RULES OF ORDER

ORGANIZATION

From Canon I, Section 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case de novo.

RULES OF ORDER

1st. The Council shall be opened with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Report of Secretary.

Election of a Secretary.

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent. The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Communications from Convocations.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the

address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on New Parishes.

A Committee on Dispatch of Business.

And the chairmen of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President may think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next Council.

5th. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention, shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

6th. Divine service shall be held on the Wednesday and Thursday evenings of each Council with a sermon, and a committee of three shall be appointed at each Council to select a preacher or preachers to deliver these sermons at the succeeding Council.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; and all resolutions shall be referred to their proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any

member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to

adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *Provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

25th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

26th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the President may appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And the Committee may report at any time.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

27th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

28th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

29th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

30th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

134th Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church

IN THE

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

RICHMOND, VA., May 15, 1929.

The one hundred and thirty-fourth annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia assembled in St. Paul's Church, Richmond, after divine service held in connection with the Centennial Celebration of the establishment of the Diocesan Missionary Society. The Council was called to order at 11:45 A. M., Bishop Tucker presiding.

Bishop Tucker invited the Bishops of the other dioceses of Virginia and West Virginia who were present to have seats in the chancel.

The official list of the clergy of the Diocese was presented and the roll was called therefrom. The Secretary then called the roll of the lay delegates. A quorum of each order was found to be present.

The Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, D. D., was unanimously re-elected the Secretary of the Council. Dr. Brydon appointed the Rev. Lewis Carter Harrison Assistant Secretary.

The Chair appointed a Committee on Credentials of lay delegates consisting of the Rev. S. L. Rotter, Messrs. William E. Austin and James E. Lewis.

The rules of order of the last Council were adopted.

Bishop Tucker presented his Journal of Official Acts. (See Appendix A, I.) The Bishop then read his annual address to the Council.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

To the Clerical and Lay Delegates:

Grace be to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Since the last meeting of our Council two of its most valued members have passed on to the Church Triumphant.

Mr. Robert Beverley, of Blandfield, Essex county, was for many years one of Virginia's lay deputies to the General Convention. He served on the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, was a member of the School Board and many other diocesan committees. Mr. Beverley was a man whose faith manifested itself in active service. Personal Evangelism was for him not simply a verbal program; it was the daily unadvertised practice of his life. His example and his leadership were a potent factor in arousing the laymen of the Diocese to more active cooperation in the work of the Church.

Mr. James Caskie for a great many years was not only a member of the Council, but also was of greatest assistance in stabilizing and bringing to good condition the finances of the Diocese. I don't suppose there is any one who has done greater service to the Diocese of Virginia in the financial matters of the Diocese than has Mr. Caskie.

We have been celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of the formation of the Diocesan Missionary Society. Such a celebration would fall short of its purpose if it served simply to satisfy our antiquarian interest or to stir up in us a feeling of pride in past accomplishments. The real value of this survey is that it inspires us to meet the tasks and opportunities of our own time with the same courage, faith, perseverance and consecration that enabled our predecessors to revive a church that seemed about to die, and after a century hand it over to us, not only restored to health and vigor, but qualified and equipped to render service in carrying out our Lord's missionary purpose.

At the Council last year a committee was appointed to make a study of the rural, mountain and colored work of the Diocese. The reports of the three sections of this committee will bring to your attention the problems and needs of these fields, so that I shall not deal with them specifically in this address. This much, however, should be said, that our first responsibility as a Church is to provide adequately for the missionary work within the borders of our own Diocese. The whole State of Virginia is divided up by our Church into parishes. This implies a pastoral responsibilty for all the people resdent within its territory. Many of these parishes are unable to maintain a minister. In the Christian Church, however, the strong

count it a privilege to share the burdens of the weak, which in this case implies that we as a Diocese will see to it that in every parish provision is made for ministering to the religious needs of the people.

Were Virginia too weak to provide support for the work in its own mission areas, we might ask aid of the General Church. Such, however, is not the case. We have the ability. Perhaps what we need is more knowledge of the field that God has committed to us. The Good Shepherd knoweth His own sheep. His knowledge begets a love for them and a desire to save them. People will gladly support a cause in which they are interested, but interest depends upon knowledge. If sometimes our congregations have not responded adequately to the appeal to provide for our missionary work, it may be that we have not given them the opportunity to know the concrete needs.

Where interest based upon knowledge is lacking, not only is it difficult to secure an adequate amount of money, but giving loses much of its value as a Christian virtue. St. Paul writes, Though I give all my goods to feed the poor, and have not love, it profiteth me nothing. God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son. Christ's command to preach the gospel to the world presupposes a love for those to whom we carry His message. Love depends upon knowledge of the condition and needs of those whom we are asked to help. It is the Church's duty, therefore, not simply to ask for the amount of money needed to carry on its missionary work, but to inform its members as to the nature of that work, to give them the opportunity to know those who need their help. The giving of this information should not be confined to the few weeks of the fall campaign. There should be constant and systematic effort on the part of every clergyman and every diocesan and parochial agency to bring the needs of the world to the attention of the people of the Church in order that they may have the opportunity to develop and to exercise that Christian love which is the very badge of discipleship.

Closely connected with this responsibility for ministering to the spiritual needs of those who are not able to provide for themselves is the duty of giving religious training to our own children. Human progress depends upon the impartation to each new generation of the knowledge and experience acquired by those who have gone before. We recognize the responsibility in the secular realm. Education is deemed of such importance that it is not left simply to the initiative of parents. The State itself provides schools. Parents are not only encouraged but often compelled to take advantage of these public facilities for training the young. Progress from generation to generation in religion and morals is no less dependent upon education. Primarily this responsibility rests upon parents. The intimate atmosphere of the home, the parental love that awakens love and

faith in the child, constitute the best, the only adequate medium for imparting to the young those principles that determine the character and give worth to the personality. The Church should, however, indeed cooperate with the parent by furnishing facilities for religious education in the more technical sense. It must take the child and relate it to the larger family, train it to play its part as a member of the whole body. In this connection would we lay stress upon the importance of the Sunday schools. An important part of the parents' duty is to bring the child to the church that the good work which God has begun in it through home training may be carried forward to its completion. Parents cannot, however, delegate their responsibility in this matter to the Church. The seeds of faith and character must be sown in the home. The tender plant must be nourished by parents themselves.

In thus emphasizing parental responsibility for the religious and moral training of the young, I would remind you of the fact that its neglect is not an isolated single phenomenon. There has been a general tendency in modern life to transfer responsibility and initiative from the individual to the community. The increased recognition of the function of the corporate whole in realizing the ends of life is perfectly proper, provided it does not involve any diminution of individual responsibility. This insistence upon individual experience and activity is especially important in the spiritual life. Christ came to establish a kingdom, but its advent was conditioned upon the repentance of those who were to become its members. God is the Father who loves and cares for each one of His children. The Good Shepherd knows His sheep by name. There is joy in heaven over one sinner that repenteth. The new birth involves a personal experience of God's grace.

It is well then to remember that there are responsibilities that cannot be delegated to committees nor to the Church, but which call for individual activity. The world's salvation cannot be effected by setting up a smoothly running machine and limiting one's own effort to giving the money to keep it supplied with fuel. Personal experience, personal effort, personal evangelism are necessary for the attainment of the purpose of Christianity. There is real danger that the centralizing, standardizing tendencies of our age will result in the loss of individual character and efficiency.

If I may apply this principle to our Diocese, while we will be eager to cooperate with the General Church in all those activities that belong to it, yet we should be equally resolute in doing for ourselves those which are clearly our own responsibility. While we shall always be ready to conform to the decisions of the General Church in matters that rightfully come under its determination, yet we should

remember that true catholicity, so far from demanding complete standardization and uniformity of method, consists rather in the same spirit working through diversity of administration. While we should always be ready to learn from others and while we should never take pride simply in being peculiar, yet there are some things which it is right we should determine for ourselves in accordance with our own local conditions, customs and characteristics. In saying this I do not forget that one great need of the Christian Church today is unity, but the confusion of unity with uniformity is perhaps the greatest obstacle in the way of its attainment. The body is composed of many members, each preserving its own characteristics and performing its own proper function, yet through them all works the one spirit, binding them together into a unity of purpose. Perhaps the ideal may be well expressed by the Latin line that was inscribed on one of the walls of the old assembly hall at the University:

Quam fluctus diversi, Quam mare juncti—As diverse as the waves, as united as the sea.

The two years which have elapsed since Bishop Brown's death have given me the opportunity to learn by actual experience the nature and extent of the work in the Diocese of Virginia and to form some conclusions as to what is needed for its future welfare. Among these there is one which I feel should be presented to this Council for its consideration. The pastoral and administrative duties that fall to the Bishop are so extensive that I do not think it possible for one man to fulfil them adequately. If it were only a question of administration the need might be met by the appointment of a field secretary, but I am convinced that the welfare of the work in a Diocese like Virginia requires not only efficient organization and administration, but more opportunity for personal contact between the Bishop as chief pastor and the clergy and congregations.

The canons of our Church provide two ways in which such a need as this may be met, the election either of a Coadjutor or a Suffragan Bishop. The former of these two methods seems to me better suited to meet the conditions that exist in this Diocese. The canons provide that before the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor on the ground of extent of territory the consent of the General Convention, or during the recess thereof, the consent of a majority of the Bishops and of the several standing committees, shall be had and obtained. Should the Council decide to grant my request for Episcopal assistance I would recommend that at this meeting it take such steps as are necessary to secure the required consent for the election of a Coadjutor so as to make it possible to elect one at the meeting of the Council in 1930.

Mr. Rosewell Page presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Council now in session in St. Paul's Church, Richmond, desires to express its gratitude to God for the recovery of our beloved Bishop from his recent illness.

This resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote, the vote being put by the mover of the resolution.

Mr. Page then moved that a committee be appointed to consider that part of the Bishop's address dealing with the subject of a Bishop Coadjutor or Bishop Suffragan. This motion was carried and the Chair appointed as the committee Rev. William J. Morton, D. D., Rev. W. H. Burkhardt, D. D., Rev. Noble C. Powell, Rev. Berryman Green, D. D., Mr. Rosewell Page and Mr. Murray M. McGuire.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED AT THE CONVENTION OF 1928, AND TO BE FINALLY ACTED UPON AT THE CONVENTION OF 1931.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution:

Amend Article I, Section 3, by adding after the words "Entitled to vote in the House of Bishops", at line 7 of the article, the following words: "Except that whenever two-thirds of the House of Bishops are present a majority vote shall suffice."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution:

Amend Article I, Section 3, of the Constitution so that the third sentence thereof shall read as follows:

"His term and tenure of office and duties, and particulars of his election not inconsistent with the preceding provisions, shall be prescribed by the Canons of the General Convention."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution:

Amend Article I, Section 4, fourth paragraph, the last sentence so that the same shall read as follows:

"In all cases of a vote by Orders, the two Orders shall vote separately, each Diocese having one vote in the Clerical and one vote in the Lay Order, and each Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States of America having a one-fourth vote in the Clerical Order and a one-fourth vote in the Lay Order; and the concurrence of the votes of the two Orders shall be necessary to constitute a vote of the House. No action of either Order shall pass in the affirmative unless it receives the majority of all votes cast, and unless the sum of all the affirmative votes shall exceed the sum of other votes by at least one whole vote."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI of the Constitution:

Amend the second and third sentences of Article X of the Constitution to read:

"No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed in one Triennial meeting of the General Convention and by a resolve thereof be sent within six months to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese and of the Convocation of every Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States of America, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or Missionary District Convention at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding Triennial meeting by a majority of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies and all the Missionary Districts within the boundaries of the United States, voting by Orders, each Diocese having one vote in the Clerical Order and one vote in the Lay Order, and each Missionary District having a one-fourth vote in the Clerical Order and a one-fourth vote in the Lay Order. Provided, however, htat the General Convention at any meeting shall have power to amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the use of the Psalms by a majority of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies ,and all the Missionary Districts within the bounda-

ries of the United States, voting by Orders as previously laid down in this article.

Mr. Alexander H. Sands moved that the item of \$10,000.00 for diocesan deficit be stricken from the budget and some other means be found to raise this amount. Mr. Murray McGuire moved as a substitute that a committee of five be appointed to study the proposed budget to see whether reductions cannot be made in the other items under the budget to a sufficient amount to reduce the proposed budget by \$10,000.00.

After a discussion, Mr. McGuire's substitute, being put to the vote, was lost. Mr. Sands' motion was then put to the vote and was lost. The report of the Board of Apportionment was then adopted.

Rev. Robert F. Gibson presented the

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON SURVEY OF MOUNTAIN WORK.

The Diocesan Council of 1928, in pursuance of a recommendation of the Bishop, created a Commission "to study conditions in our rural work and report to the meeting of the Council in 1929". This Commission, at the instance of the Bishop, was divided into three Commissions, each to study and report on a particular part of the Rural Work. The Commission to which was assigned the Mountain Work begs leave to report as follows:

In undertaking the study committed to it, your Commission kept in mind the purpose expressed by the Bishop in his address, in which he said: "I would, therefore, recommend to the Council the appointment of a Commission to make such a survey of our Rural Work as will enable it to suggest to us at our next meeting the steps that should be taken to promote its welfare. Should the Council see fit to adopt this recommendation, I hope that the Commission will be asked to include in its survey the Mountain Missions and the Colored Work. These two enterprises are so full of missionary opportunity that they deserve more support than we are at present giving them. Like all things that are worth doing, they bristle with problems. We should understand these in order that we may cooperate more effectively with our devoted missionaries, who are rendering splendid service under very serious handicaps."

The Commission therefore understood that it was to make such a survey as would enable it to suggest steps to promote the welfare of the Mountain Work and secure it more support and to offer, if possible, such solution of its problems as would produce more effective cooperation between those conducting the work and the rest of the Diocese.

The Commission did not understand that it was to make a critical investigation of the methods and details of operation of the work. These have evolved during more than a quarter of a century through the study and experience of those engaged in or officially connected with the work. Only experts in work of this character would be qualified to make such an investigation. But the Commission has learned enough regarding this missionary adventure to express the deepest gratification over its amazing growth since its small beginning under Archdeacon Neve, its astonishing results in salvage, rehabilitation and progress, and the devotion and sacrifices of those who have been or are now engaged in it. It is indeed a project worthy of interest and support, and it deserves the sympathetic consideration and utmost endeavors of the Council for its advancement.

These Mountain Missions have grown up apart from the other missionary work of the Diocese because of their special character, due to the unique conditions in the sections where they were planted. At first the personal work of one man, Archdeacon Neve, they came in 1906, at his request, under the management of a board known as "The Advisory Board of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge". This Board was created by a resolution of the Council. The Board was made auxiliary to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, to which it was to make report semi-annually. It was to manage all the affairs of the Archdeaconry, disburse all funds and approve the appointment of all missionaries, teachers and other helpers. It seems that neither this Board, nor the office of Archdeacon, nor the existence of the Archdeaconry itself, has ever had any canonical authorization or definition.

The word Archdeaconry, as above used, has no territorial significance, other than that all the Mountain Missions are in a certain section of the Diocese. In some parishes in this area all the work is under the Archdeaconry Board; in other parishes only certain missions are included.

The Blue Ridge Industrial School, begun in 1909 as a part of the Mountain Work and still listed as one of the stations of the Archdeaconry, is conducted independently of the Archdeaconry Board. It is incorporated, has its own Board of Trustees, raises its own funds (in addition to the Diocesan appropriation) and publishes its own paper, The Mountain Echo. The Commission has not regarded the school as within its purview.

There does not appear to be in existence any authoritative definitive statement as to the relation of the various authorities, responsibilities and duties of those engaged in or officially connected with the Mountain Werk. The list of those involved would include the Bishop, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Advisory Board of the Archdeaconry, the Archdeacon, the Assistant Archdeacon, the parish rectors with Mountain Missions in their parishes, other clergy serving as missionaries, and lay workers, men and women. Very naturally uncertainty has caused misunderstanding and embarrassing problems have arisen.

The work is suffering at present from a very serious practical handicap, the lack of sufficient clergy in the field. Of the nine districts of the Archdeaconry three are in charge of local rectors, two are permanently in charge of the Assistant Archdeacon and four are temporarily in his charge. These four districts, where there are vacancies, include 18 separate stations. This means that the responsibility for the maintenance of services and other ministrations in 6 out of 9 districts rests upon the Assistant Archdeacon. These 6 dis-

tricts include 24 stations. Even with such assistance as Mr. Mason can secure this imposes upon him a practically impossible burden. This condition necessarily reduces his effectiveness in supervision and promotion, and deprives these many stations of that local clerical leadership and pastoral care without which they cannot expect to flourish and develop. The problem of filling these vacancies is not a simple one, but is complicated with problems of authority, responsibility, tenure of office and salary.

Another handicap is the lack of sufficient financial support, which makes it impossible to pay the workers adequate stipends. The total amount received and spent on the work seems large until we realize how wide is the surface over which it is thinly spread. The Diocese pays \$9,000.00 in clerical stipends. For lay workers it gives the Archdeaconry \$15,000.00. From other sources in the Diocese come about \$6,000.00, and from sources outside the Diocese about \$6,000.00. This makes a total of \$36,000.00. But there are 33 mission stations with 38 salarfed lay workers and (with vacancies filled) 8 clergy receiving full or part time stipends, not to mention the many other forms of unavoidable expenditure.

As a result of its study of the situation the Commission makes the following recommendations:

1. That a new Department, or Board, of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society be created to take the place of the present Advisory Board of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, with the privilege, as in the case of existing Boards, of adding to the number of its members. A new Board could, and doubtless would select its additional members from the present Board. Thus there would be no break in the continuity of service of those who best understand the work and whose experience makes their membership invaluable.

It is believed that such a change in organization would have real advantages. It would put the Mountain Work, properly an integral part of the missionary work of the Diocese, directly in the hands of the Executive Committee, instead of in the hands of an auxiliary. It would give the work canonical authorization. It would tend to broaden and intensify interest and sense of responsibility. It would eliminate some problems of conflicting authority.

On the other hand, the work would continue to enjoy the special attention of a particular advisory group, which is regarded as essential. The work is still distinct in character and necessarily unique in method and has not yet reached the stage where it can safely be merged in the general missionary work of the Diocese. If taken over by the Executive Committee, it would still require special handling

and promotion; and for such purpose the system of action through a department is the most practical yet devised.

2. Canonical recognition of the existence of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge and a delimitation of its field. This could be in terms of work rather than of territory and should be elastic enough to include such work and stations as the Executive Committee might specifically assign to it from time to time. Such assignments would naturally be made on request of the Board in charge.

3. Canonical recognition of an official head for the work, who would act as the representative of the Bishop and whose duties would be, as now, supervision and promotion, with such local charge or charges as might be deemed wise. In the interest of the work, a large part of the time of this official, perhaps a half, might well be given to the task of making the work known both within and without the Diocese, in order that adequate support might be secured. The title Archdeacon is obviously appropriate if the field retains its name of Archdeaconry.

In thus proposing a regularizing of the supervision of the work it is far from the thought of the Commission to suggest any change in the present personnel. It is believed that it is the unanimous desire of the Diocese that Archdeacon Neve should bear as long as he lives the title which he has so well earned and so conspicuously dignified, and that the duties and responsibilities of supervision and promotion should remain in the hands of Assistant Archdeacon Mason, who since 1926 has been carrying them so devotedly and successfully.

4. The adoption of a set of by-laws or rules for the Archdeaconry, among other things clearly defining the duties, responsibilities and authority of all the officials, boards, clergy and workers involved. These by-laws should be formulated by the Board in charge, as being the only group technically conversant with the work and its problems, but should have the approval of the Bishop and the Executive Committee. They should be printed, together with all relevant canonical provisions, in some convenient form, and a copy furnished to every one connected with the work. These by-laws might well also include rules governing the receipt of missionary boxes and the disposal of the contents through the clothing bureaus at the various stations.

5. The problem of securing and holding clergy in the mountain field is not susceptible of any easy or any final solution. Primarily the responsibility of the Bishop, whether acting directly or through others, it is nevertheless one in the solution of which the Bishop would welcome aid. There are contributing factors which may be influenced helpfully. There is, for instance, the matter of salaries. Doubtless larger salaries would help. Perhaps an increase of the

minimum stipend is a necessity. The Commission recommends a serious facing of this possibility by the Council. In doing so it is not unmindful of the fact that the problem is not confined to the mountain field. At the same time the Commission desires to express the conviction that work in the mountain field requires and ought to have men of exceptional ability and that this consideration justifies exceptional treatment. At the very least, all such salaries should be fully up to the standard set by other Dioceses conducting similar work. The Commission suggests also that the elimination of uncertainties, if any, as to tenure of office, duties and powers, and freedom of action, would tend to create satisfaction, and that frequent opportunities for conference and fellowship with other clergy would prove stimulating.

