FORM FOR MAKING BEOUEST

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

The funds already created and now held by the said corporation are:

- 1. The Disabled Clergy Fund.
- 2. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund. 8. Yeocomico Ch. Endowment Fund.
- 3. The Episcopal Fund.

All devises or bequests to any of the said funds should be made to "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Virginia, for the sole use and benefit of the Fund | naming the fund intended |, now held in trust by the said corporation."

If it is the desire to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its President, Rt. Rev. Robert A. Gibson, D. D.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is, "The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary and High School in Virginia," and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia," and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia," and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg, Va., is: "The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity and Industrial School in Virginia," and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia, March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

ORGANIZATION

From Canon I, Section 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be so designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

Canon II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all of the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

RULES OF ORDER

1st. The Council shall be opened each day with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Election of a Secretary.

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President, and announced on the first day of the Council, the following Standing Committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Clergy Relief, to whom shall be referred the accounts of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and of the Disabled Clergy Fund, and other matters cognate thereto.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds not specified above, held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on Missions, to whom shall be referred the report and accounts of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society, and other matters bearing on the missionary work of the Diocese.

A Committee on Clerical Support, consisting of ten laymen.

A Committee on New Parishes.

A Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

A Committee on Unfinished Business.

And the chairmen of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President shall think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next succeeding Council.

5th. Immediately after the reading of the Bishop's address, the Council shall proceed to elect the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, the Diocesan Board of Religious Education, the Board of Apportionment, to fill vacancies, if any exist, on the Committee on Church Property, to elect delegates to the Synod of the Province, and such other committees or representatives as need to be chosen annually.

6th. The Council shall sit as a Board of Missions on the first day of the session at 8:15 o'clock p. m. The President of the Council, or some member of the Council selected by him, shall preside. The Secretary of the Council shall be Secretary of the Council sitting as a Board of Missions.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; and all resolutions shall be referred to their proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secre-

tary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the President or any member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate.

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting

in the majority; Provided, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

25th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action of the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only, when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

26th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the Presidenmay appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recompmend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And this Committee may report at any time.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

27th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Counci without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

28th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

29th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

30th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Journal of the 122d Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia

St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, VA.,

WEDNESDAY, MAY 23, 1917.

The One Hundred and Twenty-second Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia convened this day in St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, Va., at 10:00 A. M. and was opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion. The Rt. Rev. Robert A. Gibson, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese, was the celebrant, assisted by the Rt. Rev. William C. Brown, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor; the Rev. Edward L. Goodwin, D. D., Secretary of the Council; the Rev. G. M. Brydon, Assistant Secretary; and the Rev. J. J. Lanier, Rector of St. George's Church. In place of the sermon, Bishop Gibson read a part of his annual address to the Council.

The Council was called to order in business session at 12:15 P. M.

The Chair introduced the Rev. M. B. Porter, Secretary of the South Atlantic Agency of the American Bible Society, who made an address on the work of the American Bible Society, and appealed for gifts to a special fund with which to purchase Testaments for the American soldiers.

The Council was then organized by calling the roll. Sixty clergymen and forty-five lay delegates being present, the Bishop declared the Council organized.

Excuses for non-attendance were sent by the Rev. Messrs. Edward Wall and H. H. Williams.

The Rev. E. L. Goodwin, D. D., was nominated as Secretary of the Council, and on motion the Rev. Mr. Brydon was instructed to cast one ballot for Dr. Goodwin for that office.

Dr. Goodwin appointed the Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon Assistant Secretary.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Goodwin, the Rules of Order of the last Council were adopted.

The Rev. J. I. Lanier moved that the hours of business session be as follows: 10:00 A. M. to 1:00 P. M.; 3:00 to 5:00 P. M.; and 8:00 P. M. This motion was carried.

The Rev. W. D. Smith, D. D., moved that divine service be held at 9 o'clock on Thursday and Friday mornings. This motion was carried. Upon motion of the Rev. J. F. Burks, the arrangement of these morning services was left to the Bishop.

The Chair appointed the Rev. W. E. Rollins, D. D., and Messrs. James Ashby and John F. Scott as the Committee on Credentials.

Judge A. W. Wallace, after securing unanimous consent of the Council, presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That so much of the Bishop's address as calls attention to the foreign war in which the United States is engaged be referred to a committee composed of four members from the clergy and four lay members of this Council, who shall report at the opening of the afternoon session suitable resolutions expressing the profound sense of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia as to conditions in this national crisis, compelling the United States to engage in justifiable war and stating the position that should be taken by this Church.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS.

The Committee on Credentials begs leave to report that it has examined the certificates of Lay Delegates and finds them correct as read by the Secretary, except that one certificate was unsigned.

W. E. ROLLINS, Chairman.

The Rev. W. J. Morton moved that a committee be appointed to secure pledges for a special fund of \$500 for the American Bible Society, for the purpose of procuring Bibles and Testaments for the American soldiers. The motion was carried, and the Chair appointed the Rev. Messrs. W. R. Mason, W. D. Smith, D. D., and W. J. Morton as this committee.

Mr. John M. Taylor presented the Reports of the Treasurers of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, the Disabled Clergy Fund, the Bruce Fund, the Fund for Women's Work, the Episcopal Fund, the Albert Baker Evangelist Fund, St. Andrew's Church Fund, and Special Funds for Churches, held by the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia. These reports were referred to their appropriate committees.

The hour of 1:00 having arrived, the Council took a recess.

Wednesday, 3:00 P. M.

The Council was called to order, Bishop Gibson presiding.

The Bishop read the remainder of his address. Including the part read this morning, it was as follows:

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

In the midst of this twentieth year of my Episcopate I feel that it will be advantageous in several ways to make something of a general resumé of the events of the period.

In 1897 when I was elected and came to Virginia as Bishop the diocese was just emerging from a condition of ruin. As I came into Richmond on the train one traveling man, who was sitting in front of me, said to another, "This town of Richmond is dead commercially." The man was a stranger and did

not know that the country was just beginning to realize that a quiet but steady recuperation was going on in the State of Virginia. The first visitation which I made as the new Bishop was to Southern Virginia in aid of Bishop. Randolph. The section of country visited was that in which my diaconate was spent. In one county an optimist whom I had long known surprised me by saying there was as much money in the county as in the days to which we looked back as prosperous. True, it was in quite different hands, but every one felt the benefit of the quickened life; and the revival had really beoun As for the Church, there was something on both sides. On the one hand the sale of some of the colonial churches was reported; also the confiscation of few and the decay of others. Then the removal of our people by the hundreds, and even thousands, yearly was still taking place. They were scattering north, east, south and west. The breaking up of our county principalities and the growth of the cities was, to a great extent and as a matter of course, changing our parish organizations. An enormous decline in land values and radical changes in our system of labor were so universal as to deprive the clergy even of their means of livelihood. On the other side was the loyalty of the people to their convictions and their steadfastness and affection for the Church; their willing self-sacrifice; their unselfish care for family and friends, and added to this was the interest of those outside our parishes and outside the State in restorations of all kinds—churches, houses, parishes and all this was still going on when your present Bishop came to the diocese in the year aforesaid, 1897; and fully one-half the people in this State, if told that materially a complete recovery of civic prosperity, as measured by money, had been made since 1861 would not have been able to believe it possible.

Realizing its truth, some of us are not hopeless of the recovery within a calculable period of devastated France, Poland, Serbia and Belgium. But the state of things I have tried to depict brings us face to face to the contrast which appears when we look around us to-day. In the State we can point to our new educational institutions, our growing cities, our development of minerals, the growth and increased number of our banks, our new or restored country houses, our important farms and improved farming, and many things of a like kind.

Nor is the present condition of affairs less bright in the Church than in the State. To the clergy list we have added about twenty, making a hundred or a little more for several years past, the number varying a little in different years. About forty churches have been built or rebuilt. We have gotten control of our own territory, which for many years had been invaded from both sides of the diocese. We have been filling fields which had been long without ministration, and with the thirteen men at the Seminary and a promise of more, we should be able to do active missionary work in the near future. Some of this work we hope to construct on new models and some on those old and well tried. Our chief difficulty is in the salaries—the inadequate salaries—of the clergy in country parishes and small towns. The average has greatly advanced, but there are a few clergymen still who, with a rectory, have less

than \$1,000.00; while outside of this diocese these same men have from \$1,-200.00 to \$1,400.00 with houses quite equal to ours. When the prices of the necessities of life are as high as they are now we cannot expect the affection and respect accorded among us to earnest Christian ministers to take the place in their estimation of an amount of money sufficient to keep them out of debt. It often happens that ministers' wives might successfully occupy chairs in the best schools as professors of household economics, but the discipline which has trained their minds and habits marks both person and character so deeply and so indelibly that other proof of the cruelty with which it has been exercised is quite unnecessary.

I have spoken in a previous address of the necessity of strengthening our position as a Diocese. Let me repeat my formula for describing the relations between our different grades of organizations, namely: Strong Christian men and women make a strong church or congregation; strong churches make a strong diocese; strong dioceses make a strong national church. As we learn, then, to be careful in criticism of persons we should learn also to be both careful and discriminating in criticising parishes, dioceses and other forms of church life which elicit enthusiasm to such an extent that they threaten absorption of interest. Intense love of the parish and Diocese are only dangerous when they become unreasonable. A good motto in this case is one which is applicable in many others: "Ne quid nimis"—in all that you do, keep moderation in view. Let sympathies expand; they will contract fast enough as physical strength wanes.

Now in this Council we all know about the parish. At least to this extent: It must be a unit in certain essentials. Our difficulty just at present lies in the relation of parishes and clergy to the Diocese. As it is absolutely necessary to unify parishes, so is it necessary to unify the Diocese. The General Convention of the Church has seen this and at its last meeting in St. Louis made a beginning towards the accomplishment of this unity in the passage of the 50th Canon of the present Digest. That Canon and the 49th Canon which precedes it are our law on this subject. The General Convention is our Convention. To this Convention we send deputies; in both Houses we were represented; our representatives doubtless voted for the 50th Canon. I have heard of no protest against it, and the passage of the Canon was an agreement made on our part with all the other Dioceses of the Church in this country. The subject of that 50th Canon was Church Finance, but perhaps I had better run over its chief points in case there should be any persons who have not seen it. In the first place, January 1st is the beginning of our fiscal year, and the Canon went into effect January 1, 1917. In the second place, under this Canon all church organizations, large and small, must have their accounts audited. If their income is over \$3,000.00, the audit must be made by a certified public accountant. If less than \$3,000.00, it may be made by a competent bookkeeper. In either case it must be made by one who has no connection with the subject matter. In the third place, the Diocese must choose a Finance Committee yearly. The duties of this Committee are specified

and are very clear. They are also very large. I had in my mind another plan to accomplish the same objects, but this plan of the General Convention is now ours and must be fully tried before anything else is entertained even for the purpose of supplementing it. Let us take hold of the business promptly, cheerfully and efficiently. It seems the Finance Committee ought to be larger than the one we have at present. There are many churches and much to be done in the way of supervision, and some adjustment must be made in our existing methods.

Now about the Church Pension Fund. Two methods are proposed for using the proceeds and interest on our invested fund for Widows and Orphans and Disabled Clergy. One is to call on each church and church institution for a premium of 7½ per cent. of the salary paid to its minister by that church; the interest of the invested funds in that case to be used for the help of the church which cannot pay its full amount. The other method is to keep in motion all machinery we are now employing, namely, interest on investments and collections for the Widows' and Orphans' and Disabled Clergy Funds, with the hope that by these means we may pay all which the Diocese as such will owe. These are the two plans. In the first case, the larger churches will pay much less than they pay now. In the second case, the larger churches will help the smaller ones, and especially the tiny ones, very much in the same way that the Diocesan Missionary Society helps these same churches in another field. In the first case, the Church Pension Fund Committee of the Diocese will look to each parish and mission for 7½ per cent. of the amount it pays its minister. In the second case, that Committee will calculate approximately what the interest on investments and the collections will bring, will gather up these amounts, and will call upon delinquent parishes for the balance necessary to bring them up to the aforesaid 7½ per cent., which will leave a very small sum to be paid by each of the churches. But note I am saying this chiefly for your information. The Church Pension Fund in New York may make some regulation which will shut us up to one or the other of these plans. Their final word has not yet come to us. There are questions and calculations which they call actuarial. I would by no means venture to follow these unless they were laid before me in very plain, distinct form, and that has to be done by expert insurance accountants.

A third plan comes to us from the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. It is in the form of a request from that Committee to the Pension Fund Committee of the Diocese to give them the interest on the invested funds to pay 7½ per cent. on their appropriations to salaries. This would be most unwise, and I hope it will not be entertained. Should collections fail, we would have nothing with which to help out weak parishes and missions. Yet we have groups of churches at this moment where the stronger churches are separating themselves from the weaker ones. We cannot afford to let our mission work flag in any part of the Diocese.

It is proper for me to say that when as a member of the Committee of the

General Convention I pledged the Diocese to the Church Pension Fund, I did so in reliance on the second method here mentioned.

