### RULES OF ORDER.

#### ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand except to address the chair.

3d. The credentials of Lay Delegates shall be forwarded to the Secretary, and the Secretary shall make out a roll and call the names of all certified to him, as duly and canonically elected. The President of the Council shall then appoint a committee, to be composed of four clerical and three Lay Delegates, to whom shall be referred the certificates of election of the Lay Delegates, and who shall report the names of those entitled to seats; but until said report shall be received and adopted, no business shall be considered by the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any "Lay Delegate" to his seat, the matter shall be referred to "the Committee on Elections," for examination and report.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed :

The appointment of a Treasurer *pro tempore*, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addr.sses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the *second* day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

Rules of Order.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Elections.

A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of *ten* laymen.

A Committee on Sunday Schools.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.

2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.


6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form : "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided* such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectators shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

The Rev. Pike Powers, D. D., Secretary of the Executive Committee, read the Annual Report as follows:

#### Report of Committee of Diocesan Missionary Society.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society respectfully report, that they have aided forty-seven regular Missionaries and Rectors of weak Parishes since the Council of 1885, and that the appropriations to these beneficiaries of the Society have amounted to \$8,725, per annum, or an average of about \$185, though the whole of this amount has not been paid out because some of these appropriations have been standing for less than a year.

Besides this, the Committee have paid to Rev. F. Stringfellow, evangelist, \$500 for six months' service, from 1st June to 1st December, 1885; to Rev. Geo. C. Sutton, \$133.33, being at the rate of \$800 a year, for services while in charge of St. Stephen's Church and School two months from the 20th of September to the 20th November, 1885, after the resignation of Rev. Giles B. Cooke; to several worthy ministers of the Diocese who were in need, \$400, and they have also appropriated \$100 to Rev. Job Turner, Missionary to Deaf Mutes in the Southern States, and paid \$30 to Walter Burwell, Divinity Student, Petersburg, for his board while doing colored work at Hope Chapel, Manchester, during his vacation in the summer of 1885, making specials to the amount of \$1,063.33 and the total amount appropriated, and the greater part paid out, since the last Council, \$9,788.33.

The amount of existing appropriations which must be provided for if they are to be continued, is \$8,725. We left the Council last year with a balance on hand of \$3,153.52 according to the report of the Treasurer. We have received since \$8,496.48, and there is a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$2,444.32 to begin the year with.

We have more vacant Parishes and churches and more ministers to aid than a year ago. In several cases we have had to increase the stipend, in not one to make a reduction, and have had but one resignation of a stipend, that of Rev. Wm. B. Lee, of Gloucester. The cry comes to us from almost every quarter that the Parishes are getting poorer every year from deaths and removals, from bad crops and from the general depression of business. They must be kept up by the help of the Diocese at large and by this Committee, as the agent of the Diocese, or they will die out. We have the men and we have the money; but men are nothing without the Spirit of consecration-the will to work for the Master and His church, and the readiness to deny themselves if need be, and to endure hardness as good soldiers of Jesus Christ. And money is nothing, if it is kept locked up; nothing for Christ, if it is used only for the world, the flesh, and the devil; nothing for the Church and the Gospel, if it is made and employed only to enrich children and to give them the means of indolence, self-indulgence, and, perhaps, of vice. Many of the Parishes are, doubtless, poor, and some of them getting poorer. But we doubt if, as a rule, they are doing what they are able

to do. Then, there is money in the cities, in the centres of business, and we ought to get for the Lord's work a great deal more than we do. "Give as the Lord prospers you," is the Apostle's rule, but that means a liberal beginning, and afterwards a proportionate increase, proportioned to increase of prosperity; otherwise, a man might give one cent when he makes \$100, two cents when he makes \$200, and so on and this would make the rule a nullity and a farce. We could save enough every year in dress, in entertainments, in weddings, in funerals, and in the merest superfluities, to carry on the Lord's work, and yet have enough left to dress becomingly, to do all things needful decently and in order, and to have as much reasonable, Christian enjoyment, as is good for body and soul.

Funsten from Stafford to Henry; Rev. R. A. Goodwin from Roanoke to St. Stephen's Colored Church and School, Petersburg; Rev. J. E. Hammond from Maryland to Montgomery; Rev. A. Jaeger to Campbell; Rev. J. C. Hobson to St. John's, Petersburg; Rev. A. A. McDonough from Kansas to Fauquier; Rev. J. J. Norwood to Franklin; Rev. W. J. Page from Amelia to Georgia; Rev. L. W. Rose from Mecklenburg to North Carolina; Rev. F. G. Scott from Charlotte to Lynchburg; Rev. John McGill from Culpeper to Ashland; and the three colored deacons put in charge of work in Brunswick and Mecklenburg.

In conclusion, we beg leave to say that while we deplore the frequent changes among our ministers, and regard them as a serious hindrance to the work of the Lord and the growth of the Church in our Diocese, we have

abundant reason to believe that our missionaries as a body are zealous, laborious, self-denying, and efficient.

The Bishop then read his Annual Address :

ADDRESS OF BISHOP WHITTLE.

**Rev. and Dear Brethren :** 

For the first time in my experience we are permitted to assemble in our Annual Council (the Ninety-first of the Diocese) without our clerical ranks having been broken during the preceding year by the death of a single one of its members. For this and for all His unnumbered mercies, temporal and spiritual, may God's holy name be praised.

The Council which met two years ago in Winchester appointed a committee to arrange for celebrating the one hundredth anniversary

of the organization of our church in Virginia. This celebration was held from May 20th to 24th inclusive in St. Paul's and St. John's churches, Richmond, and I must congratulate you on its having been a grand success. There was a larger attendance of clerical and lay delegates than ever before in the history of the Diocese, and many visitors were present from within and from beyond our borders. A number of the papers and addresses which were read and delivered have been published in a handsome volume by our good friend, Thomas Whittaker, Esq., of New York, which is well worth possessing, as being a valuable contribution to the history of our beloved church. It is to be hoped that the admirable recital, on that memorable occasion, of God's dealings with the Episcopal Church in Virginia during the past one hundred years, made a deep and lasting impression for good on many minds and hearts.

I now proceed to give as briefly as possible such information in regard to the work and state of the Diocese as the Canons require shall be laid before you.

At the opening service of the last Council, May 20th, 1885, in St. Paul's Church, Richmond, nine Deacons were ordained Presbyters.

June 5.—Epiphany Church, Danville, confirmed forty-seven.

June 16 and 17, and 23-26, was engaged in duties at the Theological Seminary.

June 26.—Ordained five members of the graduating class Deacons. June 27.—Grace, Fauquier, confirmed nine.

June 28.—St. James', Warrenton, confirmed three, and in the afternoon preached in a new and unfinished church at "Baldwin's Ridge," a few miles distant.

July 6.—Bishop Ferguson, of Africa, confirmed, by my request, in the colored mission in charge of Rev. J. H. M. Pollard, Norfolk, seven.

July 21.—Attended a meeting of the Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School in Petersburg.

August 9.—St. Andrew's Church, Pittsylvania, confirmed six. This church had been abandoned for many years, but has been revived by Rev. C. O. Pruden, and under his efficient ministry promises soon to become a flourishing congregation.

August 9.—At night, confirmed four in Emmanuel Church, Chatham.

August 11.-Christ, Henry county, confirmed six.

The very sad and really alarming fact is developed by the above summary, that there has been a great falling off in the number of young men seeking to enter the ministry of our church. Last year twenty-seven candidates for Priest's orders were reported, while now we have but fourteen. And it will be seen that there is a corresponding decrease in the number of students at the Seminary. I say this is alarming, because it indicates, in my judgment, a declining and low state of religion as the cause; and what is to become of us without an adequate supply of ministers? And if we do not find and educate men at home, where are they to be had? In time past we have not only provided for ourselves, but largely for others also, eleven having been lost to us during the last year by removals to other Dioceses. I would earnestly beg the attention of parents and pastors to this all-important matter. While, in my opinion, no one should ever urge or advise another to enter the ministry, except under very peculiar circumstances, yet every young man who consecrates himself, soul and body, to the service of Christ in the rite of confirmation, and thereby becomes a communicant of the church, might have his mind directed to the subject, and be induced to seriously and prayerfully consider whether he is not called of God

to this sacred office. And this reminds me how necessary it is that all our people should contribute to the utmost of their ability to sustain the two most important of our Diocesan societies—the Education and the Missionary Society—the former of which is engaged in the good work of sending forth laborers into the harvest, and the latter of helping to support, and thus to retain, more than one-third of the whole number of those who are already there.

