## FORMS FOR MAKING BEQUEST

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

If it is the desire to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its officers.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is, "Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia."

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia."

The legal title of the Episcopal High School is "Protestant Episcopal High School in Virginia."

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia."

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia," a corporation chartered under the laws of Virginia.

The legal title of the Blue Ridge Industrial School is: "The Blue Ridge Industrial School, Incorporated."

The legal title of St. Agnes' School, Alexandria, is: "St. Agnes' Episcopal School for Girls, Incorporated."

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg is: "The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia."

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

#### RULES OF ORDER

## ORGANIZATION

FROM CANON I, SECTION 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Épiscopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

#### RULES OF ORDER

1st. The Council shall be opened with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Report of Secretary.

Election of a Secretary.

The appointment of a Treasurer *pro tempore* when the Treasurer is absent. The adoption of rules of order. The reading of the Journal of the preceding day. The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Communications from Convocations.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on New Parishes.

A Committee on Dispatch of Business.

And the chairmen of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President may think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next Council.

5th. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention, shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

6th. Divine service shall be held on the Wednesday and Thursday evenings of each Council with a sermon, and a committee of three shall be appointed at each Council to select a preacher or preachers to deliver these sermons at the succeeding Council.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; and all resolutions shall be referred to their proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.

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#### Rules of Order

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *Provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

25th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

26th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the President may appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And the Committee may report at any time.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS

27th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

28th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

29th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

30th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

## CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA., May 20, 1931.

The one hundred and thirty-sixth annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia convened this morning at 10 o'clock in St. Paul's Memorial Church, University. The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D., assisted by Rt. Rev. Frederick D. Goodwin, D. D., Bishop-Coadjutor, Rev. Robert F. Gibson and Rev. Sam B. Chilton.

Immediately after the close of the communion service the Council was called to order.

The official list of the clergy of the Diocese was presented and the roll called therefrom. The Secretary then called the roll of lay delegates. Fifty-seven clergy and fifty-three lay delegates were found to be present.

The Chair appointed as the Committee on Credentials: Rev. Paul D. Bowden, Mr. James M. Lewis and Mr. John S. White.

Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, D. D., was elected Secretary of the Council. He appointed Rev. Lewis Carter Harrison Assistant Secretary.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Diocese of Tennessee:

#### 28 136TH ANNUAL COUNCIL DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

### NASHVILLE, TENN., April 28, 1931.

To the Secretary of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

## REVEREND AND DEAR SIR:

The resolution quoted below was unanimously adopted by the ninety-eighth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Tennessee, and the Secretary was directed to send copies of the same to the Conventions of other Dioceses in the United States, inviting them to take similar action.

Resolved, That this Convention memorialize the General Convention to amend Canon 44, Section I, in such wise as to extend the application thereof to baptized members of this Church other than communicants.

Will you, accordingly, kindly present this communication to the 1931 Convention of your Diocese for its information, and for such consideration and action as it may deem expedient?

The intention in proposing such alteration in the Canon is primarily to provide a proper record of children, not yet of an age to be confirmed, who are now frequently lost sight of in the removal of their families from one place to another.

This was referred to the Committee on Canons. The Secretary presented the following communication from a special committee of the Diocese of Chicago:

CHICAGO, February 6, 1931.

The Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, D. D., Secretary of the Diocese of Virginia.

MY DEAR SIR:

I enclose a copy of the resolution concerning deaconesses, which was passed unanimously by the Annual Convention of the Diocese of Chicago on February 3d.

There are 223 deaconesses in the Church, and the Church is asking these faithful women to serve in many of the hard places, and yet the Church makes no provision for them in case of disability and old age.

The present effort on the part of the deaconesses themselves to raise a Deaconess Retiring Fund of \$50,000.00, will, even when completed, be utterly insufficient to provide proper pension or disability allowance.

## WEDNESDAY, MAY 20, 1931

It seems a matter of simple justice that the Church make some proper provision for disability and old age. We have no right to ask women to devote their lives to good works. and then to cast them out when they are no longer able to be of service.

The Convention authorized me to send this resolution to the Conventions of the Dioceses, and ask that it receive affirmative action. Thanking you for your cooperation and interest, I am.

#### RESOLUTION CONCERNING DEACONESSES PASSED BY THE CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF CHICAGO, FEBRUARY 3, 1931.

Whereas, the recent Lambeth Conference has reaffirmed the resolution passed by the Lambeth Conference of 1920 to the effect that the office of a deaconess is primarily a ministry of succour, bodily and spiritual, especially to women, and should follow the lines of the primitive, rather than of the modern, diaconate of men; and

Whereas, the Lambeth Conference of 1930 has declared that the ordination of a deaconess should everywhere include prayer by the Bishop and the laying on of hands; the delivery of a New Testament to the candidate, and a formula giving authority to execute the office of a deaconess in the Church of God; and

Whereas, the Lambeth Conference of 1930 has declared that every stipendiary woman worker is entitled to proper provision for a pension: and

Whereas, the so-called "Deaconess Retiring Fund", even when completed. will be entirely inadequate to meet the pensions for disability and old age; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Diocese of Chicago, in Convention assembled, February 3 and 4, 1931, hereby concurs in the recommendation of the Diocesan Council of the Diocese of Chicago, and respectfully petitions the General Convention of the Episcopal Church to take action at its forthcoming meeting in September, 1931, defining the status of deaconesses in accordance with the declarations of the Lambeth Conference; and be it further

Resolved. That definite steps be taken at the session of the General Convention for the inauguration of an adequate pension system for the deaconesses of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the U.S.A.

This was referred to the Diocesan Committee on the Church Pension Fund.

Dr. Ivey F. Lewis presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Council take a recess at 1 o'clock for lunch and convene again at 2 o'clock, and that the Council open at 9 A. M. Thursday morning, taking a recess from 1 P. M. till 2:15 P. M. for lunch.

The rules of order of the last Council were on motion adopted.

Bishop Tucker then read his annual address.

ADDRESS OF RT. REV. HENRY ST. GEORGE TUCKER, D. D., MAY 20, 1931.

## My Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

In opening the 136th Council of the Diocese of Virginia, I extend to you my affectionate greetings. Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

I take this occasion to thank the Council for the great relief you gave me at your last meeting by the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor. Bishop Goodwin has not only done most effectively the work assigned him, but during my illness has filled most of my own confirmation appointments. I desire to make this public expression of my grateful appreciation of his assistance.

Since last year three clergymen of this Diocese have passed from us to enter upon the rest that remaineth for the people of God: The Rev. Josiah Richard Ellis, the Rev. Edgar Carpenter, and the Rev. William Hullihen Burkhardt, D. D.

The Rev. Josiah Richard Ellis died on January 1, 1931. Mr. Ellis was born in Amherst county, Va., in 1856. He was graduated from the Seminary in 1892 and ordained deacon the same year. His whole ministry was spent in the State of Virginia. From the Seminary he went to Gordonsville, where he stayed fourteen years. His next charge was Emporia. After leaving there he spent fifteen years in mountain mission work in Rockingham county. His last charge was at Pedlar Mills. Mr. Ellis was a man of strong convictions and untiring energy, and will be greatly missed throughout the Diocese.

The Rev. Edgar Carpenter died on February 9, 1931. After his graduation from the Seminary he served successively in Lawrenceville, Christ Church, Richmond, and in All Saints, Portsmouth. In 1904' he went to Grace Church, Alexandria, where he remained until his death. Mr. Carpenter was a devoted pastor. He gave himself wholly to his congregation and to the community in which he lived. In these days, when the value of pastoral work is sometimes overlooked, I would commend Mr. Carpenter's example to the attention of the younger clergy.

The Rev. William Hullihen Burkhardt, D. D., passed away on March 1, 1931. He was born in Martinsburg, W. Va., in 1866. Graduating from the Seminary in 1890, he served first in West Virginia and then in New Jersey. In 1906 he became rector of St. James, Leesburg. From 1917 until his death he was in Richmond, first as rector of Grace Church and later of Grace and Holy Trinity. He retired in 1929, and was made rector emeritus of Grace and Holy Trinity. Dr. Burkhardt was a man whom to know was to love. He was a gallant soldier of the Cross, whose life bore constant witness to his Master.

This is General Convention year. Before considering the work in our own Diocese, I must call your attention to two important canons which are to be proposed to the General Convention:

First, the proposed canon on Placement of the Clergy. This canon represents an attempt to solve one of the most difficult practical problems confronting the Church. While I do not think that the proposed canon is practicable in its present form, it suggests methods which may well be tried out informally by some of the Dioceses.

Second, the proposed canon on Marriage and Divorce. I am strongly opposed to Section VII of this proposed canon, which permits clergymen of this Church, under certain conditions, to solemnize the marriage of men and women who have been divorced.

There was published some few months ago a book called "The American Missal". I shall read the description of this book as given on the back cover of the Living Church of March 7, 1931. It is as follows: "The Missal contains the Liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer according to the use of the Church in the United States of America, with Introits, Graduals, Collects, Epistles, and Gospels, and other devotions proper to the same, together with proffers for additional Holy Days and Saints Days and for Requiem and Votive Masses." I judge from this description that this book contains additions to the Holy Communion Service as found in the Book of Common Prayer; and that its use in this Diocese would therefore require the authorization of the Bishop.

While I do not think that I need have any anxiety with regard to the use of The American Missal in this Diocese, yet it is incumbent upon me as Bishop to give official notice that this book is not authorized for use in the service of the Holy Communion in the Diocese of Virginia.

I now come to the work of the Diocese. In some ways this has

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been a discouraging year, as we heard last night from our speaker on Social Service. The depression in business has been reflected in the financial returns of our Diocese. This does not mean necessarily that the work of the Church has gone backwards. On the contrary, in counting up the number of people confirmed last year, I found that there were more than in any other year since I came into the Diocese. In almost every place that I have visited the attendance upon the services and the interest manifested in the Church gave ample ground for encouragement. Nevertheless, we have to meet the financial question. It is a problem which has been with the Diocese for a long time. Each year we make up a budget providing simply for the work which we have to do and we know the amount needed to meet that budget is not going to be forthcoming. Unless we are prepared to drop some of the work which God has given us to do, we must devise some plan of meeting this situation. As the afternoon session is to be given up to the consideration of the budget, I shall not dwell upon it any further at this time, but will simply ask you to approach this subject with the determination that this Diocese shall take no backward step.

Our financial difficulties are a symptom of a more fundamental weakness. There have been times when the Church could truthfully say, "Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have given I unto thee". If it be true that the financial depression has diminished the Church's capacity for material giving, can she compensate for this by drawing more largely from her spiritual resources? Apart from silver and gold, what has she to give to the world? The financial stringency may prove a blessing in disguise if it moves us to give heed to our spiritual condition. That there is something wrong with the spiritual life of the Church would doubtless be generally acknowledged. I suppose our fathers and grandfathers have said the same thing about the spiritual life of the Church in their time. It is not a new phenomenon, but more serious now because we are called to render a service much more complex and more widely extended than ever before in the Church's history.

What is spiritual life? Spiritual life is born of faith in God and is kept alive by communion with God. We still say, "I believe in God", but too often the words do not express the faith by which we live. Our real creed is, "I believe in the world". We worship and serve the creature more than the Creator. It has been hard for faith to maintain itself during the past seventy-five years. The prevailing philosophy has left but little place for God's existence and none at all for His activity in human affairs. We have left Him entirely out of our practical life, thinking that human problems could be solved by human wisdom. In saying this one must not overlook the real achievements of the age of science. Religion has made notable progress in many directions. We have learned to know the world that God gave us and to use that knowledge to promote human welfare. This progress of religion along practical lines will be of no avail, however, if its belief in God is reduced to a form of words by a materialistic and mechanistic philosophy which influences even those who still call themselves Christians. Fortunately there are signs of a vigorous reaction in the world of thought. The very progress of science itself is bringing into question the adequacy of theories which not long ago seemed a sufficient explanation of the universe. So far the reaction is mainly negative, but at least the field is no longer held by theories which leave no standing ground for religion. We can teach our children to believe in God with the hope that this belief will not be stifled in an intellectual atmosphere deadly to religion. Further, we can teach them to believe not only in a god, but in the God who has revealed Himself in our Lord Jesus Christ.

The second requisite for a vigorous, fruitful, spiritual life is constant and real communion with God. "As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself except it abide in the vine: no more can ye except ye abide in me." The bearing of these words of our Lord upon the present crisis in the Church's life and work is obvious. I use the word crisis advisedly. There is a tension between our ideals and our capacity for realizing them. The danger is that we shall be tempted to lower our ideals to what we conceive to be our strength. St. Paul points out the way of escape from this temptation-"I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." The branch cannot bear fruit of itself. In other words, the Church of today must respond to her Lord's invitation, "Come unto me, all ye that travail and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you". This means more time given to prayer, and more effort spent to make our prayer a real communion with God. It means more reading of the Bible in order that we may hear what God has to say to His children. It means not only more regular attendance upon public worship, but more concentration of attention upon God in our worship. In short, we need to consecrate to God more of our time, attention and effort. The modern world makes such constant claims upon us in these respects, that unless we are careful there will be nothing left to devote to God. I believe that it is practically impossible to escape this danger, unless we set aside definite periods for prayer and devotional reading.

Of special importance in this connection is a proper observance of Sunday. It should be a day when our attention is directed primarily to God and the things of the spirit. Nothing, in my opinion,

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will do more to revitalize and strengthen the spiritual life of the Church than for each one of us to observe Sunday as the Lord's Day, a day devoted to Him and His service.

God is calling upon the Church of this age to do great things for Him. We have learned only too well the lesson that human effort of itself is inadequate to the performance of this task. Our failures will prove a blessing in disguise if they will lead us to a greater dependence on the Divine aid.

The impossible things of men are possible with God. Let us not then turn back in discouragement from the tasks that He has given us, and ask for lighter ones, but rather ask Him to strengthen us with might by His spirit in the inner man.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS.

The Credentials Committee reports that they have examined the credentials of the lay delegates and find them correct with the exception that it appears from the face of the credentials in several cases that the delegates were elected by the vestrymen of a single church instead of being elected by the vestry of the whole parish. We recommend that these lay delegates be seated as members of the Council and suggest that greater care be exercised in the future in this matter.

#### PAUL D. BOWDEN, JAMES M. LEWIS, JOHN S. WHITE, Committee.

The report of the Committee on Credentials was adopted.

The amendment to Section (b) of Article II of the Constitution of the Diocese, which was adopted at the Council last year and reported to the parishes, was then taken under consideration.

Resolved, That Section (b) of Article II of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

(1) One delegate from each parish or church entitled to representation chosen by the vestry thereof, save that every such parish or church having more than one minister canonically settled shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has ministers, and that every such parish or church having more than five hundred communicants reported to the previous annual Council shall be entitled to send an additional delegate for each five hundred communicants or major fraction thereof above the first five hundred; but in no case to exceed three lay delegates in all from any one congregation.

(2) Three delegates from the missionary jurisdiction known as the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, chosen by the Board of Mountain Work.

(3) The lay members of the Standing Committee, and the Chancellor of the Diocese and the Committee on Finance, as the same are or may hereafter be constituted by Canon, shall be members of the Council ex-officio, but without the right to vote when the vote shall be taken by orders. And in every case members of the Council shall be communicants in the Church."

Being put to a vote, this amendment of Article II was adopted by a constitutional majority.

#### REPORT OF THE EXAMINING CHAPLAINS.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Board of Examining Chaplains of the Diocese respectfully submits its annual report:

At the Council in 1930 the Rev. F. D. Goodwin, D. D., and the Rev. R. F. Gibson were appointed as Examining Chaplains. Dr. Goodwin later resigned because of his election as Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese. The Rev. R. A. Magill was appointed to fill the vacancy. After serving part of the year Mr. Magill resigned, having removed to the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia. The Rev. S. B. Chilton was appointed in his place.

The Board held examinations at the Theological Seminary in Virginia on January 26 and 27 and May 11 and 12. These examinations covered the subjects listed for both Deacons' and Priests' Orders. The candidates examined were: Of the Senior Class: Mr. Robert C. Beverley, Mr. Albert C. Muller, Mr., William R. D. Turkington, Jr., and Mr. William Wyllie, Jr., of this Diocese, and Mr. Alfred L. Griffiths, of the Diocese of Massachusetts, examined at the request of the Bishop of Massachusetts.

Of the Middle Class: Mr. H. Meriwether Lewis and Mr. Charles W. Smith, of this Diocese, and Mr. Archie Buchanan, of the Missionary District of Eastern Oregon, at the request of the Bishop of that District, and Mr. James DeW. Hubbard, of the Diocese of Massachusetts, at the request of the Bishop of that Diocese.

The candidates in the Middle Class have taken only a portion of the required examinations.

The Bishop of Virginia was present and took part in these examinations.

> ROBERT F. GIBSON, SAMUEL B. CHILTON, Board of Examining Chaplains.

This report was received.

Upon nomination by the Bishop, Rev. Robert F. Gibson and Rev. Sam B. Chilton were elected Examining Chaplains, and Rev. Thomas K. Nelson, D. D., and Rev. A. C. Zabriskie as Examining Chaplains for Academic Courses.

Rev. Robert B. Nelson presented a verbal report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

On motion, the Chairman was requested to write out the salient points of his report in order that it might be published in the Council Journal and in the Virginia Churchman.

In presenting the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, the chairman said that efforts had been made to secure the cooperation of the clergy and vestries in preparing the report in order that it might be the more worth while. For this purpose Bulletin 207 from V. P. I. and Vol. 24, No. 8, together with Professor Hummel's Summary of Bulletin 207, had been mailed to all the clergy, and the recommendations of the latter had been published in the Virginia Churchman. To these various communications and efforts three replies had been received by the committee.

The importance of these communications was demonstrated by quoting page 30 of V. P. I. Bulletin, Vol. 24, No. 8, which was a discussion of Bulletin 207, which had been prepared by the best trained men in the State, together with the leaders of the religious

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life of the State. Some of the facts revealed by this quotation were as follows: Per cent of ministers in Virginia counties who are reported to have rendered material assistance to various rural life agencies and movements, based on reports from 1,033 white ministers and 275 negro ministers (Va. Agr. Exp. Sta., Bulletin 207, p. 123).

Number of ministers active in— One or more Movements, White 20%, Colored 27%. School Improvement, White 15%, Colored 18%. Health and Sanitation Work, White 10%, Colored 18%. Community organization, White 9%, Colored 16%. Law enforcement, White 8%, Colored 2%. School or Public Library, White 6%, Colored 3%. Road Improvement, White 4%, Colored 1%. Recreational Work, White 4%, Colored 3%. Community Beautification, White 3%, Colored 3%. Farm Agent Work, White 3%, Colored 13%. Good Race Relations, White 3%, Colored 13%. 4-H Club Work, White 3%, Colored 12%. Home Agent Work, White 1%, Colored 9%.

In addition to the above mentioned bulletins, the journals of the Council for the last ten years were studied and an effort made to find out what the figures indicated the state of the Church actually to be. The following figures were significant: Baptisms reported for 1922 were 1,130, for 1929 they were 829. Confirmations for 1919 were 1,039, for 1929 they were 837. Marriages in 1923 were 434, in 1929 they were 402. Burials in 1920 were 527, in 1926 they were 710 and in 1929 they were 611. Thus it is seen that there was a large decline annually in the number of baptisms, confirmations and marriages and a large increase in burials. The total number of baptized persons in 1919 were 24,763, and in 1929 it was 28,033; an actual gain of about 325 per year, an average of about 2 or 3 persons per congregation throughout the Diocese. The number of confirmed persons reported for 1919 was 17,779, and in 1929 it was 20,932; an actual gain of about 312 persons per year, an average of about 2 or 3 per congregation per year. This is admittedly a rough estimate because the figures were not at hand showing the number of parishes and missions for the years preceding 1929, when the Living Church Annual for 1930 reported 220 parishes and missions. If these figures were used for calculation there would be a much smaller average actual gain per congregation per year.

