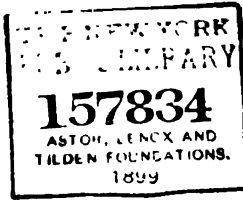

# RULES OF ORDER.

## ORGANIZATION.

- 1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.
- 2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand except to address the chair.

## ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- 1st. After the organization of the Council the following order of business shall be observed :

The appointment of a Treasurer *pro tempore* when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

- 2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the *second* day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

- A Committee on Parochial Reports.
- A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.
- A Committee on Elections.
- A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.
- A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of *ten* laymen.
- A Committee on Sunday Schools.

3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishops' Addresses the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such other Committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

## ORDER OF DEBATE.

1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.

2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit, or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

---

Rules of Order.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.

13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats with-

out the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or Wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectators shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and Wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 17, 1893.

The Ninety-Eighth Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia met at 10 A. M. this day in Christ Church, Winchester.

After the service the sermon was preached by the Rev. G. W. Nelson, Psalm cxxii, 6, after which the Holy Communion was administered.

There were present, in the chancel, the Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, Bishop of the Diocese; Bishop Randolph, of Southern Virginia, and Bishop Peterkin, of West Virginia, and Rev. Dr. H. Suter, and Revs. J. B. Newton and Angus Crawford.

The Council was called to order at 12:15 P. M., the Rev. Nelson P. Dame acting as secretary.

On motion, it was resolved to refer the above to a committee appointed by the Chair.

The account of Mr. A. Herbert, Treasurer of the Episcopal Fund, and report of the Treasurer of the Bruce Fund, and the report of the Treasurer of the Disabled Clergy Fund, were placed on the Secretary's table to be put into the hands of committees.

The Rev. L. W. Burton presented the following memorial:

The James River Convocation respectfully memorialize the Council of the Diocese to appoint a committee, which will consider and report to this Council upon the desirability of combining two or more parishes in the support of a joint rector as the only practical method of supplying vacant churches.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN  
MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia respectfully report :

That up to the time of the organization of the Diocese of Southern Virginia they assisted sixty parishes and two city churches, served by forty-five ministers in the undivided Diocese of Virginia, in sums running from \$50 to \$300, besides several colored ministers, making an aggregate of between eight and nine thousand dollars. They also paid the salaries of two Evangelists, amounting to \$3,000 per annum. Some of these ministers took charge of their work in the summer; two in the Diocese of Virginia have recently resigned and gone, one to a self-supporting Parish in Virginia and one to another Diocese; one Evangelist, Rev. James B. Funsten, resigned in the summer and took charge of Trinity Church, Portsmouth, and another, Rev. J. J. Norwood, is soon to take charge of Whittle Parish, Fauquier county, leaving but one Evangelist, Rev. Ev. Meade, in the field. When the Diocese of Southern Virginia was organized in November, 1892, the stipendiaries of that Diocese were turned over to the Diocesan Missionary Society of Southern Virginia, and a division of the funds in hand was made by the Treasurer, Mr. J. L. Williams, with the new Diocese. Of course our liabilities were diminished by these several causes, and the Treasurer has been able to meet all our engagements without borrowing. The amount received from Churches, Sunday-Schools, other children and individuals, in the Diocese of Virginia since the organization of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, according to the Treasurer's account, is about \$6,000, of which the children gave about \$1,800. We have in this Diocese twenty-five parishes and one city church, served by twenty two ministers, which receive aid from the Executive Committee Diocesan Missionary Society to the amount of \$3,375 per annum. We have also one Evangelist, Rev. Ev. Meade, whom the Executive Committee have engaged for a year, from 1st January, 1893, at a salary of \$1,500, and whom we think it important to keep in the field. There are also vacant parishes in Mathews, Middlesex, Essex, Westmoreland, Fairfax, Prince William, Fauquier and Hanover, most of which have heretofore been receiving help from the committee, and almost all of which will probably want help again as soon as they are supplied with ministers. Those that have become vacant in the last two or three years were helped by the committee to the amount of \$1,200, and if all of them should be supplied with ministers we should certainly be called upon for at least \$1,500; this, added to the Evangelist's salary makes \$3,000; this added to the \$3,375, now being paid out to the parishes, makes \$6,375, besides which there are other incidental expenses, so that we ought to have, in

order to do our work properly, at least \$7,000 a year. As far as we know, I believe our stipendiaries and Evangelist are doing good and faithful work. None are receiving too much and some are receiving less than they ought to have, if we had it to give them. In some cases results seem to be small, but we cannot always measure work by results any more than we can expect as good a crop from poor land as from rich land.

We have again to express our thankfulness to God, and our obligation to the dear children, to their parents, teachers and friends, for the liberal contributions they have made to the cause of Diocesan Missions, and we again urge the importance of keeping up in the children in Sunday-Schools and in families the habit of giving to Missionary work in some form or other throughout the year; to enable them to do this, we urge the congregations to pay the necessary expenses of the Sunday-Schools, which in most cases will be small, and when they are greater, as in city schools, the ability of the congregation will also be greater. We should be glad to do something more for Foreign Missions and not only for our Mission in Brazil, but for the General Missionary work of the Church of the United States. We see no better way of doing this than through the children, and no better way of training the children who are to be the future men and women of the church, in the habit and the love of giving to the Lord. As to Evangelistic service, we believe that one Evangelist will do for the whole Diocese; visiting only the vacant churches. We believe that too much Evangelistic service tends to paralyze the churches, to make them indifferent about getting a minister and indifferent about giving to Diocesan Missions or anything else. We believe, also, that if all the ministers of our several Conventions would pledge themselves to give one or two Sundays in the course of the year to vacant churches within their reach, they would help those churches, would help their own congregations by giving them the opportunity of hearing somebody else, and would help themselves by a little rest from sermon writing and pastoral work, and a little change of air and fare and society.

## BISHOP WHITTLE'S ADDRESS.

The Bishop then read his address.

## MY DEAR BRETHREN :

We are assembled in this Ninety-Eighth annual Council of our Church under circumstances greatly changed and very sad as compared with those of former years. Not only have several of our number been called to rest from their earthly labors, but one-half of our members, both clerical and lay, belonging now to a separate organization, will meet with us no more. While we can but rejoice at the growth and prosperity of our Church which seemed to make the formation of another Council necessary, we must all ever greatly miss and affectionately remember these beloved brethren, and deeply regret that we can no longer take sweet counsel with them and go to the house of God together.

The Council which met in Danville last year, by a large vote of both orders, cut off sixty-two counties of the State to form what is now the “Diocese of Southern Virginia.” Being absent from the Council I did not feel at liberty to withhold my consent to the line adopted, although it seemed to me to be a remarkable and unwise one, as it was hard to see how, with one of the two bishops in each Diocese, there could be, on the whole, any increase of Episcopal services, while nearly all expenses were doubled. The action of the Council

having been approved by the General Convention which sat in Baltimore in October, the division of the dear old Diocese of Virginia was completed and the Primary Council of the new Diocese was held under the provisions of the Constitution, in St. Paul's Church, Lynchburg, commencing November 23d, 1893. When the Council was duly organized I made a short address which I here repeat, because I desire that it may be placed on record in your Journal. That address was as follows:

"The Council being now organized and ready to proceed with its business, I have to detain you, dear brethren, while I perform a solemn and distressing duty.

