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



RULES OF ORDER.

- 1st. The Council shall be opened every day with prayer.
- 2d. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing, nor shall afterwards stand up, except to address the Chair.
- 3d. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat, and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, and avoid personality.
- 4th. If any member in speaking, or otherwise, transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to explain, and the Council shall, if appealed to, decide on the case, but without debate; and, if there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed; if otherwise, and the case require it, he shall be liable to the censure of the Council.
- 5th. When two or more members happen to rise at once, the President shall name the member who is first to speak.
- 6th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the Council, nor more than once, until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- 7th. While the President is putting any question, or addressing the Council, none shall walk out of or across the house; nor in such case, nor when a member is speaking, shall entertain private discourse; nor whilst a member is speaking shall pass between him and the Chair.
- 8th. No member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is immediately and particularly interested, nor in any case where he was not present when the question was put.
- 9th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member, without the limits allotted as seats of the members, shall be counted.
- 10th. Every member, who shall be in the house when the question is put, shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reason, shall excuse him.

Rules of Order.

11. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, or, being in writing, it shall be handed to the Chair, and read aloud by the Secretary before debate.

12th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member shall require it.

13th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment.

14th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely or to a certain day, to commit to a committee, or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order they stand arranged.

15. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and shall be

decided without debate.

16th. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; and until it is decided, shall preclude all amendments and farther debate on the main question.

17th. On the previous question there shall be no debate.

18th. When a question is decided by the Council, or is postponed indefinitely, the same shall not be acted upon again during the session without the consent of two-thirds of the members present.

19th. Any member may call for the division of a question where the sense will admit of it, but a question to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted, under color of amendment, as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

21st. When a motion has been once made and carried, in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member of the majority to move a reconsideration thereof on the same or next day.

22d. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Council unless he has leave, or be sick and unable to attend.

23d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those pews allotted for the use of members, which shall be appropriated to the exclusive accommodation of visiting clergymen, and candidates for orders, who may be invited by the Rector or Wardens of the Church in which the meetings of the Council are held.

Rules of Order.

under the direction of the President of the Council; it being expected that those to whom such seats are appropriated will confine themselves to the same.

24th. No spectator shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members of the Council; and it is expected and hoped that not only the spectators will attend to this regulation, but that the Rector and Wardens of the Church in which the sessions of the Council are held, will see that this rule of order is not violated.

25th. There shall, not later than the second day of the Council, be appointed by the President, unless otherwise directed by the Council, the following Standing Committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the Address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee of Elections.

A Committee of Finance, consisting of laymen.

26th. The credentials of the Lay Delegates shall be handed in to the Secretary, and be referred to a Committee of one clerical and two lay members, which shall report who are entitled to seats in the Council; and if there is any doubt as to the right of any delegate to his seat, the same shall be referred to the Committee of Elections to be by the said Committee forthwith examined into and reported upon to the Council.

27th. When three members require it, the vote on all questions shall be by ayes and noes.

28th. None of the Rules of Order shall be suspended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

29th. The business first in order, after the organization of the Council, shall be the appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is not a member of the Council; reading the Pastoral Addresses, and the proceedings of the Standing Committees.

Rector's Salaries-Petitions.

It will be perceived that the sum of \$1,540 has been advanced by laymen to meet the payments as they fell due. The sums contributed by churches and individuals, since the last Council adjourned, have not amounted, in the aggregate, to one-half of what was required. The Treasurer informs the undersigned, that owing to the prospective expenses incident to the General Convention, and other burdens likely to fall upon the contingent fund during the year, but little aid can be relied on from that source to meet the last payment. It is hoped, however, that contributions expected from congregations which have not yet forwarded them, will be received in time, and that means will be found to discharge the remaining liability without the necessity of any urgent appeals to the Diocese. As soon as the purchase money is paid, the title will be made to the trustees designated by the former resolution of the Council.

XIX, offered by himself at last Council, be made the order of the day for to-morrow afternoon upon the assembling of the Council. Agreed to.

Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D. moved that all the visiting clergy and candidates for orders, and licensed lay readers present, be admitted to honorary seats in the Council. Agreed to.

Mr. Tazewell Taylor moved at 11 o'clock that the Council adjourn for Divine service. Agreed to.

The Council re-assembled after recess.

Rev. J. A. Latané asked to be relieved from serving as chairman on the committee on the State of the Church, which was granted by the Council, and the Rev. H. Suter appointed in his place.

The Bishop then read his annual address.

Bishop Johns' Address.

In reporting the services rendered during the past year, you will indulge me in the recollection, that this is the twenty-ninth anniversary on which I have been privileged to assemble with the representatives of the Church in Virginia; each marked in memory by much to which we may recur with pleasure, and I trust with profit. Everything indicates that this Council will, in number, character and efficiency, prove in nothing inferior to those by which it has been preceded. My hope is animated by the assurance that we have come together with much prayer, that He without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy, will guide and control us in all our deliberations, that they may be conducted with wisdom and love, and tend to the advancement of His glory, and the extension of pure and undefiled religion.

During the session of the last Council I addressed the congregation in St. Matthew's on Ascension day, and after the Council had adjourned I addressed a congregation on Sunday morning in the same place, and in the afternoon another in St. John's Church on the subject of Missions.

June 12.—In compliance with the special request of the Rector of the Church in Lexington, I made an early visit to that Parish, that I might officiate there before the close of the annual course of study in Washington College and the Military Institute, and the consequent dispersion of those in attendance.

In the morning I preached in Grace Church, and confirmed eighteen. At night, on invitation from the Young Men's Christian Association, I preached in the new and spacious chapel of the College, to a very large and attentive audience.

June 13.—I returned to Staunton, and the next evening preached in Trinity Church, and confirmed sixteen.

June 15.—I attended the Commencement at the Virginia Female Institute, and addressed the graduating class. This school continues to merit the signal success it has attained. Instead of requiring efforts to gain patronage, the difficulty is in accommodating the numerous applicants. I am happy to add that the religious influence on the pupils has been very encouraging.

June 16.—I travelled round through Charlottesville to Liberty, Bedford county, where the next day I preached and confirmed four.

June 19.—In Grace Church, Lynchburg, I preached in the morning, and confirmed fifteen, and at night in St. Paul's, and confirmed twenty-two.

June 21-5.—I was occupied with the examinations and other exercises at the close of the session of the Seminary.

June 24.—In the chapel of the Seminary, I advanced to Priest's Orders the Rev'd Pendleton Brooke, Wm. M. Dame, Otis A. Glazebrook, Sewell S. Hepbron, Wm. H. Laird, Haslett McKim, C. C. Penick, and C. Yancey Steptoe.

June 26.—At Langley, a very promising station in the vicinity of the Seminary, I preached and confirmed ten. Arrangements are making to erect a suitable house of worship for the accommodation of this congregation.

July 2-Was the day of my appointment at Acquia Creek.

Owing to some misunderstanding, no conveyance was sent to the depot, and I was obliged to proceed to Fredericksburg.

July 8.—I rode to Christ Church, Spotsylvania, preached, and confirmed four.

July 4.—I preached in St. John's, Spotsylvania, and confirmed four.

July 5.—At St. Margaret's, Caroline, I preached, and confirmed two.

July 7.—At St. Paul's, Hanover, I preached, and confirmed two.

July 8.—Immanuel, Hanover, I preached, and confirmed two. July 10.—At a church in Sussex, I preached, and confirmed three.

July 11—At Christ Church, Hicksford, I preached, and confirmed one.

July 12.—At Grace Church, Greensville, I preached.

July 13.—At St. Andrew's, Brunswick, I preached, and confirmed fifteen white and two colored persons.

July 14.—At Trinity, Brunswick, I preached, and confirmed six.

At night, at Culpeper C. H., after sermon by the Rev. Mr. Steptoe, I addressed the congregation.

October 12.—At Leeds, I preached, and confirmed four.

October 13.—At Salem, I preached, and confirmed two.

October 14.—At the Plains, I preached, and confirmed sixteen.

At night, I preached at Aldie, and confirmed two.

For the month of October, I had a series of appointments, extending through the Northern Neck; but when the time for their fulfilment was at hand, a sudden and sharp attack disabled me for meeting my engagements. As the Rt. Rev. Bishop Payne was then residing just where my visitation was to begin, I did not hesitate to dispatch to him a request that he would

officiate for me till I should be able to join him on the route, and share with him the services as my strength would permit. I scarcely need state that he promptly afforded the assistance solicited, and to the great satisfaction of the several congregations visited by him, rendered the following services, which I very gratefully report:

October 26.—At St. Peter's, Oak Grove, Bishop Payne preached, and confirmed eleven.

October 27.—At Nomini Church, he preached, and confirmed three.

October 28.—At Yeocomico Church, he preached, and confirmed two.

On the 27th of October, I was sufficiently recovered to travel, and taking the route by Baltimore and the Bay, I was able to reach my appointment on the 30th at White Chapel, near the Rappahannock. Here Bishop Payne soon joined me, and accompanied me through my visitation, affording me very acceptable assistance.

October 80.—I preached at White Chapel, and confirmed two.

October 31.—I preached in Grace Church, Lancaster, and confirmed three.

