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

RULES OF ORDER.

ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order, no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore, when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

- A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.
- A Committee on the Brotherhood.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.
 - A Committee on Parochial Reports.
 - A Committee on the admission of New Parishes.
 - A Committee on Election.

Rules of Order.

- A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.
- A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.
- A Committee on Sunday Schools.
- 3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishops' Addresses, the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such other Committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

- 1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing be read by the Secretary, before debate.
- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.
- 4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.
- 5th. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present—it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided, all debate and amendment are precluded.
- 7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.
- 9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

- 10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the Council.
- 12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.
- 13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.
- 14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- 15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.
- 16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.
- 17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

- 1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave unless he be sick or unable to attend.
- 2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held under the direction of the President and Council.
- 3d. No spectators shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.
- 4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

On motion of Rev. Jno. K. Mason, the times of the Council's sessions were ordered to be from 10 A. M. to 2 P. M., and from 4 P. M. to 6:30 P. M.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Powers, the Report of the Diocesan Missionary Society was made the order of the day for Friday morning, immediately after the reading of the minutes.

Rev. G. M. Murray presented a petition from Emanuel Church, Culpeper county, which was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Rev. Dr. Dashiell read a communication transmitted by the Secretary of the House of Deputies, containing the General Convention's recommendation that each Diocese shall take steps toward the provision of a Clergyman's Retiring Fund, which communication was referred to the Committee on the Disabled Clergy Fund.

The Bishop presented the official notification of the changes proposed in the Prayer Book by the General Convention of 1889, and to be acted upon by the General Convention of 1892.

Rev. R. A. Goodwin, of the committee appointed by last Council [JOURNAL 1889, p. 79] to report what amendments are desirable to the Canon on Colored Mission Churches, presented the report, and requested its reference to a committee consisting of the Bishops, three clergymen, and three laymen.

Mr. Douthat moved that a committee of five be appointed to consider and report on the advisability of repealing or amending the 19th Canon.

The motion was lost. Ayes, 37; Noes, 67.

The Secretary reported that the committee appointed at last Council to revise the form of Parochial Reports, which committee consisted of the Bishops and himself, had performed the duty committed to them, and had sent forth a revised form of report.

Rev. Dr. Powers gave notice that he would propose at this Council certain amendments to Canons XIX and XX, of which notice was given at the last Council by Rev. Dr. Meade [JOURNAL 1889, p. 78].

Mr. W. Old presented the following report of the committee appointed at last Council [JOURNAL 1889, p. 27] to consider the expediency of appointing legally incorporated Boards of Trustees, subject to control of the Council.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BOARDS OF TRUSTEES.

The committee appointed by the last Council [JOURNAL 1889, page 27] "to consider the expediency of appointing one or more Boards of Trustees to be legally incorporated for the purpose of holding, subject to the direction and control of the Diocesan Council, all invested funds now existing, or hereafter to be accumulated for the benefit of the various church charities of the Diocese," beg leave respectfully to report:

That they have had several meetings, all the members of the committee

being present, at which they considered the matters submitted to them, and as a result of their deliberations they submit to the Council the following as the form of a charter which will best serve the purposes in view, to be applied for at the next session of the General Assembly:

"An act to incorporate the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, for the purposes therein mentioned."

WHEREAS. The members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Commonwealth of Virginia, have contributed and raised certain funds for the support of their disabled Clergy, the widows and orphans of their deceased Clergy, and the Episcopate of said Church, and desire from year to year to continue such contributions for these and other charitable purposes; and,

WHEREAS, also, The Council of the said Church, which is known as "the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia," which by the constitution thereof is entrusted with the administration of its affairs, has no legal authority to receive, invest or dispose of the said funds or the proceeds arising therefrom, and to that end have asked that a law may be passed incorporating the said Council, for the purpose alone of receiving, holding and administering the said funds, according to the design of the said contributors.

Now, therefore, be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Virginia:

- 1. That the persons who now constitute and may hereafter constitute the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia shall be and they are hereby incorporated and made a body corporate and politic, by the name of "The Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia," and by that name they and their successors to be elected, appointed and qualified according to the form and effect of the constitution and canons of the said church in said Diocese, for the time being, shall have perpetual succession, and by that name be capable of suing or being sued in any court of law or equity, and shall have and use a common seal, and shall have all the general powers incident to bodies corporate, or which may be necessary or proper to carry into effect the objects of this incorporation.
- 2. That the said corporation shall have full power and authority to take and hold subscriptions, gifts or contributions in money or otherwise, for the purpose of providing for their disabled Clergy, the widows and orphans of their deceased Clergy, and for the support of the Episcopate in the said Diocese, and for any other charitable purpose, and the same to invest or distribute and apply, for the purposes aforesaid, as may from time to time be deemed most expedient, and shall likewise have full power and authority to appoint an executive committee or committees, or board or boards of trustees, by whatever name or names they may be designated, to administer said funds in such manner and form and with such authority as the said corporation shall from time to time prescribe.
 - 3. That if this act shall be accepted by the Council of the Protestant

Episcopal Church of said Diocese, at their next annual meeting, the said Council shall proceed to adopt such rules and regulations in regard to the said funds and their administration, as to the said Council shall seem expedient, which rules and regulations may be amended, modified or altered by any subsequent Council of said Church in said Diocese.

- 4. That nothing herein contained shall enlarge, restrict or in any manner affect the power or authority, which the said Council now has or may exercise, or claim over the said Church within said Diocese, or the members thereof, but all such powers and authorities, which are or may be lawfully claimed or exercised, shall remain in like condition, and none other, as if this act had not been passed.
- 5. That the said Council shall have the power to surrender this charter at any time after its acceptance, upon a vote of a majority of both the Clergy and the Laity composing said Council, voting separately, at two consecutive annual meetings thereof.
 - 6. That this act shall be in force from its passage.

In submitting this form of charter, your committee deem it proper to say a few words in explanation of their action.

The resolution under which they have acted required them "to consider the expediency of appointing one or more boards of trustees to be legally incorporated, etc." The form of charter they recommend provides for the incorporation of this Council, and that it shall appoint the board or boards of trustees who are to manage the trust funds of the Diocese. In this way the whole control of these funds will be in this Council, and the trustees appointed to manage them will be subject to its legislation and control, according to such rules and regulations as it shall from time to time prescribe. This they think desirable, and they consider it better than to have one board of trustees incorporated to manage all the several trust funds. which might lead to some confusion and possible embarrassment, and would be more objectionable than the plan proposed, or several boards of trustees, one for each trust fund, which would require as many separate charters as there are trust subjects, and would be even more confusing and embarrassing. Your committee have aimed to submit a plan which will place these trust funds, legally, directly in the hands of this Council, so that it can have the most direct control over them, and itself be the incorporated board of trustees holding the legal title; and, after consulting the various plans for managing such funds as they exist in several of the Dioceses, they considered that adopted by the Diocese of Maryland as the most practical and direct, and took as the model of the charter proposed, the charter granted by the Legislature of that State incorporating the Convention of that Diocese. This Council can, when incorporated, appoint committees or boards of trustees to manage these several funds, as they are now managed, and prescribe the rules and regulations for their management and control through appointed agents.

Report of Committee on Boards of Trustees-Referred to Special Committee.

The question has been raised, however, and we beg to call attention to it, that as the Council, as such, is known only during its sessions, possibly some change should be made in our constitution, whereby the Lay members elected to our Council shall continue to be the Lay members representing their several and respective Parishes until their successors are elected.

Your committee therefore submit the following resolutions:

- I. That the Council adopt the form of charter as proposed by the committee, and that a committee of Laymen be appointed by the President, who shall apply on behalf of this Council to the General Assembly of this Commonwealth at its next session to have the same passed.
- 2. That a committee of Clergymen and Laymen be appointed by the President to take into consideration and report such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the management and control of the trust funds which this Council may hold by virtue of said charter; and also what changes, if any, are necessary to be made in our constitution to effect the purposes of the said charter.

On motion, the resolution and amendment were referred to the Committee on the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Council then adjourned until Thursday at 10 A. M.

The Bishop then read his Annual Address:

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN:

I am reminded that in this church, where we are now assembled in our Ninety-fifth Annual Council, just twenty-two years ago I performed my first Episcopal service. Truly can I say that goodness and mercy have followed me through all these years, and that

God has wonderfully blessed our beloved communion in this Diocese. Many events have occurred and changes taken place, which it might be not unprofitable to recall and dwell upon, but, not wishing to detain you longer than is necessary, I proceed to give account of quite a large amount of work which I have been enabled to do during the past year.

1889, May 14th.—In St. Paul's Church, Lynchburg, confirmed four.

May 26th.—Emmanuel Church, Franklin, Southampton county, preached, confirmed five, and celebrated the Lord's Supper, the Rev. A. Smith, D. D., of North Carolina, kindly assisting in the services. This church was then vacant, but has since been supplied with a Minister from the Seminary.

June 3d.—Was prevented by high water and damage to railroad tracks from leaving home, and so missed thirteen appointments in the Northern Neck.

June 10th.—Assisted the chaplains in their examination of candidates for orders in the Divinity School, Petersburg.

June 14th.—St. James, Ashland, preached, and confirmed five.

June 16th.—Preached morning and night in the Church of the Epiphany, Danville, and confirmed thirty-seven.

June 18th.—Attended the annual meeting of the Trustees of the Divinity and Industrial School, Petersburg.

June 19th.—Assisted in the chaplain's examinations at the Theological Seminary.

June 23d.—Assisted by Rev. Dr. K. Nelson, consecrated St. Paul's Chapel, Fairfax county, preached, and confirmed ten. This is one of a number of pretty and comfortable churches in the neighborhood of the Seminary, where services are regularly conducted by the students, under the rectorship of Dr. Nelson. In the afternoon of the same day preached in Meade Chapel (colored), Alexandria, and confirmed four.

June 24th.—Preached in Trinity Chapel, another of the Seminary Missions, and confirmed four.

June 25th-27th.—Was engaged in various duties connected with the close of the session of the Seminary and High School.

June 28th.—After sermon in the Seminary Chapel by Rev. G. H. Kinsolving, of Philadelphia, ordained eight of the graduates Deacons.

July 10th.—Preached in Lamb's Creek Church.

August 4th.—In Grace Church, Richmond, assisted by the Rector and Rev. Professor Grammer, of the Seminary, who preached the sermon and presented the candidates, ordained Rev. James W. Morris and Lucien L. Kinsolving, Presbyters. The same evening an interesting and profitable missionary meeting was held in St. James' Church, to commend to the Grace of God these brethren, who were soon to sail for Brazil to found a mission there under appointment by the American Church Missionary Society.

August 9th.—Preached in Grace Memorial Church, Rockingham county.

August 11th.—Preached morning and afternoon in Christ Church, Luray, baptized an adult, confirmed four, and celebrated the Lord's

MINISTERS DECEASED.

Four of our brethren have been taken from us by death during the past year. June 28th, 1889, the Rev. George A. Smith departed this life at his home in Alexandria, in the 87th year of his age. He had long been in feeble health and unable to perform any regular ministerial duties. He was the first alumnus of our Theological Seminary, and the senior Presbyter of the Diocese. His character and life have recently been so beautifully and faithfully portrayed by the Rev. Dr. Slaughter, that it would be worse than useless for me to attempt to add anything to what he has written.

The Rev. John Cannon Hobson was ordained Deacon in June, 1885, and soon after took charge of St. John's Church, Petersburg, where he labored most acceptably for about a year, and then became Rector of Lexington Parish, Amherst county. Here he struggled bravely against feeble and declining health, until he was entirely disabled for any duty, more than a year before his death, which occurred in Richmond, February 15th, 1890. A noble young man, admired for his talents and beloved for his character, he was called away from his earthly labors to his eternal reward almost at the commencement of what promised to be a faithful and most successful ministry.

April 1st, 1800, at his residence near Halifax C. H., suddenly departed this life the Rev. Wellington E. Webb, aged seventy-three years. This realous and indefatigable brother had labored in many places in this Diocese, and in at least four different Dioceses of our

Church, his ministrations being mostly in feeble or unorganized Parishes. For many of the last years of his life he had devoted himself chiefly to work among the colored people, not without a good measure of success. He had given the land, built a church and established a flourishing school for them at his home, and was in the midst of his active and successful labors when called to his rest. "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye did it unto me."

The Rev. Richard H. Phillips, after spending several of the earlier years of his ministry in Maryland, returned to his native Virginia and was known in the Diocese for more than thirty years as the successful Principal of the Female Institute in Staunton. It is impossible to estimate the great work he did for Christ and our Church through the many girls whom he educated and sent forth as Christian women through all parts of the South. Compelled by failing health several years ago to resign the charge of the Institute, he subsequently removed with his family to Norfolk, where he died, April 7th, 1890, in the eightieth year of his age.

It would not be right for me to omit to briefly record here that Mr. Cassius F. Lee, often a member of this Council and a deputy to the General Convention from this Diocese, closed his long, exemplary and useful life in Alexandria, January 23d, 1890, after having attained the age of more than four-score years. Mr. Lee had been Treasurer of our Education Society and of the corporation of the Seminary and High School almost from the beginning, and these institutions never had a more devoted, constant and faithful friend. Those who were associated with him in their management will long and greatly miss his presence and counsel.

The reports from our different literary and benevolent institutions will show that they have done well the past year. The Episcopal High School and Virginia Female Institute continue to prosper under the management of their able and accomplished Principals. The unsurpassed advantages of our Seminary for the theoretical and practical, intellectual and spiritual training of candidates for the ministry were never, I believe, more widely appreciated than they are now. It appears from the last catalogue that its fifty-nine students represent as many as fourteen different Dioceses of our Church. Kind friends have contributed the means to greatly improve the comfort and appearance of the buildings, and the beauty and attractiveness of the grounds, and very much is due to the Rev. Dr. Suter and Professor Crawford for their agency in accomplishing this good work.

The last General Convention passed a canon—not only, as it seems to me, unobjectionable, but admirable—for the revival of what, I believe, is universally admitted to be the apostolic Order of Deaconesses in the Church. It was thought advisable to take advantage of this legislation, and to begin without delay to gather a fund to establish in our own Diocese a Home, where such women as should offer themselves for this service might make adequate preparation, both technical and religious, for their important work. Accordingly a charter was obtained from the last Legislature of the State incorporating a board of trustees, by the name and style of "The Bethany Institute," "for the purpose of establishing and conducting an orphan asylum and hospital, and for educating women in the care of the poor and the sick, the religious training of the young and others, and the work of moral reformation." The first offering for this object came from an interested and liberal minister of another Diocese, and a few other contributions have been received. has been made an humble beginning of what I believe will prove in

time to be, by the blessing of God, one of our most important agencies for doing good to the bodies and souls of men. I ask for the Bethany Institute the prayers and the money of all who desire to promote the work of women in the Church of Christ.

