5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present-it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

oth. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes whenever three members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council for special reasons shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council, or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

REPORT OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

Reverend and Dear Brethren:

As required by Canon, I proceed in this, my Eleventh Annual Address, to report to you the condition of the Diocese, beginning with an account of the services performed by me during the past year.

1878, May 18.—In the Alms-house, in Lynchburg, after sermon by Rev. James Grammer, confirmed two.

May 19.—In Grace Memorial Church, Lynchburg, after sermon by Rev. G. W. Nelson, confirmed eight.

May 20.—Preached in Trinity Church, Campbell Court-house. May 21.—In the morning preached in St. Peter's Church, Camp-

bell, and at night confirmed six in Emmanuel, Amherst, after sermon by Rev. J. J. Norwood. All the foregoing places were supplied with services by that indefatigable brother, the Rev. J. H. Williams.

May 22.—In Elon Church, Amherst county, confirmed six.

May 23.—Baptized a child of the Rector, Rev. J. P. Lawrence, in St. Luke's, Amherst, and confirmed four.

May 26.—Confirmed seven in Emmanuel, Henrico, and four in St. Philip's, Richmond. The latter is a church for colored people, where Rev. Dr. Peterkin and his assistant have a service every Sunday night for a small congregation, not without some signs of encouragement.

May 30.—In St. Matthew's Church, Wheeling, assisted Bishops Bedell, Kertoot, Dudley and Jaggar in the consecration of Rev. George W. Peterkin, D. D., as Bishop of the Diocese of West Virginia.

June 2.—Preached in St. John's Church, Hampton, and in Centurion Church, Fortress Monroe, confirming in the former twelve.

June 5.-Emmanuel, Hanover, confirmed eleven,

June 6.-St. David's, King William, confirmed five.

June 7.-Preached in St. Paul's, Hanover,

June 11 and 12.—Attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute in Staunton.

June 20.—Attended a meeting of a committee of the trustees of the Seminary in Alexandria, and at night, after sermon by Rev. H. Suter, confirmed five colored in the Meade Memorial Church.

June 22.-Preached in Sharon Church, Fairtax.

June 23.—In the morning after sermon by Rev. Dr. Minnigerode, confirmed ten in the Seminary Chapel, and in the afternoon preached in Trinity Chapel, Fairfax, and confirmed three.

June 20-28.-Was engaged in various duties at the Theological Seminary.

June 23.—After sermon by Rev. A. M. Randolph, D. D., of Baltimore, in the Seminary Chapel, ordained six deacons to the Priesthood, and ten persons to the Diaconate, one of the latter being colored.

July 7.-Preached morning and night in Trinity, Chesterfield, and confirmed eight.

July 12.—Confirmed seven in Christ Church, Nelson: on 13th, in Trinity eleven: and on 14th, in Bethlehem, eight.

July 21.—Preached in Grace, Albemarle, and confirmed eight, and in the afternoon preached in the same church to a large colored congregation.

July 22.—In St. John's, Louisa, confirmed two.

July 23.—Christ Church, Gordonsville, confirmed two.

July 24.—St. Thomas, Orange Court-house, confirmed nine.

July 25.—Emmanuel, Culpeper, confirmed two.

July 26.-St. Paul's, Culpeper, confirmed eight.

July 27.—Christ Church, Culpeper, confirmed three.

July 28.—St. Stephen's, Culpeper, confirmed two.

August 4.—Christ Church, Bath county, confirmed three colored.

August 11.—Assisted by the Rector, Rev. E. A. Penick; consecrated St. John's Church, Big Lick; preached and confirmed one. This is a handsome and commodious building, erected in place of another which stood at the inconvenient distance of two miles from the village and railroad.

August 12.—Preached in St. Paul's Chapel, Salem, Roanoke county. The Rector had taken charge of these churches only a week before my visit, and found the Parish in a most depressed condition. Since then it has greatly revived, by the blessing of God on his faithful ministry.

August 13.—Read morning prayer, baptized a child, and preached in Trinity Church, Buchanan.

August 14.—St. Mark's, Fincastle, confirmed three, presented by Rev. J. J. Norwood, evangelist. The churches in Botetourt, then without a minister, have since been supplied.

August 16.—Grace, Fauquier, confirmed thirteen.

August 18.—Cotocton, Loudoun, confirmed six, and at night confirmed the same number in St. James, Leesburg.

August 19.-Belmont Chapel, confirmed two.

August 20.-Christ Church, Loudoun, confirmed one.

August 21.—Assisted by Rev. Messrs. Davis and Reed; consecrated the church of our Saviour, a neat brick building at Oatlands, in the same county.

From August 27th to September 5th.—I was detained in the city of New York, taking part in the proceedings of the Bishops in reference to the Rt. Rev. Dr. McCoskry, late Bishop of the Diocese of Michigan.

In explanation of this sad and most deplorable case, I append the following official document:

The Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, assembled under Title I., Canon 15, § XVI. [3] of the Digest, and holding sessions in Grace Chapel, New York City, September 2d and 3d, A. D. 1878, have instructed the undersigned to set forth and publish to the Church their action deposing Samuel Allen McCoskry from the Holy Ministry, and the sentence of deposition pronounced in said Chapel on the 3d day of September, A. D. 1878, as follows, to wit:

Whereas, The Right Rev. Samuel Allen McCoskry, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of Michigan, has, in a communication under his own proper hand, bearing date May 25th, 1878, declared that he does resign and relinquish his office as a Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, and has requested that this resignation and relinquishment may be acted upon by the Bishops of said Church "at the earliest convenient season," "upon such manner and length of notice as may be thought best by the Presiding Bishop;" and, whereas, the said Bishop has abandoned his Diocese and left the territory of the United States while grave allegations touching his moral character existed, thereby declining to promote any investigation of the allegations aforesaid; and, whereas, no action of the said Bishops in the premises, which action he has himself invoked, can make effective his voluntary resignation, relinquishment and abandonment of his said office, except by his deposition from the same:

And, whereas, At a meeting of a majority of the Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States exercising jurisdiction in the same, convened in the city of New York, September 3d, 1878, the following resolution was unanimously adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That the said Samuel Allen McCoskry is hereby deposed from the sacred ministry and from all the offices thereof, and that the Presiding Bishop is hereby requested and authorized to pronounce and record sentence of deposition, and to give due notice thereof;

Now, therefore, Be it known that on this third day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventyeight, I, Benjamin Bosworth Smith, D. D., by Divine permission Bishop of the Diocese of Kentucky, and Presiding Bishop of the

Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, do, in conformity with the terms of the resolution afore recited, declare and pronounce the said Samuel Allen McCoskry deposed from the Holy Ministry and from all the offices thereof;

In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost. Amen. (Signed) BENJAMIN BOSWORTH SMITH,

Bishop of Kentucky and Presiding Bishop.

Taking as a basis of judgment the foregoing statement, together with the parochial reports and those to be presented, as usual, by the officers of our different educational and benevolent institutions, I think we may conclude that the diocese is in an encouraging condition. The fields are everywhere white to the harvest, but the laborers to reap them are entirely inadequate. With seventeen clergymen added to our list during the past year, we still have a net increase of but two,-three having died and twelve removed. In no diocese of our church, in proportion to the number of communicants, is there annually so large a number of ordinations, and vet, year after year, the number of our ministers remains very much the same, our mission seeming to be to raise up, educate and commission men to preach the gospel, and then see them leave our own borders and go forth into other fields. And this state of things can never be improved until better provision is made for the support of the parochial clercy, and our missionary treasury is more liberally supplied with funds.

I am glad to be able to report a small increase in the number of colored persons confirmed. This portion of our population is becoming more and more accessible to the teaching and influence of our church and the time has arrived, it appears to me, when every minister who believes that they are included in the Saviour's redeeming work, should believe also that they are included in the commission which commands him to preach the gospel to every creature. It will be seen from the punchial reports that quite a number of the brothnen of the elergy, and of the laity are laboring amongst the colored people, and, when all things are considered, with as much theorem only mode a beginning in the great field which God has optimed everywhere around us

In Peter Lurp Per, Mr. Couls's work is constantly enlarging, and

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he deserves all the sympathy and needs all the pecuniary assistance that can possibly be given him. In Brunswick county a devoted lady, by simply manifesting the spirit and following the example of the blessed Saviour, has so gained the confidence of the colored people that, by means of her influence, an organized body, composed of a number of preachers and of several thousand members, has asked to be received into communion with our church. Last summer the Rev. Dr. Dashiell was sent by the executive missionary committee to confer with these people, and more recently the Rev. Drs. Dashiell and Weddell were appointed for the same purpose. I give their interesting report in full.

The undersigned appointed to act as a committee of conference with the ministers of Zion Union (colored) organization would respectfully submit this report:

We were notified that the ministers and members of this religious body were seeking to be taken into the care of our church, and they desired to meet your committee on Wednesday, April 30, 1879.

The place appointed for the conference was the "chapel of the Good Shepherd," about two miles from Lawrenceville in the county of Brunswick.

We left Petersburg together on Tuesday, April 29, and reached the houses of friends, by whom we were entertained, in the evening, of that day.

We went to the place of meeting at half-past ten o'clock Wednesday morning. There were upon the ground in waiting for us, fifteen of the ministers and a thousand or twelve hundred from their various congregations. It was arranged that the chairman of this committee should meet in conference with the ministers and with as many of the Zion Union laity as the chapel could accommodate, while his colleague would preach to the crowd outside. At their religious exercises the congregation used the "Third service."

After the sermon and benediction both of us participated in the conference, which closed at about one o'clock P. M.

The result of the conference was that by an unanimous vote the organization puts itself into the care of the Protestant Episcopal Church, giving their assent to our doctrine, discipline and worship.

In submitting this brief statement of facts we feel it our duty to add some remarks.

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In seeking this union with our church, this society of colored people are not under the influence of the ideas and convictions which usually bring other denominations into our fold.

It ought to be understood by all our diocese, and especially by friends in the North, that these ministers and their congregations desire to be with us—not because of any change in their opinions as to Episcopacy, not because they have any trouble in their minds concerning the validity of their orders. Upon these subjects their minds are not at all exercised at present. They have been led to desire such an union for reasons which in our judgment are more to the glory of God and to the credit of our church.

In their poverty and friendlessness, along with their yearning for a better condition, these people have been helped by our church through one of its female communicants. Through her they have gotten to some extent education for their children—care for their sick and their aged—religious books, such as Bibles, Prayer Books and Catechisms, for their Sunday schools, and commentaries for their ministers. They have learned something as to the theory of the church from books and papers, but they have formed their opinions rather from the kindness that has been shown. They have said just about this—"We wish to go with you for we believe the Lord is with you."

