FORMS FOR MAKING BEQUEST

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "*The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.*"

The funds already created and now held by the said corporation are:

1. The Disabled Clergy Fund.
2. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund.
3. The Episcopal Fund.
4. The Bruce Fund.
5. The A. Baker Evangelist Fund.
6. The St. Andrew's Fund.
7. Pohick Ch. Endowment Fund.
8. Yeocomico Ch. Endowment Fund.
9. Monumental Church Fund.
10. Fork Church Fund, and others.

All devises or bequests to any of the said funds should be made to "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a corporation created under the laws of the State of Virginia, for the sole use and benefit of the.....Fund (naming the fund intended) now held in trust by the said corporation."

If it is the desire to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its President, Rt. Rev. William Cabell Brown, D. D.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is, "*The Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary and High School in Virginia,*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "*Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia,*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "*The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia,*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "*Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia,*" a corporation chartered under the laws of Virginia. All gifts and bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg, Va., is: "*The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia,*" and all bequests to the same should be made accordingly.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

ORGANIZATION

FROM CANON I, SECTION 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

RULES OF ORDER

1st. The Council shall be opened with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Report of Secretary.

Election of a Secretary.

The appointment of a Treasurer *pro tempore* when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council, the following standing Committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on Missions, to whom shall be referred the report and accounts of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Bible and Prayer Book Distribution Society, and other matters bearing on the missionary work of the Diocese.

A Committee on New Parishes.

A Committee on Increase of the Ministry.

A Committee on Unfinished Business.

And the chairmen of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President may think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next Council.

5th. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention, shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

In all elections held by ballot, no candidate who receives a majority of the votes cast shall be dropped except upon motion made and carried by the Council.

6th. Divine service shall be held on the Wednesday and Thursday evenings of each Council with a sermon, and a committee of three shall be appointed at each Council to select a preacher or preachers to deliver these sermons at the succeeding Council.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; and all resolutions shall be referred to their proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desire to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *Provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

25th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

26th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the President may appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And the Committee may report at any time.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

27th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

28th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

29th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

30th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

THE JOURNAL

OF THE

130th Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church

OF THE

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

The one hundred and thirtieth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia convened in St. George's Church on Wednesday morning, May 27, 1925, at 10 A. M. Holy Communion was administered by the Rt. Rev. William Cabell Brown, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. Dudley Boogher, rector of St. George's Church; the Rev. J. F. Ribble, D. D., and Rev. G. M. Brydon.

The Council was called to order by the Bishop in business session. The roll being called, forty clergy and forty-one lay delegates answered to their names. The Chair declared a quorum present and the Council opened for business.

The Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon was unanimously elected Secretary of the Council. Mr. Brydon appointed the Rev. Lewis Carter Harrison Assistant Secretary.

The Chair appointed the Rev. G. Freeland Peter and Messrs. R. Powell Page and John M. Taylor as the Committee on Credentials.

On motion the rules of order of the last Council were adopted.

The Rev. Dudley Boogher moved that the hours of meeting of the Council be as follows: On Wednesday adjourn at 1 for luncheon and convene at 2:30, adjourning at 5; Thursday the sessions to run from 9 to 1 and 2:30 to 5. This motion was carried.

An invitation was extended to the Council to visit Kenmore after the close of the afternoon session.

The Bishop presented his Journal of Official Acts. (See Appendix A-1.)

The Bishop then read

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

My Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

The meeting of the Council is always interesting and important, and this one hundred and thirtieth annual meeting will be unusually so, because not only will the regular routine business have to be transacted, and this business grows heavier and more intricate each year with the steadily advancing growth of the Church, but also because of the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor and the election of deputies to represent the Diocese in the General Convention in New Orleans next fall.

It will be seen from what I have said that it will be necessary to devote ourselves diligently to the prompt dispatch of the regular routine matters that come before us so that we may have the time for careful study and discussion of new and unfinished business. Among other matters, apart from the elections I have mentioned, we shall need ample time to discuss thoroughly the report adopted at the Laymen's Conference last spring requesting me, as President of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, "to appoint a committee of five to take under consideration and report to the next meeting of the Council, whether it be desirable to adopt some other methods than those now in use for the laying of the parish apportionments for the work of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia." This resolution was adopted by the Council, and the committee appointed as requested. In view of the importance of this report, and the diligent labors expended by the committee in its preparation, I bespeak for it your careful study and a full and frank discussion of it.

After this preliminary statement about the work that lies ahead of us, I would now make grateful mention of those clergy who since our last meeting have completed their course here on earth and have been called, as I believe, to a higher service.

REV. JOHN LLOYD.

The Rev. John Lloyd, son of the Rt. Rev. Arthur Selden Lloyd, D. D., and Elizabeth Blackford Lloyd, died at Colorado Springs on Monday, June 6, 1924, in his thirty-fourth year. He was born in

Norfolk, where his father was rector of St. Luke's Church; was educated at the Norfolk Academy, at the Episcopal High School, near Alexandria, and at the University of Virginia, from which institution he was graduated with the B. A. degree in 1912. At the University he was a leader in student life, being a member of the D. K. E. Fraternity, Lambda Pi, T. I. L. K. A. and "13 Club." He took an active part in the Church life, as a member of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew of St. Paul's Memorial Church, and was diligent and faithful in his duties as a teacher of the Sunday school at Rio Chapel on Sunday afternoons.

Upon his graduation from the University he became one of the masters at Pomfret School, Pomfret, Conn. The time had now come when he felt he must begin his studies for the ministry of the Church, so he entered the Virginia Theological Seminary in the fall of 1914 and graduated in 1917. He was ordained to the diaconate by Bishop Gibson on June 6, 1917, and sent by the Bishop to Bromfield Parish, in Rappahannock County. He had served in this parish only a few months when he felt compelled to resign, and it was altogether characteristic of him that instead of seeking an easy or, comparatively speaking, safe post, he entered as a private in Ambulance Company 33. That he might the more effectively discharge his duties, he was advanced to the priesthood by Bishop Gibson on February 24, 1918, and almost immediately went overseas to serve with his unit, which was attached to the Fourth Division.

He saw much active service, participating in the Marne-Aisne offensive as well as the Marne-Oise, the Saint Mihiel and the Meuse-Argonne. He was gassed on the Vasse, but continued to serve through the war, and was sent into Germany with the Army of Occupation. On his return home he took temporary charge at St. John's, Warsaw, Wis. He was soon, however, called back to Virginia, and took charge of St. Paul's, Hamilton, Mt. Calvary at Round Hill, and St. Peter's, Purcellville, in Shelburne Parish, Loudoun County.

His health had been much impaired by his army service, and he suffered greatly from chronic asthma, and after a hard fight, and sufferings greater than his friends could imagine because he bore them so bravely and so patiently, he was forced to give up his active ministry in the effort to regain his health. Despite all that science and loving care could do, the gas had done its terrible work too thoroughly. Though with singular fortitude and patience, he fought a losing fight until he was mercifully relieved and he fell asleep.

All who were privileged to know him bear testimony to his lovable disposition and his great gift of friendliness which drew to him at school, at college and in the army a host of friends.

It seems strange to us, when we recall how fitted he was by natural

disposition and his great gift of friendliness which drew to him at this ministry should have been so brief, and yet we dare believe that his ministry here on earth, though brief and filled with suffering bravely borne, was not in vain, but that it only trained and prepared him for that higher and larger service to which he has been called.

THE REV. JOHN J. GRAVATT, D. D.

The Rev. John J. Gravatt died suddenly after a very brief illness on Saturday, March 14, 1925.

Born in Port Royal, Caroline County, on May 14, 1854, he was the son of Dr. John J. Gravatt and Mary Eliza Gravatt. He entered the Virginia Theological Seminary and was graduated in the class of 1876. Upon his ordination to the diaconate he was sent by his Bishop to take charge of St. John's, Hampton, and after he was advanced to the priesthood he accepted the call of the vestry and assumed the rectorship of that church, which he served with singular devotion for a period of fifteen years. In 1893 he accepted a call to Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, which under his leadership grew to be one of the largest and strongest congregations in the city.

Dr. Gravatt occupied a leading position in the Diocese, being for many years a member of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. He was a deputy to the General Convention almost continuously from 1904 to 1919.

He was an outstanding figure in the religious life of the community. He served for many years as president of the Richmond Clericus, which is made up of the clergy of his own Church, and also as president of the Richmond Ministerial Union, composed of the ministers of all the Protestant churches in the city. He did not confine his services to the church of which he was rector, and in which he was known and loved as a strong preacher and devoted pastor, but he was recognized as a leader in matters of community welfare and rendered signal service to the city along these lines.

Both the News Leader and the Times-Dispatch, in addition to the regular news notice of his death, carried editorials appreciative of the place that he had won for himself in the religious and civic life of the city. These tributes were so well done and so richly deserved that I desire that the members of the Council who did not see them might yet hear of the high esteem in which our brother was held. The News Leader said in part that "he was mindful of his own flock, but never indifferent to larger civic duty, interested in youth and sympathetic with age, a man who grew to the very last in influence and in spiritual power; while mellowing always in spirit, he was as faithful a minister as Richmond ever had and as devoted a citizen."

The Times-Dispatch said: "Not alone the Episcopal Church in Virginia, of which he had long been an outstanding figure, but the city and State as well, regardless of denominational lines, sustain a severe loss in the death of Dr. John J. Gravatt. He was a religious leader whose influence was not confined to the narrow limits of any one sect; he was a citizen who recognized no artificial barriers in his efforts to advance the interests of the community; he was a friend who allowed no differences in creed to affect the beauty and the purity of his devotion; he was a man who possessed a broad understanding of human nature and whose range of sympathy was as wide as the world."

This is high praise, but it was deserved. May his example stimulate us who remain to give ourselves whole-heartedly to unselfish and devoted service for our fellowmen.

REV. ANGUS CRAWFORD, D. D.

The news of Dr. Crawford's death in September brought a note of sadness wherever throughout this country his old students are living. Those who came under his influence as a teacher at the Virginia Seminary almost invariably carried away an abiding feeling of affection for him and looked forward to seeing him as one of the great pleasures of every return to the Old Hill.

Dr. Crawford was born in Canada in 1850. After graduating at the University of Toronto he studied at the Princeton Theological Seminary and the Philadelphia Divinity School. Later he studied Hebrew under Dr. William R. Harper at Yale and Aramaic and Assyrian under Dr. Hilprecht.

He came to the Virginia Seminary as Professor of Hebrew and Old Testament in 1887. He became Dean in 1898 and remained at the Seminary until advancing age compelled his retirement in 1920.

Dr. Crawford's interest in the Oriental languages never lessened as the years went by, since he was firmly convinced that the study of Hebrew and Greek and the cognate languages were the best means of interpreting the Scriptures. His enthusiasm as a Hebraist, combined with his deep personal Christian earnestness, made him a most enthusiastic student and teacher of the Bible. He combined the simple unquestioning faith of a child with the wide and thorough learning of the ripe scholar.

His services to the Seminary will be long and gratefully remembered. He built for himself an enduring monument in his successful efforts to improve the physical equipment of that institution and in raising the standard of training of students. The Diocese elected him

time after time as deputy to the General Convention. His work there, as well as at the Seminary, brought him into contact with many of the Church's leaders throughout the country and all recognized in him the able leader of a great institution and an unwavering defender of the faith.

REV. JOSEPH BAKER.

The Rev. Joseph Baker was born in the city of London in 1846. He was educated to be a schoolmaster in St. Paul's College, Cheltenham, England, from which he graduated in 1866. He came to America with his family in the year 1882, settling in the State of Kansas. Here his zeal as a layman attracted the attention of Bishop Elisha Thomas, who urged him to study for the ministry, and in 1894 he received the degree of B. D. from the Kansas Theological Seminary. He was ordained deacon in 1893 and priest in 1894 by Bishop Thomas. He ministered in Kansas, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Maryland and came to Virginia to Westover Parish in 1911. In our Diocese he held successively the parish of Westover, St. Paul's Church in Hamilton, and Overwharton Parish, retiring on account of age in 1921, since which time he ministered as opportunity offered by assisting the rectors of parishes and by holding services in vacant parishes.

He was an excellent preacher and a devoted and faithful pastor, and his memory will be cherished wherever he has ministered.

GENERAL CONVENTION.

At the General Convention, to meet in New Orleans next October, apart from the many matters that arise and must be decided during the sessions of the Convention, there are some which we know beforehand will have to be carefully considered; and to at least three of these matters I deem it advisable to call your attention at this time.

(a) At present and until after the election in October, the duties which will devolve upon and be discharged by the Presiding Bishop of the Church are in part discharged by the President of the National Council; this anomaly will then disappear, as the Presiding Bishop of the Church will also be the President of the National Church. May I not suggest that the deputies who shall be elected at this Council as our representatives ought to give this question most careful thought, as the Bishop, to be elected to this high and important office by the House of Bishops, must be confirmed by the House of Deputies?

(b) A commission was appointed in Portland, composed of one Bishop, one presbyter and one layman from each of the eight provinces, to report in New Orleans on "the enlargement of the powers of provinces." This commission was organized by the election of the Rt.

Rev. A. C. A. Hall, D. D., Bishop of Vermont, as its chairman, and the Rev. Malcolm Taylor, of No. 1 Joy Street, Boston, Mass., as its secretary. I have before me the preliminary report of this commission, in which it is stated that the report is made public to provoke discussion in order that the commission might learn the mind of the clergy and laity of the Church. I have no means of knowing just what changes will be made in this report as the result of the discussion it has provoked, but of the eight proposals made, each requiring changes and amendments either in the constitution or in the canons, and in some instances in both the constitution and the canons, there are only two which seem to be unobjectionable. They are as follows:

III in the proposals: That notice of amendments to the constitution and of alterations in the Book of Common Prayer be referred to the provinces for their consideration.

IV in the proposals: That reports of commissions of General Convention be presented to the Presiding Bishop of the Church at least one year before the meetings of General Convention; and that such reports be transmitted by him to the Provincial Synods for their consideration before they are presented to the General Convention.

As I have said, these two proposals seem to me unobjectionable. As they confer no power on the Synods to legislate, but only to consider, I can conceive that such previous consideration by the Synods might render discussion in the General Convention on these matters more intelligent and thus greatly facilitate wise and prompt action. It would also give the Synods something worth while to do and thus justify their continuance.

The other five proposals are either unnecessary, or worse still, positively objectionable. They are, with brief comment on each, as follows:

I. That there be given to the provinces a share in the National-Wide Campaign Fund for specifically provincial work, the percentage in each province to be determined by the Synod or Council of the province in consultation with the National Council and the authorities of the constituent Dioceses. With this I place the second proposal, so that I may save time by considering both proposals together.

