# RULES OF ORDER.

RIGHTY-SECOND ANNUAL COUNCIL

#### ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterwards stand except to address the chair.

Sd. The credentials of Lay Delegates shall be handed to the Secretary, who shall call the names of at least twelve, that the Council may at once proceed to business. The credentials of all the delegates shall then be referred to a committee of two clerical and three lay members, who shall report thereon as speedily as practicable, and if any doubt arise as to the right of any delegate to a seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for their Examination.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of the pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Reports of standing committees.

Reports of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each Order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

#### Bules of Order.

- A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.
  - A Committee on Parochial Reports.
  - A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.
  - A Committee on Elections.
  - A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.
  - A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

- 1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.
- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of his second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.
- 4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.
- 5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.
- 7th. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.
- 9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to

explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes whenever three members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council for special reasons shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council, or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick, or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall at his discretion select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3rd. No spectator shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

## REPORT OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

## REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:

1876, May 19.—During the session of our last Council I commenced the work of the year, confirming in Christ Church, Alexandria, thirteen.

May 21.—Confirmed twenty in St. Paul's, Alexandria (nine being students of the High School), and sixteen in Grace (one colored from Christ Church).

May 28.—Emmanuel, Henrico, preached and confirmed six. May 30.—Grace, Charlotte Courthouse, preached and confirmed four.

May 31.—St. Luke's, Halifax, confirmed six, one being colored.

June 1.—St. John's, Halifax Courthouse, confirmed ten.

June 2.—Grace, Halifax, confirmed one.

June 4.—Preached morning and night in the Church of the Epiphany, Danville, and confirmed fifteen.

June 11.—Confirmed one in Emmanuel, and the next day four in St. Paul's, Albemarle.

June 13.—Christ Church, Charlottesville, confirmed eleven, of whom two were students of the University.

June 14.—Confirmed four in Grace, Albemarle, and the next day one in St. John's, Louisa.

June 16.—St. Thomas', Orange Courthouse, confirmed ten. June 17.—St. James', Warrenton, confirmed twelve.

June 18.—In the morning baptized an adult, preached, and confirmed two in the Church at Langley, Fairfax county; and at night preached and confirmed thirteen in St. John's, West End. These are two of the missions conducted by students of the Seminary. The next four days were devoted to duties at the Theological Seminary and High School.

June 23.—In the Seminary Chapel, after morning prayer by Rev. P. Wroth of Baltimore, and sermon by Rev. T. G. Dashiell of Richmond, fifteen young men, presented by Rev. Dr.

Packard, were ordained Deacons, and seven Deacons, presented by Rev. Dr. Walker, were ordained Priests. Two persons were also confirmed.

July 6.—In Fork Union Church, Fluvanna, confirmed two candidates from St. Ann's Parish, Albemarle.

July 7.—In St. John's, Columbia, confirmed nine.

July 8.—St. James', Cumberland, confirmed two.

July 9.—St. Paul's, Goochland, confirmed one. This Church has since become vacant by the resignation of Rev. H. B. Lee.

July 10.—Preached and confirmed six in Goochland Courthouse. I am glad to say that a church-building is going up at this place, where Rev. H. B. Lee officiates once a month.

About this time I received a communication from the Standing Committee of the Diocese, kindly urging me to suspend my labors for some months, with a view to recruiting my health. Not feeling at liberty to disregard their wishes and advice, all the appointments I had made were recalled, and, as soen as domestic affliction would allow, I went to the mountains for a month, with, I am thankful to say, much benefit to my health.

August 20.—Bishop Dudley, of Kentucky, confirmed for me in Emmanuel Church, Middleburg, five.

September 3.—Consecrated All Saints Church, Union, Monroe county, West Virginia, preached morning and night, celebrated the Lord's Supper, and confirmed six. Rev. R. H. Mason, rector, and Rev. R. A. Cobbs, of Charleston, assisted in the services. The completion of this building—simple and unpretending, but confortable and handsome—was the comsummation of hopes long deferred, of many prayers, and of persevering effort on the part of a few zealous Episcopalians. May God ever abundantly bless the labors of the devoted rector and his faithful co-workers.

September 10.—Read prayers and preached at the Healing Springs, Bath county.

September 16.—Preached, confirmed two, and administered

the communion, in Grace Church, Fauquier, Rev. W. S. Jones, deacon, in charge.

September 17.—In St. Paul's, Haymarket, preached and confirmed two, and the next day, in the same church, preached and confirmed six,—several candidates being detained from church by heavy rain.

September 19.—Grace Church, The Plains, confirmed five, and the next day, in Trinity, Salem, confirmed one.

September 21.—Emmanuel, Fauquier, confirmed two.

September 22.—Leed's Church, confirmed five.

Here I was detained for three days longer by rain and high water, and was compelled to miss several appointments in Loudoun.

October 1.—Aquia, Stafford, preached and confirmed three.

October 2.—Preached in Lamb's Creek Church, King George.

October 8.—I found St. Paul's in the hands of the painters, and could have no service.

October 4.—St. John's, King George Courthouse, confirmed one.

October 5.—Preached in Emmanuel, Port Conway.

October 6.—Confirmed four in St. Peter's, and the next day eleven in Grace Church, Caroline.

October 8.—In the morning, preached and confirmed thirteen in St. George's, Fredericksburg, and in the afternoon, in St. George's Chapel, baptized an adult, preached and confirmed five, the rector being absent at a funeral.

October 13 and 14.—Attended a meeting of the House of Bishops in Philadelphia, for the election of Missionary Bishops for China and Africa; which resulted in the choice of the Rev. Dr. Schereschewsky for the former, and the Rev. C. C. Penick for the latter.

October 21.—Christ Church, Eastville, confirmed six.

October 22.—Hungar's, Northampton county, confirmed three.

October 23.—In the Methodist Church, Pongoteague, Accomac county, confirmed two.

October 24.—Preached in the Methodist Church in Onancock.

October 25.—St. James, Drummondtown, confirmed five.

October 26.—Preached and administered the communion in Emmanuel, Temperanceville.

October 29.—Read prayers, preached, and administered the communion in Pohick, Fairfax county, and preached and confirmed five in Olivet church. The services in these two churches are conducted by students of the Seminary.

November 5.—Grub Hill, Amelia, confirmed ten.

November 6.—Grace, Powhatan, confirmed one.

November 7.—Emmanuel, Powhatan, confirmed eight.

November 8.—St. Luke's, Powhatan, confirmed two.

November 9.—Manakin, Powhatan, confirmed five, of whom two were from St. Luke's.

November 16.—Preached in Emmanuel Chapel, Henry county.

November 17.—Christ Church, Henry Courthouse, confirmed one.

November 19.—In Trinity Church, Franklin Courthouse, read prayers and preached morning and night, baptized an adult, confirmed three, and administered the Lord's Supper, the rector being detained at home by sickness. This church, a very neat and comfortable building, erected by the persevering efforts of a few zealous Episcopalians, was ready for consecration, but because of the absence of the rector, Rev. Jno. R. Lee, that service was postponed. The next morning, in the same church, two persons were united in marriage.

November 21.—The rector being necessarily absent, I officiated in St. John's, Big Lick, and confirmed two, and the next day did the same in St. Paul's, Salem, baptizing an infant and confirming six.

November 26—Consecrated Christ Church, Gordonsville, one of the most substantial and beautiful buildings in the

Diocese. Rev. Messrs. Boyden, Hanckel, Greaves, Steptoe, and F. G. Scott, the rector, assisted in the services. Sermon by myself. At night in the same church, after sermon by Rev. Mr. Greaves, I made an address and confirmed seven.

December 1.—Vawter's, Essex, confirmed two.

December 2.—Preached in St. Matthews.

December 3.—In St. Paul's, Essex, confirmed twelve, and in St. John's, six. The Rev. Everard Meade had but recently commenced his very acceptable services as rector of these two churches.

December 5.—Christ Church, Middlesex, confirmed one.

December 6.—White Chapel, Lancaster, confirmed five.

December 7.—In Grace Church, in the same county, confirmed two.

December 8.—In the Methodist Church, Heathsville, Northumberland, confirmed two.

December 9.—Farnham Church, Richmond county, confirmed seven. I was delighted to find this grand old colonial building, which had not been occupied for years, thoroughly repaired, and now one of the neatest and most comfortable churches in the Diocese.

December 10.—Preached morning and night in St. John's, Warsaw, and confirmed thirteen.

December 11.—Had an appointment at a mission conducted by Rev. D. M. Wharton, which very inclement weather prevented me from keeping.

December 12.—Confirmed nine in Yeocomico Church, and the next day six in Nomini, Westmoreland county. These churches have greatly revived under the faithful ministry of Rev. J. J. Lloyd.

December 14.—St. James', Westmoreland Courthouse, confirmed one.

December 15.—St. Peter's, Oak Grove, confirmed six.

December 17.—Being detained on my way home by ice in the Rappahannock, I preached for the Rector in St. Peter's, Port Royal.

December 20.—By request of our Diocesan "Standing Committee on Colored Congregations," I went to New York to confer with the Executive Committee of the "Commission of Home Missions to Colored People," in reference to Rev. Mr. Cooke's work in Petersburg, and returned on 28rd.

December 31.—Preached in The Moore Memorial Chapel, Richmond.

1877, January 14.—In St. Andrew's, Richmond, preached and confirmed thirteen.

January 28.—Preached in the morning in St. Mark's, Richmond, and at night in St. Paul's.

February 2.—Cotocton Church, Loudoun, preached and confirmed eleven.

February 3.—Christ Church, Loudoun, confirmed two.

February 4.—Preached morning and night in St. James', Leesburg, and confirmed sixteen. The faithful and beloved Rector of this Church, Rev. R. T. Davis, having been absent for several months on account of bad health, the candidates were presented by Rev. Theodore Reed.

February 5.—Assisted in a delegate missionary meeting in St. Paul's, Alexandria.

February 6.—At the Theological Seminary.

February 7.—Confirmed two in Christ Church, Culpeper.

