# FORM FOR MAKING BEQUEST

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether The funds already created and now held by the said corporation are:

- 1. The Disabled Clergy Fund.
- 7. Pohick Ch. Endowment Fund.
- 2. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund. 8. Yeocomico Ch. Endowment Fund.
- 3. The Episcopal Fund.
- 9. Monumental Church Fund.

- 4. The Bruce Fund.
- 10. The Carry Randolph Memorial
- 5. The A. Baker Evangelist Fund.
- Fund.

6. The St. Andrew's Fund.

11. Fork Church Fund, and others.

All devises or bequests to any of the said funds should be made to "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Virginia, for the sole use and benefit of the—Fund [naming the fund intended], now held in trust by the said corporation."

If it is desired to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its President, Rt. Rev Robert A. Gibson, D.D.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is, "The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary and High School in Virqinia," and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia," and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia." and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg, Va., is: "The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School in Virginia," and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequests: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia, March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

# **ORGANIZATION**

From Canon I, Section 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures, or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be so designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all of the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

# RULES OF ORDER

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Election of a Secretary.

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees. Report of standing committees. Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President, and announced on the first day of the Council, the following Standing Committee, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Clergy Relief, to whom shall be referred the accounts of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and of the Disabled Clergy Fund, and other matters cognate thereto.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds not specified above held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on Missions, to whom shall be referred the report and accounts of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society, and other matters bearing on the missionary work of the Diocese.

- A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.
- A Committee on New Parishes.
- A Committee on Parochial Reports.
- A Committee on Increase of the Ministry.
- A Committee on Colonial Churches.
- A Committee on Unfinished Business.

And the chairman of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President shall think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next succeeding Council.

5th. Immediately after the reading of the Bishop's address the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, the Commission on Sunday-school Education, to fill vacancies, if any exist, on the Committee on Church Property, to elect representatives to the Missionary Council and delegates to the Sunday-school Convention of the Third Department, and such other committees or representatives as need to be chosen annually.

6th. The Council shall sit as a Board of Missions on the first day of the session at 8:15 o'clock p. m. The President of the Council, or some member of the Council selected by him, shall preside. The Secretary of the Council shall be Secretary of the Council sitting as a Board of Missions.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary before debate.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, when ever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *Provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

25th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action of the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only, when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

26th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the President may appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And this Committee may report at any time.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

27th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

28th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

29th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

30th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

# Journal of the One Hundred and Nineteenth Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

St. James' Church, Richmond, Va., Wednesday, May 20, 1914.

By appointment of the Bishop of the Diocese, under the authority of Article I of the Constitution, the One Hundred and Nineteenth Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia assembled in St. James' Church, Richmond, Va., on this day at 10 o'clock a. m.

The Ante-Communion Service was read by the Rev. Berryman Green, D.D.

The Bishop, the Right Rev. Robert A. Gibson, D.D., read as a Communion address that part of his annual address to the Council commemorating the clergymen who have departed this life since the last Council.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Thomas C. Darst, Rector of the Church, and the Rev. Drs. Berryman Green and Edward L. Goodwin.

After Divine Service the Council was called to order by the Bishop, who, on account of his late illness, called the Rev. Berryman Green, D.D., President of the Standing Committee, to the Chair.

The roll of the clergy, and the names of the Lay Delegates whose credentials had been received, were called by the Secretary, and a quorum in both orders was found to be present.

The Rev. Dr. E. L. Goodwin was nominated to succeed himself as Secretary, and, there being no other nominations, on motion the Rev. Mr. Brydon was requested to cast the ballot of the Council for Dr. Goodwin, and he was elected.

The Secretary announced the appointment of the Rev. Geo. MacLaren Brydon as Assistant Secretary.

The following gentlemen were appointed as the Committee on

Credentials: Messrs. J. K. M. Norton, Thos. C. Ruffin and the Rev. E. B. Burwell.

The Secretary, for the Rector of St. James' Church, moved that the following be the hours of meeting for this Council: To meet at 9:30 a. m. for Divine Service and continue in session until 1:30 p. m.; meet again at 3:30 p. m. and continue in session until 6:00 p. m.; evening services to begin at 8:15, which was adopted.

The Bishop then read the remainder of his annual address, which, with the portion of it read at the Communion Service, follows:

#### THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, Greeting:

It is my privilege and pleasure, my dear brethren, to give you my thanks for the charming trip to Europe which you enabled me to take last summer. I have often felt since that to it I may have owed my partial recovery now. The confinement to my home and the entire inability to make visitations in the Diocese has been a trial, but the recovery so far made is cause for the most profound gratitude. I have felt as if the Psalm of Hezekiah—116—ought to give the tone to my thoughts for the rest of my life. Many gratifying things, however, have attended my illness, and, among others-not by any means the least-has been the great and unbounded kindness shown by my brethren in the Episcopate. The Bishops who are neighbors to us have done everything that was possible to lighten my labors and to insure the progress of the Diocese. My thanks are hereby rendered to them in conjunction with yours. Bishops Gravatt, Harding, Garland, Tucker and Kinsolving have all done great work in confirming classes in different parts of the Diocese. Bishop Gravatt's assistance has been especially unstinted and valued.

Let me now call your attention to some matters which have come to us in consequence of a general movement of the Church towards more complex organization. The General Convention has sent us down several changes of the Constitution for our consideration; first, with regard to the office of Presiding Bishop; second, as to the time of meeting of the General Convention; third, a provision for change of place of trial of presbyters and deacons under certain circumstances, and fourth, as to amendment of the table of lessons, table of psalms on certain days and the table of selection of psalms. I shall ask that these changes of the Constitution be referred to a committee to report at this Council.

A communication from the Census Bureau, Department of Commerce and Labor, in Washington, asks that all clergymen in Virginia will aid in bringing to the attention of the people the importance of registering all births and deaths. It is fully recognized in this communication that no legal obligation rests on clergymen in the matter, but an appeal is made to them because these records are the only basis upon which many questions important to the community can be ultimately decided, and the clergy have the ear of many influential people. It is a way and an easy way for the clergy to render valuable social service.

A communication also from the General Board of Religious Education, of which the presiding Bishop is President, deserves our attention; and we note that in regard to the financial support of this Board the Diocese is asked to assume an apportionment of \$378.00. It seems to me that this communication must be referred to the Committee on Finance first of all and then possibly to some other committee.

The new Canon in regard to provinces will also require reference to the Committee on Finance because of expenditures necessary to keep our place in the line of Dioceses forming the province.

These expenses I should put at not less than \$400.00 a year.

I wish to report that owing to the lamented death of Rev. R. A. Goodwin and Rev. W. M. Clark the office of Chaplains has been rendered vacant, and I have appointed as my Chaplains Rev. J. F. Ribble and Rev. Kensey J. Hammond.

At this meeting of the Council we are to hear an account of one of the largest, the most important and the most statesmanlike schemes that has ever been presented to any portion of the Church of Our Lord Jesus Christ. It is nothing less than a plan for the scientific pensioning of all clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and the purpose is to arrange the details of this scheme in such a way that every man will, by his own labors in the

Church, secure the pension which he is to receive on retirement, and his family after his death.

It so happens that your own Bishop was on the Commission for devising some such plan and has been made a member of the corporation which is to carry it out under the direction of the General Convention. This fact, of course, makes it a matter of the deepest interest to him, and, it is hoped, will add to the interest of the members of the Council also. As you know, neither the Bishop of Virginia nor the Diocese of Virginia deals in the stupendous sums of money of which we shall hear, but we are only asked to do what we can.

Mr. Monell Sayre will be present at this Council and will speak to us on this subject at least once during its session. I bespeak for him the attention which is due to a perfectly disinterested man, and, at the same time, a most skillful manager in the arrangement of precisely such affairs.

Now let me call your attention to the Missionary Society of the Diocese. It assumes at present proportions which add greatly to its importance. Heretofore for generations it has done absolutely necessary work in and for this Diocese, but largely without relation to the other parts of the Church. Now, however, it must stand in the position of a Board of Missions of the Diocese; a Board which will be the only body competent to speak for the whole Diocese in circumstances where more or less friction and frequent clashes of opinion are almost certain. Let me explain. The Board of Missions in New York is very much pleased with the attitude which this Diocese has assumed of not receiving aid from that Board, but there will be differences of opinion as to that policy; differences varying with varying dispositions and varying circumstances; differences characterizing different epochs, if not years, and the Board of Missions of the Diocese of Virginia must be ready to speak on every necessary occasion for Virginia. Again, if we have a province, of which this Diocese shall form a part, much of the work of the province will be some kind of co-operation in missions. That is really all it has to do: The province to have a Board of Missions. Now it is exceedingly important that the Diocese of Virginia shall have its Board of Missions which can and shall speak the mind of the Diocese in all dealings with the

Provincial Board of Missions. The strength of the Colony and State of Virginia has always been that it has moved as one. The dignity and strength of the Diocese depends on living up to the example. With an Executive Secretary having close and thorough knowledge of the apportionments on the Diocese for its missions, having a Treasurer through whose hands will pass all the money given for missionary work in the Diocese, and having an Executive Committee, backed by the Council, to advise in the expenditure of the money we receive, our organization in that respect will be as nearly complete as we can now make it. We have taken our stand in the passage of the Canon at the last Council, and the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society has resolved to make that Canon effective and has put itself on record to that effect at the last meeting which it held this year. All money thereafter collected for missionary work, if it be the result of appeal, must be sent to the Treasurer of the Missionary Society. That money will be returned after due notice is taken of it by the Treasurer and Committee to the person to whom it was originally sent.

In connection with the work of the Church in the Diocese, something ought to be said about the Church at the University of Virginia. The increase of interest in religious subjects since 1910 among the students and residents of that part of Charlottesville is very marked. The Church has proved its usefulness and we ought to be able to go forward without further delay and certainly without further retrenchment and build according to the plans which we already have. It is not, perhaps, best for me to make a plea for this Church; there are a sufficient number of University students, alumni and under-graduates to make this work and its claims sufficiently known in the Diocese. I may say this, however, the crying need for such a church is emphasized to my mind more strongly by one fact than by all others put together, and that is the indifference of the Episcopal alumni to the whole enterprise. On that point I shall not enlarge.

At the last Council we determined on the apportionment to the parishes of the amounts of money necessary for various objects to which we felt under obligations. These objects included the Diocesan Missionary Society, General Missions, Education Society, Bible and Prayer Book Society of Virginia, Disabled Clergy Fund, Widows' and Orphans' Fund and General Clergy Relief. On the success of that apportionment the Diocese is to be congratulated. The Diocesan Missionary Society is behindhand, but the other objects are well paid up. Why we failed to reach our predetermined amount for the Diocesan Missionary Society I cannot say, except that nothing has been said about the Missions of the Diocese in the Episcopal visitations. I hope the apportionment will be continued at its present figure at least and that the Woman's work in the Diocese will be added to the objects now on the list when the apportionment is made.