A committee was appointed by the last Council to report on the subject of legally and securely investing our various church funds. This is a matter of great importance, which should be attended to without delay, and I hope we shall hear from the committee. The title to much of our Church property, I suspect, is imperfect, if not worthless, and should be looked into and, if necessary, perfected. In at least one Diocese, if I have not been misinformed, there is a corporation which holds, as trustee, the title of any church property, of whatever kind, that may be entrusted to it, and perhaps we might find it practicable and expedient to make some such arrangement.

The two evangelists, Messrs. Norwood and Meade, have diligently prosecuted their important work during the past year. One of these is supported by the Richmond City Missionary Society, and the other by the Missionary Society of the Diocese. This latter Society has been wonderfully sustained the past year, and will report a larger amount of contributions received than ever before in the history of the Diocese. In order to increase the Society's funds, the Executive Committee resolved last January to appeal to the children of the Church for contributions during the six weeks of Lent. By request of the Committee, I addressed to them a letter asking them to support one of the evangelists, thinking that by placing before them a definite object which they could easily understand their interest would be increased, while the general missionary work would be just as effectively aided. It was supposed that this was as much as the children could be expected to accomplish, but their enthusiastic interest was aroused, and, to our great surprise and delight, when their contributions were received, they amounted to the grand sum of at least three thousand dollars. I make this indefinite statement of the amount, because it is impossible to tell exactly how much the children gave, as their contributions, in many cases, were not separated from those of the people. The result of this experiment so impressed the Executive Committee that they resolved to make the children's Lenten offerings for evangelistic work a permanent institution. They will ask the Council to sanction a plan to divide the Diocese into three or four districts, appoint an evangelist for each

district and depend on the children to support two or three of the ministers engaged in this work. I cordially recommend the plan, and hope it may receive your approval.

The work among the colored people is, all things considered, making remarkable progress, as the following statement will show. There are now in the Diocese five Postulants, one candidate for Priest's orders and thirteen ministers. There are eighteen churches or chapels; six preaching stations where there is no church; three rectories; twenty-six Parish schools, with fourteen hundred and sixty-seven scholars; twenty-seven Sunday-schools, with two thousand, one hundred and seventy-nine scholars; about twelve hundred communicants, and one hundred and eighty were confirmed last year. I do not pretend to be accurate in these figures, but think they are not above what is true. Legislation is needed for the benefit and protection of this people and their interests. Such legislation will be proposed to this Council, and ought to receive earnest and patient consideration. Nearly every colored minister is laboring by mere sufferance in the Parish of another minister, who can, at any time, put a stop to his work. Moreover, we are under obligation not to cast our colored brethren off from us, but, if possible, to strengthen the ties which bind them to us. They ought to have some voice in the legislation which affects them, and some means by which the influence of their laity may be felt among them. The 13th canon, which was adopted some years ago, is inadequate to the accomplishment of these ends, even if the execution of it is not impracticable. Now that the Constitution of the Diocese is practically settled, as I suppose, it is hoped that the Council will take the time and trouble to improve the canon law.

Looking at the state of the Diocese, as it may be seen from the episcopal, parochial and other reports, there is nothing to discourage us, but very much to excite our gratitude to the Giver of all good for the past, and to inspire us with increased earnestness and devotion to our work for the time to come. I have great faith in the future of Virginia and of our beloved Church If the laity will only faithfully hold up the hands of their ministers, and the Clergy will conduct the services as ordered in the Prayer Book, and preach the pure and simple gospel and live unworldly and godly lives—then, I am persuaded, that great will be the growth and prosperity of our Zion, and grand the work we shall be privileged to do for the glory of God and the salvation of our fellow-men.

And now, in conclusion, after much reflection and under a solemn sense of responsibility to God, to you, and to those whom you represent, I proceed to say what will no doubt cause sorrow to some, joy to others, and surprise to all. Ten years ago, in the exercise of my best judgment, I was decidedly opposed to a division of this Diocese. But less than ten years have brought about great changes in the condition of the State and of our Church, and we may look for still more remarkable ones during the nearly three years which must elapse before the meeting of our next General Convention. cities are growing, and new ones are springing up by the dozen, population is increasing, railroads and various business enterprises are multiplying, and all our many and wonderful resources are being developed as never before. All this means a corresponding increase of work and anxiety for one upon whom comes daily the care of all the churches. New places are to be visited, scattered sheep of our fold are to be looked after, lands are to be secured for building purposes, and various other interests are to be cared for. Nine new churches have been consecrated since our last Council, and perhaps as many others are waiting or preparing for that service. The already large and constantly increasing work among the colored people, and which requires much supervision, has been added to the other work of the Diocese. In short, the field has grown to be so great that the cares and responsibilities and labors which its oversight involves are fast becoming a mental and physical burden too heavy for any one man, or for two men, to bear. In view of these facts, and others which might be mentioned, and expressing-I am convinced—the wishes of a large majority both of the clergy and laity, however much as a matter of feeling and sentiment they may be opposed to disturbing the present order of things, I respectfully recommend that a committee be appointed to consider the question of dividing the Diocese of Virginia into two or three Dioceses, and to report to the next Council.

May the Lord direct us in all our doings with His most gracious favor, and further us with His continual help, that in all our works begun, continued, and ended in Him we may glorify His holy name, and, finally, by His mercy obtain everlasting life.

The Assistant Bishop then read his Annual Address:

BISHOP RANDOLPH'S ADDRESS.

BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND OF THE LAITY:

You will observe in the report of the Bishop and in the record of my own work that the churches in the Diocese have with very few exceptions been visited during the year since the last Council. But for the engagements in attendance upon the sessions of the General Convention, which occupied the month of October, it is probable that every church in the Diocese would have received a visitation. It will be gratifying to you to know that the vacant Parishes, though suffering from the absence of regular ministration, maintain their coherence and their devotion to their own Church. The visits of our faithful and most efficient evangelists, the fidelity of our Christian women and laymen, and the hold of the Prayer-Book upon the hearts of the people, have kept them alive and kept them together. In Smithfield, at Surry Courthouse, at Brandon, at Martinsville and Rocky Mount, and many others which I could mention, which have been vacant for more than a year past, I was touched with the evidences of religious feeling and the earnest longing of the people for pastoral care and regular services. May I express the hope that our city churches will continue to help these country Parishes liberally and lovingly. There is no danger, in my opinion, that the sinews of their effort will be cut by the largest aid we can give them—they are doing their best to help themselves. CHURCHES CONSECRATED.

On Sunday, June 9th, 1889, I consecrated Grace Church, Massie's Mills, Nelson county. The Rev. J. W. Ware and the Rev. J. J. Norwood were present, and assisted at the services. The approximate cost of the building is \$3,000. The architect is a member of the congregation. The timber and the variety of woods used in the construction of the church were procured from the mountains that surround the locality, and all the work was done by native workmen. In architecture and in workmanship it is an exceptionally handsome building. I visited this church and Trinity a few weeks after the sudden death of their Rector, the Rev. Davis M. Wood. The manifestations from all classes of the love they bore him, and grief for his loss, furnished a touching illustration of the power of a faithful pastor and preacher over the hearts and minds of the people. After a vacancy of more than a year, the rectorship of these churches has been filled.

On Sunday, December 1st, 1889, I consecrated Emmanuel Church, Buckingham county. The Rev. Everard Meade was present and assisted in the services. Previous to my visit Mr. Meade had held frequent services in this church, and the candidates for confirmation were presented by him.

On March 5th, 1890, I consecrated Christ Church, Pittsylvania county. The Rev. Dr. Dame, Rector of Epiphany Church, Danville, preached the consecration sermon. To his ministry and missionary activity this church owes its existence.

On Wednesday, the 9th of April, 1890, I consecrated Grace Church, Charles City county. This is a mission off-shoot from Westover Church. The work has been blessed in establishing an Episcopal Church among a people who were strangers to it until within a few years ago. There are several churches in process of construction in the portion of the Diocese which I have visited, which will probably be ready for consecration during the coming year. It is gratifying to know that these new church enterprises are, for the most part,

conducted with financial prudence and economy. The work is done with funds that are in hand, and, as far as possible, contingencies are provided for and debt is avoided. Notwithstanding the depression in agriculture which we share with the rest of the country in this period of transition from an unequal to, it is hoped, a just distribu tion of the burdens of government among all classes, the country people in the Episcopal Church in Virginia, Sunday-school children and congregations have worked and given more to their churches than ever before in the history of the Diocese. In the month of June, 1889, I attended the meetings of the Trustees of the Seminary and High School and of the Education Society of Virginia. On Friday. June 28th, 1889, in the chapel of the Theological Seminary, I ordained to the priesthood John Cary Ambler, Charles Gauss, John Points Tyler. At the same service I assisted the Bishop of the Diocese in the Holy Communion. During the year I officiated in Parishes where there was no minister, at two funerals, and baptized four children and three adults, and administered Holy Communion five times. I believe that personal mention of bereavement to the Diocese by death, except in reference to the clergy, is not the custom in the reports of your Bishops or in the JOURNALS of our Councils. I must ask the liberty of departing from or of making an exception to this custom. On the 12th of August, while visiting churches in Fairfax county. I received tidings of the death of Daniel K. Stewart, of Henrico county, after a prolonged illness. Among the struggling churches and the self-denying ministers in this Diocese, I know of none who ever appealed to him in vain. He gave nobly and humbly and gladly; he gave wisely and judiciously. His simple desire was to use his talent of wealth for the promotion of the Kingdom of God. as represented by his own Church, and in every field of Christian charity. Amid the perils of wealth he lived close to Christ. His life was a benediction to the Diocese; his death a bereavement. May God bless his memory and keep it green.

In the month of October, 1889, I attended the sessions of the General Convention in New York city. The good feeling which prevailed in the deliberations of that body, the absence of the spirit of party, and the general disposition to legislate in the interests of, and for the good of the whole Church, the tendency to suppress questions that contained in them the seeds of dissension and alienation, are subjects of congratulation, and may be interpreted as answers

to the prayers of the faithful Christian people throughout the Church. The question which, in my opinion, was fraught with most serious dangers to the Episcopal Church, namely, the proposition to repudiate the name "Protestant" in its title, was practically abandoned by its advocates. The work of the revision of the Prayer-book, which occupied the deliberations of the Convention for the larger part of its sessions, has, in the main, and upon all important questions, reached its conclusion. There remain fifty-two resolutions of change proposed by this Convention to be made known to the Dioceses, and to be submitted to the next General Convention in 1892 for final action. I suppose it will be our duty at this Council to appoint a committee to examine these resolutions of proposed alteration, and submit the results of their investigation in order to obtain an expression of opinion on the part of the Diocese. These resolutions, with few exceptions, as far as I have observed, refer to questions of change in words or minor details which seem to be rendered necessary by alterations already adopted, and which contain no principle which need provoke discussion or diversity of opinion. One marked exception to this is the proposal for an alteration in the confirmation service, which, so far as I can see, would lead to serious doctrinal error in our conception and in our teaching of the meaning of that service. A general review of the work which has been accomplished in the revision of the Prayer-book and which is now a part of the liturgy and the law of this Church, will, I am sure, tend to allay the anxiety which our people of various shades of opinion have felt during the agitation of the subject. The alterations, when finally incorporated into the new editions of the Book of Common Prayer, will be comparatively so few in number, so obvious in meaning, so entirely in harmony with the doctrine, the ritual and the traditions of this Church, as to commend themselves spontaneously to the good judgment and favorable criticism of its members. The rubrics have been made clearer; general directions for services simpler and more direct, so as to lessen the probability of doubtful interpretations leading to diversity of opinion and of practice. A few beautiful prayers. additional anthems of praise from the Word of God, greater variety and appropriateness, perhaps, in the selection of Scriptures to be read in the regular and special services, and you have the sum and substance of the alterations already adopted and those proposed for final adoption. Apart from the work accomplished in the alterations

and additions already made, perhaps a greater good has resulted from the free discussion and the exchange of sympathies among the Clergy and laity throughout the Church upon the contents of the Book of Common Prayer. During the ten years when the translation of the Authorized Version of our English Bibles was in progress. there was a manifest revival among English-speaking people all over the world in the critical and devotional study of the Word of God. growing out of the loyalty of the heart of Christendom to that Word, in view of the possible results of that undertaking. Our effort at Prayer-book revision has had. I think, a similar result in the education of the masses of our own people, and of intelligent members of other Protestant churches, into a knowledge of the riches of our liturgy and of the fidelity of our worship and our standards of belief to the Word of God. This result has been attained at some cost. not, however, at the cost of the introduction of a single form or ceremony or expression embodying the principles of the Anti-Reformation party, which has troubled the peace of this Church for more than half a century, but only at the cost of some pain and apprehension of an opposite result on the part of many of the best and wisest members of our Church, and that is only one of the pains of progress.

Upon the question of the relation of our Church to the work in behalf of the negro population, the General Convention again expressed by its action the constitutional principle of the right and the duty of the Dioceses to legislate for themselves. It is difficult to maintain our intellectual respect for those who, as a condition of their co-operation in carrying the Gospel of Christ to an ignorant and half-civilized people, demand of any Church or any body of Christians that they shall embody in their constitution and laws a political ideal of liberty, fraternity and equality, which, in its practical application, would place insuperable barriers to the work and paralyze the missionary impulse. If the work is done, it must be done by ourselves. We will try to do it under the conviction that God has given it to us to do. We will give, as we may, the labor and the sacrifice for its accomplishment. Our friends throughout the country must trust us as brethren, and help and pray for us in our efforts to educate and to Christianize the negro race, and may God bless us and them in the discharge of our great responsibility.

I must say this before I close: I am standing now where I stood when I preached my first sermon and entered upon the duties of my

first charge. In days of peace and in the time of war I ministered in this Church—so young, without experience, and the people so good and true and helpful. My experience then and ever since impels me to say to my brethren of the Clergy, that duty to their families and to the Church of Christ may seem to call them away from the old Diocese to other fields of labor; but, go where they may, they will never find a truer people, a more loving people, than the men and the women of the Episcopal Church in Virginia,

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF THE ENGLISH BIBLE.

To the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of the English Bible submits the following report of the studies pursued in his department:

The Senior Class has read several of the Minor Prophets, the Book of Daniel, and Ecclesiastes.

Theological Seminary.

The Middle Class, to which he gives the most attention, has studied with care the Psalms in the Authorized Version, comparing them with Prayer Book Version, and with the Revision, with constant reference to the Hebrew Original and Septuagint Version.

