GENERAL REGULATIONS.

Bishop Whittle then read his Annual Address:

Rev. and Dear Brethren :

My first service after the adjournment of our last Council was May 30th, 1886, when, assisted by Rev. Messrs. Lawrence, G. W. Nelson, and the rector, I consecrated Grace Memorial Church, Lexington, and preached the sermon. This is a massive, costly, and beautiful building of lime stone, erected, after many years of prayer and effort under the faithful ministry of the late Rev. W. N. Pendleton, D. D. (whose funeral was, I believe, the first service held in the completed edifice), for the worship of Almighty God and in memory of the character and services of the great General Robert E. Lee. At night, in same church, after sermon by Rev. Mr. Nelson, confirmed five.

June 4.—Preached in Emmanuel, Front Royal, and, at the request of the rector, baptized an infant.

June 5.-Preached in St. Thomas, Middletown.

June 6.-Meade Memorial, White Post, confirmed two.

June 7.—Christ Church, Millwood, confirmed six.

June 8.-Grace, Berryville, confirmed eleven.

June 9.-Wickliffe Church, Clarke county, confirmed two.

June 11.—Attended the chaplain's examination of the colored divinity students in Petersburg.

June 15-16.—Assisted in the examinations at the Theological Seminary.

June 22-25.—Attended the meeting of the trustees and the closing exercises of the Seminary, and on the last day admitted three members of the graduating class to Deacons' Orders.

June 29.—Preached in St. John's Church, Hampton, ordained the assistant minister, Rev. William N. Meade, Presbyter, and confirmed four, of whom two were Indians. Rev. Messrs. Tucker, Reese, the rector and others assisted in the services.

July 9.—Admitted three of the colored divinity students in Petersburg to Deacons' Orders.

August 29.—Christ Church, Warm Springs, Bath county, baptized an adult, preached, and confirmed six. This church was then and is now without a rector.

September 5.—Conducted the service and preached morning and night in Emmanuel Church, Goodson, which was and still is vacant.

September 6.—St. Thomas, Abingdon, confirmed six.

September 7.-Preached in Grace Church, Glade Spring.

September 8.—Preached in Christ Church, Marion—the rectorship vacant.

September 9.—St. Thomas, Wytheville, preached and confirmed sixteen. This church building had been much enlarged and improved since my last visit, which indicated the prosperity of the parish under its energetic and faithful pastor.

September 10.-McGill Memorial (vacant), preached and confirmed one.

September 12.—Preached morning and night in the Stras Memorial Church, Tazewell Courthouse.

September 14.—Our own building not being finished, preached in the Baptist Church, Pocahontas—which was kindly loaned us—and confirmed seven.

September 15.—St. James', Central, confirmed four.

September 17.-Christ Church, Blacksburg, confirmed twelve.

September 19.—Consecrated St. Paul's, Salem, Roanoke county, and, after sermon by Rev. R. A. Goodwin, confirmed eight. This was a small brick building, which had been enlarged to a commodious and handsome church. At night of the same day conducted service, preached, and confirmed ten in St John's, Roanoke, which was then without a minister, but is now served by Rev. William H. Meade, D. D.

September 26.—Old Church, Chase City, confirmed three.

September 27.-St. James', Boydton, confirmed three.

September 28.—Preached in St. Luke's, Mecklenburg.

September 29.—Grace, Mecklenburg, confirmed one.

October 3.—At the request of the rector, baptized an infant in St. John's, Lunenburg, preached, and confirmed two; and in the afternoon, in Trinity Chapel (colored), confirmed nine.

Soon after my return from the General Convention, which was near the end of October, I set out on a visitation, extending through nearly two weeks, of the colored congregations of Brunswick and Mecklenburg counties. Most of the way I was accompanied by Rev. Messrs. E. B. Jones and J. S. Russell, to whom I am indebted for acceptable help, the former preaching twice and the latter once, besides assisting in the services. On every occasion I preached, or made an address, and celebrated the Lord's Supper. What I saw

May.

and heard of these colored congregations—the large attendance, their apparent interest in, and attachment to, our services, the numbers confirmed, their humble, but earnest efforts to build themselves churches, and the testimony borne by the whites to their good influence on the surrounding communities—was most gratifying. And I here take occasion to say that anything which may be given to aid these people to complete any of the seven churches which they have commenced will be worthily bestowed and gratefully received.

November 9.-Trinity Church, Brunswick, confirmed four.

November 10.-St. James' (colored), confirmed one.

November 11.-St. Thomas' (colored), confirmed twenty.

November 12.—St. Andrew's, confirmed one, and St. Paul's (colored), confirmed six.

November 13.-Diamond Grove (colored), confirmed fifteen.

November 14.—St. Martha's, Brunswick, confirmed forty five, and St. Mary's, Mecklenburg, confirmed thirty-five.

November 15.—St. Mark's, Mecklenburg (colored), confirmed twenty.

November 16.—Grace (which was loaned by the white vestry for the occasion), confirmed seventeen, colored.

November 17.—St. Paul's Chapel (colored), confirmed forty-nine. November 27.—Preached in St. John's Church, Nansemond county, and confirmed one.

November 28.—In the morning preached in the Glebe Church, and at night in St. Paul's and confirmed five.

December 5.—St. James', Louisa Courthouse, preached and confirmed two. Had appointments for night and the next morning at Gordonsville, which I was unable to fill, because of an unusually severe snow-storm.

December 14.—In St. Paul's, Norfolk, after sermon by Rev. A. S. Lloyd, the Rev. B. D. Tucker presented J. H. M. Pollard, a colored Deacon, who was admitted to Priest's orders.

December 19.-St. John's, Richmond, confirmed nine.

1887, January 12.—St. Stephen's, Petersburg, ordained George F. Bragg, Jr., Deacon.

February 6.—Officiated morning and alternoon in Christ Church, Williamsburg, reading prayers, preaching, celebrating the Lord's Supper, and confirming eighteen. The church was and still is without a pastor.

February 9.—St. Stephen's, Petersburg, admitted J. S. Russell (colored), Deacon, to Priest's orders.

From February 24th to March 1st, was at the Theological Seminary going over the Prayer-Book with the senior class, by request of the Board of Trustees. And I will remark that I was most favorably impressed by the earnestness and fidelity of professors and students in their attention to their respective duties.

March 6th.—Assisted by Rev. J. R. Hubard, the rector being absent on account of sickness, preached in St. John's Church, Portsmouth, confirmed eight and celebrated the Lord's Supper. At night preached in Trinity Church and confirmed eighteen.

March 13.—Christ Church, Norfolk, confirmed thirty-one; St. Paul's, twenty; and St. Luke's, thirty.

March 14.—Consecrated St. Peter's Church, Brambleton. Brambleton, then a beautiful suburb, is now within the corporate limits of Norfolk, and has a population of about 3,000. The Church is a comfortable and pretty frame building, on a large and valuable lot, with a good and self-supporting congregration and a minister of their own, all the result of the faithful labors of Rev. B. D. Tucker, of St. Paul's, Norfolk.

March 15.—Preached in the morning in Eastern Shore Chapel, Princess Anne county, and confirmed twelve, and at night in St. Peter's, Brambleton, and confirmed sixteen.

March 16.—Preached in Emmanuel, Kempsville, and in the Holy Innocents' (colored), Norfolk, and confirmed six.

Nowhere in the Diocese is there a larger field for our Church amongst the colored people, or one where its elevating and sanctifying influences are more needed than in the city of Norfolk. The minister who is laboring amongst them has much to encourage him, but they are sadly in want of a suitable church building, and can hope to accomplish comparatively but little until this want is supplied. The congregation of the Holy Innocents, I am persuaded, are ready to contribute the extent of their ability towards the erection of a church, but they are poor, very poor, and must have help from those whom God has made stewards of more of the good things of this world. Would that our brethren, Clerical and Lay, of Norfolk, could be persuaded to take hold of this important work without delay and push to speedy completion.

March 20.—Grace Church, Petersburg, confirmed thirty-five, and St. Paul's, sixteen.

March 23.—Christ, Richmond, confirmed seventeen.

March 25.—St. John's, Richmond, confirmed fifty-six.

March 27.—St. John's, Petersburg, confirmed seven; The Good Shepherd, thirty-four; and St. Stephen's (colored), twenty-six.

March 30.-Monumental, Richmond, confirmed fourteen.

April 3.—Christ Church, Gordonsville, preached and confirmed six, and St. Paul's (colored) School, and confirmed nineteen. The colored work at this place, under Mrs. B. S. Brent, is most encouragingly successful.

April 6.—St. Paul's, Richmond, confirmed eleven.

April 8.—Good Friday. Trinity, Staunton, confirmed twenty-six. April 10.—Easter-Day. Preached morning and night in Grace Memorial, Lexington, and confirmed fourteen.

April 11.—Emmanuel, Harrisonburg, confirmed nine, one being colored.

April 12.—St. Andrew's, Mt. Jackson, confirmed four.

MINISTERS DECEASED.

It is my painful duty to report the deaths of two of our brethren of the clergy during the past year. The Rev. Edmund C. Murdaugh, D. D., went as a candidate for Orders to Alabama, and was ordained Deacon by Bishop Cobbs, January 6, 1845. After laboring for a number of years in that diocese, he returned to Virginia, to Martin's-

Brandon and Southwark Parishes, whence he removed, for a short time, to Maryland, and finally to Fredericksburg as rector of St. George's Church. Subsequently he organized Trinity Church, in the same place, and became its first rector, in which charge he died, November 7, 1886, after a ministry of nearly forty-two years. He was earnest and diligent in the Master's work, and abundant in labors, especially amongst the poor. Having fought a good fight and kept the faith, and finished his course, he has doubtless entered into the joy of his Lord.