We are confronted by another action of the General Convention, the expediency of which seems to me at least questionable. We are asked to divide the United States into eight provinces for the purposes of missionary work, religious education, social service and discipline. I cannot see how missionary work is to be helped by forming a Board of Missions in each province. Such a Board will be an expense and will interfere with every active Diocese. It will require certainly one or more paid officers and will doubtless at some time or other traverse the lines of action both of the General Board of Missions and Diocesan Missions. The tendency, as it seems to me, is toward an amount of organization—and organization on paper merely—which the facts of the case do not warrant us in creating, and I am sure that the differences between these Provinces will gradually become so marked that in the process of time, and not a long time in this swiftly moving country, we shall have substantially eight churches in this country instead of one. But I have thought best to go no further into this. We were urged to hold a meeting of the Primary Synod last winter. This plan I absolutely declined to follow, but insisted that the Diocese should act through its Council as well as by the call of the Bishop.

It is hardly necessary for me to say that, regarding the Diocese as the climax of church organization indicated in the New Testament, I prefer to put all further organization in the direction of a hierarchy upon the merest ground of expediency, and as I think Provinces are inexpedient at the present time I prefer not to have part in one. Still the question comes up for decision at this

Council, and I wish to put it upon a consistent and rational basis. There are two resolutions which I propose, and shall be glad to refer them to a committee to report at this Council:

1st. Resolved, In accordance with Article No. 7, General Convention, the Diocese of Virginia gives its consent to be included in the third Province, provided that whenever it shall see fit so to do it may withdraw from this Province without prejudice.

2d. At each annual Convention there shall be elected by ballot eight delegates—four clergymen canonically residents of the Diocese and four laymen who must be communicants and domiciled in the Diocese—as deputies to the Provincial Synod. Alternates to these delegates shall also be elected.

The illness of the Bishop this winter disarranged many plans, and made impossible many visitations which were contemplated. I have pointed out our deep indebtedness to the neighboring Bishops who have enabled us to make the comparatively large record of six hundred and fourteen confirmations. But the fear of inability to cover the ground as closely as has been done for several years and to meet the rapid growth of the Diocese, induces me to make a request for a Bishop Coadjutor. The preliminaries have already been attended to and the consent of the Bishops and Standing Committees has been given, and the only thing necessary to secure such aid is the election of a Bishop Coadjutor by the Council. I have written a letter to the parishes and have asked of them whether they are willing to add to the contingent fund the amount necessary to pay the Bishop the salary heretofore paid. The answers of the parishes I have turned over to the Finance Committee for their review. Those of the Finance Committee with whom I have spoken agree with me that about \$4,400.00 will be necessary to do what is desired. They have not estimated for a Bishop Coadjutor in their report to this Council, nor has such estimate been made in any other apportionment of the parishes; but if the amount required of the Diocese is fifty per cent. of what has been given heretofore, which the members of the Finance Committee agree is not too much, it will be very easy for each parish to calculate its own increased amount for itself.

My request of the Diocese and assignment of work will be in this form: I hereby ask for a Bishop-Coadjutor on the ground of

physical inability to do the full work of the Diocese, and assign him the parishes and churches which are aided by the Diocesan

Missionary Society, to be by him visited and helped in securing ministers. I also expect him to take, from time to time, such work as I find myself unable to do. This assignment does not include the administration of the Diocese or any part thereof, nor does it

prevent the Bishop from making visitations to any parishes,

churches or institutions that he may see fit to visit.

One more subject and this address shall close. We are all interested in keeping the Sacraments of the Church free from criticism, and doubly interested in guarding them from the possibility of doing harm to those who partake of them. We know also the controversy now rife with regard to a Cup or Chalice used by a congregation in common.

Now, on this whole matter I have some views, based, as I think, on trustworthy information, which I believe will be of service. The House of Bishops has for some time had this question under consideration. A careful committee has investigated it with thoroughness. The report of that committee to the last General Convention suggested to me the following practical solution of what in some quarters is a great difficulty:

Let every clergyman at every administration of the Holy Communion have on the Holy Table a small vessel of the purest alcohol with a number of purificators, which, after the Service, may be burned. Let one cup be used, and the rim of this cup be wiped with the alcohol after the administration of the consecrated wine to each individual. If this be carefully and neatly done, the possibility of harm will be, practically speaking, removed. This advice is based on the fact, well ascertained, if we can trust the most expert scientists and medical men, that alcohol, whether in the wine or separate, is unsurpassed as a disinfectant in such cases.

I should have preferred to say what I have now said on this point to the clergy only, and in private, on the principle that "holy things must be treated in a holy manner," but this plan seemed inadequate to the pressing nature of the subject. The clergy can easily get the information of their own careful methods to their congregations without making them matters of public discussion.

#### REV. FRANK STRINGFELLOW.

June 8, 1913, departed this life Frank Stringfellow, well known in the history of the war between the States as one of the most enterprising and accurate of a wonderful body of scouts.

Mr. Stringfellow was as active in the service of the Master as he had been in his youthful days in the service of his State. I remember his saying to me once that he did not wish to make anything except a bare living from the Church until he had done at least as much in her service as he had done for the army of the Confederate States.

By word and by example he set forth the Gospel of the Master, "Instant in season and out of season," growing fuller of zeal in his beloved cause as the years went on. Of his last sermon I have heard the account that as he sat in the Chancel, unable to stand, in his little Church at Mechanicsville in Louisa county, he spoke of an opportunity, which he had labored to improve, given him while he was lying on his bed of illness. In the sermon he told of his presentation of the Gospel to a man in doubt, whose difficulties he had been enabled to remove, and the congregation who heard

him were fully as much impressed as the original hearer could possibly have been.

Strong, bold and full of resource, he was a good soldier of the Cross; and the Diocese of Virginia, indeed, the State of Virginia, will long look back to his life as that of a workman who never needed to be ashamed either of action or motive.

#### REV. JAMES GRAMMER, D.D.

The Rev. Dr. James Grammer died September 9, 1913, at a ripe old age. Dr. Grammer was a man of large intellectual calibre and of fine gifts as a writer and speaker. His work in the pulpit was careful, scholarly and finished. His views on subjects connected with the Church and the ministry were formed very early in his life and never radically changed nor largely developed. He preached with great power and one could not but think when watching the movement of his mind that he would have adorned the Senate of the United States or any other great deliberative body in whose action he might have been called to participate.

He was a man of the deepest conscientiousness. The thing that appeared to him to be right he would do at all hazards. The temptation to follow in action his own judgment of right and propriety sometimes led him to take positions which were open to criticism, but back of all was a warm and generous heart whose movements showed themselves in a life full of corresponding actions. Although often in the minority, he could always render a reason for the faith that was in him, and whether one agreed with him or not as to the validity of the reason, one could not fail to recognize his sincere and honest purpose.

Many people in many parts of the Diocese of Virginia will regard themselves as singularly blest to have had his personal and priestly ministrations. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

#### REV. EVERARD MEADE, D.D.

The Rev. Everard Meade, D.D., Rector of Truro Parish, entered peacefully into life December 19, 1913.

Dr. Meade had returned home on Thanksgiving Day, November 27th, from a visitation with the Bishop through four counties in the lower part of the Diocese. The journey involved constant movement; sometimes over bad roads, a considerable departure from the regularity of home life, much fatigue and some anxiety about appointments. The incidents of travel, whether trying or pleasant, Dr. Meade met with the good temper, affability and unselfishness characteristic of the man, but his heart, like that of many an old soldier, had been weakened in the fierce excitements of the past, and sometime in the early hours of a winter's morning, when his family thought him sleeping in rest for renewed labor, the silver cord was loosed and the spirit of the good soldier of Jesus Christ passed peacefully away.

Whether as student, soldier, teacher, citizen or clergyman, in all of which positions he was called to serve God and his fellows, Dr. Meade was found faithful. He did justly, loved mercy and walked humbly with his God.

Few men of my acquaintance have had so good a natural disposition, and few have yielded themselves more fully to the kindly, hopeful, cheering influences of the religion of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Dr. Meade was an ardent lover of his country and his State, a student of Virginia history, a man of literary tastes, a delightful companion, and withal a friend of all human creatures. His loss is felt, not only in Virginia, but far and wide over this country. Wherever he has lived there are many who say from their hearts, "We have lost a 'friend."

He was laid to rest in the cemetery of Pohick Church, with the restoration of which his name will always be associated. The great congregation gathered at his grave was a proof of the esteem in which he was held and the thought of him in the minds of all was, "Of such is the kingdom of heaven."

#### REV. ROBERT ARCHER GOODWIN, D.D.

The life of the Rev. Robert A. Goodwin, D.D., has been so identified with the life of this Diocese and has been so conspicuous in recent days that it is not necessary for me to do more than

mention the fields of activity in which his powers were displayed. Every phase of Virginia clerical life was known to him by experience.

In his younger days he had served in a large country Parish. He had lived in a college town; he had taught in the seminary for colored students for the ministry; he had been Examining Chaplain, and was Rector of a large and constantly growing city church. Besides these things, he had been for many years a member of different boards; was sought out for the arduous post of secretary, and took an active part in the proceedings of the Council of the Diocese. A clear and ready speaker, he exercised a large influence which was increased and solidified by his evident sincerity of statement and integrity of purpose.

Dr. Goodwin was really a rare preacher. There was a blending of common sense and high spiritual acumen in his sermons which satisfied persons of fastidious taste as well as those of deep religious conviction. Nor was the finish of select diction and reverent manner wanting in the delivery of his thoughts.

But the pastorate was the field in which he showed the deepest devotion to his calling. In his large classes for confirmation he was particularly happy as an instructor. Any one who has seen him gather his flock into the Church, after prayers in the brick school house, and place them in the seats assigned the candidates for confirmation, will realize that there was in his mind the thought that the commission to Peter had descended to him: "Feed my sheep; feed my lambs; feed my young sheep."

Dr. Goodwin departed this life on the morning of the 4th of February, 1914, surrounded by his family, all of whom were present, with the exception of one son, who is a missionary in China.

And the record of his life may be fittingly closed with the words, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

# REV. WILLIAM MEADE CLARK, D.D.

The Rev. William Meade Clark, D.D., died April 29, 1914, leaving vacant many posts among the offices of the Diocese and Church, and leaving also a large vacancy in the hearts of loving

friends and sincere admirers. Dr. Clark's life was marked by rare success won against great odds.

A railroad accident which befell him in his college days would have reduced many men to incompetency. With him, on the contrary, it was made an occasion of greater usefulness. Largely as its result, he developed an extraordinary degree of fortitude and most admirable habits of forecast, punctuality and careful consideration of his own powers. His fixed determination to trouble nobody with his ailments turned his mind to things outside of himself. Naturally social, he took a lively interest in the people about him, and, ignoring his pains and troubles, he took the best course to make other people forget them. And forget them they did to such an extent that his aid was constantly solicited for extra work, and when asked was usually given.

