ORGANIZATION.

FROM CANON I, SECTION I. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecciesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures, or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged. And the Ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be so designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them, respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the Lay Delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all of the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

RULES OF ORDER.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer. 2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand, except to address the chair. Rules of Order.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1st. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral address.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

2d. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the *second* day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.

A Committee on the Brotherhood.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.

A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

A Committee on Parochial Reports.

A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

A Committee on Sunday-schools.

A Committee on Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society.

A Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

A Committee on Colonial Churches.

A Committee on Unfinished Business.

Rules of Order.

3d. Immediately after the reading of the Bishop's Address the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, the Committee on Church Property, and such other committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

4th. The Council shall sit as a Board of Missions on the first day of the session at 8 o'clock P. M. The President of the Council, or some member of the Council selected by him, shall preside. The Secretary of the Council shall be Secretary of the Council sitting as a Board of Missions.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

1st. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary before debate.

2d. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

3d. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.

4th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

5th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6th. The previous question shall be admitted only when de-

Rules of Order.

manded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form:

"Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendment are precluded.

7th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

8th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

9th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

10th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

11th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

12th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

13th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

14th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

15th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

16th. Upon a division and count of the Council on any ques-

tion, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

17th. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

18th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1st. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

2d. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

3d. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

4th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 20, 1908.

The One Hundred and Thirteenth Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia met this day in St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, at 10 A. M., for Divine Service.

There were present in the chancel the Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, D. D., the Revs. John Moncure, D. D., E. L. Goodwin, R. A. Goodwin, W. D. Smith, and the rector, Rev. R. J. McBryde, D. D.

The sermon was preached by the Rev. W. D. Smith, from Acts xi, 26.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop and the Rev. E. L. Goodwin.

After Divine service the Council was called to order by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of the members of the Council; 53 of the clergy and 36 of the laity answered to their names.

Report of Committee on Credentials.

A quorum of both orders being present, the Council was declared organized and ready for business.

On motion of Rev. E. L. Goodwin, the Rules of Order of last Council were adopted for the guidance of this Council.

Rev. R. A. Goodwin presented to the Council the papers and accounts of the Invested Funds of the Diocese.

The Rector, Rev. R. J. McBryde, D. D., offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the business sessions of the Council shall be from 9:30 A. M. to 11:00 A. M., when there shall be an adjournment for Divine service; that the Council reassemble immediately after Divine service and continue in session till 1 P. M., when recess shall be taken till 3:30 P. M., at which time the Council shall convene and continue in session until 6 P. M.

On the motion of the rector, the Rev. R. J. McBryde, D. D., it was—

Resolved, That all visiting clergy from other Dioceses, theological students and ministers of the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist churches in this town be invited to seats on the floor of the Council.

Rev. W. M. Clark, for the Committee on Credentials reported, that the Roll of Lay Delegates as called by the Secretary had been found correct, and recommended that the name of Mr. J. G. Moncure, of St. David's Church, King William county, be added thereto as the delegate from that parish, which, on motion, was accordingly done.

The Bishop called for reports from the Standing Committees. Through their Chairmen the following reported: Church Property, Disabled Clergy Fund, Episcopal Fund, Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and the Bruce Fund. These reports were referred to the appropriate committees.

On motion of Rev. R. A. Goodwin, reports on the Monumental Church Fund, St. Andrew's Fund, Yeocomico Church Endowment Fund, and the Pohick Church Endowment Fund, were referred to the Committee on Bruce Fund.

Standing Committees.

Rev. W. M. Clark asked for information as to who were the Committee on Finance. The Bishop announced that the Committee consisted of Messrs. Joseph Bryan, P. H. Mayo and James Caskie.

BISHOP GIBSON'S ADDRESS.

The Bishop made his address in part, announcing that on account of its length he would not attempt to read it all at one sitting, but would begin it today and conclude it at tomorrow's session of the Council.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, Gathered in FREDERICKSBURG—GREETING:

"The peace of God, which passeth all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of His Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

Bishop's Address.

The gathering of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia in this old town of Fredericksburg, is always of interest and also of great significance.

Wednesday, May 1st-Found me in the county of Essex, and on that day I preached at Vawter's Church and made an address on the missions of the Diocese, but did not administer the rite of confirmation. In the evening took the boat at Carter's Wharf to Fredericksburg on my return to Richmond.

Thursday, 2d—Attended a meeting of the City Missionary Society in St. James' lecture room.

Sunday, 5th—In St. Paul's Church, Richmond, I administered the rite of confirmation to nineteen persons.

Tuesday, 7th—Attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and the Virginia Prayer Book Distribution Society.

Thursday, 9th-Missed a deferred meeting of the trustees of the Diocesan funds because of attendance on a meeting of the trustees of Stuart Hall in Staunton.

Sunday, 12th—Confirmed six persons at Emmanual Church, Henrico county.

Monday, 13th—I was present at exercises of extraordinary interest at Jamestown, on Jamestown Island, in celebration of the three hundredth anniversary of the first landing of Anglo-Saxons on that spot. The British Ambassador, James Bryce; the Governor of Virginia, Mr. Claude A. Swanson; Lieut.-Governor, Mr. J. Taylor Ellyson, and Mr. Joseph Bryan, delivered appropriate and valuable addresses, and Mr. Moomaw read a poem in commemoration of the first settlement in this country.

Tuesday, 14th—I went to Warrenton to attend a meeting of the Council, which for the first time in the history of the Diocese was held in that town. The meeting was more like the Councils of my youthful days than any I have seen as Bishop.

Wednesday, 15th—Council opened with service, at which Dr. Wallace, of the Virginia Seminary, preached the Council sermon. .

Bishop's Address.

In the evening, a missionary meeting was held in the interest of the work of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

Thursday, 16th—Between sessions of the Council in the morning, there was a service and sermon by Rev. R. W. Barnwell, of Southern Virginia. At night the usual missionary meeting in the interest of general missions was held.

Friday, 17th—Between sessions of the Council, after a sermon by the Rev. J. Y. Downman, I confirmed six persons.

Saturday, 18th—In Alexandria, I went over the plans which had been secured by the Rev. J. F. Mitchell, the colored priest in charge of that mission, for replacing the present Meade Chapel by a new building.

Sunday, 19th-Whitsunday, I confirmed seven persons at Dumfries, in Quantico Church, and administered the Holy Communion.

Tuesday, 21st—Attended a meeting of the Senior Class at the Virginia Seminary.

Thursday, 23rd—Met a Committee on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese, and appointed Mr. Robert S. Chamberlayne custodian of the silver plate presented to the Diocese from B. B. Leacock, and put Mr. Chamberlavne into possession of the same.

Friday, 24th—Held a consultation with Dr. Moncure, on the work among the colored people.

Tuesday, 28th—Held several interviews, one with Misses Stephenson and Arundel.

Wednesday, 20th—Saw several persons on the same business— Brook Avenue Mission.

Thursday, 30th—The great Confederate Reunion began in Richmond, and the statue of Gen'l. J. E. B. Stuart was unveiled.

Friday, 31st—At night, attended a reunion and banquet of the Rockbridge Artillery.

Saturday, June 1st-Baptized an infant at No. 1015 West Grace street.

Sunday, 2nd—Preached a memorial sermon on the character

of the Hon. Jefferson Davis, from the text, 1st Samuel, 25th chapter, 29th verse: "But the soul of my Lord shall be bound in the bundle of life with the Lord thy God."

Monday, 3rd-Took part in the great procession at the unveiling of the statue to Mr. Davis, and in the afternoon, attended a reception at "Brook Hill."

Wednesday, 5th-Attended a meeting of the Finance Committee, which was preparing for the coming of the General Convention, in October.

Thursday and Friday, 13th, 14th-Made two days' visit to the Exposition.

Sunday, 16th—In the morning, confirmed seventeen persons in Christ Church, Charlottesville, of whom four were for Edge Hill Chapel, and three for St. Luke's. In the afternoon, confirmed three persons at Silvania Chapel.

Monday, 17th—Went to the Seminary at Alexandria, and at night, confirmed two persons in St. John's Chapel, West End.

Tuesday, 18th—Attended a meeting of the Educational Society of Virginia, and the Board of Trustees of the Seminary. In the evening, went to Philadelphia on my way to Valley Forge.

Wednesday 19th—At Valley Forge, by request, I dedicated the Virginia Bay in the Cloister of the Colonies in the Washington Memorial Chapel, with appropriate religious services, conducted by the Rev. W. Herbert Burke, minister in charge, and Rev. Francis T. H. Finn, assisting. The inscription on this edifice is so remarkable that I feel it ought to be put on record in the annals of the Diocese. The words are as follows:

> "To the Glory of God, And in honor of the unfaltering heroism of the Father of his Country, and the brave Virginians who so faithfully stood by him in this Valley. And in sincere appreciation of

the devotion of the
Commonwealth of Virginia,
to the Missions of the Church,
and especially in giving themselves
to this great cause,
This Bay is erected by
George Clifford Thomas,
June 19th, 1907."

My theme was "Washington, the Product of his Virginia Environments." In the afternoon I returned to the Seminary.

Thursday, 20th—Attended a meeting of the Seminary Allumni, Allumni dinner, and dedication of the beautiful chancel window presented by Mr. and Mrs. Houston. At night, confirmed three persos at Sharon.

Friday, 21st—After a sermon by the Rev. W. E. Evans, D. D., ordained seven deacons and one priest. In the evening, went to Riverton Junction and then to Luray.

Saturday, 22nd—Confirmed one person at Luray and in the afternoon confirmed five persons at Ingham, and at night went on to Elkton.

Sunday, 23rd—Confirmed five persons at Shenandoah in the morning, and eighteen at Islandford at night.

Monday, 24th—Confirmed one person in private, at Elkton, and confirmed two in private in the neighborhood of Berrytown. At night, confirmed nine persons in Grace Church, Lynnwood.

Tuesday, 25th—Confirmed one person in private near Grace Church, Lynnwood. Went to Basic and thence to Alexandria.

Wednesday, 26th—Went to Leesburg, thence to Oatland, where I confirmed two persons.

Thursday, 27th—Confirmed seven persons at Middleburg. Friday, 28th—Confirmed eleven persons at Aldie.

Saturday, 29th—Went to Leesburg and thence to Goresville. Sunday, 30th—Confirmed two persons at Goresville, made an address at Limestone Mission, and preached at Hamilton.

Monday, July 1st—Went to Bluemont, thence to Winchester, thence to Mt. Jackson, and on July 2nd, reached Orkney Springs. After a little quiet at Orkney Springs, occupied largely, so far as the Diocese was concerned, with attending to the mail which had accumulated for me, I preached at Orkney on the 14th and again on the 21st.

Monday, 22nd—Came from Mt. Jackson to Staunton, and thence to Richmond.

Tuesday, 23rd, to Friday 26th—Attended to business there.

Friday, 26th—Returned to Staunton, thence to Orkney.

Sunday, 28th—Read services and preached at Orkney.

Thursday, August 1st—Went to Harrisonburg.

Sunday, 4th—Confirmed ten persons in Emmanuel Church, Harrisonburg, and at night, preached for Mr. Brooking.

Sunday, 11th—Preached at Orkney.

Saturday, 17th—Went to Mt. Jackson, thence to Front Royal. Sunday, 18th—Confirmed five persons at Front Royal in the morning, and at night baptized a candidate for confirmation and confirmed three persons at White Post.

Monday, 19th—Went to Delaplane, then to Upperville, where I confirmed six persons.