The total number of "communicants" reported for 1919 was 16,005, and for 1929 the number was 19,880, a gain of 3,875 in ten years, an average permanent gain of 387.5, about 2 or 3 communicants

per parish or mission per year. There was an improvement in the number of persons not communing, as there were in 1919 reported 1.774 and in 1929 the number was 1.052. A very great improvement.

The number of Church Schools had decreased from 165 in 1919 to 151 in 1929, though the number of "teachers and officers" had increased from 1,216 in 1919 to 1,317 in 1929. The number of pupils had increased from 9,820 in 1919 to 10,824 in 1929.

The only financial figures presented for consideration were the per capita contributions for the Diocesan budget quota to the General Church, which showed that in 1919 the per capita contribution was \$1.61; in 1920, \$5.64, which gradually decreased until 1928, when it was \$2.35.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that all accounts of the various funds under the charge of the Treasurer of the Diocese from January 1 to December 31, 1930, have been audited by Messrs. A. M. Pullen & Co., certified public accountants of Richmond, and have been found to be correct.

The receipts of the Bishop's and Contingent Fund for 1930, including a balance brought over of \$3,338.38, amounted to \$19,598.38. The disbursements amounted to \$17,080.03, leaving a balance at the end of the year of \$2,518.35, of which \$1,200.00 was due to the Episcopal Fund to cover the appropriation of that amount, \$1,000.00 reserved for the expenses of deputies of our Diocese to the General Convention of 1931 and \$318.35 remained unappropriated. The itemized statement of this report appears in the Treasurer's report and will be printed in the Council Journal.

The Committee thinks that the item for printing the Council Journal is large and the effort should be made to reduce the size of the Journal and the price if possible.

Under resolution of a former Council \$4,000.00 has been paid from the income of the Episcopal Fund to the Bishop's and Contingent Fund to be applied on expenses of the Diocesan offices. We recommend that this be continued for 1932. This leaves \$18,145.00 to be collected by assessment upon the parishes of this Diocese. We recommend that the assessments for 1932 for this fund be the same as for the present year.

There is a balance of \$2,518.00 from last year, of which \$1,200.00 was appropriated to the Episcopal Fund, but has not yet been paid. We recommend that this appropriation be transferred to the expenses of deputies from this Diocese to the General Convention of 1931, and that the balance of \$2,518.35, or so much thereof as may be necessary, together with the \$1,000.00 provided for this current year for that purpose, be set aside for the expenses of the deputies to the General Convention. As the General Convention will meet in Denver, the expenses of our deputies will be larger than is usually the case.

In response to a resolution of the Standing Committee of the Diocese and of many of our people, your committee appropriated \$600.00 for the use of Bishop Tucker and urged him to take a vacation. The appropriation was returned.

We hope the Council will renew this appropriation and urge Bishop Tucker to take a vacation after this meeting of the Council.

We cannot close our report without expressing our deep sense of the great loss that the Finance Committee and the Diocese as a whole has suffered in the death of Mr. R. Carter Beverley. Mr. Beverley has served the Diocese for many years and in many capacities. He loved his Church and gave himself unstintedly to her service. Our Diocese is the riches for the example of his devoted Christian life and his abiding interest in every phase of her work.

D., as Bishop-Coadjutor of Chicago; the Rt. Rev. James Craik Morris. D. D. as Bishop of Louisiana; the Rev. Robert Nelson Spencer, as Bishop-Coadjutor of West Missouri: the Rev. Charles Kendall Gilbert, D. D., as Suffragan-Bishop of New York; the Rev. Benjamin T. Kemerer, as Bishop-Coadjutor of Duluth; the Rev. Wyatt Brown, D. D., as Bishop of Harrisburg. Consent was given to the ordination to the priesthood of the Rev. Henry Heaton, Rev. Frederick J. Warnecke and the Rev. Dudley Archer Boogher. Consent was given to the ordination to the diaconate of Dewey Campbell Loving. Dudley Archer Boogher, Frederick J. Eastman, Marshall Edward Travers, William R. D. Turkington, Jr., and William Wyllie, Jr. William Byrd Lee Milton and C. Worthington Lowe were recommended to become candidates for Holy Orders.

Consent was given to the Diocese of Minnesota to elect a Bishop-Coadjutor. Consent was given to the sale of Payne's Chapel, Westmoreland county.

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#### WEDNESDAY, MAY 20-2 P. M.

Council convened, with Bishop Tucker presiding. Rev. Charles W. Sheerin presented an amendment to Sec-

tions (a) and (c) of Article II of the Constitution.

This was referred to the Committee on Canons. (See page 67 for their report.)

Mr. Blake T. Newton presented the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That it is the sense of this Council that the address of Bishop H. St. George Tucker to the Council be printed and distributed in pamphlet form.

This resolution was adopted.

Mr. Bryan moved that the Bishop be requested to take a vacation of three months, beginning immediately after this Council, in order to the full restoration of his health. This motion was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Dr. Brydon presented the report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. (See Appendix A, III (a).)

Rev. B. D. Tucker, Jr., D. D., presented the report of the Board of Apportionment, carrying the tentative budget of the Diocese for 1932. (See Appendix A, III (b).)

In speaking to the report of the Board of Apportionment, Mr. Frederick E. Nolting reported the request of the Board that a roll call of parishes be held and the delegates from each parish and mission state the amount which the parish or congregation hopes to raise through the Every-Member Canvass as the acceptance of parish quota to cover this budget. The roll call was then held, reports being presented from about 130 parishes and missions, that their several congregations hoped to raise a total of \$134,596.00. Forty parishes and congregations, with no representative present at the time, failed to report. The amount of tentative quota assigned to these non-reporting congregations amounting to slightly over \$11,-000.00. After discussion, Mr. Rosewell Page moved that the tentative budget be adopted by the Council as presented.

Mr. McGuire moved that the budget be referred to a committee of five to study the various items of the budget with a view to ascertaining if and where any reduction can be made.

The vote was taken on Mr. Page's motion, resulting in its adoption by ninety ayes to thirty-seven noes. Mr. McGuire's motion for appointment of committee of five was referred to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

A telegram of greeting was read from the Council of the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia, now in session at Wytheville, and the Secretary was ordered to send suitable acknowledgment.

Mr. Braxton Valentine presented the following memorial from the Virginia Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew:

#### May 18, 1931.

To Bishop H. St. George Tucker and Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

At a conference of the men of the Diocese of Virginia at Mayo Memorial Church House, February 12, 1931, gathered for the purpose of considering Church work with older boys, the following resolution was passed, and has been endorsed by the Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew:

Resolved, That this conference of men of the Diocese of Virginia, gathered here to consider Church work with older boys, feels strongly that everything possible should be done to reach and train more of our boys for Church leadership. We, therefore, respectfully request our Bishop and Council to appoint a commission of the leaders for older boys to consist of three clergymen and four laymen for the purpose of investigating conditions and recommending ways and means of strengthening the work.

The Woman's Auxiliary hopes you can plan for some activity for boys. Sunday schools are not filling the bill. Following telegram received from Mr. Choate: Consider your suggestion regarding younger boys at Executive Committee meeting, Philadelphia, last week. Also have discussed with Religious Educational Department at 281 Fourth Avenue, and opinion is unanimous that our field is with boys, age ten or older. Believe younger boys' activities should come out of Sunday school.

#### GERTRUDE W. BARTON.

At the request of the Council, the Chair appointed a Commission on Work Among Boys, consisting of Rt. Rev. Frederick D. Goodwin, D. D., Rev. W. R. G. Irwin, Rev. Ernest Van R. Stires, Messrs. E. I. Carruthers, Robert E. Anderson, C. Braxton Valentine and Ivor Massey, to take under consideration the matters contained in the memorials from the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and the Woman's Auxiliary.

It was moved that the Council meet at 9:15 A. M. tomorrow instead of 9.

The Council then adjourned.

## THURSDAY, MAY 21st-9:15 A. M.

The Council convened, Bishop Tucker presiding. After the opening prayer the minutes of yesterday's meetings were read and approved.

Rev. S. L. Rotter presented the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, the commission appointed by General Convention to study the whole subject of divorce and remarriage has published a tentative report embodying a proposed new Canon to replace General Canon 43, Of Matrimony, and has expressed the desire to give it the widest possible publicity for the purpose of invoking discussion and criticism, and has stated that on the basis of criticisms received the commission will hold another meeting and consider further amendments before making its final report to the coming General Convention to be held in Denver, Col., in September; and

Whereas, Section VII of the proposed new Canon is as follows: "Any person to whom a divorce from a former marriage has been granted for any cause by a civil court may, after the expiration of one year from the granting of the divorce, apply to his Bishop or to the ecclesiastical marital court of his domicil for permission to marry another person. The Bishop or court shall thereupon inquire into the characters and personalities of the parties to the previous and to the proposed marriage, and determine whether the purposes of Christian marriage will be best served by the proposed marriage. If the Bishop or court permits the proposed marriage, a minister of the Church may solemnize the marriage; provided, however, that he shall not solemnize it in the church or by the form contained in the Book of Common Prayer, but he may use such special service as his Bishop may provide for the purpose; and provided, further, that it shall be within the discretion of any minister to decline to solemnize any marriage."

Therefore, be it

*Resolved*: I. That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, in session at St. Paul's Memorial Church, University, Va., May 20, 1931, is opposed to said Section VII for reasons among which the following present themselves to the Council as manifestly obvious:

This Council does not believe that it is consistent with the general content of scriptural revelation and the witness and teaching of the Church to empower any Bishop or ecclesiastical court to determine whether the purposes of Christian marriage would be best served by a remarriage of persons "to whom a divorce from a former marriage has been granted for any cause by a civil court". The Council feels that such power given to a Bishop or ecclesiastical court would be a direct and unexplainable contradiction of the Church's public teaching on divorce and remarriage expressed at the solemnization of every Church marriage in the words uttered by the minister as he joins together the right hands of the man and women, "Those whom God hath joined together let no man put asunder".

The proviso that the minister shall not solemnize the remarriage in the church or by the form contained in the Book of Common Prayer, but may use such special service as his Bishop may provide for the purpose, seems to this Council almost in the nature of an attempt on the part of the Church to avoid the responsibility of the Church for an official act performed by one of her ordained ministers, or an effort to separate for the time being the minister from his sacred office and make of him a civil magistrate for the purpose of a re

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marriage which the authorized public service of the Church in the Book of Common Prayer does not recognize.

This proviso is open to this further objection apparent to the Council, that in case of an Episcopal vacancy in any Diocese, there would be no authority to provide the special service mentioned, the proposed ecclesiastical court being hardly a competent source for a service to be used by the minister.

II. That a copy hereof be sent by the Secretary of this Diocese to the Rt. Rev. Herman Page, Bishop of Michigan, Chairman of the Commission.

This resolution was adopted.

Be It Resolved, That the delegates of the Diocese of Virginia to the General Convention meeting at Denver, September 16, 1931, be hereby instructed to vote against, work against and oppose the Canon on Marriage and Divorce as proposed by the Commission on said Canon.

This resolution was adopted.

## PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESE.

(a) The Bishop or Bishops, and the ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who are now or may hereafter be canonically settled in parishes or churches within the Diocese, professors of the Theological Seminary in Virginia or any other theological seminary in connection with the Protestant Episcopal Church being ordained ministers canonically connected with this Diocese, missionaries within this Diocese and under its ecclesiastical authority being clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese, chaplains in the United States Army or Navy canonically connected with this Diocese, clergymen canonically connected with this Diocese serving as headmasters of Church schools within this Diocese, or holding executive positions in the work of the Diocese or in the work of the Church under the National Council. Provided, etc., as at present.

This proposed amendment of the Constitution was adopted by a constitutional majority.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE INCREASE OF THE MINISTRY.

#### PREAMBLE AND RESOLUTION.

Whereas, a rule of the Church Pension Fund makes it impossible for a clergyman who is receiving an annuity from the "Fund", to engage in the work for which he was ordained, unless it be without regular compensation, and for very brief periods: and

Whereas, until such time as the Fund is sufficient to allow a much larger annuity, such a drastic rule seems unjustifiable and lacking in due consideration of the hardships and suffering it is bringing to a number of our brothers: therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Annual Convention of the Diocese of Virginia, meeting on May 20-21, 1931, memorialize the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, meeting in Denver, Col., in September next; asking that it take such action as shall bring about a modification and change in Rule No. VIII of the Church Pension Fund; the object of this memorial being to secure adequate relief to numbers of the retired clergy suffering hardships under the restrictive terms of this rule.

Prior to action upon this resolution, Dr. Brydon presented the

#### REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE OF THE CHURCH PENSION FUND.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Diocesan Committee of the Church Pension Fund begs to report that every assessment for 1930 made against the salary of a clergyman at work in the Diocese of Virginia has been paid in full, so that our Diocese continues to maintain its record of payment of assessments in full every year which it has held for the past ten years or more. There are still, we regret to say, a number of parishes and congregations in the Diocese which, instead of paying their Pension Fund assessments at regular periods, either monthly or quarterly, during the year, permit the assessments to accumulate until the year has closed and this requires a heavy amount of correspondence on the part of the Secretary before these parishes which are in arrears pay up the pension assessments.

This is not only bad business, but means a constant threat of loss in the pension benefits to our clergy. It should be generally understood that the Pension Fund is a form of group insurance. The

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Diocese, at the formation of the Church Pension Fund, entered into a formal contract that the assessment would be paid for every clergyman at work in the Diocese. If at any time any parish pays no part of its assessment for a year, the Church Pension Fund properly takes the attitude that the Diocese has failed in its agreement, and consequently every minister in the Diocese is in danger of suffering in his Pension Fund benefits because one parish has failed to pay any part of its assessment.

The original agreement of the Church Pension Fund was that every minister ordained before 1917 would be entitled to a retirement pension of \$600.00, provided the assessment was paid on his salary for every year from 1917 until the date of his retirement. During the years since 1917 the Pension Fund has found it possible to grant still further benefits as the result of additional funds which have come into their hands.

These benefits are-first, a payment of \$1,000.00 to the widow of every clergyman dying in active service immediately upon the event of his death, after which the widow's pension is paid regularly. Second, the pensions to the retired clergy have been gradually and steadily increased above the \$600.00 promised. On March 1, 1931, the Church Pension Fund found it possible to make a notable increase in the pensions of clergy retired on account of age. They have determined to increase the minimum retirement pension to clergymen ordained prior to 1917 from \$600.00 to \$1,000.00. This increase has been made possible by additional funds which the Church Pension Fund has received, but most of all on accounts of the wise and conservative management of its affairs. It is, of course, possible that conditions may change to such an extent as to require the Pension Fund to rescind its present action making \$1,000.00 the minimum, but we hope that this will not prove to be necessary. The fact of this material increase in pensions will be most gratifying to every one in the Diocese. It must be understood, however, that this increase has been made in the pensions of clergy retired on account of age and does not affect the pension of \$600.00 granted to a minister who becomes totally disabled prior to the age of sixty-eight.

But both of these benefits, the \$1,000.00 to the widow of a clergyman dying in active service and the increase above the \$600.00 promised, are, under the rules of the Fund, paid in those dioceses only in which every parish has paid the assessments on its minister's salary for the preceding year. If one parish refuses to pay throughout the whole year anything upon its assessment, no widow of a clergyman dying in that Diocese during the succeeding year would get the \$1,000.00 and no further increase could be made during the year in the pension of any retired clergyman. The situation in our Diocese in January, 1931, was that two parishes had failed to pay a cent upon the Pension Fund assessment for the preceding year, and the Secretary of the Church Pension Fund wrote to our committee stating that they had sufficient funds in hand to increase the pensions of three of our retired clergy from \$900.00 to \$1,000.00, but that under their rules they could not do so because of the failure of these two parishes to pay the Pension Fund assessment for the preceding year. Fortunately for us, when the matter was reported to the vestries of these two parishes, they promptly raised the money and sent in the Pension Fund assessment in full, whereupon the increase was granted to the three retired clergymen.

Our Diocese is constantly in danger of some such loss to a retired clergyman or to the widow of a clergyman through such neglect on the part of some parish. We would, therefore, as strongly as we can, urge the vestry of every parish to see that the Pension Fund assessments are paid at regular periods through the year and not permitted to accumulate until the end of the year.

We have ninety-four clergymen receiving salaries in this Diocese, the total amount of salaries being \$282,026.42, or an average salary of \$3,000.28. This, of course, includes the money value of rectories, making the average cash salary paid \$2,500.00.

During the year we have sent on to the Church Pension Fund the sum of \$6,198.26, the income of the Disabled Clergy Fund, and \$745.71, the income of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, making a total of \$6,943.97. This income has been used as follows: Three hundred dollars returned for the expenses of the Diocesan Committee, the Pension Fund assessments on all salaries paid by the Diocese and all appropriations to salary made by the Diocesan Missionary Society are paid therefrom, the remainder, amounting to somewhere between \$2,000.00 and \$3,000.00, is paid back as a rebate to the parishes which have paid the Pension Fund assessment in full for the preceding year.

The Pension Fund assessments on the \$282,026.00, total salaries of all of our clergy, amounts to \$21,151.98, the rebate received by the parishes being conservatively estimated to be \$2,151,98, shows that the net cost to the Diocese of Pension Fund assessments of all of our clergy is \$19,000.00, or perhaps slightly less. We are receiving from the Pension Fund in the form of pensions to retired clergy and to the widows and orphans of deceased clergy the sum at present of \$20,750.00. So that it is easy to see that the Diocese is receiving back considerably more than it is paying to the Church Pension Fund.

There has frequently been considerable misunderstanding on the part of many clergy as to ministers doing supply work and receiv-

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ing honorarium therefrom after retirement. It is generally understood that no minister can receive a retirement pension until he has definitely given up the charge of a parish, as obviously a minister should not receive a salary from a parish at the same time that he is receiving a retirement pension. But the question is often raised as to whether a minister receiving a retirement pension will be permitted to do supply work after retirement. In a letter from the Secretary of the Church Pension Fund about this matter the following statement is made: "The Trustees of the Church Pension Fund have placed this question in the hands of the Sub-Committee on Ecclesiastical Offices Held by Beneficiaries. They have laid down the general rule, which is really more in the nature of a guide, that a beneficiary's pension shall not be jeopardized if he does not perform services for more than one month at any one place. If a clergyman serves at any one church for more than a month, it is assumed that temporarily at least he has returned to active work, although the committee is always glad to consider the circumstances surrounding any individual case. If it appears that he has, in effect, returned to active work temporarily, it is a very simple matter to suspend the pension for the time being and resume it later when that work is given up. This, of course, does not interfere in any way with the incidental supply services which he may perform here and there, a few Sundays at a time."

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GENERAL ADVANCE WORK PROGRAM.

## To the One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Your Committee on the General Advance Work Program of the National Church and the work of St. Paul's Normal and Industrial School, Lawrenceville, begs to report as follows:

Due to the extraordinary year's depression, while a sum of \$20,-000.00 was asked for, we have not felt it was wise or expedient to push contributions for either of our projects during a year when the Diocese is having an unusually hard time to complete its budget. If we can be accused of inaction and lack of perseverance, we trust that it will be laid to the door of wanting to cooperate with the Diocese. First things must come first in this work as in all other.