The circumstances in which we find ourselves placed by the great war in which we have become involved call upon us for thought and prayer. Yes, indeed, they do. But call upon us also in trumpet tones for action. This trouble of the world has been foreseen for at least fifty years. As I remember perfectly well "the spark in the Balkans" was prophesied years ago as the precise agency which was to set that part of the world on fire and so the rest. The thing has been done. It was a wild, reckless, unadvised and almost, I would say, insane state of mind which brought on a war so unexpected by most of the nations who are now wrapped in its terrible folds. There was treachery in the preparation for it; there was the most selfish ambition in its purposes: there has been a cruelty in its methods which dwarf the nameless horrors of the sack of Rome. It seems to me that as a Diocese and as individuals each one of us must find out what it is his duty to do and what duty he can do to the best advantage, and do it with all his might. The results are not in our hands, but we are bound to make our efforts as effective for securing the triumph of justice and the impossibility of renewed criminality as it is within our power to make them. As a Diocese and as a Council we can doubtless, and I think with perfect propriety, pass a resolution of strong support of the President in the stand which he has taken to defend the citizens of this country and a resolution which shall fully recognize the value to us and to the world of complete victory of the Allies. I should be glad if we could express our deep and profound sympathy for the Armenians, Serbians, Belgians and any other people who have been treated in anything like the same way. Any other things necessary to enter into the said resolution I am perfectly willing to leave to the committee appointed. I recommend a committee of clergymen and laymen.

The question has arisen as to the military services of the clergy of the Church. After writing to several people and getting opinions from them and exchanging views with others, I have come to these conclusions. In 1865 the General Convention passed what was called a Declaratory Resolution, stating that in the judgment of that Convention it was improper for a clergyman to bear arms. That resolution stood at the end of the Canons until after the General Convention of 1910; but from the Journals of 1913-1916 it was omitted. The Secretary of the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies writes me that it was omitted because it was thought to have made the Church acquainted with what was the opinion at that time. He also said that it had not and had never had the force of law. It simply stated, I should say, the mind of that Convention, which, of course, expressed the mind of a great many people in the Church and had a strong educational effect on all; but since it is not a law we have the liberty of taking other advice, and a letter from Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts, in answer to one of mine, tells me he has been investigating this subject and that the commission he has appointed has determined under all the circumstances to leave the whole matter in his hands.

A decision like this allows any man who receives the Bishop's permission to follow his conscience and to go into the army in any capacity which he may select. It seems to me a good solution of the question that every man, after taking the advice of his own Bishop, do as he thinks right. Some of our new men are doubtful about being ordained for fear they may prefer after a while to take training as officers. I have expressed to them my preference that they should be ordained. Temptations are great for every member of an army in the field, and I know of scarcely anything which will break their force more thoroughly than the consciousness that the man is under obligations imposed by ordination to the diaconate or priesthood. In my company in the Army of Northern Virginia there were men who were ministers of the Church, licentiates of different churches, and a considerable number of students for the ministry. The presence of these men and their consistent lives made the company one of the most delightful bodies of men to associate with and work with that can be imagined. When I think of the war in which we are now engaged, it seems to me that more and more we can see in it the hand of Providence. The result of the war of 1861-1865 in this country was to get rid of what many of us greatly deprecated, the institution of slavery; and as a consequence to begin a process of unification in this country which was never known before. That process is not yet quite completed, but it will be completed when this war is over, and we can thank God for it. The present war is distinctly, as it seems to me, a contest of evil against comparative innounce unsuspecting innocence; and it is moreover an attack upon the austrace principles of good, such as the world has never seen, not even in the case of Napoleon Bonaparte. The results nobody can accurately predict, but with the triumph of the Allied forces and the consequent efforts to establish justice and peace on a firm basis, I believe those results will be as great as the war itself has been terrible. May we and all the people engaged fight the good fight of faith and in so doing realize at least to some extent the promise implied in the words of St. Paul to Timothy: "Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life."

I pass to the mention of those clergymen who have died during the past year.

REV. ROBERT J. McBryde, D. D.

Dr. McBryde was a South Carolinian by birth, but spent almost his whole ministerial life in this State. Notwithstanding a delicate constitution, his life was a rarely fruitful one.

In Amherst county, in Lexington, at the University of Virginia, and during two periods in Fredericksburg, he filled important points and blessed them with the light of the pure gospel of Jesus Christ. His influence over young men and boys was extensive and wholesome. His candidates for the ministry were well guided. His preaching was attractive and his life thoroughly agreeable thereto. His pastoral work was tender and sympathetic.

He passed to the realm of health and happiness on September 6, 1916, and

was buried in Richmond, to which place he was brought from Rockbridge county.

We can truly say of him as was said of Barnabas: "He was a good man and full of the Holy Ghost."

REV. W. B. WILLIAMS.

Mr. Williams entered the ministry late in life. As a member of St. Mark's Church, then under the wonderfully successful ministry of the Rev. T. G. Dashiell, he felt that he was needed in his own parish. He could aid a burdened rector and give comfort and instruction to many in need of both. He therefore took Orders and did faithfully the work of a deacon until disabled by the infirmities of advanced age.

He died on January 23, 1917, at the age of ninety-two, having done good and useful work in Henrico, Goochland and New Kent counties, as well as in Richmond.

A quiet, steadfast, unostentatious Christian man, he went to his reward 'having the testimony of a good conscience, in the confidence of a certain faith, and in the comfort of a reasonable religious and holy hope."

REV. ANDREW G. GRINNAN.

Rev. Andrew Grinnan died March 11, 1917. His praise is in every church of which he was rector. He not only did his work in the ministry of the Gospel, but he did more than he ought to have done. His life, so many think, was shortened by his labors.

In preaching and in the work of a pastor he was instant in season and out of season; out of season simply because of his health, because his constitution was not as robust as his spirit.

In Charlottesville, Weston, W. Va., Haymarket, Falls Church and Herndon his record is that of a devoted, industrious, God-fearing and man-loving clergyman of the Church who highly esteemed the work to which he was called in the world and who was himself in consequence highly esteemed.

May his influence, "influence which alone is eternal among human activities," lead many to the adoption of his view and practice of the sacred ministry.

BISHOP PETERKIN.

As a general thing we confine ourselves in our notices of the dead at our Annual Councils to the mention of those of the clergy who during the past year have been taken from our very midst, but I cannot let this occasion pass without at least a brief tribute to one whose interest in the Diocese was unfailing.

The Right Rev. George W. Peterkin, D. D., LL. D., was brought up in Richmond, attended the University of Virginia, and entered the Army of Northern Virginia in a Virginia regiment. His ministerial work in Virginia

was confined to a short assistantship to his father, Dr. Joshua Peterkin, and a rectorship of a few years in Culpeper. But though the skies under which he lived might change, his mind as a Virginian changed not. He thoroughly enjoyed Baltimore, he devoted without the slightest reserve the best years of his life to West Virginia; but Virginia was to him as a mother. In this State his work in convocation showed the qualities which proclaimed him the man to lay the foundations of a new Diocese. But in the church at large it is his work as Bishop which has given him the distinguished place he holds.

It would be out of the question for me to tell here the story of his Episcopal labors even as I know it, nor is it necessary. But it is altogether in keeping with this place and the relations I bore to him to lay a modest wreath of honor and affection on his grave.

His father used to say of him, "George can endure hardness as a good soldier," and his whole life proved the truth of the encomium. He breathed throughout his career the spirit of a soldier. Ready, cheerful, patient, just, considerate and generous, he was a man to be sought as a comrade and followed with pride.

For difficult tasks he was a favorite selection in the House of Bishops, and those tasks were always accomplished wisely and well.

Upon his record in West Virginia that Diocese will always look with admiration, and future generations will wonder how so much was done for the Church of God in that new State in the brief term of a lifetime.

The Rev. W. R. Mason moved that the Secretary call the roll of members of the Council to give opportunity to make pledges towards the \$500.00 for Bibles for our soldiers. The motion was carried.

The Secretary called the roll of Lay Delegates, and the \$500.00 sought was promptly pledged by them.

On motion of Judge Scott, the amounts pledged to this fund were ordered to be paid to the Treasurer of the Council.

The Rev. Berryman Green, D. D., chairman of the committee appointed to consider that part of the Bishop's address relating to the war, presented the following report:

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE COUNCIL OF VIR-GINIA APPOINTED TO TAKE INTO CONSIDERATION THAT PART OF THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS WITH REFERENCE TO THE GREAT WAR NOW RAGING.

Resolved, in accordance with the suggestions contained in the Bishop's address by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia assembled in the city of Fredericksburg, whose history is associated with the heroic deeds of American soldiers and sailors, many of whom were faithful sons of the Church;

- 1. That, whereas in the all wise and inscrutable providence of Airaignty God, the United States have been compelled to engage in war for the maintenance of the national honor, the protection of the lives of its citizens on the high seas, and the civilization and liberty of mankind; now, therefore, it is the sense of this Council that it put on record its profound expression of sympathy for the Armenians, Serbians, Belgians, Poles and other peoples who have been trodden down under the heel of injustice and oppression, as well as to express its deliberate conviction that the cause for which they suffered and for which the Allies are so gloriously contending is the cause of our Church, our country, and of mankind.
- 2. That it is the sense of this Council that the action of our government, headed by its great President, in standing forth to meet the aggression above described, is in accordance with the laws of God and of His Church; and we hereby tender to the President our great appreciation of his work, and of the value to the world of his labor to effect a complete victory for the Allies.
- 3. That as our government has designated the 5th day of June, 1917, for the enrollment of all men in the United States between the ages of 21 and 30 to meet the aggression above mentioned, it is the duty and privilege of the

Church to advise and give comfort especially to those who are in doubt and ignorance of their duty in the present crisis, no less than to look after the sons and daughters of the Church after they have been enrolled and have entered into training camps or other service of their country.

Be it further resolved, that it is the duty of all to do their best and to do it with all their might, so as to render to the country every service possible. And to that end the clergy of the Diocese are requested to preach on the Sunday preceding the 5th day of June upon this subject, so as to encourage and inform all who may be in doubt or ignorance as to their duty or as to their country's claim.

4. That it therefore appeal to every member of this Church to support the government so that victory may crown its efforts, that peace and happiness, truth and justice, religion and piety may be established throughout all generations.

These resolutions were adopted unanimously by the Council by a rising vote. The Secretary of the Council was on motion instructed to send copies of the resolutions to the President of the United States, the Governor of this State, and to all clergymen in the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE COMMISSION.

To the 122nd Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

As the introduction to this, its annual report to the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, the Social Service Commission desires to call the attention of the delegates present to the letter which the Commission sent out to all ministers in the Diocese in February. In that letter the Commission set forth concretely and clearly certain opportunities for definite service which lie within the reach of the leaders of our Virginia churches. It pointed out how the congregations might co-operate with existing agencies in Virginia for the promotion of public health, the strengthening of the schools, and the safeguarding or morals. Particularly also the Commission asked that the ministers in virginia of parishes would let the Commission know whether they could organize in

their parishes local committees with whom the Commission might be in touch, and by whom men and women of good will might be organized for community service. Thus far the Commission has received replies from only three men.

The Commission is well aware of the great pressure of work under which many of our ministers labor, and it knows how easy it is to put aside for indefinite future reference letters that suggest the organization of some new enterprise. But we feel that the sort of work which the Commission's letter sought to stimulate would be of real help and inspiration in our different parishes and would strengthen the happy ministry of all those men who could set it on foct. Therefore we earnestly call attention to that letter—additional copies of which can be secured from the Secretary of the Commission—and we ask that our ministers will think this matter through and send us their answer as to the feasibility of organizing local committees.

To this Council, meeting in this great and solemn hour of the nation's destiny, the Commission begs leave to present certain definite resolutions.

The truth is being emphasized from many quarters that the outcome of the struggle in which America is now engaged depends not only upon the men who shall be under arms, but also upon the industry and the self-sacrificing earnestness of men and women in every rank who may help increase the nation's resources of every kind.

Among the steps taken by the Governor to prepare this Commonwealth to bear her share of the burden of carrying the war to a successful conclusion, none is of greater importance than the creation of the Virginia Agricultural Council of Safety, whose purpose is to co-ordinate the efforts of all the State agricultural and educational agencies in a definite program for the production, conservation, economic use and distribution of food supplies in Virginia.

There can be no doubt of the pressing importance of the work the Council is called upon to do. The country's need in this respect affords a great opportunity to the Church for patriotic service. The ministers, especially those in rural parishes, can contribute much towards carrying out promptly and effectively the purpose of the Council. Your Commission has already learned with approving interest of the co-operation of some of the clergy of the Diocese with this movement. From what we can learn, they have not only availed themselves of their own pulpits, but have sought opportunity outside to bring to all classes of people, both white and colored, the supreme importance of a prompt and hearty compliance with the recommendations of the Council. We trust that their example will be followed by all the clergy of the Diocese, and to this end we recommend the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, that this Council heartily endorse the work of the Virginia Agricultural Council of Safety, and urges all its members, especially the clergy, to put themselves immediately in touch with this movement, and to do all they can to further its object. Your Commission begs leave to suggest two ways by which this resolution may be put into operation:

First: Encourage the organization of county and district councils to cooperate with the State Council. Secondly: Through addresses and the use of your local newspaper inform people of the motives which compelled our country to take a part in the great world conflict and the grave consequences involved, and insist upon the necessity of a greater production of food, its conservation and fair distribution.

Mr. B. C. Moomaw, Jr., Richmond, Va., Secretary of the Virginia Agricultural Council of Safety, will gladly supply free of charge facts bearing on present conditions and suggestions as to ways and means of meeting the need.

