#### FORMS FOR MAKING BEOUEST

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

If it is the desire to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its officers.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is, "Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia."

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia."

The legal title of the Episcopal High School is "Protestant Episcopal High School in Virginia."

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia."

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia," a corporation chartered under the laws of Virginia.

The legal title of the Blue Ridge Industrial School is: "The Blue Ridge Industrial School, Incorporated."

The legal title of St. Agnes' School, Alexandria, is: "St. Agnes' Episcopal School for Girls, Incorporated."

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg is: "The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia."

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

#### **ORGANIZATION**

From Canon I, Section 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

#### RULES OF ORDER

1st. The Council shall be opened with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Report of Secretary.

Election of a Secretary.

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day. The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Communications from Convocations.

Report of special committees.

report of special committee

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on New Parishes.

A Committee on Dispatch of Business.

And the chairmen of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President may think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next Council.

5th. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention, shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

6th. Divine service shall be held on the Wednesday evening of each Council with a sermon, and a committee of three shall be appointed at each Council to select a preacher to deliver this sermon at the succeeding Council.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; and all resolutions shall be referred to their proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefi-

nitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgresses the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *Provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

25th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

26th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the President may

appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And the Committee may report at any time.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS

27th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

28th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

29th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

30th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

The 137th annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia convened this morning at 10 o'clock in St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, Richmond. The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D., assisted by the Rt. Rev. F. D. Goodwin, D. D., Bishop-Coadjutor; Rev. Giles B. Palmer and Rev. C. G. Chamberlayne, Ph. D.

Immediately after the close of the communion service the Council was called to order. The official list of clergy of the Diocese was presented and the roll called therefrom. The Assistant Secretary then called the roll of lay delegates. Seventy-two clergy and sixty-three lay delegates were found to be present.

The Chair appointed the following

Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, D. D., was re-elected Secretary of the Council. He appointed Rev. Lewis Carter Harrison Assistant Secretary.

On motion, the Rev. A. M. Sherman, D. D., of Hangkow, China; Rev. H. E. Batcheller, of Albemarle county; Archdeacon William Wyllie, of the Missionary District of Haiti and Santo Domingo, and the Rev. James H. Garner, of the Diocese of Easton, being present, were invited to seats in the Council.

It was moved that the Council take a recess for luncheon from 1 to 2:30 and adjourn at 5 o'clock; that the Council convene at 9:30 tomorrow morning and take a recess from 1 to 2:30 P. M. for luncheon. This motion was carried.

It was moved that the Rules of Order of the last Council be adopted with the following amendment; that the words "and Thursday" in the first line of the sixth rule be omitted and the word "evenings" changed to "evening". This motion was carried.

Bishop Tucker read his annual address to the Council.

#### THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS

#### BRETHREN:

In opening the 137th annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia. I extend to you my affectionate greetings. Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. May the Holy Spirit so direct us in our deliberations that this Council may be an effective agency in carrying out God's purpose.

Since our last meeting one of the oldest and best loved of our clergy, the Rev. William Byrd Lee, has passed away. Mr. Lee was born in Millwood, Clarke county, in 1851. After his graduation from the Seminary in 1878 he went to Culpeper county, where he served for three years. With the exception of these three years his whole ministry was spent in Gloucester county. Mr. Lee's life was an exemplification of the beauty of holiness and the power of simple faith working through love. To him to live was Christ. Like his Master, he went about doing good. Being dead, he yet speaketh, helping us to realize the worth of character and the value of pastoral work.

I do not propose in this address to say much about the financial problems that confront both our own Diocese and the General Church. This does not mean that I do not consider these problems important. On the contrary, they have a vital bearing upon the progress of the work which Christ has committed to us. One of the

main duties of this Council is to adopt a budget and to discuss the methods by which the money which it calls for is to be raised. This question will, however, be presented to you in the reports of the Treasurer and of the Board of Apportionment. I hope that you will give their proposals serious consideration and that there will be full and frank discussion of the problems involved. It would be foolish to overlook the fact that we are faced with really serious problems. If the measure of a Church's welfare were the amount of its income in dollars, there would be ample ground for discouragement in the present situation. The Diocese of Virginia has suffered a large shrinkage in the contributions made to its work. So far this has not necessitated the abandonment of any specific field of activity. It is obvious, however, that while emergency measures may suffice to keep the work going on for a time, some permanent adjustment between our income and our proposed expenditures must be sought. We need not indeed be unduly discouraged nor take counsel of our fears. I believe that most of our people are giving proportionately just as generously, if not more so, than they did in the days of prosperity. Let us therefore combine prudence with faith. Faith does not mean foolish optimism, but it means confidence that this work is given us of God and that the people of God when they understand its needs will bravely and even gladly make real sacrifices to supply them.

There is one matter relating to the budget which came to my attention too late to be referred to the Executive Committee. The House of Bishops, at its recent meeting, passed a resolution recommending that if further cuts in the budget of the General Church are necessary, these cuts should be made in the appropriations to aided Dioceses rather than in those to missionary districts. The National Council has as yet taken no action in regard to this, but will undoubtedly follow the recommendation. Naturally the first reductions will be made in the appropriations to the stronger Dioceses. At the recent meeting attention was called to the rule that Dioceses accepting appropriations must agree not to solicit funds from outside sources without the approval of the National Council. The Diocese of Virginia is at present an aided Diocese. We receive from the United Thank Offering through the National Council the salaries of two of our mountain workers. I would suggest to the Council the advisability of voluntarily relinquishing this aid. If possible, we should do so without diminishing the amount of our pledge to the General Church. We ought to anticipate any action by the National Council. This not only seems to me the proper thing for the Diocese to do in the circumstances, but it will release us from the necessity of securing the approval of the National Council to solicit funds from outside sources for our mountain work.

In the work of the Church, as in all forms of human endeavor, there are two main questions, that of production and that of distribution. In Christian work there is no danger of overproduction nor of lack of demand. Sometimes, indeed, the demand is latent, so that distribution means not only carrying around what is produced, but also creating a demand for it on the part of those who have a real need, but often an unrecognized one. That is what we mean by the missionary work of the Church.

What is it that is produced and distributed? When we look at church reports it may sometimes appear as if the purpose was to produce money. Clearly, however, the money raised by a church is the means to an end and not the end itself. The Church is the body through which Christ's purpose is realized. "I am come," said he, "that ye may have life." The Church exists in order to produce life, or to express it differently to transform men and women into the likeness of Jesus Christ. Life is not a static term. It is not something which can be produced and stored away; life is activity. This activity is maintained by a constant process of taking in and giving out spiritual energy. Spiritual life is nourished through worship, that is to say, communion with God. It expresses itself in Christ-like service. Both are equally essential to its welfare. "He that abideth in me and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away."

We live in a period when the value and obligation of service are widely recognized. If, however, our service is to be a means of communicating to others the Christian life, we must ourselves be Christ-like in our own lives. We cannot give what we have not ourselves acquired. The lesson of a time like the present, when the quantity of our material contributions is necessarily decreased, may well be that God is teaching us to pay more attention to their spiritual quality. We must equip ourselves for more effective service by appropriating more of the Spirit of Christ through more real communion with Him.

Worship is the means by which we keep ourselves in vital touch with God. I need hardly say that it is a spiritual activity. "God is Spirit and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth." What we need then is not only more worship, but a better quality of worship, more real communion with God.

Reality in worship is dependent first of all upon the reality of our belief in God. St. Paul asks, "How can they call on Him in whom they have not believed"? While his question had reference primarily to those who were beyond the hearing of the Gospel, yet it is relevant to conditions in Christian countries today. There was

a time when it might be assumed that practically every one believed in God. He is revealed to us in Christ. There was doubtless much indifference with regard to religion, much failure to live according to Christian standards. The world, the flesh and the devil led many astray. Yet these lapses were not, as a rule, indicative of fundamental changes of belief. So far as men gave any thought to religion, they were likely to accept the customary Christian interpretation. This can no longer be assumed of the generation that is growing up today. Education means the introduction to a world view that is not only indifferent, but in many respects is definitely hostile to Christianity. Belief is confronted with real problems and the danger becomes acute just in proportion as one thinks seriously.

A well-known English scientist, in a recent article, says, "Probably religion as a whole, and certainly the Christian religion, is in for a bad time during the next few centuries." Personally, I do not agree with this opinion. If the Church will but meet the situation bravely, energetically and intelligently, I believe that we can confidently expect a great spiritual revival. Already there is a perceptible trend away from the arid rationalism and the soul-destroying materialism of the last century. No one can foresee as yet what this change portends, but there is ample ground for believing that the world-view of the coming era will be more congenial to religion than is that out of which we are passing. This means opportunity for the Church, but it will be a lost opportunity if we do not prepare ourselves to utilize it.

What bearing has this rather abstract disquisition upon the practical questions with which this Council is concerned? If my reading of the situation is correct, the most important task of the Church is to make ready for the opportunity that lies ahead of us. We ourselves may pass away without receiving the promises—the future will be determined by our children. The responsibility for training them, however, rests upon us. We must keep them in vital relationship with Christ, that He may be the dominating influence in their development. There is another task which perhaps equals this in importance. Our children will have either as rivals or as co-workers in determining the world of the coming age the children of those civilizations that are growng up in non-Christian countries. It is difficult, perhaps, for those who have not lived in Asia to recognize the tremendous import of this consideration. Personally, I am convinced after considerable experience and opportunity for direct observation that foreign missionary work is not only a Christian obligation, but that it is also a task which is second to no other in its bearing upon the future welfare of the world.

With regard to the religious training of our own children I

would like to say two things. We cannot protect them from the tension that is produced when they come into contact with the prevalent world-view. This, however, makes it all the more important to prepare them for it so far as is possible. First of all, we must give them careful training during the early years when a child's development is almost entirely shaped by the influences which come from its home environment. This is the age when it is pre-eminently true that example is better than precept. A home in which God's presence and influence are so real that they take their place naturally among the formative factors in the child's development is the most effective preparation for the problems that will arise later. If worship has been as much a part of the home life as the other family activities, it will become a fixed attitude that will tend to maintain itself amid all the experiences of adolescence and maturity. At this stage it is the parents' attitude towards God rather than any teaching about God that matters most. The child will reproduce your real self and not your assumed self. If your teaching is an exemplication of your life it will have weight. Otherwise, it will be in the child's life what it is in yours, an external addition which has but little bearing on the issues of life and which in times of stress will be easily lost.

For the young child home-training is undoubtedly the most important factor in religious development. As it grows older a change takes place both in its environment and in its reaction to the influences which come into its life. Contact with the world outside of the home increases. The youth begins to think for himself. In  ${\it so}$ doing he naturaly develops a new emotional life and claims the right to choose his own way. We need not be surprised if this new sense of freedom is accompanied by a tendency to break away from the routine which has hitherto been imposed upon him. We hear a good deal about the revolt of modern youth, but it is probable that revolt has always been the natural, and one may perhaps say the proper first reaction of a newly aroused sense of freedom. The question is how to deal with such an attitude. Coercion either crushes the most valuable characteristic of youth or hardens the natural spirit of independence into permanent alienation. To leave inexperienced freedom utterly without guidance exposes it to unjustifiable risks. It is impossible here to do more than to state the problem: How can young people between the ages, say, of fifteen and twenty-five be kept in vital touch with Jesus Christ? We must seek an answer to that question. If the Church is failing to reach them, we must assume that there is something lacking in its method of approach to them. We know how to reach younger children, even though we may frequently fail to act upon this knowledge. We are equipped to supply

the needs of older people. Our church services and our preaching are, if one may use the term, attuned to them. When it comes to practical activities, most of the work of the church is committed to the mature and experienced members. Our appeals for financial support are primarily directed to them, or else to the small children in our Sunday schools. In view of the importance of this problem, I would recommend the appointment of a commission to study the whole question of work among young adults.

Bishop Tucker then presented his Journal of Confirmations and Official Acts. (See Appendix A, I.)

The Council took under consideration the proposed amendments to Article II of the Constitution adopted at the Council last May and now brought up for final action. The first amendment is as follows:

Resolved, That Section (a) of Article II be amended to read as follows:

(a) The Bishop or Bishops, and the ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who are now or may hereafter be canonically settled

in parishes or churches within the Diocese, professors of the Theological Seminary in Virginia or any other theological seminary in connection with the Protestant Episcopal Church being ordained ministers canonically connected with this Diocese, missionaries within this Diocese and under its ecclesiastical authority being clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese, chaplains in the United States Army or Navy canonically connected with this Diocese, clergymen canonically connected with this Diocese, clergymen canonically connected with this Diocese, or holding executive positions in the work of the Diocese or in the work of the Church under the National Council. Provided, etc., as at present.

Mr. R. B. Tunstall moved that the proposed amendment be amended by striking out the word "executive" in the last sentence and inserting in its stead the word "official".

The Chair ruled that the proposed change of this word would be a new amendment to the Constitution, which would necessitate its being reported back to the parishes before final action next year. Mr. Tunstall then withdrew his amendment.

The proposed amendment to the Constitution was adopted by a constitutional majority of 148 to 1.

Mr. Sands then presented the following resolution:

Be It Resolved, That the word "executive" as mentioned and included in the amendment just made of the Constitution be interpreted as if that word had been written "official".

This resolution was adopted.

The Council then took under consideration the second proposed amendment to Article II, which is as follows:

Be It Resolved, That in Article II of the Constitution the words in Section (a), "Provided further, that only such colored ministers shall be members as are hereinafter specified", be omitted. And further, be it

Resolved, That Section (c) of Article II of the Constitution be amended to read as follows: "Two lay delegates from the Colored Ministry Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is or may hereafter be constituted by Canon,"

This amendment was adopted by a vote of 129 to 20.

The hour of 1 having come, the Council took recess for luncheon.

Wednesday, May 18,—2:30 P. M.

Council convened, Bishop Tucker presiding. Mr. W. Frank Powers presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That, beginning with the Council of 1933, each official delegate to the Council shall pay to the Treasurer of the Diocese the sum of one dollar; the amount so collected to be turned over to the parish acting as host to the Council for the entertainment of the delegates. In the event that any parish acting as host to the Council shall not desire to avail itself of this fund, the amount collected shall be applied to the Bishop's Emergency Fund.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CONSIDER THAT PART OF THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS DEALING WITH THE CHURCH'S RELATION TO THE YOUNGER MEMBERS OF THE CONGREGATION.

There should be a closer union between the young people's organizations and the Church as a place for worship than now seems to exist. The Sunday Schools and various other branches of the Church, organized for the purpose of reaching the young, are not separate and distinct organizations, but should be an integral part of the Church, and it is therefore of the utmost importance that Church attendance for the purpose of devotional worship should receive more emphasis. This can be accomplished by laying more stress upon the spiritual side and less upon the social side of the various organizations with regular and devout worship as the main objective, and thus a valuable and lasting sense of devotion to the service can be instilled into the individual members.

The problem naturally arises with the young people of marriageable age.

With many of these, the only contact with the Church in a physical way is the fact that they will call upon the Church to per-

from the marriage ceremony. As this is a point of contact with them, it would be well for the Church to capitalize this contact.