So far we have received for St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, \$3,367.77, with an additional contribution of \$50.00 that did not come through the hands of the Treasurer. As St. Paul's needs a sum of \$10,000.00 by July 1st, in order that it might receive a large grant from the General Education Board, it is still hoped before that time that the hearts of many may be moved to contribute to this cause. As a matter of fact, your committee feels that the Diocese of Virginia should undertake in its budget from year to year some real item of support of this great work. This is the largest school in the Episcopal Church for any race and serves many inhabitants of our Diocese. It should rank in our sense of obligation along with our own Church schools and such an institution as the Blue Ridge Industrial School.

For the Advance Work project of completing the Church of the Resurrection, in Nishigin, Kyoto, Japan, we have received in cash \$2,284.80, with an additional pledge of \$1,000.00 not as yet paid, making a total for that project of \$3,284.80. The Rev. Mr. Morris spent a month in the Diocese and created a wonderful impression wherever he went. We feel sure that the people of our Diocese wish to complete this project. Consequently, we are asking the Council not to accept any more Advance Work until your committee feels that the effort in this direction is complete.

We have had some interesting experiences. In spite of the resolution of this body last year, giving us full cooperation, we have at times found a surprising ignorance as to what constitutes the Advance Work. One rector announced that he would mention that Mr. Morris was to speak, but he could not endorse a man he did not

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know, forgetting that the National Council and our own Diocese had endorsed Mr. Morris. However, in spite of our failure to complete the task, we feel that the sum of \$6,702.57 is not a bad sum of money for a year of depression.

Archdeacon W. Roy Mason presented the report of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge. (See Appendix A, III (e).)

Rev. George P. Mayo, D. D., reported two vacancies on the Board of Trustees of the Blue Ridge Industrial School and requested the Council to nominate Mr. Blake T. Newton, Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., Mr. Isaac Lewis and Mr. Buford Scott as four persons from whom the Board may elect two to fill these vacancies.

Mr. John M. Taylor reported three vacancies on the Board of Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia and requested the Council to nominate Rt. Rev. F. D. Goodwin, D. D., Messrs. O. Herbert Funsten, Alex. H. Robertson, John B. Welsh, Oliver J. Sands and Robert L. Brown as persons from among whom these vacancies may be filled.

The Secretary reported four vacancies on the Board of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia and requested the Council to nominate Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., Rev. Robert F. Gibson, Rev. C. W. Sheerin, Messrs. Julian H. Hill, C. Braxton Valentine, John B. Mordecai, J. Stewart Bryan, W. R. Trigg, Jr., C. S. Taylor Burke, Alexander W. Weddell and George Ross, Jr., as persons from whom the Board may elect members to fill these vacancies.

The Council on motion approved the nominations as presented above and the Secretary was instructed to report them to the respective Boards.

Dr. Berryman Green, as Chairman of the Special Committee appointed at the Council of 1929 to consider four proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, reported to this Diocese by the Secretary of the General Convention, stated that the Special Committee recommended the adoption by our Diocese of each of these four proposed amendments. The report of this Special Committee was on motion adopted, the proposed amendments being voted on severally and each one receiving a majority vote. (See Council Journal of 1929, pp. 32-34, for these amendments.)

Dr. Smith reported that the term of office of Mr. John B. Mordecai, one of the representatives elected by this Diocese on the Board of Trustees of Stuart Hall, would expire on June 30, 1931, and moved that Mr. Mordecai be re-elected to serve another term as trustee. The motion was carried.

The Secretary presented the following

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INVESTED FUNDS.

Your Committee on Invested Funds beg leave to report that it has reviewed the list of securities contained in the report of the certified public accountants as of December 31, 1930, and from the information obtainable, your committee is of the opinion that the funds are properly invested.

The Rev. Matthew B. Porter, Secretary of the South Atlantic Agency of the American Bible Society, being present, was invited to address the Council on the work of the Bible Society.

*Resolved*, That the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia do hereby express our deep interest in the work of the American Bible Society and commend it to all our people.

This resolution was adopted unanimously.

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Rev. R. Cary Montague, D. D., presented the following 'resolution:

Whereas, the Protestant Episcopal Church has always taken an enlightened and progressive stand in endeavoring to bring a more Christian spirit into industrial relations through the action of its General Convention and its Social Service Department; now, therefore, be it

*Resolved* by this Council, That it does hereby commend this position, and that it specifically urges support of efforts now being made to better the condition of women workers in factories by providing for a fifty-hour week and eliminating night work.

And we also commend the appointment of a new children's code commission.

This resolution was adopted.

Rev. A. C. Zabriskie presented the

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED LAST YEAR TO CONSIDER THE PROPOSED NEW CANON ON THE PLACEMENT OF THE CLERGY.

The special committee has received the proposed canonical changes bearing on the placement of clergy and approved it in principle. The committee deems it unwise for the Council to instruct its deputies to General Convention how to vote on this proposal. Therefore, it moves that this matter be referred to the deputies to General Convention with the request that they give it careful study.

Whereas, if they were found, would not coincide or be the same as the present boundary line between Rappahannock and Culpeper counties;

Therefore, we, the vestry of Bromfield Parish, duly assembled at a regular meeting, in order to establish a new boundary line that can be easily followed and known, do petition the Council of the Diocese of Virginia to establish the present boundary line between the counties of Rappahannock and Culpeper to be also the boundary line between Bromfield Parish in Rappahannock county and St. Mark's Parish in Culpeper county.

The Council then adjourned for luncheon.

## THURSDAY, MAY 21st-2:15 P. M.

Council convened, Bishop Tucker presiding.

Dr. Brydon presented the Statistician's report. (See Appendix C, III.)

Rev. Lewis C. Harrison moved that a committee of three be appointed to take under consideration the fact of loss of communicants reported as removed without transfer and so dropped from parish rolls. This motion was carried and the Bishop appointed as members of this committee Rev. G. Mac-Laren Brydon, D. D., Rev. Lewis C. Harrison and Rev. H. B. Peters.

Mr. Harrison moved that a committee of three be appointed by the Bishop to take under consideration the large amount of insurable property in this Diocese reported as being not covered by fire insurance with a view to calling to the attention of the parishes the great importance of having all church property fully insured. This motion was carried and the Chair appointed as members of this committee Rev. G. Mac-Laren Brydon, D. D., Colonel Joseph Button and Mr. W. P. Johnson.

Dr. B. D. Tucker presented the following resolution:

Be It Resolved, That on the occasion of the retirement of the Rev. Berryman Green, D. D., from the deanship of the Virginia Theological Seminary, after thirty years of service as professor and dean, the members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, in its annual session at St. Paul's Memorial Church, University, Virginia, express by a rising vote their affection for Dr. Green personally and their abiding sense of gratitude for the service that he has rendered to the Church in Virginia and throughout the country as professor and dean of the Seminary. This was adopted by a rising vote.

Rev. Robert F. Gibson, making further report from the Committee on Canons, presented the following amendment to Article II of the Constitution, with the recommendation of the Committee on Canons that it be adopted:

Be It Resolved, That in Article II of the Constitution the words in Section (a), "Provided further, that only such colored ministers shall be members as are hereinafter specified", be omitted. And further, be it

*Resolved*, That Section (c) of Article II of the Constitution be amended to read as follows: "Two lay delegates from the Colored Ministry Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is or may hereafter be constituted by Canon."

After discussion this amendment was adopted by an almost unanimous vote.

Dr. Brydon presented the

#### REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Registrar begs to report that during the past year he has continued as far as possible the effort to collect papers, records and books dealing with the Diocese of Virginia or the individual parishes.

The Council has, on more than one occasion, by resolution urged our parishes to send to the Registrar for safekeeping all parish registers and vestry books which are no longer required for the present operation of the parish. Under this resolution a number of parishes have sent to the Registrar their old vestry books and parish registers, the definite understanding being had that when so deposited with the Registrar, the parish books still belong to the parish and will be returned at any time upon demand of the vestry.

But there are still a much larger number of parishes which have not yet deposited their old parish records. There are very few of our country parishes which have their records complete back through the nineteenth century to the date of parish reorganization, the reason being that when a parish register or vestry book becomes filled up and a new one is secured, the old one very frequently has become misplaced and lost. It is of so great importance to the history of the Church that old parish records be preserved that every

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parish should be urged, as strongly as possible, to send its old parish registers and vestry books to the Registrar of the Diocese for safekeeping.

Another most important part of the Registrar's work has been the building up of an Historical Library of books and papers dealing with the history of Virginia and of the Church, and the collecting of records, newspaper articles and pamphlets dealing with the history of parishes. With no regular appropriation for this work, the Diocese has already secured in this library a most valuable collection of books and records. It is because we have now begun in earnest to collect such records that the Church finds itself now in a position where old misstatements about the Church and its clergy can be refuted and true facts given.

The library has been built up by the frequent small gifts of a group of devoted churchmen who recognize the importance of such a library. It is hoped that others, realizing the importance of this work, can be enlisted to help, by their gifts, in its development.

the Diocesan authorities he had been engaged in preparing a map of the Diocese showing the locations of the various churches and missions, stating that his work was nearing completion. It was moved that this map, after being satisfactorily completed, be published and distributed throughout the Diocese.

This motion was carried.

Archdeacon Neve addressed the Council on the work of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

Mr. Page presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Council hereby extend to the vestry and congregation of St. Paul's Memorial Church and the rector, vestry and congregation of Christ Church our hearty thanks and appreciation for the generous and delightful hospitality with which this Council has been entertained.

This resolution was adopted by a rising vote. A vote of thanks was extended to Miss Margaret Porter and the faculty of St. Anne's School for the reception tendered by the school to the members of the Council on yesterday afternoon.

The Council, by a rising vote, expressed its appreciation of Bishop Tucker's services as the presiding officer of the Council.

The minutes of the day's sessions were then read and approved.

After the singing of the hymn, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" and benediction by the Bishop, the Council adjourned sine die.

#### III. THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

(a) Report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

To the One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society begs to report that the financial transactions of the Society for the past year have been as follows:

This is the largest amount that the Diocesan Missionary Society has ever expended in our missionary work. The situation has continued throughout the year as was reported to the last Council, with practically every field filled, with fewer vacancies than we have ever known before, and these vacancies supplied by students from the Theological Seminary. For the past few years our Diocese has been more fully manned than we have ever known.

The publication of the Census of 1930 has enabled us to take some account of the growth of the Church in the past ten years and the figures prove exceedingly interesting. It will be remembered that the Nation-Wide Campaign began in the autumn of 1919, so that for the past ten years our Church in this Diocese has been moving forward under the continued impetus which originated in that campaign. A comparison of the census figures of 1920 with those of 1930 and the statistics of the Diocese as of January 1, 1921, and January 1, 1931, form a satisfactory basis of comparison between the growth of the Church and the population of the Diocese within these past ten years. The report of the Executive Committee to the Council in 1921 showed expenditures of \$39,902.77, whereas our expenditures for 1930 amount to \$78,205.05. There were then a total of sixty-six workers whose salaries were paid in whole or part by the Diocesan Missionary Society, whereas today we have over one hundred; in that year there were twenty-one vacant cures in the Diocese, today we have seven, of which three have secured ministers who will enter upon their duties within the next few months. The total population of the Diocese in 1920 was 699,071; the population in 1930 census was 731,889, a net gain of 32,818, or 4.12 per cent in crease. The communicants of the Diocese have increased from 16,638 to something over 20,100, or 20.8 per cent increase. It is cheering to note that the growth of communicants has been practically five times as great as the growth of the population.

Analyzing these figures into three groups, the six cities, the three suburban counties of Arlington, Fairfax and Henrico, and the thirtyfive rural counties, our figures are as follows: The population of the six cities has increased from 219,000 to 247,229, a net increase of 28,174, or 12.95 per cent increase; the communicants in the cities have grown from 6,849 to 8,727, a net increase of 1,878, or 27.42 per cent. The suburban counties have increased in population from

56,955 to 81,989, a net gain of 25,034, or 43.95 per cent, whereas our communicants have grown from 970 to 1,280, a net gain of 310, or 31.95 per cent. The thirty-five rural counties have decreased in population from 423,061 to 402,671, a net loss of 20,390, or 4.82 per cent decrease, whereas our communicants in these counties have grown from 8,819 to 10,093, a net gain of 1.274, or 13.31 per cent increase. These figures will justify further study, the most interesting fact for the purposes of this report being that in the rural counties, where the great bulk of the work of our Society is done, in spite of the distressing decrease of population, our communicants have actually increased by 13 per cent. May we not feel that this increasing strength and more efficient organization of our Church work in the rural counties but place us in a larger room and give us promise of increasingly wider opportunities of service in the years to come

It is a pleasure to report a special gift made for the benefit of the Mountain Missionary Work of our Diocese during the year 1930. Dr. William Cabell Rives, of Washington, gave to the Diocesan Missionary Society the sum of \$30,000.00 in Missouri State bonds to establish a foundation for mountain work. The income of this fund is paid to the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge over and above the appropriation made by the Diocese. Our missionary work is always so much greater than the funds which the Diocese can give from year to year will permit us to perform that such a generous gift as this is most deeply appreciated and will be exceedingly helpful. No one in the Diocese desires to have endowment funds established, either for the support of a parish or for our missionary work, which will take away from the living communicants the privilege and responsibility of supporting their own churches and of carrying on our missionary work, but there is always a great opportunity and need of endowments for special forms of work or special objects which may enable a parish or the Diocese to carry on a greater work than can be supported by the living communicants. The increase of such endowments is one of our hopes for the future.

The Council last year referred to the Executive Committee of our Society a minute from the Woman's Auxiliary asking that some method be devised for the pensioning of lay workers who have grown old in the mission work of the Diocese. Our committee has made a careful study of this matter and have determined to establish a fund which we hope will be augmented from time to time, out of the income of which such workers as may be approved by the Bishop and Missionary Society may receive old age or disability pension. The Woman's Auxiliary has established a nucleus of this fund for pensioning lay workers by the gift of \$200.00 which has been invested. We hope to increase the fund from time to time by special gifts

until the fund shall reach a suitable size to care for our needs. The Church Pension Fund provides pensions for all ordained ministers and for their widows, but there is no provision for the pensioning of aged lay workers. It is all the more important, therefore, that our own Diocese should establish and carry forward our plan for the pensioning of these faithful servants of the Church. The whole matter is commended to the people of the Diocese.

Bishop Goodwin, having been elected Bishop-Coadjutor, becomes an *ex-officio* member of the Board.

The Board has held four meetings, in June, October, January and April. The June meeting was a called meeting held immediately after the Executive Committee meeting for the purpose of organizing and electing supplementary members of the Board as given above. Rev. George P. Mayo, D. D., was re-elected Chairman and Rev. R. Cary Montague, D. D., re-elected Executive Secretary.

At the October meeting the Chairman was absent on account of illness and Rev. R. B. Nelson presided. A resolution was passed requesting the Executive Secretary to send letters to all the rural clergy giving the name of the drought relief officer in their respective towns and urging them to take an active part in cooperating in this work. At this meeting the office of Vice-Chairman was created and the Rev. Charles W. Sheerin elected to this position.

At the January meeting it was resolved that the deans of each Convocation be requested to appoint a Convocational Social Service Committee, and subsequently letters were sent by the Executive Secretary to the members of this Board urging them to present this matter at their respective Convocational meetings. Also at this meeting a request in the form of a resolution was made that the D. M. S. compile and keep on file information concerning our Diocesan institutions as to requisites for admission, names of members of Boards of Trustees, etc.

Bishop Goodwin, Rev. R. B. Nelson and Rev. Beverley D. Tucker were requested to arrange for the conference of rural ministers which was held in Richmond February 3d and 4th. It was a well attended and most helpful conference.

At the April meeting arrangements were made for the presentation of Social Service on Tuesday evening preceding the opening of the Diocesan Council, for which occasion Mr. Spencer Miller, of the National Board of Social Service, was secured as speaker. At this meeting the following resolution was passed: "Resolved, That the Chairman write to Dr. R. E. Blackwell, Chairman of the Virginia Commission on Interracial Cooperation, expressing the sentiment of the Board of Social Service as deprocating the proposed revival of the motion picture entitled 'The Birth of a Nation', and expressing our belief that the exhibition of the picture would be most unfortunate in arousing bitter racial feeling and injuring the good relations existing between the white and negro races in Virginia."

Representatives of the Board were appointed to attend the Child Welfare Conference soon to be called by the Governor to consider especially the subnormal child; and to attend the State Conference on Social Workers to be held in Alexandria in May. A committee consisting of Bishop Goodwin, Rev. Charles W. Sheerin and Rev. Robert B. Nelson were appointed to arrange for a conference on rural work next winter.

We are fortunate in having the services of the Rev. R. Cary Montague as Executive Secretary. The Board pays only the salary of his secretary. He is in position to serve the entire Diocese in the field of Social Service and is always ready to respond to the call of the clergy. His annual report to our Board is hereto attached as a part of our report to the Diocese.

An inquiring individual once asked what was meant by the petition in the Lord's Prayer, "Thy Kingdom Come, Thy will be done, On earth as it is in heaven", and the answer that was given by a resourceful person was this, "The best way I can illustrate it is that it would be like a benefit baseball game played between the teams of the Ku Klux Klan and the Knights of Columbus, with a negro umpire, for the benefit of Jewish relief".

This description does not greatly exaggerate the activities of the Board of Social Service of the Diocese of Virginia as carried on through the office of the Executive Secretary.

At the present time, and during the past year, we are arranging for a Jewish boy in a tuberculosis sanatorium to get a correspondence course to finish his high school education. We have paid the tuition (a very small sum) for a little colored girl to attend a Parochial Roman Catholic School. A young girl at God's Bible School and Missionary Training Home, a "Holiness" institution in Cincinnati, was brought home to spend the Christmas vacation with her family in Richmond. In November, we sent a young girl to the Baptist Mission School at Council. We are helping to support a little colored boy in the Piedmont Sanatorium, and paying for two boys at Blue Ridge Industrial School. This is merely a bird's-eye view of what goes on from day to day and year to year in this office.

Our statistical report as compared with last year shows smaller figures in some cases and larger in others. For instance, the hospital and institutional cases have decreased somewhat. This is probably due to the fact that bad tonsils are getting scarcer in the State, so that this type of case is not so often reported, either by rural clergy or county nurses.

On the other hand, the number of charity tickets and passes secured have increased considerably, and through the splendid cooperation of the railroads and bus lines, we have assisted worthy poor people to *travel* as far West as Longview, Washington, and Yale, Oklahoma, and to numerous intermediate points.

The doctors and hospitals, especially Sheltering Arms, Memorial, The Crippled Children's Hospital and The Retreat for the Sick, continue to give us the most splendid kind of cooperation in arranging for either free treatment or care at greatly reduced rates, so that the work of the Commission reaches from the mountains to Tidewater Virginia, and from the banks of the Potomac to the far southwestern portions of the State.

Heretofore there has been a considerable slacking of work during the summer months, but during 1930 the calls for advice and help in the solution of difficult social problems, securing hospital treatments and charity tickets and passes, continued throughout the entire year.

In spite of the fact that except for the small appropriation of \$600 from the Diocese, we have to depend entirely upon voluntary contributions, and have no certain source of income nor knowledge of where it will come from, we are able to pay all of our bills for 1930 and have a balance with which to start the year.

In concluding this brief report I must again express my thanks and appreciation of the efficient work of the Corresponding Secretary, Miss Byrd Warwick, whose services become continually more helpful by reason of her increased experience, so that during the past year she was able to handle the work of the office entirely alone for several weeks, while I was lecturing at a conference in North Carolina.

Again I wish to remind the members of the Board that it will be a pleasure to me to try to carry out any further program of service that they may wish to suggest.

