ORGANIZATION.

"The Secretary shall make out a roll and call the names of all certified to him as duly and canonically elected. The President of the Council shall then appoint a committee, to be composed of one clerical and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report the names of those entitled to seats to the Secretary, and of those claiming, but not entitled to seats, to the Council.

"Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for examination and report."

RULES OF ORDER.

· 1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the *second* day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

Rules of Order.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Elections.

A Committee on Finance, consisting of laymen.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

A Committee on Sunday-schools.

A Committee on Prayer Book Distribution Society.

A Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

A Committee on Colonial Churches.

3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishop's Address the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such other committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

4th. The Council shall sit as a Board of Missions on the first day of the session at 8 o'clock P. M. The President of the Council, or some member of the Council selected by him, shall preside. The Secretary of the Council shall be Secretary of the Council sitting as a Board of Missions.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

Ist. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and if in writing, be read by the Secretary before debate.

2d. After a motion is stated by the President or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but

may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form:

"Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or to lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

Rules of Order.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

18th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

ONE HUNDRED AND TENTH ANNUAL COUNCIL

CHRIST CHURCH, CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA.,
WEDNESDAY, MAY 17, 1905.

The One Hundred and Tenth Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, met this day in Christ Church, Charlottesville, at 10 A. M., for Divine service.

There were in the chancel the Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, D. D., and the Revs. John Moncure, D. D., H. B. Lee, F. W. Neve, and E. L. Goodwin. The Bishop made an address on "The ministry—the problem of presenting its claims to young men."

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. E. L. Goodwin.

After Divine service, the Council was called to order by the President.

The Secretary called the roll and 39 clergy and 35 laity answered to their names.

Rules of Order Adopted.

A quorum of both orders being present, the Council was declared organized and ready for business.

The Rev. H. B. Lee moved that the rules of order of the last Council be adopted for this.

Carried.

The Rev. H. B. Lee offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the sessions of the Council be as follows: That today we continue in session until 1:30, taking a recess for dinner until 3:30. Afternoon session until 5:30 P. M. Hereafter meet at 9:30 A. M., taking a recess at II A. M. for Divine service, and another at 1:30 for dinner; reassembling at 3:30, and continuing to 5:30.

The Committee on Credentials made the following report:

The Committee on Credentials begs leave to report that the delegates are all properly accredited with the addition of Dr. Thomas E. Williams.

Rev. John J. Gravatt presented the following:

- I. Resolved, That the thanks of the Council be tendered the Bishop for his valuable charge read this morning in place of the Council sermon, and that he be requested to allow its publication.
- 2. Resolved, That the Rev. W. M. Clark and Mr. John L. Williams be appointed a committee to have the charge printed and distributed with the Bishop's permission in such way as they shall deem best to bring it into possession of the whole Church.
- 3. Resolved, That the clergy be requested to see that this paper is distributed.
- 4. Resolved, That the above resolution be referred to the Finance Committee.

On motion, these resolutions were referred to the Finance Committee.

The Rev. Landon R. Mason gave notice that on to-morrow he would move an amendment to the fourth Canon, by which the last clause will be eliminated.

REPORT OF THE HISTORIOGRAPHER.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin, Historiographer, read his report as follows:

As Historiographer of the Diocese I would respectfully report that I have had in hand during the past winter the task intrusted to me by the last Council, of collecting and transcribing the records which give the boundary lines of the parishes of this Diocese. I have brought the work down from the beginnings of legislation in Virginia (1619), through the Colonial period, to the organization of the Diocese in 1785.

The one source of information for this period is Hening's Statutes at Large, Bishop Meade's monumental work on the "Old Churches, Ministers and Families," Bishop Perry's "Papers Relating to the History of the Colonial Church," and a few pages in Beverley's "History of Virginia," give occasional side lights only on parochial geography. But Hening contains practically all that we have preserved to us of the legislation for the Church in Virginia for the first one hundred and sixty-four years of its history.

I have examined the thirteen volumes of these Statutes almost page by page, (not trusting to the indices, which are not complete), and have copied into a well bound-book the whole or the essential parts of every act bearing upon the establishment or the division of the Colonial parishes of the Diocese that is therein given.

There are fifty-two of these Colonial parishes, including Fluvanna, the name of which has since been changed to Rivanna, and Blisland, which lies partly in James City county in Southern Virginia. The metes and bounds of thirty of these, except where altered by more recent legislation, are clearly and minutely laid down in the Acts of Assembly. Of the remaining twenty-two the great majority of the lines are given definite-

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ly. Others are certainly fixed by civil boundaries. That a few are unknown, as far as I can discover, is due to two causes: First. During the latter half of the seventeenth century the law required the Courts, or County Commissioners, to "devide their counties into parishes." Ten of our counties were formed during this period, and the original parishes in most of them were established by the Courts. In a large number of cases, however, notably on the lower Rappahannock, the lines were changed in later years, or new parishes were formed, by the General Assembly. But no legislation is found giving the lines of the parishes in four of the counties, viz: Gloucester (including Mathews), Lancaster, Northumberland and Westmoreland. Their boundaries must be sought among the records of the County Courts, or fixed by tradition, as can usually be done.

Again, the Acts of Assembly for a number of years were recovered by Mr. Hening from manuscript copies found in the Clerk's Offices of one or two counties. In these copies, originally made for the use of local officials, acts in which that county had no interest were often given by number and title only, the body of the act being omitted. This was the fate of the acts establishing four of our parishes. We have the facts and the dates, but not the dividing lines.

Notwithstanding all this, there are lacking from the authenticated records, but twelve boundary lines between the old colonial parishes. Of these three are supplied by county lines which seem always to have been accepted as the true parish lines. One has been superceded by the erection of a new parish. Two more, dividing the three parishes in Gloucester, have been discovered with practical certainty by the careful investigation of the Rev. William B. Lee. Six only remain to be found; and I name them here in the hope that others, like Mr. Lee, may search them out, and let the result of their investigations be put upon record. The lost lines are those between Blisland and St. Peter's, in New Kent; between St. Paul's and St. Martin's, in Hanover; between Stratton Major and St. Stephen's, and between St. Stephen's and Drysdale, in King and Queen; between Wicomico and St. Stephen's, in Northumberland, and between Hanover and Overwharton, in King George, or Stafford.

The description of the ancient lines, as given in the Statutes, are clear and definite. I am satisfied that, with perhaps a very few exceptions, they can be readily traced by any one familiar with the landmarks, surveys and deed books of the counties in which they respectively lie. The work of identifying these old landmarks, and of retracing these historic lines, where necessary, ought surely to be undertaken by the vestries, and the results made a matter of record. It will be the pleasure, as well

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as the duty of the Historiographer, to furnish the original descriptions of the lines, as far as is in his power, to any who may desire them.

I wish I could impress upon the minds of the Council the importance of this matter. Many of the lines are not at all where they are supposed to be, and a number of churches are not in the parishes to which they are assigned in the Journal. The temptation is strong to lengthen this paper unduly by citing instances, and especially by pointing out the mistakes that have been made in the past, some of which will be hard to rectify, by forming new parishes without knowing the boundaries of the old ones. One notable case only will I give, not only as an illustration, but in order to preserve the history of one of our old parishes which is supposed to have no history; which is thought to have been dead for a century and a quarter, but was not dead, only forgotten. I call it The Sad Story of Cameron Parish.

Cameron Parish was formed from Truro, in Fairfax county, in 1748, and was the third parish formed in that section of the State. The Act of Assembly by which it was established was omitted in printing the Acts of that year, and so no reference to it can be found in the index to Hening's Statutes. Probably for that reason its location has long been a matter of supposed uncertainty. Doubtless to supply the loss of this original act, however, in the preamble of another act passed a few years later, in reference to the sale of a Glebe, the fact and exact date of its establishment, and a minute description of its boundaries, are fully set forth. (Hening' Vol. VI., p. 271.) After a slight change had been made in the line in 1757, to make it conform to the old line between Fairfax and Loudoun, and after Shelburne parish was formed from it in 1770. the parish extended from Difficult Run and a line from the head thereof to Rocky Run, on the east, to Goose Creek, Little River, and a line from about opposite the village of Aldie, to the Fauquier line, on the west; and from the Potomac to Bull Run, on the north and south. After the present line between Fairfax and Loudoun was fixed, in 1708 Cameron parish embraced about one-fourth of Loudoun and nearly one-third of Fairfax, forming a large and compact parish, with two churches, one in

After the Revolution the parish fell into decay. It is mentioned in the lists of the parishes in the early Journals, but it is one of two parishes in the Diocese which have never been represented in Convention or Council, the other being Stratton Major. But here, as elsewhere, by the labors of zealous men, the Church was gradually restored. About 1840 a chapel was built at Belmont, in Loudoun. Ten years later St. John's, Centerville, appears, and after the war the churches at Chantilly and at Herndon,—all in Cameron Parish. The old parish had been revived, but

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no one knew it. Tradition said that it was dead and buried, and its very location had been forgotten, so that no man knew even of its sepulchre. Yet it was not dead, but dumb, having no one to whisper its ancient name into the ear of the Church, none to take her by the hand of all the sons whom she had brought forth. So, in 1884 came a petition from Truro Parish, asking that the upper part thereof, as was supposed, be separated and formed into a new parish under the name of Upper Truro; which was done, though four-fifths of the territory, and all three of the churches so set apart and named, were in Cameron Parish, and not in Truro at all. So, the old parish was all unwittingly shorn of its strength and robbed of much of its domain. What is left to it lies in eastern Loudoun, except about two square miles lying just west of Fairfax Courthouse, and about six miles from the main body of the parish.

During the coming year I hope to complete the work assigned me by recording the metes and bounds of the parishes of more modern foundation, or such of them as can be found. There are twenty-two or twenty-three of these parishes. The bounds of ten only are recorded in the Journal, namely: Greenwood, Haymarket, Luray, Ridley, Rivanna, Slaughter, Upper Truro, Walker's and Whittle.

Those whose lines are wanting are: Ashland, Cedar Run, Clarke, Cunningham Chapel, Emmanuel, Green Springs, Greenway Court, John's Meade, Montrose, Piedmont, Saint Thomas, in Frederick, and Warren, and Wickliffe.

Most of these were formed under the present Canon, which requires that the lines of division be set forth. It is probable that in some instances the lines are recorded in the Vestry books, but in many cases, I understand that they are entirely unknown. I can only call attention to this anomalous condition, and urge that steps be taken to determine the boundaries of these parishes, as the Canons contemplate.

I renew the recommendation made last year, that an authoritative list of the parishes of the Diocese, and of the separate congregations entitled to representation, be prepared for the use of the Council.

E. L. Goodwin, Historiographer.

The Rev. J. J. Clopton moved that the thanks of the Council be extended to the Historiographer for his report.

Carried, unanimously.

The Rev. John McGill, D. D., offered the following:

Revision of the Canons.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to consider the advisability of this Diocese's assisting in the effort to provide the services of our Church for the students at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute, at Blacksburg; that the said committee report to this Council with suggestions as to the best mode of rendering that aid.

Carried.

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The Bishop appointed the Rev. Dr. McGill, the Rev. R. U. Brooking, and Mr. Fred. S. Valentine to report on this resolution.

The Rev. M. S. Eagle gave notice that on to-morrow he would offer a resolution changing Section 3, Canon VIII.

REVISION OF THE CANONS.

The Rev. E. Meade moved that a committee of three be appointed to consider whether the Canons of the Diocese require revision, and if so, to what extent, and to report to this Council.

Carried.

The Bishop apointed as such committee, at the request of the mover of the resolution, the Revs. E. L. Goodwin, H. B. Lee, and Judge J. M. White.

The invitation extended to the Council by Rev. H. M. Mc-Ilhenny, Ph. D., to visit the Young Men's Christian Association building at the University, was, upon motion, accepted.

The visiting clergy were, on motion, invited to seats on the floor of the Council.

BUILDING FUND OF THE AMERICAN CHURCH.

The Rev. Landon R. Mason made a statement about the Building Fund of the American Church.

The Rev. H. B. Lee presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Report of the Treasurer of the Brotherhood.

Resolved, That the American Church Building Fund Commission be cordially commended to the sympathy and liberality of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

The Secretary read the report of Miss Sallie Stuart, President and Secretary of the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. W. C. Latane moved that the sympathy of the Council be extended to the Rev. J. P. Tyler, who is absent from the Council on account of the death of his mother.

The Rev. John Moncure, D. D., moved, as an amendment, that prayer for those in affliction be offered.

The motion, as thus amended, was carried, and the Bishop offered the prayer as requested.

Council took recess until 3:30 P. M.

Wednesday, 3:30 P. M.

The Council reassembled, and was called to order by the President.

At the request of the President, Mr. Hubert Carleton made an address on the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

He received the thanks of the Bishop and the Council for his address.

TREASURER'S REPORT OF THE BROTHERHOOD.

Mr. Cyrus Boisseaux read the report on the Brotherhood of Virginia.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Gentlemen,—By the grace of God, I am enabled to report there has been no death of any beneficial member of the Brotherhood during the year.

Virginia Female Institute.

Funds on hand are as follows: two five hundred dollar (\$500) city of Manchester 5 per cent. Bonds, and eight hundred and tweny-eight dollars and seventeen cents (\$828.17) in City Bank of Richmond, at 3 per cent, interest.

Rev. H. B. Lee read the report of the Treasurer of the Prayer Book Distribution Society, which was referred to its proper committee.

The Rev. H. B. Lee read the report of Miss M. P. Duval, Principal of the Virginia Female nstitute. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. Robert K. Massie offered a resolution in regard to the Virginia Female Institute.

Rev. R. A. Goodwin offered an amendment to the same.

The resolution, as amended, was carried, and is as follows:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute have met with some success in their efforts to raise the sum of \$25,000 to pay the bonded debt of that institution and to erect certain much-needed buildings; and,

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the Institute have elected Rev. R. C. Jett their Financial Agent to raise this money; therefore,

- I. Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia renew its expression of approval of this effort of the Trustees, and urge the clergy and laity of the Diocese to co-operate with Mr. Jett in his work.
- 2. Resolved, That we express our grateful appreciation of Miss Duval's generosity in the matter of scholarships and improvement of the buildings and grounds.

The Rev. R. K. Massie offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Council that the total salary from all sources paid to the clergy in this Diocese should not in any case be less than eight hundred dollars a year, and a rectory for each clergyman.

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Report of the Executive Committee of D. M. Society.

The Rev. H. B. Lee presented the following:

Resolved, That in the future it be the duty of the Secretary of the Council to arrange with the railroads and other transportation lines as to special rates for the members of the Council.

Adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Rev. R. A. Goodwin read the following report:

The Committee on Church Property respectfully report that \$10,000 has been paid on the Episcopal Residence. Three notes for \$2,500 each, with interest at 5 per cent. will be paid annually, on June 20th. Insurance to the amount of \$12,500 has been placed on the building.

The Council then took recess until 8 P. M.

Wednesday, 8 P. M.

The Council met as a Board of Missions, the President presiding.

After a brief service by the Revs. E. Meade and E. L. Goodwin, the report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society was read by the Bishop in the absence of the Secretary.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society respectfully submits its annual report to the Council.

The Treasurer reports that he has received from the 14th of May last:

The receipts for this year are \$1,320.34 less than last year. Churches and individuals have contributed \$1,067.76 less, and the Sunday-schools \$252.56 less.

Report of the Executive Committee of D. M. Society.

The expenditures have been \$9,833.25, an excess over receipts of \$1,861.70. The cash balance of last year of \$5,004.15 has, therefore, been reduced to \$3,142.45.

There are now, including the Archdeacon and the Archdeacon of the colored work, thirty-nine (39) stipendiaries upon the Society, requiring the sum of \$10,215 to meet its obligations.

In addition to this, there are grants to the amount of \$625, which have been made to three vacant parishes, which are about to be supplied with rectors.

There will be required, therefore, between now and the next meeting of this Council the sum of \$10,840 to meet the present obligations of the Society. The cash balance on hand is \$3,142.45. The sum of \$6,697.55 will therefore be needed for the ensuing year.

During the year three (3) of our beneficiary parishes have asked for reductions, amounting to \$60. Four (4) have asked for an increase, amounting to \$170. One (1), Middlesex, which received \$230 per annum, has become self-supporting. Three (3), Beckford, North Farnham and Cople, have added \$150, \$125 and \$100, respectively, to the salaries of their rectors.

Too much praise cannot be accorded our band of missionaries for their faithful labors and self-sacrifice. In view of this, the great difficulty of supplying the places when vacated, the small salaries now received by many of the men, the increase of the cost of living, the committee would ask the continued interest of the people of the Diocese in the great work of its Missionary Society.

The welfare and progress of the Diocese are bound up in this Society. Now, as in the past, it is the life of the Church in Virginia. It makes its appeal, therefore, to every man, woman and child, who loves the kingdom of our blessed Lord.

The committee would earnestly request the clergy to instruct their congregations and Sunday-schools in the work of the Society, and solicit their contributions towards its support. Not only have we to maintain the work already in hand; but there are numerous opportunities opening up for our entrance into new fields. The present income of the Society is, however, barely sufficient to maintain the ground already occupied. If there is to be advance, progress and enlargement, there must be larger giving and more consecration of ourselves to the work which the Lord has given us to do.

There must be more systematic interest taken in the work of the Society. The congregations and Sunday-schools must be kept abreast of its needs, and individuals must be encouraged to make contributions to it. It is in the matter of Diocesan Missions, as in General Missions,

that the lack of information on the part of the clergy, and their manifested lack of interest in the cause, is to blame for much of the lethargy of the people.

The Council recommends an offering for this Society in the season of Advent. The committee does not know the amount contributed last Advent for this purpose. From the total receipts for the year, it could not have been very generally or generously observed. One of the rules of the committee is (Rule VI): "Every missionary of this Society shall take up quarterly collections for the Society, in each of his churches"—not parishes.

The committee is entirely unable to say whether this *rule* is observed or not. At best, it must be only partially regarded.

