St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, Wednesday, December 16, 1908, 10 A. M.

A Special Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia, assembled at the above place and time, in accordance with a call issued by the Bishop of the Diocese on the 23d of October last.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. P. P. Phillips, rector of the church.

After Divine Service the Council was called to order by the Bishop.

A quorum in both orders having answered to their names the Bishop declared the Council organized and appointed the following Committee on Credentials: The Rev. E. B. Burwell, Mr. W. C. Marshall and Judge R. Carter Scott.

The Rev. P. P. Phillips moved that all visiting clergymen and Theological students, and the ministers of this city, be invited to seats on the floor. Carried.

He also moved that the Council shall take a recess from 1.15 to 2.45 P. M. Carried.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

The Bishop then read the following address:

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Virginia:

We have met in this old city of Alexandria and in this house of God to elect a Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese, who shall be a Bishop in the Church of God. It is a deeply religious matter. It is a business of weight and moment. Let us realize fully that it involves on our part solemn responsibility.

Let me say a word to you first about the Diocese—its condition and prospects. The request which I made to the last Council for a Bishop-Coadjutor was not forced from me by any outside demand, but was made deliberately and in full view of the conditions which confront us. That request as you will remember was based on the extent of the work now required in the field, and was emphasized by the expression of the hope on my part that the election of the Bishop-Coadjutor might result in an increasingly vigorous prosecution of the task allotted to us as a Diocese of the Church. Many of the clergy have in several ways expressed a wish that the election

should not be deferred even until the next Council. I have called this Council chiefly because I have thought that the election could be better held in a gathering of the Diocese which had no other business to transact, but the desire of the clergy in Richmond, at the Seminary and at other points I have visited, reinforced by the action of the Standing Committee, has removed apparent difficulties out of the way, and, as far as so large a body can be committed, has committed the Diocese to the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor at this time.

In preparing this address I have gone over the counties of the Diocese of Virginia one by one and made an enumeration as close as possible of the churches, chapels and school-houses in which I have confirmed, together with the churches which are now almost ready to take their place on our list of consecrated buildings. The number of such buildings is two hundred and twenty-five, and these with the private confirmations which take place every year will make approximately two hundred and fifty places where the rite of laying on of hands must be administered if the best interests of the Diocese are to be cared for. You will see at once that a visitation of all these places, if one day was given to each, would cover a little more than two-thirds of the year. That number of visitations allows nothing for the distances which must sometimes be travelled to reach the various places. If these were taken into account I can safely say that fully three-fourths of the days in the year would be occupied in the annual visitation of churches, chapels and places of preaching. The expenditure of so much time, you will understand, is quite impossible for one who must attend meetings of Boards, Committees, Conventions, Conferences, Special Ordinations and timely Consecrations of Churches.

But the task of administering the Diocese of Virginia is made much larger than these statements would indicate by the recent legislation of our General Convention. If one were always away from home a systematic answer of letters would be impossible. To say nothing of a miscellaneous correspondence, the filling of one parish often involves five or six such letters, but under the Bishop's Address.

recent legislation to which I have referred not only must letters dimissory be promptly attended to by one who has his office books and blanks at hand, but the instituting of each new rector demands correspondence never required before; church wardens of the parishes securing new rectors must be reminded, often more than once, of the laws which concern them; requests for leave to officiate in parishes even on the part of our own clergy have been referred to the Bishop as never in the old times; all cases of divorce, with their complications and their attendant letters and telegrams are now in the Bishop's hands, and consultation with a lawyer in each case is imperatively demanded; churches which are closed by their rectors have the right of appeal to the Bishop and must be attended to, and all questions arising under Canon 19 must also be settled by the same official. Most of these requirements are quite new. None of the Bishops of the Diocese have had them to handle until this duty fell to the lot of the present incumbent.

I am satisfied too that no man in the Diocese has the slightest idea of the amount of work outside of correspondence required in filling vacant parishes, securing for the new encumbent a living salary, and providing for missionary fields where nothing can really be done of any permanent value without the presence of a settled minister. Thanks to your foresight and generosity in providing for me a competent person to work in this field, I have the supreme pleasure of informing this Council that for the third time since I have been Bishop the Diocese is practically filled. Two or three points are still vacant, but the conditions have so greatly improved that we have good hope these vacancies will not continue very long. Following the plan suggested by experience in the case of Archdeacon Neve, I have divided the Diocese in my own mind into missionary districts similar to his, and anticipate such success in setting the missionary work of the Church before those who are willing to befriend it that our revenues for that purpose will be greatly increased, and the advantages due to such increase distributed over all parts of the Diocese. Let me give you my profound thanks, my brethren, for standing by me as you have done in this

matter. You have trusted me sometimes rather tremblingly but yet generously. I have notified the present Archdeacon, Rev. A. Vaughan Colston, that his services will not be required after the 1st of April, as I think it not probable that the consecration of the Bishop-Coadjutor can be delayed much beyond that time. Mr. Colston's work together with other matters connected with the administration of the Diocese will be detailed to you at the Annual Council.

Notwithstanding the fact that our clergy list now numbers one hundred and four, I trust, with the help of the Bishop-Coadjutor and the arrangements which I am hastening to consummate, to be able to carry on the work of the Diocese without the help of any functionary who will be dependent upon our missionary funds for a large salary.

Perhaps it will be best for me at this point to say, as I must say in writing, what work I propose to assign to the Bishop-Coadjutor. My purpose is to give my brother, who I trust will be a member of my official family, the charge of visiting all parishes of the Diocese twice in three years, if it is possible for him to do so. I shall ask him to speak for Diocesan Missions at each of his services and take an offering for the same. I shall look to him moreover for aid in filling vacant parishes.

Now as we go to the work for which we have been called, let us do so with a calm resolve that our every word and action shall be agreeable to our character as religious men, to our faith in the living and present Christ, and to our high sense of accountability to our Father in Heaven who knows the hearts of men and judges righteously. The work before us may possibly be trying, but we have undertaken it in the fear of God. We have as a Diocese pledged ourselves to it, and called upon the whole Church throughout the length and breadth of this land to endorse it, and if I may say so, to witness our efforts to make this day's business a success. Let nothing be hurried, and especially let nothing be needlessly delayed.

Sundry Resolutions-Report of Committee on Credentials.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin moved that the Rules of Order of the last Council be adopted as the Rules of Order of this Council as far as applicable. Carried.

Mr. James Caskie offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Committee of seven be appointed by the Bishop, which Committee shall be selected from the various sections of the Diocese, at least one member to come from each Convocation, who shall ascertain and report at the next regular meeting of this Council to be held next May in Leesburg,

1st. As to the necessity of a Bishop-Coadjutor for this Diocese.
2nd. As to the ability of the Diocese to meet the expense of said office.

The Rev. J. W. Ware offered the following as a substitute:

Resolved, That this Council proceed at once to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.

Both of these resolutions were withdrawn temporarily, and, on motion of Judge J. K. M. Norton, it was

Resolved, That the Finance Committee, or such of them as are present report forthwith to the Council whether the Diocese can or can not support a Coadjutor-Bishop, and if not, why not.

Mr. James Caskie, for the Finance Committee, made an informal statement as to the financial condition of the Diocese.

The hour of 1.15 having arrived, the Council took a recess.

At 2.45 P. M., the Council was again called to order.

The Committee on Credentials reported that the roll of Lay Delegates as called by the Secretary was found to be correct, with the exception of the Delegate from St. John's Church, Langley, who was not entitled to a seat, inasmuch as there was no evidence before them that St. John's was a separate congregation.

The report was accepted.

Salary of Bishop-Coadjutor Fixed.

Mr. James Caskie offered again his resolution which was read this morning.

On motion, Mr. Caskie's resolution was laid on the table. Ayes 77, Noes 30.

The Rev. J. W. Ware then renewed his motion that the Council proceed at once to the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor, which was carried.

Dr. L. M. Blackford offered the following:

WHEREAS, In the selection of a Bishop it is of paramount importance that before the casting of the vote which is to determine the result there should be an unbiased interchange of opinion among members of this body, and whereas such interchange can in no way be so efficiently made as by preliminary ballot, be it

Resolved, 1. That before the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor by this Council in the manner provided by the Diocesan Canon, three preliminary ballots without nomination be made, the clergy and laity voting alternately.

- 2. That the result of each ballot when taken, after being announced to the house, shall be posted in full view, one after another and remain so posted throughout the balloting in sight of all present.
- 3. That with a view to taking the action proposed in the foregoing resolution, the house do now go into Committee of the Whole.

It was moved that Dr. Blackford's resolutions be laid on the table.

Carried. Ayes 65, noes 39.

Judge J. K. M. Norton moved that the salary of the Bishop-Coadjutor be fixed at three thousand dollars per annum, with six hundred dollars for house rent, his travelling expenses also to be paid.

Under the rules this was referred to the Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee reported, through Mr. Caskie, that the sums named in Judge Norton's resolution were the minimum

amount which should be offered to a Bishop-Coadjutor, though they were in doubt where the means were to come from.

Judge Norton's resolution was then adopted.

The Rev. R. K. Massie, D. D., moved that nominations for the office of Bishop-Coadjutor be now in order, nominating speeches being limited to ten minutes and seconding speeches to five minutes.

It was moved as an amendment that no nominating speeches be made, which was lost.

Mr. G. G. Minor moved that all nominating speeches be limited to five minutes. Carried.

Dr. Massie's motion as thus amended was adopted.

The Rev. J. Y. Downman, D. D., nominated the Rev. Arthur S. Lloyd, D. D.

Dr. Lloyd's nomination was seconded by Judge A. W. Wallace, Mr. Thos. Poindexter and the Rev. J. W. Ware.

The Rev. William B. Lee nominated the Rev. C. Braxton Bryan, D. D.

The nomination was seconded by the Rev. Landon R. Mason and the Rev. John H. Dickinson.

The Rev. William J. Morton nominated the Rev. Berryman Green, D. D.

Dr. L. M. Blackford, the Rev. A. P. Gray, Judge T. R. B. Wright and others seconded the nomination of Dr. Green.

The Rev. Thos. C. Darst nominated the Rev. William Meade Clark.

The nomination was seconded by Mr. James Caskie and Mr. J. C. Cooke.

Ballot No. 1.

Mr. P. H. Mayo nominated the Rev. J. Y. Downman, D. D.

Dr. W. P. Moncure nominated the Rev. E. L. Goodwin.

Dr. Downman requested that his name be not considered as before the Council.

It was moved and carried that the Council now proceed to ballot.

The Bishop appointed as tellers for the Clerical vote the Rev. E. E. Osgood and the Rev. A. P. Gray. For the Lay vote Mr. John G. Williams and Mr. Chas. E. Cary.

The Rev. P. P. Phillips moved that the Council adjourn for supper at 5:30, to meet again at 7:30 P. M. Carried.

A ballot was then taken and the tellers retired.

Another ballot was then taken and the tellers retired.

The Rev. H. B. Lee moved that the Council now take into consideration the question as to where they would recommend that the Bishop-Coadjutor should reside.

Carried. Ayes 53, noes 33.

Mr. Lee then moved that it be recommended that the Bishop-Coadjutor, when consecrated, live either in Charlottesville, Alexandria or in the Valley of Virginia.

The Rev. Dr. Angus Crawford moved that the election of Dr. Green be made unanimous.

Carried by a rising vote, nem. con.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin moved that a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to present the Bishop-Coadjutor elect to the Council. Carried.

The Chair appointed Rev. E. L. Goodwin, Rev. Wm. Meade Clark and Rev. Wm. D. Smith.

The Rev. Dr. Green was presented and was warmly welcomed by the Bishop. He spoke briefly, expressing his thanks to the Council and asking for time to consider his duty in the matter and for the prayers of the Council for his guidance from on High.

The canonical testimonials in favor of the Bishop-Coadjutor elect were then read by the Secretary and signed by the members of the Council.

The pending motion of the Rev. Mr. Lee in regard to the residence of the Bishop-Coadjutor was, on motion, laid on the table.

The Rev. Wm. M. Clark moved, that the whole question of the place of residence of the Bishop-Coadjutor be left to his discretion.

Carried.

Chaplet of Flowers for Grave of Joseph Bryan.

Judge T. R. B. Wright moved, that a vote of thanks be tendered to the Finance Committee for their painstaking reports to this Council.

Carried.

It was also moved by Judge Wright and carried, that a chaplet of flowers be placed on the grave of the late Joseph Bryan, for the Council, by the Finance Committee.

The Rev. John Moncure, D. D., offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Council be extended to the Rector, Vestry and congregation of St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, and to the members of all the other congregations of the city for their courtesy in the use of this church and for the hospitality extended the members of the Council and other acts of kindness. Also to the Rector and Vestry of Christ Church for free admission to the grounds of the same as their guests.

It was moved and carried, that after the reading of the minutes and the customary religious exercises the Council stand adjourned.

The minutes were read and approved.

Hymn 672 was then sung, the Bishop offered appropriate prayers and pronounced the benediction, and the Council stood adjourned.

Form for Making Bequest.

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to them selves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not," is "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

If it is desired to create a new fund for any Church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its President, Rt. Rev. Robert A, Gibson, D. D.

ORGANIZATION.

From Canon I, Section I. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures. or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged. And the Ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be so designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the Lay Delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all of the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; Provided, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case de novo.

RULES OF ORDER.

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer. 2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing, nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business,

4th. There shall be appointed by the President, not later than the *second* day of the Council, unless otherwise directed, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on the Fund for the Support of Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergymen.

- A Committee on the Episcopal Fund.
- A Committee on the Brotherhood.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Disabled Clergy Fund.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Bruce Fund.
- A Committee on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society.
 - A Committee on Parochial Reports.
 - A Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.
 - A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.
 - A Committee on Sunday-schools.
 - A Committee on Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society.
 - A Committee on Increase of the Ministry.
 - A Committee on Colonial Churches.

A Committee on Unfinished Business.

5th. Immediately after the reading of the Bishop's Address the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, the Committee on Church Property, and such other committees as are necessary for the transaction of the business of the Diocese until the next annual meeting of the Council.

6th. The Council shall sit as a Board of Missions on the first day of the session at 8 o'clock P. M. The President of the Council, or some member of the Council selected by him, shall preside. The Secretary of the Council shall be Secretary of the Council sitting as a Board of Missions.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary before debate.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when de-

manded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendment are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

Rules of Order.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; provided, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

25th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

26th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

27th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

28th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

St. James Church, Leesburg, Va., Wednesday, May 26, 1909.