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#### (d) REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

The year has been a varied one for the Diocesan Board of Religious Education in the active work done and the losses on our Board. The activities are reported in another place, and losses have been the passing to his reward of our Secretary, Dr. W. H. Burkhardt, and the resignation of the President, Rev. H. S. Osburn, in October, 1930, and the resignation of the Diocesan Secretary, Miss Monteiro, which will take effect August 31st.

The all-important task before the board in the near future is to find a successor to Miss Monteiro, who in the brief period of two years has brought the work of her office and field work in the Diocese to a high state of efficiency.

Next to the procuring of a full-time Secretary is the matter of providing a salary for this office which under Miss Monteiro's faithful and diligent efforts has proven itself necessary for the greater effectiveness of Religious Education in the Diocese. Unless the Council sees fit to include this item in the regular budget, it seems that the work cannot be continued.

The financial accounting of the Board will be found in the report of the Treasurer of the Diocese. The funds at our disposal were spent in the running of the office of Secretary, furnishing materials to churches and Sunday schools and putting on conferences both winter and summer. Over 500 persons attended the four summer schools, and, with the exception of Sweet Briar, most of them were from this Diocese. A few registrations were provided and a contribution was made to the Blue Mountain Conference at Frederick, Md., which is now the advanced Conference in the Province. Three members of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education are serving on the Board of Directors of the Blue Mountain Conference and for work of superintendents and higher grade teachers the attendance at this Conference is strongly recommended by this Board.

A thorough survey was made of the Religious Education work carried on in the Church Schools of the Diocese and proved most satisfactory.

A detailed account of the year's work having been mailed to each member of the Council, will be filed and not read at this time.

A Tentative Report of the Work of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education for the Year Ending May 20, 1931.

Chief Activities: During the past year the chief executives of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education have been holding summer conferences for Church workers; conducting small local institutes; extending the work of the Field Department; cooperating with the various Church organizations, especially those made up of young people and affiliating with the program of Religious Education of the National Council, the Provincial Board and the Virginia Council of Religious Education.

Board Meetings: Within the year four regular Board meetings have been held. The summer meeting was mainly taken up with planning last year's summer conferences. At the fall meeting Rev. B. D. Chambers was elected President of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education. Several new members were also added to the group. A committee was selected to serve with Rev. E. C. Pedrick in cooperating with the work done in Church Boarding and Day Schools, and young people's organizations. All members of the Board were much encouraged by hearing that their former President, Rev. H. S. Osburn, was steadily improving in health. The winter meeting was largely concerned with plans for carrying on the Field Department. An excellent report was presented by the Committee on Young People's Work. The first hour of the spring meeting was given to conferring with Rev. John W. Suter, Jr., Executive Secretary of the Department of Religious Education of the National Council. In this conference the selection of a Church School faculty and the principles back of the construction of a vital and growing curriculum for a Church School were the matters under discussion. As this was the first meeting of the Board since the death of their beloved Secretary, the late Rev. William H. Burkhardt, a message of sympathy was sent to his family.

Church Conferences, Summer 1930: A brief review of the conferences held last year would show that: Shrinemont had a most successful initial session, proving that it was filling a real need, and would be supported by the Valley Convocation, and an increasing number of friends throughout the Diocese. Sweetbriar provided an especially planned program for the Youth Division. Tappahannock was unusually well attended. The Girls' Friendly Society Conference at Greenwood was an inspiration to all who were there.

Local Institutes Field Work: Twelve small institutes have been arranged for and put on by the field office. It was also possible to hold a larger institute in Richmond during October, when it was possible to secure Miss Mabel Lee Cooper as a leader. Miss Cooper is in charge of the Teacher Training Department of the National Council, Her visit did much to create interest in the Credit Training classes given later in the fall. The Field Secretary has made eighty visits since September first. These were made to seventy different Church centers. As far as possible these visits were made

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at the time of the Church School session, or during the meeting of some Church organization.

Diocesan Institute Lenten Program: The field office affiliated with the committee in charge of the Diocesan Institute of the Woman's Auxiliary, in inviting speakers and planning and sending out programs. As the purpose of this institute is to promote Missionary Education, this opportunits was taken to plan the Lenten Program of the Church Schools; and also to discuss Missionary Education, and its place on the regular curriculum. A representative group of Church School workers gathered in conference with Miss Lily Cheston, Secretary of Missionary Activities under the National Council. The effects of this conference have been most evident in the high type of Missionary Education arranged by many of the Church Schools in the Diocese. Posters, essays, pageants, stories and maps have been in constant use. The children's response has been most splendid and gratifying. In Richmond the Church Schools closed their program with a joint presentation service and pageant in which almost every school in the city had a part.

Special Mention: Ever since the field office has been opened, several other larger offices with a common aim have extended much kindly aid. This has been particularly true of the Diocese of Pittsburgh, which has graciously lent Miss Evelyn Buchanan, Director of Religious Education, for several most valuable pieces of conference work; the Diocese of Pennsylvania, which is known to this work chiefly through the kindly interest and assistance of Rev. Frederick Seymour, Director of Religious Education; and the Virginia Council of Religious Education, represented by Rev. Minor C. Miller, who is unfailing in his efforts to further unity of purpose in the religious work attempted in this State, and has been most gracious to the needs of this new field work.

There is also a small group of full-time workers in the field of Religious Education, some located in Richmond and a few scattered throughout the Diocese, who assume any amount of hard work necessary to furthering the projects attempted by the field office, regardless of how heavy their own work may be. The Board of Religious Education would like to take this opportunity of acknowledging the service they are rendering and thanking them.

No account of our work would be complete without mention of the unfailing cooperation of the members of the Colored Convocation. Much of their work has been visited this year. They have shared in the institutes, study classes and services, and have been an inspiration to the whole group in their willingness to fit in. Their special institute is being planned for late July. This will be in West

Point. All members of their Convocation, who live near enough to attend, will be invited to do so.

#### Report of Archdeacon Neve.

#### My DEAR BISHOP:

The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, being administered by Archdeacon Mason, than whom no one could be better qualified to carry it on, I will leave that part of our report to him and confine myself to a few general considerations.

The coordination of the whole field has been considerably developed during the past year.

The custom of holding not only an annual workers' Conference, but a semi-annual Quiet Day, at one or other of our mission points, has had very valuable results, chiefly in enabling the workers to realize the unity of the work and in giving many of the people the opportunity to come together, as well, and realize that they too have a part to play and duties to perform, in order to make the work a success.

I have never known the Archdeaconry to be in such an efficient and hopeful condition, as it is at present, in spite of the temporarily impoverished condition of many of the people and the loss sustained by the burning of the Preventorium. These have been but temporary setbacks and already the way has been opened for greater things in the future.

We have all been much concerned by your recent illness, but trust you may soon be restored to your former health and strength.

So far as my own particular part in the work is concerned, I am glad to help out, by holding services as the need for them arises, and I am doing what I can to keep in touch with many friends of the work, by correspondence and enlisting their financial help and cooperation.

Report of Archdeacon Mason to the Diocesan Council. To the Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D., Bishop of Virginia: My DEAR BISHOP:

I believe that comparatively few people know either the extent

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of the mountain work of our Diocese or the many opportunities waiting our early consideration. Our work at present has the same number of stations, nearly as many clergy, and nearly as many communicnts as the District of Alaska; yet we receive nothing from the General Church except the salaries of our two United Thank Offering workers; and from the Diocese only enough for the salaries of our clergy and a little more than half our women workers. We must get from some source about twenty thousand dollars a year for the remaining salaries and for upkeep and building projects. This is a hard matter when many, in fact, nearly all, doors are closed to the asking for "specials". Added to this, in the past year we have had to spend several thousand dollars to keep the wolf from the doors of many of our people, because of the drought of last summer. Also the destruction of the Preventorium by fire on December 2d came as a blow. These things came in a year of depression, yet we were able to close the year with a balance. This, of course, was made possible by the loyalty and devotion of the friends of the work.

The beautiful church at St. John's is completed and awaits the arrival of the donor and the Bishop for the service of dedication. It has been greatly admired by many visitors and is a fine example of the efficient work of our mountain men. Our work has been both strengthened and beautified in recent years by these substantial memorials given by interested friends, built of native rock by our own native men.

This has been, in spite of the drought, the depression and the harm done by unfortunate publicity, the best year we have ever had; there have been more people added to the Church, there has been a better spirit among the workers, greater interest manifested both from outside by the friends of the work and from inside by our own people. I baptized in one month last summer a hundred persons and presented eighty for confirmation. This does not include those baptized and presented by the clergy of the Archdeaconry where there are clergy in charge. I attribute the spirit of cooperation among the workers to:

First. The fine quality of the workers themselves.

Second. To our annual Workers' Conference and our two Quiet Days each year.

Third. To the fine spirit of cooperation among our clergy.

Many opportunities are knocking at our door and we are wondering when we will be able to answer these calls and dare to go forward. It is interesting to note that both the missions, which were closed in the past two years, have been opened by request and petitions of the people themselves and the deep interest manifested seems to have justified our venture of faith in the reopening of

these places. The new work at Ingham also seems to be doing splendidly and we feel that here, too, the forward step has been justified. We need very badly:

First. A pension fund for our lay missionaries.

And the state of the second

Second. Funds available for better salaries for our workers, and for the opening of new work.

Third. Visitations by our officials and leading men of the Diocese, that they may be better informed about this great endeavor and in a position to give out with accuracy and pride this information to all who may inquire.

#### IV. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

. To the Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, D. D., President ex-officio: The Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary presents the following report:

In making the report of the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, including that of its departments, the Juniors and the Little Helpers, it seems best, while confining the financial report to the year 1930, to bring the record of our activities up to the present time.

To the Woman's Auxiliary and Section B we have added twelve new branches. Of these, four are found in the churches at Mineral, Purcellville, Rio and White Chapel in Lancaster county; three are in chapels in the mountains, Standardsville, Blackwell's Hollow and Simmons' Gap; and five are branches of young women, the Sections B at Warsaw, Hanover, Front Royal, Christ Church, Middlesex and St. Philip's Church, Richmond; the last named being a branch of young colored women.

Our aim is to have the Woman's Auxiliary at work in every church and chapel in the Diocese. At present we have branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in one hundred and twenty-six white churches and in ten colored churches; and in twenty-nine white churches and one colored church we have also a Section B, or branch of young women.

The number of churches in Virginia to which a share of the Diocesan apportionment is assigned is one hundred and seventy-eight. We would suggest to the fifty-two churches and missions in which the Woman's Auxiliary is not organized, that even a small group of women, whose business it was to create an interest in the program of the National Church and of the Diocese, and to work for it, might prove a real help to each one of them in meeting its apportionment.

Our Educational Department has been active, studying last autumn "Our Expanding Church", and conducting study classes, reading circles, and Bible classes during the winter and spring. The programs for monthly meetings of the parish branches have been of real value, and have been widely used. These programs make it possible for an untrained leader to have a meeting that will be educational as well as spiritually helpful; and their use is by no means confined to untrained leaders. The Diocesan Institute, which is held every winter in Richmond, has grown until it is now attended by women from all over the Diocese; and it is impossible to measure the help that is given to the parishes by these days of intensive training for their workers.

Owing to the drought and financial depression our Supply Department undertook the year's missionary boxes with some uneasiness, fearing that the pressing local needs, which had to be met, would make the Auxiliary women feel unable to work as usual for the missions and schools. But the report of the Supply Secretary shows that, instead of doing less, the women did twenty per cent more than last year. To quote from Mrs. Cardwell's report: "The need has been very great and urgent, and the response has been enthusiastic and generous."

Our thoughts are now turning to the Triennial at Denver, and to the United Thank Offering which will be presented there. For this Triennium the aim of the Virginia Branch has been, "More Women Giving to the United Thank Offering". And an earnest effort is being made to give to every woman in the Diocese an opportunity to share in this gift which transmutes our thankfulness into world-wide service.

There is at the present time a strong movement in the Province of Washington to enlist the younger women for missionary work through the Woman's Auxiliary: and Miss Sallie Deane, of this Diocese, has been called to lead this movement in the Province. The movement is not new in Virginia. Our first "Section B" was formed in 1914; and our branches of young women have been under the guidance of a special Diocesan officer, Mrs. E. L. Woodward. She and Miss Deane are now rejoicing in their five new branches; and they are hoping for many more.

The Junior Auxiliary, too, is enrolling new branches, seven of them; and its financial report shows a healthy growth. In the summer of 1930 the Juniors had a Conference at Orkney, which was so well attended, and proved so helpful that it is to be repeated this summer

The resignation of Mrs. E. S. W. Howard, who for many years had charge of our Little Helpers, and who was one of the most valua-

ble Diocesan officers, has been much regretted. Bishop Tucker has appointed Mrs. William Beverley, of Winchester, as Secretary of the Little Helpers; and we bespeak for her the support and assistance of the Auxiliary women of the Diocese. It is through them that her work for the children must be done.

Through the Branch for Isolated Churchwomen, we bring the opportunity for service to many of those who, through sickness or distance from a church building, are cut off from the work they would love to do. The Secretary of this Branch, Miss Pickett Waller. Widewater, Va., begs that the names of such isolated women be sent to her.

The Publicity Department of the National Council is asking the Woman's Auxiliary to help to extend the circulation of The Spirit of Missions. The goal set is 50,000 subscribers before Denver. If every Auxiliary does its part, the goal will be reached.

One of the questions on the report blanks sent to the branches was, "Is the spiritual life of your branch growing"? Such growth is difficult to measure both in parish and Diocesan branches; but we believe that we see its proofs in an increasing emphasis upon the devotional life, in a greater interest in the Program of the Church, and in larger gifts of time and money.

In closing this report, I would bear grateful witness to the work of the Diocesan officers. While their President has been disabled they have carried her responsibilities as well as their own. They have organized new branches, strengthened weak ones, trained leaders and conducted meetings in all parts of the Diocese; and to their efforts we owe a most successful year.

#### V. CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

#### (a) REPORT OF CHRISTCHURCH SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia: SIRS:

I herewith submit the report of Christchurch School for the session of 1930-1931.

The enrollment this session was somewhat reduced by the unfortunate conditions prevailing in the business world; consequently we are facing a small deficit for the session closing in June.

Boarders, 73; day, 9-82.

Faculty: Men, 8; women, 2.

Staff: Men, 1; women, 2.

Otherwise the year has been a most satisfactory one. The health of the school has been remarkably fine. We were mercifully saved from the wave of sickness that swept over other sections. We had only three cases of chickenpox and two of measles to mar an otherwise well-nigh perfect record.

In spite of the drought, our artesian well supplied us with water bountifully.

Prominent speakers have come to us from many sections and brought us valuable information on a wide range of subjects.

The regular religious instruction of the class room has been augmented by Bible talks on Sunday night, illustrated by the stereopticon. A friend has just given the school a full set of fifteen hundred slides on the Old Testament and it is hoped a similar set on the New Testament will be provided for use next session.

The late Langbourne M. Williams last summer added to his many benefactions to the school, a commodious and attractive recreation hall. In this building the boys gather in their leisure hours and on Saturday nights we have motion pictures, made possible through the generous gift of a splendid equipment by another friend.

Several years ago the late Langbourne M. Williams, established prizes for the best essay on General Robert E. Lee, General Thomas J. Jackson and Bishop Meade. He also gave annually an American flag to be used through the session by the school and at finals to be presented to the most outstanding member of the graduating class. We are happy to state that these prizes will be continued by Mr. Langbourne M. Williams, Jr., of New York, in memory of his father. We are particularly glad to have the name of our generous benefactor so appropriately connected with our school life.

The school has continued the Thomas Locke Rust Memorial Scholarship at the Blue Ridge Industrial School.

Added to our transportation facilities we are glad to report that a very fine bus line has just been established between Norfolk and Baltimore and three buses daily pass near the school going to those cities.

As we close our tenth session and reflect that in these few years the school has grown from a beginning of twelve boarders, gathered in one small frame house, to our present number with five brick buildings of beautiful design and with the most modern equipment, representing an appraisement of \$210,000, we thank God and take courage.

#### (b) REPORT OF ST. ANNE'S SCHOOL, CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA.

A hundred per cent increase in the Day School enrollment at St. Anne's gives us encouragement. The year 1929-1930 opened with a total enrollment of thirty-nine. This year we have fifty-two in the Day School and eighteen boarders, a total of seventy. Present indications are that we shall close the year with no deficit for salaries or for running expenses and we shall have a small surplus to put into much needed desks and chairs for our class rooms.

Interest in the college preparatory work is growing. This is especially noticeable in the two lower grades of the high school and perhaps 75 per cent of all inquiries are in regard to college preparations.

The emphasis at St. Anne's is on scholarship, yet we do not neglect these extra-curricular activities which help to build a better school. Athletics and outdoor recreation form an important part of the program every afternoon. This year we added a hockey field at small expense, thanks to the ingenuity of Mr. Mason, and next year we shall expand the gymnastic program to include floor work, etc.

School spirit is also growing through better organization among the students themselves. A monitor system takes almost entire charge of the upper school study halls. Interest in the community has been demonstrated by gifts to the Red Cross, the new Preventorium and in other ways.

The alumni, in its desire to further the interests of the school,

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has raised the amount necessary to offer a \$100.00 scholarship for next year, the candidate to be chosen by a competitive examination to be held at the school next Saturday, May 23d.

Recently we have received a very beautiful gift of bronze lights for the chapel as a memorial to Lois Walker Quarles, who was a student at St. Anne's from 1919 to 1925. This memorial is given by her father, Mr. C. B. Walker, of South Orange, N. J.

We are grateful to Mr. Powell, Mr. Mason and Mr. Gibson for their frequent Wednesday morning chapel services. Mr. Powell's going is indeed a loss to St. Anne's.

The loyalty and appreciation of the people of Charlottesville are helping us greatly at St. Anne's, and I wish to express in this report my deep gratitude to them. Our thanks are also due Dr. Brydon and Mr. Sands for prompt emergency aid when we call for it. We all hope that the future will justify their faith.

#### (c) REPORT OF ST. CATHERINE'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The report of St. Catherine's School, handed in to the Council last year, contained a full account of the development of the school during the ten years in which it has been a part of the Diocesan System of Church Schools.

There is not much to add this year. In spite of the general depression the enrollment has been practically the same. Two hundred and ninety enrolled this year as compared with 292 last year; seventy boarders as against sixty-eight last year. There has been a slight increase in the Boarding School, in the Upper School and in the Middle School. The decrease, as was natural and to be expected, was in the Lower School. The standards of the school, both academically and recreationally, have been maintained. The new brick dormitory, a unit of the Central Building completed last fall, relieved the congestion, and has been greatly enjoyed as a residence by the Senior Class, the first floor serving as a study hall for the Upper School. Perhaps the outstanding feature of the year has been the increased ability on the part of the girls to work together for the best interests of the school.

St. Catherine's School joins with St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, and St. Christopher's School, in hoping that the Council will meet next year in Richmond at St. Stephen's Church. We should like to have the pleasure of entertaining the members of the Council on that occasion. Louisa DEB. Bacor.

(d) REPORT OF ST. CHRISTOPHER'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia: SIRS:

I beg to submit the following report of St. Christopher's School for the session of 1930-1931, being the twentieth in its history and the eleventh under Church ownership:

1. Enrolment: A. Total enrollment of pupils, 254: Boarding pupils (including four transients), 53; day pupils, 201. Upper School pupils, 179; Lower School pupils, 75. B. Faculty members, 19: Men teachers, 13; women teachers, 6. C. House stay, 5: Matrons, 3; housekeeper, 1; resident nurse, 1. D. Executive staff, 2: Treasurer and bookkeeper, 1; secretary, 1.

