## RULES OF ORDER.

#### ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterwards stand except to address the chair.

8d. The credentials of Lay Delegates shall be handed to the Secretary, who shall call the names of at least twelve, that the Council may at once proceed to business. The credentials of all the delegates shall then be referred to a committee of two clerical and three lay members, who shall report thereon as speedily as practicable, and if any doubt arise as to the right of any delegate to a seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for their examination.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of the pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Reports of standing committees.

Reports of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2nd. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each Order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

1st, When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.

- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of his second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

#### Bules of Order.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever three members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council for special reasons shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council, or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick, or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall at his discretion select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the rembers, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3rd. No spectator shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

#### REPORT OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

### My DEAR BRETHREN, CLERICAL AND LAY:

It is under peculiarly sad and solemn circumstances that we are assembled in this eighty-first Council of our church in Virginia. Our venerable and beloved Bishop Johns said, in his address to us twelve months ago: "During the past year, not one of the clergy canonically connected with this Diocese has been removed by death." But how different the report which I must make to you to-day! We had hardly adjourned, and while most of us were on our way to our homes, the Rev. Chas. W. Andrews, D. D., rector of Trinity Church, Shepherdstown, who had been arrested by sickness in Fredericksburg, on his way to the Council, after a most faithful and useful ministry of forty-three years, on 24th May, 1875, ceased from his labors and entered into the rest which remaineth for the people of God. No words of eulogy are needed from me of one so well known, not only in our own Diocese, but throughout our entire Church, and wherever known, so much admired for his superior talents, and loved for his devout and earnest Christian spirit. It is enough to say of him, that he "fought a good fight, and finished his course, and kept the faith;" and, we doubt not, has received the crown of righteousness which the

Lord, the righteous judge, has laid up for all them who love His appearing.

Dr. Andrews was followed, Sept. 13th, by the Rev. Mark L. Chevers, after a pilgrimage of four score years, more than fifty-one of which were faithfully spent, chiefly as Chaplain of the United States Army at Fortress Monroe, in the ministry of his Saviour whom he loved.

On the 1st November, 1875, Rev. William C. Meredith, D. D., rector of Christ Church, Winchester, as noble and manly a Christian as one rarely meets with in this world, after several months' sickness, closed his ministry of more than thirty years, and calmly and peacefully departed, to be present with the Lord.

The Rev. Charles E. Ambler, late rector of the churches in Middletown and Front Royal, was the next to follow. A purer and more lovable Christian character it was never my privilege to know. I am not informed as to the day or month of his decease. He had been for many years in declining health, but "while the outward man decayed, the inward man was renewed day by day," so that when his change came we doubt not an abundant entrance was ministered unto him into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

The Rev. Jno. W. Magill, after a brief but faithful and promising ministry of little more than a year as Rector of St. John's Church, Petersburg, returned in broken health to his native Ireland, where, in his father's house, on 19th March, 1876, he died "in the confidence of a certain faith, and in the comfort of a reasonable, religious and holy hope." Thus, during the past year, five of our faithful and beloved Presbyters have been called from the sweet toils and cares of the church militant to the glorious rewards of the church triumphant. They had diversities of giffs, but they were all sanctified and governed by the same Holy Spirit. When we call to mind their characters and their lives, we cannot but feel that in the loss of so many and such men we have been greatly afflicted.

But "whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth." Blessed be His holy name, we "sorrow not even as others who have no hope. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so these dear brethren also who sleep in Jesus will God bring with Him." We give Him "hearty thanks for the good examples of all these his servants, who, having finished their course in faith, do now rest from their labors." And may it be the prayer and the effort of our lives, that when our appointed work is done, we, with them, "may have our perfect consummation and bliss, both in body and soul, in His eternal and everlasting glory, through Jesus Christ our Lord."

But the greatest sorrow for the whole Diocese was yet to come. Our beloved Bishop, the Rt. Rev. John Johns, was stricken with sickness on 13th March, and after lingering with us amidst our hopes and our fears until midnight of 4th April, he finished his course with joy, and the ministry which he had received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God. His end was not only peaceful but triumphant. God had given Him for long and important service in his church. His ministry extended through a period of within one month of fifty-seven years; the record of his abundant labors as Bishop and assistant Bishop during nearly thirty-three of those years being spread on the pages of your journals. I can add nothing to what has been published by individuals, vestries, and other bodies in regard to the character and life and work of the dear I will merely testify that he ever treated me with the kindness and confidence of a father. The better I came to know him, during my intimate association with him for nearly eight years, the more I admired him for his great and varied abilities, and loved him for his Christian virtues. But he has gone! The place amongst us which so long knew him shall know him no more forever. Surely his loss to me can never be repaired. May a double portion of his spirit rest on his unworthy successor, and may God's strength be made perfect in my weakness. May we, my dear clerical brethren, be enabled by the Holy Spirit to preach Christ as uniformly, as simply

and as earnestly as he preached. Him, and may we all, ministers and laymen, receive grace to follow Christ as he followed him. So—and what more can we desire?—shall we die the death of this eminent servant of God, and our last end shall be like his.

Our late venerated Bishop had written a part of his address to this Council, which I now proceed to read as follows:

1875, June 6.—I preached in St. John's Church, Roanoke county, and confirmed ten.

June 7.—I preached in St. Paul's, Salem, and confirmed seventeen.

June 8.—In St. Paul's, Lynchburg, I preached and confirmed twenty-seven.

June 9.—I preached in Grace Church and confirmed twenty-two.

June 10.—In Prince Edward county, I consecrated St. Ann's church. The sermon by myself. In the service I was assisted by Rev. Dr. Gibson and the Rev. Messrs. Carson, Williams and Ellerby. A few English families settled in the vicinity, aided by generous friends at home, and others in New York, who became interested in the enterprise by the representations of Bishop Tozer, have erected this appropriate house of worship and dedicated it to the service of Almighty God. On this occasion it was filled with a respectable and serious congregation. I was unusually impressed by the becoming manner in which they engaged in the prayesr and other parts of the service.

The music was exemplary—so simple, solemn and affecting, that I cannot refrain from the expression of my great gratification, and my hope that if spared to repeat my visit, it may be to be made glad by the healthy growth and true and abundant prosperity of this new congregation.

June 25.—In the Seminary Chapel, after sermon by Rev. Dr. Peterkin, I ordained the following persons presbyters: Melville Boyd, Richard Ellerby, John W. Magill, George W. Nelson, Theodore Reed, F. G. Scott, James W. Shields, Edward Wall, Beverly D. Tucker, Dallas Tucker—10.

July 11.—In Christ Church, Winchester, I baptized Richard Stuart Hunter (infant), preached and confirmed three.

July 12.—I preached in St. Thomas' Church, Middletown. This parish is now vacant, the Rev. C. E. Ambler having resigned on account of ill health.

July 13.—At White Post, Clarke county, I consecrated the Meade Memorial Church. I also preached and confirmed three. For this building we are indebted to the Rector of the parish, the Rev. Joseph R. Jones. He originated the enterprise, and by his indefatigable efforts secured the funds by which it has been happily completed. A substantial, commodious and sightly church now stands near the spot where our sainted Bishop was born, opens its doors and offers its precious privileges to the children of those among whom he had himself been a child—to whom, in his manhood he had ministered so acceptably, and to whose descendants, generation after generation, we pray that it may prove a sanctuary indeed, a house of God and a gate to heaven.

July 14.—I preached in Christ Church, Millwood, and confirmed five.

July 15.—In Grace Church, Berryville, I preached and confirmed three.

July 16.—I preached in Wickliffe Church, and confirmed five.

July 18.—In Zion Church, Charlestown, I preached and confirmed fifteen.

July 19.—I preached in Grace Church, Middleway, and confirmed three.

July 20.—I preached in St. Bartholomew's.

July 21.—I preached in Trinity Church, Shepherdstown.

July 22.—I preached in Trinity Church, Martinsburg, and confirmed eight.

July 23.—I preached in Christ Church, Bunker Hill, and confirmed three.

July 24.—I preached in Zion Church, Hedgesville, and confirmed five.

July 26.—I passed in Frederick City, Maryland, and preached in All Saints' Church, where, in 1819, I began my ministry.

August 8.—In Grace Church, Fauquier, I preached and confirmed thirteen.

August 15.—I preached in the Seminary Chapel.

August 22.—I preached in Christ Church, Alexandria.

October 3.—I consecrated Pohick Church. Morning service by the Rev. Dr. Packard and the Rev. Dr. McIlhenny. Sermon by myself. This venerable building, in the location and erection of which General Washington was so active, was for many years the Parish Church of the family at Mt. Vernon. It was during the late war shamefully damaged by its military invaders, who left it to crumble under the wasting influence of the weather, and be carried off at pleasure by any one who fancied its material for private use. So, after the War of the Revolution disappeared the Church in which the "father of his country" is said to have been christened, and such seemed to be the doom of the Church of his manhood, but its sad condition came to the knowledge of a generous Christian gentleman in New York, who inquired, then came and looked, and then never intermitted his efforts till the ruin was thoroughly repaired. A new chancel with all its appropriate furniture and a handsome communion service was provided, a font in front and a convenient robing room on one side of the chancel and a good pipe organ on the other. The restoration was complete. and the large congregation now assembled were gladdened by the presence of the benefactor to whose sympathy and services they were so largely indebted, and who was now with them uniting in the consecration of the venerable building which he had been the honored agent in rescuing from ruin and preserving for their great benefit and the honor and worship of God. Until an ordained minister can be procured to officiate regularly for this congregation, stated services will be rendered by students of the Seminary appointed for the purpose.

October 11.—I left home to visit the Western section of the Diocese.