According to the present canons of the Church, the rector is expected to "instruct" those who are to be married. Just what that instruction should be is a matter of argument, but we are convinced that a religious life is a safeguard for all that the marriage stands for, and that divorces and unhappy separations are most frequently found in those who do not exercise worship in their lives. An impression at such a time may be created that will challenge the young couple to more active interest in the Church. The rector who kindly insists that the ceremony is more than a gay incident in a social life, and who shows that his interest is greater than the mere receiving of a fee, will find at that time of life, no matter how far the couple may have wandered from their spiritual home, a grateful sense of reality that may be the cause of their remaining loyal to the Church throughout their lifetime. Some rectors have found that real attention focused on matters of personal religion, such as advice to the young couple to have prayer together as much as possible, will be received more warmly at that time than it ever will be when preached from the pulpit later.

With the advent of children in the home another point of contact is gained. Many young couples who never go near a church, for sentimental or family reasons, will want the Church's baptism. Here is a great opportunity to remind young parents in the spirit of friendliness and interest of their responsibility in endowing their children with a spiritual heritage as good at the very least as they would care to give them in a physical way.

When it is realized that many young parents today are guiding their children in the early stages of education without any real sense of worship and reverence latent in any child, a tremendous field of usefulness presents itself to the Church's leaders. Any rector would find it important to study this subject in itself and to point out to parents the great opportunity given them to awaken the sense of the beautiful in life rooted in a real worship of the Father.

We take it that the function of this Committee is to make a sketchy survey of the field of the Church's provision for the young people. We feel that the most fundamental question is that which comes forward in the report of the Committee on Reverence and Worship as a warm, hearty service with a timely sermon which attacks present-day problems will attract many of those whose absence from Church now gives us concern.

After the regular Sunday School many parishes provide Bible Classes for young people. At the same age there is a most effective organization available in the Young People's Service League. Under

interested adult guidance this is proving an attractive focal point for the young life of the parish between fourteen and twenty.

We have done much for our work at the University of Virginia, but more should be done for the other colleges in the Diocese.

The greatest and most serious leakage in the scheme of Church development is perhaps the failure of the Church to get hold of the young men and women when they return home from college, or when at the same age they come into the community to make a living.

Two suggestions have been made to the Committee as to means of conserving this young life. The first has to do with early training. Many of our young people have not formed the habit of churchgoing early enough. They have gone to Sunday School and to the Young People's Service Leagues, but have been denied that great safeguard of having for all their conscious life sat in the family pews with their parents and taken part in the beauty of the Church's worship from infancy.

The second suggestion is that the choir has taken the service so away from the congregation that these young people are not satisfied with looking on, and lose interest. If this be so the fault is not with the choir, but with the rector, to whom the control of the music is entrusted.

No institutional activity is, we feel, ever going to hold the young people or any other people to the Church. It may hold them to the institution, but the Church's business is the worship of God-and the attachment is one that is personal and can be made only personally. Nothing can take the place of a rector's interest in the affairs of each individual, social, athletic, business, as well as spiritual. This grows more difficult in larger parishes and therefore the city churches must look to the country and town churches for their ideal.

This is indeed a sketchy outline and we think this study should be continued, therefore we present the following resolution:

Resolved, That a permanent Commission be established in the Diocese of Virginia to study the Church's relation to the younger members of the congregations.

#### THURSDAY, MAY 19-9:30 A. M.

The Council convened. Bishop Tucker presiding. After the opening prayers the minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

The Council continued consideration of the budget for 1933, presented by the Board of Apportionment. The several remaining items down to the Virginia Churchman were considered seriatim and adopted as recommended by the Board.

The item of the Virginia Churchman was taken under consideration.

Mr. Nelson read the following memorial from the Valley Convocation:

"Whereas, the Valley Convocation has heard with grave concern the statement of the present financial condition of the Virginia Churchman; and

Whereas, this convocation realizes the great value of this paper to the whole Diocese;

Be It Resolved, That we express the hope that plans may be devised by the Publicity Board of the Diocesan Missionary Society by which the continuance of the publication of this paper may be secured and the distribution thereof in every home in the Diocese may be arranged."

The item of Virginia Churchman, \$1,500, was adopted; the item Quota for Work of the General Church, \$46,200, was adopted; the Item Diocesan Deficit Note, \$3,882, was adopted. The report of the Board of Apportionment was then adopted as a whole.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE OF ALBEMARLE CONVOCATION REGARDING THE VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN.

A committee was appointed by the Albemarle Convocation, at the suggestion of the Bishop of the Diocese, to make recommendations to the Diocesan Council regarding the Virginia Churchman. The Committee hereby reports the consensus of opinion of the members of the Convocation.

The publication of the Virginia Churchman should be continued. It is valuable and necessary as a means of direct contact between the Diocese and the people of the Diocese, as a means of spreading information about and arousing interest in the work of the Diocese and as the best possible way to combat the spirit of parochialism.

Nevertheless, the proposed cut in the appropriation for the Virginia Churchman is approved. It is believed that publication could continued even if the appropriation were cut to \$1,000.

If a cut is made, it would be necessary (1) to reduce expenses or (2) to secure additional income from other sources.

Expenses can be cut by reducing the number of issues per year or reducing the number of pages per issue. It is believed that to do this during the period of depression would not destroy the usefulness of the paper.

It is believed that an arbitrary cut in the circulation of the paper would destroy its best usefulness. It ought to go to every actual Church family in the Diocese, whether consisting of one or more persons. It may not be read by all, but only in this way is every possible susceptible reader reached.

Mailing lists should, of course, be carefully corrected and pruned of all "dead wood" and "paper names".

Additional income could be secured by asking for voluntary subscriptions. This would be in addition to the subscriptions printed on the pledge cards. These must be continued in order to hold our second class privileges in mailing. These additional subscriptions, or contributions, could be secured, not by canvasses, but by direct appeal to the people through the paper and otherwise. While many would not respond, many would be glad to contribute enough to cover two, or five, or ten, or more subscriptions. This plan has been successfully used. These additional subscriptions would be given with the understanding that the paper would continue to go to every family in the Diocese.

However, it is felt that these technical problems growing out of

a cut in appropriation cannot be wisely or successfully solved in the meeting of the Council. Therefore, the adoption of the following resolution is recommended:

Resolved, That all revision of plans, procedure and methods of the Virginia Churchman be referred to the Board of Publicity of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society for consideration, with power to act, subject to the approval of the Bishop.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

To the 137th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that all accounts of the various funds under the charge of the Treasurer of the Diocese from January 1 to December 31, 1931, have been audited by Messrs. A. M. Pullen & Company, Certified Public Accountants of Richmond, and have been found to be correct.

The receipts of the Bishops' and Contingent Fund for 1931 from the assessments of \$18,972 made upon the parishes of the Diocese amounted to \$16,960.69. This, with a payment of \$4,000 from the Episcopal Fund and a balance from 1930 of \$2,518.35, made total receipts of \$23,479.04. A number of payments upon parish assessments for the Contingent Fund for 1931, amounting to \$901.05, were not received until after the books of the year were closed and will be accounted for in the transactions of 1932.

The total disbursements for the year were \$22,335.97, leaving a balance as of December 31, 1931, of \$1,143.07. All appropriations for the year were paid during the year 1931, with the exception of the one item of \$1,200 to the Episcopal Fund. This item was paid in full at the beginning of the year 1932 out of the balance of \$1,143.07 mentioned above and other receipts from Contingent Fund assessments received after the books for 1931 were closed. The itemized statement of this report will appear in the report of the Treasurer of the Diocese and will be printed in the Council Journal.

Rev. R. B. Nelson presented the following resolutions from the report of the Board of Social Service of the Province of Washington:

Whereas, the Social Service Commission of the Province of Washington has heard with great satisfaction the report of the Special Committee of the Board of Christian Social Service of the Diocese of Virginia concerning the Shenandoah National Park; and

Whereas, it is evident from the report that Mr. W. E. Carson, of Riverton, Va., Chairman of the State Conservation Commission. secured the interest of the State and national authorities in the welfare of the people in the park, thereby securing for the Church twelve of the thirteen mission stations in the original area, as well as the homes of the people. It is also evident that Mr. Carson secured the interest of the President of the United States and that of the Secretary of the Interior whereby the government of the United States accepts equal responsibility with the State in looking after the welfare of the people who must move out of the park area and the promise to provide lands for their future homes; be it

Resolved, That this Commission expresses its profound appreciation of the activities on the part of Mr. Carson, considering this a very fine piece of Social Service work.

Whereas, the Social Service Commission of the Province of Washington has been informed that arrangements have been made whereby Mrs. F. A. Habersham will take moving pictures of the mountain work of the Church in the mountains of Virginia and Southwestern Virginia; and

Whereas, this work has made a large contribution toward the solution of the Social Service problems of the Southern mountaineer, and deserves the support of the whole Church; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Commission memorializes the Synod of Washington to give these pictures and lectures as wide circulation and as broad a field of usefulness as possible.

Mr. Nelson then moved that the action referred to in the above report be approved by the Council. This motion was adopted.

Rev. Robert F. Gibson presented the report of the Committee on Canons, recommending the adoption of the amendment to Canon X proposed by Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., as follows:

Resolved, That the fifth paragraph of Article 6 of Canon X shall be so amended in the second line thereof that the said paragraph shall read:

It shall be the duty of the minister and vestry of each parish and congregation to further the objects of this campaign by laying before the people of the congregation the apportionment as fixed by the Board of Apportionment and by using all diligence, to secure pledges to the full ability of their respective congregations to give to the budget of the Diocese and other missionary opportunities of the Church, and to provide for the payment to the Treasurer of the

Diocese in regular monthly installments during the next fiscal year of the amount pledged to the Diocesan budget. It shall be the further duty of said minister and vestry to report to the Treasurer of the Diocese not later than December 15th each year the amount which said parish or congregation expects to pay on or above its apportionment.

The report of the Committee was received and the proposed amendment to the Canon was adopted by a canonical vote.

# PETITION FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF A NEW PARISH TO BE CALLED GIBSON PARISH.

To the 137th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

We, the undersigned, representing the congregations of Grace Church, Stanardsville; Cecil Memorial Mission, Stanardsville; Middle River Mission, Fletcher; Upper and Lower Pocosan Missions, McMullen; St. James' Mission, Lydia; and the Blue Ridge Industrial School field, having organized a vestry, do hereby respectfully request that we be admitted into union with the Council as Gibson Parish.

We are naming the parish "Gibson Parish" in memory of Rt. Rev. Robert A. Gibson, who was deeply interested in the mountain work.

We request further that, inasmuch as Middle River Mission, which is an integral part of our field, is immediately across the line in Madison county, the territory of Gibson Parish, which includes all Greene county with the exception of the Mission Home, Frazier Mountain and Simmon's Gap area, be extended to include certain territory at present within the bounds of Bromfield Parish, the new boundary to be as follows: a line drawn from the crest of the Blue Ridge above the headwaters of the Rapidan River, following the course of the aforesaid river to its junction with Conway, or Middle River, which coincides with the Greene county line.

The parish will include the following congregations:

Grace Church, Stanardsville. with 60 communicants
Cecil Memorial Mission. with 25 communicants
St. James' Mission. with 15 communicants
Upper Pocosan Mission. with 18 communicants
Lower Pocosan Mission. with 56 communicants
Middle River Mission. with 20 communicants
Blue Ridge Industrial School field. with 81 communicants

We beg to report that we have taken the proper canonical action of notification to the Bishop of this proposed action, and inasmuch as that part of Bromfield Parish in Madison county has no canonical organization, we have reported to the vestries of Trinity and Emmanuel Churches in Bromfield Parish, Rappahannock county, our request that the small section of Bromfield Parish included in our field be added to Gibson Parish.

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#### REVERENCE IN WORSHIP.

Its Promotion in the Diocese of Virginia.

To the Clergy and Laity:

Communion with God in worship is the heart of religious experience. Corporate worship binds together a congregation in one of the strongest bonds that exists and endues its members with new inspiration to carry into daily life.

To actualize this ideal each worshipper must make his own part in public service as acceptable to God and as helpful to his companions in worship as possible.

The Church of the Prayer Book is a truly descriptive name of this Church. The Prayer Book is, with the Church's Constitution, the fundamental law of the Church. In its Preface "the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free" is harmonized with "Discipline . . . by the common consent and authority", both leading to "The procuring of reverence . . . in the worship of God". In this insistence upon reverence the Prayer Book is distinctively true to the New Testament, to the age-long use of the Church, and meets the greatest need of our own time.

The Board of Religious Education of the Diocese of Virginia appeals to all loyal Churchmen, clergy and laity alike, to make more vital the corporate worship of our congregations in the Prayer Book services, that through the reality, worth and beauty of that worship the Holy Spirit may more fully inspire our people in life and service. To this end the Board recommends wisely directed and sustained cooperation of our clergy and their lay leaders to promote the four values of reverent worship, which follow:

I. Prayer Book Instruction. The Preface of the Book of Common Prayer closes with the hope that "the whole will be received and examined by every true member of our Church, and every sincere Christian, with a meek, candid and charitable frame of mind; without prejudice or prepossessions . . ."

To this end develop systematic study and teaching of the Prayer Book—for the individual, the family, the Church (Sunday) School, the confirmation instruction, the Bible class, the vestry and other parish organizations, from the pulpit and in every Church boarding school. Win back the Church's children to a glad attendance upon the public worship of the Church and arouse the minds of the adult laity to a deeper realization of the priceless heritage the struggles of the past have left in our trust.

II. Common Prayer. The title—"The Book of Common Prayer"—compels our attention at once to this main objective: "with one accord to make our common supplications unto Thee". Let Prayer Book and Hymnal be supplied to each member of the congregation,

and let pains be taken to have them used. See that all Church music except the anthem is suitable for congregational singing, and see also that singing is general and hearty. To these ends enlist in advance the cooperation of parish groups to lead the congregation in habitual use of the books in responses and singing.

III. Kneeling in Prayer. Bowing the head in prayer while sitting is a modern custom which to many now seems reverent; but it has no recognition in the Prayer Book. In the Church's usage kneeling in prayer is invariably enjoined for the laity.

Let every hindrance be removed: the inconvenient boards occasionally still found under pews in old churches where the devout formerly knelt facing the seat, also the accumulation of dust and dirt on the floor between the pews which deters from kneeling.

Encourage kneeling in prayer by installing comfortable kneeling benches in all pews, or increase the number of kneeling cushions to supply all worshippers alike.

Instruct leading groups and the whole congregation in the reasons for the Church's directions through her rubrics for kneeling in prayer. Kneeling is the proper attitude to express humility and reverent supplication in addressing God. The devout manner helps to create devout feeling. Kneeling has been the custom of the Church from ancient times, and is based upon the example of our blessed Lord and His apostles: Our Lord in Gethsemane "kneeled down and prayed" (Luke 22:41). See also Acts 7:50; 9:40; 20:35, etc. Also Daniel 6:10.

Congregational kneeling in prayer is thirteen times directed in the services of Morning and Evening Prayer and Holy Communion. To quote the variants: "all kneeling", "the people still kneeling", "the people devoutly kneeling", "the priest standing reverently before the Holy Table . . . the people kneeling"; "make your humble confession to Almighty God devoutly kneeling", "the priest and all who are minded to receive the Holy Communion humbly kneeling"; "all devoutly kneeling".