2. *Health*: The health of the school generally has been good throughout the session.

3. Work: The regular work of the school has been of a satisfactory character.

4. The Faculty and House Staff: At the close of the session we shall lose one of the nineteen members of our present faculty. The religious affiliation of the members of the faculty and of the house staff and executive staff this session is as follows: Protestant Episcopal, 14: Baptist, 6: Presbyterian, 4: Methodist, 2.

5. Religious Affiliation of Pupils: a. Protestant Episcopal, 66 per cent; b. Other churches, 34 per cent.

6. Graduating Class: At the close on the session, on June 11th, a class of eleven will be graduated.

7. Finances for the Session: While it is impossible for me at this day (May 19th) to give exact figures for the session, it is my belief and that of the School Treasurer that the books of the school on June 30th, the closing day of our financial year, will show a net credit income of at least \$4,000.00.

8. Scholarships: Reductions from the rates made by the school and scholarships established by friends of the school, together amounting to \$13,534.72, are this year being given through the school toward the education of the youth of Virginia and the Church.

9. Enrollment: Last session we had total enrollment of 254 boys. Our enrollment this year to date is 254.

10. A Suggestion: It is once more offered as a suggestion that individual parishes in the Diocese, following the lead of St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, found at the school parish scholarships, reserving to themselves the right of presentation. By such action the parish would benefit, and the school—the property of the Church and one of its working organizations—would be strengthened.

11. Religion: St. Christopher's School is a Church institution; in every department of the school's life, therefore, the fundamental

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importance of religion is recognized. The first exercise of every school day is a short divine service, in which every boy takes an active part; and before athletic events the boys of the whole school kneel together in prayer to ask God's blessing upon those who are about to represent them in the contest. In addition to these religious services, regular instruction in religion is provided for in graded courses, every boy being required to take two periods a week in the religious studies of his form.

Furthermore, recognizing the futility of trying by means of religious exercises and studies alone to inculcate a religious spirit, the school management endeavors to awaken that spirit in the boys, and to foster it when awakened, by presenting to them definite opportunities of work for others.

Among the opportunities that have come to the boys of St. Christopher's this year are the following: The Red Cross Membership Campaign, the Anti-Tuberculosis Christmas Seals Drive, and direct appeals for funds to aid various schools, orphanages, mountain missions and the like. Answering these appeals, the school will, by the end of the session, have collected and distributed through its Missionary Societies and other agencies sums amounting in the aggregate to over \$700.00.

12. The Bishop's Visitation: On Sunday, April 26, 1931, Bishop Tucker confirmed six of the pupils of St. Christopher's, of whom four were members of the Boarding Department.

13. The Outlook for the Session of 1931-1932: Prospects for next year are good. We are anticipating the loss by graduation and withdrawals of about the usual percentage of the student bodies, while inquiries with regard to next year are coming in in encouraging numbers.

14. Further information in regard to the character and work of St. Christopher's can be found in the school catalogue and in the other printed publications of the school.

#### (e) REPORT OF ST. MARGARET'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishops and Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The tenth session of St. Margaret's School is now drawing to a close, with seventy girls in residence and nineteen day pupils. The school can care for so many girls only by crowding as much as possible and by renting rooms outside for some of the teachers.

The headmistress is assisted by a faculty of ten, including eight full-time and two part-time teachers, and by a staff of four, including a secretary, a housekeeper, a nurse who also functions as house mother, and a bursar who is at the school one day a week.

#### Report of St. Agnes' School

The personnel of the school has grown more satisfactory each year. The girls usually stay long enough to get the spirit of the school and the training which it affords, and most of the new students come through parents or friends of girls who have been in the school. It is a pleasure to speak of the efficiency of the faculty and staff and their devotion to the school and its best interests.

Last summer the buildings of St. Margaret's were painted, inside and outside, and it would be hard to exaggerate the pleasure which this renovation has given to girls and teachers. The glistening white buildings are beautifully set in their trees by the river and the fresh walls inside make every room more attractive.

The session has been a good one in regard to health and discipline. There has been no serious illness and now for months the infirmary has been empty the greater part of the time. The President of the Student Council, elected by the girls themselves, is an upright, fearless girl, who has had great influence in maintaining among her fellow-students high standards of conduct and responsibility.

St. Margaret's is accredited by the Virginia State Board of Education and its graduates without examination have entered Goucher, Westhampton, William and Mary, and Hollins.

The courses of religious instruction are very carefully planned and two full class periods a week are required. Examinations are held as in all other subjects. These classes attempt to instruct the girls and make them see the reasonableness of religion. The Church services and family prayers offer an entirely different approach, while branches of the Junior Auxiliary and Section B within the school provide a chance for practical work. Thirteen St. Margaret's girls were confirmed in March.

St. Agnes' School is happy to report a year of quiet, steady progress and prosperity. The total enrollment of scholars was 120, an increase of 10. There will be 5 graduates on June 1st, when the Rev. ZeBarney Phillips, D. D., of Washington, will give the address. The curriculum and student activities have been successfully carried out and the financial situation is slightly improved. Bishop Goodwin and the Rev. Paul D. Bowden, of Warrenton, have been added to the Board of Trustees and an Alumnae Association has been organized. Visitors and inquiries are always cordially welcomed by Miss Chapman, Principal.

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## VII. REPORT OF THE BLUE RIDGE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR 1930.

*Employees*: Total, 23; 6 men, 17 women. Superintendent; teachers, 11; teacher and house mother; nurse; house mother and bookkeeper; handicraft teacher; house mothers, 2; man in charge of younger boys; secretary; matron; farm manager; shop foreman.

Students: Boarding Department—Total, 182; boys, 72; girls, 110. Day School—Total, 26; boys, 16; girls, 10. In the High School— Total, 73; boys, 22; girls, 51. Total number of pupils enrolled, 208.

In its academic work the school has followed the regular State Course of Study, emphasis being given to such vocational courses as agriculture and home economics.

In June, 1930, there was a graduating class of 15, 12 girls and 3 boys. Still another girl received a diploma in September, after the completion of the Summer Course. The total number of graduates at present is 64, 16 of these being boys and 48 girls.

All girls are required to take a two-year course in home economics. The first year includes Home Nursing, Home Management, Cooking and Sewing. The second year includes Advanced Home Nursing, Dietetics, Cooking and Sewing.

The aim of this course is to teach a girl that the home is the center of life; to teach the principles of helpful living for herself, her family and her community. She must learn how to select, propare and use proper food and clothing, and must understand the vanitation of the dwelling, the care of food and of clothing in their relation to health.

A four-year course is given in agriculture. All boys in the first and second-year high school are required to take agriculture, and those in the third and fourth years may take agriculture or the commercial course. The course embraces class-rooms, laboratory, prolect and shop work. The aim is to carry the class-room instruction through the "step" application.

Participation in the routine work of the school presents a twofold opportunity to the pupils. Through the system of credit offered for work, they may greatly reduce their expenses and by the performance of varied duties done under careful supervision, they gain practical experience and demonstrate the theories learned in the classroom. During the past year pupils have done their share of such work as cooking, house-cleaning, laundering, sewing, farming, gardening, fruit-growing, caring for the campus, cutting and hauling of fuel, painting, repairing buildings, and equipment, hauling, etc. All pupils over fourteen years of age are allowed pay for such work, the rate varying according to the age and ability of the pupil. During the year the value of such work exceeded \$3,000.00. Régular Sunday services, with a celebration of the Holy Communion once or twice a month, and special services during Lent were held. In April a class of 19 boys and girls was confirmed.

Both the Woman's Auxiliary and the Junior Auxiliary have continued their work through the year. They have sent delegates to Convocational and Diocesan meetings and made regular contributions to the work of the Church. The Girls' Friendly has had a successful year and has done much to develop a spirit of helpfulness among the girls. On Sunday evenings the young people have held regular meetings of their own conducted by a committee of students. At Easter the large offering made, \$120.86, by the pupils and teachers testified to their interest in the Church's mission work. Total contribution to missions and charities, \$430.00.

#### FARM, ORCHARD AND CANNERY.

These industries suffered severely from the drought. It accounts for the loss of \$2,150.78 during the year as compared with a profit of \$3,361.51 in 1929.

This year the total value of all fruit harvested was \$250.00 as compared with an average value of about \$4,000.00 in a normal season. The output of the cannery was only \$85.00 as compared with an average of \$900.00. For the first time we have had to buy canned goods.

The school supplies a market for all the farm produce, the output of the cannery, and about one-third of the fruit.

#### BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT.

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The weather, while hard on crops, was good for building, and we took full advantage of it.

Work on the chapel was advanced rapidly until July 1st, when all the workmen had to be transferred to other projects more urgently needed. A part of the third story in Mayo Hall was finished as a dormitory for sixteen older girls; a rock dormitory for older boys was built with capacity for eighteen boys and one teacher. Low Hall, the old dormitory for boys, was completely overhauled, housekeeping apartment for the principal arranged, new floors laid and entire interior painted. A laundry was built and equipment will be installed during the summer of 1931. Arrangements were perfected with the Madison Power Company for extending their line to the school from Stanardsville, a distance of eight miles. This necessitated overhauling and rebuilding most of the wiring. Richards Hall, a four-room cottage formerly used as a girls' dormitory, was overhauled, painted inside and out, and rented to the Superintendent.

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A small cottage on the recently acquired Roach property was renovated, made into a very comfortable home and rented to one of the farm men. A playhouse was built for the little boys. A second room was added to the handcraft shop.

#### COST OF OPERATION.

During the year we had an average of 145 pupils in residence every day of the year. The total cost of the operation of the school was \$34,117.23, or about \$235.00 per pupil. This is \$35.00 less per pupil than in 1929. This decrease is due to an increase of 40 in the boarding pupils, which goes to show that the more pupils we have the lower is the per capita cost. More dormitories would greatly increase the usefulness of the school. This low cost of operation is due to the fact that no servants are employed—all routine work being done by the pupils—the reduction of overhead cost to the minimum, close buying, prompt payment of bills, but mainly to the sacrifice of the women workers who place service above salary.

#### II. REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

#### To the Finance Committee, Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia.

Gentlemen:

We have made our annual audit of the records and accounts of administration of the Diocesan Funds as kept by Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, Treasurer, for the year ended December 31, 1930.

From the audited accounts we have prepared and submit herewith sundry statements of receipts and disbursements affecting the various funds.

Exhibit "A," it will be noted, is a summary of all the separate accounts. It reflects at a glance the "cash" standing of each fund at the end of the year, and the net condition of the Treasurer's General Account, which, at December 31st, carried a net balance of \$1,582.21 in current funds, made up of the balances and overdrafts of the several funds, as indicated in the last column of Exhibit "A."

The Bishop's Contingent Fund, Exhibit "B," shows a balance of \$2,518.35. Of this, \$1,200.00 is already appropriated to the Episcopal Fund and \$1,000.00 is reserved to pay expenses of delegates to the 1931 general convention; \$318.35 remained undistributed.

The Diocesan Missionary Fund, Exhibit "C," at the end of the year reflected cash of \$2,397.43, which arose from the following conditions:

Of the \$5,100.00 realized from maturity of investment securities, the Tressurer was able to re-invest only \$3,000.00 in securities acceptable to the Investment Committee. Consequently, at December 31st the remaining \$2,100.00, together with a gift of \$200.00 from the Woman's Auxiliary, was found in a savings account at First and Merchants National Bank; \$97.43 therefore was undistributed.

The Diocesan Missionary Fund No. 2, Exhibit "D," was shown to be overdrawn by \$1,182.61, which was reflected in various individual accounts under that heading as follows:

#### III. REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE BOARD OF APPORTIONMENT.

To the Finance Committee, Diocese of Virginia,

Richmond, Virginia.

Gentlemen:

We have made our regular audit of the records of receipts and disbursements of the current funds of the Diocesan Program under administration of the Board of Apportionment, Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia, for the year 1930.

In order to show the source and amount and objects to which the funds were applied, we have prepared from the audited accounts the accompanying statements, indexed as Exhibits "A" and "B."

Exhibit "A"—General Statement of Receipts and Disbursements—Diocesan Program by Months—Comparative 1930 and 1929.

This statement reflects only the amounts by months handled through the Treasurer's office during the year 1930 in comparison with the year 1929. So far as we could ascertain from the Board minutes and other records, all funds coming to the Treasurer's hands were faithfully applied to the designated objects.

Exhibit "B"—Comparative Statement of Receipts and Disbursements of Appropriations for Diocesan Program—1930 and 1929.

This is a more complete statement as to source and object of the Program funds, and shows the two years in comparison.

It will be noted that for the year 1930 the total amount involved was \$204,440.40, of which \$1,569.12 was remitted by individuals direct to the General Church Treasurer in New York, and reported back to the credit of this Diocese; \$906.33 also included in the total was the unapplied balance of 1929. Temporary borrowings from bank during the year amounted to \$17,500.00 at an interest cost of \$128.40. So that after taking these exceptions into account, the actual total received and applied to the Program and other purposes was \$184,464.95.

During the year of 1930 \$10,068.75 was applied to the Diocesan debt, which, at the beginning of the year was \$21,400.00 (principal notes). Of the \$10,068.75 applied, \$9,000.00 curtailed the principal and \$1,068.75 paid up interest.

The outstanding debt as at the close of the period treated in this report was \$12,400.00, entailing interest of \$744.00 annually.

The General Church quota of \$47,700.00 accepted by the Diocese was fully covered by aid of special gifts of \$7,642.36 from individual donors. Respectfully submitted,

\$713.00 belonged to the Dooley Fund as at December 31st, but was closed about May 1, 1931. The balance, therefore, belonging to the general funds-Income account-was \$136.70. The balance of uninvested cash in the principal account was \$25,420.00.

Exhibit "B" is in support of Exhibit "A," and shows the details of receipts and disbursements for account of the individual funds. The details of the Dooley Fund are also included in these exhibits.

Exhibits "C" and "D" reflect the receipts and disbursements for account of the Disabled Clergy and the Widows' and Orphans' Funds for the year 1930. While the principal funds of these two accounts appear in these statements to have been invested up to a close margin as at December 31, 1930, there was, however, an approximate average of \$10,000.00 idle for the entire year in the Disabled Clergy Fund.

The Treasurer states that this was due to difficulty in finding investment securities acceptable to the Committee, and the same explanation applies to idle funds standing in the principal accounts of the general and the Dooley Funds. The uninvested cash in the Dooley Fund at the end of the year was \$39,238.96. The average of uninvested cash in this fund for the whole year was approximately \$30,000.00.

Exhibits "E," "F" and "G" relate entirely to the principal values held in trust for the various funds-all summarized from Exhibits "E" and "F," as follows:

#### COMMENTS RESPECTING RECEIPTS-GENERAL FUND.

Total recorded receipts of the general fund amounted to \$57,032.71, or \$5,578.62 in excess of general fund disbursements. The following comments are made with respect to the several classifications of these receipts shown in Exhibit A:

## Diocesan Treasurer—Salaries, \$15,000.00: Diocesan Treasurer—Services, \$3,200.08:

The Treasurer of the Diocese of Virginia allowed to the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge the sum of \$15,000.00 for salaries and \$3,200.08 for special services. The total expenditures for the above purposes were \$291.18 in excess of the amount allowed.

#### St. John the Baptist Chapel-\$11,000.00:

This amount was donated by Mrs. Thomas Fleming, Pasadena, California. During 1930 \$6,482.27 of this amount was spent on construction of the chapel.

### Preventorium Fire Insurance—\$4,400.00: Preventorium Building—\$5,322.22:

In December, 1930, St. Anne's Preventorium was destroyed by fire and insurance in the amount of \$4,400.00 was collected. Donations amounting to \$5,322.22 were recorded as received from sundry churches, societies and individuals for the construction of a new Preventorium.

#### Building and Improvements-\$1,126.37:

Contributions from various sources were made during the year for specific missions and for general and particular improvements, and were expended for the purpose indicated.

#### Stanardsville Rectory-\$771.97:

The above amount consisted of donations from various sources for the improvement of the rectory at Standardsville. The cost of this work at December 21, 1930, amounted to \$1,225.47.

#### Maintenance of Preventorium-\$3,000.00:

This amount was contributed toward the support of the Preventorium and has been invested in certificates of deposit.

#### Relief Work-\$2,123.82:

The sum of \$2,123.82 was received from various sources for drought relief work in this section of Virginia.

# COMMENTS RESPECTING DISBURSEMENTS-GENERAL FUND.

Total general fund disbursements during 1930 amounted to \$51,454.09 and were made by checks signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by the Archdeacon or Associate Archdeacon. Except for the examination of cancelled checks returned by the paying bank, expenditures were not verified beyond the original record thereof in your books.

The following comments are directed to specific terms of disbursements in Exhibit A:

# Salaries-\$16,167.11:

Salary paid to the Assistant Archdeacon represents that portion of his compensation which is an obligation of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge. Salaries paid to workers amounted to \$14,887.11.

# Special Services-\$2,324.15:

Salaries and expenses of workers conducting special services were distributed among the various districts as follows:

# Insurance-\$795.62:

Insurance policies on the various churches, missions, schools and dwellings owned by the Archdeaconry and their contents were examined. The Archdeaconry is also protected by liability insurance on automobiles operatedby it.

Insurance on the life of Archdeacon F. W. Neve, amounting to \$8,000.00, is now fully paid and dividends aggregating \$121.04 were received during 1930.

# GENERAL COMMENTS.

The recorded receipts and disbursements of the several other special funds are presented in Exhibit B and do not, we think, require specific explanatory comments.

The report for the year 1929 contained suggestions and recommendations which we believed might be helpful to your organization. Our examination of your records for the year 1930 tends to confirm the opinion expressed on pages 7 and 8 of that report, and we renew the recommendations contained therein.

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# APPENDIX D

# CONSTITUTION

# OF THE

# PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

As adopted in 1815, and amended in 1836, 1840, 1850, 1860, 1864, 1867 1872, 1881, 1890, 1900, 1904, 1909, 1912, 1920 and 1931.

# ARTICLE I.

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, at the place designated by the preceding Council, on the third Wednesday in May every year; except when the Ascension Day shall fall upon the day following, in which case the Council shall be on the fourth Wednesday in May. But in the case of any good cause arising, rendering it necessary or expedient to change the time or the place for any meeting of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may change the time, or the place, or both.

### ARTICLE II.

## The Council shall be composed of-

(a) The Bishop or Bishops, and the ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who are now or may hereafter be canonically settled in parishes or churches within the Diocese, professors of the Theological Seminary in Virginia, and missionaries within this Diocese and under its Ecclesiastical Authority, being clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese. *Provided*, That any such ministers who may have been members of the Council up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members *ex-officio*. *Provided further*, That only such colored ministers shall be members as are hereinafter

specified. *Provided further*, That no minister under ecclesiastical censure shall be entitled to a seat in the Council; and no minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding:

(b) Lay members consisting of

2

(1) One delegate from each parish or church entitled to representation chosen by the vestry thereof, save that every such parish or church having more than one minister canonically settled shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has ministers, and that every such parish or church having more than five hundred communicants reported to the previous annual Council, shall be entitled to send an additional delegate for each five hundred communicants or major fraction thereof above the first five hundred; but in no case to exceed three lay delegates in all from any one congregation.

(2) Three delegates from the missionary jurisdiction known as the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge chosen by the Board of Mountain Work.

(3) The lay members of the Standing Committee, and the Chancellor of the Diocese and the Committee on Finance, as the same are or may hereafter be constituted by Canon, shall be members of the Council ex-officio, but without the right to vote when the vote shall be taken by orders. And in every case members of the Council shall be communicants in the Church."