October 12.—I preached in Christ Church, Clarksburg. The next day was occupied in reaching Wheeling.

October 14.—I preached in St. Mathew's, Wheeling, and confirmed eight. I had no appointment for St. John's congregation. The house which they had occupied, but which never belonged to them, had been recently sold to pay the debt contracted in its erection. Whether the good people thus unhoused will provide themselves with suitable accommodations elsewhere, or unite with St. Mathew's, I am not informed. I am, however, happy to know that the Rector of St. Mathew's purposes to enter at an early day upon the Missionary work, for which North and South Wheeling seem to be prepared. Returning by Grafton and Clarksburg I passed on to Parkersburg.

October 17.—In the morning I preached in Trinity Church; and at night, after sermon by the Rev. Mr. Tompkins, I confirmed five.

October 18.—I preached in Grace Church, Ravenswood. This and St. John's, Ripley, vacant by the resignation of the Rev. C. R. Page, have made arrangements for occasional services by the Rev. Mr. Lacy.

October 20.—At Point Pleasant I baptized an infant of the Rev. H. Hayden, former Rector of the Parish, and preached in Christ Church. The next morning the only boat going down the river that day passed without stopping, and so deprived me of the conveyance on which I depended for reaching Huntington in time for my appointment that night. But the enterprise of my clerical brother was equal to the emergency. Carriages were quickly provided. We were soon ferried over the Ohio; and by a rapid ride to Gallipolis reached the wharf before the boat had finished taking on her freight. I was thus enabled to fulfil my appointment in the evening, when I preached to a large and interesting congregation at Huntington. The churches here and at St. Alban's are both vacant. United they might furnish a support for a minister, and a faith-

ful and persistent laborer in these fields will not have long to wait for precious fruit.

October 22d.—At Charleston, Kanawha, I was happy to find the Rev. R. A. Cobbs recently elected Rector of the Saint John's Church, who had hastened to the Parish that he might be there during my visit and assist me in the services. As he had reached Charleston but a few days before I did, there was no time to arrange for confirmation. At night I preached in St. John's, and next day at noon left for home by the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad.

From Ravenswood to Charleston I was accompanied by the Rev. Mr. Lacy, whose services were very acceptable to the several congregations.

Here ends what our dear Bishop had written of his thirtythird Annual Address to this Council, when he was called to enter into the joy of his Lord.

November 21.—He confirmed 21 in Grace, and 43 in St. Paul's Church, Petersburg.

On the 24th of the same month he confirmed a class of 10 in Trinity Church, Portsmouth, when he performed the rite of laying on of hands for the last time. Total confirmations by Bishop Johns 229.

Resuming my own address-

1875, May 29.—In Mapsico Church, Charles City county, preached and confirmed three.

May 30.—In Westover Church confirmed one.

May 31.—In St. John's, City Point, confirmed three.

June 1.—In Merchant's Hope, Prince George county, confirmed seven.

June 2.—In Brandon Church confirmed twelve.

June 3.—In Grace, Cabin Point, confirmed two.

These two last churches, then in charge of Rev. E. W. Hubard, are now and have been for some time past vacant.

June 4 and 5.—Preached in Christ Church, Smithfield, and confirmed eight.

The Rev. F. A. Meade has since removed, leaving this church without a minister.

June 6.—Preached in the morning in St. John's, Nansemond county, and at night in St. Paul's, Suffolk, where one was confirmed.

June 7.—Preached in the Glebe Church, in the same county.

June 8.—Preached and confirmed four in the Church of Our Saviour, at Ivor, in Southampton county, the Rev. J. B. Craighill, who had been officiating regularly at this point, assisting in the services. This is our only church in Southampton. The building, a very neat frame one, was then in quite an unfinished state, but has since been nearly finished. The good people here have made an excellent beginning, and I do trust they will not rest satisfied a day until they have secured for themselves the regular ministrations of the gospel.

June 11.—Read prayers, baptized an infant, preached and confirmed three in Christ Church, Hicksford, which has long been without a Rector.

June 12.—In Calvary Church, Dinwiddie Courthouse, preached, confirmed two, and celebrated the Lord's Supper, and the next day performed the same services in Sapony Church, where two were confirmed. The Rev. R. H. Jones, Deacon, was then officiating in these churches, but they are now without a minister.

June 14.—Preached and celebrated the Lord's Supper in Trinity Church, Brunswick, assisted by Rev. E. B. Jones, Deacon.

June 15.—St. Luke's, Nottoway, baptized an infant, preached and confirmed two. This church is also without a pastor.

June 16.—Preached and confirmed six in St. John's, Lunenburg, and baptized a child of the Rector. The next day preached in St. Paul's, in the same county.

June 19.—Preached in a Grange Hall at Littleton, Sussex county, and confirmed four, presented by Rev. Dr. Gibson, who, in his untiring zeal, had been for some time officiating regularly at this point.

June 25.—In the Seminary Chapel, after morning prayer by Rev. Messrs. Meredith and Grammer, and sermon by Dr. Peterkin, admitted nine to Deacons' orders, Rev. Dr. Walker presenting the candidates.

June 27.—Confirmed one in St. Philip's colored church, Richmond.

July 2.—Preached in St. Thomas' Church, Madison Courthouse.

July 3.—Preached and celebrated the Lord's Supper in the same church.

July 4.—Preached morning and night in the Methodist Church, Gordonsville, and at the first service confirmed six, and celebrated the Lord's Supper. The Rev. F. G. Scott is Rector of these churches.

July 6.--Confirmed 9 (one colored) in St. James', Leesburg, and one in Belmont Chapel, in the same parish.

July 7.—Attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute in Alexandria.

July 8.—Accompanied and assisted by Rev. John McGill, I set out on a partial visitation of the counties of Prince William and Fairfax, preaching in the morning in St. James' Church, Brentsville, and at night in the Methodist Church at Manassas.

July 9.—Preached in the morning in St. John's, Centreville, and confirmed two, and in the afternoon, in Christ Church, Chantilly, and confirmed five.

July 10.—At St. Timothy's Mission, Herndon, preached and confirmed one. This mission was established and is carried on by an earnest and devoted layman, Mr. D. L. S. Johnson, who, in connection with his building for a day school, has fitted up a nice and convenient little chapel.

July 11.—Preached in the morning in Zion Church, Fairfax Courthouse, and in the afternoon in Falls Church, two being confirmed in the former.

July 12.—Preached and confirmed four in the grand and venerable Pohick Church, and at night in a hall at Clifton Sta-

tion, confirmed nine, gathered in and prepared by Mr. F. Stringfellow, a candidate for orders at our Seminary.

July 18.—Emmanuel, Culpeper, confirmed four.

July 23.—Christ, Albemarle, confirmed one.

July 24.—Preached and confirmed three in St. John's, Scottsville, a handsome building not completed at this time, but which I hope has been since.

July 25.—Preached in the morning in Emmanuel, and in the afternoon in Grace Church, Buckingham, and confirmed four in the former. These are also new churches, both in an unfinished state.

July 26.—Christ Church, Norwood, Nelson county, confirmed two.

July 27.—Preached in Trinity, Nelson.

July 28.—In Bethlehem, confirmed four.

August 1.—Preached in the morning in Little Fork Church, Culpeper, and at night in St. Stephen's, and confirmed six, one from St. James', Richmond.

August 4.—Preached in the morning in Trinity, Washington, and at night in the Methodist Church, Sperryville, Rappahannock county.

August 5.—In St. Paul's, Woodville, preached and confirmed three. Rev. Ed. W. Wroth, jr., had just taken charge of these churches.

August 7.—Preached in St. Paul's, Culpeper.

August 8.—In Christ Church, Culpeper, baptized a child of the Rector, preached and confirmed eight.

August 14 and 15.—Accompanied by Rev. Dr. Meredith, visited Moorefield, Hardy county, West Virginia, where I preached twice in the Courthouse, made an address after sermon by Dr. M., and confirmed five. Here I found a small but very earnest band of Episcopalians, who are carrying on quite a flourishing Sunday school, and are making an effort to erect a church. In this effort I trust they may be successful, and also in somehow procuring the regular services of a minister. Entirely cut off by mountains and long distances from all in-

tercourse with the members of their own church, they deserve the sympathy and assistance of their more favored brethren.

August 2.—In All Saint's, Monroe county, West Virginia, preached and confirmed two.

August 22.—Preached and confirmed eight in Christ Church, Warm Springs, four of whom were from Pocahontas county. These candidates were presented by Rev. Wm. Hoxton, who officiated, most acceptably, for three months during the summer for this congregation, which is without a minister.

August 25.—At Louisa Courthouse confirmed six, presented by Rev. A. S. Berkeley, who was laboring here as his feeble health would allow.

August 27.—Preached and confirmed six in the Grange Hall at Amelia Springs, Rev. Mr. Ellerby being the officiating minister.

August 28.—Preached in Guinea Church, and the next day in Grace, Ca Ira, Cumberland county.

August 30.—In a private house at Prospect Depot, Prince Edward county, after sermon by Rev. Dr. Gibson, made an address and confirmed three.

August 31.—Consecrated St. Paul's Church, Appomattox county, baptized three adults, preached and confirmed six, Dr. Gibson and Rev. Messrs. Ellerby and Cooke kindly assisting in the services. This, a plain but neat and comfortable log building, is our first church in Appomattox county. It has no rector, but lay services are regularly conducted, and God's blessing attends them. Would that many other communities would follow the example of this little band of our brethren.

September 1.—Consecrated the church of "The Good Shepherd," Campbell county, preached and confirmed four. The then Rector, Rev. G. W. Nelson, and Rev. Mr. Gibbons, assisted me in the services. On the afternoon of the same day preached in the Presbyterian Church, Castle Craig, and confirmed four.

