

# RULES OF ORDER.

#### ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterwards stand except to address the Chair.

3d. The credentials of the Lay Delegates shall be handed in to the Secretary, and be referred to a committee of two clerical and three lay members, who shall report thereon as speedily as practicable, and if any doubt arise as to the right of any delegate to a seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for their examination.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of the pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Reports of standing committees.

Reports of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each Order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergyman.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

#### Rules of Order.

- A Committee on Parochial Reports.
- A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.
- A Committee on Elections.
- A Committee of Finance, consisting of laymen.
- A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

- 1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary before debate.
- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of his second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.
- 4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.
- 5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.
- 7th. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.
- 9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.
- 10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

#### Rules of Order.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever three members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council for special reason shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council, or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick, or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall at his discretion select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the Church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3rd. No spectator shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the Church in which the sessions of the Council are held, are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Bishop Johns then read his annual address as follows:

### BISHOP JOHNS' REPORT.

### BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

In presenting the following detail of official services rendered during the past year, and submitting such suggestions as may bear on the interest of the Diocese for the future, I cannot forbear recurring with gratitude to the proceedings and results of our last Council. Assembling, as it did, at a time of serious solicitude and grave forebodings on the part of many of our most intelligent and decided friends, and called to the free discussion of questions which disturbed our entire Angli-

can communion, it proved, under God's blessing, adequate to the responsibility of the trying situation. Its anxious deliberations, conducted with exemplary propriety, and its conclusions, adopted as they were, with that unanimity, which in all matters essential has ever marked the course of the Church in Virginia, did, I trust, bind us together more closely in fraternal confidence and Christian love, and by their wisdom and moderation confirm the respect and esteem of other Dioceses. The happy result we have enjoyed in the peace and prosperity with which we have been blessed, and the harmony and good heart with which we commence another year.—God's holy name be praised.

May 24.—After the adjournment of the Council, I confirmed twenty-eight persons in Christ church, Charlottesville.

June 7.—I preached in the Seminary chapel.

June 21.—I preached in Christ church, Alexandria, and confirmed sixteen.

June 26.—At the close of the session of the Seminary in the chapel, after a sermon by the Rev. R. H. McKim, I admitted to priest's orders the Rev. H. D. Gibbons, Rev. A. S. Johns, Rev. E. H. Ward, and Rev. J. Ambler. And to deacon's orders, M. Boyd, R. Ellerby, C. Holt, G. H. Kinsolving, G. W. Nelson, Theo. Reed, F. G. Scott, J. W. Shields and Edward Wall.

July 7.—In Emanuel church, Harrisonburg, I preached and confirmed eight.

July 9.—In the Virginia Female Institute, Staunton, I met with several of the distant trustees to attend an adjourned meeting of the Board, but, in consequence of the absence of the resident members no quorum could be formed. At night I preached in Trinity church and confirmed eleven.

July 11.—I preached in Emanuel church, Goodson, Washington county, and confirmed three.

July 12.—I preached in St. Thomas, Abingdon, where the Rev. Dr. Goodrich has recently commenced his ministrations. July 14.—I consecrated Christ church, Marion, preached and confirmed three. I was assisted in the services by the

Rev. Dr. Goodrich and the Rev. Mr. Forrest, who has recently accepted the rectorship and officiates there monthly in connection with his charge at Wytheville.

By the self-denying labor and commendable liberality of the five communicants who formed the commencement of this congregation at Marion, a suitable site was purchased for \$462, and a brick church erected at a cost of about \$3,000. Their energy and zeal are entitled to this special notice.

July 15.—In St. John's Church, Wytheville, after a sermon by the Rev. Dr. Goodrich, I admitted to Priest's Orders the Rev. H. M. Jackson, of Montgomery Parish, Montgomery Co.

At night I preached in the same Church, and confirmed twenty.

July 17.—I preached in the Methodist Church, Blacksburg, and confirmed seven.

At this place, peculiarly interesting as the location of the Agricultural College of Virginia, a commodious church is about to be erected. Another is in prospect at Central depot, on the Virginia and Tennessee railroad.

July 18.—At the Montgomery White Sulphur Springs, I baptized the infant son of the proprietor, Col. Colquboun.

July 19.—I preached in St. John's, Salem, and confirmed two.

July 20.—I preached in St. Paul's, Big Lick, and confirmed three.

July 21.—I consecrated St. Mark's, Bedford, preached, and confirmed three.

At night my appointment was in St. John's, Liberty, but it rained so hard, that it was thought useless to open the church.

Aug. 2.—In the Seminary Chapel, after a sermon by the Rev. Dr. McIlhinney, I admitted John W. McGill to Deacon's Orders.

Aug. 16.—I preached at St. Paul's, Alexandria. This was the last public service I performed for some weeks. The periodical infirmity to which I have long been annually subjected, combined with a serious injury to one of my feet, disabled me

from duty, and confined me to the house until the 16th of October, when I managed to reach New York after the General Convention had been in session for a week.

I had no reason to regret the effort to be present. That Convention, in respectability, talent, and courtesy, was certainly unsurpassed by any similar assembly with which I am acquainted. Although all we may have deemed desirable was not attained, enough was accomplished in reference to matters of great importance to afford us sincere satisfaction. The overture for an organic connection with the Church of England—the scheme to introduce the Provincial system, and the proposal to establish a General Court of Appeals, measures which were calculated to complicate and revolutionize the simple constitution under which we have signally prospered, and to disintegrate our confederation, soon enough for the most impatient separatist, were all defeated, with an emphasis not to be mistaken.

In regard to Ritualism, I cared little for new legislation, believing, as I did, the existing provisions to be amply adequate for all proper discipline. Yet, as the Canon passed is in fact only declaratory, I did not hesitate to vote for its adoption. It has from various quarters been assailed by criticism, and even by questionable levity, all of which would perhaps have been prevented by fuller information as to the history of the proceedings.

The concession as to the use of the Baptismal office, so earnestly sought by many, and favored by the known wish of this Diocese, though not accorded to the memorialists, received a consideration which does not discourage the hope that the day is coming when this occasion of complaint will be satisfactorily removed. Meanwhile, as the faulted phrase is no innovation, but the language of the formularies of this Church from its organization, and of the Reformers in England and on the Continent, and as it has been judicially decided that its import harmonizes, as I verily believe it does, with the views of Baptism maintained by the school of theology to which the memo-

rialists belong, I can see no reason why they may not with good conscience minister as their fathers have done, trusting to the power of truth, and the prevalency of prayer, to dispose their brethren to an adjustment which may accommodate the petitioners without disturbing the principles of others. More than this ought not to be sought, and short of this would be insufficient.

After my return from the Convention, in answer to many inquiries, I expressed my conviction that the proceedings of that body, in connection with those of the Conventions of '69 and '71, form a reäffirmation of the Protestant character of this Church, and a pledge to maintain it unimpaired. Subsequent events have strengthened this conviction. I am happy to repeat it here, that my brethren may share with me in the satisfaction it affords.

To resume my report of services rendered within the Diocese:

Nov. 20.—I left home to visit the parishes on the Eastern Shore. Passing down the Chesapeake from Baltimore, I reached Accomac the next morning.

Nov. 21.—At night I preached in Onancock.

Nov. 22.—I preached in St. James' Church, Accomac C. H., and confirmed six.