November 1.—At Lancaster C. H., Bishop Payne preached. I confirmed one.

November 3.—At St. John's, Essex, I preached, and confirmed eight.

November 4.—At St. Paul's, Essex, after sermon by Bishop Payne, I admitted to Deacon's Orders Mr. J. Hervey Hundley. In the services on this occasion we were assisted by the Rev. Charles Goodrich, D. D., and by the Rev. Messrs. May and Greene.

At night, in St. John's, Tappahannock, after sermon by Rev. Mr. May, I addressed the congregation.

November 9.—I preached in Emmanuel Church, Rockingham.

At night, I preached in the same Church, and confirmed thirteen.

November 10.—I preached in Front Royal.

November 11.—I preached in St. Thomas' Chapel, Middletown.

November 12.—I preached in Christ Church, Winchester, and confirmed four.

November 13.—At White Post, I preached, and confirmed four. There is good reason for believing that a suitable house of worship at this place would ensure a permanent and prosperous congregation.

November 14.—In Christ Church, Millwood, I preached, and confirmed two.

November 15.—In Grace Church, Berryville, I preached, and confirmed ten.

November 16.—In Wickliffe Church, I preached, and confirmed four.

November 17.—In Zion Church, Charlestown, I preached, and confirmed seventeen.

November 18.—In Grace Church, Middleway, I preached, and confirmed two.

November 19.—I preached in St. Bartholomew's, Leetown.

November 20.—I preached in Christ Church, Bunker Hill.

The same morning, in Trinity Church, Shepherdstown, after a sermon by the Rev. Mr. Avirett, I addressed the congregation.

November 21.—In the same Church, I preached, and confirmed six.

November 22.—In Trinity Church, Martinsburg, I preached, and confirmed six.

November 23.—In Zion Church, Hedgesville, I preached, and confirmed eleven.

November 27.—At Manassas, I preached, and confirmed three. In this new and growing settlement there is much to encourage the hope that a church will soon be built, and a congregation gathered there.

November 28.—I preached at Haymarket, and confirmed five.

November 29.—At Centreville, I preached, and confirmed one.

November 30.—I preached at Fairfax C. H., and confirmed ten.

December 18.—I preached in the Church at West End, and confirmed five.

December 25.—I preached in the Seminary Chapel.

1871, January 8.—I preached in the Seminary Chapel.

January 19.—I preached in the Seminary Chapel.

March 6.—I preached in Christ Church, Georgetown, D. C.

March 17.—I preached in the Seminary Chapel.

March 25.—I preached in Christ Church, Alexandria.

March 29.—I preached in the Seminary Chapel.

April 4 & 7.—I preached in the Seminary Chapel.

April 9.—In the Seminary Chapel, acting for the Bishop of Nebraska, I admitted Mr. J. Owen Dorsey to Deacon's Orders. During his connection with the Seminary, he was a diligent and exemplary student, and I doubt not will prove a valuable acquisition to the Indian Mission, to which he has dedicated himself.

April 16.—In the morning, I preached in Christ Church, Alexandria, and confirmed thirty-four.

In the afternoon, I preached at St. Paul's, and confirmed twenty-three, and one from Christ Church.

At night, in Grace Church, I preached, and confirmed sixteen.

April 23.—I preached in the morning in Grace Church, Richmond, and confirmed fifteen.

At night, I preached in St. Mark's, and confirmed twenty-five.

April 24.—I preached in St. James Church, and confirmed twenty-nine.

April 26.—I preached in the morning in Trinity Church, Portsmouth, and confirmed twenty.

At night, I preached in St. John's, and confirmed seven.

April 27.—In Christ Church, Norfolk, I preached, and confirmed thirty-five.

April 28.—I preached in St. Paul's, and confirmed twentynine.

April 30.—I preached in St. John's Church, Hampton, and confirmed fifteen.

On my previous visit to Hampton, the venerable church was in ruins; nothing remaining but the bare walls, and those in a condition more likely to fall than ever again to bear a roof. Of those accustomed to worship there, few remained, and these not in a condition to repair the ruin. But, under God's blessing, zeal, energy and perseverance have accomplished what I did not expect to see—the dilapidated building thoroughly restored, and to more than its former convenience and adornment, with a congregation filling it to its capacity, and already yielding as the fruits of the labor of its minister, fifteen persons to give themselves to God in the rite of confirmation. My only sadness in connection with the joyful scene was the knowledge that our worthy brother, who has so endeared himself to the people as to afford good hope of continued and increasing usefulness, had decided to relieve himself from regular parochial duties, and consult his physical strength in services of another form.

At night, I preached in Centurion Church, Fortress Monroe.

May 1.—I crossed the Bay to Northampton, and at night, in
Christ Church, Eastville, after sermon by the Rev. Mr. Lindsay,
I addressed the congregation.

May 2.—In Christ Church, Eastville, I admitted to Priest's Orders the Rev. J. Julian Clemens. Sermon by the Rev. J. H. D. Wingfield, who, with the Rev. M. S. Chevers and the Rev. J. S. Lindsay, united in the imposition of hands, and assisted in the administration of the Lord's Supper.

At night, I preached in the same church, and confirmed three.

May 4.—In St. James Church, Drummondtown, I baptized
an adult, preached, and confirmed one person.

May 5.—I preached in the church at Temperanceville, and at night at Onancock.

May 7.—I preached in Hungar's Church, and confirmed one. May 8.—Recrossed the Bay to Norfolk, and next morning rode to Kempsville, preached, and confirmed one.

May 10.—The morning was very unfavorable for a congregation; but at the Eastern Shore Chapel we were met by so many more than we expected, that the Rev. Mr. Okeson, who kindly accompanied me on this part of my visitation, encountering with me its exposure and fatigue, read the service, and I preached. This Church is at present without a minister, but Mr. Okeson has offered to visit them to administer the Lord's Supper, and from time to time render them such services during their vacancy, as his engagements with his own congregation will allow.

In the evening we returned to Norfolk, and the next morning I took the boat for Gloucester, that I might be in place for the appointments in that vicinity.

May 12.—I was with the Rev. Mr. Phillips at Abingdon Church, but the incessant heavy rain prevented the parishioners from assembling.

May 13.—I preached in Ware Church, and confirmed three.

May 14.—I preached in Christ Church, Mathews. The congregation was much larger than the building could accommodate. Many gathered round the door and windows; others were beyond the speaker's voice. Prayers were read by the Rev. C. S. Sykes, of the Diocese of New York, residing for his health in this vicinity.

May 14.—In Trinity Church, Mathews, I preached, and confirmed one. Prayer was read by the Rev. Mr. Sykes, who occasionally officiates in that Church. The Rev. Mr. Mann assisted me in administering the Lord's Supper.

In the afternoon, I rode seven miles to the Piankatank, and crossed in a small boat to Middlesex. In crossing, I was overtaken by a violent storm, during which a skiff which we passed was struck by lightning and the boatman killed. A merciful Providence, which I desire gratefully to acknowledge, con-

ducted me in safety to the hospitable shelter where I was kindly received.

May 16.—I read prayers and preached in Christ Church, Middlesex. This congregation, and the two in Mathews, are, I lament to say, still without the services of a settled minister, though every effort has been made for their supply.

May 21.—I preached at Sharon, Fairfax Co., and confirmed three.

May 23.—I preached in Immanuel Church, Henrico county, in the morning, and confirmed eleven.

At night, I preached in St. John's, Richmond, and confirmed fourteen, one being from Memorial Church, Manchester, one from the Monumental, and one from St. James' Ch., Richmond.

DRATHS.

During the past year, the Rev. John Grammer, of Halifax, closed his life of long and fruitful service in the Gospel. I may

truly speak of him as one of the fathers of the Church in Virginia, to whose sound learning, excellent example, and abundant labors, its revival may be ascribed, and from whose ministrations it received a salutary impression to be held in grateful remembrance. In organizing and sustaining the religious institutions which now bless this Diocese, he was active and generous; and to his practical wisdom and vigilance they are largely indebted for the success which has attended their agency. To his venerated name I lament to add that of the Rev. H. W. L. TEMPLE, of South Farnham Parish, Essex, whose humble, but useful and diligent ministry, begun and ended where he calmly departed this life in the faith which he had preached and practiced in earnest simplicity, leaving as his memorial the many souls he had been instrumental in bringing to Jesus.

Your expectation would, I am sure, be disappointed, and I must do violence to my own feelings, if I did not depart from what has been customary in this connection, by recording the death of two of our brethren of the laity.

GEN. ROBERT E. LEE received his not unexpected or unwelcome summons whilst engaged in the discharge of his duties as a vestryman of Grace Church, Lexington. Immediately after his return from the Mexican war, in which he was distinguished for all that could adorn a Christian soldier, he, with one of his daughters on each arm, presented himself for confirmation in Christ Church, Alexandria. The whole congregation was moved and melted to tears by the affecting scene. In parting from him, I could not refrain from the remark-"If you now serve your God as faithfully as you have served your country, you will indeed be to be envied." His patriotism was only surpassed by his exemplary piety, which was neither dazzled by the glory of signal success in his profession, nor paralyzed and disheartened by reverses for which he was not responsible. his honorable retirement he was so eminent for his noble bearing, exemplary virtues, and varied active usefulness, that there was no place for thought of his former renown. If his heart was at times saddened, it was by the sorrows of others, who

now mourn their great bereavement, yet rejoice in the assurance that his rest is glorious, and his crown incorruptible.