(c) Two clerical and two lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

### ARTICLE III.

Twenty members of the clerical and twenty of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn.

### ARTICLE IV.

In all matters that shall come before Council, the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body, and the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure; but when five members require it there shall be a vote by orders, and a majority of each order shall be necessary to a decision.

### ARTICLE V.

The election of a Bishop in the Diocese shall be made in Council in the following manner: The vote shall be by ballot and by orders, a concurrent majority of the votes cast by each order being necessary to a choice.

# ARTICLE VI.

The Bishop shall be President of the Council, in which character it shall be his duty to give to the Council annually a general view of the state of the Church; to call special Councils at whatever time and place he shall think necessary, or when required by the Standing Committee; to preserve order during the time of session; to put the question, collect the votes, and declare the decision; and he may deliver his sentiments on any subject after it has been discussed, before a vote thereon. The Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside in the Council in the absence of the Bishop.

### ARTICLE VII.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, the Council, immediately upon their assembling, shall choose by joint ballot a President from among the order of Priests, who shall remain in office until the next annual Council or until the next election of a President. He shall perform all the duties, and possess all the privileges above specified; but he shall not call special meetings of the Council unless applied to for that purpose by a majority of the Standing Committee. If neither the Bishop nor the Bishop-Coadjutor be present at any meeting of the Council, they shall elect, by ballot, a President pro tempore.

### ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed annually by the Council. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully to deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Council which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to give reasonable notice of the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journal of each succeeding Council a list of the clergy of the Diocese, which shall have been certified to him by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint a Secretary *pro tempore*, who shall take charge of the books and papers, and perform the duties of the office, until the election of a Secretary by the Council.

### ARTICLE IX.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office for one year, or until his successor shall be appointed. It

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shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be ordered by the Council or provided by Canon. He shall report annually to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same.

The Treasurer shall give bond for the faithful performance of his duties in an amount to be fixed by the Committee on Finance, with a surety company authorized to do business in Virginia and approved by said Committee as security, which bond shall cover all amounts coming into his hands as Treasurer from whatsoever source.

The accounts of the Treasurer shall be audited annually on or before February 1st by, or under the direction of, the said Committee on Finance.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Treasurer, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint a Treasurer *pro tempore*; and in case of the misconduct of the Treasurer, or of his incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, the Ecclesiastical Authority may remove him and fill the vacancy in the same manner. The Treasurer *pro tempore* shall take into his custody all the money and other property, and all the books and papers, belonging to the said office, and discharge the duties thereof until the election of a Treasurer by the Council.

### ARTICLE X.

Each annual Council shall elect by ballot a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese, and who shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed.

### ARTICLE XI.

Every Parish within this Diocese shall be entitled to the entire benefit of this Constitution as soon as it shall have signified its ratification thereof, either in writing or by sending a lay delegate to the Council; and such Parish shall thereafter be benefited and bound equally with the other Parishes in this Diocese by every rule and Canon which shall be framed by any Council acting under this Constitution for the government of this Church in ecclesiastical con cerns.

### ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution shall be unalterable, except in the following manner: A proposition for any change shall be introduced in writ-

ing and considered in Council, and if approved of, the same shall be transmitted to the several vestries of the Parishes which shall have ratified this Constitution; and if again approved of in the next ensuing Council by a majority, the change shall then take place, and the Constitution so altered shall be valid and obligatory.

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# CANONS

### OF THE

# PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

As Revised and Adopted May 18, 1906, and Amended in Council Since That Time.

### CANON I.

### Of a List of the Ministers of this Diocese.

SECTION 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of this Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their postoffices, and their respective cures, or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged. And the Ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be so designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom. And it shall be appended to the Journal, and be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

SECTION 2. The list of the clergy of the Diocese, so prepared, and corrected according to the changes which may occur, whether by death, ordination, discipline, or canonical removals from or admission into this Diocese, shall be *prima facie* evidence of a clergyman's having a cure or mission, or other canonical connection with this Diocese.

SECTION 3. The right of any clergyman to a seat in the Council shall, if claimed or disputed, be determined according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons by the Council itself, whether his name be inserted in the list aforesaid or omitted. And it shall be the duty of every clergyman to attend regularly the meeting of every Council; or, if unable to attend, to send his written excuse to the President.

### CANON II.

# Of Lay Delegates, and the Evidence of Their Election.

SECTION 1. The Parishes of this Diocese, entitled to representation in the Council, are those, within its presents limits, which were established by law prior to the eighteenth day of May, A. D. 1785; together with those which have, since that time, been constituted and received into union therewith by act of the Convention or Council of the Diocese. And the Churches entitled to representation are those which have been constituted and received as Separate Congregations by like action of the Convention or Council; or which, being distinct cures, have been recognized, by long and unbroken usage, as Separate Congregations entitled to representation.

A list of the Parishes in the Diocese, and of the Separate Congregations therein, shall be appended to the Journal of each Annual Council.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of every Parish, and of every Church entitled to representation, as above defined, to send to each meeting of the Council of the Diocese the number of Lay Delegates to which they may be respectively entitled.

SECTION 3. The election of Lay Delegates to the Council shall be certified by the Rector, Register, or one of the Wardens of the proper Parish or Church, in duplicate; and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

This is to certify, That at a meeting of the Vestry of......Parish, (or, of.....Church,.....Parish,) in .....County, held on the.....day of......19...., the following named communicants of said....., viz: Mr.....as Lay Delega<sup>+</sup>e. and Mr.....as Alternate, were duly appointed to represent the same in the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia, to be holden in the city of......, ou the......day of......in the year....

> (Signed)..... Rector, Register, or Warden.

One copy of this certificate shall be sent to the Secretary of the Council at least ten days before the meeting of the Council, and the other shall be given to the Delegate attending.

SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the Parishes

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or Churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the Lay Delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council. But until their report be received the roll as made out and called by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authorized roll of Lay Delegates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all of the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter: *Providea*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

### CANON III.

### Of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

SECTION 1. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office; or, there being no Bishop-Coadjutor, in case the Bishop be incapable of performing his administrative duties; or when the Bishop shall authorize them so to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for all purposes set forth by these Canons. SECTION 2. Any vacancy occurring by death, removal from the Diocese, or otherwise, in the Standing Committee, shall be supplied by the concurrent vote of the remaining clerical and lay members of the Committee.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee at every annual meeting of the Council to submit a report of their proceedings. When required by the Council they shall also lay before them any documents which may have come into their possession.

### CANON IV.

### Of the Registrar of the Diocese.

The Council shall elect, at its meeting next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, an officer who shall be called the Registrar of the Diocese; who shall continue in office for three years, or until his successor is elected. It shall be the duty of the Registrar to receive and preserve, under the direction of the Council, books, papers and other documents bearing upon the history of the Church in the Diocese, and to perform such other duties pertaining to his office as may be required by the Council. And he shall make a report to the Council at each annual meeting.

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### CANON V.

# Of the Chancellor of the Diocese.

The Council shall elect, at its meeting next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, an officer who shall be called the Chancellor of the Diocese; who shall continue in office for three years, or until his successor is elected. The Chancellor shall be a lay communicant, resident in the Diocese, and learned in the law. He shall be the legal adviser of the Bishop, and also of the officers and committees of the Council, whenever they shall require legal advice in matters affecting the interests of the Diocese.

### CANON VI.

# Of Deputies to the General Convention.

SECTION 1. At the annual Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention there shall be elected by ballot the full number of Clerical and Lay Deputies to the General Convention to which this Diocese is entitled, and, in the same manner, a like number of Clerical and Lay Alternate Deputies; and a majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. The Clerical Deputies shall be Presbyters canonically connected with this Diocese, and the Lay Deputies shall be communicants resident within the Diocese.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of each of the Deputies elected to signify to the Secretary of the Council, at least ten days before the meeting of the General Convention, whether or not he accepts the appointment and will perform its duties. If he accepts, the Secretary shall issue to him a certificate of election. Should any Deputy elected decline, or fail to signify his acceptance, or should a vacancy occur otherwise, the Secretary of the Council shall issue the certificate of election to the Alternate Deputy, of the same order in which the vacancy occurs, who was first elected; or, if more than one were elected on the same ballot, who received the highest number of votes; and if there be more than one vacancy the others shall be filled successively in like manner.

### CANON VII.

# Of the Committee on Church Property.

SECTION 1. The Council shall elect a Standing Committee, to consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, and three laymen who shall be members of the Corporation known as the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, to be known as the Committee on

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Church Property, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of this Committee to take such steps, legal or otherwise, as may be necessary to recover or secure any property, real or personal, belonging to any Parish or Congregation of the Church within this Diocese, the legal title to which is not vested in duly constituted Trustees; and in the case of any such property which may be regarded as abandoned property, the said Committee shall take such steps, through the Trustees holding the legal title thereto, or the survivor or survivors of them, if there be any, or, if there be no such Trustee or Trustees, then through any one or more members of the Congregation which has ceased to occupy said property, either to hold said property. or to make sale thereof, in accordance with the statutes of this State in that case made and provided; and in case of a sale of the said property, the said Committee shall pay over to the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia the proceeds of such sale, to be subject to the order and disposition of the Council of this Diocese.

SECTION 3. It shall also be the duty of this Committee, when it may be necessary, to apply to the Courts of the State for the appointment of Trustees to hold the legal title to any property belonging to the Church within this Diocese, and under the control of the Council thereof. And they are hereby constituted the proper authorities of the Council to make such application. They shall also have the care of the Episcopal residence, and other property belonging to the Diocese for which no other custodians are provided; and shall be authorized to make such expenditures for repairs, insurance, etc., thereon as may be necessary, with the approval of the Committee on Finance.

SECTION 4. Vacancies in this Committee, occurring by death, removal from the Diocese, or otherwise, shall be filled by the Council from time to time as they may occur.

SECTION 5. This Committee shall make a report annually to the Council of any action taken by them in the preceding year.

### CANON VIII.

### Of the Bishops' and Contingent Fund for Diocesan Expenses.

SECTION 1. The fiscal year of the Diocese, and of each Parish and congregation, shall begin January first.

SECTION 2. The Council shall elect annually a Committee of three laymen to be known as the Committee on Finance, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. Any vacancy occurring in this Committee shall be filled by the remaining members. It shall be the duty of the said Committee to examine the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, and report to the Council the financial condition of the Diocese in respect to the Bishops' and Contingent Fund, making such recommendations as they may deem expedient.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance, at each annual Council, to present an estimate of the amount needed to meet the expenses of the Diocese for the fiscal year beginning the first day of January following. They shall at the same time present a schedule assessing the amount called for in their estimate proportionately upon the Vestries of the different parishes and congregations of the Diocese. The said assessment shall be based upon the relative financial strength of the parishes and congregations, as shown by their parochial reports and by other facts and considerations which may become known to the Committee. This assessment shall be made known to the Vestries of the several parishes or churches as soon as possible after it is made. But be it provided, That any Vestry shall have thirty days in which to protest if they deem the assessment excessive or burdensome, and the Committee on Finance shall allow them opportunity to show cause why it should be reduced.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each Vestry to pay the sum assessed upon the respective parish or church to the Treasurer of the Diocese, in full at the beginning of the fiscal year, or quarterly in advance throughout the year, as it may elect; each Vestry being free to adopt such means as it may deem best to raise its assessment.

SECTION 5. The Fund thus created shall be known as the Bishops' and Contingent Fund; and shall be held by the Treasurer of the Diocese for the purpose of defraying such expenses as shall be authorized by the Council. But the Committee on Finance may also, after the adjournment of the Council, authorize and require the Treasurer to pay any extraordinary or unforeseen expenses which shall legitimately arise in the proper conduct of the pusiness of the Diocese.

### CANON IX.

### Of the Church Pension Fund.

SECTION 1. In conformity with the resolutions adopted by the General Convention of 1913, setting forth the principles upon which a pension system for the clergy of this Church and their dependents should be constructed, pursuant to which the corporation the Church Pension Fund has been created to carry those principles into effect, the Diocese of Virginia hereby adopts the system of the Church Pension Fund.

SECTION 2. The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall ap-

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point, annually, a Committee to be entitled The Committee on the Church Pension Fund, to consist of two clergymen and five laymen, which shall include the Treasurers of the Widows and Orphans and Disabled Clergy Funds, which Committee shall have authority to elect such officers as may be necessary or proper to carry out the provisions of this Canon. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

(i) To furnish annually to the Church Pension Fund the canonical roll of the Bishops and other Clergy of this Diocese, and of the Clergy canonically belonging to other Dioceses or Missionary Districts who may be licensed to officiate in this Diocese, with a statement of the stipends received by each of said Bishops and Clergymen from any Parish, Mission or other Ecclesiastical organization in this Diocese.

(ii) To receive from the Church Pension Fund annually a statement of the premiums necessary to be paid by the Diocese or by each Parish, Mission, or other Ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese, in order that the Bishops and Clergymen in receipt of stipends from such Diocese, Parishes, Missions, and other Ecclesiastical organizations may be entitled respectively to pensions.

(iii) To receive from the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese of Virginia the annual interest accruing on the investments held by the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund of said Diocese and the General Clergy Relief Fund when this Canon goes into effect, and to transmit the same to the Church Pension Fund to be applied as the Committee shall direct on account of the premiums necessary to be paid by the Diocese.

(iv) To inform the authorities of each of the said Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations of the premiums payable by it, and of the time and manner of payment thereof; to receive, from all of the Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations in this Diocese, or from individual contributions, the aforesaid premiums and to transmit the same to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund; *provided*, that the Committee may, in its discretion, make arrangements with the Church Pension Fund for the direct transmission of such premiums from the Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations aforesaid to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund.

(v) To inform the Church Pension Fund from time to time of the Bishops and other Clergy and the widows, remaining unmarried, and minor orphans, remaining unmarried, of such Bishops and other Clergy, canonically connected with this Diocese, who may be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.

(vi) In general, to inform the Bishops and other Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of the pension system created by the General Convention, and committed by it to the operation of the Church Pension Fund, whereby the Bishops and other Clergy of the Church are assured of pensions, as of right, to themselves in the event of old age, or disability, and to their widows and minor orphans in the event of death, and to do all things that may be necessary or advisable in the premises to the end that moneys necessary to be paid by the Parishes, Missions, and other Ecclesiastical organizations may be fully and systematically paid.

(vii) To make an annual report to Council of the amount of premiums collected and paid to the Church Pension Fund and of amounts received therefrom by the pensioners of this Diocese.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese of Virginia to pay, semi-annually, or oftener at their option, to the said Committee on the Church Pension Fund, all the income of the investments held by said Trustees for the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund, receiving satisfactory assurance from the Church Pension Fund that the latter corporation will assume and pay all of the annuities paid by the said Trustees when this Canon goes into effect, and so long as said payments are actually made by the Church Pension Fund.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of every Bishop and other Clergyman receiving a stipend or stipends, and the duty of every Parish, Mission, or other Ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese paying a stipend or stipends, to furnish a statement of such stipend or stipends to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund whenever said Committee shall, in writing, ask for such statement.

SECTION 5. This Canon shall go into effect when the Secretary of the Council shall receive notification from the Church Pension Fund that such sufficient number of other Dioceses. Missionary Districts. and General Boards, or other General Institutions of the Church have. by legislation, provided for entering into the pension system of the Church Pension Fund, as, in the opinion of the said Church Pension Fund, will enable its system to go into operation; provided, that the Bishops and other Clergy canonically connected with said Dioceses or Missionary Districts, or whose stipends are wholly paid by said Boards or General Institutions of the Church, shall number not less than Two Thousand individuals: and when the Secretary of the Diocese shall also receive notification from the Church Pension Fund that the special account for the accrued liabilities in the opinion of the Trustees of the Church Pension Fund is of sufficient amount to insure adequate provision for the clergy canonically resident in this Diocese at the time; and provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to hinder or delay the prompt payment of the existing allowance to the present or future disabled Clergy or to the widows

and orphans of the Clergy of this Diocese out of the collections in this Diocese or from the trust funds held for their benefit until the equivalent is paid them or secured to be paid them promptly.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese to transfer and deliver to a trust company, to be named by the Trustees of the invested Funds belonging to the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund and by the Church Pension Fund Committee, all of these securities and invested principal funds held by the Diocese belonging to the Disabled Clergy Fund and the Widows and Orphans Fund, to be held by the said trust company with authority and obligation on its part to collect the income and to pay the same to the Pension Fund.

Whenever in the judgment of the said Trustees it shall become expedient to make a particular investment of uninvested funds, or to change any existing investments, said investment or change of investments shall be made when and as may be directed in writing by the said Trustees with the approval of the said Pension Fund, provided that the Church Pension Fund shall first enter into a contract to assume and continue to pay the grants for pensions or annuities to the beneficiaries at present receiving the same from such funds, until all such obligations are fulfilled and the same terminated by the death of the several beneficiaries or by the action of the Trustees of the several funds. And further, to credit annually the amount of the annual net income derived from such funds upon the annual assessments of the parishes and missions of the Diocese of Virginia for the purposes of the Church Pension Fund as in the discretion of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund may deem proper.

And further, that the Trustees will not, after the expiration of ten years from the execution of this contract, make, directly or indirectly, any appeal or solicitation for funds or endowments to be made either to the Diocese or to any person or corporation, to be used for the relief of aged or infirm clergy or the families of deceased clergymen of the Diocese of Virginia, other than the Pension Fund, and during the ten years after the execution of this contract, any such appeal must be approved by the authorities of the Diocese of Virginia and shall only be made for or on behalf of clergy who are upon the canonical roll of said Diocese at the time of the execution of this contract.

Any monies or securities hereafter received by said Trustees shall be deposited with the trust company above mentioned by said Trustees, upon the conditions and for the purposes hereinbefore set forth. The Trustees or proper authority are authorized and empowered

to enter into and sign, seal, acknowledge and deliver any contract or contracts with the Church Pension Fund, a corporation created under the laws of the State of New York, to carry out any and all of the provisions of this Canon.

### CANON X.

# Of the Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Constitution of this Society is hereby amended and established as follows:

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE PROTES-TANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

Article 1. This Society shall be called the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia. Its membership shall be considered as including all the baptized members of this Church residing in this Diocese. Its government shall be vested in the Council of the Diocese. Its object shall be to extend and support the Missionary work of the Church in the Diocese, and to encourage the liberality of its members in support of the Church's mission.

Article 2. The Council shall annually elect an Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, to continue in office for one year or until their successors are elected, consisting of the Bishop, and the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, the Treasurer of the Diocese, five clergymen and five laymen from the Diocese at large and two members, one clergyman and one layman, from each of the several Convocations in the Diocese which shall have been recognized by the Council as being entitled to such representation, nominated by the said Convocations respectively.

Article 3. The Bishop shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, and the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, shall be Vice-Chairman. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall be Treasurer of the Executive Committee. A Secretary shall be elected by the Committee. The Committee shall fill any vacancies that may occur in their number: provided that a representative from any Convocation shall be elected only upon nomination by that Convocation.

The Committee may enact such rules and By-Laws as shall be needful for their own guidance and that of those under their authority, subject always to the direction and control of the Council. Nine members of the Executive Committee, duly convened, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article 4. The Executive Committee shall be charged with the conduct and supervision of the missionary work of the Church within the Diocese, except such as is strictly parochial; and shall receive, ap-

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propriate and disburse all contributions made for such missionary work. Auxiliary societies, boards, and other agencies and persons employed or engaged in this work shall be subject to their oversight and direction.