6. Making the work known should not be the duty of the official head of the work alone. Other workers, both clerical and lay, could be provided with opportunities to tell the story, as heretofore but more extensively. Our Mountain Work, the present organ of the Archdeaconry, is well adapted to its purpose and by all means should be continued. It would be helpful in maintaining interest if in every issue of the Virginia Churchman there should be something from the mountain field. An illustrated booklet, giving full information about the work, and its needs and aims, would prove very valuable for distribution on special occasions and to interested individuals.

These recommendations are made with some hesitation, for the best intentioned efforts to advance a project might prove an injury rather than an aid. However, this study has been made in full and frank cooperation with all those officially connected with the work, and the recommendations are offered sincerely and hopefully. Legislation is never in itself life-giving. Yet it can be effective in removing obstacles and handicaps, perfecting organization, facilitating procedure and deepening a sense of responsibility.

Proposed canonical amendments, designed to carry out the above recommendations, are appended hereto.

Resolved, That Article 5 of Canon X be amended by inserting after line 17 the following paragraph:

VII. The Board of Mountain Work, to consist primarily of ten members.

Resolved, That the following Canon be adopted, and numbered XI. all succeeding Canons to be renumbered accordingly:

CANON XI

Of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

Section 1. The missions engaged in Mountain Work shall constitute a missionary jurisdiction to be known as "The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge". The missions to be included in this jurisdiction shall be designated from time to time by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Section 2. The management of the affairs of this jurisdiction shall be in the hands of the Board of Mountain Work.

Section 3. There shall be appointed by the Bishop a presbyter, to be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, who shall have, as the representative of the Bishop, general supervision of the Mountain Work, and shall be responsible for the promotion thereof. When necessary in the judgment of the Bishop and the Board, there shall be an Assistant Archdeacon, chosen in like manner.

Section 4. The Board shall formulate by-laws governing the Mountain Work, which shall become effective upon approval by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

This report was received and the proposed changes in the canons were referred to the Committee on Canons.

Mr. Carter Beverley moved that the Council continue in session until 5:30. This was carried.

Rev. Noble C. Powell presented the following report of the Advisory Board of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge:

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Because of the development of the work and the changed and changing conditions under which that work must be done, the Advisory Board of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge has, for quite some time, felt increasingly the need for a reorganization of the work which it has been charged to do by the Council of Virginia. The Board feels that certain facts relative to it and its work should be placed before the Council.

- 1. The Board of the Archdeaconry has no canonical standing, but exists only by resolution of Council.
- 2. The bounds of the Archdeaconry are not set and defined. Where work is being done by this Board it is frequently within the boundaries of parishes having settled ministers with definite duties and responsibilities placed upon them in their jurisdictions by the canons of this Church. With the growth of the Church this may well cause unnecessary confusion, as it has done in the past.

3. There is no clearly defined relationship between the Board and the clergymen and workers in the field.

4. Because of the undefined relationship between the Board and the clergymen in the field, and the undefined area of a clergyman's field, when he has come into the Archdeaconry, it is difficult to secure clergy to take up the work. Once a man is secured, it is not possible to define even approximately what is his jurisdiction.

5. While the Board is, by the resolution of the Council of Virginia, a sub-committee of the D. M. S., yet it has to depend upon the efforts of its members, chiefly the Archdeacon and his Associate, to raise a considerable sum of money each year, over and above that in the Diocesan budget, for the maintenance of the Mountain Work.

6. While the Mountain Work is entirely missionary, yet the central missionary body of the Diocese is not directly responsible for it. Because of this, the Diocese as a Diocese is not fully informed, and consequently not as keenly alert to the Mountain Work as the nature and opportunity of that work would warrant.

In view of the foregoing, the Advisory Board of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge respectfully petitions the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, assembled in St. Paul's Church, in the City of Richmond, May 15, 1929:

That the Advisory Board of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge as now constituted be abolished and in its place provided an Executive Committee for the Mountain Work, consisting of three members of the D. M. S.

This committee shall have the responsibility of associating with itself, in an advisory capacity, every clergyman actively engaged in mission work in the bounds of the Archdeaconry, and such other members, not to exceed four, as in its discretion it may choose; such shall hold membership at the pleasure of the representatives of the D. M. S. This committee, when meeting as an advisory committee, shall meet at least twice a year and may be called at the discretion of the Executive Committee for the Mountain Work. This committee of three of the D. M. S. shall be directly responsible to the D. M. S.

The regulations under which this Executive Committee shall function shall be made by it and become operative upon the approval of the D. M. S.

The Council expressed its appreciation of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary by accepting this report by a rising vote.

Dr. Tucker moved that the hours of meeting of Council tomorrow be from 10 to 1 and from 2:30 to 5 P. M. This motion was carried.

The Rev. B. D. Chambers presented the report of the Committee of Deans of Convocations, in the form of a proposed amendment of the Canon on Convocations.

This was referred to the Committee on Canons.

On motion of Mr. Chambers, the rules of order of the Council were amended by inserting in the order of business the item "Communication from Convocations" immediately after the item "Reports of Standing Committees".

The Bishop nominated Rev. Kensey J. Hammond, D. D., and Rev. F. D. Goodwin, D. D., as Examining Chaplains.

These nominations were confirmed by the Council.

Dr. Hammond read the

REPORT OF THE EXAMINING CHAPLAINS.

Rev. George P. Mayo, D. D., presented the report of the Board of Christian Social Service. (See Appendix A, II (c).)

Rev. Robert B. Nelson read as part of the report of the Board of Christian Social Service the report of the Findings Committee of the Diocesan Rural Conference. (See Appendix A, II (c).)

These reports were received and the recommendations in the report of the Findings Committee were approved.

Dr. Goodwin read the

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON RURAL WORK TO THE COUNCIL OF 1929.

Following the suggestion of the Bishop made in his address to the Council last year, the Council created a Commission to study the Rural Work of the Diocese, including the Mountain Work and the Colored Work. In undertaking this study the Commission divided its work among three sub-committees, and the following is the report on the Rural Work of the Diocese, exclusive of the Mountain Work and the Colored Work, which are covered by other reports:

The Committee on Rural Work started its study by sending out to all of the rural and small town clergy a request that they lay before the Committee in writing any problems in their own fields which might be helped by Diocesan cooperation. Thirty-two replies were received. The information thus received was supplemented by knowledge the members of the Committee and the Bishop had of conditions in the rural sections of the Diocese. With this information before us, the Committee, at a meeting last September, selected fifteen situations among the rural parishes and missions of the Diocese for careful study, and assigned these situations to various members of the Committee for investigation. This was done because it was felt that the problems of the Rural Work of this Diocese could be solved only by studying each particular situation, and trying to arrive at some helpful solution for each one separately—for no two of them are alike, and no general suggestion or single action of the Council or Diocesan Missionary Society can solve so complex a situation. Then, too, these problems are not static. Whoever tries to help them has to watch and wait sometimes for months, until the situation is ripe for suggestion or change.

In accordance with this policy, we submit as an appendix to this report the reports of the various members of the Committee assigned to special situations, as far as they have been able thus far to work towards a solution:

(Appendix submitted to Council by Title.)

PART II.

The Committee, however, feels that there are certain principles that should constitute the general policy of the Diocese towards its Rural Work, and to this end would submit the following suggestions:

(1) Not in any sense as something new, but only by way of reiteration, we would emphasize the fundamental principle that should actuate the Diocese in its missionary policy, as expressed in the original Constitution of the D. M. S .- not just to support what work we now have, but to carry the ministry of the Church throughout the whole extent of the Diocese. There are not less than fourteen vacant fields in the Diocese today: there are ten counties where there is no resident Episcopal minister. Perhaps not all of these fields or counties should be supplied with a resident minister immediately, but the Church in this Diocese will never be the force it ought to be until these points are supplied. All of the Diocese is covered by duly constituted parishes, and in many of the parishes that are now vacant the vestries are making efforts to secure ministers. In such cases the Diocesan Missionary Society should offer full cooperation. In those vacant parishes that do not have working vestries it is the duty of the Missionary Society to take the initiative and press the work for-

In many cases, to reclaim these unoccupied or inadequately occupied fields will require a very considerable outlay of money over a

long period of years. In his request for this study, Bishop Tucker asked that it be made to determine how the situation in this Diocese might best be dealt with, and what it would involve in the way of Diocesan aid. To give this amount in exact figures is not possible, but it is the belief of this Committee that the Diocesan Missionary Society, if it is to meet the opportunities before it in an aggressive way, should have from three to five thousand dollars added to its budget for each of the next four or five years, or as rapidly as situations are developed that warrant putting in new workers. This Diocese can expect seven of its candidates for Holy Orders to graduate from the Seminary in 1930 and 31. Will the money be available to put most of them to work in the now unoccupied fields of the Diocese?

- (2) In placing missionaries throughout the Diocese, especial regard should be had that the men are put into fields that will call out their fullest efforts. Don't give them less than they can do, but more. Good roads and automobiles are making possible today realignments of churches and consolidations that even ten years ago would have been impossible. These new factors that have so revolutionized the educational, social, economic and other phases of rural life have not been considered sufficiently by the Church in adjusting her work to the new country life of today. We recommend a fresh study of each field with this in mind when making appropriations from the missionary funds of the Diocese.
- (3) The stability of the church life in our country parishes is directly in proportion to the length of time that the right men serve those parishes. Short rectorships and long intervals between them spell disaster. No one can estimate how these factors have held back the growth of the Church in the country parishes.

There are three things necessary in order to keep the right kind of men in country parishes: the right men, adequate fields and adequate support.

For the first of these—the right kind of men—humanly speaking, it is the duty of the rectors and laymen of the whole Diocese to endeavor to see that men of the proper calibre have the work of the ministry properly presented to them. When we have done this, we must leave the rest to the Lord. We believe the men will be forthcoming.

For the second factor, adequate fields, suggestions have been made above.

For the third, adequate support, the Diocese has been doing much better in the last few years. But we would suggest that this is a matter that constantly needs attention by the Diocesan authorities. We certainly must not pamper our missionaries; but, on the other hand, we must be fair to their families. Give them a fair salary, and they

will still have plenty of opportunities for self-sacrifice that the world knows not of, and which money cannot alleviate.

We would recommend a periodic survey, at intervals of not less than three years, of the needs of every missionary of the Diocese, with a view to adjusting his salary thereto.

- (4) In certain parishes in Eastern Virginia the use of Women Workers has proved very successful. Often they can supplement a minister's work so as to enable him to give more time to his pastoral work and the care of the churches. The Committee commends this type of work in those communities where careful study shows it to be advisable, but recommends that the Missionary Society take into consideration not only the matter of the salary of the worker, but also the necessity of meeting the expense of the upkeep and replacement of her automobile. This will necessitate regular provision for the Automobile Fund of the Diocese.
- (5) In dealing with the country parishes of our Diocese it must always be borne in mind that we have to do with units in our church organization that are canonically under the authority of the vestries of those parishes. We cannot legislate for them as if they were mission stations. They are independent units. Furthermore, they and the congregations they represent oftentimes have opinions about what is best for their parish that will not be in accord with the general policy of the Diocese as here or elsewhere suggested. The hour of service is often a very dear tradition to a small congregation. The ties of long years' standing that bind them to another parish or church are not easily to be broken. The affection and loyalty that binds them to the church and surrounding cemetery where their loved ones are buried cannot possibly be disregarded.

So every suggestion about new combinations of churches, consolidations of churches, changing hours of service, etc., that the Diocese may make in an effort to make more effective its ministry in the rural sections must be made in all considerateness, and with a willingness to duly consider local sentiment and judgment. On the other hand, so imperative is the necessity for making new alignments in certain cases, and of making other adjustments for the good of the work that the Diocese must begin to appeal to its country congregations to cultivate a spirit of a large loyalty to the Church as a whole, and a willingness to make a sacrifice on points that are not essentials, in order that the work may be strengthened and the Diocese as a whole advanced.

(6) Sympathetic cooperation between the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and the country parishes is essential, if the suggestions here made are to be carried out. To this end we suggest that greater responsibility be placed on the Convocational representatives on the Executive Committee to keep the Committee informed about conditions in their Convocations, particularly in regard to vacant parishes and unoccupied fields. Theirs should be the responsibility, under the Bishop, of aggressively planning for the continuance and furtherance of the work of the Church within their fields. We suggest that at certain times the Executive Committee ask for such reports from the Convocational representatives and hold them to this responsibility. The position of Convocational representative on the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society ought to be recognized as one of great missionary responsibility.

If, in the judgment of the Council, the present Committee on this Rural Study can serve further in helping to work out the situations that we now have before us, we will be glad to be continued; but we feel that, as this is a continuing work, it should be integrated as soon as possible into the present missionary machinery of the Diocese.

(7) Finally, we feel that the great opportunity and honor of being a missionary in this Diocese should be stressed, to the end that young men coming into the ministry in this Diocese may be led to look upon the work of the rural minister as being as great an opportunity for service as the Church has to offer. We emphasize this because we believe it to be true.

As Archdeacon Neve said in a paper read at the Rural Conference last winter: "There is a need in the country for big men, the biggest men we can get, because there is a larger opportunity for doing a great constructive work there than in any field in the United States. The country at the present time is in a state of transition. The young people are becoming better educated and getting a wider outlook on life, while at the same time there is no constructive leadership which would give them a vision of a new order of things which would make the country an attractive place for them to live in. The country ministry should be held out to young men as providing a career of such transcendent importance as to be capable of being developed into an Apostleship." With this your Committee heartily concurs.

There is also a growing appreciation of and opportunity for real Christian Social Service in the country sections. The State government, particularly through its Educational, Health and Public Welfare Departments, is anxious to find leaders in rural communities that will help put into effect the social, health and educational programs of the State. Here is a wonderful opportunity for Christian leadership. In a few years the opportunity will have passed the country church by. Again, the improvement in transportation has made the most remote sections easily accessible to the cities. These cities

have many advantages in hospital service and other ways that have long been needed by, but denied to, the country communities. Here is a chance to enrich life, and to alleviate its suffering. It is but part of the many-sided ministry that the country parish of Virginia offers to those who will give themselves wholeheartedly to its service. We hope that the spirit of this Diocese will always be that of its great missionary, Archdeacon Neve, as his is the Spirit of our Master.

This report was received, and the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Council approve the principles of general missionary policy as outlined in the report of the Committee on Rural Work, and recommend them to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Committee to be carried out as far as that Committee may be able to do so.

Resolved, That the Committee on the Rural Survey be continued for the purpose of completing their investigation into specific problems in the Rural Work of the Diocese that are now before them.

Resolved, That this report be published in the Virginia Churchman or elsewhere.

The Secretary read the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-fourth Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Standing Committee on Church Property begs to present the following report:

During the past year it was reported to us that the organization of John Moncure Memorial Colored Mission in Stafford county has been abandoned and the church property is no longer used, and there was a general feeling on the part of the church people in Overwharton Parish, in which this colored mission was situated, that the property should be sold.

In cooperation with the vestry of Overwharton Parish, your Committee on Church Property petitioned the Circuit Court of Stafford county to order the sale of this property. The property has now been sold, the net proceeds amounting to \$1,353.50, which, according to the canons, has been deposited with the Trustees of the Funds of

the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia subject to the order of the Council of the Diocese.

John Mencure, D. D., in some part of the colored missionary work of the Diocese.

This resolution was adopted.

Dr. Tucker moved that a committee be appointed to present a plan of publishing the addresses made at the Centennial Celebration of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

This was referred to the Special Committee on the Report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Council then adjourned.

THURSDAY, MAY 16TH-10 A. M.

Council convened, Bishop Tucker presiding. The minutes of yesterday's meetings were read and approved.

Dr. Tucker presented the following resolution:

Whereas, the General Convention meeting in Washington in October, 1928, endorsed the plans for St. Luke's International Hospital, as outlined by Dr. Rudolph B. Teusler, and recommended that \$1,000,000.00 be raised as a special undertaking by the various Dioceses during 1929; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, in session at St. Paul's Church, Richmond, on May 16, 1929, desires to commend this undertaking to the parishes of the Diocese of Virginia, and recommends that the Bishop of the Diocese request every rector and vestry in the Diocese to present this subject to the several congrega-

tions on Trinity Sunday, May 26th, and that a special offering for this object be taken in every church on the first Sunday after Trinity, June 2d, or some other Sunday in June. Further, be it

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be requested to send out to the rectors at the earliest possible day folders giving the outline of the plan and special offering envelopes for distribution on Trinity Sunday.

This resolution was adopted unanimously.

Elections being the order of the day, Mr. Osburn moved that the Secretary cast the ballot for Rev. Messrs. W. H. Burkhardt, D. D., Berryman Green, D. D., W. J. Morton, D. D., and Messrs. John B. Minor, Gardner L. Boothe and A. R. Hoxton, as members of the Standing Committee.

This motion was carried and the Chair announced the election of these gentlemen.

It was moved that the Secretary cast the ballot for Messrs. Lewis C. Williams, R. Carter Beverley and John M. Taylor as the Committee on Finance.

This motion was carried and the Chair announced their election.

The tellers then took the ballot for clerical members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE COLORED WORK OF THE COMMISSION APPOINTED BY THE COUNCIL OF 1928

TO MAKE A SURVEY OF THE MISSIONARY WORK OF THE DIOCESE.

PURPOSE.

To get all available facts about the work of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction having to do with its present effectiveness, its difficulties, its future possibilities and, from conclusions reached, to make any recommendations that, in the opinion of the Committee, would make for its greater effectiveness.

METHODS EMPLOYED BY THE COMMITTEE.

Personal interviews with the Bishop, the Archdeacon, interested individuals, both colored and white, in the various localities, a tour of a large part of the field, taking in a number of the points where missions and schools have been established, holding of congregational meetings at two of these points, studying the report of a committee appointed by the Colored Board of Missions to investigate their schools, studying certain statistics bearing upon the work as given in the journals of the Diocese.

CONCLUSIONS.

Your Committee believes that, on the whole, the progress of the Colored Work will compare favorably with that of the white. We note that while the percentage of growth in white membership as recorded in the Journal of 1928 was less than 2 per cent, the growth in the colored jurisdiction was over 4 per cent. We note too that while the average white contributor gives \$40.00 per year toward the work of the Church, the average per capita among our colored brethren is \$12.50. This \$12.50 represents an increase of over 100 per cent in the per capita giving of the colored contributor ten years ago. It does not represent the high-water mark. It has at times gone to over \$15.00, or nearly two-fifths of the per capita white contribution.

So much by way of dealing at once with the impression so widely prevailing that the colored people are not giving anything worthwhile to their own work.

Needless to say, your Committee was more favorably impressed with the work in some places than in others. In most of them the

work is progressing under capable leadership, both clergy and lay. In some instances it would seem the clergy have too much to do; in others too little. The matter of opening up new work, or placing men in localities where there is the greatest need of the Church, is a task that calls for the utmost thought and care.

At two points we are providing largely for the support of men whose ministrations are practically confined to one very small congregation each—possibly twenty-five or thirty members. It is to be presumed that men in such situations are ministering in other ways than through the Church, and that they are on the lookout for opportunities to start work in other communities within their reach, but when, after years pass, and no such opportunities open up or are unrecognized, it very naturally gives rise to a question in the minds of some people as to the wisdom of continuing to pay all or a very large part of such clergyman's salary to minister to one small group, especially if, along with the lack of new undertakings, there is apparently little development at the centre itself.

SCHOOLS.

There has been for some time a feeling of uncertainty, to say the least, about the establishment and conduct of the colored church day schools. Your Committee found some justification for this feeling. Schools have been established where there was no apparent need for them, the standards, in some instances, have not been of the best, just criticism has been made of the more or less arbitrary method of the appointment of teachers by the minister in charge. We will not at this time go into details. Our task has been made easier by a most excellent report of a committee of the Colored Board of Missions, appointed to make a survey of this very work. This report shows a careful study of all the schools in the jurisdiction and its conclusions are exactly in line with those of your Committee in asking that, wherever possible, the teachers be required to hold State certificates, that they be elected by the Board upon applications submitted by them, that certain work be discontinued, and that definite religious instruction approved by the Bishop be given in all of these schools.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Your Committee would avoid the setting up of new machinery and believes that it would be possible to carry out all needed changes in policy with the present organization, especially since the establishment by the colored people themselves of their own Boards of Missions and Religious Education, but by way of giving assistance to

the Bishop and the Archdeacon in the handling of the problems suggested and others which may arise, we recommend a closer and better informed relationship between the Executive Committee of the D. M. S. and the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction by the appointment of two members of the Executive Committee to serve with the Archdeacon as a Committee on the Colored Work, and that this Committee work in Tullest cooperation with and recognition of the Boards of the Colored Jurisdiction.

We believe that in these and all questions arising, every encouragement should be given to the principle of self-government, by which alone we can hope for real progress in the principle of self-support and autonomy.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons makes the following recommendations as to the proposed changes in the canons referred to it:

1. Amend Canon XII, Section 1, as follows:

In Division (1), line 2, after "Fluvanna" add "Goochland", and after "Orange" add "and St. Martin's Parish in Hanover county", so that Division (1) shall read:

(a) "The Albemarle Convocation, comprising all parishes in the counties of Albemarle, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Louisa, Orange and St. Martin's Parish in Hanover county".