II. That all requests for appropriations from the National Council by Dioceses and Missionary Districts within a province be submitted to the Provincial Synod for approval; that each province submit to the National Council an annual budget for work of Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the province for which appropriations are asked from the National Council; and that appropriations by the National Council for such work be made in bulk to the province and be distributed by it to its constituent Dioceses and Missionary Districts.

There are many and serious objections to these proposals. I will mention only a few:

(a) It would practically abolish the present system, which, since the movement was inaugurated, has increased the offerings of the people of the Church by about \$15,000,000.

(b) It is too vague and indefinite, and untold difficulties would certainly arise in the attempt to carry out its provisions.

(c) It is to be noted that Porto Rico is in the Second Province; Alaska, Honolulu and the Philippine Islands are part of the Eighth Province, and the Panama Canal Zone is seeking to become a part of the Fourth Province. Now if the proposals of the Commission should be adopted, it would seem to be necessary for these provinces to take over the whole supervision of their missions.

(d) It would tend to center power in the provinces and would lead inevitably to legislation, and I am unalterably opposed to a legislative body interposed between the Diocese and the General Church, as such a body would serve not as an integrating, but as a disruptive force.

Proposal V has to do with the election of missionary bishops.

Proposal VI has to do with the confirmation of a bishop-elect.

Proposal VII has to do with the resignation of a bishop.

Proposal VIII has to do with the trial of a bishop.

In each case the action proposed would enlarge the powers of the provinces by curtailing the powers of the General Church, and such action seems to me not only unnecessary, but highly injudicious.

III. The third matter about which I desire to say a few words has to do with Prayer-Book revision. In order that the changes authorized by the General Convention in Portland, and which must be ratified in New Orleans before they become effective, should not be overlooked, I have appointed a committee to bring these changes to the attention of the Council, so that they might have consideration, and such action taken as you may deem wise or desirable.

Part B of the schedule in the fourth report of the Commission contains those actions of the third report not yet acted upon by the General Convention; now there is a paragraph in this fourth report near the bottom of page 31 which in my judgment ought to be rejected.

The paragraph in question reads as follows:

"In the services of this Church, prayers may be read, taken from the service books authorized by any Church in communion with this Church; provided the order for the administration of the sacraments and other rites set forth by this Church shall not be varied."

If this is adopted, then it would be lawful for any clergyman to use, say in Morning or Evening Prayer, any prayers found in the

Prayer-Book of the Churches of England, Scotland, Ireland and Canada. This seems to me unnecessarily large liberty, but if intercommunion between this Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church be consummated, and such consummation is well on the way, then it would permit the use of prayers to the Virgin Mary, etc., and might cause friction and distress.

I hope, therefore, that the deputies from this Diocese will oppose its adoption.

OVERGROWN PARISHES.

One of the matters to be presented to this Council is the requests for the division of present parishes and the establishment of new ones coming from Henrico and Albemarle Counties.

An anomalous situation has existed for many years in different parts of the Diocese through failure to divide some of the parishes of large territorial extent into smaller and more easily administered cures. It is the mind of the Church that a parish should include a definite section of territory having a rector and vestry and Church organization which has the responsibility and privilege of ministering to the spiritual needs, not merely of a certain group of families who are enrolled on the communicant list, but of all the people who live within its geographical bounds. Theoretically, every foot of land in our Diocese is within the bounds of some parish, and our responsibility of ministration extends to every group of people and every kind of spiritual need.

As population increases, and a parish finds within its bounds too many people and too great opportunities for one minister and vestry to care for, the parish should be divided and another parish erected. Otherwise the sense of responsibility for ministration grows weaker and oftentimes vanishes through sheer inability of one organization to handle the situation.

The fact that this Council will be requested to erect three entirely new parishes out of the former territory of St. Anne's and Fredericksville Parishes in Albemarle, and two new parishes out of Henrico Parish shows how much overgrown these parishes have become, and the granting of these petitions by the Council will tend to the far greater efficiency of Church work, and the strengthening of the sense of responsibility for ministration throughout the territory involved.

There are still other sections of the Diocese where parishes much too large in territorial extent for administration by one rector and vestry should be divided; notably Fairfax Parish in Arlington and upper Fairfax Counties, with its seventeen congregations, large and small, under various kinds of canonical organization, or lack of it; also Truro Parish in Fairfax and Shelburne in Loudoun, in each of

which there are two entirely separate cures with different vestries and rectors living with seeming comfort within the same parochial bounds.

A careful consideration of the whole subject is commended to the rectors and vestries within these parishes, and in other parts of the Diocese where similar conditions exist, or are in danger of coming into existence.

CHURCH HOME.

I suspect there are many members of the Council who do not know that the Church Home for Old Ladies in Richmond is now in its fiftieth year. In 1875 the Home was opened and four old ladies received its care and shelter. I am told by the President of the Board that there are now in the Home thirty and that they are in receipt of many applications which they are not able even to consider. From the very first the Home has done a beautiful work, and it seems to me that there is no institution of the Church that ought to have a greater appeal to our people than is made by this Home, which provides care and shelter for old ladies in their declining years. I want to stress and emphasize this because there seems to be a mistaken impression abroad that the Home is so well endowed that it does not need any further funds. This, however, is a great mistake, and were it not for occasional small gifts we should have to encroach upon our principal to carry on the work as it now stands.

I earnestly hope that this mention of the Home, now in its fiftieth year of useful service, will cause some one to remember the Home in his will, and even stir up some one to make regular offerings for the Home among his other charities.

BISHOP-COAJUTOR.

At our annual Council last May the Council was pleased to grant my request for the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor by reason of the extent of Diocesan work as provided for by Canon 13, Section II (1); and it was furthermore resolved: "That provided the canonical consent of a majority of the Bishops and Standing Committees be received, the election of such Bishop-Coadjutor be made at the next regular meeting of the Diocesan Council, May, 1925." This condition has been met and at the proper time, before the Council enters upon the election, the consents of the Bishops and Standing Committee will be read.

It becomes my duty to carry out the further requirements of Canon 13, Section II (1) which are:

- (a) "Before any election of a Bishop-Coadjutor, the Bishop of the

Diocese shall read, or cause to be read, to the Convention therefor, his written consent to such election." As the reasons which led me to ask for a Coadjutor not only still subsist, but have become clearer and weightier since the request was made at our last Council, I hereby give my written consent to such election.

(b) It is also provided in the Canon that: "In such consent he shall state the duties which he thereby assigns to the Bishop-Coadjutor, when duly ordained and consecrated, and such consent shall form part of the proceedings of the Convention."

In carrying out the provisions of the Canons, I have determined to assign to the Bishop-Coadjutor not only the oversight of, but jurisdiction over the churches and missions, except missions among the colored people, in the Rappahannock, Albemarle and Valley Convocations, so far as may be done under the Canons of the Church; and I also place under his supervision all the mountain missions in the Diocese. From this it will be seen that I reserve for myself jurisdiction over the churches and missions in the Richmond and Piedmont Convocations except mountain missions, and also the work among the colored people where such work is now in existence or wherever it may hereafter be established.

While it seemed to me right and necessary thus clearly to define the jurisdiction and the duties of the Bishop-Coadjutor, I would express my conviction that, by mutual agreement between the Bishop and his Coadjutor, the visitations in the Diocese ought to be so arranged that, taking the visitations turn and turn about, each Bishop would keep in close and intimate touch with all the churches and missions in the Diocese; and I am quite confident that such an arrangement will be effected to the mutual satisfaction of the Bishops and congregations concerned.

The Committee on Credentials reported that the credentials of the Lay Delegates were correct, and presented one additional credential which had not been received by the Secretary.

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that all accounts of the various funds under the charge of the Treasurer of the Diocese

from January 1 to December 31, 1924, have been examined by Messrs. Pullen & Company, certified public accountants of Richmond, and have been found to be correct. We have examined the report of the accountants, and so far as we are informed it is correct.

All of which will be used in paying the expenses of delegates to the General Convention, if needed.

As the Council expects to elect a Bishop-Coadjutor at their meeting, we must make provision in the budget of 1926 for the payment of his salary and traveling expenses. As it usually takes two or three months for the Standing Committees and Bishops throughout the Church to vote upon the election of a Bishop, any one elected at this time will, in all probability, be able to undertake the duties of the office at some time either in August or September. We must make provision for his salary from the earliest date at which, in our judgment, he could enter upon his duties, consequently we are placing in the budget an item of salary of Bishop-Coadjutor and his traveling expenses for five months in 1925. We recommend a salary for the Bishop-Coadjutor of \$6,000, which will include a provision for his house rent. We submit, therefore, the following estimated expenses for the year 1926:

It will be noted that the estimated expenses for 1926 amounts to \$20,785, as compared with the estimated expenses of \$11,485 in 1925, an increase of \$9,300.

The parish assessments to cover the 1925 expenses amounted to \$12,051. We submit the assessment of \$20,548 for 1926, which is hereto attached, and estimated expenses of \$20,785 for same year. The balance will be covered by the balance carried over at the end of this year. We recommend the payment of all salaries and other expenses of the Diocese as set forth in the estimated expenses of 1926 in this report.

It will be noted that our estimated expenses for 1926 include two items amounting to \$2,750 to pay the salary and traveling expenses of the Bishop-Coadjutor for the five months of 1925. These two items will not appear in our estimated expenses for 1927. Consequently, the Council can look to a reduction in the Bishop's and Contingent Fund assessment for 1927 of 10 per cent from the assessments of 1926.

Your committee desires to call attention to the fact that eighty-two churches, or about the same number as last year, failed to pay their part of the \$200,000 budget of 1924 to the extent of \$26,911.77. This is a decided improvement upon the condition shown at the end of 1923, in which year, as stated in our report to the Council of 1924, the churches in the Diocese failed to the extent of \$30,843.19 in paying the Diocesan budget of \$190,000. It can be seen therefore that the churches in the Diocese gave in 1924 upon the Diocesan budget about \$13,000 more than they gave in 1923.

The Treasurer's accounts show that at the close of 1924 the Diocese owed \$8,000 to banks and a cash overdraft of \$2,884.26, making a total deficiency of \$10,884.26, as compared with a deficiency of \$8,782.72 at the close of 1923. This increase, as has been reported to the Councils of 1923 and 1924, arose in the Diocesan Missionary Society through the expansion of their work. Provision has been made in the Diocesan Program of 1925 for the repayment of the larger part of this deficiency, and the remainder has been provided for in the Program of 1926 recommended to the Council by the Board of Apportionment.

The Treasurer of the Diocese, in the course of his disbursements of salaries and other appropriations ordered by the Diocesan Council or the Diocesan Missionary Society, faces the situation that sometimes the receipts from the parish quotas or the Bishop's and Contingent Fund are insufficient to pay the appropriations when due. Under such circumstances he borrows from the banks sufficient amounts to pay the

appropriations. It is inevitable that in a work as large and as wide-spread as the work of our Diocese times must come when money must be borrowed from the bank.

The Treasurer has borrowed money whenever necessary to carry on the work, and this has been done with the tacit approval and consent of the officials of the Diocese and of the Council itself. But we deem it advisable to have the formal approval of the Council given to this course. We, therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the action of the Treasurer of the Diocese during the past year and in previous years of borrowing such funds as were necessary to conduct the work of the Diocese is hereby approved.

Resolved, second, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized and empowered to borrow from time to time on behalf of the Diocese and to sign notes therefor in his official capacity in such amounts as, in the judgment of the Finance Committee, may be required for the authorized expenditures of the Bishop's and Contingent Fund, the Diocesan Offices, the Diocesan Missionary Society and all other funds that he holds in his accounts as the Treasurer of the Diocese, such amounts, however, not to exceed the sum of \$25,000.

The Rev. W. R. Mason moved to amend the report by making the salary of the Bishop-Coadjutor \$5,000. This amendment was lost. A vote was then taken on the motion to adopt as a whole and was carried.

Mr. Caskie presented also the schedule of parish assessments for the Bishop's and Contingent Fund for 1926. (See Appendix C.)

The Rev. John G. Scott presented the petition of Varina Church, in Henrico Parish, to be erected as a separate parish. (See page 61.)

The Rev. G. B. Palmer presented the petition of St. Ste-

phen's Church, Henrico Parish, to be erected as Tuckahoe Parish. (See page 63.)

The Rev. W. R. Mason presented a petition for the change of parish lines and the erection of new parishes in Albemarle County. (See page 63.)

These were referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Judge R. Carter Scott thanked the Council for their message of sympathy sent to him last year during his enforced absence.

Judge Scott presented an amendment to Canon XII. (See page 78.)

This was referred to the Committee on Canons:

The Rev. W. E. Cox presented the report of the special committee appointed at the last Council on plans of laying parish apportionments.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PLAN OF LAYING APPORTIONMENTS.

Your committee appointed to report to this meeting of the Diocesan Council (May, 1925), "Whether it be desirable to adopt some other methods than those now in use for the laying of the parish apportionments for the work of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia," reports as follows:

After careful consideration at numerous and prolonged meetings of the committee, and in the light of suggestions invited and received from Rectors and Vestries of the Diocese, we feel convinced that the present plan of laying the parish apportionments in this Diocese should be amended.

The outstanding disadvantage of that plan, in the judgment of the committee, is the fixing of the apportionments or quotas by a central Board of Apportionment, the several Vestries and congregations having no voice therein except the right of appeal in the event the apportionments so fixed by the Board are not satisfactory to them.

Your committee feels that the work of the Church in this Diocese can best be served, not by the adoption of some new and untried system of finance, but by such revision of our present system as will remedy its defects. In the judgment of this committee two things are needed:

First. Definite undertakings on which the Executive Committee of the D. M. S. can rely for sums certain in amount and sufficient as a whole to support the work to be undertaken.

Second. A method of arriving at these undertakings which will enlist the hearty cooperation of the Vestries and congregations of the several parishes and missions, and eliminate causes of friction.

With these two things as our main objective we have prepared a plan, the principal features of which are as follows:

1—A method by which the Vestries will play a larger part in determining the amounts to be contributed by their respective parishes and will undertake to see that these amounts are paid; and which at the same time will provide for proper suggestions by the Executive Committee of the D. M. S., which is acquainted with the needs of the Diocese as a whole and has general knowledge of the relative financial strength of the several parishes.

2—A plan by which the Executive Committee, after making out a program and budget, will make a tentative apportionment of this budget among the several parishes and ask the Vestries to accept definitely the whole of their several apportionments, or such part as they think their parishes can be counted on to contribute.

3—A plan which will increase and maintain interest in the work of the Diocese and of the General Church. To this end it is suggested that representatives of the Executive Committee be sent to meet each Vestry and congregation in the Diocese before they are asked to make any pledge for a contribution, with the purpose of informing the Vestries and congregations of what the Church is doing and enlist the sympathy and cooperation of the members in the Church's work.

4—The formation of an organization of laymen, with sub-divisions throughout the Diocese, who will take an active part in this work. This is suggested as a vital need, for without organized effort by the laymen any plan for carrying on the work of the Diocese will be necessarily less effective than the same plan would be if the laymen were organized and cooperating.