The *Preparatory Department* has, in his judgment, been well taught, and from the reports of its teachers the members have made good progress in their studies.

As Dean, I would add, the religious spirit of the Seminary has been uncommonly good, as shown by its interest in Foreign and Domestic Missions and every good work.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully submits the following report of the studies pursued in his classes during the current session:

The Junior Class, reciting once a week, has studied Chadbourne's Natural Theology, and are now reviewing it.

The Middle Class, reciting five times a week, has studied Butler's Analogy and Knapp's Theology. The former they have finished, and they are in review of the latter. To these has been added a weekly recitation in Oehler's Old Testament Theology, with introductory exercises in Homiletics, and essays on subjects in Systematic Divinity.

The Senior Class, with three recitations a week, and the Wednesday evening exercises, has studied the Articles with Boultbie, and are now closing the review. They have also, in Natural Theology, studied Hopkins' Outline Man, and Homiletics in Dr. Broadus' work, with exercises.

I have also given to this class a course of lectures on Christian Ethics, and one on Liturgics, in connection with Professor Hale's Manual and Dr. Butler's History of the Prayer Book.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The greatly improved appearance of the Library at this time, brought about during the past year, is due in large measure to the removal from its shelves of about 2,500 volumes, many of them duplicates, and a considerable number antiquated folios, rarely, if ever, looked into, save as objects of curiosity. To such of the latter as may be of some use for occasional

reference, access is provided by the formation of a convenient "Annex" in one of the rooms of Aspinwall Hall, fitted up for the purpose.

Room has thus been secured for the due display of the large accession of more than 4,000 volumes—the valuable donation of the late Dr. Colburn (2,700 volumes), together with that of friends of the late Dr. Giesy (1,500 volumes).

The work of selection and removal was accomplished during vacation, under the superintendence of the venerable Dean of the Faculty, who took special pains, by carefully inspecting every volume separately, to guard against unjust discrimination in the weeding process.

It may be proper to mention that the Librarian instructs his assistant to make himself familiar with the contents of the shelves in the several compartments to such an extent as to be able, without prolonged search, to lay his hand upon any book that may be called for. This he regards as no very difficult attainment on the part of a properly qualified custodian of a collection of limited numbers, obviating the necessity of a register of the exact position of each several volume for the independent use of others. To the Librarian alone, or his substitute, pertains the right (strictly speaking) of taking down any book from its proper place and returning it thither. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF THE GREEK LANGUAGE, &C., &C.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Greek Language, New Testament Literature, Church Polity and Pastoral Theology, respectfully submits the following annual report:

The Senior Class has read in Greek, in connection with Ellicott's Series of Commentaries, Ephesians, Colossians, the Catholic Epistles, and the Apocalypse. They are now reading St. Luke's Gospel. In Polity they have studied, with lectures in class, the Third, Seventh and part of the Fifth books of Hooker, and Butler's Protestant Episcopal Doctrine and Church Unity. They have also studied the Pastoral Epistles in Greek, with Meade on the Pastoral Office, with references to Bedell and other text-books.

The *Middle Class* has read in Greek, with the same series of Commentaries, I and II Corinthians, Romans, Galatians and Hebrews.

The Junior Class has read, with the same series of Commentaries, in Greek, St. John and nearly all of St. Matthew, with parallel references to the other synoptic Gospels.

In accordance with the request of the Trustees, he frequently attends the recitations of the Preparatory Classes, and finds them most faithfully and efficiently taught.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF HEBREW, ORIENTAL LANGUAGES, AND APOLOGETICS.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Senior Class has read critically in Hebrew, portions of the books of Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Hosea, Jonah, Nahum, Micah, Isaiah, studying carefully at the same time the periods and events of their prophetic ministries. The study of Hebrew Syntax continued, and special attention has been paid to the development of Messianic prophecy.

The *Middle Class* has read fifteen Psalms critically, also sections of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, and Job, in connection with introduction to the same, special attention being given to the history and principles of Hebrew Poetry. It has studied, also, Muller's Syntax.

The Juniors have read in Hebrew the larger part of Genesis, parts of Exodus, Deuteronomy, Joshua, Judges, Samuel, and Kings, studying thoroughly the Elements of Hebrew Grammar and Accentuation. The usual instruction in Apologetics has been supplemented by lectures.

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY AND CANON LAW.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Ecclesiastical History respectfully submits the following report:

The Senior Class has studied Perry's History of the Church of England and the Constitutions and Canons of the Church. Lectures have been given, on which the class has taken notes.

The *Middle Class* has studied Smith's Student's Ecclesiastical History and Fisher's History of the Christian Church, and has read privately, as a parallel to the course, Trench's Mediæval Church History. Essays have been read on assigned topics.

The Junior Class has studied Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and are reading the Acts of the Apostles in Greek as a text-book of early Church History. Essays have been read by this class also.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to submit the following report:

Report of Standing Committee of the Diocese.

The whole number of boys entered this session is one hundred and two, the maximum attendance having been ninety-seven.

The general work of the school has been as before, though there has been added for advanced students a course of Christian Evidence and of psychology of much value. Systematic exercise in the gymnasium for all the pupils (under direction of one of the masters) has proved highly beneficial. The Rev. Prof. Kinloch Nelson, D. D., of the Theological Seminary, has continued that faithful pastoral care of the boys which has long merited our gratitude. Besides his one Sunday night service monthly, and one weekly during Lent in the School Chapel, several of his colleagues have officiated there, and we have had two admirable Sunday-night addresses by laymen from a distance. The Friday night devotional meeting with the boys has continued to be acceptably maintained by Mr. Wm. Cabell Brown, of the Seminary Middle Class. Our daily services at the school have had the advantage of skilled assistance, instrumental and vocal, from without, and an affectionate observance of the ecclesiastical year has, as usual, been constant. Sunday morning we attend the Seminary Chapel. Seven boys have been confirmed during the session, the whole number of communicants being thirty-three. My thanks are due, as before, to the Associate Principal and my other assistants for loyal and efficient co-operation in every effort made for the improvement of our common charge.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY,

The Committee on the Diocesan Missionary Society, to which was referred the resolution of Rev. Henry T. Sharp, relative to the supply of vacant Parishes, having considered the same, submit the following report:

The resolution is as follows—

Resolved, That each active clergyman in this Diocese be requested to give his services for seven consecutive days of the current year to some vacant church within the bounds of his convocation.

In view of the many difficulties connected with the practical operation of the proposed resolution, the legal objections which might be urged against it, and the superior opportunities of the different Convocations to acquaint themselves with the best methods of dealing with the subject, we would respectfully recommend that the whole matter be left to the different Convocations, with the recommendation that they use their best efforts to meet the wants of the vacant parishes, in conjunction with the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Report of Managers of Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

The committee on the "Diocesan Missionary Society," to which was referred the Accounts of the Treasurer of said Society, have examined the same and compared it with the vouchers presented, and found them correct and sustained by proper vouchers in each case.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the report of the Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

REPORT OF MANAGERS OF WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund are glad to report a slight increase in the contributions of the Churches during the past year. In the year ending May, 1889, the amount given was only \$812.82. This year they have given \$1,125.26. But the contributing churches were only seventyfour, out of more than two hundred that are in the Diocese. If all our congregations would contribute annually to these widows and fatherless ones, who ought to be the objects of the tender care of the whole Diocese, it would secure an amount in some measure adequate to the relief of their wants, and also enable the Board to comply strictly with the Rule of Management enjoined upon the Board by the Convention of the Diocese at their formation in May, 1860, requiring them to reinvest "one-half of the annual interest and dividends of the Fund as soon as collected," to be "made a part of the Capital Fund" until it reached the full amount of \$60,000; the remaining half only to be used for distribution. This wise regulation the Board, under the sanction of the Council of 1870, were obliged to disregard, in order to relieve the then "existing suffering." That "suffering" still continues, and we have felt ourselves constrained to appropriate almost the whole of "the interest and dividends" of the past year, amounting to \$1,288.88, to the urgent necessities of our beneficiaries. Out of the whole distributable income of the Board the past year, viz, \$2,414.14, they have applied \$2,410 to the relief of seventeen suffering families.

Report of Committee on Endowment Fund.

We call upon all the congregations of the Diocese to help us to do better next year.

The Capital Fund is only \$23,142.

The subject of the amendment to Article II of the Constitution [JOURNAL 1889, p. 73,] which was approved by the last Council and referred to the Vestries for their approval, was then brought up for final action in this Council.

The proposed substitute for amendment to Article II of the Constitution was then adopted so as to read as follows:

PROPOSED SUBSTITUTE FOR AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II OF THE CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION I. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop (if there be one), and of the Ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who now are or may hereafter be canonically settled in Parishes or Churches within this Diocese; Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, Missionaries within this Diocese, and under its ecclesiastical authority, being Clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese: Provided, that any such Ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members ex officio: Provided further, that only such Colored Ministers shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article: Provided further, that no Minister

under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat in the Council, and no Minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC. 2. The Council shall also be composed of Lay members, consisting of one delegate for each Parish or Church entitled to representation, chosen by the Vestry thereof, except as hereinafter provided. Every such Parish or Church having more than one officiating Minister canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many Lay delegates as it has Ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church: *Provided*, that only such colored delegates shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article.

SEC. 3. The Council shall also be composed of the Colored Ministers having a seat and voice in the Council on the 17th day of May. 1889, and of two Clerical and two Lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is now or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

Rev. Jno. K. Mason offered the following:

Resolved, That the Bishop of the Diocese, or, if it be out of his power, the Assistant Bishop, be and is hereby most earnestly requested to close the religious services of the Council with an address, on Sunday night, and that we make this request because persuaded that this closing service greatly promotes the spiritual good of the Clergy and laity of the Diocese.

Mr. F. H. McGuire moved to lay the resolution on the table.

Pending consideration of the resolution, the hour of two o'clock arrived, and the Council adjourned until 4 P. M.

THURSDAY, 4 P. M.

The Council reassembled.

By unanimous consent, the Secretary read the following telegram of greeting from the Convention of the Diocese of Texas:

WACO, TEXAS, May 22, 1890.

To the Secretary of the Episcopal Convention, Fredericksburg, Va.:

The Council of the Diocese of Texas sends fraternal greetings to the Council of Virginia.

Rev. H. B. Lee offered the following as a substitute.

Resolved, 1st. That the Bishop, or, if for any reason he cannot remain, then the Assistant Bishop be, and is, hereby requested to deliver an address on Sunday night, after the usual services, to such members of the Council as shall remain over.

2d. That all members who can do so are earnestly requested to remain.

The substitute resolution was then put, and was carried unanimously.

Rev. Dr. Sprigg moved that so much of the Bishop's address as refers to the division of the Diocese be referred to a committee consisting of the Bishops, six clergymen and eight laymen, to report to the next Council.

HISTORIOGRAPHER'S REPORT.

A PROBLEM IN THE HISTORY OF VIRGINIA WAITING A SOLUTION.

There are few traditions more widespread and more deeply imbedded in the popular creed than the tradition that many of our old Colonial churches and private mansions are built of imported bricks. This belief has been handed down by word of mouth from sire to son for so many generations that it seems to some an impiety to question its truth, as implying a reflection on the veracity of the fathers, from whose loved lips it has been so long heard. It is in the nature of those heir-looms which, though having no intrinsic value, are precious in our eyes, because, from the mysterious association of ideas, they call up images of honored ancestors. It has blended itself, too, with our literature, which sees in these old edifices so many links connecting us with the fatherland. They become a sort of Campo Santo, like that mound of earth in Pisa (Italy) said to have been brought by the Crusaders from the Holy Land, and which the citizens of that classic city have surrounded with arcades of white marble, adorned with Etruscan and Greek bas-reliefs and other sculpture and fresco paintings by the earliest Italian Masters. Under a like inspiration our orators, poets, artists, tourists, and writers in magazines and newspapers have encircled these venerable relics, not with material sculpture and painting, but with a halo composed of the gems of their own genius, which may make them live as long as the Campo Santo in story and in song. Some persons, by the light of this halo, have seen in the lone tower of Jamestown the relic of the identical church in which the primitive Virginia apostle, Robert Hunt, first read the Liturgy and preached the Gospel in "His Majesty's Ancient Colony and Dominion of Virginia"—in the face of the demonstrable fact that the first church of brick at the old metropolis was begun in 1638, according to Governor Harvey, and was burned by Bacon in 1676, so that the present ruins cannot possibly represent a church older than the one reported by Sir John Harvey. No one was more under the power of this spell for many years than the present writer, and even now, when his enthusiasm has been chilled by the frost of

four-score winters, all his sympathies and tastes incline him to assign to the old churches and mansions the greatest possible antiquity which will consist with the hard facts of history. As the patriarch Moses wished that all the Lord's people were prophets, so would I, that these venerable relics were, as Bishop Meade said, con amore, of the Rosewell Palace of the Pages, "all of English brick," but of which Dr. Channing Moore Page, of New York, who has diligently, in England and America, scanned all the pages, now says has no known foundation in fact. Let me not be misunderstood. I do not dogmatically affirm that no church or mansion in Virginia was built of English brick. I cannot prove a negative proposition. It devolves upon those who hold the affirmative to produce the proof. I only say that I have for two years sought diligently for such proof in vain, and if anyone has found it I shall gladly welcome it as a consummation devoutly to be wished. In the meantime allow me to say that, if it be true, it would seem to have been a work of supererogation, in view of the historical fact that brickmakers and bricklayers, and all the materials for the manufacture, have been in the country from the day of the first landing of immigrants at Jamestown. We have a series of historical tracts running through the Colonial era, giving the details of ships and their contents. In the very first company which landed at Jamestown, April 14, 1607, were fifty gentlemen (so called) who did no manual labor, and among the mechanics were Will Garnett and "Old Short," bricklayers, and Edward Brinto, brickmason. In 1609, five brickmakers and layers are mentioned in "Nova Britania." In 1612, in the New Life of Virginia, printed by His Majesty's Council, it is said: "We have made a new settlement eighty miles above Jamestown, on high ground, where we have pure air, fresh springs, and open ground. The spade-men fell to digging, the brick-men burned their bricks, and we have built decent houses, the first story of brick."

Mark, this was only five years after the first landing. In 1613 brickmakers were sent over to build the projected University at Henricopolis, which classic name has degenerated into the prosaic one of "Dutch Gap." Not to weary with details, brickmakers are mentioned in 1618-19-20. "In 1621 brickmakers and layers were sent over for enclosing the public house at Jamestown. After the Indian massacre in 1622, when so many of the College people were slain, the company ordered that the brickmakers should be held to their contract to go on with the buildings." In a "New Description of Virginia," printed in 1649, it is said: "The Virginians have lime in abundance, stores of bricks made, and houses and chimneys made of brick and covered with shingles, the brickmakers not having the art of making tiles which will not shrink." This was the era of the finishing of the first brick church at Jamestown. Other proofs of like import might be adduced, but these will suffice to establish the point that brickmakers and layers were in Virginia from the beginning, and that houses were built of bricks and burned on the ground as early as 1612-five years after the foundation of the Colony.