On my visit to Leesburg last October, my first greeting was from our deceased brother, Dr. THOMAS H. CLAGGET. During the services of the day he manifested his usual interest. passed the evening under his hospitable roof, in happy Christian converse. Next morning before day, he was at the Parsonage to rouse the family, and so prevent my being too late for the train. He returned to his chamber to rest till his usual hour, and in a few minutes after lying down was a corpse. For some time he had been laboring under a disease of the heart, to which he alluded the evening before, as fully aware of the precariousness of his life. He had for years been habitually ready for the change, and at last the transition was in an instant into the presence and joy of the Lord. The place in the congregation of which he had for years been a most valuable and beloved vestryman-in the Council of the Diocese, where his influence was always salutary, and especially in the Board of Trustees of the Seminary of which he had long been a most reliable and useful member, cannot easily be supplied. May the loss sustained by these removals be repaired by the increased devotion and zeal of those who remain, and by the accession of others of like godly conversation and usefulness.

DIOCESAN INSTITUTIONS.

The reports which you will receive of the religious institutions of the Diocese will satisfy you that they have been judiciously managed, and deserve your continued confidence and support. If for a time the Missionary Society found itself embarrassed by a failure of its funds, this only furnished occasion for a generous advance by our Treasurer, which was soon returned, and your treasury replenished by a liberal response of our parishes to an appeal for relief. A little attention in making the congregational collections for this and the other societies will easily prevent all necessity for such special application.

Though our Education Society has not been as well supplied with means as its importance, and the cases for which assistance was needed, required, yet, by judicious economy, with very acceptable aid from the Evangelical Education Society, and Christian friends beyond the Diocese, who have volunteered to contribute to the support of several students, it is believed that provision has been made for every proper applicant.

Our Theological Seminary continues to furnish its annual contribution to meet the demand for clergy in our own and other Dioceses, and in the missionary field. More than seventy of our own clergy are its alumni, and soon this number will be increased to supply the parishes which are still vacant. You judge of its management and influence by its fruits thus distributed among you, and I trust find increasing cause for gratitude to God for an institution to which we owe so much, and for fervent prayers for his blessing upon its students, and their honored and loved Professors. That through the liberality of Anson G. Phelps Dodge, Esq. the Board is able to make provision for the support of these Professors, in some measure commensurate with their valuable labors, is a source of great satisfaction. The same generous benefactor has also appropriately provided for additions to the library and the improvement of the grounds, which will soon make them what we have long desired, and worthy of the institution to which they pertain. A few years since, and by a mysterious dispensation, it was gasping for life and like to die-now it stands before us in healthful vigor and activity, more prosperous than ever, and with encouraging prospects of increasing usefulness. Giver of every good and perfect gift be all the glory!

The High School at Howard shares in this happy restoration. During the past year it has been well and successfully conducted, and is justly entitled to the increasing patronage it has earned. I commend it very confidently to those who seek for their sons a course of thorough academic instruction under influences favorable to moral and religious culture. This, with other excellent schools existing in different sections of the Dio-

cese, remove all pretext for the sinful inconsideration which perils the souls of our youth by placing them under instructors, hostile to scriptural truth as held by our branch of the Protestant Church.

In closing this summary of services, I may add that whilst at home during the winter and early spring, in addition to other services, I devoted two days in each week to the Senior Class in the Seminary engaged in the study of Pastoral Theology and the composition of sermons. Though not a part of my official work, I hope to be able to continue it till other provision can be made for its satisfactory performance.

For the protection and strength afforded me in the imperfect services I am permitted to report—for the fraternal consideration and generous assistance of my brethren of the clergy, and for the affectionate reception and entertainment which, in all parts of the Diocese, I have met with from our good people now more endeared to me by the intercourse of nine and twenty years, I have no words to express my appreciation and grati-This blessed experience lightened the labors, and abated the trials inseparable from the arduous responsibilities of the Episcopate, and animated me, I trust, with an earnest desire to spend the time and strength which may remain to me, so as, with the blessing of God and your cordial cooperation, to maintain most successfully the doctrines, worship and discipline to which the Diocese is indebted for its prosperity. To this end. dear brethren, I am persuaded your prayers will be unceasingly directed.

Bishop Whittle then read his annual address:

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN:

On the assembling of the last Council in Wheeling, I assisted the Bishop in the administration of the Lord's Supper, made missionary addresses in both the churches during its session, and Sunday night, May 29th, 1870, preached the closing sermon in St. Matthew's Church.

I had taken a severe cold in travelling from Clarksburg to Weston, and after struggling against it for several days, was so unwell at this point, that I was obliged to recall my remaining appointments, and return home.

December 10.—Preached, morning and night, at Louisa C. H. December 11.—Preached again, and confirmed 7; the first time, it is believed, this apostolic rite was ever administered at this place. There were 15 candidates, 8 of whom were prevented by the inclemency of the weather from being present.

December 16.—In Christ Church, Hicksford, after morning prayer by Rev. Mr. Glazebrook, and sermon by Dr. Gibson, Rev. David Barr, rector of the parish, was admitted to Priest's orders, Rev. Dr. Peterkin presenting, and uniting with the other Presbyters in the imposition of hands.

December 25.—In the morning, assisted the rector of St. James', Richmond, in the celebration of the Lord's Supper; and in the afternoon catechised the children of Christ Church Sunday School.

1871, January 8.—Preached at night in St. Mark's, Richmond.

January 26 and 27.—Was in attendance at the delegate missionary meetings of the Diocesan Missionary Society, in St. Paul's Church, Lynchburg.

January 27.—Preached at night in Grace Memorial Church, and confirmed 9.

January 29.—Preached, morning and night, in St. Paul's, Richmond, the rector being absent on missionary duty.

February 5.—Took part in the services of the City Missionary Association, in St. Paul's, Richmond.

February 12.—Preached, morning and night, in Christ Ch., Norfolk, and in the afternoon addressed the Sunday School.

February 14 and 15.—Attended the meetings of the S. W. Convocation in Trinity Ch., Portsmouth.

February 19.—Preached in Grace Ch., Richmond.

February 26.—Catechised the Sunday School, and preached

in St. John's, Richmond; the rector being absent on missionary duty.

March 5.—In the afternoon, read the service, and presched in Christ Church, Richmond; and at night, presided at the monthly meeting of the City Missionary Association, in St. James' Church.

March 12 and 19.—Read prayers, and preached in Christ Church, Richmond.

March 25.—Read prayers, and preached, morning and night, at Louisa C. H., and baptized an adult at the first service.

March 26.—Had an appointment for service and confirmation at the same place, but rain throughout the day prevented the congregation from assembling.

April 2.—Preached in the morning in St. Mark's, and in the afternoon in Christ Church, Richmond.

April 4.—Preached in the Monumental, and confirmed 23, one being from St. James'.

April 5.—In the morning, preached in the Monumental, and at night in St. Paul's, and confirmed 32.

April 6.—Preached at night in St. George's, Fredericksburg.

April 7.—Good Friday morning and night, preached in the

same church, and confirmed 13.

April 8.—Preached in Acquia Church, Stafford, and at night baptized a child of the rector, Rev. J. M. Meredith.

April 9.—Easter morning, preached, and confirmed 11 in Acquia, and at night preached in St. George's, Fredericksburg.

April 14 and 15.—Preached in Christ Church, Charlottesville, where 35 were confirmed.

April 16.—Preached in Boyden chapel, Augusta Co., and in Trinity, Staunton, and confirmed 27, 11 being from the Female Institute.

April 18.—Preached in Trinity, Campbell C. H., confirmed 2, and administered the Lord's Supper, assisted by Rev. J. H. Williams.

April 19.—St. John's, Campbell Co., preached, confirmed 1, and administered the Communion.

April 20.—Was prevented in the morning from filling an appointment at Trinity, Bedford Co., by rain; at night, in Grace Memorial, Lynchburg, preached, and confirmed 16.

April 21.—In St. Paul's, preached, and confirmed 56.

April 23.—Christ Church, Albemarle, preached, and confirmed 2.

April 30.—Preached in Meade Memorial Ch., Manchester, where 13 were confirmed.

Hoping now for favorable weather, my next work was the completion of the visitation of West Virginia, which had been interrupted by sickness last fall. Leaving home the first day of the month,

May 3.—In Christ Church, Fairmont, preached, and confirmed 4.

May 4.—Trinity, Moundsville, after sermon, confirmed 8.

May 5.—Preached in St. Matthew's, Wheeling, and confirmed 31.

May 6.—Preached in Christ Church, Wellsburg.

. May 7.—In St. John's, Brooke Co., in the morning, preached, and confirmed 1, and at night preached, and confirmed 6, in Christ Church, Wellsburg.