Following the general principles just outlined, your committee respectfully submits the following Proposed Plan for Apportionments:

PROPOSED PLAN FOR APPORTIONMENTS.

1—Instead of a Board of Apportionment as now constituted, there shall be a Board of Missionary Finance, with the members chosen in same manner as that formerly in force in choosing the members of the Board of Apportionment, but with duties in accordance with the plan herewith suggested.

2—The Board of Missionary Finance, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, shall each year, not later than the 15th of January, prepare a program for the work of the Church in the Diocese and a tentative budget of the ex-

penses of this program, which shall not be stated in round figures only, but shall be itemized, together with the Diocesan quota for the work of the Church at large, and also a tentative schedule of amounts to be suggested to the various parishes and congregations as representing what the committee deems their several equitable portions of the whole.

3—This tentative schedule of contributions or quotas shall be based upon the relative financial ability of the parishes and congregations as shown by their parochial reports for the preceding five years, the number of their communicants, and all other facts and considerations which may become known to the Board and the Executive Committee.

4—The program and tentative budget above described, as adopted, with such information and explanations as the Committee deems advisable, shall be printed and mailed to the Rector and Vestry of each parish and congregation not later than February 1, with the Committee's estimate of the amount which it considers the equitable portion for each parish and congregation to contribute.

5—The Vestry of each parish and congregation shall be asked if it will accept as its quota the amount suggested by the Committee for the contribution of the parish or congregation in question and, if not, what proportion of that amount it can assume, with the request that the Committee be advised of the Vestry's action not later than March 15. If no reply be received by April 1 from any Vestry, the Executive Committee will assume that the quota suggested for the parish or congregation in question is acceptable to it.

6—The acceptance of a quota by any Vestry shall be deemed an obligation on the part of the parish or congregation which it represents to make the utmost endeavor to contribute during the next fiscal year the amount so undertaken, and, in case any Vestry takes no action and its quota be fixed as above provided for such a case, that quota shall be treated in all respects as if it had been formally accepted by the Vestry.

7—In the event that the total of all quotas agreed upon or fixed as above provided shall be less than the amount which the Executive Committee shall have shown to be needed, that Committee shall send to each Rector and Vestry not later than April 15 a schedule showing all quotas as then determined, with the amount still needed, and with the request for an increased contribution as large as the Vestry thinks that the parish or congregation can undertake and with the request that a reply be made on or before May 5.

8—The Executive Committee shall report to the Council the tentative itemized budget for final action, and also the schedule of quotas as agreed upon or fixed in accordance with the foregoing provision. In the event that the total amount of these quotas does not equal the

amount required by the budget, the Council shall take such steps as it may deem advisable either to reduce the budget, or to increase the offerings, or both; provided, however, that action taken by the Council looking to an increase in offerings shall not be construed as the levying of an assessment, but shall be treated as a request by the Council for further contributions.

9—The Executive Committee shall send to each Vestry where practicable, at a time agreeable to the members of that Vestry, one or more representatives to explain fully the purposes and plans of the Committee in connection with the program for the Diocese.

10—The Council shall take steps to organize a league of laymen, with a representative in every parish and congregation, whose duty it shall be to cooperate with the Executive Committee in connection with the program for the Diocese and to aid in every way in carrying out the purposes in connection therewith.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLES 5 AND 6 OF CANON X.

Amend Article 5 by striking out of Paragraph III the words "The Board of Apportionment" and substitute therefor "The Board of Missionary Finance."

Strike out all of Article 6 and substitute therefor the following:

"In order that sufficient means may be provided by the stated offerings of the people for the support and extension of the missionary, educational, social service and other religious work of the Diocese and for its proportionate part of the work of the Church at large, the Executive Committee shall plan and promote an Every-Member Canvass to be held each year in every congregation and parish after adequate preparation, at a time appointed by the Committee; provided, however, that it shall not be obligatory upon any congregation or parish to follow any one method of conducting this canvass, but each congregation and parish shall be free to adopt its own method of accomplishing this object.

The Board of Missionary Finance, in cooperation with the appropriate department of the Presiding Bishop and Council and with the parochial authorities and committees organized for the purpose, shall also promote a campaign of instruction and preparation throughout the Diocese for the purpose of acquainting the members of each parish and congregation with the work above provided for and its needs. It shall be the duty of the Rector and Vestry of each parish and congregation to further the objects of this campaign and to use their best endeavors to secure pledges to the full amount of the quotas of their several parishes and congregations and to see that these pledges be fully paid at regular intervals during the fiscal year for which they are made.

The Board of Missionary Finance, after consultation with the appropriate department of the Presiding Bishop and Council and of the Province, the Trustees of the Diocesan institutions, and representatives of the parishes and missions of the Diocese, shall each year, not later than the 15th of January, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, prepare a program for the work of the Church in the Diocese with a tentative budget of the expenses incident to this program which shall be itemized, together with the quota for the Diocese in the work of the Church at large, and also tentative schedule of the amounts to be suggested to the various parishes and congregations as representing what the Committee deem their several equitable portions of the whole.

This tentative schedule of contributions or quotas shall be based upon the relative financial ability of the several parishes and congregations as shown by their parochial reports for the preceding five years, the number of their communicants, and by all other facts and considerations which shall become known to the Board and to the Executive Committee.

The program and tentative budget, as adopted, with such information and explanations as the Committee deems advisable, shall be printed and mailed to the Rector and Vestry of each parish and congregation not later than February 1, with the Committee's estimate of the amount which it considers equitable as the quota for that parish or congregation to contribute.

The Vestry of each parish and congregation shall be asked by the Committee if it will accept as its quota the amount thus suggested for the contribution of the parish or congregation in question, and, if not, what proportion of that amount it can assume, with the request that the Committee be advised of the Vestry's action not later than March 15 and a statement that, if no reply be received by April 1, the Committee will assume that the quota suggested is acceptable.

The acceptance of a quota by any Vestry shall be deemed an obligation on the part of the parish or congregation which it represents to make the utmost endeavor to contribute during the next fiscal year the amount so undertaken, and, in case any Vestry takes no action and its quota be fixed as above provided for such a case, that quota shall be treated in all respects as if it had been formally accepted by the congregation.

In the event that the total of all quotas agreed upon or fixed as above provided shall be less than the amount the Executive Committee shall have shown to be needed, that Committee shall send to each Rector and Vestry not later than April 15 a schedule showing all quotas as then determined, with the amount still needed, and with the request for an increased contribution as large as the Vestry thinks

that the parish or congregation can undertake, and with the request that a reply be made on or before May 5.

The Executive Committee shall report to the Council the tentative itemized budget for final action, and also the schedule of quotas as agreed upon or fixed in accordance with the foregoing provision. In the event that the total of these quotas does not equal the amount required by the budget, the Council shall take such steps as it may deem advisable either to reduce the budget, or to increase the offerings, or both; provided, however, that action taken by the Council looking to an increase in offerings shall not be construed as levying an assessment, but shall be treated as a request by the Council for further contributions.

As soon as practicable after the adjournment of the Council, the Board of Missionary Finance, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, shall prepare a schedule distributing the total amount of all the quotas as determined among the several objects shown in the budget, making appropriations accordingly, and directing when and under what conditions the appropriation so made shall be paid. This schedule, when approved as above provided, shall be the warrant of the Treasurer of the Diocese for paying out the contributions received on account of the quotas; provided, however, that any unused or unapportioned funds may be expended at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

The program, budget and schedule of quotas shall be published in such manner and at such time as the Board of Missionary Finance shall deem appropriate.

I concur in the above report with the omission of the following clause in Section 5 of The Proposed Plan for Apportionments, "and, if not, what proportion of that amount it can assume."

This, of course, applies to this clause and reference thereto wherever it occurs in the report and canon.

My reasons are:

(1) It suggests a general lowering of the standard which is not wholesome, and it implies the Board's lack of faith in its carefully suggested quotas.

(2) It may be construed as sanction for a Vestry or congregation to thus, finally perhaps, limit its giving by a narrow parochial viewpoint; rather than, with a broader vision of the whole Church working together as a unit, to cooperate in full measure of its ability, and thereby inspire others to do the same.

I recommend the following substitute for Section 5:

"The Vestry of each parish and congregation shall be asked if it will accept as its quota the amount suggested by the Committee for the contribution of the parish or congregation in question, with the request that the Committee be advised of the Vestry's action not later than March 15.

In the event there are peculiar conditions which a Vestry feels affect the ability of their congregation to give, they shall make known to the Committee the nature of these conditions, stating the amount their quota should be increased or decreased because of same.

If no reply be received by April 1 from any Vestry, the Executive Committee will assume that the quota suggested for the parish or congregation in question is acceptable to it.

R. CARTER BEVERLEY.

Mr. Boogher extended on behalf of Colonel and Mrs. Daniel DeVore, of Chatham, their invitation to the Council to visit Chatham after the adjournment of Council on Thursday afternoon. This invitation was accepted.

Mr. Robert Beverley presented the following amendment to Canon X:

Resolved, That paragraph 3, Article 6, of Canon X be amended as follows: Insert at the close of sentence in line 11, the following sentence: "Should such be the case, it may be referred to a committee of four—one appointed at large by the Bishop, one by the Board of Apportionment, one from the Convocation from which the grievance comes, and one from the church or parish from which the grievance comes: decision of such committee to be final."

This amendment was referred to the Committee on Canons. (Note by Secretary. It is to be noted that the Committee on Canons did not report on this amendment, and consequently it was not acted upon by the Council.)

On motion of Judge Scott the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor was made the order of the day immediately after the Council convenes this afternoon.

The Rev. R. Cary Montague made a verbal report as City Missionary of Richmond.

The report of the Statistician was presented. (See Appendix D, II.)

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON INCREASE OF THE MINISTRY.

The fact that the Council has appointed this committee shows that it realizes the importance of the subject, a study of which seems to show that this Diocese and indeed the whole Church has four great needs:

1. More ministers. There are not enough men to do the work, either at home or abroad.

2. Ministers of good character. While we believe that men of unworthy character rarely succeed in getting into the ministry, some do, and none should be able to do so. This problem goes back to the rectors and vestries, without whose recommendation no man may be ordained. We respectfully suggest to these that they sign the papers of no man until they personally know him to be a fit person.

3. Ministers who are well educated. Education and general information have become so widespread that an uneducated man is not qualified to lead the average congregation. We suggest at least the consideration of a ruling that no man who has not a B. A. degree be admitted to the ministry.

4. Ministers who have the quality of leadership. The minister has usually the opportunity of becoming the leader in his community. He cannot seize that opportunity if he has not the natural gift of leading others.

Such are the needs. We would like to suggest one method of meeting them which seems to us the best, that is the method of personal suggestion to picked men. We believe in the sermon on the ministry, but it is unfortunately true that it too often appeals to the weak man. Our Lord's method was to choose individuals suited to the work and summon them to do it, and this was also the method of the apostles. We believe that it is the best method. It can be applied anywhere, but especially

1. In the parish. The minister who has baptized and prepared his boys for confirmation knows which of them have the special gifts, and has their confidence. He can go to the best of them and say at least: "It is your duty and privilege to consider seriously if this is not your special task in life."

2. In our schools, and especially our Church schools. We are in-

clined to think that here, perhaps, lies the greatest opportunity for this kind of work.

3. In our colleges and universities, where we have chaplains chosen for their ability to get in touch with and influence young men.

In short, your committee, realizing that the future of the Church depends upon an unceasing supply of ministers, and that this supply must come from the present generation of men and boys, believe that we should make it our business to see that the best of them shall at least be brought face to face with the question: Has God called me? and, If He has am I willing to say: "Here am I, send me?"

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE CONSTITUTION AND THE PRAYER-BOOK.

To the One Hundred and Thirtieth Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Your committee appointed to consider and report upon the changes in the Constitution of the Church and changes in the Book of Common Prayer proposed at the General Convention of 1922, and sent to this Council that they may be finally acted upon by the General Convention of 1925, would report as follows:

I. There is but one change in the Constitution, which reads as follows: "Amend Article VIII of the Constitution by adding immediately after the Declaration of Conformity the following words": "If any Bishop ordains a priest or deacon to minister elsewhere than in this Church, he shall do so only in accordance with such provisions as shall be set forth in the canons."

The above provides certain restrictions in regard to the ordination of clergymen who may be ordained by one of our Bishops to minister in any other congregation than this Church. The amendment seems to your committee advisable.

II. The alterations proposed in the Prayer Book are numerous, as shown in the printed statement herewith filed. It is impossible to report to this Council these changes in detail. They cover a large part of the Prayer Book. The members of your committee having heard, on the floor of the General Convention, these changes fully discussed and the reasons for the changes, feel that, on the whole, they are desirable, giving certain flexibility to the services, and that none of them seems to affect the integrity of the Prayer Book, or to be open to serious criticism.

We would therefore report that it is the sense of your committee that no action concerning them is necessary.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON A LAYMAN'S TRAINING
SCHOOL.

To the One Hundred and Thirtieth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Two years ago a resolution was presented to the Diocesan Council to the effect that a committee be appointed to take under advisement the establishment of a Lay Workers' Training School in this Diocese. As chairman of that committee, we regret to say we have not gotten very far. Why? Indifference.

I. *Need.* Any man faced with the increasing difficulties of carrying on the true life of his parish and the problems of this day and generation realizes the feebleness of the Church to cope with its tasks. Again, any man, watching with interest the advance of the other denominations about us in religious education, observes the backwardness of our own, even in the making of an effort to do anything to meet the crying needs of the present situation. The world cries for leaders and to a degree it gets them. The Church cries, and to an astounding degree it does not get them. Give us leaders, men say, but how can we with our present equipment.

The need I hardly am compelled to further present; it is the call to Christ's chief command, "Go and teach."

II. *Purpose.* To establish a training school in this Diocese, to train lay workers, both men and women, for every department of Church's work. Can it be done?

III. *How can it be done?* I hear the inner answer, It can't be done. We have enough to occupy us, and still further, it takes funds. Don't add to the budget. In a few words, I shall try to state an affirmative answer:

(a) Such a school can be begun October next at the Mayo Memorial Church House, Richmond. That is the logical starting place.

(b) *Funds.* By your help can be secured Bethany Institute Fund. We can begin on what we can secure.

(c) *Teachers,* by your help, can be found. Volunteers from clergy of the Diocese have already been secured.

(d) *Students.* There will be a plenty.

(e) *Last, but not least,* it's a venture of faith. And because it is,

there is no doubt of its accomplishment, for it lives where all other things fail.

III. That St. Stephen's Church, in the parish of Henrico, be set off as a separate parish, with boundaries coterminous with the present boundaries of Tuckahoe District.

