RULES OF ORDER.

ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterwards stand except to address the chair.

3d. The credentials of Lay Delegates shall be handed to the Secretary, who shall call the names of at least twelve, that the Council may at once proceed to business. The credentials of all the delegates shall then be referred to a committee of two clerical and three lay members, who shall report thereon as speedily as practicable, and if any doubt arise as to the right of any delegate to a seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for their Examination.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of the pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.

- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.
- 4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate
- 5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous questions, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.
- 7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.
- 9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council, or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick, or unable to attend.

- 2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders, who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.
- 3d. No spectator shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church, in which the sessions of the Council are held, are directed to see that this rule is enforced.
- 4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE REVISION OF THE CANONS.

Your Committee, appointed to revise the Canons of this Diocese, and to which was recommitted the report submitted by it to the last session of the Council, begs leave now respectfully to report that in its opinion it is not expedient at this time to do more in the matter of such revision than to adopt certain limited modification of the said Canons as set forth in a series of resolutions herewith returned in lieu of a more extended report; the adoption of which resolutions your committee respectfully recommend.

RESOLUTIONS PROPOSED BY THE COMMITTEE ON THE REVISION OF THE CANONS.

Resolutions adopting two Canons additional to those now in force in the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, repealing Canons one and sixteen, and re-numbering them all.

1. Be it resolved by the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, that the two following Canons be added to those now in force:

FIRST.-OF MISSION CHURCHES.

SEC. I. When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation desire a separate and independent organization, but cannot comply with the requirements of the Canon in regard to the formation of new congregations, they may, until they are so able, proceed to organize a MISSION CHURCH upon the following conditions:

Report of the Committee on the Revision of the Canons.

They must obtain the approval of the vestry of the Parish to which they belonged, and if there be two or more vestries in the Parish they must have the consent of a majority of the same.

They must have the approval of the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese.

They may have their own vestry and officers, whose manner of election and whose duties shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of other vestries, except that they shall have no representation in the Council of the Diocese, and shall not call a minister without the approval of the ecclesiastical authority.

SEC. 2. A list of Mission Churches organized under this Canon shall be furnished to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocese, and shall be published annually in the Journal.

SECOND.—OF CHURCH PROPERTY FOR WHICH THERE ARE NO TRUSTEES.

The Council shall annually elect a Standing Committee, to consist of two Clergymen and three Laymen, whose duty it shall be to claim for and on behalf of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, all property, real and personal, belonging to said Church or any Parish or Congregation thereof, whether said Parish or Congregation has been disbanded or not, as to which there are no duly constituted trustees in whom is vested the legal title thereto.

The said Committee shall use all due diligence, by proper legal steps or otherwise, to secure such property to the use and benefit of the said Church or of the proper Parish or Congregation thereof, and to that end the members of said Committee, or the persons designated by them, are hereby nominated without further action of the Council, to the respective Courts to which said Committee may apply, as the Trustees for any such property so to be claimed by said Committee.

When any such property shall be recovered by said Committee it shall be held by the Trustees appointed, for the use and benefit of this Church, or the Parish or Congregation properly entitled thereto.

- 2. Canon one, entitled "Of trial of a Bishop," and SIXTEEN entitled "Of Candidates for Orders," are hereby repealed.
- 3. The Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, shall hereafter be numbered as follows:
- 1. The canon "Of the Trial of a Clergymen not being a Bishop" shall be canon number one.
- 2. The canon "Of the Proceedings in the Trial of a Laymen, after Expulsion by the Minister from the Holy Communion" shall be canon number two.
- 3. The canon "Of the Transfer of Communicants from one Parish or Church to another" shall be canon number three.

- 4. The canon entitled "Ministers to be careful in admitting to Holy Communion" shall be canon number four.
- 5. The canon entitled "Communicants to have Family Worship" shall be canon number five.
- 6. The canon entitled "The Members of this Church to instruct their families in the Principles of Religion" shall be canon number six.
- 7. The canon entitled "Of the due celebration of Sunday" shall be canon number seven.
- 8. The canon entitled "Election and Duties of Vestries and Wardens," &c., shall be canon number eight.
- 9. The canon entitled "Concerning Exceptions to the foregoing Canon" shall be canon number nine.
- 10. The canon entitled "Of the Division of Parishes" shall be canon number ten.
- 11. The canon entitled "Of the Formation of New Congregations" shall be canon number *eleven*.
- 12. The canon entitled "Of Mission Churches" shall be canon number twelve.
- 13. The canon entitled "Of the Evidence of the Appointment of Lay Delegates to the Council" shall be canon number thirteen.
- 14. The canon entitled "Of the Standing Committee" shall be canon number fourteen.
- 15. The canon entitled "A List to be made of Ministers in this Diocese" shall be canon number fifteen.
- 16. The canon entitled "Respecting the Property of the Church" shall be canon number sixteen.
- 17. The canon entitled "Of Church Property for which there are no Trustees" shall be canon number seventeen.
- 18. The canon entitled "Of Proceedings for the Expenses of the Diocese" shall be canon number eighteen.
- 19. The canon entitled "Offenders to be admonished or expelled from the Lord's Table" shall be canon number nineteen.
- 20. The canon entitled "Concerning altering or adding to the Canons of the Church" shall be canon number twenty.
 - 21. The canon twenty-one shall remain as numbered.
 - 4. These resolutions shall take effect from their passage.

On motion, it was laid upon the table, ordered to be printed, and made the order of the day for to-morrow immediately after the reading of the Bishop's Address.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey moved that the Rev. James Grammer be requested to furnish the Secretary with a copy of his sermon preached

Resolved, That the Diocese of Virginia pray the General Convention to appoint a Committee on Sunday School Hymns, so that a uniform Hymnal, having the approval of the General Church as to doctrine and language, may be within the reach of all our Episcopal Sunday Schools, thus insuring to us a pure form of worship for the children of the Church.

The Bishop then read his Annual Address.

REPORT OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

My DEAR BRETHREN:

Our Eighty-sixth Annual Council assembled on 18th day of May, 1881, in Epiphany Church, Danville, where one had never met before. It was a peculiarly solemn and interesting occasion. The building was consecrated to the worship of Almighty God, Bishop Peterkin of West Virginia, assisting me in the service. The venerable rector of the Parish, Rev. Geo. W. Dame, read the sentence of consecration, and his three sons the Morning Prayer, and the Rev. A. S. Johns, son of our late Bishop, preached the sermon. The church in Danville was planted by its present rector, and the beautiful and spacious church building, with its flourishing congregation and large list of communicants, is a noble monument to the fidelity and success of his labors of more than forty years.

May 22.—In the same church, after sermon by Rev. Dr. Gibson, confirmed twenty-three white and two colored.

May 23.—Grace, Halifax, confirmed five, and the next day in St. John's, eighteen.

May 25.—Confirmed eight in Christ Church, and the day following one white and one colored in St. Luke's.

May 27.—Christ, Charlotte, confirmed two.

May 28.—Grace, twelve. This was a sad day to our people in. Charlotte, being the close of the very acceptable and blessed ministry

of several years amongst them of Rev. L. R. Mason, who had resigned to remove to another Diocese.

June 4.—St. John's, Prince George, confirmed ten.

June 5.—Merchant's Hope, confirmed six, and in the afternoon of the same day, by request of Rev. J.W. Shields, baptized three infants.

June 6.—Brandon Church, confirmed twenty-one.

June 7.—Grace, Surry, confirmed one.

June 8.—In the Methodist church, Bacon's Castle, same county, confirmed twelve, presented by Rev. E. V. Jones, who held regular missionary services at this point.

June 9.—Christ, Smithfield, confirmed five.

June 10.—Preached in the Church of our Saviour, Southampton county.

June 11.—Read prayers, baptized an infant, preached and confirmed four, in the new church at Jerusalem, which was ready for consecration, but there was no minister to assist me in the service.

