

## RULES OF ORDER.

#### ORGANIZATION.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand except to address the chair.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

#### Rules of Order.

- A Committee on Parochial Reports.
- A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.
- A Committee on Elections.
- A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.
- A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.
- A Committee on Sunday Schools.
- 3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishops' Addresses the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such other Committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

#### ORDER OF DEBATE.

- 1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.
- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.
- 4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.
- 5th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendment are precluded.
- 7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully

address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member trangresses the rules of the Council the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or wardens

of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

- 3d. No spectators, shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.
- 4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia respectfully report:

Of these, the church in Pulaski City and Christ Church, Richmond, each resigned \$50 of their respective stipends. Two were reduced by the committee \$50 each, and one \$25 in November, 1891. The total amount of the above-stated stipends is \$9,230, from which some abatement is to be made, because some of the stipends began and some ceased in the course of the year. But this abatement is largely overbalanced by the stipends paid to the colored deacons, which are not here included. We think we may safely add to the above \$1,000 as the excess of the colored stipends over all reductions; then adding \$3,000, the salaries of two evangelists paid by the committee, and we have a total of \$13,230, not including specials to clergymen in need and other expenses incident to the work. So that as we began the Council year with \$6,000, and had received up to 1st April, 1892, less than \$5,000, making a total of less than \$11,000, it can readily be seen that our treasury would then be exhausted, so that we felt compelled to make an appeal to the churches, and to appoint a committee to borrow money, if necessary, to meet our engagements. Indeed, the Treasurer reports that on 1st of April he was short over \$2,000; while, therefore, by the blessing of God and by the liberality of the people and of the children, the treasury has been replenished, the sum total up to the meeting of Council being \$13,875.25, of which the children probably gave one-fourth, yet after making up all deficiences and meeting all obligations the balance is \$5,767.34-\$300 less than Report of Executive Committee of Diocesan Missionary Society.

last year. It is a trial to the committee, and, we should think, to the Diocese, with forty or fifty men looking to us for help, to be left with an empty treasury almost every year before Lent, and to have to rely upon the extraordinary efforts of that season to replenish it. Regular and frequent giving is the rule of the New Testament, of almost all churches for self-support, and, we believe, of all Mutual Aid Societies, and, we think, should be the rule of all giving to the cause of Christ at home and abroad. Why cannot some zealous lay-man or lay-woman in every country church, and especially in every long vacant church, take down the names of all who are willing to give to Diocesan Missions, with the amounts they are willing to give monthly or quarterly, and then, by themselves or with the help of others, collect the same and remit to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Societies as soon as possible. Surely this or some other plan ought to be adopted to make our revenue more regular and to keep us from running aground almost every year. In this connection the Executive Committee begs the members of the Council to bear in mind that the balance reported as now in the treasury is already appropriated, and will be necessary to meet the obligations to which we are already committed. The committee makes this statement to guard against the idea that this is a surplus, whereas it is part of our regular provision, and will barely suffice to take us through the year. The ministers aided by us are, as we believe, faithful and efficient, and some of them remarkably so. The evangelists are worthy of all praise, not only for their zeal and efficiency, but for their disinterestedness in their efforts to supply the vacant parishes with ministers, or to bring about such combination as will enable them to support a minister themselves, or with less aid from the Executive Committee than the parishes would require if separate. The office of evangelist is, from its nature, temporary, and just in proportion as the vacant parishes are supplied with ministers, separately or by combination, will there be less need of evangelistic service. The Executive Committee would be glad to have the sense of Council as to the expediency of denying aid to parishes which refuse to combine when combination is practicable and desirable. Finally, we earnestly recommend to all our congregations, in order to foster the spirit and establish the habit of Christian giving in our children, that the congregation pay all necessary expenses of the Sunday-school, and have the children free to devote their offerings, specially during Lent, to Diocesan Missions, and at other times to Brazilian or other Foreign Missions, to the Education Society, or to any other Christian object which the rector, superintendent and teachers may agree upon, keeping up the interest of the children by occasional statements of facts, or other interesting matter connected with the object of their beneficence.

Bishop's Address.

#### BISHOP WHITTLE'S ADDRESS.

The Bishop's Address was then read by the Assistant Bishop.

#### My DEAR BRETHREN:

It is a great disappointment to me that I am providentially prevented from meeting with you in this interesting and important Council of our Church. But, my absence being providential, is of course right, and for the best.

I was stricken down by sickness in the midst of my labors last September, and for the greater part of the time since have been confined to my room, and much of it, to my bed.

Although my health has much improved, I am still unable to endure the fatigue and excitement of the Council, or even to do more than dictate such a brief account of matters in the diocese, as I am expressly required by Canon, to lay before you.

1891, May 25th.—I had the pleasure of taking part in a solemn and joyful celebration of the Rev. Dr. C. J. Gibson's semi centennial of his rectorship of Grace Church, Petersburg.

June 4th.—Attended the interesting and satisfactory commencement of St. Paul's Normal and Industrial Colored School, Lawrenceville, under the direction of Rev. J. S. Russell. This brother has done and is doing a noble work for his people, which I wish all their friends in the Diocese could see for themselves.

## MINISTERS DECEASED.

It is my sad duty to report the loss by death of two of our most prominent and valued Presbyters during the past year.

The Rev. Joshua Peterkin, D. D., who had been in declining health for some time, departed this life at his home in Richmond, March 7, 1892, in the seventy-eighth year of his age.

A native of Baltimore and ordained in 1837, he labored in Maryland, Berryville, Va., and Princeton, N. J., and at the time of his death had been for nearly thirty-seven years the faithful and beloved Rector of St. James' Church, Richmond.

The Rev. Richard T. Davis, D. D., for nearly twenty-four years Rector of St. James' Church, Leesburg, died in that place May 3d, 1892, in the sixty-third year of his age.

Dr. Davis was ordained in 1855, and spent the whole of his Ministry in his native Virginia.

Both these dear brethren were well known throughout the Diocese, and wherever known, admired and loved. They need no eulogy from me—they were both men of ability, and eminent for the saintliness of their characters and for the purity and Godliness of their lives.

"They rest from their labors, and their works do follow them." May we all be imitators of them, even as they were of Christ.

## ASSISTANT BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

### My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

The long-continued illness of the Bishop of the Diocese, which compelled him to suspend active work during the month of September last, and which detains him from this Council, has been a subject of solicitude and sympathy throughout the Diocese and the State of Virginia. The loving appreciation of fidelity and self-sacrifice in her public servants has always been a characteristic of the

people of Virginia. In church and in state the instinct to honor those who are over us in the Lord, and to esteem them very highly for their work's sake, is one of the conservative virtues nurtured in a people by the growth of Christian civilization. My intercourse during the last eight months with the people of all parts of Virginia and their kind inquiries after their Bishop's health, have suggested these observations. It is hoped that rest and freedom from the cares of his office may restore him to health and prolong his day of usefulness in his generation. As soon as it was more than a probability that his illness would be a long-continued one I addressed myself to the effort to supply the needs of the whole Diocese for Episcopal visitations. Had it been possible to begin the work in the fall this might have been accomplished. The greater part of the work in the following record has been done, as will be seen, since the 1st of January, 1892:

## CONSECRATION OF CHURCHES.

On the 5th of December, 1891, St. John's Church, near Balcony Falls and Glasgow, Rockbridge county, was consecrated. The Rev. George Benedict, the rector, and Rev. Mr. Lawrence assisted in the services. The church building has seating capacity for about one hundred and fifty persons. It commands a field where good mission work may be done.

