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## RULES OF ORDER.

#### ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterwards stand except to address the chair.

3d. The credentials of Lay Delegates shall be handed to the Secretary, who shall call the names of at least twelve, that the Council may at once proceed to business. The credentials of all the delegates shall then be referred to a committee of two clerical and three lay members, who shall report thereon as speedily as practicable, and if any doubt arise as to the right of any delegate to a seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for their Examination.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of the pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

#### Rules of Order.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Elections.

A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

- 1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.
- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.
- 4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.
- 5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.
- 7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.
- 9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council, or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick, or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders, who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectator shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church, in which the sessions of the Council are held, are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Rev. H. M. Jackson, from the committee appointed at the last Council to consider and report upon the subject of the Contingent Fund, presented the following:

The committee, to whom was referred the subject of the Contingent Fund, respectfully report that they have given the subject the attention which its importance demands.

The resolution adopted at the last Council, under which they act, reads as follows:

Resolved, That the subject of the Contingent Fund, the method of raising the same, the amount of assessment, and the disposition of it, be referred to a committee of three, to report to the next Council."

Three distinct questions are raised by that resolution and made the duty of the committee to consider:—(1.) The method of raising the fund; 2, the amount of the assessment; and (3,) the disposition of it. For obvious reasons your committee will consider these questions in inverse order.

1. The disposition of the fund.—The objects to which the Contingent Fund is now applied are as follows:

With respect to these expenditures your committee have no recommendations to offer, except (1.) That the salaries and expenses of the evangelists, in their judgment, should not be paid from the Con-

tingent Fund of the Diocese; and (2,) that the expenses connected with the Journal should be reduced.

- (1.) With respect to the evangelists, it is with extreme regret that we have been forced to the conclusion that this very efficient branch of the missionary service should be provided for in some other way. No one can deny that the Contingent Fund is a levy upon the parishes for a distinct purpose, viz: To provide an Episcopal Fund, and to meet the contingent expenses of the Diocese. It is not, and it was never designed to be, a Missionary Fund. The appropriation, therefore, of any part of it to missionary purposes, is an appropriation apart from its original design. Moreover, it is a practical division of the missionary enterprises of the Diocese-a part whereof are sustained by a tax upon the people, and a part by their voluntary offerings. It is no part of the duty assigned to us to discuss the propriety of sustaining missionary enterprises by taxes, but we do insist that the Contingent Fund should be applied to the purposes for which it is collected from the people, and for none other, and if there be a surplus after these purposes are met, then such surplus should be converted into a permanent fund, having in view the reduction, if not the final extinction, of the tax now laid upon the people.
- (2.) With respect to the Journal, your committee would submit that it is a very expensive luxury. The annual cost of printing and mailing is upwards of \$600. We respectfully recommend that the Parochial Reports, instead of being printed seriatim, should be tabulated in the manner ordinarily followed in such matters. The size of the volume, and presumably the cost of publication, would be reduced nearly one-half.
- 2. The second question before your committee is, The Amount of Assessment.

Although, if the foregoing recommendations be approved, the expenses of the Diocese would be reduced about \$2,250, yet we are not prepared to recommend any reduction in the amount now realized to the Contingent Fund.

The receipts reported by the Treasurer at the last Council amounted to \$9,422.47—a sum \$500 greater than has been collected any year since the division of the Diocese.

The Episcopal Residence has been entirely paid for; and the last instalment to West Virginia will be paid shortly after this Council has adjourned from the Contingent Fund now collected. Hence, in

the future, there are no extraordinary obligations to be met. While, therefore, a much smaller sum might suffice to meet the needs of the Diocese, yet it cannot be long before either a division of the Diocese, or the election of an Assistant Bishop, must increase our expenses, in which case it will become necessary to increase our revenues, and it is not desirable to make many changes. We do not find, therefore, that the total amount realized to this fund should be materially reduced.

3. But the third question submitted to your committee was, The Method of Assessment.

The plan now in operation is, as is well known, to assess the several parishes upon the basis of communicants, i. e., one dollar for each communicant reported. This plan has the merit of simplicity, and of being well understood, and the sanction of long custom. These advantages would determine us in recommending no change if it were not for the many disadvantages which attend it. That this method has grave defects is sufficiently attested by the fact that the Diocese is absolutely unable to realize the amount of its assessment. In the past five years there has been a positive loss to the Diocese upon its assessment of about \$12,000. The annual deficiency is now about \$3,000, or nearly one-fourth of the assessment. Certainly this large deficiency is conclusive proof that the prevailing system is a pressing burden upon our parishes which very many have resigned all hope of sustaining. This hope being surrendered, the practical result is, that each Parish assesses itself and pays the amount its officers think it is able to pay. This process will go on, and the number of parishes which will cease their efforts to raise the Diocesan assessment, and will adopt an assessment of their own will annually increase. But the defect of this system appears in the large total deficit, but in the delinquency of many of our largest parishes.

Grace Church, Petersburg, has an average annual deficit during the past five years of about \$400, and during that period a total of \$2,039. St. Mark's Church, Richmond, has an average deficit during the same period of \$230, and a total of \$1,160. Christ Church, Norfolk, in like manner, falls short yearly by about \$200, having a total delinquency in five years of \$1,020. Some smaller parishes have even a larger proportionate deficiency.

Your committee would hesitate to exhibit these facts if they were

to the discredit of the parishes named. But it is a singular proof of the defect of this system, that these large deficiencies only show that these churches are making advance in what is the great mission of the Church, to bring the gospel as this Church has received the same in contact with the poorer classes of society. But while these facts show this, they also display the manifest unfairness of a system which thus is seen to press most heavily upon those least able to bear it. Of all the bases for assessment which might be selected, the number of communicants is the most unsatisfactory. It contains no hint or indication of the ability of the Parish. The fact that one Parish has one hundred more communicants than another, is no proof whatever that it is richer. A Parish with twenty communicants may be wealthier than a Parish with two hundred, and yet this system can take no cognizance of that fact; and the poorer Parish is assessed ten times as much for Diocesan purposes as the richer.

Such considerations as these have led your committee to examine whether there may not be an assessment which will square more accurately with the ability of the several parishes than are made upon the basis of communicants. Having settled in their minds that there should be no considerable reduction of the amount now realized, it remained for them to ascertain upon what basis of assessments this amount could be most equitably distributed among the parishes.

Two plans suggested themselves (1) on the basis of Parish expenses. The total amount of Parish expenses, including salaries, reported to the last Council was found to be \$105,911.31, of which eight per cent. would amount to \$8,472.90. (2.) On the basis of total contributions. These amounted, according to the report to the last Council, to \$193,034.93. An assessment of five per cent. on this sum would amount to \$9,651.75; a sum a little in excess of that realized under the present system.

After calculating and compiling tables of these assessments for each Parish, and comparing them, we were led to prefer the latter, for the double reason that it realizes a larger sum and that it proved to be a more equitable distribution of the assessment. We were pleased to discover how accurately, in every case, this rate of assessment squared with the ability of the parishes as evidenced by their past payments to this fund.

Those parishes with heavy deficiencies were found to be most largely reduced. Considering, for example, these churches already

named, we find that Grace Church, Petersburg, with its annual average deficit of about \$400, would have its assessment reduced \$380. St. Mark's Church, Richmond, with its annual deficiency of \$230, would have its assessment reduced \$168. Christ Church, Norfolk, with its annual deficiency of about \$200, would have its assessments reduced nearly \$100.

These churches, having been previously named, are used merely as illustrations. The like result will be found in all the parishes; those having the largest deficiencies are generally reduced the most.

There are, of course, a few exceptional cases—perhaps owing to exceptional reports. Some of the parishes (there are but three important enough to be taken into the account), would have their assessment increased; but, although your committee think that even this would be a fairer arrangement than the other, yet they are not prepared to recommend or advocate any increase of assessment upon any individual Parish. They will, therefore, in the resolutions herewith appended, introduce a provision designed to cover such exceptional cases.

It is now necessary to ask what will be the probable income derived from the Contingent Fund under this system?

We reply that the total contributions of the parishes last year was, in round numbers, \$193,000, of which five per cent. would be \$9,650 The expenses of the Diocese (an account of which has been kindly furnished the committee by the treasurer), are \$8,674.75.

If the entire amount of five per cent. in the total contributions could be realized, the income would be nearly \$1,000 in excess of expenditures.

But a deduction of about \$1,000 must be made for the exceptional cases above alluded to.

On the other hand, the reports (this being the first year in which Parish expenses are reported) are so imperfect, that we think it fair to assume that more complete reports would restore the balance.

We therefore think that the income would be in excess of expenditures from \$500 to \$1,000. If the recommendations of this report, respecting the Evangelists and the Journal, be adopted, the excess would be nearly \$3,000.

It will be said, however, that the full amount of the assessment, whatever it be, can never be realized, and that therefore some margin should be left for deficiencies. To this we reply that, in the judg-

ment of the committee, the full amount of this assessment will, in all probability, be very nearly realized.

We think so for these reasons:

- (1.) Each Parish pays now an amount about equal to this assessment, and there is no reason to believe it will pay less than it now gives.
- (2.) Because the very fact that there is no very considerable margin above the expenses, will stimulate the parishes to meet their obligations. When the assessment is nearly double the expenditures of the Diocese (as it now is), it is very likely that a Parish will not feel so strongly the obligation to pay the full amount of such assessment.
- (3.) Because this system is a reduction to the measure of the ability of the parishes, is a less burdensome tax and will meet with a more cheerful response.
- (4.) Because it is a perfectly fair assessment, pressing equally upon all the parishes in proportion to their means, and therefore can excite no dissatisfaction.

Your committee is convinced that an assessment of five per cent. upon the total contributions of the parishes is the best and most equitable method which can be devised for providing for the Episcopal and Contingent Funds of the Diocese. We, therefore, respectfully submit the following resolutions:

Resolved, That five per cent, of the total contributions of a Parish for one year shall be its assessment for the year next ensuing for the stated and contingent expenses of the Diocese: provided, that in no case shall the assessment upon any Parish be greater than a sum equal to one dollar for each communicant.

- 2. That whatever surplus annually remains, after the payment of these expenses, shall be converted into a Permanent Fund under the direction of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund.
- 3. That it is inadvisable to pay the salaries of evangelists from the Contingent Fund of the Diocese.
- 4. That the Parochial Reports published in the Journal shall be tabulated and not published seriatim.

The report was ordered to be printed in the Journal, and laid over for consideration at the next Council.

#### Resolutions-Communications from General Convention.

### Mr. H. W. Sheffey offered the following:

Resolved, That in order to fill the vacancies caused by the deaths of John M. Miller and N. H. Massie, two of the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute, that Charles M. Blackford and J. Thompson Brown be nominated to the Board of Trustees, one of whom may be chosen to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. Miller, and that George M. Harrison and Anthony McLean be nominated to the Board of Trustees, one of whom may be chosen to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Massie.