This being the time and place appointed, the One Hundred and Fourteenth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia assembled in St. James Church at 10 o'clock A. M. Morning prayer having been said at an earlier hour, the Council was opened with the administration of the Holy Communion by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. E. S. Hinks, the Rev. James W. Morris, D. D., and the Rev. W. H. Burkhardt, Rector of the Church.

After divine service the Council was called to order by the Bishop.

The Secretary, the Rev. Everard Meade, called the roll of the clergy, and fifty-nine answered to their names. The roll of lay delegates was called, and forty-nine answered to their names.

The President announced that a quorum was present and that the Council was organized for business. He then appointed the Rev. E. L. Goodwin Elected Secretary,

following Committee on Credentials: The Rev. R. A. Goodwin, Mr. H. C. Marchant, Mr. Rosewell Page.

The Rev. Everard Meade offered his resignation of the office of Secretary, which he had filled for sixteen years.

On motion, the resignation was accepted, with expressions of appreciation for his long and faithful service.

The Rev. H. B. Lee nominated the Rev. E. L. Goodwin for Secretary of the Council, and the Rev. W. M. Clark seconded the nomination.

It was moved and carried that the President cast the ballot of the Council for Mr. Goodwin, which being done, he was declared elected.

By permission the Rev. W. Edward Callender, of Falls Church, asked that his name be inserted in the roll of the clergy.

The Bishop stated that though Mr. Callender had been at work in the Diocese for more than six months, he yet lacked three days of the required six months' canonical connection with the Diocese.

It was moved that the Rev. Mr. Callender be given a seat in the Council, which being carried, his name was called and he took his seat.

The Rev. W. M. Clark moved the adoption of the Rules of Order of the last Council.

The following changes in the Rules were suggested, and accepted by Mr. Clark:

1st. Add to Rule 18, under Order of Debate, these words: "or, in their absence, by a special committee."

2d. That the Rules of Order be numbered consecutively throughout.

With these amendments the Rules of Order were adopted.

The Bishop then read his annual address.

Bishop's Address.

BISHOP GIBSON'S ADDRESS.

To the Clergy and Laity of the Council of Virginia,

Assembled in Leesburg, May 26, 1909.

DEAR BRETHREN:

May the blessings of Almighty God rest upon the work which you shall do this day, and upon the deliberations for the good of the Diocese in which you shall engage.

I must first of all, return to the Council my sincere and warm thanks for the generous provision made for me in my trip to England to attend the Pan-Anglican Congress and Lambeth Conference. This is the first opportunity I have had of making this acknowledgment to the body which made the gift. We adjourned at Fredericksburg without any formal notice given to me of what the Council had done. A few things about the Conference and Congress I shall say in connection with the dates of that meeting. Our time to-day will be so fully occupied that it is my desire to make the report of proceedings of the year as short as possible.

1908:

Friday, May 1st-Found me in Richmond.

Sunday, May 3rd—I attended a Sunday-school meeting at St. Paul's Church, at which addresses were made by Rev. E. L. Goodwin and Rev. Everett P. Smith, in explanation of the use to which the money collected in the Lenten boxes in the Sunday-schools would be put. It seems to me this meeting had a good effect. At night, with a service and address, I confirmed thirty-nine persons in the same church.

Monday, 4th—I attended a meeting of the City Missionary Society.

Tuesday, 5th—Attended meetings of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and the Prayer Book Society.

Bishop's Address.

Wednesday, 6th-Had a wedding in Richmond.

Sunday, 10th—After baptizing four adults in Quantico Church, Dumfries, I confirmed eleven persons, presented by Mr. J. J. Gravatt, then a student at the Seminary of Virginia, and in charge of the mission.

Wednesday, 13th—Attended a meeting of the Trustees of Diocesan Funds.

Thursday, 14th—At night attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Stuart Hall, Staunton.

Wednesday, 20th—The Council opened in Fredericksburg, Rev. W. D. Smith preached the sermon and immediately after I made the first half of my address to the Council. At night there was a meeting on the subject of Diocesan Missions.

Thursday, 21st—At the Council session in the morning I delivered the second half of my address. At the hour of service, Rev. W. M. Clark preached, and the evening was devoted to General Missions.

Friday, 22nd—In the session of the Council, finding that the Diocese generally wanted a Bishop-Coadjutor, I made a formal request for such assistance, and a committee was appointed to ask the consent of the Bishop and Standing Committees.

Sunday, 24th—At the Theological Seminary I ordained to the Priesthood, Rev. David H. Lewis, of Goochland and Fluvanna, and Rev. Wylie Roy Mason, Mission Home, and Rev. Lorenzo D. Vaughan, then in St. Luke's, Essex. As the time of ordination had been more or less uncertain until a comparatively short while before the date finally settled on, I could not secure anybody to preach the ordination sermon, and therefore preached the sermon myself. In the afternoon, confirmed six persons at St. John's, West End, and at night confirmed twenty-four in Immanuel Chapel, Seminary.

Monday, 25th—Performed a wedding ceremony at Arlington, and in the evening confirmed three persons at Christ Church, Alexandria, of whom two were for Grace Church.

Tuesday, 26th—In Baltimore, took the steamer for Cone Wharf, to ordain Rev. L. C. Harrison to the priesthood.

Wednesday, 27th—Mr. Harrison was ordained priest at St. Stephen's, Heathville; the Rev. Arthur P. Gray preached the sermon, and with the Rev. Henry G. Lane joining in the laying on of hands. In the afternoon I held service in St. Stephen's Church, and confirmed three persons, and later took the steamer for Baltimore.

Sunday, 31st—Confirmed eight persons at Emmanuel Church, Henrico county, and at night confirmed seventeen in Christ Church, Richmond.

JUNE, Tuesday, 2nd—Before leaving for New York it became my sad duty to pass sentence of deposition in the case of Rev. W. H. McGee, who insisted that such action should be taken and who gave up the ministry for reasons in no way affecting his moral character.

June 4th—I sailed in company with Mr. P. H. Mayo, on the Mauretania, for Liverpool.

Sunday 7th—Being Whit-Sunday, it was my privilege to administer the Holy Communion in the drawing room of the steamer, and at ten-thirty, to attend the usual Cunard service and make an address. In the afternoon I went to a very interesting service in the steerage, at which Bishop Edward Parker, of New Hampshire, preached.

Wednesday, 10th—Our party landed in Liverpool and went straight on to London. On Trinity Sunday I had the pleasure of listening to the Vicar of Hedsor conduct the service in his own church, and of hearing the Athanasian Creed chanted in the service. The cordiality and friendliness with which we were met can never be forgotten. Houses were thrown open to us and to members of the Pan-Anglican Conference, which had not been opened for general entertainment for many years; the court and people seemed to welcome the occasion as one in which the bond of union between English speaking people might be drawn closer. I administered the Holy Communion in Ful-

ham Palace, preached on several occasions and attended as well as I could to the duties imposed upon me by the Congress and the Conference.

August, Saturday, 22nd—Sailed from Liverpool to this country, and landed in New York on Friday, the 28th.

Saturday, 29th—I reached Orkney Springs, and on Sunday, the 30th, attended a service in the little chapel at Orkney, where Dr. Arthur Lloyd preached, and at night had a service at Orkney hotel. The next two weeks were spent in trying to get a hold on the condition of things in the Diocese.

SEPTEMBER, Sunday, 13th—I preached in St. Paul's Church, Ivy, set apart Miss Mary Lacompte as Deaconess and confirmed five persons. In the afternoon I preached in St. John the Baptist Church and confirmed nineteen persons, and at night preached at Miller's School.

Monday, 14th—Preached at the Chapel of the Holy Cross, Albemarle, and confirmed three persons.

Tuesday, 15th—With Mr. Neve, drove to White Hall from Charlottesville, where we overtook two ladies who were going to the mission, and drove to Blackwell's Hollow, to the new St. John's Church, consecrated the year before. There I preached and confirmed eight persons.

Wednesday, 16th—In Whittle Memorial Church, confirmed thirty persons.

Sunday, 20th—Read service and preached at Orkney Springs and at night spoke at a song service in the hotel.

Tuesday, 22nd—Miss M. W. Meade came to Orkney, and on the 23rd the school was opened. It shall be my business this year, if I am spared the strength to take a part in this work, to put forward the building of a church at Orkney. In this enterprise I bespeak the good offices and help of the Diocese. The Rev. W. D. Smith, of Winchester, is in charge of this nascent work in the Alleghany Mountains. At the point where the school at Orkney is opened we are thirteen miles from the near-

est parish church, and a man having two or three churches on the railroad would find it very difficult to get to Orkney during the winter months, but some way will be found to do in that region what the interest of the people and the Church of God seem to demand.

Sunday, 27th—I held service at Orkney Chapel, and also on Sunday, October 4th.

OCTOBER, Sunday, 11th-Preached in Orkney school house.

Friday, 16th—Went down to Winchester and from that point to Millwood, where, on Sunday, the 18th, I preached in Christ Church.

Monday, 19th—Went from Millwood to the Seminary, and from thence, on the 20th, to Richmond.

Wednesday, 28th—By special request attended the consecration of Rev. F. J. Kinsman, at Wilmington, Del., as Bishop of that Diocese.

NOVEMBER, Sunday, 1st—Ordained the Rev. Ivan M. Green priest in Aquia Church, in Stafford county; Dr. McBryde preached, and I confirmed two persons and administered the Holy Communion.

Tuesday, 3rd—The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society elected Rev. A. Vaughan Colston Archdeacon, January to April.

Wednesday, 4th—Attended a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary at Warrenton; made an address to the Juniors, administered the Holy Communion and made an address on the Emergency Fund and other things in which the Woman's Auxiliary is giving me aid.

Thursday, 5th-Addressed a mass meeting at night.

Friday, 6th—Returned to Richmond.

Saturday, 7th-Went back to Mitchell's Station.

Sunday, 8th—At All Saints' Chapel, confirmed four persons, of whom one was colored, and at Rapidan, confirmed one person.

Monday, 9th—Confirmed three persons in Good Shepherd, Ragged Mountains.

Tuesday, 10th—Assigned the missions of Rev. H. B. Lee, to Mr. Neve, which was done at Mr. Lee's request. In the evening met the faculty of the Theological Seminary.

Wednesday, 11th—Attended a meeting of the Seminary Trustees.

Sunday, 15th—Confirmed three persons at Gordonsville and in the afternoon confirmed two persons at Epiphany Chapel, Somerset.

Tuesday, 17th, and Wednesday, 18th—Attended meeting of the Missionary Conference in Philadelphia, Pa.

Thursday, 19th—Attended a meeting of the Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Home.

Saturday, 21—In consequence of the lamented death of Mr. Joseph Bryan I recalled my appointments for Sunday and Monday, and on Sunday afternoon attended Mr. Bryan's funeral at Emmanuel Church, Henrico, where, together with Bishop Randolph and Bishop Tucker, I assisted Mr. Osgood in the service. It is a rare thing that a community is called to mourn the death of a man who filled so many important places and filled them so well. Mr. Bryan's sympathies were so quick and his intelligence so wide-reaching that few people came into the range of his influence who were not consciously helped and benefited. His desire always was to be of service and he obtained his wish to a degree which was not only unusual but most remarkable. This Council will miss him at its every session. He was always ready to do its work, ready to maintain the dignity of the Diocese and to advance its progress.

Tuesday, 24th—I reached the Church at Maple Grove in time for service, but my appointment had been recalled.

Wednesday, 25th—At night I confirmed four persons at Colonial Beach.

Thursday, 26th—I confirmed six persons at St. Peter's, Oak Grove, Westmoreland county.

Bishop's Address.

Friday, 27th—I confirmed ten persons at St. James', Montross, thus adding fully one-third to the membership of the Church.

Saturday, 28th—I confirmed two persons at Nomini Church. Sunday, 29th—I confirmed six persons at Yeocomico Church and at night, two at Cople Chapel. The last two Parishes, Oak Grove and Cople Chapel, had been filled since my last visit, the first having Rev. R. R. Phelps as its rector, and the second, Rev. Arthur P. Gray. Both of these clergymen have firm hold on the affections of their people and the work is going forward under them most hopefully. Our deepest sympathy is given to Mr. Gray in the long illness which has disabled him for work and endangered his life, but we are sure that in his return to his duties, which now seems altogether probable, there are many ready helpers among his people, whose assistance will soon enable him to make up for lost time. The loss, however, that cannot be replaced is that of many of his flock who have fallen victims to a most unexpected and virulent epidemic of typhoid fever.

Monday, 30th—I preached at St. Paul's, Nomini Grove, of which Rev. H. G. Lane has charge, and confirmed one person.

DECEMBER, Tuesday, 1st—I confirmed six persons at St. John's, Warsaw, also under the charge of Mr. Lane, and on the 2nd, confirmed two persons at Emmanuel, Farnham Parish. Mr. Lane is doing his work in these parishes for a people who are highly appreciative and who welcome his ministrations with both satisfaction and affection.

Thursday, 3rd—I went to Heathsville and thence to Fairfield District. At Lilian, not far from Reedsville, I confirmed one person, and returned to Wicomico and confirmed one person. At St. Stephen's, Heathsville, some misunderstanding about the service prevented a gathering of the congregation. I had prayers with the few who were present. Rev. L. C. Harrison, in charge of these churches, has his troubles and discouragements, but with patience and prudence he will surmount them. Sunday, 6th—At Bertram, consecrated Emmanuel Chapel and

confirmed two persons. In the afternoon, at White Chapel, confirmed one.

Monday, 7th-At Trinity Church, Lancaster Court-house, I confirmed three persons.

Tuesday, 8th—At Grace Church, Kilmarnock, confirmed six persons.

Saturday, 12th-Prepared my address to the Special Council to be held on the 16th, for the purpose of electing a Bishop-Coadjutor.

Sunday, 13th—Confirmed three persons at St. Mark's Church, Richmond.

Wednesday, 16th—The Special Council met in Alexandria for the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor. The consents of the Bishops and Standing Committees had been secured during the summer, the Council had been called for St. Paul's Church, and after the Holy Communion was administered by the rector and myself, the Council was called to order. On the third ballot, Rev. Berryman Green was elected. The Council adjourned that night. The next day, with two of the clergymen, I went to the Seminary. After a talk with one of the Seminary students I dined with Dr. Green.

