St. Paul's Church, Richmond, Va., Wednesday, January 31, 1894.

The Special Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia met this day in St. Paul's church, Richmond, at 10 A. M.

There were present in the chancel the Rt. Rev. Francis M. Whittle, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of the Diocese, the Rev. Drs. Walker and Carmichael, and the Rev. Messrs. B. M. Randolph and W. C. Latané.

The address was delivered by the Rev. C. Walker, D. D., on Romans viii, v. 26, and the Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop

After Divine service the Council was called to order by the Bishop.

By direction of the Bishop the secretary then read the notice of the call of this Special Council, as follows:

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

Notice for a Special Council of the Diocese:

By the recommendation of all the clergy of Richmond, and acting under authority of the 6th Article of the Constitution, a Special Council of the Diocese of Virginia is hereby called to meet in St. Paul's Church, Richmond, at 10 A. M., January 31, 1894, for the purpose of electing an Assistant Bishop.

BISHOP WHITTLE'S ADDRESS.

The Bishop then read his address, as follows: My DEAR BRETHREN:

At the time of our last Council in Winchester my health had

so far improved that I confidently hoped to be able for some time to come to perform all the Episcopal duties of the Diocese, but this hope was soon disappointed. Continuing my visitations immediately after the adjournment of the Council, which had been commenced in the latter part of the winter, by the end of June my strength was exhausted and I was compelled to stop. After doing all I could to recruit my health, until the second week in September, I again resumed my visitations of the churches, but before completing my first list of appointments was obliged by great and constant suffering to give up all further effort and return home. Much of the time since I have been confined to my house, and although now better and able to attend to what I may call my office duties, I am still feeble and suffering, and my physician gives me no hope of ever being well enough to undergo the labor and fatigue of visiting the country churches. All this is well known to a number of my clerical brethren, with whom I have communicated freely on the subject, and they all insist that to meet the wants of the Diocese. there is no alternative but to elect an Assistant Bishop. It was further urged by one of these brethren that it would be best to call a Special Council for the election, and thus save nearly four months' time which would be lost by waiting until the annual Council in May. Not being willing to take the responsibility of asking for an assistant or of calling a Special Council, I conferred with the ministers of Richmond and, eleven being present, they unanimously advised and requested me to call this Council at this time and place to elect an Assistant Bishop.

I have thus, as briefly and plainly as I could, laid the whole case before you. It is for you to determine whether you will elect an assistant at this Council, or defer the matter until the next regular Council, or postpone it indefinitely. Provided you decide to proceed to elect an Assistant Bishop, I hereby signify my consent to such election—as required by Title I, Canon 19, of the Canons of the General Convention—and assign to the said Assistant Bishop, when duly elected and consecrated, all the duties of the Episcopal office which I am not able to perform myself. These include, at present, the visitation and oversight of all the country churches and some of those of the towns and cities.

Appointment and Report of the Finance Committee.

I have nothing to add except the earnest prayer that you may be blest with the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit.

ELECTION OF ASSISTANT BISHOP.

The Rev. R. A. Goodwin then moved that the Council go into the election of an Assistant Bishop.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE APPOINTED.

Mr. Thomas Potts moved, as a substitute, that the Chair appoint a Finance Committee who shall report as soon as possible.

Carried.

The Rev. Dr. Newton moved the adoption of the Rules of Order of the last Council.

Adopted.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Mr. Joseph Bryan made the report of the Committee on Finance, which was that the Bishop of this Diocese should receive \$3,000 salary, per year, and his residence, and that the Assistant Bishop should receive \$3,000, without a residence.

The Rev. N. P. Dame moved to amend with the words "that the salary of the Bishop remain as it now is, i. e. \$3,500 per year."

The Rev. H. B. Lee raised the point of order that this Council had no right to change the salary of the Bishop.

The Rev. G. W. Nelson, being called to the chair, decided the point of order well taken.

The amendment of Mr. Dame was then withdrawn.

Mr. Bryan asked permission to amend his report by inserting the following:

Report of the Finance Committee.

"That the salary of the Bishop remain unchanged until the consecration of the Assistant Bishop, and that the salary of the assistant begin at that time."

Permission was granted, on motion of Mr. R. T. Scott.

Mr. Bryan then offered the following amended report, which was adopted:

St. Paul's Church, Richmond, Va., January 31, 1894.

The committee to whom was referred the condition of the finances of the Diocese, with a view to determining the ability of the Diocese to sustain the Bishop and an Assistant Bishop in the event one should be elected by this Council, respectfully reports as follows:

We have fully considered the resources of the Diocese applicable to the salaries of the Bishop and Assistant Bishop and the general expenses of the Diocese, and, in our judgment, the Diocese will be able to pay the necessary general expenses substantially as heretofore.

We recommend that the salary of the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop each be three thousand dollars. The Bishop to retain the Episcopal residence as at present. The Assistant Bishop's salary to be in lieu of any additional allowance for a residence.

These provisions to take effect upon the consecration of the Assistant Bishop, until which time the salary of the Bishop to remain as at present.

In making this report and recommendation we assume that the collection of the contingent fund will be as full as heretofore.

The committee would further state that they much desired to have provided a residence for the Assistant Bishop, and they feel sure that the Council will be glad to do so as soon as the collection of the contingent fund will be sufficient to justify it.

RESOLUTION OF SYMPATHY.

The Rev. Angus Crawford offered the following resolution which, on motion of Rev. R. A. Goodwin, was put to the House by the Secretary, and carried by a rising vote:

Resolutions, Motions, &c.

Resolved, That this Council express its deep sense of regret for the necessity which calls it together at this time, and its profound sympathy with our beloved Bishop in his trying affliction, and their appreciation of the good example he has set his people by his wonderful patience and submission, and pray God that his grace may continue to sustain him and his beloved wife, and long spare them to us.

The Rev. C. R. Kuyk moved that the visiting clergy be invited to seats on the floor of the Council.

Carried.

The Bishop then announced that after silent prayer the Council would proceed to the election of an Assistant Bishop.

On motion of the Rev. E. Meade it was-

Resolved, That in casting the vote, the roll be called and each delegate come forward and place his ballot in a box which would be provided for that purpose.

The Rev. G. W. Nelson asked the President if the Lay Delegates were entitled to speak on nominations for an Assistant Bishop when made by the clergy.

The Rev. Angus Crawford raised the point that this debate was out of order.

The President then decided that the Laity had no right, under Article V of the Constitution, to speak during the making of nominations.

The Rev. G. W. Nelson appealed from this decision.

The Rev. B. M. Randolph moved that the rule of order prohibiting debate on appeals from decisions of the President be suspended, and that discussion be allowed.

A vote by orders being called for resulted as follows:

Ayes, 45; noes, 50.

The motion was lost.

Nominations for Assistant Bishop.

The question on the appeal was then put, and the decision of the President was sustained.

Ayes, 62; noes, 34.

The Rev. C. E. Grammer moved to adjourn until 3 o'clock.

Carried.

WEDNESDAY, 3 P. M.

The Council re-assembled, Bishop Whittle in the chair, who announced that nominations for Assistant Bishop were in order.

NOMINATIONS FOR ASSISTANT BISHOP.

The Rev. H. B. Lee nominated the Rev. John K. Mason, D. D.

The Rev. Wm. C. Latané nominated the Rev. R. A. Goodwin.

The Rev. C. E. Grammer nominated the Rev. L. W. Burton, D. D.

The Rev. Angus Crawford nominated the Rev. Kinloch Nelson, D. D.

The Bishop being summoned away by the extreme illness of his daughter-in-law, the Rev. G. W. Nelson was called to the chair.

The Rev. Dr. Carmichael offered a resolution of sympathy for the Bishop on the death of his daughter-in-law, which was adopted by a rising vote.

The Rev. C. E. Grammer moved that the nominations be closed, and that the Council proceed to ballot.

Carried.

The Rev. Preston Nash offered the following which, with amend-

ments offered by the Rev. C. E. Grammer and Dr. Carmichael, was adopted, viz:

Resolved. That the name, or if there be two receiving the same vote, the names receiving the lowest number of votes be dropped, subject to one renomination later—no speeches being made.

The Council then proceeded to ballot, and the tellers, the Revs. H. B. Lee and Berryman Green, reported on first ballot the following vote:

On motion of the Rev. S. A. Wallis, D. D., the Secretary was authorized to print the minutes of this Special Council in the Journal of the Ninety-ninth Council.

The Rev. R. A. Castleman moved that the thanks of this Council are hereby tendered to the ladies of the Episcopal churches of Richmond for the elegant and bountiful lunch provided for us to-day.

The tellers reported the third ballot.

Whole number of votes cast, 52; necessary to a choice, 27.

Ballot of the Laity and Election of Assistant Bishop.

The Rev. J. B. Newton was declared by the President to be the choice of the clergy.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Goodwin, which was amended by the Rev. C. E. Grammer, the election of Dr. Newton was declared unanimous, and the secretary was authorized to cast the ballot making Dr. Newton the unanimous choice of the clergy.

Carried.

And the ballot was so cast.

The President then announced that the Rev. J. B. Newton was before the laity for election or rejection.

Major John Page moved that the laity retire and consider the nomination of the candidate.

The President decided this out of order.

The President appointed tellers for the laity Mr. W. W. Scott and Mr. Charles Woolnough.

The laity then proceeded to vote (the roll being called as with the clerical vote), and the tellers reported:

Whole number of votes cast, 62; necessary to a choice, 32.

For the Rev. J. B. Newton: Ayes, 61; noes, 1.

The President then announced that the Rev. John B. Newton, having received a majority of the votes cast, is the choice of this Council for Assistant Bishop for the Diocese of Virginia.

The Rev. R. A. Goodwin moved that a committee of two clergymen and two laymen be appointed by the President to wait on the Bishop, who was called from the Council by the death of his daughter-in-law, and inform him that the Rev. J. B. Newton had been elected Assistant Bishop, and ask if he had any further business to suggest to the Council.

Carried.

The Assistant Bishop presented to the Council.

The following committee was appointed, who proceeded to the Bishop's house:

Rev. Hartley Carmichael, D. D. " James Grammer, D. D.

Major John Page, Mr. Joseph Bryan.

After some time, the committee returned, and reported, through Dr. Carmichael, that the Bishop had no suggestions to make to the Council.

The "Prayer for those in Affliction" was then offered by the President.

On motion of the Rev. J. K. Mason, D. D., a committee of two clergymen and one layman was appointed to inform Dr. Newton of his election, and to bring him before the Council.

The President appointed the Rev. C. E. Grammer, the Rev. J. K. Mason, D. D., and Mr. John G. Williams.

Dr. Newton was introduced to the Council by the Rev. C. E. Grammer. The Bishop-elect spoke to the Council in an earnest and feeling manner.

