## RULES OF ORDER.

### ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand except to address the chair.

3d. The credentials of Lay Delegates shall be handed to the Secretary, who shall call the names of at least twelve, that the Council may at once proceed to business. The credentials of all the delegates shall then be referred to a committee of two clerical and three lay members, who shall report thereon as speedily as practicable, and if any doubt arise as to the right of any delegate to a seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for their Examination.

## ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

## Rules of Order.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Elections.

A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

A Committee on Sunday Schools.

## ORDER OF DEBATE.

1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.

2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

## GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectators shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

## My DEAR BISHOP:

Having past my threescore years and sixteen, and having no ambition to play the part of the "veteran lingering on the stage," and as I see by the Treasurer's report in the newspaper that the revenue of the Diocese has fallen short of the expenses, it seems to be an opportune time for my retirement in accordance with the settled usage of civil officers, founded upon experience. I desire to return thanks and to express my high appreciation of the honor done me by the Council in conferring upon me, in my absence, without my solicitation or even knowledge of their purpose, the office of Historiographer of the Diocese. I have tried as best I could to do its duties, under the burden of age and of many infirmities, but am

painfully conscious of having fallen far short of my conception of them. The burden of answering queries from nearly every State in the Union, and from abroad, is far heavier than one would think. ## REPORT OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

## REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN:

The first Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Virginia after the Revolution met in this city of Richmond, under the presidency of the Reverend afterwards Bishop, James Madison, May 18th, 1785, just one hundred years ago. No Convention was held in several of the subsequent years, and hence, we are now assembled in our ninetieth annual Council, or Convention, but in the one hundredth year of the organization of the Church in the Diocese. A committee, appointed by the last Council, having made ample ar-

rangements for the proper celebration of this interesting and important Centennial, I will not detain you with any thoughts on the subject but proceed to give an account of my stewardship during the past year, and to lay before you such information in regard to the state of the Diocese as is required by the canons.

1884.

May 25.—I confirmed two persons in the morning in Christ Church, Winchester, and at night preached the sermon at the closing service in connection with the Council.

May 28.—Read morning prayer and preached in Calvary Church, Dinwiddie C. H., which, for several years, has been without a rector, May 29.—In Sapony Church, confirmed two.

May 30.—Trinity, Brunswick, preached, confirmed five and administered the Lord's Supper, assisted by Rev. E. B. Jones.

May 31.—Mercy Seat, a church kindly loaned us for the occasion, preached to a large colored congregation, confirmed twenty-five and celebrated the Lord's Supper. This is one of three prosperous missions, two in Brunswick and one in Mecklenburg, faithfully conducted by Rev. James S. Russell. He is building a church at this place, which is greatly needed, and is in want of funds to complete it. His work is cordially commended to any one who may wish to contribute to a good and deserving object.

June 1.—In the morning confirmed two in St. Andrew's Church, Lawrenceville, which, with Trinity, in the same Parish, has long been without a rector. In the afternoon, in St. Paul's colored church, confirmed twenty-nine, and the next morning visited the large and well-conducted parish school of the same church and gave the children a very satisfactory examination in their religious and other studies. Mr. Russell commenced work at this point about three years ago and has now a neat and comfortable frame church with a good congregation, a commodious and suitably arranged school building, with two teachers and between fifty and a hundred pupils, and a large lot of ground on which he proposes to build a rectory as soon as kind friends will give him the money.

June 3.—Visited Christ, and the next day Grace Church, Greensville county, and in the latter confirmed three.

June 8.—Preached and celebrated the Lord's Supper in St. John's, Lunenburg, assisted by Rev. E. B. Jones, Deacon in charge. In the

afternoon of the same day went to Trinity Chapel (colored), where thirteen were confirmed. This is a mission school which was started and has been carried on for several years by Mrs. M. M. Jennings and one assistant. Services are held in the chapel on one Sunday in each month by Rev. Mr. Cain, of Richmond, and occasionally by Rev. E. B. Jones, as his other duties will permit. Since the work was commenced twenty-seven persons have been confirmed.

June 14.—In Elon (Presbyterian) Church, Amherst county, confirmed one, and the next day, in St. Luke's, twelve.

June 16.—Ordained Rev. Wm. T. Roberts, Presbyter, in St. Paul's Church, Petersburg, Rev. Messrs. Gibson, Hains and Shackelford assisting in the service.

June 22.—St. John's Langley, Fairfax county, one of the churches served by students from the Seminary, confirmed three, and in the afternoon in Falls Church, eleven.

June 19-27.—Was engaged in duties at the Theological Seminary and on the last day admitted thirteen candidates to Deacon's orders.

June 28.—Gray's Chapel, Stafford county, confirmed seven and the next day, in Aquia Church, confirmed nineteen.

August 17.—Assisted by Rev. Messrs. Jno. A. Wharton and Dennis consecrated St. John's Church, Pulaski county, and confirmed two, and at night preached in St. James, Central Depot, Montgomery county. This latter church, then vacant, is now in charge of Rev. J. E. Hammond.

August 19.—Preached in McGill Memorial Church, Pulaski county.

August 20.—St. John's, Wytheville, confirmed ten.

August 21.—Services in Christ Church, Marion.

August 22.—Grace, Glade Spring, Washington county, confirmed three.

August 23.—Services in Emmanuel Church, Goodson.

August 24.—Preached morning and night in St. Thomas, Abingdon, and confirmed seven, one colored.

August 26.—Methodist Church, Tazewell C. H., confirmed twelve. Rev. Mr. Dennis is much encouraged at this point and at Pocahontas, a mining town in the same county. He hopes soon to have a church building at each place, which is, of course, indispensable to the success of his mission and will be glad of any pecuniary assistance that may be given him.

August 28.—Assisted by Rev. Messrs. A. S. Lloyd and Forsyth in St. Luke's Church, Nottoway, advanced Rev. N. F. Marshall to the Priesthood.

September 3.—Christ Church, Warm Springs, Bath county, confirmed six.

September 5.—Lowmoor Furnace, Alleghany county, confirmed one.

September 7.—St. Luke's, Goshen, Rockbridge county, confirmed three. These last three points, then in charge of Rev. David May, are now vacant.

September 11.—Visited Old Church, Mecklenburg.

September 12.—St. James, Boydton, and confirmed eight.

September 13.—Services in St. Andrew's, vacant.

September 14.—St. Mark's (colored), preached, confirmed seventy-four and celebrated the Lord's Supper. This is the third mission in charge of Rev. J. S. Russell, and being some thirty miles from Lawrenceville, where he lives, he can visit it but once a month. The congregation is a large one. They came to us from the "Zion Union" people and brought their plain, unfinished, frame church building with them.

September 15.—Services in Grace Church which is without a minister.

September 16.—Preached in St. Luke's, Mecklenburg. We have seven white churches in this large county and only one minister, Rev. Mr. Rose, who went as a Deacon from the Seminary last year.

September 28.—Church of our Saviour, Hanover county, confirmed nine.

September 29.—Trinity, confirmed one.

September 30.—Emmanuel, Albemarle (now vacant), confirmed three.

October 1.—Was at Trinity, in the same county.

October 2.—Confirmed two in Christ Church, Albemarle; and the next day one, in St. John's, Scottsville.

October 5.—St. Mark's, Fincastle, confirmed four.

October 7.—St. Peter's, Curdsville, confirmed five.

October 16.—Christ, Mathews, confirmed two.

October 17.—Trinity, Mathews, confirmed three.

October 18.—Abingdon, Gloucester, confirmed two

October 19.-Ware, Gloucester, confirmed seven.

October 29.—Trinity, Buchanan, confirmed thirteen.

November 1.—Preached at Dover Mill, Goochland; and the next day in Grace Church, at the Courthouse, and confirmed four. A new church, then nearly finished, has since been completed at the first mentioned place, and is ready to be consecrated.