In Division (2), line 2, before "counties" insert "the City of Alexandria and the"; after "Fauquier" strike out the words "Loudoun, Madison"; after "Fauquier" add the words "(south of the Bull Run Mountain); and in line 3 strike out "and Rappahannock", so that the whole Division shall read:

(b) "The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all parishes in the City of Alexandria and the counties of Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier (south of the Bull Run Mountain) and Prince William."

In Division (3) change the Division to read as follows:

(c) "The Rappahannock Convocation, comprising all parishes in the counties of Caroline, Charles City, Essex, Gloucester, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster, Mathews, Middlesex, New Kent, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford, Westmoreland and Ashland and St. Paul's Parishes in Hanover county."

In Division (4) strike out all of lines 2 and 3, and in their place put "county of Henrico", so that the whole Division shall read as follows:

(d) "The Richmond Convocation, comprising all parishes in the county of Henrico."

In Division (5) line 2, after "Clarke" add "Fauquier (north of the Bull Run Mountain)"; after "Frederick" add "Loudoun, Madison", and after "Page" add "Rappahannock", so that the whole Division shall read:

- (e) "The Valley Convocation, comprising all parishes in the counties of Clarke, Fauquier (north of the Bull Run Mountain), Frederick, Loudoun, Madison, Page, Rappahannock, Rockingham, Shenandoah and Warren."
- 2. Amend Article 5 of Canon X by inserting after line 17 the following paragraph:

VII: The Board of Mountain Work, to consist primarily of seven members.

3. Amend Article 5 of Canon X, line 20, by adding, after the words "Executive Committee", the words "which in the case of the Board of Mountain Work shall include the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, and the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, if there be one", so that the whole sentence shall read:

"Each of said Boards shall have the power, with the advice and consent of the Bishop, to elect additional members in number not exceeding those appointed by the Executive Committee; which, in the case of the Board of Mountain Work, shall include the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, and the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, if there be one."

4. Adopt the following Canon, to be numbered XI, all succeeding Canons to be renumbered accordingly:

CANON XI

Of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

Section 1. The missions engaged in Mountain Work shall constitute a missionary jurisdiction to be known as "The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge". The missions to be included in this jurisdiction shall be designated from time to time by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Section 2. The management of the affairs of this jurisdiction shall be in the hands of the Board of Mountain Work.

Section 3. A presbyter, to be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, shall have as the representative of the Bishop general supervision of the Mountain Work, and shall be responsible for the promotion thereof. The Archdeacon shall be appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the Executive Committee. When necessary, in the judgment of the Bishop and the Executive Committee, there shall be an Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, chosen in like manner.

Section 4. The Board shall formulate by-laws governing the Mountain Work, which shall become effective upon approval by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

The proposed amendment of Canon XII being under consideration, Rev. A. S. Gibson moved that this matter be referred to a special committee to report to the next Council.

Rev. John G. Scott moved as a substitute that this canon be referred back to the Committee on Canons for further consideration and report. Mr. Scott's substitute, being put to the vote, was lost, and Mr. Gibson's motion was lost also. The proposed amendment to Canon XII was then adopted by a canonical vote.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE PROPOSED SHENANDOAH NATIONAL PARK.

Your Committee appointed to keep in touch with the development of the proposed Shenandoah National Park, with a view to anticipating the changes which would probably be made in the Mountain Work of the Diocese in that area, wishes to report:

First. Constant contact has been maintained with this development by securing for the representatives of the Church's work interviews with the State and national authorities having supervision of this territory.

Second. As a result of this contact, the heartiest cooperation on the part of the governmental authorities has been secured, and eight of the fifteen mission points within the proposed area have been retained for the Church, namely, Middle River, Cecil Memorial, Haneytown, Blue Ridge Industrial School, Mission Home, Blackwell's Hollow and Pine Grove, the contours of the park being laid down by the governmental authorities at the suggestion of the Church authorities. By this cooperation property amounting to thousands of dollars and the homes of many of the mountaineers attached to the Church have been retained.

Third. The Department of Sociology at the University of Virginia, appreciating the grave importance of this project, has been anxious to lend its aid in solving the difficult problems arising from the park project.

Fourth. The Committee recommends (a) the thanks of the Council be extended to the governmental authorities, whose cooperation

has been so graciously rendered, especially Colonel Smith, of the National Government, and Colonel Carson, of the State Conservation Commission, and the authorities at the University. (b) It is also recommended that the Commission be continued with its present membership, adding thereto the Hon. H. F. Byrd.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY'S REPORT.

In order to signalize the celebration of the Centennial of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia with some forward missionary movement in the Diocese, the Special Committee appointed by the Council desire to make the following recommendation:

First. That 1,000 copies of the program and the addresses given at the Centennial, together with the Bishop's Council address, be published by the Diocesan Missionary Society, in a volume to be distributed and sold, the initial expense for the publication being underwritten by the Contingent Fund.

Second. That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society be instructed to organize a club among the contributors of the Diocesan Program who will be willing to subscribe \$25.00 or more per annum for three or more years in addition to their subscriptions to their parish quotas; this fund to be used for advance, missionary and Church extension work and not to be applied to any object otherwise provided for on the budget.

Third. In response to the disturbing report rendered by the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society on the general apathy on the part of the men of the Diocese in the missionary work of the Church, that the Bishop be requested to appoint a commission to devise a plan for the organization of groups among men of the parish to study and support missions of the Church.

In making this last recommendation the Committee commends to the Commission to be appointed the study of the Laymen's Association of the Rappahannock Convocation established by the late Robert Beverley.

REPORT OF THE COLONIAL CHURCHES COMMISSION.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-fourth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Colonial Churches Commission of the Diocese begs to report that during the past year we have found the opportunities to undertake a movement for securing and restoring to the Church one of the colonial churchyards which had passed out of the possession of the Church into private hands.

The church in question is Wicomico Church, in Wicomico Parish, Northumberland county. This parish is one of the oldest in the Diocese, having been established prior to 1650. "Ditchley", the original home of the Lee family in Virginia, is situated in this parish and the early members of the family were active members of the vestry.

At the time of the Revolution there was a very handsome cruciform church in the parish which had then been recently erected. After the Revolution the parish went down, the church was finally abandoned, torn down for the bricks, and the property passed out of the possession of the Church into private hands.

When the church was revived again a number of years later the site of the old church was secured and a modern building erected upon it, but the old churchyard still remained in private possession and most of the tombstones had gone to make hearths and walkways for farmers in the neighborhood.

The opportunity has recently arisen to secure the churchyard from the present owner and restore it once again to the possession of the Church. The Colonial Churches Commission has undertaken to secure the amount necessary to pay for the property. The actual cost is \$350.00, but we would like to go a bit further and secure a small fund for its preservation and care.

This churchyard has been in use for many generations and contains doubtless graves of soldiers who fought in the French and Indian Wars and in the Revolution. It should be preserved as a relic of our colonial life.

The Colonial Churches Commission will be grateful for any gifts from members of the \bar{C} hurch to be applied for this purpose.

Dr. Mayo reported that there was one vacancy on the Board of Trustees of the Blue Ridge Industrial School and requested the Council to nominate Dr. Ivey F. Lewis, Mr. Blake T. Newton and Rev. R. B. Nelson as three persons from whom the Board might select one to fill the vacancy. On motion, these three gentlemen were so nominated by the Council.

Mr. Murray McGuire presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Council give its hearty endorsement to the plan for the erection of a chapel at the Blue Ridge Industrial School to be known as the Robert A. Gibson Memorial Chapel and hereby appeal to the liberality of the people of our Diocese for the accomplishment of this end.

The Assistant Treasurer was, on motion, instructed to cast the ballot of the Council for the Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon as Treasurer of the Diocese.

Mr. John M. Taylor reported that there are two vacancies on the Board of Trustees of Church Schools and moved that the Council nominate Messrs. James M. Lewis, R. Carter Beverley, Alexander W. Weddell and John Stewart Bryan as four persons from whom the Board may select two to fill the vacancies.

Mr. Taylor reported two vacancies also in the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, and moved that the Council nominate Messrs. Edmund Strudwick, Oliver J. Sands, A. S. Kratz and Richard H. Meade as four persons from whom the Trustees may select two to fill the vacancies. The Council approved the nomination of the above mentioned gentlemen for the vacancies reported.

Mr. Murray McGuire presented the

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE OF THE CHURCH PENSION FUND.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-fourth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Diocesan Committee of the Church Pension Fund has a

pleasant duty of reporting to the Council practically the same thing that it has reported each year for the past six years, that every Pension Fund assessment on the salary of any minister at work in the Diocese has been paid in full for the year 1928. A letter from Mr. Bradford B. Locke, the Secretary of the Church Pension Fund, under date of March 23, 1929, states: "In the Diocese of Virginia our records show that the assessments have been 100 per cent paid since the very beginning of the fund. I need hardly tell you what such whole-hearted cooperation means to us in the administration of the fund. But I would like again to express to you the appreciation of the Trustees and my own appreciation for all you have done."

The Pension Fund has continued its policy of increasing the pensions of the older retired clergy and the widows of the deceased just as rapidly as increase of assets makes this possible. During the past year two of the widows of our older clergy have had their pensions increased to \$500.00 per annum and one minister has had his retirement pension increased from \$750.00 to \$900.00. During the year an application was made to the Pension Fund to restore to the list of beneficiaries of our Widows' and Orphans' Fund the daughter of a clergyman who died thirty-five years ago and who had at first been in receipt of an annuity from our Diocesan Fund until she became self-supporting and gave it up. As this lady was not on the list of beneficiaries of our Diocesan Society when that list was reported to the Church Pension Fund upon its establishment in 1917, no provision had been made whereby a pension could be paid to her. The Pension Fund very willingly replaced her on the list of beneficiaries, with the understanding that the annual payment made to her should come not from the funds of the Church Pension Fund, but from the income of our Diocesan funds. This has proved to be a most satisfactory solution of the problem.

While every clergyman who has been continuously at work in the Diocese of Virginia since 1917 has had the Pension Fund assessment on his salary paid in full from that date to the present, it has happened in several cases that clergymen coming into our Diocese from others have arrearages sometimes in quite large amounts charged against them through failure to pay assessments before they came into the Diocese. The result is that neither such clergymen nor their widows will receive the full pension if the need should arise. The pension is based upon the requirement that every Pension Fund assessment from March, 1917, to the date of retirement or death be paid in full and if there is any arrearage it must inevitably mean that the pension will not be as large as it should be. The Diocese can and does provide for the payment of all assessments arising in the Diocese, but it cannot do anything about arrearages arising before the minis-

ters in question came into the Diocese. In such cases the ministers themselves should, if possible, devise some way of paying the arrearage so that they and their dependents may be assured of the full pension. When such cases are brought to the attention of our Committee we have always taken the matter up with the ministers concerned, and where such a procedure has been deemed desirable have written to the officials of the Dioceses where the arrearages occurred to ask if the Dioceses themselves would pay the arrearages. In some cases the arrearages have been paid by the Dioceses concerned, but in other cases payment has been declined. The matter, however, is of such great importance in our judgment that every minister should pay himself, if necessary, any arrearage existing in his Pension Fund record.

During the past year the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Disabled Clergy Fund and Widows' and Orphans' Fund has sent to the Church Pension Fund the sum of \$6,475.17, being the year's interest that accrued on these funds. After the payment by the Church Pension Fund of \$300.00 for the expenses or the Diocesan Committee and \$200.00 for the pension mentioned above, this interest is used in paying the Pension Fund assessment on salaries paid to clergymen by the Diocesa and on appropriations made to the salaries of the ministers by the Diocesan Missionary Society, the remainder, amounting annually to something over \$2,000.00, will be paid as a refund to those parishes in the Diocese which have paid their Pension Fund assessment in full for the preceding year. As every parish and congregation pays its assessment in full, each one will share in this refund.

The total amount of salaries paid to clergymen in the Diocese (including in addition one-sixth of the money salary in each case where a rectory is furnished), and on which the Pension Fund makes assessment, is \$260,390.22. The assessment, therefore, paid by the Diocese at 7½ per cent is \$19,528.26. It is interesting to note in the recent report of the Church Pension Fund that the total pensions now being paid by the Church Pension Fund to retired clergymen and the widows and orphans of clergymen in our Diocese amounts to \$20,300.00, so that in the last analysis \$771.74 more is coming back to our aged and disabled clergy and widows and orphans of our deceased clergy, than the Diocese as a whole pays per annum for Pension Fund assessments. This means that every cent that the Diocese or any parish will pay this year in Pension Fund assessment will come directly back as pension to some old clergyman or some widow or orphan of a deceased minister belonging to our Diocese.

We cannot close our report without expressing our deep sense of loss in the death during the past year of Mr. James Caskie and Mr. Edwin A. Palmer. Both of these gentlemen were members of the

Diocesan Pension Fund Committee from the date of the establishment of that Committee in 1917 until their death. They both gave of their time and their interest without stint to the work of our Committee and to every call that the Diocese made upon them. We thank God for the good example of their loyalty and devotion to their Church.

Whereas, a number of religious leaders, belonging to some fifteen different branches of God's household, have recognized the unfortunate and weak position in which Christianity is placed by reason of doctrinal and organic differences, and have drawn a "Pact of Reconciliation", which sixty-three of them have signed, and which reads as follows:

"We, Christians of various churches, believing that only in a cooperative and united Christendom can the world be Christianized, deplore a divided Christendom as being opposed to the Spirit of Christ and the needs of the world; and we are convinced that the Christianizing of the world is greatly hindered by divisive and rivaling churches.

"We, therefore, desire to express our sympathetic interest in and prayerful attitude toward all conferences, small and large, that are looking toward reconciliation of the divided Church of Christ; and we propose to practice, in all our spiritual fellowships, the equality of all Christians before God, so that no Christian shall be denied membership in our churches, nor a place in our celebration of the Lord's Supper, nor any ministry be denied the courtesies of our pulpits; and, further, irrespective of denominational barriers, we pledge to be brethren one to another in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour, whose we are and whom we serve."

Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Council does hereby express its sympathy with this Reconciliation Pact among Christians and does hereby give its cordial approval to the spirit of the Pact.

The hour of 1 having come, the Council adjourned for luncheon, to meet again at 2:15.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INCREASE OF THE MINISTRY.

Your Committee begs leave to present the following report:

At the present time there are not enough men in the Virginia Seminary, in spite of the fact that the Seminary is full and men have to be turned away, to provide, when they are graduated, for the vacant parishes and missions in the Diocese. This is a serious matter. We should look to our own Diocese to supply the clergy needed to man the posts within our borders.

At the present moment there is not a resident clergyman within the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge. All the ministerial work has to be carried on by the Archdeacon and the Associate Archdeacon. The work in this section is most important and should be in charge of the highest grade men. This is the "firing line" of the Church in Virginia. Here, and in the similar work which we commonly call the "rural sections", the Church should have her best equipped men.

We are informed that there are relatively few men coming into the Diocese from outside.

In making efforts to meet the needs for additional men in the Diocese, there are certain obstacles which must, in our judgment, be overcome.

We do not believe that it would be wise to make a general appeal for men for the ministry. If such an appeal should be made, we fear, in the emotion of it, men who are not suited to the work would offer themselves.

In the minds of some of our young men there is the thought that the work of the ministry is not a man's job. We live in an age characterized by intense activity with a large material output. Men like to see results such as can be tabulated. We feel that if the clergy would choose suitable young men and associate such with themselves in the work of their parishes, not just as lay readers, ushers in churches, etc., but as active participants in social service work, mission work, boys' work, teaching in the Sunday schools, etc., this would give these young men an idea of what the ministry is and thus enlist their interest in it and, in all probability, turn their minds toward it as a life work. If the rectors of our parishes could devote more time to cultivating the young men who are in their charge, have friendly and frank discussions with them about the serious side of the work of the ministry, we feel there would be accomplished much toward interesting them in the real work of the ministry.

The young men of our day are men of ideals, but many of them feel that their ideals can secure better expression in other work than in the ministry.

While some men are turned away from the ministry because of the smallness of the salaries offered, and while this matter should be appreciated fully by the Church, yet we do not feel that this is a really serious hindrance.

We do not feel that organizations are, nor can they be, of very much assistance in recruiting for the ministry.

We would recommend that the clergy themselves get clearly in mind the real need for men in the ministry. We talk about it, but do little or nothing to remedy the situation. The clergy must sound the call to the ministry.

Christian parents should be urged to present the work of the ministry to their sons. There is no more effective way to turn the heart and mind of a growing boy toward the ministry than a word from his parents.

We would strongly recommend the establishment of the family altar in all our homes.

It is the conviction of your Committee that the merely formal report made by us to the Council is of no value, and we would recommend:

- 1. That the Bishop appoint a Commission on Recruiting for the Ministry consisting of five men representing the various types of ministry within the Diocese, *i. e.*, city, rural, school, college and seminary, to give study to the matter of securing the proper men for the work of the ministry; this Commission to take the place of the present existing Committee on the Increase of the Ministry.
- 2. We recommend further that the membership be changed from year to year by the retirement of one of the members and the selection of one representing the same type of ministry appointed by the Bishop to fill such vacancy.

3. Your Committee does not think that the cost of such a Commission would be an expense to be met by the Diocese, and would recommend that, for the present, no funds be set aside for this purpose.

II. (a) REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-fourth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society begs to report that the total receipts of the Missionary Society for all purposes during the year 1928 amounted to \$70,590.92; the expenditures amounted to \$70,419.86, leaving a balance of \$171.06. The sum of \$4,000.00 in both expenditures and disbursements was owing to the payment and reinvestment of our invested funds so that the actual disbursements of the Society in the work of the Diocese amounted to \$66,419.86. This is by far the largest amount that the Diocese has ever expended in the conduct of its missionary work, and yet the

field of our opportunity is growing so steadily that more than this could have been wisely expended if it had been available.

Perhaps the most important event in our missionary work during the past year has been the establishment at the request of the Bishop by the Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of a Colored Board of Missions consisting of three clergymen and three laymen from their Board who will act as a Committee of Missions for the colored missionary work, making recommendation to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Scciety as to the appropriations to be made to the salaries of clergy and women workers in the colored missionary field. This Board holds its meetings before each meeting of the Executive Committee. They have conducted their work with great earnestness, appointing their own committees to investigate the needs of the various colored missionary fields, and especially the colored schools, and their recommendations to the Board have been marked by a clear grasp of their situation and a conservativeness of recommendation which gives great promise for the future of the colored work. It is a real step forward in the strengthening and building up of the colored work to a point where the goal set before it will be attained that the colored people themselves must be the chief agencies in building up our Church in their own race.

As an illustration of the trend of this development of self-government and also of self-support, we can report that in purchasing a lot for our colored mission of St. Paul's at West Point within the past few months at a cost of \$550.00, the colored mission itself assumed an obligation for \$250.00 of the purchase price and three other colored congregations in Richmond and Hanover made cash contributions amounting to \$40.00 to apply on the purchase of the new lot. The other great departments of the missionary field—the mountain work and the rural work—will be dealt with by other reports to this Council.

The Society and the Diocese at large have passed through a year's experience of the pay-as-you-go plan. It will be remembered that at the Council of last year it was reported that a cut of about $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent had been necessary because the acceptances by parishes of their quotas were not sufficiently large to cover the whole budget of the Diocese. Each Diocesan Board and organization found it necessary to readjust its expenditures to the reduced income expected to be received, and it is a pleasure to report that each one has lived within its income. So that there is no great deficit resting upon our Diocese arising from the obligations of the year 1928.

Our situation for 1929 is somewhat different. The budget approved by the Council for this year amounted to \$196,050.00, of which the item of Church Extension by definite understanding was not to

be paid until the others were provided for. This left \$179,050.00 of appropriations. A great many parishes were so slow in sending in their report of acceptances of quota that it was late in February before the Board of Apportionment could know definitely what the situation of the Diocese would be. It was then found that the acceptances amounted to \$165,756.82 and a cut of 14 per cent would therefore be required in order to bring the appropriations of the Diocese within its expected income. We followed the precedent of last year in considering our appropriation for the work of the General Church, \$42,000.00 as a fixed obligation and also the item of payment of bonds, \$30,000.00 and interest on bonds outstanding, \$10,350.00 under the item of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, directing that these two be paid in full. Everything else suffered a cut in its appropriation of 14 per cent.

It was found that the various other Boards and organizations by more or less readjustment of program could hope to live within the reduced income, but at somewhat heavy cost. For instance, under the Diocesan offices we were compelled to reduce our office force by one worker.