Historiographer's Report.

Now, let us look at the question from another point of view, and bring the ships in which these bricks must have been imported, if imported at all. to bear upon the issue. In the public archives at Richmond are lists of vessels and their invoices, in which are enumerated in detail the items composing their cargoes, and there is no mention of bricks. But it is said that they might have come as ballast, to which the answer is obvious—that as all the iron and other metals used in the Colony for more than half a century had to be imported, there is no need of looking further for ballast. there were, we have only to think of the guns with which each vessel was armed; the guns for manning forts; the crowds of immigrants, with their furniture and house and farming utensils; groceries and other stores for the Colonists, including cattle, goats and horses; to say nothing of the beer. wines and stronger liquors, which our ancestors thought "necessary to make the water of the country wholesome"; the dry-goods for themselves. and the many other articles for the Indian trade, and we shall not have much room left in these frail little vessels for the tons of bricks for houses and churches, when bricks were manufactured every day in the Colony at much less expense than they could be imported.

Once more, changing the point of view, let us look at some of these churches of whose origin we have certain knowledge. In Culpeper county there is a church whose historical name is "Little Fork," now called by many "Oak Shade." From my boyhood I was taught to believe that its bricks were English just as devoutly as the people of Mecca believe that the famous black stone of the Caava was contributed to that edifice by the Angel Gabriel, and this is the current creed now. But the old Vestry book, since brought to light, gives the particulars of its building, and proves that it was erected in 1776, when there was no intercourse with England. In Fairfax county there is a group of churches and mansions with a like reputation. Among them are Pohick and Christ Churches, so intimately associated with Washington, who was vestryman and pew-holder in both of them.

These churches were finished about the same time (1773), and the excellency of these supposed English bricks has been celebrated in story and in song, and yet the Vestry-books, which give particulars of their building, prescribing the size and style of the bricks, make no allusion to their importation. Twenty years before they were built, the Truro Vestry-book, which I lately exhumed, describes the burning of bricks for the Glebe-house, near Accotink; and this is only mentioned because the Vestry rejected the first kiln, and required the contractor, Mr. Waite, to burn another of better bricks, making him pull down a wall which he had begun. This was in 1752, and it is hardly credible that twenty years after this date bricks should have been imported. At Mt. Vernon there is a stable at whose reputed English brick pilgrims to that shrine gaze with admiration, and yet Bressot, in his "Reminiscences," says that Washington told him that these bricks were made at Mt. Vernon.

At Woollawn, the elegant seat of Lawrence Lewis, is a splendid mansion with like reputation, and yet I found on the place the remains of the kiln where they were burned, with fragments of the same kind of bricks. A like search would probably reveal like results as to Gunston, the grand old "Hall" of the grand old man, George Mason, whose memorial is written in letters more durable than brass or bricks. Near the site of King Carter's beautiful Christ Church, Lancaster, are visible marks of a brick kiln. At Williamsburg the first church of brick was finished in 1683, and that having become ruinous, the Parish Church was built between 1710 and 1715, by the joint acts of the Vestry, of the General Assembly, and of Governor Spottswood, who furnished the plan. It was finished in 1715. That it was built of Virginia bricks there can be no doubt, in view of the fact that Henry Cary, superintendent of public buildings, presented to the Council, in 1708, the following bill, viz: 150 loads of wood at 12 shillings per load; moulding and burning 70,000 bricks at 3s., 6d. per M. This was for the Governor's house, and it having been built many years before the building of the Church, its bricks were doubtless burned by the same contractor. This is the more probable, because at Hampton some years later, we find the same Henry Cary contracting for burning the bricks for St. John's Church, which has hitherto been religiously believed to have been made of imported bricks. The following entry on the records of the court, kindly copied for me by Mr. J. Heffelfinger, settles that question, and it will be a surprise to many, as it was to my accomplished friend, Dr. Palmer, who had fondly hoped that old St. John's would never lose her English laurels. Here is the minute: "Elizabeth City County, June 17, 1727, Jacob Walker and John Laurence are appointed to lay off an acre and a half at the upper end of Queen street for building of the church thereon. It is agreed (that) by the Minister, church wardens and the court to supply Henry Cary with wood from the school land at sixpence per load, to burn bricks for the church."

I cannot pay my respects to all the Colonial churches, but I must not pass by St. Luke's, Isle of Wight, which claims to be the oldest of them all now standing. This claim is founded upon an inscription written with a pen of iron on one or more bricks, bearing the figures 1632. In the absence of civil and church records, this must be accepted as the date of its erection. It is now being restored under the auspices of Rev. David Barr, and when all its storied windows in memory of historic people shall have been put in, it will be our Virginia Westminster Abbey. It stands on a ridge of sand, bordered by clay, out of which its bricks were doubtless made, as the accomplished architect, Mr. Edward Neville Stent, superintending its restoration (an expert in such matters), is of opinion that the bricks are not English but of American making, and the venerable Dr. Purdie, the most antique pillar of the Parish, says, he has no faith in what he calls the "fabulous tradition" of their being imported, which is ignored by all local antiques. Not being willing to rely wholly upon my personal researches, I have appealed to some of the most famous experts in the history of Vir-

ginia for light upon the vexed question. Among these are Mr. R. A. Brock, the able Secretary of the Virginia Historical Society, whose Herculean labors have cleansed our Temple of History from much useless rubbish which has hitherto hid the truth and beautified it with many gems dug from the mine. Dr. Wm. S. Palmer, who has for many years been breathing the dust of the archives of the attic, in the Capitol, until he has imbibed an antique flavor and "attic" elegance with which he has illumined the pages of our history. The Rev. E. D. Neill, who has ransacked the British Museum, as well as our American depositories, and added "Virginia Vetusta" and "Virginia Carolarum" and many other things new and old to our Virginiana. Mr. Alexander Brown, who has, with self-denying toil, penetrated the deepest sources, collecting and collating many rare and curious documents from abroad, and garnered them in his "Genesis of the United States"-a reservoir from which future students will derive supplies in their weary wanderings through the tangled wilderness of history. I have interrogated all these, and the reply of each has been like the "Sheriff's Return." non est inventus—"not found in my bailiwick." If no proof of the truth of this tradition which can stand the test of historical criticism, can be found, it will not be necessary to conclude that it is a case of conscious invention. Such traditions have some fact—basis—upon which they are built. This may be the fact that some church furniture, as fonts, blocks of Bristol and Portland stone, pieces of carved wood, and, perhaps, some ornamental bricks were imported. This we know from the Vestry-books and other sources, except as to the ornamental bricks, of which there is no proof known to me. On the contrary, a writer in the Century Magazine says, that the old black glazed bricks in the churches and other houses of Philadelphia, said to be imported, were in fact made on the spot. From the known genesis of legends, whose tendency is to fill up the gaps and enlarge the dimensions of oral tradition, it is easy to conceive how these fragments might be built into fabrics by the devout creative imagination—distance in time, like distance in space, lending enchantment to the view. Thus, in Italy, there are many Madonnas believed by the populace to have been painted by St. Luke. The root of this legend is the fact that there was an early Italian painter named Luke, and in process of time a freely creating fancy encircled the head of the artist with a halo and he became St. Luke. the Evangelist. If no authentic evidence shall ever be adduced of the truth of the current creed, it will be an impressible example of the untrustworthiness of mere oral tradition which floats in the air without touching the earth. It will, too, make us value more highly the written Word of God, as furnishing a sure and steadfast anchoring ground for the Ark of Christ's Church, that it may not be driven about by every wind of doctrine. although the oral tradition be uttered by as many tongues as Fable ascribes to Fame.

P. SLAUGHTER.

Mr. J. Churchill Cooke, from the Committee on the Accounts of the Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, reported the accounts correct and sustained by proper vouchers.

Rev. H. T. Sharp presented the report of the Committee on Sunday-schools:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Sunday-schools beg leave to make the following report:

The present number of teachers is, white, 1,594; colored, 135; Indian, 8; total, 1,737, a gain of over the number reported last year. The present number of scholars is, white, 11,710; colored, 2,019; Indian, 133; total, 13,862, a gain of since the last Council. Scholars confirmed last year, 331; this year, white, 397; colored, 36; total, 433, a gain of 102. Offerings last year, \$6,890; this year, white, \$7,591.43; colored, \$317.10; total, \$7,908.53, a gain of \$1,018.53 over last year.

Your Committee are impressed with the failure of many congregations to realize the supreme importance of this work, and their unreadiness to adopt improved methods of Sunday-school management.

Your Committee would suggest the consideration on the part of Rectors, superintendents and teachers of those features of interesting and effective schools now to be named:

- 1. The formation of a Bible Class in each school, to be a net to catch older scholars, as they become unwilling to remain in lower grades; to train teachers, and to supply the places of teachers temporarily absent.
- 2. The use of blackboards for word studies in connection with the lesson, and for pictures illustrative of the instruction given. Where no one can be found capable of making crayon drawings on the blackboard, lithographs might be used. These can be ordered through any bookseller.
- 3. The formation of a children's choir. In order to have good music it is imperative that at least some of the children should be taught to sing by note, under the training of a competent musician.
 - 4. A uniform lesson for the school.
 - 5. A weekly teachers' meeting for the study of the lesson.
- 6. Regular and frequent visiting of the scholars by the Rector, the superintendent and the teachers.
- 7- A Sunday-school institute on the afternoon of the first day of the Council.

Your Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That a committee of three Clergymen and two Laymen be appointed to take such steps as shall be necessary for the organization of a

Diocesan Sunday-school Institute, and to make proper arrangements for the meeting of this institute on the afternoon of the first day of the Council of 1891, of which they shall give due notice beforehand.

Petition from Slaughter Parish, &c.

PETITION FROM EMMANUEL CHURCH, SLAUGHTER PARISH.

Whereas, The Vestry of Emmanuel Church, Slaughter Parish, in the County of Culpeper, has complied with the requirements of Canon X in giving the notices required by the said Canon to the Bishop of the Diocese and the Vestry of St. Thomas' Parish, Orange county, that they would make application to the Council to be held in Fredericksburg on the 21st of May, 1890, to detach that portion of St. Thomas' Parish included within the following boundaries, and attach the same to Slaughter Parish, Culpeper county, bounded as follows: Commencing at a point where the county road crosses the Rapidan river at Peyton's Ford, and running thence eastward with said road to a point opposite the dwelling-house on the Trimmer farm, thence southward and around said dwelling-house, so as to include the same, thence in a straight line to a point in the Stevensburg road at the mouth of the road to Nason's Station, thence with the said road to Nason's Station to the lot owned by the Trustees of Emmanuel Church, Slaughter Parish, thence around the boundary of said lot to the old Plank road, thence east down the old Plank road to Rhodesville, thence northward a straight line to the Rapidan river at Somerville's Ford, thence up the river to the point of beginning. Therefore, the vestry of Emmanuel Church, Slaughter Parish, respectfully petition the Council to detach the territory included within the foregoing boundaries from St. Thomas' Parish, Orange county, and attach the same to Slaughter Parish, Culpeper county, for the following reasons, to wit:

That such territory is immediately contiguous to Emmanuel Church, Slaughter Parish, and contains within its bounds a large proportion of the communicants of said church, and also the rectory, and your petitioners humbly pray, &c.

Your Committee would emphasize the fact that their labors are much increased by carelessness in making reports. Inaccurate reports, imperfect reports, and reports coming in after the main work of the Committee is completed, delay and complicate an already laborious task.

We would respectfully recommend that dilatory and careless Clergymen be hereafter appointed as the Committee on Parochial Reports.

The amendment offered by Rev. T. W. Jones was adopted.

Rev. Dr. Powers proposed the following amendment to Canon XX.

The Committee on amending Canon XX, recommend that it be amended to read as follows:

The Vestries of the several Parishes or Churches shall, quarterly, or at every annual Council, as each Vestry shall determine for itself, pay to the Treasurer such sums as may be apportioned to them respectively, for the purpose of defraying such expenses as may be authorized by the Council.

The Council then adjourned until Friday at 10 A. M.

FRIDAY, May 23d, 1890.

The Council assembled for Divine service at 10 A. M.

Morning prayer was read by the Rev. W. M. Dame, of the Diocese of Maryland. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Nelson P. Dame, on the 11th verse of the 5th chapter of the 1st Epistle of St. John.