The work amongst the colored people continues to increase in interest and magnitude. Your committee on the subject will report a plan for its better organization, which, if adopted, I trust will remove some of the difficulties attending it. Rev. R. A. Goodwin is now in charge of St. Stephen's colored church and school in Petersburg, and they are in a more prosperous condition than ever before. Four students of the Divinity School, in the same city, have been admitted to Deacon's orders, and are now at work, and others expect to be ordained during the summer. Rev. Thomas Spencer has been obliged to resign the charge of St. John's Church, that he may devote all his time to the instruction of the theological students. I mentioned in my last address that the Legislature of the State had incorporated the "Bishon Payne Divinity and Industrial School," as the charter states, " for the purpose of educating colored persons for the ministry of the Protestant Episcopal Church, or for any secular business," and the Rev. James Saul, D. D., a generous friend of the negroes and Virginia, has given about five thousand dollars towards the purchase of a suitable location and buildings for its use. Money is greatly needed for the support of teachers and students, and contributions for these objects are solicited from all who desire to promote the best interests of our church and of the colored race.

The Trustees respectively of the Theological Seminary and High School and the Virginia Female Institute, and the managers of the different societies of the Diocese, will inform you of the condition of those institutions.

I have united with the other members of the committee in their report on the proposed alterations in the Prayer Book, but have not changed my opinion of the whole movement as expressed a year ago. In my judgment, the best thing for the Council to do is to instruct your deputies to the General Convention to vote against them all.

Commending you, dear brethren, to God, and to the word of His

grace, I pray that the Holy Spirit may in all things enlighten our minds and direct and rule our hearts.

The Assistant Bishop then read his Annual Address :

ADDRESS OF BISHOP RANDOLPH.

BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

With gratitude to the providence of God I have to report a year of work as Assistant Bishop of the Diocese without interruption, except in two instances, by slight indisposition and by accident in travel. The Bishop of the Diocese has presented in his address information and suggestions which may furnish material for your legislative deliberation and action. I proceed therefore at once to a detailed statement of my Episcopal acts during the year.

April 28th.—Emmanuel Church, Woodstock, Shenandoah county. In the intervals between these official visits, I have preached as

opportunity offered, twenty-eight times in different churches in the Diocese. I have consecrated six churches.

September 8th. — Emmanuel Church. Eagle Rock, Botetourt county, was consecrated. Rev. Messrs. F. Stringfellow, Valentine Jones, J. H. Williams, assisted in the service. The Rev. Dr. Stanger, of Cincinnati, who had encouraged and contributed generously towards the building of the church, preached the sermon. To the energy and earnestness of the Rev. F. Stringfellow, the gathering of this congregation and the erection of the church building are largely due. The Church is judiciously located on the Richmond and Alleghany railroad in one of the most picturesque portions of the valley of the James River, with a growing village around it, and a populous country neighborhood; it affords a most promising mission field. Beyond Eagle Rock is Clifton Forge, the terminus of the Richmond and Alleghany railroad-a railroad centre and a growing town. With missionary effort a congregation could be gathered and a church built at this important point. There are four vacant churches and two promising mission stations immediately on the Richmond and Alleghany railroad, between Bremo Bluff and Clifton Forge. With the railroad as a vehicle of communication, one practical and energetic minister could accomplish great good, and build up permanent congregations. If aided, they will live and grow. If left without ministrations, they will be lost to the Episcopal Church. These opening fields are calls upon the missionary spirit of the Diocese, that involve responsibility and earnest effort.

On the 11th of November, Grace Church, Mecklenburg county, was consecrated. The Rev. Mr. Pettigrew, of the Diocese of North Carolina, the beloved Pastor of this little flock, was present, and assisted in the service.

On the 25th of November, Holy Innocents' Church, in Burkeville, Nottoway county, was consecrated. The Rev. N. F. Marshall, the Rector, to whose efforts the completion of the enterprise is due, was present, and assisted in the service. The Rev. F. Stringfellow and Dr. Joseph Southall organized this effort, which in two years has developed into a comely and commodious church and an earnest congregation.

On the 13th of March, All-Saints' Church, Goochland, was consecrated. The Rev. Messrs. P. M. Boyden (Rector), B. M. Randolph, Martin Johnson, and W. B. Everett were present, and assisted in the

service. Rev. Dr. Powers, of Richmond, preached the consecration sermon. By uniting with St. Mary's Church and Goochland Courthouse, it is hoped that this new field may secure a regular ministry.

On the 22d of March, the Ritchie Memorial Church, Claremont, was consecrated. It is a gift to the Diocese of Virginia from Mrs. Charlotte C. Gittings, of Baltimore. It is beautiful in design and in all of its appointments, and our sincere thanks are tendered to the generous donor. The Rector, the Rev. T. Jones, Rev. Dr. Gibson, Rev. David Barr, Rev. Robert Goodwin, Rev. George Somerville were present, and assisted in the service.

On the 3d of May, Quantico Church, Dettinger Parish, was consecrated. The new Church is built upon the site of the Colonial Church which fell in ruins in the year 1813. The persons confirmed at the service were the first presented since the year 1812. The Church cost \$1,200. It represents the labor and sacrifice of the Rector and people, and the kind help of friends in Virginia and in Baltimore. It is comforting to hear the voice of the liturgy upon the spot where it has been sleeping for more than half a century. The Church must press out to possess new fields, but it must hold on to the old. Isaiah saw the spirit of the Gospel seven hundred years before the day of Pentecost, and he describes its two-fold missionary activity. "The Gentiles shall come to thy light; the sons of strangers shall build up thy walls ; they shall build the old wastes. the desolations of many generations." Around this Church is 2 large mission field, without Gospel ministrations or pastoral care, except at long intervals, which render them ineffectual for any permanent impression upon the community. I may mention in passing, that my visit to old Acquia Church, in the neighborhood of theme just mentioned, impressed me with the reviving vitality of these or homes of the Episcopal Church in Virginia. When the Rector or St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, in 1860, I visited this Church with Bishop Johns. It was then almost a ruin, with a sparse congregation. To-day the old building is renovated, and strong for a century to come, and filled with an earnest, active congregation.

My work during the year has brought me into contact with the colored congregations and missions and schools of the Diocese. I have visited the Church and Parish School in Petersburg, in charge of the Rev. Mr. Goodwin; the Theological Seminary, in charge of the Rev. Mr. Spencer; Mrs. Brent's School and Chapel at Gor.

donsville; the Mission Station in Nottoway county; Mrs. Jennings' School and Chapel in Lunenburg county; St. James' Colored Church, Brunswick county; St. Paul's Colored Church at Lawrenceville, now with a rectory completed; and St. Mark's Colored Church, Mecklen burg county; St. Philip's Church, Richmond, and Hope Chapel, Manchester, and Holy Innocents' Chapel, Norfolk. The confirmations at these visits have been given in the list that has just been read; the aggregate is 123. If you of the clergy and laity could visit this work as we, the Bishops, have to do, you would need nothing from us to win for it your confidence and to touch your consciences with the conviction that it is a great mission work which God has given this generation to do. I wish to repeat here some extracts from a published communication of my own, suggested by the visits recorded in this report:

"A doubt exists in the minds of many of our people as to the adaptation of our Church to the religious education of this race. That doubt is theoretical Wherever the practical effort has been made the results have dissipated the impression. The Episcopal Church, more perhaps than any other, relies upon the saving power of Christian education. From the dawn of intelligence in the child, it associates with the story of redemption the teachings of the commandments of the decalogue. Its catechism, after the creed, teaches the duty towards God and our neighbor as springing out of the regenerating power of the gospel, and as the mark of the new man in Christ Jesus. It teaches the child, and the adult, too, that his salvation by the gospel involves not only the regeneration of his spiritual life, but the reconstruction of his whole conception of moral duty; at the same time giving him new foundation upon which that moral duty is to rest. It teaches that a Christian is not only one who prays in private and in public, who reads his Bible, who spends time in religious thought and meditation, who is studying to work out his salvation with fear and trembling, but he must be truthful and honest and just and temperate and pure and self-controlled and kindly and loving towards his fellow-men. The negro, and indeed all the races in the lower stages of civilization, tend towards a divorce of religion from morality. That tendency exists in various forms among all classes of the white race, modified and controlled by long ages of discipline by Christian law and public sentiment, by the churches and the Bible. That superstition belongs not only to the negro race, but

it is the inveterate tendency of all the races. With the negro it is the inheritance of generations of paganism from the dawn of his history. The proposition that he is incapable of education out of a religion of physical excitation of antinomianism and superstitious emotionalism is equivalent to the proposition that he is incapable of salvation by the gospel. Surely only the ignorant and the unthinking among us can adopt such a conclusion. The church that addresses itself to the mighty task of bridging over the gulf between Christian faith and Christian morals, in the mind of the negro, is the one best adapted to bear to him the message of the gospel.