The testimonial of the election of the Rev. John Brockenbrough Newton, M. D., as Assistant Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia, was then signed by a Canonical majority of the Clerical and Lay Delegates of the Council.

On motion, the reading of the minutes was dispensed with, and, after appropriate religious services, the Council adjourned sine die.

RULES OF ORDER.

ORGANIZATION.

- 1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.
- 2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the second day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

- A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.
- A Committee on the Brotherhood.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

Rules of Order.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

- A Committee on Parochial Reports.
- A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.
- A Committee on Elections.
- A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.
- A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.
- A Committee on Sunday Schools.
- 3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishops' Addresses the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such other Committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

- 1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary, before debate.
- 2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- 3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.
- 4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.
- 5th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendment are precluded.

Rules of Order.

- 7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.
- 9th. It any member trangresses the rules of the Council the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.
- 10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 11th. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the Council.
- 12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever seven members require it.
- 13th. Any member may call for the division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.
- 14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- 15th. No member shall vote upon question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.
- 16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.
- 17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

Rules of Order.

- 2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or Wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.
- 3d. No spectators shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the Rector and Wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.
- 4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

After Divine service, conducted by the Rector, the Rev. Dr. Powers read the report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Report of Executive Committee of D. M. Society.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia respectfully report:

That they have aided in the past year parishes in the following counties, viz: Albemarle, Caroline, Culpeper, Essex, Fairfax, Fauquier, Fluvanna. Frederick, Gloucester, Hanover, Henrico, King George, King and Queen, King William, Lancaster, Loudoun, Louisa, Madison, Mathews, Middlesex, New Kent, Northumberland, Orange, Rappahannock, Richmond, Shenandoah, Spotsylvania and Stafford-twenty-seven out of the thirty-eight counties of the Diocese. These parishes and parts of parishes have been served by twenty-six ministers, two of whom resigned in the course of the year, leaving only two vacant parishes in the Diocese, which will probably be filled the ensuing summer. In a few cases, as in New Kent and Spotsylvania, only a single church or chapel is served, and in several others the parish is ministered to by a clergyman living in a neighboring county, as Northumberland, by Rev. E B. Burwell, of Lancaster county; Louisa, by Rev. E. Valentine Iones, of Albemarle, and Rev. J. R Ellis, of Gordonsville; King and Queen, by Rev. A. C. Thomson, of Essex, and Middlesex, by Rev. J. H. Hundley, of Essex. It will be seen, therefore, that our work covers more than two-thirds of the area of the Diocese. The aid given has ranged from \$100 to \$300 to a parish or church, with the exception of \$50 to St. George's Chapel, Spotsylvania; and the total amount paid out by the treasurer, according to his report, including the evangelist's salary and other incidental expenses, is about \$6,827.64. We believe that our missionaries are all faithful men, working efficiently in their several fields of labor according to their ability and opportunity. While some changes take place from time to time within the Diocese, there seems to be little or no disposition on the part of the settled rectors to leave it. The exhibit which we have made above of more than two-thirds of the Diocese helped by us and needing help, shows the extent and importance of our work and the need of liberal support on the part of the people. We cannot do our present work with less than seven thousand dollars, and we ought to do more than we are now doing. Some stipends ought to be increased and some new fields ought to be occupied. The total amount of receipts since the Council of 1893, according to the treasurer's report, is \$6,265.58. At this date the balance on hand is \$3,455 44 A good balance to start with is necessary, because, while the receipts of the summer and early fall are always small, the payments go on all the time, and without a good balance to fall back upon our funds are exhausted and we are driven to the necessity of borrowing. The work of the evangelist, Rev. Everard Meade, has been so wise, faithful and efficient that we desire to continue his services. Not only

are parishes likely to become vacant at any time, but there is so much missionary and other work needing to be done in the Diocese, which neither the Bishops nor the settled clergy can do, that we do not see how we can dispense with his services, and we believe that the result will amply justify his continuance. The following statement will show some of the work which needs to be done: There are nine counties in the Diocese which have no resident minister. There are fourteen counties with one resident minister in each county. In the county of Hanover one minister, Rev. S. S. Hepburn, has charge of six churches In the counties of Lancaster and Northumberland one minister, Rev. E. B. Burwell, has charge of five churches, and nearly all our county parishes have three churches to be served. The services are therefore necessarily infrequent, and an evangelist or general missionary would be invaluable to give more frequent and sometimes continued services, as well as to afford relief to the overburdened rectors. Besides, the county of Greene has no Episcopal church, no services, and no Episcopal people except, perhaps, one or two. The county of Madison has one church and five communicants, with no increase for at least ten years. The county of Spotsylvania has no services outside of Fredericksburg, except at St. George's Chapel, a few miles from that city. The lower part of Caroline and the upper part of the adjoining county of King and Queen for a distance of probably fifty miles has no Episcopal church and no Episcopal service. So great is the need of missionary service that some convocations have been trying to raise a fund to support a convocation missionary. Besides there are always Deacons who need some one to administer the Holy Communion to their people, which the neighboring clergy are either unable or unwilling to do. We think, therefore, that an Evangelist or General Missionary is necessary to carry on and to extend the work of the church in the Diocese. We recognize the increased burdens of the Diocese, with its resources diminished, as they have been, by division and by the hardness of the times, but we believe that the Diocese of Virginia will, by the blessing of God, be equal to the emergency, as she always has been, and we thank God and the people and the children for the showing we are able to make in spite of all difficulties. But we urge Rectors and Superintendents of Sunday schools to keep up their collections for Diocesan Missions for at least another month. We remind all our missionaries that our Rules require them to take up a collection for the same object four times a year, and we suggest that the Sunday schools have at least one Missionary Sunday a month, when the collection shall be devoted to missionary objects, believing that the collections of the other Sundays will be sufficient to meet the proper expenses of the Sunday school, and reserving still the Lenten offerings for Diocesan Missions.

MINISTER DECEASED.

Rev. George H. Norton, D. D., for some thirty-three years rector of St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, died suddenly at his home in that city, September 15th, 1803, in the seventieth year of his age. Ordained in 1846, he spent many of the first years of his ministry in Warrenton, Virginia, and removed from there to Columbus, Ohio. but in a very short time returned to his beloved Virginia (he was born in New York) as rector of St. Paul's Church, in which office he continued until his death. It is worthy of remark, that his rectorship in Alexandria and that of his predecessor, Rev. James T. Johnston, covered a period of between sixty and seventy years. Dr. Norton was too well known both in the Diocese and church at large to require any lengthened notice from me. I had known him intimately for nearly fifty years, and admired him greatly and loved him warmly. A man of humble, charitable and pure Christian character and life; remarkable for his reticence, prudence and discretion; of unusually clear and sound judgment, and possessing great ability as a preacher and speaker, he combined in an eminent degree the wisdom of the serpent and the harmlessness of the dove. For many years, and as long as his health permitted, he was a prominent and influential member of our Diocesan Council and General Convention, and to the last was one of the most valued trustees of our Theological Seminary and High School, in both which institutions, because of what he conceived to be their inestimable value to the church, he ever manifested the deepest interest. Very few of us ministers who were contemporaries of Dr. Norton remain, and when our time shall come to depart hence, may we all be found—as I am sure he was waiting and watching and ready.

MINISTER DEPOSED.

So far as we can judge from the foregoing report there is nothing discouraging, to say the least, in the condition of the Diocese during the past year, as compared with that of the year preceding. I fear that—no doubt as a consequence of the unprecedented business depression throughout the country—the contributions to our various benevolent and religious institutions will be found to have fallen below the average of years past. I am sorry to know that this is true

of our Diocesan Missionary Society, upon which the very life of our church may almost be said to depend. I feel that I can hardly exaggerate its importance, or the necessity for our people to contribute to its funds to the extent of their ability. The children have done nobly with their Lenten offerings, and I heartily thank them, but must earnestly exhort them and their parents and teachers not to become weary in well doing, having God's promise that in due season we shall reap if we faint not. While it is true that there are no new towns springing up or rapidly growing within the Diocese, it is also true that there yet remains much land to be possessed by our church. which is still practically unknown in large portions of a number of counties, and in one (the county of Greene) we have no services at all. If this general statement is not sufficient to show the urgent necessity for sustaining this Society then let every member and friend of our church reflect on the fact that of sixty-three white ministers engaged in parochial work, twenty-eight, or considerably more than one-third, are supported in part by the Society. This fact means that if the aid of the Missionary Society was withdrawn more than one-third of our ministers would be obliged to abandon their fields of labor, and more than one-third of the churches of the Diocese would be closed. The faithful services of these missionary pastors have been supplemented during the past year by the judicious and efficient labors of our evangelist or general missionary, Rev. E. Meade. The Executive Committee has most wisely and properly. in my judgment, decided to continue Mr. Meade in his office. Some persons may say that the consecration of Bishop Newton leaves no place for the evangelist. But their fields of labor are entirely different and distinct, and neither of them can fill the place or do the work of the other. They will both find-each in his own sphere-that they have enough of labor and care and responsibility to fill their hands and hearts.

I have no suggestions to make or plans to propose in regard to the work of the Diocese. For a fuller view of its condition I must refer you to the reports of the clergy and of our various societies and institutions.

Several years ago I obtained from the State Legislature a charter incorporating the Bethany Institute, the object being to establish a

home for the education and training of Deaconesses in our church. This is a work which I had and still have very much at heart, believing that the order of deaconess would be found to be more important and useful than that of deacon. But the matter does not seem to have impressed others as it has me. Of course, a large sum of money would be necessary to procure a building and start the work. But the treasurer, Mr. Rosewell Page, reports only \$64.29 received and on interest in the City Bank of Richmond up to January 1, 1894. However, we have made a beginning and I do not despair, but mention the subject hoping and praying that before long God will put it into the hearts of some of his people to whom he has entrusted the means, to swell the little bank deposit which I have mentioned to thousands, so that in this Diocese, as in other dioceses and in other churches, we may have our deaconesses and all the necessary equipment for preparing them for their work.

I would call attention to what follows, being part of a letter from the Secretary of the Prayer Book Distribution Society:

STOCKBRIDGE, MASS., April 10, 1894.

Right Rev. and Dear Sir:

Permit me to send to you herewith a copy of the resolutions which were adopted at a meeting of the Trustees of the Prayer Book Distribution Society, held at the Church Missions House, in New York, on Tuesday, March 13th:

Resolved, That the especial attention of the clergy and laity of the church be called to the fact that the publishers of the 32mo. edition of the Book of Common Praper have reduced the price to fifteen cents a copy, thereby making it practicable for all congregations to provide themselves with the Revised Prayer Book, in accordance with the direction of the General Convention.