Tuesday, 20th—Confirmed four persons in Ewell's Chapel, Prince William county, in the afternoon, and at night confirmed fifteen persons in St. Paul's, Haymarket, one of whom was colored.

Wednesday, 21st—Went to Washington, thence to Herndon, and at night met the members of the Vestry at Herndon, to consult about the interest of the Parish and decide on the best course to pursue during Mr. McNabb's illness.

Thursday, 22nd—From Herndon, went to Washington, thence to Widewater.

Friday, 23rd—Confirmed one person at Clifton Church.

Saturday, 24th—Went with Mr. Burwell to Rock Hill where I saw the new church for the first time. Made an address on missions, and returned that afternoon to the rectory at Aquia.

Sunday, 25th—Confirmed eight persons in old Aquia Church and in the evening preached at the colored chapel built on Miss Edrington's place. At both churches Mr. Burwell administered the sacrament of baptism.

Monday, 26th-Returned from Widewater and Washington to Mt. Jackson and Orkney.

Thursday, September 5th-Left Orkney and after a day in Staunton, went to Richmond.

Sunday, 8th-At the request of Mr. John J. Gravatt, Jr., in the absence of the Rev. J. J. Gravatt, preached at Holy Trinity Church, Mr. Gravatt reading the service

A greater part of this month until its very last days were spent in preparation by the clergy and laity in Convention meetings for the General Convention.

Saturday, 28th-Went to Washington to meet the Bishop of London and his party who were to be my guests. By the kind offices of Messrs. Warren Taylor, George W. Stevens and C. E. Doyle, a car was provided to take the Bishop of London and the gentlemen forming his party, to the University of Virginia, and thence, after a visit of a few hours, to Richmond. This plan was frustrated by the need of rest and recreation, which the Bishop felt after an arduous day on Sunday in Washington and the prospects of another day of the same sort immediately on his arrival in Richmond, at which time he was to preach the opening sermon at the General Convention.

September 29th—By the kind invitation of Bishop Satterlee, I took part in the great service on Mt. St. Albans, for laying the first foundation stone of the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul. The Bishop of London presented a pulpit from the Archbishop of Cantebury to the Cathedral, and preached the sermon.

Monday, 30th—The Bishop of London made a visit to the Virginia Seminary in the morning and addressed the students from the front steps of Aspinwall Hall. Returned to Washington in the afternoon to come down to Richmond on the train which Mr. Warren Taylor, Traffic Manager of the R. F. & P. R. R., Co., had provided as a "Bishop's Special."

Bishop's Address.

Tuesday, October 1st-Consecrated the Church of the Holy Trinity in Richmond in the presence of a great concourse of people. Many of the clergy of the Diocese and other visitors were present and assisted. The sermon was preached by Bishop Peterkin, of West Virginia. Before this service was over, the Bishop of London and his party arrived in Richmond, and were met, and at night the Bishop received a number of the church people of Richmond.

Wednesday, 2nd—The General Convention of 1907 opened with the service of Holy Communion in Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, the Bishop of London preaching the sermon.

From October 2nd to the 19th, inclusive, the General Convention was in session, and the time of everybody who had been engaged in preparing for the meeting, and the time of a good many others besides was fully taken up in attention to our guests and the business for which the Convention was assembled. The great success of this Church meeting is a matter for which we are profoundly grateful. There was never any reason to fear that it would not be a great success socially, but when it appeared that it had been a great convention for work as well. our cup of thanksgiving was filled.

Monday, 14th—At a very late hour at night, by a call of five most inconsiderate trustees, the Board of Trustees of the Virginia Seminary was convened. It was the most unpleasant incident of the Convention.

The closing services of the Convention were held at Holy Trinity Church on the afternoon of Saturday, October 19th.

Sunday, 20th—By special arrangements made by Mr. Joseph Bryan, with the Southern Railway Company, an opportunity was given for some of the visitors to make a trip to New Kent, where the people were thoroughly prepared to receive them. Most interesting sermons were delivered by the Bishop of California and Rev. E. L. Goodwyn, and the occasion was greatly enjoyed. On the afternoon of the same day, the laying of the foundation of the Chapel, which is to be a memorial to Alexander

Whittaker, the first rector of Henrico Parish, took place in the yard of St. John's Church. Addresses were made by the Rev. Robert A. Goodwin, rector of the parish, by myself, as Bishop of the Diocese, and by Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle, as presiding Bishop of the Church.

Friday, 25th—I went to Ivy Depot for a visit in the mountains.

Saturday, 26th—Confirmed one person at the Chapel of St. John the Baptist, in Albemarle county.

Sunday, 27th—In the midst of a most discouraging rain, consecrated a pretty little church in Blackwell's Hollow, given by Miss Mary Triplett, of the Diocese of Missouri. I preached the consecration sermon, and the church is called St. John's. In the afternoon, I confirmed one person in Whittle Memorial Chapel at the Mission Home.

Monday, 28th—The Festival of St. Simon and St. Jude. Service was held in Whittle Memorial Chapel and sermon by Archdeacon Neve, and at 3:30 in the afternoon, I preached in St. Paul's, Ivy, and at two separate services, confirmed nine persons.

Tuesday, 20th—Went to Haymarket and stayed at the house of the Rev. Cary Gamble.

Wednesday, 30th—At Ewell's Chapel, officiated at the wedding ceremony of Rev. John F. Coleman.

Friday, November 1st.—Did some work for the church in the West End of Charlottesville, and met the St. Andrew's Association at night.

Sunday, 3rd—After two baptismal services, confirmed ten people at St. John's, Spottsylvania.

This was the 10th anniversary of my consecration as Bishop of the Diocese. In the afternoon I drove back to Mineral City, where I confirmed five persons in the Church of the Incarnation.

Monday, 4th—Confirmed one person in private, went to Louisa Courthouse, and at night, confirmed seven people in St. James, in that place.

Bishop's Address.

Tuesday, 5th—Met the Diocesan Missionary Society and Virginia Prayer-book Society in Richmond.

Wednesday, 6th—Went to Charlottesville to attend the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Bishop Knight of Cuba and Bishop Spalding, of Salt Lake City, were present. The addresses were good and the business successfully carried on.

Thursday, 7th—At night the meeting closed with a missionary rally.

Tuesday, 12th—Went to the Seminary to meet the Faculty of that Institution in preparation of the meeting of the Board of Trustees the next day.

Wednesday, 13th—Trustees of the Seminary met.

Friday, 15th—Met a committee from St. Philip's Church to discuss the future of that church. As it seemed to be succeeding very well, determined to leave it for the present as it is.

Sunday, 17th—Confirmed four persons in St. Paul's Church, Gordonsville, colored, and administered the Holy Communion after the baptism of nine infants and adults, by Rev. John Moncure.

The rest of the month of November was spent in Richmond, and during this time,, several transfers of clergy were given and some received. Among the rest was the transfer of the Rev. John Poyntz Tyler, to Maryland. Mr. Tyler had filled the position of Archdeacon in this Diocese for two and a half years, and did a fine work in helping the clergy in increasing the salaries paid by several parishes, in organizing societies for the maintainance of the old churches, and in filling vacancies in the Diocese, in all of which lines of work his absence has been much felt since he decided to resign.

Sunday, December 1st—Made a short address on Missions, in Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, and assisted the rector in administering the Holy Communion.

Tuesday, 3rd—Attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society and a meeting of the Virginia Prayer Book Society. By the former society, the resignation of Archdeacon Tyler was accepted with regrets.

Bishop's Address.

Friday, 6th—Attended a meeting of the Executive Committee of Board of Arrangements of the General Convention.

Saturday, 7th—Went to Gordonsville on my way to Warrenton.

Sunday 8th—Confirmed ten persons in St. James' Church, Warrenton, and preached in the afternoon at Baldwin's Ridge. Saturday, 14th—Went to Fredericksburg, and thence to the neighborhood of Spottsylvania Courthouse.

Sunday, 15th—Confirmed four persons in the church at Spott-sylvania Courthouse, and in the afternoon, preached at St. George's Chapel.

Monday, 16th—Was unable to attend the examination of G. D. Christian, which had been fixed for that day, not being well enough.

Sunday, 22nd—Had a special confirmation in Holy Trinity Church, confirming two persons, of whom one was for St. Mark's Church, Richmond.

Thursday, 26th—Performed the marriage ceremony of two colored persons at my own house.

Saturday, January 4th—Went to Basic, Elkton and Harrison-burg, and at the latter place attended a reception given me by the congregation of Emmanuel Church.

Sunday, 5th—In Emmanuel Church, confirmed nineteen persons.

Tuesday, 7th—At the University of Virginia attended a meeting in the interest of the church building, West End of Charlottesville.

Sunday, 12th—Conducted services for the Rev. J J. Gravatt, who was absent, presenting the cause of Diocesan Missions in Westmoreland county. Rev. George P. Mayo made an address on the subject of mountain missions.

Sunday, 19th—Confirmed three persons at Ruther Glen, presented by Rev. P. A. Arthur, administered the Holy Communion,

and in the afternoon, made a visit to a sick man in the neighborhood.

Thursday, 23rd—At the Negro Reformatory, in Hanover county, confirmed thirteen boys.

Wednesday, February 5th—In the absence of the rector, Mr. Clarke, officiated at a wedding ceremony in St. James' Church.

Sunday, 9th—Made an address and introduced the speakers at a public meeting of the City Missionary Society, at Grace Church, Richmond.

Friday, 14th—Confirmed five persons in St. John's Church, West Point.

Sunday, 16th—Confirmed one person in St. Peter's Church, New Kent county, presented by Mr. Guy Christian, Lay Reader, and administered the Holy Communion.

Sunday, 23rd—Confirmed twelve persons in St. James Church, Ashland, presented by the new rector, Rev. John F. Coleman. In the afternoon of the same day, confirmed nine persons at St. Luke's Church, Richmond, presented by the Rev. P. A. Arthur.

Tuesday, 25th—Went to Washington to the funeral of the Rt. Rev. Henry Y. Satterlee, Bishop of that Diocese. Bishop Satterlee was a kind neighbor as well as a most vigorous administrator, and deeply consecrated Christian man. We shall feel his loss in Virginia, and extend our sincere sympathy to his bereaved Diocese.

Wednesday, 26th—Attended a meeting of the General Committee from three Dioceses of Virginia, West Virginia and Southern Virginia, on the memorial of Robert Hunt, the first clergyman resident of Jamestown.

Saturday, 29th—Spoke at the Sunday-school Institute meeting in All Saints' Church, Richmond, in the interest of the Diocese, and introduced Mr. C. B. Bryan, of Petersburg, who spoke on General Missions of the Church. This was preparatory to the special Lenten work for gathering offerings for Missions in the Sunday-school.

Tuesday 3rd—Attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society and Virginia Prayer Book Society.

Thursday, 5th—Went to Washington and thence to Falls Church to see the family of Rev. George S. Somerville. On the day before, Mr. Somerville died at Clifton Springs.

Friday, 6th—With the Rev. Dr. Wallace and other clergymen, assisted in the funeral services of the Rev. George S. Somerville.

Sunday 8th—Confirmed seven persons in Grace Church, Richmond, Va.

Sunday, 15th—Confirmed twenty-six persons in St. John's Church, Richmond, in the morning; and in the afternoon confirmed seven persons at Epiphany Church, Barton Heights.

CLERGY DECEASED.

On Ash Wednesday, at four o'clock, in the morning, entered into life Rev. Geo. S. Somerville. He was a man in the prime of intellectual vigor—in the very youth of old age—apparently as strong in body as he was certainly gifted in mind.