In conformity with Canon XII, Section I, due notice was given for a congregational meeting, which meeting was held and this committee was then appointed, and in accordance with Section II, a proper and formal notice of our intention to make this application was given to the ecclesiastical authority and to the vestries of Henrico Parish more than two months ago. A copy of said notices being herewith attached.

Believing that the work of the Church will be furthered in our community, and that the Church will be enlarged and strengthened and that many families, who in the past have been lost to this Church by reason of the fact that there was no Episcopal Church in this district may be recovered, and that the work of the Church may be more effectively done, and further being assured that we can maintain a separate organization and have the united support of the Episcopalians

of the district, we respectfully ask to be set aside as a separate parish, to be known as Varina Parish, the metes and bounds to be those of Varina Magisterial District, which metes and bounds in legal form, together with Clarke's map of Henrico County, 1913, 1920 and 1925, are herewith filed with this petition in accordance with Canon XII, Section III.

The only church or mission within this district is the Varina Church making this petition, which reported thirty-six communicants as of January 1, 1925, with twelve persons to be confirmed at the next visitation of the Bishop, and an indefinite number of parishioners within the above stated boundary.

Your petitioners beg you to grant this request for the furtherance of the work of this church and the extension of Christ's kingdom in our midst.

ity of the Diocese and to the vestries within the territory affected two months before the meeting of this Council.

At a meeting of representatives of all vestries in Frederickville, St. Anne's and Greenwood, called to consider a revision of parish lines of the said parishes and held at Christ Church Parish House on May 7, 1925, the undersigned were appointed a committee to prepare new parish boundaries for the above mentioned parishes and new boundaries which will set apart St. Paul's Church, Ivy, the city of Charlottesville and its suburbs, and the University missions as three separate parishes. Your committee, taking into consideration the information given at this meeting, beg to present the following report, recommending proposed new parish lines as follows:

(1) St. Anne's Parish. Beginning at a point on the Albemarle-Fluvanna boundary four miles south of the Rivanna River; thence by an air line northwesterly to a point on the Scottsville Road four miles south of the Charlottesville Court House in an air line; thence by an air line to a point where the north fork of the Hardware River crosses the Old Lynchburg Road; thence by the western boundary of Scottsville District along the tops of Fan and Appleberry Mountains to the Nelson County line; thence by Nelson County line, the James River, and the Fluvanna County line, to the beginning.

(2) The University missions field in the present territory of St. Anne's Parish, to be erected into a parish to be called McIlhany Parish with the following boundaries: Beginning at a point on the Scottsville Road four miles in an air line south of the Court House in Charlottesville; thence by an air line to a point where the north fork of the Hardware River crosses the Old Lynchburg Road; thence by the western boundary of Scottsville District along the tops of Fan and Appleberry Mountains to the Nelson County line; thence along the said county line in a northwesterly direction to Greenwood Parish line; thence by the eastern boundary of that parish along the tops of the Ragged Mountains to Israels Gap; thence continuing along the tops of the Ragged Mountains to Woods Crossing on the Chesapeake and Ohio R. R.; thence by an air line to the point of beginning.

(3) The field of St. Paul's, Ivy and St. John the Baptist in the present territory of Frederickville and St. Anne's Parishes to be erected into a parish to be called Ivy Parish, bounded as follows: Beginning at Woods Crossing on the C. & O. R. R., thence in a south-

westerly direction along the tops of the Ragged Mountains to Israels Gap; thence westerly along the county road to Batesville; thence along the road to the main entrance of Miller School; thence by an air line in a northerly direction to a point on the Jefferson Highway one mile west of Mechums' River; thence by an air line northwardly to intersection of the roads from Crozet and Mechums respectively to White Hall; thence by an air line due northwest to the Moorman's River; thence down the said river to its junction with Rocky River; thence south by the county road to its intersection with the road from Owensville to Charlottesville; thence by an air line to the beginning at Woods Crossing.

(4) Greenwood Parish. Beginning at Jarman's Gap; thence by an easterly line along the tops of the mountain to the intersection south of White Hall of the roads leading from Crozet and Mechums respectively to White Hall; thence by an air line to a point on the Jefferson Highway one mile west of Mechums' River; thence by an air line to the gate of the Miller School; thence along the county road via Batesville to Israels Gap; thence along the tops of the Ragged Mountains to the Nelson County line; thence along the county lines of Nelson and Augusta to the beginning.

(5) A new parish formed from Frederickville and St. Anne's to be called Monticello Parish, bounded as follows: Beginning at Woods Crossing; thence by an air line northwardly to the point where the road from Free Union intersects the road from Charlottesville to Owensville; thence along the said Free Union road to the junction of Rocky River with Moorman's River; thence down Moorman's and Rivanna Rivers to the Southern Railway bridge across the Rivanna River; thence by an air line eastwardly to the intersection of road from the Keswick road across the Southwestern Mountains with the Charlottesville-Stony Point road; thence along the southern boundary of Walker's Parish to Milton and down the Rivanna River to the Fluvanna County line; thence southwardly by the said county line to a point four miles from the river; thence by an air line along the boundary of St. Anne's Parish to a point on the Scottsville road four miles south of the Charlottesville Court House by an air line; thence by an air line to Woods Crossing.

(6) Frederickville Parish to be bounded as follows: Beginning at Jarman's Gap on the Albemarle-Augusta boundary; thence in an easterly direction along the tops of the mountain to the intersection south of White Hall of the roads leading from Crozet and Mechums respectively to White Hall; thence by an air line due northwest to the Moorman's River; thence down the said river and the Rivanna River to the Southern Railway bridge across the Rivanna River; thence by an air line eastwardly to the intersection of the road from

the Keswick road across the Southwestern Mountains with the Charlottesville-Stony Point road; thence along the said road by Stony Point to the Orange County line; thence by the Orange, Greene and Augusta County lines to Jarman's Gap.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE OF THE CHURCH PENSION FUND.

The Church Pension Fund Committee of the Diocese presents the following report of the transactions of our committee during the year 1924.

The income of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, amounting to

\$701.29, and of the Disabled Clergy Fund, amounting to \$5,722.53, a total of \$6,423.82, has been forwarded to New York as usual. Out of this amount the Church Pension Fund has paid the assessments on the Bishop's salary and that of the Secretary of the Diocese and on the salaries paid by the D. M. S. The remainder, according to our custom, has been returned to the parishes in the Diocese who paid their Pension Fund assessments in full for the year 1923. As all of our parishes paid in full for that year, they all shared in the refund.

A statement was received on January 10, 1925, from the Church Pension Fund showing the amount of arrearages still owing by parishes in the Diocese on 1924 assessments. We are glad to state that the number of arrearages was much smaller than is usually the case on January 1st. The Pension Fund allows two months in which these arrearages can be paid, and all arrearages for 1924 were paid before the books of the Pension Fund closed at the end of March.

One question that has arisen between our Diocesan Committee and the Pension Fund during the year has been in regard to the assessments on the salaries of two or three clergymen in the Diocese who receive nominal salaries of a very small amount. In one case the minister received a salary of \$180 and in another case a salary of \$400. The Pension Fund, after careful consideration of the matter, took the stand that the Pension Fund assessments provided for two classes of clergy only—one a clergyman receiving an actual salary commensurate in some measure at least with living expenses, and another of the non-parochial clergymen who do not receive a salary from church sources and who are expected to pay their own assessments. It makes no provision for a clergyman receiving a nominal salary of \$200 or \$300. Their ruling in the matter was that in the case of a clergyman receiving such nominal salary some provision must be made for paying assessment on a putative salary of \$1,200 for him.

We learned from the Pension Fund that whereas, there are some clergymen in the Diocese receiving our minimum salary (\$1,000 to a white minister without dependents and \$750 to a colored minister without dependents), they would accept the usual assessments on such salaries as being the full assessments required. But in the case of the clergymen receiving nominal salaries, they must require the payment of the assessment on the putative salary of \$1,200.

In order to meet this situation, our Diocesan Committee ordered the payment out of the income of our Diocesan funds of the difference between the assessment on the actual salary paid and the assessment on the putative salary of \$1,200. It seemed to us in such cases that where a clergyman is living in large part on his own income and is receiving merely a nominal salary for his work and at the same time giving his whole time to the work of the Church, it is

only proper that the Diocese itself should see that his assessment is paid in full.

During the last year we have suffered the loss of two of our retired clergy, the Rev. Dr. Goodwin and the Rev. Dr. Crawford, and another clergyman, the Rev. H. H. Williams, has gone upon the retired list and is receiving a pension. Through the death of the Rev. Angus Crawford, D. D., the widow's pension has been ordered paid to Mrs. Crawford.

The following statistics may be of interest: The Church Pension Fund is at present paying retirement pensions to nine of the clergy of this Diocese and a disability pension to one clergyman. The total of these pensions amounts to \$5,918.09. A pension is paid to one orphan of a clergyman amounting to \$150. It is paying pensions to six widows amounting to \$1,920.

The Church Pension Fund, according to its agreement with the Diocese, is paying annually the pensions granted by our Diocesan funds before the Church Pension Fund came into existence. The pensions amount at present to the following:

To one clergyman.....	\$ 300.00
To seventeen widows.....	2,800.00
To five children of deceased clergy.....	614.29
Total of.....	\$3,714.29

This amount is paid annually by the Church Pension Fund to the former beneficiaries of our Diocesan funds. In addition the Church Pension Fund pays to these same beneficiaries out of the old General Clergy Relief Fund and the General Convention of 1907 Fund:

To one clergyman.....	\$ 200.00
To eleven widows.....	2,300.00
To two children of deceased clergy.....	185.71
Total of.....	\$2,685.71

It will be seen, therefore, that the Church Pension Fund is paying back annually to beneficiaries in this Diocese a total of \$14,388.09. The total salaries in our Diocese amounted on January 1, 1924, to \$299,772.76, on which assessments were charged amounting to \$17,232.96. So it can be seen how large a proportion of the Pension Fund assessments paid by our parishes comes back directly to the Diocese

to the relief of the disabled clergy and the widows and orphans of deceased clergy.

The Rt. Rev. Beverley D. Tucker, D. D., Bishop of Southern Virginia, being present, was invited to a seat in the Council beside the Chair.

Mr. Lewis C. Williams presented the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

I. The Committee on Canons recommends the rejection of the proposed amendment to Articles 5 and 6 of Canon X, as set forth in the report of the Special Committee on Plan of Laying Apportionments.

We, however, recommend the adoption by Council of the following resolutions as set forth in the said special committee's report, viz:

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society shall send to each congregation at a time agreeable to its vestry one or more representatives to explain fully the purpose and plans of the committee, when requested, in connection with the program for the Diocese.

The Executive Committee shall take steps, after consultation with the rectors and vestries, to organize an association of laymen, with a representative in every parish and congregation, whose duty it shall be to cooperate with the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society in connection with the program for the Diocese and to aid in every way in carrying out the purposes in connection therewith.

The Committee on Canons recommends that the words "Presiding

Bishop and Council" in Canon X be changed to read "National Council" in order to conform with the official terminology.

In paragraph 1, page 17, strike out after "department of the" the words "Presiding Bishop and Council" and substitute "National Council." In paragraph 3, page 17, after "cooperation with the department of the" strike out the words "Presiding Bishop and Council" and substitute words "National Council."

Mr. Cox moved as a substitute for the first recommendation that the report of the Special Committee on Plan of Laying Apportionments be placed before the Council upon its merits.

Speeches were, on motion, limited to five minutes. It was moved that Mr. Murray M. McGuire, a member of the special committee, be given the privilege of the floor to speak on this report. Mr. Cox's substitute, being put to the vote, was lost.

The hour of one having come, the Council adjourned for lunch.

THURSDAY, May 28th, 2:30 P. M.

The Council was called to order, Bishop Brown presiding. Consideration of the report of the Committee on Canons was resumed.

The amendment proposed by the committee in paragraph 1, page 17, and paragraph 3 of Canon X, that the words "Presiding Bishop and Council" in each case be stricken out and the words "National Council" inserted, was put to the vote and adopted by a canonical majority.

The two resolutions presented by the committee were then adopted.

The committee recommended the adoption of the proposed amendment to Canon VII:

Strike out in the third and fourth lines of Canon VII, Section 1, the words "who shall be trustees of the invested funds of the Diocese" and insert in their place the words "who shall be members of the corporation known as the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

This amendment, being put to the vote, was adopted by a canonical majority.

The committee recommended the following amendments to Canon XII:

Resolved, That Canon XII be amended as follows: In Section 1, clause 3, line 3, after the word "Middlesex" add the words "Gloucester and Mathews," and in clause 4, line 2, strike out "Gloucester" and in line 3 strike out "Mathews."

This amendment, being put to the vote, was adopted by a canonical majority.

The committee recommended the adoption of the amendment proposed in the following resolution:

Whereas, both the Richmond and the Albemarle Convocations have taken formal action giving consent to a change in convocational bounds whereby Rivanna Parish, comprising the whole of Fluvanna County, will be transferred from the Richmond Convocation to the Albemarle Convocation, therefore be it

Resolved, That Canon XII be amended as follows: In Section 1, paragraph 1, line 2, insert the word "Fluvanna" between the words "Albemarle" and "Louisa."

In paragraph 4 strike out the word "Fluvanna" in line 2.

This proposed amendment, being put to the vote, was adopted by a canonical majority.

The committee recommended that the following amendment proposed to Canon I be not adopted:

Resolved, That Canon I be amended by the addition of the following paragraph: Reports as far as practicable of all committees which are to be presented to a regular meeting of the Council shall be forwarded by the respective chairmen of said committees to the Secretary of the Council at least thirty days before the Council. The Secretary shall have said reports immediately printed and shall forward copies to each delegate so that the same may be received at least two weeks before the meeting of the Council.

The committee's recommendation that this amendment to the canon be not adopted was approved.

The committee then moved that this proposed amendment be adopted as a rule of the Council, and requested that it be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Sands moved that this resolution be not accepted. This motion was carried.

The report of the Committee on Canons, as thus amended, was then adopted as a whole.

Mr. Taylor reported that there is a vacancy in the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, and moved that the Council nominate Messrs. Edmund Strudwick, Edmund A. Saunders and Thomas W. Purcell as three persons from whom the Trustees may select one to fill the vacancy.

This motion was carried.

Mr. Brydon presented the following:

To the One Hundred and Thirtieth Annual Council:

I beg to report that there are three vacancies in the Board of Trustees of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia. Acting under the authority of our charter, we have elected Mr. J. Marshall Lewis, of Gloucester; Mr. Frank P. Eastman, of Urbanna, and Rev. Beverley D. Tucker, Jr., D. D., of Richmond, to fill these vacancies temporarily until the Council shall nominate persons from which the vacancies may be permanently filled.

G. MACLAREN BRYDON, *Sec'y Church Schools.*

On motion, Messrs. J. Marshall Lewis, Frank P. Eastman, Rev. B. D. Tucker, Jr., James Caskie, Richard H. Meade and A. P. Thornton were nominated as persons from whose these vacancies may be filled.