As your committee we will briefly express our belief that with proper care we can reach and impress a very large colored population, and that we can rely upon many of them to be grateful and loyal children of our ecclesiastical household.

We were deeply affected by our interviews with them. They appreciate the situation. They have been praying for help—the help has seemed to come—they want to go hand in hand with the people who have shown for them the feeling of brethren. The responsibility now upon our church we think is a most serious one. It may be a crisis with these negroes; it is a crisis with us.

We recommend that effort be made by this executive committee to procure a suitable clergyman who shall work amongst their congregations as an evangelist. He would find ample work in a field which, in our judgment, has nowhere else an equal in the number and in the teachable spirit of those to whom he would minister.

I commend Mrs. Buford and her interesting and important work to the sympathy and prayers of the Diocese, and I unite with her in thanking the many kind friends at the North who have aided her by contributions of money, books, clothing and other things. As the committee say in their report just read, this is a crisis with our church. May God give us wisdom to see and realize our responsibility, and grace to enable us to discharge it.

I never record the death of one of my dear clerical brethren without wishing I could induce the laity to take an interest in the Brotherhood. It is a simple organization, composed of persons who bind themselves, on the death of a minister, to contribute two dollars each for the benefit of his bereaved and generally penniless family. I know of no charity which equals it. Thus, if the Brotherhood has one thousand members, each member has to pay but two dollars to insure to the family of the deceased the sum of two thousand dollars. If there are three thousand members, then the family would receive six thousand dollars, and so on. I ask, where in the world can I, by giving two dollars, accomplish such an amount of good? I am sure that if my dear brethren of the laity would think about the matter, very many of them would send their names to the secretary to be enrolled as members of the Brotherhood.

I beg leave to call attention to a recently founded and admirable institution, a notice of which may be found on the cover of the Journal of the last Council, viz: the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, No. 517 north Fourth street, Richmond, Va. Its object is "to provide a 'home' for female members of the Protestant Episcopal Church, who, having seen better days, are now in reduced circumstances, and unable to provide for themselves an adequate support." Its charter authorizes the board of corporators to add a home for male members of the church, and also an infirmary or hospital for the sick, which they purpose to do so soon as the necessary funds can be secured. It is not a local but a State institution, and therefore may claim the help of our church people throughout the Diocese. Contributions to defray its current expenses, or to be applied to the permanent endowment fund, will be gratefully received by any member of the board of lady managers.

The Rev. J. J. Norwood has continued his faithful work as an evangelist during the past year. A report from him of his abundant labors will be published in the Journal of the Council. I very much

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regret that I have not been able to procure the services of another suitable man to be associated with him. At least two ministers might be kept constantly and profitably employed in this good work. My account with the evangelist fund is herewith submitted, from which it appears that there has been expended \$904, leaving in my hands a balance of \$1,266. I respectfully ask that the account be referred to an auditing committee.

The revision of the Canons, and other work before you, will probably consume all your time, and I therefore refrain from mentioning several important subjects to which I desired to request your attention. There is one matter, however, which I very deeply regret to be compelled to submit for your consideration and action, and which I must dwell upon at some length, that you may fully understand it.

My venerable predecessor in his annual address ten years ago, proposed for the grave consideration of the Council which sat in this place, "the excessive ritualistic innovations which have annoyed the sober-minded and conservative portion of the church in England and our own country;" and after explaining that it is not ritualism as such, that offends and alarms, for all are ritualists, but the question with us is one of degree: he proceeded in these words:-"But if, as we have stated, the agitating question is simply one of degree, how is the proper graduation to be settled? The authoritative rule is found in the Book of Common Prayer as ratified by the General Convention. and what has been the general usage under that directory. To any ritualism so recognized and sanctioned no one may justly object, but beyond the license thus indicated, begins excess, which, being once outside the legitimate may run riot in any amount of extravagance which the fancy or the folly of the individual affects-such as the use of fading flowers cut off from their root to symbolize a resurrection to life-groups of variegatedly vested and artistically attitudinizing priests, to observe the sacrament instituted with so much simplicity in the upper chamber in Jerusalem-pictorial representations of the scenes and scriptural images of the Saints of Scripture-dramatic exhibitions of the affecting events of Passion Week-even their consummation at Calvary-anything and everything which sentimentalism or superstition may crave to gratify its morbid appetite. Thus churches are changed into exhibition halls, the people lose their spirituality in sight seeing, and become mere gazers instead of godly worshippers. So it has been, as the history of the church sadly tes-

tifies. The tendencies are still the same. The proclivity of the natural heart is to externalism in religion. So, therefore, it will be again, if legal limits are disregarded, and every one is left to introduce such innovations as are pleasing to himself."

This part of the Bishop's Address was referred to a committee, consisting of seven clergymen and six laymen, who reported three resolutions, which were unanimously adopted by the Council. The second of these resolutions was as follows'. "That in view of these 'novelties which disturb' the peace of the church and wound the consciences of so many of both the clergy and laity, and of the difficulty of arresting innovations originating from small beginnings in ornaments, decorations, or otherwise, and of returning to the simplicity of worship after the same has been departed from, it be earnestly recommended to the clergy, church wardens and vestries, strenuously to resist the introduction of any changes in the forms and modes of conducting public worship and administering the sacraments as the same were used in the church of England and our own, *before* the rise of tractarianism and ritualism."

In the month of April, 1877, I was formally and officially appealed to by two members of the vestry of a church in the diocese, to interpose and prevent the introduction into the church of flowers, altarcloths, &c., which were an offense to some of the people, and were producing dissension and division in the vestry and congregation. What was I to reply to this appeal? That it was none of my business? or that I had no authority to interfere in such matters? I thought it was especially and emphatically my business, that the very nature and purpose of my office made it my duty to interfere in such matters, and that I was solemnly bound by my consecration promises and vows faithfully and fearlessly to perform that duty. I gave my judgment in the premises, which was promptly, and, I believe, cheerfully, acquiesced in by all the parties concerned.

While this case was pending the Council met, in May 1877, and I spoke in my address as follows:

"My predecessor faithfully warned you, my brethren, against the introduction of flowers into our churches, and his warning was reiterated in perhaps more than one report of the committee on the State of the Church. The warning, however, I grieve to say, has, in a number of instances, been disregarded; and this evil, from a small.

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beginning, has in a few years grown to such proportions as on some occasions to involve wasteful and sinful expense, and to make of our Father's house a place for floral exhibition, to please the eye and gratify a sensuous taste, causing some minds, it is to be feared, to 'change the truth of God into a lie, and worship and serve the creature more than the Creator, who is blessed forever.' One of our prominent Bishops, who claims to have been the first to bring in this strange custom, seeing, when too late, whereunto it has grown, has issued a pastoral against the lamentable fruits of his own doings. And now, in addition to flowers, we begin to see what are called altar cloths, and cloths of different colors for the different church seasons, on some of our reading-desks and pulpits. These things, unimportant in themselves, are parts of a system-a system of doctrine and practice not sanctioned by the Word of God, which was utterly repudiated by our Church at the Reformation, and which is held in abhorrence by a large majority of the ministers and people of this Diocese. These things are a novelty in Virginia, not having been known at a time within the memory of the youngest of us, and are seriously disturbing the peace and unity of some of our congregations. I earnestly and lovingly implore my dear brethren, the ministers and vestries of this Diocese, and, if I have any authority in the premises, I do more than implore them, for the sake of truth and peace, not to introduce themselves, nor allow others to introduce, into our churches the things which I have mentioned, or any like things. Ritualism and Romanism have grown up little by little; and if we would preserve the worship and doctrine of our beloved Church unchanged, we must resist every innovation."

It was "resolved, That the secretary do cause to be printed, at the cost of the contingent fund, five thousand copies, in such form as he may think best, those parts of the Bishop's annual address relating to intemperance and the introduction of worldly practices, customs, decorations and tendencies in the church, for distribution among the communicants of the Church throughout the Diocese as now constituted." The Council was obliged by canon of the General Convention to publish my address in its journal, without making itself at all responsible for its sentiments, and whether it approved those sentiments or did not approve them. But with this it was not satisfied. It selected the portion which I have just read, and ordered five thou-

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sand copies of that to be printed separately and circulated amongst the communicants of the Church; thus endorsing and approving the position I had taken and the views I had expressed, and sending them forth as its own message to the churches.

The action of the Council, on the two occasions which I have mentioned, ought, in my judgment, to have been accepted by every loyal minister, vestry, and member of the church as final. And so it was by the large majority of the clergy and laity of the Diocese, no matter what may have been their own private views and wishes. But by some it was understood differently; for in June 1877 complaint was made to me by a member of the vestry of Graee Church, Richmond, of innovations being made in said church of the kind before mentioned, and in regard to which the Council had taken action but a month before. As in duty bound, I sought an interview with the rector, Rev. H. M. Jackson, which, however, in consequence of my other engagements, was not had until December. That interview was mutually cordial and affectionate, and on my part certainly entirely satisfactory. He did not question my authority to interpose in such a case, and when my judgment was pronounced he declared his purpose to be governed by it.

About the same time I addressed to several of my brethren of the clergy (amongst whom were the late Dr. Woodbridge, then rector of the Monumental Church, Richmond, and Rev. Dr. Barten, then and now rector of Christ Church, Norfolk), a communication, of which the following is a copy:

"RICHMOND, 22D DEC., 1877.

Rev. and Dear Brother:

Because I feel that necessity is laid upon me I write you this letter.

I beg to refer you to those paragraphs of my address to our last Council, which you will find on pages 44 and 45 of the printed journal, and which, I learn from a reliable source, you do not understand I meant should have the same weight and authority with my brethren of the clergy which I would have done had I addressed to them the same words in a pastoral letter. In this I wish to say you are mistaken. In saying what I did to the clergy and laity in Council assembled, I adopted what seemed to me the most formal and solemn method of delivering my 'godly admonition,' and of declaring my

'godly judgment' in regard to the matters therein mentioned or referred to. And I would remind you that my action was rendered still more authoritative by the fact, that the Council ordered, without a dissenting voice, five thousand copies of those parts of the address, to be printed for distribution among the communicants of the church throughout the Diocese.

And now let me assure you, my dear brother, that I neither accuse nor suspect you of anything which I have condemned in my address. My object is simply to explain my meaning, so that my judgment in regard to the matters about which I have spoken may be clearly understood.

Affect'ly, your friend and brother,

F. M. WHITTLE."

In consequence of a slight misunderstanding, the Rev. Mr. Jackson did not comply with my judgment in regard to the innovations in his church until February last, when he called on me and the misunderstanding was removed. This last interview between him and myself led to my asking and obtaining a conference with him and his vestry, which was pleasant and satisfactory, and, at their request that I would put my counsel and judgment in writing, I addressed to them a letter, a copy of which will be presented hereafter. I wish to add, that it affords me sincere pleasure to be able to make this *honorable* mention of my dear brother Jackson and his vestry.

