ORGANIZATION.

"The Secretary shall make out a roll and call the names of all certified to him as duly and canonically elected. The President of the Council shall then appoint a committee, to be composed of one clerical and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report the names of those entitled to seats to the Secretary, and of those claiming but not entitled to seats, to the Council.

"Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for examination and report."

RULES OF ORDER.

- 1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.
- 2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer *pro tempore* when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the *second* day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the follow-

ing standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Elections.

A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of *ten* laymen.

A Committee on Sunday-Schools.

A Committee on Prayer Book Distribution Society.

A Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishops' Addresses the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such other committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary before debate.

2d. After a motion is stated by the President or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

Rules of Order.

3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form:

“Shall the main question now be put?” and until decided all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council, the President, shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question

 Rules of Order.

is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

18th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the Rector or Wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectators shall, during the daily sessions of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

The One Hundred and Sixth Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, met this day in Christ Church, Alexandria, Virginia, at 10 A. M., for Divine service.

The sermon was preached by the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, from Acts i, 2.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, D. D., assisted by the Rt. Rev. George W. Peterkin, Bishop of the Diocese of West Virginia.

After Divine service the Council was called to order by Bishop Gibson.

The Secretary then called the roll, and a quorum (fifty clergymen and thirty laymen) of both orders was found present. The Council was declared organized and ready for business.

Bishop Gibson presented the following report of the Trustees of the invested funds of the Diocese:

Report of Prayer Book Distribution Society.

On motion of Rev. H. B. Lee, this was referred to the Committee on the State of the Church, with instructions to report to-morrow as early in the session as possible.

The Rev. George W. Nelson offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of four clergymen and four laymen be appointed to wait on the venerable Dr. Packard this afternoon, and express to him our respect and veneration.

The Chair appointed the following committee: Revs. G. W. Nelson, N. P. Dame, A. R. Walker, C. E. A. Marshall, Dr. W. P. Moncure, and Messrs. Charles Brown, Rosewell Page, G. G. Minor.

On motion of Judge Wallace, the rules of order were suspended.

On motion of same, it was resolved that the committee appointed at last Council to prepare Constitution and By-Laws for Diocesan Missionary Society (see Journal 1900, p. 45-46) be made the order of the day immediately after the election of the Standing Committee to-morrow.

Rev. H. B. Lee read the report of the Principal of the Virginia Female Institute. (See Miscellaneous in Appendix.)

REPORT OF PRAYER BOOK DISTRIBUTION SOCIETY.

Rev. Wm. Meade Clark read the report of Secretary of the Prayer Book Distribution Society.

The Virginia Prayer Book Distribution Society begs to make the following report:

During the year May 16th, 1900, May 15th, 1901, the Society has distributed 258 Prayer Books and 110 Hymnals. Compared with the statistics of the preceding Council year, this report shows an increase of 103 Prayer Books distributed, and a decrease of 73 Hymnals distributed.

By an act of the Council last year the Society was placed upon the list of objects for which regular offerings are asked through the churches, and it is so enumerated in the list as printed in the Journal.

This fact does not seem to be well known, and, as a consequence, the Society has been hampered by a lack of funds to meet the demands made upon it for Prayer Books and Hymnals.

Amendment to Parochial Reports.

In the Advent season it became necessary, because of the depleted state of the treasury, to make a special appeal to the churches, which brought in a fairly liberal sum. As far as possible the Society has responded to all applications from missionary points, and is ready cheerfully to meet such demands with any money it may have at its disposal.

The Society is convinced that the Prayer Book should occupy a more prominent place in the devotional exercises of the homes and Sunday-schools in the Diocese. In the home its regular and intelligent use will associate its truths with those incidents and experiences of childhood that go far to mould the character, the recollection of which gives the greatest happiness in mature years.

In the Sunday-school it should be as essential to the devotional exercises as it is to the public services in the church. A substituted form, or one composed from the Prayer Book, without the Prayer Book, will fail in that most important consideration of familiarizing the children with the services of the sanctuary, and will allow them, at their most impressible age, to remain ignorant of that appropriate liturgy, the love for which in later life it may be difficult to inspire.

The opening and closing exercises of the Sunday-schools, read from the Prayer Book, with the Prayer Book in the hands of officers, teachers and scholars, will give to the children a knowledge of a love and veneration for the church's liturgy that no change of place or condition will ever eradicate.

We believe that no Diocesan organization is more important than that of your Prayer Book Distribution Society; none more worthy of your prayerful interest and support; and we earnestly commend it to you as an adjunct to your domestic, mission and parish obligations, that cannot, without serious spiritual loss, be ignored or neglected.

For the purposes of this resolution the expression

"Baptized Persons" shall include all baptized children and adults affiliated with the several parishes in this Diocese; and the expression "Confirmed Persons" shall include all who have received Episcopal confirmation in the Protestant Episcopal Church, and have not renounced their allegiance to the same by formerly uniting with some other body of Christians.

The Rev. Edward Wall moved that this resolution be referred to a committee.

Carried.

The President appointed as this committee the Rev. Messrs. Morton, Semmes and Taylor.

The Rev. John P. Tyler, of Philadelphia, then addressed the Council on the General Clergy Relief Fund.

The Council took recess until 8 P. M.

WEDNESDAY, 8 P. M.

The Council assembled in the interest of Diocesan Missions, Bishop Gibson presiding.

After Divine service, the Rev. Wm. M. Clark, Secretary *pro tem.*, read the report of the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

By the grace of God, under the wise presidency of our Senior Bishop, and the unremitting consideration of the lay and clerical members, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society has, during another year, discharged the important duties with which it has been charged, and begs to make this its annual report.

The number of parishes receiving missionary aid during the year is the same as reported last year, while the number of missionaries is greater ; this is accounted for : Several missionaries have moved from the Diocese, and new men have taken their places within the year ; in the enumeration both the outgoing and incoming men have been counted. The amount paid to these parishes wherein these changes have taken place has not been increased, but rather diminished, because of the lapse of stipend during the time such parishes were vacant.

There have been few applications for increase of missionary appropriation, in every instance owing to deaths in, or removals from, the applying parishes of liberal supporters of the church. In other instances there have been voluntary reductions in the amount of stipend asked, and in one case a relinquishment of the entire amount of missionary appropriations.

New combinations of parishes, and the opening of new missionary fields, have demanded new and judicious expenditures. We believe that no men are more faithful and conscientious than those who compose the missionary corps of our Diocese. It is not to the discredit of these servants of the church that their parishes are compelled to ask aid of the Missionary Society, nor is it a charge against the faithful communicants of such parishes. The era of financial prosperity centers in the cities and larger towns ; the younger men and women leave the country to try their fortunes where employment at better remuneration may be secured ; the churches in the country suffer from the loss of this element, their natural source of growth and strength ; the older communicants cannot increase their financial help, and in many instances when they die or move from the parish they leave no successors.

Ours is a Missionary Diocese. It is our boast that the church in Virginia is not shut in the corporate limits of cities and towns, but that in our historic valleys, in our verdant plains, under the shadow of our grand mountains, along our railroads and rivers, and in places far remote from the fierce strivings of trade and commerce, the church builds her houses of prayer and

praise, and her devoted children worship God after the manner of their fathers.

To those who have received liberally of the trust gifts of God, it should be a grateful duty to extend a cheerful, hearty aid to their brethren who have received less of the Father ; for has He not given abundance to some, that they may have the blessed privilege of supplying the needs of those to whom He has given less ?

Your committee provided and distributed, free of carriage, 5,500 mite-boxes among the parishes in the beginning of Lent, each accompanied by a letter written to the children by our Bishop Coadjutor (the illness of the Senior Bishop denying him the privilege). The response to this letter in mite-box collections for Diocesan Missions up to May 15th has been \$2,143. Assured that this amount will be increased by later reports, we note with pleasure the perennial vitality of this plan introduced by our Senior Bishop many years ago. Other methods to raise funds for the Missionary Society have been introduced, tried, and have passed into history ; this plan has been blessed of God to the good of the missionary cause, and stands to-day, as we trust it will ever remain, a monument to the sympathy existing between the children of the Diocese, and him who knew them, loved them, and held their unwavering, devoted confidence.

The Advent appeal made by circular letter to the clergy in the Advent season met with a very general and liberal response.

The two extraordinary appeals are all that are made during the year, and with the regular collections have provided for the expenditures.

There is no question but that with ampler resources the mission work in the Diocese could be made more aggressive and effective. Our bishops could place more men, new fields could be opened, existing preaching places could have more frequent services, and new life could be infused into a work now limited by inadequate means.