Nov. 23.—A heavy rain detained me at Drummondtown, and prevented me from reaching the place of my next appointment, which was at St. James' Church, Temperanceville, some twelve miles distant.

On my way to Northampton I passed immediately by old St. George's Church. This venerable building, which when I last visited it had been well repaired, I found now a melancholy ruin. During the late war it was, as the Rector reports, used by the United States troops for stabling their horses. Nothing but the substantial walls were left. The hope is entertained that Congress will yet make the appropriation necessary to refit it, that the congregation now using a school-house near by, may be privileged to resume their worship on the site where

their fathers had so long enjoyed the sacred services which our good people so highly prize.

Nov. 25.—I preached in Christ Church, Eastville.

Nov. 26.—I preached in Hungar's Church, and confirmed two.

As the Rector had but just taken charge of these congregations, there had been no time to prepare for a general confirmation, and none was expected.

From Northampton I crossed to Norfolk, where I received from a vestryman of the Church in Prince Edward county, a letter informing me that the Church there was not ready for consecration. I of course postponed the appointment.

Nov. 29.—I preached in Brandon Church, and confirmed five.

Dec. 2.—In St. Paul's Church, Petersburg, I united with the Bishop of North Carolina, Easton, and the Assistant Bishops of Maryland and North Carolina, in the consecration of the Rev. J. H. D. Wingfield, D. D., as Missionary Bishop of North California. The worthy son of my early and valued friend, the Rev. J. Wingfield, D. D., of Portsmouth—a pupil of mine during my connection with William & Mary College, and afterwards a Presbyter of this Diocese, whom I had learned to prize for his faithful and energetic ministry, I could but part with him with reluctance. In his distant field of increased responsibility, arduous service and ceaseless cares, he may be assured of the affectionate sympathy and prayers of the brethren with whom he was here associated, and of their joy in the fruits with which they trust his labors will be blessed.

Dec. 6.—I consecrated Zion Church, Fairfax county, preached, and confirmed one.

Dec. 7.—I consecrated Christ Church, in the same county, preached, and confirmed four.

Zion Church replaces the building which shared the fate of several others in that section during the late war.

Christ Church is a new building well located, and with encouraging prospect of being filled with a thriving congregation.

Dec. 10.—I consecrated Emmanuel Church, Rapidan station, Culpeper county, preached, and confirmed five.

This judiciously located and appropriate Church, though within the charge of the Rev. Mr. Steptoe, is favored with the services of the Rev. Dr. Slaughter, whose health, now sufficiently improved to officiate, will, we trust, be renewed by ministrations salutary to himself and the congregation.

You will observe that within a few days I had been privileged to dedicate three churches in that section of the State fearfully desolated by the contending armies which recently "swayed" over and devastated its fertile fields. So, everywhere may the vestiges of violence be succeeded by the sacred symbols of "peace on earth, and good will toward men!"

Dec. 13.—At Sharon, a missionary station in the vicinity of the Seminary, I preached and confirmed three.

Dec. 18.—At Christ Church, Alexandria, I addressed the congregation in the morning, in the afternoon, and at night.

Dec. 20.—In the Seminary Chapel, after a sermon by the Rev. Dr. Walker, I admitted the Rev. L. R. Mason to Priests Orders.

1875, Jan. 10.—I preached in Grace Church, Alexandria.

Jan. 27.—In Christ Church, Baltimore, I was present at the consecration of the Rev. T. U. Dudley, D. D., as Assistant Bishop of Kentucky, participated in the services, and by appointment, preached the consecration sermon.

As Bishop Dudley is a native of Virginia, a graduate of her University, an alumnus of our theological seminary, and was for some time a Presbyter of this Diocese, I again felt that we were called to part with another of our valued sons, to endure the toils and bear the trials incident to the Western Episcopate. The conflict, which was inseparable from the painful circumstances of this surrender, was indeed controlled by the persuasion that his heart was in the formidable work for which the grace of God had rendered him apt and meet, and that his brethren at home would be compensated for their loss by the assurances of his faithful and acceptable services, and of his

honored instrumentality in furthering the precious Gospel of their dear Lord and Saviour.

Feb. 26.—I lectured in the Seminary Prayer Hall.

On Good Friday, and again on Easter Sunday, I preached in the Seminary Chapel.

March 30.—I preached in St. James' Church, Warrenton, and confirmed 21.

April 4.—In the morning I preached in the Seminary Chapel and confirmed 10.

In the afternoon I preached in Arlington Chapel, and confirmed 5.

This new Chapel, and the interesting congregation, are the pleasing fruits of Mission services by the students of the Seminary.

April 11.—In the morning I preached at St. John's, Hampton, now vacant in consequence of the resignation of the Rev. Mr. Jarrett.

At night I preached in Centurion Church, Fortress Monroe, and confirmed 4.

April 12.—I preached in St. Paul's Church, Norfolk, and confirmed 6.

April 14.—I preached in Christ Church and confirmed 26.

April 15.—I preached in Trinity, Portsmouth, and confirmed 5.

At night I preached in St. John's, and confirmed 10.

April 16.—I preached in Emmanuel Church, Princess Anne, and confirmed 2. This Church and the Chapel in the same parish are still without a minister.

April 17.—I preached in St. Paul's, Suffolk, and confirmed 8.

April 18.—I preached in St. Paul's Chapel, Berkeley, and confirmed 3.

At night I preached in St. Luke's, Norfolk, and confirmed 17. The growth and vigor of this young Church are most gratifying. Already it requires enlarged accommodation, and for missionary services in the suburbs, has nearly completed a Church almost as capacious as St. Luke's itself. The secret of

this expansion is seen in the devoted band of zealous and active men and women who cordially co-operate with their Rector in all good works.

April 20.—In St. Mark's, Richmond, I preached and confirmed 50.

April 21.—I preached in Grace Church, and confirmed 11.

April 25.—In St. Paul's, Alexandria, after a sermon by the Rev. D. F. Forrest, I confirmed 12.

May 6.—In St. Stephen's Church, Culpeper Court-house, I preached and confirmed 26.

May 9.—At Langley, Fairfax Co., I baptized 1 adult, preached and confirmed 8.

May 16.—In the morning I preached in St. John's Church, Richmond, and confirmed 5; at night in St. James' Church, and confirmed 22.

May 18.—At night preached at Meade Memorial Church, Manchester, and confirmed 4.

In closing this statement of services, it may be proper to notice that, during the past season, the students of the Senior Class at the Seminary, have been accustomed to assemble in my study to engage in exercises connected with Pastoral Theology and Homiletics, apart from the prescribed Seminary course.

#### CHANGES.

During the past year not one of the Clergy canonically connected with this Diocese has been removed by death. Yet we have sustained a sad bereavement by the departure of that most estimable Bishop who sat with us in our last Council, entering deeply into all our interests, and by his gentle spirit and meekness of wisdom, exemplifying and extending the influence of the gospel in which he gloried. In early youth he had come under its blessed power. The prime and vigor of his life were devoted to the evangelization of Africa, where his memory may well be cherished as one of her noble martyrs. after thirty years of labor and self-denial, in that climate so fatal to most white men, his constitution became so impaired as to render continued usefulness hopeless, he most reluctantly retired from the field which he had successfully cultivated and returned to his native State, not to rest, but to work on as he could, and live or die as his Lord might determine. Selecting as his last abode on earth a site near his birth-place, he gave utterance to the partiality of his unweaned heart in naming his place Cavalla. Here for a few years the flickering flame of life was in some measure revived, its pure light was seen, and its genial warmth was felt not merely by those among whom he moved, but by the Church he so dearly loved. In this vicinity he labored as a parish minister even beyond his strength, and, as opportunity was offered, he wrote and spoke in behalf of his lamented Africa. At last, when our anxieties had almost

ceased, it pleased the Master to remove him from us to be with Himself in the house not made with hands eternal in the heavens.