On the 11th of December, Emmanuel Church, Wakefield, Surry county, was consecrated. The Rev. Dr. Gibson, of Grace Church. Petersburg; the Rev. B. D. Tucker, of St. Paul's, Norfolk; the Rev. H. L. Derby, then of Suffolk, and the Rev. Mr. Ridout, assis-

tant Grace Church, Petersburg, assisted in the services. The building is neat and churchly. Its erection is due to the zeal and sacrifice of a few faithful women. With this church as the central point, in combination with Ivor and Waverly, a self-supporting parish may be constituted. On the 5th of February the Chapel by the Sea, Princess Anne county, was consecrated. Rev. A. W. Anson, the rector of the parish, and the Rev. B. D. Tucker and Rev. L. W. Gravatt, of Norfolk, assisted in the services. The Rev. Mr. Tucker preached the consecration sermon. The chapel was built under the faithful ministry of Rev. Mr. Savage, chiefly for the benefit of the life-saving crew and their families, and in memory of many gallant men who from time to time had perished on that wild coast while engaged in the life-saving work. The circumstances and the character of the congregation helped to make the services and the sermon touching and impressive. On Sunday, February 7th, dedicatory services were held in St. Paul's Church, Norfolk, upon the occasion of the reopening, after it had been closed for many months for remodelling and renovation. The rector and vestry are to be congratulated upon their wisdom and good taste in consulting the best architects and ecclesiastical artists in the country in the restoration of this old church. The deformities which had been engrafted upon the interior plan, and which for half a century have concealed its beauty and dignity, have all been removed, and the graceful architectural lines of the original church have been revealed, evidently the work of some master of the profession. It stands now as perhaps the most beautiful specimen of the colonial churches in America. I may be pardoned if, in passing, I suggest to our brethren of the clergy the importance to them in their calling of at least a knowledge of the elementary principles of church architecture. I do not mean a technical knowledge—even if that were desirable they would have no time to acquire it—but such a knowledge as every man of broad and general culture ought to have, gained from reading in leisure hours and from the observation of architectural forms in travel at home or abroad. A clergymen has more to do with the building and improvement of churches than any member of his congregation. He in the majority of cases collects the money, and his is the leading voice in the selection of architectural plans. If he is ignorant he is at the mercy of the sensational architect who furnishes

him with the colored drawings that please his eye. Let him read as a cultivating study and as a part of the general equipment for usefulness in his calling some one of the many excellent English books upon the history and the science of ecclesiastical building. Let him read Ruskin's "Even Lamps of Architecture," and form in his mind some definite conception of truth and beauty and utility in the forms of church architecture. He will then at least know who a good architect is, and will be able to detect bad architecture when he sees it. Above all, let him not imagine himself to be an architect, and undertake to draw his own plans for church building. It will doubtless save much of the money that has been contributed by the self-sacrifice of your people; it will secure beauty and fitness as against the risk of grotesqueness in form and proportion. If no matter how humble your church building is to be, you consult the best architect you can find as the first step in your enterprise.

On the 6th of April, St. Thomas' Church, Christiansburg, Montgomery county, was consecrated. Rev. John McGill, the rector, and the Rev. Messrs. Lloyd, Logan and Smead assisted in the services. The Rev. E. L. Goodwin preached the consecration sermon. The church building is very attractive, and the congregation earnest and united.

On Wednesday, April 20th, St. Thomas' Church, St. Bride's Parish. Berkelev, was consecrated. The Rev. J. R. Hubard, D. D., Rev. B. D. Tucker, Rev. A. S. Lloyd, Rev. J. L. Gravatt, Rev. Robert Forsyth and Rev. John Powell assisted in the services. Rev. O. S. Barten, D. D., preached the consecration sermon. This congregation during the five years of its life has expended in parish work \$0,000. Unaided they have built their handsome and commodious church. Their good fortune in securing the ability and experience of the Rev. Dr. Hubard as their rector has contributed doubtless toward the exceptional success of their undertaking, but they deserve commendation for their fidelity and self-sacrifice. It is a striking coincidence in the history of this old parish, that its revival and reorganization by the congregation of St. Thomas should have occurred just one hundred years after its apparent extinction. Its name disappears with the name of the Rev. Weedlow Robinson, its last rector. in 1787. Just one hundred years after February 15th, 1787, the parish was reorganized, and the new vestry of St. Bride's elected.

St. Paul's Chapel has also been organized as an independent congregation in St. Bride's Parish.

On Sunday, the 8th of May, Christ Church, Buena Vista, was consecrated. The Rev. Dr. McBryde, of Lexington, assisted in the services and preached the consecration sermon. This church has a future of usefulness and strength in a growing community.

In addition to these new churches consecrated, it is encouraging to mention some of the churches in process of erection, which may be open for worship during the coming year. A neat church building has been erected at Cape Charles city, and the field is said to be quite a promising one. The congregation of St. Luke's Church, Norfolk, has been blessed with exceptional success in their new church enterprise. The judgment displayed in the selection of places, and the generous enthusiasm of the people in contributing to the new building are subjects of hearty congratulation. It will be probably one of the largest churches in the State, and as handsome a piece of architecture for the amount expended as any in the country. A new church is in process of erection at Suffolk, Nansemond county, to meet the demands of a flourishing town and a growing congregation. St. Peter's Church, Norfolk, has been enlarged to double its original The new St. Paul's Church in Lynchburg is steadily progressing, and it is hoped that this strong congregation may, before many months, be worshipping in their beautiful building. rector and congregation at Roanoke City are hoping to enter their new and capacious building certainly by the end of the summer. The chapel in West Radford is nearing completion. church at Pulaski City may be ready for worship before another This and the church at Roanoke are both excellent specimens of Gothic work. A neat church at the beautiful little town Richlands, in Tazewell county, is probably by this time ready for occupation. A new church is nearing completion in Barton Heights, one of the suburban towns of Richmond, mainly the fruits of the missionary spirit and the liberal offerings of Emmanuel Church. Henrico. These new buildings are hopeful signs of energy and development in the Church.

On the 8th of October, in St. James' Church, Warrenton, Alexander Paine was ordained to the Order of Deacons. The Rev. G. W. Nelson preached the sermon, and the Rev. Dr. Kinloch Nelson pre-

sented the candidate and assisted in the services. On Sunday morning, March the 6th, Richard Pardee Williams was ordained to the Order of Deacons in St. Paul's Church, Richmond. The Rev. Hartley Carmichael preached the sermon and presented the candidate. In addition to these services, I have conducted the worship and filled the pulpits of vacant Churches eight times. I have administered the Holy Communion nine times. I have baptized in vacant parishes, or at the request of the rector, eight infants, and discharged occasionally ministerial duties in the absence of rectors, or vacancies in parishes.

I must not detain you with discussions of questions which are to come before you, and upon which you are to render a responsible decision. Upon the question of the Division of the Diocese my opinions are on record in the address delivered at the last Council. I have read in the public prints the report of your Committee on Division, which will be presented for your consideration to-day. Whatever may be your disposition of the proposition embodied in that report. I am sure you will render to your committee your thanks for the painstaking fidelity with which the duty you committed to them has been discharged. If the determination is reached to divide the Diocese at this time, and if it is ratified by the General Convention, there is nothing for me to do but to exercise the option which is given to me by the Constitution of the Church-either to remain with the old or to take the new Diocese. God knows what a pain it will be to me to part from the Clergy and the Laity of either one. If the proposition to divide is deseated or postponed to the future, when it must come I shall remain gladly in the work which I accepted at the hands of this Diocese nine years ago, and with my best energies and a hopeful heart minister to a people and a Clergy which any Bishop might be thankful to serve.

Before I close I must pause and dwell for a few moments on a blessed and helpful memory and example. On the 9th day of March I assisted the Rev. J. K. Mason and others of the clergy at the funeral of the Rev. Joshua Peterkin, D. D., in St. James' Church, Richmond. The Bishop, in his address just read, the public journals and memorial meetings in sister Churches, as well as in our own, have given the events of his life and the record of his long service as a minister of the Gospel. This is the first Council of Virginia for

perhaps thirty years where his voice is silent and his face is seen no more. The public of all classes in the city of Richmond, and the Clergy and Laity of the Episcopal Church in Virginia, seem now, while his memory is so fresh, to recognize the fact that across the horizon of our generation has passed a character of rare and remarkable Christian graces—a character with an exceptional combination of gentleness and power, of strength and of love. The natural bent of his intellect seemed to me to be philosophical, and his tastes from a boy were literary in a very marked degree, but he had higher impulses and higher ends than philosophy or literature. There was in him a passion for doing good, a Divine devotion for duty, a glorious fame, loving and being loved. He never shrank from controversy upon questions of religious truth, and during all those troubled vears, when you had been sending him to the General Conventions to represent you, he has seen the dangers to be feared from the invasion of Romish principles in all the Protestant Churches, and with steadiness and firmness he has been true and consistent in his fidelity to our Prayer Book and to the reformations of the sixteenth century.