The day before the conference just referred to, I wrote a note to Rev. J. G. Armstrong, rector of the Monumental Church, Richmond, respectfully calling his attention to my address of 1877, and to the action of the Council in reference to the same. In a personal interview, a day or two later, I understood him expressly to admit my authority to interpose in such cases as the one under consideration, but he said he hoped that, as no complaint had been made to me from his church, I would not feel bound to take any action in regard to it, and requested, if I did act, that I would address myself to his vestry. as the things which I objected to were their property, bought with their money, and he did not know that he had any right to molest them. I replied, that all I proposed to say or do at that time, was to ask his attention to my address and the action of the Council. Subsequent reflection, however, convinced me that duty required me to go further. So the next morning I addressed a note to Mr. Armstrong, enclosing to him and his vestry a copy of the letter before

referred to, and at the same time I decided to send a copy to every minister and vestry in the diocese. That letter is as follows:

RICHMOND, VA., 18th February, 1879.

To the Rector and Vestry of ---- Church, ---- Parish, ---- Va :

DEAR BRETHREN:—Circumstances have forced me to the conviction, that duty requires me respectfully to declare to every minister and vestry of the diocese, my "godly admonition" and my "godly judgment" in regard to certain matters, as follows:

The services of the Church should be conducted as prescribed by the Rubrics in the Book of Common Prayer, without adding thereto or subtracting therefrom.

The decoration of the church building at Christmas, being a custom as old as the Church itself in Virginia, may lawfully and properly be continued.

The introduction into the Church of evergreens and flowers at Easter; or of flowers, fruits or vegetables on Thanksgiving Day, or on any other occasion, is a novelty and an innovation in Virginia, and ought not to be done or allowed. The decoration of "the Lord's Table," pulpit and desk with cloths, of one color for some occasions and of another color for other occasions, the different colored cloths being changed according to times and seasons, is a new and strange thing in the Church in Virginia, and ought not to be done or allowed.

These views of the duty of our ministers and vestries were, as I understand, endorsed and approved by resolution of the Council of the Diocese, at its session in 1877, as may be seen on pages 45 and 88 of its journal.

The "Lambeth Conference" of 1878, consisting of one hundred Bishops, nineteen of whom were of our own communion, unanimously adopted the following report: "Considering unhappy disputes on questions of Ritual, whereby divers congregations in the Church of England, and elsewhere, have been seriously disquited, your committee desire to affirm the principle, that no alteration from long-accustomed ritual should be made contrary to the admonition of the Bishop of the Diocese."

Faithfully and affectionately yours,

FRANCIS M. WHITTLE, Bishop of the P. E. Church in Virginia.

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I did not expect any reply to this letter. But quite a number of the ministers and vestries of the diocese have written approving my action and thanking me for it, while some others have expressed themselves very differently. I proceed to give extracts from the communications which I have received from the latter. At a meeting of the vestry of St. Paul's Church, Norfolk, 6th April, 1879, the rector and seven other members being present, it was unanimously resolved, "that without considering it necessary now to express any opinion upon the policy which dictated it, or to decide the question of the Bishop's right to prescribe or enforce its requirements, as to which we say nothing one way or the other, we are of opinion as Christians, in the interest of peace, and having the welfare of the church at heart, that it is wise and best cheerfully to acquiesce in it."

The vestry of St. Luke's Church, Norfolk, at a regular meeting April 7th, after unanimously declaring it to be their earnest desire to be enabled at all times promptly and reverently to heed the "godly admonition" and the "godly judgment" of their Bishop when, in their opinion, occasion arises to justify the same, go on to resolve, "that the practice of decorating our church at Easter and on Thanksgiving day, and of otherwise commemorating the different seasons of the ecclesiastical year, so far as the same is distasteful to the Bishop, as indicated in the letter above quoted, be hereafter discontinued." In a second resolution, after declaring that they do not mean to admit there is anything "sinful, harmful or inappropriate" in the things they agree to discontinue, they add, "on the contrary we maintain that there is good and sufficient ground for the justification of such decorations, not only because they are beautiful in themselves, and designed as an humble and heartfelt tribute by a grateful people to the Giver of all good gifts, * * * but in the long and continued usage, as well in the Church of England, as in a great number of the dioceses of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United Statcs of America, of which we are members." * * * Thirdly they resolve, "that if the practices inhibited are not wrong in essence-and this is virtually admitted when all objection is waived to a continuance of the customary decorations at Christmas-and if they be of such long usage as that their discontinuance will be regarded by many as "an innovation," inasmuch as it will be a departure from custom, then, in our judgment, they should be regarded as * in no sense a departure from the faith or practices of the church, calling

for the exercise of the high prerogative of the Bishop's 'godly admonition.'"

In a fourth resolution the Bishop is informed that they have given candid expression to their views, because a failure to do so "might cause our quiet acquiescence to be misunderstood for an acknowledgment of previous wrong-doing, and as a vindication of the Episcopal intervention and censure."

The Rev. O. S. Barten, D. D., rector of Christ Church, Norfolk, wrote me on 16 April, * * * "Under the enclosed resolution, *unanimously* adopted by the vestry, the use of flowers was discontinued for the present. But I feel it my duty to state distinctly that this was done by me in deference to the wishes of those of my people who, lamenting the harmful effects of your inhibition on the quietness, love and peace which has reigned in the congregation, desired to avoid further complications by either a protest or open opposition to your command. However, I most respectfully desire to state that I reserve to myself, independently of the vestry, THE RIGHT at any time to resume any or all such customs or usages, as may have been temporarily discontinued." The resolution enclosed by Dr. Barten, as passed unanimously by the vestry, April 7th, 1879, is as follows:

Resolved, That we acknowledge the receipt of the Bishop's letter of February 17, 1879, and that while in deference to the reign of peace and love in our congregation we comply with his request, we, however, respectfully express our dissent from, and objection to, any encroachments upon our rights as a vestry, and those of our rector."

I have received from the vestry of Trinity Church, Portsmouth, a long account of their proceedings at a special meeting held oth April, 1879, which resulted in their adopting the following resolution:

"Resolved, That we have received and considered with profound respect and prayerful care, the circular letter of the Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, Bishop of the Diocese, bearing date on the 18th day of Feb., 1879, addressed to the rector and vestry of this church, and without now considering the question of the respective rights of the Bishop of the Diocese, and of the rector and vestry of this church involved in said circular; and without admitting that the use of flowers in this church, in the manner in which they have been used for many years, is wrong in principle, or is a novelty or innovation as far as this church is concerned; yet deeply sharing with our Bishop in his devotion to our church in Virginia, and being willing to make

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any sacrifice which does not involve the surrender of principle, for its good, peace and prosperity, we do hereby agree to heed and follow the admonition of said Bishop, set forth in his said letter, excepting and reserving, however, the right and practice of members of the congregation of this church, to place flowers at their pleasure, as they have been want to do, at the memorial windows of our church building, including that erected to the memory of our dear departed rector, the Rev. J. H. Wingfield, D. D."

The proceedings of the vestry of Trinity Church, Portsmouth, were enclosed in a letter from the rector, Rev. Reverdy Estill, in which, after an introductory sentence, he says,-"With the result of that meeting I heartily concur, but I feel in duty bound to make this * The grounds upon which I my further earnest protest. * * base my reverent protest are as follows: First, this direction to the clergy and vestries within your jurisdiction, cannot, I submit, be called, in the understanding of the Church, a 'godly judgment,' as the term involves, I submit, the promulgation of a 'judicial interpretation' 'of some known law or statute, either of the general Church,' or of 'the diocese,' for the infringement of which a clergyman is amenable to trial. Furthermore, it is my conviction, formed after considerable research, that it was never the intention of the Church to make such things as 'flowers' and the 'hangings of the church' (enumerated in your letter) subjects for a bishop's 'godly admonition' or 'godly judgment.' Second, with my understanding of the term, a custom of more than twenty years' duration in this parish, cannot be called an 'innovation' Third, the prohibition of flowers in the church upon Easter or other occasions will produce much feeling and strife in this parish, wherein all has been quietness and peace. With the custom relating to the memorial windows, mentioned in the resolution of the vestry, I do not feel called upon, as the rector of the parish, to interfere "

Some time in the month of February, the Rev. J. G. Armstrong, rector of the Monumental Church, Richmond, accompanied by three members of his vestry, called on me and formally presented a document from which I extract as follows:

"The usages and customs which formed the reason for your communication have been in practice in the Monumental Church for many years, and only at those periods of the ecclesiastical year which are recognized in the Book of Common Prayer, chiefly denoting the birth and resurrection of our blessed Lord. * * *

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"Since the death of Dr. Woodbridge, the present rector has not deemed it necessary to make any change in the usages he found had existed for so many years before, and so far as he and the vestry are advised, we are not prepared to admit the authority of the Bishop or the Council of the Church of this Diocese to forbid the practice of the usages and customs under consideration.

"But while we thus express our conviction, and with the most respectful and Christian feeling towards our esteemed Bishop, and the desire to repudiate anything like a refractory spirit, we must conclude our letter by consenting, *under solemn protest*, to carry out his wishes, as expressed in his letter of the 14th inst., with the additional assurance, that *now* as *heretofore*, we have had but a single eye to the glory of God, and the good of our fellow men, in all we have done in his most holy Catholic church."

Accompanying the foregoing was a separate paper from the rector, in which he says: * * * "I desire also to assert, in both my personal and official character, what, as one of the members of the vestry, I have united with that body in asserting; to wit, my dissent from the position involved in your letter that a Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States has the right to legislate upon the questions at issue. Such a right is not in congruity with the governmental economy of this Church. * *

"And while, according to my vow of ordination to the Priesthood, I have no disposition but 'reverently to obey my Bishop,' and ' to follow with a glad mind and will his godly admonitions, and submit myself to his godly judgment'; I yet submit, if it is not contemplated that the 'admonition' and 'judgment' in order to be binding and

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legitimately and authoritatively to demand obedience must be within the sphere of canon law? Is not the Bishop, no less than the Priest, under this law? And is not the inspired rule of an inspired apostle of universal application, 'where there is no law there is no transgression?' In conclusion, therefore, I have to say that, in the exercise of the right given me by God, and vindicated all through the ages by that branch of the Holy Catholic Church, in which I have the privilege and honor of possessing ministerial sonship, I do now as a man, and as a minister of Jesus Christ and of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, atter to you, my Bishop, my most respectful, yet most earnest and decided, protest against your authority to forbid as 'not to be allowed,' the customs and usuages specified in your official letter to me and my vestry." * * *

Finally, I have received from the Rev. John S. Lindsay, rector of Hamilton Parish, Warrenton, a letter dated 22d March, 1879, from which I make the following extracts:

"Immediately upon the receipt of your circular letter expressing your godly judgment, and giving your godly admonition as to church decorations, flowers, &c., I wrote to you promising acquiescence in your expressed wishes, as far as I could control the matter, and expressing the belief that the vestry would also consent to change any Parish custom that your letter condemned.