November 16.—In Christ Church, a new building at Amelia C. H., then not quite finished, but now awaiting consecration, confirmed twelve; and the same afternoon, in Grub Hill, confirmed two.

November 25.—St. Luke's, Nottoway, confirmed eight; and the next day, in Grace Church, at the Courthouse, confirmed three.

December 7.—Sickness in my family, prevented me from meeting appointments at Franklin and Jerusalem, Southampton county.

1885, January 4.—In St. James', Richmond, assisted by Rev. Dr. Peterkin and Rev. Mr. Nash, ordained Rev. Edwin B. Jones, M. D., Presbyter.

March 6.—Christ Church, Charlottesville, confirmed twenty.

March 8.—Grace Memorial, Lexington, confirmed twenty-one.

March 9.—Emmanuel, Harrisonburg, confirmed thirteen.

March 10.—Trinity, Staunton, confirmed thirty-five; and the next morning advanced Rev. G. M. Murray to the Priesthood, assisted by Rev. W. Q. Hullihen and Rev. C. H. Sheild, D. D., who preached the sermon.

March 15.—Confirmed fourteen in St. George's, Fredericksburg; and in Trinity, ten.

March 16.—Christ Church, Spotsylvania C. H., confirmed seven; and in St. George's Chapel, three.

March 20.—Grace, Petersburg, confirmed thirty-eight.

March 22.—Confirmed in St. John's, four; St. Paul's, forty-four; and St. Stephen's (colored) forty.

March 24.—Christ, Richmond, confirmed twenty-three.

March 25.-Monumental, Richmond, confirmed twenty-nine.

March 26.—St. John's, Richmond, confirmed twelve.

March 28.—St. Luke's, Norfolk, confirmed ten.

March 29.—St. Paul's Chapel, Berkley, confirmed four; and at night preached to a colored congregation in Norfolk, in charge of Rev. J. H. M. Pollard, and confirmed seventeen. Two days later visited the industrial school for girls belonging to this mission, and saw more than forty pupils being taught sewing and various other handicrafts by which they may make a living for themselves after

finishing their education. Mr. Pollard, under very unfavorable circumstances, has much to encourage him, but he must have a church building and the means to pay at least two teachers to make his mission a success.

March 30.—Preached in the Chapel, Princess Anne county; and the next day in Emmanuel Church, and confirmed three.

April 1.—Confirmed in St. Paul's, Norfolk, eleven; and in Christ Church, twenty-one.

April 2.—Trinity, Portsmouth, confirmed nine; and in St. John's, five.

April 3.—St. Paul's, Richmond, confirmed thirty-two.

April 5.—Meade Memorial, Manchester, ten; and St. Philip's (colored), Richmond, seven.

April 8.—St. James, Ashland, confirmed five.

It will be seen from the preceding report that there has been a large increase in the number of colored persons confirmed during the past year. There really appears to be hardly any limit to the work we might do amongst this people, if we only had a sufficient supply of men and money. And the former are likely to be forthcoming before the latter. One of the students in the Theological School, in Petersburg, having died the present session, the number now under instruction by Rev. Mr. Spencer is fourteen, seven of whom are candidates for Deacon's orders. I refer to Mr. Spencer's report to the trustees of the Seminary for further information in regard to the important work in which he is engaged.

Bishop's Report.

The last Legislature of the State incorporated "The Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School in Virginia," as is declared "for the purpose of educating colored persons for the ministry of the Protestant Episcopal Church, or for any secular business." The trustees have held but one meeting for the purpose of organizing and accepting the charter, but it is believed that a liberal friend of the colored people will soon present them with a building and ground to start the school, and then, I trust, the money will not be wanting to carry it on.

Daily observation and experience confirm me more and more in the conviction that this negro question in our church is going to be a very difficult and serious one, and that the only solution of it is to be found in the plan adopted by other churches around us, of forming our colored brethren into a separate organization. In this conclusion, I believe a large majority of our Clergy and Laity, white and black, agree with me, and if this be so, I hope we will agitate the question until the General Convention can be induced to take it up and adopt the necessary legislation.

I have received from the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, to be presented to the Council, the volume which I hold in my hand, and which is a copy of the official "notification to the Dioceses of the alterations and additions in the Book of Common Prayer of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, proposed in the General Convention of 1883, and to be acted upon at the General Convention of 1886."

A committee, of which I am chairman, was appointed by the last Council to report on these proposed changes to the one now in session, but of course we could do nothing until we were informed what were the contemplated "alterations and additions," and as this "notification" of them was not received until some ten or twelve days ago—too late to examine and consider them—the committee was never called together. For my own part, I have been from the first utterly opposed to this whole movement for the so-called "enrichment" of our Prayer Book, which is already rich enough in everything that is good and desirable, if clergy and people would only make a right use of it. No doubt improvements can be made and have been suggested, but, on the whole, the old book appears to me to be far better than the proposed new one. At a time like the present, when there is everywhere so much rest-

lessness and lawlessness and love of change, we are not well qualified to accomplish so great and important a work. But whatever may be our views and feelings in regard to a revision of the Prayer Book, the time is now too short. It will be simply impossible for our next Council to give anything like a proper consideration to the many proposed changes, and I therefore respectfully suggest whether it will not be best to instruct our deputies to the next General Convention to vote against them all. It is much easier to make mistakes than to correct them after they have been made, and it is far wiser and safer to continue to endure evils and imperfections in our liturgy—if there be any—which we have always endured, than to entail upon ourselves others and worse ones by hasty and inconsiderate legislation.

The parochial and other reports will show that most of the parishes and the various institutions of the Diocese are in a healthy condition. Improvement might no doubt be made in many things, but we have abundant cause to be thankful for the past and hopeful for the future. A large amount of work has been done by as faithful and earnest a body of Clergy and Laity as I believe is anywhere to be found, and God has not withheld His blessing, as may be seen in such fruits as the large number of persons confirmed, the many new churches built, the list of young men seeking admission into the ministry, the roll of Sunday School teachers and scholars, and the amount contributed to various religious and benevolent objects.

The earnest effort to raise the sum of ten thousand dollars for the most important work of Diocesan missions, to which we pledged ourselves at the last Council, has not been quite successful, but we have done so well and so much better than usual that it is hoped we may be encouraged to make a still greater effort and to practice a little more self denial to secure that amount the present year. The Executive Committee will then be able, not only to enlarge the bounds of the missionary work, but also—which is so desirable—to increase the inadequate salaries of some of the laborers now in the field.

The Theological Seminary and High School continue to enjoy the favor of God and man. The Female Institute, in Staunton, commending itself by its own merits, has largely increased the number of its pupils and is gradually extending its influence and usefulness. The Education Society is still prosecuting the good work, in which it has been engaged for more than sixty years, of helping young men

to qualify themselves for the ministry of the Church. The Protestant Episcopal Church Home, in Richmond, is surely doing a blessed work in furnishing a home for fourteen lady guests, which are as many as the building will accommodate. To procure the means to provide for the maintenance of so large a family from day to day, the managers have nowhere to look except to the voluntary contributions of our churches and people. These are all institutions of the Diocese, worthy of and entitled to receive the prayers and support of all its members.

And now, dear brethren, as we stand at the close of the first century of the history of our beloved Church and on the threshold of the second, I pray that we all, ministers and people, may be as wise and faithful as those who have gone before us, and that God may bless us even far more in the coming hundred years than He has done in the past.

# REPORT OF BISHOP RANDOLPH.

# Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

I present, as required, my report of Episcopal work during the year. On Sundays, when I had no appointments, I have preached in churches in the city of Richmond, and in other parts of the Diocese, to supply a need of ministrations, or at the kind invitation of the rectors.

If, in building churches, we can make a graceful form instead of an indifferent or an ugly one for the same expenditure of money, it is clearly our duty, to the dignity of Christian worship, to ourselves and to our children, to do so. The permanent attraction in a church building must be its spiritual associations with the blessedness of approaching God in the ordinances of worship; but it is a mistake to suppose that a wise attention to the external incidents of worship is other than a help to religious reverence in the house of God.

