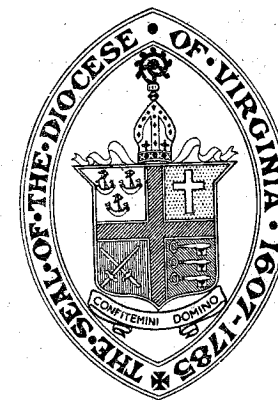

FORMS FOR MAKING BEQUEST

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "*The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.*"

The funds already created and now held by the said corporation are:

1. The Disabled Clergy Fund.
2. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund.
3. The Episcopal Fund.
4. The Bruce Fund.
5. The A. Baker Evangelist Fund.
6. The St. Andrew's Fund.
7. Pohick Ch. Endowment Fund.
8. Yeocomico Ch. Endowment Fund.
9. Monumental Church Fund.
10. Fork Church Fund, and others.

All devises or bequests to any of the said funds should be made to "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Virginia, for the sole use and benefit of the Fund (naming the fund intended) now held in trust by the said corporation."

If it is the desire to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its President, Rt. Rev. William Cabell Brown, D. D.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is, "*The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary and High School in Virginia,*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "*Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia,*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "*The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia,*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "*Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia,*" a corporation chartered under the laws of Virginia. All gifts and bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg, Va., is: "*The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia,*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia, March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va.

ORGANIZATION

FROM CANON I, SECTION 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

RULES OF ORDER

- 1st. The Council shall be opened with prayer.
- 2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

- 3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Report of Secretary.

Election of a Secretary.

The appointment of a Treasurer *pro tempore* when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council, the following standing Committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Clergy Relief, to whom shall be referred the accounts of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and of the Disabled Clergy Fund, and other matters cognate thereto.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds not specified above, held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on Missions, to whom shall be referred the report and accounts of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society, and other matters bearing on the missionary work of the Diocese.

A Committee on New Parishes.

A Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

A Committee on Unfinished Business.

And the chairman of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President may think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next Council.

5th. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention, shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

In all elections held by ballot, no candidate who receives a majority of the votes cast shall be dropped except upon motion made and carried by the Council.

6th. The Council shall sit as a Board of Missions on the first day of the session at 8:15 o'clock P. M. The President of the Council, or some member of the Council selected by him shall preside. The Secretary of the Council shall be Secretary of the Council sitting as a Board of Missions.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; and all resolutions shall be referred to their proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the

mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desire to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *Provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese

shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

25th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

26th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the President may appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And the Committee may report at any time.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

27th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

28th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

29th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

30th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

JOURNAL
OF THE
128th Annual Council of the Protestant
Episcopal Church
IN THE
DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

The One Hundred and Twenty-eighth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia convened in St. James Church, Warrenton, Virginia, on Wednesday, the 16th day of May, 1923, at ten A. M.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. G. M. Brydon, the Rev. W. J. Morton, D. D., and the Rev. Paul D. Bowden, the rector of the church.

The Council was called together in business session at 11:18 A. M. The roll call showed fifty-three Clergy and forty-three lay delegates present. The Chairman announced that a quorum was present, and Council ready to proceed to business.

The Secretary made a verbal report, and presented the official notification to the Diocese of the changes in the Prayer Book and in the Constitution of the General Convention proposed by the General Convention of 1922, to be finally acted upon by the Convention of 1925: which was received.

The Chair called for the election of a Secretary. The Rev. E. L. Goodwin, D. D., was nominated for re-election. The Assistant Secretary was, on motion, instructed to cast the ballot of the Council, and he was elected.

The Secretary appointed the Rev. G. M. Brydon and the Rev. Clayton Torrence as Assistant Secretaries.

The Chair appointed as the Committee on Credentials: The Rev. J. F. Ribble, D. D., Mr. Lewis C. Williams and Mr. Robert Beverley.

On motion the rules of order of the last Council were adopted.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Bowden the hours of meeting of the Council were appointed as follows:

From 10 A. M. to 1 P. M., 2:30 to 5:00 P. M. Evening session 8:15.

The Bishop presented his journal of official acts in 1922. (See Appendix A-1.)

The Bishop read his annual address to the Council.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

My dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

By the action of the last Council, we ought to have met in St. Paul's, Alexandria, but the illness of its rector, who I am glad to say is slowly regaining his health, was sufficiently severe to make me feel that he ought under no circumstances to be permitted to undertake the task of being host to the Council, and so, acting under the authority of the Constitution of the Church, I accepted the gracious invitation of the rector and vestry of this church, and transferred the meeting of the Council from St. Paul's, Alexandria, to St. James, Warrenton.

Before reading the report of my official acts for the year beginning January 1st, 1922, and ending January 31st, 1922, it gives me pleasure to state that there were no deaths among the Clergy of the Diocese during the year 1922, for which God be praised.

Since the beginning of the new year, however, the Rev. Messrs. Ernest Earle Osgood, Edward Valentine Jones and Byrd Thornton Turner have passed from among us.

REV. ERNEST E. OSGOOD.

Not only Emmanuel Church, Brook Hill, of which he had been the beloved rector for twenty years, but the whole Diocese has sustained a grievous loss in the death, on March 10th, of the Rev. Ernest E. Osgood, who, after a week's illness of pneumonia in Grace Hospital, Richmond, fell asleep.

Mr. Osgood was born in New Hampshire in 1870. He took his theological training at our Seminary near Alexandria, from which he graduated in 1903. He was assigned by the Bishop of Virginia, after he was made deacon in June, 1903, to take charge of Emmanuel Church, which was then temporarily vacant.

From the first Mr. Osgood proved so acceptable that when the vestry met to choose a permanent rector, he was the unanimous choice. He was advanced to the priesthood in 1904, and assumed the charge of the church, which he served with singular devotion for twenty years. During these years, though he received repeated calls to other fields

of labor, Mr. Osgood, at the earnest solicitation of his vestry, felt constrained to remain at Emmanuel.

Upon my request, Mr. Osgood accepted last October his appointment, as Archdeacon of the Colored Work in the Diocese, and entered upon his duties with such an intelligent and sympathetic interest in the work that his death will be a great blow to a work which demands for its successful prosecution just those traits which he possessed in so marked a degree. He was by nature and habit a student, and though familiar with the trend of modern thought he was content to walk in the old paths.

His pastorate was characterized by an extraordinary increase in community spirit, and how truly he had come to be looked upon as the pastor of a community as well as of a church, was shown by the vast throng of people, rich and poor, white and colored, who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect and affection when he was laid to rest near to the church he loved so well.

He was admired and respected by his colleagues, he was loved by the congregation and the community, to which he gave himself without stint.

REV. BYRD THORNTON TURNER.

Rev. Byrd Thornton Turner, a retired priest of the Diocese of Virginia, died in Fredericksburg on Sunday, April 8th, at the age of seventy-five.

Mr. Turner was born in Goochland County, Virginia, and was a soldier in the Confederate Army the last year of the War Between the States. He graduated from William and Mary College in 1873 and from the Theological Seminary of Virginia in 1878. His ministry was spent entirely in the Dioceses in Virginia and Maryland. His last charge was as rector of the Stanardsville District in the mountain work in the Diocese of Virginia.

One outstanding feature of Mr. Turner's ministry was the revival of the work at Lamb's Creek Church in King George County, one of our colonial churches which had been abandoned for a number of years. During Mr. Turner's rectorship of the other parishes in that county between 1904 and 1914, Mr. Turner found the opportunity of reviving the work at old Lamb's Creek Church, of restoring it from a condition of dilapidation into which it had fallen and of laying foundations upon which the work has been carried on ever since.

He was laid to rest by the side of his wife, who died and was buried at Madison Courthouse, while he was yet in charge of the mountain missions in Greene County.

He loved the mountains and the people who lived among them, and

in turn he was greatly beloved by them. It is fitting that he should sleep where the mountains will keep watch about him.

REV. EDWARD VALENTINE JONES.

The Rev. Edward Valentine Jones died at his home in Charles City County on Thursday, March 22nd, and was buried in the churchyard of old Westover Church on Saturday.

Mr. Jones was born in Augusta County, Virginia, in 1844. He graduated at Washington College, now Washington and Lee University, in 1867, and from the Virginia Seminary in 1872, when he was ordained deacon by Bishop Johns. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1873 by Bishop Whittle.

Mr. Jones' whole life was spent in the Diocese of Virginia. His first charge was Trinity Church, Huntington, West Virginia, from 1872 to 1874, before the first division of the original Diocese. Afterward he served successively in Prince George County from 1874 to 1884, in Salem from 1886 to 1889. His longest ministry was in Walker's Parish in Albemarle County, which he served for twenty years, from 1839 to 1909. He then became rector of Christ Church Parish, Middlesex County, to which he ministered until the loss of his eyesight compelled him to give up the active work of the ministry. Mr. Jones was a faithful and loving pastor of his people always. He saw and followed his Master with loyalty and fidelity in his own life and led his people along the way that leads to eternal life.

REPORTS OF THE SECRETARY OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The indefatigable Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society showed me the various reports, which he has prepared for the Council, and which he usually presents at the Wednesday night meeting. They seemed to me to contain so much that is of interest, not only as touching what has been done during the past years, but also in the way of plans and suggestions for the current year, that I advised him strongly to have them printed and distributed among the members of the Council during the afternoon's session so that at the night session a brief outline might be given of the most important matters, instead of reading the whole of the reports. I advised this, because I wanted to secure time for a full and frank discussion and criticism of what has been done and what it is proposed to do.

REPORT OF THE DEAN OF CHURCH SCHOOLS.

I need not take up your time by saying in advance what the Dean of Church Schools will bring to your attention in his annual report. I cannot refrain, however, from expressing my keen appreciation of the

valuable services he has rendered to the Diocese in helping to launch the system of Church Schools, and personally I am greatly indebted to him for relieving me of many of the details incident to the beginning of so tremendous an undertaking.

While fully conscious of the difficulties that have yet to be overcome, and realizing how far we are still from the ideal which we cherish, I want once again to express my profound conviction that there is no one thing more necessary to the well-being of the Diocese than the system of schools that has been inaugurated. I bespeak, therefore, the earnest interest and hearty co-operation of both clergy and laity, without which we cannot hope to see the schools established and self-supporting, though far more has been accomplished in this respect than I had deemed possible in so short a time.

THE MAYO MEMORIAL.

The Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese will, in due course, bring to the attention of the Council the wonderful gift made to it by the children and grandchildren of the late Mr. Peter H. Mayo.

I have, of course, long since expressed to these good ladies the grateful thanks of the Diocese, but it seems to me not amiss to say that as great and valuable as was their generous gift, the gracious manner in which it was done, was even greater.

I hope, and confidently believe, that in the future this house will not only serve as headquarters for all the activities of the Diocese, but will become of exceeding interest to the whole Church as the place where portraits and paintings and interesting documents concerning the past history of the Church in Virginia, will be kept.

THE DR. HUGH M. TAYLOR MEMORIAL.

Besides the splendid gift to the Diocese just mentioned, I am authorized by Mrs. Hugh M. Taylor to announce that it is her purpose to give to the Diocese the farm known as Springsbury, situated near the Shenandoah River in Clarke County, consisting of 420 acres of land, with large dwelling house, two barns and other outhouses, besides three tenants' houses, as a memorial to her husband, Dr. Hugh M. Taylor, and to be used as a home, or should the estate be sold, then the proceeds of the sale to be invested and the interest employed for the care of orphan boys, when possible.

While not able at this time to give all the details about either one of these splendid memorials, I deemed it wise to make public mention of these generous gifts which will increase tremendously the usefulness and efficiency of the Church in the Diocese.

Wherever we look there seems to be a spirit of unrest. We need not stop now to consider the causes of this unrest, for though the causes doubtless are many and complex, yet the fact of this unrest is patent and manifest in every sphere of life. I am concerned now, however, only with its appearance and its persistence in the realm of religion.

I may as well frankly state at the outset that I want to deal with its manifestation in the uncertain and questioning attitude of not a few touching the person of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

In considering this question it is difficult for us not to have before us the controversy which has received so much notice in both the religious and secular press. And yet, unless we can rid our minds of what is a mere incident in a question that is far-reaching and of supreme importance, we shall hardly approach it with any prospect of coming to a wise and sane conclusion about it.

In my recent visitations so many people have asked me to explain to them what is meant by modernism, that I may not with a clear conscience evade the responsibility of stating as concisely as possible what I conceive it to be. The term itself is very vague, but if I understand the trend of thought among those who are looked upon as leaders in this movement, they insist upon the right to interpret the Church's creeds in the light of modern science and biblical scholarship, with the result that they seem to me, without admitting it frankly, to have grave difficulty in repeating without an interpretation which amounts to a denial, the words of the creeds which affirm that "He was conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary; * * * the third day He rose again from the dead." They look askance at the statement of the creeds which they regard as dogmas that are now meaningless and constitute real stumbling-blocks in the path of the Church's progress, while they seem to me simple and necessary statements of truths which have been revealed to us and which serve to differentiate Christianity from Judaism, Buddhism and Mohammedanism.

The modernist denies most emphatically that he does not believe in the incarnation and divinity of Christ, and yet while he uses the words he does not use them in the sense that the Church does, but rather in the sense that the Unitarian does.

That this is a moderate and conservative statement of the modernist position, let us place side by side words of the great Unitarian divine, William Channing, and those of Dean Rashdall, Professor Baker and Mr. Major.

Channing wrote: "We believe firmly in the divinity of Christ's mission and office, that He spoke with divine authority and was a bright image of the divine perfection. We believe that God dwelt in Him, manifested Himself through Him, taught men by Him and communi-

cated to Him His Divine Spirit without measure. We believe that Jesus Christ was the most glorious display, expression and representative of God to mankind, so that in seeing and knowing Him, we see and know the invisible Father. So that when Christ came God visited the world and dwelt with men more conspicuously than at any former period. In Christ's words we hear God speaking; in His miracles we behold God acting. In His character and life we see an unsullied image of God's purity and love. We believe in the divinity of Christ as this term is often and properly used."

Notwithstanding this glowing description of Christ, we know that Channing did not and could not as a Unitarian believe Him to be a Divine Person, for with the Unitarians there is only one Person in God, and that the Father; Jesus was His human son, unique, singular, more filled with God than any one else, but only a human person.