"I find that I reckoned without my host. The vestry met and considered the letter, indicating decided opposition to its requests. I induced them to postpone the matter, as the meeting was not a full one, and gave the letter to a committee to be considered and reported upon. They brought in a report to the regular meeting of the vestry to-day, in which they respectfully decline to change the customs of the Parish, such as dressing the church with flowers at Easter, and changing the book marks and pulpit cloths according to the seasons. * * *

"I regret inexpressibly that they should have taken this ground of non-concurrence in the request of the Bishop. * * * I lament the fact that a Parish over which I preside should allow itself to be put into an attitude of disagreement with the Bishop, and especially a Bishop for whose personal character I have no less respect than I have for his official position. But as the vestry and the Parish seem to be in accord on this question, I feel that I am powerless to act any further, though I was prepared to sacrifice any taste that I might have for the things condemned to the kindly expressed wish of my Bishop

that they be dispensed with. I have no knowledge of any law bearing on a case of this kind, but the Canons of common sense would seem to require that I take the position of non-action in the matter."

H. Shepperd, Esq., register, wrote me that he was instructed by the vestry of Hamilton Parish to say, in regard to my circular letter of 18th February, "that after giving it that careful and respectful consideration that is due to any communication from the Bishop of the Diocese, they are constrained to decide that they ought not to change the only two customs in this Parish condemned in your letter, viz: the decoration of the pulpit and reading desk with cloths and book marks 'of one color for some occasions, and of another color for other occasions,' and 'the introduction into the church of evergreens and flowers at Easter, the former having been a custom in this Parish for thirteen years, and the latter for a much longer period."

I had no alternative, my dear brethren—painful as the duty is to myself and humiliating as the performance of it is to our beloved Church—but to lay before you the documents which I have read. I add not a word of comment in regard to their spirit or contents. They speak for themselves, and they show that a great crisis has arisen in our diocese, and that an issue has been joined, the result of which must determine the spiritual and Protestant or the worldly and Romish character of our Virginia church for all time. They fully justify me at the bar of my own judgment and my own conscience for doing what I have done, and convince me that the need for my action was ten times more pressing and important than I had supposed.

And now I desire, in the first place, clearly to define the position which I occupy. I do not claim, but utterly *disclaim* and *repudiate* the possession of any undefined or undefinable rights and powers as inherent in my office, and as belonging to me in virtue of that office. I do not claim any authority to make or to break laws, but acknowledge myself preëminently bound to be governed by laws divine and human of the Church and of the State, that, as in other respects, so in the matter of submission to the rightly constituted authorities, I may be "a wholesome example and pattern for the flock to follow," over which, in the providence of God, I have been placed as the overseer. I claim no right to introduce any novelties of doctrine or ritual into the church in this diocese to disturb the peace of its members,

and I deny any such right to every minister and vestry, and especially to every private member of the same.

On the other hand, I trust I am "ready with all faithful diligence, to banish and drive away from the church all erroneous and strange doctrine contrary to God's word, and both privately and openly to call upon and encourage others to the same," whether the "erroneous and strange doctrine" be taught from the pulpit or the chancel, by word, or by vestments, decorations, signs or symbols,-and in so doing I but "exercise such discipline, as by the authority of God's word, and by the order of this church is committed to me." In a word, if there is any duty imposed upon me by my consecration vows, and which may be demanded of me by the ministers and people of this Diocese, it is my duty to keep out all innovations on our doctrine and worship, and to leave the Protestant Episcopal Church in Virginia, the same glorious church which I found it, unchanged in its teaching, services, practices and ceremonies. This being the duty which I understand my office lays upon me, then I distinctly claim that the church has entrusted to me the power and authority to perform that duty.

In the second place, having been, under God. placed by you in a . fearful position of difficulty and anxiety and responsibility, which none can understand but those who have tried it, and in view of which the greatest of the inspired apostles might well exclaim, "who is sufficient for these things?" I think I have the right to look to you. my dear brethren, for sympathy and counsel and assistance. If, in your judgment, I have done wrong, or made a mistake, by wittingly or unwittingly usurping authority in what I have done, I earnestly beg that you will say so. Then I shall understand, that so far as this Council is concerned, I am not expected to be the Bishop or overseer of the churches of this diocese; that on my visitations I am a mere automaton to confirm, ordain, and consecrate buildings; that every minister. vestry, or individual, according to their various views of what is pretty, or appropriate, or edifying, may introduce into our worship whatever services, or ceremonies, or objects they please, converting our houses of prayer into concert halls, exhibition rooms, Romish churches, or heathenish temples; and that it is not my duty. and I have no authority to interpose my "godly admonition" and my "godly judgment" to prevent such innovations. But if, on the other hand, as I do not doubt for one moment is the case, you hold that I

have simply performed a plain and imperative duty to God and to you (notwithstanding my action has been protested against, and I myself have been ridiculed and scorned and denounced), then, my dear brethren, I think I have a right most respectfully to demand, that you encourage and help me by such legislation as the case may seem to you to require.

I conclude with the prayer, that in all your doings you may be directed with God's most gracious favor, and furthered with his continual help; that in all your works begun, continued, and ended in Him, you may glorify his holy name; and finally, by his mercy, obtain everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The account of the Evangelist Fund was referred to the Finance Committee.

Rev. K. Nelson from the Committee on Credentials presented the following as duly elected and entitled to seats. (*Vide* list on page 12).

Rev. Dr. Norton presented the following report from the trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School:

The trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School beg leave to report that the number of the students in the three regular classes during the session is twenty-six. The number in the preparatory department is nineteen. The diligence of the students has been exemplary. The reports of the professors are annexed.

The High School continues to maintain its stand among the best schools of the country.

The friends of the Seminary will be pleased to learn that the branch institution at Petersburg for colored students promises well. The report of Professor Spencer is annexed.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Va.:

The professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully submits the fol-

lowing report of the studies pursued under his direction during the current session:

The senior class, with three recitations a week and the Wednesday evening exercise, have studied the articles with Baulthis and Burnet, and have just finished the review with written questions. They are now studying, with written questions and references, a course on Liturgics. Specific exercises in Homiletics, as also in connection with other recitations, have gone on during the whole session.

The middle class, reciting five times a week, has studied Knapp's Theology, which they are now reviewing. One recitation per week has been given by the class to the study of the New Testament in the English version. During this session they have studied the Apocalypse.

To the junior class I have given a weekly recitation in Chadbourne's Natural Theology and in Hopkins' "Outline Man." They are now engaged in reviewing Chadbourne.

It gives me pleasure to report the most commendable diligence and conscientiousness in the class of this session. I have no reports of absence of students without leave.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF APOLOGETICS AND CHURCH POLITY.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Va.:

In the department of Apologetics the instruction of the junior class has been carried on, through the current term, for the greater part of the course, in the form of lectures, in addition to regular class room examinations in the text-book. The course has been completed, on the part of the middle class, by the study of Butler's Analogy of religion, Natural and Revealed, to the Constitution and Course of Nature.

The senior class has received instruction in Church Polity by means of lectures on the Church and ministry, as supplementary to the study of the text-book.

The attendance in the class room, on the part of all the students, has been commendably regular and punctual.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF BIBLICAL LEARNING.

I would respectfully report to the Board of Trustees, that the classes of students of the seminary have pursued the prescribed course of study in my department with the usual measure of success.

The senior class has continued the study of the Hebrew languaage, and read in the book of Isaiah, sixteen chapters; in Greek, they have read the two epistles to the Corinthians, and are now reviewing them.

The middle class has studied the Prophecies of Christ in the original, and read in addition twenty-three Psalms in the Hebrew. In Greek they have finished the Epistles to the Romans and to the Hebrews.

The junior class has studied the Hebrew Grammar, with written exercises. They have read sixteen chapters in the Bible, and are now reviewing them. In the Greek New Testament, they have studied critically and exegetically the Gospel of St. Matthew. Three times a week essays are read on the most important and difficult subjects in the Gospels.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF CHURCH HISTORY.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia.

The professor of Church History and Canon Law presents the following annual report:

The senior class has studied, with four recitations a week, the History of the Church of England, the History of the American Church, the first book of Hooker's Ecclesiastical Polity, the Constitution and Canons of the Church, the Pastoral Epistles in Greek, and Meade on the Pastoral Office.

The middle class, with three recitations a week and regular essays, has studied Kurtz's Church History.

The junior class, with four weekly recitations and three essays a week, has studied Dr. Smith's Old and New Testament History, and read the book of the Acts of the Apostles in Greek.

In response to the request of the Board he has made a practice of attending, at least once a month, each class in the preparatory department, except those taught by one of the professors. It affords him great pleasure to state his decided conviction that its present teachers are, in faithfulness, qualifications and efficiency, second to none in our

State, and that under their instruction, both the senior and junior preparatory classes have made a marked and constant improvement.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D., President of the Board of Trustees:

Rt. Rev. and Dear Sir:—As principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

The aggregate number of boys, including eight day-scholars, received during the current session is seventy; the maximum attendance sixty-nine. * * * From the new Society Hall and reading room erected last summer every advantage anticipated has been realized. It is a valuable improvement.

The regular religious exercises of the school on week days have been much as heretofore. Morning service in the chapel consists of a hymn, a lesson, (alternating with the psalter), the Lord's prayer and collect for the day always, the latter being followed by a brief litany two days in the week, and on other days by suitable prayers, including a special one for missions on Thursdays. Evening service at the tea table is simple. The endeavor soberly to observe and improve all the Christian seasons has been as before. During Passion Week the usual daily instructions, in the shape of discourses from Norton suited to each day, were used with even more than usual satisfaction. A Missionary Society in the school, organized in October and including almost every boy, has been maintained with spirit throughout the session. Its object, in the language of its constitution is, "I. To raise money for missionary and other benevolent work. 2. To diffuse information in regard to such work, to increase interest in it, and in every practical way to advance it." Two hundred dollars, or more, for missions have been raised by this organization, and its good influence in other ways been attested. * * * Great attention continues to be paid to sacred music, the choir being regularly trained and habituated to the singing of every part of the service commonly so rendered.