September 2.—In St. John's, Liberty, preached and confirmed two.

September 3.—St. Mark's, Bedford, confirmed one.

September 5.—St. Mark's, Fincastle, confirmed six.

September 6.—Trinity, Buchanan, confirmed five.

September 7.—Was compelled by a railroad accident to miss an appointment in the morning at Blacksburg, but reached Central Depot, Montgomery county, in time for service at night, where twelve were confirmed. The Rev. M. H. Jackson was then laboring at these points, which are now without a minister.

September 8.—Preached and confirmed five in St. John's, Wytheville.

September 9.—Baptized a child in the same church, and at night and next morning read prayers and preached in Christ Church, Marion, where one was confirmed. Rev. Robb White had accepted a call to the Rectorship of these churches, but had not entered upon his duties.

September 11.—In St. Thomas, Abingdon, peached and confirmed three. Rev. Dr. Goodrich had just resigned the charge of this Church, which has since been vacant.

September 12.—Preached morning and night in Emmanuel, Goodson, which has been long without a pastor.

Later in the month of September I had appointments in the counties of Amherst, Campbell and Bedford, but sickness obliged me to recall them. I had not been well during the Summer, and now found myself broken down. Being positively enjoined by my physicians not to incur fatigue or excitement, I did but little during the remainder of the year out of my study. Four days of the month of November were spent in Philadelphia, at the Church Congress and the meetings of the Evangelical, Educational, and the American Church Missionary Societies. We in Virginia owe these Societies, for what they have done towards supporting many of our ministers and educating a number of our theological students, a debt which we can hardly hope ever to repay. And I wish I could induce every one of my dear brethren, clerical and lay, who regards the interest of our Church in this diocese as his Sav-

iour's interest, and therefore as identical with his own interest, to sustain and help them as God has given him the ability.

1876. January 15.—Preached in St. James', Ashland, and the next day preached morning and night in the same church, and confirmed seven.

January 30.—In Christ Church, Richmond, preached and confirmed nineteen.

February 6.—Preached morning and night in Emmanuel, Harrisonburg, and confirmed eight.

February 8.—In Emmanuel, Amherst county, preached and confirmed six.

February 9.—Grace, Campbell, confirmed two.

February 10.—Trinity, Campbell C. H., confirmed seven.

The three churches last mentioned were in charge of that most indefatigable brother, Rev. J. H. Williams, rector of Grace Memorial Church, Lynchburg.

February 13.—Officiated morning and night for the rector of Grace Church, Petersburg, who was absent endeavoring to increase the endowment fund of our Seminary.

February 20.—In St. John's Church, Richmond, preached and confirmed 42.

March 5.—Emmanuel, Hanover, preached and confirmed eight.

March 10.—Preached in St. Paul's, Hanover.

March 11.—Read prayers and preached in Trinity.

March 12.—In the morning read prayers, preached, confirmed five, and celebrated the Lord's Supper in Fork Church, and at night preached at the Hanover Academy. These last two churches are without a pastor.

March 19.—Trinity, Chesterfield, confirmed seven.

March 25.—Having appointments in Goochland, Fluvanna, and Cumberland counties, I drove thirty-five miles, most of the way through a pouring rain. The next morning, being prevented by high water from reaching St. Paul's Church, Goochland, service was held in a private house, and four per-

sons confirmed. My other appointments were necessarily abandoned.

April 2.—Preached in the morning in the Meade Memorial Church, Manchester, and at night in the Moore Memorial Chapel, Richmond, and confirmed twenty in the former and seven in the latter.

April 5.—In Trinity, Portsmouth, confirmed nine, and in St. John's fourteen.

April 6.—Confirmed thirty-nine in St. Paul's and forty-six in Christ Church, Norfolk, one of the latter being from St. Luke's. Hearing of the death of Bishop Johns, other appointments in Norfolk, Berkley, Hampton, Old Point and Princess Ann county, were recalled.

April 9.—Preached in the Seminary Chapel.

April 13.—St. Paul's, Petersburg, confirmed eighteen.

April 14, Good Friday.—Confirmed forty-five in Grace and six in St. Stephen's Church.

April 16, Easter Day.—Confirmed twenty-seven in St. James' Richmond.

April 19.—In the Monumental, confirmed nineteen.

April 23.—Old Church, Mecklenburg, confirmed two.

April 24.—St. James', Boydton, confirmed twenty-eight.

April 25.—St. Timothy's, Clarksville, confirmed three.

April 26.—St. Luke's, Mecklenburg, confirmed two.

In each of the three last mentioned churches, in charge of Rev. R. A. Goodwin, deacon, I preached and celebrated the Lord's Supper.

April 30.—In Grace Church, Richmond, confirmed twenty-one, and in St. Mark's, thirty-eight.

May 3.—St. Paul's Church, Richmond, confirmed twenty-six.

May 4.—St. Andrew's, Richmond, confirmed seventeen.

May 5.—Confirmed thirty-five in Trinity, Staunton. In this parish it was my pleasure to see the finest building, just completed, for lecture and Sunday School rooms in the diocese.

May 7.—Preached in the large, comfortable and handsome

lecture room of the new, but incomplete, Grace Church, Lexington, and confirmed fourteen white and one colored.

May 10.—In Elon Presbyterian Church, Amherst county, confirmed five.

May 11.—Consecrated St. Luke's Church, in the same county, preached, confirmed five and celebrated the Lord's Supper. Rev. Mr. Lawrence, minister in charge, and Rev. J. H. Williams assisted in the services.

May 12.—Confirmed seven in St. Mark's Church, New Glasgow, and nine in the Ascension Church, Amherst C. H. This last Church I found enlarged and greatly improved, chiefly through the agency of Rev. R. J. McBryde, whose work in Amherst cannot be too highly commended.

May 14.—Preached in the morning in Christ Church, Richmond, and confirmed fifteen; and at night in St John's, where twenty-two were confirmed.

For a particular account of our theological, literary and benevolent institutions, I must refer you to the reports of their respective officers. They will all be found, under the continued blessing of God, to be in a prosperous condition. The Seminary has been especially favored by a large addition to its endowment fund. Efforts are now making by brethren of the clergy and laity in Richmond to still further increase this fund by providing for a professorship, and it is hoped that no part of the diocese will suffer itself to be deprived of the privilege of aiding in the good work. Our late Bishop said in his last address to this Council: "The provision of a cemetery on the grounds of our Seminary is in contemplation. I trust the design will soon be carried into effect, and that the honored remains of our sainted brother (Bishop Payne) will repose

there." This design has been carried into effect, and his own honored remains will be the first to repose in the cemetery which has been provided.

I would earnestly commend our Education and Missionary Societies to the generous support of all the clergy and laity of the Diocese. God has most signally honored us by putting it into the hearts of a larger number of our young men than ever before to devote themselves to the ministry. We ought to manifest our gratitude for his so great mercy by liberal contributions to the society to which most of these young men look for their education. There never was a time when our beloved church was had in more favor by all the people than at present. Appeals are constantly made to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, from all quarters, to supply our ministrations of the gospel to those who have them not. Were the committee only entrusted with ten thousand dollars each year (which might easily be, if every minister would do his part), they might accomplish great things for the glory of God and the salvation of our fellow men.

The two societies which I have mentioned, and our Brother-hood, are now all incorporated institutions, capable, under the laws of the State, of holding any property which may be given them, by will or otherwise.

The treasurer will report the condition of the Bruce Fund. The vacancy in the Board of Managers, which was made by the death of Bishop Johns, has been filled by the election of Rev. J. Peterkin, D. D.

# RESOLUTIONS OF THE CONVOCATION OF WEST VIRGINIA.

At the twentieth regular session of the Convocation of West Virginia, held in Christ Church, Wellsburg, commencing Wednesday, April 19th, 1876, after a full and free discussion the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, 1. That in the judgment of this Convocation the interests of the church in our State clearly demand a division of the Diocese of Virginia.

II. That while we would all prefer a Diocesan organization, yet rather than the division should fail, we ask that West Virginia, or such a part thereof as may be designated by the Council of Virginia, be set apart as a missionary jurisdiction.

III. That we respectfully petition the Bishop and the ensuing Council to take the necessary action in the premises.

IV. That in expressing our views as above of the necessity of a division of the Diocese of Virginia, we would have it distinctly understood that we continue to cherish toward our Bishop the same loyal affection and high esteem for his zeal and fidelity which we have always felt. And also that for our beloved and much lamented Bishop, recently deceased, we have the most affectionate remembrance and highest veneration.

It does not appear from the above who were represented in the Convocation. I should be sorry to see any of our brethren cut off from us against their will. But if it shall be made to appear that the ministers and people of Trans-Alleghany West Virginia desire their territory to be erected into a separate diocese or missionary district, I trust the Council will do whatever may be necessary to accomplish their wishes.

The trouble with regard to our Church in West Virginia is not the want of Episcopal supervision. That portion of the diocese, as compared with some other portions, has received more than its share of the services of our late Bishop and his assistant. What is needed is settled ministers and money to support them. These are not to be had in West Virginia, and it is simply impossible for Virginia to supply them. There is no more reason why our Diocesan Missionary Society should be expected, unsided, to build up the Church in that, than in any other adjoining, but separate and independent State It belongs to the Board of Missions of the whole Church to do this work in West Virginia, as well as in Colorado or Utah, and more than in Northern California and Northern and West-To the Board of Missions, therefore, in my judgern Texas. ment, it ought to be transferred. I commend this subject, of so much importance to the growth of our Church on both

sides of the mountains, to the serious consideration of the Council.