When the Bishop, assigning his Deacons to fields of labor, suggested to Mr. Clark that he thought of putting him in a place where the life would be a little easier than in some others, Mr. Clark's reply was that if he could not do a man's work in the ministry he would give up his intention of taking orders. The Bishop approved the sentiment and never forgot it. Nor did Dr. Clark, during a life of varied activity, fall below the high standard then announced for himself. The business he undertook he carried to a finish with energy, promptness and dispatch. That he would do at least as well as he promised to do was one of his leading characteristics.

Both nature and nurture had been kind to Dr. Clark. The disposition of a man is, after all, the region where his true freedom commences; the freedom without which there is no growth; and Dr. Clark's disposition was kindly, generous and comprehensive. His surroundings, also, from his youth up were the best possible to make him care ardently for his fellowmen, and, with this beginning, one might expect that latent talent would be developed and character well rounded out in later life. This expectation was fulfilled. Dr. Clark's influence increased with the passing of the years.

It was not given to everyone, even of his clerical brethren, to know intimately the solid religious, contemplative side of Dr. Clark's mind. He was regarded rather as a man of action. But

his action was based on principle and his principles were rooted in religious feeling, conviction and experience. There are those who know this because they have seen its unmistakable evidences. To his Father in Heaven he could say with the Psalmist, and even under the stress of severest trial he said it in many ways: "I will always give thanks unto Thee for that thou hast done; and I will hope in thy Name, for thy saints like it well."

Taylor presented the following Treasurer's reports, which were referred to the proper committees, namely: those of the Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society, Woman's Work, Disabled Clergy Fund, Widows' and Orphans' Fund, St. Andrew's Fund, Bruce Fund, Albert Baker Fund, Episcopal Fund, Special Church Funds.

The Secretary presented the report of the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Secretary also presented a communication from the Secretary of the House of Deputies containing several proposed amendments to the Constitution of the General Church, and, on his motion, these were referred to a committee to report at the next Council.

On motion of Mr. Rosewell Page, the election of a Bishop Coadjutor was made the order of the day at 3:30 o'clock, immediately after the recess.

The Rev. Dr. Goodwin read a report adopted by the General Convention in regard to the uniform registration of communicants, and offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That in agreement with a resolution of the General Convention of 1913, in regard to the Uniform Registration of Communicants, this Diocese adopts the following ruling on this subject:

A communicant is defined as one who has received baptism and confirmation, or has been formally admitted to the Holy Communion as being "ready and desirous to be confirmed." Every such person should be enrolled and kept upon the Parish Register until death, transfer or discipline removes the name, in order that his or her rights as a potential communicant may be conserved. But for statistical purposes communicants should not be reported who are known to have neglected the reception of the Holy Communion for three years last past, having had sufficient opportunity to receive it.

Mr. P. H. Mayo read the report of the Committee on Finance, which, on motion of Judge Wallace, was received and adopted:

St. James Church, Richmond, Va., May 20, 1914.

To the President and Council of the Diocese of Virginia:
GENTLEMEN:

Your Committee on Finance respectfully begs to report that they have examined the accounts and vouchers of the treasurer, Mr. R. Carter Beverley, for the year ending April 30, 1914, and find the same to be correct.

The new Canon VIII has not been effective until the year beginning May 1, 1914, as per circular letter of this committee dated February 10, 1913. Your committee is glad to report that the churches and parishes have contributed for the year ending April 30, 1914, \$8,507.52, which is about the same amount that they have contributed for the past six years under the former Canon.

With a balance of \$2,393.55 on hand in bank May 1, 1913, brought over from 1912, added to the receipts of the year 1913-14, there was sufficient to meet the estimated expenses, and still leave a balance of \$3,032.69 to be carried to 1914-15. Therefore your committee thought it best under the authority given them by the Council in May, 1913, to transfer two thousand dollars, a part of this balance, to the Episcopal Fund, as appears in the treasurer's account.

As the collections for the year May 1, 1914, to April 30, 1915, are now being received by the treasurer at this meeting of the Council, and probably will not all be in until sometime after the Council adjourns, it is not possible for your committee to say how much will be received on account of the estimate of expenditures presented to the Council at its last meeting, with the schedule of assessment therefor, but as the assessment was considerably smaller than the average of the six preceding years, it is hoped that the whole amount will certainly be paid to the treasurer.

With this report, and as a part hereof, your committee gives in detail, as far as it is possible, an estimate of the expenditures for the year ensuing from May 1, 1915, to April 30, 1916, amounting to \$7,771.00.

This estimate is so nearly the same as last year (1914-1915) that your committee has decided to make the same schedule and assessment for 1915-1916 as it made for 1914-1915.

To save the cost of printing, copies of the 1914-1915 schedule and assessment, which applies to 1915-1916, will be sent to the various vestries later by the treasurer, Mr. R. Carter Beverley.

It must be distinctly understood, and your committee begs to impress it upon the Council, that the estimate hereinabove referred to and stated in this report, is only for the payment of the salary of the Bishop and other incidental expenses, as named, and not for the expenses of a Bishop Coadjutor.

Should the Council elect a Bishop Coadjutor, it will become necessary to make an additional assessment for such amount as will be paid him as a salary, together with house rent, traveling expenses, etc., estimated at about \$365.00 per month, or \$4,400.00.

Should there be any necessity for this additional assessment, your committee recommends that the present Council make provision therefor by giving the Committee on Finance authority to make such extra assessment, and to call upon the churches and parishes as may be necessary.

Section 3 of Canon VIII states:

"It shall be the duty of each *vestry* to pay the sum assessed upon the respective parish or church to the treasurer of the Diocese, . . . each vestry being free to adopt such means as it may deem best to raise this assessment."

This makes it necessary for each vestry to raise the amount of its assessment in such way as it may deem best, from special contributions, from other church funds, collections, or otherwise. There is no provision made for the payment of the salary and expenses of a Bishop Coadjutor, if he is elected by you. So far as we can learn under the Canons, neither this committee nor the treasurer has authority to borrow, or otherwise raise money, or to provide for any deficit. Therefore the failure of the vestries or parishes to pay their assessments will make it impossible to pay the salary of the Bishop Coadjutor and his other expenses.

Your committee recommends the payment of the usual salaries of the Bishop and officers of the Diocese, and such other items as have been customary, but any amounts to be paid to the Sunday-school Commission, Increase of the Ministry, Social Service Commission, and other outside appropriations, etc., will have to be authorized by the Council before your committee can pay any thing on account thereof, and we recommend that these appropriations shall be made payable only after the Bishops' and other salaries and Diocesan expenses have been paid, or provided for, with funds in hand, and then only in proportion, ratably, as funds may be available to pay the same.

All salaries of the Bishops and other officers of the Diocese are legal obligations and must be paid, while appropriations to other objects are only optional contributions. The amount needed to pay a Bishop Coadjutor is about \$365.00 per month. If elected the date of his consecration, or begining of his duties, will determine the amount of the assessment to be made for the payment of his salary, expenses, etc., for the portion of the year ending April 30, 1915. After that, the assessment will have to be made for each whole year. If any additional assessment has to be made, notice of such assessment will be given later, as the facts will require.

Wednesday, 3:30 p.m.

The Council assembled and was called to order, the Rev. Dr. Green in the Chair.

Judge Norton reported from the Committee on Credentials, That the roll of Lay Delegates as called by the Secretary was correct; and that St. George's Church, Farlee, had as yet no right to representation in the Council.

The order of the day was called, and Mr. Rosewell Page offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That in the light of the Bishop's announcement to this Council, the election of a Bishop Coadjutor be made forthwith.

Resolved, That there be no nominating speeches, but only the announcement of the names of candidates for such office and the seconding of the same.

The first resolution was adopted. The second resolution was, on motion, laid upon the table.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Burkhardt the Chairman was requested to call the Council to prayer.

The Chair bade the Council to silent prayer, closing with a collect.

On motion of Mr. Robert Beverley nominating and seconding speeches were limited to ten minutes.

The Rev. Dr. Morris moved, That two silent ballots be taken before any nominating speeches be made; which motion was laid upon the table.

Mr. J. M. Taylor moved, That the salary of the Bishop Coadjutor be fixed at three thousand dollars per annum, with an allowance of six hundred dollars per annum for house rent. Under the rules this was referred to the Finance Committee, and this committee were given leave to retire.

WEDNESDAY, 8:15 p. m.

The Council assembled as a Board of Missions, and was called to order by the Bishop. Prayers were read by the Secretary.

The report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society was read by the Rev. Dr. Goodwin, Executive Secretary.

To the Diocesan Missionary Society:

Your executive committee must begin its annual report with a note of sadness. For twenty and for nineteen years, respectively, you have regularly chosen on your executive committee the Rev. Robert A. Goodwin, D.D., and the Rev. Wm. Meade Clark, D.D. Both have always accepted your election as a solemn call of duty, and side by side have given to the work of the Society with unfailing fidelity their best service and most loyal support for nearly two decades of years. Within three months of each other they have been called from the scene of their earthly labors, promoted, as those who have been tried and found faithful, to some higher service for the Master.

For eight years Dr. R. A. Goodwin was the efficient and painstaking secretary of the Society, resigning this position on December 15, but seven weeks before his death.

It will be seen that the committee relying upon the apportionment made for the Society by the Council being fully paid, have expended very nearly that amount. They would have expended it all but for the fact that missionaries for certain fields for which appropriations were made could not be found. But to our disappointment and mortification the apportionment was not paid by \$889.54. And among the parishes which have failed of their duty to the Society we note several who have for years been its beneficiaries and who were entirely able to meet the sums apportioned them had they felt it as a duty resting upon them. These parishes will have no room for complaint if the fact is remembered when they shall apply for a renewal of their appropriations.

On the other hand forty churches or missions which are aided by your Society have paid their apportionment to it in full, and in many instances have overpaid it. Three colored congregations, not apportioned, gave \$130.50. And we would especially commend the example of St. Anne's Parish, Essex, which has heeded the request of the Council made several years since that vacant missionary parishes would pay to the Society one-half of the salary usually paid to their minister, and has given this year \$236.00 for Diocesan Missions, though without services except those of a faithful Lay reader. Epiphany Church, Barton Heights, continues its self-imposed plan of relinquishing each year fifty dollars of its appropriation, and in consequence will soon become self-supporting.

The Society has now on its list forty-three white missionaries, including our missionary to the deaf-mutes of the Diocese, and four colored missionaries. These minister to about one hundred and twenty-five churches and missions, or, as usual, more than half of the number in the Diocese. Besides these there are a number of dependent parishes and mission fields which are vacant, to some of which we have already promised aid when they can secure missionaries. If these should all be filled the demands upon your Executive Committee would far exceed the

\$18,000 which we are asking again for the coming year. As it is, our active appropriations now in force, including our expenses, come very close to that amount.