The Rev. K. Nelson, D. D., has ministered, as heretofore, regularly once a month in the school chapel; and the Rev. C. Walker, D. D.,

has given us several services. Other clergymen have officiated once each, and several laymen have addressed the Missionary Society. The Friday night devotional meeting for the boys, on which, as on all extra services, attendance is voluntary, has been maintained with remarkable spirit and success by Mr. Wm. Herbert Assheton, of the Junior Class in the Seminary. During Lent Dr. Nelson gave us one week night service besides, on which, as on the noon litany service on Fridays, the attendance was also encouraging. To all the gentlemen who have thus aided the good work, I am sincerely grateful.

The number of communicants among the boys is twenty-five; two having been confirmed at home since Christmas. We have had no confirmation here this session, though there are candidates awaiting the rite.

REPORT OF INSTRUCTOR OF THEOLOGY IN BRANCH SCHOOL, PE-TERSBURG.

To the Board of Trustees of Theological Seminary:

DEAR BRETHREN:—Having entered, in accordance with your appointment, on the work of instructing colored candidates for the ministry, I beg to present my report of work done since October 1st in that capacity.

Instruction has been given in Paley's Evidences, Smith's Old and New Testament History, Butler on Common Prayer, Townsend's Elements of Theology, lectures on some of the Thirty-nine Articles, and exercises in Homiletics, in the department of Theology. Also in elementary Greek and Hebrew, and in Haven's Mental Philosophy. About three hours per day (except Saturday) has been occupied in the work of the recitation room.

The total number of students present during the session (two of them only for a short time) has been six. Of these three are members of our own church, two are Methodist preachers, and one a Baptist preacher. Of these last, two have removed from Petersburg.

The students have been exemplary in diligence and deportment. The progress made by them is perhaps as fair as could be expected, when their want of previous training is remembered, but it has not been in any way remarkable. These students manifestly need a very

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special, patient training, in order to fit them for the work of the ministry.

If the Board shall determine to continue longer the experiment, as yet hardly begun, of supplying this needed training to such candidates as may offer, I trust that the Lord's blessing may crown it with success, and make it an efficient agency in our work among the much neglected colored people. But in view of my conscious lack of any special fitness for this work, and my conviction of greater usefulness in regular parochial work, I beg leave to resign my appointment at the close of the session in July, or at such earlier period as the board may deem it expedient to suspend the work.

3. Give the names of such of your vestry as are in favor of division, of those opposed to division, of those undecided.

(3.) That the aforesaid committee shall tabulate these returns, and report the same to the next Council.

(4.) These questions (as to number of members of vestry who favor an assistant bishop, a division, or those undecided,) be addressed to the communicants of each church, to be called together by the rector on Easter Monday, or when the vestry is elected, and that the answers be reported as provided above in the same way as regards vestries.

The minutes were read and approved.

Rev. Dr. Gibson, from the Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund presented the following report:

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese are thankful to be able to report to the Council that by the judicious management of our treasurer, and the much larger number of contributing parishes the past year, both the principal and annual income of the fund have been increased. The number of persons and parishes contributing during the year ending May, 1878, was only *ten*. During the year ending May, 1879, they increased to *fiftysix*. The amount given year before last was only \$272.73; for the last year it was \$777.17. This amount, with the interest yielded by the fund, has made our income \$2,177.81, while the face value of our bonds has increased to \$25,951.47.

The distribution of the Board for the coming year has amounted to \$1,810, leaving \$367.81 to be invested towards the increase of the principal of the fund. We present herewith the encouraging report and statement of our treasurer, and ask that they may be printed in the Journal.

Among the expenditures will be found a small amount of mission prayer books, sent to destitute fields in accordance with the powers granted to the Executive Committee by the constitution and laws of the society. It is proper here to state, that the trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia received during this year a legacy of \$6,461.73 net for the benefit of the society. In the prostrate condition of the treasury of the Diocesan Missionary Society the corporators appropriated to its immediate wants the sum of \$1,461.73, and also the accrued interest of \$75. The remaining sum of \$5,000 was judiciously invested by the trustees, who have allowed this Executive Committee to use the interest as part of their regular income. This income amounts to \$300 per annum, which is all that it affords, and can be relied on from it. It is evident that this small addition to the resources of this society does not lessen the obligations of the parishes to continue their support of the diocesan missions.

The reports furnished by the missionaries have from time to time been published in the *Southern Churchman*, in accordance with the arrangements made with the editor some time since; and the attention of all rectors and parishes to these reports is most earnestly requested, as they certainly are calculated to stimulate the interest of all in the missionary work of the diocese.

Thus far this report was drawn up by our late secretary and general agent.

The following extract from the minutes of the proceedings of the Executive Committee is here added:

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH, RICHMOND, 5TH MAY, 1879.

Since our last meeting, the Rev. F. M. BAKER, the faithful and devoted secretary of this committee, has been taken from us by death. In sincere attestation of our respect for his memory, we have recorded upon our Journal our sense of the great loss to our committee and to the diocese.

The committee having found by experience that a secretary and 5

general agent is indispensable, unanimously elected Rev. Pike Powers to that place.

In conclusion, the committee regret to have to add that the clergy and other friends of this society have been unusually backward in sending their contributions to the treasurer, insomuch, that they are more than usually oppressed in regard to the charge which the diocese has entrusted to their hands, and therefore they close this report with the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the Council urge upon the clergy and vestries throughout the diocese a hearty coöperation with the committee by regular, liberal and prompt contributions to its funds.

2. *Resolved*, That the clergy and laity of the diocese do now for their respective parishes engage as heretofore for contributions to be paid periodically during the coming year.

Rev. J. G. Armstrong reported as chairman of the committee on the accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund, that accounts and vouchers connected with the fund had been examined and found correct.

Rev. W. Q. Hullihen as chairman of the committee on the Bruce Fund reported that the accounts and vouchers in connection with that fund had been examined and found correct.

Judge J. Thompson Brown presented the following report of the Committee on Historiographer, which was received and its resolutions adopted:

The committee to which was referred the resolution of last Council respecting the appointment of a historiographer of this diocese, beg leave to report: That fully appreciating the importance of an accurate history of the diocese from its origin onward continuously in the future, your committee deems the first and most necessary steps toward it to be the collection and preservation of the material for the work, and placing it within the control of the person who is to compose the history.

In this work, attention should at once be given to the county and

corporation courts, of the overseers of the poor, and the registers of the parishes, between the original erection of the colonial government in the State and the peace between the mother country and the colonies.

These documents are in condition of great neglect, many of them scattered in unknown places, and even those in the keeping of the State authorities are in numerous instances mutilated and defaced, and in danger of becoming useless at any time. Those prepared during the first period are especially in this condition, and without them a most interesting and in some respects the most important facts of this history may soon be destroyed.

It seems to your committee that the most effectual means of preventing this result is the appointment of an officer, empowered to procure the gratuitous services of some competent person friendly to the object, and residing in the several parishes, to examine these public documents, making and forwarding to such officer such copies and extracts from them as he may from time to time prescribe, to be kept safely by him. It is hardly to be expected that there may not be found in every parish of the diocese, at least one person who, from love of the church or his State, will willingly lend himself to a purpose so praiseworthy and attended with so little trouble.

The officer mentioned should be empowered also to correspond with the registers or vestries of the several parishes, and ascertain what parish record or parts of them now exist embracing the period beforenamed, and to procure from the vestries their consent to their removal to the Library of the Theological Seminary, as the property of the vestries, there to be safely kept, liable to be recalled at the pleasure of the vestries from which they came, and subject to the use of such person as may be appointed to prepare a history of the diocese.

As to the parish registers which have been filed and put aside from use since the period aforesaid, these should also be forwarded to the Library of the Seminary, on the same terms and for similar uses as those first mentioned, unless in the exercise of a discretion to be vested in the person to be appointed to prepare the history, he should deem it sufficient to have such extracts made from them and forwarded to him as he may prescribe. These registers it is much to be regretted are often kept in frail books, the entries carelessly and hurriedly made, and then thrown aside, without any care for their pre-

servation. The rector is often a mere temporary sojourner in the parish, having no special interest in its history, and the vestrymen and registers often active men of business, having little time or taste for such employment, and so the books hurriedly made up are left to take the chances of loss, mutilation or decay. This is much to be regretted, and if possible some prevention should be adopted.

It suggests itself to your committee that the person who is to collect the material for the history, with a view to his composing it, is the proper person to superintend this matter, and that a historiographer of the diocese should be appointed on a reasonable adequate salary to attend to the preparation and safe-keeping of the registers now complete, and those hereafter to be completed, and that he should be required from time to time to make proper enquiries into the mode of keeping and preserving the registers and give such directions concerning these matters as would produce uniformity in the mode of keeping, and safety in preservation of these books, as experience might indicate. It would be difficult to lay down beforehand any definite rules, especially as the circumstances of the parishes are various, and experience and attention to the subject can alone be relied on to arrange suitable regulations. Your committee, therefore, content themselves to confide this matter to the historiographer and vestries, satisfied that nothing will be required by the former which the latter will not willingly and cordially approve. The collection of the registers made up since the peace before named and thence onward, might accumulate too great a mass for convenience, but the historiographer could easily prevent this by requiring such extracts to be made and forwarded exclusive of the matter required to be embraced in the parochial report, as to reduce to comparatively small space the part of the library devoted to this use. Your committee is pleased to learn that the finances of the diocese are in such condition that the initiatory steps of collecting the registers first mentioned can be entered on upon a moderate compensation, to be increased in the future as the history may be commenced and prosecuted and as they have reason to believe and hope the resources of the diocese will increase. Your committee therefore recommend to the Council the adoption of the resolutions following, viz:

Resolved, 1st, That the Council approve of the appointment of a historiographer of the several parishes of this diocese, and of his proceeding at once to collect and preserve the registers of the parishes made up between the erection of the colonial gov-

erament in Virginia and its overthrow; that he procure from the vestries of the several parishes their consent to forward the parish registers for the period aforesaid to the librarian of the Theological Seminary near Alexandria, there to be carefully kept and preserved and liable at all times to the use of the historiographer, but to be received and kept as the property of the parish from which they may be forwarded, and liable at any time to their recall.

Resolved, and, That the historiographer have authority to procure from the said parish the transmission to the said library, to be there kept in the same manner and on the same terms as are mentioned in resolution No. I, any other parish registers made up and completed since the period aforesaid, that he may deem essential to the preparation of the said history, or, if in his opinion it may be more advantageous, the making such copies and abstracts of and from the register last mentioned and transmission of them to the said library, as he may deem essential.

The committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's Address, connected with his letter of godly admonition and counsel, dated February 18th, 1879, have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to report: That the matters embraced by this reference have filled your committee with great concern, blended with sincere pleasure: concern, for the peace and harmony of the diocese; and pleasure, that its sacred interests are in the hands of a Bishop who follows duty with fearless firmness, however painful its pathway may be; and, under him, entrusted to the keeping of ministers who regard the vow of ordination as above personal taste and individual opinions.