May God stir up the hearts of His people to consider the vast responsibilities of the mission work entrusted to them as His stewards.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Council are cordially tendered to the Trustees of the Theological Seminary for the excursion given by them to the Council on yesterday afternoon; to Mr. Joseph Wilmer, by whom the arrangements for the visit were made, and to the ladies of "The Hill," forming the reception committee, by whom we were so pleasantly entertained. To the Council of Virginia no spot is so hallowed by sacred memories and so rich in high inspiration as our dear school of the Prophets. We honor her lofty traditions, rejoice in her holy influences, and thank God for every token of His abiding blessing upon her.

Rev. Everard Meade presented the following preamble and resolution and moved their adoption:

WHEREAS, The Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia has heard of the effort of the Mount Vernon Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution to raise funds to restore Pohick Church, Fairfax county, Va.; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Bishop, clergy and laity, in Council assembled, that we heartily endorse this work, and trust that their efforts may be crowned with success.

Adopted.

Rev. H. B. Lee moved that Mr. L. M. Blackford be added to the committee appointed to consider the decrease of candidates for orders.

Carried.

Bishop Gibson then read the address of Bishop Whittle.

Bishop Whittle's Address.

BISHOP WHITTLE'S ADDRESS.

MY DEAR BRETHREN:

It is a great grief to me that I cannot be with you in our annual Council, but a long and severe illness, commencing about the middle of January, has left me in such a condition that I am not able to stand the excitement and fatigue which my attendance on your meeting would involve. Sickness at other periods during the year prevented me from filling appointments which I had made, and—being in the seventy-eighth year of my age, the fifty-fourth of my ministry, and thirty-fourth of my Episcopate—I cannot hope in time to come to do much in the way of visitations of the churches, but must lay that burden chiefly on my brother Bishop, who is so able and willing to bear it. I beg, therefore, of my beloved brethren of the clergy and of the laity, to continue in the future that generous sympathy and forbearance for my many infirmities and shortcomings, which they have ever manifested in the past.

May 16-18, 1900—I was in attendance on our annual Council in Charlottesville.

May 20—Preached in the chapel of the Theological Seminary in the morning, confirming five, and in the afternoon in the Chapel of the Good Shepherd (colored), on the Seminary grounds, and confirmed four. Sickness prevented me from conducting a study of the Book of Common Prayer with the senior class of the Seminary, which I had done for many years, by direction of the Board of Trustees. During this week I attended and took part in the chaplains' examinations.

June 12—Went to Staunton to attend the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute, but, a quorum not being present, no meeting could be held. I take this occasion to say that the Institute, under its new principal, Miss Duval, is conducted successfully and satisfactorily, and is in the highest degree, worthy of the patronage of parents and guardians.

June 14—Attended the annual meeting of the Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School, Petersburg. This school, I am glad to believe, is growing in favor in the church, and is coming

more and more to be regarded as the best place to educate colored men for the ministry. It needs only money to enable it to do a great work for that part of our people.

June 18-23.—Was engaged in duties connected with the close of the session of the Theological Seminary.

August 6.—Trinity, Manassas, preached and confirmed four. Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton is doing a good work in this place, and hopes soon to build a church at Noaksville, a new field of labor for us.

August 7.—Preached in St. Paul's, Haymarket, and confirmed two.

August 8.—Church of Our Saviour, Fauquier, and confirmed one.

August 9.—Grace, The Plains, and confirmed one.

August 10.—Trinity, Marshall, and confirmed two.

August 11.—Emmanuel, Fauquier, and confirmed one.

August 12.—Leeds, and confirmed five.

August 13.—Calvary, Front Royal and confirmed six.

August 14.—Preached in Meade Memorial, White Post, Clarke county.

August 15.—Preached in Christ Church, Millwood, and confirmed one.

August 25.—Preached in Wickliffe Church, Clarke county, and the next day in Grace Church, Berryville.

September 2.—Pohick, Fairfax, preached and confirmed one.

September 29.—Preached in St. Stephen's, Fauquier.

In a former address I spoke of the great and steady decrease in the number of our candidates for Holy orders during the past few years, a fact which causes me the deepest concern, being, in my judgment, a most significant indication of the spiritual and real condition of the church. I have just reported two white postulants only, received last year, a much smaller number than ever before in my experience of more than thirty years. And of the six young men reported as having been ordained Deacons, only one is a native of Virginia, and three of the six were transferred to other fields of labor. I had hoped that many members of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew throughout the diocese, of whom we hear so much, would have felt inwardly moved by the Holy Ghost to devote themselves to the larger and more important work of the ministry, but, so far as I know, not one, because of his connection with that society, has ever become a candidate for Holy orders. Surely this is a sad and alarming state of things, showing that, while there is great religious activity of certain sorts in our churches and amongst our congregations, there must be much of a form of godliness without the power thereof. I trust the committee, appointed by the last Council to report on this subject, may be able to suggest the causes and the remedy for this deplorable evil.

There are two objects for which the Council recommends that annual contributions be made by all our churches, to which I would ask the special attention of my brethren. One is the Prayer Book and Hymnal Distribution Society, established by the Council and one of the most valuable missionary agencies of our Church. The Society distributes gratuitously The Book of Common Prayer and our Church Hymnal in any number where they are needed in missionary work. The Society could greatly extend its usefulness if it were more generally known and more liberally supplied with funds. It has been obliged to decline applications for books, because it had not the means to supply them.

Bishop Whittle's Address.

The other object to which I referred is our work among the negroes of the Diocese. No other work is more important or obligatory. It cannot be that there are any of us who, as citizens and as Christians, feel under no responsibility in regard to this people. For our own good as well as for theirs we are bound to do what we can to elevate them intellectually, morally and religiously. The harvest truly is plenteous if we only had the money to secure laborers to gather it. A small contribution from each of our congregations would aggregate a considerable sum, would show the minister's interest in this good object, and would help to educate and benefit the people, for it is more blessed to give than to receive.

I congratulate you on the larger contributions this year than last to our Diocesan Missionary Society, the most important of our organizations, on which, not only the growth, but the very life of our Church largely depends, and I thank the dear children for their large part of the offerings, and trust they will continue to stand by the Society and help it more and more, for we cannot do without them.

I respectfully recommend that the Secretary be directed to publish in each annual Journal of the Council, for the information of ministers and people, a list of the legal titles of all the incorporated Boards or Societies of our Church within the Diocese. When persons have wished to devise money or other property to one of these corporations, I have been repeatedly asked to give them the legal title, and in some cases wills have been made in which the object intended to be benefited was not properly designated and which had to be determined by a suit at law. The existence of some of these bodies, I am sure, is not known to many of our own people, to say nothing of outsiders, some of whom might be interested in them.

BISHOP COADJUTOR GIBSON'S ADDRESS.

BRETHREN OF THE COUNCIL:

In the providence of God we have again assembled to consider the interests and foster the growth of that portion of the Church of Christ which is committed to our care.

Wishing you good luck in the name of the Lord I proceed without preface to render you an account of my official acts since the beginning of May a year ago.

On the second of May, at the Theological Seminary, I attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of that institution. It was there resolved to discontinue the May meeting of the Trustees, and to substitute one in November of each year.

The change is convenient and promises to be of some service.

Sunday, May 6th—I confirmed three persons at St. Mark's, Richmond, and with the rector administered Holy Communion.

Wednesday, May 9th—Met the Trustees of the Diocesan Funds in annual meeting at the City Bank in Richmond.

Sunday, May 13th—Preached in the morning at Emmanuel, Henrico county, the rector being absent on missionary work.

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, May 16th to 18th inclusive—Attended Council in Charlottesville.

On Sunday, May 20th—Preached in Christ Church, Charlottesville in the morning and confirmed fourteen persons. In the afternoon visited a new mission to the west of the city and made an address. At night preached for Mr. Lee in Christ Church.

Sunday, 27th—Confirmed two in the morning at St. John's Church, West Point, and at night preached in St. David's at Aylett.

Wednesday, 30th—In Richmond had the burial service for a lady at her special request. No rector.

June 1st—I preached at night in Luray, Page county, but confirmed no one. The next day spent a most interesting day at Ingham in the hollow or valley of Fultz Run. Here the Rev. C. E. A. Marshall has opened a mission. The people are eager for Christian instruction and leadership. They are shrewd, sensible people, but largely

without letters. Mr. Marshall baptized by immersion the Superintendent of the Sunday School, and later in the afternoon I met a number of the pupils of the School in their meeting place and made them an address. The School, cut down that afternoon by rain to 26, numbered at that time about 80.

On Sunday, June 3d—I administered Holy Communion in the Church at Shenandoah and at night confirmed three persons in the same Church.

Monday, 4th—Visited Lynwood day-school of thirty-seven, and at night in Brown's Gap confirmed one.

Tuesday, 5th—Visited Brown's Gap day-school of thirty, and at night at Lynwood, confirmed three.