The demands upon your Executive Committee for aid for purely missionary work and the extension of the Church into new fields is constantly increasing. And this new work is not all in the mountains by any means. For a number of years the constantly increased cost of living has made the problem of keeping our faithful ministers in the country parishes from actual want a serious one, as you know, and the committee have sought in every way to encourage the parishes which they aided to increase the salaries paid to their ministers, and have not only not reduced appropriations made to them, but have in many cases given an increased appropriation on condition that the vestry would pledge a corresponding increase on their part. Except in a few instances as a result of this policy our missionaries now receive what may by courtesy be called a living wage. Your committee now feel that they must adopt and enforce a policy of gradual reduction of appropriations made to the old parishes which have been leaning upon the Society for financial support for so long a time that it has become a fixed and seemingly an incorrigible habit. They feel that they must do this, not only for the sake of the missionary treasury and of those who give to it with the expectation that their offerings will be wisely and worthily applied, but for the sake of these parishes themselves. No parish or congregation can grow strong that is willing to remain a pensioner for a moment after it is able by any effort to become self-supporting. With this conviction your committee have prepared a list of parishes to which it is sure the rule of at least a gradual reduction of appropriations ought to be applied, and will give them due notice of the fact. Moreover, your committee is assured that if the truth of the case were duly presented to and considered by the vestries of the parishes each year when their applications are made, they would bestir themselves and realize more fully their responsibilities in the matter. The Executive Committee will therefore ask that hereafter every application from a vestry for a renewal of appropriation shall be accompanied with a certificate to the effect that the application is made by the vestry itself at a meeting duly convened, and that they have fully canvassed their parish or congregation for new or enlarged contributions toward their own support.

There is an impression in some vestries that because a rector has some missionary work in his parish beyond the congregation of his parish church, a part of his support is therefore due from the Mssionary Society. This is a mistake, except in those cases where the Diocese has undertaken missionary work at points beyond the reach of any rector, as in the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge. Elsewhere the responbility of a parish vestry extends over the whole territorial limits of their parish. Any mission work that is a part of the spiritual cure of a rector is a part of

the temporal cure of the vestry of the parish in which it lies, and no vestry can circumscribe the labors, or demand from others a return for the services, of their rector in any part of the parish over which his cure extends.

The Council at its last session adopted an amendment to the Canon under which the Diocesan Missionary Society operates, requiring that the Executive Committee "shall receive, appropriate and disburse all contributions" made for the missionary work of the Diocese, and placing all "auxiliary societies, boards and other agencies and persons engaged in this work" under their oversight and direction. For several reasons your committee has been slow in putting this arrangement into effect, but at its last meeting it adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas, The solicitors of funds for the mission work in the Diocese of Virginia are missionaries of the Diocese, and as such are accredited by the Diocese to the general public; and

Whereas, The Council has enacted a law requiring money collected either in or out of the Diocese for Diocesan Missions to pass through the treasury of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society;

Therefore, resolved, That from the first of May, 1914, all money received by and missionary of this Society as the result of appeal shall be sent to the treasurer of the Executive Committee, to be credited by him to the person to whom it was given or the fund for which it was intended, and returned within sixty days with such recommendations as the committee may see fit to make."

During the past year your committee has created the office of Executive Secretary of the Society. His duties, in addition to those of recording and Corresponding Secretary, Editor, of the Diocesan Work, etc., are perhaps sufficiently indicated by the term "executive." He will be the agent of the committee in its administration and guidance of the missionary work entrusted to them, to carry out their instructions, and to coordinate and systematize the business of the Society. But a few years ago the Missionary Society of the Diocese expended six or seven thousand dollars annually, almost all of which was applied in one direction-aiding old and feeble parishes. Hereafter the Society must expend, or direct the expenditures of, perhaps forty thousand dollars each year, in five or six different departments of your work. In other words your missionary work, and the consequent responsibilities of your Executive Committee, have grown to such an extent as to render the services of such an official imperative, a fact which was pointed out by the Bishop in his address to the Council of last May.

The work of your missionaries during the past year has, we believe, as always, been faithful and efficient. Two of the oldest and most useful among them, the Rev. Frank Stringfellow and the Rev. Everard Meade, D.D., have during the year laid down their work at the call of the Master to "come up higher." Two others have become disabled, "bearing in

their bodies the marks of the Lord Jesus." Five more have left the Diocese. One of our great needs is for men to take the places of these; young and consecrated men "native and to the manor born," to fill vacant fields and to press forward into parts that wait to be possessed. The Executive Committee appeals to every members of the Missionary Society, that is, to every member of our beloved Church in the Diocese, for their continued, united and intelligent support of this work, ever growing and ever demanding more and more the free-will offerings of the Lord's stewards, being assured that His blessing will continue to crown all our true and unselfish labors with success.

Dr. Goodwin also read the report of the Board of Apportionment.

The Board of Apportionment would respectfully report to the Council, that the apportionment for the Council year, May 1, 1913, to May 1, 1914, was \$39,500, which was distributed among the parishes and congregations of the Diocese in proportion to their several ability as nearly as could be found out.

From the various treasurers' reports sent to us month by menth, excluding individual contributions and offerings from missions, etc., not apportioned, parishes and congregations paid on the apportionment \$37,712.87.

So that they have seemingly fallen short of meeting the apportionment by \$1,787.13. The shortage is however somewhat less than this, for there are some payments which, through misunderstanding or error, have not been reported to us. This is sometimes the case with payments for General Missions made through the Woman's Auxiliary. The apportionment for Diocesan Missions has fallen short by \$889.54, and that for General Missions by, apparently, \$2,217.13. The latter will doubtless be fully made up before the end of the fiscal year of the Board of Missions on September 1, and we recommend that hereafter the apportionment year for this one item of the budget be arranged to run from September 1 to September 1, to correspond with that of the Board of Missions. The apportionment for the five objects connected with the Diocese was considerably overpaid, the shortage for Diocesan Missions being more than compensated by over-payments to the remaining four objects.

This is the first year that our proportionment system has been fairly tried out in the Diocese. Last year, owing to the number of contributions which came over from the year before, and which could not be separated or distinguished, it was impossible to tell whether the Diocese had paid the apportionment or not during the year. Moreover, we made no such

careful analysis of the receipts, culling out "miscellaneous" items, as we have this year. While we deeply regret that the whole amount was not paid, and are satisfied that it could have been and ought to have been done, the result shows the value of the apportionment system, both in a large increase in total contributions and in the proper distribution of them among the objects provided for in the budget. It has added in round numbers \$1,000.00 each to the income of the Disabled Clergy and Widows' and Orphans' Fund; about \$400.00 to that of the Education Society, and some \$3,000.00 or \$4,000.00 to that of the Diocesan Missionary Society, over the average of from two to five years ago. It gives the managers of these funds and societies also a pretty definite idea of what their income is going to be, so that they can dispense it as the need arises.

Forty-seven parishes or churches have paid their apportionment in full to every object, and many of them have paid more than apportioned. Nine paid amounts equal to their apportionments, but did not so distribute it as to pay in full each object. Fifteen more paid in full to every object except General Missions, intending, doubtless, to complete this before September. Thirty-three others paid a large part of their apportionment, showing an effort to do so. Fifty-six paid small amounts or nothing at all. Some of these are fairly strong congregations, but for the most part they are weak missions which were only apportioned nominally and have been without ministers or services.

Professor William M. Lyle spoke on the work of St. Paul's Memorial Church at the University of Virginia and the importance of carrying to completion the plans for the permanent building.

Mr. Rosewell Page spoke of the property in the west end of Richmond which it is proposed to purchase and present to the Diocese for its future needs.

Mr. E. Randolph Williams offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia does hereby express its approval of the movement in progress, on the part of certain individuals, for the purchase and initial development, at the cost of themselves and their associates, of a considerable tract of land near Richmond, to make provision for the future growth and influence of the Episcopal Church, through unifying Diocesan activities normal to the Church, at this Diocesan centre in the capital city of the State of Virginia.

Col. Eugene C. Massie spoke to the resolution, which was adopted.

An offertory was taken, and the congregation dismissed with the benediction by the Bishop.

WEDNESDAY, 10:00 p.m.

The Council was called to order in business session. The Bishop called the Rev. Nelson P. Dame to the chair.

The canonical testimonials in favor of the Rev. William Cabell Brown, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor-elect, were read and signed by a constitutional majority of the Council. After which the Council adjourned.

The Rev. J. F. Burks, for the Committee on Unfinished Business, reported, That the only unfinished business coming over from the last Council was the proposed amendment to Canon XVI. (See Journal, 1913, pp. 65, 66.)

The Rev. P. P. Phillips read the report of the Standing Committee of the Diocese:

## REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee respectfully reports that since the last Council consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Samuel Gavitt Babcock, as suffragan Bishop of Massachusetts, and the Rev. William Theodotus Capers, as Bishop Coadjutor of West Texas.

The Rev. J. Francis Ribble presented the report of the Sunday School Commission:

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL COMMISSION.

The work of your commission during the past year has been in many respects most encouraging, and in some respects discouraging. Among the encouraging features, we might mention an awakening of interest on the part of many of our schools throughout the Diocese, and a manifestation of that interest in a systematic study of religious education, and the applying of new and up-to-date methods of instruction. A number of our convocations, in compliance with a resolution passed at our last Diocesan Council, have given a portion of their time to the consideration of Sundayschool work, having in attendance at some of them our faithful and efficient field secretary, Rev. S. U. Mitman, Ph.D., to arouse zeal and encourage effort. Doctor Mitman has also, where he was able, attended the Sunday-school Institutes, held during the past year, delivering addresses, and coming in closer touch with the work and the workers. One of the most successful of these Institutes was held at St. Paul's Church, Richmond, Va., December 8th to the 12th, having as its faculty Rev. S. U. Mitman, Ph.D., our Field Secretary; Rev. Lester Brander, Ph.D., of New York City; Mrs. John Loman, leader of Junior Workers, Diocese of Pennsylvania; Mrs. Edna Hastings, leader of primary workers, Washington, D. C., and Rev Earnest J. Denen, St. Stephens Church, Lynn, Mass. It was a most enthusiastic and helpful meeting, attended by the teachers and superintendents of the city and the Richmond Convocation, as well as representatives from other Convocations of the Diocese, and some visitors from Southern Virginia. In the City of Richmond a number of teachers are taking the Teachers' Training Course, thus adding greatly to their efficiency in Sunday-school work. Miss Sallie Dean was recently elected by the Richmond Convocation as Sunday-school visitor of the Convocation, and would no doubt be glad to visit other schools in the Diocese, if her services were requested.

Such are some of the encouraging features of the work during the past year. In accordance with a resolution unanimously adopted by the Council at Charlottesville, your commission sent to the churches throughout the Diocese the Advent mite-boxes, with the earnest request that as in the Lenten season emphasis is given to the Lord's commission-"Go preach," so in the Advent season, emphasis might be given to that portion of the Divine commission—"Go teach." The response to our appeal is the one discouraging note to the work of your commission. Out of 113 churches to which these boxes were sent, only twenty-nine responded. The cost of sending, to say nothing of the labor, was \$60. The returns from all sources was only \$179.82. In many of those churches which responded the boxes were not distributed, but only a small offering sent, perhaps without the knowledge of the children, and thus the opportunity to emphasize Religious Education was lost. The commission was only doing the Council's bidding, and felt that it might have had the cooperation of those whom it was trying to serve. Instead of being discouraged, however, we will hope for a more hearty cooperation next year. The response from the friends of religious education has been generous, and your commission has largely, from this source, been able to meet all expenses.