June 12.—Read prayers, baptized an infant, and preached in St. Andrew's, Sussex.

June 16.—Christ, Charlottesville, confirmed seven.

June 19.—St. John's, Langley, Fairfax county, confirmed two, and in Sharon seven. The services at these churches are conducted by students of the Seminary.

June 20.-In the Seminary chapel confirmed seven.

June 23.—Consecrated the new Seminary chapel. It was a very great pleasure on this interesting occasion to have Bishops Pinkney, of Maryland, and Peterkin, of West Virginia, read the Morning Prayer, and Bishop Lee of Delaware, the ante-Communion Service. Rev. Dr. Nelson read the Sentence of Consecration, and Dr. Packard preached an appropriate sermon. If any fault could be found with this beautiful building it was the want of a stained glass window in its eastern end, to correspond with the window in the chancel. But this defect will soon be remedied by the generous liberality of Bishop Pinkney, who has ordered such a window as I have mentioned to be put in the chapel at a cost of one hundred and fifty dollars.

June 24.—The usual ordination was held in the chapel, when ten persons were made Deacons, and six Deacons advanced to the Priesthood. Professors Nelson and McElhinney presented the candidates and Rev. R. T. Davis, D. D., preached the sermon.

June 26.—In the morning consecrated St. Mark's Church, Richmond, preached, and confirmed eight, Rev. Dr Peterkin and the Rector, Rev. Dr. Dashiell, assisting in the service. At night preached in Christ Church, and confirmed seven. The congregation of St. Mark's was started by its present Rector in what is now St. Philip's colored church, corner of Leigh and St. James' streets, and after a time removed to a building on Fourth street. This building was subsequently taken down and the present permanent one erected, corner of Clay and First streets. The church has prospered from the beginning, under the earnest and efficient ministry of Rev. Dr. Dashiell, until it has become a great power for good in the city.

The month of July was spent in much needed rest, and in preparing for laborious work during the remainder of the summer.

August 7.—Preached morning and night in St. John's, Wytheville, administering the Communion at the former service, and at the latter confirming sixteen white and one colored.

August 9.—Preached morning and night in Christ Church, Marion, Rev. J. J. Lloyd reading the service.

August 10.—In the Methodist Church, Glade Spring, Washington county, preached and confirmed two, presented by Rev. Geo. S. Gibbs.

August 11.-St. Thomas, Abingdon, confirmed eight.

August 12.—Emmanuel, Goodson, confirmed two.

August 13.—Accompanied by Rev. J. J. Lloyd drove forty miles in a spring wagon to Tazewell Courthouse, and the next morning preached in the Methodist church, and confirmed three.

August 15.—Thirty miles to Elk Garden, Russell county, and at night preached in the Methodist Church, and confirmed one.

Tazewell and Russell counties are new fields for our church, where Rev. Mr. Lloyd is laboring as Evangelist, not without encouragement and hope.

August 17.—Preached in the McGill Memorial Church, Pulaski, and confirmed one.

August 18.—Emmanuel, Dublin, baptized the infant daughter of the rector, Rev. J. P. Lawrence, preached and confirmed three.

August 19.—Accompanied Mr. Lawrence twenty-two miles to Pearisburg, Giles county, and at night preached in the Methodist church, and confirmed one.

August 21.—Assisted by Rev. J. J. Lloyd, consecrated St. James',

a very nice church at Central Depot, Montgomery county, and preached; and in the afternoon of the same day preached in St. John's, Pulaski.

August 22.—Preached in Christ church, Blacksburg, after service by Mr. Lloyd.

The two churches in Montgomery, the three in Pulaski, the mission station in Giles, the church in Wytheville and the one in Abingdon are all without ministers. The churches in Montgomery and Wytheville I hope will soon be supplied.

August 24.—By request of our Presbyterian brethren (our building being too small to hold the people) preached in their church in Salem, Roanoke county, and confirmed seven.

August 25.—St. John's, Roanoke, confirmed five.

August 27.—Elon Presbyterian Church, Amherst, read the service and preached.

August 28.—St. Luke's, read the service, preached and confirmed four. This Parish was without a rector.

August 29.—Ascension, Amherst Courthouse, confirmed two, and the next day in St. Mark's, New Glasgow, confirmed two.

August 31.—Bethlehem, Nelson, confirmed one.

September 1.—Preached in Trinity, and the next day preached in Christ Church, and confirmed four.

September 9.—Consecrated St. James Church, Louisa Courthouse, a very comfortable and pretty building, and confirmed two. Rev. Messrs. Weddell and Joyner conducted the service, and Dr. Dashiell preached the sermon. This Church is the fruit of God's blessing on the zealous labors of the then Rector, Rev. James Grammer.

September 10.—Preached in St. Martin's, Hanover.

September 11.—Preached in Fork Church, and the next day in Trinity, and confirmed nine, Rev. Dr. Robert Nelson kindly assisting me in the services, the rectorship being vacant.

September 13.—Christ, Gordonsville, confirmed two.

September 14.—St. Thomas, Orange Courthouse, confirmed eight. September 15.—Emmanuel, Culpeper, after service by Bishop Wilmer, of Alabama, preached and confirmed one, the rectorship being vacant.

September 16.—Confirmed three in St. Stephen's, which has since become vacant.

DEATH.

'I have to report the death of one clerical brother during the past year. Rev. John R. Lee departed this life at Franklin Courthouse, on Easter evening, 8th April, 1882, in the seventy-ninth year of his age, and the thirty-ninth of his ministry. The parochial and other reports show that the faithful labors of ministers and people have not been without God's blessing during the past year. More than one thousand persons confirmed, thirteen Deacons ordained, thirty-five candidates for Priest's orders, six new churches consecrated and eleven Lay Readers licensed, surely proves that the old Diocese is neither dead nor asleep, and that God has not forsaken us or forgotten to be gracious.

While it is gratifying to learn that the salaries promised the clergy have been generally better paid than usual, still the discouraging fact appears, that although seventeen have been added to the number of our ministers, we close the year with a gain of only four, eleven of those lost having removed from the Diocese. No doubt these removals to a certain extent must go on as long as the material condition of the State continues so depressed as compared with that of other parts of the country, and while the laity continue to emigrate in such large numbers. But most of our ministers who leave us are obliged, by the utter insufficiency of their salaries, to go where their

services are more highly valued and better rewarded. If the people could only realize how they would impart heart and strength and efficiency to their pastors, and thus really secure blessings for themselves, by relieving them of their incessant anxiety as to what they and their families shall eat, and what they shall drink, and wherewithal they shall be clothed, there would be, as there ought to be, great improvement in this matter of clerical support.

Most, if not all, of our societies will report an increase in the amount of contributions received. I especially rejoice that this is true of our Diocesan Missionary Society, the first in importance of them all. It is to me simply amazing that this society, upon which the extension, and in a large part of the Diocese, the very life of the Church depends, does not enlist the hearty support of every minister and of all our people. The addition to the society's funds during the past year is entirely due, in my opinion, to the good influence of "Our Diocesan Work," a little paper published by the Executive Committee, and edited by three of its members. Such is my estimate of the value of this publication as a help to the minister, who desires to be helped, in promoting the cause of religion and the interests of the church amongst the people, that I wish it were regularly read by every family in the Diocese.

The Executive Committee have also published an enlarged and greatly improved edition of "The Mission Prayer Book for Church and Sunday School," to which I would call the attention of my clerical brethren, and especially of those who are engaged in missionary work. It contains nearly all the services of the Prayer Book, and the best hymns from the Hymnal, a Sunday School Liturgy with suitable hymns, can be used in any congregation, is in good type, and very cheap.