"The time has come when I must declare with which of the two Dioceses into which the Diocese of Virginia has been divided I will cast in my lot for the future, and I ask first to be allowed to make a brief statement, which I desire may be entered on your Journal.

"For nearly twenty-five years I have stood in the closest official and other relations to the clergy of Virginia. During this quarter of a century I have been thus associated with perhaps not fewer than three hundred ministers in the Diocese. It would be strange if, during these years, some of my brethren had not often found themselves unable to approve of my official utterances and actions, and no doubt this has been the case. But I have the satisfaction of feeling assured that in none of them (with a solitary exception) have I excited by what I may have said or done any sentiment of personal hostility towards myself. On the contrary, all these beloved brethren (with the single exception which I have mentioned) in intercourse with me have invariably manifested their affectionate respect and confidence. And I may say the same of my dear brethren of the laity. I have gone in and out amongst them for all these years, and, so far as I know or believe, have never given offence to anyone, but have received from all the greatest kindness and consideration. I rejoice to be able to make this statement, and I do it with a profound sense of gratitude to God and of thankfulness to my brethren, while humbled by the consciousness of my own unworthiness. Whether I have reciprocated your feelings, or have shewn my appreciation of your conduct towards me, it is not for me to say. My whole past intercourse with you is a truer and better answer to this question than any professions on my part could be. And now it is unnecessary for me

to add, that all the brethren of the old Diocese are alike dear to me, and it is equally sad to sever the ties which unite me to those on the one side of the dividing line or on the other. But I must choose, and for reasons and in view of existing circumstances which I need not mention, I decide to continue my connection with the Diocese of Virginia. For the new Diocese, and for each one of its members, Clerical and Lay, I can only earnestly invoke God's ceaseless and abundant blessings.'

On concluding this address, and by request of Bishop Randolph, I announced to the Council that he elected to be attached to the new Diocese, and thereupon my connection with that Diocese was ended. All this as a matter of history. And I now proceed to give such information in regard to our own Diocese as I am required to lay before you.

In September, 1891, I was stricken down by sickness and since that time, until February last, have been unable to do anything out of my study, consequently there is but little work to report for the past year. But, by God's blessing, I am now so far recovered that I trust, while avoiding the excitement of public speaking, to be able to meet all the requirements of the Diocese for the future.

#### MINISTERS DECEASED.

It is my sad duty to report that three of our clerical brethren have departed this life during the past year.

The Rev. Richard Kidder Meade, son of the late Bishop Meade of Virginia, quietly passed away at his residence in Charlottesville, on the 17th day of November, 1892, in the eighty-first year of his age. He became rector of Christ Church, Charlottesville, (I think his only ministerial charge,) in the spring of 1836, and so continued until 1868, when he was obliged by the failure of his health to resign. He was a man of fine intellect, a good scholar and preacher, of deep and earnest convictions, modest and quiet in manners, and beloved by all who knew him. For many of the last years of his retired but useful life, he was the principal of the Piedmont Female Seminary, a successful school of high grade for girls. He gave two sons to the ministry of our church, Rev. Wm. H. Meade, D. D., and Rev. Frank A. Meade, who are both laboring in their native State.

The Rev. James S. Hanckel, D. D., of South Carolina, became the rector of Christ Church, Charlottesville, in 1868, and continued

its able preacher and faithful pastor until his death, August 22d, 1892, in the 77th year of his age. On coming to Virginia, Dr. Hanckel, by his ability and beautiful christian spirit, soon won the admiration, love and confidence of his brethren, and they were ever ready to manifest their appreciation of his character and talents by electing him to places of importance and trust. He was always sent as a deputy to the General Convention, and was an able and faithful examining chaplain of the Diocese from the creation of that office until the close of his useful life. His death is a loss to the Church at large as well as to his family, congregation and Diocese, but we cannot doubt their loss is his own great and eternal gain.

The Rev. Thomas Grayson Dashiell, D. D., was born in Prince William county, Virginia, December 15th, 1830. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Meade, July 14th, 1854, and Presbyter by Bishop Johns, June 16th, 1855. On his ordination to the diaconate he took charge of Cople Parish, Westmoreland county, where those of his old friends who remain, with their children and grandchildren, still bless the memory of his life and labors among them. He continued in his first charge until January, 1860, when he became assistant of St. James' Church, Richmond, and in 1866 started St. Mark's, in the same city, where by his fidelity, earnestness and zeal he gathered a large congregation. Declining health at length obliged him to give up the active work of his beloved church, and hoping to benefit or restore it, he sailed from New York, in January, for a warm Southern climate; but God had ordered otherwise, and he departed this life at Colon, Colombia, S. A., March 18th, 1893, in the sixty-third year of his age. Dr. Dashiell was, since May, 1863, or for nearly thirty years, the faithful, efficient, and accomplished Secretary of the Council. He was a man of godly character and life, and of great and varied abilities. There is no minister in the Diocese whose place, or I should rather say *places*—for he occupied a number of important and responsible ones—I think, will be found more difficult to fill. Surely, in view of the departure of three such brethren from among us, we may all beseech our heavenly Father to “grant us grace so to follow these blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those unspeakable joys which he has prepared for those who unfeignedly love Him; through Jesus Christ our Lord.”

By the death of Rev. Dr. Dashiell, in March, the Diocese was left without a Secretary, and there were important matters to be attended to before his successor could be elected. The Canons make no provision for such an emergency, and I felt that the responsibility and duty of meeting it devolved on me. I therefore engaged Miss Mina Dashiell, a daughter of our late Secretary, who was competent, and had access to her father's papers, to perform the duties of the office. She has done so, I believe faithfully, and I respectfully suggest and request, as a simple matter of justice, that her father's salary be continued up to the meeting of the Council for her benefit.

The vacancies in the office of Examining Chaplains, caused by the death of Rev. Dr. Hanckel, and the connection of Rev. B. D. Tucker with the new Diocese have been filled, and the Board now consists of Rev. Sam'l A. Wallis, of Fairfax county, Rev. L. W. Burton, of Richmond, and Rev. Wm. M. Clark, of Fredericksburg.

I have received from Mr. H. C. Baskervill his resignation as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute.