May not the fact which I have stated, that this has been the only death among our clerical brethren during the year past, have been so ordered that we may ponder it with undivided attention, and lose nothing of the salutary influence afforded by his personal piety and his extended and eminently useful ministry?

The provision of a cemetery on the grounds of our Seminary is in contemplation. I trust the design will soon be carried into effect, and that the honored remains of our sainted brother will repose there, and the sight of his sepulchre preserve in freshness the memory of his life and labors, and so, under God's blessing, perpetuate in that beloved institution the missionary spirit which has been its life, its health, and its crowning glory. Amen.

### THEOLOGICAL AND LITERARY INSTITUTIONS.

The report of the trustees of the Seminary and High School, which will be laid before the Council, will afford very gratifying information as to the manner in which they are conducted, the increase of the number of pupils, and the excellent spirit which prevails.

The literary institutions, male and female, in which we are particularly interested, maintain their deserved reputation, and afford educational advantages which reduce to mere pretext the reasons usually assigned for exposing our youth where their religious principles are imperilled, without any compensating advantages—an experiment which, I trust, is happily on the decrease.

The missionary and education societies continue to render good services to the Diocese, which are only limited by the inadequate means placed at their disposal. I earnestly bespeak for them a more liberal patronage. I would not that contributions to the general societies of the Church should be diminished by a dollar, but rather increased; for I am well persuaded that such corporation, in ministering for the benefit of others, will ever be attended by enlarging capability and zeal, in providing for the destitute of our own Diocese.

It may not be deemed inappropriate if I make mention of another of our benevolent associations, which, though but recently formed, has already afforded comfort to many of our Clergy, in anticipation of the destitute condition in which their death would leave their families, and provided for several households, bereaved of their earthly support, "the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness." Our Brotherhood, with which a number of our kind and considerate laity have connected themselves, insures timely and acceptable relief for the widows and orphans of our deceased clergy, without invading the delicate sensibility of the afflicted recipients. As this

Christian association is wider known and understood, it must commend itself to the judgment and sympathy of all our good people.

In my address to the last Council, I directed attention to the efforts which are making here and in England, to arrest the fearful ravages of intemperance, and also of the sad prevalence among many who profess and call themselves Christians, of indulgence in those pomps and vanities renounced in baptism; so, almost effacing the visible distinction between the Church and the world, and giving occasion for scandal, and grievously hindering the progress of pure and undefiled religion.

That these deplorable evils are regarded by you with painful concern, I do not doubt, and I feel assured of your readiness, by your example and prayers, and all other appropriate means, to essay their repression. I need not remind you that the grand means for the correction of these and all other forms of sin is, not heated controversy, which often generates as great evils as it aims to extirpate, or violent legislation, which may shatter and disable the impetuous agent, and fret and injure those whom it is designed to benefit; but the clear, earnest and affectionate preaching of the precious gospel, which we know to be indeed the power of God unto salvation.

Thanks be to God, this Gospel, in its fulness and force, is our's—our's to have and hold for our own soul's health and comfort; and to preach without let or hindrance, as our Lord has ordained, for his glory and the salvation of our fellow-sinners. This Divine provision needs nothing to supplement it. It would only be discredited and impaired by adventitious additions. It was all-sufficient for our sainted fathers and brothers who set to their seal that God is true, and finished their course with joy, and now, as a great cloud of witnesses, compass us about with intense interest. Wherefore let us not become faint or disheartened, but laying aside every weight, and discarding whatever might impede our progress, or impair our strength, "let us run with patience the race which is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the Author and Finisher of our faith."

I know no Church upon earth more highly favored—no ministers and people on whom greater responsibilities rest. My heart's desire and prayer for you, my dear brethren, and for myself continually is, that we may have grace so to appreciate and improve our advantages that we may be able to give our account with joy in the day of the Lord, and receive at His hands the crown of life which He has promised to give to those who are faithful unto death.

Even so, Lord Jesus. Amen. Amen.

Bishop WHITTLE then read his annual address, as follows:

# REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN:

My first visit, after the adjournment of the last Council, was, 1874, May 29, to Grace Church, Charlotte Courthouse.

May 30.—Consecrated Grace Church, a handsome and commodious frame building, near News Ferry, Halifax county; and confirmed one. Rev. O. A. Kinsolving, rector of the parish, and Rev. John T. Clark assisted in the services.

May 31.—Preached morning and night in St. John's Church, Halifax Court-house, and confirmed ten.

June 2.—Grub Hill, Amelia, confirmed one.

June 3.—Was prevented by rain from meeting an appointment at Grace, Genito, Powhatan county.

June 4.—Confirmed two in Emmanuel; and the next day two in St. Luke's, Powhatan county.

June 7.—Preached morning and night in Trinity, Chester-field, and confirmed seven.

June 14.—Confirmed one in St. Philip's (colored), Richmond, presented by Rev. P. Powers.

I was detained at home during the months of June and July by the severe and protracted illness of a member of my family, and recalled a number of appointments. The same cause prevented me from attending the closing exercises at the Seminary and High School, and a meeting of the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute in Staunton on July 8th.

July 12.—Assisted by Rev. William Norwood, D. D., and Rev. R. A. Gibson, in St. Paul's, Richmond, Rev. Giles B. Cooke of St. Stephen's Petersburg, was admitted to Priest's Orders. Dr. Norwood preached the sermon and presented the candidate.

July 19 and 26.—I officiated in Grace Church, Richmond, which was without a rector.

July 31.—After service by Rev. C. M. Callaway, preached in the Court-house at Hinton, Summers county, West Virginia, and confirmed five.

August 2.—Preached morning and night in St. John's, Charleston, and confirmed eight.

August 5.—Preached in Grace Church, Fauquier, and the next day, in St. Paul's, Haymarket, and confirmed two. Rev. William Hoxton had, only a short time before, become the rector of these Churches.

August 7.—In the morning, preached and confirmed one in Grace Church, The Plains; and in the afternoon preached in Whittle Chapel, in the same Parish.

August 8.—Trinity, Salem, Fauquier, confirmed one.

August 9.—Read the morning prayer, preached, and celebrated the Lord's Supper in Immanuel Church, Fauquier, which has long been without a pastor.

August 10.—Preached in Leeds Mission Church.

August 11.—Services were held in the free Church at Markham, and four confirmed. Leeds Church, which had been destroyed by fire, was rebuilding, and has since been completed.

Sept. 6.—Preached morning and night in Luray, Page Co.

Sept. 17.—Immanuel Chapel, Henry Co., confirmed 1.

Sept. 18.—Christ Church, Henry C. H., confirmed 3.

Sept. 20.—Preached morning and night at Franklin C. H., where 4 were confirmed.

