

# RULES OF ORDER.

# ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand except to address the chair.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

ist. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed :

The appointment of a Treasurer *pro tempore*, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the *second* day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Election.

Rules of Order.

A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

A Committee on Sunday Schools.

3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishops' Addresses, the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such other Committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

### ORDER OF DEBATE.

Ist. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing be read by the Secretary, before debate.

2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *procided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

# GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectators shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

*Resolved*, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia earnestly protests against the adoption by the General Convention of the Report of the Committee on the Hymnal in its present form, and especially against the rejection of so many of the hymns which, for generations past, have been the joy and comfort of Christian hearts.

On motion of Rev. T. G. Dashiell, the amendment to Article X of the Constitution, proposed at the last Council, was adopted by this Council, so that Article X, as amended, reads as follows:

"Each Annual Council shall elect by ballot a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese, and who shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed."

### **REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH INVESTMENTS.**

The committee appointed at the last Council to examine the trust funds of the Diocese and to report to the Council how the said funds have been invested, etc., would submit the following: The committee met in the State Bank, Richmond, June 8th, 1888, Rev. T. G. Dashiell was in the chair, and the Rev. J. B. Funsten was chosen Secretary. Mr. R. Taylor Scott, who had been requested by the Chairman to stop in Alexandria on his way from Warren-

ton to Richmond, and to make examination into the Episcopal Fund, made report that he had attended to the duty, and that he had found the report made by the Treasurer, Colonel Herbert, to be in every particular conformed to the report made on page 123 of the JOURNAL of 1888. The investments are made by the Treasurer. They are held by the Trustees named on page 5 of the Journal of 1888. The securities are kept in a box in the First National Bank of Alexandria, and are properly marked.

A sub-committee, consisting of the Rev. H. M. Jackson, Messrs. Joseph R. Anderson and R. Taylor Scott, then examined the securities of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Mr. Mayo, the Treasurer, was present, and gave the committee valuable assistance and information.

The examination showed investments and cash amounting in par value to \$25,328.27 as per report, JOURNAL 1888, page 122, and having an estimated present value of \$27,593.27. The investments are made by a Committee of the Board of Managers; they are held by the Trustees named on page 5, JOURNAL 1888; are first-class securities, and are kept in a box in the State Bank. They are carefully examined, and a list made of them by a Special Committee of the Board at its annual meeting immediately before the meeting of the Council.

The income consists of interest upon the securities and collections from the churches, and disbursed by the Board at its annual meeting in May of each year.

The securities of the Bruce Fund were then placed in the hands of the sub-committee by the Bishop, who attended at their request, and gave a history of the fund, and stated how its income was applied.

The investments "first-class" are held by the Bishop and Mr. William M. Hill, and are kept in the State Bank. The sub-committee ascertain the report concerning the fund on pages 116-117 of the JOURNAL of 1888, to be correct in every particular.

The securities of the Disabled Clergy Fund were subsequently examined by the Rev. Joshua Peterkin, Rev. J. B. Funsten and Rev. T. G. Dashiell.

The report to the last Council stated the assets to be \$19,000 in bonds and \$433.33 in cash. Some of the investments—Richmond City Bonds—matured last July and were paid by the city to the trustees. This necessitated a change in the investments, but the amount in the hands of the trustees aggregates what was reported to the Council in May, 1888. The securities all are first-class and held by trustees and kept in the State Bank.

Disbursements have been made by the Treasurers, acting under orders passed by the Council in the year 1856. This order reads as follows:

"Resolved, That the appropriations be confined to the relief or aid of disabled clergymen of our own Diocese, and such as have labored in the said office therein for at least three years before the disability shall have occurred; and no appropriation exceeding \$250 shall be made in any year to any one individual."

The original Board of Trustees did not all reside in Richmond. The

Treasurers therefore did not summon them to meet in Richmond when any case of pressing necessity arose, but in emergencies would act alone under the general instructions referred to—both in making investments and in assisting beneficiaries.

It is within the power of members of this committee to bear testimony to the judgment and kindness with which the Treasurers have acted toward some of our needy and now deceased brethren.

The committee think it a matter of importance that this Fund should bereafter be managed by a board whose members live near each other; that the board should meet when the disbursements are made; that the investments be made by the board, or a sub-committee of the same, and the securities examined and listed *at least* once a year.

The committee recommend the adoption of the following:

*Resolved*, That a clergyman be added to the Board of Trustees of the Fund for Relief of the Disabled Clergy.

Respectfully submitted,

Rev. F. F. Reese offered the following :

*Resolved*, That a Committee of two Clergymen and three Laymen be appointed to consider the expediency of appointing one or more Boards of Trustees, to be legally incorporated for the purpose of holding, subject to the direction and control of the Diocesan Council, all invested funds now existing, or hereafter to be accumulated, for the benefit of the various Church charities of the Diocese.

The motion was carried, and the following committee appointed :

Mr. W. B. Martin offered the following :

*Resolved*, That the Trustees of the Fund for Disabled Clergy be directed to expend each year, if necessary, all amounts received by them for the Disabled Clergy, and the interest on investments held by them.

Rev. John K. Mason moved to limit the grant in any case from the Fund to four hundred dollars.

#### Dr. Nelson's Sermon Ordered to be Printed,

Mr. Woolnough offered the following :

*Resolved*, That the distribution of the income, or other property of the Funds for the relief of the Disabled Clergy and of the Widows and Orphans, be made annually by this Council; and that to assist this Council a committee or committees be appointed each year by the Bishop, who shall investigate all cases deserving relief, and report each year to this Council.

On motion of Rev. H. M. Jackson the above resolutions were referred to a Special Committee, consisting of the following :

The Bishop then read his Annual Address :

**Rev. AND DEAR BRETHREN:** 

It is certainly with very great pleasure and, I trust, with sincere gratitude to the Giver of all good, that I am permitted to unite with you in this, our Ninety-fourth Annual Council. The sickness which detained me from your last meeting continued through the whole summer and fall, so that I have but a brief account to give of work done during the past year.

Commencing with a visit to the Theological Seminary, I spent several days, as requested by the Board of Trustees, instructing the senior class in the rubrics and teaching of the Prayer Book, and while there, February 17th, 1889, preached in the chapel and confirmed sixteen.

February 24.—In St. Paul's Church, Petersburg, confirmed fifteen white and one colored; and in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Blandford, confirmed twelve.

March 13.—Christ Church, Richmond, confirmed sixteen.

March 13.-St. Mark's, Richmond, confirmed eight.

March 10.-Moore Memorial, Richmond.

March 10.—St. James', Richmond, confirmed thirteen.

March 17.--St. Paul's, Richmond, confirmed twenty-six, one of whom was from St. James.

March 17.-Monumental, Richmond, confirmed nineteen.

March 24.—St. Andrew's, Richmond, confirmed twelve.

March 24.—Grace, Richmond, confirmed twenty-four, one being from the Monumental.

March 31.—St. John's, Richmond, confirmed forty, and in Weddell Memorial Chapel, of the same church, confirmed six.

April 3.—Grace, Petersburg, confirmed twenty-six; and in St. Stephen's (colored), thirteen.

April 6.—St. Thomas', Berkley, confirmed eleven; and at night in St. Paul's Chapel, nine.

April 7.—Confirmed twenty in St. Paul's; and ten in Grace (colored), Norfolk.

April 8.—In Christ Church, Norfolk, confirmed twenty-three; in St. Peter's, fifteen; and in St. Luke's, forty-eight, of whom three were from St. Paul's, three from Ascension, Atlantic City, a mission of St. Paul's, and one from Grace (colored).

# MINISTERS DECEASED.

Three of our brethren of the clergy have died during the past year—Rev. John A. Wharton, Rector of Lee Parish, June 20th, 1888, in the 86th year of his age. He was quite a remarkable man, and his career a peculiar one. His whole life was passed in his native county and amongst his own people. After being a lawyer for a number of years, he was ordained a Deacon, and took charge of St. John's Church, Liberty, still continuing to practice his profession. A few years later he was admitted to Priest's orders, and was subse-

quently made Judge of his County Court, but whether at the bar or on the bench he never compromised his ministerial character, and always maintained a good report of them that were without. He continued to work on to the last, being earnest, faithful and abundant in labors for the advancement of the interests of religion and of his beloved Church. He now rests from his labors, but his works do follow him.