But he knew better than most of us ever learn to know, that controversy at last means so little and charity means so much. He knew what is so hard for most of us to learn, and what some of us never do learn in this world, that whether circumcision availeth anvthing, nor uncircumcision, but that daily growth in goodness, in self-control in love, and in unselfishness, which Paul calls a new creation in Christ Jesus-and why cannot we learn that too? we must learn it, for it is the heart of the religion of Christ-and there left us another great lesson about Christ. As a pastor moving about among his flock in pastoral ministrations—a Christian citizen who was open to the call of every public duty, never too tired to go and lend his influence to any good cause—a friend and comforter to the rich and to the poor, to old men and to children, in these daily pastoral duties he taught us that the work of the religion of Christ is there. The becoming more like Christ lay in that path of daily duty and of common life. It is not a new truth, but an old one. David knew it, and we ought to know it better than he did, for we have Christ in the Gospels before us. David said who shall ascend unto the hill of the Lord? who shall rise up in his holy place—who? Not the orator, who thrills with his passion the listening multitude: Report of Committee on the Division of the Diocese.

not the poet with his mystic song; not the wasted monk with his bodily mortifications; not the priest with his garments of beauty and glory and the pomp of his ceremonial—not these shall ascend unto the hill of the Lord—but he that hath clean hands and a pure heart, and that hath not lifted up his mind unto vanity. He that walketh uprightly and worketh righteousness and speaketh the truth from his heart, he shall receive the blessing of his Lord and righteousness from the God of his salvation. Kindness and purity, guilelessness and love in these daily lives of ours, there is the pathway up the hill of the Lord, and in these daily journeys upward are we moulded into the image of Christ. He taught us that, and what a lesson that is for us to learn from this strong and beautiful life which has passed away from our midst.

The death of Dr. Davis, of Leesburg, reminds us of the same lessons, and leaves us an example of guileless devotion to duty, of ability and of purity which constitute a heritage and a benediction to the Diocese of Virginia. May God keep these memories green.

I must not detain you longer, May the Spirit of Grace rule our hearts and guide our Councils, and give us a right judgment in all things.

Mr. John Page moved that after the disposition of the report of the Committee on Division, the election of Deputies to the General Convention be made the order of the day. Carried.

The order of the day, being the report of the Committee on Division, was then taken up.

Rev. Dr. K. Nelson presented the report of the Committee as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DIVISION OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

The committee appointed to consider the subject of the division of the Diocese and report to this Council have the honor to present the subjoined report. Having thoroughly discussed in full committee the whole subject and carefully weighed the various propositions submitted for our consideration, we recommend the adoption of the follow resolutions:

Report of the Committee on the Division of the Diocese.

- Resolved, That it is expedient at this time to divide the Diocese of Virginia into two Dioceses.
- 2. Resolved, That the consent of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia be and hereby is given to the erection within the limits of this Diocese of a new Diocese to be formed of the territory comprised in the following counties of the State of Virginia, to-wit: Accomac, Northampton, Princess Anne, Norfolk, Nansemond, Isle of Wight, Surry, Prince George, Sussex, Southampton, Greenesville, Brunswick, Dinwiddie, Chesterfield, Powhatan, Amelia, Nottoway, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Halifax, Charlotte, Prince Edward, Appomattox, Cumberland, Buckingham, Nelson, Augusta, Highland, Bath, Alleghany, Rockbridge, Amherst, Bedford, Campbell, Pittsylvania, Henry, Franklin, Patrick, Carroll, Floyd, Montgomery, Roanoke, Botetourt, Craig, Giles, Pulaski, Bland, Wythe, Grayson, Smythe, Tazewell, Buchanan, Dickenson, Russell, Washington, Scott, Wise and Lee.
- 3. Resolved, That all vested funds of the Diocese of Virginia be divided between the two proposed Dioceses in the ratio of communicants in each, so far as such division may be found practicable and free from legal difficulties.
- 4. Resolved, That the title to the Episcopal residence in the city of Richmond be vested in the Diocese of Virginia, to be held and used for its purposes: provided, however, that said Diocese shall account for and pay over to the new Diocese its due proportion of the value of said property according to the number of its communicants at the date of division.
- 5. Resolved, That the Virginia Female Institute shall remain the property of the Diocese of Virginia and of the proposed new Diocese, and under their joint control and management, on such terms and conditions as may hereafter be determined.

Should the above proposed line of division be adopted, the statistics of the two Dioceses would be as shown in the Appendix.

REPORT OF MANAGERS OF WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia are thankful to report that the income of the past year, from the contributions of individuals and churches, has been larger than that of the year before by \$295.49. It has reached the sum of \$1,432.32, more than ever before from this source, but by no means sufficient for the wants of our beneficiaries. The income from our invested funds the past year was \$1,491.71, more than one thousand dollars of which it was found necessary to add to the above contributions to supply the deficiency. In view of the fact that no new case of need had arisen during the year and realizing the obligation resting upon the Diocese to carry out the original design of the

givers of this Fund—to increase as soon as practicable its Capital Fund to \$60,000—the Board determined to expend only the same amount as last year, viz: twenty-five hundred and thirty-five dollars, and to make no change in the respective sums assigned to the different families. There are eighteen of these families still under our care, and it is well to remind our brethren that out of three hundred churches in the Diocese, not more than eighty have contributed one cent to their support.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

Rev. H. Carmichael presented the report of the Committee on Sunday-schools.

The Committee on Sunday schools beg to submit the following suggestions to the Council:

Your Committee are deeply impressed with the necessity of urging on all pastors and teachers the importance of pure and undefiled Biblical instruction. They desire that children should be taught, so soon as they are able to learn, the Holy Scriptures—taught them not only in substance, but verbally, so that when the child becomes a man, the mind may be well stored with treasures taken from the Word of God. It is in youth when the mind is plastic, that we can learn by heart the beauties of the Bible. When age comes with its temptations and worries, it takes from us that facility for committing to memory those sacred stories and psalms which the child can

learn with ease. Remember what St. Paul said to Timothy: "From a child, thou hast known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation, by faith, which is in Christ Jesus"

If the teacher is to properly instruct the scholar, the teacher must have something to teach. Your Committee, while giving the highest praise to our gallant and unselfish band of Sunday-school teachers, yet deplore the fact that in too many cases classes are taught by those who have made no effort to prepare the lesson, and who consequently must fail to benefit their scholars. Your Committee recommend that pastors should establish classes for the teachers of the Sunday-schools, at which the subjects for the following Sunday should be taught by the pastor, and that, too, in such a way that the teacher may not only have the knowledge to impart, but may learn how to impart it.

Your Committee, while appreciating the value of what is popularly called "the leaflet system," feel constrained to utter a note of warning concerning it. There is a danger that in the pupil's mind it may become a substitute for the Holy Bible. In many cases it has, and such a result is deplorable. Your Committee, therefore, ask all pastors who use the leaflets to watch carefully and see that the open Bibles are to be found in the Sunday-school classes—whether the "leaflets" be used or not.

Your Committee would respectfully remind all ministers of the gospel of the vast importance of the Sunday-school in relation to the church. They earnestly trust that all pastors will give their schools the weight due to them; that they will visit them regularly—even though they be under the most excellent superintendence. Cordial and loving relations between the pastor and the young of the flock build up the church of to-morrow. The school is the nursery of the church. From it comes most of the candidates for confirmation, and if the pastor is on cordial terms with the spiritual children, how much more easy will it be for him, when they come to years of discretion, to gather them into classes of preparation—classes that ought to be held in all parishes—that when the Bishop comes to visit the church he may find those who come forward to receive a blessing, prepared not only in their hearts, but in their minds.

Your Committee would call the attention of the Council to another danger in connection with our Sunday-schools. It is that, instead of being, as they are, nurseries for the church, they should become substitutes for worship. They therefore recommend that pastors should hold bright children's services, from time to time, where, by a judicious use of collects and bright, tuneful hymns, the children might be brought to love the church building and the Prayer-Book, and realize that the church of their fathers was their own church too. The Church of Christ—"The Kingdom of God"—in the next generation is in the hands of our children. Therefore, suffer them to come to Him now, not only in Sunday-school, but in His Church, and "forbid them not."

Your Committee put themselves on record as being opposed to the giving of prizes in Sunday-schools.

Lastly, they urge on all pastors to impress on the youthful mind the duty of giving to God. It is more blessed to give than to receive. Giving, when it is done as a loving duty to God and regularly, not spasmodically, brings the blessing of the sacrificing spirit with it. Look how in response to the Bishop's appeal, the children of this Diocese, in loving, affectionate desire to do their duty, have, with their mite-boxes, taught their elders a lesson in giving. May that spirit grow in them; may they know every year more and more the blessing of giving to God. If they learn their lesson now, they will practice its principles in youth, manhood and old age; and then, indeed, when we are gathered to our Fathers, with the Church of our Fathers, it will be well.