The Rev. Dabney M. Wharton, after a pilgrimage of more than four score years, departed this life at his home, in Westmoreland county, May 4, 1887. Ordained by Bishop Moore, July 10, 1834; he passed the greater part, if not the whole, of his humble, gentle and earnest ministry of more than fifty-two years in the counties of Spotsylvania and Westmoreland. He had no regular charge for some time before his death, and, although feeble from infirm health and the weight of years, yet, constrained by the love of Christ, he continued to labor, as he had opportunity, to the last. He was truly a good man, full of the Holy Ghost, and, by his godly life and conversation, adorned the doctrine of God his Saviour in all things. All who enjoyed the privilege of his acquaintance may well bless God for the good example of this His servant, who, having finished his course in faith, now rests from his labors.

Bishop's Report.

There are at this time at least forty of our churches, in as many as twenty-five different counties, which have no regular ministerial services. To provide in some measure for this deplorable state of things the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society at their last meeting made provision for the employment of an Evangelist, and one will be appointed as soon as a suitable man can be found. To say nothing of carrying the church into new fields, or of building it up in feeble parishes, the statement just made shows the supreme importance of sustaining our Missionary Society, and that I cannot too earnestly urge my brethren of the clergy not to fail to call on their people to contribute liberally to its funds.

During the past year, three kind friends of the negroes have enabled the trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School to purchase a valuable piece of property, of nearly six acres, with two sets of buildings, beautifully situated on one of the principal streets of Petersburg, at a cost of about nine thousand dollars. One of the buildings is occupied by the colored divinity students, and the other by a normal school, Rev. R. A. Goodwin Principal, with a boarding department for girls under the management of Mrs. Payne, widow of Bishop Payne, who resides in the house. Altogether, the work amongst the colored people, involving many and great difficulties, is encouraging to those who are engaged in it.

A session of our General Convention was held last October in the city of Chicago. A number of unimportant changes in the Prayer Book, which had been proposed by the preceding, were adopted by this Convention, and are now, of course, parts of our Liturgy.

The House of Deputies occupied several days in discussing a proposition to change the name of the church, the object being to get rid of the title "Protestant Episcopal." The proposition was lost by a small majority, but will no doubt be renewed in the next Convention, and with every prospect of success. What the Bishops will do if the question shall be brought before them no one can say.

The fact that the movement met with such favor in the House of Deputies has created widespread surprise and alarm. But why should it be so regarded by any who are acquainted with the history of events during the past fifty years? It is simply the seed which has been sown and permitted to grow, bringing forth fruit after its kind, and which might have been looked for as a matter of course. As you are aware, each of my predecessors, Bishops Moore, Meade

and Johns, and many other true and faithful men, solemnly warned the Church, from time to time, that Romish teaching and practices, contrary to the Word of God and condemned by our standards, were being privily brought in amongst us, which would ultimately destroy the Scriptural and Protestant character of our commu-These innovations have continued to increase with such nion. steadiness and rapidity, without hindrance or even rebuke. that in many places, and by many of our clergy, doctrines are openly and boastfully taught and ceremonies observed, for protesting against which our fathers were burned at the stake. It is not not strange, then, but just what might have been expected, that these Romanizers, having changed for themselves the Church, should wish to change the name also, and adopt another suited to the new order of things. I cannot trust myself to discuss this subject; but there are two questions which, it seems to me, we are bound to consider. First, is it not our duty to make an effort to change the organization of our General Convention and to constitute it on a basis of something like justice and equality, so that a small minority of our ministers and members shall not have the power, through their representatives, as now, to legislate for the large majority? And, second, are we of Virginia (whatever other dioceses may do) going to submit to the effort of this minority to undo the work of the Reformation for us and our children, unprotestantize our Church and carry us back to Rome?

May He who is the Fountain of all Wisdom direct us in all our doings with His most gracious favor, and further us with His continual help, to the glory of His holy name.

Bishop Randolph then read his Annual Address:

ADDRESS OF BISHOP RANDOLPH.

BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

Before I begin to read the record of visits to the Parishes, I must express my regret that circumstances compelled me, in the fall and in the early spring, to relinquish work which I had hoped to accomplish. After the General Convention I had planned to visit the churches in the counties bordering upon the Rappahannock and Potomac rivers, but was prevented from doing so by lameness, the result of an accident, which interfered with my ability to travel. In the early spring I was confined at my home, in Richmond, by sickness in my family. I hope to make up for this lack of work in the coming year.

CHURCHES CONSECRATED.

Trinity Church, Pittsylvania county, was consecrated on the 13th of September, 1886. The Rev. George Funsten and the Rev. Dr. Dame assisted in the services. The church is a neat Gothic building,

with a seating capacity for 175 persons. The congregation was organized and the church was erected under the pastoral care and the missionary ministrations of the Rev. Dr. Dame, Rector of Epiphany Church, Danville. The history of the work of the Rev. Dr. Dame in building up the Episcopal Church in the city of Danville, and in planting churches in the counties adjacent beyond the limits of his own parish, is an encouraging record of the power of missionary zeal, fidelity and perseverance in the Christian ministry. For the half of a century his devoted work has resulted in the steady growth and extension of our Church throughout the portion of the Diocese of which Danville is the centre. Under our Church system the permanent pastorate with the missionary spirit is the strongest element of power and steady growth. Changes may be desirable for ministers, and, under exceptional circumstances, for Parishes. Where the support is absolutely inadequate, the removal of the pastor is not an open question. A migratory ministry is the necessary result of an ungenerous and parsimonious indifference among the laity in the provision made for the support of the clergy. Each year of faithful service increases the value of your pastor's ministrations to you and your children, and strengthens the hold of your church upon your community. Each year should find a congregation more generous and self-sacrificing in the expression of their sense of the value of ministerial fidelity. It is a blessing to a people when a good man abides among them and grows old in their service in the Gospel ministry.

On the 14th of February, St. Thomas' Church, Halifax county, was consecrated. This church, it is hoped, will unite with the churches at Mt. Laurel and Clover Depot, Halifax county, in the support of a minister. The Rev. Thomas Packard, under whose ministry this church was built and this congregation organized, and the Rev. Mr. Pender, assisted in the consecration service.

The occasion was the last service of the Rev. Mr. Packard in the Parish.

The Missionary Society, in response to a request from myself, were compelled to decline an appropriation for this new field, and Mr. Packard, finding the support inadequate to the needs of his family, accepted a call to the Diocese of Maryland.

I deeply regret his loss to the Diocese. As a scholar and a gentleman, and a devoted worker in the ministry, he has the confidence

and the admiration of the people of all classes in his Parishes, and of his brethren in the ministry.

On April the 6th, Grace Memorial Church at Lynwood, Rockingham county, was consecrated. The Rector, the Rev. G. Moseley Murray, the Rev. Dr. Wheat, and the Rev. O. S. Bunting, of Harrisonburg, assisted in the services. The church is Gothic in form, and both the exterior and interior are comely and graceful. The seating capacity is for two hundred persons. In addition there is a gallery for colored people, which is always well filled. The cost of the building is \$1,200-a specimen of economical construction. stands upon the field of the battle of Port Republic, and upon the spot where the fight was the hottest and the carnage the greatest. Nature heals the ravages that man has wrought in the earth, and the grass grows green upon the mounds of buried cities and from the blood of battle-fields. The gospel of peace that comes from the Lord of Nature heals the wounds of human passion, and survives the desolations of the wrongs and the strifes of men. This little valley was once covered with the pall of the smoke of battle, and echoed with the cries of combat and the thunder of artillery. Today it is peaceful, and consecrated to the gospel of peace, and the hills around it echo to the hymns of redemption. I cannot speak too warmly of the fidelity and enthusiasm of the minister of this Parish and his people in their work among the poor.

On the 11th of April, Emmanuel Chapel, near Boyce station, Clarke county, was consecrated. The Rev. Mr. Page, of Wickliffe, and the Rev. Mr. Phillips, of Berryville, with the Rector, the Rev. C. B. Bryan, assisted in the services. This work is the result of the efforts of the Rev. Mr. Bryan, the Rector, at Millwood, to extend the church to a class of people in a thickly settled community who have been practically without Gospel ministrations. Already the work has the tokens of the blessing of God upon the community and upon the Parish. My heart warms when I think of these consecration services, and the loving earnestness of these Rectors in their work among the poor.

In the month of June I visited the Diocesan School for girls at Staunton. Before coming to Virginia to live, my experience with large schools for girls in the great cities had, in some instances, produced feelings of depression with reference to the standards of female education. My visit to this school gave me the impression of

earnest and faithful and thorough work. The Principal and her corps of teachers appeared to me to be inspired with the desire to accomplish the best results in the development of mind and character in each pupil committed to their charge. I think the Diocese may congratulate itself in having such a school for the education of its daughters.