The Rev. Jno. J. Norwood has resigned his office as evangelist or general missionary of the Diocese, which leaves only Rev. E. Meade in that field. The Diocese being so much diminished in size,

Mr. Meade is equal to all its demands in this direction, but, in my judgment, it is very important that he should continue his work. Both he and Mr. Norwood have done good and faithful service during the past year. The division of the Diocese has left us with no young and growing towns, and with few fields of any kind for new church enterprises. But in sustaining and strengthening our many country parishes, we have our hands full of the most important missionary work. We cannot afford to allow these rural churches to languish or die. Not only is a large proportion of the growth of the city churches due to the accessions received from the country, but upon the latter must we chiefly depend to recruit the ranks of the ministry. In illustration of the truth of this statement, I need only mention that of about thirty young men in the Diocese now expecting to enter Holy Orders, nearly three-fourths come from the country, and only a little more than one-fourth from the towns and cities. I am glad to believe that our people generally take the same view of this subject, as is most satisfactorily shewn by the large receipts of our Diocesan Missionary Society during the past year.

The children of the Diocese also are nobly standing by their seniors. I do not know the exact amount they have given, but believe it does not fall short of that of former years. I here take occasion to thank them and bless them for myself and for you.

I wish to warmly commend to to all our ministers and people our Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, which meets annually with the Council. If our ladies generally would acquaint themselves with its object and work, I am sure it would soon lead to the establishment of a branch in every parish, a result which is very greatly to be desired.

The condition of the Diocese on the whole, is, in my judgment, favorable and encouraging, and there are many reasons why we should bless God for the past and take courage for the future. May we be Divinely guided in all our deliberations, and may we, dear brethren, ministers and laymen, return to our homes resolved more than ever before, by God's grace, to spend and be spent in His service.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

*To the Board of Trustees  
of the Theological Seminary of Virginia :*

The Professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully reports the following course of studies pursued in his classes during the current session.

*The Junior Class*, for part of the session reciting once a week, have studied Chadbourne's Natural Theology, and are prepared for their examination.

*The Middle Class*, reciting five times a week, have studied Butler's Analogy, and Knapp's Theology. The former they have finished, and are in review of the latter. To these have been added, for part of the session, two recitations in the week, on Mead's Supernatural Revelation, being an exhibition of this subject, with reference to its issues, as now up for discussion. With these, essays on topics of Systematic Divinity.

*The Senior Class*, with three recitations a week and the Wednesday evening exercise, have studied the Articles, with Brown and Boulton, and are now closing the review. They have, also, in Natural Theology, studied Hopkin's "Outline Man," and Homiletics, in Dr. Broadus' book, with exer-

uses. I have also, to this class, given a course of lectures on Christian Ethics.

In connection with the Prayer Book, with lectures on Liturgics, they have studied Butler's History of its origin, formation, and progress; with references to the work of Blakeney on the same subject, also to that of Bishop Barry, especially as to its earlier material, and forms and arrangement. Along with the Revised Book, have been compared, rubically and doctrinally, those of earlier existence and authority.

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF GREEK LANGUAGE, &C., &C.

*To the Board of Trustees*

*of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:*

The Professor of Greek Language, New Testament Literature, Church Polity, and Pastoral Theology respectfully submits the following report:

*The Senior Class* has read in Greek, along with Ellicott's Series of Commentaries, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, the Catholic and Pastoral Epistles and the Apocalypse. They have also read, in the same way, twenty-one chapters of St. Luke's Gospel, with exegetical essays on the same. This completes their course in Greek. In the three years they have read the whole Greek Testament, with the exception of St. Mark, Philemon, the last few chapters of St. Luke, and perhaps a small portion of the Acts.

In Polity they have studied the three books of Hooker that bear on this subject. They have also studied Butler's Protestant Episcopal Doctrine and Church Unity, also Schaff's Companion to the Greek Testament. They are now studying Meade on the Pastoral Office, with parallel references to Bedell.

*The Middle Class* has read in Greek, with the same series of Commentaries and Beet on Romans, 1st and 2d Corinthians, Galatian's and Romans. They are now reading Hebrews. They also read, in class, frequent exegetical essays.

*The Junior Class* has read in Greek, with the same Commentaries, St. John and nearly all of St. Matthew, with parallel references to the other Gospels. They will finish St. Matthew and read 1st and 2d Thessalonians. This class also constantly reads exegetical essays.

In accordance with the request of the trustees he attends, at least once a month, the recitations of the Preparatory Department, and takes pleasure in reporting that the classes are efficiently and successfully taught.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF HEBREW, ORIENTAL LANGUAGES AND  
APOLOGETICS.

*To the Board of Trustees*

*of the Theological Seminary of Virginia :*

The Senior Class has read critically in Hebrew selected from portions of all the Prophets, analyzing the several books and studying carefully the periods and events of their ministries. The study of Hebrew Syntax continued, and special attention given to the development of Messianic prophecy.

The Middle Class has read eighteen Psalms critically, also selected portions of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, and Job, in connection with introduction to the same, special attention being given to the principles of Hebrew Poetry and their application. It has also studied Harper's Syntax.

The Juniors have read in Hebrew portions of Genesis, Exodus, Deuteronomy, and other Historical Books, mastering the elements of Hebrew Grammar and Accentuation, also the elements of Hebrew Syntax. The aim is to familiarize them with the entire range of Historical Hebrew, and for the final examination they are required to read it at sight. The Higher Criticism is thoroughly explained together with its most important application. The usual instruction in Apologetics is given supplemented by lectures.

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY AND  
CANON LAW.

*To the Board of Trustees*

*of the Theological Seminary of Virginia :*

The Professor of Ecclesiastical History and Canon Law respectfully submits the following report:

The Senior class has studied and been examined upon the first two volumes of Perry's History of the Church of England, which cover the period down to the silencing of Convocation in 1717, A. D. Upon the history after that date lectures have been delivered, and the class has been assigned as parallel-reading the third volume of Perry, Ryle's Christian Leaders of the Last Century, Seeley's Later Evangelical Fathers, the Chapter on Methodism in Lecky's History of England in the Eighteenth Century, and Tullock's Religious Thought in Britain during the Nineteenth Century. The lectures are general discussions and criticisms of the successive phases of religious life, and are meant to be directive of investigation and private study. Each student is required to select for special study some one move-

ment in the eighteenth or nineteenth century, as, for example, the Great Awakening of the Nineteenth Century, or the Evangelical Movement, or the Tractarian or Broad Church Movement, or Dornør's History of Protestant Theology, or some representative writer like Wesley, or Coleridge, or Whately, or Arnold, or Newman, or he may choose for special investigation the History of the Protestant Episcopal Church. In all cases the result of the investigation must be embodied in a satisfactory paper. The class has just completed the Canons of the General Church, and will be occupied until the close of the session with concluding lectures on English and American Church History, when there will be a general examination upon the whole period since 1717.

The Middle Class has studied and been examined upon the two volumes of Smith's Students' Ecclesiastical History, and is, at present, studying Fisher's History of the Christian Church, the Reformation period. It has read as parallel-reading Trench's Mediæval Church History, and the Apostolic Fathers. Special attention is paid in this year to the discussion and criticism of essays that are read by the class upon assigned topics.

The Junior Class has read and been examined upon Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and half of the Acts of the Apostles in Greek, which last has been used as a basis for the discussion of the constitution, doctrine, life and worship of the Apostolic Church. The remainder of the session will be occupied with reading and criticising some of the early uncanonical Christian writings. Essays are read by the class on assigned topics. The parallel-reading assigned is the Apocrypha.

## ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT TO TRUSTEES (1893).

*Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D.,*

*President of Board of Trustees:*

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School, I have the honor to submit the following report:

The whole number of pupils entered this session is eighty-three. We have never had any whose conduct was more satisfactory.

Two most gratifying indications of the esteem in which the school is held by surviving friends of former pupils have been afforded since the opening of the present year—gifts which will enure to its advantage and to that of sound learning long after all now connected with it have passed away.

Mr. George H. Byrd, of New York, has placed in the hands of the treasurer of the board, six thousand dollars, the proceeds of which are to be used forever for the support of a scholarship in the school, in memory of his son, Samuel Wyman Byrd, a student here in 1887-90, who died the

17th of last September. The beneficiary must be the son of a layman of Virginia as it was in 1860.

The other benefaction is in the shape of a building, the need of which has been long keenly felt. Mrs. Laura C. Liggett, the widow of Hiram S. Liggett, of St. Louis, a student of the school in 1874-76, who died Christmas day last, proposes to erect here during the coming summer, as a memorial to her husband, a handsome commencement hall.

I cannot forbear expression of the hope that such enlightened liberality as has been displayed by Mr. Byrd and Mrs. Liggett may stimulate other friends of the school to imitation. For scholarships there is, of course, unlimited field; for additional buildings and buildings to take the place of unsuitable ones already here, abundant occasion.

The religious privileges of the school have continued as before and with even more than wonted encouragement. Devotional meetings Friday night in the school chapel have been kept up with great acceptance to the boys by Mr. Walter DeForrest Johnson, of the Seminary Middle Class, and the faithful pastoral care of the Rev. Prof. Kinloch Nelson, D. D., has been extended as before. To these gentlemen, as well as to my excellent corps of assistants, my grateful acknowledgments are due.

Two boys have been confirmed at home, and a class now under instruction await confirmation next month. Exclusive of the latter, the number of communicants is thirty.

Mr. Potts, of the Committee appointed at the Danville Council, offered a paper showing the condition of the several funds, as reported by the Treasurers, making a total of \$104,087.22, face value, of the bonds and stocks, and proposing that the funds be equally divided, each Diocese getting one half in kind of the several bonds, stocks and cash, basing the account on the appendix reported by the Committee on Division of the Diocese, showing the number of *White* Communicants in the old and in the new Diocese, namely, 9,464 in Virginia, and 9,120 in Southern Virginia, leaving out of the calculation the colored communicants. The Committee from Southern Virginia declined to accept this proposition, claiming under the report made to the General Convention, held in Baltimore, October, 1892, when final action was taken on the Division of the Diocese of Virginia, and signed by Rt. Rev. A. M. Randolph, as president, and Rev. Dr. T. G. Dashiell, as secretary, that the communicants as reported were as follows:

Diocese of Virginia, 9,169.

" " Southern Virginia, 10,696.

This report made no distinction between white and colored communicants, and the Committee from Southern Virginia claimed, under Resolutions 3 and 4 of the report on Division, a distribution of the funds on the basis of Communicants reported to the General Convention. Resolutions 3 and 4 are as follows:

3. "That all vested funds of the Diocese of Virginia be divided between the two proposed Dioceses in the ratio of communicants in each, so far as such division may be found practicable and free from legal difficulties."

4. "That the title to the Episcopal residence, in the city of Richmond, be vested in the Diocese of Virginia, to be held and used for its purposes; provided, however, that said Diocese shall account for and pay over to the new Diocese its due proportion of the value of said property according to the number of its communicants at the date of division."

After a full and free discussion of the subject, a large majority of the Joint Committee were of opinion that a division should be made on the basis of the report to the General Convention.

The gross amount of bonds, stocks, and cash, without going into a careful calculation of interest, as reported, was \$104,087.22; this amount included Widows and Orphans, Contingent, Episcopal, Bruce, Disabled Clergy, Diocesan Missionary, and the Trustee Funds, the Episcopal residence in Richmond, and a vacant lot in the town of Manchester, but did not include the Brotherhood Funds.

Under the ruling of the Joint Committee, Virginia would get 46.156 per cent., say \$48,042 49, and Southern Virginia would get 53.844 per cent., say

\$56,044.72, making a difference, on this basis, in favor of Southern Virginia; of \$8,002.23.

The following resolution was offered and adopted :

"It is agreed between the Committees appointed by the Councils of the Diocese of Virginia and Southern Virginia, that the distribution of the funds and securities held by the various Committees and Trustees of the old Diocese of Virginia, shall be made on the basis of the report made by the Rt. Rev. Alfred Magill Randolph, D. D., President of the Council of Diocese of Virginia, and Rev. T. G. Dashiell, D. D., Secretary, presented to the late General Convention in Baltimore, on which the Division of the Diocese of Virginia was made. The report referred to gives the number of communicants as follows :

For the Diocese of Virginia, 9,169,  
 " " " " Southern Virginia, 10,696.

(See page 42, proceedings of General Convention, 1892.)

"In accordance with these figures, we give to the Diocese of Virginia 46.156 per cent., and to the Diocese of Southern Virginia, 53.844 per cent. of the money and securities belonging to each fund. We appoint W. W. Old, Esq'r, of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, and Thomas Potts, Esq'r, of the Diocese of Virginia, to prepare a schedule of distribution of the funds of the various Treasurers, according to the foregoing agreement, and report the same to their respective committees.

"Further, the valuation of the Episcopal residence having been fixed at \$7,000, and approved by the Committee of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, and the valuation of a vacant lot in Manchester, to be conveyed to the Diocese of Southern Virginia, having been fixed at \$454.25, and approved by the Committee of said Diocese, it was agreed that in the foregoing schedule of distribution, the said real estate be treated accordingly."

A request was made in writing, by Messrs. Old and Potts, to the several Treasurers, for a full statement showing the condition of each security as to mortgage and rate of interest, so that a market value might be put on each bond and stock, before a final calculation could be made or a division arrived at. Only a few of the reports have been received, and the sub-committee are unable to give a final report as to the current market value of the several funds belonging to the Diocese of Virginia.

This report is made to the Council of Virginia for its action.

Rev. L. W. Burton presented the following report on Sunday-schools :

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The germ or unit in a Sunday-school is a teacher and a scholar. The most important questions that can arise with reference to this unit are the fitness of the teacher and the method of instruction. The responsibility of answering both these questions rests with the Rector. In most parishes he has no problems that are more perplexing.

The absolute essential to the fitness of a teacher is love for Christ. The Lord solemnly impressed that fact upon Peter.

Your committee have considered the question how to deepen the personal religion of a teacher. They know no better means than for the Rector to meet his teachers monthly, in what may be called a Teachers' Prayer-meeting. Where a school is not followed immediately by a church service, this prayer-meeting could be held briefly after the session of the school. In other cases the Teachers' Prayer-meeting might follow the church service itself. Where a Wednesday-night service is held, the prayer-meeting would best follow it.

