RULES OF ORDER.

ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro lempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Elections.

Rules of Order.

A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

A Committee on Sunday Schools.

3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishops' Addresses the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such other Committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

- 1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.
- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.
- 4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.
- 5th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendment are precluded.
- 7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.
- 9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless per-

mitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectators shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Rev. B. D. Tucker presented the following report of Committee on Sunday-school Institute:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOL INSTITUTE.

The Committee appointed by the last Council to take such steps as shall be necessary for the organization of a Diocesan Institute, and to make proper arrangements for a meeting of the Institute on the afternoon of the first day of the Council of 1891, beg leave respectfully to report as follows:

The Committee, fully realizing the benefit of the Sunday-school Institute as an agency to elevate the character of the teaching in the Sunday-school and to promote the efficiency of this most useful part of the organization of the Church, have endeavored to carry out the instructions of the Council.

They have been met, however, with the insuperable difficulty of conducting a session of the Institute in the brief hours available in one afternoon.

The Sunday-school Institute is practicably a normal school. It would not be possible even to show the workings of such a school in the time at our disposal during the session of the Diocesan Council. The Committee feel that in view of this fact it would not be practicable to hold an Institute in connection with the annual Councils, and that the end sought by the resolution would be best attained by the organization of Convocational Institutes, which would be in more direct contact with the Sunday-school work. A

Report of Managers of Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Diocesan Institute, composed of delegates from the several Convocational Institutes, would be the natural outgrowth; and holding its sessions at such time and place as would be most convenient for those interested in the special work of the Sunday-school, would be able to accomplish far more than would be possible during the busy session of the Councils.

. In conclusion the Committee, regretting that they have not been able to carry out the full letter of the instructions of the Council, desire to give notice that there will be a meeting at four o'clock this afternoon in accordance with the order of the resolution under which they were appointed, when the subject of the organization of Sunday school Institutes will be brought before the members of the Council and all those interested in the work.

The Committee have been so fortunate as to secure the assistance of Archdeacon Moran, of the Diocese of Maryland, who has been prominently connected with the American Sunday-school Institute from its organization, and who is well fitted, by long experience in England and in Pennsylvania, to set forth the uses and methods of the Sunday-school Institute.

The Bishop presented the accounts of the Episcopal Fund and of the Bruce Fund, which were referred to the committees on those accounts.

Rev. Dr. Gibson presented the report of the Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

REPORT OF MANAGERS OF WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund are glad to be able to report a somewhat improved condition of their finances. The annual report of our Treasurer shows the par value of our invested fund to be \$25,713.73. The income from this fund for the year ending May, 1891, was \$1,539.94, an increase over that of the previous year of \$251.61.

The contributions also have slightly increased both in the number of contributors and in the amount given. In the year ending May, 1890, only seventy-four churches and individuals gave anything to this fund. In the year just ended the number has increased to ninety-two. The sum contributed, however, is only eleven dollars and fifty-seven cents more than last year, being \$1,136.83 to \$1,125.26 of the year before.

Hours of Meeting and Adjournment-Subject of Division of Diocese.

The amount from the interest fund and from contributions, together with a small balance in bank, gave us a distributable income of \$2 733.73. Out of this amount the Board have appropriated \$2,535 to the relief of eighteen beneficiaries, and reserving a balance of \$198.73 for possible demands that may arise during the year. It is exceedingly desirable that all the members of the Church in the Diocese should become contributors to this Fund, and that all our ministers should make collections for its enlargement. If this were done the Board would be enabled to carry out strictly the original Rule of Management, viz: to increase the Capital Fund to \$60,000 by adding to it yearly one-half of the annual income. Twenty-five cents given annually from each of our 18,000 communicants would accomplish this object.

Rev. Thomas Spencer presented a communication from the Petersburg Musical Association and Petersburg Chorus inviting the Council to attend a concert of sacred music to be given on Friday night.

On motion the thanks of the Council were returned for the above invitations.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Hanckel the subject of the division of the Diocese was made the order of the day for Thursday, immediately after the election of the Standing Committees of the Diocese.

Rev. E. L. Goodwin presented a petition for the division of Montgomery Parish, which was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Resolution, &c .- Evening Session-Report of Executive Committee of Diocesan Miss. Society.

On motion of Mr. R. Taylor Scott the privilege of seats on the floor of the Council was accorded to the Bishop of West Virginia and to all visiting clergy and theological students.

Rev. Dr. Powers presented a petition from St. Andrew's Church, Richmond, asking to be admitted into union with the Council. Referred to Committee on New Parishes.

Mr. J. Ravenscroft Jones offered the following:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Council be instructed to insert in the Annual Journal of this Council a brief memorial page of such ministers in this Diocese as have died within the preceding conciliar year; which memorial page shall embrace the following facts: What was his name in full? When born, and where? When ordered Deacon, and where? When ordained priest, and where? The several charges held by him? When did he die, and where?

Rev. J. B. Newton moved to amend by including also the names of deceased lay members of the Council.

The resolution, as amended, was adopted.

Rev. Dr. Dashiell moved that the Council meet at 8 P. M. for proceedings in connection with the report of the Diocesan Missionary Society. Adopted.

The hour of two o'clock having arrived, the Council took recess until 8 P. M.

WEDNESDAY, 8 P. M.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment, Bishop Whittle in the chair.

After services conducted by the Rev. Geo. W. Easter, the annual report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society was read by the Rev. Pike Powers, D. D., Secretary of the Committee.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSION-ARY SOCIETY.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society respectfully report that in the disbursement of the funds entrusted to them, they have aided, since the last Council, Parishes in the following counties and to

the following amounts, viz: Albemarle, \$100; Alleghany, \$200; Amherst, \$200; Bedford, \$150; Botetourt, \$100; Campbell, \$200; Chesterfield (two Parishes), \$325; Caroline (two Parishes), \$300; Culpeper, \$200; Essex (two Parishes), \$350; Fairfax, \$150; Goochland, \$200; Greensville, \$150; Halifax, \$200; Hanover (two Parishes), \$300; Henrico, \$250; Henry, \$200; King George, \$150; King William, \$100; Lancaster, \$200; Madison, \$100; Montgomery, \$200; Nottoway, \$200; Orange and Louisa, \$250; Pittsylvania (two Parishes), \$200; Princess Anne, \$200; Prince Edward, \$200; Prince William, \$300; Pulaski, \$200; Rockbridge, \$150; Shenandoah, \$250; Southampton, \$200; Stafford, \$250; Westmoreland (three Parishes), \$550; Warwick, \$200; York, \$100; total, \$7,575. This amount was not actually paid out, because there were vacancies part of the time, and appropriations made in the course of the year and paid from the date when they were made. November, 1890, a third Evangelist, Rev. James B. Funsten, having been appointed by the Bishop in pursuance of the resolution of the last Council, he entered upon his work, so that while we have paid the salary of one Evangelist, Rev. Ev. Meade, for one year, \$1,500, we have paid the salary of Rev. James B. Funsten say for seven months, \$875, making for the two \$2,375, the salary of the other Evangelist, Rev. John J. Norwood, being paid by the Richmond Missionary Society. We have also paid the travelling expenses of all three Evangelists. To this must be added \$100 paid to Rev. Job Turner, Missionary to Deaf Mutes, the stipends of five colored deacons, some specials paid to ministers in need, and other expenses incidental to the work, so that the total amount reported by the treasurer as paid out by him, of which the items are given in his report, is \$12,411.86. To meet this we started after the last Council with a balance on hand of \$4,586.25. and we have received \$13.893.43, of which the Lenten and Easter offerings up to 1st of May were \$6,746.46, and the children's offerings \$4,373.91. We are thankful for these large Lenten and Easter offerings, for without them we should have been unable to meet our engagements, and should have been compelled to curtail our work. But still we think it would be better if the contributions were more equally distributed throughout the year. More money was paid in in the single month of April than in all the preceding months since Council. It is certainly better not to be compelled to borrow, and we are compelled to borrow every year. A man who has a good deal of religion during Lent and but little at other times is not much of a Christian, and what is true of Christian living is apt to be true also of Christian giving. The Apostle's rule is to give regularly, according to the ability which God giveth.

There are now three Evangelists at work in the Diocese, each with his proper district assigned him. Rev. John J. Norwood has the counties in the Rappahannock Valley, the Piedmont and the Valley Convocations; Rev. Ev. Meade has the counties in the James River, the Petersburg, and the Norfolk Convocations, and Rev. James B. Funsten has the counties in the Southwest Virginia, the Central, and the Danville Convocations. They

have been assiduous and faithful in their work, and have visited the vacant churches in their several districts probably once in three months or oftener, besides doing some pastoral work and aiding them with counsel and encouragement. But there may be danger of some of the churches being satisfied with this supply and satisfied to pay very little for it; and this danger is likely to increase with the number of Evangelists. So that if we had six instead of three, and they could give the churches one service a month, some churches would be satisfied and satisfied that these services should be paid for mainly by the rest of the Diocese. Certain it is, that while some of them do very well, most of them give much less to Diocesan Missions, and therefore to the support of the Evangelists, than they would give to the support of a rector if they had one. The tendency of the system of Evangelists, when carried beyond a certain point, we think, is to pauperize the churches, unless some plan can be adopted to make the churches which are served by the Evangelists pledge themselves for a reasonable part of their support.

We have reason to believe that our Evangelists and Missionaries are doing good work, and for the most part are earnest, faithful, and efficient.

We thank God that He has blessed our work, and that He has put it into the hearts of the people and children to give as liberally as they have done to the cause of Diocesan Missions.

BISHOP WHITTLE'S ADDRESS.

The Bishop then read his Annual Address:

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN:

The last Council—in my absence and when I had no opportunity to respond—passed a resolution requesting me to take a vacation of four months and appropriating the means to enable me to do so. My first duty, therefore—after acknowledging my obligations to God for His goodness and mercy which have followed me through another year—is to assure you that I do most gratefully appreciate, not only this considerate and undeserved kindness, but also the unfailing confidence, forbearance, and affection which my dear brethren of the clergy and laity have manifested towards me for now twenty-three years past, and of which, it humbles me to know, I am entirely unworthy. I can only trust that it may constrain me freely to spend my improved health and strength in labors with them and for them.

I now proceed to give, as briefly as possible, such a report of my labors and of the affairs of the Diocese as is required by canon.

1890, June 6th. —Visited St. Stephen's Church, Culpeper, preached and confirmed six.

June 7th.—Preached in Christ Church.

June 8th.—In the morning in St. Paul's conducted the service, baptized an adult, preached and confirmed three; and in the afternoon preached in Calvary Church and confirmed two. The three churches last mentioned were then vacant, but now have a rector.

June 9th.—Emmanuel Church, preached and confirmed six.

June 10th.—St. Thomas', Orange, preached and confirmed three.

June 11th.—Preached in the morning in Christ Church, Gordonsville, and confirmed three; and at night in the colored church and confirmed six.

June 12th.—Preached in St. James' Church, Louisa C. H.

June 16th.—St. James', Ashland, preached and confirmed nine.