I assisted the Bishop in the ordinations at the Seminary on the 25th of June. I regret that so far I have not been able to attend the meetings of the various convocations to which I have been kindly invited. I am satisfied, by observation, of the good accomplished by these meetings of the clergy to the churches in the communities where they are held and upon those who participated in them. As missionary organizations, they promise more and more to become most important agents for the extension and the building up of the Church. I would most earnestly advise the clergy to be faithful in their attendance upon them. If you cannot attend, at least write a letter to the Secretary expressing your sympathy and explaining the cause of your absence. The age we live in is expressing its sense of the power of co-operative work by forming associations in every department of knowledge and of progressive industry.

It is but the working out of a Gospel principle into all the activities of man's tomporal life. The world is learning it from Christ and from the Christian Church. The law of sympathy with one another is as much a part of the Christian code as prayer and worship and faith. Sympathy not only with each other's joys and sorrows, but practical and personal sympathy with each other's work, and in the common aim of the body to which we belong. A minister's field and first duty is to his own Parish, but he misses the strength which comes from sympathy with his brother-workers when he gravitates into the habit of never looking beyond his own field of labor. Have this mind in you, which was also in Christ Jesus—not looking each of you to his own things, but each of you also to the things of others. It is good for us, it is good for the great cause, when we meet to strengthen each other's hands and cheer each other's hearts in the work of the Lord and Master whom we serve.

These meetings tend to break the loneliness which is sometimes a trial and a discouragement to the pastors of our country churches, and out of them spring personal friendships which cement the clergy

of a community and a diocese into a living brotherhood. We should try to make the brotherhood of the Christian ministry a reality, and to keep it so.

When a brother is in trouble, write him a letter of sympathy. When he is in joy, tell him that you share his joy. When he preaches a good sermon, grasp his hand and tell him that his sermon helped you. So far from contributing to vanity and conceit, it will humble him, and help him as he stands again to do his Master's work.

Sympathy with one another is the practical bond of unity in the Church, and under its genial influence, alienations are healed and new energies for work are born. Sympathy is not, as we are ready to suppose, a question of temperament; for we are all narrow and selfbound by nature. It is a question of contact with Christ, and it widens and deepens as we get closer to Him.

The imitation of Christ is not impossible to any of us; for in the power of His spirit, His perfections may become ours, and His strength may grow fair and noble out of all our human weakness.

Perhaps it is well for persons in the position which we, your Bishops, occupy, to embrace every opportunity to remind our brethren of these elementary Gospel principles, which form the blessing and the strength of the Gospel ministry.

The order of the day, the proposed amendment to Art. II of the Constitution, was then taken up, by which it was proposed to strike out the words "minister" and "clergyman" wherever they occurred, and insert the word "Presbyter."

On motion of Rev. R. A. Goodwin, the subject was laid on the table.

Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., presented the annual report of the Board of Managers of the Fund for the Relief of the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen, which was referred to the Committee on Widows and Orphans.

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund respectfully report: That in consequence of the large demand upon the income of the Board, *no increase* has been made the past year to the amount of capital invested. It remains \$22,580 in bonds, with market value of \$27,494.97.

A committee of the Board having examined into the state of the securities, found them safe and profitable investments, and in accordance with the report of our Treasurer.

It will at once be seen that the income from the above sum, being less than \$1,500, can afford to the families of our *fifteen* beneficiaries a very meagre amount of help and comfort. We are compelled, then, to fall back upon the annual contributions of our Parishes to furnish the necessary means for the bare sustenance of the widows and orphans of our deceased brethren. And yet, to this important and vital object of charity more than one-half of our churches—and among them some of our richest ones—have contributed during the last year nol one cent. The amount received by our Treasurer from only seventy-seven parishes and churches was \$985.41. We have been obliged, then, to reduce the amounts appropriated in a majority of cases. The sum to be distributed was only \$2,210, and although death has removed two of our beneficiaries, one new family has been added to our list, and the number of families remains the same—viz: fifteen. If all the churches and

Parishes of the Diocese would contribute an *average* of \$20, some adequate relief might be afforded to those helpless sufferers, who justly claim from the members of the Church in Virginia their *first* consideration.

Of late years there has been a great awakening of the public mind as to the value of the original sources of history. Time was when historians were content to accept oral traditions for facts. Hence many original records were suffered to moulder into illegible dust. Historians are no longer satisfied with dricking at the branch when they can find the spring from which it flows. Luckily, Hening had collated and embalmed in print the Acts of the General Assembly, and his "Statutes at Large" is to this day one of the best histories of Virginia in Church and State. A like good work was done by our far-seeing Bishop Meade for our Church Records. His antiquarian tastes, his intense Virginianism, and his love for the Church, made his Episcopal visitations of Parishes, like the herald's visitations of bounties in England, a search for the muniments of the history of old families and churches. With a rare instinct, he ferreted out old vestry books and registers from their hiding places, made large extracts from them, and preserved in print many things which otherwise would have been irreparably lost. His book, like an ark, has survived the deluge, and delivered to the new world many precious relics of the old. If he had done nothing else, he would have deserved well of the country and of the church. The State, too, has done a good thing in employing Dr. Palmer to brood over the chaos of archives in the attic of the capitol, and reduce them to order. The first fruits of his labors, "The Calendar of State Papers," is as full as an egg of meat, and his elegant "introduction" to it is an honor to the author and to Virginia Literature. The State did another good thing in sending commissioners to England to procure copies of the duplicates of some of our lost documents.

The Historical Society of Virginia, too, by its able secretary and executive committee, merits high commendation for much good work, and especially for snatching from "decay's effacing fingers" the Dinwiddie and Spotswood Papers, the Huguenot and other MSS., and preserving them in print. And it will not be deemed invidious if I add that there have been times when Mr. R. A. Brock, its self-sacrificing secretary, has had to bear the whole burden upon his "Atlantean shoulders." The point I wish to emphasize is, that it is now everywhere recognized that among the head-springs of our history, the Church Records are of exceeding value. Queries come to me from New England to New Orleans, and from Virginia to California, from the sons of sires born and baptized in Virginia. Many of them turn wistfully to the land of their fathers, inquiring as eagerly for certificates of birth, baptism and marriage as they would for titles to property. And, indeed, it often happens that titles to property depend upon these records. It is curious to trace the severe ordeal through which some of our Church Records have passed. Here is a Vestry Book of St. Paul's Parish, Hanover, which was found in the streets of Richmond after the fire, and placed in a drug-store. A young lady spied it there and gave me notice of it, and by the courtesy of Dr. George I got possession of it. Here is another, which was left by Federal soldiers in a tavern which they occupied at Sussex Courthouse. General Shands, finding it there, rescued it from ruin. Rev. F. Stringfellow gave

me notice, and General Shands kindly sent it to me at my request. The register of the same Parish was carried to Pennsylvania, and falling into the hands of a gentleman, he sent it to Mr. Brock, in whose loving custody it now is. And here is a register in vellum, found amongst the lumber of the loft of the courthouse at Yorktown. That eminent jurist, Conway Robinson, was so impressed with its value that he asked me to allow him to have it copied. This he had done under his own eye, in his office, carefully collating it with the original. Here is the Vestry Book of St. Patrick's Parish which, after being lost to public view from time immemorial, was found in the library of Hampden-Sidney College, and turned over to me at my request by Prof. Holliday. Again, here is a register of St. Mark's Parish, Culpeper, which was taken from a private house and conveyed by soldiers to Philadelphia. My antiquarian friend, Dr. Peterkin, got wind of it and gave me notice, and by his kind aid it was sent to me. There is no covert insinuation in applying the word "antiquarian" to my excellent friend. It only means that he is a man of that true antique flavor that can extract its essence of humanity from an old book or an old date cut in stone.

Once more, here is the Vestry Book of Truro Parish, recording the church work of such men as George Washington and George Mason, a book which Bishop Meade longed to see and died without the sight. I received anonymous intelligence of it, and after a pleasant correspondence with unknown parties, I succeeded in buying it for twenty dollars on my own responsibility.

It is not surprising that these venerable vestrymen, married pairs and baptized infants, after such perilous passages, should have come down to us with broken backs, dislocated members, and vestments all tattered and torn. It almost broke the heart of the venerable clerk of Essex county, Mr. Micou, in whose office were deposited the records of old Rappahannock county, to lose his Register of Marriages because there was not room for them in the wagons in which he conveyed his other papers to a place of safety on the approach of an invading army.

Lawyers sometimes bring into court the woe begone wives and children of their clients that their piteous aspect may plead more plaintively than words. So do I exhibit these old and battered books with the hope of moving that sympathy which I cannot command by arguments. With such clients at my back, I feel that I cannot altogether fail in moving the hearts of my hearers to have these old books clothed in decent vestments.

A Tentative List of Colonial Vestry Books and Registers.

Those who know of others will please send to me their names and dates. Of those two head-springs of our history, Jamestown and Williamsburg, no record other than 1865 remains. The invaluable vestry book of Bruton Parish was carried off during the late war by Federal soldiers or camp followers.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF BIBLICAL LEARNING.

To the Roard of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

I would respectfully report to the Trustees that I have made a beginning this session in the department of the English Bible which has been committed to me. I am more and more convinced of the importance of the study of the English Bible by students.

My plan has been for the classes to prepare a written analysis of each bank of the Hible to be corrected by me, and then in the class their attention has been called to any difficulties, and especially to any changes made in the revision, with which I am familiar. Theological Seminary.

The Senior Class has read over with me the English Bible as far as the middle of Isaiah, and the *Middle Class* as far as the Psalms.