It seems to your committee that it would be wise, and certainly exceedingly helpful to the Society, if the brethren in transmitting their offerings, would indicate if it be an "Advent Offering" or a "Quarterly Offering," or a "Lenten Offering," or a "Sunday-school Offering," or an "Individual Offering," and that a record of these be made upon the books of the Treasurer, so that the Society may be able to form some idea of the best sources of its help, and at what time it can look for its revenue. A record thus kept by the parishes and the Society, and used by them for reference, would serve as a healthy stimulus, from year to year, to encourage the people and the Sunday-schools to increase their offerings.

The Rev. Dr. John Moncure, Archdeacon of the Colored Work, then read his report:

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON OF THE COLORED WORK FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 1905.

To the President and Members of the Diocesan Missionary Society:

Gentlemen,—The history of the year just ended affords cause for gratitude in the important work among the colored people in the Diocese. The progress may have been slow, and results may have seemed meagre, but there has been a growth.

God's blessing has been realized, and we are increasingly hopeful. We believe that much more is being accomplished for the reclamation of this peculiar people to the Kingdom of our God, and his Christ, than mere surface indications might portend.

Report of Archdeacon of the Colored Work.

The people of this great country, and particularly in the Southland have, after all matters are considered, a warm place in their hearts for the negro, when he shows a disposition to receive the priceless truths of religion.

Many, as all here know, have been the theories advanced and the plans formulated by this Church for his evangelization and salvation. Particularly has this been so during the year just gone.

The matter has been discussed in both Church and secular papers, and was one of the subjects before the General Convention. Great is the diversity of thought, and numerous plans have been advocated, but all tend to the one great point: a proper understanding of the negro's character, to the end that this Church of ours may reach his heart, and assist in causing him to give sincere utterance to the prayer of the Publican.

My first official act after the last Council, was a visit to the St. Paul's Normal and Industrial School, at Lawrenceville, Va.

This, though situated in the Diocese of Southern Virginia, is a general institution of the Church, its Board of Trustees having representation from several Dioceses. I wish that all who are not satisfied that there is any real outcome to the negro character could visit this institution. It is in charge of the Rev. James S. Russell, a colored man, who is also Archdeacon of the colored work in his Diocese.

The School has many departments, those of the artisan character among men, and domestic service among women, particularly interested me. There were in the former class: harness makers, electricians, blacksmiths, carpenters, shoe makers, &c.; and in the latter: dress making and cooks. Graduates in any of these will prove a real help to the community irrespective of race.

In addition to these, there are the means for obtaining a plain education, and what is best of all, it is under the *Church* and her teaching By invitation, previously extended, I preached the baccalaureate sermon at the close of the School.

During the month of May I preached also at the large colored school at Cappahoosic, in Gloucester county, the rector of the parish, Rev. Wm. B. Lee, reading the service; also visited and prayed with a colored communicant near Gloucester Courthouse.

On June 5th I visited a family in affliction in St. Philip's Church, Richmond, and on the 7th officiated at a burial from the same Church.

On June 9th I attended the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School.

This institution continues its encouraging work, and is now probably the leading one of its kind in the country.

Report of Archdeacon of the Colored Work.

On June 26th I preached, celebrated Holy Communion and baptized an infant in St. Philip's Church, Richmond, and same day baptized a sick child in private.

On June 27th I administered Holy Communion to two sick persons in their respective homes, and July 1st again administered the Holy Communion in two homes, to the sick in Richmond.

On July 7th I visited two sick persons in the Richmond Hospital, which is exclusively in charge of colored people, and on July 17th, in St. Philip's Church baptized an infant and an adult.

On August 7th I visited Miss Edrington's work in Stafford county, and conducted the service, making an address to quite a good congregation of colored people. Later in the month I conferred with the rector of the parish, Rev. E. B. Burwell, in reference to a proposed Chapel. The work here is fully ripe for such a step, there being a disposition on the part of the colored people to come into the Church. One of the principal men in the community having recently severed his connection with the colored Church to become an Episcopalian.

On August 29th I visited St. Paul's Mission at Gordonsville, and preached and celebated Holy Communion, the Rev. E. E. Miller, Deacon in charge, reading service; also conferred with latter and E. T. Jefferson, teacher in the Parish School, about the work.

On September 4th, in St. Philip's, Richmond, preached and celebrated Holy Communion.

On September 25th I attended the Piedmont Convocation at Upperville, in Fauquier county, the Rev. T. C. Darst rector, and made an address on the Colored Work at the missionary meeting.

On October 1st I again visited Miss Edrington's school in Stafford and read service and made an address.

October 16th baptized two infants in St. Philip's church in Richmond; also preached and celebrated Holy Communion.

On November 5th I visited St. Paul's Church, Haymarket, the Rev. H. F. Kloman, rector. Attended meeting of the Colored Sewing School, and made address. Also addressed the Parish Junior Auxiliary on the Colored Work. The next day I preached in St. Paul's Church, and called attention to colored work, and the afternoon in the Church of Our Saviour, Fauquier county; also preached on colored work.

November 20th, St. Philip's, Richmond, baptized adult, preached and celebrated Holy Communion.

On December 4th I visited Christ Chapel at Wickliffe, in Clarke county, read service and preached. This is a neat building, with a seating capacity of about 150, which has recently been built largely through the

efforts of Miss Hannah Williams, an earnest and consecrated lady, to whose work reference has been made in former reports. Notwithstanding a very inclement evening, the attendance was good. The service was rendered with heartiness and reverence.

This work has been ministered to in the summer months by a colored student for the ministry, who was sent by the Bishop.

The Rev. F. M. Burch, the new rector at Wickliffe, preaches in this Chapel on two Sundays each month.

On December 16th, with Rev. Mr. Burch I drove to Millwood, and was cordially received by the rector, the Rev. E. H. Ingle. Snow and sleet all day, yet an excellent congregation assembled in Christ Church in the evening, which I preached to with much pleasure. This work has been faithfully prosecuted for years by Miss Celestine Page and other consecrated ladies of the Church.

On December 13th, in St. Philip's Church, in Richmond, Charles L. Somers, who, since last Council, had ministered to this congregation, was ordained Deacon by the Bishop of the Diocese. The sermon was preached by myself.

On January 25th, in Meade Chapel, Alexandria, the Rev. Emmett E. Miller, who for a year and a half had been in charge of the work in Orange and Alexandria, was ordained Priest by Bishop Gibson. I presented the candidate, and preached the sermon.

In February I visited the Colored Reformatory for boys at Broad Neck, Hanover county, and made an address to a large congregation, consisting of the superintendent, teachers and inmates. The attention was gratifying, and the knowledge of the Church service by the boys as shown in the responses, etc., remarkable. I also catechised the school, and found a proficiency which would be a credit to any Sunday-school in the land.

On February 25th I attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School in Petersburg. It was called to elect a principal in succession to the Rev. O. S. Bunting, D. D., who died a short time before. The Rev. C. Braxton Bryan, D. D., was unanimously elected. Dr. Bunting's death is a great loss to the colored work in the South. His interest has been ever apparent, and his efficiency as head of the Divinity School was pronounced.

He was truly loved wherever he was known in this, as in all of his ministerial duties, and his work will live after him.

During the winter and spring I preached three times in St. Philip's, Richmond, and administered Holy Communion seven times, five being to the sick.

My work in connection with this Church has been an unusually busy

one last year owing to the fact that since the reorganization of the parish, whereby the vestry in consequence of factional differences, with the endorsement of the congregation, placed the business affairs of the Church in the hands of the Bishop, Mr. John L. Williams and myself. This has necessitated considerable effort on my part, while the work in other parts of the Diocese received due recognition. It is a matter for deep gratitude that the Church is now in a condition of encouragement, which, humanly speaking, did not seem possible a year ago.

The Rev. E. E. Miller, of Gordonsville and Alexandria, has resigned and left the Diocese, but Gordonsville will be served by the Rev. J. L. Taylor, who will take charge in June.

Meade Chapel, Alexandria, will have a separate minister, arrangements having been made to that end, thus increasing the clerical force by one. There are now seventeen points in the Diocese where the work is being done.

In addition to these, I have ascertained, with gratification, that much has been accomplished in a quiet and unofficial way throughout the Diocese. This knowledge came to me through the answers to postal cards, which I sent to every clergyman in the Diocese this spring.

Some of the rectors spoke of the regular attendance of colored people at their services, occupying places reserved for them, others of communicants connected with their parishes, and still others of works of comfort among the needy.

In conclusion I would express my renewed conviction that this work is one which the Church must prosecute with vigor.

That there is a problem in what shall be done for the colored man in this land, is a truth becoming more pronounced every day, and that such a problem is an intricate one is also apparent from the different views from thoughtful minds, which fill many columns of the Church and secular papers, and discussion in deliberative bodies.

It is a problem, however, which must be solved by God's people, and as His representatives, in that He has commissioned His ministers to preach the Gospel to every creature. The Christian religion is great in its inclusiveness, and the recognition of this is an essential with every member of the Church. Feeling, as we do, that the time is coming when the colored man shall find the consolation, which for so many years has not been his, in this Church of ours, we "thank God and take courage."

The Chair then called upon the following, who made addresses—viz., Rev. E. L. Goodwin, the Rev. E. Meade, and the Rev. F. W. Neve.

Bishop Gibson's Address.

BISHOP GIBSON'S ADDRESS.

Brethren of the Council of Virginia:

May the blessing of God, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy, be upon our assembly and its deliberations.

May 1st, 1904, found me in Stanardsville, Greene county, making a visitation to the churches under the charge of Rev. Robb White, Jr. On that day I confirmed two persons at Stanardsville and four at Madison Courthouse.

Returning to Richmond on Tuesday, May 3rd, I met, first, a Committee from the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society on the subject of a Secretary for the said Executive Committee, and then the Executive Committee itself.

Sunday, 8th—I confirmed eighteen persons at Emmanuel Church, Henrico county.

Wednesday, 11th—Met the Trustees of the Diocesan Funds at the City Bank in Richmond.

Thursday, 12th—Sat with the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Female Institute at Staunton.

Friday, 13th—Confirmed eleven at the Church of the Epiphany, Barton Heights.

Sunday, 15th—Confirmed fourteen at St. Thomas' Church, Orange.

Wednesday, 18th—Opened the 109th Annual Council at St. James' Church, Richmond.

Many of the members of this Council will remember with pleasure the hearty services, the elevating sermons, and the valuable work of that Council. The interest was sustained to the end of the session, and we adjourned on Friday night with the consciousness of having spent our time to the advantage of the Diocese.

One subject, on which extraordinary pains had been taken, was the subject of statistics. It was found that the figures we could obtain from the Parochial Reports did not represent the state of the Church. A Committee was, therefore, appointed

to secure from other sources than the reports submitted to that Council additional facts, which, taken with the reports in hand, should give us an approximation, at least, to the real state of the case.

That Committee I met on the 24th at my house, and the result of their labors appears in the Journal of 1904 in the Summary of Statistics, and, also in a note to the Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools.

On Friday, the 27th, I met in the morning a Committee from St. Luke's Church, Richmond, for consultation with regard to their condition and prospects; and at night I met a similar Committee from St. Mark's, Richmond.

Sunday, 29th—I confirmed twenty persons at St. James', Warrenton, at morning service; and in the afternoon seven at the chapel on Baldwin's Ridge.

Monday, 30th—In the afternoon attended a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Education Society of Virginia at the house of Rev. Mr. Phillips in Alexandria, and at night, in Christ Church, confirmed five persons, of whom three were from Grace Church.

Wednesday, the 1st of June, I saw a young man in Richmond about taking work in the mountains, with a view to becoming a candidate for Orders.

Thursday, 2nd—Attended a session of the Council of Southern Virginia in Grace Church, Petersburg, where I was able, in addition to the pleasure of seeing old friends, to further certain matters of business with which I was charged.

Sunday, 5th—After sermon, by the Rev. Thomas Semmes, at St. Andrew's, Richmond, confirmed fourteen persons.

Tuesday, 7th—Licensed two Lay Readers; approved candidacy of Guy D. Christian; and attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society's Executive Committee. At this meeting Rev. W. D. Smith was elected Archdeacon, pursuant to the action of the Council in May.

Wednesday, 8th—Attended Commencement of the Bishop

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Payne Divinity School in Petersburg, and, on Thursday, 9th, sat in the Board of Trustees of the same Institution.

Monday, 13th—Was present at the examination of G. L. Somers, colored, candidate for ordination.

Tuesday, 14th—Attended in the day, the Education Society and Trustees of the Seminary at the Seminary Library, and at night the meeting of the Societies at the High School.

Wednesday, 15th—High School Commencement, and Missionary service at the Seminary.

Thursday, 16th—Seminary Commencement, and at night confirmation at Groveton. After sermon by Rev. E. P. Miner, confirmed two persons.

Friday, 17th—Ordained, in Seminary Chapel, Deacons: S. R. Tyler and C. G. Chamberlayne; Priests: Rev. Ernest E. Osgood, W. H. Darbie and J. W. Cook. At night, at Glen Carlyn, confirmed ten.

Saturday, 18th—By request, met Rev. W. H. McGee, who has since taken charge of Buck Mountain and other churches near Charlottesville.

Sunday, 19th—Confirmed twelve at Christ Church, Charlottes-ville, and one at St. James'.

Monday, 20th—Held business conferences with the vestry of Buck Mountain Church, Rev. W. H. McGee and Rev. George P. Mayo, at Rev. H. B. Lee's.

Friday, 24th—Confirmed two at Nokesville.

Saturday, 25th—Confirmed eight at Manassas.

Sunday, 26th—Confirmed seventeen at Haymarket, and visited Church of our Saviour, Fauquier.

Monday, 27th—Confirmed six at Aldie and two at Middleburg; and Tuesday night, six at Upperville.

On the 29th I went to Orkney Springs, which for the next three months was my post-office.

Tuesday, the 5th of July, at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society in Richmond, on my nomination, Rev. John Poyntz Tyler was elected Archdeacon.

Sunday, September 4th—Preached in the chapel at Orkney Springs.

Wednesday, 7th—Returned to Richmond and occupied the new Episcopal residence.

of the rectorship of St. Phillip's, the colored people's church, of Richmond.

Sunday, 18th—Confirmed two persons at St. James', Louisa Courthouse, and at night twenty-six in the Church of the Incarnation, Mineral City.

Monday, 19th—Drove with Rev. Mr. Eagle to Lewiston, in Spotsylvania county; met Mr. J. F. Coleman, student in charge of the work there; held service and preached in the Neighborhood Hall.

The night of the 20th, in Christ Church, Spotsylvania Courthouse, baptized one person and confirmed two.

Wednesday, 21st—Confirmed two in St. George's Chapel, Spotsylvania county.

Thursday, 22d—Confirmed two colored persons in Meade Chapel, Alexandria.

Sunday, 25th—Confirmed nine persons at Grace Church, Albemarle, and two at St. John's Church, Louisa county.

Monday, 26th—Attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society in Richmond.

Wednesday, 28th—Officiated at the wedding of Rev. W. H. Darbie, at Luray.

October was taken up by the General Convention. Besides performing the duties required of me as a member of that body, I preached three times, and made an address, returning home in time to go to Wilmington, N. C., on the 31st, to take part in the consecration of Rev. Robert Strange, D. D., as Bishop-Coadjutor of East Carolina.

November 1st—Dr. Strange was consecrated in the church of which he had been many years rector, entering upon the duties of a Bishop in the community in which he had been brought up. It was an unusual experience, and one which promises much happiness in the new relation, since it speaks of cordial recognition on the part of the people, and duty well done on the part of the priest.

November 2d—I made a little address to the Woman's Aux-

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iliary in St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, Va., and the next day officiated at the Corporate Communion of the Auxiliary in the morning, and presided at a missionary meeting at night. On

the latter occasion, I had the pleasure of presenting to the congregation the Bishops of Boise and the Hawaiian Islands.

Friday, 4th—The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society met in Richmond, Archdeacon Tyler present for the first time as Secretary.

Sunday, 6th—I confirmed six persons at Leesburg, and at night preached for the rector, Rev. James W. Morris.

Wednesday, 9th—Attended the fall meeting of the Seminary Trustees in Library Building.

Thursday, 10th—After a brief stay with Rev. J. W. Ware, in Culpeper, I commenced a visitation of Rev. Mr. Tillinghast's field, and confirmed three persons at Olivette Chapel, a point near the boundary line between Culpeper and Rappahannock counties, where Mr. Tillinghast has service.

On Friday, I preached at Woodville and Sperryville, and on Saturday confirmed five at St. Paul's Church, Washington, all these places being in Rappahannock county.

Sunday, 13th—I confirmed four persons at Front Royal and three at White Post.

On Sunday, 20th, and Monday 21st, I visited three places in the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge. Sunday morning I preached for the first time in the Whittle Memorial Chapel, Blackwell's and Shifflett's Hollows. The congregation filled the church, and many people who had come to service could not get in. Both baptism and confirmation were administered, but the congregation seemed unwearied. Many of the people had walked several miles, and they had to walk back; little children and babies in arms had been brought to church, but the mothers sat on the rough boards, which were their only seats, with the utmost patience until the services came to an end. I have thought of the scene many times since. It has brought to my recollection the accounts of the crowds who, when the Master was on earth, heard him gladly.

Rev. George P. Mayo has labored faithfuly and wisely in locating, designing and constructing the buildings about the Mission House. The House itself, under the management of Mrs. Douglas, is a boon to those who have given themselves to the evangelization and instruction of the neighboring people, and while a great change has taken place already in the habits and manners of the young people of the vicinity, it seems to me that the good work is just beginning. Mr. Mayo's plans contemplate larger things than have yet been attempted, and those plans have been proven in other fields to be both feasible and helpful.

I confirmed seven persons in the Whittle Memorial Chapel, a class representing almost as many ages, and in the afternoon, in the school-house on the side of Flat Top Mountain, confirmed one.

On Monday, an all-day drive, brought me, in company with Archdeacon Neve, to Alberene. There Mrs. Pusey had the pleasure of showing us, and we had the pleasure of seeing, the Mission House, or Parish House, almost completed and already habitable. As there is no church of ours at Alberene, the lower floor of the Parish House is made a chapel. In that room the preaching is done, the Sunday-school meets, the Guilds and Societies assemble. It is a very neat, comfortable auditorium, and sufficiently commodious for the present. The second floor is a Mission Home, and the whole building has large capabilities of usefulness. At Alberene I confirmed five.