Let us note now what Dean Rashdall says when he explains what he means when he says that Christ is Divine: "If we believe that every human soul records, reproduces, incarnates God to some extent; if we believe that in the great ethical teachers of mankind the great religious personalities, the founders, the reformers of religion, the heroes, the prophets, the saints, God is more fully revealed than in other men; if we believe that up to the coming of Christ there had been a gradual, continuous and, on the whole, progressive revelation of God (especially, though by no means exclusively, in the development of Jewish Monotheism), then it becomes possible to believe that in one Man the self-revelation of God has been signal, supreme, unique. That we are justified in thinking of God as like Christ, that the character and teaching of Christ contains the fullest disclosure both of the character of God Himself and of His will for man, that is (so far as so momentous a truth can be summed up in a few words), the true message for us of the doctrine of Christ's Divinity."

Is it not clear from these words that while Dean Rashdall speaks of Christ's Divinity, he is not thinking of a Divine Person becoming man, but of a Divine Life filling man?

Let me quote now the words of another acknowledged leader in the ranks of the modernists. Professor Bethune Baker, Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity in the University of Cambridge, writes: "We most absolutely jettison the traditional doctrine that His (i. e., Christ's) personality was not human, but divine. For our modern categories of thought such a statement is the denial of the incarnation. There is for us no such thing as human nature apart from human personality, the distinction that He was man, not a man, while it has deep religious value, has ceased to be tenable. The personality of Jesus is human."

After a careful consideration of these words, it is difficult for me

to see what the difference is between Professor Baker's position and that of the most pronounced Unitarian.

Let me read you the words of the Rev. H. D. A. Major, who has been writing a good deal of late for one of our Church papers, and who had an article entitled 'Modern Churchman or Unitarians?' in the Churchman of May 5th. "Let it be clearly realized," he wrote in a paper on "Jesus, the Son of God," "that Jesus Himself did not claim to be the Son of God in a physical sense, such as the narrative of the Virgin Birth affirms, nor did He claim to be the Son of God in a metaphysical sense, such as is required by the Nicene Theology. He claimed to be the Son of God in a moral sense, in the sense in which all human beings are sons of God."

I can but feel that the teachings above quoted are fraught with grave dangers, and even if not identical with the Unitarian position, are utterly incompatible with the teachings of the Church.

I rejoice that all these writers are in accord in emphasizing the uniqueness of Christ, but I can go much further than they seem willing to go, and say that I look upon Christ as so unique that I find no difficulty in believing that it was in a manner altogether unique that He came into and went out of this world. If one argues, as they seem to do, that Christ was a Son of God and that every man is a Son of God, and that the only difference between Christ and other men is a difference in degree, then it follows inevitably that, though you exhaust all the adjectives in the dictionary in describing the difference, Christ is only a man; but if Christ be the eternal Son of God, then the difference is not only a difference in degree, but in kind, and the great and comforting truth that the eternal Son of God was made man finds its most fitting expression for every believer in the words of the Nicene Creed: I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of God; Begotten of His Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, Very God of Very God * * * who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven, and was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary, and was made man."

One of my chief objections to the writings of the modernists is that they all alike seem to be animated by a desire to get rid of the natural difficulties the human mind feels in contemplating the mystery of the Incarnation, and the solution which they offer and believe to be rational is only found, at the expense of some aspect of the truth. They acknowledge in word that Christ is Divine, that in Him we see "Deity within human limitations," yet they all alike deny directly or by implication that the Person of Jesus is the eternal Son of God who took human nature to Himself. Bishop Gailor, in his last Council address, calls attention to their hazy statements in the following words: "The less definite a religion is, the more readily, it is thought, it will commend itself to the multitude; and popularity, it would seem,

is the test of the truth as well as the success of a religion. We have all become accustomed to the frequent challenge, that we must not teach or preach this or that doctrine, because it will not be understood or accepted by the man in the street, as though the Church had no obligation to instruct or enlighten, but only to adapt its teachings to the wishes and thoughts of the people to whom it ministers."

One feels instinctively in reading much that has been written of late about the incarnation and deity of Christ that the writers have approached these questions with a fixed prejudice against the possibility of the occurrence of anything miraculous or supernatural. I need hardly say that I do not share this feeling. As the result of the joint action of heart and mind and will I believe that Jesus is both God and man, and in this faith I rest content. He is for me, not because of this or that word that He uttered, not because of this or that deed that He performed, but because of His whole revelation to me, and of what He has meant to the world, the one great and supreme miracle, and, therefore, the desire to explain away or deny the miraculous and supernatural in historical Christianity is difficult for me to understand. Being what He was, I am not surprised that He spoke as never man spake, that He did things that no mere man ever did or could do; and yet men, as He foretold, by the power that He supplied and still supplies, have done and will yet do greater works than those at which His disciples marveled.

Here I would venture to call to your attention the weighty words of the Bishop of Carlisle, in the last chapter of his great work on "The Foundation of the Creed":

"If a man who leans towards Christian belief—who perhaps has been brought up in the principles of the Church Catechism, but has found his mind perplexed by the results of criticism or the facts of science—whose faith is cast down but not destroyed—if such a man be troubled by the fact that the creed involves the acceptance of miracles, I would respectfully venture to submit that absolutely to deny the miraculous, that is to say, to deny the possibility of everything which does not conform to the ordinary course of nature—is clearly unphilosophical. To speak of the rules of the ordinary course of nature being applicable to a particular case, implies that all the circumstances of the particular case in which a miracle is alleged are ordinary, whereas in the case of the incarnation the circumstances are by hypothesis extraordinary. A visit of God to man, if the incarnation may be so described, stands by itself; it is not in the course of nature, but distinctly outside of that course; and to assert that the birth and death of Him, who is God made man, must be exactly like the birth and death of those whom He calls His brethren, is plainly unwarranted by the premises. But, having made the observation, and so endeavored to vindicate the abstract reasonableness of that which the creed pro-

pounds, I would venture to advise Christian inquirers not to lean too much upon the miraculous features of our Lord's history, as (according to the view taken by a certain school of apologists) furnishing proof of His Divine character, but rather to reverse the process and to accept the miracles because they believe Him to be Divine. Let the incarnation be the foundation of the miracles, rather than miracles the proof of the incarnation.

When once Christ is acknowledged to be the eternal Son of God, God made man, difficulties will disappear, and He will sooner or later be perceived to be all that the Gospels represent Him to have been, all that the Church still believes Him to be.

As we enter upon our labors it is with a very earnest prayer that we may have the constant guidance and assistance of the Holy Spirit; that we may be saved from all error, ignorance, pride and prejudice, and that, as a result of our deliberations during the sessions of the Council, "the comfortable Gospel of Christ may be truly preached, truly received and truly followed, in all places, to the breaking down of the kingdom of sin, Satan and death." And "now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God, our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen."

Judge Wallace presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That so much of the Bishop's address as refers to the so-called "Modernist Movement" be referred to a committee of five to be appointed by the Bishop, and such committee is directed to report thereon to the Council not later than the opening of the morning session on Thursday. Said committee to be allowed to sit during the sessions of the Council.

REPORT OF HISTORIOGRAPHER.

During the past Council year I have been in correspondence with the rectors or with vestrymen of no less than fifteen or twenty of the Parishes in the Diocese in regard to determining or rectifying the boundaries of their respective Parishes. From some of these I have, as yet, received no reply nor return of the maps sent to them

upon which to record their findings. But several Parishes will, I believe, present petitions to this Council which, when favorably acted upon, will carry us far on our way toward the completion of this work and the preparation of an official Parochial map of the Diocese which was ordered to be made by the last Council. The petition which will come from the seven Parishes in Fauquier County, asking for new lines which will give them the definite boundaries they have never had before, is of special interest and importance. I wish to express my appreciation of the part taken by the Rev. Paul D. Bowden in securing unity of action among the Parochial authorities of the county; and especially of the painstaking work of Mr. H. C. Groome of the Vestry of Hamilton Parish. Before undertaking to draw the lines you will be asked to confirm, he made a careful study of the records of the foundation of all these Parishes as far as they were preserved, and a persistent and successful search for the lost landmarks of the original line between Hamilton and Leeds Parishes which led to several interesting discoveries.

In addition to this special work I have written a number of articles for publication, have rendered some small assistance in the preparation by the Rev. W. A. R. Goodwin, D. D., of the valuable Centennial History of the Virginia Theological Seminary, which is now in press, the proof-sheets of which have largely passed through my hands, and have answered the usual letters which have come to me from many quarters.

I have received from Mr. Fairfax Harrison two papers of historical interest which will become the property of the Diocese. One is a photostat of the original survey of the lines of Dettingen Parish, made in 1745 and recently unearthed by Mr. Harrison among the old records of Prince William County. It sets at rest several points previously in doubt as to the original lines of a number of neighboring Parishes. The other is a photostat of the original Act of the House of Burgesses of 1720, creating the Counties of Spottsylvania and Brunswick on the frontiers of Virginia for protection from the Indians, and their Parishes of St. George and St. Andrew; and granting to foreign Protestants in either of these Parishes the privileges formerly granted to those in the first St. George's Parish, to be freed for ten years from all Parish levies if they should keep and maintain their own ministers. Only an abstract of this important Act is given in Henning. Mr. Harrison procured this complete copy from the records of the Colonial Office in London. Like Mr. Groome, Mr. Harrison, as Dr. Slaughter used to say, "never drinks from the branch if he can find the spring"; and he usually does. He has given me the pleasure of reading in manuscript a part of his forthcoming work on the Landmarks of Old Prince William County, in which is corrected some of my own misinformation, and which will

be of great historical value when completed and published.

These four petitions were referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

The Rev. Nelson P. Dame read the report of the Committee on the Church's attitude toward war.

This report was, on motion, laid on the table.

Judge Scott presented the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED AT THE LAST COUNCIL TO RECOMMEND A CANONICAL RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE CHURCH SCHOOLS AND THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

To the One Hundred and Twenty-eighth Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

At the last Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to prepare a Canon which will create and define a canonical relationship between the Church School System and the Diocese of Virginia, said committee to report at the next Council.

The committee appointed under this resolution begs leave to report as follows:

In order that the existing relationship between the Church School System and the Diocese of Virginia may be perfectly clear we record first the Resolution on Establishment of Church Schools passed by the Council of 1920, as printed on pages 74 and 75 of the Council Journal of that year; and, second, the relevant sections of the Certificate of Incorporation of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, granted by the State Corporation Commission of Virginia June 8th, 1920.

Resolutions of the Council of 1920:

Resolved 1. That the Council does hereby ratify the program of the Executive Committee of the Nation-Wide Campaign for the establishment of a system of Church Schools for boys and girls, to supply the varying needs of the Diocese.

2. That the action of the Bishop and Executive Committee of the Nation-Wide Campaign, looking to the purchase and acquisition of the Chamberlayne School for Boys, the Virginia Randolph Ellett School for Girls, both at Richmond, and St. Anne's School for Girls at Charlottesville, and provision for improvements of same, be approved.

3. That the whole matter be referred to the Hon. R. Carter Scott, the Chancellor of the Diocese, and the sub-committee on schools of said Executive Committee of the Nation-Wide Campaign Fund, with power to organize a corporation, or corporations, as may be determined to be advisable by the Chancellor, and with authority to do all

other things necessary to acquire legal title to the property of the schools and acquire the same.

Certificate of Incorporation of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia—granted June 8th, 1920—relevant sections.

A. The name of this corporation is to be CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

C. The purpose for which it is formed is to name, establish and conduct a system of schools and colleges under the supervision and direction of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, * * *

H. The * * * trustees and their successors shall at all times constitute the members of this corporation; they shall have perpetual succession and power to elect their own successors and to fill any vacancy * * * provided that such vacancy shall be filled by the selection of one of two or more persons nominated therefor by the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia * * * A copy of the Certificate of Incorporation in full is appended as a part of this report. (See Appendix D, III.)

Your committee feel that the above resolutions of the Council and Certificate of Incorporation of the Church Schools create and define sufficiently the essential relationship between the Diocese of Virginia and the Church School System, but, as a further expression of this relationship on the part of the Council, we recommend the passage of the following resolution:

Resolved 1. That in event of a vacancy occurring on the Board of Trustees of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, the next Annual Council shall, in accordance with their Charter, nominate two or more persons from whom selection shall be made by the trustees of said corporation to fill the vacancy.

2. That the Annual Council of this Diocese shall receive an annual report from the Dean of Church Schools as to the general and financial condition of said Church Schools, and the same shall be published in the Diocesan Journal.

3. That Canon X, Article 2, be amended by the insertion of the words "the Dean of Church Schools" after the words "the Treasurer of the Diocese" and before the words "five clergymen and five laymen, etc."

The first and second resolutions in this report were adopted. The third, proposing an amendment to Canon X, was referred to the Committee on Canons. This report, excepting action upon the proposed change in the Canon was then accepted and adopted as a whole.

REPORT OF THE PENSION FUND COMMITTEE.

To the One Hundred and Twenty-eighth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Gentlemen:

The Diocesan Pension Fund Committee desires to make the following report:

We are very glad indeed to be able to report that every Parish and congregation in the Diocese of Virginia has paid its pension fund assessments in full for the year 1922. The rules of the Church Pension Fund direct that their treasurer's books shall be held open until the 31st of March in order to receive belated payments of assessments for the preceding year. The report from the Church Pension Fund office of arrearages on 1922 on January 1st, 1923, show, as usual, about twenty churches in the Diocese which were in arrears. This required a number of letters from the Secretary to the Treasurers of congregations which were in arrears so that in one or two cases the Secretary had to write three or four times before the matter was finally settled and the assessment paid in full. The reason in almost every case has been that these churches permitted the monthly assessments to accumulate rather than paying in full from month to month so that at the close of the year they were liable in some cases for the whole year's assessment. We would recommend that the Parishes pay their assessments either monthly or quarterly and so avoid the danger of the assessments accumulating until they reach an amount which may be hard to handle.

One of our Clergy, the Rev. Joseph Mitchell, the oldest colored clergyman in the Diocese, retired and went on the pension fund during the past year. An interesting point in connection with Mr. Mitchell's pension as showing the methods of the Church Pension Fund, arose from the fact that Mr. Mitchell was ordained shortly after he was thirty-six and consequently he was not guaranteed the full retiring pension of \$600.00. The rule of the Pension Fund is that a clergyman ordained after that age will receive such pen-

sion only as the premiums paid for him will buy. His pension, therefore, will depend upon his years of service and the salary that he has received. In Mr. Mitchell's case, he desired to retire upon reaching the age of sixty-eight in 1921, but your Secretary learned that he would not receive \$600.00 if he retired at that time, whereas if he continued in service for a year later, he would receive practically that amount. Mr. Mitchell continued at work until his sixty-ninth birthday in August, 1922, at which time he retired and was granted a pension of \$592.91.

