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

RULES OF ORDER.

ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterwards stand except to address the chair.

3d. The credentials of Lay Delegates shall be handed to the Secretary, who shall call the names of at least twelve, that the Council may at once proceed to business. The credentials of all the delegates shall then be referred to a committee of two clerical and three lay members, who shall report thereon as speedily as practicable, and if any doubt arise as to the right of any delegate to a seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for their Examination.

ORDER OF BUSINEESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of the pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Reports of standing committees.

Reports of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each Order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

- A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

 - A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

lst. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.

- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted

to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes whenever three members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council for special reasons shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council, or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick, or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall at his discretion select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectator shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Rev. Dr. Norton, from the Committee continued over from the last Council to consider the subject of the relations of the Diocese of Virginia to the General Church, read the following paper:

The Committee appointed by the Annual Council of 1876 "to enquire into the origin and limitations of the Federal Power as they affect this Diocese," and to ascertain "to what extent and in what way (if at all) the Church in this Diocese has parted with her original right of self-government, and how far she is to be governed by the acts and opinions of other ecclesiastical bodies, whether Anglican or American, whether of modern or former times,"—after patient examination of the subject, beg leave to report:

From the first settlement of the country until the Revolution there was no bond of union among the Protestant Episcopal churches in the several colonies, which afterwards became the United States, save in their common subjection to the jurisdiction of the Bishop of London, in a somewhat undefined obligation to obey the ecclesiastical laws of England, and in the use of the Book of Common Prayer. The Revolution "severed the union between the colonial churches and that of the parent land," and "destroyed also the union among themselves." Hawks' Const. & Can., p. 3 and 4.

In the language of Bishop White (Memoirs, p. 21), "they had been heretofore detached from, and independent of, one another, excepting the bond which had subsisted through the medium of the Bishop of London. That medium of connexion had been confessedly destroyed by the Revolution; and therefore it was evident, that without the creating of some new tie, the churches in the different states, and even those in the same states, might adopt such varying measures as would forever prevent their being combined in one communion."

No one who has studied the history of those times can doubt the statement of Dr. Hawks, "that in each state, the church considered itself an integral part of the Church of Christ, perfectly independent in its government of any and every branch of the Church in Christendom." Const. & Can., p. 4.

During the years from 1788 until 1789, when the Constitution of the General Church was finally adopted, there were conventions of delegates from the several Dioceses. Bishops were consecrated, and impor-

tant preliminary measures adopted; but there was nothing to interfere with the independence of the churches in the different States.

The adoption of the Constitution of the General Church has been supposed to modify that independence, and your Committee is expected to ascertain, so far as possible, to what extent the union of the Church in Virginia, with the other Dioceses under a General Constitution, has divested the Diocese of the right of self-government, confessedly belonging to her from 1783 to 1789.

When a similar question is propounded with regard to State Rights under the Federal Constitution, the answer is made easier by the fact that the Constitution enumerates certain powers, which may be exercised by the General Government; and expressly declares that "the powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people." No such enumeration or declaration is found in the Constitution of the Church, and we are therefore left to a study of the Constitution itself, and the history and circumstances of its formation, to learn the relative extent of Federal and Diocesan powers. The enquiry may conveniently be divided into two questions, viz:

1st. So long as the Diocese of Virginia remains in union with the other Dioceses, what powers can be exercised exclusively by the General Church, and what powers remain with the Diocese?

2d. Has the Diocese of Virginia surrendered such an exercise of independence as would permit her to withdraw from the union, under any circumstances, without the assent of the other Dioceses?

I. The great object aimed at in forming the General Constitution was to secure "uniformity in doctrine, discipline and worship." This appears from the fundamental principles enunciated by the voluntary assembly of clergy and laity in New York, October, 1784, and is expressly stated in the preamble of the Constitution, set forth and recommended to the Dioceses by the General Convention of 1785, composed of "clerical and lay deputies, duly appointed from New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia and North Carolina." Provisions to secure such uniformity are found in the Constitution as proposed in 1785, and as adopted in 1789.

Subsequently a Book of Common Prayer to regulate worship, articles of religion, to define doctrine, and a form of making, ordaining and consecrating bishops, priests and descons, to whom are entrusted discipline, was established by the General Convention. The same General

Convention of 1789, which adopted the Constitution, likewise enacted sundry Canons. There was no express power given in the Constitution to enact Canons; but the very word Convention having acquired in the Dioceses the meaning of a Church Synod with Canon-making power, itself contained the conveyance of such power to the General Convention under the Constitution. The exercise of this power by the first General Convention was neither at the time nor afterwards called in question by the Dioceses. The next Annual Convention of Virginia, in 1790, recognized the Canons thus enacted by instructing the delegates to the next General Convention to endeavor to obtain an amendment to one of said Canons. The General Convention has since continued to exercise legislative powers, without apparently any fixed limit in view as to the subjects upon which Canons may be passed, except so far as restricted by the General Constitution of the Church. It is obvious to any careful student of the history of the Church that the extent to which the Canon-making power of the General Convention has been exercised has far exceeded the expectations of any of those who took part in the organization of the Church. The convenience of uniform rules having force throughout the entire Church, as contrasted with a multitude of diverse rules in the several Dioceses, has naturally extended the scope of general legislation.

The inevitable tendency of large bodies to encroach upon the province of smaller ones has been illustrated in this case, as every where else, in the progress of human affairs. This extension of legislative jurisdiction by the General Convention has been thought by some of the wisest bishops to be attended with danger. Forty years ago, Bishop White said: "It has been all along his opinion, and there will be more and more ground for it in proportion as our ecclesiastical organization shall be operative over the American territory, that the authority and the deliberations of the General Convention should be limited to matters essential to the keeping of us together in one body, and requiring agreement with a view to that end. All enlargement of the jurisdiction endangers controversy and of course division." Memoirs, page 237.

If we ask what are the limits upon Diocesan legislation by union with the general Church, it is clear the Diocese of Virginia must have some right to an opinion. And she expressed that opinion by a Canon passed in 1793, only four years after the adoption of the constitution of the general Church. The second Canon enacted that year defines the con-

stitution and powers of Virginia Conventions. Section 7th declares that "conventions shall regulate all the religious concerns of the Protestant Episcopal Church within this state; its doctrine, discipline, and worship; and institute such rules and regulations as they may judge necessary for the good government thereof, and the same revoke and alter at their pleasure: Provided always, that the powers hereby declared shall not be so construed as to affect any powers exclusively vested in the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America."

This differs little, if at all, from the statement of Dr. Hawks, when he enumerates among the reserved rights of Dioceses, the right "to hold their own ecclesiastical legislatures, and make all such laws as they deem necessary for their well-being, provided they do not defeat the purpose of union by contravening the Constitution and constitutional enactments of the Church general."

Bishop Meade, commenting on this Canon says, (remarks on a pamphlet &c., 1850, page 11) "what these powers were, she does not say; nor is it practicable for us at this day to determine precisely what she meant by the rights reserved to herself. One thing is certain, that she never meant to give exclusive right of discipline to the General Convention, for in that very Convention she proceeds to renew various laws as to the conduct and trial of the clergy of all orders," &c. "Certain it is that she claims some powers as to doctrine, discipline and worship; though not unlimited, however. They must not interfere with those exclusively belonging to the General Convention. As it is impossible, at this day, to say what was in the minds of our forefathers, in drawing up this assertion of their Diocesan rights, it is better to refer to their action, and that of their successors, for an explanation. It is certain that they claimed no right to alter the Prayer Book, which contains our common worship, or to change the articles which contain our common doctrine. None of these things can be touched except by the General Convention, which itself cannot alter a word in the Constitution or Prayer Book without reference to all the Dioceses. And yet there are some things within each Diocese appertaining to worship, which may come in some degree, under the power of the Convention. Prayers for certain occasions may, by request of the Convention, be prepared by the Bishop," &c. "Something comprehended under the term doctrine, might come before a Diocese, without its undertaking to meddle with the creeds, or define the faith once delivered to the saints. We offer

this only as a conjecture in relation to the claims, which the Church in Virginia still reserved to herself. Much more readily can we understand her claim as to discipline, which is a yet more comprehensive term, taking in all laws relating to clergy and laity, congregations and conventions."

The above views of Bishop Meade, expressed twenty-seven years ago, are cited, not as conclusive upon the matters referred to by him, but as indicating an anxiety on his part to protect the reserved rights of Dioceses against the tide of centralization.

About the same time there was a strong opinion of like tenor given by a distinguished layman of Maryland-Mr. Hugh Davy Evans. "Each and every Diocese," says Mr. Evans, "has force, power and authority of itself. The Diocese of Maryland, for instance, can enact whatever it chooses. It does not derive its authority to legislate from the General Convention: on the contrary, the authority of the General Convention is derived from the Dioceses. The General Convention possesses only a delegated authority for specific purposes, and has no power beyond it." "The right of any Diocese to legislate for itself is necessarily derived from the original Constitution of the Church. From primitive times Dioceses have always been regarded as complete and independent bodies in themselves; independent for all the purposes of their own conduct and legislation. That they do not everywhere remain so is owing to the usurpations of the Church of Rome and to the usurpations of the English Crown upon the Church, followed by parliamentary usurpations upon the Crown. In this country we have returned to the primitive Constitution of independent Dioceses, and maintain that in them rests the superior authority for all legislation. and from this as a source all ecclesiastical law derives its obligation."-[Speech at the trial of Rev. Joseph Trapnell, Jr., 1846.]

Every year of the last twenty-seven has shown the steadily increasing power of the General Church, and the diminishing jurisdiction of the Dioceses. Now if we be asked whether the Constitution itself determines any limit beyond which this process of absorption cannot go, after the best examination we can give that instrument, we are compelled to answer in the negative. The General Constitution and Canons have been submitted to by the Dioceses since 1789, as the supreme law of the Church, superseding all identical and annulling all conflicting Diocesan legislation, upon whatever matter the General Church has decided to legislate. And there seems no check or

hindrance in any express provision of the Constitution itself, to the gradual enlargement of Federal power and the reduction of Diocesan authority to a mere shadow.

If we turn to the history of the formation of the Constitution however, it will be found that there were conditions, sine quibus non, of its adoption.

Among them were:-

1st. Adherence in all essential points to the doctrine of the Church of England.

2d. The limitation of the exercise of Episcopal powers by law.

3d. The effective voice of presbyters and laymen, in all legislation of the Church, excluding every possible claim of bishops to legislate without the co-operation of both clergy and laity.

These principles, indeed, were embodied in the Constitution. They differ, however, from other articles of the Constitution, in the fact, that their being thus embodied was an indispensable condition of union among the Dioceses. The Constitution might in many respects be changed, as it has, from time to time been changed, without violation of the original compact. But the General Convention could never abandon the doctrine of the Church of England, or abolish the checks imposed upon the exercise of Episcopal powers, or recognize any enactment, opinion or decisions of bishops alone as law, without violating the fundamental principles of union among the Dioceses.

Shall it be said that such changes are inconceivable? Who that has read the history of the past forty years will say that it is incredible a class of men should ever arise in our Church favorable to such changes? Or that such class, if existing, could never become a constitutional majority of the Church?

And if such changes be conceivable, if there could ever be amendments to the Constitution which should make a new creed the established doctrine, and Canons enacted by councils of bishops the law of this Church, it may be asked, under such revolutionized circumstances, what remedy has a Diocese of our Church? And this brings us to the second topic proposed for consideration. Before entering on that topic, we pause only for one moment to record a single weighty sentence of Dr. Hawks, viz: "If ever the union of our Dioceses is dissolved, it will probably be accomplished by measures, the incipient steps of which will be changes in the Constitution." Hawks' Const. and Canons, page 50.

II. As there is a provision in the Constitution for making changes in its articles, after due submission to the judgment of all the Dioceses, whenever a proposed change shall be approved by a majority of the Dioceses, it would seem that, without violation of the letter of the Constitution, were a majority of the Dioceses so inclined, the greatest and most radical changes might be effected in despite of any constitutional opposition of the minority; and by a like process, the Prayer Book could be changed so as to make it a book impossible to be used with good conscience by the minority; and all this under provisions of the Constitution itself.

No one who has read Church history, or who understands human nature, will reject such a supposition as visionary.

It is said that there are members of our Church who regard bishops, by divine appointment, as the depositaries of all authority. The powers exercised by presbyters and laymen are considered as granted to them by bishops. Upon such a theory, should it ever become generally received in the Church, it would be a return to primitive simplicity of government, if all powers, executive, legislative and judicial were vested in the bishops.

There are said to be persons in our Church sympathizing with the Broad Church school in England, for whom it would be a relief, if the articles could be so modified as to smooth down sharp points of definition in respect of the doctrines of our Lord's Divinity, the Holy Trinity and the Atonement.

There are persons in our Church who find it hard to make the strong Protestant declarations of the articles an honest expression of their own views. It would be a relief to such if those features of the articles could be changed or abolished.