With a liberal response from the Sunday-schools next year, we feel that we will be able to meet the increased demand for wider usefulness, and would therefore only ask for a renewal of the recommendations adopted last year, which are as follows:

- (1) That under Section 3 of the Canon on Sunday-school Education, which reads "that the Commission shall raise funds and disburse same for the conduct of its work," we be permitted to ask the Sunday-school workers and scholars to make their Advent offerings for religious education and the work of the Sunday-school Commission.
- (2) That we be permitted to appeal to the friends of religious education and to the Sunday-schools to make donations to our treasury, so we can meet our obligations to the field work of the Third Department and the necessary expenses of our Diocesan work.

In addition to these resolutions, in behalf of the General Board of Religious Education, we offer the following:

- (3) That the Council heartily endorses the work of the General Board of Religious Education, and commends it to the parishes.
- (4) That the Council shall pay from the Contingent Fund the amount of the apportionment made to the Diocese by the General Board of Religious Education, namely, \$378.

The report was received and the first three resolutions appended thereto were severally adopted. The fourth resolution was referred, under the rules, to the Finance Committee.

Mr. Smith and Dr. Goodwin requested that their names be withdrawn.

The Chair appointed as Tellers the Rev. A. Stuart Gibson and Mr. J. C. Phillips. The ballot was taken and the tellers retired.

The Rev. S. Roger Tyler moved, That that portion of the Bishop's address referring to the Provincial System be made the order of the day for this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. Mr. Robt. Beverley moved an amendment, That the reports of any committees which were then ready to be presented should have precedence over any other business. The amendment was carried and Mr. Tyler's resolution as amended was adopted.

Mr. Mayo offered for the Finance Committee this resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Finance Committee is hereby authorized to make such additional assessment when and as it may seem necessary consequent on the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.

#### REPORT OF THE BROTHERHOOD OF ST. PAUL.

To the One Hundred and Nineteenth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Brotherhood of St. Paul begs leave to submit its first annual report.

At the meeting of the Council held in Charlottesville May, 1913, the Brotherhood of St. Paul was recognized as the official Missionary organization among boys, and the existing chapters of the Brotherhood encouraged to elect officers, and proceed with the development of the work.

The officers elected were: Rt. Rev. Robt. A. Gibson, President ex-officio; Rev. David H. Lewis, President; Rev. J. Frank Ribble; Vice-President; Miss Martha Webb Purcell, General Secretary; Rev. E. L. Goodwin, Treasurer.

An Advisory Board consisting of the following was also elected: Rev. Messrs. W. C. Bell, D. D., W. H. Burkhardt, G. M. Brydon, W. R. Bowie, E. E. Osgood, W. D. Smith, J. L. Jackson, B. D. Tucker, Jr., C. J. Gibson, and the Executive Committee of the Brotherhood.

No action was taken by this Board until after the meeting of the General Convention, to see what action that body would take regarding work among boys.

The Advisory Board has met twice, December 7th, at which meeting seven members were present, and again February 17th, at which meeting nine members were present.

It was decided that we proceed at once to organize as many chapters in the Diocese as possible, and to this end letters were sent to every rector in the Diocese setting forth the claims of the Brotherhood; and the General Secretary presented the plan and scope of work at the Piedmont and the Albemarle Convocations, with the result that sixteen rectors have approved the work and promised to organize chapters; beside which there are twenty chapters already organized. These chapters contributed during the year to:

A committee has been appointed to confer with a committee from the Third Department on boys' work.

A conference of the Diocesan officers, Advisory Board and Brotherhood directors, including four older boys, was held in Richmond, February 15-17, at which thirty-three delegates were present.

The work shows growth and progress, and we would be peak the interest and coöperation of every clergyman in the Diocese in making this Brotherhood a power for good among the boys of our Diocese.

Judge J. K. M. Norton offered several resolutions, to which certain amendments were proposed and accepted by him, and which were finally adopted in the following form:

Resolved, 1st, That in accordance with Article VII of the Constitution of the General Convention the Diocese of Virginia gives its consent to be included in the Third Province; provided, that the right of withdrawing from the Province, without prejudice, at any time in the future is reserved by the Diocese.

Resolved, 2d, That the Council shall proceed to elect Deputies to the Primary Synod of the Third Province.

Resolved, 3d, That our Deputies be instructed to communicate the first resolution above to the Primary Synod upon its organization, and if the Synod shall object to their taking part in their proceedings under its terms that they shall state that the Diocese of Virginia does not consent to be included in the Province, and shall withdraw.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Council adjourned until 8:30 o'clock.

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THURSDAY, May 21, 8:30 p. m.

The Council met with a congregation for a service in the interest of General Missions. The Bishop presided, supported by the Rev. H. B. Lee, D.D.

After the opening services addresses were made by Mr. Monell Sayre, the Rev. Edmund L. Woodward, M.D., the Rev. Robb White and the Rev. Charles L. Somers.

An offering was taken for General Missions, and the meeting was dismissed with the benediction by the Bishop.

FRIDAY, May 22, 9:30 a.m.

The Council met and was opened with prayer. The Rev. Dr. Green in the Chair. The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

Mr. J. Stewart Bryan presented the report of the Committee on the Duty of Personal Purity, appointed under the resolution of the Social Service Commission.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PERSONAL PURITY.

Not with harsh criticism, not with a narrow, blind or unsympathetic spirit, but speaking simply and directly as Christian men to Christian men and boys, the Council of the Diocese of Virginia calls on all the members of the Protestant Episcopal Church of Virginia to use the brief and priceless gift of life for the honor and glory of their Captain, Christ!

The call is for leaders of our own sex, dauntless and pure, to wage open and aggressive war against every low thought and vile deed; to make impregnable principle and high living the mark of manhood, and to dedicate undefiled character to the service of our country and our God. Let the Man of Galilee be the ideal of manhood among all men. He is the hero of the ages, and His call is clear that we should build up ourselves to the fullness of the stature of the perfect man.

Without purity in heart and mind, without purity in thought and word, in act and body, no man can march under the spotless banner of the Shepherd and Captain of our souls. And those who march not with Him, and with His hosts, are by that act alone cut off from the noble army of all His followers, and not cut off only, but cast out into a darkness reeking with misery and peopled with impurity.

In the presence of this appeal, in the choice between the light and darkness, between glory and shame, between companionship with mighty men or with wrecks and failures, how trivial and how vain are all lesser arguments?

And yet, the Church can see that what it taught and teaches as a revelation from God is now confirmed by the investigations of science and emphasized by the exigencies of politics.

It is not from any evangelical predilections that Berlin has begun its fight on immorality. It is not because of religious dogmas that the great European doctors declare that personal purity is essential if the race is to be preserved. And the dangers that have awakened and horrified scientific investigators are pressing at our doors.

Natural impulses, ignorance of danger, acquiescence in, where there is not actual glorification of, personal impurity, the breaking down of home ties and moral standards, the neglect of the family altar, and the increasing attraction of unregulated and uncontrolled lives on the part of many young people who are now herded together in great cities, have all played their part in undermining old foundations and building up new standards.

To state the danger is to recognize it in all its impressiveness and proximity. To combat the danger is a far more difficult and delicate problem.

But the danger can be met and overcome if the men and boys of this church will only give themselves to this great enterprise of manhood in its highest sense.

As means to enlistment in this adventure, we, the men of this Council, declare to the boys and men to whom we now speak that nothing less than absolute and inviolate chastity can ever satisfy that ideal of manhood which a pitiful multitude catches sight of only when all chance of attaining it is irrevocably lost.

This incomparable challenge to personal purity is whispered to the soul and thundered in the ears of every man and boy. The demand of the hour is for us to cherish purity, to remove from manhood its reproach, to honor the precepts of the Church, and to preserve the foundations of society. To no generation has a call more inspiring been given, and upon the response that shall be made by each man and boy depends the glory or the shame of this Diocese.

To every youth we give the solemn warning that indulgence in personal impurity of any sort not only results in sin and shame always, but after in loathsome disease. The consequences of a single act may be terrific and perpetual.

Let the thought forever be banished that impurity is manly. Vice is weakness; virtue alone is strength. No man or boy whose influence is evil is worthy of leadership; he is not to be followed, but to be shunned. The low-minded are never superior, but inferior; never to be looked up to, but to be looked down upon; never to be regarded as guides, but to be avoided or to be led into paths of purity. Innocency is better than guilt. If it has been lost in the past, let it be preserved in the present and in the future. It can be preserved. There are pure men. What others have done and are doing, you can do by the grace of God.

We condemn as wicked and false the declaration that wild outs must be sown, and the suggestion that unchastity is a peccadillo that is negligible or trivial. We know, as younger men cannot know, both the unspeakable sorrows and dangers of personal impurity, and the joys and triumphs of that splendid, vigorous manhood that only the pure can have.

We appeal to the men and boys to enlist in this noble cause, not because we see in the men and boys any special indications of those seeds of impurity that foretell ultimate destruction, but because this fight for purity is a man's affair. It is the manliest fight that can be made. It will call out the highest qualities of virile power, and will reward its victors with blessings and honor and power that none but they and their fellow conquerors can know and understand.

In conclusion we recommend:

First. That this memorial be read in each parish by the rector, with such comments as he may desire to make thereon.

Second. That in order to lay the true foundation for the attainment of the ideal expressed in this memorial, the rector of each parish is hereby requested to urge the maintenance of the family altar in each and every home.

Dr. Gravatt also moved, That the Social Service Commission have this report printed in pamphlet form, and that one thousand copies be distributed as widely as possible throughout the Diocese. This motion was referred to the Finance Committee under the rules.

The Rev. Dr. Gravatt stated that a vacancy existed in the Board of Trustees of Stuart Hall, and moved that Mr. John M. Taylor and Mr. Eustace F. Golsan be nominated to the Trustees for their selection to fill the vacancy, which motion was adopted.

The Rev. Geo. M. Brydon read the report of the Commission on Colonial Churches:

To the One Hundred and Nineteenth Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Commission on Colonial Churches has during the past year been carrying on its work as opportunity has offered.

It has suffered a serious loss in the recent death of one of its members,

Judge T. R. B. Wright, of Essex County. Loving his church and his State with an intensity which showed itself in constant action, and intensely proud of the history of both, for many years he gave unstintedly of his time and care to the preservation of the historic material, and the commemoration of the makers of history in the counties of the district over which he presided as Judge. He gave the same interest and care to the work of the Colonial Churches Commission from the time of its organization, and was one of its most active and efficient members. A member of this Council for many years, and widely loved, we thank God for the abiding influence of a life well lived, and work well done.