And now, my dear brethren, commending myself to your sympathy and your prayers, and you to the blessing of our Heavenly Father, I pray that His Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule our hearts, that all our consultations being begun, continued and ended in Him, we may glorify His holy name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

We beg, therefore, in common with the whole Church, to offer this our tribute to the memory of a "Father in Israel," and pray that a double portion of his Spirit may descend upon his successor, and that we, in common with those who have gone before, "may have our perfect consummation and bliss, both in body and soul in the eternal and everlasting glory" of the Church triumphant.

The reports of the Professors, which are annexed, will furnish information as to the instruction given in the several departments. It is gratifying to state that the Examining Chaplains report a decided improvement on former years. By the blessing of God the financial condition of the Seminary is so improved, through the liberal benefactions of its friends, that the trustees will be enabled to consider measures of enlarged usefulness.

The High School overflows with prosperity, and deserves all the encouragement it receives.

The Professor of Church History would report, that during the session he has pursued the usual course of study with the classes in the Seminary. The Seniors, with four recitations per week and an exercise in Homiletics, have studied Sport's History of the Church of England, the Constitution and General Canons and those of the Diocese of Virginia, also a course of questions with references in Liturgics. The remainder of the session will be occupied with Pastoral Theology. The Middle Class, meeting three times a week, has studied and is reviewing Kurtz' Church History; this being accompanied by written essays. The Junior Class has studied and reviewed Kurtz' Sacred History; and has read the Acts of the Apostles in the original, as introductory to Church History. Judging from the results, the studies appear to have been pursued with diligence, and the proficiency of the classes will compare very favorably with that of any of previous sessions.

I have no instance to report of students' being absent, without permission, from recitation.

# To the Board of Trustees of the

Theological Seminary of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Professor of Apologetics respectfully reports:

That during the Seminary year, now drawing to a close, he has regularly met the several classes for instruction in the departments assigned to him, viz: Apologetics, Systematic Divinity and Ecclesiastical Polity.

He has given instruction in the form of written and oral lectures:—
To the Junior Class in Apologetics on three days in each week—Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday; to the Middle Class in Systematic Divinity on four days in each week—Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday; and to the Senior Class in Systematic Divinity and Ecclesiastical Polity on three days in each week, viz: Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The attendance of the students in the class-room has been regular and punctual, no unexcused absences being on record against them, and I have to commend their diligence in study, and the general propriety of their deportment.

Theological Seminary, Virginia, May 16, 1876.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

My report this year is similar to the one submitted last year.

The Junior Class, with which I have five recitations a week, has studied the Hebrew Grammar with written exercises, and the Bible. They have read fourteen chapters in Genesis, and three in other books, frequently reviewing what they have been over.

In the Greek Testament they will have finished in a few days the critical and exegetical study of the Gospel of John. I think it of great importance that the study of the gospel should not be given up, and the Gospel of John is best adapted to the purpose. They have read three times a week exegetical essays on the most difficult subjects in all the gospels.

The Middle Class, which I meet three times a week, have studied in the Hebrew the Prophecies of Christ, and 20 Psalms. In Greek they have studied with great care the Epistle to the Romans, Hebrews and Galatians.

The Senior Class have continued the study of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures, reading in Hebrew most of the last part of Isaiah, from the 40th to the 66th chapter; and in Greek the Epistle to the Corinthians. I might add that I have delivered ten lectures on the Minor Prophets on Sunday nights.

Rt. Rev. and Dear Sir:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School, I have the honor to submit the following report:

Though two more boys only than in 1874-75 have, during the present session been entered, the aggregate number (seventy-seven) as well as the maximum attendance (seventy-five) was never since the war so large.

\* \* \* Twelve clergymen's sons have been received. \* \* \*

The religious services and exercises of the school, including an additional week night service during Lent, conducted by myself, have been substantially as before. On the principal holy days school duties are suspended and divine service is attended at the Theological Seminary; the minor festivals are, without suspension, suitably observed in our own chapel. During Passion Week, a brief instruction, appropriate to the season, always follows morning prayers. This year appropriate extracts from Farrar's Life of Christ were read. The devotional meeting in the school chapel, so long customary on one night in the week, has been maintained this year with spirit and encouraging results; and \* \* coccasional special services have been held during the session by the late and present rector of Christ Church, Alexandria, and by the Professor of Ecclesiastical History, in the Seminary.

The number of communicants among the boys, if we may include nine awaiting confirmation at the hands of the Bishop next week, is thirty-nine.

#### Division of the Diocese.

At a meeting of clerical and lay delegates from that portion of the Diocese of Virginia lying south of the James river, held on the 17th of May, 1876, in the city of Alexandria, a committee was appointed, for and on behalf of the members present at such meeting, to prepare and present to the Bishop and Council of said Diocese, now sitting, a petition asking their consent to the erection of a new Diocese within their territorial limits, to be composed of the parishes and congregations within the counties herein afterwards named.

In accordance with the instructions thus given it by said meeting, that committee has prepared and respectfully submits the following petition:

To the Bishop and Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Believing that the welfare and future development of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia imperatively demands a division of its geographical limits into two or more Diocesan organizations, the committee appointed by a meeting of clerical and lay delegates to the present Council from that portion of your Diocese lying south of the James river, for and on behalf of said meeting, respectfully prays that you will consent to the erection of a new Diocese to be composed of the parishes and congregations lying and being in the following counties now under their jurisdiction, to wit: Princess Anne, Norfolk, Nansemond, Isle of Wight, Southampton, Surry, Sussex, Greensville, Prince George, Dinwiddie, Brunswick, Chesterfield, Powhatan, Amelia, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Cumberland, Buckingham, Prince Edward, Appomattox, Nottoway, Charlotte, Halifax, Campbell, Pittsylvania, Bedford, Henry, Patrick, Franklin, Roanoke, Botetourt, Rockbridge, Montgomery, Giles, Wythe, Grayson, Washington, Alleghany, Bath, Tazwell, Russell, Scott, Smythe, Lee and Wise.

A Diocese, formed within these limits, will fulfil every requirement of the constitution of the church, as it will be able to provide a suitable provision for the support of its Bishop, and will contain greatly more than the requisite number of parishes and presbyters; nor by its erection will the present Diocese be so reduced as either to injure its

Resolved, Also, that this Council hereby gratefully acknowledges the valuable and most timely aid extended to the Diocese of Virginia for a number of years past, by the Evangelical Education Society, in the preparation of her candidates for orders.

Resolved, That fully approving the purposes and principles of the Evangelical Societies of the Church, and in proper recognition of their peculiar claims upon this Diocese, this Council heartily commends them to the confidence and support of our clergy and congregations.

# Adopted.

Judge Sheffey offered the following, which was seconded by the Rev. W. Q. Hullihen, and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the next session of the Council be held in Trinity Church, Staunton.

Judge Sheffey presented the following report from the Board of Directors of the Virginia Female Institute:

At a meeting of the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute, held on the 18th of May, 1876, a report of the Board of Directors was re-

ceived and ordered to be entered in the Minutes; and it was further ordered that the same be laid before the Council. Said report is as follows:

To the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute:

The Board of Directors of the Virginia Female Institute beg leave to submit the following report of the condition and progress of the Institute, in order that the same may be laid before the Council of the Diocese, as required by the order of the Trustees made on the 7th day of July, 1875.

The Board herewith return the report made by the Rev. R. H. Phillips, Principal, upon the condition and progress of the Institute as an educational Institution. In addition to what the Principal has reported on this subject, the Board of Directors feel justified in saying that, in their opinion, in no Institution of the kind is there a higher tone of refined culture, more genial and happy domestic influences, more encouragement given to the development of the religious emotion, and that under its present management the aim of the officers of the Institute seems to be not merely the training of the minds of the pupils in useful knowledge, and the conferring upon them of those accomplishments appropriate to their respective position in life, but in an eminent degree to develop in them, in full beauty and symmetry, the attractive attributes of true womanhood. And the Board of Directors trust that the trustees may succeed in enlisting the cordial interest of the Diocese in this important Church School, and in securing for it the means of permanent prosperity and usefulness.

The Board of Directors also return herewith a statement of the account between the Institute and the Rev. R. H. Phillips, showing that on the 1st day of September, 1876, the balance in favor of Mr. Phillips will be \$980.58. This is the only debt due from the Institute. The income for the next year will be \$1,560.28; so that making reasonable allowance for necessary repairs and improvements, the entire debt to Mr. Phillips will be extinguished on the 1st day of September, 1877; and the trustees may, in view of this event, make such new contracts or arrangements for the conduct and management of the Institute as their wisdom may dictate, and the means at their command may enable them to carry into effect. As required by the resolution of the Trustees, at their last meeting, the Board have caused the buildings to be insured to

### Virginia Female Institute.

the amount of \$10,000, in addition to the amount of the former policy, which was for \$8,000.

The property is very valuable, consisting of four acres of land in the city of Staunton, and extensive and costly improvements thereon. The grounds are elevated, well kept, and arranged with due regard to beauty and healthfulness. In the present depressed condition of money affairs it would be difficult to estimate its saleable value. Indeed, in view of the purpose to which it is dedicated, and for which it must be used, it is sufficient to say that no Diocese in the church in this country owns a property more valuable than this upon which to build up and foster a first class school for the intellectual, moral and religious training of the daughters of the church.

By the act of the General Assembly, passed on the 14th day of March, 1874, the power of absolute control over the Institute, its property and management, is vested in fifteen trustees, vacancies in whose ranks can only be filled by selection to be made by the Board of Trustees from lists of nominees made by the Council itself. The Institute, therefore, is for all practical and legal purposes under the control of the Council, and in the course of time it will be governed exclusively by its appointees. The only restriction upon the power of the trustees under the act of Assembly is that the property cannot be diverted from educational purpose. It is true, that there are scattered abroad over several States, a few living persons, and the unascertained and almost undiscoverable representatives of other persons, who are dead, in whom are vested claims, now wholly unavailable for any practicable purposes, to some shares of the original stock subscribed to found the Institute.