Another clergyman, not canonically connected with this Diocese, but in charge of one of our churches under license from the Bishop of Virginia, Rev. S. E. Prentiss, of Claremont, in the Diocese of Southern Virginia, retired during the year and received a disability pension of \$600.00.

One of our Clergy, the Rev. John J. Lanier, resigned his Parish during the year and went upon the non-parochial list. The rules of the Pension Fund permitted him to continue paying his own pension fund assessment based upon a technical salary of \$1,200.00. Mr. Lanier, therefore, will be able to retain the benefits of the Church Pension Fund.

Another clergyman, not canonically connected with this Diocese but working here under license of the Bishop, the Rev. G. W. Hurlbut, during the year withdrew from the Episcopal Church and entered the Presbyterian. The rules of the Pension Fund provided that by his leaving the ministry of this Church to enter the ministry of another, automatically deprived him of any Pension Fund benefits which might have come to him if he had remained in the ministry of this Church.

Another point of interest as indicating the effort of the Church Pension Fund to minister to the Church as effectively as the business methods will permit, is shown by the following fact; the daughters of the late Rev. Richard Kidder Meade, of Charlottesville, have been the recipients of a pension from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund for a number of years, and this pension was in the name of Miss Lucy B. Meade and was so reported to the Church Pension Fund. Miss Lucy Meade died during the year 1922, and at the request of the Bishop, the Pension Fund continued the pension in the same amount to the two surviving daughters of Mr. Meade. So these two ladies are assured of their pension as long as they live.

Our Diocese was very fortunate in that there were no deaths of our Clergy during the year 1922, though within the past month from this date three of our Clergy have passed away.

The total amount of income of the Disabled Clergy Fund and the

Widows' and Orphans' Fund, which was sent to the Church Pension Fund last year was:

This money was applied, as usual, in the following way: \$300.00 was returned to the Diocese for the expenses of the Treasurer of the Pension Fund Committee, the assessments on all clerical salaries paid by the Diocese and on all stipends to ordained missionaries of the Diocesan Missionary Society were paid; the balance will be returned. Unless the Pension Fund Committee gives some further direction as to the expenditure of the balance, it will be returned, according to our rule, as a cash rebate to those Parishes in the Diocese which paid their assessment in full last year. This rebate will be paid about the first of July. Last year the cash rebate, arising out of the income of 1921, amounted to a total of \$1,907.89.

It was learned in the early part of 1922 that while all Pension Fund assessments for 1921 had been paid, there were five or six Clergy in the Diocese who were in arrears on the payment of Pension Fund assessments by reason of the fact that their full assessments had not been paid in the years 1918, 1919 or 1920.

In the case of two of our Clergy these arrearages were quite large, and the Secretary of the Church Pension Fund stated that there would be serious loss in the amount of the Church Pension Fund benefit which would be paid in case of death to either of these clergymen on account of the fact of this arrearage.

Your Secretary secured the full information, presented the matter to the vestry of each church which was in arrears and during the year received from each vestry the full amount of arrears with interest, all of which was forwarded to New York. We are now able to say with a great deal of pleasure that every clergyman who has ministered continuously in this Diocese since 1917 is as fully protected as the Church Pension Fund can protect by reason of the fact that all assessments for each year have been paid in full.

This is true with one exception. One clergyman who said he did not believe in the Church Pension Fund instructed his vestry not to pay the assessment and persisted in that stand after the matter was clearly explained to him. As his congregation was a very small and weak one, your Secretary did not feel that they could be pressed to pay after their rector had taken this stand. He has since left this field and come to another, in which his Parish is paying his assessment in full, and will continue to do so.

The Diocesan Missionary Society has adopted the rule that it will not renew the appropriation to any Parish in the Diocese in which the Pension Fund assessment for the preceding year has not been paid in full. We have not yet been compelled to invoke this rule though we have had once or twice to call it to the attention of vestries which seemed to be making no effort to pay arrearages.

While it is true that every clergyman who has ministered continuously in this Diocese since 1917 is fully protected, your Secretary has learned that a number of clergymen who have come into this Diocese since 1917, are not fully protected by reason of the fact that Pension Fund assessments due from fields where they ministered before coming to this Diocese, have not been paid. Your Secretary has recently secured a list of these Clergy and is endeavoring to collect these arrearages. He has already succeeded in straightening out three of these cases, and hopes that eventually all arrearages can be paid.

It may be of interest to add here a portion of the report which has been received from the Church Pension Fund Committee in New York, which shows that "the assessment payments from the entire Church for the year just closed are in excess of those for 1921, thus showing that the universal support given the pension system by the various Parishes and other organizations in our Church is continuing in a most satisfactory way."

"The annual grants of the Church Pension Fund proper up to March 1, 1923, have reached the total of over \$272,000.00. This figure added to the total of the annual grants being carried on account of the General Clergy Relief Fund and the other merged funds makes a grand total of over \$468,000.00 per annum."

"I may add that at their meeting on December 12th, 1922, the Trustees renewed for the coming year their resolutions of December 20, 1921, granting in addition to the customary annuity an immediate payment of \$1,000.00 to the widows of clergymen dying in active service whose assessments are fully paid."

"The outstanding action of the year, although not strictly within the Church Pension Fund proper, has been the formation of the Church Life Insurance Corporation with the object of offering to the Clergy and to certain classes of lay workers in the Church various forms of life insurance policies at the same rates as those of the converted War Risk Insurance of the United States Government. This office will be very glad at any time to answer inquiries

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in regard to life insurance from any of the Clergy or others who might be eligible and are interested."

REPORT OF DIOCESAN SECRETARY OF THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY FOR 1922.

There are nine Branches in the Diocese, two of which were organized in 1890; those at Alexandria and Winchester. The Branch at Alexandria has the distinction of having had only one Branch Secretary during that time.

Four Branches were organized in 1922—at Cherrydale, Hague, Weddell Memorial Church in Richmond, and at Tappahannock.

The first of this year the total membership in the Diocese was 347; 65 Working and Honorary Associates; 8 Married Branch Helpers; 100 members; 94 Probationers and 80 Candidates.

The total income of the Branches was \$742.93, and their expenses were \$417.03.

The Branches gave to Missions \$36.00 in money and \$66.00 in work. Their gifts for Social Service work totaled \$123.96 in cash and \$344.64 in work. Two branches made gifts to their parish to the amount of \$33.00 and one Branch sent \$2.00 to the Central Office from Festival Week. \$11.65 was received by the Diocese from dues.

Two Branches had talks on Social Service subjects and one had a talk on Missions. A weekly class in Domestic Science and First Aid, with talks on nursing, was held by one Branch.

In a letter from Miss McGuire, National Secretary, in March, she wrote that Virginia had gained 157 in membership last year, which was the largest proportionate growth then reported.

The Secretary called the attention of the Council to the amendment to the Constitution adopted by the Council of 1921, and referred by the Council of 1922 to this present Council for final action. The proposed amendment is as follows:

Insert in Article II, section (b), line 5, after the word "ministers," the following: "And that every such parish or church having more than two hundred communicants reported to the previous annual Council, shall be entitled to send an additional delegate for each two

hundred communicants or major fraction thereof above the first two hundred; but in no case to exceed three lay delegates in all from any one congregation."

This amendment, being put to the vote, was lost.
Dr. Ribble presented the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS.

The Committee on Credentials makes the following report:

All credentials are in proper form except the following: Those of the delegates from Christ Church, Fredericksville Parish, in Albemarle County, for which two delegates are named, when Christ Church is only entitled to one. One delegate has been withdrawn, and we find that the other delegate, Dr. J. H. Dillard, has been duly elected, and we recommend that he be seated; St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, Va.; Emmanuel Parish, Fauquier, St. Luke's and Emmanuel Churches each having elected delegates; Christ Church, Ridley Parish, Culpeper County; Emmanuel Church, Greenwood Parish, Albemarle County; Emmanuel Church, Slaughter Parish, Culpeper County; St. James' Church, Hamilton Parish, Fauquier County; Christ church, Frederick Parish, Frederick County.

Attention is called to the fact that these churches are parts of parishes, and that certificates should be made out in the name of the parish and not of one individual church of the parish. Some of these churches made the same mistake last year, and we suggest greater care in filling out reports.

It appears that the delegates, with the exception of those from Emmanuel Parish, Fauquier, have been duly elected, and we recommend that they be seated.

In the matter of St. Luke's and Emmanuel Churches of Emmanuel Parish, Fauquier County, we report that the delegates have not been properly elected, but the persons named, Mr. L. M. Brittle and Mr. William W. Gulick, being present, we recommend that they be given the privileges of the floor of the Council without vote.

It has been satisfactorily established by evidence before the Committee that Judge J. K. M. Norton, delegate, and T. Calvert Perry, alternate, have been duly elected delegates from St. Paul's Church in Fairfax Parish, Arlington County, and we recommend they be seated, although no certificates have been filed.

There should be separate certificates where there are two delegates from a church or parish.

The Council convened, sitting as a Board of Missions, Bishop Brown presiding. After the opening prayers and the singing of a hymn, the Rev. E. L. Woodward, M. D., read the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

To Our Brethren of the Council:

Immediately after Pentecost we have an inspired report of the state of the Church. It reads: "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized. . . . And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, and in breaking of bread and in the prayers." Steadfast continuance in the apostolic faith and fellowship, and in the sacramental life and in the worship of the Church—such is the ideal state of the Church for every generation. We cannot do better than to test by this standard the special problems of the Church in our Diocese and in the world today.

Steadfastness in the apostolic teaching is the first foundation stone of the Spirit-filled, victorious Church. "The old order changeth, giving place to new." Instability, change, transition are writ large for him who would discern the signs of the times. But, for the Church, is it the change of decay and dissolution, or rather the transition to a more abundant life and more vigorous growth? Movement is evident, but whither does it trend? If the Church's progress is encumbered by outworn habiliments of an age long dead, she must cast them off as she girds herself for conflict of a new day. But she *lives*, arrayed in the seamless robe of the Christ-Faith once delivered to the saints, and she must preserve it inviolate as her very life, that it be not rent by heedless or irreverent hands. The collective witness and blood-bought Faith of the historic Church of the ages is a priceless heritage and may not be bartered for any congeries of ancient or modern speculations, however brilliantly championed. And yet the Church must leave open the window of her mind and heart for the ever-fresh manifestation of the Spirit of Truth, promised by Him who is the Way, the Truth and the Life, whose Presence abides in the Church.

Surely, at this time of the returning tide of Faith no report on the State of the Church should fail to stress the fundamental importance of this question to the Church and to all devout Christians. Yet the issue is far too immense and the problem far too complex to

be dealt with here except it be to suggest a few guiding thoughts that may be of help and comfort to earnest defenders of the Faith and to devout seekers after Truth.

The first of these is the principle of supreme loyalty to Christ as the Son of God in thought and life. A loyalty like that of Thomas, banishing at last all doubt and crying out from the inmost heart, "My Lord and my God." A loyalty like that of Peter, fearful no longer for self, forgiven, restored: "Lord, thou knowest all things; thou knowest that I love thee." A loyalty like that of Paul, the proud and intolerant intellect humbled as that of a bond-slave before the vision of the glorified Christ, giving the glad testimony: "For me to live is Christ" . . . "I have kept the Faith."

Such a loyalty will not find its satisfaction in any conception of His Person less exalted than that of the Catholic, or universal creed of the historic Church—"Very God of Very God,—Made Man." If it be possible for this or any future generation to find in human language any more sublime definition of His perfect Godhead and any more beautiful expression of His perfect Manhood, the loyal Church and Christian will eagerly welcome and appropriate it. But newly formulated truth cannot contradict or discredit the truth. The newly sought "creed of the indwelling Christ-life," if found and made of universal acceptance in the Church, will not impair by a hair's breadth a single article of the ancient and time-tested creed of the indwelling Christ-faith. Nor will it impute creedal error to the myriads of true and humble men of heart, simple and sage alike, who through the centuries have expressed and shall express their highest devotion to their Saviour and God in the words of the Nicene Creed. Perhaps the hands of reverence and humility may add new touches of beauty in interpretation to the Faith of the ages, but by no possible chance will such hands efface a single line of true beauty already drawn. And every new touch will be made with the assured conviction that at best "we know in part," and that the combined portrayal of all human history and human language must fail of the ineffable Reality.

"As has been well said, men are moved not by the understanding of an idea, but by belief in the idea. Intelligent students will not reject a religion which has withstood fierce and insidious attack for sixty generations. The effect that the Christian religion has had upon the world is sufficient to satisfy the inquiring mind as to the fact that faith in Jesus Christ as the Son of God does bring salvation and does heal the ills to which the soul of man is subject. When with broken heart we come to our Saviour for help, we gain no comfort by solving problems, depending only on what our intellects grasp and what we can understand. We come so often because we cannot understand! We gain no strength by reliance on any other than God

Himself—God the Father—God the Son—and God the Holy Ghost. When souls burdened with sin look for salvation, they want the Christ whom Paul knew and preached. They must look to God and a Saviour who is God Himself."

The second foundation of the Spirit-filled, all-conquering Church is steadfast continuance in the apostolic fellowship. Apostolic teaching and fellowship cannot be divorced. Zeal for the truth as it is in Jesus must be associated with charity for Christian brethren who seem to us at times so slow of heart to believe all that is written of the Christ. The faith of the Church was not imperilled, but wonderfully strengthened by the loving sympathy, apart perhaps from understanding, which retained Thomas in the innermost fellowship of the apostolic company until he had vanquished his spirit of doubting protest. It was the spirit of their Master, who prayed "that they may all be one." The same spirit is spreading through the Church today as never before since the Reformation. It will soon find outward expression in the World Conference of Faith and Order, looking forward, in the atmosphere of prayer and of Christian fellowship, to a reunited Christendom. We must not, we will not, forget that it is in the atmosphere of apostolic fellowship alone that the Risen Christ can manifest Himself in blessing to His Church, and that in that atmosphere He can manifest Himself even to those disciples whose eyes are holden.