June 17th.—Attended meeting of Trustees of the Divinity and Industrial School, Petersburg, and the next two days the chaplain's examinations at the Theological Seminary.

June 20th.—Ordained a colored Deacon in St. Stephen's Church, Petersburg, a graduate of the Divinity and Industrial School.

June 24-26th.—Was engaged in duties at the Seminary.

June 27th.—Ordained four Deacons in the Seminary chapel.

September 26th.—Preached in Christ Church, Warm Springs, and confirmed three presented by Rev. Dr. Gibson.

September 28th.—Preached morning and night in the new and pretty Emmanuel Church, Covington, and confirmed three.

September 29th.—Preached in the Presbyterian Church, kindly loaned us, Clifton Forge.

September 30th.—At Longdale Furnace, Alleghany county, preached and confirmed five. These three last places are in the new and difficult, but important and encouraging, mission field of Rev. L. R. Combs.

October 1st.—Preached in Emmanuel Church, Botetourt county.

October 2d.—St. Mark's, Fincastle, and confirmed one.

October 3d.—Trinity, Buchanan, and confirmed six.

October 4th.—Preached in St. Paul's, Appommattox county, a plain but neat and comfortable log building, with a devout and earnest congregation, and confirmed seventeen. Revs. J. W. Ware and T. W. Jones had been conducting several days' services, the church having been for some time vacant. It is now in charge of Mr. Ware.

October 5th.—Johns Memorial Church, Farmville, preached and confirmed nine.

October 6th. —Grace, Cumberland county, preached and confirmed one.

October 7th.—St. Peter's, Buckingham, preached and confirmed one.

October 17th.—In St. Paul's, Hanover, and confirmed three.

October 18th.—Immanuel and confirmed three.

October 19th.—St. Peter's, New Kent, and confirmed three.

October 24th.—St. John's, Louisa, preached and confirmed one.

MINISTERS DECEASED.

It is my sad duty to report that three of our ministers have ceased from their earthly labors during the past year. June 12th, 1890, Rev. Philip Slaughter, D. D., the distinguished Historiographer of the Diocese, departed this life at his home in Culpeper at an advanced age, which I do not know. He had been disabled by feeble health for many years from doing the work of the ministry, but was actively engaged in historical studies and with his pen nearly to the last.

August 1st, 1890, died at the Orkney Springs, near Mt. Jackson, his home, in Shenandoah county, Rev. James W. Shields, the true, genial, warm-hearted Christian man, and the faithful and beloved rector of Beckford Parish, in the forty-second year of his age, and after a ministry of fifteen years.

January 15th, 1891, Rev. Ebenezer Boyden departed from us at his home in Albemarle county, in the eighty-eighth year of his age and the sixty-third of his ministry. This venerable brother had labored with fidelity and ability in Norfolk, Staunton, Cleveland,



Ohio, and, I think, for more than forty years as the Rector of Grace Church, Albemarle and St. John's, Louisa, but for several years had been unable, because of bodily infirmities, to continue in service. I do not attempt to write any eulogy of these dear brethren. That has been much better done by others than I could do it, and they were so well known as to make it unnecessary to add anything. Enough to say of them that they were all true and faithful servants of the Master, and ministers of His gospel; and that for them to live was Christ, and to die was gain.

I think it will appear from the various reports to be presented to the Council that while the Church may not have made any great progress during the past year, yet there is nothing to discourage us, and much for which we should be thankful. The confirmations have been about as usual, a number of new churches have been consecrated, the list of ministers remains nearly the same as last year, the amount of contributions has been large, and our different societies and institutions continue to prosper.

By resolution of the last Council I was made chairman of a committee to take charge of the very important work of preparing or of selecting and recommending suitable books for the instruction and the libraries of our Sunday-schools, which had been under consideration for several years. But unfortunately no committee was appointed and consequently nothing could be done. I suggest that the resolution be renewed during our present session. I was also appointed, during my absence from the Council and without my knowledge, one of a committee to report on the question of repealing the XIXth Canon of the Diocese. I respectfully declined to serve on this committee, and so informed the chairman.

The Diocese has been divided, as approved by the Council, into three districts, and Revs. J. J. Norwood and E. Meade have been continued, and Rev. James B. Funsten has been added to the number as Evangelists, who confine their labors each to his own district. These brethen have done faithful and effective service during the past year. Messrs. Meade and Funsten are supported and the expenses of all three are paid by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. To help the committee especially to meet this

additional expense and to do this important part of their work the children of the Diocese were again appealed to and asked to devote their Lent offerings to this object, and so increase the funds of the Society. The result has been simply wonderful and more gratifying than I can express. Think of the treasurer's reporting the contributions from the children as reaching the great sum of \$4,305.97-exceeding that of last year by more than \$1,300, and swelling the amount from the whole Diocese to the grand total of \$13,834-more than was ever given before, and more than the most sanguine of us had ever ventured to hope for! Truly, if not "out of the mouth of babes and sucklings," yet by the hearts and hands of little children God has ordained strength to carry on our work and advance his kingdom. The children of our families and Sunday-schools deserve the thanks of the whole Church. May God richly bless every one of them, and may their example inspire their seniors with a more earnest spirit of devotion and self-denial in the Master's service.

Two of our Evangelists, as I have mentioned, are supported by the Executive Committee, while the salary of the third, Mr. Norwood, is paid by the Richmond City Missionary Society, an organization representing the ministers and congregations of the city and neighborhood, and which I commend as a model which may well be imitated and an example which may be followed in all places where we have two or more churches. Its work is not limited to any particular locality, but extends as far as to Brazil, where it largely contributes to sustain one of our ministers. This Brazilian mission was founded and is carried on by the American Church Missionary Society, a voluntary organization of men of like doctrinal and ecclesiastical views and principles, whose teaching and methods we can cordially approve. The mission now consists of two of our noblest young Presbyters, Morris and Kinsolving, and several native helpers, who are to be joined in a few months (D. V.) by three other young Virginians of like mind and character, now members of the graduating class of the Seminary. Among the reports to be published in your Journal will be found a very interesting one from Messrs. Morris and Kinsolving, showing what remarkable encouragement and success have so far rewarded their labors. This mission has peculiar claims on us of Virginia for many reasons. It is conducted by a society worthy of our confidence—in a portion of our own American continent—among a people nominally Christian, but really

as heathen as any, and by men of our own State and Dioce the highest manly Christian character, well furnished for and to oughly consecrated to their work. Such a mission as this is, will be after the additions which are soon to be made to it, ca fail, in my judgment, to secure the favor and blessing of God. a foreign field I earnestly commend it as being especially desing of the sympathy and prayers and support of all our mini and people.

In my last address I mentioned the fact that the legislature ha corporated a board of trustees by the name and style of the "Bet Institute," "for the purpose of establishing and conducting an or asylum and hospital, and for educating women in the care of the and sick, the religious training of the young and others, and work of moral reformation." I am sorry to be obliged to say next to no interest has been manifested in this—as it seems to rof us—exceedingly important movement. I may not discuss the ject here, but wish I could persuade all who have money which realize that they hold as God's stewards, to study it and deter that it is an object which ought to be accomplished. Any cont tion for the Bethany Institute—from a house in which to star work down to the smallest sums of money—will be gladly received by the treasurer, Rosewell Page, Esq., Richmond.

Acting under Canon XIII—"of Colored Mission Churches" who were concerned were duly summoned to meet December 1890, in St. Stephen's Church, Petersburg, to organize "a contion," which the Canon requires "shall be held annually." A colored ministers of the Diocese-except one, who was prevented sickness—responded to the call, and a lay delegate was present every Colored Mission Church or congregation. It the journed, to meet about the same time next year, in Grace Ch Norfolk. As far as appeared, the best spirit animated all the bers, and I cannot but hope and believe that the Convocation

prove a great help towards advancing the interests of the Church among our colored brethren in Virginia.

The question which, no doubt, will engage more of your attention than any other is that of dividing the Diocese. I think it my duty to try to clearly explain my position on this subject, because I find that, in many quarters, it is misunderstood. A year ago, for reasons which were mentioned. I recommended that a committee be appointed to consider the question of dividing the Diocese of Virginia into two or three dioceses and to report to this Council. A committee of sixteen was appointed, of which I was made chairman. The committee met in Richmond January 13th, all the members being present, and unanimously adopted a report to be presented to the Council. But, before anything was done, I distinctly stated that, in my judgment, it was a mistake to put me on the committee; that I was present merely as chairman and to get all the information I could; that I would not feel bound by the action of the committee, or commit myself to anything until I heard all that might be said out of and in the Council. I think the committee understood that to be my position then, and that is my position now. I have not expressed myself as being either in favor of, or as opposed to, any particular line or lines of division, and do not consider myself bound to consent to any such, or, indeed, to any division whatever that may be agreed upon. I trust, therefore, that there may be a free and full discussion of the important subject in all its bearings, and that no one will be in the least degree influenced in his speech or action by what he may suppose to be my views and wishes.

May the love of the Father and the grace of the Son, our Saviour, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with us all now and ever.

The Assistant Bishop then read his annual address.

ASSISTANT BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

In beginning my address, I must express my sincere regret at my failure to meet twelve of my appointments during the months of March and May. With seven, the failure was due to impassable roads; with five, to indisposition, which confined me to my room. Before I begin a detailed statement of official duties in the Diocese I

will mention that I was appointed to attend the consecration of the Rt. Rev. Henry Melville Jackson, D. D., at Selma, Alabama, which took place on Wednesday, the 21st of January. I discharged that duty, and the memory of the occasion is very pleasant. The only regret was the parting with an able minister and a beloved brother from the Diocese of Virginia.

December 8th.—Consecrated St. Philip's colored church. Rev. T. W. Jones, Rector of St. John's Church, Bedford City, preached and assisted in the service.

April 7th.—Consecrated St. John's Church, Mount Airy, Pittsylvania county. Rev. C. O. Pruden, Rector, assisted in the services. This new church takes the place of an old building a few hundred yards distant, which has been kindly loaned to the Methodists for their services. In plan and construction it is one of the best buildings in the county parishes of the Diocese. It cost about three thousand dollars. The people themselves, with the exception of a few hundred dollars, raising the amount. I do not know of a church enterprise in the Diocese which tells more for fidelity and earnestness in the Rector and in the congregation.

April 23d I visited the new church building in process of erection at South Boston, Halifax county. When completed it will be a comely church, seating three hundred persons, and built at a cost of three thousand dollars. Our people in this growing town deserve our respect and commendation for their persevering efforts during three years to build this church. They have received little help from outside. The cause of the church has suffered for want of a building to worship in. I would advise those who have the means and the heart to do it to help these good people to complete their church at once.

Outside of official visitations I have administered the Holy Communion twelve times, the sacrament of baptism six times, and have ministered and preached in vacant churches, or in temporary absence of minister in charge, eighteen times, and at the invitation of rectors to assist them eleven times.

I have preached four times at special services by the invitation of Young Men's Christian Associations in different parts of the State. I would commend this work and the broad-minded and loving cooperation of our ministers and our people.