The situation of the Missionary Society, however, was far more serious, as the cut reduced our anticipated appropriation from \$73, 250.00 to \$65,000.00, thereby making the total income of the Society from all sources amount to about \$65,472.58. Our first step was to reduce the appropriation to the Blue Ridge Industrial School from \$10,000,00 to \$7,500,00, and that left our appropriations made almost entirely to salaries then in force amount to \$4,883.00 more than our anticipated income. The only alternative before the Executive Committee was either to reduce the appropriations to our missionaries or else to undertake to secure the needed amount through individual gifts. This latter plan was adopted and we are very happy to be able to report that through special efforts of the Woman's Auxiliary and Section B. increased gifts and larger acceptances from several parishes, and by direct gifts or pledges from individuals we have now secured about \$6,000.00 additional. This guarantees the payment or every appropriation of the Society at present in force without any reduction, and also provides a much-needed amount to grant appropriation to any vacant parish which may secure a minister during this current year.

Our experience of the pay-as-you-go plan thus indicates most clearly that if it is continued in force there will always be the possibility that acceptances of the quotas by the parishes will be insufficient to cover the budget, and the Missionary Society face the need of securing additional gifts to carry on its work. Two things are required to remedy this situation: First, the Diocese should strengthen

the organization of the Field Department to a point where it can constantly keep before each parish and vestry the importance of the missionary work of the Diocese instead of confining information of this work to the Fall Campaign, so that each parish may undertake the largest amount which it can accept for the work of the Diocese. Second, our need this year for going to individuals of larger means for additional gifts has proven the wisdom of the recommendation that this plan should be adopted as a regular method in use in our Diocese to enable us to make up for deficits in the acceptances of parish quotas and to provide funds for larger plans of extension that cannot be included in the annual budget. A recommendation to this effect has been made to one Council after another, and each time it has been approved, but never until this year has any effort been made to put it into effect.

In regard to the Diocesan deficit account, sometimes called the 23 per cent deficit account, to pay the old deficits and pledges resting upon the Diocese before we undertook the present pay-as-you-go plan. we beg to report that we have finally paid the remainder of our promise made at the General Convention in New Orleans of \$25,000.00 to apply upon the deficit of the National Council. Our situation in May, 1928, was that we had a Diocesan deficit note in bank of \$17,-000.00. and we still owed on the deficit of the National Council a sum, after making reduction for cash then in our hands, of \$17,516.73, a total deficit then resting on the Diocese of \$34.516.73. Our situation at present is that this amount has been cut down to \$26,200.00, represented by two notes, and we have in cash to apply thereon the sum of \$4,274.41, so that the actual obligation now resting upon the Diocese is in round numbers \$22,000.00 plus interest. There are certain other amounts which we hope will come in before the end of the year, but as far as our present receipts go we must expect to enter upon the year 1930 with a debt of \$22,000.00 of this old deficit still remaining upon the Diocese. The Board of Apportionment has therefore placed in the budget of 1930 and proposes to place in the budget of 1931 an item of \$10,000.00 each year as a fixed obligation to be applied upon the payment of this deficit.

The Diocesan Missionary Society is celebrating this year the Centennial Anniversary of its first establishment in 1929. The passing years have given great opportunity to us to labor in the extension of our Master's Kingdom in this Diocese, and we thank God for the success that has been won, for the work that has been accomplished; but never in all of the past century have there been greater opportunities of ministry before us than at present nor clearer grasp of our Diocesan field nor a greater readiness on the part of our people to enter into it. For this we thank God and pray that in the coming years

our Society, which is in a real sense the Diocese at work, may go forward to ever greater usefulness and success in our Master's service.

II. (b) REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPORTIONMENT.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-fourth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Board of Apportionment begs to present the following as a tentative program for the Diocese of Virginia for the year 1930:

It will be noted that there have been two increases; the item for work of the General Church has been increased from \$42,000.00 to \$48,000.00 for the reason that \$48,000.00 is the amount assigned by the National Council as the quota of our Diocese for 1930, and we cannot do less than put in the figure that they assigned to us and undertake to raise it.

The other item is \$10,000.00 for payment of notes on the Diocesan deficits. The Diocese at the Council of 1927, before the beginning of the pay-as-you-go plan, faced the situation that by the end of that year we would have deficits and unpaid obligations amounting to about \$44,000.00. The effort was made to secure special gifts from each parish of 23 per cent of its current quota with which to wipe out these deficits. This plan was only partially successful and the present situation is that we still have \$26,200.00 of past deficits which is now carried on notes. We expect a certain amount to come in

during this year to apply on the notes, but the Board of Apportionment has undertaken to put into the budget each year the sum of \$10,000.00 to apply on the payment of these notes until they are finally wiped out and the Diocese relieved of its burden. Under our present plan the Diocese will not accumulate any further deficits, but we must wipe out the old one, which rests upon us as a burden.

In addition to the primary budget amounting to \$194,800.00, we have put in an item of \$15,000.00 for Church Extension, which is not to be paid in any part until all of the items on the primary budget have been paid or provided for. The \$194,800.00 will be apportioned to the parishes in quotas and this will mean that there will have to be a slight increase in the parish quota over the present year.

The item of Diocesan Offices is continued at \$4,500.00, whereas the actual expenses of the Diocesan Offices are \$8,500.00. It will be remembered that at our Council last year the Contingent Fund was directed to pay the additional \$4,000.00 of expenses of the Diocesan Offices, and in order to secure this amount was directed to draw \$4,000.00 of the income of the Episcopal Fund to apply on the salary of the Bishop. We recommend that this same plan be adopted for the year 1930.

II. (c) REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SOCIAL SERVICE OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA FOR THE YEAR 1928.

This Board has held five meetings during the current year.

The first, on January 17th, was in connection with a meeting of the Provincial Board of Social Service of the Province of Washington, and Dean Lathrop, head of this department of the National Council, was present.

On January 18th a called meeting convened in the office of the Executive Secretary to prepare a report for the Council. The regular quarterly spring meeting was held on April 19th, and on June 13th the Board met after the session of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and organized for the year, the members present being: Rev. W. Roy Mason, Rev. B. D. Tucker, Jr., D. D., Rev. George P. Mayo, D. D., Mr. B. T. Newton and Mr. John B. Minor.

They elected as supplementary members: Rev. Robert B. Nelson from the Valley Convocation; Rev. F. D. Goodwin from the Rappahannock Convocation; Rev. W. C. Marshall from the Piedmont Convocation.

And they also elected as advisory members: Misses Louise Price and Nannie Minor, Dr. Ennion G. Williams, Mr. Dabney Lancaster.

At this meeting the Rev. George P. Mayo. D. D., was elected

chairman.

The fifth and last meeting during the year was held on September 26th, at which the Rev. R. Cary Montague, D. D., was re-elected Executive Secretary.

The Commission has made a special effort during the past year to secure better cooperation from the parishes, and with this end in view letters were sent out to all the parochial clergy in the Diocese urging them to appoint a parish secretary for social service to whom communications could be sent and from whom information might be received by this department. The response to these letters was by no means satisfactory, however, through repeated effort we have succeeded in securing the appointment of secretaries in forty-four parishes. From twenty-two of these reports were received concerning parish activities showing an organized effort in community activities by parishes as follows:

Taking invalids and old people to drive, eight parishes.

Cooperation with city and State health, relief and social agencies, eight parishes.

Conducting Sunday morning day nurseries, four parishes.

Giving assistance to the handicapped in finding work, six parishes.

Visiting local institutions, twelve parishes.

Establishing maternity and loan closets, three parishes.

Visiting shut-ins, eighteen parishes.

Organizing community choruses, two parishes.

Participating in recreational activities, nine parishes.

Helping to secure hospital and institutional treatments, eleven parishes.

Organizing corrective clinics, four parishes.

One parish assists in supporting a fresh air camp for two months in the year.

Increased use of the office of the Executive Secretary is shown by the fact that hospital and institutional treatments were provided for 303 persons during 1928 as against 283 in 1927.

REPORT OF FINDINGS COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN RURAL CONFERENCE.

Your Committee feels, in view of the numerous suggestions brought out in papers and discussions on the various aspects of the general rural work in the Diocese, that it must needs confine itself to such definite and tangible proposals as appear to your Committee to be capable of practical application.

Considering first the matter of Evangelism, we are persuaded that, while there may be far less of evident Christian zeal on the part of both clergy and laity in our Diocese than we would wish, nevertheless that there is far more than in our discouraged moments we would incline to think.

Recognizing that in carrying out the principles of Evangelism in our parishes large liberty as to method must be allowed, we commend the following suggestions of our Commission on Evangelism:

1—Personal consecration of the minister through re-emphasis of his own expression of the Church's mission to his community.

2—Enlisting the efforts of the individuals of his own congregation in personal contacts with others with a view to drawing them to Christ.

3—We see large possibilities in the suggestion of the open confirmation class, and heartily commend its use where practicable.

Coming now to the problems that are peculiar to rural work, we recommend to Council that the present Committee of the Diocese on Survey of the Rural Work be made a permanent Commission of the Diocese on Rural Work, and that the following suggestions be submitted from this Conference to this Commission:

- 1-Those bearing upon consolidation of churches.
- 2—The matter of temporary clerical supply and responsibility for vacant cures.
 - 3-Regrouping of local fields of service.
 - 4-Maintenance of the morale of the rural clergy through ade-

quate salaries and proper recognition of the vital importance of rural work in a rural Diocese.

5—The proposal for the "larger parish" system where practicable, involving the employment of expert leadership in the various departments of the work under a rector guiding the whole group of churches.

We would re-emphasize the wide opportunity for service to humanity in the local fields offered through cooperation with our own Social Service Department and other social agencies, and the opportunity of our Church to give spiritual significance to all such agencies.

We commend the suggestion of the fitting recognition of rural work and workers in the Rogation Day services, with a view to overcoming the lack of knowledge, want of vision and indifference among so many of our Church people in regard to rural work.

We recommend that this Conference be established as an annual institution of the Diocese.

We heartily commend to our people, especially the rural Church School workers, the opportunities of increasing the usefulness of their service offered by the summer schools sponsored by our Department of Religious Education.

On the subject of the Church Schools we call the attention of our vestries to the far-reaching importance of our Church Schools in their relation to the Church's future, and in this connection we have been impressed with the experience of parishes which have furnished free transportation in reaching out for people living too far to walk to their nearest Church School.

Finally we would express our interest in the suggestions bearing on ministering to "shut-ins", or isolated individuals, through the League for the Isolated, represented by Miss Edna Eastwood, 281 Fourth Avenue.

II. (d) REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION, FROM THE COUNCIL OF 1928 TO 1929.

The Board has held four meetings during the year, with a quorum present on each occasion. It has greatly missed at two of these meetings its efficient Secretary, Rev. W. H. Burkhardt, D. D., kept away by illness. We are thankful to know of his improvement and earnestly hope for his complete recovery.

Much of the work of the Board is now pretty well established. The Virginia Summer School of Religious Education at Sweet Briar enters upon its fourteenth session June 24th and runs to July 5th.

For the conduct of this school we are jointly responsible with the Boards of the Dioceses of Southern and Southwestern Virginia. Programs of the school are now ready for distribution.

The program this year, as heretofore, will provide for training in all departments of Church work, meeting the requirements of the National Accredited Teachers' Association as to subjects, fitness of instructors, number of periods and length of periods.

While standing firmly behind this school and making by far our largest appropriation to its support, it is now a fairly well established policy of the Board to bring the opportunities for training in leadership within reach, geographically and financially, of as many people in the Diocese as possible, not by the establishment of other schools on the scale of the one at Sweet Briar, but by giving encouragement to and making smaller appropriations for shorter term schools either in the Diocese or sufficiently near it to draw from a number of our churches.

St. Margaret's School, Tappahannock, originally a conference for Church workers, in the Rappahannock Valley Convocation, is now conducted jointly with Piedmont Convocation, and despite the fact that publicity has been confined almost entirely to these Convocations, is fast becoming, without any definite action to that effect, a short-term school of the Diocese—every Convocation being represented at the session of 1928. It will hold its seventh session June 17th-21st. Programs for this too are ready for distribution. There are two schools just outside of the Diocese, which are attended by a number of our people and for which we make small appropriation. A small appropriation is also made for the conduct of a school for colored workers held annually at St. Paul's Church, Lawrenceville, Va. These matters are all itemized in the report of the Treasurer.

The Board has one very radical departure from custom to report, namely, the election of a woman to its membership. Worse still, we had planned to elect another. Here is a real, live issue in the making up of the next Board. For the sake of those now serving it might be well to say that Miss Louisa T. Davis, of Leesburg, Va., President of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese, is the woman member elected.

Perhaps the most important matter before the Board now is the selection by a committee appointed for that purpose of a full-time field worker for Religious Education. Funds for this, outside the regular appropriation to the Board, are now available for a year or two at least, and we have faith to believe that, once such a worker is en-

gaged, not to sit in an office and run our Sunday schools by mail and brand us as "Bosouras" for not making reports on time, but to go in and out among us, helping where help is most needed, directing the work among young people; such worker will soon be found indispensable. No one has been secured for this work as yet. Conferences have been held and two or three applications are soon to be presented, but the matter is still open and the Committee will welcome suggestions.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The matter of standardizing the work of Christian teaching in our Sunday schools has been often discussed. If anything was ever done about it before the present Board took office we all know that little attention is given to it. It might be interesting to know how many varieties of literature and how many publishers are represented in this Diocese. Standardization, however, does not mean necessarily adhering to one course or one particular publisher's output. It does mean the recognition, first, that there are different capacities and experiences of individuals at different ages, and secondly, in the light of experience, there are such things as fundamentals in the making of Christian character which should be included in every course. It would seem that a Board of Religious Education, if it is to mean anything, should be of help to those needing help in such matters. And to this end we recommend to the next Board that it be divided into committees for the study of material and methods of the different departments for the purpose of giving all possible information to those seeking it in arranging courses in their schools.

II. (e) REPORT OF ARCHDEACON FREDERICK W. NEVE, D. D., TO THE COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

It is a happy coincidence that the Centenary of the D. M. S. should coincide with the twenty-fifth anniversary of the formation of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, by the Diocesan Council in 1904, because the Mountain Work was an extension of the work of the D. M. S. into an entirely new field.

The Mountain Work, however, may be regarded as rather a return to the original ideal of the Church when it was first settled in Virginia by Robert Hunt and his fellow-settlers at Jamestown, for the Church started out to be the mother of all the people, with the hope also that missionary work might be done among the Indians as time went on.

This ideal was carried into practice, as Virginia was settled up, by its division into parishes, with provisions made for the support of their ministers and church buildings, to care for the spiritual interest of all the people. Unfortunately, as we all know, the Revolution entirely changed the old order of things in this respect and the Church lost her hold over a large proportion of the people, so that the Episcopal Church came to be regarded as the Church of a class, and that the upper class, rather than the Church of the people generally.

The condition of things, however, in the mountains, inhabited for the most part by a long neglected class of people, gave our Church an opportunity to return to the old Jamestown ideal of being the mother of the people, and this opportunity has been made the most of, through the extension of our Diocesan mission to this large and important field. That the Church is the mother of the people is clearly manifested in the fact that our missions in the mountains form the centre of the social and religious life of the various communities in which they are placed. The people come to our missionaries as to their best friends, and help is given them in a number of different ways, and more especially in training the young with higher ideals of life and larger outlook on the world than had prevailed for generations.

In our schools, and more especially in the Blue Ridge Industrial School, the children are given a chance to fit themselves for a larger life, and it is wonderful how many of them have gone out and taken their places as useful citizens in the outside world, showing that all they needed was a chance to make good on equal terms with those who had started out in life under better and more favorable conditions. I will leave the facts connected with the present status of the work to be dealt with by our Associate Archdeacon, the Ven. W. Roy Mason. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF ARCHDEACON W. ROY MASON, TO THE COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

It seems wise to give in our report a few statistics, in spite of the fact that such are often tiresome. We feel sure that there are many in the Diocese who do not know the size and strength of this work, nor how great are the problems and the opportunities connected with it. In the territory in which our thirty stations are located, there are about 10,000 square miles. We have work in seven counties; forty-odd workers. When all districts are manned we have twelve clergymen giving all or part time to the work. We have about 1,100 communicants. We run twelve day schools, four of which are two-room schools. We have a preventorium for rebuilding undernourished children, saving them from the certain destruction of tuber-

culosis. All of this work requires large sums of money, even with the most careful management. The Diocese gives us about half of what it costs to meet our expenses. We are always trying to make a dollar do two dollars' worth of work, and we have to depend upon the loyalty of our friends to enable us to keep our credit good.

In the past year we have been short four clergymen, but in spite of this fact the services have been kept up at every point by our fine body of laymen; and Dr. Neve and I have been able to give the Communion as often as they have been used to having it. There have been times when we could not have all the baptisms, and often they had to be postponed for a week day. I often drive seventy-five miles before my first service, and then have three services, with perhaps ten or fifteen miles between each two, the services usually being the Communion, with sermon. I also have conferences with the workers at each point. These Sundays are busy days, but these are not the things which have given us our real worries. The dreadful condition of the roads in some places have made it impossible for me to meet my appointments, a thing which is trying both to the minister and the workers and disappointing to the people. If I miss the regular Sunday it usually means waiting a month for another chance.

Another trial is the lack of workers and clergy. If it had not been for the good people of other denominations coming to our rescue. some of our schools would have been closed and many of our services could not have been held. The park question also is giving our people much concern. Because of the uncertainty about the prices they will get for their land they are unable to borrow money on the land as security. What they are to do and where they are to go are burning questions. We do not know, but we are going with them wherever they go, if possible. We are hoping that some good fairy will give us money to buy up some land and establish a community of our people, where we can have our church and school right in their midst.

I wish to note some encouraging signs: First—The general attitude of the people is more sympathetic and appreciative than in the past. One church, not of our own kind, served by occasional visits from a preacher from Harrisonburg, came to our worker and asked her to conduct their Sunday school, which she gladly did and is still doing. These people, for the first time in their lives, saved up money during Lent and made an Easter Offering. Our own offerings in all the missions have been much larger than ever before, which indicates a solid growth.

We are trying now to build our buildings of a more substantial type, using the native rock, and we have trained our own mountain men to do this rock work. They work for a much more reasonable price than we could get outside labor for, thus making it possible for us, with our limited funds, to use permanent material at almost the same cost as wood, when paint and insurance rates and repairs are considered.

I must not forget to mention the splendid help given us by the Church Army. Captain Mountford has been most sympathetic, and has let us have Captains Smith and Wiese for many missions and also to supply vacant places. We could not have made the splendid progress of the past year without them.

The moving of the preventorium to Mission Home has proved to be wise. In the new location the work is progressing beautifully, and Miss Park and her staff have much more comfortable and efficient quarters in which to do their fine work of reclaiming these little children.

We thank God for the many blessings we have received in these past twenty-five years. For the future we feel most hopeful.

III. (a) REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

To the Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, D. D., President ex-officio: The Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary reports as follows:

During the year 1928 the interest of the Woman's Auxiliary has centered in a group of definite objects: the United Thank Offering, the Corporate Gift, the water supply for Dr. Burke's Hospital at Fort Yukon, Alaska; the problem of inducing our women to read the Church papers, the Study Classes on "The New Africa" and "A Church Awake", and the effort to help our parishes meet the budget quota for missions. The officers of our several departments are reporting the results of this interest. The year was one of activity; yet we are glad to see in the parish reports a growing consciousness of the greatness of the work that needs to be done, and of the comparative smallness of our efforts to accomplish it.

Our Educational Secretary notes progress along all lines; ninety Study Classes, the best institute for training teachers that we have ever had, a wide use of the monthly programs, and an increasing demand for missionary books.

The Church Periodical Club, which in this Diocese works closely with the Woman's Auxiliary, finds it difficult to secure the very limited financial support for which it asks. If the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary will concern themselves about this matter, they can greatly help our sister organization, an organization which is a real blessing to our missionaries at home and abroad.

Our Section B of the Woman's Auxiliary was formed in 1914 by Bishop Gibson, on the advice of Bishop Lloyd, who was then President of the Board of Missions. The plan of having Woman's Auxiliary branches composed of the younger women was from its inception found useful in the Virginia Branch. But this plan spread very slowly; and it was not until the time of the Triennial in Washington that. through the active work of the Washington Section B, it aroused wide interest in the National Auxiliary. While we fully recognize the principle that our women do better work, and do it with more enthusiasm, when allowed to form special working groups, we would urge such groups to keep in mind the constantly changing needs of the girls who are coming to womanhood, and who should be taking their place in the missionary work of the Church. In my judgment, the Diocesan Branch should at this time devise some plan through which new parish branches of younger women shall be formed as the need for them arises. I am further convinced that this action should recognize the group principle in the work of the Auxiliary, thereby continuing the present branches of Section B as long as such branches desire to work as separate groups.

The Junior Auxiliary, through its Secretary, Mrs. Barton, reports several new branches, and much activity. Mrs. Barton finds her five Convocational Secretaries most helpful and effective. The crying need of her department is for up-to-date material for Mission Study Classes for young girls, for which at present we are largely dependent upon the Missionary Education Movement and the Church of England in

It will be readily seen that this makes it hard to teach our Juniors of the needs of the work done by their own Church. The National Department of Religious Education is preparing a series of leaflets to be used in connection with the Christmas boxes sent by the children to the mission field. These will be useful, but will not take the place of carefully prepared Mission Study Courses, such as are used by other Christian Communions.