Sunday, 20th—I confirmed twenty-one persons at Monumental Church in the morning, and six persons in St. Paul's Church at night.

Monday, 21st—Being St. Thomas' Day, I made an address at St. Thomas' Mission, Ginter Park, and confirmed one person.

Tuesday, 20th—Baptized an infant in Richmond.

JANUARY, 1909, Saturday, 2nd—Went to the Theological Seminary to see Professor Green, and returning, paid one or two visits in Alexandria.

Monday, 4th—Received a letter from Dr. Green, in which he declined his election as Bishop-Coadjutor.

Tuesday, 5th—Attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society and Virginia Bible and Prayer Book Society, at which meeting it was determined by vote of the Committee, to say to

the Treasurer of the Diocese and to the Finance Committee that the debt of the Diocese for back salary of the Archdeacon had been cancelled by the Diocesan Missionary Society, as in all probability it would no longer be needed.

Wednesday, 6th—I settled in my own mind the question of a Special Council to be called for the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor, and notified the newspapers, who were desirous of information on the subject, that the election would be deferred until this, the regular annual meeting of the Council.

Saturday, 9th—I confirmed two persons at St. David's Church, Ayletts.

Tuesday, 10th—In the morning, confirmed fourteen persons at Immanuel, Hanover, and in the afternoon confirmed seven persons at St. Paul's, Hanover.

Thursday, 14th—At the suggestion of persons interested, I wrote to Judge Mason, of the Circuit Court of King George, asking him to appoint Mr. Frank Taylor one of the Trustees of Lamb's Creek Church.

Friday, 15th—Went to Washington, en route to Leesburg, for the purpose of ordaining Rev. Alexander Stuart Gibson to the priesthood.

Saturday, 16th—Went on to Leesburg, and was met by Professor Green and other gentlemen interested in the service. The night was stormy all through, but the morning cleared cold, and the congregation came in sleighs and filled the church. Dr. Green presented the candidate, Rev. Cary Gamble assisted in the service, and I preached the sermon in the Church of the Redeemer, at Aldie. At night I preached at St. James' Church, Leesburg.

Monday, 18th—I went to the Seminary.

Tuesday, 19th—After stopping a little while in Alexandria, I came on to Richmond.

Thursday, 21st—I appointed Mr. F. V. Gunn and Mr. Alexander F. Ryland members of the Committee on St. Thomas' Mission, Ginter Park. Met the Executive Committee of St.

Andrew's Association, and made an appointment with Rev. Mr. Bowie, of Greenwood.

Saturday, 23rd—Went over the colored work in extenso with Dr. Moncure.

Sunday, 24th—Preached in St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, on my way to Washington to attend the consecration of Rev. Dr. Alfred Harding, as Bishop of the Diocese of Washington.

Monday, 25th—Attended the consecration in Trinity Church, Washington, and joined in the Laying on of Hands.

Saturday, 30th—Wrote the children's letter to go with the Lenten boxes, and in the evening went to Bremo.

Sunday, 31st—Confirmed three persons in Grace Church, Bremo.

February, Tuesday, 2nd—Attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Monday, 8th—Met Dr. Green and Rev. W. M. Clark, at my house, for the discussion of business.

Wednesday, 10th—I went to New York to attend a called meeting of the House of Bishops.

Thursday, 11th—Took part in the election of two Missionary Bishops.

Tuesday, 16th—Took advice of Chancellor R. Carter Scott on several legal matters in connection with the Diocese.

Sunday, 21st—Confirmed twelve persons in St. James Church, Ashland, and one person belonging to the same congregation, in private.

Wednesday, 28th—Confirmed one hundred and thirty-one persons in St. Andrew's Church, Richmond, and at night confirmed fourteen at St. Luke's, same city.

MARCH, Monday, 1st—Confirmed seventy-two, presented by Dr. John Moncure, at Laurel Reformatory.

Tuesday, 2nd—In the afternoon attended a meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and at night attended the Lenten united service of the Richmond congregations, at St. John's Church, Richmond. This service seems to promise well, as it

brought all or nearly all of the clergy in Richmond once a week, to a service in which they all had part.

In view of the comparatively full report of our Colonial Churches and their condition made at the last Council, I shall leave that subject to the Committee on Colonial Churches, except to say that as I drove by Lamb's Creek Church, in November, 1908, and saw the preparations going on for making repairs, I had a pleasant subject of reflection which recurred to me frequently during my visitation through the Northern Neck, and when I passed the same place again this Spring and saw the

new and substantial roof in place, I was cheered as I have not been for a long time. That much at least is done, and it is my experience that everything actually done makes some other and further achievement easier. I hope the Committee on Colonial Churches will find it possible, at some future time, to prepare a little volume describing the improvements which have been made on these old buildings and the use which we now find for them in the daily life of the Church.

Let me remind the Council of what was said in the last address of the Bishop, 1908, about the action of the General Convention proposing changes in the Constitution of the Church. I do not find in the Journal that the Council has acted on these changes as is desirable. You may remember the suggestion made in the last address, that these alterations are so important that they ought to be considered by the members of this body while the incidents as well as debates relating to their passage by the General Convention are fully and clearly remembered.

About the General Disabled Clergy Fund, commonly called the \$5,000,000 Fund, let us do what we can. Rev. Thomas C. Darst is Secretary of our committee on the subject.

It will be remembered that instead of the old plan of holding missionary councils in the years in which the General Convention does not meet, the whole country has been divided into districts called missionary departments, and the Diocese of Virginia has been assigned to the third of these departments. The name of the department at present is the Third Missionary Department. The first Conference of this Department was held in Philadelphia, in the fall of 1908, and the following Dioceses reported and were all represented: Pennsylvania, Central Pennsylvania, Harrisburg, Pittsburg, Delaware, Easton, Maryland, Washington, Virginia, West Virginia and Southern Virginia. The meeting was largely taken up by the business of organizing. The Rev. Thomas J. Garland was made Department Secretary, and Rev. William Meade Clark was elected representative from the Department to the Board of Missions. It is de-

sired that the Department meetings shall be held in a principal city in each Diocese to be addressed on Diocesan, Domestic and Foreign Missions. This plan we have under advisement, but I would say just now, that it is the privilege of the Diocese to elect four clerical and four lay representatives each year. This election is to be made by the Council, and I hope you will bear that fact in mind, as imposing on you a duty to be performed before adjournment.

Since we met in regular session, a called meeting has been held for the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor. At that meeting I said to the brethren assembled, that I should not just now, in case of the election and consecration of a Bishop-Coadjutor, ask for the appointment of an Archdeacon for the whole Diocese or appropriation for such an official. At that time the Rev. A. Vaughan Colston was acting as Archdeacon. From January to April he was elected by the Executive Committee of the D. M. S., as Archdeacon, and has since been elected to the same office until expiration of this Council. I do not wish to change a word of what I said in my last address to the Annual Council upon the subject of the Archdeacon and the necessity for such an official, and indeed, the same words might be uttered at this Council with renewed emphasis, because of the valuable work which Archdeacon Colston has done, but it is far from my purpose to burden the Diocese with costs which the churches are unable to meet.

The appeal made by your Finance Committee in behalf of the Contingent Fund, and sent to every rector, church warden and treasurer, was most opportune, and the committee has my warmest thanks for their interest and activity, and especially for the sense of responsibility shown by them in addressing the Diocese on this matter. Their action was a new step, a step in advance and I believe a wise one. The Diocese must be recognized, as well as the Bishop or Bishops, and its treasury must be supplied with the needed funds for its maintenance. For myself, I have never had the slightest doubt that the Dio-

cese of Virginia, if desirous of the service of two Bishops, would raise the money for them just as easily as it raises the money for one. But two Bishops and an Archdeacon on full salary besides, would be a different thing. The Diocese might possibly feel itself burdened.

Speaking again for myself, I should be disposed to exhaust my resources, both of strength and ingenuity, before making a direct request of the Council for such assistance.

With a Bishop-Coadjutor who will do the work which I assigned at the special meeting of the Council, namely, visit all parishes and preaching places as nearly as possible twice in three years, and help me about filling vacancies, I think I can go on for the present.

Possibly, however, the Diocese knowing the value of Archdeacon Colston's work, may prefer to have him remain in his position and may give the Diocesan Missionary Society money to pay his salary. In that case, I shall be more than glad to have him continue in the office which he so ably fills.

The business before this Council is so important and so varied in its character that I hope we shall not shorten more than is absolutely necessary the time for its transaction, and to this end I would not only suggest, but as far as is proper, would urge that the election of the Bishop-Coadjutor be made the order of the day, immediately after this address, that the election be completed, and that notice be given to the person elected before any other extended business is undertaken.

It is possible for me to report to the Council the receipts for Diocesan work from the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, the Archdeaconry of the colored work, and the Emergency Fund. These sums aggregate \$24,000, divided thus:

The Rev. W. H. Burkhardt moved that the election of a Bishop Coadjutor be made the order of the day this afternoon immediately upon reassembling after lunch.

Judge Wallace offered the following:

That the motion of Rev. Mr. Burkhardt to proceed to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor be committed to the Finance Committee, with instructions to report immediately after recess "whether plans for the support of the Bishop Coadjutor have been carefully made," and whether, in the judgment of the said committee, the revenues and finances of the Church are in such a condition as to justify a reasonable probability that the salary fixed at the called Council held in Alexandria on December 16, 1908, can be promptly paid to the Bishop Coadjutor when elected.

The resolution of Judge Wallace was adopted.

The Rev. W. H. Burkhardt moved that the daily business sessions of the Council be from 9:30 to 11 A. M., at which hour Divine Service shall be held. After which the Council shall continue its session until 1 P. M., when a recess shall be taken. Reassembling at 3 P. M., the session shall continue until 6 P. M., which was adopted.

The Council then took a recess until 3 P. M.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese respectfully report that since the Council held in May, 1908, they have given consent to the consecration of the Rev. Frederick Joseph Kinsman as Bishop of Delaware; of the Rev. Alfred Harding, D. D., as Bishop of Washington; of the Rev. Benjamin Brewster as Missionary Bishop of Western Colorado, and to the consecration of Rev. Nathaniel S. Thomas as Missionary Bishop of Wyoming.

CANON X.

DIOCESAN COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOL EDUCATION.

Section 1. There shall be a Committee of the Diocese on Sunday School Education, composed of the Bishop, who shall be *ex-officio* President, and six members appointed annually by the Council, and enlarged by one representative elected by each convocation and local Sunday School Institute in the Diocese, and if there should be in the future a Sunday School Union with local branches, its officers shall be *ex-officio* members of this committee, with one representative elected by each local branch.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Sunday School Education to study the problem of religious instruction and Church training in connection with the Sunday School, to investigate the needs of the Sunday Schools of the Diocese, to adopt such measures as the Committee may deem advisable for promoting their greater efficiency, and to advance the cause of religious education in the Diocese; provided, however, that no course of study or list of books shall be officially recommended by the Committee until such course or list has been formally approved by the Bishop of the Diocese; and provided further, that nothing in this canon shall be so construed as to diminish the authority of the minister of the parish or relieve the responsibility of the same.

Section 3. The Committee shall hold its first meeting at the call of the Bishop, and shall hold such regular meetings as it may find necessary for its work. Special meetings may be called by the Bishop at his discretion, and shall be called when requested by five members of the Committee.

Section 4. As soon as expedient the Bishop shall appoint annually a Diocesan Educational Secretary, subject to confirmation by the Committee on Sunday School Education. His salary shall be fixed by the Council, and his expenses per annum shall not exceed such sum as the Council may determine.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Secretary, when requested by the minister of a parish or mission, to visit the Sunday School of such parish or mission, or to advise upon any matter relating to the educational work of the same. He shall be ready as occasion offers to present the cause of religious education to congregations. He shall be the executive agent of the Committee on Sunday School Education, shall carry out its instructions, and shall report regularly to the Committee at its meetings. He shall perform such other duties in connection with the educational work, or work in the vacant parishes of the Diocese, as the Bishop may assign

him, provided he be not hindered in carrying out the work of the Committee on Sunday School Education.

The President appointed as the Committee on this proposed canon, the Rev. Dr. A. Crawford, the Rev. E. S. Hinks, Mr. H. C. Marchant and Mr. R. W. Hilleary.

It was moved by the Rev. W. E. Callender, that so much of the Bishop's address as bears upon the Archdeacon be referred to a Special Committee to report to the Council.

This was carried, and the following Committee was appointed: The Rev. W. E. Callender, the Rev. Wm. N. Meade, Mr. James Caskie and Mr. John L. Williams.

The President announced the order of the day, the report of the Finance Committee.

The Rev. Dr. A. Crawford moved, that the Council go into executive session to consider the report of the Finance Committee and the election of the Bishop Coadjutor.

The motion was lost.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Mr. James Caskie presented the report of the Finance Committee:

The Committee on Finance respectfully report that they have examined the accounts of Robert S. Chamberlayne, Esq., Treasurer, for the fiscal year ending April 30th, 1909, and find them fully and accurately stated, and all disbursements sustained by proper vouchers.

The receipts from the various parishes for the Contingent Fund for the year 1906, were \$8,492.54; 1907, \$8,302.96, and the past year \$7,936.64, showing a falling off of \$189.58 from 1906 and of \$366.32 from 1907, a decrease of \$555.90 in two years.

The statements for the fiscal year ending April 30th, 1909, and for comparison for the fiscal year ending April 30th, 1908, are as follows:

It will be seen from the above that there is included therein the loan of \$900.00 which has been paid off, and that there remains a balance of \$377.54 in bank to the credit of the Treasurer, May 1, 1909.

Your Committee's report for last year showed that there remained unpaid the items of \$500.00 and \$333.00, making \$833.00, which was authorized to be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society for the Archdeacon's salary up to December 1st, 1907. This amount, \$833.00, has been "remitted" by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and no longer remains as a charge against this account.

Your Committee recommends the continuation of the envelope system used in the collection of the Contingent Fund, with such change in the backing on the envelopes as this Committee may suggest before they are again needed, and that they be distributed as heretofore by the Secretary, and the cost paid by the Treasurer, and that this method of aiding the collection of the Contingent Fund be made a standing order of the Council.