If the intelligent and conservative people of all the churches lend their influence and active help, the Young Men's Christian Association would become a means of blessing and unity to the Christian church.

On Sunday the 22d of June, at the evening service in the Seminary Chapel, I had the privilege of preaching the closing sermon to the High School. My contact with this school, especially upon such occasions, leaves with me a gratifying impression of its many excellences and especially of the religious reverence pervading it, and of the intelligent training in the services of the Episcopal Church which its pupils receive.

On the 24th of June I attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Seminary and High School; on the 25th a meeting of the Education Society; on the afternoon of the 25th the final exercises at the High School; on the 26th the reading of essays and the delivery of diplomas to the graduating class in the Chapel of the Seminary; on the 27th I assisted the Bishop of the Diocese in the services in the Seminary Chapel and ordained to the Priesthood Luther Wesley Doggett, John Thomas Foster, Robert Carter Jett, Stephen Osborne Southall, and Charles Edward Woodson.

On Saturday the 9th of August I was informed by telegram from Harrisonburg of the sudden death of the Rev. James W. Shields. Owing to irregularity of railroad communications I failed to reach Richmond in time for the funeral. Upon a visit a few weeks afterwards to see his family and to minister in his bereaved churches, I was deeply impressed with the love and the sorrow, not only of his own people, but of all classes and churches in the community. was a man of single and steady purpose, of high ideals of duty as a student and a preacher of the Gospel, and of self-forgetting enthusiasm in the work of the ministry. Bishop Wilmer, of Alabama, ministered to him in his last hours. Speaking to me about it, he said: "I would not have missed the lessons of his dying hours. I feel that the memory of his peace and strength, and the light upon his face as we communed together will help me when my time comes." If we ministers give to Christ our best-if we are faithful to our people, to ourselves, and to Him-we, too, as we look back from the end, will thank God that He has dedicated our lives to a service which must be the best preparation for the wider fields and the nobler activities and the everlasting glories of the life to come.

I attended a special meeting of the House of Bishops in New York October 22d and 23d. I was able to attend the meetings of the Commission on the colored work in the city of Washington—one held on the 5th of June and the other on the 7th and 8th of January.

During my visit to the churches in Brunswick, in the month of March, I gave a day to visiting the schools for colored children, male and female, under the care of the Rev. James Russell. I can commend this work without reserve to the confidence and the generous help of our people.

On the 30th of December I attended, at the request of the Bishop and in company with him, a meeting of colored clergy and laity in Petersburg to organize a convocation, as provided for in Canon XIIIth of the Canons of the Diocese.

On the 15th of January I attended a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Seminary and High School, called at the instance of the Committee on the High School improvements, appointed at the former meeting of the Board. The Southern Churchman has kindly informed the church and the public of the action of this meeting in the resolutions adopted for improvements in the High School buildings. As chairman of the two committees appointed at this meeting—



one a building committee and one for raising funds necessary for the improvements—I have had some work to do along with other members of the two committees in the effort to carry out the wishes of the Board. Plans of building have been adopted; the bid of a responsible contractor, among four others, has been accepted, and the work is begun. I trust that the Church in Virginia will respond to this call of duty to its own Diocesan School. I believe it will, if our ministers, without timidity and with loving loyalty to our Diocese, acquaint their people with its claims and co-operate with cordiality with the Rev. Mr. Castleman, our agent for collecting contributions for the work. The Church in Virginia governs her institutions well, but perhaps the time has come for her to rely less upon her friends in the North and elsewhere, and more upon herself to build and equip her institutions.

On the 13th of January I attended a meeting in the city of Richmond of the committee appointed at the last Council upon the question of the division of the Diocese, raised by an expression of an opinion from the Bishop in his address that the time had come for the consideration of that question. After prolonged consideration and discussion, when the advocates—representing all parts of the Diocese—of various schemes and plans of division had the opportunity of expressing their views and wishes, a report was agreed upon with practical unanimity. That report was printed, and has been in possession of the Church for some months past. It has called forth criticisms from various quarters, and it is well, perhaps, that it is so. It has also suggested articles in our Southern Churchman, proposing schemes and geographical lines, some of which have been discussed in the committee and some entirely original, and exhibit geographical ingenuity. As the question is one upon which my opinions, from my position and my opportunities of forming intelligent judgment may be of some value, and also one of more personal interest to me than it can be to any one of you, and as this is by custom a Bishop's opportunity for expressing his views upon questions of general and Diocesan policy, I may detain you with a brief review of the question as it comes before you. A Bishop is married to his Diocese. It is a tie that death alone can part. You, dear brethren of the clergy and laity, are under no such bonds. In this wide country—in this great Church with it fifty

Dioceses-calls of duty or desire for change may take you to other fields of work, and your people may part with you to-morrow to see your faces no more as their pastor and fellow-worker in the kingdom of God. And your Bishops go in and out of your old homes and churches long after you have taken root in other lands and gathered new interests around you in far-off communities. You see what a living, lasting tie it is. Again, the question of division in a Diocese has an element of finality in its decision which belongs to no other question which presents itself in the government of the Church. Canons and constitutions are in perpetual process of renovation and change. The line you make to separate a portion of your territory from the Mother Diocese each year assumes something of the permanency of the mountain chains and rivers that abide as the generations pass away. The new Diocese may want to come back again, and there is a constitutional way of coming back, but it is a hard way. I know of three Dioceses who long ago must have realized the mistake of their separation, but I have heard of no organized effort in them to come back. Like young manhood, with high hopes emigrating from an old State to a new land, they may fail and struggle and almost starve, but anything is better than acknowledging failure—than coming back to the old home and knocking at the door with, "Let me in-I was wrong to go away." The work we do in dividing a Diocese is a permanent work, and this consideration must lift the question above influences and feelings and circumstances that are in their nature conditional and transient. The delicate health, the age and infirmity of your Bishops, may be classed among circumstances that are conditional and temporary. In the Diocese of Maryland, after the Diocese of Easton was cut off, but before the demand for small Dioceses, originating with the High Church party, had subsided and faith in the system broken by stern experience. the then Bishop of Maryland, old and infirm, made repeated efforts to set apart the city of Washington, and parts of Maryland adjacent, into an independent Diocese. The effort was steadily resisted by the Convention of Maryland. To-day, perhaps, not a single clergyman or layman in that powerful Diocese would move for such a proposition. Not one, perhaps, but would admit that its success, when proposed by Bishop Whittingham, would have been a disaster to the interests of the Episcopal Church in Washington and throughout the Diocese



of Maryland, and this in the face of the fact that Washington has more than twice the population and many more churches than it had then.

Nor, again, is the sudden growth of population and a tide of material development in a State, or a portion of its territory, a sound basis for the erection of independent Dioceses. The Southern portion of California, with Los Angelos for its central city, presented to the last General Convention a petition to be set apart as a Diocese. The petition was supported by the recommendation of the Convention of California, by the fact that the Bishop was almost wholly incapacitated for duty by blindness and the infirmities of age. statistics of phenominal material development and increase of population throughout that portion of the State, and lastly by pledges of \$6,000 income for the support of the new Diocese. By the time the petition reached the General Convention, the wave of material prosperity had subsided, values depreciated, and the alleged \$6,000 of income contracted to a doubtful and contingent \$4,000; and the petition was rejected by the House of Bishops, only a few votes sustaining it against an overwhelming majority, upon the ground of inadequate guarantee for the support of the Episcopate and for Diocesan expenses. We are glad to believe that the tide of material prosperity in portions of Virginia is not transient or fictitious, but steady and permanent; but these are, with few exceptions, portions of the State where the Episcopal Church is weak and struggling; where the means for its support and development are drawn largely from the older portions of the Diocese; where the incoming populations belong to other communions, and where the people absorb all they make, like children in rapid physical development, and give little and have little to give; where even the few strong churches, if any can be called strong, are struggling to get themselves built up, and the weak ones are crying for help. To cut off such communities from the sympathy and the support of the great body of strength in a Diocese, seems to be unwise. It is bad ecclesiastical statesmanship.

There seems to be an impression, not very clearly defined, in the minds of many of our earnest and intelligent clergy and laity that the smallness of a Diocese is, per se, a condition of exceptional growth and vitality. Why should it be so? Experience in the American Church seems to be against it. The majority of the smaller Dioceses

have remained small since their organization. They have grown less in proportion than the large Dioceses. They are struggling to exist to-day after an experiment of ten or fifteen years. The Diocese of Virginia, the battle-ground of the great war, has grown in the last twenty-five years with exceptional rapidity. The Diocese of Maryland, under the administration of a single Bishop, and with some adverse elements to contend with which have not existed here, has grown stronger each year for a quarter of a century past. True some small Dioceses have prospered—one near to us constitutes an example—but no one doubts that with its earnest clergy and its blessed Bishop it would have grown more rapidly had it been larger and with larger resources. The balance of experience is clearly against the proposition that smallness in a Diocese is a condition of exceptional vitality.

Does the impression rest upon reasonable grounds? Is it in accord with the practical beliefs and public sentiment of the age in which we live, in other churches and in other departments of life? The Methodists are widening the boundaries of their Conferences, the Presbyterians of their Presbyteries.

In the great movements for internal improvements which are making our wildernesses to blossom and our mountains to give up their coal and iron for the uses of man, combination, not disintegration, association, not isolation, constitute the law and the principle of growth. So in churches. The larger your religious community, within the demands and the possibilities of your form of church government, the more of weight and of warmth, of energy and of hope for great enterprises, and the wider the material resources for educating the ignorant, for building up the old waste places and opening new fields for the missionary activities of your Church. These seem to me not only to be intelligible, but obvious propositions, and in view of them there has been no doubt upon my mind since the subject has engaged my earnest attention that the cutting off of a weak portion of the Diocese to be erected into an independent Diocese, or a division of the State into three Dioceses, would be disastrous to the Church in Virginia; to her energy and power for work; to the strength which comes from the associations and the dignity of her history, and to her position in the general Church, where I trust she may stand for generations to come as one of the great bulwarks of Protestantism in our American Christianity.



Beside all this there is the ultimate fact, standing at the threshold of the consideration of the proposition for such division, that there is less need for it, so far as Episcopal visitations are involved, than at any previous period of her history.

For the most part the churches in Virginia are visited by your Bishops every year.

In regard to my brother, your Bishop, I have yet to hear that he has ever spared himself from spending and being spent in these ministrations to your churches. For myself, I am sure you will be willing to testify that my effort has been at least a sincere one to discharge these duties up to the measure of my ability.

If you desire your Bishops to be missionaries, you are adding to their office functions which neutralize and weaken those with which they are clothed at their consecration.

They are overseers, guides, rulers under law, administrators of government for missionaries and for ministers. And they are the chief pastors to all of the congregations. You have your missionaries; you have your evangelists; and you have enough for your Bishops to do in the discharge of their legitimate and necessary duties. This brings me to the last point in this discussion. If, in the Providence of God, the responsibility is placed upon us to carve a Diocese out of our territory, and to define its boundaries, surely the criterion of measurement is the capacity of one Bishop to discharge all Episcopal duties in that Diocese.