Report on Bishop's Letter of "Godly Admonition."

As its chief minister, a bishop's duty is to see to it that the church within his diocese suffers no harm; and "with all faithful diligence to banish and drive away from it all erroneous and strange doctrines contrary to God's word," and "diligently to exercise such discipline as by authority of God's word and by the order of this church is committed to him."

It is the duty of every minister of this church, according to the solemn vow and promise made by him at his ordination, to obey his Bishop, and to follow with a glad mind and will his godly admonitions, and to submit himself to his godly judgments; and it affords your committee pleasure to believe, that the clergy in this diocese recognize the binding force of this vow and promise.

The laity of this diocese are law-loving and conservative: and have heretofore faithfully observed the laws of their church, and reverenced their ministers and bishops, as those ordained by God for the cure of their souls, and the spiritual conduct of the church: and your committee cannot doubt that this spirit will ever animate their loyal devotion to the church of their fathers; and that no insubordination on their part to its constituted authorities will call for the exercise of its power to suppress it.

According to the law of this church, neither wardens nor vestries have rightful power to prescribe or to regulate ritual; to change rites or ceremonies; or, to prescribe or introduce into the church, ornaments or decorations in connection with worship, the manner of conducting which pertains to the minister in charge, who is amenable to his Bishop, and whom he has promised to obey. And thereupon the committee have adopted the following resolutions, in which they ask the concurrence of the Council—

1. That, in the judgment of this Council, the Bishop had the rightful power to give to the ministers, under his charge, the godly admonition contained in his circular letter of the 18th day of February, 1879; and that, irrespective of reasons therefor, it became the duty of those ministers to give heed to and obey such admonition with a glad mind and will,—and

2. That, it is the earnest wish and prayer of this Council, that cheerful and willing obedience be yielded by clergy and laity to the Bishop's views and admonition; so that no occasion may arise for legislation to give effect thereto: that peace and harmony may abound throughout the diocese: and that clergy and laity, having Minority Report on Same,

the mind that is in Christ Jesus our Lord, may, with one heart, desire those things which make for peace; and our beloved diocese, in its unity of faith and its ancient loving concord, may go forward to fulfil its holy mission, in establishing and building up the church within its borders, upon the true foundation, which is Christ !

At the same time we would express the earnest hope that throughout the diocese ready obedience may be given to the Bishop's views in regard to these matters, and that there will be faithful co-operation with him in promoting the peace and harmony of the diocese, and maintaining the Protestant character of this Protestant Episcopal Church.

Mr. B. T. Johnson offered the following substitute for the report:

Whereas, it is a most valuable part of that blessed liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, that in his worship different forms and usages may, without offence, be allowed; *provided*, the substance of the faith be kept entire; and

Whereas, it is not necessary that traditions and ceremonies be in all places one or utterly alike; for at all times they have been divers, and may be changed according to the diversity of countries, times and men's manners; so that nothing be ordained against God's word; and

Whereas, the spirit and intent of the Protesant Reformation was to allow the largest liberty in rites, ceremonies, forms and usages of worship; and, therefore, the Church of England established a standard of ritual in the rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer, below which no one is allowed to go, and a standard of faith in the articles of religion, beyond which no one, by practices, uses, or professions was permitted to depart, and between which rules, bishops, clergy and laity were secured and guaranteed the most liberal indulgence in ceremonies, ornaments and decorations, except where controlled by Canon; and

Whereas, the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, formed, nurtured and deriving its authority from the Church of England, and exercising the power to change her standard of ritual and of faith, as she had the right to do, hath established for her members a still wider liberty and more indulgent freedom of use and of conscience, by omitting from the rubrics many requirements of ceremonies, and from the articles of religion positive declarations of faith; and in the further exercise of her authority hath admitted

the laity to a share in the government of the church, and hath ordained a written constitution, under and in pursuance of which alone the authority of the church can be exercised, for the change of ritual or the modification of articles of faith, or the enlargement or abridgement of the liberty guaranteed to all her children in matters of ritual and faith; and

Whereas, these changes were not to gratify this or that party in any of their unreasonable demands, but to do that which she conceived might most tend to the promotion of peace and unity of the church, the procuring of reverence and exciting of piety and devotion in the public worship of God, and the cutting off occasion from them that seek occasion of cavil or quarrel against the Liturgy of the church; and

Whereas, it has become painfully manifest, that in some places, some persons, clergy as well as laity, have abused this liberty, secured to them under the Constitution of the Church, by introducing and insisting on practices and ceremonies which symbolize erroneous and doubtful doctrines, and which are not in accord with the doctrine, discipline and worship of our own church, and are foreign to the genius and spirit of our services, and tend to teach, and do teach the very dogmas which our ancestors protested against and rejected at the reformation as the errors of the church of Rome; and

Whereas, the power to repress such dangerous practices can only be exercised by the authority of the whole church, and no integral part thereof can or ought to undertake to make any rule applicable only to itself, in matters of ritual or of faith, whereby the liberty guaranteed by the whole church, to every member thereof, wherever he may be, may be abridged by any diocese, parish, vestry or other part thereof; and

Whereas, all such teachings of false or doubtful doctrine, whether by works, acts, or things, is a scandal to the church, and a stumbling block of offence to the lovers of good order and true religion, and ought to be repressed by the full power of the whole church, and, if necessary, by such change and modification of the Constitution and Canons as may be necessary for that purpose, in order that the liberty of her members may be preserved, and the purity of her faith maintained:

Therefore, we the clergy and laity, of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, in the Diocese of Virginia,

n Council assembled, do hereby instruct our deputies to the next General Convention of the Church in the said United States, to urge upon that venerable and illustrious body, the adoption of such constitutional legislation, and, if necessary, such amendment to the Constitution and Canons as may be necessary to forever prohibit and always prevent all such ceremonies, services, vestments, ornaments, decorations, usages and practices as symbolize or teach or tend to symbolize or teach erroneous or doubtful doctrine, and particularly all such dogmas as were rejected by the church as errors of the church of Rome.

And that they be particularly instructed to urge such action as will protect the charch from the intrusion of the dogmas

Of the material presence and transubstantiation.

Of the sacrament of marriage.

Of the sacrament of penance and the practice of auricular confession.

Of the sacrament of confirmation and orders

Of the sacrament of extreme unction.

Of the practice of intercessory prayers to and for the dead, and the invocation of saints;

And from all like teachings.

SATURDAY, May 24, 1879, 9 A. M.

The Council met and was called to order by the Bishop, after prayer by the Rev. Albert Ware.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Rev. Wm. N. Ward asked to be allowed to record his vote on the question taken last night. Permission being granted, he voted in the affirmative.

Rev. Dr. Packard presented the report of the committee on the State of the Church:

The Committee on the State of the Church would report to the Council that the past ecclesiastical year has been one of prosperity to the Diocese of Virginia. Its condition, as reported by the Bishop, has been encouraging. He reports that the number of confirmations has been 1,032; the number of postulants as 15; the number of candidates for holy orders as 22; that he has ordained 10 to the order of deacons, and 8 to the order of priests, while the net gain in the number of cod took them." They were, as far as we can judge, good and faithful servants, always about their Master's business; and the voices we miss in our assemblies on earth now join in the louder and eternal hallelujahs of heaven.

But apart from the loss by death, more than twelve of our clergy have gone to other dioceses from the want of sufficient support. As this has been the case in years past, so it will be in the future, unless the church in Virginia provides better for her clergy. Though men of self-denial, contented with little, yet it must not be forgotten that they are men—men of like wants and necessities with those to whom they minister. While they do not expect the ease and luxury with which secular employments reward those who pursue them, they must provide for their households, and should live above the fear of want and the vexations and anxieties of debt. Every parish which hopes and desires to secure the faithful services of a minister of God must provide him in good faith and with honest punctuality a decent support. More than this is not asked; this much cannot in common justice be denied.

. State of the Church.

We regard the Societies of the Brotherhood, of the Disabled orgy, and that of the Widows and Orphans of Clergymen, as important means in retaining our clergy in the diocese. Whatever agency ministers to the comfort of the clergy when incapable of duty; whatever cheers their hearts upon their death-beds with the thought that they are not to leave their families altogether unprovided for, to find their way as best they may through a cold world, should be fostered, and we hope that the collections on the appointed days for these societies will never be omitted.

In connection with this subject, and as closely associated with it, we refer to the Diocesan Missionary Society, which we regard as the most important agency for supplying feeble parishes with ministers. During the past year it has sustained in whole or in part twenty-five missionaries, at a stipend of \$250 per annum. There has been a decrease in its receipts from the parishes of \$1,000. We earnestly entreat every member of the church to do something to relieve the pressing necessities of this society. Next in importance is the Education Society. Its object is to aid young men without means in their preparation for the ministry. This society aids all who come properly recommended as pious, fit for the ministry of the church, and needing aid. In contributing to this society the members of our church are contributing directly to the success and prosperity of the diocese, which must always depend upon an adequate supply of clergy.

Regarding the work among colored people in the diocese, we have much to encouage us. The efforts of the missionary in Petersburg have been vouchsafed a good measure of success. After struggling many years for a foothold, he has laid such a foundation as to justify the expectation of rearing in the future a substantial and lasting superstructure. The theological department established there last October, in charge of the Rev. Professor Spencer, is in successful operation; and besides the training of young men for the sacred ministry, much good is being done by the students visiting among their own people. The number of confirmations for the past year, larger than ever before, the unusual number of baptisms, the increased number of Sunday and parochial schools, taught by teachers of their own race, as well as by white teachers, all go to show that the good work is spreading. The taking hold of this important work in many parts of the diocese by both clergy and laity, male and female, is another

proof that the church is being more and more aroused to a sense of her duty to this race. The interest manifested by the colored people themselves, in the instruction and care that they now receive at our hands, are favorable signs that they are beginning to realize that our church not only welcomes them gladly, but is eminently fitted to meet their religious wants. The remarkable work in Brunswick and adjoining counties, under Mrs. F. E. Buford, has awakened great hope as to our being able to reach on a large scale, and to influence for good this class of our population. Through the efforts of this modest and refined church-woman, under God, we call attention to the fact that, an entire congregation, called the Zion Union Apostolic Church, consisting of their bishop, more than twenty (20) preachers, and about 2,000 communicants, is seeking to be placed under the care of our church. When it is considered what an amazing work (unaided and alone except by her Heavenly Father's help) among these people, has been done by this devoted servant of God, can we not take courage and hope, that at last an open door and effectual has been opened to us in the direction of a people whom we have too much neglected ?"