February 8.—Confirmed ten in St. Stephen's.

February 9.—Confirmed two in Emmanuel, in the same county.

February 13.—In St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, preached the sermon and assisted the Right Rev. Bishops Atkinson, Huntington, Pinkney and Dudley in the consecration of Rev. C. C. Penick, D. D., as Bishop of Cape Palmas, and parts adjacent, Africa:

February 18.—In the morning preached and confirmed six in St. Paul's Chapel, Berkeley, and at night in St. Luke's, Norfolk, preached and confirmed eighteen.

February 25.—Services were held in Petersburg, where twenty-seven were confirmed in Grace Church, twelve in St.

Paul's, and thirteen in the Church of The Good Shepherd, Blandford, an interesting and flourishing mission of St. Paul's.

March 1.—Sent to the Southern Churchman a notice to the Clergy and Laity of West Virginia to assemble in conference in Parkersburg, April 18, in reference to a division of the Diocese.

March 4.—Preached and confirmed twenty-one in St. John's Church, Hampton, and at night in Centurion Church, Fortress Monroe, preached and confirmed two.

March 6.—Read morning prayer, baptized three adults, preached and confirmed seven in the Eastern Shore Chapel, Princess Anne county, and in the afternoon officiated at the funeral of a young man.

March 7.—Read prayers and preached in Emmanuel Church, Kempsville. This Parish has been, for more than a year past, without a pastor.

March 7.—Preached and confirmed thirteen in Emmanuel Church, Norfolk. This is a new and very successful missionary enterprise, commenced by Rev. Wm. M. Dame, and now carried on by that indefatigable brother, the Rev. Robert Gatewood, assisted by a zealous band of Christian men and women. For the ground and building, which is neat, comfortable and commodious, the Church is chiefly indebted to Mr. W. H. Turner.

March 8.—Officiated in the Churches in Portsmouth, confirming four in St. John's, and five in Trinity.

March 9.—Confirmed ten in St. Paul's, Norfolk, three being from Emmanuel and one from St. Luke's. In Christ Church confirmed fifty-two.

March 10.—At Ivor, Southampton county, consecrated the pretty and comfortable Church of our Saviour, the Rector, Rev. E. W. Wroth, and Rev. Messrs. J. D. Powell, J. B. Craighill and J. B. Newton assisting in the services. The Rev. Dr. Newton preached the sermon, after which I made an address to the congregation, and confirmed nine. The completion and consecration of this building was a consummation which had been long hoped and prayed and labored for by a small band of our

people, and marks the dawn I trust of a brighter day for our Church in Southampton county.

March 11.—Preached in the morning in the Glebe Church, Nansemond, and at night in St. Paul's, Suffolk, and confirmed five.

March 12.—St. John's, Nansemond, preached and confirmed six.

March 13.—Christ Church, Smithfield, preached and confirmed four.

March 15.—Grace Church, Surry county, preached and confirmed three.

March 16.—Brandon Church, Prince George, preached and confirmed three.

March 17.—A severe storm prevented me from filling an appointment at Merchant's Hope Church, Prince George county.

March 18.—After travelling four hours through mud and snow, and making eleven miles, I arrived too late for an appointment at St. John's Church, City Point. Reached Petersburg in time for service that night, where I preached in St. Stephen's (colored), and confirmed nine.

March 21.—In St. Paul's Church, Richmond, after sermon by Rev. J. Peterkin D. D., admitted Rev. Pike Powers to Priest's orders, and Mr. Geo. C. Sutton, of Petersburg, to the order of Deacons; Rev. C. Minnigerode, D. D., presenting the candidates.

March 25.—At Louisa Courthouse, preached, confirmed three and administered the communion, assisted by Rev. Chas. Morris, Deacon in charge. In the afternoon rode five miles and conducted a service in a private house, where I confirmed a venerable Christian brother of eighty years, and administered the Lord's Supper to him and others. During Passion week made a visitation of the churches in Richmond.

March 26.—In St. Mark's preached and confirmed twenty.

March 27.—Grace, preached and confirmed fourteen, of
whom one was from St. Mark's.

March 28.—Monumental, preached and confirmed twelve.

March 29.—St. John's, preached and confirmed twenty-two.
March 30.—Good Friday, St. Paul's, preached and confirmed nineteen.

March 31.—After sermon by Rev. Dr. Bancroft, of Montreal in the Moore Memorial, confirmed eleven, three being from Grace, and one from St. Mark's.

April 1.—Easter morning, preached, confirmed seven, and administered the Lord's Supper in Christ Church, assisted by Rev. R. S. Barrett, Deacon in charge. In the afternoon in the Meade Memorial, Manchester, preached and confirmed five. At night preached in St. James', Richmond, and confirmed fourteeen, of whom two were from St. Mark's.

April 8.—Confirmed eleven in Grace Memorial, and sixteen in St. Paul's, Lynchburg.

April 9.—In Epiphany, Danville, confirmed 9.

April 11.—Emmanuel, Pittsylvania Courthouse, confirmed ten.

April 12.—Castle Craig, Campbell county, confirmed eight, and the next day preached in The Church of the Good Shepherd, in the same county.

April 15.—Preached morning and night in Christ Church, Clarksburg, and confirmed six.

April 16.—Preached and confirmed two in St. Paul's, Weston, which is now vacant, Rev. A. A. McDonough having resigned the parish and removed from the diocese.

The last Council "Resolved, That the Bishop be, and is hereby respectfully requested to call a conference of the clergy and laity of the parishes and congregations within the limits of West Virginia; and that he request such conference to furnish for the information of the Council at its next session, such facts as will enable the Council to act understandingly on the subject." In compliance with this resolution, on the first of March I issued a call for such a conference.

April 18.—The conference met in one of the Presbyterian churches in Parkersburg, kindly loaned us for the occasion, our own, Trinity, church building having been condemned as

unsafe for us to occupy. The conference was well attended, two sessions were held, and the best feeling prevailed. Without coming to any practical conclusion, the brethren adjourned to meet again, on yesterday, in this place. That meeting I was not able to attend, but the conference will no doubt report its action to the council. At night, after sermon by Rev. W. H. Meade, confirmed four.

April 19.—Confirmed four in Emmanuel, Volcano, Wood county.

April 20.—In Fairmont, as in Parkersburg, our building being regarded as unsafe, I preached in the Methodist church, and confirmed five.

April 22.—Preached morning and night in St. Matthew's, Wheeling, and confirmed twenty-one.

April 23.—Accompanied by Rev. Messrs. J. G. Armstrong and R. F. Jackson, Jr., visited Christ Church, Wellsburg, preached and confirmed seven, and the next day, after sermon by Mr. Armstrong, in St. John's, Brooke county, confirmed one. These two churches, I regret to say, have been for some time vacant.

April 25.—Trinity, Moundsville, preached and confirmed three.

April 29.—Emmanuel, Henrico, confirmed eleven, but was prevented by inclement weather from meeting an appointment in the evening at St. Andrew's, Richmond.

May 6.—Preached morning and night in St. James', Ashland, and confirmed two.

This is a very pretty and comfortable building, just completed, after several years of working and praying on the part of a feeble but zealous congregation. A small debt prevented its being consecrated.

May 7.—Took the night train from Richmond to Fredericksburg, and the next morning accompanied by Rev. Dr. Murdaugh, rode fifteen miles through a hard rain to Spotsylvania Courthouse, and found no congregation. The weather being so unfavorable, and the water-courses rising and likely to be-

come impassable, I concluded to give up two other appointments and return home, so concluding my visitations for the year.

I can do little more than record the names of the beloved

brethren who, during the past year, have ceased from their labors and entered upon their reward.

Rev. Wm. Hoxton, Rector of Emmanuel Parish, Fauquier, a sweet, lovely Christian character, after several years of declining health, during which he was diligent in season and out of season, and often beyond his strength, died in Richmond, 81st May, 1876.

Rev. Edmund Christian, who had but recently come to the Diocese, and whom I had never met, died in Moundsville, West Virginia, at an advanced age, 10th June, 1876, leaving behind him a good reputation for purity of character and fidelity in the work of the Christian ministry, to which he had devoted his life.

The next to follow was Rev. Wm. Meade Nelson, 8th July, 1876. Having known him intimately from boyhood, I can testify to his manly Christian character, his godly walk and conversation, and his earnest devotion to the great work of preaching Christ and saving souls.

On the 20th of the same month, in Washington City, departed this life, Rev. Chas. H. Page, after a pilgrimage of more than three score and ten, a man of singular simplicity of character, most abundant in labors, and whose meat seemed to be to do the will of the Master who sent him, and to finish his work.

Lastly, on the 28th February, 1877, Rev. James T. Johnston distinguished as an eloquent preacher and faithful pastor, having attained the age of nearly four score years, entered into rest, in the city of Alexandria, the scene of his entire ministry.

May this record of the mortality of our brethren teach us of the clergy, especially, so to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom. May we indeed realize that our time also is short, so that whatsoever our hands find to do, we may do it with our might.

OTHER CHANGES AMONGST THE CLERGY.

Rev. Edward W. Wroth has resigned the churches in Rap-

pahannock county, and taken charge of Christ Church, Smithfield, and the Church of Our Saviour, Southampton county.

Rev. H. B. Lee has resigned the rectorship of St. James' Northam Parish, Goochland Co., and become assistant minister of St. James', Richmond.

Rev. Kinloch Nelson resigned Grace Church, Richmond, to accept a professorship in the Theological Seminary.

Rev. Robb White was obliged by bad health to resign St. John's, Wytheville, and is now without charge. He has been succeeded by Rev. George W. Nelson, late assistant minister of Grace Church, Lexington.

Rev. Wm. T. Leavell having ceased to be assistant of Trinity Church, Shepherdstown, has become rector of Mt. Zion, Hedgesville.

Rev. Edmund W. Hubard has given up his missionary work around Lynchburg, and taken charge of the churches in Rappahannock.