Resolved, That whereas the reduction of the cost of the Prayer Book to fifteen cents affords substantial encouragement to Prayer Book distribution, the clergy and laity be, and they are hereby, urged to adopt measures for putting the Prayer Book into the hands of all people who are strangers to it.

Resolved, That the Secretary be requested to print the foregoing resolutions in the Church papers, and also to communicate them to the several Bishops, with the request that they will bring the subject to the attention of the people of their Diocese, and also have reports forwarded to the Secretary, on or before September 1st, of the statistics of Prayer Book Distribution in their Dioceses.

Proposed Amendment to Canon XIV.

This Prayer Book Distribution Society was created by the last General Convention for the purpose of supplying everybody in the land with a copy of the Prayer Book. Of course, I would not compare any volume with the Book—the Bible—but our incomparable Prayer Book is so full of the words and truth of the Word of God, that I believe its distribution would do more good than the distribution of any other book in the world, next to the sacred Scriptures themselves. I wish we could form a branch of the Society and begin with the work of supplying with a copy of the Prayer Book every one in the Diocese who will receive it, and then extend our efforts to sending it throughout the whole country.

I conclude with the prayer that the Holy Spirit may direct and rule our hearts and give us a right judgment in all our deliberations, for the blessed Saviour's sake. Amen.

PROPOSED CHANGES OF THE CONSTITUTION.

The Rev. Dr. Kinloch Nelson read a letter from the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention in regard to proposed changes in the Constitution as agreed upon in the last General Convention (vide Journal 1892, pages 338, 118).

The alterations recommended provide that alterations in the Prayer Book shall require the endorsement of the actual majority of all the Bishops and not of a majority of those present.

The second proposed change (vide Journal 1892, pages 394, 395, 152) is in regard to the substitution of the words "Bishop Coadjutor" for the words "Assistant Bishop" wherever they occur in the Constitution.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF SYSTEMATIC DIVINITY AND HOMILETICS.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Systematic Divinity respectfully submits the following report of the studies pursued in his classes during the current session:

Reports of the Professors of the Seminary.

The Junior Class, for part of the session reciting once a week, have studied Chadbourne's Natural Theology, and have passed their examination on it.

The Middle Class, reciting five times a week, have studied Butler's Analogy and Knapp's Theology. The former they have finished with examination, and they are in review of the latter. To these have been added, during part of the session, recitations twice a week, as in connection with the issues of the day, Mead's Supernatural Revelation. Also, Essays on Systematic Divinity and exercises in the construction of sermons.

The Senior Class, with three recitations per week and the Wednesday evening exercise, have studied the Articles with Boultbie, with reference to Burnet and Brown. They have also, in Natural Theology, studied "Hopkin's Outline Man," and Homiletics, in Dr. Broadus' book, with exercises.

I have also gone over with this class, the history of the Prayer-Book, as to its sources, material, as also its changes in the Church of England and in this country, using Dr. Butler's History, Canon Barry's Students' Prayer Book, and the more elaborate work of Blakeney, in the way of reference. Along with this, a course of lectures on Liturgics and one on Christian Ethics.

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF GREEK LANGUAGE, &C., &C.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Senior Class has read in Greek, along with the Commentaries edited by Ellicott, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, the Catholic and Pastoral Epistles, and the Apocalypse. They have also read with the Cambridge Commentary St. Luke, with exegetical essays on it. In the three years they have read the whole of the New Testament in Greek, excepting St. Mark and perhaps a portion of the Acts.

They have also studied Hooker's Ecclesiastical Polity and Butler's Protestant Episcopal Doctrine and Church Unity. They are now studying Meade on the Pastoral Office, and will study Bedell.

The Middle Class has read in Greek, with the same series of Commentaries and Beet on Romans, 1st and 2nd Corinthians, Galatians, and Hebrews. They are now reading Hebrews.

The Junior Class has read in Greek, with the same Commentaries, St. John and nearly all of St. Matthew, with parallel references to the other synoptics, and constant exegetical essays. They will also read 1st and 2nd Thessalonians.

Reports of the Professors of the Seminary.

REPORT OF PROFESSOR OF HEBREW, ORIENTAL LANGUAGES AND APOLOGETICS.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Senior Class has read critically in Hebrew selected from portions of all the Prophets, analyzing the several books and studying carefully the periods and events of their ministries. The study of Hebrew Syntax continued, and special attention given to the development of Messianic prophecy.

The Middle Class has read eighteen Psalms critically, also selected portions of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, and Job, in connection with introduction to the same, special attention being given to the principles of Hebrew Poetry and their application. It has also studied Harper's Syntax.

The Juniors have read in Hebrew portions of Genesis, Exodus, Deuteronomy, and other Historical Books, mastering the elements of Hebrew Grammar and Accentuation, also the elements of Hebrew Syntax. The aim is to familiarize them with the entire range of Historical Hebrew, and for the final examination they are required to read it at sight. The Higher Criticism is thoroughly explained together with its most important application. The usual instruction in Apologetics is given supplemented by lectures.

REPORT OF THE PROFESSOR OF ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY AND CANON LAW.

To the Board of Trustees

of the Theological Seminary of Virginia:

The Professor of Ecclesiastical History and Canon Law respectfully submits the following report:

The Senior Class has studied and been examined upon the first two volumes of Perry's History of the Church of England, which cover the period down to the silencing of Convocation in 1717, A. D. Upon the history after that date lectures have been delivered, and the class has been assigned as parallel reading the third volume of Perry, Ryle's Christian Leaders of the Last Century, Seeley's Later Evangelical Fathers, the Chapter on Methodism in Lecky's History of England in the Eighteenth Century, and Tullock's Religious Thought in Britain during the Nineteenth Century. The lectures are general discussions and criticisms of the successive phases of religious life, and are meant to be directive of investigation and private study. Each student is required to select for special study some one movement of the

eighteenth or nineteenth century, as, for example, the Great Awakening of the Eighteeeth Century, or the Evangelical Movement, or the Tractarian or Broad Church Movement, or some representative writer like Coleridge or Whately, or Arnold or Newman, or Robertson, or he may select the History of the Protestant Episcopal Church. In all cases the result of reading must be embodied in a satisfactory paper. The class is now studying the Canons of the General Church, and will be occupied with them and the concluding lectures on history until the close of the session, when there will be a general examination on the whole period since 1717. A. D.

The Middle Class has studied and been examined upon the two volumes of Smith's Students' Ecclesiastical History, and is, at present, studying Fisher's History of the Christian Church, the Reformation period. It has read as parallel reading French's Mediæval Church History. Special attention is paid in this year to the discussion and criticism of essays read in class by the students.

The Junior Class has read and been examined upon Smith's Old and New Testament Histories, and eight chapters of the Acts of the Apostles in Greek, which last have been used as a basis for the discussion of the constitution, doctrine, life and worship of the Apostolic Church. Essays are read by the class. The parallel reading assigned is the Apocrypha.

ABSTRACT OF ANNUAL REPORT TO TRUSTEES (1894).

Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, D. D.,

President of the Board of Trustees:

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—As Principal of the Episcopal High School I have the honor to make the following report:

The whole number of pupils entered this session is ninety—the maximum attendance being eighty-nine.

The session has been a singularly fortunate one. Besides at least average numbers in a time of widespread financial distress, and fewer losses than ever before, the general conduct of the boys has been highly satisfactory, and their health better than in any previous session.

Liggett Hall, the building here for commencement exercises, society celebrations, readings, lectures, addresses and other public occasions, formally accepted a year ago by the Trustees from Mrs. Laura C. Liggett, as a memorial of her husband, the late Hiram Shaw Liggett, of St. Louis, a former student of the school, has since been completed. Mrs. Liggett having entrusted to me the execution of her purpose and sent the \$10,000 dedicated thereto, and the site having been chosen, under the sanction of the Executive Committee, I employed Mr. J. C. Neilson, architect, and Mr. Clinton Smith, builders, both of Baltimore—of whom I had formed favorable judg-

ment when engaged in the improvement of the school buildings in 1891—and by them the hall was erected and furnished. It was inaugurated by a religious service the evening of Easter day, March 25th, with a sermon, the Rev. Prof. Carl E. Grammer, of the Theological Seminary, officiating. By universal consent, it is well adapted to the purpose for which intended, and a most valuable addition to the equipment of the school.

The same efforts as heretofore to throw about my charge the best safeguards and influences have been made during the past year. Mr. Walter DeForrest, of the Seminary Senior Class, has continued in charge of the Friday night devotional meeting, and the Rev. Prof. Kinloch Nelson has given us his usual monthly services and, to the boys especially, that excellent pastoral care, including extra offices during Lent, which he has so long afforded. To these gentlemen and to my able corps of assistants I am sincerely grateful.

We have had no confirmation thus far this session, but the number of communicants among the boys is thirty-seven.

We earnestly ask the clergy to do likewise during the coming year, that we may be enabled to meet the increasing demands upon us.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA FEMALE INSTITUTE.

Virginia Female Institute, Staunton, Va., May, 1894.

RT. REV. F. M. WHITTLE,

President of the Board of Trustees:

DEAR SIR: As Principal of the Diocesan School for girls, I wish to submit my report of the session, now near its close.

The entire number of pupils enrolled is ninety-five (95); the largest number at any one time ninety-one (91).

Our standard of scholarship continues high, and a fair proportion reach it. The general conduct is very good, and compares favorably with former years, while the general health of all has never been better.

Owing to the fact that a larger number of the pupils were communicants of the Church when entered, and several are much younger than we usually have with us, the confirmation class was small. Three were confirmed and one was baptized and united with the Presbyterian church. There is no abatement in the effort made to train these precious souls for a pure and holy womanhood, and results are encouraging.

The buildings and grounds are in good order, but each year the need of a hall is felt to be greater. The two last years earnest appeals have been made to the Board and Council, but not one step has been taken towards it. The Episcopal High School has had much more done for it than is asked for this school, so let me plead for immediate action. The value of this property has been greatly enhanced by the changes made in grade of street and the new enclosure, a handsome and substantial stone wall. May I not suggest the issuing of bonds, as was formerly done, or the borrowing on the property ten thousand dollars (\$10,000)? This, with what could be raised by private subscription, would very soon accomplish the proposed addition. I have now on hand about \$300, given by pupils and a few friends.

I append one of my circulars, prepared last spring for distribution, and hope some positive action upon this subject may be taken at the meeting of Council this year.

Report of Committee on Division of Church Funds.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DIVISION OF CHURCH FUNDS.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Your committee appointed at the last Council to carry out and effect the division of the Church funds between this Diocese and the Diocese of Southern Virginia, and to deliver on the part of this Diocese such funds and securities as the Diocese of Southern Virginia might be entitled to in the said division (Journal, page 49), beg leave to report as follows:

The Council of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, on June 7, 1893, appointed a committee of three, consisting of Messrs. W. W. Old, M. P. Burks, and N. T. Green, with full power to carry into effect on its behalf the division of said funds and property, upon the basis proposed by the committees appointed by the two Dioceses and approved by the Councils of both Dioceses at their Councils of 1893 (see Journal of Diocese of Virginia, pages 46-49; Journal of Diocese of Southern Virginia, pages 21-23).