Bethel Chapel, in the mountains of Fauquier county, consecrated in September, gave me the impression of the blessedness and the promise of mission work with the Prayer Book for worship, and an earnest missionary spirit in the pastor. Of the new churches visited by myself, I believe each one to be needed, to be judiciously located, and as having a promise of enlarged usefulness in the future. Some of them take the places of colonial churches, deserted or in ruins, or passed into other hands. In King & Queen county we passed by a noble old church now worshipped in and owned by the Baptists. A few miles further on, the next day, at King & Queen Courthouse, we consecrated a neat Gothic Chapel, built under the ministry of the earnest rector of the church at Tappahannock.

Christ Church, Lancaster county, is, perhaps, the noblest monument of the colonial church in Virginia. Occasional services are held in it, but for the greater part of the year it is deserted. But Grace Church, three miles away and a new church at Lancaster Courthouse, very tasteful and capacious, have taken its place. These old buildings, whose massive walls have defied the attrition of

centuries, tell us of the religious reverence of our forefathers, who reared them, and when it is practicable, the historic spirit and the importance of that moral influence which comes from due honor to the memorials of past generations should lead us to efforts for their preservation.

But for the practical work of religious education and evangelization the new churches more than fill the places of the old, so that the desertion of the old, mainly because the population has receded from their neighborhood, is not a sign of decay in the spirit and the life of the Church. My visits to many parishes in the country have impressed upon me the importance and the absolute necessity of increased lay work to keep the churches warm and alive. The new energy that has been devoted to Sunday Schools within the past thirty years is one of the most promising features of the religious activity of our times. In parishes where there are three or four churches, and no one of these can expect more than two services a month, a Sunday School which meets every Sunday is of more importance to the coherence and the permanent growth of a congregation than in churches where the people have the blessing of church services every Sunday. As a field of activity for Christian effort, and for the development of the working spirit and the missionary impulse in our church members, the Sunday School is perhaps the most important agency. If our laymen would make the effort in response to the call of their Rectors, I am sure that all obstacles would be overcome, and that no one of our country churches would be without a Sunday School. There are poor children, and many of the children of well-to-do people in every neighborhood, to whom a Sunday School would be a blessing that cannot be measured. No Christian man or woman who has tried it doubts the blessing, and the spiritual quickening that comes as the reward of missionary activity in this field. Gather the children, especially upon the Sundays when there is no service in your Church, teach them the Bible. introduce them to the creeds, the prayers, the catechisms of your liturgy. Form a friendship between the Prayer Book and the mind of the child, and that friendship never dies. The growth of our Church in mission fields has its germ in the Mission Sunday School. Through the child you win the confidence of the parents, who have perhaps never heard an Episcopal service in their lives, and who rarely attend the worship of any other Christian Church. But, more

than this, by carrying the Gospel to the poor children around you, you are deepening the fervor of your own piety, you are warming the life of your own Church, and bringing down upon it the blessing of God.

The Christian men of our country churches meet a suggestion or a call to this work, by their rectors, with the answer, "they are not fit for it." "They never taught children in their lives." "The women must do that"-and how is it possible that women alone can organize and work a Sunday school in a country community. You cannot teach children, and yet you can plead for your client at the In your country homes you can talk to me about religion, about literature, about politics, with exceptional intelligence. You can criticise your minister's sermons, but cannot help him in his work. You cannot superintend a Sunday school; you cannot illustrate to children the story of the Gospel, the wonderful literature of the Bible—the principles of the Ten Commandments. What you need is to pray for the fire of Christ's love in your hearts. What you need is a sense of the dignity and blessedness and the tremendous responsibility of Christian work-Christian men you must break the ice-you must try the work, and when you begin, stand by it and Christ will take care of it and of you too. We Episcopalians, and it is true to some extent of the Presbyterians also, have in the generations that are past acted upon the principle that a church should grow and become strong and widen its influence in the community by the regular Christian worship; by devout Christian conduct, by teaching our children their Catechism and their Bible lessons at home, by making our families the nurseries of the church. and forming religious habits in our children, and trusting to these quiet methods to influence the careless and the indifferent around us. We have believed that the parable of the leaven contains the true and only conception of the methods for propagating the Gospel As some one has said: "We are keepers at home," We don't believe in raids in the name of Christ against the irreligon, the drunkenness, the ungodliness, the ignorance around us. We are afraid of pressing too far the parable of the lost sheep—we think that the Methodists with their revivals, their prayer-meetings, their excited appeals have gone too far-they are in too great a hurry to save the souls of men from destruction. The parable of the leaven contains a great truth, but it is not all the truth. The parable of the seeking

and the saving of the lost sheep contains another great truth, and the Methodists, may God bless them, have helped and are helping to teach us that we must go after the sheep and not stand on our dignity, and wait for them to come to us. We must build churches for the poor; we must welcome them into our houses of worship; we must greet them—go out of our way to make them feel at home with us. A church must be a home; it must be a practical exhibition in its meetings of Christian brotherhood. If it is not, men and women will find a home in some other church. Our ministers have found that out. There is no body of clergy in the country, in any church, more faithful in their ministrations to the poor and to people who were seldom seen in our churches in past generations, than the clergy of Virginia, and everywhere these classes of people are responding to their efforts.

What the clergy need is the sympathy, the loving co-operation of the Laity, men and women, and, thank God, the tide of broader Christian sympathies among them is rising, and the realization that our Church has a great field for Christ open to it which it has never entered before is beginning to dawn. Our dependence for mission work is not in the discussions at Convocations or in the wrangling of Conventions over organization and missionary methods, but in the practical growth of the Spirit of Christ among the Laity. And while I am speaking to the Laity let me say a word to them about the support of the Clergy. I know that they are solicitous about the comfort and the temporal welfare of their ministers, and well they may be, for no people in any of the churches have for their pastors a more self-denying body of men. But they must be kept above solicitude about the necessities of life for themselves and their families. If not, there are other congregations and other dioceses who want earnest men and if they are called, they will and they ought to go. I would suggest to all of the country churches where the system is not in operation, and I know it is not in the majority, that, in addition to the salary in money, they should have a system of supply for the Rector's family of wood, of provender and of articles of family consumption. A little trouble and an organized effort would make this practicable in every country congregation. The ministers will not tell you about it, you must think of it yourselves, and not only think of it and talk of it, but do it. It would fall lightly upon every member and would be a burden to none.

The Church in our dear old Diocese has wide opportunities and new fields opening in every direction corresponding with the varied development of our material growth throughout the State. In the Southwest, with its mining centres, its railroad towns and its agricultural populations there are fields of intense interest and promise. In the tidewater counties the old love for the Episcopal Church seems in many places to be coming back again.

On last Sunday I visited St. John's Church, Hampton. It is the oldest church in America in use as a house of worship. Old, but so young in its beautiful interior, newly decorated; so warm and active in its missionary spirit. I confirmed there, with others, two Indians from the Normal School. A few weeks before I had confirmed sixteen Indians from the same institution. In addition to the charge of the parish this special work of the religious training of the Indians is under the manly, judicious and devoted pastorate of the Rector of St. John's. Here, almost on the spot where the first battles were fought beginning that long war which has pressed the Indian back from the homes of his fathers towards the setting sun, here, where the conflict begun more than two centuries ago, the red man is learning under the training of our Church the Gospel of peace. For the evangelization of the Indians I regard that work as perhaps the most important in our whole country.

The fields are open to us on every side. God give us the courage, the manhood and the faith to work them for Christ. If, in answer to our prayer, He will do that, the century that begins here will be marked by wider growth and larger measures of blessing to our Diocese and to the world than the century which closes with this centennial celebration.