There is nothing to prevent, should a majority of the Dioceses so wish, by perfectly constitutional measures, the accomplishment of any or all of these changes. There is nothing to prevent the permanent endowment of the bishops of our Church with all the powers now exercised by the General and Diocesan Conventions. There is nothing to prevent the removal from the Prayer Book of everything to which a Unitarian might object. There is nothing to prevent the removal from the Prayer Book of everything to which a Romanist might object. There is nothing to prevent a majority of the Dioceses, if so inclined, from effecting a complete revolution in the Church without even touching the Prayer Book. Suppose the small Romanizing element now said

to exist, not in the Prayer Book but in a few congregations of the Church, should ever come to infect the great mass of the Church.

Suppose discipline to be relaxed everywhere, as it now is relaxed in some quarters, so that clergy and congregations may preach and worship almost according to individual fancy. It is conceivable that, after a few generations, the standards of doctrine might be regarded as obsolete. The Ritual of the Prayer Book might become overgrown and encrusted with alien usages, which would, after a few years, seem to many the genuine worship of the Church. All this we may conceive to have place, the Prayer Book remaining as it is to-day.

Now suppose William White to look down from his heavenly rest upon the Church he had labored so long to build up, would it not appear to him as needing nothing to make it a branch of the Roman Catholic Church, but the acknowledgment that one bishop in the world is greater than all others?

When we say there is nothing to prevent all this, we mean nothing in the letter of the Constitution. But what should be an insuperable bar to all such radical changes may be found in the historically attested constitutional compact, and such changes could never be effected without a violation of that compact.

But suppose a majority of the Dioceses, bent on change, and regardless of the fundamental conditions of our Union, should proceed, by constitutional amendments, to accomplish their purpose, what remedy has a Diocese not concurring in such views and plans? The exercise of all constitutional methods of resisting such proposed amendments of course belongs to every Diocese. But suppose all these methods fail? In such a case has the Diocese of Virginia, supposing her still firm in adherence to the principles of 1789, no remedy? Must she bow to the ecclesiastical tyranny, leaving individual members to steal away, one by one, from the Church which sheltered their fathers for many generations? or has the Diocese her reserved rights, equal to the crisis, which shall enable her, without just charge of schism, to separate herself from uncongenial companions, even without their consent, standing fast in her integrity as a Diocese of the Church of Christ, and claiming the respect and fellowship of all the faithful in Christendom? This is a grave question.

Your Committee believes such right of withdrawal, for reasons of great magnitude, from unworthy companionship, is a part of the liberty wherewith Christ has made every Diocese free; that all human ar-

rangements and constitutions are made with the implied understanding of such reserved rights.

It is granted that there is no recognition of such right in the Constitution. It is not usual for any Constitution to provide for its own dissolution, and ours is no exception to the rule, neither is there anything in the Constitution against such a right; and the history of the Diocesan proceedings preliminary to the Union, and especially in Virginia, makes us sure that had it been intimated that the Diocese was bound forever to the compact with no power to withdraw unless by the consent of other Dioceses, the Church of Virginia would have remained to this day separate and independent. We can only refer to the journals of Virginia Conventions from 1785 to 1789. The thoughtful reader of those journals will feel what Dr. Hawks expresses in commenting on the cautious procedure of the Convention of 1785, when discussing the proposed Constitution: "Thus jealous was the Church in Virginia under her new organization to preserve the rights which belonged to her as a distinct and independent portion of the Church of Christ."

While affirming the right of our Diocese to withdraw from union with the general Church, without the consent of the other Dioceses, it is not intended to claim the right of withdrawal at pleasure.

The solemn bond of union among the Dioceses cannot be surrendered lightly, without sin. Though a voluntary union of independent churches, it is a compact to which each is bound, so long as the terms on which the compact was made, remain fulfilled. No considerations of feeling, or mere expediency can justify a rupture of the bond.

In any case of contemplated withdrawal, the possibility of the entire Diocese not concurring in such withdrawal, must likewise be taken into account. It is certainly supposable that some congregations, and that individual members of many congregations might think it their right and duty to remain members of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States. These congregations and individual members might claim rights of property which could only be adjusted in the civil courts. And whatever might be the result of litigation, so far as property is concerned, there can be no doubt as to the effects upon moral and religious interests. Ill will and controversies, rending families, congregations and communities, so dishonoring to the Master's name, have always resulted from divisions in the Church, and perhaps always must result. These are facts which must always make Christian people slow to resort to separation, as a remedy, even for great evils. But such facts ought

not to make us deny that our Diocese has a right, under the great charter which Christ has given to the Catholic Church, to withdraw from union with the General Church, should evils become intolerable.

May that day never come, is the prayer of your Committee.

In examining the whole subject of Federal relations, it would have been impossible to pass by unnoticed so obvious an enquiry as that just considered, even had it not been expressly brought to the attention of the Committee (as it was) by the resolutions submitted to them. The examination has been conducted, in the dry light of ecclesiastical law. There has been no reference to the present state of opinion and feeling in the Church, except so far as was needed to illustrate legal principles. The conclusions reached have not been affected by sympathy with, or hostility to, any special opinions held, or any special objects, aimed at by individuals or classes of men, within the borders of our Church. But inasmuch as scarce anything can be stated in words, so clearly as to avoid the possibility of misunderstanding; your Committee would add that the right of withdrawal claimed for a Diocese, is only as a last resource, for the maintenance of those principles, to perpetuate which the union was formed. And furthermore that your Committee can find neither in the Constitution, nor in the constitutional compact, any warrant for withdrawal on the part of a Diocese, upon the ground that such Diocese may think it expedient changes should be made, which changes the General Church shall refuse to make in the Prayer Book adopted in 1789.

III. Your Committee is likewise instructed to report how far this Diocese "is to be governed by the acts and opinions of other ecclesiastical bodies, whether Anglican or American, whether of modern or former times."

The question as regards American ecclesiastical bodies having already been considered, it remains to inquire how far the "acts and opinions" of Anglican ecclesiastical bodies, ancient or modern, are binding upon this Diocese.

This Diocese, as an integral portion of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, has, in various ways, declared her entire independence of all such authority. The preface to the Book of Common Prayer declares, that when "these American States became independent with respect to civil government, their ecclesiastical independence was necessarily included, and the different religious denominations of Christians in these States were left at full and equal liberty to model

and organize their respective churches and forms of worship and discipline in such manner as they might judge most convenient for their future prosperity consistently with the Constitution and laws of their country."

All limitations upon the liberty of our Church, from "the acts or opinions" of any authority external to the country are hereby expressly repudiated.

The inheritance of doctrinal and liturgical treasures from the Church of England, and the gift from the same source of the Episcopal succession, did undoubtedly lay the Protestant Episcopal Church under the obligation of gratitude to the Mother Church. The assurances given by American churchmen to the Archbishop of Canterbury, that this branch of the Church was "far from intending to depart from the Church of England in any essential point of doctrine, discipline or worship, or further than local circumstances require," is a pledge which must always be remembered.

But a careful study of the formation of the Constitution will show that no act or opinion of the Church of England was considered binding on American soil, except in so far as established by the authority of the American Church. In harmony with all the early documents of the General Church is the solemn resolution of the Convention of the Church in Maryland in August 1783: "We consider it as the undoubted right of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in common with other Christian churches, under the American Revolution, to complete and preserve herself as an entire Church, agreeably to her ancient usages and professions, and to have the full enjoyment and free exercise of those purely spiritual powers which are essential to the being of every Church or congregation, and which being derived only from Christ and his Apostles, are to be maintained independent of every foreign and other jurisdiction, so far as may be consistent with the civil rights of society."

In accordance with this principle of entire independence, the General Convention of 1814 thinking it expedient, with a view to questions of property that had arisen, to declare "that the Protestant Episcopal Church in America is the same body heretofore known in these States by the name of the Church of England," was mindful to add: "But it would be contrary to fact for any one to infer that the discipline exercised in this Church, or that any proceedings therein, are at all de-

pendent on the will of the civil or ecclesiastical authority of any foreign country."

It has been maintained, we know by learned men, that an unascertained portion of English Canon law is binding upon the American Church; but your Committee, after weighing all that has been said in support of this view, are of opinion that it cannot be sustained. English Canons doubtless have been the source of usages, which usages may be regarded as an ecclesiastical common law; but the authority on which such common law rests is not the Canon to which it may be traced, but the fact of old established custom in this Church. So far as the Diocese of Virginia is concerned, we may be content to abide by the formal resolution of her Convention in 1785, which has never been revoked or gainsaid:

"Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Convention that the Canons of the Church of England have no obligation on the Protestant Episcopal Church in this Commonwealth,"

Upon the whole, your Committee would express, as the result of their examination of this part of their inquiry, the confident belief that although the "acts and opinions" of Anglican ecclesiastical bodies, ancient and modern, must always have a special interest and instructive value for the Diocese of Virginia, yet she is not to be governed by them, except in so far as they may be embodied in American Constitutions and Canons, or preserved in usages so old and general in this Church, as to have acquired the authority of customs. The binding sanction of such customs, it will be observed, is not at all to be referred to the foreign ecclesiastical body whose Canons may be historically connected with said customs, but exclusively to the authority of the American Church which allows or recognizes them.

Your Committee having been instructed to enquire and report, do not feel called upon to offer anything for adoption by this Council, but submit the conclusions to which their studies have led them upon the topics committed to them for examination.

For the fuller elucidation of the subject, your committee beg leave to append a succinct statement of principles, and likewise a brief historical view of Primitive Diocesan Episcopacy. These principles are either implied in, or recognized by the foregoing report, and the view of Di-

ocesan Episcopacy contained in the appended paper, is that which in this report is assumed as correct.

The Council met at 9 A. M. and was called to order by the Bishop, after prayer by Rev. Joseph Packard, D. D.

· The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The Bishop then read his Annual Address:

REPORT OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:

As required by Canon, I proceed to give, as briefly as possible, an account of the services performed by me during the past year.

1877, May 20.—In Trinity Church, Staunton, confirmed seventeen.

May 26.—St. John's, Spotsylvania, confirmed five.

May 27.—St. Margaret's, Caroline, confirmed three.

May 28.—Christ Church, Spotsylvania, confirmed three. These three churches enjoy the faithful ministrations of Rev. W. N. Ward.

June 2.—Merchant's Hope Church, Prince George county, confirmed four.

June 3.—St. John's, City Point, confirmed seven.

June 5.—Christ Church, Mathews, confirmed seven.

June 6.—Trinity, Mathews, confirmed three.

June 7.—Ware, Gloucester, confirmed seven, presented by Rev. Wm. Munford, the rector, Rev. Mr. Mann, having been confined to his house, by age and infirmity, for several months.

June 8.—Abingdon Church, Gloucester, confirmed nineteen.

June 9.—Grace, Yorktown, confirmed six, presented by Rev. A. Y. Hundley, who now ministers regularly to the congregation.

June 10.—In the morning preached in James City Chapel, and at night in Bruton Church, Williamsburg, and in the latter confirmed five. This Parish, then vacant, now has for its rector Rev. H. Wall, D. D.

June 12.—Mapsico Church, Charles City, confirmed two, and the next day in Westover Church, in the same Parish, confirmed three.

June 17.—Buckmountain Church, Albemarle, confirmed seven. In the afternoon of the same day, confirmed twelve in Christ Church, Charlottesville, of whom five were students from the University.

June 22.—In Grace Church, Alexandria, after sermon by Dr. Minnigerode, confirmed two.

June 23.—Christ Church, Alexandria, confirmed twelve.

June 24.—Assisted by Rev. Robt. F. Jackson, consecrated St. John's Church, Langley, Fairfax county, preached and confirmed three. That afternoon preached in Fall's Church, and at night, after sermon by Dr. Minnigerode in the Seminary Chapel, made an address and confirmed nine.

June 25.—St. Paul's, Alexandria, confirmed sixteen.

June 26.—In consequence of a storm, I failed to meet an appointment at St. John's Church, West End. Bishop Penick, at my request, confirmed one in Meade chapel (colored), Alexandria.

June 29.—In the Seminary chapel, after sermon by Bishop Penick, ordained eight persons deacons, and nine deacons priests.

July 8.—St. Peter's, New Kent, confirmed ten.

July 18.—In St. Andrew's, Richmond, after sermon by Rev. A. W. Weddell, confirmed seven.

July 22.—Preached morning and night in Grace Church, Berryville, and confirmed nineteen.

July 23.—Christ Church, Winchester, confirmed fifty-four. July 24.—Baptized a child of the rector, and preached in Christ Church, Millwood.

July 25.—In the Bishop Meade Memorial Church, White Post, confirmed six.

July 26.—St. Thomas', Middletown, confirmed five.

July 27.—Calvary, Front Royal, confirmed three.

July 29.—Consecrated St. Andrew's Church, Mt. Jackson. Rev. John K. Mason rector, who with Rev. Messrs. Wheat, Lea, Dorsey and Weddell, assisted in the services, the latter preaching the sermon. At night in the same Church, after sermon by Rev. A. W. Weddell, confirmed nine.

July 80.—Emmanuel Church, Harrisonburg, confirmed three.

August 8.—Preached in Mt. Zion Church, Hedgesville.

August 9.—Trinity, Martinsburg, confirmed eleven.

August 10.—Trinity, Shepherdstown, confirmed thirteen, one being colored.

August 11.—St. Bartholomew's, Leetown, confirmed one.