On the 30th day of June, 1893, the two committees representing their respective Dioceses met in Richmond, Va., and with the reports of the treasurers of all the several funds, except the Bruce fund, before them, adopted a division of the following named funds—viz:

- 1. Of the Disabled Clergy Fund.
- 2. Of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.
- 3. Of the Episcopal Fund.
- 4. Of the Diocesan Missionary Fund.
- 5. Of the Brotherhood Fund.
- 6. Of the Contingent Fund and the Episcopal Residence.

The details of the division of these several funds are all given in the several statements hereto annexed, showing the division as adopted by the committees, how it has in fact been made, and to whom the moneys and securities making up the said several funds to which the Diocese of Southern Virginia was entitled have been paid or transferred.

The only instance in which the division as made by the committees were not, in fact, carried out literally, are as follows:

In the division of the Widows' and Orphans' fund the committee attempted to divide in kind one Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta railroad bond of \$1,000, and one Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac railroad bond of \$1,000, by giving to each Diocese \$500 of said bonds, at the market value mentioned in the statement. These bonds, being coupon bonds, could not be divided in kind, but the treasurer of the fund for the Diocese

of Virginia made sale of them and divided the proceeds, as will be seen by reference to the statement showing the actual division of said fund.

And in the division of the Episcopal fund a \$2,000 Alexandria corporation bond could not be divided so as to give the Diocese of Southern Virginia \$1,900, as ordered by the committees, but that Diocese took the additional \$100 of said bond, paying for it \$75, the valuation fixed upon it in the division by the committees.

As a part of the contingent fund the Treasurer of the Diocese of Virginia held \$5,000 Georgia Pacific railway second mortgage bonds, which, in the proposed reorganization of the Richmond and West Point Terminal properties, is to be converted into new Drexel, Morgan & Co. reorganization terminal properties at \$125. We have arranged for the division of these so that the Diocese of Southern Virginia will receive \$3,350 of these new securities when issued, and the Diocese of Virginia will receive \$2,900.

The proportion to which the Diocese of Southern Virginia was entitled from the valuation of the Episcopal residence, \$3,769 08, together with the interest thereon for seven months, \$131.92, making \$3,900, was paid to the Treasurer of that Diocese.

As the division of the several funds was not made until some time after the statements had been made by the committees, there appear many items of cash in the statements of the divisions as actually made which do not appear in the statements made by the committees, but the basis adopted by the Councils of the two Dioceses for the division, and upon which the committees acted, was preserved throughout.

The lot in Manchester, taken as a part of the Diocesan Missionary fund, stands in the name of Messrs. Joseph Bryan, Thomas Potts, and John L. Williams, trustees, who are ready to make such a deed as the Council of the Diocese of Southern Virginia may require; but the committee of that Diocese deemed it unnecessary themselves to take a deed for it, because it had been represented as desirable to sell it, and it was understood that in case of a sale of it, the trustees holding the legal title would convey it to the purchaser and account for the proceeds to the Diocesan Missionary Society. This lot was taken at the valuation of \$454.25. It lies on the north side of Stockton street, in Manchester, Va., fronting forty (40) feet on that street, and running back one hundred and twenty (120) feet.

The Bruce Fund has not yet been divided, but it has been agreed between the representatives of the respective Dioceses that it shall be equally divided, and such division will be made by the Bishop of this Diocese, in whose hands the funds are, with all convenient speed.

THE "DIOCESE OF SOUTHERN VIRGINIA," By Fortescue Whittle, Treasurer.

Petersburg, Va., April 1, 1894.

Mr. Joseph Bryan read the report of the Trustees of the funds of the Diocese of Virginia, attached to which was a resolution. Report of the Incorporated Trustees.

REPORT OF THE INCORPORATED TRUSTEES.

The trustees of the funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia (incorporated) report that in accordance with the act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved February 2, 1892, which will be found printed in the Journal of the Council for 1892, page 79, the trustees met on the 2d day of May, 1894, and organized, by the election of Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle as President, and Mr. F. H. McGuire as Secretary of the corporation.

A plan for the conduct of the business of the corporation was referred to a committee, who, at a subsequent meeting, made a report presenting a series of By-laws, Rules and Regulations for the government of the corporation.

The recommendations of this report were adopted in substance, and they provided—

- ist. For a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer; the duties of the latter offices being permitted to be discharged by one person.
- 2d. For the appointment of standing committees on Finance, the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, the Episcopal Fund, the Bruce Fund, and for such other committees as might be further provided for in the By-laws. The members of these committees and their respective chairmen to be appointed by the President.
- 3d. For two general meetings of the trustees each year—viz: the annual meeting on the second Wednesday of May, and a regular meeting on the second Wednesday of November, both to be held in Richmond, Va. Special meetings to be called at any time by the President, or by any five of the trustees, upon one week's notice.
- 4th. Vacancies in the trustees to be created by death, resignation, inability or refusal to act, or removal from the Diocese.
- 5th. The duties of the respective officers to be such as are usually discharged by such officers. The duties of the Secretary and Treasurer are detailed with particularity.
- 6th. All the stocks, bonds, or other evidence of debt which may be transferred to the corporation to be deposited in some safe deposit and trust company, in its care and custody, to be changed or removed only upon an order signed by the three members of the Finance Committee, countersigned by the Treasurer.

The interest dividends and all collections from the securities so deposited to be collected by the safe deposit and trust company, and placed to the credit of the Treasurer, who shall pay out all sums as directed by the Finance Committee. The Treasurer to give bond for the faithful discharge of his duties.

7th. The Finance Committee to have charge of all the funds of the corporation, and to direct the Treasurer in all matters of collection and investment and of disbursement, except where otherwise provided. The other committees to have charge respectively of the disbursement of the annual receipts of their respective funds. Payments to be made by the Treasurer upon the order of the chairman of the committee.

Such, in brief, is the general plan for the management of the funds of the church.

It is expected that the committees will interest themselves in securing contributions to their respective funds—a separate account being kept for each, not only of what is now on hand, but of what may be hereafter contributed.

In order that the funds in the hands of the respective treasurers may be passed over to this corporation, the trustees recommend the adoption by the Council of a resolution authorizing and directing such transfer. A form of a resolution deemed adequate for this purpose is hereto appended.

The death of the Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., and of the Rev. T. G. Dashiell, D. D., and the removal from the Diocese and resignation of the Rev. J. B. Funsten, and the resignations of Col. Arthur Herbert and Mr. C. R. Hoof, all charter members of this corporation, have created vacancies which, under the terms of the charter, must be filled by election by the trustees from persons to be nominated by the Council. The act requires each vacancy to be filled by the selection of one of two or more persons nominated therefor by the Council. As there are three vacancies among the clerical trustees and two among the lay trustees, the trustees propose for nomination by the Council the following names of clergymen and laymen, not, however, affecting in any way the right of the Council to make any other nominations they may deem proper: Rt. Rev. J. B. Newton, Rev. J. K. Mason, Rev. L. R. Mason, Rev. Hartley Carmichael, Rev. R. A. Goodwin, Rev. Preston Nash, Rev. Angus Crawford, and Messrs. J. M. Taylor, James M. Ball, Thos. Potts, James N. Boyd, and L. M. Blackford.

The names presented by the trustees are mostly of persons residing in Richmond, as experience has shown the importance of having members of the committees of the several funds easily accessible to each other.

The resolution recommended for adoption by the Council is as follows:

Treasurer of the Bruce Fund, all of the Diocese of Virginia, be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed to transfer and deliver all the stocks, bonds, notes, or other evidences of debt and cash in their possession, respectively, to the

Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, or to such person or company as they may direct, and the receipt of such trustees, or their duly authorized officer or agent, shall be a full acquittance of said treasurers respectively.

Rev. N. P. Dame read the report of the Committee on Sunday schools.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

From the 103 Parochial reports presented to the Bishop at this meeting of the Council we gather the following statistics:

While we have not been able in the brief time at our command to make any minute comparison between these figures and the figures of last year, the indications are that there have been considerable gains in this department of the church's work, except in the last item—the number of scholars confirmed.

Of the great importance of the Sunday-school in the Church's system there is no question among us. Nor is there any need for your committee to point out how high a place the Sunday-school occupies among Christian activities. But, perhaps, it would not be out of place for us to offer a few general suggestions with regard to the Sunday-school and its work.

The first of these suggestions is, that the distinctive WORK of the Sunday-school is the bringing up of the children of the Church in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, to win their young hearts for Christ, to teach them to hate sin and to forsake it, and to walk in the ways of God all the days of their life. In one word, the peculiar work of the Sunday-school is to take the baptized children of the Church and to help them realize their profession, which is to be made like unto Christ and to do His work in the world; to fight manfully under His banner against sin, the world and the devil, and to continue Christ's faithful soldiers and servants.

There is danger, it seems to us, lest, in these days, this work may be obscured in the minds of both ministers and people by the increasing use of the Sunday-school as a money-raising agency. The constant and urgent appeals to the children to raise money for all sorts of Church work have, we are persuaded, already done injury in some cases. Let the children be taught to give regularly, systematically, cheerfully, above all, to give from

the right motive, because it is Christian, it is in accordance with the will of Christ so to do. But do not ever let the children have ground to imagine that the Sunday-school is primarily a money-making organization, or worse still, that the Church cares for the Sunday-school chiefly for what it can get out of the little children; that it is a mine to be worked for the gold that is in it.

In the second place, we would like to emphasize the well-known fact that the POWER—the only power—by which this work is to be done successfully is the power of the Holy Spirit, not the peculiar gifts of the teacher, nor yet the peculiar excellence of some system or method of instruction.

This power will be manifested, under proper conditions, through the WORD OF GOD. Faith cometh by hearing that word, in the heart of the child, as well as in the heart of the adult. We would urge on rectors and teachers the importance, then, of instructing the children of the church in the plain words and teaching of Jesus wholly apart from any theories or opinions of men, even of the wisest and best of men. For it will ever remain true that the "seed is the word of God." Next to the plain word of God itself, we place, of course, the Church's Catechism as the truest and simplest compendium of the essential teaching of that word.

Again, we would insist that this work of teaching and training the church's children in Christian truth and in Christian living is not, as is so often said, the peculiar task of the *minister*. It is the Church's work. It is the task of the congregation as an organized body, including both minister and people, both head and members; and the people are just as responsible for it as the minister.