The reports will show an increase of work amongst the colored people, with much to encourage those engaged in it. Schools are being established and services conducted for their benefit in various parts of the Diocese, and one result is a much larger number of confirmations than I have ever reported before. They are trying in several places to erect houses of worship for their exclusive use, and I trust every such effort will be encouraged and liberally aided by their more highly favored brethren. The Rev. Thomas Spencer has under his instruction, in the Theological School in Petersburg, five

colored men who are looking forward to the ministry, one having been recently ordained Deacon, after passing an examination highly creditable to his teacher and himself. Mr. Spencer's salary is provided by the trustees of the Seminary, but money is needed for the expenses of the students, and I appeal to my brethren to give of their substance to sustain and enlarge this charity. Looking at the question merely as citizens and with reference to this world, the importance to ourselves as well as to them of doing all in our power to bring the colored population under the good moral and religious instruction of our Church cannot, in my judgment, be exaggerated. And those who are earnestly engaged in this work, I am sure, will testify that, all things considered, they have as much to encourage them and as many tokens of God's blessing as they have in their labors amongst our own people.

Rev. J. J. Norwood has been abundant in labors during the past year, conducting protracted services in vacant churches and at mission stations, administering the sacraments, visiting the sick, and performing such other ministerial offices as were needed. Still entertaining the same views of the importance and usefulness of his ministrations which L have repeatedly expressed, I hope the Council will continue him in the work of an Evangelist.

Rev. J. J. Lloyd, after giving two Sundays each month to the church in Bristol-Goodson, devotes the rest of his time as your Evangelist to different missionary points in several counties. While I believe Mr. Lloyd to be as well qualified for his work and as faithful as any man, I am convinced that his field of labor (which is in all respects totally unlike that occupied by Mr. Norwood) is not one in which an Evangelist ought to be employed. Therefore, I cannot conscientiously recommend the renewal of Mr. Lloyd's appointment for another year, but suggest that his work be remitted to the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Our Theological Seminary and High School, continuing to enjoy the favor of both God and man, are in a highly prosperous condition. The Virginia Female Institute, our Diocesan school for girls, under the able management of Mrs. Stuart and her assistants, is steadily securing the confidence of the public and increasing in the number of its pupils. I can, without qualification, cordially recommend it as being, in my judgment, worthy of the patronage of our Church people.

In July, Rev. H. Suter resigned the office of Examining Chaplain for the Diocese, greatly to the regret of his colleagues and the theological students, as well as of myself, and Rev. Beverly D. Tucker was appointed his successor.

It is to be regretted that the interest which was manifested at the last Council in the cause of temperance, and of the Church Temperance Society, does not appear to have continued, and very little seems to have been done throughout the Diocese. Surely the subject has lost none of its importance, and our responsibilities are as great and solemn as ever, and I trust that we may never cease our prayers and efforts until the unspeakable evil of manufacturing, selling and drinking intoxicating liquors is at least banished from the Church, if not from the world.

Whatever may be done with the rest of the report of the Committee on the Revision of the Canons—which I presume will be presented to this Council—it is a matter of great importance that some such canon be adopted as the one which has been proposed in regard to mission churches.

We have no Canon authorizing the organization of a new and independent congregation, except where the people are able to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a minister. But cases frequently occur (and are going to occur more frequently in future) where these conditions cannot be complied with, and yet churches ought to, and will be, organized, if not according to law, then without law. To provide for such cases this Canon was framed, and I respectfully urge the Council to consider and adopt it, or a better one in its place.

I have received from Rev. T. G Dashiell, D. D., the following letter:

RICHMOND, VA., May 10, 1882.

My Dear Bishop:

At various times in the last few years I have occupied myself in compiling a brief summary of the proceedings of our Conventions and Councils from the year 1785 to the present time. The MS. contains a digest of our Diocesan legislation, together with complete lists of the clergy and lay delegates up to the Council of 1881. It has been to me a work of pleasure, and it has occurred to me that if published, it might, for various reasons, be of use to the Diocese. If you and the brethren of the Council think the same, I shall be very glad to present the MS. to the Diocese. Please consider it as in your possession and subject to your control.

I have not examined the MS, which I know our brother has been for years engaged in preparing, and which he now so generously presents to the Council, expecting no pecuniary return whatever. But if the work has been thoroughly and well done—as I doubt not it has been, for its author does thoroughly and well whatever he undertakes—it would make a volume of great interest and value to the ministers and laity of the Diocese, and especially to the younger clergy and theological students. I respectfully recommend that the MS. be accepted and referred to a committee, who shall examine, and, if in their judgment expedient, publish it at the expense of the Council.

I will not detain you longer from the business which has brought us together, and may He, from whom all good things do come, grant to us, that by His holy inspiration we may think those things that are good, and by his merciful guiding may perform the same, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey offered the following:

Resolved, That so much of the Bishop's Address as refers to the manuscript Digest or Compilations of the Journals of the Diocese, prepared by the Rev. Rev. H. M. Jackson brought up the Report on the Contingent Fund, which was laid over from the last Council, and requested leave to withdraw the same, and asked that the committee be discharged.

Leave to withdraw the Report was thereupon granted, and the committee was discharged.

Rev. H. T. Sharp, from the committee on the Episcopal Fund, presented the Report, which was received and referred to the Finance Committee.

The Committee on the Episcopal Fund beg leave to report that they have examined the accounts of the Treasurer, and found them to be correct.

The value of the securities is estimated at \$5,862.

The Committee would make two recommendations:

- 1. That, inasmuch as there is every year a surplus in the receipts from assessments for the contingent fund of the Diocese, the said surplus, either in whole or in part, be annually added to the Episcopal Fund, so as steadily to raise it to the point of an endowment.
- 2. That the money in the hands of the Treasurer be invested either in ground rents or in first mortgages on real estate. The losses heretofore sustained from investments in stocks have induced the Committee to make this second suggestion.

HISTORIOGRAPHER'S REPORT.

TO BISHOP WHITTLE:

My Dear Bishop,—As in duty bound, I respectfully report that, by reason of bodily infirmities, I have only been able to preach three or four times since the last Council. As it respects my other duties, I have written a series of sketches of the historic churches of Virginia, as a contribution to the Centennial History of the American Episcopal Church, which Bishop.

Perry, of Iowa, is preparing, with the co-operation of the Bishops of Pennsylvania, New York and Connecticut. I did not feel at liberty to decline this request, which seemed to me to be within the line of my duty as Historiographer. I have also ready for the press some "Personal Reminiscences and Literary remains of the late eminent Jurist and Historian, the Honorable William Green, LL. D." This was written at the suggestion and request of eminent members of the Richmond Bar, for the Historical Society of Virginia, of which Mr. Green was an honored officer.

The Antique Register of Births, Baptisms and Burials of Charles Parish, in the county of York, to which I have before referred, has been very kindly copied in the office and under the eye of that learned lawyer and accomplished Antiquary, Mr. Conway Robinson, well known not only for his legal lore, but also for many valuable contributions to the History of Virginia; and whose zeal in the last regard has not been abated by his removal to Washington, and his absorbing professional labors. It is hoped that Mr. Robinson will further illustrate his labors of love by enriching this Register with some notes and comments of his own. This venerable document, beginning in 1660, revives the memory of a Parish which has been dropped from our records for half a century, and whose very site is known to but few persons of this generation.

I have also, in connection with the elegant draughtsman, General Thomas H. Williamson, Professor of Architecture, Drawing, Engineering and Geography, in the Virginia Military Institute, made a map of the Diocese, giving the location and bounds of Parishes, and the sites of churches, old and new, so far as they could be found. The map contains also a clergy-list from the beginning of the Church in Virginia, and other statistics.