May 9.—In St. Matthew's, Wheeling, ordained Rev. Thos. 0. Tongue Presbyter, assisted by Rev. Messrs. J. H. Woods and J. Cowpland. Sermon by myself. Mr. Tongue went to Wheeling in November, as City Missionary, but since Christmas, had been acceptably and successfully supplying St. Matthew's, which was without a rector.

May 10.—Preached in St. John's, Pleasants county.

May 11.—In the morning preached in Emanuel Church, Volcano, Wood county; and in the afternoon, after sermon by Rev. W. L. Hyland, addressed and confirmed 5.

This church is about 25 miles from Parkersburg, surrounded by oil wells, and in the midst of a population of several hundred souls.

Four months before, the building had not been commenced;

it was now finished; a beautiful edifice, with seats for 160 persons, and having cost from \$3,000 to \$3,500.

Messrs. Hyland and Tompkins supply them with services as far as they can, but the people seemed resolved to have a pastor of their own, and God, I trust and believe, will crown their efforts, to procure one, with success.

May 12.—In Trinity, Parkersburg, preached and confirmed 2.
May 13.—Read prayers and preached in Grace Church, Ravenswood.

May 14.—Rode 12 miles to Ripley, the county seat of Jackson county, where I read morning prayer, baptized one adult and 4 children, preached and confirmed 4: and returning to Ravenswood at night, read evening prayer, baptized an infant, and preached in Grace Church.

The people at these two places are very anxious to procure the services of a minister, and pledge themselves to contribute \$400 towards his support.

May 16.—Preached morning and night in Point Pleasant, Mason county, where 5 were confirmed.

May 18.—Preached in the courthouse at Barboursville, Cabell county.

May 19 and 20—Preached in St. Mark's, Coalsmouth, and confirmed one.

Here and at Huntington, the terminus of the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad are good, and constantly enlarging fields of labor for an earnest, godly man. Oh! that Christians everywhere would unceasingly pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth more laborers into his harvest.

May 21.—In St. John's Church, Charleston, in the morning, at the request of the rector, baptized six children, preached and confirmed 5; and at night baptized an adult, preached and confirmed one.

May 28.—Preached in the morning in St. Stephen's, Petersburg, and confirmed 3; and at night in St. Paul's, and confirmed 38.

Rev. Dr. Pendleton asked leave to read a communication from the vestry of Grace Church, Lexington, stating their action, and expressing their grief upon the death of General Robert E. Lee. Permission was granted, and the communication was read to the Council.

Mr. T. Taylor moved that the election of deputies to the General Convention be made the order of the day for to-morrow morning, at 10 o'clock. Agreed to.

Rev. Dr. Pendleton, from the Committee on new Parishes, recommended the granting of the petition of Christ Church, Spottsylvania, to be set apart as a separate congregation. Approved.

Also to agree to the paper fixing the metes and bounds of Dale and Chesterfield Parishes.

Also to grant the petition of All Saints Parish, Monroe county, to be received into union with the Council, the metes and bounds to be the same as those of Monroe county.

Also to grant the petition of Hamilton Parish, Fauquier, for a division of the same. Approved.

The petition of members of the church in Wood county, asking for a division of the Parish, was found informal in not having given the three months notice to the Bishop.

Upon motion of Rev. Mr. Hyland, it was laid upon the table for further consideration.

The amendments to the Constitution proposed by Mr. Tazwell Taylor were called up by him, and he moved their adoption.

Bruce Fund.

The amendment proposed to Article second, changing the word "State," in the 5th line of said Article, to the words "States of Virginia and West Virginia," was first taken up, and at the request of Rev. W. L. Hyland laid over for the present.

The amendment proposed to Article first, causing it to read as follows:

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in this Diocese every year, at such time and place as the Council shall at each previous session thereof appoint, was then taken up.

Pending the discussion upon this amendment, the Council adjourned until Friday, at 9 A M.

Friday, June 2, 1871, 9 A. M.

The Council met, and was opened with prayer by Rev. Geo. Woodbridge, D. D.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The following clergy appeared and took their seats:—Rev. Wm. M. Nelson, Rev. Wm. F. Gardner.

Rev. Dr. Pendleton, from the Committee on new Parishes, presented the petitions of Christ Church and Catocton Church, Shelburne Parish, Loudoun, asking to be set apart as separate congregations, and recommended that the petition be granted; which was agreed to.

Leave of absence granted to Rev. Geo. T. Wilmer, D. D. Rev. Dr. Peterkin, from the Committee appointed to examine the accounts of the Bruce Fund, made the following report:

The Committee appointed to examine the account of the trustees of the "Bruce Fund," respectfully report that they find it to be correct. During the year assistance has been rendered in repairing or building seven churches, at an outlay of \$750, and the treasurer reports a balance in hand of \$1,137 82, while the investments amount to \$17,632 30.

Colored Congregations.

Our thanks are specially due to the trustees for their judicious management of this fund.

Rev. Dr. Andrews, from the Committee appointed in 1869 to consider and report upon the relations of colored congregations, made the following report:

The Committee appointed at the Council of 1869, to enquire and report respecting the relationship of any Episcopal colored congregations to the Council, respectfully submit—

That shortly after their appointment they entered into correspondence with all the Southern Dioceses, and from the answers received, it appeared that there were at the time but two such congregations served by colored ministers, one in Virginia and one in Maryland, and that with respect to both, no special legislation had been called for by them, or dissatisfaction with existing relationships expressed.

The Committee might give their views at length upon the subject if there were any interest pending to which they would apply. Such not being the case, they ask to be discharged from its further consideration.

Rev. Dr. Andrews, from the Committee appointed to consider and report upon the proposed amendments to Article V. of Constitution of the Church in the United States presented the following report, which was laid over for the present at the request of Rev. Dr. Gibson.

The Committee appointed to consider and report upon the change in the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, which was proposed by the General Convention at its last session, and which is now submitted according to said Constitution to this Coun-

Amendments to Constitution.

cil for its concurrence or non-concurrence, submit the result of its deliberations as follows, viz:

- 1. It appears that the Constitution, as it now stands, requires, in order to the division of a Diocese, that the original Diocese, after the division, must have at least 30 self-supporting Parishes, and 20 resident Presbyters, and the part set off not less than 15 self-supporting Parishes and 12 resident Presbyters, and the part set off is left to determine for itself whether it can support a Bishop or not.
- 2. That under the proposed alteration of the Constitution, a Diocese, having but 18 Presbyters, all of whom may be Missionaries, or the beneficiaries of parties outside of said Diocese, may constitute from itself two Dioceses with two Bishops, but it is provided that the salary for the new Bishop must be first guaranteed.

The Committee is of opinion that the proposed alteration indicates an undue reliance upon the Episcopate, as a means of propagating the church, that with such an insignificant jurisdiction as it renders possible, and is likely to create beyond all precedent in church history, the legitimate powers and importance of the Episcopate as a whole, and its capacity to do good, will be diminished, instead of being increased, and in such wise as to effect no inconsiderable change in the Constitution of an Episcopal Church, as it has been, if not from the beginning, certainly since the reformation; and, furthermore, that it opens the way for temptations to the establishment of new Dioceses from improper motives.

The Committee therefore recommends the following for adoption:

Resolved, That this Council does not concur in the said proposed change in the 5th Article of the Constitution.

Dr. Frederick Horner moved that the subject of Church Education be made the order of the day for to-morrow at 10 o'clock, and carried.

Mr. Massie, from the Committee to consider the subject of a rule of order relating to unfinished business, reported that the Committee recommended no change in the rules, and asked to be discharged. Agreed to.

Rev. Wm. H. Meade, from the Committee appointed to examine the report of the Treasurer of the Fund for the relief of

Clerical Deputies.

Disabled Clergy, reported that the same had been examined and found to be correct.

Rev. J. H. D. Wingfield, D. D., from the Committee appointed in 1869 to consider and report upon any necessary changes in Canon IX., presented the Canon agreed upon by the Committee, and moved that it be considered section by section. Motion carried.

Pending the discussion, on motion of Mr. Tazewell Taylor, the Council proceeded to ballot for deputies to the General Convention. The following gentlemen were nominated as clerical deputies:

Whilst the tellers were collecting and counting the ballots, Rev. Dr. Wall moved that the newly proposed Canon IX. be laid upon the table. Lost.

Rev. D. F. Sprigg moved that the whole subject be recommitted to a committee, to be appointed by the Chair. Lost.

Rev. Dr. Pendleton moved to reconsider the vote. Motion carried, and the motion to recommit was carried, and the following committee appointed: Rev. Dr. Norton, Rev. J. H. D. Wingfield, D. D., Rev. W. H. Laird, Judge Sheffey, Mr. N. H. Massie, Mr. Tazewell Taylor.

Judge Lay gave notice of his intention to offer to morrow a resolution to repeal Canon X.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Hyland, the Council then took recesssor for Divine service.

The Council reassembled after service. The Rev. T. E. Locke, on behalf of the tellers appointed to collect the ballots for lay deputies, reported the election of Rev. Geo. H. Norton, D. D., and Rev. C. W. Andrews, D. D., and that none others had obtained a sufficient number of votes to elect.

The Council proceeded to a second ballot, in which there was no election.