Sunday, 27th—I visited Pohick and Olivet, confirming six at the former church. The work of restoring Pohick to colonial condition and state goes quietly on. The rector has announced to me that services have been resumed in the building, much to the content of the congregation.

Tuesday, November 28th—I officiated at a wedding in St. Paul's Church, Richmond, that church having no rector.

Wednesday, 30th—Assisted the rector of All Saints', Richmond, in the annual Brotherhood service, and, with him, administered the Holy Communion to the members of the Local Assembly of the city.

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Sunday, December 4th—In the morning, at the Church of the Holy Comforter, Richmond, confirmed ten. In the afternoon baptized an adult and an infant.

Tuesday, 6th—Met the Diocesan Missionary Society, and had the pleasure of hearing reports from the three Archdeacons.

Wednesday, 7th—Attended meetings of the Church Students' Missionary Association in the Chapel of the Virginia Seminary. and in Whittle Hall.

Friday, 9th—By invitation of Mr. John R. Mott, met a number of ministers of the city of Richmond at the Jefferson Hotel, to talk over the subject of the increase of the ministry.

Friday, 16th—Ordained to the Diaconate in St. Phillip's, Richmond, Charles L. Somers, a graduate of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, in Petersburg. Dr. Moncure preached the sermon. Rev. R. A. Goodwin presented the candidate. Rev. Messrs Osgood and Dickinson assisted. At the same service confirmed four. Rev. Mr. Somers is working faithfully and well at St. Phillip's Church.

Sunday, 18th—At the Monumental, Richmond, confirmed eighteen.

Christmas-Day, which was Sunday, I read service and preached at St. Paul's Church, Richmond, and at night preached for Rev. Mr. Mason, at Grace Church.

January 1st, 1905—Preached for Mr. Mason at Grace Church, Richmond, in the evening.

Tuesday, 3d—Attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Monday, 9th—Attended a meeting of the Protestant Episcopal Church Home.

Sunday, 15th—Addressed the children at a missionary rally in St. Paul's, Richmond, Second Sunday after Epiphany.

Monday, 16th—Examination of a candidate for orders, Mr. P. A. Arthur. At night met the City Missionary Society of Richmond, and at this meeting appointed the Committee of the So-

ciety, who should have special charge under the Society itself of the Neighborhood Workers League.

Friday, 20th—Took steps to inaugurate a Church Club, or League, in Richmond. A committee was appointed to report soon after this council.

Monday, 23d—Continued the examination of Mr. P. A. Arthur.

Wednesday, 25th—St. Paul's Day, advanced to the Priesthood in Meade Chapel, Alexandria, Rev. Emmet Emmanuel Miller, a colored Deacon and graduate of the Bishop Payne Divinity School. Dr. Moncure preached, and in the absence of Rev. W. M. Clark, whose train was delayed by a storm, presented the candidate. Rev. Mr. Morton assisted in the service and in laying on of hands.

Sunday, 29th—Preached for the rector, Rev. C. J. Holt, in St. John's, West Point, at both services, and at night, confirmed nine persons. Plans for the improvement of St. John's have been agreed on. Subscriptions to a gratifying amount have been secured, and the prospects are good in that town for an enlarged church, and greater encouragement for the faithful band of Church people.

On Monday I licensed two Lay Readers for the parish, at Mr. Holt's request.

On the 5th of February, I confirmed four persons in Ashland, and in the afternoon, after a sermon to the children by the rector, Rev. Mr. Hepburn, said a few words to them about the work of the Diocese.

Tuesday 7th—Met the Executive Committee of Diocesan Missionary Society.

Sunday, 12th—Had an appointment at the Monumental Church to preside at a meeting in the interest of City Missions. To my great regret a rather sharp attack of illness prevented my going out. The meeting was held, however, and in spite of extremely inclement weather was a decided success. The

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City Missions of Richmond are now doing a work to which the whole Diocese can look with thankfulness and gratification.

Tuesday, 21st—I met the Neighborhood Workers' League.

Monday, 27th—Attended a meeting of the Church Sunday-School Institute of Henrico Parish, in the lecture-room of Grace Church. I took no part in this meeting, but mention it because I am going to refer to the organization again.

Sunday, March 5th—I assisted the rector of Holy Trinity, Richmond, and with him administered Holy Communion.

March 7th—I met the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

March 10th—I attended a called meeting of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School.

On the 12th of the month, I commenced a series of visitations which took nearly all my time to the end of April, and made close attention to any other sort of business almost impossible.

Sunday, 12th—Confirmed nineteen at St. Andrew's, Richmond, and thirty-three at Christ Church.

Friday, 17th—Confirmed twelve at the Monumental.

Sunday, 19th—Confirmed fourteen at All Saints', and two at the Holy Comforter.

Tuesday, 21st—Met the Neighborhood Workers' League at the Episcopal Rooms.

Sunday, 26th—Confirmed fifteen at St. James', and eighteen at Grace. Richmond.

28th, 29th and 30th—Confirmed six at the Plains, three at Woodstock, and seventeen at Harrisonburg.

On the 31st, at Winchester, met the Vestry of Christ Church in consultation.

April 2nd—Confirmed twenty-seven at St. John's, Richmond, and eleven at Holy Trinity.

April 3d—Confirmed seven at Weddell Memorial, of whom one was for Christ Church, Richmond.

April 4th—Met the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and at the Methodist-Presbyterian Home for

Bishop Gibson's Address.

Old Ladies on Seventh street, confirmed one person, presented by Rev. J. P. Tyler.

April 6th—Confirmed three persons at Port Conway, and at night preached at St. John's Church, at the Courthouse.

Friday, 7th—Preached at St. Paul's, King George, and confirmed eleven persons, which number, with two persons confirmed in private on the way to church, made thirteen for the parish.

Saturday, 8th—Preached at Maple Grove, and confirmed eight persons at Colonial Beach.

Sunday, 9th—Confirmed eight at Oak Grove, and two at Montross.

Monday, 10th—Confirmed two at St. Paul's, Nomini Grove, where Rev. Mr. Latane has been holding services since the Parish in Richmond county became vacant; at night preached at St. John's, Hague.

Tuesday, 11th—At St. John's, Warsaw, baptized an adult, and confirmed two persons.

Wednesday, 12th—Confirmed one at Emmerton, after inquiry and examination. Both Cople and Lunenburg parishes have been long without a rector, but I am glad to say they are both now rejoicing in the prospect of welcoming men whom they have themselves chosen to be their spiritual pastors and guides.

Thursday, 13th—I confirmed two at Heathsville, after adult baptism by Archdeacon Tyler, who met me at this point.

Friday, 14th—Preached to a good congregation in the Methodist Church at Reedville; the minister, Rev. Mr. Wallace, kindly extending the courtesy of his church to both Mr. Tyler and myself.

Saturday, 15th—Preached at Wicomico, and confirmed two at Grace, Kilmarnock.

The Sunday before Easter, confirmed one at Whitechapel and one at Trinity, Lancaster, and on Monday, after making a crossing of the Rappahannock from Merry Point to Urbanna, which was a great deal rougher than my recollection of the trip

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from Calais to Dover, I drove to West Point, arriving there in the early afternoon, while Mr. Holt was preparing for evening service. I broke in on his arrangements and wound up by preaching his Lenten lecture for him.

The next day, Tuesday, I reached Richmond, and at night met the Richmond Missionary Society.

Wednesday night, I confirmed twenty-two boys at the Reformatory, at Laurel. It was a touching service. In so far as one could hope it meant what the words said, there were treasures in it. Twenty-two boys, none of whom had been much guarded or guided in their young life, coming out for the right. Standing in the attitude of repentance and trust, and asking God for help to keep their good resolves—it was a moving sight. The possibilities of happiness and usefulness in that number of well-intentioned, religious, young American boys are immense. Dr. Moncure presented the class, which he had carefully trained. After my address, Major Robert Stiles, the originator of the Reformatory in Virginia, spoke to them strongly and affectionately.

On Holy Thursday, confirmed twelve in St. George's, Fredericksburg. Good Friday, preached in St. George's in the morning, and confirmed seven in Trinity Church at night.

The next day, after one or two visits in Fredericksburg, went on to Alexandria, where, on Easter Day, I confirmed ten in Christ Church, and fifteen in Grace Church. It was encouraging to see the interest manifested in Grace Church. The confirmation class, the congregation, the choir, the offering, all spoke well for the fervor of the people, and their confidence in the leadership of their rector, Rev. Edgar Carpenter.

Monday, 24th—Confirmed five at Grace Church, Casanova, and preached at St. Stephen's.

Tuesday, 25th—Confirmed two at Remington.

Wednesday, 26th—Confirmed two at Christ Church, Brandy Station.

Thursday, 27th—Confirmed eleven at St. Stephens', Culpeper.

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Friday, 28th—Confirmed three at St. Thomas', Orange, and eleven at Woodberry Forest High School.

On Saturday I returned to Alexandria, and on Sunday morning confirmed eleven persons at St. Paul's Church.

At night, in the Seminary Chapel, the work of the year was closed by the confirmation of eight persons, four from the Seminary missions, and four from the Episcopal High School.

CLERGY DECEASED.

On April 22, 1905, in the Memorial Hospital, Richmond, Va., the Rev. Christian R. Kuyk laid down his life in the cause of his Master, the Lord Jesus Christ. It is given to some good men to testify to the Gospel in their lives, and in death simply to close the book of their testimony, and lay it down. This is a great boon, and one for which we may well pray. But it is given to others so to end their lives that a radiance of glory is shed from the death-bed on everything they have said and done in presenting the truth of God to men. It was Mr. Kuyk's happy lot to be among the latter class of witnesses to the Lord Jesus.

From causes we now know to have been in operation all his life, he was a victim to a most terrible and disabling form of facial neuralgia. The pain he had for years borne manfully, but it steadily increased. Without narcotics, he was becoming helpless. But a growing dependence upon drugs, brought him face to face with a new horror. Rather than run the risk of ruining his ministry, by becoming a slave to anodynes of any description, he insisted on an operation of which the dangers were fully made known to him. With the courage of a soldier. yes, with the alacrity of the early martyrs, he demanded that a chance should be given him of continuing to preach the Gospel in honor and integrity. He died, but to the world he is a hero, and his brethren call him blessed. Endowed by nature with certain gifts which are specially valuable to a preacher, he added this above all, he was "faithful unto death." Surely to him the promise is fulfilled, "I will give thee a crown of life."

There are several matters which must be noticed in this address, some demanding action by the Council, others which I mention merely for our information.

1st. It is pleasant to report that a beginning, though a small one, has been made towards caring for the Colonial Churches not at present in use. Last winter I appointed Dr. John Moncure, whose work keeps him for the greater part of his time in Richmond, custodian and treasurer of any funds which might be contributed for the repair or restoration of any Colonial Church in the Diocese which is not under the charge of a rector. Then in the case of a particular church, which I want to see restored, I instructed Rev. Mr. Tyler to interest the people in the vicinity of that church in forming a society—a neighborhood or county society—for the purpose of securing money and enlisting friends of that special cause. This plan can be repeated in every place where a Colonial Church stands vacant. Rectors will, in some cases, attend to this matter themselves, in other cases, they will be glad to have help. The points I have touched thus far have been those where no one was in residence.

Where a church has crumbled entirely to the ground, I hope to have the site marked by a simple stone with the name, date and possibly some memorable event which occurred in it as, e. g., "Here Washington was baptized."

Bishop Gibson's Address.

The Colonial Churches in use are a source of power to the parishes which many rectors and people only faintly perceive. I am told that we may hope to see the restoration of Christ Church, Lancaster, completed this fall. Perhaps I should say just here, that much more is going on in this field than would be supposed by any one who has taken no pains to examine into the matter. It would be a pleasure to show this to the Council if time permitted.

2. The Emergency Fund has received this year \$590.31. It has distributed \$453.03.

The Woman's Auxiliary has made no empty promise in pledging its Branches to send a yearly offering to this fund. Year by year the amounts contributed by the parish Branches increase, and the number of contributing Branches increases also. My grateful acknowledgments are hereby made to the women of the Auxiliaries for their invaluable aid to me, in fulfilling many of the most delicate and imperative duties which fall to my lot as Bishop. Acknowledgments of individual contributions are made personally.

3rd. The April statement from the Treasurer of the Board of Missions with regard to our payment on the apportionment is encouraging, though it shows that \$3,184.27 was still to be made up on the 1st of that month. We have paid \$3,615.73 on our apportionment of \$6,800, and, of course, we shall pay the remainder. The statement shows a fact which emphasizes our status as a rural Diocese, viz: that our largest contributions for missions come in during the spring and summer. Last year on the 1st of April we had only paid one thousand and fifty-four dollars to the Board itself, exclusive of the American Church Missionary Society, while this year we have paid two thousand and ninetyeight dollars. I trust that every rector and minister will recollect that we have a law in force since 1st of January, requiring that every congregation of the Church in the land be given an opportunity to contribute to General Missions in a collection or offering in church.

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4th. The General Clergy Relief Fund has sent me a modest request for my co-operation with its Trustees, which I cannot refuse. This request is simply, that I give the Trustees of this fund and their noble work a cordial recognition in this address, and that I have a notice inserted in the Diocesan Journal giving the name, object and treasurer of this Canonical Fund. Compliance with the request of the Trustees gives me pleasure. It is the only return I can make just now for aid, which is so much to me that I feel as if it were personal. So kindly and so promptly do these Trustees meet my applications to them for assistance, either to the Disabled Clergy of the Diocese, or the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen, that my sense of the strong official obligation I am under towards them becomes quite a secondary consideration. Yet that official relation cannot be ignored. The Society is a national organization. Its Trustees are elected every three years by the General Convention. Its status in the General Canons is the same as that of the Missionary Society. It has all "the machinery and authority" for doing its work, and it has 450 annuitants, several of them in this Diocese.

Let us remember that Quinquagesima Sunday is the day set apart for offerings to its fund, and let us keep the name, object and Treasurer of the Society prominently before us.

5th. The Bethany Institute I have been obliged to set aside for the present. My plan for working it in connection with the Richmond City Missionary Society could only have served a temporary purpose, and has been abandoned. The City Missionary Society has entered upon another field of labor which I hope will give permanent directions to its efforts, and a method of getting the work of the Institute done has been suggested to me, of which I had no knowledge last year, but which promises well. This new method is recommended by skillful trainers of Church workers, but the time for laying it before the Council does not seem to me to have yet arrived.

6th. Condensed reports from the Archdeacons have been prepared at my request, to make clearer to the minds of members

of the Council the character and extent of the work going forward in the Diocese. I submit them, in this connection and recommend that the Council request the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society to elect Rev. John Poyntz Tyler, Archdeacon of the Diocese, with the same salary as heretofore.

OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

Bishop Gibson's Address.

I have discharged my duties as Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society and the Virginia Prayer Book Society, the former requiring much time for its correspondence. In March "Our Diocesan Work," was issued again and will appear as formerly each month, except July and August. I have been enabled to establish two new Sunday-schools and to revive two latent ones. Two Ladies Aid Societies have been re-established. My work for the most part of the nine months has been in the vacant fields of the Diocese. I have conducted five missions each of a week's service in different parts of the Diocese. Now that the vacant fields are being filled I hope to be allowed to turn my face toward the new opportunities which are presenting themselves on every hand. I have four missions to hold in this month and the month of July.

REPORT OF ARCHDEACON NEVE.

IVY DEPOT, VA., May 12, 1905.

The Right Reverend Bishop Gibson:

My Dear Bishop,—In handing in my report as Archdeacon of the missionary work in the mountains of this Diocese, I should like to state, in the first place, that the setting apart of this special kind of work, as a separate missionary district or Archdeaconry, has given to it a clearly defined Diocesan status, as distinguished from a merely parochial or personal enterprise.

The effect of this has been seen, I think, in its recognition by the general Church, as of the same character, and deserving of the same support, as the mountain missionary work in North Carolina, Tennessee and other places.

As the raising of money for the support of our work forms one of my duties and responsibilities, I feel that the way has been made smoother and easier for me in this respect, by your action, in organizing the work into an Archdeaconry with the consent and approval of our last Diocesan Council. Whether this be the cause or not, certain it is, that a considerable advance has been made during the past year in securing contributions for the work.

In the eleven months, beginning June 1, 1904, and ending April 30, 1905, \$4,709.04 has been contributed, and at the time of writing (May 12th) the sum total has reached \$5,000.

This is \$1,500 more than was received during the full twelve months previous to June, 1904. Two gifts, worthy of special notice, have been made during the past year.

One was a donation of \$800.00 from a lady, who was moved to give it,

through seeing photographs of the Whittle Memorial chapel, and the Home for Workers in Shiffletts Hollow. She expressed the wish that a similar centre of work might be organized in another destitute community.

A more remarkable gift still, was that of a lady signing herself "A Friend of Virginia," who sent in her jewelry to be sold for the benefit of our mountain work.

The proceeds of the sale amounted to \$425.00.

These special gifts, as well as the large increase in the total receipts, show a growing interest, and a clearer realization of the great need of the work which is being carried on.

A considerable proportion of the money given is used in either providing buildings for the better equipment of the field, or in making grants towards such buildings, where special funds have been raised for their erection.

For instance, last summer, in addition to the building of the Whittle Memorial chapel, the money for which was especially given by the Diocesan Auxiliary, and did not pass through the Archdeaconry fund, two homes for workers were also built; one at the mission of the Holy Cross, in the Ragged Mountains, and the other at Alberene.

The first of these cost \$650, \$500 of which has already been paid out of the Archdeaconry Fund; and the balance will also be paid from the same source.

The Mission house at Alberene cost \$1,500, of which one-half, or thereabouts, was raised as a separate fund, the rest being a charge upon the Archdeaconry Fund.

The building operations contemplated for the coming summer will be the erection of four churches and chapels, and two mission houses, or homes for workers. This programme may not be entirely carried out, but there is a good prospect that it will be, and a considerable part of the money has already been raised by special funds.