Rev. J. M. Meredith having accepted, and resigned Bruton Parish, Williamsburg, is now rector of Overwharton Parish, Stafford county.

Rev. Lyman B. Wharton has been compelled by bad health to discontinue his services as missionary at James City Chapel and Christ Church, Yorktown.

Rev. William N. Ward has taken charge of Christ and St. John's Churches, Spotsylvania, and St. Margaret's, Caroline.

Rev. H. M. Jackson is rector of Grace Church, Richmond, and Rev. Everard Meade of South Farnham Parish, Essex.

Rev. J. J. Norwood has resigned St. Mark's and Trinity Churches, Botetourt, and Rev. E. C. Murdaugh, D. D., St. George's, Fredericksburg.

The vacancy in the Faculty of the Seminary, caused by the lamented death of Dr. Sparrow, has been filled by the election of Rev. Kinloch Nelson, of Grace Church, Richmond. Mr. Nelson entered upon his duties at the commencement of the present session, and is giving entire satisfaction to trustees, professors and students. Although the seminary has fewer

students at present than it has sometimes had, yet, when we remember how many similar institutions are now established in our Church, I think, with forty young men within its hallowed walls, we may well bless God for its continued prosperity.

The principals of the High School and Virginia Female Institute will report their condition during the past year.

The Bruce Fund, as will be seen by the report of its treasurer, continues to do a blessed work by aiding in the erection and repair of churches. I cannot too earnestly or too often commend our Education Society, our Brotherhood, the Society for the Relief of Disabled Clergy, and that for the help of the widows and orphans of clergymen deceased, to the prayers and pecuniary support of our people. They are all noble charities, and if we could only believe it, it is more blessed to give to them than to receive from them.

The great want of our Diocese is a largely increased missionary fund, which shall enable us to supply vacant Parishes with ministers, and to send forth other ministers into the waste places of our land. There are from twelve to fifteen clergymen faithfully laboring in this Diocese to-day because of additions to their salaries made by the Domestic Committee of the Board of Missions and the American Church Missionary Society, and who, but for such aid, would have been obliged to seek food and raiment for their families in some other field. Indeed, I know not what would have become of a number of our ministers and Churches but for the kindness of those societies extended to us during the past ten years. The time has come, however, it seems to me, when we ought to relieve them of their burden and ourselves of our obligation. Executive Committee of our Diocesan Missionary Society will make an effort to accomplish this end during the present Council. Their plan is to induce each minister and lay delegate to pledge himself to try and raise a certain sum during the coming year, to be paid quarterly. I trust the plan may be so successful, that at least \$10,000 shall be placed in our missionary trea-

sury. At our last meeting a resolution was passed, "That, in the opinion of this Council, it is advisable that, at each Council of this Diocese, one sitting of the body be devoted to the consideration of Diocesan Missions and to the hearing of the reports of individual missionaries." And surely no more appropriate or important work can possibly engage our attention. The missionary spirit is the spirit of Christ, and the missionary work is the work for which his Church was established and is continued in the world. Just in proportion as we pray and labor and give for the cause of missions may we expect God to bless us in our own souls.

In compliance with a resolution of the last Council, I addressed a brief Pastoral to the Diocese on the subject of intemperance. I did not feel that I was expected to preach a sermon, but left that to my brethren of the clergy. Surely, when we consider its prevalence and its consequences for time and for eternity, no more terrible evil exists in the world. Nor are its. dreadful effects confined to the world; Christians, church officers and ministers of the gospel being often involved in its sin and ruin. Not only have the Church of England, some of the dioceses of our own Church, and other religious bodies taken action in regard to it, but tens of thousands of our fellowcountrymen, actuated by merely worldly motives, are laboring for the decrease or suppression of intemperance. It were a shame on us as a church, if, with the prevalence of this fearful vice on all sides around us, and, to so great an extent amongst our own members, and in view of the present state of public opinion, we do not do more than we have yet done against it. trust the council may have grace and wisdom to devise some practical and effectual means of dealing with this matter. And in any event, not only should "the laity consider the evil tendencies to themselves of social drinking, especially in public places, and the consequences resulting to others from the influence of their example," but, it seems to me, that every one who names the name of Christ, ought in these times, for the Lord's sake, and the Church's sake, and the sake of the

world, at least to abstain from all intoxicating drinks as a beverage.

Occupying the fearfully responsible official position which I do. I feel it my duty to lift up my voice against the spirit of worldliness and irreligion which I grieve to think is increasing among us. More now perhaps than ever before within our knowledge the cares of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches, and the lust of other things, entering into the hearts of Christians, choke the word and make it unfruitful. Because iniquity abounds, the love of many has waxed cold. Worldliness—the spirit, and sentiments, and fashions, and customs, and pleasures, and vices of the world—its shows, and frivolities, and extravagances, and dissipations, have come into the church like a flood, and well-nigh swept away every mark of difference between the disciples of Christ and other people. This is seen, as in other things, so conspicuously in the musical performances in some of our churches, where the praises of God are converted into what might be called a Sunday opera-in the fairs, and shows, and plays, and other unworthy means which are used to raise money—and in the attendance of communicants and vestrymen upon theatres and other forbidden places of amusement. We ministers must remember that we watch for souls, of which we must give account, and that if we fail to warn our fellow-men of the error of their ways, and they die in their iniquities, their blood will be required at our hands. And the people must be continually reminded that without holiness no man shall see the Lord; and that when the Apostle says, "Be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your minds, that ye may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God," he is not simply giving us a piece of advice, but authoritatively announcing the law of the gospel, which all are solemnly bound to obey. I am persuaded there is no means of grace more needed to be used in our day, than that of godly discipline; and I must insist, that obedience to the Rubric of the Communion Office and to the XIX Canon of this Diocese on

the part of the laity, and the enforcement of that obedience by the clergy, is as binding as any other law of this Church.

My predecessor faithfully warned you, my brethren, against the introduction of flowers into our Churches, and his warning was reiterated in perhaps more than one report of the Committee on the State of the Church. The warning, however, I grieve to say, has in a number of instances been disregarded; and this evil, from a small beginning, has in a few years grown to such proportions as on some occasions to involve wasteful and sinful expense, and to make of our Father's house a place for a floral exhibition, to please the eye and gratify a sensuous taste, causing some minds, it is to be feared, to "change the truth of God into a lie, and worship and serve the creature more than the Creator, who is blessed forever." One of our prominent Bishops, who claims to have been the first to bring in this strange custom, seeing, when too late, whereunto it has grown, has issued a pastoral against the lamentable fruits of his own doings. And now, in addition to flowers, we begin to see what are called altar cloths, and cloths of different colors for the different Church seasons, on some of our reading-desks and pulpits. These things, unimportant in themselves, are parts of a system—a system of doctrine and practice not sanctioned by the word of God, which was utterly repudiated by our Church at the Reformation, and which is held in abhorrence by a large majority of the ministers and people of this Diocese. These things are a novelty in Virginia, not having been known at a time within the memory of the youngest of us, and are seriously disturbing the peace and unity of some of our congregations. I earnestly and lovingly implore my dear brethren, the ministers and vestries of this Diocese, and, if I have any authority in the premises, I do more than implore them, for the sake of truth and peace, not to introduce themselves, nor to allow others to introduce, into our Churches the things which I have mentioned, or any like Ritualism and Romanism have grown up little by litthings. tle; and if we would preserve the worship and doctrine of our beloved Church unchanged, we must resist every innovation.

When so many foreigners are coming into our State, and amongst them persons claiming to be ministers of some branch of the Church of England, my brethren of the Clergy will understand my reason for respectfully asking their attention to Canon 10 of Title II of the Digest of the Canons of the General Convention. I would also direct the attention of all whom it may hereafter concern to Section 1 of Canon 14 of Title II.

I have received from the trustees of Gambier Theological Seminary and Kenyon College a communication in regard to the establishment of a "Church University" by the Dioceses of Ohio, Southern Ohio, Pittsburgh, Kentucky, Virginia, Indiana and Michigan. However unlikely you may be to engage in such an enterprise, I think it due to those brethren to lay the communication before you, and to ask for a committee to consider and report on the subject.

The question to be considered, which is doubtless of most general and absorbing interest, is that which relates to some provision for a supply of more Episcopal services. While I have very decided opinions on the subject, yet, as the whole question has been referred to a large and able committee, of whose views and purposes I am entirely ignorant, it is due to the Council, the committee and myself, that, for the present at least, I should say nothing in regard to it.

And now may the Holy Spirit preside in our Council assembled in his name and presence. May he save us from all error, ignorance, pride and prejudice; and so direct, sanctify and govern us in our work that God's name may be glorified, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

The Annual Report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society was then read:

#### Diocesan Missionary Society.

The amount received is larger than that of last year by several hundred dollars, but it is owing to the fact that the committee adopted the expedient of holding delegate missionary meetings in some of the principal cities and towns of the Diocese, at which meetings the appeals for help were responded to in a gratifying and encouraging manner. There was also received a legacy of \$200 from the late Miss Judith Applethwaite. But for these two additional sources of revenue an embarrassing deficiency would doubtless have occurred, as the receipts up to January were so small that the Committee was compelled to cast about to avert the threatened deficiency, and so devised the scheme referred to.

It will thus be seen that about one-fourth of our clergy—that is, of those who are actively engaged—receive aid from this society. And if the names of those brethren be added, who receive missionary aid from the several convocations in the Diocese, it might possibly appear that

about one-third of our active clergy are aided and enabled to remain at their posts by missionary help.

#### THE NEED OF SUSTAINING THIS SOCIETY.

It is therefore obvious that this society, or some such agency which would accomplish the same results, cannot be dispensed with. If one-fourth of our clergy are enabled to remain at their posts by the help received from this society, the conclusion follows that if this aid were withdrawn, we should in a short time lose the services of that portion of our clergy, who would either be compelled to take up some secular occupation, or leave this Diocese for some other, where they might hope to obtain bread for their families.