Of the twenty Colonial Church buildings in the Diocese, fifteen are cared for by the well organized congregations which own them. Of the other five, Christ Church, Lancaster County, is cared for by the church people in that county, and is used for services during the summer months. Lambs' Creek Church, Brunswick Parish, King George County, is cared for by a Restoration Association which is steadily raising funds for the restoration of the interior. It has regular services and hopes in time to be fully organized as a parish, and represented once more in the Council after more than 125 years in which it has had no delegate. Little Fork Church, in Culpeper County, belongs to the Diocese by order of the County Court, but only on condition that the Parish holds at least one service a year in it. Since the present rector took charge, frequent services have been held in the summer months, and plans have been formed, and a sum of money raised, for its repair.

Farnham Church, in Richmond County, has its Restoration Association, which is endeavoring under difficulties to raise sufficient money to build a roof, floor and windows, so as to make the building once more habitable. The building is as yet a roofless ruin, but every lover of this old Diocese will hope that it will soon be restored.

Old St. John's Church, in King William County, has at last been definitely claimed and taken possession of by the Parish. An association for its restoration was formed at West Point last November, and is endeavoring to raise funds for that purpose.

The commission cannot but feel that these, and the other Colonial Churches of the Diocese, while of course they belong absolutely to the parishes in which they are located, are also a very precious heritage of the Diocese, and arouse an interest far wider than would be accorded to them as parish churches. For the sake of their historic interest and value as examples of the church architecture, and as illustrating the church customs and habits of the colonial period, they should be kept as nearly as possible as they stood when they first came from the hands of their builders. They cannot be modernized except at the cost of losing all the distinctive features which make them of such intense interest to the churchmen of today. A venerable old building whose plain lines and beautiful simplicity fill the heart with thoughts of the men who built

and worshipped within its walls, sinks to a lower level of mediocrity when the attempt is made to remodel it after the fashion of churches of today. One has but to enter an old church like Christ Church, Lancaster, to feel the thrill of contact with the life that pulsed strong and vigorously before the Revolution. It would mean much to the Diocese if each one of its colonial churches could be made as impressive an object lesson of its colonial life.

Therefore, the commission urges that when extensive repairs or alterations are to be made in a colonial church building, the work should be done under the supervision of an architect skilled in the restoration of old churches; so that all our colonial material remaining may be preserved, and what is lost restored as far as possible.

One site of a destroyed colonial church will shortly be marked by a suitable tablet and inscription: The site of the old Mountain Chapel of Shelburne Parish, in Loudoun County.

In the past year it has been definitely learned that what is at present used as the rectory of St. Paul's Parish, King George County, is in reality a colonial building, and was originally the vestry house of the parish. It is a two-story brick building, standing beside the old church. The date of erection has not been learned, but it most probably is as old, or older than the church itself. The commission does not know of another parish in which the old vestry house is still standing.

A work which must be done for the Diocese sooner or later, is the searching through the court order-books and other court records of the colonial period of the different counties, for the purpose of learning whatever is therein mentioned in regard to the church and its parishes and ministers. This should be done especially in those parishes whose colonial records and registers are lost. It is being done in one county now. And it has been done recently in another county, and has furnished enough material to enable the putting together of a fairly complete outline of the history of the church in that county. In many places in the State today a minister or other earnest churchman who can get convenient access to colonial court records could do real service in the Diocese by searching the old court records, and making a copy of all therein found which pertains to the history of the parishes in that county. Judge A. W. Wallace, with an eloquent address, offered the following minute, which was adopted by a rising vote:

This Council has heard with profound sorrow of the death of Judge T. R. B. Wright, of Tappahannock, Va., and as an expression of the same it puts on record its tribute to a life lived on the highest plane of citizenship, both religious and civil.

The Rev. John London presented the report of the Committee on the Increase of the Ministry:

To the One Hundred and Nineteenth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Committee on the Increase of the Ministry respectfully reports:

The report of the treasurer of the Virginia Education Society, which has been referred to your committee, is very gratifying, both in the increased number of churches contributing to this Fund and also in the amounts paid. Last year forty-three (43) churches contributed to this Fund; this year fifty-four. Last year \$1,174.29 was contributed to the Society, while this year's report shows a total amount of \$1,099.32. The Bishop reported to the Council postulants received, six. A number far too small if the church expects to fill the parishes in this Diocese with ordained men.

Your committee would urge upon the Clergy and Laity the great importance of supporting the Virginia Education Society. We need churches and parish houses, but more than all these we need ordained men to go out to spread the good news and to convert the impenitent.

It was when the first Christians at Antioch ministered unto the Lord and fasted, that the Spirit said unto them, "Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them."

Personal work is the only way which God has appointed for the reaping of the golden field ready for the harvest.

We should be willing to give ourselves to prayer with new earnestness, recognizing in our need of men for the ministry that the great facts of Christianity are vital, and mean that man's highest glory is his opportunity so to surrender himself to God's will that he may share God's purpose and enter His service for the work in His Kingdom. There are, no doubt, many young men who would gladly enter the ministry, but they have not the courage to ask, "What can I do for My Master?" They have not been invited by their rector, and consequently are not seeking the Holy Ministry.

We, therefore, ask the clergy of this Diocese to frequently extend an invitation to men, not only from the pulpit, but also privately; to try and lead them to enter the ministry of the church.

Your committee would call the attention of the members of the Council, and of the Churchmen of the Diocese, to the generous bequest of Colonel Skinner, of Staunton, Va., to the University of Virginia for the purpose of providing scholarships for students intending to enter the ministry of our Church. These funds yield at present five scholarships of \$250 each, and when the estate is finally settled, it is espected that three more scholarships, each paying a like sum, will be available. According to the provisions of the will of Colonel Skinner the following conditions are attached to these scholarships:

First. The appointment to these scholarships are to be made by the Educational Society of Virginia, and secondly, students applying for these scholarships must agree to pursue their theological course at the Theological Seminary of Virginia.

Your committee also notes with gratitude the bequest of Miss Skinner, of Staunton, Va., to the Theological Seminary of Virginia, of a sum the exact amount of which is at present not known—to provide for several scholarships at the Theological Seminary. These scholarships are, however, not yet available.

Your committee feels sure that these bequests of Colonel Skinner and his sister, supplementing each other, will in time have a great influence in helping to provide thoroughly trained men for the Christian Ministry. For there is at the present time not only a dearth of men, but especially of TRAINED men, entering the Ministry, and we are grateful for this promise for the future.

Your committee would call the attention of all the churches in the Diocese to the needs of the Educational Society of Virginia. During the past year the disbursements exceeded the receipts of the Society by about \$1,500. We would earnestly recommend an increase in the offerings to the Society.

Your committee offer the following:

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Resolved, That the Special Committee on the Increase of the Ministry be continued for the next Council year and that an appropriation of \$50.00, or as much as this committee may need, be made from the Contingent Fund.

Judge Norton moved, That the gentlemen receiving the highest number of votes on any ballot, after those elected Deputies, be declared Alternate Deputies, which was adopted.

Mr. Mayo made the following supplementary report from the Committee on Finance, which was adopted:

The Committee on Finance recommends the payment of \$200.00 to the General Board of Religious Education; \$100.00 to the Diocesan Social Service Commission; \$50.00 to the Special Committee on Increase of the Ministry, and an amount not exceeding \$40.00 per capita to pay expenses of the Delegates to Primary Council of Third Province.

We recommend that an appropriation be not made to the Social Service Commission to have 1,000 copies of their report presented to this Council, printed, as we think the Commission should pay for this printing out of the appropriation made to it. These recommendations of appropriations are made subject to the provisions of our report of May 20, 1914, viz:

"Increase of the Ministry, Social Service Commission, and other outside appropriations, etc., will have to be authorized by the Council before your committee can pay any thing on account thereof, and we recommend that these appropriations shall be made payable only after the Bishops' and other salaries and Diocesan expenses have been paid, or provided for, with funds in hand, and then only in proportion, ratably, as funds may be available to pay the same."

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was read by the Rev. Geo. P. Mayo:

Your Committee on the State of the Church beg leave to make the following report:

In spite of the loss by death of so many of our prominent and valued clergy and the long and serious illness of our Bishop, the work of the Diocese has made encouraging progress.

While the number of confirmations reported is only 614 as compared with 748 for last year, the reason no doubt lies in the fact that many of the parishes have received no Episcopal visitation and that in many of them large classes are now awaiting confirmation.

The number of candidates for Holy Orders continues about the same. This perhaps is the most discouraging feature of our work. The Church must have more men seeking her ministry if her work is to be carried forward. The demand is greater by far than the supply. "How shall they hear without a preacher and how shall they preach except they be sent," and it may be added, how shall they be sent unless more say "Here am I, send me."

The number of clergy received into the Diocese is more by far than those leaving. This would indicate that there are fewer vacant parishes than last year, but our vacancies are filled by making vacancies elsewhere. How shall we get more young men to seek the church's ministry? This is the question and it is an important one. Upon the clergy themselves rest the chief responsibility of answering this question. Just how it will be done is for them to say. We believe that the perfecting of some such plan of pensioning the clergy as that outlined by Mr. Sayre and approved by our Council will not only result in increasing their efficiency, but also in increasing the number of those applying for Holy Orders.

The missionary work of the Diocese on the whole is encouraging, but it should be a matter of serious regret to us all that we failed to raise our apportionment for both Foreign and Diocesan Missions. Shall we not say that we believe that there is not the full and intelligent forward effort made to fulfill obligations laid by the apportionment; for in many instances the blank spaces set opposite certain funds denote no effort and no offering asked for that fund. It should be noted, however, that while we did not raise the apportionment for Diocesan Missions, the Executive Committee closes its year's work with a balance in its treasury of over four thousand dollars. If the recommended apportionment for 1914-'15 is raised it will give the Diocese \$23,000 for Diocesan Missions. This should enable the Diocesan Missionary Society to take care of the entire missionary work of the Diocese and render it unnecessary for personal appeals to be made to the church at large to help pay the salaries of our own missionaries, either clerical or lay, a practice which, to say the least, is not creditable to a Diocese of our size and strength.

The apportionment plan appears thus far to be a success, but your committee believes that the state of the church would be improved should there be some fixed rules governing the making up of the budget and the distribution of the funds after they are raised. We believe that one central board cannot adequately determine all of the questions involved in a matter which so vitally concerns the uttermost parts of the Diocese. There should be auxiliary centres nearer the scene of action to which may be given some voice in determining the two important questions involved in the apportionment plan, namely: How much we shall ask for, and how we shall spend what we get. The convocations may be used as such local centres but, we believe, as constituted at present, these Convocations could not wisely and fairly render such service. Therefore your committee would humbly recommend the apportionment of a special committee to report at the next Council on the expediency of bringing the Convocations into closer canonical relation with the Diocese and rearranging the limits of the Convocations with special reference to the misisonary work of the Diocese.

The work of the archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge under the active and efficient leadership of Archdeacon Neve continues to grow. The chief need here as in many other fields in the Diocese is for more laborers—earnest, strong and consecrated men and women.

The steady growth of the work at the University of Virginia and the fact that it has demonstrated its necessity in the religious life of that institution, should commend it to the liberal support of the Diocese.