I cannot agree with my honored brother, the Bishop, that the Episcopal duties needed in Virginia are beyond the capacity of two Bishops to perform. I believe that two Bishops, in physical health—and this must be the assumption in the estimate of capacity as a basis of legislation—may discharge to the full all Episcopal duties in the Diocese of Virginia. In Maryland one Bishop with more than two hundred churches, with a larger number of church institutions than our own and with almost as large a body of clergy, performs every duty of the Episcopate.

I do agree with the Bishop in the opinion that the time has come for the division of Virginia into two Dioceses—a division as near to equality as may be practicable, in resources, territory, and strength in communicants and churches. It may be asked: How does that solve the problem which confronts us? What relief does it afford for an over-worked Diocesan? The answer is that it gives the State

of Virginia two full Bishops instead of one. In explaining that proposition I must speak with the utmost candor, and I must ask you to remove your minds above the region of all personal associations. The question is too important to suppress the truth that bears upon any of its relations, and manly and intelligent men may discuss principles upon a plane above the imputation, from even common minds. of personal considerations. An assistant Bishop is an anomaly in the history and the laws governing the Episcopate throughout its long career as an institution in the Christian Church. He has responsibilities without powers. He is clothed by his consecration with the functions of rule and of discipline. After his consecration, as he enters upon the discharge of his duties, he comes under the authority of the canonical law of the general Church and of his own Diocese. In order to adapt his position to the rights and responsibilities which belong to the Bishop alone, the canonical law takes away these functions of discipline and government with which his consecration has The anomaly of his position, then, is illustrated in this clothed him. conflict between the constitutional law which confers upon him the rights and responsibilities of discipline, and the canonical law which takes these rights and responsibilities away. The Church, in her legislation, to meet the lessons of experience which have taught her governmental principles, which she failed to see at first, has recognized this anomaly, and has in her general law eliminated from the petition of a Diocese every ground of the claim of an assistant Bishop, save that of permanent physical disability in the Diocesan. In so doing she points to the division of the Diocese as the normal and the only legal remedy for extent of territory beyond the capacity of a Bishop to work, or multiplication of duties beyond his capacity to fill. Here, then, is the answer to the question. Relieve your Bishop from the duties of administration, from the solicitudes and perplexities of discipline, and from the care of one-half of the churches, the clergy and the laity of his Diocese-you remove from him a pressure of responsibility and duty which he feels to be his greatest burden, and which you, if you think intelligently, ought, in some measure, to appreciate.

As to the question of the increased efficiency and the wider activity on the part of an assistant Bishop who takes his place and does his work as the responsible head of a Diocese, I suppose there is no doubt upon the mind of any member of this intelligent body.

Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

As to the lines of division into two Dioceses that have been or may be proposed, I have no advice to give. As a member of the committee on the division, I voted for the line drawn in their report as a proposition to be presented to this Council. That line creates a Diocese in the eastern part of the State with three cities, the Church strong in each one and the parishes in the country easily accessible by railroads. A Diocese easy to work, coherent, growing, and destined for wider growth in the future, but never beyond the capacity of the Bishop to discharge its duties. The other Diocese would be weaker in numbers and resources, but wider in territory, and destined, perhaps, in the future to grow up to the necessity of another division. Another natural line of division would be the great river that divides the State into two almost equal parts. That division would also create two strong Dioceses, either one of which would furnish a noble field for the best activities, and the thankful, lifelong devotion of either one of your Bishops.

Every morning when the Council is opened we pray to the Lord Jesus Christ, who has promised to be with his Church to the end of the world, to save us from all error, ignorance, pride, and prejudice. In the discharge of your responsibilities as legislators in the Church, upon this most important question, surely you need to pray that prayer with fervor and humility to-day.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF THE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY AND HIGH SCHOOL.

The Trustees of the Theological Seminary and High School beg leave to report that during the current session there have been in the

Through the liberality of Mrs. Powers, of Philadelphia, obtained by the kindly interest of Professor Crawford, St. George's Hall has been enlarged and improved.

The work on the water supply is also nearly completed. Each building is provided with water and other arrangements made for the comfort and health of the students.

It is earnestly hoped that some kind friend or friends will, either by the increase of our endowment fund or by special gift, enable us to heat the buildings by steam or otherwise.

The High School still enjoys its wonted prosperity. The contracts for the enlargement and improvements of the building have been made and the work begun.

The Trustees would also suggest that the Council, by resolution, recommend an annual collection in all the churches of the Diocese for the increase

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF THE ENGLISH BIBLE.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of the English Bible reports that during the past session he has pursued his usual course of study with the Senior and Middle Classes.

The Senior Class has read over carefully the more difficult books of the Old Testament, studying Ecclesiastes, the Minor Prophets, and the books of Daniel and of Ezekiel.

The Middle Class has studied the Psalms, with constant comparison with the Prayer Book and the Revised Versions, and with reference to the original, the Septuagint, and the Vulgate. Both classes have paid special attention to the authorship and age of the books studied.

He feels an increasing conviction of the importance of the study of the English Bible, and of the need of more time being allowed for it in the course.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully submits the following report of the studies pursued in his classes during the current session:

The Junior Class, for part of the session reciting once a week, have studied Chadbourne's Natural Theology, and are now reviewing it.

The Middle Class, reciting five times a week, have studied Butler's Analogy, and Knapp's Theology. The former they have finished, and they are in review of the latter. To these have been added a weekly recitation in Oehler's Old Testament Theology, and essays on Systematic Divinity.

The Senior Class, with three recitations per week, and the Wednesday evening exercise, have studied the Articles with Boultbie, and are now closing the review. They have also in Natural Theology studied Hopkins' Outline Man, and Homiletics in Dr. Broadus' book, with exercises.

I have also given to this class a course of lectures on Christian Ethics, as also one on Lithurgics, in connection with the Prayer Book.

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF THE GREEK LANGUAGE, &C.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Greek Language, New Testament Literature, Church Polity and Pastoral Theology respectfully submits the following report:

The Senior Class has read in Greek, in connection with Ellicott's Series of Commentaries, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, the Catholic and Pastoral Epistles. They have also read twenty chapters in St. Luke's Gospel, with exegetical essays on the first six. In Polity they have studied, with lectures in class, the third, seventh, and part of the fifth books of Hooker, also Butler's Protestant Episcopal Doctrine and Church Unity. They have also studied Schaff's Companion to the Greek Testament. They are now studying Meade on the Pastoral Office, with references to Bedell and other text-books.

The Middle Class has read in Greek, with the same series of Commentaries and Beet on Romans, I and II Corinthians, Romans, and Galatians. They are now reading Hebrews.

The Junior Class has read, with the same series of Commentaries in Greek, St. John and also St. Matthew, with parallel references to the other synoptic Gospels. They are now beginning I Thessalonians.

In accordance with the request of the Trustees he attends the recitations of the Preparatory Classes at least once a month, and finds them taught faithfully and progressing favorably.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF HEBREW, ORIENTAL LANGUAGES AND APOLOGETICS.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Senior class has read critically in Hebrew selected portions of the books of Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Hosea, Jonah, Nahum, Micah, Isaiah, Jeremiah, studying carefully at the same time the periods and events of their prophetic ministries. The study of Hebrew Syntax continued, and special attention given to the development of Messianic prophecy.

The Middle Class has read fifteen Psalms critically, also selected portions of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, and Job, in connection with introduction to the same, special attention being given to the principles of Hebrew Poetry and their application. It has also studied Harper's Syntax.

The Juniors have read in Hebrew the larger part of Genesis, and large portions of the other Historical Books, studying the elements of Hebrew Grammar and Accentuation. The elements of Hebrew Syntax are also studied. The aim is to familiarize them with the entire range of Historical

Theological Seminary.

Hebrew, and for the final examination they are required to read it at sight. The Higher Criticism is carefully discussed in addition to the usual instruction in Apologetics supplemented by lectures.

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY AND CANON LAW.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Ecclesiastical History and Canon Law respectfully submits the following report:

The Senior Class has studied Perry's History of the Church of England, and are now studying the Constitution and Canons of the Church. The course has been supplemented by lectures.

The Middle Class has studied Smith's Student's Ecclesiastical History, and are studying at present Fisher's History of the Christian Church. Essays have been read on assigned topics.

The Junior Class has studied Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and are reading the Acts of the Apostles in Greek, as a text-book of early Church History. Essays have been read by this class also.

The following books have been required as private parallel-reading: of the Seniors, Tulloch's Religious Thought in Britain During the Nineteenth Century, and Ryle's Christian Leaders of the Last Century; of the Middle Class, Trench's Mediæval Church History; of the Junior Class, the Apocrypha.

ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT TO TRUSTEES (1891).

Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D.,

President of the Board of Trustees:

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR: As Principal of the Episcopal High School, I have the honor to submit the following report:

The whole number of boys entered this session is ninety-seven, the maximum attendance having been ninety-one.

It is my painful duty to make formal report of the death of my beloved friend and co-laborer, Colonel Llewellen Hoxton, who expired here suddenly in his seat at the breakfast-table February 12th. For more than twenty years in fact—as, since 1886, in name also—Associate Principal and Mathematical master, he exemplified to a degree I have not known equalled the highest qualities of the Christian teacher. As such, and as a man admirable in every relation of life, the loss to the School of his influence

and example is irreparable. The serious embarrassment incident to such a gap in our teaching force, occurring in the middle of the session was, with slight delay, satisfactorily met. * * * In this difficult undertaking I acknowledge gratefully the help of my faithful assistants, Messrs. Kern, Pendleton and Wood, without whose valuable co-operation its successful accomplishment would have been impossible. I have been fortunate enough to secure as Colonel Hoxton's successor, Dr. Charles L. C. Minor, M. A., of Baltimore, a native of this State, and a gentleman pre-eminently qualified for the position.

In respect to the instruction afforded, the religious and other advantages offered, and good influences brought to bear, there is nothing to add to what has been so often before reported. The Friday night devotional meeting has remained under the efficient charge of Mr. William Cabell Brown, who, after ten years' connection more or less, intimate with the School, is about to take orders and go to the foreign missionary field. The Rev. Prof. Nelson, of the Theological Seminary, has continued his valued labors as chaplain to the boys, with repeated services in the School chapel, especially during Lent. To both my warmest thanks are due and are here recorded.

The health of the School has been singularly good, and the general conduct of the boys singularly satisfactory. Neither was ever better in my time here. The number of boys confirmed during the session was eleven, the present number of communicants being thirty-seven.

The order of the day—the report of the Committee on Division of the Diocese—was then taken up by the Council. The report was read as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DIVISION OF DIOCESE.

The Committee appointed at the last Council to consider the question of the division of the Diocese, raised by the recommendation of the Bishop in his address, to the effect that the time had arrived in his opinion for the consideration of said question, beg leave to offer the following report:

The interest in the question committed to them and the sense of the responsibility imposed upon them are manifested in the fact of the presence of every member of the committee, representing all parts of the Diocese.