Your Committee recommends that the sum of \$300.00 be paid the Bishop for an office, and for such clerical assistance as he may require, and they further recommend that the Treasurer pay the sum of \$75.00 to the Rev. J. H. Dickinson for his services in preparing the tabulated statement in the report of the several parishes, and his necessay expenses.

In view of the proceedings of the Council at its annual meeting in Fredericksburg, in May last, and its special meeting in Alexandria in December last, as to the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor, when the Reverend Dr. Berryman Green was elected, but afterwards declined, and in view of the proposed election of a Bishop-Coadjutor at this annual meeting in Leesburg, your Committee begs reference to its following report made to the Special Council.

"That it did not know where the funds were to come from to pay the salary, house rent and traveling expenses of the Bishop-Coadjutor, but

if the Council decided to elect a Bishop-Coadjutor, the salary, house rent, and allowance for traveling expenses, were certainly reasonable; and the Committee also stated that it (the Committee) could not be responsible for such payments unless the Contingent Fund is more liberally paid up, as required, as it is the only provision made for such pay ments."

In anticipation of the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor and the consequent increased demands upon the Treasurer of the Diocese for his salary, etc., and the fact that this increased demand will create a deficiency, especially as the past several years' collections for this fund has yearly decreased, there must be increased receipts from the churches and parishes to meet this new demand. Your Committee, with a desire to meet such emergency, issued in April last a circular addressed "To the Rectors, Vestries and Congregations in the Diocese of Virginia," requesting that the same be read by the Vestries, and by the Rectors, to their respective congregations, with the hope that the information given therein, and the appeal made, would arouse greater interest, and more liberal responses for the support of the Bishops and for meeting the Council's expenses.

Believing that the communicants and friends of the Church, who give so liberally to missions, and its other objects, fail to give as liberally to the support of the Bishops, and for the payment of the expenses of the Diocese, because they do not understand, and therefore are not so interested in this, the Contingent Fund, your Committee issued said circular and appeal, quoting extracts from the Canons and the proceedings of the Council in the matter of the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor, and as to the Contingent Fund, hoping to create a better understanding as to this, and the necessity as to more regular and more liberal responses to this Contingent Fund, as well as for the harmonizing of certain views on these points, and especially for the better information of not only each vestry, but each vestryman, as to their individual responsibility, to see to the collection, and payment to the Treasurer of the Diocese. as required, the sum necessary "For the purpose of defraying such expenses of the Diocese as may be authorized by the Council or directed by the Committee on Finance."

Canon XVIII-now Canon VIII-as revised, 1906, reads as follows:

CANON VIII.

Section I. "The vestries of the several parishes and of the several separate congregations shall pay quarterly, or at each annual Council, as each vestry may determine for itself, to the Treasurer of the Diocese, Report of Finance Committee.

a sum of money to be ascertained in amount on the basis of one dollar for each communicant, belonging to the several parishes and separate congregations, &c."

Only about eleven of the vestries or churches seem to have recognized their obligations under this Canon, they only having paid in full their apportionment on the basis of one dollar for each communicant, whether they have collected the same or not. This they have done by making up any deficiency from their church funds, or otherwise. This we recommend shall be done by all of the vestries, who should give supervision to the sum to be paid to the Treasurer before it is sent to him.

Your Committee finds under the general head of "Parochial Reports," in the Journal of 1908, from page 146 to page 299, in addition to the list of vestrymen, wardens, etc., of each parish, a "Financial Summary" and sometimes "Remarks." These it is desirable should be so printed there, for each parish or church, but we do not think it necessary to print therewith the other data given, as to the number of baptisms, confirmations, communicants, offerings, churches, etc., because these latter facts and figures are taken from the same reports made by the several parishes and churches, and by the Rev. J. H. Dickinson are tabulated in a much more convenient and condensed form, and are printed in columns under the heading of "Parochial," "Church" and "Financial," in the same Tournal, as will be seen, on pages from 300 to 329, inclusive.

The names of the vestrymen and others in the reports, together with any remarks, being thus separated from the tabulated statement, should be entirely satisfactory, and if so printed in the Journal, we are informed that by the omission of the other figures, as heretofore printed under the heading of "Parochial Reports," it will not only save duplication of the same, but the printer states that it will cut down the cost of the printing of the Journal so as to save about \$175.00.

For this reason, and to save this amount in the cost, the Committee recommends that this change be made in printing the Journal, or that the same be referred to this Committee to consider with power to act as they may deem best.

Should a Bishop-Coadjutor be elected we estimate that it will take at least \$10,250 to pay all expenses for which the Contingent Fund will be liable, which will be about \$2,250.00 above what was received for the year April 30th, 1900.

We recommend that the ordinary expenses of the Diocese be paid.

The Rev. Dr. A. Crawford nominated the Rev. Robert S. Coupland.

The Rev. Dr. James W. Morris nominated the Rev. William Cabell Brown, D. D.

Dr. Brown's nomination was seconded by the Rev. H. B. Lee, the Rev. William J. Morton, and the Rev. E. S. Hinks.

It was moved by the Rev. Dr. Downman, that the Rule of Order requiring the Council to sit tonight as a Board of Missions be suspended, which motion was adopted.

Dr. Downman then moved, that after the Council shall have been bidden to prayer by the Bishop, it shall adjourn to meet again at 8 o'clock P. M., and that the present order of the day be then continued.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MATTER OF GENERAL CLERGY RELIEF.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

At the last annual Council a committee was appointed under the following resolution:

"Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed to examine the relations now existing between the General Clergy Relief Society and the various societies within the Diocese having the same or similar objects, and report to the next Council what changes, if any, ought to be made in those relations."

Pursuant to that resolution your Committee beg to report that they have examined the relations existing between the aforesaid societies and

1909]

for some change.

First: Under the eligibility rules of our Diocesan societies for The Relief of Disabled Clergy and for Widows and Orphans of Deceased Clergy, a clergyman may spend a large part of his life in this Diocese and then if he dies or becomes disabled shortly after removing to another Diocese, neither the clergyman, if he is alive and disabled, nor his family, if he is dead, can receive aid from our Diocesan societies because he was not connected with the Diocese at the time of his death or disability.

Therefore we have cases of disabled clergy and families of deceased clergy residing in this Diocese, who, although both needy and worthy, cannot receive help from our Diocesan societies. Fortunately such cases can and do receive help from the General Clergy Relief Fund, and so we come to this other fact indicating a need of change.

Second: Persons residing in this Diocese have been receiving from the General Clergy Relief Fund each year from 1904 to 1907, an average amount of \$981.67 in excess of the contributions from this Diocese to the General Clergy Relief Fund.

Third: Owing to the income from invested funds and to contributions from individuals and churches, the Disabled Clergy Fund of Virginia has had an average yearly surplus of \$680.67 for the past ten years.

The Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese has had from like sources an average yearly surplus of \$164.74. Total yearly surplus for the last ten years for our two societies, \$841.41. Meanwhile the General Clergy Relief Fund has been sending into our Diocese each year \$981.67 more than it has been receiving from the Diocese.

We are thus building up a surplus while residents of our Diocese are living on the bounty of the Church in other Dioceses.

These facts seem to your Committee to call for some change.

We believe that the best plan would be to have a Diocesan committee to co-operate with the General Clergy Relief Fund on the one hand, and our Diocesan societies on the other hand, and co-ordinate their efforts; but we do not think that the time has come for this plan and therefore we do not recommend it at this time.

We recognize that the income from the invested funds in possession of our two Diocesan societies cannot be diverted to other objects. Also that contributions from churches and individuals sent to our Diocesan societies under the present and heretofore existing understanding cannot be diverted to other objects.

Report of Committee on General Clergy Relief.

We therefore recommend that the Treasurer of the Society for the Relief of Disabled Clergy of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia be, and hereby is directed to send each year hereafter to the General Clergy Relief Fund, the sum of \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) or such part thereof as he may be able to send, after using the income from the invested funds of his society, supplemented by contributions from churches and individuals, to supply the needs of the beneficiaries of his society as heretofore.

We further recommend that the Treasurer of The Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Virginia be, and hereby is directed to send each year hereafter to the General Clergy Relief Fund, the sum of \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) or such part thereof, as he may be able to send, after providing as heretofore for the beneficiaries of the society of which he is treasurer.

The money in both cases is to be taken not from the income of the invested funds, but from the contributions. We consider this use of the funds perfectly justifiable and right, as the money will be given in future with that understanding.

Your Committee cannot close this report without paying their tribute of appreciation to Colonel William H. Palmer, Treasurer of the Disabled Clergy Fund, and to Mr. E. B. Addison, Treasurer of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, for their faithful and efficient services as treasurers of their respective societies. The Diocese owes much to them both for their loving care in the trusts committed to them.

Gentlemen,—In making my annual report for the session of 1908-1909, I acknowledge with gratitude that the year has been a successful one. The health of the school has been remarkable and the scholarship good. The interest in Sunday School and Missions has been quickened, and the Missionary Society of the school has been active in its efforts to meet pledges, giving over three hundred dollars to mission causes in addition to its contribution to Diocesan Missions. A large number of the school are Church members, but at the Bishop's visitation eleven of our household were confirmed.

In September we open the new Whittle Memorial Hall, which contains a fine gymnasium, adequate dining room and library, a complete infirmary, and one floor of bed rooms. S. S. Ware from the Rappahannock Valley Convocation,

Geo. P. Mayo from the Albemarle Convocation.

To fill a vacancy in the Standing Committee on Church Property, the Rev. Dr. Moncure nominated Mr. J. Stewart Bryan, and he was elected.

Mr. Rosewell Page presented his report as Treasurer of Bethany Institute, and also the report of the Brotherhood. The latter was referred to the proper Committee.

Mr. H. C. Marchant moved that Mr. W. J. Cary, of Cople Parish, whose credentials had not been received owing to the illness of his rector, be seated as a lay delegate.

Carried, and Mr. Cary took his seat.

SPECIAL CHURCH FUNDS.

The Rev. Thos. C. Darst presented the report of the Committee on the Disabled Clergy Fund as follows:

We, your Committee, have examined this report, and beg leave to submit that we find the same correct and supported by proper vouchers.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin read the following:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL CHURCH.

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's address at the last Council relating to the amendments to the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church proposed by the General Convention of 1907, and to be finally acted upon by the next Convention, to whom has also been handed the official notification to the Council of such proposed alterations, would respectfully report:

The amendments proposed are five in number. The first in order, and in interest, if not in practical importance, is the preamble to the Constitution as a whole. It is designed to supply what has seemed a formal defect in that instrument, in that it has no descriptive or definitive foreword; and also to infuse into the dry bones of its mechanism some breath of the spirit which animates the Church, some expression of the

vital principles by which she is governed as a holy and living organism. As the Constitution now stands the name of God appears in it but once, and then in quotation marks, while there is not a reference to the Divine Head of the Church or to the Holy Spirit, nor any direct allusion to her origin, or mission, or faith, or reason for existence. The preamble as proposed is in these words:

"Prefix to the Constitution the following

PREAMBLE

This American Church first planted in Virginia, in the year of our Lord 1607, by representatives of the ancient Church of England; acknowledging the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, the record of God's Revelation of Himself in his Son, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; holding the Catholic Creeds, to-wit, the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed, to be a sufficient statement of the Christian Faith; maintaining the Orders of the Sacred Ministry in such form as from the Apostles' time they have been continued; reverently conserving the Sacraments ordained by Christ Himself; and accounting to be members of the flock of Christ all who have been duly baptized in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, has set forth and established, for the furtherance of the work to which it has been called of God, the following

CONSTITUTION."

The phraseology of this stately and well-balanced paragraph is almost beyond criticism. It is seen to contain seven statements. The first defines "This American Church," the Church of which the following paper is the governmental Constitution, by reference to its historic origin and continuity. The four clauses which follow express in measured terms her position upon, and her allegiance to, the four fundamentals of the doctrine, the faith, the ministry, and the Sacraments. The sixth clause is a catholic recognition of all who are sacramentally of the flock of Christ, while the last acknowledges her call of God to His sacred service. The language, except in a single parenthetical line, is strictly parallel to that of our most venerable formularies. The tone throughout is markedly eirenical. "The polemic attitude is avoided, and the controversial note is absent." In the judgment of your Committee this Preamble is not only unobjectionable but is a fitting, timely and conservative expression of the Church's position on these essential points.

The second proposed Amendment provides for the election of the Pre-

siding Bishop of the Church, and for a limited term in that office. At present the Senior Bishop by consecration, having jurisdiction in the United States is Presiding Bishop, and holds office until his death, resignation or disability. This is, however, but a recent provision of the Constitution, having been adopted in 1901. Before that time the Presiding Bishop held office by virtue of a Rule of Order of the House of Bishops, which Rule that body could alter at its will, and in fact did alter at least three times in its early history. Courtesy, however, at that time dictated that the Senior Bishop should be President of the House, and the very few duties then attaching to the position could be performed by him as well as by any other, so this became the fixed custem which it has been found hard to change. But with the growth of the Church and the enlargement of her corporate activities these duties of the Presiding Bishop have multiplied enormously both in number and importance, and are likely to increase yet more. They are onerous, intricate, and sometimes of a very delicate nature. They demand for their performance not only time and labor, but a vigorous mind, sound judgment, wide knowledge and prompt business habits. The incongruity of assigning these duties to the Bishop who chances to be the Senior by consecration, who will certainly be among the oldest in years, and probably among the most infirm in body and mind, has long been sufficiently obvious.

The change proposed in the Constitution is as follows:

"Strike out Section 3 of Article I., and insert in place of it the following:

"Section 3. Upon the expiration of the term of office of the Presiding Bishop, the General Convention shall elect the Presiding Bishop of the Church. The House of Bishops shall choose one of the Bishops having jurisdiction within the United States to be such Presiding Bishop, by the vote of a majority of all the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, such choice to be subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies by vote of a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders.

"The Presiding Bishop shall discharge such duties as may be prescribed by the Constitution and the Canons of the General Convention."

"The Presiding Bishop so elected shall hold office for six years, unless meanwhile he shall have reached the seventieth year of his age, when his tenure of office shall end in any case, or shall have resigned his Episcopal jurisdiction, or, with the consent of the General Convention,

his office as Presiding Bishop, or, unless, for infirmity or other sufficient cause, he may have been relieved of such office by the General Convention by the concurrent vote, first of a majority of all the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and then of a majority of the Clerical and lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders.