2. We recognize the call upon America to-day for unprecedented generosity for war relief at home and continuing help for the stricken countries abroad. Because to this country much has been given, of her shall much be required. The Commission asks the Council, therefore, to pass this resolution, and commend it earnestly to the attention of the clergy and the people.

Resolved, that the Council urge the rector of every parish in the Diocese, and in the lack of a rector the senior warden, to inform the people of his parish of the causes to-day which call for aid in money or service from Christian people for war relief; and help to organize his parish or people for such aid or show them how they may co-operate with existing organizations.

The Joint Commission on Social Service for the whole Church has issued an admirable pamphlet, explaining in detail just what part America has previously played in war relief and how small even her utmost gifts have been in comparison with those of some of the warring nations, what the needs are for increased giving to-day, and exactly what the ways are in which help can be given most effectively. Copies of this pamphlet will be distributed at the Council, and additional copies may be secured upon request to the Joint Commission on Social Service, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City.

3. Finally, the Commission desires that this Council go on record as throwing the whole of its moral force in favor of those measures which the Commission believes are needed to promote the economic efficiency and moral soundness of the nation in this time of stress. The Commission recognizes with gladness the declared intention of the military authorities to protect the mobilization camps from evil influences, and we urge the utmost readiness on the part of all local authorities for co-operation with this purpose. Similarly the Commission approves the great and growing sentiment for nation-wide prohibition during the war. It asks, therefore, that the Council pass this resolution.

Resolved, that the Council endorse what is understood to be the purpose of the National Council of Defense and the Secretary of War to safeguard by military regulations the mobilization and other military camps from liquor and vice; and, furthermore, in the light of the truth of the President's words that this is a war in which the forces of the whole nation must be mobilized and kept efficient for service, we urge, both on moral and economic grounds. the enactment of legislation which shall prohibit the manufacture and saie of intoxicating liquor in the United States during this war.

Fredericksburg, Va., May 23, 1917.

To the President and Council of the Diocese of Virginia. Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Finance begs to make the following report:

The accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer, Mr. R. Carter Beverley, for the year ending April 30, 1917, have been examined and found correct, and the accounts are herewith submitted as a part of this report.

The assessment for the year 1916-1917 was \$11,462.25, the receipts from the same to the end of the fiscal year (April 30, 1917) were \$10,634.25, being \$828.00 less than the assessment.

The disbursements for the same time were \$10,992.01, or \$357.76 more than the receipts for that period. This difference (\$357.76) was about provided for by the receipt of \$208.45 of deficits for the year 1915-1916 collected in 1916-1917, and by \$145.20 interest on balances in bank, all of which is stated in the Treasurer's account, which shows a balance on hand May 1, 1916, of \$851.17, of which \$847.06 is carried forward to the year 1917-1918.

The difference in the receipts and disbursements for the past year would have been considerably more but for the material reduction in the estimated expenses of delegates to the General Convention, due to the hospitality of the good people of St. Louis and to the fact that three of the delegates have made no charge so far for their expenses.

The disbursements, \$10,992.01, were entirely for the expenses of the Diocese and do not include the recommended appropriation of \$100.00 to the Social Service Commission, which if paid will reduce the balance brought over to 1917-1918 to \$747.06.

With the deficits of the past two years of \$830.94 in 1915-1916 and \$828.00 in 1916-1917 and the sad and serious outlook for the future because of the world-wide war, causing our national and individual resources to be so largely taxed and reduced, your Committee urges the most careful distribution of the income from this fund and strict confinement of payments to only the legitimate expenses of the Diocese, for which alone these assessments are made

With this year we begin the payment of the increased salary of our Bishop Coadjutor, which with all the other items of the "Estimated Disbursements," must be met. This will require the very best efforts of each and every parish.

We herewith submit as a part of this report the "Estimated Disbursements" of the Diocese for the year May 1, 1918, to April 30, 1919, amounting to \$12,765.00, together with the new Schedule of Assessment for the same year. We have increased the assessment for 1918-1919 to meet the premiums on Pension Fund or our Bishops' salaries.

Your Committee recommends the payment of the usual salaries and other

ordinary expenses of the Diocese, as indicated in the estimate herewith submitted with the Treasurer's report.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the State of the Church begs leave to make the following report:

The Committee notes, first of all, that the Council meets this year in the midst of the twentieth year of Bishop Gibson's Episcopate. With thankfulness to God we call to mind the splendid progress that the Diocese has made under the Bishop's wise and faithful administration. We bespeak for him the affectionate loyalty of the clergy and laity of the Diocese and offer our prayer that he may be spared for years to come to serve as our chief pastor in the ministry of Christ.

Your Committee is glad to be able to announce that the two Bishops have confirmed during the current year 1,090 persons, being seven more than the

number reported last year, which established a new record for the Diocese. The reports of the various diocesan treasurers indicate that four apportionments-Diocesan Missions, Disabled Clergy, Education Society and General Clergy Relief—were overpaid by larger or smaller amounts, and four, the Contingent Fund, Bible and Prayer Book Society, Widows' and Orphans,' and Diocesan Board of Religious Education, failed of being paid in full. The Contingent Fund lacked \$1,487.75 of receiving the full amount assessed, which is twice as large a deficit as last year. As the assessment for the Contingent Fund represents not a benevolent contribution, but an obligation that the Diocese has assumed, we feel that this deficit is especially to be deprecated.

In connection with the financial statistics for the year, your Committee notes with pride the contribution of \$150,000.00 which the Diocese has made in cash and pledges to the Church Pension Fund. This generous response on the part of our people to a great cause reveals their capacity and willingness to do big things when their imagination is sufficiently stirred.

The report of the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society shows that there are from twenty to twenty-five vacant parishes in the Diocese. While this statement is discouraging upon any analysis, there are several factors which may be noted as to some extent alleviating the seriousness of the situation. In the first place, the Bishop reports that he has thirteen men at the Theological Seminary, an unusually large number for the Diocese. In the second place, your Committee would call attention to the automobile as a potent factor in reducing vacancies. 
 If every rural parish were equipped with an automobile as an accessory to the rectory, not only would one clergyman be able to cover twice as much ground as formerly, but also the expansion of the field would tend to hold the worker to the country parish as furnishing an adequate scope for his ambitions and energies.

Your Committee would call attention to that portion of the Bishop's address dealing with the 50th Canon, which was passed at the last meeting of the General Convention in St. Louis. We recommend the appointment of a committee to adjust the financial affairs of the various parishes to the provisions of the aforesaid Canon.

Your Committee approves heartily the recommendation of the Bishop in connection with the Church Pension Fund, to the effect that we keep in motion all the machinery which we are now employing, namely, interest on investments and collections for the Widows' and Orphans' and Disabled Clergy Funds, with the hope that by those means we may pay all that the Diocese no doubt will owe, without looking to each parish and mission for  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of the amount it pays its minister.

In conclusion, the Committee would direct the attention of the Council to the problems which confront the Diocese and the Church as a whole in the face of the national emergency and the world war. In the first place, we note the counsel of the Bishop as to the military service of the clergy of the Church, namely, that the clergyman who receives the Bishop's permission may, without violating any law of the Church, follow his conscience and go into the army

in any capacity which he may select. In view of the fact that the red-blooded young manhood of our nation will be leaving the home parishes to do patriotic service in the army and navy, the Church must turn her eyes and her feet to camp and trench to minister to these men in this supreme hour of testing. As an aid to meeting the situation we would recommend the appointment of a Diocesan Commission, which should be charged with the following duties: To assist the clergy who volunteer in obtaining chaplaincies or other appointments to national service; to make provision for supplying the parishes during the vacancies thus temporarily created; and to mobilize the resources of the Diocese for the necessary equipment of our own clergy who are appointed to chaplaincies.

In the second place, we would emphasize the note which was sounded at the recent meeting of the Federated Council of Churches, namely, that the war, no matter how long it may last, is a temporary episode in the life of humanity, but that the mission of the Church is permanent. It behooves the Church in America, then, to see to it that the missionary and construction work which has been inaugurated at home and abroad shall in no way be suspended for the period of the war. To relax the hold that the Church has established in domestic and foreign fields would be to defer the day of peace rather than to bring it near. For our encouragement in meeting this problem we may look to the splendid example of the American Church in the Civil War, and of the English Church in this present conflict. While, on the one side, the Church sends forth her sons to war with the enemies of righteousness, she must, on the other side, continue to promote her positive forces for righteousness, which can alone assure the abiding peace.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Missions, having examined the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Treasurer of the Bible and Prayer Book Society, the Treasurer of the Fund for Women's Work and the Report of the Archdeacon of Colored Work, beg leave to submit the following:

The Diocesan Missionary Society received during the year \$27,367.13 and disbursed \$19,958.20. This is nearly \$1,700.00 more than was received last year and shows increased interest in the missionary work of the Diocese.

The Bible and Prayer Book Society received during the year \$360.97 and disbursed \$218.74, leaving a balance of \$142.23. This Society starts the year with a balance in excess of \$50.00 more than last year.

Owing to the fact that large and urgent calls are likely to be made upon us by our own young men who are being called to the colors, this Society should receive greater consideration and help than heretofore. These calls should by all means be met by our own Church organizations rather than by an organization to which our young men are not definitely attached.

The Fund for Woman's Work shows a slight falling off in receipts of this year over last. This condition is partly explained by the fact that in some of the fields there is a dearth of members, and funds which would not only have been forthcoming, but are actually in hand for that work have not been utilized became there has been no worker to receive it. With the increased cost of living it will be necessary to increase the wages of these workers.

The Report of the Archdeacon of the Colored Work shows that \$1,362.38 was received during the year and that \$825.10 was disbursed, leaving a balance of \$537.28. The balance on hand May 1, 1916, being \$519.33, the colored work has only a very small increased balance to show. This is more than offset by the fact that there has been considerable increase in property and equipment. Two new churches have been erected and five new stations opened, every colored priest making at least one new venture of faith in connection with his work. While this shows splendid progress and is evidence of the enthusiastic zeal of the Archdeacon and those working under his immediate supervision, we recognize that this branch of the Church's mission is pitifully weak and cries aloud for a proper solution.

Your Committee would urge every member of the Church to establish a cordial and sympathetic interest in the spiritual aspirations of the colored

people with whom they are associated. There should be much greater enthusiasm shown in definite, practical ways towards the work among the colored people by both clergy and laity.

In passing we learn with real distress that the Archdeacon of the Colored Work in the Diocese of Southern Virginia is considering a call to become Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Arkansas. It would be a very real loss to the whole State to lose the influence and work of the Principal of St. Paul's Normal and Industrial School, and the colored racial Episcopate would receive its first Bishop from the mother Church in Virginia.

The Rev. Dr. Phillips read the Report of the Committee on New Parishes, presenting the application of Whittle and Piedmont Parishes in Fauquier County that a certain part of Whittle Parish be added to Piedmont Parish, and recommending that, the law governing such cases having been complied with, the petition be granted. The petition is as follows:

Marshall, Va., February 21, 1917.

To the Bishop and Diocesan Council of Virginia:

The subscribers, C. M. Smith, representing Emmanuel Church, Piedmont Parish, Fauquier County, and John T. Ramey, representing Trinity Church, Whittle Parish, Marshall, Fauquier County, have been appointed a committee to petition the Diocesan Council to authorize the division of Whittle Parish in such manner as to place Trinity Church in Piedmont Parish.

These two churches, with Grace Church, The Plains, originally formed Piedmont Parish, but it was divided by the Diocesan Council of 1867, Grace and Trinity Churches forming Whittle Parish, and Emmanuel forming Piedmont Parish. It is desired now to restore Trinity Church to Piedmont Parish for the following reasons: there will be a more convenient arrangement of the church services; each church will have two morning and two afternoon services every month. The membership of Grace Church and of Whittle Chapel, a mission of Grace Church, has increased so much, numbering now more than 120 communicants, that the rector, the Rev. E. L. Woodward, M. D., thinks it advisable to devote his whole time to them. There are seventy-five communicants in Trinity and Emmanuel Churches; neither one can alone support a rector, but by uniting they will be able to pay a rector a salary of \$1,000.00 per year.

This division of Whittle Parish was proposed by Piedmont Parish and was agreed to by an unanimous vote of vestry and members of Trinity Church, and also of Grace Church, as evidenced by subjoined extract from minutes of vestry of Grace Church, and it is believed that it will be to the advantage of all three churches.

The proposed line of division is as follows: Beginning at the boundary line of Hamilton Parish on the Warrenton and Marshall road running via Belvoir but passing to the west of the village, thereby throwing the village into Whittle Parish; thence by the road to Brooks' Crossroads on the road from Marshall to The Plains; thence north, following the most direct roads to the boundary line of Meade Parish. All the territory of the present Whittle Parish lying west of this line to be incorporated into Piedmont Parish.

With the consent of the Bishap the Rev. Wilfred Everard Roach, M. A., has been elected rector of the proposed new parish, and since February 15th has been officiating at both Trinity and Emmanuel Churches.

We respectfully request the Council to act upon this petition favorably.

# REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN PENSION FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee has had two meetings. Letters have been addressed to all the clergy of the Diocese and to the Wardens of vacant parishes, asking for the salaries, stipends, grants, etc., which had to be furnished the Pension Fund Committee in New York.

Your Committee has obtained this information and has forwarded it to New York. We had hoped to receive from the New York Committee the amount of premiums to be apportioned to each parish before the Council met, but owing to the great amount of work which the Committee in New York has had to do, this information has not yet been received.