Where a weekly Teachers' meeting for the study of the lesson is impracticable, it is possible to adopt such a method of instruction as will supply the place of these meetings. This can be done by putting into the teachers hands a book like "Lessons on the Gospels," by Misses Soames and Cawthorn, or Watson's "Lessons on the Gospel," both published by the Church of England S. S. Institute. Eugene Stock's "Life of Christ" is a similar book for older classes. Watson's book is the simplest of the three, and contains separate lessons for intermediate and primary classes. In these books the material for instruction is prepared for the teacher, but in such a way as to compel the teacher to study the lesson. There can be none of the perfunctory work possible, as under the system of books and leaflets containing alternate questions and answers.

It is necessary to put these books into the hands of the teachers only. The cost of the books is not large. For the children a card can be prepared on the basis of the book adopted. This card will contain, in successive columns, the date, the Sunday of the Church Year, the passage of Scripture

appointed for that day's lesson, the place of a text to be learned, and the assignment of a portion of the Catechism to be memorized. A card six inches square will contain the material for a year, and in addition, a brief appeal to parents to co-operate with the school by requiring the children of the family to read over the passage of Scripture, and to learn the text and portion of the Catechism assigned. Bibles, of course, will be distributed among the scholars while the school is in session.

A member of your committee has had this system in practical use for six years and more. It has had the severest test by being applied to nearly fifty classes of different grades; some of them in the parent school, others in missions in different kinds of neighborhoods, one of the missions being a colored Sunday-school. In other words, the one set of books and cards is in joint use by all the schools of his church, except in the primary or infant classes. In all this time there has been no complaint of the system]by the teachers. The scholars have done more studying at home than was ever before accomplished in those schools. Such a book as those of Misses Soames and Cawthorn, and the Rev. Mr. Watson, will, under this system, continue interesting for two years each. The texts to be learned can be varied each year. In the schools above referred to, the teachers expressed a desire to return to the use of "Lessons on the Gospels," by Misses Soames and Cawthorn, after an interval of some four years. Thus expense is saved. The Church Catechism, under this system, is gone through twice a year. Interest in the system has been quickened by having the whole school recite the text to be learned and the portion of the Catechism assigned. The boys and the girls alternate in reciting the place and the words of the text, and then the question and the answer in the Catechism.

Your committee have felt that some such practical recommendation as the above, on some one feature of the work, would be more useful than to attempt to theorize and deliver exhortations upon the whole of the very large subject of the Sunday-school.

Your committee are unable to make any use of the figures referring to the Sunday-school in the parochial reports, because, as this is the first year after the division of the Diocese, we have as yet no basis of comparison.

Rev. L. W. Burton, from Special Committee on Memorial of James River Convocation, reported as follows :

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL OF THE JAMES RIVER  
CONVOCATION WITH REFERENCE TO VACANT CHURCHES.

As your committee understand this memorial, it seeks to bring before the Council such combinations of adjoining parishes under a joint rector, as have been accomplished within the bounds of the Convocation, and as now exist in the ministries of Rev. S. S. Hepburn, in Hanover and New Kent, Rev. Martin Johnson, in Powhatan and Goochland, and Rev. W. W. Brander, in Fluvanna, Cumberland, and Buckingham. Your committee have also had in mind this whole subject as brought before the last Council of the undivided Diocese. In the first place, your committee recognize some such plan as not only the best, but also the only possible plan for supplying the vacant churches with services under the existing circumstances of diminished population and revenue.

But, in the second place, they would remind the Council that such a combination can only be accomplished by loving persuasion. Even were our organic law different from what it is, churches could not be effectively combined except by their own volition. Your committee would deprecate even the appearance of threatening, and we deem it unwise to ask the Council to bind or hamper the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society in any way.

In the third place, we believe the persons best fitted by position to bring about the desired combination of vacant parishes under joint rectors, are the Bishop of the Diocese, the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and the Evangelist. By personal interviews with the vestries and congregations concerned, they will be able to overcome the various obstacles to combination that exist in the minds or circumstances of the people concerned. Your committee think that the Council may safely entrust this subject to them, to carry out its ideas as occasion demands or opportunity offers.

It will perhaps be safest to state that this plan suggests not the slightest sacrifice of legal rights or prerogatives now vested in the parochial authorities. The parishes are to retain their individuality and autonomy. It is only participation with other vacant churches or parishes in the call and services of a joint rector that is aimed at.

Your committee recommend the following resolution :

*Resolved*, That the Bishop of the Diocese, the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and the Diocesan Evangelist, be a Committee on Vacant

Churches, and that they be respectfully requested to supply vacant churches by this plan so far as necessary or practicable.

The following report of Mrs. J. E. B. Stuart, Principal of the Episcopal Female Institute, was then read by the Secretary :

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA FEMALE INSTITUTE.

STAUNTON, VA., *May, 1893.*

BISHOP F. M. WHITTLE,

*President Board of Trustees,  
 Virginia Female Institute :*

At the meeting of the Board, or of such members as were present, I made a full report of the condition of the school, referring more particularly to its financial status.

The Board expressed entire satisfaction with the present management, and endorsed my appeal for help towards the erection of an addition to the present buildings. It is hard to feel I have only "the endorsement," when

the actual and material aid of the Diocese should be given. I therefore appeal once more to the Presbyters and Laymen here assembled for such contributions as should be expected from the old Diocese of Virginia. My earnest desire is to see this work accomplished by June, 1894, when we reach our fiftieth anniversary.

No *large* gift is looked for, yet in the two Dioceses the \$20,000 can be made up if two thousand persons will give \$10 each. Let this be considered seriously and each one give something, and at once!

The Bishop has copies of my circular for distribution. These have been sent to personal friends and former pupils. In response, I have already received several sums, the *first one* from a member of the Presbyterian Church.

The school this session has done the usual amount of faithful work, and the general bearing of the pupils has been excellent.

I have given Scholarships (that is *free* tuition in *English*) to fourteen (14) boarders, and to three of these, board, &c., in addition. Among them are six who are daughters, or grand-daughters of Clergymen

The health of the school has never been better, notwithstanding the severe winter, and prevalence of colds, and other diseases in our city.

The Confirmation class numbered thirteen (13); of these, nine (9) were confirmed in Trinity Church, two in their own churches in Virginia, and two to present themselves to their respective Bishops on their return to their homes in North Carolina and Tennessee.

Having renewed my lease of the school for another term of years, I have secured such assistance as will satisfy the most exacting; each department having at its head an able and experienced teacher.

Let me ask for an increase of patronage from our own people, and thus be sustained in a work of great labor and responsibility, second to none in the proper training of the daughters of the South.

With a feeling of truest loyalty to the *Old* Diocese, give me your prayers and your support.

Mr. F. H. McGuire, of Committee on Clerical Support, made the following report:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CLERICAL SUPPORT.