His life had been spent in the Diocese of Virginia. For a while, assistant to my father in Petersburg, he learned the best methods of approaching individuals on religious subjects, in as good a school as ever man had.

The working of a city parish, too, became part and parcel of his mental make up. Too serious to be lightly or even markedly versatile, he dedicated himself to the one kind of pastoral work which he had thoroughly learned, and refused, perhaps, unconsciously to consider any other. He lived in the ideal. His own ideal was early and firmly grasped and no other ideal ever appealed to him. Hence, I believe, his desire for one church, and only one, in whatever village, town or country neighborhood he might successively labor. From his single-minded intensity he gained power—unusual power. A short and comparatively fruitless ministry in Nelson county convinced him of his limitations and when the little church at Hay Market called him to try the experiment of establishing uninterrupted weekly ser-

vices in a church where such privileges had never been dreamed of, he stepped forward with alacrity to the task—the right man in the right place.

With this move commenced, what any clergyman must call a career. The little wayside church became a centre not only of ecclesiastical, but of civil life. The preacher confining himself strictly to his ministry of the Gospel, and dealing in his pulpit solely with religious themes, drew to himself the country round about. His frequent illnesses generally concealed, and his harmless foibles freely displayed, were alike unable to cripple him or lessen his influence.

A power went out from him which was universally felt and the first of those extended movements took place, which we have since seen repeated, and which I believe will, as they more and more frequently occur, at some day, restore the Church in Virginia to her old place as the recognized leader of the best religious progress of the State.

Of the change we all know something. St. Paul's, Hay Market, going steadily forward under succeeding administrations, has chapels and missions which are nearly as strong as was the mother church in the memory of the older men among us. May the work go bravely on. To each workman his meed of praise, to Mr. Somerville, the glory of the startling, cheering, inspiring beginning of the day of greater things.

Mr. Somerville was buried close to the walls of old Falls Church, in Fairfax county, and his body was laid to rest at the foot of a spreading oak tree. The thought came into my mind that for those who should hereafter learn the history of that building there would be no necessity for any other monument to him.

Removing from Hay Market he found his lot cast among circumstances as totally different as it was possible to conceive. Many men would have given up. Most men would have been daunted. He only braced himself for a new and untried task. The church building and its history were his best hold on the

community. He put everything else into a secondary place and without neglecting the preaching of the Gospel, applied himself almost with the energy of desperation to the business of renovating and beautifying the dignified and historic structure.

The labor spent was rewarded. The material part of the work was well and thoroughly done; the moral and spiritual results of the pious thoughts and earnest prayers which accompanied it remains to be seen.

Meantime the devoted and consecrated laborer, whose delight it was to walk about Zion and view the towers thereof, has entered into a city which hath foundations whose builder and maker is God. He has found the house which was to him the House of God, for him also, as we sincerely believe, the gate of Heaven.

A few words now, on the business of the Diocese. Familiar

as are the themes, their phases change from year to year. New light comes, new sources of information are opened, new turns in events occur. It is not uninteresting to add to our accumulated knowledge and in my opinion the only way to get anything practical completed by a number of persons working together is to keep the matter ever fresh in the minds of those who are or ought to be busy in its accomplishment.

1. THE COLONIAL CHURCHES.—I give them with the dates of their erection as nearly as I can ascertain those dates, with the time and sources at my disposal. They are as follows:

Of these it will be observed fifteen are in good condition and occupied by active congregations which will take care that they are kept up.

One, viz.: Christ Church, Lancaster, has been nearly restored, and I am expecting at almost any time to reopen it.

Two, Aquia and Fork Churches, are endowed to an extent which guarantees necessary repairs. Two, Pohick and Yeocomico, are accumulating endowments of the same character and all four have placed their securities in the hands of the Trustees of Diocesan Funds. And two, Lamb's Creek and Farnham, are beginning to gather together their friends and to infuse into the minds of all who wish them well the purpose of restoring them in time, no matter how long a time it takes. The Committee on this subject will, I hope, give the Council both instruction and guidance as to the help we can render in this matter.

2. The Funds of the Diocese.—That the Widows' and Orphans' Fund is inadequate, a glance at the Journal will show. The demands upon this fund are increasing, the amounts distributed from it in many cases are less than we ought to give. The General Clergy Relief Fund helps us with unfailing hand, but even so the amounts secured for distressed women and helpless children, the widows and orphans of men who have given their lives to the Church, are totally insufficient for their simple needs. I hope that the Council will bear this fund in mind.

The Disabled Clery Fund meets well the calls upon it, which I will take occasion to say are just now fewer than for some time.

The Emergency Fund is becoming of so much value that I must take a few minutes of your time to make its operation known to the Council, and through its members and its Journal to the generous friends who keep this fund alive.

The Emergency Fund, as you know, is an agency of my own for helping where help is needed, and where no other means of assistance are available.

The Woman's Auxiliary has taken an interest in contributing to the Emergency Fund which has been invaluable. Other contributions may be uncertain, not to be counted on beforeBishop's Address.

hand, but something from the different branches of the Auxiniary is sure and this certainty is worth more than I can say. It is the meal in the barrel and the oil in the cruse which, though it may run low, never runs out. The contributions of the Auxiliary constitute the basis of the Fund. To the contributions of the Auxiliary good friends have added in several instances large sums, and the benefits conferred by this fund as such will appear some day, though of most of its achievements it is quite impossible to speak.

There is a way, however, in which this fund proves valuable, of which mention may be made. It is an open account in bank. It is kept as a trust fund. There is no possibility of confusing its contents with other money through mere mistake. It is therefore most convenient for the handling of special or designated gifts made to the Bishop for one object or another. Let me enumerate some of the objects which have been aided by friends of the Diocese acting through the Bishop within the last two years, the Emergency Fund being the Bishop's vehicle for transmitting money.

The Sparrow Tablet in the Chapel of the Theological Seminary is a debt which Virginia and the friends of Evangelical religion owed to a great teacher and leader. Gifts for this memorial were handled easily through the Emergency Account, and the prompt and full settlement of the bill for the same made possible by its operation.

The School at Orkney, which I trust in God will be the beginning of mountain work in the Alleghany division of the Appalachians, owes its existence and its freedom from debt to-day to the same machinery of collection and distribution.

Scholarships in the schools, which I hope some day will be properly known as the "Diocesan System of Schools for Girls" have been cared for under this Fund.

The Advent Fund of the Sunday Schools, amounting this year to \$246.62, which so happily supplements the work of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and provides for permanent equip-

Occasional gifts, like that most generous and unexpected contribution of the boys of St. Paul's Church, Richmond, working as a branch of the Brotherhood of St. Paul, when they gave \$200.00 to be used for the mission work of the Diocese at the discretion of the Bishop; or, like the designated gifts for work among white people and colored, which came from the Men's Thank Offering at the General Convention of 1907, to the amount of \$3,394.00. Gifts of this kind, comparatively large, are divided and sent to their respective destinations through this agency.

So too, with gifts designated for particular cases of distress which appeal to warm hearted persons who can feel at liberty to make the Bishop of the Diocese their almoner. All these sources have supplied to the Emergency Fund during the past year about \$6,000.00, and I say this to the Council for its encouragement as well as its information, that clergy and laity may see how things really are and may be moved to banish pessimism from their counsels: may banish pessimism and go on with the work of the Church of Christ in the fear and love of God and in the enthusiasm of a Christian faith. Neither Captain or Colonel ever did anything worth while with volunteers who were dragged to duty. If your horse balks at every little hill get another horse.

Anybody can criticise, but the number of those who can and will help is comparatively small.

Somehow or other this Diocese has had for its Missionary work during the past year \$37,000.00, and the money did not make the work but the tidings of the work brought the money. And let me say moreover that the sum I name has not all gone to the mountains by any means. Three or four, ves, five or six of the most striking instances of energy and life we have to show are not in the mountains, but in Prince William and Stafford, Louisa, in the upper part of Goochland and in Northumberland Bishop's Address.

counties, while some of the most beautiful instances of devotion to the cause of the Master are in Rappahannock and Fairfax. in Essex, in Hanover and in Gloucester.

But in saying this, let me not be thought for one moment to disparage the zeal or belittle the devotion of our mountain missionaries. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. The work there lies in a mass, awe inspiring for its magnitude, cheering for the gleams of self-sacrifice and unconscious heroism which flash continually from its heights.

Far be it from me to set one part of the work against another. But looking down upon the woods the twinkle of a single nightlight, or even the glare of a conflagration is not visible as is the same illumination against the sky-line. And, therefore, I speak for the rest of the Diocese and say what I am always ready to say for the mountain work, indeed it is enough to say for our mountain work as I can say in one word, that it has made the Diocese of Virginia known throughout the Missionary world of English speaking people.

I ask the attention of the Council to the action of the General Convention proposing changes in the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church. They are all of great importance. The preamble is a statement of our doctrine and spirit with which we should become familiar as soon as possible, for I recommend no changes in its proposed form.

The third section of Article I, on the subject of the presiding Bishop, will make a decided change in the government of the Church, but its delay up to this time has resulted in offering it to us in better shape than ever before.

The proposed fourth section of Article II, that viz., on Suffragan Bishops, I should like to see altered so that Suffragans would have no seat in the house of Bishops, and I should like to see this if it takes many years to do it. Otherwise I commend the article to the Diocese for adoption.

The addition to the second paragraph of Article 14 on the Constitution which allows the General Convention to provide

by Canon for that of a Presbyter or Deacon in the Diocese and in which an offence is alleged to have been committed, I think wise, and my opinion, as the Council may remember, grows out of some experience.

As to the addition to Article 10, with regard to vergal alteration to the edition of Common Prayer in foreign languages, I have no recommendation to make. Insuch alterations they must have the authority of the Bishop of the territory in which it is to be used and the Presiding Bishop also, and ought therefore to be safe. These alterations are so important that they ought to be considered while the recollection of the members of the General Convention who are members of this body is full and clear on the incidents and debates relating to their passage.

A word in addition to what was said in the Diary about the General Convention of 1907. It was a great event for the Diocese of Virginia and for the city of Richmond. Meeting in Richmond for the first time in half a century, it promised to tax all our powers to the utmost. The magnificent care and forethought exercised in arranging for the Convention, the zeal and energy with which everybody, clergy and laity, strove to do the part which fell to them, made the entertaining of the Convention a much easier and more pleasant task than we had anticipated. Many delightful friendships were formed, many lasting impressions made, and the general result, it appears to me, will be, that churchman from all parts of the country will understand each other better than in the past. We are working for the same end, we believe substantially the same truths, we hold and value the same orders, and the better specimens of our clergy and laity are the same kind of people. We have been long in finding out these facts, but the knowledge of them is now so strongly impressed upon us that we shall hand it down easily and naturally to our children. We are thankful that the General Convention of 1907, met in Richmond; we are thankful to have made the acquaintance of our distinguished guests, both from our home Dioceses and from other countries; and

we are especially grateful in the profoundest degree for the spirit of comprehensiveness and brotherly kindness which marked our deliberations, and which we trust will further the great cause of religion in the world. I introduce these remarks into my address simply that some record may be made of the event which has proved so engrossing in its interest, and so important to the Diocese and the Church at large.