Sept. 22.—Morning in St. John's, Liberty, confirmed 7, one being colored, and in the afternoon, assisted by Rev. H. Suter, rector of the Parish, consecrated Christ Church, a neat frame building, some six miles distant.

Sept. 23.—St. Thomas', Bedford, confirmed 5.

Sept. 24.—St. Stephen's, 11.

Sept. 25.—Trinity, 5.

Sept. 26.—Trinity, Campbell C. H., confirmed 6, presented by Rev. J. H. Williams, of Lynchburg, who, in the abundance of his labors, preaches regularly at this place.

Sept. 27.—In the morning, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Campbell co., which was vacant, I read the service, bap-

tized a child, preached, and confirmed 4; and at night preached and confirmed 2 in Immanuel Church, Madison, a village opposite Lynchburg, in Amherst county. This neat and comfortable brick Church, has been built, and its good congregation gathered, in an almost entirely neglected community, through the indefatigable labors of Rev. Mr. Williams, who, in addition to his faithfully performed duties as rector of Grace Memorial Church, Lynchburg, officiates regularly at four other places, two of them outside the city, and one as far as twelve miles distant.

From October 7 to November 2, I was in attendance on the sessions of the General Convention.

November 8.—I visited Spring Creek Episcopal Mission in Prince Edward county. A few English families having settled in this neighborhood, at once took steps towards the erection of a house of worship; and resolving in the meantime not to forsake the assembling of themselves together on the Lord's day, they commenced and have continued lay services in a private house. On the occasion of my visit, there was only the foundation of the Church edifice, which is now nearly finished; but I found a carpenter's shop fitted up for our services, with vestry-room, organ and everything complete. Nine were confirmed, and the Lord's Supper administered to some thirty persons.

November 10.—In Trinity Church, Brunswick, Dr. Edwin B. Jones, presented by Rev. O. A. Glazebrook, was ordained Deacon, and five persons were confirmed.

November 11.—In St. Andrew's, Lawrenceville, preached to the white congregation, and confirmed five; and at night to the colored people, and confirmed two.

November 15.—Preached and administered the Lord's Supper in St. Paul's, King George, of which the Rev. Mellville Boyd had, but a short time before, become the minister.

November 16.—In St. John's, King George Court-house, confirmed five.

November 17.—Preached in Emmanuel Church, Port Conway.

Nov. 18.—St. Peter's, Westmoreland, baptized a child, and confirmed four.

The Rectorship of this Church had recently become vacant by the death of the lamented Bishop Payne.

Nov. 19.—In St. James', Westmoreland courthouse, confirmed three.

Nov. 20.—Being unable to procure a conveyance, I failed to meet an appointment at Nomini Church.

Nov. 21.—In Yeocomico, confirmed four.

This venerable old building I was delighted to find repaired and put in nice order since my last visit.

Nov. 22.—Administered the Communion and confirmed three, in St. John's, Warsaw. Rev. Beverly D. Tucker, Deacon, in charge.

Nov. 23.—In Emmanuel Methodist Church, in the same parish, confirmed one.

Nov. 24.—In the Methodist Church, Heathsville, Northumberland county, baptized an adult, preached, and confirmed seven, presented by Rev. Mr. Cole.

Nov. 25.—In White Chapel, Lancaster, baptized a child of the rector, and confirmed two.

March 21.—Preached in the morning in St. Paul's, Petersburg, and Bishop Wingfield, of the missionary district of Northern California, late rector of the Church, by my request confirmed thirty-one; at night I preached and confirmed eleven in St. Stephen's, colored.

March 28.—Christ Church, Richmond, confirmed thirteen.

March 24.—In the Monumental, confirmed thirteen.

March 26.—Good Friday, confirmed thirteen in Grace Ch., Alexandria.

The church building at St. Alban's was so much injured during the war that it has become unsafe, and the people being unable to raise the means to repair, have been compelled to abandon it.

April 10.—Preached in the morning in West Columbia, and in the afternoon in Mason City, Mason county, five being confirmed in the former, and six in the latter place.

April 11.—Baptized a child of the rector in Christ Church, Point Pleasant, and confirmed five, and in the afternoon preached in Bruce Chapel.

April 18.—In the Meade Memorial Church, Manchester, confirmed nine.

April 25.—Preached morning and afternoon in Emmanuel, Volcano, Wood Co., W. Va., where two were confirmed.

April 26.—In St. Paul's, Weston, confirmed two.

April 27.—Christ, Clarksburg, confirmed one.

April 28.—Christ, Fairmont, confirmed three.

April 29.—Trinity, Moundsville, confirmed one.

April 30.—Christ, Wellsburg, confirmed three.

May 1.—St. John's, Brooke Co., confirmed three.

May 2.—In St. Matthew's, Wheeling, confirmed thirty-one, and in St. John's nine.

May 8.—Preached at night in New Martinsville, Wetzel Co.

May 4.—In Sistersville, Tyler Co., confirmed one.

May 5.—In the morning preached and confirmed one in St. John's, Pleasants Co., and at night preached in Williamstown, Wood Co.

May 6.—Preached in Trinity Church, Parkersburg, and baptized a child of the rector, and at night, in the same Church, preached and confirmed eight.

May 8.—In the Court-house at Ripley, Jackson Co., preached and confirmed five.

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute be instructed to report to the next Council the financial status of that Institution, showing the character and value of the property pertaining to it; what liabilities, if any there are, yet outstanding against it; to whom the same may be owing; and the resources relied on for the payment thereof; and also the condition of the title to the property and franchises of the Institute; showing whether said Trustees are now vested with all of the original shares of stock, and if not, in whom the same are vested, and what steps are necessary to enable them to acquire such shares, so that the Council may determine whether it will attempt to exercise any control over said Institute.

The reports of the Professors, which are appended, will show the work done in their several departments. It is but justice to them, the trustees should state that, notwithstanding the great loss of their lamented colleague, Rev. Wm. Sparrow, D. D., they have by devotion to their duties sustained the character of the Seminary for sound learning. The success of the students has been marked, and their conduct exemplary. It will gratify many to know that a decided interest in Christian missions prevails among the students.

The trustees still labor under difficulties from the loss of a large part of their income, but the Lord has raised up generous friends, and the hope is entertained, that at no distant day the needed endowment may be complete.

The High School has met all reasonable expectations. The number of pupils has nearly reached the full extent of accommodation for them.

By a rule of the trustees, the rent of the High School is appropriated to the payment of the expenses of such boys of the Diocese as the trustees may select for their merit, especial regard being had to the sons of the clergy. During the current year three boys have enjoyed this advantage, and the increased income of the High School has enabled the trustees to appoint four for the session 1875—"76.

# Rev. Geo. W. Dame offered the following.

Whereas the thorough instruction of our children in the doctrine of the Bible and of the Church, in connection with their education in science and literature, as taught in our best schools, is the only feasible means of securing intelligent Christians and churchmen to carry on the work of Christ in its purity and integrity in our Diocese:

And whereas this Church has, from inability or other causes, thus far failed to make any adequate provision for such instruction of the children of the Clergy and of the masses of churchmen in our Diocese, who are, from poverty, unable to send their children to those valuable Church schools now in active operation, and who are thereby compelled to see their children grow up comparatively uneducated;

And whereas no one duty can be more important to us than making suitable provision for the proper education of those who will have the work of the Church and of society to shape and carry on after we shall have gone to our rest, and no other more suitable provision can be made than having the children of the Church thoroughly educated and trained in the word of God as held by the Church, and in the principles and practices of the Church as held and taught by us; therefore be it

Resolved by this Council, That three clergymen and three laymen be and they are hereby appointed a committee to take the necessary steps to ascertain, and to report to

the next Council, the feasibility of establishing in this Diocese not less than four Church schools—two male and two female—wherein the children of the clergy, canonically resident in this Diocese, may, if possible, be educated free of all expense; and the expenses attending the education of the children of other churchmen, resident in the Diocese, shall not, if possible, exceed one hundred dollars per year.