Should our laity indulge themselves in a laxity in the pew, except when necessitated by age or infirmity, which would give offense if practiced in the chancel? At the visible appearing of the Lord of Glory, all instinctively would kneel in adoration. His invisible Presence where two or three are gathered together in His Name is no less real and should be no less compelling of reverence.

IV. The Habit of Staying to the End of the Communion Service. In large city churches especially, the custom has grown up for many, sometimes the majority, of those who come to the Holy Table on the first Sunday of the month to leave the church after communing themselve without waiting for the end of the service.

Except in necessity this is a grave, though unconscious, abuse of the highest act of Christian worship. For those who remain, as well as for those who go, it mars the corporate character of the communion. Those who leave miss the Thanksgiving, the Gloria and the Benediction of Peace, and break the spirit of unity, fellowship and reverence.

This condition, wherever it exists, cries out for correction. The last rubric before the Benediction reads: "Then, the people kneeling, the Priest (the Bishop if he be present) shall let them depart with this Blessing". By clear implication it is the priest's duty not to let the people depart (except for individual necessity) until after they have received the Church's blessing. The responsibility thus falls primarily upon the rector. He may solve it by instruction alone. He may do much also to alleviate the practical causes, the unusual length of the service and the loss of the art of devotional meditation.

The unusual length of the service, when there are many to commune, is a real problem. Psychologists say that services are apt to lose devout attention if more than an hour, or at most an hour and a quarter long. Of all services that of the Holy Communion should be one of progressive devotion, rededication, joyful thanksgiving and peace. The method of shortening the service lies with the rector. Notices, sermon, hymns, anthems, administration of the Elements, all may be expedited, and some shortened or omitted. The congregation will respond if they are not held longer than on other Sundays of the month, thus taking into account home demands.

The loss of the art of devotional meditation accounts for the restless tedium of many communicants during the period when others are communing. The rector may well instruct his congregation in devotional meditation through the use of the Prayer Book, Hymnal or other aids, and so transform this time of waiting into a most profitable experience of spiritual refreshment and intercessory prayer.

Reverence in worship in the Diocese of Virginia is the objective of this movement which begins but does not end with the four suggested values of worship. It has the earnest endorsement of the Bishop and Bishop-Coadjutor, and is inaugurated by the Diocesan Board of Religious Education under a committee named below. This Committee is ready to cooperate with the clergy and laity as may be desired, and feels confident of the support of all those who love the Church and her hallowed ways.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

This report is presented under separate heads, as assigned to the to the several members of the Committee.

#### The Urban Church.

We are glad to be able to say that a review of recent reports of the Council and of the different activities of the Church gives the impression that we have a very earnest and efficient organization of spiritually-minded men and women in the Diocese, and that the outlook is bright and hopeful. We would, however, set forth certain needs, voiced largely by clergymen and laymen throughout the Diocese, in statements obtained through correspondence with them.

One writes: "I feel that few things would do more to develop the spirit of worship in our Church services and the resultant sense of spiritual gain to worshippers, clergy and people than a concerted movement led by the Bishops and fostered by the Board of Religious Education, with all other organized bodies of the Church, to reclaim in the Diocese the spirit of reverent worship, so carefully set forth in the Book of Common Prayer, and so carelessly observed by our congregations—with notable exceptions.

Many, both clergymen and laymen, complain of poor attendance

at Church services, and lack of interest in them. We would suggest that an organized movement here might be of much use. It could be preached from the pulpit and earnestly advocated by all parish organizations; but it should be especially fostered in the home, where the foundations of the religious life must be laid. The right example to our children and the proper training and teaching constitute a responsibility that every parent and teacher must face; and the way it is met will be reflected in the children's after life.

There is great need of improvement in our Sunday Schools. They should be greater feeders to the Church than they are. The Church should be as a mother to the children in all the communities where it is located, manifesting a deep concern in all that affects them. We have stressed repentance for sin and a faith which leads to conscious forgiveness and peace in Christ. This is good, but do we go far enough? We should tell them that they are saved, not only from something, but for something; that their powers are to be redeemed from evil things and dedicated to right things. Energies are not to be suppressed, but turned into good channels for the service of God and man.

Much stress is laid on the importance of training the boys of the Church, they who are so soon to be leaders in both Church and State. We would commend in this connection the wider use of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, so admirably adapted to furnish this kind of training.

A prominent rector raises the question of how to make the vestries more helpful in parish work. It is an important question. Vestries, in addition to their responsibility for the financial needs of the parish, have a most important duty to perform in the example they set to the other members of the congregation. They should be men with the proper conception of their spiritual duties and responsibilities, as well as possessed of business ability. We would refer both rector and vestrymen to Diocesan Canon XX, Section 1, which bears on this subject, for their thoughtful reading.

More mention should be given to the problem of the large number of communicants lost sight of through removals. From the time a person is confirmed he should be impressed with the importance of keeping his registration as a communicant clear, especially by informing his rector of any contemplated change of residence. A self-addressed postcard to be given persons leaving the parish, to be filled in with their new address, might be used to advantage. A more careful follow-up system, we believe, would result not only in saving many communicants to the records of the Church, but to devoted and active membership.

The problem of money is of course raised: How to put the finan-

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cial affairs of the Church on a more sound business basis. We can suggest no departure from the plan of voluntary contributions, but would stress the importance of appeal to the conscience of the giver, teaching that life is stewardship, and that at the end we must render an account of that stewardship.

#### The Rural Church.

It is rather difficult to formulate a full and accurate report of the present state of the rural church in the Diocese, because so many of the clergy fail to send in their parochial reports at the proper time. From the information available we would say that conditions on the whole are encouraging. But while it is true that in our Diocese the rural churches are stronger and better organized than in almost any other, there is still much to be desired.

There are many things for which we can be thankful. One of them is the whole-hearted way in which these churches as a group have supported the Diocese in the present financial crisis. During 1931 almost 50 per cent of them accepted the full quota apportioned them by the Diocese; a little over 40 per cent asked for a reduction; and about 10 per cent accepted a larger quota. How did they pay? About 40 per cent paid their quotas in full; another 40 per cent overpaid; and about 20 per cent failed to meet the quotas they had told the Diocese to expect. Comparing these figures with the acceptances for 1932, a year of even greater difficulty in meeting the Diocesan budget, we note with some satisfaction that about 70 per cent of the rural churches have accepted the same quotas as last year; about 15 per cent reduced their acceptances; and the remaining 15 per cent have either accepted a larger quota or have undertaken a quota, though none was accepted last year.

No new churches were opened in the rural field last year; but none were closed, and it is evident that some have been reawakened to greater activity and to an increased sense of responsibility.

Numerically, the Church is growing steadily, and the rate of growth seems at present more rapid in the country than in the cities. This growth is more apparent in the Tidewater section of the Diocese than elsewhere for the last fifteen years. Clergy all over the Diocese are reporting larger attendance at the services of the Church.

We find a very devoted and loyal group of well-trained clergy in charge of the rural churches. A glance at the membership of the various Diocesan organizations and the important committees and boards reveals the fact that a large number of the rural clergy are active in the work of the Diocese. This condition exists in few, if any, of the other Dioceses; of the Church.

A few of the rural clergy have a real social vision of their work.

Most of us have not. We still confine ourselves too closely within our own small groups of members of the Church, and think little of the welfare of the neighbors among whom we live. We love the term "parson", but we no longer adequately fill that term. This condition is being corrected through such schools as the Rural Clergy Conference, held at V. P. I., almost every Convocation of the Diocese now supplying at least one scholarship to this school.

Our rural church schools are not so well attended as they might be. Several of the churches report a decrease in attendance or no school at all. They may be due to various causes: lack of children, lack of teachers, or a lack of interest and foresight. Whatever the cause may be, it forebodes ill for the churches in rural Virginia. There are, however, several churches where there is an exception to these conditions, with large and active church schools.

#### Mountain Work.

During 1931 there has been built and equipped a preventorium at a cost of \$25,000. The building is 300 feet long and can care for fifteen boys and as many girls. It is of rock construction and practically fireproof, has a 110-volt Delco plant, a frigidaire and is fitted with hospital beds and all necessary furnishings for the care of sick children.

There have been a large number of confirmations and baptisms throughout the Archdeaconry. The churches and chapels have all paid their quotas in full and most of them have overpaid.

Communicants of the Archdeaconry now number about 1,300. There are six full-time clergymen and four who give part time to the work, with forty-three lay workers, of whom seven are men. There are thirty mission points, six mission day schools, five public day schools on or adjoining mission property and under influence of the mission

The Diocese has paid the sum of \$15,000 for the salaries of women workers, which cares for twenty-five women. In addition the sum of \$1,900 has been given toward extra services in those places not manned by clergymen. Aside from these sums there has been received in gifts about \$45,000 for the work, approximately one-half of which comes from people within the Diocese.

The spirit of the mountain people, generally speaking, is reported as fine. The communicants cooperate in the work in an earnest way, and it is believed that in time to come the Church may count on strong leaders being developed in the mission congregations.

#### Negro Work.

There are nearly 200,000 Negroes living in the Diocese of Virginia, of whom 128,419 live in the rural sections and 65,092 in the

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cities. In all of the Tidewater counties the population is either just under or over 50 per cent of the whole. In Charles City county more than 75 per cent of the population belongs to the Negro race. The total population of the Diocese, white and colored, is 731,206.

In the midst of this large Negro population our Church has a total of thirteen missions and congregations with 129 communicants in rural missions and 507 in missions in the cities. We have a total of five Negro clergymen connected with the Diocese engaged in the work, and one Negro clergyman living in the Diocese of West Virginia who has charge of one mission in this Diocese along with his other work.

In view of the greatness of the opportunity our work among the Negroes is pathetically small. Our Diocese is not entering in a worthy way into the field which lies all around us. The negroes are increasing steadily in wealth, education and refinement of life, and just in measure as this process of advancement continues the opportunity of our Church of ministering among them growing greater.

In the few places where our missions have been established the work among the Negroes has grown steadily over recent years, and the Negro Churchmen are taking on more and more of the responsibility of conducting their own work and of planning for the extension of the Church among their own people. There are four parochial schools; one in Hanover county, two kindergarten schools in Richmond and the John Moncure High School in Essex county, which has developed in recent years from a one-room parochial day school into a well-organized high school with a total enrolment in the secondary and high school grades of over 100.

#### Church Schools.

The establishment of the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia and their due incorporation was a conception and achievement worthy of the highest statesmanship.

To Bishop William Cabell Brown, perhaps, more than any other person, is due the undertaking and completing of the great venture. A great scholar as well as a sound executive, he realized the importance of a better system of education for the children of the Church, and devoted his efforts toward the attainment of the much-needed end. Unbaffled by the difficulties ahead of him, in the apparent inability of the Church at the time financially to sustain the undertaking, and in the seeming dominance of the lethargy which always attends new ideas, he held the venture of the first importance and preached a crusade which so successfully carried opposition before it, that he lived to see the complete accomplishment of the great design

in the system of schools which are now among the glories of the Diocese and the benefactions of the whole Church.

Under the leadership of Bishop Tucker, successor to their founder, these schools have advanced steadily in efficiency, and were in a condition of self-support until last year, when one of them reported a slight decrease in enrolment and a consequent small deficit, as a result of the general economic depression. Like other institutions, they are feeling keenly the stress of "hard times"; and in the yet unpaid bonds issued to meet the cost of their establishment, they constitute a burden upon the Diocese, in the form of a large item in the annual budget, as every responsibility has its accompanying burden. But your Committee feels that this particular responsibility is of so great worth that its burden, instead of bringing complaints, ought to be met resolutely and cheerfully until it shall have been carried to a completely successful end.

# REPORT OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY IN VIRGINIA.

To the Bishops and Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The faculty of the Virginia Theological Seminary beg leave to submit the following report:

The 109th session opened on September 16, 1931. Forty-four old students returned and thirty-one new students were matriculated—twenty-five as members of the Junior class, one as a member of the Middle class, and five as special students. The seventy-five students in the Seminary come from thirty-four Dioceses and Missionary Dis-

tricts in the Church, including two from Japan and two from Southern Brazil. Forty-eight colleges are represented in the present student body and fifty-four of the students hold college degrees.

Three new teachers began their work during the past session. Associate Professor James A. Mitchell and Instructor Clifford L. Stanley began their work in September. Professor Stanley Brown-Serman, the successor to Dr. Kennedy, began his work in January.

The curriculum of the Seminary has been revised and many improvements made. The last term of the Senior year will, in the future, consist entirely of elective courses.

The past session has been a very successful one. Good academic work has been done. There has been a fine spirit in the student body, and high moral and spiritual standards have been maintained.

The prospects for next year are most encouraging. An unusually large number of fine, highly trained men are applying for admission next September. We already have a waiting list for next year.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORK AMONG BOYS.

The Commission on Work Among Boys, to which was referred the memorials from the Virginia Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and from the Woman's Auxiliary, having to do with work among boys, having considered the matter contained in these memorials, determined that their efforts could be most profitably directed toward encouraging that type of work that has been so successfully carried out in certain parishes with boys and young men from sixteen to thirty years of age.

In All Saints' Parish, Richmond, due largely to the efforts of Mr. Robert E. Anderson and Mr. D. M. Thornton, it has been found possible to hold a splendid group of young men in active and interested loyalty to the Church. This has been accomplished partly by following plans suggested by the Brotherhood of St. Andrew for the Young Men's Division, but more largely through the initiative and energy of the local leaders. The heart of the matter seems to be the training of proper parish leadership for this work.

With a view to securing a wider knowledge of this work among the clergy of Richmond, the Commission arranged to have Mr. Thornton address the Richmond Clericus. His ideas and plans were well received, but most unfortunately Mr. Thornton's ill health at that time prevented carrying out the plans to have a leadership training class organized. Next fall it is hoped that this may be done and the benefits of this excellent plan made available to other churches in Richmond.

The Commission recognizes that its work thus far has touched only one phase of a vitally important field, that should reach into country and city parishes alike, supplementing the work of the Sunday Schools and Young People's Service Leagues. If it is the will of the Council, this Commission will be glad to continue its efforts in any way that the Council may direct.

#### REPORT OF SHRINE MONT.

SHRINE MONT is at Orkney Springs, Va. It is in the Alleghanies west of Mount Jackson, which is about midway on the Shenandoah Valley Highway between Winchester and Staunton. Highway No. 820 of the State System, thirteen miles long, starts at Mount Jackson and ends at the entrance of Shrine Mont.

The grounds comprise 120 acres. They include half of a forested mountain and adjoin on the west the vast Shenandoah Forest

Reserve of the National Government. Just at the entrance of Shrine Mont is a century-old settlement of summer cottages, prevailingly owned by Church families. The Orkney Springs Hotel, in spacious grounds lying to either side of the highway, is just east; and immediately beyond is the village, the post-office and stores.

The buildings include-

The Cathedral Shrine and Shelter House.

The Hall, the social center and refectory.

Gibson, Peterkin, Goodwin Cottages.

Shrine Mont properties, as acquired, are made a perpetual trust, in care of the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, for the use of the General Church. The cost of supervision is cared for apart from the operating income. Thus costs to Shrine Mont guests are kept at the actual prorations of costs of food, service and upkeep. The swimming pool is centrally located, of modern design and equipment.