The Secretary of the Little Helpers impresses upon us the need for strengthening her organization. Her reason is twofold. The Church of the future will be missionary if we faithfully instill missionary motives into the souls of the children of the Church of the present. And a well-defined road to the hearts of the parents of little children is through the interests of those children. The prophecy that a little child shall lead them is still finding its fulfilment in the world today.

The Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Washington was attended by our five elected delegates, who represented the Branch in all business meetings. But the value to Virginia of the Triennial of 1928 was measured, not by the work of these delegates, but by the presence in Washington of hundreds of Virginia women, who took part in the great United Thank Offering services, and listened to the reports and appeals of missionaries from all over the world, and received special training in the study classes, and saw, some of them for the first time, that missionary work should have a compelling interest for every woman in the Church.

The Woman's Auxiliary has been asked by the Commission on Personal Religion and Evangelism to take part in the effort to bring the work of this Commission into every Diocese and parish in the Church. The national officers of the Auxiliary are urging the Diocesan and parish branches to give their most earnest attention to this subject, and to stand ready to help every plan of the Bishops and clergy for the furtherance of the movement.

In preparation for a task which calls not only our spiritual leaders, but every communicant, the Auxiliary is stressing the importance of Corporate Communions, Bible Study, Prayer Circles, Devotional Committees and the reading of carefully selected books. Such preparation will make the individual woman a better fitted and readier messenger as her calls to service come to her.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:
Sirs:
I beg to submit the following report of St. Christopher's School
for the session of 1928-1929, being the eighteenth in its history and the ninth under Church ownership:

2. Health:

The health of the School generally has been unusually good throughout the session: in the Day Department there have been only a few cases of extended illness; in the Boarding Department there has been no single case of serious illness.

3. Work:

The regular work of the School has been of a satisfactory character.

4. The Faculty and House Staff:

At the close of the session we shall lose five of the nineteen members of our present faculty. The vacancies thus caused have already been filled. The religious affiliation of the members of the faculty and of the House Staff and Executive Staff this session is as follows.

6. Graduating Class:

At the close of the session, on June 13th, a class of eight will be graduated.

7. Finances for the Session:

While it is impossible for me at this date (May 15th) to give exact figures for the session, it is my belief and that of the School Treasurer that the books of the School on June 30th, the closing day of our financial year, will show a net credit income sufficient to meet the obligation of \$2,000.00 due this year for retiring bonds on its property.

8. Scholarships:

Reductions from the regular rates made by the School and scholarships established by friends of the School, together amounting to \$9,571.65, or about 11% of the total estimated income of the School, are this year being given through the School toward the education of the youth of Virginia and the Church. In addition, there are reductions (to two or more brothers, to sons of clergymen, and to sons of missionaries, teachers and officers in the service of the United States, amounting to \$3,153,35.

9. Increase in Enrollment:

Last session we had total enrollment of 238 boys. Our enrollment this year to date is 244—an increase of 2.52%.

10. A Suggestion:

It is again offered as a suggestion that individual parishes in the Diocese, following the lead of St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, found at the School parish scholarships, reserving to themselves the right of presentation. By such action the parish would benefit, and the School-the property of the Church and one of its working organizations—would be strengthened.

11. Religion:

St. Christopher's School is a Church institution; in every department of the School's life, therefore, the fundamental importance of religion is recognized. The first exercise of every school day is a

short divine service, in which every boy takes an active part; and before athletic events the boys of the whole School kneel together in prayer to ask God's blessing upon those who are about to represent them in the contest. In addition to these religious services, regular instruction in religion is provided for in graded courses, every boy being required to take two periods a week in the religious studies of his form.

Furthermore, recognizing the futility of trying by means of religious exercises and studies alone to inculcate a religious spirit, the School management endeavors to awaken that spirit in the boys, and to foster it when awakened, by presenting to them definite opportunities of work for others.

Among the opportunities that have come to the boys of St. Christopher's this year are the following: The Red Cross Membership Campaign, the Anti-Tuberculosis Christmas Seals Drive, and direct appeals for funds to aid various schools, orphanages, mountain missions and the like. Answering these appeals, the School has collected and by the end of the session will have distributed through its Missionary Societies and other agencies sums amounting in the aggregate to \$1,000.00.

12. The Outlook for the Session of 1929-1930:

Prospects for next year are good. We are anticipating the loss by graduation and withdrawals of no more than the usual percentage of the student body, while inquiries with regard to next year are coming in in gratifying numbers.

13. Gifts:

It is gratifying and encouraging to be able to record that since the report for 1927-1928 was made, the facilities of St. Christopher's School have been materially increased by the addition of the Memorial Library, a gift to the School from the Board of Trustees and several interested friends. The Library has already proved itself an invaluable adjunct to the School.

14. Additional Information:

Further information in regard to the character and work of St. Christopher's can be found in the School catalogue and in the other printed publications of the School.

The enrollment of St. Catherine's School for the session of 1928-1929 is 285, an increase of 14. The resident School enrollment is 62, showing an increase of 12 over last year. The faculty and staff number 42.

The graduating class will consist of 34 members, 20 of whom are in the college preparatory group. The remainder, with very few exceptions, are preparing to take special training for some kind of work.

We expect at this date that the School will show at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30th a net income sufficient to meet the obligation of \$5,000.00 due this year for retiring bonds on the School property.

We have at present too few scholarships. We have constant requests for scholarships and we would like to be able to offer many more. We heartily join in the suggestion made in the report of St. Christopher's School last year "that individual parishes in the Diocese found at the School parish scholarships, reserving to themselves the right of presentation". Since St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, has already a scholarship at St. Christopher's, and is so closely associated with us as our friend and neighbor, may we not hope that they will take the lead in this movement?

The Bishop Brown Memorial Chapel continues to be the muchloved centre of our religious life. On All Saints' Day a communion service was held by the Rt. Rev. Walter Mitchell, of Arizona. The first baptismal service was held in the chapel on March 27th of this year by the Rev. Giles B. Palmer, chaplain of the School, at which time four of our resident students were baptized. Mr. Palmer also held a celebration of the Holy Communion for us on Ascension Day, and it will be our custom each year to have a communion service at that time, in commemoration of the dedication of our chapel by Bishop Brown on Ascension Day, 1927. Bishop Tucker, who was to have given us a confirmation service in the chapel this spring, was prevented by illness, and our candidates for confirmation will be confirmed in St. Stephen's Church on May 19th by Bishop Davenport.

We are very happy to report that at the close of last year's session the Alumnae Association of the Virginia Randolph Ellett School and of the St. Catherine's School were united under the name of the Ellett-St. Catherine's Alumnae Association. The first piece of work accomplished by the new Association was the building of a house for Miss Ellett. This was begun last fall, it is now finished, and is a beautiful addition to our grounds. It is Miss Ellett's home during her lifetime, and will eventually become the property of the School.

The School League is working for and contributing to organizations representing the parish, the Diocese, community, State, national and international causes. Last year these contributions amounted to \$1,800.00, and we hope by the end of the year to reach this figure again. In the twofold sense of responsibility, and in the desire for service and cooperation that necessarily follows, St. Catherine's has grown, and it is her spiritual growth, impossible to put down on paper, that we value most, as we look back on the session that is drawing to a close.

IV. (c) REPORT OF ST. ANNE'S SCHOOL.

The enrollment of St. Anne's in her eighth year under Church ownership is encouraging, because instead of the decrease usual in private schools in a presidential election year, there has been double the number of new names in the boarding department over those of 1927.

This has helped to fill the loss of nine resident pupils of the seventeen graduates last June, and with twenty-nine new names in the day school, promises a good start for next year.

The twenty-four boarding pupils enrolled represent nine States—of these, including two confirmed this year, all but six girls in the lower school are church members. Nineteen are Episcopalians. The entire enrollment has been eighty-two—eleven more than last year.

The resident members of the faculty include five Episcopalians and two Methodists. The faculty, including part-time non-resident teachers and those teaching special courses of art, music, dancing and riding, numbers seventeen. Seven of these are not on the roll for salaries, as their departments are self-supporting.

The resident staff includes besides the principal only the housemother, whose especial care is the health of the household, the house keeper and four teachers.

The health of the school is still phenomenal. The sixth successive year without one case of serious or continued illness, we claim, is due to the superior open-air methods, unremittingly used. The sleeping porches, leaving warm dressing rooms, and the daily use of the open gym. in all weather, for drills and sports, have justified the claims made for their extraordinary and beneficial effect on our health record.

The upper school, numbering forty-one, with only ten to graduate

this year, and the primary nearly three times as many as last year, gives a better prospect than for two years past, since the increase in our rates caused so many to go to the public school instead of returning to us.

The University Extension Bureau has again offered Junior College work, of which our graduates have taken advantage for courses we cannot offer, Spanish and Library Courses. Through the heads of our English and History Departments, most unusual privileges have been secured for us in lectures by professors from the University on Early Saxon Poetry, Chaucer, Macbeth, Burns, The League of Nations, Washington and Lee, while special services have been given us by Rev. Messrs. Roy Mason, Gibson, Powell and Dr. Neve, on Armistice Day, All Saints and Holy Week, and by Bishop Davenport, of Easton, while spending the week-end here, when he took Bishop Tucker's confirmation services at Christ Church. Two of our resident pupils and seven day scholars were in the confirmation class.

The Junior Auxiliary's faithful work this year includes charge of the contributions, in which the entire day school joins, to the Orphana' Home on Thanksgiving Day; the Red Cross membership, 100% for the past six years; Christmas box to a mission; the white Christmas tree service; the beautiful candle service on the first and last Sunday of the year in St. Anne's Chapel; the pageants in Christ Church for Christmas and Holy Week; flowers every day in the chapel, and one Sunday in Christ Church, in memory of Miss Pendleton; monthly meetings and study class, with missionary speakers; the beautiful brass cross in memory of Bishop Brown for St. Anne's Chapel.

A new prize has been endowed by Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton, of North Carolina, in memory of his sister, for fourteen years the greatly beloved head of the English Department, who did so much to establish our scholastic standards.

Only two in the College Preparatory Course have applied for college entrance. One has been accepted in Goucher College, one in Sweet Briar.

IV. (d) REPORT OF ST. MARGARET'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

A report of St. Margaret's School for the session 1928-29 is herewith submitted:

The total enrollment has been seventy-seven, including fifty-six boarding pupils and twenty-one day pupils. Of these fifty-four belong to the High School and twenty-three to the Lower School. To make a territorial classification, sixty-nine are from Virginia, three from Mary-

land, the remaining five from different States. The Episcopalians number fifty-four, of whom forty have been confirmed.

During the past year the efficiency of the School has been increased by enlarging the staff. An additional High School teacher was secured and this has enabled us to broaden the curriculum and to give each year courses that at one time had to alternate. It also freed the Secretary from part-time teaching and has enabled us to improve the general organization and the keeping of the records.

We took advantage of the accidental presence in Tappahannock for this one year of a well-trained art teacher and secured her services to organize an Art Department. We have no studio, but improvised one by using in the afternoon one end of the large primary room. The class in art has aroused such enthusiasm that we hope to con-

The entire staff now numbers thirteen, of whom ten teach, one is secretary, and two belong to the household. Of the teachers eight are full-time teachers, the headmistress teaches a part of each day, and Mr. Osburn comes in for the religious instruction of the older girls.

The School is accredited by the Virginia State Board of Education, and its graduates are doing creditably at Goucher College, Westhampton, and William and Mary. Two girls who are to graduate in June have already been awarded scholarships for next year at Sweet Briar and Westhampton.

Every effort is made not only to put life and interest into the religious instruction which is required in the curriculum for all the girls, but also to foster spiritual life by forming helpful habits. Morning and Evening Prayer are held regularly, while a Junior Auxiliary for the younger girls and Section B for the older ones, accustom the girls to Church organizations.

Perhaps the most valuable thing at St. Margaret's is the student body's own feeling of responsibility for the tone of the school, and the effort of the more mature girls to help newcomers and younger girls to live up to high standards.

IV. (e) REPORT OF CHRISTCHURCH SCHOOL.

In submitting this eighth annual report, it is gratifying to state that our enrolment shows a 37 per cent increase over last session. The enrollment and religious affiliation are as follows:

Under our competent Coach we engage in all lines of athletics with gratifying success. No boy is permitted to play on any team unless he makes passing grades in all studies.

Two full lesson periods a week are given to religious instruction, and are required of all pupils. We also have daily Morning and Evening Prayers.

Among the noteworthy features of this session may be mentioned: On February 10th the Bishop of the Diocese confirmed twelve of our boys and two members of our staff.

The fine athletic field, presented to the School by Mr. Langbourne Meade Williams in memory of his father, the late John L. Williams, was dedicated on April 13th.

Canon G. Osborne Troop of Toronto, Can., spent four days at the School early in May. He spoke twice daily to the boys, and his burning words and charming personality made a lasting impression on ali at the School.

The beautiful and commodious headmaster's residence was completed early in November. The headmaster and his family occupied the dwelling on November 5th, and on the 12th a house-warming was given to the School and the community. The new home adds much to the life of the School.

The chapel, presented the School by the Rev. John G. Scott and his sister, Mrs. Fenton Taylor, will be completed by finals. Words are inadequate to describe the charm and beauty of this addition to our growing group of buildings. Although we expect to attend the parish church on Sunday mornings, we shall hold daily devotions in our own chapel and service on Sunday night, when we shall have a vested choir of boys. The chapel will seat 250.

For the first time in the School's history we shall close the session without a deficit.

A small brick cottage on the campus, which served as a reading room this session, will be converted into a dormitory. At the rate enrollments are coming in, our full quota for next year will soon be secured.

Our sorest need is another dormitory. The plans and specifications are all in hand. Who will give us the \$65,000 required? The School is only eight years old, consequently we have no alumni to appeal to for help. We look to our generous friends to assist us in getting established.

V. ST. AGNES' SCHOOL.

St. Agnes' School reports that its fifth year has by God's blessing been one of happy progress under Miss Marguerite E. Chapman, Principal, assisted by an efficient and harmonious faculty. There are fourteen boarders, our full quota, and over 100 day scholars, including ten children in the new pre-school foreshadowed in last year's report. There will be five graduates this year, one of whom will go to Sweet Briar to join our graduate who entered that college last year. This afternoon (May 16th) the scholars are giving an operetta, "The Pied Piper of Hamlin", in the open air in the beautiful grounds of St. Agnes.

The Trustees are encouraged by the excellent spirit of cooperation prevailing in the School and by the slightly improved financial condition. The School has paid its own way this year, for the first time, with the exception of about \$2,000.00 interest charges. It is estimated that with additional buildings to cost \$18,000.00 accommodating additional boarders, the School revenues would meet all charges. We have applications for admission of more boarders than can be taken care of. Our situation is most advantageous and will be improved when the new memorial, Washington Highway to Mount Vernon, is completed in 1932, passing within half a mile of the front of our buildings which stand on a high bluff. The assistance of generous friends and the continued good will of the Diocese will be appreciated by the Board of Trustees, of which the Bishop is President.

VI. REPORT OF STUART HALL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of Virginia: Gentlemen:

I beg to submit the following report of Stuart Hall for the current session, 1928-1929:

Those who heard the last year's report will recall that there were indications that it would be more difficult to fill the School this year

than has usually been the case. We had last year a large graduating class, were drastically weeding out a lawless element, and were fearing unfavorable financial conditions. To some extent this expectation has been realized. Applications came very slowly; parents were un certain until near the end of the summer what they would be able to do; additional advertising seemed advisable. As one of the most effective means of advertising a new book of views of the School was put out at considerable expense to replace those views which had been in use many years.

School opened with 135 resident pupils, ten fewer than last year. In looking back over our records, however, I find that only in the years of 1927 and 1928 has there been so large a total enrollment as there is this year. In 1925 it was 139, in 1926 141, and this year 143. In 1928 it went to 150.

There has continued to be an unusual number of withdrawals in the course of the year, though only one this year out of a total of twelve has been because of inability to pay, as against four last year. The reasons have been various: Eight left because of illness, 1 girl was married, 1 was dissatisfied, 1 was disappointed to find her previous work less good than she thought it. Eight new girls were admitted after Christmas.

In spite of the fact that four girls have been dismissed because they were unable to adjust themselves to the School requirements, and were a menace to others, the year as a whole has been a good one, and a great improvement over last year.

Repairs, always a heavy item on buildings the age of ours, amounted to more than usual the past year. We have, nevertheless, been able to pay off \$8,000.00 on the bond issue of Stuart Hall, maturing in July, 1933. This leaves unpaid \$21,000.00.

In general, the prospect for the coming year seems better than for two years past. Fewer girls are graduating—sixteen resident pupils—and many more are likely to return than came back last year. Requests for catalogs and visits from parents seeking a school are numerous.

Those who hear the reports of Stuart Hall from year to year will remember that for several years past there has always been mention of the urgent need of a new academic building. Modern class-rooms, completely equipped, an auditorium and gymnasium of adequate size, are among our absolute necessities if we are to keep our place among first-class schools. There have been during the past year definite instances of desirable patrons deciding to send their daughters elsewhere because of this lack. It is, therefore, a source of greater gratification than I can express that active measures have

been taken by Bishop Jett and our Trustees to provide means for this much-needed undertaking.

VII. REPORT OF THE BLUE RIDGE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

To the Council of Diocese of Virginia:

The Blue Ridge Industrial School begs leave to present the following report for 1928:

EMPLOYEES.

Men. 5; women, 14. Total, 19. Superintendent, 1; teachers, 7; house mother and teacher, 1; house mother and bookkeeper, 1; secretary 1: matron, 1; nurse, 1; house mother, 2; assistant house mother, 1; farm manager, 1; shop foreman, 1; handcraft teacher, 1.

STUDENTS.

Boarding Department-Boys, 40; girls, 84. Total, 124. Day School -Boys, 16; girls, 12. Total, 28. In the High School-Boys, 18; girls, 40. Total, 58. The School is accredited by the State Board of Education; its diploma will admit a student to college or university without entrance examination.

The Industrial Department includes instruction in fruit growing, stock raising, dairying, gardening, cropping, poultry raising, domestic science, sewing and handcraft. All girls are required to take Home Economics and all boys Agriculture.

There were only 4 graduates in 1928, 1 boy and 3 girls. The alumni now number 42, 29 girls and 31 boys. Some are teaching, some nursing, 1 a student for the Episcopal ministry, and many have married and have happy homes; others are continuing their education in college and university. One of our boys has recently won at the University of Virginia by competitive examinations an annual scholarship of \$500.00.

The salary of all teachers who have taught in the school two or more years have been increased from \$40.00 to \$50.00 a month.

In addition to the regular session of nine months, a twelve-week summer course was given. This summer work has not been developed to the extent we desire. It is considerably less expensive to operate the School in summer than in winter. How can we take greater advantage of this fact? We hope to answer fully this question in the near future.

The health of the pupils is very good. Plain food, outdoor exercise and regular habits in a naturally invigorating climate have contributed to this. Through nurse and cottage hospital, prompt attention was given to any cases of sickness and through the clinics held by the medical school of the University of Virginia many physical defects remedied.

Considerable attention was given the religious life of the pupils. Sunday school and services were held every Sunday at the School. and Sunday school with occasional services at the missions-Wyatt Mountain and Haneytown. A voung people's meeting was conducted by the pupils every Sunday. Branches of the Junior Red Cross. Junior Auxiliary and Girls' Friendly are maintained. Four hundred dollars was contributed to missions and charities.

A valuable addition to the equipment was made by the completion of the home for girls from fourteen to sixteen years of age. It contains complete housekeeping arrangement and living rooms for thirtyfive children, a house mother and assistant. A spring house and a meat house were built of native stone. The appearance of the campus was greatly improved by the planting of flowers and shrubbery. A large quantity of rock and sand and lumber was collected for the chapel and work of construction will begin next summer.

A post office has been established at the School. Its name is "Bris", being formed from the initials of the school.

The cost of the operation of the School was a little less than \$25,000.00, or about \$247.00 for each boarding pupil. The cost of food averaged \$770.00 per month, or about \$6.50 a month per person. Fees collected from the pupils, their parents or patrons, amounted to \$6,365.49, or a little over 25% of the total cost of operation. Seven thousand five hundred dollars was appropriated by the Diocese of Virginia, and the balance, about \$11,000.00, contributed by friends. The low cost of operation is due chiefly to the fact that most of the food is supplied by the School farm at less than it could be bought elsewhere; all routine work is done by the pupils-no servants are employed; and the small salaries paid. Undesignated donations amounted to \$12,688.36. We are deeply grateful to all contributors, especially to the Daughters of the American Revolution, the New York and Boston Committees and the Woman's Auxiliary of the Episcopal Church, who have been most generous in their support.

All milk, eggs, vegetables, fruits and most of the meat consumed in the School was supplied by the farm, orchard and cannery. The total value of these provisions was \$5,296.00. The net profit from the farm for the year was \$5,251.89, orchard \$884.65, cannery \$44.46.

AN ENDOWMENT IS NECESSARY.