August 12.—Christ Church, Berkeley county, confirmed one.

August 13.—Preached in Grace Church, Middleway, Jefferson county.

August 14.—Zion Church, Charlestown, confirmed twenty-six.

August 15.—Consecrated St. John's Church, Ripon, Jefferson county, West Virginia, and preached. Revs. W. H. Meade, Leavell, Duncan, Lea, Wheat, and F. A. Meade, minister in charge, assisted in the services.

August 16.—After sermon by Rev. J. W. Lea, made an address, and confirmed six in Wickliffe Church, Clarke county. August 18.—Emmanuel, Middleburg, confirmed nine.

August 19.—Trinity, Upperville, confirmed three.

August 27.—Emmanuel, Amherst, confirmed four.

August 28.—Trinity, Bedford, confirmed nine.

August 29.—In St. Stephen's Church, Bedford, preached, ordained the minister in charge priest, and confirmed two. Rev. Messrs. Hanckel, Carson, and C. D. Walker, kindly assisted in the services. That night in St. John's, Liberty, confirmed fifteen.

August 30.—St. Thomas', Bedford, confirmed twelve.

August 31.—Preached in St. Mark's, Bedford.

September 1.—Preached in Christ Church, in the same county,

September 2.—In the morning confirmed five in St. John's Church, New River Depot, and in the afternoon fifteen in Emmanuel Church, Dublin, Pulaski county. These are new churches in a new field, where Rev. George S. Gibbs and his co-laborers, amidst many difficulties, have much to encourage them.

September 3.—Read prayers, preached and confirmed twelve in St. John's, Wytheville, the rector, Rev. G. W. Nelson, being unavoidably absent.

September 4 and 5.—Assisted by Rev. Mr. Gibbs. Services were held in Christ Church, Marion, Smyth county, and seven confirmed.

September 6.—St. Thomas, Abingdon, confirmed four.

September 7.—Emmanuel, Goodson, confirmed one.

September 9.—In the Agricultural College chapel, Blacksburg, ordained Rev. John McNabb to the priesthood, and confirmed four, of whom three were students of the college. I was assisted in the services by Revs. J. J. Norwood, G. S. Gibbs and N. P. Dame. At night confirmed three at Central depot, Montgomery county.

September 16.—Assisted by Rev. H. Suter and the rector, Rev. John R. Lee, I consecrated Trinity Church, Franklin C. H., and confirmed twenty-six. I think neither minister nor people expected to live to see such a day for our beloved

church at Rocky Mount, and there was great joy in that village.

September 19.—St. Paul's Church, Woodville, Rappahan-nock, confirmed five.

September 20.—Trinity, Washington, confirmed five.

September 21.—St. Johns, Amisville, confirmed one, and consecrated the plain, but very neat and comfortable, building, erected chiefly by the untiring efforts of one devoted woman and her husband, to the worship and service of God. Rev. J. G. Minnigerode kindly conveyed me through the county of Rappahannock, and, with the rector, Rev. E. W. Hubard, assisted in all the services.

From the 4th to the 31st October I was in Boston and New York, attending the General Convention and meetings of our evangelical societies.

November 7.—Calvary Church, Dinwiddie C. H., confirmed one, presented by Rev. Dr. Gibson, who officiates regularly here, in addition to his other abundant labors.

November 8.—Was prevented by rain from filling an appointment at Sapony Church.

November 9.—Confirmed five in Trinity Church, Brunswick, and baptized an infant.

November 10.—Preached in St. Luke's Church, Nottoway.

November 11.—In the Presbyterian Church, Nottoway C. H., which was kindly loaned us, our own building not being finished, confirmed two, presented by Rev. Mr. Sutton, deacon, who was regularly officiating here.

November 12.—Preached in St. Paul's, Lunenburg.

November 13.—In St. John's baptized a child of the rector and confirmed four.

November 18.—Old Church, Mecklenburg, confirmed five.

November 19.—St. Timothy's, Clarksville, confirmed five.

November 20.—St. James', Boydton, preached morning and night and confirmed twenty.

November 21.—In the county Poor House, confirmed six, two being colored. Here the indefatigable rector ministers

regularly to a good congregation, composed of inmates of the house and people of the neighborhood, for whose accommodation he is trying to build a chapel. He will be thankful for help from any quarter in this good work of preaching the gospel to the poor.

November 22.—Preached in St. Luke's Church, Mecklenburg.

November 23.—Had an appointment at St. Andrew's, but no congregation because of the rain.

November 25.—Preached in the morning to the white, and in the afternoon to the colored congregation in St. Andrew's, Lawrenceville, and confirmed five of the former, and three of the latter.

November 26.—In Sapony Church, Dinwiddie, confirmed five.

December 16.—Christ Church, Richmond, confirmed seven. December 18.—In St. Paul's, Richmond, assisted by Rev. Drs. Minnigerode and Peterkin, advanced Rev. C. C. Randolph to the priesthood. Sermon by Rev. Pike Powers.

December 30.—Consecrated St. Andrew's, a chapel of St. Paul's Church, Richmond, a beautiful frame building. Rev. Dr. Minnigerode rector, Rev. P. Powers assistant minister, and Rev. R. A. Gibson took part in the services, the sentence of consecration being read by Mr. George A. Barksdale.

1878, January 12.—Received notice of the intention of certain members of St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, to petition this Council that they be allowed to form a new congregation.

January 27.—Preached morning and night in St. James' Church, Warrenton, and confirmed thirteen.

January 28.—At night read prayers, and preached in Ascension Church, Amherst Court-house.

January 29.—Read prayers, and preached morning and night in the same Church; baptized two adults, and confirmed nine.

January 80.—Read prayers, baptized an infant and an

adult; preached and confirmed four in St. Mark's Church, New Glasgow. These two churches had been vacant for several months by the death of their beloved and lamented rector, Rev. Charles D. Walker.

February 9.—In St. Mark's, Richmond, advanced Rev. F. A. Meade to the priesthood. Rev. Mr. Barrett read the morning prayer, Mr. Dashiell preached, and Dr. Minnigerode presented the candidate.

February 11.—Received notice of a petition to be presented to this Council for the division of Overwharton Parish, Stafford county.

February 20.—In the morning preached in St. James', Brentsville, and in the afternoon in Trinity Church, Manassas.

February 21.—Preached at Clifton Station, Fairfax county.

February 22.—In St. John's, Centreville, confirmed four, and in Christ Church, Chantilly, three.

February 23.—In the Methodist Church, Herndon, Fairfax county, confirmed twenty.

February 24.—Confirmed in Zion Church, Fairfax Courthouse twenty-five, Falls eight, and in Christ Church, Alexandria, thirteen.

February 26.—In Christ Church, Winchester, confirmed forty, making ninety-four during the year.

March 3.—In St. John's Church, West End, Alexandria, advanced Rev. J. J. Lloyd and Rev. Henry S. Derby to the priesthood, and confirmed eight. Rev. K. Nelson and B. D. Tucker assisted in the services, the latter preaching the sermon and presenting the candidates. The same day confirmed eight in St. Paul's, and twenty-five in Grace Church, Alexandria.

March 8.—Grace, Petersburg, confirmed thirty-five.

March 9.—St. Paul's, Petersburg, confirmed nineteen.

March 10.—Confirmed in St. John's Church thirteen (three from Grace), in The Good Shepherd four, and in St. Stephen's (colored) eighteen.

March 18.—Preached in the Methodist Church, West Point, and confirmed two, presented by Rev. F. M. Baker.

March 16.—Preached in Trinity Church, Hanover.

March 17.—Preached morning and night in Fork Church, and confirmed twenty-three.

March 20.—In the Monumental Church, Richmond, at a Lent service of Rev. H. S. Kepler, (the rectorship being vacant by the death of the lamented Dr. Woodbridge), I baptized seven infants.

March 24.—Preached morning and night in St. John's Church, Halifax Courthouse, and confirmed twenty-five.

March 25.—In the morning in Grace Church, Halifax, confirmed seven, and at night in the Church of the Epiphany, Danville, confirmed ten.

March 27.—Preached in St. Luke's, Halifax, which has long been vacant.

March 30.—In St. Paul's Chapel, Berkeley, confirmed six.

March 31.—Confirmed in Christ Church, Norfolk, thirty, in St. Paul's ten, and in St. Luke's fourteen.

April 1.—In Emmanuel, Princess Anne, confirmed twenty-two.

April 2.—Eastern Shore Chapel, confirmed twelve. This Parish has wonderfully revived under the wise and faithful labors of Rev. Edwin A. Penick.

April 2.—At night preached in Emmanuel Chapel, Norfolk.

April 3.—In St. John's, Portsmouth, confirmed two,

April 4.—Was prevented by rain from filling an appointment at the Glebe Church, Nansemond.

April 5.—Confirmed five in St. John's and five in St. Paul's, Nansemond, one of the latter being from St. John's, Portsmouth.

April 6.—In the church of our Saviour, Ivor, Southampton, baptized an adult, and confirmed four.

April 7.—Consecrated St. Andrew's, Sussex county, preached and confirmed nine. Rev. Robb White, the faithful and acceptable missionary in charge, assisted in the services. At

night preached and confirmed four at Waverly in the same county. Here a very neat and substantial building has been purchased, which, at a small expense, can be made a nice church. Rev. Dr. Hains of Petersburg conducts regular monthly services, and is quite encouraged in his efforts to build up a congregation.

April 12.—St. George's, Fredericksburg, confirmed nineteen. The week before Easter visited the churches in Richmond, confirming as follows:

April 14.—St. Andrew's fifteen, St. James' twenty-two, and Moore Memorial five.

April 15-St. Mark's thirty-three.

April 16.—Grace twenty-four.

April 17.-Monumental fourteen, and baptized three adults.

April 18.—St. John's forty.

April 19.—St. Paul's, twenty-nine.

April 20.—Assisted by Rev. H. S. Kepler, F. Stringfellow, and P. M. Boyden, deacon in charge, consecrated St. Mary's Church in the lower end of Goochland county, and confirmed two.

April 21.—Easter Sunday preached and celebrated the Lord's supper in the same Church. This is a very neat and pretty building, in a destitute neighborhood where our Church is hardly known at all, and has been erected and paid for entirely through the persevering and untiring efforts of a lady of the congregation. May God honor her who has thus honored Him!

April 26.—In Trinity Staunton, confirmed twenty-three, one of them being colored.

April 28.—Grace, Lexington, confirmed eighteen.

April 30.—Christ Church, Charlottesville, confirmed eleven.

May 1.—St. Paul's, Albemarle, confirmed fifteen.

May 2.—In Emmanuel, confirmed seven.

May 8.—Trinity, confirmed two.

May 4.—Christ Church, Green Mountain, confirmed one.

May 5.—Assisted by the rector, Rev. T. E. Locke, conse-

crated St. John's Church, Scottsville, a very pretty building, and complete in all its arrangements. Six persons were confirmed.

May 12.—In the morning confirmed two in the Meade Memorial Church, Manchester, and at night in Christ Church, Richmond, nineteen.

May 14.—In St. Paul's, Lynchburg, confirmed sixteen.

May we so heed the warning that, when called to give account of our stewardship, we may be prepared to do it with joy, and not with grief.

There is no occasion for me to speak of the different benevolent and educational institutions of the Diocese, as their condition will be reported by their respective officers. I do, however, earnestly commend them to your continued confidence and support.

I am sorry to be obliged to say that I have not had time to attend to the request of the last Council conveyed in a resolution which was offered by a Committee on Church Schools, and which may be found on page 75 of the Journal, but hope to be able to do so hereafter.

By the last Council it was-

"Resolved, That \$1,000 from the Contingent Fund of the Diocese be placed at the Bishop's absolute disposal for the relief, at his discretion, of either missionaries or parochial clergy, whose stipends are inadequate to their support, and that of the expenditure of this amount no report to the Council be asked or expected."

I have discharged this delicate trust to the best of my ability, and have been the happy medium of helping to relieve the wants of twenty-one of my very poorly paid brethren of the clergy. I cannot consent to give no account of my stewardship in this matter, and therefore add the following:

Having at the bishop's request, examined vouchers which he submitted to me, I certify that he has expended the \$1,000 intrusted to him by the first resolution on page 84 of the Journal of 1877, as directed by said resolution.

The sum of \$2,000 was placed at my disposal, by resolution of the last Council, (Journal, page 75) "to be employed according to my judgment, to the support of evangelistic services or evangelists, to aid me in survey of the Parishes of the Diocese and promoting religious services in destitute places." In trying to carry out this resolution, I induced Rev. T. G. Dashiell to devote several weeks of last summer to missionary labors along the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, at points extending from Hinton to Huntington. The Rev. J. J. Norwood was

also appointed Evangelist for the year. He entered upon his duties the first of June, and has been since faithfully and acceptably laboring, chiefly in vacant parishes and at missionary points, and on the South side of James river, from Bristol on the Tennessee line, to Accomac on the Eastern Shore. But I have not been able to find another minister to do either temporary or permanent service. A report from Mr. Norwood will be published in the Journal. I trust it will be the pleasure of the Council to continue him in office, for I know of no man who is, in my judgment, better suited for his work. My account with the Evangelist Fund is herewith presented, from which it will be seen that there is the sum of \$1,470 remaining in my hands, a balance, however, of \$100 or more being still due Mr. Norwood. I ask that the account may be audited by a committee.