A third ballot was ordered, which resulted in the election of Rev. J. S. Hanckel as the third clerical deputy.

A fourth ballot was ordered for the fourth clerical deputy, which resulted in no election.

On the fifth and sixth ballots, there was no election. On the seventh ballot, the tellers announced the election of Rev. C. Minnigerode, D. D., and the Chair announced that the clerical delegation was completed. Alternates were then elected in the following order: Rev. Wm. Sparrow, D. D., Rev. Wm. C. Meredith, D. D., Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., Rev. J. Peterkin, D. D.

The Council then proceeded to elect the lay deputies. The following gentlemen were put in nomination: Hon. Willoughby Newton, Hon. H. W. Sheffey, Hon. Rich'd H. Parker, Mr. N. H. Massie, Mr. John M. Rev. W. H. Pendleton and Mr. John Coakley were appointed tellers.

lay deputies, Rev. Dr. Pendleton offered the following preamble and resolutions:

Whereas, For years past it has been evident that, in portions of our branch of the church of Christ, practices are introduced, and doctrines symbolically (and otherwise) are taught, subversive of the faith as set forth in God's holy Word, and as received from the fathers of the Reformation, especially in our Prayer Book—Therefore,

Resolved, 1. That the delegates from this Diocese to the General Convention are hereby requested to use their best endeavors to procure by Canon or otherwise, some effectual remedy for so great and growing an evil.

Resolved, 2. In case no such remedial action can be obtained, the Diocese of Virginia deems it due to its character, as part of the Protestant Episcopal Church, that a solumn protest be, in its behalf, entered by said delegates against the toleration of the unscriptural practices and teachings referred to.

On motion of Rev. J. A. Latané, the resolutions were referred for report to a special committee, appointed by the Chair, as follows: Rev. W. N. Pendleton, D. D., Rev. J. A. Latané, Rev. Joshua Peterkin, D. D., Mr. R. G. Montgomery, Mr. Geo. P. Tayloe, and Dr. R. E. Withers.

Judge Lay, from the committee appointed to consider and report upon a plan "by which church property may be insured against loss by fire," &c., presented, in the absence of the chairman, the following report, which was received and ordered to be entered upon the Journal:

The Committee appointed by the last Council, held in Wheeling, and charged with the duty of reporting on the subject of the insurance of Church property, on the mutual principle, report the following plan:

1st. That an association be organized, to be called "The Mutual Insurance Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

2nd. Its officers shall consist of a President, Secretary and Treasurer, to be annually appointed by the lay delegates to the Council from the churches that shall become members of the Society. The said officers, together, shall constitute a Board of Directors for the management of the business of the Society, and for the investment and application of all funds which shall come into their hands, and shall continue in office until their successors are appointed and enter upon the discharge of their duties.

Insurance on Church Property.

3d. Any Church in the Diocese may become a member of the Society, on paying to the Treasurer an initiation fee of two dollars, and from time to time upon payment to the Treasurer of any further sum it may choose. Its church building, lecture-room, rectory, or other property, as shall be designated by it, shall thereupon stand insured against loss or injury by fire for the space of one year for one hundred times such further sum: provided, in the event of loss or injury, such Church shall not receive from the Society a sum exceeding the actual loss or injury sustained: and provided further, that for the first ten years no building or other property shall be insured for a sum exceeding two thousand dollars.

4th. The extent of all losses and injuries to be ascertained by a board of three arbitrators, one to be chosen by the Board of Directors, one by the vestry of the Church sustaining the loss, and the third by the two, whose award shall be reported to the Board of Directors, and shall be conclusive.

5th. The Board of Directors shall have power, from time to time, to make such by-laws as may be necessary for the management of the business of the Society.

6th. In the event of a deficiency of funds to meet any loss, such deficiency shall be apportioned among the members of the Society by the Board of Directors, in proportion to the amount of their respective insurance. Any member failing, for the space of six months, to pay such assessment, shall thereby forfeit his membership, unless the time for paying such assessment shall be extended by the Board of Directors.

The foregoing plan is believed to be practicable, with one exception, to wit: For the want of some mode of investment of the premiums other than in the individual names of the Board of Directors, there is danger of all the funds of the Society being lost. To meet this difficulty, equally applicable to all the charitable and benevolent funds of the Church, the Council at its last session appointed a committee, of which Judge Hugh W. Sheffey is chairman, to consider the subject, and report to the Council at its present session. Until that committee reports, and measures are taken to meet the difficulty, your committee deems it inexpedient to take any further action in the premises.

Life Insurance.

Judge Lay, from the Committee to whom was referred the subject of the "Brotherhood," (vide Journal 1870, page 72,) presented the following report and resolutions:

To the Committee to whom, at the last session of the Council, was recommitted the report in relation to Life Insurance of the Clergy, respectfully report—

That after the adoption of the resolution recommitting said report, a meeting was held in the lecture room of St. Matthew's Church, Wheeling, at which an Association was organized by the name of "the Brotherhood of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia," and a Constitution adopted, a printed copy of which is herewith returned as a part of this report. Subsequently certain by-laws were adopted for the government of the Association, a printed copy of which is also herewith returned.

The Committee, deeming the plan of organization set forth in the Constitution and By-laws referred to, subject to such modifications as experience may suggest to be preferable to that of the recommitted report, will forbear making any other suggestion than that the Council gives its sanction to the objects of the existing Association.

The Committee therefore respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. That the Council, approving the objects of "the Brotherhood of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia," earnestly commends the same to the careful consideration of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, and expresses the hope that those who have begun this work, so good and beneficent in itself, so eminently just to the clergy, and so beneficial in its tendencies to the church in this Diocese, may persevere in this labor of love, and may receive the active and zealous cooperation of all within the Diocese, who desire the prosperity and welfare of our common Zion.
- 2. That the Council recognizes, in the organization of this Association, a manifestation of interest on the part of the laity in the welfare of the clergy, entitled to sincere commendation, and trust that the Spirit may grow stronger and stronger, until this Diocese shall be thronged with laborers in the ministry, who shall rejoice to toil on within its borders, with the assurance that the objects of their tenderest solicitude will be cared for when they shall be called away by the Master.
- 3. That the trustees of the Brotherhood be requested to communicate to the Council, at each of its sessions, the condition of the Association, and any such matters connected with its operations as they may deem conducive to the interests of the church in this Diocese.

Resolutions.

The report was received, and the first and second resolutions were adopted; the third resolution was rejected.

Rev. Saml. H. Phillips asked to be excused from further attendance upon the services of the Council. Request granted.

Rev. Wm. Norwood, D. D., Chairman of the Committee, appointed to examine the accounts of the treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society, reported that the same had been examined and found to be correct.

Rev. Wm. Norwood, D. D., Chairman of the Committee, to whom was referred the resolution offered by Mr. J. M. Patton at the last Council, (vide Journal of 1870, page 47,) presented a report accompanied by the following resolutions; which were approved.

1st. Resolved. That it is apparent to all reflecting minds, seriously considering: this subject, that the ministry and all the agencies of the church, for the extension of religion, are insufficiently supported.

2dly. Resolved, That the Gospel teaches, that as to all our means we are stewardsand will have to give account of our stewardship to God. We are stewards in regard to the support of our families, the conducting of our business, and the support of the work of the church, and though we do our duty in regard to the first two, yet if we neglect the last, we shall not escape the judgment of God.

3dly. Resolved, That by the Gospel it is made as much our duty to make offerings to God of our substance, as to offer prayer and praise.

4thly. Resolved, That though no rule is given as to the proportion of our incomewhich should be contributed in discharge of this duty, yet we are distinctly taught to give systematically to these objects, and therefore this Council doth earnestly recommend to all members of the church to adopt St. Paul's precept, and lay by them in store as God hath prospered them, either on the first day of the week, orat least regularly to constitute a sacred fund, to be dedicated to God for the maintenance and extension of the religion of the Gospel.

5thly. Resolved, That it is the duty of the clergy diligently to instruct and exhortthe people upon this, as upon other Christian duties, and that failing in this, they have not preached the whole counsel of God.

Mr. J. M. Miller, from the tellers appointed to collect ballots for lay deputies, reported the election of Judge Sheffey, but that no other candidate had a sufficiency of votes.

A second ballot was ordered. Pending which, Rev. G. H. Norton, D. D., presented the annual report of the Standing Committee of the Diocese as follows:

Report of Standing Committee.

All which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. E. S. Pegram presented the following report from the Finance Committee:

Report of Finance Committee

The Finance Committee would respectfully report that they have examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Council for the past year, and find them all correct.

There is a balance on hand from the Contingent Fund of \$527 34, and of the Episcopal Residence Fund of \$135 85.

The receipts for the current year, so far, are upwards of \$8,200, with a probability of a large increase.

The estimated expenses for the current year are supposed to amount to about \$9,000, of which sum will be classed as extraordinary, the expenses attendant on the General Convention to sit in October.

The quarter's salary, amounting to \$625 25, due to Bishop Johns to the 1st May, 1865, which in the confusion of the times was wholly overlooked, and to which the attention of the committee has been called by the late Treasurer John Stewart, Esq. and the present Treasurer, and we recommend the Council to instruct the present Treasurer to pay it.