Those for whom Shrine Mont accommodations are not available can secure board and lodging during the summer months at either of two nearby private cottages taking paying guests or at the Orkney Springs Hotel.

Shrine Mont Mountain is at its crest 2,500 feet above sea level, and is in air line just a mile from the crest of the 3,000-foot range separating Virginia from West Virginia in the Forest Reserve. There are no human habitations in this section of Virginia west of Shrine Mont.

The accommodations are:

For the Colder Season—October to April. Cottage quarters are available to clergy and lay families for periods of rest and retirement.

For the Conference Period—May and June. By use of extra cots a hundred guests are cared for.

For the Clergy School Fortnight—Beginning the last week in June. The school is open to clergy from any part of the Church, but is limited to thirty clergy. Their wives may accompany them.

For the Summer Vacation Period—July through September. Cottage quarters and refectory fare are available to clergy and their families and to salaried Church workers. The normal limit is forty persons.

# REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE OF THE CHURCH PENSION FUND.

To the 137th Annual Counil of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Diocesan Committee of the Church Pension Fund begs to report that every assessment for 1931 made against the salary of a clergyman at work in the Diocese of Virginia has been paid in full so that our Diocese continues to maintain its record of paying these assessments in full.

There has been considerable reduction in the total salaries paid to our clergy as compared with 1931. The Church Pension Fund notified our Diocesan Committee in February that where reductions of salaries as a result of the present financial condition could be considered as temporary reductions the Pension Fund would accept as sessments upon the same amount of salary as for last year. As this is so manifestly to the advantage of our clergy the Church Pension Fund Committee has directed that in the case of ministers receiving aid from the Diocesan Missionary Society assessment should be paid upon the full amount of the appropriation in each case, even though a reduction in appropriation has temporarily been made.

The total amount of salaries reported to the Church Pension Fund as at present in force in this Diocese amounts to \$274,801.64, as com-

pared with \$282,026 in 1931, the figures in both cases including onesixth of the amount of the money salary paid as being the money value of the rectories furnished. The assessments to be paid from all sources in the Diocese of Virginia during the year 1932 amount to \$20,610.08.

During the past year four of our clergy have retired through age, receiving in each case a pension of \$1,000, and one of our clergy retired several years ago through disability, having reached the age of sixty-eight, has had his pension increased from the disability pension of \$600 to the age pension of \$1,000. The total amount of pensions paid to retired and disabled clergy and the widows and orphans of deceased clergy in this Diocese amount to \$24,800.

It is a very great pleasure to report that the Church Pension Fund has been able to continue up to the present the action taken in March, 1931, of increasing the pension of clergy retired on account of age to the sum of \$1,000 per annum. The pension guaranteed in the establishment of the Pension Fund in 1917 to all clergy ordained before that date was \$600 and this increase from \$600 to \$1,000 has been of untold benefit to our aged brethren. This increase above the \$600 is not guaranteed, but can be paid only so long as the additional income received by the Church Pension Fund will permit it. We hope most sincerely that they will be able to continue it until they are able to make it a permanent rule of the Pension Fund.

During the past year we have forwarded to the Church Pension Fund the sum of \$5,717.56 as the income of the Disabled Clergy Fund for the year 1931 and \$749.15 as the income of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, making a total of \$6,466.71. This income has been applied as heretofore, after returning \$300 for the expenses of the Diocesan Committee, to pay the Pension Fund assessments on all salaries paid by the Diocesan d on appropriations to salaries of clergy made by the Diocesan Missionary Society and the remainder returned as a rebate to the parishes which had paid the Pension Fund assessment in full for the preceding year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE.

To the 137th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

In accordance with the resolution passed at the 136th annual Convention that a committee of three be appointed to take under consideration the large amount of insurable property in this Diocese reported as not being covered by fire insurance, with a view to calling to the attention of the parishes the great importance of having all church property fully insured.

We, your Committee, find the following conditions to exist:

First—Only eight churches report their property fully covered by insurance.

Second—There are twenty-one churches or chapels carrying no insurance.

There are sixteen parish houses and other buildings carrying no insurance.

There are six rectories carrying no insurance.

Third—There are ninety-three parishes not properly covered with insurance.

Appended to this report is a list of the church property in the Diocese of Virginia showing the value of each property, the insurance carried and a suggested increase, which, if added to the present insurance, will aid in bringing the coverage more normal.

With the colored church property we find three churches and chapels without insurance and three parish houses without insurance.

Your Committee feels very strongly that when the vestry of a parish fails to carry adequate insurance upon the church property, it is placing upon the congregation and the Diocese at large an unnecessarily heavy burden of financial responsibility for rebuilding in case of fire. We, therefore, present the following resolution:

Resolved, That the vestry of every parish and congregation in this Diocese which is carrying at present an insufficient amount of insurance upon its church property be urged to take this matter into its most serious consideration with a view to taking out enough additional insurance to protect fully their church property.

### III. THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

### (a) REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

To the 137th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society begs to report that during the year 1931 our receipts, including a balance from the previous year of \$2,397.43, amounted to \$78,697.56. Under disbursements we paid salaries of missionaries, both clerical and lay, in the sum of \$63,847.28; to the Blue Ridge Industrial School, \$7,500, and to St. Paul's Church at the University for the interest on the parish house debt and upkeep of parish house, \$2,062.56. We reinvested \$800 of the \$3,700 of bonds paid during the year and paid to the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge \$1,275, being the income of the Rives Fund for the year. Miscellaneous payments amounted to \$1,163.72, making our total disbursements \$76,648.56 and leaving a balance at the end of the year of \$2,049.

Owing to the general financial situation the appropriation made by the Diocese to the Missionary Society was reduced to \$60,531.07, and \$8,013.91 came in response to a special appeal to cover the reduction in appropriation from the Diocese.

The disturbing factor in the situation is that we were compelled during the year to expend three thousand dollars of the principal of our invested funds in the carrying on of our work. If we had not done this we would have been unable to pay the appropriations in full made to the salaries of our missionaries. We had hoped that at the end of the year there would be a sufficient balance in the account of payments by parishes upon their accepted quotas to enable the Missionary Society to restore the amounts temporarily taken from our invested funds, but this hope has not yet been realized. The parishes at the end of the year have failed by the sum of \$4,000 in paying the full amounts of parish acceptances. There is even yet hope that many of these parishes will be able to send in amounts on the parish acceptances of 1931 so that part at least of our principal

fund temporarily used may be restored. If this is not done our Society will suffer a definite loss in the amount of our invested funds.

A most encouraging feature of our work has been the response made by the parishes of the Diocese to the resolution adopted by the Council last year requesting the vestries to give to the Diocesan Missionary Society the annual refunds received from the Church Pension Fund to be used in establishing a method of pensioning aged and disabled lay workers of the Diocese. These rebates are usually paid in July and various churches responded, paying over to us a total of \$581.21. We asked in addition that each vestry should adopt a resolution directing that this annual rebate be paid each year to the Diocesan Missionary Society as a gift, and about 75 per cent of the vestries in the Diocese have adopted this resolution. About 25 per cent have not yet adopted it, but we are hopeful that many of these will eventually take this action.

We have put the pension plan into effect, placing the matter under a special committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and have already taken on one lay worker with a grant of \$25 per month. The Woman's Auxiliary, who established the Church Workers' Pension Fund last year with a gift of \$200, have increased the fund by a gift of \$300 more, which has been invested, making our total permanent invested fund amount to \$500.

The rules adopted for the guidance of the Executive Committee in granting the pensions are as follows:

This fund shall consist of a principal endowment fund, and income consisting of interest on said fund, appropriations from the Diocesan Missionary Society and voluntary contributions except those designated for the Permanent Endowment Fund. No part of the principal fund shall be used in the granting of pensions.

All pensions are limited to and dependent upon the funds available for the purpose, and the Committee reserves the right to alter the amounts and the rules governing the granting of pensions at any time it may be necessary.

Pensions of not more than \$25 per month shall be granted to all lay workers who have reached the age of sixty-eight upon their retirement from active work, and who have served for twenty years or more in the work of the Diocese. Such retirement pensions shall be a first charge upon all available funds.

To workers who retire involuntarily before the age of sixty-eight after a service of twenty years or more, and to those who retire before that age after shorter service by reason of permanent disability, there shall be granted such pensions as the funds under the control of the Pension Committee and the circumstances of the case may warrant.

Any balance of income at the end of any year shall be added to the principal fund.

As reported to the Special Council held in January, the Missionary Society faced the stern necessity of making a 10 per cent cut in salaries to our missionaries for this year. The Special Council directed that an effort be made through a special offering to be taken on Whitsunday (or on Easter) to secure a sufficient amount to balance the budget of the Diocesan Missionary Society and to remove if possible the cuts in appropriations made to salaries of our workers. About twenty-five churches took this special offering at Easter and the response made by these churches has been so encouraging as to make us look forward with eager hope to the gifts to be made on Whitsunday. It is as yet too early to say what amount will be received from this source.

As a result of special gifts received by the Bishop for this purpose, the cuts in the salaries of married ministers receiving less than \$2,200 and the cut in the salaries of our women workers were removed so that no cut at all has been made as yet in these salaries. We are very hopeful that the response made to the Whitsunday gift will enable us to release these salaries from the fear of a cut for the rest of the year.

### (c) REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE.

The Board is composed of Rev. George P. Mayo, D. D., Chairman; Rev. B. D. Tucker, D. D., Archdeacon; W. R. Mason, Mr. Bland Beverley and Mr. John B. Minor, who were elected by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. Supplementary members elected by the Board itself: Rev. R. B. Nelson, Rev. Charles W. Sheerin, Vice-Chairman; Rev. A. Stuart Gibson and Mr. Blake Newton, Advisory members; Dr. Warren F. Draper, State Health Commissioner; Misses Louise Price and Nannie Minor, ex-officio members; Bishops Tucker and Goodwin, who usually attend the meetings.

During the past year it has held its usual four quarterly meetings in June, October, January and April.

The June meeting is always called immediately after the convening of the newly-elected Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, which elects the members of this Board for the following year, and merely elects the officers and supplementary members for the year.

At the October meeting the economic situation throughout the Diocese was discussed and a resolution adopted urging our clergy to meet the conditions by ascertaining and cooperating with local relief organizations such as the Red Cross, etc.

At the January meeting efforts were made through committees to plan for the raising of sufficient funds for the Rural Conference, and to have social service brought to the attention of the various summer conferences through proper courses of instruction. Also the annual report of the Executive Secretary was received and approved, and it is hereto appended and made a part of this report.

The Board has always had under its care the rural work of the Diocese. It has arranged several conferences of the rural clergy and is now considering calling another conference next fall. It has promoted the School for Rural Ministers at V. P. I. and has been instrumental in securing scholarships from the Convocations to aid in the attendance of more ministers from country parishes who couldn't otherwise attend. At the last meeting of the Board the following resolution was passed: "Resolved, That the Board of Social Service memorialize the Council to commend the Rural Pastors' Summer School at Blacksburg to the Cooperation of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia." The Rev. George P. Mayo, as delegate, attended the Conference on Social Work of the National Church which met in Minneapolis last June in connection with the conference of the Commission on Social Service of the Federal Council of Churches and also the National Conference of Social Agencies.

Through the efforts of a special committee of which Rev. R. B. Nelson is chairman, the Board has followed closely the work of the

Shenandoah National Park Commission. Several conferences have been held with Mr. R. E. Carson, chairman of the State Commission on Conservation and Development, looking to the safeguarding of the interest of our mission property lying in the park area and also the welfare of the mountain people who will have to move from this area when it is turned over to the national government.

Arrangements are being made to take moving pictures of the Church work in the mountains and to have these pictures exhibited before President Hoover and throughout the country.

This Committee is also working with the State and national governments and the Advisory Board of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge looking towards the colonization of the poorest families near some of our Church missions when they have to move from the park area.

The distress and suffering occasioned through the inability of so many people to get employment has placed a great burden upon all social agencies. We recommend to the clergy that they urge their people to give relief whenever possible through creating employment and that they cooperate with all private or governmental relief agencies to the end that the Spirit of Christ pervade and direct all their efforts.

REPORT OF R. CARY MONTAGUE, EXECUTIVE SECRETARY FOR BOARD OF SOCIAL SERVICE OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA FOR YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1931.

The Board of Social Service of this Diocese, like all important organizations that are controlled by boards composed of busy people, has to operate chiefly through its staff. The Board meets four times a year in connection with the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and never has more than an hour and fifty minutes for the transaction of business, part of which is consumed in eating luncheon. The luncheon meeting is the most effective in getting the Board together.

The staff consists of an Executive Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary. The former is also City Missionary, and donates his services to the Board of Social Service, and the latter has sufficient missionary spirit to be willing to serve on a missionary's salary, hence the expense to the Diocese is amazingly small for the services rendered.

The work of the City Missionary of Richmond is strictly that of ministering in institutions, but because of its character the services of this official are included in the report of social service done in the Diocese, together with such information about social service activities rendered by other clergymen and laymen as we can obtain.

The great work of bringing patients to hospitals and arranging for admissions to other institutions, while performed by the City Missionary, is rendered in his capacity as Executive Secretary for the Board of Social Service, and through the assistance of the Corresponding Secretary; and this work could not be carried on without the assistance of the Corresponding Secretary and the support of this Board, therefore it is perfectly proper that it should be included in the Board's report. By reason also of the location of the office of the Board and the Executive Secretary in the capital of the State and on the edge of the Diocese, many of its activities and services rendered reach into the other two Dioceses of this State, and the work is performed in cooperation and perfect harmony with the officials of all three Dioceses; and Southern Virginia and Southwestern rectors (and doctors and county nurses in these sections) feel at liberty to call on our office for the same help that is given within our own Diocese.

We make this brief statement preliminary to the statistical report so that the distinctions made therein can be understood.

With this introduction the following statistical report is hereby submitted.

As compared with last year, these figures have some interesting differences. For instance, the number to whom Christmas presents or treats were sent is reduced from 2,000 to 1,607, partly because of the reduced numbers at the Confederate Soldiers' Home, and partly due to the fact that we have left out the Richmond City Jail because of lack of funds.

On the other hand, the number of charity tickets and passes secured has increased nearly 10 per cent, due probably to the fact that our work is becoming better known and that the splendid cooperation which the railroads give us is more generally recognized. This year we assisted 255 in this way as against 234 last year.

The number of commitments to institutions has jumped by more than 50 per cent, from sixty to ninety-nine, due partly by the enlarged capacity of the Home for Incurables, which for a short time wiped out its waiting list, and where we placed a number of patients.

The number of hospital patients arranged for also shows a large increase of from 235 to 301. This is due in part to the economic situation, which is requiring people to ask for free or special rate treatment who would otherwise incur the usual hospital expenses. This increase, however, is more largely due to the very splendid cooperation given to us by the Memorial Hospital in accepting indigent patients on flat rate fees of \$5, \$10 or \$15, covering all expenses, both for treatment and surgery. We cannot commend their help too highly in this matter.

In this connection acknowledgment should be made also to the Sheltering Arms, who have taken seventy of our patients; the Retreat for the Sick, who have helped to the limit of their charity capacity, and Johnston-Willis Hospital, which has opened a small free ward for children.