1888, August 13, Rev. Mack F. Nelson, a colored Deacon, died in charge of St. Philip's Church, Richmond, in the 26th year of his age. His health had been feeble since his ordination, which prevented him from making full proof of his ministry, but he was a good man, and gave promise of usefulness had his life been spared.

1880, May 5.-Rev. Davis M. Wood, Rector of Nelson Parish, Nelson county, after officiating at one of his churches in the morning, was on his way to an afternoon service at another, when, in an instant, his lifeless body fell from his horse to the ground, and his spirit returned to God who gave it. But it was a good time and place for such a consecrated man to die. Mr. Wood was ordained in June, 1881, and at once offered himself for Foreign Missionary work, but was not accepted because of the feeble state of his health. After laboring for a short time in Charlotte, and then in Roanoke, he removed to Nelson county, where, by his lovely Christian character and conduct and his earnest devotion to the work of the ministry, he won the confidence and affection of all his people. His departure from amongst us cannot but be mourned, not only by his own family and flock, but by all his brethren throughout the Diocese.

I mention in this connection the death, in Lexington, Virginia, August 31st, 1888, of William Charles Ludwig, in the 25th year of his age, a very lovely Christian character, and one of our most promising candidates for Holy Orders.

The Council has never taken any action, I believe, on the death of a Minister or Layman of the Diocese, and this good custom I trust will not be broken. But it may not be amiss to remind you that the long familiar person and voice of Hon. Hugh W. Sheffey, of Trinity Church, Staunton, will no more be seen and heard amongst us, he having been called to give up his stewardship on the 8th day of April last. How greatly will his faithful and useful services be missed in his own Parish, in the Council of the Diocese and in our General Convention. We may all well pray that God will raise up some

The Richmond City Missionary Society offered to furnish the salary for a second Evangelist or General Missionary, and Rev. J. J. Norwood accepted an appointment to that important office. Since the first of January he and Rev. E. Meade have both been doing faithful and efficient service in the vacant Parishes of the Diocese.

I have performed several trusts which were committed to me by the last Council, a record of which may be found on the pages of its JOURNAL.

I think it will appear from the Parochial Reports, and from those of your Treasurer and of our various charitable and educational institutions, that the Diocese is enjoying such a measure of prosperity as should fill our hearts with gratitude to God and move us to consecrate ourselves more entirely to His service. Having no legislation to propose and no special suggestions to make, I conclude by commending you, my dear brethren, to the guidance and direction of the Holy Spirit in all your deliberations. Assistant Bishop's Address.

The Assistant Bishop then read his Annual Address :

#### ADDRESS OF BISHOP RANDOLPH.

#### BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND THE LAITY:

My work during the year has been chiefly among the country churches of the Diocese. I wish that the labors could have been more abundant. From many appointments which I had proposed to fill, I was detained by inability for public speaking. These I hope to fill among the first appointments of the coming year. The church in the country, in my judgment, is growing steadily, notwithstanding the constant drain by removal to the city of its strongest supporters. The privation seems to have resulted in many cases in an increase of energy and the sense of responsibility on the part of those who are left. Still with many of them it is a close and constant struggle. I could tell you of beautiful self-denials of women and men in the country to hold on to the church of their fathers and to give it to their children. These are critical times in the history of the country churches of Virginia. Listen to the appeals of your Diocesan Missionary Society as the strongest that comes to you. Keep your ministers in the country at their posts a few years longer, and they will build strength and coherence out of the new elements they are gathering into the church. Her influence is far wider than the list of confirmations would indicate. Her worship and her ministry are steadily gaining upon the confidence and reverence of the people.

#### CHURCHES CONSECRATED.

In Petersburg on the 3d of June, 1888, the Church of the Good Shepherd, Memorial, was consecrated. The Rev. Dr. Haynes preached the consecration sermon. The Rev. Dr. Gibson and the Revs. F. Scott and Robert Goodwin assisted in the services. The church was erected to take the place of Blandford Chapel by a generous Christian lady, a member of St. Paul's Church. It is in the charge of the Rev. Mr. Jones, who is nominally the assistant of St. Paul's, but practically the Rector of this new and beautiful church.

On the 15th of July, 1888, the Church of Our Saviour, Whittle Parish, was consecrated. The Revs. John McGill, A. P. Gray, W. F. Gardner and B. T. Turner were present and assisted in the services. The church is an excellent building, and accommodates perhaps two hundred and fifty or three hundred persons. It is gratifying to observe evidences of interest on the part of persons in this thickly settled community, who were comparative strangers to our worship in the services of the Episcopal Church. It is hoped that good is being accomplished by the opening of this new field.

On July the 16th, 1888, Trinity Church at Manassas, Prince William county, was consecrated. The Rector, Rev. A. P. Gray, who has since removed from the Diocese to our sincere regret, was present and assisted in the services. By his removal this church has been deprived of regular services; but it has been visited from time to time by the Evangelist, and lay services are conducted by students from the Seminary.

September 4th, 1888, Grace Chapel, formerly Ewell's Chapel, Prince William county, was consecrated. The clergy present were the Rev. Dr. Davis, of Leesburg, who preached the consecration sermon, and the Rev. John Ambler, Deacon in charge of the church in Middleburg. This church is now in charge of the Rev. B. T. Turner, Rector of the Church of our Saviour in Fauquier.

September 13th, 1888, St. Luke's Church, Rappahannock, Fau-

quier county, was consecrated. The consecration sermon was preached by the Rev. G. W. Nelson, and the services conducted by the Rev. G. M. Murray and the Rev. H. B Lee. For several years this has been a struggling mission. It is hoped that a future of much usefulness is before it.

October 18th, 1888, Christ Church, Amelia Courthouse, was consecrated. The Rev. J. Ware, of Farmville, preached the consecration sermon, and the Rev. A. B. Tizzard assisted in the services. The Rev. Mr. Ware gives this church a portion of his time. The building and the furnishing of this church was a labor and sacrifice of a few members whose fidelity is an example to the Diocese.

November 27th, Stras Memorial Church at Tazewell Courthouse, was consecrated. The Rev. John Lloyd, of Abingdon, preached the consecration sermon. The Rev. G. G. Smead, of Pulaski City and the Rev. Charles Gauss, Deacon in charge, assisted in the services. The church is very commodious, and constructed of the best material at a cost of about \$3,000 Our Church is almost a stranger in that portion of Virginia, but is making steady progress in the good will and the confidence of the people.

On the 17th of February, 1889, Ascension Church, Keysville, Charlotte county, was consecrated. The Rev. Alexander Overby, the Rector, assisted in the services. By the faithful and efficient efforts of Mr. Overby in collecting funds and managing affairs, this church was rescued from sale at public auction and the reproach of a seemingly hopeless debt removed. It is an excellent church building.

There are ten other church buildings in process of erection in various portions of the Diocese, which it is hoped will be ready for consecration during the coming year. Parish buildings for readingrooms and associations for church work are being erected in several of the older Parishes. Among them, in St. John's, Portsmouth, and St. John's, Hampton. These are considered most valuable additions to church property, and furnish facilities for wider and more efficient Parish work.

On November 15th I attended a meeting of the House of Bishops, held in St. John's Chapel, Washington, for the purpose of electing two missionary Bishops.

same Commission, held also in Washington. The members of the Commission express much gratification and confidence in the colored work in this Diocese. It makes a larger appropriation to Virginia, as our work here is more extensive than in any other Diocese. It may be remembered that a considerable portion of the address to the last Diocesan Council was given to a review of the history of the legislation and of the sentiments of the Diocese towards Christian missionary work among our colored population. In response to the recommendations contained in the address for some decisive action, defining the relations of the colored Clergy and churches to the organic law and governmental machinery of the Diocese, a committee was appointed to take the subject into consideration. That committee reported certain alterations and additions to the Article of the Constitution prescribing the organization of the legislative body of the Diocese. The report was approved by the Council, and comes before the present Council for final action.