#### Carried.

## Mr. H. W. Sheffey offered the following:

Resolved, That the Committee on the "Widows and Orphans Fund" consider the expediency of making an allowance annually out of the fund under their control to Mrs. C. P. Mackenheimer, whose husband was a clergyman of this Diocese at the time of his death, but who had not been for three years canonically settled therein, and that they report the amount they may deem it proper to allow to Mrs. Mackenheimer to aid her in the support of herself and her daughter.

#### Carried.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey moved a reconsideration of the time for considering the report of the Committee on Canons.

## Adopted.

It was resolved to consider the report immediately after the reading of the Bishop's Address to-morrow.

The Bishop presented a report of the Historiographer of the Diocese, which by general consent was laid upon the table for the present.

The Bishop presented to the Council three communications received by him from the officers of the General Convention:

## To the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese of Virginia:

RIGHT REVEREND SIR,—In compliance with the requirements of Title III, Canon 1, § 3 of the Digest, I hereby give notice that

the following changes of the Book of Common Prayer are proposed: to-wit, those comprised in the resolution subjoined, said resolution having been constitutionally adopted by a General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, held in the city of New York in October, A. D. 1880:

Resolved, That the Ratification of the Book of Common Prayer be amended so as to read as follows, and that such proposed amendment be made known to the several Diocesan Conventions, in order that it may be adopted in the next General Convention, according to Article 8 of the Constitution:

### THE RATIFICATION OF THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER,

By the Bishops, the Clergy, and the Laity of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, in General Convention assembled.

The General Convention of this Church having heretofore—to-wit, on the sixteenth day of October, A. D. 1789—set forth and established a Book of Common Prayer and administration of the Sacraments, and other rites and ceremonies of the Church, and thereby established the said book, and declared it to be the liturgy of this Church, and required that it be received as such by all the members of the same, and be in use from and after the first day of October, A. D. 1790: the same book is hereby ratified and confirmed, and ordered to be the use of this Church from this time forth.

But note, however, that on days other than Sunday, Christmas day, the Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and Ascension day, it shall suffice if the minister begin morning or evening prayer at the general confession, or the Lord's Prayer, preceded by one or more of the sentences appointed at the beginning of morning and evening prayer, and end after the collect for grace, or the collect for aid against perils, with 2 Cor. xiii, 14, using so much of the lessons appointed for the day, and so much as the Psalter as he shall judge to be for edification.

And note, also, that on any day when morning and evening prayer shall have been duly said, or are to be said, and upon days other than those first afore-mentioned, it shall suffice, when need may require, if a sermon or lecture be preceded by at least the Lord's Prayer, and one or more collects found in this book: *provided*, that no prayers

suffering poverty. Shall not the Church care for her children as the State does for hers?

The Church presents us the manifest duty, nay, in the revelation of God, even from the beginning, it is clearly enforced, that "they who minister about holy things (should) live of the sacrifice." Now, our Rt. Rev. Fathers have come before us, and urged to immediate action in this pre-eminent charity, this paramount duty of humanity. Your committee recognize the grateful fact that a step has been taken in the direction to which we are bidden, by depositing with the Trustees of the Fund for the Relief of the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen, and of Aged, Infirm, and Disabled Clergymen, a royalty upon the publication and sale of our Hymnal. The money thus received and disbursed by the Trustees of this fund has been the means of relieving much suffering, but the amount is quite inadequate to meet the great and painful wants.

Your committee further recognize the several Diocesan efforts in this direction, which have been organized and administered with varying measures of success; but while these serve in part to relieve the need of the disabled clergy in the older and richer Dioceses, where they are chiefly to be found, still they do not contemplate the extension of aid to the feebler Dioceses, where no such organizations exist, nor to the vast missionary jurisdictions, where now, and for many years to come, the want will be found to be greatest and the means of help the feeblest.

The immediate question is, What can be done to increase the fund designed for *general* distribution?

Your committee have had a number of projects referred to them, all of which have received their respectful consideration. There are difficulties insuperable to almost every plan, save that which is manifestly set forth in the Church's theory, as translated to us in the Offertory Sentences. The Rubric in the Communion Office is in harmony with this, when it provides for the collection not only of "alms for the poor," but for "the other devotions" (or consecrated gifts) "of the people." Now, for what are these "other devotions" of the people designed if not for that very purpose set forth in the Offertory Sentences which ask for them? It can scarcely be too much emphasized in this connection, that the Offertory appeals only for the relief of the poor and the sustentation of the clergy.

#### Communications from General Convention.

And then the Canon [Title I., Canon 14, ¶ 3 of the Digest], speaking of "the Alms and Contributions of the Holy Communion" as proper to be applied by the minister, or under his superintendence, to such pious and charitable uses as shall by him be thought fit—after dividing a certain part for the relief of the poor, which may rightly be called the "Alms,"—what "pious and charitable use" can possibly be made of the other part, called "Contributions," of as great and pressing import, of as high and holy character, of as appropriate and divinely ordered description, as giving relief to our suffering brothers who have spent their lives in fatherly offices in the "house-hold of faith"?

Your committee feel the difficulty of fixing, at once, upon any method which shall be general and final, but prefer to submit such measures as shall be rather tentative, while proposing further investigation in the way of correspondence and the compilation of statistics.

Your committee therefore beg to submit the following resolutions for the approval of this House:

- I. Resolved, That the committee appointed to consider the subjects of the increase of the Fund for the Relief of the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen, and of Aged, Infirm and Disabled Clergymen, be continued, with an increased membership, with instructions to act in the premises during the time intervening before the next General Convention, to the end that they may the better accomplish the objects for which the committee was raised.
- 2. Resolved, That this House do earnestly request the several Diocesan Conventions or Councils that they duly consider, and, if they find it expedient, approve, commend, and endorse the eminent charity embraced in the purpose and effort of this committee.
- 3. Resolved, That every minister in charge of a congregation be requested to reserve, from this time forth, out of "the alms and other devotions" of the people, collected upon each and every occasion of the administration of the Lord's Supper, a percentage of the whole amount, not less than one nor more than ten per cent., at the discretion of the minister, the same to be forwarded and paid over to the Trustees of the Fund for the Relief of the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen, and of Aged, Infirm and Disabled Clergymen.
- 4. Resolved, That this committee be instructed to correspond with the authorities of each Diocese and Missionary Jurisdiction, for the purpose of collecting facts and statistics bearing upon the subject committed to them, such as the local provision now made in certain Dioceses for the relief of disabled clergy and their families, the wants that now exist and that are unsupplied, the irregular and unorganized assistance that is now being extended, and all other information that shall contribute to a

full exhibit of the present condition of this charity and its probable future; and that this committee prepare and present to the next General Convention a digest of all the information thus gathered, with reference to further and more formal action.

- Resolved, That this committee be further instructed to inquire into the practicability of founding a Sustentation Fund for supplementing the salaries of clergymen who have not suitable support.
- 6. Resolved, That the Secretary of the House of Deputies be instructed to publish this report in the Church Press, to send copies to the Bishops of the Church and to the Secretaries of the Conventions or Councils of the Dioceses and Missionary Jurisdictions, with the request that the report be submitted to the consideration of the several Diocesan Conventions or Councils.
- 7. Resolved, That this report be respectfully communicated to the House of Bishops as the response of this body to their request that some action be taken upon the subject of the relief of disabled clergy and their families, and that, in submitting this report, it is hoped that it will meet the approval of our Rt. Rev. Fathers.

Right Rev. and Dear Sir,—Will you be good enough to read this letter at the next meeting of the Convention of your Diocese, and to invite an expression of opinion from the Convention in reply to the questions asked in it.

By reference to the Journal of the General Convention you will see that the matter of providing for the expenses of the Deputies was brought up in both houses. On page 214 of the Journal you will find a resolution offered by the Bishop of Virginia, that, the House of Deputies concurring, it is incumbent on the several Dioceses to make provision for the entertainment of their own deputies to the General Convention. The Assistant Bishop of Kentucky offered the following as a substitute—That it be referred to a committee of three bishops, three presbyters and three laymen, to consider the expediency of increasing the assessment to be paid by the Dioceses to the General Convention, so as to pay the expenses per diem of the Bishops and the clerical and lay deputies.

## Communications from General Convention.

On page 41 of the Journal of the House of Deputies you will find that Mr. Blair, of Maryland, offered a resolution—That, the House of Bishops concurring, it be referred to a committee of three bishops, three clergymen and three laymen, to consider and report as to the expediency of so increasing the assessment upon the Dioceses as to enable the General Convention to pay the expenses incurred by the clerical members in attending its sessions.

This was referred to the Committee on Expenses. Their reports will be found on the 104th and 127th pages, in which they mention that they have ascertained the travelling expenses of the members of this Convention to be thirty thousand two hundred and forty-two dollars, and to provide for the travelling expenses of the Bishops and Deputies of the next Convention, an assessment of ten cents on each communicant must be laid, or of ten dollars on each clergyman.

At the same meeting it was voted—That the Committee on Expenses be empowered to sit during the recess, and to take full and final action touching the travelling expenses of members of the next General Convention.

The committee ask for information if any provision is now made in your Diocese for the travelling expenses of the Bishop and Deputies to the General Convention. They also invite an expression of opinion from each Diocesan Convention whether it is best that the General Convention should undertake to provide these expenses by an assessment on each Diocese. The sum of ten cents upon each communicant would be the smallest assessment providing enough to meet these expenses. You can easily calculate the assessment on your Convention.

There is a great difference in the travelling expenses of the Bishops and Deputies of different Dioceses. A sum of nearly three thousand dollars must be provided to pay the travelling expenses from California and Oregon to Philadelphia; of thirteen hundred and fifty dollars from Texas to Philadelphia; from Arkansas, nine hundred and fifty-six dollars. From New York or Maryland the amount would be only fifty dollars.

A prompt answer to this communication is very desirable, so that the committee can take early action if this course is recommended by the Diocesan Conventions.

# REPORT OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

# REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:

E. W. Hubard,

In the good providence of God we are permitted to assemble in the Eighty-sixth Annual Council of the Church, in the Diocese of Virginia, and I pray that throughout our deliberations the Holy Spirit may, with His most gracious favor, direct all our thoughts, words and acts to the glory of Christ and the advancement of His kingdom.

In the past year sickness and affliction in my family, the unusual severity of the winter, and attendance at the General Convention during nearly the whole month of October, have not allowed me to accomplish as much work as I proposed, though I have done more than usual, as the following report will show.

1880, May 22.—In St. Stephen's (colored) Church, Petersburg, after sermon by Bishop Penick, confirmed twenty-one.

May 23.—Preached in St. John's and confirmed five.

June 1.—Preached in St. John's, Louisa, and confirmed two.

June 2.—Preached in Grace, Albemarle, and confirmed six. This occasion was rendered peculiarly solemn by the fact, that the Rev. and venerable E. Boyden, impelled by age and infirmaties, having resigned the last two churches, after a faithful rectorship of thirty-two years, took leave of the congregation, in a wise, earnest and affecting address.

June 3.—Christ Church, Charlottesville, preached and confirmed twelve.

June 4.—Trinity, Staunton, preached and confirmed fifteen.