General Williamson has displayed his talents as an artist by painting on the margin pictures of many Colonial churches, and portraits of some eminent churchmen, English and American. It was impossible for us to personally inspect the sites of churches and bounds of parishes, and unluckily many of them are not of record. I endeavored earnestly and persistently to supplement the lack of information in the records by repeated appeals to the Parishes. Some kindly responded and gave valuable information; but, as in the case of all like appeals, the responses were few and far between. Under such circumstances, it was simply impossible to make a perfect map. It must be borne in mind that this is only an experiment, and the first essay in this direction. As such, it is exhibited for criticism. Members of the Council are invited to inspect it, and to make a note in writing of every error and omission they can find, that the errors may be corrected and the omissions supplied. The truth is that many ministers and laymen do not know the bounds of their own Parishes. Indeed, there are not a few Parishes whose bounds are not known exactly to any person. because there is no known record of them extant.

It will not, perhaps, be regarded as an impertinence if in this connection I take a brief retrospect of the origin and history of Parishes, as they have

descended to us of this generation. It is well known that church lines were conformed to the civil divisions of the Roman Empire, and that it is from that source we derive our church-words-Diocese, Province, and Parish. The term Parish (which is Greek) was first used to designate what we now call a Diocese-that is, the jurisdiction of a Bishop, which was at first a city and its surroundings, and when the latter became too populous to be overseen by the Bishop at the centre Chore-episcopoi, country Bishops or suffragans were set over them. Our Mother Church of England derived this system from the Roman Empire, once dominant in England, and which impressed itself so deeply upon all peoples whom it ruled that traces of it are yet seen and felt in all civilized communities. The word Parish was first used in this large sense in England, and some historians, by not bearing this fact in mind, have fallen into the error of confounding Parishes and Dioceses, as may be seen in Selden. Parishes in the modern sense, defined by Blackstone—"a circuit of ground committed to the care of one parson (persona ecclesiae), vicar, or other minister, having the cure of souls therein"—were of gradual growth. Although Parishes are a recognized element in the British Constitution, and great care is taken to preserve their boundaries and to enforce the rights and duties depending upon them, yet it is curious that their bounds were never defined there by act of Parliament. as ours were in Colonial times by act of Assembly and otherwise. In England, like so many other institutions, they are the result of ancient and immemorial custom; in other words, they exist by common law. The original centres about which the English Parishes were formed, were the old British churches which were found standing, as many of our old colonial churches survived the American Revolution. As new churches were built, generally (at first) by Lords of manors (whence by the way arose lay patronage) these new churches became the centres of new Parishes. So careful were they in England to keep the bounds of Parishes intact and well known, that the minister and some of the substantial parishioners were required by law to "perambulate," that is, walk around the Parish once a year-the minister reminding the people of the curse denounced against those who removed the old land-marks-just as the Vestries in colonial Virginia were required by law to appoint responsible freeholders to "procession" the lands; that is, to go around each planter's land and renew the marks upon the trees every few years. Before the time of Queen Elizabeth, perambulations of parishes were attended with curious ceremonies, such as the carrying of banners, ringing of bells, and like diversions, which led to such abuses that they were forbidden by the "Injunctions" of that Queen. But the perambulations were continued with simple religious ceremonies, ending in service at church. One reason, doubtless, of the strict observance of the law for perambulations was, that the minister's income depended upon the number of tithables within his Parish; so that it was his interest, as well as his duty, to know the bounds of his jurisdiction. In Colonial Virginia, the first settlements, called "Plantations,"

"Hundreds," "Gifts," "Choises," and the like, when they had a minister, were Parishes, and were represented in the House of Burgesses. In 1624. these settlements were formed into eight counties. Within the counties new Parishes were instituted, and new churches built, as fast as the settlers got beyond the reach of the mother Church; it being the policy of the British Government, that the Church should keep company with the people. At first, Parishes were made by the Governor and Council, or General court, as well as by the House of Burgesses, which latter body, as early as 1647, not only empowered, but commanded the county courts to divide their several counties into Parishes without delay (1 Hening). So that the records of each of the foregoing bodies are the sources of intelligence as to the dates and bounds of Parishes. Many of these records have been consumed by time, war, flood and fire. The bounds of most of the Parishes, instituted by the House of Burgesses, are preserved in "Hening's Statutes at Large," but some of the lines cannot now be traced, because the land-marks being ephemeral, such as the names of plantations, roads, and creeks, whose names have been changed, cannot now be recognized. To the year 1776, we have lists of the colonial Parishes. After the union of Church and State had been dissolved, the Episcopal Church was incorporated by the Legislature, and the act of incorporation recognized the colonial parishes and vestries and constituted the latter trustees of such church property as had not been confiscated. And when finally the last State prop was knocked from under the church, and it was left to walk alone, the powers of government and discipline being held to have reverted to the people, they elected vestries, and sent lay as well as clerical deputies to the conventions, which now for the first time had power to make laws for themselves. The parishes which had been created by the colonial House of Burgesses, and been recognized by the Republican Legislature in the act of incorporation, were again recognized by the Protestant Episcopal Church in convention. The new constitution of the church declared that every parish in the Diocese should be entitled to the benefits of this constitution when it shall have sent a lay delegate to the convention. The old parishes were recognized as not being dead, but sleeping, and as soon as they were sufficiently awakened to send a deputy to the convention, they, by that act, were restored to the Statu quo ante bellum, as to their church privileges. So that it would seem to be a work of supererogation for an old parish to ask for re-admission to the Council. The very act of sending a deputy re-instates them.

Such having been the theory and the practice, and there being so many more Parishes than ministers, the question of new Parishes never arose until 1823, when it was suggested by the application of Mr. John Moore to be received as lay deputy from Fall's Church in Fairfax Parish. The petition was denied, upon the ground that Fairfax Parish was represented by the deputies from Alexandria. This was the occasion and the cause of the first canon for the division of Parishes under the new regime. Since that

date many old Parishes have been divided, and many new ones established. And although the canons required that the new Parishes should have express metes and bounds, yet, in many cases, these bounds have not been recorded in the journals, nor otherwise preserved. They cannot, therefore, be exactly ascertained, as, in most cases, those who were personally cognizant of them have passed away. Our legislation has been often very loose, being often extemporized to meet present emergencies, without stopping to consider its connection with the past or its bearing upon other provisions of the Canons. We make certain rights and duties depend upon Parish lines, and yet take no adequate care to keep those lines in memory.

In 1848, the Committee on Canons was instructed to inquire into the expediency of abolishing Parish lines altogether, and they reported unanimously against it, upon the ground that it would cause more evils than it would cure. If we were to do so unhistorical a thing, its effect would be to bring us back under the operation of the General Canons, which provide that in case a Diocese does not define its Parish lines, the Bishop and the Standing Committee may do it; and if they fail to act, the lines shall conform to those of the townships or other civil divisions, when approved by the Bishop. It is presumed that the ecclesiastical authorities would not care to have this responsibility and trouble added to their burdens. The alternative, then, would be the obliteration of Parish lines, leaving every man to do what seemed right in his own eyes, even to the instituting a mission under the very walls of other ministers' churches, and such like things, which would introduce into our orderly Church "confusion worse confounded"; or we must resort to some other legislation to obviate these consequences. If these things be so, it follows that it would be "better to bear the ills we have than flee to others that we know not of."

It only remains that we shall keep up the old landmarks as well as we can. The proposed map is an essay towards that end; and if ministers and people would contribute their personal knowledge and the most reliable traditions in their Parishes, its errors might be corrected and its omissions supplied; and soon we should have a standard authority visible to every man's eyes, and in our Parish perambulations we should no longer walk in darkness.

I would only add that I have recently procured, through the kind offices of the Rev. William B. Lee, the Register of Abingdon Parish, beginning in 1687, which revives the names of the ancestors of many of our old families, and supplies a missing link in our Records.

The thanks of the Council were returned to the Historiographer for his interesting report, and the same was ordered to be printed in the Journal.

The Council resumed consideration of the Standing Committee's Report.