The Rev. George H. Norton, D. D., from the committee appointed to consider the subject of the division of the Diocese, presented the following report:

The committee appointed by the Annual Council of 1883, "to consider the subject of a division of the Diocese," beg leave to report:

Your committee, in considering the subject submitted to them, have not been influenced by any theories as to the respective advantages of large and small Dioceses. The question of a division of the Diocese of Virginia does not seem to involve any question as to the expediency of forming a small Diocese, and, therefore, much that has been said and written on the general topic has been left out of view by your committee. The Diocese of Virginia

contains 273 churches and chapels needing the visitations and supervision of a Bishop. The first question that presents itself is:

1. Whether one Bishop can be expected permanently to perform this duty with justice to himself, to the Diocese, and to the other obligations resting upon him.

Any answer to this question, so far as it depends upon experience, is complicated by the fact, that for the larger portion of the past fifty-four years this Diocese has enjoyed the services of two Bishops.

Your committee, therefore, look chiefly for the teachings of experience to the period from 1876 to 1883, during which the Diocese was under the sole charge of its present Bishop.

It will no doubt, be conceded by all that nothing more can ever be expected from a Bishop than the amount of labor performed by the Bishop of Virginia from May, 1876, when he expressed to the Council his opinion "that it would be better he should make the experiment of undertaking the discharge of his full Episcopal duties for the present" to May, 1883, when the unanimous voice of the Diocese begged him to seek, for a time, a much needed rest from his labors.

It would be ungracious and ungrateful on the part of your committee to enter upon any criticism of the success of this experiment of the Bishop, so far as the interests of the Diocese are concerned.

If anything was left undone, we feel sure it must have been something which no sacrifice of time or strength could accomplish. Nay, more, the abundant prosperity of the Diocese, in all branches of church enterprise, by comparison with the statistics of other Dioceses, great or small, forbids the thought that our Diocese, during the period referred to, has suffered, in any considerable degree, from lack of Episcopal supervision. All opinions as to what might have been, under other circumstances, are purely speculative. It can neither be proved nor disproved that greater progress would have resulted from more frequent Episcopal visitations.

Even a seeming basis for such opinions in statistics is exposed to the difficulty of taking into account all the conditions under which different Dioceses have worked, and a mere array of figures is conclusive only to those whose minds are already made up upon other grounds.

We, therefore, shut our eyes upon this whole view of the subject.

Neither will your committee ask, whether a Bishop can visit 273 places as often as the interests of the Church require.

It will be more satisfactory to look at what the Bishop of this Diocese, in view of the field, considered to be his duty, and at what he actually accomplished. Let us take the six years coming next after West Virginia had been set apart as a new Diocese. In his annual statement to the Council of the previous year's work the Bishop reports in—

This gives an average of 142 annual visitations. When we reflect upon the time, fatigue, exposure, tax on mind and body, implied in such long journeys and constant ministrations, it is clear that the circuit of our Bishop, under such circumstances, through his Diocese, can never be watched by his clergy and laity without anxious and painful thoughts.

When we ask, in addition, when shall opportunity be found for study, for the questions connected with the care of all the churches, which comes daily upon a Bishop, for the recovery of strength which such exhausting duties demand, we are unable to see how one man can with safety ever permanently attempt what the Bishop of this Diocese undertook as an experiment.

It is likewise to be remembered, as Bishop White says (Memoirs, page 392), that "a Bishop will generally have a family, to whom a reasonable portion of his time will be as much due as are any of his services to the Church." Looking fairly at everything, your committee feel convinced that one Bishop cannot be expected permanently to perform the duties of his office in the present Diocese of Virginia.

The next question presenting itself is-

2. Whether, under the laws of our Church, the services of two Bishops can be permanently secured for the Diocese?

The provision of the Canons for an assistant, in case of the inability of a Bishop, from permanent cause or infirmity, to discharge his Episcopal duties, cannot of course be relied on. The former attempt of this Diocese to obtain an assistant Bishop, upon the ground that, from extent of territory, its Bishop was unable to perform his duties, does not encourage much hope in that direction.

The Canonical law of our Church provides for the election of an assistant Bishop, when the Bishop of a Diocese is unable to perform his Episcopal duties, either from age or other permanent cause of infirmity, or from extent of Diocese.

But the *permission* to elect an assistant Bishop, when the inability arises from extent of Diocese, rests upon a different footing from the *right* to elect one upon the ground of age or permanent cause of infirmity.

From the first organization of our church and before any canon on the subject was enacted, the Dioceses exercised the right of electing an assistant to a Bishop who was disabled by age or infirmity, This was claimed upon the ground of necessity and the practice of the primitive church.

It was not until 1829 that a canon was passed limiting the number of assistant Bishops to one for a Diocese, and expressly defining that the Bishop,

for whom an assistant was to be provided, should be "unable by reason of old age or other permanent cause of infirmity, to discharge his Episcopal duties."

In 1835 it had become obvious that there were Bishops, neither old nor infirm, who still could not discharge "their Episcopal duties" because of the extent of their Dioceses.

The General Convention of that year deliberated upon the matter. The schemes suggested were three, viz: Assistant Bishops, Suffragan Bishops, and Division of Dioceses. The joint committee having charge of the subject reported against Assistant Bishops, against Suffragan Bishops, and in favor of Division. (Journal, 1835, page 94)

A change of the Constitution, making lawful the division of Dioceses, which were too large for one Bishop, was adopted by that convention, and ratified by the convention of 1838.

The advocates for Assistant or Suffragan Bishops seem to have been few Bishop White, not only as chairman of the joint committee referred to, but in contributions to the public press, gave the authority of his great name against Assistant or Suffragan Bishops and in favor of Division. He says, "I am in favor of the division of a Diocese, whenever it is rendered expedient by extent of territory, and by Episcopalian population in point of number." (Memoirs, 389, 390).

Such, it is believed, was and has continued to be the general sentiment of our Church.

Such remained the law until 1871. In that year it was urged upon the notice of the General Convention that there are Dioceses so large that it is impossible for any one Bishop to exercise the needed supervision over them, and that such Dioceses, in some cases from "lack of the requisite number of clergymen and self-supporting parishes," cannot be divided. (Journal, 603, 604.) In response to this appeal the Convention amended the Canon by inserting "extent of Diocese" as a form of disability on the part of a Bishop to discharge his Episcopal duties which should entitle a Diocese to elect an assistant. But the concession was hedged in by a Proviso which indicated that it was not the purpose of the Church to depart from its established policy. After the declaration of power conceded to a Diocese to elect an assistant upon either of the specified grounds the Canon adds as follows: "Provided, that before the election of an Assistant Bishop, for reason of extent of Diocese, the consent of the General Convention, or, during the recess thereof, the consent of a majority of the Bishops and of the several standing committees, must be had and obtained."

It is clear from this statement that while a Diocese, whose Bishop is disabled, by reason of age or permanent cause of infirmity, may proceed at once to elect an assistant and claim the sanction of the General Church unless grave fault shall be found in the doctrine or character of the man elected, a Diocese which desires an assistant, because its territory and numbers are too great for any one Bishop's strength, cannot elect without per-

mission and it is left to the judgment of the General Church whether it be right and expedient to grant such permission.

The Diocese of Virginia has once asked such permission and it was refused.

Your Committee would not recommend this Diocese to depend in the future upon a renewal of such request.

We must answer, therefore, that there is little prospect of any permanent continuance of the services of two Bishops in our Diocese.

We come then to the last question:

3. Ought our Diocese to be divided? Notwithstanding all that has been said, your committee would not recommend a division of the Diocese, if there be danger of casting off a weak new Diocese unable to take care of itself, or of leaving the old Diocese so crippled in resources as to be unable easily to bear all its responsibilities. Upon a scrutiny of the field, and counting the number of Clergy and churches in the State of Virginia, your committee believe two Dioceses might be formed, neither of which should be feeble in strength or contemptible in size. The experiment thus far made in the case of West Virginia encourages the hope that another division would not sunder the ties of sympathy which naturally bind together all churchmen living on the soil of Virginia, or prevent efficient cooperation in some matters of common interest, such as the Theological Seminary, &c.