After Divine service, the Council met for business, and was called to order by the Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

The order of the day was then taken up, being the report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, which was presented and read by the Rev. Dr. Powers:

Report of Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia respectfully report: That they have aided in the course of the past year Parishes in thirty-eight counties, viz: Albemarle, Alleghany, Amherst, Botetourt, Brunswick, Campbell, Caroline, Chesterfield, Essex, Fairfax, Fauquier, Gloucester, Halifax, Hanover, Henrico, King George, King William, Greensville, Lancaster, Louisa, Loudoun, Madison, Mecklenburg, Matthews, Middlesex, Montgomery, Nottoway, Orange, Prince Edward, Princess Anne, Pittsylvania, Pulaski, Rockbridge, Southampton, Tazewell, Warwick, Westmoreland, and York, with an aggregate of fifty-nine ministers, some of whom were aided only a part of the year, because of their resigning, or taking charge of their Parishes after the meeting of the last Council. We have also aided seven colored ministers, and have made special appropiations to the armount of \$200, and an annual appropriation of \$100 to Rev. Job Turner, Missionary to Deaf-Mutes. The amount thus appropriated, according to the Treasurer's report, is about \$9,000, besides which we have paid the salary of the Rev. Everard Meade, Evangelist, the travelling expenses of both Evangelists, and other incidental expenses necessary to our work. We began the Council year with a balance of \$2,588,50 in the treasury. The amounts received from churches, Sundayschools, and other schools, and children in families, according to the Treasurer's report, is \$12.906.71 (May 19), of which more than \$3,000 was given by the children, in many cases avowedly, and, doubtless, in most cases, really, in response to the Bishop's letter to the children. This is the largest amount we have ever received, and considering the depletion of the country Parishes, by deaths and removals, the low prices of farm products, the disasters of the last season, and the poverty of the country people, it speaks well for the zeal and liberality of the churches, and verifies the old adage, "Where there is a will there is a way." It also shows what the Sunday-schools and the children not in Sunday-schools can and will do, especially when appealed to by such a letter as that of the Bishop of the Diocese. In a number of cases the offering of the Sunday-school was larger than that of the congregation, and as the children's money must have come largely from the parents, we rejoice that while the parents were thus gratifying their children and obeying the impulses of their own parental affections, they were doing what would be likely to form in their children the habit and the love of Christian giving. In furtherance of this most desirable end, we suggest that the churches which have Sunday-schools, and all ought to have them, should pay for Sunday-school libraries and papers, and all other Sunday-school expenses, so as to leave the children free to give their money to missions or other religious objects outside of the Sunday-school, and thus be trained to help others as well as themselves. We also recommend the suggestion Report received-Resolutions adopted.

of the Rev. F. Stringfellow, in a recent number of Our Diocesan Work, that the families connected with vacant churches take mite-boxes and put their offerings in them every Sunday, whether they have services or not. and hand the proceeds to the Evangelist when he comes around, or to some other minister, for the Diocesan Missionary Society or some other Christian object as they may elect. If these suggestions were adopted and faithfully carried out, the contributions to the Diocesan Missionary Society, Education Society, Disabled Clergy Fund, Widows' and Orphans' Fund, Brazilian Mission, &c., we are persuaded would be largely increased. The Evangelist, Rev. Everard Meade, reports sixty-eight vacant churches in the Diocese, and we may safely say that if all these churches had ministers they would pay them an average of \$100 a year. Why not give this to the Lord's work? And this would make a total of \$6,800, besides what is given by all the other churches. Country people often have little or no money, but they have what will bring money. Ladies in the country sometimes send in the proceeds of Sunday eggs and of a portion of their butter, and if all the female members of the church in the country would do something like this, it would be a substantial help to the work of the Lord, and the Lord would bless them. Our missionaries are, as ever, faithful and zealous, almost all of them working one or more mission points besides their regular Parish work, and some of them preaching at five or six different places. We are sure that no one feels any poorer for what he has given to the Lord the past year, and we bless God that the people have been able to offer so willingly and after this sort. But the temple of the Lord is not yet done, nor the walls of Zion built up, and we hope and trust that the zeal and liberality of the past year are but the pledge and forerunner of better things vet to come.

The report was received and its appended resolution adopted.

Rev. T. G. Dashiell offered the following, which was carried:

Resolved, That this Council tender its thanks to the Rev. Dr. Powers for his efficient services in so ably editing "Our Diocesan Work," and that the

Rev. John J. Clopton offered the following:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society be authorized to issue 12,000 copies additional of the June number of "Our Diocesan Work," and that the expense connected with the same be paid from the treasury of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Mr. John G. Williams moved to insert 5,000 instead of 12,000 copies.

The amendment was approved, and the resolution as amended was adopted.

Rev. B. M. Randolph offered the following:

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society shall apportion vacant churches into districts of about ten to fifteen vacant churches, and locate Evangelists in charge of the same, to the number of five evangelists.

Mr. John L. Williams moved that the resolution be referred to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, to be acted on according to their discretion.

Rev. J. W. Ware moved to lay the whole matter on the table, which was carried. Ayes, 78; noes, 37.

The next special order was then taken up, being the report of the committee appointed to consider the report presented on Wednesday by Mr. W. W. Old.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CONSIDER THE REPORT SUBMITTED ON WEDNESDAY.

The committee appointed to consider the report submitted by the committee appointed at the last Council "To consider the expediency of appointing one or more Boards of Trustees, to be legally incorporated for the purpose of holding, subject to the direction and control of the Diocesan Council, all invested funds now existing or hereafter to be accumulated Report received, its resolutions adopted-Committee appointed.

for the benefit of the various Church charities of the Diocese," report that, with the aid of the said Committee, they have, as carefully as the time allowed would permit, examined and considered said report.

In the judgment of this committee, the proposed Charter presents serious and grave legal questions, which should be maturely and deliberately considered.

Article V, section 17, Constitution of Virginia, provides, "The General Assembly shall not grant a charter of incorporation to any church or religious denomination, but may secure the title to church property to an extent to be limited by law." What the judicial interpretation of this fundamental law will be is unknown.

The title of the act to effect the incorporation is, "An act to incorporate the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, for the purpose therein mentioned."

Though "the Council" be not the Church, it is part and parcel of its "E clesiastical Organization." It is composed of Clergy and lay-communicants, and presided over by the executive head of the Church, and thus organized the legislature of "the Church." The Charter should be free from doubt and uncertainty; if tainted with "illegality," the consequence, will be loss of "the Funds" it was designed to make secure.

Therefore, your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1st. That the report of the committee aforesaid, be recommitted to a committee of nine; which committee shall be composed of the Clergymen and Laymen, who compose the said committee, to which shall be added one Clergyman and five Laymen, to be appointed by the Bishop, who shall report thereon to the next Council.

Resolved, 2d. That the Charter and report of the committee be printed in the JOURNAL.

Your committee regret the delay consequent upon this action, but in point of fact, no time will be lost; because, unless called in "extra session," there will be no "General Assembly" before the meeting of the Council, to which the report of the proposed committee will be made.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOL BOOKS.

The Special Committee on Sunday-school Books, appointed at the Council in Alexandria, enlarged and continued at the next Council, and again continued at the last Council, begs leave to report as follows:

Your committee was charged with two duties, to-wit:

- 1. The Editing of Bishop Burgess' CATECHISM ON THE CHURCH CATECHISM, the middle grade in the Course of Sunday school Instruction Books on the Church Catechism adopted by this Council, and—
- 2. The Selection of a List of Sunday-school Library Books, suitable for the Sunday-schools of the Diocese of Virginia.

The editorial work of your Committee on the Catechism of Bishop Burgess is before you in the printed report which has been distributed on the floor of this Council. To this particular matter much time and attention has been given. It is now for the Council to say whether a new edition, with the additions indicated in the printed report, will be an improvement on the old, and whether such an edition shall be forthcoming for use in the Diocese of Virginia. Your committee could do no more than they have done towards bringing out a new edition, unless they had been authorized by the Council to draw upon the Treasurer of the Diocese to meet the expense of so doing. As it is, they will have to ask the Council to pay the bill for printing their report. In no other way could the work of the committee be intelligently brought before the Council. And whatever may be thought of this part of their work, your committee feel obliged even now to put on record their deliberate and matured judgment of the value of Bishop Burgess' book as an Exposition of the Church Catechism. Its wise conservatism, its lucidity, its reverence for Holy Scripture, and its skill in elucidating the text of the Church Catechism, in the very words of Scripture, are beyond all praise.

In the discharge of the second duty imposed upon them, your committee have, first of all, to record their conviction (1), of the real value of a Library as an aid to Sunday-school work, when such a library is judiciously selected. Especially is this true of the country, where there are no public and few private libraries. Here it is that the child prizes most highly the book he

has gotten at the Sunday-school, and it often proves a source of profit and pleasure to both child and parents during the week that follows. Nor is it by any means a rare occurrence for a single good book to influence some life permanently for good, and through that one life, so influenced, to exert a widespread influence over other lives, which, in their turn, perpetuate and broaden a never-ending stream of influence which makes for righteousness, all of which can be traced back to the teaching of a single little book as its parent source. Bishop Meade writes of Wilberforce's Practical View, "It gave a direction and color to my whole life"; and his last venerable and most accomplished biographer remarks, in immediate connection with this testimony of Bishop Meade to the powerful influence of a single book on his life, that, "It is curious that Wilberforce derived his religious impulse from his aunt, who got hers from Whitefield; and thus is brought to light a chain connecting two centuries and two continents, through an influence flowing from George Whitefield to William Meade, the future Bishop of Virginia.

The conviction, therefore, of the value, both possible and real, of a good Sunday-school library, as an aid to Sunday-school work, is clear and positive in the minds of your committee; and since, as a matter of fact, the library forms a part of the equipment of every Sunday-school in the Diocese which can afford it, its absence constitutes a want to be supplied at the first opportunity in the case of all other Sunday-schools. Your committee would also record just here their conviction (2), of the prime importance of raising the standard of these libraries and of making them just what they ought to be. That the average Sunday-school library is below the standard which a proper regard for the children of the Church requires, is a fact which has come under the observation of almost every one who has had anything to do with Sunday-school libraries. What reader of Sunday-school books has not at times sympathized most heartily with the boy who did not want to be good, because all the good boys died and went to heaven? The boy's revulsion against that kind of goodness which invariably kills was natural and healthy; and the books which tell of goodygoody boys and girls, who never existed outside of the books themselves, and which cause a revulsion against goodness in the minds of bright, strong, real boys who love their bats and their balls, enjoy life and want to live, are unnatural and unhealthy, and ought to be forever excluded from the model Sunday-school library. Beside such weak sentimental booklets as these. others which are sensational in style and others still which are secular in their spirit ought also to find no place in the Sunday-school libraries of the Diocese. It is unnecessary to point out more in detail the defects which characterize the average Sunday-school library. Its defectiveness and its inadequacy to meet the demands of the Diocese to day are just the points assumed by this Council when it appointed the present committee. And, after careful study of the subject, your committee deliberately put themselves on record as believing that no more useful in this line could be done for the

children of the Church, gathered together in the Sunday-schools of the Diocese than to select for them, and by Concilior "action to prescribe for their use only standard Sunday-school library," consisting of such books as are morally healthy, intellectually stimulating and doctrinally in accord with the standards of this Church.

It was the desire and has been the effort of your committee to recommend to this Council a library composed of one hundred books of this character. It was their desire and intention to recommend these books on their merits, as they appeared to your committee upon a careful examination of the contents of each book. With this end in view, they procured publishers' catalogues and select lists of Sunday-school libraries, and wrote to these several publishers requesting them to furnish them with their books for examination. With the single exception of Mr. T. Whittaker, however, who promptly complied with our request, and from whose publications more than twenty-five volumes were selected after careful examination, the other publishers refused to furnish their books without heavy charge. Your committee were not authorized to incur any expense, and so, for sheer lack of means, were compelled to abandon the idea of procuring the necessary books and selecting from them volumes to the number and of the character desired. Possibly some other committee might be able to accomplish this feat without money. This committee cannot. And if the only thing the present committee feel justified in doing is unsatisfactory to the Council, let it appoint another committee which can get books free, or let it make an appropriation for the purchase of books to be examined. To give an idea of the amount required for this purpose, it may be well to note that the Bishop Doane List of Approved Sunday school Books, the selection of which is put forward with the greatest flourish of trumpets by our Church publishers, consisting of 190 volumes, costs \$136.25 net.

Under these circumstances your committee could do no more than select and classify one hundred books and present them, without any special examination of their own, except in the case of the twenty-five volumes selected out of Whittaker's publications, to the Council as a provisional and tentative list, and as the basis of future work along this line. We say as the basis of future work, for we hope the Council will not let this matter drop here. Its work in the future along this line will be simply the perfecting of the present confessedly imperfect list. The JOURNAL will give it permanent form. It will there be always open to the inspection and criticism of every Clergyman and layman in the Diocese who feels any interest in Sunday-school work. Whenever any book in the list is discovered to be unworthy of a place therein, or whenever a better book is suggested. Let the inferior book be stricken from the list and let the superior book be inserted in its place. In this way, in the course of a few years at the most. we can get a standard Sunday-school library, one in every respect adapted to our Sunday-school wants and in every way worthy of the Diocese of Virginia.

We would further suggest, as the name of our beloved Bishop carries so much weight with it everywhere, and is so potent with the children in particular, that he be requested to act as chairman of the comittee to whom the continuation of this work is committed, and that the list, when finally settled and endorsed by the Bishop, be called the BISHOP WHITTLE SUNDAY-SCHOOL LIBRARY.

On motion of Rev. John K. Mason, a vote of thanks was presented to the committee, and especially to the chairman, for the above report.

Rev. Dr. Grammer presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church respectfully present their report:

The Church whose state is investigated may be viewed either as an organic body, the condition of which may be evidenced and determined by statistics, or as a living body with a moral and spiritual character, and capable of spiritual health and growth.

1. The condition of the Church as disclosed by the information laid before this Council is such as to call for devout gratitude to the great Head and Lord of the Church, who has continued to us His wonted grace and favor. The exhibit made by the Episcopal and Parochial Reports of 1,602 confirmed, eight churches consecrated, fourteen new candidates for the ministry, and a clear gain of four ministers after all deductions for death, deposition and removal, affords a very cheering and stimulating evidence of growth. Our educational institutions are in a prosperous condition. The Seminary has been greatly improved without and within, mainly through the generosity of friends outside the Diocese; and the report of the Dean assures us that the spiritual tone pervading the students is most healthy and encouraging. The other Institutions of the Diocese present equally cheering evidences of prosperity. New enterprises are opening. New zeal is awaking all over the Diocese. More men and more money are urgently needed to enable the Church to enter in and possess a land that seems to be opening for us on every side, and more of God's spirit to quicken us forward in the building of the spiritual temple.

The reports of our Diocesan Missionary Society, moreover, show an increased spirit of liberality in our churches, and an enlarged capacity for giving, that calls for devout gratitude. A new mine of wealth seems to have been suddenly opened to the missionary work in the freshly awakening intererest and activity of the children of the Church. But to these grounds of hope and courage there is one very serious and threatening drawback in the increasing number of vacant churches and of Parishes dependent on the missionary treasury. With about fifty of our Ministers receiving aid from this source, and several self-supporting Parishes besides without pastors at all, the situation is such as to require new measures. And for the inaugurating of such new measures, happily, God's goodness seems to be supplying an increase in our missionary funds. The contribu-

tions to Diocesan Missions have been larger than ever before. But a very few years ago it was thought to be a great audacity of faith in the Council to resolve to raise \$10,000 for the year Now the sum easily exceeds \$13,000. And we feel justified in recommending to the Council this year to undertake to raise \$15,000.

In regard to our work for the colored race, it is gratifying to hear, through the address of the Bishop, that it is in a healthy and growing state. We urge upon our people as well as our pastors, to give this important work their sympathy and fostering care.

2. We turn, secondly, to a less cheerful view of the state of the Church. It is unwise and unsafe to estimate the Church wholly by its organic growth and prosperity. It is not alone an institution, it is a living body inhabited by a living and divine Spirit. It possesses a character. It has an aim, a destiny, a mission, and is healthy and prosperous, or otherwise, only as it is fulfilling, and is fitted to fulfill, its end and mission. That mission is not itself self-extension and self-exaltation. The Church that saves its life shall inevitably lose it. Its aim and mission is Jesus Christ, His glory, His work and His kingdom. And in the more or less successful pursuit of this high aim is to be sought the true measure of its health and prosperity. In inquiring, then, about the state of the Church, we are to look at its doctrine, discipline and worship.