Resolved, further, That in the selection of the location of those schools, said committee shall have reference to the establishment of four more of such schools. So that if possible there shall soon be in this Diocese four male and four female schools, wherein the education of children shall be free to those whose parents have spent their strength in the ministerial service of God and His Church, and also shall be within the available means of all other churchmen.

The Brotherhood of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, having adopted certain resolutions, and appointed a committee charged with certain duties connected therewith, Hugh W. Sheffey, chairman of said committee, in accordance with said resolutions, submitted for the consideration of the Council the following resolutions:

- I. Resolved, That, in addition to the standing committees required by the 24th Rule of Order, to be appointed by the President at each session of the Council, there shall be appointed a Committee on the Brotherhood.
- 2. Resolved, That the Committee on the Brotherhood shall report at each session of the Council the condition of the Brotherhood, the number of its members, and the work accomplished by it during the preceding year, with such recommendations for the increase of its usefulness as the said Committee may deem proper.
- 3. Resolved, That the lay delegates now in attendance upon the Council, be respectfully requested to procure the appointment of efficient agents of the Brotherhood in their respective parishes or congregations; and, with a view to the increase of its membership that each lay delegate on some suitable occasion and after proper notice, cause the objects of the Brotherhood to be fully explained to his congregation, and thereupon cause to be enrolled the names of such persons as may be willing to become members, and report the same to the Secretary of the Brotherhood, and also the name of the agent chosen for his parish or congregation.

At a meeting of the Brotherhood of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, held in the city of Richmond on Wednesday, the 19th of May, 1875, the following resolutions were adopted:

## Standing Committee on the Brotherhood.

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed, charged with the following duty:

- 1st. To request the Council to appoint each year a committee to report to that body the work of the Brotherhood, with such recommendations as they think will increase its usefulness.
- 2d. To offer before that body a resolution recommending each lay delegate, on his return home, to see that an efficient agent is appointed in his Parish, and on some suitable Sunday, after the services, the subject having been fully explained to the congregation, there and then enrolling such members as may be obtained.

Pending the consideration of the subject, the Council adjourned to Friday, at 9 A. M.

FRIDAY, May 21, 1875.

Resolved, That a new Parish, to be known as Christ Church Parish, be constituted, embracing within its boundaries the territory now composing the county of Smythe.

The following communication was reported to the Council, and ordered to be entered upon the Journal:

To the Secretary of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

## SIR:

In compliance with the requirements of Article 9 of the Constitution of the Church, I would hereby officially make known, through you, to the Diocesan Council of Virginia, the following proposed changes in the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, recommended by the General Convention of 1874, and to be finally acted upon by the General Convention of 1877, to wit:

I. It was, by concurrent action of the two houses of the General Convention of 1874,

## Changes in Constitution-Bible Society of Virginia.

Resolved, That it be recommended and proposed that the following alteration be made in Article 5 of the Constitution, to wit: Insert at the end of the Article the words:

"The General Convention may, upon the application of the Bishop and Convention of an organized Diocese, setting forth that the territory of the Diocese is too large for due episcopal supervision by the Bishop of such Diocese, set off a portion of such Diocesan territory, which shall thereupon be placed within, or constitute, a Missionary Jurisdiction, as the House of Bishops may determine."

## II. It was further

Resolved, That the following be proposed and made known to the several Dioceses as an amendment to Article 8 of the Constitution, to be added at the end of the Article as it now stands, to wit, the words:

"Provided, That the General Convention may by Canon arrange and set forth a shortened form of Morning and Evening Prayer, to be compiled wholly from the Book of Common Prayer,"

## III. It was further

Resolved, That the following be proposed as an amendment, by way of addition, to the 8th Article of the Constitution, to wit:

"Provided, however, That the General Convention shall have power, from time to time, to amend the Lectionary; but no act for this purpose shall be valid which is not voted for by a majority of the whole number of Bishops entitled to seats in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies."

Resolved, second, That the Secretary of the House of Deputies cause the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution to be made known to the several Dioceses, according to the Constitution and Canons of the Church.

take up an annual collection to aid the Bible Society of Virginia in the prosecution of its work.

Rev. D. F. Sprigg, D. D., offered the following amendment:

Resolved, That this Council recommend to the Board of Managers of the Virginia Bible Society an economical administration of its financial affairs.

Pending the consideration of the subject, the Council took recess for divine service.

After service, the Council reassembled for business, and resumed the consideration of the resolutions offered by Rev. Dr. Woodbridge, in relation to the Bible Society.

The first was adopted. The second resolution was laid upon the table, as was also the resolution offered by the Rev. Dr. Sprigg.

Mr. N. H. Massie presented the following from the Committee on Clerical Support:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF LAYMEN ON CLERICAL SUPPORT.

The committee to whom were referred the reports of the parish treasurers upon the subject of the support of the clergy, instruct me to report that they have carefully examined these reports and tabulated the results, and find the following state of facts:

One hundred and eight parishes have sent in reports, of which eleven are found to be delinquent in the payment of the salary promised. Your Committee have found themselves, in their efforts to ascertain the actual condition of the Diocese, embarrassed by the same difficulty which has often before been mentioned, to wit: the negligence on the part of so many parish treasurers in the matter of sending in their reports. After all the efforts of the secretary of this body, and the published appeals, there must be now well nigh one-fourth of the occupied parishes from whom no response whatever has been obtained. Surely there ought to be no difficulty in getting this information even

for the Journal of the present session, if only the lay delegates now present would undertake to have the matter attended to at once. Your Committee can think of nothing better than to recommend, as on former occasions, that the secretary be requested, at the earliest day practicable, to publish in the Southern Churchman a list of all the occupied parishes thus failing to report, notifying them that if they will at once send their reports, the list will be corrected and they will not be published in the Journal as being in default. In like manner your Committee furnish as part of this report a tabular list of all those parishes who are delinquent, giving the name of the Church, parish, county, sum promised, amount paid, and amount of delinquency, with the recommendation, however, that, as heretofore, the secretary publish in the Southern Churchman a list giving only the names of those Churches and parishes, with the assurance that if they will at once furnish to him the evidence that the deficiency has been made up, they will not be included in the ugly list published in the Journal, which will contain all the particulars.

On the subject of rectories, your Committee are gratified to report a marked progress in the past two years. Of the 108 parishes heard from, 43 report comfortable rectories, in some cases with 50, 60, 100, and in one case, nearly 200 acres attached, and six others report steps in progress to procure rectories with more or less of hope for the accomplishment of the purpose. Several parishes report the payment to their rectors of amounts larger than those promised.

All which is respectfully submitted.