The *Preparatory Department* has been, in my judgment, well taught, and according to the monthly reports of its teachers the students in it have made unusual progress.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully submits the following report of the studies pursued under his direction during the current session.

The Senior Class, with three recitations a week, and the Wednesday evening exercise, has studied the 39 Articles with Boultbie, and finished the review with written questions. They have also in Natural Theology studied Hopkins's Outline Man, and are now with lectures and written questions studying Liturgic's Specific Exercises in Homiletics, with Recitations on Broadus, have gone on for a large part of the session.

The *Middle Class*, reciting five times a week, has studied Butler's Analogy and Knapp's Theology. The former they have finished, and they are in review of the latter. They have also had introductory exercises in Homiletics.

To the *Junior Class* I have given three recitations a week on Apologetics and Natural Theology, using Fisher's "Grounds of Theistic and Christian Belief" for the former, and Chadbourne's work for the latter. They have finished Fisher, and are now reviewing Chadbourne.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF APOLOGETICS AND CHURCH POLITY.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The undersigned respectfully reports that during the last eight months he has given instruction to the several classes in the Seminary as follows :

The *Junior Class* he has met for recitation in Hebrew, and the Greek of the Septuagent and the New Testament daily, or five days in the week.

The *Middle Class* have studied under his instruction select chapters of some of the prophetical books of the Old Testament in Hebrew, and the epistle to the Romans and the Galatians, the epistles to the Ephesians, Colossians and Thessalonians, of the New Testament, in Greek on three days in each week.

He has met the *Senior Class* on two days in the week (Monday and Friday) for recitation and lectures on the Hebrew text of the book of Jobthe first fourteen chapters—and on the first six chapters of the prophecy of

Isaiah; and on the Greek text of the New Testament, the first epistle to the Corinthians, and the epistles to the Ephesians, Colossians and Philippians.

During the month of October, in the absence of the Professor of Ecclesiastical Polity, and at his request, the undersigned gave a course of lectures on the Church and Ministry to the Senior Class as preparatory to the study of the text-book in this department.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF CHURCH HISTORY.

To the Board of Truslees

of the Theological Seminary:

The Professor of Church History, Canon Law and Pastoral Theology, respectfully submits the following annual report:

The Senior Class, with four weekly recitations, has studied Short's History of the Church of England, written lectures on English Church History, and on the History of the Protestant Episcopal Church; Green's History of the English People; Hooker's Ecclesiastical Polity, Book I; The Constitution and Canons of the Church; The Pastoral Epistles in Greek, and Meade on the Pastoral Office.

The Middle Class has read essays and studied, with three recitations a week, Kurtz's Church History, with constant parallel references to Robertson's Church History.

The Junior Class, with four weekly recitations, has written essays and studied Dr. Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and read the Acts of the Apostles in Greek.

He has, in accordance with the written request of the Trustees, frequently attended the classes in the Preparatory Department, and gladly testifies to the faithful and efficient work done by this most indispensable adjunct of the Seminary.

He has also, at the request of the Trustees, taught the Senior Class Church Polity during the current session.

ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT TO TRUSTEES (1887).

Right Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D., LL.D.,

President of the Board of Trustees :

RIGHT REV. AND DEAR SIR:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

The whole number of pupils entered the present session is *eighty-eight*. * * * The general condition of the School has been encouraging. Not a single case of serious sickness, and little of any kind has occurred, and good conduct has prevailed. The only change in my corps of assistants was that

occasioned by the withdrawal, in July last, to accept the head mastership of Trinity Hall, Louisville, the new Diocesan School for boys in Kentucky, of Mr. E. L. McClelland. Mr. McClelland's connection here of twelve years was one to which not a little of the success the School has in that time enjoyed was due, and the recollection of his conscientious and valuable services will long be gratefully cherished. He has been succeeded by Mr. James W. Kern, late assistant instructor of Latin and Greek in the University of Virginia, a teacher of reputation as well as of skill and experience. * * *

I have little or nothing to report as to the religious exercises and privileges of the School additional to what was submitted last year. Prayers morning and evening every day, service and sermon at the Seminary Chapel on the morning of every Sunday and of the four chief holy days during the session, with Bible class Sunday afternoon, constitute as before, all on which attendance is required. The last service on Sunday consists of the regular order of evening prayer, with the addition of a special sermon once a month by the Rev. Dr. Nelson, and sometimes another from the Rev. Dr. Walker, of the Seminary. A devout improvement of the ecclesiastical year, including the minor festivals, continues to be attempted. During the season of Lent several extra week services in the School Chapel—one regularly conducted by the Rev. Dr. Nelson, our acting pastor—are accessible to the boys, and the Holy Week is emphasized besides by special daily devotions and instruction. As leaves of absence are never allowed at that time, the minds of all are more readily directed to its lessons.

The devotional meeting for the boys, which has so long been held at the School Friday night by a seminary student, and is a potent agency for good, has this year been in charge of Mr. Geo. Gordon Smeade, of the senior class, whose zeal and efficiency in the work have rivalled that of his most successful predecessors. To him, as well as to the reverend gentlemen mentioned above, the hearty thanks of myself and of all interested in the School are due. Including two, who received the rite at home, fourteen boys have been confirmed during the session; the number of communicants being in all now thirty-six.

REPORT OF THE INSTRUCTOR OF THEOLOGY IN BRANCH SCHOOL, PETERSBURG.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of the Diocese of Virginia:

During the past year I have had under my tuition in the Branch Divinity School in Petersburg *nine* students, to whom instruction has been given in the following studies:

Report of Committees-Election, Contingent Fund.

Paley's Evidences, Butler's Analogy, Questions and Outlines on 39 Articles, Knapp's Theology, the Prayer Book, Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, Kurtz's Church History. Also instruction has been given in Latin, Book-keeping and Mental Science to the Divinity students, and also to some of the scholars of the Normal school. In Greek the Divinity students have gone through Romans, James, and a portion of Galatians, and in Hebrew, chapter of Deuteronomy, and a review of the Grammar.

The assistant teacher, the Rev. William P. Burke, has rendered efficient service in teaching other academic branches to students of both schools. For the most part our students have made fair progress in their studies, and in one or two cases show marked improvement in that respect.

Rev. J. B. Newton presented the following report from the Committee on Elections, which was adopted :

Your Committee on Elections have had under consideration the question referred to them concerning the lay delegates from St. Bride's Parish.

We find that St. Bride's Parish, one of the old Parishes of the Diocese, embraces the growing town of Berkeley, in which both congregations are worshipping, containing about three thousand inhabitants. As an abandoned Parish, the field was occupied and worked by the congregation of St. Paul's, Elizabeth River Parish, and a chapel built, and the congregation there worshipping has been hitherto represented in Council.

We further find that St. Bride's has recently been revived, and another congregation has been formed, a rector called and in charge. Although the forms of law have not been strictly complied with, they have been substantially so, and we therefore recommend that the lay delegates of both congregations, Judge G. D. Parker and Jacob W. Dunstan, be admitted to their seats.

Rev. T. M. Carson presented the report of the Committee on Contingent Fund, appointed at the Council of 1886, which was made the special order of the day to-morrow, immediately after divine service.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONTINGENT FUND, ETC.

The committee appointed at the Council of 1886, to consider the general expenses of the Diocese, and especially the most effective method of collecting the Contingent Fund, beg leave to report that they have given the subject, in all its bearings, the careful consideration which its gravity demands.

Report of Committee on Parochial Reports.

In the judgment of the Committee no more perplexing problem, yet none of profounder interest, touching the practical life of the Church in the Diocese can come before this Council. With great diffidence we have sought a solution of difficulties which have been long recognized as serious hindrances to growth and progress, invoking such aid as was accessible in the discretion and experience of others.

It is manifestly both desirable and necessary to provide a fund which shall be at once both ample in itself and, as far as possible, stable and secure. In the absence of an endowment, such as would rid us of anxieties, the needed revenues must come in some form as stated voluntary contributions of the people. But these contributions, whilst free-will offerings, are none the less to be regarded as *sacred obligations*, to which we are bound by every sense of duty and affection. Earnestly desiring to realize this fact for ourselves and to impress it upon others, we recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

I. That any material reduction of the expenses of the Diocese would be unwise, and is, as matter of fact, impracticable. Only at one point does any reduction seem to be either just or possible, viz.: in the form of the JOURNAL and in the number of copies to be printed.

2. That the existing mode of assessment should, for the present at least, be adhered to, viz.: that each Church or Parish be expected and required to pay a sum equal in dollars to the number of its communicants.

3. That this sum be collected from the congregation at large in quarterly instalments instead of annually, as at present.

4. That to facilitate this end, the Secretary shall notify the Rector and Treasurer of each Church or Parish as soon as may be after the adjournment of this Council, and regularly thereafter prior to the beginning of the quarter, that one-fourth of the entire annual assessment is due.

5. That this sum shall be due and payable on the 15th day of July, October, January, and April of each year.

Report of Committee on Episcopal Fund.

Rev. E. W. Hubard offered the following, which, on motion of Dr. Clarkson, was laid on the table :

Whereas, it is a matter of fact well known to all the members of this Council and of this Diocese, that the Constitution of the Church in this Diocese was adopted altogether by white congregations, and that the Church, from its reorganization in 1785 to the year 1865, was administered altogether upon the basis of a white membership and of a white constituency and a white Convention or Council; and

Whereas, although no legislation to that end has ever been had, colored ministers have been allowed to sit in this Council; and

Whereas, it is a matter of anxious concern with many, whether such a change in the membership of our Diocesan Council is in accordance with the fundamental law of this Diocese, as originally adopted,

Resolved, That the matters involved herein be referred to a committee to consider and report to this Council what action in the premises is expedient, and the form of the same.