The reports of the professors given below will show that the classes are faithfully prosecuting their respective courses of study.

The number of boys at the High School this session is exceptionally large, giving gratifying evidence of a continuance of public favor and patronage to this Diocesan School.

From the Committee on the High School Improvements we learn that the plan of improvement has been fully carried out at a cost of \$19,213.81, which has added greatly to the comfort of teachers and students, and to the general efficiency of the school. The buildings are heated by steam, and the water supply, if not all that could be desired, is sufficient for present practical purposes.

The buildings and grounds of the Theological Seminary were never before in as good a condition as at present, and the water supply abundant and of the best quality.

#### REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

## To the Board of Trustees

## of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully submits the following report of the studies pursued, in his classes, during the current session:

The Junior Class, for part of the session reciting once a week, have studied Chadbourne's Natural Theology, and have passed their examinations in it.

The Middle Class, reciting five times a week, have studied Butler's Analogy and Knapp's Theology. The former they have finished, and they are in review of the latter. To these have been added a weekly recitation on Robson's Revelation and Inspiration of Old and New Testament and Essays on Systematic Divinity.

The Senior Class, with three recitations per week, and the Wednesday evening exercise, have studied the Articles with Boultbie, and are now closing the review. They have, also, in Natural Theology studied Hopkin's Outline Man, and Homiletics in Dr. Broadus' book, with exercises.

I have also given to this class a course of lectures on Christian Ethics, also one on Liturgics, in connection with the Prayer-Book.

## REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF GREEK LANGUAGE, &C., &C.

## To the Board of Truslees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Greek Language, New Testament Literature, Church Polity and Pastoral Theology respectfully submits the following report:

The Senior Class has read in Greek, along with Ellicott's Series of Commentaries, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, the Catholic and Pastoral Epistles, and the Apocalypse. They have also read in the same way twenty chapters of St. Luke's Gospel. In Polity they have studied the third, seventh and part of the fifth book of Hooker, also Butler's Protestant Episcopal Doctrine and Church Unity. They have also studied Schaff's Companion to the Greek Testament. They have yet to study Meade on the Pastoral Office, with parallel references to Bedell.

The Middle Class has read in Greek, with the same series of Commentaries, and Beet on Romans, the Epistles of St. Paul's Third Missionary Journey, the Epistle to the Hebrews, and are now reading the Epistle to the Ephesians.

The Junior Class has read in Greek, with the same Commentaries, St. John and St. Matthew, with parallel references to the Synoptic Gospels. They are now reading 1st Thessalonians and studying Schaff's Companion to the New Testament.

In accordance with the request of the Trustees he makes a practice of attending the recitations of the Preparatory Classes at least once a month, and finds them faithfully and successfully taught.

# REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF HEBREW, ORIENTAL LANGUAGES AND APOLOGETICS.

## To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Senior Class has read critically in Hebrew selected from portions of all the Prophets, analyzing the several books and studying carefully the periods and events of their ministries. The study of Hebrew Syntax continued, and special attention given to the development of Messianic prophecy.

The Middle Class has read eighteen Psalms critically, also selected portions of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, and Job, in connection with introduction to the same, special attention being given to the principles of Hebrew Poetry and their application. It has also studied Harper's Syntax.

The Juniors have read in Hebrew portions of Genesis, Exodus, Deuteronomy, and other Historical Books, mastering the elements of Hebrew

Grammar and Accentuation, also the elements of Hebrew Syntax. The aim is to familiarize them with the entire range of Historical Hebrew, and for the final examination they are required to read it at sight. The Higher Criticism is thoroughly explained together with its most important application. The usual instruction in Apologetics is given supplemented by lectures.

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY AND CANON LAW.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Ecclesiastical History and Canon Law respectfully submits the following report:

The Senior Class has studied and been examined upon the first two volumes of Perry's History of the Church of England, which goes down to 1717 A. D., the silencing of Convocation. Lectures have been delivered by the Professor upon the history of the Church after that date, and the class has been assigned as parallel reading the third volume of Perry, Ryle's Christian Leaders in the Last Century, Seeley's Later Evangelical Fathers, and Tulloch's Religious Thought in Britain during the Nineteenth Century. Time for this reading is gained by abandoning the system of recitation for the last half year. The lectures are general discussions and criticisms of the successive phases of religious life in England, and more particularly in the Established Church, and are meant to be directive of investigation and private study. Each student is requested to select for special study some one movement in the eighteenth or nineteenth century, as for example the Great Awakening of the eighteenth century, or the Evangelical Movement, or the Tractarian Movement, or the Broad Church Movement, or some one representative writer like Wesley, or Coleridge, or Arnold, or Newman, or F. W. Robertson. In some cases the results of these private studies are given to the class in a lecture. The great aim in this part of the course is to incite the students to research, and to introduce more of the co-operative method of historical study. The class is now studying the Constitution and Canons, and hearing lectures on American Church History, and will be occupied in this way until the close of the session, when there will be a general examination upon the whole period, and a more particular examination for each student upon his chosen movement or author.

The Middle Class has studied and been examined upon the two volumes of Smith's Student's Ecclesiastical History, and is at present studying Fisher's History of the Christian Church. It has read as parallel reading

Trench's Midiæval Church History. Essays have been prepared and read upon assigned topics by the members of the class.

The Junior Class has read and been examined upon Smith's Old and New Testament Histories and the Acts of the Apostles in the Greek, which was used as a basis for the discussion of the Constitution and Ordinances of the Primitive Church. The remainder of the session will be devoted to reading in class some of the early uncanonical Christian writings, and in an examination of the light that they throw upon the polity, doctrine, life and worship of the early Church. Essays are read by this class also upon assigned topics. The parallel reading required of it is the Apocrypha.

ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT TO TRUSTEES (1892).

Right Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D.,

President of the Board of Trustees:

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School, I have the honor to submit the following report:

The whole number of pupils entered this session is 106, the maximum attendance being 102. It was never but twice before larger—i. e., once in Mr. Pendleton's time and once in mine. The general behavior of the boys has been such as to compare favorably with our best previous years, and the general health of the school was never better.

The improvements in equipment and building so liberally provided by the Trustees during the past vacation have been gratefully appreciated by the boys as well as by myself. No school within my knowledge has better equipped or finer rooms for study and class purposes, or a finer diningroom; while the neat little sleeping apartments (one for each boy, with wardrobe, washstand, etc., complete) give great satisfaction. The steamheating and bath-room arrangements have proved just what was desired.

There has been no abatement in the endeavor heretofore constantly made to bring the best moral and religious influences to bear upon those committed to my charge, and encouragement has not been wanting. In every such effort the co-operation of Mr. A. H. Mellen, of the Seminary Senior Class, who has the charge of the Friday night meeting, and of my honored friend, the Rev. Professor Kinloch Nelson, who has continued chaplain to the school, have been invaluable. Few boys similarly situated have pastoral oversight so efficient and tender as that afforded here by Dr. Nelson

Fourteen have been confirmed during the session, and the number of communicants among the boys is forty-two.

#### REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN.

### To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Library has been kept regularly open for consultation on the part of students during the session now current, with due official attendance on the part of the Assistant or Sub-assistant Librarian for two hours daily.

It is gratifying to record the addition to its manifold compartments of a goodly number of valuable books by purchase and by donation. There have been added by purchase one hundred and five (105) volumes; by gift of the Rev. Charles R. Howard, four hundred and twenty-five (425) volumes; by gift of the Rev. John A. Greaves (now of England), eighty (80) volumes—an aggregate of six hundred and ten (610) volumes. We are indebted to Mr. James M. Garnett for the gift of a "Reduced Fac-simile of Folio 40 of the Codex Sinaiticus;" and to the Rev. C. H. Thomson, for a "Chart of the Chinese Pantheon."

Attention has been heretofore called to the need of ampler shelf-room for new books almost daily coming in. That the shelves are now becoming overcrowded would seem to render the erection of a larger building, or, in default of so much, some suitable additions to the present building, by way of annex, highly desirable.

# Rev. J. W. Ware offered the following:

Resolved, That the Council declines to receive and enter upon its minutes the report of the Theological Seminary and High School.

The resolution was laid upon the table.

Rev. G. Moseley Murray, from the Committee on Vacant Parishes appointed by the last Council, presented the report.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON VACANT PARISHES.

