## RULES OF ORDER.

#### ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterwards stand except to address the chair.

3d. The credentials of Lay Delegates shall be handed to the Secretary, who shall call the names of at least twelve, that the council may at once proceed to business. The credentials of all the delegates shall then be referred to a committee of two clerical and three lay members, who shall report thereon as speedily as practicable, and if any doubt arise as to the right of any delegate to a seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for their Examination.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of the pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

#### Rules of Order.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Elections.

A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.

2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of second.

3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council for special reasons shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council, or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick, or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders, who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectator shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church, in which the sessions of the Council are held, are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

#### Resignation of Treasurer-Committee on Credentials.

The Bishop then announced that a quorum of both orders being present, the Council was organized for business.

The resignation of Mr. H. E. C. Baskervill as treasurer of the Council, was presented and accepted.

Mr. P. H. Baskervill was nominated and elected to the office of treasurer of the Council.

Rev. Dr. Norton moved that the Rules of Order printed in the last Journal be adopted as the Rules of Order for this Council, except that the 12th rule be so amended as to require twelve members instead of three to call for a vote by ayes and noes.

Rev. Dr. Minnigerode moved that the Rules be adopted, the 12th rule being amended so as to require seven instead of three.

The amendment of Rev. Dr. Minnigerode was carried.

Rev. Dr. Minnigerode offered the following resolution, which was carried unanimously:

Resolved, That in receiving the resignation of Mr. H. E. C. Baskervill, as treasurer of the Diocese of Virginia, whilst not able to refuse his withdrawal from a post in which he has served the Diocese so long and faithfully, we accept it with sincere regret at losing the services of a treasurer who in the discharge of his duties has ever combined the courtesy of a Christian gentleman, the kindness of an impartial friend, and unsurpassed skill in the administration of the funds of the Church.

Resolved, That in view of the large extent of territory still to be occupied by our Church in this Diocese, and in order to lighten the arduous labors of our Bishop, this Council respectfully asks the Bishop to give his consent to the further division of the Diocese.

#### REPORT OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

#### REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:

With devout gratitude, I trust, to Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for His mercy and goodness which have followed us through another year, we meet once more to consult together concerning the things pertaining to His kingdom.

In giving you information of the state of the Diocese, as I am required to do by canon, I begin with an account of services performed by me since our last Council.

1879, May 25.—In St. George's, Fredericksburg, confirmed sixteen, and in Trinity, seven.

June 1.—Emmanuel, Henrico, confirmed seven.

June 5.—Buck Mountain, Albemarle, confirmed five, and in Christ Church, Charlottesville, twelve.

June 6.—Trinity, Staunton, fifteen. During this visit attended a meeting of the trustees of the Virginia Female Institute.

June 8.—In the morning preached and confirmed ten in Grace-Church, Lexington, and at night, by invitation of the Young Men's Christian Association of Washington and Lee University, preached in the University Chapel.

June 11.—Trinity, Bedford, confirmed three.

June 12.—St. Stephen's, five.

June 13.—Consecrated St. Peter's Church, and preached the sermon, Revs. J. A. Wharton and Albert Ware assisting in the service. This is a very neat church, built by a few English families, who were prevented by long distances over bad roads from attending any other place of worship. Rev. A. Ware officiates for them as often as his other duties will allow him to do so.

June 14.—St. Thomas', Bedford, confirmed three. This church had been enlarged and greatly improved in comfort and appearance since my last visit.

June 15.—Confirmed three in St. Mark's, Bedford, and seventeen in St. John's, Liberty.

June 22.—Confirmed in St. John's, Langley, Fairfax county, six; in Falls Church, fifteen, of whom six were students of the High School, and three in the Meade Memorial Colored Church, Alexandria.

June 23.—Pohick, Fairfax county, confirmed two.

June 24 to 26, was engaged with the examinations and other duties at the Seminary.

June 27.—Ordained five Deacons and six Priests in St. Paul's, Alexandria, Rev. Dr. Walker presenting the former, and Rev. H. Suter the latter, and Rev. H. T. Sharp preaching the sermon. This ordination was held in Alexandria because the Seminary Chapel, after being pronounced unsafe by competent architects, had been abandoned.

July 3.—After service by Rev. W. E. Webb, preached in the Presbyterian Church in Farmville.

July 4.—Preached in St. Ann's Church, Prince Edward.

July 5.—Preached in St. Paul's Appomattox, and celebrated the Lord's Supper, the church being vacant.

July 6.—In the morning preached in St. Peter's, Curdsville, Buckingham county; confirmed four and administered the communion, and in the afternoon preached and confirmed four in Grace, Ca Ira, Cumberland county. These churches, which had become well night extinct, by the blessing of God on the faithful and laborious efforts of Rev. F. Stringfellow, of Powhatan, have greatly revived, and, I trust, may yet become strong and prosperous.

July 13.—Visited St. Peter's, New Kent, which has long been vacant. Assisted by Rev. J. J. Norwood and T. H. Lacy, of West Virginia, services were held morning and afternoon, and four confirmed.

July 16.—Was prostrated by sickness, which compelled me to miss appointments in Hanover, King William, Essex and Middlesex counties. As soon as I had sufficiently recovered, I set out by way of Old Point to meet such of my appointments as still remained, and on July 20 preached for the rector of St. John's, Hampton.

July 23.—Preached in Ware Church, Gloucester, Rev. A. Y. Hundley reading prayers.

July 24.—Christ Church, Mathews, read the service, preached and confirmed two.

July 25.—Trinity, Mathews, read the morning prayer, preached and celebrated the Lord's Supper. The three last mentioned churches have been long vacant.

July 26.—Abingdon Church, Gloucester, confirmed thirteen.

July 27.—In the morning confirmed in Grace Church, Yorktown, two, and at night in Bruton, Williamsburg, four.

I still had appointments in Charles City county, but being overcome by heat and debility, was obliged to postpone them and return home.

August 8.—St. John's, Big Lick, Roanoke county, confirmed four.

August 9.—St. Paul's, Salem, confirmed five.

August 10.—Preached morning and afternoon in Christ Church, Blacksburg, and confirmed fifteen. Also baptized the infant daughter of the rector.

August 11.—Preached in the free church at Central Depot, Montgomery county, and confirmed seven.

August 12.—St. John's, Pulaski, confirmed seven.

August 13.—Assisted by Revs. G. W. Nelson, R. A. Goodwin and George S. Gibbs, rector, consecrated Emmanuel Church, Dublin, preached and confirmed five.

August 14.—Accompanied by Rev. George S. Gibbs, missionary, made the first Episcopal visit to Giles county, preached to a good congregation in the court-house at Pearisburg, and confirmed two.

August 15.—Consecrated McGill Memorial Chapel at Martin's Depot, Pulaski, and confirmed two. This church and the one at Dublin, the former a neat frame and the latter a handsome brick building, are some of the fruit of the faithful and successful labors of Rev. George S. Gibbs in Pulaski county.

August 16.-St. John's, Wytheville, confirmed eight.

August 17.—Preached and administered the Lord's Supper in Emmanuel, Goodson, and at night in the same church preached and confirmed six.

August 18.-St. Thomas', Abingdon, confirmed five.

August 19.—Preached in Christ Church, Marion, Smythe county.

August 31.—Preached in the church at Aldie, Loudoun county,

and confirmed five, and in Emmanuel, Middleburg, and confirmed one.

September 1.—Trinity, Upperville, confirmed three.

September 2.—Calvary, Front Royal, confirmed five.

September 3.—Trinity, Rappahannock, confirmed three.

September 4.—St. John's, confirmed two.

September 5.—Preached in St. Paul's in the same county.

October 2.—Emmanuel Chapel, Henry county, read prayers and preached.

October 3.—Services in Christ Church, Henry C. H., morning and night, and confirmed three. These churches had been vacant for some time, the Rev. John R. Lee having been compelled by bad health to almost entirely discontinue his labors.

October 5.—Preached morning and night in Trinity Church, Franklin C. H., confirmed eight and celebrated the Lord's Supper.

October 8.—Ascension, Amherst C. H., confirmed eight.

October 9.-St. Mark's, confirmed six.

October 17.—Preached in Vawter's, Essex.

October 18.—Preached in St. Matthew's.

October 19.—Confirmed five in St. Paul's and seven in St. John's, Essex.

October 21.—Christ, Middlesex, confirmed three.

October 23.—St. David's, King William, confirmed six, one being from Emmanuel, Hanover.

October 24.—Emmanuel, Hanover, confirmed three.

October 26.—Preached at Louisa C. H.

November 4.—Read prayers and preached in Calvary, Dinwiddie C. H., the church being vacant.

November 5.—Sapony, confirmed three.

November 6.—Trinity, Brunswick, confirmed one.

November 7.—Read prayers and preached in St. Luke's, Nottoway.

November 8.—Assisted in the services by Revs. E. B. Jones and George C. Sutton, consecrated Christ Church, Nottoway C. H.; preached and confirmed one.

November 9.—Preached in St. Paul's, Lunenburg.

November 10.—Visited a new church for colored people at McFarland's, Lunenburg; catechised the children, preached and confirmed five adults. This is a good work, carried on by Mrs. Jennings, a

faithful colored woman, under the rectorship of Rev. L. J. Sothoron. She teaches a Sunday and day school, and is slowly but surely, by the blessing of the Holy Spirit, impressing the truths of the gospel as set forth by our church, on the minds and hearts of the community. I found the plain, but neat and comfortable, log church nearly finished and ready for consecration.

November 11.—Confirmed six in St. John's, Lunenburg, several other candidates being absent from sickness or other causes.

November 14.—Confirmed one in St. Andrew's, Mecklenburg.

November 15.-In St. Luke's confirmed four.

November 16.—Preached in St. James, Boydton, confirmed nine, and admitted the assistant minister of the parish to priest's orders. The Rev. Messrs. L. R. Mason and R. A. Goodwin, rector, assisted in the services. At night preached to the colored people in their own church.

November 17.—Consecrated Christ Chapel at the almshouse of Mecklenburg county, preached and confirmed sixteen, of whom four were inmates of the institution. This is a very neat and comfortable little church, built through the efforts of Rev. R. A. Goodwin, in a poor and ignorant community, where good congregations attend the services.

November 18.—Preached in St. Timothy's Church, Clarksville, and confirmed two.

November 19.—Preached in Old Church, Chase City.