Sunday, June 10th—Visited Hamilton and Round Hill, in Loudoun Co.; at the former place confirming four and at the latter two. Rev. Mr. LaMothe has since gone to Washington, D. C. as assistant to Rev. Dr. McKim. He has left behind him a record of work well done.

Tuesday, June 12th—I attended the commencement exercises of the Virginia Female Institute in Staunton. There was to have been a meeting of the Board of Trustees that afternoon. The out of town members from the Southern Diocese failed to come. This is a splendid institution. I wish we could either buy it or sell it to Southern Virginia.

Thursday, 14th—I attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School in Petersburg.

Sunday, 17th—In the Chapel of the Theological Seminary, confirmed two persons for Glen Carlyn mission, and in the afternoon of the same day, two persons in the chapel for the colored people in Alexandria.

On Monday, 18th—In the evening preached at Glen Carlyn and confirmed one.

Tuesday, 19th—Meeting of the Education Society of Virginia. Same day meeting of Board of Trustees of the Seminary. Wednesday, Trustee meeting continued and concluded. Thursday, closing exercises of the Seminary, and Friday, ordination of Deacons and Priests. I attended these meetings.

Sunday, 24th—At St. Peter's, New Kent, I preached twice, and in the morning administered Holy Communion. No one was confirmed. The church was in charge of lay readers who did their duty faithfully until in November they were able to transfer their responsibility to a clergyman.

From Saturday, June 30th, to Tuesday, July 3d, inclusive—I visited the churches in Gloucester and Mathews counties. At Abingdon and Ware I administered Holy Communion—otherwise did nothing but preach. Congregations were good and attentive, but I think they must be too much "at ease in Zion." I could not find out that the lack of confirmations was in any way the fault of the clergy. I took Abingdon, Saturday; Ware and Holy Innocents, Sunday; Trinity, Mathews, on Monday; Christ Church, and St. John's, Tuesday.

Saturday, July 7th—I preached at Grace Church, Charles City county, none confirmed; but Sunday I confirmed three at Mapsico and one at Westover.

Sunday, 22nd—Assisted in service at Emmanuel, Staunton.

Sunday, 27th—Preached in Trinity Church, Staunton.

Sunday, Aug. 5th—Preached in Emmanuel, Staunton, and administered Holy Communion, and Sunday, the 12th, preached at Verona in Augusta county, in a chapel belonging to Emmanuel congregation.

Friday, 17th—Preached at Union Mills in Fluvanna county, in a Methodist Church, where Rev. Valentine Jones gathers our people in that vicinity. First visit of a bishop.

Saturday, the 18th—Preached at St. Andrew's, Albemarle, and confirmed four. This also is a mission chapel of Rev. E. V. Jones, which had never received Episcopal visitation.

Sunday, 19th—Confirmed six at Grace Church, Albemarle, and in the afternoon preached at St. John's, Louisa county.

Monday, 20th—Preached at St. John's Chapel, Louisa, and confirmed two.

On Tuesday, 21st, Wednesday, 22d, and Friday, 23d, preached in Zion Church, Fairfax, the Church at Vienna, and the Chapel of the Good Shepherd. Of this group of churches the Rev. Albert R. Walker had just taken charge. Owing to the fact that their rector had so lately arrived I held no confirmations.

Sunday, 26th—Morning, at Falls Church, confirmed four; afternoon, at Bailey's Cross Roads, preached; night, at Herndon, confirmed seven.

Monday, 27th—Confirmed four at Centreville and one at Chantilly.

Wednesday, August 29th—Preached at Goresville but confirmed no one.

Thursday, 30th—Confirmed two at Round Hill and second visit in three months.

On Saturday, the 1st of September—I preached at Oatlands and confirmed seven, and on Sunday, 2nd, preached at Emmanuel, Staunton, and administered Holy Communion.

Tuesday, September 11th—Confirmed two persons in Scottsville, Albemarle county.

Wednesday, 12th—At the Rectory of Rev. W. H. Laird, baptized his little child. Confirmed four persons in Christ Church, St. Anne's parish, and in the afternoon preached at Howardsville.

Friday, 14th—Preached at St. Paul's Church, Ivy Depot, and confirmed four; in the afternoon at St. John the Baptist, confirmed eighteen, of whom thirteen were presented by Rev. John G. Scott, of the Miller Manual School; and at night preached to a most inspiring congregation in the Chapel of the aforesaid school.

Saturday, 15th—Reached Emmanuel, Albemarle county, with the rector, only to find that the congregation had been prevented from assembling by heavy and continuous rain.

Sunday, 16th—Baptized an infant at St. James', Albemarle, confirmed three persons, and administered Holy Communion; in the afternoon preached at Buck Mountain Church.

Monday, 17th—Confirmed five at Edgehill, and Tuesday, 18th, one at St. Luke's College.

Sunday, 22d—Preached at St. James', Louisa Court House, and at night confirmed thirteen at Mineral City.

Wednesday, October 3d—Attended the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Virginia Branch, at Warrenton, and in the evening made an address. Bishop Partridge followed me in a strong speech on Missions in China. On Thursday, at a convenient time in the Conference proceedings, confirmed one person who was pre-

vented by sickness from presenting himself at the last regular visitation. In the afternoon of that day made a short address.

Sunday, 7th—In the afternoon, among other speakers, made a short address in the Chapel of St. Paul's Church, Richmond; occasion, the opening of the new building.

Wednesday, 10th—The Annual Council of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew met in Richmond. It fell to my lot to deliver both the address of welcome to the Council and the charge to the Brotherhood. These addresses were thrown together and made on Thursday morning. On Friday, with assistance, I administered the Holy Communion to the Brotherhood as a body, and on Saturday took part in the historical service at St. John's Church, Rev. C. Braxton Bryan making the address.

On Sunday, 14th, I ordained to the priesthood Rev. Nathan Mathews, who has since gone to Africa as a missionary. The service took place in Grace Church, Richmond, the Rev. Everard Meade preaching the sermon, and with the Rev. L. R. Mason, uniting in the laying on of hands. At night I presided at the farewell service to the Brotherhood, and on the part of church and city said "Good-bye."

On Tuesday, 16th, I confirmed two persons at Christ Church, Middlesex, and on Wednesday, 17th, three at St. Luke's, Essex. These services were held by special request of Rev. J. H. Hundley, who felt obliged, in consequence of illness, to give up the active work of the ministry, and desired, as far as possible, to set his parish affairs in order before doing so.

Sunday, October 21st—I preached the missionary sermon in St. Paul's Church, Louisville, Ky., preparatory to the Missionary Council. Monday evening presided over a meeting of the local assembly Brotherhood of St. Andrew in Calvary Church. Addressed by several of the Bishops attending the Council. This by request of the rector of the church.

Tuesday, 23d, to Thursday, 25th, in attendance on the Council.

Sunday, 28th—Confirmed one person in St. Mary's, Goochland; afternoon, preached at All Saints.

Monday, 29th—Confirmed six in Grace Church.

Tuesday, 30th—Preached at St. Paul's, and Wednesday, 31st, confirmed one at Columbia.

November 1st—Assisted at a wedding in Grace Church, Richmond.

Sunday, November 4th—Confirmed three at Barboursville, and three at Somerset. Monday, confirmed one in Christ Church, Gordonsville, and two in St. Paul's Church (colored). Tuesday, visited the school in Gordonsville.

Tuesday, 13th—Attended meeting of the Board of Trustees at the Theological Seminary.

Thursday, 15th—For the rector, administered Holy Communion to the Chapter of the Brotherhood at Holy Trinity, Richmond.

Sunday, 25th—Preached at St. Margaret's, Caroline county, confirmed one and administered Holy Communion.

Thursday, 29th, Thanksgiving Day—Preached in Holy Trinity, Richmond.

Sunday, December 2d—Confirmed three in St. Paul's, Hanover county, and preached in Immanuel. 4th, preached in the Church of Our Saviour. 5th, confirmed two in Trinity Church. 6th, confirmed five in Fork Church. 7th, confirmed one in St. Martin's Church.

In the course of this trip visited, with the rector of the Parish, Rev. Mr. Hepburn, the Reformatory for Colored Youth. This institution seems to be starting well. The buildings are simple and the discipline strict. To generalize for a moment: the plague and threat of the philanthropic work done for the negroes in the South is the immense mass of brick and stone buildings it is producing. It is a plague because it is spoiling its beneficiaries. It is a threat because its tendency is to anchor down in one section a population which ought to be evenly distributed over this whole country.