Special: The committee appointed at the last Council in accordance with the following resolution, viz: "Resolved, That so much of the report on the State of the Church as applies to the vacant parishes be referred to a special committee of five, who shall take the whole matter into consideration, and devise a scheme which shall meet the need of said parishes, and report to the next Council," respectfully present their report as follows:

#### Report of Committee on Vacant Parishes.

Pursuant to call of the Chairman the committee met in Richmond, and after due deliberation unanimously adopted the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Council request and authorize the several Convocations within the Diocese to thoroughly inform themselves of the condition and needs of the vacant churches and parishes within their several bounds.

Further, That said Convocations shall canvass each of the said parishes and secure from each church or parish an engagement to co-operate, as long as vacant, with the committee's plan, and in earnest of their co-operation to pledge a sum not less than one hundred dollars per annum, the same to be paid in quarterly payments in advance, such payments to be made to the Diocesan Missionary Society towards the support of a minister.

Further, That the several Convocations shall then recommend such combinations of churches as they shall have found practicable to the Diocesan Missionary Society, and ask for their assistance to make up whatever deficiency there may be in the stipends of the several clergymen who shall have the charge of such several combinations, and that the Diocesan Missionary Society render the assistance as asked.

Further, That any vacant parish or church that shall decline to co-operate by payment of not less than one hundred dollars shall not be included within the said combination, and shall not be participator in the benefits arising therefrom.

Your committee offers the above resolution and urgently asks for its adoption—

First. Because we believe that while the evangelists have accomplished a noble work in the Diocese, and have faithfully and zealously discharged their duties, have opened up the way, and have ploughed the ground, and that they have fulfilled their mission; plainly, they have finished their work.

Second. Because as organization is essential to success in all of life's affairs, and being confident of this, we urge organization and system in this matter of supplying the needs of the Church. We believe it is for us to go on now and bring to a successful issue by wise methods what our evangelists have so well begun. We urge the adoption of this resolution.

Third. Because we are convinced that in spite of all that our evangelists have so faithfully done, the vacant parishes for the most part do not prosper under the present system. Occasionally, when the evangelist makes his visit, they rouse themselves to something like life, but they are learning to be satisfied with these occasional services, they show little or no growth, and for the most part they contribute little or nothing to the general work of the Church, and quoting from Our Diocesan Work of April, "with some notable exceptions the vacant churches do very little, though the whole expense of the evangelists is on their account." We urge the adoption of this resolution.

Fourth. Because we are confident that under such a plan of combination the several parishes would wake up to their responsibilities, when they find Report of Committee on Division of the Diocese.

that they have to pay for their privileges, and because we fully believe that the establishment (under this plan) of a pastorate among the people will give them an incentive to do what they will never do under an evangelistic ministry. We urge the adoption of this resolution.

Fifth. Because we are convinced that co-operation and sympathy between the several Convocations and the Diocesan Missionary Society are in the highest degree desirable.

Resolved. That we recommit the report to the Committee, with the request that they present a plan of working the vacant parishes in accordance with Canon law and under the constituted authorities of the Church, and to report to this Council at five o'clock this afternoon.

The motion to recommit was adopted.

Mr. C. M. Blackford, from the Committee on Arrangements Preparatory to the Division of the Diocese, presented the following report:

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DIVISION OF THE DIOCESE.

Whereas, this Council has, in accordance with the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States, given its consent to a division thereof, as set forth in the resolution heretofore adopted, and now wishes to give effect to the said consent and cause said division to be consummated as speedily as possible,

- 1. Be it resolved, That the Bishop of this Diocese be and hereby is respectfully requested to give his consent to the proposed division.
- 2. That if the consent of the Bishop be given, then the General Convention is respectfully requested to give its consent to said division; and to that end, should the consent of the Bishop be given, as above requested, the Secretary of this Council is directed to prepare two copies of the resolution in regard to said division adopted on yesterday, of the report of the Committee, which was the basis thereof, and of these resolutions and of the action of the Bishop consenting to the division, and cause the same to be certified by the President of this Council and by himself, and then to forward one copy thereof to the Secretary of the House of Bishops, and the other copy to the Secretary of the House of Deputies, for the consideration of their respective houses.
- 3. That in case of the consent of the Bishop to such division, the Clerical and Lay deputies from this Diocese to the General Convention be and

hereby are instructed, and the Bishop and Assistant Bishop are requested to present the said resolutions, report and action of the Bishop to the General Convention, and for and in behalf of this Diocese ask that the consent of said Convention be given to said division, and at the same time and with the petition making such request, present to said Convention such statistics, duly certified by the President of this Council and its Secretary, being taken from the Parochial reports, as will assure the said Convention that after such division both the old and the new Diocese can easily make a suitable provision for the support of the Episcopate therein, and that in each Diocese there will be more than twelve parishes and more than twelve presbyters who have been for at least one year canonically resident therein, regularly settled in a parish, and qualified to vote for a Bishop.

And the Secretary shall furnish and cause to be printed these and any other statistics which may be requisite to inform the General Convention of the numerical and financial strength, and the territorial extent of both the proposed and the old Diocese, after the new has been separated therefrom, and any other information which may tend to prove that both of said Dioceses conform to the constitutional requirements in case of such division.

The report was received and its resolutions unanimously adopted.

Rev. Dr. Barten presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee would open their report with an expression of their sorrow at the necessary and unavoidable absence of our senior Bishop. Mindful of his great sufferings, and the patience with which he has borne the afflictive dispensation of God's providence, we assure him of our sympathy and our prayers. May God look down from Heaven, behold, visit and speedily relieve His servant; look upon him with the eyes of His mercy; give him comfort and more confidence in Him; defend him from the danger of the enemy, and keep him in perpetual peace and safety.

Your Committee have examined the various papers placed at their disposal and, both from the addresses of our Bishops and such of the Parochial Reports as have been handed in and formulated, may congratulate the Diocese upon the continued growth and prosperity of our Church. It is a steady growth—uniform and healthy—showing in its results the wisdom and zeal of the Clergy and the energy and faithful continuance in well-doing of an earnest and devoted Laity.

The Committee feels that we are meeting this year under peculiar circumstances, and that the Ninety-Seventh Annual Council of the Protestant

Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia must be ever memorable in the history of the Diocese. It may be the last time that we meet as one body. Another year may find us two bands, but always one in heart and Christian affection. This great old Diocese, honored and beloved, will always continue one in spirit and, we trust, one in doctrine and practice. In the Providence of God and as an ecclesiastical necessity, forced upon her by a divinely given growth, division has taken place, and may again and again take place, but the great and noble Province of Virginia, enfolding all her children-north and south, east and west-will ever continue an inspiring monument in the Church of the great work done within her borders-done in troublous times-but done well by true and faithful men in the fear of God and the spirit of their Lord; for let it be remembered, and we may be justly proud of it, this Diocese has always represented, and even in her darkest days has been faithful to, the vital, fundamental conditions of true Apostolic Church growth. She has always been (and may she ever continue) a true Apostolic Church.

We are living in sober, solemn times—the hostile forces of the world and of a highly trained intellectualism are pressing us on every side. Special care and effort and great wisdom are needed, alike in the choice of the means of our defence and the method of an aggressive warfare. God has supplied to us these means, and has provided an instrumentality good and perfect, which cannot fail. It is the Gospel of Jesus Christ-the truth as it is in Jesus, written in scripture and handed down to us by and in the Church. It is pre-eminently God's truth. He prepared it for such a purpose in all its variety of form and beauty, and He inspired holy men to preach it for the regeneration of the world. Gospel truth, that truth which centres in the Cross of Christ, which was all that the Apostles cared to know in their Apostolic work—it alone has power over the human mind, and can rightly move the heart for religious ends. It is sealed upon the heart by the Divine Spirit. This Gospel truth was the strength of the early Apostolic Church. It began to operate with wondrous power as soon as proclaimed after the ascension of Jesus, and the Divine, all potent spell has gone with it ever since. It has not only revolutionized the world's thought and greatly modified and moulded its practice and life on a multitude of subjects connected with morals and religion, but it has savingly affected and has lovingly gathered to Christ an endless harvest of the saved. This it does to day! The past is an encouragement to constant and world-wide effort. And nowhere has this truth been more faithfully preached than in our own Diocese, and nowhere have the fruits of such preachings been more conspicuously manifest than in the simple, consistent, almost primitive lives of many of her Clergy and Laity. A blessed experience shows that God is still with His Church as of old-that the Divine presence is both our safeguard and inspiration. It is true, supernatural signs and wonders have ceased. It has pleased the Father, in His infinite wisdom, to withdraw for a time all outReport of Committee on the State of the Church.

ward manifestations of wonder and surprise. No inspired Apostle can now vindicate with immediate and visible judgment the sentence of God's wrath upon those who believe not in this sacred presence, and insult it by their manner and conduct, their professions, their offerings and gifts. But God is with us as of old, and we see and feel His presence in many wonderful ways. Still sinners are arrested; souls are converted; men are brought to God; the enemy is put to flight, and believers are built up in their most precious faith; the glory of God is seen and felt in the rapid extension of the Kingdom and the ever stronger spiritual rule of God. The Church is grateful for this fact; she rejoices in what may be truly called the living indications of a speedy victory for Christ. She rejoices in that holy presence and gives it full expression, alike in her teaching, in her worship, and in her daily life she endeavors to serve God acceptably with reverence and Godly fear.