November 23.—Preached in the morning in St. Andrews', Law-renceville, and confirmed four white, and in the afternoon, in the same church, preached and confirmed nine colored.

November 24.—Accompanied by Rev. Messrs. White, Goodwin and E. B. Jones, visited the Colored Mission of the Good Shepherd to the Zion Union churches, about three miles from Lawrenceville. Their Bishop, a number of their ministers and a good congregation were present. Rev. Mr. White questioned the children on our Church Catechism, and he, Mr. Goodwin, their Bishop Howell and I made addresses. I leave it to Mr. White, our evangelist, to tell of the good work which is being done amongst this people.

November 25.—Preached in Christ Church, Hicksford, Greensville county.

November 26.—Grace Church, in the same county, confirmed four.

December 5.—St. James, Leesburg, confirmed ten white and one colored.

December 6.—In the Methodist Church, Herndon, Fairfax county (our own building not being finished), confirmed six.

December 7.—Confirmed six in Christ Church, Chantilly, and two in Zion Church, Fairfax C. H.

December 21.—In St. Stephen's Colored Church, Petersburg, after sermon by Rev. Thomas Spencer, admitted a candidate to deacon's orders, and at night in the same church preached and confirmed nine.

1880, January 11.—In St. Paul's Church, Richmond, performed the most interesting service of admitting to deacon's orders Mr. Job Turner, a deaf mute. Rev. Dr. Minnigerode, of St. Paul's, and Dr. Gallaudet, of St. Ann's Church for Deaf Mutes, New York, assisted in the service, the latter preaching the sermon. Mr. Turner is ministering to his fellow-unfortunates in our own and the other Southern dioceses. His report of his labors since his ordination will appear in the Journal with the other clerical reports.

January 14.—Attended a special meeting of the trustees of the Virginia Female Institute in Staunton, when the Rev. R. H. Phillips, because of bad health, resigned the office of principal, which he had filled ably, taithfully and successfully for more than thirty years. The board was constrained, reluctantly and sorrowfully, to accept his resignation, and at once advertised in a number of newspapers, with a view to secure a suitable successor.

February 1.—In St. Phillip's Colored Church, Richmond, after sermon by Rev. W. Q. Hullihen, confirmed two, and celebrated the Lord's Supper.

February 8.—Assisted by Rev. Messrs. Habersham, McBryde and Grammer, the rector, consecrated St. James' Church, Ashland, and confirmed two. Mr. McBryde preached the sermon. In the afternoon preached in the same church.

February 15.—In the morning read prayers and preached in Fork Church, Hanover, and in the afternoon in St. Martin's.

February 24.—Attended a meeting of the trustees of the Virginia Female Institute in Staunton.

February 26.—Consecrated Emmanuel Church, Harrisonburg, and at night in the same church, preached and confirmed six. The rector of this church, Rev. T. J. Edwards, took charge only last August.

He has accomplished wonders in paying off a debt which had existed for years, enclosing the ground, procuring a new organ, &c.

February 27.—Christ Church, Winchester, confirmed twenty-five.

February 28.—Christ Church, Alexandria, confirmed fourteen.

February 29.—Confirmed in St. John's, West End, eleven; St. Paul's, Alexandria, seven; and Grace, seven.

March 5.—Consecrated Christ Church, Charlotte county, and confirmed six; and the next day consecrated Grace Church, in the same parish, and confirmed eleven. Besides these two new churches, a nice and comfortable rectory has been built at Drake's Branch during the past year, and both in a temporal and spiritual point of view, the parish is in a very prosperous condition. Indeed, no where in the diocese has the blessing of God been more manifest, than on the consistent life, and the quiet, persevering, faithful labors of the Rev. L. R. Mason.

March 7.—Read prayers and preached in Christ and St. Luke's Churches, Halifax, and confirmed four in the former, and one in the latter, both being vacant.

March 9.—Preached in St. John's Church, Halifax Court-house.

March 10.—Preached in Grace, Halifax, and confirmed six; and at night in the handsome lecture-room of the beautiful Church of the Epiphany, Danville, and confirmed seventeen. I hope the new church building will soon be finished.

March 11.—Preached in Emmanuel, Pittsylvania Court-house.

March 12.—Christ, Lynchburg, confirmed two.

March 13.—Was prevented by bad weather and roads from meeting an appointment at Campbell Court-house.

March 14.—Confirmed in St. Paul's, Lynchburg, nine; and in Grace Memorial, thirteen white and one colored.

March 21.—Confirmed nine in the Meade Memorial, Manchester; eighteen in the Monumental; and eight in the Moore Memorial, Richmond.

March 23.—Grace, Richmond, confirmed four.

March 24.—St. Mark's, twenty-three.

March 25.—St. John's twenty-six.

March 26.-St. Paul's, thirteen.

March 28.—Christ, twenty-seven; St. James', fourteen; and St. Andrew's, thirteen.

April 4.—St. Paul's, Petersburg, confirmed twenty-six; and Grace, forty-two.

April 9.—Confirmed ten in Trinity and eight in St. John's, Portsmouth.

April 11.—A most interesting service was held in St. John's, Hampton, when five were confirmed, two being white, two Indians, and one a negro. At night preached in the same church. The Rev. J. J. Gravatt, besides his parish duties, is doing a good work amongst the Indians at the Hampton Normal School, this being the second class he has presented for confirmation.

April 13.—Preached in the Eastern Shore Chapel, Princess Anne county.

April 14.—At Emmanuel, in the same county, confirmed one.

April 15.—Confirmed nineteen in St. Paul's, Norfolk, and three in St. Paul's Chapel, Berkeley.

April 16.—In Christ, Norfolk, confirmed nineteen, and in St. Luke's nine.

April 18.—Westover, Charles City, confirmed six.

April 19.-Mapsico, confirmed four.

April 25.—Confirmed in St. George's, Fredericksburg, four, and in Trinity, eleven, being the second confirmation in each church during the year.

#### EVANGELISTIC WORK.

I was requested by resolution of the last Council to appoint at least one evangelist, whose time shall be devoted to work among the colored people known as "The Zion Union Apostolic Church." Unwilling to act on my own judgment in so delicate and important a matter, I called to my aid the standing committee on colored congregations. We met on 19th June, and after consultation unanimously agreed that it would be best, under all the circumstances, to appoint Rev. Robb White to give a part of his time only to this work. Accordingly, since July, he has devoted two Sundays in each month to St. Andrew's Church, Lawrenceville, where he resides, and the rest of his time to the work of an evangelist to the colored people. His interesting report for ten months will appear with the other reports in the Journal.

The last Council also resolved, that the Bishop and a special committee of two be requested to address a cordial letter of welcome and of Christian sympathy to the colored preachers and people of the Zion Union Church. The Rev. Drs. J. S. Hanckel and A. W. Weddell were appointed on this committee, the former of whom prepared a letter which was so truly apostolic, both in form and substance, that I regret my inability to lay it before you. One thousand copies of this letter were printed and circulated amongst those to whom it was addressed.

The work amongst these Zion Union brethren is so important and encouraging, that I do not hesitate earnestly to recommend, that Mr. White be continued as evangelist for another year. And I repeat what was said in my last address, that the difficulties in the way of our preaching the gospel to the colored people are disappearing more and more, so that in most parts of the diocese they are as accessible to the enlightening and sanctifying influences of our church as the white people are.

It will be seen by his report, that the Rev. J. J. Norwood has continued his faithful and abundant labors as evangelist during the past year. The Rev. R. A. Goodwin has also devoted a part of his time to the same useful work, in addition to his rectorship of two large parishes in Mecklenburg county. I reported to the last Council twelve hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$1266) as remaining in my hands of the Evangelist Fund. I now present my account for the

past year, showing that \$770 have been expended with a balance of \$496, and request that it may be referred to the Finance Committee for examination.

#### THE FAMINE FUND.

You are aware that a distressing famine has been prevailing for some time past in Ireland. An appeal having been made to me for help by the Lord Mayor of Dublin and others, I felt constrained to ask my brethren, the clergy and laity of the diocese, through the Southern Churchman, to contribute as they were able to the relief of our suffering and dying fellow-men. Mr. Wm. F. Gray, of Richmond, kindly consented to act as treasurer of any fund that might be raised. On the 12th inst., he had received one thousand and ninty-five dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$1,095.39), which, converted into a sight bill on London, amounted to £225 7s. 9d. This sum I transmitted to Archbishop Trench, of Dublin, to be disposed of as he might think best.

#### THE BIBLE SOCIETY.

I beg leave to call attention to the blessed work of that noble institution, the Virginia Bible Society, and respectfully to suggest that a collection be made annually in every congregation to add to its funds. It is more extensively engaged in distributing the word of God now than ever before, as our large colored population, who are poor and ignorant, require it should be. But its work is by no means confined to them—many of our own churches and Sunday schools receiving from it grants of Bibles and Testaments. The bishops and other ministers, and the people of our communion have ever manifested an interest in this society since its formation, and I trust that interest may never cease or diminish.

I have mentioned the resignation of the Principal of the Virginia Female Institute. The trustees have been so fortunate as to secure as his successor, Mrs. Flora Stewart, widow of the late Gen'l J. E. B. Stewart, who will take charge at the end of the present session. Mrs. Stewart is highly endorsed as a lady of refinement and cultivation, having great administrative ability, and experience as a successful teacher. She will retain several of the tried and satisfactory assistants now in the institution. With Mrs. Stewart and her associates in charge of our diocesan school, I do not hesitate to pronounce it to be,

in my judgment, worthy of the confidence and patronage of all whohave girls to educate.

The reports of the trustees and officers of our Seminary and High School will show those two most important institutions to be, by God's blessing, in a prosperous condition. The trustees of the Seminary, at their meeting last June, inaugurated measures for replacing the chapel with a new and more suitable building. By the aid of the Alumni Association and of friends within and especially without the diocese, those measures have been so far successful, that a sufficient amount of money has been raised, work on the new chapel has been commenced, and it is expected that it will be completed early in the fall.

I again earnestly commend our Missionary and Education Societies, the Brotherhood, the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, and all our diocesan institutions to your continued confidence and more generous support.