The proposition for a division of the Diocese first presented for the consideration of the committee met with its approval. The proposition for the division of the Diocese into three Dioceses occupied the attention of the committee for several hours. The conclusion was reached that such a division at this time is unwise, inexpedient, and impracticable.

Resolution, &c.-Discussion of Resolution Postponed.

- (1) The Committee, with unanimity, recommends a division of the Diocese into two Dioceses, with resources, communicants, and territory as near to equality as practicable, in consideration of present circumstances and in view of the future.
- (2) It is agreed to recommend that the following counties shall compose the Diocese of Virginia: King George, Caroline, Hanover, Goochland, Powhatan, Amelia, Nottoway, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Westmoreland, Essex, King and Queen, New Kent, King William, Henrico, Chesterfield, Dinwiddie, Brunswick, Richmond, Northumberland, Lancaster, Middlesex, Gloucester, Mathews, Charles City, Prince George, Sussex, Greensville, York, James City, Warwick, Elizabeth City, Surry, Southampton, Isle of Wight, Nansemond, Norfolk, Princess Anne, Northampton, Accomac. The remainder of the State to constitute another Diocese.

The above division would assign to the Diocese of Virginia 10,165 communicants, whose contribution to the Contingent Fund, by the report of the last Diocesan Council, amounted to \$6,018, and to the proposed new Diocese 8,224 communicants, contributing to the Contingent Fund \$5,000.

- (3) It is recommended that all vested funds of the Diocese of Virginia be divided in the ratio of communicants between the two proposed Dioceses, so far as such division may be found to be practicable and free from legal difficulties. It is also recommended that the property in the Episcopal residence in the city of Richmond be vested in the proposed Diocese of Virginia.
- (4) We further recommend that the Virginia Female Institute shall remain the property of and under the control and management of the two Dioceses, on such terms and conditions as may hereafter be determined.

The pending order, being the discussion of the resolution on division, was postponed by general consent for fifteen minutes.



Report on the Woman's Auxiliary-Resolution, &c.

Rev. L. W. Burton presented a report on the Woman's Auxiliary, which was ordered to be entered upon the Journal.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Report of Contributions of the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions from May, 1890 to May, 1891:

Total contributions in money and boxes, \$4,331. Of this amount \$660.50 were contributed for Diocesan Missions; \$414.40 for Domestic Missions outside of the Diocese, and \$800 for Foreign Missions.

The value of the boxes was \$1,672, almost all of which were sent to clergymen in our own diocese, while several were sent to Indian Missions in South Dakota and Minnesota. one to Brazil and one to Africa.

The Foreign Missions that received contributions from the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary were Brazil, China, Japan, Mexico, Cuba and Jaffa.

This is the report of the work done for the past year by the Woman's Auxiliary in seventeen parishes, in many of which the Auxiliary has not been established longer than six months, and from some of the parishes where the Auxiliary is organized we failed to receive any report.

Taking all this into consideration, we feel cause to be much encouraged by the report of this our first year of united diocesan work, and feel that we may confidently look forward to the formation of many new parochial branches during the coming year, and to a large increase in the amount of contributions that we will have to report at our next annual meeting.

For the success of our Diocesan Branch, we feel that we are largely indebted to the kind endorsement and hearty approval of our beloved Bishop.

Rev. L. W. Burton presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee joyfully heard the announcement in the address of our beloved Diocesan that his health has been in large measure restored. They feel sure that all who heard the record of arduous episcopal work, so faithfully performed during the past year by both the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop, must have thanked the Divine Head of the Church that he has blessed this Diocese with such oversight.

Your Committee have made the examination into the state of the Church with which they are charged. We find, indeed, no striking change in any direction; but that condition is consistent with the fact that our Diocese is moving through the zenith of her prosperity.

The most startling difference between this year's summary by the Committee on Parochial Reports and last year's lies in the falling off in baptisms. According to these summaries, of white infants 309 less, and of white adults 182 less were baptized this year than last; 223 persons less have been confirmed. But judging from these same summaries, the communicants have increased from 16,155 whites and 831 colored, by 1,208 whites and 458 colored, to 17,363 whites and 1,289 colored—a total increase of 1,666 white and colored. There has been a falling off in Indian com-

Report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

municants from 49 to 45. The aggregate number of communicants thus reported to be now in the Diocese is 18,697. The Sunday-schools have also enjoyed an increase in number, both of teachers and scholars.

The Committee on Parochial Reports for 1890 called attention to an increase in total contributions over the preceding year of \$70,035.27. This year the same committee report an increase of \$31,734.71, the total amount being \$309,368.62. The children of the Diocese are to be especially applauded for an increase of about \$1,000 in the Lenten Offering for 1891; and by their gift of \$4,305.97 the contributions of the Diocese to Diocesan Missions this year have attained the highest point ever yet reached—\$13,884.

But your Committee are impressed with the fact that, after allowing for all regular losses, the whole number of communicants does not increase from year to year in proportion to the number annually confirmed. They account for it in two ways. There is reason to fear that there is often an entire neglect of special preparation, both privately and in confirmation classes: and that many candidates are presented who have by no means learned all those "things which a Christian" in the Protestant Episcopal Church "ought to know and believe to his soul's health." Then, again, it is too frequently forgotten that, when confirmed, these young communicants are still "babes in Christ," needing particular watchfulness and nourishing care. second reason for a loss of communicants lies in their utter indifference to the rule about transfers when they remove from one part of the Diocese to another. Of course transfers cannot be forced upon persons removing; and often they ask that their names may be retained on the register of the church of their childhood. But a pastor can informally notify the rector into whose jurisdiction any of his people may move their residence; and this should be done as well when communicants move beyond the borders of our Diocese.

There seems to be a general healthy increase in church attendance; but it is in spite of the fact that very many do not come to church who should and who used to do so. And so widely is the persuasion spreading that attendance at one divine service a week is sufficient, that our night congregations are largely different in their personnel from those that assemble in the morning. The late hours of Saturday night into which business projects itself, and the fatiguing, harassing pressure of the whole week's affairs have made the weary and the heavy laden indeed welcome the rest of the Sabbath, but have utterly unfitted them to appreciate the Lord's day as one for devout worship.

The Sunday newspaper is a secularizing influence more potent than the thoughtless can even imagine. Published under the specious plea that it permits the few individuals connected with the paper to enjoy Sunday, it lets loose on that holy day upon the community, and impels with the most rapid power of steam throughout the country-side, a flood of exciting, engrossing worldliness. No one, more than do your Committee, can value the friendly interest and helpfulness of the press in all religious enterprises and

Church institutions. And your Committee recognize that the Sunday paper is furnished to satisfy a voracious public demand, as well as published because it is a profitable business undertaking. We, therefore, do not propose any attack upon publishers or appeals to editors. But we pray this Council, as "elders of Israel," and our Church people throughout the Diocese, as a large factor in public opinion, to build about their households a dyke which will guard them against the intrusion on the Lord's day of the news and gossip and often, alas! the scandal of the world. Your committee suggest as a simple compromise, which experiment has proved to be perfectly practicable and very efficacious, that each subscriber arrange to have the Sunday paper not arrive at his house until Monday morning. In the cities this arrangement can be privately made with the newspaper carrier without involving additional cost.

To make the Sunday services more bright and attractive is possible, without either transgression of the rubrics or a descent into sensationalism; and surely no effort deserves more thought and energy from the ministry than one looking to this end. It is believed that many strangers, now roaming from church to church, might be drawn to settle down in ours, if a leaflet containing the service for that day in consecutive shape were put into their hands by cordially polite ushers, and if the sermon, while true to the Divine commission we have received, were brief, simple, interesting, helpful, pointed, and not delivered by a preacher fagged out by a Sunday of too many ministrations. A member of your Committee has largely increased the number of children at church by securing from each Sunday-school class, upon an appropriate blank, a weekly report of attendance on the services of the preceding Sunday.

Your Committee sadly recognize that the sixty-three vacant churches of the Diocese are a prominent feature in the state of the Church. But they think it a depressing mistake to suppose that this condition of things is peculiar to Virginia; and they find compensating encouragement in the healthy growth of Church work, both in the newly-developed parts of the State and in the cities. Nevertheless, the vacant churches present a pressing problem. Your Committee does not think that its solution can be easily found in legislation. The practical factors in the solution of this problem are to be found in a steady increase in contributions to Diocesan Missions, and in the disposition of our clergy and congregations to embrace within their fostering care the vacant Parishes which may lie adjacent or in the immediate neighborhood.

Yet it is not so much money as it is men that are wanted. Here again the lack is far from being peculiar to Virginia. Indeed, the reputation of our Seminary as a seat of sound, thorough theological learning, and, now even more than ever before, as a centre of positive spiritual influence, and the well-known character of our clergy as intelligent, conservative, pious and godly, consecrated to Christ both as industrious pastors and practical

preachers, make Virginia a source of supply to other dioceses. Still, it should be a subject of earnest inquiry, among the city clergy especially, why from their congregations so few men are offering themselves for the ministry.

In this connection we note with pleasure the increase of intelligent, organized and energetic work among young men, as largely calculated to inspire some of them to devote their whole being to the blessed mission of spreading Christ's Gospel.

Germane to this subject is that of the Sunday-school. Social reformers and philanthropists have been forced by long and painful experience to a conclusion which the Church has always been taught by the Word of God. The Church's system could not be more perfectly adapted in theory to this truth. But has there not been a general failure on our part to rise to the practical recognition of the great fact, that the prosperity of the Church and the existence of the Nation depend upon the bias toward religion. thorough instruction in its principles and practice in its rules which are given the young? Now, wherein our special diocesan deficiency in Sundayschool work has lain has been in acquaintance with the best modern methods and means. Looking to improvement in this direction, we welcome the Sunday-school Institute as a practical source of information and instrument of training. Improved methods of instruction by no means necessarily involve novelty in the facts and truths taught. But there is danger that they may accompany each other. Your Committee cannot too strongly urge the moral and canonical responsibility of the Rector for the character of the teaching given the children under his charge. The clergy need help. The Sunday-school workers in vacant churches need still more to have advice as to the best systems of Sunday-school instruction. In calling attention to the recommendation in the Bishop's Address concerning Sunday-school libraries, your Committee would also respectfully urge that the Council by the proper committee push its investigation further into the subject of Sunday-school instruction in its two branches of Bible and Church teaching.

While your Committee thus feel that our Diocese should learn about the Sunday-school all that experts in that line from any quarter can teach us. we also hail with pleasure the fact that Virginia has finally, under the able and loyal generalship of her Bishops, wheeled into line with the rest of the Church in the organization of a diocesan and of parochial branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. There is danger lest, in our utter lack of sympathy with uncongenial views and customs that largely prevail beyond our bounds, we should lose our proper interest and fail to do our part in much of the work and in many of the institutions of the general Church. In a policy of isolation is little increase in either knowledge or zeal; and thereby also is wasted that powerful influence which God expects such a Diocese as ours to wield for his truth and glory. Your Committee would earnestly

emphasize the recommendation of the Bishop, that not only a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary be established in every Parish, but also that in every town where there are two or more churches there be between them some union for missionary study, contributions and work, analogous to that exemplified in the Richmond Protestant Episcopal Missionary Society. Not the least among the valuable results of such a combination would be the counteraction of that individualism and congregationalism which are peculiar evil tendencies of our day.