And may not this be the reason of another hopeful sign, most cheering and comforting to us, the constant, steady drift toward this true and Apostolic Church of ours? No one can watch the proceedings of other Christian bodies about us, or scan our confirmation and ordination lists, without feeling convinced that there is a strong inducement which is leading many devout persons nearer and nearer to this Church. In the judgment of large numbers, there really exists no good reason for longer separation, and they are steadily, if slowly, coming back to the Church. The Church should gladly encourage such a movement, and lovingly receive all those who desire to enter and become part of our communion. We should avoid all boastfulness, and, above all, remember that such a state of things imposes upon her great responsibilities and duties. She must emphasize the great churchly principle of the membership of all who are baptized in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and recognize the manifold gifts of God's grace, working in the hearts of men and setting forth His glory in the world. She must also remain true to her Divine teaching; stand firmly on the three essential signs of a true church: her Apostolic faith, her divinely instituted sacraments, her apostolic ministry.

The attitude of our Church as a body is not one of arrogant indifference to the great religious bodies all around it, but one of tender and loving interest, regarding all who differ kindly, but clinging to the truth with a firm and steadfast grasp, and following a polity which has always existed in the Christian church, and is as old as Christianity itself—which for many centuries was never departed from—which is primitive and Apostolic.

The truth—precious above words—should be carefully and wisely administered. The Committee, therefore, cannot sufficiently emphasize the great need of more carefully training our people in the fuller knowledge of it. It may be questioned whether this matter is pushed as it ought to be, and whether our people are aware of the necessity of a more intelligent, a more thoughtful and a carefully instructed churchmanship. How often do we fail

in our efforts to give a satisfactory reason for our faith and our Church, and the distinctive differences that keep us apart from others? There can be no doubt of the fact that, especially in our Sunday-schools and Bible classes, and, later on, in our parochial instructions, much remains to be desired in this direction. Are our children sufficiently trained in the great descriptive truths and duties of our faith? Are these sufficiently pressed home upon the mind, the heart, the conscience of our children? Is there not, perhaps, too much attention paid to a somewhat desultory teaching of the Scriptures; and might not a plainer, simpler plan of combining Bible truth and church doctrine, systematically constructed and carefully presented according to the church year and its teachings, prove more forceful and desirable?

We need more knowledge, more instruction, more skillful training and a higher intelligence to keep us steadfast in the faith, and earnest, devout and wise in Apostolic life and practice.

But as a happy and most grateful offset to any possible deficiency in the line just indicated, we must call your attention to the many indications of a new and vigorous parochial life, felt all through our parishes and churches. The laity has literally, like the sun, come forth as a bride-groom out of his chamber, and rejoiceth as a giant to run his course. There has been a great awakening in our churches—a season of refreshing from on high.

The healthy and most successful work of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and the earnest efforts and warm and thoughtful aid of the Women's Auxiliary Societies may be a new departure, but it is a departure in the right direction. They are but in their incipiency, and yet already so richly blessed, they fill our hearts with joy and gratitude, for we welcome them as the strong signs of God's blessing and the Spirit's presence and operation in the Church, and accepted as pleages of untold blessings still to come.

The Church, then, of Virginia is safe, is prosperous, is divinely blessed, continues true to her high vantage ground, is true and Apostolic—beloved of God. Let the past inspire the future. Separated we may be in name, divided into different separate bands, each marshalled by its own able and devoted head, yet we shall ever continue one in spirit and in love, be only so many parts of one great whole. The Diocese of Virginia may become smaller and smaller—first west, then South—and who knows in coming days how many more partitions and partings may take place, but the great province of Virginia will always remain, will continue to act as one with her many bishops, will for all time show to the Church the power of loyal hearts, knit together in simple faith, in earnest love, and in humble, child-like obedience to God, who doeth all things well.

May God forever bless all our Bishops, all our Clergy, and all our Laity, and keep Virginia as the apple of His eye.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH FUNDS.

# An Act to Incorporate the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

Approved February 2, 1892.

Whereas the members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Commonwealth of Virginia have raised and contributed certain funds for the support of their disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of their deceased clergy, and the Episcopate of said Church within this Commonwealth; and whereas, in order to successfully administer the said funds and such additions thereto as may hereafter accrue or be made, it is needful to create a corporation which shall receive, hold and administer the same; now, therefore,

- 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That Right Reverend F. M. Whittle, Reverend C. J. Gibson, D. D., Reverend T. G. Dashiell, D. D., Reverend D. F. Sprigg, D. D., Reverend J. B. Funsten, Messrs. Charles E. Whitlock, Joseph Bryan, E. B. Addison, B. J. Barbour, John F. Glenn, Cyrus Bossieux, F. H. McGuire, William H. Palmer, Arthur Herbert, and Charles R. Hooff, and their successors, be and they are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name and style of the trustees of the funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and may sue and be sued, with power to take, receive and hold to themselves and their successors, subscriptions, gifts and contributions for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other charitable purpose of said Church in said diocese, and the same to invest, hold, distribute and apply for the purposes aforesaid, but subject to the control of the Council of the said Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, as it shall be from time to time constituted; provided that the value of the property so held shall not exceed at any one time, for each of said funds, the sum of five hundred thousand dollars.
- 2. That the said trustees and their successors shall have power to appoint from their number such officers and committees (under such rules and by such means as they may adopt) as shall be necessary and proper for the due management, control and administration of the funds and other property committed to the said corporation for the purposes aforesaid, and may invest the said officers and committees with such powers as the said corporation shall deem best adapted to accomplish the objects and purposes of this act.
- 3. That the said trustees shall have power to make and establish from time to time such by-laws and regulations, not contrary to the directions of

the said Council, the laws of this Commonwealth or of the United States, as they may deem proper for the management of said corporation and best fitted to accomplish its objects and purposes; and a majority of said board of trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

- 4. That the said trustees shall have power to fill any vacancy which may occur in their body arising from death, resignation, inability or refusal to act, removal from this Commonwealth, or other cause declared by the bylaws sufficient to create a vacancy; provided that such vacancy shall be filled by the selection of one of two or more persons nominated therefor by the said Council; and, provided, that in case no such nomination be made by said Council at its next meeting after receiving notice of such vacancy, then said trustees may fill such vacancy; and upon any successor elected under the provisions of this act shall be conferred the same powers and imposed the same duties as if his name had been mentioned as one of the incorporators herein.
- 5. That the said trustees shall submit annually to the said Council a full statement and report of the funds in their hands or under their charge and of their transactions during the past year.
  - 6. This act shall be in force from its passage.

The undersigned, committee appointed by the Bishop, to apply on behalf of the Council to the General Assembly for the enactment of the charter adopted by the Council last year, incorporating the "Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia" (printed on pages 89-90, JOURNAL of 1891), respectfully report that they have performed the duty imposed upon them, and have secured the passage of the act exactly as proposed and adopted by the Council.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Council accept the act passed by the last Legislature of Virginia incorporating the "Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia," approved February 2, 1892; and the corporators named in said act are hereby requested to meet and organize, and, therefore, are hereby authorized and directed to take charge of the funds contemplated in said act.