Rev. Douglass Hooff presented the following report from the Committee on the Episcopal Fund:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPAL FUND.

To the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of Virginia:

I herewith enclose the account of the Episcopal Fund, of which I am treasurer, showing balance due treasurer of \$65.84, which is caused by my not being able to invest exact amount on hand and not being able to purchase less than a \$500 bond.

Rev. T. G. Dashiell, on behalf of Rev. H. M. Jackson, who was detained from the Council, offered the following, which was referred to the Committee on the State of the Church :

Whereas, the order of the Diaconate, as instituted by the Apostolic Church, has fallen into practical disuse, and no longer meets the purposes for which it was originally created: therefore be it

Resolved, That the said order should be restored to the polity of the Church, according to its normal function.

2. That the congregations of the Church in this Diocese are counselled, wherever practicable, to elect each a pious and discreet man from the body of the congregation to exercise the office of perpetual Deacon, and to certify him to the Bishop for ordination.

3. That the general regulations governing the election of Vestrymen should govern the election of Deacon.

Rev. Pike Powers presented the annual report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The amount appropriated to these fifty-one ministers was \$8,970, but this amount was not all paid, because some resigned before their year was out, and some have but recently begun work. The number now on our list is forty, including the six colored deacons-to-wit: Rev. Messrs. Boyden, Brooke, Claiborne, Combs, Castleman, Derby, Dennis, J. B. Funsten, Hammond, Hobson, Hundley, Jæger, Latané. Lawrence, Locke, Meade, McDonough, McGill, Murray, Norwood, Overby, C. Page, T. C. Page, Poindexter, Phelps, Russell, Shields, Savage, Stringfellow, Sharp, Scott, Tizzard, Townsend, J. W. Ware, S. S. Ware, G. E. Howell, W. E. Howell, Burwell, Carroll and Harrison.

We are happy to say that Meade Memorial Church, Manchester, Rev. J. J. Clopton, has resigned its stipend and become self-supporting.

Besides the stipends of our missionaries, we have paid Rev. Job Turner, missionary to deaf mutes in the Southern States, at the rate of \$100 a year; \$522 for a new edition of the Mission Prayer Book (5,000 copies), and a special appropriation of \$50 to a clergyman of the Diocese.

There are several Parishes now vacant, which we have heretofore helped, and which will doubtless expect help from us again as soon as they procure a minister. There are detached churches which cannot easily be connected with any Parish, and there are a number of mission points which ought to be worked. Several of our convocations are moving to do something for these places, and will probably look to us to aid them in their efforts. Our existing appropriations amount to \$7,645. So that while our people have done wonderfully well this year, though the worst year, financially, we have had for a long time, raising over \$9,000 for Diocesan missions; yet if we are to keep our work up on the present scale, or if we are to increase it at all, it will not do to relax our efforts, or to diminish our contributions. The outlook is encouraging. Reports from almost all quarters are favorable, and we have reason to thank God, and to congratulate the Council and the Church on the manner in which the people have rallied to our aid in this hard year; and we wish to make especial mention of the Sunday Schools and others who, through their mite boxes; have given us between four and five hundred dollars.

The contributions in the month of April, 1887, amounted to upwards of

Next Meeting of Council.

\$3,400, the largest amount, we believe, ever given in one month since the Society had an existence. But we suppose the people had no more money in April than in any one of the five or six preceding months, and it would be not only a great convenience but a great help to the committee if the churches would distribute their contributions more equally. In the latter ' part of the fall and in the winter months we were greatly straitened, and were compelled to borrow money to meet our engagements; but if we had received in November half of what we received in April there would have been no difficulty. Of course, April is generally the Easter season, and whilst it is well to honor our risen Lord by greater gifts at this season, yet the Scripture rule is the rule of systematic giving, and the best way to honor and to please the Lord is to do for Him and His cause at all times what we can.

We would state, in closing this report, that the Executive Committee at their last meeting passed a resolution requesting the Bishop to appoint an Evangelist for the Diocese at a salary not exceeding \$1,000, as soon as he can procure a suitable man.

PIKE POWERS, Secretary Diocesan Missionary Society.

The following resolution, adopted at the meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society, held Wednesday night, May 18th, was offered in the Council by Rev. Pike Powers, and unanimously approved :

Resolved, That as the sense of this meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Executive Committee be requested to confer with all the Sunday schools in the Diocese and to ask that they receive mite-boxes, and appropriate their Lenten offerings to the treasury of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

On motion of Judge Sheffey, it was resolved that the next meeting of the Council be held in Trinity Church, Staunton.

Mr. E. S. Duffey offered the following, which was referred to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society:

Resolved, That the Rector of each Parish in this Diocese appoint one of the wardens, or some suitable person, to collect the two (2) cents per week, or more, from each communicant, promised by this Council, the same to be paid quarterly to the treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Resolved, That a circular letter be furnished the Rector of each Parish for distribution, stating the wants of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

On motion, the Council adjourned.

Third Day's Minutes.

FRIDAY, May 20th, 1887.

The Council met at 10 A. M. Service was read by Rev. R. R. Claiborne; after which Bishop Randolph, according to request of the Council, read his address upon the effort to change the name of our Church.

The Council then assembled for business, and was called to order by the Bishop.

Judge Sheffey offered the following amendment to the third resolution :

"But in case it shall be found impracticable or inexpedient in any Parish or church to make such quarterly collections in full at the end of each quarter, then as to any balance which may remain due on the 15th day of April in any year, it shall be the duty of such Parish. or Church to cause such balance to be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocese on or before the first day of the next Council."

Rev. Dr. Hanckel moved to strike out the words "in full."

Resolutions on Proposed Change of Name.

Pending the consideration of which, on motion of Rev Frank Page, the third resolution and amendments, together with the remainder of the report after resolution third, were laid upon the table.

Petitions were presented from Greenwood Parish, Albemarle county, and from St. James'-Northam Parish, Goochland county, asking the Council to fix the boundary lines for said Parishes, and were referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Rev. R. T. Davis, D. D., offered the following :

RESOLUTIONS ON THE PROPOSED CHANGE OF NAME OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH,

adopted by the Piedmont Convocation for presentation at the Diocesan Council of Virginia, to be holden in the city of Alexandria on the 18th day of May, 1887.

Whereas, a proposition to change the name of the Protestant Episcopal Church was made in the last General Convention, and received much favor, gaining a large affirmative vote; and

Whereas, this movement to change the name of our Church was initiated and primarily urged by men who disparage the Reformation, and have no sympathy with Protestantism, and who, in consistency, must advocate further changes in the Book of Common Prayer, with which, as it now stands, they do not hesitate to express dissatisfaction; therefore,

Resolved, That we are determined not to abandon those Protestant principles which are embodied in our Prayer Book, and which are, as we believe, taught in the Holy Scriptures; and that we cling to the name by which those principles are distinctively declared.

That, as it is a change in the Prayer Book itself, we regard the alteration proposed as outside the legitimate powers of the General Convention, and we consider it as little, if at all, short of revolutionary, tending to involve the Church in discord and strife, and to unsettle the titles to much of our Church property.

Resolved, finally, That we hereby declare our unalterable and unyielding opposition to the change thus proposed, and we affirm that we will not, as a Diocese, give our assent to the omission of the word "Protestant" any more than of the word "Episcopal," from the name of our Church in the title of our Prayer Book.

Mr. W. N. Nelson, from the Committee on the Brotherhood, offered the following:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE BROTHERHOOD.

The Committee on the Brotherhood respectfully report that they have examined the reports of the President and Treasurer of the Brotherhood, and ascertain that there are now about seven hundred ordinary contributing members who, pay one dollar each upon the death of a clerical member, and eleven life members who contribute two dollars each; that within the seventeen years of the existence of the Brotherhood 32,123.09 have been distributed among the families of twenty-nine deceased clergymen, in sums varying from 31,500 down to 563,734.

Report of Committee on Amendment to Canon XIII.

The amount recently collected upon the death of the Rev. E. C. Murdaugh, and included in the above, is \$745. No collection has yet been made on account of the Rev. D. M. Wharton's death. The permanent fund now in the hands of the Treasurer amounts to \$2,009.91.

The committee, observing the great irregularity in contributing, and the striking disparity in the amounts given, where all under the present scheme are entitled to receive the same amounts, recommend the adoption of the following resolutions, which they hope will give greater stability to the Brotherhood in its resources, and give greater satisfaction to the contributors that the funds are appropriated with some regard to the *mecessities* and natural equities of each case.

Resolved, 1. That it is the sense of this Council that the Constitution of the Brotherhood be so changed that the payment by members shall be for a fixed sum annually.

Resolved, 2. That the amount to be appropriated to the family of any deceased clergyman shall be determined upon after a full consideration of all the facts in the case by a standing committee to be appointed by the Council annually.

Resolved. 3. That this Council request each minister of this Diocese to call the attention of his congregation to the objects of the Brotherhood, and to appoint an agent of the Brotherhood for such congregation, whose duty it shall be to solicit memberships and collect and remit dues.