Rev. C. J. Gibson presented the following report of the Board of Managers of the Fund for Relief of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen:

The Board of Managers of the Fund for the Relief of the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen of the Diocese of Virginia, present their annual report.

The Fund now consists of railroad and corporation bonds to the amount of \$21,568.18—no increase upon the fund of last year, because the Board thought it best, in the present state of suffering and scarcity of money, to distribute the whole amount of their last year's income. The income for this year, according to the Treasurer's report herewith submitted, will be a little larger than usual-\$1,444.19—out of which for the same reason, the Board have determined to apppropriate \$1,400 to the relief of eight families, giving each of them \$175. Much more would gladly have been given them by the Board, if the Parishes of the Diocese had more generously rendered their aid. Only eleven Parishes, however, out of our 150, have given us anything at all, and their united contributions have supplied to our income \$142.50! We hope for better things next year.

The Board are sorry, also, to be obliged to report to the Council the

resignation of their most efficient and highly valued Treasurer, John L. Bacon, Esq., who for the last twenty-five years has been the guardian and skillful manager of this important Fund. With great reluctance, the Board have felt themselves compelled to accept his resignation. They have elected in his stead P. H. Mayo, Esq., of this city, who has kindly consented to act as the Treasurer of the Board.

According to a regulation under which the property of the Fund is held by the Board, the Treasurer is obliged to be also one of the trustees of the Fund. The Board would therefore ask, that in the election of the three Clerical members of the Board of Managers, which occurs at this meeting, the Council would also authorize the name of Mr. Mayo to be substituted for that of Col. Thomas H. Ellis, one of the present Trustees of the Fund, who has removed his residence from the State.

In view of the past valuable services of our late Treasurer, so cheerfully rendered to the Diocese, the Board would also ask the adoption by the Council of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Council are hereby most cordially tendered to John L. Bacon, Esq., for his long continued care and most faithful and judicious management of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese.

The Rev. Dr. Minnigerode presented the annual report of the Diocesan Missionary Society, as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA TO THE COUNCIL CONVENED AT RICHMOND, MAY 1875.

The IV. Article of the Constitution of this Society, requiring its Executive Committee "to make an annual statement of their proceedings to the Convention," or Council, they respectfully report, that the unexpended balance in the hands of the treasurer May 1st, 1874, was \$1,083.98. The receipts for the year ending May 1st, 1875, were \$4,405.31, and the disbursements during the same period were \$4,729.25, leaving in the hands of the treasurer, May 1, 1875, \$760.04.

The number of missionaries aided by this Society during the year ending May 1, 1875, was twenty-nine, who have been laboring in twenty-eight counties and towns of the Diocese.

About the 1st of August last, the Committee created the office of General Agent of this Society, it being designed that the person filling the office should make it "his special business, by personal appeals to our various congregations, and by the adoption of such other plans as in his judgment might seem best, to excite an increased interest in our home work, to secure contributions and to promote generally the welfare of the Society." The Rev. F. M. Baker was appointed to fill the position. The agent, acting under the general instructions of the Committee, has done what seemed to be best, under the circumstances, to accomplish these ends.

The Committee cannot close their report without expressing their regrets that, notwithstanding their increased efforts, the contributions have not been larger. During three fourths of their fiscal year, the receipts were so small that they did not feel justified in making any new appropriations, and it was not until the last quarter of the year that they ven-

tured to make a few long-delayed appropriations, and then not without apprehensions that the receipts would not be sufficient to justify the They are glad to say that in this their fears proved to be unne-But with regard to the smallness of the contributions, during the past year, as compared with the work to be done, the Committee would beg leave to say that while, no doubt, it is to be attributed in a considerable degree to the financial condition of the country, yet facts show that in some parts of the Diocese the interest evinced in this work is not in proportion to its merits and its claims, and they would respectfully call the attention of ministers and laymen to it. If the Church is to be extended through the Diocese it can only be done by sending ministers of the Church to the destitute points; and there is no other regular agency to meet the temporal wants of these ministers and enable them to remain at their posts, but this Society. The Executive Committee are often almost in despair to know how to furnish the necessaries of life to these brethren, who, relying upon the good faith of the Diocese, are laboring to extend the Church, and who ask and expect nothing more for their labors than a bare subsistence.

## DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Rev. W. C. Meredith, D. D., presented the following:

Your committee report that they have examined the accounts of the Treasurer, and find the same to be correct, and accompanied with proper vouchers.

- Rev. E. H. Ingle offered an amendment to Canon IX, which was referred to a committee, consisting of Rev. E. H. Ingle, Rev. Dr. Morrison, Judge Sheffey, and Mr. John Stewart, to report to-morrow.
- Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., in behalf of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, presented the following proposed Constitution for the Society, and the Council proceeded to consider the articles seriatim.
- 1. This Society shall be called the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Virginia.
  - 2. This Society shall consist of all persons who contribute to its funds.
- 3. The object of this Society shall be to procure and assist missionaries within the bounds of the Diocese.
- 4. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be, ex officio, the President, and the other officers shall be a Vice-president, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee, consisting of the officers already mentioned in this article, and of such other clerical and lay members as the Council may appoint at its annual meeting, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, provided both orders are represented.
- 5. The duty of the Executive Committee shall be, to employ missionaries, to appoint their stations, to give them such instructions as may be

deemed necessary, to provide for the payment of their salaries, to take all such measures as may promote the objects of the society, and to present an annual statement of their proceedings to the Council.

- 6. The Executive Committee may, when they deem it expedient, employ a portion of the funds of the society, not exceeding one-tenth part thereof, in supplying its missionaries and mission stations with prayer books and tracts, and shall in their report to the Council specify what books and tracts have been so distributed.
- 7. This Constitution may be altered by a vote of the majority of the Council present when the alteration is proposed.

Article 1 was adopted.

The Rev. R. H. Mason offered the following as a substitute for Article 2:

This Society shall consist of the clergy and lay delegates entitled to seats in the Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, and they shall constitute the Society until their successors are appointed.

Pending the discussion of this amendment, the Council adjourned to Saturday at 9 o'clock A. M.

SATURDAY, 9 A. M.

Council met, and, after prayer by Rev. A. W. Weddell, was called to order by the Bishop.

Minutes of yesterday read and approved.

Mr. R. W. Noland moved that speakers upon all subjects be limited to five minutes, and that no one be allowed to speak upon any subject more than once, except by consent of a majority of the Council.

Adopted.

## Report of Finance Committee.

Mr. N. H. Massie presented the following report from the Finance Committee:

### REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Committee to whom were referred the accounts of the Treasurer of the Council, beg leave to report that they have examined his accounts and find them accurately and neatly kept, and that the expenditures were all proper and sustained by satisfactory vouchers; and there remained on hand on the 1st May, 1875, a balance of \$233.39. This simple statement will scarcely give a correct idea of the satisfactory condition of the financial status of your body. Your Committee will, therefore, state further, that the report of the Treasurer shows that during the past year, in addition to the payment of all the regular expenses, he has also paid all the expenses attending the session of the General Convention, and has, moreover, paid off and discharged in full all the balance of the debt that was due upon the Episcopal Residence, and the apparently small balance remaining on hand at the close of the fiscal year, \$233.39, represents a surplus where a year ago the Treasurer had anticipated a large deficit.