The feeling of reluctance to divide the Diocese again is one in which your committee largely shares, but it is believed that questions affecting the prosperity of the Church should not be determined by feeling.

Should the views thus freely expressed ever become those of the Diocese, your committee are not prepared to recommend an immediate division of the Diocese by the action of the Council, subject to the consent of the Bishop.

It is believed by some of your committee that the safest mode of dividing the Diocese would be by a movement in some portion of the Diocese desiring to be set apart as a new Diocese. It was a movement of this kind in the western part of the State of New York, which led to the change in the Constitution of the Church, which permits the division of a Diocese. There would certainly be advantages in waiting for a similar movement from some portion of the Diocese of Virginia desiring to be set apart as a new Diocese.

Questions of boundary would thus be at least primarily adjusted among those most interested. There would be time for a decided manifestation of the wishes of those who should, if the application were granted, become the new Diocese. There would be time to arouse the energy and liberality needed for the commencement of a new Diocesan life. There would be an avoidance of the agitation in our Council of the subject until it was required an answer should be given to a definite proposal.

If, for example, a portion of the Diocese should apply to the Council to be set apart as a new Diocese, with proper boundaries, and with evidence of the general approval of the Clergy and Laity within those boundaries, and

of their ability to meet the responsibilities of an independent Diocese, and if such proposed scheme should not seriously impair the resources of the old Diocese, division might then seem reasonable and practicable, even to those now most opposed to it.

There can be no doubt, however, that it is in the power of the Council to proceed at once to divide the Diocese in any way deemed right and expedient. Of course it is understood that no division, however the movement be inaugurated, can ever be effected without the consent of the Bishop of the Diocese and of the General Convention. Upon the whole, looking at all the present surroundings of the question, your committee are not prepared to submit any practical resolution for adoption by the Council at this time. It is in the power of any member of the Council to offer such a resolution, and the right to do so is reserved to the members of this committee as individuals, notwithstanding the committee as a body declines to present such resolution at this time. All which is respectfully submitted.

## REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF BIBLICAL LEARNING.

# To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

REPORT OF THE INSTRUCTOR OF THEOLOGY IN BRANCH SCHOOL, PETERSBURG.

To the Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

I beg leave to report my work as Instructor of the Colored Theological Students under your charge in this city:

There have been in all seventeen students under instruction during the past session; one admitted for a probation of two months, who will apply for re-admission next session; one, a Methodist, who has been permitted to

attend our recitations, and fifteen regular students. One of our regular students, Mr. Fountain Barner, died at his home, of consumption, on April 22d.

The progress made by the younger students during the session has been most encouraging. The older students will never attain much in scholarship. It is hoped that five of our students may be able to obtain Deacon's Orders at the close of this session.

The subjects taught have been Bible History and Introduction, Prayer Book with Articles and Catechism, Homiletics, General and Ecclesiastical History, Mental and Moral Science and Greek together with certain elementary branches in the teaching of which I have been efficiently assisted by the most advanced pupils.

The change that has taken place in the removal of the School to the more suitable and commodious premises now occupied, will doubtless be reported by the Committee of your number at whose instance it was made, and it only remains for me to report that the results have justified the wisdom of the Committee's action.

In conclusion, I respectfully submit that the School needs an additional teacher and earnestly request that steps may be taken to supply that need by the beginning of next session.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

The aggregate number of pupils entered during the present session is 101; 9 only being day scholars. The general health of the School has been excellent. \* \* \* \* Various improvements at the expense of the Trustees have been made; among them the ceiling of dormitory and vestiary with tongue-and-grooved pine suitably painted, and extensive repairs to the roof, also the equipment of the entire premises with Flagg Fire Extinguishing Hand Grenades, the most efficient security now attainable. Other improvements, at an expense to myself of nearly a thousand dollars, have been made. \* \* \*

The religious privileges and exercises of the School, including a loving observance of the Church year, have been mainly, as heretofore, though since the falling ill in March of the Rev. Dr. Nelson, curtailed of the ministrations of that gentleman who had previously, as in former sessions, held monthly meetings with our boy communicants and otherwise been their faithful pastor. On the mornings of Sundays and the chief holy days

all attend service in the Seminary chapel, regular evening service being performed by myself, with occasional relief by visiting clergymen, Sunday night in the School chapel. My Sunday afternoon lectures to the elder boys have been, as heretofore, an extended course on the Book of Common Prayer being now nearly completed. The season of Lent was again duly improved by extra services and the usual daily instruction—this year from Norton—afforded during Holy Week. The Friday night devotional meetings have been conducted with interest and profit by Mr. R. Allen Castleman, of the Seminary Middle Class, to whom and to Dr. Nelson my best thanks are due. Eight boys have been confirmed during the session and the whole number of communicants, including two Presbyterians and one Methodist, is thirtynine.

# REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia respectfully report, that forty-five Missionaries have received regular aid from the Committee since the last meeting of the Council, besides an appropriation of \$100 to Rev. Job Turner, Missionary to Deaf Mutes in the Southern States, and several special appropriations to ministers who needed and deserved help.

The following changes have taken place in the course of the year: Rev. J. Y. Downman has given up the charge of the churches in King William county and become assistant to Rev. G. W. Dame, Epiphany Church, Danville; Rev. William B. Everett has resigned the Mission in Charles City county and become assistant to Rev. L. W. Burton, St. John's Church, Richmond, and in charge of the mission work of that church with one service a month at the penitentiary; Rev. J. B. Funsten has resigned the church in Bristol and taken charge of Christ Church, Richmond; Rev. E. L. Goodwin has resigned the churches in Franklin county to take charge of the churches in Albemarle and Louisia, lately served by Rev. Robb White; Rev. H. M. Jarvis, of St. John's Church, Scottsville, has gone South, and the charge of church been resumed by Rev. Thomas E. Locke; also Rev. W. W. Kimball has given up the churches in Campbell county and gone South, and his place in Campbell been taken by Rev. Abraham Jaeger, D. D.; Rev. A. S. Lloyd, of John's Memorial Church, Farmville, has gone to St. Luke's, Norfolk, and his place in Farmville been occupied by Rev. J. W. Ware; Rev. David May, of Goshen, Rockbridge county, has gone to Ohio; Rev. J. M. Meredith has resigned his work in Stafford and Prince William and taken

charge of St. Margaret's, Caroline, and Christ Church, Spotsylvania Courthouse; Rev. C. J. S. Mayo has resigned the Mission at Newport News and Morrison's, and gone to Ohio; Rev. Duncan McCulloh has left Christ Church, Richmond, for New York; Rev. Alexander Overby has left Williamsburg and gone to Michigan; Rev. A. J. Willis has given up his work in Northumberland county and taken charge of the churches in King George county. Here are thirteen changes, an unusually large number, and nearly one-third of the number aided by the committee.

W. Phelps, Greensville; J. E. Poindexter, Caroline; C. C. Randolph, Botetourt; James S. Russell, Brunswick; L. W. Rose, Mecklenburg; James W. Shields, Shenandoah; Green Shackelford, Ashland; A. B. Their stipends range from \$100 to \$350 per annum, being an average of \$186, and an aggregate of \$6,525, to which must be added partial payments made to missionaries who have resigned, special appropriations to ministers who needed and deserved help, and other necessary expenses.

We deplore the frequent changes among our ministers and their constant exodus from the Diocese, but we are encouraged to hope, that with the increased means placed at our disposal, we shall be able to remove, to a good degree, one of the chief reasons of these changes, the inadequacy of support, as well as to do more for the destitute portions of the Diocese.

A reasonable support being assured to them, we think that those ministers who have received their theological education from the Diocese of Virginia ought to remain in it long enough to make some adequate return for the benefit.

Report of Committee on Removals of Parochial Clergy.