"The salary of the Presiding Bishop as such shall be fixed and paid by the General Convention, as may be provided by Canon of such Convention.

"When, for any reason, a vacancy in the office shall occur, or if, by reason of infirmity, the Presiding Bishop shall become disabled, the House of Bishops shall elect one of its number to act as Presiding Bishop until the next meeting of the General Convention."

While, as our Bishop suggests, the change proposed is a very decided one, it is to be noted that the Amendment confers upon the Presiding Bishop no new title, dignity or authority, and his duties are those only which are or may be prescribed by law. The office will normally pass from Bishop to Bishop, and from See to See, with each successive election. While we might wish that this feature were more definitely provided for, and also that the language of the amendment were less ambiguous in one place, yet we think that its provisions are sufficiently guarded, and that the change proposed is strongly demanded to meet the future necessities of the Church.

The next proposed amendment is an addition to the Constitution permitting the election and consecration of Suffragan Bishops.

"Insert in Article II. as Section 4 the following, and renumber the present Section 4:

"It shall be lawful for a Diocese, with the consent of the Bishop of that Diocese, to elect one or more Suffragan Bishops, without right of succession, and with seat and without vote in the House of Bishops. A Suffragan Bishop shall be consecrated and hold office under such conditions and limitations other than those provided in this Article as may be provided by Canons of the General Convention. He shall be eligible as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor of a Diocese, or as a Suffragan in another Diocese, or he may be elected by the House of Bishops as a Missionary Bishop."

This radical departure from the time-honored policy of the American Church was proposed, as is well understood, in answer to the demand for more effectiveness, and less friction, in the prosecution of the Church's work among the colored population of our land. Several expedients were

suggested and ably defended in the Convention to this end; and no question was more carefully or seriously considered by it than this. To the majority it seemed that the plan of allowing any Diocese that so desired to place a Suffragan Bishop, presumably, but not necessarily, a colored Bishop, over this work in that Diocese, was more conservative. and offered fewer difficulties, than any other. Moreover the provision is a general one, and may be adopted by any Diocese having, for instance, a large foreign population, or other work of a special character. In effect it allows a Diocese to have one or more Assistant Bishops, in addition to a Bishop-Coadjutor, without primary jurisdiction or right of succession; and it is in line with the law and custom of the English Church, where some of the Dioceses have from two to five Assistant or Suffragan Bishops. The practical working of this new provision of the Constitution, should it be adopted, will be governed by the Canon which will have to be enacted to prescribe the "conditions and limitations" of the office, and a Committee has already been appointed to frame such a Canon in anticipation of the adoption of the amendment.

In regard to the objection raised by our own Bishop to giving a Suffragan Bishop a seat, though without a vote, in the House of Bishops, we have no recommendation to offer. It is a question in which the House of Bishops is chiefly interested, and on which its judgment has been deliberately expressed, while in the House of Deputies it received little or no special consideration.

The next amendment proposed is meant to supply what experience has shown to be a defect in our laws concerning the trial of a clergyman, and to bring the Constitution and the Canons into more perfect accord at a point where they now seem to conflict. It is in these words, and is self-explanatory:

"Add to the second paragraph of Article IX. of the Constitution the following sentence, namely:

"The General Convention may also provide by Canon for the trial of a Presbyter or Deacon in the Diocese or Missionary District in which an offence is alleged to have been committed by him."

The final proposed change is as follows:

"Add to Article X. at the end thereof the following proviso:

"And provided further, that in editions of the Book of Common Prayer in foreign languages, such verbal alterations as may be necessary to adapt the same to local conditions may be made by the authority of the Bishop of the Diocese or Missionary District in which it is used, subject to the approval of the Presiding Bishop."

Morning Prayer Said.

Here again the amendment is demanded by the necessities of the case. The Chinaman does not wish to pray for our President but for his own Emperor, while the Brazilian does not like his Chuch to be called an "infidel" Church, which, we are told, is the meaning that attaches there to the word Protestant. Only such needful changes are allowed, as shall in no way affect doctrine or essential usage, and in point of fact such verbal alterations have already been made wherever the Prayer Book has been translated for use in our foreign missionary fields.

No action upon these amendments is required of the Council, but it is entirely within its province, and has been customary, for the Council to express its assent or dissent to such proposed alterations in the fundamental law of the Church, as at least a guide to its Deputies in the following General Convention. We therefore suggest the adoption of this Resolution:

That this Council approves the alterations in the Constitution proposed by the General Convention of 1907.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Alex. Stuart Gibson and the Rev. J. J. Gravatt, D. D. The sermon was preached by the Rev. William J. Morton.

Sundry Business.

THURSDAY, 12:15 P. M.

The Council was called to order after Divine service.

The Rev. R. A. Goodwin moved that a committee of five be appointed to consider that part of the Bishop's address which referred to the Five Million Dollar Pension Fund.

Carried, and the Chair appointed as such committee Mr. H. C. Marchant, Judge A. W. Wallace, Mr. James Caskie, the Rev. R. A. Goodwin, and the Rev. Thomas C. Darst.

On motion of the Rev. W. M. Clark, the report of the Finance Committee was then taken up to be acted upon.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin moved, as a substitute for that part of the report bearing upon the publication of parochial reports, that the whole question as to the publication of the parochial reports be referred for decision to a committee to consist of the Bishop, the Secretary, the Statistician, and the Finance Committee, which was carried.

As thus amended, the report with its recommendations was adopted.

The Rev. Thomas C. Darst moved the following:

That a committee, to consist of the Rev. William M. Clark and Mr. John B. Minor, be appointed to see the Rev. Arthur S. Lloyd, D. D., and personally to notify him of his election as Bishop Coadjutor.

The motion was adopted.

BIBLE AND PRAYER BOOK DISTRIBUTION SOCIETY.

The Rev. Wm. B. Lee presented the following report:

Your Committee has examined the account of the Treasurer of the Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society, and find the same correct and sustained by proper vouchers.

Report of Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE AND PRAYER BOOK DISTRIBUTION SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

At the Council held in May, 1908, the name of the Virginia Prayer Book Distribution Society was changed to the Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society of the Diocese of Virginia.

During the past year this Society has donated to nineteen mission points and feeeble parishes over 400 Prayer Books, 450 hymnals, and 104 Bibles.

It will be seen by comparison with previous reports that the good work of the Society is increasing. During the past year the Treasurer has received \$138.88 from sixteen churches. This is an increase over last year, but the demands upon the Society have been so much greater than heretofore that the treasury is now nearly empty, though we began the year with a balance of \$117.50.

There are a number of applications now before the Society which cannot be met for lack of funds.

The Council recommends an annual offering for this good work, and we earnestly request the clergy of the Diocese to bring the needs of the Society to the attention of their congregations.

COLONIAL CHURCHES.

The Rev. Wm. B. Lee also presented the following:

Your Committee on Colonial Churches respectfully submit the following report:

Old Lambs Creek Church, Brunswick Parish, in King George county, under the charge of Rev. Byrd T. Turner, has been repaired and is now in better condition than many of the Colonial churches now in use.

We have obtained a partial list of these churches that have passed into other hands, as follows: Old Upper Church, in Middlesex county, has for a number of years been in the hands of the Baptists.

Old Lower Church, in Middlesex county, is in the hands of Methodists. Mattaponi Church, St. Stephen's Parish, in the middle of King and Queen county, passed into the hands of the Baptists about the year 1840; this property was granted by the Governor of Virginia in that year to Mr. John Pollard, and by him to the Baptists. About the same time Mr. Pollard gave the marble font of Mattaponi Church to Old Fork Church, Hanover.

The Old Church, in Stratton Major Parish, lower King and Queen, is in a very bad condition, and is in the hands of the Methodists.

Mangohick Church, King William county, is in the hands of the negro Baptists.

Aquinton Church, near the center of King William county, is in the hands of the Methodists.

Old West Point or Old St. John's Church, in lower King William, is in bad condition and is in the hands of Capt. R. E. Lee and of the heirs of Dr. Richards, and steps are being taken to have it transferred to the Church.

Your committee are glad to note that in many of our Colonial Parishes not only are the old churches being repaired, but at or near the ruins of the old churches new churches or chapels are being built. Within the past three years St. John's Church, Berkeley Parish, Spotsylvania county, has been built about a mile and a half from the old site, which is twenty-eight miles from Fredericksburg.

St. Stephen's Church, Northumberland county, has been rebuilt at or near the old site, which is about six miles from Readeville.

Wicomico Church has recently been rebuilt on the old site in Wicomico Parish, Northumberland county.

St. Margaret's Church, St. Margaret's Parish, Caroline, destroyed by fire some years ago, has been replaced by a very neat frame church.

The walls of old Farnham Church, Richmond county, are standing and in good condition, and it is hoped that the building will be restored in the near future.

Your committee hopes to have a fuller report on these restored churches for the next Council.

Report of Committee on State of the Church.

We, the undersigned committee, beg leave to report that the Archdeacon's work has been of such value to the Diocese both spiritually, in organizing new work and in increasing the interest in the older Parishes in increasing the salaries of country rectors and increasing the amounts contributed for contingent and other funds, and generally arousing religious activity and interest in the communities which he has visited,—

That we recommend that he be retained in office for a further twelve months, provided that the Diocesan Missionary Society can provide for his salary.

The Rev. Dr. J. Y. Downman moved the following substitute for the recommendation contained in the report:

The substitute was carried, and the report, as thus amended, was adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the State of the Church invite you to render with them profound thanks to Almighty God for His mercies vouchsafed the Diocese in the past year. The Church in her various activities has been showing increased energy and faithfulness.

In her fundamental work of teaching, through the agency of the Sunday-school, she has given evidence of intelligence and thoroughness unsurpassed in her previous history. In her missionary studies and activities she has been earnest as never before.

In her home-life she has given evidence of family piety as the unusual number of persons confirmed seems to indicate. But in her lack of recruits for the Sacred Ministry she has not displayed that devotion which she should have manifested to the cause of extending the kingdom of Christ. For Virginia must not forget that her sons are still in demand, not only in the home field, but also in this whole land as well as in the world at large.

Report of Committee on State of the Church.

In her relation to the great Anglican Communion, she has shown a right judgment in sending her Bishop and others of her clergy and laymen, to take their place and perform their part in the Lambeth Conference and the Pan-Anglican Congress. These living witnesses to her being, dignity and efficiency, represented not only her historic connection with the mother country, but also her touch upon and advance with the great Anglican Communion, and testified to her interest in and loyalty to her Apostolic orders. In her efforts to provide a Coadjutor Bishop, competent for his work and acceptable to her Bishop, she has shown her earnestness and carefulness for the welfare of the Diocese and her leader.

The zeal of the clergy collectively in presenting one thousand and seventy persons for confirmation, expressed as it was, in terms of prayer, solicitation, instruction and encouragement, has been matched by that of their Bishop, singly expressed in calculation of opportunity, travel, ministration and personal welcome of these candidates.

The timeliness of a Coadjutor Bishop is evident to those who know the extent and character of territory comprised in this Diocese, and through the fact of the increase of nearly 40 per cent. in the number of persons confirmed over that of last year. It remains for the pastors of the flock and the responsible members of households to see that this number does not decrease.

Solicitude is constantly expressed concerning the sufficiency of the Contingent Fund for the support of the Diocesan organization. Your Committee respectfully suggest that the burden of its gathering be not imposed upon the clergy, but that vestries take practical measures to collect it by systematic offerings, quarterly, if need be, to relieve the poorer members of the Church of any needless burden or embarassment and by such distribution of a natural deficit among voluntary contributors, as may be expedient. It is with eminent satisfaction that we note the effort to repay, in some substantial measure, the benefits of the General Clergy Relief Fund to worthy beneficiaries in this Diocese who are ineligible to benefits from our own Diocesan Funds. This, the only other agency beside the Board of Missions established by the General Convention, is fully entitled to our respect, confidence, support and gratitude. We earnestly entreat the Church in this Diocese to make liberal contribution to its funds.

The encouragingly large sum reported as contributed to the Diocesan Missionary Society is a matter of congratulation. We trust it may increase. We note with thankfulness, the incease of contributions from the Sunday-schools to this fund, which increase is practically a com-

pensation for the small decrease in the sum total received from the congregations in the Diocese. The sum of \$24,000 expended upon the missions of the Diocese in the past year is indication of widespread interest at home and abroad in our work. The story of its judicious distribution over a wide area would make a missionary volume, inspiring and stimulating. We urge upon the parishes and missions receiving aid from the Society that they exercise due care to develop their resources, and by renewed efforts to increase the too meagre support of the country clergy and at the same time to have in mind, as an ever desired ideal, the rendering of their parishes self-supporting. For so they will enhance the general interest of the Diocese in retaining the devoted clergy already at work, in developing new work, and in increasing the number of clergy in the field. We must recognize the fact that the Diocesan Missionary Society is one of our great unifying factors. if not the greatest, and be glad of the opportunity to aid through its agency the noble men who prefer self-denial in Virginia to sufficiency in other fields. These are the men, who, as a rule, send from their parishes our candidates for orders, who, in their turn, are not only not deterred by the hard conditions of a country parson's life, but rather stimulated by the examples of fidelity and ability set before them in their pastors. Your Committee are gratified that letters dimissory to the clergy are in favor of the Diocese. Four have removed to other Dioceses, while eight have been received from without the Diocese. The number of the clergy now on the roster of the Council is 101. As we look with nearer, clearer vision at the condition of our beloved Diocese, our hope increases for her prosperity and our confidence is strengthened in the fidelity of the whole people to the trust committed to them in the gospel of Christ, and in the sufficiency of that Gospel for the needs and perplexities of men everywhere.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The next annual Council of the Diocese, meeting on Wednesday, the 18th day of May, 1910, will fall upon the one hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary of the meeting of the first Convention of the Church in Virginia and the organization of the Diocese, and by a happy coincidence will meet on the same day of the week and of the month with that illustrious Convention of May 18, 1785;

Be it Resolved, That a committee, to consist of the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there shall be one, two other clergymen and two laymen, be appointed to arrange for such an observance of this anniversary in connection with the next Council as may seem to them appropriate and desirable, with full power to act in the premises.

The resolution was adopted.

The Rev. R. A. Goodwin, in seconding the above resolution, expressed the hope that the Council would meet next year in Richmond, and offered St. John's Church for any historical services it may be desired to hold there, and especially for a commemoration of the first Divine service held by a Convention of the Diocese, which service was held in that church on Thursday, May 19, 1785.