Your committee calls your attention to an old but indeed a vital subject. It is the weakness, inefficiency, and absence of plan and purpose and intelligent methods in our Sunday-schools. It is a truism to say, Here lies our strength for a future church, and here is one of our weakest spots in organization and administration. We fear our laymen, and clergymen too, sometimes miss the perspective and balance of importance. Our Sunday-schools must have more thought, time, and prayer if our Church is to be a power for the future.

This committee believes that one of the most urgent calls now challenging the Church is for the increased participation of the clergy of the Diocese, and of laymen and laywomen whom they shall inspire in the many forms of work for moral and social betterment, which are summed up under the general head of social service. The committee commends to the attention of the Council the published report of the Social Service Commission and urges that the clergy and lay delegates consider thoughtfully the opportunities there suggested for neighborhood service which they themselves can inaugurate in their own parishes at this immediate time. There is one department of the church's work in this Diocese which is far from being what it should be. We refer to the colored work. This work has been neglected in the past, and yet its importance is so great that we believe more special attention should be

given it, and to this end we recommend that a commission consisting of three should be appointed, to be known as Commission on Colored Work, and as an immediate step towards more aggressive work for these people, we recommend the appointment of an archdeacon as soon as possible.

A healthy state of the church is dependent upon the whole-hearted service of a vigorous ministry. Such service cannot be rendered by men who are in debt. It is a lamentable fact that while the cost of living has increased about forty-five per cent., the salary of the clergy in many cases has remained the same. Your committee looks forward to the time when \$1,000 shall be the minimum salary for a single man and \$1,200 for a married man.

The Rev. Wm. B. Lee offered the following resolution:

Whereas, the traffic in intoxicating liquors as a beverage is recognized as injurious to the interest of Church and State, and

Whereas, an effort is being made to banish this traffe from the confines of this State, therefore.

Resolved, That this Council approves of said effort, and bids God's speed to all who are engaged in this laudable undertaking.

On motion it was ordered that the Council meet at 3:30 o'clock in executive session for the consideration of this resolution.

The Rev. Dr. Wallis offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That this Council of the Diocese of Virginia place on record its unanimous approval of the stand uniformly taken by the Ladies' Association of Mt. Vernon, in keeping that sacred shrine, the home and resting-place of Washington, closed to the public on Sundays.

Mr. John M. Taylor offered the following preamble and resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, the Diocese of Virginia is the owner of twenty-nine (29) shares of the preferred stock of the Southern Railway Company, which certificate is registered in the name of R. S. Chamberlayne, Treasurer, Diocese of Virginia, and

Whereas, the said Diocese of Virginia is now desirous of having this certificate transferred from the name of R. S. Chamberlayne, Treasurer, Diocese of Virginia, and a new certificate therefor issued, registered in the name of The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia for Account of the Episcopal Fund; now, therefore,

Be it resolved, That the said R. S. Chamberlayne, Treasurer of the Diocese of Virginia, be, and is hereby, authorized to execute the necessary assignment for the transfer of the above-mentioned twenty-nine (29) shares of the preferred stock of the Southern Railway Company, as above mentioned, and his signature as Treasurer of the said Diocese of Virginia be attested by the Secretary of the said Diocese of Virginia.

The Rev. Dr. Goodwin moved, That the proposed amendment to Canon XVI, referred to this Council by the last Council (see Journal, 1913, pp. 65, 66), be laid upon the table, which was carried.

The Rev. Dr. Gravatt offered the following resolution, which was adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That this Council, with gratitude to God, who has heard our prayers, expresses great pleasure that the Bishop of the Diocese has been able to be present with us in the Council and trusts that he may soon be restored to vigor of health.

The hour of recess having come, the Council adjourned.

FRIDAY, 3:30 p. m.

The Council was called to order in executive session.

The following resolution was offered by the Rev. S. Roger Tyler, and adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That the sympathy of the Council be extended to the Rev. J. Francis Ribble on the death of his father.

The resolution offered this morning by the Rev. Wm. B. Lee was withdrawn by consent.

The Rev. W. Russell Bowie offered the following:

Resolved, That this Council, recognizing that earnest and consecrated men may legitimately differ as to the ways and means by which the sale and consumption of liquor may best be discouraged and decreased, calls all Christian men in the light of their clearest judgment, to give their influence and activity to a constructive effort to diminish the consumption and sale of liquor, and to set on foot such positive efforts as shall lead to the ultimate goal of the annihilation of traffic in intoxicating liquors as a fact in our civilization.

Mr. John B. Minor offered the following as a substitute:

In view of the fact that there is now pending before the people of Virginia the question as to whether the State shall adopt the system of State-wide prohibition or that of local option, and since this Council has been called upon to express its position on this question; now, therefore,

Be it resolved, That the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia in annual Council assembled, reiterates the declaration frequently heretofore made that it earnestly indorses the cause of temperance and all proper means to promote said cause; but it believes that the means of accomplishing this end should be left to the prayerful judgment of the individual.

On motion the substitute was laid upon the table, and the resolution of the Rev. Mr. Bowie was adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Goodwin moved the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Council hereby expresses to the Rev. Berryman Green, D.D., our high appreciation of the dignity, courtesy and ability with which he has presided over our deliberations in relieving the labors of our beloved Bishop.

The Rev. S. Roger Tyler offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Council be tendered to the rector, vestry and congregation of St. James' Church for their gracious hospitality, and to the choir of the church and to the pages for their assistance in our services and other sessions, and that we cordially congratulate the rector and congregation upon the splendid new church in which we have been privileged to meet.

It was moved by the Rev. Dr. Wallis and carried, That after the reading of today's minutes and the usual devotional exercises, the Council do adjourn *sine die*.

The rough minutes of this day's proceedings were read and approved. After singing Hymn 672, with prayers and the benediction by the Bishop, the Council stood adjourned without day.

REPORT OF ARCHDEACON NEVE. Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge.

IVY DEPOT, VA., May 13, 1914.

Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, D.D.,

MY DEAR BISHOP:

In sending in my annual report, I am glad to be able to report signs of progress in various points of this archdeaconry.

The most notable event as it seems to me during the past year has been the remarkable victory gained by the Rev. Roy Mason, of Mission Home, over the liquor dealers in his district.

The distilleries have been perhaps the greatest hindrance to the work we have to encounter, and the demoralizing effects of these places have been seen on every hand. Mr. Mason ever since his coming into this field has been trying to do away with them, and thus set the people free from the bondage which they have been under. After a seven years' fight, during which time his life has been often in danger, Mr. Mason has now won a complete victory, and on the first day of May last, every distillery in Albemarle and Greene counties was closed.

This victory has been brought about in a great measure by the change of sentiment in the minds of the people as a result of Mr. Mason's courageous stand for a higher moral standard. The good effects of this victory will reach far beyond the bounds of his own district.

Another event of importance has been the securing of a charter for the Industrial School, which has now become as a result of this action a regularly incorporated institution. Year by year this school is gaining ground, and increasing in usefulness, not only through the increased number of pupils, but also on account of its improved equipment.

Mr. Mayo deserves all praise for his faithful and persevering efforts in founding and developing this institution.

The Rev. Mr. Ellis has the settlement and the school work at Yancey very well organized, and a great deal of good is being done. He is endeavoring now to build a stone church at Rocky Bar, which will be the means, it is hoped, of creating another center of useful work.

In Page county the work has been received and strengthened by the appointment of the Rev. Churchill Gibson as rector. There is a good

prospect for the building of a new church and also a rectory at Luray, the headquarters of this field.

The Standardsville District, through the resignation of the Rev. W. M. Cleaveland last summer, has been without a rector for eight months, and is suffering in consequence. The Rev. Mr. Turner, of Madison court-house, has, however, been kindly holding monthly services at the various missions.

Deaconess Boorman, who for several years had been doing a valuable work at Hickory Hill and Red Hill, resigned last fall and moved to a larger field in Georgia. Her loss was keenly felt by the people, as she had spared neither time nor strength in their service. Her place has been taken by two young ladies who are doing their best to make up to the people for the loss they have sustained in the removal of Deaconess Boorman.

Another loss has been that of the Mission House at Lydia, which was burned to the ground on Sunday night, March 1st. Fortunately the building was insured but the workers lost most of their things, as there was no time to save them, and they were not covered by insurance.

There was also considerable loss at the Pocosan and Cecil Memorial Mission near Lydia through the terrible storm of March 1st and 2d.

The absence in England of Mr. H. L. Lyman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Advisory Board, throws an additional amount of care and responsibility on me. Few people realize how much time and care this valuable layman gives to the Mission work of the Diocese in this section.

REPORT OF ST. ANNE'S SCHOOL.

May 18, 1914.

RT. REV. ROBERT A. GIBSON, D.D., Bishop of Virginia:

The report of St. Anne's School for the past session is very encouraging.

Since the first year of its existence the attendance and income have been doubled.

The boarding department has been filled during the past session. The faculty and pupils have been faithful to their duties. The health of pupils and teachers has been excellent. The Junior Auxiliary under the leadership of Miss Agnes Moon has contributed to Doctor Lee's hospital in China, to the Mission work in Japan, and to the Ragged Mountain Missions.

The Helping Hand has done some good work in the community, including a Christmas dinner and gifts for a poor family, and an Easter treat for the children recommended by the District Nurse. This society has also undertaken to support a day scholarship in the Mission School at Dyke, in Greene county.

Miss Fitz Jarrell, who has charge of the Art Department, has painted an oil portrait of the founder of the school, Rev. H. B. Lee, D.D., which will be hung in the hall June 6th.

If St. Anne's could secure the necessary endowment for additional buildings and the proper equipment, its work and influence would be immeasurably increased.

REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Present Opportunities for Constructive Leadership, Particularly in the Country.

To the One Hundred and Nineteenth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, meeting in Richmond, May 20, 1914:

The Social Service Commission of the Diocese respectfully submits this, its second Annual Report.

Meetings of the Commission.

Since the last meeting of the Council in Charlottesville in May, 1913, the commission has had two meetings, in December, 1913, and on May 7, 1914. At the meeting in December, Col. Eugene C. Massie tendered his resignation as a member of the Commission, and Mr. John B. Minor was elected in his place.

Immediate Opportunities for Community Service.

At the meeting in December the commission voted that the Chairman should send out to all the ministers in the Diocese a letter calling attention to the agencies in Virginia with which they could coöperate in stimulating efforts for community betterment. This letter was mailed in February.

The commission feels that the most important thing at present to be desired within the scope of its interests is the realization on the part of all the clergy, and especially the clergy in the country, of how simple and vital and altogether practicable are the means for social service work which lie now at hand. At the meeting in May the commission voted that the substance of the letter sent to the clergy in February should be incorporated in this permanent report, in order that attention might again be called to the opportunities for helpful leadership which it suggests.