June 6.—Preached in the morning in Grace Church, Lexington, and confirmed six, and at night preached in the Chapel of Washington and Lee University.

June 8.—Trinity, Buchanan, preached and confirmed one.

June 9.—St. Mark's, Fincastle, preached and confirmed two.

June 10.—In Emmanuel, Amherst, a church opposite Lynchburg, built and sustained by the zealous and faithful Rev. J. H. Williams, preached and confirmed four.

June 11.—Preached in the then vacant Trinity Church, Campbell C. H., and confirmed two.

June 17.—Assisted by Rev. Messrs. Lindsay of Georgetown, and G. W. Nelson, of Warrenton, consecrated St. Stephen's Church, near Catlett's Station, Fauquier county, preached, confirmed three and celebrated the Lord's Supper. This is a commodious and handsome building, erected on the site of one which was destroyed during the war. Then without a pastor, for the past six months the Parish has enjoyed the services of Rev. J. E. Jackson.

June 18.—Preached in St. James', Brentsville, and confirmed two, and in Trinity, Manassas, and confirmed thirteen.

June 19.—Preached in the morning at Clifton, and in the afternoon in St. John's Church, Centreville, Fairfax county.

June 20.—In the morning, preached in the Seminary Prayer Hall, and confirmed seven; in the afternoon preached in Falls Church, Fairfax, and at night in Grace, Alexandria, and confirmed eleven.

June 25.—In St. Paul's, Alexandria, ordained eight persons deacons and two deacons presbyters, Rev. Messrs. Hains, Packard, and Suter assisting in the services, and Dr. J. Peterkin preaching the sermon.

I was prevented, by causes already mentioned, from continuing my work until

September 12.—When I preached, morning and afternoon, in Little Fork Church, Culpeper county.

September 13.—Preached in St. John's, Rappahannock.

September 14.—Preached in St. Paul's and confirmed four.

September 15.—Preached in Trinity and confirmed two. The three churches in Rappahannock have been vacant for several months, and I have heard of no effort being made to procure a minister.

September 16.—Preached in South Run Church, Fauquier, and confirmed three.

September 17.—Preached in Leeds Church, and confirmed twelve. September 18.—Read prayers, preached, and confirmed six in Emmanuel, Fauquier; which has long been vacant.

September 19.—Preached in Trinity Church, Salem, and Grace, The Plains, confirming in the former five, and in the latter seven.

September 20.—Emmanuel, Middleburg, preached and confirmed two.

September 21.—Preached at Aldie, and the next day in Trinity, Upperville.

September 23.—Preached in Christ Church, Millwood, and the next day in the Meade-Memorial, White Post, and confirmed one.

September 25.—Preached in Wickliffe, Clarke county; which was and is without a pastor, and confirmed two.

September 26.—Grace, Berryville, preached and confirmed eight. September 28.—St. Paul's Hamilton, Loudoun county, preached and confirmed two.

September 29.—Preached in Christ Church, Goresville, and St. James, Leesburg, confirming two in the former, and three in the latter.

September 30.—Preached in The Church of Our Saviour, Loudoun. October 2.—Preached in St. Paul's, Haymarket, and confirmed six.

October 3.—Preached in Pohick, Fairfax, and confirmed one. This venerable and interesting church, which has only enjoyed the services of students from the Seminary, I trust will soon be in charge of a minister, who will have a large and promising field of labor.

From October 6 to 27, I was at the General Convention.

November 4.—Preached in St. Mary's, Goochland.

November 5.—Read the service and preached in Hebron Church, the rector being detained at home by sickness in his family during my visit to his parish.

November 6.—Read the service, preached, and confirmed three in Grace Church, Goochland Courthouse.

November 7.—Read the service and preached in St. Paul's, Goochland.

November 8.—St. James', Cumberland, preached and confirmed five.

November 9.—St. John's, Columbia, preached and confirmed ten.

November 10.—Stopped at Fork Union Church, Fluvanna, but as only one person was present at the time appointed for service, with his approval, I went on my way.

November 11.—In St. John's, Scottsville, another vacant church, preached and confirmed one.

November 12.—Preached in Grace, and the next day in Emmanuel Church, Buckingham, and confirmed six. Rev. T. E. Locke officiates once a month in these churches.

November 14.—Christ, Albemarle, preached and confirmed six.

November 15.—Preached in Trinity, North Garden.

November 16.—Preached in Emmanuel, and the next day in St. Paul's, Albemarle, confirming six in the former and eight in the latter.

November 21.—St. Luke's, Powhatan, and confirmed two, and at night preached to a large congregation of colored people in their own church, where Rev. F. Stringfellow, that most zealous and energetic of workers, has a regular appointment.

November 22.—Preached in Manakin Church, and confirmed one.

November 23.—Emmanuel, preached and confirmed five.

November 24.—Grace, Genito, preached and confirmed three.

November 25.—Grub Hill, Amelia, preached and confirmed one.

I had further appointments for November and December in Prince George, Surry and other counties in that part of the Diocese, but the winter having apparently commenced, and with severity, the brethren agreed with me that it was best to recall them.

December 19.—Preached in Trinity Church, Chesterfield, and confirmed ten.

December 23.—Assisted by Rev. Messrs. Tizzard, Lacy, Cooke, Allanson, and Spencer, the pastor, consecrated St. John's, a pretty and comfortable little frame church, at Chester, Chesterfield county,

and confirmed eleven. Rev. Dr. Gibson preached the sermon.

1881, January 9.—In St. James' Church, Richmond, ordained Rev. George C. Sutton, Assistant Minister of the Church, to the Priesthood. Dr. Minnigerode presented the candidate, and Dr. Gibson preached. Rev. Messrs. Peterkin, Haines, Armstrong and Cooke were also present and assisted in the services.

January 13.—St. Philip's (colored) Church, Richmond, preached and confirmed nine.

February 20.—Preached in three of the churches in Petersburg, and confirmed in Grace twenty-eight, in St. Paul's thirteen, and in The Good Shepherd, a Chapel of St. Paul's, thirteen.

February 27.—Preached in the churches in Alexandria, and confirmed in Grace seven, in St. Paul's seven, and in Christ twelve, of whom two were from the High School.

March 2.—St. Paul's, Richmond, preached and confirmed fifteen.

March 4.—St. James', Richmond, preached and confirmed fourteen. I have also confirmed four belonging to this church in other churches of the Diocese.

March 6.—Preached in Meade Memorial Church, Manchester, and confirmed four; in St. Andrew's, Richmond, and confirmed nine.

March 7.—In St. Mark's, preached and confirmed twenty-eight.

March 8.—Grace, Richmond, preached and confirmed eleven.

March 9.—Monumental, Richmond, preached and confirmed twenty-eight—one being from St. Paul's.

March 10.—St. John's, Richmond, preached and confirmed thirty-eight.

March 11.—Moore Memorial, Richmond, preached and confirmed eight.

March 13.—St. Paul's Chapel, Berkley, preached and confirmed ten, and the same day preached in St. Paul's and Christ's, Norfolk; confirming eighteen in the former and twenty-nine in the latter.

March 14.—Centurion Church, Fortress Monroe, preached and confirmed twenty-one, presented by the post chaplain, Rev. O. E. Herrick.

March 15.—Preached morning and night in St. John's Church, Hampton, and confirmed twenty-seven, of whom four were Indians from the Normal School, where, in addition to their other labors, the Rev. J. J. Gravatt, and his assistant, Rev. C. J. S. Mayo, are engaged in a most interesting and beneficent work.

March 16.—Preached in the churches in Portsmouth, and confirmed eleven in St. John's and nine in Trinity.

March 17.—St. Luke's, Norfolk, preached and confirmed eighteen. The church building of this flourishing congregation had been greatly enlarged and improved since my last visit.

March 19.—Administered the communion to a sick person at Rocky Mount, Franklin county, the minister in charge being only in deacon's orders.

March 20.—Consecrated Ascension Church, Franklin county, preached, confirmed ten, and celebrated the Lord's Supper; and at night again preached, confirmed one, and administered the communion in Trinity Church, Franklin Courthouse.

Ascension Church, a substantial, comfortable and pretty building, with its flourishing Sunday School and congregation and growing communion, was all commenced by one earnest woman, and has been carried on to its present state of prosperity and success by her and a few like-minded with herself, who soon came to her help. May the Lord, more and more, bless these good people in their labors for His glory and the salvation of their fellow-men. I have reported my celebrating the Lord's Supper at night. This, under ordinary circumstances, is, in my judgment, unlawful. But I felt justified in violating what I understand to be the order of the Church, by the necessity of the case, there being no other time when the Sacrament could be administered.

March 21.—Preached in Grace Memorial Church, Lynchburg, and confirmed four.

March 22.—Preached, morning and night, in St. Paul's, Lynchburg; at the former service ordaining Rev. Edward S. Gregory to the Priesthood, and at the latter confirming seventeen. The Rev. E. W. Hubard, J. K. Mason, J. H. Williams, and T. M. Carson, rector of the church, assisted in the services.

March 23.—Preached in the court-house in Farmville, and confirmed five.

March 27.—Preached in the churches in Fredericksburg, and confirmed nine in St. George's and five in Trinity; also in St. George's Chapel, Spotsylvania, and confirmed three.

March 29.—After sermon by Rev. P. Powers, confirmed four in St. Mark's, Richmond.

April 1.—Preached in Emmanuel, Harrisonburg, and confirmed

seven. I grieve to say that the earnest and able rector of this church, Rev. T. Jervis-Edwards, has been constrained, by continued bad health to resign his charge. His brief ministry, of less than two years, will leave fruit which must abide for all time. Besides spiritual results he has done the important work of relieving the parish of a large debt on the church building, which had been a burden upon it for years, and of securing a desirable lot for a rectory. I trust he may soon be restored to health and usefulness.

April 3.—Preached in St. Andrew's, Mount Jackson, and confirmed six; and in the court-house, Woodstock, and confirmed two. In this latter place a church building has been commenced, which, as there is money in hand to finish it, will no doubt be ready for consecration by my next visit.

April 4.—Christ Church, Winchester, preached and confirmed fifteen.

April 5.—Preached in St. Thomas' Church, Middletown, which is without a rector.

April 6.—Preached in Calvary Church, Front Royal.

April 7.—Preached in the same church and confirmed three.

April 8.—Christ, Chantilly, Fairfax county, preached and confirmed four.

April 9.—Assisted by the rector, Rev. Frank Page, consecrated St. Timothy's Church, Herndon, and confirmed two. This fine building is a monument to the faithful perseverence of a few earnest Christians, who are already rewarded by having good congregations, and the prospect of a flourishing church.

April 10.—Preached in Zion Church, Fairfax Courthouse, and in St. John's, West End, confirming six in the former and four in the latter.

April 11.—Preached at night to a good congregation, in a school-house, at Dumfries, Prince William county. Rev. J. M. Meredith is laboring as a missionary amongst the people of this neglected region. Aided by a few zealous Episcopalians he has erected quite a large and handsome building on the site and in the grave-yard of Quantico, an old Colonial church, which has long since disappeared. They are going on with the inside work of the new building, the rest being completed.