A more honorable support of the parochial clergy, and more liberal offerings to the work of missions, continue to be the great needs of our church. It will be seen that an unusually large number of ministers have left the Diocese during the past year, the one cause, in the large majority of cases, being the necessity which was laid upon them of providing a maintenance for themselves and their families.

Acting by the advice of the Executive Committee of our Diocesan Missionary Society, I have relinquished the aid which has, for a number of years, been so generously extended to us by the Domestic Committee of the Board of Missions. Larger contributions must therefore be made to our missionary treasury, or the committee cannot continue the work now going on, to say nothing of the impossibility of their sending forth laborers into the many new fields which are white for the harvest.

Those faithful and wise stewards, Bishops Meade and Johns, assisted in organizing the Evangelical Knowledge, the Evangelical Educational, and the American Church Missionary Societies, and repeatedly urged you to give them your cordial and liberal support. I would earnestly reiterate their commen-

dations of these societies, and ask for them the continued confidence and pecuniary help of the Diocese. They have done an incalculable amount of good in the past, for which we owe them a large debt of gratitude, but, in my judgment, at no time in the history of our Church has there been so great a necessity for their existence and work, as there is now. I would especially direct attention to what follows from the Executive Committee of the Evangelical Knowledge Society, for the reason which they mention.

"As there seems to be some misapprehension as to the present status and plans of the society, the Executive Committee beg leave to submit the following statement:

The society is not in debt, nor is it inactive. By reason of the embarrassments of its securities it has but little income besides the contributions of its friends; and owing to the impression that it had quite a large vested fund, and also that it was not as actively engaged in work as formerly, it has been thought that there was no special need of contributions to its treasury. The consequence is, that under the pressure of other claims but little has been received. With such means as the Committee have had at command, they have been engaged in putting into circulation, particularly among the clergy and theological students, various publications of the society and other works, selected with special reference to the more important questions now agitating our Church. Within a few weeks more than a thousand dollars' worth of such books has been distributed among individuals of the clergy and theological students.

The Committee have no wish to stir up unnecessary strife or provoke angry controversies, and thus break a true and loyal harmony among brethren; but they cannot shut their eyes to the errors which now assail and threaten to undermine the very foundations not only of our Protestant Church but of our common faith. To contend, and that earnestly, against these errors, is a plain duty which loyalty to the Church and

allegiance to Christ, the great Head of the Church, plainly and imperatively demand.

Will our brethren aid us in this work? A little effort on the part of the clergy and laity who sympathize with the Committee will supply all needed funds."

In his address to the Council of 1872, my venerated predecessor earnestly warned communicants against the inconsistency of indulging in "a demoralizing dissipation," which he denounced as "that lascivious mode of promiscuous dancing, styled the round dance."—"This scandal," he said, "is not to be tolerated in the Church of Christ. Let every appeal be made in the way of affectionate remonstrance, judicious teaching and earnest prayer for the reformation of those led astray, "if God peradventure will give them repentance." If all such efforts prove unavailing, and to remove the scandal, and at the same time employ the last expedient for awakening the offender to a sense of his sin and danger, it becomes necessary to resort to the exercise of decided discipline it must be done." I adopt this language as my own, that he being dead may yet speak on this important matter. Perhaps his words struck some as being too strong and harsh when they were first uttered, who think very differently now after six years' observation and experience. Certain it is, that many of our wisest and best people, ministers and laymen, judging the tree by its fruit, have become alarmed lest the effect of this dreadful evil of round dancing shall be not only to injure pure and undefiled religion in the Church, but even to sap the very foundations of all social virtue and morality. I will not discuss its character and consequences. For while St. Paul wrote to the Church in Ephesus that it was a shame even to speak of those things which were done by some in secret, I should feel ashamed even to speak, as the truth would require, of this thing which is done openly before all. I will only say, that I trust no man or woman will be presented for confirmation who means to continue to participate in this abomination. And if the ministers

of the Church have no authority to discipline communicants as "notorious evil livers" who practice it, surely this Council should not fail to clothe them with such authority by Canon.

The action of the last Council in cutting off the State of West Virginia from the Diocese of Virginia and erecting it into a separate Diocese, was ratified by the General Conven-The primary council tion which sat in Boston last October. of the new Diocese was convened in Charleston on the 5th day of December 1877, and was duly organized as "The Diocese of West Virginia." I having elected to be attached to the Diocese of Virginia, the Diocese of West Virginia was placed by its Council under my "full episcopal charge and authority," and has so continued to the present time. The Rev. Jas. H. Eccleston, D. D. was elected bishop, but he having declined to accept, the first annual Council met in Charlestown, 27th February, 1878, and made choice of Rev. George W. Peterkin for that important and responsible office, a result in which, I am sure, the church in Virginia greatly rejoices. His consecration is appointed to take place in the city of Wheeling on the 30th instant, after which the complete establishment of the new Diocese will have been consummated. I recommend that this Council appoint a committee to confer with one which has been appointed by West Virginia, to consider any pecuniary or other questions between the two Dioceses which may need to be settled.

I owe it to you, my dear brethren, and to myself, to say that I have been enabled, by the help of God, to accomplish an amount of visitation work during the past year greater than ought to be expected of any man, and greater than I can promise to perform in the future. I feel able to do all that is necessary, in my judgment, for the interest of religion and the growth and prosperity of the Church, and more than all that is required of me by the Canons. I do not, therefore, ask for any relief or assistance. But whether what I have done has been, or what I may be able to do hereafter will be, satisfactory to the Diocese, it is for you to decide. If a more fre-

quent visitation of the churches is demanded, there is but one of two ways, as you are aware, by which it can be secured,viz, either by another division of the Diocese, or by the election of an assistant bishop. As to the first, I am convinced that a large majority of the people on the south side of James river are utterly opposed to the cutting off of that part of the State as a separate Diocese; and my opinion is, that a large majority of the people of Virginia are opposed to any division whatever. From the measure of division, therefore, with my convictions, I should feel obliged in conscience to withhold my consent. As to the other method of relief, I will merely say. without at all discusisng the question, that so far from being able to see any objection to an assistant bishop, it is just what, in my judgment, this Diocese and many other Dioceses ought always to have. With this candid, and, I trust, plain, statement of my views on this subject, I leave it to you to do something or nothing as you may think best.

In closing this, my tenth annual address, I beg to be permitted to put on record an expression of my very deep and grateful sense of the unvarying forbearance, confidence and kindness which I have received at the hands of my beloved brethren, the clergy and laity of this dear old Diocese of Virginia. May God, by his Holy Spirit, direct, sanctify, and govern you in your present work; and may he abundantly bless you and those whom you represent, both now and ever more, through Jesus Christ his Son.—Amen.

Of this number twenty-five have already paid the full amount subscribed, and some more than was promised. As the year does not close until July 1, it may be supposed that the remainder will be paid by that time.

The Committee regret that there was so much misunderstanding about the pledge system, as proposed last year, as to deter some from acquiescing in the plan. All that was meant was that the attempt should be made to raise a certain sum. It was supposed that every one would know what was the minimum sum he could properly pledge, and if he failed to raise so much, then it would be inferred that unforeseen causes, or such as were beyond his control, had prevented, and no imputation or blame would be cast upon him. The sole design of the Committee was to enable them to form some approximate idea of what they might expect to receive for the support of the missionaries, so that they might be guided both as to the number that might be employed and the compensation that might be safely promised them. The word "pledge" was used in the sense of a conditional promise. It was not meant that any personal liability should attach to one making such a promise, and if he fell short, in the judgment of Christian charity, it

was to be concluded that he found himself unable to do as much as he expected.

The Committee still think it the best and most reliable system they have yet been able to devise, and earnestly recommend it for general adoption.

It is proper to mention that a new edition of the Mission Prayer Book has been prepared and will soon be published. It will contain full morning and evening prayer, and will be somewhat changed in the Hymnal.

The Committee would remind the Council that as the Diocese of Virginia has declined to receive in future the assistance which the Domestic Committee has so kindly given for some years past in aid of her Diocesan Missions, and which last year was \$500, there will be a corresponding need on the part of the Diocese to increase the contributions to the Diocesan Society by at least that sum.

In accordance with the resolution of the Committee to send delegates to the convocations, in response to the cordial invitations of those bodies to do so, different members of the Committee have, at various times during the year, attended the regular meetings of those organizations, and presented the cause and claims of the society.

And in this connection it should be mentioned that the Petersburg convocation having brought before this committee the draft of a Canon for organizing the Diocese into convocational districts, the Committee is of the opinion that this is a subject worthy of the serious consideration of the Council.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel moved that the report of the Diocesan Missionary Society be made the special order for this afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Rev. T. G. Dashiell moved in amendment that the order of business be suspended, and that we now proceed to discuss the report of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Amendment lost, and the motion of Dr. Hanckel carried.

Rev. W. N. Ward presented a petition from Trinity Church, Fredericksburg, for recognition as a separate Parish.

Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergy.

On motion, it was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the following report from the Board of Managers of the fund for relief of widows and orphans of deceased clergy:

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia respectfully present their report for the year ending May 15th, 1878. The treasurer's statement shows that we have now on hand for distribution only the sum of \$1,259.70. The total assets, including distributable income, being \$25,060.36.

The number of churches that have contributed the past year to the fund has been only ten, and the amount contributed \$272.73. The Board having determined to meet in Richmond on the 25th of this month, thought best to postpone the appropriation of their annual income until that meeting.

The action of the last Council in electing new members into the Board, without rescinding the rule already adopted to elect them every three years, was regarded by the Board as an inadvertence, to which it was only necessary to call the attention of the Council to obtain a speedy remedy. The present being the year in which, according to the standing rule, the clerical members of the Board are to be re-elected, the Board would respectfully call the attention of the Council to an important question which it is necessary to settle before that election shall take place. It was therefore

Resolved, That the Secretary be requested to call the attention of the Council to the rule of the Board requiring the clerical members of the Board to be resident, and officiating at least five years within the Diocese, and to ask their judgment and action thereon.

The Council will observe that the election of these members of the Board involves the question whether the Diocese of West Virginia shall be allowed a representation in the Board and a share in the benefits of the fund. The judgment of the Council upon the present Constitution of the members of the Board and their action thereon is respectfully requested.

Pederal Beletions.

By request of the Committee on Federal Relations, Rev. Dr. Hanckel presented the following:

ON DIOCESAN AUTONOMY AND FEDERAL RELATIONS.

Our Ordinal avers: "It is evident unto all men diligently reading Holy Scripture and ancient authors, that from the Apostle's time there have been three orders of ministers in Christ's Church, bishops, priests and deacons." These three orders of ministers, with "the brethren" or laity, constitute a complete ecclesiastical unit (Integer or Diocese). Of any other constituent element of such a unit no mention is made either in the Acts of the Apostles or in their Epistles, or (as especially relating to the subject) in the pastoral epistles of St. Paul.

In the first Council at Jerusalem these elements and these only occur: "The Apostles and Elders with the whole Church," and again the "Apostles and Elders and Brethren." Acts xv, 22, 23.

In the two Epistles to Timothy, and in that to Titus, each of them is assigned to the chief pastorate of a particular Diocese. Timothy "at Ephesus;" Titus "in Crete." 1 Timothy i, 3; Titus i, 5.

In the addresses to the seven churches of Asia (in the Apocalypse), "the angel" or bishops of each (and jointly with him the whole company of believers committed to his charge) is either rebuked or commended as an independent ecclesiastical unit, each bishop (with his charge) being held responsible for the conservation in their purity of Christian faith and practice.

But this deposit of faith and practice, which was committed to each bishop and his Diocese in severally, was also the joint charge of the whole College of Bishops and their Dioceses—the Church thus constituted being the divinely ordained "pillar and ground of the truth." Uniformity of teaching and usage was of course of prime importance to avert confusion and promote edification. Hence although himself the recipient of a special revelation, we find St. Paul repairing "to Jerusalem to communicate that gospel which he preached among the Gentiles, but privately to them of reputation." Galatians i, 12; Galatians ii, 2.

And when the question of the obligation to keep the Ceremonial law arose and began to trouble the churches among the Gentiles, "we find it made the subject of a special consultation in the first Council at Jerusalem."

Still as each and all were under solemn obligation to "contend for

the faith once delivered to the Saints"—supposing Christian faith denied or Christian practice infringed—to preserve that faith and practice inviolate was the imperative duty of each to whom it was committed. So that if needful (as was done by St. Paul) a Peter was to be "withstood to the face" (Galatians ii, 11), and "an angel from heaven who preached any other gospel was to be held accursed." Galatians i, 8.

The truth of God denied or compromised, another principle and rule of conduct came into play and under the original commission of the Master ("Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel"), that "whole world" became the jurisdiction of that bishop and his charge, who still held the faith.

To these clearly established principles of Apostolic Church organization and administration (contemplating as they did both Diocesan autonomy and Federal relations), as continuing to be the recognized principles of the post apostolic age (Bingham's Antiquities, book ii, chapters v and vi; book xiii, chapter v), Bingham, and a host of other authorities, bear ample testimony. The last principle, for instance, was signally illustrated, and its necessity shown in the case of Athanasius at the period of the Arian apostasy.