There is another topic which we deem appropriate to this report: the necessity of increased lay agency. The church is a temple fitly framed, where every stone is necessary for the perfection of the building. Every member of the church has his work to do, which cannot be done by anyone else. In the early church every man felt himself to be a missionary. Every minister will encourage the cooperation of the laity, and will feel as Moses did when Joshua proposed to forbid Eldad and Mildad prophesying in the camp. Moses answered: "Would God that all the Lord's people were prophets, and that the Lord would put His spirit upon them."

In surveying the past year we find that the contributions to religious objects have fallen but little below those of recent years, notwithstanding the formation of the new Diocese of West Virginia. It is a remarkable fact that the church in Virginia has annually contributed more since the war than before, "its deep poverty abounding unto the riches of its liberality."

In conclusion, we would say that we hope and pray that the unity in faith and love which has so remarkably distinguished the church in Virginia in years past, so that it has been called "a city which is at unity in itself," may ever continue.

Virginia Female Institute.

Rev. Dr. Dashiell read communication from the standing Committee on Church Property, asking permission to sell a lot in Hollywood, the property of the diocese.

On motion, they were directed to make the sale.

Rev. Dr. Minnigerode called up the report of the Committee on Canons.

Gen. B. T. Johnson moved the following:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on the Constitution and Canons be referred back to the committee to consider the same; prepare such amendments as they may consider necessary; have the same printed in parallel columns, with the present Constitution and Canons, showing the proposed alterations in *italics*, and forward a copy of the same to each clergyman and vestry in the diocese by Christmas, 1879.

The motion was carried.

Col. J. M. Patton offered an amendment to Canon IV, which was referred to the committee.

Judge Sheffey presented the following report of the Board of Directors of the Virginia Female Institute:

The Board of Directors submit for the consideration of the Trustees this their annual report:

They invite the special attention of the Trustees to the following matters:

I. The account current of the rector, showing, as the items now stand, a balance in favor of the Institute of \$790.38. See paper A. It must however be remembered that the insurance premiums for the year are to be paid, and, as the Board is aware, some necessary repairs and improvements must be made during the vacation. The Board, however, confidently anticipate a surplus sufficient to pay the interest and sink a part of the principal of the indebtedness of the Institute. And they feel gratified in saying the heating apparatus, although more costly than was at first anticipated, is a perfect success; that the application of Sagendorph preparation to the roofs of the buildings has successfully and entirely arrested the leakages in

them; and that the addition of the Kice lot to the Institute grounds will prove to be most advantageous in many ways.

2. The report of the rector in respect to the Institute, its condition and successful administration. The attention of the Trustees is invited to the two matters of interest in respect to which the rector requests an expression of opinion,-"First, as to the reception of certificates of examination from other institutions : and Second, as to the system of honors, as part of the present moral suasion system of discipline." It is hoped that the rector will in person appear before the Board of Trustees and give his own views on these points. As to the first, this Board is of opinion, that no diplomas or certificates of scholarships should be given by the Institute upon the basis of certificates of examination from other institutions, however respectable; but that all such evidences of proficiency should be founded on rigid examinations by the officers of the Institute themselves : As to the second, this Board is of opinion, that at least the expense incurred in connexion with the bestowal of diplomas and honors, should be lessened. And to this end, they would suggest, that no diploma should be awarded to any pupil until her final graduation: and, then, that but one diploma should be awarded, embracing the schools in which the pupil has graduated : and that for all distinctions, prior to final graduation, inexpensive certificates of proficiency should be given. The Board, however, requests the advice and counsel of the Trustees on these points; and as advised, they will adopt such rules and regulations as may be appropriate.

3. The statement marked C, showing the sums borrowed by the Board and how disbursed; and exhibiting a balance due to Hugh W. Sheffey, who acted as fiscal agent of the Board in this regard of \$195.38, as of May 19, 1879. The Trustees are aware, that at the last session of the General Assembly an act was passed authorizing the Board, with the consent of a majority of the Trustees, to borrow money, to an amount not exceeding six thousand dollars, and to create a mortgage or trust deed to secure the loans. Thirteen of the fifteen Trustees gave their consent in writing, to the exercise, by the Board, of the powers conferred by the act of Assembly. A trust deed has been carefully prepared and recorded for the securing of bonds to an amount not to exceed six thousand dollars. As shown by statement C, five hundred dollars were borrowed before the passage of the act, and twenty-five hundred dollars has been borrowed since its

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passage, making the present bonded indebtedness, three thousand dollars. It may not be necessary to issue the full amount of bonds; and the Board will not issue more than will be found necessary, using the income of the Institute to sink the debt as rapidly as possible.

The act of Assembly, the consent of the Trustees, and the form of the trust deed and of the bonds secured thereby, have been recorded in the record book of the Board, which will be exhibited to the Trustees.

The Board, with sincere gratification, beg leave to assure the Trustees that, with the means arising from said mortgage, and the proceeds of the rents, which will be at their command, they anticipate no trouble in the future in providing for the indebtedness incurred in connexion with the heating apparatus and the Kice lot.

In conclusion, the Board of Directors desire to express their hearty concurrence in all the rector says in his report in respect to the health, progress and demeanor of the pupils, and the fidelity, competency and efficiency of his corps of officers and teachers; and they earnestly commend this diocesan institution to the care of the Council, and to the liberal patronage of the friends of Christian education throughout the Diocese. The members of this Board sincerely believe that the Virginia Female Institute is unsurpassed by any similar institution in the country, as a training school for physical culture, health, mental development, useful learning, and for moral and religious elevation of character; and in nothing is it more distinguished than for the perfectly lady-like deportment of its pupils, and for the attractive graces of a truly refined womanhood which peculiarly distinguish them in domestic and social life; and above all, for the religious influence its graduates everywhere exert; and for their devotion and labors for the church, wherever they go. Many waste places, throughout the South, have been restored by them, and many churches have been built through their exertions; and the church we love so dearly has been abundantly blessed by their zeal in good works and their Christian examples. The tree which has borne such fruits deserves the fostering care of the Council.

Colored Work.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel, from the special Committee on Colored Work, presented the following:

The Committee to whom was referred so much of the Bishop's address as relates to the application for the aid and counsel of this church, from the colored organizatian known as "The Zion Union Apostolic Church," in southern Virginia, respectfully report: That while deeply impressed with the grave importance of said application, and with the weighty responsibility thereby imposed upon the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia; that while they sincerely desire to express the warmest sympathy and interest in the spiritual welfare of our colored brethren of Brunswick and the counties adjoining-your committee do, nevertheless, feel greatly embarrassed in the expression of such sympathy, whether by word or deed, by the vagueness of the application made. After availing themselves as a committee and as individuals, of all the information within their reach, they have failed to eliminate this embarrassing element of incertitude from the case submitted to their consideration. This uncertainty as to what and how much our colored friends ask on our part, and propose on their own, creates further embarrassment as to what can and what should be done for their relief.

Of one thing your committee are convinced, that at the present state of negotiation and development, the work of the Protestant Episcopal Church among the colored people known as "The Zion Union Apostolic Church," in southern Virginia, can only be effective for good by disturbing in the smallest possible degree their existing church relations, and that the responsibility and duty of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the present aspect of affairs, must be restricted to teaching, or "disciplining" that people,—aiding them by every means in our power to embrace a pure christian faith and to lead godly and christian lives.

A restatement of the facts is needless, and all that your committee feel called upon to do in the premises is to suggest what, on our part, may be done in compliance with the application of our colored friends. They therefore propose for adoption by this Council, if meeting their approval, the following resolutions:

I. *Resolved*, That the Bishop of the Diocese be requested to appoint at least one evangelist, whose time shall be devoted to work among the colored people of Brunswick and the counties adjoining, in connection with the Rev. Messrs. R. White, R.

Contingent Fund.

A. Goodwin and E. B. Jones, and that for this object \$700 per annum be paid out of the Contingent Fund of the Diocese.

2. *Resolved*, That the Rev. gentlemen just named and J. R. Jones, Esq., do constitute, and are hereby appointed, a special committee, to take charge of this entire work, and to report from time to time for the information of this Church.

3. *Resolved*, That whenever these brethren shall deem it expedient, they shall be empowered to employ as Catechists, under their supervision, any of the colored preachers of "The Zion Uuion Apostolic Church."

4. *Resolved*, That fit persons of this class be sought out, and encouraged to become candidates for the sacred ministry, and that when so disposed, they be assured of aid in pursuing the necessary studies.

5. *Resolved*, That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and the committee on Colored Congregations be and are hereby charged with the duty of supplying the books which may be needed for Sunday- or for day-schools among this people.

6. *Resolved*, That as colored ministers are ordained, they be received, as heretofore, to seats and to all the privileges of members of this Council, and that the status of colored Episcopal congregations (if any) which may be formed, as to lay representation in the Council, be left for future consideration and decision.

7. *Resolved*, That the Bishop and a special committee of two be requested to address a cordial letter of welcome and of Christian sympathy to the colored preachers and people of "The Zion Union Apostolic Church," to be read to them by the Rev. brethren in charge of this work in Brunswick and the counties adjoining.

8. *Resolved*, Lastly, that our deputies to the next General Convention be charged with the duty of bringing before the house of clerical and lay deputies the question of the expediency of giving to the colored people of Virginia and the other Southern States, when desired, a full and complete church organization of their own race, under such constitutional and canonical provisions as the General Convention in their wisdom may devise and ordain.

The report was adopted, and its resolutions carried.

The following committee was appointed under resolution VII: The Bishop, Rev. J. S. Hanchel, D. D., and A. W. Weddell, D. D.

Rev. J. B. Newton, from the special Committee on the Contingent Fund, reported the following:

Your committee was appointed at the Council which met in Staunton two years ago, "to take into consideration the matter of the Contingent Fund, and if possible to devise some better plan of apportionment than that now in use."

Olerical Support.

We beg leave to report, that after the most careful consideration of this subject, and after correspondence with the treasurers of a number of other dioceses, we have been unable to devise any better plan than now in use in this diocese.

Mr. J. R. Jones from the Committee on Clerical Support:

The Committee on Clerical Support have carefully examined and considered the papers submitted to them on that important subject, and make report as follows:

The committee have had before them the reports from one hundred and twenty churches in the diocese. Very many of these have not conformed to the requirements of the circular letter of the secretary of the Council, which inadvertance or neglect caused increase of labor and embarrassment in the discharge of the duty assigned the committee. From fifty-six churches no report was before them, and these churches are put in the delinquent list for that reason. Neglect of a ready and proper compliance with the demands of the Council in this matter, in the opinion of the committee, is almost as culpable as failure to pay a minister's salary promised him. In the one case neglect, or indolence (properly called laziness), must be implied; whereas, in the other case, failure in the discharge of duty may proceed from inability to meet promptly, or fully, the sacred obligations incurred by the parish or church.