April 12.—Passed by Aquia Church, Stafford, in a pouring rain, where I had an appointment but no congregation.

April 16.—Easter eve—preached in Grace, Caroline, and confirmed two.

April 17.—Easter day—preached in St. Peter's, Port Royal, confirmed eight, and assisted the rector, Rev. J. E. Poindexter, in the administration of the Lord's Supper.

April 18.—Preached in Emmanuel, King George, the rectorship being vacant, and confirmed three.

April 19.-Lamb's Creek, preached and confirmed one.

April 20.—Preached in St. Paul's.

April 21.—Assisted by Rev. Messrs. Hunter, Poindexter and Latané, consecrated St. John's, a very pretty brick church at King George Courthouse, preached and confirmed one. This building was erected in place of another, which was torn down, under the ministry of the lamented Rev. E. B. McGuire, who did not live to take part in the day's service.

April 22.—Consecrated Payne Memorial Chapel, a plain, but neat and comfortable building in Westmoreland county. The rector, Rev. W. C. Latané, assisted in the services.

April 23.—Preached in St. Peter's, Oak Grove, and confirmed three.

April 24.—St. James, Montross, preached and confirmed one.

April 25.—Preached in Nomini Church, and confirmed four.

April 26.—Preached in Yeocomico.

April 27.—Preached in St. John's, Warsaw, Richmond county, and confirmed thirteen.

April 28.—St. Paul's Chapel, Westmoreland, preached and confirmed one.

April 29.—Farnham Church, Richmond, preached and confirmed two.

April 30.—Consecrated St. Stephen's Church, a large and pretty building at Heathsville, Northumberland county, preached and confirmed one. Rev. Messrs. Tucker, Derby and E. Meade assisted in the services.

May 1.—Grace, Lancaster, preached and confirmed four.

May 2.—Preached and confirmed three in Wycomico Church, Northumberland. This is a school-house which has been purchased for a church, and where there is a prospect of a good work being done by the faithful efforts of Rev. H. L. Derby. The building is to be enlarged and improved for the congregation which is already large and increasing.

May 3.—White Chapel, Lancaster, preached and confirmed two.

May 4.—St. John's, Tappahannock, preached and confirmed five.

May 5.—Preached in St. Paul's, Essex, and confirmed four.

May 6.—After service by Rev. E. Meade, preached in St. David's, King William, which is without a rector, and confirmed three.

May 7.—Read the service, baptized three adults, preached and confirmed six in Emmanuel, Hanover, which is also without a rector

May 8.—St. Paul's, Richmond, confirmed nine.

## DEATHS.

It is my sad duty to report the deaths of four of our Clerical brethren during the past year. The Rev. Henry S. Kepler was the first to depart, on the 5th of Oct., 1880, in the seventy-fourth year of his age. At the time of his last sickness (which was brought on by exposure in the discharge of duty, and was protracted to several months) he was laboring as a missionary in Goochland county and in the State penitentiary, Richmond.

Rev. Wm. N. WARD died at his home in Richmond county, on the 25th of February, 1881, aged seventy-four years. For several years he had been most actively engaged in missionary work in Spotsylvania and Caroline counties, but was obliged by feeble health, a few months before his death, to cease from his labors.

Rev. FREDERICK D. GOODWIN, who, for many years, had been so broken down in health, as to be unable to perform any of the duties of the ministry, departed this life at his home in Wytheville, on the 26th of March, 1881, in the seventy-eighth year of his age.

Finally, on the 29th of March, 1881, the Rev. EDWARD B. McGuire, Rector of Hanover Parish, King George county, died, after a violent and distressing illness of six days, in the sixty-fourth year of his age, triumphing in the consolations of that blessed Gospel which he had preached to others and practised in his own life. It is not necessary I should eulogize these brethren. Enough that they were all earnest, devout, Godly men, who, having finished their course in faith, have doubtless entered into the joy of their Lord. May we follow them as they followed Christ.

#### SUMMARY.

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If figures furnish any reliable view of the state of the Diocese the foregoing summary ought surely to fill our hearts with gratitude to God for the past and inspire us with increased devotion to the great work of preaching the Gospel and extending our beloved Church for the future.

As requested by the last Council (Journal, p. 72), I have filled the vacancy in the Committee on the Zion Union Work by the appointment of Rev. A. W. Weddell, D. D., in place of Rev. R. A. Goodwin.

I leave it to the deputies whom the Council charged with the duty of asking the consent of the General Convention to the election of an Assistant Bishop by this Diocese to report the result of their application.

I am glad to be able to report that the new chapel at our Seminary has been finished and paid for, and will be consecrated (D. V.) during commencement week in June.

The Rev. J. J. Norwood has continued to labor most faithfully and acceptably as Evangelist during the past year, and I am persuaded few ministers of the Diocese are engaged in more important work. I had been trying for several years, in compliance with the direction of the Council, to find a suitable man to associate with Mr. Norwood

but never succeeded until last December, when Rev. John J. Lloyd was appointed, his field of labor being Southwest Virginia.

The Rev. Robb White, during the past as during the previous year, has devoted one half of his time to the Zion Union congregations in Brunswick and Mecklenburg counties in connection with his duties as Rector of St. Andrew's Church, Lawrenceville. The last Council directed that all his time be given to these colored people, but after consultation with him and the Committee on Colored Congregations it was decided to be best to continue the old arrangement, his work consisting chiefly in visiting the different congregations to advise and direct them, and one half of his time being thought sufficient for this purpose. The reports of these three Evangelist brethren will be published in the Journal. I earnestly recommend that the appropriation for their support made by the last Council be renewed.

It is not necessary for me to speak particularly of our various Diocesan institutions, as their condition and wants will be laid before you by their respective officers or managers. I commend them all as being worthy of a deeper and more general interest on the part of the clergy, and of a more liberal support from the laity, than they have heretofore received.

I have no new suggestions to make or measures to propose. The object for which the church exists, which ought to be regarded as of first importance by us all, and which I would rejoice to see occupying the largest share of the time and attention of the Council, is the promotion of the great and divine work of missions-missions, especially, amongst the white and colored people within our own borders. No Diocese, I believe, was ever blessed with a clergy who, as a body, were more largely endued with the missionary spirit, which is the spirit of Christ, or who were more diligent in missionary labors than our own. Many of the laity too are willing co-workers with their pastors, and I am glad to observe that their interest is increasing, as appears from the increase in the contributions to our Missionary Society the past year, the large number of lay readers licensed, and the efforts which are being made in various parts of the Diocese to do something for the religious instruction of the negroes. But, while the harvest which is ready and waiting for our Church to reap in Virginia truly is great-greater than ever before-the laborers and the means to support them are altogether inadequate. To say noth-

ing of the large white population scattered everywhere, who are as sheep having no shepherd, there are hundreds of thousands of colored people in our very midst—members of our parishes, our fellow-citizens, and our brethren in Christ—for whose instruction in the doctrines and duties of Christianity we are responsible and will be held accountable. It is vain to look for either men or money from outside the Diocese for this work. The duty is ours and we cannot escape it. Our own people must furnish the means and our own ministers and laity must do the work. We have a glorious opportunity, and fearful will be the consequences if we fail to improve it. May the love of Christ constrain us, as a Church and as individual Christians, faithfully to discharge the trust which He has committed to us, lest he say to us, "Give an account of thy stewardship, for thou mayest be no longer steward."

I beg, in conclusion, to remind my brethren that our old Evangelical Knowledge Society is still engaged in publishing and circulating books and tracts to drive away the infidel and Romish and other erroneous and strange doctrines contrary to God's word, which are plaguing our Church now more than ever before. If, as we believe, there were good and sufficient reasons for organizing the society nearly forty years ago, the same reasons still exist in even greater force for continuing it and enabling it to do its good work. I therefore trust that it may not fail to be sustained by your prayers and your alms.

Mr. W. W. Old moved that the Council meet next year in Christ Church, Norfolk.

The motion was laid upon the table for the present.

Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D.,

President of the Board of Trustees:

Rt. Rev. and Dear Sir,—As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

The aggregate number of boys admitted during the present session, including six day scholars, is eighty-seven, the highest since the war. We have continued to enjoy the blessing of health in a remarkable degree, largely, if not mainly, the result of the gymnasium, of the extraordinary attention paid to physical culture, and the encouragement afforded to athletic sports.

Previous to March 13, all the religious services attended by boys and masters were, as last session, in the School Chapel. On that day, after two years' intermission, we were happily permitted to resume our Sunday morning place in the Seminary Chapel. The thanks of all are eminently due to the Rev. Drs. Walker and Nelson, for their

frequent ministrations here during our long privation of regular services, and it seems fit that the gratitude of their alma mater to such dutiful sons should be recorded. The Friday night meeting for the boys has been maintained with unabated zeal by Mr. Wm. Herbert Assheton, of the Senior Class in the Seminary. The ordinary devotional exercises of the school have been as heretofore, except that increased outlay and effort have been made in behalf of music. The choir has been enlarged and a new organ provided. The observance of the Christian holy days and seasons has been as heretofore, regular and emphatic. The number of communicants among the boys is nineteen, and others are awaiting confirmation.

# REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF BIBLICAL LEARNING.

# To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Biblical Learning respectfully reports to the Board of Trustees, that the classes under his instruction, have, during the past session, pursued the prescribed course of study.

The senior class has read the books of Jonah and Esther in the Hebrew, and has studied energetically the two Epistles to the Corinthians.

The middle class has read about twenty Psalms and the Prophecies of Christ in the Hebrew language, and the Epistles to the Romans, and to the Hebrews in the Greek.

The junior class has been drilled in the Hebrew Grammar by written exercises, and have read about the usual amount of text. They have in Greek, studied the Gospel of John. They have, as usual, written essays on important and difficult subjects in the Gospels.

A monthly report has been made to me by the teachers of the preparatory department, from which I learn that its students have been diligent in their studies.

# REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

# To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

I would respectfully report that the classes have during the session pursued the usual course of study.

The senior class, reciting three times a week, have studied the Articles, Homiletics and Liturgies. With the Articles they have used Boultbie and Burnett, with written references to other sources of information. In Homiletics they have studied Broadus, with plans and analysis of sermons, and the usual Wednesday evening exercise. In Liturgies they have had lectures, with written questions and references. They are now occupied with the last.

The middle class, for most of the session reciting daily, have studied Knapp's Theology, with written essays, and analysis of subjects studied. They are now reviewing.

The junior class, as during the last session, and for the reasons mentioned in former report, have studied only Chadbourne's Natural Theology. This they have finished, and are now engaged in reviewing.

Owing to the fact of the residence of one of the students in Washington, and the employment of three others in neighboring schools, there have been more absences from my recitations than usual. With the exception of those, however, from these causes, there have been none without excuse.

The middle class conclude the study of Apologetics, with the use of Butler's Analogy as a text-book.

In the same department the junior class pursue a course of study beginning with a course of lectures, and continued to the close of the session, in the use of Paley's Evidences and Butler's Analogy of Religion, Natural and Revealed.