The Committee sensibly feel this, and also the responsibility devolved upon them of devising ways and means for securing a sufficient income. But they are at a loss to know how to act to make it more certain that the needed amount will be forthcoming. The expedient above referred to, of special delegate meetings, though highly successful in this instance, cannot be repeated regularly with like hope of success. The resolution adopted by the Council, some years since, recommending an annual contribution towards this society of fifty cents for each communicant, is, to a great extent, ignored or neglected. Special appeals by circulars, or the living agent, soon lose their effect, and therefore a renewed interest in the work of the society, so vital to the prosperity of the Diocese, is absolutely necessary. The subject, its importance and wants, must be kept before the people. To secure this the Committee have adopted the following measures:

- 1. They have corresponded with the several convocations of the Diocese to ascertain if it would be agreeable to them to receive at their convocational meetings delegates to represent this society, and to set forth its objects, condition, claims, &c., with a view to diffusing intelligence concerning it, and creating more interest in it, and in every case they have received replies of welcome from the convocations. It was late in the current year when this resolution was adopted, and there has not yet been time to carry out the plan to any considerable extent, but it is believed much good will result from it.
- 2. It has also been determined by the committee to keep the Diocese supplied with Diocesan missionary intelligence. Special measures have been from time to time adopted, but it is feared with no great success.

Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Committee feel the importance of doing this, and therefore will endeavor to keep the Churches regularly supplied hereafter with information through the columns of our Diocesan paper.

In conclusion, the Committee have to say to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese that increased pecuniary effort on their part will now be needed, as the Bishop of the Diocese has been officially informed that on account of the stringency of the times and other causes the help heretofore given to the Diocese by the Domestic Committee and the Church Missionary Society, while not absolutely withdrawn, cannot be depended upon for the future. The Domestic Committee promise to be responsible for the payment of the second quarter only of what they have promised for this year, while the American Church Missionary Society reserves the right to modify its engagements to help the Diocese to any extent that may be necessary.

It is the decided opinion of the Committee that it is the duty of the Diocese to free the general Missionary Societies of the Church from the burden of assisting it with pecuniary aid, which it has so generously done for some years past. Our missions in Virginia cost at least \$8,000 a year, and this is the minimum which the Diocese should furnish.

To accomplish this some organization is necessary, and the Committee requests and is prepared to receive from every Parish through its Rector and Lay Delegate the formal promise of a minimum contribution, which they will honestly endeavor to raise during this year in semi-annual or quarterly payments commencing July 1, 1877.

The trustees of the Seminary and High School beg leave to report, that since the last Annual Council the Rev. Kinloch Nelson has been elected and has been discharging his duties as Professor of Ecclesiastical History, Pastoral Theology and Canon Law. The friends of the Seminary are to be congratulated on his accession to the faculty. Rev. Dr. Walker has been appointed Professor of Systematic Divinity and Homiletics, and Rev. Dr. Packard has been made Dean. Mr. J. H. Siddons has given instruction in the art of reading. The studies of the course, of which particular account will be given in the annexed reports of the professors, have been successfully pursued during the session. The High School maintains its deserved reputation, and is an honor and blessing to the diocese.

# To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Biblical Learning respectfully reports:

That the classes under his instruction have, during the session, pursued the prescribed course of study in his department, with commendable diligence and success.

I do not think it necessary to go into much detail. The Junior class, with which I have five recitations a week, have devoted special attention to the Grammar of the Hebrew language, having been over the principal parts three times, and have written exercises. They have read about the usual amount in the Bible.

In the Greek Testament they have studied exegetically the Gospel of John, which they have finished, and are now reading the Sermon on

the Mount. They have also written Exegetical Essays on subjects in the Gospels.

The Middle Class, which I meet three times a week, have studied the Prophecies of Christ in the original, besides several of the Psalms. In Greek they have studied exegetically the Epistles to the Romans and Hebrews.

The Senior Class have continued the study of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures, reading in Hebrew twenty chapters in the latter part of Isaiah, and in Greek the two Epistles to the Corinthians.

Right Rev. Francis M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D.,

President Board of Trustees Theological Seminary of Va:

I would respectfully report, that the classes during the session, with slight variations indicated below, have pursued the usual course of studies.

The senior class, with three recitations a week and the Wednesday evening exercise, have gone over Burnet on the Articles and are now reviewing it. They have studied, with written questions and references, a course on Liturgics. Specific Exercises in Homiletics, as also in connection with other recitations, have gone on during the whole session.

The middle class, reciting, until within the last month, five times a week, has studied Knapp's Theology, which they are now reviewing. One recitation per week has been given by this class to the study of the New Testament as in the English version and with reference to the form in which its Theology is thus exhibited. The class has found special interest in these recitations, and I trust has been benefitted.

To the junior class, which, under the former arrangement, studied Evidences with the Professor of Systematic Divinity, I have given a weekly recitation in Natural Theology, especially with reference to the prevalent forms of unbelief. This being an addition to the course, I have had provisionally to use a new text-book, President Chadbourne's Lectures on Natural Theology. I would suggest that, if it meets the approval of the Board, a course of this kind be added to the usual studies of the junior year; and also a similar course to the studies of the senior class. With the latter, perhaps, it is the more important, as they are better prepared to appreciate the material of the subject with

which they are occupied, as also the necessity of intelligence in regard to it.

As to the matter of text-books, I would prefer the full trial of one or two sessions before deciding. The work that I have used and that of President Hopkins on the "Outline Version" are very good; but I may be able to find better.

Prof. Systematic Divinity and Homiletics.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

In the department of Church Polity the instruction of the senior class embraces: 1st, A full course of lecturing on the Church and ministry, in connection with oral and written examinations; and, 2nd, Lectures with examinations on the text-book,—Hooker's Laws of Ecclesiastical Polity, the third, the fifth and the seventh books; concluding with a review of the entire course in written questions. The middle class continue the study of Apologetics with the use of Luthardt's Apologetic Lectures on the Fundamental Truths of Christianity as a text-book. In the same department the junior class pursue a course of study which begins with a series of lectures, and is continued to the close of the session in the use of Paley's Evidences and Butler's Analogy as text-books.

The proficiency of the several classes will bear favorable comparison with that of any, so far as known to the professor, in former years, affording gratifying evidence of a conscientious endeavor on their part to fulfil, to the letter, their matriculation vows.

The Professor of Church History and Canon Law respectfully submits the following report of the studies pursued under his direction during the current session.

The Seniors, with four recitations a week, have studied the History of the Church of England from its rise to the present day in Short and in written lectures; also the History of the American Church.

They have also read the Pastoral Epistles in the original, and studied Meade on the Pastoral Office. They are now engaged with the Constitution and Canons of the Church.

The Middle Class, with three recitations a week, with essays at each recitation, has studied Kurtz's Church History.

The Juniors, with three recitations a week, have studied Smith's Old and New Testament History, and read the Acts of the Apostles in Greek.

The Senior Preparatory Class has recited to me four times a week in Greek Grammar and Translation.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:

As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

The aggregate number of boys, including six day-scholars, received during the current session is eighty-three; the maximum attendance seventy-seven. Neither since the war was ever so large. \* \* \* Fifteen clergymen's sons have been received. No boy has been expelled and none withdrawn by request; the general conduct of pupils having been unusually good. \* \*

In no previous session during my charge of the school have our advantages with respect to special religious services been so great. The Rev. W. M. Dame, of Christ church, Alexandria, has officiated in the School Chapel one Sunday afternoon in the month, and the Rev. Prof. K. Nelson, of the Seminary, one Sunday evening. Besides this, Mr. Nelson held during Lent a weekly evening service here of less formal char-The ordinary religious exercises of the acter. school have been as before. Our brief daily morning service in the chapel is varied by the reading of the pealter twice in the week, and the ante-communion office on the minor festivals; singing, with organ, being always a prominent feature. On the chief holy days school duties are suspended, and divine service is attended in the Seminary Chapel. During Holy Week a special effort, as in previous years, was made to improve the season by a brief instruction appropriate to each The regular Friday night service in the day. School Chapel, so long customary, has been maintained with spirit and efficiency, first by Mr. J. R. Winchester, of the Seminary Senior Class, and then by Mr. Frank Page of the class below. To both these gentlemen, as to the clergy mentioned above, my gratitude is pointedly re-

corded. The number of communicants among the boys is twenty-eight. A class now awaiting confirmation will add others. \* \* \* The health of the school was never in my time so good as during the present session.

The Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., presented the following report from the Committee on the Division of the Diocese:

The Committee to whom the last Council referred "the whole question of the expediency of a division of the Diocese—and if so, what division?" and also "whether the desires of all cannot better be met

and the interests of the Diocese better promoted by the election of an assistant Bishop?"—respectfully report that they have given to these important subjects their most careful consideration, and have embodied the results of a long and free discussion in the resolutions herewith submitted. The proceedings of the conference in West Virginia being laid before them, they unanimously sustained its action by recommending to the Council that a Diocese be formed comprising the State of West Virginia.

On the subject of the petition from the Southern portion of the Diocese, presented to that Council and referred to this Committee, there was not the same degree of unanimity. The majority of the Committee, however, are decidedly of opinion that the wishes of that portion of the Diocese, both for the relief of our Bishop from the demands of a still too extensive territory, and for supplying themselves with more Episcopal supervision, can best be met and ought to be met by the formation of a new Diocese within the lines designated in the second resolution herewith presented. The alternative proposition, viz: the election of an assistant Bishop, was also brought before the Committee in the form of a resolution, which, after a short discussion, was withdrawn, the opinion of the majority of the Committee present being decidedly against the measure thus proposed.

The following are the resolutions adopted by the Committee, the first unanimously, the second by a majority of the Committee:

First, Resolved, That in the judgment of the Committee should that portion of the Diocese contained in the State of West Virginia, either with or without the counties of Jefferson and Berkeley, present to the Council a petition conformed to the constitutional requirements for the division of a Diocese, it will be expedient that such application should be granted.