Originally these subscriptions were intended as gifts to the cause of education. The act referred to secures absolutely the carrying out of their beneficent purpose; and the Diocese having acquired by its own means, the majority of the stock, the said act of Assembly gives legal effect to the moral understanding arising out of the Constitution by the Diocese, and vests absolutely in Trustees as the executive, and in the Council, as the appointing power the entire control of the Institute, whilst at the same time its corporate functions are all preserved. The enlarged liberality of the General Assembly of Virginia in passing the act referred to, cannot be too gratefully acknowledged; and it would seem to be the duty of the friends of female education and of churchmen in the Diocese, without minute criticism upon possible flaws of title, as

if we were about to put the property upon the market, to accept the great practical fact, that the franchise and property of the Virginia Female Institute belong to the Diocese of Virginia, upon the sole sacred trust that they shall be dedicated to the cause of Female education forever.

# Mr. R. T. Craighill offered the following:

Whereas, That eminent constitutional lawyer and divine (Rev. Dr. Hawks) has placed on record in various places, from page four to ten of his work on the Canons, the following important statements in respect to the formation of our present Ecclesiastical Union.

- a. That "the testimony would seem to leave no doubt that in each State the Church considered itself an integral part of the Church of Christ, perfectly independent in its government of any and every branch of the Church in Christendom;" and also that "the facts show the sense of independence entertained by the churches in the several States."
- b. That Connecticut "furnished one of the plainest proofs of the general sense of Episcopalians, as to the independent character of the churches in the several States."
- c. That "Virginia asserted the entire independence of the Church within her limits of all control except her own."
- d. That "the experience of our civil history shows that few points are more difficult of adjustment than the respective rights and powers of the State and General Government,"
  - e. That in the Church "what is desirable, is on the one hand to promote such a

union as is compatible with Diocesan independence; and on the other so to uphold the just rights of the latter as to prevent their merger in the former."

f. That in a supposed possible case "such fearful consolidation of ecclesiastical power" might take place, that "Dioceses which once had rights, and which came into the union because these rights were preserved to them under the Constitution as it stood, may find themselves so shorn and stripped of every vestige of former privileges, that Diocesan Episcopacy may become but little more than an empty name;" and

Whereas, The minds of many of our people have become anxious and unsettled as to the relations which the Church in Virginia sustains to extra-Diocesan authority; and

Whereas, it is matter of exceeding importance to all law-abiding men, whether in Church or State, that they should have clear and authoritative information as to the obligations by which they are bound, and the laws to which they are amenable; and whereas it is affirmed that at the time of Virginia's entering into the compact of union with the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States, the following powers were surrendered:

- 1. Such an exercise of independency as would permit them to withdraw from the union at their own pleasure, and without the assent of the other Dioceses.
- They surrendered the right of having the Bishop, whom they might elect, consecrated without the assent of the church at large.
- 3. They surrendered the right of sole and unrestricted legislation for themselves in the Diocese alone, but consented that part of their laws should be made in a general legislature of which they were members.
- 4. They surrendered the right of framing their own liturgy, and agreed through all the Dioceses to use the same when all should have ratified it.
- They surrendered the right of making separately any alteration in the great compact or charter of union.

Resolved, 1st, That a committee be appointed to give the whole subject a thorough examination, the committee to consist of two clerical and two lay delegates, to enquire into the origin and limitations of the Federal power, as they affect this Diocese; to enquire to what extent and in what way (if at all) the church in this Diocese has parted with her original right of self-government, and how far she is to be governed by the acts and opinions of other ecclesiastical bodies, whether Anglican or American, whether of modern or of former times.

Resolved, That the said committee report at the next regular meeting of the Council.

The Rev. Dr. Packard, from the committee on so much of the Bishop's address as relates to the death of Bishop Johns, presented the following report, which was unanimously approved:

The committee to which was referred so much of the Bishop's Ad-

dress as referred to the death of our beloved Bishop Johns, submit the following report:

That this Council feels deeply the loss we have sustained by his death, and heartily respond to all the Bishop has said in his address on the subject as expressive of our own feelings.

That we give most hearty thanks to the Great Head of the Church that he spared him to bless this Diocese for a third of a century with his wise and faithful and loving administration of its affairs.

That we personally shall never cease to remember with affection his intercourse with us.

That to preserve the memory of our beloved father in God, and as the most fitting and lasting memorial of his long and faithful services, we earnestly recommend to the members of the church in this Diocese to use their utmost efforts to endow five scholarships of \$5,000 each, to be called the Johns scholarships.

The Rev. Dr. Minnigerode, from the committee on the increase of the Endowment Fund of the Theological Seminary, presented the following report:

The committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's report which referred to an increased endowment of the Theological Seminary as a memorial of Bishop Johns on the part of Virginia, having considered the subject carefully and upon full consultation with the best friends of the Seminary, and those most familiar with its wants, respectfully report the following result:

- 1. Resolved, That this Council, representing the Church of Virginia, deem it their duty and privilege to show their love and veneration for their departed Bishop, by connecting their memorial with that Institution for which he had labored so faithfully, and which was the last subject which engaged his attention and care as the Bishop of the Diocese, viz: the Theological Seminary.
- 2. Resolved, That the Council, in grateful acknowledgment of the liberality which has completed the endowment, feel it obligatory upon them to follow up the help thus extended to our Diocese and its great Seminary by making the increased advantage of the Seminary accessible to a large number of recipients, by calling upon all the parishes in Virginia, as a memorial of our beloved departed Bishop, to endow five scholarships at \$5,000 each, to be called the Johns scholarships of the Seminary, and employed for the benefit of needy candidates at the discretion of the proper authorities.
  - 3. Resolved, That the Council deem it absolutely necessary that this proposed

endowment should be raised at once, a proper circular setting forth the object and requesting contributions in money or pledges being sent to all Rectors, to be acted on at once by their parishes, and returned to by the first of July (or the commencement at the Seminary).

- 4. Resolved, That a circular be accompanied by a printed form of a pledge, running from one to five years, at the option of the donor, payable in stated instalments, and bearing six per cent, interest until paid.
- 5. Resolved, That a committee be appointed by the Bishop to carry out the provisions of this report,

The report was approved, and the following committee appointed:

Rev. Dr. Minnigerode, Rev. Dr. Hanckel, Rev. Dr. Gibson, Mr. Cassius F. Lee, Mr. Thomas Potts, Mr. R. T. Craighill.

## Rev. Dr. Norton presented the following:

Whereas, It is most desirable and important that the Education Society of this Diocese shall receive a larger and more systematic support; and, whereas, experience has shown that the former practice of taking up annual collections, and the formation of auxiliary societies accomplished this object most effectually, therefore,

Resolved, That the rectors and ministers of the churches in this Diocese are earnestly requested to cause such an offering or collection to be made in their respective churches, on the second Sunday in June in each year, or as soon after as may be practicable, in aid of the funds of the Education Society.

Resolved, That it is also earnestly recommended to form auxiliary societies in each Parish.

## Adopted.

## Mr. B. Johnson Barbour presented the following:

Resolved, That, if agreeable to the family of our deceased Bishop, the committee charged with the erection of a monument to the late Bishop Johns, be and is hereby instructed to apply through the rectors of the various Parishes to the laymen of the Diocese, to secure additional funds, up to the amount of \$3000, for the carrying out of that purpose.

amine the account of the treasurer of the disabled clergy fund, reported the same to be correct.

Sundry resolutions were introduced having reference to the election of an Assistant Bishop, pending the consideration of which, the Council adjourned to 5 o'clock P. M.

5 O'CLOCK P. M.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Mr. John Stewart presented the following report of the Finance Committee, which was approved:

The committee to whom was referred the accounts of the Treasurer of the Council, beg leave to report: That they have examined his accounts, and find that they have been properly kept and sustained by satisfactory vouchers; showing a balance remaining in his hands, on 9th May, 1876, of \$1,030.55.

In this connection, it is proper to state, is included the sum of \$320.41, which our faithful Treasurer has secured for the fund by placing at interest any balance in his hands.

Your committee recommend the same appropriations for the current year which were paid in the preceding one; which, of course, includes the salary of the Secretary and payment to the assistant Secretary.

Up to the time of writing this report, the Treasurer informs us that his receipts at this Council are about \$8,500.

Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., presented the report of the Board of Managers of the fund for widows and orphans:

The Board of managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia, respectfully present their annual report:

According to the statements of our Treasurer, which are herewith submitted to be printed in the Journal, the fund has increased during

the past year \$986.01, being now \$22,674.19. He gives us also the pleasing intelligence that a legacy of \$1,000 has been left to the Board by the widow of the late Rev. Malcolm Macfarland, of Baltimore; which is payable next November. The amount of our income since May, 1875 is \$1,442.13; out of which \$1,410 has been appropriated by the Board to the relief of eleven families, the number of our beneficiaries being very sensibly on the increase. We had hoped that the appeal to the Parishes through a circular sent them in January last, by our Treasurer, would have procured us a large increase of our income, and thus have enabled the Board to meet with liberality the increasing demand. The effort was not indeed without its effect, for the number of contributing Parishes have increased this year from eleven to fifteen, and the amount contributed from \$142.50 to \$292.45. But the number of our suffering families has increased also, and the Board have consequently been constrained to diminish, in many cases, the amount formerly appropriated.

We hope the contributions from the Parishes, next year, will enable the Board to enlarge their benefactions, and render more effectual the relief which our fund is annually dispensing.