Fifty years ago our Church was in the throes of a controversy which seemed to men of that day as one of supreme moment, and that resulted lamentably in schism and in the genesis of the Reformed Episcopal Church. The Rev. Dr. E. L. Goodwin, in his article on the life of Bishop John Johns, appearing in the last Virginia Churchman, writes a passage which seems to convey a prophetic warning lest we in our day fall, or cause others to fall, into the same condemnation. "These were troublous times in the Church at large. The impact of the Oxford, or "Tractarian" Movement, which had been gaining impetus for thirty years, was being felt in full force. Its adherents had become self-confident and perhaps a little arrogant. It was a question whether Evangelical Churchmanship was to be allowed standing room in the Church. Perhaps from the temper of the times, men were irritable and suspicious, and failed to understand one another. Extremists on both sides were supposed to represent their respective parties, and motives as well as measures were attacked with bitterness." Mark well the words: "*Men were irritable and suspicious and failed to understand one another.*" That is, they failed to continue steadfast in the spirit of apostolic fellowship. Therefore they failed to understand one another in attempting to interpret the apostolic teaching, and were incapable not only of agreement, but even of suspended judgment. It behooves us to use all

godly diligence to prevent such a tragedy repeating itself in our day. The truth is mighty and will prevail, both in the Church and through the Church in the world, if it is steadfastly championed in the spirit of Christian forbearance and brotherhood for all those who love Him and look for His appearing.

But the apostolic fellowship is the attainment of the mind of Christ also in *His Social Gospel* overflowing all human relationships. And while on the one side it is in inseparable contact with the apostolic teaching, on the other it bears equally close relationship to the other two foundation stones of the Church, its *sacramental life* and its *common worship*. Here indeed we touch the individual and corporate Christian life in manifold relationships. Of these we single out several as worthy of special commendation to our brethren in this Diocese at this time.

For three years the Diocese has preserved a position of outstanding leadership in the great advance movement called the Nation-Wide Campaign. Splendid as has been the accomplishment in itself as measured by the past or by results in the Church elsewhere, even more splendid is the Pentecostal spirit of co-operation under the leadership of our Bishop and of glad sacrifice for the cause of the Church at large which has made that accomplishment a reality. It is of the utmost importance to the spiritual welfare of the Church in this Diocese and in every parish therein that this spirit be permanently cherished and made fruitful.

The importance of personal contact in the social life of the Church needs re-emphasis. On the part of the clergy the pastoral office of the ministry should be magnified. The need of this, especially in the rural and smaller churches, is oft-times keenly felt, though generally inarticulate. By systematic and constant visiting the true pastor will make friends of the members of every family in his parish, visiting them in their sorrows and in their joys, being a shepherd to his people, young and old alike. On the part of the laity the things that make for the true Church fellowship, of family with family, and man with man, should be fostered. Among these none is perhaps so important as the observance of Sunday, not as a mere holiday, but primarily as a holy day, together with habitual attendance at Church of the family *as such*, sitting together wherever possible in the familiar pew, hallowed by sacred memories.

Steadfast continuance "in Breaking of Bread and in the Prayers," that is to say, the primary place in Christian worship accorded to the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and the public worship of the Church pervaded with a liturgic orderliness and reverent seemliness worthy of Him who brought Order out of chaos, and beheld that it was good.

The preeminence of the Holy Communion, together with the enshrining of that service and the whole Book of Common Prayer in

matchless diction and in orderliness of rubrical direction, is a characteristic of this Church of ours. O that our clergy and laity would claim for every Church in the Diocese the unrealized glories of worship as prescribed in the Prayer Book! That the Prayer Book rubrics were generally understood and conscientiously followed! That a pervading spirit of reverence would banish triviality and listlessness from our worship. That the singing and responses of our congregations were general and gave utterance to the deep things of all hearts! That the worshippers in our Churches were sensible of the painful incongruity with the whole spirit of our worship that in scores of our older Churches the board division beneath the old pew seats should never have been removed, rendering it practically impossible for a devout congregation of today to comply with the rubrical injunction to "kneel" in prayer. Or that our clergy and choirs were sensible of that other anomaly of a congregation standing in dumb helplessness while the choir sings for them an elaborate Te Deum and other congregational parts of the musical service. Or, most distressing of all, the custom particularly in city churches, at large communions, for many communicants to press forward in unseemly droves to the Holy Table, in order to depart home, leaving a faithful remnant to complete the service of the Great Thanksgiving and Highest Praise and to receive the Benediction of Peace. Brethren of the clergy and laity, it is indeed timely that an effectual remedy should be found for these and similar conditions, in order that we may regain for our day and generation the spirit of deep reverence in sacrament and worship which has been inherent in the Church from the beginning.

Let us close with our thoughts enlarged and our hearts uplifted by a fresh realization of our oneness with the Church of Pentecost, of our oneness in Christ with all faithful people of every age and clime, race and condition of men. And let us re-voice that glorious sense of oneness in the words of the Eucharistic Prayer preserved in that earliest of post-apostolic Christian writing—the Didache, or "The Teaching of the Twelve Apostles":

"As this broken bread was scattered upon the mountains and gathered together became one, so let Thy Church be gathered together from the ends of the earth into Thy kingdom, for Thine is the glory and the power through Jesus Christ, for ever. Amen."

Mr. Brydon presented and read extracts from the Report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society which had been previously distributed in printed form to the members of the Council. (See Appendix A, II.)

The Rev. R. B. Nelson presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the general plan, as outlined in this report, for reduction of aid given by the D. M. S. to weak parishes, be approved.

This resolution was adopted.

The Board of Missions then took under consideration the Report of the Board of Apportionment, recommending the Program of the Diocese for 1924. (See Appendix A, II. [b].)

The Program is as follows:

The items in this program were discussed one by one and each item was adopted.

After the singing of a hymn and taking an offering for the Bishop's Emergency Fund, the Council adjourned until tomorrow morning.

THURSDAY, MAY 17TH—10 A. M.

The Council was called to order, Bishop Brown presiding. After the Creed and opening prayers the minutes of yesterday's meetings were read and approved.

The Committee on New Parishes made its report through

its Chairman, Dr. Goodwin. The report consisted of four petitions, each of which was presented with its accompanying papers, and the recommendation of the Committee.

PETITION TO THE COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA FOR A RECTIFICATION OF PARISH BOUNDARY LINES IN THE COUNTY OF FAUQUIER.

We, the Vestries of the several parishes in the County of Fauquier, do hereby unite in a petition to the Council of the Diocese of Virginia for a general rectification of the parish boundaries in this county.

After a comprehensive study of existing boundary lines we find that between certain parishes no known boundaries exist; that in one case the parish church is not situated within the parish boundaries, and that this parish is divided into two parts, separated by the interposition of two other parishes; that one parish, as now constituted, has ceased to function, having no minister, vestry or congregation. We hold that these conditions are obviously unsatisfactory and not conducive to the orderly progress of church development.

We therefore pray:

That the boundary lines of the several parishes in the County of Fauquier be re-established, as follows:

Hamilton Parish—Beginning at the mouth of Carter's Run on Rappahannock River; thence up Carter's Run to a point opposite Enon Church, on the Carter's Run Valley Road; thence southeast ten miles, one furlong a straight line to the intersection of the Fauquier-Prince William County boundary line by the Warrenton and Alexandria turnpike; thence southeast five miles, two furlongs with the Fauquier-Prince William line to the intersection of that line by Kettle Run; thence west slightly south three miles, five and one-half furlongs a straight line to Auburn; thence southwest ten miles, six and one-half furlongs a straight line, following the Cedar Run and Emmanuel Parish lines to Fox's Mill at the mouth of Great Run on Rappahannock River; thence up that river to the beginning.

(This parish is now divided by the parishes of Emmanuel and Cedar Run, and neither its parish church or the chapel at Baldwin's Ridge is included in its present boundaries.)

Leeds Parish—Beginning at the top of the Blue Ridge Mountains by the shortest line to the head of Crooked Run; thence down that run to Delaplane's Mill; thence south slightly west eleven miles, one furlong a straight line to Vernon Mills on Thumb Run; thence down that run to Rappahannock River; thence with the Fauquier County boundary line to the beginning.

(The boundaries of this parish are not known, except that the county line is presumably its western boundary.)

Meade Parish—Beginning at the top of the Blue Ridge Mountains by the shortest line to the head of Crooked Run; thence down that run to Delaplane's Mill; thence southeast six miles, six furlongs a straight line to Five Points and by the same line continued to Cromwell's Run; thence down that run to the Fauquier-Loudoun County boundary line.

(The southern boundary of this parish is not known.)

Johns Parish—Beginning at the intersection of the Fauquier-Loudoun County boundary line by Cromwell's Run; thence up that run to the southeastern corner of Meade Parish; thence southeast seven miles, five furlongs a straight line to the eastern angle of the offset in the Fauquier-Prince William County boundary line below Round Top Mountain.

(The southern boundary of this parish is not known.)

Cedar Run Parish—Beginning at the intersection of the Fauquier-Prince William County boundary line by Kettle Run; thence with the Fauquier-Prince William line to its corner with the Fauquier-Stafford line; thence with the latter line to its junction with Deep Run; thence up that run to its headspring; thence northwest eleven miles a straight line with the Emmanuel Parish line to the intersection of the Hamilton Parish line by Licking Run; thence northeast five miles, six furlongs a straight line with the Hamilton Parish line to Auburn; thence east slightly north three miles, five and one-half furlongs to the beginning.

(This parish has no minister, vestry or congregation, but a church building (St. Stephen's), in which services were formerly conducted, is still held by trustees. The boundaries proposed in this petition would reconstruct this parish by adding parts of Hamilton and Emmanuel Parishes, including Grace Church, the Vestry of which would become the vestry of the new Cedar Run Parish and could do doubt also obtain from the court a transfer of the St. Stephen's Church property.)

Piedmont Parish—Beginning at Delaplane's Mill on Crooked Run; thence south slightly west eleven miles, one furlong a straight line with the Leeds Parish line to Vernon Mills on Thumb Run; thence down that run to Rappahannock River; thence down Rappahannock River to the mouth of Carter's Run; thence up that run to a point opposite to Enon Church, on the Carter's Run Valley Road (Hamilton Parish corner); thence northeast three miles, five furlongs to Sinclair's Old Distillery on the Warrenton-Marshall Road; thence north slightly east six miles, two furlongs a straight line to the southeastern corner of Meade Parish on Cromwell's Run; thence northwest

seven miles, five furlongs a straight line with the Meade Parish line to the beginning.

(The northern and western boundaries of this parish are not known and its eastern boundary is unsatisfactorily defined by a county road.)

Whittle Parish—Beginning at the southeastern corner of Meade Parish on Cromwell's Run south slightly west six miles, two furlongs a straight line to Sinclair's Old Distillery on the Warrenton-Marshall Road; thence southwest three miles, five furlongs a straight line to a point on Carter's Run opposite to Enon Church, on the Carter's Run Valley Road (Hamilton Parish corner); thence southeast ten miles, one furlong a straight line to the intersection of the Fauquier-Prince William County boundary line by the Warrenton and Alexandria Turnpike; thence with the Fauquier-Prince William line to the western angle of the offset on High Acre Ridge; thence northwest six miles, three and one-half furlongs a straight line to the beginning.

(The northern boundary of this parish is not known, and its southern line apparently includes the parish church of Hamilton Parish.)

Emmanuel Parish—Beginning at the mouth of Great Run on Rappahannock River; thence northeast five miles, one furlong a straight line with the Hamilton Parish line to the intersection of that line by Licking Run; thence southeast eleven miles a straight line to the headspring of Deep Run; thence down that run to Rappahannock River; thence up Rappahannock River to the beginning.

(This is geographically a large parish with its parish church at Remington on the border of Culpeper County. The division of this parish seems desirable for the reasons given in urging the reconstruction of Cedar Run Parish.)

(The delegates from Meade and Piedmont Parishes stated that the petition was acceptable to their respective vestries, though they had failed to hold Vestry meetings in time to give it formal ratification.)

The Committee on New Parishes recommended that this petition for rectification of parish boundaries in Fauquier County be granted. This recommendation was adopted unanimously by the Council.

The Rev. Dr. Goodwin then moved that Mr. L. M. Brittle be admitted to a seat and vote in Council as the delegate from Emmanuel Parish, and Mr. W. W. Gulick as the delegate from Cedar Run Parish. Carried.

2. PETITION FOR THE FORMATION OF ASHLAND PARISH.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Your petitioners, being the Vestry of the Church of St. James the Less, in Ashland, Hanover County, Va., do respectfully represent:

That at the Council of the Diocese held in May, 1866, the Church of St. James the Less, Hanover County, was admitted into union with the Council. (See Journal of that year, page 29.) No territorial limits were assigned, as in the creation of a new parish, and the status of the congregation became, and has since remained, that of a Separate Congregation. As such it has always chosen its Vestry and had representation in the Council.

At that time the Town of Ashland was supposed to be in St. Martin's Parish. Some years ago, however, the original lines between St. Paul's and St. Martin's Parishes were discovered in the proceedings of the General Assembly of 1726, by which St. Martin's Parish was established; that parish being defined as "that part of the parish

of St. Paul's, in the County of Hanover, which lieth in the neck between the North and South branches of Pamunkey River, and also that part of the parish which lieth above Stonehorse Creek." (See Report of the Historiographer Journal of 1912, page 52.) This shows Ashland to lie well within the limits of St. Paul's Parish, and it has since been so reported.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Bishop and the Council of 1922, as shown in the Journal, we hereby petition the Council for a division of the Parish of St. Paul's, in Hanover County, by the following line, namely:

Beginning at a point on the South Anna River, formerly known as the South branch of the Pamunkey River, two and one-half miles due east from the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad, and thence running southerly parallel with the said railroad and at every point two and one-half miles due east of the same to the Henrico County line. And all that part of the said parish lying east of the said line to be and remain the Parish of St. Paul's in Hanover County and all that part thereof lying west of the said line to be created a new parish to be known as Ashland Parish which will be bounded as follows: on the east by the above line of division; on the south by the northern boundary of Henrico County; on the west by a line running in a northerly direction from the northwest corner of Henrico County to the head of Stone Horse Creek or, as it is now called, Stone Creek, and by Stone Creek; and on the north by the South Anna River.

By this division the new parish of Ashland will be approximately ten miles long, with an average width of about seven miles, with one church and about 120 communicants. St. Paul's Parish will still contain nearly one-half of the county, with two churches which will remain entirely unaffected, either financially, or in their sphere of work, by this division.