"If I were a politician I would advocate the Christian education of the colored population, as the strongest ground for the stability of our political institutions. An acknowledgement of the awful authority of God and obedience to the ten commandments as His law. must be recognized by all political parties as lessening the difficulties of human governments and securing readier obedience to human laws. As a political economist I would advocate the evangelizing of the race, as contributing to national wealth and material prosperity. To have in a nation, a vast population with thriftless habits, living from hand to mouth, with no instincts to accumulate property, clothed with the right of suffrage but with no interest in the laws for the protection of property, must always be an element of danger and a barrier to material progress. Christianity and Christianity alone will teach them the divine authority of marriage, the sacredness of property, purity in the control of their bodies, honesty in their relations with their fellow-men, industry in their common toil, and all the virtues that contribute to the wealth of nations. If I were engaged in a trade I would advocate their Christian education, for as they are elevated by the power of the gospel all the conditions of their temporal life would be progressively improved. They would live in better houses, they would wear better clothes, they would accumulate property which would advance the resources of the State and diminish taxation. They would be better customers of the merchants in our cities and towns, as their wants would increase through the refining influences of a Christian civilization, and thus contribute to the prosperity of the whole community. But these are not the motives which impel the Christian Church in the work of their evangelization. These incidental blessings follow in the pathway of the Christian faith, but they are as nothing compared with the infinite

blessings which Christ brings to all of the children of men. We must refuse to estimate the value of our missionary efforts in terms of material progress. Could we train the uncivilized race in all the arts and the literature and the social refinements of the foremost nations of Europe, could we banish poverty and spread the blessings of wealth and enlightenment over all the nations that sit in darkness, we would have done nothing after all compared to the work of bringing souls home to God and making them heirs through Christ of eternal life and glory.

"The conversion of the heathen abroad and at home may add to our commercial prosperity, may lighten the cost of government by diminishing crime and taxation to support poorhouses, and increase the wealth of the nation. (!) With what withering contempt would the early apostles have regarded such a conception of the motive to preach Christ to the lost world.

"We must believe that these people have souls to be saved; we must believe that Christ lays upon Christians the responsibility of bringing these wanderers home to God. This alone can kindle the enthusiasm and inspire the self-sacrifice needed for the work. If we do that, Christ will take the future of the two races, living together in the same home, into His own hands. He will cause them to dwell together in peace, each filling its own sphere and working out its own destiny. He will solve the problems that statesmen cannot solve with reference to the relations and development of the races under a common government; He will bless us in the great work He has given us to do, and open the way, perhaps in the near future, for our colored population, Christianized and civilized, to bear to their own race, in the long darkened continent of Africa, the salvation of the Gospel for the life here and the life that is to come."

The views here expressed have been confirmed by contact with this work, and reflection upon the problems it involves, during thirteen years of my ministry. I would call the attention of the clergy and laity to the special organ of our work in Virginia, published in Petersburg, and edited by one of our colored Theological students. It is an interesting and most creditable paper, and by subscribing to it we would furnish ourselves with information of the progress of the work, and encourage a Missionary cause.

Assisting the Bishop of the Diocese at the ordinations at the

Theological Seminary Chapel on the 26th of June, I ordained to the priesthood, Charles John Fair, Wiley Jones Page, and William Rutherford Savage.

At a special service at Grace Church, Petersburg, I ordained to the priesthood, Joseph C. Jones, J. Cannon Hobson, and George S. Somerville. These brethren were ordained in the presence of members of their several congregations, and in the community which constituted the field of their work during the term of their diaconate. It would be well to give to congregations in the Diocese, when practicable, the opportunity to witness and to participate in this noble and solemn service of the Church. I must not neglect to express my thanks to friends throughout the Diocese for offers of hospitality which I have been unable for the most part to accept. As I visit the clergy of Virginia, in their homes and their parishes. I am impressed with the fidelity and religious earnestness of their ministry. We should be devoutly thankful for the loving confidence in our parishes between pastors and people, and for our exemption from disturbed relations between ministers and organizations which have afflicted other Dioceses. There is an ordination vow which we of the clergy should keep ever in remembrance in all the duties and relations of the Christian ministry. In the most solemn moment of our lives each one of us was asked this question. "Will you maintain and set forward, as much as lieth in you, quietness, peace and love among all Christian people, and especially among them that are, or shall be, committed to your charge?" and we answered. "I will do so, the Lord being my helper." Our experience has taught us the inability of unaided human nature, and the absolute need of the Lord's help to keep this vow. Failure to keep it in the long run, means failure in the Christian ministry. I know of a minister in this Church who gives to that duty constant prayer, and noble enthusiasm. He cannot rest as long as there is alienation or strife among his neighbors, rich or poor, high or low. The people of his community, of all the churches, have learned to look up to him with a strange, tender reverence; they listen to him as he speaks to them from the pulpit, as one known to have been with Jesus, and words that would seem common-place from other men are clothed with dignity and power by the Christ-like walk and conversation of the man behind them. Christ words never fail: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God ;" and

when men call us "the children of God," we have gone a long way towards winning them to become His children too.

The confirmations, as you have observed by the reports of your Bishops, have been numerous, and encouraging to our pastors. The services in the churches in the observance of the Holy ordinance and the external behavior of the candidates, as well as information concerning them from their ministers, gave me the satisfactory hope that they were duly instructed and impressed with the import and the solemnity of the occasion. To win souls, to add to the Church such as are in the way of salvation, is surely the highest function of the Christian ministry. We should watch against an ambition for numbers to be presented at the visitation of the Bishop; we should pray against the temptation to admit to confirmation persons ill prepared, or where the preparation is at least doubtful; but we should pray just as fervently to be saved from the temptation to indifference and neglect of personal effort and solicitude for the individual souls committed to our charge. Indifference here on the part of a minister will destroy the spiritual life of any Church. In this connection, I would suggest that we keep in mind the rule of this Church, that no candidate be admitted to confirmation who is not ready and desirous to partake of the Holy Communion; and that in our teachings upon the subject, this principle be not only assumed, but clearly stated to the people and to the candidates. Confirmation is the connecting link between baptism and the Lord's Supper : it is the door of the Holy Communion. If a person is in a fit state to take upon him the engagements of his baptism, he is in a fit state to receive the Lord's Supper. If he is ready to declare his resolution, as he does declare in confirmation, to fight manfully under the banner of Christ crucified, against the world, the flesh and the devil, and to continue Christ's faithful soldier and servant to his life's end, then he is ready to come to the Lord's table, and cannot be an unworthy communicant.

It is clear that no long interval should be allowed between confirmation and participation in the Holy Communion. Need I remind any pastor or Christian parent of the temptation to those who have received confirmation and attended the Lord's table, to imagine that their spiritual concerns have been attended to, and to look upon themselves as having discharged the great duty, and to rest in indolent and contented security. Special pastoral care and loving

Christian training should be bestowed upon the newly confirmed in our flocks. Try to keep them in remembrance of their confirmation day. You might remind them a Sunday before of the anniversary of their confirmation morning. Anything, to tell them that you, the Shepherd, love the sheep, and that you "know them by name," and that you never forget to pray that they may be kept from the evil that is in the world. Having you all here before me, tempts me to transgress the limits of a Bishop's address. But you will pardon that. For my honored Bishop, and for myself, the joy and blessedness of our work is to deepen and to strengthen, to guide and to quicken yours in all the fields of this wide Diocese. We hear it said, again and again, that our day is a time of skepticism. Other days, the eighteenth century for example, were times of harder skepticism than ours. We must not judge the age by typical specimens of revolt from Christianity, or from the name of religion. I read with a shock, some years ago, this utterance of a statesman, the Prime Minister of a great and a nominally Christian nation: "As men move out of the influence of religion they get nearer to morality and to practical sense and truthfulness." What was his conception of Christianity? What kind of religion did that statesman mean? A Christianity, whose authoritative exposition was an unintelligible tirade against every element of liberal progress, which the modern world owes to Christianity, and which never could have been without it. A religion of pilgrimages to shrines and irrational belief in the false miracles of modern superstitions. We make men skeptics, too, if our religion is a quarrel about dress, or posture, or a solicitude about organization and machinery. to the subordination of their spiritual interests and the mighty themes of the Gospel. The heart of the Gospel is the redemption of Christ and the character of Christ; and the Bible is the inspired exposition of these elements of theology and life and saving power. Let us preach the Bible-the world around us knows less about it than we imagine. Ignorance of the Bible is the soil out of which the weeds of irreverence and flippant skepticism grow. Preach from texts in the Bible; but widen your teaching beyond the exposition of single sentences. If you teach it by single sentences your people will come to read it as a book of detached texts. They may read it in that way for a lifetime and be ignorant of its meaning, the current of its revelation, its structure, its scope, its argument and its history. You

cannot get a conception of the Falls of Niagara, by examining under a microscope a single drop of its water. So you cannot know the Bible by analytical examination of the fragments of the Bible. Preach and expound the Bible, and men's hearts and consciences will respond to day as they have done in all Christian ages wherever the word of God has been given to them as the Bread of Life.