Only dependent children or those of limited means are admitted to the School, therefore the cost of operation will never be met by fees, collected from the pupils, their parents or patrons. An endowment would help to insure operating expenses and set free the voluntary contributions for the construction of necessary buildings and the purchase of equipment. Two thousand two hundred and fifty dollars will provide income sufficient to meet expenses of a pupil who can pay the regular charges. Five thousand dollars will provide for a dependent pupil.

Form of bequest: "I give and bequeath to the Blue Ridge Industrial School, incorporated under the laws of the State of Virginia, the sum of to be used for"

For the benefit of those desiring to contribute a definite sum, we give the following information:

Two hundred and fifty dollars yearly will provide total expenses of a dependent pupil.

One hundred dollars yearly will provide for a pupil who can pay the regular charges.

Seventy dollars will provide total cost of operation for a day. Twenty-five dollars will provide a scholarship for a day pupil.

Thirty dollars will provide clothing for a dependent pupil for a year.

II. REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE DIOCESE.

To the Finance Committee, Diocese of Virginia,

Richmond, Virginia.

Gentlemen:

We have made our regular annual audit of the Treasurer's accounts and records of the Diocesan Funds as kept by Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, Treasurer, for the year ended December 31, 1928.

We have prepared in accordance with our findings sundry statements of receipts and disbursements for all funds passing through the Treasurer's hands for the year 1928. These statements appear in the order indicated by the index on the preceding page.

A general statement of receipts and disbursements of Diocesan Funds is contained in Exhibit "A." It is a summary of the totals of the various funds and shows an available balance of \$1,756.38 in the Treasurer's hands at the close of the year, existing in the following funds:

The Diocesan Missionary Society, No. 2, Exhibit "D," showed the largest deficit, \$1,350.83. The principal disbursements from this fund were for payment of principal notes and interest thereon.

A statement of the Administrative Office Expense Fund is contained in Exhibit "J." The office and the Mayo Memorial Church House appear to be conducted in an extremely economic manner.

III. REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE BOARD OF APPORTIONMENT.

To the Finance Committee, Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia.

Gentlemen:

We have audited the Treasurer's records and accounts of receipts and disbursements for the Diocesan Program under administration of the Board of Apportionment, Richmond, Va., for the year ended December 31, 1928, and have prepared therefrom statements of receipts and disbursements, which are presented herewith.

Exhibit "A" is merely a summary of amounts received and disbursed by months for the two years, 1928 and 1927. All amounts collected and paid out on each year's program up to May in the following year are included in the December item. Amounts remitted by individuals direct to New York toward the Program's purposes are included so as to indicate the possible extent of collections in the Diocese.

Exhibit "B" is a statement of receipts (as to sources and purposes) and disbursements (as to objects) showing the two years of 1928 and 1927 in comparison.

Expectations for the year 1928 were \$173,187.76, based on pledges of \$169,865.00 by 130 parishes, and the balance to come from those not heard

The appropriations definitely laid by the Board amounted to \$173,221.25, distributed as shown in first column of Exhibit "B." The total amount of \$172,996.75 was paid by the Treasurer to the beneficiaries of the appropriations, as set forth in column 2 of the same statement, as compared to \$190,-696.39 raised and paid over for the prior year.

The total amount received and paid out for specific purposes was \$27,-268.62, as shown in the detail column, Exhibit "B." Included in this was \$21,618.44 received toward the 1927 deficit. \$500.00 out of this was applied on the note of \$17,000.00, leaving \$21,118.44, plus \$626.97 cash balance brought over from prior year to apply on the deficit account.

The note of \$16,500.00 due to the First and Merchants National Bank for this account is still outstanding; also a note of \$9,700.00 in favor of John M. Taylor, who volunteered to lend the Diocese enough money to discharge the remainder of its obligation on the National Council. Additional money borrowed from bank during the year amounted to \$8,986.06, which was paid.

Interest paid on loans during the year aggregated \$1,289.83.

The Treasurer's records were found correct as a whole and his affairs administered faithfully in accordance with the authority of the Board.

We have audited the records and accounts of The Virginia Churchman, Richmond. Virginia for the year ended December 31, 1928.

We submit herewith full report of the finances of the paper for the year 1928.

The financial status of the church paper at December 31, 1928, is shown in Exhibit "A." It will be noted that the assets, consisting of cash and accounts receivable, amounted to \$1,098.35. The accounts receivable, listed at \$702.55 in Schedule 1, are considered good.

The liabilities against the assets were \$564.50, consisting of unpaid press bill and office salary for December.

The surplus of assets over liabilities was \$533.85, after charging off \$72.79 of old accounts considered uncollectible.

The excess of income over expenses for the year was \$58.71, added to surplus.

The income and expenses are set forth in Exhibit "B," a summary of which is shown in comparison with last year's statement, as follows:

APPENDIX E

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

As adopted in 1815, and amended in 1836, 1840, 1850, 1860, 1864, 1867, 1872, 1881, 1890, 1900, 1904, 1909, 1912 and 1920.

ARTICLE I.

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, at the place designated by the preceding Council, on the third Wednesday in May every year; except when the Ascension Day shall fall upon the day following, in which case the Council shall be on the fourth Wednesday in May. But in the case of any good cause arising, rendering it necessary or expedient to change the time or the place for any meeting of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may change the time, or the place, or both.

ARTICLE II.

The Council shall be composed of-

(a) The Bishop or Bishops, and the ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who are now or may hereafter be canonically settled in parishes or churches within the Diocese, professors of the Theological Seminary in Virginia, and missionaries within this Diocese and under its Ecclesiastical Authority, being clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese. Provided, That any such ministers who may have been members of the Council up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members ex-officio. Provided further, That only such colored ministers shall be members as are hereinafter

specified. Provided further, That no minister under ecclesiastical censure shall be entitled to a seat in the Council; and no minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding:

- (b) Lay members, consisting of one delegate from each parish or church entitled to representation, chosen by the vestry thereof, save that every such parish or church having more than one minister canonically settled shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has ministers. The lay members of the Standing Committee, and the Chancellor of the Diocese and the Committee on Finance, as the same are or may hereafter be constituted by Canon, shall be members of the Council ex-officio, but without the right to vote when the vote shall be taken by orders. And in every case members of the Council shall be communicants in the Church:
- (c) Two clerical and two lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

ARTICLE III.

Twenty members of the clerical and twenty of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn.

ARTICLE IV.

In all matters that shall come before Council, the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body, and the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure; but when five members require it there shall be a vote by orders, and a majority of each order shall be necessary to a decision.

ARTICLE V.

The election of a Bishop in the Diocese shall be made in Council in the following manner: The vote shall be by ballot and by orders, a concurrent majority of the votes cast by each order being necessary to a choice.

ARTICLE VI.

The Bishop shall be President of the Council, in which character it shall be his duty to give to the Council annually a general view of the state of the Church; to call special Councils at whatever time and place he shall think necessary, or when required by the Standing Committee; to preserve order during the time of session; to put the question, collect the votes, and declare the decision; and he may deliver

his sentiments on any subject after it has been discussed, before a vote thereon. The Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside in the Council in the absence of the Bishop.

ARTICLE VII.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, the Council, immediately upon their assembling, shall choose by joint ballot a President from among the order of Priests, who shall remain in office until the next annual Council or until the next election of a President. He shall perform all the duties, and possess all the privileges above specified; but he shall not call special meetings of the Council unless applied to for that purpose by a majority of the Standing Committee. If neither the Bishop nor the Bishop-Coadjutor be present at any meeting of the Council, they shall elect, by ballot, a President protempore.

ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed annually by the Council. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully to deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Council which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to give reasonable notice of the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journal of each succeeding Council a list of the clergy of the Diocese, which shall have been certified to him by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint a Secretary *pro tempore*, who shall take charge of the books and papers, and perform the duties of the office, until the election of a Secretary by the Council.

ARTICLE IX.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office for one year, or until his successor shall be appointed. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be ordered by the Council or provided by Canon. He shall report annually to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same.

The Treasurer shall give bond for the faithful performance of his duties in an amount to be fixed by the Committee on Finance, with a surety company authorized to do business in Virginia and approved

coming into his hands as Treasurer from whatsoever source.

The accounts of the Treasurer shall be audited annually on or before February 1st by, or under the direction of, the said Committee

on Finance.

by said Committee as security, which bond shall cover all amounts

In case of a vacancy in the office of Treasurer, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint a Treasurer pro tempore; and in case of the misconduct of the Treasurer, or of his incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, the Ecclesiastical Authority may remove him and fill the vacancy in the same manner. The Treasurer pro tempore shall take into his custody all the money and other property, and all the books and papers, belonging to the said office, and discharge the duties thereof until the election of a Treasurer by the Council.

ARTICLE X.

Each annual Council shall elect by ballot a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese, and who shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed.

ARTICLE XI.

Every Parish within this Diocese shall be entitled to the entire benefit of this Constitution as soon as it shall have signified its ratification thereof, either in writing or by sending a lay delegate to the Council; and such Parish shall thereafter be benefited and bound equally with the other Parishes in this Diocese by every rule and Canon which shall be framed by any Council acting under this Constitution for the government of this Church in ecclesiastical concerns.

ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution shall be unalterable, except in the following manner: A proposition for any change shall be introduced in writing and considered in Council, and if approved of, the same shall be transmitted to the several vestries of the Parishes which shall have ratified this Constitution; and if again approved of in the next ensuing Council by a majority, the change shall then take place, and the Constitution so altered shall be valid and obligatory.

CANONS

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

As Revised and Adopted May 18, 1906, and Amended in Council Since
That Time.

CANON I.

Of a List of the Ministers of this Diocese.

Section 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of this Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their post-offices, and their respective cures, or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged. And the Ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be so designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom. And it shall be appended to the Journal, and be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

SECTION 2. The list of the clergy of the Diocese, so prepared, and corrected according to the changes which may occur, whether by death, ordination, discipline, or canonical removals from or admission into this Diocese, shall be *prima facie* evidence of a clergyman's having a cure or mission, or other canonical connection with this Diocese.

SECTION 3. The right of any clergyman to a seat in the Council shall, if claimed or disputed, be determined according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons by the Council itself, whether his name be inserted in the list aforesaid or omitted. And it shall be the duty of every clergyman to attend regularly the meeting of

every Council; or, if unable to attend, to send his written excuse to the President.

CANON II.

Of Lay Delegates, and the Evidence of Their Election.

Section 1. The Parishes of this Diocese, entitled to representation in the Council, are those, within its presents limits, which were established by law prior to the eighteenth day of May, A. D. 1785; together with those which have, since that time, been constituted and received into union therewith by act of the Convention or Council of the Diocese. And the Churches entitled to representation are those which have been constituted and received as Separate Congregations by like action of the Convention or Council; or which, being distinct cures, have been recognized, by long and unbroken usage, as Separate Congregations entitled to representation.

A list of the Parishes in the Diocese, and of the Separate Congregations therein, shall be appended to the Journal of each Annual Council.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of every Parish, and of every Church entitled to representation, as above defined, to send to each meeting of the Council of the Diocese the number of Lay Delegates to which they may be respectively entitled.

SECTION 3. The election of Lay Delegates to the Council shall be certified by the Rector, Register, or one of the Wardens of the proper Parish or Church, in duplicate; and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

Rector, Register, or Warden.

One copy of this certificate shall be sent to the Secretary of the Council at least ten days before the meeting of the Council, and the other shall be given to the Delegate attending.

SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the Parishes or Churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the Lay Delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council. But until their report be received the roll as made out and called by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authorized roll of Lay Delegates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all of the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter: Provideā. that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case de novo.

CANON III.

Of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

SECTION 1. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office; or, there being no Bishop-Coadjutor, in case the Bishop be incapable of performing his administrative duties; or when the Bishop shall authorize them so to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for all purposes set forth by these Canons.

SECTION 2. Any vacancy occurring by death, removal from the Diocese, or otherwise, in the Standing Committee, shall be supplied by the concurrent vote of the remaining clerical and lay members of the Committee.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee at every annual meeting of the Council to submit a report of their proceedings. When required by the Council they shall also lay before them any documents which may have come into their possession.

CANON IV.

Of the Registrar of the Diocese.

The Council shall elect, at its meeting next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, an officer who shall be called the Registrar of the Diocese; who shall continue in office for three years, or until his successor is elected. It shall be the duty of the Registrar to receive and preserve, under the direction of the Council, books, papers and other documents bearing upon the history of the Church in the Diocese, and to perform such other duties pertaining to his office as may be required by the Council. And he shall make a report to the Council at each annual meeting.

CANON V.

Of the Chancellor of the Diocese.

The Council shall elect, at its meeting next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, an officer who shall be called the Chancellor of the Diocese; who shall continue in office for three years, or until his successor is elected. The Chancellor shall be a lay communicant, resident in the Diocese, and learned in the law. He shall be the legal adviser of the Bishop, and also of the officers and committees of the Council, whenever they shall require legal advice in matters affecting the interests of the Diocese.

CANON VI.

Of Deputies to the General Convention.

Section 1. At the annual Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention there shall be elected by ballot the full number of Clerical and Lay Deputies to the General Convention to which this Diocese is entitled, and, in the same manner, a like number of Clerical and Lay Alternate Deputies; and a majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. The Clerical Deputies shall be Presbyters canonically connected with this Diocese, and the Lay Deputies shall be communicants resident within the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of each of the Deputies elected to signify to the Secretary of the Council, at least ten days before the meeting of the General Convention, whether or not he accepts the appointment and will perform its duties. If he accepts, the Secretary shall issue to him a certificate of election. Should any Deputy elected decline, or fail to signify his acceptance, or should a vacancy occur otherwise, the Secretary of the Council shall issue the certificate of election to the Alternate Deputy, of the same order in which the vacancy occurs, who was first elected; or, if more than one were elected on the same ballot, who received the highest number of votes; and if there be more than one vacancy the others shall be filled successively in like manner.

CANON VII.

Of the Committee on Church Property.

SECTION 1. The Council shall elect a Standing Committee, to consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, and three laymen who shall be members of the Corporation known as the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, to be known as the Committee on Church Property,

who shall continue in office until their successors are elected as here-inafter provided.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of this Committee to take such steps, legal or otherwise, as may be necessary to recover or secure any property, real or personal, belonging to any Parish or Congregation of the Church within this Diocese, the legal title to which is not vested in duly constituted Trustees: and in the case of any such property which may be regarded as abandoned property, the said Committee shall take such steps, through the Trustees holding the legal title thereto, or the survivor or survivors of them, if there be any. or, if there be no such Trustee or Trustees, then through any one or more members of the Congregation which has ceased to occupy said property, either to hold said property, or to make sale thereof, in accordance with the statutes of this State in that case made and provided; and in case of a sale of the said property, the said Committee shall pay over to the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia the proceeds of such sale, to be subject to the order and disposition of the Council of this Diocese.

Section 3. It shall also be the duty of this Committee, when it may be necessary, to apply to the Courts of the State for the appointment of Trustees to hold the legal title to any property belonging to the Church within this Diocese, and under the control of the Council thereof. And they are hereby constituted the proper authorities of the Council to make such application. They shall also have the care of the Episcopal residence, and other property belonging to the Diocese for which no other custodians are provided; and shall be authorized to make such expenditures for repairs, insurance, etc., thereon as may be necessary, with the approval of the Committee on Finance.

SECTION 4. Vacancies in this Committee, occurring by death, removal from the Diocese, or otherwise, shall be filled by the Council from time to time as they may occur.

Section 5. This Committee shall make a report annually to the Council of any action taken by them in the preceding year.

CANON VIII.

Of the Bishops' and Contingent Fund for Diocesan Expenses.

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Diocese, and of each Parish and congregation, shall begin January first.

Section 2. The Council shall elect annually a Committee of three . laymen to be known as the Committee on Finance, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. Any vacancy occurring in

this Committee shall be filled by the remaining members. It shall be the duty of the said Committee to examine the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, and report to the Council the financial condition of the Diocese in respect to the Bishops' and Contingent Fund, making such recommendations as they may deem expedient.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance, at each annual Council, to present an estimate of the amount needed to meet the expenses of the Diocese for the fiscal year beginning the first day of January following. They shall at the same time present a schedule assessing the amount called for in their estimate proportionately upon the Vestries of the different parishes and congregations of the Diocese. The said assessment shall be based upon the relative financial strength of the parishes and congregations, as shown by their parochial reports and by other facts and considerations which may become known to the Committee. This assessment shall be made known to the Vestries of the several parishes or churches as soon as possible after it is made. But be it provided, That any Vestry shall have thirty days in which to protest if they deem the assessment excessive or burdensome, and the Committee on Finance shall allow them opportunity to show cause why it should be reduced.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each Vestry to pay the sum assessed upon the respective parish or church to the Treasurer of the Diocese, in full at the beginning of the fiscal year, or quarterly in advance throughout the year, as it may elect; each Vestry being free to adopt such means as it may deem best to raise its assessment.

SECTION 5. The Fund thus created shall be known as the Bishops' and Contingent Fund; and shall be held by the Treasurer of the Diocese for the purpose of defraying such expenses as shall be authorized by the Council. But the Committee on Finance may also, after the adjournment of the Council, authorize and require the Treasurer to pay any extraordinary or unforeseen expenses which shall legitimately arise in the proper conduct of the business of the Diocese.

CANON IX.

Of the Church Pension Fund.

SECTION 1. In conformity with the resolutions adopted by the General Convention of 1913, setting forth the principles upon which a pension system for the clergy of this Church and their dependents should be constructed, pursuant to which the corporation the Church Pension Fund has been created to carry those principles into effect, the Diocese of Virginia hereby adopts the system of the Church Pension Fund.

SECTION 2. The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall ap-

point, annually, a Committee to be entitled The Committee on the Church Pension Fund, to consist of two clergymen and five laymen, which shall include the Treasurers of the Widows and Orphans and Disabled Clergy Funds, which Committee shall have authority to elect such officers as may be necessary or proper to carry out the provisions of this Canon. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

- (i) To furnish annually to the Church Pension Fund the canonical roll of the Bishops and other Clergy of this Diocese, and of the Clergy canonically belonging to other Dioceses or Missionary Districts who may be licensed to officiate in this Diocese, with a statement of the stipends received by each of said Bishops and Clergymen from any Parish, Mission or other Ecclesiastical organization in this Diocese.
- (ii) To receive from the Church Pension Fund annually a statement of the premiums necessary to be paid by the Diocese or by each Parish, Mission, or other Ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese, in order that the Bishops and Clergymen in receipt of stipends from such Diocese, Parishes, Missions, and other Ecclesiastical organizations may be entitled respectively to pensions.
- (iii) To receive from the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese of Virginia the annual interest accruing on the investments held by the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund of said Diocese and the General Clergy Relief Fund when this Canon goes into effect, and to transmit the same to the Church Pension Fund to be applied as the Committee shall direct on account of the premiums necessary to be paid by the Diocese.
- (iv) To inform the authorities of each of the said Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations of the premiums payable by it, and of the time and manner of payment thereof; to receive, from all of the Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations in this Diocese, or from individual contributions, the aforesaid premiums and to transmit the same to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund; provided, that the Committee may, in its discretion, make arrangements with the Church Pension Fund for the direct transmission of such premiums from the Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations aforesaid to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund.
- (v) To inform the Church Pension Fund from time to time of the Bishops and other Clergy and the widows, remaining unmarried, and minor orphans, remaining unmarried, of such Bishops and other Clergy, canonically connected with this Diocese, who may be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.
- (vi) In general, to inform the Bishops and other Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of the pension system created by the General Con-

vention, and committed by it to the operation of the Church Pension Fund, whereby the Bishops and other Clergy of the Church are assured of pensions, as of right, to themselves in the event of old age, or disability, and to their widows and minor orphans in the event of death, and to do all things that may be necessary or advisable in the premises to the end that moneys necessary to be paid by the Parishes, Missions, and other Ecclesiastical organizations may be fully and systematically paid.

(vii) To make an annual report to Council of the amount of premiums collected and paid to the Church Pension Fund and of amounts received therefrom by the pensioners of this Diocese.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese of Virginia to pay, semi-annually, or oftener at their option, to the said Committee on the Church Pension Fund, all the income of the investments held by said Trustees for the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund, receiving satisfactory assurance from the Church Pension Fund that the latter corporation will assume and pay all of the annuities paid by the said Trustees when this Canon goes into effect, and so long as said payments are actually made by the Church Pension Fund.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of every Bishop and other Clergyman receiving a stipend or stipends, and the duty of every Parish, Mission, or other Ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese paying a stipend or stipends, to furnish a statement of such stipend or stipends to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund whenever said Committee shall, in writing, ask for such statement.