The receipts for the year ending May, 1873 (before the panic), were \$6,254; and during a few years prior to that they had been between \$5,000 and \$6,000, \$5,500 being considered to be about the sum needed. to conduct the operations of the Society. But after the eventful period referred to, a steady diminution in our receipts commenced, and has continued as just shown. This diminution, however, is no more than might have been looked for, seeing that every benevolent agency in the land unavoidably suffered in such a crisis. This necessitated great caution on the part of the committee in making appropriations, as they were in a constant state of uncertainty as to what amount of receipts could be counted upon. Before each quarter, and especially the October, January and April quarters, the Treasurer felt much uneasiness. lest he should be unable to send the Missionaries their needed quotas, in which anxiety the whole committee feelingly shared; but each time, we are thankful to say, the Rector and other friends of the Society responded to the earnest appeals that were made, and we have met our obligations. It is true a few hundred dollars were borrowed last fall to meet a temporary exigency, but the money was soon returned.

It perhaps should be mentioned that notwithstanding the unfavorable financial condition of the country our receipts would doubtless have been greater had it not been for two causes:—1. That the late Bishop of the Diocese, who had been in the habit for many years of collecting for this Society at his visitation, was not able to make as many visits as usual during the year; and 2. That it so happened that some of the largest and most regular contributors have been so pressed with churchwork, within the bounds of their own parishes, that they have been unable to contribute with their accustomed liberality.

Upon the whole, it is hoped that the past will prove to have been an exceptional year as regards the smallness of receipts and the consequent inability to make but a few new appropriations.

## THE NUMBER OF MISSIONARIES AND THEIR FIELDS OF LABOR.

During the past year there have been on the books of the Society the names of twenty-five clergymen, laboring as missionaries in different parts of the Diocese. The committee regret to have to say that there are now on file in the Secretary's hands applications for aid from different parts of the Diocese which they could not grant, as it would have been simply rash on their part and unkind to the applicants to make

pledges which they could have no sufficient assurance of being able to make good. But for this other missionaries and missionary stations might be reported.

Some of these clergymen are laboring in the comparatively new fields in the more central and western portions of the Diocese, and others in the fields where the church was first established a century or two ago, but where, from various causes, it has been threatened with decay or even extinction. The effort is being made by the ministers at these points to rekindle the fires upon the altars of these venerable, but, in some instances, almost deserted sanctuaries—venerable with age and dear to the church in Virginia because of their hallowed associations. Interesting reports from some of these have been published during the past year in "The Diocesan Messenger," and copies sent to every Rector in the Diocese.

#### DIFFUSION OF MISSIONARY INTELLIGENCE.

The hope has been cherished that by diffusing information in relation to the parishes needing the aid of the Society, and also of the missionary needs of the Diocese in general, increased interest would be excited and manifested in the welfare of the Society. It has been attempted to do this through statements by the agent in person, by means of occasional publications in the Southern Churchman, and especially a small paper called the "Diocesan Messenger."

Other means have been suggested, one of which is to issue a map of the Diocese, showing those portions which were supplied with missionary services and those that were destitute. Diligent inquiry however revealed the fact that the expense would be too great, while so far as could be learned, from those who had employed similar means, the results were not so encouraging as were expected.

We trust that the information which has been given has not been without good effect, and that it is only because of the unprecedented financial pressure, and the other causes above alluded to, that the interest has not shown itself in increased contributions.

Copies of the Mission Prayer Book have been furnished on application to those points where they were needed, and to which they were especially adapted.

### CONTRIBUTIONS.

The list of churches published in the last Journal numbers 202. Of

these about 110, or a little more than half, appear to have contributed to the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia during the year ending May, 1876.

The Council in 1869 recommended that fifty cents be the annual contribution from each communicant of the church. An examination of the receipts on the Treasurer's books-shows that only a few churches have complied with this, most of them falling considerably under this sum, while a few have given over that amount.

#### CLAIMS OF THE SOCIETY UPON THE DIOCESE.

When it is remembered that this Society is in effect a Church-extension Society, which, if properly sustained, has the power to exten I and spread the church through the Diocese, and that churches now strong and flourishing came into existence through the fostering aid given in their infancy by this Society, without which, humanly speaking, they could not have come into existence at all, and that therefore this Society may be said to have given these churches in perpetuo to the Diocese. And when it is also borne in mind that this Society is in like manner a Church-reclaiming or church-restoring Society, which, as far as it has the power, sends ministers to the help of old churches which may be threatened with decay, or possibly extinction, seeking to keep them alive with the hope of complete restoration; and when it is also remembered that this Society if sustained has the power to keep our ministers from leaving the Diocese to obtain a support, as unhappily has been the case, and that therefore it has some of the claims that are urged with so much force in favor of the "Brotherhood," the reasons for classing it among the very first objects entitled to our help will appear to all. As we love our Diocese, and desire its growth and prosperity, it is not easy to see how any agency is more directly promotive of both than the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia.

## BY ORDER OF THE COMMITTEE.

Upon motion of Rev. Dr. Sprigg, the Executive Committee D. M. S. was reëlected, with the addition of Rev. A. W. Weddell, of Richmond.

The Council then proceeded to consider the resolutions referring to the election of an assistant Bishop.

## Episcopal Fund.

Mr. P. C. Warwick moved to lay the whole subject upon the table.

A vote was called by yeas and nays and by orders, and resulted as follows: Clergy—Ayes 47, nays 40. Lay—Ayes 41, nays 47.

So the motion to lay upon the table was lost.

The Rev. Kinloch Nelson moved to refer the resolutions to a committee of five, to report to-morrow at 9:30 A. M., after consultation with the Bishop.

From Christ Church, at Brandy Station and St. Paul's Church, near Raccoon Ford, both in Culpeper county, the whole of which county has heretofore been known as St. Mark's Parish, a petition to this Council to set off and recognize a new Parish in said county, to be known as Ridley Parish, with the following boundaries, to wit:

Beginning at Jamieson's mill on Muddy run, and running thence down the said run to its mouth; thence down the Hazel run to its junction with the Rappahannock; thence down the Rappahannock to the mouth of the Rapidan river: thence up the Rapidan river to the mouth of the Robertson river; thence up the Robertson river to the mouth of the Crooked river; thence up Crooked river to Wayland's mill; thence by an air line to the point of Mount Pony, southeast of Culpeper; thence by a straight line to the beginning, and embracing about one-half of territorial area of the said county.

Your committee recommend that said petition be granted.

2. From Morgantown West Virginia an application for admission as a Parish, said Parish to be composed of Morgan, Grant and Union districts, in the county of Monongalia, to be called Trinity Parish.

Your committee recommend the admission of this Parish.

#### New Parishes.

3. From Amherst county a petition to be divided from Lexington Parish, of which it now forms a part, and to be formed into a separate Parish, taking the name of Amherst Parish with the following boundaries, to wit: Those boundaries known as belonging to Pedlar township, and all that part of Elon township that lies to the west of the Virginia Midland railroad; or, in other words, the northern boundary of the Elon section of the Parish will be the Lynchburg road from Ware's Gap across to Cool Well; the eastern boundary the Virginia and Midland railroad; the southern boundary the James river; the western boundary the Tobacco Row mountains to Ware's Gap.

The boundaries of Pedlar will be the Biue Ridge mountains on the west, the James river on the south, the Tobacco Row mountains on the east, and the road from Amherst Courthouse to Lexington on the north.

Your committee recommend that this petition be granted.

4. From Hardy county, West Virginia, a petition to separate from Augusta Parish, and to establish a new Parish, having for its lines of division the boundary lines of Hardy county, under the title of Emmanuel Parish, Hardy county, West Virginia.

Your committee recommend the granting of this petition.

5. From Ivor, Nottoway Parish, Southampton county, a petition to be admitted as a distinct church, and to be called by the name of the Church of Our Saviour, with all the rights and privileges of other churches and congregations in this Diocese.

Your committee being of opinion from the facts set forth in the petition of the committee of the members of a church in Nottoway Parish, county of Southampton, that the said Parish hath a right to proceed to the election of a Vestry, the calling of a Rector, and do all that their petition contemplates, deems it unnecessary that this Council take any action on the said petition.

Rev. E. Withers, from the committee appointed to examine the accounts of the Treasurer of the Bruce Fund, presented the following report:

The committee appointed to examine the accounts of the Treasurer of the Bruce Fund, respectfully report that they have examined the same, and find them correct, and supported by proper vouchurs.

With reference to the appropriation of one hundred dollars to the

Church of the Good Shepherd, in Campbell county, they will state, that, while the voucher is in hand, and in proper form, it is not accompanied with any order from the Secretary of the Bruce fund, for the payment of the same. We are informed by the Bishop that such order was given by Bishop Johns, but by some inadvertence it fails to accompany the voucher.

# Rev. R. H. Mason presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Council it is advisable that at each Council of this Diocese one sitting of the body be devoted to the consideration of Diocesan Missions and to the hearing of the reports of individual missionaries.

## Carried.

#### Assistant Bishop.

Judge Sheffey, from the committee to whom was referred resolutions referring to the election of an assistant Bishop, made the following report:

The committee to whom were referred certain resolutions pending before the Council in respect to the election of an Assistant Bishop, with instructions to confer with the Bishop on the subject, have discharged the duty assigned to them, and respectfully report: That in a full and frank interview with the Bishop, and in response to inquiries propounded to him by the committee, the Bishop repeated substantially the statement made by himself to the Council, to the effect that he was not conscious of any such infirmity or defect of health as would justify him in requesting the appointment of an Assistant Bishop at this time; but he said, that if the Council were satisfied by other evidence that there was sufficient cause for such action, and that the interests of the Diocese required it, and should thereupon proceed to elect an Assistant Bishop, this course would be entirely agreeable to him. He was, however, of opinion that it would be better that he should make the experiment of undertaking the discharge of his full Episcopal duties without assistance for the present; and that he hoped that with his appointments systematically arranged by himself, and with the considerate and kindly cooperation of the clergy in carrying out the plan of labor which he would make out, it might be found that even an increase of work might not prove burdensome and exhausting. He, however, assured the committee that if after a fair and prudent trial it should be found, in the opinion of the Standing Committee and other judicious advisers whom he would consult and to whose judgment he would defer, that the interests of the Church in this Diocese required that he should be aided in the discharge of his Episcopal duties, he would take such action as would bring the subject before a special session of the Council for its consideration and wise determination.