The minister and congregation are not two separate agencies, each having its own work and its own responsibilities, and working together at times for mere convenience' sake. They constitute together but one agency, and that of divine appointment. They are as closely related, as absolutely necessary to each other, as the two parts of a pair of shears. They constitute together a great spiritual battery. We look for the manifestation of the power chiefly at the poles, but we should look in vain did the cups or jars fail of their office.

Now God has so wrought minister and people together; he has placed them in a position of such absolute dependence on each other, that He will grant the Spirit's richest blessing on the minister's and teachers' efforts in the Sunday school or in any other department of the church's work, only in response to united, earnest, expectant prayers of the people.

In few words, then, your committee would urge on those who have charge of the Sunday school work, (1) that they see that the spiritual work of the Sunday school be kept constantly in view; (2) that they depend upon and pray and look for the Holy Spirit as the power by which this work is to be done; (3) that the pure word of God be ever regarded as the channel through which

the Holy Spirit will operate upon the hearts of the children, and all "systems of instruction" are of value only as they teach the sacred Scriptures; and (4) that the people be taught that the Sunday school work is *their* work; that those who teach in the school are the agents of the congregation, and urge upon the people that they all pray daily for God's richest blessing upon the labors of those who are engaged in the difficult and often thankless task of teaching the children of the church.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CLERICAL SUPPORT.

From the sixty-five parishes and one hundred and twenty-six churches and chapels shown by the last Journal to be in the Diocese, only seventy-seven reports of church treasurers have been received. It is manifestly impracticable to base an accurate report, or deduce satisfactory results from such imperfect data. Only thirty-six churches report rectories, whilst it is well known to your committee that many other churches have rectories.

The following churches report having paid more to the rector than they promised: St. Margaret's Church, Caroline; Emmanuel Church, Fauquier; St. James', Louisa; St. Stephen's, Fauquier; Trinity, Prince William; St. Paul's, Prince William; Falls, Fairfax; St. Paul's, Hanover; All Saints, Goochland. Sixty churches reported having paid their rectors in full.

Reports of the Committees on the Brotherhood and Finance.

Maj. R. Taylor Scott, for the Committee on the Brotherhood, reported the sum of \$341.33 had been paid to the heirs of the Rev. T. G. Dashiell, and that \$1,510 95 had been paid to the Treasurer of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, leaving in his hands \$1,497.45.

Mr. John F. Glenn, for the Board of Managers appointed at the session of the Council held in Winchester last year to take control of the affairs of the Brotherhood of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, reported that on investigation they found that the Brotherhood is a close corporation, chartered by the Legislature of the State, over which the Council has no control, and therefore they were unable to act under its resolution.

Mr. Joseph Bryan read the report of the Committee on Finance.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Committee on Finance report that they have examined the accounts of Mr. James T. Gray. Treasurer, and have found them well and accurately stated, and his disbursements sustained by proper vouchers.

They recommend that the Treasurer be directed to pay to the Rt. Rev. T. U. Dudley, D. D.; to the Rt. Rev. H. M. Jackson, D. D.; to the Rt. Rev. Ellison Capers, D. D., the expenses by them respectively incurred in attendance upon the consecration of the Rt. Rev. J. B. Newton.

Your committee desire to urge upon the Church at large in the Diocese the absolute necessity of the full payment of the quotas assessed on each parish for the general expenses of the Diocese, including the salaries of our Bishop and Assistant Bishop, in fixing whose salaries the special Council assumed that full payment would be made by the respective parishes when the necessity therefor should arise. That necessity has arisen. We have no margin now as heretofore between the assessments and our necessities.

The committee would therefore called the attention of the rectors and vestries to the fact that the Church does not lay an assessment of \$1 on each communicant, but fixes the assessment upon the various parishes at the rate of \$1 for each of its communicants, and that those who are able are expected and urged to contribute whatever may be necessary to pay the assessment upon their respective churches, that there may be no deficit.

In this connection your committee would report that from those churches which are now included in the present Diocese of Virginia there were reported for the year 1892, 8,774 white communicants, and the payments for the contingent fund that year amounted to \$6,741; for 1893, 8,778 communicants and \$6.513 paid—a falling off of \$228.

Report of Committee on the State of the Church.

Up to the time of this report the Treasurer has received from churches reporting 4,504 communicants only \$3,352.73.

It is not thought that this depressing ratio of payments will be observed by those churches which have not yet reported or paid, as but very few of the city churches have been heard from. These facts emphasize the necessity of increase diligence in the collection and payment of the assessments.

The Treasurer will keep his accounts open until the 7th day of June for the receipt of the assessments, and all payments made before that day will be received and credited as if paid now.

We recommend that a special collection be taken up in those churches, where other methods fail, to obtain the sum necessary to meet the assessment.

We recommend that in addition to the salaries provided for the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop by the special Council in January, 1894, their travelling expenses be paid by the Treasurer.

We recommend that the sum of \$25 be paid to the Assistant Secretary of this Council for his services.

We recommend that the sum of \$15 be paid to the sexton of this church for his services during the Council.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church would respectfully report:

That with unfeigned thankfulness to Almighty God they have listened to the address of our revered Bishop, and the reports presented to this Council, which show the continued prosperity of our church in this Diocese, and Report of Committee on the State of the Church.

pray that a larger increase of grace and spiritual gifts through the power of the Holy Ghost may be ours through the coming year.

We also give thanks for the measure of health and strength vouchsafed to our beloved Bishop, which has enabled him in part to fulfil again his ministry, which has been so blessed of God for more than a quarter of a century; and our fervent prayer is that he may long be spared to aid us by his ripened experience, Godly wisdom, and the benediction of his presence in our annual councils and parochial visitations. We assure him of our deep veneration, love and appreciation of his work over us in the Lord, and of our heartfelt sympathy in the bereavement which has taken from his side the partner of his life's joys and sorrows, praying that the God of all consolation may ever be with him and his.

In the election and consecration of our beloved brother, Rev. John B. Newton, to the Episcopate, we rejoice in the manifest evidence of the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Having made good proof of his ministry as an earnest preacher of the word, and faithful pastor of the flock, approved in all positions in which he has been called to serve, whether in this Diocese or the Councils of the general church, we have full confidence that he will worthily fill the higher office now committed to his trust, and with unswerving loyalty to the faith once delivered to the saints, and to the Book of Common Prayer, will jealously guard the sound doctrine, reverent usage, and the sacred traditions of the church in Virginia.

Passing now to what we feel to be the imperative needs of the hour, we would do our part in commending the great missionary work of the Diocese to this Council. We have the old parishes, especially in Tidewater Virginia, to nurture and support. Weak as many of them undoubtedly are, they are still alive, as is shown by the number of young men offering themselves from their bounds to the work of the ministry, and by the devotion of their people to the church of their fathers. Shall we fail them in the hour of their need? Ought not those portions of the Diocese to whom God has given more abundant prosperity help these old churches, around which so many historic associations gather, to keep their doors open until the returning tide of prosperity gives them the strength of former days. Then there are large areas of this Diocese where our church is yet unknown. In one county there have never been the stated services of the church, and in twenty three counties there are only fourteen ministers. You see that there remains much land to be possessed. The time is ripe. The old opposition to our church has passed away. As one of our ministers has declared, "In every country school-house we can gather a congregation." If we believe in the apostolicity of our church should we not labor by every means in our power to help our advance guards at missionary posts to hold their position, and to send out others for building up the spiritual wastes until they become as the garden of the Lord. We can do this if we will. There is Report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

enough money among our people belonging to the Lord as His required portion. May the Spirit dispose us to liberal offerings of the Lord's money, and enable us as a Diocese to rise up to the needs of the hour.

The Bishop has again earnestly commended the Bethany Institute for the training of deaconesses to the church in the Diocese. Like him, we believe this important institution will yet be established, but why not now? We know of young women who are compelled to go to institutions in other Dioceses who would gladly be trained in Virginia if this institute were an accomplished fact. As the work of deaconesses is more and more recognized in the church we will undoubtedly lose many of our best daughters in the coming years, or else if they return to us, there is danger that they will have received training and imbibed views at variance with the teachings of the prayer book and the usage of this church. We earnestly hope that the words of our Bishop may shortly bring forth fruit in the establishment of this institution for deaconesses on a sound basis, knowing what a blessing it will be to our Diocese.

The Woman's Auxiliary has witnessed a year of large development and increase in power and efficiency. While recognizing the material aid it has given to missionaries in this Diocese and elsewhere, we will call the attention of this Council to it as a great and unifying centre of work for the women of the church. Before its establishment bands of faithful women were working here and there, not realizing how much more effectual their labors would be if they were united in one common bond of interest, guided by leaders who know the needs of the wide mission field, and could direct the streams of benevolence for the Master's sake into wider channels of ministering service. So great has been the growth of the Auxiliary we believe only a few years will elapse before a branch is found actively working in every parish.

Among our various Macedonian calls none should be more heeded than that which comes from the colored race. We have been so interested in the division of the Diocese, in the missionary work among our white population, and in the development of the Women's Auxiliary that the question may be asked, have we not lost sight of Ethiopia in our midst blindly stretching forth her hands unto God? How little has been done by us for this people! Would not the few churches of our communion for this race in our Diocese be shut up if it were not for contributions from other Dioceses? Virginia was not unmindful of her duty to this race in the past. Ought she to let its cry rise unheeded now? It seems to us this people needs the scriptural, catechetical and liturgical training of our Church. We are responsible for giving it to them. To this end we think it would be well for the Council to show its interest in this work by recommending an offertory to be taken up in the churches of this Diocese for it, and providing a place for recording the amount of these contributions in our parochial reports. In addition.

Amendment to Canon XIV.

wherever possible, special services should be held by our clergy for colored people in country parishes, as well as in towns and cities, believing that God's blessing will attend our faithful efforts in this behalf.

Your committee cannot close without noting an improvement in church music in the Diocese. They respectfully suggest that rectors should avail themselves of the wealth of fine hymn tunes contained in the new musical editions of the hymn book, and of the great settings of the canticles by recognized ecclesiastical composers, thereby avoiding all light and inappropriate music in the service of the sanctuary. They also recommend that rectors should enlist in the musical service of the Church the aid of those members of the congregation who have vocal power and musical ability, thus making the common praise of God a voluntary service by His people in His holy temple.

In conclusion, your committee commend the beloved Church in this dear old Diocese to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, and pray that by the influence of the Holy Spirit it may become, as years roll by, more and more a power for the advancement of the kingdom of Christ.

Resolved, That a committee of three (two clergymen and one layman) be appointed to consider the whole subject of Church Finance in our Diocese, as to both principles and methods, and to make such suggestions as may seem to promise improvement in this department of our church work, and to report at the next Council.

Adopted.

Rev. J. R. Ellis moved that the Brotherhood be made the order for 5 o'clock this afternoon. Carried.