SECTION 5. This Canon shall go into effect when the Secretary of the Council shall receive notification from the Church Pension Fund that such sufficient number of other Dioceses, Missionary Districts, and General Boards, or other General Institutions of the Church have, by legislation, provided for entering into the pension system of the Church Pension Fund, as, in the opinion of the said Church Pension Fund, will enable its system to go into operation; provided, that the Bishops and other Clergy canonically connected with said Dioceses or Missionary Districts, or whose stipends are wholly paid by said Boards or General Institutions of the Church, shall number not less than Two Thousand individuals; and when the Secretary of the Diocese shall also receive notification from the Church Pension Fund that the special account for the accrued liabilities in the opinion of the Trustees of the Church Pension Fund is of sufficient amount to insure adequate provision for the clergy canonically resident in this Diocese at the time; and provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to hinder or delay the prompt payment of the existing allowance to the present or future disabled Clergy or to the widows

and orphans of the Clergy of this Diocese out of the collections in this Diocese or from the trust funds held for their benefit until the equivalent is paid them or secured to be paid them promptly.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese to transfer and deliver to a trust company, to be named by the Trustees of the invested Funds belonging to the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund and by the Church Pension Fund Committee, all of these securities and invested principal funds held by the Diocese belonging to the Disabled Clergy Fund and the Widows and Orphans Fund, to be held by the said trust company with authority and obligation on its part to collect the income and to pay the same to the Pension Fund.

Whenever in the judgment of the said Trustees it shall become expedient to make a particular investment of uninvested funds, or to change any existing investments, said investment or change of investments shall be made when and as may be directed in writing by the said Trustees with the approval of the said Pension Fund, provided that the Church Pension Fund shall first enter into a contract to assume and continue to pay the grants for pensions or annuities to the beneficiaries at present receiving the same from such funds, until all such obligations are fulfilled and the same terminated by the death of the several beneficiaries or by the action of the Trustees of the several funds. And further, to credit annually the amount of the annual net income derived from such funds upon the annual assessments of the parishes and missions of the Diocese of Virginia for the purposes of the Church Pension Fund as in the discretion of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund may deem proper.

And further, that the Trustees will not, after the expiration of ten years from the execution of this contract, make, directly or indirectly, any appeal or solicitation for funds or endowments to be made either to the Diocese or to any person or corporation, to be used for the relief of aged or infirm clergy or the families of deceased clergymen of the Diocese of Virginia, other than the Pension Fund, and during the ten years after the execution of this contract, any such appeal must be approved by the authorities of the Diocese of Virginia and shall only be made for or on behalf of clergy who are upon the canonical roll of said Diocese at the time of the execution of this contract.

Any monies or securities hereafter received by said Trustees shall be deposited with the trust company above mentioned by said Trustees, upon the conditions and for the purposes hereinbefore set forth.

The Trustees or proper authority are authorized and empowered to enter into and sign, seal, acknowledge and deliver any contract or contracts with the Church Pension Fund, a corporation created under the laws of the State of New York, to carry out any and all of the provisions of this Canon.

CANON X.

Of the Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Constitution of this Society is hereby amended and established as follows:

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE PROTES-TANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

Article 1. This Society shall be called the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia. Its membership shall be considered as including all the baptized members of this Church residing in this Diocese. Its government shall be vested in the Council of the Diocese. Its object shall be to extend and support the Missionary work of the Church in the Diocese, and to encourage the liberality of its members in support of the Church's mission.

Article 2. The Council shall annually elect an Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, to continue in office for one year or until their successors are elected, consisting of the Bishop, and the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, the Treasurer of the Diocese, five clergymen and five laymen from the Diocese at large and two members, one clergyman and one layman, from each of the several Convocations in the Diocese which shall have been recognized by the Council as being entitled to such representation, nominated by the said Convocations respectively.

Article 3. The Bishop shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, and the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, shall be Vice-Chairman. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall be Treasurer of the Executive Committee. A Secretary shall be elected by the Committee. The Committee shall fill any vacancies that may occur in their number: provided that a representative from any Convocation shall be elected only upon nomination by that Convocation.

The Committee may enact such rules and By-Laws as shall be needful for their own guidance and that of those under their authority, subject always to the direction and control of the Council. Nine members of the Executive Committee, duly convened, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article 4. The Executive Committee shall be charged with the conduct and supervision of the missionary work of the Church within the Diocese, except such as is strictly parochial; and shall receive, ap-

propriate and disburse all contributions made for such missionary work. Auxiliary societies, boards, and other agencies and persons employed or engaged in this work shall be subject to their oversight and direction.

They shall have authority, with the advice and consent of the Bishop, to establish missions in the Diocese; to aid in the erection of churches; to group missions or congregations dependent upon the Society into suitable fields or cures; to employ missionaries, provide for their support, appoint them their stations and give them such directions as may be deemed necessary; provided always that the rights of no duly constituted Rector or Vestry be infringed upon without his or their consent. They shall also have authority to aid feeble Parishes or congregations in supporting their ministers, upon application from the Vestries thereof, when, and as long as, they are satisfied such aid is necessary; to assist in the material equipment of parishes and missions; to provide for the training of workers and teachers: for the distribution of Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals: for the publication and distribution of books, papers, etc., for Sundayschools and missions; for missionary meetings and addresses. They shall also have authority to promote the cause of religious and moral Education and of Christian Social Service: and may provide for disseminating information as to the work and needs of the Society and of the Church at large; and generally, as the executive agency of the Society, to advance its interests and prosecute its work.

Article 5. The Executive Committee shall elect from its membership the following Departments or Boards, and shall determine from time to time the scope of the work of each Board and, out of funds at its disposal, make appropriations for its authorized expenditures.

I. The Board of Religious Education; to consist primarily of seven members.

II. The Board of Christian Social Service; to consist primarily of five members.

III. The Board of Apportionment; to consist primarily of ten members, including the Treasurer and at least one representative from each Convocation.

IV. The Board of Publicity: to consist primarily of seven members, including at least one representative from each Convocation.

V. The Field Board: to consist primarily of seven members, including at least one representative from each Convocation.

VI. The Board of Evangelism: to consist primarily of five members.

VII. The Board of Mountain Work: to consist primarily of seven members.

Each of said Boards shall have the power, with the advice and

consent of the Bishop, to elect additional members in number not exceeding those appointed by the Executive Committee; which, in the case of the Board of Mountain Work, shall include the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge and the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, if there be one. Such additional members shall be entitled to seats but not to vote at the meetings of the Executive Committee. Each Board shall elect from its members a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary. Appropriations made for the expenditures of each Board shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Executive Committee upon order of the Chairman or Vice-Chairman, certified by the Secretary of the Board. Each Board shall report its actions to the Executive Committee under such regulations as the Committee shall prescribe.

The Executive Committee may also appoint from its membership such Sub-Committees as may be needful to facilitate its work, and prescribe their duties.

Article 6. In order that sufficient means may be provided by the stated offerings of the people for the support and extension of the missionary, educational, social service and other religious work of the Diocese, and for its proper share of the work of the Church at large, the Executive Committee shall plan and promote each year an Every-Member Canvass to be made after adequate preparation in every congregation and parish as far as possible, at a time appointed by the committee.

The Board of Apportionment, after consultation with the appropriate Departments of the National Council and of this Province, the Trustees of the Diocesan institutions, and representatives of the parishes and missions of the Diocese, shall annually prepare a survey setting forth the opportunities and needs of the Church as represented by these various interests, and also an itemized budget indicating the amount required by the Church in the Diocese for the next fiscal year, which survey and budget, after approval by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, shall be submitted to the Council for final action. This survey and budget shall also be submitted to each minister and vestry for their information not later than May first.

After action by the Council the Board of Apportionment shall prepare a schedule apportioning the total amount called for by the budget adopted by the Council among the parishes and congregations of the Diocese, which apportionment shall be based upon the relative financial ability of the several parishes and congregations; and the financial ability of each congregation for this purpose shall be measured by the amount of its annual operating expenses, exclusive of interest and capital expenditures, over a series of years as disclosed by its parochial reports, and by such peculiar facts and considerations as may be deemed pertinent by the Board. This survey, budget and

schedule shall be published and the apportionment of each parish and congregation shall be communicated to the minister and vestry thereof not later than October first of each year.

In order that the people may be properly instructed as to the needs of the Diocese as outlined in the survey and budget, the Board of Apportionment, in cooperation with the Field Board, the parochial authorities and committees organized for the purpose, shall conduct a campaign of instruction and preparation throughout the Diocese, culminating in the Every-Member Canyass.

It shall be the duty of the minister and vestry of each parish and congregation to further the objects of this campaign, and to use all diligence to secure pledges to the full amount of their respective apportionments and to provide for the payment of the same to the Diocesan Treasurer in regular monthly installments during the next fiscal year. It shall be the further duty of said minister and vestry to report to the Treasurer of the Diocese not later than December 15th each year the amount which said parish or congregation expects to pay on its apportionment.

As soon as practicable after December 15th each year, the Board of Apportionment shall provide for the distribution among the interests represented in the budget of the estimated receipts for the next fiscal year as based upon the information then available, and shall direct when and under what conditions the payments shall be made. The estimated receipts, if less than the budget, shall first be applied to fixed obligations, and the remainder apportioned to other objects in the budget pro rata. The schedule of payments, when approved by the Executive Committee, shall be the warrant of the Treasurer of the Diocese for paying out the money received, periodically, according to its terms.

Article 7. The Executive Committee shall present a report of its operations and those of its Boards and Sub-Committees, and of the progress and condition of the missionary work of the Diocese, to the Council, sitting as a Missionary Council, on or before the second day of each annual meeting.

Article 8. The maximum expenses of the Executive Committee shall be fixed annually by the Council of the Diocese.

Article 9. All resolutions and Canons in conflict with this Canon are hereby repealed.

CANON XI.

Of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

SECTION 1. The Missions engaged in Mountain Work shall constitute a missionary jurisdiction to be known as "The Archdeaconry

of the Blue Ridge". The Missions to be included in this jurisdiction shall be designated from time to time by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

SECTION 2. The management of the affairs of this jurisdiction shall be in the hands of the Board of Mountain Work.

Section 3. A presbyter, to be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, shall have as the representative of the Bishop general supervision of the Mountain Work, and shall be responsible for the promotion thereof. The Archdeacon shall be appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the Executive Committee. When necessary in the judgment of the Bishop and the Executive Committee, there shall be an Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, chosen in like manner.

Section 4. The Board shall formulate by-laws governing the Mountain Work, which shall become effective upon approval by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

CANON XII.

Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction.

SECTION 1. The colored people residing within the Diocese of Virginia who are, or may be hereafter, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be lawful to organize Separate Congregations or Mission Churches composed exclusively of colored persons within the limits of any already existing parish or parishes, subject to all the conditions prescribed in the Canon "Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish", or the Canon "Of Mission Churches", except that the consent of the Vestry or Vestries of white congregations need not be obtained; and further, that the right of representation of such Separate Congregations or Mission Churches composed exclusively of colored persons shall be in the Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction, and only in the Council of the Diocese as provided in Section 6 of this Canon.

SECTION 3. There may be appointed by the Bishop one or more Presbyters who shall have general supervision of such colored churches and congregations as the Bishop may designate, and perform such duties as he may prescribe.

Section 4. When, in the judgment of the Bishop, the number of colored ministers and congregations is sufficient to justify it, a Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction shall be held annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the Convocation itself. The colored ministers of the Diocese, in good standing, shall be members of the

Convocation, and it shall be the duty of every such minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every Colored Mission Church or congregation shall elect one male Lay Delegate annually, a communicant, and twenty-one years of age, who shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation upon presentation of a proper certificate, signed by the Minister, or, if there be no minister, by one of the Wardens, or the Register of the Vestry.

The Bishop, the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, and the Presbyters mentioned in Section 3, shall be members ex-officio of the Convocation. The Bishop, or, in his absence, the Bishop-Coadjutor, shall be President of the Convocation; or, if neither be present, the Convocation shall elect a President pro tempore.

SECTION 5. The Convocation shall have power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare and the advancement of the work of the Church among the colored people, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Council of the Diocese.

Section 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two clergymen and two laymen to represent them in the Council of the Diocese.

SECTION 7. Colored congregations constituted as above provided may acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by transfer, under the laws of the State of Virginia; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by like transfer.

CANON XIII.

Of Convocations.

SECTION 1. The parishes in this Diocese shall be grouped in five Convocations as follows:

- (1) The Albemarle Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Albemarle, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Louisa, Orange, and St. Martin's Parish in Hanover County.
- (2) The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the City of Alexandria and the Counties of Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier (south of the Bull Run Mountain) and Prince William.
- (3) The Rappahannock Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Caroline, Charles City, Essex, Gloucester, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster, Mathews, Middlesex, New Kent, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford, Westmoreland, and Ashland and St. Paul's Parishes in Hanover County.
- (4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the County of Henrico.
 - (5) The Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Coun-

ties of Clarke, Fauquier (north of Bull Run Mountain), Frederick, Loudoun, Madison, Page, Rappahannock, Rockingham, Shenandoah and Warren. Provided, however, that nothing herein shall affect the provisions in the Canon "Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction".

Changes in Convocation boundaries shall be authorized by Council on joint application of the Convocations interested.

SECTION 2. Every clergyman settled as rector, assistant minister or minister in charge shall be a member of the Convocation in which his principal Church is situated.

SECTION 3. The Convocations shall make provision for lay representation.

SECTION 4. The Convocations may enact such rules and by-laws as may be necessary for their own guidance.

CANON XIV.

Of the Division of Parishes.

Section 1. Whenever the members of this Church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, or in adjoining portions of two or more Parishes, shall desire to separate from the Parish or Parishes of which they form a part, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after ten days' notice of the time and place of such meeting, given publicly in the church, or, otherwise, to each known person qualified to vote for Vestrymen in the territory proposed to be formed into a new Parish, and appoint a Committee to take such measures as may be necessary.

SECTION 2. The committee thus appointed shall give to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and to the Vestry or Vestries in the Parish or Parishes from which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply for such separation: which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority, and to the said Vestry or Vestries, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.

Section 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council; and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desirable, together with an accurate description of the proposed line or lines of division, the name proposed for the new parish, and a statement showing the extent of the territory, the churches and missions, if any, and the number of communicants, which will be embraced therein.

SECTION 4. The Council shall refer the petition to a committee to examine and report thereon; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, proceed to divide said Parish or Parishes, and to con-

stitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese; in which case the petition, or so much thereof as shall contain the description of the line or lines of division, shall be delivered to the Secretary and shall be published in the Journal.

Section 5. As soon as practicable after the new Parish is constituted, the committee which made the application aforesaid shall give at least ten days' notice, in the manner prescribed in section one of this Canon, to the qualified electors residing in the new Parish to assemble for the election of a Vestry; which election shall be conducted according to the direction contained in the Canon "Of the Election and Organization of Vestries".

CANON XV.

Of Establishing or Altering Parish Boundaries.

Section 1. When it shall be deemed desirable to alter the boundary lines between two or more Parishes; or when such lines are unknown, or need to be newly determined, the Vestries of the Parishes concerned may agree upon the lines which they wish to have established as their parish lines, and unite in a petition to the Council to alter or establish them accordingly; which petition shall contain an accurate description of the line or lines proposed. Or if the said Vestries fail to agree, then one or more of them may present such petition; in which case a copy of the petition shall be sent to every Vestry in the Parishes concerned which does not unite therein, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the petition shall be presented. And in any case, if a proposed change in parish lines would effect a transfer of any congregation or church building from one parish to another, formal notice thereof shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority at least two months before the meeting of the Council.

SECTION 2. The Council shall refer such petition to a Committee to examine and report thereon; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, alter or establish the said line or lines accordingly. In which case the petition, or so much thereof as shall contain the line or lines so established, shall be delivered to the Secretary and shall be published in the Journal.

CANON XVI.

Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish.

SECTION 1. When any number of persons, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a minister, shall desire a separate parochial organization, but do not reside so apart from other

congregations as to admit of forming a new parish, they may proceed according to the directions of the Canon "Of the Division of Parishes", except as regards a line or lines of vision, which provision in this case is inapplicable. And the Council, proceeding under the directions of the same Canon, may constitute the applicants a Separate Congregation in the Parish in which they are situated, with the right to elect a Vestry, and to have representation in the Council, subject always to the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese.

SECTION 2. No new church shall be built, or new congregation established, in any Parish, unless the consent of the Vestry, or of all the Vestries, of the said Parish be first had. But if such consent be not given an appeal may be taken to the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese, or to the Council when in session; and in either case their decision in the matter shall be final.

CANON XVII.

Of Mission Churches.

Section 1. When any number of persons belonging to any parish or congregation desire a separate organization, but cannot comply with the requirements of the Canon in regard to the formation of Separate Congregations, they may proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

They must obtain the approval of the Vestry of the Parish to which they belong, and if there be two or more Vestries in the Parish they must have the consent of a majority of the same.

They must have the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

They may have their own Vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties, shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of Vestries; except that they shall have no representation in the Council of the Diocese, and shall not call a minister without the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of a church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary and the Treasurer of the Diocese; and a list of such Mission Churches shall be published annually in the Journal.

CANON XVIII.

Of Parish Councils.

SECTION. In every parish with a single Rector and Vestry, their parochial authority, and their consequent primary responsibility for

the extension and welfare of the Church, extends throughout the territorial limits of their parish and should be so recognized and exercised.

In every parish which contains, in addition to the original Parish Church, one or more Separate Congregations or Mission Churches, organized as provided in these Canons, there shall be a Parish Council, to consist of the Rector or Minister in charge of each of the said organized churches or congregations therein, and one or more lay members of the Vestry thereof. The lay members shall be elected annually by their respective Vestries, and shall continue in office until their successors are duly elected. The Parish Council shall elect a Chairman and a Secretary, and shall adopt such rules for its own guidance as may be deemed necessary, subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Parish Council to exercise the authority which belongs to the Parish as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout its borders, so that the Parish may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. Especially it shall be its duty to encourage the planting of missions or mission Sunday Schools where necessary in the Parish, to determine their location and their status and to foster their growth and efficiency, and to provide as far as possible that the services of the Church shall be available to all the people within its territory, and that its united influence be exerted in matters pertaining to the welfare of the community. Provided, however, that the Parish Council shall not encroach upon the rights or duties of the Vestries of organized congregations within its Parish; but it may act with them in an advisory capacity by their express invitation.

CANON XIX.

Of the Election and Organization of Vestries.

SECTION 1. Every Parish, Separate Congregation and Mission Church in this Diocese shall elect annually, as hereinafter prescribed, suitable persons who, with the Rector or Minister in charge, if there be one, shall constitute the Vestry thereof until their successors are elected and have duly qualified.

SECTION 2. The election of Vestrymen shall be held on Easter Monday, in the church or regular place of worship. But if no election be held on Easter Monday it may be held on any day thereafter; and if there be no church or regular place of worship, or if it be not available, the election may be held at any suitable place in the Parish; such time or place to be appointed by the Minister, or if there be none, by the Wardens, or by two Vestrymen, or, if there be none, by three mem-

bers of the congregation. But any congregation may, at a regular meeting of the congregation duly convened at the call of the Vestry or of three members of the congregation, appoint some fixed day in the year other than Easter Monday on which to hold the annual election of Vestry. And the Vestry, or other persons authorized under this Section to act in the premises, shall take care that adequate notice of the place, and the day and hour, appointed for every election of a Vestry shall be given, either in the church on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means.

SECTION 3. All persons twenty-one years of age, who are registered as communicants of the particular church in which they offer to vote, and non-communicants who are baptized, and who have been for six months regular contributors to the charges of the same, shall be entitled to vote at the election of Vestrymen. The voting shall be by ballot, and a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. But no election shall be valid hereunder unless at least ten per cent of the qualified voters of the congregation participate therein.

Section 4. The Vestry may appoint three persons to act as judges, to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges are appointed, the electors present may choose three persons to act as judges. The judges of election shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and of those elected as Vestrymen.

Section 5. The number of Vestrymen elected shall be not less than three, nor more than twelve; provided, however, that in any congregation having more than one hundred communicants, one additional Vestryman may be elected for each additional one hundred communicants or fraction thereof; but the total number of Vestrymen shall in no case exceed eighteen. If the election be the first in a new Parish or congregation the number of Vestrymen shall be fixed by vote of the electors present; otherwise it shall be the same as that of the former Vestry unless changed by vote of the electors. Only male persons, who are communicants, shall be eligible to the office of Vestryman; in other respects the qualifications of Vestrymen shall be the same as those prescribed for voters; provided, that a Vestryman now serving on this 22nd day of May, 1919, shall be eligible for reelection.

Section 6. If there be in any Parish two or more congregations apart from each other, not being Separate Congregations or Mission Churches in the meaning of these Canons, it shall be lawful for the Vestry of such Parish, if they deem it expedient, to apportion to each congregation the number of Vestrymen to be chosen as its representation upon the Vestry of the Parish. In which case a separate election shall be held by and for each such congregation; and the electors thereof shall choose the number of Vestrymen so allotted to that

congregation, and no more. In other respects such elections shall conform to all the foregoing provisions of this Canon. But in no case shall the aggregate number of such Vestrymen in any Parish exceed twelve.