For the first time, the Professor in this department has to report his absence from the class-room in consequence of illness—on one occasion for a period of three weeks, and on another of ten days.

# REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF CHURCH HISTORY.

The senior class has studied, with four recitations a week, the History of the Church of England, the History of the American Church, the first book of Hooker's Ecclesiastical Polity, the Constitution and Canons of the Church, the Pastoral Epistles in Greek, and Meade on the Pastoral Office.

The middle class, with three weekly recitations and regular essays, has studied Kurtz's Church History.

The junior class, with four weekly recitations and three essays a a week, has studied Dr. Smith's Old and New Testament History, and read the book of the Acts of the Apostles in Greek.

From frequent attendance upon the classes of the preparatory department, he testifies that faithful, thorough and efficient work has been performed by both teachers and scholars in that department.

REPORT OF INSTRUCTOR OF THEOLOGY IN BRANCH SCHOOL, PETERS-BURG.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

Dear Brethren,—I beg leave to report on my work as theological tutor of colored students for the past year.

There have been under my charge, during the past year, only three students, Messrs. J. S. Russell and G. W. Bragg, and the Rev. J. H. M. Pollard. The latter student recites to me twice a week in Systematic Theology, (Browne on the Articles,) and has studied other topics under my direction. The two former recite to me four days each week in the morning. During this session they have studied Abp. Secker's Lectures on the Catechism; Angus's Bible Hand Book; Cutts's Turning Points of Church History; Lightfoot's Christian Ministry; and Professor Walker's Questions on Ecclesiastical History, as given in the course at the Seminary. They have also read about seventeen chapters of the latter part of Isaiah, in Hebrew. They have also read Butler's "Common Prayer Interpreted," and are studying Dr. Walker's Questions on Liturgies. Their progress in study has been encouraging, and their deportment excellent.

We are glad to say that from the indications we have, our missionaries appear to be earnest and faithful, and, for the most part, to be doing good and effective work in their several fields of labor. In a few cases activity is hindered by age and bodily infirmity, but these

are doubtless doing what they can. We are glad to say, also, that the contributions for the year have considerably exceeded those of the preceding year, but they are still not up to the measure of our wants, and but for the McFarland legacy, from which we were obliged to draw \$1,288, we should have been unable to keep our work up to its present standard. It is manifest that instead of curtailing that work it ought to be extended, and it is equally manifest that we are fully able to do it. If the 13,000 communicants of the Diocese will give us an average of but one cent a Sunday, we can not only keep our present force at work, but have something for another line of work which is now pressing upon us, the religious education of colored children and youth.

We desire also to call attention to a monthly paper, entitled Our Diocesan Work, which has been issued since 1st January, 1881, under the auspices of the Executive Committee, the design of which is to stimulate all, both people and clergy, to greater zeal and activity in the Lord's work. All moneys received over and above the actual expenses of publication will be turned over to Diocesan Missions. All we ask is money enough to carry it on, and intelligence enough to make the paper serve the purpose for which it is published. We distributed in the Diocese 1,000 copies in the month of January, and 2,000 copies in each of the following months. But we are still embarrassed for want of names, for there are more than thirty of the clergy who, though asked again and again, have given us no names, nor taken notice of the paper in any way.

In conclusion, we think the outlook is such that we may thank God and take courage.

# Protestant Episcopal Church Home,

The order of the day was suspended to allow the Rev. J. G. Armstrong to present the following letter and resolutions:

114 N. SEVENTH STREET, RICHMOND, May 3d.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The managers of the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, No. 517 N. Fourth street, feel it their duty to make a report to the Council, that they may call attention, not only to the present condition, but to the future wants of the institution under their care.

We have had fourteen (14) inmates during the past year. Seven (7) of these have come from various parts of the Diocese, beyond the limits of this city, but up to this time we have received only one hundred and eighty dollars (\$180) from outside of Richmond.

It has given us real pain to refuse applications from those who from dire necessity are now seeking refuge within our walls. Add to this that the increasing age and infirmities of those already in our establishment, make it an infirmary as well as a home, and you will see the absolute necessity of increased assistance from all interested in so important a work.

As the institution belongs to the whole Diocese, it is hoped that contributions will be sent from all the parishes. However small, they will be gratefully received and will assist us in extending our care to deserving members of the Church, who sadly need just such a shelter as the Home affords.

Resolved, That the Standing Committee on Church Property be instructed to sell at their discretion lots No. 6 and 7, in the Hollywood Cemetery, and to devote the proceeds to the P. E. Church Home; that the Trustees use the same to purchase other and more suitable lots.

The consideration of the order of the day was resumed.

Canon II of the report was adopted, with the three additional sections of the old Canon added.

Mr. Robert Beverly moved that the present Canon XII be adopted in lieu of the proposed Canon III.

Carried.

Canon IV of the report was then presented and adopted as reported.

Mr. Walter H. Taylor moved the rejection of the rest of the report.

At 11 A. M. the Rev. Dr. Damé moved that the Council take recess for divine service.

Carried.

The Council re-assembled at 12:55 P. M., and took recess to 3 P. M.

The Council re-assembled.

By unanimous consent the order of the day was set aside temporarily, to allow Mr. H. W. Sheffey to present the following:

The undersigned Deputies to the General Convention, which met in New York in October last, having been charged by the Council of

this Diocese, in May 1880, with the duty of presenting to the General Convention a request to that body for its consent to the election of an Assistant Bishop for the Diocese of Virginia, and of securing such consent, if practicable, deem it proper to inform the Council, now in session, that in obedience to the instruction of the Council, they presented to the General Convention the resolutions which had been adopted by the Council of this Diocese on the 21st day of May, 1880, together with a communication in writing, signed by them, and by the associate-deputies, Dr. Norton and Judge Parker, in which they formally requested the consent of the General Convention to the election of an Assistant Bishop for this Diocese; that the subject was referred to the Committee on Canons, which committee reported it back without recommendation; and that, after debate, the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies refused to grant the consent asked for.

DANVILLE, May 19, 1881.

The Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute respectfully report to the Council that they have filled the vacancies in the Board of Trustees by the election of the following gentlemen: Thomas C. Elder, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of John N. Hendron; George M. Harrison, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Nathaniel H. Massie, and C. M. Blackford to fill the vacancy caused by the death of John M. Miller.

The Trustees this day held their annual meeting and received from the Board of Directors and from Mrs. Stuart, the Principal of the Institute, their regular reports. These reports, so far as they refer to the condition of the Institute in its educational department, are not

only satisfactory but highly gratifying. It affords the Trustees pleasure, as expressing what they believe to be just views of the Institute, and of its management, to copy the following extracts from the report of the Board of Directors. The Board state that "all that Mrs. Stuart says in respect to the condition of the school in its educational department, the corps of teachers, and the progress and deportment of the pupils, they most unreservedly and cordially endorse. When, at the last Council, the Board invoked the confidence of the Trustees and through them of the Council, and of the clergy and laity of the Diocese, in Mrs. Stuart and her then newly organized faculty of instructors; when, in the presence of the Council, and by its permission, Colonel Skinner made his earnest and eloquent address in behalf of the Institute, under the auspices of its recently appointed principal, the friends of the Institute labored under the disadvantage of speaking prospectively and conjecturally as to the capacity and fitness of Mrs. Stuart for the conduct and management of such an institution. Now, however, after the observation and experience of the past year, the Board of Directors feel justified in announcing to the Trustees that the confidence which led them to select Mrs. Stuart as principal of the Institute was well justified, and that the most sanguine anticipations of her friends in respect to her qualifications for the responsible position assigned to her have been more than realized. She is endowed with rare administrative capacity, and with the clearness and promptness of judgment, firmness and system in government, blended with maternal solicitude for and care of the comfort and happiness of the pupils under her charge, which entitle her not only to the confidence of the Trustees and of the Council. but to distinguished success in her high and noble aims." The Board add that "it is gratifying to know from Mrs. Stuart's report that she will be assisted during the next session by her present corps of instructors, including Professor Minor, Miss Parran as vice principal, Mrs. Dupuy, Professor and Madam De Vallay, and others who constitute faculty of teachers unsurpassed in the South. And in view of the experience of the past year, the Board of Directors feel well justified in again commending the institution to the confidence and patronage of the Diocese of Virginia, to which it belongs; and which, if properly supported by the Diocese, will ere long provide, especially for the daughters of our clergy, the means of first-class education at a low rate of cost." In these views the Trustees cordially concur and earnRelations of Diocese to General Theological Seminary.

estly commend the Institute to those who desire for their daughters education of the best kind, and training for them under maternal control and watchful care, and to be assured that they will constantly be surrounded by all the refining, elevating, and Christian influences which tend to develope the graces and virtues of true womanhood.

The Trustees recognize, with pleasure, the fact as disclosed by Mrs. Stuart's report, that the young Diocese of West Virginia is beginning to bestow liberal patronage upon the Institute, the number from that Diocese being almost equal to that from the Diocese of Virginia. The Trustees trust that the clergy and laity of Virginia will sustain their own school and make it a success and a blessing to the whole Diocese-Clergymens' daughters are now received at reduced rates; and the general charges, as the Board reports, are as moderate as those of any other institution of like educational advantages in the State. They are particularly gratified by the assurance "that nowhere is the tendency towards extravagance in dress and other expenditures more firmly and uniformly repressed."

In conclusion, the Trustees request the Council to adopt the resolution which they have instructed Judge Sheffey to submit for its consideration and action.

The resolution of Mr. Old was carried.

Resolved, That our thanks are also tendered to the Rector of this Church, to the Committee of Reception, and to the Pages for their useful services, as also to the Vestry and Wardens of the Church of the Epiphany for their arrangements for this Conneil.

#### State of the Church.

On motion of Mr. B. J. Barbour, the reading of the Report of the Historiographer was made the order of the day for tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

Carried unanimously.

The Council then adjourned.

May 21, 1881.

The Council met at 9 A. M., and was called to order by the Bishop, after prayer by Rev. A. W. Weddell, D. D.

Rev. Dr. Minnigerode presented the Report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

The Committee on the State of the Church in presenting their report to the Council think it proper, by way of introduction, to refer to the peculiar features attending their annual meeting of its Clergy and Lay Delegates.

It is the first time that we have met in the goodly city of Danville. Another place of meeting of the Council of our Church has been added to the number of the rallying points for the annual meetings of our Diocesan Conventions; and the committee are thankful to report that its success has placed it among the most favorable points of the Diocese for this purpose, whether we consider the accommodations and comforts of the members of the Council, or the arrangements for the transaction of its business. It is not deemed improper by your committee to refer briefly to the history and growth of the Church in this place—for it is but a type of the progress of our Church and a testimony of its growth. Epiphany Church, Danville, was taken charge of by Dr. Dame in the year 1840; the communicants then consisting of four ladies. One hundred and seventy communicants, male and female, are reported this year. The size and wants of the congregation had outgrown the venerable old church, and a beautiful chaste church building has just been completed, free of debt, and in time for consecration at the opening services of this Council. We may be permitted to refer to the interesting and unusual features of that consecration. There were present the Bishop of the Diocese and

the Bishop of West Virginia, who still appears at our Councils as one of our own. The Rector, Dr. Dame, with his three sons, all of Virginia birth and training, Revs. Wm. M. Dame, N. P. Dame, now of Maryland, and G. W. Dame, of West Virginia, in the chancel; and the sermon, the consecration and convention service of the day was preached by the Rev. A. Johns, the son of our late beloved Diocesan, the Rt. Rev. Bishop Johns, of blessed memory. Rarely, if ever, have so many touching associations accompanied the opening services of our Council.