It will thus be seen that the equipment of the field with suitable buildings is rapidly going forward. Since last fall there have been twenty-one workers in the field, six of them being clergymen. Two of these workers, however, were only employed for a part of the time. Good and faithful work has been done, the schools have improved in efficiency, and we are gaining a stronger and firmer hold upon the people generally. It is also worth noting that there has been an increase in the number of people offering themselves as workers in the field, not only from our own Diocese, but from those adjoining. There have also been a few applications from persons living in distant parts of the country, showing that the work is well known, and the interest widespread.

In conclusion, I would request every clergyman in the Diocese to draw

the attention of his people to this work, and recommend them to give it their earnest support.

I must have one word to say about our Sunday-school interests. Our Sunday-schools must be built up, increased in number and made more efficient in teaching. Earnest lay people-men and women—here and there in the Diocese are looking for opportunities to advance the Church through the Sunday-school, and the Sunday-school, through improved methods. In Richmond there is an institution called the Church Sunday-school Institute of Henrico Parish. This organization holds meetings, discusses Sunday-school matters, and does a large amount of valuable practical work. It has taken up the subject of Sundayschool instruction very thoroughly. It has published a plan of Sunday-school work which provides for a course of study occupying the child from infancy to the age of eighteen. Many of the churches have adopted this plan, and several others have noticed it favorably. The question has occurred to me, "Would it be possible to form a Diocesan Institute, of which this Richmond organization could be a member?" If such a Diocesan Institute could be formed, it would naturally enter into correspondence with the Joint Commission on Sunday-school Instruction, appointed by the last General Convention. I suggest that the whole matter be referred to our Council Committee on Sunday-schools, of which Rev. H. F. Klowman is Chairman.

One Canon must be brought up for inspection by this Council. The interpretation generally put upon it is gradually changing the character of the Church, reversing all our historic theories, and bringing us under the operation of the General Canons in advance of all formal action on our part. While we are waiting for the report of our Committee on Parish Lines, and for the advice of our Historiographer, the old Parish organization has been in many cases virtually obliterated, and in others so changed as to be unrecognizable.

Bishop Gibson's Address.

The Canon I refer to is Canon VIII, Section 3, where separate elections for a Parish Vestry are allowed to congregations in a Parish, "apart from one another, but not constituting independent cures." This Canon has been so construed as to form "independent cures," with two Church Wardens, a Register and Treasurer for each, and two churches in such a parish take it as a matter of course that they can divide a Vestry of twelve between them in such proportion as comity and a sense of fairness dictates. While, to my mind, the Canon says as plainly as English words can speak, that each separate election shall choose only three persons, whether those separate elections be in number two, three, or four. A committee on this Canon may, if it pleases, open the door to a large question, and one which the Historiographer told us in his report to the last Council, has been several times discussed in Virginia Councils, and always decided adversely, viz: the limitation of Parish lines so that much of the territory of the Diocese may be in no Parish.

The Secretary of the Board of Missions writes me that a missionary meeting is contemplated for the Judicial District, or Department, of the Church, in which our Diocese is situated. I am to hear about it more fully from the Department Secretary. Meantime, I should like to have a committee of this council look up the law relating to the matter, and, if possible, suggest to us the number of representatives we may have in that Conference. I recommend to the Council that we select men as our representatives who will go to the meeting and take an interest in its work. Department Conferences have taken the place of the Missionary Council of former years, and if they prove anything like as valuable, the Church will grow apace under their stimulus. Let us do our part heartily and hopefully.

At one of the sessions of the Board of Missions, held during the General Convention in Boston, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Missions affectionately recommend to Dioceses and Missionary Districts that they send, through the deputies to the

next General Convention, an extra offering for Missions, to be presented at the opening services as a special recognition of thankfulness to Almighty God for the blessings he has vouchsafed to this Church during the three hundred years since it was planted at Jamestown."

In the Board of Missions a Committee was appointed early this year to "formulate and put into execution a plan to insure the presentation at Richmond in 1907, of a missionary offering by the men of the Church, as a thanksgiving for three hundred years of English Christianity." Bishop Greer, Mr. Thomas, and Mr. Pepper are that Committee. These gentlement have formulated a plan, and are at work in accordance with its provisions. One of its features and that first to be presented, is the appointment by the Bishop of each Diocese of a Committee, consisting of the Deputies to the last General Convention, this Committee to be put in communication with the Committee of the Board of Missions. I hereby appoint and announce to the Council my appointment of the Committee on Thank Offering for 1907. Three of the Deputies are not in this Council. One, Dr. Strange, is Bishop of another Diocese, and two are abroad; but those who are here can meet and organize, and, if necessary, others can be added to make up a working number.

Every one must see, I think, that we should do this work thoroughly. If successful, it will give the Church a tremendous impetus. To many people it will be an awakening to a sense of power quite startling, and in a vast number of cases, a face to face interview with an accredited representative of the General Church on the subject of missions, will bring to a man's mind a sense of his responsibility for the advance of the Church, such as he has never felt before. In this field, also, let us do our very best heartily, unto the Lord.

The Bishop reports to the Council that he is occupying the Episcopal Residence, 906 Park Avenue, and that he and his family find it a delightful home.

Report of Standing Committee.

THURSDAY, MAY 18TH, 3:30 P. M.

The Council re-assembled, and was called to order by the President.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese respectfully report that, since the last Council (1904), they have given consent to the consecration of the Rev. Dr. Robert Strange, as Bishop Coadjutor of East Carolina; Rev. Dr. Charles Edward Woodcock, as Bishop of Kentucky, and Rev. Dr. James Henry Darlington, as Bishop of Harrisburg.

REPORT OF THE PRAYER BOOK DISTRIBUTION SOCIETY.

The Rev. J. W. Ware read the report of the Prayer Book Distribution Society.

The Board of Directors of the Prayer Book Distribution Society beg leave to report that they began the year with a cash balance of \$89.44.

During the year twelve (12) churches have added by their contributions the sum of \$167.12, making a total of \$256.56. All applications for books have been granted.

Eleven (II) grants have been made, consisting of 363 Prayer Books and 305 Hymnals, or a total of 668 volumes. In several instances the parishes receiving the grant have made contributions to the Society, which have greatly aided it in its work.

The directors would commend most heartily the work of this valuable auxiliary to the work of the Church in the Diocese, and ask that during the coming year all the churches make offerings for it.

The growth of the missionary work of the Diocese will make large demands upon this Society during the next year, and more money will be needed than ever before.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH SCHOOLS.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin presented the following report of the Committee on Church Schools in and for the Diocese of Virginia, which was adopted:

To the Council of Virginia:

Your Committee appointed at the last Council, beg leave to report that they have considered with some care the subject before them, and submit the following:

Passing by all abstract questions about dioceses and schools and the possible relation of the two groups of institutions one to the other, they find that the Diocese of Virginia has at present two schools called diocesan: the Episcopal High School, and the Virginia Female Institute.

Both these schools they regard as doing most admirable work. Under

the management of their Boards of Trustees they are steadily improving their grounds and buildings, and providing for the well-being of their inmates. With no large amount of money on hand at any one time, and consequently with an annual expenditure which must be considered very

moderate, they are keeping their places in the fore-front of the useful, healthful, beautiful and growing educational institutions of the coun-

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We call these schools diocesan, and so they are in spirit and in the appointment of their governing boards. They are part and parcel of this Diocese. They help the Diocese, and the Diocese helps them. But they are not exclusively diocesan, nor are they so broadly diocesan that every child in the Diocese who deserves their benefits can be educated in them. Judged by the standards of Virginia and the South, they are expensive schools, and, therefore, out of reach of many who would be glad to avail themselves of their great advantages. This state of affairs has at times raised the question, "Are these schools properly called diocesan?"-"Has the Diocese any special, vital interest in them?" We have answered that in our judgment they are properly called diocesan, but we add that their influence extends so far beyond the Diocese into so many other dioceses, and their benefits are distributed so widely, that they must be considered and may properly be called "Church Schools,"-"Episcopal Church Schools in Virginia." The Diocese is proud of them in this aspect of their work, and because of their reputation and general influence insists on her ownership in them with pride.

These schools then, your Committee think should be cordially approved by the Council and allowed to develop gradually and normally, under the wise direction which has made them what they are. That they will do more for the Diocese in the future than in the past seems likely when we remember that both of them are obliged to refuse pupils every year for want of room, and when we remember also that this year both the High School and the Institute are putting into the hands of their Boards of Trustees \$1,000, to be used in scholarships at the discretion of those boards or their agencies.

But your Committee cannot forget that the High School and the Institute, however highly recommended and endorsed by us, do not meet the demand of our people for less expensive schools, which shall be in some way and under some form connected with the Diocese. We want Diocesan Schools where the influences of the Church will be steady and strong; schools which will lay the foundation of a broad, liberal culture. Schools under the management of our best types of men and women; and also schools which will be accessible to the girls and boys of our repreReport of Committee on Revision of Canous.

sentative Virginia families who have in our years of bitter trial clung to the soil of the old State with a heroism born of unchangeable affection

We want schools of that kind. We ought to have them. They will, in scores, perhaps hundreds, of cases, make the difference to our young people of abiding, and living out their lives, in the class of society in which they were born, or else of descending to menial occupations for their living, and the associations which those occupations involve.

Happily, under the natural laws of Christian society we have not been entirely debarred from schools which without the name of church schools, have done the precise work of which we are speaking. In many country homes throughout the Diocese little gatherings of children can be found who are pursuing reasonable and modern courses of study, while at the same time they are learning from nature, and from the occupations of the farm, from careful housekeepers and from intelligent country gentlemen, lessons which would be vainly sought in books.

Still your Committee is of opinion that there is need for a Diocesan School or schools to supplement the praiseworthy efforts of individuals to provide instruction for the young people of this Diocese and State. They think there is ample room for such schools. They, therefore, offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Committee be continued and instructed to inquire into the expediency and practicability of establishing in this Diocese, and under the control of the Council, a school for girls in which the charges for board and tuition shall not exceed \$200.

RFPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CLERICAL SUPPORT.

Mr. W. W. Chamblin presented the following report, which, with recommendations, was adopted.

Your Committee beg to report they have found some difficulty in tabulating this report owing to the lack of uniformity in the reports furnished by the various treasurers. We, therefore, specially recommend that a new form of Parish Treasurers' Report be framed, and that each report be signed by the Treasurer of the parish or church, and attested by the rector, or in his absence, by the Senior or Junior Warden. Accompanying this, we submit the style of blank form. The attention of the Vestries is called to the failure of some of their treasurers to make their

reports, as it is impossible to make complete reports from incomplete returns.

The whole number of churches reporting is 63; twelve failing to make any report. Number of churches reporting salaries paid in full, 53. Seven churches report small deficits, amounting in all to \$248.96, and three overpaid being \$44.25. The small amount of deficit indicates a hopeful and encouraging condition of the tendency of the parishes to fulfill their obligations. We would also recommend that parishes that are beneficiaries of the Diocesan Missionary Society, shall while they are without a rector, be requested to collect at least half of the salaries they usually pay their rector, and contribute the amount to the Diocesan Missionary Society, and such parishes be shown a preference by the Society in the help given them.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AT BLACKSBURG.

The Rev. John McGill, D. D., presented the following report which, with the two resolutions therein offered, was adopted:

Your Committee appointed to consider the matter of our assisting in the effort now being made to provide the services of our Church for the students of the Virginia Polytechnic Institute, at Blacksburg, would respectfully submit, that,

WHEREAS, There are at Blacksburg this session, one hundred and sixty odd Episcopal students, twenty-five or more of these coming from beyond the borders of the State of Virginia, and seventy of the remainder hailing from the Diocese of Virginia; and,

WHEREAS, The church building at Blacksburg cannot seat the students who desire to worship there, and consequently Episcopal students are constantly turned from the doors of their own church, and forced to attend religious services elsewhere; and

WHEREAS, The Rectory at Blacksburg, in course of construction, is unfit for occupancy, and no house, or even rooms, can be secured at Blacksburg for the rector; and,

Whereas, The Blacksburg Parish is numerically and financially weak, and while doing its best, is not able, unaided, to do what is imperatively needed for any successful prosecution of the Church's work at that school, and has appealed and is appealing to us for help through individuals; and,

WHEREAS, The Institute at Blacksburg is not a diocesan, but a State institution, and while located in another Diocese, is attended yearly by a goodly number of the sons of this Diocese, thus assuring us that the Diocese of Southern Virginia will welcome our interest and efforts in behalf of this important work; and,

WHEREAS, There are no funds at the command of this Council which can be appropriated to this work, therefore, be it

- I. Resolved, That subscriptions be taken from all those in this Council interested in this good work, and be forwarded at once to Blacksburg.
- 2. Resolved, That we earnestly recommend to the congregations of the Diocese this work at Blacksburg, which is so imperative, and earnestly hope all who can will contribute liberally to this cause.

It will be seen that the extraordnary expenses for the year were mainly due to the assessment for the General Convention, held at Boston, in October, 1904, and the expenses of the deputies from this Diocese thereto; and to the purchase and repair of the new Episcopal residence.

But there has also been a large increase in the cost of printing and distributing the Journals of the Council. This was, no doubt, due to the increased size of the last Journal and the arrangement of the statements. Your Committee recommend that the Secretary be instructed to take such steps as he may deem best to reduce both the size and the cost of the Journal; and they suggest that he adopt as far as he can, the form of tabulated statements prepared by the Rev. J. H. Dickinson, and thereby avoid much unnecessary repetition of items.

Your Committee recommend that the salary of the Treasurer be made \$200 per annum, to date from May 1, 1905. In view of the magnitude of the sums he handles, the accounts he has to keep and the accuracy and excellence with which his work is done, this allowance is very moderate, and is richly due him.

Your Committee believe that the tabulated statements prepared by the Rev. J. H. Dickinson will tend greatly to reduce the cost of this and all future Journals, and that a proper allowance should be made him for his labors in arranging and perfecting those statements, and they recommend that for preparing the necessary statements to be used in the forthcoming Journal, and probably all future Journals, he be allowed the sum of \$75.

Your Committee recommend that the sum of \$300 be allowed the Bishop for an office and such clerical assistance as he may require. The sum of \$500 was allowed for this purpose last year, but only \$250 was used.

Your Committee recommend that the sum of \$1,000 be put subject to the order of the Bishop, to be paid in four quarterly instalments to such Archdeacon as may be chosen to do missionary work under the Bishop in the Diocese; such appropriation to expire April 30th, 1906.

Your Committee recommend that 1,000 copies of the address of the Bishop, made at the opening of the Council, be printed in such form as the

Report of Committee on Sunday-schools.

Committee to whom the printing of it was referred, may deem proper, and that the cost be paid by the Treasurer.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The Rev. H. F. Kloman read the report of the Committee on Sunday-schools.

Your Committee on Sunday-schools beg leave to report that having examined the statistics of Parochial Reports, we find an increase over the previous year in the number of teachers and scholars, and also an increase in the total contributions. The total number of teachers reported at present being 1,064; scholars, 9,792; contributions, \$6,655.91. Your Committee find that in considering the suggestion made by the Bishop in his report that the question is so large and so important that we cannot make an intelligent report with the data at present before us. We, therefore, ask that the Committee be continued, in order that we may thoroughly investigate and consider the matter, and report at the next Council. The Committee has decided to get out a circular asking certain questions, to be sent to each rector and Sunday-school superintendent in the Diocese. Your Committee would urge upon rectors and superintendents the importance of promptly and correctly answering these questions when received. As it will necessarily entail some expense in going into this matter as it should be done, your Committee ask that they be allowed to call on the Treasurer of the Diocese for such necessary fundsnot to exceed \$25.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Rev. F. W. Neve read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

"The Church, which is His Body, the Fulness of Him, that fitteth all in all."

As the Church enters into the fuller consciousness, and clearer realization of this truth, that she is indeed the Body of Christ, filled by His Spirit, and sharing in the fulness of His Divine life; so must she come to have a clearer vision of the greatness of the work, which it is her mission to fulfil The Church in this Diocese seems during the past few vears to have awakened to this fuller realization of the opportunities and possibilities of her high calling. She has enlarged and widened her vision of duty and responsibility. Never before has she attempted greater things than now. In the lowest slums of the city, in the jails and prisons, in the distant hollows of the mountains, in the mining villages; in fact, wherever men are ignorant and out of the way, our Church is sending her messengers with the glad tidings, which alone can give "light and understanding to the simple;" and the hope of better things to the minds and hearts of men. Christ is still going about doing good through us, the members of his Body; still shining in the dark and desolate places, through the consecrated lives of those, who are doing the pioneer work of our Church in Virginia.

Report of Committee on State of the Church.

Men and women are hearing the voice of the Master, and coming forth at His call, in ever increasing numbers to join the army of Light Bearers, who leaving those comforts and advantages which men deem most desirable, are going forth into the wilderness to spend and be spent in the work of uplifting their fellow-men.

All this shows that the tide of life is rising; that the Spirit of Christ is manifesting in us, the members of His Body, a fuller and larger measure of His power, and an increasing capacity for service; that His promptings are more clearly recognized, meeting with a more loyal and glad response and obedience. And if this be so, as we know and feel that it is, there is no place nor ground for discouragement, much less dismay; though on the material side, our resources seem less than adequate to meet the demands of our growing missionary work.

It is because we, the members of His Body, moved by the indwelling of the Spirit of the Master, have been raised to a higher and larger conception of our duty; it is because we are reaching out to the doing of greater things; because we have advanced to the acknowledgement, that ties of Christian brotherhood bind us to those, whom once we passed by on the other side; it is because of this more vigorous life of our Church on its spiritual side, that our material resources seem to be dwarfed in comparison. With a large increase in the number of our communicants, and also in the number of children in our Sunday-schools; with a growing desire on the part of our young men to enter the ministry, many of whom are proving their fitness for this high calling by doing good and self-denying work in the mission fields of the Diocese. With these and other clear indications of increased vitality, the mere fact that our missionary contributions are not so large as we anticipated, must not be allowed to obscure the bright and glowing hopefulness of the outlook. For this increased vitality in the Church, which is so clearly marked, will assuredly make itself felt before long in this other department of the Church's life as well.