As this is the only occasion upon which I shall allude to this subject, I deem it my duty to call your attention to certain principles which seem to me to be just and true, as bearing upon the relations between ourselves and the colored race, in the affairs of the government of this Church. The government of our Church is, perhaps, more than any other of the church systems of Christendom, a government of the people. The fountain of authority is in the spiritual sovereignty of the people. The voters of a congregation, being contributors and twenty-one years of age, elect their vestry; the vestry elects the minister; the vestry elects its Lay Delegate to the Council : the Council legislates for the local affairs of the Diocese, and also in its relation as a unit in the affairs of government over all the Dioceses. The Council elects Bishops and delegates to the General Convention. The General Convention legislates upon doctrine, discipline and worship for the whole Church. The General Convention, then, is constituted by the votes of these members of the congregation who contribute to its support and who are twenty-one years of age.

This system of government is based upon the assumption of the possession by this voter of certain elements of moral character, of knowledge, of personal self-control and dignity, which, in some degree, belong to the white race in all communities. This voter is also the heir of ages of civilization, through centuries of discipline, by religion, by law, through many revolutions which have taught

through suffering the value and the meaning of principles, and trained them to bear the strain of the responsibility of governing and thinking for themselves.

The government of a Church by the people is the highest mission in this world to which the people can be called. The determination of the doctrine, discipline and worship of a Church by the people involves a strain upon intelligence, upon moral principles and upon all the elements of character which result from the highest discipline of Christian civilization. Do we propose to clothe people who are not twenty-one years of age, no, not ten years of age, in these powers of self-development, with the responsibilities of a complex government like this? Is it justice to the doctrine, discipline and worship of that grand Church which we have inherited to entrust its purity, its stability and its mighty mission under God to a people who have had no such training, no such discipline of ages of self-control and of moral and intellectual progress? The question, with reference to the negro as a legislator in the Episcopal Church, is not a question of race, a question of color, but it is a question of faculty, of ability. It is a question of capacity of character.

Of course there are marked exceptions here and there, which we thankfully recognize as signs of promise for the future; but systems of popular government must be framed, not with reference to the capacities of the few, but with reference to the level of the many. Stand face to face with an average man of this race dwelling among us. He has lovable qualities, and you and your children have loved him for generations, and love him to-day. He is kind and shrewd, he is polite and genial, he is fluent, and often eloquent in speech. What is the difference between you and him? At first you are puzzled to define it. But place him in conditions where he is called to exercise faculties for duties which belong to what you call civilization, the forms, the meaning, the complex relations of the government of society, then you see his lack, then you begin to see the gap between you and him; he is bewildered; he loses his head; he is inaccessible to ideas, and government is instinct with ideas. He is without fixed purpose, steadiness of aim, self-control. You cannot depend upon him; he is moved by unruly impulses, and of these he is unconscious. There is a deep content with himself, that keeps his life down to the same dead level. Those faculties of steady purpose and will and openness to ideas, which

have trained us to deal with the formal and complex relations of government through centuries of discipline, he has had no opportunity to develop.

The question is not one of race, not one of color, but of incapacity to deal successfully and intelligently with this highest form of government—the guarding of the purity of the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Church by the people themselves.

What, then, seems to be the line of our duty to these brethren of another race? Surely the duty of teaching, the duty of training, guiding, helping, lifting them, seeking them for their sakes and for Christ's sake—through disappointments, through misunderstanding, through alienations, and imputations, without even the reward of gratitude, it may be. Still we must be patient, we must give, we must work and not be weary, we must pray for these children of our Father whom He has given us to train. If we do this the blessing will come to us now and it will come multiplied in the future, and other generations may see the solution of the problems which perplex us of to-day, in this remnant of the race, educated in morals, in religion, in manhood, and transplanted to their old home, to constitute a nucleus for the regeneration and the salvation of this great division of God's family of man.

May the spirit of reasonableness and fearlessness in the path of duty, the spirit of love and of light guide us in this and in all the responsibilities of legislators for the Church of God.

The Council then proceeded to the election of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

Report of Special Committee on Disabled Clergy Fund.

Rev. John K. Mason moved that all speeches on the subject of the amendment to Article II of the Constitution be limited to ten minutes. Carried.

Rev. H. B. Lee moved that the order of the day be suspended for five minutes to receive the report from the special committee on the subject of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

The motion was carried, and the report was then read by Rev. H. M. Jackson as follows:

The committee to which was referred resolutions touching the management and distribution of the Fund for Disabled Clergy, report :

I. That the trustees or committee in charge of the distribution of this Fund should make liberal appropriation to the Disabled Clergy of the Diocese, and that their policy should be to provide ample maintenance for those who, from disease or age, have become incapacitated for active service, rather than to build up a capitalized fund from the offerings of the people.

2. To this end, if the necessities of the case require, not only should the entire amount derived from the annual offerings of the people and from the interest on invested funds be expended, but also, rather than any man should suffer, the available capitalized funds in their hands should be utilized.

3. That we find it impossible to designate a fixed sum to be allowed as a stipend to each disabled Clergyman, but that this difficult and delicate matter must be confided to the discretion of the trustees or committee charged with the distribution of this Fund.

4. That we recognize the wisdom of providing a fund to meet exigencies, but we discountenance the accumulation of such a fund at the expense of present necessities, and recommend the following resolution:

*Resolved*. That the Council hereby instructs the trustees or committee of the Fund for Disabled Clergy to capitalize neither the interest or dividends accruing from investments, nor the offerings of the people, except in such case as that, after ample and liberal appropriations, a surplus may be found remaining.

#### ARTICLE II.

SEC. I. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop, if there be one, and of the ministers (being white) who now are, or may hereafter be, canonically settled in Parishes or churches within this Diocese, Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, Missionaries within this Diocese, and under its ecclesiastical authority, being clergymen of this Church, and canonically connected with this Diocese: *Provided*, that any such ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members *ex officio*: *Provided further*, that no

minister under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat in the Council, and no minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC. 2. The Council shall also be composed of lay members (being white), consisting of one delegate for each Parish or church, chosen by the vestry thereof. Every Parish or church having more than one officiating minister, canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church.

SEC. 3. The Council shall yet further be composed of four clerical delegates from the colored missionary jurisdiction of the Diocese, as constituted under Canon XIII—of Colored Mission churches. The colored Clergy now connected with the Diocese shall however retain their right to a seat and voice in the Council.

# PROPOSED SUBSTITUTE FOR AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II OF THE CONSTITUTION.

#### ARTICLE II.

SECTION I. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop (if there be one) and of the Ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who now are or may hereafter be canonically settled in Parishes or Churches within this Diocese; Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia; Missionaries within this Diocese and under its ecclesiastical authority, being Clergymen of this Church, and canonically connected with this Diocese: *Provided*, that any such Ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members *ex officio* : *Provided further*, that only such Colored Ministers shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article: *Provided further*, that no Minister under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat in the Council, and no Minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC. 2. The Council shall also be composed of Lay members, consisting of one delegate for each Parish or Church entitled to representation, chosen

by the Vestry thereof, except as hereinafter provided. Every Parish or Church having more than one officiating Minister, canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many Lay delegates as it has Ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church: *Provided*, that only such colored delegates shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article.

SEC. 3. Provision shall be made by Canon for a Convocation of the Colored Clergy and Laity of the Diocese. This Convocation shall be deliberative, and shall have such legislative powers as the Council from time to time may delegate. This Convocation shall be entitled to send two Clerical and two Lay delegates to represent them in this Council, who shall have the privileges of the floor of the Council, and the right to vote on all matters affecting the Convocation, and on no other questions.

Rev. F. F. Reese moved to amend section 3 of Mr. Bryan's proposed amendment by omitting the words: "on all matters affecting the Convocation, and on no other questions," and to add the following :

"The colored Clergy connected with the Diocese on May 1st, 1889, shall, however, retain their right to a seat and voice in the Council so long as they shall retain their canonical connection with the Diocese, and subject to the restrictions and limitations affecting the rights of the Clergy to seats and voice in the Council, as provided by Section 1 of this Article of the Constitution."