The cooperation that is given us by the doctors of the city and throughout the State is truly inspiring, and I should like to have time to quote some of their letters in response to our requests for free treatments.

The individual persons given advice on social problems have increased by nearly a hundred and fifty, showing that our office is continually more widely recognized as a source of information for handling social problems.

The amount of our correspondence, as estimated by our postage bill, has also increased considerably, from 2,256 letters last year to 2,800 this year.

On the other hand, the number of positions secured shows a decline of 75 per cent, dropping from twenty last year to five this year, which, of course, is due to the economic situation and lack of employment in all directions.

The financial report, which shows a total of \$2,841.49 being handled, looks large, but only \$600 of this is a Diocesan appropriation, and that all goes for the salary of the Corresponding Secretary. The other \$2,241.49 is made up entirely from voluntary contributions of individuals sometimes requested for specific purposes like supporting children in the Blue Ridge Industrial School, or paying for patients in the tubercular sanatoriums, etc. In these matters it is practically impossible to distinguish between the work of the City Missionary and that of the Executive Secretary for Social Service, except to say that the combination of the two offices is advantageous to both fields of service and extends the opportunities for help. Office expenses amounting to \$155.89 for telephone, stationery and stamps have been paid out of these contributions, but such expenses are a legitimate part of relief work.

### (d) REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

Chief among the difficulties and anxieties of our organization in the past year have been the shifting from an old to a new Secretary and trying to keep our appropriation within the Diocesan budget.

After a very active winter and spring filled with institutes, conferences, rural travel and problems of a dozen natures, Miss Margaret Monteiro, after a short vacation, left for the General Convention, thence to the Coast and on to China, where she took up her work left several years ago.

A special committee corresponded and conferred much of the summer, and two meetings of the Board were largely occupied in locating and electing a new Secretary. The office was vacant from September until the first of January, when Miss Ann Ruth Estes, from the Diocese of Tennesee, took possession of the Religious Education room in Mayo Memorial.

Outstanding in the work of the year were the three conferences sponsored by the Board, which were attended by teachers and scholars from all parts of the Diocese. The elementary schools were at Shrine Mont, Orkney Springs, in June, and St. Margaret's, Tappahannock,

in July. Sweet Briar had its usual number of Virginia delegates, while ten or more took advantage of the advanced school at Hood College, Frederick, Md. The Board made appropriations to all of these schools.

A special committee investigated the courses in religion taught in the several Diocesan and other Episcopal schools and found that in each one definite and satisfactory work is being done. Recommendations were made to the clergy to keep in close touch with boys and girls at school and college.

Another committee was appointed to study the subject of "Reverence in Worship", which makes a special report to this body.

A list has been made of the teachers in the Diocese having N. A. L. A. credits. There are 311 of them.

Several one-day institutes have been held and plans made for others. One Normal Training Series had a satisfactory lot of attendants.

The Rev. Elmer Pedrick, in charge of the Young People's Service League for several years, resigned and the Board appointed as his successor Mr. T. Oswald Heinrich, of Richmond, who has had much experience in this work.

We greatly regret the loss of the Sweet Briar Conference this year and hope that funds will be available to put the Conferenc on again in 1933.

Strong faculties have been secured for the two summer schools, June 20-24 and July 11-15. It is hoped that the clergy and schools of the Diocese will realize the opportunity these conferences provide and will take advantage of them by sending delegates of three kinds—Woman's Auxiliary, teachers and schools.

The financial report is furnished by the Diocesan Treasurer.

(e) REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACONRY OF THE BLUE RIDGE.

IVY, Va., May 12, 1932.

To the Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D., Bishop of Virginia. My Dear Bishop:

The general report on the condition of the Mountain Work will be made by Archdeacon Mason, who is administering the work.

During 1931 one of the most interesting events was the consecration of the new Church of St. John the Baptist, in the Ragged Mountains. It coincided with my own jubilee in the priesthood, and also with the ordination to the same office of the Rev. Dewey C. Loving, the first member of our mountain missions to enter the ministry. What made his ordination in this church more interesting was that he was brought up in close proximity to this particular mission, and

was encouraged and inspired to enter the ministry by one of its faithful workers.

It has been my desire for many years that the Mountain Work should be able to give to the Diocese and the General Church more than it receives. This, I believe, it is doing, not in financial help, though it is certainly doing its part, but in helping to create an interest in missions, and thus infusing new life and inspiration into the church.

Our workers are setting an example of devotion and self-sacrifice which cannot be praised too highly.

My special work is to fill in where needed and keep in touch with many interested friends and solicit their assistance for the work.

The Order of the Thousandfold, which grew out of the Mountain Work, has made great progress within the last year, and seems to be an inspiration to a great many people.

To the Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D., Bishop of Virginia:

A report of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge is hereby respectfully submitted:

In the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge we were faced with possibly the biggest and most difficult task at the beginning of the past year that we have as yet confronted. We had just completed our little preventorium and had all the beds full of children who so much needed the care they were receiving, when in almost the time it takes to tell we found our plant in ashes-all gone, with only a few dollars of insurance with which to start all over again. The great need, however, demanded a new building. Little children were sick and suffering; we felt we must care for them. But how was this to be done? It took real faith to start on a building like the one we have just completed-300 feet long, with accommodations for both boys and girls, fireproof and up-to-date in every respect. Yes, it took faith, but we had faith and also many friends whom we could count upon, and so we met the challenge—we and our friends—and this work of our Master is going on again in a larger and better way than ever before.

Our next greatest trouble was the loss from the field of Mr. and Mrs. Warnecke. Yancey and Lynnwood were already vacant. Mr. Fisk, our worker at Lydia, was in bad health and Mr. Shultz on leave of absence from the Mission Home District to study at the Seminary. We have not met this difficulty quite so effectually, but have managed to have regular services at all the points. Luray and Lynnwood are still vacant. We are moving slowly, hoping to get

real missionaries filled with love for our mountain friends, and not afraid to work for them.

In addition to holding our regular services, we have kept our band of forty-five missionaries in the field, provided work for many needy families, built our \$25,000 preventorium, and while we had no appreciable balance to carry over, we have met and paid possibly the largest number of bills we ever had in the same period of time. All this has happened in the worst year of depression any of us has ever experienced. These, I believe, are encouraging facts.

On April 1, 1932, our entire plant in Blackwell's Hollow was destroyed by fire with the exception of a tiny clothing bureau which we have converted into a temporary home for the worker. The fire started in the school building shortly after school was dismissed for the day, and the high wind made it impossible to save school, church or Mission House. The people worked hard in their efforts to save the plant and were so distressed at the dreadful loss. Little did we realize that our service on Easter Day would be the last in that little church. There was a good congregation that day and everything seemed especially sweet and peaceful. A few Sundays later I kept my regular appointment there, holding the service in the one building left, the little clothing bureau. A crowd of people had gathered and covered every available space in the little room and on the stairs. It was a sad service. Men and women wept as we talked of our loss and of what we could do for the future. We cannot desert people when they feel their need and show a real desire for the Church. We must do something shortly.

In Pine Grove Hollow we have the one church building that cannot hold its congregation. It is literally filled to overflowing. So here we decided to place the second Chapel of Remembrance. This building, of native rock and almost fireproof, is growing rapidly. We hope by fall to have it ready for use. At the beginning of the work the people of Pine Grove held a meeting among themselves and then presented me with a paper which they had drawn up. In this they agreed to work for the wages then being paid my staff of men, and to give back, a part-day laborer, 5 per cent, stone masons whose wages are higher, 10 per cent, to help in building their church. One young man keeps a little store and cannot get off to work on the new church. He is trying hard to get on his feet and make a support for his little family, but he wants so much to make his contribution to the building that he offered to give \$50 toward a window for the chancel. This is for him a tremendous offering and his thought of beautifying the chancel shows how deep the Church's teaching is taking root in the minds and hearts of our people.

Let me give just one more illustration of the impression our

Church is making in the mountains. Not long ago I was called to go up on a mountain to a point miles away from any of our mission stations. There I found an old lady, eighty-four years of age, who was a member of the Episcopal Church, but had been unable to attend any of its services for years. She still loved them, however, and had been wanting me to come to give her the Holy Communion. It is a real inspiration to come in touch with souls like this!

Although we have some very trying days before us, it looks as though we are about to enter upon an era of unprecedented opportunities. We have opened our new preventorium with its thirty beds, which are being rapidly filled. Now we are confronted with a great need for a home in which to care for orphan children of our mountain people. Just a short time ago we had to send three fine children, baptized in the Episcopal Church, to a Dunkard Orphanage because we had no place in which to put them. Now five more little ones whose father recently killed himself have been brought to us. These children are also baptized members of our Church. Shall we ask the Dunkards, who are poor as compared with the Episcopalians around them, to take these too? I am sure our Church people will want to do something about it. There is a home with equipment owned by Episcopalians in the Diocese, and I believe they will turn it over to us. This will be an added responsibility for which we need faith and real friends.

Again, in the next few years some 400 families of our mountain people must get out of their homes in the park area. They are deeply attached to the mountains and their mountain friends. Many of them have no money and no land. They are unaccustomed to the ways of the city, untrained to make a living in the outside world. The government officials realize this and are very sympathetic. They believe the relief plan we have mapped out to be the best and most constructive they have found. In consequence, they have offered to give us land in the park area in which to settle a community of our mountain friends. Also there is a promise of contributions toward a fund for building homes. Deeply gratified as we must be at this evidence of confidence in us and in our work we realize also that a very great responsibility is entailed.

More than ever our work is "on the map". All these wonderful opportunities and responsibilities come at a time when our Church is talking about depression and retrenchment! These calls must be met with courage, with sacrifice and with faith, but we will meet them, God being our helper. "Speak to the children of Israel that they go forward."

### IV. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

To the Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, D. D., President ex-officio: Since her last report, the Woman's Auxiliary, including her Junior Department, has had an active year.

We have fourteen new branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. Of these, six are in the mountain missions; five are Section B groups; and three are composed of younger girls in parishes where there is already a Section B. These girls are pleased to call themselves Section C. We rejoice in the addition of these young women to our ranks; and we feel with them that at this time much of the best work is done when the group principle is recognized. But we are also convinced that in a parish where there are several branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, care should be taken to keep those branches in close touch and to arrange several times in the year for joint meetings and joint undertakings.

Our Educational Department is active. The Diocesan Educational Secretary has one assistant in each of the rural Convocations and two in Richmond. All effort has been made to find some one to do this work in the parish branches; and we are glad to note that seventy-three women are acting as secretaries for missionary education in the parishes. This should mean a great increase in information and interest. In response to many requests for help, Mrs. Osgood and her assistants have prepared twelve programs, some of which are now ready. Others will be issued in the early autumn. Their use is, of course, optional; but there is not an Auxiliary in the Diocese that does not need the suggestions and information contained in them, whether or not the monthly meetings are based upon them.

In 1931 105 Mission Study classes were conducted and twenty-three reading circles. Sixty-seven branches report some Bible class work, and sixty-eight used the monthly programs. Seventy-seven branches had a plan for securing the reading of the Church papers, forty-three a plan for getting missionary books read, 106 of our members attended summer conferences, and we held two Mission Study Institutes.

The Virginia Branch had her full quota of delegates (five) in Denver; and, in the person of Miss Sallie Deane, is now representing the Province of Washington on the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

In the past Triennium our aim for the United Thank Offering was not "more money", but "more givers". And this aim was reached: many more women than ever before having had a part in the offering which we sent to Denver. The amount sent by the Virginia Branch was almost equal to that of 1928; which, in view of the fact

that the larger part of it was gathered in years of financial stringency, was a noteworthy accomplishment.

The Supply Department reports a larger number of boxes sent to missionaries, schools and missions. When we remember that this work is in addition to much local work that cannot be included in this summary, we can form some idea of the efficiency and loyalty of our members.

The Junior Auxiliary is in a healthy condition, having added seven new branches to its roll, and planning excellent educational work for the coming year.

The Little Helpers have also added new branches, three of them; and have given this year a font to be used in some mountain mission church, and have undertaken to support a bed in St. Anne's Preventorium.

An examination of the reports from the parish branches of the Woman's Auxiliary reveals two tendencies that should be noted. The first of these calls for a word of caution. One finds in a number of branches that the gifts in money and boxes are largely sent to work within the Diocese of Virginia. At a time when our own Diocese sorely need our gifts, we cannot wish them to have been less. But we must remember that greater activity on our part in enlisting the interest of the thousands of women in our Church in Virginia who are not members of the Auxiliary could easily result in enlarged contributions for the foreign field as well as stronger support of our Diocesan obligations.

The other tendency is our chief cause for thankfulness. There is a decided awakening in the devotional life of the branches. This is evidenced by the following facts: One hundred and sixty-one Corporate Communions are listed, and 173 Prayer Circles. Forty-seven branches observed Days of Intercession, quite a number of these observing two days. Seventy-four Auxiliaries took part in the World Day of Prayer, and fifty-six in the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Never before has such a missionary opportunity faced the Woman's Auxiliary; and if she continues to face it in a spirit of devotion, the opportunity will pass into obedient service.

### V. REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE KING.

Eo the Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Virginia Diocesan Assembly of the Order of the Daughters of the King presents the following report for the year ending May 10. 1932.

The sole object of our Order is "the spread of Christ's Kingdom among women and the strengthening of the spiritual life of the Church".

The two rules are: "First, to pray daily for the spread of Christ's Kingdom, especially among women; for God's blessing upon all members of the Order; for the spiritual growth of the parish to which the chapter owes allegiance. Second, to take regularly some part in the worship, study and work of the Church; to make a constant effort to bring other women within its influence; and to render at all times such aid to the rector as he may deem necessary for the spiritual upbuilding of the Church."

As our Order is a spiritual Order, we are not permitted to raise money by fairs, sales or any other money-making device. Our admission into the Order after serving a probationary period of three months carries with it, however, the obligation of support of the Order nationally by the payment of annual dues.

There are also two funds to which we make voluntary contributions annually; namely, the Self-Denial Offering, which is made in the Epiphany season for the support of missionary Daughters of the King in China, in memory of Miss Lily Funsten Ward, a Virginia Daughter; and the Master's Fund, due at Whitsuntide, and used for the education of church workers in deaconess' schools.

The annual reports of the Diocesan officers included three officers meetings held: Intercessory Prayer Serevice held at All Saints' Church, Richmond, on September 14th, the opening day of the Order's Triennial Convention at Denver; the distribution of prayer leaflets for use during the General Convention; All Saints' Day Memorial Service held at Emmanuel Church. Brook Hill, on the afternoon of All Saints' Day, with sermon preached by the Rev. R. Cary Montague. A joint meeting of all Richmond chapters was held at the Mayo Memorial Church House on January 8th, to consider ways and means for the establishment of a memorial chapel at the Church House, Mrs. E. E. Osgood, chairman of the Chapel Committee, being the speaker. On January 27th the Daughters of the King appeared on the program of the Diocesan Institute held at the Church House, January 26th-28th, inclusive, our speaker being Mrs. Charles F. Roberts, of Washington, President of the Daughters in the Diocese of Washington. Mrs. Roberts presented the subject of the work of our Order at the session at which the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Girls' Friendly Society were presented. On February 2d, the Feast of the Purification, the Self-Denial Offering was presented at a beautiful service at the Monumental Church, Richmond, conducted by the rector, Rev. George Ossman. On February 12th the Daughters of the King were represented at the World Day of Prayer Service held at Grace and Holy Trinity Church, Richmond.