Our missionaries, as a rule, are doing good work, and the contributions of the past year show that the Diocese is abundantly able to furnish the means of sustaining them, and sustaining them better, and of pushing forward our work into new localities.

We have not yet reached an average of one cent and a half a week per capita, for that, with only 14,000 communicants, would give us \$10,920. But we have done well. Let us try to do still better, and rejoice to work for Him, and to give to Him who gave Himself for us, and for our sakes became poor.

We have not raised the \$10,000, but we have raised more than ever before, say \$9,000, and that in a year of almost unexampled hardship and financial depression. Of this sum nearly one-third was paid in after 1st of April, and not notified to the Executive Committee before their regular meeting in May, so that they have not had time to adopt such measures as the increase of their means may seem to justify.

# The Rev. J. D. Powell presented the following:

The Committee, to whom was referred so much of the Bishop's address as relates to removals of the Parochial clergy from the Diocese to other fields, asks to report as follows:

At their first meeting it was deemed advisable to get some facts as data for their consideration. To this end they corresponded with those clergy that have left the Diocese in four years past. From such data your Committee have been impressed with the painful embarrassments of many faithful ministers owing to the scantiness of their incomes promised and the delay and uncertainty in the payment of what is promised. This difficulty is doubtless the main cause of frequent separation between pastor and people. By keeping her ministers so straitened the Church cripples them and impairs their usefulness as well as starves and dwarfs herself.

While the average support of the Clergy in Virginia compares favorably with other Dioceses yet it must be acknowledged it falls far below a just and generous standard. For men who have in many cases spent their substance in preparing themselves for the ministry, have relinquished lucrative positions and the prospect of future advantage and are devoting themselves exclusively to the ministry of the Word and of prayer, it is not just and right that they should be kept at starvation rates on less than a mechanic's wages. They have a right to ask (not in any mercenary spirit, either), but as the Lord ordained, that they that preach the Gospel shall live of the Gospel. Is there no remedy for this evil? It were idle to repeat the grievances of Virginia ministers while no practical relief is pointed out. The remedy must be principally with the parish. With those that represent the Church

the responsibility rests. An offer made and accepted in good faith creates a mutual obligation of the highest dignity of service for Christ's sake on the one side, of sympathy and support on the other. The pastoral relation is no mere labor contract of dollars and cents but a reciprocal pledge of loving service and generous support for the Lord's sake. With every vestry rests the performance of this pledge. They must stand between the pastor and the people for he is powerless to protect his own rights. This contract should be rigidly performed by business methods. It is the loose and slovenly ways with which Church business is too often transacted that has led to the present evil. The treasurer as well as every vestryman should see to it that all pledges are scrupulously redeemed. Besides the money salary contributions in kind ought to form a stipulated part of the income and not as a gratuity. The free-will offerings of the people, over and above their pledged support, should be distinctly understood as such. For his support as a minister of Christ he should never be regarded as an object of charity. He should not be embarrassed or humiliated by a sense of dependence upon the favor or caprice of his people. Let him that is taught in the Word minister unto him that teacheth in all good things.

As auxiliary to the vestry a women's parochial aid society in every parish could do much to supplement the work of the official body, the vestry, in suggesting and carrying out plans for supplying and replenishing the furniture of the rectory. The generous sympathy, delicate tact and fervent zeal, those gracious qualities that made her last at the cross and first at the sepulchre, are not to be neglected as factors in good work for the Church.

Again, no parish should be without a rectory. It is hard that the small income should be taxed to provide a home. Such a drain impoverishes the minister, fixes on him in a few years a hopeless burden of debt and in the end does not better the condition of the parish. By a wise and liberal plan, of building, or buying by instalment, a home for the rector in every church may be secured as the property of the church to its permanent advantage. This would afford great relief to many ministers who now find their lives embittered by the prospect of increasing difficulties in the future.

We have said that the remedy for these evils rests with the parish. It is vain to look elsewhere for help. But it is with the congregation, the vestry-the individual members of the church in every parish that the question of a proper support of the clergy rests.

Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

The Rev. Dr. C. J. Gibson presented the report of the Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund:

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia respectfully report the condition of the fund as decidedly encouraging. The income this year from which our appropriations are made, is not quite as large as it was last year, being only \$2,286.05. But the report of our treasurer, herewith submitted, shows that a change of investments has absorbed some \$350 of our income of this year, so that it has been really as large, if not larger, than that of the last year. The principal of the fund is now \$24,866.05. The Board have distributed the sum of \$2,335, exactly the same amount as last year, among exactly the same number of familiesfifteen—and in the same amounts, except that the name of Mrs. Edward S. Gregory was substituted for one who had married again. In the wise Providence of God the Board has been deprived by death of the valuable aid of their beloved brother, Mr. John Stewart, one of the permanent members of the Board and Trustees of the Fund. The Council are called upon not to fill his place, but to supply the vacancy by the election of a successor at its present session. The list of beneficiaries is now as follows:

The Council assembled at 10 o'clock for divine service.

Morning prayer was read by the Revs. W. M. Dame and John K. Mason. The sermon was preached by the Rev. J. E. Grammer, D. D., of Baltimore, on the 23d chapter of the Book of Acts, the 24th verse.

respectfully report that while they appreciate the delicacy of feeling which prompted his resignation, arising out of the difficulty of performing, at his advanced age, the full work of his office and of the inadequacy of the revenues of the Diocese to meet the charges upon the Treasury, your Committee are unwilling to lose entirely the services of one who has done so much to enrich the archives of the Diocese with recovered records and most valuable contributions to its history, and trusting that, in the discharge of the lighter duties which he will hereafter be expected to perform, our faithful and learned brother will still be able, in the field in which he lives, to do much for the Diocese, and even "in his old age" to continue to "bring forth fruit" to its honor and God's glory, your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. That the resignation of the office of Historiographer of the Diocese, tendered by Dr. Slaughter, be not accepted, and that he be requested, without taxing his strength with burdensome work, to continue, as far as may be, his efforts to illustrate the history of the Diocese and to increase the value of its permanent records.
- 2. That for such services as Dr. Slaughter may render, in the manner indicated in the foregoing resolution, the Treasurer pay him at the rate of two hundred dollars for the current year and his necessary expenses.

The Standing Committee on Sunday Schools would respectfully report that in their attempt last year to gather, by circular, the statistics of the Sunday schools of the Diocese, they were so discouraged that they had no heart to repeat the experiment.

Our list of questions, carefully prepared, were intended to bring out important facts concerning the condition of this all-important work—the training of the young in the ways of Godliness. Not more than half the parishes were heard from. Many, and those representing perhaps the majority of children, failed to respond. No trustworthy conclusions, therefore,

could be arrived at. We content ourselves, therefore, by asking the Council, at its present session, so to amend the "Form of Parochial Report," on the cover of the JOURNAL that it may bring into more prominence the Sunday school work of the Diocese. We suggest that these items be inserted, "Scholars habitually attending Divine Service," "Number confirmed and become communicants," "Number of catechizings by the Minister."

Your Committee on Clerical Support, respectfully offer the following report:

One hundred and sixteen reports of treasurers of parishes have been presented to us; according to which, 130 churches have paid their ministers the salaries promised in full; 14 churches have overpaid to the amount \$258.97, and 15 churches have fallen short of their promises \$979.27. 63 rectories, with 659 acres of land, are reported, and considerable efforts being made to supply other churches with rectories—such, for instance, as in the county of Mathews, where they have on hand over \$1,500 for the purpose.

The Council met, and after service, conducted by the Rev. Peregrine Wroth, of Baltimore, Md., was addressed upon the subject of "The Theological Seminary of Virginia," by the Right Rev. Bishop Peterkin (his address being read by the Rev. R. A. Gibson), and by the Rev. J. E. Grammer, D. D., of Baltimore, Md.

SATURDAY, MAY 23d, 1885.

The Council assembled at 10 A. M. for divine service.