Up to the present time the receipts of the Treasurer have been about \$9,000, and this sum will undoubtedly be considerably increased. Your Committee recommend the same regular appropriations for the coming year which were paid during the year just closed, with the addition of \$100 to the salary of the Secretary, and the recommendation that this be paid quarterly like all the other salaries. They also recommend an appropriation of \$30 for the Assistant Secretary.

### Episcopal Fund,

Rev. Dr. Woodbridge, from the Committee on the Episcopal Fund, presented the following statement:

The Committee on the Episcopal Fund have examined the report of the Treasurer, and present to the Council the following statement as to the condition of that fund:

During the last year the Treasurer has purchased three shares of Alexandria corporation stock, first mortgage 7 per cent. bonds, payable July 1st, 1875, and valued at \$70 per share, leaving in his hands a balance of \$149.70. The amount of available funds in his hands now is,

Besides this there are also Virginia and West Virginia stocks to the amount of \$2,314.54, whose par value is about 40 cents. The market value of these "available securities" is very far from being at par. Had they been sold and judiciously re-invested at some former period, the Fund would now be in a far better condition; but in the present depressed condition we should hesitate to advise a sale.

Rev. E. H. Ingle, from the committee upon the proposed amendment to Canon IX., presented the following:

The committee appointed to consider the proposed amendment to Canon IX., would recommend that section third of said Canon be amended so as to read as follows:

In case there be in a Parish congregations not exceeding four in number, apart from each other, but not constituting independent cures, a separate election may be held for each congregation, at its usual place of worship, or if there be none, at such other place as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The qualified electors of such congregation shall, in the manner prescribed by this Canon, elect three persons, who shall be Vestrymen of the Parish: provided, however, that in case such separate elections be held, a less or greater num-

ber than three persons may be elected by the electors of any such congregation with the consent of the Vestry of the parish first had and obtained: and provided further, that in no event shall the aggregate number of such Vestrymen exceed twelve.

# Mr. Tazewell Taylor offered the following:

Resolved, That Article X. of the Constitution of this Diocese, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Before the adjournment of each Annual Council, a Standing Committee, consisting of ten members-five Clerical and five of the Lay Order-who shall be Communicants of the Church in the Diocese, shall be chosen by a ballot of the Clergy and Laity."

Which was approved, and ordered to be transmitted to the Vestries of the Parishes.

The Council resumed the consideration of the Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Upon motion of Rev. Dr. Minnigerode, the whole subject was laid upon the table, to be considered at the next Council.

# The Rev. R. H. Mason offered the following:

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Council it is advisable that at each Council of this Diocese one sitting of the body be devoted to the consideration of Diocesan Missions and to the hearing of the reports of individual missionaries.

# Adopted.

Rev. Wm. Norwood, D. D., from the Committee on New Parishes, presented a petition from members of the parish of St. Thomas, residing in Gordonsville and its vicinity, asking for authority to establish a separate congregation.

#### State of the Church.

Report received and petition granted.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel, from the Committee on the state of the Church, presented the following report:

Inadequate as are all external tests of Church growth, your committee have enough in the documents submitted to their consideration to call for heartfelt gratitude to our Divine Head. The number of those who during the past year have confessed Christ in confirmation (1,089) constitute no inconsiderable accession to our Household of Faith. The number of Churches (7) consecrated to the worship of Almighty God is, when we consider the prevailing financial depression, a healthy indication of progress. The number of postulants and candidates for holy orders (33) is in excess of any previous experience, the number of communicants (although not yet fully reported), is nearly as large (11,385) as was reported last year; while the amount of contributions (\$127,888) exceeds that of the year preceding by \$22,000. In the matter of clerical support, and in the provision of rectories, there has been a marked improvement.

In the very important department of Diocesan Missions alone is your committee pained to note a less encouraging result. All who give to the subject a moment's reflection must concede that the amount (\$4,500) contributed to this branch of missionary enterprise is wholly inadequate to the wants of our widely-extended diocese. When it is considered, further, that out of the one hundred and fifty parishes which compose our diocese, about 100 contribute at all, and that the rest contribute nothing to this object, a condition is disclosed of supineness, indifference, or dissatisfaction greatly to be deplored, and which imperatively calls for correction. No effort should be spared to discover, and if possible remove, the cause. Your committee are persuaded that this lamentable lack of interest in diocesan work is traceable in part, at least, if not in large measure, to lack of information among both clergy and people.

Were the number of missionaries employed and their respective fields of labor extensively made known; were each missionary required to give annually a detailed account of his labors, his privations, of the extent and the needs of his own and adjacent fields; were these accounts judiciously digested by a committee of the Board, such portions only being retained as would prove of present interest to the Church at large, prefaced and followed by remarks calculated to throw further light

upon the subject; were a missionary map of the diocese prepared, indicating what parts, and how much, of our beloved diocese remains unsupplied with the ministrations of our Church, and the whole embodied in a report, of which a large edition was published and circulated throughout the diocese, it would form an invaluable and most effective appeal to both the clergy and the congregations of the Church. Both by clergy and people the complaint is loud and constant of the lack of just such data.

But be the cause what it may of the existing deficiency, your committee cannot too emphatically declare their conviction that, instead of the paltry sum of \$4,500, \$10,000 or \$12,500 at the very least should be put at the disposal of our Diocesan Board.

In such conviction we are confirmed by the reflection that upon one large and highly important sphere of missionary enterprise, our Church in Virginia can be scarcely said to have entered—we mean the colored population of the State. Fully and painfully apprised as we are of the difficulties to be surmounted, the prejudices to be overcome, and the discouragements to be encountered, our duty in the premises is unchanged. At our very doors are this numerous class of almost heathen, for whom Christ died. To them as to every creature we are commanded to preach the everlasting gospel. We are debtors both to the wise and unwise, and at the peril of our own, their salvation must be sought, and that debt paid. In one case, at least—that of Rev. Mr. Cooke, of Petersburg—such effort in behalf of our own colored population has been attended with success sufficient to stimulate our Church to similar attempts to reach and benefit this class. Expansion in this and every other feasible direction is, we feel, imperatively required if we would develope and invigorate the missionary zeal of our Church. We must lengthen our cords, as we hope to secure the blessing of Him who sent us to strengthen our stakes.

For the support of this, as of all the other benevolent enterprises of our Church in the diocese—the Education Society, the Brotherhood, the Disabled Clergy fund—a very moderate degree of self-denial on the part of our members would suffice; and until our benefactions cost us something we fail of that standard of liberality which is inculcated and was exemplified by Him who for our sakes became poor that we through His poverty might be rich.

To be effective in its beneficial influence upon ourselves or others such

charity should not be fitful and irregular, but habitual and systematic—at regular periods, and always in proportion to the means wherewith God hath prospered us. Thus only can we grow up ourselves unto Godlikeness and become the children of our Father in heaven, who causeth His sun daily to rise on the evil and on the good.

But it is not only to the want of self-denial and to consequent want of liberality that we are constrained to revert. Our beloved Bishop in his address pointedly called attention to practical excesses on the part of some—first in intemperance. The apostolic caution, "be not drunk with wine"; the solemn warning that drunkards have no portion in the kingdom of heaven, but are without, "in the lake which burneth with fire," ought to be, and in the vast majority of instances are, sufficient to class this with sins not once to be named among us as "becoming saints." Still, your committee are forced to the conclusion that social usagessome of long standing, others of novel introduction, peril the safety, and weaken, if they do not destroy, the influence for good to edification of many professing Christians. They cannot, therefore, but express their conviction, in the very strongest terms, that the offering of intoxicating draughts as a rite of hospitality is more honored in the breach than in the observance, and the frequenting of club and bar-rooms (or even an occasional visit to the same) is inconsistent with a Christian profession, and fraught with incalculable evil to the persons themselves, to the rising generation, and to society at large.