The report of the Treasurer of the Episcopal Fund was presented and referred to the Standing Committee on that Fund.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the report of the Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Referred to Committee on said Fund.

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund respectfully present their Annual Report: By a change of investments, our judicious treasurer has increased the market value of our bonds, so that while they have a face value of \$24,795.96, they are worth at least \$27,000.

The income from this fund has increased, however, by no means in proportion to the value of the principal. It has improved from \$1,372.91 to \$1,397 o2. The contributions also, during the past conventional year, have increased from \$789.22 to \$877.39. and the number of contributing parishes from seventy to seventy-five: But it is well to remind our brethren that there are in the Diocese still at least *seventy non-contributing parishes*. Our beneficiaries are *fifteen* in number, and although the income of the fund would seem to demand some reduction of the amounts to be given, the Board have thought it best to continue their appropriations as last year. They hope the parishes of the Diocese will, by their future liberality, more than supply the deficiency they have felt themselves bound, by the wants of "the fatherless and the widow," to create.

Rev. Dr. Powers presented the following :

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COLORED WORK.

The majority of the Committee, to which was referred the Canon proposed by the Committee on Colored Organization, respectfully report that they deem the adoption of the proposed Canon inexpedient at this time, and they recommend in lieu thereof the following resolution: Report on Separate Organization for Colored Brethren.

*Resolved*, That the Bishop be empowered to appoint an evangelist for the colored people of the Diocese, who shall perform such work as may be assigned him by the Bishop.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel presented the following :

REPORT ON SEPARATE ORGANIZATION FOR COLORED BRETHREN.

The Committee appointed at Winchester, and enlarged at Richmond, to consider what action should be taken by the Diocese looking to a separate organization for our colored brethren, respectfully report: Your Committee are free to acknowledge at the outset that they have found the task assigned to them by your honorable body beset with difficulties, all of which they cannot hope to avoid or overcome.

They realize that, in the abstract, race-segregation might not seem to furnish the best solution of the race-problem; that it might be preferable, if found practicable, for the races to worship together the common God and Father of usall, and to legislate for His Church in close conjunction. But, in point of fact, this question is not an open one. It has been practically settled in advance by the action, not of the white, but of the colored race, and been thus eliminated from the race-problem, as presented for our consideration. The colored race have withdrawn in overwhelming majority from the churches in which they once worshipped with the whites, and that in every section of this broad land. Race-affinity, which we do not fault. has proved so strong, that even among the Methodists and Baptists, where they were formerly most numerous, and where they enjoyed race-associations to the full, short of race-segregation, this withdrawal has nevertheless occurred. The colored race have thus set off the white race, and not the white the colored; the conclusion therefrom being, that a separate organization of some sort our colored brethren have, and will continue to have an organization of their own. It has been conceded to them as unavoidable by all other denominations of Christians. The Northern Methodists, after an earnest effort to do otherwise, being the last to make the concession-a con-

cession which our Church must, sooner or later, make in some shape and to some extent, or else abandon the colored field. Your committee therefore concurs in the opinion expressed by our Assistant Bishop, that "History" (which repeats itself in our experience) "has demonstrated that the races must work out their destinies under separate social and religious organizations." In essaying to disregard, to go counter to, this teaching of History and of Providence, we only fight against God.

Again, it might in the abstract, as has been suggested, be deemed wiser that, for a time at least, congregations composed exclusively of colored persons should be under the pastoral charge of white ministers; but as a fact, in days byzone, the colored people of the South usually had colored preachers in addition to their white pastors, and in the future, when the choice will, and of necessity must, rest with themselves, they will certainly, as a rule, continue to have pastors of their own race, despite all the whites may either say or do. It is then another foregone conclusion, that all we can hope to accomplish in this regard is to educate colored pastors for colored congregations, and this your Committee do most earnestly urge as wise and proper. Having conceded separate organization to our colored brethren, to the extent of allowing and recognizing colored congregations with colored pastors, it remains to consider what further steps can be taken in the same direction consistently with a continuance of ecclesiastical union between the races and the welfare of our entire Diocese. Despite the difficulties therein involved, your Committee recognize the great, nay, the extreme, importance of as close Church affiliation as may be compatible with the highest welfare of both races. The whites, to whom it is in the Providence of God committed, must sedulously guard and preserve inviolate in its purity that deposit of truth and of duty which it is theirs to keep and to transmit. Nothing would be gained for either race by which this previous deposit was imperilled.

In seeking to determine what relation may safely subsist between our colored brethren (with their exclusively colored congregations and colored pastor, especially in the rural districts) and our entire Church in this Diocese, your Committee have been able to devise no expedient better adapted than the one to which resort has been had by the Congress of the United States and by the General Convention of our Church, so far as the precedents are applicable to the case we have in hand. Congress erects territories (with territorial governments) out of sparsely settled portions of the public domain not yet prepared for the burthens, the duties, or the privileges of fully organized States.

In like manner, the General Convention of our Church has organized Missionary jurisdiction (out of parts of the territory nominally under its authority), composed at one time of an entire civil division; at another of parts, or the whole of several civil divisions; or, as in one instance (that of Dakota), out of a part only of a single civil division. In this last case, more closely resembling ours, a race-jurisdiction (*i. e.* for Indians) was originally

erected under the title of Niobrara. Niobrara was, and still is, an ecclesiastical, and not a civil division, whose metes and bounds were determined by race-occupancy. The name of the jurisdiction has been changed to Southern Dakota, the same Bishop holding over, with his newly named jurisdiction subdivided into two deaneries, one of which sub-divisions ("for Indians ") still bears the original name of Niobrara. These Missionary jurisdictions of the Church at large are officered and legislated for by the General Convention. Their representatives may be admitted to seats but not to votes in the House of Deputies. While of our Foreign Missionary jurisdictions, neither the African, nor the Chinese, nor the Japanese have, or ever had, representatives in the General Council of the Church.

Following these precedents in part, your Committee suggest the erection of a Colored Missionary jurisdiction of our Diocese, for which special legislation may then be had, and fostering care extended. They propose to allow colored convocations, and that such convocations may assemble annually in joint Council to consult and devise for their common welfare; and lastly, that such local convocations, in General Convocation assembled, may elect deputies to represent the whole colored jurisdiction in the annual Councils of the Diocese, thus ceding to our Diocesan Missionary jurisdiction what has not been ceded by the General Convention to its Missionary jurisdictions, either at home or abroad.

In pursuance of these objects your Committee recommend the adoption of the following:

# CANON' XIII,

## OF COLORED MISSION CHURCHES.

Section 1. The colored people of Virginia, who are, or may hereafter be, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary jurisdiction of the Diocese.

Sec. 2. It shall be lawful to organize mission churches or congregations, composed exclusively of colored persons, within the limits of any already existing parish, subject to the same conditions and regulations as are other mission churches (see Canon XII), and specially those of this Canon.

Sec. 3. Colored churches and congregations, organized as above provided, may be associated with other churches similarly constituted in convocations, such convocations to consist of as many congregations as may be determined by the ecclesiastical authority.

A General Convocation, to be composed of two clerical and two lay deputies from each local convocation, may be held at such time and place as may be designated, by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the General Convocation itself, to be presided over by the Bishop or Assistant Bishop, with power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Council of the Diocese.

Sec. 4. At each such General Convocation there may be elected four

clerical delegates to represent the entire colored missionary jurisdiction in the Annual Council of the Diocese, to vote only on matters affecting the interests of said jurisdiction.

Sec. 5. Colored congregations constituted as above provided shall not be liable to any assessment for the contingent expenses of the Diocese. They may acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by legal transfer, under the direction of the proper court of equity; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by legal transfer under similar direction.

Sec. 6. As a temporary (or, if found desirable, permanent) measure, there shall be appointed by the Bishop an Archdeacon, being a Presbyter, white or colored, of this Church (and if found necessary or possible more than one Archdeacon), who shall have general supervision of the colored churches and congregations within a prescribed district, whose duty it shall be to preside at meetings of convocation; to administer the Lord's Supper for colored deacons; to advise and aid such colored deacons, and when desired by themselves, colored Presbyters also in preparing classes for confirmation; and in general to discharge such other duties as may be assigned by the Bishop.

# To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Church History, Canon Law and Pastoral Theology. respectfully submits the following annual report:

The Senior Class has had four weekly recitations in Short's History of the Church of England, supplemented by written lectures on English Church History, and on the Protestant Episcopal Church; Green's History of the English People; Hooker's Ecclesiastical Polity, Book I; the Constitution and Canons of the Church; the Pastoral Epistles in Greek, and Meade on the Pastoral Office.

The Middle Class has read essays and studied, with three recitations a week, Kurtz's Church History, with constant parallel references to Robertson's Church History.