The passage of the 19th Canon, or rather of a short addition to that Canon, has raised serious questions in the minds of many earnest members of the Church. In Virginia we have less anxiety about the effect of this change in the language of the law than is felt in some other parts of the Church. A new responsibility is put upon the Bishop for which he must prepare himself. A strong suggestion is made to our clergy to invite persons, other than our own ordained ministers, to make addresses to our people on special occasions. These two sentences cover all the points of difference between our condition now and formerly. We were not at liberty before the passage of this law to exchange pulpits. We have not gained that liberty.

We could not invite any person not recognized by our Church as a duly ordained minister to preach for us at an ordinary morning or evening service. We cannot do so now.

The occasion must be special, the address or sermon suitable to the occasion, or at least expected so to be.

It seems to me the clergy in all parts of the Church have been facing these questions, and deciding them, ever since I can remember. They now have the Bishop to fall back upon, but it will not help them that the Bishop joined with them in making a mistake if their congregation suffer or are seriously divided.

The only safe course is that Bishop and clergy shall alike look to the welfare of "the Congregations Committed to their charges," shall make no radical changes, shall not feel obliged to go out opportunity to be genuinely courteous.

Our position may have really changed, but it has not greatly changed, and our course must still be steered by trust in one

another such as we in this Diocese have had in the past and hearty good will to all Christian people.

When the flurry incident to the raising of a new question, among men of many diverse opinions has subsided, I feel sure the Church will we able to address itself to the work for which it was founded in a rather better condition than that it occupied before the Convention of 1907.

May we, of the Diocese of Virginia, be enabled to perform our part of that work faithfully, and with all Godly quietness.

To recur to matters connected exclusively with the Diocese, Rev. J. P. Tyler was Archdeacon four years, lacking eight months. At the end of that time much against his will, but from a high sense of duty, he took a parish in Maryland. Since his resignation, the Rev. E. S. Hinks has been chosen to fill the place and at first accepted the appointment with the finest spirit of self-devotion. Subsequently, doubtless just as unselfishly, his acceptance was withdrawn, and no one has been proposed since. It is a position which requires many rare qualities, and the results of the three and a half years of Mr. Tyler's encumbency of this office show what can be done by a man of good talents and fine character in the prosecution of this work.

A lack of time prevents me from going over the reports which Mr. Tyler sent me monthly since the last Council, but referring to the reports made and printed in the Journals, we note some remarkable results of his efforts. It might possibly be questioned whether the employment of a minister at the salary of \$2,000.00 and travelling expenses could be made to remunerate the Diocese in money, but upon reference to the Journals of 1905, 1906 and 1907, we find that in those years Mr. Tyler added to the salaries of clergymen, or raised for salaries in vacant parishes, \$2,225.00. During that time he received \$6,700.00. An investment of \$6,700.00, which pays \$2,250.00 annually is, in the language of the street, 33 1-3 per cent. investment. Even if \$240.00 of that were taken off, because we think that amount

might have been raised at any rate, the difference would leave a 30 per cent. investment. I repeat these figures and say them slowly because I found among the members of the Diocesan Missionary Society an inaptness in dealing with figures, which was somewhat startling and might have been attended with bad results. No one, I believe, would hesitate to say that if an investment in an Archdeacon pays us 30 per cent. annually for several years it is a very good investment. I hope these facts will be borne in mind, and I am sure that all fair minded friends of the work of the Church in the Diocese will be pleased to make a careful note of them.

Besides these results in raising money for the permanent help of feeble parishes. Mr. Tyler organized four Sunday-schools, which I am sure the Sunday-school Commission will consider admirable work; he also presided at the formation of seven parochial societies, for which I am sure, beyond question, those who come into the parishes thus strengthened will give him thanks. It is a good deal to have a man administer the Holy Communion in desolate places, which Mr. Tyler did on eighty-three separate occasions. All clergymen and especially those in distant country places such as he generally visited will realize that something eminently worth while was done in the preparation of twenty-one candidates for comfirmation. But besides all these things, one or two instances of a special form of service which falls to the Archdeacon will make plain the value of the office. In 1906, Mr. Tyler went to Northumberland county, went over the whole county, stayed for weeks at a time among the people, preached to them, visited their houses, and to my surprise and to their surprise, and I think certainly to the surprise of everybody to whom the statement was made, found in the county fifty communicants of our Church. In one part of the county of Northumberland there was a district in which a Colonial Church of large size once stood, in which, since the Revolutionary War there have been no Episcopal services with frequency, not to say regularity. In the district mentioned a school-house was

secured and the beginning of a congregation made. Soon confirmation was held there and a third point was secured for Church services in the county of Northumberland, making positively necessary the work of a regular minister, in that old parish. Half enough for the salary for said minister having been raised, a Deacon was sent to Northumberland, after the ordination of the last class at the Seminary, and Mr. L. C. Harrison had not been in the field more than three months before I received a letter from a prominent layman asking me to send somebody to help their minister because he was working himself to death. This new field, therefore, it may be said Archdeacon Tyler opened, or at least revived when it had seemed to be beyond resuscitation. The supply of a minister to Northumberland county set free the minister in Lancaster county for missionary work, which he was very anxious to do, and has resulted already in the building of a church in that county.

Again, Rev. Dr. McGill is working in the towns of Woodstock and Mt. Jackson. He bids fair to gain for the Church a hearing which perhaps she has never had in that vicinity. Dr. McGill is, I suppose, or was until a few weeks ago, regularly in charge of those two towns, both situated in blank parishes. The coming of Dr. McGill or anybody else to Woodstock and Mt. Jackson was made possible by the work of the Archdeacon. He went to those two places and it seemed that nothing could be done to bring their people together. He stimulated them into pledging a definite salary fairly adequate to their ability, and made possible their present promise of progress.

Still another instance, when St. Paul's, Goochland, was left without a Rector, the case would have been hopeless had the Bishop been obliged to attend to it without aid; efficient aid and aid which could be summoned at any time. As one of the gentlemen in that vicinity told me, Mr. Tyler in his visit to the church, made a personal visit to every member of it and to a good many other people who live in that neighborhood. He preached and talked to them. The promise of salary which was Bishop's Address.

made to him was much larger than had been given before and has been fully sustained. The position in which St. Paul's Church was put has enabled us to have at that point, at poor neglected little Bremo, and at Palmyra, the services of the Rev. David H. Lewis, which are reaching every family in the vicinity of the three centers of his laborious and his most highly valued ministrations.

And this is only a part of the record of the work done by an Archdeacon of this Diocese in a period of forty months. The figures of the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society call attention to the fact that the increase of communicants in the country parishes has been chiefly in the new places. The statement is correct if among the new places be included the revived old places which have been treated in a careful persistent way possible only when there is a man whose duty it is to give them fostering care as well as occasional ecclesiastical ministrations; and yet there are those who think that an occasional or semi-occasional visit of the parochial clergyman could accomplish the results. Some think the Bishop Coadjutor should do the same, some think that the Deans of Convocations, or if possible the visiting rector of a parish could build up the waste places; while there are those who imagine that a combination of these methods wisely and deliberately planned and managed by the Bishop, spending of course all his nights at home, and most of his days in the business of his office, ordering about his free and independent clergymen at his will like the commander-inchief of an army, would soon bring the Diocese to the condition of a well ordered province. These are my dear brethren, dreams, wells without water. The business of an Archdeacon is a distinct and well defined business of its own kind. There is necessity for it; there is a demand for it; make-shifts will not do. I want from you at this Council in view of all the circumstances of our case at this time a resolution similar to the one under which the Archdeacon was first appointed. Bishop to nominate, Diocesan Missionary Society to approve. Time limit one year. When I can

find the right man I shall, under the resolution of the Council, nominate him to the Diocesan Missionary Society to fill this place. The size of the salary may be fixed according to the ability of the Diocese, but a Diocese which has received as much money as this Diocese has received within the last year cannot refuse the necessary equipment to do its work without incurring the charge of negligence, selfishness and lack of the normal powers of sense perception.

I wish every man of this Council who has not done so would read, and I wish every man who has read would read it again, the chapter in Butler's Analogy in which he answers the objection of the Deists by showing them they are attempting to criticise a scheme imperfectly comprehended. In addition to the heavenly wisdom which it contains there is a great deal of very practical earthly wisdom. The mocking bird, sweetest of American singers, nesting in the flowering shrubs, says there is very little to be done in the grassy lawns and on the pavements about him, though he gets up early in the morning, but the hawk sitting silent on the lonely pine, sees many clearings in all directions around him, and is altogether of the opinion that in every one of them there is business for him which demands and will reward his attention.

Some two weeks ago I received from the Secretary of the Piedmont Convocation a copy of certain resolutions passed by that Convocation at a meeting at Manassas on April 30th. These resolutions I have had no opportunity of answering as the Convocation adjourned. Let me answer them now, and add a few words in my reply. Resolutions are as follows:

"Resolved, 1st. That this Convocation has observed with thankfulness and satisfaction the rapid growth of the Church's work in the Diocese."

Answer. The Bishop reciprocates the congratulations of the Convocation, and trusts that every member of the same will rise

to the full measure of his duty in sowing the good seed, and in planting and training the Church as it grows up.

"Resolved, 2nd. That in the judgment of this Convocation, for the relief of the Bishop as well as to meet the increasing demands of the Church, the time has come when the election of a Bishop Coadjutor is desirable."

Answer. The Bishop agrees fully with this judgment of the Convocation and promises his consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor as soon as the question has been deliberately studied and the plans for the support of such Bishop carefully made.

"Resolved, 3rd. That this Convocation stands ready, whenever the Bishop in his judgment sees fit to ask for a Coadjutor, to assume its just proportion of the added obligation which will be involved in providing for his support."

Answer. For this assurance the Bishop gives his thanks to the Convocation, and ventures to express an opinion that if the contingent fund is fully paid and the support to the Diocesan Missionary Society goes on increasing as it has done for some time, we will find ourselves able to take care of the Coadjutor without additional burden.

In pursuance of the resolution of the Piedmont Convocation, I shall be glad to appoint a Committee to inquire into the expediency and possibility of electing a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of Virginia; said Committee to report at the next Council, at which time, if their report is favorable, an election may be made.

One word in closing; when I came to this Diocese as Bishop I had in mind the methods employed in certain other Dioceses with which I was more or less acquainted, of doing missionary work and distributing money through the Convocations and Deaneries. It seemed to me that a good deal might be done in that way to stimulate missionary work in the Diocese. At my first Council, however, when I was presiding at Winchester, with

Bishop Whittle at my side, a discussion took place on the subject of Convocations, and the late lamented Rev. G. W. Nelson announced in unmistakable, indeed in thunderous tones, that the Convocations of this Diocese were and ought to be forever voluntary associations, untrammelled by any connection with the Diocese, and made up solely of those clergymen who elected to become members of the same. The Council accepted this dictum and acted on it, and I found it necessary to propose other measures to carry out the ends I had in view. I fell upon the plan of Archdeacon, and under that plan we have reached such success as has been ours. It will be hard to change it at any rate. When I think of the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, extending from Elliott's Knob to Point of Rocks, and remember that the work reaches all along that line and on both sides of the mountains, it seems simply impossible, unwise, fickle and inconsiderate to make a change. The same thing is true to some extent in the Alleghanies. It will be impossible to put the same head over them, to preside over both the Eastern and Western slope of the Blue Ridge unless, as in the case of the Archdeacon he has nothing else to do. We will, if it is desired that this question shall be investigated, appoint a committee to look into it.

ARCHDEACONRY OF THE BLUE RIDGE, DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

IVY DEPOT, VA., May 14th, 1908.

The Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, D. D., Bishop of Virginia:

My DEAR BISHOP.—The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge is at the present time, in a more satisfactory and flourishing condition than ever before in its history.