In the matter of non-conformity to the sinful amusements and practices of the world, our Bishop deplored laxity on the part of some of our members. Your committee, while unable to lay down any rules for the guidance of clergy and laity more explicit than are already found in Holy Scripture and the canon of the diocese, cannot but accept and enforce his paternal admonition. The cure for this, as for other evils, must come from a deepened tone of personal piety; and just in proportion, and in proportion only, as we become transformed in the spirit of our minds will a healthy and an abiding non-conformity be apparent in the life.

In one respect your committee feel that they would be derelict in duty and ungrateful to God did they not felicitate the Church in Virginia upon the marvelous unanimity in sentiment and harmony in spirit with which He who maketh men to be of one mind in one house hath heretofore blessed us. In no age of the Church (not the apostolic age

itself), in no part of Christendom, in no Church of whatever name, among so large a body of clergy and laity, scattered over so wide an area, has there ever been so near an approximation to oneness of mind and of heart—a unanimity all the more remarkable when so much distraction and division prevails around us and in so many of our sister diocesses.

Your committee conclude with the earnest prayer that He who, as at this time, did teach the hearts of His faithful people by sending to them the light of his Holy Spirit would give us a right judgment in all things, and especially in this: to prize, to cherish, and by all that in us lies, to perpetuate this blessed boon of being all of one heart and of one soul, striving together for the faith of the gospel.

On motion of Dr. Newton the Secretary was instructed to have 2,000 copies of this report printed for distribution in the Diocese.

Carried.

The Council then took recess for divine service.

The Council reassembled after service.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Council be returned to the citizens of Richmond for the generous hospitality and thoughtful kindness which have been extended towards its members during their sojourn in the city.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Body be also returned to the Rector and Vestry of St. Paul's Church, for the considerate arrangements made for the accommodation of the members, and for the prompt and efficient transaction of its business.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Council be tendered to the Railroad and Steamboat Companies, who have granted to the members of the Council the courtesy of free passes to their homes.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be requested to pay fifteen dollars to the Sexton of this Church for his services to the Council.

#### Adjournment.

It was ordered that 1,500 copies of the Journal be printed for distribution amongst the Parishes of the Diocese.

Resolved, That the next Council meet for its first service at 10 o'clock, A. M.

The Council then united in singing the Gloria in Excelsis. Prayer was offered, and the benediction pronounced by the Bishop, after which it was announced that the Council had adjourned sine die.

A lot near the Church has also been purchased, on which a rectory is now in process of building. On Monday nights, a gentleman's Bible class is conducted by the rector in the lecture-room of the Church, and on Wednesday nights "cottage lectures" at private residences in the outlying districts of the city. Services are also held on alternate Wednesdays at the City Almshouse, with gratifying results. At the Mission Church, on the opposite side of the river, services are held on alternate Sunday and Friday nights, and the Sunday School regularly kept up. A Mission Sunday School and services have also been inaugurated on Daniel's Hill, where it is hoped a new Church may soon be erected.

There are connected with this parish two missionary stations—Mason City and West Columbia, distant respectively sixteen and twelve miles from this place, and situated above, on the Ohio river. There seems a good promise for the Church in these towns, though most of the inhabitants are either miners or laboring people. There are several Episco-palians among them, and eleven of the confirmations reported above took place up there. It is necessary, for the bulk of the congregation at each of these towns, to "page out" the service, though there are some who know and love it. There are a good many others besides these, who are connected with the Church in Ohio, but reside on this side of the river, who, I suppose, would join the Church in their midst if it ever becomes regularly established. At Bruce Chapel, some nine miles below on the Ohio, there are three communicants, besides those reported above. ## REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF BIBLICAL LEARNING.

To the Board of Trustees of the

Theological Seminary of Virginia:

I would respectfully report to the trustees, that the classes under my instruction have pursued the prescribed course of studies with more than common faithfulness and diligence.

The Junior class have studied the Hebrew Grammar with written exercises, and have read the usual amount in Hebrew. In Greek, they have finished the exegetical study of the Gospel of St. John and the Sermon on the Mount. Three times a week they have read exegetical essays on the most difficult subjects in the Gospels.

The *Middle* class have read in Hebrew thirty-five Psalms, and the prophecies of Christ in Isaiah; in Greek they have studied the epistles to the Romans, Hebrews and Galatians, and have begun the review.

The Senior class have read in Hebrew twenty chapters in Isaiah, from Isaiah 40-63; in Greek, the epistles to the Galatians, and the first to the Corinthians.

As Librarian, I would further report that there have been added to the library 144 volumes of the Greek Church Fathers, and other works of value.

## REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY.

To the Board of Trustees of the

Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Ecclesiastical History would respectfully report:

That the classes under his instruction have pursued the usual course of studies for the session, and with a commendable degree of diligence.

The Seniors, reciting daily, have studied and reviewed Short's History of the Church of England, with written Lectures on the Early History of the British Church and the later History of the English Church, and of that in this country. As introductory to Pastoral Theology, they have read the Pastoral Epistles; have studied a course of Liturgies with questions of my own preparation, a similar course also in Homiletics, with weekly exercises and criticisms. They will be occupied for the remainder of the session with Homiletics and Pastoral Theology.

The Middle class, reciting tri-weekly, has studied Kurtz' Church History, with essays at each recitation; and they are now reviewing.

The Junior class, reciting twice a week, have studied Kurtz' Sacred History; and, as introductory to Ecclesiastical History, have read, in the original, the Acts of the Apostles.

## REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Rt. Rev. John Johns, D. D., LL. D.,

President of the Board of Trustees:

Rt. Rev. and Dear Sir,—As Principal of the Episcopal High School, I have the honor to submit the following report:

The session of 1874-'75 has been the most prosperous of those under my administration. Seventy-five pupils, including six day scholars, have been entered; fourteen of the number being clergymen's sons.

\* \* \* The religious services and exercises of the school have been as before, except that during Lent an extra night service in the week was had, conducted by myself. The Friday night meeting, from which in past sessions so much good has come, has been most efficiently sustained by Mr. Charles D. Walker, of the Senior Class in the Teological Seminary. Attendance in the week on religious services, other than family prayer, is always voluntary, but few congregations, however large the proportion of communicants, show as much interest in this respect as our boys. To Mr. Walker, for the aid mentioned, and to Mr. James R. Winchester, of the Junior Class, for assistance in Bible class and work on Sundays, I am greatly indebted.

I have been the medium of contributions from pupils for religious and benevolent uses during the summer amounting to about \$100. Nine students and the only one of my assistants not already a communicant, have been confirmed since March 1st. Forty-two pupils are communicants.

To my assistants, Messrs. Hoxton, Minor, Berkeley, and M'Clelland, I would record grateful acknowledgments. The zeal, ability and efficiency as teachers, and their influence and example as men have contributed in large, if not chief, measure, to the continued success of the school, and my good fortune in retaining them is a matter of interest to the Diocese.