Mr. John B. Minor invited the Council to meet next year in the Church of the Holy Trinity, Richmond.

The Rev. Dr. Gravatt seconded the invitation.

Mr. P. H. Mayo offered All Saints' Church for the place of meeting.

Judge R. Carter Scott offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That in the list of places where the Council is appointed to meet Richmond be substituted for Winchester for next year, and that the invitation from the Church of the Holy Trinity that the Council meet in

that Church, and the offer of St. John's Church for historical services, be accepted.

The President appointed as the Committee to arrange for the historical observances at the next Council, the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor, the Rev. E. L. Goodwin, the Rev. W. M. Clark, Judge R. Carter Scott, and Mr. P. H. Mayo.

The Rev. G. Otis Mead read the report of the Sunday School Commission.

To the Annual Council of the Diocese:

1909]

Since the appointment of the present members of the Commission, at Fredericksburg, last May, we have not been able to have a full meeting, but have held one meeting of the Richmond members; have done quite a good deal of correspondence and, through the Convocations, have made ourselves responsible for the subject of the Sunday-school work to be discussed at their meetings. At the Richmond Convocation, St. Paul's Church, Goochland, Rev. Mr. Ridout made a splendid address, and that Convocation has incorporated in their by-laws a special order for the discussion of Sunday-school work at their regular meetings, insuring thereby the consideration of this branch of work at every meeting.

The President went to Tappahannock for the Convocation of Rappahannock Valley, and besides making an address, had a satisfactory conference with the clergy and laity, who were in attendance at the meeting.

The Sunday-school question was discussed at the meetings of the other three Convocations. On January 26th, under the auspices of the Commission, an institute was held in Alexandria, holding through the day with a public mass meeting at night. This meeting seems to have done a great deal of good, and, as one result, a Local Institute was organized with the Rev. W. H. Burkhardt, President. Attempts were made to hold similar institutes in Charlottesville and Fredericksburg, but owing to the local conditions and the near approach of Lent, these meetings were postponed. The President wrote to each Convocation asking that the Sunday-school question be presented at the various meetings held in May.

Commencing with January 12th, for three weeks, we had a stenographer doing work for the Commission. This young lady wrote a letter, and also sent a copy of the last annual report, and revised curriculum and schedule of the graded course, to every superintendent in the Diocese,

also making up a revised and corrected list of superintendents. We feel that much work has been donely quietly by the Commission during the year, although there has not been a general meeting; but the various members of the Commission have been communicated with and the work has gone on in a satisfactory way, for the small outlay of money and time on the part of those who compose the Commission.

We are thoroughly convinced that the Commission exercises the good office of stirring up renewed interest throughout the Diocese; being an established means through which people obtain information and get exchange of views as to running the individual Sunday-schools. The President and Secretary have written nearly two hundred letters during the year. We are hoping for more vigorous work, and trust the Council will think the Commission warrants existence, and that they will continue their appropriation of \$100 for the coming year. We have hopes of working during the summer for the establishment of local institutes in the chief centres throughout the Diocese, and will continue to hold ourselves in readiness to reply to inquiries and furnish all information at our command.

There are 1,150 white officers and teachers of the Sunday-schools in the Diocese. These faithful men and women are the best workers and contributors in the parishes, working and giving through the various organizations, responding to appeals made by the rectors. Therefore we urge upon the members of the Council, and the vestries throughout the Diocese, to do all they can to help these most faithful workers. Anything that can be done, should be gladly accorded them, and the vestries should support the Sunday-school with sympathetic help, and also appropriations, that they may have freer hands and stronger hearts, and besides, more efficient spiritual work accomplished, a great deal more could be done for missions.

There has been a small increase in the number of schools and the enrollment of scholars; also in contributions. There are, according to the statistician's report, a total of 136 white schools, 10,792 officers, teachers and scholars.

We remind the Council that the growth of the Church depends largely upon the Sunday-schools, and those who love the Church and have her interests at heart, should, as far as in them lies, spare no effort in increasing the number of Sunday-schools, the membership and the efficiency.

Besides the parish school, let the Home Department, neighborhood classes and Font Roll be given attention. The work requires unceasing thought and enthusiastic effort on the part of, first the clergy, and then

the vestries. Such thought and effort in behalf of Sunday-school work will bring larger returns to the Church by double than from any other source.

The Rev. W. N. Tillinghast read the following paper from the Piedmont Convocation:

As Secretary of the Piedmont Convocation, I am directed to read the following resolutions to the Council:

I. Resolved, by the Piedmont Convocation, that we, realizing the great dearth of candidates for Holy Orders, request the Council of the Diocese to urge upon the clergy and lay delegates, our great need in this direction, and to call upon them to use their influence for its relief, not only through the preaching of sermons, but by personal intercourse with the boys and young men of their congregations, voicing the great call of the Church to her Holy Ministry.

II. That this be read by the Secretary of this Convocation in the approaching Council of the Diocese at Leesburg, and be referred to the Committee on the Increase of the ministry.

These resolutions were referred to the Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

The Rev. Dr. Crawford read the following:

Report of Committee on the Proposed Canon X, Providing for a Diocesan Committee on Sunday School Education.

Your Committee has examined the proposed Canon, and desires to report it for the favorable consideration of this Council. It has been formulated in accordance with the recommendation of the *Joint Commission of the*

Report of Committee on the \$5,000,000 Pension Fund.

General Convention on Sunday School Education which was appointed at Boston in October, 1904, and which presented a very full report at the meeting of the General Convention in Richmond, 1907.

Your Committee observes the growing recognition and necessity of the *Diocese* as the chief unit of organization, to quote from the report of the Joint Commission. "Hitherto the *Parish* has been the only unit of educational organization on which we could rely. Now it is to be the Diocese. The diocesan machinery, when perfected, should be much easier to handle for advance movements than the parochial. There will be fewer links and less loss of energy."

Your Committee also recognizes that the time has come when there should be canonical recognition of the Sunday School work and provision made for its further development and efficiency. The call for instruction and suggestion comes from all over the Diocese, and no canonical provision has yet been made to supply this need and attempt to solve the many problems which have arisen both in organizing and maintaining Sunday Schools and applying the best teaching methods.

The Committee on Unfinished Business begs leave to report that there are two matters to be considered at this Council which have come over from the last Council, viz: the proposed amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution, relative to the election of the Secretary of the Council and the proposed amendment to Canon VIII relative to the Contingent Fund.

Resolved, That the amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the Diocese, proposed by the last Council, be now finally adopted.

The resolution was adopted. The amendment is in these words: "Strike out the words, 'A Secretary shall be appointed by the Council who shall continue in office during good behavior,' and insert, 'a Secretary shall be appointed annually by the Council,' "so that Article VIII of the Constitution now reads:

ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed annually by the Council. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully to deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Council which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to notify through the channel of the public papers, as he may think proper, the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journal of every succeeding Council a list of the clergy, with all alterations therein produced in the preceding year by ordinations, deaths, removals, suspensions and degradations.

The Rev. G. Otis Mead presented the following:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Your Committee notes with much satisfaction the increase in the offerings received from the Sunday-schools in the Diocese to this fund during the past year, but with disappointment at the decrease of \$434.67 from the churches and other sources.

The report of the Treasurer shows a smaller balance this year than last by \$586.87. It is earnestly suggested by your Committee that each parish be as liberal as possible during this year to this object, which will increase the efficiency of this Society.

We, your Committee, have to the best of our ability entered into the merits of the Protestant Episcopal Brotherhood, from the report of said Brotherhood presented at this Council, and having had the benefit of the views of the President of the Board of Trustees—recommend merging the funds now in the hands of this corporation into the Widows and Orphans Fund. For the following reasons:

1st. We learn that for some years past, it has been all but impossible to maintain even the life of this organization.

2nd. This lack of interest seems to have arisen in great part from the fact that the Widows and Orphans Fund, the Disabled Clergy Fund and the General Clergy Relief Fund have been especially emphasized and do actually fill the sphere originally intended to be occupied by the Protestant Episcopal Brotherhood.

3rd. We believe that when we have two organizations which virtually confer the same benefits; it is the part of wisdom to consolidate them and thereby eliminate unnecessary machinery.

4th. The committee is informed that the legal difficulty in making such merger of funds can be met by the trustees voting such merger

THURSDAY, MAY 27TH, 8 P. M.

The Council met as a Board of Missions, the Bishop presiding.

Evening Prayer was said by Archdeacon Neve and the Rev. Cary Gamble.

The report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society was read by the Rev. R. A. Goodwin, Secretary of the Society.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY, FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 10, 1909.

Brethren: Your Executive Committee respectfully present their annual report.

During the past year the Treasurer has received from Sunday-schools, \$2,922.94. From Churches, individuals and other sources, \$7,425.78, making a total of \$10,348.72.

As compared with the financial statement of last year, there is an increase from Sunday-schools of \$291.62; and a decrease from Churches and other sources of \$434.67; making a net decrease of \$143.05.

Last year the Treasurer reported \$250 received from the Contingent Fund of the Diocese. No account is taken of this amount in the above comparison.

The disbursements during the year have amounted to \$10,935.59. The balance in the treasury is \$1,356.46, as against a balance of \$1,-943.33 on the 10th of last May.

Report of Executive Committee D. M. S.

Appropriations have been made to forty-three missionaries, ranging in amount from \$50 to \$700. At the present time we have forty missionaries. One of these is Archdeacon of work among the colored people. He will present a report of the important work with which he is charged. Another general missionary, who receives aid from your Committee, is the Rev. O. J. Whilden, who ministers to the deaf-mutes in the Diocese. The Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge reports good progress, and preparation for greater efficiency in his important field. Six new churches will soon be built there. Twenty-eight points are now occupied. During the past year \$20,914.85 has been spent for salaries and equipment in this Archdeaconry. A fuller report will be seen in the Journal of the Council.

There have been three changes in the membership of the Executive Committee since last Council. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Rev. J. P. Tyler, Archdeacon, and left to be filled by the Committee, was filled by the election of Rev. James W. Morris, D. D. Mr. B. R. Wellford, after years of faithful service, resigned in November, 1908. This vacancy was filled by the election of Mr. Frank D. Beveridge. The Committee, as well as the whole Diocese, sustained a great loss in the death of Mr. Joseph Bryan. He had been a member of this Committee since 1884. His great, sympathetic and generous heart was in the work of our Society; to it he gave freely of his means, his time and his influence to the very end of his life. The vacancy caused by his death was filled by the election of his son, Mr. John Stewart Bryan.

The last Council authorized the appointment of an Archdeacon for the Diocese, for one year. He was to be nominated by the Bishop, and elected by your Executive Committee, with a salary of \$2,000, and traveling expenses. On July 7, 1908, a letter from the Bishop (who was then in England), was placed before the Executive Committee, requesting that Rev. A. V. Colston be appointed a missionary of this Society to do work assigned him by the Bishop, in vacant parishes, for a period of three months, at a salary of \$100 per month and traveling expenses. The Bishop's request was approved. On October 6th, after the Bishop had explained the efficient and encouraging work Mr. Colston had done, in raising salaries and awakening interest in vacant parishes, he requested that Mr. Colston be continued as missionary, at the same salary, till January 1st, 1909. The Bishop's request was granted. In November, after giving further evidence of his fitness, the Bishop nominated Rev. A. V. Colston as Archdeacon of the Diocese from January 1st, to April 1st, 1909. He was unanimously elected. In March, the Bishop

reminded the Committee that the Archdeacon's term of office would expire on April 1st, and that, as we have no Bishop-Coadjutor, it was very important that his work should not be discontinued. On motion, the term of office of the Archdeacon was extended to June 1st, 1909. Very soon after this action was taken, Mr. Colston was called to England by the death of his wife. In a short time he returned, and resumed his good work.

Your Committee has given serious and protracted consideration to the question of the republication of Our Diocesan Work. Changes in the postal laws, and the increased price of paper and printing, make the publication and distribution of the paper much more expensive than it was formerly. Suggestions and propositions from individuals, and from the Valley Convocation, have been duly weighed. It was decided to publish the paper four times a year. The first number was edited, published and distributed by Rev. Wm. M. Clark, to test the desire of the clergy as to the republication of the paper. The opinion of every clergyman of the Diocese, in charge of a parish, was asked on this question. So few were the replies, and so discouraging were a number of these, that the Committee determined to suspend the publication.

A publicity committee, with Dr. John R. Wheat as chairman, was appointed, to have printed and distributed, from time to time, such statistical and other information as the committee thought advisable. At a recent meeting of the Executive Committee, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That a resolution from this Executive Committee be sent to our next Council, asking the judgment of the Council as to the publication of a Diocesan organ."

That resolution is hereby presented for your consideration,

The Finance Committee of the Diocese reported to the Council last May that the Diocese owed the Diocesan Missionary Society \$833. At a meeting of the Executive Committee, held last January, it was resolved that the Committee remit the obligation due this society from the Contingent Fund of the Diocese. It will be recalled that this money was appropriated as part of the Archdeacon's salary by the Councils held in 1906 and 1907.

Once more, we most earnestly commend to all the members of this Society, which embraces all the Church people of the Diocese, the pressing claims and the urgent needs of same. Our missionaries are faithful and devoted. They are doing excellent work for Christ and His Church. Without them, more than one-half of the Churches of the Dio-

cese would be closed, and new stations, now occupied, would be abandoned. The continued prosperity, if not the very life, of our Church, depends upon this society. Let each one do his best to speed the good work, for it is indeed the work of Him who said: "Preach the Gospel and, lo, I am with you alway."

An offertory was taken for Meade Chapel (colored) in Alexandria. After which the congregation was dismissed by the Bishop with the benediction.

REPORT ON CANON X.

The order of the day being called, the Rev. E. L. Goodwin made the report of the Committee appointed to recast the proposed new Canon X, in the following form:

Resolved, That the following Canon be adopted, to be numbered Canon X, and that the Canons succeeding be renumbered accordingly. But this Canon shall not be in effect until the opening of the next Council.

CANON X.

Of the Diocesan Commission on Sunday School Education.