Monday, 10th—With Rev. E. B. Burwell, of Columbia, went to Red Hills in Fluvanna county, where we met the Rev. E. V. Jones and opened a mission. The next day seven persons were confirmed and Holy Communion administered. These persons had been prepared by Miss Bettie Cocke in the Sunday-school which she has taught at her home for several years, and they were examined and presented by the Rev. Mr. Jones. Mr. Burwell will preach at this

point hereafter several times a year, and look after the people in the vicinity to the best of his power. That afternoon I preached at Union Mills.

Sunday, 16th—Confirmed three persons at St. Peter's, Caroline county, and in the evening preached for the rector.

Tuesday, 18th—Attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Hampden Sidney College at Farmville.

Sunday, 23rd—Confirmed fourteen in Monumental Church, Richmond, and administered Holy Communion.

Tuesday, 25th, Christmas Day—Preached in All Saints', Richmond, and administered Holy Communion.

Thursday, 27th—Attended a reception to the Southern Educational Association, and Friday, 28th, made an address to the Kindergarten Department of the same in the Grace Street Baptist Church.

Sunday, 30th—Confirmed two in Upperville and one in Middleburg, and Monday, 31st, three in Aldie.

Sunday, January 6th, 1901—I preached in All Saints' Church, Richmond, on the occasion of the opening of the new and beautiful church. It was a pleasure to be with the rector, the Rev. Mr. Downman, and with the congregation under such circumstances. The church building is unusually interesting as well as handsome. I administered the Holy Communion also.

Tuesday, 8th—Confirmed a sick man in private, at the request of Rev. L. R. Mason.

Sunday, 13th—Confirmed three persons in St. James' Church, Ashland, and at the second service preached for the rector.

Monday, 14th—Meeting of Trustees of Protestant Episcopal Church Home.

Monday, 21st—As Bishop Whittle was too ill to come out, I presided at a meeting of the Protestant Episcopal City Mission Society at St. James' Church, Richmond.

February 4th—At the request of the Diocesan Missionary Society, wrote letters to the children of the Diocese and in the interest of the Virginia Prayer Book Society.

Wednesday, 6th—By courtesy of the rector of Holy Trinity, Richmond, performed marriage ceremony in the Chapel of that Church.

Tuesday, 12th—Meeting of the United Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in St. James', Richmond. Dr. William Cabell Brown spoke on Brazil. Present and presided.

February 18—For Rev. L. R. Mason, confirmed one person in private.

The last week in February and the first week in March were occupied largely in duties connected with a mission held under the auspices of the Richmond clergy in St. Paul's Church. The general theme was the history, doctrine and polity of the Church. Dr. R. H. McKim and Bishop Thompson were the speakers. It was a rare treat to clergy and people, and we hope will result in greatly increased attention to these subjects.

Sunday, March 10th—Confirmed seven in Weddell Memorial and two in St. Mark's, Richmond.

Sunday, 17th—Twelve in All Saints' and twenty in St. Andrew's.

Thursday, 21st—For the rector, administered Holy Communion to the Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew of Holy Trinity, Richmond.

Sunday, 24th—Confirmed eight people in Grace Church, Richmond, and thirty-two in Christ Church.

Tuesday, 26th—Confirmed six in St. George's, Fredericksburg.

Thursday, 28th—Nineteen in St. Philip's, Richmond.

Friday, 29th—Ten in the Monumental.

Sunday, 31st—Fifteen in St. John's, eighteen in St. James' (one for St. Paul's) and twelve in Holy Trinity (one for Epiphany).

Monday, April 1—Meeting of Diocesan Missionary Society.

April 2—Grace Church, Berryville, confirmed seven.

April 3—In private house in Berryville, confirmed one.

April 3—Second service, Boyce, confirmed one.

April 4—Millwood, confirmed eleven.

April 5—Winchester, A. M., confirmed fourteen.

April 5—Middletown, P. M., confirmed two.

April 7—Easter Day, White Post, confirmed one and administered Holy Communion; at night preached at Front Royal to an overflowing and deeply interested congregation, and confirmed eight.

Monday, 8th—Mount Jackson, confirmed three.

Tuesday, 9th—At Harrisonburg, confirmed one.

On Saturday, April 13th, made a brief address at St. Andrew's Church, Richmond, on the occasion of the laying of the corner stone of the new church building; reached Alexandria that night and the next day confirmed seventeen in Christ Church, four in Grace and twelve in St. Paul's. All the classes were cut down by the storm of wind and rain which continued all day.

Monday, 15th—Confirmed seven at Fairfax Courthouse, five at Vienna, and none at the Good Shepherd. I preached at the last of these places, but the persons who were to have been confirmed could not brave the weather.

Tuesday, 16th—Preached at Brandy and in the afternoon confirmed two at Mitchell's.

Wednesday, 17th—Confirmed one at All Saints', Culpeper, and preached at Rapidan. The 18th confirmed one at Culpeper, St. Stephens, and the 19th one at Rixeyville.

Sunday, 21st—Confirmed three at Washington, Rappahannock county, and four at Woodville.

Friday, 26th—Confirmed two at Trinity, Lancaster.

Saturday, 27th—Preached at White Chapel.

Sunday, 28th—Confirmed four at Wicomico, Northumberland county, and two at Grace, Lancaster.

Monday, 29th—Confirmed one person in private near Farnham, three at Emmerton and three at St. John's, Warsaw.

Tuesday, April 30th—I attended the opening service of the Rappahannock Convocation and in the evening spoke on Diocesan Missions.

This ends the Journal. Now to resume.

I have made 122 visitations of churches and held 32 other services; have preached sermons and made addresses to the number of 210; have officiated on 93 occasions of confirmation and confirmed 479 candidates; have administered Holy Communion 17 times; baptized two infants; married two couples; buried one person, and ordained one deacon to the priesthood. I have attended eight Trustee meetings, visited five schools for the purpose of inspection and made a point of being present officially at six general meetings for religious or educational extension. During Bishop Whittle's illness I received one letter dimissory, viz: from the ecclesiastical authority of Southern Virginia, and gave one to the ecclesiastical authority of Pennsylvania.

Bishop Coadjutor Gibson's Address.

There are some matters to which I have referred in other addresses to the Council which I wish to emphasize if only by repetition.

1st. Our Colonial Church Buildings.

They are monuments of the life of the colonies, they illustrate a period which has much romantic interest and many fine distinctive features, and in my humble judgment they will be wanted again for the service of our Church.

My suggestion, then, is that in every county where there is a church of the colonial period, an organization be formed among the ladies and gentlemen of the parish to rebuild, repair or take care of the same; the specific duty in each case to be determined by the state of the building. Such an organization would enlist the help of people without as well as within the county; indeed, of some without as well as within the State. Where there are two colonial churches in a county there should be, I think, two organizations. Something is gained when even a few rays are brought to a focus.

2nd. Our pension fund.

By this name I would designate the fund for widows and orphans, and the fund for disabled clergy. The Council will be glad to know that these funds have done better this year—the latter very much better. Appeals made for them by those in charge have been heard and liberal responses given. But the needs of the funds are great and not decreasing. I hope the reports made to this Council will be read by the clergy, and that they will remember the brethren and their families on one good Sunday every year. The General Convention asks that an offering be taken by each rector on Quinquagesima Sunday for the General Clergy Relief Fund. That fund is doing the same sort of work with our Widows' and Orphans' and Disabled Clergy funds. The request of the General Convention for the Quinquagesima offering ought to be granted where it is possible. It is a case where justice and mercy meet together, both demanding that we shall give all the help we can, and for our needy ones in turn get all the help we can.

But this subject has larger and more wide-reaching relationships than have yet been mentioned. This Council has a pension fund, the General Convention has a pension fund. We, as individuals, are under obligations to both Council and Convention. Suppose

we can add to the value and magnitude of the general effort to benefit those persons, or the families of those who have given their lives to the ministry. Ought we not to do it? Other things being equal, I think we ought beyond question. The clergy are the clergy of the Church in the United States. They come here from other Dioceses and we take them to our hearts. We go to other Dioceses and they treat us the same way. The honor of the Church in the United States is concerned in caring for those who fall overburdened by the way, or who leave helpless those for whom other men spend the labor of their lives. The whole Church in this country wants to act in helping aged and infirm clergymen, and it ought so to act. Now there are few objects on which the Church can act as a unit.

We are making a gigantic experiment in our missionary operations. That experiment is threatened at its very base. We may be obliged to insist on voluntary missionary societies if our hardly raised funds are used to support those who in our judgment pull down the Church instead of building it up.

But there is no such question as this about pensions. Sternness and rigor vanish when disability and suffering present themselves. We can all agree to help the helpless of our tribe and family. But every enterprise in which the Church acts as a unit becomes a bond of union.

We need such bonds. We ought to hunt for them. We should bind them about us though they be fine and weak as silken threads. Hence I think we should strengthen our interest in the General Clergy Relief Fund. I do not believe we can coalesce with that fund. I do not think we can merge our existence into theirs.