Referred to same committee, with instructions to present a printed report to this Council.

The consideration of the report of the Committee on the Disabled Clergy Fund was resumed, and the recommendations of the report were approved.

Bishop Randolph read the report of the Committee on the Change of Name of the Church, and on "Proportional Representation":

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHANGE OF NAME OF CHURCH, AND ON "PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION."

The committee to whom were referred certain papers (JOURNAL 1887, page 63, and 1888, page 59) relating to the effort to "expunge the name Protestant Episcopal from the present designation of this Church in her laws and formularies"; and also those in regard to the unequal and unjust basis of representation in the House of Deputies of the General Convention, beg leave to offer the following resolutions for adoption by the Council:

Report of Committee on Change of Name and "Proportional Representation."

1. Resolved, That the word Protestant is understood by us, not only to condemn and repudiate the errors of the Church of Rome, but also to positively declare the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the sole rule of faith and practice. And as the word Protestant affirms our belief in the great truths of the Gospel, as embodied in our creeds, articles and homilies, so the word Episcopal proclaims our apostolic order and government.

2. Resolved, That this Church has been since the Reformation, in the 16th century, in its organization, its faith, its worship and its history a *Pro-testant Church*, holding vital relations of brotherhood and unity in essentials with all the Protestant churches of Christendom, and the name is dear to our hearts because of its association with all that has made the Church of our fathers glorious in the past, as the faithful teacher of truth and opposer of error.

3. Resolved, That to expunge the name Protestant Episcopal from its title would be not only to break with the history of this Church and of the Church of England, but would be rightly understood as an expression of opposition to Protestant principles, thus putting our Church outside the current of our national life, and destroying its influence and its mission to the people of America.

4. *Resolved*, That to expunge the words Protestant Episcopal from our title would endanger the organic unity of the Dioceses, since Christian men cannot be expected to surrender what they hold to be essential truths of the Gospel for the appearance of external or governmental unity.

5. *Resolved*, That the Diocese of Virginia implores those brethren who may have committed themselves to this measure, to consider the subject in all its relations before they assume the responsibility of a position which imperils the unity of this Church.

6. *Resolved*, That the Diocese of Virginia most earnestly and lovingly appeals to her sister Dioceses to unite in determined opposition to the effort to expunge the words Protestant Episcopal, either from the title page of the Prayer-book or from the name of the Church.

7. *Resolved*, That proportional representation is the only just principle in the organization of the legislative bodies of our Church, and we declare our conviction that there is great need of reform in the Constitution of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, both as to its size and its basis of representation.

Report of Managers of Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Rev. W. C. Latané offered the following, which was carried :

Whereas, the Evangelists of this Diocese are sent forth at great expense to the Diocese for the special benefit of the vacant Parishes in the Diocese; and

Whereas, the said vacant Parishes are at no expense in supporting a minister; therefore—

*Resolved*, That the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society be directed to write to the treasurers of the Parishes that are now vacant, or that may hereafter become vacant, and earnestly request them to collect from the subscribers in their respective Parishes at least a fair proportion of their usual subscriptions to their minister's salary, to be paid into the treasury of the Diocesan Missionary Society towards the support of the Evangelists of this Diocese.

Rev Dr. Gibson, from the Committee on Elections, reported on the cases of Mr. B. W. Stras, of Stras Memorial Church, Tazewell county, and of Dr. Izard, of Pocahontas, that they were not legally entitled to seats in the Council, but recommended that they be invited to honorary seats in the Council, without votes. The recommendation was adopted.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the Report of the Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

REPORT OF MANAGERS OF WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund report the condition of things as rather discouraging. The Parishes and Churches u-ull not furnish the means to give the measure of relief we desire for the destitute households of our departed brethren.

The contributions in 1888 were \$1,209.56 from *seventy* churches and individuals. This year they are \$812.82, from *sixty-nine* churches. In consequence of this deficiency, the amount to be distributed could not be increased. *Twenty-two hundred and ten* dollars was the whole amount the Board had at their disposal to be distributed to *seventeen* beneficiaries. one new applicant having been admitted. They felt it to be right to substitute the name of the new beneficiary for that of one of fifteen years' standing, and thus only were prevented from diminishing the small amounts granted to the others.

The principal of the Fund now amounts to \$23,142.27, yielding an income this year of only \$1,405.70. We must look to the members of the churches in the Diocese to supply the remainder of the amount sorely needed by the increasing number of those who are asking relief at our hands.

He is thankful that he has been able to officiate regularly in his turn in the chapel, and in the faculty meeting on Thursday night.

The *Preparatory Department* has, in his judgment, been well taught, and its members have made good progress in their studies.

As Dean, I would add that the religious spirit of the Seminary has been good, as shown by its interest in missions, and in every good work.

**REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.**

The Professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully submits the following report of the studies pursued under his direction during the current session:

To the Junior Class I have given instruction in Chadbourne's Natural Theology.

The *Middle Class*, reciting five times a week, has studied Butler's Analogy, and Knapp's Theology. The former they have finished, and they are in review of the latter. They have also been able to give a weekly recitation to Oehler's Old Testament Theology.

The Senior Class, with three recitations a week, and the Wednesday evening exercises, has studied the 39 Articles with Boultbee, and are now closing with the review. They have also in Natural Theology studied Hopkins' Outline Man, and in Homiletics, Dr. Broadus's work.

I have given the usual lectures on Liturgics, and hope before the end of the session to be able to give a course on Christian Ethics.

#### REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF THE GREEK LANGUAGE, &C., &C.

#### To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Greek Language, New Testament Literature, Church Polity and Pastoral Theology, respectfully submits the following annual report :

The Senior Class has read in Greek, Ephesians, Colossians, Philippians, the Catholic Epistles, the Apocalypse, and are now reading St. Luke's Gospel. They have also studied Schaff's Companion to the Greek Testament, and English version. In Polity they have studied with lectures in class the Third, Seventh, and part of the Fifth books of Hooker, and Butler's Protestant Episcopal Doctrine and Church Unity. In Pastoral Theology they have studied the Pastoral Epistles in Greek, and Meade on the Pastoral Office, with parallel references to other books and lectures in class.

The *Middle Class* has read in Greek, I and II Corinthians, Romans, Galatians, Hebrews and Philippians.

The *Junior Class* has read in Greek, St. John, St. Matthew, with parallel references to the other synoptic Gospels, and is now finishing Thessalonians.

In response to the request of the Trustees, he has frequently attended the Preparatory Classes, and finds them most thoroughly and efficiently taught.

#### REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY AND CANON LAW.

#### To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Ecclesiastical History and Canon Law respectfully submits the following report:

The Senior Class, with three recitations a week, has studied Short's History of the Church of England, Green's Short History of the English People, and has privately read for examination Martineau's Church History in England. Lectures, on which the class took notes, have been given to supplement the text-books. At present the class is studying the Constitutions and Canons of the Church. Before the close of the session notes will be given on the History of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States.

The Middle Class, with three recitations a week, has read essays on assigned topics and has studied Smith's Student's Ecclesiastical History (two volumes) from the beginning of the Reformation period down to our own times. Fisher's History of the Christian Church has been used as a textTheological Seminary.

book, omitting all that portion which relates to the history of the Church in England or the United States. The class is at present reviewing.

The Junior Class, reciting four times a week, has gone through Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and is at present studying, as a brief course in comparative religion, "The Ancient World and Christianity," by De Pressensé. The members of the class have also read carefully prepared essays on assigned topics, in some cases giving the results of independent investigation.

#### REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF HEBREW, ORIENTAL LANGUAGES, AND APOLOGETICS.

#### To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

I would respectfully report as follows:

The *Senior Class* has read critically in Hebrew, portions of the books of Isaiah and Jeremiah, making at the same time a thorough study of the periods and events of their prophetic ministries. It has studied also Muller's Syntax.