# Mr. J. R. Jones presented the report of the Committee on Finance:

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The account of the Treasurer of the Diocese has been examined and found correct, and sustained by proper vouchers. The receipts from the Contingent Fund for year ending May, 1892, were \$12,829.62. Balance on hand May 19, 1891, was \$3,607.50. Interest on deposits was \$157.62. Collected for Contingent Fund—source not reported, \$21.00; making total receipts of \$16,615.74. Expenses for the past year were \$10,025.60. Balance in hands of Treasurer, \$6,590.14; which sum is bearing interest.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. That the Treasurer pay the customary charges for the salaries of the Bishop and Assistant Bishop, Secretary, Chaplains and other customary expenses, including rent of the residence of the Assistant Bishop, the sums of \$25 to the Assistant Secretary of this Council, and \$15 to the Sexton of Epiphany Church, Danville.
- 2. That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the expenses of the Committee on "Division of the Diocese," and of the Delegates to the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church from the Diocese of Virginia.

The resolution was adopted.

The tellers of the vote for Clerical Deputies reported the result of the ballot for the remaining Deputy:

Total vote cast, 140; necessary to a choice, 71. Rev. B. D. Tucker received 71 votes, and was declared elected.

The Council then proceeded to ballot for four alternate Clerical Deputies.

Report of the Committee on New Parishes.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on New Parishes respectfully report that they have had referred to them—

First. A petition from the congregation of St. Andrew's Church, a mission church in the parish of Henrico, praying to be admitted into union with the Council as an independent church with representation. The requirements of the Canons have been complied with, and the church is self-supporting. We respectfully recommend that the petition of St. Andrew's Church in Richmond be granted.

Second. A petition from certain members of Mt. Olivet Parish, Roanoke, asking to be set apart and constituted a separate and independent church of said parish, under the name of Christ Church. The requirements of the Canons have been complied with. The congregation is represented as being able to build a house of worship and support a minister. We therefore recommend that the prayer of these petitioners be granted.

Third. A petition from the congregation of Calvary Church, Ridley Parish, Culpeper county, asking that there be set apart from Ridley Parish so much thereof as is contained within the following bounds—to-wit: Beginning at Newman's Ford on Rapidan river, and running thence in an air line through Winston Station on the Richmond and Danville Railroad to the boundary line between Ridley and St. Mark's Parishes; thence with this line to a point where it meets the line between Ridley and Slaughter Parishes; thence with this line to Newman's Ford, the beginning; and that the same be attached to Slaughter Parish.

The Canonical provisions for dividing a parish, requiring three months' notice of the intention to apply for such division to be given to the Bishop and Vestry, have, it appears, been complied with

The Canons make no provision for detaching a portion of territory, or a church, from one parish and joining it to another. But this has been done we believe, by the Council in the past, and we suppose it is competent for it to do so in this case. We therefore recommend that the prayer of the petitioners of Calvary Church, Ridley Parish, be granted.

In making this recommendation your Committee express no opinion as to any differences which may exist between a majority of this congregation and the rest of their parish. They make it because they think Calvary Church will be an element of weakness rather than of strength if it remains in Ridley Parish, while it may be strong and useful in connection with Slaughter Parish.

Your Committee would, however, earnestly deprecate this proposed action ever being urged as a precedent to encourage or to justify the division of our parishes, or changing their boundaries, on the motion of a small part thereof, or because of unfortunate disagreement between congregations or neighborhoods in a parish. #### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CLERICAL SUPPORT.

The Committee on Clerical Support begs to report as follows:

They find from the JOURNAL that there are in the Diocese one hundred and forty parishes and two hundred and forty churches, from which they have received one hundred and thirty-one parish and church Treasurers' reports. Seventy-six churches report having rectories.

The following churches report having paid more to the rector than they promised: St. John's, Elizabeth City; St. Paul's, Hanover; Ritchie Memorial, Prince George, Meade Memorial, Chesterfield; St. Paul's and Grace, Prince William.

Your Committee finds that there are fourteen ministers in the Diocese who receive as salary less than five hundred dollars per annum. They regard this support as inadequate, and they earnestly urge that additional provision be made for the support of these clergymen. They also suggest that all the vestries throughout the Diocese so arrange the payment of the rectors' salaries that the end of the year will fall at the same time as the Church Year, and thus avoid much complication in the reports.

Christ Church, Winchester, Va., deserves special mention. From its report it appears that in addition to the full payment of the regular salary of the minister, insurance is carried upon the life of the rector amounting to \$7,500. We urge all the churches whose financial strength permits to emulate in this regard the worthy example of Christ Church, Winchester.

Whereas, it is expedient that special provision be made to secure regular ministrations in the vacant churches of this Diocese in order that the comforts of our religion may be afforded to churchmen who would otherwise be without a pastor—

- r. Resolved, That the Bishop is requested to combine, in such convenient association as he may deem wisest, two or more of the vacant churches of this Diocese, or to combine in such associations one or more vacant churches with an occupied church, regardless of parish lines.
- 2. When there is no vestry elected for any such vacant church, the Bishop is requested to secure the election in due form and order of a vestry for such church.
- 3. The Bishop is requested to recommend to the vestries of the several churches to be combined in the association, approved by him, of a minister to be the rector or minister in charge of each of said churches; and said minister shall receive such salary as may be approved by the Bishop, to be apportioned among the several churches of said association in such amounts as each church may agree to contribute.

Provided, that if, in the judgment of the Bishop, the several churches shall make a proper contribution to the salary of the minister the deficiency, if any, shall, upon the recommendation of the Bishop, be made up and paid by the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Provided further, the Diocesan Missionary Society shall be under no obligation to make any appropriation for any church which shall fail or refuse to accept the recommendation of the Bishop touching the association of churches herein provided for.

Rev. H. B. Lee moved to continue the Committee, with instructions to report to the next Council. Carried.

On motion, the Council adjourned to meet at 9 A. M. to-morrow.

NOTE.—The Convocations and Evangelists of this Diocese are requested to afford the Bishop
all the information and assistance in their power in his effort to fill the vacant churches in this
Diocese, and to sustain the ministers thereof.

# SATURDAY, May 21st.

The Council met at 9 A. M. for Divine service. Morning prayer was read by Revs. L. R. Mason and C. B. Bryan.

# Mr. W. W. Old offered the following:

Resolved, That the members of this Council hereby tender their hearty thanks to the rectors and officers of Epiphany Church, Danville; to the members of the congregation and citizens generally of the city for their generous and overflowing hospitality to and arrangements for the comfort of its delegates; to the members of the choir of Epiphany Church, and to the pages who have contributed their assistance during the session of the Council, and to the railroad and steamboat lines for their courtesies to the delegates in attendance; and, in parting, we wish continued health and strength to the senior rector of this parish. May God continue to bless him and his people.

Mr. T. C. Elder presented the Report of the Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA FEMALE INSTITUTE.

The Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute beg leave to report to the Council that Mrs. General J. E. B. Stuart, Principal of this school, has recently made to the Board the annual report, giving an account of the condition of the school and its work during the current session, now very near its close. This report of the Principal is herewith submitted.

It appears there have been on the roll this session eighty-five boarders and thirty-one day pupils, making a total of one hundred and sixteen.

Quite a number of applications for the admission of boarding pupils had to be rejected for want of accommodations.

The health of the school has been good; the deportment of the pupils excellent; their application praiseworthy.

On the occasion of the recent visit of Bishop Randolph to Trinity Church, Staunton, twelve young ladies of this Diocesan Seminary were presented for confirmation. The Principal and her efficient corps of teachers manifest as much concern in respect to the moral and religious training of the girls under their charge as they do in respect to their application and progress in the different branches of secular learning.

#### Annual Report of the Virginia Female Institute.

Nor is the physical health and welfare of the inmates of the school neglected. The management and discipline are conducive to the preservation of health; and when a pupil becomes indisposed she receives the most considerate and kindly attention.

Daughters of clergymen of the Church are admitted on most favorable terms, and a certain number of other young ladies whose means are limited receive each year the benfits of this Institution.

The grounds are well kept and present an inviting appearance; the buildings are in thorough repair; and the debt on the property is being reduced. So from a business and financial point of view the condition of the Institute is greatly improved.

Indeed, when its affairs are viewed as a whole, it may justly be claimed to be in a prosperous condition.

The Principal again calls attention to the urgent need of enlarged accommodations, especially in the way of class-rooms and of a hall for public occasions. No one who has attended the commencement exercises of the Institute in late years can have failed to be impressed with the need of a more capacious and better appointed room for the accommodation of public audiences than the one now used for this purpose. The Institute is at present without means to make the suggested improvements that are so much needed.

No better place can be found in this Diocese, or perhaps anywhere in this section of our country, for the exercise of the benevolence of those persons of means who are interested in the education of girls at a church school than here at our Diocesan Female Seminary.