And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

(The delegate from St. Paul's Parish, Hanover, stated that this petition was acceptable to the Vestry of his parish.)

The Committee on New Parishes recommended the granting of this petition. This recommendation was adopted by the Council, thereby admitting Ashland Parish into union with the Council of the Diocese.

3. PETITION FOR ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARY LINE BETWEEN COPLE AND MONTROSS PARISHES.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Your petitioners, being the vestries of Cople Parish and of Montross Parish, in the County of Westmoreland, would respectfully represent: that at the Convention of the Diocese held in May, 1850, an "independent parish, to be known as Montross Parish," was separated from Cople Parish, and admitted into union with the Convention, but so far as can be discovered no boundary lines between the new parish and Cople Parish were established.

We therefore present this our petition, that the following line be established as the line between the two parishes; the same being the line between Cople and Montross Magisterial Districts; namely:

Beginning on the Maryland line at the mouth of Nomini Creek, thence up the said creek to a headwater thereof approximately one-half mile southeast of Nomini Grove, on the main county road; thence by the said Magisterial District line to the line of Richmond County. All that portion of Westmoreland County lying east of this line shall be and remain Cople Parish.

And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

This petition is authorized by appropriate resolutions recorded in the minutes of the vestries.

The Committee on New Parishes recommended that this petition be granted. The recommendation was adopted unanimously by the Council.

4. PETITION FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF SCOTT PARISH.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

After due notice given in conformity to Canon XII, the members of this church residing within the limits of the boundaries hereinafter set out, assembled in Christ Church, Gordonsville, Va., on the seventeenth day of April, 1922, and in further conformity with said Canon, appointed W. W. Scott a committee to "take such measures as might be necessary" to invoke the action of the Council to divide the Parish of St. Thomas, and to establish a new parish under the name and style of Scott Parish.

This Committee has further complied with said Canon by giving formal notice to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and to the Vestry of St. Thomas' Church, of their intention to apply for such separation, within the time limit prescribed by said Canon; and have set out in said notice a "description of the proposed line of division" as follows:

Beginning at the corner of Orange with Albemarle and Louisa Counties about one mile southwest of Gordonsville, thence with the line of Orange and Louisa to Mallory's Ford on the North Anna River; thence along the public road via Madison Run Station to the old Fredericksburg Plank Road; thence with said plank road to its intersection with the turnpike near Wilhoit's Store; thence with said turnpike to Rapidan River; thence with said river to the Greene County line; thence with said line to the corner with Albemarle and Orange; thence with the Albemarle line to the beginning; all the area within said lines to be and to constitute the parish to be established and known as Scott Parish.

Said area contains the independent congregation known as Christ Church at Gordonsville, the Organized Mission of Barbour Memorial, Barboursville, and the mission of Epiphany, Somerset; is about ten miles long and six miles wide; embraces about ninety-one resident communicants and fifteen non-resident communicants.

The Committee respectfully files this, its petition, for the division of the parish on the lines hereinbefore set out, and has sent a copy thereof more than two months before the meeting of the Council to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and to the Vestry of St. Thomas' Church at Orange, considering the petition itself the best form of notice it could devise.

W. W. SCOTT, *Committee*.

The Committee on New Parishes recommended that this petition be granted, and that Scott Parish be established as a parish in union with the Council. This recommendation was adopted unanimously.

5. NEVE PARISH.

The Committee on New Parishes report that by the establishment of Scott Parish the part of St. Thomas' Parish which lies in Greene County is entirely cut off from the eastern end of the parish in which St. Thomas' Parish Church is situated, at Orange Court House. And that further, while there are a number of missions in Greene County, there is no organized Mission Church or Separate Congregation. The Committee recommend that the Council, exercising its right of eminent domain, erect that part of the territory of St. Thomas' Parish in Greene County into a new parish to be called Neve Parish, in honor of the Rev. Frederick W. Neve, D. D., the founder of the mountain work in this Diocese, and for many years past the Arch-deacon of the Blue Ridge.

This recommendation was adopted unanimously.
Dr. Tucker presented the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The report consisted of two proposed amendments to Canons, which the Committee presented separately with recommendation.

(1) A proposed new Canon, to be numbered Canon XII, the remaining Canons to be renumbered.

CANON XII.

Of Convocations.

Section 1. The parishes in this Diocese shall be grouped in five Convocations, as follows:

(1) The Albemarle Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Albemarle, Louisa, Orange and Greene.

(2) The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier, Loudoun, Madison, Prince William and Rappahannock.

(3) The Rappahannock Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Caroline, Essex, King George, Lancaster, Middlesex, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford and Westmoreland.

(4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Charles City, Fluvanna, Gloucester, Goochland, Hanover, Henrico, King and Queen, King William, Mathews and New Kent.

(5) The Valley Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Clarke, Frederick, Page, Rockingham, Shenandoah and Warren.

Changes in Convocation boundaries shall be authorized by Council on joint application of the Convocations interested.

Section 2. Every clergyman settled as rector, assistant minister or minister in charge shall be a member of the Convocation in which his principal church is situated.

Section 3. The Convocations shall make provision for lay representation.

Section 4. The Convocations may enact such rules and by-laws as may be necessary for their own guidance.

Dr. Goodwin moved to amend Section 1 by inserting after the words "Shenandoah and Warren" at the end of the list of counties the following proviso: "*Provided, however, that the congregations or persons constituting the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese shall not be understood as being included in these Convocational districts.*"

Dr. Smith moved as a substitute for Dr. Goodwin's amendment the following: "*Provided, that nothing herein shall affect the provisions in the Canon 'Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction.'*"

Dr. Smith's substitute was adopted. Section 1 as thus amended was adopted. Section 2 was adopted.

The Council suspended consideration of this report to proceed to elections. The Chair called for the election of the Standing Committee. The tellers took the ballot and retired.

The Council resumed consideration of the Report of the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. A. Stuart Gibson moved to strike out the word "shall" in Section 3, and insert in its place the word "may." This amendment was lost by a vote of 47 ayes to 60 nos.

Section 3 was then adopted.

Section 4 was adopted.

This new Canon, as thus amended, was adopted as a whole by a canonical majority.

The Committee on Canons presented the following, recommending that this Canon, as prepared by the Committee on A Central Representative Body in a Parish, be adopted, excluding the first paragraph of Section 1.

Dr. Goodwin moved to amend by reinserting the first paragraph as written in the Committee's Report. This motion was carried. The Canon as thus amended was adopted by a

canonical majority. It is as follows: (Subsequent Canons to be renumbered.)

CANON XVII.

Of Parish Councils.

Section 1. In every parish with a single rector and vestry, their parochial authority, and their consequent primary responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church, extends throughout the territorial limits of their parish and should be so recognized and exercised.

In every parish which contains, in addition to the original parish church, one or more Separate Congregations or Mission Churches, organized as provided in these Canons, there shall be a Parish Council, to consist of the rector or minister in charge of each of the said organized churches or congregations therein, and one or more lay members of the vestry thereof. The lay members shall be elected annually by their respective vestries, and shall continue in office until their successors are duly elected. The Parish Council shall elect a Chairman and a Secretary, and shall adopt such rules for its own guidance as may be deemed necessary, subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Parish Council to exercise the authority which belongs to the parish as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout its borders, so that the parish may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. Especially it shall be its duty to encourage the planting of missions or mission Sunday schools where necessary in the parish, to determine their location and their status and to foster their growth and efficiency, and to provide as far as possible that the services of the Church shall be available to all the people within its territory, and that its united influence be exerted in matters pertaining to the welfare of the community. *Provided, however,* that the Parish Council shall not encroach upon the rights or duties of the vestries of organized congregations within its parish; but it may act with them in an advisory capacity by their express invitation.

Mr. Mayo presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on the State of the Church be sent to the Southern Churchman and the Virginia Churchman, with the request that it be published therein.

The Rev. Elmer C. Pedrick presented the two following resolutions:

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take under advisement the establishment of a Lay Workers' Training School in this Diocese, this Committee to report at the next Council.

This resolution was adopted, and the Chair appointed as the Committee the Rev. Messrs. E. C. Pedrick, J. F. Ribble, D. D., and G. Peyton Craighill.

Resolved, That the attention of the Board of Religious Education be called to the growth of the young people's societies and the organized Bible classes in this Diocese with a view to aiding in the extension of both these movements and their coordination with the life of the Diocese.

Whereas, The foundation of all government, the structure of society, and civilization itself are endangered by national antagonisms, We, the delegates of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, assembled at our one hundred and twenty-eighth annual Council, declare our conviction that the time has come for the nations of the earth to form an effective league of peace.

We are convinced that such a league can be formed without the surrender of the essential principles of national sovereignty, and we hold that nations, no less than individuals, should be restrained by law from doing violence to the rights of each other.

Therefore, be it resolved, That it is the sense of this Council that the teachings of Jesus are as applicable to national and international as to personal and individual relations.

Be it resolved further, That it is the duty of the Church to organize her forces to co-operate with the government in its rational, democratic policy of national defense, but to use every effort to prevent physical violence in the future by all the devices of spiritual diplomacy, to protest against and rebuke all evil speaking against other nations and peoples, all racial hatred, all suspicion and prejudice, all acts of aggression or threatened wrong by any strong nation against a weaker one, and all attempts to exploit the unorganized and undeveloped peoples.

This resolution was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Pedrick, the Secretary was instructed to send this resolution to the leading daily papers and also to the Southern Churchman and the Virginia Churchman.

Dr. Downman, the Chairman of the Committee appointed

to express the appreciation of the Council for the two gifts to the Diocese, presented the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, acting upon the annual address of the Bishop, doth hereby express its appreciation of the noble gift to the Diocese of the home of the late Peter H. Mayo at Franklin and Jefferson Streets, Richmond, by his daughters, Mrs. Thos. N. Carter and Mrs. Benehan Cameron, and his grandchildren, Miss Isabelle Carter and the Misses Cameron; and in accepting the same for the Diocese, the Council desires to express its feeling that the spirit which so characterized the distinguished ancestor of the donors in his zeal for the work of the Church has, judged by this action of the family, descended from generation to generation.

Resolved, That these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of the Council, and a copy of them forwarded, for them and their families, to Mrs. Benehan Cameron and Mrs. Thos. Nelson Carter, the daughters of Mr. Mayo.

The Report of the Board of Apportionment was received, and the Program of the Diocese for 1924 as therein presented and as amended was adopted as a whole.

REPORT OF THE DEAN OF CHURCH SCHOOLS.

The most outstanding accomplishment of the Church Schools during the past year has been the physical development of the properties and equipment of the schools, resulting from the successful flotation of the \$300,000.00 First Mortgage Bond Issue. This Bond Issue was made possible by the action of last year's Council assuring an annual appropriation of \$50,000.00 for Church Schools in the Diocesan budget, over a sufficient period of years, to be employed primarily for the payment of interest and the repayment of principal of said bonds as these obligations shall fall due. With the assistance of a group of bankers, particularly of F. E. Nolting & Co., of Richmond; Burke & Herbert, of Alexandria, and the People's National Bank of Charlottesville, these bonds have been sold as rapidly as the money has been needed to meet payments upon building contracts. But it is important that the unsold remainder of the bonds, \$64,000.00, shall be marketed in time to meet the final payments upon contracts falling due in the next few months.

Appropriations from the \$350,000.00 Building and Equipment Program associated with the Bond Issue have been made as follows:

The buildings made possible at the schools except at St. Anne's have been either completed or are assured of completion in ample time for next session. Indeed, the pressure for enlarged quarters at St. Christopher's has necessitated \$30,000.00 more of new buildings than could be provided by the above appropriation, and this amount has been loaned by a trust company and a special group of Churchmen so that the required development will be completed before next session. The total assets of the Church Schools system now represent over \$600,000.00.

In regard to the problem of current self-support, distinct advance

may be reported. St. Christopher's School has been income-producing from the first. St. Catherine's and St. Anne's now show reasonable prospect of attaining self-support this session, and the deficit at St. Margaret's and Christchurch Schools together are expected not to exceed the \$7,000.00 for deficit provided in their budgets. Such a deficit is regarded as inevitable during the formative years of these schools, at which, in order to carry out the very purpose of the establishment of the schools, the association of high standards and low costs must be maintained at a deficit, *until the schools are completely filled.*

With the acquisition of Miss Laura Lee Dorsey as Principal at St. Anne's School to take charge in June, all five schools will be under the direction of able and experienced heads, and with the enlarged facilities made possible by the Bond Issue we may look forward confidently to a continued development next session. Indeed, the total enrollment for the present session shows an increase of over fifty pupils as compared with any previous session. Provision has been made for meeting this deficit of \$7,000.00 by including it in the Advance Work item provided for Church Schools.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions has examined the various reports submitted, and desires to express its appreciation of their completeness and accuracy. Together they form a graphic picture of the wise way in which the mission work of the Diocese is being prosecuted and the care with which its funds are expended.

Under the head of the Department of Missions a new thing is reported, "a deficit for the first time in many years." This is always disturbing but we are glad to say that in this instance it is an evidence of advancing work rather than of failing finance. Still, work that lives must experience a normal growth from year to year, and unless income shall keep pace with it, a distressing discrepancy between the two must eventually occur. In spite of the fact that these are difficult years in financial matters, we record it as our conviction that if all the members of our Church could see the Church's mission in terms of work to be done, rather than of money to be raised, the problem would even now be solved. As an evidence of the careful thought which our D. M. S. is giving to our work, we would call attention to its plan to remedy the present difficulty, not by asking for more money, but by calling on the parishes and missions receiving aid to reduce year by year the amounts so received, until they shall become self-supporting.

The reports of other departments emphasize the fact that all our work is missionary work, or, in other words, that our mission is one. The Committee on Bible and Prayer Book Distribution though little thought of in this connection perhaps, is distinctly furthering this mission by encouraging the wider use of these books among our people. So with regard to the Department of Religious Education. Through the great Summer School established by it, and now holding

an annual session, through its encouragement of week-day religious instruction, through its presentation of the call of the ministry to young men, it is furthering the spread and the deeper appreciation of Christ's Gospel in a way that is inestimable. One member of our Committee, a layman, reports that in his opinion every family in the parish represented by him is using the book of Family Prayer, issued by this department. The report of the Board of Christian Social Service is especially significant at this time. With the appointment of an Executive Secretary to carry such service into effect throughout the Diocese, Christian Social Service has been taken out of the realm of theory, and is rapidly becoming a vital part of the Church's mission to more and more of our people.