The Council then took recess till 4 P. M.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment. Bishop Newton presided.

Lay Representation in the Council.

Rev. N. P. Dame offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Council extend its most cordial thanks to the good people of Richmond for their hospitality; to the rectors and vestries of the several churches for their care and trouble for the Council; to the choirs of the Monumental and St. James' churches for their excellent music and faithful attendance on the meetings and services of the Council; to the Committee on Hospitality for their careful arrangements for the entertainment of the Council, and to the one little page, Master Pope Nash, a host in himself, for his ready assistance in transacting the business of the Council.

Mr. F. H. McGuire presented the following:

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed, to whom shall be referred the question of lay representation in the Diocesan Councils of the Church in Virginia, to report to the next Council.

After reading the minutes, and appropriate religious services, the Council adjourned sine die.

IN MEMORIAM

THE REVEREND

George N. Norton, A. A.

Born in the State of New York.

Ordained in Virginia on July 10th, 1846.

He preached his first sermon in St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, where, forty-seven years afterwards, he preached his last.

His ministry was spent in the following places: Warrenton, Va., twelve years; Columbus, Ohio, one year; St. Paul's, Alexandria, thirty-four years. A part of this last-named period was spent as follows: a few months during the first year of the Civil War as Chaplain of the 17th Va. Regiment, and the remaining years of the war as temporary Rector of Grace Church, Lexington, Virginia.

Resuming his rectorship at St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, at the close of the war, he continued his active and earnest labors until the end of his life.

He was a prominent and influential member of our Diocesan Council and General Convention, and a Trustee of the Theological Seminary and High School.

Died suddenly, September 15th, 1893, in the 70th year of his age.

"They rest from their labors, and their works do follow them."

Secretary's Report, 1894.

To Rt. Rev. F. M. WHITTLE, D. D., President ex-officio:

In submitting the Fourth Annual Report of the work accomplished by the Virginia Branch since last May, the financial depression that faced the workers must be considered, and it is due the secretaries to state, in view of the seeming contrast to other years, that they are learning better how to make out their reports each year, only crediting their receipts from legitimate missionary contributions; so if there seems to be "diminished missionary giving," caused by hard times, through the lines may be seen the faith that undertook, and the glow of hopefulness and courage that sustained them through this crucial year; and while the figures do not come up to the stand-

ard of other years, yet this is counterbalanced by the increase of members and new Branches, with promise of good work the coming year, as the fruit that prayers and loving thoughts have borne from consecrated hearts and hands, offered to God and their fellow men. The Branches have kept true to Auxiliary purposes, more time has been given to the intelligent study of missions, and, best of all, where gifts failed they have learned the power of "prayer for missions," which may be the meaning of the trial of the past year.

As we summarize the reports of twenty-three branches heard from, and five juniors, the condensed statement is stripped of the attractive detail that gives the Secretary enthusiasm in guiding her pen through dreary figures; for in these she sees the bands of women allied to the Auxiliary far separated, yet one with the great work of the Church. The character of the work has been much the same as in the past. Money and boxes have been sent North, South, East, West within our own borders, even to Alaska. For Domestic Missions, \$580. The foreign gifts include China, Japan, Africa, and Brazil, and amounts to \$915.66, while Diocesan, including Parochial Missions, have received \$1,093.42.

Boxes have been sent to missionaries in our own and other Dioceses, while Alaska, the Dakotahs, Minnesota, Wyoming, Utah, and Texas have all shared these good gifts of well-made clothing and staple groceries, valued at \$1,315.61. Total in boxes and money, \$3,904.69. The Church Periodical Club has been organized in Virginia with Secretary and Librarian.

A "Junior Auxiliary," C. P. C., has been established in one Branch with twenty-six members, sending sixty periodicals and papers regularly. Let the Parish Branches register a steadfast intention to do God's and the Church's bidding the coming year, ever keeping their faces set towards the purpose for which their lives are consecrated, and they will accomplish great things, though times be hard and money gifts few; for prayer is the key that unlocks the treasure-house of our rich Father, "whose is the silver and the gold."

REVISED CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA,

As adopted in 1836, and amended in 1840, 1850, 1860, 1864, 1867, 1872 1881 and 1890.

ARTICLE I.

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia on the third Wednesday in May every year; but the Council which meets in the year previous to the meeting of the General Convention may have power to appoint the time and place of meeting for the next annual session, and in the event of the existence of an epidemic disease, or any other good cause, rendering it necessary or expedient to alter the place fixed on for any meeting of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may change the place, or the time, or both.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Assistant Bishop (if there be one), and of the Ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who now are or may hereafter be canonically settled in Parishes or churches within this Diocese; Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, Missionaries within this Diocese, and under its ecclesiastical authority, being Clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese: *Provided*, that any such Ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exer-

cising their clerical functions, shall be members ex officio: Provided further, that only such Colored Ministers shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article: Provided further, that no Minister under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat in the Council, and no Minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC 2. The Council shall also be composed of lay members, consisting of one delegate for each Parish or church entitled to representation, chosen by the Vestry thereof, except as hereinafter provided. Every such Parish or church having more than one officiating Minister canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has Ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church: *Provided*, that only such colored delegates shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article.

SEC. 3. The Council shall also be composed of the Colored Ministers having a seat and voice in the Council on the 17th day of May, 1889, and of two clerical and two lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is now or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

ARTICLE III.

Twenty members of the clerical and twenty of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn.

ARTICLE IV.

In all matters that shall come before Council, the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body, and the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure; but when five members require it there shall be a vote by orders, and a majority of each order shall be necessary to a decision.

ARTICLE V.

The election of a Bishop in this Diocese shall be made in Council in the following manner: The order of the clergy shall nominate

and appoint by ballot some fit and qualified clergyman for that office, and the votes of a majority of that order shall be requisite to constitute a choice; and thereupon such appointment shall be presented to the order of the lay delegates, and be considered by them; and if on a ballot it shall appear that the person so nominated is approved by a majority of the lay order, he shall then be declared to be duly elected.

ARTICLE VI.

The Bishop shall be President of the Council, in which character it shall be his duty to give to the Council annually a general view of the state of the church; to call special Councils at whatever time and place he shall think necessary, or when required by the Standing Committee; to preserve order during the time of session; to put the question, collect the votes, and declare the decision; and he may deliver his sentiments on any subject after it has been discussed before a vote thereon. The Assistant Bishop, if there be one, shall preside in the Council in the absence of the Bishop.

ARTICLE VII.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, the Council, immediately upon their assembling, shall choose by joint ballot a President from among the order of Priests, who shall remain in office until the next annual Council, or until the next election of a President. He shall perform all duties, and possess all the privileges above specified; but he shall not call special meetings of the Council unless applied to for that purpose by a majority of the Standing Committee; and if the Bishop of the Diocese be not present at any meeting of the Council, they shall elect, in the manner aforesaid, a President pro tempore.

ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office during good behavior. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and to faithfully deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the

Council which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to notify through the channel of the public papers, as he may think proper, the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journal of every succeeding Council a list of the clergy, with all alterations therein produced in the preceding year by ordinations, deaths, removals, suspensions and degradations.

ARTICLE IX.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office for one year, or until his successor shall be appointed. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be ordered by the Council. He shall annually report to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same.

In case of a vacancy in the office by the death or resignation of the Treasurer, or in case of his misconduct, incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office during the recess of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may fill the said vacancy, or remove the said Treasurer, and appoint a Treasurer pro tempore, who shall take into his custody all the money and other property, and all the books and papers belonging to the said office, and discharge the duties thereof until the election of a Treasurer by the Council.

ARTICLE X.

Each Annual Council shall elect by ballot a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese, and who shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed.

ARTICLE XI.

Every Parish within this Diocese shall be entitled to the entire benefit of this Constitution as soon as it shall have signified its ratification thereof, either in writing or by sending a lay delegate to the

Council; and such Parish shall thereafter be benefited and bound equally with the other Parishes in this Diocese by every rule and Canon which shall be framed by any Council acting under this Constitution for the government of this church in ecclesiastical concerns.

. ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution shall be unalterable, except in the following manner: A proposition for any change shall be introduced in writing and considered in Council, and if approved of, the same shall be transmitted to the several vestries of the parishes which shall have ratified this Constitution; and if again approved of in the next ensuing Council by a majority, the change shall then take place, and the Constitution so altered shall be valid and obligatory.

CANONS

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

OF THE

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

Adopted 1849, and amended in 1850, 1860, 1867, 1872, 1882, 1887, 1890 and 1894.

CANON I.

Of the trial of a Clergyman, not being a Bishop.

SECTION 1. The trial of a clergyman, not being a Bishop, shall be on a presentment in writing, specifying with reasonable clearness and certainty as to time, place and circumstance, the crime or misdemeanor, by violation of the canons or otherwise, charged; the said presentment to be made to the Bishop, either by the Council, or by the vestry of the Parish to which the accused belongs, or by any three presbyters of the Diocese, entitled to seats in the Council; the said vestry, or presbyters, pledging themselves to act as a committee of prosecution. If, however, the presentment be made by the Council, then the Council shall appoint the committee of prosecution and furnish them with such instructions as may be deemed necessary.

SEC. 2. Such presentment being made to the Bishop, and being accompanied by a further statement in writing of the names of the witnesses, and of the purport of their evidence, and by such documentary evidence as may be in their possession, the Bishop shall immediately proceed to the trial, according to the following provisions:

He shall nominate from among the clergy entitled to seats in the Council, other than the members of the Standing Committee, eight presbyters, and cause a list of their names and a copy of the presentment to be furnished to the accused, or left at his place of residence. Of the eight presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the accused may choose five, or, in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days so to do, the Bishop shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen shall constitute a court for the trial of the accused. The Bishop shall also, at the same time, cause at least thirty days' notice of the time and place of the trial to be given, both to the accused and to the parties presenting him, and also to the presbyters nominated as before provided.

- SEC. 3. The court shall appoint a President and Secretary—the first always from their own body.
- SEC. 4. If the accused appear before proceeding to trial, he shall be called on by the court to say whether he is guilty of the offence, or offences, charged against him, and on his neglect or refusal to answer, the plea of not guilty shall be entered for him, and the trial shall proceed: Provided, that for sufficient cause the court may adjourn, from time to time, and place to place: And provided also, that the accused shall, at all times during the trial, have liberty to be present, to produce his testimony, and to make his defense.
- SEC. 5. On the request of the accused, or the committee of prosecution, witnesses may be summoned—if before the meeting of the court—by the Bishop; if during the session of the court then by its President. All testimony shall be given under oath or affirmation, administered by some officer authorized by law. In case the testimony of any witness—whose attendance on the trial cannot be obtained—is desired, it shall be lawful for either party, at any time after notice of the presentment is served on the accused, to apply to the court, if in session, or if not, to the Bishop, who shall thereupon appoint a commissioner to take the deposition of such witness; and such party so desiring to take the deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying such notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness; whereupon, it shall be

lawful for the other party, within six days after such notice, to propound cross-interrogatories, and such interrogatories and cross-interrogatories, if any be propounded, shall be sent to the commissioner, who shall thereupon proceed to take the testimony of such witness, and transmit it under seal to the court. But no deposition shall be read at the trial unless the court have reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, or unless both parties shall consent that it may be read.