Since May 1st, 1907, three new clergy have been added to the working force, whilst another, the Rev. W. H. Darbie, has undertaken the charge of the work at Alberene, in connection with his other parish duties.

Our educational work has grown considerably, and during the past year, twelve schools have been in operation; ten of them being parochial, and two worked in connection with the county authorities.

Medical mission work has been still further developed; our various dispensaries connected with our Mission Houses having been of great as-

sistance to the people. The hospital at Lydia was opened last summer and a large number of out-patients have been treated there, and a few in-patients. It is expected that as the value of the institution is more fully realized by the people, its usefulness will be greatly increased.

The plan for the establishment of an Industrial School, in the mountains, which was referred to in last year's report has made considerable progress. Sufficient money has been already raised to justify the commencement of building operations this summer, and a location has been selected, in or near one of the mountain hollows, where a large number of children are to be found, from which a sufficient number of day scholars can be drawn to ensure success at the start. Provision will also be made for boarding pupils from a distance.

The Rev. George P. Mayo deserves great credit for the able manner in which he has brought this scheme to its present satisfactory stage of

A new venture is being made this summer, in the endeavor to open up the mountains of Madison county by the sending of a missionary into that region.

Another venture has also been made in the securing of a convenient and valuable piece of property in the town of Stanardsville, to serve as a home and headquarters for the missionary in charge of that large and important district. It is anticipated that the possession of a rectory in Stanardsville, will make it easier to keep a missionary in that field, and to fill the position, when vacant.

The finances of the Archdeaconry are in a very satisfactory condition, which is due principally to the assistance of a Virginia lady interested in the work, who by her active and self-denying efforts has been instrumental in raising the large sum of \$8,592.66, for the Archdeaconry Fund.

This sum, together with the money received from the Men's Thankoffering, and that raised for the Industrial School has enabled us to report receipts, as follows:

Of this balance \$6,291.00, belongs to the Industrial School Fund.

REPORT OF THE REV. JOHN MONCURE, D. D., ARCHDEACON OF THE COLORED WORK FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 1908.

Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, D. D.;

My Dear Bishop,—At the end of the year, notwithstanding the many perplexing features in the work as viewed by the Church at large, I am grateful to say that our work in the Diocese of Virginia, has presented positive proofs of God's blessing.

Recognizing in the colored work one of the many fields for activity in God's cause, such a statement is most natural.

Wherever people are, notwithstanding their location or condition, racial or otherwise, we are called to work and pray. Where the earnest effort is made for the spread of the Master's Kingdom, we have His promise to be with His worker, even unto the end of the world, and so if we do what is before us with prayer to God for guidance, there can be no doubt as to His blessing.

My first service for the Council year was at the Broadneck Reformatory for Colored Youth in Hanover county, which I visited on Ascension Day (May 9th, 1907). It was a large congregation, consisting of the officers and inmates of the institution, which assembled in the chapel. I read the service and preached.

On June 6, I attended the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School in Petersburg.

The institution is in good condition, and is prospering under the supervision of the Principal, the Rev. Dr. Bryan, and his efficient staff of professors.

On June 12th, the work at St. Paul's, Gordonsville, suffered a loss by the death of E. S. Jefferson, teacher in the school. He had been connected with the work for many years, and was a communicant of the Church. Soon after his death, I visited Gordonsville to rearrange the work

During the summer, arrangements were made for regular services at two points: St. Paul's, Gordonsville, and Grace Chapel, Essex. Sandy A. Morgan and John Scott, candidates for orders from our Diocese, were put in charge of these places.

Archdeacon Moncure's Report.

On June 20th, I preached to a good congregation in the Chapel of the Good Shepherd. Much good is being done here through the hearty interest of the Rev. Doctors Crawford and Wallis, combined with the earnest efforts of students of the Seminary.

On July 9th and 15th, I made special visits to sick colored people in Richmond, administering the communion in the first instance. In September, I conferred with Miss Edrington about her work in Stafford, which has been much strengthened by the new chapel. The Rev. E. B. Burwell, rector of the parish, has services here, from time to time, the chapel being opened every Sunday.

In the middle of September I went to Gordonsville, and arranged the work for the winter and spring. The school was put under the care of Sarah J. Reese, one of the teachers of the last session, and the services in charge of Sandy A. Morgan, of the Divinity School, who goes to Gordonsville twice a month to look after the work.

On September 18th, I attended the meeting of the Rappahannock Convocation at Aquia Church, Stafford, and made an address on the colored work, at the missionary meeting.

On September 26, in Washington, during the Convention of the Brother-hood of St. Andrew, I had a conference with the Rev. Joseph F. Mitchell on the work at Meade Chapel, Alexandria. This work has reached a very important stage. It is felt that the time has come for the erection of a larger and more substantial church building, as well as a rectory, and efforts are being made to that end.

The Rev. Wm. J. Morton, rector of Christ Church, under whose pastoral charge is this work, is much interested, and a committee consisting of Churchmen in Alexandria have the matter in hand. Subscriptions are being earnestly solicited.

With such a church plant assured, great good, under God's blessing, can be done at this important point.

During the General Convention some very interesting services were held in St. Philip's Church, Richmond, at one of which I was present and welcomed the Bishop of Liberia, who addressed the congregation.

On November 24th, in St. Paul's Church, Gordonsville, I baptized eight people, and presented four candidates, who were confirmed by the Bishop. Also assisted the Bishop in the services and celebration of the Holy Communion.

On January 18th, 1908, I visited the Broadneck Reformatory in Hanover, and after service delivered an address on confirmation. Also catechised the school, and found the scholars about as ready in answering the questions, as any I have ever known.

Archdeacon Moncure's Report.

On January 23d, I again visited this institution, and presented thirteen of the boys, who were confirmed by the Bishop. These boys had been instructed by the principal, Dr. J. H. Smyth, and another Churchman, who is teacher in the school.

On March 1st, I visited Grace Chapel, Essex. This is one of the very encouraging points in the Diocese. Its origin and progress are due, by the Grace of God, to the earnest efforts of the Rev. Thomas D. Lewis, who for years, during a period of bad health, labored for the upbuilding of this work against great difficulties. It is situated in a thickly populated colored district. A tasty and convenient chapel has been built, paid for and consecrated, and during the month of March the Bishop held the first confirmation within its walls.

The Rev. Mr. Lewis, happily for himself and the Church, has been restored to health, and has moved to a larger field, and the work at Grace Chapel will during the summer be in charge of a student from the Divinity School, working under the rector, Rev. Wm. N. Meade,

On March 14th, I again visited and preached at Broadneck, and on the 18th baptized the wife of the Superintendent.

On April 22d, at Manassas, I visited and addressed the very interesting colored industrial school there, and on the evening of the same day made an address on the colored work at the missionary meeting of the Piedmont Convocation. In addition to the foregoing incidents are to be noted the confirmation by our Bishop of nine candidates in St. Philip's Church, Richmond, and four in Christ Chapel, Clarke county. The latter formed the first class ever confirmed at this Mission, which owes its existence, through the grace of God, to Miss Hannah Williams.

One Postulant for Holy Orders, Orlando Thomas, of Gordonsville, has been received during the year, and he is now studying at St. Augustine's School, at Raleigh, North Carolina.

Dr. J. H. Smyth, of the Broadneck Reformatory, has signified his intention of applying for Holy Orders, so that as a perpetual Deacon he may the better minister to the spiritual needs of the hundreds of colored boys who are from time to time under his supervision. During the year the Archdeacon has received \$2,396.67 for the work in the Diocese. Of this, \$317.43 was from sources within the Diocese and the remainder from the Board of Missions, through the Bishop. With the support thus reccived the work at seven points has either been maintained or largely assisted.

Thereupon the Council adjourned to meet at 3:30 P. M. this evening.

WEDNESDAY, 3: 30 P. M.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment, the Bishop presiding.

AMENDMENT TO CANON VIII.

The Rev. L. R. Mason gave notice that on tomorrow he would offer the following Amendment to Canon VIII, and asked that it be made the order of the day for 3:30 P. M. tomorrow, and that it be referred to a committee consisting of two clergymen and two laymen:

CANON VIII.

Of the Fund for the Expenses of the Diocese.

The Council shall elect at each annual meeting a committee of three laymen, which shall be known as the "Committee on Finance." It shall be the duty of this committee at each annual meeting of the Council to estimate the probable amount necessary for the expenses of the Diocese for the ensuing year. This estimate shall be referred to a committee composed of two clergyman and three laymen, to be appointed at each annual session of the Council. Said committee shall assess each congregation of the Diocese for its proper proportion of said amount on the basis of its financial strength, which strength shall be determined by the ordinary running expenses of the congregation as reported in the Journal of the preceding year. This assessment shall be made known to the rectors and treasurers of the several congregations as soon after the adjournment of the Council as possible; and it shall be the duty of the vestries to see that such assessment is collected and sent to the Treasurer of the Diocese either quarterly, or at the annual Council as they may deem best. But be it,

Provided, 1st, That in no case shall such assessment exceed the amount that would be due from any congregation on the basis of one dollar a head per communicant.

Provided, 2nd, That each congregation shall have thirty (30) days in which to protest if they deem the assessment excessive or unequal, and to show cause why it should be reduced.

The fund thus created shall be known as the "Fund for the expenses of the Diocese," and shall be held by the treasurer of the Diocese for the purpose of defraying such Diocesan expenses as shall be authorized by the Council, or directed by the Committee on Finance.

It shall, also, be the duty of this committee to examine the accounts of

the treasurer, to report to the Council the financial condition of the Diocese, and to make such recommendations as they may deem necessary. And this Committee may, after the adjournment of the Council, authorize and require the payment of any such extraordinary and unforeseen expenses as may legitimately arise in the proper conduct of the business of the Diocese.

The committee to whom Rev. L. R. Mason's amendment to Canon VIII was committed, as appointed by the Bishop, consisted of Revs. L. R. Mason, John Y. Downman, and Judges A. W. Wallace and R. Carter Scott.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin offered the following amendment to the same Canon and asked its reference to the same Committee, which was accordingly done:

The Vestries of the several Parishes or churches shall pay to the Treasurer of the Diocese such sums as may be apportioned to them, respectively, for the purpose of defraying such expenses as may be authorized by the Council.

On motion of Rev. R. K. Massie the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Finance Committee be requested to report to this Council as to the propriety of paying two hundred dollars to Rev. E. L. Goodwin, Historiographer of the Diocese, for his work as Historiographer already done, and also of paying a yearly salary of one hundred dollars to the Historiographer, beginning with this conciliar year.

On motion of Rev. H. B. Lee, it was-

Resolved, That Article VIII of the Constitution be amended as follows: Strike out the words: "a Secretary shall be appointed who shall continue in office during good behavour," and insert: "A Secretary shall be appointed annually by the Council."

On motion it was ordered that said resolution be sent to the vestries of the several parishes for their action.

The Rev. R. A. Goodwin presented the Report of the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and the following resolutions, which were referred to the Committee on the Diocesan Missionary Society:

Resolved, That the following resolution be referred to the Committee of this Council on the Diocesan Missionary Society:

Report of the Registrar and Historiographer.

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society recommend to the Council that the report of the Treasurer of the Advisory Committee of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, or a synopsis thereof, be printed in the Journal of the Council.

Report of Virginia Prayer Book Distribution Society, presented by the Rev. Robert A. Goodwin, was referred to its proper committee.