Second. Resolved, That in the opinion of this Committee the petition presented to the last Council by C. J. Gibson, for himself and others, asking for a division of the Diocese of Virginia, and the establishment of a new Diocese upon the South side of James River, be so far granted by the Council as to consent to the erection of such new Diocese, to be composed of the counties of Accomac and Northampton, Princess Anne, Norfolk, Nansemond, Isle of Wight, Surry, Sussex, Southampton, Greensville, Dinwiddie, Prince George, Brunswick, Nottoway, Amelia, Chesterfield, Powhatan, Cumberland, Prince Edward, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Halifax, Charlotte, Campbell, Appomattox, Buckingham, Pittsylvania, Bedford, Alleghany, Craig, Botetourt, Roanoke, Montgomery, Franklin, Henry, Patrick, Floyd, Carroll, Pulaski, Giles, Bland, Wythe, Grayson, Smyth, Tazewell, Buchanan, Russell, Washington, Scott, Wise and Lee: Provided, the Council is satisfied that such is the wish of that portion of the clergy and laity residing in such territory.

#### Oredentials.

Rev. Dr. Peterkin presented the accounts of the Bruce Fund, and moved that they be referred to the standing committee on those accounts.

Carried.

One o'clock having arrived, the Council proceeded to consider the order of the day. The first resolution of the report made by the Rev. Dr. Gibson was then reported as follows:

Resolved, That in the judgment of the committee, should that portion of the Diocese contained in the State of West Virginia, either with or without the counties of Jefferson and Berkeley, present to the Council a petition conformed to the constitutional requirement for the division of a Diocese, it will be expedient that such application should be granted.

On motion of Mr. Thomas Moore, the resolution was referred to the committee appointed by the Conference of the Clergy and Laity of West Virginia, with leave to report forthwith.

# Report of W. L. Hyland.

# The Rev. W. L. Hyland then presented the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the resolution relating to the creation of a new Diocese within the State of West Virginia, by the boundary lines between said State and the State of Virginia, having had the same under consideration, report the following as embodying the results reached by the Conference of Clerical and Lay Delegates convened by the Bishop in the city of Parkersburg on the 18th of April and concluded in Staunton on the 16th of May, and adopting the same as the judgment of your committee:

The committee appointed by the Conference beg leave to report their unanimous concurrence in the following resolutions, and recommend their adoption by this Conference as its final action in the premises:

r. Resolved, That in the judgment of this Conference the interests of the Church in our State clearly demand a division of the Diocese of Virginia; and that the dividing line be the boundaries between the States of Virginia and West Virginia.

We further report that we have ascertained that at least twenty-two hundred dollars and a residence have been pledged within the proposed Diocese for the support of the Episcopate, and believe that this sum can be materially increased; therefore,

2. Resolved, That this Conference requests and earnestly urges the Council now in session to set apart West Virginia as a separate Diocese.

Your committee offer the following resolution, and ask its adoption by the Council:

Resolved, That the prayer contained in the resolutions tendered by the Conference of the Clergy and Laity of West Virginia be granted, and that the Council doth hereby give its consent to the erection of a new Diocese, to be formed out of so much of the territory of the Diocese of Virginia as is contained within the limits of West Virginia.

# Mr. M. P. Andrews presented the following as an amendment:

"Provided that no Parishes in the Counties of Jefferson and Berkeley, who have signified or may signify their desire to remain in the old Diocese, shall be embraced within the limits of the proposed Diocese of West Virginia."

#### Arrival of Delegates.

The Rev. John P. Hubbard offered as an amendment to the amendment:

"That the new Diocese be formed of so much of the territory of the Diocese of Virginia as is contained within the State of West Virginia as lies west of the boundary lines of Grant and Pendleton counties."

Col. John M. Patton moved that when the council adjourn it do adjourn to re-assemble at 4 o'clock, P. M.

Carried.

Mr. C. F. Lee moved that the election of delegates to the General Convention be the order of the day for to-morrow morning, immediately after the reading of the journal.

Carried.

The Council then adjourned to 4 o'clock, P. M.

On motion, a committee of three, consisting of Judge Sheffey, Col. I. H. Carrington and Mr. Taylor Berry, was appointed to examine and report to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock, upon the canonical and constitutional relations of the question.

The council then adjourned until to-morrow at 9 o'clock.

FRIDAY, May 18, 1877.

The Council was called to order at 9 o'clock by the Bishop, after prayer by the Rev. J. R. Hubard, D. D.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

The order of the day was suspended in favor of the question of erecting a new Diocese in West Virginia.

Judge Sheffey, from the special committee to consider the canonical and constitutional aspects of the question of the division of the Diocese, presented the following, which was received and adopted:

The Committee to whom was referred the legal and constitutional aspects of the proposition now pending before the council, having for its object the erection of a new Diocese, co-extensive with the limits of the State of West Virginia, have considered the subject and respectfully report:

1. That a majority will determine the question. The 4th article of the Diocesan Constitution expressly provides that "the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure." It is true that the 20th Canon requires a two-third vote in order to pass a Canon, altering or adding to an existing Canon, if the action, on the subject is at one and the same session of the Council, the provision being, that unless the proposition shall receive a two-third vote at such session it shall lie over for consideration until the next succeeding Council. But this Canon has nothing to do with the matter under consideration.

## Division of the Diocese.

2. That, in our opinion, however loose and vague the language of the Constitution of the Diocese, and of the General Church on this subject, may be it is not necessary to postpone the consideration of the pending question, in view of any constitutional obstacle in the way of present action by the Council.

It is true that the Diocesan Constitution is wholly silent on the subject, and that its framers seem not to have contemplated the contingency of a division of the Diocese. The Canons of the Diocese are equally silent in respect to this matter.

The 5th article of the Constitution of this Church, however, empowers the General Convention to admit into ecclesiastical union with the Church additional dioceses; first, without conditions, to admit a Protestant Episcopal Church in any State, upon the acceptance and ratification by it of the Constitution; second, to admit with express conditions and restrictions, a Diocese to be formed from one or more existing dioceses. The restrictions upon the power to admit Dioceses so "to be formed," are, so far as this question is concerned, first, that it shall not be done unless the Bishop consents to it; and second, that it shall not be done unless the Convention or Council consents to it. The power to admit new dioceses so to be formed precedes these restrictions, and must be held to be operative as a substantial grant of power if the express conditions be complied with. This provision of the Constitution, then, taken altogether, is to this effect: that, with the consent of the Bishop and of the Convention of a Diocese, the General Convention shall have power to admit into ecclesiastical union with the Church, a diocese to be formed out of an existing diocese. The only question here is whether the words "to be formed from one or more existing Dioceses," contain such a declaration of power in respect to the formation of new dioceses, as to override or set aside what might otherwise be deemed to be rights and privileges guaranteed by the Diocesan Constitution.

We are of opinion that these words, as held and construed by the Church since the Constitution was adopted, and as fairly interpreted, do contain such a declaration of power—that is to say, that they declare that the power does exist, with the consent of the Bishop and convention of any Dioceses, to be affected by the act, to form new Dioceses out of existing Dioceses, or out of parts of different Dioceses. The exercise of the power may deprive ministers, laymen and Parishes, in portions of the existing Diocese, of rights and privileges, under the Diocesan Constitution, which would otherwise be vested and inviolable.

## Division of the Diocese.

But it is well established that the plain grants of power in a Constitution must operate with all necessary consequences flowing therefrom, so that whilst Congress has no power to impair the obligation of contracts by direct legislation, it may do so indirectly by exercising its powers in respect to Bankrupt and Embargo laws, which do impair the obligations of contracts. So here, although the results of the action of the Council in giving its consent to the erection of the new Diocese of West Virginia might be oppressive or injurious to the rights and interests of some portions of the Diocese, which could not be affected or impaired by any direct action of the Council, those rights and interests may, by the exercise of the power to erect a new Diocese within the limits of the existing Diocese, be incidentally impaired without objection on the ground of the unconstitutionality of the act. Apart from the idea that the Constitution of the General Church assented to, and acted under for a long time by this Diocese, is the Constitution of this Diocese, and is not to be brought in question as to its plain express powers, the silence of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Virginia on the subject of the division of Dioceses would seem to involve the further ides and conclusion in acceding to the Constitution of the Church, that the Diocese has accepted and recognized the existence of the power as declared by the General Constitution, and as being willing that it shall be exercised without respect to its own Diocesan Constitution as to boundaries and other such matters of Diocesan constitutional right and privileges. Of the merits of the pending proposition we have nothing here to say. If the power to act exists, as we think it does, the manner of its exercise is a matter of discretion and conscientious sense of duty in the Council.

The Council met and was called to order by the Bishop at 4 o'clock, P. M.

The tellers on the election of a fourth lay deputy presented their report as follows:

Rev. Geo. W. Dame presented the following from the committee on Church Schools:

Your Committee appointed originally to ascertain if anything can be done to secure a liberal education to the children of the church, and especially to those of the clergy, at prices within their control,—and since enlarged into a committee on church schools—have given the subject such attention as they could and offer the following report:

Churchmen, and especially the clergy, feel their poverty more keenly in their inability to educate their children than in any other of its privations. And the clergy feel that it would be an act of simple justice that the laity should consider it their duty to make those provisions for the education of their children, which from the meagre salaries that are paid them, they cannot make for themselves. Nor are the laity unwilling to do it. The subject has not been brought before them as it should have been by the clergy, and therefore so little has been done. We believe that when the present stringency of the finances of the State shall pass away, the laity will be found ready to do all that need be done on this subject, if their attention is earnestly called to it and they are shown how the work can be accomplished. And in the provisions which will thus be made to educate the children of the clergy at a nominal cost, ample provision will also be made for the edu-

cation of all the other children of the church at greatly reduced prices. The clergy cannot be blessed without a blessing on all the people.