The Junior Class has written essays, and studied, with four weekly recitations, Dr. Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and the Acts of the Apostles in Greek.

He has, in accordance with the written request of the Trustees, frequently attended the recitations of the Preparatory Department, and gladly testifies to the faithful and efficient work which has been done there by both teachers and scholars.

# REPORT OF THE INSTRUCTOR OF THEOLOGY IN BRANCH SCHOOL, PETERSBURG.

# To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia :

I beg leave to report that there have been under instruction in your Branch School, during the past session. seventeen students in all. Of these, four were ordained deacons and went forth to their fields of labor last December, leaving thirteen students now in attendance, four of whom entered this session.

The subjects taught have been Latin, Greek Testament, Elementary Hebrew, English Grammar, General and Church History, Theology, Bible Introduction, Prayer Book, Mental and Moral Philosophy. Only six of the students receive instruction in languages other than English. The progress made in studies has been upon the whole quite encouraging, and the deportment of the students excellent.

Three students will apply for Deacon's Orders at the end of the session. In teaching the lower branches I have been efficiently assisted by two of our advanced students, but an additional teacher is much needed.

# ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT TO TRUSTEES (1886) FOR COUNCIL JOURNAL.

# Right Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D., LL D., President of the Board of Trustees :

RIGHT REV. AND DEAR SIR:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

The whole number of pupils entered the present session is eighty. \* \* \* Except in the diminution of numbers the session has been a prosperous one. We have had no serious sickness, and little of any sort. Fewer students have withdrawn during the year than ever before. The conduct of the boys has been unusually good, and the percentage of communicants has rarely been larger. With a return of better times our numbers will doubtless be restored.

In respect to religious observances at the School I have nothing new to report. They have continued as before, with due celebration of the Holy Seasons, and with confidence on our part that nothing beyond what is reasonable in the way of attendance is exacted. Family prayers in the morning in the School Chapel, and a brief service at the tea-table in the evening are held

daily throughout the session. Sunday we go in the morning to the Seminary Chapel, and in the evening the regular service of the Church is performed at home; this, with Bible class Sunday afternoon, is all that is required. Attendance at Church on the chief festivals and fasts is cheerfully conceded by the boys as the condition of a full holiday—the only ones we have except the Christmas recess - and to the various extra services in the School Chapel, especially during Lent, they come in larger proportion probably than any congregation in the Diocese. Before the formation of the annual class for confirmation, instruction is furnished all who choose to listen, in a series of weekly lectures on the subject, with the understanding that no one is committed by such attendance to be a candidate, and from this plan the most satisfactory results follow.

I have again to thank the Rev. Drs. Walker and Nelson for occasional sermons in the School Chapel, and Dr. Nelson in particular for weekly services as heretofore during Lent, and for invaluable pastoral attention throughout the session.

Mr. R. A. Castleman, of the Seminary Senior Class, has retained charge of the Friday night devotional meeting for the boys, and has continued to exercise among them an influence of which I cannot overstate my grateful appreciation.

Eleven boys have been confirmed during the session the whole number of communicants now being thirty-three.

In this, the sixteenth annual report, the President again congratulates the Brotherhood on the fact that during the preceding year death has not invaded the ranks of its clerical members.

The statement of the Treasurer, duly attested by the committee of examination, and accompanied by proper vouchers, shows a balance of \$1,837.30 on hand to the credit of the Brotherhood.

Your Committee, being impressed by the importance of this beneficent organization, and the necessity not only of keeping it alive, but of increasing its means of usefulness; and remembering that the Brotherhood no longer has the services of that energetic worker, the Rev. F. Stringfellow, whose untiring efforts have secured so many recruits for the Order, without which Report of Committee on Relief of Disabled Clergy.

The Trustees of the Brotherhood beg herewith to submit their sixteenth annual report. They have no deaths to report during the past year, as they had none to report last year. Since organization there have been twentyeight deaths, and  $$_{31,373,09}$  have been paid to the families of the beneficiaries. The whole amount paid by a member who joined in 1870 has been \$54.80, or an average of  $$_{3.42\frac{1}{2}}$  per year. It is therefore surprising that all the ministers are not interested in it, and that more of the Laity cannot spare that amount yearly for so good an object.

aid from this Society, and even those now aided may require greater assistance. It is the duty of the Church to provide amply for the comfort of those who have given their health and strength to the cause of God and man in preaching salvation through Christ. They will have their reward from God in the enduring rest of Heaven; but they should feel the gratitude of man in being fully cared for when the day of labor is past, and they are waiting their call to their eternal home. It is a reflection on the piety of the Church when the servants of God suffer for that which man can give.

We believe that there will be no difficulty in having this fund largely increased, if the clergy would call the attention of their people to it. We do not think it a Christian modesty that causes many to decline to do so. The minister should remember that he occupies the position of God's messenger, and therefore should ignore self and speak for his Master.

We hope therefore the Clergy of the Diocese will call the especial attention of their congregations to this matter during the coming year, and urge a heavy increase to the funds of this Society.

Rev. Dr. Powers offered the following:

*Resolved* (1st). That the Diocesan Missionary Society will use its best efforts to raise the sum of ten thousand dollars during the ensuing year, and (2d), that, if possible, two Evangelists be employed to work under the direction of the Bishop.

A division of the resolution was called for. The first part of the resolution was carried.

Rev. H. M. Jackson moved the following as a substitute for the second part of the resolution :

*Resolved*, That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society be authorized to employ two Evangelists under direction of the Bishop if the funds at their disposition will justify it.

Carried.

The tellers reported as the result of the ballot for a fourth Clerical Deputy the election of Rev. Dr. Nelson.

Rev. Messrs. Peterkin, Minnigerode, Gibson and Jackson, were elected alternate Clerical Deputies.

The tellers for Lay Deputies reported as the result of the third ballot the election of Mr. R. T. Scott. On the fourth ballot they reported no election. On the fifth ballot they reported the election of Mr. Chas. M. Blackford. Messrs. Jos. Bryan, Jos. Wilmer, B. J. Barbour and Wm. Nelson, were elected alternate Lay Deputies to the General Convention.

Right Rev. A. M. Randolph, from the Committee on the proposed changes in the Prayer Book, presented the following report :

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE PRAYER BOOK.

The Committee, to whom were referred the alterations and amendments to the Book of Common Prayer, approved by the last General Convention and sent down to this Diocese, respectfully submit to the Council their report.

Your Committee, keeping in mind "the happy mean between too much stiffness in refusing and too much easiness in admitting variations in things once advisedly established," have themselves subjected, and invite the Council to subject, to a rigid criticism these proposed changes in our Book of Common Prayer, for, except the Bible, no other book exerts so great an influence upon the religious life and character of our people. Propositions coming from so high and honorable a body as our Bishops and Deputies in Convention are entitled to, and will undoubtedly receive from all members of this Church, most respectful consideration. But while under the influence of this feeling, your Committee at the same time have felt, as doubtless this Council feels, that in such a work as this in which we have engaged—a work that is intended for the generations to come-we should not be hindered from making our book of worship as perfect as, by the grace of God's Spirit and the sanctified culture of His Church, it is possible to make it. The debt of gratitude we owe to our fathers for so precious a heritage as this Prayer Book, we can no other way discharge than by handing it down to our children even more free from blemishes-doctrinal, liturgical or literary, and more rich in devotional stores-than when we received it.

To the deep-seated love and veneration for the Prayer Book that has always been entertained by the people of this Church, we may confidently look, as its sufficient safeguard against the endless changes which the foreboding jealousy of some is apt to imagine when once the door has been opened to change. In view of the past history of the Prayer Book, and especially of the fact that in the last two hundred and eighty-two years there have been but two revisions, all such forebodings would seem to be groundless.

The proposed alterations and amendments come before us for our action in the form of resolutions adopted by the General Convention. These resolations are thirty in number, each one embracing the alterations and additions in one office or natural division of the Prayer Book.

## RESOLUTION I.- The Title Page.

We recommend the adoption of the first resolution, with this amendment:

I. That the words, "Together with the articles of Religion" be added to the title.

## **RESOLUTION II.**— The Introductory Portion.

We recommend the adoption of Resolution II, with the following amendments:

I. In the third paragraph, under the heading, "concerning the service of the Church," the words "on any day when Morning and Evening Prayer shall have been said, or are to be said in Church," be stricken out, so that the paragraph shall read, "The minister may, at any other service, with or without a sermon or lecture, use such devotions as he shall, at his discretion, select from this book, subject to the directions of the ordinary."

2. That the "Table of Proper Psalms on certain days," and the "Table of Selections of Psalms," be omitted here, inasmuch as they are printed before the Psalter, where they more appropriately belong.

3. That Canon 23, Title I, of the Digest, be substituted for the paragraph under the heading "Hymns and Anthems."

4. That (d) in this resolution concerning the Sectionary be not approved, in so far as it embraces Lessons from the Apocryphal Books under the title of "Lessons of Holy Scripture."