They shall have authority, with the advice and consent of the Bishop, to establish missions in the Diocese; to aid in the erection of churches; to group missions or congregations dependent upon the Society into suitable fields or cures; to employ missionaries, provide for their support, appoint them their stations and give them such directions as may be deemed necessary; provided always that the rights of no duly constituted Rector or Vestry be infringed upon without his or their consent. They shall also have authority to aid feeble Parishes or congregations in supporting their ministers, upon application from the Vestries thereof, when, and as long as, they are satisfied such aid is necessary; to assist in the material equipment of parishes and missions; to provide for the training of workers and teachers; for the distribution of Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals; for the publication and distribution of books, papers, etc., for Sundayschools and missions; for missionary meetings and addresses. They shall also have authority to promote the cause of religious and moral Education and of Christian Social Service; and may provide for disseminating information as to the work and needs of the Society and of the Church at large; and generally, as the executive agency of the Society, to advance its interests and prosecute its work.

Article 5. The Executive Committee shall elect from its membership the following Departments or Boards, and shall determine from time to time the scope of the work of each Board and, out of funds at its disposal, make appropriations for its authorized expenditures.

I. The Board of Religious Education; to consist primarily of seven members.

II. The Board of Christian Social Service; to consist primarily of five members.

III. The Board of Apportionment; to consist primarily of ten members, including the Treasurer and at least one representative from each Convocation.

IV. The Board of Publicity: to consist primarily of seven members, including at least one representative from each Convocation.

V. The Field Board: to consist primarily of seven members, including at least one representative from each Convocation.

VI. The Board of Evangelism: to consist primarily of five members.

VII. The Board of Mountain Work: to consist primarily of seven members.

Each of said Boards shall have the power, with the advice and

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consent of the Bishop, to elect additional members in number not exceeding those appointed by the Executive Committee; which, in the case of the Board of Mountain Work, shall include the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge and the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, if there be one. Such additional members shall be entitled to seats but not to vote at the meetings of the Executive Committee. Each Board shall elect from its members a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretarv. Appropriations made for the expenditures of each Board shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Executive Committee upon order of the Chairman or Vice-Chairman, certified by the Secretary of the Board. Each Board shall report its actions to the Executive Committee under such regulations as the Committee shall prescribe.

The Executive Committee may also appoint from its membership such Sub-Committees as may be needful to facilitate its work, and prescribe their duties.

Article 6. In order that sufficient means may be provided by the stated offerings of the people for the support and extension of the missionary, educational, social service and other religious work of the Diocese, and for its proper share of the work of the Church at large, the Executive Committee shall plan and promote each year an Every-Member Canvass to be made after adequate preparation in every congregation and parish as far as possible, at a time appointed by the committee.

The Board of Apportionment, after consultation with the appropriate Departments of the National Council and of this Province, the Trustees of the Diocesan institutions, and representatives of the parishes and missions of the Diocese, shall annually prepare a survey setting forth the opportunities and needs of the Church as represented by these various interests, and also an itemized budget indicating the amount required by the Church in the Diocese for the next fiscal year, which survey and budget, after approval by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, shall be submitted to the Council for final action. This survey and budget shall also be submitted to each minister and vestry for their information not later than May first.

After action by the Council the Board of Apportionment shall prepare a schedule apportioning the total amount called for by the budget adopted by the Council among the parishes and congregations of the Diocese, which apportionment shall be based upon the relative financial ability of the several parishes and congregations; and the financial ability of each congregation for this purpose shall be measured by the amount of its annual operating expenses, exclusive of interest and capital expenditures, over a series of years as disclosed by its parochial reports, and by such peculiar facts and considerations as may be deemed pertinent by the Board. This survey, budget and

schedule shall be published and the apportionment of each parish and congregation shall be communicated to the minister and vestry thereof not later than October first of each year.

In order that the people may be properly instructed as to the needs of the Diocese as outlined in the survey and budget, the Board of Apportionment, in cooperation with the Field Board, the parochial authorities and committees organized for the purpose, shall conduct a campaign of instruction and preparation throughout the Diocese, culminating in the Every-Member Canvass.

It shall be the duty of the minister and vestry of each parish and congregation to further the objects of this campaign, to use all diligence to secure pledges to the full ability of their respective congregations to give to the Budget of the Diocese and other missionary opportunities of the Church, and to provide for the payment to the Treasurer of the Diocese, in regular monthly installments during the next fiscal year, of the amount pledged to the diocesan budget. It shall be the further duty of said minister and vestry to report to the Treasurer of the Diocese not later than December 15th each year the amount which said parish or congregation expects to pay on, or above, its apportionment.

It shall be the duty of the said Treasurer, as soon as the total of said parochial pledges is ascertained, to inform the several clergy and congregations of said total and of the additional amount, if any, necessry to meet all the budget needs and obligations. And it shall thereupon be the duty of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society to make an appeal directly to individuals and organizations in the Diocese by such means as it deems best for supplementary gifts to enable the Diocese to carry on all the work provided for in the budget, and to take advantage of opportunities for the extension thereof.

As soon as practicable after December 15th each year, the Board of Apportionment shall provide for the distribution among the interests represented in the budget of the estimated receipts for the next fiscal year as based upon the information then available, and shall direct when and under what conditions the payments shall be made. The estimated receipts, if less than the budget, shall first be applied to fixed obligations, and the remainder apportioned to other objects in the budget pro rata. The schedule of payments, when approved by the Executive Committee, shall be the warrant of the Treasurer of the Diocese for paying out the money received, periodically, according to its terms. Pending the fixing of said schedule, the Treasurer is authorized to make payments according to the terms of the budget.

Article 7. The Executive Committee shall present a report of its operations and those of its Boards and Sub-Committees. and of the progress and condition of the missionary work of the Diocese, to the Council, sitting as a Missionary Council, on or before the second day of each annual meeting.

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Article 8. The maximum expenses of the Executive Committee shall be fixed annually by the Council of the Diocese.

Article 9. All resolutions and Canons in conflict with this Canon are hereby repealed.

# CANON XI.

# Of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

SECTION 1. The Missions engaged in Mountain Work shall constitute a missionary jurisdiction to be known as "The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge". The Missions to be included in this jurisdiction shall be designated from time to time by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

SECTION 2. The management of the affairs of this jurisdiction shall be in the hands of the Board of Mountain Work.

SECTION 3. A presbyter, to be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, shall have as the representative of the Bishop general supervision of the Mountain Work, and shall be responsible for the promotion thereof. The Archdeacon shall be appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the Executive Committee. When necessary in the judgment of the Bishop and the Executive Committee, there shall be an Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, chosen in like manner.

SECTION 4. The Board shall formulate by-laws governing the Mountain Work, which shall become effective upon approval by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

### CANON XII.

### Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction.

SECTION 1. The colored people residing within the Diocese of Virginia who are, or may be hereafter, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese.

SECTION 2. It shall be lawful to organize Separate Congregations or Mission Churches composed exclusively of colored persons within the limits of any already existing parish or parishes, subject to all the conditions prescribed in the Canon "Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish", or the Canon "Of Mission Churches", except that the consent of the Vestry or Vestries of white congregations need not be obtained; and further, that the right of representation of such Separate Congregations or Mission Churches composed exclusively of colored persons shall be in the Convocation of the Colored

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Missionary Jurisdiction, and only in the Council of the Diocese as provided in Section 6 of this Canon.

SECTION 3. There may be appointed by the Bishop one or more Presbyters who shall have general supervision of such colored churches and congregations as the Bishop may designate, and perform such duties as he may prescribe.

SECTION 4. When, in the judgment of the Bishop, the number of colored ministers and congregations is sufficient to justify it, a Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction shall be held annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the Convocation itself. The colored ministers of the Diocese, in good standing, shall be members of the Convocation, and it shall be the duty of every such minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every Colored Mission Church or congregation shall elect one male Lay Delegate annually, a communicant, and twenty-one years of age, who shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation upon presentation of a proper certificate, signed by the Minister, or, if there be no minister, by one of the Wardens, or the Register of the Vestry.

The Bishop, the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, and the Presbyters mentioned in Section 3, shall be members *ex-officio* of the Convocation. The Bishop, or, in his absence, the Bishop-Coadjutor, shall be President of the Convocation; or, if neither be present, the Convocation shall elect a President *pro tempore*.

SECTION 5. The Convocation shall have power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare and the advancement of the work of the Church among the colored people, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Council of the Diocese.

SECTION 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two clergymen and two laymen to represent them in the Council of the Diocese.

SECTION 7. Colored congregations constituted as above provided may acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by transfer, under the laws of the State of Virginia; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by like transfer.

### CANON XIII.

### Of Convocations.

SECTION 1. The parishes in this Diocese shall be grouped in five Convocations as follows:

(1) The Albemarle Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Albemarle, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Louisa, Orange, and St. Martin's Parish in Hanover County. (2) The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the City of Alexandria and the Counties of Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier (south of the Bull Run Mountain) and Prince William.

(3) The Rappahannock Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Caroline, Charles City, Essex, Gloucester, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster, Mathews, Middlesex, New Kent, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford, Westmoreland, and Ashland and St. Paul's Parishes in Hanover County.

(4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the County of Henrico.

(5) The Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Clarke, Fauquier (north of Bull Run Mountain), Frederick, Loudoun, Madison, Page, Rappahannock, Rockingham, Shenandoah and Warren. *Provided*, however, that nothing herein shall affect the provisions in the Canon "Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction".

- Changes in Convocation boundaries shall be authorized by Council on joint application of the Convocations interested.

SECTION 2. Every clergyman settled as rector, assistant minister or minister in charge shall be a member of the Convocation in which his principal Church is situated.

SECTION 3. The Convocations shall make provision for lay representation.

SECTION 4. The Convocations may enact such rules and by-laws as may be necessary for their own guidance.

### CANON XIV.

### Of the Division of Parishes.

SECTION 1. Whenever the members of this Church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, or in adjoining portions of two or more Parishes, shall desire to separate from the Parish or Parishes of which they form a part, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after ten days' notice of the time and place of such meeting, given publicly in the church, or, otherwise, to each known person qualified to vote for Vestrymen in the territory proposed to be formed into a new Parish, and appoint a Committee to take such measures as may be necessary.

SECTION 2. The committee thus appointed shall give to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and to the Vestry or Vestries in the Parish or Parishes from which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply for such separation: which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority, and to the said

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Vestry or Vestries, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.

SECTION 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council; and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desirable, together with an accurate description of the proposed line or lines of division, the name proposed for the new parish, and a statement showing the extent of the territory, the churches and missions, if any, and the number of communicants, which will be embraced therein.

SECTION 4. The Council shall refer the petition to a committee to examine and report thereon; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, proceed to divide said Parish or Parishes, and to constitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese; in which case the petition, or so much thereof as shall contain the description of the line or lines of division, shall be delivered to the Secretary and shall be published in the Journal.

SECTION 5. As soon as practicable after the new Parish is constituted, the committee which made the application aforesaid shall give at least ten days' notice, in the manner prescribed in section one of this Canon, to the qualified electors residing in the new Parish to assemble for the election of a Vestry; which election shall be conducted according to the direction contained in the Canon "Of the Election and Organization of Vestries".

### CANON XV.

# Of Establishing or Altering Parish Boundaries.

SECTION 1. When it shall be deemed desirable to alter the boundary lines between two or more Parishes; or when such lines are unknown, or need to be newly determined, the Vestries of the Parishes concerned may agree upon the lines which they wish to have established as their parish lines, and unite in a petition to the Council to alter or establish them accordingly; which petition shall contain an accurate description of the line or lines proposed. Or if the said Vestries fail to agree, then one or more of them may present such petition; in which case a copy of the petition shall be sent to every Vestry in the Parishes concerned which does not unite therein, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the petition shall be presented. And in any case, if a proposed change in parish lines would effect a transfer of any congregation or church building from one parish to another, formal notice thereof shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority at least two months before the meeting of the Council.

SECTION 2. The Council shall refer such petition to a Committee

to examine and report thereon; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, alter or establish the said line or lines accordingly. In which case the petition, or so much thereof as shall contain the line or lines so established, shall be delivered to the Secretary and shall be published in the Journal.

## CANON XVI.

# Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish.

SECTION 1. When any number of persons, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a minister, shall desire a separate parochial organization, but do not reside so apart from other congregations as to admit of forming a new parish, they may proceed according to the directions of the Canon "Of the Division of Parishes", except as regards a line or lines of vision, which provision in this case is inapplicable. And the Council, proceeding under the directions of the same Canon, may constitute the applicants a Separate Congregation in the Parish in which they are situated, with the right to elect a Vestry, and to have representation in the Council, subject always to the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese.

SECTION 2. No new church shall be built, or new congregation established, in any Parish, unless the consent of the Vestry, or of all the Vestries, of the said Parish be first had. But if such consent be not given an appeal may be taken to the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese, or to the Council when in session; and in either case their decision in the matter shall be final.

### CANON XVII.

### Of Mission Churches.

SECTION 1. When any number of persons belonging to any parish or congregation desire a separate organization, but cannot comply with the requirements of the Canon in regard to the formation of Separate Congregations, they may proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

They must obtain the approval of the Vestry of the Parish to which they belong, and if there be two or more Vestries in the Parish they must have the consent of a majority of the same.

They must have the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

They may have their own Vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties, shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of Vestries; except

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that they shall have no representation in the Council of the Diocese, and shall not call a minister without the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of a church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary and the Treasurer of the Diocese; and a list of such Mission Churches shall be published annually in the Journal.

# CANON XVIII.

### Of Parish Councils.

SECTION. In every parish with a single Rector and Vestry, their parochial authority, and their consequent primary responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church, extends throughout the territorial limits of their parish and should be so recognized and exercised.

In every parish which contains, in addition to the original Parish Church, one or more Separate Congregations or Mission Churches, organized as provided in these Canons, there shall be a Parish Council, to consist of the Rector or Minister in charge of each of the said organized churches or congregations therein, and one or more lay members of the Vestry thereof. The lay members shall be elected annually by their respective Vestries, and shall continue in office until their successors are duly elected. The Parish Council shall elect a Chairman and a Secretary, and shall adopt such rules for its own guidance as may be deemed necessary, subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Parish Council to exercise the authority which belongs to the Parish as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout its borders, so that the Parish may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. Especially it shall be its duty to encourage the planting of missions or mission Sunday Schools where necessary in the Parish, to determine their location and their status and to foster their growth and efficiency, and to provide as far as possible that the services of the Church shall be available to all the people within its territory, and that its united influence be exerted in matters pertaining to the welfare of the community. *Provided*, *however*, that the Parish Council shall not encroach upon the rights or duties of the Vestries of organized congregations within its Parish; but it may act with them in an advisory capacity by their express invitation.

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# Canons

# CANON XIX.

### Of the Election and Organization of Vestries.

SECTION 1. Every Parish, Separate Congregation and Mission Church in this Diocese shall elect annually, as hereinafter prescribed, suitable persons who, with the Rector or Minister in charge, if there be one, shall constitute the Vestry thereof until their successors are elected and have duly qualified; or if any parish or separate congregation at a meeting called as provided by Section 2 of this canon so authorized, vestrymen may be elected for terms not to exceed three years, the congregation to determine the length of terms and the number of vestrymen to be elected for such terms.

SECTION 2. The election of Vestrymen shall be held on Easter Monday, in the church or regular place of worship. But if no election be held on Easter Monday it may be held on any day thereafter; and if there be no church or regular place of worship, or if it be not available, the election may be held at any suitable place in the Parish: such time or place to be appointed by the Minister, or if there be none, by the Wardens, or by two Vestrymen, or, if there be none, by three members of the congregation. But any congregation may, at a regular meeting of the congregation duly convened at the call of the Vestry or of three members of the congregation, appoint some fixed day in the year other than Easter Monday on which to hold the annual election of Vestry. And the Vestry, or other persons authorized under this Section to act in the premises, shall take care that adequate notice of the place, and the day and hour, appointed for every election of a Vestry shall be given, either in the church on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means.

SECTION 3. All persons eighteen years of age, who are registered as communicants of the particular church in which they offer to vote, and non-communicants twenty-one years of age who are baptized and who have been for six months regular contributors to the charges of the same, shall be entitled to vote at the election of Vestrymen. The voting shall be by ballot, and a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. But no election shall be valid hereunder unless at least ten per cent of the qualified voters of the congregation participate therein.

SECTION 4. The Vestry may appoint three persons to act as judges, to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges are appointed, the electors present may choose three persons to act as judges. The judges of election shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and of those elected as Vestrymen.

SECTION 5. The number of Vestrymen elected shall be not less than three, nor more than twelve; *provided*, however, that in any congre-

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gation having more than one hundred communicants, one additional Vestryman may be elected for each additional one hundred communicants or fraction thereof; but the total number of Vestrymen shall in no case exceed eighteen. If the election be the first in a new Parish or congregation the number of Vestrymen shall be fixed by vote of the electors present; otherwise it shall be the same as that of the former Vestry unless changed by vote of the electors. Only male persons twenty-one years of age who are communicants, shall be eligible to the office of Vestryman; in other respects the qualifications of Vestrymen shall be the same as those prescribed by voters; *provided*, that a Vestryman now serving on this 22nd day of May, 1919, shall be eligible for re-election.

SECTION 6. If there be in any Parish two or more congregations apart from each other, not being Separate Congregations or Mission Churches in the meaning of these Canons, it shall be lawful for the Vestry of such Parish, if they deem it expedient, to apportion to each congregation the number of Vestrymen to be chosen as its representation upon the Vestry of the Parish. In which case a separate election shall be held by and for each such congregation; and the electors thereof shall choose the number of Vestrymen so allotted to that congregation, and no more. In other respects such elections shall conform to all the foregoing provisions of this Canon. But in no case shall the aggregate number of such Vestrymen in any Parish exceed twelve.

All the Vestrymen so chosen by the different congregations therein, together with the Rector or Minister, if there be one, shall constitute the Vestry of the Parish, with all the duties and powers of other Vestries under these Canons. But the Vestrymen chosen by each congregation respectively, together with the Rector or Minister, shall be a Committee of the Vestry to have the care and control of the property, and to transact the local business, pertaining to that congregation alone, and not to the Parish at large. In which case they may appoint one Warden for their Church, a Treasurer, and a Clerk who shall keep a record of their proceedings.

When in the judgment of the Minister, or, if there be none, of the Senior Warden, a meeting of a Parish Vestry so constituted is impracticable, any matter concurred in by a majority of the aforesaid Committees of the Vestry, and duly recorded by their respective Clerks and the Register of the Vestry, shall be deemed to be the act of the Vestry of the Parish. *Provided, however*, That the Parish Vestry shall meet as a whole at least once a year.

SECTION 7. As soon as may be after their election, the persons chosen as Vestrymen shall assemble at such time and place as the Minister shall appoint, or as shall be designated by any two Vestrymen-elect, the Minister and each Vestryman-elect being notified, and proceed to organize the Vestry. The proceedings at this and every meeting of the Vestry shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's Prayer by the Minister, or in his absence by any member who may be chosen to preside over the meeting.

SECTION 9. The Vestry shall proceed to elect a Senior and a Junior Warden, a Register and a Treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. If Wardens have been chosen for particular churches by Committees of the Vestry, the Senior and Junior Wardens of the Parish shall be chosen from among such Wardens. All Wardens must be communicants and members of the Vestry.

SECTION 10. The Rector shall preside at all meetings of the Vestry when present, and be entitled to give the casting vote in case of a tie, when he is not personally interested. All Vestry meetings shall be subject to his call; but in case he fails, at the request of two Vestrymen, to call a meeting, such Vestrymen, if they deem it necessary, may themselves call a meeting, giving notice thereof to the Rector and to each Vestryman. A majority of the Vestrymen who have qualified, exclusive of the Rector or Minister, shall constitute a quorum; but any Vestry may agree upon a smaller number, not however less than four, to act as a quorum thereof.