Of synodical union of Dioceses (as of apostolic and therefore permanent institution) no evidence can be traced in Scripture and in the age immediately succeeding the apostolic synodical union of Dioceses, in the modern sense, was unknown. Synods (and they were few), whether provincial or (so called) general, were not then as now stated and periodical, but occasional only, the products of exigencies in the Church for the settlement of the faith when disputed or denied, or for its clearer definition.

All distribution or grouping of Dioceses (which gradually arose), whether metropolitan, provincial, patriarchal or national, were of purely human origination and contrivance, the result of mutual agreement for convenience of administration, or else imposed by civil authority. Even under the overshadowing influence of the Roman See, and despite the encroachments and usurpations of successive pontiffs, aided and abetted by various causes and agencies (which need not be mentioned here), the original idea of Diocesan independence, for all purposes of intra Diocesan administration (e. g. of liturgy and worship), continued to be cherished and contended for throughout by far the greater part of Christendom (and especially in the west, in the Gallican and Anglican churches), during what has since been designated and

known as the mediæval period. The violent contests between emperors and kings on the one hand, and successive popes on the other, over the right of investiture, fully attests this; while in the case of England the various statutes of Præmunire, from Edward I to Edward VI (Henry VIII inclusive), show how determined was the resistance made to Papal intrusion into Diocesan organization and administration. (See Leelie's case of the Regale and Pontificate, stated, and Barrow on the Supremacy of the Pope.) Diocesan Episcopacy, though ground to powder in many parts and times, between the upper and the nether millstones of the Regale and the Pontificate, did, nevertheless, in many other places and periods continue to struggle and assert its right, offering as it did the one divinely ordained bulwark against popish aggression.

With this cursory glance at "former times," to which the attention of your committee was in part directed, we reach the period of the Anglican reformation.

In the Church of England (from which the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States is sprung) and at the period of the reformation we find the idea of Diocesan autonomy in full vigor. statutes of Præmunire (with severe penalties annexed) which continued to be enforced and re-enacted show this. Nor these alone. It is even more conclusively shown by the prevalence of various uses (as they were called) or modes of worship, bearing the names of the several Dioceses by which they were adopted. Thus in the preface to the books of Edward VI it is said, "Where heretofore there hath been great diversity in saying and singing in churches within this realm, some following Salisbury use, some Hereford use, and some the use of Bangor, some of York, some of Lincoln. Now all the whole realm shall have but one use." Even under this first act of uniformity original Diocesan autonomy is recognized. When "for the resolution of all doubts as to how to understand, do and execute the things contained in this book, the parties are charged to resort to the Bishop of the Diocese, who, by his discretion, shall take order for the quieting of the same."

Thus was inaugurated under Edward VI (the first Protestant King), for weal or woe, a new era in Diocesan administration, at least in the matter of liturgical order and use.

Under the jurisdiction of one of the Anglican bishops (of London) the several branches of the Church of England, planted in the several American colonies, were placed the liturgy and laws of that Church,

becoming the liturgy and laws of the same Church in these United States.

When at the period of revolution, ending in our national independence, the jurisdiction of the Bishop of London was brought to an abrupt close, it is simply marvelous how universal and absolutely undisputed were the ideas of State lines as the proper limits of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, and of the absolute independence of each Diocese as defined by such civil boundaries. (See Perry's Historical Notes and Documents, volume III, passim.) Almost countless expressions of individual opinion to this effect might be cited, but we prefer to cite acts only, as actions speak louder even than words. Conspicuous among such acts stands the wholly independent procedure of Connecticut in electing her own bishops, and without consulting her sister Dioceses, securing his consecration by Scottish (nonjuring) bishops; and yet further, her long continued, persistent and perfectly unyielding assertion of her own absolute Diocesan independence and autonomy.

Similar, although less extreme acts and assertions of independence might be adduced in the cases of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, South Carolina, a part of Massachusetts and Rhode Island, and subsequently New Hampshire, severally or jointly in associate Council. (See Perry, volume III.)

The great importance of securing uniformity of faith and worship for our entire communion in the United States alone induced any of these Dioceses to waive even in part the practical assertion of their independence, and to enter into any Articles of Confederation.

In the very act, however, of so confederating, and in the Articles of Confederation themselves, the pre-existing, separate and independent organization of the several Dioceses was fully and expressly recognized, and the continuance of such independence was provided for, except (and except only) so far as such independence was limited by the transfer of delegated powers to a General Convention of the confederating Dioceses. That General Convention was and still is the freely constituted creature of the several independent Dioceses, and not the Dioceses of the General Convention. In well nigh (if not quite) all the associating Dioceses previous conventional action was had, instructing their deputies to enter into such a general organization as was projected on certain specified conditions, and (with what might to some seem superabundant caution) expressly reserving the right to revise (for final and

decisive approval or disapproval) the acts of their deputies, and of the associating Dioceses in General Convention assembled.

We might adduce in evidence of this the action of New York, Maryland, Connecticut and Virginia. But for our purposes that of Virginia will suffice.

At the Convention, consisting of thirty-six (36) clergymen, and upwards of seventy (70) laymen, held in Richmond May, 1785, it was

Resolved, That the instructions to the deputies, appointed to represent the Protestant Episcopal Church of Virginia in the General Convention, be so framed as to leave the Convention of this State at liberty to approve or disapprove the proceedings of the General Convention.

With her original, inherent and inalienable independence and right of self-government—resting as that right does upon scriptural authority and precedent—sustained as that right is by primitive and Anglican and American conception and usage—the Diocese of Virginia would not part. She could not have done so without proving derelict to her duty as a scripturally constituted unit of the Church universal. This action of her Convention, in 1785, conclusively attests that in entering into confederation with her sister Dioceses, Virginia did not and had no intention to relinquish such inherent right of self-government, but expressly reserved the same.

But while all this is true, it was still competent for Virginia to decide within what limits she could continue the practical exercise of her scripturally vested autonomy, and how far she should waive such inherent right to secure common legislation for our entire household of faith. This decision Virginia entrusted, in the first instance, to her deputies to the General Convention of 1785, subject, however, to revisal, for approval or disapproval by her own Diocesan Council.

We come therefore to the several questions of surrendered rights propounded by the last Council.

1. First, as to the right of withdrawal without consent of her sister Dioceses. Having voluntarily, as a scripturally constituted Diocese, entered into a limited confederation—of delegated powers, and of delegated powers only—it would be clearly competent for Virginia to withdraw upon sufficient cause, given and shown, and in the exercise of her godly discretion. Nay, it might even become her sad and solemn duty to withdraw, e. g., upon a departure from some essential of the faith, or the imposition of a sinful term of communion. One or either

of these would constitute a justifying cause of withdrawal, and Virginia would stand clear of the imputation of schism. Other justifying cause or causes may be conceived, but need not be enumerated, since variations in non-essentials of government and usage, even in the judgment of such churchmen as Seabury and Parker (not to cite a long list of other and greater names) are not inconsistent with essential union.

Still, your committee cannot but hold that no such cause has yet been given, nor as we confidently hope and trust, will be given. Such isolation in Christendom as withdrawal from the now existing union of Dioceses would involve (a union effected with so much difficulty, and with such happy results), is no inconsiderable evil, and can only be entertained for a moment in contrast with yet greater evils. It would be fraught with countless and incalculable inconveniences of administration, with such deplorable curtailment of privilege, with such narrowing of Christian sympathy, and of corporate life, with such forfeiture of influence for Christ and his cause, and with such exposure to the very evils, in as great or greater measure, from which relief was thereby sought, withdrawal is to be greatly deprecated for our own sake, and for the sake of our children, and our children's children. The inherent right is indisputable, while its practical exercise might, and in our position would, be little short of suicidal. In this however your committee simply give their own judgment, subject to modification or change as occasion may possibly, but not probably arise.

2. On the 2nd question of surrendered right, your Committee hold that each Diocese, on entering into the confederation, (and therefore Virginia,) did surrender the right of having the bishop whom they might elect consecrated without the assent of a majority of the House of Bishops, and of the Standing Committees, during the recess of the General Convention. The wording of the Canon admits of no other possible construction, and with reason—

Firstly, Bishops should have the right of judging of the fitness of members of their own House; Secondly, Because every bishop, as a member of the House of Bishops, becomes "ex officio" a life long legislator for the Church at large—and, if that Church at large have no voice in his elevation to the Episcopate, we have "quoad hoc" legislation without representation; Thirdly, If Virginia be thereby held in check, she in turn holds in check her sister Dioceses; Fourthly, Your committee deem the safeguards not one whit too stringent against the elevation to the Episcopate of the whole Church, (and therefore of

Virginia in part) of improper persons, whether on moral or doctrinal grounds.

3. To the third question of surrendered rights (if they rightly apprehend it) your Committee must give a qualified response.

Upon strictly intra Diocesan legislation, no restrictions are set by the Constitution and Canons of the General Church. The Constitution and Canons do however define, what are, and what are not, strictly intra Diocesan matters of legislation, and provide for such legislation only by the General Convention as affects the Church at large. In such legislation Virginia has her proportionate voice through her deputies to the General Convention.

- 4. In regard to the liturgy and other standards, as embodied in the Book of Common Prayer, we have only to note that according to Art. 8th, they are adopted by each and every Diocese in adopting the Constitution itself. But in complying with this article Virginia has a right to expect compliance therewith by her sister Dioceses, else uniformity in worship (the great aim and motive of union) is not secured, and the compact is broken and void.
- 5. Neither this, nor any other, part of the great compact, or charter of union, can be altered by Virginia, or any other Diocese acting apart, but only in concert with her sister Dioceses, as prescribed by Art. 9 of the Constitution. Virginia else would undertake to legislate for her sister Dioceses without their concurrence.

In conclusion, so far, and so far only, as the Diocese of Virginia has delegated any powers to the central ecclesiastical legislature (the General Convention) has she parted, for a definite purpose, and, if need be, only for a time, with her original inherent right of self-government.

Beyond these expressly defined limits "she is committed to be governed by no acts or opinions of other eccleaiastical bodies, whether Anglican or American, of modern or of former times," but remains in full possession of her rights as a duly constituted unit in the Church universal, whose powers are defined in Articles XX and XXXIV of the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion.

In behalf of the same committee, Mr. R. T. Craighill read the following:

In conclusion, your committee submit the following summary of their

Federal Relations.

views on the subject of "the Federal Relations" of this Diocese to the General Church in the United States.

- 1. The Protestant Episcopal Church, deriving its doctrine, discipline and worship from the mother Church of England, existed in the Colonies and States, prior to the adoption of the Constitution of 1789; and, although Diocesan in form, it was the same Catholic and Apostolic Church in each and all of said Colonies and States, with the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England as its bond of union, and with the Bishop of London as its Episcopal head; and it so continued, until "the States became independent with respect to civil government," and the external tie that united it to the Church of England was severed.
- 2. And, thereupon, as each State was recognized as sovereign and independent of the others, although all were pervaded by the same common principles of liberty and free government, as expressed in their Bills of Rights, and, as the States so continued until the Federal Union was formed, so the Dioceses, as integral parts of the same Catholic and Apostolic Church, although bound together in the unity of the same faith, continued to exist in their primitive and independent forms and modes of government, until the General Constitution was adopted in 1789.
- 3. That apprehensions, similar to those which induced the people of the several States to desire and ultimately to bring about "a more perfect union," in order to secure "the common defence and general welfare," caused the members of the Church in the separate Dioceses "to take into consideration the importance of maintaining uniformity in the doctrine, discipline and worship of the said Church," that is, of the same Catholic and Apostolic Church, which followed or was derived by them from the mother country; this purpose having been clearly announced in the preamble to the Constitution, which was proposed by delegates from Virginia and other Dioceses, assembled in Convention at Philadelphia in June 1786.
- 4. That the object, thus announced, and so earnestly desired by the fathers of the American Church, was finally accomplished by the adoption of the Constitution of 1789; by which the same Catholic and Apostolic Church, in this country, was recognized to be, and designated as "The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America;" and, thereupon, it became, in form, a National Church; and, so long as the said Constitution remains in force, the doctrine, discipline

and worship, ordained and established in pursuance thereof, must be uniform in all the Dioceses; must be beyond the control of the Dioceses and subject to alteration only in the mode prescribed by the Constitution itself.

- 5. That notwithstanding this compact by the Church, in its parts, made to secure uniformity in doctrine, discipline and worship to the Church, in its entirety, the Dioceses are not lost or merged into one consolidated organization, but are recognized in the compact itself as the true sources of its own powers, and as entitled to all the rights, powers and privileges pertaining to primitive Dioceses, except so far as the same may be inconsistent with the aforesaid purpose of ecclesiastical union, or are denied to them, either expressly or by necessary implication, by the Constitution itself.
- 6. That the body, thus organized under said Constitution, having, by the concurrent action and consent of the Dioceses, become the true, legal and Constitutional "Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America," adherence to the doctrine, discipline and worship of which, constitutes the sole test of the membership and ministry thereof, it follows, that no Diocese can, without first withdrawing from this ecclesiastical union, rightfully exercise any of the powers pertaining to this Church, which are conferred upon the General Convention by express grant, or by plain implication, or which are denied to the Dioceses or to the bishops and Councils thereof, by the Constitution itself.
- 7. That in view of the sacred obligations upon the Dioceses, arising out of their concurrent action, in forming it, and implied in the compact itself, and of the peril to the Church and the cause of religion involved, nothing could justify withdrawal from said ecclesiastical union, or, the taking of any steps to that end, but, the ultima ratio, which underlies all supreme necessities in Church and State; and which, as an inalienable, reserved right, should be appealed to ONLY for the preservation of vital principles, put in grave and imminent peril, by the power, to which allegiance is due under the compact of government.