## **RESOLUTION III.**—Morning Prayer.

We recommend the adoption of this resolution, with the following amendments :

1. Substitute 2 Cor. 5:21 for "Sam. 1:12," in the opening sentence for Good Friday.

2. That the change in the Venite exultemus be not approved.

3. That the words "or he that readeth," in the note immediately preceding the Te Deum be omitted.

4. That the addition to the Benedictus be not approved.

5. That the change in the Rubric immediately preceding the Apostles' Creed in Morning and Evening Prayer, making imperative the use of one or the other of the forms, "He descended into hell," and "He went into the place of departed spirits." be not approved.

6. That the musical punctuation of the two Creeds be not approved.

7. That the first Rubric after the Collect for Grace, viz: "In places where it may be convenient, here followeth the anthem," be not approved.

## RESOLUTION IV.-Evening Prayer.

We recommend the adoption of this resolution, with the following amendments:

1. Insert among the opening sentences Eph. 1:7, and on the margin add "Good Friday."

2. That the introduction of the Magnificat be not approved.

This involves the rejection of the Rubric just preceding, the substitution in the following Rubric of "After which shall be sung or said the following Psalm," for the words "or this Psalm," and the omission of the words "Magnificat, or," in the note after the Bonum est.

3. That the introduction of the Nunc Dimittis, with the consequent rubrical additions, be not approved.

4. That the additional versicles after the Creed be not approved.

5. That in the Rubric before the Collect for Peace, after the words, "Then shall be said the Collect for the day," be inserted the words "except when the Communion service is read."

6. That the omission of the first clause in the Collect for Aid against Perils be not approved, but that the words "Lighten our darkness, we beseech thee," be inserted; so that the prayer shall read: "O Lord, our heavenly Father, by whose almighty power we have been preserved this day, lighten our darkness, we beseech thee, and by thy great mercy defend," &c.

7. That the Rubric immediately following the Collect for Aid against Perils be omitted.

8. That in the title of the "Prayer for the President of the United States and all in civil authority," in the Morning and Evening Service, the words "the President of the United States and" be omitted.

9. That in the said prayer in Morning Service, the words "the President of the United States," and in the same prayer in Evening Service, the words "the President of the United States, the Governor of this State," be substituted the words "the chief Magistrate of our country.

### **RESOLUTION V.**—*The Beatitudes.*

We recommend that this resolution be not adopted.

#### **RESOLUTION VI.**—*The Litany*.

We recommend the adoption of this resolution, with the following amendments:

r. That the words "the chief Magistrate of our country" be substituted for the words "the President of the United States," in the petition for the President.

2. That the proposed change under (e) be not approved.

## **RESOLUTION VII.**—Prayers and Thanksgivings.

We recommend the adoption of this resolution, with the following amendments :

I. In the Prayer for Meetings of Convention, substitute the words "in session" for the word "convened."

2. In the Prayer for Missions, omit the word "for" before "to dwell on the face," &c.

3. In the Prayer for a Vacancy in the Cure of Souls, the words "of him who ministereth unto us in holy things" be stricken out, and the sentence read, "that by his faithful work and blameless conversation we may be moved," &c.

> RESOLUTION VIII.—Penilential Office. "IX.—Thanksgiving Day. "X.—Short Office of Prayer.

We recommend the adoption of these resolutions.

**RESOLUTION XI.**—Collects, Epistles and Gospels.

We recommend its adoption, with this amendment :

I. In the Collect for Tuesday in Easter week, after the words "washing of regeneration," insert "and renewing of the Holy Ghost."

### **RESOLUTION XII.**—Holy Communion.

We recommend the following amendments:

1. In the Rubric, immediately preceding the Lord's Prayer, for the words "Morning Prayer," in the last clause, substitute "Morning or Evening Prayer."

2. That the Rubric next before the commandments be not approved.

3. That "Thanks be to Thee, O Lord," after the Gospel, be omitted.

4. In the Rubric, before the Nicene Creed, for "Morning Prayer" substitute "Morning or Evening Prayer."

5. That the last clause of the Rubric next after the Offertory sentences, viz: "And when the alms are presented, there may be sung or said an Offertory Anthem," be omitted.

6. That the change in the Rubric, after the Prayer for the Church Militant, allowing the exhortation, "Dearly beloved in the Lord," to be omitted if it has been used once that same month, be not approved.

7. That the change in the Rubric before the Trisagion be not approved.

8. That the first of the group of Rubrics at the end of the Communion Office be amended, to read thus: "On any occasion of public worship (though there be no sermon or Communion) may be said all that is appointed at the Communion unto the end of the Gospel, concluding with the Blessing."

9. That the third of these Rubrics, viz: "And note that every communicant should receive the Communion at the least three times in the year," &c., be not approved.

> RESOLUTION XIII.—Public Baptism of Infants. "XIV.—Private Baptism of Children. "XV.—Adult Baptism.

We recommend the adoption of these resolutions.

#### **RESOLUTION XVI.**—Confirmation.

We recommend the following amendments:

I. That in the first Rubric the words "sitting in his chair near the Holy Table" be omitted.

2. That in the first Rubric the words "the people standing until the Lord's Prayer," be omitted.

3. That the Introduction of the Lesson from Acts 8th be not approved.

4. That the form of presenting the candidates (c) be not approved.

5. That the questions and answers under (d) be not approved.

6. Omit "then" before "here," in the question "Do ye then here," &c.

7. That the Rubric permitting a hymn after the first prayer be not approved.

8. That in place of the Rubric, next after the Blessing, be substituted this Rubric, viz: "There shall none be confirmed until they be ready and desirous to be admitted to the Holy Communion."

## **RESOLUTION XVII.**—Marriage Service.

We recommend that this resolution be adopted, with the amendment-

I. That the change in the Rubric as to giving and receiving the ring be not approved.

## **RESOLUTION XVIII.**—Visitation of Sick.

We recommend to adopt with the amendment that, in the prayer "In prolonged sickness," the sentence, "Let not any pain or passion discompose the order and decency of his thoughts and duty," be omitted.

**Resolution XIX.**—Communion of Sick.

We recommend that the change in the first Rubric of "two" into "one," as the least number to commune with the sick, be not approved.

## **RESOLUTION XX.**—Burial Service.

We recommend the following amendments:

I. That the Rubric after the Lesson be changed to read: "Here may be sung a Hymn or an Anthem, and at the discretion of the minister such fitting prayers as are elsewhere provided in this book may be said."

2. In the Rubric, before the sentence of committal, omit "the" before "earth."

3. Substitute the words "been pleased" for "hastened" in the prayer. "Most merciful Father, who hast hastened," &c.

4. In the prayer next after, substitute "be" for the words "find ourselves."

We recommend that the following be adopted :

**RESOLUTION XXVIII.**—Consecration of a Church.

We recommend the following amendment:

I. That the omitted Rubric after the Proper Lessons be restored and changed to read thus: "Morning Prayer being ended, there may be sung a Hymn or an Anthem."

## **RESOLUTION XXIX.**—Embracing the Institution Office.

*Resolved*. That the following verbal alterations be made in this service as in the proposed book :

(a). Under C, in the Letter of Institution, substitute for the word "sacerdotal" the word "ministerial," so as to read "ministerial function," "ministerial relation." The reasons for this proposition are—

Ist. That the word "sacerdotal" is nowhere used in the Prayer Book to describe the functions of a Minister and the relations between him and the congregation. It is a new term introduced into this service. The term "Minister," is the name for Priests and Deacons in the Rubrical laws and the Liturgical forms of the Prayer Book, and should be used in this office for that reason, apart from other considerations.

2d. The term "sacerdotal" is inadequate and inappropriate in the connection in which it is proposed to be used, and is therefore a literary blemish. The passages in the Bishop's Letter, where it occurs, refer to the entire relations between the Minister and the Parish, prescribing the conditions of their permanence, or the manner and the authority for their dissolution. It is obvious that a term should be used describing and comprehending all the relations between the Minister and the Parish. The term "sacerdotal," even in the conception of those who advocate its use, as applied to the functions and the office of a Minister of a Parish, describes only a limited portion of those functions. The term "ministerial" comprehends the sacerdotal relation, and, besides, all the other relations which a Minister sustains to a Parish or a congregation.

( $\delta$ ). Substitute for the word "altar," wherever it occurs in the Rubric of the Office of Institution, the phrase "Communion Table." The term "altar"

is unknown to the Rubrical law of this Church, save in this office. The legal and the uniform designation throughout the Prayer Book is "Communion Table." To render the Rubrics consistent and uniform, especially in the use of legal terms, seems an obvious duty of a Revision Committee. The substitution of the term "altar" for "Communion Table" in the Rubric of one office, and that comparatively unimportant, and seldom used, would require very clear reasons, both upon literary and legal grounds, to explain and to justify it. It is clear that no such reasons exist.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

*Resolved*, That this Council commits to its Deputies to the General Convention the recommendations of this Report to be presented to that body without expressing any opinion thereupon.