The *Middle Class* has read twenty-five Psalms critically, sections of the books of Proverbs and Ecclesiastes, in connection with the introduction to the same, special attention being given to the principles of Hebrew Poetry.

The Juniors have read in Hebrew, Genesis (excepting the poetical portions), parts of Exodus, Deuteronomy, Joshua, Judges, and Kings. They have had also the usual instruction in Apologetics.

ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT TO TRUSTEES (1889).

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

The whole number of pupils entered the present session is eighty-seven, the decline from last year being chiefly in day-scholars.

The health of the school has rarely ever been so good. No epidemic has visited us, and there has been no case of serious sickness. In this respect, as well as in the excellent conduct and diligence of the boys, we have been singularly favored. The co-operation of the Associate Principal and of the other Masters, in every effort for the good of our common charge, has been earnest and effective, and no previous year has afforded us greater encouragement.

Mr. Wm. Cabell Brown, of the Seminary Junior Class, has conducted the Friday night devotional meeting for the boys, with an average attendance Report of Committee on the Hymnal.

of more than fifty, and highly gratifying results, while the Rev. Professor Nelson has continued indefatigable in the labors incident to his pastoral charge. The Rev. Professors Walker, Grammer and Crawford, have also laid us under obligation by occasional ministrations in the School Chapel. There have been nine confirmations during the session, the whole number of communicants among the boys being forty.

Rev. Dr. Hains, from the Committee on New Parishes, recommended that the petition of All Saints' Church, Richmond, for admission to the Council, be granted, all the requisite conditions to its admission having been complied with.

The recommendation of the committee was adopted by the Council.

Rev. A. S. Lloyd, from the Committee on the Bruce Fund, reported having examined the accounts of the said Fund and found them correct.

Bishop Randolph then read the report of the Committee on the Hymnal:

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE HYMNAL.** 

The committee appointed by the last Council to report suggestions to this Council in relation to the improvement of the hymnal of our Church which, with the endorsement of the Council of this Diocese, would be recommended to the committee appointed by the General Convention of 1886. have had two meetings during the year. They desire me to state that the publication, a few days before their last meeting, of the preliminary report of the Committee on the Hymnal rendered much of the work which they had accomplished useless as the basis of a report to be laid before this Council.

It was presumed that the committee of the General Convention would delay the publication of their report until the Dioceses had had an opportunity of proposing contributions and suggestions, which would place them in possession of the general sentiment and wishes of the Church in the formation of a new hymnal.

That committee has considered it best to publish their report so that the Dioceses might review their work, and thus give them the benefit of suggestions and criticisms which might be guides and contributions to the full and final report which they will make to the General Convention. Your com-

mittee would have undertaken the work of review in a report for this Council but for lack of time and opportunity, the published report of the Hymnal Committee having been in circulation only a few days, aud only two members having had an opportunity of giving to it even a cursory examination.

To form an intelligent opinion and a fair judgment upon the proposed new hymnal would require careful examination and critical study. The importance of the subject in relation to the spiritual life of the Church cannot be overestimated.

Some one has said, "Let me write the songs of a nation and I do not care who makes the laws." A great Englishman said not long ago, "Let me write the hymns and the music of the Church and I care very little who writes the theology." I cannot fully endorse this last statement, for a true theology I regard as a spiritual atmosphere in which true hymns and noble music are born and nurtured, but still the general meaning is true that the hymns which our people sing have an influence which cannot be calculated in moulding their theology and their religious life. Weak, sentimental hymns tend to produce a weak, sentimental religion; mere doctrinal hymns encourage a quarrelsome and dogmatic religion; cold, didactic hymns encourage a mechanical and heartless religion; hymns with too much of the lyrical element in them encourage the habit of morbid introspection, which is adverse to healthy spiritual growth; ritualistic hymns, which must be had as poetry, are yet successful methods of sowing seeds of religious error in receptive minds kindled to emotion by religious music. On the other hand, hymns which breathe true penitence, generous trust, living faith, and joy and thanksgiving, and reverence will develop the growth of a strong, manly and impassioned piety.

The work of the committee of the General Convention has been more radical than was perhaps anticipated; they have added 447 new hymns; they have changed six of the old hymns, and they have omitted a large number; some of them, doubtless, useless for worship and without merit as hymns; but a large number, perhaps as many as seventy, of those which have been omitted are dear and consecrated by blessed associations not only to Christian worshippers of our own communion but to all branches of the Church among English-speaking people—such as Cowper's true and beautiful hymn, "God moves in a mysterious way," or Francis Lyte's noble, triumphant hymn, "Jesus I my cross have taken"; one verse is enough to give it immortality:

"Take my soul thy full salvation; Rise o'er sin, and fear, and care; Joy to find in every station ! Something still to do or bear. Think what spirit dwells within thee: What a Father's smile is thine: What a Saviour died to win thee— Child of Heaven should'st thou repine?" Report of Committee on the Hymnal.

Or this hymn of George Keith's, which all our children know and which we grown people love more as the years go on—

"How firm a foundation ye saints of the Lord, Is laid for your faith in his excellent word."

Old Dr. Hodge could never read the hymn through; his voice would break with the triumph and the blessedness of the last line—"I'll never, no never, no never forsake."

It is a great wrong to cut us off from such hymns as these; their omission is the more unaccountable when we examine the new hymns and recognize the good critical judgment with which a large number of them have been selected from some of the best hymn writers in the literature of hymnology, greatly to the enrichment of our hymnal.

It is hoped that the enlargement of the hymnal, which is contemplated by the committee, will not prejudice the work in the eyes of the church; if we are to have a hymnal separate from the Prayer-book it is difficult to understand why objection should be made to an expansion of the book beyond the limits of the present number of our hymns; it may be said "we do not want a cumbrous, heavy book"; very true, but the difference in weight between a hymnal of 400 and another of 800 hymns would perhaps be three or four ounces, and this additional weight could not be a grievous burden to carry to church or to hold in the hands at worship even to the little children of our congregations.

Surely it is not a sufficient reason for impoverishing the worship of the church and the devotional culture of our people. Nor is the additional expense of a large hymnal a rational objection, though you hear it frequently urged. If the book lasts four or five years, the additional expense of a larger hymnal will perhaps average a few cents every year; the objection needs only a little arithmetic to expose its triviality.

It may be said, "Why have so large a number of hymns when so few are sung by the congregation?" The answer is, "Your congregation may not sing them because you, their leader and teacher, may have failed to introduce them in their hours of worship to the riches of our hymnology." If we are careless and narrow in our selections of songs for the sanctuary, we train our people to be narrow and careless too; we must remember that there are other congregations who may find in the hymns that we habitually neglect helps to their devotion and voices to their praise; we should remember that a church hymnal should embrace a variety adapted to every phase of religious feeling and of spiritual experience; to praise and penitence; to the bed of sickness; to the lonely and the suffering; to spring, summer and autumn; to youth and to age; they should interpret through poetry the voices of religion to all the varied conditions of our human life. Their main purpose is to be sung in the sanctuary, but their mission of comfort and help extends far beyond the hours of our worship with the congregation in the house of God.

#### Report of Committee on the Hymnal.

There can be no intelligent reason why we should not embrace in our hymnal all of the best hymns of our own time and of the past ages of the Christian Church.

Before closing these observations I may mention the surprise and disappointment with which we find in the new hymnal certain suggestive directions in connection with a number of the hymns, which, if the book is adopted as it is by the General Convention, will doubtless be interpreted as a sanction and authority from the General Church for the ceremonies to which they refer. We find notes after certain hymns which may in time rise to the dignity of Rubrical directions. "This hymn may be sung as a processional;" "this hymn must be sung as a recessional." There are many of us in this Church who still hold that the Rubrics in the Prayer-book contain authoritative directions for opening and for closing her regular services; that the performances referred to are without the authority and the sanction of law. There are others of us who regard these ceremonies in their intrinsic nature and effect as tending to produce sensational excitement rather than emotions of religious reverence, and that they are therefore below the dignity of Christian worship. However this may be, it will be time enough to introduce into our hymnal Rubrical directions concerning processionals and recessionals when the Rubrics in the Prayer-book shall prescribe them as proper ceremonies for opening and closing the worship. Those who indulge their fancies in such performances should be content with the immunity which they enjoy in many parts of the Church from interference on the part of the ecclesiastical authorities over them.