Mr. B. J. Barbour moved the following:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to confer with the Bishop, and then to digest and offer to-morrow the best plan in their opinion for ascertaining the wishes and views of the laity on the subject of the division of this Diocese.

Pending consideration of this resolution, the Council adjourned to meet in the Church at 5 P. M.

5 P. M.

The Council reassembled.

The order of the day being called, the Council went into Committee of the Whole on Diocesan Missions, with Rev. Dr. Hanckel in the Chair.

At 7 P. M., the committee arose, and the Council adjourned.

FRIDAY, May 19.

The Council met at 9 A. M., and was called to order by the Bishop, after prayer by Rev. John J. Gravatt.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Reports of Committees on Disabled Clery Fund-Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Present—Rev. Preston G. Nash, Rev. John A. Wharton, Rev. D. M. Wood.

Rev. Dr. Hains reported the following:

The Committee on the Disabled Clergy Fund beg leave to report that they have examined the annual statement of the Treasurer, and found it sustained by proper vouchers. The Committee is also gratified to find that the contributions to this Fund are nearly fifty per cent. larger this year than they were last year.

C. R. HAINS, Chairman.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the following Report:

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia report this year no material increase of the principal from which their income is derived. Our Treasurer states the amount as \$23,653.71, in bonds above par. One favorable item we are glad to notice. The number of churches contributing to the annual income is larger this year than usual. We have received from sixty-seven congregations a token of their remembrance; and although the amount given (\$700) does not come up to the contribution of 1879—that being \$777—still it is much larger than last year's amount of collections, and is an evidence, we trust, of an increasing interest throughout the Diocese in the important charity committed to our trust. The collections from the churches and the interest upon the bonds have given us this year an income of about \$2,100. Of this the Board has distributed \$1,760 among twelve beneficiaries, and ordered the balance to be judiciously invested.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society respectfully report:

The number of Missionaries aided by the committee during the year has been thirty-three. Of these four, viz: Rev. L. R. Mason, Rev. T. H. Lacy, Rev. E. H. Wellman, and Rev. L. J. Sothoron, have removed to other Dioceses; two, Rev. James Grammer and Rev. C. J. S. Mayo, have taken charge of self-supporting Parishes in other parts of the Diocese of Virginia; and one, Rev. James E. Poindexter, has resigned his stipend because of his Parish giving him a sufficient support. It may be proper also to state here that St. Anne's Parish, Essex county, became self-supporting last year

before the meeting of the Council, and the fact was not noticed in our report, because we had not then received any notification of it ourselves.

The new Missionaries on our list are: Rev. Davis M. Wood, in Charlotte county, in place of Rev. L. R. Mason; Rev. E. Allanson, in Manchester, in place of Rev. T. H. Lacy; Rev. J. H. Chesley, in Hampton and parts adjacent, in place of Rev. C. J. S. Mayo; Rev. John R. Joyner at Stanardsville and Louisa Courthouse; Rev. R. R. Claiborne in Madison; Rev. George Appleton in Stafford; and Rev. J. P. Lawrence in Amherst.

The stipends of these Missionaries range from \$85 to \$350; the average is \$185, and the aggregate \$4,805. They are, as we believe, zealous and efficient, preaching at at least seventy-five different points, half of which are Mission points; and though nearly all are in charge of old and weak Parishes, these Parishes, as the Parochial Reports show, exhibit a growth and an effort at self-support equal to the average of our self-supporting churches. The Executive Committee therefore see no reason to change their place of operations, and believe that in no other way can they accomplish as much good as in that which they are now pursuing.

Resolution from Committee of Whole on Diocesan Missions.

We began the year with a balance of \$1,680 from the McFarland legacy, and this, with certain small sums other than the contributions of the churches added to these contributions, has enabled us so far to meet our engagements without going in debt.

The contributions of the churches have been greater than for the preceding year, but as we have now no legacy to fall back upon, those contributions must be increased for the ensuing year by nearly \$2,000, to enable us to keep our work up to its present standard. But we are anxious to enlarge it. We are anxious to have a Missionary at Goshen and points contiguous to it. There is no Missionary in Caroline and Spotsylvania, where our brother Ward died in harness; none at Ashland and in Hanover, at St. Mary's, Goochland, and other points where there are churches and people. Give us an average of one cent each per Sunday, or fifty-two cents each a year, and as there are at least thirteen thousand communicants, we shall have \$6,760, enough for all our present wants.

May the Lord dispose us all to devise liberal things, and to do what we can to advance his kingdom in the world.

Pending discussion, the Council took recess for Divine service.

Evangelist at Large Appointed.

Mr. B. Johnson Barbour offered the following:

Resolved, That the Rev. Philip Slaughter be and is hereby re-appointed Historiographer of the Diocese of Virginia, with the salary heretofore attached to that office, the Council binding itself to pay all legitimate expenses of the office.

Carried.

Mr. J. L. Williams moved that the subject of the Brotherhood be brought up at 5 o'clock, if the business of the Council will allow.

Carried.

The subject of missionary work in Southwestern Virginia was then taken up.

Mr. Page's substitute was lost.

Mr. G. W. Nelson offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Council has heard with interest the statements of our clergy and lay delegates of Southwestern Virginia, and sympathizes with them in their desire to have our Church extended in that part of our Diocese.

Resolved, That this Council appropriate \$1,000 from the Contingent Fund, to be used by the Bishop to employ the Rev. Frank Stringfellow as the Evangelist at large of the Diocese of Virginia.

Resolved, That we try to raise in the Diocese not less than \$7,000 for Diocesan Missions before the next annual Council.

The resolutions were carried.

The hour for unfinished business having arrived, the Bishop stated in reference to the motion for a conference upon the subject of division that as Bishop of the Diocese he declined at this time to entertain any motion looking toward a division of the Diocese.

Mr. C. M. Blackford presented the report of the Committee on Clerical Support.

Report of Committee on Clerical Support.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CLERICAL SUPPORT.

Your Committee herewith submits a tabulated statement of the churches in default in their obligations to their rectors, from which it will be seen that sixteen are in arrear in a total amount of \$772.10.

Reports from all the churches have not been furnished whether from shame or negligence it does not appear. Still enough are reported to give a fair view of the condition of the Church in the matters for the consideration of which this committee was raised, for out of 168 churches, the names of which appear in the Journal, 138 are reported, representing about ninety of the 105 clergymen who appear by the Journal to have charge of churches.

A careful analysis of the reports give results which are not without encouragement, especially when it is remembered that the past has been a year of unusual agricultural and commercial distress, and that the first retrenchment incident to such distress is prone to discover itself in the subscription to the salary of the minister.

It is pleasaut to know from these reports that out of ninety clergymen reported, sixty-five now reside in comfortable rectories belonging to their respective churches, and that nine others will soon be so; that to these ninety clergymen, compensation amounting to \$68,606 was promised last year, and that the default in such promises amounted to only \$772.10, made good to some extent by an over payment in some instances, the aggregate of such over payments amounting to \$229.25.

It is a cause of congratulation to know that our people so nearly did what they promised, but it is extremely mortifying to note how fearfully small in many instances is the amount promised as compared with the ability to make it larger, and the exultation incident to the show of promptness disclosed by this report should be much tempered by the reflection that the punctuality of which we boast has its origin rather in the smallness of the undertaking, than in the effort made to accomplish it.

The ninety clergymen receive an average annual compensation of \$760, and when it is remembered that twenty of the number receive one-half of the total amount paid, it reduces the average salary of the remaining seventy to \$490, with which they are to support themselves, their wives, their horses, and often, to an untoward extent, their friends and the poor of the parish.

What the average compensation is to the fifteen clergymen whose vestries did not report cannot be told, and it is fortunate perhaps that such is the case.