We know that the present is not the time when much can be done, but it is the time when we can plan for work to be done when the time for action shall come. The plan which we believe to be feasible is this. Let the State be laid off in four or more School Sections, and a committee formed in each section to devise the ways and means for the erection of the suitable buildings for a church school. Let such committee meet, draw their plans, select their place, and immediately begin their work by creating an interest on the subject, and when that has been done, there will be but very little difficulty in securing the means and having the buildings erected. Let the principal to the school be appointed as the minister is elected—to have his support and not to make money. Let all that is made go to the reduction of expenses. And if this work is done, as we feel sure it can be done, and simplicity in living and dress is had, the children of the church can be educated at prices within the means of any.

This is necessarily prospective. Something, however, can now be done for the children of the clergy. The debt of the Virginia Female Institute has now been paid, and there will be an income to the church. Let this money be collected on the tuition of the daughters of the clergy of this Diocese by dividing it into portions that will probably give such material assistance to eight or ten pupils as will enable that number of the daughters of the clergy, with the assistance to be derived from their parents or other sources, to enjoy the advantages of that excellent school. And we believe the trustees can make such arrangements with the principal that a very heavy beginning can be made in this work of a thorough education of the children of the Church at prices within the means of all. The resident trustees should have the selection of the applicants.

We suggest the same course in reference to the High School for boys. There is another matter that, in this connection, we think worthy of consideration. The State has made provision for Public Free Schools. If the educated higher classes of society will take hold of these and see that they are properly conducted, the trustees will see that they are properly supplied with well-qualified managers. And the State has so directed, in reference to these schools, that a very little supplement is re-

quired to make them capable of preparing the scholars for business and

for entering colleges. Shall we not look to this and aid the State in doing a work which she has at heart? We expressly state that this interest is to be shown by us as citizens as a means of having these schools taught only by those who are mentally and morally qualified for that position, and who shall have the school disciplined on the principles of the Bible.

But baptized children are to be brought up in the Church. How shall this be done? If the literary and the moral is provided for, the Rector of the Parish is expected to supply all that remains undone. He is the teacher of the principles of religion to the young, as well as the practice to the older of his people. And this fact should have a deep hold on the minds of our clergy. The Church, in the first Rubric after the Catechism, declares that truth. The children are to be openly instructed, publicly catechised, and if this work is faithfully done, the schools of the world will be so fully supplemented by the school of the Rector, that Church schools, in a modified form, can be at once fully established. There is a want here to which we desire especially to call attention. The teaching of the Rector should be a complete system, beginning when the child enters the Sunday school, and ending only when a thorough settled communicant. We have nothing on this subject as a guide. The Christian training of the children of the Church should be as thoroughly graded as the literary, and if a plan of this kind can be drawn up as a guide to the clergy much good can be done. We consider that the Sunday school work should be carried on by the week-day Bible and Prayer-book classes, and made so continuous that the change in the ministry should make no change in the graded instruction of the Parish.

If this plan should make the Rector the virtual keeper of a Parochial school, be it so. It does not confine him in any way, but makes his work more direct and more effectual.

We therefore recommend that the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute be requested to collect the annual rents for the use of those buildings on the board and tuition of the daughters of those of our clergy who desire to avail themselves of the benefits of that school, with especial reference to the most needy, and that they be requested to have it made effectual to so large a number as can be mutually agreed upon by them and the principal:

Resolved, That the friends of Church Education in this Diocese be requested to

organize into four or more districts, for the purpose of establishing Church schools therein in such a manner as to place the education of the children of the Church, if possible, within the means of the large mass. We recommend this resolution to the consideration of the Lay Association about to be formed.

Resolved, That the Rectors of our Churches be and they are hereby earnestly requested to conform to the directions of the first Rubric of the catechism, and publicly and openly in the Church instruct and catechise the children of the Church undertheir care, and by Bible and Prayer book classes in the congregation instruct their young people in the Bible and in the doctrine and worship of the Church, that they may be thoroughly instructed and able to show to any who may desire to know the grounds of their Christian faith, and the reasons why they are churchmen.

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to suggest—or appoint a Committee to do the same—a system of Sunday school and Parochial instruction as a guide, which shall carry on the work of Church and Church instructions from the beginning of Sunday school life to the thorough education of the younger portion of the congregation on the doctrine and principles of the Bible, and doctrine, discipline and worship of the Church.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the following, which was received and referred to the Committee on the Widows and Orphans Fund:

### Widows and Orphans' Fund.

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia respectfully present their annual report:

The statement of our Treasurer herewith submitted, to be printed in the Journal, shows an increase of the principal of the Fund during the last year of \$1,588.87—our assets in May, 1876, being \$22.674.19; in May, 1877, \$24,263.06. A large portion of this increase comes from the legacy left to the Board by the late Mrs. Malcolm Macfarland, of Baltimore.

The income of the Board from the interest on its various bonds, and from the contributions of the Parishes of the Diocese, has been less this year than the last. Only twelve Churches have contributed anything at all, and only to the amount of \$234.10. Our distributable income has, therefore, been less—being for the coming year only \$1,880, to be divided among ten families. This distribution the Board has endeavored to make with impartiality and with a due regard to the most pressing cases of want.

We again express the hope that our Parishes will remember this important charity, and by more liberal contributions enable the Board to enlarge their benefactions.

Rev. Dr. Norton offered the following, which he requested to be laid on the table for to-morrow morning:

Resolved, That the sum of \$2000 be placed at the disposal of the Bishop, to be used at his discretion in the employment of Clergy for evangelistic services in Parishes south of James River.

Rev. T. G. Dashiell moved to reconsider the vote on division.

The motion was carried.

The vote was again put and Mr. Blackford's resolution was rejected.

The Council adjourned to Saturday, at 9 A. M.

#### Clerical Support.

SATURDAY, May 19, 1877.

The council was called to order by the Bishop, at 9 o'clock, after prayer by Rev. H. L. Derby.

Mr. John H. Claiborne, from Committee on Clerical Support, presented the report, which was received and its resolution adopted:

The Committee on Clerical Support submit the following report:

One hundred and twenty churches in one hundred and three parishes have sent in reports. Of these, one hundred and six churches in ninety parishes have paid their clergy the amounts agreed to be paid. Fourteen churches in thirteen parishes have not discharged this duty, but are returned by their treasurers delinquent. The total amount of deficiencies is \$701.30. This is a great improvement on the last report, and, it is to be hoped, indicates that the time is near when there will be no deficiency.

The whole amount promised by all the churches reporting is \$75,846.15, being an average of \$632.75 to each rector. Of these, three churches pay less than \$100 each, twenty-eight from \$100 to \$200, sixteen from \$200 to \$300, sixteen from \$300 to \$400, eleven from \$400 to \$500, six from \$500 to \$600, three from \$600 to \$700, four from \$700 to \$800, one \$900, three \$1000 each, the residue from \$1200 to \$4500.

We recommend, as usual, that notice be given by the Secretary, through the Southern Churchman, that the names of Congregations and Parishes on the delinquent list may be removed therefrom in all cases where, by means of the supplemental report sent to the Secretary, it is made to appear that the delinquency has been removed by full payment of the debt due the rector.

We further recommend that the list of delinquent parishes be, as heretofore, appended to the Journal, and that a list of the parishes from which no reports have been sent be likewise appended to the Journal. In conclusion, your committee, deeply impressed with the importance of the subject, ask the Council to adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the laity of the Diocese be again earnestly requested to make adequate and systematic provision for the support of the clergy ministering to them in

holy things; and that they be specially requested to see to it that the compensation promised be regularly and promptly paid to their Rectors.

Judge Sheffey presented the following Report from the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute:

### Virginia Female Institute.

The Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute beg leave to report to the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of Virginia, the following facts in the past history of this most important Diocesan School and its present actual condition:

In 1851 the Diocese of Virginia, in Council assembled, saw fit, with the view of promoting the Christian education of the daughters of the Church, to purchase the buildings owned by the corporators of the Virginia Female Institute, for \$7,000, and acquired thereby the title to a most valuable property in the town of Staunton, which had cost the patrons of this enterprise some \$20,000. After some necessary delay in inaugurating this important work of the Church, the trustees secured the continued services of the Rev. R. H. Phillips, who had been previously engaged by the Board of Directory of the Institute as principal, upon a lease of the property for a term of years, and under the provis. ions of this lease, the principal was authorized under the contract of the Board of Directors, to keep the buildings and grounds in order, and to make such additions to the buildings, and to add such conveniences as should be required by the growth of the school, the cost of these improvements being paid out of the annual rents of the Institution. Under this arrangement the Virginia Female Institute has been enlarged, until a sum, not less than \$30,000 has been expended, since its purchase, in bringing it up to its present prosperous condition.

The lease of Mr. Phillips expires with this session, while the entire property is now held by the trustees appointed by the Council, free from debt, to be continued as a Church School for our daughters, in such manner as may best promote the great objects designed by the Council in establishing it.

The trustees have the pleasure to report that they have renewed, upon satisfactory terms, the lease of Rev. Mr. Phillips, and that he will continue as Rector of the Institute to direct the education of our daughters, with the earnest zeal which has marked his work for the twentynine years just about to close.

The trustees with entire unanimity commend the Virginia Female Institute to the cordial support of the Diocese of Virginia, and of the friends of the church in the country. Their recommendation is based upon the undoubted results of this school. The Virginia Female Institute has been the instrumentality, through the young ladies who have been sent out from its walls, in building up the church in waste places

of this Diocese, and of the Southern States, while it has been an important agent in diffusing high Christian culture among our people.

We do not overrate this work when we thus speak of it, and it is our belief that the Church in Virginia has only to know the facts in the history of this Institution, which are known to the Board, to enlist for it the cordial support of our people, and to give a new era of prosperity to the Institution, with every encouragement for a continued life of usefulness.

Judge Sheffey presented the following from the Standing Committee on the Brotherhood:

The Committee on the Brotherhood respectfully report that they have received from the President and Treasurer of the Brotherhood the Seventh Annual Report of the Association, which is herewith submitted.