*Resolved*, That in the opinion of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia the whole subject of the Revision of the Book of Common Prayer be recommitted to the learned body of Revisers, to whose faithful labors we owe the valuable suggestions of the Book Annexed. We believe that the work may be greatly improved if subjected to deliberate reconsideration, and thus improved by the Convention of 1886, it may be ready for final adoption by the Convention of 1889.

Rev. B. D. Tucker presented the following as a substitute :

Whereas, The Council of the Diocese of Virginia deems it inexpedient and unnecessay at this time to make any change in the Book of Common Prayer,

*Resolved*, That the Council recommend that the alterations and amendments to the Book of Common Prayer, approved by the last General Convention and sent down to this Diocese be not approved; and

*Resolved*, That the Delegates to the General Convention be instructed to oppose any change in the Book of Common Prayer.

The substitute of Rev. B. D. Tucker was lost.

The resolutions of Rt. Rev. A. M. Randolph were carried.

Rev. Dr. Walker, from the Committee on New Parishes, presented the following: Report of Committee on New Parishes.

As Chairman of the Committee on the Division of Parishes, I would respectfully report :

That the committee have had before them a petition from members of Whittle Parish, Fauquier county, asking for a division of the same, and the setting off of a new Parish to be called Randolph Parish: of which petition due canonical notice has been given to the Bishop and the vestry of said Parish.

Accompanying this petition, is a protest, signed by eleven members of the vestry, with reasons against the division. The committee find themselves unable to *agree*—upon a vote, are equally divided.

The portion of the committee disagreeing to the division are persuaded that it will prove inimical to the permanent interests of the Parish.

The fact of the protest of so large a portion of the vestry, irrespective of any reasons given, has its weight. With this protest, however, are statements of fact, as to the annual collections of the Treasurer, and, consequently, of the average of the contributing willingness of the community, which serve to show that the old Parish, by the division, will be weakened, and that it will be only with extraordinary effort and liberality that the new Parish can be permanently sustained.

In view of these considerations, this portion of the committee find that they cannot recommend the division asked for in the petition.

C. WALKER. O. A. KINSOLVING, R. A. GOODWIN.

. Mr. P. H. Powers, from the same Committee, presented the following:

The undersigned, a portion of the committee to whom was referred the petition of certain members of the church of Whittle Parish, asking for a division of said Parish by certain lines as indicated in said petition, and the establishment of a new Parish, to be known as Randolph Parish, beg leave to report that they have given careful and thorough consideration to the matter referred to them in all its aspects, including the calling forth by parol testimony of exact and explicit information upon certain fundamental points necessarily having a controlling influence in deciding the question before them.

This testimony has conclusively established in our minds these facts :

rst. That the requirements of the ecclesiastical law, as necessarily precedent to the consideration of a division of a Parish, have been complied with.

2d. That from extent of territory, number of inhabitants, and wide separation of churches, the work now incumbent upon the rector of Whittle Parish is more than one minister can adequately perform.

3d. That the petitioners have ample resources to build a church and to support a minister, and have given satisfactory assurance of an earnest and determined desire and intention to do so.

4th. That the division asked for leaves to Whittle Parish all the church property, including three churches and a comfortable rectory, and withdraws from its support, of those now contributing, only one or two contributors.

In view of these facts, and with a firm conviction that a division will inure to the benefit of Whittle Parish, will build up a church and congregation with all their appliances for good in a field now much neglected, and redound to the glory of God, we recommend that the petition be granted.

### Report of Committee on Lack of Candidates for Orders.

The Committee, to whom was referred so much of the report of the Bishop as relates to the greatly diminished number of candidates for Holy Orders, have had the same under consideration, and after a careful interchange of views, beg leave to report the following resolutions:

I. That there be prepared, printed and circulated, under the direction of the Bishop and Assistant Bishop, three earnest appeals in the form of *tracts*.

First. One addressed to Christian parents, urging on them the duty of bringing before their sons the duty of preaching the everlasting Gospel of the Son of God.

Second. One to all the members of the Church, urging on them the duty, by *direct* means, to bring to the attention of young men the claims of the sacred ministry.

And last, a special appeal to Christian young men, setting forth the claims of God on them to enter His service as Ministers of the Gospel.

*Resolved*, 2. That the Rectors of churches be earnestly requested to bring the claims of the sacred ministry before their congregations at least once each year.

*Resolved*, 3. That one of the Professors of the Seminary, or some other suitable Clergyman, be urged to visit the several literary institutions of the State, and seek opportunities, at appropriate times, of enlisting the interest of Christian young men to consider the duty of studying for the sacred ministry.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church desire to express their gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, for the measure of His grace vouchsafed us during the past year. He has blessed our Bishops and clergy with

health and strength, has given them "a mind to work," and the results of that work as gathered from the Bishops' addresses and the Parochial reports, as far as received, are, on the whole, encouraging. The number of confirmations, of churches consecrated, of mission stations established and old Parishes revived; the condition of our Seminary Fund, the number of our Postulants for Holy Orders—six of whom are colored—are, all of them, causes for thankfulness, and indicate a healthy if not a rapid growth of the Church.

Through an unfortunate omission in the form of Parochial Reports sent out to the clergy we have no complete returns of our Sunday School work, a portion of our labors which is of the highest importance.

We should like to know whether the number of the lambs of the flocks have increased through the year; how many have attended the services of God's House; how many have been confirmed; how many public catechizings the ministers have held, and whatever else might indicate to us the spiritual condition of those who are the seed of the future Church.

For need we remind our Christian people that no part of God's Church can be spiritually healthy and prosperous where the training of the young is neglected or superficial, where the home influence is not positively and strongly for God, and where, by the guarding and guiding hand of parents, sponsors and pastors, the young are not kept from "the temptations of the world, the flesh and the devil."

Brethren of the clergy, are the lambs of your flocks duly sheltered and cared for?

Brethren of the laity, have you earnestly sought to frame the lives of your households, by the teachings of the Holy Word, by the training powers of the Church, and by the influence of your own godly walk and conversation?

And here, while deploring the laxity which prevails among many professing Christians, with regard to the observance of the Lord's day in general, we cannot refrain from uttering our solemn protest and warning against one most fruitful source of Sabbath desecration, the admission into our homes of the so-called Sunday newspapers and periodicals The great and growing prevalence of this evil means serious danger to the spiritual health of our people, and especially our young people, pre-occupying their minds with vain and worldly thoughts, and often, by their seductive influence, detain ing many from God's house.

We therefore earnestly exhort you, brethren, both by word and example. to condemn these things, that your own heart and the hearts of your households may be open, at least upon God's holy day, to the pure influence and teaching of His sacred Word.

It is with sorrow that we note the fact, emphasized by the Bishop in his report, of the marked falling off in the number of young men seeking admission into the ministry of this Church. While twenty-seven candidates for Priest's Orders were enrolled last year, there are but fourteen this, with a corresponding decrease in the students attending our Seminary. The spir-

itual growth and progress of the Church is inseparably allied both with the number and character of those who seek and gain admission to the ranks of her ministry. And though it is sadly true the church needs men for her various fields ripe for the harvest, it is also true she needs them earnest, devoted, Christlike men as well. Upon pastors, sponsors, and parents devolves, therefore, the grave responsibility of seeking out and finding those of such character, and laying upon their hearts for prayerful consideration the question of their own inward call and consecration to the ministry of this Church. For, to use the language of our Bishop in his report, "While no one, in my opinion, should ever urge or advise another to enter the ministry, except under very peculiar circumstances, yet every man who consecrates himself soul and body to the service of Christ in confirmation, might have his mind directed to the subject, and be induced to seriously and prayerfully consider whether he is not called of God to this sacred office."

The work among the colored people, of which you are fully informed in the reports of the Bishops and others, though attended by peculiar embarrassments and difficulties, and straitened in many quarters for lack of adequate funds, gives, on the whole, great cause for thankfulness and encouragement. Trusting that the plan matured by the present Council may tend to its better and more efficient organization, we earnestly commend the work as the cause of Christ and His Church to the sympathy, the prayers, and the support of all our people.

Your Committee regret to note a considerable decrease in the aggregate of contributions as shown by the parochial reports, due in great part, no doubt, to the unusually large number of non-reporting parishes. But the falling off in this respect-if falling off there be-is hardly matter of surprise in view of the general business depression which has affected all interests, secular as well as religious. Under this head, however, we are gratified to mark a notable exception in the receipts of the Diocesan Missionary Society, which have almost reached the amount of last year and prove that notwithstanding their financial distress, our people, both Clergy and Laity, are more and more realizing the urgent claims of this great agency for the spread and support of the Church in this Diocese, and upon whose fostering care more than one-third of our Parishes depend as beneficiaries, and forasmuch as this blessed work can neither increase nor continue without the hearty and united co-operation of our Parishes, your Committee earnestly invoke for this Society the faithful prayers and liberal, systematic offerings of our people. All of which is respectfully submitted by the Committee.