As to doctrinal teaching and preaching, we are happy in the belief, on not unreasonable grounds, and without any undue elation of pride, that in no part of the Church is preached a more pure and wholesome gospel of Christ than among us. That reviving breath of the Spirit of Christ that passed over this Diocese during and through the fervent and faithful ministrations of Bishop Moore and his contemporaries and Bishop Meade and his contemporaries—under whose ministry of reconciliation the Church was uplifted from an almost extinct condition—stamped on the Virginia Church a character which it has not wholly lost. God grant its sweet savor may never pass away.

But there have sprung up among us, as well as in other parts of the Church, errors of doctrine, the prevalence of which must, in the next generation, prove fatal to the tone and character of that teaching and preaching which has always obtained in this Diocese. Errors rarely come to a harvest or ripen their fruits in the same generation, or come in the same soil in which they are sown. Springing up in hearts and lives that are already established in religious character, they are often for a time harmless enough, and rather lie barrenly in the mind as mere variations of religious thought than enter into the life and religious character. The fruits of error are to be sought for in the next generation, in those who with unformed character and convictions grow up under their influence. We must wait awhile, then, to see the corrupting effects of those erroneous beliefs gaining some currency in our Church, that deny immortality to the wicked, and claim a future probation and the possibility of repentance after death. If

we realize as we ought our responsibility to the Church that is to come after us, it becomes us to be exceedingly cautious and tender of teaching doctrines which will be held by them, not as variations of fresh thought, but as living truths, and transmitting as an inheritance to our children teachings which our fathers have never committed to us.

As to discipline and worship, your committee must restrict themselves by saying summarily, that in the nature of the case there cannot be a maintenance of sound doctrine, purity of worship, and innocency of life, where discipline is despised. Disregard of canons, of rubrics, of vows, of legitimate authority, of old-established usages and orders, and the general prevalence, instead, of self-pleasing, self-will, and self-rule, must obviously make impossible, not to say the continuance of sound doctrine and righteous living, but the continuance of very organic government itself, which being government by law and authority assumes the faithful administration of law and authority. We feel constrained to utter here a note of warning to the Diocese. Because we are all, Clergy and Laity alike, under authority, and need to be digesting all through life what we learned in childhood, that in submitting ourselves to all our governors. teachers, spiritual pastors and masters, consists the safety and perpetuity of all government, ecclesiastical, as well as domestic and divine.

Rev. H. Suter, D. D., presented the report of the Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE ACCOUNTS OF THE DISABLED CLERGY FUND.

The committee appointed to examine the Disabled Clergy Fund beg leave to report that they have had submitted to them the account of the Treasurer. It is certified to by the Trustees of this Fund, and therefore is in every way correct.

The assets of the Society at their face value amounted last year to \$21,648.19. They are now \$22,497.49. The report thus shows an increase of \$849.30, notwithstanding the two facts, (1) that new investments were made during the past fiscal year at considerable premiums, and (2) that the needy Clergy during the same time have received \$950 more than were given the year before.

These figures indicate a very healthy condition of the finances as managed by the Trustees and Treasurer; but we feel it our duty to call attention to a slight falling off in the collections from the churches during the

last year, lest this decrease should go on, and in time seriously cripple our resources. We must remember that with the coming years our liabilities will increase, and that, at the same time, our reinvestments will have to be made at a lower rate of interest. We must, therefore, steadily increase our annual contributions from the churches, in order to keep our Society in a condition equal to the increasing burdens to be laid upon it.

So far as your committee can judge, the investments have been wisely made, and the funds properly applied. The funds distributed to five (5) clergymen have amounted to \$2,200, an excess, as we have already said, over last year of \$950.

Your committee also desire to say that they have considered the resolutions of the House of Deputies of the General Convention referred to them, adopted October 24th, 1889, relative to the enactment of a canon by this Council in the interest of the Clergy Pension Fund. As we already have in this Diocese a Society for the Relief of our Aged and Disabled Clergy, your committee does not deem it wise to legislate further on this subject.

With reference to the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society, we cordially endorse the action of the House of Deputies in heartily approving of the principles and methods of the Society, and commending it to the support of the Clergy and Laity of this Diocese.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPAL FUND.

FREDERICKSBURG, May 21, 1890.

The committee appointed to examine the accounts of the treasurer of the Episcopal Fund present the treasurer's report. The only changes since the last report have been a sale of \$200 of the Charlottesville & Rapidan R. R. 1st mortgage bonds at 102. The proceeds received from this sale was added to the receipts for the past year from dividends collected from the securities held by the treasurer (amounting to \$475.85) to purchase a \$1,000 bond of the corporation of the City of Alexandria at 650, as evidenced by the treasurer's check on Burke & Herbert, paid by them and for six hundred and fifty dollars. This leaves a balance due the treasurer of \$57.37.

Mr. L. M. Blackford presented the report of the Committee on the Brotherhood.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE BROTHERHOOD.

The Committee on the Brotherhood beg leave to submit the following report:

During the twenty years since its organization at the Council in Wheeling there have been among the beneficiary members of the Brotherhood thirty-five deaths, among the families of these \$33,561 have been distributed. Collections for the heirs of the three who have died during the past year—the Revs. G. A. Smith, J. C. Hobson and R. H. Phillips—are still going on. It appears, therefore, that the average number of deaths annually among our members is one and three-fourths, and the average cost to each less than two dollars. The present number of members is from six hundred to seven hundred

The trustees having experienced as great difficulty as ever in securing agents in the congregations, have determined to solicit the assistance in that behalf of the Volume of such Parish which is without one. At the same time they ask, and you minittee warmly seconds the request, that members of the Council will co-operate in this endeavor. We believe that in no other way can the same outlay accomplish as large a measure of good.

Your committ. v in pain, the death during the last year of Mr. George W. Warre..., or Richmond, the gentleman who had so long and faithfully served as Treasurer of the Brotherhood. His place has been supplied by the appointment of Mr. Cyrus Bossieux, who reports in hand now, securely invested, \$2,000, and in cash, \$353.65.

It only remains for us to add to this exhibit of the past working and present condition of the organization, our conviction of the usefulness of the Brotherhood as it stands, and our still deeper conviction of its capability for good far beyond anything it has yet accomplished.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF VIRGINIA FEMALE INSTITUTE.

The Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute has the satisfaction of reporting to the Council that this Diocesan school for young ladies, under the admirable management of Mrs. Gen. J. E. B. Stuart, continues to prosper and to answer the high purposes of its foundation. The mental, moral, religious, and social training of its scholars is of the best and most faithful character, and the school is yearly turning out young ladies who are fitted, in all the highest accomplishments of womanhood, to adorn the society of their homes.

The number of scholars for the present year is ninety-eight, of whom sixty-five are boarders. Sixteen of these during the session have united themselves with the Church, in addition to a large number already in communion therewith.

The health of the pupils has been, as usual, very good, no case of serious sickness having occurred among them. The location of the Institute in the beautiful Valley of Virginia is, as you well know, one of rare healthfulness. Its literary and artistic advantages are excellent, and its discipline careful and loving, such as to entitle it to the fullest confidence of its patrons. The Board has no hesitation in giving the school a hearty recommendation.

Mrs. Stuart, in a recent report to the Board, suggests "the great need of an addition to the buildings, to be used as an assembly hall and for commencement exercises, the second story to serve as a studio to accommodate the increasing number of art students"; and she asks, "are there not some able, large-hearted men in our Diocese to help forward this good cause?"

We cordially approve this object, and should be glad to see it accomplished through the liberality of our wealthy laymen.

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Report received-Resolutions adopted-Recess.

A vacancy in the Board has recently been made by the lamented death of Gen. Francis H. Smith, who for many years showed a lively interest in the Institute and always exerted himself zealously in its behalf. A distinguished educator, a faithful servant of the State, a loyal son of the Church, an humble and devoted Christian, a courteous gentleman and true friend, we sincerely deplore the great loss which we have sustained, and which has fallen alike on Church and State.

We invite the Council to make the nominations which the law requires for the filling of this vacancy.

The decision of the chair was sustained.

Rev. Dr. Nelson moved to postpone indefinitely.

Resolved, That the Council especially endorse that portion of the report of the Committee on the State of the Church which refers to doctrine, and orders 5,000 copies of the report to be printed and to be distributed throughout the Diocese.

Rev. H. B. Lee gave notice that he would move at this Council that the 19th Canon be amended so as to read as follows:

Any member of the Church, being a communicant thereof, conducting himself or herself in a manner unworthy of a Christian, ought to be admonished or repelled from the Lord's table by the minister of the Parish or Church, according to the rubric. Gaming, attendance on horse racing and theatrical amusements, witnessing immodest and licentious exhibitions or shows, attending public balls, habitual neglect of public worship, a neglect of the Holy Communion, or denial of the doctrines of the Gospel as generally set forth in the authorized standards of the Church, are practices from which all Christians should abstain. This enumeration, however, shall not include all the subjects of discipline or admonition in the Church.

In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the minister, or may be requested by the accused, the church wardens, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the minister in ascertaining the facts in the case: Provided, That if such warden, or wardens, shall fail or refuse to act within ten days, the minister shall proceed to act under the rubrics of the Church.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE OF FINANCE.

The Committee on Finance beg to report as follows:

We have examined the account of Mr. James T. Gray, treasurer of the Contingent Fund of the Diocese, and found it correct in every particular, and sustained by proper vouchers.

Report of Committee on Canon XIII.

The receipts from the Contingent Fund for the year ending May, 1890, amounted to \$13,504.43, and from interest, \$404.51, making a total receipt of \$13,908.94. The total expenses of the Diocese, as shown by the account, are \$11,233.83, leaving a balance in the hands of the treasurer of \$175.11, and \$2,500 loaned on interest.

The treasurer reports his collections up to this afternoon at about \$7,200. Your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- I. That the treasurer pay the customary charges for the salaries of the Bishop and Assistant Bishop, Secretary, Chaplain, Historiographer, and other customary expenses, including the rent of the residence of the Assistant Bishop, the sum of \$25 to the Assistant Secretary of this Council, and \$15 dollars to the sexton of St. George's Church, Fredericksburg.
- 2. That the Secretary cause to be printed fifteen hundred copies of the JOURNAL, as heretofore, and that he distribute, free of charge, so many as may be required for the use of the ministers and vestries of the Diocese, and dispose of the residue by sale, as heretofore.
- 3. That a committee of three be appointed to invest, or reinvest, any sum of money in the hands of the Treasurer of the Contingent Fund not necessary for the current expenses of the Diocese, and report their action, from year to year, to the Council.
- 4. That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the sum of \$20 to the Rev. W. T. Roberts, for his expenses in making his report on Bishop Burgess's Catechism and Sunday-school Instruction Books.

CANON XIII.

OF COLORED MISSION CHURCHES.

SECTION 1. The colored people of Virginia who are, or may hereafter be, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary jurisdiction of the Diocese.

Sec. 2. It shall be lawful to organize Mission Churches or congregations, composed exclusively of colored persons, within the limits of any already

Canon Adopted.

existing Parish, subject to the same conditions and regulations as are other Mission Churches (see Canon XII), and specially those of this Canon, except that consent of the Vestry or Vestries need not be obtained.

SEC. 3. There may be appointed, by the Bishop, one or more Presbyters who shall have general supervision of such colored churches and congregations as the Bishop may designate, and perform such duties as he may prescribe.

SEC. 4. A Convocation shall be held annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the Convocation itself. The colored ministers of the Diocese, in good standing, shall be members of the Convocation, and it shall be the duty of every such minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every Colored Mission Church or congregation shall elect one male lay delegate annually, who, upon the presentation of a certificate signed by the minister (or warden, if there be no minister,) and Register of the Vestry, stating that the delegate is not less than twenty-one years of age, and is a communicant of the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation.

The Bishop, the Assistant Bishop (if there be one), and the Presbyters mentioned in Section 3, shall be ex officio members of the Convocation. The Bishop (or in his absence the Assistant Bishop) shall be President of the Convocation.

SEC. 5. The Convocation shall have power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Council of the Diocese.

SEC. 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two Clergymen and two laymen to represent them in the Council of the Diocese.

SEC. 7. Colored congregations, constituted as above provided, may acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by transfer, under the laws of the State of Virginia; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by like transfer.

Bishop Randolph moved that the proposed Canon be adopted as a substitute for the present Canon XIII, which was carried unanimously.

Bishop Randolph offered the following, which was carried unanimously:

WHEREAS, The Bible Society of Virginia is doing an extensive mission work and greatly needs the help of all churches, and—

Amendment to 19th Canon Adopted.

WHEREAS, Our Council, in 1884, asked that it be one of the objects to which our offerings be made;

Resolved, That this Council renew this recommendation, and further suggest that the second Sunday in November be set apart for the purpose.

Rev. S. S. Ware offered the report of the Committee on the Bruce Fund, showing the accounts to be correct.

Rev. James Grammer, D. D., moved that after religious services the Council adjourn *sine die*.

Rev. H. B. Lee moved to adjourn until to-morrow at 10 A. M.

The motion to adjourn to 10 A. M. to-morrow was carried.

SATURDAY, May 24th, 1890.

The Council assembled for Divine service at 10 A. M. Morning prayer was read by the Rev. G. G. Smeade. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Pike Powers, D. D., on the 16th verse of the 16th chapter of St. Mark's Gospel.

After Divine service the Council met for business, and was called to order by the Assistant Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Rev. Pike Powers presented the following:

The committee on the proposed amendment to the 19th Canon recommend its adoption.

Pike Powers, C. R. Hains, John W. Green.

The amendment was adopted.

Judge W. S. Barton moved that a committee of seven be apcluding the two Bishops, who shall report to the next on the question of repealing the 19th Canon. Committee appointed-Resolution-Adjournment.

The motion was carried, and the following committee appointed:

Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D., Rt. Rev. A. M. Randolph, D. D., Rev. B. D. Tucker, Mr. R. Taylor Scott.

On motion of the Rev. R. T. Davis, the name of Mr. L. M. Blackford was added to the Committee on the Brotherhood.

The following resolution was offered by the Rev. Thos. Spencer, which was carried.

Resolved, That in addition to printing the Constitution and Canons in the JOURNAL, one thousand copies be printed and bound separately, the expense to be borne out of the Contingent Fund.

On motion—after the minutes of the day's proceedings were read and approved, and after the Council engaged in religious services—the Assistant Bishop pronounced the benediction and declared the Council to be adjourned sine die.

President of the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School:

I respectfully report that eight students have attended the Divinity School this session. One of these expects to graduate on the course for candidates for Priest's Orders next month. He is the first student who has taken the full course in the school.

Most of the Divinity students have studied well, and made fair progress.

Sixty-five scholars have attended the Normal School during the current session. Some of these have done faithful work, others have done very little that is creditable.