The Church, we may hope, is not yet prepared to prescribe and ordain such ceremonies, and, until it is so, there is manifest impropriety in such directions in a hymnal issued under the authority of and for the whole Church. Especial attention is called to the many beautiful hymns printed in the report, for which our grateful acknowledgments to the committee are due.

The object of this general criticism has been to call attention to the great importance of the subject, as well as to explain the failure of your committee to render a formal report. The committee have requested me to propose the following resolution:

"That this committee be requested by this Council to examine with critical care the preliminary report of the Committee on the Hymnal appointed by the General Convention between this and the meeting of that body, and to communicate their suggestions and the results of their investigations to the said Committee on the Hymnal and to our delegates to the General Convention."

The resolution was adopted.

Mr. John L. Williams presented the following :

Resolved, That the committee be requested to adopt such measures as

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.** 

The Committee on Finance beg to report as follows:

We have examined the account current of James T. Gray, Esq., Treasurer Contingent Fund of the Diocese, and found it correct in every particular, sustained by proper vouchers.

The Treasurer, on the 16th of May, 1888, was in debt to the State Bank of Virginia, Richmond, the sum of \$156.58. The receipts from the Contingent

Fund and from interest from May, 1888, to May, 1889, amounted to \$12,066.83, from which sum deduct the amount due the State Bank, and you have \$11,910.25 net receipts. Out of this was paid the current expenses of the Diocese, amounting to \$9,842.91, leaving a balance in the hands of your Treasurer on the 14th day of May, 1889, of \$2,067.34.

This is the most favorable report that has been made for many years. The expenses of the present Church year will be very much larger than the past year, as the General Convention and increased traveling expenses will be included, so we may not expect as large a balance at our next Council. The Treasurer reports his collection up to this morning at about \$7,000.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions :

I. That the Treasurer pay the customary charges for the salaries of the Bishop and Assistant Bishop, Secretary, Chaplains, Historiographer and other customary expenses, including the rent of the residence of the Assistant Bishop, the sum of \$25 to the Assistant Secretary of this Council and \$15 to the Sexton of St. Paul's Church, Lynchburg.

2. That the Secretary cause to be printed fifteen hundred copies of the JOURNAL as heretofore, and that he distribute, free of charge, so many as may be required for the use of the ministers and vestries of the Diocese, and dispose of the residue by sale as heretofore.

Rev. Dr. R. T. Davis presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church : Report of Committee on the State of the Church.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church, in bringing forward their report, would congratulate the Church upon the improved health of our beloved Bishop, and his ability to be present with the Council and to preside over its deliberations.

For this great mercy we should be thankful; and in the many evidences of the favor of God, which has been vouchsafed to us, we have reason to rejoice. The sum of confirmations reported is quite up to the average of past years, and even above it; and in several of our churches the number of the confirmed has been unusually large. And thus our ranks are kept full and are thickening, although in the course of nature our older members are departing year by year. Whilst God's blessings attend the labors of his ministering servants, young men and women come forward to take the places of those that are called to their heavenly rest; and if one generation of Christians passes away another still comes to succeed it.

The Parochial Reports bear testimony to the fact that many Lay-workers are laboring faithfully in Sunday-schools, and striving to train their young charge in the ways of piety and happiness; and though it is to be regretted that our country Parishes are being much depleted by removals, the persons so removing strengthen the city Parishes to which they go, and are not lost to the Church at large.

Your committee learn with pleasure that our church schools are well attended, and are in a flourishing condition, and the reports of the diligence and general behaviour of the pupils of both sexes are gratifying; and gratifying is the prosperity of the colored work in the Diocese, and the growing usefulness of the Colored Industrial and Divinity Schools at Petersburg and elsewhere.

Especially are we called upon to notice the marked increase of candidates for the ministry pursuing their studies at the Theological Seminary; and we find cause for thankfulness in the earnest tone which pervades that institution, and in the spirit of self-consecration which is manifested among the young men by their readiness to go to the heathen, or whithersoever God may call them. The Church has lately made more frequent prayer that God would send forth laborers into His harvest, and already the laborers are offering themselves. Let us not fail to note the coincidence.

Amongst the agencies by which, under God, has been brought about the spiritual prosperity that many of our congregations exhibit, your committee would observe that a prominent place must be assigned to the Associations, or "Missions," as they are often called. These protracted services of preaching, attended with much earnest prayer, and especially with specific prayers of intercession, have been greatly blessed in various places—alike in the conversion of sinners, and in the quickening of the spiritual life of those who have already professed Christ.

#### Report of Committee on the State of the Church.

In casting our eyes abroad to discern the existing state of the Church, we are obliged to notice some of the features in the prospect that are not altogether pleasing. In many places the attendance of the male members of our Christian families (and even of our male communicants) upon the public services of the sanctuary, is not what it ought to be. On Sunday evenings they are too often absent; and absent also, without good reason, on week days.

Your committee are persuaded, moreover, that the practice of family prayer is not generally observed in the households of our communion as it was wont to be by our pious forefathers, and as the Book of Common Prayer and the Canons of the Church direct. And perhaps to the neglect of these time-honored and pious customs may be attributed the fact that a larger proportion of our young men of Church families do not seek the ministry of reconciliation, and that there are at present so many vacant churches in our Diocese.

We fear, also, that the obligations of the day of sacred rest are too frequently disregarded when they interfere with inclination or convenience. As tending to diminish the amount of Sunday travel, and of Sunday work in handling and transporting freight, by which many railroad employees are deprived of opportunities of rest and worship, it seems to us that Christian people should throw all their influence upon the side of the discontinuance of Sunday trains, towards which end some steps have been lately taken by leading Northern railroads.

To the Committee on the State of the Church was referred a resolution of censure upon the new hymnal, which has just been put forth tentatively by the committee of the last General Convention, to whom the revision of the hymnal which we have been using was entrusted. In our opinion, the result of their labors is entirely unsatisfactory, and both because of what they have left out and of what they have inserted, we disapprove of their work. We hold that their proceeding in throwing out numbers of popular hymns (amongst them not a few of those most familiar and best loved) because of the fancied want of a certain churchly tone, is indefensible; and their recommendations, if adopted, will prove absolutely disastrous. On their principles very many of the lyrics of the inspired Psalmist would surely have been cast out of the collection. The dictum that a good hymn should contain only strains of praise, has no support in the sacred psalter. If we examine those compositions which were set forth to be sung by the ancient Church, and which furnished a model for the Church in all ages, we perceive at once that their authors gave free utterance to their sentiments and feelings of penitence as well as of thankfulness, and freely mingled both with pious musings and devout aspirations. Nor did they hesitate to make reference to the ungodly, and even to plead and argue with them.

A hymn may declare God's glory *indirectly* as well as directly; and it is only a shallow criticism which styles such a composition as "Sinners turn, why will ye die?" a hymn to sinners. Those well-known verses do constiReport of Committee on Sunday-schools.

tute indeed an appeal addressed to sinners, like the Psalmist's "Now consider this, ye that forget God, lest I tear you to pieces and there be none to deliver"; but the appeal is made upon the ground of the forbearance and loving kindness of Father, Son and Spirit, which are presented in the most edifying and affecting manner, and so as to enhance our conceptions of God's long suffering and grace.

Regarding it, therefore, as intolerable that we should, for no reason that we recognize as valid, be deprived of such hymns as "How firm a foundation," and "Come Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove," and "There is a fountain filled with blood," and others as precious, we conclude by expressing the hope that the Council will instruct our delegates to the General Convention to protest most earnestly against the adoption of the hymnal which is proposed for our acceptance.

Rev. F. F. Reese presented the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools :

#### Report of Committee on Sunday-schools.

Your Committee do not consider it necessary to lay any stress upon the value and importance of Sunday-schools. The subject has been again and again most emphatically and fully discussed, and we may take it for granted that a very small minority, if any at all, are prepared to doubt or deny so indisputable a proposition. The question is not, are Sunday-schools necessary and right, but are they effective—as effective as they might be and should be; and, if not, what are the reasons for their want of efficiency, and the methods of promoting that efficiency.