The seven active chapters in the Virginia Diocesan Assembly are: All Saints' Chapter of All Saints' Church, Richmond; Bishop Newton Memorial Chapter of the Church of the Epiphany, Richmond; Falls Church Chapter of Falls Church; Holy Comforter Chapter of Holy Comforter Church, Richmond; Moncure Memorial Chapter of Emmanuel Church, Brook Hill; St. Hilda's Chapter of Grace Church, Alexandria; St. John's Chapter of St. John's Church, Richmond; and a new chapter in process of formation at St. Paul's Church, Alexandria.

In addition, there are two chapters at present inactive, for whose renewed activity we are praying and working.

Chapter activities included Altar Guild work, teaching in the Church School, singing in the choir, playing the organ, acting as choir mothers, holding congregational receptions for the newly confirmed, with appropriate programs, such as pageants of the departments of the Church and of the Church seasons, arranged by two Daughters of the King; taking part in all prayer services, reading to blind persons, caring for the poor, carrying food and clothing to the needy, visiting the sick and shut-ins and new-comers; 3,781 visits were

reported for the year just ended; strangers welcomed at church services; penal institutions visited. Some chapters have responded to calls outside of their parishes, such as aiding county health officials and nurses in providing clothing for infants and young children; donating supplies of drinking glasses and other necessities to a free hospital; also calls for social service.

There are three objectives before us in the year upon which we are entering:

First—Definite progress on the establishment of the Memorial Chapel at the Diocesan Church House.

Second—Organization of a Bishop's Chapter, composed of Daughters of the King living in isolated districts and not affiliated with any chapter. Such a group would work under the direction of our Bishop as the chapters work under the direction of their rectors.

Third—The organization of new Senior chapters and of Junior chapters.

At our thirty-sixth Diocesan Assembly, held this year on May 10th at the Church of the Epiphany, Richmond, we had the honor of having our Quiet Hour conducted by our Bishop, assisted by the rector of the church. We renewed our vows in a service of rededication, concluding after the sermon by the celebration of the Holy Communion. The words of our Bishop that to be efficient and faithful witnesses we should train and qualify ourselves for service as the Apostles were trained and qualified, we shall carry with us we hope to good effect in the years to come.

Diocesan officers who had served the preceding year were reelected at this meeting for one more year as follows: President, Mrs. Edith Clark Cowles; First Vice-President, Mrs. John C. Winterwerp; Second Vice-President, Mrs. M. Edna Wheeler; Secretary, Mrs. Walter S. Dunn, Treasurer; Mrs. Thomas B. Bigger. Mrs. W. A. Powers, Past President, was made Honorary President for life at the Assembly of 1931.

We accepted an invitation to meet with St. John's Chapter, Richmond, in May, 1933.

### VI. CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

(a) REPORT OF CHRISTCHURCH SCHOOL.

Report of Christchurch School for session 1931-32 is herewith submitted:

The enrollment—Boarders, forty-seven; day students, ten. Total, fifty-seven.

The health of the school has been excellent. One boy had to be taken to Richmond for an emergency operation for appendicitis, but outside of that there has not been a single boy in the school infirm ary the entire session. This unusual record is an eloquent tribute to the climate, food and competent health supervision.

The scholastic work has been unusually good. The boys have received a maximum of individual attention and the results have been most gratifying. Six boys are due to graduate in June.

Two full periods of forty-five minutes each week are devoted to religious instruction in the regular curriculum, and the school is opened each morning with prayers in the chapel. We also have our own service Sunday night.

On Sunday morning the boys attend the parish church, which is being so attractively restored through the untiring efforts of the rector, who also is the chaplain of the School.

In the most interesting class presented to Bishop Tucker for confirmation this spring we were happy to note the presence of six of our boys and three members of our School Board.

The Thomas Locke Rust Memorial Scholarship supported at the Blue Ridge Industrial School has been maintained.

The purchase of a tract of six acres on the river by the Board has aroused much interest in the school. This gives us about 500 feet of the finest beach in this entire section. The boys have gone into the woods and cut the necessary timbers and are constructing a pier 130 feet long. This will be an enormous help in bathing and boating.

In the face of the fact that our enrollment is reduced this year because of the prevailing conditions in the business world, we have been able through rigid economy and some generous gifts to come through the session without debt. Bills have been paid promptly and the credit of the school has been maintained.

Even though the school is operated at cost, we are in sore need of scholarships with which to help in cases where the boys are otherwise unable to come to us. Any job in or about the school that can be handled by a boy without interfering with his studies is used to help in needy cases and these working scholarships are in great demand.

As the school practically spends not a dollar for advertising, we must depend on the assistance of our friends in advising us of likely prospects. Any help the members of this Council can render will be deeply appreciated and will be an enormous aid in building up the school.

(b) REPORT OF ST. ANNE'S SCHOOL.

Report of Year 1931-1932.

In spite of the depression, St. Anne's has had a very successful year. Not only have we been entirely self-supporting, but we have also been able to meet this year our share of interest indebtedness allotted to us by the Central Committee.

The total enrollment has been eighty, of which twenty-one were resident students and fifty-nine in the day school. The building has been put in good repair, new desks and other equipment and furnishings bought, so that both classrooms and the dormitory are adequately equipped for the present.

Our efforts to make St. Anne's an outstanding college preparatory school are showing results. At Sweet Briar fourteen girls from the State at large had scholastic standing entitling them to be guests at the honor banquet, and of these four were graduates of St. Anne's. A recent graduate of St. Anne's was one of twenty freshmen at Radcliffe honored by the Phi Beta Kappa dinner in recognition of outstanding scholastic ability.

In the religious instruction at the school we have been greatly aided by Rev. Dudley Boogher, of Neve Hall, and the Rev. Mr. Christian, of St. Paul's, both being very popular speakers at morning chapel. Mr. Christian also gave to the Juniors and Sophomores during Lent a series of talks on Christian Standards and Character Development, which aroused active discussion and were very much liked by the girls. Five of our boarding students were confirmed by Bishop Tucker this spring.

Charlottesville continues to give the day school its whole-hearted support, and we are hoping for a larger enrollment from the surrounding rural community this coming year.

### (c) REPORT OF ST. CATHERINE'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia: We are giving a very brief report this year, since the members of the Council have an opportunity to visit the School.

For the sake of the children, there has been a great effort to keep all activities of the School as normal as possible. The enrollment for the session 1931-32 is 265, as compared with last year's enrollment of 290, with sixty-four boarding students this year and seventy last year. In spite of this difference in numbers, it is our expectation to end the year without a deficit.

We shall welcome the opportunity of showing St. Catherine's to

any member of the Council who can find time to visit the school. We shall be especially glad to have the members see our chapel.

The uncertainty of the coming year is great, and we shall appreciate the efforts of any member of the Council in getting us in touch with desirable students. There will be a few scholarships available to the daughters of ministers of the Diocese of Virginia at a special fee of \$550.

### (d) REPORT OF ST. CHRISTOPHER'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia: Sirs:

- I beg to submit the following report of St. Christopher's School for the session of 1931-1932, being the twenty-first in its history and the twelfth under Church ownership:
- 1. Enrollment: (a) Total enrollment of pupils, 244: Boarding pupils (including five transients), 38; day pupils, 206. Upper school pupils, 171; lower school pupils, 73. (b) Faculty members, 18: Men teachers, 12; women teachers, 6. (c) House staff, 4: Matrons, 2; housekeeper, 1; resident nurse, 1. (d) Executive staff, 2: Treasurer and bookkeeper, 1; secretary, 1.
- 2. Health: The health of the school has been excellent throughout the session. There has not been a single case of serious illness in the boarding department.
- 3. Work: The regular work of the school has been of a satisfactory character.
- 4. The Faculty and House Staff: At the close of the session we shall lose one of the eighteen members of our present faculty. The religious affiliation of the members of the faculty and of the house staff and executive staff this session is as follows: Protestant Episcopal, 13; Baptist, 5; Presbyterian, 4; Methodist, 2.
- 5. Religious Affiliation of Pupils: (a) Protestant Episcopal, 66 2-5 per cent. (b) Other churches, 33 3-5 per cent.
- 6. Graduating Class: At the close of the session, on June 10th, a class of twelve will be graduated.
- 7. Finances for the Session: While it is impossible for me at this day (May 18th) to give exact figures for the session, it is my belief and that of the School Treasurer that the books of the school on June 30th, the closing day of our financial year, will show a net credit income of at least \$4,000.
- 8. Scholarships: Reductions from the rates made by the school and scholarships established by friends of the school, together amount-

ing to \$11,316.85, are this year being given through the school toward the education of the youth of Virginia and the Church.

- 9. Enrollment: Last session we had total enrollment of 254 boys. Our Enrollment this year to date is 244.
- 10. A Suggestion: It is once more offered as a suggestion that individual parishes in the Diocese follow the lead of St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, and found at the school parish scholarships, reserving to themselves the right of presentation. By such action the parish would benefit, and the school, the property of the Church and one of its working organizations, would be strengthened.
- 11. Religion: St. Christopher's School is a Church institution. In every department of the school's life, therefore, the fundamental importance of religion is recognized. The first exercise of every school day is a short divine service, in which every boy takes an active part; and before athletic events the boys of the whole school kneel together in prayer to ask God's blessing upon those who are about to represent them in the contest. In addition to these religious services, regular instruction in religion is provided for in graded courses, every boy being required to take two periods a week in the religious studies of his form.

Furthermore, recognizing the futility of trying by means of religious exercises and studies alone to inculcate a religious spirit, the school management endeavors to awaken that spirit in the boys and to foster it when awakened by presenting to them definite opportunities of work for others.

Among the opportunities that have come to the boys of St. Christopher's this year are the following: The Red Cross Membership Campaign, the Anti-Tuberculosis Christmas Seals Drive, and direct appeals for funds and clothing to aid various schools, orphanages, mountain missions and the like. Answering these appeals, the school will, by the end of the session, have collected and distributed through its Missionary Societies and other agencies sums amounting in the aggregate to over \$680 and more than 200 articles of clothing.

- 12. The Bishop's Visitation: On Sunday, March 13, 1932, Bishop Tucker confirmed seven of the pupils of St. Christopher's (of whom one was a member of the boarding department), and one member of the faculty.
- 13. The Outlook of the Session of 19329-1933: In view of the conditions prevailing at present, prospects for next year are good. We are anticipating the loss by graduation and withdrawals of about the usual percentage of the student bodies, while inquiries with regard to next year are already beginning to come in.

### (e) REPORT OF ST. MARGARET'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

For the session 1931-1932 the enrollment of St. Margaret's School is seventy-two boarding pupils and fourteen day pupils, a total of eighty-six. The geographical distribution of the boarding pupils is interesting because it covers a larger area than heretofore: Virginia, 45; Maryland, 5; District of Columbia and Connecticut, 3 each; Illinois, New York, North Carolina and Brazil, 2 each; Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Georgia and Florida, 1 each; and 4 whose residence is not fixed because the fathers are officers in the United States Navy.

The staff has been increased by an office assistant, who is contributing much to the smooth running of the school.

St. Margaret's has always maintained a small Primary Department for the convenience of friends in the locality, but the classes are too small to be very satisfactory and the department does not make its own expenses. For these reasons, and because the upper school needs space so badly, the Primary Department will be dropped at the close of the present session. The Intermediate Department, comprising fifth, sixth and seventh grades, will be retained, but the four high school classes, with seventy-one pupils, form the greater part of the school.

The school has been filled to its capacity and has had to rent for teachers and an art studio the second floor of a house in the vicinity.

This has been a good session in health, morale and scholarship. It is impossible to measure growth in character or spiritual development, but the facts that a number of St. Margaret's girls chose to pledge regular contributions in the Every-Member Canvass in December, and that eleven of them were confirmed in March, indicate a real interest in assuming religious responsibilities.

### VII. REPORT OF ST. AGNES' SCHOOL.

A prosperous year, in spite of untoward circumstances, brings gratitude to the hearts of all well-wishers of St. Agnes' School, Alexandria. Two graduates were expected, but causes not connected with the school took them both away during the year. A large and hopeful class is expected next year. The enrollment of both boarders

and day scholars has held up well and the teaching staff is as earnest and efficient as ever. Religious instruction continues to be given regularly by a gifted Seminary student, and services are conducted from time to time by neighboring ministers. The boarders attend Immanuel Church, Braddock, where Rev. George S. Vest, Chaplain of the School and Vice-President of the Trustees, is rector. Here annually a beautiful Christmas service and pageant is given which attracts a large congregation. The May Day fete on the well-wooded school hill also is an event of the neighborhood. Our graduates are making good records in various colleges and elsewhere. Miss Marguerite Chapman, Principal, is encouraged by this year's report and by the prospects for next year.

The commencement will be held June 3d, when the Rev. Professor Brown-Serman, of the Seminary, will give the address.

### VIII. REPORT OF THE BLUE RIDGE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

Total numbers of workers, 24—6 men, 17 women. Pupils, 228—Girls, 130; boys, 98. In high school, 76. Grades, 152. Course of study, primary through high school. Accredited by State Board of Education. Vocational training includes cooking, sewing, handcraft, nursing, typing, stenography, bookkeeping, farming, dairying, gardening, fruit-growing, carpentry, blacksmithing, electrical wiring, painting and masonry.

Graduating class numbered 14—boys, 6; girls, 8—making total number of graduates 78—boys, 22; girls, 56.

Summer school numbered 115, of which 45 were boys, 75 girls, 41 in the high school.

All girls are required to take a two-year course in Home Economics and all boys in high school to take Agriculture.

Three forty-five minute periods a week were given to Religious Instruction. The Christian Nurture Course was used. Regular Sunday services were held with celebration of Holy Communion on the average of once a month and special services during Lent. Rev. Nelson P. Dame held a mission of a week in March. Twenty-three were confirmed.

The Woman's Auxiliary, Junior Auxiliary, Junior Red Cross and Girls' Friendly Society continued their work throughout the year. The Junior Red Cross raised \$95, of which \$50 was donated to the chapel and the balance sent to the national headquarters. Total contributions to missions and charities, \$475.

Regular Sunday school and occasional services have been held at Haneytown and Wyatt Mountain Missions.

Rev. Churchill G. Gibson, D. D., and Mr. Ivey M. Lewis have been elected members of the Board of Trustees.

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### Buildings and Equipment.

The chapel was completed except for the furnishings. The pews and chancel furnitures are being made at the school. A septic tank and sewerage system was installed. Equipment for new laundry installed. A stone garage, capacity for four cars was built and rented to the workers. Neve Hall, a girls' dormitory, was overhauled and painted, new furnace installed in the main building and a vapor heating system and bathroom put in the hospital.

### Cost of Operation.

Total cost operation was \$38,989.04. An average of 160 boarding pupils was in residence throughout the year, making per capita cost only \$243.68. The day pupils, about forty, are not counted in arriving at this figure. Salaries paid, \$9,540 for women and \$8,835 for men, including the rector. The total receipts from fees and profit from industries within the school amounted to \$24,825.59, or about 64 per cent of the total cost of operation. In other words, it cost the public only \$14,163.45.