But I feel that if we want to help them, and they want to help us, we can find some way of getting together, some *modus vivendi*, alliance or correspondence.

I suggest therefore the appointment by this Council of a committee to confer with the Secretary, Rev. Alfred J. P. McClure, to ascertain the terms on which the General Society and our committees can co-operate.

3d. Last October the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary for the first time met at a date and place different from those of the meeting of council.

It was my privilege, as I think it was my duty, to attend. The meeting was a success. The attendance was exceedingly good and the interest warm, indeed enthusiastic. Among other matters of importance the Auxiliary resolved to make a contribution from each parish branch to the Emergency Fund. This was a gratification to me because it showed that the laity, and especially the women, were disposed to take seriously a proposition which I had deliberately laid before them, and which in the nature of things the clergy are not going to care much for.

The Bishop needs a fund to be used at his own discretion. There is no such fund provided by rubric or canon; though the Church from which our rubrics and canons are largely derived has set us a good example in that respect. Each Bishop must devise a plan for raising a discretionary fund to suit his own surroundings. My plan is very simple, it is to tell the people the money is needed, and continue to tell them the same thing until the money comes. This plan is based, as you see, on the goodness of the human heart, and the natural difficulty of gaining a hearing when so many objects appeal to us at once. The Emergency Fund has received during the year \$228.50 and disbursed \$170. Five parish branches of the Woman's Auxiliary have sent in to the Treasurer \$58.50, which is the exact amount the fund has on hand of this year's receipts, and \$10 more is on the way to the Treasurer.

I find the question of the observance of the Lord's day is troubling many of our clergy. This is especially true of the clergy in the cities. They see their people go off on excursions for Sunday, spend part of the day playing golf, and take the afternoons and evenings for visiting socially, and even for entertaining their friends. Naturally this state of things distresses them. The Lord's day kept religiously is the chief bulwark of christianity. The other feast days of the church, and the fast days of the church, do not appeal to the consciences of our people in any thing like the same way. Sunday is interwoven into the habits of thought and life of the masses of those with whom we deal. They are more ready to hear on Sunday. The day itself calls them to christian reflections and christian work. The rest is welcome to those who toil and contact with the high themes of the pulpit is refreshing and stimulating.

Now to have all this threatened by the entrance into our own camp of an insidious enemy in the shape of a careless habit is a grief to every earnest minded man.

Many of those who take a day off from church to go to the country, or run a few times over the golf links, or give a party on Sunday, would be exceedingly sorry to see the christian habits of their whole people changed. They have no intention of contributing to that result. They simply want to do as they please. They think they will not be injured in their own spiritual lives, and will exercise no perceptible influence on the community. In other words, they do not think out the question at all. They do what they want to do, or have been persuaded to do, *that one time*, and leave all other times and other people out of account.

Now we christians, on whom rests the responsibility of caring for the church, see that there is a grievous error here. Example affects more widely as well as more strongly than precept. An act done once may be held up to imitation a thousand times. Influence is a delicate as well as a subtle force. There is no necessity for using these principles fanatically, as has been often done, but still they are true, they are solemnly true and they must be used. Their application is just here. If christians are not careful about keeping holy the Lord's day how can they expect other people to esteem it? If individual christians have no regard to the amount of work they exact from their servants on the Lord's day, how can they expect soulless corporations to be more thoughtful of their employees? If members of the church are not jealous for the rights and privileges of this day, from what quarter are we to look for its safe-guard and protection?

I hope the clergy, especially those in cities and towns, will take this subject into consideration and give their people the results of their reflections with much plainness and freedom.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS.

The Rev. P. P. The order of the day being report of Committee on Amendment to the Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the said report was read by the Secretary.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The undersigned committee, who were appointed by a resolution passed by the Council of the Diocese on the 17th day of May, 1900, to ascertain and report as to the necessity for amendment to the Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society, if one existed, and to return full information as to the legal status of the Society, respectfully report :

First. That a Constitution for the Diocesan Missionary Society was originally adopted by the Convention for the Diocese of Virginia in 1829, and that by that Constitution the Executive Committee for the Diocesan Missionary Society was made an auxiliary to the Society. (A copy is herewith filed as part of this report.)

Second. That for many years the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society has been the life of the Society, and has acted entirely under the control and supervision of the Council.

Third. That neither the Diocesan Missionary Society nor the Executive Committee have any legal status, and that the only corporate body connected with the Society is a Board of Trustees, appointed by Act of the Legislature of Virginia in 1876, as amended in 1883, for the purpose of holding gifts and devises for the objects of the Society. The present Board consists of Rt. Rev. F. M. Whittle, Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, Rev. R. A. Goodwin, Rev. J. J. Gravatt, Rev. L. R. Mason, Rev. Preston Nash, Mr. John L. Williams, Mr. G. G. Minor, Mr. Joseph Bryan, Mr. William F. Gray. This corporation holds investments of the value of about \$1,100.

Fourth. Your committee further report an amended Constitution for the Diocesan Missionary Society, the object of which is to vest the whole management of Diocesan Missions in the Executive Committee, subject to the supervision of the Council, sitting as a Board of Missions, to which Board the committee shall make a full report, and where an opportunity will be offered for a full discussion of the subject.

All of which is respectfully submitted, this 16th day of May, 1901.

 Report of Committee on Amendment to Constitution of D. M. S.

ALTERED CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

ARTICLE 1. This Society shall be called The Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

ART. 2. This Society shall consist of all the baptized members of this Church residing in this Diocese, and the control and management of the Society shall be vested in the Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

ART. 3. There shall be an Executive Committee of said Society, consisting of the Bishop, who shall be Chairman (and Bishop Coadjutor, should there be one), and seven clergymen and seven laymen, to be elected annually by the Council. In addition to these there shall be one member to be elected from each Convocation in the Diocese.

Said Executive Committee, subject to the control of the Council, shall have the management of the general missions of the Diocese, and shall exercise all the powers of the Diocesan Missionary Society under the Constitution of 1829, as well as under this altered Constitution; and shall annually make a full and complete report to the Council constituted and sitting as a Board of Missions, on or before the second day of the session of the Council, embracing in said report such outline of the missionary work as may serve to give a comprehensive view of its progress and prospects in the Diocese. The said committee shall remain in office until their successors are elected. They shall fill all vacancies, provided that should such vacancy occur, after election of any member, among the Convocational members, the committee shall fill the same from the Convocation wherein the same occurred.

ART. 4. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman, or, in his absence, any three of its members. Seven (7) of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall elect a Treasurer and a Secretary for the Society, and such other officers as may be necessary to carry on its work.

It may appoint agents to represent it in various portions of the Diocese, and may arrange for public meetings at such times and places as it may deem expedient.

It may enact By-Laws for its own government and for the government of those under its authority.

ART. 5. The Executive Committee is entrusted with power to establish missions in the Diocese, provided that in so doing it does not infringe upon the rights of any parish already established.

The Executive Committee shall have power to group missions, which they may establish or which are already established, and such non-self-supporting

congregations as are without ministers, provided that where there is a duly elected vestry the consent thereof shall be obtained.

The Executive Committee shall have power to employ one or more missionaries to take charge of the combined points referred to in this Article.

In carrying out the provisions of this Article the consent of the Bishop must be obtained.

ART. 6. This Constitution may be amended or altered by a majority vote at any meeting of the Council.

It shall be in force from its passage, and shall stand in the place of the existing Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

SUPPLEMENT.

Resolved, That this Constitution shall be printed in the Journal as a supplement to the Canons.

The Treasurer has in hand twenty-nine shares of Southern Railroad preferred stock, now worth about \$2,300, which stock constitutes a reserve fund for any emergency which may arise.

Your committee are of opinion that this Diocese is able to send a full deputation to the General Convention, and that no special assessment need now be made for the purpose; but the Treasurer should be authorized to use the said twenty-nine shares of Southern Railroad preferred stock, as far as necessary, to meet any deficit which may occur by reason of this extraordinary expense before the meeting of the next Diocesan Council.

CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE
DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be called "The Protestant Episcopal Missionary Society of the Diocese of Virginia."

ART. 2. The object of this Society shall be to procure and support missionaries within the bounds of this Diocese.

ART. 3. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be *ex-officio* the President; and the other officers shall be a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee, consisting of five clerical and five lay members, to be annually appointed by the Convention, and of this Executive Committee the Bishop shall be *ex-officio* the President.

ART. 5. The payment of any sum not less than one dollar annually, shall constitute a member; and the payment of twenty dollars shall constitute a life member; and the payment of fifty dollars shall constitute a patron.