The Committee on Clerical Support submit the following report :

From the sixty-six parishes and one hundred and twenty-six churches and chapels shown by the last Journal to be in the Diocese, only ninety-four reports of church treasurers have been received, and of that number only seventy-four are substantially complete. It is manifestly impossible to base an accurate report, or deduce satisfactory results from such imperfect data. But forty churches report rectories, while in the knowledge of members of the committee, a number of others own them. Many of the reports fail to answer a very important enquiry, viz : whether their churches own rectories or not, and if not, whether steps are being taken to get them. The committee calls attention to the laxness of treasurers in making their reports, and urges more attention, and painstaking attention, to the matter in the future. An order of this Council exists, directing that parishes failing to report shall be returned and published as delinquent. Your committee have not carried out their part of this order in view of the recent death of

Dr. Dashiell, the late efficient Secretary of this Council, which event may have occasioned some confusion in the receipt or forwarding of these reports.

From the reports received we find that the following churches have paid to their rectors larger salaries than promised, viz: St. Margaret's Chapel, Caroline; Grace Church, Trinity Church, and Whittle Chapel, Fauquier; St. Paul's, Hanover; St. Stephen's, Fauquier; St. Paul's and Grace Churches, Prince William; Christ Church, Fairfax; and Christ Church, Orange. The following failed to pay all promised, and show the following deficits, viz: St. Timothy's, Fairfax, \$68.52; Olivet, Fairfax, \$17.02; Emmanuel, Fauquier, \$12.50; St. John's, Louisa, \$47; Abingdon, Gloucester, \$36; Moore Memorial, Henrico, \$250; Wicomico, Northumberland, \$6.40; St. John's, Albemarle, \$34.67; and Vawter's and St. Matthew's, Essex, \$32.70. The remaining churches from which reports were received, reported salaries paid in full. Without going into detail, your committee deem it proper to call attention again to the lamentably poor provision made for many of our clergy, and without disparaging the efforts now made in the weaker parishes to pay ministers resident there, the committee appeals to the church, and especially to the laity of the church in the Diocese, to renew their efforts everywhere to increase the salaries paid to their faithful men. In this direction and because they deem it the best form of endowment fund, your committee earnestly urge upon all vestries and congregations to take immediate steps to secure rectories where they are not now owned by the churches. This subject has had, before now, the earnest consideration of this Council, as is shown by the questions above adverted to, and required to be answered in each year's treasurer's report, viz: whether the church owns its rectory, and if not, whether it is taking steps in that direction. That the subject be kept fresh in the minds of all the members of the church, and that answers to these enquiries be hereafter insisted upon, and made full and specific, is, in the judgment of your committee, of prime importance.

Report of Committee on the Brotherhood was presented by Prof. James M. Garnett, with a resolution that a Board of Managers be appointed, which was passed :

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE BROTHERHOOD.

The Committee on the Brotherhood respectfully submits the following report :

During the past year four members of the Brotherhood have died, Rev. J. S. Hanckel, Rev. C. J. Gibson, Rev. R. K. Meade, and Rev. T. G. Dashiell. The committee has not been able to secure any statistics showing the amount collected for the families of these deceased brethren.

The report of the Treasurer, already submitted to the Council, shows that the invested funds consist of four (4) city of Manchester six per cent. bonds of \$500 each, equal to \$2 000, and there is to the credit of the Brotherhood in the Citizens Bank of Richmond, \$806.17.

Since the resignation of the President, Maj. D. N. Walker, in 1891, the Brotherhood has been without an official head. Miss Mary Woodbridge is now the Secretary, and Mr. Cyrus Bossieux the Treasurer.

The committee ascertains that no action has ever been taken on the report of the Committee on Affairs and Organization of the Brotherhood, which was adopted by the Council, and will be found in the Journal of 1891, page 91. The committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following resolution :

---

*Resolved*, That the Bishop be requested to appoint the Board of Five Managers provided for in the said report, in order that the new organization of the Brotherhood may be put into practical operation.

The committee also considers it desirable that a President of the Brotherhood be appointed as soon as possible. It is manifest that the affairs of the Brotherhood need the hand of an efficient officer. The parochial reports show that in 1890 there were 498 members ; in 1891, 420 ; in 1892, 352. for the whole Diocese ; and the parochial report of 1893, just read, shows 210 members for the present Diocese. This emphasizes the necessity for a speedy increase in the number of members of the Brotherhood. The payment of \$1.10 by each of 210 members, furnishes a very insignificant sum for the family of a deceased clergyman. Up to 1890, \$33,561 had been distributed among the families of thirty-five clergymen, giving an average of nearly \$1,000 a piece. (See Journal of 1890, page 95.)

The committee has been unable to secure statistics showing the gradual decline, but the result is painful, for unless there is a very decided increase of membership, each family of a deceased clergyman in this Diocese will hereafter receive but \$231. This result also shows the importance of prompt action in accordance with the report adopted by the Council in 1891, which recommended a better system of contributions. The duty and privilege of the laity to aid the families of deceased clergymen are too evident to require comment. A large and well arranged Brotherhood would prove a most efficient organization for this purpose.

Rev. Carl E. Grammer read the following report of Committee on State of Church :

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church respectfully submit their report :

The division of the old Diocese of Virginia, which has been completed since our last Council, makes the task of your Committee somewhat different from that of their predecessors. There are no statistics of the State of the Church a year ago, in this section of the old Diocese, compiled in such a form that they can be readily referred to. And even if they were at hand there are many reasons why comparisons might prove misleading. Our situation calls for an estimate of our resources, and a pointing out of our possibilities, opportunities, and lines of development, rather than for a calculation of the rate of our progress. We are in many respects a new Diocese, and we can only understand the new career that opens before us by studying carefully our present conditions.

The first feature of our new-old Diocese that strikes us, is that we still have a large missionary field in our own borders. It is true that the chief weight of the work among the colored people has fallen upon the other Diocese—a circumstance by the way which ought to make us emulous to do our less difficult work with the greater zeal. It is true too that we have a general sense of a narrower horizon, and of a loss of inspiration and incentive, now that the Convocations of the Southwest no longer present the needs of their great region; but there is still left within our own borders a work that calls for all the former zeal of our people for the cause of

Diocesan Missions—and that has many elements of inspiration. The Tide-water counties cry aloud for the ministrations of our Church. They appeal not to a sentiment however romantic, but to our sense of responsibility for the spiritual training and guardianship of the children of our own household. At the same time they are able to point to the fact that all work done in the Tide-water country is amply repaid by the large number of the young men of that section who take Orders. Tide-water Virginia does nobly in sending men into the ministry, and our Missionary Society could not do a better work than by putting ministers, at almost any cost, in the vacant parishes in that region. The mountain parishes also call for care, and there is much to be done for these people at our doors. The Diocese of Virginia has still a great Diocesan Missionary work. The children of the Sunday-school, who have done so well, must not be allowed for one moment to lose interest.