This amount should be secured through an appropriation from the Diocese or from an endowment, so that voluntary gifts might be set free for buildings and permanent improvements. The amount asked of the Diocese, \$10,000, is only \$460 more than the salaries paid the women workers. When this is reduced to \$7,500 it greatly hampers and retards the progress of the school. Right now is needed a new dining-room and kitchen, a new shop for boys and two cottage dormitories, one for boys and one for girls. The estimated total cost of these buildings is only \$25,000.

### Industries.

The farm and orchard have not fully recovered from the effects of the drought of 1930. They showed a combined loss of \$700.21. The cannery, however, shows a net profit of \$441.85. The entire output of cannery, practically all foodstuffs raised on farms, and one-third of the fruit is consumed by the school. Total estimated value of the produce furnished during the year, \$4,957.

### II. REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE DIOCESE.

May 4, 1932.

To the Finance Committee, Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia.

### Gentlemen:

We have audited the Treasurer's records and accounts of the administration of Diocesan Funds for the year ended December 31, 1931, including transactions up to January 10, 1932.

We have prepared from the audited accounts statements which reflect the sources of receipts and objects of disbursements and final cash condition of the various funds. These statements range from Exhibits "A" to "L."

Exhibit "A" is a summary of totals from all the separate statements of funds, reflecting in the last vertical column the balance or overdraft in each fund; also the total or net balance of cash in the hands of the Treasurer for the Diocesan Operating Account as a whole.

This net amount is shown at \$4,436.64, but against it there was a temporary outstanding bank loan of \$4,000.00, which was borrowed for the following specific deficits:

Exhibit "B" is a statement of receipts and disbursements of the Bishops' and Contingent Fund. The receipts to this fund were \$20,960.69 for the year, as compared to \$16,260.00 for the year 1930. However, the salaries of both Bishops were paid out of this fund instead of that of one, as before. The expenditures also included the expenses of \$2,669.95 to the General Con-

vention at Denver. An available balance of \$1,143.07 remained in this fund at the end of the year. This balance, however, was disposed of in an appropriation of \$1,200.00 to the Episcopal Fund immediately after the close of the year.

Exhibit "C" shows the receipts and disbursements for account of the Diocesan Missionary Society. Starting the year with a balance of \$2,397.43, the funds apportioned and received from the Diocesan Program amounted in all to \$68,534.98. This included the special appropriation of \$7,893.56 from gifts toward the deficit.

Not included in the receipts, however, was \$500.00 received through the Woman's Auxiliary in 1932, after the close of the year.

Of the closing balance of \$2,049.00, \$812.21 belonged to the Diocesan Church Lay Workers' Pension Fund.

Exhibit "D" shows the receipts and disbursements for account of Diocesan Missionary Society, No. 2.

It will be noted that there are still overdrafts in certain purposes of this fund, as follows:

### III. REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE BOARD OF APPORTIONMENT.

### Gentlemen:

We have audited the Treasurer's records of receipts and disbursements of the 1931 funds of the Diocesan Program under administration of the Board of Apportionment, Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia, for the year 1931, including transactions to May 1, 1932.

The funds handled through the Treasurer's office for the 1931 Program are summarized in the following statements herewith submitted:

Exhibit "A"—General Statement of Receipts and Disbursements—Diocesan Program by Months—Comparative:

This statement shows only the total amounts passing through the Treasurer's hands by months, in comparison with similar figures for the preceding year.

Exhibit "B"—Comparative Statement of Receipts and Disbursements of Funds for Diocesan Program—Years 1931 and 1930:

This statement summarizes the receipts as to source and the disbursements as to object for the program year of 1931 in comparison with that of 1930, and indicates a total of funds approximately \$29,000.00 less than for the preceding year.

\$17,500.00 was borrowed in December, and at date of preparing this statement (May 1, 1932), \$1,250.00 of this loan remained unpaid. Current funds

in the hands of the Treasurer at the same date amounted to \$49.54. In addition to this, the Treasurer reports unpaid acceptances of churches at approximately \$4,000.00.

During the year 1931 interest on the old outstanding debt of \$12,400.00 was paid, but no curtailment of principal was made.

### V. REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE FUNDS OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

May 10, 1932.

To the Trustees of the Funds, Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the records and securities relating to the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia, for the year ended December 31, 1931, and in connection therewith we have prepared the accompanying statements which, in our opinion, reflect accurately the movement of the funds for the year 1931 and their status at the close of the year.

Exhibit "A" is a general summary of receipts and disbursements pertaining to the individual funds grouped under General Fund. The last column to the right shows the final current condition of Income Account of each individual fund in the general group, the final figure for the whole group being an overdraft of \$596.18, the net result of the following:

It will be noted that the overdrafts listed above exist in the operating accounts of the Diocese.

Uninvested cash belonging to the principal account of general funds at December 31st was \$100.00. The funds in this and Exhibit "B" are arranged in the order of parishes.

After allotment of income from general real estate 6% bonds to the several funds, there existed an unapportioned amount of \$161.41, which, upon the suggestion of the Treasurer, was applied to the operating or administrative account towards covering the deficiency of \$236.05 existing in that account.

Exhibit "B" is collateral to Exhibit "A" and is made up of the individual funds by parishes, showing the movement of monies to and from each fund in the general account group.

It is to be observed that, notwithstanding the uncertain financial conditions, income from the various invested securities came in to be credited to the funds at the accrual rate, including the average of 6% on funds resting in miscellaneous real estate bonds. This reflects great credit to the administration of the funds.

Exhibits "C" and "D" show the receipts and disbursements for account of the Disabled Clergy and Widows' and Orphans' Funds. Uninvested funds in both these principal accounts at the close of the year amounted to approximately \$21,900.00. No reinvestment of matured funds was effected during the year.

Exhibits "E." "F." "G" and "H" are schedules only of the principal fund securities and other values held in trust for the various purposes indicated. These schedules were prepared by us after examination of the records and documents in evidence.

It is noted in Exhibit "F" that one bond of the Guaranty Trust Company of Norfolk has long passed maturity and is apparently of doubtful value.

The aggregate total of funds in the hands of the Trustees is stated at \$731. 974.64, as summarized at the end of Exhibit "E."

The obligation outstanding for improvements to Mayo Memorial property had been reduced to \$850.00 at the close of the year.

The Treasurer's records were satisfactorily verified, and all funds appear to have been faithfully accounted for.

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## APPENDIX D.

## CONSTITUTION

OF THE

# PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

As adopted in 1815, and amended in 1836, 1840, 1850, 1860, 1864, 1867, 1872, 1881, 1890, 1900, 1904, 1909, 1912, 1920, 1931 and 1932.

## ARTICLE I.

There shall be a Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, at the place designated by the preceding Council, on the third Wednesday in May every year; except when the Ascension Day shall fall upon the day following, in which case the Council shall be on the fourth Wednesday in May. But in the case of any good cause arising, rendering it necessary or expedient to change the time or the place for any meeting of the Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may change the time, or the place, or both.

## ARTICLE II.

The Council shall be composed of—

(a) The Bishop or Bishops, and the ministers, except as hereinafter provided, who are now or may hereafter be canonically settled in parishes or churches within the Diocese, professors of the Theological Seminary in Virginia or any other theological seminary in connection with the Protestant Episcopal Church being ordained ministers canonically connected with this Diocese, missionaries within this Diocese and under its ecclesiastical authority being clergymen of this Church and canonically connected with this Diocese, chaplains in the United States Army or Navy canonically connected with this Diocese, clergymen canonically connected with this Diocese serving as headmasters of Church schools within this Diocese, or holding executive positions in the work of the Diocese or in the work of the Church under the National Council. Provided, That any such ministers who may have been members of the Council up to the time of disability, but whom age or infirmity prevents from exercising their clerical functions, shall be members ex-officio. Provided further, That no minister under ecclesiastical censure shall be entitled to a seat in the Council; and no minister shall be entitled to a seat unless he has been canonically connected with the Diocese for the six calendar months preceding:

(b) Lay members consisting of

(1) One delegate from each parish or church entitled to representation chosen by the vestry thereof, save that every such parish or church having more than one minister canonically settled shall be entitled to send as many lay delegates as it has ministers, and that every such parish or church having more than five hundred communicants reported to the previous annual Council, shall be entitled to send an additional delegate for each five hundred communicants or major fraction thereof above the first five hundred; but in no case to exceed three lay delegates in all from any one congregation.

(2) Three delegates from the missionary jurisdiction known as the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge chosen by the Board of Mountain Work.

(3) The lay members of the Standing Committee, and the Chancellor of the Diocese and the Committee on Finance, as the same are or may hereafter be constituted by Canon, shall be members of the Council ex-officio, but without the right to vote when the vote shall be taken by orders. And in every case members of the Council shall be communicants in the Church."

(c) Two lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese, as the same is or may hereafter be constituted by Canon.

## ARTICLE III.

Twenty members of the clerical and twenty of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn.

## ARTICLE IV.

In all matters that shall come before Council, the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body, and the concurrence of a majority shall give validity to any measure; but when five members require it there shall be a vote by orders, and a majority of each order shall be necessary to a decision.

## ARTICLE V.

The election of a Bishop in the Diocese shall be made in Council in the following manner: The vote shall be by ballot and by orders, a concurrent majority of the votes cast by each order being necessary to a choice.

## ARTICLE VI.

The Bishop shall be President of the Council, in which character it shall be his duty to give to the Council annually a general view of the state of the Church; to call special Councils at whatever time and place he shall think necessary, or when required by the Standing Committee; to preserve order during the time of session; to put the question, collect the votes, and declare the decision; and he may deliver his sentiments on any subject after it has

been discussed, before a vote thereon. The Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside in the Council in the absence of the Bishop.

## ARTICLE VII.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, the Council, immediately upon their assembling, shall choose by joint ballot a President from among the order of Priests, who shall remain in office until the next annual Council or until the next election of a President. He shall perform all the duties, and possess all the privileges above specified; but he shall not call special meetings of the Council unless applied to for that purpose by a majority of the Standing Committee. If neither the Bishop nor the Bishop-Coadjutor be present at any meeting of the Council, they shall elect, by ballot, a President pro tempore.

## ARTICLE VIII.

A Secretary shall be appointed annually by the Council. His duty shall be to make minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully to deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Council which may be in his possession. It shall be his duty to give reasonable notice of the time and place for the meeting of the succeeding Council. The Secretary shall annex to the journal of each succeeding Council a list of the clergy of the Diocese, which shall have been certified to him by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint a Secretary pro tempore, who shall take charge of the books and papers, and perform the duties of the office, until the election of a Secretary by the Council.

## ARTICLE IX.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council, who shall continue in office for one year, or until his successor shall be appointed. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be ordered by the Council or provided by Canon. He shall report annually to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same.

The Treasurer shall give bond for the faithful performance of his duties in an amount to be fixed by the Committee on Finance, with a surety company authorized to do business in Virginia and approved by said Committee as security, which bond shall cover all amounts coming into his hands as Treasurer from whatsoever source.

The accounts of the Treasurer shall be audited annually on or before February 1st by, or under the direction of, the said Committee on Finance.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Treasurer, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint a Treasurer pro tempore; and in case of the misconduct of the Treasurer, or of his incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, the Ecclesiastical Authority may remove him and fill the vacancy in the same manner. The Treasurer pro tempore shall take into his custody all the money and other property, and all the books and papers, belonging to the said office, and discharge the duties thereof until the election of a Treasurer by the Council.

## ARTICLE X

Each annual Council shall elect by ballot a Standing Committee, consisting of six members, three clerical and three of the lay order, who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese, and who shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed.

## ARTICLE XI.

Every Parish within this Diocese shall be entitled to the entire benefit of this Constitution as soon as it shall have signified its ratification thereof, either in writing or by sending a lay delegate to the Council; and such Parish shall thereafter be benefited and bound equally with the other Parishes in this Diocese by every rule and Canon which shall be framed by any Council acting under this Constitution for the government of this Church in ecclesiastical concerns.

## ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution shall be unalterable, except in the following manner: A proposition for any change shall be introduced in writing and considered in Council, and if approved of, the same shall be transmitted to the several vestries of the Parishes which shall have ratified this Constitution; and if again approved of in the next ensuing Council by a majority, the change shall then take place, and the Constitution so altered shall be valid and obligatory.

## CANONS

## OF THE

# PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

As Revised and Adopted May 18, 1906, and Amended in Council Since
That Time

## CANON I.

## Of a List of the Ministers of this Diocese.

Section 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of this Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their post-offices, and their respective cures, or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged. And the Ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be so designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom. And it shall be appended to the Journal, and be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

Section 2. The list of the clergy of the Diocese, so prepared, and corrected according to the changes which may occur, whether by death, ordination, discipline, or canonical removals from or admission into this Diocese, shall be *prima facie* evidence of a clergyman's having a cure or mission, or other canonical connection with this Diocese.

Section 3. The right of any clergyman to a seat in the Council shall, if claimed or disputed, be determined according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons by the Council itself, whether his name be inserted in the list aforesaid or omitted. And it shall be the duty of every clergyman to attend regularly the meeting of every Council; or, if unable to attend, to send his written excuse to the President.

## CANON II.

## Of Lay Delegates, and the Evidence of Their Election.

Section 1. The Parishes of this Diocese, entitled to representation in the Council, are those, within its present limits, which were established by law prior to the eighteenth day of May, A. D. 1785; together with those which

have, since that time, been constituted and received into union therewith by act of the Convention or Council of the Diocese. And the Churches entitled to representation are those which have been constituted and received as Separate Congregations by like action of the Convention or Council; or which, being distinct cures, have been recognized, by long and unbroken usage, as Separate Congregations entitled to representation.

A list of the Parishes in the Diocese, and of the Separate Congregations therein, shall be appended to the Journal of each Annual Council.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of every Parish, and of every Church entitled to representation, as above defined, to send to each meeting of the Council of the Diocese the number of Lay Delegates to which they may be respectively entitled.

Section 3. The election of Lay Delegates to the Council shall be certified by the Rector, Register, or one of the Wardens of the proper Parish or Church, in duplicate; and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

One copy of this certificate shall be sent to the Secretary of the Council at least ten days before the meeting of the Council, and the other shall be given to the Delegate attending.

Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the Parishes or Churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the Lay Delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council. But until their report be received the roll as made out and called by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authorized roll of Lay Delegates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all of the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter: *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

## CANON III.

## Of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

Section 1. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office; or, there being no Bishop-Coadjutor, in case the Bishop be incapable of performing his administrative duties; or when the Bishop shall authorize them so to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for all purposes set forth by these Canons.

Section 2. Any vacancy occurring by death, removal from the Diocese, or otherwise, in the Standing Committee, shall be supplied by the concurrent vote of the remaining clerical and lay members of the Committee.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee at every annual meeting of the Council to submit a report of their proceedings. When required by the Council they shall also lay before them any documents which may have come into their possession.