Beginning with the Council which sat in Alexandria in 1876, the question of more frequent Episcopal visitations has ever since been agitated. This agitation, for which, in my judgment, there is no ground whatever, is not likely to cease until something is done to quiet it. The only thing which can be done is, either to divide the diocese, or to elect an assistant Bishop. In my address to the Council in Lynchburg, in 1878, I declared my views in regard to these two measures. Those views remain unchanged except that subsequent reading, reflection, observation and experience have deepened my conviction that I ought not, and have strengthened my resolution that I will not, at this time, consent to a division of the diocese. I therefore respectfully suggest, that you adopt whatever measures may be necessary to obtain the consent of the General Convention, which is to meet in October next, to the election of an Assistant Bishop "for the reason of extent of Diocese," as provided by § V, of Canon 15, of Title I, of the Digest.

And now may the Holy Spirit grant us a right judgment in all things, that our sayings as well as our doings, may tend to the promotion of God's glory, and the best interests of our beloved church.

# Rev. Dr. Pendleton offered the following:

Resolved, That so much of the Bishop's Address as relates to applying to the General Convention for permission to elect an Assistant Bishop be referred to a commit-

tee of nine, five clergy and four lay delegates, to consider the same and report thereon for the action of the Council at its meeting to-morrow, and that their report be made the order of the day.

Carried.

The report of the Committee on the Constitution was then taken up.

Article 1st being under discussion, the proposed change of name from Council to Convention was voted on and rejected.

The Council took recess for divine service at 11 A. M.

May 20, 12:30 P. M.

The Council reassembled.

Rev. Dr. Hains moved that the sessions of this Council be held from 9 A. M. to 2:30 P. M., with recess at 11 for divine service, and from 4 P. M. to 7 P. M.

The Council resumed consideration of the Constitution.

Pending its consideration the Council adjourned until four o'clock.

4 P. M.

The Council reassembled and resumed consideration of the Constitution.

The Articles of the amended Constitution were taken up seriatim, and passed as follows:

#### ARTICLE I.

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, on the third Wednesday in May, every year; but the Council which meets in the year previous to the meeting of the General Convention, may have power to appoint the time and place of meeting for the next annual session; and in the event of the existence of an epidemic disease or any other good cause, rendering it necessary or expedient to alter the place fixed on for any meeting of the Council, the ecclesiastical authority of the diocese may change the place, or the time, or both.

#### ARTICLE II.

SEC. I. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop, if there be one, and of the ministers who now are, or may hereafter be, canonically settled in parishes or churches within this Diocese, Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, Missionaries within this Diocese and under its ecclesiastical authority, being clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese. *Provided*, That any ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members *ex officio*. *Provided further*, That no minister under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat in the Council, and no minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC. 2. The Council shall also be composed of lay members, consisting of one delegate for each parish or church, chosen by the vestry thereof. Every parish or church having more than one officiating

minister canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church.

#### ARTICLE III.

Twenty members of the clerical and twenty of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn.

#### ARTICLE IV.

In all matters that shall come before Council, the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body, and the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure; but when five members require it there shall be a vote by orders, and a majority of each order shall be necessary to a decision.

#### ARTICLE V.

The election of a Bishop in this Diocese shall be made in Council in the following manner: The order of the clergy shall nominate and appoint by ballot some fit and qualified clergyman for that office, and the votes of a majority of that order shall be requisite to constitute a choice; and thereupon such appointment shall be presented to the order of the lay delegates, and be considered by them; and if, on a ballot, it shall appear that the person so nominated is approved by a majority of the lay order, he shall then be declared to be duly elected.

#### ARTICLE VI.

The Bishop shall be President of the Council; in which character it shall be his duty to give to the Council annually, a general view of the state of the Church; to call special Councils at whatever time and place he shall think necessary, or when required by the standing committee; to preserve order during the time of session; to put the question, collect the votes, and declare the decision; and he may deliver his sentiments on any subject after it has been discussed, before a vote thereon. The Assistant Bishop, if there be one, shall preside in the Council in the absence of the Bishop.

#### ARTICLE VII.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, the Council, immediately upon their assembling, shall choose, by joint ballot, a President from among the order of Priests, who shall remain in office until the next annual Council, or until the next election of a President. He shall perform all duties and possess all the privileges above specified; but he shall not call special meetings of the Council, unless applied to for that purpose by a majority of the standing committee; and if the Bishop of the Diocese be not present at any meeting of the Council, they shall elect, in the manner aforesaid, a President protempore.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office during good behavior. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully to deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Council, which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to notify through the channel of the public papers, as he may think proper, the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journals of every succeeding Council a list of the clergy, with all alterations therein produced in the preceding year by ordinations, deaths, removals, suspensions and degradations.

#### ARTICLE IX.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office for one year, or until his successor shall be appointed. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be ordered by the Council. He shall annually report to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same.

In case of a vacancy in the office by the death or resignation of the Treasurer, or in case of his misconduct, incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, during the recess of the

Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may fill the said vacancy, or remove the said Treasurer, and appoint a Treasurer protempore, who shall take into his custody all the money and other property, and all the books and papers belonging to the said office, and discharge the duties thereof until the election of a Treasurer by the Council.

#### ARTICLE X.

Each Annual Council shall elect, by ballot, a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese.

#### ARTICLE XI.

Every parish within this Diocese shall be entitled to the entire benefit of this Constitution, as soon as it shall have signified its ratification thereof, either in writing or by sending a lay delegate to the Council; and such parish shall thereafter be benefitted and bound equally with the other parishes in this Diocese, by every rule and canon which shall be framed by any Council acting under this Constitution, for the government of this Church in ecclesiastical concerns.

#### ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution shall be unalterable, except in the following manner: A proposition for any change shall be introduced in writing and considered in Council; and, if approved of, the same shall be transmitted to the several vestries of the parishes which shall have ratified this Constitution; and, if again approved of in the next ensuing Council by a majority, the change shall then take place; and the Constitution, so altered, shall be valid and obligatory.

Mr. Thomas Moore moved that the Council go into the election of deputies to the General Convention to-morrow morning at half-past nine o'clock.

Carried.

Rev. Dr. Peterkin offered the following:

Resolved, That this Council commends to the regard of the members of our

Church in this Diocese, the "Protestant Episcopal Church Home," an institution located in Richmond, at No. 517 N. 4th Street, as a home for female members of our Church in Virginia, who are in reduced circumstances, and who have no friends upon whom they can rely for a support.

The resolution was adopted.

Rev. Dr. Norton presented the report of the trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School.

The trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School beg leave to report that there have been in the Seminary the current year of the

The funds of the Seminary have suffered from the shrinkage of values. The new chapel, it is hoped, may be completed this year, the friends of the institution having aided with a liberal hand. The reports of the professors are annexed.

The High School continues its course of unabated prosperity, and receives, as it well deserves, testimonials of confidence from the friends of thorough education.

Professor Spencer's report of his instruction of colored students is appended.

#### REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF BIBLICAL LEARNING.

I would respectfully report to the trustees that the classes under my instruction have pursued the prescribed course of study with diligence and success.

The senior class has continued the study of the Hebrew language, and has read select chapters from the book of Job, and from the latter part of Isaiah. In the Greek of the New Testament, they have read the Epistles to the Corinthians, and the Epistle to the Galatians.

The middle class has studied the Prophecies of Christ in the original, and read a number of the Psalms. In the New Testament, they have finished the Epistles to the Romans and to the Hebrews.

The junior class has studied the Hebrew Grammar, with written exercises. They have read in the Hebrew sixteen chapters in Genesis, and the Ten Commandments; and in the Greek the Gospel of John, and the Sermon on the Mount. Three times a week essays are read on the most important and difficult subjects in the Gospels.

The teachers of the preparatory department have made to me a monthly report of the proficiency of each student, and I am able to state, that the department has been satisfactorily conducted.

#### REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

# To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully submits the following report of the studies in his department during the current session.

The senior class, with three recitations weekly, and the Wednesday evening exercise, have studied the articles with Burnet and Boultbie, and have just finished the review with written questions. They are now studying with lectures and written questions and references, a course of Liturgics. A weekly recitation, in addition to the Wednesday evening exercise, has been given to Homiletics and the criticism of sermons.

The middle class, for the first three months, reciting three times a week, and for the rest of the session five times a week, has studied Knapp's Theology, which they are now reviewing.

To the junior class I have given a weekly recitation in Chadbourne's Natural Theology. The work of President Hopkins, which I have also used with this class, and of which report has been made in previous years, I have postponed to the senior year. The students, at that stage of their course, are better prepared to appreciate its argument.

I am glad to report commendable diligence in studies and duties of the classes during the session. I have no report of absence of students from recitation without permission.

#### REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF CHURCH HISTORY.

# To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Church History and Canon Law presents the following annual report:

The senior class has studied, with four recitations a week, the History of the Church of England, the History of the American Church, the first book of Hooker's Ecclesiastical Polity, the Constitution and Canons of the Church, the Pastoral Epistles in Greek, and Meade on the Pastoral Office.

The middle class, with three weekly recitations a week and regular essays, has studied Kurtz's Church History.

The junior class, with four weekly recitations and three essays a week, has studied Dr. Smith's Old and New Testament History, and read the book of the Acts of the Apostles in Greek. In response to the request of the Board of Trustees, he has made a practice of attending at least once a month, each class in the preparatory department, except those taught by one of the professors, and testifies from personal knowledge that this department, as at present conducted, is a most necessary and valuable adjunct to the Seminary.

#### REPORT OF INSTRUCTOR OF THEOLOGY IN BRANCH SCHOOL.

## To the Board of Trustees:

At the decision of a committee from your number I resumed for a second session the work of instructing colored candidates for the ministry. It was hoped at the beginning of the session that students would be sent us from the Zion Union organization, but that hope has not been realized. Four students have been under instruction throughout the session. One of these is a deacon, also engaged in teaching; another is a Methodist pastor, resident here; the other two are applicants for our ministry. The subjects taught have been Hebrew, Greek, Bible History, General History, Theology (Hodge's Outlines and Lectures), Mental Philosophy and Moral Philosophy. The progress of the students has been rather slow, but upon the whole encouraging; and my chief regret is that there are so few pupils.

#### REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF THE HIGH SCHOOL.

# Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D. LL. D., President of the Board of Trustees:

Rt. Rev. and Dear Sir.—As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

Seventy boys, including five day scholars, have been received. \* \* No pupil has been dismissed, or withdrawn by request, the general behavior and tone of the school having been better than for years past. There has been little sickness of any sort, and, except severe effects of cold in two or three cases, none worth mentioning. \* \* \* The entire worship of the school this session (owing to the building of the new Seminary Chapel) has necessarily been in the school chapel. The Rev. Drs. Nelson and Walker have officiated often for us on Sundays and chief holy days, and the Holy Communion has been celebrated monthly. In the absence of clergymen the Sunday services of the church have been maintained by myself and Col. Hoxton. Our daily devotional exercises have been as heretofore. The Christian seasons have been observed with accustomed regularity, and it is hoped, with increased profit. \* \* The Friday night meeting for the boys has been conducted with much acceptance by Mr. W. H.

Assheton, of the middle class in the Seminary. To this gentleman, as well as to the clergymen named, the gratitude of myself and of every one interested in the school is due. The Missionary Society organized in 1878, has been kept up with gratifying results. \* \* \* The number of communicants among the boys is twenty-one.

Rev. R. S. Barrett presented the report of the Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund, certifying that these accounts had been examined and found sustained by proper vouchers.

Rev. Dr. K. Nelson reported that the accounts of the Diocesan Missionary Society had been examined and found correct, and sustained by proper vouchers.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the report of the Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, which was referred to the appropriate committee.

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia, in submitting herewith the report of their treasurer, beg leave to call the attention of the clergy and the laity to the following facts brought to their notice in that report: The number of parishes which have contributed to the important cause we represent is not as large this year as it was the last year, by one-half, while the number of our beneficiaries is larger. Only twenty-seven contributions have been made this year in aid of our income. Last year there were fifty-six. The amount contributed last year was \$777.17; this year only \$314.26. Some of our wealthiest parishes have given nothing. The distributable income of the year now ending amounted to \$1,850, which we have been obliged to divide among twelve needy families. One name has been voluntarily withdrawn from our list, but two others have been added.

A change in the investment of a \$1,000 bond of the James river and Kanawha company seems to have lessened the amount of our principal by some \$600, but the new investment, being an eight per cent. bond, and paying its interest regularly, will be found next year to be greatly to the advantage of the fund. Its assets now amount to \$25,328.92.

#### Bible Society of Virginia.

In conclusion, the board would remind the Council that according to the rules under which the fund is to be managed by them, the three clerical members of the board are to be elected by the Council "every three years," and from among those clergymen who "have been at least five years resident and officiating in this Diocese," and that this is the year for their election.

WHEREAS, The Board of Managers of the Bible Society of Virginia desire to raise, in this State, a considerable sum of money to be appropriated to a larger distribution of the Bible to those who are destitute of God's word—and have requested their representatives in this body respectfully to ask the approbation and concurrence of the Bishop and the Council of this Diocese in the proposed object; and whereas, this Council is deeply sensible of the obligation which rests upon all the disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ to use their best efforts for supplying every creature with the word of life, and is fully impressed with the importance of the proposed measures as being calculated to put honor upon God's holy word, to confer the richest blessings upon the destitute portions of our Commonwealth, and to cherish and increase that spirit of zeal for God's glory, and of love for the souls of men, which should ever be kept alive and active in our churches; therefore

Resolved, That this Council cordially recommends the object of the Bible Society to the churches in this diocese, and affectionately requests the members and friends of the same to co-operate in the accomplishment of the above object by their prayers and their contributions, and by all the assistance that circumstances may enable them to afford.

Resolved, That the clergy and vestries be requested to observe the Bishop's recommendation, to make at least one annual contribution to this cause.

Rev. W. C. Latanè moved that the form of Parochial Report be amended by striking out the report of amount contributed to the contingent fund.

The motion was lost.

Rev. H. B. Lee moved that the report of the Committee on Intemperance, appointed at the last Council be made the order of the day for six o'clock this evening.

Carried.

#### Proceedings.

Mr. Thomas Moore moved that the resolution endorsing the Bible Society be recommended to be read in the churches.

Carried.

Mr. S. B. Paul moved that the salary of the Historiographer for the ensuing year be fixed at the same rate as last year.

The motion was agreed to.

Rev. T. G. Dashiell moved to reconsider the motion made and defeated yesterday enlarging the Committee on Canons.

Adopted.

Rev. T. G. Dashiell moved to add five clergymen and five laymen to the original committee.

Rev. Reverdy Estill moved to discharge the committee from further consideration of the Canons.

The motion was lost.

The motion to increase the committee by adding five of each order, was adopted.

Rev. Dr. Barten offered the following:

Resolved, That a committee of two be appointed to inquire what relations the Diocese sustains to the General Theological Seminary, and to report to the next Council.

The motion was carried, and the Bishop appointed Rev. Dr. Barten and Mr. S. B. Paul as that committee.

These men are doing, most of them, real mission work, and some of them a great deal of it. In some cases the missionary preaches at four, five and six different points, with good congregations and encouraging prospects. In others the church has been planted and is growing in localities where the people formerly were not only ignorant of it, but hostile to it. There is an increasing feeling of favor towards our church, among the members of other communions, all over the Diocese, as shown by their attendance on our services, when they have the opportunity, by the character of the confirmation classes, and in other ways. The missionaries aided by this Society, furnish a most effective means of bringing the church to these good people, and the gospel to the destitute in different portions of the Diocese.

There are now various points where the people are hungering and thirsting for the ministrations of the church of their affections, and

anxiously looking to your committee for help—as West Point, New Kent, Chester and others. There is much ground to be occupied, where as yet nothing has been done. There are old and faithful men, who have spent their lives in the Master's service, who are not superannuated or disabled, but are doing what they can, and still feeding those few sheep in the wilderness entrusted to their care, some of whom this Society helps, and must help, until some other way of helping them is provided.

These twenty-eight or thirty ministers of the gospel, scattered over the Diocese, and doing as we believe, the Master's work, with zeal and fidelity, would have to abandon their work, or else suffer great hardship, if not starve at their posts, without the aid received from their brethren of the church, through this Society. We ask you, therefore, to enable us to sustain them; and not only to do this, but to put more men into the field, to attack the enemy at more points and to push forward the frontiers of the Redeemer's kingdom.

The contributions of the church to this work have fallen off materially and have by no means kept pace with the increase of communicants and with the improved condition of the country.

Comparing the contributions of the last seven years, and excluding those from West Virginia, and other outside sources, we find them as follows:

In 1874, \$3,827.24; 1875, \$4,030.69—increase of \$203.45; 1876, \$3,882.16—decrease of \$148.53; 1877, \$4,190.72—increase of \$308.56; 1878, \$4,995.88—increase of \$805.16; 1879, \$3,980.29—decrease of \$1,015.59; 1880, \$3,199.59—decrease of \$780.70; and less than 1874 by \$627.65.

The deficiency of the last two years it is true was made up by legacies and by interest on investments; but one of the worst things that could happen to a church, would be to have all its benevolent and Christian work paid for by somebody else—would be, for example, to receive so much money from legacies, that the people would have no need and no desire to give anything themselves; for Christian giving is not only a duty but a means of grace, a thing had in remembrance before God, and bringing down the divine blessing upon the giver; as we learn from such Scriptures as "It is more blessed to give than to receive"; "The Lord loveth a cheerful giver"; "The liberal soul shall be made fat"; "He that watereth shall be watered also himself"; "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth," &c.; and

hence we believe that the church or the individual Christian that gives nothing, and desires to give nothing, to the furtherance of the gospel, will dry up and become spiritually barren, if not spiritually dead.

We appeal to you, therefore, dear brethren, for a more liberal support of this work, not only for the sake of others, but your own sakes, and above all for the sake of him who, though he was rich, yet for our sakes became poor, that we through his poverty might be made rich.

Rev. Dr. Weddell presented the following report from the committee appointed at the last Council to propose some plan for the suppression of the evils of intemperance:

The Council held in Fredericksburg in May, 1879, in response to a memorial from the Piedmont convocation, appointed the undersigned a committee to devise and report to this Council "some effectual and practical plan for the arrest of the evil of intemperance" within our own diocesan borders. The memorial which was thus presented, and the committee which was thus appointed, are in themselves deeply significant. They indicate a growing apprehension on the part of the Church of the magnitude of this evil. They indicate that it has developed into such fearful proportions, and the ills which follow in its train have become so appalling that the Church cannot longer regard the matter with indifference. Some scheme is desired, some plan is asked for, which may stay its advance. The subject has already engaged the attention of the wisest and best minds of this nineteenth century. Where these have failed your committee can hardly anticipate success. Yet-and as the result of our very earnest investigations—we would submit some few practical suggestions, which we hope may prove helpful in securing the desired end.

In the first place, and as a foundation truth, we would emphasize the fact that intemperance, like any other violation of the divine law, is SIN. It springs from a corrupt nature. Its indulgence is the embodiment of a sinful life. Above all else, therefore, aye, as SIN, the church must regard it, and in this light the church must seek its ultimate destruction. The one remedy is CHRIST. The "one effectual and practical plan" is the preaching of Christ. Through this instrumentality men are to be regenerated and sanctified, and thus He who

was "called Jesus" shall in the end "save HIS people from their sins." All other instrumentalities will prove exceptional in their operations, spasmodic in their duration, and superficial in their results. The triumph of the gospel, and that triumph alone, will secure to our race an emancipation from sin so far forth as the gospel, in sincerity and in truth, is accepted by men,-so far forth as they are thus enabled to hate sin and love holiness,—so far forth as they are thus strengthened to "deny themselves,"—so far, not further, will their emancipation from sin (sin in general, and the sin of intemperance in particular,) prove radical and complete. The operations of gospel grace, whether in the individual, the social, or the national life, are indeed slow, but they are sure. Like leaven, hid in "the three measures of meal," albeit invisible, it is ever active in the heart where God hath deposited it, and the steady final assimilation is assured. Hence, in seeking "some effectual and practical plan for the arrest of the evil of intemperance," we can admit no substitute for, and must urge as our chief hope, the continued preaching of Christ and His gospel. So men are converted, so men are weaned from the love of sin-thus the bondage to sin is broken.