The report of Miss Sallie Stuart, Secretary of the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, was presented by the Rev. W. J. Morton, and ordered to be printed in the Journal. (See Miscellaneous.)

The report of the Virginia Female Institute, now called "Stuart Hall," was read by the Rev. E. L. Goodwin, and ordered to be published in the Journal. (See Miscellaneous.)

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR AND HISTORIOGRAPHER.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin, Historiographer and Registrar of the Diocese, made his report which was received and ordered to be published in the Journal:

I was chosen by the last Council to fill the office of Registrar of the Diocese, under the new Canon creating such an officer. It is my duty to "receive and preserve, under the direction of the Council, books, papers and other documents bearing upon the history of the Church in the Diocese, and to perform such other duties as may be required by the Council." No provision has been made however for acquiring any such books, papers or documents, nor have any instructions been given me in the premises. I have laid aside for preservation a few pamphlets which have accidentally come into my possession, and am hoping to receive others. I would beg the clergy and others to send me copies of all publications bearing upon our history, whether past or now in the making, that they may be placed in a collection which may at some time be worthy of being styled a nucleus of the archives of the Diocese. Historical and memorial monographs, sermons and addresses, new or old, are especially desirable. But any published matter, however ephemeral, which may hereafter be of interest to the Diocese or to any parish or congregation is worthy of preservation; while publications of the same character which are old and rare, (and there Name of the Virginia Prayer Book Distribution Society Changed.

are many such in the lumber rooms of the old homes in the Diocese), have on that account an added value. Any such documents entrusted to the Registrar will be filed and cared for as the property of the Diocese.

As Historiographer I have answered many letters from within, and still more from without, the Diocese, and have been able to give some assistance and information to persons interested in the history of Virginia and of the Church. I have written four or five papers for the press, and have made three historical addresses. The time and study which these have cost I have contributed freely and with pleasure.

Our Canons require that "A list of the Parishes in the Diocese, and of the Separate Congregations therein, shall be appended to the Journal of each annual Council." At the request of the Secretary I prepared this list for the Journal of last year (pages 320 ff.). I think it may be accepted as a correct roll of the parishes and separate congregations entitled to representation in the Council.

Resolutions on General Clergy Relief Society.

On motion of Rev. W. M. Clark, it was-

Resolved, That No. VIII of the list of objects for which collections have been recommended by the Council on the 2nd page of the Journal be changed so as to read "The Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society of the Diocese of Virginia."

On motion of Rev. R. K. Massie, D. D., it was-

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed to examine the relations now existing between the General Clergy Relief Society and the various societies within this Diocese having the same or similar objects, and report what changes, if any, ought to be made in those relations; said report to be made to the next Council.

Further Resolved, That the officers of these societies be requested to furnish necessary information to aid the committee in its work.

The Bishop appointed the following said committee: Revs. R. K. Massie, T. C. Darst, J. Y. Downman, Mr. James Caskie and Judge R. Carter Scott.

On motion of Rev. R. A. Goodwin, it was-

Resolved, 1st, That the Council remind the ministers of churches in the Diocese that the Council recommends an annual offering for the General Clergy Relief Fund.

Resolved, 2nd, That the Council recommend Quinquagesima Sunday as the time for this offering.

On motion of Rev. John Y. Downman, it was-

Resolved, That the tabulated form of the parochial reports be omitted from the Journal as shown in pages 284 to 311 inclusive.

On motion of Rev. J. F. Coleman, the following was adopted:

WHEREAS, On page 39 of the Journal of 1907, two weeks record of the official acts of the Bishop, from May 18th to June 1st, have been omitted.

Resolved, That the omitted portion of the Bishop's report be published as addenda to the Journal of the Council.

On motion of Rev. W. M. Clark, it was-

Resolved, That it be made a matter of record that Messrs. Joseph Bryan, P. H. Mayo and James Caskie were elected a Committee on Finance by the Council of 1907.

Thereupon the Council adjourned till tonight at 8: 15 o'clock.

The Council sitting as a Board of Missions, the Bishop presiding. After a brief service by the Bishop, the Rev. R. A. Goodwin, Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Diocese Missionary Society, read its report:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

To the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia:

Brethren,—Your Executive Committee respectfully present their annual report.

There has been no change in the personnel of the Committee since our last Council, except that there is a vacancy caused by the resignation of Rev. J. Poyntz Tyler. The officers of the Committee are the same as last reported.

The receipts during the past year from Churches, Sunday Schools and other sources, have been \$10,491.77. This does not include what has been paid toward the salary of the Archdeacon from the Contingent Fund of the Diocese. Of this amount \$7,306.90, was received from the Churches, \$2,631.32 from Sunday Schools and \$553.55 from other sources. As compared with the financial statement made to the last Council we note an increase in contributions (not including the amount received from the Contingent Fund of the Diocese for either year,) \$736.19.

The increase from the Churches is \$446.07; from Sunday Schools, \$69.31; from other sources, \$220.81.

Our disbursements for the year past have been \$10,586.22. During the past year we have made appropriations to forty-nine missionaries. Of these four are candidates for Holy Order and forty-five are clergyman. The amounts appropriated have ranged from fifty dollars to five hundred dollars. These missionaries have labored in all parts of the Diocese. They have given the bread of life to thousands who, without your help, would have been deprived of their ministrations. Only one of our missionaries has died

during the year, Rev. George S. Somerville, rector of Falls Church, a devoted, earnest and faithful servant of Christ, who entered into rest on Ash Wednesday, 1908.

Your Committee feel deeply the necessity for a new church in the western part of Charlottesville, convenient to the University of Virginia, and have made an appropriation this year to the salary of Rev. H. M. McIlhany, whom the Bishop has appointed over this important field. A desirable lot has been purchased and nearly paid for, largely through the efforts of Mr. McIlhany.

Rev. J. Poyntz Tyler resigned as Archdeacon of the Diocese, December 1, 1907. Since that date the office has been vacant.

On the first of May there were seven parishes vacant which have been receiving aid from this Society.

Your Committee receives semi-annual reports from the Rev. F. W. Neve, Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge. He reports the work in his Archdeaconry as making steady and encouraging progress. During the past year there has been marked advance in the matter of the Industrial School and in other departments. The total receipts for the year, largely for the Industrial School, have been \$21,501.30. There are over 30 missionaries, clerical and lay, male and female. Of these your Executive Committee make appropriations to six, all clergyman.

At this time your Committee are aiding forty missionaries. Our present appropriations amount to \$9,557.00.

We would call attention to the fact that on the 14th of May, 1904, we had a balance (omitting cents), of \$5,043.

On May 13, 1905, the balance was \$3,142.

On May 10, 1906, the balance was \$2,979.

On May 10, 1907, the balance was \$1,787.

The receipts during the past four years show a very gratifying increase over those of the four previous years; but this increase has not been sufficient to offset the drain on the balance carried forward from year to year. The average receipts for the four years ending May, 1903, were \$7,620. The average receipts for the four years ending May, 1907, were \$9,517.

Notwithstanding this very gratifying increase in contributions, for the last four years we have been disbursing more money than we received, and have been steadily using up our balance. This balance is now small, and unless our receipts increase we will be obliged to retrench. This would mean withdrawing from promising fields, or reducing the too small salaries now paid to our faithful missionaries. We are assured that you do not desire and that you will not permit either of these things to be done; and as there is but one alternative, we confidently expect an increase in contributions.

Your Committee were agreeably surprised to learn from figures furnished

by the Historiographer of the Diocese, that during the ten years preceding May, 1907, notwithstanding deaths and the great number of removals to the towns and cities within and without the Diocese, that we have a net gain of 546 communicants in the old country churches and in new churches and missions. During these ten years the number confirmed in the Diocese was 6,465. The net gain in the Diocese was only 1,872, but of this gain 546 are in the old country churches and in church missions founded during these ten years. This would not have been possible but for the splendid work of the Diocesan Missionary Society. Our work is prospering all along the line. New fields are opening. Old fields are prospering. The Lord is with us. We must, we will go forward.

The Council met at 9:30 A. M. pursuant to adjournment, the Bishop presiding.

The Council was opened with prayer by Rev. J. W. Morris, D. D.

Resolution on Appointment of Archdeacon.

The minutes of yesterday's business session were read, but not approved, the same being deferred until the coming in of the report of the committee to which the resolution of the Rev. R. W. Forsyth, D. D., was referred.

The Rev. R. W. Forsyth, D. D., offered the following:

Be it resolved as the sense of this Council that the daily minutes of its proceedings must not be put upon their final record until they shall have been approved by the Council, so that the final official record may be a fair and accurate record without erasure or alteration of any sort, so that the rough minutes of the official record and the minutes printed in the Journal shall be identical.

After some discussion, on motion of Rev. Angus Crawford, D. D., the whole matter was referred to the following committee: Rev. R. W. Forsyth and Messrs. R. C. Wellford and Robert Beverly to report at the afternoon session.

BISHOP GIBSON CONCLUDES HIS ADDRESS.

The Bishop resumed the reading of his address and concluded it. (See pages 22-54.)

The Council adjourned for Divine service.

After Divine service the sermon was preached by the Rev. W. M. Clark, of St. James church, Richmond, from Daniel, vi. 10.

The Council reassembled for business.

On the motion of Rev. H. B. Lee, it was-

Resolved, That a committee of seven be appointed to consider and report upon that part of the Bishop's address which refers to the appointment of an Archdeacon, said report to be made immediately after the order of the day this afternoon is disposed of.

On like motion, it was ordered that the consideration of said resolution be made the order of the day immediately after the conclusion of the special order now set for 3:30 P. M. today.

Committee on Amendments of the Constitution of General Church.

On which motion the Bishop appointed the following committee: Revs. H. B. Lee, Dr. John Moncure, Robert A. Goodwin, J. Y. Downman, W. H. Burkhardt, Mr. H. C. Marchant and Mr. J. S. Mason.

Mr. W. W. Chamblin, the lay delegate from Shelburne Parish, read a resolution from the Vestry of St. James church, Leesburg, extending a cordial invitation to the Council to meet with them at its next annual session, and moved that the invitation be accepted.

The Rector, Rev. W. H. Burkhardt, warmly seconded the motion.

On motion of Rev. W. M. Clark the invitation was accepted and the motion carried.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMISSION.

Rev. G. Otis Mead presented the following report as Chairman of the Sunday School Commission, which was received and ordered to be printed in the Journal:

The Sunday School Commission of the Diocese makes its annual report

to the Council as to the work it has done during the year, also submits the report of the Standing Committee on Sunday Schools, which has been made a duty of the Commission.

Report of Sunday School Commission.

The Commission working under the six sub-committees into which it has been divided has made gratifying progress in inspiring and assisting our Sunday School workers throughout the Diocese. Under the supervision of this Commission, arrangements were perfected for the two days' Conference of Sunday School Workers, and the Sunday School mass meeting, together with the elaborate exhibit of Sunday School supplies and requisites, held in Richmond during the General Convention, at which time Sunday School work was brought before the Church more prominently than ever before in its history. One of the direct results of these conferences was the arrangement for a course of lectures on Teacher Training, which were so successfully conducted under the auspices of the Henrico Church Sunday School Institute in February.

The importance of Sunday School work was emphasized at the meetings of the various Convocations by members of the Commission, while the Secretary of the Commission was constantly in touch with the workers throughout the Diocese by correspondence.

A list of helpful books for the teachers was mailed to every Rector or Superintendent in the early part of the year, as well as the annual report of our Commission.