Your Committee feels that this is a critical time in connection with the system of the Church Pension Fund and hopes that the system may be inaugurated in this Diocese upon a strong and effective basis.

While the Church has responded most generously in raising the amount required, there must be now no relaxation of efforts on the part of every Parish and Mission to pay its assessment.

"The Church," says Bishop Lawrence, "as a whole in her General Convention and through her Diocesan Conventions has committed herself to it as a system, and as a system its safety and security hangs together. If any considerable number of parishes or missions drop out, it affects not only them and their rector or missionary, but it affects the strength of the whole system. There is, therefore, a mutual responsibility. The interest of the great body of the laity, shown by their gifts, should stimulate and give faith to timid vestrymen and parishes to realize that they can meet the pension

assessment in practically all cases if they will once resolve to do so." We believe that now is the time, when the system is being inaugurated, to do all in our power to have every parish and mission pay its assessment, and not let it be supposed that because the Diocese has gone into the system as a Diocese that it will take care of all the clergy, whether the parish or mission meets its assessment or not. There are many things to be adjusted and it will necessarily take a year or more to get the system working smoothly. We ask that every one, therefore, exercise patience and a willingness to co-operate in working out the various problems which must necessarily arise in the inauguration of such a system.

Your Committee has thought it best to apply the interest from the invested funds of the Disabled Clergy Fund and the Widows' and Orphans' Fund to pay the premiums on the salaries of those clergy who receive stipends from the Diocesan Missionary Society, in conformity with the request of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society as expressed in the following resolution:

"Resolved, that the Executive Committee request the Pension Fund Committee of this Diocese to apply as much as may be necessary of the income of the invested funds of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund to the payment in full of the assessments made by the Church Pension Fund against the Diocesan Missionary Society on account of appropriations made by the society toward the salaries of ministers in this Diocese."

If these funds were applied differently it would make it more difficult for the Apportionment Committee and in the end the result would be the same.

Each parish and mission will therefore pay an assessment of  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. as originally planned.

Your Committee asks that the wording of Canon X, Section 2, governing them be changed by striking out the words "from its members," so as to allow the Secretary and the Treasurer to be appointed outside of the members of the Committee.

The Committee on so much of the Bishop's address as referred to the financial system of the Diocese respectfully recommend as follows:

1. We recommend that the fiscal year of the Diocese shall begin with January 1st. To this end the following changes should be made in the Canons:

Canon VIII. Add a new section, to be numbered Section 1, the other sections to be renumbered accordingly, as follows:

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Diocese, and of each parish and congregation, shall begin January 1st.

In Section 2, line four, strike out the word "May" and insert "January."

In Section 3, line three, strike out the words "either quarterly or at the next annual Council," and insert "in full at the beginning of the fiscal year or quarterly in advance throughout the year." Omit the proviso at the end of Section 3 and insert it at the end of Section 2.

Canon IX. Section 2, line five, strike out the words "that Council year" and insert "the next fiscal year."

Section 3, line one, strike out "at the same time present" and insert "prepare."

Section 3, line eight and following, strike out "this schedule shall," etc., to the end of the section, and insert "This schedule shall be published and shall be sent to the minister or wardens of every parish or congregation before the first day of December following. The board shall receive and consider any protest that may be made by any rector or vestry in regard to their apportionment, provided the same be made before the beginning of the fiscal year; and their decision in the matter shall be final. The schedule, with any corrections thus made, shall be published in the Journal."

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CLERICAL SUPPORT.

Fredericksburg, Va., May 24, 1917

The Committee on Clerical Support submits the following:

Your Committee has received reports from ninety-five parishes and churches. The total amount paid to rectors in these ninety-five parishes and churches is \$105,000.00. Of this amount, \$13,404.00 was received from the Diocesan Missionary Society and other sources. Leaving the amount, \$91,596.00 paid by the parishes. Five parishes failed to pay the full amount pledged to their rector. Your Committee would emphasize the report of the committee appointed by the Bishop to estimate the comparative increase in the salaries of clergy and cost of living. It is their opinion that the increase

of salaries paid the clergy is not in keeping with the increased cost of living, and this Committee urges the vestries to bring these salaries into closer relationship to these changed conditions.

We recommend the following resolution; That it is the sense of the Council that the minimum salary for an unmarried elergyman should be \$900.00, and that of a married elergyman \$1,200.00, in addition to the rectory and Church Pension Fund provision, and that, in country parishes especially, the maintenance of a horse or car and the parish telephone be considered as a charge upon the parish.

Your Committee finds that several parishes have failed to make a report and some reports are incomplete, and they repeat the request that treasurers use greater care in the preparation of their reports.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COMPARATIVE INCREASE OF SALARIES OF CLERGY AND THE COST OF LIVING.

The following Committee appointed by the Bishop to investigate the comparative increase in the salaries and the cost of living for the last ten years among the clergy of the Diocese respectfully report that through the active assistance of the Rev. William Byrd Lee, Jr., they sent out a series of questions to every congregation. The object of the questions was to ascertain how much the salaries of the clergy had increased in the past decade, and how this increase compared with the cost of living for the same period.

The number of rectors from whom replies could have been received, by reason of the fact that the rectors were not engaged in work in three or four different parishes, was found to be seventy, and of these, sixty replies were received. Some of these replies were so vague that only fifty could be used for the purpose of comparison and tabulation. An examination of these fifty replies showed that the cost of living had on the average increased in the last decade, from 1906 to March 1, 1917, nearly 50 per cent., the exact figure being 49.4 per cent.

The replies as to the changes in salaries amounted to thirty-seven out of a possible seventy; that is to say that only 50 per cent. of the possible sources of information in this connection was heard from. Of these thirty-seven replies, two had received less than 10 per cent. increase; five had received between 10 and 25 per cent. increase; ten had received between 25 and 50 per cent. increase; three had received between 50 and 75 per cent. increase; seven had received 75 per cent. increase or more; ten reported no increase; one reported increase of 100 per cent.; one reported decrease of 20 per cent.

Your Committee will not attempt to draw any general conclusions from these figures further than to say that the Committee thinks it is highly desirable for both the lay and clerical delegates to know what these figures show. And your Committee feels that in view of the conditions shown by these tables a resolution should be adopted requesting each vestry, in consideration of the present cost of living in comparison with the salaries paid clergy, to use every effort possible for the purpose of bringing the salaries into closer relationship to the changed living conditions.

With this expression of our love and esteem for him as our leader and friend, we pray for God's blessings upon him and his home and for his continuance as our Bishop.

The year for General Missions does not end until October 30th. There was paid to April 30th upon this apportionment the sum of \$13,789.70.

The apportionment for General Missions for the year ending September 30, 1916, was overpaid by more than \$5,000.00.

While the total amount apportioned to the parishes of the Diocese was overpaid, three funds failed of receiving the full amounts asked for them, as follows:

The Virginia Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society, by \$35.58.

The Widows' and Orphans' Fund, by \$211.14.

The Diocesan Board of Religious Education, by \$82.50.

The Board recommended the adoption of a budget of apportionment for a period of eight months to January 1, 1918, instead of for a year of twelve months, the amounts apportioned to be in each case two-thirds of the amount estimated to be needed for one year. It recommended also that the Social Service Commission and the South Atlantic Agency of the American Bible Society be included in the budget as funds for which appropriation be made, the amounts for each fund to be as in the budget given below, and that furthermore the amount apportioned to the American Bible Society be not reported as a separate fund, but included with the Virginia Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society under one heading; payments on the combined apportionments to be made to the Treasurer of our Diocesan Society and divided by him pro-rata between the two

The Report of the Board of Apportionment was adopted. The Rev. C. W. Sydnor presented the following resolution: Resolved, that the Committee on Apportionment be asked to read before the Council at each annual meeting hereafter the list not only of all churches which have paid their total Diocesan apportionment, but also of those which have failed to pay the total amount, together with a statement of the proportion which the amount lacking in each case bears to the Church's total apportionment; and that at the same time there be read the names of the rector and lay delegates of each Church which has thus come short of the apportionment, in order that they may state to the Council if they so desire any particular reason why the apportionment could not or cannot be paid.

This resolution was, on motion, laid upon the table.

The Rev. B. D. Tucker, Jr., made a statement of the Summer School for Sunday School Workers to be held by the Diocesan Board of Religious Education at the University of Virginia June 11 to 15, 1917.

Shortened form of Evening Prayer was read by the Rev. B. D. Chambers. The Rev. W. R. Bowie, D. D., preached on "America's Duty in the War." An offering was taken for the Red Cross Society. The service was closed with prayer and benediction by Bishop Gibson.

FRIDAY, 10:00 A. M.

The Council convened, Bishop Gibson presiding. Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

Mr. Robert Beverley presented the following resolution, which was adopted.

Resolved, that a committee of three energetic laymen be appointed by the Bishop (or one from each Convocation, in his discretion) to assist the Treasurer of the Diocese in collecting the Contingent Fund in parishes that are de-

linquent, this committee to serve through the fiscal year and report to the next Council.

The Chair appointed on this committee Mr. Robert Beverley, Mr. E. I. Carruthers, Mr. John Goodridge.

The Rev. George P. Mayo presented the Report of the Blue Ridge Industrial School. (See Appendix A. VII.)

In connection therewith, Mr. Mayo offered the following resolution, which was adopted unanimously.

Whereas, the Blue Ridge Industrial School, located at Dyke, Green County, Va., has been chartered as a Church institution under the control of the Diocese of Virginia;

Resolved, that this Council approves this action and commends the school to the liberality of all church people, and requests the clergy of this Diocese to bear in mind its needs when appealing to their congregations and when distributing the offerings given to missionary and philanthropic work.

Mr. Mayo gave notice of the resignation of Professor James M. Page as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Blue Ridge Industrial School, and moved that Mr. T. E. Powers, Professor R. M. Bird and Mr. A. S. Bolling be nominated to the Board of Trustees as names from which they may elect a successor to Professor Page. This motion was carried.

Mr. James Caskie offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, that we record our grateful appreciation of the cordial welcome and gracious entertainment extended to the Council and each delegate by the rector, vestry and congregation of St. George's Church and the citizens of the historic and hospitable city of Fredericksburg.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CLERGY RELIEF.

Your Committee begs leave to report that we have examined the statements of the Treasurers of the Disabled Clergy Fund and the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and find them correct and sustained by proper vouchers.

The amount contributed for the Disabled Clergy Fund was \$2,503.65 as against \$2,511.03 contributed a year ago, being a decrease of \$7.38. The amount contributed for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund was \$2,218.86 ac against \$2,772.29 contributed a year ago, being a decrease of \$553.43. The decrease in both instances we believe to be due to confusion as to the time of the merging of those funds into the Church Pension Fund.

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Your Committee notes with sincere regret the resignation of Mr. Wm. H. Palmer, Treasurer of the Disabled Clergy Fund, after twenty-eight years of most faithful and efficient service, and are sure this resignation will be heard by the whole Council with the same sorrow.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE INCREASE OF THE MINISTRY.

Your Committee on the Increase of the Ministry begs leave to submit the following report:

In the nation's anticipated conflict, thoughts of young men, how and where they were to be obtained, filled the minds of the authorities at once. The need was made known. Volunteers came forward for non-commissioned officers' positions, so many of them that the training camps overflowed and only those were accepted who could be accommodated.

In the conflict of the light of the Gospel with the darkness of sin, of truth with error, the need for youths to train in ecclesiastical camps as officers is no less felt by the authorities. Some vestrymen of a vacant parish in Delaware once complained to the President of the Standing Committee over their inability to secure a rector. "I have been in this Diocese nineteen years," said

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this clergyman. "I have seen vacancies filled again and again here because other Dioceses provided more clergymen than they used. Is it not time she protected herself against loss by providing enough at least for her own use from her own youth?"

The duties of the clergy when known yield to none in satisfaction. The conflict in which these officers engage when understood arouses the highest ambitions. The privilege of helping human souls in their holiest aspirations yields to no earthly calling in interest. The rewards eternal in character-building inspire the most sacred enthusiasm.

The increase in candidates for Holy Orders will come through this appeal to the highest heroism of youthful hearts. It will become a fact as these have eternity so brought before them with the work of a clergyman, that they see their energies and enthusiasm will be expended, their time and strength will be so used, that the results will not be bounded like earthly effort by time and to-day. It will be more than earning a living, with its temptation to become a money-making machine. It will be work done for eternity.

Your Committee recommends that at least on the third Sunday in Advent the clergy preach on the ministerial calling and present it on its practical side, following up such sermons with personal work among boys in whom they see qualities developing necessary to a useful ministry. Also that they secure opportunities for presenting the claims of the ministry in institutions of learning for boys and men in reach of their parishes.

In the seriousness of the need, your Committee venture most respectfully to suggest that our reverend fathers in God and the faculty of our theological and other institutions endeavor to find or hear of youths among their acquaintances possibly possessing qualities fitting them when educated for helpful pastorates. Also that they invite these to the sincere consideration as Christian youths why they should not study for the ministry.

Your Committee ask from Christian parents conscientious efforts to let no absorbing business cares or Lord's Day laziness or sociability prevent them from making their dwellings, in family prayers and direct religious teaching of their children, in the fullest sense Christian homes. In this atmosphere will grow most naturally those who will go forth in manhood to lead the Lord's laity in dutiful service for His kingdom. From the lips of parents who love their Lord and His Church will come most naturally to their boys the earliest call to this life work, of all business the noblest, and in privilege the highest.