Morning prayer was read by the Rev. J. E. Poindexter.

The Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., then delivered an address on "Memorials of the Deceased Bishops of Virginia."

After the address the Council was called to order by the Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Mr. W. W. Old, from the Committee on the Brotherhood, presented the following:

The Committee on the Brotherhood beg leave to say that they have carefully examined the several papers submitted to their consideration, and report as follows:

The statement of the account of the Brotherhood, with Mr. A. Y. Stokes, Treasurer, is duly attested by the proper committee of examination, and found sustained by proper vouchers. A balance of \$1,876.89 remains on hand.

The President, Major D. N. Walker, in presenting his fifteenth annual

report, congratulates the Brotherhood on the fact that during the past year there has been no death among its Clerical members.

"The collections of last year indicated a reliable membership of about 800. To increase this, and in accordance with a suggestion made at the last Councill," the Rev. Frank Stringfellow, one of the evangelists, was, in October last, appointed general agent. Mr. Stringfellow has secured nearly 200 members, and is satisfied he could secure an equal number each year without serious injury to his regular work.

Mr. Stringfellow is of opinion, in which this Committee entirely concurs, that the cause can only be duly presented through agents, and we cannot too strongly urge upon the Clergy the importance of having a representative of the Brotherhood in every Parish. We are not aware of any mode in which more good, with the same expenditure of effort, can be accomplished.

The Committee on New Parishes respectfully report that they have had under consideration a petition from St. John's Church, Pulaski county, asking for the establishment of a new Parish, to be composed mainly of the western portion of West Augusta Parish, and a small part of Montgomery Parish. The petition states that there is no Vestry in the first-named Parish to be consulted; but there being no evidence that the Vestry of Montgomery Parish has consented to the proposed division, the committee cannot recommend that the petition be granted. The petition from Fredericksville Parish, Albemarle county, was withdrawn.

The Rev. Dr. Packard presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

At this Centennial Council, your committee cannot forbear contrasting the present state of the Church in Virginia with its feeble condition seventy years ago, at Bishop Moore's election, from which time the revival of the Church may be dated. Report of Committee on State of the Church.

At that meeting there were present seven clergymen and seventeen laymen. Now we have about three hundred Clerical and Lay Delegates in attendance upon this Council. The small number of communicants then has increased to more than 15,000. "The little one has become a thousand."

From the addresses of the Bishops and from the Parochial reports, we have great reason to thank God for the continued and increased prosperity of the Diocese.

The confirmations have been over 1,500 more than ever before in our history, and of these 233 are colored.

In a year of drought and scarcity the contributions have not fallen off, and for Diocesan Missions, have greatly increased. Numbers and material growth are not the only or best measure of true prosperity, but we feel gratified that the spiritual has kept pace with the material prosperity.

At no time in the history of the Church has a more faithful and hard working band of clergy labored for her advancement, nor, we believe, has the Gospel been more clearly and fully presented to her people. While preaching salvation by Christ only, and urging their hearers to be careful to maintain good works, they have taught that the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ to the praise and glory of God, can only be brought forth by the aid of the renewing, sanctifying influences of the Holy Spirit. No other foundation indeed can be laid than Jesus Christ, yet we can only be built up on our most holy faith by the constant assistance of the Holy Spirit. In vain do ministers urge their hearers to greater earnestness in religion, unless they teach them that God will give His spirit to them that ask Him to help their infirmities, and enable them to do what without Him they cannot do.

Our Diocese, with her Bishops and Clergy, may justly claim to have ever contended earnestly for the faith once delivered to the saints, and that love which is the bond of perfectness has, in a marked degree, united the Church in Virginia. This has been, and is at once her glory and her strength, and we pray that this spirit may increase more and more, and be perpetual. United in this faith and love we shall firmly stand, divided we must surely fall.

We observe with satisfaction that the ranks of our clergy are, in a great measure, recruited from her own sons, who have been trained like Timothy in the hereditary faith of their parents, who, with filial love, naturally know and care for her needs. It is chiefly from sons reared in pious homes that the Lord of the harvest calls and sends forth laborers into his harvest. In such a home Bishop Meade was nurtured and prepared for his great work. We read that Hannibal's father made him, at the age of nine years, swear before the altar, love to his country and undying hatred to Rome. So Christian parents should bring their sons to the altar and make them swear eternal love to Christ and his Church, and undying warfare against all the enemies of the truth. For lack of this early dedication to the Lord the Church laments the fewness of the candidates for her ministry.

Report of Committee on State of the Church.

In this connection, we urge the importance of family worship. We fear the fire has gone out on many family altars; the business and the pleasures of the world have been so pressing, that no time is taken for collecting the family together, and uniting them in the presence of God, thus offering an acceptable morning and evening sacrifice. Those who like Joshua determine, "As for me and for my house we will serve the Lord," may expect a blessing on their children's children. A family thus united on earth may become a family in heaven—no wanderer lost.

In his address, the Bishop has spoken of the great importance and encouragement of the work among the colored people. This work increases with every year, as is shown by the large number of candidates for the ministry and by the large number confirmed. The building of churches for their use, the ever widening field, which each year opens to us, so that we can almost hear the voice of the Master saying, "I have set before thee an open door," the earnest zeal and devotion of those engaged in it, are all proofs of God's favor, and an earnest of its future success. We believe that the more intelligent and thoughtful of the colored race will turn to the Episcopal Church to find in her compact and effective organization, in her large and generous sympathy, in her orderly and decorous methods, and in her instructive and educational liturgy, the best and fullest answer to the needs of their people. The successful working of the Divinity School, at Petersburg, is a ground of encouragement in this department of the Church's work, for it promises to give us a pious and educated colored ministry. Without such a ministry we can hope for no great improvement among them. All who feel an interest in the welfare of this people should remember this institution, not only in their prayers, but in their offerings. This work must be done by those among whom they live, the responsibility is laid upon us, we cannot shake it off, and should not wait for aid from without.

Without considering other important points, which have been often brought before the Council, we close with the prayer that the Lord our God may be with us as he was with our fathers, and that he may never leave us nor forsake us.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey, from the special Committee on the communications of greeting from the Dioceses of West Virginia and Pennsylvania, presented the following reports which were received and their resolutions adopted:

The undersigned committee appointed for the purpose, beg leave to recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

r. Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia desires to express its cordial and grateful appreciation of the Centennial greeting so eloquently and affectionately tendered to the Diocese on yesterday by the Bishop and other deputies from the Diocese of West Virginia.

In this, the hundreth anniversary of the orderly reorganization of the Church in her borders in 1785, the Mother Diocese, with warm heart and just maternal pride, returns the greeting of her daughter, and rejoices to point to her as one of her jewels; and she humbly prays that the mother and the daughter may continue to walk together in love, and in the unity of a common spirit to set forward and maintain the precious "faith once delivered to the saints."

2. That a copy of the foregoing resolution be delivered by the Secretary to the Bishop of West Virginia.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey, from the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute, presented the following:

Report of Trustees of Virginia Female Institute.

The Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute submit to the Council their annual report.

The interest on the debt of the Institute has been paid to the first day of April, 1885.

The reports of the Board of Directors, and of Mrs. Stuart, the Principal, show gratifying evidences of the success of the Institute and of increased favor and confidence among its patrons.

The number of boarding pupils is now fifty-five. For several months there were sixty.

The conduct of the pupils has, as usual, been lady-like and refined, their habits studious, and their health such as pure air, uniform temperature throughout the building, regular exercise and watchful care, have always secured for the inmates of the Institute.

The high grade of scholarship, heretofore established, has been maintained during the session in a manner most satisfactory to the Principal and Teachers; and for the next year a corps of skilled and competent instructors, including native teachers of the French and German languages, has been secured.

The Principal reports a steady increase of patronage from Virginia. It is gratifying to know that Church people in Virginia begin to realize that they have a Diocesan School entitled to their confidence and support.