ART. 6. Any Missionary Society of the Episcopal Church may become an auxiliary by transmitting to the Secretary a list of its officers and a copy of its Constitution (provided such Constitution do not contravene the provisions of these Articles).

ART. 7. It shall be the duty of the Auxiliary Societies to place their funds at the disposal of the Executive Committee.

ART. 8. The Executive Committee may, when they deem it expedient, employ a portion of the funds of the Society, not exceeding one-tenth part thereof, in supplying its missionaries with Prayer Books and Tracts, and shall, in their report to the Convention, specify what books and tracts have been so distributed.

ART. 9. This Constitution may be altered by a vote of a majority of the Convention present, when the alteration is proposed.

This being done, the report of the Amendment to the Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society was amended and passed as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The Rev. B. M. Randolph presented report of Committee on Sunday-schools:

The Committee on Sunday-schools offer the following report:

As to statistics your Committee have not been able to make extended comparisons with other years, on account of inaccessible material, which suggests the thought that if these Committees were appointed say about the first of May and its members notified then, they might be able to gather much more valuable information on the subjects concerning which they are required to report. We have waited before reporting to get the figures for the present year, and so have collated comparisons of three consecutive years, 1899, 1900, and 1901.

Report of Committee on Sunday-schools.

Totals, teachers and scholars, white and colored, show very slight changes. 1899, 9,176; 1900, 8,755; 1901, 9,151; a decrease of about twenty-five in three years. We suggest that this showing may result from an incomplete number of reports handed in, some delays having no doubt occurred from not forwarding reports through the Bishop's hands, the customary channel. If these figures are the true statement of the case, we certainly need to be warned that our zeal in bringing in the wanderers, of whom we know there are some in every community, is not at white heat, when our communion lists increases and our Sunday-schools decrease.

And yet we must believe our Church is alive as to the importance of Sunday-school work. We have seen some individual instances, we have heard the brethren talk about it, we have read of Sunday-school Institutes, kindergarten methods and elaborate lesson leaflets. Let us not forget in our zeal for some new thing, that we as a Church have the best educated and best trained elements in our congregations to draw on for teachers, and we have the best compendium of religious instruction for children in the English language, "the Church Catechism." The best is what the virile masses of the Anglo-Saxon race are looking for; if we work our material to its best purpose, we ought certainly to grow.

Let not the indomitable zeal which we see in those whom we claim have weaker and more imperfect standards, exhibited even by Mormon, the worst of religious heresies, out weigh by our lack, all our other advantages.

That the Sunday-school is the nursery of the Church is so commonly acknowledged that its repetition becomes a platitude, unless we remember the tremendous facts which underlie its truth. A nursery is a place where young, tender life is nurtured into strength and potency for that life's highest and noblest development.

The nursery for the Christian Church should be the place where tender human life is trained and nourished in the knowledge and love of Jesus Christ, the highest and noblest development of human life. Many parents believe they are absolved from all responsibility of Christian training and instruction in the family by having committed the religion of their children to the Sunday-school teaching. What a powerful vantage ground you give the devil by such an error. He has one hundred and sixty-seven hours in a week to work on the child's character and the Sunday-school has only one hour. Can you wonder then that such marvelous disproportion produces a child of the devil. The House of Bishops, some years back, wrote in a pastoral to the Church, words to this effect: that neglect of religion in the family life was one of the greatest evils threatening the vitals of our social life in America. The family is the unit of human development. In its sacred precincts are formed those first impressions of principle and character, which lay the foundations on which we must build. If the family life be all secular,

worldly, irreligious, how hardly do you tax the Sunday-school to build Christians on such a foundation.

We want, brethren of the clergy and laity, to convince the fathers and mothers of our Sunday-school children, that their life, their influence, their prayers in the family circle are back of the Sunday-school teaching and training of their children, and unless its weight is used to push the other, their dearest treasurers must suffer loss.

Let us add one more point. The Bishop in his address has sounded a note of warning about our colored work. No doubt his watchful heart has caught a danger signal in that wave of thought we have heard expressed in the idea of dividing the responsibility of education race to race; the whites for white children, the colored for colored children. We do not for a moment believe such to be the prevailing sentiment, but its mere expression by thinking men is a cause for a sense of danger. Has it touched the religious instruction of colored children? Up to twenty years ago there were many little Sunday afternoon colored Sunday-schools and classes, especially in the country, taught by one or two consecrated men and women, with sometimes fifty scholars to a class. Never being thought of as worth reporting to a Council, but who could say the Creed, the Lord's Prayer and the ten commandments, as well as any children. Is there not a decline in that practice? And is there no responsibility for allowing ignorance and vice to fester at our door! As well claim no responsibility for the spread of small-pox, when we wilfully suffer it to roam at large in our midst. Self-preservation as well as God's law of duty to our neighbor warns us to deeply consider this subject.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Rev. J. Y. Downman presented report of Committee on the State of the Church:

Report of Committee on State of the Church.

Your committee cannot help calling attention to the fact that the One Hundred and Sixth Annual Council of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia is the first in the new century. It is natural, in the presence of such a fact, that we should look back for a moment to the condition of the Church in the beginning of the century just closed.

When we think of what the Church in Virginia was one hundred years ago, how few her communicants, how little her influence, how bitter the prejudice to her, how harsh the criticisms, and how scanty her missionary effort, and then when we compare that condition of things with what we behold to-day—the Church's remarkable numerical growth, her widespread influence, the respect and veneration in which she is held by those not of her communion, and her burning, practical missionary zeal, we must take courage, and are forced to exclaim, as we behold the change, "What hath God wrought!"

In an age like this, when such tremendous changes are taking place, such revolutions in the social and in the mercantile world, the Church must feel their influence, and must arouse herself and be awake to meet the new condition which these things necessarily produce.

We believe the Church is doing this. First, we note the change which has taken place so far as our country parishes are concerned. The movement of the people from the country to the city continues. The financial inducements offered our young men to make their homes in our great cities and the small remuneration for their labor in the country are causes for the continual drain upon our country parishes and for their weakness financially.

And yet, in spite of this, we note with pleasure the ever increasing interest in Diocesan Missions. The Secretary's report shows a condition of things never before surpassed. The children's offering during the Lenten season just past is unusually large, and the contributions from the Diocese for Diocesan Missions are greater than ever before in her history. We are, it has been said, a Missionary Diocese. We have a great deal in this respect to do. Opportunities are opening to us such as we have never had before. "Let us go up at once and possess the land; for we are well able to overcome it."

Your committee notes, with profound thankfulness to God, the growth and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. The loving sympathy which the members of this organization give to our missionaries and to their families, together with the practical help which goes with it, is something for which the whole church may indeed be proud.

So, too, would we express our interest in the work of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. In an age like ours, when the greed for gain is such a temptation to our young men to forget the claims of the Gospel upon them, in their rush and effort not to be left behind in the race for the things of this life, a Society like this, which endeavors to keep before them the fact that this life is not the all of man, and enables them by precept and example to bring

this before their fellows is a society for which the church may well be thankful.

Your committee would call attention to the work among the colored people. There is no greater institution among us for the upbuilding of the social, moral, and religious condition of the colored people than the Protestant Episcopal Church. We note with pleasure the increasing interest of the church in this matter, and the action of the Bishop Coadjutor in turning over to one of the clergymen a certain special oversight of this work, gives promise of marked and beneficial results in the future.

But with the encouraging features in the State of the Church, and your committee would emphasize the fact that they are many, we must not fail to call attention to the dangers ahead. One of these is the falling off in the number of candidates for Holy Orders. The Bishop, in his address to the Council a year ago, called attention to this, and again this year he has done the same thing. It is, as the Bishop says, distressing, and your committee with him views it with serious apprehension. It ought to cause among our clergy and laity "great searching of heart," whether the clergy, as rectors of parishes, are bringing this subject to the attention of the young men of their congregations, or the laity, as fathers and mothers, are presenting to their sons the blessedness of laboring together with Christ for the salvation of souls.

The growing disregard for Sunday, to which the Bishop Coadjutor calls attention in his address to the Council, is another subject to which the church in this Diocese may well give heed. The Lord's day is one of the foundation stones of morals and religion. When that goes it is a question of time when almost all else will go. Surely the clergy and laity of the Diocese ought to do all in their power, both by precept and example, to stem the tide which in our cities especially seems to be flowing so steadily towards a complete abolition of the sanctity of the Lord's day. The beneficial habit and duty of family prayer, and of instructing the children at home in the principles of religion are both, we fear, growing into disuse. The rush and hurry of business leaves no time for the first, and the too great confidence in the Sunday-school accounts in a measure for the second. The family without family prayer is like a house without a roof; and while the Sunday-school is a splendid organization, has done a most noble and helpful work, and should it be abolished would be to the church like the loss of her right hand, yet the Sunday-school was not intended, nor, indeed, is it possible for the Sunday-school at its best, to take the place of the father's and mother's duty in the matter of instructing their own children in the principles of religion at home.