This Board can, without reserve or qualification, recommend to this Diocese and to the Church at large the Virginia Female Institute as a school worthy of the patronage and support of church people.

#### To the Board of Trustees:

I am reminded, by the Chairman of the Local Board, that the time is again at hand when my annual report must be made of the condition of your Diocesan school for girls—showing its status for the session now drawing to a close.

We have on our roll eighty-five (85) boarders and thirty-one (31) day pupils, with many States represented. Some fifteen or twenty who desired admission could not be received for want of room. My day school has not been quite so large as usual—a number of the older pupils having finished their scholastic work.

Annual Report of the Virginia Female Institute.

I have again this session had the daughters of seven clergymen, two of whom are again with me at little or no expense, and, in addition to these, I have, as heretofore, granted "Scholarships" to seven others.

Our work done by the pupils has been very good—some making a very high grade—and the conduct and general bearing of all under our care has never been better. Twelve (12) were presented to the Bishop for confirmation, and one was confirmed at her home in Charlottesville.

Notwithstanding the unusually trying winter, the health of our pupils has been good. We have had some sickness, but only in one or two cases did we for a few days use the room set apart as an infirmary. We mourn the loss of one from our midst. She was a delicate girl, and, after being with us only a few weeks, went home, and from acute and severe illness died rather suddenly a short time since.

Our buildings are in excellent repair, and the grounds are the admiration of all. We constantly regret, however, that some large-hearted and wealthy layman does not come to the front, and do for our school what is done for so many and what is so necessary—that is, add to its present well-built buildings a large and attractive hall. In order to have this, on a proper footing with other schools of the same character, it is, I may say, an absolute necessity, and I have more than once called the attention of the Church to it, yet with no effect. May we not be encouraged, this Council, by a renewal of the old interest in their school for girls, and see some active measures taken at once towards the early accomplishment of the work suggested.

Your aid and your prayers are asked for this your Diocesan school, that it may ever be worthy your truest confidence, and that God in His mercy may continue to bless it.

Mr. L. M. Blackford presented the report of the Committee on the Brotherhood.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE BROTHERHOOD.

The Committee on the Brotherhood beg leave to submit the following report:

Two Clerical members of the Brotherhood—the Rev. Drs. J. Peterkin and R. T. Davis—have entered into rest since the last Council, but, at their earnest request, no assessment in behalf of their heirs will be made.

There is to the credit of the Brotherhood in the Citizens Bank of Richmond, \$838.62, besides two six per cent. City of Manchester bonds of \$1,000 each.

Your Committee of last year recommended, and the Council ultimately adopted, the report of the Committee (of which Colonel Skinner was chairman) in relation to improvement in the organization of the Brotherhood. Notwithstanding this, no action in pursuance of the resolutions has been taken, and since the resignation by Major D. N. Walker of the presidency a year ago, the organization has been without a head. We recommend that prompt and active measures be taken by the Board of Managers in Richmond to select a President, and otherwise to set in operation the reorganization already approved by the Council.

# Rev. R. A. Goodwin offered the following:

Resolved, 1. That the delegates of this Council to the next General Convention be requested to confer with the delegates of the Diocese of West Virginia to the same Convention, and with their aid and consent endeavor to have Canon 7, Title III of the Digest so amended that if at any time it may seem expedient to form a Federate Council in Virginia, the Diocese of West Virginia (which, till the time of the war between the States, was a part of the State of Virginia, and when this Canon was enacted, was part of the Diocese of Virginia) may be included in the same.

Resolved, 2d. That our Bishops be requested to further the same object in the House of Bishops.

The resolution was adopted by a vote of 58 to 27.

# Rev. S. A. Wallis presented the following:

The Council of the Diocese of Virginia, sensible of the gravity of the changes in the Proposed Hymnal, set forth by the Committee on Hymnal Revision appointed by the General Convention, which would deprive the Church of many of its most valuable and best loved hymns, respectfully memorialize the General Convention that the following hymns contained in our present Hymnal, but omitted from the Proposed Hymnal, be retained and added to the said Proposed Hymnal set forth in 1889 by the Committee on the Hymnal appointed by the General Convention of 1886, and re-committed to a Hymnal Commission to report for final action at the General Convention of 1892:

President of the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School:

MY DEAR BISHOP—I respectfully report that the Divinity and Normal Departments of this Institution have been in constant operation during the past session. The results have been gratifying in some cases, and discouraging in others. We have had some pupils of good ability, but most with whom we have labored are not strong, so far as we have been able to discover, intellectually, morally or spiritually.

There will be four graduates (all girls) from the Normal Department to-morrow.

Only one student of the Divinity School is ready for ordination to the diaconate, though four applied for the ordination. Neither the Professors nor the Bishop's Chaplains considered the other three sufficiently familiar with the English language to enter the ministry, though strenuous efforts in this direction have been put forth for four years or more.

There have been thirteen students in the Divinity School. One of these is a Methodist minister. There is one young man in the Normal School who expects to enter a Divinity School next session.

Three of our Divinity students will probably take priest's orders. The matron, Mrs. Martha Payne, and the teachers of the Normal

The matron, Mrs. Martha Payne, and the teachers of the Normal School have been faithful and energetic. Professor Spencer will present his report. Good progress has been made in the Sewing School. The students have done the work assigned them on the grounds.

I have endeavored to give instruction to classes in the Divinity School in Bible History and Introduction, Church History, Apologetics, Homiletics and Pastoral Theology.

In the Normal School, I have met the Senior class regularly, every day, for study in the Prayer-Book, Church History and Logic.

We desire to make a few statements by way of addition and explanation.

When we made our last report there were no organized churches, now there are three; there were six communicants, now there are over fifty; there was one Sunday-school with five teachers, now there

are three with eleven teachers; there was one Parochial school with three teachers and seventy scholars, now there are two with eightyfive scholars and eight teachers; there were two candidates for orders, now there are three; there were two presbyters under appointment, now there are four; there were five workers all told, now there are nine.

In Porto Alegre, since January, eight persons have been admitted to the Holy Communion, and regular collections have been taken. Latterly a Christian society, numbering seven young men and boys, has been formed. It is proposed to make this into a chapter of St. Andrew's Brotherhood.

In the city of Rio Grande do Sul, a small congregation was in June last transferred by the Presbyterian Board of Missions to our care. We stationed there our catechist, Senhor Vicente Brande. He preaches to the congregation under our oversight until a presbyter can be definitely assigned to that important charge.

Last December, at a place called Contracto, some twenty miles from Porto Alegre, eleven persons were, after careful examination, admitted to the Communion. Later, one of our catechists, Senhor Boaventura d'Oliveira, was permanently stationed there with his family. This church has now twenty-three communicants, a regularly elected vestry, and money contributed for extraordinary and current expenses. The Holy Communion is celebrated each month by presbyters from Porto Alegre.

In August of last year the Rev. L. L. Kinsolving, by order of the Society, left for the United States. At the same time a promising young man, Senhor A. V. Cabral, was received as catechist and future candidate for orders. In October, the mission was strengthened by the arrival of Rev. W. C. Brown and wife, Rev. J. G. Meem, and Miss Mary Packard. For awhile Rev. and Mrs. Brown and Miss Packard were stationed at Rio Grande; but on further consideration, they all were in January of this year settled in Porto Alegre for the study of the language. These brethren have, however, all begun to work. Rev. Mr. Brown and Miss Packard teach regularly in the school, while the Rev. Mr. Meem makes frequent evangelistic tours into the country, either alone or in company with Senhor Cabral.

ENGLISH SERVICES.—The Rev. Mr. Brown, during his stay in Rio Grande, conducted regular services in English on Sunday. These were largely attended. He also officiated at the marriage of the English consul. In Porto Alegre, since January, we have held at our house an English service each Sunday morning. These services have been attended by only three or four persons besides ourselves.

OUR NEEDS—We have written, making three requests of the Society.

- 1. That a Bishop be sent as soon as possible to visit this mission. We need to have our affairs set in order, our people confirmed, and our candidates ordained.
- 2. That funds be sent us sufficient to purchase a suitable mission-house. One of the finest houses and most valuable pieces of property in city can be bought just now for about ten thousand dollars. This is about half value, and its purchase would go far to make our mission a great power in this city and State.
- 3. That we might send two youths to be educated at the Virginia Seminary. Their names are Jose' da Rocha and Alfredo Dias; we have proven them and find them faithful. They are very anxious to preach the Gospel, and they are able to take a thorough education. We need greatly some native Brazilians educated and equipped on the American methods.