And the committee further recommend the adoption of the following resolutions of the last Council (see page 62 of the Journal):

Resolved, 1st—That the same amounts appropriated last year for the salaries of the Bishop, Assistant Bishop, and other officers of this body, be hereby again appropriated for the ensuing year.

Resolved, 3rd—That the Treasurer be directed, after paying the ordinary expenses, and reserving \$500 as a margin for unforeseen contingencies, to pay over to the proper committee the residue in his hands, if any, to be applied towards the payments due upon the Episcopal residence.

The committee also recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to Rt. Rev. Bishop Johns \$625.25, the amount due to him for a quarter's salary up to May 1st, 1865, which had been inadvertently overlooked.

All of which is submitted.

The report was received, and the resolutions were adopted.

The report of the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School was then read:

The usual course of study of the Theological classes and the Pre-

Theological Seminary and High School.

paratory department of the Seminary has been successfully pursued during the present session, and the classes are now reviewing for examination. The number of students is thirty-eight, and there are favorable indications of increase for the coming session. The condition of the High School, under its Principal, Mr. L. M. Blackford, is improving. There are now thirty-five pupils, boarders and day scholars included. The prospects of an increase of numbers for the coming session are favorable, and the Board would heartly commend the Institution to the regard and patronage of parents and guardians, as one in which the great work of Education, under decidedly Christian influences, can be successfully prosecuted.

The Seminary buildings, and the residences of the Professors, have within the past year been put in complete repair; this being the first thorough restoration since the injuries and dilapidations of the war. A plan, moreover, has been obtained for improvement of the grounds, and some of these improvements commenced. It is hoped that the means for their completion will ere long be possessed. The means for these repairs, and for the improvements already made on the grounds, were largely afforded through the munificent donation of A. S. P. Dodge, Esq., already alluded to in the annual report of the Bishop of the Diocese—this liberality, indeed, relieving the Institution from pecuniary embarrassment, and obviating the necessity of yearly appeals and subscriptions for the continuance of its operations.

The Board would gratefully recognize the good hand of God in the restored condition of the institutions under their charge, and would commend them to the prayerful consideration and regards of our clergy and people.

Dr. Andrews moved that the next session of the Diocesan Council be held in Winchester. Lost.

Reconsidered at request of Dr. Minnigerode.

Mr. Grammer called for the order of the day.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Sprigg it was suspended.

Tellers on lay deputies reported no election.

Third ballot ordered—Col. R. E. Withers elected.

Fourth ballot ordered-Mr. N. H. Massie elected.

Fifth ballot ordered-Mr. B. J. Barbour.

Mr. Sprigg moved to meet in Lexington next year.

Mr. Hyland moved to strike out Lexington and insert Norfolk. Lost.

The Council then decided to meet in Lexington at nine o'clock on third Wednesday, May, 1872.

Mr. Tazwell Taylor offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to revise the rules of order of this Council, and report to the next Council on the first day of its session such amendments as they may deem expedient.

Resolution carried, and the following Committee appointed:

Rev. W. N. Pendleton, D. D., Rev. C. Minnigerode, D. D., Rev. T. M. Carson, Messrs. Tazwell Taylor, Mr. Wm. C. Cazenove, Col. R. E. Withers.

Mr. Tazwell Taylor's proposed amendment to Article 1st of the Constitution was then called up, and it was resolved by the Council that Article 1st of the Constitution be amended as follows:

Strike out from the 6th line of said Article the word "State," and insert in lieu thereof the word "Diocese."

Mr. Latané, from the Committee appointed to report upon the resolutions offered by Dr. Pendleton, made the following report:

Amendments to the Constitution.

The Committee, to whom was referred the paper introduced by Dr. Pendleton, as the basis of instructions to our delegates to the next General Convention, beg leave to report back to the Council the preamble and resolutions without alteration, and with the recommendation that they be adopted.

Pending the consideration of this report the last resolution was withdrawn. Upon the first resolution and the preamble the ayes and noes were called for, and the vote resulted as follows:

Clergy—Ayes 42, noes 4.

Laity—Ayes 40, noes 9.

The Chair announced that the resolutions were adopted. The Council then adjourned to Saturday morning, at 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, June 3, 1871.

The Council met at nine o'clock, and was opened with prayer by Rev. O. S. Barten.

Minutes of yesterday read and approved.

Rev. P. F. Berkeley appeared and took his seat.

Rev. Dr. Andrews then called up the report offered by him yesterday upon the proposed amendments to the Constitution of the church in the United States. Report adopted.

Rev. Dr. Barten presented the report of the Committee on Parochial Reports:

Rev. James Grammer called up his proposed amendment to Canon XIX.

Dr. Andrews moved that it be postponed until the next Council. Carried.

Mr. Massie presented the following report from the committee of ten laymen, appointed to consider the reports of Treasurers respecting the payment of rector's salaries. The report was received, and the recommendations approved:

The committee of ten laymen, to whom was referred the subject of the support of the clergy of our Diocese, beg leave respectfully to report, that they have carefully examined the reports from the various parishes,

Rector's Salaries.

handed to them by the Secretary of the Council, and have endeavored to tabulate the results of said reports, so as to present the results at a 'glance.

There are some inconsistencies between the results shown this year, and those contained in their reports made one year ago, which your committee are at present unable to explain. For instance: Last year it was stated that 112 parishes reported, and 17 failed to report; showing that there were 129 occupied parishes in the Diocese. This year your committee can find returns from only 99 parishes, and including in that number several of which the committee can make no use, either because they are wholly unintelligible, or because no name is given either of the parish, or the treasurer reporting. From the list handed to the committee by the Secretary of the Council, it would appear that there were still 16 parishes this year not reporting. Why it is that there appeared to be 129 occupied parishes in the Diocese last year, and only 115 this year, your committee cannot explain. They are unwilling to believe that 14 of our parishes have become vacant within the past year.

With reference to the facts disclosed in the reports that have been received, there is room for encouragement to your committee in the line of duty they have heretofore prescribed to themselves, and there are also abundant evidences that much yet remains to be done to bring all our parishes up to the measure of a duty so plain and imperative, that no one, however dissatisfied with our published reports, has ever ventured to dispute, to wit, the simple duty of at least paying a minister the amount which has been specifically promised to him. Last year 38 parishes were set down as more or less in arrear to the rectors at the date of the committee's report. This year the number delinquent is 29; and whilst many of them are quite small, and probably the result of a little inadvertence, your committee are compelled to add that a few of these cases seem to call for as severe condemnation as your committee know how to express in such a report.

Three parishes are in arrear more than half the salaries promised their rector, and one parish reports itself as being indebted to their rector in a sum greater, by \$100, than the entire salary promised. The parishes referred to will no doubt recognize themselves in the list.

On the subject of rectories, the exhibit is encouraging. Last year 40 churches were reported as having comfortable rectories. This year several additional ones are reported, though it is again to be regretted that quite a number fail to report upon the subject entirely.

Clerical Support.

Your committee, in conclusion, respectfully recommend the adoption of the same resolutions which were embodied in the report of a similar committee last year:

Resolved, 1—That the Secretary be instructed to insert in the next Journal of this Council a list of all the parishes which were in arrears for the past year in the payment of the rector's salary, showing precisely how much was promised, and how much has been paid in each case.

2. That the list of parishes which have failed to make report be printed by the Secretary in the Journal, and that he also publish the same in the Southern Churchman, asking the attention of these parishes to these reports, so that uniformity of

action may be had throughout the Diocese.

- 3. That on the 1st of May in each year the Secretary be directed to address a circular letter to each pastor whose treasurer has, down to that date, failed to forward his report, requesting him to notify his lay delegate that it is his duty to see that the proper report is immediately forwarded to the Secretary, and that, if this is not done, such delegate will be called upon by the Council, when his credentials are presented, to explain to the body the reason of his failure to discharge this duty.
- 4. That the Secretary prepare a column in his printed forms for a report from each parish upon the subject of a rectory—whether there be one connected with the parish, and if so, how many acres are attached, and if there be no rectory, what the prospect is of providing one.

All which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. N. H. Massie offered the following, by request of the same committee:

The Committee of ten laymen, on the subject of Clerical Support, respectfully recommend that the 25th Rule of Order be so amended as to provide for an additional standing committee to consist of ten laymen, to be appointed at each Council, to whom shall be referred all reports from parishes on the subject of the proper support of the clergy.

Which was agreed to.

Rev. H. Suter, from the Committee on the State of the Church, presented the following report:

The Committee, to whose consideration the state of the church has been referred, beg leave to report the following:

State of the Church.

From the facts brought before them in the reports of the Bishops and Rectors, and through conference with each other, it is apparent that throughout the Diocese there is no lack in efforts to bring home to the minds and hearts of the people the Gospel of the Divine Redeemer. The number of confirmations, indeed, is less than during the preceding year, but is the largest ever known save that, and doubtless has, for the explanation of its deficiency, local causes. We trust that all those who are thus admitted to the fellowship of the Gospel feel the solemnity of the position they hold, and that our Rectors continue in that strict examination, which allows no admission to full membership in the church except to those who have fully resolved to dedicate themselves to God in a sober, righteous and godly life.