The living power of this Church is attested by the remarkable record that eleven candidates have been sent forth from it into the sacred ministry, three of them sons of the Rector, and one his nephew, besides one Bishop, the energetic and faithful Missionary Bishop of Africa.

The committee refer to these facts as facts connected with the history and state of our Church, which are not recorded in any other report.

Turning to the special items presenting the State of the Church in our Diocese, the committee regret that they labor under the difficulty, perhaps the common difficulty, that the sources from which they have to make up their report, are not complete. It was impossible to obtain a copy of the Bishop's Report, so full of specific information; nor did they have the benefit of the full report of the Committee on Parochial Reports.

This is a very common difficulty; and it is a source of regret that all the measures taken to insure to the Committee on the State of the Church the needful materials, practically so little has yet been accomplished in that way. But the perspicuity of the Bishop's Report fastened the main facts in the minds of the members of the committee, and at least the leading items of the Parochial Reports were forwarded to it.

In entering upon the details, the committee cannot refrain from expressing (and they hope they violate no law of delicacy, but only discharge a duty to which the whole Diocese responds,) their deep and heartfelt sympathy with our beloved Bishop in the dark days of the trials which the All-wise Ruler of our lives has allowed him to pass through, and assure him of the tender love and constant prayers with which his Diocese follow him to the throne of grace for support and comfort. Let us close our lips in loving

reserve upon the wrestlings of those sad and anxious days, and thank God that Divine grace brought him out of them stronger for the blessed work he has been doing in the Diocese.

The committee rejoice with the Bishop, that so far as we can judge from the fruits of this year's work, we have great cause to lift our hearts in gratitude to the great Head of the Church for the many blessings bestowed upon us.

In spite of the loss of time, increased by the meeting of the General Convention and the severity of the winter, the work done is equal to what the most sanguine could expect, and is an earnest of the live character of the Church, a proof of the energy of our chief pastor, and of the blessing of God upon the labors of our clergy and, we gladly add, our faithful laity.

For the details of numbers, which we cannot report with exactness, suffice it to say: that the visitations of the Bishop, and the number of our communicants added by confirmation, scarcely fall behind the previous year; and in many instances go beyond them. A wide door is opened to the Church among our own people and to every Parish in the Diocese. Let the knowledge of this increase in all the sense of their responsibility, and prove an encouragement to put forth all our zeal and strength to meet the mercies of our Lord and the wants of the times. Let us ever remember, however, that true success is not measured by numbers but by change of heart, verified in the life of those who are admitted to our communion. Here is our main work! Our Church is like a city set on a hill-many, many more than ever before are seeking our communion from other Christian bodies. Let us so administer our trust and so live, that our friends, our children, and all who seek salvation, may find in our Church a body of professors who are Christians in deed and in truth, and who, by their consistent and unworldly lives, let their light shine before men to the praise and glory of God and the true welfare of our fellow creatures, of all classes—of all conditions of men!

The committee would press upon the conscience of all our people the paramount importance of training the young. The Sunday Schools, we are glad to see, are increasing; not in numbers only, we hope but in real godly work. The Sunday School is the first element of the Church's growth. The blessing was given to Abraham because he would command, or that he should command his children after him; and the noblest Christians of all ages have been those, who, like

Timothy, have learned the Scriptures from their childhood up—aye, at their mother's knees. Let our mothers heed this truth!

No subject can engage our attention more earnestly than the missions of the Church. The Church of God is a missionary Church. Christ himself, the first and great missionary. And unless the Church goes out in obedience to our Lord's commands, it is dead, and we do not see what claims it has to call itself the Church of Christ,

It is gratifying to report that about \$1,000 more have been contributed to Diocesan Missions this year than last year. But we must all feel how far we fall below the Scripture mark and the work and sacrifices—we do not say of the Master—but of His apostles and the early Church; we fear we must add, how little our present indifference to this work corresponds with the mighty work, the great movement which marked the revival of the Church some fifty or eighty years ago, and gave this century of the Church's history the character of a missionary Church. We have hopes that our Church is deeply moved on this subject, and would reiterate what has been said during the missionary meetings of this Council—that there are three fields—our older and enfeebled parishes, the new fields opening to us in the western part of the Diocese especially, and the colored people, who we maintain are much more the wards of the Church, and in a more blessed sense than they ever can be claimed to be the wards of the nation. Here, if anywhere, is their hope, and we are responsible for their souls! Only think, 700,000 souls in charge of Christ's Church in Virginia!

We forbear going into minute details, so deeply interesting, as they have been given in the discussion before the Church, and the reports of separate committees. We do so reluctantly, as there is no more tempting subject; but as they are brought out in other ways and laid before the Church, we do not think that we ought to spin out our report to undue length by repeating what is better said in special reports.

Let the following suffice.

There never has been the time, so far as we know, in the history of our Diocese, when the people, generally, were more willing to receive and welcome our Church, nor was it ever more important that the Scriptural and conservative features of our Church should be brought to bear upon the masses.

We cannot lose sight of the great and good work of aiding, re-

viving, enfeebled or vacant parishes. Besides the sentiment, there is a strong claim upon the Church, which these very parishes have helped to establish in this Diocese. In many instances, even the vacant churches can be occasionally used by the nearest ministers, and an interest kept up and revived. Many of our parishes are asleep—not dead. Shall we have them to sleep the sleep of death? No; we must stand by them, aid them, watch over them, cherish them for what they have done, and what they may yet do. Many of our Eastern parishes present as large a field for missionary work as any in the fallow ground of the West. Just take the field or fields of our minister in Powhatan, or the experiences we have had in Fairfax county, Hanover, Mecklenburg, and others, and in the comparatively new fields of Franklin and other counties, hitherto almost inaccessible.

The western part of the Diocese, so rich in mineral resources, is being rapidly developed. Railroads are being made, furnaces and factories established; the population has increased about 33 per cent. in ten years, and will probably increase more rapidly in the next decade.

There are twelve counties west of the Blue Ridge, in which there is no Episcopal Church or minister, with a population of 131,000. There are only six ministers to 233,000 souls. The prejudices against our Church are decreasing wherever it is established—the people asking to hear and know our Church—very many of them totally ignorant of the Gospel, and heretofore attending no church at all.

Colored Work.—Before the war much was done by the Church and our Church families, especially in the country; and the awakening in Brunswick county and neighborhood may be the result of the faithful and successful church-work in the days before the war. After its close it was but natural that reaction should have followed; but it was of short duration, and now we can report not only the beginning but the growth of a work most promising, and laying upon our Church the highest obligations.

More colored Sundays Schools are in existence now than ever before. Our ministers, to some extent, realize the truth that the colored people in their Parishes are their parishioners—but not as fully as should be.

The work among the Zion Union Apostolic Church has not been without good fruit—they still wish instruction—six desire to enter our ministry, and the moral and religious character of the people has

much improved. Of course we must not be too sanguine. We cannot, nor will we look for a mushroom growth, or sensational marvels; but what is before us is no more full of surprise than of promise. Look at Petersburg. The successful experiment at this point proves conclusively that our Church is well adapted and suited to the spiritual wants of the colored people. Besides our training school—the policy adopted there of thorough teaching of children in the Parochial and Sunday Schools, and preaching the gospel to the adults in the Church and elsewhere, seems to be the only one to reach and to Christianize this race.

Our Diocesan Missionary Society in all its branches is one arm of the Church, our Seminary and Education Society are the other arm, and we must use both, and use them to the best advantage. The Education Society is the great source of strength on which our Seminary relies, that Seminary—the legacy to Virginia of the great saints of our Church—the most important of all our institutions.

Your committee would recognize the favoring hand of God in the number of candidates for orders and the condition of the Seminary. Though one of ten or twelve similar institutions throughout the Church, it has forty-five students upon its rolls. Yet since our Diocese is constantly called upon to supply the vacant parishes in other Dioceses; since now, as of old, the harvest continues plenteous and the laborers are few, they would urge upon Christian parents their privilege and obligation, to dedicate their children to the service of God, to train them up with the belief that the Christian ministry is the greatest and most glorious work which God ever commits to mortal man. The condition of the Education Society is well worthy of attention. This time-honored institution, in the more than fifty years of its existence, has helped to put nearly 700 men into the ministry, and the record shows that scarcely any have proved unworthy of the care and approval of their Alma Mater.

To its aid a large number of our parishes owe their present supply of clergymen. It is now supporting eighteen students at our seminary, and hopes to close the present session free from debt. There is reason to believe, however, that it will in future need and merit the constant and increased support of its friends and patrons. God help us if we do not meet this sacred duty.

The Brotherhood.—It has again and again been recommended to the people of our Diocese. We can hardly understand why it has

met with so little success, comparatively speaking. Your committee think that its claims appeal to the best and tenderest feelings, and every "natural affection" (to use a Scriptural term) of the members of the Church and the beneficiary of its blessings. But, beyond this, they believe that, in its missionary aspect, as securing to the Diocese the permanent residence and labors of our ministers, and preventing them from seeking other fields outside of Virginia, it is one of the most practically useful institutions of our Diocese. All of our ministers are willing to labor in our own vineyard even upon the minimum of a support, and gladly bear poverty and trials. Secure to them by means of this Brotherhood a provision for their dear ones. left behind, when they, worn out in the service of our Church, are called to rest from their labors above, and you give them a reasonable motive for remaining with us, as they can leave their family in the hands of a faithful protector. The committee hope that the new measures adopted, and the earnest and judicious presentation of its claims by all ministers and our lay agents, will infuse new interest in this blessed work, and place the Brotherhood upon a safe footing.

One More Subject.—Every age has its special temptations and vices. Everywhere the Church is awaking to the crying evil of intemperance. We cannot close our report without referring to this subject, and press its importance and urge the cooperation of all in its promotion upon the Church. We thank God for the steps taken at this Council to give a practical turn to the resolutions so often, but without commensurate results, passed by our Church, and commend the movement to every lover of God and man.

So much the committee feel bound to lay before the Council in their report on the State of the Church. We believe there are signs of more life, that there is a decrease of prejudice against our Church on the part of others, that there is a decided increase of interest in our own Church, as shown by their increased contributions. But the committee cannot close their report without pointing out—as the only way to give life and keep life in the machinery of our Church, and promote its true welfare—the increased holiness on the part of priest and people, and the spirit of Christ as the guide of our lives. Let us pray God for the outpouring of His spirit, to enable us to do our duty as in His sight, in dependence on His grace and to His praise and glory. And God's blessing is given with this and in this renewal of our minds.

#### Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

And, in conclusion, let us all work together in this noble work of the Christian ministry, which belongs to all Christians, clerical or lay, and in peace and harmony and brotherly love, reap His blessing, without which nothing is strong, nothing is holy.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel moved that 2,000 extra copies of that Report be printed and circulated through the Diocese. Carried.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the Report of the Manager of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

The Board of Managers of "The Widows' and Orphans' Fund" of the Diocese of Virginia are thankful to be able to report a somewhat improved condition of their finances. The report of the Treasurer is herewith submitted to be printed in the Journal. From this it will be seen that while the face value of the bonds in which the principal is invested is less than it was last year, their real value has been very much increased, all the bonds now held being above par. Our assets amount to \$23,638.60 in 6 per cents. One bond only of \$1,000, yielding 8 per cent. An income at this rate of interest does not furnish an amount at all adequate to the constantly increasing demands upon us. We are obliged to look still to the parishes of the Diocese to supply by their contributions, year by year, the means of keeping from pinching want, the widows and orphans of our departed brethren. The year before last we had a response to the earnest appeal of our Treasurer from fifty-six of our parishes, about a third of the

whole, but this year we are sorry to say not one fourth of them, only thirty-six out of the one hundred and sixty still alive in the Diocese, have given us one cent.

In 1879 our distributable income was increased by the parishes \$777.17. This year they have added to it only \$479.01. In the meantime, the number of the beneficiaries has increased, until this year, they amount to thirteen. Notwithstanding, therefore, the lack of interest shown by the parishes, the board have felt constrained, even at the risk of trenching upon their principal, not to withhold from those who have such strong claims upon us, a small amount to meet their most pressing need. Among the thirteen families they have distributed \$2,080.

If all the ministers of the Diocese had given heed to the earnest appeal of our Treasurer, and had remembered the claims of "the fatherless and the widows," we could have rendered them more effectual aid, and made their darkened homes less desolate.

Rev. R. A. Goodwin presented the Report of the Special Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's Address relating to Diocesan Missions.

The committee appointed to consider that part of the Bishop's address relating to missionary work within the Diocese, beg leave to make the following report:

We are unanimous in the opinion that the missionary work of this Diocese, which we believe to be of preeminent importance, can be accomplished more effectually by keeping the three branches of the same distinct, namely: The work among the colored people in organized parishes; the work among white and colored, in that part of the Diocese where our Church has never been established, and the work of aiding feeble parishes already organized.

We believe the funds of the society will be increased by encouraging distinct contributions to these three good objects. We have considered the two resolutions referred to us. One on the pledge sys-

tem and the other on the subscription book as adopted by the General Convention for Foreign and Domestic Missions.

We recommend to the Council the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved 1, That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia appoint three (3) sub committees, partly or entirely, from their own number, as they may deem best; provided that the Bishop of the Diocese be ex-officio chairman of each: to be known as the Committee on Work Among the Colored People; The Committee on Work in New Fields; The Committee on Work in Feeble Parishes.

Resolved 2, That the Executive Committee place the funds contributed, respectively to the above named branches of mission work in the hands of the respective sub-committees for disbursement.

Resolved 3, That the Executive Committee shall decide to which of the sub-committees all funds, not designated, shall be given.

Resolved 4, That the secretary of the Executive Committee prepare a subscription-book similar to that now recommended to be used for Foreign and Domestic Mission, and send to every rector in the Diocese as many copies of the same as he has churches under his care, and to the vestry of every church where there is no rector, and that the Council recommend the use of said book.

Resolved 5, That every rector or vestry inform the secretary of the Executive Committee as soon as practicable, what amounts has been subscribed respectively to the object above mentioned.

Resolved 6, That the Council, recognizing the importance of making the parishes, aided by the Executive Committee, self-supporting, at the earliest day practicable, recommend a gradual reduction of the stipend allotted to each; leaving to the judgment of the committee the amount of such reduction.

Mr. B. J. Barbour read the Report of the Committee on Clerical Support.

Mr. B. J. Barbour read the Report of the Historiographer, which was ordered to be printed in the Journal.

#### REPORT OF THE HISTORIOGRAPHER.

My Dear Bishop,—In my report to the last Council I enumerated the Church records which were in the library at the seminary and in my possession. I need not recapitulate them here. Since that date, I have added to them the vestry book of Northam Parish by the courtesy of the Rev. P. M. Boyden; that of Amherst Parish by the kindness of the Rev. O. S. Bunting; that of St. Patrick's Parish, Prince Edward, through the mediation of Professor Holliday, of Hampden Sidney College. There are other colonial records in being, either in the charge of vestries or in private hands, who do not seem willing to let them go out of their care. Among these there is a mutilated record of St. George's Parish, on the basis of which I wrote and published in 1847 my history of St. George's

Parish, which was the first Parish History ever printed in Virginia. There is also one of Elizabeth City Parish (Hampton); another of Elizabeth River Parish, in the clerk's office at Norfolk; and, doubtless, others elsewhere.

The old register found in the clerk's office at Yorktown, and which has hitherto been reputed to be the register of York-Hampton Parish, I have found, upon a critical examination, is not a record of York-Hampton, but of *Charles*, another old Parish in York county, whose records have hitherto been supposed to be irrecoverably lost, the name of the Parish itself having disappeared from the journals for more than half a century.

Bishop Meade devoted only twelve lines to Charles Parish for want of documents, giving up its history as hopelessly lost. Stimulated by the discovery of this register, I have looked through "Henning's Statutes at Large," the Journals of Conventions, the Calendars of Virginia, State Papers, and other authorities, and out of scraps, picked up here and there, I have reconstructed the history of the old Parish, so long lapsed from sight. I have recovered the names and order of succession of its several ministers, the names of many of its vestrymen, and other incidents of its history. By the kindness of sympathizing friends, the venerable record of the names, births, baptisms and burials of many citizens of the State has been copied for the press, and will be printed, before it becomes illegible, without cost to the Council.

I also mentioned, in my last report, that I had recovered the vestry book of St. Patrick's Parish, which had been lost for a hundred years. Strangely enough it was found at Hampden Sidney, and courteously sent to me by Professor Holliday of that institution. At the suggestion of the Rev. Frank Stringfellow, and at the request of the editor of the Farmville Mercury, I have written, by the light of this record, the history of St. Patrick's Parish, which was published in the Mercury, and reprinted in the Southern Churchman. Mr. Stringfellow has been diligently and successfully engaged in recovering this Parish from its long sleep, an enterprise which is so deserving, that it should command success. It is a singular coincidence that the vestry book should have come to light at the very time of the Parish's awakening.

I have, too, since the last Council, written and published a sketch of Blisland Parish, in New Kent, based upon a vestry book found

since the time of Bishop Meade, who only glanced at this Parish in passing, saying, "There is no vestry book to tell its story."

I have, too, during the year, written and published a memoir of Colonel Joshua Fry, an old vestryman of the last century, sometime professor in William and Mary College, the friend and comrade in arms of Washington, and the Commander-in-chief of Virginia forces in 1755. This service has been gracefully acknowledged by divers historians and historical societies.

I am thinking of printing a curious charred manuscript, saved from a fire at the Mansion House, Alexandria. It contains the diary of a journey in the northwest, made by its unknown author, with General Washington and Dr. Craik and his son. The manuscript has in it, among many other things, a diagram of the grounds and garden of a place called *Belvidere*, which may lead to the discovery of the author.

All my histories of Parishes, except the sketches in the Southern Churchman, have been printed at my own expense, and most of my salary as Historiographer has been consumed in like manner, and in postage on the enormous correspondence (incident to the office) with the descendants of sires, born, baptized and buried in Virginia, the centre from which have radiated so many of the people of the other States and of several foreign lands, through which the sons of Virginia sires are "scattered abroad." Many of these exiles turn wistfully to the land of their fathers, and inquire as eagerly for certificates of births and baptisms as they would for title deeds to property. People may mock at such sentimentalism (as some call it), but mockery will not expel from human nature a feeling as old as man, and as sacred and beautiful now as when like sentiments were uttered by the patriarchs, the apostles, and by the Saviour himself. Virginians have often been taunted for their pride in their F. F. V's, so called; but those who throw these stones, themselves live in glass houses. There is hardly an American State which has not surpassed Virginia in its care for the "dead past," by appropriating money for gathering and preserving their family and historical records, and in the institution of antiquarian and other associations for recovering and illustrating their old annals, and perpetuating, by memoirs and monuments, poems and pictures, the memory of their sainted and patriotic dead. Even the youngest of her sisters, as Wisconsin and others, have far outstripped her. The most plaintive pleas have been

put forth by our Jeffersons, Madisons, Meades, Maxwells, Minors, McCabes, Rives, Hennings, Gilmers, Thompsons, Campbells, Grigsbys, Palmers and many others, with but little effect other than occasional spasmodic awakenings, followed by swift relapses. But for the unsubduable energy of Mr. Brock and his brave associates of the Executive Committee, the Historical Society of the State would ere this have probably been extinct.

The Episcopal Church, so vitally interwoven with our Colonial history, and which (with all its faults) nursed in her bosom the father of his country, the father of the Constitution, the author of the Bill of Rights, and so many of the great men, who fought our battles in council and in the field, has seen her records, "one by one expire," until not a record is left at Jamestown, and even in our old classic metropolis of Williamsburg, there is not a church record older than our late civil war, which capped the climax of our calamities. "Time, war, flood and fire" have dealt their deadly blows at our lives, our fortunes, our old land marks and memorials; and our people had but little heart to gather up the fragments, and reconstruct them into new and strange forms. Their energies have been absorbed in getting the means of subsistence, and rebuilding their waste places. In the meantime others, who have more leisure and more money, and most of the organs of public opinion, are writing our history for us from sectional standpoints, and coloring it with the hues of their own passions and prejudices. Unless we bestir ourselves in time, our children's children will look at us through a distorting medium and see our best and brightest names stained with dishonoring epithets. The parts which our great men, in Church and State, played in that great drama, of which America is the theatre, and whose catastrophe is beyond our ken, instead of looming to posterity in their true historical proportions, will be dwarfed to insignificant figures, playing secondary parts.

With all our losses we have a heritage which it is our Christian duty, by the grace of God, to transmit to our children as the best legacy we can leave them. This legacy includes a profound reverence for the Bible as the word of God, and for His Church as its witness and keeper; for the family as a divine institution, and family-worship and catechism, as the best primary and most normal of all schools; for the sanctity of the Sabbath, as the most conservative of all memorials; for "holy matrimony," as the greatest "bliss that has

survived the fall;" for the honor of our men, whose word is as sacred as their bond, and who feel a stain as a wound; and for the purity of our women, whose down of delicacy is their peculiar beauty and charm and crown of glory to their husbands. When a flood of infidelity and worldliness is sweeping through the land and menacing so many old landmarks, we should raise up these standards against it and do all within our power, by God's help, to keep alive upon our altars those fires, which, when once extinguished, can never be lighted again but by fire from heaven. If history teaches any lesson (infidels themselves being the judges), it is that the world is built upon moral foundations; that in the long run it is well for the good and ill for the evil. Opinions change, manners vary, but the moral law, like its author, is the same yesterday, to-day, and forever. There is a God in history and all laws, moral and material, are but the thoughts of God, made visible to the eyes of men.