From this report it will be seen that there is a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$2,244.51; that since the last annual meeting of the Brotherhood, three of the Clergy of the Diocese, who were members of the Brotherhood, have died—Rev. William Hoxton, Rev. W. M. Nelson and Rev. C. H. Page; that over \$5,500 was disbursed last year, and about \$3,500 this year for the beneficent objects of the Association; that notwithstanding some "lets and hindrances" mentioned in the report, the membership of the Brotherhood is steadily on the increase; that this gratifying result has been accomplished mainly by means of the zeal and earnest efforts of Judge Lay, the General Agent of the Brotherhood, who has visited many of the Churches of the Diocese, and always

with the most happy effect, showing that a knowledge of the work of the Brotherhood is alone necessary to commend it to the cordial co-operation and confidence of the Laity.

The report discloses the further gratifying fact, that since the organization of the Brotherhood, the sum of nearly \$19,000 has been collected and paid over to the families of deceased clergymen; and it is earnestly hoped by the Trustees of this noble Association, that with the return of material prosperity to the country, and with more active help from the Clergy and prominent Laity, they will yet count their members by thousands, and their deeds of blessing by tens of thousands.

Your Committee have taken pleasure in embodying the substance of this gratifying statement of the condition of the Brotherhood in their report, in order that the facts may become known to the Church at large, There are eight hundred and fifty members of the Brotherhood who may be safely relied on as paying members, although the enrolled number is greater. The engagement of General Agents to canvass the Diocese in the interest of the Brotherhood has been a great success, and we are gratified to learn that the Clergy are overcoming mistaken feelings of delicacy, and are showing increased interest in the cause by bringing before their congregations the objects of the Association, and by extending invitations to the General Agent to visit and address their Parishioners on the subject. This is as it should be, and your Committee trust that ere long, Clergy and Laity, working zealously and lovingly together, the membership of the Brotherhood may indeed be counted by thousands, and the blessings dispensed by it be scattered over the entire Diocese. Your Committee know nothing the Laity can do to encourage and strengthen the hearts of the Clergy, more effective and beneficent, than to join the Brotherhood, and thus assure the toiling minister of the Church that when called to his rest his wife and children will not be left destitute. It is a cause of continual thankfulness, to those who are members of the Brotherhood, when death invades the ranks of the Clergy, that they have the right and privilege to contribute something to keep want from the desolate homestead, and to provide the means of support and comfort to the widow and orphans. May the number of this band of contributors be largely increased, so that our Clergy may cling to the old Diocese, not only as a pleasant and useful field of labor, but as a secure home for those who may survive them when death calls them to their home in heaven.

### Substitute for motion to Pay Expenses of Clerk, Evangelist, &c.

We are requested to remind the Clergy that failure on their part to pay their contributions operates as a forfeiture of their privileges as members of the Brotherhood.

The first resolution offered by Dr. Minnigerode was withdrawn.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel offered the following resolutions as substitutes for Rev. Dr. Minnigerode's resolutions:

- 1. Resolved, That \$1,000 from the Contingent Fund of the Diocese be placed at the Bishop's absolute disposal for the relief, at his discretion, of either missionaries or parochial clergy, whose stipends are inadequate to their support, and that of the expenditure of this amount no report to the Council be asked or expected.
- 2. Resolved, That a further sum of \$2000 from the Contingent Fund be appropriated to employ two or more evangelists, to be chosen by the Bishop, at such points or in such neighborhoods as he may designate, and that said evangelists be required to make full reports of their services at each annual Council.

Rev. Dr. Sprigg moved to commit the whole subject to a committee, to report as soon as possible.

Rev. T. G. Dashiell called for the previous question.

The call was sustained.

The motion to refer to a committee was lost.

The first resolution of Rev. Dr. Hanckel was caried.

The second resolution offered by Dr. Hanckel, as an amendment to the resolution of Rev. Dr. Minnigerode, was lost.

### Report on State of the Church.

The resolution of Rev. Dr. Minnigerode was carried.

Rev. T. E. Locke, from the Committee on the Accounts of the Fund for the Relief of the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen, reported that the same had been examined and had been found to be correct.

The Committee appointed to examine the accounts of J. L. Williams, Esq., Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society, would report that they have found the same to be correct, and sustained by proper vouchers.

O. S. BARTEN, Chairman.

Rev. T. M. Carson, chairman of the Committee on the State of the Church, presented the following report:

The Committee on the State of the Church beg leave respectfully to report, that a brief but careful review of the work done in the Diocese during the past year, presents many subjects of devout thankfulness to God, under whose good hand we have grown and prospered. The period through which we have passed has been one of unusual difficulty, and the Church has suffered from peculiar disabilities.

Financial distress and political excitements have embarrassed Church enterprises, and perhaps, in some cases, seriously impeded the spiritual growth of church members. But despite all hindrances, the statistics before us furnish good ground for encouragement and hopefulness.

It is a matter of surprise, no less than gratitude, that our beloved Bishop, although disabled for a season by sickness, has been able to make so many visitations in the Diocese, viz: 135; and the number of persons confirmed, reaching nine nundred (900), exceeds all reasonable expectations.

Rarely in our history have so many candidates for Holy Orders been reported, thirty-five young men being now in course of preparation for the work of the ministry.

The report of the Committee on Parochial Reports, shows a considerable decrease in the amount of contributions from the parishes of the Diocese, which however much to be lamented, is hardly matter of surprise under the circumstances of general business depression which have affected all interests, secular as well as religious.

#### Report on State of the Church.

But, thanking God for the past and taking courage for the future, your Committee are constrained to call attention to the work and claims of that great agency for good amongst us,—the Diocesan Missionary Society. Hampered hitherto by utterly inadequate means, and always embarrassed in its efforts to propagate the gospel, the Executive Committee during the past year found itself sorely pressed in redeeming its pledges to the faithful men who under its auspices are now cultivating the waste places of this Diocese. The unusual exigency was promptly met by extraordinary devices. But the work of this society, continuous in its operations, and constantly increasing in its vast proportions, cannot be done successfully, cannot be done at all, by spasmodic, intermittent effort. It must be sustained, encouraged, promoted, by some well devised and promptly executed plan of systematic beneficence. Giving it God-speed in our prayers, we must also fill its treasury, not only freely, but also regularly with our alms. It is earnestly hoped that the proposition of the committee will be cheerfully responded to by every Parish in the Diocese, and that its receipts for this year, instead of the paltry sum of \$4,000 or \$5,000, will even exceed the amount asked for, and so imperatively needed, viz: \$10,000.

Prominent among the benevolent objects which demand our sympathy is the work of the Brotherhood. It is more than a benevolence; it is a sacred duty. And did we sustain it as we might, and as we should, it would speedily become not only an efficient agent of relief to the bereaved families of our deceased clergy, but a comfort to the living ministry in the promise which it gives, and an element of strength to the Diocese in the inspiration which it furnishes to laborers in this vineyard.

Your Committee feel, in fullest measure, the importance of the subjects referred to its consideration from the address of our Bishop.

No evil of the present day is more fearful in its ravages than the vice of intemperance. It stalks boldly through the land, and slays its victims by thousands. Permeating modern society, it enters unblushingly the sacred portals of the Church. It needs to be arrested by the strong but gentle hand of discipline. The time has evidently come when the Church, God's agent for the world's regeneration, must assert herself in dealing with this monster. No timid policy will serve her purpose. She must teach her children to shun the bad example of the social glass, to avoid as very gates of hell the grog-shop and the bar-room. Mode-

rate drinking, drinking in private, under whatsoever pretext, here lies the common danger. The first step taken, the descent is very easy. The Church must therefore recognize its mission as a great Temperance Society, and in respect of strong drink make its motto those words of the Apostle: "Touch not, taste not, handle not."

Less abhorrent in its forms, but not less pervasive and destructive of true religious life is the spirit of worldliness. Insidious and seductive, its virus enters the veins and poisons the life-blood of the soul, and threatens the speedy extinction of all genuine spirituality. It is fast becoming the reproach of the Church, that in distinctively worldly and ungodly amusements, amusements which are not innocent, but reprehensible and hurtful, her children vie with those who are professedly irreligious. Oft times, to their shame be it spoken, Church members are leaders, where they should not be led. Your Committee, in speaking of these things, would emphasize the godly admonition of our Bishop, and urge upon all, who profess and call themselves Christians, the solemn exhortation of the Apostle St. Paul: "Be not conformed to this world."

But in repressing the great sin of worldliness, and in freeing the Church from its taint, Christian Pastors, especially in their instruction of the young, must be seconded by Christian parents and sponsors, for it is a painful truth that not unfrequently the teaching of the Sunday school and pulpit is contradicted and counteracted by the stronger, because the more immediate and constant influence and example of the home. Hard as it may sometimes be to draw the line sharply between the lawful and unlawful, between the permissible and the inexpedient, and dangerous and harmful as may be the indiscreet administration of discipline, it cannot be questioned that, confronted as the Church is by a bold and specious worldliness, she owes it to herself and to the souls of men not only to make her solemn protest against all forms of ungodliness and evil living, to reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long suffering, but also on occasion vindicate distinctly the good name of her Lord.

Your Committee do not deem it necessary to speak at length in this place of extravagant decorations, and of light and unchurchly music, which tend to sensationalism in worship, and to secularize the services of God's house.

The Church in this Diocese has repeatedly testified devotion to the polity, doctrines and usages of our fathers, and the position which we

occupy cannot be misunderstood. We stand in the old paths, and neither now nor hereafter do we propose to depart from them.

Now, as heretofore, invoking the guidance and blessing of the Holy Spirit, let us gird up the loins of our minds, and whether standing on the defensive against worldly encroachments, or pushing the battle to the gate in the warfare against sin, Satan and death, let us serve or suffer for the dear Lord's sake, and in the strength which He shall give us.

Rev. Thomas Spencer was elected assistant Secretary of the Council.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel and the Rev. Messrs. Suter and Kinsolving were appointed a committee to report nominations for the Missionary Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and the committees usually elected by the Council.

# Col. J. M. Patton offered the following:

Resolved, That the Diocese of Virginia prizes Episcopacy as a venerable historic form of Church government or ecclesiastical polity, but does not maintain, and does not find in the Prayer Book the exclusive validity of Episcopal Orders.