Your committee has gone into these details because it believes the laity do not fully appreciate how little is done in the direction of proper clerical support, and that improvement would follow were the facts generally known. That such men as the clergy of our Church in Virginia, distinguished as

they are for learning, piety and devotion, should receive such pitiful compensation as disclosed by this report, is a shame and a reproach to the laity, which your committee believes would soon be removed were it brought home to their consideration.

Surely when these facts are known and considered more effort will be made to give greater material support to the clergy, and to remove the caroding cares and distracting anxieties which embitter the lives and fetter the labors of those who not only administer to us in spiritual affairs, but by their tender sympathy in our troubles and our joys, are endeared as the friends of our hearthstones and the companions of our choice

Some of the reports are not complete because they do not cover a period of twelve months, reporting one, two, or three quarters as the case may be. Uniformity in the fiscal year should be secured if possible, and to that end your committee recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolutions, or such other legislation as may be necessary.

Whereas, it is important to the welfare of the Church and of its Ministers that the "Committee on Clerical Support" should be furnished with accurate and complete information in regard to the pecuniary condition of the several churches of the Diocese. Be it

- 1. Resolved, That the Clergy and Vestry are earnestly solicited to be careful that the information necessary for the report of said committee, and for which blanks are furnished by the Secretary, is regularly furnished before each Annual Council.
- 2. That the reports made by each Church shall be of the amount paid to clerical support for the year ending on the 31st of March next preceding the meeting of the Council.
- 3. That the Secretary furnish each Rector and Vestry with a printed copy of these resolutions, and that the blanks supplied the vestries be made to conform to these resolutions.

The report was received, and its resolutions unanimously adopted.

- Mr. T. R. B. Wright called up the subject of the proposed amendment to Canon IX, and asked leave to withdraw that amendment. Leave was granted and the amendment was withdrawn.
- Rev. Dr. Armstrong presented a report from the officers of the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, which was ordered to be printed in the Journal.

The article in our constitution providing for an entrance fee, has been changed recently, and is now fixed at two hundred dollars (\$200) from every inmate, from whatever part of the Diocese she may come.

Rev. Dr. Peterkin presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

We begin this report with the expression of our gratitude to God for the many blessings conferred upon us as a Diocese and as individuals.

From the Bishop's Address, we learn that he has administered the rite of confirmation to larger numbers than usual.

The additions to the communion also have been large, and we regard it as a favorable sign that, as in time past, those who are confirmed come forward, perhaps without exception, to the Lord's Supper.

Then, too, the *contributions* have been large. When we remember how disastrous the drought of last year was, throughout nearly the whole of our territory, we think it remarkable that our people have been moved to devote so much of their means to the advancement of the Church of Christ. The amounts contributed to Diocesan Missions, to the Education Society, to the Society for the relief of Disabled Clergymen, and to the Society for

State of the Church.

the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of deceased clergymen have been considerable, and show that these institutions are growing in favor and increasing in usefulness every year. The "Brotherhood," too, after a season of depression, is in an improving condition and we trust will be able to subserve, more fully, the important object for which it was designed.

Our Theological Seminary is in a healthy condition, and by the blessing of God, is still, as in former years, largely instrumental in promoting the welfare of the Diocese.

The most encouraging signs of spiritual life which we notice, at present, are the liberal contributions of the people, as mentioned above, and the increased interest shown in the promotion of the religious welfare of our colored population. And yet we never shall, in any adequate degree, come up to the full measure of our duty, unless we "know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for our sakes He became poor, that we, through His poverty, might be rich."

However we may be encouraged, we cannot make this report altogether one of congratulation.

We have need to humble ourselves before God, on account of the prevalence of a worldly spirit among many of our church members, and their devotion to objects and pursuits inconsistent with a Christian profession. The sermon preached at the opening of the Council discusses this subject so fully, that we need not enlarge on it in this report. We cannot, however, refrain from saying that Christian people need reproof, quite as often for their extravagance in furniture and dress, and fancy personal decorations, as for their attachment to other vanities of this transitory life. The men waste thousands on mere luxuries, and the women equal sums in jewels and costly apparel.

Woman, who was "last at the Cross, and first at the Sepulchre," ought to know that her chief attraction is the "ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which in the sight of God is of great price"; and to remember that her influence for good is never fully exerted, except when she evidently rises above the mere vanities of the world.

The dangers to which *men* are at this time more particularly exposed arise from the temptations to intemperance and the hastening to grow rich. We speak not now of the ungodly, who may be earthly, sensual and devilish, without bringing any reproach upon the Church. We speak of Christian men, who are set in the midst of many and great dangers, and by reason of the frailty of their nature "cannot always stand upright."

What are called the "drinking usages of society" are more honored in the breach than in the observance; and while we would not dictate to any of our people, we have a right to remind them that *temperance* is one of the cardinal virtues which even the wiser sort of *heathen* have thought essential to an honorable life.

The other temptation mentioned, viz: the haste to be rich, leads to incal-

culable evil, and destroys more fortunes than it builds up. It converts the most important business transactions into mere games of chance, where no commodities are bought or sold, but only a system of *betting* adopted as to the value of such commodities at some future day.

All such operations are not only hazardous but injurious to the character of the individual and to the best interests of society, and we trust that our people will avoid them.

This greed for gain is closely connected with one of the greatest evils which threaten us at this time—the desecration of the Lord's Day. The observance of this day is not a mere ceremonial arrangement. It is directly an observance of moral obligation. One day in itself considered may be no more sacred than any other, but the observance of one day out of seven is required by the *moral law*, and is evidently necessary to sustain the authority of that law.

The clothes we wear have actually no warmth in themselves, but they keep out the cold of winter, and *keep* in the heat of the body, so that we would perish without them.

Now all experience shows that if we do not keep the Lord's Day holy, we can have no security for the maintenance of the authority of the moral law. We would therefore press upon our people the duty of abstaining from travel and from all secular occupations on this sacred day, believing that thus only can they promote the interests of true religion and the prosperity of the Church,

In thinking of the future extension of our Church, it occurs to us to remind our vestries that (except in towns where there are several churches) they are the vestries of *Parishes* and not simply of congregations. It follows that their responsibilities are coterminous with their Parish limits. If, therefore, their Rectors can make appointments, and find preaching places anywhere within their bounds, the vestries should be glad to facilitate such labors, even though their ministers' efforts be occasionally withdrawn from their regular congregations. The seed of Divine truth will thus be more widely sown, and the harvest be correspondingly more abundant.

The Committee on the Brotherhood would report that they have examined the accounts and papers submitted to them. The report of the General Agent proves that accessions have been made to the number of members during the year, and the Committee would urge the clergy and laity to give him their cooperation. We ask the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Council the Brotherhood of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in this Diocese, has shown itself to be a highly meritorious institution, and its claims to the support of the laity are hereby reaffirmed.

The Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School beg leave to report to the Council as follows:

The Theological Seminary and High School enjoys a degree of material

prosperity, evidenced by the Treasurer's report, which shows an increase in its vested funds to the amount of \$16,000, and an increase of annual interest to the amount of about \$1,000. And we recognize gratefully the Divine blessing which has rested on both institutions. The students of the Seminary, numbering forty in all, have, in health and peaceful comfort, pursued the regular course of study, having the benefit of the reverend Professors' instructions and pious training for the ministerial work, whilst into the High School a larger number of pupils than ever have been gathered, and by their diligence and general good behavior have given satisfaction to the principal of the school and his efficient and accomplished instructors. The reports of the Professors are herewith appended, and also Professor Spencer's report of his instruction of the colored students in Petersburg.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF BIBLICAL LEARNING.

I would respectfully report to the Trustees that the Senior Class under my instruction has read the Book of Josiah, and selected chapters in Isaiah in the original; and has studied critically in the Greek language the Epistle to the Galatians, and the two Epistles to the Corinthians.

The Middle Class has read the Prophecies of Christ and a number of the Psalms in the Hebrew language, and the Epistles to the Romans and to the Hebrews in the Greek language.