For a quarter of a century we have prayed in the Litany for the increase of the ministry. Your Committee offer the following resolutions:

1. That a simple, short, pointed, yet withal readable leaflet be prepared describing the life and work and need for clergymen.

2. That the cost of printing 1,000 copies be met from the fund for theological or religious education;

3. That copies be sent, with offer of more, to every clergyman and Sunday-school Superintendent in this Diocese, with earnest appeal to find opportunities to use them, or to send to the Chairman of this Committee the addresses of

Christian parents having sons over ten years of age to whom a copy may be sent

Brethren of this Council, your Committee appeals from a bad, wasteful, economic condition. We know to-day of several elergymen in the midst of the great need for men broken down through over work; some of them under threescore years of age. Why? Men are so few and stipends so meagre. These men yielded to the pressure to do two men's work and at the same time secure from a double field a reasonable support for their families—the pressure of, shall we say, holy ambition or sinful necessity? Answer that question by increased zeal to increase the number of candidates for Holy Orders.

Resolved, by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, that in consideration of the great increase in the cost of living with its relative decrease in the value of money, the vestries of the Diocese are requested to investigate the relationship in their respective parishes between the salaries paid and the demands upon the rector for maintenance; and wherever such salaries are inadequate the vestries are requested to make every effort to remedy such conditions.

Resolved, that this resolution be communicated to the vestries of the Diocese by circular letter by the Secretary of this Council, and the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society is also requested to consider the salaries now paid by it in relation to the demands upon the missionaries in the Diocesan field.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STUART HALL.

Stuart Hall, Staunton, Va., is the property of the Dioceses of Virginia and Southern Virginia—each Diocese owning one-half of it. The property con

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sists of five acres of land with handsome buildings, and is situated in the best residential part of the town. It has beautiful lawns and ample grounds for outdoor sports.

The school is governed by a Board of Trustees consisting of fourteen members, of whom seven are nominated by each Diocese. In the event of a vacancy the Council of the Diocese in which the vacancy occurs nominates two persons to the remaining trustees representing that Diocese by whom the vacancy is filled from the nominees. Thus each Diocese keeps its own membership full without any interference by the other.

The Board of Trustees at their annual meeting elects a Board of Directors, who attend to the affairs of the school in the absence of the Board of Trustees. To save expense and because they can always be in close touch with the school, the Board of Directors are generally selected from Staunton, though the Board of Trustees are untrammeled in their selection.

For seventy-four years this school has been affording education under Episcopal influences to young ladies, principally for the Southern States, and it is regarded as one of the best schools for girls in the South.

From its foundation until two years ago the policy of the trustees was to lease the property. Thus it was conducted successively by Dr. Phillips, Mrs. Stuart and Miss Duval as principals, who paid a stated rent, which usually paid the interest on the debt and for improvements. The trustees for many years were not satisfied with this mode of conducting the school, but wished it to be run in fact as well as in name a Diocesan school. The difficulty of doing so arose from the fact that there was a considerable debt upon the property and, moreover, all of the equipment belonged to the lessee. Thus matters stood at the close of the session of 1915, when Miss Duval's lease expired. The trustees then decided to elect a principal on a salary, purchase equipment and conduct the school as a Diocesan school. Miss Jane Colston Howard was elected principal, and during the last two sessions has conducted the school on behalf of the trustees. The attendance has been good, and the trustees feel that, considering the condition of the country since the change in management was made, their efforts have met with success. Owing to the necessity of paying interest on the debt and the high cost of living, however, the trustees have been greatly embarrassed, and they feel that if this property is to be saved to the Church and the school continue its good work, then the Dioceses of Virginia and Southern Virginia must come to its financial relief. Relieved of the debt, the school could take care of itself.

A fair statement of the financial situation is as follows:

The property is valued on the basis of a going school plant and would be much less if dismantled. During the two years that the trustees have conducted the school, in addition to bedding, china, etc., which has been purchased and paid for, they have paid on equipment \$5,662.59. The payment of these sums out of current revenue has caused a deficit which at the beginning of next session will probably amount to \$4,000.00, and cannot be spared from the current revenue of next session. In addition to this, a note on furniture, amounting to \$1,259.50, and one on pianos of \$1,170.45. These last two items are included in the indebtedness as given above.

At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees held on May 11, 1917, a resolution was passed asking the Diocese of Virginia to raise \$25,000.00 of the indebtedness, and the Diocese of Southern Virginia a like sum. It is not to be believed that the Church in these Dioceses will allow this school, after all these years of usefulness, to languish and die for the lack of the money to liquidate this debt.

Resolved, that this Council endorse the intention of the Board of Trustees of Stuart Hall to attempt to raise in the Diocese of Virginia \$25,000.00 for the financial strengthening of the school—a like amount to be raised in the Diocese of Southern Virginia—and it being understood that the trustees will create annual scholarships to the amount of 5 per cent. of the total gifts.

Resolved further, that this Council urge its members to spread among the people of Virginia information as to the character and standing of this Church school and the unusual advantages which it offers under the present management to girls at a tuition greatly below that of the average at schools in the country of a like grade.

Both resolutions were adopted.

Mr. John B. Minor reported for the Nominating Committee. nominating Mr. Oliver J. Sands, Mr. W. Meade Addison and Mr. J. Stewart Bryan as the Auxiliary Finance Commission. These gentlemen were thereupon elected by the Council.

The hour of 12:00 having arrived, the Chair bade the house to prayer for missions. Prayer was offered by the Rev. W. Roy Mason.

The Rev. Dr. Goodwin read the Report of St. Anne's School at Charlottesville. (See Appendix A. IX.)

Mr. E. I. Carruthers offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, that the Council having heard the report of the principal of St. Anne's School, cordially commend it to the support and patronage of our people.

The Rev. W. H. Burkhardt invited the Council to hold its meeting next year in St. James Church, Leesburg. The invitation was accepted.

Mr. Burkhardt presented the Report of the Committee on Administration of the Chalice, which was appointed at the last Council.

At a meeting of the Committee on the Proper Administration of the Communion Chalice held at the Seminary on February 8th, Rev. Mr. Burkhardt, Chairman, and Messrs. Wallis and Woodward were present, the Rev. Dr. Goodwin and Judge Scott, the other members of the Committee being unavoidably absent. After careful deliberation it was determined that the same conservative position taken by the Bishop in his Council address of 1914, and by the Council resolution of 1916, should be adhered to by the Committee and that Dr. Woodward, who was elected Secretary, should be entrusted with the embodying of the sense of the Committee in a form to be submitted for criticism to the other members of the Committee, and with such alterations as should be finally agreed upon, this should be submitted as the Committee's report to the next Council.

The Committee on the Proper Administration of the Communion Chalice begs leave to recommend the repassage with slight restatement of the resolution of the Council of 1916—

Resolved, that it is the sense of this Council that the attention of the clergy of the Diocese be directed to the proper cleansing of the Communion Chalice under all circumstances, and to the practice of administration by intinction for use in special cases, by permission of the Bishop, as being a practice approved by the report of the House of Bishops.

The Committee would supplement the proposed resolution by calling the attention of the clergy to the following methods of cleansing the Chalice which they believe to be approved in reverent use:

a. At the time of celebration: The wiping of the rim of the Chalice, slightly revolved as administered to successive communicants, with a purificator, which is special precaution, may be moistened in alcohol, according to the method described in the Bishop's address to the Council of 1914.

b. In the interval between celebrations: The scalding of the Chalice and the boiling of purificators, if the latter are to be used again.

The resolution in this report was adopted after being amended by striking out the words "and which does not impair the sacrament according to its original institution, and the order of the Church," which came after the words "House of Bishops," which amendment was accepted by the committee.

The Rev. J. F. Ribble read the Report of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education. (See Appendix A. X.) The report was received and its resolutions adopted. The main resolution is as follows:

Resolved by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia in session:

1. That in accordance with the recommendation of the General and Provincial Boards of Religious Education every clergyman in the Diocese of Virginia be urged to observe Education Week, beginning the twentieth Sunday after Trinity (October 21st), and that he be further urged to make a careful preparation for the most effective use of this week in arousing the members of his parish to a realization of the importance of religious education; also that the twenty-first Sunday after Trinity (October 28th), as recommended by the General and Provincial Boards of Religious Education, be observed as a Vocation Day, at which time special emphasis shall be given to the subject of the call to the ministry.

2. Be it further resolved, that the Council note with special gratification the successful inauguration of the Summer School for Sunday School Teachers at Charlottesville last summer and pledges its hearty sympathy and active co-operation for an even more successful and better patronized session to be held this summer at the University of Virginia June 11th to 14th, inclusive.

The Rev. Mr. Brydon presented by title the Reports of the Colonial Churches Commission and the Brotherhood of St Paul. (See Appendix A. XI and XII.)

These reports were received.

Col. E. C. Massie presented the report of Mr. David H. Brown. Secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Commission, and made further verbal report of the Commission's work. (For report of Mr. Brown, see Appendix A. XIII.)

The following resolution was presented and adopted:

Resolved, that the Council has heard with regret of the resignation of Mr. David H. Brown as Secretary of the Laymen's Movement Committee, whose efficient services have brought enlarged life to the parishes in which he has been able to labor, and assures him that its best wishes attend him in his new field of endeavor.

Resolved, that the Laymen's Movement Committee be continued with authority to prosecute the purposes of its organization and to employ a Field Secretary with such funds as it may be able to raise for that purpose.

III. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

To the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The report of the Treasurer of the Society for the year running from May 1, 1916, to April 30, 1917, will show that for the first time in the recent history of the Society we have been able to pass through the year without having to borrow money on call loans from the banks. This is the result mainly of the large balance on hand with which the year was started; and because some of the parishes paid part or all of their apportionments early in the year. A glance at the Treasurer's reports in the journals of recent years will show that in some years more than a hundred dollars has been paid out as interest on loans. And we feel that the passing of a year without debt is not only a saving of that amount, but a distinct step forward toward more business-like methods of carrying on the Master's work.

The number of parishes and congregations which paid the apportionment for Diocesan Missions in full is not quite as large as the number of last year. Of the 182 parishes and congregations to which apportionment was made, an even 100 paid it in full, or overpaid, as compared with 115 of last year; whereas thirty-three did not send in any offering at all for Diocesan Missions. These thirty-three include a number of very weak missions to which a nominal apportionment was made, and a number of vacant parishes; though there are also some churches on that list which might, it seems, have made at least an earnest effort to pay the apportionment. The aggregate of apportionment to

all these thirty-three congregations was only \$450.00, so the financial loss is not large; but the Diocese is distinctly the poorer for the lack of missionary earnestness and interest shown by their failure to give to the Church's work. The fact that a Church is without a minister might be argued in some cases as the reason for failure to pay anything on the apportionment were it not for the fact that twelve churches which have been without a minister for six months or more are on the list of those which paid in full.

The present number of missionaries on the roll of the Society is thirty-six, thirty-one white and five colored, and the amount of appropriations to these missionaries aggregates \$16,725.00. This is a much smaller number of missionaries upon our roll than usual, owing to the very large number of vacant parishes in the Diocese. There are twenty fields vacant at present to which appropriation is usually made by the Society. Of these, three are awaiting the coming of rectors who have accepted charge, leaving seventeen missionary fields still vacant. Three other parishes vacant in the Diocese makes the number of vacancies twenty, a full one-sixth of the number of ministers who are needed to do the work of our Diocese.

Two parishes, St. Paul's, Hanover County, and Abingdon, Gloucester County, have during the year given up the appropriations formerly made toward the support of their ministers and are now independent of missionary aid. These two appropriations amounted to \$175.00.

Increases of appropriation aggregate \$450.00 to five cures, of which \$400.00 was appropriated to four parishes for the purpose of augmenting salaries which were below the thousand dollar minimum.

New work to which appropriation has been made include an entirely new field which has been opened in the colored work by the establishment of the John Moncure Memorial Chapel in Stafford County, and the entire reorganization of the work among the deaf in the Diocese. In addition to making an appropriation toward the salary of the General Missionary to the Deaf of this and contiguous Dioceses, we are now employing a woman worker to minister to the deaf in the city of Richmond.