Considered now, as all enterprises for producing either material, moral or spiritual results ought to be considered, the question is asked. Do Sundayschools, as definite agencies for producing positive results in moral and religious training, produce those results in the highest measure now possible? Given a certain expenditure of energy, time and money, what relation do the results bear to it? Does it pay? To reduce waste of power and product is the problem of all productive enterprises. Is it not equally a proper question and a serious problem in the work of the Church? We are aware that moral and spiritual results cannot be reduced to statistics. We are aware that they are too far-reaching and too subtle-too much a question of persons, involving the delicate estimate of human character in the long run of life and eternity-to be made a basis for an exact induction. But allowing for all difficulties in the way of making estimates, reasoning from general observation, we believe that Sunday-schools are an expensive and wasteful (not in a pecuniary sense) machinery, as generally conducted. And the reason we venture to suggest is not so much from want of interest and zeal on the part of those engaged in them, lamentable as that oftentimes is, but from the want of common sense in the practical application of means to ends. Superintendents, yes, Rectors, teachers and officers, who are not only wellmeaning men, but who know their business and who exercise care and thought to increase their fitness, are a great want. A thoughtful and suggestive interest, the study of methods as well as efforts to increase personal efficiency, are still exceptional on the part of Sunday-school workers.

The Sunday-school is intended to instruct children in the fundamental facts and doctrines of the Christian religion, as this Church hath received the same, and to impress these facts and doctrines upon them as principles of right living; to inform the mind, stimulate the conscience, purify and elevate the motives and affections, and form habits of good character; in other words, to promote in them a living faith in Jesus Christ. It is not the only nor the most important agency for these purposes; but to do this is its reason for existence. To do its work, therefore, well, the teachers must know the facts and understand the doctrines; they must realize the necessity, and take pains to inform their own minds; they must study and understand proper methods of teaching; they must study child-life, its temptations and needs, its capacity, and how to influence the affections and wills and consciences of children; and, above all, they must, of course, be them-

selves persons whose lives are animated by the motives, and formed in the habits, and stimulated by the hopes of Christian manhood and womanhood.

We cannot take time to speak of the Superintendent's position and duties, except to say that it is absolutely essential that he learn the business of administering the affairs of a complex body formed for such a purpose; how to make its parts work smoothly, with the least waste and friction and loss of time; how to inspire everybody with the hopefulness that comes from the consciousness of being parts of a well-regulated and well-handled concern, and to conduct its general exercises with the promptness and vivacity so necessary in dealing with children.

How shall these most desirable ends be attained? How shall improvement be promoted? We desire to emphasize at this time only one suggestion, and that is by conference, discussion, and frequent interchange of ideas among those interested in the subject. In many schools one thing is done well: an infant class is well taught; a library is well managed; a Superintendent directs well; improved methods of teaching are practised; the singing is good. Let these people meet at intervals and tell each other what they know-what they find by experience works well. They can sing and pray together and help each other by mutual encouragement. That is good. But singing and praying and exhortation are not all. Enthusiasm is necessary. But it is not wisdom and knowledge. And everywhere to day men are working and praying in their work. They want facts; they want to know the results of well-tried experiment In every sphere of human activity men meet for conference, to get at the results already attained in various places and by various people. In the public school systems of many States the Teachers' Institute has become a recognized feature, and teaching is made a profession, and teachers are becoming skilled workers. Experiments are everywhere tried, and when demonstrated to be wise, become common property. We believe such methods for increasing knowledge and disseminating experience are necessary in Sunday-school work.

We therefore close our report by recommending that throughout the whole Diocese, as a part say of our Convocations, in cities, and wherever two or three bodies of teachers and officers can conveniently be got together, *Sunday-school Teachers' Institutes* be organized on lines similar to those already successfully established in other Dioceses.

We also suggest that it may be found practicable to appoint a special service, say, on the night before the meeting of the Council for Conference, and the consideration of improved methods of Sunday-school work.

We also recommend the formation in Parishes, of distinctively Church organizations for boys and girls—such as Guilds, Brotherhoods, Girls' Friendly Societies, and the like, which experience has proven to be of value in retaining young persons in the fold of the Church.

#### FREDERICK F. REESE, Chairman.

Report of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute.

Mr. J. H. Skinner presented the report of the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute:

The Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute respectfully submit to the Council their annual report for 1888 and 1889:

Our report to the last Council was so full, in regard to the condition of the buildings and grounds of the Institute property and the general prosperity and management of the school, that little remains for us to report at this time, except to reaffirm all that is there said on that subject. Mrs. Stuart's annual report to the Trustees shows that the number of pupils continues about the same as formerly reported. She reports for the session now in progress fifty-nine (59) boarders and forty (40) day pupils; of this number thirteen were upon "scholarships"—eight boarders and five day scholars—four of these were daughters of clergymen. The discipline and *morale* of the school is of the highest order. The health of the school has been excellent, no case of sickness having occurred this session. The buildings are kept in good order at all times, and within the past year much has been done in repairing and beautifying the house and the grounds.

The new lease, under which Mrs. Stuart is now conducting the school, began, as shown by the last report, on the 1st day of September, 1888, and continues for five years from that date. The first year of the lease not having expired, no report can be made of the financial results of the year. The Trustees cannot close this report without again commending the Virginia Female Institute and its management in the highest terms to the cordial support and patronage of the Diocese—indeed, it is a school to which parents can send their daughters with every assurance that their mental, moral and physical training will be cared for in a manner to satisfy the most anxious and exacting heart.

Since our last report was made, the Board has suffered an irreparable loss in the death of the Hon. Hugh W. Sheffey. For many years Judge Sheffey has been connected with the affairs of the "Virginia Female Institute." Upon every page of its history is found the evidence of his untiring zeal and earnest loving devotion in its behalf. He stood by it when the day was dark, and its future seemed hopeless, and to his unfailing interest is due, in a large measure, the gratifying condition in which we now find it. He gave his time and his wise counsel without stint through all the periods of its history; and his genial presence and cordial manner were impressed upon all of its public exercises. We greatly mourn his loss, and desire to put on record the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That in the death of Hon. Hugh W. Sheffey, this Board, with a sense of its personal bereavement and loss to the institution, extends its sympathy to the Diocese of Virginia, to which he devoted his exceptional abilities, and whose acknowledged leader he was in matters of ecclesiastical legislation for a quarter of a century, and to the Protestant Episcopal

Church in the United States, which felt and recognized his learning, his intellectual power, and his devotion to her interests in the affairs of the general government of the Church.

The death of Judge Sheffey makes a vacancy in the Board of Trustees, which has now to be filled according to law.

#### Proposed Amendment to Article II of the Constitution.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Sprigg, the whole subject of Parochial Reports was referred to a committee, consisting of the Bishop, the Assistant Bishop and the Secretary of the Council.

A message being received from Mr. Thomas Atkinson, announcing his inability to serve as the Treasurer of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on motion of Rev. Dr. Dashiell, Mr. E. B. Addison, of Richmond, was appointed a member of the Board of Managers and Treasurer of the Fund.

Rev. J. S. Hanckel presented the following :

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II OF THE CONSTITUTION.

#### ARTICLE II.

SECTION I. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop (if there be one), and of the Ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who now are or may hereafter be canonically settled in Parishes or Churches within this Diocese; Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, Missionaries within this Diocese, and under its ecclesiatical authority, being Clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese: *Provided*, that any such Ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members *ex officio*: *Provided further*, that only such Colored Ministers shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article: *Provided further*, that no Minister under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat in the Council, and no Minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC. 2. The Council shall also be composed of Lay members, consisting of one delegate for each Parish or church entitled to representation, chosen by the Vestry thereof, except as hereinafter provided. Every such Parish or church having more than one officiating Minister canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many Lay delegates as it has Ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church: *Provided*, that only such colored delegates shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article.