We feel assured that the missionary work of our Diocese is in vigorous and competent hands, and that with the loyal support of all our people it will be carried forward to abundant fruitage for the Master.

THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS.

For the first time in a great many years the Treasurer of the Diocese must report a deficit in the account of the Diocesan Missionary Society. The Treasurer's report shows that while the total receipts for Diocesan Missions during 1922 amounted to \$50,958.86, which was just about the same amount as was received in 1921, the disbursements amounted to \$56,718.58, which was nearly six thousand dollars more than was disbursed in 1921. We started 1922 with a balance brought over from the previous year of \$4,377.35. This balance has all been expended, and we have a deficit of \$1,382.37 with which to start the year 1923.

A comparison of the reports for 1921 and 1922 will show just where the expenditures increased. In 1921 the Society paid \$37,722.73 in stipends to missionaries of the Society, and \$13,212.21 for all other purposes (total, \$50,934.94). In 1922 we paid \$44,399.24 in stipends to our missionaries, and \$12,319.34 for all other purposes (a total of \$56,718.58). This was an increase of \$6,676.51 in the amount paid as stipends, and a decrease of \$892.87 in our other expenditures. There are two reasons for this increase in appropriations: first, our Society took over, about March 1, 1921, the payment of salaries of all the women workers in the Diocese, which meant an increase of over \$10,000 in our annual appropriations. This increase extended over ten months only of the year 1921, and so we did not feel its full force; but in 1922 we had to pay these appropriations for the full twelve months. This accounts for about \$1,600 or \$1,700 of the increase. The other contributing cause was the fact that during 1922 we have had considerably fewer vacant parishes than we had during 1921; and consequently we had to make appropriations to more salaries than we did in 1921. The prospects are that we will have to make fully as large payments in 1923 as we did in 1922. Including our deficit of last year, we shall have to expend this year about \$58,000. Our resources for this year are \$50,000 from the Diocese, and about \$1,000 more from invested funds and other sources, leaving a difference of about \$7,000 between our anticipated income and disbursements.

We hope to secure this additional \$7,000 this year by asking parishes to give toward it through the Advance Work of the Diocesan Program, after they have paid their parish quotas for the year. It will be a very heavy burden to all our work if this deficit cannot be paid, and a working balance restored to our treasury.

The Diocese itself must decide what our plan shall be for the future. One possible plan would be to reduce the extent of our work by cutting off some of the ministers and women workers now on our list so as to bring our expenditures within the figure of \$50,000 set aside for us in the Diocesan Program. Another would be to increase to about \$60,000 the item for Diocesan Missions in the Diocesan Budget, and so enable us to continue our present list of missionaries, and extend by taking on still further work. But your Executive Committee is not in favor of either of these plans. If the Church is to grow, it cannot do so by cutting off missionaries who are now at work. And yet, on the other hand, we would rather try to keep the appropriation from the Diocese at \$50,000 and not go beyond that figure—certainly at this time. We think that the solution can be found in the following manner.

The three main departments of our work are Mountain Missions, Colored Work and assistance to rural and other weak parishes. In

addition, we make appropriations to workers in certain specialized fields, as the Penitentiary, convict road camps, reform schools, the deaf people, etc.

We have five ministers on our list devoting all or most of their time to the Mountain Work, and twenty-two lay workers. Our appropriations to all these workers amounted to an annual rate of \$16,160.

We have six colored ministers and ten women workers. Their appropriations amounted to \$8,808.

We have thirty-one ministers in rural and other weak parishes, and one woman worker. Their appropriations amounted to \$17,806.

We have four ministers doing specialized work and one woman worker. Their appropriations amounted to \$4,526.67.

The Mountain Work must grow if we are to be true to the commission given to the Diocese by the Great Head of the Church. And so must the work grow and increase among the colored people. We have responsibility for both these kinds of Mission Work laid upon us by reason of the fact that we have so many mountain people and colored people living within our Diocese; and so many of them unshepherded as yet, at least as far as we are concerned. The work among them must increase. Indeed, we must report at this time that two new fields are being formed now in the Mountain Work, which will require the services of two additional ministers as soon as we can get them; one new field in Clarke County, and the division of the Stanardsville District in Greene. The salaries of both these new ministers must come from our Society. In both these kinds of work self-support can come very slowly only, and at times by almost imperceptible degrees. The Diocese must care for this work if it is to be done.

But in the appropriations granted to assist weak parishes to pay adequate salaries there is always the hope and expectation that as the parish grows stronger the appropriation asked from our Society will be reduced from time to time until the parish becomes financially independent and self-supporting. It is in this field that our hope lies of reducing appropriations until our disbursements come safely within the amount given us by the Diocese.

Impelled by this hope, the Executive Committee last Fall requested the Bishop to write to every parish receiving aid to ask that a twenty per cent. reduction be made, if possible, in the amount asked for 1923. Fifteen parishes voluntarily reduced their askings in conformity with this request, and two, Walker's Parish, in Albemarle County, and St. George's, Clarendon, assumed the full support of their ministers, and released the entire appropriation from our Society. The Executive Committee then made a cut of ten per cent. in the appropriations of all parishes which had not asked a reduc-

tion, and requested in each case that the parish make up the amount so that the minister's salary should not suffer diminution. This reduction was accepted in every parish, with the exception of two or three, which showed to our Committee their inability to increase the amounts raised locally. And in each of these cases the Executive Committee rescinded its action and granted the same appropriation as the previous year. In this way a saving of about three thousand dollars was made in the appropriation list of 1923. We believe that the same plan should be carried out at the end of this year when appropriations will be made for 1924, and every year hereafter. The appropriation from the Society should never be considered a permanent thing by any parish, but some reduction should be made every year, unless conditions make a reduction absolutely impossible. Sometimes, we imagine, a parish vestry hesitates to ask for a reduction in appropriation through fear that it may not be able to pay its minister the increased amount from year to year; and so they desire to hold on to the same appropriation from the Society, because of the certainty and regularity of its coming. But the Society has never yet refused to increase again an appropriation if a vestry has asked a reduction and then found it could not raise a sufficient amount locally to enable them to pay the salary promised. The wisest plan is for the Society to establish the definite understanding that except in great emergency the appropriations to weak parishes shall be reduced each year, until each one becomes self-supporting. In this way the parishes which have for a number of years been beneficiaries of the Society will become financially independent, and the resources of our Society will be released for undertaking new work and extending the Church in new fields.

The work of supplying services to vacant parishes by non-parochial clergy, Diocesan officials, lay readers and Seminary students has continued steadily throughout the year, and in almost every vacant parish in the Diocese services have been kept up with more or less regularity.

There are at the present moment twelve vacant cures in the Diocese, and two new fields in the Mountain Work which have been already mentioned. This makes a total of fourteen cures for which ministers are needed. By ordination of men who are now Candidates for Orders we expect that after the Commencement at the Seminary, or during the coming summer, four of these fields will be supplied. We still need to pray earnestly and insistently for more laborers to come out into the Master's harvest.

We wish to record with deep gratitude the receipt by the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia (which is the corpora-

tion established to hold the invested funds of our Society), of a bequest of \$1,300 from the estate of the late Mr. John R. Chilton, of Lancaster County. Mr. Chilton died in 1891, leaving the Diocesan Missionary Society the residuary legatee of one-half of his estate, and the Education Society the residuary legatee of the other half. This money has, by request of the Diocesan Missionary Society, been loaned to the Church Extension Committee to be used in making loans for the erection of Churches, parish houses and rectories in the Diocese. A fund of this kind, given either to help support a parish or for some department of the Church's work in the Diocese, is a very beautiful way of perpetuating the interest and love of the donor long after his earthly life has closed.

The work among the colored people is growing slowly, taking deeper root from year to year. It has suffered a serious loss within the past few months in the death of the Archdeacon, Rev. E. E. Osgood, after a few brief months only of service. Mr. Osgood's interest in the colored work was so great and of such long standing that we looked for steady advance in it under his guiding hand. He had time to visit each field once, and then God took him. But surely we can thank God for the work that was done by Mr. Osgood, even though the time was very short.

An outstanding feature this past year has been the taking over by the people of St. Philip's Church in Richmond of the work at the Chapel of the Good Shepherd, which for many years was conducted by members of St. John's Church as a Sunday School for colored children. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew of St. Philip's Church has undertaken to carry on the Sunday School, and endeavor to establish a permanent mission. They are doing this now with good prospect of success. The Rector of St. Philip's has under his care beside this Mission of the Good Shepherd, the Mission of St. Cyprian's, in the western part of Richmond, and the Mission at Hanover Court House. He is enabled to keep up the services at these points by the use of his lay readers. So the inspiration of the Nation-Wide Campaign is continuing to show its abiding influence in the enlisting of laymen, both white and colored, in the larger work of the Church.

Report of the Board of Apportionment.

The Treasurer of the Diocese will present to this Council a full report of the receipts and disbursements of the Nation-Wide Campaign fund for the year 1922. A summary is as follows:

The Board approved a total of \$265,271.37 of appropriations to cover our quota to the work of the General Church and the Diocesan Missionary Society and Church Schools, and the various other objects

in the Diocese to which appropriation was made out of the Nation-Wide Campaign Funds within the three-year period ending December 31, 1922. These appropriations were, of course, approved to be paid if the money became available.

Up to March 1, 1923, the Diocese has given from all sources the sum of \$231,208.25 to apply on the payment of these appropriations. At the meeting of the Board in January we faced the fact that there was at that time a deficit of about \$55,000; that is to say, we were behind about \$27,500 in the payment of our Diocesan quota to the work of the General Church, and about the same amount in the payment of appropriations to objects in the Diocese. The feeling of the Board was so strong that our quota to the work of the General Church should by all means be paid in full, that a committee was appointed to exert its utmost endeavors to secure a sufficient amount from the Diocese to pay the quota to the General Church in full. This Committee was able to report early in March that this particular deficit had been cut from \$27,500 to \$6,000, whereupon they borrowed that amount upon their own joint note, and paid the quota in full, feeling confident that Churches or individuals in the Diocese would give enough to pay off the note. Up to the present about \$2,000 of this note has been paid off, leaving slightly less than \$4,000 still to be collected. Our Board has requested that parishes in the Diocese, after they have paid their quota for 1923 in full, should designate part of their gifts to the Advance Work for the payment of this note.

We have received assurances of many kinds from different parts of the country of the real help and strengthening of the cause of Missions throughout the Church that has come through our action in this Diocese in keeping at it until we had paid our Diocesan quota to the General Church in full. For ourselves we can say with utter thankfulness that by God's help we have kept faith, and throughout the whole three-year period of the Nation-Wide Campaign we have given each year, in spite of every difficulty, the full amount of \$90,000 a year asked of us by the General Church.

There are many parishes and Churches in the Diocese whose names do not appear on this list of those that paid in full for the reason that after making the most earnest efforts they were unable to raise the full amount asked of them. They did their best, and they share in full measure with those parishes whose names appear on the list the gratitude and appreciation of the Diocese for their love and loyalty to the work of the Church. And we share together the rejoicing in a work well done.

As was indicated above, we paid in full to the work of the General Church, but we were compelled to leave unpaid about \$27,500 of amounts appropriated to objects within this Diocese. Just as in 1921, we were compelled to leave unpaid about \$35,000 of appropriations to objects within the Diocese. These amounts still unpaid, or the most important of them, we must provide for in some way in the years to come.

But in round numbers we can say that during the three-year period the Diocese was asked to give to the Nation-Wide Campaign a total of \$810,000. Of this amount we raised just about \$750,000, of which \$270,000 went to the work of the General Church, \$140,000 to our Diocesan Missionary Society, \$175,000 to establish our Diocesan system of Church Schools, \$15,000 to Diocesan Boards, and \$150,000 to the strengthening and upbuilding of local parishes throughout the Diocese by the erection of Churches, Parish Houses, Rectories, etc.

In the fall of 1922 the Board of Apportionment prepared the list of Parish apportionments to cover the Diocesan Program for 1923, and held a six weeks' campaign of information prior to the annual day of the Every-Member Canvass at which pledges were asked in every parish to apply on the Parish budgets and the Parish quotas for 1923.

We must call attention as strongly as possible to the fact that this year, under our present Diocesan Program, we are working under a financial plan which, if it works, will prove a real and a long step forward in our work, but, if it does not work, will cause the utmost confusion. Last year, and during all the previous years, our rule has been that the overpayment of those parishes which overpaid their quotas for the apportionment, would go to make up for the failure of those parishes which did not pay in full. This year, and for the

future, after a parish has paid its quota to the support of the necessary things in the budget of the Diocese, it will be asked to make all its further gifts to Advance Work, so that its giving may be really for things of advance, and not simply to make up for the failure of parishes which do not pay their quotas. But it will be seen at once that under this plan it will be possible for half the parishes to pay their quotas and then give generously to the Advance Work, but if the other half do not pay their quotas the Diocese will not have the funds to pay all the items that have been included in its budget for the maintenance of existing work. Every parish and congregation must make the most earnest effort to pay its quota in full, so that the Diocese may not be embarrassed by not having the funds wherewith to carry on existing work.

We hope that every parish in the Diocese, after it has paid its quota for this year, will have at least some part in the Advance Work included in our program. The quota is our share of the responsibility of the Diocese to support the work already in existence. The Advance Work will be our gifts for further extension and development. Your Board, in thus calling attention to the Advance Work, desires to stress the following point:

The report of the Diocesan Missionary Society shows that while \$50,000 has been apportioned to it this year, it will need at least \$58,000 to carry on its work. The Church Schools, which will receive \$50,000 to apply on its program of development, will need about \$7,000 additional to cover the expected deficits in the two new Schools, St. Margaret's and Christchurch, which have just been started, and which will necessarily have deficits in the first few years, until they can get firmly established.

Also we must pay back that \$4,000 still due on the note mentioned above. The only way in which the Diocese can get these amounts will be by designations in the Advance Work. After your Parish has paid its quota, raise what you can for the Advance Work, making whatever special appeals may be necessary, and either designate part for the objects mentioned above, or else send it undesignated so that the Board may designate as the need may appear.