Rev. Dr. Weddell, of the Committee on Zion Union work, offered the following:

The committee in charge of the work of this body among the Zion Union Apostolic Church beg leave to submit the following:

Since our last annual report there has been no material change in the attitude of the Zion Union organization and membership. As heretofore, so now, they continue under our care, desire to be guided by our councils, are under the influence of our teachings, and are being gradually shaped into harmony with our own "doctrine, discipline and worship." As far as their limited education permits, the Prayer Book is being used, and the literature of this Church sought after and studied. Beyond this, as was stated at the Fredericksburg Council, in 1879, they have no present desire to go. They cling

tenaciously to their organization. Any attempt as yet to engraft their ministry or membership upon this Church would prove fatal to the work. The fruit will ripen, but there must be no attempt to pluck until it does ripen. In proof of this, and as indicating their exact status, we quote from their own resolutions, as adopted by their Annual Conference:

Resolved 1, That holding firmly to our Church organization, as now constituted, and with no present desire to change the same, we feel the deepest gratitude to the Protestant Episcopal Church for the Christian love and charity which has been extended to us by the same in teaching and disciplining our people, aiding them to embrace a pure Christian faith, and to lead godly and Christian lives.

Resolved 2, That we earnestly desire that the work controlled by the same principle may be continued.

Resolved 3, That the Book of Common Prayer of the Protestant Episcopal Church contains sound doctrine for the edification of all Christian people, and we recommend its use in our churches as the ministers shall find it practicable.

To the great regret of your committee, the Rev. Robb White has resigned the office of Evangelist to these people, to take effect July 1st proximo. In noting this fact, your committee desire to place upon record their testimony as to the conspicuous zeal, fidelity and intelligence with which he has discharged his great and important trust.

Your committee do not recommend a continuance of the office of Evangelist. We believe that the time has arrived when our parochial clergy should recognize the fact, that the negroes within their parochial bounds are an integral part of their parochial work, and that such work can no longer be ignored nor neglected. As the Zion Unions are chiefly within the parishes which now cover the counties of Mecklenburg and Brunswick, upon the rectors of the parishes in these counties the responsibility of doing this work must rest. On this account they will need, and must have, help. Your committee, therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint, with the consent of the ecclesiastical authorities thereof, assistant ministers for the parishes in Mecklenburg and Brunswick for special work among the colored people in those parishes.
- 2. Resolved, That the salaries of these assistant ministers be paid by the Diocesan Missionary Committee.
  - 3. Resolved, That in consequence of this extra draft upon the treasury, the Dioce-

san Missionary Committee be instructed to issue an appeal to the Diocese for special contributions to colored missions.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey, from the Committee on New Parishes, made the following Report, which was received, and its resolution adopted.

The Committee on New Parishes, to whom was referred the memorial for the change of the name of Leeds Parish, lying within the limits of Prince William, recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That so much of the original Parish, called "Leeds Parish," as lies within the county of Prince William, and bounded as follows, to wit: on the north by Whittle Parish, on the east by John's and Truro parishes, on the south by Dettingen Parish, and on the West by Cedar Run and Hamilton parishes, be hereafter named and known as "Haymarket" Parish, and shall be entered on the register of parishes in that name.

Mr. J. H. Claiborne presented the report of the Finance Committee, which was approved.

The Finance, Committee beg leave to report that they have examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, and find them correct, and sustained by proper vouchers.

They authorize the Treasurer to pay the salaries of the Bishop, Secretary, Evangelists, Chaplains, and their expenses; \$30 to Assistant Secretary; \$15 to the Sexton, and whatever balance may be due the Diocese of West Virginia.

ings of the Brotherhood at this session be published in the Journal.

The committee, to whom was referred the suggestions of President D. N. Walker, looking to a more effective administration of the Brotherhood, beg leave to submit the following statement and suggestions:

The report of the Board of Trustees for the year ending May 15th, 1881, indicates a fearful lack and loss of interest on the part of our Church-people in this noble charity. The evidence of this lack and loss of interest is seen in the fact that, with two hundred churches in the Diocese, only thirty-two have agents; fifty-five have not a single member, not even the clergyman. In ninety-two not a single lay member. But, more than this, the sum paid to the family of a deceased clergymen, which formerly ranged from \$1,200 to \$1,500, has dwindled to \$700 and \$800 and is growing beautifully less. The membership, which at one time reached eight hundred, has been reduced to something less than four hundred and twenty-five. Under these circumstances, as must be apparent to all, the condition of the Brotherhood is critical, and its very life threatened. To avert so fearful a calamity, your committee, after mature deliberation, would ask you sanction to the following resolutions:

First. That the Board of Trustees be instructed to employ a general agent at such salary as may be necessary to secure a competent man, whose duty it shall be to canvass the Diocese, confer with the parochial authorities as to the appointment of local agents, and to awaken among our people a deeper interest in the cause.

Second. That Article III of the Constitution be so amended as to reduce the mortuary assessment to be collected on the death of a member from \$2.10 to \$1.10.

Finally, and without reducing the same to a resolution, your committee would remark that, so far as the presence of unsuitable persons among our clerical beneficiaries has wrought this present depression in the affairs of the Brotherhood, the evil is one which the Brotherhood in its corporate capacity cannot remedy. The remedy must come from the clerical beneficiaries themselves, and we feel that the evil will be promptly remedied as soon as the attention of these beneficiaries is called thereto. This fund is designed for dependent clergy-

ment, for the widows and orphans of such as are thrown upon the cold charities of the world. It is not designed for any other class. Some clergy die leaving a competency for their families. Others die leaving married daughters or adult sons. Under such circumstances they have no right to the benefits of this organization. They ought to withdraw as beneficiaries, and become contributing members. And this doubtless they will do now that their attention has been called to the inconsistency of their position; and, further, when they are reminded that their continued membership is working injury to the only organization upon which their dependent brethren can lean for succor.

Parish)—that is to say, beginning at a point on the boundary line of Fauquier county, about two miles and one-half mile north of the Virginia Midland railroad, at a point where the Greenwich road crosses Kettle Run; thence northeast to Lanqyher's Mills; thence following the public road eastward, by the way of Wellington station, crossing the Sudley road near to and south of the residence of William B. Wheeler, and passing through the farm of Mr. Frank Lewis, called "Potisi," to Ball's ford on the Bull Run.

# MISCELLANEOUS.

St. Andrew's Rectory, Lawrenceville, Va., April 30th, 1881.

Rt. Rev. Francis M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D.

My Dear Bishop,—I beg leave to submit the following report. After returning from the Council last year, there was a service at the Chapel of the Good Shepherd, when seventy-nine were baptized, ten of them being adults. The Rev. J. H. M. Pollard conducted the service, preached very acceptably and assisted me. This is Mrs. Buford's work.

Having obtained permission of Bishop Lyman, in August, I visited the Churches in North Carolina. I found the children thoroughly drilled in the catechism, the congregations using heartily the general confession, Creed, Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments.

At Boydton, during the same month, I found the school that Mr. Goodwin had conducted so successfully discontinued. I tried to revive it, but was unsuccessful.

At their annual Conference in Boydton, at the same time, Jas. R. Howell was forced to resign, and Rev. Wm. E. Howell elected Bishop in his place. The former then attacked our Church, and endeavored to have the Convention annul the resolutions upon which your letter of welcome was based. He failed.

Resolutions confirming the relations between us were passed over his opposition. They reiterate their confidence in our Church, and desired the same policy as laid down in the letter of welcome to continue.

Six candidates, whom I have already reported to you, desired assistance in prosecuting their studies for the ministry. Eight of their ministers went to the adjacent free schools last year, their expenses

being defrayed. Their improvement in reading is very great. Howell has attempted to ostracize all those who went off to school, by forbidding the Churches to receive them, and by removing them from office. But the people have remained true to them. He refused to abide by the action of the Conference in Boydton, and continuing to exercise the functions of a Bishop, a meeting was called to try him for insubordination. This Conference, after careful deliberation, expelled him from their ministry and from their communion. He still remains insubordinate, and all the Churches, with one or two exceptions, have closed their doors against him, refusing to hear him or be under his authority again.

On account of the severity of the winter the congregations have not been as large as usual.

The majority of their Churches have no stoves. A pile of fagots on a pile of ashes and sand in the centre of the room serves for a heating apparatus, and the smoke, having no chimney, goes where it pleases, and it generally pleases to go in one's eyes. A hole cut in the logs, with a sliding door, serves for a window to let in the light and the cold at the same time. And yet the congregations have come, walking for miles, and have sat and listened and enjoyed the services and the preaching of the Gospel.

The severity of the winter has kept me back only one Sunday; sometimes I have been to the appointments, riding from ten to thirty miles on horseback, only to make my tracks against them in the snow, when the weather was too bad for them to turn out.

As the spring has opened the congregations are again large, always more than the building can contain, showing that their interest is unabated.

I have suffered a great deal from exposure, and this, together with facts already known to you, have induced me to tender my resignation as Evangelist. I would like for it to take effect at the meeting of the Council; but I have been requested by a number of the Zion Unions to remain with them at least until their annual Conference in August, when they think they will be rid of Howell as a disturbing element. I leave you to decide, therefore, when it shall take effect.

In laying down this charge, I am deeply sensible of the things done that I ought not to have done, and left undone that I ought to have done. But I would be untrue to my Master, if I did not record the pleasure, and satisfaction, and comfort, that He has given me in

my work among these humble people, and untrue to them did I not express my regrets at leaving them, and my heartfelt gratitude for the affection and consideration they have always shown me. May the Great Bishop and Shepherd of souls bless them, and grant that we all may be one flock, under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ, our Lord.

# DANVILLE, May 20th, 1881.

The Committee beg leave to say, in connection with the above report, first, that there has been a strange, unaccountable neglect on the part of many Parishes to send in the requisite information to the making out of a full report. Many counties have totally forgotten to report, and within several of the Parishes one or more of the churches have withheld reports. It is not deemed proper to encumber this report with the names of these delinquent Parishes and Churches, the Committee believing that they will be sufficiently conspicuous by their absence, and that a large number, if not all, will be sent in before the publication of the Journal. Furthermore, the committee is pained to see how many Parishes have failed to provide rectories for their Ministers. It is hardly necessary to suggest how important it is that a Minister should be bound to his Parish by a home feeling, and that he should be in all respects one of the community. It is sincerely hoped that every Parish now delinquent in this respect, will, to the best of its ability, and in the shortest possible time, hasten to make up this deficiency by giving to such of their Pastors as may desire it (and there are few, we presume, who do not) a decent, commodious and comfortable house and home. In conclusion, the Committee is happy to be able to report that the deficiencies in the payment of the salaries of Ministers are comparatively few and small. The exact amount cannot be given until the delayed reports have been sent in.