SEC. 6. The court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall, within ten days after closing the same, declare in a written judgment signed by them, or a majority of them, that the accused is guilty, or not guilty, of the charge or charges, or any of them, laid in the presentment, in the order therein set forth, and also, if guilty, what punishment shall be awarded, which judgment, with all the evidence received, shall be delivered forthwith to the Bishop; whereupon, unless the Bishop see cause to mitigate or remit the punishment, or to grant a new trial, he shall pronounce sentence according to the judgment of the court, and such sentence shall be final. In case a new trial is granted, a new court shall be constituted according to the provisions of this Canon.

SEC. 7. If the accused shall neglect or refuse to appear before the court, when summoned according to section second of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the court shall delare him to be in contumacy, and report the same to the Bishop, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass against him for contumacy; but the said sentence shall be reversed by the Bishop, if—within three calendar months—the accused shall tender himself ready, and accordingly appear to take his trial on the presentment; but if he shall not so tender himself before the expiration of the said three months, the sentence of degradation from the ministry for contumacy shall forthwith be pronounced by the Bishop, who shall cause such sentence to be publicly read to the congregations of the Diocese by the respective ministers thereof.

SEC. 8. If at any time the accused shall confess himself guilty of the matters charged in the presentment, or any of them, the court shall proceed to award the punishment, and certify the same, as

hereinbefore provided, to the Bishop, who shall, unless he see cause to remit or mitigate the punishment, pronounce the sentence according to the Canons.

SEC. 9. All notices and papers contemplated by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Bishop, or by the court when the same is in session, and the certificate of any such summoner shall be evidence of the due service of a notice or paper. The delivery of a written notice or paper to a party, or the leaving it at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

SEC. 10. The accused party may have the privilege of appearing by counsel, in number not more than two, and, in case of the exercise of such privilege, but not otherwise, those presenting shall have the like privilege. If the party accused desire it, the trial shall be in public, and said party shall be entitled to a copy of the evidence if he require it.

SEC. 11. In case of a presentment occurring during a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, such presentment shall be made to the Standing Committee, who shall thereon take such steps as are by this Canon enjoined on the Bishop: *Provided*, that on receiving the proceedings and judgments of the court, they shall transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese, who shall be requested, and is hereby authorized to act thereon, as if he were the Bishop of the Diocese, and, if he shall concur in opinion with the court, he shall proceed to pronounce sentence accordingly.

SEC. 12. The expenses of such trial, as also those of the investigating committee, preliminary to a presentment, shall be defrayed by the Treasurer out of the contingent fund by order of the Council.

CANON II.

Of the proceedings in the trial of a Layman, after expulsion by the Minister from the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he

shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric, in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and desiring that he may be restored to the Communion, and then the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the minister, shall nominate two of the clergy and two of the laity, of whom the minister repelling shall select one of the clergymen, and the communicant one of the laymen; and it shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case. under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop, who, thereupon, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence, shall proceed to adjudge the case. If further evidence be required, it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. And when the evidence is thus procured, the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment whenever made to the minister repelling, and to the communicant repelled, which judgment shall be final and conclusive: Provided, that in case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall nevertheless be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

CANON III.

Of the transfer of Communicants from one Parish or Church to another.

Every communicant removing from one Parish or church to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the minister a certificate of regular standing from the minister, or, if there be no minister, from the vestry of the Parish or church from which the communicant desires to be transferred.

CANON IV.

Ministers to be careful in admitting to Holy Communion.

No minister shall enroll any persons as communicants in the Parish or congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, or unless he shall be satisfied that they have been regular communicants in some other Parish or congregation; nor shall he enroll any one who is known to deny the doctrines of the gospel as generally set forth in the authorized standards of the Church; nor shall he report to the Diocesan Council, as a communicant, any one who has not (without satisfactory reason) communed within the year immediately preceding the annual meeting of the Council.

CANON V.

Communicants to have Family Worship.

It shall be the duty of every communicant in this Church, who is at the head of a family, to live in the daily exercise of family worship.

CANON VI.

The members of this Church to instruct their Families in the principles of Religion.

The members of this Church shall instruct their families, as far as they are able, in the principles of the Christian religion. Parents and sponsors shall be careful to teach their children the solemnity and obligation of their baptismal vow, to cause them to attend the catechetical and other instructions of their minister; and, as soon as they are sufficiently instructed and impressed with the importance and sacredness of their baptismal promise, shall take care that they come to the Bishop to be confirmed by him.

CANON VII.

Of the due celebration of Sunday.

All persons within this Church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, in hearing the word of God read and taught, in private and public prayer, and in acts of charity, using all sober and godly conversation.

CANON VIII.

Election and Duties of Vestries and Wardens, &c.

SEC. I. All persons who have attained the age of twenty-one years, have resided in the Parish in which they offer to vote for six months next preceding the election, and are communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church, or regular contributors to the charges of the Parish, shall be entitled to vote at the election of vestrymen for such Parish.

SEC. 2. The election of vestrymen shall be held on Easter Monday; or, in case no election be held on that day, on such other day as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The election shall be held at the Parish church, or some place of worship, if there be one; if not, at such other place within the Parish as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter provided. The voting shall be by ballot. The number of persons to be voted for by each elector shall not be less than three, nor more than twelve, and shall be fixed—where the election is the first in a new Parish—by the Council on its admission into the Diocese, or, before the election commences, by a majority of the qualified electors who shall have assembled to vote at such election; or, in case the election be in an organized Parish, the number to be voted for shall be the same that constituted the former vestry, unless such number be changed in like manner by a majority of the qualified electors so assembled. Only male persons shall be eligible to the office of vestryman; in other respects the qualifications of vestrymen shall be the same as those prescribed for voters. The persons chosen by a majority of

the votes cast at such election, together with the minister in charge of the Parish, if there be one, shall constitute the vestry of the Parish, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected, and qualify as hereinafter prescribed.

SEC. 3. In case there be in a Parish congregations not exceeding four in number, apart from each other, but not constituting independent cures, a separate election shall be held for each congregation at its usual place of worship, or, if there be none, at such other place as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The qualified electors of such congregation shall, in the manner prescribed by this Canon, elect three persons, who shall be vestrymen of the Parish. The vestrymen chosen for such congregation shall, together with the minister in charge thereof, be the constituted authorities of such congregation, and shall manage and control the affairs of the same, so far as they pertain alone to the congregation, and not to the Parish at large. The vestrymen chosen by such congregations in the same Parish shall, together with the minister in charge thereof, be the constituted authorities of the Parish, as its vestry, and shall manage and control the affairs of the Parish, either in general meeting, a majority of the whole number of vestrymen in the Parish being present, or in case such meeting be impracticable. or in the opinion of the minister in charge too inconvenient, any matter concurred in by a majority of the vestrymen of the respective congregations, and duly recorded by the register of the Parish, shall be deemed to be the act of the vestry of the Parish. But in no event shall the aggregate number of such vestrymen exceed twelve.

SEC. 4. If there be no Parish church or place of regular worship for the Parish or congregation, as the case may be, the minister in charge of the same, or other person or persons named in the next succeeding section, shall have authority to appoint the place within the Parish at which such election shall be held. If such place of voting be so fixed before Easter Monday, the same notice of the time and place of election shall be required as in the next succeeding election.

SEC. 5. If no such election be held on Easter Monday, the same may be held on any day thereafter (except Sunday), to be fixed by

the minister in charge, or, if there be none, by one of the wardens, or by two vestrymen, or, if there be none, by three members of the congregation. Of the time and place of such special election, due notice shall be given during the services held at the Parish church or place of worship on the two Sundays next preceding such special election; or in case no such services be held by posting copies of such notice for two weeks next preceding such special election at the front door of the Parish church or place of worship; or, in case there be none, at two or more public places in the Parish.

- SEÇ. 6. The vestry shall appoint three persons, of whom not more than two members shall be of their own body, to act as judges to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges be appointed, the members of the vestry present shall act as judges of election; and in case none of the vestry be present, or if present, fail to act, the electors may choose three of their number to act as such judges. The judges of election shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and of those elected as vestrymen.
- SEC. 7. As soon as may be after such election, the persons chosen to act as vestrymen shall, at such time and place as the minister shall appoint, or as shall otherwise be designated, assemble and proceed to organize the vestry. The register and treasurer of the former vestry shall attend. The proceedings shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's prayer by the minister in charge, or in his absence by one of the wardens, or any other member who may be requested to preside over the meeting.
- - SEC. 9. The vestry shall proceed to elect two wardens, a register

and a treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. The wardens must be communicants and members of the vestry.

SEC. 10. Vacancies occurring in the vestry shall be filled by a vote of the remaining members, and a majority of those who have qualified shall constitute a quorum. The rector shall preside at all meetings when present, and be entitled to give the casting vote in case of a tie, when he is not personally interested. All vestry meetings shall be subject to his call, and in case he fails, at the request of two vestrymen, to call a meeting, such vestrymen, if they deem it necessary, may themselves call a meeting.

Duties.

SEC. I. It shall be the duty of the vestry to determine upon and elect a Rector; to co-operate with him in gathering souls into the fold of Christ; to see that he be properly supported; that his salary be paid with regularity and punctuality; to make and execute all contracts for the erection, furnishing and preserving the church edifice and other church property; to regulate the use of the Parish grave-yard; to employ an organist, and otherwise provide for sacred music, subject to the control of the Rector, and generally as the constituted agents of the Parish or congregation to transact all its temporal business.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the wardens to keep watch over the church property; to see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship; to see that the sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties; to collect the offerings of the people; to take charge of the font and communion plate; to provide out of the Parish funds, under the direction of the vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion; to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the register of the vestry to take charge of all Parish records; to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the vestry, and when there shall be no Rector, to enter upon

the Church register usually kept by the rector, all baptisms, specifying the Christian and surnames of the parents, with the name and date of birth and baptism of the person baptized; also all marriages, deaths and funerals, with dates and names of parties, and in like manner all confirmations administered in, and communicants lost or gained by the Parish, and furnish a report of the same to the annual Councils of the Diocese.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all moneys, except communion alms and other special offerings, and to disburse the same under the direction of the vestry, and to make such reports to the Council as are required by its orders. The term "Parish," wherever it occurs in this Canon, shall be interpreted also to mean church or congregation, wherever such a church or congregation is entitled to a separate vestry, unless where the context requires a more restricted construction.