But with all this, we cannot doubt the fact that the movement of the church is on the whole forward. We rest in the promise of our Lord to be with His Church to the end of the world. We believe His word shall not return

to Him void, and that it shall, through the instrumentality of the church, accomplish that whereto He sent it.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PRAYER BOOK DISTRIBUTION SOCIETY.

Rev. L. R. Mason, of Committee on the Prayer Book Distribution Society, reported as follows:

Your Committee on Society for Prayer Book Distribution begs leave to report a marked improvement in the work of this Society within the last year. Especially is this true as to the state of its treasury, which from being empty a few months ago has now a balance of over \$90.00 (ninety dollars) on hand.

We also call attention to the encouraging fact that the Society has added to the distribution of prayer books, that of our Church hymnals as well, a most valuable companion of and addition to the matchless body of ritual and worship contained in the Book of Common Prayer.

We feel assured that a better knowledge of the work of this Society will at once secure for it more liberal and more regular contributions from all the congregations and church people in the Diocese, and also more applications for prayer books and hymnals from weak parishes and mission stations, where their office of instruction and comfort are sorely needed.

We would, in conclusion, earnestly commend to the consideration and the liberality of our people the valuable work of this Society, and ask for it their cordial support.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DECREASE OF CANDIDATES FOR HOLY ORDERS.

The Rev. H. B. Lee, of Committee on Decrease of Candidates for Holy Orders, made report as follows:

The Committee to which was referred that portion of the address of the Bishop to the Council of 1899 in reference to the decrease of candidates for Holy Orders, submit the following report:

The Bishop stated that never within his knowledge had there been so few candidates for the Ministry of the Church in this Diocese. Your Committee are pained to find that the trouble is not confined to Virginia or even to the United States, since a similar falling off is reported in the Church of England. Nor is the same limited to our own communion since like complaint comes from other Christian bodies.

We inquire first into the cause. Your Committee would be sorry to believe with the Bishop, that "this significant and alarming fact * * * * certainly seems to indicate a decline in spirituality and an increase of worldliness on the part of Church people."

OTHER CAUSES MUST BE AT WORK.

Among the possible causes we mention the following:

1. We do not think that the subject is properly presented to boys and young men. Nor are the claims of the ministry pressed upon their attention.
2. We fear that parents do not realize their responsibility in this matter. Do they on bended knee devote their boys to God in the sacred ministry?
3. May not some young men, who ought to be in the ministry, satisfy their consciences by identifying themselves with one or more forms of lay activity now so numerous?

Report of Committee on Decrease of Candidates for Holy Orders.

We all honor the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and rejoice at the great good it accomplishes, yet we fear that it works harm in this particular. Once there were few fields of lay work—now there are many. The Brotherhood, the Guild, and the increased usefulness of the lay-reader, conferred by the license to make original addresses, combine to silence the call to the ministry.

4. We very much fear that the astounding statement, that the ministry is over crowded, along with the prevailing opinion that the ministerial "dead line" is drawn at the age of fifty years, has had its influence.

5. The question of securing proper theological training is a serious matter. Many earnest men hesitate to accept aid from our Educational Societies because of the severe criticisms frequently made for giving that aid.

6. Lastly, are not the clergy themselves somewhat to blame for the decline of candidates for Holy Orders? Do they show the laity, and especially young men, that they consider theirs a noble and blessed calling? Do they exhibit such earnestness, zeal and joy as to move others to enter upon the work? or do they by a different course drive men from it? Each minister of Christ should be a recruiting officer for this branch of the service. What is the remedy?

The Bishop makes one important contribution when he says: "Surely pastors may properly direct the attention of godly young men in their congregations to this important matter, and induce them to consider whether the Holy Spirit may not be inwardly and silently calling on them to enter upon this office."

More than this, we think the pastor when presenting young men for confirmation should urge each one to ask this question: "Lord what wilt thou have me to do," and, when not inappropriate, exhort each to consider the claims of the ministry.

In addition to this he should from time to time preach a special sermon on the subject. When expedient the Bishop, or some other representative clergyman, might be invited to bring the matter before the people.

We suggest that well qualified men be sent to our higher seats of learning, and there present the urgent need for men in the ministry.

Christian parents can do much to help increase the number of ministers. They should without reserve offer their sons to the Lord, and daily pray Him to accept them for the work of the ministry. We do not mean that they should urge or even advise them to seek the sacred office, none should dare strive to keep them from it unless satisfied of their unfitness. In conclusion your Committee recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That to the list of standing committees of the Council, with a view to keeping the subject before the Church, there be added a "Committee on the Increase of the Ministry," and that to said Committee be referred the number of postulants, candidates for deacons and Priests orders, and any other matters of like nature which may come before the Council.

General Convention Invited to Richmond in 1907.

2. *Resolved*, That the Bishop be empowered to secure the services of a suitable person to go to the institutions or elsewhere of learning to set forth the needs of the Church in this matter.

3. *Resolved*, Should the Bishop consent to do this, he is hereby authorized to draw on the Treasurer of the Contingent Fund for a sum not to exceed \$50.00.

Resolved, That this Council be requested to instruct the delegation to the General Convention in San Francisco to invite the General Convention to Richmond in 1907.

Election of delegates to the General Convention being in order the Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton and the Rev. Mr. Tyndell were appointed tellers for the clerical vote.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin moved that the nomination of lay delegates is in order.

Carried.

Several new members have recently been added to the Board of Incorporators of the Brotherhood, and the committee note with pleasure that there is a hopeful feeling on the part of the Board, and a belief that the Brotherhood can be made a power for good in the future as it has been in the past. In this belief the committee heartily concur, and would earnestly urge the people of the Diocese to co-operate actively and faithfully with the Board in their efforts to make the work of the Brotherhood a success.

The Spiritual Needs of the Negro.

PORTION OF ADDRESS DELIVERED BY MR. WM. C. BENTLEY, MAY 15, 1901, BEFORE THE COUNCIL AT ALEXANDRIA, AS REPRESENTATIVE OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

(Published by order of Council.)

Allow me to add one other thought here, and that in regard to the spiritual needs of the colored people in this Diocese. Have we done anything like our duty towards bettering the condition of these people? The Diocesan Missionary Society would, doubtless, gladly enter upon and push this field of work, if the church at large would place within its power the means with which to do it.

Thus far this Society has had about all it could stand up to keep going the needy white congregations in the Diocese, and has been forced to leave the colored work pretty much to get along as best it could. Indeed, our Diocese has never made any very determined effort to bring these people within the fold of our church. As far back as May, 1859—before the war and when the negroes were still in slavery—at a meeting held in St. Paul's Church, Richmond, looking to the establishment of St. Philip's Church, for colored people in that city, Rev. Richard H. Wilmer stated that while the church in Virginia made such a poor showing as to negro membership, there were in South Carolina twice as many colored as white communicants, and that while there were less than one hundred white adult baptisms in that Diocese the previous year, there were upwards of eight hundred colored, and twice as many colored confirmations as white. He then advocated organizing corps of instructors, building churches, etc., for the colored people, and that a strong effort be made to attract them to our church through Sunday-school work. At the Diocesan Convention in Norfolk in the same year (1859) Bishop Johns strongly advocated the same subject. It

 Spiritual Needs of the Negro.

is now forty-two years since these events thus mentioned, and what advance have we made on the lines thus indicated?

Our church, in its mode of worship, is peculiarly adapted to suit the taste of this race, they being very imitative, ready to memorize, and with dispositions strongly tending to a ready reception of our form of service.

I do not mean or wish to say anything offensive to any one, or willingly to hurt any one's feelings; but every intelligent person, be he white or colored, must see how very degraded a large portion of our colored brethren is becoming, especially since they have gotten to flock so to themselves in our cities and towns, and have put themselves out of contact with the refining influences of the better class of white people, and have thus broken up those close, friendly ties which characterized the relations between the races in years gone by. Can nothing be done to alleviate, at any rate, this sad condition of these people, who have souls to save as well as we, and who seem wholly ignorant of their true condition, and who manifest no especial disposition to better it? Our church people should arouse themselves to the seriousness of this question, and make a very earnest effort, at least, to solve the difficulty. The fact is, that the negro has been long taught by wicked foreign influences to distrust his own white friends and neighbors, and has himself done much to alienate them from him; yet, we should remember our dying Lord's prayer on the cross, "Forgive them, for they know not what they do."

I feel sure that the Diocesan Missionary Society is ready to take a vigorous hold on this work, if you will but provide the means. The situation appeals to you; the Society throws itself upon your generosity. What will you do about it?