The large number of candidates for orders is a pleasing sign that the Lord of the Harvest has heard the prayers of his people, and enables us to hope that many places, now deprived of Gospel ministrations, will ere long be privileged to hear the word and rejoice in the presence and sympathy of faithful pastors. While thus rejoicing in the large accession to our candidates for orders, your Committee must deplore the continued loss of ministers by removals from the Diocese. During the past year eleven have left it, and but four been received. One cause of this sad fact, we doubt not, rests in the inadequate support to which many are condemned.

It is not that the clergy are unwilling to endure hardness, but that they feel full oft that their efficiency is impaired, and thus their success as ministers is impeded by labors entirely foreign to their office. It is with some a serving of tables, instead of a waiting upon the Lord. It was the hope of your Committee that the liberal intentions of the laity—in the formation of that Brotherhood, which looked to the relief of the families of deceased clergymen, and the manifest propriety of the care—should correct this depletion, and we earnestly hope that the good people of the Diocese will make full proof of the plan already alluded to by a ready and liberal adoption of its provisions, and also, by increased attention to the wants of their ministers, render less operative the reasons pleaded by those who have families to feed and educate.

The other points to which your Committee have been directed, and which seem to them indicative of the improved condition of the church, are the Convocational system, the Sunday School cause and the Parish School. Throughout the Diocese, convocations are busily and happily at

work, and, we believe, in harmonious co-operation with the Missionary Society, and thus the local knowledge and interest have been made tributary to the general cause.

Very marked, too, has become the attention to the training of the young, and we cannot but deem it the sign of a larger accession to our fold, when thus the young mind is sought, and we cannot but commend to our people and ministers this holy cause, and invoke their prayerful and honest endeavors to make the Sunday School the training place for the church and for heaven. We have reason to believe that increased efficiency has been manifested in many places in this work, and where heretofore there was but little interest and little effort, and trust that such will be the case in every parish.

In this connection we are constrained by a sense of duty to our common Lord, and to the church of our love, to urge upon the people of the Diocese, especially upon those who have heretofore had in operation the Parish School system, not to allow their interest to subside, nor their support to fail, because of the fact, that under State authority schools have been organized.

Religious instruction, especially that which appertains to us, can no where be more systematically and thoroughly imparted than in the Parish School, and we see no reason, no commanding reason why, because of the adoption of the one system, the other should be forsaken. We earnestly commend therefore to those who have had interest in the matter, heretofore, to remember that the obligation to impart the knowledge of saving truth still weighs, and can never be removed save by a providence, which absolutely makes its fulfillment impossible.

To say more of this, and of the other interest of the church, appears needless to your Committee, assured as they are that no word of theirs can make more felt the obligation under which clergy and laity are faithfully to work, and earnestly to pray for the good cause which God has entrusted to us.

The committee charged with the duty of collecting funds and erecting a monument to the memory of Bishop Meade, respectfully report the result of their efforts.

Meade Monument.

They have erected over his remains a white marble sarcophagus, upon which is engraved the following epitaph:

Sacred to the memory of the

RT. REV. WM. MEADE, D.D.,

Third Bishop of Virginia.

Born in Clarke Co., Va., November 11th, 1789.

Died in the city of Richmond, Mch. 14th, 1862.

Prominent in the revival of the Church after the Revolutionary War, he was the zealous defender of its purity, and the founder and liberal patron of the Theological Seminary of Virginia.

He lived for Christ, died in Christ, and, we believe, is with Christ.

Erected as a memorial of love and veneration, by the Protestant Episcopal Church in Virginia.

Resolved. That the report of the committee on the monument to Bishop Meade be spread upon the Journal, and that the thanks of this Council be tendered to the committee for their attention to the important duty with which they were charged.

Judge Lay asked that the motion to repeal Canon X. be committed to the committee on Canon IX. Granted.

Diocesan Missionary Society.

Rev. Dr. Barten, from the committee on Church Schools, asked for an extension of time in behalf of said committee. Granted.

Dr. Horner offered the following, which was, on motion, referred to the committee on Church Schools, and Dr. Horner, on motion of Mr. Massie, was added to the committee:

Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia do recommend the establishment of primary schools in each parish, to be under the supervision of the rector of said parish.

Rev. Dr. Peterkin presented the following report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society:

The Diocesan Missionary Society began a new financial year in May, 1870, with a balance of \$351 13 in the treasury.

The receipts during the year just closed have been \$5,497 09, making an aggregate of \$5,848 22. We regard it as a most favorable sign that the contributions have exceeded those of the preceding year by more than one thousand dollars. If the funds for missionary purposes, raised by the various convocations, were added, the sum total would be greatly increased. From these, however, we have no reports, except in the case of the "Valley Convocation," which has distributed during the year the sum of \$672 88; and the Piedmont Convocation, which has raised and disbursed \$694 16.

The appropriations of the Executive Committee, amounting to \$5,022 99, have aided in the support of twenty-eight clergymen, whose names are subjoined, and have enabled these brethren to labor in fields, which otherwise might have been entirely deprived of the services of our Church.

While we are thankful to God for many encouragements, it is our duty to say that we have gone through seasons of great embarrassment, by reason of the irregularity of the contributions made to a cause which ought to be dear to all our hearts.

When it was proposed that each parish should contribute, annually, an amount in dollars, equal, at least, to half its numbers of communicants, it was hoped that we would always have funds in hand, ready for every legitimate demand. This hope is still entertained; since, although the proposition referred to seems to have been forgotten by many rec-

tors and congregations, there are others that greatly exceed the amount expected from them.

With a view to the future welfare of the Church, we can suggest no better mode of operations than that which is already before us, viz: that every one of our ministers make it a point of conscience to see that our Diocesan Missions be systematically sustained—first, by contributions equal to fifty cents per annum from each communicant; and secondly, by keeping the subject before the people, and affording them frequent opportunities to give what they can, over and above the minimum amount to which they are virtually pledged.

We think it right to state that we have, in some instances, made small appropriations to furnish prayer books to feeble parishes and schools. We have been enabled to do this, only by reason of the low price of the Mission Prayer book, published under the auspices of the Henrico Sunday School Union. This little volume has supplied a form of sound words, greatly to the advantage of many a poor congregation. If some means could be devised for its republication, in a larger edition, and in such manner as might give this Society a direct interest in the work, we are persuaded that much good would be accomplished.

In reviewing our whole work, and in forming plans for carrying it on with greater efficiency, we would remember that the Word of God, anticipating a future which is as certain as the past, declares that "the kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord and His Christ, and He shall reign forever and ever." (Rev. xi. 15.) And yet, He who has ordained this grand consummation, has ordained also the means by which it shall be brought about. If we, who at this important era are privileged to be co-workers with God, fail in the performance of our duty—whether of personal effort, or of pecuniary contribution—we may reasonably expect to be set aside, to make way for men who will more cheerfully accomplish the Divine will.

Leave of absence from the sessions of the Council was granted to General J. J. Jackson.

On motion of Judge Lay, the following gentlemen were elected the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society:

Rev. R. T. Davis, from the Committee on the subject of Hymns, ancient and modern, presented the following report:

Hymns,

Your Committee having examined the proceedings of the General Convention in this Convention, would draw attention to the following points:

First. That a Committee of five Bishops, expressly and, to all appearance, unanimously reported that ten of the hymns, ancient and modern, are objectionable.

Secondly. That the joint resolution granting liberty to license, reads only "hymns from," not the whole collection.

Thirdly. That this liberty expires at the next meeting of the General Convention by its own limitation.

Fourthly. That a commission of both houses has been appointed to prepare a permanent hymnal, and to report at the next General Convention.

They recommend therefore the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That whilst we have full confidence that the excellent commission on hymnnody will not adopt any of the objectionable hymns into the permanent hymnal, we will, through our delegates to the next General Convention, oppose any renewal of the sanction heretofore given to the use of the hymns, ancient and modern, in addition to that hymnal.

The resolutions were not approved.

The Standing Committees "on Colored Congregations," and "to take charge of abandoned church property," who were elected in 1870, were reëlected for 1871.

Mr. N. H. Massie offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Council be tendered the citizens of Petersburg for the cordial and abounding hospitality with which the members of our body have been received to the hearts and homes of the people of this city.

Unanimously adopted.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of the Council be tendered the various railroad and steamboat companies for their courtesies to the members of this body; also, to the newspapers, for furnishing the Council with copies of their daily issues.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Council pay the sexton of Grace Church \$15 for his services.

Adjournment.

Ordered that 1,500 copies of the Journal be printed for distribution.

Rev. C. J. Gibson presented the report of the managers of the fund for relief of the widows and orphans of deceased clergymen, and it was ordered that the same be entered upon the Journal.

After religious exercises, conducted by the Bishops, On motion of Rev. W. L. Hyland, the Council adjourned sine die.

The above includes \$502, contributed by "the Ladies' Sewing Society;" and also the offerings of the Sunday School. The *Parish School* has been in successful operation. The opening of the public schools has not decreased the number of its pupils as much as was feared, and we feel that, as present constituted, they can never take its place.