In conclusion, your Committee would take advantage of the Council's opportunely meeting in Whitsuntide, to suggest that we cannot be faithful in our allegiance to Christ crucified, unless, like him and his apostles, we make much of the Holy Spirit of all truth and grace. Let our effort be more and more to present that Blessed Person as the one by whom all the great fundamental saving doctrines of the Gospel are to be applied to the individual, and in the heart and life of the several members of Christ's Church to be transmuted into practical uprightness and holiness.

Resolved, That so much of the report on the State of the Church as applies to the vacant Parishes be referred to a special committee of five, who shall take the whole matter into consideration and devise a scheme which shall meet the needs of said Parishes, and report to the next Council.

The motion was carried, and the following committee appointed:

Rev. E. L. Goodwin moved that the report of the Committee on the State of the Church be read to the congregations of the Diocese. Adopted. Report of the Committee on New Parishes.

Rev. R. A. Goodwin presented the report of the Committee on New Parishes:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on New Parishes would respectfully report that two applications have been referred to them, to-wit; one for the erection of a new Parish from a part of Montgomery Parish, Montgomery county, and a part of Pulaski county; and one from St. Andrew's Mission Church, Henrico Parish, to become a separate congregation, with the right of representation in the Council of the Diocese.

As to the first-named application, we believe that all the requirements of the Canon "Of the Division of Parishes" have been complied with, so far as possible. The provisions have certainly been carried out so far as that part of the proposed new Parish now embraced in Montgomery Parish, Montgomery county, is concerned. As to the part of the proposed new Parish which is embraced in Pulaski county, we are of the opinion that it is impossible to comply with that provision of the above-named Canon, which requires notice to be given to the Vestry, for the reason that the territory referred to is not embraced in any organized Parish, and has not been, so far as we can find, since the re-organization of the Diocese of Virginia in 1785 A. D.

We are of opinion that the interests of the Church in Montgomery Parish demand a division of said Parish. We unanimously recommend that this Council constitute that part of Montgomery Parish and that part of Pulaski county embraced within the lines hereinafter named a new Parish, to be known as Radford Parish.

Metes and bounds of Radford Parish: Beginning at Morgan's Cut on the Norfolk and Western Railroad in Pulaski county; thence due north to the Giles county line; thence with said county line to New River; thence up New River to the mouth of Wall's Creek; thence in a straight line to Chisman's Mill on the Norfolk and Western Railroad in Montgomery county; thence to Bean's Shop on the old Christiansburg turnpike; thence to a point on Little River opposite the village of Snowville; thence down Little River to New River; thence up New River to a point due south from Morgan's Cut; thence due north to the beginning.

As to the petition of St. Andrew's Mission Church, Henrico Parish, to become a separate congregation, with the right of representation in the Council of the Diocese, we are constrained reluctantly to recommend that it be not granted, as, in our opinion, the conditions of the Canons governing such cases have not been complied with.

Proposed Amendment to Canon XI-Memorial.

Mr. Joseph Bryan presented the report of the Special Committee on the Brotherhood, which was received and made the order of the day after existing orders were disposed of.

Mr. Joseph Bryan presented the report from the Committee on Canon XIX.

The report was received and ordered to be taken up after existing orders have been disposed of.

Rev. Dr. Powers gave notice of the following proposed amendment to Canon XI, to be considered to-morrow:

When any number of persons belonging to any congregation, sufficient to organize a new congregation, shall choose to separate from the congregation of which they have hitherto been a part, they shall proceed according to the directions given in Canon X, except that in this case the directions as to a line or lines of division are inapplicable. They shall also, in their petition to the Council, show their ability and declare their intention to provide a house of worship and to furnish a reasonable support to a minister; and the Council may, on such petition, constitute the applicants a separate congregation, and authorize, by special enactment, such peculiar provisions as to the right of suffrage, the employment of a minister or ministers, and the manner of holding and managing the property of such congregation, as they may propose and the Council deem expedient: Provided, that the time of electing and the manner of qualifying vestrymen shall always be conformed to the regulations prescribed in Canon VIII: Provided, also, that no such independent congregation shall be established within the bounds of any Parish without the consent of the Ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese.

PIKE POWERS, Chairman.

The Council resumed the consideration of the division of the Diocese.

Mr. R. E. Withers presented the following memorial, which, upon motion of Mr. J. T. Harris, was received and laid upon the table:

MEMORIAL.

The undersigned petitioners respectfully ask of the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia that there be set apart

and erected into a separate and independent Diocese, on the terms hereinafter stated, the following counties—to wit.: Highland, Augusta, Nelson, Amherst, Campbell, Pittsylvania, Henry, Franklin, Bedford, Rockbridge, Bath, Alleghany, Botetourt, Craig, Roanoke, Floyd, Patrick, Carroll, Montgomery, Giles, Bland, Pulaski, Wythe, Grayson, Smyth, Tazewell, Buchanan, Dickenson, Washington, Russell, Wise, Scott, and Lee; that the Diocese of Virginia will aid the new Diocese, so to be set apart and erected, in bearing the annual expense of such new Diocese, by paying to the new Diocese the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) annually for a period of five years, or by paying over to the new Diocese one-half of the present "Episcopal Fund," as may be deemed most expedient; that proper representation be granted such new Diocese in the present Diocesan Institutions, and that such proportion of the invested funds of the present Diocese (except the Episcopal Fund) be set apart to the new Diocese as the number of communicants of the new Diocese bears to the whole number of communicants reported to the present Council.

In the territory thus proposed to be set apart there are thirty-three counties, twenty-four clergymen, ten self supporting Parishes, and three thousand three hundred and seventy-three communicants. In the Council year of 1889-'90 we received from the Diocesan Missionary Society \$1,400. We paid into the Diocesan Missionary Society \$2,293, and aided the Society through the Southwest Convocation by the payment of \$500.

We feel assured that we can raise for Diocesan support now \$3,300, and also furnish a suitable house and lot for the residence of the Bishop. These, with the \$1,000 per annum asked of the Council, we believe will furnish adequate Episcopal support. We believe that at the end of five years we will be fully self-supporting.

Rev. Dr. Hanckel, for the Committee, presented as its second recommendation the following:

Resolved, That for the present it is inexpedient to divide the Diocese of Virginia into more than two Dioceses.

Rev. W. T. Roberts moved as a substitute the following:

Resolved, That it is expedient to divide the Diocese into three Dioceses.

The substitute was lost.

The original resolution of the Committee was adopted.

RECOMMENDATION OF COMMITTEE ON LINE OF DIVISION.

Rev. D. Hanckel presented as the third recommendation of the Committee the following:

Resolved, That in forming a new Diocese within the limits of the existing Diocese, the line of Division be as follows: Starting at the Potomac River at and with the boundary of Stafford and King George counties, follow that line along the boundaries of the following named counties: Spotsylvania and Caroline, Louisa and Hanover to Goochland county; then the boundary between Goochland and Louisa, Goochland and Fluvanna, and Goochland and Cumberland; then the boundary between Cumberland and Powhatan, and Cumberland and Amelia; then between Prince Edward and Amelia, Prince Edward and Nottoway, and Prince Edward and Lunenburg; then between Charlotte and Lunenburg, Charlotte and Mecklenburg; then between Halifax and Mecklenburg to the North Carolina line; and that all of the existing Diocese of Virginia west of said line be the new Diocese, and all east of said line remain the Diocese of Virginia.

On motion it was

Resolved, That when the Council adjourn at two o'clock it adjourn to meet at 4 P. M.

Rev. J. B. Newton offered as an amendment the recommendation that the division be made by the line of James river:

Resolved, That the present Diocese of Virginia be divided by a line beginning at a point midway between Capes Henry and Charles and extending west through Hampton Roads and up James River to the point at which James River ceases to be a county line—i. e., where it crosses the Rock-

bridge county line; thence by the southwest lines of the counties of Rockbridge and Alleghany counties to the West Virginia line.

The amendment was laid upon the table temporarily.

Mr. R. E. Withers moved to strike out from the Committee's resolution the names of the counties proposed to be erected into a new Diocese, and to substitute therefor the names of counties enumerated in the memorial presented by him.

Pending discussion, the hour of two o'clock arrived and the Council took recess until 4 P. M.

FRIDAY, 4 P. M.

The Council re-assembled, and resumed consideration of the subject of division, the Assistant Bishop in the chair.

Mr. R. E. Withers withdrew his amendment for the present.

Rev. Dr. Sprigg moved as a substitute for the Committee's proposal that there be retained within the old Diocese the counties of Stafford, Prince William, Fairfax, and Alexandria.

Mr. J. M. Garnett gave notice that when it should be in order under the rules he would propose:

"That the portion of Virginia lying south of James river and east of the Blue Ridge, together with the counties of Accomac and Northampton, be set apart as a new Diocese."

Rev. Dr. Sprigg offered the following:

Resolved. That the several propositions from members of the Council having reference to a division of this Diocese, together with the report of the Committee and the petition from Southwest Virginia, be referred to a committee of seven clergymen and six laymen, with instructions to consider and report to the next Council.

The resolution was laid on the table.

The hour of six o'clock having arrived, it was moved that the Council adjourn until eight o'clock. It was moved in amendment that the Council adjourn until Saturday morning after divine service. The amendment was carried, and the Council then adjourned until Saturday morning.



Report of Committee on the Brotherhood.

SATURDAY, May 23, 1891.

The Council assembled for divine service. Morning prayer was read by the Rev. John K. Mason. The sermon was preached by the Rev. James Grammer, D. D., from the 17th verse of the 14th chapter of St. John.

After divine service the Council assembled for business, and was called to order by the Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Mr. W. W. Old presented the following report on the Brotherhood:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE BROTHERHOOD.

The Committee on the Brotherhood beg leave to submit the following report:

During the past year two members, the Rev. P. Slaughter, D. D., and the Rev. E. Boyden have passed away. The collections in behalf of their heirs, which are as yet insignificant in amount, denote little change in the membership, while they point distinctly to the necessity for improvement in the methods hitherto pursued.

The report of Cyrus Bossieux, Esq., Treasurer, filed herewith, and certified by the proper committee as correct and sustained by proper vouchers, exhibits a cash balance in his hands of \$616.60, besides two six per cent. bonds of \$1,000 each.

Major David N. Walker, for so many years president, finding himself unable to give to the office the time and attention it should have, tenders his resignation.

The Trustees as individuals having examined the report of the Committee (of which Colonel J. H. Skinner is chairman), in relation to improvement in the Organization of the Brotherhood, have signified their approval of the same, and recommend its adoption. In this recommendation this Committee unanimously coincide.