The work of the Diocesan Missionary Society reaches every part of the Diocese. The mountain work, the colored work, the helping of the weak parishes, the support of special forms of work like that among the deaf are all part of the fulfilment of the great purpose underlying the establishment and continuance of the Society. The Diocesan Missionary Society is the Diocese organized to work for the extension of the Master's kingdom through

his Church within our geographical bounds, and it is the one organization most vitally essential to our development and growth. The two Dioceses in Virginia have by far the largest and most widely extended rural work of any in the American Church. The reason for it lies in the fact of the Diocesan Missionary Society with its ninety odd years record of caring for the weak parishes of the State. One reads frequently enough most alarming statements of the deplorable condition of religion in rural districts in various parts of the United States. Statements, for instance, of the thousands of country churches which have been abandoned in the past ten years; of the tremendous loss of communicants. Those who know religious conditions in our own State and our Diocese know that we have suffered no such abandonment of churches or loss of church members as have been reported elsewhere. Our own Church has a larger number of communicants and more Church buildings in the country parishes to-day than it had ten years ago. There has been a net gain of twenty-three Sunday Schools and over a thousand scholars in the same period in our villages and the open country, a gain which was greater than that of all the city Sunday Schools in our Diocese combined. Who can fail to realize that the reason for this is the existence of the Diocesan Missionary Society? Without its fostering care of country parishes, the Church would be as hopelessly unknown in the country in Virginia as it is in the rural districts of some portions of the Middle West. What the effect has been upon the religious life of the State in general resulting from the maintenance of our churches in every county, our Heavenly Father alone knows; but no one can doubt that the effect has been great. We know well enough that the strength of the Church in the cities of our State in large measure, and of our strength in other cities adjacent to our Diocese in measure is due to the support which our Diocesan Missionary Society has given through all these years to the parishes in the country districts from which the population of the cities has been recruited. And from all our missionary parishes there has gone out through the years a stream of young men into the ministry who have gone far and wide throughout the Church, who have become our missionaries in the West and in foreign lands, or who have served as leaders and in the ranks of our Bishops. The establishment of the Diocesan Missionary Society and its support through the long years of its existence has been a gift by the Diocese to the Church at large which has brought forth rich fruitage, both within our bounds and to the farthest limit of the American Church.

The Society is doing a larger and more varied work to-day than ever before in its history. In the midst of the changing conditions of living of to-day and with ever-growing opportunities of advance and extension before us, we look with confidence to the Church in the Diocese for its abiding interest in our work.

## IV. REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON OF THE BLUE RIDGE.

Ivy Depot, Va., May 21, 1917.

My Dear Bishop:

The past year has been one of considerable development, so far as equipment is concerned. Buildings have been erected in almost every part of the field. In Mr. Tucker's field a chapel has been built at Forest Lodge, where the services had been held in a small public schoolhouse. Miss Mollie Maddox has been an active worker in this community for some years, and it is in a great measure due to her work among the people that this mission has been built up. The money was raised by Mr. Tucker through the help and co-operation of the young ladies of his congregation at the University of Virginia. The church will, D. V., be consecrated on Whitsunday.

(2) At the Mission of St. John the Baptist, a bungalow Mission House, for the two lady workers at this point has been built on a lot adjoining the Church at a cost of about \$2,000. The bulk of the money was given by friends of one of the workers, beginning with a gift of \$500. The building consists of a living room, club room for the boys, three bed rooms, a bath room and kitchen. There is also a stable at the back for the horse, which is a valuable assistant

to the workers.

- (3) In Mr. Mason's field (Mission Home) some building has also been done. A new schoolhouse is being put up on Frazier's Mountain from money collected by the Junior Auxiliary of Orange, Va. The former schoolhouse will be made into a chapel and reserved for Sunday School and religious services. This building was the second mission school erected by us in the Blue Ridge, and as the one at Simmons Gap is no longer used for Church purposes, the Frazier Mountain Chapel will be the oldest building of all, and is associated in the minds of the early workers with one of the most interesting services ever held in the mountains, when the first fruits of the Lost Mountain, twenty-three in all, received through you the laying on of hands. A clothing bureau has also been built by Mr. Mason at Simmons Gap.
- (3) At Lydia Mission a new and very attractive Mission house has been built to take the place of the one burned down a few years ago. This new house is a great improvement upon the old one and compares favorably with the best of the mission houses in the Archdeaconry.
- (4) A new mission has been opened up on Roche's Mountain during the past year, and Miss Carrie Makely, a former worker at Pocosan, has been teaching at this new point. This is the most remote of all our missions, and the people have been cut off from educational and religious opportunities, which we are now furnishing them.
- (5) Mr. Ellis, on the west side of the Blue Ridge, is developing his industries for the benefit of the people in his section, and the cannery which he started last summer has a good prospect for usefulness in the coming season.

My Dear Bishop:

The work among the colored people of this Diocese has, by our Father's blessing, continued steadily and prosperously during the past year, in spite of problems and difficulties which at two or three points have injured the present

The work among the colored people of this Diocese has, by our Father's blessing, continued steadily and prosperously during the past year, in spite of problems and difficulties which at two or three points have injured the present condition of the work. The exodus of the colored people from the State has for the time being crippled our work most seriously at one point. St. Mary's Memorial Church, Berryville, which was consecrated last September, and had at that time more than twenty communicants and an enrollment of thirty in the Sunday School, has seen its congregation scatter through the North until there are now left three active communicants and a Sunday School of six or eight. But this we trust will prove a temporary condition which will in time be overcome.

Five per mission points have been opened during the year one a new field

Five new mission points have been opened during the year, one a new field with minister in charge in Stafford County, centering at the new John Moncure Memorial Chapel, the others in connection with fields already in existence.

Every colored minister in the Diocese has, during the year, started services at a new mission point outside of his previous regular appointments. This is a record to be proud of.

In addition to the above, I have for the past several months been employing the services for Sunday work of two students at the Bishop Payne Divinity School in Petersburg. One has taken charge of the services at St. Philip's Church, Richmond, during the vacancy in the rectorship, and another has assisted the Rev. W. B. Lee, Jr., in his work at the two reform schools for colored boys and girls, both of which are located in his parish. The value of this work which Mr. Lee is doing cannot be over-estimated, reaching as it does boys and girls from every part of the State who have been committed to the schools. We plan to send an ordained man during the coming summer to assist Mr. Lee in this work.

The Colored Convocation, comprising the colored clergy in the Diocese, is to-day in a better organized condition than it has ever been. The recent meeting in Richmond manifested a growing realization of their own responsibility for the spread of the Church among their people which bodes well for the development of the work. Plans were adopted looking to the establishment of a Sunday School Institute to meet at the time of the annual Convocation, and for the establishment of a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in every congregation, with a resultant convocational organization which is hoped to be made effective by the meeting of 1918.

But while the colored church people themselves are reaching out to do better and larger work, we must impress the fact that the interest and cordial co-operation of our white ministers and church people is essentially necessary if the work among the colored people is to be done in any adequate way. Among the hundreds of thousands of colored people living within the bounds of the Diocese there are at present only twenty-three points where we are doing any work at all among them. This figure is an increase of twenty-five per cent. over last year; but after all, the actual figure is still twenty-three.

Surely there are opportunities to be found in every parish for starting a small work among the colored people, if only a Sunday School. Our work has never yet received the cordial co-operation and sympathy which its importance demands, and the responsibility is heavy upon us for the opportunities unseen and ignored which have lain around us. In almost every case the establishment of a new mission point, or a new field, must have its inception in the interest and active work of the minister or communicants of the white congregation, and our work can grow and develop only in measure as that interest and co-operation are given. We plead with our white ministers for that help. If it can be nothing more than the finding of an opportunity and then conferring with the Archdeacon as to the method of taking advantage of it, even that will be productive of much.

I append a report of the receipts and expenditures of the Fund for Colored Work for the past year. The increased amount of receipts during the year has permitted the adding of much needed equipment and the carrying on of missionary work which could not otherwise have been done.

#### VI. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

To the Right Rev. Robert A. Gibson, D. D., President ex-officio:

The Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Virginia begs to present the following report:

During the past year 24 new branches have been added to our roll. Of these, 6 are Woman's Auxiliary Branches, 5 Section B, 5 Junior, and 8 Little Helpers.

There are eight counties in the Diocese in which we are not organized, and we find that there are 118 churches and chapels in which we have no branch.

Since our last report there has been steady progress along all our lines of work. Our Educational Department has conducted sixty-eight mission study classes, besides numerous program meetings and reading circles. It has also arranged for the giving of missionary lectures and plays in various parishes, and the Educational Secretary has met the study class leaders in "the Piedmont" Convocation, in order to outline for them a course of lessons on The New World.

^{*}This does not include scattering colored communicants in white congregations.

Through the efforts of our Secretary for the Spirit of Missions, many new subscribers to that magazine have been gained. The Church Periodical Club reports the regular mailing of 411 magazines and papers and the sending of 787 books (theological and secular) to our domestic and foreign missionaries.

We are encouraged to find the Little Helpers in eight new places, and bespeak for their officers the help which the nature of their work demands.

A new Junior plan has been sent to each Diocesan branch by the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, with the request that it be tried by the Junior Auxiliary in that Diocese. The object of the plan is to provide a way by which the missionary instruction which is given to our Juniors may be conveyed through them to all the children in the Sunday Schools. Under the direction of the Bishop of the Diocese, this plan has been adapted for use in Virginia. The Secretary of the Virginia Juniors is inviting the co-operation of the Brotherhood of St. Paul, and it is hoped that by the combined efforts of our two Young People's Missionary Associations much missionary zeal may be kindled.

In reviewing the work of our fourteen branches of young women, we find such evidences of vitality that we earnestly recommend the formation of a Section B in all the larger parishes.

Under the able management of our Box Committee, the box work of our branch has largely increased, as the appended report will show.

Our united offering, which is made every three years and is not included in annual reports, was presented during the triennial meeting in St. Louis and amounted to \$6,056.00.

Last summer our Silver Anniversary Rest Fund enabled us to send four missionary workers for vacations to the Summer Rest House in Albemarle County.

Following the example of the Auxiliary in the Valley Convocation, we have during the past year held Convocational Auxiliary Days in the Rappahannock and Piedmont Convocations. These meetings were largely attended and their good effects are already apparent.

The observance of the Pilgrimage of Prayer has emphasized the spiritual side of our work and we wish to thank the clergy of the Diocese for the assistance that they gave, both during our Pilgrimage Week and in our preparation

When we plan for the work of the coming year and look around us at present conditions, we realize that we shall need the help of every woman and girl in the Diocese, if we are to make the advance that is now more than ever neces-

In the death of our first President and Secretary, Miss Sallie Stuart, which occurred last August in Alexandria, we met a loss that cannot be measured with words. But those of us who come after her in the Auxiliary find her foundations so well and so wisely laid that in the present activities of the Society we are reminded of one of the great blessings that come to those who die in the Lord: "Their works do follow them."

I herewith submit a report of the work of the Blue Ridge Industrial School for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1916, and ending December 31, 1916;

#### THE SCHOOL.

Officers, teachers and other employees, 15.

The enrollment of pupils was 93, of which 56 were boarding and 37 day scholars. Of the boarding scholars, 26 were boys and 30 girls. Their ages ranged from 3 to 18.

In the academic work there were grades from the primary to the second year high school. A great improvement was made in the character of the work done, and there has been a general quickening of interest in educational work throughout the community. The school is prepared to give the full course of a first grade high school under the Virginia public school standard.

In addition to the regular academic work, courses are given in domestic science, domestic and manual arts, agriculture, wood and iron working. Very good work has been done in these departments, but much better work could be accomplished if we had the necessary equipment. Industrial work is given the same importance and dignity as the academic. It is carefully inspected and graded and remuneration and standing in the school determined accordingly.

We are encouraging some of the brighter boys and girls to fit themselves

to teach in the public schools, as there is great need in the mountains for well trained native teachers.

The buildings are substantial and comfortable, but absolutely free of luxury. Only such industries as are adapted to isolated rural mountainous communities have been established, our aim being to discover and to teach the most efficient method of doing such things as are possible amid the conditions in which our average pupil lives.

The mountain people are beginning to understand the scope and purpose of the school, and each year more and more of them are making application for the admission of their children. We are endeavoring to fill the school exclusively from pupils of this class. Many applications come to us from eities and towns to take children whose moral character has been affected by vicious surroundings, but we believe it unwise to admit any of this class, as they lower the tone of the institution and exclude the ambitious and respectable children of rural communities.

Pupils below the age of fourteen are housed in the Constance Ledyard Heckscher Memorial. We have now twelve boys and thirteen girls in the home. They are under the care of a house mother, who gives all her time to their interest. This home enables us to receive many children who are orphans or half orphans or whose parents cannot adequately provide for them, and to start them aright while young. It serves an excellent preparatory department to the main school. The regular charge is \$5.00 per month, but many have been admitted who are unable to pay anything.

The school is becoming the social center of the neighboring community. During the year meetings were held in the interest of the Sunday School, Country Church, Public Health, etc. In this connection we desire to mention the valuable aid given by the Extension Department of the Y. M. C. A. of the University of Virginia. They pay the salary of a resident nurse and for five or six months during the session provide the services of the fourth-year medical students from the University to conduct clinics at the school infirmary.

The school operates two missions, one on Wyatt Mountain, and the other at Haneytown. At the first we have a school, mission home and two resident workers. At the latter, services and Sunday School are held in the public school building. A church is being erected at this point. The older pupils assist in this religious work.

#### THE FARM.

We have under cultivation about 250 acres of land. It is now yielding a profit, and we are confident that each year it will prove a greater asset to the school. Besides supplying the school with necessary provisions, it furnishes work for the boys and aids them in meeting the expense of their education. Special attention is given to stock raising. A well-equipped dairy supplies the school with milk. This work is under the direction of a good, practical farmer. Valuable assistance free of charge has been given us from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and the United States Agricultural Department.

#### ORCHARD AND CANNERY.

The Eastern slope of the Blue Ridge Mountains is recognized throughout the country as being most admirably adapted to fruit growing. The people who have lived here have been conscious of this fact for generations, but the variety of fruit grown, especially the apple, was not suitable for shipping. It was natural to consider the apple brandy distillery as the only suitable market for such fruit. To-day the people are beginning to turn their attention to the scientific cultivation of such excellent varieties of apples as the Albemarle Pippin, Winesap, and York Imperial, which are too valuable to be converted into apple brandy.