The following amendment was offered by Rev. K. Nelson:

Resolved, That it is uncalled for and inexpedient for this Council to express any opinion concerning the validity or invalidity of the orders of ministers in any other Church than our own.

Col. Wm. Nelson moved to lay the whole subject on the table.

Judge Sheffey brought to the attention of the Council the amendments proposed in the General Convention of 1874 to the Constitution of the Church, reported as follows on page 575 of the Journal of that Convention.

1. It was by concurrent action of the two houses of General Convention 1874,

Resolved, That it be recommended and proposed that the following alteration be made in article V of the Constitution, to wit: insert at the end of the article the words:

"The General Convention may, upon the application of the Bishop and Convention of an organized Diocese, setting forth that the territory of the Diocese is too large for

due Episcopal supervision by the Bishop of such Diocese, set off a portion of such Diocesan territory, which shall thereupon be placed within, or constitute a missionary jurisdiction, as the House of Bishops may determine."

- 2. It was further Resolved, That the following be proposed and made known to the several Dioceses as an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution, to be added at the end of the article as it now stands, to wit: the words, "provided, that the General Convention may by Canon arrange and set forth a shortened form of morning and evening prayer, to be compiled wholly from the Book of Common Prayer."
- 3. It was further Resolved, That the following be proposed as an amendment, by way of addition, to Article VIII of the Constitution, to wit: "provided, however, that the General Convention shall have power, from time to time, to amend the Lectionary, but no act for this purpose shall be valid which is not voted for by a majority of the whole number of Bishops entitled to seats in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies."

# Rev. Dr. Sprigg offered the following:

Resolved, That this Council does not concur in the amendment to Article V of the Constitution, proposed by the General Convention in the year 1874.

# Rev. G. A. Gibbons presented the following substitute:

Resolved, That this Council instruct its delegates to the General Convention to vote against the proposed amendment to Article V of the Constitution, as proposed by the General Convention in the year 1874.

The substitute was lost and the resolution of Rev. Dr. Sprigg was agreed to.

# Col. J. M. Patton presented the following:

Resolved, That the Council of this Diocese disapprove of the amendment to Article VIII, unless the abridged services and lectionary be referred back for approval to the several Dioceses, before the same is set forth authoritatively.

The resolution was lost.

# On motion of Judge Sheffey, it was

Ordered, That there be entered upon the minutes of this Council the "proposed changes" of the Constitution of the Church, found on page 575 of the General Convention of 1874, and that the secretary be requested to certify to the proper officer of the General Convention that said "proposed changes" have been made known to the Council of this Diocese, and certify the action of this Council in respect thereto.

### Carried.

#### New Parishes.

### Rev. W. L. Hyland presented the following:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Council be tendered to the citizens of Staunton for their cordial and hospitable entertainment of this unusually large gathering of our clergy and laity, and especially are our thanks tendered to the rector and vestry of this church, and to the assisting committees, for the excellent and thoughtful arrangements made by them, and which have so greatly contributed to the comfort and dispatch of our deliberations, and to the young gentlemen who have so obligingly and efficiently acted as pages during the session.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Council be tendered to the railroad, steamboat and other corporations, to whose kindness the members of the Council are indebted for reduced rates of travel.

Resolved, That \$15 be paid to the sexton of Trinity Church, Staunton, for his services during the present Council.

Resolved, That 1,500 copies of the Journal be printed, for distribution under the direction of the Secretary.

These resolutions were all carried unanimously.

Rev. O. A. Kinsolving, from the Committee on New Parishes, presented the following report:

The Committee on the admission of New Parishes respectfully report that there has been only one petition submitted to them, which is from St. Anne's Church, St. Patrick's Parish, Prince Edward county, to be received into union with the Council of the Diocese.

Your Committee deem it unnecessary that the Council should take any action on said petition, inasmuch as the petitioners only desire the re-organization of one of the old Parishes of the Diocese.

Resolved, That the action of this Council in consenting to the erection of an independent Diocese of the State of West Virginia, which was passed with such unanimity, is not to be construed as a disregarding of the wishes of any Parishes of West Virginia to remain with the old Diocese of Virginia, or as forcing them from us, but as the decided conviction of this Council, after hearing all that was to be said for and against it, that the good of the Church demanded this action.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

REMARKS.—About one-half of the weekly collections were for missions. St. Andrew's is the Mission Chapel, located between Oregon Hill and Harvietown, a strictly missionary field, but on ground most hopeful for our church. It is administered by Rev. P. Powers. I know of nofield more thoroughly cultivated, nor one offering greater promises. The leading statistics are embraced in the report; but the work done by Sunday Schools, Parish School, Night Lectures, Sewing School, Mothers' Meeting and Sewing Society, is beyond all that a brief report could state.

St. Paul's Church Home, incorporated 1861, exists in two departments—a Female Orphan Asylum, and a Home for aged and infirm women.

The Orphans' Asylum contains thirty three children, with two

matrons and one teacher—total, thirty-six.

The Womens' Department, organized February, 1875, has been transferred to a separate and admirably appointed Home, with an Infirmary (free of charge) attached. A little more than two years' old, it has taken care of more than twenty women—a "Home for the poor" of our churches, and relieved more than half a dozen congregations. Number of present inmates eleven. Our arrangements enable us to take care of any number of inmates (Episcopalians, and without incumbrance) at \$60 per annum, or \$5 a month, and thus to offer comforts, temporal and spiritual, to many of the poor of the church, now living, and often starved on the charities of congregations or friendly families.

Religious services are held regularly at both Homes.

This as against no report for the last Council, and no contribution.

Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D.:

Dear Bishop:—As required, I report that I have continued to discharge my duties as chaplain at this place since the last Council. I have held services once during the week and twice on Sundays. I have been frequent in my pastoral visits to the members of the faculty, and particularly to the students. In February I organized a twilight prayer meeting, to be held nightly and conducted by the students. I have attended regularly and closed the services. After Easter, for three weeks we had sermons every night. A few of these sermons were by ministers of other churches. The majority were delivered by Rev. A. W. Weddell, of Richmond, who continued laboring with us almost to the close. I conducted the exercises and bore a part of the preaching.

All these services were largely attended, and we have reason to believe much good has been done. Some have been led to "confess

Christ." Some have returned from their wanderings, and others are still questioning—what they must do to be saved? Our prayer meetings are still well attended.

I have sought, during my chaplaincy, to unite Christians in efforts to counteract the evil influences that are incident to every large institution. And, as a consequence, Christians have been strengthened and upheld in their faith, and many have become active workers. We have now, more distinctively than in the past, a *Christian Society*. Christians stand and work together, and seek companionship among their own members.

The Young Men's Christian Association has seconded my every effort. It is the official body in this church, and is a power for good in this place and neighborhood.

The professors have extended to me always a ready sympathy and a hearty co-operation. They have attended our special services, and sometimes spoken words of cheer. And from all these influences and efforts there has gone forth, and is still working, the leaven of a Christian morality that is seen and felt throughout this whole community.

In leaving my work, I look hopefully to the religious future of this institution, firmly believing that it will be second to none in our land, in the vigor and extent of its religious life, even as it is second to none in its educational advantages.

And now, I close my ministry here with the regret that it is no longer my privilege to labor in this great harvest field, where the hope of our southern land are gathered,—even "where angels would delight to labor,"—where every sympathy of my heart has been enlisted, and where I would gladly "spend and be spent," did circumstances permit.

Rt. Rev. Francis M. Whittle, Bishop of the Diocese of Va:

Dear Sir:—I entered upon my duties the 12th of July. I expected to find three churches built when I came here. Only one had been commenced, but which has since been finished. This church is located at New River. One service a month has been held there since February 1st.

The church at Dublin has been commenced, and we hope, will be completed by July.

We contemplate building a chapel at Martins Station.

At New River we have a flourishing Sunday School. Though managed by Episcopalians, it is not solely in the interest of the Protestant Episcopal Church. It numbers more than forty scholars.

A Sunday School was not established at Dublin, because there are already three at this place. One was established five miles west of Dublin. Twenty-three children have been collected, and are taught altogether in the interest of the Protestant Episcopal Church. This school is managed and taught by a married lady who has five children; and as the result of her untiring and faithful work, two of the members are candidates for confirmation.

At Dublin our Methodist friends have allowed us to use their church, where we have two services a month.

As there is no house at, or near Martins Station, services are held at the house of Mr. James Magill. Fourteen persons have been added to the church by baptism—six adults, and eight children. We have two "missions," at one of which we preach once, at the other twice a month.

VIRGINIA FEMALE INSTITUTE, STAUNTON, VA., May 14th, 1877.

Right Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D.,

Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia:

The undersigned respectfully reports that he has been engaged during the past year in conducting the Diocesan Institution for young ladies, completing his twenty-ninth year in this field of labor. The institution, though feeling somewhat the influence of the financial embarrassment of the country, has, nevertheless, flourished to a very gratifying degree, and maintained the high character of its patronage. The health of the family has been excellent, and the success of the officers and pupils in their several positions very gratifying.

Two daily school services have been regularly held, and on inclement

Sabbath the church service, with appropriate discourses, has been read in the chapel of the institution. As usual, I have, as occasion required, assisted the Rector of the Parish Church in his ministerial duties, and filled his pulpit during his summer vacation. During part of last Autumn, and also during the present Spring, I have held services, and preached every two weeks in the Mission Church, a few miles from Staunton, with encouraging prospects of usefulness in a neighborhood somewhat destitute of religious services.

The members of our corps of teachers are communicants, and to their consistent example and religious influence we are largely indebted for the harmony and success of the current session. Pupils prepared for confirmation are advised to present themselves for this rite after conference with their pastors at home, and thereby receive the counsel of the Rector, under whose spiritual care they will live, after leaving the institution.

There are some ten or twelve candidates prepared for confirmation, when the bishop shall visit the parish in the last of the present month. I hope to collect the full contigent fund in the course of the summer.