In the second place,—and as suggesting a subsidiary instrumentality.—we must remember that the church is a WITNESS. Such is her office—such is her function. She is to WITNESS FOR THE TRUTH. But more: Whenever, in any given age, a special form of sin asserts itself with conspicuous prominence, the church must witness against that specific evil. Her voice must be heard. Her convictions must be expressed. Her warnings must be uttered. In this respect,—and in regard to the sin of intemperance,—the church in Virginia, as such, has been "a faithful witness." Her bishops, speaking ex cathedra, and her council, in oft-repeated resolution, have spoken in language whose meaning cannot be misunderstood. Such testimony has not been without effect, and yet it has not been altogether effectual. The responsibility of failure, whatever its extent, rests alike with clergy and laity. The clergy have failed to emphasize this testimony by failing to follow it up with a firm, yet loving discipline. The laity have failed to emphasize this testimony by failing to follow it up with a pronounced, yet unobtrusive example. Such cases, we know, are exceptional, but these very exceptions tend mightily towards neutralizing the force of the church's warning. The world will doubt the sincerity of any witness who, albeit denouncing certain practices as

dangerous and sinful, yet tampers with them himself, or tolerates them in his household. The church's testimony must go for naught so long as intemperance among its communicants is passed over and permitted to exist undisciplined. So too the church's testimony must suffer grave impeachment so long as any fraction of its membership, whether by word or deed, occupy towards this great evil an equivocal attitude. The Christian who frequents bar rooms, or who surrenders to the drinking usages of society, or whose body and breath betray the insidious ravages of an unrealized excess, that Christian not only shadows the church's testimony, but gives, however unconsciously, "aid and comfort" to the foe. Such TREASON may win the world's approval, but the TRAITOR will be as sure to reap the world's contempt.

In the third place, your committee would ask the Council—by the adoption of this report, and in the discharge of its office as witness—to give the sanction of its name, and the force of its authority, to the two suggestions which follow.

And first: Has not the time arrived, and do not our obligations as Christians demand, that the Christian people of this diocese avouch themselves, by word and act, on the side of TOTAL ABSTINENCE? In making this suggestion we are seeking simply what is practical, and therefore would avoid all side issues. If it be said that "alcohol is a medicine," the fact is admitted; we only insist that as medicine it may be used by the most advanced among total abstainers. If it be said that "mere temperance, as a Christian virtue, is higher in dignity than abstinence," the fact is admitted; we simply insist, as is proven by observation and experience, that among those in greatest jeopardy abstinence is the only temperance which they have the strength to practice. If it be said that "grape culture and cheap wines will prove an adequate remedy," the fact is admitted; we simply insist that until grape culture becomes one of the recognized industries of this land, and until cheap wines are within the call of our people, the remedy suggested is altogether beyond our reach. If it be said that "these intoxicating beverages, like all the creations of God, are good, and that their temperate use is part of that liberty wherewith Christ has enriched every man," the fact is admitted, but WHAT THEN? Has the Christ love wrought in Christian hearts no spirit of self-sacrifice, no willingness to surrender a mere animal gratification if thereby we can aid in the eradication of an evil which has proven the temporal and

eternal ruin of a vast multitude of our fellow beings? Aye-do not our peculiar surroundings demand that the Christian men and women of this age shall "take heed lest by any means this liberty of ours become a stumbling-block to the weak." In a word, circumstanced as we are, and confronting as we do a most determined evil, would it not be wise in all Christians to surrender their abstract rights in favor of a heaven-inspired expediency? The temperate indulgence of these destructive agents is lawful, but is it wise? is it best? Shall we push our liberty to its utmost limit? The rather, does not the voice of Christian love rise above the din of appetite and challenge every Christian conscience to a sublime self-denial? Our weaker brethren, those with whom drunkenness is a "besetting sin," and an everthreatening precipice, have claims upon us. They are influenced by our example. They are sorely tempted by the drinking usages which they encounter as they mingle in the world of fashion. Perchance, like some unfortunate Christians, they have very vague ideas as to where temperance ceases and intemperance begins, and yet they are tempted to follow where such Christians lead the way. Has not the time, therefore, come when-for their sakes, ave, and for Christ's sake too-Christian people should resolve with St. Paul: "All things are lawful unto me, but all things are not expedient." "It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor anything whereby thy brother stumbleth, or is offended, or is made weak." "If meat make my brother to offend, I will eat no flesh while the world standeth, lest I make my brother to offend."

Again: Considering the great evil which we are called to resist, and forced as we are to invoke every subsidiary agency which may help forward the good work, would it not be well for the rector and vestry of each parish, in their official character and as one feature of their regular church work, to establish parochial temperance guilds? Unquestionably such organizations have accomplished great good in times past, and this too when based upon no distinctively Christian principles, and when administered by men who acknowledge no special Christian inspiration. There is power in COMBINATION. It kindles sympathy, creates enthusiasm, strengthens resolution, and when administered by the Church, through the agency of her own consecrated membership, may claim the blessing promised from the Mount of Ascension. The Church of Rome and the Church of England have not hesitated to establish such organizations, and to nourish

them with the same motherly care which they lavish upon any other of their auxiliary enterprises. Let the Church in Virginia follow in their train. In every parish let the TEMPERANCE GUILD find a home and do its work. In this way its efficacy can be tested, and if found efficacious, the methods of organization tried in the different parishes may then be carefully weighed and the best points in each may be embodied in a permanent constitution. Thus we hope to see a noble diocesan organization created, based upon actual experience, and already strong in the assured confidence of its own efficiency.

The committee to whom was referred so much of the Bishop's Address as relates to the appointment of an Assistant Bishop, have had the same under consideration, and report for adoption by the Council the following preamble and resolutions:

Whereas the Bishop of the diocese, in his address, has suggested to the Council that they adopt whatever measures may be necessary to obtain the consent of the General Convention, which is to meet in October next, to the election of an Assistant Bishop, "for the reason of extent of diocese," as provided by section 5, of Canon 15, Title I, of the Digest: therefore be it

Resolved, I, by the Council of the diocese of Virginia, That the General Convention be respectfully requested to give its consent to the election of an Assistant Bishop for the diocese of Virginia.

2. That the deputies from this diocese to the next General Convention be charged

with the duty of presenting to that body the request aforesaid, and of securing such consent, if practicable.

Whereas the Bishop has clearly intimated that in his judgment an increase of episcopal visitation is not called for by the condition of the Church, and that he is able to discharge all the duties canonically required of him; and whereas an honest difference of opinion exists in the diocese as to whether such increase of episcopal visitation is necessary or desirable; and whereas many contend that the proper remedy in case of a diocese so extensive or populous that one Bishop cannot properly perform the duties pertaining to the office, is a division of the diocese and not the election of an Assistant Bishop; and whereas the Bishop has declared that he will not give his consent to such division: therefore be it

Resolved, That it is inexpedient for the Council to take any action on this subject at this time.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey presented the following from the trustees of the Virginia Female Institute:

The Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute submit their annual report to the Council:

#### Virginia Female Institute.

Since they made their last report the Rev. R. H. Phillips, the rector, has resigned his position on account of ill-health. The trustees unite with the board of directors in expressing sincere regret that the connection which has existed between Mr. Phillips and the Institute for more than thirty years, has been severed, and sincerely sympathize with him in the affliction which has caused his resignation. Most faithful has he been in his office, and the fruits of his long continued labors in training the young for useful and happy lives, may be found scattered over Virginia and the South. Wherever the graduates of the Institute have gone, they have carried with them the graces of cultivated womanhood and the influence of Christian character and devotion to the church.

Upon the unanimous recommendation of an advisory committee of the board of trustees, the board of directors have appointed Mrs. Flora Stuart, the widow of Gen'l J. E. B. Stuart, principal of the Institute, upon terms which, with the cordial co-operation of the clergy and laity of the Diocese, may reasonably be expected to secure success to the Institute as an educational institution of the highest order, and also the means of ultimately providing for the education of the daughters of the clergymen of the Diocese at rates commensurate with their limited means. The trustees concur with the board of directors in the opinion that Mrs. Stuart is a lady of rare attainments and peculiar qualifications for the position she is to fill. With all the gentle attributes of a true woman, who will care for the girls under her charge, as a mother, she is endowed with such clearness of judgment, firmness of purpose, experience in managing and instructing the young, and skill in administration, as eminently fit her for the efficient discharge of the duties of the position, which, at the request of the trustees and board of directors, she has assumed. In view of what is due to Mrs. Stuart, as well as of the substantial interests of the Diocese, involved in the success of the Institute, under its new management, the trustees earnestly invoke the co-operation of the Council in securing that success. The corps of teachers, already secured for the next session, give ample assurance that Virginia churchmen will have no occasion to send their daughters out of the state for thorough education and womanly accomplishments. Advantages of the highest order will be found at this Diocesan school; and its patrons will not only be repaid for their outlays in educating their own daughters, but will, at the same time, contribute to the estab-

lishment, upon a firm foundation, of the prosperity of an institution which belongs to the Diocese and is to be conducted for its benefit.

The trustees have instructed one of their number to ask the concurrence of the Council in the following resolution—

Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia commend to the confidence and patronage of the clergy and laity of this Diocese, the Virginia Female Institute, which is to be under the charge of Mrs. J. E. B. Stuart, as its principal, and of a competent corps of instructors in the different branches of a thorough education, and request active co-operation on the part of Virginia churchmen, in securing success to the Institute and thereby substantial benefits to the Diocese.

Which at Judge Sheffey's request was temporarily laid on the table.

The accounts of the Evangelists' Fund were presented by the Bishop, and at his request were referred to the Committee on Finance.

The hour having arrived for the order of the day, the Council went into the election of deputies to the General Convention.

The Bishop appointed the Revs. F. Stringfellow and B. D. Tucker, and Messrs. B. M. Randolph and R. L. Miller to act as tellers.

Pending the counting of the first ballot, Rev. R. A. Goodwin presented the following:

The committee appointed by our last Council to take charge of the work of our Church among the colored people belonging to the Zion Union Apostolic Church, beg leave to submit the following report:

The Rev. Robb White has been laboring faithfully, and we believe successfully, as evangelist among these people since the first of last July. He is highly esteemed by them, and they count it a great privilege to attend upon his ministry.

At the meeting of their Conference in August last a vote of thanks to this Council for its kind consideration of them was passed with unanimity and enthusiasm.