Your Committee, appointed at the last Council to consider the matter of the Contingent Fund, respectfully ask that they may be continued for another year, to enable them to obtain further information from the experience of other Dioceses as to the mode of raising the Contingent Fund, and they recommend that, in the meantime, the assessment be reduced to seventy-five cents per capita in lieu of one dollar as heretofore.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel called for a division of the question.

The Committee was continued.

The recommendation to reduce the assessment was withdrawn.

Mr. L. M. Blackford moved to amend the seventh rule of order so as to read as follows:

A motion to adjourn or to lay on the table shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

Carried.

Rev. James W. Shields presented a petition for recognizing a new Parish in Stafford county, and moved its reference to the Committee on New Parishes.

Carried.

Rev. Geo. S. Gibbs presented a petition from St. John's Church, Pulaski county, and moved its reference to the Committee on New Parishes.

Carried.

Rev. R. J. McBryde moved that the next session of the Council be held in St. George's Church, Fredericksburg.

Carried unanimously.

Rev. Thomas Spencer presented the report of the Trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School:

The Trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School beg leave to report that the Institutions under their care have enjoyed another year of prosperity. The whole number of students in the seminary is forty-three, viz:

Considering the fact that there are fourteen divinity and training schools in our Church this number of students is encouraging. The character of the students and their diligence is likewise encouraging. A particular account of the several classes will be found in the annexed reports of the professors.

The High School continues to maintain its rank among the boys schools of the country, and it is pleasing to see that this estimate of its value is conceded by competent judges in all parts of the country.

Theological Seminary and High School.

The professor of Biblical Learning respectfully reports to the trustees, that the classes under his instruction have pursued the usual course of study with commendable diligence and success.

The Senior class have continued the study of Hebrew, reading about twenty chapters in the latter part of Isaiah; and in the Greek of the New Testament, they have studied critically the two Epistles to the Corinthians and the Epistle to the Galatians.

The Middle class have studied the prophecies of Christ, and in addition several of the Psalms in Hebrew, and in Greek the Epistles to the Romans, Hebrews and Galatians.

The Junior class have reviewed the Hebrew Grammar repeatedly, with written exercises, and read about twenty-four chapters in Hebrew. In the Greek they have finished the exegetical study of the Gospel of St. John. They have read two or three times a week essays on the most important and difficult subjects in the Gospels.

Board of Trustees of Theological Seminary of Virginia:

I would respectfully report that the classes during the current session have pursued their usual course of studies.

The Senior class has studied Burnet and are now reviewing. It has also had the usual course in Liturgics, with instruction and exercises in Homiletics. The Middle class has studied Knapp's Theology, with a weekly recitation in the English New Testament; and the Primary have studied the two works, "Chadbourne's Natural Theology" and "Hopkins' Outline Man," mentioned in the report of last year. I would suggest that these be adopted for regular use.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

During the past year I have given instruction to the Senior Class in Church Polity:—1st, in the use of the Text-book, Hooker's Laws of Eccleiastical Polity—the third, the fifth, and the seventh book; and 2d, in the form of lectures, embracing a full course on The Church, its nature, attributes, notes; and on the Ministry, its origin, constitution, powers, and perpetuation.

The course of study in APOLOGETICS has been continued and closed by the Middle Class in the use of LUTHARDT'S Fundamental Truths of Christianity as a Text-book.

Theological Seminary and High School,

In the same department I have read two courses of lectures to the Junior Class—first, as introductory to the Text-book, and second, as supplementary to it—the latter being devoted to the consideration of modern objections to the Christian revelation.

The several classes have given satisfactory evidence of diligence in study, and the regularity of their attendance in the class room merits special commendation.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Church History and Canon Law respectfully reports as follows:

The Senior Class has studied, with four recitations a week, the History of the Church of England, and also the History of the American Church; the Pastoral Epistles in Greek; and Meade on the Pastoral Office. They are now engaged with the Constitution and Canons of the Church.

The Middle Class, with three recitations a week, and regular essays, has studied Kurtz's Church History.

The Juniors, with three and often five recitations a week, and reading three essays a week, have studied Dr. Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and read the Acts of the Apostles in Greek.

The Senior Preparatory Class has recited to me four times a week in Greek Grammar and translation.

Rt. Rev. And Dear Sir:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School, I have the honor to submit the following report:

The aggregate number of boys, including eight day scholars, received during the current session is eighty-three; the maximum attendance eighty. The latter is the largest since the war. * * * The health of the school has been particularly good, not a single case of serious sickness having occurred, and little of any kind. * * * Since my

last report two important additions to the equipment of the school have been completed. I have erected and furnished suitably a *Gymnasium*, which is believed to be the best in the State. * * * Besides the Gymnasium, a *Skating Pond*, by joint subscription of boys and masters, has been constructed on the school premises, at a cost of several hundred dollars.

The ordinary religious exercises of the school have varied but little from last year. Greater attention has been paid to music, and increased interest excited in it as a consequence of the systematic training of the school choir by an accomplished musician engaged for the purpose. Our daily morning devotions, always begun with a hymn, are marked by the use of the Psalter thrice and a brief Litany (prepared for schools by Bishop Whittingham) twice in the week, with suitable variation on holy days. The endeavor to emphasize and improve all the Christian seasons has been constant. During Lent a special Litany service in the School Chapel at noon on Fridays was well attended, and the daily instructions during Passion week (in the shape this year of extracts from Farrar's Life of Christ) seemed never better heeded. * * The Rev. W. M. Dame, of Alexandria, and the Rev. Prof. K. Nelson, of the Theological Seminary, have continued their invaluable assistance, each giving at the school one regular Sunday service a month. Besides this, Mr. Nelson held one each Tuesday evening in Lent. * * * Mr. Frank Page, of the Senior class in the Seminary, has continued to conduct with great acceptance the Friday night devotional meeting. To him, as to the clergymen named, my warmest thanks are due. * * * The number of communicants among the boys is twenty-seven.

Rev. Dr. Minnigerode moved their reference to a special committee of three. Carried, and the following committee appointed, Rev. O. A. Kinsolving, Col. J. M. Patton, and Mr. J. M. Whittle.

Rev. Dr. Minnigerode from the Committee on New Parishes, reported the following which was adopted:

The Committee on New Parishes, to which was referred the petition of Trinity Church, Fredericksburg, for admission into the Diocese, have examined the papers, and find that they meet all the requirements of Canons 11 and 12. They therefore move, that Trinity Church, Fredericksburg, be hereby admitted into the Diocese.

Mr. Taylor Berry gave notice of a proposed amendment to section 6 of Canon IX, to be offered by him to-morrow.

Mr. William V. Jordan presented the following:

Resolved, That this Council, in view of the alarming increase of intemperate drinking within as well as without the Church, reaffirms the fourth resolution reported from the Committee on the Subject of Temperance, and adopted by the Council of this Church at the session in 1876, which is in these words: "That the laity be earnestly exhorted to consider the evil tendencies to themselves of social drinking, especially in public places, and the consequences resulting to others from the influence of their example."

Resolved, That the clergy of this Church are urged to be more earnest in their efforts in putting a stop to this evil habit in the Church, and the laity are earnestly and affectionately exhorted to use their influence to sustain their pastors in legitimate means used by them to purify the Church from the shameful practice.

The resolution was adopted.

Rev. G. W. Dame offered the following:

Resolved, That in compliance with the bishop's request, a committee of three be appointed to confer with the delegation of West Virginia in reference to the property questions that may come between the Dioceses.

The resolution was adopted, and the following committee was appointed: Rev. G. W. Dame, Mr. Charles M. Blackford and Mr. D. N. Walker.

Diocese of West Virginia.

Rev. Dr. Gibson offered the following, and moved its reference to the above Committee on Conference:

Whereas, the prosperity of the clergy and laity of the Diocese of West Virginia must ever be a cherished object of desire to their brethren, the clergy and laity of this Diocese, this Council feel it their duty to extend as liberal a measure of nursing care and protection as is consistent with a due regard to her own necessary interests; therefore,

Resolved, That the clergy and laity of the Diocese of West Virginia be entitled to the benefit of all the charitable Missionary Funds now sustained by this Diocese, and that the trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School of Virginia be requested to provide for a representation of the said Diocese in their Board.

The motion was so referred.

Rev. E. V. Jones presented the following, and moved its reference to a committee to report to this Council:

To the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Virginia:

At the Fall Session of the Petersburg Convocation, held at Nottoway Courthouse, in November, 1877, a Committee was appointed to consider the feasibility of applying to the Diocesan Council for such canonical recognition of the convocations as would render them more efficient in their work, and more thoroughly identify them with the work of our Diocesan Missionary Society. At the spring session, held at Hampton, in April, 1878, the accompanying report was presented by that committee and the following resolutions adopted concerning it:

Resolved, That this convocation approve this report, and commend some such measure as it advises to the serious consideration of the clergy and laity of the Diocese of Virginia.

Resolved, That a copy of this report be sent to the bishop and to the president of each convocation, and published in the Southern Churchman.

REPORT.

The committee appointed by the Petersburg Convocation at its last meeting, to whom the expediency of dividing the Diocese of Virginia into convocation districts by the Council, was referred, begs leave to submit the following report:

Convocations.

Although the Diocese is now well embraced by voluntary convocations, your committee believe that a more formal division into canonical organizations so constituted as to include its whole territory with all its ministers would contribute far more to the extension of the Church and its rapid and symmetrical growth. We therefore earnestly recommend the apportionment of the Diocese into definite Convocational Districts. having such metes and bounds as are hereinafter suggested or as the Council may prescribe. We further recommend that each convocation thus organized by Canon, be represented by a clerical and lay delegate in all the meetings of the Diocesan Missionary Committee. While including all the possible advantages of our present voluntary system, convocations thus sanctioned by the Council itself, and invested with such authority as it might see fit to confer, would be rendered not only more efficient in their local operations, but become valuable auxiliaries of the Diocesan Committee and sources of information to our Diocesan himself.

- 1. While persuaded that the onerous and responsible duties of the Diocesan Committee are discharged with a faithfulness and impartiality which commend them to the full confidence and support of the Church, it is believed that the proposed change will go far to relieve them of some difficulties and embarrassments which seem inherent and unavoidable in the present system itself. The committee as now constituted must generally rely upon such representations as the individual applicant may make. However honest, he may be unduly influenced by personal interest or prejudice, or unconsciously unjust to the relative claims of more needy places. Whereas, the delegates from the several convocations would be expected to take a comprehensive view of the whole field, and acquaint themselves as well with the absolute and relative needs of each part, and thus be far more likely to furnish the committee with reliable data upon which they could act understandingly.
- 2. The bishop who would be canonically connected with these convocations would find them to be channels of information far more trustworthy than any now open to him.
- 3. The Church at large, from its love of order and law, would always have a higher regard for their recommendations than for those of mere voluntary associations; their sessions and services would be more fully attended, and their appeals for aid meet with greater success.
- 4. Our present voluntary convocations must leave out from their supervision large uncultivated fields, the ecclesiastical care of which is

Convocations.

undefined and unknown; whereas, the Canonical Convocation would have its accurate geographical "metes and bounds" for every soul in whose limits it would feel a degree of responsibility.

In conclusion, your Committee would state that the views now presented are not undigested theories or untried expedients, but their practical value has been fully demonstrated by their working in the neighboring Diocese of Maryland, and all others in which they have been tested. From these and other less important considerations that might be mentioned, your Committee would recommend to the Petersburg Convocation the expediency of applying to our next Council, to be held in Lynchburg, the adoption of the following

CANON.

The Diocese of Virginia shall be divided into ——— Missionary Convocations as follows:

1st. The city of Richmond and the counties of ———, known as the Richmond Convocation.

2d. The city of Norfok and the counties of ———, known as the Norfolk Convocation.

3d. The city of Petersburg and the counties of ———, known as the Petersburg Convocation.

4th. The city of Lynchburg and the counties of ———, known as the Lynchburg Convocation.

5th. The city of Alexandria and the counties of ———, known as the Alexandria Convocation.

Then Danville, Winchester, Charlottesville, &c., &c., &c.

The above convocations shall be organized under the direction of the bishop, who shall preside over them in all meetings when present. Each convocation shall have a president, to be appointed annually by the bishop on the nomination of convocation. The president of each convocation shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the bishop or convocation, and shall report to the Council through the bishop at each annual session the missionary work done in the limits of his convocation, and any other matter deemed pertinent by himself. Each convocation shall meet twice a year, and shall consist of the clergy residing in its limits, who have seats in the Council, and a lay communicant from each Parish or Mission, to be appointed according to such rule as the Council

may prescribe. Presidents of the convocations shall be ex officio members of the Diocesan Committee.