The "Mothers' Mission" continues its "work and labor of love" not without special tokens of the divine blessing. The entire number of women brought under its influence has been 68, with an average attendance of 38.

A "Brotherhood" has recently been organized, and now comprises about sixteen of the male communicants of the church. Three "cottage lectures" are conducted weekly under its auspices in the houses of the poor, with an average aggregate attendance of about fifty persons, most of them strangers to our church hitherto. Five of our confirmation class came from one of these meetings.

Meade Chapel.—Services have been regularly conducted since its completion, a year ago, twice a week. Our thanks are due Messrs. Tidball, Holt and Jackson, of the Theological Seminary, for their faithful labors here. The congregations have generally been quite good, and recently have largely increased, occasionally almost filling the building. A handsome chancel window and font have been given by friends of the enterprise, a stove and a first class cabinet organ by the Sunday School, and a bell by a former member of the same. These will make the appointments complete.

I have officiated here occasionally during the year; have preached and administered the communion once at Sharon Chapel, in Fairfax county; and preached twice at the High

CHURCH SCHOOLS.—Since the last meeting of the Council, a Church School for girls has been organized. It was put in operation in September last.

It is under the immediate supervision of the rector and vestry, who have placed in charge a principal and two assistants, communicants of the church, and faithful competent teachers.

The school is of a high grade, and adapted to younger chil-

dren, as well as to those more advanced in their studies.

About thirty scholars have been connected with it during this the first session, and although the tuition fees have been very low, the school has been self-supporting from the beginning.

For the accommodation of the school, a handsome brick building was erected and furnished last summer at a cost of \$1,669 40, borrowed on the credit of the vestry. Of this sum \$542 has been paid, mainly by contributions taken up in the church.

The church has not deemed it advisable to assume the responsibility of a boarding department, but the Principal, Mr. Keating S. Nelson, with our full approbation, has himself undertaken this part of the work.

It is proposed to educate gratuitously all the children of the church, whose parents or friends cannot pay for their tuition.

When the present building has been fully paid for, it is contemplated to establish one for boys on the same plan.

Since last October, I have had a monthly service near Pros-

pect depot, in Prince Edward county. This work was transmitted to me by the Rev. C. J. Gibson, and has at different times occupied the attention of several ministers, among them Rev. Jas. Grammer and Rev. C. P. Rodefer. Beginning with one or two members, it has extended in all directions from the original centre, and now reaches some 200 persons. A Sunday School commenced under difficulties, but sustained with energy, has done much both to dispel prejudice and advance the cause. The number of communicants is from 15 to 20, and a good many members of the Church of England, who are settling around us, attend service, and manifest great interest. Most, if not all, will join us as soon as we have a regular place of worship. Services held for the present at private houses, and in that way several different neighborhoods reached. As a week day service is the only one possible just now, we find that many who would otherwise come are unable to leave their homes and home duties. It is hoped that a church will soon be commenced. Efforts are in motion toward that end, and I am sure that we have the means of erecting a structure, both comfortable and suitable, to our condition in other respects. This organization is called the "Empie Scholarship Society," after the first rector of the church. A Sunday School for colored children is kept up by teachers from St. James', but not directly connected with it. It occupies a school room at some distance from the church, and is accomplishing much good, though it numbers only five teachers, and about forty scholars.

Looking forward to orders, I commenced to hold service as a way reader" in the counties of Sussex and Southampton, Va., on the 23d of April, 1871. The success attending my labors during this short period of time, shows this field to be one of much promise. There being no Episcopal church at Sussex Courthouse, we worship in a building loaned us by the Presbyterians. In this building I hold service twice during each month. In the past few weeks a very promising Sabbath School has been raised, numbering 36 teachers and scholars; the children of which are now being trained in our church services. I have also, in connection with this school, a Bible class of grown persons, to which I give my personal attention.

At Jerusalem, in Southampton, I hold service once during each month, in a building offered me by the Baptists (there

being no Episcopal church). I find no report of this parish in the last Journal. I learned that Rev. Mr. Easter preached occasionally at Jerusalem during the past two years. Here I commenced on last Sabbath a Sabbath School, numbering 15 teachers and scholars, found 4 candidates for confirmation, and some subjects for baptism. At "Barn Tavern," in the same county, I hold service once a month in a building offered me by the Masons for that purpose.

REPORT OF HENRY L. PHILLIPS,

Rector of Grace Church, Cornwall Parish, to Rt. Rev. John Johns, D. D., at the seventy-sixth An. Council of Va.

My connection with this Church was to be the corollary of the proposition that I should find this place a suitable point for opening here a High School, that would not only sustain me at present, but could by and by be expanded into an extensive boarding school, that would attract a large patronage from the adjoining counties.

Miscellaneous.

Since my arrival here, on the 27th January, 1871, I have held fourteen services on Sunday mornings, and nine on Sunday afternoons, since the days have lengthened; sixteen on other days; preaching regularly in the A. M., and using a lecture in the P. M. whenever service has been held.

This parish, which was originally small, has been rendered still smaller by deaths and removals. In common with others of Charlotte county, they have suffered so severely from the result of the war, that their ability to sustain the church here has borne no comparison with their interest and zeal in seeing the regular services resumed. So much interest has been shown in attendance at the services, even during the week, and that by some living five miles' distance from the church, that I have often felt rebuked for my inability to do more for their spiritual welfare. What this parish has suffered as much from, perhaps, as from any other cause, is the removal of its rectors or pastors. This could, in a great measure, be remedied, and more of a settled character imparted to the residence of its pastors, by the purchase of the adjoining little cottage as a parsonage, which would not cost more than \$1,000, but which the parish is too small and impoverished to accomplish without aid from outside. Efficient aid in this direction would be not restricted to the congregation attached to this church, but would really have the effect of a public benefit in eventually elevating the general tone of the community, and exerting a wholesome conservative influence.

We lost two Sundays in February and two in March—the weather was so very inclement that no congregation did or could assemble, since only one Episcopal family is resident, for a limited time, in the village.

WHEELING, WEST VIRGINIA.

About the first of September, 1870, I accepted a professorship in the West Virginia University, but owing to failing health, did not retain it longer than the end of the fall term, December 1st, following. I found at Morgantown but one decidedly Episcopal family. Bishop Whittle confirmed three persons at his visitation last fall, two of whom were students. I found in the University some twelve or fifteen students from different parts of the State, whose families were more or less inclined to the Episcopal Church. I think that Morgantown should receive at least a monthly missionary visit, and am pleased to learn that Rev. J. Woods proposes to give to that point one-fourth of his time.

On my return to Wheeling I entered into an arrangement with the vestry of St. John's parish to supply their pulpit for an indefinite length of time. My services in that capacity lasted from January first to the first of May following. As I was not

I respectfully report that the prosperity of the institution under my charge exceeds that of any previous year since its organization. Sixteen States are represented by the pupils, one hundred and sixteen of whom are from a distance. A spacious building, required for the largely increased number of music pupils, was completed last December, and furnished with pianos from one of the leading factories in Baltimore. This building renders the institution in its arrangements one of the most complete of Southern schools.

Our regular school services and bible classes have been well sustained during the session. Eleven pupils were confirmed immediately after Lent. A large number of the pupils are

communicants. Besides frequent services in our chapel, I have officiated in Harrisonburg, and during our vacation at Bath Alum Springs, where our pupils from the south spent the summer, I have also aided the rector, as occasion required, in maintaining the services in the parish church:

RIGHT REV. AND DEAR SIR:

In submitting a report of my labors during the past year, I have nothing of special encouragement to offer.

It requires about three weeks in every month to meet my appointments at the following places, which I have been enabled to do with great regularity during the year, to wit: At a Baptist Church (Concord) in Caroline county on the 1st Sunday; at Hebron, a Presbyterian Church; in Goochland on the second and fourth Sundays, where we have established a separate congregation, which is called St. James' Church, and elected a vestry, but are still without a house of worship of our own, though a few ladies of our communion have placed an organ in the church, which is kindly received by all the members.

At Goochland Courthouse I officiate on the 3d Sunday in the courthouse to very encouraging congregations, though still unable to erect a church.

At the earnest solicitation of our friends at Louisa Courthouse, I have devoted the 5th Saturday and Sundays to them

with a prospect of greater good than I could hope for from my labors at Bowling Green.

On my first visit I baptized four adults, and was encouraged by large and attentive congregations, many of whom I was gratified to see came forward to the communion. I was informed that there were some ten or twelve desirous of being confirmed, and only awaited a visit from the Bishop to assume their baptismal vows. I at once called on the assistant Bishop, who promptly made a visitation, and confirmed seven, the rest not being able to be present from various causes. This, I was told, was the first time the services of a Bishop had ever been required at that place.

I have received a pressing invitation from our Methodist brethren to preach for them in the afternoon of the days on which I officiate at Hebron, with which I shall comply, as long as the length of the day will justify it.

My services being so few and far between, I can hope to do but little more than keep our people together.

We have in these several congregations—Communicants, 55. Baptisms: Infants, 4; adults, 4; total, 8. Marriages: White, 3; colored, 1; total, 4. Funerals: 2. Contributions: Diocesan missions, \$12 65; Bishop's fund, \$20.