In reply to the question, "How close do you wish the union between us to be?" they replied, "As close as we can get." The most serious question which your committee has had to consider and decide has been with reference to the confirmation of their ministers. When the Bishop, in November last, visited the Chapel of the Good Shepherd, where our Church School for them is held, quite a number of their ministers, as well as members, desired to be confirmed; but it was the unanimous opinion of the committee, and we were glad to find that the Bishop was of the same opinion, that these ministers ought not, at this time to be confirmed. By confirmation they would have become laymen in the Episcopal Church. They are not ready for ordination. Not being authorized to perform the ministerial functions, their flocks would have been scattered, and, in many cases, lost to our influence. Many of these ministers are studying in the hope that they may yet be ordained in our Church. In many cases we know them to be godly, earnest men, and trust that some of them may at least be able to take deacons' orders in the Church, and work under a presbyter, who, as evangelist, shall be over all their congregations. so far as our Church is concerned.

To this end your committee would recommend the advisability of establishing a school of higher grade near the centre of the territory occupied by their congregations, so that the ministers can, without

giving up their charges, attend school, and when capable, study theology there. We also recommend that the Rev. Robb White be continued as evangelist, and requested to devote his whole time to this work, and that his salary be increased in order that he may be able to do so.

Your committee would express their admiration of the zeal and fidelity of that noble woman, Mrs. F. E. Buford, who has done, and is still doing, so much for this good work in teaching the ignorant, relieving the destitute, visiting and cheering the sick and dying; and we recommend that she be continued as the principal of the school which she has organized, under the evangelist.

We refer to Mr. White's report, to be printed in the Journal of this Council, for a more extended account of this work, and especially for the resolution passed in their meeting of March 10th, 1880, in regard to their relations to our Church.

We believe that God has placed a plain duty before the Church in Virginia in reference to these poor people, and we pray that He may give us grace to be faithful in the discharge of it.

### Suppression of the Evils of Intemperance.

Pending the discussion, the Right Rev. C. C. Penick, D. D., Bishop of our Church in West Africa, was, on motion, received by the Council standing, and invited to a seat by the Bishop.

The hour of half-past two having arrived, the Council adjourned to 4 P. M.

The Council reassembled.

Rev. Dr. Dame moved that the next meeting of the Council be held in the Church of the Epiphany, Danville.

Carried unanimously.

The report of the Committee on Intemperance, being the order of the day, then came under consideration.

Rev. J. B. Newton offered the following resolutions to be appended to the report of the committee:

Resolved, That this Council has heard with the interest and sympathy which the great importance of the subject demands, the report of the Committee on Intemperance.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Council, the intemperate use of intoxicating drinks is a grievous sin against God, and we earnestly urge the clergy of this diocese wisely and lovingly to enforce the rubrical or canon law against notorious evil living and wickedness of life.

Resolved, That we implore our brethren, clerical and lay, throughout the diocese, to be careful in this regard, to "walk with wisdom toward them that are without," remembering the solemn words of our Saviour, "It must needs be that offences come, but woe to that man by whom the offence cometh."

Mr. J. J. Mason presented the following as a substitute for that part of the report which recommends the formation of Temperance Guilds:

Recognizing the great evils of intemperance, we earnestly call on and appeal to the communicants in the diocese, clerical and lay, to do all in their power, by precept and example, to suppress this evil, and further the cause of temperance. Reports of Finance Committee and Committee on Brotherhood.

The substitute offered by Mr. Mason was lost.

The report of the committee and the resolutions offered by Rev. J. B. Newton, were adopted.

Mr. John H. Claiborne, from the Finance Committee, presented the following report:

The Finance Committee beg leave to report that they have examined the accounts of the treasurer of the Diocese, and find them correct and sustained by vouchers, with check for balance due. That the Bishop's account with the Evangelist's Fund is found correct and sustained by vouchers. They authorize the treasurer to pay the salaries of the Bishop, secretary, chaplains, and their expenses; \$30 to assistant secretary; \$15 to sexton, and whatever balance may be due West Virginia.

On motion of Mr. John H. Claiborne, Mr. P. H. Mayo was elected to fill a vacancy in the Board of Trustees of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

The Bishop was requested to fill, by his appointment, made when convenient to him, the vacancy created in the Committee on the Zion Union Work by the removal of Rev. R. A. Goodwin.

Mr. L. M. Blackford presented the report of the Brother-hood.

The Committee on the Brotherhood have examined the reports of the officers for the past year (hereunto appended and marked A and B), and find in them material both for encouragement and concern.

The only death (that of the Rev. Dr. Wade) in the last twelve months is the twentieth since the organization of the Brotherhood in 1870. In ten years an aggregate of \$24,040.66 has been paid to the heirs of beneficiaries, being an average to each of \$1,265, exclusive of the last. Thus it appears that at an average annual cost to each member of \$4.20 this handsome sum has been secured to the families of a score of clergymen.

Discussion of Report on election of Assistant Bishop.

In a few cases dissatisfaction has been expressed at the fact that beneficiaries have left their families in a condition not needing aid, and collections have been made with difficulty. This dissatisfaction gives your committee grave anxiety, and inspires serious fears for the prosperity, if not the existence, of the Brotherhood. We are unable at this time to devise a complete solution for the trouble; but, without expressing a decided opinion in either direction, respectfully suggest that those of the laity who experience such doubts should regard this work as an agency for compensating past faithful services, always inadequately paid; and, on the other hand, that the heirs of such beneficiaries as are blessed with this world's goods, might themselves remove this objection, if they see fit, by waiving, as has been already done in one instance, their claims on the Brotherhood.

Your committee, in conclusion, cannot too strongly recommend to the clergy and laity of the diocese continued and increased support of the Brotherhood. We urge on the clergy to select and name for appointment, to the secretary in Richmond, a suitable person as agent in every parish, and we urge all lay persons not already connected with the organization to become members.

On motion the Council adjourned until to-morrow at nine o'clock, A. M.

MAY 22, 1880.

The Council met at 9 A. M., and was called to order by the Bishop, after prayer by the Rev. Everard Meade.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Rev. D. M. Wharton and Mr. Andrew Lewis asked permission to announce that had they been present when the vote was taken last night, they would have voted for the majority report.

Rev. O. A. Kinsolving, from the Committee on the State of the Church, presented the following:

The Committee on the State of the Church would respectfully report, that after a careful consideration of such information as they have been able to gather, they think that the Diocese has much cause for devout thankfulness to our covenant Father, for the continued prosperity of our church in Virginia. During the past year the number confirmed was not as large as in the previous year, but the falling off is not great, and is only what is to be expected, from time to time, in the regular ministrations of the Gospel. The history of the church in all ages, shows that its progress is not always uniform, but that it is liable to such alternations, as to keep its ministers and members ever mindful of their own weakness and need of unceasing dependence upon Him, "without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy." The number confirmed during the year was eight hundred and eighty.—being more than one hundred less than the number confirmed the year before. But taking the average number of confirmations during the last ten years, we find that the aggregate is most encouraging, the number of communicants in the Diocese, within the last decade, being nearly doubled. Without laying an undue stress upon mere outward growth, or dwelling in a spirit of pride or boastfulness upon those indications of prosperity which may not be true

and real, still in view of this steady increase, even in the numerical strength of the Diocese, surely we have reason to "thank God and take courage."

Another ground of encouragement, to which your committee may call the attention of the Council, is the unusually large number of candidates for orders, mentioned in the report of the Bishop. We may regard it as an evidence of God's special favor towards us, that in His kind providence He does thus continue to provide for the increasing demand for ministerial work within the limits of our own Diocese, and at the same time to furnish a supply for the continual drain that is being made upon Virginia by other parts of the Lord's vineyard. In former years it was "our joy and crown of rejoicing," that our foreign missionary field was almost entirely supplied by young men who received their theological training in our own Diocesan school of the prophets. And now, while that foreign field is still supplied in a large measure from the same source, it is a matter of gratification to us, that our loss is so often a gain to others who are more in need than we are, and that so many earnest ministers of Christ are annually going forth from Virginia to minister to our fellow-men in other States and Dioceses of our own country, still we can not but regret at the same time that the supply is so limited at home. It has been so from the beginning, and the Saviour's lamentation over this state of things in His times may still be heard in its application to our own—"The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few." We call the attention of the church to this fact, and urge upon "every member of the same in his vocation and ministry" to remember in a practical way the divine remedy prescribed, "Pray ye, therefore, the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers into His harvest." The vacant parishes and waste places in our Diocese do, no doubt, greatly need the services of these men. But we are persuaded that in many cases, there is no necessity for such vacancies as do exist, and are allowed to continue from year to year. An unreasonable hope is almost as damaging as despair, when brought to bear upon the energies and efforts of men. It always disappoints, and being "deferred maketh the heart sick." Frequent ministerial services is something not to be reasonably hoped for, in most of the vacant parishes of this Diocese. But a faithful minister, with the earnest co-operation of the laymen of his parish, may enlarge the field of his labors, and carry on a more extensive work in several parishes. The few-

ness of the laborers, as compared with the greatness of the harvest, seems to indicate that the circuit or district system, or the combination of several parishes, is the only available method by which the smaller country parishes are to be preserved. Even four or more may combine when a smaller number cannot support a minister, and by lay reading and other means, the churches may be kept open even in the absence of the minister.

In connection with this subject, your committee would call particular attention to the great decrease in the treasury of the Diocesan Missionary Society. This has been very often heretofore "a lamentation," and alas, it seems "to be for a lamentation" from year to year. We cannot believe that any member of our communion places a light value upon the work of that Society, which has done so much to restore the waste places of our Diocese, and to establish the church in regions where it was before unknown. But if they are not indifferent to its object, many perhaps fail to remember that the work cannot be sustained without means. A work that requires six thousand dollars a year cannot be done with thirty-six hundred, the amount reported as having been contributed during the last year.

Your committee would like to allude to one or two other points connected with the prosperity of our church, and "the safety, honor, and spiritual welfare of her people," but these are points which have been oft repeated, and brought to the attention of the Council in the earnest words of the Bishop, in the annual reports of the committee on the state of the church, and in resolutions introduced and passed by the Council, warning the members of the church, in the most emphatic and solemn words, against the evils to which the church is always more or lesss liable, but to which in this age, it seems to be peculiarly exposed. We allude to the common evils of worldliness and intemperance, in which general terms are included nearly all the social difficulties with which Christianity has to contend. A clear and definite understanding of what the baptismal covenant means, and a sincere, true-hearted purpose on the part of every person who is confirmed and admitted into the communion of the church, which is fellowship with God, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and not with that trinity of evil influences which are renounced in baptism, is the only safeguard against the dangers to which the attention of the members of our church is so often directed.