Your committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That the consideration of the proposition to elect an Assistant Bishop be for the present postponed, in accordance with the suggestions of the Bishop.

Resolved, 2. That with affectionate sympathy with our beloved Bishop, now that "the care of all the Churches" of this large Diocese rests upon him, and with fervent prayers to the Great Head of the Church, that abundant health may be vouchsafed to him, and that, with the increase of his duties, increase of grace and strength may be

granted unto him, this Council doth declare, that it stands ready, whenever the necessity may arise, to elect an assistant to share with him the burdens and responsibilities of the Episcopal office in this Diocese.

Resolved, 3. That the Council earnestly requests the clergy to exercise considerate forbearance in their calls upon the Bishop for special visitations; and that they render him all needful assistance in executing such plan of systematic services as he may devise.

Judge Sheffey, from the committee to whom was referred the subject of West Virginia, presented the following report:

The committee to whom was referred so much of the Bishop's Address as has reference to the formation of a new diocese in West Virginia, and, if that cannot be accomplished, the creation of a missionary jurisdiction of that portion of the Diocese; the memorial of the Convocation of West Virginia, asking for the organization of a new diocese within the limits of West Virginia, or such portions thereof as the Council may designate; and the memorial of the Convocation of the Valley, embracing the parishes and congregations within the limits of Jefferson and Berkeley, in West Virginia, protesting against any line of division which would separate them from the Diocese of Virginia, and indicating the Alleghany mountains as a proper line for the new diocese, should one be organized; have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to report: That feeling deeply the need of increased episcopal services in the portion of the diocese referred to; but, having before them no satisfactory or sufficient data or facts to base a definite report upon, and deeming it proper that opportunity should be afforded to procure and lay before the Council due information on the subject; and that the same should be procured under proper authority: It is therefore--

Resolved, That the Bishop be and is hereby respectfully requested to call a conference of the clergy and laity of the Parishes and congregations within the limits of West Virginia; and that he request such conference to furnish for the information of

the Council at its next session, such facts as will enable the Council to act understandingly on the subject.

Resolved, 2. That the matters referred to this committee be postponed for consideration at the next Council.

Amend the 1st resolution by striking out the word "all," and adding at the close of the words "West Virginia," the words "exclusive of the Parishes in the counties of Jefferson and Berkeley."

Mr. A. L. Carter moved to lay the whole subject upon the table.

## Lost.

The amendment proposed by Rev. Mr. Grammer was lost, and the report as offered by the committee was approved.

Gen. F. H. Smith, from the special committee upon the subject of intemperance, presented the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the resolution adopted by the Council on the subject of intemperance beg leave to present the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That the Bishop be respectfully requested to address a pastoral letter to the Diocese on the subject of intemperance, said pastoral to be read from the pulpit by the respective Rectors in every Parish.

Resolved, 2. That the clergy be recommended to present to their congregations such a wise, judicious and scriptural view of the subject of intemperance as shall most effectually bring the influence of the pulpit to bear upon this great and alarming evil.

Resolved, 3. That we urge the use of such agencies as may develope among the laity a more healthy sentiment on this subject.

Resolved, 4. That the laity be earnestly exhorted to consider the evil tendencies to themselves of social drinking, especially in public places, and the consequences resulting to others from the influence of their example.

## Rev. C. J. Gibson D. D., offered the following:

Resolved, That if the Bishop of the Diocese should feel it his duty to call a

meeting of the Council before its next annual meeting, the committee to whom was referred the subjects of the division of the Diocese and of the election of an assistant Bishop have liberty to report to such Council.

Rev. Dr. Walker, from the committee on the state of the church, presented the following report:

The general condition of the Diocese has continued very much the same as indicated in the report of the last session. To some few changes and features of special interest, with inferences of which they are naturally suggestive, the committee would ask your attention.

One of these has already been brought before the Council—our peculiar bereavement as a Diocese since our last meeting. We not only miss from his presiding seat the late chief officer of this body, but from its floor the forms and voices of more than one beloved brother, with whom in time past we have enjoyed communion. Rarely if ever has it been the lot of this, or of any other Diocese, in the course of twelve months to lose so many of such men as John Johns, Charles Andrews, Tazewell Taylor, William Meredith and Charles Ambler. We would thank God upon every remembrance of these our departed brethren; and as we think of the blessed communion enjoyed with them in the church militant here on earth, we would look forward to that more blessed and perfect communion in the church triumphant above, into which they have already entered. Suggested by this topic, and having a very peculiar connection with the permanent welfare of the Diocese, is that of the effort, started some five or six years ago, which has now reached in a legally corporate form the association of the Brotherhood, &c. The clerical mortality of the last twelve months has very clearly demonstrated two facts of importance in this movement. One of these is that of its necessity and its beneficent character. It is a matter of congratulation that during the last twelve months this Brotherhood as an association had existence. There is perhaps no form of effort or contribution in which there can be a stronger assurance that a pressing necessity is met, and that the relief afforded is of value. "When," said Dr. Andrews, some years ago, speaking of his contribution to the clerical league, "when I send my two dollars, I know that they go to relieve a certain real want, and I know that they go with enough from other sources to make them really of some value." Simply in view of its beneficent results for individuals, the effort claims the sympathies

and cooperation of our ministers and people. And if we take into further consideration the fact that this constitutes an inducement to permanency of clerical time in the Diocese, we can see additional reasons for its claims upon our regard. The collections here, as elsewhere, have fallen off as the year moves on. And a membership of only seven or eight hundred, out of a communion of some twelve thousand, shows very clearly how large a material is yet to be drawn upon for additional membership.

Of course, in our review of the state of the church, we can never lose sight of our missionary operations. Every church, in some form or other, has before it the threefold sphere of activity marked out for his Order by the founder of Jesuitism: its counter mission to check and neutralize positive error and falsehood, its outer mission to extend into new and distant territory the light and life of gospel blessing, its inner mission to cultivate and call into its highest efficiency material already in connection. The special and most pressing call upon this diocese in the last ten years has been for effort in this last department, the inner mission, the diocesan work, the kind of effort to call out the resources of our stronger congregations, and thus cultivate their Christian life, at the same time to support, and to help to become self-supporting, many of our weaker parishes. The report of the Diocesan Board, at the last Council, indicated a falling off in contributions. Such is the fact again this year. This, indeed, has been the case elsewhere, and in all departments of religious and benevolent exertion. But such palliation, if it really be one, should only stir us up to greater exertions. If our people, during the coming year, will economize, not in their charities, but in their luxuries and superfluities, this whole difficulty will receive speedy adjustment.

In thus pressing, however, the diocesan and domestic work, your committee would not lose sight of that broader field, the outer foreign missionary work, to which for so many years this diocese was so large a contributor. The question may be thrown out for prayerful reflection, have we not stinted ourselves in this outer field to meet the more pressing demand of the inner one, with the result of a deficiency in both? The political economy of charity is full of such problems.

To only one other topic would the committee ask your consideration. The gratifying success of the last effort of our late beloved diocesan, in behalf of that institution in which he felt such a deep interest, and for which some of his last supplications were offered, has already in other

modes been made known to the members of the Council. The relief thus offered to the Seminary, and the additional work thus demanded of it, brings to view a topic of the deepest interest to the permanent welfare of the diocese. The state of the Church—the prosperous or adverse state of any Church-depends very greatly upon the quality and character, the personally religious state of those who are looking forward to, and preparing for the work of the ministry. Such decision and earnestness of personal religious character, ought to have existence and to manifest itself before the individual becomes a candidate, or is encouraged to think of so doing. The effective inward call of the Holy Spirit, the great theological teacher, first calling to this work and then fitting for it, does not ordinarily come during the theological course, at the time of ordination, or afterwards, but in the parish while the individual as a private Christian in that sphere is trying to do the work of his Master. There is a great responsibility upon the pastors and vestries of our congregations and parishes, with reference to this matter, in two respects, first, to find and call out material for the ministry in quantity to meet the demand of the Church and the world; secondly, to see that it is of the right quality; and, if there must be an alternative, to sacrifice the quantity for the quality. Many an army would have been saved from overthrow by the prior rough process of decima-And so with the army, especially with the officers of Christ's church militant. The men who are now preparing for the ministry, or considering the question of so doing, will, in a few years, be occupying our places. How important to the state of the Church, that they be Christ-like men, full of the Holy Ghost, more than ordinary Christians as laymen and candidates, and thus more than ordinary ministers, more than ordinarily successful in the great work to which their lives are consecrated. How important that those with whom they first consult. and from whom the first evidence of their fitness comes, should be careful to see that this first step be not a false one, and all the rest mistake and disaster.