But even if they should give much more than heretofore, we could not hope to fill all the vacant parishes. The true remedy is for contiguous, feeble parishes to unite in the support of a minister. If this were done an adequate salary could be offered and a minister could be secured and retained. Moreover the minister being freed from any undue anxiety about his support would be able to render more acceptable service. Such an arrangement would conduce to longer and more fruitful pastorates, and is apparently the only feasible method of providing for our vacant parishes. Your Committee suggest that the Diocesan Missionary Society labour to bring about such combinations, and that, in cases where the Bishop and Executive Committee advise such an arrangement, any grant of aid be denied to a parish that refuses to be guided by their counsel.

It is pleasant, at this time when the sense of separation is forced upon us by the absence of accustomed faces, and the loss of former counsellors and friends, to note that unifying influences are busily at work. For, indeed, this is one, and an important, aspect of the work of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, the admirable Christian Social Union, the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society and other guilds. Efficient as are these organizations for their special work, they are also powerful to bind us to the whole Church, and to make us realize that we are parts of a larger society. It is, indeed, one of the features of the present state of the Diocese, that the life of the Church without is pressing in upon us. In the past, from various causes, the Diocese of Virginia was a world to itself, with its own ideals of worship, of the ministerial character and of the Christian life, in brief, with its Virginia Churchmanship. But in recent years the walls that separated us from others have become lower. There has been a large migration into our Diocese of people from other regions, who bring with them other ecclesiastical traditions. Our own people, by travel and in other ways, are brought more and more closely in contact with the Church life beyond our borders. On every side and in countless little ways we are reminded of

---

our organic and vital connection with other Dioceses, and our fraternal relationship with the Anglican Communion throughout the world.

This is a feature in the State of the Church that is worthy of the most careful consideration. To some it may seem a matter of unmixed regret. But while the loyal and affectionate feeling, that is at the root of this disposition, may excite our admiration, and at least calls for respectful consideration, it is none the less true that it would be exceedingly unfortunate if this attachment to the past should prevent us from adapting ourselves to new conditions, and from learning any new lessons. A Diocese can never be too old to learn, and no past can be so great that it can set the unchangeable mould in which all our future life must run.

On the other hand there are, of course, great dangers in all transitions. In seeking for new methods and adopting new ideals we may lose some of the precious lessons of our experience, and fail to preserve and use the special *charisma*, the special gracious gift, that God has bestowed upon us. It is, indeed, quite possible that our Virginia Churchmanship is not without spot or wrinkle, or any such thing; but it is nevertheless true that it would be a great loss not merely to ourselves, but to the whole Church, if the type should be destroyed. The improvement and not the obliteration of the type should be our object.

It is, however, no easy task to separate what is essential or important from the unimportant, merely external and incidental characteristics of our life, worship and doctrinal system. Piety must here be supplemented by learning and trained intelligence. The ministers must be men of generous culture and thorough theological training. In our present state it may safely be said that one of our prime duties is to see to it that our candidates for the ministry receive a collegiate training before entering upon their theological studies. The Presbyterians and Lutherans have long done this, and the custom is steadily growing among the Methodists and Baptists. Our own Church has too great a responsibility in the character of its membership and in the sympathetic attitude that it has always maintained toward the demands of culture to be able to lag behind. The momentous questions which are convulsing at the time we are meeting the General Assembly of a sister church are bound to come upon us. The advance ripples of the great tidal wave that is moving down upon us has already reached our shores. Now, if ever, it is our duty to do all that we can to spread sound doctrine, to train up scribes instructed unto the Kingdom, and to lay broad and deep the foundation of our beliefs. All that is true in the New and all that is true in the Old unite in calling for progressive methods of training and for constant study on the part of the ministry.

It is with pleasure that we notice in this connection the enlargement that has taken place in the *Southern Churchman*. No one can estimate the value of that paper, not only to our Diocese, but to our whole Church.

The work of the *Protestant Episcopal Review*, also, it seems to us, has claims upon the support and consideration of the Diocese.

No view of the State of the Church would be complete that did not mention with gratitude to God, for his answers to our prayers, the improved health of our beloved Diocesan. It is a matter of devout thankfulness that he has been restored to his Council and to his work.

The importance of his office cannot be readily over-estimated. Our Church is so constituted that the vigor of our efforts to gather in the wandering and unconverted largely depends upon the frequency and regularity of his visitations. He must be a careless minister, indeed, who does not feel a solemn responsibility laid upon him by the announcement of an Episcopal visitation for the purpose of administering the rite of Confirmation. No one can tell how many a wavering and delaying soul has been brought to a decision by the necessity for immediate determination laid upon it by such an opportunity. We are certain that the Bishop feels this most deeply. The record of his visitations this spring shows how earnestly and diligently he has labored in this great work. Your committee cannot, however, repress an expression of solicitude. It is a painful thing for us to contemplate the possibility that he may be endangering his health and even shortening his life by over-exertion. We are sure that he estimates too lightly our care for him and our appreciation of the value of Episcopal visitations, preaching, and exhortations, if he shrinks from any fear of laying too great a burden upon a small Diocese from asking for an assistant.

So far as your committee can estimate it the general record of the year calls for great thankfulness. God, who has so wonderfully manifested his goodness to this Diocese, has protected us, and been unto us both as a sun and a shield. For the good examples of the godly men who have been taken from us we give Him hearty thanks. May He grant us grace to follow them in all virtuous and godly living. May he raise up unto us men who may carry on their work in their spirit and to the glory of the Master whom they served.

*Of the Board of Managers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia for the Fiscal Year ending May 11, 1893.*

The managers beg leave to report that the income for the past year from contributions of individuals and churches amounted to \$904.10, being a decrease of \$478.22, caused, doubtless, by the division of the Diocese.

The receipts (interest) from the invested funds amounted to \$1,207.97, a decrease of \$263.94, caused by default of payment of the January interest on \$9,000 of the Richmond & Danville Railroad Company's bonds, but we have reason to hope and believe that this is but a temporary suspension on

the part of this railroad, and that payment will be resumed at an early day. The investment is yet considered a safe one by those supposed to know something of the financial status of the company.

There are two vacancies in the Board caused by the deaths of our beloved associates, Rev. Dr. C. J. Gibson, and Rev. Dr. T. G. Dashiell.

Rev. J. B. Newton, D. D., and Rev. John K. Mason, D. D., of Richmond, were nominated by the Board of Managers to fill these vacancies.

Of the eighteen (18) beneficiaries now on our list, but five of them belong to the Diocese of Southern Virginia.

The Board could take no action in distributing the proceeds of the fund in hand at the annual meeting held this day, because of the division of the Diocese, and adjourned to meet again on the 31st inst.

*Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School:*

*Rt. Rev. and Dear Bishop*—I respectfully report that the Divinity and Normal Departments of this Institution have been in constant operation during the past session.

We have had seven students in the Divinity School. Five of these have been faithful and earnest, so far as we know, and have made good progress in their studies. We hope they will be found fit for Priest's orders. One student, after a month's trial, was sent home, because, in the opinion of the Faculty, he was deficient in spirituality and in mental training. One was expelled for gross immorality.