The matron and teachers have been faithful and conscientious, so far as can be seen, in the discharge of their duties.

There have been twenty boarders in the two schools.

Some progress has been made in the Industrial Department.

I have instructed classes in the Divinity School in Old and New Testament History, Church History, New Testament Exegesis, Homiletics, Latin and Greek.

In the Normal School, I have instructed the Senior class in the Prayer-Book, Church History, Social Science and Logic.

I respectfully report that during the past session I have taught in the Divinity School classes in Hebrew, Bible Introduction, Liturgies, Church Polity, and Systematic Theology.

In the Normal School I have taught classes in Mental Science, Moral Science, English and Latin.

The progress of the Divinity Students has been very fair in Biblical and theological studies, but they are generally backward in English Grammar, Composition and Spelling—studies to which we find it necessary to give increasing attention.

The same remark as to English holds good in the case of most of the Normal scholars. It is very difficult to impress upon them the necessity of thoroughness in elementary studies.

REVISED CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

As adopted in 1836, and amended in 1840, 1850, 1860, 1864, 1867, 1872, 1881 and 1890.

ARTICLE I.

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia on the third Wednesday in May every year; but the Council which meets in the year previous to the meeting of the General Convention may have power to appoint the time and place of meeting for the next annual session, and in the event of the existence of an epidemic disease, or any other good cause, rendering it necessary or expedient to alter the place fixed on for any meeting of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may change the place, or the time, or both.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION I. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop (if there be one), and of the Ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who now are or may hereafter be canonically settled in Parishes or churches within this Diocese; Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, Missionaries within this Diocese, and under its ecclesiastical authority, being Clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese: *Provided*, that any such Ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members ex officio: Provided

Constitution.

further, that only such Colored Ministers shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article: Provided further, that no Minister under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat in the Council, and no Minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC. 2. The Council shall also be composed of lay members, consisting of one delegate for each Parish or church entitled to representation, chosen by the Vestry thereof, except as hereinafter provided. Every such Parish or church having more than one officiating Minister canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has Ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church: *Provided*, that only such colored delegates shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article.

SEC. 3. The Council shall also be composed of the Colored Ministers having a seat and voice in the Council on the 17th day of May. 1889, and of two clerical and two lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is now or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

ARTICLE III.

Twenty members of the clerical and twenty of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn.

ARTICLE IV.

In all matters that shall come before Council, the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body, and the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure; but when five members require it there shall be a vote by orders, and a majority of each order shall be necessary to a decision.

ARTICLE V.

The election of a Bishop in this Diocese shall be made in Council in the following manner: The order of the clergy shall nominate and appoint by ballot some fit and qualified clergyman for that

Constitution.

office, and the votes of a majority of that order shall be requisite to constitute a choice; and thereupon such appointment shall be presented to the order of the lay delegates, and be considered by them; and if on a ballot it shall appear that the person so nominated is approved by a majority of the lay order, he shall then be declared to be duly elected.

ARTICLE VI.

The Bishop shall be President of the Council, in which character it shall be his duty to give to the Council annually a general view of the state of the Church; to call special Councils at whatever time and place he shall think necessary, or when required by the Standing Committee; to preserve order during the time of session; to put the question, collect the votes, and declare the decision; and he may deliver his sentiments on any subject after it has been discussed before a vote thereon. The Assistant Bishop, if there be one, shall preside in the Council in the absence of the Bishop.

ARTICLE VII.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, the Council, immediately upon their assembling, shall choose by joint ballot a President from among the order of Priests, who shall remain in office until the next annual Council, or until the next election of a President. He shall perform all duties, and possess all the privileges above specified; but he shall not call special meetings of the Council unless applied to for that purpose by a majority of the Standing Committee; and if the Bishop of the Diocese be not present at any meeting of the Council, they shall elect, in the manner aforesaid, a President pro tempore.

ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office during good behavior. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully to deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Council which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to notify through the channel of the public papers, as he may think

Constitution

proper, the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journals of every succeeding Council a list of the clergy, with all alterations therein produced in the preceding year by ordinations, deaths, removals, suspensions and degradations.

ARTICLE IX.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office for one year, or until his successor shall be appointed. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be ordered by the Council. He shall annually report to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same.

In case of a vacancy in the office by the death or resignation of the Treasurer, or in case of his misconduct, incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office during the recess of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may fill the said vacancy, or remove the said Treasurer, and appoint a Treasurer pro tempore, who shall take into his custody all the money and other property, and all the books and papers belonging to the said office, and discharge the duties thereof until the election of a Treasurer by the Council.

ARTICLE X.

Each Annual Council shall elect by ballot a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese, and who shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed.

ARTICLE XI.

Every Parish within this Diocese shall be entitled to the entire benefit of this Constitution as soon as it shall have signified its ratification thereof, either in writing or by sending a lay delegate to the Council; and such Parish shall thereafter be benefited and bound equally with the other Parishes in this Diocese by every rule and Canon which shall be framed by any Council acting under this Constitution for the government of this Church in ecclesiastical concerns.

Constitution.

ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution shall be unalterable, except in the following manner: A proposition for any change shall be introduced in writing and considered in Council, and if approved of, the same shall be transmitted to the several vestries of the Parishes which shall have ratified this Constitution; and if again approved of in the next ensuing Council by a majority, the change shall then take place, and the Constitution so altered shall be valid and obligatory.

CANONS

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

OF THE

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

Adopted 1849, 1850, 1860, 1867, 1872, 1882, 1887, and 1890.

CANON I.

Of the trial of a Clergyman, not being a Bishop.

SECTION 1. The trial of a clergyman, not being a Bishop, shall be on a presentment in writing, specifying with reasonable clearness and certainty as to time, place and circumstance, the crime or misdemeanor, by violation of the canons or otherwise, charged; the said presentment to be made to the Bishop, either by the Council, or by the vestry of the Parish to which the accused belongs, or by any three presbyters of the Diocese, entitled to seats in the Council; the said vestry, or presbyters, pledging themselves to act as a committee of prosecution. If, however, the presentment be made by the Council, then the Council shall appoint the committee of prosecution and furnish them with such instructions as may be deemed necessary.

SEC. 2. Such presentment being made to the Bishop, and being accompanied by a further statement in writing of the names of the witnesses, and of the purport of their evidence, and by such documentary evidence as may be in their possession, the Bishop shall immediately proceed to the trial, according to the following provisions: He shall nominate from among the clergy entitled to seats in the Council, other than the members of the Standing Committee, eight



presbyters, and cause a list of their names and a copy of the presentment to be furnished to the accused, or left at his place of residence. Of the eight presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the accused may choose five, or, in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days so to do, the Bishop shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen shall constitute a court for tne trial of the accused. The Bishop shall also, at the same time, cause at least thirty days' notice of the time and place of the trial to be given, both to the accused and to the parties presenting him, and also to the presbyters nominated as before provided.

SEC. 3. The court shall appoint a President and Secretary—the first always from their own body.

SEC. 4. If the accused appear before proceeding to trial, he shall be called on by the court to say whether he is guilty of the offence, or offences, charged against him, and on his neglect or refusal to answer, the plea of not guilty shall be entered for him, and the trial shall proceed: Provided, that for sufficient cause the court may adjourn, from time to time, and place to place: And provided also, that the accused shall, at all times during the trial, have liberty to be present, to produce his testimony, and to make his defense.

SEC. 5. On the request of the accused, or the committee of prosecution, witnesses may be summoned—if before the meeting of the court—by the Bishop; if during the session of the court then by its President. All testimony shall be given under oath or affirmation, administered by some officer authorized by law. In case the testimony of any witness-whose attendance on the trial cannot be obtained—is desired, it shall be lawful for either party, at any time after notice of the presentment is served on the accused, to apply to the court, if in session, or if not, to the Bishop, who shall thereupon appoint a commissioner to take the deposition of such witness; and such party so desiring to take the deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying such notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness; whereupon, it shall be lawful for the other party, within six days after such notice, to propound cross-interrogatories, and such interrogatories and crossinterrogatories, if any be propounded, shall be sent to the commissioner, who shall thereupon proceed to take the testimony of such witness, and transmit it under seal to the court. But no deposition

shall be read at the trial unless the court have reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, or unless both parties shall consent that it may be read.

SEC. 6. The court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall, within ten days after closing the same, declare in a written judgment signed by them, or a majority of them, that the accused is guilty, or not guilty, of the charge or charges, or any of them, laid in the presentment, in the order therein set forth, and also, if guilty, what punishment shall be awarded, which judgment, with all the evidence received, shall be delivered forthwith to the Bishop; whereupon, unless the Bishop see cause to mitigate or remit the punishment, or to grant a new trial, he shall pronounce sentence according to the judgment of the court, and such sentence shall be final. In case a new trial is granted, a new court shall be constituted according to the provisions of this Canon.

SEC. 7. If the accused shall neglect or refuse to appear before the court, when summoned according to section second of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the court shall declare him to be in contumacy, and report the same to the Bishop, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass against him for contumacy; but the said sentence shall be reversed by the Bishop, if—within three calendar months—the accused shall tender himself ready, and accordingly appear to take his trial on the presentment; but if he shall not so tender himself before the expiration of the said three months, the sentence of degradation from the ministry for contumacy shall forthwith be pronounced by the Bishop, who shall cause such sentence to be publicly read to the congregations of the Diocese by the respective ministers thereof.

SEC. 8. If at any time the accused shall confess himself guilty of the matters charged in the presentment, or any of them, the court shall proceed to award the punishment, and certify the same, as hereinbefore provided, to the Bishop, who shall, unless he see cause to remit or mitigate the punishment, pronounce the sentence according to the Canons.

SEC. 9. All notices and papers contemplated by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Bishop, or by the court when the same is in session, and the certificate of any such summoner shall be evidence of the due service of a notice or paper. The delivery of a written notice or paper to a party, or

the leaving it at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

SEC. 10. The accused party may have the privilege of appearing by counsel, in number not more than two, and, in case of the exercise of such privilege, but not otherwise, those presenting shall have the like privilege. If the party accused desire it, the trial shall be in public, and said party shall be entitled to a copy of the evidence if he require it.

SEC. 11. In case of a presentment occuring during a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, such presentment shall be made to the Standing Committee, who shall thereon take such steps as are by this Canon enjoined on the Bishop: *Provided*, that on receiving the proceedings and judgments of the court, they shall transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese, who shall be requested, and is hereby authorized, to act thereon, as if he were the Bishop of the Diocese, and, if he shall concur in opinion with the court, he shall proceed to pronounce sentence accordingly.

SEC. 12. The expenses of such trial, as also those of the investigating committee, preliminary to a presentment, shall be defrayed by the Treasurer out of the contingent fund by order of the Council.

CANON II.

Of the proceedings in the trial of a Laymen, after expulsion by the Minister from the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop, that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric, in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and desiring that he may be restored to the Communion, and then the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the minister, shall nominate two of the clergy and two of the laity, of whom the minister repelling shall select one of the clergymen, and the communicant one of the laymen; and it shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in

the case, under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop, who, thereupon, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence, shall proceed to adjudge the case. If further evidence be required, it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or by another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. And when the evidence is thus procured, the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment whenever made to the minister repelling, and to the communicant repelled, which judgment shall be final and conclusive: *Provided*, that in case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall neverthelesses be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

CANON III.

Of the transfer of Communicants from one Parish or Church to another.

Every communicant removing from one Parish or church to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the minister a certificate of regular standing from the minister, or, if there be no minister, from the vestry of the Parish or church from which the communicant desires to be transferred.

CANON IV.

Ministers to be careful in admitting to Holy Communion.

No minister shall enroll any persons as communicants in the Parish or congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, or unless he shall be satisfied that they have been regular communicants in some other Parish or congregation; nor shall he enroll any one who is known to deny the doctrines of the gospel as generally set forth in the authorized standards of the Church; nor shall he report to the Diocesan Council, as a communicant, any one who has not (without satisfactory reason) communed within the year immediately preceding the annual meeting of the Council.



CANON V.

Communicants to have Family Worship.

It shall be the duty of every communicant in this Church, who is at the head of a family, to live in the daily exercise of family worship.

CANON VI.

The members of this Church to instruct their Families in the principles of Religion.

The members of this Church shall instruct their families, as far as they are able, in the principle of the Christian religion. Parents and sponsors shall be careful to teach their children the solemnity and obligation of their baptismal vow, to cause them to attend the catechetical and other instructions of their minister; and, as soon as they are sufficiently instructed and impressed with the importance and sacredness of their baptismal promise, shall take care that they come to the Bishop to be confirmed by him.

CANON VII.

Of the due celebration of Sunday.

All persons within this Church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, in hearing the Word of God read and taught, in private and public prayer, and in acts of charity, using all sober and godly conversation.

CANON VIII.

Election and Duties of Vestries and Wardens, &c.

SEC. 1. All persons who have attained the age of twenty-one years, have resided in the Parish in which they offer to vote for six months next preceding the election, and are communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church, or regular contributors to the charges of the Parish, shall be entitled to vote at the election of vestrymen for such Parish.

SEC. 2. The election of vestrymen shall be held on Easter Monday: or in case no election be held on that day, on such other day as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. tion shall be held at the Parish church, or some place of worship, if there be one; if not, at such other place within the Parish as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter provided. The voting shall be by ballot. The number of persons to be voted for by each elector shall not be less than three, nor more than twelve, and shall be fixed—where the election is the first in a new Parish—by the Council on its admission into the Diocese, or, before the election commences, by a majority of the qualified electors who shall have assembled to vote at such election; or, in case the election be in an organized Parish, the number to be voted for shall be the same that constituted the former vestry, unless such number be changed in like manner by a majority of the qualified electors so assembled. Only male persons shall be eligible to the office of vestryman; in other respects the qualifications of vestrymen shall be the same as those prescribed for voters. The persons chosen by a majority of the votes cast at such election, together with the minister in charge of the Parish, if there be one, shall constitute the vestry of the Parish, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected, and qualify as hereinafter prescribed.

SEC. 3. In case there be in a Parish congregations not exceeding four in number, apart from each other, but not constituting independent cures, a separate election shall be held for each congregation at its usual place of worship, or, if there be none, at such other place as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The qualified electors of such congregation shall, in the manner prescribed by this Canon, elect three persons, who shall be vestrymen of the Parish. The vestrymen chosen for such congregation shall, together with the minister in charge thereof, be the constituted authorities of such congregation, and shall manage and control the affairs of the same, so far as they pertain alone to the congregation, and not to the Parish at large. The vestrymen chosen by such congregations in the same Parish shall, together with the minister in charge thereof, be the constituted authorities of the Parish, as its vestry, and shall manage and control the affairs of the Parish, either in general meeting, a majority of the whole number of vestrymen in the Parish being present, or in case such meeting be impracticable,



or in the opinion of the minister in charge too inconvenient, any matter concurred in by a majority of the vestrymen of the respective congregations, and duly recorded by the register of the Parish, shall be deemed to be the act of the vestry of the Parish. But in no event shall the aggregate number of such vestrymen exceed twelve.