The committee appointed on the amendment to Canon XIII offered the following, which was approved by the Council :

The committee to whom has been referred the amendment proposed to Canon XIII respectfully report that they have considered the subject, and recommend that the third rule of order be stricken out, and that Canon XIII • be amended so as to read as follows:

CANON XIII.

OF THE EVIDENCE OF THE APPOINTMENT OF LAY DELEGATES TO THE COUNCIL.

The appointment of lay delegates to the Council of this Diocese shall be certified by the rector, register, or warden of the proper parish or church, in duplicate, and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

Report of Committee on Amendment to Canon VIII.

"This is to certify that at a meeting of the Vestry (or Trustees, as the case may be) of — Parish (or Church), in — county, held on the — day of —, A. B., who is a communicant in said parish, or church, was appointed a lay delegate to represent the same in the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, to be holden on the — day of —, in the year of our Lord —.

The original credential of lay delegate shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Council, and the duplicate delivered to the delegate-elect. The Secretary shall make out a roll and call the names of all certified to him as duly and canonically elected. The President of the Council shall then appoint a committee, to be composed of four clerical and three lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report the names of those entitled to seats; but until said report shall be received and adopted, no business shall be considered by the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for examination and report. Respectfully submitted,

The special order, the report of Committee on Clerical Support, was taken up. The report was received.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CLERICAL SUPPORT.

Your committee beg leave respectfully to report :

There have been laid before us one hundred and thirty-five reports of treasurers, representing the charges of one hundred and seven ministers and assistant ministers.

Ninety-nine churches have paid in full their obligations in money to their ministers, no account being taken of supplies furnished.

Eight churches have paid more than they promised.

Twenty-eight churches appear to be sadly in arrears to their ministers. Ninety parishes have rectories.

The deficit appears to have been about 2.30 per cent. of the whole amount promised, which, in a year of exceptional embarrassment and pecuniary trouble throughout the State, seems to your committee encouraging.

-being an average of about \$770 to the minister, besides, in most cases, a rectory.

It is due to the churches reported deficient, that we should say that we have reason to believe that, in many cases, the deficits reported result from inaccuracy in accounts and misunderstandings on the part of the treasurers. The committee are loth to believe that the parishes could, under any circumstances, fail of their obligations to the Church and to the men of God laboring among them, to the extent indicated by some of the reports.

Your committee therefore most earnestly recommend that the fiscal year of the churches be made to conform to the Council year—from April 30th to April 30th—and that the blanks furnished by the Secretary be made to correspond to this suggestion. Further, that the treasurers, for the sake of appearance as well as duty, that their good may not be evil spoken of, be careful and accurate, and confine their reports to the current fiscal year.

Report of Committee on Journal.

The Committee appointed to consider the cost, &c., of printing the JOURNAL, presented the following :

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JOURNAL.

The Committee appointed to examine the JOURNAL and report by what method, or methods, its cost can be reduced, have given the subject their careful attention, and present the following report:

The attachment of your Committee to the JOURNAL in the present wellknown form is exceeded by that of no one present, but they all believe that the JOURNAL can be greatly improved and its cost materially reduced. They, therefore, unanimously offer the following recommendations:

I. That the *Parochial Reports*, now occupying ninety-four pages of the JOURNAL, be tabulated. Your committee believe that in this way they can, without detriment, be made to occupy about ten pages.

2. That the various *Treasurers' Reports* give only the receipts and disbursements *in the aggregate*, the items given in them all properly occurring *once* in the Parochial Reports.

3. That the *printing* of the JOURNAL be made more compact. There is too much *spacing*.

4. That after the Bishops' reports and those of the Standing Committees of the Diocese and of the Council, no others be inserted in the JOURNAL except by special order of the Council. Your committee are of the opinion that much material, in the form of reports and other papers, might be left out of the JOURNAL without injury to that publication.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Dr. Kinloch Nelson offered the following substitute, which was adopted :

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Council that the JOURNAL should be printed in the same style and distributed freely to the Diocese as hereto-fore; and that they express full confidence in the Secretary to reduce the expenses thereof as much as possible.

Rev. G. W. Nelson presented the report from the Committee on the Bruce Fund, showing the accounts to be correct and payments sustained by proper vouchers.

Rev. W. T. Roberts offered the following resolution:

Whereas, unsound and mischievous Sunday-school instruction books are constantly being issued; and,

Whereas, their suppression has been found necessary for the security, in one of our Dioceses, of its Sunday-school children against false teaching; and,

Whereas, improper Sunday-school books are already in use in this Diocese, and the only way to prevent their further introduction and to suppress mischievous books is to concentrate on good ones; therefore, be it,

Resolved, That this Council appoint a committee of three to report at the next Council the best books for instructing our Sunday-schools in the Holy Bible and Church Catechism.

Carried, and the following committee appointed: Rev. Messrs. Roberts, G. W. Nelson and H. B. Lee.

Rev. James Grammer presented the report from the Committee on the State of the Church. The report was received and resolution adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHUBCH.

The committee, in reviewing the reports that have come up from the Parishes of the Diocese, finds but little that calls for any special remark.

The Parochial Reports show the Church to be, outwardly at least, in healthy working condition. While there has been no considerable advance on the exhibits of past years, there is enough done to be thankful for, and to encourage us in our work. Thirteen hundred and fifty confirmed; a total of 15,299 communicants from 181 parishes; 14,000 children in our Sunday-schools, and a total of contributions of \$218,437, show the blessing of God to be resting upon our labors in His cause.

Yet, out of these 15,000 communicants, surely there ought to be more than seven young men offering themselves for the work of the Ministry; and surely there ought to be more than seven hundred members of the Brotherhood. If these seven candidates for Orders indicate the spiritual vigor of our Church—and it is only those who are unusually vigorous in their spiritual life who offer themselves for the Ministry—for the reason that it offers so little inducement of a worldly kind—then there seems to be in this fact a ground of humiliation before God that there is so little of the spirit of selfdenial and self-consecration in the religion of to-day.

The outlook, however, is brighter, when we look at our Sunday-schools, and reflect upon the opportunities and possibilities in these 14,000 children under instruction in our Sunday-schools. In ten years these will all have passed out of the Sunday-school. How many of their names will be on the communion roll? How many of them will be in the Ministry? The questions will at least suggest to us the solemn responsibility resting upon us, who have the training of them for these ten years.

Report of Committee on the State of the Church.

Mission work among the colored people in this Diocese is very bright with hope. Nearly 300 of them confirmed within the year, and nearly 1,000 communicants in the Diocese, and 10 ministers at work, and 9 postulants and candidates for Orders. And all this in so short a time and under such difficulties! There seems clearly to be a great trust committed to this Diocesea great and effectual door opened, and, God help us to realize it, a great responsibility laid upon us. May it not be that God is going to honor this Diocese of ours to be the leader in this work, and to blaze a way for the Church through the intricacies of its untrodden darkness? And should not we go forward, in a simple faith, one step at a time, as God shows us where to tread, in the confidence that He is going before us, and will not lead us astray?

We are thankful to say that the entire exhibit of the Parochial Reports is encouraging as indicating our Diocese to be, not only a live Diocese, but, in the main, in a healthy condition, and full of energy and zeal. At the same time it is well to bear in mind that all such indications are but partially safe and reliable, for the reason that the Church is not simply an organism that can be defined by laws and measured by statistics. It is the living people of God; and hence any inquiry as to the state of the Church should embrace, besides the information contained in Parochial Reports, such questions as these: What is the habit of the people in attending public worship? the practice of heads of families in regard to family prayer? in regard to observance of the Lord's day? what is the state of separation from the world, as well from its pomps and vanities as from the covetous desires of the same? is there a readiness or a backwardness to all good works? what about liberalty in giving? unity, peace and concord in the congregation? and in general, are the fruits of the spirit abounding in the private life and character of the members? For the real health of the Church is ascertained more by the personal gifts and graces of the Spirit than by any organic symptoms. As the Church is a spiritual as well as an organic body, there may be growth and thrift outwardly, while its spiritual health is feeble.

While the reports, therefore, are encouraging and afford cause of thanksgiving to God, there still remains to be sought those other evidences of the spiritual health of the Church which such reports can give but very partially, but which can only be given by the pastors themselves. And the committee recommend to our ministers to make a fuller use of the margin for remarks in our printed forms of Parochial Reports to indicate what, in their view, statistics alone cannot give—the spiritual state of the flock of God under their care.

The true state of the Church is to be sought in the personal piety and religious activity of the individual members of the Church. It is as true of the entire body as it is of the single member. "To be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace." How are our ministers and members living? What is the character of the religious teaching in our Diocese?

Report of Committee on the State of the Church.

The multitude of persons publicly consecrating themselves and their lives to Christ in the rite of confirmation and in the rite of ordination, may indicate either a vigorous and growing life in our Church, or, alas, it may indicate a lowering of the standard of Christian living and ministerial consecration and pastoral faithfulness. An abundance in supply may indicate a depreciation in value; as cheapening the cost of the religious profession and privileges may multiply the number of those seeking them.

But should any one take a discouraging view of the present state and outlook of our Church in Virginia, let him reflect that we, through the good hand of our God upon us, have been preserved from many of the evils that are afflicting the Church elsewhere.

As to the great issues that have been disturbing our peace, defiling our purity and thus tending to destroy our integrity, we in this Diocese have been preserved in a substantial unity and unanimity which call upon our souls and all that is within us to bless His holy name. "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits."