Just as in the spring-time some trees seem to be dormant and unaffected by the awakening to life of the whole earth, while those around them show signs of luxuriant growth; and yet, in a short while, the flowing tide of renewing life reaches them, too, and they share in the general awakening, so, too, will it be with our beloved Church in this Diocese. Let the need be but known; let the full story of our missionary enterprise be told, and this one cloud of discouragement shall pass away, and the growth in the free-will offerings of the people will be as clearly marked, as in the other departments of the Church's life and activity.

Vote of Thanks.

In our Bishop we have a spiritual leader, who has the clearness of vision, which enables him to see throughout the length and breadth of the Diocese's great and growing opportunities for larger and wider service. The watchword, which he gave us at our missionary meeting on Wednesday night, was "Forward!" Forward, then let it be, in spite of apparently diminished resources. We know him not only as a man of faith and courage, but as a man of sound judgment and practical common sense as well,—a safe leader. If he says "Forward!" then let us accept his leadership and follow him. And let each member of this Council go back to his parish, and tell the people of the growing life and vitality manifesting itself in our midst. Let us tell them of the Bishop's watchword, and bid them take their part in the forward movement, keeping step with their brethren throughout the Diocese. And so, as one united people, we shall go forward, to meet the greater opportunities for service opening out before us, each one trying to do his part in raising the spiritual tone, and the spiritual efficiency of his own church and his own parish, till we all come in the unity of the faith, and the knowledge of the Son of God unto the perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ.

The President appointed the following as the committee: Rev. S. S. Hepburn, C. J. Holt, and Mr. R. Carter Wellford.

The Rev. L. R. Mason moved to refer to the Committee on Canons his resolution, offered yesterday, in regard to Canon IV.

The rector of Christ Church warmly and feelingly responded to the resolution, and the Bishop earnestly congratulated the rector and congregation.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INCREASE OF THE MINISTRY.

Rev. S. A. Wallis, D. D., read the following report of the Committee on Increase of the Ministry:

The question of the best means of providing for an increase of the ministry, which would satisfy the growing demands of the Church, in its forward development at home and abroad, has been occupying the thought of its leaders, and others most deeply interested in its extension during the past ten or fifteen years.

The subject has been more frequently presented under the aspect of

Increase of Ministry.

"The Falling Off of Candidates for Holy Orders." The reasons for this alleged, and, we believe, serious condition, lying at the very root of the Church's life and progress, have been discussed from all points of view in our religious papers; talked about and resolved upon in our Councils and Conventions; investigated at our Theological Seminaries, and formed the subject of important conferences, appointed by the leaders of our great missionary movements.

This widespread interest demonstrates that a lack of spiritual power for the bestowal of this gift or "charism" of the ministry is felt in the Body of Christ, and that an earnest effort is being put forth to remedy this lack. The present situation may, and does, indicate the existence of certain streams of tendency, which close the doors of the sacred ministry against a number of young men of recognized worth and ability, who might otherwise enter. In the first place, there is a deepening sense of the loftiness of the ideal of what a Christian minister should be. The professional aspect of the ministry, which we devoutly thank God has never found a place in our own Diocese, is becoming abhorrent to all right thinking people, whether they are followers of Christ or not. Secondly, the materialistic spirit of the age, with its commercialism, is so dominating the life of even the Church itself that the question of entering the ministry never occurs to many young men, or, if it does, they at once repel the thought of it, because their hearts are fixed upon the ambitions and rewards of this world alone. Again, an indictment is laid against the Church itself. It is asserted that her influence is waning, because she holds on to the husks of human interpretations of Scripture, and opinions which suited former times, but which hide the truth from the present generation. This indictment was true in many quarters some vears ago. But the proud world of scientific criticism is very often as ignorant of the real conditions found within the Church, as it claims the Church is of the real conditions outside its own borders. If those who criticise the intellectual life of the Church were more familiar with the trend of its thought, with the books studied at our Seminaries, and read by our clergy, and would sometimes listen to our teachers and preachers, they would find that there is true development and progress within the ancient realm of theology, both scientific and practical. The purpose of much of the opposition of science, falsely so-called, is not merely to discredit interpretations of truth already discredited within the Church itself, but to overthrow the very foundations of the faith once delivered to the saints.

We cannot do more than call attention to these conditions, which are held to deter many young men from entering the ministry. Some, as we have seen, are lofty, some are of the earth, earthy. It is our duty to

hold young men to the loftiest ideals. And we thank God that they generally hold these themselves. So we believe they should wait on the threshhold until they have well weighed the matter with themselves, and until they are assured that the Spirit speaks to their souls, saying, unmistakably, This is the way, walk ye in it. For others, we should make the spiritual a reality, engrossed as they are, and too often overwhelmed by the deadening forces of materialism and commercialism, as a result of training in the home, and through no fault of their own. And for ourselves, as Christian leaders and teachers, while holding unswervingly to the substance of the faith, we should avoid burdening this by the dead hand of human interpretations, inconsistent with the revelation God is making in the departments of the field of universal truth.

But there are vital hindrances found in our own midst which we should do our utmost to put out of the way.

There is, firstly, a lamentable and marked decadence of family religion. Although required by our Canons, we fear that the family altar is no longer reared in many of our homes. Can there be a great desire on the part of our young men to respond to the call of God when the atmosphere of the home gives no encouragement for the growth of spiritual life? When fathers and mothers are not anxious for their sons to be numbered among the apostles of the Lord, can we expect the spirit of consecration to rest upon youths nurtured under such untoward influences?

Again, what are the clergy doing to lead fit young men in their congregations to consider the claims of the ministry of Jesus Christ? There is a solemn responsibility resting upon them to speak to earnest young souls about the highest and noblest of callings, for the Spirit works ordinarily through human agencies. In our judgment, each parish clergyman should preach at least once a year on the work of the ministry and the need of faithful and consecrated men to go forth and turn many to righteousness and build them up in our most holy faith. Then not only should each minister pray fervently that the Lord of the harvest should send forth laborers into His harvest, but also make use of his personal influence to inspire young men, who look to him for counsel, with a passion to be ministers and teachers in the Church of Christ.

We have also found that personal contact with young men on the part of earnest young men is most effectual in moving many such to consider the claims of the ministry. Several candidates for orders are at our Seminaries to-day because this subject was seriously presented to them by wise and consecrated theological students sent forth from time to time to our colleges and universities. We are told that the personal influence of some postulants for orders, now at our university, is being felt by stu-

dents there, who, but for them, would never have thought of the ministry at all.

The call for laborers is heard on all sides, and it should receive a hearty response. But is the Church prepared to support her laborers in the parishes, and in our missionary fields, foreign and domestic, as she should? This is a question chiefly for our laymen to ponder. Our young men looking forward to the ministry are not afraid of enduring hardness as good soldiers of Jesus Christ. But is it not a shame that they should be left in so many places to labor for a Church blessed so abundantly with worldly goods as ours is, on such a small pittance, as is represented by the average salary? Perhaps, then, we have all the candidates for orders we have a right to expect until we add to our prayers for laborers, that faith which will also be fruitful in the work of ministering to their temporal needs.

Form for Making Bequest.

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise, or bequest, property of every description, real, personal, or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not," is "The Trustees of the Fund of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Vir-

The funds already created and now held by the said corporation, are:

- 1. The Disabled Clergy Fund.
- 2. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund.
- 3. The Episcopal Fund,
- 4. The Bruce Fund.
- 5. The St. Andrew's Fund.

All devises or bequests to any of the said funds should be made to "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Virginia. for the sole use and benefit of the——Fund [naming the fund intended]. now held in trust by the said corporation."

If it is desired to create a new fund for any Church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its President, Rt. Rev. Robert A. Gibson.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary of Virginia is "The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary and High School in Virginia;" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia is "The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia;" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is, "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia;" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg, Va., is, "The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School in Virginia;" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequests: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia, March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

Gentlemen,—I have the honor to present to the Diocese of Virginia a report of the Virginia Female Institute for the session 1904-1905.

The year has been a successful one and the house full, with some changes at the half year. The health has been excellent, and the scholarship good. The Institute has assisted many pupils not able to meet the usual charges, and is doing a widespread good. At the Bishop's visitation, we had only four candidates, nearly every other girl of suitable age being a Church member. Sixty-eight pupils have been confirmed within six years, and our Missionary Society does good work.

To quote Dr. Alderman, the newly-installed president of the University of Virginia,—"That college is dead which needs nothing"—so again I would urge our needs in equipment, if the Diocese wishes to keep the school in a healthful condition.

I earnestly ask for your interest, your sympathy, and your prayers.

REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S Auxiliary, May, 1905.

Rt. Rev. R. A. GIBSON, D. D., President, ex-officio;

The 15th annual report of the Work of the Branch, comes into review to-day, and gives evidence of continued life and some measure of growth, though the high ideal of its devoted officers and friends "to enroll every woman in every parish, as an active, or honorary member," is not yet attained,—but the hope is strong, that in time, this "ideal" will crystallize into a reality; and it will, if our worthy rectors will throw the weight of their influence in this direction, and not fear a deficit in the "parish apportionment," for loyalty to her baptismal vows secures an interest in missions, as she assumes her usual obligation to missionary responsibility, which, whether she will, or no, she cannot get rid of. It is true, there are difficulties;—we appreciate this fact, and often wonder, as we learn to value the selfdenying gifts for the cause of missions, as manifested in these annual reports-how so much is accomplished. But it is also true, that no parish need fear to organize all its members into a branch, because of small numbers, or smaller means,—for the facts verify the statement, that in the work of spreading God's truth, relying on His help, He will surely see to it, that the means are forthcoming,—which is proved, by those branches, whose faithful earnestness, make it possible to present this report of work "well done" all over the old Diocese, through the effort of consecrated women, who, year by year, continue at their post, and more and more, are developing that, for which the Auxiliary stands; spirituality, intelligence, and gifts.

We are glad to report three (3) new branches formed, that of St. Thomas, Orange; which though long delayed, starts out with full purpose and promise, to be a power by adding strength to the whole work.

St. James, Ashland, has been aroused to action under the present rector; -and a good work is growing at Sharon Chapel, Fair-

fax county, which is in charge of students of the Theological Seminary, while White Post and Front Royal are ready for organization by promise, from the present rector.

OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

With much to encourage on all lines, there is danger of forgetting that as an organization, we are a "Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions," created by the Board in 1871, in order to help forward its own work, and as such, we must always keep that principle in view, while the interests and claims of our own Diocese, in its present active and spreading missionary zeal, must also never be forgotten,—for with hearts inspired by the "constraining love of Christ," there will be enough and to spare for all work, knowing that it is "not the gift, but the altar which sancifieth the gift."

Statistics of the year aggregate a fair showing of interest and effort to meet all appeals. Pledges assumed at the annual meeting in November, have been paid; the former pledges are still kept up, as the women grasp the principle,—that the "worth of the money grows with the worth of the purpose for which it is given." and it is all given for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom.

The largest share of gifts, in money and boxes, as usual, has been distributed in the Diocese, till there is not a mission in Virginia that has not been helped by a liberal response to every appeal from mountain to seashore, proving there is that "Scattereth and yet increaseth."

The foreign work has been generously helped by money gifts, notably in the love offering of \$287 to build and equip a room in St. James' Hospital, Gankin, as a memorial to the late loved Vice-President, Mrs. R. A. Gibson, beside other gifts to China, Japan, Brazil, and Africa.

The domestic field, too, has received its portion, from Alaska, Boise, and other western jurisdictions, to Southern Florida and Honolulu.

The work of the Junior Department is in splendid condition, and bids fair to rival the Woman's Auxiliary, under the efficient

leadership of its earnest secretaries, Mrs. Barton and Miss F. Gibson.

The Babies' Branch is most blessed, in securing for its Secretary, Mrs. Walter Christian, who has increased largely the number of its branches and membership.

The United Offering, is not what it might be,—six months gone, and the custodian has little to report, since the offering in Boston.

The next triennial gift will be made in Richmond, 1907,—it should be worthy of the object and of the occasion—a "Thank Offering," that we of to-day inherit the priceless privileges of this American Church, founded by our forefathers, 300 years ago.

The C. P. C. does good and helpful work by distributing literature, through its Secretary, Miss Freedley.

The Emergency Fund grows slowly; but Miss Gibson presents a better report this year. We should be glad for each branch to make greater effort to increase gifts in the future.

We cordially thank our Bishop for his unfailing sympathy and encouragement. Without them, we would often have been in despair.

To every rector who loyally stands by the Auxiliary with helpful interest, we owe our gratitude, and ask for continued endorsement, while in different ways we unite in one effort to win the world for Christ.

REPORT OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL MISSIONARY AT RICH-MOND FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 1905.

Richmond, Va., May 11, 1905.

Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, D. D.:

My dear Bishop,—In submitting this, my report as City Missionary at Richmond, I would express my conviction as to the growing importance of a work of this character, together with a sense of privilege at being called to it. During the year, it has been my aim to reach all of the institutions, and outlying work, not specially provided for in parochial organization. My work has consisted mainly in teaching and preaching, though I have ministered not infrequently to the temporal needs of the poor. This latter department has been so amply provided for by the

many charitable organizations in the city, that such need is not as great in many localities; though I endeavor to be watchful, and to render help wherever it is needed. Special attention is called, in this report, to the work in the prisons, where regular visitations and services are had; the Boys' Reformatory, at Laurel, near Richmond, where I have had a class for instruction, and have preached, and in conjunction with the Richmond Chapters of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, I have, with the blessing of God, baptized twenty-one of the inmates, and presented twenty-two for confirmation during the year; and to the Neighborhood Workers' League, on Brook avenue. This is an important and growing institutional work in a needy section of the city, and consists of clubs for boys and girls, kindergarten, sewing-school, mothers' meeting, Sunday services and school. This latter work has been taken up by the Society during the year.

In addition to the foregoing I have officiated in many churches, where there have been vacancies in the rectorships, or where the clergy have been absent on account of sickness, of from other causes.

THE GENERAL CONVENTION.

To the Convention (or Council) of the Diocese of Virginia:

In compliance with the requirement of Article XI, of the Constitution, I hereby make known that the following alteration of the Constitution of the Church is proposed—to-wit: That comprised in the resolution printed herewith, said resolution having been constitutionally adopted by a General Convention held in the city of Boston, in October, A. D., 1904.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution, as follows:

That Article I, Section 6 of the Constitution be amended by adding after the words "of the United States" the words "and one Clerical and

REVISED CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

As adopted in 1836, and amended in 1840, 1850, 1860, 1864, 1867, 1872, 1881, 1890 and 1900.

ARTICLE I.

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia on the third Wednesday in May every year; but the Council which meets in the year previous to the meeting of the General Convention may have power to appoint the time and place of meeting for the next annual session, and in the event of the existence of an epidemic disease, or any other good cause, rendering it necessary or expedient to alter the place fixed on for any meeting of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may change the place, or the time, or both.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be one), and of the Ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who now are or may hereafter be canonically settled in Parishes or churches within this Diocese; Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, Missionaries within this Diocese and under its ecclesiastical authority, being Clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese: *Provided*, that any such Ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members *ex officio: Provided further*, that only such Colored Ministers shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article: *Provided further*, that no Minister under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat

in the Council, and no Minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC. 2. The Council shall also be composed of lay members, consisting of one delegate for each Parish or church entitled to representation, chosen by the vestry thereof, except as hereinafter provided. Every such Parish or church having more than one officiating Minister canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has Ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church: *Provided*, that only such colored delegates shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article.

SEC. 3. The Council shall also be composed of the Colored Ministers having a seat and voice in the Council on the 17th day of May, 1889, and of two clerical and two lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is now or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

ARTICLE III.

Twenty members of the clerical and twenty of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn.

ARTICLE IV.

In all matters that shall come before Council, the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body, and the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure; but when five members require it there shall be a vote by orders, and a majority of each order shall be necessary to a decision.

ARTICLE V.

The election of a Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor in this Diocese shall be made in Council in the following manner: The vote shall be by ballot and by orders, a concurrent majority of the votes cast by each order, being necessary to a choice.

ARTICLE VI.

The Bishop shall be President of the Council, in which character it shall be his duty to give to the Council annually a general view of the state of the church; to call special Councils at whatever time and place he shall think necessary, or when required by the Standing Committee; to preserve order during the time of session; to put the question, collect the votes, and declare the decision; and he may deliver his sentiments on any subject after it has been discussed before a vote thereon. The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside in the Council in the absence of the Bishop.

ARTICLE VII.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, the Council, immediately upon their assembling, shall choose by joint ballot a President from among the order of Priests, who shall remain in office until the next annual Council, or until the next election of a President. He shall perform all duties, and possess all the privileges above specified; but he shall not call special meetings of the Council unless applied to for that purpose by a majority of the Standing Committee; and if the Bishop of the Diocese be not present at any meeting of the Council, they shall elect, in the manner aforesaid, a President pro tempore.

ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office during good behavior. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and to faithfully deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Council which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to notify through the channel of the public papers, as he may think proper, the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journal of every succeeding Council a list of the clergy, with all alterations therein produced in the preceding year by ordinations, deaths, removals, suspensions and degradations.

ARTICLE IX.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office for one year, or until his successor shall be appointed. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose

of the same as may be ordered by the Council. He shall annually report to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same.

In case of a vacancy in the office by the death or resignation of the Treasurer, or in case of his misconduct, incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office during the recess of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may fill the said vacancy, or remove the said Treasurer and appoint a Treasurer *pro tempore*, who shall take into his custody all the money and other property, and all the books and papers belonging to the said office, and discharge the duties thereof until the election of a Treasurer by the Council.

ARTICLE X.

Each Annual Council shall elect by ballot a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese, and who shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed.

ARTICLE XI.

Every Parish within this Diocese shall be entitled to the entire benefit of this Constitution as soon as it shall have signified its ratification thereof, either in writing or by sending a lay delegate to the Council; and such Parish shall thereafter be benefited and bound equally with the other Parishes in this Diocese by every rule and Canon which shall be framed by any Council acting under this Constitution for the government of this church in ecclesiastical concerns.

ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution shall be unalterable, except in the following manner: A proposition for any change shall be introduced in writing and considered in Council, and if approved of, the same shall be transmitted to the several vestries of the Parishes which shall have ratified this Constitution; and if again approved of in the next ensuing Council by a majority, the change shall then take place, and the Constitution so altered shall be valid and obligatory.

CANONS

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

OF THE

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

Adopted 1849, and amended in 1850, 1860, 1867, 1872, 1882, 1887, 1890, 1894 and 1900.

CANON I.

Of the trial of a Clergyman, not being a Bishop.

Section 1. The trial of a clergyman, not being a Bishop, shall be on a presentment in writing, specifying with reasonable clearness and certainty as to time, place and circumstance, the crime or misdemeanor, by violation of the canons or otherwise, charged; the said presentment to be made to the Bishop, either by the Council, or by the vestry of the Parish to which the accused belongs, or by any three presbyters of the Diocese, entitled to seats in the Council; the said vestry, or presbyters, pledging themselves to act as a committee of prosecution. If, however, the presentment be made by the Council, then the Council shall appoint the committee of prosecution and furnish them with such instructions as may be deemed necessary.

SEC. 2. Such presentment being made to the Bishop, and being accompanied by a further statement in writing of the names of the witnesses, and of the purport of their evidence, and by such documentary evidence as may be in their possession, the Bishop shall immediately proceed to the trial, according to the following provisions: He shall nominate from among the clergy entitled to seats in the

Council, other than the members of the Standing Committee, eight presbyters, and cause a list of their names and a copy of the presentment to be furnished to the accused, or left at his place of residence. Of the eight presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the accused may choose five, or in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days so to do, the Bishop shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen shall constitute a court for the trial of the accused. The Bishop shall also, at the same time, cause at least thirty days' notice of the time and place of the trial to be given, both to the accused and to the parties presenting him, and also to the presbyters nominated as before provided.

SEC. 3. The court shall appoint a President and Secretary—the first always from their own body.

SEC. 4. If the accused appear before proceeding to trial, he shall be called on by the court to say whether he is guilty of the offence, or offences, charged against him, and on his neglect or refusal to answer, the plea of *not guilty* shall be entered for him, and the trial shall proceed: *Provided*, that for sufficient cause the court may adjourn, from time to time, and place to place: *And provided also*, that the accused shall, at all times during the trial, have liberty to be present, to produce his testimony, and to make his defense.

SEC. 5. On the request of the accused, or the committee of prosecution, witnesses may be summoned—if before the meeting of the court—by the Bishop; if during the session of the court then by its President. All testimony shall be given under oath or affirmation, administered by some officer authorized by law. In case the testimony of any witness—whose attendance on the trial cannot be obtained—is desired, it shall be lawful for either party, at any time after notice of the presentment is served on the accused, to apply to the court, if in session, or if not, to the Bishop, who shall thereupon appoint a commissioner to take the deposition of such witness; and such party so desiring to take the deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying such notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness; whereupon, it shall be lawful for the other party, within six days after such notice, to propound cross-interrogatories, and such interrogatories and crossinterrogatories, if any be propounded, shall be sent to the commissioner, who shall thereupon proceed to take the testimony of such

witness, and transmit it under seal to the court. But no deposition shall be read at the trial unless the court have reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, or unless both parties shall consent that it may be read.

SEC. 6. The court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall, within ten days after closing the same, declare in a written judgment signed by them, or a majority of them, that the accused is guilty, or not guilty, of the charge or charges, or any of them, laid in the presentment, in the order therein set forth, and also, if guilty, what punishment shall be awarded, which judgment, with all the evidence received, shall be delivered forthwith to the Bishop; whereupon, unless the Bishop see cause to mitigate or remit the punishment, or to grant a new trial, he shall pronounce sentence according to the judgment of the court, and such sentence shall be final. In case a new trial is granted, a new court shall be constituted according to the provisions of this Canon.

SEC. 7. If the accused shall neglect or refuse to appear before the court, when summoned according to section second of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the court shall declare him to be in contumacy, and report the same to the Bishop, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass 'against him for contumacy; but the said sentence shall be reversed by the Bishop, if—within three calendar months—the accused shall tender himself ready, and accordingly appear to take his trial on the presentment; but if he shall not so tender himself before the expiration of the said three months, the sentence of degradation from the ministry for contumacy shall forthwith be pronounced by the Bishop, who shall cause such sentence to be publicly read to the congregations of the Diocese by the respective ministers thereof.

SEC. 8. If at any time the accused shall confess himself guilty of the matters charged in the presentment, or any of them, the court shall proceed to award the punishment, and certify the same, as hereinbefore provided, to the Bishop, who shall, unless he see cause to remit or mitigate the punishment, pronounce the sentence according to the Canons.

SEC. 9. All notices and papers contemplated by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Bishop, or by the court when the same is in session, and the certificate of any such summoner shall be evidence of the due service of a notice or paper. The delivery of a written notice or paper to a party, or the leaving it at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

SEC. 10. The accused party may have the privilege of appearing by counsel, in number not more than two, and, in case of the exercise of such privilege, but not otherwise, those presenting shall have the like privilege. If the party accused desire it, the trial shall be in public, and said party shall be entitled to a copy of the evidence if he require it.

SEC. 11. In case of a presentment occuring during a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, such presentment shall be made to the Standing Committee, who shall thereon take such steps as are by this Canon enjoined on the Bishop: *Provided*, that on receiving the proceedings and judgments of the court, they shall transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese, who shall be requested, and is hereby authorized to act thereon, as if he were the Bishop of the Diocese, and, if he shall concur in opinion with the court, he shall proceed to pronounce sentence accordingly.

SEC. 12. The expenses of such trial, as also those of the investigating committee, preliminary to a presentment, shall be defrayed by the Treasurer out of the contingent fund by order of the Council.

CANON II.

Of the Proceedings in the Trial of a Layman, after Expulsion by the Minister from the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric, in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and desiring that he may be restored to the Communion, and then the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the minister, shall nominate two of the clergy and two of the laity, of whom the minister repelling shall select one of the clergymen, and the communicant one of the laymen; and it shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case,

under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop, who, thereupon, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence, shall proceed to adjudge the case. If further evidence be required, it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. And when the evidence is thus procured, the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment whenever made to the minister repelling, and to the communicant repelled, which judgment shall be final and conclusive: *Provided*, that in case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall nevertheless be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

CANON III.

Of the Transfer of Communicants from one Parish or Church to Another.

Every communicant removing from one Parish or church to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the minister a certificate of regular standing from the minister, or, if there be no minister, from the vestry of the Parish or church from which the communicant desires to be transferred.

CANON IV.

Ministers to be Careful in Admitting to Holy Communion.

No minister shall enroll any persons as communicants in the Parish or congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, or unless he shall be satisfied that they have been regular communicants in some other Parish or congregation; nor shall he enroll any one who is known to deny the doctrines of the gospel as generally set forth in the authorized standards of the Church; nor shall he report to the Diocesan Council, as a communicant, any one who has not (without satisfactory reason) communed within the year immediately preceding the annual meeting of the Council.

CANON V.

Communicants to have Family Worship.

It shall be the duty of every communicant in this Church, who is at the head of a family, to live in the daily exercise of family worship.

CANON VI.

The members of this Church to Instruct their Families in the Principles of Religion.

The members of this Church shall instruct their families, as far as they are able, in the principles of the Christian religion. Parents and sponsors shall be careful to teach their children the solemnity and obligation of their baptismal vow, to cause them to attend the catechetical and other instructions of their minister; and, as soon as they are sufficiently instructed and impressed with the importance and sacredness of their baptismal promise, shall take care that they come to the Bishop to be confirmed by him.

CANON VII.

Of the Due Celebration of Sunday.

All persons within this Church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, in hearing the word of God read and taught, in private and public prayer, and in acts of charity, using all sober and godly conversation.

CANON VIII.

Election and Duties of Vestries and Wardens, &c.

SEC. I. All persons who have attained the age of twenty-one years, have resided in the Parish in which they offer to vote for six months next preceding the election, and are communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church, or regular contributors to the charges of the Parish, shall be entitled to vote at the the election of vestrymen for such Parish.

SEC. 2. The election of vestrymen shall be held on Easter Monday; or, in case no election be held on that day, on such other day as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The election shall be held at the Parish church, or some place of worship, if there be one; if not, at such other place within the Parish as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter provided. The voting shall be by ballot. The number of persons to be voted for by each elector shall not be less than three nor more than twelve, and shall be fixed—where the election is the first in a new Parish—by the Council on its admission into the Diocese, or, before the election

commences, by a majority of the qualified electors who shall have assembled to vote at such election; or, in case the election be in an organized Parish, the number to be voted for shall be the same that constituted the former vestry, unless such number be changed in like manner by a majority of the qualified electors so assembled. Only male persons shall be eligible to the office of vestryman; in other respects the qualifications of vestrymen shall be the same as those prescribed for voters. The persons chosen by a majority of the votes cast at such election, together with the minister in charge of the Parish, if there be one, shall constitute the vestry of the Parish, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected, and qualify as hereinafter prescribed.

SEC. 3. In case there be in a Parish congregations not exceeding four in number, apart from each other, but not constituting independent cures, a separate election shall be held for each congregation at its usual place of worship, or, if there be none, at such other place as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The qualified electors of such congregation shall, in the manner prescribed by this Canon, elect three persons, who shall be vestrymen of the Parish. The vestrymen chosen for such congregation shall, together with the minister in charge thereof, be the constituted authorities of such congregation, and shall manage and control the affairs of the same, so far as they pertain alone to the congregation, and not to the Parish at large. The vestrymen chosen by such congregations in the same Parish shall, together with the minister in charge thereof, be the constituted authorities of the Parish, as its vestry, and shall manage and control the affairs of the Parish, either in general meeting, a majority of the whole number of vestrymen in the Parish being present, or in case such meeting be impracticable, or in the opinion of the minister in charge too inconvenient, any matter concurred in by a majority of the vestrymen of the respective congregations, and duly recorded by the register of the Parish, shall be deemed to be the act of the vestry of the Parish. But in no event shall the aggregate number of such vestrymen exceed twelve.

SEC. 4. If there be no Parish church or place of regular worship for the Parish or congregation, as the case may be, the minister in charge of the same, or other person or persons named in the next succeeding section, shall have authority to appoint the place within the Parish at which such election shall be held. If such place of voting be so fixed before Easter Monday, the same notice of the time

and place of election shall be required as in the next succeeding election.

SEC. 5. If no such election be held on Easter Monday, the same may be held on any day thereafter (except Sunday), to be fixed by the minister in charge, or, if there be none, by one of the wardens, or by two vestrymen, or, if there be none, by three members of the congregation. Of the time and place of such special election, due notice shall be given during the services held at the Parish church or place of worship on the two Sundays next preceding such special election; or in case no such services be held by posting copies of such notice for two weeks next preceding such special election at the front door of the Parish church or place of worship; or, in case there be none, at two or more public places in the Parish.

SEC. 6. The vestry shall appoint three persons, of whom not more than two members shall be of their own body, to act as judges to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges be appointed, the members of the vestry present shall act as judges of election; and in case none of the vestry be present, or if present, fail to act, the electors may choose three of their number to act as such judges. The judges of election shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and of those elected as vestrymen.

SEC. 7. As soon as may be after such election, the persons chosen to act as vestrymen shall, at such time and place as the minister shall appoint, or as shall otherwise be designated, assemble and proceed to organize the vestry. The register and treasurer of the former vestry shall attend. The proceedings shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's prayer by the minister in charge, or in his absence by one of the wardens, or any other member who may be requested to preside over the meeting.

SEC. 9. The vestry shall proceed to elect two wardens, a register and a treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. The wardens must be communicants and members of the vestry.

SEC. 10. Vacancies occuring in the vestry shall be filled by a vote of the remaining members, and a majority of those who have qualified shall constitute a quorum. The rector shall preside at all meetings when present, and be entitled to give the casting vote in case of a tie, when he is not personally interested. All vestry meetings shall be subject to his call, and in case he fails, at the request of two vestrymen, to call a meeting, such vestrymen, if they deem it necessary, may themselves call a meeting.

Duties.

SEC. I. It shall be the duty of the vestry to determine upon and elect a Rector; to co-operate with him in gathering souls into the fold of Christ; to see that he be properly supported; that his salary be paid with regularity and punctuality; to make and execute all contracts for the erection, furnishing and preserving the church edifice and other church property; to regulate the use of the Parish grave-yard; to employ an organist, and otherwise provide for sacred music, subject to the control of the Rector, and generally as the constituted agent of the Parish or congregation to transact all its temporal business.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the wardens to keep watch over the church property; to see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship; to see that the sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties; to collect the offerings of the people; to take charge of the font and communion plate; to provide out of the Parish funds, under the direction of the vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion; to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the register of the vestry to take charge of all Parish records; to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the vestry, and when there shall be no Rector, to enter upon the Church register usually kept by the rector, all baptisms, specifying the Christian and surnames of the parents, with the name and

date of birth and baptism of the person baptized; also all marriages, deaths and funerals, with dates and names of parties, and in like manner all confirmations administered in, and communicants lost or gained by the Parish, and furnish a report of the same to the annual Councils of the Diocese.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all moneys, except communion alms and other special offerings, and to disburse the same under the direction of the vestry, and to make such reports to the Council as are required by its orders. The term "Parish," wherever it occurs in this Canon, shall be interpreted also to mean church or congregation, wherever such a church or congregation is entitled to a separate vestry, unless where the context requires a more restricted construction.

CANON IX.

Concerning Exceptions to the Foregoing Canon.

Whereas the preceding Canon, which directs the manner of choosing vestrymen in the several Parishes, is not applicable to the case of churches built and supported by voluntary associations of individuals; and it is proper that those who hold the sole property of a particular church—as in the case of the Monumental Church, Richmond, and in all similar cases—should provide for its care and management, the choice of vestrymen shall be made by the pew-holders of the respective churches, conforming, as to the time of appointment and manner of qualifying the vestrymen, to the regulations prescribed by the eighth Canon.

CANON X.

Of the Division of Parishes.

SEC. I. Whenever the members of the church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, shall desire to separate from the Parish of which they form a part, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after public notice given in the church or place of public worship, or posted upon the door of the same, and appoint a committee to take such measures as may be necessary.

SEC. 2. The committee thus apointed shall give to the Bishop and to the majority of the vestry (if there be one) of the Parish from

which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply for such purpose, which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Bishop and said vestry at least three months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.

SEC. 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council, and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desireable; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, proceed to divide said Parish, and to constitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese.

SEC. 4. As soon after the adjournment of the Council as may be practicable, the committee aforesaid shall give at least two weeks' notice to the members of the church, residing in the new Parish, to assemble for the election of a vestry, which elections shall be conducted according to the directions contained in Canon VIII.

SEC. 5. The committee aforesaid, or a majority of those who may attend, shall judge of the qualification of voters, and of the qualification of persons proposed to be elected, and of the election of vestrymen; and those persons whom said committee shall declare to be duly elected, shall be the vestry of said Parish until the election and qualification of the succeeding vestry.

CANON XI.

Of the Formation of New Congregations.

When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a minister, shall choose to separate from the Parish or congregation of which they have hitherto been a part, they may proceed according to the directions given in Canon X, except that in this case the direction as to a line or lines of division is inapplicable. The Council may, on such petition, constitute the applicants a separate congregation, and authorize, by special enactment, such peculiar provisions as to the right of suffrage, the employment of a minister or ministers, and the manner of holding and managing the property of such congregation, as they may propose, and the Council deem expedient: *Provided*, That the time of electing and the manner of qualifying vestrymen shall always be conformed to the regulation prescribed in Canon VIII.

CANON XII.

Of Mission Churches.

SEC. I. When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation desire a separate and independent organization, but cannot comply with the requirements of the Canon in regard to the formation of new congregations, they may, until they are so able, proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

They must obtain the approval of the vestry of the Parish to which they belonged, and if there be two or more vestries in the Parish they must have the consent of a majority of the same.

They must have the approval of the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese.

They may have their own vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of other vestries, except that they shall have no representation in the Council of the Diocese, and shall not call a minister without the approval of the ecclesiastical authority.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the vestry of a church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocese, and a list of mission Churches so organized shall be published annually in the JOURNAL.

CANON XIII.

Of Colored Mission Churches.

SEC. 1. The colored people of Virginia who are, or may hereafter be, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary jurisdiction of the Diocese.

SEC. 2. It shall be lawful to organize Mission Churches or congregations composed exclusively of colored persons within the limits of any already existing Parish, subject to the same conditions and regulations as are other Mission Churches (see Canon XII), and specially those of this Canon, except that consent of the Vestry or Vestries need not be obtained.

SEC. 3. There may be appointed, by the Bishop, one or more Presbyters who shall have general supervision of such colored churches and congregations as the Bishop may designate, and perform such duties as he may prescribe. SEC. 4. A Convocation shall be held annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the Convocation itself. The colored ministers of the Diocese, in good standing, shall be members of the Convocation, and it shall be the duty of every such minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every Colored Mission Church or congregation shall elect one male lay delegate annually, who, upon the presentation of a certificate signed by the minister (or warden, if there be no minister), and Register of the Vestry, stating that the delegate is not less than twenty-one years of age, and is a communicant of the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation.

The Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be one), and the Presbyters mentioned in Section 3, shall be *ex-officio* members of the Convocation. The Bishop (or in his absence the Bishop Coadjutor) shall be President of the Convocation.

SEC. 5. The Convocation shall have power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Council of the Diocese.

SEC. 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two clergymen and two laymen to represent them in the Council of the Diocese.

SEC. 7. Colored congregations, constituted as above provided, may acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by transfer, under the laws of the State of Virginia; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by like transfer.

CANON XIV.

Of the Evidence of the Appointment of Lay Delegates to the Council.

The appointment of lay delegates to the Council of this Diocese shall be certified by the rector, register, or warden of the proper Parish or Church, in duplicate, and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

Church of the Diocese of Virginia, to be holden in the city of ______, on the ____ day of ______, in the year of our Lord ______, Rector, _______, Register or Warden.