The committee hold that the pecuniary claims upon the churches for the support of their ministers, are as sacred as any contract that can be created between man and man; that failure to meet obligations so created, is condemned by the teachings of common *honesty*, even when conscience has not been enlightened by the truth as contained in the word of God. We can therefore only excuse the parties thus delinquent, when their claim to such excuse can be based upon inability, after the most strenuous and persistent effort to pay their honest debts. That there should be delinquents, from any cause whatever, in this respect, is always to be regretted; and your committee grieve to say, that this report is no exception to preceding ones, in that it records eighteen of our churches as failing to pay amounts

promised their ministers for their support, and that the agegrgate sum thus in arrears is \$1,281.96. It is to be hoped that this amount will be very largely reduced hereafter; and we would most earnestly and affectionately invoke the aid and influence of all Christians, men and women, to banish such reproach as an unpaid salary of a minister from the church. The laity are responsible, mainly, we feel, for this crime in the sight of God; and yet we do insist, that no motives of false delicacy in the premises, should restrain our brethren of the clergy from the presentation of the *truth*, in all that concerns man's duty to God and man's duty to man. Have all of us, dear brethren of the clergy and of the laity, done our duty, as freely and fully as we *feel* we should have done it? O brethren, "if our heart condemn us, God is greater than our heart, and knoweth all things."

Per contra: It affords the committee great pleasure to state that five of the churches are on the record as having exceeded their promises to their ministers. We feel constrained to make honorable mention of this, well assured, as we are, that the Council will be no less gratified than ourselves by this fact. We append the roll of honor to this report, with the hope that the example may incite other churches to go and do likewise.

The committee believe that more active and successful co-operation in the congregations of the several churches would be caused by statements from the vestry, read in the church by the proper officer, at regular and stated periods, of the financial affairs of the church under their charge. The people would thus have full knowledge about these matters. and liberality would be excited and encouraged by the more frequent opportunities thus afforded for collections for all church work. It is the aggregate from small and regular contributions, even though they be the widow's mite, rather than large and irregular contributions, that keep the treasury of the Lord replenished.

Of the churches reported fifty-eight have a rectory, and many of these rectories have land attached—one hundred acres being the largest quantity reported in any case.

To facilitate the labors of future committees on this subject, we recommend that a uniform date should be adopted hereafter, as the time to which reports should be made up; and that some more concise form should be prepared for these reports from the treasurers of the parishes and churches.

Clerical Support.

The committee recommend the publication, in the *Journal* and in the *Southern Churchman*, of the churches delinquent in the payment of the salaries *promised* their ministers, or delinquent by making no report.

The committee cannot close their report without calling the serious attention of the Council and the Church at large to the injurious influence usually resulting from indefinite contracts between rectors and their churches;—we mean where no specific sum is agreed upon as necessary to the support of the minister and his family, but he is left entirely dependent upon the church collections, whether adequate or inadequate. No arrangement, in our unanimous judgment, can be entered into which will relieve the vestry and congregation from the *religious duty and obligation* to see to it, that "they who preach the gospel, should live of the gospel,"—which we construe to mean, that they shall live by *faith*, by faith we say, in God, and by faith in their fellow-men, who as Christians fulfil all their obligations.

Your committee beg leave to remark that from some parishes no return has been received, from others only a partial or imperfect statement, hence this report cannot be regarded as presenting perfectly accurate information on the various points which it includes.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey presented the report of the committee on Finance:

The Committee on Finance, to whom, as usual, the accounts of the treasurer of the Diocese of Virginia have been submitted, beg leave to report that they have examined said accounts and find them correct. The treasurer's ledger, which your committee has inspected, has been accurately and carefully kept and the account laid before your committee is a transcript from said ledger. The balance on hand, deposited in the State Bank of Virginia, as shown by the treasurer's bank book, was, on the 10th day of May 1879, \$1627.91. This balance includes the sum of \$183.06, interest on balances received from the Bank of Virginia.

Besides the customary appropriations heretofore made for the salaries of the bishop, the secretary and the chaplains, and their expenses, and the other ordinary expenses of the diocese, the committee recommend the payment of thirty dollars to the assistant secretary, and the sum of fifteen dollars to the sexton of St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, for his services during the present session of the Council. We further report that during the ensuing year, the treasurer will be called upon to pay to the treasurer of the Diocese of West Virginia, the sum of \$1,000, and to the Rev. Dr. Slaughter, Historiographer of the diocese, the sum of \$500 in quarterly installments.

The amount received by the treasurer on account of the contingent fund, up to the time of closing this report, is about \$8,100, and other amounts will be added during the session and will be duly accounted for. Only \$2,44.45 have been collected since the last Council, on account of arrearages due from delinquent parishes, and your

committee report that the delinquent list is increasing, year by year, and they are of opinion that some measure should be adopted to secure greater promptness in the payment of the contingent fund.

Your committee recommend that Messrs. H. E. C. Baskervill, John L. Bacon and John H. Claiborne be continued as a committee of the Council, with power to invest any surplus of the contingent fund, above the necessary charges for the year, in United States four per cent. bonds, the said committee having reported that they have found it impracticable to make investments in ground rents and mortgages, as directed by the report of the Finance Committee last year.

It appears from the report of your committee, made at the present session of the Council, upon the "evangelist fund," placed at the disposal of the Bishop, that there is a balance in his hands of 1,266 to be used in supporting the evangelist. In case the Bishop shall be able to engage the services of an additional evangelist, your committee recommend that the treasurer be authorized to pay to the Bishop any additional amount he may certify to be necessary for the purpose.

Rev. Dr. Peterkin presented the report of the Committee on New Parishes, as follows:

I. The Committee on new Parishes, to which was referred the petition of certain members of Emmanuel Church, Ridley Parish, Culpeper county, for the erection of a new parish, within the limits of Ridley Parish, to be called Slaughter Parish, find that all the canonical conditions have been complied with. According to agreement with the vestry of Ridley Parish, the bounds of Slaughter Parish are to commence at the junction of the Rapidan and Robertson rivers, down the Rapidan to Newman's Ford, thence by the county road which crosses the railroad, three-quarters of a mile south of Mitchell's station, to Slaughter's old church-site, thence to intersection of Orange and Culpeper road, thence by the road to Wayland's mill on Crooked run, thence down Crooked run to Robertson river, and down Robertson river to its junction with the Rapidan.

2. The committee have also considered the petition of certain

members of St. James' Church, Henrico Parish, in the city of Richmond, to be set apart as a separate congregation under the name of the Bishop Moore Memorial Church. In this case, also, all the conditions of the Canon have been complied with.

The committee therefore propose the following resolution:

Recolved, That the petitions of the members of Ridley Parish, Culpeper county, for the erection of a new parish, and of certain members of St. James' Church, Richmond, for the formation of a new congregation, be granted.

3. The committee have also had under consideration a petition from a joint committee, appointed by the vestries of St. John's and St. Paul's Churches, Salem Parish, Roanoke county, asking the division of that parish. This petition, however, does not comply with the requirements of the Canon, since it furnishes no evidence of any notice given by a committee of the congregation to the vestry, and since it is not an application from one portion of a parish to be set apart as a separate parish, but a petition from the whole parish to be divided into two. This may be a mere technical objection, but the mode of procedure is not that which is contemplated by the Canon. A more decided objection is based upon the consideration that your committee have no assurance that each one of the two proposed parishes would be self-sustaining.

4. Finally, your committee have considered the application of two of the congregations (Bethlehem and Trinity) of Nelson Parish. Nelson county, to be formed into a separate parish. This application is made with the approval of the *third* congregation (Christ Church) but the prescribed form of the Canon is not adhered to, and the third congregation has given no assurance of its being self-supporting.

The committee think that if this congregation, of Christ Church, can form a connexion with Tillotson Parish, Buckingham county, there may be sufficient ground for granting this application hereafter, as in that event, ministerial services could no doubt be secured.

In view of all the circumstances of both cases, the committee propose the following resolution:---

Resolved, That the petitions from Salem Parish, Roanoke county, and Nelson Parish, Nelson county, be not granted.

The amendment of Mr. Moore was lost.

The resolution of Rev. E. A. Penick, was lost.

The recommendations of the committee were adopted.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel gave notice that he would not call up at this Council the amendment last year proposed to Canon XIX, and that it would be called up next year only in the event of failure to adopt the proposed new code of Canons.

Rev. Dr. Murdaugh offered the following:

Resolved, That the form of Parochial Reports be amended so as to include a statement of the number of free seats in each and every church in the diocese, and also the method of the support of said churches, whether by rental of seats, general subscription, or otherwise.

The resolution was lost.

Rev. W. H. H. Powers presented the following, which was adopted by the Piedmont Convocation and forwarded as a communication to the Council:

Resolved, That the Piedmont Convocation do petition the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, at its sessions in Fredericksburg in May, 1879, to appoint a committee of two clergymen and three laymen, to devise some effectual and practical plan for the arrest of the evil of intemperance in this diocese, and to report such plan to the next meeting of the Council.

I beg leave to report, that during the past year I have, by God's blessing, without intermission, performed the duties of rector of the Virginia Female Institute, the Diocesan school of the church in Virginia. The session has been characterized by good health, hard work and uninterrupted harmony. We have rarely had such an exemplary set of pupils, many of whom are earnest servants of God. Number of communicants: teachers, officers and pupils, 39. The Bible classes embrace the boarding and nearly all the day pupils. The daily responsive school services have been maintained in the chapel, during the session, and the full church services, with discourses, on inclement Sundays.

I have assisted the rector of the Parish in his duties as occasion offered, and held services at Trinity Mission chapel, when my regular duties permitted. Funerals, baptisms and marriages are embodied in the rector's report.

The Institution is in admirable working condition, with an accomplished corps of officers, and I sincerely trust is contributing its humble part to the great work of christian education, under the auspices of the church and aiding it, in some measure, to obey the injunction of Jesus, "Feed my Lambs."

Mrs. Buford is the only person engaged in this great work. She has organized a society of women for the relief of the sick, which numbers twelve excellent nurses, who, since January, have ministered to sixty-one sick persons. She has received from various sources, mainly from the Woman's Auxiliary Aid Society, 21 boxes of clothing, &c., and a great quantity of books and papers, and \$441.70 to aid her in her work. A log chapel has been built at a nominal cost of \$165, which enables her to teach protected from the weather. The work has grown to such proportions and is of such a novel character that Mrs. Buford appeals to the Diocese for help. Of course I am heartily in sympathy with her, and do all I can to help; but hers is the work and hers be the praise. Would to God I could do more !