All the Vestrymen so chosen by the different congregations therein, together with the Rector or Minister, if there be one, shall constitute the Vestry of the Parish, with all the duties and powers of other Vestries under these Canons. But the Vestrymen chosen by each congregation respectively, together with the Rector or Minister, shall be a Committee of the Vestry to have the care and control of the property, and to transact the local business, pertaining to that congregation alone, and not to the Parish at large. In which case they may appoint one Warden for their Church, a Treasurer, and a Clerk who shall keep a record of their proceedings.

When in the judgment of the Minister, or, if there be none, of the Senior Warden, a meeting of a Parish Vestry so constituted is impracticable, any matter concurred in by a majority of the aforesaid Committees of the Vestry, and duly recorded by their respective Clerks and the Register of the Vestry, shall be deemed to be the act of the Vestry of the Parish. *Provided*, *however*, That the Parish Vestry shall meet as a whole at least once a year.

SECTION 7. As soon as may be after their election, the persons chosen as Vestrymen shall assemble at such time and place as the Minister shall appoint, or as shall be designated by any two Vestrymen-elect, the Minister and each Vestryman-elect being notified, and proceed to organize the Vestry. The proceedings at this and every meeting of the Vestry shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's Prayer by the Minister, or in his absence by any member who may be chosen to preside over the meeting.

SECTION 9. The Vestry shall proceed to elect a Senior and a Junior Warden, a Register and a Treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. If Wardens have been chosen for particular churches by Committees of the Vestry, the Senior and Junior

Wardens of the Parish shall be chosen from among such Wardens. All Wardens must be communicants and members of the Vestry.

SECTION 10. The Rector shall preside at all meetings of the Vestry when present, and be entitled to give the casting vote in case of a tie, when he is not personally interested. All Vestry meetings shall be subject to his call; but in case he fails, at the request of two Vestrymen, to call a meeting, such Vestrymen, if they deem it necessary, may themselves call a meeting, giving notice thereof to the Rector and to each Vestryman. A majority of the Vestrymen who have qualified, exclusive of the Rector or Minister, shall constitute a quorum; but any Vestry may agree upon a smaller number, not however less than four, to act as a quorum thereof.

SECTION 11. Vacancies occurring in the Vestry shall be filled by a vote of the remaining members. The failure of any Vestryman-elect to qualify within a reasonable time, or the continued neglect of any Vestryman to attend the meetings of the Vestry without adequate excuse, may, after due warning, be deemed to create a vacancy.

CANON XX.

Of the Duties of Vestries, Wardens and Other Parish Officers.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Vestry to determine upon and elect a Rector; to co-operate with him in promoting the spiritual welfare of his cure; to use all earnestness in seeking with him to enlist new disciples for the congregation of Christ, and particularly as a body to meet, at the Rector's appointment, all persons desiring to be confirmed or to be transferred into the congregation, in order to express to such persons before their reception into the congregation what the Vestry, as the lay leaders of the congregation, consider the duties and privileges of work and service for such prospective members of the fellowship to be; to see that the Rector is properly supported and that his salary is paid regularly and punctually; to provide for the appointment of Trustees under the laws of the State of Virginia authorized to hold the legal title to the church property; to make and execute all contracts for the erection, furnishing, preserving and insuring the church edifice and other property; to regulate the use of the Parish graveyard; to make all necessary provision for church music, with the advice and consent of the Rector, and subject to his control; and generally, as the constituted agents of the Parish or Congregation, to transact all its temporal business.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Wardens to keep watch over the Church property; to see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship; to see that the Sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties; to collect the offerings of

the people; to take charge of the font and communion plate; to provide out of the Church funds, under the direction of the Vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion; to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Register of the Vestry to take charge of all Parish records, and to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the Vestry in a well bound book to be provided for that purpose.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all Church funds, except communion alms and other special offerings, and to disburse the same under the direction of the Vestry; to render his accounts to the Vestry at stated times, and to make such reports to the Council as may be required by their orders.

CANON XXI.

Of Parish Registers and Parochial Reports.

Section 1. Every Minister of this Diocese shall keep a record of the Communicants, and of all Baptisms, Confirmations, Marriages and Burials, within his Parish or Congregation; specifying the time when persons became or ceased to be Communicants under his charge, and whether by confirmation, transfer, discipline, death or otherwise; the name, age or the date of birth, the sponsors or witnesses, and, in the case of infants, the parents, of each person baptized; the names of persons confirmed, and by what Bishop; the names, ages and residences of persons married, and the names of at least two witnesses; the names and ages of persons buried; and also the date and place of every such rite respectively; attesting each by his signature.

These records shall be made by the Minister in a suitable and substantial book, to be known as the Parish Register, to be provided by the Vestry for that purpose and to remain their property. When a Parish or Church becomes vacant the Parish Register shall be deposited with one of the Wardens, who shall make, or cause to be made, all needful entries therein until a Minister shall be in charge.

SECTION 2. Every minister shall send to the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, to the Secretary, for the President of the Council, on or before the first day of February of each year, a Report of his official acts, and, if he has a cure, of the condition of his Church or Churches, for the year ending the thirty-first day of December preceding, in such form as shall have been prescribed by the Bishop or Coun-

cil. And if any Church be vacant the report for that Church shall be sent by the Wardens.

CANON XXII.

Of the Transfer and Enrollment of Communicants.

Section 1. Every communicant removing from one Parish or Church to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the minister a certificate that he or she is a communicant in regular standing, from the Minister, or, if there be no Minister, from one of the Wardens, of the Parish or Church from which the communicant desires to be transferred.

SECTION 2. No Minister shall enroll any persons as communicants in the Parish or Congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, unless he shall be satisfied that they have been regular communicants in some other Parish or Congregation; nor shall he enroll any one who is known to deny the Articles of the Christian Faith as set forth in the Apostles' Creed.

CANON XXIII.

Of the Due Celebration of the Lord's Day.

All persons within this Church are enjoined to celebrate and keep the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, in hearing the word of God read and taught, in private and public prayer, and in acts of charity, using all sober and godly conversation.

CANON XXIV.

Of Family Worship and Instruction.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of every communicant in this Church, who is at the head of a family, to live in the daily exercise of family worship.

Section 2. The members of this Church shall instruct their families, as far as they are able, in the principles of the Christian religion. Parents and sponsors shall be careful to teach their children the solemnity and obligation of their baptismal vows, to cause them to attend the Sunday-school and other catechetical instructions of their Minister, and, as soon as they are sufficiently impressed with the importance and sacredness of their baptismal promise, shall take care that they come to the Minister to be examined, and, if they be deemed fit, to be presented to the Bishop for confirmation.

CANON XXV.

Of Offenders to Be Admonished, or Repelled From the Lord's Table.

If any persons within this Church offend their brethren by wickedness of life, such persons shall be admonished, or repelled from the Lord's Table, by the Minister in charge of the Parish or Church, according to the Rubric. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the Minister, or may be requested by the accused, the Wardens of the Parish, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the Minister in ascertaining the facts of the case: *Provided*, That if such Warden or Wardens fail or refuse to act within ten days, the Minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

CANON XXVI.

Of the Trial of the Appeal of a Layman After Repulsion From the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and desiring that he may be restored to the Communion. And then the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the Minister, shall nominate two of the clergy and two of the laity, of whom the Minister repelling shall select one of the clergymen, and the communicant one of the laymen; and it shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case, under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop; who, thereupon, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence, shall proceed to adjudge the case. If further evidence be required it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. And when the evidence is thus procured the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment whenever made to the Minister repelling, and to the communicant repelled; which judgment shall be final and conclusive. Provided. That in case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall nevertheless be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

CANON XXVII.

Of the Trial of a Clergyman, Not Being a Bishop.

Section 1. The trial of a clergyman, not being a Bishop, shall be on a presentment in writing, specifying with reasonable clearness and certainty as to time, place, and circumstance, the crime or misdemeanor, by violation of the canons or otherwise, charged; the said presentment to be made to the Bishop, either by the Council, or by the Vestry of the Parish or Congregation to which the accused belongs, or by any three presbyters of the Diocese entitled to seats in the Council; the said vestry, or presbyters, pledging themselves to act as a committee of prosecution. If, however, the presentment be made by the Council, then the Council shall appoint the committee of prosecution and furnish them with such instructions as may be deemed necessary.

SECTION 2. Such presentment being made to the Bishop, and being accompanied by a further statement in writing of the names of the witnesses, and of the purport of their evidence, and by such documentary evidence as may be in their possession, the Bishop shall immediately proceed to the trial, according to the following provisions: He shall nominate from among the clergy entitled to seats in the Council, other than the members of the Standing Committee, eight presbyters, and cause a list of their names and a copy of the presentment to be furnished to the accused, or left at his place of residence. Of the eight presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the accused may choose five, or in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days so to do, the Bishop shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen shall constitute a court for the trial of the accused. The Bishop shall also at the same time, cause at least thirty days' notice of the time and place of the trial to be given, both to the accused and to the parties presenting him, and also to the presbyters nominated as before provided.

SECTION 3. The Court shall appoint a President and Secretary, the first always from their own body.

SECTION 4. If the accused appear before proceeding to trial, he shall be called on by the court to say whether he is guilty of the offence, or offences, charged against him, and on his neglect or refusal to answer, the plea of not guilty shall be entered for him, and the trial shall proceed: Provided, That for sufficient cause the court may adjourn, from time to time, and place to place: And provided also, That the accused shall, at all times during the trial, have liberty to be present, to produce his testimony, and to make his defense.

SECTION 5. On the request of the accused, or the committee of prosecution, witnesses may be summoned, if before the meeting of

the court, by the Bishop; if during the session of the court then by its President. All testimony shall be given under oath or affirmation. administered by some officer authorized by law. In case the testimony of any witness, whose attendance on the trial cannot be obtained, is desired, it shall be lawful for either party, at any time after notice of the presentment is served on the accused, to apply to the court, if in session, or if not, to the Bishop, who shall thereupon appoint a commissioner to take the deposition of such witness: and such party so desiring to take deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying such notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness; whereupon, it shall be lawful for the other party, within six days after such notice, to propound crossinterrogatories, and such interrogatories, and cross-interrogatories, if any be propounded, shall be sent to the commissioner, who shall thereupon proceed to take the testimony of such witness, and transmit it under seal to the court. But no deposition shall be read at the trial unless the court have reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, unless both parties shall consent that it may be read.

SECTION 6. The court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall, within ten days after closing the same, declare in a written judgment signed by them, or a majority of them, that the accused is guilty, or not guilty, of the charge or charges, or any of them, laid in the presentment, in order therein set forth, and also, if guilty, what punishment shall be awarded; which judgment, with all the evidence received, shall be delivered forthwith to the Bishop; whereupon, unless the Bishop see cause to mitigate or remit the punishment, or to grant a new trial, he shall pronounce sentence according to the judgment of the court, and such sentence shall be final. In case a new trial is granted, a new court shall be constituted according to the provisions of this Canon.

Section 7. If the accused shall neglect or refuse to appear before the court, when summoned according to section second of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the court shall declare him to be in contumacy, and report the same to the Bishop, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass against him for contumacy; but the said sentence shall be reversed by the Bishop, if, within three calendar months, the accused shall tender himself ready, and accordingly appear, to take his trial on the presentment; but if he shall not so tender himself before the expiration of the said three months, the sentence of degradation from the ministry for contumacy shall forthwith be pronounced by the Bishop, who shall

cause such sentence to be publicly read to the congregations of the Diocese by the respective ministers thereof.

Section 8. If at any time the accused shall confess himself guilty of the matters charged in the presentment, or any of them, the court shall proceed to award the punishment, and certify the same, as hereinbefore provided, to the Bishop, who shall, unless he see cause to remit or mitigate the punishment, pronounce the sentence according to the Canons.

Section 9. All notices and papers contemplated by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Bishop, or by the court when the same is in session; and the certificate of any such summoner shall be evidence of the due service of a notice or paper. The delivery of a written notice or paper to a party, or the leaving it at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

Section 10. The accused party may have the privilege of appearing by counsel, in number not more than two, and, in case of the exercise of such privilege, but not otherwise, those presenting shall have the like privilege. If the party accused desire it the trial shall be in public, and said party shall be entitled to a copy of the evidence if he require it.

Section 11. In case of a presentment occurring during a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, such presentment shall be made to the Standing Committee, who shall thereon take such steps as are by this Canon enjoined on the Bishop. *Provided*, That on receiving the proceedings and judgments of the court, they shall transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese, who shall be requested, and is hereby authorized, to act thereon, as if he were the Bishop of this Diocese, and, if he shall concur in opinion with the court, he shall proceed to pronounce sentence accordingly.

Section 12. The expenses of such trial, as also those of the investigating committee preliminary to a presentment, shall be defrayed by the Treasurer out of the Contingent Fund by order of the Council, or, when it is not in session, of the Committee on Finance.

Section 13. All judgments and proceedings under this Canon shall, after they have been acted on by the Bishop, be transmitted by him to the Standing Committee, who shall preserve the same.

CANON XXVIII.

Of Altering or Adding to the Canons.

No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall hereafter be considered by the Council, unless at least one day's notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a committee of at least two presbyters and two laymen. Nor shall such alteration or addition be adopted during the same Council if two-thirds of the members present shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration until the next annual Council.

CANON XXIX.

Of Former Canons Repealed.

All the former Canons or parts of Canons of this Diocese, not included in these Canons, are hereby repealed.

APPENDIX

CERTAIN CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF VESTRIES AND THE LAY PEOPLE: SELECTED BY
THE BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE, AND PUBLISHED HERE BY
ORDER OF THE COUNCIL.

CANON 19.

Of the Filling of Vacant Cures.

Section 1. When a Parish or Congregation becomes vacant the Church-wardens or other proper officers shall notify the fact to the Bishop. If the authorities of the Parish shall for thirty days have failed to make provision for the services, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to take such measures as he may deem expedient for the temporary maintenance of Divine services therein.

SECTION 2. No election of a Rector shall be had until the name of the Clergyman whom it is proposed to elect has been made known to the Bishop, if there be one, and sufficient time, not exceeding thirty days, has been given to him to communicate with the Vestry thereon.

Section 3. Written notice of the election, signed by the Churchwardens, shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. If the Ecclesiastical Authority be satisfied that the person so chosen is a duly qualified Minister, and that he has accepted the office, the notice shall be sent to the Secretary of the Convention, who shall record it. And such record shall be sufficient evidence of the relation between the Minister and the Parish.

SECTION 4. A Minister is settled, for all purposes here or else-

where mentioned in these Canons, who has been engaged permanently by any Parish, according to the rules of said Diocese, or for any term not less than one year.

SECTION 5. In case of the election of an Assistant Minister, a certificate from the Rector and Wardens shall be sent to the Bishop.

CANON 25.

Of Lay Readers.

Section 1. A competent person ready and desirous to serve the Church in the public services statedly as a Lay Reader must procure from the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or Missionary District a written license. Such license shall not be granted to any but a male communicant of this Church, and must be given for a definite period, not longer than one year, but may be renewed from time to time, or revoked at any time. Such license may be given for any vacant Parish or Mission, or for a Congregation without a Minister, but where a Presbyter is in charge, his request and recommendation must have been previously signified to the Ecclesiastical Authority. A license shall not be granted for conducting the service in a Congregation without a Minister, which is able and has had reasonable opportunity to secure the services of an ordained Minister. If the Lay Reader be a student in any Theological Seminary, he shall also, before acting as such, obtain the permission of the presiding officer of such institution and of his own Bishop.

SECTION 2. A Lay Reader shall be subject to the regulations prescribed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and shall not serve in any Diocese other than that in which he is licensed, unless he shall have received a license from the Bishop of the Diocese in which he desires to serve.

Section 3. In all matters relating to the conduct of the service, and to the Sermons or Homilies to be read, he shall conform to the directions of the Minister in charge of the Parish, Congregation, or Mission in which he is serving, and, in all cases, to the directions of the Bishop. He shall read only the Morning and Evening Prayer (omitting the Absolution), the Litany, and the Office for the Burial of the Dead. He shall not deliver sermons or addresses of his own composition, unless, after instruction and examination, he be specially licensed thereto for urgent needs by the Bishop. He shall not wear the dress appropriate to Clergymen ministering in the Congregation.

CANON 42.

Of the Solemnization of Matrimony.

SECTION 1. Ministers of this Church shall be careful to secure the observance of the law of the State governing the civil contract of marriage in the place where the service shall be performed.

SECTION 2. (i) No Minister shall solemnize a marriage except in the presence of at least two witnesses.

(ii) Every Minister shall without delay formally record in the proper register the name, age and residence of each party. Such record shall be signed by the Minister who solemnizes the marriage, and if practicable, by the married parties, and by at least two witnesses of the marriage.

Section 3. No Minister, knowingly, after due inquiry, shall solemnize the marriage of any person who has been or is the husband or wife of any other person then living, from whom he or she has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage. But this Canon shall not be held to apply to the innocent party in a divorce for adultery; Provided, that before the application for such remarriage a period of not less than one year shall have elapsed, after the granting of such divorce; and that satisfactory evidence touching the facts in the case, including a copy of the court's decree, and record, if practicable, with proof that the defendant was personally served or appeared in the action, be laid before the Ecclesiastical Authority, and such Ecclesiastical Authority, having taken legal advice thereon, shall have declared in writing that in his judgment the case of the applicant conforms to the requirements of this Canon; and Provided, further, that it shall be within the discretion of any minister to decline to solemnize any marriage.

SECTION 4. If any Minister of this Church shall have reasonable cause to doubt whether a person desirous of being admitted to Holy Baptism, or to Confirmation, or to the Holy Communion, has been married otherwise than as the Word of God and discipline of this Church allow such Minister, before receiving such person to these ordinances, shall refer the case to the Bishop, for his godly judgment thereupon; *Provided*, *however*, that no Minister shall in any case refuse these ordinances to a penitent person in imminent danger of death.

CANON 48.

Of the Music of the Church.

It shall be the duty of every Minister to appoint for use in his Congregation hymns or anthems from those authorized by the Rubrics,

and, with such assistance as he may see fit to employ from persons skilled in music, to give order concerning the tunes to be sung in his Church. It shall be his especial duty to suppress all light and unseemly music, and all irreverence in the performance.

CANON 49.

Of the Consecration of Churches.

Section 1. No church or chapel shall be consecrated until the Bishop shall have been sufficiently certified that the building and the grounds on which it is erected have been fully paid for, and are free from lien or other incumbrance; and also that such building and ground are secured from the danger of alienation, either in whole or in part, from those who profess and practice the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of this Church, except in the cases provided for in Secs. 2 and 3 of this Canon.

Section 2. It shall not be lawful for any Vestry, Trustees, or other body authorized by law of any State or Territory to hold property for any Diocese, Parish, or Congregation, to encumber or alienate any consecrated church or chapel, or any church or chapel which has been used solely for Divine Service, belonging to the Parish or Congregation which they represent, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

SECTION 3. No consecrated church or chapel shall be removed, taken down, or otherwise disposed of for any worldly or common use, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

Other Provisions of the General Canons.

A person applying to the Standing Committee for recommendation to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders, or for ordination to the Diaconate, or the Priesthood, must present a certificate of his character and fitness signed by the Vestry of the Parish to which he belongs. Canons 2, 7, 8. (Therefore, when a Rector has recommended a postulant to the Bishop as a fit person to study for the ministry, said Rector should report the fact to his Vestry; and the Vestry should be careful to become acquainted with the postulant, that they may intelligently indorse him.)

If a Bishop shall for three years have declined to visit a Parish or Congregation, the Vestry (in this Diocese including the Rector), may apply to the Presiding Bishop for a Council of Conciliation, to

be composed of the five Bishops living nearest the Diocese. Canon 17, Sec. 2 (ii).

In case there be no Minister in charge of a congregation—"No Church-wardens, Vestrymen, or Trustees of the Congregation, shall permit any person to officiate therein, without sufficient evidence of his being duly licensed or ordained to minister in this Church." Canon 22.

It shall be the duty of the Vestry or Church-wardens having charge of the Parish Register, in a vacant Parish, to exhibit it to the Bishop on the occasion of his visitation. Canon 20, Sec. 2 (iii).

A Vestry has the privilege of refusing its consent to the resignation of its Rector. Canon 41, Sec. 1.

A Vestry desiring for urgent reasons a separation and dissolution of pastoral relations with its Rector, may, if the parties be not agreed, give notice thereof in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority, who will act in the premises. Canon 41, Sec. 2.

Lay Delegates to the Diocesan Council are called upon to sign a testimonial for a person whom they elect Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor. Canon 12, Sec. 1 (1).

Lay Delegates may also be called upon to take part in placing the Diocese under the provisional charge of the Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor of another Diocese. Canon 17, Sec. 6 (ii).

A person applying to be appointed Deaconess must lay before the Bishop a testimonial of fitness, signed by twelve lay communicants, six of whom shall be women, as a prerequisite to her appointment to that function. Canon 23, Sec. 3.

A communicant in good standing, removing from one Parish or Congregation to another, is entitled to a certificate that he or she is a communicant. Canon 43, Sec. 3.