It will be remembered that the Council of the Diocese in Charlottesville last May passed this resolution by an unanimous vote:

"This Council, believing that the Spirit of Jesus working through the Church will express itself in ever-widening forms of human service, urges upon the ministers in the Diocese, and particularly in the country parishes, that by word and by leadership they teach their people that their Christianity should prove itself by alert and earnest readiness to strengthen every cooperative movement which makes for better health, for better education, for happy and clean recreation, and for progress along any other way which leads to the community's larger good."

As suggestions for carrying out this resolution, the commission begs leave to call the attention of all our clergy again to these facts, which were mentioned in the letter sent out in February:

The Coöperative Education Association of Virginia (address, Capitol Building, Richmond), which is doing such magnificent work in building up, throughout Virginia, neighborhood leagues to improve the schools and to bring the people of a neighborhood together for discussion of public questions and for united work for the neighborhood prosperity and betterment along all lines, will send its secretary, Mr. J. H. Binford, to any community, free of expense, to tell the citizens how to organize a league, and what a league can do.

A bulletin of this Association will be mailed to you on request.

The State Board of Health (address, Richmond) will send one of its secretaries to any community, free of expense, to lecture on any one of a long list of subjects of public health and sanitation.

A catalogue of these lectures will be mailed you on request.

The secretary of the State Board of Charities and Corrections (Dr. J. T. Mastin, State Library Building, Richmond) will come, free of expense, to any community to tell of the vital work his Board is seeking to do for the people of Virginia.

If you want a copy of his annual report, write and ask him for it.

It should be noted that the work Doctor Mastin can outline challenges the interest of men in city parishes and in country parishes equally.

Coöperation with the agencies suggested in these memoranda is very simply secured, and would lead to the inauguration in our parishes of a kind of service which would make the church of immense benefit to its neighborhood in helping promote the conditions that make for sweeter, healthier and sounder living.

An interesting bit of testimony as to the way in which ministers may actually make use of the organizations existing in Virginia for social service, particularly in rural districts, is contained in a leaflet sent out by the Coöperative Education Association recently to persons throughout Virginia interested in the Association's work. Here is one paragraph of it, headed: "How Ministers Help Our Work":

"Last fall Mr. Binford spent a week in King George county at the solicitation of Rev. George McL. Brydon. Mr. Brydon became acquainted with our work through the Conference for Education in the South and through the Social Service Committee of the Episcopal Church. On this trip in King George five leagues were organized. Rev. Mr. Brydon has since visited all these leagues and has assisted in forming a new one at the Court-house. He is also interested in corn and canning club work and in a county fair. He keeps in touch with our office and is doing much to advance the educational interests of his county."

What has been done in this individual instance is being done in some other parishes in the Diocese, and can be done in all.

In this connection a letter, written by one of the clergymen in the Diocese, of long experience, and recently received by the commission, is so apt that it is quoted here in full:

"While social service is only a name to many of our country clergy as yet, I believe it can be the means by which many of our clergymen can become leaders in their communities and in this way draw to the Episcopal Church a future permanent social element in the country. If this is not done, our Church will gradually die in the rural parts. The older church people are dving or leaving the country, and the populous parishes now have only a handful of people. But the country is full of the middle class, who so far, because of habit or prejudice, have not come to the Episcopal church, even where this is the only church in the community. If we can get our clergy to take an interest in the public schools, better buildings, etc., the social life of the community, games, etc., in corn clubs, etc., they will gain the good-will and confidence of the people and many of them will come to the Episcopal church. If you can emphasize this along definite lines and show how it will strengthen the Church, as well as benefit the community, I believe many of our clergy will take hold and it will be the means of holding them in the country.

"If we are going to save the country to the Church, we will have to wake up and change our methods and views. It can be done, I believe, and with some readjustment the country parishes can be made largely self-supporting and our funds can go to the real missionary work of the Diocese."

Work of the Commission in Connection with Legislation.

At the meeting of the Council in May, 1913, the Council indorsed a resolution offered by the commission recommending the passage of a new Child Labor Bill similar to the Byrd Bill, which failed of passage in the Legislature of 1912. The commission used its best efforts to further consideration of this bill in the session of the Legislature this past winter, and asked the ministers in the Diocese to send petitions to their legislators urging the passage of the bill. It is a great satisfaction that the bill was passed, and that its operation, which begins with the 20th of next June, will throw largely strengthened safeguards around the children of the Commonwealth who have been forced heretofore into hurtful conditions of labor.

Besides the general prohibition of employment of children under fourteen years of age, the new bill prohibits the employment of children under sixteen years of age for more than six days in a week, or more than ten hours of any one day, or at night. In all cities having a population of 5,000 or more, it prohibits the employment of children under the age of fourteen years as messengers for telegraph or telephone companies, or in the distribution or delivery of goods and messages, and prohibits the employment of children under eighteen in the same character of work at night. It prohibits, further, the selling of newspapers by boys under ten and girls under sixteen in any street or public place in cities having a population of 5,000 or more. All the persons, except the one indicated

in the first clause of the paragraph, are new ones, and involve safeguards which did not exist in the previous law at all.

At the meeting of the commission in December, 1913, the commission discussed the so-called Red Light Injunction Abatement Law, which it was believed would be presented in the session of the Legislature then about to meet. The purpose of that law, the principle of which was first adopted in Iowa, and has since been enacted in other States and in the District of Columbia, is to assail commercialized prostitution by placing the burden of responsibility upon the owner of the property which is used for immoral purposes.

This law failed of passage in the Legislature. Since the adjournment of the Legislature, the Mayor of Richmond has appointed a committee of able and patriotic citizens to study the problem of immorality in Richmond with specific reference to the maintenance or dispersion of the so-called segregated districts, as either the one or the other of these policies would affect the welfare of the whole community.

In view of this investigation into the matter, and in view of the divergence of opinion as to the actual benefit of laws similar to the Iowa law, this commission does not desire to make now any definite suggestions or report further than to reaffirm its belief that the policy of silence and neglect will neither solve nor amelioriate this old and deep-seated evil.

The commission will, of course, take further action upon this matter and make further report before the question becomes immediately vital again by the reassembling of a new Legislature.

### The Boy Scout Movement.

In its preliminary report published in February, 1913, the commission recommended to the attention of the clergy in the Diocese the Boy Scout Movement as an exceedingly promising agency for reaching the boys of any community with stimulating and inspiring moral influences. The months intervening since that time have marked the continued extraordinary growth and development of the Boy Scout Movement. It has entrenched itself in wide-spread popular favor; and a great many of our churches, particularly those in the cities, have already had experience in organizing and conducting patrols of the scouts. The commission wishes to call this movement to the attention of those of the clergy who have not already been personally in touch with it. Specific information about the scout movement here in Virginia can be secured by writing to Mr. W. J. B. Housman, News Leader Building, Richmond.

# Results of Requiring Certificates Before Marriage.

At the meeting last May in Charlottesville, the Council adopted a resolution recommending to the ministers of the Diocese, that under certain conditions, which the resolution specified, they should require of

men applying to be married by a minister of the church a physician's certificate of freedom from any disease of immoral origin.

Thirteen of the clergymen in Richmond and one outside of Richmond determined to put this resolution into effect so far as their own churches were concerned. One of the clergy at that time among the number who took this position in Richmond has died, and three have removed from the city, but two of them are still in the Diocese. Two of the clergymen now outside of Richmond and six of those in Richmond have had occasion to perform marriages since they made the new requirement binding for themselves.

The commission reports to the Council that these clergymen who have governed themselves by this requirement testify that the number of marriages performed by them has not decreased, and that, in addition, they feel that there has been marked increase in the Church's power to win attention and regard for right ideals of masculine purity.

## The Single Standard.

It will be remembered that the speakers in favor of the resolution debated and finally adopted by the Council at Charlottesville urged as their foremost reason their belief that the adoption of such a requirement would have signal educative value in making men and boys of the Church understand that the Church does clearly and uncompromisingly believe in the single standard of morals, which shall be as sovereign for the man as for the woman; and those who disagreed with this particular resolution were, and are, equally earnest that this standard be lifted up. The Social Service Commission believes that the Church can render no finer service than by making this ideal of purity more and more clear and unmistakable, so that all the weight of her spiritual influence may be cast against those contrary influences of ignorance and misunderstanding and vicious teaching to which boys are sometimes subjected, and by which too many are made to imagine impurity to be a natural and excusable thing.

The commission, therefore, recommends to this Council as the one definite legislative action urged in this report: That the Council emphasize the value and duty of personal purity for men and boys by appointing a committee of laymen to draw up a statement expressing the mind of this Council on this subject and to report at this meeting.

#### Summary of Recommendations.

It has been the desire of the commission in presenting this report to the Council to urge a few things only and make those few things definite. It believes that all of us are coming more and more to recognize that social service is no vague and remote thing, but the opportunity at our doors for simple and constructive form of leadership that shall help carry out the Christ's Gospel of the Kingdom of God on earth by bringing wholesome influences to bear upon the familiar conditions of the life of every day. The letter quoted in this report shows how vitally related to the fundamental interests of the Church the thing that we call social service is; for the possibility of new power for this Church of ours is going to depend, as it ought to do, upon her ability to inspire and organize the influences which help in vital and demonstrable ways the people in the midst of whom she is placed.

For this sort of leadership there is needed no special technical equipment or technical experience. The agencies already exist in the State to do the work we want to promote—to organize the people of various communities into leagues for the promotion of their own common interests, to better the schools, to safeguard public health, to promote clean recreation and healthful social fellowship, and in general to teach the people of a neighborhood how to come together in what is the real Christian brotherhood of mutual interest for the general good of the community in which they live.

This report gives the names and the addresses of the organizations to which any minister in the Diocese can turn for immediate guidance and help in any work he may want to inaugurate in his community. The only things that any man needs with which to start are the will to begin and a two-cent stamp on an envelope addressed to any one of the organizations which are listed in this report.

Two things the commission would feel grateful for if this report could accomplish them:

- 1. An increased realization among the ministers of the Diocese, and especially those in the country, of the simple and practical opportunities for social leadership which they themselves and the people of their congregations can at this time embrace.
- 2. The appointment of a committee of laymen to formulate and present for adoption by this Council a statement of that ideal of personal purity which the Church expects of boys and men.

# APPENDIX D-II

# Statistics of The Diocese of Virginia, 1914

One hundred and forty-six Parochial Reports have been received, covering two hundred and eighteen churches, chapels or missions. About twenty-six are not reported, mostly small missions or vacant churches. Two ministers in charge of parishes failed to make any report, and at least two others failed to report all their missions. The reports received, however, cover at least ninety five per cent. of the Diocese, estimated by communicants. In the figures given below the number of communicants last reported from congregations not reported this year are added to make up the total. For other items the addition of about two per cent. would probably give a correct total.

Baptisms: adults, white, 183; colored, 8; total, 191; infants, white, 679; colored, 18; total, 697; total baptisms, 888. (Increase, 19).

Confirmations (Bishop's Report): white, 600; colored, 14; total 614.

Burials: white, 557; colored, 10; total, 567. (Increase, 33).

Catechisings: too imperfectly reported to be even estimated.