Mr. Alexander H. Sands presented the following resolution:

Resolved, by the Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, That the trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, or the survivors of said trustees, as named in a deed from B. S. Hume to said trustees, dated June 22, 1904, and recorded amongst the land records of the city of Richmond, be and they are authorized to sell and convey the property described in said deed, and to turn over the proceeds therefrom to "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

This resolution was adopted.

Mr. Peter presented the

THE REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE ON THE WORLD CONFERENCE ON FAITH AND ORDER.

In making our report to the Council on the World Conference on Faith and Order, it might be interesting to give a resume of what has been accomplished by the Commission throughout the year.

In the first place, we should mention the great loss sustained in the death of Mr. Gardiner, who had devoted so many years of his life to this work. In his death the Commission sustained a distinct loss.

On December 11, 1924, the Church of England Committee met at Lambeth. On January 27, 1925, a meeting of the Business Committee was held in New York, which issued the last two series of questions for preliminary discussion, namely, on the Christian Moral Ideal and on the Sacraments. (Herewith attached.)

A meeting of the Commission of the Episcopal Church was arranged with the Presbyterian Committee on November 4 and 5, 1925, in New York, for the purpose of conference, an experience that proved so interesting that it was unanimously voted to have another session for the same purpose. Unfortunately, between our Lent and the meeting of the Presbyterian local and General Assemblies, it was not possible to arrange a second meeting this year, but it will be done next fall.

The first meeting since 1920 of the Continuation Committee (which represents all the eighty-odd churches in the movement), is to be held this summer at Stockholm, August 15, 1925, and at that time action will be taken fixing the date and place of the World Conference itself. There is little doubt that the date will be 1927 and the place probably The Hague.

Diocesan committees to cooperate on the Commission on Faith and Order have been appointed in some forty Dioceses, and several of them are actively at work promoting local conferences. In Bethlehem, for example, there are three conference groups as a result of the committee's work. The observance of the Octave of Prayer for Unity is also being pushed through the hearty cooperation of the Woman's Auxiliary. Hundreds of local branches have already written, asking for the leaflets of prayers. The Commission will have sent out over twenty-five thousand by the end of this week.

It is interesting to note in this connection that the summer school courses and the observance of the Octave of Prayer for Unity, June 1st to 8th of last year, were splendidly attended. The response to the latter from the Woman's Auxiliary, and from the Brotherhood of St.

Andrew, was unexpectedly good. The demand for the little leaflet of Suggestions for Prayer was so great as to require a second edition. They were sent by the request of the Diocesan presidents to the branches in forty-seven Dioceses. Many of these ordered additional copies to be distributed to their members. An account of some of the reports of the observance is printed in the October "Spirit of Missions."

Notices sent to the chapter directors of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew at a late date brought a number of similar requests for the leaflet. It is clear that with more adequate preparation this octave can be made a real influence in our church circles.

The summer schools were most encouraging, except for the fact that several opportunities had to be dropped for lack of leaders. Eighteen schools were reached, and in twelve of these a week's course on Christian Unity and the Method of Conference was given. The enrollment totaled two hundred and sixty.

It is worth noting that in spite of the travel expenses and the additional printing involved by these two activities, the financial statement at the end of September shows a substantial balance in each of the items of the budget, totaling \$1,995. We should be able to refund some of the appropriation again to the National Council.

Twenty-two Diocesan conventions last spring appointed Diocesan committees to cooperate with the Commission.

Your committee suggests that the week commencing with Whitsunday be observed as the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity, and that a special sermon on that subject be preached on Whitsunday by the clergy; and that services be held during the week with intercession for Christian Unity, as outlined in the pamphlet issued by the Commission and filed with this report. Our committee suggests that it be continued with power to act as originally appointed.

Mr. Barton Palmer presented the report of Christchurch School. (See Appendix A-IV, (e).)

Dr. Woodward then presented his own report as Dean of Church Schools. (See Appendix A-IV, (a).)

Mr. Taylor presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, recognizing that there can be no higher or holier use for wealth than in deepening and guarding the wellsprings of Christian training represented by the schools of the Church, and that the annual appropriation from its corporate income to the Church Schools within its borders is altogether inadequate for their larger development, earnestly commend these institutions to the spiritual intelligence of the men and women whom God has made the trustees of His bounty.

This resolution was adopted unanimously.

Mr. Mayo presented the

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO WHOM WAS REFERRED THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPORTIONMENT.

We recommend the adoption of the report of the Board of Apportionment that \$8,000 additional for General Church be apportioned to the parishes to a sufficient amount to cover the full budget quota of \$58,000 for the work of the General Church. Second, in reference to the request from certain churches for a reduction in their quotas, we

recommend that the quotas remain as apportioned and that the said churches be requested to use all diligence to meet their quotas.

We, the delegates of St. Paul's Memorial Church, University of Virginia, do hereby make request that the committee recommend to the Council that there be set aside the sum of \$1,922 in the item of Church Extension and Development in the budget of 1926 for the purpose of maintenance of the parish house at the University of Virginia. This being the amount most equitably arrived at as the portion which the Diocese might bear in this work among the students at the University.

The first resolution of the committee's report was adopted. Mr. Carter Beverley presented the following amendment to the second resolution:

"With the suggestion that such congregations request the Board of Apportionment to send representatives to present the matter to their congregations and, if necessary, make an every-member canvass with the consent of rector and vestry to secure the full quota; then if with their information and inspiration the full sum cannot be had, the quota shall be as shown by that canvass."

It was moved to lay this amendment on the table. This motion was carried by a vote of 66 to 21. The second resolution was then adopted.

The third item in the committee's report, the recommendation in regard to appropriations to St. Paul's Memorial Parish House, was then adopted.

Judge Norton presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia desires gratefully to thank the pastor and congregation of the Presbyterian Church of the city of Fredericksburg for their gracious assistance in entertaining the delegates.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Council be extended to the ladies of Fredericksburg for the attractive lunch furnished the delegates and the many other acts of attention and hospitality. And to the pastors and congregations of St. George's and Trinity Churches for their constant courtesies and attendance.

These resolutions were adopted unanimously.

Dr. Tucker made a verbal report of the canvass for funds for the erection of St. Paul's Memorial Church at the University.

Dr. Hammond presented the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church, taking the word "report" literally and seriously, offers the following:

That which occupies most widely the attention of the whole Church is the Church's Program. Beginning as the Nation-Wide Campaign, it aroused the practical enthusiasm of our people to an unprecedented extent, and Virginia was a leader in it all. We report with profound regret that the enthusiasm has cooled in Virginia as elsewhere, and that we hear, too generally, men speaking as if unreasonably overburdened. The need of the hour is to catch anew the animating vision, and turn anew to the Lord of the vineyard praying that He give us both the vision and necessary grace.

On the other hand, we find men in the Seminary volunteering in unusual numbers for the foreign field and for hard places at home. One of our own leaders has devoted himself anew to the mountain work, and a missionary trained in Alaska will also go to our mountain field. The Woman's Auxiliary and its branches are devoting themselves with unflagging ardor and increasing intelligence to the cause. Our country parishes and mission stations show few vacancies.

New times demands new methods. Education is therefore a word to conjure with all over the land. Our Bishop's statesmanlike policy, in line with this tendency, has founded among us a system of Church schools, all of which are making progress. Our Summer Schools of Religious Education are building up an enviable reputation.

The idea of Social Service is making its way steadily throughout the Diocese largely through the work and personality of our energetic and versatile Secretary for Social Service.

The Diocese has awakened to the resources latent in our young people, and is organizing in a Diocesan society their youthful energies. This has the very hearty endorsement of our Bishop.

Our colored work needs our constant strong interest and Christian support. Bishop Brown has made known his intention to keep this work under his own supervision.

Our State is spending large sums of money on good roads. They will lead men to the Church door, and will make pastoral oversight of the people many times more effective.

Statistics yield the following results: They are hard to secure in advance and no special use has been made of them in the report of this committee since 1921. They became available for this year two weeks ago, bringing opportunity to take advantage of them. No parent expects his child to add a cubit to his stature in one year; but a father can find satisfaction in his teen-age son's growth since boyhood. Placing this report beside that for 1923 and that for 1914-15, we find both counsel and encouragement. The 1,081 baptisms last year are 96 more than in 1923 and 46 more than a decade ago; confirmations are (1,032) 10 more than a year ago, but 19 per cent more than ten years ago; enrolment in our Sunday schools (now 13,311) is 637 more than last year and 10 per cent over a decade ago. Parochial contributions are \$513,527, being \$701 more than a year ago and 162 per cent of ten years back. Offerings outside the parish are \$228,012; less than last year's by \$11,234; but 172 per cent of 1914-15; total, \$741,539.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA.

To the One Hundred and Thirtieth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia beg to report that the Rev. Edmund L. Woodward, M. D., and wife have conveyed to our corporation to be held for the Diocese the land at

Orkney Springs in Beckford Parish, Shenandoah County, whereon stands the Memorial Shrine of the Transfiguration. Formal consent has been given by the rector and vestry of Beckford Parish to the establishment of this shrine within their parochial bounds under the direct charge of the Bishop of the Diocese, and the Bishop has accepted the ecclesiastical charge thereof.

Our corporation has adopted the following resolutions at its meeting held May 8, 1925:

Resolved, That the trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia hereby accept the conveyance by the Rev. Edmund L. Woodward and wife, Francis Gibson Woodward, of the property at Orkney Springs, Virginia, as a cathedral shrine to be known as the Shrine of the Transfiguration, a memorial to Bishop Gibson, and to be held in trust as a consecrated place of open air worship under the direct ecclesiastical supervision of the Bishop of Virginia.

Resolved, second, That this proposed gift and its acceptance be reported to the one hundred and thirtieth annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia to be held in the latter part of May of this year.

We, therefore, present this matter to the Council with the recommendation that the gift of this Memorial Shrine for open air worship at Orkney Springs be accepted in grateful memory of Bishop Gibson, and with deep appreciation to the donors for establishing this memorial to one whom we all loved and honored.

REPORT OF THE COLONIAL CHURCHES COMMISSION.

To the One Hundred and Thirtieth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Colonial Churches Commission begs to report that the matter of greatest interest in our field of work during the past year has been the effort now being undertaken to secure funds with which to restore the old colonial St. John's Church in St. John's Parish in King William County, on the main road nine miles west of West Point. This is the only one of the twenty colonial church buildings now in possession of the Diocese which is in a condition of abandonment and dilapidation. The others are all in constant or occasional use.

Gifts and pledges amounting to about \$400 have already been secured. The amount required for the complete repair of the building is about \$1,260, but as soon as \$500 or \$600 is secured sufficient repairs can be made to make the building usable, and it is hoped that these repairs can be made during the coming summer and the first service held.

It is a great pleasure to be able to report that a member of our Commission, Rev. Dr. Woodward, has recently been enabled to discover and locate the site of one of our colonial churches which has been so completely lost that its name was unknown and its existence merely a presumption. This was Warrenigh Church in Blissland Parish, in the lower part of New Kent County; a T-shaped brick building standing upon a very high eminence overlooking the Pamunkey River in the midst of a densely wooded tract and three and a half miles southwest from West Point. Nothing is left of it now except scattered bricks and lines of depression in the ground whence many of the bricks even of the foundations of the church and of the churchyard wall were removed; but there are two ancient tombstones dated 1715 and 1736 still in place in the old churchyard. The new direct line highway from Richmond to West Point, which is to bridge the Pamunkey River at West Point and is now under survey, will approach within half a mile or less of this site of old Warrenigh Church, called locally "Old Church" and now approached by "Old Church Road." Immediate steps are contemplated for the reacquisition for the Diocese of this old church site and five or six acres about it, and it will then be marked with a suitable inscription. The same, we hope, may from time to time be done for many other old sites upon which our colonial churches stood. They are all links binding us with the past of the Church's long and checkered history.

It will be noted that both of the places mentioned above are in the section of the Diocese adjacent to the Pamunkey and Mattaponi Rivers where the Church has never as yet recovered from the days of her desolation after the Revolution. There are whole parishes in this section whose names are never called in Council because, with the exception of one in which we have two colored missions, the Church has remained dormant in them all. Blissland in New Kent, Petsworth in Gloucester, Stratton-Major in King and Queen, Drysdale in King and Queen and Caroline, are without any organization at all. St. Peter's Parish in New Kent has its old church building and eight or ten scattered communicants who have regular services provided by lay readers from the Diocesan Offices. St. John's and St. David's Parishes, covering the whole of King William County, have between them a congregation of 30 or 40 at West Point, and St. David's at Ayletts with 16. St. Stephen's Parish in King and Queen has 14,

St. Margaret's in Caroline has 15, St. Asaph's has 21, and Berkeley Parish at the headwaters of the Mattaponi in Spotsylvania has 25. Throughout all this section there is not a resident rector of any parish.

All of these were charter parishes of our Diocese when it was organized in 1785. It would be futile to ask the question why the Church has never recovered its strength in this section when its life has grown so strong and vigorous in others. Rather we should ask what can be done to re-establish the Church in the parishes which are dormant and to strengthen and upbuild it in those in which it has a show of life. This Church of ours has the same gospel message and responsibility of ministration for this section that it has for every other part of our Diocese. Can we rest content until that message is being delivered and that ministry of service rendered, and until each one of these time-honored names of now dormant parishes is answered by a living voice in the annual roll-call of the Diocese?

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions legs leave to report that the report of the Woman's Auxilliary indicates a most healthy state of activity. We note with special interest the stress they are placing on prayer and Bible study as shown by the number of Bible classes and prayer circles formed. As a result of thus taking care of the devotional side we are not surprised to find them enlarging their work by visiting hospitals and prisons with their beneficent ministrations.

The Diocesan Missionary Society makes a noteworthy report in the announcement of five new self-supporting parishes. We wish to commend also their appeal for help in the colored work. The Board of Religious Education is vigorously making its influence felt in the enlistment and training of the young people of the Church, and particularly in the summer schools, where increasing numbers are given new vision and fired with high resolve that is being actualized in more live workers.

The Social Service Committee has presented a wide range of activity showing that nothing that is human is foreign to it, and much is being done to relieve the submerged truth.

The committee recommends greater cooperation with our Social Service Boards of State, city and county. Further, that each parish take upon itself the responsibility of covering its own field and opening new mission points by lay workers and other means.

We also wish to stress the importance of preaching missions with the definite aim of winning souls for Christ.

The hour of five having come, the Council adjourned to meet again at the close of the service this evening.

II. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

To the One Hundred and Thirtieth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

GENTLEMEN:

I beg to present herewith the report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society with appended reports from our subsidiary Boards—Religious Education, Christian Social Service, Bible and Prayer-Book and Church Extension. The following is the report of our missionary work during the past year:

We began the year 1924 with a list of 35 white clergy, 2 white laymen, 6 colored clergy, 22 white women workers and 10 colored women workers—a total of 75 missionaries supported in whole or in part by the Diocesan Missionary Society. We closed the year with 34

white clergy, 5 colored clergy, 6 laymen, 26 white women workers and 10 colored women workers—a total of 81. The appropriations promised to the missionaries at present on our list for the year 1925 amount to \$45,329.67, which, with appropriation of \$3,750 to the Blue Ridge Industrial School, and the amounts estimated for supply fund and special appropriations, will require the full amount of the expected income for the year. We are glad to report that whereas, it was anticipated a year ago that our total deficit at the end of 1924 would be \$10,000, the Treasurer was able to report in closing his books for that year that the actual deficit was \$7,758.40. Of this deficit \$5,000 will be paid out of the appropriation to Diocesan missions for 1925; indeed, a part of it has already been repaid. This will leave about \$2,758.40 still unpaid at the close of the year, and this amount has been placed in our Diocesan budget for 1926. So that we are hopeful that by the close of 1926 the Diocesan Missionary Society will have cleared off its deficit in full.

We are glad to report that five parishes—Westover in Charles City County, Leeds in Fauquier, St. Anne's and Greenwood in Albemarle, and Scott in Orange—have at the beginning of this year given up the appropriation made to them by the D. M. S. and have acquired the status of self-supporting parishes. We congratulate them very heartily upon having taken this step.

The report of the Board of Apportionment will show that the appropriation to the D. M. S. for 1926 has been set at \$50,000 for the work of the society in 1926, as compared with \$53,000 for the work of the society in 1925. We are leaving out for the time being the appropriations made in 1925 and 1926 to pay off the deficit, but are speaking of the amounts that the Missionary Society will have to use in the missionary work of the Diocese. This proposed reduction of \$3,000 can be safely accepted in one way only, that is by asking the parishes which receive aid from the Diocesan Missionary Society to reduce by an average of perhaps 50 per cent the amounts asked for and to equalize matters wherever necessary by reducing the amount of the parish quota. Of the total amount of \$45,329.67 appropriated at present toward the salaries of clergy and lay workers, the sum of \$17,430 is appropriated to workers in the mountain field, both clerical and lay; \$8,001 to the colored work, \$11,972 to the support of ministers in weak parishes, and \$7,926.67 to workers in special work. It is in this third class only, the weak parishes which receive aid, that we can ask a reduction in appropriation with any hope of the amount being made up from the parish. The mountain work and the colored work being almost purely missionary, must continue to receive larger and larger appropriations from the Diocese in measure as these fields are more fully covered, though in every case the Missionary Society

urges each mission to raise as much as it can for its own operating expenses.

COLORED WORK.

We have at present one colored clergyman less in the Diocese than we had last year, and the church to which he ministered—Meade Memorial Chapel in Alexandria—is being ministered to very acceptably by a student from the Bishop Payne Divinity School. The colored missions in Clarke County and in Charlottesville are being ministered to at present by the white clergy of the parishes in which they are situated until other colored ministers can be secured.

The great forward step in the colored work has been the establishment of a new mission at West Point, where we found a community of over 1,000 colored people, with only one colored Baptist Church ministering to about 200. We have been able to secure an abandoned colored church by long lease and regular services have been established. Already we have been able to gather a communicant list of 14 and the work gives promise of great success.

In Richmond we have been able to purchase the church building formerly owned and occupied by St. Luke's Church, which was sold when St. Luke's Church was abandoned several years ago. This has been purchased for the use of St. Cyprian's Mission, and the name has been changed to the Osgood Memorial, in memory of the late Rev. E. E. Osgood, who at the time of his death was the Archdeacon of the Colored Work.

The almost insuperable obstacle in the colored work is that since the Nation-Wide Campaign began the sources have, to a large extent, dried up from which gifts were received for the extension of that work. The colored people in almost every mission in the Diocese are paying all of their current expenses with the exception of the salary of the minister and of the parish school teachers, and in the case of the two stronger colored congregations, St. Philip's in Richmond, is entirely self-supporting, and the other, Meade Memorial Chapel in Alexandria, is paying a larger amount of its minister's salary than ever before. There is great need of funds at the disposal of the Bishop and the Executive Secretary for the establishment of new work and the erection of buildings. In order to secure the church building at West Point we had to expend nearly \$500 to make the house habitable, and in taking the eminently wise step of purchasing a church building for St. Cyprian's Mission, which we acquired at a cost of \$5,000, we lack about \$2,500 of the purchase price. We are carrying the money expended at West Point as a deficit, and can only trust that funds will be given from time to time that will enable us to pay this and also to balance the purchase price of the Church for St. Cyprian's.

The numerical growth of our work among the colored people must inevitably be slow, but there is abundant evidence that our Church is holding up a higher standard of living which is bearing fruit in the lives of those who come under its influence. It is the hardest, most difficult form of missionary work in which the Diocese is engaged, and yet there is none of greater or more far-reaching importance.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPORTIONMENT.

The Board of Apportionment herewith presents to the Council of the Diocese a proposed program for the year 1926 for its consideration, and we recommend its adoption. The Board has given prolonged and careful consideration to the work and needs of the Diocese, has reviewed and discussed the separate items in the budget of each Board and Committee, making reductions wherever we felt it was possible to do so and has discussed this program with the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society at its meeting in January, and this program as now presented has received the approval of that body.

DESCRIPTION OF THE PROGRAM.

It will be noted at once that almost every item of the diocesan budget has been cut to the very utmost. The Diocesan Missions appropriation has been reduced from \$53,000 of last year (exclusive of the item of \$5,000 for accumulated deficit included in that budget) to an item of \$50,000 (excluding again the remainder of the deficit). The only way in which the Missionary Society can do its work on this reduced budget and still continue to support the missionary work of the diocese is by reducing the appropriations made toward the salaries of ministers in the weaker parishes. We hope to do this for next year to a sufficient extent to bring our expenditures within our income and in the cases of those parishes receiving aid from the Society, will reduce the parish quota to a sufficient amount to enable the parish to pay the increased amount of salary without undue burden.

The appropriations to the Diocesan Boards have in each case been reduced from 25 per cent to 40 per cent. The item for Church Schools is the same as last year, being the \$50,000 promised by the Diocese to the Church Schools to pay the interest on the bond issue, the principal of the bonds which mature during that year and the remainder to be used by the Schools Board for the strengthening and upbuilding of the system. As there has been some misunderstanding in regard to this appropriation, we give herewith the resolution of the Council under which it is made:

"Whereas, 'Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia',

incorporated under the laws of the State of Virginia, purposes to issue three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) of six per cent bonds, secured by a first mortgage on all of its property, maturing serially over a period of ten (10) years, beginning January 1, 1925; and

Whereas, in order to dispose of said bonds it is necessary to provide for the payment of same as they mature and also for the payment of the interest thereon; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, First, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia hereby covenants and agrees that until all of said bonds, principal and interest are paid, it will at each annual meeting include in its annual budget the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to be applied to the payment of the interest on said bonds and to the payment of such of said bonds as have become due and payable and the residue thereof to be applied to such other school purposes as may be determined by the 'Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia'.

Second, The Board of Apportionment of the Diocesan Missionary Society is hereby directed each year to appropriate the aforesaid sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to be paid to the 'Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia' for the purposes aforesaid out of the funds to be applied to the budget for that year."—*Council Journal 1922, Page 76.*)

The figure for the Diocesan Offices is practically the same as last year, except that one item of \$500 is added under the heading of Contingent Fund. This is to pay the interest on the notes in bank covering our deficit. This item was unintentionally omitted from the budget of 1925 when the interest payments have been heaviest, and consequently will be needed all the more in 1926.

The item of operating expenses of the Mayo Memorial Church House remains the same. The actual cost of operating the Mayo Memorial in 1924, as shown in the Treasurer's report, amounted to about \$2,200, but this was because comparatively few repairs were needed during the year and only a small amount of insurance fell due and had to be renewed. We estimate that both of these items will be larger in 1926 than they were in 1924.

The appropriation of The Virginia Churchman has been reduced from \$4,500 in 1925 to \$3,500 in 1926. Part of this will be made up by increased income from advertising.

The budget includes an item for Church Extension without designating the churches to which appropriation is to be made. Your Board did not think that it was in a position this far ahead to make

appropriation of different amounts beyond the recommendation that \$1,200 under this item should be appropriated to St. Paul's Memorial Church at the University.

The budget includes one new item: The Emergency Fund, for which we recommend an appropriation of \$500. Demands arise every year in the work of the Diocese for which no provision is made in the Budget. In our judgment it is eminently desirable that the Diocese, acting through the Board of Apportionment should have at its disposal a small amount which may be appropriated to some need of our work not otherwise provided for.

The objects in the Advance Work are the same as heretofore.

The Boards finds that it is impossible to ascertain this early in the year what will be the diocesan quota for 1926 for the work of the General Church. We have put in a tentative estimate of \$50,000 and \$20,000 for Priorities, but we recommend that this figure be left as a tentative amount with the understanding that the Program quota apportioned to us by the authorities of the General Church be accepted and inserted in that place and the total changed accordingly.

This budget does not include the \$2,000 for St. Paul's Normal and Industrial School, which was added to our budget of 1925 at the Council of 1924. Without reflecting in the least upon the importance of that work and our desire for a share in it, your Board thought it desirable to leave it to the Diocesan Council to say whether it should be inserted for 1926 or not.

Whereas, information has reached our Board which was not available to us at the time that the budget for 1926 was being prepared, and which shows that in all probability the budget quota of the Diocese of Virginia for the work of the General Church will amount to \$58,000 instead of \$50,000, which we had placed in the report as the tentative budget.

Whereas, it is too late at this time, under our canons, to change the budget and the tentative quotas which have already been presented to the parish; therefore, be it resolved—

That the statement of the Treasurer of the National Council, estimating our Diocesan budget quota for the year 1926 to be \$58,000 and the priorities to be \$25,000 be reported to our Diocesan Council with the recommendation that the Board of Apportionment be

authorized by the Council to increase the quotas apportioned to the parishes to a sufficient amount to cover the full budget of the work of the General Church.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION FOR THE YEAR 1924.

Your Board, shortly after its election, met and appointed the following committees: Committee on Religious Education in Public Schools, Committee on Life Service, Committee on Young People's Work, and Committee on Summer Schools. These committees have been actively at work and have accomplished much in their several departments.

The Committee on Religious Education in Public Schools, of which Rev. George P. Mayo is chairman, is in constant touch with the State Board of Education. Meetings with representatives of other denominations are held from time to time, and by persistent effort the sentiment for religious education in public schools is constantly growing.

The Committee on Life Service, of which the Rev. Noble Powell is chairman, is making this year an effort to present the call to the sacred ministry and lay service in the schools and colleges of the State.

The Committee on Young People's Work, of which the Rev. E. C. Pedrick is chairman, has done splendid work in organizing the Young People's Service League in parishes throughout the Diocese. A conference was held in the city of Richmond attended by delegates from organized leagues. This conference was well attended and a Diocesan organization was formed. There are untold possibilities for work in this organization, and it is hoped that a Young People's Service League may soon be organized in every parish in the Diocese.

The Committee on Summer Schools, of which Rev. J. F. Ribble, D. D., is chairman, in conjunction with similar committees from Southern Virginia, Southwestern Virginia and West Virginia, had a most successful school at Sweet Briar College from June 24th to July 4th. There were about 325 in attendance from eleven Dioceses. Sweet Briar College is an ideal place for the Summer School, and the college authorities have spared no effort in providing every accommodation and comfort for those in attendance. A program has been arranged for next summer's session, in which provision has been made for daily lectures and conferences for the clergy. This was done at the request of the clergy, and it is hoped that these courses will prove most beneficial. The school is growing in influence and usefulness each year and should appeal to the clergy, school workers and Diocesan organizations of every parish in the Diocese. Under the auspices of your Board a Sunday-School Institute was held at St. Margaret's School, in Rappahannock Convocation, with the splendid attendance of about 250.

The chairman of your Board attended a denominational conference of the schools of Henrico County at Ashland, Va., and gave a lecture on The Benefits of Summer Schools. He also attended a meeting of the Provincial Board of Religious Education in Charleston, W. Va.

Your Board has been in constant touch with Church Schools throughout the Diocese and has given assistance when requested.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee on June 30, 1924, the following members were elected to the Board of Christian Social Service: Rev. Messrs. George P. Mayo, B. D. Tucker, Jr., W. Roy Mason, and Mr. John B. Minor. Immediately after this meeting the Board of Social Service met and elected the following additional members: Dr. Ennion Williams, Miss Nannie Minor, Miss Louise Price and Rev. Robert B. Nelson. Rev. Fred D. Goodwin, of the Department of Rural Work of the National Board of Social Service, and Dr. Mary Brydon, of the State Board of Health, have been actively associated with the work of our Board, and their services have been most valuable.

The Board has had three splendidly attended meetings during the year, and for the work accomplished desires to call attention to the report of its Executive Secretary, Rev. R. Cary Montague, which has been published for general distribution. Through the Rev. Robert B. Nelson we have gathered valuable information in reference to the use

of motion pictures in religious services. Mr. Nelson's report is printed as a part of the report of the Executive Secretary.

III. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

To the Rt. Rev. William Cabell Brown, D. D., President ex-officio:

The Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary presents the following report:

The year 1924 was marked by progress in the educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Juniors.

The reports show that one hundred and ninety-one of our members attended some one of the summer conferences—a larger number than ever before; and the study classes increased from sixty to 102. Besides mission study classes, thirty-five Bible classes were a part of the work of as many branches. We feel that in the past we have not sufficiently emphasized the fact that the Bible is the great missionary text-book, and are urging our women to give the study of the Bible the first place in their study of missions.

A movement to secure the reading by Auxiliary women of missionary books and of the Church papers has enlisted the cooperation of eighty branches.

The Junior Auxiliary has carried its educational program into some of the Church boarding schools; and all over the Diocese the Juniors are getting a missionary training that will make them the leaders of the future.

After standing still for some years past, the little Helpers Department is reporting six new branches. This department has everything to offer that recommended the old Cradle Roll—with the addition of a definite training in missionary prayer and giving. We are hoping that every Cradle Roll in the Diocese will soon come into the Little Helpers.

Our parish reports show that there are in Virginia at this time seven volunteers for the mission field; and in this connection it is interesting to note that the Woman's Auxiliary and Section B have each established a scholarship for the support of a student in one of the missionary training schools.

We are encouraged to find that in 1924 a number of branches observed the Day of Prayer for Missions, that sixty Prayer Circles were led by Auxiliary members, that there were seventy-four Corporate Communion services, and in addition to these sixty-four special services or Auxiliary days.