THURSDAY, 6 P. M.

Council met at 6 P. M., and was called to order by the Bishop.

Mr. C. M. Blackford asked to be excused from the Committee on Property Adjustment between the Dioceses of Virginia and West Virginia. His request was granted, and Col. John M. Patton appointed in his place.

Leave was granted to Rev. Dr. Minnigerode to present, from the board of trustees of the Virginia Female Institute, the nominations of Mr. C. M. Blackford and Mr. H. E. C. Baskervill, from which to elect a trustee to fill vacancy caused by the death of Mr. W. G. Cazenove. Mr. Blackford withdrew his name, and Mr. H. E. C. Baskervill was elected.

The Council then proceeded to the order of the day.

Rev. W. Q. Hullihen offered the following:

Recolved, That the report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society be referred to a special committee, who shall consider and report upon such measures as shall be best in their judgment for the promotion of our Diocesan missionary interests.

Legal Advisor appointed.

The motion was carried and the following committee appointed: Revs. W. Q. Hullihen, J. E. Poindexter and J. B. Newton, Mr. C. E. Cosby and Dr. T. S. Beckwith.

Pending the discussion, Rev. W. M. Dame moved that the Council hold a special session to-morrow at 4 P. M., and that the business of the Diocesan Missionary Society be appointed as the order of the day for that session.

Carried.

The Council adjourned until to-morrow at 9 A. M.

FRIDAY, MAY 17, 9 A. M.

The Council met, and after prayer by Rev. W. Q. Hullihen, was called to order by the Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Rev. Dr. Barten offered the following:

WHEREAS, In order to secure the interests of the Church in our Diocese there is frequent need of legal advice and consultation, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Council hereby establish the office of Legal Adviser or Chancellor of the Diocese, said office to be filled by appointment of the Bishop, the appointee to render his services without remuneration.

The resolution was adopted, and the bishop announced the appointment of Professor Samuel D. Davies, of Richmond College, to the office therein created.

Mr. Taylor Berry called up the following proposed amendment to Canon IX, of which notice was given yesterday.

Resolved, That a committee of two clergymen and two laymen be appointed to report upon the propriety of so amending section 3 of Canon IX as to provide that in parishes having twelve vestrymen, five vestrymen may be competent to transact business, their action to be subject to revision by a majority of the whole vestry on the

application of any three vestrymen made to the register within thirty days from the action sought to be revised.

It was referred to the committee appointed yesterday to consider the Canon upon convocations.

Rev. J. B. Craighill presented the following report from the Committee on the Episcopal Fund:

The Committee on the Episcopal Fund beg leave to report that they have examined the account of Col. Arthur Herbert, which is herewith filed as a part of this report. They find the amount of cash now in the hands of the treasurer to be \$164.21, and the nominal value of the assets to be \$9,385.24.

The report of the committee appointed to express "the feelings of the Council of the Diocese of West Virginia, on the separation now formally completed between the Diocese of West Virginia, and the bishop and Diocese of Virginia":

Whereas, The Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of West Virginia has become in the good providence of God, and by the concurrent action of the bishops and Council of Virginia, ratified by the General Convention, a separate and independent Diocese, the clergy and lay delegates, assembled in Primary Convention, desire to express and spread upon their Journal the grateful acknowledgments which under God they owe to the fostering care of the mother Diocese, and to the faithful and self-sacrificing labors of its late lamented chief pastors, Meade and Johns, as well as of him who is now its bishop, for their ability to stand alone, and to carry on their work as an independent member in the family of Dioceses. And, now, in taking leave of our right reverend father in God, and of our beloved brethren of the clergy and laity of the Diocese of Virginia, with whom we have been so long associated in common work for Christ and His Church, we would indulge the hope that we may all still be bound together in unity of spirit, and be ever valiant for the faith once for all delivered to the saints. We would also express our earnest wish that the pain of separation may be alleviated, in some way, by which, as far as is consistent with our

independent organization, we may still be united in common counsel, and action, for the good of the Church in our respective Dioceses, in all matters of common interest.

Resolved, That future Parochial reports shall designate the number of communicants who are unable to contribute to the Contingent Fund, and the same shall be deducted from the total number of each Parish, and the residue paid in at the annual meeting of the Council.

It was referred to the Committee on Contingent Fund appointed to report to the next Council.

Report from Committee on the Brotherhood.

The Committee on Credentials presented the credentials of Mr. Wm. Holman, delegate from Leighton Parish, Cumberland county.

Rev. H. M. Jackson offered the following:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to draft a schedule of special collections recommended to be taken during the ecclesiastical year in the several Parishes in this Diocese and report to the next Council.

Pending consideration of this motion the Council took recess for divine service.

FRIDAY, 1 P. M.

The Council met and renewed the consideration of the resolution to prepare a schedule of special collections.

The motion was lost.

Col. John M. Patton presented the following report from the Committee on the Brotherhood:

The undersigned, a Committee on the Brotherhood, beg leave to report, that sundry papers have been laid before us by the president of that corporation, including his annual report. From these papers it appears that the permanent fund derived from initiation fees, heretofore collected, amounts to the sum of \$2,221.65, the annual income of which is the resource of the trustees for bearing the limited but necessary expenses of printing, &c. It is burdened by no salaries to the officers, whose services are rendered voluntarily and cheerfully without compensation.

Since the last report the lamented deaths of Rev. C. Y. Steptoe, Rev. Charles Mann and Rev. Geo. Woodbridge., D. D., have occurred, and partial payments have been made to their families, as far as collections have been made, of the sums of \$1,170.98, \$939.70, and \$622 respectively. It is hoped that when collections are completed these sums will reach the usual average of \$1,300 to each recipient.

Report from Committee on the Brotherhood.

It appears that the creation of the new Diocese of West Virginia was the occasion of the withdrawal of nearly all the lay members of the brotherhood living in that Diocese. Notwithstanding this withdrawal of this large membership we still have the number of seven hundred members, who may fairly be relied on to sustain the organization. The report of the trustees, which is hereto annexed, contains words which should arrest the attention and arouse the efforts of every member on this floor, whether lay or clerical. After stating that this number of seven hundred "could be increased, if we could secure good agents in every Church (in very many we have none)," it proceeds: "We again make our yearly appeal to those attending the Council to aid us in this respect." Your committee cannot but ask whether it is right that these faithful officers should appeal year after year in vain for the manifestation of interest and for a cordial co-operation on the part of the members of this Council in that labor of love, which is ours by profession, but too much theirs alone in fact. Their labors must be less and less fruitful from year to year, unless far larger contributions of personal interest and aid shall be made by individuals in the future than in the past. The laity are to be blamed that they have not (whether from indifference, indolence, or other cause,) done as much as they could; but not less should the clergy take blame to themselves that they (whether from the same causes, or from what we cannot but think is a false delicacy,) have done their duty to this brotherhood even less effectively if possible than the laity.

If men will not interest themselves in that form of Christian effort which accomplishes the largest good at the least possible expense, which more than any other enterprise of this Church, which is connected with temporal things, has fallen like the gentle dew from heaven on blasted hearts and hopes beneath, by what motives shall we hope to stimulate them? Perhaps the naked facts before us may be more potent than any vain appeals—vain, if we are to define the word in the light of repeated previous failures in their effects.

The brotherhood has been effectively at work for eight years. In that time seventeen of our clerical members have died. The average payments by individual members have been a little over four dollars per annum, and as the result of this insignificant sacrifice, upward of \$20,000 have been distributed among the helpless and bereaved families of our clerical members who have passed away. Such simple facts

are more eloquent, more touching, more restful in the complete satisfaction they bestow than anything that any committee you could appoint could say, and it is needless to mar their beauty by further words.

Your committee therefore venture no further than to recommend the passage of the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Council earnestly recommend to the laity of the Diocese to take hold of this great and good work with vigor; to the clergy, that they dismiss all groundless notions of delicacy, and give their personal influence to its success, and to both; that as a practical mode of work they see to it that there is an active agent of the brotherhood in every Parish of the Diocese.

Rev. R. A. Goodwin presented the following:

Resolved, That in Parochial Reports the number of members of the Brotherhood of the Protestant Episcopal Church in each parish be given.

On motion, the resolution was referred to the Committee on Parochial Reports.

Col. W. H. Taylor, from the Committee on Clerical Support, presented the following, which was adopted:

Your committee to whom was referred the consideration of the matter of the support of the clergy, have carefully examined all the reports of the treasurers of parishes, touching this subject, handed to them by the secretary, and beg leave to make the following report:

Owing to the lack of uniformity on the part of the treasurers in the manner of making their statements, it was necessary for the committee in many cases to ascertain the amount of the deficit in the rector's salary by a troublesome calculation, that could and would be easily avoided,

if the report in every case was required to be so made as to show the amount of salary promised to the rector for the year, or part of the year, ending on the 30th day of April. If this was done the standing committee could ascertain at a glance the amount that any church was delinquent on the first day of May; and the period of time covered by the treasurers' reports would be the same for all the churches of the Diocese. Your committee recommend that the language of the circular letter of the Secretary, calling for this information, be so amended as to remedy the defect stated.

It is very much to be regretted that a response to the Secretary's letter cannot be had in every case; and the Council can well understand how imperfectly the work expected of this committee has been performed, when it is ascertained that only one hundred and twelve churches in seventy-three parishes have made any report on this subject. We are without any information whatever touching the manner in which the remaining fifty-four churches, as reported in the Journal of 1877, have performed their duty in this regard.

Of the churches from which reports have been received, seventy-eight have paid in full the amounts promised their respective rectors, and thirty-four are delinquent in amounts varying from three dollars to nearly two hundred. The total amount delinquent being \$1,901.36. This, in the judgment of your committee, is a most lamentable exhibit and calls for a decided expression of disapprobation from the Council.

Fully sympathizing with their brethren of the Church in many sections of the Diocese, in the sore trials in temporal matters to which they have been subjected, and fully recognizing the difficulties with which they have to contend in their endeavors to maintain themselves and those dependent on them, your committee would be loth to reproach or censure any parish, the peculiar circumstances of whose people were unknown to them, for any apparent lack of liberality in the offer held out by such parish to secure the residence and services of a pastor; but when their attention is directed to the fact that there are parishes in the Diocese of Virginia, whose people, after a careful and deliberate consideration of the obligation assumed, and with a full and perfect knowledge of the extent of their ability to perform the same, have entered into a contract to pay a stipulated amount during the year for the support of their rector, and having so agreed, have utterly failed to make good their promises, your committee submits that such conduct

should be seriously rebuked, being ungenerous, unjust and inexcusable. The blessing of God in the inestimable privilege of the enjoyment of a faithful ministration in his service by one who, preaching the Gospel should live by the Gospel, cannot be expected long to continue with those who are thus recreant to their plainest duty. The man of business cannot permit his obligations to mature without making due provision for them, and escape that impairment of credit which will wreck his reputation and destroy his prospect of success; no more can these parishes allow their obligations to be thus dishonored and yet maintain their acceptability to God and the esteem and sympathy of their fellow And whilst your committee would question the wisdom of any sweeping line of action that would deprive many weak parishes of the needed aid now received from the Diocesan Missionary Society, they do think that a wise and judicious discrimination might be made by the Executive Committee of that society in the distribution of its funds, in illustration and enforcement of the principle that those should be helped most who help themselves, and by the application of which those who have heretofore neglected their bounden duty in this regard. would be aroused to a more lively appreciation of the duties which are inseparable from the privileges of those who claim to be members of the household of God.

Your committee has observed with much pleasure and thankfulness, that efforts, gradual, it is true, but earnest and systematic, are being made in several of the parishes now without rectories to provide them; and they recommend to every parish deficient in this respect, the inauguration of a like effort, no matter on how small a scale begun, that persistently and honestly persevered in, will ultimately secure a similar benefit to every church in the Diocese.

Your committee recommend the usual publication in the Journal and the Southern Churchman concerning the churches delinquent in the support of the clergy.

Recognizing the desire of many that there shall be an assistant bishop of this Diocese, we recommend that the question of an assistant bishop

The Council met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by the bishop.

Rev. J. E. Poindexter, from the Committee on Diocesan Missionary interests, presented the following report:

The committee appointed to consider and report upon such measures as shall be best in their judgment for the promotion of Diocesan Missionary interests respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

lst. That the executive committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society be, and they are, hereby instructed to strictly observe the regulations established by said committee in regard to the granting of aid to feeble parishes, except so far as they are modified by this report.

2nd. That such stipends, except in cases when, in the opinion of the executive committee, the rule would work manifest injury, shall be reduced at the rate of ten per cent. a year on the original amount.

3rd. That they be further instructed to lend aid only on condition that the parish or church receiving it pledge itself to increase its sub-

scription to the minister's salary as fast as the stipend allowed by the society is reduced.

4th. That all ministers, whose parishes or churches receive aid from this society, be informed by its secretary that, in the opinion of this Council, it is their bounden duty to bring this subject before their congregations and faithfully to urge upon them the necessity of supporting themselves, that so the society, relieved from the burden under which it now groans, may enter upon its appropriate work.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Sprigg, the resolutions were taken up seriatim, and were all adopted.