The Board of Apportionment has directed the Treasurer of the Diocese to pay to the various agencies included in the Budget for this year the amounts approved by the Council last May, and payments are now being made by the Treasurer out of the monthly receipts from the parishes. We are glad to report that more and more of our Vestries are directing their parish treasurers to make monthly remittances upon the parish quota to the Diocesan Treasurer. We would most strongly urge every Vestry which has not already adopted such a rule to do so at once. The reason is obvious. The Treasurer of the Diocese must make monthly payments to New York, to the

Diocesan Missionary Society and to the Diocesan Offices. If the parish treasurers remit monthly, the funds are always in hand with which to pay our monthly appropriations. Where parish treasurers hold the money lying idle at home they make the Diocese suffer.

The last item in our Budget, the \$30,000 for Church development and extension, was by direction of the Council ordered to be given to our Church Extension Committee, to be used in making appropriation to parishes in the Diocese for purposes of local development. We have learned through the experience of the past three years that it is not wise to pay the appropriations of this nature until the full receipts of the year are in hand, so that a deficit, if there should by any chance prove to be one, may be handled in such a way as to cause the least harm. Your Board has directed that the other items in our Budget, to-wit, Diocesan Missions, Diocesan Offices, Boards of Religious Education and Social Service, Church Schools, and our share of the Budget of the General Church, be paid from month to month as needed, but that the item of Church Development and Extension be held until the end of the year, when the receipts from the parishes shall be in hand, or until such time as the Treasurer may have in hand a sufficient amount to pay the other items of the Budget. The actual disbursement of this item will be shown by the Church Extension Committee in their report.

The Program of the Diocese for 1924.

The Board of Apportionment, after careful consideration, and after review by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, hereby presents to the Council, and recommends to their approval, the following Program of the Diocese for the year 1924:

This is an increase of ten thousand dollars over our Budget of this year. The items are the same as last year, except that one additional item, the Virginia Churchman, has been added.

There is an increase of \$1,400 in the item of Diocesan Offices. This was placed in the budget before the gift of the Mayo Memorial was made, and was added because we had learned that the building in which we then were renting offices would be torn down, and we would not be able to rent in any desirable fireproof building for less than \$2,000 as much space (four rooms) as we have heretofore rented for \$620. By the splendid gift of the Mayo Memorial for a Church House, the Diocese will have its own permanent quarters instead of having to rent, and we trust that we shall be able to keep the upkeep of the building, exclusive of repairs, within the \$2,000 which we had included as rent.

The only new item in the Budget is \$4,700 for the Virginia Churchman. The Diocesan Missionary Society has hitherto been appropriating out of its funds the sum of \$1,500 per annum for the support of the Diocesan paper. The Board of Apportionment recommends very strongly that the Virginia Churchman as the official organ of the Diocese be made a separate item in the Diocesan Budget, and that a sufficient amount be appropriated to permit it to be sent to every family in the Diocese, with the payment of family subscriptions simply included in the family pledge for 1924 to the Diocesan Program.

As we included in the Advance Work for 1923 the sum of \$10,000 toward the erection of a new dormitory at the Virginia Seminary, so we include in the Advance Work for 1924 the sum of \$20,000 for the Seminary. The new dormitory when completed will cost much more than the \$30,000 which has been included in the programs of the Dioceses in Virginia and West Virginia for 1923. And with the proposed enlargement of the student body made possible by the new dormitory, our Seminary will need additional funds with which to secure an additional professor. The Seminary lies so close to the hearts of all our people that we feel that this item should be placed in our program, so that gifts made to it may be credited to the parishes from which they come.

THE CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE.

The Church Extension Committee of the Diocese of Virginia has been created by the Diocesan Missionary Society as one of its Boards to establish and build up a loan fund out of which loans may be made to parishes and churches in this Diocese for the purpose of erecting Churches, Parish Houses and Rectories, or for the purchase of land for such parish uses. It has the further duty of making grants for

these purposes out of any funds which may be placed in its hands to be used in this way.

Our resources at present are as follows:

(1) *The Loan Fund.*

(a) By action of the Council last year the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia paid over to this Committee the money in their possession arising from the sale of abandoned Church property at Strasburg (\$853.96), and at Clifton Station (\$1,002.55), a total of \$1,856.51.

(b) By request of the Diocesan Missionary Society the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia have placed in the hands of the Church Extension Committee, for use in making loans, the sum of \$1,300.00 coming from the bequest of the late Mr. John R. Chilton, of Lancaster County.

The amounts coming from these two sources, amounting to \$3,156.51, with such interest as has accrued upon the loans already made, form the corpus of our loan fund. We hope that this Fund will increase from year to year until it has reached a large enough amount to be of assistance to all the Churches in the Diocese which may need help.

(2) *Funds for Making Grants.*

The Bishop of the Diocese, who has legally the sole right to expend the annual income of the Bruce Fund, has requested the Church Extension Committee, until such time as he may direct otherwise, to use the income of this Fund in making grants for the erection of Churches Parish Houses or Rectories, or for the purchase of land therefor. The income of this Fund amounts to about \$450 or \$500.00 per annum.

The Council last year included in the Budget of the Diocese for 1923 the sum of \$30,000.00 for Church Development and Extension, and directed that this sum be placed in the hands of the Church Extension Committee for appropriation.

The Church Extension Committee held its first meeting for organization on June 9, 1922. After a careful study of methods, the rules were adopted under which loans to Churches will be made. Briefly stated they provide for two classes of loans: first, loans of more than one thousand dollars, to be secured by a first mortgage on the property upon which the loan is made; second, loans of one thousand dollars or less, which will be made to a congregation or parish upon the security of a note for the amount, to be signed by five responsible persons in the congregation, satisfactory to the Church Extension Committee.

The rate of interest is five per cent per annum, and the repayment can extend as desired by the congregation over a period of seven or of ten years. The rules governing our loans have been printed in pamphlet form, and will be sent to any one upon request.

We have already made loans to two Churches in the Diocese, one of \$2,150.00 and one of \$1,000.00. Since the first of the year the larger loan has been paid, and two new loans have been made to other Churches, one of \$1,400.00 and one of \$800.00.

From the Bruce Fund was received to December 31st the sum of \$25.00, which was expended as a grant to one of the smaller Churches in the Diocese.

The Church Extension Committee has given most careful consideration to the matter of making grants out of the \$30,000.00 which is to come from the Diocesan Budget this year. Applications for appropriation from this fund came from parishes and churches in every part of the Diocese, and the Church Extension Committee appointed in each case a committee of laymen (with a clergyman in some cases) in an adjoining section of the Diocese but in no way connected with the parish making application, to investigate the asking and make full report with recommendation as to granting or refusing the application. The Extension Committee, and indeed the Diocese, owes a debt of gratitude to the members of these committees of investigation. It means a great deal to us all to know that all over the Diocese we have men who are willing to give the time from their business to go to a neighboring community to make investigation on behalf of the Diocese.

After the most careful consideration the following appropriations have been approved, and the Treasurer has been ordered to pay them if and when the amount of \$30,000.00 is made available from the Diocese this year.

There are two or three applications still before the Committee which will be acted on when further information is secured.

It must be noted, however, that under the rule adopted by the Board of Apportionment, in which our Church Extension Committee heartily concurs, no payment of any appropriation on this list can be made until at or near the end of the year. The rule referred to is as follows:

Whereas it is the judgment of the Board of Apportionment that the appropriations in the Budget of 1923 for the first five items therein. General Church, Diocesan Missions, Church Schools, Diocesan Offices and Boards of Religious Education and Social Service are absolutely essential to the maintenance of the existing work of the General Church and the Diocese, and

Whereas the Treasurer of the Diocese will not be in a position to know until late in the year 1923 whether the amount given by the parishes on the Budget of the Diocese will ensure the payment of these appropriations of primary obligation, therefore be it

Resolved, That no appropriation for any project of local parish development listed in the budget under its last heading of Church Extension shall be paid until the end of the said year or until the Treasurer shall be assured that the full \$160,000.00 asked for the first five items in the Budget will be available for the payment of appropriations therefor.

THE COMMITTEE ON BIBLE AND PRAYER BOOK DISTRIBUTION.

The Committee on Bible and Prayer Book Distribution has received during the past year from the Diocese the sum of \$1,100. With this amount we have paid the deficit coming over from the previous year, have given as usual the sum of \$500.00 to the Virginia Bible Society Branch of the American Bible Society, and have expended the sum of \$277.53 in purchasing Bibles, Prayer Books, Hymnals and Mission Hymnals for Missions and weak Churches throughout the Diocese. We carry over a balance of \$90.16 into the present year.

We request that the sum of \$800.00 be included for this Committee in the Budget of 1924, to be used as heretofore, \$500.00 for the Virginia Bible Society Branch of the American Bible Society, and \$300.00 to be used in making grants of Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals to Missions and weaker Churches.

Our usual rule is to make grants of the full cost of the books required by our Missions. But we urge the organized congregations in every case, if they cannot pay the full cost of the books required, to pay at least half, and let our Bible and Prayer Book Committee make a grant of the other half.

We desire again to call the attention of all our Churches to the fact that we are enabled to purchase these books at a discount; which in every case where the Books are ordered for a Church is used to reduce the actual cost to the purchaser.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

There have been regular meetings of the Board throughout the year, generally on the days of meeting of the Diocesan Missionary Society. At the beginning of the year the Board marked out a program which was pretty generally followed.

1. The Summer School, held at the University of Virginia, was attended with the usual success. This School grows in efficiency and in reputation each year. The session covered a period of twelve days. Eighteen Dioceses were represented, and there were two students from the Presbyterian Church. The faculty consisted of the foremost educators, and the schedule embraced all branches of Church work. The four Virginia Bishops and the Bishop of Hankow were present and had important assignments on the program. Teacher Training occupies the position of chief importance, and instruction was given on the three series recommended by the Diocese—the Christian Nurture, the New York Sunday School Commission and the American Church Sunday School Lessons.

2. The Board is in correspondence with Schools throughout the Diocese—both white and colored—giving such assistance as is requested. It provides for institutes in parishes when asked for.

3. The Book of Family Prayers published by the Board is still in demand and is filling a long felt need not only in Virginia but in other Dioceses.

4. The Committee on Religious Education in Public Schools has had several meetings with Committees of the State Board of Education. It is encouraging to note that there is little or no opposition, but on the other hand, a real cooperation in communities where religious education has been introduced in the Public Schools.

5. Under the direction of your Board a conference of principals and teachers of our Diocesan Schools is held each year in the city of Richmond. The conference always has representatives from all the schools. Its purpose is to study and to work out the best curriculum on religious education for these schools. The Board paid the salary of a teacher to give her full time to religious education at St. Anne's School, Charlottesville, Va., and has continued her salary for another year. This is not a permanent arrangement, but only as an experiment.

6. The Board paid the expenses of a delegate to the Chicago Conference on Religious Education, and of two young men who were sent from this Diocese to the Conference on the Ministry at St. Paul's School, Concord, N. H. It was a conference at which the claims of the ministry were presented and resulted in untold good. A committee has been appointed by the Board to present the claims of the sacred ministry to the young men at the colleges and University of Virginia.

At our first meeting after the Diocesan Council the Board was re-organized, new members elected, and committees appointed for the work of this year. All our members seem most interested and enthusiastic, and we are hoping for great things during the coming year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE.

The report made on behalf of the Department of Social Service, at the meeting before the last annual Council of the Diocese, described the work which the Commission did in the winter of 1922, in connection with matters of moral and social welfare in the Legislature of

Virginia. It is not necessary, therefore, to recapitulate that part of the Commission's service, in 1922, since it is already on record.

At the time of the Diocesan Council, in my report on behalf of the Department of Social Service, I said:

"We are increasingly impressed by the fact that the possibilities for vital Social Service in this Diocese are far larger than those which the Commission can take advantage of. One of the supreme tests of the Church in this day is its ability so to relate its Christian idealism to the actual needs and problems of our communities that the spirit of Jesus shall not be a vague aspiration of the sanctuary, but a living power to shape the conditions of every day. Our congregations ought to be taught effective means of making their Christian spirit count for the elimination of evils and the building up of social righteousness. Rectors of parishes ought to be able to call upon the Commission far more confidently than now they can, to furnish guidance and help in the training and organizing of their people for social service. It is impossible for a Commission made up of men who have other pressing duties to give the time necessary to make the Commission constantly responsive to the many chances for service. The question has arisen as to the advisability of securing an executive officer to give his whole time to organizing the parishes of the Diocese, at the request of their rectors, for Social Service Work, and to the development of a Diocesan program."

At a meeting of the Department, on November 2, 1922, the Rev. R. Cary Montague was appointed Executive Secretary upon his generous offer to serve, without compensation, this Department, however, making an appropriation of \$50 a month for an office secretary for Mr. Montague. The remarkable record of his activity during the last three months of 1922 is the fine fruition of the hope, so long cherished, for an executive officer for this part of the Church's work, and a most remarkable witness to what such an officer can accomplish. The Commission cannot speak with too great enthusiasm of his initiative, enthusiasm and constructive ability.

III. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

To the Rt. Rev. William Cabell Brown, D. D., *President ex-officio*:

The Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary submits the following report:

Seven new branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, three of Section B, and one of the Juniors were organized in 1922.

In the Diocese of Virginia there are one hundred and eighty-seven Parishes and Missions to which a Nation-Wide Campaign quota was given. We feel that there should be organized missionary work for women and girls in every one of these Parishes and Missions. Investigation shows that many of the smaller churches have no Auxiliaries, and it is our aim to remedy this condition as speedily as possible. We believe that in the smallest congregation the banding together of even two or three women, or young people, to learn about the world-wide mission of the Church, to pray for its success, and to give such service as may be possible, will result not only in help outside the Parish, but in quickened life within it.

In March, 1922, our branches were called upon to observe the first Friday in Lent as a Day of Intercession for Missions, and to join as far as possible with the Woman's Missionary Organizations of other Christian bodies in this observance.

In compliance with a request from the President of the National Council (then the Presiding Bishop and Council), the Virginia Auxiliary used her organization to bring quickly before the Church people of this Diocese the emergency appeal for the starving children of the Near East, and forwarded many contributions to the Near East Relief Committee.

The year 1922 was marked by the effort of our Educational Department to circulate missionary information and to train new leaders. A largely attended Mission Study Institute was held in Richmond, and an effort was made to introduce mission study into every branch of the Auxiliary. As a result eighty-two mission study classes were held, besides numerous program meetings. When the new program of the Church was adopted by the General Convention, our Educational Secretary issued a series of lessons on this program, which were widely used.