The question may be asked, What practical results are coming from all this study and devotion? A glance at the records of the

Supply Department will show that our women have busied themselves in sewing for clergymen's families, missionaries and Church hospitals and schools; and an examination of our year-book will give some idea of the widely scattered money gifts of the Auxiliary. This financial report, however, shows only a part of the missionary giving of the Auxiliary; for we know that the gifts of the women to missions through their parish church envelopes are largely influenced by their mission study and their missionary intercessions.

At the request of the Social Service Secretary of the Diocese we have undertaken certain Social Service work of a missionary character; such as visiting in hospitals and prisons and helping to give Christmas celebrations in State institutions.

Fifty-four of our branches have fulfilled the requirements for a Standard Branch. This means that we have ninety-eight branches that must still strive to meet these requirements; and it should mean the raising of standard for those branches that have reached the first one.

Speaking of standards for parish branches reminds us that the aim of the Diocesan Branch, an Auxiliary in every church and mission in the Diocese, has not been obtained. If 1925 can show us how to accomplish this it will be indeed a successful year.

V. CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

(a) REPORT OF THE DEAN OF CHURCH SCHOOLS.

The Church School system is near the close of the fifth year of its operation. This year, like each of its predecessors, exhibits gratifying progress along many lines and gives strengthened assurance for the future.

The total enrollment for the year is 611, as compared with 593 last year and 473 the year before. The number of boarding pupils is 170. The increase in enrollment each year in the system presents a recurrent problem from the standpoint of enlarged accommodation and equipment.

During the past year \$40,000 has been expended and \$83,000 has been further authorized for permanent improvements.

We were able last year to report for the first time a small credit balance on the current operation of the five schools as a whole, the considerable deficits in two of them being somewhat more than offset by the credit balances on the operation of the other three. We have even greater satisfaction now in reporting that there will be this year a credit balance in the current operation of each of the five schools, and that the total of these credit balances promises to be about \$13,000, possibly more. The following facts should be taken into account in appraising this statement:

1. All school properties from the beginning have been kept fully insured, and for several years the premiums have been charged against the operative account of each several school.

2. The cost of central administration of the school system (normally about \$5,000 a year) is of course also a logical charge for prorating to the operative cost of the several schools. Prior to 1925 this cost of administration had devolved upon the appropriation made annually to the Church Schools by the Diocese. It is hereafter to be met from the general funds, and the \$50,000 annual appropriation from the Diocese will be used entirely for the payment of interest and repayment of the principal of the bond issue and other capital obligations of the Church Schools.

3. Following the standard usage recommended by the General Education Board for the financial conduct of educational institutions, depreciation on buildings and equipment is not charged off on our books in the annual audit. If figured at the usual percentages, this depreciation would amount to about \$20,000 a year. This just about measures the total reductions and scholarships granted students for the year, and this benefit to special students is in no sense made at the expense of inadequate salaries of the school staff. It is expected that the loss in depreciation of plant over a considerable period of years will be more than cared for by special gifts and grants made from time to time, through corporate or individual beneficence, in the interest of the student body.

4. The credit balance of \$13,000 on current operation for this year represents less than a 2 per cent dividend on the \$750,000 present capitalization of the school system. The students thus are beneficiaries not only in the \$20,000 reductions and scholarships to selected students, but also in the \$32,000 extra income from school charges which would have to be collected in order to pay a normal dividend of \$45,000 6 per cent on capitalization. By the exemption of Church School property from taxation, they also benefit. Thus the students are receiving a total benefit in saved costs as compared with a private educational institution of nearly \$60,000 a year, or one-third of the total school charges actually paid during the year—about \$180,000 at present.

The financial strength of the school system may be thus summarized:

Local assets, approximately.....	\$750,000
Total liabilities, approximately.....	390,000

Net assets over liabilities, approximately.....\$360,000

Liabilities are covered as to principal and interest (1) by \$600,000 guaranteed income from the Diocese of Virginia through its annual budget over twelve years ending 1935, being \$50,000 each year; (2) by supplementary earnings from the current operation of the school system, likely to be increased as a result of the further extension of the school capacity; (3) and by substantial gifts or grants from time to time for endowment or equipment from individual or corporate sources. The trustees and their able Finance Committee are careful to conform with approved business standards in directing the financial affairs of the school system and its obligations are invariably met as they fall due.

The \$50,000 a year from the corporate resources of the Diocese would by itself be hardly adequate in fifteen years to effect the full development of one high grade Church School, with adequate equipment and partial endowment to care for 200 boarding students. Yet

after five years' experience it is proving fairly adequate as the *stabilizing basis* for the simultaneous development of five such schools to meet the varying needs of the Diocese, even though their full development must depend upon grants from educational foundations and the gifts and bequests of individual Churchmen or Churchwomen, which may from time to time make possible this or that extension—a playground, a gymnasium, a dormitory, a library, a chapel, or may endow scholarships.

The several substantial gifts and one large bequest which have already been made from such sources will be repeated again and again, and still again. It is indispensable to the whole program to have it stabilized by the assured, fixed, annual corporate appropriation from the Diocese. But this corporate Diocesan support will through the years be multiplied many times by other benefactions. The one talent of corporate Diocesan support will, under God's Holy Spirit, gain five other talents of consecrated beneficence, and the Church Schools of the Diocese of Virginia will have, in coming years, the generous equipment and endowment to provide the very best that the Church can give for the education of the representative boys and girls from Virginia and elsewhere for outstanding Christian leadership.

REPORT OF ST. CHRISTOPHER'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:
SIRS:

I beg to submit the following report of St. Christopher's School for the session of 1924-1925, being the fourteenth in its history and the fifth under Church ownership:

2. Health:

During the fall and winter there were several cases of influenza in the school and one serious case of pneumonia. This spring there has been a mild epidemic of pink-eye. At the present writing there is no sickness in the school. Once more we have reason for thankfulness that we have been spared the loss of any of our pupils by death or withdrawal from the school on account of ill-health.

3. Work; and Other Activities:

The regular work of the school during the session has been of a satisfactory character. In addition to their studies, the boys have shown interest particularly in the Literary Societies, the Pine Needle (the school paper), the Dramatic Club, and the Missionary Society. This last organization has, through membership dues, by sponsoring a concert given by the Sabbath Glee Club, and through a play given by the Dramatic Club under its auspices, raised thus far this year the sum of \$363.93, all of which has been given, or will before the end of the season be given, to worthy causes. In addition to this amount the boys of the school raised \$237.33 in their annual sale of Anti-Tuberculosis Christmas Seals, while the annual Red Cross membership drive in the school brought in the sum of \$124.

4. The Faculty:

At the close of the session we shall lose one of the thirteen members of our present faculty. This vacancy has already been filled. The religious affiliation of the members of the faculty this session is shown in the following summary:

The difficulty of finding among the educated members of our own

Communion properly trained men and women teachers is a matter of concern to the management of this school. It is to be hoped that one of the results of the establishment of the system of Church Schools in the Diocese, of which this school is one, will be that young men and young women of the Church will in increasing numbers be led to devote their lives to the work of teaching. It is gratifying to be able to record here the fact that one of the members of our present faculty, who will be with us again next year, was graduated from this school six years ago.

5. *Religious Affiliation of Pupils:*

- a. Protestant Episcopal.....71%
- b. Other churches (Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist, Lutheran and Roman Catholic).....29%

6. *Additions to the Faculty and House Staff:*

Owing to the increase in the number of pupils in the school, it has been found necessary to secure the services of an additional teacher in the Upper School. For the same reason a graduate nurse has been engaged to take charge of the school infirmary.

7. *Graduating Class:*

At the close of the session on June 12th a class of nine will be graduated.

8. *Finances for the Session:*

While it is impossible for me at this date (May 23rd) to give exact figures for the session, it is my belief and that of the School Secretary that the books of the school on June 30th, the end of the financial year under Church ownership, will show a credit balance of not less than \$5,000 for the year, all of which is this year being put back in one way or another into the school.

9. *Rates for Next Session:*

For boarding pupils.....	\$700.00

10. *Scholarships:*

Reductions from the regular rates made by the school (amounting in the aggregate to \$6,061.95) and scholarships already established by

friends of the school (aggregating \$1,500), together amounting to \$7,561.95, or about 11.6 per cent of the total income of the school, are this year being given through the school toward the education of the youth of Virginia and the Church.

11. *Improvements:*

The improvements authorized by the trustees in 1922-1923, and first made use of last session, have continued to justify themselves. This year the school enrollment has increased nearly 10 per cent over that of last session, and in the boarding department the increase has been over 19 per cent. In view of this advance in enrollment, and of the success the school has thus far had in annually curtailing by \$4,000 the debt incurred in making the improvements referred to above, while at the same time meeting all interest charges on the debt, the trustees have this year authorized the purchase of some two and a half acres of land adjoining the present school property, and the erection thereon of a fourth cottage dormitory. This dormitory, which is now under way and which will be ready for occupancy by September 1st of this year, will provide quarters for two teachers and sixteen boys.

12. *A Suggestion:*

It is again offered as a suggestion that individual parishes in the Diocese, following the lead of St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, found at the School Parish Scholarships, reserving to themselves the right of presentation. By such action the parish would benefit, and the school—the property of the Church and one of its working organizations—would be strengthened.

13. *Religious Instruction:*

St. Christopher's School is a Church institution; in every department of the school's life, therefore, the fundamental importance of religion is recognized. The first exercises of every school day is a short divine service, in which every boy takes an active part; and before every athletic event the boys of the whole school kneel together in prayer to ask God's blessing upon those who are about to represent them in the contest. In addition to these religious services, regular instruction in religion is provided for in graded courses, every boy being required to take two periods a week in the religious studies of his form.

Furthermore, recognizing the futility of trying by means of religious exercises and studies alone to inculcate a religious spirit, the school management endeavors to awaken that spirit in the boys, and

to foster it when awakened, by presenting to them definite opportunities of work for others.

14. *The Bishop's Visitation:*

On March 29th the Bishop of the Diocese, on the occasion of his visitation at St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton (the parish church of the school), confirmed seven boys of the school, of whom four were members of the boarding department.

15. *The Outlook:*

Prospects for next year are good. We are expecting to lose by graduation and withdrawals no more than the usual percentage of the student body; already there have been received a gratifying number of applications from parents of new boys; and thanks to the forward looking policy of the local board, who last year authorized the construction of a new and much-needed athletic field, we believe that St. Christopher's is now making a showing in interscholastic athletics that will inevitably mean a steady growth in the school's enrollment and sphere of usefulness.

Further information in regard to the character and work of St. Christopher's can be found in the school catalogue and in the other printed publications of the school.

ST. CATHERINE'S SCHOOL.

St. Catherine's School, founded by Virginia Randolph Ellett in 1890, is now at the close of its fifth year as a Church School. It has increased in these five years from one hundred and fifty to two hundred and forty-five pupils. The boarding school, which was started last year, has increased from twenty permanent students to twenty-seven, with each year a number of girls who were in the school from one week to several months. We have representatives in our boarding department from six States and Porto Rico.

In order to make the teaching more satisfactory, it has been found necessary to devote Ellett Hall to the boarding school and to build the next unit, the first of the two arcades which will be ready for use October, 1925. It will contain a study hall and five class-rooms. There is prospect that a building to be devoted entirely to the teaching of music will be erected this summer. We also hope to have the gymnasium more adequate and attractive for the school and Sunday school of St. Stephen's. With these added facilities, and its increase

in staff, it will be possible for the children to be taught in groups of fifteen or fewer.

With the cooperation of Mr. Palmer, our chaplain, we have held, since early in the session, a weekly service in St. Stephen's Church.

We have this year established in St. Catherine's School a Junior Auxiliary with an enrollment of thirty children, ranging from eight to ten years of age. This Auxiliary meets every Tuesday afternoon.

Out of our graduating class of this year nine are going to college, one is to study music, and one is to go in training at a hospital.

ST. ANNE'S SCHOOL.

The enrollment of St. Anne's, 1924-25, is 85 pupils—boarders, 20; day pupils, 65. Upper School, 45; Lower School, 40. Faculty (2 men, 14 women), 16. The Lower School includes a kindergarten, primary, and Grades 1 to 7.

The Departments of Music, Art and Business Courses provide for their own expenses, of salary, etc., as does the teacher of French conversation.

Two scholarships are given by the Bishop, from which we receive \$400 instead of \$550 each, and there are six free scholarships given in the day school to children of the clergy, or of Church people unable to pay tuition charges, but who contribute something to the school. In spite of these reductions, the budget approved by the General Board in October, 1924, has been met, and, if a few more unpaid bills are collected, there will be a small credit balance, for the first time since the school has been under Church ownership.

St. Anne's graduates have been received at all Virginia and Southern colleges, and is now on the list of schools *accredited* by the Virginia State Board of Education.

The Senior class is nearly double that of last year. Ten of the twelve members are prepared for college, six are already booked; the others are going to Europe or remaining at home.

The health of the school has been so exceptionally good for the past two years, the principal feels justified in claiming it is due to the open air methods introduced by her. With an admitted epidemic in the town of measles, scarlet fever, diphtheria and pneumonia, there has not been one case of any contagious disease in the household, nor for two years past any illness requiring a trained nurse.

The religious instruction has been especially commended by patrons of the school, and in the Upper School the course now conforms to the requirements of the State Board of Education for a college entrance unit. Four times as much work as is required for that unit is given by the carefully selected teachers who have had definite train-

ing for the work. Every class, from the kindergarten up, is required to study, and to take tests on the work done. Each of the thirty-six members of the household is a member of the church, except two girls, one a Baptist, the other preparing for confirmation.

Daily service is attended at the school and at Christ Church on Ash-Wednesday and on our last Sunday at school. Special services were held at the school by our chaplain, or the clergy of St. Paul's on All Saints' Day, the three days during Holy Week.

The Junior Auxiliary meets regularly, the household paid \$350 towards the Church's Program.

The importance and good standing of the school in the community is testified to by the constant demands and unfailing response to the appeals for worthy local objects: the Orphans' Home, hospitals, etc., etc.

Many improvements have been made this year, besides the new open-air gymnasium, making out-of-doors athletics possible, even in bad weather. The capacity of the auditorium for concerts is nearly doubled.

On May 28, 1925, Bryn Mawr examinations, authorized by the college, will be given at St. Anne's School by a former graduate of St. Anne's, now an A. B. of Bryn Mawr.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CHRISTCHURCH SCHOOL.

The report of the fourth session of Christchurch School is herewith respectfully submitted:

II. Health:

Christchurch has enjoyed exceptional health since its establishment. The record this year is no exception. Up to the last week in January not a day's attendance had been lost by a boy in the boarding department. A mild epidemic of influenza at this time caused the loss to ten boys of an average of three days each, or one-half of one per cent of the total number of school days in a session. Since this time not a single day has been lost. The location of the school in the open country, coupled with the abundant use of fresh seafoods, caught literally at our doors, has been very materially instrumental in this remarkable record.