But there is one other subject which your committee cannot, in

faithfulness, fail to bring to your notice, before we close this report on the state of the church, feeling, as they do, that it is a matter about which a friendly note of warning ought to be raised, and to which, they humbly hope that every person, of whatever shade of opinion, will give earnest heed. We allude to the perilous speculations which are becoming too common, both in England and this country, in regard to the doctrine so emphatically defined, and the thing itself deprecated in our Litany as "everlasting damnation." Your committee deem it proper to call the attention of our clergy and laity particularly to this subject, because we think that they cannot too carefully guard against the efforts now made by a growing school of religionists, to get rid of the doctrine of the everlasting punishment of the finally impenitent, which efforts tend to obscure the manifest teaching of the Holy Scriptures, to gradually sap the life and power of the great central fact of the atonement, to undermine the foundations of Christianity, and to loosen the church from its moorings by changing and denying "the faith as it was once delivered to the saints," and thus, in proportion to the success of such efforts, to injure the cause of religion in the church. Your committee are far from affirming that such speculations prevail as yet, to any considerable extent in this Diocese. But when peril to the faith approaches, the faithful cannot be too prompt, in meeting and taking all due precautions against it.

The Committee appointed to invest the surplus in the hands of the treasurer, respectfully report the purchase of \$2,600 U. S. coupon bonds, as ordered, and recommend that the Council authorize the con-

version of same into registered bonds, in the name of the Bishop, to avoid difficulty in collecting the interest on same.

J. H. CLAIBORNE, for the Committee.

The report was received and its recommendations approved.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey presented the following from the Committee on Clerical Support.

The Committee on Clerical Support report as follows, viz: 22 parishes and churches are reported deficient, the deficiency aggregregating \$1,280.60; 16 parishes and churches are reported as having paid more than was promised, aggregating \$581.24; 107 churches and parishes report paying in the aggregate \$67,441.33, and averaging \$630.29. If we deduct 26 churches in the cities and towns, paying each \$1,000 and upwards, we have 81 parishes and churches paying an average of \$304.27. If the parishes and churches not reporting, could be embraced in this calculation, the average salary paid would be even less than this amount.

Sixty-five churches and parishes report rectories, having in the aggregate 982 acres of land attached. Several parishes report having funds on hand for the purpose of building rectories.

As shown by the table at the end of the Journal, there are 35 churches and parishes from which no reports have been received; one church (Grace Memorial, Tillotson parish,) reports simply "all paid." There are, then, 143 churches from which reports should have been received, and from 35 (that is about one-fourth in number) no reports have been sent in; some of these may be vacant, but there are only a few of them from which reports should not have been received. In one parish or church the salary paid was \$3,750; in one, \$3,000; in four, from \$2,000 to \$3,000; in nine, from \$1,500 to \$2,000; in eight, from \$1,000 to \$1,500; in twenty, from \$500 to \$1,000, and in sixty-three, less than \$500 each. On the whole, the clergy of the diocese are poorly paid. The delinquencies are about the same as last year, notwithstanding the earnest report made on that subject to the Council at its last session. In a few instances, perhaps, these delinquencies are only nominal. Your committee ask the Council to adopt the following resolutions:

- 1. That the list of delinquent parishes and churches be published in the Journal, and also the list of parishes and churches from which no reports have been received.
- 2. That the rectors in charge, treasurers and vestries, be requested to cause full, regular and accurate reports to be made each year to the secretary according to the forms prepared by him.
- 3. That the laity of the diocese be earnestly urged, even to the point of much self-denial, to provide increased compensation to the faithful and hard-working clergy of the diocese, so that changes in parochial charges may be lessened, and fewer of our clergy may be drawn away from the diocese for the means of bare support for themselves and their families.

The report of Rev. Dr. Slaughter, historiographer of the diocese, was read by Rev. H. M. Jackson, and was ordered to be published in the Minutes.

The last Council, from which I was detained by illness, did me the honor in my absence to elect me historiographer of the diocese. This was an honor which I highly appreciated, and for which I now make a formal and grateful acknowledgment. It was with unaffected diffidence and reluctance that I accepted the office, for, while it accorded with my tastes and studies, I distrusted my physical ability to do its duties in a manner at all correspondent to my own conceptions and the reasonable anticipations of the friends who initiated and urged it. But believing as I did that the end aimed at was good, and that there was an urgent need that some steps should be taken without delay towards the realization of this end, I consented to undertake the work in weakness and in fear of failure. The first step I took was to try and find out what historical records had survived the flood which had swept over us and strewed our State and diocese with so many civil, ecclesiastical and literary, as well as physical

wrecks. To this end I addressed, in the name and by the authority of the Council, a respectful and urgent request to the ministers and vestries of the diocese to be so kind as to tell me what records of the Colonial era were extant in their several parishes, and whether they were willing to have them deposited in the fire-proof library at the Seminary, subject to their orders should they see fit to reclaim them. This appeal in the Southern Churchman met with but few responses. which satisfied me that either there were but few such records extant other than those already in the Seminary library, or that there was an apathy upon the subject which was very discouraging. I then addressed, through the mail, like queries to the authorities of such old parishes as I thought were most likely to have such records. This direct inquiry elicited some melancholy facts, and among them the startling discovery that in the old parish of Bruton and city of Williamsburg, that of the original centres of Church and State. and head springs of our history, there is no extant record older than -

In the primitive shire of York, Parish York Hampton, originally called Charles River county and parish, the only relic of the colonial era is a fragment of a register in vellum, 1665 to 1800; condition very bad; pages wanting.

In the primitive county Isle of Wight (Warwequege), when it was invaded by Cornwallis and Tarlton, the parish records were buried by Nat. Burwell, clerk of the county, in a pit prepared for the purpose on the land of the late Henry Brock, the Order, Deed and Will books of the county court office, and the Berkley books from the first establishment of the plantation of 1637. Here most of them mouldered into illegible dust.

The only extant Vestry book begins in 1722 to 1769. This, too, would have perished but for the loving zeal and extraordinary diligence of Dr. Purdie, of Smithfield, who has transcribed it entire, except some orders and reports of processioners. Such filial affection deserves the special and grateful recognition of the Council. This transcript is now in my possession and is the more valuable for the explanatory notes with which Dr. Purdie has enriched it.

The earliest colonial record remaining of the primitive shire, Henrico, is dated 1730. This book is in print, as all these old records should be.

Of the parishes in Charles City, Elizabeth City and Warwick, all

the early colonial records are gone. Col. Lamb, in his very interesting lecture on old St. Paul's, Norfolk, states that he had received through Mr. Portlock, clerk, a church record of Elizabeth river parish from 1749 to 1761.

New Kent (Blissland and St. Peter's) was formed from primitive shire of York, and the records of Blissland church in that county are extant 1684.

King William, Stratton Major parish, 1664.

Middlesex county.

Records of old Lancaster, afterwards Christ Church parish, are extant, 1664.

I have reclaimed the Vestry book of St. Patrick's parish, Prince Edward county, which had been lost for 100 years. It was found at Hampden Sidney College among the papers of an old secretary of the vestry which were inherited by Mr. Venable, of Prince Edward. Through the kind offices of Professor Holliday, of Hampden Sidney, I have that book, which contains the proceedings of the vestry from the organization of the parish till it became dormant, 1776, and which enables us to fill the chasms in Bishop Meade's sketch of that parish.

The following records are in the library at the Seminary:

Vestry Book, Petsor Parish, Gloucester county, Va. Number of pages, about 250; first legible date, September 4, 1677; last legible date July 11, 1793; binding half sheep; condition bad; paper badly stained, somewhat torn, and writing in many places illegible to the uninitiated; gaps do not seem to be numerous or important.

Vestry Book, St. Mark's Parish, Culpeper county Va. Number of pages, 440, with long intervals of blanks; dates—first, January 9, 1730; last. February 5, 1785; gaps don't seem to be serious; binding half sheep; condition quite good.

Vestry Book, Dettingen Parish, Prince William county, Va. Pages, 205; dates—May 23d, 1745, and November 18th, 1802; gaps few, if any; binding vellum, badly preserved; condition bad, but writing legible. In the same volume are 96 pages of Indentures, from 1764 to 1782, in a good state of preservation.

Vestry Book, Christ Church Parish, Lancaster county, Va. Pages, 134: dates—November 26th, 1739, to May 11th 1786; binding half sheep; condition bad; worn and stained; gaps not serious.

Vestry Book of Hanover Parish, King George county Va. One volume, binding half sheep; 1st about 200 pages; 2nd about 35 pages; 1st good condition and few gaps; 2nd condition not so good and gaps not apparent; dates—1742-1785.

Vestry Book, Shelbourne Parish, Loudoun county, Va. Pages, about 90; dates—May 10, 1771, to June 20, 1805; gaps, if any, not serious; binding half sheep; condition bad, worn and stained.

Vestry Book, Fredericksville Parish, Louisa county, Va. Pages, 126; dates—May 21st, 1758, to October 10th, 1787; binding half sheep; condition very good.

Vestry Book, Antrim Parish, Halifax county, Va. Pages, about 200; dates—April 24th, 1753, to February, 1817; gaps not serious; binding half sheep, good; condition, in some places, very bad.

Vestry Book, Henrico Parish, Henrico county, Va. Pages, 202; dates—1730-1773; this book is printed, and bound in paper.

Vestry Book, Stratton Major Parish, King & Queen county, Va. Pages 156; dates—April 8th, 1729, to December 13th, 1783; some pages lost in first part; binding half sheep, good; condition quite good.

Vestry Book, Cumberland Parish, Lunenburg county, Va. Pages, 266; dates—1746 to 1831; gaps few, if any; binding half sheep; condition good, though a good deal worn; quite legible.

Vestry Book, Upper Parish, Nansemond county, Va. Pages, 290; dates—March 27, 1744, to February 10, 1793; gaps few, if any; binding half sheep; condition seems quite good.

Vestry Book, Frederick Parish, Frederick county, Va. Pages 250 or 300; dates January 4, 1764, to November 2, 1818; gaps apparently few, if any; binding half sheep, condition good.

Vestry Book, St. Peter's Parish, New Kent county, Va. Pages, 383; dates November 25, 1636, to November 22, 1758; gaps numerous and very serious; binding half sheep, fair; condition very bad, but quite legible in most places.

Vestry Book, Kingston Parish, Matthews county, Va. Pages, 120; dates November 1, 1679, to May 13, 1796; gaps seem to be few; binding half sheep; condition fair but a good deal worn in places.