Section 1. The Council shall elect annually a Commission on Sunday School Education, to consist of the Bishop, and the Bishop Coadjutor if

there be one, six persons from the Diocese at large, and one person from each Convocation in the Diocese recognized by the Council as entitled to such representation, nominated by such Convocations respectively, and one member of the Faculty of the Theological Seminary in Virginia. And this Commission may, at their discretion, add to their number, for their own term of office, such representatives from local associations of Sunday school workers as they may select, not exceeding five.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of this Commission to study the problems of religious instruction and Church training in connection with the Sunday school; to investigate the needs of the Sunday schools of the Diocese; to adopt such measures as may be deemed advisable for promoting their efficiency; and generally to advance the cause of religious education in the Diocese; provided however, that no books or course of study shall be officially recommended by the Commission without the formal approval of the Bishop; and provided further, that nothing in this Canon shall be so construed as to impair the authority or abridge the responsibility of the minister of any Parish in his Sunday school work.

SECTION 3. The Bishop shall be *ex officio* President of the Commission, and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall be Vice-President. The Commission may raise funds and disburse the same for the conduct of their work, and may enact such Rules and By-Laws as shall be needful for their own guidance.

Section 4. When authorized by the Council the Bishop shall appoint a Diocesan Educational Secretary, subject to confirmation by the Commission. His salary and official expenses shall be fixed by the Council, who shall determine how, and by whom, the same shall be paid.

Section 5. The Educational Secretary shall be the agent of the Commission. At the request of the Rector he may visit the Sunday schools of any Parish, or advise in regard to them. As occasion offers he shall present the cause of religious education to the various congregations of the Diocese, and otherwise promote the general work of evangelization. He shall be subject to the direction of the Commission and shall make his reports to them as they may require.

Resolved, That in the "List of Objects for which Collections have been Recommended by the Council," that No. II read, instead of "Foreign Missions, in Epiphany," "Domestic and Foreign Missions, in Epiphany."

Resolved, That in the "List of Objects for which Collections have been Recommended by the Council," after No. VII-" Endowment Fund of the Theological Seminary "-there be inserted the words, "in May."

Resolved, That in the tabulated form of Parochial Reports there be inserted in the section "Diocesan Offerings," among other Diocesan objects, the "Endowment Fund of the Theological Seminary."

The resolutions were severally adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INCREASE OF THE MINISTRY.

The Rev. Dr. McBryde presented the report of the Committee on Increase of the Ministry, and asked that without being read it be received and printed in the Journal. It was so ordered.

Your Committee on the Increase of the Ministry asks the members of this Council to look some facts in the face, to-wit:

Report of Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

That not one man from this Diocese is in the graduating class of our Seminary; that the postulants, at the present, are only three in number; that in the Church at large there is a steady falling off in number of candidates for orders that the supply of ministers in our Church is not equal to the demand. Certainly the outlook does not warrant the indifference that characterizes many in the ministry and many more among the laity towards the existing condition of things.

If the Church is not to die out in a few places for lack of ministerial oversight—the preaching of the word and pastoral supervision—something must be done to increase the number of the clergy in our Church. Something can be done. Let that be admitted and it will be done. Our Lord has told us how our great need is to be met, "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers into the harvest." St. James tells us "ye have not because ye ask not." Do we really pray about this matter? Is the cry importunate, expectant, sincere?

It is true that our Lord has answered the prayer of His Church. If the ministers of the Gospel in this country were properly distributed, there would not be a community in this broad land without its religious teacher. The divisions among Christian believers should be laid to heart and the prayer for Christian unity should rise unceasingly from our lips. But believing as we do in the mission of our Church to be a rallying point for our divided forces or denominations, we should consider how can we fill the depleted ranks of our own ministry? Therefore, we would respectfully suggest that one of the most potent influences that can draw men to the sacred ministry is intense spirituality and entire consecration on the part of the parochial clergy. The living example of "the beauty of holiness" in the personal life of the pastor is the most constraining of appeals to the spiritually-minded among the young men of a congregation to draw them to a life entire in the Master's service.

In addition to sermons, now and then, that set forth the need, the character and the claims of the sacred ministry, every pastor should carefully study the young men of his charge and when he finds earnestness of spirit, activity in Christian work, consistency of life, with average intellectual ability in any young man, he should ask that person to consider the claims of the ministry as a life work. No man should say to any one, "you ought to enter the ministry." That is a prescience that is presumptuous and unwarranted in experience. But to suggest and urge that amid the calls that come to young men to choose a vocation, the needs of the ministry should be earnestly and prayerfully considered, is due to a perplexed spirit on the part of his pastor.

Minute on the late Joseph Bryan.

The personal interview is far more helpful than the most caefully prepared sermon.

Christian parents, also, should be faithfully dealt with to consecrate their children to the Master's service, a matter some are reluctant to do lest one or other of the family might join themselves to the unworldly and materially hard lives of saving the lost and guiding the saved. And they should be urged to have family worship, morning and evening, according to the forms prescribed in the Prayer Book. The passing away of this Christian duty to a large extent, accounts for the indifference of children to the highest of all earthly callings and unconsciously induces some to neglect the Divine guidance in the affairs of life. The habit of Bible reading-of the word of God, which is the sword of the Spirit-should be urged upon the children by our Christian parents as the direct means of ordering the steps of their children in the ways of God. The promise of "Wisdom from above" should be claimed by clergy and laity alike, and then the Holy Spirit who "leads into all the truth," would show the way to meet the present conditions, which to some of us are alarming as we face the impending future.

MINUTE OF THE COUNCIL ON THE LATE JOSEPH BRYAN, LL. D.

We, your Committee, wish to spread upon the minutes of this Council some permanent record of the deep sense of the loss sustained by the Diocese of Virginia in the death of Joseph Bryan. His life as one of the State's foremost citizens is well known to all here present. We need not speak of the brilliant heroism of his youth, when as a mere boy, he left the nurturing care of home to be brought up under the stern tutelage of the army. We need not tell of the achievements of his mature years, which illustrated so well the truth that

"Peace hath her Victories
No less renowned than War."

And it is hardly necessary to repeat the story of his deeds as one of Virginia's greatest philanthropists. In this presence we wish to refer to him only as the devoted and able layman of this Diocese.

The positions he filled in the Church make a remarkable list of religious

activities for any one man: twenty-five years the Superintendent of the Sunday-school of Emmanuel Church, Brook Hill; thirty-five years a vestryman, twenty-five years a lay delegate to this Council, eight sessions a deputy to the General Convention, for many years member of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

With what splendid fidelity and ability he discharged the duties of all these positions is a matter of Diocesan record. Mr. Bryan was in the truest sense a man, a gentleman, and a Christian. In him the moral integrity of true manhood, the spirit of ancient chivalry, and the loyalty of the true disciple of Christ were strikingly and beautifully blended. He held in wonderful equilibrium sound judgment and sublime faith. Many men possess the cool calculating sense, and many others the strong faith; but few are gifted with the two qualities to such a marked degree, and yet so well balanced. His strong religious sentiment inspired his judgment, and his clear judgment poised his faith. His opinions were a mighty bulwark to his local Church, and proved an unfailing tower of strength in this Diocesan Council. His quick, deep insight was relied upon for the clear solution of so many of the most perplexing subjects of discussion.

But above all, in business, in home, in society, and in the Church, his sublime faith in God and unswerving loyalty to his Saviour, compelled the respect of the careless and irreverent, and inspired the faith of the weak-hearted. His religion was his life. His passing away left a vacancy in the work of this Diocese and in the religious life of this State, which will not be filled, we fear, for a long while.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

Your Committee on New Parishes would respectfully report, that they have had before them a petition from the congregations of Christ Church,

Report of Committee on New Parishes.

Gordonsville, being a separate congregation in St. Thomas' Parish, Epiphany Church, Somerset, and Barbour Memorial Church, Barboursville, also in St. Thomas' Parish, praying for a division of that Parish and the formation of a new Parish to be known as Spotswood Parish, on lines therein laid down. The petition is in proper form and the canonical provisions have been complied with.

We think that the petitioners are entitled to have a new Parish formed as they desire, provided that the lines of division can be so drawn as not to do injustice to the old Parish. But the lines as proposed in the petition seem to us not to fulfil this condition. The Parish of St. Thomas covers the greater part of the county of Orange and all of the county of Green, making a long, narrow Parish. The proposed new Parish cuts the old Parish in two, leaving the county of Green on the west entirely separated from the remainder of the Parish lying in the eastern part of Orange. This we think ought not to be done.

We therefore recommend, that the petition be not granted, but that it be returned to the Committee of the congregations petitioning with the suggestion that if possible new lines shall be agreed upon by all the parties concerned to be presented to the next Council.

The lines of the proposed division were as follows:

"Beginning at Mallory's Ford, on the North Anna river, thence following the public road to Madison Run Station, thence following the road to Montpelier by the old Marble Quarry to the top of Emerson's mountain, thence with the crest of the mountain southwest to the township line, hence with the said line northward to the Rapidan river; all the territory south and west of said line being in Orange county to constitute the new Parish of Spotswood.

Territorial extent of proposed Parish: The northern line about seventeen miles long, the western about eleven, the southern and eastern together about seven, for the proposed Parish approximates a triangular shape.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR AND HISTORIOGRAPHER.

As Registrar and Historiographer of the Diocese, I have continued the work on much the same lines as reported last year. I have answered many letters which have been written to me, or referred to me by others, and in every case have at least been at pains to supply, if possible, the information sought. I have made a study of the old records of several parishes, and have prepared two articles for the press. The Rev. William H. Meade, D. D., has sent me two papers left by his grandfather, Bishop Meade, being the original memorandum, signed by himself and Mr. Joseph Ball, of the sale of the old Wicomico Church, in Northumberland county, as is set forth in his report to the Convention of 1846 and in his "Old Churches," &c., Vol. II, pp. 134-5; and also the note given by the purchaser for \$250, being one half of the purchase price, which note yet remains unpaid. I am also indebted to the Rev. C. G. Chamberlayne for an extract from the Calendar of State Papers, Vol. I, p. 11, which fixes the fact that St. Peter's Parish, New Kent, was formed from the older parish of Blissland, and the date of the division, which was agreed upon in 1678 and confirmed by the General Court April 29, 1679.

The Chair appointed the Rev. J. R. Ellis and the Rev. W. R. Mason as tellers.

It was moved by the Rev. J. H. Dickinson and carried, that the four clergymen and the four laymen receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

The ballot was taken and the tellers retired.

The Rev. Dr. A. Crawford offered the following:

WHEREAS, The Church of Christ today in all parts of the world is manifestly impressed by the serious results of our unhappy divisions and in view of the leading part taken by our beloved Church in America towards the reunion of the Churches as expressed by the Chicago Quadrilateral basis of Union, afterwards confirmed by the Conference at Lambeth, England, by all branches of the Anglican Communion, and known since as the Chicago-Lambeth basis of Union, which has stimulated all the Churches to prayer that these divisions may in some way be healed and that the Master's prayer "that they all may be one" may be realized, and considering the general and hopeful efforts that are being made by the Protestant Churches to accomplish this object, not only by conference and council, but by federation when possible and in some cases by actual organic union;

Resolved, That this Council express its grateful acknowledgements to Almighty God for the progress made towards a united brotherhood in Christ, and its earnest prayer for further expressions of unity until the reunited Church, the body of Christ, as our blessed Lord conceived it, be fully accomplished; and,

Representatives Elected to Missionary Council.

OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

Resolved, further, That in an humble effort to do our part to help on this happy consummation we do appoint a Committee of Conference, consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese, three clergymen and three laymen, to confer with our brethren of the other Churches looking towards methods and suggestions for further affiliation; that this Committee meet at least twice a year for Conference, and that it report at the Annual Council of the Diocese.

The resolutions were adopted.

On motion, the appointment of the Committee was left in the hands of the Bishop.

The following Committee was accordingly appointed:

The Bishop, the Rev. Doctors A. Crawford, R. J. McBryde and James W. Morris, and Messrs. John B. Minor, Rosewell Page and John Rutherfoord.

The Rev. Everard Meade moved that after the report of the tellers and the reading of the minutes, the Council do adjourn with the usual devotional exercises, which was carried.

The tellers made their report, and the President announced that under the rule adopted the following gentlemen were elected representatives to the Missionary Council:

Of the clergy, the Rev. Archdeacon Neve, the Rev. Robert K. Massie, D. D., the Rev. H. B. Lee and the Rev. W. D. Smith.

Of the laity, Mr. Rosewell Page, Mr. H. C. Marchant, Mr. W. W. Chamblin, and Mr. John B. Minor.

It was moved and carried that the four clergymen and the four laymen who received the next highest number of votes be declared elected alternates in the order of their votes.

Under this rule the following were found to be elected alternates in order: The Rev. Dr. J. Y. Downman, the Rev. William J. Morton, the Rev. George P. Mayo and the Rev. E. B. Burwell; and Mr. R. W. Hilleary, Judge A. W. Wallace, Mr. James Carr Baker and Mr. Wm. H. McCuen.

Adjourned sine die.

The minutes of this day's session were read and approved.

The 672d hymn was then sung, and the Bishop bade the Council to prayer, remembering especially the Rev. Arthur P. Gray, who was ill, and pronounced the benediction.

REPORTS OF ARCHDEACONS AND WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

I.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON OF THE BLUE RIDGE, DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA, 1908—1909.

IVY DEPOT. VA., May 17, 1909.

THE RIGHT REV. R. A. GIBSON, D. D., Bishop of Virginia:

My Dear Bishop.—In presenting my report of the work in this Archdeaconry during the past year, I am glad to be able to say, that the outlook is encouraging. We have not only been able to hold our own, but have at various centres made considerable progress.

In District No. 1, which is under my own supervision, there has been marked growth at the mission of St. John the Baptist, which has been due in a great measure to the faithful work of Miss Louisa Smart who has, however, left the field to take up work in Alaska.

At the mission of the Good Shepherd, the work has been much helped by the coming of Deaconess Boorman, who is assisting the Rev. Dr. McIlhany; and a new mission has been opened in connection with the Good Shepherd chapel.

Owing to the appointment of a rector for Greenwood parish, the Holy Cross mission will have the benefit of his pastoral care and oversight, which for several years it has lacked. This, together with the presence of a deaconess at the Mission House, will make it possible to push the work vigorously, and attain better results than in the past.

At Alberene, the deaconess, Miss LeCompte, is doing faithful work, and has a fine Sunday-school.