One hundred and sixty-two copies of the report of the Joint Commission on Sunday School Instruction, which was submitted to the General Convention in Richmond in October, 1907, was also mailed to the Rectors and Superintendents. This report, with the many valuable suggestions and recommendations therein, was the outcome of three years study of the conditions as they exist in our Sunday School by the most prominent leaders in Sunday School work in the Church. It is earnestly hoped that this report will be carefully read and studied by those receiving copies of same.

The correspondence of the Secretary and the work of the Commission necessitated the service of a stenographer and typewriter for part of the year. This lady acted as office secretary and made headquarters at the Episcopal Rooms, where she was always ready to answer questions and letters asking for Sunday School information. Sunday School workers were invited to come to examine exhibits of text books and requisites which was kept there, as the property of the Commission, and which contains samples of all the text books and teachers' helps mentioned in the curriculum. These books were arranged on display cards to be taken to the Convocations by different members of the Commission. The office

secretary made a correct list of the Sunday Schools and Sunday School Superintendents in the Diocese, and gathered all the statistics possible regarding the schools for the future use of the Commission. She also took charge of the Bishop's Advent Fund, which the Commission had inaugurated last year in the Sunday Schools, sending out mite boxes to the different Sunday Schools who applied for same. The result of this special Advent offering from the schools towards Church Extension was very encouraging, forty Sunday Schools contributing \$270.22. The literature which is necessary to send out from time to time, the questions to be answered, and the interest to be aroused in Sunday School work would justify the employment of an office secretary during the whole year. Three hundred and fifty-three copies of the revised curriculum were sent out to the different schools-the Curriculum Committee finding it necessary to issue a new edition of 2,000 copies, the first edition being exhausted. The Commission feels that the religious instruction of the youth of the Church needs a great deal more attention, not only in the way of better methods for the limited Sunday School instruction, but also that supplementary religious instruction should be given at certain periods of the year, on part of some week-day say during the seasons of Advent and Lent.

The work of the Commission is considerably crippled by want of funds or the proper financial support. For the two years the Commission has been in operation, there has only been appropriated by the Council \$200.00, and through pledges and other contributions, \$197.35, making a total for the two years, \$397.35. This amount was disbursed as follows:

Considering the amount of correspondence, the Sunday School literature circulated, and the work done by the Commission in the last two years in stimulating interest, and the practical results accomplished, the amount expended is very small. It is hoped by the Commission that the Church will recognize her responsibility to her children, and give at least to this branch of the work a sufficient amount to employ either a field secretary or

a permanent office secretary. Our Sunday School workers are doing noble service for the Church, and in the efforts for the children they should be encouraged and helped, certainly to this extent.

The Commission would strongly urge the observance of the days of intercession for Sunday Schools in the month of October, requesting special sermons wherever possible on the importance of Sunday Schools and the religious education of those committed to their care.

It will be seen that our expenditures for the past year have exceeded our receipts by \$900.00 which has been borrowed from the City Bank of Richmond, less the balance of \$40.34 remaining in bank to the credit of the Treasurer.

This deficiency is explained principally by the payment which have been made to complete the purchase of the Bishop's residence and to practically reconstruct the plumbing in the building, all amounting to \$2,996.25. There was also paid on account of assessment for expenses of the General Convention \$270.00. The ordinary expenses of the Diocese vary but little from those of the preceding year, but the extraordinary expenses were an unusual burden.

From the year 1906 we carried over to 1907 a surplus of \$1,082.85. From 1907 we carried to 1908 \$207.00, while after borrowing \$900.00 we have a balance to carry next year of only \$40.34.

The amount paid on account of the Contingent Fund was \$189.58 less for the last than for the preceding year. If the increase of communicants is to be taken as a measure of expected receipts the amount returned should have been greater.

The Treasurer reminds your committee that the amounts authorized to be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society for the Archdeacon's salary are behind \$500.00 for the year ending May 1, 1907, and \$333.00 up to December 1, 1907, when the Archdeacon resigned. These sums will remain a liability until the Treasurer of the Council is in funds sufficient for their payment.

This general statement of deficiencies is to be offset by the encouraging fact that we have finished paying for the Bishop's residence, to which object

we have annually for three years past appropriated \$2,500.00 of principal and the current interest. This accomplishment will give us sensible relief hereafter. Our ordinary receipts from Contingent Fund payments is about \$8,500.00; our ordinary expenses are about \$5,500.00, so we have about \$3,000.00 for extraordinary purposes. This year we will have \$900.00 of debt due at bank to pay out of this assumed surplus, the balance due on the Archdeacon account is \$833.00, to be paid in the same way, making a total of \$1,733.00 In any case, however, we may hope to close the coming fiscal year with all debts paid and have a normal surplus to our credit unless some very large and unexpected claims are put upon our treasury.

Your committee have ascertained from the printer of the Journal of the Council that the cost of the Journal may be reduced about \$175.00 by omitting the Financial statistics in the reports of the several parishes and churches and using only the tabulated statement of this information prepared by the Rev. J. H. Dickinson Your committee is informed and believe that the repetition of this information in the parochial reports is superfluous and they recommend that this change be made, and they further recommend that the Treasurer pay the sum of \$75.00 to the Rev. J. H. Dickinson for his services in preparing this statement and his necessary expenses.

Your committee recommend the continuation of the envelope system used in the collection of the Contingent Fund and that they be distributed as heretofore by the Secretary and the cost paid by the Treasurer, and that this method of aiding the collection of the Contingent Fund be made a standing order of the Council.

Your committee recommends that the sum of \$300.00 be paid the Bishop for an office and for such clerical assistance as he may require.

Goodwin, Historiographer of this Diocese, the sum of \$200.00 for work which he has already done and for which he has received no compensation, and further proposing to pay the Historiographer a yearly salary of one hundred dollars, beginning with this conciliar year, respectfully report as follows:

They recommend the payment of two hundred dollars to the Rev. E. L. Goodwin for services already rendered for several years past, but they are unwilling to recommend the establishment of a regular salary to be attached to the office of Historiographer; they are of opinion that the services of the Historiographer should be paid for from time to time as the Council may deem proper. los. BRYAN.

Resolved, That the report of the Finance Committee be amended by striking out the recommendation to omit the printing of the Parochial Reports from the Journal.

Resolved, That the supplementary report of the Finance Committee relating to the payment of salary to the Historiographer of the Diocese be adopted, and that the Treasurer be and hereby is directed to pay two hundred dollars (200.00) to the Rev. E. L. Goodwin, Historiographer as recommended in that report.

On motion of Dr. L. M. Blackford, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, It is understood that the Bishop of the Diocese proposes soon to visit England, heading the deputation from Virginia to the Pan Anglican Congress of Missions in London, and later to take his seat in the Lambeth Conference, and whereas this is believed to be the first occasion in our history on which the Diocese has been formally represented in any such meeting in the mother Church; it is hereby resolved:

- I. That this Council desires to record its satisfaction that the Diocese is to be so represented and its pleasure that our beloved Bishop, after so many years of labor, is to enjoy a period of adequate rest and refreshment.
- II. That it is the sense of the Council that a contribution (not exceeding \$500.00) such as in the judgment of the Finance Committee is appropriate be made from the funds of the Diocese toward the Bishop's expenses.

On the reading of the resolutions the Bishop vacated the chair. calling Rev. H. B. Lee thereto.

On motion of Rev. W. M. Clark the first resolution was adopted. and 2nd under the rules was referred to the Finance Committee which reported favorably on the same and recommended that \$500.00 be paid by the Treasurer of the Council to the Bishop towards defraying the expenses of his visit to England.

The Bishop then resumed the chair.

On motion of Rev. R. A. Goodwin the vacancy created in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society by the

On the call for Reports of Standing Committees the following made their reports:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON INCREASE OF THE MINISTRY.

Rev. R. W. Micou, D. D., Chairman of the Committee on Increase of the Ministry, read the following report, which was adopted:

The last General Convention report on the state of the Church shows that the parochial reports indicate an increase of \$375,000 for religious, charitable, and educational purposes. "The endowment of hospitals, orphanages and other institutions of the Church are greater by five and a quarter million dollars. The invested wealth of the Church is over nine million dollars more than it was three years ago.

"We regret to report that the number of deacons ordained during the past three years was less by twenty-two, and that the number of candidates for Holy Orders is less by forty-one, than it was three years ago. This presents to the Church a most serious condition, and one which calls at once for action upon the part of both laymen and clergy.

As we read these words, we cannot but ask ourselves: "What avails this vast stream of beneficence for the minds and bodies of men, if the supply of the special servants of the Lord who minister to the heart and soul, transmitting the material gifts into spiritual grace, is failing. Here especially is it true that the gift without the giver is bare!"

The subject is vast and many-sided. We can only indicate a few of the main elements which seem most responsible for the conditions which confront us to-day and which admit of remedy,

First, we must place the apparent—for surely it is only apparent—indifference of the clergy themselves, as manifested in the scarcity of the sermons preached on this subject. Candidates for Orders frequently remark at the Seminary that they never heard a sermon calling their attention to the claims on men of the ministry of the Gospel. It is hardly to be expected that men should be eager to enter on a calling whose representatives make no efforts to induce others to walk in their footsteps.

We feel assured that if there could be a wide, if not a general agreement, that each rector should preach yearly at some Ember Season on Report of Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

the high honor and dignity of the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the abundant opportunities for the noblest service of men which it affords; many young men throughout the vast expanse of the Church would be moved, as were the prophets of old, to say "Here am I! Send me." The waiters idly in the market place were not blameworthy if they could truly say, "No man hath hired us."

Somewhat the same spirit seems to pervade the laity, if we may judge by the studied omission of the subject of the Christian ministry from the topics brought before the annual meetings of the St. Andrew's Brotherhood, attended by thousands of impressionable young men. One cannot but feel that it was meant to be a layman's movement and any plea for the ministry would be out of place! We are glad to know that there has been a change in this respect and that the Junior Brotherhood is exerting its influence not only to bring men to Christ, but still farther to give themselves wholly to Him and His gospel.

Another serious symptom of the changed attitude of the laity toward the clerical calling is painfully apparent in the great reduction in the amounts contributed to the important work of the education of Divinity students. Few as the candidates now are, it is increasingly difficult to support them at the Seminary and still more at college. Our own Educational Society, one of the very earliest in the United States, suffers with the rest. We now have to refuse any aid whatever to men at college.

Business men are not consistent here. They desire an educated ministiv and they know that all candidates cannot be rich, yet they oppose the giving of aid during the college and seminary courses which the Church requires, on the ground that such aid pauperises them, deprives them of self-respect, helps men too lazy to help themselves, fills our ranks with inferior men. To which, for reply, we point to the strong and goaly men who for seventy years have gone forth from the old Semilary at Alexandria.

But it is a common error to suppose that Divinity Schools are the only offenders in this matter. All colleges have means for helping deserving students, and it was stated recently, apparently on authority, that the majority of the present senior class at Princeton received more or less aid and that only seven paid their whole expenses. Both Harvard and Yale have special funds for such use.

We do not believe that the small salary of the average minister deters many whose young hearts are once roused to follow Christ, but we must admit that there are very many parish clergy who suffer such distress and anxiety through unbusiness-like methods which result in irregular Report of Committee on Clerical Support.

payments of their small stipends that they do sometimes advise young men not to face the debts and burdens which have wearied them. But this is certainly capable of amendment and the smaller the parish the greater the need of reform.

But the most potent and pervasive of all the forces working against the spiritual aspect of life is the subtle materialism and the undisguised worldliness of the age.