In order to encourage this industry the school is giving special attention to the orchard. We have about 1,200 bearing apple trees, most of them Old Virginia Winesaps. From one to two hundred new trees have been planted each year for the past three years. A practical orchardist is in control of this work.

Although the orchard is on steep and rocky hillside land, it has netted a small profit each year, at the same time taking care of the cost of improvements. During the past year considerable improvement has been made; the land cleared and cultivated, the trees pruned and carefully sprayed. Many of the apples were sold to private families. Apples not suitable for packing are made into vinegar and apple butter or canned.

#### THE CANNERY.

This is operated in connection with the orchard. Fruit which we cannot market fresh, owing to our great distance from the railroad, is canned. Vegetables and berries are also canned. A ready sale is found for all canned goods not consumed in the school.

#### THE SHOP.

(a). Woodworking.—A second-hand planer, some ripsaws and a 12 horse-power portable gasoline engine constitute our present equipment. So far the work here has been confined to working out our own building materials and doing such work as possible for the people of the community.

Last summer we built a woodworking shop. We need equipment. Here we will instruct the boys in the care and use of tools and teach them how to make many necessary articles for the home and farm.

(b). Blacksmithing.—So far work has been confined to supplying the needs of the school farm.

The services of a competent foreman have been secured for this department and the work will be developed as rapidly as possible.

#### REAL ESTATE AND BUILDINGS.

Building operations during the past year were confined to completing the new wing to the boys' dormitory and in building an outside bath room, build-

ing a laundry and bath room for the little children's home, a woodworking shop and several sheds and outhouses, and painting the reflectory, infirmary and the addition to the boys' dormitory.

As the work grows the financial burden becomes heavier. Something should be done, and done immediately, to put the school on a firmer financial basis. While the farm, orchard and other industries are year by year becoming more profitable, yet we must face the fact that they will never enable the school to be self-sustaining, unless a considerably larger charge is made for tuition and board than is made at present. But if this were done it would debar from the school the very class of children we are striving to help.

With seventy-five boarding pupils, which is the limit of our capacity at present, \$6,000.00 yearly in donations is required to meet operating expenses. This sum must be secured by the general manager in the form of voluntary contributions. The need for such work is practically unlimited. The school should continue to grow, but growth in size means placing additional financial burdens upon the management of the institution and ultimately upon the Church, as the school is a Church institution.

In this connection, I wish to call your attention to Article III of the charter, which reads as follows:

The members of the Board of Trustees shall have perpetual succession and power to elect their own successors to fill any vacancy or vacancies which may occur in their body from death, resignation, inability or refusal to act, removal, or from any other causes, provided that such vacancy shall be filled by the selection of one of two or more persons named therefor by the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

The fact that the control of this school has been vested in the Church of this Diocese shuts it out from securing State aid, and indeed from nearly all aid except what the Church individually or corporately may give. If the Church of this Diocese is to exercise control of such work, naturally she should assume the responsibilities connected with its development. In order to fix the status of the school in the minds of the members of the Council, we propose the following resolution:

Whereas, the Blue Ridge Industrial School, located at Dyke, Greene County, Va., has been chartered as a Church institution under the control of the Diocese of Virginia;

Resolved, that this Council approves this action and commends the school to the liberality of all Church people and requests the clergy of this Diocese to bear in mind its needs when appealing to their congregations and when distributing the offerings given to missionary and philanthropic work.

VIII. REPORT OF STUART HALL.

May 21, 1917.

To the Bishops and Council of Virginia.

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit the following report:

At the close of its second session as a Diocesan School, Stuart Hall shows a distinct gain in numbers over the last year. There have been sixty-eight boarding pupils, fifty day pupils, and twenty special pupils in music, art, etc., making a total number of 138 pupils—an increase of eleven boarding pupils and a total increase of nineteen pupils.

All departments have been conducted satisfactorily and efficiently, the former high standard of scholarship being consistently maintained. Seven young ladies will be graduated from the school this year, three of whom expect to enter college in the autumn. The general health conditions have been good.

Four candidates from the school were confirmed by Bishop Tucker, a fifth being prevented by illness. The Missionary Society has done faithful work, sending contributions to the Covington school, for foreign and diocesan missions, for war relief, and for local charities.

It is naturally impossible to forecast to what extent the war conditions may affect the attendance for next year, but at present the prospects seem good. Numerous inquiries for catalogues and information are being received and some pupils, including both old and new ones, have been entered for the session of 1917-18, notwithstanding the increase of \$50.00 in price, authorized by the Board of Directors at a recent meeting.

IX. REPORT OF ST. ANNE'S SCHOOL.

Charlottesville, Va., May 22, 1917.

Right Rev. Robert A. Gibson, Bishop of Virginia:

The report of this school for the past year is herewith respectfully submitted to you. Notwithstanding the increased cost of all living expenses, the school is now closing its seventh session with an encouraging record.

The academic department has been larger than during any previous year,

and the boarding department larger than the previous year.

We have established three tuition scholarships. The scholastic work has approached nearer the ideal of our aspirations during 1917 than ever before. If St. Anne's could obtain an endowment of from \$25,000 to \$50,000, the work of the school and its influence for good would be immeasurably increased.

MARY HYDE DUVAL, Principal. X. REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

The changing of the name from Sunday School Commission to the Diocesan Board of Religious Education has broadened the scope of our work, and your Board has during the year tried to measure up to its increased responsibility.

For the first time in the history of the Diocese we had last year a Summer School for Sunday School Workers at Charlottesville, Va., largely attended by teachers from a number of schools, as well as a number of the clergy. The school was most successful and practically paid its own expenses. A similar school will be held this year at the University of Virginia from the 11th to the 15th of June. A most helpful and attractive program has been arranged, a strong corps of teachers and lecturers secured, and we trust the school will have representatives from each parish in the Diocese.

It is the hope of your Board to establish Convocational Boards of Religious Education in each of the five Convocations of the Diocese. If this can be done, the work will be greatly unified and placed on a more practical and effective basis of operation. First, the General Board, and then the Provincial, the Diocesan and the Convocational Boards. It will be as it were the carrying of the life of the tree to the remotest twig. Two of these boards have already been organized, one in the Richmond Convocation, and last fall another in Rappahannock Convocation.

We hope by next year each Convocation will have fallen in line and the work fully organized.

The Diocesan Board has a Curriculum Committee which has been spending much time and labor on a Curriculum suited to the needs of the smaller graded schools of the Diocese. This Curriculum is about completed and would have been given to the schools several months ago but for the fact that a part of the literature suggested has not yet been published. It will be remembered that in our last report we stated that the only way to get a suitable Curriculum would be to have a Diocesan Course published. This task has, at least in part, been undertaken during the past year by three of our most accomplished and successful Sunday School workers. The Beginners' course by Mrs. R. H. Meade; the Primary by Miss Sallie Deane; and the Junior by Mrs. E. E. Osgood. These courses have been accepted and incorporated in, the Jacob's Series and will probably be ready for use by October next. The delay in publication, like many other things, is due to the war, and these are circumstances over which we could have no control.

Last year the Board elected Mrs. E. E. Osgood and Miss Sallie Deane as teacher trainers for the Diocese. These ladies have had in their classes during the past year 115 Sunday School teachers, representing many schools in the Diocese. This work is done in person and by correspondence. Teachers taking the whole course will receive a Diocesan diploma; those taking part of the course will receive certificates for work accomplished. It is hoped that at least one teacher in each Sunday School in the Diocese will take this Teacher Training-Course. That teacher could then form Parochial Teacher Training Classes, and in this way greatly add to the proficiency of all our schools.

Your Board is much interested in religious education and is giving much time and attention to its work. The hearty co-operation of the rectors and the Sunday Schools will be greatly appreciated.

Of the \$700.00 apportioned to the board, \$621.26 has been received. This is a gain of \$8.59 over last year. As every cent of the \$700.00 is needed to meet our obligations, we hope that the delinquent parishes may yet respond.

The Board offers the following resolutions:

1. That the apportionment of last year be renewed and placed in the Diocesan budget; a total of \$700.00, to be distributed as follows:

2. Resolved by the Council of the Diocese of Virglnis in session: First, that in accordance with the recommendations of the General and Provincial Boards of Religious Education, every clergyman in the Diocese of Virginia be urged to observe Education Week, beginning the twentieth Sunday after Trinity (October 21st), and that he be further urged to make a careful preparation for the most effective use of this week in arousing the members of his parish to a realization of the importance of religious education; also that the twenty-first Sunday after Trinity (October 28th), as recommended by the General and Provincial Boards of Religious Education, be observed as Vocation Day, at which time special emphasis shall be given to the subject of the call to the ministry.

Be it further resolved, that the Council notes with special gratification the successful inauguration of the Summer School for Sunday School Teachers at Charlottesville last summer, and pledges its hearty sympathy and active co-operation for an even more successful and better patronized session to be held this summer at the University of Virginia June 11th-15th, inclusive.

## XI. REPORT OF THE COLONIAL CHURCHES COMMISSION.

Fredericksburg, Va., May 24, 1917.

To the One Hundred and Twenty-second Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Colonial Churches Commission is able to report that during the past year its work has gone on steadily if slowly. Repairs and improvements have been made in some of the colonial churches, notably Old Pohick Church, which has been completely restored at a cost of \$8,000.00, which was raised by one of the Vice-Regents of Mt. Vernon (Miss Amy Townsend).

The fund for the restoration of old Farnham Church, Richmond County, has been augmented during the year and now stands at \$612.00. We trust that increasing interest can be aroused in the restoration of this old church, as apart from its interest as a historic monument, the need is very great for its

restoration in order that it may be used for services, as at present the village of Farnham is without an adequate church building of any kind.

The committee in charge of the restoration of old St. John's Church, in King William County, reports receipts of \$69.72 in the hands of the treasurer of the committee, which will be used for the further restoration of this building.

The most interesting question that has come before the Commission during the year has been in regard to old Cattail Church, in King William County. This Church, it will be remembered, is one of those that have passed out of our hands into the possession of other religious bodies. Shortly after the Civil War the white congregation of St. David's Parish abandoned this building and erected a church building in the village of Aylett and, with the consent of the vestry of the parish, a colored Baptist congregation took possession of the old church. This coored congregation desiring now to spend a considerable amount of money in repairing the building, asked the Colonial Churches Commission if it would be possible for them to secure a clear title to the property, so that there might be no danger of its alienation from them. While the Colonial Churches Commission is intensely desirous of getting back for the Church those colonial buildings which have passed from our possession, it seems very clear that this colored congregation, having in the first place taken possession of the building with the consent of the vestry of the parish, have at present the first right to its ownership; consequently a tentative proposition was made to them looking to their relinquishment of claim to the property, which they rejected, as a possession of fifty years had caused them to form a strong attachment for the building. The Colonial Churches Commission, therefore, acting under the advice of the chancellor of the Diocese, suggested that the vestry of the parish give to the trustees of the said colored congrégation a quit claim deed so long as they use it for religious purposes as a relinquishment by the Church of any claim to legal possession of the property. This quit claim deed has since been executed and recorded and the matter finally settled.

Little Fork Church, Oak Shade, Culpeper County, since the report last year of a new roof, has within the past year had the windows restored and protected with iron screens. These improvements, with white paint on the woodwork, represent an added expenditure of about \$250.00. Services are held in this church once a month in the summer and in St. Mark's Chapel in Rixeyville in the winter also once a month.

#### XII. REPORT OF THE BROTHERHOOD OF ST. PAUL.

The Brotherhood chapters began work in the fall of 1916 with a pledge to meet of \$100.00 which had been promised as a special for feeding one of Bishop Rowe's dogs in Alaska. The appeal is one that always meets with an enthusiastic response from all the boys and the amount has been paid. The directors had chosen China as the subject for study for the year, and nearly all used "The Emergency in China" as their text-book, adapting it to the needs of the small boy.

In January the Brotherhood held its annual service in St. Paul's Church, Richmond. This had been preceded the evening before by a supper to forty

boys and five laymen and clergy.

This spring one chapter at least promises to have a flourishing vegetable garden. The St. Paul's Chapter at Hanover has invited the Richmond Chapters to meet with them on May 26th. At this meeting, which is to be arranged by St. Paul's, Hanover, the secretaries of the chapters will read their annual reports and the work for the coming year will be discussed.

At the annual conference in February of the Diocesan officers, Advisory Board and directors of the active chapters, the Treasurer reported the total receipts having passed through the treasury since February, 1916, to be \$232.54. The Secretary reported twenty-eight chapters on the roll, with twelve doing active work, sixteen without leaders, or dead.

Officers elected were: President, Rev. G. McL. Brydon; Vice-President, Rev. J. F. Ribble; Treasurer, Rev. E. L. Goodwin, D. D.; Secretary, Miss

Martha Webb Purcell.

It was decided that a smaller advisory board would be found easier to reach and better able to handle the work of the Brotherhood. The following were elected: The Diocesan officers and Rev. E. E. Osgood, Rev. W. R. Bowie, and Rev. W. B. Lee, Jr.

The board has since met each month. The Rev. W. B. Lee, Jr., spoke at two of the spring convocations on the Brotherhood of St. Paul.

XIII. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY OF THE LAYMEN'S MOVE-MENT COMMISSION OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN VIRGINIA.

May 21, 1917.