Rev. W. Q. Hullihen presented the report of the Committee on Sunday-schools:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Sunday-schools, for various reasons, have not been able to have a full conference of its members, chiefly on account of the interesting and absorbing topics engaging the attention of the Council. But happily the Committee on the State of the Church, among the many interesting subjects which appropriately have engaged their attention, has spoken also upon this, and has rendered, perhaps, any further allusion to it unnecessary at this time.

It is not suggestions, however attractive, as to the best methods of carrying on the Sunday-school work that is so much needed as faithful carrying on of those that have been already well approved. An intelligent appreciation of the genius of our religion and steady and persistent cultivation of those agencies which this Church of ours has placed within our reach would secure most blessed results.

Your Committee are of the opinion that if our teachers could be, from time to time, gathered together and hold, as has been recommended, a teachers' institute, only good could result, in quickening the zeal of individuals and of digesting methods and plans of carrying on the Sunday-school work.

Report of the Committee on Sunday-schools.

Whatever may be the imperfections and inefficiency of the Sunday-school as at present constituted, it is our wisdom to recognize the fact that it is filling or attempting to fill a place in the machinery of the churches which is not otherwise filled, and it is, therefore, our wisdom under the guiding spirit of our Church to endeavor to bring out all the possibilities for good there may if God's providence be in it. In using an agency which is so universal among the churches as the Sunday-school, there are great temptations constantly recurring, against which we must be on our guard, e.g., of using meaningless hymns because of a captivating tune, and following sensational and questionable methods, no matter how extensively recommended in their use among other excellent Christian people.

We must not forget that as ministers and as teachers from among the ranks of the laity Christ lays upon us a solemn responsibility as shepherds and under shepherds to feed the lambs of the flock of God that is amongst us; shepherding this little flock, and leading them along those paths which they are to follow in after years. It is the conviction of your Committee that nothing will be gained by a colorless Christianity, and while all must avoid the gross error of putting the Church before Christ, we must not, on the other hand, fail to avail ourselves of our rich heritage in preaching Christ thereby to them, and little by little explaining that more excellent way whereby they may, in accordance with the apostolic precept, build themselves up in their most holy faith.

Your Committee feel most strongly the importance of calling upon every Church and teacher, the paramount duty of studying well the question how to prevent the Sunday-school from becoming a mere substitute for the Church.

And just as the ordinary lesson leaflets are objectionable because the scholar is not taught acquaintance with the Bible as a book as a whole, so our scholars are in danger of being unfamiliar with the use of the Prayer Book, and almost as ignorant of its devotional treasures as children of other denominations.

Your Committee hail with delight the phenomenal growth of and wide spread interest in the organization of St. Andrew's Brotherhood, because as for other manifest reasons it husbands strength as a Church, and unites together by the strongest bonds of affinity its male members. And we cannot but hope that there may be thereby cultivated devoted attachment and loyalty to the Protestant Episcopal Church, and from its ranks may come forth well instructed and well equipped men, to teach in our Sunday-school: and while we may thus look for competent teachers, well instructed in the principles and modes of thought and methods of work current in the Church, the fact must not be overlooked that we have already among the large number of highly cultivated professional men in the communion of the Church-lawyers and doctors, perhaps—an adequate supply of teachers, if they would only be constrained by the love of Christ to throw the weight of their influence in behalf of His cause, who when on earth took little children into

His arms and blessed them, and solemnly imposed upon as great and distinguished a character as St. Peter the duty of feeding His lambs.

Let us, therefore, in our Parishes and our Diocesan deliberations give that prominence to this important and fundamental duty, which the genius of our Church prompts, and the precepts of the religion of Christ enjoin, and the universal experience of mankind reveals.

Mr. Thomas Potts presented the report of the Committee on Finance:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The account of the Treasurer of the Diocese has been examined, and found to be correct, with proper vouchers.

The receipts from the Contingent Fund, for the year ending May, 1891, amounted to \$11,890.72. From the sale of U. S. bonds, \$3,149.25: from call loans, \$5,431.64, and from interest, \$641,05—making a total of all receipts \$21,112.66.

The expenses for the past year, as shown by the Treasurer's account, were \$10,655.16. Paid for bonds, \$3,950; money on call, \$2,900—leaving in the hands of your Treasurer \$3,607.50, which sum is bearing 6% interest.

The Treasurer reports to your Committee that his collections up to Friday evening were about \$8.500.

Your Committee would respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. That the Treasurer pay the customary charges for the salaries of the Bishop and Assistant Bishop, Secretary, Chaplains, and other customary expenses, including the rent of the residence of the Assistant Bishop, the sum of \$25 to the Assistant Secretary of this Council, and \$15 to the sexton of Grace Church, Petersburg.
- 2. That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the expenses of the committee on "Division of the Diocese."

Annual Report of the Virginia Female Institute.

The Committee on Investments report that during the past year \$5,000 of the second mortgage bonds of the Georgia Pacific Railroad Company were purchased for the sum of \$3,950, and are now held by your Treasurer.

The Bishop presented the report of the Virginia Female Institute, which was ordered to be printed in the Journal:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA FEMALE INSTITUTE.

To the Board of Trustees:

I have the honor to make my annual report of the condition of the Virginia Female Institute.

A much larger number of pupils has been in attendance this session than ever before during my administration. Ninety names have been enrolled as boarders and thirty-three day pupils. Among the boarders are the names of seven whose fathers are clergymen in our Church, and enjoying the benefit of free tuition in all English branches, two of them having no expense for board or tuition. In addition, it has been my pleasure to aid six others by giving them their tuition in English studies without charge.

As a whole our work has not been quite so satisfactory as in former years, owing, no doubt, to the fact that a large majority were pupils entered in September, and, being younger in years, have lacked that interest in work that our older pupils alway possess. There have been a few, too, who resisted authority and discipline, however reasonable, and some trouble existed on that account; the moral status of the school, however, is high, and no finer, nobler pupils can be found in any school than we have had under our care this year. Five were presented to the Bishop for confirmation, and two were confirmed at their own homes during the Easter visitation.

The buildings continue to be kept in excellent repair, every attention being paid to the care of the property at all times. We have felt for some time past the great need of a new hall, as an addition to our present buildings, and with the increase in our numbers it has been more apparent—not having

been able to accommodate quite a number who offered themselves as pupils. An appeal was made to the Board of Directors during the winter, with the hope they would be sufficiently interested to take some active and positive steps towards this much needed addition, but nothing has been done. We can do without it, it is true, but it would add immensely to the comfort and convenience of all connected with the school, and place this, our only Diocesan school for girls, on a footing with those of other denominations throughout our State and country. We should, I think, feel some pride in Church institutions, and not fall behind the demands of the times, which are being met by other schools growing up around us.

We are approaching the semi-centennial of the school, and this would be a suitable way of commemorating it, and thus add honor to its noble work carried on since its establishment in 1844.

I appeal to the Council to consider the subject, and ask for material aid at the same time, *not* as a personal matter, but for the good of our Church at large.

Resolved, That the XIXth Canon be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

If any persons within this church offend their brethren by any wickedness of life, such persons shall be repelled from the Holy Communion, agreeably to the Rubric. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the minister or may be requested of the accused, the church wardens, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the minister in ascertaining the facts of the case; *Provided*, That if such warden, or wardens, shall fail or refuse to act within ten days, the minister shall proceed to act under the rubrics of the Church

Report of Committee on Incorporation of Board of Trustees to Hold Invested Funds.

After discussion Rev. E. B. Jones moved to postpone until next Council, and continue the committee.

Rev. B. D. Tucker moved in amendment that a new committee be appointed to whom the proposed Canon should be referred.

Mr. Frank Nelson moved as a substitute that the report be received and its further consideration postponed to the next Council.

The substitute of Mr. Nelson was adopted.

Mr. W. W. Old presented the following, which was adopted:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INCORPORATION OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO HOLD INVESTED FUNDS.

The committee to whom was referred the report of the committee appointed "to consider the expediency of appointing one or more Board of Trustees, to be legally incorporated, for the purpose of holding, subject to the direction and control of the Diocesan Council, all invested funds now existing, or hereafter to be accumulated, for the benefit of the various church charities of the Diocese," having carefully considered the matter entrusted to them, beg leave respectfully to report the following form of a charter:

An Act to incorporate the "Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

Whereas the members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Commonwealth of Virginia have raised and contributed certain funds for the support of their disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of their deceased clergy, and the episcopate of said church within this Commonwealth; and,

Whereas in order to successfully administer the said funds and such additions thereto as may hereafter accrue or be made, it is needful to create a corporation which shall receive, hold and administer the same;

Now, therefore, be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., Rev. T. G. Dashiell, D. D., Rev. D. F. Sprigg, D. D., Rev. J. B. Funsten, Messrs. Chas. E. Whitlock, Jos. Bryan, E. B. Addison, B. J. Barbour, John F. Glenn, Cyrus Bossieux, F. H. McGuire, Wm. H. Palmer, Arthur Herbert, and Charles R. Hooff, and their successors be, and they are hereby, constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name and style of the "Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia," and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal; and may sue and be sued, with power to take, receive, and hold, to themselves and their successors, subscriptions, gifts, and contributions, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the episcopate, and for any other charitable purpose of said church in said Diocese; and the same to invest, hold, distribute, and apply

for the purposes aforesaid, but subject to the control of the Council of the said Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, as it shall be from time to time constituted; provided that the value of the property so held shall not exceed at any one time for each of said funds the sum of five hundred thousand dollars.

- 2. That the said trustees and their successors shall have power to appoint from their number such officers and committees (under such rules and by such means as they may adopt) as shall be necessary and proper for the due management, control and administration of the funds and other property committed to the said corporation for the purposes aforesaid, and may invest the said officers and committees with such powers as the said corporation shall deem best adapted to accomplish the objects and purposes of this act.
- 3. That the said trustees shall have power to make and establish from time to time such by-laws and regulations, not contrary to the directions of the said Council, the laws of this Commonwealth or of the United States, as they may deem proper for the management of the said corporation and best fitted to accomplish its objects and purposes; and a majority of the said board of trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- 4. That the said trustees shall have power to fill any vacancy which may occur in their body arising from death, resignation, inability or refusal to act, removal from this Commonwealth, or other cause declared by the bylaws sufficient to create a vacancy, provided that such vacancy shall be filled by the selection of one of two more persons nominated therefor by the said Council, and provided that in case no such nomination be made by said Council at its next meeting after receiving notice of such vacancy, then said trustees may fill such vacancy; and upon any successor elected under the provisions of this act shall be conferred the same powers and imposed the same duties as if his name had been mentioned as one of the incorporators herein.
- 5. That the said trustees shall submit annually to the said Council a full statement and report of the funds in their hands or under their charge, and of their transactions during the past year.
 - 6. This act shall be in force from its passage.

Your Committee, therefore, submit the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Council adopt the form of charter as proposed, and that a committee of three laymen be appointed by the President, who shall apply on behalf of this Council to the General Assembly of the Commonwealth at its next session to have the law passed.

BEVERLEY D. TUCKER, R. TAYLOR SCOTT, F. H. McGuire, W. H. Murdaugh, William W. Old, W. B. Martin. Report of Committee on Affairs and Organization of the Brotherhood.