We recognize in this the grace of our Lord bestowed upon the faithful services of the past and present generation of gospel-preaching Bishops, ministers and members, ever more concerned for the spiritual than for the mere ecclesiastical interests of the Diocese, more concerned to follow Christ closely, and make Him great and glorious, than to magnify the Episcopal, Church, dear as that Church was to them; and we of to day will do well to keep in mind that a continuance of this distinguishing favor of God towards, this, our Diocese, depends upon our continuance in setting forth Jesus Christ and Him crucified as the power of God and the wisdom of God. Any substitution for this must prove to be but the wisdom of men, which is foolishness with God. We have no other business or care than to "show forth the honor of His name and to make His praise glorious." While we with single eye are seeking above all His honor, the welfare and honor of our dear Church will be His peculiar care: "Them that honor me I will honor."

If it will not be deemed officious, the committee will recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That it be submitted to the judgment of the Bishop to appoint the Committee on the State of the Church a year in advance.

Rev. C. J. Gibson moved that the form of Parochial Report be so altered as to show how many catechisings during the year, and also number of children confirmed from members of Sunday Schools. Pending consideration of this—

Rev. Mr. Marshall moved to adjourn. Lost.

The resolution of Dr. Gibson was then adopted.

The Council then adjourned.

Report of Committee on New Parishes.

SATURDAY, May 21, 1887.

Council met at 10 A. M. Service was read by the Rev. Dr. Hains. The sermon was by the Rev. W. T. Roberts.

The Council then assembled for business. Minutes of preceding day read and adopted.

The following report, presented by the Rev. O. A. Kinsolving, from the Committee on New Parishes, was adopted by the Council:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on New Parishes would respectfully report, that they have considered the petition from a number of "residents of the southeastern portion of Whittle Parish, Fauquier county, requesting the Council to allow them to form a separate congregation in said parish, with an independent minister, stating that they have erected a handsome and commodious house of worship at Little Georgetown—a convenient point for the purpose—and that they are prepared to support a minister, and that they have given to the Bishop and to the vestfy of said parish the notices required in Canon XI," and recommend that the petition be granted.

The committee have also had before them a petition from St. Peter's Church, Elizabeth River Parish, Norfolk county, organized in November, 1886, under Canon XII. Now, finding that the church is self-supporting, and having obtained consent of the vestries of said parish and given the required notice to the Bishop of the Diocese, ask to be received as an independent church. The petition being in due form, in compliance with the Canon, and no objection being made, the committee recommend that the prayer of the petitioners be granted.

A petition from Greenwood Parish, Albemarle county, has also been laid before the committee, asking that the metes and bounds of said parish be established as follows: By the Mountain Plain road from Jarmon's gap, beginning at Jarmon's gap; thence to Mechum's river; thence up the river to Chilton's or Shelton's mill; thence due south to the top of Little or Ragged Mountains; thence, with the top of said mountains, to the county line of Nelson county; thence, with the said line to the top of the Blue Ridge, and thence, with the Augusta county line, to the beginning. The committee recommend that this petition be granted.

A petition from St. Mary's congregation. St. James'-Northam Parish, Goochland county, has been withdrawn.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Report from the Committee on Sunday-Schools.

Rev. Dr. Barten offered the report from the Committee on Sundayschools :

REPORT FROM THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Sunday-schools beg leave to report that there have been reported in the Parochial Reports received 13,111 Sunday-school scholars, of which 10,827 are white, 2,149 colored, and 135 Indian. These are taught by 1,643 teachers. The offerings aggregate \$4,919.87. Compared with the report of last year there is an increase of about three hundred children, with twenty-six teachers.

The Sunday-school must always claim our attention, our earnest efforts and our prayers. The problem of a healthy religious education is rapidly becoming the leading question before the church. Such an education, though, to be done chiefly by the influence and teaching of the father and mother in the home, is to be supplemented, not to be superseded, by the special body of the church in the way of Sunday-school effort. We recognize the fact, that at the root of all religious education is, and must ever be, the home. No Church, no Sunday-school can ever quite supply the place of those first loving thoughts of the Heavenly Father, and of the heavenly home and of the great merciful Christ, who went about doing good, and took the little children in his arms--thoughts which a child should learn among the earliest lessons of the home. But the fathers and mothers home, part in the religious training of the child, may be neglected, or may be but poorly attended to--many causes operate to make such a training in many families exceedingly precarious, nay, often wanting altogether.

Hence the solemn duty of the church to provide for all deficiencies by a judicious course of Sunday-school instruction to strengthen the good work begun at home, or undertake it altogether, where it is deficient or neglected. The children of the church need special training, discipline and instruction; they also need *worship*, and for all these they are to be brought into the Sunday-school; and the minister of the Parish should put himself at the head of it, and ever look upon the superintendent, the teachers and officers as his helpers in this the most important department of his 'parochial work.

Perhaps it is well to direct attention to that portion of Sunday-school effort which is often very much neglected—*the element of worship* / The proper function of the church is worship, intelligent worship it is true, but yet worship! It is true, a certain space is allotted to a sermon in which the minister is expected to do some teaching, but in the main it is for worship that our people come to church. If the Sunday-school is an integral part of the church, then should not this be borne in mind? Should not more time be given to worship than is often done now? Is there not danger of often reducing the worship of the children to the minimum, forgetting that the singing of bright hymns or penitential psalms as the lesson may dictate, the occasional use of portions of the service and other acts of worship, may educate the heart and mind as well as mere formal and dogmatic teaching?

Resolutions of Thanks.

Sunday-schools have improved, and will continue to improve, as to their hymns, their books of instruction, and their opening and closing services. In several of these respects the church owes a debt, which ought to be recognized, to many successful leaders who have been doing good and thorough work. But much remains yet to be done. It is not easy to apply what has been done to general use. A wide field here opens into which your committee cannot now enter. But often the wish is expressed, more particularly by our rural Parishes, for more carefully selected lists of question books, library books, and also Sunday-school hymnals, from which to choose, books perfectly safe, free from objections on the score of extreme church teaching, and in keeping with the plain practical, protestant tone of thought and feeling familiar to our people.

A committee, appointed for such a purpose, might undertake this work at their leisure, and bring forward at some future Council the result of their investigation, and by doing so would greatly aid the Parish minister, who has not always the time nor the opportuity of making as careful a selection as he might desire.

We need an ever-growing realization of the importance of Sunday-school work. The religious education of our children becomes more and more the question of the day. Moral training, such as is given by our public school system, and even in some of our private schools, must be supplemented by religious training in the home and by the church. Let the church be faithful in this matter, and liberally offer for this good cause *ker means*, her best men and women to do the work of teaching, her earnest, faithful prayers, and the blessing of God will rest upon her.

On motion of Mr. Frank Nelson, it was resolved that the Secretary be directed to distribute the copies of last year's JOURNAL among the Parishes.

Rev. A. S. Johns offered the following resolutions, which were manimously adopted :

Resolved, That the cordial thanks of this Council be given to the citizens of Alexandria and vicinity for their great kindness and abounding hospitality to the members of this body.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Council be also given to the Rector of St. Panl's Church, to the vestry, Committee of Arrangements, and the pages for their constant attentions to our comfort.

Resolved. That \$:5 be paid by the Treasurer to the sexton of St. Paul's Courch.

Resolved, That the usual number of Journals be printed for distribution.

Mr. Roseweil Page offered the following for Rev. Dr. Dame, which was referred to the committee appointed vesterday to consider the

resolution of Rev. T. G. Dashiell, concerning the change of the name of the Church.

Whereas, since the adoption of the Constitution of the Church in the United States the number of Dioceses has so greatly increased as to make the membership of the House of Clerical and Lay Delegates too large for the proper consideration of the matters coming before them in the time usually occupied for the meeting of the General Convention; and,

Whereas, the representation therein—of an equal number from each Diocese—is not, in our judgment, just and equitable, being the same for a Diocese of 500 as for 50,000 communicants.

Resolved, That our delegates to the next General Convention be, and they hereby are, requested and instructed to bring this matter to the notice of that body and ask that the organization of the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies may be so far constitutionally changed as to make representation therein be dependent on the number of communicants in the Diocese, allowing for each organized Diocese one clerical and one lay deputy. and one additional clerical and one additional lay deputy for each succeeding 10,000 communicants.

Resolved, further, That our delegates be, and are hereby, requested and instructed to present before that body the earnest appeal of this Diocese not to legislate any further on the name of our Church; that while we might not have chosen the name in the beginning, we now hold it and expect ever to remain connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, and earnestly urge the members not to be guilty of the schism, of which we think they would be guilty, by going out from us and our known principles as the great power protesting against an error, whether coming from Roman or other schismatic parties or churches.

Rev. T. G. Dashiell offered the following, which was adopted :

Resolved, That this Council takes occasion to express its great pleasure in having at its session our venerated brother, Rev. George A. Smith, the senior Presbyter of the Diocese, and the first *alumnus* of our Theological Seminary.