But there is an *ultimate* responsibility in this matter which goes back even of pastors and vestries—that of our Church membership, the spiritual priesthood of the Christian laity. A high tone of Christian piety in the parish and congregation, especially in the family, and thus pervading the whole Church, is the best guard against mistakes, the most effective agency to the calling forth the material of an effective and earnest ministry. From this we may expect everything; out of this we

may repair every loss, supply every deficiency. It behooves our communicants, therefore, each one in his sphere of influence, to recognize this their high responsibility; to make it evident to all men that such responsibility is conscientiously accepted. In previous years, this committee, under the suggestion of Episcopal reports, has called attention to certain forms of specific offence, and warned against them. It would now, to all such warnings, add the affectionate suggestion as to the importance of a steady, unbroken consistency of decided Christian life and activity. "About this time"-was the sneering remark last autumn of one of our secular journals—"about this time there is a resumption of schools and religion." The necessity of these resumptions of religion on Ash Wednesday, after a winter's frivolities, or about the first of October, after a summer's waste and dissipation, is what brings reproach upon that holy name by which we are called-weakness and discouragement to his most faithful followers. Our proper service to that Master is one of love. It is of the very essence of such love that it is self-sacrificing and untiring; finds expression in the restless energy of unbroken obedience. To this obedience, our highest blessedness, as our spring of all success and efficiency, every member of Christ, and whatever his vocation, is called. In responding to that call, the great object alike of all individual and all ecclesiastical life is secured-Christ is glorified.

That there are hopeful indications in the present condition of Christendom, as in our own portion of it, your committee would gratefully recognize. Religious interest, to a very unusual degree, has been the characteristic of the last twelve months both in Europe and this country. Probably the matter of personal religion, of man's personal relations to Christ, and His claims and offers, is receiving a larger degree of attention, and from more minds than at any previous era of Christianity. We cannot but anticipate spiritual blessings to our Church and diocese from this condition of things. Christian communities, like Christian individuals, are members one of another. And when the Spirit of all grace is poured out abundantly upon any one such community, it is an earnest of like grace to be communicated to others.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Council be tendered to the Railroad and Steamboat Companies, who have granted to the members of the Council the courtesy of free passes to their homes.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be requested to pay fifteen dollars to the sexton of this Church for his services to the Council.

Resolved, That fifteen hundred copies of the Journal be published for distribu-

Judge Sheffey, from the Committee on Clerical Support, presented the following report:

The Committee on Clerical Support submit the following report:—
One hundred and eleven churches in ninety-one parishes have sent in reports. Of these, eighty-two churches in sixty-four parishes have discharged the duty of paying their clergy the amounts agreed to be paid. Twenty-nine churches in twenty-seven parishes have not discharged this duty, but are returned by their own officers delinquent. The total amount of deficiencies is \$3,291.74; that is to say, twenty-nine churches in twenty-seven parishes acknowledge, by their reports, that they owe the clergymen, whom they have contracted to support, the sum of \$3,291.74. How many more are in like condition of delin-

quency, the committee, for lack of reports, have no means of stating. Your committee cannot too strongly express their profound sorrow in view of such facts. They indicate negligence and remissness, to say nothing of serious breach of good faith, which cannot be otherwise than displeasing to God. In many cases these deficiencies doubtless arisefrom sheer carelessness. Persons don't mean to do their Rectors any particular harm; indeed, they esteem them highly, and duly appreciate the value of their services. They only put off paying this the most sacred debt they owe; and in the meantime the clergymen and his family must suffer, or go in debt; and so the burden of these daily cases is painfully increased. Their stipends are small enough at best. The number of churches which agree to pay \$500 and less, some as low as \$100, is forty-six. Twenty-six agree to pay sums ranging from \$500 to \$1,000. The number who promise \$1,000 and less being seventy-two. Only sixteen promise sums ranging from \$1,000 to \$2,000; and the highest salary on the list, made up from the reports, is \$3,000, with the exception of St. Paul's, Richmond, the salary of whose Rector is \$4,500.

The evil of insufficient salaries for the clergy is great; but that of unpaid salaries. agreed to be paid and relied on by dependent clergymen for daily support is greater; and we earnestly invoke the attention of the Vestries of the Diocese to this subject. Delicacy seals the lips of the clergy, who bear the evil without complaint; and for this reason the highest obligation of duty and Christian honor should berespected, and this debt be revoked, as it deserves to be, among the most sacred of our liabilities. Among the delinquencies reported there are some of a most painful character. Clergymen, who do their full duty, are working apparently on half pay, and in two instances without any pay from the parishioners whom they serve. We forbear to call special attention to these cases, and trust that before the printing of the Journal, appended to which will be found the list of delinquent parishes. the evil may be remedied by supplemental reports from the parishes in arrear, and so that these instances of delinquency may not come before the public eye.

An unusually large number of parishes have neglected the duty of making reports, as required by the order of the Council. Seventy-seven Churthes in fifty-three Parishes have failed to discharge this duty. There must be some defect in the working of a system which yields such results. In many cases there are several treasurers of Churches in one Parish under one Rector. In such cases, unless the Rector him-

self gives attention to the matter, the duty will be neglected. We think it will be well that the clergy in all cases see that these reports are made.

Through some inadvertence, the forms of reports called for did not direct the attention of the treasurers of Parishes to the matter of rectories, &c., required by former reports. This omission will not again occur. For the reason given, we make no report on the subject of rectories and the material growth and advancement of the Parishes.

We recommend, as usual, that notice be given by the Secretary, through the Southern Churchman, that the names of Congregations and Parishes on the delinquent list may be removed therefrom in all cases where, by means of a supplemental report sent to the Secretary, it is made to appear that the delinquency has been removed by full payment of the debt due the Rector.

We further recommend that the list of delinquent Parishes be, as heretofore, appended to the Journal, and that a list of the Parishes from which no reports have been sent be likewise appended to the Journal. In conclusion, your committee, deeply impressed with the importance of the subject, ask the Council to adopt the following resolution:

Resolved, That the laity of the Diocese be again earnestly requested to make adequate and systematic provision for the support of the clergy ministering to them in holy things: and that they be specially requested to see to it that the compensation promised be regularly and promptly paid to their Rectors.

The report was received, and the resolution adopted.

The Council then united in singing the 27th hymn:

"Blest is the tie that binds."

Prayer was offered by the Bishop, and the Council adjourned sine die.

The good Lord has blessed this work each year, but during this one he has enriched it with greater blessings than usual. Both numerically and financially, in the Sunday School and Church proper, we have much cause for thankfulness to God. REMARKS.—There are connected with this Parish three regular Missionary stations—Hartford City, Mason City and West Columbia, distant from Point Pleasant respectively nineteen, sixteen and twelve miles, and situated above on the Ohio river. In these towns, in the aggregate, reside thirteen of the forty-six communicants reported above, besides several others who still hold their membership in the church at Pomeroy, Ohio, who would be more than likely to join the church on

this side of the river, if a church building in their midst could be obtained. This end, so long and so earnestly desired, seems now more nearly attained than ever. There is a strong hope that we may obtain a building by purchase, which will answer every purpose, and be obtained much cheaper than one could be built. Right Reverend and Dear Sir:

I respectfully report, that during the past year, I have conducted this Diocesan Institution for young ladies with gratifying success, notwithstanding the severe pressure of the times. The pupils represent sixteen Dioceses, and the exercises of the session have been marked by great harmony. I am indebted to the zeal and energy of our able corps of professors and teachers for the large amount of work which has been accomplished with so much efficiency. In my long experience it has rarely happened that I have been sustained by a corps of so much ability and cordial, earnest zeal.

Number of communicants in the Institute: Pupils, 45; teachers, 10; total, 55. Baptisms, 3. Confirmations, 10 (others will be confirmed in their own parishes). Bible classes, 3. Some of the younger pupils attend the parish Sunday School.

It pleased God to take to Himself, during the session, one of our loveliest pupils, after a residence of three years with us, during which time her brilliant talents and earnest piety gave promise of a most useful life in the service of her Master. She assumed her baptismal vows during her first session, and steadily developed a Christian character beautiful for its modest, but earnest, consistency. With this exception, the health of the family, teachers and pupils, has been, as heretofore, excellent.

Our grounds have been greatly beautified. We are indebted to a pupil in Mississippi, long resident with us, for a large contribution of roses and other flowers of rare beauty. The large and shady grounds have afforded means of healthful recreation to our pupils during their leisure hours.

I have assisted the Rector of the parish, as usual, in his arduous duties, and my ministerial acts are embodied in his report. Daily services in the Chapel of the Institute, with lectures and sermons, have been regularly held. The Chapel, fitted up by the young ladies, supplies a long-felt want, and has imparted to the daily school services greater solemnity and impressiveness, besides giving up the larger hall exclusively to the health-giving exercises of a Calisthenium.

The establishment of so many denominational schools in Virginia necessarily limits our sources of patronage, and presents a question of deep interest to the churchmen in Virginia in this connection. A generous and cordial support of our own schools will enable them to take a position of efficiency in the work of Christian education.

# REPORT OF R. GATEWOOD, MISSIONARY.

Emmanuel Chapel is near the northern limits of the city of Norfolk. It is owned by William H. Turner, Esq., of Norfolk. Mr. Turner has fitted it up, and set it apart to the Lord's work. A band of Christian men and women have devoted themselves to the work. Here we have a Sunday school, of which Mr. J. G. Spruill is superintendent. The average attendance of scholars for several Sundays past has been forty; number of teachers, &c., twelve; total average of Sunday school, fiftytwo. The school is growing. There is also an industrial school for girls, which meets in the week, for teaching the girls how to sew and cut and fit garments. The average attendance is: scholars, twentytwo; teachers, six; total average, twenty-eight. This school is also increasing. I have been holding service here every Sunday night for several months. The congregations are steadily increasing. Altogether, the work promises well for the glory of Christ's kingdom. We hope to have soon a day school for the children in the neighborhood, to be presided over by Mrs. Barnes. For the spirit of self-denial and liberality, shown by those connected with this work, may praise be given to the Lord Jesus.

I am thankful to report that I have preached the Gospel during the past year about one hundred and fifty times.