The committee also offered the following:

WHEREAS, the twelfth Canon allows the erection of a new congregation only on condition that it is able to build a house of worship and support a minister; therefore, Resolved, That article II of the Constitution be so amended, that the first section relating to lay members shall read as follows: "The Council shall also be composed of lay members, consisting of one delegate for each self-supporting (i. e., receiving no assistance from the Missionary Society) Parish or Church chosen by the vestry or trustees thereof."

On motion of Rev. Dr. Sprigg, the resolution was laid on the table.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel gave notice that an amendment to Canon XIX, touching upon the subject of round dancing, would be introduced to-morrow.

Mr. J. Ravenscroft Jones presented the report of the Committee on Finance, as follows:

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese of Virginia, beg leave to report, that they have examined said accounts, and find them carefully and accurately kept, and sustained by proper vouchers. The balance on hand, deposited in the State Bank of Virginia at Richmond, was \$709.87. This includes the sum of \$294.89, which accrued to the funds of the Diocese from the judicious action of the Treasurer in securing interest on balances deposited in bank. Besides the customary appropriations heretofore made to the support of the Bishop, salary of the Secretary and

Chaplains, and other ordinary expenses of the Diocese, the committee recommend the payment of \$30 to the assistant Secretary, and the sum of \$15 to the sexton of St. Paul's Church, Lynchburg, for his services during the present session of the Council. The amount received by the Treasurer on account of the Contingent Fund, up to this report, is about \$7,661.52. The committee further suggests, in view of the propriety of keeping this Contingent Fund sacred to the purposes for which it has been, and will be collected, that the Council appoint a committee of three—viz: our Treasurer, H. E. C. Baskervill, John L. Bacon and John H. Claiborne, all of the city of Richmond—to invest such surplus as may remain beyond necessary requirements, in ground rents or in mortgages on rent-paying insured property, not exceeding half its value, in the city of Richmond, the interest from which will in due time prove a sufficient revenue for the support of the Bishop and the necessary expenses of the Diocese.

Rev. Dr. Dame, from the Committee on the Adjustment of Property Questions between this Diocese and that of West Virginia, moved that the delegates from West Virginia, Rev. James Grammer and Dr. James Logie, be invited to seats in the Council, and to participate in the discussion.

Carried.

Rev. Dr. Dame then presented a report.

It was ordered that the report be received, and the resolutions contained therein considered in their order.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel moved that the first resolution be adopted.

After discussion, Mr. J. Ravenscroft Jones moved that the whole subject be recommitted.

Carried.

Mr. Thomas Moore moved that the committee be enlarged to seven.

Church Historiographer.

The motion was lost.

Rev. R. T. Davis, D. D., moved it be enlarged to five.

Carried: and Mr. J. R. Jones and Mr. Taylor Berry were appointed.

On motion, the Council adjourned until to-morrow, at 9 A. M.

SATURDAY, May 18, 9 A. M.

The Council met at 9 A. M., and after prayer by Rev. J. J. Norwood, was called to order by the bishop.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel presented the following report from the Committee on the State of the Church:

The conciliar year just closed has been an eventful one in the history of Virginia. In her ecclesiastical status she is no longer the Virginia of the olden time, but Virginia dismembered. The organization of West Virginia, as an independent Diocese, involves the severance of ties which have endured her entire life period as a Diocese, and that of many of her still remaining members. "The mother of States," in her civil, in her ecclesiastical sphere, her's must henceforth be the glory and the joy of a mother of Dioceses. No word of ours is, we feel persuaded, needful to elicit from the mother or to assure the daughter of a continuance of fostering care, since such care will be the spontaneous outflow of maternal love and interest.

Yet other sad associations tinge the year just closed. Changeful as is this world of change, we miss more than the usual number from the group of familiar faces wont to gather at our annual Councils. Seldom has the reaper Death taken from our ranks a larger number—never been more impartial in taking alike

"The bearded grain And the flowers that grow between."

Four of our clerical brethren have gone to their rest. Two of the very oldest having fallen at their posts, mailed and in armor clad to the last—two summoned while it was yet day to lay their armor down.

State of the Church.

Loved forms and faces of our lay brethren also are missing, and the places which once knew them shall know them no more. Of these changes we can only say, "Even so, Father!"

But other and in one aspect sadder removals have occurred, and that in unprecedented number—removals which appeal not only to our feelings but to our sense of duty. The bishop reports a very large number of clerical dismissals from our Diocese for lack of adequate support. We know that some did not leave us willingly, but with the heart of exiles. Shall the reproach of failing to make provision for her own rest upon Virginia, when every one who has gone, and many more, are needed to fill waste places at home? In the reports made and tabulalated by the appropriate Committee on Clerical Support, we grieve to note no indication of abatement of the cause of this deplorable depletion of our clerical ranks. On the contrary, the evil would appear to be on the increase. Shall it culminate in a famine not of bread, but for lack of bread of hearing the word of the Lord?

One agency adopted to avert this (our Diocesan Missionary Board) should be enabled to stand in the gap, and effectively redress the wrong so portentous of disaster to the cause of Christ and His Church in Virginia. A small increase in the amount, at the disposal of this Board, is indeed reported; but with no miracle-working Lord to interpose, we are constrained to ask, "What are these among so many?" Divided among twenty-four missionaries in their employ, the whole amount received affords an average stipend of only \$250 per annum to each. Instead of considerably less than \$6,000 contributed, the Diocesan Board should have twice that amount placed at their disposal. The imperative need of increased liberality in support of this cause is rendered more urgent by the relinquishment on our part of any further aid from the Central Board, and as new fields are developed and brought into notice "in sections of the State" traversed by our evangelist, and in the large number of counties in which our Church is unknown.

Another vast field (the colored population of the State)—a field as yet very partially occupied, claims our attention and culture. Furnishing as this class does the labor best adapted to our peculiar wants, and at the same time the least turbulent, most orderly, and on every account most desirable, which capital anywhere controls, it is little to expect, and, to say the very least, impolitic and unchristian to withhold provision for their spiritual as well as temporal necessities. One clerical brother (Rev. G. B. Cooke) is standing nobly at his post in this impor-

tant sphere of evangelic enterprise, whose hands should be upheld and whose needs should be supplied, and that cheerfully and without stint by the Church at large. Your committee rejoice to note cheering indications of success in his work, and especially the fact that two of this class, drawn from his school, are now candidates for holy orders. A ministry of their own race is one of their most imperative needs—a need which schools, like Mr. Cooke's, are best calculated to supply.

But while thus addressing to the Council and those they represent words of exhortation, your committee would be both unwise and ungrateful did they fail to acknowledge or record what in the past year has under God been accomplished. In spite of the very considerable curtailment of our Diocesan limits, and of the withdrawal of so many of her active clergy from the old Diocese, it is simply marvellous that so much progress should be indicated. Never has the number of confirmations (1,300) been so large, and never therefore so considerable an accession made to what ought to be the working power of our church, the number (nine) of new churches consecrated, the large number of ordinations (twenty-three) and of candidates (twenty-six) for Holy Orders, all call for thankfulness, and lead us to exclaim "what hath God wrought."

In the absence too of an adequate supply of ordained laborers, it is encouraging to observe that the number of lay co-workers is steadily on the increase.

The contributions also of our churches to benevolent objects equal in amount the contributions of last year, notwithstanding our loss in numbers and resources by the setting off of the Diocese of West Virginia.

Painful as part of our duty has already been, the most painful yet remains to be performed. Set on the watchtower and required to answer "what of the night?" while glad to respond "the morning cometh," we must in grief and candour add, and "also the night." Indications of decay and defection as well as of progress must be noted, and if possible needed corrections suggested.

At the Council held in Norfolk (1872), our then venerable chief pastor (Bishop Johns)—now with God—entered his solemn protest and issued his fatherly admonition against "promiscuous round dancing." By many of his spiritual charge that admonition has been wholly disregarded, and his successor in office has felt constrained at this time to reiterate and emphasize his godly counsel. That counsel so godly and so eminently timely should have been unheeded by "them that are

without" is not so surprising. But that those "who are within," and who name the name of Him "who pleased not Himself," when solemnly warned of the danger to themselves and of the injury to others should be thus unheedful, affords matter for both surprise and sorrow. It does more. It suggests that some decided action is needed on the part of this, the representative body of our Church in Virginia, to represe, if possible (among her members at least), a practice so reprehensible in the participants themselves and so fraught with evil to society at large.

Your committee feel sensibly the difficulty of indicating what that action should be, and the delicacy involved in its very discussion—that discussion we would fain waive, contenting ourselves first with the most emphatic and perfectly unanimous endorsement of the bishop's admonition as eminently both godly and timely. Secondly, by endeavoring to provide for the discipline indicated by him as desirable by the following sub-section to Canon XIX of our Diocese.

Section 2, Canon XIX. Persons who engage in promiscuous round dancing, by which is meant round dancing between males and females, in the judgment of this Council, are not, in the language of the Rubric, "fit to be presented to the bishop to be confirmed;" and communicants who engage in such round dancing should, "after the first and second admonition," be advertised "that they presume not to come to the Lord's table."

The Committee on New Parishes, to which was referred the petition of certain parties in Overwharton Parish, Stafford county, for the recognition of a church in said parish and county, have considered the same, and recommend that it be returned to the petitioners, on the ground that the proper course for them to adopt in pursuance of their object, would be to apply to the Council that the church referred to be permitted to separate from the parish of Overwharton, Stafford county, and unite with Lamb's Creek Church, Brunswick Parish, county of King George.

In reference to the application of Emmanuel Church, Dublin, Va., also referred to the committee, petitioning that said church in Pulaski county be formed into a new parish, they recommend that it be approved. The metes and bounds of said parish to be as follows: All that part of the county bounded by the county lines of said county to a point in the eastern part of said county on the Atlantic, Mississippi and Ohio railroad known as Morgan's Cut, and to lines extending due north and south from said point to Giles county on the north and New river on the south. All the canonical provisions have been complied with except that no notice was given to a vestry of West Augusta Parish, of which said county was reported originally to have been a part, the actual existence and locality of which parish and vestry, however, is unknown to the parties. The committee, upon full consideration of the circumstances, and the long distances with several counties and organized parishes intervening from the actual parish of Augusta county, have unanimously resolved that the erection of this church into a new parish in Pulaski county, as described above, is in accordance with the intent and spirit of the Canon.

Remarks.—The statistics of this report show the continued success and growth of the mission of St. Andrew's. The debt on this building has been fully paid, and last fall it was consecrated by Bishop Whittle. For want of room the afternoon Sunday school has recently been suspended. We expect soon to build a large room there, to accommodate the Sunday schools as well as the Parish day school, and a night school for young men. The Sunday school at St. Paul's is in a very healthy condition; the teachers meet weekly for study. The school supports entirely the Parish school at St. Andrews of about thirty children; and also at St. Paul's church a Dorcas society and Sewing school of about twenty scholars.

St. Paul's Church home has been greatly blessed in both of its departments. Eight of the orphans have been confirmed. In the women's

department, now incorporated under the name of "St. Paul's Church Home for the Aged and Infirm," the infirmary has naturally become a prominent feature. Apart from the regular inmates of the Home, ten cases have been treated during the year. A dispensary has been added, and two days in each week, Tuesday and Friday, from one to two o'clock, are given to the poor of all classes and denominations for treatment and medicine.

The above named churches are embraced in my missionary charge. Such is its extent that, if means could be provided, two young and energetic men could be fully and usefully employed. The work is more than can be well done by an old and declining man.

The total communion, as above reported, is sixty, so scattered and distant, that some rarely, others, for want of means, never attend services in the churches. I can see them only by visits, which require long rides, or when I can have special services in their vicinity. The congregations are usually large and attentive, and particularly at night service in private families.

I have preached on several occasions to large congregations in St. Paul's, a Methodist church built on the site of the old Reeder's church

in Drysdale parish. Here there are several families warmly attached to the church. I have made one visit to the Bowling Green; preached morning and afternoon to large congregations, and baptized one infant.

Services are held regularly in the afternoon of the Sabbath for the colored people, with good prospect of success.

Some thirty dollars have been contributed, mainly to the Diocesan Missionary Society.

I beg leave respectfully to report, that since the last Council I have been, as for some years past, conducting this Diocesan school for young ladies, with gratifying encouragement, both as to the number of pupils, and the character of its patronage from thirteen dioceses.

It is gratifying to state that at no time since the first organization of the Institute, have the comfort, conveniences and educational advantages equaled those of the present session. The health of the large family has been uniformly excellent. The professors and teachers have earnestly co-operated with the governmental officers and largely contributed to the gratifying success of the session.

Regular daily chapel services, responsively conducted, have been held, and on inclement Sabbaths appropriate discourses have been delivered to the officers and pupils. The Institute choir, led by a zealous pupil as organist and first chorister, contributes greatly to the interest

of these services. As heretofore, I have gladly aided the rector of the parish church in his duties, as occasion required, and had Sunday afternoon services at the mission chapel, as opportunity offered.