Judge Sheffey offered the following report from the Committee on Finance, which was adopted :

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Committee on Finance respectfully report to the Council that, at the request of the committee, James T. Gray, Esq., Treasurer of the Diocese, submitted to them the statement of his accounts, which, upon careful examination, were found to be correct and sustained by proper vouchers. The committee renew, with sincere pleasure, the expression of their grateful

appreciation of Mr. Gray's gratuitous services to the Diocese, not only in the admirable manner in which the accounts are kept, but in promptly giving to the committee valuable information as to the financial condition of the Diocese. The statement of the Treasurer's accounts, herewith returned, and other means of information, enable the committee to submit to the Council the following statement:

At the commencement of the fiscal year (1886-'7) the sum due the State Bank was \$1.575. The receipts on account of dues to the Contingent Fund last year were \$10,773.32, which, compared with those of the preceding year, amounting to \$10,529.82, show an increase of only \$243.50. For the current year (1887-'8) we learn from our Treasurer that the aggregate amount of moneys actually secured and of checks tendered and presently available is \$10,044.43, and that additional dues, the payment of which before the publication of the JOURNAL may reasonably be relied on, will amount to \$845, making altogether \$10,889.43 for the current year, showing an increase of only \$116.11 over the receipts of last year.

The Treasurer's statement shows a balance to his credit in the State Bank of Virginia of \$15351; but it also shows that in order to supply the wants of the Diocese, the Treasurer was called upon to borrow, and did kindly borrow, two sums of \$700 and \$875, in March and May, respectively, which call loans must be paid out of the present receipts. The result, therefore, is that the Diocese begins the current fiscal year with a debt-charge upon its income of \$1,421.49, showing a decrease of indebtedness, as compared with that of May, 1886, of \$153.43. This is somewhat encouraging, in view of the fact that the sum of \$1,040.92 was disbursed by the Treasurer in paying charges connected with the General Convention held in Chicago in October last.

From our last year's report it will appear that provision was made, by resolution of the Council, for "paying the cost of such repairs of the Episcopal residence as may be needed."

Your committee regret exceedingly to learn, through Major D. N. Walker, one of the trustees of the property, that, doubtless for want of funds, this was not done; and that the residence is sadly in need of repairs, which will cost from \$450 to \$500. Whatever the cost may be, the work should be done, and done at once; and your committee will report to the Council a resolution to accomplish that object.

The Treasurer's report of 1886 shows that the printing and distribution of 1,500 copies of the JOURNAL cost \$492 and \$70, \$562.

It appears from the geport now under consideration that the same number of JOURNALS cost \$391 and \$30, \$421—a reduction in cost of \$141.

Your committee are of opinion that the work is now done at reasonable rates, in a manner acceptable to the Diocese, and they are assured that the Secretary will continue his efforts to have the work well and economically done. We, therefore, advise that no change be made in this department of the Diocesan service.

Report of Committee on Finance.

From the Treasurer's report it will appear that the ordinary expenses of the Diocese will amount to, say, \$10, 183.84. This sum should be provided for. In addition, the Diocese owes the State Bank of Virginia the sum of \$1,575 with interest, making, say, \$1,590. And in addition to this we must reckon and estimate \$500 for the repairs of the Episcopal residence, making altogether \$12,273.84.

So that \$12,273.84, less \$11,042.72, leaves \$1,231.14, which will be the debt of the Diocese at the next annual session in May, 1888. So that if all our expectations be realized and the sums expected fall into the treasury we will begin the next year with a *debt* of \$1,231.14.

This ought not to be. On the contrary, means should be in hand to lay the foundation of sure and independent support for the Episcopate in this Diocese.

The reports to the Council show that there are 15,381 communicants in the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, and upon the basis of assessments made for Diocesan support upon the Parishes and congregations, the income to the contingent or Bishop's fund, as it is called, should be \$15,381. In fact, the amount received is only \$10,889, showing a discrepancy of \$4,492 between the amount assessed and the amount realized or received. This is about thirty per cent. of the amount which ought to be paid. It does seem to your committee that if due effort were made to stir up the minds of the laity of the Diocese to a sense of the responsibilities resting upon them, there would be no difficulty in securing all the money needed for the purposes of the Diocese.

At the present session of the Council it has been determined that the Parishes and congregations be charged with the duty of providing the means for the common objects and charges of the Diocese, upon the basis of one dollar for each communicant in the respective Parishes and congregations, each Parish and congregation being charged with the payment of the amount necessary to meet the assessment made upon it. It is now hoped that the mischiefs of former derelictions in duty will cease.

Heretofore it has been true, and the reports to this Council show that it is still true, that from many Parishes and churches no reports are made at all, and from many no reports of communicants are made; and the amounts silently paid in are sadly disproportioned to those which should be paid In this way delinquent Parishes and churches escape the discredit of their failure to do their duty to the Church in the Diocese. As your committee has often shown, there would be no difficulty in meeting all the expenses of the Diocese, without the discredit of indebtedness, if the Parishes and churches paid in their quotas at the rate of one dollar for each communicant.

Report of Trustees of Virginia Female Institute.

The charges upon the Diocese and its expenses have been much reduced of late; and your committee are of opinion that no further reductions can, with justice to the general interests of the Diocese, be made at this time. And, in view of the encouraging expectation, that with due efforts on the part of the Parishes and churches to do their duty, the income of the Diocese will be sufficient to enable the Council to continue to make provision for paying examining chaplains for their services, and to continue the compensation now allowed to our faithful and laborious Secretary, it is not deemed necessary to recommend any changes in these matters.

In conclusion, your committee tender their exhortation to the Clergy and Laity to consider and deal with the subject of Diocesan Support as a matter of honest business. It is not charity, but the sacred obligation of duty, which is involved in making ample provision for defraying all Diocesan expenses, and Clergy and Laymen should realize that the support of our Bishops and Diocesan officers is not only a duty of the highest obligation, but one which should be gladly and promptly discharged.

Your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions :

I. That the trustees of the Episcopal residence be authorized to have the same duly and promptly repaired, in order that it may be a comfortable abode for the Bishop of the Diocese, and that the Treasurer pay for such repairs upon the certificates of one or more of such trustees.

2. That the Treasurer pay the customary charges for the salaries of the Bishop, Assistant Bishop, Secretary, Chaplains, Historiographer, and other customary expenses, including the rent of the residence of the Assistant Bishop and the sum of fifteen dollars to the sexton of St. Paul's Church, Alexandria.

Judge Sheffey presented the report of the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute. Resolutions adopted.

The Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute submit to the Council their annual report :

The interest on the debt of the Institute is paid by Mrs. Stuart regularly every six months. The insurance on the property is kept up, and the grounds and buildings are kept in good condition and repair. Indeed, a more beautiful site for a girls' school can hardly be found anywhere, and in no establishment are there better arrangements for the health and comfort of the pupils. As the report of Mrs. Stuart shows, there has been almost an entire exemption from sickness. Mrs. Stuart states that the present session has, in most particulars, been a very satisfactory one; that whilst the present number of boarding pupils—sixty-three—is slightly smaller than it was last year, the day school is larger. In the boarding department there are pupils from sixteen States. The number from Virginia is twenty—an increase in the patronage of the Diocese gratifying to the Trustees, and

which they trust will continue. The spirit which pervades the household is pure, refined, and marked by strong religious influence. Four of the pupils were baptized by the Rector of Trinity Church, Staunton; twelve were confirmed by the Bishop in April. One was confirmed in Charlottesville; and three, one a Presbyterian, one a Baptist, and one a Methodist, are prepared for church-membership when they return to them respectively. Thus it appears that during the session sixteen of the pupils have confessed Christ before the world, and it is believed that they will adorn the profession of their faith by lives of fidelity and zeal in their Saviour's service.

One member of the corps of teachers, the instructress in French, will withdraw from her position at the close of the session. Her place will be filled by the appointment of a thoroughly competent and skilled instructor. The commencement exercises will be held on the 7th and 8th of June next. The friends and patrons of the Institute are cordially invited to attend these interesting exercises.

Mrs. Stuart closes her very satisfactory report, "asking for the prayers and good wishes of all who are interested in the *true* education of our girls."

The Trustees heard, with much gratification and pleasure, that part of the addresses of the Assistant Bishop, in which he spoke of his visit to the Institute. His opinion as to its management, its influence for good, and its prospects for continued usefulness, the Trustees think is just and wellfounded, and they sincerely trust that in the near future the income of the Institute may become the means of increasing the number of scholarships, and adding largely to the facilities for educating the daughters of clergymen and other members of the church who need ssistance in securing "the true education of our girls," of which Mrs. Stuart speaks. If the aim of the Principal and Faculty of the Institute continues to be thorough instruction in every branch of knowledge taught in it, and to inspire each pupil with an elevated sense of right and an earnest desire to attain all that is noble and true in woman, as Mrs. Stuart has heretofore declared to be her object, and as the Trustees believe is her purpose, then will the beneficent influence of the Institute pervade more and more the households of the church throughout our land, and promote its prosperity and spiritual welfare.

The trustees renew their expressions of commendation of the Institute as one of the most important of our Diocesan institutions, and respectfully ask the Council to adopt the following resolutions :

That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia has heard, with gratification, the report of the trustees of the Virginia Female Institute, this day made, which, taken in connection with the words of the Assistant Bishop, in his address on the same subject, give strength to the opinion that this Diocesan training school for girls is growing more and more in the confidence of the Church, and, as a nursery of refined and Christian culture, deserves continued and increased confidence and support. The Council therefore again Adjournment.

most cordially commends the Institute to the continued patronage of the Diocese, and earnestly unites with the principal in asking for it "the prayers and good wishes of all who are interested in the true education of our girls."