The Junior Class has been drilled in the Hebrew Grammar by written exercises, and has read about the usual amount of text. They have finished the Gospel of John in the Greek, and have written essays on the most important and difficult subjects in the Gospels.

A monthly report has been made to me by the teachers of the Preparatory Department, from which I learn that their students have been diligent and successful in their studies.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

To the Board of Trustees
of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

I would respectfully report, that the classes during the current year have pursued the usual course of study, varied, in certain respects, as to manner in this or in previous sessions, to meet demands of prevalent thought and the necessities of succeeding classes.

The Senior Class reciting three times a week, with the Wednesday evening exercise, have, with the usual text-books and references, studied the Thirty-nine Articles. They have also in Natural Theology studied Hopkins's "Outline Man," and in Homilectics Dr. Broadus's book, with exercises and criticisms upon composition and delivery of sermons. My usual

course of lectures on Liturgies, with accompanying questions, is now going on.

The Middle Class, reciting daily for most of the session, have studied Knapp's Theology with written essays upon subjects of study. Since the first of April a part of each week has been given by this class to the critical examination of the Revised New Testament.

The Junior Class, reciting once a week, have studied Chadbourne's Natural Theology, and are now prepared for examination.

I am glad to report very commendable diligence and regularity in my classes. Absences, when taking place, have been through sickness or for excusable causes.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF CHURCH HISTORY.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Church History, Canon Law and Pastoral Theology presents the following report for the current session:

The Senior Class has studied, with four recitations a week, the History of the Church of England and of the American Church, in text-books, supplemented by written lectures, Hooker's Ecclesiastical Polity, Book I, the Constitution and Canons of the Church, the Pastoral Epistles in Greek, and Meade on the Pastoral Office.

The Middle Class, with three weekly recitations and regular essays, has studied Kurtz's Church History, illustrated by an extensive course of parallel reading.

The Junior Class, with four weekly recitations and three essays a week,

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has studied Dr. Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and read the Acts of the Apostles in Greek.

From constant inspection of the preparatory department, he would also state that though the number of its students has been diminished from causes which need not now be mentioned, yet most satisfactory progress continues to be made under well trained and efficient teachers.

REPORT OF INSTRUCTOR OF THEOLOGY IN BRANCH SCHOOL, PETERSBURG.

To the Board of Trustees, of the Theological Seminary:

As instructor of the colored theological students in Petersburg, I beg leave to present the following report:

From the 1st of October, to the 1oth of March, Mr. James S. Russell was under my instruction in Systematic Divinity, Greek Testament, Church Polity, and the Prayer Book, with daily recitations. Having passed his examinations, he was ordained Deacon, and removed to Lawrenceville.

From the 1st of October to the present time, the Rev. J. H. M. Pollard has recited to me twice a week on the Greek Testament and Systematic Divinity, Boultbee on the Articles being used as a text-book,

From the middle of January to the present time, the five new students from the Zion Union connection—Messrs. Taylor, Harrison, Washington, Carroll, and Brown—have been instructed in the Prayer Book, Shinn's Manual being used as a text-book. This instruction has been necessarily of a most elementary character, as the minds of the students permitted of no other.

The deportment and religious character of all the students has been, so far as I can judge, most exemplary; the progress of the latter five in their studies has been slow and discouraging. Their instructor will require patience in his work, but he is hopeful of its good result.

The school has for the first time been quite full throughout the session. * * * The health of the school has never in my time been so good. We have enjoyed entire exemption from epidemics, and have had but a single case of serious sickness. * * * All . the religious privileges and observances of the school have remained as before, including attendance Sunday morning at the Seminary chapel. The Rev. Drs. Walker and Nelson have occasionally on Sunday nights preached for us in the school chapel, where they find always attentive hearers. Besides this, Dr. Nelson has held (with better attendance than ever before) the weekly service here in Lent which he has always given us; and has inaugurated monthly meetings with our student communicants. The Friday night services have been kept up with interest and profit by Mr. B. M. Randolph, of the Senior Class of the Seminary, aided by Mr. W. L. Gravatt, of the Junior Class. To both these gentlemen and to the clergymen mentioned above, my warmest thanks are due. * * * An affectionate observance of the holy days and seasons of the church continues to be an essential feature of our system. The number of communicants among the boys is twenty-four.

The Council met at 9 A. M. and was called to order by the Bishop, after prayer by Rev. H. L. Derby.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Report of Committee on Finance.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey presented the report of the Committee on Finance:

The Committee on Finance respectfully report that they have examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, and find them correct and sustained by proper vouchers. The Treasurer on the 17th of February, 1882, paid sixty-five dollars on account of the traveling expenses of the Evangelist, out of the unexpended appropriation for the preceding year. This was done with the approval of the Bishop, and your committee recommend that the same be sanctioned.

The committee recommend, that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the salaries of the Bishop, Secretary, Evangelists, Chaplains, Historiographer, and their expenses, and the further sums of thirty dollars to the Assistant Secretary and fifteen dollars to the sexton of Christ Church, Norfolk.

The report of the Treasurer shows that there was on the 1st day of May, a balance to his credit of \$2,389.47 in the State Bank of Virginia, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent.

Your committee recommend that, for the present, said balance remain at interest in bank.

Your committee further recommend, that no part of the contingent fund be, at this time, transferred to the Committee on "the Episcopal Fund"; and therefore that the first recommendation of the report of the Committee on the Episcopal Fund, which has been referred to the committee, be not adopted.

Your committee further recommend, that John L. Bacon, John L. Williams, and Thomas Potts be, and they are hereby, appointed a committee to prepare and report to the Council, at its next session a well digested plan for the accumulation and proper investment of an Episcopal Endowment Fund, to consist of the securities in which the Episcopal Fund to the amount of \$5,862 is now invested (if such securities be approved by them), and, of any surplus of the Contingent Fund which may from year to year be transferred to such Endowment Fund: and that as soon as practicable, they procure the incorporation of a company for the purpose of managing and preserving said Fund—said company to consist of members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in this Diocese, with power to fill vacancies in the Board of Trustees, upon nominations by this Council, as is the case in respect to Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute.

Report of the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE VIRGINIA FEMALE INSTITUTE.

The Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute respectfully report to the Council that they have received from the Board of Directors and from Mrs. Stuart, the Principal of the Institute, their annual reports, from which the trustees derive the gratifying information that the number of pupils is steadily increasing, the increase during the present session, as compared with the last, being fifty per cent.; and what is very gratifying to the trustees, that there has been a marked improvement in the patronage of this Diocesan school by churchmen in Virginia.

The trustees take pleasure in copying from the report of the Board of Directors the following extract, which they believe contains just views of the present condition of the Institute. The Board state "that the admirable and competent corps of teachers under the direction of Mrs. Stuart as the Principal, the judicious training of the pupils, the high standard of scholarship, the discipline of the Institution, tempered as it is by loving care and maternal affection, the sanitary regulations, and the daily enjoyment by the pupils of calisthenics and other exercises, resulting in wonderful exemption from sickness, the freedom and security of the girls from outside and disturbing influences, the uniform restraint upon extravagance in dress and other expenditures, the deportment of the pupils, unexceptionable at all times, and signally marked by refinement and lady-like propriety, and, above all, the tone of Christian influence and principle which pervades every department, together entitle the Virginia Female Institute and its administration under Mrs. Stuart to the unreserved confidence and the active and earnest support of the clergy and laity of the Diocese, and it is sincerely hoped that it will hereafter receive the abundant patronage which it so justly deserves." Seven of the pupils were confirmed by the Bishop at his last visitation, and seventeen earnest communicants of the Church, mingling with the other pupils, cooperate with their teachers in maintaining in the Institute the high standard of scholarship, duty and Christian character for which it is distinguished, and so when they go forth into active life will these young Christians become centres of holy influences and helpers in building up our Church wherever their homes may be. Well, therefore, may we cherish this school as a nursery of the Church.