CANON IX.

Concerning Exceptions to the foregoing Canon.

Whereas the preceding Canon, which directs the manner of choosing vestrymen in the several Parishes, is not applicable to the case of churches built and supported by voluntary associations of individuals; and it is proper that those who hold the sole property of a particular church—as in the case of the Monumental Church, Richmond, and in all similar cases—should provide for its care and management, the choice of vestrymen shall be made by the pew-holders of the respective churches, conforming, as to the time of appointment and manner of qualifying the vestrymen, to the regulations prescribed by the eighth Canon.

CANON X.

Of the Division of Parishes.

SEC. 1. Whenever the members of the church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, shall desire to separate from the Parish of which they form a part, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after

public notice given in the church or place of public worship, or posted upon the door of the same, and appoint a committee to take such measures as may be necessary.

- SEC. 2. The committee thus appointed shall give to the Bishop and to the majority of the vestry (if there be one) of the Parish from which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply for such purpose, which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Bishop and said vestry at least three months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.
- SEC. 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council, and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desirable; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, proceed to divide said parish, and to constitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese.
- SEC. 4. As soon after the adjournment of the Council as may be practicable, the committee aforesaid shall give at least two weeks' notice to the members of the church, residing in the new Parish, to assemble for the election of a vestry, which elections shall be conducted according to the directions contained in Canon VIII.
- SEC. 5. The committee aforesaid, or a majority of those who may attend, shall judge of the qualification of voters, and of the qualification of persons proposed to be elected, and of the election of vestrymen; and those persons whom said committee shall declare to be duly elected, shall be the vestry of said Parish until the election and qualification of the succeeding vestry.

CANON XI.

Of the formation of New Congregations.

When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a minister, shall choose to separate from the Parish or congregation of which they have hitherto been a part, they may proceed according to the directions given in Canon X, except that in

this case the direction as to a line or lines of division is inapplicable. The Council may, on such petition, constitute the applicants a separate congregation, and authorize, by special enactment, such peculiar provisions as to the right of suffrage, the employment of a minister or ministers, and the manner of holding and managing the property of such congregation, as they may propose, and the Council deem expedient: *Provided*, That the time of electing and the manner of qualifying vestrymen shall always be conformed to the regulation prescribed in Canon VIII.

CANON XII.

Of Mission Churches.

SEC. 1. When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation desire a separate and independent organization, but cannot comply with the requirements of the Canon in regard to the formation of new congregations, they may, until they are so able, proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

They must obtain the approval of the vestry of the Parish to which they belonged, and if there be two or more vestries in the Parish they must have the consent of a majority of the same.

They must have the approval of the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese.

They may have their own vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of other vestries, except that they shall have no representation in the Council of the Diocese, and shall not call a minister without the approval of the ecclesiastical authority.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the vestry of a church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocese, and a list of mission Churches so organized shall be published annually in the JOURNAL.

CANON XIII.

Of Colored Mission Churches.

SEC. 1. The colored people of Virginia who are, or may hereafter

be, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary jurisdiction of the Diocese.

- SEC. 2. It shall be lawful to organize Mission Churches or congregations composed exclusively of colored persons, within the limits of any already existing Parish, subject to the same conditions and regulations as are other Mission Churches (see Canon XII), and specially those of this Canon, except that consent of the Vestry or Vestries need not be obtained.
- SEC. 3. There may be appointed, by the Bishop, one or more Presbyters who shall have general supervision of such colored churches and congregations as the Bishop may designate, and perform such duties as he may prescribe.
- SEC. 4. A Convocation shall be held annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the Convocation itself. The colored ministers of the Diocese, in good standing, shall be members of the Convocation, and it shall be the duty of every such minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every Colored Mission Church or congregation shall elect one male lay delegate annually, who, upon the presentation of a certificate signed by the minister (or warden, if there be no minister,) and Register of the Vestry, stating that the delegate is not less than twenty-one years of age, and is a communicant of the Protest-ant Episcopal Church, shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation.

The Bishop, the Assistant Bishop (if there be one), and the Presbyters mentioned in Section 3, shall be *ex-officio* members of the Convocation. The Bishop (or in his absence the Assistant Bishop) shall be President of the Convocation.

- SEC. 5. The Convocation shall have power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Council of the Diocese.
- SEC. 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two clergymen and two laymen to represent them in the Council of the Diocese.
- SEC. 7. Colored congregations, constituted as above provided, may acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by transfer, under the laws of the State of Vir-

ginia; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by like transfer.

CANON XIV.

Of the Evidence of the Appointment of Lay Delegates to the Council.

The appointment of lay delegates to the Council of this Diocese shall be certified by the rector, register, or warden of the proper Parish or Church, in duplicate, and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

The Secretary shall make out a roll and call the names of all certified to him as duly and canonically elected. The President of the Council shall then appoint a committee, to be composed of one clerical and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report the names of those entitled to seats to the Secretary, and of those claiming but not entitled to seats, to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for examination and report.

CANON XV.

Of the Standing Committee.

SEC. 1. Any vacancy occurring by death, or otherwise, in the Standing Committee, shall be supplied by the concurrent vote of the remaining clerical members and lay members of the Committee.

- SEC. 2. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate,' the powers and duties to be performed by the Bishop, as regards discipline, except the pronouncing sentence of suspension, deposition, or degradation from the ministry, shall belong to, and be performed by, the Standing Committee.
- SEC. 3. The record of all the proceedings, on a presentment of a clergyman or layman, shall be preserved by the Standing Committee, and for that purpose shall, after a final decision, be delivered to their Secretary.
- SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee, before every stated meeting of the General Convention, to draft, with the advice and approbation of the Bishop, a report of the state of the Church in this Diocese, to be presented to the General Convention.
- SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee, at every meeting of the Council, to submit, in addition to the report of their proceedings, the documents also which have been laid before them during the year.

CANON XVI.

A List to be made of Ministers in this Diocese.

- SEC. I. Within one week before every stated meeting of the Council of this Diocese, the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, the Standing Committee, shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church, canonically resident in this Diocese, annexing the names of their respective cures, or of their stations as missionaries, or of the colleges, academies, or other seminaries of learning in which they are engaged, or in regard to those who have no cure, or are not engaged in missions or institutions of learning, as above, their places of residence only. And such list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of meeting, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom, and appended to the journal, and shall be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.
- SEC. 2. The list of the clergy of this Diocese, so prepared by the Bishop or Standing Committee, and annexed according to the changes which may occur, whether by death, ordination, discipline, or canonical removals from or admission into this Diocese, shall be

evidence of a clergyman's having a cure or mission, or engagement in a seminary of learning, and no clergyman, while suspended from the ministry, shall have a place on said list.

- SEC. 3. The right of any clergyman to a seat in the Council shall, if disputed, be determined according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons by the Council itself, whether his name be inserted in the list aforesaid or omitted.
- SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the clergy to attend regularly at the meeting of every Council. At the opening of the Council their names shall be called over and absentees noted, and at the ensuing stated Council they shall be required to give excuses for their absence.

CANON XVII.

Respecting the Property of the Church.

The vestries respectively shall hold all glebes, lands, parsonage, houses, churches, books, plate or other property now belonging or hereafter accruing to the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, as trustees for the benefit of the Parish or Church, for whose use the same were or shall hereafter be purchased or otherwise obtained; and may improve, demise, or otherwise dispose of the lands or houses allowed for the minister's habitation or use with the minister's consent; and if there be no minister, with the consent of the Bishop; or in case there be no minister, and the Episcopal Office be vacant, then not without the consent of the Standing Committee. The vestry may also use, improve, or dispose of all personal property, and the produce, rents and profits of lands and houses (not appropriated for the occupancy and use of the minister) belonging to the church, in repairing the church and parsonage house for the benefit of the respective Parishes or churches, and may make such rules and orders for managing the affairs and temporal concerns of their respective churches and Parishes as they shall think most conducive to their interest and prosperity. They shall have the sole power of directing the payment of money belonging to the respective churches and Parishes, and appoint a clerk, treasurer and collector when necessary; all which proceedings shall be entered

in a well-bound book to be kept for that purpose. But when there are trustees under the act of the Legislature, passed February 3d, 1842, authorized to hold real property, such real property shall not be subject to the provisions of this Canon.

CANON XVIII.

Of Church Property for which there are no Trustees.

The Council shall annually elect a Standing Committee, to consist of two clergymen and three laymen, whose duty it shall be to claim for and on behalf the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, all property, real and personal, belonging to said church or any Parish or congregation thereof, whether said Parish or congregation has been disbanded or not, as to which there are no duly constituted trustees in whom is vested the legal title thereto.

The said Committee shall use all due diligence, by proper legal steps or otherwise, to secure such property to the use and benefit of the said Church, or of the proper Parish or Congregation thereof, and to that end the members of said Committee, or the persons designated by them, are hereby nominated without further action of the Council, to the respective courts to which said Committee may apply, as the trustees for any such property so to be claimed by said Committee.

When any such property shall be recovered by said Committee, it shall be held by the trustees appointed for the use and benefit of this Church, or the Parish or Congregation properly entitled thereto.

CANON XIX.

Offenders to be admonished or repelled from the Lord's Table.

Any member of the Church, being a communicant thereof, conducting himself or herself in a manner unworthy of a Christian, ought to be admonished or repelled from the Lord's Table by the minister of the Parish or Church, according to the Rubric. Gaming, attendance on horse-racing and theatrical amusements, witnessing immodest and licentious exhibitions or shows, attending public balls,

habitual neglect of public worship, a neglect of the Holy Communion, or a denial of the doctrines of the Gospel, as generally set forth in the authorized standards of the Church, are practices from which all Christians should abstain. This enumeration, however, shall not be construed to include all the subjects of discipline or admonition in the Church. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the minister, or may be requested by the accused, the Church wardens, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the minister in ascertaining the facts of the case: *Provided*, that if such warden or wardens shall fail or refuse to act within ten days, the minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

CANON XX.

Proceedings for the Expenses of the Diocese.

The Vestries of the several Parishes or churches shall, quarterly, or at every annual Council, as each Vestry shall determine for itself, pay to the Treasurer such sums as may be apportioned to them, respectively, for the purpose of defraying such expenses as may be authorized by the Council.

CANON XXI.

Concerning altering or adding to the Canons of the Church.

No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall hereafter be considered by the Council, unless at least one day's previous notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a committee of at least two presbyters and two laymen. Nor shall such alteration or addition be adopted during the same Council if two-thirds of the members shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration until the next Annual Council.

CANON XXII.

All the former Canons of this Diocese, not included in these Canons, are hereby repealed.