SEC. 3. The Council shall also be composed of the Colored Ministers having a seat and voice in the Council on the 17th day of May, 1889, and of two Clerical and two Lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is now or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

Resolved, That the Council proceed immediately after the settlement of the proposal to amend Article II of the Constitution to elect four clerical and four lay deputies to the General Convention; also four alternate depaties of each order, no alternate to take his seat unless notified by a deputy before the Convention meets that he will not attend.

#### PROTEST OF THE COLORED CLERGY.

We, whose names are herewith appended, Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, in the fear of and presence of Almighty God, who hears our solemn declaration, do represent that this question of separate organization, under its many forms and devices, has been carefully considered and discussed at length in meetings duly convened for that purpose in all of the missions represented by us. So unanimous and determined are the congregations represented by us, that they have put into our hands papers affirming their strong disapproval of the amendment to the Constitution of the Diocese. They recognize the fact that they are a part and parcel of the Church in this Diocese, although weak and in a struggling condition. However, they are of the opinion that this should not operate against them in receiving the protection and fraternal sympathy of the strong.

Beyond all doubt, we believe that the amendment adopted yesterday by this Council, relating to this question, was the most speedy way of settling it, but not we fear as God would have it settled. As men who must one day appear before the judgment seat of Chrlst, we affirm as our belief that the adoption of the afore-mentioned amendment will put an end to the growth of the work of the Church among our people.

And we beg permission to record our most solemn protest against the change in the Constitution.

The Council reassembled, and was called to order by the Bishop.

The Council proceeded to the election of four Clerical Deputies and four Lay Deputies to the General Convention. Revs. R. A. Goodwin and A. S. Lloyd were appointed tellers on the part of the Clergy, and Messrs. Potts and Egerton as tellers on the part of the Laity.

Pending the counting of the ballot, Rev. N. P. Dame offered the following, which was carried :

*Resolved*, That the Bishop be requested to ask the Clergy throughout the Diocese to call the attention of the people to the Church's need of young men for the work of her Ministry, and of money for their education and support, and appoint a day for the special presentation of this subject; that the Bishops be requested at their visitations as far as possible to bring this matter before the people, and the Faculty of the Seminary be requested to visit when they can the Colleges and vacant Parishes of the State, and present the subject to the young men.

Rev. H. Suter offered the following, which was carried unanimously :

*Resolved*, That the thanks of the Council are gratefully tendered to the Rector and Vestry of this Church for their arrangements for its comfort, and to the citizens of Lynchburg for their general hospitality.

Rev. B. D. Tucker offered the following, which was carried :

*Resolved*, That the thanks of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia be, and hereby are, tendered to the Rev. Pike Powers, D. The Committee to whom was referred the proposed change in Canon XIII, report that in view of the passage on yesterday of the amendment to Article II of the Constitution, they deem it inexpedient to legislate upon this subject at this time, and they recommend that the matter be referred to a committee to report at the next meeting of the Council.

Rev. Dr. Sprigg moved that after the election of alternate deputies to the General Convention and the usual religious exercises, the Council do adjourn *sine die*. Carried. Report of Committee on the Brotherhood.

Rev. Dr. Newton offered the following, which was carried:

*Resolved*, That the churches in this Diocese be requested to use diligent efforts to increase their contributions to the work amongst the colored people.

Mr. L. M. Blackford presented the following :

REPORT ON THE BROTHERHOOD.

The Committee on the Brotherhood beg leave to submit the following report:

The only death of a beneficiary during the year is that of the Rev. Davis M. Wood on the 5th of May, too late for action and report to this Council. In behalf of the heirs of those who died during the Council-year pending, \$376.75 has been collected. Under the circumstances, therefore, there are no data on which to base an estimate of the condition of the organization as compared to 1887-'88, except the fact that *three* new members only have been added. This is not encouraging, and it is earnestly hoped the recent death above mentioned may be the occasion of a large access both of new members and of special contributions.

The committee venture to record their abiding conviction of the value of the Brotherhood as a means of usefulness in the Diocese, and to reiterate the recommendations previously made, and at their instance adopted by the last Council.





## Report of the EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY, from May, 1888, to May, 1889, read by the Secretary, REV. PIKE POWERS, D. D., at the Missionary Meeting, Wednesday night, May 15, 1889.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia respectfully report that they have aided, in the course of the past year, some 53 ministers, including the colored deacons, and have appropriated towards their support upwards of \$9,000. Some of these ministers resigned or changed their Parishes during the year, and were replaced by other ministers, while in other cases the Parishes still remain vacant The committee have also paid the salary of Rev. Ev. Meade, Evangelist, and have had another Evangelist, Rev. J. J. Norwood, at work for four or five months, whose salary is paid by the Richmond Protestant Episcopal Missionary Society. To meet this outlay, they have received from churches, schools and individuals, since the last Council, according to the Treasurer's report. \$10,065.66, which would have been inadequate but for the fact that they began the year with a balance of \$3,358.48 on hand. Besides the above regular and permanent appropriations, they have donated \$400 or \$500 in specials to ministers who had gotten into pecuniary difficulties through no fault of their own, or were in circumstances of distress which we are sure would enlist the sympathy of the Council and secure their approval of our action.

It will be seen, therefore, that the work is increasing on our hands, and if it goes on in this way, almost the whole Diocese, outside of the cities and towns, will to some extent be dependent on the Diocesan Missionary Society. We know that the country people, in a great many places, are poor, and that depletion by death and removal is going on more or less all the time. And we learn from statistics, drawn from the last JOURNAL by the Rev. B. M. Randolph and published in the Virginia Seminary Magazine, that the country Parishes have been doing better for Diocesan Missions than the city churches-the former giving an average of 67 cents and the latter 60 cents per head for Diocesan Missions. But there must be an increase of wealth and an influx of new-comers in some places, and it is hard to believe that out of 40 or 50 Parishes receiving aid from us, there could not be at least an average of one a year resigning its stipend and relieving the committee of its support. But it is a very rare thing for this to occur, and in almost every case they come back upon us after awhile. If the vacant Parishes which have no Minister to support, and little or no Parish expenses to meet, would give us a fair proportion of what they would pay their Minister, if they had one, it would aid us very materially in our work. If the Churches of the eleven cities in which the Council is held, which according to the statistics of Rev. B. M. Randolph, already referred to, contained last year 8,635 communicants, would give us three cents a Sunday per capita, it would amount to \$13,470.60 a year; and if the rest of the Diocese, which con-

tained, according to the same statistics, 7,877 communicants, would give us two cents *per capila* a Sunday, it would amount to \$8,192.08 a year, and the whole would be \$21,662.68 a year—an average of a little over two and a half cents a Sunday; whereas we have received from the whole Diocese since the last Council only \$10,065.66, which is an average of one and onesixth cents *per capila*, and a considerable falling off from the contributions of the last Council year.

What are the causes of this falling off we cannot undertake to determine. But still we think we have cause to be thankful. The contributions to Diocesan Missions have increased in the last five years more rapidly than the communicants, and we trust that in the good providence of God they will increase more and more; that more Parishes will become self-supporting; that the vacant Parishes will help themselves and help us more, and that we shall be enabled to do more, not only to help the weak Parishes that have Ministers, but to inaugurate more Mission work in destitute portions of the Diocese.

I respectfully report that eleven students have attended the Divinity School this session. One of these has been expelled and two will apply for ordination next month.

The conduct of the ten now in attendance has been very good. They have studied faithfully, and most of them have made fair progress.

The number of pupils in the Normal School is seventy-five—larger than ever before. The majority of these, all things considered, have given satisfaction. Several expect to graduate in June.

Mr. James E. Shields and Miss M. E. Griffis, the colored teachers in the Normal School, have done faithful and conscientious work.

Mrs. M. Payne continues her faithful labors as matron. There have been twenty boarders in the two schools during the session.

Prof. Thomas Spencer will report his work in the two schools.

I have instructed the classes in the Divinity School in Apologetics, Homiletics, Pastoral Theology, Old Testament History, General History, English Grammar and Spelling, and in the Normal School classes in Logic, Church History and the Prayer Book.