The trustees beg to remind the clergy of the Diocese that whilst the customary charges at the Institute are as moderate as those of any other institution of like educational advantages in the State, clergymen's daughters are now received at reduced rates; and that just in proportion as the patronage of the school shall increase will these rates be reduced more and more, until, as the trustees hope, the burden of the education of clergymen's daughters in Virginia will become light and inappreciable. On the grounds, then, of intrinsic merit in the school itself, and of the prospective advantages and blessings destined to flow from its property, the trustees com-

mend it to the interest and favor of all laymen and clergymen in the Diocese.

Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia have received with gratification the report of the trustees of the Virginia Female Institute, in which they inform the Council of the increase in numbers and usefulness of this Institution under the admirable management of Mrs. J. E. B. Stuart, its Principal, and commend it not only as an educational institution unsurpassed by any, but as the nursery of the Church in this Diocese, which it is the duty and interest of all to sustain. The Council do therefore most earnestly commend this, the Diocesan Female School of Virginia, to the confidence and liberal patronage of the clergy and laity of the Diocese.

Rev. Dr. Weddell, from the Committee on that part of the Bishop's Address relating to work among the colored people of this Diocese, presented the Report, which was received and approved.

REPORT ON DIOCESAN COLORED WORK.

The Committee to whom was referred so much of the Bishop's Report as relates to colored work of the Diocese of Virginia, would most cordially respond to the very earnest sentiments contained therein. The evangelization of these seven hundred thousand colored people, which a mysterious Providence has planted within our Diocesan borders, is a matter of supreme importance. That this importance is being realized by our clergy and people, can no longer be questioned. The work, albeit in its day of small things, is growing; and this growth will no doubt receive a marked impetus from the stirring words which, during the present Council, have fallen from the lips of our Virginia-born and Virginia-trained colored clergy.

An examination of the parochial and other reports, in possession of the Secretary, furnishes some interesting statistics:

We have three colored church-buildings. We have on our list three colored clergymen. We have four clergymen who are giving their entire time to the colored work; while a large number of the clergy, in charge of white congregations, are providing regular services for this race. Sunday Schools, numbering 1,500 scholars, are in successful operation in the various Parishes. During the past year the Bishop has confirmed eighty-two candidates; our clergy have baptized six adults and fifty infants, married seventy-eight couples, and officiated at twenty-nine funerals. The number of communicants, as reported, is 212. Nearly \$2,000 has been raised within the Diocese for the support of this work.

In addition to these facts we are glad to report sundry parochial day

schools, to-wit: St. Stephen's Normal, at Petersburg; St. Phillip's, at Richmond; the school at Gordonsville, under Mrs. Brent; at Lexington, under Miss Pendleton; in Powhatan, under Miss Wesson; in Halifax, under Mrs. Miles; in Charlotte, under Mrs. Burgwyn, and in Lunenburg, under Mrs. Jennings.

In several of the parishes sewing schools are reported as doing a helpful work.

At Petersburg, in connection with St. Stephen's Church, a theological department was established some few years since by the authorities of the Virginia Seminary, and placed in charge of the Rev. Prof. Thomas Spencer. The establishment of this "school of the prophets" solves the problem of an educated colored ministry. One hundred dollars will suffice to meet all necessary expenses of a student. Six students have pursued their studies in this institution during the past year. One has been ordained—five remain. For the support of these five, as well as the support of others who are expected to enter the next session, there is none other reliance but the voluntary offerings of the people. We earnestly commend this cause to the special attention of our parochial clergy.

In conclusion—while frankly confessing that the Diocese of Virginia has not measured up to the full standard of its duty, we rejoice to find in the facts as herein given, assurance that this important department is by no means ignored nor neglected.

Rev. R. A. Goodwin moved the following:

Resolved, That a copy of the Report just offered be forwarded severally to the Spirit of Missions, the Southern Churchman, and the New York Churchman.

Carried.

Rev. Dr. Gibson, from the Committee on Sunday Schools, reported that his committee was not ready to report at this time, and asked leave to hold over to next Council.

The request was granted.

Mr. R. E. Withers offered the following:

Resolved, That a committee of three clergymen and three laymen, with the Bishop as chairman, be appointed, whose duty shall be to examine the whole question of Diocesan division, and report to the next Council whether the claim of the Bishop to the exclusive right of initiating any movement looking to a division of the Diocese is authorized or sanctioned by the Constitution or Canons of this Church.

Carried.

Resolutions.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel moved that the Council elect the committee by ballot.

Carried.

Rev. J. B. Newton moved to reconsider the whole subject.

The motion to reconsider was lost.

The Council then proceeded to ballot for the committee. Rev. D. M. Wood and Mr. H. Shepperd were appointed tellers. They reported the following committee elected:

The Secretary pesented an invitation from the President of the Norfolk and Ocean View Railroad to the members of the Council to visit Ocean View, which invitation was accepted with the thanks of the Council.

Rev. Dr. Weddell moved the following:

Resolved, That the Committee on Colored Congregations and on Zion Union Work, be disbanded, and their work transferred to the Executive Committee on the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Carried.

Rev. Thos. Spencer moved the following:

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society shall prepare and present to next Council a tabulated statement of all the work carried on among the colored people in this Diocese, and the sources to which that work looks for its support.

Carried.

Rev. Dr. Weddell moved the following:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to have printed and distributed 3,000 copies of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

Carried.

On motion, three of the Indian pupils from the Hampton Institute

Adjournment.

were introduced by the Rev. J. J. Gravatt, and the Council listened to addresses by them.

On motion of Mr. L. M. Blackford, the thanks of the Council were returned to Rev. J. J. Gravatt and the Indian scholars.

Rev. Dr. Robert Nelson, by request, addressed the Council upon the subject of Missions in China.

The Council united in singing the 315th hymn-

"Blest be the tie that binds."

Prayer was offered by the Bishop, and the Council adjourned sine -die.

MEXICO CITY, MEX., May 1, 1882.

The Rt. Rev. Francis M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D.:

My Dear Bishop:—I avail myself of a few moments' leisure to write to you to submit my third report of my work done in your diocese during the past year.

Since the date of my last, I have conducted joint services for the benefit of my deaf-mute brethren in Richmond, Manchester, Petersburg, Fredericksburg, Alexandria, Culpeper, Wytheville, Lynchburg, Concord, Danville, Salem, Roanoke county, Virginia, besides officiating in twenty seven States and the District of Columbia. I have visited twenty one deaf and dumb institutions. I need not say that I have slept on the trains about two thirds of the time. I thank our Heavenly Father for guiding and watching over me in all my labors for our best Master on high and the extension of his kingdom on the earth, especially among my deaf-mute brethren.

I did not come to this tropical country of myself. It was conscience that kept telling me several months to visit Mexico in order to enquire into the condition of these, the Mexican mutes, and see what was being done for their benefit, and I could not resist its force. I feel easier and happier, for I have obeyed it. I am able to say that God has blessed my object with success. I have met quite a number of deaf-mutes in this city, and spoken to them about our Saviour.

There are only two deaf-mute institutions in the Republic of Mexico, one in this city, and the other at Zecatecas. Both the schools are supported by the government. Before I set foot on this ancient soil, we, the teachers of the deaf-mutes in the United States, had never heard anything about them. I am told that there are many, many ignorant mutes in the Northern and Western parts of this Republic. Let us drop the subject for the present.

Bishop Riley is doing a grand work in his Mexican diocese and is the right man in the right place. I need not say anything of his work, as I believe you have already heard of it in full. I expect to reach New Orleans about the 15th inst., and must work in some of the Western States for some time, on which account, it will be impossible for me to attend your Council at Norfolk.