In District No. 2, many signs of progress are apparent. The membership has been largely increased during the year by the confirmation of some 40 persons.

The school at the Mission Home has been enlarged, and this year two teachers have been at work instead of one. The former school house has been altered, and fitted up as a hospital and dispensary, and a new and large clothing bureau has been established.

Archdeacon Neve's Report.

At Simmon's Gap, in this district, a chapel is to be built this summer from money raised by Mrs. K. E. Pusey.

A great step forward has also taken place in connection with the Industrial School. About 500 acres of land have been purchased in Bacon Hollow, Greene county, and an expert farmer has been secured, who is rapidly bringing the arable land into a high state of cultivation, so as to make the school as far as possible, self-supporting.

Mr. Mayo has been busily employed this winter in raising money for the erection of buildings on the Industrial Farm, so that the school may be opened next fall, and his labors have met with very considerable success.

In District No. 3, under the Rev. W. M. Cleaveland, the work has held its own, and preparations are being made for an extension of our missionary operations in this section. A new mission is to be started about half way between Stanardsville and Lydia, where a Sunday-school and day school are much needed.

The Board has also appropriated money for the building of a church at St. James' Mission, Lydia. The settlement there consists of a mission home and hospital; and the building of a church will add greatly to the present efficiency and future progress of the work.

At Pocosan it has been decided to build a new mission house, in place of the small log cabin which has been used for some years by our two faithful workers, the Misses Towles. The money has already been given for this purpose, and as soon as a new and more favorable site can be obtained, the work will be commenced.

At Stanardsville the church has been repainted, and a confirmation class awaits the coming of the Bishop. The money for the second payment on the rectory property is in hand, and will be paid when due.

District No. 4. The work on the west side of the Blue Ridge, under the supervision of the Rev. Jos. R. Ellis, has made considerable progress during the year. The mission at Berrytown, with its graded school and its church, is growing stronger year by year.

At Ingham, a concrete school or parish building is in course of construction, near the church; and with a resident worker, the prospects for increased usefulness for our Church in this community are very good.

At Piney Grove Hollow, Mr. Ellis is building a church, which is greatly needed, as this community was without religious services until our Church came to the help of the neglected people. Mr. Ellis is also contemplating the erection of a church at Elkton, which is cer-

tainly a strategic point; but it may take some little time before this plan can be carried out.

This district has recently been divided, through the appointment of the Rev. W. H. Darbie as rector of the churches and missions in Page county, in succession to the Rev. Ivan Green, who for a year and a half had acted as assistant to Mr. Ellis.

Beyond the limits of District 4, but on the west side of the Blue Ridge, the Rev. R. C. Cowling has opened up work at the north end of Clarke county, at a place called Snicker's Gap, in the Blue Ridge. It is a fine field for missionary work, as it is a thickly settled community, and we are the first in the field. Mr. Cowling has commenced a church at this point, and has it under roof. Later on we hope to start a school.

In addition to Mr. Cowling's work, the Revs. T. C. Page and Robeson are opening up work of a similar kind in Clarke and Warren counties respectively.

As the Advisory Board has reported to the Diocesan Missionary Society the exact amounts received and disbursed by its treasurer during the past year, which report will be incorporated in that of the Executive Committee to be presented to the approaching Council, I shall confine myself to a few general statements with regard to the finances. The total amount available for expenditure throughout the Archdeaconry, including some local funds which have not passed through our treasurer's hands, has come to about \$30,000.

Of this large amount, some \$8,000 remains unexpended, half of which represents the money raised in Richmond for the Industrial School.

The Advisory Board has proved itself, of the greatest assistance in administering this rapidly growing work, and in exercising a wise and judicious control over the expenditure of the large sums of money entrusted to its care.

At a recent meeting of the Board, it was decided to publish a monthly paper, for the purpose of keeping the numerous friends of the work and others fully informed as to what is being done, and as to the various objects to which help can be given. The paper has been already started, under my editorship, and under the business management of the Rev. Mr. Ellis.

REPORT OF THE REV. JOHN MONCURE, D. D., ARCHDEACON OF THE COLORED WORK, FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 1909.

Rt. Rev. R. A. GIBSON, D. D.:

My Dear Bishop.—The year just ended has given its testimony to the power of God's grace. Our work has made such progress as to inspire hope of brighter things even in the near future. Earnest prayer, the index of earnest effort in any department of the great work which God has committed to His servants, will reveal Him as our co-worker and companion, even though we may be in the midst of the greatest perplexities. Both the difficulty and importance of the work of the Church among the colored people must be recognized, and with such to call for renewed earnestness, that work must succeed

No Christian can advocate the principle that any part of that work included in the words, "preach the Gospel to every creature," is to be neglected, and the earnest question "Lord what would Thou have me to do," represents the ideal position towards the colored as well as all other works for God. In reference to my individual work during the year, I make my report with a mingled sense of regret and gratitude. Regret that during part of the time sickness prevented me from doing all that I would, and I was unable to attend several important meetings in the Diocese and presenting the needs to the Church people, and gratitude that good health has returned, and that even while sick I was enabled by God's help to supervise the work, and see that it continued uninterruptedly in the different parts of the field.

My first act in the year was an address at the Diocesan Council in St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, in which a resume of the work was given and its needs pointed out to the assembled clergy and laity representing all parts of the Diocese. May 27th-Visited the wife of Dr. John H. Smyth, of the Broadneck Reformatory. She was critically ill. and subsequently was baptized by me, and received the Holy Communion. I also visited her when she was dying and had the commendatory prayer.

On June 4, I attended the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, which continues in excellent condition under the able management of the Rev. Dr. C. Braxton Bryan and his faithful faculty.

During the summer I had numerous conferences and a busy correspondence in reference to the work at Gordonsville, Albano, Orange

county, and Millers, Essex. Changes occurred at the first two named, Sarah J. Reese and William Armstrong the teachers having resigned. Considerable care was given to the selection of their successors. Two young colored Churchwomen, Annie E. Todd, and Josephine Scruggs were secured, and their work during the year has been satisfactory, and the field in that section is in a better condition than for years.

Sandy A. Morgan, a candidate for Orders, soon to graduate from the Divinity School, had charge of the services at these points during the session, going to them twice a month. He is a man of good sense and piety, and his aid has been very great in enabling me to arrange the work.

The work at Miller's has been in charge of John Scott, another candidate in the graduating class, who gave a monthly service during the fall, winter and spring. The excellent work done here by the Rev. Thomas D. Lewis is bearing permanent fruits, a number of people having been baptized, and a class awaiting the visitation of the Bishop. A generous donation of land for a church yard and cemetery has been made to this church, by Mr. James Lewis, of Millers.

In September, I had a conference with Miss Edrington, in Stafford county, whose good work continues. The Rev. E. B. Burwell, rector of Overwharton parish, gives the people occasional and most acceptable services.

Dr. J. H. Smyth, Superintendent of the Reformatory for colored youth, at Broadneck, in Hanover county, died in September. He was one of our most useful and intelligent colored laymen, and a prospective candidate for Orders.

I had the pleasure of presenting him for confirmation some years since, and since that time his interest in the work has been active. His death is a great loss, but his "works live after him."

On October 28th, at the fall meeting of the Richmond Convocation, held in St. Paul's Church, Goochland, I made an address on the colored work at the public missionary service. On the 13th of November, I again visited and had services at the Broadneck School, and was encouraged to note its good condition, under the acting supervision of Mrs. E. G. Shippen, who is ably succeeding Dr. Smyth.

The knowledge of the Church Catechism on the part of the boys I have never seen equalled in any Sunday-school in the country. Though an undenominational institution, the ways of the Church are gladly acknowledged, and another confirmation class is in prospect.

On December 27th, I baptized a colored man in the State prison, at Richmond.

Archdeacon Moncure's Report.

On December 30th, I made an address at the Christmas celebration of the Sunday-school of the Church of the Good Shepherd, at Richmond, which continues to do good work under the Rev. R. A. Goodwin, and the faithful helpers from St. John's Church.

Another service at the Colored Reformatory, March 11th, and ten private services to the colored people in Richmond, during April, complete my pastoral duties during the year.

Have been in touch, by correspondence, with every point. The works at Millwood, Clarke county, in the parish of the Rev. J. M. Robeson; Christ Church, Wickliffe, in that of Rev. R. C. Cowling; Meade Chapel, Alexandria, of which the Rev. J. F. Mitchell is pastor, working under the Rev. Wm. J. Morton, of Christ Church; Emmanuel, Henrico, Rev. E. E. Osgood, rector; Stony Point, Albemarle, Miss Selma Nelson, teacher; St. Philip's, Richmond, Rev. C. L. Somers, pastor; Cappahoosic, Gloucester, where services are given by the Rev. Wm. B. Lee, and the Good Shepherd, Theological Seminary, under the Seminary Missionary Society, are we trust and believe being blessed.

One of these points I single out as calling for special effort along an important line. Meade Chapel, Alexandria, is in the midst of a very large and important field. It was established many years ago, and is part of the work of Christ Church.

Much good has been done, and among the results has been at least one colored clergyman, who occupied a place at the very forefront in the work of the Church among his people. It's need is a new church building, the present one being entirely inadequate to its needs, and being also in a state of comparative dilapidation.

An effort is being made to meet this need. A committee of gentlemen in Alexandria has been appointed to take the matter in charge.

The pastor has been very active, but up to the present time has raised but four or five hundred dollars of the necessary four thousand.

With a good church building, which will ensure the stability of the work, the amount of good which may be done is incalculable.

May God put it into the hearts of those whom He has blessed with the good things of this world to "come over and help us."

The future of the work is brightening. Two additional clergymen will be put in the field within the next few months, our candidates for Orders having passed their examinations with credit and having shown themselves good and useful men.

During the year the receipts from all sources in the Diocese have aggregated \$1,726.08. This has been supplemented by the usual appropriations of the Board of Missions.

Miss Stuart's Report.

The amount thus acknowledged is an increase over the offerings of other years, save one, when an extraordinary amount was required. This is an encouragement, for which thanks be to God. When, however, we look at the multitude, amounting to about three hundred thousand souls in our Diocese, we can see that such effort is but a small beginning, and we should be "up and doing" in this work as in all others which have the stamp of Divine approval. Be assured that notwithstanding any predjudice or criticism of this work, it is God's work for which all of His people, according to their ability will be held accountable.

REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, MAY, 1907.

To the Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, President, ex-officio:

Another year has closed the record of the "nineteenth year" of the Virginia Branch, with its aspirations to reach a higher plane of spiritual missionary effort and to accomplish yet greater things for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, which the strange unfolding of opportunity that one cannot fail to see is more apparent in the world. The Spirit of God is moving in the world. He is moving in the Church, and out of unrest and opposition an impulse that must be Divine, is stirring many hearts, and the Virginia Branch must learn the place which God has for it in this "world opportunity." While we gratefully recognize whatever success has been accomplished, we see only a small group within the Church really interested, a still smaller group really concerned, as we also see a waning sense of personal responsibility to meet the "Missionary Problems of the Hour," so that the great pentup forces of God's power may be set free, by prayer, to work on us, on our Missionaries and on the World.

The Virginia Branch owes very much of its zeal the past year to the inspiring meeting in Warrenton, which roused interest and stimulated the women to a practical evidence of the same, by pledges to the threc great objects of Missionary gifts, as belonging to Auxiliary work. The foreign fields and their needs were ably presented by Rev. E. J. Lee, for "St. Agnes School," China, and by Miss Boyd for her work in Japan. The domestic fields received due share through appeals from Alaska, Utah and Idaho. And always true to the old Diocese they

gladly responded to the many appeals from earnest "beggars" or through appealing letters. From each of these fields encouraging reports of work done were given, but the need of developing plans, already begun, was strongly urged, calling for prayer, interest and money, to hold to strengthen and to advance the work. Ever ready to respond, the delegates quickly and liberally pledged to each appeal even to finally buying "fifty-one yards of land" for St. Agnes School, so becoming land owners in China (both Juniors and Seniors). But as all human endeavor has its limitations so we mark failures that should humble vet rouse to new effort for the new year. In reviewing the past record of "nineteen years," one feels the women of the Virginia Branch, filled with the desire to be loyal to the aims of the Auxiliary and to do God's work, as He gives opportunity, are steadily climbing the hill of missionary knowledge to higher planes, where new and wonderful vistas rise before them, and they begin to see this sin-laden world as God sees it, and to know the power of an unseen force that can and will work in and through them so they may have the "joy in service" of winning the Kingdom.

Three new branches have been organized, and one revived, while in the "81," we see signs of growing interest. Brazil has been remembered by gifts, as well as China, Japan and Africa. The annual pledges, and the "specials," though numerous, are in hand. The Juniors still are joining in every good work, and are wonderful stimulants to the W. A. The new "U. O." officer is fulfilling her duties, as also the new "B. B." officer, with zeal and fidelity. The C. P. C. is increasing its usefulness by the effort of its correspondent, but the Emergency Fund grows slowly.

Again we renew our thanks to our Bishop and to our clergy for their hearty co-operation, unfailing interest and encouragement which make the work only a *delight*.

Report of Richmond City Missionary.

REPORT OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL MISSIONARY AT RICHMOND FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 1909.

Richmond, Va., May 19, 1909.

Rt. Rev. ROBERT A. GIBSON, D. D.:

My Dear Bishop,—I herewith submit my annual report. As the years pass they bring a renewed reminder of the importance of the work in the city, and also the deepening sense of responsibility to the worker. The harvest is indeed plenteous, and the great strength which can only be imparted by the Spirit of the Living God, is needed on the part of the laborer. Much of the work is as the bread cast "upon the waters," and a very great part shows quick and encouraging results, for which we "thank God and take courage."

In many respects the last year has been the most fruitful in the history of the City Missionary Society. Prison work, that in the charitable and benevolent institutions, as well as among the needy poor, have received active recognition. The special encouragement of the year has been the comparatively large numbers added to the Church of those whose environment has been such as to darken and dishearten. In this connection attention is called to the ministrations at the Laurel Reformatory for boys and the State Penitentiary. In both departments the Sacraments of the Church have been administered with frequency, and efforts of the nature, which I have made by God's help, at all points, have been made to bring the comforts of the religion of Jesus Christ to all, from the men under sentence of death to the shortest term prisoners.

In the hospitals and homes I trust that the same comforts have helped many to bear patiently the great trials of flesh which have been placed upon them.