III. Religion:

The students at the school are divided among the following denominations:

The school has felt sorely the lack of a chaplain during the current session owing to a vacancy in Christchurch Parish. However, the services of a very capable and energetic man, Rev. A. Campbell Tucker, have been secured, who will take up his duties in the parish before the opening of the next session. In spite of this handicap, the Bishop visited the parish on May 19th and administered the rite of confirmation to four boys from the school. The Headmaster has conducted Sunday school and held lay services on those Sundays when no minister supplied to the parish. This is all in addition, of course, to the regular classes in religious instruction held twice a week throughout the session.

IV. Finance:

It gives the Headmaster unbounded pleasure to be able to report that for the first time since its establishment Christchurch will be on a self-supporting basis for the current session. This has been accomplished in spite of a diminished enrollment, by rigid economies which have not effected the standard of the school. With this as a starting point it is hopefully expected that next session will show a safe credit balance.

V. *Developments:*

No new capital outlays have been made since the last report. During the coming summer an artesian well will be drilled on the school property to take the place of the present inadequate water supply. This pure water will add even more to the present healthfulness of the student body and be, at the same time, an added attraction to prospective patrons.

VI. *Scholarships and Gifts:*

The school gives to worthy applicants a total of \$860.35 in rebates and reductions. The local board, deeming this a heavy enough draft on the school's finances, has limited the reductions of next year to this amount.

Sincere appreciation is hereby acknowledged of the splendid beneficence of Mr. C. T. Marston, of Baltimore, who, with his brothers, Mr. W. W. Marston, Mr. O. S. Marston, Mr. E. B. Marston and Mr. Claudius Marston, has donated \$12,000 towards the erection of a memorial gymnasium. The need of this building is very urgent, and it is hoped that the balance, \$13,000, necessary for its erection may be speedily donated.

VII. *Outlook:*

A national advertising campaign, made possible by the far-sightedness of the Board of Trustees, gives very good promise of yielding a decided increase in enrollment. Inquiries are being received from a very much wider section of the country than ever before. The major part of this work has been carried on through the Dean's office, but will be transferred to the school at the close of the session.

VIII. *An Appreciation:*

The Headmaster wishes to express his sincere appreciation for the loyal and interested support of the Dean and the rejuvenated local Board. They have been most harmonious and sympathetic in supporting his policies, and by their sound advice and hearty cooperation have been most instrumental in placing the school on a self-supporting basis.

THE REPORT OF ST. MARGARET'S SCHOOL FOR THE YEAR 1924-25.

The school, including the new cottage, has been filled this year, the enrollment being as follows: Thirty-eight boarders and 15 day pupils, making a total of 53. Of these, 31 are in the high school and

22 in the lower school. This means an increase of almost 50 per cent in the boarding department since last year. Most of the students are Virginians, although a few are from North Carolina and Maryland. All but 9 of the pupils and all the teachers are Episcopalians, 7 having been confirmed this year. The staff consists of 10 members, 8 of these being teachers.

There has been no epidemic except a mild form of grip. It has, therefore, been possible to carry on the work of the school year successfully and without interruption. It is significant that the three girls who graduate this year are all planning to enter college in the autumn.

In addition to attending the parish Sunday school, each girl has had two periods each week of religious studies which have been prepared as carefully as any other school work. There has been an active and interested branch of the Junior Auxiliary consisting of the total enrollment of the school. The girls have had study classes, packed boxes and given a Christmas pageant and a Chinese play. The budget has not been large—\$34—but it has represented earnest effort. In addition, \$12 was sent to the Near East Relief as a result of a Golden Rule Sunday, and Christmas stockings were contributed to the community celebration. The girls also helped materially in the Sunday-school offering. Attendance at one service on Sunday and one week-day service during Lent has been required of the girls, but they have also come to the other services, including the early communion, in a way that has been very gratifying.

A plan of government based on the honor system was worked out in consultation with the girls and has been successfully carried out by them. Through it they have learned something of self-government and the proper use of liberty and responsibility.

During the year a cottage dormitory costing \$14,000 has been built. Mrs. Alfred I. duPont's generous gift of \$10,000 has made possible the erection of a gymnasium which can be used, not only for athletics, but also as an auditorium where lectures, plays and other entertainments can be given. A laboratory has been fitted up and equipped, and through the generosity of friends several hundred volumes have been added to the library. It is too soon to speak with any certainty of the financial situation, but we are hoping to end the year with a surplus.

We are in great need of scholarships. Even those given for one year only would be of great help. As the rates at St. Margaret's are the lowest in the system, only \$450 for board and tuition for the year, a girl who cannot afford to come to us must usually give up entirely the thought of going to boarding school. It is, therefore,

doubly hard to lose promising girls who would be valuable in the school and who could be trained for leadership in the Diocese.

V. REPORT OF THE BLUE RIDGE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

Report of the Blue Ridge Industrial School for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1924:

Enrollment—115 distributed as follows: Boarding department—Girls, 50; boys, 23; total, 73. Day pupils—Girls, 27; boys, 17; total, 42.

Teachers and Employes—General manager, 1; teachers, 8; house mother, 1; nurse, 1; matron, 1; farm manager, 1.

Considering the financial handicap under which the school has been laboring for the past twelve months, satisfactory progress has been made in all departments.

The following facts, we believe, are worthy of special mention:

The high school has increased to thirty-five pupils, about 30 per cent of the total enrollment. This increase in the number of students in the high school is significant not only in the fact that it speaks the approval of the community as to the value of the school, but would seem to indicate that the mountain people are more keenly alive to the value of secondary education for their children than the people of more privileged communities.

Of the thirteen boys and girls who have graduated in the past two years four boys are at college, having entered without difficulty, and are doing well. Two of them are preparing for the ministry. Two others are teaching local country schools. Of the six girl graduates during this period three are at Normal School and three in training schools for nurses in first class hospitals.

The general standing of the pupils is thoroughly satisfactory, and their loyalty to and affection for the school is one of the most encouraging features of the work.

In addition to the regular class work, the students have organized a literary society whose programs of readings, compositions, debates and dramatization, as well as parliamentary procedure, will compare favorably with that of any high school in the State.

They have an active Junior Red Cross Chapter which raised \$75 for the Near East Relief; a flourishing Girl Scout troop which has done most commendable art-craft work. Through the sale of such articles they have contributed to the electric light fund for the Little Children's Home and have offered a prize to the girl member of the Senior class who attains the highest average in English.

In the sale of tuberculosis seals the students sold nearly twice as many as was reported from all other sections of the county.

The students and faculty are a vital part of the Dyke Community League which has raised nearly \$1,000 for the improvement of country roads and schools. They are also prominent in the County Chapter of the Red Cross, which plans an active health campaign.

The religious work has not been neglected, although weakened by the absence of a chaplain; Sunday-school and lay services have been held every Sunday, and occasionally services by a visiting clergyman.

In addition to the Sunday-school instruction, in which all the teachers take part, two periods a week of Bible training has been given every pupil by a specially trained Bible teacher.

A vested choir of boys and girls has been an added interest and inspiration. The school has paid its quota of the Diocesan budget and also contributed to the advance work of the Church. The Bishop, on his annual visit to the school, November 14th, confirmed a class of fourteen. Active branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, Junior Auxiliary and Little Helpers are maintained.

The school's quarterly publication, "The Mountain Echo," is invaluable in spreading information about the school and creating interest in its work. A drive for new subscribers in September added about two hundred and fifty new names to the mailing list.

INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT.

Farm. Most of the meat, vegetables, milk, etc., used in the school is supplied by the school farm. The value of such produce for the year was \$1,000. Labor supplied through hauling, etc., \$600.

Orchard. The apple crop was one of the best we have had for several years. 300 boxes and 650 barrels were packed. Counting both the lean and fat years, the orchard has always shown a profit. In our judgment, fruit-growing can be made one of the most profitable industries for this section, and it is the aim of the school to demonstrate this fact to the students and to the community.

Cannery. Through a gift from Rev. Frank Persons, of the equipment of the abandoned cannery at Yancey, we were able to put our cannery in better condition than it has ever been. Fruits and vegetables to the value of \$650 were put up. After supplying the school the surplus is sold at a good profit.

Needs. We cannot close this report without mentioning the most urgent needs of the school. They total approximately \$40,000, distributed as follows: \$5,000 for the completion of the main building; \$10,000 for a stone chapel seating 350 to 400; \$15,000 to develop and equip the boys' vocational department; \$10,000 for operating expenses. This is an annual need.

The above needs with the exception of the \$10,000 for operation have been approved by the Bishop of this Diocese and the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge for inclusion among the Priorities in the Program of the General Church for 1925-28.

VI. REPORT OF STUART HALL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

GENTLEMEN:

I beg to submit the following report of Stuart Hall for the session of 1924-25:

The total enrollment of the year, including day pupils and special students, is one hundred and ninety-seven (197). The session opened

with 130 resident pupils, four more than we have ever before been able to place in our own buildings. There has been a slight decrease in the number of our day pupils, some having moved from town and others having gone to the public school.

Our Primary and Intermediate Departments have been greatly strengthened by the addition of an eighth year to the course, and a third teacher of ability and experience. This brings the number of our teachers and officers to twenty-eight, all capable and enthusiastic in their departments.

During the summer the Parkins House, bought last year, was remodeled at an expense of about twenty-eight hundred (\$2,800) dollars, so that it accommodates, on the first floor, the three rooms needed by the lower school, and a class-room for domestic art; on the second floor are four large and attractive rooms for teachers. The changes in the building included the introduction of five additional windows, two toilets and a lavatory, and the conducting of heat and hot water from the Robertson House. Furniture and equipment, painting, cleaning, etc., cost slightly over thirteen hundred (\$1,300) dollars. No use has yet been made of ell or attic.

The two large recitation rooms set free in the main building by the removal of the lower departments to the Parkins House have added greatly to our comfort.

Taking the year together, we have reason for great gratitude for the general good health and good spirits of teachers and students, and the complete harmony which has characterized our life and work together.

We have been compelled to increase the number of our boarding pupils as much as possible in order to meet the increased salaries of teachers, the expense of remodeling, furnishing and running, the additional house, and paying the interest on our indebtedness. This increase in numbers makes even more urgent the necessity for a larger auditorium, gymnasium, dining room and recitation rooms. This need can be met only by a new academic building.

VII. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S SERVICE LEAGUE.

The Young People's Service League of the Diocese of Virginia was formed at a conference held at All Saints' Church, Richmond, on May 3, 1924. Delegates were present from the Leagues at Varina Church, Varina; St. Stephen's Church, Culpeper; Christ Church, Charlottesville; All Saints', Ascension, Christ, Epiphany, Emmanuel,

Holy Comforter, St. Andrew's, St. James', St. John's and St. Thomas Churches, all of Richmond; besides representatives from Grace and Holy Trinity, Monumental, St. Paul's, St. Stephen's and Weddell Churches of Richmond, and from The Plains, Ashland, and Garrisonville.

The following officers were unanimously elected:

Miss Zillah Shackleford, Richmond, President.
Miss Elizabeth Stoneman, Varina, First Vice-President.
Miss Catherine Jennings, Culpeper, Second Vice-President.
Mr. Frank Snyder, Richmond, Third Vice-President.
Mrs. Frank L. Cummings, Richmond, Secretary and Treasurer.

Mr. Pedrick presented a tentative Constitution, which was discussed and adopted after a few amendments had been made.

A copy of the Constitution has been sent to every League in the Diocese and to the rector of each parish where there is no League.

Inquiries have been received from Goochland, Ashland, Millwood and Williamsburg, which were promptly answered and information and literature for the forming of a League sent. An inquiry was received from the Diocese of Western New York.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee a proposed parochial Constitution was drawn up, together with instructions for the forming of a League. Copies of these may be obtained from the Secretary upon request.

A splendid League has been formed at the Church of St. James the Less, Ashland, also at the Church of the Messiah, Highland Springs, and Grace and Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, and reports have been received from Leagues at St. Paul's Church and Christ Church, Alexandria. It is regretted that the Leagues at St. James' Church and All Saints' Church, Richmond, are not now active, but it is hoped that they will soon reorganize. While the work of organizing must necessarily be slow, the Diocese seems to be awaking to a gradual interest in this very important work.

A course of instruction for group leaders and counsellors was held over a period of six weeks the first part of this year, with Rev. E. C. Pedrick and Miss Sallie Deane lecturing, and a goodly number received great benefit therefrom.

A special service for the young people of the city was held at All Saints' Church on Sunday, February 22, 1925, which was very well attended. This is the second such service held here under the auspices of the Y. P. S. L., and it is hoped that it will be made an annual affair.

The Richmond Council, which is composed of one representative from each League in the city, has met regularly through the year to discuss plans for carrying on the work.

Much good has been accomplished, and we hope to do more during the coming year.

The first annual convention of the Young People's Service League was held at St. Thomas' Church, Ginter Park, Richmond, on Saturday and Sunday, May 16th and 17th.

The convention was opened at luncheon at 1 P. M. Saturday with an address of welcome to the visiting delegates from the Diocese by Mr. Craig Ruffin, President of the Y. P. S. L. of St. Thomas' Church.

At 2 o'clock the business session opened with the Diocesan President, Miss Zillah Shackleford, of Holy Comforter Church, Richmond, presiding.

Most interesting reports were made by official delegates of the seventeen Leagues, and other reports by representatives from other churches.

The Diocesan President made a most interesting address and report.

After reports of the various committees the officers for the following year were elected:

Mr. Craig Ruffin was elected Diocesan President.

Mrs. Frank Cummings was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer.

Various committees for the spreading of the work were appointed. The Y. P. S. L. assumed responsibility for the publication of the Diocesan hand-book.

At 5 P. M. the meeting adjourned. At 6:30 P. M. a banquet was given. The speaker on the occasion was the Rev. Noble C. Powell, rector of St. Paul's Memorial Church, University, who gave a most stirring address.

Sunday, 8 A. M., the entire delegates attended in a body the service of Holy Communion.

At 10 A. M. the delegates made a study of Christian Nurture in practice, from the beginners to the Senior Department.

11 A. M., a special service was held, with the Rev. Mr. Powell preaching.

At 8 P. M. a demonstration service was held, the service being read by the young men of St. Thomas' Church, and a splendid address on "The Faith of the Young People" was made by Mr. Ernest Schumacher, of Richmond.

This marked the close of the first year of the Y. P. S. L. in the Diocese of Virginia.

Gentlemen:

We have made our annual audit of the Treasurer's accounts and records of the Diocesan Funds for the year ending December 31, 1924. We submit herewith our report on same, as evidenced by sundry exhibits.

The Treasurer's records of receipts and disbursements were verified in detail and were found to have been properly kept, and in accordance with the instructions of the Board.