Mr. Joseph Bryan called up the report on the Brotherhood, and the recommendations attached to that report were adopted:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON AFFAIRS AND ORGANIZATION OF THE BROTHERHOOD.

The committee to which, by a resolution of the last Council was referred "the affairs and organization of the Brotherhood" that they might report "some plan by which its beneficient ends may be more surely and largely attained," return herewith the draft of a Constitution and By-Laws, of which they recommend the adoption.

The changes which they propose in the present system, and the additions to it which they suggest, are as follows:

They recommend that hereafter the contributing membership be confined to laymen, as the benefits which the Brotherhood proposes to confer are a free-will offering from the laity, to such families of deceased clergymen as may be in need of assistance.

They recommend that its Board of Management—which shall consist of five laymen resident in or near Richmond city—shall, upon the death of any clergyman canonically connected with the Diocese, determine, by and with the advice of the Bishop, the Assistant Bishop, and the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society, whether the family of said clergyman are in need of assistance, in which event it shall be freely and lovingly bestowed from the contributions of the laity.

To increase these contributions, which at present are very small, they propose the establishment of three classes of members, who shall contribute annually \$10, or \$5, or \$3 to the funds of the Brotherhood, according to the class to which each may agree to belong; and they retain as a fourth class those who shall agree, as at present, to contribute \$1.10 on the death of any clergyman for whose family the Board may order a collection to be made. The sums annually collected are to be distributed as equitably as possible among the families that are assisted, and where the recipients' of assistance shall not seem to the Board to require an absolute gift of the sum collected, then it shall be bestowed on such terms of use as to the Board may seem right, and afterwards revert to the Brotherhood. It is hoped that the addition of these three classes of annual contributors will add largely to the resources of the Brotherhood and to its benefits, since they will invite the wealthier of our laity to assist more freely, and more in proportion to their abundance, the families of such of our deceased clergy as may need the help of their Christian brethren.

They also propose the establishment, in every congregation where practicable, of a Ladies' Auxiliary to the Brotherhood, which shall, whenever an assessment is called for in aid of a family, collect for its benefit such sums as they can from those of the congregation who are not members of the Brotherhood.

Resolution, &c.

They recommend that should the Constitution and By-Laws which they propose be adopted, there be refunded to such persons as have heretofore become, or been made life members, should they so desire, the sum of \$50 which was paid to secure such life membership.

In conclusion, they earnestly invite their brethren of the laity to contribute with unstinted hand to the support of this beneficient association. A petition has lately been added to the suffrages of our devout litary that God would send forth laborers into His harvest; and surely it becomes us to manifest our sincerity in its utterance by giving encouragement, comfort and aid in every needful form to those who engage in the service of His ministry.

It must excite regret, if not self-reproach, when we consider the smallness of the average pecuniary stipend which the faithful and humble men of God, who labor in our country Parishes receive. It is not so much as \$600 per annum-a sum so small as to make any provision for the future of their families quite impossible. We expect them to be "instant in season and out of season" in their labors of love and mercy; we look for them to "endure hardness as good soldiers of Jesus Christ"; we would not have them "entangle themselves" with worldly pursuits, nor engage in the quest of earthly riches and honors; and, therefore, it is plainly our duty, when they have fought their good fight and have finished their earthly course, to come promptly and liberally to the assistance of such of their families as need our helping hand; and this should be esteemed our great privilege as well, for the Master's promised recognition of every kindness shown and deed of mercy done to even the least of His brethren, as done to Him, must peculiarly attach to every office of helpful love rendered to the bereaved of these His followers whose lives have been consecrated to His service.

Resolved, That we record our testimony to the eminent usefulness of our beloved brother as the eloquent preacher and missioner of years gone by; as an able editor of our Diocesan paper, and as a historiographer who, by

his learning and research, and singularly graceful pen, has contributed more than almost any other to elucidate the history of our Diocese, and especially to vindicate the religious character of the Father of his country.

The consideration of the report upon Canon XI was postponed to next Council.

Prayer was offered by the Assistant Bishop, and the Council adjourned sine die.

Philip Slaughter, D. D.

Born October 26th, 1808, at Springfield, Culpeper county, Virginia.

Ordained Deacon May 25th, 1834, by the Rt. Rev. William Meade, D. D., in Trinity Church, Staunton, Virginia.

Ordained Priest July, 1835, by the Rt. Rev. Richard Channing Moore, D. D., in St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, Virginia.

His first charge was at Haymarket, Virginia, January 1, 1835. His second, Christ Church, Georgetown, D. C., January 1, 1836. His third, Meade and Johns Parishes, Loudoun county, Virginia, 1840. His fourth, St. Paul's Church, Petersburg, Virginia, 1843. He established the "Virginia Colonizationist" in 1850. He built Calvary Church upon his own farm in Culpeper county in 1857. He took charge of Emmanuel Church, Slaughter Parish, July, 1874. Was elected Historiographer of the Diocese of Virginia May, 1879.

Died at his home, Cedar Mountain, Culpeper county, June 12, 1890, and was buried in Calvary Church-yard, Culpeper county.

Born in Richmond, Virginia, February 17, 1849.

His first charge was that of Assistant Minister to the Rev. Henry Wall, D. D., Rector of St. John's Church, Richmond, Virginia. His fourth charge was Beckford Parish, Shenandoah county, Virginia, from 1883 to 1890.

He died at Orkney Springs August 1, 1890, and was buried in Hollywood Cemetery, Richmond, Virginia.

Ebenezer Boyden.

Born in Guilford, Vermont, May 25, 1803.

Ordained Deacon by Rt. Rev. Richard Channing Moore, D. D., May, 1828, when he became editor of the "Theological Repertory."

Ordained Priest by Rt. Rev. Wm. Meade, D. D., December 6, 1829.

His first parochial charge was Trinity Church, Staunton, Virginia, in 1829. His second was St. Paul's Church, Norfolk, toward the close of 1832. About the year 1835 he removed to Cleveland, Ohio, where he ministered until 1838, when failing health induced him to return to Virginia. In June, 1839, he took charge of Walker's Parish, Albemarle, with which St. John's Church, Louisa, was afterwards united. He ministered there until 1880, when he resigned because of infirm health.

He died January 15, 1891.

My Dear Bishop:

I submit the following report of my work since November 1, 1891. My district comprises the forty counties in the western portion of the State, containing the Convocations known as Danville, Central and South-west. Since my appointment as Evangelist I have traveled five thousand miles in the discharge of my duties. The expenses for the six months have been \$99.70 (ninety-nine dollars and seventy cents); collections \$210.01 (two hundred and ten dollars and one cent). I have up to this date preached one hundred and twenty times, administered communion twelve times and baptized four.

One pleasing and encouraging feature of the evangelistic work in my large territory is the apparent assistance the general agent of the Church has been able to render directly and indirectly in keeping to secure rectors for new or vacant parishes, and assistants to disabled clergymen.

Under our Evangelists' guidance there has been raised for the support of ministers from \$1,500 to \$2,000, and his visits have rather stimulated than hindered the calling of a permanent rector.

As far as I can see, counting the men who have within the last six months moved in my district, and the ones likely to come soon, there will be a gain to the list of clergy for that territory of not less than seven or eight.

No where has our beloved Church a brighter future, and no where is there a more cordial reception for the Evangelists who go forth to prepare the way for the permanent minister.

President of the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School:

I respectfully report that fourteen students have received instruction in the Divinity School this session. One of these is a deacon of our Church, and two are Methodist ministers.

No one will apply for ordination this year, but four of the present students hope to enter the ministry at the close of next session.

The men in this department have studied earnestly. All of them have improved, and some have done very well. Most of them are deficient in English Grammar, Composition and Spelling. The teachers are making constant, though not always encouraging, efforts to remedy this deficiency.

Sixty scholars have attended the Normal School during the session; one of these, not included among the Divinity students, expects to enter the ministry, and gives promise of usefulness. All of the Divinity students have attended classes in the Normal School.

There will probably be three graduates from this school to-morrow. The teacher in the Sewing School reports good progress on the part of her pupils.

The students have done the work assigned them in the garden and yards.

The matron and teachers have been faithful and conscientious, so far as can be seen, in the discharge of their duties.

There have been twenty-two boarders in the two schools.

I have endeavored to give instruction to the classes in the Divinity School in Bible History, Church History, Apologetics and Homiletics; in the Normal School to the senior class in the Prayer-Book, Church History, Social Science and Logic.

I respectfully report that during the past session I have taught classes in the Divinity School daily in the following studies:

Theology—Elementary Class—keeping close to the text of the Catechism and Articles.

Bible Introduction—two grades; one using Barrows' Companion to the Bible as a text-book, the other using Angus' Bible Hand-Book.

Greek—Two grades in first term. At end of first term the lower grade was discontinued, having made unsatisfactory progress. The other grade, with two students, will be ready to go into Xenophon and the New Testament shortly after the beginning of next session.

Latin—Two grades. Upper grade, with one student, now making good progress in Cæsar. Half of lower class doing fairly in Grammar.

For both Divinity and Normal Schools I have taught as follows: Mental Science (Hopkins' Outline Study of Man) in first term.

Moral Science (Hopkins' Law of Love) in second term.

English Grammar and Composition throughout the session.

Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia:

As presbyters of the Diocese of Virginia, under appointment by the American Church Missionary Society to found a mission in Brazil, we respectfully submit the following report:

Sailing from Newport's News August 31, 1889, we reached Sao Paulo October 1st, whence, after three week's stay, we proceeded to the village of Cruzeiro, where we were engaged in the study of Portuguese until April 5, 1890.

April 21, 1890, we arrived in Porto Alegre, accompanied by Senhor Boaventura Souza e Oliveira and family. Our first public service was held in this city on the afternoon of June 8, 1890. A second service for the evening was begun in another locality the night of August 24, 1890. Both these services have continued without interruption each Sunday, with at all times encouraging and not unfrequently crowded attendance.

In addition, we held services for some months at two other points within the city, Sunday forenoon and night, and a cottage service on Friday night. This last continues to the present time.

In October we took charge of a school which had been under the care of Senhor Vicente Brande, giving daily instruction to the pupils, and enlisting the former master as co-worker and catechist. This school has been thoroughly reorganized, and now numbers seventy children, who receive religious instruction one day each week, while the daily round is begun with an informal service.

The two catechists have been instructed by us during the past year in English, preparatory to theological studies. This seems imperative, as there are no commentaries nor aids to Bible study in the Portuguese language. During the hot season, from December to April, it was found impossible to continue this instruction. It will shortly be resumed, and daily instruction in English with readings from the Bible will be given them by Mr. Kinsolving, while Mr. Morris will study with them the Creed and the Articles in their own tongue.

A Sunday-school was established December 28, 1890, and at 9 A. M. each Sunday continues its hopeful work among some sixty or

seventy children. This work devolves upon the missionaries and their catechists, as there are no competent teachers to be procured.

All the above services have been in Portuguese, since we have had no occasion for services in our own language.