Vestry Book, Blisland Parish, county not given. Pages about 130; dates—October 10, 1722, to May 7, 1785; gaps not serious; binding very old leather, in very bad condition; condition quite good except in some places.

A book of old letters beginning 1766; old leather binding; condition bad.

# PARISH REGISTERS.

Register St. Peter's Parish, New Kent county, Va. Pages about 65; dates 1732 to 1787; gaps; about two-thirds of it lost; binding old leather; condition horrible.

Register Lunenburg Parish, Richmond county, Va. Pages about 25; dates—July 3, 1792, to August 5, 1799; binding half sheep; condition good; gaps apparently none.

Register Kingston Parish, Matthews county, Va. Pages, 234; dates—May 5, 1755, to February 6, 1778; gaps very numerous and bad; binding half sheep; condition, very badly worn.

Register Dumfries Parish, Prince William county, Va. Pages, 40; dates—1809–1824; gaps none; binding half sheep; condition good.

Bristol Parish Vestry Book and Register, beginning in 1723, are in good condition.

I have gotten from the Wisconsin Historical Society a MS. copy of a topographical description of Prince Edward county, Va., by Rev. John Spooner, A. M., rector of Martin's Brandon Parish, 1790, a very valuable document.

A diary of the Rev. Devereux Jarratt, rector of Bath Parish, Va., with a sermon on Regeneration, and the hymns which he used to sing in his congregations—all in his own beautiful hand-writing.

Some Colonial Virginia Almanacs; containing lists of the Clergy and Parishes, of the Burgesses and other civil officers, mail routes and other curious details.

A series, in succession of the Colonial Maps of Virginia, with pretorial illustrations; the seats of the principal gentlemen of the time are given in some of the maps, with other topographical and historical matter of interest, including the maps of Capt. John Smith, itemmers, Mitchell, Fry & Jefferson. &c.. &c

A manuscript of Rev. Ethan Allen, a marvel of painetar not dustry, so far as it goes, and if continued on the same plan would to the history of the church, what Henning's Statutes are to the state.

I have collected from the historical magazines, process anumber of articles, genealogical and many can

of historical people; family reminiscences and other miscellaneous matter; furnishing a book of reference which will be useful.

Parish Histories; Historical Sermons; Pamphlets and Essays, &c.; MS. Letters, &c., &c.

Genealogies, (unpublished), of families in Virginia.

I have succeeded in finding what has been a great desideratum by historians, the Records of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Madison county, Va., composed of Germans, who moved from Germanna about 1723, to Madison county. Among these is the original record of subscribers for the building of this church, gotten by their first member in Europe, 1736, the names of each subscriber, including German clergymen, literateurs and civilians, with sentiments following their names in numerous languages and dialects; registers of baptism, of the confirmed, and of communicants.

These documents have been much sought for by Lutheran and other historians, and have been supposed to be irrevocably lost. They are a valuable accession to the historical treasures of the state, and especially interesting to Episcopalians, because of the kindly relations which existed between the ministers of these Germans and the Episcopalians of Colonial times, of which I have given some account in my history of St. Mark's Parish.

I have from time to time contributed to the *Southern Churchman* historical articles, some of which were original, and others taken from sources only accessible to a few.

There are other records of old parishes in the hands of families who seem not willing to part with them.

These facts are respectfully submitted to the Council for any action that may seem good to them.

# MISCELLANEOUS.

St. Andrew's Rectory, Lawrenceville, Va., April 30th, 1880.

My Dear Bishop:

I respectfully submit the following report. I entered formally upon the duties of evangelist to the Zion Unions July 1st.

As soon as the letter of welcome ordered by the Council was issued, copies were sent to every minister among them, assuring them of the interest the church had in them, and the desire that the relations should be as "fraternal as possible."

This letter made a profound impression upon them, and when their Conference met in August they presented a long petition asking explanation of certain clauses, and showed how close they desired the union to be by requesting confirmation and ordination, if it were possible, allowing them to retain their congregations and organization, ministering under the general direction and instruction of our church, introducing as fast as practicable the book of Common Prayer.

They carried with unanimity and enthusiasm a resolution of thanks to the Council for its consideration of them, and replied in answer to the question, "How close do you want the union to be?" "As close as we can get." In November the Bishop visited the work, when all of their ministers, with one or two exceptions, were present, ready and desirous of being confirmed. After a consultation upon the part of the committee appointed by the Council to take charge of the work, it was decided to be inexpedient; because, after confirmation they would become ordinary laymen, and the church could not authorize them to preach or minister the holy sacraments, and they were not fit subjects under the Canons for ordination. To allow them to be confirmed would break up their organization, for the church had no ministers to supply their congregations while they were undergoing the preparation necessary for orders. All this was explained to them,

and though sadly disappointed, they appreciated the candor and determined to wait. There were forty-six candidates present.

The committee was invited to confer with them in March, their Bishop presiding. After a full and free discussion of all the questions upon their part, the following preamble and resolutions were separately and as a whole unanimously adopted as the result of their deliberations:

At a meeting of the ministers and delegates of the Zion Union Apostolic Church, held at Union Bethel, Brunswick county, March 10th, 1880, to consider their relations, present and future, towards the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Virginia, and to express their feelings and desires as to the work undertaken by that church among them, it was—

Resolved, 1st. That holding firmly to our church organization as now constituted, and with no present desire to change the same, we feel the deepest gratitude to the Protestant Episcopal Church for the Christian love and charity which has been extended to us by the same in teaching and disciplining our people, aiding them to embrace a pure Christian faith, and to lead godly and Christian lives.

and. That we earnestly desire that the work controlled by the same principle shall be continued, as we feel that great spiritual improvement to our churches has resulted from the faithful Christian teaching and instruction of Mrs. Buford, the missionary, and others of the committee charged with that work.

3rd. That the Book of Common Prayer of the Protestant Episcopal Church contains sound doctrine for the edification of all Christian people, and we recommend its use in our churches as the ministers shall find it practicable.

4th. That we desire to record our deep sense of gratitude to Mrs. F. E. Buford, and our high appreciation of her untiring zeal and devoted work, and we heartily pray Almighty God to prolong her life to us for future usefulness among our people.

5th. That we desire that Rev Robb White shall be continued as missionary to the churches of our communion. Signed: Rev. Geo. Taylor, chairman, Revs. Charles Brown, Albert Brown, Samuel Barner, Geo. Williams, Oscar Jones, William E. Howell. Laymen: J. J. Graves, William Burnett.

Mrs. Buford and I were invited to New York to attend the Missionary Conference in October. The result of the trip, principally through Mrs. Buford's presence and instrumentality, were contributions to the work amounting to thirteen hundred dollars, which amount is subject to her check. She has also received through the Woman's Auxiliary Aid Society a number of boxes, containing clothing, books and supplies of every description for the poor and sick. And just here I desire to record my high appreciation of Mrs. Bu-

ford's executive ability. Wherever I go I find Sunday Schools organized and furnished with uniform text-books, and in every congregation accessible to her there are two trustworthy women, members of a society for the relief of the suffering and destitute, whose duty it is to report *bona fide* cases of destitution, to nurse the sick, supplying them with comfortable clothing, bed clothes, groceries and medicines.

Through the instrumentality of this organization hundreds have been ministered unto. A new school house has been built at a cost of two hundred and sixty dollars. The school numbers one hundred and thirty-eight scholars. The services of an efficient and acceptable assistant have been secured. At the chapel of the Good Shepherd I assisted Bishop Elliott, of Texas, at the baptism of sixty-nine persons, principally children of the school, though some were adults.

In the various churches there are fourteen hundred Sunday School scholars, under the teaching of the church. Those of them whom I have catechised repeat with astonishing accuracy the Church Catechism, the Calvary Catechism, and many of them repeat the Sermon on the Mount and other chapters from the Bible.

They love to be catechised and to hear the gospel, and wherever I have been the congregations have been very large and very attentive.

In conducting the services it is impossible to introduce the Psalter, as very few of them can read. They repeat heartily the General Confession, the Lord's Prayer, and the Creed. They do not always wait until the end of the prayer to say Amen.

As agent of the American Bible Society, without compensation, I furnish them with Bibles, and it is a rare thing that one is found who is not willing and anxious to pay for a Bible. They all want a family Bible with large print and a family record, and they never come for their books without bringing the money.

With this statement of facts I close. I believe this to be a great work. I leave others to their conclusions, hoping that the church will continue to support it, and enjoy a rich harvest of spiritual blessing which seems already within her grasp.

TENNESSEE SCHOOL FOR DEAF AND DUMB, Knoxville, Tenn., May 1st, 1880.

The Rt. Rev. Francis M. Whittle,

Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia.

My Dear Bishop:—In compliance with the canon, I take pleasure in submitting this, my first report of mission work done in the interest of the deaf and dumb in the diocese of Virginia.

Since the date of my ordination as deacon, four months ago, I have visited different sections of the diocese and held services at Staunton, Petersburg, Lynchburg, Concord Depot, Wytheville and Edinburg, Shenandoah county. It has been my pleasure to assist at the celebration of the blessed communion, and also to baptize the children of my fellow unfortunates and former pupils.

I shall devote closer attention to this diocese than any other, excepting that of West Virginia, which will receive equal attention; still the nature of my work shall require much of my time in ministering to the spiritual wants of the deaf and dumb in other dioceses. I have already, in the last four months, visited and conducted divine services at prominent points in West Virginia, Maryland, Kentucky, Arkansas, Tennessee, Missouri, Mississippi, Louisiana and Alabama. After leaving here I am to labor in Georgia, North and South Carolina.

I cannot close this without giving expression to the grateful feelings I entertain for the privilege bestowed upon me to labor for the advancement of a heavenly calling among those who are even as I am, who, but for the aid of the Church, and by the grace of God, would be devoid of privileges now vouchsafed to them. I must also note with thankfulness the kindly and cordial encouragement given me, by the clergy and laity in all places, for the continuance and advancement of the gospel among deaf mutes.

By Divine permission I hope to be present at the meeting of the Council at Petersburg on the 19th instant, hoping thereby to enlarge my acquaintance among the clergy and laity of the diocese, and thereby increase my usefulness.

Praying for blessings upon you, my dear Bishop, and all who labor for the advancement of the kingdom of our Lord and Saviour, and for efficacy in the discharge of labors committed to me,