SECTION 11. Vacancies occurring in the Vestry shall be filled by a vote of the remaining members. The failure of any Vestryman-elect to qualify within a reasonable time, or the continued neglect of any Vestryman to attend the meetings of the Vestry without adequate excuse, may, after due warning, be deemed to create a vacancy.

### CANON XX.

# Of the Duties of Vestries, Wardens and Other Parish Officers.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Vestry to determine upon and elect a Rector; to co-operate with him in promoting the spiritual welfare of his cure; to use all earnestness in seeking with him to

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enlist new disciples for the congregation of Christ, and particularly as a body to meet, at the Rector's appointment, all persons desiring to be confirmed or to be transferred into the congregation, in order to express to such persons before their reception into the congregation what the Vestry, as the lay leaders of the congregation, consider the duties and privileges of work and service for such prospective members of the fellowship to be; to see that the Rector is properly supported and that his salary is paid regularly and punctually; to provide for the appointment of Trustees under the laws of the State of Virginia authorized to hold the legal title to the church property; to make and execute all contracts for the erection, furnishing, preserving and insuring the church edifice and other property; to regulate the use of the Parish graveyard; to make all necessary provision for church music, with the advice and consent of the Rector, and subject to his control; and generally, as the constituted agents of the Parish or Congregation, to transact all its temporal business.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Wardens to keep watch over the Church property; to see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship; to see that the Sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties; to collect the offerings of the people; to take charge of the font and communion plate; to provide out of the Church funds, under the direction of the Vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion; to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Register of the Vestry to take charge of all Parish records, and to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the Vestry in a well bound book to be provided for that purpose.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all Church funds, except communion alms and other special offerings, and to disburse the same under the direction of the Vestry; to render his accounts to the Vestry at stated times, and to make such reports to the Council as may be required by their orders.

### CANON XXI.

### Of Parish Registers and Parochial Reports.

SECTION 1. Every Minister of this Diocese shall keep a record of the Communicants, and of all Baptisms, Confirmations, Marriages and Burials, within his Parish or Congregation; specifying the time when persons became or ceased to be Communicants under his charge, and

whether by confirmation, transfer, discipline, death or otherwise; the name, age or the date of birth, the sponsors or witnesses, and, in the case of infants, the parents, of each person baptized; the names of persons confirmed, and by what Bishop; the names, ages and residences of persons married, and the names of at least two witnesses; the names and ages of persons buried; and also the date and place of every such rite respectively; attesting each by his signature.

These records shall be made by the Minister in a suitable and substantial book, to be known as the Parish Register, to be provided by the Vestry for that purpose and to remain their property. When a Parish or Church becomes vacant the Parish Register shall be deposited with one of the Wardens, who shall make, or cause to be made. all needful entries therein until a Minister shall be in charge.

SECTION 2. Every minister shall send to the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, to the Secretary, for the President of the Council, on or before the first day of February of each year, a Report of his official acts, and, if he has a cure, of the condition of his Church or Churches, for the year ending the thirty-first day of December preceding, in such form as shall have been prescribed by the Bishop or Council. And if any Church be vacant the report for that Church shall be sent by the Wardens.

### CANON XXII.

# Of the Transfer and Enrollment of Communicants.

SECTION 1. Every communicant removing from one Parish or Church to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the minister a certificate that he or she is a communicant in regular standing, from the Minister, or, if there be no Minister, from one of the Wardens, of the Parish or Church from which the communicant desires to be transferred.

SECTION 2. No Minister shall enroll any persons as communicants in the Parish or Congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, unless he shall be satisfied that they have been regular communicants in some other Parish or Congregation; nor shall he enroll any one who is known to deny the Articles of the Christian Faith as set forth in the Apostles' Creed. 1.8 ST. 

### CANON XXIII.

# Of the Due Celebration of the Lord's Day.

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All persons within this Church are enjoined to celebrate and keep the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, in hearing the word of God

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read and taught, in private and public prayer, and in acts of charity, using all sober and godly conversation.

### CANON XXIV.

### Of Family Worship and Instruction.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of every communicant in this Church, who is at the head of a family, to live in the daily exercise of family worship.

SECTION 2. The members of this Church shall instruct their families, as far as they are able, in the principles of the Christian religion. Parents and sponsors shall be careful to teach their children the solemnity and obligation of their baptismal vows, to cause them to attend the Sunday-school and other catechetical instructions of their Minister, and, as soon as they are sufficiently impressed with the importance and sacredness of their baptismal promise, shall take care that they come to the Minister to be examined, and, if they be deemed fit, to be presented to the Bishop for confirmation.

### CANON XXV.

# Of Offenders to Be Admonished, or Repelled From the Lord's Table.

If any persons within this Church offend their brethren by wickedness of life, such persons shall be admonished, or repelled from the Lord's Table, by the Minister in charge of the Parish or Church, according to the Rubric. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the Minister, or may be requested by the accused, the Wardens of the Parish, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the Minister in ascertaining the facts of the case: *Provided*, That if such Warden or Wardens fail or refuse to act within ten days, the Minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

### CANON XXVI.

# Of the Trial of the Appeal of a Layman After Repulsion From the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and desiring that he may be restored to the Communion. And then the Bishop, unless he think

fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the Minister, shall nominate two of the clergy and two of the laity, of whom the Minister repelling shall select one of the clergymen, and the communicant one of the laymen; and it shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case, under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop; who, thereupon, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence, shall proceed to adjudge the case. If further evidence be required it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. And when the evidence is thus procured the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment whenever made to the Minister repelling, and to the communicant repelled; which judgment shall be final and conclusive. *Provided*, That in case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall nevertheless be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

### CANON XXVII.

### Of the Trial of a Clergyman, Not Being a Bishop.

SECTION 1. The trial of a clergyman, not being a Bishop, shall be on a presentment in writing, specifying with reasonable clearness and certainty as to time, place, and circumstance, the crime or misdemeanor, by violation of the canons or otherwise, charged; the said presentment to be made to the Bishop, either by the Council, or by the Vestry of the Parish or Congregation to which the accused belongs, or by any three presbyters of the Diocese entitled to seats in the Council; the said vestry, or presbyters, pledging themselves to act as a committee of prosecution. If, however, the presentment be made by the Council, then the Council shall appoint the committee of prosecution and furnish them with such instructions as may be deemed necessary.

SECTION 2. Such presentment being made to the Bishop, and being accompanied by a further statement in writing of the names of the witnesses, and of the purport of their evidence, and by such documentary evidence as may be in their possession, the Bishop shall immediately proceed to the trial, according to the following provisions: He shall nominate from among the clergy entitled to seats in the Council, other than the members of the Standing Committee, eight presbyters, and cause a list of their names and a copy of the presentment to be furnished to the accused, or left at his place of

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residence. Of the eight presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the accused may choose five, or in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days so to do, the Bishop shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen shall constitute a court for the trial of the accused. The Bishop shall also at the same time, cause at least thirty days' notice of the time and place of the trial to be given, both to the accused and to the parties presenting him, and also to the presbyters nominated as before provided.

SECTION 3. The Court shall appoint a President and Secretary, the first always from their own body.

SECTION 4. If the accused appear before proceeding to trial, he shall be called on by the court to say whether he is guilty of the offence, or offences, charged against him, and on his neglect or refusal to answer, the plea of not guilty shall be entered for him, and the trial shall proceed: *Provided*, That for sufficient cause the court may adjourn, from time to time, and place to place: And provided also, That the accused shall, at all times during the trial, have liberty to be present, to produce his testimony, and to make his defense.

SECTION 5. On the request of the accused, or the committee of prosecution, witnesses may be summoned, if before the meeting of the court, by the Bishop; if during the session of the court then by its President. All testimony shall be given under oath or affirmation. administered by some officer authorized by law. In case the testimony of any witness, whose attendance on the trial cannot be obtained. is desired, it shall be lawful for either party, at any time after notice of the presentment is served on the accused, to apply to the court, if in session, or if not, to the Bishop, who shall thereupon appoint a commissioner to take the deposition of such witness; and such party so desiring to take deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying such notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness; whereupon, it shall be lawful for the other party, within six days after such notice. to propound crossinterrogatories, and such interrogatories, and cross-interrogatories, if any be propounded, shall be sent to the commissioner, who shall thereupon proceed to take the testimony of such witness, and transmit it under seal to the court. But no deposition shall be read at the trial unless the court have reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, unless both parties shall consent that it may be read.

SECTION 6. The court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall, within ten days after closing the same, declare in a written judgment signed by them, or a majority of them, that the accused is guilty, or not guilty, of the charge or charges, or any of them, laid in the presentment, in order therein set forth, and also, if guilty, what punishment shall be awarded; which judgment, with all the evidence received, shall be delivered forthwith to the Bishop; whereupon, unless the Bishop see cause to mitigate or remit the punishment, or to grant a new trial, he shall pronounce sentence according to the judgment of the court, and such sentence shall be final. In case a new trial is granted, a new court shall be constituted according to the provisions of this Canon.

SECTION 7. If the accused shall neglect or refuse to appear before the court, when summoned according to section second of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the court shall declare him to be in contumacy, and report the same to the Bishop, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass against him for contumacy; but the said sentence shall be reversed by the Bishop, if, within three calendar months, the accused shall tender himself ready, and accordingly appear, to take his trial on the presentment; but if he shall not so tender himself before the expiration of the said three months, the sentence of degradation from the ministry for contumacy shall forthwith be pronounced by the Bishop, who shall cause such sentence to be publicly read to the congregations of the Diocese by the respective ministers thereof.

SECTION 8. If at any time the accused shall confess himself guilty of the matters charged in the presentment, or any of them, the court shall proceed to award the punishment, and certify the same, as hereinbefore provided, to the Bishop, who shall, unless he see cause to remit or mitigate the punishment, pronounce the sentence according to the Canons.

SECTION 9. All notices and papers contemplated by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Bishop, or by the court when the same is in session; and the certificate of any such summoner shall be evidence of the due service of a notice or paper. The delivery of a written notice or paper to a party, or the leaving it at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

SECTION 10. The accused party may have the privilege of appearing by counsel, in number not more than two, and, in case of the exercise of such privilege, but not otherwise, those presenting shall have the like privilege. If the party accused desire it the trial shall be in public, and said party shall be entitled to a copy of the evidence if he require it.

SECTION 11. In case of a presentment occurring during a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, such presentment shall be made to the Standing Committee, who shall thereon take such steps as are by this Canon enjoined on the Bishop. *Provided*, That on receiving the proceedings

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and judgments of the court, they shall transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese, who shall be requested, and is hereby authorized, to act thereon, as if he were the Bishop of this Diocese, and, if he shall concur in opinion with the court, he shall proceed to pronounce sentence accordingly.

SECTION 12. The expenses of such trial, as also those of the investigating committee preliminary to a presentment, shall be defrayed by the Treasurer out of the Contingent Fund by order of the Council, or, when it is not in session, of the Committee on Finance.

SECTION 13. All judgments and proceedings under this Canon shall, after they have been acted on by the Bishop, be transmitted by him to the Standing Committee, who shall preserve the same.

### CANON XXVIII.

### Of Altering or Adding to the Canons.

No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall hereafter be considered by the Council, unless at least one day's notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a committee of at least two presbyters and two laymen. Nor shall such alteration or addition be adopted during the same Council if two-thirds of the members present shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration until the next annual Council.

### CANON XXIX.

### Of Former Canons Repealed.

All the former Canons or parts of Canons of this Diocese, not included in these Canons, are hereby repealed.

# APPENDIX

CANONS

# CERTAIN CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF VESTRIES AND THE LAY PEOPLE: SELECTED BY THE BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE, AND PUBLISHED HERE BY ORDER OF THE COUNCIL.

### CANON 20.

### Of the Filling of Vacant Cures.

SECTION 1. When a Parish or Congregation becomes vacant the Church-wardens or other proper officers shall notify the fact to the Bishop. If the authorities of the Parish shall for thirty days have failed to make provision for the services, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to take such measures as he may deem expedient for the temporary maintenance of Divine services therein.

SECTION 2. No election of a Rector shall be had until the name of the Clergyman whom it is proposed to elect has been made known to the Bishop, if there be one, and sufficient time, not exceeding thirty days, has been given to him to communicate with the Vestry thereon.

SECTION 3. Written notice of the election, signed by the Churchwardens shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese If the Ecclesiastical Authority be satisfied that the person so chosen is a duly qualified Minister, and that he has accepted the office, the notice shall be sent to the Secretary of the Convention, who shall record it. And such record shall be sufficient evidence of the relation between the Minister and the Parish.

SECTION 4. A Minister is settled, for all purposes here or elsewhere mentioned in these Canons, who has been engaged permanently by any Parish, according to the rules of said Diocese, or for any term not less than one year.

SECTION 5. In case of the election of an Assistant Minister, a certificate from the Rector and Wardens shall be sent to the Bishop.

### CANON 26.

### Of Lay Readers.

SECTION 1. A competent person ready and desirous to serve the Church in the public services statedly as a Lay Reader must procure

from the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or Missionary District a written license. Such license shall not be granted to any but a male communicant of this Church, and must be given for a definite period, not longer than one year, but may be renewed from time to time, or revoked at any time. Such license may be given for any vacant Parish or Mission, or for a Congregation without a Minister, but where a Presbyter is in charge, his request and recommendation must have been previously signified to the Ecclesiastical Authority. A license shall not be granted for conducting the service in a Congregation without a Minister, which is able and has had reasonable opportunity to secure the services of an ordained Minister. If the Lay Reader be a student in any Theological Seminary, he shall also, before acting as such, obtain the permission of the presiding officer of such institution and of his own Bishop.

SECTION 2. A Lay Reader shall be subject to the regulations prescribed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and shall not serve in any Diocese other than that in which he is licensed, unless he shall have received a license from the Bishop of the Diocese in which he desires to serve.

SECTION 3. In all matters relating to the conduct of the service, and to the Sermons or Homilies to be read, he shall conform to the directions of the Minister in charge of the Parish, Congregation, or Mission in which he is serving, and, in all cases, to the directions of the Bishop. He shall read only the Morning and Evening Prayer (omitting the Absolution), the Litany, and the Office for the Burial of the Dead. He shall not deliver sermons or addresses of his own composition, unless, after instruction and examination, he be specially licensed thereto for urgent needs by the Bishop. He shall not wear the dress appropriate to Clergymen ministering in the Congregation.

### CANON 43.

### Of the Solemnization of Matrimony.

SECTION 1. Ministers of this Church shall be careful to secure the observance of the law of the State governing the civil contract of marriage in the place where the service shall be performed.

SECTION 2. (i) No Minister shall solemnize a marriage except in the presence of at least two witnesses.

(ii) Every Minister shall without delay formally record in the proper register the name, age and residence of each party. Such record shall be signed by the Minister who solemnizes the marriage, and if practicable, by the married parties, and by at least two witnesses of the marriage.

SECTION 3. No Minister, knowingly, after due inquiry, shall solemnize the marriage of any person who has been or is the husband or wife of any other person then living, from whom he or she has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage. Nor shall it be lawful for any member of this Church to enter upon a marriage when either of the contracting parties is the husband of the wife of any other person then living from whom he or she has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage. But this Canon shall not be held to apply to the innocent party in a divorce for adultery; Provided, that before the application for such remarriage a period of not less than one year shall have elapsed, after the granting of such divorce: and that satisfactory evidence touching the facts in the case, including a copy of the Court's Decree, and Record, if practicable, with proof that the defendant was personally served or appeared in the action, be laid before the Ecclesiastical Authority, and such Ecclesiastical Authority, having taken legal advice thereon, shall have declared in writing that in his judgment the case of the applicant conforms to the requirements of this Canon; and Provided, further, that it shall be within the discretion of any minister to decline to solemnize any marriage.

SECTION 4. If any Minister of this Church shall have reasonable cause to think that a person desirous of being admitted to Holy Baptism, or to Confirmation, or to the Holy Communion, has been married otherwise than as the Word of God and discipline of this Church allow, such Minister, before receiving such person to these ordinances, shall refer the case to the Bishop, for his godly judgment thereupon; *Provided, however*, that no Minister shall in any case refuse these ordinances to a penitent person in imminent danger of death.

### CANON 49.

### Of the Music of the Church.

It shall be the duty of every Minister to appoint for use in his Congregation hymns or anthems from those authorized by the Rubrics. and, with such assistance as he may see fit to employ from persons skilled in music, to give order concerning the tunes to be sung in his Church. It shall be his especial duty to suppress all light and unseemly music, and all irreverence in the performance.

### CANON 50.

### Of the Consecration of Churches.

SECTION 1. No Church or Chapel shall be consecrated until the Bishop shall have been sufficiently certified that the building and the grounds on which it is erected have been fully paid for, and are free from lien or other incumbrance; and also that such building and

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ground are secured from the danger of alienation, either in whole or in part, from those who profess and practice the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of this Church, except in the cases provided for in Secs. 2 and 3 of this Canon.

SECTION 2. It shall not be lawful for any Vestry, Trustees, or other body authorized by law of any State or Territory to hold property for any Diocese, Parish, or Congregation, to encumber or alienate any consecrated Church or Chapel, or any Church or Chapel which has been used solely for Divine Service, belonging to the Parish or Congregation which they represent, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

SECTION 3. No consecrated Church or Chapel shall be removed, taken down, or otherwise disposed of for any worldly or common use, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

### Other Provisions of the General Canons.

A person applying to the Standing Committee for recommendation to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders, or for ordination to the Diaconate, or the Priesthood, must present a certificate of his character and fitness signed by the Vestry of the Parish to which he belongs. Canons 2, 7, 8. (Therefore, when a Rector has recommended a postulant to the Bishop as a fit person to study for the ministry, said Rector should report the fact to his Vestry; and the Vestry should be careful to become acquainted with the postulant, that they may intelligently indorse him.)

If a Bishop shall for three years have declined to visit a Parish or Congregation, the Vestry (in this Diocese including the Rector), may apply to the Presiding Bishop for a Council of Conciliation, to be composed of the five Bishops living nearest the Diocese. Canon 18 Sec. 2 (ii).

In case there be no Minister in charge of a congregation—"No Church-wardens, Vestrymen, or Trustees of the Congregation, shall permit any person to officiate therein, without sufficient evidence of his being duly licensed or ordained to minister in this Church." Canon 23.

It shall be the duty of the Vestry or Church-wardens having charge of the Parish Register, in a vacant Parish, to exhibit it to the Bishop on the occasion of his visitation. Canon 21, Sec. 2 (iii).

A Vestry has the privilege of refusing its consent to the resignation of its Rector. Canon 42, Sec. 1.

A Vestry desiring for urgent reasons a separation and dissolution of pastoral relations with its Rector, may, if the parties be not agreed, give notice thereof in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority, who will act in the premises. Canon 42, Sec. 2.

Lay Delegates to the Diocesan Council are called upon to sign a testimonial for a person whom they elect Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor. Canon 13, Sec. 1 (1).

Lay Delegates may also be called upon to take part in placing the Diocese under the provisional charge of the Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor of another Diocese. Canon 18, Sec. 6 (ii).

A person applying to be appointed Deaconess must lay before the Bishop a testimonial of fitness, signed by twelve lay communicants, six of whom shall be women, as a prerequisite to her appointment to that function. Canon 24, Sec. 3.

A communicant in good standing, removing from one Parish or Congregation to another, is entitled to a certificate that he or she is a communicant. Canon 44, Sec. 3.

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