Two of our last year's students left the Church during the summer, one going to the Methodists and the other to the Baptists.

I would respectfully suggest to the Board the establishment of a Preparatory Department, in which only men who are looking forward to the ministry shall be taught, and where they may be thoroughly tested as to their mental and moral qualifications. Since I have been Principal of the school not a single man has come to us who was prepared to study theology, though several have brought diplomas from institutions whose names would indicate that their graduates were well equipped.

I think some good work has been done in the Normal School. There will probably be four graduates (all girls) at the close of the session. We have had very few boys—only seven out of a total of fifty.

Most of the Normal School pupils have behaved very well. Two of the female boarders have been expelled for immorality.

The Sewing School has been kept up, and the teacher reports good work done.

Our faithful Matron, Mrs. M. Payne, notwithstanding the weight of years and infirmities due to hard work in the past for the negroes, both in Africa and America, has been able to perform her duties, but she has been much saddened by the conduct of the two girls referred to above, to whom she had been a true friend.

The teachers in the Normal School, so far as I can judge, have, in the main, been faithful and conscientious.

Professor Spencer has been a great sufferer during the past spring and winter from rheumatism and from a disease of the eyes. Often, when unable to be at school, he has had the students in his room manfully battling against pain in his efforts to be faithful to his students and to the King. I have been able to render him some little assistance, and Mr. C. L. Avant, a Divinity student, has gladly taught one of his classes when necessary.

I have taught classes during the past session in Bible History, Church History and Homiletics in the Divinity School; and in the Prayer-Book, Church History, Logic and the Church Catechism in the Normal School.

During the past year I have been exceptionally kept back from my teaching work by serious sickness. This fact no one can regret as much as I do myself. My work has been in Latin, Greek, Hebrew, Bible Introduction and Elementary Theology, together with the teaching of Mental and Moral Science with the Normal Middle class. Progress made by the Divinity students has been very fair, by the Normal scholars very poor.

*The Report of the Secretary of the Virginia Branch*

*of the Woman's Auxiliary, May, 1892, to May, 1893.*

Rt. Rev. F. M. WHITTLE, D. D., President *ex-officio*:

In offering the third official Report, that sums up the "outward and visible sign" of the growing interest and practical proof of

what is made so large a part of Auxiliary work, viz: "*boxes and money*," the delegates and friends of the Virginia branch must remember, if they contrast last year's receipts, that forty-three branches were then reported, to-day only twenty-two in this Diocese, and some of these recently organized, and from six we have not heard. Yet, we believe that an earnest and onward move in the interests of Mission, at home and abroad, is rousing the Church and bringing its members in touch with the Auxiliary; we repeat "the hope that a branch will soon be formed in every Parish."

The contributions of 1892 were \$5,300, a *gain* of \$1,000 over 1891; but though we have lost so heavily, by the division of the Diocese, we aggregate, in money and boxes, from the sixteen branches reporting, \$4,462.18, *four fifths* of the amount reported last year from the entire number. If this generous sum has been given for Christ's sake, and for the glory and extension of His kingdom, we may truly rejoice and boldly undertake great things the coming year. Of this amount, the *Junior Auxiliary* has contributed, in boxes and money, \$268.97 (only three out of seven reporting), and has been sent to Diocesan Missions, Indians and far off Alaska.

"*Boxes*" have been sent by the Women's Auxiliary to clergymen in Virginia and beyond our border, even to South Dakota, Minnesota and Alaska, in value \$500. The gifts "*in money*" to Foreign Missions prove that Virginia is still true to them, for having given her most precious things, "her sons and daughters," to the work, she cannot withhold the silver and the gold, and \$1,336.39 will tell her children in China, Japan, Brazil, that they are *lovingly remembered*, while Africa, too, shares a part. \$427.25 has been given to the domestic work in the Dakota's and other Western and Southern Missionary jurisdictions, while the money for Diocesan Missionary work is \$1,846.50, total \$4,462.18. These are the material results, but the "high water mark" of the Auxiliary is not to be reached by "*money and boxes*;" *in the work*, must come the illumination of the divine purpose, to reveal Christ in us more clearly, so may we give back his light to the work.

Special reports from the Missionaries in Porto Alegre, Rio Grande and Pelota, giving in detail the needs and prospects of those fields, are herewith submitted.

The following facts, selected from these reports, are considered worthy of especial attention.

In the Porto Alegre District by far the best results and most promising openings are offered by the country neighborhoods. The church at Contracto grows and prospers. The brethren there are much rejoiced to hear that friends in Washington propose to build them a chapel. They have recently opened a new station among friends and relatives at a place called Passo Grande, where the gospel has been gladly received. The neighborhood near Viamao, called Estoucia Grande, has manifested great interest in the gospel; many families have definitely declared their intention of uniting with the Church. Snr. Cabral has made frequent tours to the other sections of State, being everywhere cordially received and respectfully heard. This country work, however, has been most imperfectly done, as frequent political disturbances have rendered travelling unsafe and often impossible.

In the city of Porto Alegre no large results can be expected until a suitable chapel has been arranged for the services, and a thorough equipment given to the school. The latter has been so diminished that it may be placed entirely under the direction of Miss Packard. The Missionaries have five youths under their training, while the Rev. Mr. Brown instructs our Catechist, Snr. Gabral, in Theology, and in Greek, Hebrew and English.

The Rev. Mr. Kinsolving has succeeded in making Rio Grande the most satisfactory point, perhaps, in the whole Mission. The rented hall has been skilfully made into an attractive chapel, capable of seating two hundred persons. At every service there is a large and devout congregation. The English service, begun by the Rev. Mr. Brown, has been successfully continued. There are two schools, one in the city and the other in an island near by; these, though small, are giving satisfaction.

The Rev. Mr. Meem, accompanied by our appointed Catechist Snr. Antonia Fraga, went to Pelotas in the month of September.

Unable at first to rent a commodious house, they began services in a very small and inconvenient hall. These were at once crowded; attracted wide attention and aroused violent temporary opposition. Finally, our Missionaries have secured permanent quarters, and have won the respect and sympathy of the community. Their services are well attended, except in bad weather, and they report a great many souls thoroughly awakened and anxiously enquiring the way of life.

As proofs of our Society's activity, and as evidences of God's gracious response to prayer, we record the following blessings:

1. We have received a Service Book, being a translation into Portugese of the Morning and Evening Prayer, with the Litany and several selections of Psalms. This is now in use in Rio Grande and Porto Alegre.

2. We have been promised the visit of a Bishop at an early date.

3. We have been assured that two of our young men can be educated in the United States, so soon as they are ready to profit by the training.

We would still recommend as highly necessary:

1. A suitable house and property in Porto Alegre, to constitute the centre of educational and evangelistic agencies.

2. A thoroughly equipped school, capable of commanding the patronage of the best classes of the community.

3. A church building in Rio Grande, to accommodate the growing congregation.