Fifteen of the pupils were confirmed by the Bishop at his visitation in March last, a spectacle well calculated to enkindle a warmer interest in the school throughout the entire Diocese.

Deeply impressed with the importance of affording facilities within the means of clergymen for the education of their daughters. Mrs. Stuart offers to them instruction in all English branches without charge. In view of the concessions she proposes, it is believed that \$200 will cover all necessary expenses of the year for such pupils. She appeals with earnestness to those whom God has blessed with wealth to aid in the work of securing education for the daughters of those who, out of their meagre salaries, cannot defray even the ordinary expenses of such education. She says: "Let some one who is able and willing come forward to the aid of those whose lives are being spent in a noble but self-sacrificing work—work for the Master's cause." The Trustees hope that this appeal will not be in vain.

Endowed Schools, Colleges and Universities for boys are found everywhere. Why should not some provision be made for lessening the cost of educating those upon whom the Church and the security of our Christian social and domestic life in the future so much depend? Even if ten Laymen could be found willing and able "to lend to the Lord" one hundred dollars each for such a noble object the beginning of a great and good work would be inaugurated.

The Trustees renew the expression of their approval of the management, educational advantages and elevating influences of the Institute.

As year after year the number of those presented to the Bishop for confir-

mation increases, the conviction grows that the Diocesan School of Virginia is becoming more and more not only a nursery of truly refined and womanly education, but one of the missions of the Church for the ingathering of its daughters into the sacred fold.

The Trustees recommend that the Council adopt the following resolution:

Resolved, That gratified to know that the Virginia Female Institute, one of the recognized Institutions of this Diocese, has entered upon a new career of usefulness with encouraging assurances of abundant success, the Council commends it to the continued patronage of the Diocese, and earnestly unites with the Principal and the Trustees in appealing to those whom God has blessed with wealth to contribute of their abundance, so that those who need generous help may, at reduced rates of charge, at least secure the priceless blessing of Christian education.

The report was received and its resolution adopted.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey presented the report of the Finance Committee:

The Committee on Finance respectfully report that they have examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese and found them correct and sustained by proper vouchers

There was to the credit of the Diocese at the commencement of the fiscal year of 1884-5, the sum of \$974.78. The receipts on account of dues to the Contingent Fund last year were only \$9,562.92. They should have amounted, allowing a reasonable margin for delinquencies, to \$12,000. The amount due from the Diocese at the close of the present fiscal year was \$1,865.46.

The delinquencies on Contingent Fund account last year amounted to \$2,613.07, more than enough to discharge all indebtedness. The aggregate of delinquencies for the year 1883 was \$2,402.91, showing for two years last a total of delinquencies of \$5,015.98. By the Treasurer's Report of 1882 the accumulations of delinquencies, prior to that year, amounted to \$10,147.95, showing a grand total of delinquencies up to 1884, of \$15,163.93. Doubtless the injurious habit of negligence in making full payments of Contingent Fund dues arose out of the fact that having but one Bishop to provide for, the income seemed to be, and was ample to meet current charges. And many did not appreciate the importance of laying by in store for the future a fund to bear the burden of unexpected charges, or to provide for the endowment of an Episcopal fund.

But the time is at hand when the matter of Diocesan support must be considered in a strictly business point of view; and, at the next session of the Council, unless the appeal hereinafter made to the parishes and churches be promptly and satisfactorily responded to, the question of rigid curtail-

ment of expenses must be met and decided, that is, whether provision for the services of the evangelists and the historiographer shall be continued; whether the usual allowance to the examining chaplains shall be made, and how far the salaries of the secretaries may be diminished, and, lastly, whether the failure of the parishes and churches to make full payment of the assessments, shall compel us to lessen the compensation of our already poorly paid Bishops? It is sincerely hoped that this alternative of dire necessity will not be forced upon the Council by the carelessness, indifference or supposed inability of debtors to the Contingent Fund. It may be, and doubtless there are those in the Diocese who are personally unable to pay the assessment of one dollar for each communicant. But it is true that, with but few exceptions, these are in churches or parishes in the Diocese which have not the ability to make good the delinquencies of poor communicants. This is done in many parishes, and should be done in every case, where the ability exists: and congregations should feel it to be their bounden duty to see to it that the Contingent Fund is paid as an honest debt, necessary to be paid for the support of the Diocese; and it will not do for the rich man to pay his dollar, and to allow his church to be returned delinquent because some of his brethren are too poor to raise the dollar. Let those who are able in each parish bear the burden-sub-divided it will be trifling, but thrown in a grand aggregate upon the Diocese the delinquencies threaten serious consequences. In this centennial year of the history of the Church in this Diocese, let us not only rejoice in the rich inheritance which is ours, but feel revived in us the noble sensitiveness of our fathers to the honorable obligation to pay our debts, and chiefly those due to the Church and to God.

And if our people will in earnest set to work to do their duty in this regard the finances of the Diocese need be in no difficulty.

A small effort on the part of already delinquent parishes would meet this amount. At any rate, your committee prefer, at present, not to advise reduction of salaries, except in the case of the Historiographer, whose duties are to be so much lessened. This, they recommend, shall be fixed at \$200; the other salaries they recommend to be continued as they were last year. Let the Diocese stand as it were on trial for the ensuing year, and let its fifteen thousand communicants determine whether for lack of means the work of the Church shall be curtailed, and its growth stopped on our borders. The committee renew their last year's appeal, which was in these words: "The committee earnestly advise and recommend that the parishes and congregations which are now in arrear on contingent fund account, use their most strenuous exertions to pay at least a part of what is over due from them, and in future to allow no such accumulations of indebtedness to the fund, which, if continued, threatens serious embarrassment in the near future to the finances of the Diocese."

The committee ask that the recommendations of this report be approved.

Consideration of the resolution offered by the Rev. H. M. Jackson was resumed. On motion of the Rev. Frank Page, the resolution was laid on the table.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Sprigg, the Committee on the Prayer Book revision, appointed at the last Council, was continued to report at the next Coucil.

The Rev. Jas. Grammer, in behalf of the Rev. G. W. Dame presented the following:

Custodian of Matters Pertaining to History of Diocese.

As it is a matter of interest to us to have gathered and preserved for future use all duly authenticated facts in reference to the past history of the Church in this Diocese which may now be had, and as many papers, books and other matters of interest and value have been and will be sent to the historiographer of the Diocese, which, as such, are the property of the Diocese, and which, in the event of his disability by death or otherwise, before a successor shall be appointed, there is no one to claim in her name.

Resolved, That a permanent Standing Committee of three be appointed by the Bishop, to be known as the keeper or custodian of the matters pertaining to the history of the Diocese, of which committee the historiographer shall be ex officio a member, whose duty it shall be to gather, hold and keep in safety, in the name of the Diocese of Virginia, all such matters as shall come into their hands as such, to have copied in a bound volume all written or printed manuscripts of value, which have no known duplicate, and of which there is from any cause danger of loss, and that the historiographer be requested to endorse on all books and papers, "the property of the Diocese," together with his own correspondence as such officer, and that they are to be handed to said committee in any event where it is necessary for the Diocese to claim such property.

Resolved, That the Rector or person in charge of any Parish in this Diocese be and is hereby earnestly requested, in person or by proxy, to use all diligence to gather and report in a proper form for preservation to said committee at the next annual Council all well authenticated facts in reference to the past history of his Parish, and such a sketch of the lives of the ministers, who have had it in charge, as shall show their work and character, (the leading hand of God with them, and the course which they severally found most useful in advancing the prosperity of the Church as the spouse of Christ, in gathering souls into the fold of God, and training them by work, instruction and discipline to occupy their position as lights in the world.

On motion of Mr. H. W. Sheffey, further consideration of the subject was postponed to the next Council.

The Rev. R. A. Goodwin offered the following:

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society pay the expenses of one delegate from each Convocation to one meeting of the Executive Committee annually.