[Return original to Secretary of Council and give duplicate to delegate attending.]

The Secretary shall make out a roll and call the names of all certified to him as duly and canonically elected. The President of the Council shall then appoint a committee, to be composed of one clerical and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report the names of those entitled to seats to the Secretary, and of those claiming but not entitled to seats, to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for examination and report.

CANON XV.

Of the Standing Committee.

SEC. I. Any vacancy occurring by death, or otherwise, in the Standing Committee, shall be supplied by the concurrent vote of the remaining clerical members and lay members of the Committee.

SEC. 2. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the powers and duties to be performed by the Bishop, as regards discipline, except the pronouncing sentence of suspension, deposition, or degradation from the ministry, shall belong to, and be performed by, the Standing Committee.

SEC. 3. The record of all the proceedings, on a presentment of a clergyman or layman, shall be preserved by the Standing Committee, and for that purpose shall, after a final decision, be delivered to their Secretary.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee, before every stated meeting of the General Convention, to draft, with the advice and approbation of the Bishop, a report of the state of the Church in this Diocese, to be presented to the General Convention.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee, at every

meeting of the Council, to submit, in addition to the report of their proceedings, the documents also which have been laid before them during the year.

CANON XVI.

A List to be Made of Ministers in this Diocese.

SEC. I. Within one week before every stated meeting of the Council of this Diocese, the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, the Standing Committee, shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church, canonically resident in this Diocese, annexing the names of their respective cures, or of their stations as missionaries, or of the colleges, academies, or other seminaries of learning in which they are engaged, or in regard to those who have no cure, or are not engaged in missions or institutions of learning, as above, their places of residence only. And such list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of meeting, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom, and appended to the journal, and shall be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

SEC. 2. The list of the clergy of this Diocese, so prepared by the Bishop or Standing Committee, and annexed according to the changes which may occur, whether by death, ordination, discipline, or canonical removals from or admission into this Diocese, shall be evidence of a clergyman's having a cure or mission, or engagement in a seminary of learning, and no clergyman, while suspended from the ministry, shall have a place on said list.

SEC. 3. The right of any clergyman to a seat in the Council, shall, if disputed, be determined according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons by the Council itself, whether his name be inserted in the list aforesaid or omitted.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the clergy to attend regularly at the meeting of every Council. At the opening of the Council their names shall be called over and absentees noted, and at the ensuing stated Council they shall be required to give excuses for their absence.

CANON XVII.

Respecting the Property of the Church.

The vestries respectively shall hold all glebes, lands, parsonage, houses, churches, books, plate or other property now belonging or

hereafter accruing to the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, as trustees for the benefit of the Parish or Church. for whose use the same were or shall hereafter be purchased or otherwise obtained; and may improve, demise, or otherwise dispose of the lands or houses allowed for the minister's habitation or use with the minister's consent; and if there be no minister, with the consent of the Bishop; or in case there be no minister, and the Episcopal Office be vacant, then not without the consent of the Standing Committee. The vestry may also use, improve, or dispose of all personal property, and the produce, rents and profits of lands and houses (not appropriated for the occupancy and use of the minister) belonging to the church, in repairing the church and parsonage house for the benefit of the respective Parishes or churches, and may make such rules and orders for managing the affairs and temporal concerns of their respective churches and Parishes as they shall think most conducive to their interest and prosperty. They shall have the sole power of directing the payment of money belonging to the respective churches and Parishes, and appoint a clerk, treasurer and collector when necessary; all which proceedings shall be entered in a well-bound book to be kept for that purpose. But when there are trustees under the act of the Legislature, passed February 3d. 1842, authorized to hold real property, such real property shall not be subject to the provisions of this Canon.

CANON XVIII.

Of Church Property for which there are no Trustees.

The Council shall annually elect a Standing Committee, to consist of two clergymen and three laymen, whose duty it shall be to claim for and on behalf the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, all property, real and personal, belonging to said church or any Parish or congregation thereof, whether said Parish or congregation has been disbanded or not, as to which there are no duly constituted trustees in whom is vested the legal title thereto.

The said Committee shall use all due diligence, by proper legal steps or otherwise, to secure such property to the use and benefit of the said Church, or of the proper Parish or Congregation thereof, and to that end the members of said Committee, or the persons designated by them, are hereby nominated without further action of the Council, to the respective courts to which said committee may

apply, as the trustees for any such property so to be claimed by said Committee.

When any such property shall be recovered by said Committee, it shall be held by the trustees appointed for the use and benefit of this Church, or the Parish or Congregation properly entitled thereto.

CANON XIX.

Offenders to be Admonished or Repelled from the Lord's Table.

Any member of the Church, being a communicant thereof, conducting himself or herself in a manner unworthy of a Christian, ought to be admonished or repelled from the Lord's Table by the minister of the Parish or Church, according to the Rubric. Gaming, attendance on horse-racing and theatrical amusements, witnessing immodest and licentious exibitions or shows, attending public balls, habitual neglect of public worship, a neglect of the Holy Communion, or a denial of the doctrines of the Gospel, as generally set forth in the authorized standards of the Church, are practices from which all Christians should abstain. This enumeration, however, shall not be construed to include all the subjects of discipline or admonition in the Church. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the minister, or may be requested by the accused, the Church wardens, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the minister in ascertaining the facts of the case: Provided, that if such warden or wardens shall fail or refuse to act within ten days, the minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

CANON XX.

Proceedings for the Expenses of the Diocese.

The Vestries of the several Parishes or churches shall, quarterly, or at every annual Council, as each Vestry shall determine for itself, pay to the Treasurer such sums as may be apportioned to them, respectively, for the purpose of defraying such expenses as may be authorized by the Council.

CANON XXI.

Concerning Altering or Adding to the Canons of the Church.

No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall hereafter be considered by the Council, unless at least one day's previous notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a committee of at least two presbyters and two laymen. Nor shall such alteration or addition be adopted during the same Council if two-thirds of the members shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration until the next Annual Council.

CANON XXII.

All the former Canons of this Diocese, not included in these Canons, are hereby repealed.

REVISED CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

As adopted in 1836, and amended in 1840, 1850, 1860, 1864, 1867, 1872, 1881, 1890, 1900, and 1904.

ARTICLE I.

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia on the third Wednesday in May every year, except when the Ascension Day shall fall upon the day following, in which case the Council shall be on the fourth Wednesday in May; but the Council which meets in the year previous to the meeting of the General Convention may have power to appoint the time and place of meeting for the next annual session, and in the event of the existence of an epidemic disease, or any other good cause, rendering it necessary or expedient to alter the place fixed on for any meeting of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may change the place, or the time, or both.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The Council shall be composed of the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be one) and of the Ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who now are or may hereafter be canonically settled in Parishes or churches within the Diocese; Professors of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, Missionaries within this Diocese and under its ecclesiastical authority, being Clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese: *Provided*, that any such Ministers who may have been so canonically settled up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members *ex-officio: Provided further*, that only such Colored Ministers shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article: *Provided further*,

that no Minister under ecclesiastical censure or process shall be entitled to a seat in the Council, and no Minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding.

SEC. 2. The Council shall also be composed of lay members, consisting of one delegate for each Parish or church entitled to representation, chosen by the vestry thereof, except as hereinafter provided. Every such Parish or church having more than one officiating Minister canonically settled, shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has Ministers, and in every case the delegate or delegates shall be communicants in the Church: *Provided*, that only such colored delegates shall be members as are specified in Section 3 of this Article.

SEC 3. The Council shall also be composed of the Colored Ministers having a seat and voice in the Council on the 17th day of May, 1889, and of two clerical and two lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is now or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

ARTICLE III.

Twenty members of the clerical and twenty of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn.

ARTICLE IV.

In all matters that shall come before Council, the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body, and the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure; but when five members require it there shall be a vote by orders, and a majority of each order shall be necessary to a decision.

ARTICLE V.

The election of a Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor in the Diocese shall be made in Council in the following manner: The vote shall be by ballot and by orders, a concurrent majority of the votes cast by each order, being necessary to a choice.

ARTICLE VI.

The Bishop shall be President of the Council, in which character it shall be his duty to give to the Council annually a general view

of the state of the Church, to call special councils at whatever time and place he shall think necessary, or when required by the Standing Committee; to preserve order during the time of session; to put the question, collect the votes, and declare the decision; and he may deliver his sentiments on any subject after it has been discussed before a vote thereon. The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside in the Council in the absence of the Bishop.

ARTICLE VII.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, the Council, immediately upon their assembling, shall choose by joint ballot a President from among the order of Priests, who shall remain in office until the next annual Council, or until the next election of a President. He shall perform all duties, and possess all the privileges above specified; but he shall not call special meetings of the Council unless applied to for that purpose by a majority of the Standing Committee; and if the Bishop of the Diocese be not present at any meeting of the Council, they shall elect, in the manner aforesaid, a President *pro tempore*.

ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office during good behavior. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and to faithfully deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Council which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to notify through the channel of the public papers, as he may think proper, the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journal of every succeeding Council a list of the clergy, with all alterations therein produced in the preceding year by ordinations, deaths, removals, suspensions and degradations.

ARTICLE IX.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office for one year, or until his successor shall be appointed. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose

of the same as may be ordered by the Council. He shall annually report to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same.

In case of a vacancy in the office by the death or resignation of the Treasurer, or in case of his misconduct, incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, during the recess of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may fill the said vacancy, or remove the said Treasurer and appoint a Treasurer *pro tempore*, who shall take into his custody all the money and other property, and all the books and papers belonging to the said office, and discharge the duties thereof until the election of a Treasurer by the Council.

ARTICLE X.

Each annual Council shall elect by ballot a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese, and who shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed.

ARTICLE XI.

Every Parish within this Diocese shall be entitled to the entire benefit of this Constitution as soon as it shall have signified its ratification thereof, either in writing or by sending a lay delegate to the Council, and such Parish shall thereafter be benefitted and bound equally with the other Parishes in this Diocese by every rule and Canon which shall be framed by any Council acting under this Constitution for the government of this Church in ecclesiastical concerns.

ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution shall be unalterable, except in the following manner: A proposition for any change shall be introduced in writing and considered in Council, and if approved of, the same shall be transmitted to the several vestries of the Parishes which shall have ratified this Constitution; and if again approved of in the next ensuing Council by a majority, the change shall then take place, and the Constitution so altered shall be valid and obligatory.

CANONS

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

OF THE

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

Adopted 1849, and amended in 1850, 1860, 1867, 1872, 1882, 1887, 1890, 1894, 1900, and 1904.

CANON I.

Of the trial of a Clergyman, not being a Bishop.

Section r. The trial of a clergyman, not being a Bishop, shall be on a presentment in writing, specifying with reasonable clearness and certainty as to time, place, and circumstance, the crime or misdemeanor, by violation of the canons or otherwise, charged; the said presentment to be made to the Bishop, either by the Council, or by the vestry of the Parish to which the accused belongs, or by any three presbyters of the Diocese, entitled to seats in the Council, the said vestry, or presbyters, pledging themselves to act as a committee of prosecution. If, however the presentment be made by the Council, then the Council shall appoint the committee of prosecution and furnish them with such instructions as may be deemed necessary.

SEC. 2. Such presentment being made to the Bishop, and being accompanied by a further statement in writing of the names of the witnesses, and of the purport of their evidence, and by such documentary evidence as may be in their possession, the Bishop shall immediately proceed to the trial, according to the following provisions: He shall nominate from among the clergy entitled to seats

in the Council, other than the members of the Standing Committee, eight presbyters, and cause a list of their names and a copy of the presentment to be furnished to the accused, or left at his place of residence. Of the eight presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the accused may choose five, or in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days so to do, the Bishop shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen shall constitute a court for the trial of the accused. The Bishop shall also, at the same time cause at least thirty days' notice of the time and place of the trial to be given, both to the accused and to the parties presenting him, and also to the presbyters nominated as before provided.

SEC. 3. The Court shall appoint a President and Secretary—the first always from their own body.

SEC. 4. If the accused appear before proceeding to trial, he shall be called on by the court to say whether he is guilty of the offence, or offences, charged against him, and on his neglect or refusal to answer, the plea of not guilty shall be entered for him, and the trial shall proceed: Provided, that for sufficient cause the court may adjourn, from time to time, and place to place: And provided also, that the accused shall, at all times during the trial, have liberty to be present, to produce his testimony, and to make his defense.

SEC. 5. On the request of the accused, or the committee of prosecution, witnesses may be summoned—if before the meeting of the court—by the Bishop; if during the session of the court then by its President. All testimony shall be given under oath or affirmation; administered by some officer authorized by law. In case the testimony of any witness-whose attendance on the trial cannot be obtained—is desired, it shall be lawful for either party, at any time after notice of the presentment is served on the accused, to apply to the court, if in session, or if not, to the Bishop, who shall thereupon appoint a commissioner to take the deposition of such witness; and such party so desiring to take the deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying such notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness; whereupon, it shall be lawful for the other party, within six days after such notice, to propound cross-interrogatories, and such interrogatories and cross-interrogatories, if any be propounded, shall be sent to the commissioner, who shall thereupon proceed to take the testimony

of such witness, and transmit it under seal to the court. But no deposition shall be read at the trial unless the court have reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, or unless both parties shall consent that it may be read.

SEC. 6. The court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall, within ten days after closing the same, declare in a written judgment signed by them, or a majority of them, that the accused is guilty, or not guilty, of the charge or charges, or any of them, laid in the presentment, in the order therein set forth, and also, if guilty, what punishment shall be awarded, which judgment, with all the evidence received, shall be delivered forthwith to the Bishop; whereupon, unless the Bishop see cause to mitigate or remit the punishment, or to grant a new trial, he shall pronounce sentence according to the judgment of the court, and such sentence shall be final. In case a new trial is granted, a new court shall be constituted according to the provisions of this Canon.

SEC. 7. If the accused shall neglect or refuse to appear before the court, when summoned according to section second of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the court shall declare him to be in contumacy, and report the same to the Bishop, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass against him for contumacy; but the said sentence shall be reversed by the Bishop, if—within three calendar months—the accused shall tender himself ready, and accordingly appear to take his trial on the presentment; but if he shall not so tender himself before the expiration of the said three months, the sentence of degradation from the ministry for contumacy shall forthwith be pronounced by the Bishop, who shall cause such sentence to be publicly read to the congregations of the Diocese by the respective ministers thereof.

SEC. 8. If at any time the accused shall confess himself guilty of the matters charged in the presentment, or any of them, the court shall proceed to award the punishment, and certify the same, as hereinbefore provided, to the Bishop, who shall, unless he see cause to remit or mitigate the punishment, pronounce the sentence according to the Canons.

SEC. 9. All notices and papers contemplated by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Bishop, or by the court when the same is in session, and the certificate of any such summoner shall be evidence of the due service of a notice

or paper. The delivery of a written notice or paper to a party, or the leaving it at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

SEC. 10. The accused party may have the privilege of appearing by counsel, in number not more than two, and, in case of the exercise of such privilege, but not otherwise, those presenting shall have the like privilege. If the party accused desire it, the trial shall be in public, and said party shall be entitled to a copy of the evidence if he require it.

SEC. 11. In case of a presentment occurring during a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, such presentment shall be made to the Standing Committee, who shall thereon take such steps as are by this Canon enjoined on the Bishop: *Provided*, that on receiving the proceedings and judgments of the court, they shall transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese, who shall be requested, and is hereby authorized to act thereon, as if he were the Bishop of the Diocese, and, if he shall concur in opinion with the court, he shall proceed to pronounce sentence accordingly.

SEC. 12. The expenses of such trial, as also those of the investigating committee, preliminary to a presentment, shall be defrayed by the Treasurer out of the contingent fund by order of the Council.

CANON II.

Of the Proceedings in the Trial of a Layman, after Expulsion by the Minister from the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric, in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and desiring that he may be restored to the Communion, and then the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the minister, shall nominate two of the clergy and two of the laity, of whom the minister repelling shall select one of the clergymen, and the communicant one of the laymen; and it shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case, under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by

either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop, who, thereupon, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence, shall proceed to adjudge the case. If further evidence be required, it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. And when the evidence is thus procured, the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment whenever made to the minister repelling, and to the communicant repelled, which judgment shall be final and conclusive: *Provided*, that in case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall nevertheless be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

CANON III.

Of the Transfer of Communicants from one Parish or Church to Another.

Every communicant removing from one Parish or church to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the minister a certificate of regular standing from the minister, or, if there be no minister, from the vestry of the Parish or church from which the communicant desires to be transferred.

CANON IV.

Ministers to be careful in Admitting to Holy Communion.

No minister shall enroll any persons as communicants in the Parish or congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, or unless he shall be satisfied that they have been regular communicants in some other Parish or congregation; nor shall he enroll any one who is known to deny the doctrines of the gospel as generally set forth in the authorized standards of the Church; nor shall he report to the Diocesan Council, as a communicant, any one who has not (without satisfactory reason) communed within the year immediately preceding the annual meeting of the Council.

CANON V.

Communicants to have Family Worship.

It shall be the duty of every communicant in this Church, who is at the head of a family, to live in the daily exercise of family worship.

CANON VI.

The Members of this Church to Instruct their Families in the Principles of Religion.

The members of this Church shall instruct their families, as far as they are able, in the principles of the Christian religion. Parents and sponsors shall be careful to teach their children the solemnity and obligation of their baptismal vow, to cause them to attend the catechetical and other instructions of their minister; and, as soon as they are sufficiently instructed and impressed with the importance and sacredness of their baptismal promise, shall take care that they come to the Bishop to be confirmed by him.

CANON VII.

Of the Due Celebration of Sunday.

All persons within this Church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, in hearing the word of God read and taught, in private and public prayer, and in acts of charity, using all sober and godly conversation.

CANON VIII.

Election and Duties of Vestries and Wardens, &c.

SEC. I. All persons who have attained the age of twenty-one years and have resided in the parish in which they offer to vote for six months next preceding the election, and are communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and are registered as communicants of the particular church in which they offer to vote, or regular contributors to the charges of the parish, shall be entitled to vote at the election of vestrymen for such parish.