Form for Making Bequests.

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise, or bequest, property of every description, real, personal, or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese, whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not," is "*The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.*"

The funds, already created and now held by the said corporation, are:

1. The Disabled Clergy Fund,
2. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund,
3. The Episcopal Fund,
4. The Bruce Fund,
5. The St. Andrew's Fund.

All devises or bequests to any of the said funds should be made to "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Virginia, for the sole use and benefit of the ——— Fund [naming the fund intended], now held in trust by the said corporation."

If it is desired to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its President, Rt. Rev. Robert A. Gibson.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary of Virginia is, "*The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary and High School in Virginia;*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia is, "*The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia;*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is, "*The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia;*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg, Va, is, "*The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School in Virginia;*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of Bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia, March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

My Dear Bishop:—Although by the separation of the old Diocese of Virginia my location fell within the bounds of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, my interest in and devotion to the spiritual welfare of deaf-mutes within the present limits of the Virginia Diocese has continued my ministrations to them. Three-fourths of my life (now past four-score years) has it been my privilege to serve those who are as I am—deprived of speech and hearing. These people have, after leaving their schools, no other spiritual instruction; and it is difficult for those who are not in the position to know their needs, the usefulness and the comfort that is within the scope of this missionary to the speechless, to appreciate the good to be accomplished by the minister who devotes his time and energies to this not unimportant agency of the church.

During the past year I have visited several times, holding services for mutes, Richmond city, Charlottesville city, and the counties of Appomattox, Rockingham, Shenandoah, and other rural sections, where, in addition to other services, I baptized several children, and many precious souls were administered unto.

I trust that the work among these people may be fostered, and missionary efforts be increased and perpetuated.

At St. Paul's Mission, Alexandria, the work was carried on during the summer by Mr. Charles Taylor, of that city, who had been appointed lay reader, and in every way is a most efficient helper. All communicants, bap- tisms, &c., are reported at St. Paul's Church. Two missions, West End and Glen Carlyn, were kept open last summer by Mr. Mayo, a student. At West End, \$280, nearly all raised within the congregation, is in hand for the church building fund. Glen Carlyn also has \$124 in hand for building a church on the lot given last year. Of this, \$96 has been contributed by the congregation and \$68 from outside sources. A new chapel is needed at Sharon. Towards this, \$30.07 has been collected, chiefly through the energy of Mr. Robeson, one of the stu- dents of the mission. Bishop Potter, of New York, who was one of the students at Arlington when at the Sem- inary, sent \$20 towards the debt on the church lot at that place. The debt on St. Paul's, Lincolnia, has been reduced to \$321. The Chapel of the Good Shepherd (colored), has been painted this year. The work at the missions has been satisfactory this year, and much interest manifested by the people.

REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, MAY, 1901.

Rt. Rev. F. M. WHITTLE, D. D., LL. D., and
Rt. Rev. R. A. GIBSON, D. D., *Presidents ex-officio* :

With devout thankfulness, for a marked increase of zeal and interest on all missionary lines, the eleventh annual report of the Virginia Branch is respectfully submitted. Its strong and healthy development has assumed a proportion in *Diocesan* work, that is beginning to be felt in all our parishes, in the *spiritual* life, growing *in* and *out* of the higher conception of the Church's duty to Missions, that so bringing forth fruit unto good works, beautifying and enriching barren places, and more barren lives, the women of Virginia, with zeal and unselfishness, often unaided with money, have quietly and with marvellous faith, inaugurated mission work in all directions; in some cases where there is no Rector to encourage, or guide them, yet overcoming difficulties, and bravely submitting to disappointments. The special point of interest and anxiety, centered round the new and untried experiment of change of time and place of the annual meeting. Whatever seemed to threaten disaster for the occasion, was soon forgotten, in the successful and inspiring meeting in Warrenton. *It was a notable meeting*, marked by a large attendance of delegates. Its business sessions were full of despatch; its "Quiet Hour," conducted by Bishop Partridge, of Japan, so helpful and refreshing; the presence of Bishop Gibson, throughout the time, with his addresses and counsel, gave new impulse to the work, and going fresh, from such a *mountain-top experience*, into the winter's work, *each one* saw new beauty in the common paths of daily endeavor, that lie *just before* each worker, as they labor and pray, for the progress of Christ's Kingdom. Out of seventy-two parishes, sixty are represented in this report, but with only a small proportion of active workers (about 2,000). The Virginia Branch has set before itself, the high hope, "*every woman in every parish, an enrolled member,*" and *not* 'till this is accomplished, will it have done its work. If the Rectors would aid the officers, by urging their women to unite with the Auxiliary, it would stimulate missionary zeal, and quicken, with a mighty power, the spiritual life of the parish, besides

bringing forth good results to the cause. Virginia women, seem born with the missionary spirit, and only need to have it developed. From this faithful *minority*, who are earnestly striving to tell the "good news" by prayer and gifts, a creditable showing is made in money to *China, Japan, Africa* and *Brazil* to the amount of \$1,587.75.

The Domestic work (in boxes and money) begins in the far away ice-bound regions of Alaska and threads its way, in loving deeds, through our Western Jurisdictions 'till it touches and cheers the worker in sunny Florida to the amount of \$722.25. The Diocesan work, as usual, claims the largest share of interest and gifts, including the colored work, which is gaining friends. We are glad to report, St. Philip's Church, Richmond, and St. Paul's, Gordonsville, having active branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. The amount in boxes and money to Virginia is \$2,401.83. Brazil is still "Virginia's favorite mission," and one-half of the United Offering for 1901 was voted to Bishop Kinsolving for his work. Virginia has supported her own Medical Missionary in China for three years (Dr. Mary Glinton) and with ready hand extends help all along the line of work of the Board of Missions, to which the Virginia Branch is Auxiliary.

The regular pledges were renewed for this year, and it was decided to raise an "Emergency Fund" for Bishop Gibson for Diocesan needs, through the efforts of the members of the Auxiliary, which, we hope in time, will become an important factor in the work.

Each year makes the officers more eager to win friends to the work. Mrs. Barton, the zealous, earnest Secretary of the "Juniors," is bringing the young girls to the front in new and enlarged efforts, training them to train others to so sweet a service that there never shall be wanting missionary recruits to fill the ranks. Mrs. Shields, the faithful Secretary of the Babies Branch, still strives to gather the "lambs of the fold," and teaches them to pray and give to missions, while Mrs. Craigie, Secretary of the "C. P. C.," is overcoming difficulties and efficiently building up this important work. Each year too makes a stronger bond between the Bishops, Clergy and officers, by their courtesy and ready willingness to advise or approve. We thank them most cordially for their good will and encouragements, we ask for renewed interest on their part for the coming year, that

all of us being baptized anew with missionary consecration, may undertake greater things for God and the world in the future.

REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA FEMALE INSTITUTE.

Rt. Rev. F. M. WHITTLE,

and Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute:

GENTLEMEN,—I have the honor to present to the Diocese of Virginia a report of the Virginia Female Institute for the session 1900-1901.

The year has been a successful one, and the house evenly full, with the changes incident to change of term, February 1.

The health of the school has been good, with the exception of

several cases of measles and roseola, which have crippled the standard of some of the pupils, and postponed their work.

The scholarship has been excellent, and compares well with past years. Our patronage is from the best people of Virginia and throughout the South, as well as a few representatives from the North and Northwest, drawn by climate and low rates.

At the Bishop's visitation twelve were confirmed here, and three in their homes.

I owe a great deal to our most excellent and efficient Faculty, who have helped to keep up the high standard of this Institute, so notably shown forth during Mrs. Stuart's administration.

Perhaps it is not in my province to make allusion to the meeting of the Board of Trustees, but my deep interest in the prosperity of the school impels me to earnestly present this plea—that all members of the Board of Trustees be present at the annual meeting. Last June it was impossible to act because a quorum was not present, and the expense of the meeting (something over \$50) was completely lost, because of the failure on the part of a few to be here. A knowledge of these facts prompts me to state them, in order that their importance may be appreciated. There are two vacancies on the Board, and we greatly need earnest men to fill these vacancies, who will make it their business to be present at every annual meeting. I would suggest that the date for this annual meeting be fixed for the first Friday in May of each year, as many of these gentlemen are upon other boards, which call them in several directions.

It is with sincere pleasure that we learn of the recovery of our honored President.

I ask the interest and sympathy of your Council and the Diocese in the great work you have given me to do for you. I feel its responsibility, and without your co-operation I am powerless; but with it I feel that a wonderful work may be done, both for education and for the cultivation of a missionary field. A church school, with its churchly influences, carries a power for all time.

The great need of this Institute is endowment for scholarships.