We need not speak at length of this evil which saddens our hearts by its very frankness. At a crowded gathering at a college commencement, a lady, the wife of a wealthy Presbyterian Elder, was overheard to say, "My son is eager to enter the ministry, but I will never consent! You know there is no money in that."

In such an atmosphere faith must wither and aspirations die of inanition. We must look to the many households where rule higher standards and nobler aims than mere wealth and social estimates for the fresh young hearts eager to follow the Lord and serve their brother men. It is from the quiet peace and content of the God-fearing homes of our clergy, especially in the country, that we must look for our main supply of earnest candidates for orders, and in Virginia at least, that source never fails entirely.

The outlook, we admit has serious, not to say alarming, aspects. It calls for searchings of heart on the part both of clergy and laymen. The fields are white for the harvest—but the laborers are few. But the greater our perplexity, the more eager should we be to lay it before the Lord of the Harvest, praying for the wisdom that can guide and persuade, and for the spirit that can speak in season and win the hearts of Christian parents and give to God, not only their gold and silver, but their sons and daughters to the glad service of their loving Lord.

their clergymen. We recognize the fact, however, that the high cost of living still obtains, and instead of any relaxation of effort on the part of the people, we would urge the individual members of the congregation, as well as the vestries, to re-double their energies in order to increase the salary of their clergymen to an adequate amount, especially do we urge this in the country parishes. That this may be effected it is the recommendation of your Committee that the country parish select a deputy treasurer, and that this office be filled by an active, energetic woman, who shall be chosen by the vestries with the approval of the rector and treasurer. It is our belief that such an assistant will not only help and inspire the treasurer to collect the salary pledged, but will in addition

thereto materially effect the congregation and vestry in increasing the salary of their rector.

We would further emphasize the fact, that supplies of every kind, such

as nearly every farmer raises, are the equivalent of money, and that contributions of this kind go far towards helping him to live on the salary he now receives, and we would urge the vestries toward a practical plan

of establishing such a custom in their parish.

Your Committee is impressed with the fact that the young clergy have stuck to the rough places, and we believe their earnest efforts will meet with a response from the poor people to whom they minister and that they will never be allowed to suffer, that while their youthful energies are bent towards building up new fields which clergymen with large families cannot take, they should have the satisfaction of knowing that they are laying the foundation for a life that will stand them in good stead in the future.

Your Committee heartily endorses the report of this Committee made to the 112th Council to be found on pp. 67, 68 and 69, of the Journal, with the exception that the reports of the treasurers of the various parishes are not made as clear and full as they should be. In order that the reports may be satisfactory the treasurer should answer each and every question demanded in the report, and the treasurers should send in their reports promptly and regularly.

Sixty-three out of ninety-one parishes send reports, one only reports a deficit in the payment of the salary amounting to \$56.50; one has paid \$107.00 more than it pledged.

We are pleased to report the following Churches as insured against fire: Christ Church, Alexandria for \$15,000.00; Falls Church, \$2,500.00; Abingdon Church, \$7,500.00; Fork Church, Hanover County, \$2,500.00; St. Paul's, King George County, \$1,000.00; Aquia Church, \$2,500.00.

Your Committee feel that all of these valuable Churches should have every possible safe-guard about them, so call the attention of their several vestries to the importance of having them insured.

More than twenty years ago our Diocese lost a splendid Colonial Church in Richmond County by fire.

From various causes in the past one hundred and twenty-five years, we have lost many of the Churches, so we should guard most carefully the few that remain.

Your Committee will be glad for information about these Churches; about those that have passed into other hands, and as to Churches that have taken the place of Colonial Churches.

Again we recommend that the spots where once a Colonial Church or chapels of ease stood, be marked by some friend of the Church, and that such information as can be obtained be furnished your Committee to go upon record.

We are glad to report that trustees have been appointed to hold Church property in Petsworth Parish, Gloucester County, and that the Hon J. N. Stubbs and his family are about to convey the title of the site of old Petsworth Church and burying ground back to the Protestant Episcopal Church. The deed lacks the signature of an absent member of the family before the conveyance can be made. This member is expected in a few days, when the transaction will be completed.

Report of Committee on the State of the Church.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Rev. E. B. Burwell, Chairman of the Committee on State of the Church, read the following report:

At the last meeting of the Council held in the town of Warrenton where, in the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, coming events cast their shadows before, the Church in the Diocese of Virginia, was confronted with many and grave responsibilities pending the meeting of the General Convention in the city of Richmond. The duties which she had to perform in this connection were not only many, but some of them, no doubt, perplexing. As the birth-place of the Colonial Church upon American soil, the eyes of the whole Church would be focussed upon her, and watch with keenest interest the part she would play in celebrating the great historical events which had taken place within her borders. With the Jamestown Exposition near Norfolk, and the General Convention sitting in the city of Richmond, she would become the centre of attraction, not only at home, but abroad. Dignitaries and high officials from the Mother Church were to become her guests. As the daughter, she was to play the part of hostess to the mother. But as she has always met every emergency and overcome every difficulty in the past, so in the discharge of this new duty and high privilege, she did it, and did it well. But while much was expected of her she had much to gain in return. Here, for the first time in her history in this country, the whole Church would be brought to see and realize that the great tower of strength, which she to-day is in the land, and the great influence she wields in the political, social and religious world was once cradled in the faith and hopes of the first settlers who came to Virginia. May these high privileges and noble duties, so faithfully discharged in the past, ever be an incentive to her zeal and future progress.

There are many important subjects in connection with the work of the Church in the Diocese of which much might be said, but, in so limited a space as this, we must pass by many of them and confine ourselves to those of seemingly greatest importance.

Turning our attention first to the Bishop's address to the Council, it is gratifying to note that it indicates marked progress in the work of the Church throughout the Diocese, and furnishes us with just grounds for the commendation of his faithful and untiring labors for the upbuilding of the Church. Faithful to every call of duty, he has gone into the high-ways and hedges, from the mountain peak to the valley gorge, where the foot of a Bishop of this Church never before trod, or the

sound of a Bishop's voice was never before heard. May his years of service and usefulness to the Diocese be many.

His report as compared with that made to the Council last year, shows great activity and energy on the part of the Bishop, as well as that of the whole Church in the Diocese in all her departments of labor. We note, however, a slight decrease in the number of confirmations reported this year, which may be accounted for when we remember that the General Convention met in this Diocese during the past Council year, and for that reason that unusual demands were made upon the time and services of our Bishop.

It should be with profound gratitude to Almighty God, and in humble acknowledgement of His many mercies, that of the number of faithful workers in this portion of his vineyard, we have to chronicle the death of but one. Of the true character and genuine worth of this man, the Bishop has befittingly spoken in his address to the Council.

We are glad to note farther that there are fewer vacancies in the Diocese at present than there have been for years, and that the probability is that some of these will be filled in the near future.

The work of the statistician of the Diocese is highly commended by your Committee for its efficiency, and the ease with which it enables the Church to see at a glance its state or condition. When we think of the bungling and altogether unreliable reports of past years, made so necessarily, from the system under which they were tabulated, we have every reason to be thankful for the present system. From this report of the statistician we gather that the communicant list of the Diocese now reaches the highwater mark of over thirteen thousand, and that the report is the most complete and satisfactory one ever before made to the Council. All of which indicates that the Church is fully alive to its duties and responsibilities.

To another feature of the Church's work we turn, namely, the Sunday-school—the children—the future of the Church in embryo, so to speak, and we do not know of a more important subject that demands her most serious consideration and her best efforts at the present time. With her reported list of more than ten thousand children now receiving instruction in her Sunday-schools, together with over eleven hundred officers and teachers, and their liberal contribution of some twenty-six hundred dollars to the cause of Diocesan Missions last year. We think the Church has just reason to be proud of the work she is doing for the uplift and betterment of her children. While she is truly beginning, we believe, to awaken herself to her duties and responsibilities along this line, and while

in many of our city churches the work of the Sunday-school is well organized and working along lines that will be productive of great future good to the Church, yet much remains to be done, especially in our country parishes. Here we have many problems to face and conditions to meet which are almost, if not wholly, unknown to our city churches. To many of these problems the Sunday-school Commission of the Diocese is now addressing itself and seeking to solve. We bid it God-speed, trusting to the wisdom and discretion of the Church to devise means to accomplish the desired end.

Before closing this report we would call special attention to the missionary work in the Diocese. The report of the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society, we are glad to say, shows great progress in missions, and the excellent reports coming from our missionary fields, as given by the young men of the clergy, show a zeal, and an enthusiasm awakened, which will doubtless be productive of great good to the Church in the future. In view, therefore, of the excellent work, which is being done throughout the Diocese by this Society, we would again emphasize the importance of sustaining its hands by calling upon the members of the Church, both clerical and lay, to continue their offerings so willingly and freely made to this cause in the past. We cannot, in detail, go into the work of this Society, but those of our brethren who labor in the missionary fields of the Diocese, can cheerfully testify to its efficiency and good works. As an illustration of the truth of this statement we might refer, in conclusion, to the progress of the Church in the mountainous section of the Diocese, to the admirable work which is being done there under the fostering hand of this Society by such men as Archdeacon Neve and the Revs. Mr. Ellis and George Mayo, and their corps of faithful assistants. Here truly the wilderness and the solitary place has been made glad for them, and the desert has been made to rejoice and blossom as the rose. In many places in this section, where only a few years ago the Church was wholly unknown, now the people have the gospel preached to them, and flourishing missions and schools have been established with others soon to follow. It should be with great delight and enthusiasm for Diocesan Missions that the Church should learn of her more than thirty clerical and lay workers now in this once desolate and seemingly hopeless field, and that the almost incredible sum of over twenty-one thousand dollars has been raised during the past year for missions, a sum twice as large as that raised in the whole Diocese for the same purpose in the same period of time. To both the clerical and lay workers who have labored so faithfully and untiringly in this as well as in other difficult porOld Parish Records.

tions of the Lord's vineyard, may the Church ever give her praise and most loyal and hearty support.

Resolved, That this Council heartily approves of this undertaking, and earnestly commends it to the sympathy and generous support of the church.

On motion of R. A. Goodwin, it was-

Resolved, That when an Archdeacon of the Diocese shall be appointed his duties shall be assigned by the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Rev. John Moncure, D. D., offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Council be extended to the rector, wardens and vestry of St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, for the use of their church, the Church people and others of the city for their delightful hospitality; the pages for their kindly services; the railroads and members of the press for their courteous attentions, and all others who have contributed to the success of its meetings and that the congratulations of the Council be extended the rector and his people for the beautiful adornments of their church.

Adjourned sine die.

On motion, it was resolved that after the reading of the minutes and prayer by the Bishop, the 113th Council adjourn sine die.

After the minutes were read, the hymn, "Blest be the tie that binds," was sung, prayer was offered by the President, and the Council adjourned sine die.

Form for Making Bequest.

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not," is "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

The funds already created and now held by the said corporation, are:

- 1. The Disabled Clergy Fund,
- 2. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund,
- 3. The Episcopal Fund,
- 4. The Bruce Fund,
- 5. The St. Andrew's Fund.

All devises or bequests to any of the said funds should be made to "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Virginia, for the sole use and Benefit of the——Fund [naming the fund intended], now held in trust by the said corporation."

If it is desired to create a new fund for any Church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its President, Rt. Rev. Robert A. Gibson.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary of Virginia is: "The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary and High School in Virginia;" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia is: "The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia;" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia;" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg, Va., is: "The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School in Virginia;" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequests: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia, March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."