We are glad to report that the amount of the United Thank Offering sent by the Virginia Branch to the presentation service in Portland was greater by over \$7,000.00 than the offering sent to Detroit in 1919. The Portland offering from Virginia, including the offering from the Virginia Juniors, was \$16,716.75. The women and girls of our Church are gradually learning to use this offering as an expression of thanksgiving and as a means of extending to others their chiefest blessings.

Five delegates from the Virginia Branch attended the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Portland, Oregon. They brought back with them a deepened sense of the opportunity of our women and girls to serve the Church through our organization, which is flexible enough to permit varied forms of service, and which is safeguarded by its dependence upon the National Council.

2. *Health:*

During the session the health of the School, generally, has been good; there have been no death and no more than the usual number of minor ailments and sicknesses.

3. *Work; and Other Activities:*

The regular work of the School during the session has been of a satisfactory character. In addition to their studies, the boys have showed interest particularly in the literary societies, and in at least two philanthropic efforts. In the first, the annual sale of Anti-Tuberculosis Christmas seals, the boys raised \$140.00. By means of their second effort, the giving of two plays, they made \$200.00; one-half of which they sent to the School and Farm for Homeless Boys at Covington, Va.

4. *The Faculty:*

At the close of the session, we shall lose six of the twelve members of our present faculty. Of the two young lady assistants to Miss Bouldin, in the Lower School, one is already married; the other ex-

pects to be married in June. Of the Upper School faculty, two of our teachers are leaving to re-enter college for post-graduate work, and two others are expecting to enter business life. All six vacancies have been filled. The religious affiliation of the members of the faculty, this session, is shown in the following summary:

The difficulty of finding among the educated members of our own Communion properly trained men and women teachers, is a matter of great concern to the management of this School. That this difficulty exists is due simply to the fact that comparatively few young men and women from Episcopal families take up teaching as a life profession.

5. *Religious Affiliation of Pupils:*

a. Protestant Episcopal	68%
b. Other churches (Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist, Disciples, Lutheran and Roman Catholic)	32%

6. *Graduating Class:*

At the close of the session on June 9th, a class of about four will graduate.

7. *Finances For the Session:*

While it is impossible for me at this date (May 12th) to give exact figures for the session, it is my belief and that of the School Treasurer, that the books of the School on June 15th, the end of the second financial year under Church ownership, will show a credit balance of not less than \$2,000 for the year.

8. *Rates For Next Session:*

For boarding pupils	\$650.00
For day pupils (Upper School)	225.00
For day pupils (Lower School)	150.00
Dinners for day pupils are extra; for the session	100.00

9. *Scholarships:*

Reductions from the regular rates made by the School (amounting in the aggregate to \$4,322) and scholarships already established by friends of the School (aggregating \$1,500), together amounting to \$5,822, or 12% of the total income of the School, are this year being given through the School toward the education of the youth of Virginia and the Church.

It is to be hoped that one of the results of the establishment of the system of Church Schools in the Diocese, of which this School is one, will be that young men and young women of the Church will in increasing numbers be led to devote their lives to the work of teaching. It is gratifying to be able to record here the fact that one of the new teachers secured for next year is a graduate of four years ago of this School.

10. *Improvements:*

During the present session the Trustees of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, Inc., through the Finance Committee of the Corporation, authorized the following additions and improvements:

1. A new dormitory, to accommodate two teachers and twenty pupils.
2. A large addition to the Upper School building, providing a new Assembly Hall and additional class rooms.
3. A Recreation Building, for the use of the boys in the boarding department.

The cost of these additions and improvements is being met by money borrowed from friends of the School, and secured by notes of the Church Schools Corporation, the money to be repaid out of the profits of the School. As a result of this outlet the School will be able, next year, if necessary, to take care, comfortably, of 180 pupils (50 boarding pupils and 130 day pupils).

11. *A Suggestion:*

It is offered as a suggestion that individual Parishes in the Diocese found at the School Parish Scholarships, reserving to themselves the right of presentation. By such action the Parish would benefit, and the School—the property of the Church, and one of its working organizations—would be strengthened. In this connection it is gratifying and encouraging to record that the congregation of St. Stephen's, Westhampton, through its vestry, has already founded one such

scholarship. At the present time two boys of the Parish are by this means being helped to the extent of one-half their tuition expenses. In the case of one of these boys the School gives the other half.

12. *Religious Instruction:*

St. Christopher's School is a Church institution; in every department of the School's life, therefore, the fundamental importance of religion is recognized. The first exercises of every school day is a short Divine service, in which every boy takes an active part; and before every athletic event the boys of the whole School kneel together in prayer to ask God's blessing upon those who are about to represent them in the contest. In addition to these religious services, regular instruction in religion is provided for in graded courses, every boy being required to take two periods a week in the religious studies of his form.

Furthermore, recognizing the futility of trying by means of religious exercises and studies alone to inculcate a religious spirit, the School management endeavors to awaken that spirit in the boys, and to foster it when awakened, by presenting to them definite opportunities of work for others. That every boy in St. Christopher's has proved himself to be thoroughly permeated by the spirit of service, which is the Spirit of Christ no one connected with the School would dare to say; but that in the past the boys, both individually and as a body, have done much self-denying work for others, the headmaster is proud to acknowledge; and it is his confident hope, as it is his prayer, that month by month and year by year they will become more worthy followers of their Master and, like St. Christopher, find Him through service to their fellow-men.

13. *The Bishop's Visitation:*

On April 8th, the Bishop of the Diocese on the occasion of his visitation at St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton (the Parish Church of the School), confirmed three of the boys of the boarding department of the School, and among the other persons confirmed at that time was one of the pupils of the day department.

14. Further information in regard to the character and work of St. Christopher's School can be found in an article published in *The Virginia Churchman*, for April of this year.

APPENDIX D.

I. CHARTER OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA.

(Incorporated by special act of the Legislature of Virginia, February 5, 1875, Chapter 83, Acts of General Assembly of the State of Virginia 1874-1875, page 53.

Amended by act of the Legislature of Virginia, March 23, 1887, Chapter 8, Acts of Assembly of State of Virginia (extra session 1887), page 6.)

(1) ORIGINAL CHARTER.

1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That John Johns, F. M. Whittle, George Woodbridge, William Norwood, Joshua Paterkin, Charles Minnegerode, C. J. Gibson, T. G. Dashiell, W. Q. Hyland, William F. Gray, David N. Walker, A. T. Laidly, and their successors, be and they are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name and style of The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded; and for uses of said Diocesan Missionary Society, may receive and acquire, by purchase, gift or otherwise, money, or other personal property or estate; provided, that the estate so acquired shall not exceed two hundred thousand dollars.

2. A majority of said trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Any vacancy in their number, caused by death, resignation, removal from the State or other disability, shall be filled by a vote of the Board. The Board of Trustees shall have power to make such by-laws and regulations for the government of the corporation as they may decide to be proper; provided, that such by-laws be not contrary to the laws of this State or of the United States; provided further, that this act shall be subject to amendment, alteration, modification or repeal at the pleasure of the General Assembly.

3. This act shall be in force from its passage.

(2) AMENDMENT TO CHARTER.

1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That section one of an act approved February fifth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled an act incorporating the trustees of the Diocesan

Missionary Society, be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That John Johns, F. M. Whittle, George Woodbridge, William Norwood, Joshua Peterkin, Charles Minnegerode, C. J. Gibson, T. G. Dashiell, W. Q. Hyland, William F. Gray, David N. Walker, A. T. Laidly and their successors be and they are hereby constituted a body politic corporate, by the name and style of The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded; and for uses of said Diocesan Missionary Society, may receive and acquire, by purchase, gift or otherwise, money or other personal property or real estate; provided that the estate so acquired shall not exceed two hundred thousand dollars.

2. This act shall be in force from its passage

H. CHARTER OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE FUNDS OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

(Incorporated by special act of Legislature of Virginia, February 2, 1892. See Acts of Assembly, State of Virginia, 1892, Chapter 135, page 224.

Amended by act of the Legislature of Virginia February 17, 1900, Chapter 391, Acts of Assembly, State of Virginia, 1900, page 405).

CHARTER AS AMENDED.

1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That an act approved February second, eighteen hundred and ninety-two, entitled an act to incorporate the trustees of the funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Virginia, be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

Whereas, the members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Commonwealth of Virginia have raised and contributed certain funds for the support of their disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of their deceased clergy, the episcopate of said Church within this Commonwealth, and for other purposes of the said Church; and

Whereas, in order to successfully administer the said funds and such additions thereto as may hereafter accrue or be made, it is needful to create a corporation which shall receive, hold and administer the same; now, therefore,

1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That Rt. Rev. R. A. Gibson, Rev. R. A. Goodwin, Rev. Hartley Carmichael, Rev. L. R. Mason, Misters Joseph Bryan, E. B. Addison, J. N. Boyd,

W. H. Palmer, John F. Glenn, Cyrus Boisseux, J. M. Taylor, W. F. Gray, C. C. Baughman, S. Rutherford Rose and J. M. Ball and their successors be, and they are, hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name and style of the trustees of the funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Virginia, and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and may sue and be sued, with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese, whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not, and the same to invest, hold, distribute and apply for the purposes aforesaid, but subject to the control of the Council of the said Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Virginia, as it shall be from time to time constituted; provided, that the value of the property so held shall not exceed at any one time for each of said funds the sum of five hundred thousand dollars.

2. That the said trustees and their successors shall have power to appoint from their number such officers and committees (under such rules and by such means as they may adopt) as shall be necessary and proper for the due management, control and administration of the funds and other property committed to the said corporation for the purpose aforesaid, and may invest the said officers and committees with such powers as the said corporation shall deem best adapted to accomplish the objects and purposes of this act.

3. That the said trustees shall have power to make and establish from time to time, such by-laws and regulations, not contrary to the direction of the said Council, the laws of this Commonwealth or of the United States, as they may deem proper for the management of said corporation and best fitted to accomplish its objects and purposes; and a majority of the said Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

4. That the said trustees shall have power to fill any vacancy which may occur in this body arising from death, resignation, inability or refusal to act, removal from this Commonwealth, or other cause declared by the by-laws sufficient to create a vacancy; provided, that such vacancy shall be filled by the selection of one of two or more persons nominated therefor by the said Council: and provided, that in case no such nomination be made by said Council at its next meeting after receiving notice of such vacancy, then said trustees may fill such vacancy; and upon any successor elected under the provisions of this act, shall be conferred the same powers and imposed the same duties as if his name had been mentioned as one of the incorporators herein.

5. That the said trustees shall submit annually to the said Council a full statement and report of the funds in their hands or under their charge, and of their transactions during the past year.
2. This act shall be in force from its passage.

It shall have power to borrow money, issue bonds and notes secured by mortgage or pledge of property, or any part thereof, to invest, sell, reinvest and otherwise administer, manage and control all of its property and funds, and to use the income therefrom for the purposes hereinbefore indicated.

fill any vacancy which may occur in their body from death, resignation, inability or refusal to act or from other causes; provided that such vacancy shall be filled by the selection of one of two or more persons nominated therefor by the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

Five members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and all questions before it shall be decided by a majority of those present.

IX. It shall have the power to purchase, receive and otherwise acquire and hold and dispose of forever any lands, tenements, reñts, issues and profits, interest and annuity, goods and chattels, stocks, bonds or choses in action of any corporation of whatever kind and also donations of money or other things, legacies, bequests and devises of real estate or personal property which may be purchased by, devised, bequeathed, given to or otherwise acquired by it. It shall have power to borrow money, issue bonds and notes, secured by mortgage or pledge of property, or any part thereof; to invest, sell, reinvest and otherwise administer, manage and control all of its property and funds, and to use the income therefrom for the purposes hereinbefore indicated.

V. CHARTER OF BETHANY INSTITUTE OF VIRGINIA.

Chartered by the Virginia Legislature February 7, 1890.

(Chapter 185, Acts of General Assembly, 1889-1890.)

An Act to Incorporate the Bethany Institute of Virginia.

1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That F. M. Whittle, A. M. Randolph, Lewis William Burton, John B. Newton, Hartly Carmichael, H. M. Jackson, James B. Funsten, J. M. Fourquerean, Charles C. Baughman, Charles E. Whitlock, James N. Boyd and Rosewell Page, as trustees, and for the purpose of establishing and conducting an orphan asylum and hospital, and for educating women in the care of the poor and sick, the religious training of the young and others, and the work of moral reformation, be, and are hereby, constituted a body politic and corporate by the name and style of the Bethany Institute, and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, with power to hold, receive, and purchase, to them and their successors forever, lands, tenements, money and other chattels and dispose of and manage the same as shall seem best for the said institute; provided, that the land so held and acquired shall not exceed one hundred acres, nor the money and other chattels the sum of five hundred thousand dollars; and provided, further, that the majority of said trustees, or their successors, may at any time here-

after increase the number of trustees to twenty, and that not less than a majority of the trustees for the time being shall authorize the sale or mortgage of any real estate belonging to said institute.

2. The said trustees and their successors shall have power to appoint a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, teachers, board of managers, and such other officers and agents as they may deem proper, and to make, from time to time such by-laws, rules and regulations (not contrary to the laws of the United States), as they may judge to be proper for the good government of the said institute. A majority of the trustees shall constitute a board for the transaction of business, and any vacancy amongst the trustees occasioned by death, resignation, or other cause declared by the by-laws to be sufficient to create a vacancy shall be filled by appointment of the board.

3. The treasurer shall receive all moneys accruing to the institute or property delivered to his care, and shall hold the same subject to the order of the board. Before entering upon the discharge of his duties he shall give bond, with security, and in such penalty as the board may direct, made payable to the trustees for the time being and their successors, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duty under such rules and regulations as may be adopted by the board; and it shall be lawful for the trustees to obtain a judgment for the amount thereof, or for any special delinquency incurred by said treasurer, on motion in any court of record in this Commonwealth against the said treasurer and his security or securities, his or their executors and administrators, upon giving ten days' notice of such motion.

4. The said board of trustees shall have power, either by themselves or their agents, to take and receive subscriptions for said institute, and in any case any person who shall fail to pay his or her subscriptions, to enforce the payment thereof by warrant before a magistrate or by motion in any court of record in this Commonwealth, according to the amount of such subscriptions, upon giving ten days' notice of such motion.

5. This act shall be in force from its passage.

For the other items an addition of 4 per cent would give nearly a correct total.