As the Secretary of the above Commission, I herewith submit the following report of that work committed to my charge since the last meeting of the Council of the Dioceses of Virginia:

At the last meeting of the Council it was voted that the Laymen's Movement Commission be authorized to conduct such a campaign as it deemed necessary for the purpose of raising \$50,000.00, to be used in the building of a wing to the St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo, Japan, this building to be known as the Virginian Building.

As a means of bringing the matter fully before the Church in Virginia, and as to their share in it, the Commission organized a special committee, to be known as the Virginia Building Fund Committee for St. Luke's International Hospital. This committee directed the present Secretary to devise ways and means such as seemed best at that time to start the campaign.

Starting in Richmond the latter part of April, a supper meeting was held with special speakers present; also meetings at Norfolk and Roanoke, at which time the campaign was given a splendid start, and considerable money pledged. The Secretary then arranged for a series of illustrated lectures to be given. Rev. David W. Howard, of Norfolk, Va., gave two weeks of his time as lecturer, and, with Mr. Brown, visited the following parishes: St. Andrew's, Lawrenceville; St. James, Boydton; St. John's, Houston; Emmanuel, Chatham; Trinity, Rocky Mount; Emmanuel, Bristol; St. Paul's, Saltville; St. Thomas, Abingdon; Christ, Blacksburg.

The result of these meetings and many circular letters sent out by the Secretary has been the means thus far of securing signed pledges and cash amounting to \$7,000.00. In addition to the amounts as stated, sufficient promises (but not on the regular pledge form) have been made to assure the Committee of nearly \$11,000.00, making a total of \$18,000.00. Pledges and verbal agreements must be followed up, and if the balance of the \$50,000.00 is to be raised, some organized effort should be made and every churchman and churchwoman in Virginia given a chance to contribute to this worthy object so well started—and delayed by so many conflicting campaigns—yet all worthy and as necessary.

Beginning July 28th, the Secretary again resumed his active duties in directing the every-member canvass in churches. Trinity Church, Rocky Mount, July 28th to August 6th; (August 6th to September 9th, Secretary was on his vacation); from September 10th to November 20th (in addition to keeping in touch with the work of St. Luke's Hospital), the Secretary directed or assisted the churches as herewith given in the planning of the every-member canvass: Cumberland Parish, three churches; St. Thomas Church, Richmond; Good Shepherd Church, Richmond; St. Paul's Church, Salem; St. John's Church, Roanoke; Grace Church, Lynchburg; Emmanuel Church, Chatham.

From November 7th to 12th the Secretary was in Cleveland, Ohio, where he spoke three times a day in various churches for four days in the interest of the simultaneous every-member canvass conducted there by Rev. R. W. Patton.

Beginning November 20th, your Secretary was released from his regular work as Secretary of the Laymen's Movement Commission, to take charge of the campaign details of the Church Pension Fund Committee in the Diocese of Southern Virginia. From the date mentioned up to April 7th the Secretary gave his whole time to this work, except for such time as given to Ascension Church, Norfolk, and St. Paul's Church, Suffolk, when he assisted these two churches in their every-member canvasses.

From April 8th to May 8th your Secretary was in Baltimore, being released from his work in Virginia so that he might help the Baltimore committee plan and prepare for the Missionary Mission to be conducted by the Rev. Robert W. Patton from April 29th to May 5th. While in Baltimore your Secretary not only looked after the trying details connected with the campaign at the office headquarters, but made many addresses at night and on Sundays in explaining the purposes of and how to conduct the every-member canvass. While in Baltimore, as well as the time spent by your Secretary in the interest of the Church Pension Fund, his salary was paid by those for whom he worked, thereby releasing the present Laymen's Movement Commission of any expenses during the time from November 20, 1916, to May 9, 1917.

It would indeed be a lack of appreciation on my part did I not at this time express my gratitude for the opportunity I have had to co-operate with those in Baltimore who worked so hard for the success in the recent campaign. It was a great and glorious manifestation of united effort on the part of the Church. The results of the campaign cannot be tabulated in figures at the present moment; the whole church life of Baltimore has, however, been greatly stimulated and a new awakening has dawned among those who have never before taken the Church seriously enough to give of their means sufficiently to at least express their belief in what it stands for. The every-member canvass will in time be put into operation by every live minister and conscientious vestryman who desires to see every member share in the support of the Church and all it stands for. The sooner the Church membership throughout the two Dioceses realize that every man, woman and child should give each week according to his or her ability, the sooner will this present self-contentedness of so many parishes now being supported by the richer parishes be done away with, and those able to be self-supporting, or nearly so, will make an effort to do what they now feel unable to do-because they haven't tried the best known method.

Since the return of the Secretary to Virginia (May 9th), he has put the every-member canvass in St. Paul's Church, Newport News, and Christ Church, Norfolk, May 20th. Between these dates his entire time has been spent in getting the churches ready. The most significant thing of the every member canvass in these two churches was to see on each Sunday morning at the close of the service the picked men of the congregation come forward and knee

before the altar and receive the blessing of their leader as he called upon the Great Leader of mankind to guide and direct these men as they went about their Master's business. It is this that counts—when more men are ready to undertake the spiritual work in their church the financial aid will come. The every-member canvass should need no further argument; the results of the many canvasses as held by those that have tried them ought to be sufficient endorsement of the plan which the Laymen's Movement Commission has been so active in promoting.

As I have seen fit to resign the Secretaryship of the Commission, I am not in a position to make suggestions, yet with the experience I have had I feel at liberty to say that the Dioceses of Virginia and Southern Virginia ought to get together, or act separately, and put a paid man in the field who will give his whole time in just introducing the every-member canvass in the churches until they have all adopted the system that has proven to be superior to any other method thus far known to those that have studied many methods of church finances.

If this suggestion is taken seriously it would be worth the expense to the Dioceses; for the amount of increase in contributions from those churches making the canvass in one year would fully warrant such an effort. But the man employed should be supported by the societies and not by a few laymen.

In closing this report, I wish I might give a better one as to the work I have been able to do, yet it can hardly be expected that I could introduce the everymember canvass in the churches as it should be done when I have been constantly loaned or released for other purposes. As a movable and loanable worker in the Master's service, I have tried at all times to render helpful service, but in doing so have found it impossible to look after St. Luke's Hospital, the Laymen's Movement Commission and the Church Pension Fund. If my work, such as it has been, will in time prove to be not in vain, then I shall be happy in knowing I did that work given me to do the best I knew how in view of the conditions under which it was done.

In closing, may I state that this will be my last report to the Council as the Secretary of the Laymen's Movement Commission. I wish those friends that this enjoyable work has brought me to know that in leaving it I do so because I feel that the time and opportunity have come to me when I cannot decline to refuse a position which will enable me to meet the demands upon my limited resources and yet find a greater field for service in which the name of Him whom we all wish to be known among men is as yet hardly known.

General Remarks.—This year has been eventful in this parish, because of the building, nearly to completion, of the new Grace Church and Parish House at an estimated cost of approximately \$30,000. Of this sum \$20,000 has been raised and expended in cash, and about \$8,000 of the balance has been subscribed. # APPENDIX D. II

## STATISTICS OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA, 1917.

Owing to the unusual number of vacant parishes and churches in the Diocese during the latter part of the Council year, and to the fact that the Wardens in so many of these made no parochial report at all, or very incomplete returns at best, the report of the Statistician is less accurate than usual. One hundred and forty-nine parochial reports were received, covering one hundred and ninety-nine churches, chapels and missions; while about forty-five churches and missions made no returns and a number of others reported no vital statistics. Most of these were, of course, small in membership, but in the aggregate their failure makes the report of the Diocese seriously defective. The reports received cover about ninety-one per cent. of the communicants of the Diocese. In the tables below the number of communicants last reported from the parishes and churches not reporting this year are added to make up, approximately, the whole number of communicants. For most of the other items an addition of five or six per cent. would give a nearly correct total.

The contributions reported exceed those of last year by \$116,867.78. A large portion of this represents, in part, the offerings made by the Diocese to the Church Pension Fund of about \$150,000.00 in cash and pledges. Some of the parishes, however, did not report their contributions to this object. But apart from this the contributions far surpass those of any previous year in the history of the Diocese.

#### CANONS AS AMENDED.

For the benefit of those who desire to insert the recent amendments in their copies of the Canons of the Diocese, Canons VIII., IX. and X., as amended at the Council of 1917, and Canon XII., as amended at the Council of 1916, are here given.

#### CANON VIII.

Of the Bishops' and Contingent Fund for Diocesan Expenses.

SECTION 1. The fiscal year of the Diocese, and of each parish and congregation, shall begin January first.

Section 2. The Council shall elect annually a Committee of three laymen to be known as the Committee on Finance, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. Any vacancy occurring in this Committee shall be filled by the remaining members. It shall be the duty of the said Committee to examine the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, and report to the Council the financial condition of the Diocese, making such recommendations as they may deem expedient.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance, at each annual Council, to present an estimate of the amount needed to meet the expenses of the Diocese for the fiscal year beginning the first day of January following. They shall at the same time present a schedule assessing the amount called for in their estimate proportionately upon the Vestries of the different parishes and congregations of the Diocese. The said assessment shall be based upon the relative financial strength of the parishes and congregations, as shown by their parochial reports and by other facts and considerations which may become known to the Committee. This assessment shall be made known to the Vestries of the several parishes or churches as soon as possible after it is made. But be it provided, That any Vestry shall have thirty days in which to protest if they deem the assessment excessive or burdensome, and the Committee on Finance shall allow them opportunity to show cause why it should be reduced.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of each Vestry to pay the sum assessed upon the respective parish or church to the Treasurer of the Diocese, in full at the beginning of the fiscal year, or quarterly in advance throughout the year, as it may elect; each Vestry being free to adopt such means as it may deem best to raise its assessment.

Section 5. The Fund thus created shall be known as the Bishops' and Contingent Fund; and shall be held by the Treasurer of the Diocese for the purpose of defraying such expenses as shall be authorized by the Council. But the Committee on Finance may also, after the adjournment of the Council, authorize and require the Treasurer to pay any extraordinary or unforeseen expenses which shall legitimately arise in the proper conduct of the business of the Diocese.

#### CANON IX.

#### Of the Apportionment.

Section 1. In order that sufficient means may be provided by the stated offerings of the people for the support of the missionary and charitable work of the Diocese, and its due share of that of the general Church, there shall be elected by each annual Council a Board of Apportionment, consisting of five members, at least one of whom shall be chosen from the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and one from the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese. This Board shall elect a chairman and a secretary from their own number. Vacancies arising in the Board shall be filled by vote of the remaining members.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Board of Apportionment, after consultation with the various boards, trustees or committees representing the societies or funds named below, to prepare and present to the next annual Council, on the first day of its session, a budget indicating the minimum amounts required for the next fiscal year for the following objects: (a) The Diocesan Missionary Society, (b) The Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society; (c) The Fund for the Relief of Disabled Clergy; (d) The Widows and Orphans Fund; (e) The Education Society of Virginia; (f) The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society; (g) The General Clergy Relief Fund; (h) The Sunday School Commission. The Council shall thereupon determine the amount to be apportioned for each of the said objects. But the Council may, from time to time, omit any of the above objects from the budget, or may add other objects, at its discretion.

Section 3. The Board of Apportionment shall prepare a schedule apportioning the total amount called for in their budget among the different parishes and congregations of the Diocese reported separately in the Journal. The said apportionment shall be based upon the relative financial ability of the parishes and congregations as shown by their parochial reports for a series of years, and by other facts and considerations which may become known to the Board. This schedule shall be published and shall be sent to the minister or wardens of every parish or congregation before the first of December following. The Board shall receive and consider any protest that may be made by any rector or vestry in regard to their apportionment, provided the same be made before the beginning of the fiscal year, and their decision in the matter shall be final. The schedule, with any corrections thus made, shall be published in the Journal.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of every minister and the lay officers of every congregation to use all diligence to provide that the whole amount thus apportioned to their respective parishes or congregations for the missionary and charitable work of the Church be paid quarterly within the Council year. The Board of Apportionment shall co-operate with the parochial authorities, and with the boards, trustees or committees named above, in making known to the people the needs of the Church's work and in encouraging them to liberal and systematic offerings in its behalf.

Section 5. The maximum expenses of the Board of Apportionment shall be fixed by the Council annually, and shall be paid *pro rata* by the Treasurers of the various Diocesan societies and funds provided for in the budget, upon requisition by the Chairman of the Board.

#### CANON XII.

Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

Section 1. The Council shall elect annually a Diocesan Board of Religious Education, to consist of the Bishop, the Bishop Co-adjutor, if there be one, six persons from the Diocese at large, and one person from each Convocation in the Diocese recognized by the Council as entitled to such representation, nominated by such Convocations, respectively, and one member from the faculty of the Theological Seminary in Virginia. And this Board may at their discretion add to their number for their own term of office such other members as they may select, not exceeding five.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of this Board to promote religious and moral education in this Diocese.

Section 3. This Board shall have authority to adopt such measures as shall be necessary for promoting the objects for which it is created, and for co-operating with the General and Provincial Boards of Religious Education.

Section 4. The Bishop shall be ex-officio President of the Board, and the Bishop Co-adjutor, if there be one, shall be Vice-President ex-officio. The remaining officers shall be elected at the first meeting of the Board after the Diocesan Council.

Section 5. The Board shall report annually to the Diocesan Council.

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