- SEC. 4. If there be no Parish church or place of regular worship for the Parish or congregation, as the case may be, the minister in charge of the same, or other person or persons named in the next succeeding section, shall have authority to appoint the place within the Parish at which such election shall be held. If such place of voting be so fixed before Easter Monday, the same notice of the time and place of election shall be required as in the next succeeding election.
- SEC. 5. If no such election be held on Easter Monday, the same may be held on any day thereafter (except Sunday), to be fixed by the minister in charge, or, if there be none, by one of the wardens, or by two vestrymen, or, if there be none, by three members of the congregation. Of the time and place of such special election, due notice shall be given during the services held at the Parish church or place of worship on the two Sundays next preceding such special election; or in case no such services be held by posting copies of such notice for two weeks next preceding such special election at the front door of the Parish church or place of worship; or, in case there be none, at two or more public places in the Parish.
- SEC. 6. The vestry shall appoint three persons, of whom not more than two members shall be of their own body, to act as judges, to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges be appointed, the members of the vestry present shall act as judges of election; and in case none of the vestry be present, or if present, fail to act, the electors may choose three of their number to act as such judges. The judges of election shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and of those elected as vestrymen.
- SEC. 7. As soon as may be after such election, the persons chosen to act as vestrymen shall at such time and place as the minister shall appoint, or as shall otherwise be designated, assemble and proceed to organize the vestry. The register and treasurer of the former vestry shall attend. The proceedings shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's prayer by the minister in charge, or in

his absence by one of the wardens, or any other member who may be requested to preside over the meeting.

SEC. 9. The vestry shall proceed to elect two wardens, a register and a treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. The wardens must be communicants and members of the vestry.

SEC. 10. Vacancies occurring in the vestry shall be filled by a vote of the remaining members, and a majority of those who have qualified shall constitute a quorum. The Rector shall preside at all meetings when present, and be entitled to give the casting vote in case of a tie, when he is not personally interested. All vestry meetings shall be subject to his call, and in case he fails, at the request of two vestrymen, to call a meeting, such vestrymen, if they deem it necessary, may themselves call a meeting.

Duties.

SEC. 1. It shall be the duty of the vestry to determine upon and elect a Rector; to co-operate with him in gathering souls into the fold of Christ; to see that he be properly supported; that his salary be paid with regularity and punctuality; to make and execute all contracts for the erection, furnishing and preserving the church edifice and other church property; to regulate the use of the Parish grave-yard; to employ an organist, and otherwise provide for sacred music, subject to the control of the Rector, and generally as the constituted agents of the Parish or congregation to transact all its temporal business.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the wardens to keep watch over the church property; to see that it is duly prepared for every occa-

sion of public worship; to see that the sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties; to collect the offerings of the people; to take charge of the font and communion plate; to provide out of the Parish funds, under the direction of the vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion; to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the register of the vestry to take charge of all Parish records; to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the vestry, and when there shall be no Rector, to enter upon the Church register usually kept by the Rector, all baptisms, specifying the Christian and surnames of the parents, with the name and date of birth and baptism of the person baptized; also all marriages, deaths and funerals, with dates and names of parties, and in like manner all confirmations administered in, and communicants lost or gained by the Parish, and furnish a report of the same to the annual Councils of the Diocese.

SEC. 4. It shall be duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all moneys, except communion alms and other special offerings, and to disburse the same under the direction of the vestry, and to make such reports to the Council as are required by its orders. The term "Parish," wherever it occurs in this Canon, shall be interpreted also to mean church or congregation, wherever such a church or congregation is entitled to a separate vestry, unless where the context requires a more restricted construction.

CANON IX.

Concerning Exceptions to the foregoing Canon.

Whereas, the preceding Canon, which directs the manner of choosing vestrymen in the several Parishes, is not applicable to the case of churches built and supported by voluntary associations of individuals; and it is proper that those who hold the sole property of a particular church—as in the case of the Monumental Church, Richmond, and in all similar cases—should provide for its care and management, the choice of vestrymen shall be made by the pew-holders

of the respective churches, conforming, as to the time of appointment and manner of qualifying the vestrymen, to the regulations prescribed by the eighth Canon.

CANON X.

Of the Division of Parishes.

- SEC. I. Whenever the members of the church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, shall desire to separate from the Parish of which they form a part, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after public notice given in the church or place of public worship, or posted upon the door of the same, and appoint a committee to take such measures as may be necessary.
- SEC. 2. The committee thus appointed shall give to the Bishop and to the majority of the vestry (if there be one) of the Parish from which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply for such purpose, which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Bishop and said vestry at least three months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.
- SEC. 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council, and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desirable; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, proceed to divide said Parish, and to constitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese.
- SEC. 4. As soon after the adjournment of the Council as may be practicable, the committee aforesaid shall give at least two weeks' notice to the members of the church, residing in the new Parish, to assemble for the election of a vestry, which election shall be conducted according to the directions contained in Canon VIII.
- SEC. 5. The committee aforesaid, or a majority of those who may attend, shall judge of the qualification of voters, and of the qualification of persons proposed to be elected, and of the election of vestrymen; and those persons whom said committee shall declare to be duly elected, shall be the vestry of said Parish until the election and qualification of the succeeding vestry.



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CANON XI.

Of the Formation of New Congregations.

When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a minister, shall choose to separate from the Parish or congregation of which they have hitherto been a part, they may proceed according to the directions given in Canon X, except that in this case the direction as to a line or lines of division is inapplicable. The Council may, on such petition, constitute the applicants a separate congregation, and authorize, by special enactment, such peculiar provisions as to the right of suffrage, the employment of a minister or ministers, and the manner of holding and managing the property of such congregation, as they may propose, and the Council deem expedient: *Provided*, That the time of electing and the manner of qualifying vestrymen shall always be conformed to the regulation prescribed in Canon VIII.

CANON XII.

Of Mission Churches.

SEC. 1. When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation desire a separate and independent organization, but cannot comply with the requirements of the Canon in regard to the formation of new congregations, they may, until they are so able, proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

They must obtain the approval of the vestry of the Parish to which they belonged, and if there be two or more vestries in the Parish they must have the consent of a majority of the same.

They must have the approval of the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese.

They may have their own vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of other vestries, except that they shall have no representation in the Council of the Diocese, and shall not call a minister without the approval of the ecclesiastical authority.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the vestry of a church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocese, and a list of Mission Churches so organized shall be published annually in the JOURNAL.

CANON XIII.

Of Colored Mission Churches.

- SEC. 1. The colored people of Virginia who are, or may hereafter be, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary jurisdiction of the Diocese.
- SEC. 2. It shall be lawful to organize Mission Churches or congregations composed exclusively of colored persons, within the limits of any already existing Parish, subject to the same conditions and regulations as are other Mission Churches (see Canon XII), and specially those of this Canon, except that consent of the Vestry or Vestries need not be obtained.
- SEC. 3. There may be appointed, by the Bishop, one or more Presbyters who shall have general supervision of such colored churches and congregations as the Bishop may designate, and perform such duties as he may prescribe.
- SEC. 4. A convocation shall be held annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the Convocation itself. The colored ministers of the Diocese, in good standing, shall be members of the Convocation, and it shall be the duty of every such minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every Colored Mission Church or congregation shall elect one male lay delegate annually, who, upon the presentation of a certificate signed by the minister (or warden, if there be no minister,) and Register of the Vestry, stating that the delegate is not less than twenty one years of age, and is a communicant of the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation.

The Bishop, the Assistant Bishop (if there be one), and the Presbyters mentioned in Section 3, shall Le ex officio members of the Convocation. The Bishop (or in his absence the Assistant Bishop) shall be President of the Convocation.

SEC. 5. The Convocation shall have power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare, which measures shall take effect when approved by the common of the Diocese.

SEC. 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two Clergymen and two laymen to represent them in the Council of the Diocese.

SEC. 7. Colored congregations, constituted as above provided, may acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by transfer, under the laws of the State of Virginia; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by like transfer.

CANON XIV.

Of the Evidence of the Appointment of Lay Delegates to the Council.

The appointment of lay delegates to the Council of this Diocese shall be certified by the rector, register, or warden of the proper Parish or Church, in duplicate, and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

"A. B., Rector,
"C. D., Register or Church Warden."

The original credentials of lay delegates shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Council, and the duplicate delivered to the delegate-elect. The Secretary shall make out a roll and call the names of all certified to him as duly and canonically elected. The President of the Council shall then appoint a committee, to be composed of four clerical and three lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report the names of those entitled to seats; but until said report shall be received and adopted, no business shall be considered by the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for examination and report.

CANON XV.

Of the Standing Committee.

- SEC. 1. Any vacancy occurring by death, or otherwise, in the Standing Committee, shall be supplied by the concurrent vote of the remaining clerical members and lay members of the Committee.
- SEC. 2. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the powers and duties to be performed by the Bishop, as regards discipline, except the pronouncing sentence of suspension, deposition, or degradation from the ministry, shall belong to, and be performed by, the Standing Committee.
- SEC. 3. The record of all the proceedings, on a presentment of a clergyman or layman, shall be preserved by the Standing Committee, and for that purpose shall, after a final decision, be delivered to their Secretary.
- SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee, before every stated meeting of the General Convention, to draft, with the advice and approbation of the Bishop, a report of the state of the Church in this Diocese, to be presented to the General Convention.
- SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee, at every meeting of the Council, to submit, in addition to the report of their proceedings, the documents also which have been laid before them during the year.

CANON XVI.

A List to be made of Ministers in this Diocese.

SEC. I. Within one week before every stated meeting of the Council of this Diocese, the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, the Standing Committee, shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church, canonically resident in this Diocese, annexing the names of their respective cures, or of their stations as missionaries, or of the colleges, academies, or other seminaries of learning in which they are engaged, or in regard to those who have no cure, or are not engaged in missions or institutions of learning—as above, their places of residence only. And such list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of meeting, and the names of the clerical



members called therefrom, and appended to the journal, and shall be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

SEC. 2. The list of the clergy of this Diocese, so prepared by the Bishop or Standing Committee, and annexed according to the changes which may occur, whether by death, ordination, discipline, or canonical removals from or admission into this Diocese, shall be evidence of a clergyman's having a cure or mission, or engagement in a seminary of learning, and no clergyman, while suspended from the ministry, shall have a place on said list.

SEC. 3. The right of any clergyman to a seat in the Council shall, if disputed, be determined according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons by the Council itself, whether his name be inserted in the list aforesaid or omitted.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the clergy to attend regularly at the meeting of every Council. At the opening of the Council their names shall be called over and absentees noted, and at the ensuing stated Council they shall be required to give excuses for their absence.

CANON XVII.

Respecting the Property of the Church.

The vestries respectively shall hold all glebes, lands, parsonage houses, churches, books, plate or other property now belonging or hereafter accruing to the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, as trustees for the benefit of the Parish or Church, for whose use the same were or shall hereafter be purchased or otherwise obtained; and may improve, demise, or otherwise dispose of the lands or houses allowed for the minister's habitation or use with the minister's consent; and if there be no minister, with the consent of the Bishop; or in case there be no minister, and the Episcopal Office be vacant, then not without the consent of the Standing Committee. The vestry may also use, improve, or dispose of all personal property, and the produce, rents and profits of lands and houses (not appropriated for the occupancy and use of the minister) belonging to the church, in repairing the church and parsonage house for the benefit of the respective Parishes or churches, and may make such rules and orders for managing' the affairs and temporal concerns of their respective churches and Parishes as they shall

think most conducive to their interest and prosperity. They shall have the sole power of directing the payment of money belonging to the respective churches and Parishes, and appoint a clerk, treasurer and collector when necessary; all which proceedings shall be entered in a well-bound book to be kept for that purpose. But when there are trustees under the act of the Legislature, passed February 3d, 1842, authorized to hold real property, such real property shall not be subject to the provisions of this Canon.

CANON XVIII.

Of Church Property for which there are no Trustees.

The Council shall annually elect a Standing Committee, to consist of two clergymen and three laymen, whose duty it shall be to claim for and on behalf the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, all property, real and personal, belonging to said church or any Parish or congregation thereof, whether said Parish or congregation has been disbanded or not, as to which there are no duly constituted trustees in whom is vested the legal title thereto.

The said Committee shall use all due diligence, by proper legal steps or otherwise, to secure such property to the use and benefit of the said Church, or of the proper Parish or Congregation thereof, and to that end the members of said Committee, or the persons designated by them, are hereby nominated without further action of the Council, to the respective courts to which said Committee may apply, as the trustees for any such property so to be claimed by said Committee.

When any such property shall be recovered by said Committee, it shall be held by the trustees appointed for the use and benefit of this Church, or the Parish or Congregation properly entitled thereto.

CANON XIX.

Offenders to be admonished or repelled from the Lord's Table.

Any member of the Church, being a communicant thereof, conducting himself or herself in a manner unworthy of a Christian, ought to be admonished or repelled from the Lord's Table by the minister of the Parish or Church, according to the Rubric. Gaming,

attendance on horse-racing and theatrical amusements, witnessing immodest and licentious exhibitions or shows, attending public balls, habitual neglect of public worship, a neglect of the Holy Communion, or a denial of the doctrines of the Gospel, as generally set forth in the authorized standards of the Church, are practices from which all Christians should abstain. This enumeration, however, shall not be construed to include all the subjects of discipline or admonition in the Church. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the minister, or may be requested by the accused, the Church wardens, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the minister in ascertaining the facts of the case: *Provided*, that if such warden or wardens shall fail or refuse to act within ten days, the minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

CANON XX.

Proceedings for the Expenses of the Diocese.

The Vestries of the several Parishes or churches shall, quarterly or at every annual Council, as each Vestry shall determine for itself, pay to the Treasurer such sums as may be apportioned to them respectively, for the purpose of defraying such expenses as may be authorized by the Council.

CANON XXI.

Concerning altering or adding to the Canons of the Church.

No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall hereafter be considered by the Council, unless at least one day's previous notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a committee of at least two presbyters and two laymen. Nor shall such alteration or addition be adopted during the same Council if two-thirds of the members shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration until the next Annual Council.

CANON XXII.

All the former Canons of this Diocese, not included in these Canons, are hereby repealed.

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