#### Report of Committee on Finance.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey presented the report of the Committee on Finance :

The Committee on Finance respectfully report that they have examined the accounts of the Treasurer, James T. Gray, Esq., and found them correct, and sustained by proper vouchers. The Committee are indebted to Mr. Gray, not only for the admirable manner in which the accounts with the Diocese are kept, but for valuable information as to the financial condition of the Diocese.

At the commencement of the fiscal year, 1885-6, the amount due to the State Bank of Virginia was \$1,865.46. The receipts on account of dues to the Contingent Fund last year were \$10,770.44, which amount, compared with that of the year before, which was \$9,562.92, shows an increase of receipts of \$1,207.50; that increase would have been much larger had the obligation of the communicants and parishes to pay what is due for the support of the working forces of the Diocese been recognized more generally, as being the same as that which binds parishioners to pay for the support of the Parish and its ministry. There is to the credit of the Diocese, as shown by the Treasurer's account, the sum of \$30.08. It will be seen, however, that the Treasurer, in order to supply the wants of the Diocese, borrowed \$1,605, which must be paid out of the present receipts; the result will be, that the Diocese commences the present fiscal year with a debt of \$1,574.92.

The evil of delinquencies in Contingent Fund account still continues. Notwithstanding the earnest appeal made in the Committee's last year's report to the delinquents, to come forward and settle the balances due from them, the Treasurer's report shows that since June, 1885, only \$585.69 have been paid on arrearages, old and new. This chronic debt, which, up to 1884, as was shown by the last report, amounted to \$15,163.93, instead of being diminished is increasing yearly. The time has past when ignorance of the needs of the Diocese can be plead as an excuse for delinquencies in paying what is due to the Diocese. There is no longer a surplus in the Treasury, but a debt due from it, and the amount of \$2,600 invested in United States' four per cents, will, ere long, be called upon to rescue the Diocese from discreditable indebtedness. From a large number of churches and Parishes no reports are made at all; from many no reports of communicants are made, and amounts paid in are sadly disproportioned to the true amounts due. Some churches fail to send in the number of their communicants, and while it is known that the amounts paid by them do not equal what the number of their communicants requires to be paid in, still they avoid the discredit of being published as delinquent for any specific amounts. As has been often shown before, there would be no difficulty in meeting all the expenses of the Diocese, ordinary as well as extraordinary (such as those of the General Convention which will fall upon the Treasury this year), if the parishes and churches paid at the rate of one dollar for each communicant. Now that the salaries of the Evangelists have ceased to be chargeable on the Treasury,

the income from the assessments ought to have met current expenses and left a surplus. But such is not the case, and this year there will be a serious deficiency. The ordinary expenses for the current year, unless salaries be curtailed, will, as shown by the Treasurer's report, be not less than \$10,509.98. Last year they were estimated at \$9,495.89, omitting \$2,050 for the Evangelists, showing an underestimate of \$1,014.09 If for this year there be added \$1,000 for General Convention charges, and the debt presently due of \$1,574.92, it will appear that we must meet during the current fiscal year charges in the Treasury of \$13,084.90. The largest estimate of receipts from the assessments will not yield more than \$11 000, so that our debt will be seriously increased instead of being diminished during the current year. In their last report the Committee suggested two modes of meeting the difficulty : First, the curtailment of salaries, and second, more effective efforts to secure payments to the Contingent Fund. The salaries of the Evangelists were discontinued, and the salary of the Historiographer reduced to \$200. Your Committee are not yet prepared to advise the reduction of the salaries of the examining Chaplains and Secretaries, and still less those of the Bishops. On the line of curtailment, however, they suggest that the expenses of printing and distributing the JOURNAL and other matters for Diocesan use seem to be large, and while at present they submit no resolution on the subject, they advise the Secretary to use his best efforts to lessen the expense, by competition or otherwise, as he may deem most judicious.

The second suggestion of your committee is that more effective efforts to secure payments to the Contingent Fund of assessments for Diocesan sup port. How can this be accomplished? We reply, that the only sure and effective mode is by such amendments of the Constitution and Canons as will place the support of the Diocese upon a business basis. Upon what principle these assessments shall be made, whether upon number of communicants, or upon proportionate ability to pay, will be matters for consideration. In order that the entire subject may be duly considered and a well digested plan for a reliable Diocesan system of finance and support may be adopted, your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution :

*Resolved*, That a committee of seven, to consist of three clergymen, three laymen, and the treasurer of the Diocese, be appointed to consider and report at the next Council upon the matters referred to in this report.

Judge Sheffey then presented the following :

The Committee on Finance recommend for adoption the following resolutions—

I. That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the customary charges in the Diocese for salaries of the Bishop, Assistant Bishop, Secretary, Chaplains, Historiographer, and other expenses, including the amount for rent of a residence for the Assistant Bishop, and the further sum of \$50 to the Assistant Secretary and \$15 to the sexton of Christ church, Charlottesville, and that he pay the cost of such repairs of the Episcopal residence as may be needed.

2. That the ministers of the Church in the Diocese be requested to read at an early day the report of the Committee on Finance to their respective congregations, and urge upon such as are delinquent the necessity of promptness in providing the necessary means for the support of the Diocese.

3. That in addition to those usually distributed outside of the Diocese, the Secretary forward to each of the Bishops and to every minister of the Diocese a copy of the JOURNAL, when printed, without charge, and furnish so many copies thereof as the vestries of the respective churches may order for themselves and others, to be paid for at the rate of twenty five cents a copy.

Whereas. our beloved Bishop, to the great regret of the Council, feels constrained to return to his home. therefore

*Resolved*, That the Council earnestly and affectionately requests the Assistant Bishop to have the usual closing services and to make the usual closing address to-morrow night.

Unanimously carried.

Mr. H. W. Sheffey presented the report of the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute:

The Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute submit to the Council their annual report.

Report of Trustees of Virginia Female Institute.

To fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. D. B. Tennant, late of Petersburg, the trustees have chosen the Rt. Rev. A. M. Randolph as a member of the Board of Trustees.

The interest on the Institute debt has been paid to the 1st day of April, 1886.

The report of Mrs. Stuart, the principal of the Institute, shows still more gratifying evidence of the success of the Institute, and of increased favor and confidence among its patrons.

The number of boarding pupils is sixty-four. For several months there were sixty-seven.

Ten of the pupils were confirmed at the visitation by the Assistant Bishop in April last. Indeed, year after year this Institution proves itself more and more to be a nursery of the Church and a centre of Christian influence throughout our broad land.

In her report Mrs. Stuart says "the number of pupils on the 1st of October was sixty-seven—twenty-five of these being from Virginia." This evidence of increased patronage from Virginia is most gratifying. Mrs. Stuart adds: "There are in the school this year representatives from fourteen States and five Protestant Churches besides our own." Four of the ten candidates for confirmation had been baptized by the Rector of the Parish the Sunday before the Bishop's visitation.

Mrs. Stuart again calls the attention of liberal and Christian laymen to the matter of scholarships. She says: "Help in the form of scholarships—that is, free tuition in English and Latin—has been extended by the principal to six boarders and two day pupils. The demand was urgent, and no response from outside has as yet been made to the earnest appeal of last year. Will it continue unnoticed?"

To endow such scholarships will not cost a great deal, and the Trustees earnestly commend the subject to the attention of those who are interested in Christian education for the daughters of the Church. Mrs. Stuart further says:

"The health of the School has been excellent, and, as a whole, the standard of scholarship well maintained." The number of the Faculty is to be increased to sixteen, and to be composed of three gentlemen and thirteen ladies.

"Our aim," says Mrs. Stuart, in her admirable report, "is to be thorough in every branch taught, and to inspire each pupil with a high sense of right, and a desire to attain all that is noble and true in woman. We bespeak the prayers and help of our Diocesan Council."

The Trustees, renewing their cordial expressions of commendation of the Institute, ask the Council to adopt the following resolution:

*Resolved*. That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, recognizing the Virginia Female Institute as one of the Institutions of the Diocese, and as a School which is becoming more and more not only a nursery of truly

refined culture and womanly education, but also as one of the missions of the Church for the ingathering of its daughters into the sacred fold. And being gratified by the evidences of its increased success and usefulness, the Council most cordially commends it to the continued patronage of the Diocese, and earnestly unites with the Principal and Trustees in appealing to the liberal for the means of aiding in the education of those who need kindly help.