SEC. 2. The election of vestrymen shall be held on Easter Monday; or, in case no election be held on that day, on such other day as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The election shall be held at the Parish church, or some place of worship, if there be one; if not, at such other place within the Parish as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter provided. The voting shall be by ballot. The number of persons to be voted for by each elector shall not be less than three nor more than twelve, and shall be fixed—where the election is the first in a new Parish—by the Council on its admission into the Diocese, or, before the

election commences, by a majority of the qualified electors who shall have assembled to vote at such election; or, in case the election be in an organized Parish, the number to be voted for shall be the same that constituted the former vestry, unless such number be changed in like manner by a majority of the qualified electors so assembled. Only male persons shall be eligible to the office of vestryman; in other respects the qualifications of vestrymen shall be the same as those prescribed for voters. The persons chosen by a majority of the votes cast at such election, together with the minister in charge of the Parish, if there be one, shall constitute the vestry of the Parish, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected, and qualify as hereinafter prescribed.

SEC. 3. In case there be in a Parish congregation not exceeding four in number, apart from each other, but not constituting independent cures, a separate election shall be held for each congregation at its usual place of worship, or, if there be none, at such other place as shall be designated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The qualified electors of such congregation shall, in the manner prescribed by this Canon, elect three persons, who shall be vestrymen of the Parish. The vestrymen chosen for such congregation shall, together with the minister in charge thereof, be the constituted authorities of such congregation, and shall manage and control the affairs of the same, so far as they pertain alone to the congregation, and not to the Parish at large. The vestrymen chosen by such congregations in the same Parish shall, together with the minister in charge thereof, be the constituted authorities of the Parish, as its vestry, and shall manage and control the affairs of the Parish, either in general meeting, a majority of the whole number of vestrymen in the Parish being present, or in case such meeting be impracticable, or in the opinion of the minister in charge too inconvenient, any matter concurred in by a majority of the vestrymen of the respective congregations, and duly recorded by the register of the Parish, shall be deemed to be the act of the vestry of the Parish. But in no event shall the aggregate number of such vestrymen exceed twelve.

SEC. 4. If there be no Parish church or place of regular worship for the Parish or congregation, as the case may be, the minister in charge of the same, or other person or persons named in the next succeeding section, shall have authority to appoint the place within the Parish at which such election shall be held. If such place of

voting be so fixed before Easter Monday, the same notice of the time and place of election shall be required as in the next succeeding election.

SEC. 5. If no such election be held on Easter Monday, the same may be held on any day thereafter (except Sunday), to be fixed by the minister in charge, or, if there be none, by one of the wardens, or by two vestrymen, or, if there be none, by three members of the congregation. Of the time and place of such special election, due notice shall be given during the services held at the Parish church or place of worship on the two Sundays next preceding such special election; or in case no such services be held by posting copies of such notice for two weeks next preceding such special election at the front door of the Parish church or place of worship; or, in case there be none, at two or more public places in the Parish.

SEC. 6. The vestry shall appoint three persons, of whom not more than two members shall be of their own body, to act as judges to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges be appointed, the members of the vestry present shall act as judges of election; and in case none of the vestry be present, or if present, fail to act, the electors may choose three of their number to act as such judges. The judges of election shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and of those elected as vestrymen.

SEC. 7. As soon as may be after such election, the persons chosen to act as vestrymen shall, at such time and place as the minister shall appoint, or as shall otherwise be designated, assemble and proceed to organize the vestry. The register and treasurer of the former vestry shall attend. The proceedings shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's prayer by the minister in charge, or in his absence by one of the wardens, or any other member who may be requested to preside over the meeting.

SEC. 9. The vestry shall proceed to elect two wardens, a register and a treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. The wardens must be communicants and members of the vestry.

SEC. 10. Vacancies occurring in the vestry shall be filled by a vote of the remaining members, and a majority of those who have qualified shall constitute a quorum. The rector shall preside at all meetings when present, and be entitled to give the casting vote in case of a tie, when he is not personally interested. All vestry meetings shall be subject to his call, and in case he fails, at the request of two vestrymen, to call a meeting, such vestrymen, if they deem it necessary, may themselves call a meeting.

Duties

SEC. I. It shall be the duty of the vestry to determine upon and elect a rector; to co-operate with him in gathering souls into the fold of Christ; to see that he be properly supported; that his salary be paid with regularity and punctuality; to make and execute all contracts for the erection, furnishing and preserving the church edifice and other church property; to regulate the use of the Parish graveyard; to employ an organist, and otherwise provide for sacred music, subject to the control of the Rector, and generally as the constituted agent of the Parish or congregation to transact all its temporal business.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the wardens to keep watch over the church property; to see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship; to see that the sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties; to collect the offerings of the people; to take charge of the font and communion plate; to provide out of the Parish funds, under the direction of the vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion; to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the register of the vestry to take charge of all Parish records; to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the vestry, and when there shall be no rector, to enter upon the Church register usually kept by the rector, all baptisms, specifying the Christian and surnames of the parents, with the name

and date of birth and baptism of the person baptized; also all marriages, deaths and funerals, with dates and names of parties, and in like manner all confirmations administered in, and communicants lost or gained by the Parish, and furnish a report of the same to the annual Councils of the Diocese.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all moneys, except communion alms and other special offerings, and to disburse the same under the direction of the vestry, and to make such reports to the Council as are required by its orders. The term "Parish," wherever it occurs in this Canon, shall be interpreted also to mean church or congregation, wherever such a church or congregation is entitled to a separate vestry, unless where the context requires a more restricted construction.

CANON IX.

Concerning Exceptions to the Foregoing Canon.

Whereas the preceding Canon, which directs the manner of choosing vestrymen in the several Parishes, is not applicable to the case of churches built and supported by voluntary associations of individuals; and it is proper that those who hold the sole property of a particular church—as in the case of the Monumental Church, Richmond, and in all similar cases—should provide for its care and management, the choice of vestrymen shall be made by the pewholders of the respective churches, conforming, as to the time o appointment and manner of qualifying the vestrymen, to the regulations prescribed by the eighth Canon.

CANON X.

Of the Division of Parishes.

SEC. I. Whenever the members of the church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, shall desire to separate from the Parish of which they form a part, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after public notice given in the church or place of public worship, or posted upon the door of the same, and appoint a committee to take such measures as may be necessary.

SEC. 2. The committee thus appointed shall give to the Bishop and to the majority of the vestry (if there be one) of the Parish

from which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply for such purpose, which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Bishop and said vestry at least three months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.

SEC. 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council, and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desirable; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, proceed to divide said Parish, and to constitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese.

SEC. 4. As soon after the adjournment of the Council as may be practicable, the committee aforesaid shall give at least two Weeks' notice to the members of the church, residing in the new Parish, to assemble for the election of a vestry, which elections shall be conducted according to the directions contained in Canon VIII.

SEC. 5. The committee aforesaid, or a majority of those who may attend, shall judge of the qualifications of voters, and of the qualification of persons proposed to be elected, and of the election of vestrymen; and those persons whom said committee shall declare to be duly elected, shall be the vestry of said Parish until the election and qualification of the succeeding vestry.

CANON XI.

Of the Formation of New Congregations.

When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a minister, shall choose to separate from the Parish or congregation of which they have hitherto been a part, they may proceed according to the directions given in Canon X, except that in this case the direction as to a line or lines of division is inapplicable. The Council may, on such petition, constitute the applicants a separate congregation, and authorize, by special enactment, such peculiar provisions as to the right of suffrage, the employment of a minister or ministers, and the manner of holding and managing the property of such congregation, as they may propose, and the Council deem expedient: *Provided*, That the time of electing and the manner of qualifying vestrymen shall always be conformed to the regulation prescribed in Canon VIII.

CANON XII.

Of Mission Churches.

SEC. I. When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or congregation desire a separate and independent organization, but cannot comply with the requirements of the Canon in regard to the formation of new congregations, they may, until they are so able, proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

They must obtain the approval of the vestry of the Parish to which they belonged, and if there be two or more vestries in the Parish they must have the consent of a majority of the same.

They must have the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

They may have their own vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of other vestries, except that they shall have no representation in the Council of the Diocese, and shall not call a minister without the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the vestry of a church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocese, and a list of mission Churches so organized shall be published annually in the JOURNAL.

CANON XIII.

Of Colored Mission Churches.

SEC. I. The colored people of Virginia who are, or may hereafter be, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary jurisdiction of the Diocese.

SEC. 2. It shall be lawful to organize Mission Churches or congregations composed exclusively of colored persons within the limits of any already existing Parish, subject to the same conditions and regulations as are other Mission Churches (see Canon XII), and specially those of this Canon, except that consent of the Vestry or Vestries need not be obtained.

SEC. 3. There may be appointed, by the Bishop, one or more Presbyters who shall have general supervision of such colored churches and congregations as the Bishop may designate, and perform such duties as he may prescribe.

SEC. 4. A Convocation shall be held annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the Convocation itself. The colored ministers of the Diocese, in good standing, shall be members of the Convocation, and it shall be the duty of every such minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every Colored Mission Church or congregation shall elect one male lay delegate annually, who, upon the presentation of a certificate signed by the minister (or warden, if there be no minister), and Register of the Vestry, stating that the delegate is not less than twenty-one years of age, and is a commucant of the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation.

The Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be one), and the Presbyters mentioned in Section 3, shall be *ex-officio* members of the Convocation. The Bishop (or in his absence the Bishop Coadjutor) shall be President of the Convocation.

SEC. 5. The Convocation shall have power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Council of the Diocese.

SEC. 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two clergymen and two laymen to represent them in the Council of the Diocese.

SEC. 7. Colored congregations, constituted as above provided, may acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by transfer, under the laws of the State of Virginia; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by like transfer.

CANON XIV.

Of the Evidence of the Appointment of Lay Delegates to the Council,

The appointment of lay delegates to the Council of this Diocese shall be certified by the rector, register, or warden of the proper Parish or church, in duplicate, and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

This is to certify, That at a meeting of the vestry of — in county, held on the — day of — , 19—, the following named communicants of said — , viz: Mr. — as lay delegate, and Mr. — as alternate, were duly appointed to represent the same in the Council of the Protestant Episcopal

CANONS.

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Church of the Diocese of Virginia, to be holden in the city of ______, on the _____ day of ______, in the year of our Lord ______, Rector, _______, Register or Warden.

[Return original to Secretary of Council and give duplicate to delegate attending.]

The Secretary shall make out a roll and call the names of all certified to him as duly and canonically elected. The President of the Council shall then appoint a committee, to be composed of one clerical and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report the names of those entitled to seats to the Secretary, and of those claiming but not entitled to seats, to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, the matter shall be referred to the Committee on Elections for examination and report.

CANON XV.

Of the Standing Committee.

SEC. 1. Any vacancy occurring by death, or otherwise, in the Standing Committee, shall be supplied by the concurrent vote of the remaining clerical members and lay members of the Committee.

SEC. 2. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the powers and duties to be performed by the Bishop, as regards discipline, except the pronouncing sentence of suspension, deposition, or degradation from the ministry, shall belong to, and be performed by, the Standing Committee.

SEC. 3. The record of all the proceedings, on a presentment of a clergyman or layman, shall be preserved by the Standing Committee, and for that purpose shall, after a final decision, be delivered to their Secretary.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee, before every stated meeting of the General Convention, to draft, with the advice and approbation of the Bishop, a report of the state of the Church in this Diocese, to be presented to the General Convention.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee, at every meeting of the Council, to submit, in addition to the report of their

proceedings, the documents also which have been laid before them during the year.

CANON XVI.

A List to be Made of Ministers in this Diocese.

SEC. I. Within one week before every stated meeting of the Council of this Diocese, the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, the Standing Committee, shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church, canonically resident in this Diocese, annexing the names of their respective cures, or of their stations as missionaries, or of the colleges, academies, or other seminaries of learning in which they are engaged, or in regard to those who have no cure, or are not engaged in missions or institutions of learning, as above, their places of residence only. And such list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of meeting, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom, and appended to the journal, and shall be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

SEC. 2. The list of the clergy of this Diocese, so prepared by the Bishop or Standing Committee, and annexed according to the changes which may occur, whether by death, ordination, discipline, or canonical removals from or admission into this Diocese, shall be evidence of a clergyman's having a cure or mission, or engagement in a seminary of learning, and no clegyman, while suspended from the ministry, shall have a place on said list.

SEC. 3. The right of any clergyman to a seat in the Council shall, if disputed, be determined according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons by the Council itself, whether his name be inserted in the list aforesaid or omitted.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the clergy to attend regularly at the meeting of every Council. At the opening of the Council their names shall be called over and absentees noted, and at the ensuing stated Council they shall be required to give excuses for their absence.

CANON XVII.

Respecting the Property of the Church.

The vestries respectively shall hold all glebes, lands, parsonage, houses, churches, books, plate or other property now belonging or hereafter accruing to the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Dio-

cese of Virginia, as trustees for the benefit of the Parish or Church, for whose use the same were or shall hereafter be purchased or otherwise obtained; and may improve, demise, or otherwise dispose of the lands or houses allowed for the minister's habitation or use with the minister's consent; and if there be no minister, with the consent of the Bishop; or in case there be no minister, and the Episcopal Office be vacant, then not without the consent of the Standing Committee. The vestry may also use, improve, or dispose of all personal property, and the produce, rents, and profits of lands and houses (not appropriated for the occupancy and use of the minister) belonging to the church, in repairing the church and parsonage house for the benefit of the respective Parishes or churches, and may make such rules and orders for managing the affairs and temporal concerns of their respective churches and Parishes as they shall think most conducive to their interest and prosperity. They shall have the sole power of directing the payment of money belonging to the respective churches and parishes, and appoint a clerk, treasurer, and collector when necessary; all which proceedings shall be entered in a well-bound book to be kept for that purpose. But when there are trustees under the act of the Legislature, passed February 3d, 1842, authorized to hold real property, such real property shall not be subject to the provisions of this Canon.

CANON XVIII.

Of Church Property for which there are no Trustees.

The Council shall annually elect a Standing Committee, to consist of two clergymen and three laymen, whose duty it shall be to claim for and on behalf of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, all property, real and personal, belonging to said Church or any Parish or congregation thereof, whether said Parish or congregation has been disbanded or not, as to which there are no duly constituted trustees in whom is vested the legal title thereto.

The said Committee shall use all due diligence, by proper legal steps or otherwise, to secure such property to the use and benefit of the said Church, or of the proper Parish or congregation thereof, and to that end the members of said Committee, or the persons designated by them, are hereby nominated without further action of the Council, to the respective courts to which said Committee may

apply, as the trustees for any such property so to be claimed by said Committee.

When any such property shall be recovered by said Committee, it shall be held by the trustees appointed for the use and benefit of this Church, or the Parish or Congregation properly entitled thereto.

CANON XIX.

Offenders to be Admonished or Repelled from the Lord's Table.

If any person within this Church offend their brethren by wickedness of life, such persons shall be admonished or repelled from the Lord's Table, by the minister in charge of the Parish or church according to the Rubric. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the minister, or may be requested by the accused, the church wardens, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the minister in ascertaining the facts of the case: *Provided*, that if such warden or wardens fail or refuse to act within ten days, the minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

CANON XX.

Proceedings for the Expenses of the Diocese.

The Vestries of the several Parishes or churches shall, quarterly, or at every annual Council, as each Vestry shall determine for itself, pay to the Treasurer such sums as may be apportioned to them, respectively, for the purpose of defraying such expenses as may be authorized by the Council.

CANON XXI.

Concerning Altering or Adding to the Canons of the Church.

No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall hereafter be considered by the Council, unless at least one day's previous notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a committee of at least two presbyters and two laymen. Nor shall such alteration or addition be adopted during the same Council if two-thirds of the members shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration until the next Annual Council.

CANON XXII.

All the former Canons of this Diocese, not included in these Canons, are hereby repealed.

THE CONSTITUTION

Of the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

ARTICLE. 1. This Society shall be called the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia. Objects of this Society shall be to promote missionary work in the Diocese and to encourage the weak parishes.

ART. 2. This Society shall consist of all the baptized members of this Church residing in this Diocese, and the control and management of the Society shall be vested in the Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

ART. 3. There shall be an Executive Committee of said Society consisting of the Bishop, who shall be Chairman (and Bishop Coadjutor should there be one), and eight clergymen and eight laymen, to be elected annually by the Council. In addition to these there shall be one member elected from each Convocation in the Diocese, upon nomination of said Convocation.

Said Executive Committee, subject to the control of the Council, shall have the management of the general missions of the Diocese and shall exercise all the powers of the Diocesan Missionary Society under Constitution of 1829, and also under powers given by this Constitution, and shall annually make a full and complete report to the Council sitting as a Board of Missions, on or before the second day of the session of the Council, embracing in said report such outline of the Missionary Work as may serve to give a comprehensive view of its progress and prospects in the Diocese. The said Committee shall remain in office until there successors are elected. They shall fill all vacancies; provided, that should such vacancy occur after election of any member among the Convocational members, the Committee shall fill the same from the Convocation wherein the same occurred, upon nomination of said Convocation.

ART. 4. Seven members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of busines. The Executive Committee shall elect a Treasurer and a Secretary for the Society, and such other officers as may be necessary to carry on its work. It may appoint agents to represent it in various portions of the Diocese, and may arrange for public meetings at such times and places as it may deem expedient. It may enact By-Laws for its own government and for the government of those under its authority.

ART. 5. The Executive Committee is entrusted with power to establish missions in the Diocese; *provided*, that in so doing it does not infringe upon the rights of any parish already established.

The Executive Committee shall have power to group missions, which they may establish or which are already established, and such non-self-supporting congregations as are without ministers; *provided*, that where there is a duly elected vestry, the consent thereof shall be obtained.

The Executive Committee shall have power to employ one or more missionaries to take charge of the combined points referred to in this Article.

In carrying out the provisions of this Article the consent of the Bishop must be obtained.

ART. 6. This Constitution may be amended or altered by a majority vote at any meeting of the Council.

It shall be in force from its passage and shall stand in the place of the existing Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

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