## CANON IV.

## Of the Registrar of the Diocese.

The Council shall elect, at its meeting next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, an officer who shall be called the Registrar of the Diocese; who shall continue in office for three years, or until his successor is elected. It shall be the duty of the Registrar to receive and preserve, under the direction of the Council, books, papers and other documents bearing upon the history of the Church in the Diocese, and to perform such other duties pertaining to his office as may be required by the Council. And he shall make a report to the Council at each annual meeting.

#### CANON V.

## Of the Chancellor of the Diocese.

The Council shall elect, at its meeting next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, an officer who shall be called the Chancellor of the Diocese; who shall continue in office for three years, or until his successor is elected. The Chancellor shall be a lay communicant, resident in the Diocese, and learned in the law. He shall be the legal adviser of the Bishop, and also of the officers and committees of the Council, whenever they shall require legal advice in matters affecting the interests of the Diocese.

#### CANON VI.

## Of Deputies to the General Convention.

Section 1. At the annual Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention there shall be elected by ballot the full number of Clerical and Lay Deputies to the General Convention to which this Diocese is entitled, and, in the same manner, a like number of Clerical and Lay Alternate Deputies; and a majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. The Clerical Deputies shall be Presbyters canonically connected with this Diocese, and the Lay Deputies shall be communicants resident within the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of each of the Deputies elected to signify to the Secretary of the Council, at least ten days before the meeting of the General Convention, whether or not he accepts the appointment and will perform its duties. If he accepts, the Secretary shall issue to him a certificate of election. Should any Deputy elected decline, or fail to signify his acceptance, or should a vacancy occur otherwise, the Secretary of the Council shall issue the certificate of election to the Alternate Deputy, of the same order in which the vacancy occurs, who was first elected; or, if more than one were elected on the same ballot, who received the highest number of votes; and if there be more than one vacancy the others shall be filled successively in like manner.

## CANON VII.

## Of the Committee on Church Property.

Section 1. The Council shall elect a Standing Committee, to consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, and three laymen who shall be members of the Corporation known as the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, to be known as the Committee on Church Property, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of this Committee to take such steps, legal or otherwise, as may be necessary to recover or secure any property, real or personal, belonging to any Parish or Congregation of the Church within this Diocese, the legal title to which is not vested in duly constituted Trustees; and in the case of any such property which may be regarded as abandoned property, the said Committee shall take such steps, through the Trustees holding the legal title thereto, or the survivor or survivors of them, if there be any, or, if there be no such Trustee or Trustees, then through any one or more members of the Congregation which has ceased to occupy said property, either to hold said property, or to make sale thereof, in accordance with the statutes of this State in that case made and provided; and in case of a sale of the said property, the said Committee shall pay over to the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia the proceeds of such sale, to be subject to the order and disposition of the Council of this Diocese.

Section 3. It shall also be the duty of this Committee, when it may be necessary, to apply to the Courts of the State for the appointment of Trustees to hold the legal title to any property belonging to the Church within this Diocese, and under the control of the Council thereof. And they are hereby constituted the proper authorities of the Council to make such application. They shall also have the care of the Episcopal residence, and other property

belonging to the Diocese for which no other custodians are provided; and shall be authorized to make such expenditures for repairs, insurance, etc., thereon as may be necessary, with the approval of the Committee on Finance.

Section 4. Vacancies in this Committee, occurring by death, removal from the Diocese, or otherwise, shall be filled by the Council from time to time as they may occur.

Section 5. This Committee shall make a report annually to the Council of any action taken by them in the preceding year.

#### CANON VIII.

Of the Bishops' and Contingent Fund for Diocesan Expenses.

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Diocese, and of each Parish and congregation, shall begin January first.

Section 2. The Council shall elect annually a Committee of three laymen to be known as the Committee on Finance, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. Any vacancy occurring in this Committee shall be filled by the remaining members. It shall be the duty of the said Committee to examine the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, and report to the Council the financial condition of the Diocese in respect to the Bishops' and Contingent Fund, making such recommendations as they may deem expedient.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance, at each annual Council, to present an estimate of the amount needed to meet the expenses of the Diocese for the fiscal year beginning the first day of January following. They shall at the same time present a schedule assessing the amount called for in their estimate proportionately upon the Vestries of the different parishes and congregations of the Diocese. The said assessment shall be based upon the relative financial strength of the parishes and congregations, as shown by their parochial reports and by other facts and considerations which may become known to the Committee. This assessment shall be made known to the Vestries of the several parishes or churches as soon as possible after it is made. But be it provided, That any Vestry shall have thirty days in which to protest if they deem the assessment excessive or burdensome, and the Committee on Finance shall allow them opportunity to show cause why it should be reduced.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of each Vestry to pay the sum assessed upon the respective parish or church to the Treasurer of the Diocese, in full at the beginning of the fiscal year, or quarterly in advance throughout the year, as it may elect; each Vestry being free to adopt such means as it may deem best to raise its assessment.

Section 5. The Fund thus created shall be known as the Bishops' and Contingent Fund; and shall be held by the Treasurer of the Diocese for the purpose of defraying such expenses as shall be authorized by the Council. But the Committee on Finance may also, after the adjournment of the Council,

authorize and require the Treasurer to pay any extraordinary or unforeseen expenses which shall legitimately arise in the proper conduct of the business of the Diocese.

## CANON IX.

## Of the Church Pension Fund.

Section 1. In conformity with the resolutions adopted by the General Convention of 1913, setting forth the principles upon which a pension system for the clergy of this Church and their dependents should be constructed, pursuant to which the corporation the Church Pension Fund has been created to carry those principles into effect, the Diocese of Virginia hereby adopts the system of the Church Pension Fund.

Section 2. The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint, annually, a Committee to be entitled The Committee on the Church Pension Fund, to consist of two clergymen and five laymen, which shall include the Treasurers of the Widows and Orphans and Disabled Clergy Funds, which Committee shall have authority to elect such officers as may be necessary or proper to carry out the provisions of this Canon. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

(i) To furnish annually to the Church Pension Fund the canonical roll of the Bishops and other Clergy of this Diocese, and of the Clergy canonically belonging to other Dioceses or Missionary Districts who may be licensed to officiate in this Diocese, with a statement of the stipends received by each of said Bishops and Clergymen from any Parish, Mission or other Ecclesiastical organization in this Diocese.

(ii) To receive from the Church Pension Fund annually a statement of the premiums necessary to be paid by the Diocese or by each Parish, Mission, or other Ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese, in order that the Bishops and Clergymen in receipt of stipends from such Diocese, Parishes, Missions, and other Ecclesiastical organizations may be entitled respectively to pensions.

(iii) To receive from the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese of Virginia the annual interest accruing on the investments held by the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund of said Diocese and the General Clergy Relief Fund when this Canon goes into effect, and to transmit the same to the Church Pension Fund to be applied as the Committee shall direct on account of the premiums necessary to be paid by the Diocese.

(iv) To inform the authorities of each of the said Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations of the premiums payable by it, and of the time and manner of payment thereof; to receive, from all of the Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations in this Diocese, or from individual contributions, the aforesaid premiums and to transmit the same to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund; provided, that the Committee may, in its discretion, make arrangements with the Church Pension Fund for the direct transmission of such premiums from the Parishes, Missions and other Ecclesiastical organizations aforesaid to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund.

(v) To inform the Church Pension Fund from time to time of the Bishops and other Clergy and the widows, remaining unmarried, and minor orphans, remaining unmarried, of such Bishops and other Clergy, canonically connected with this Diocese, who may be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.

(vi) In general, to inform the Bishops and other Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of the pension system created by the General Convention, and committed by it to the operation of the Church Pension Fund, whereby the Bishops and other Clergy of the Church are assured of pensions, as of right, to themselves in the event of old age, or disability, and to their widows and minor orphans in the event of death, and to do all things that may be necessary or advisable in the premises to the end that moneys necessary to be paid by the Parishes, Missions, and other Ecclesiastical organizations may be fully and systematically paid.

(vii) To make an annual report to Council of the amount of premiums collected and paid to the Church Pension Fund and of amounts received there-

from by the pensioners of this Diocese.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese of Virginia to pay, semi-annually, or oftener at their option, to the said Committee on the Church Pension Fund, all the income of the investments held by said Trustees for the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund, receiving satisfactory assurance from the Church Pension Fund that the latter corporation will assume and pay all of the annuities paid by the said Trustees when this Canon goes into effect, and so long as said payments are actually made by the Church Pension Fund.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of every Bishop and other Clergyman receiving a stipend or stipends, and the duty of every Parish, Mission, or other Ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese paying a stipend or stipends, to furnish a statement of such stipend or stipends to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund whenever said Committee shall, in writing, ask for such

Section 5. This Canon shall go into effect when the Secretary of the Council shall receive notification from the Church Pension Fund that such sufficient number of other Dioceses, Missionary Districts, and General Boards, or other General Institutions of the Church have, by legislation, provided for entering into the pension system of the Church Pension Fund, as, in the opinion of the said Church Pension Fund, will enable its system to go into operation; provided, that the Bishops and other Clergy canonically connected with said Dioceses or Missionary Districts, or whose stipends are wholly paid by said Boards or General Institutions of the Church, shall number not less than Two Thousand individuals; and when the Secretary of the Diocese shall also receive notification from the Church Pension Fund that the special account for the accrued liabilities in the opinion of the Trustees of the Church Pension Fund is of sufficient amount to insure adequate provision for the clergy canonically resident in this Diocese at the time; and provided, that nothing

herein contained shall be construed to hinder or delay the prompt payment of the existing allowance to the present or future disabled Clergy or to the widows and orphans of the Clergy of this Diocese out of the collections in this Diocese or from the trust funds held for their benefit until the equivalent is paid them or secured to be paid them promptly.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Invested Funds of the Diocese to transfer and deliver to a trust company, to be named by the Trustees of the invested Funds belonging to the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund and by the Church Pension Fund Committee. all of these securities and invested principal funds held by the Diocese belonging to the Disabled Clergy Fund and the Widows and Orphans Fund, to be held by the said trust company with authority and obligation on its part to collect the income and to pay the same to the Pension Fund.

Whenever in the judgment of the said Trustees it shall become expedient to make a particular investment of uninvested funds, or to change any existing investments, said investment or change of investments shall be made when and as may be directed in writing by the said Trustees with the approval of the said Pension Fund, provided that the Church Pension Fund shall first enter into a contract to assume and continue to pay the grants for pensions or annuities to the beneficiaries at present receiving the same from such funds, until all such obligations are fulfilled and the same terminated by the death of the several beneficiaries or by the action of the Trustees of the several funds. And further, to credit annually the amount of the annual net income derived from such funds upon the annual assessments of the parishes and missions of the Diocese of Virginia for the purposes of the Church Pension Fund as in the discretion of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund may deem proper.

And further, that the Trustees will not, after the expiration of ten years from the execution of this contract, make, directly or indirectly, any appeal or solicitation for funds or endowments to be made either to the Diocese or to any person or corporation, to be used for the relief of aged or infirm clergy or the families of deceased clergymen of the Diocese of Virginia, other than the Pension Fund, and during the ten years after the execution of this contract, any such appeal must be approved by the authorities of the Diocese of Virginia and shall only be made for or on behalf of clergy who are upon the canonical roll of said Diocese at the time of the execution of this contract.

Any monies or securities hereafter received by said Trustees shall be deposited with the trust company above mentioned by said Trustees, upon the conditions and for the purposes hereinbefore set forth.

The Trustees or proper authority are authorized and empowered to enter into and sign, seal, acknowledge and deliver any contract or contracts with the Church Pension Fund, a corporation created under the laws of the State of New York, to carry out any and all of the provisions of this Canon.

#### CANON X.

Of the Constitution of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Constitution of this Society is hereby amended and established as follows:

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

Article 1. This Society shall be called the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia. Its membership shall be considered as including all the baptized members of this Church residing in this Diocese. Its government shall be vested in the Council of the Diocese. Its object shall be to extend and support the Missionary work of the Church in the Diocese, and to encourage the liberality of its members in support of the Church's mission.

Article 2. The Council shall annually elect an Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, to continue in office for one year or until their successors are elected, consisting of the Bishop, and the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, the Treasurer of the Diocese, five clergymen and five laymen from the Diocese at large and two members, one clergyman and one layman, from each of the several Convocations in the Diocese which shall have been recognized by the Council as being entitled to such representation, nominated by the said Convocations respectively.

Article 3. The Bishop shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, and the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, shall be Vice-Chairman. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall be Treasurer of the Executive Committee. A Secretary shall be elected by the Committee. The Committee shall fill any vacancies that may occur in their number: provided that a representative from any Convocation shall be elected only upon nomination by that Convocation.

The Committee may enact such rules and By-Laws as shall be needful for their own guidance and that of those under their authority, subject always to the direction and control of the Council. Nine members of the Executive Committee, duly convened, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article 4. The Executive Committee shall be charged with the conduct and supervision of the missionary work of the Church within the Diocese, except such as is strictly parochial; and shall receive, appropriate and disburse all contributions made for such missionary work. Auxiliary societies, boards, and other agencies and persons employed or engaged in this work shall be subject to their oversight and direction.

They shall have authority, with the advice and consent of the Bishop, to establish missions in the Diocese; to aid in the erection of churches; to group missions or congregations dependent upon the Society into suitable fields or cures; to employ missionaries, provide for their support, appoint them their

stations and give them such directions as may be deemed necessary; provided always that the rights of no duly constituted Rector or Vestry be infringed upon without his or their consent. They shall also have authority to aid feeble Parishes or congregations in supporting their ministers, upon application from the Vestries thereof, when, and as long as, they are satisfied such aid is necessary; to assist in the material equipment of parishes and missions; to provide for the training of workers and teachers; for the distribution of Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals; for the publication and distribution of books, papers, etc., for Sunday schools and missions; for missionary meetings and addresses. They shall also have authority to promote the cause of religious and moral Education and of Christian Social Service; and may provide for disseminating information as to the work and needs of the Society and of the Church at large; and generally, as the executive agency of the Society, to advance its interests and prosecute its work.

Article 5. The Executive Committee shall elect from its membership the following Departments or Boards, and shall determine from time to time the scope of the work of each Board and, out of funds at its disposal, make appropriations for its authorized expenditures.

I. The Board of Religious Education; to consist primarily of seven members.

II. The Board of Christian Social Service; to consist primarily of five members.

III. The Board of Apportionment; to consist primarily of ten members, including the Treasurer and at least one representative from each Convocation.

IV. The Board of Publicity: to consist primarily of seven members, including at least one representative from each Convocation.

V. The Field Board: to consist primarily of seven members, indluding at least one representative from each Convocation.

VI. The Board of Evangelism: to consist primarily of five members.

VII. The Board of Mountain Work: to consist primarily of seven members. Each of said Boards shall have the power, with the advice and consent of the Bishop, to elect additional members in number not exceeding those appointed by the Executive Committee; which, in the case of the Board of Mountain Work, shall include the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge and the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, if there be one. Such additional members shall be entitled to seats but not to vote at the meetings of the Executive Committee. Each Board shall elect from its members a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary. Appropriations made for the expenditures of each Board shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Executive Committe upon order of the Chairman or Vice-Chairman, certified by the Secretary of the Board. Each Board shall report its actions to the Executive Committee under such regulations as the Committee shall prescribe.

The Executive Committee may also appoint from its membership such Sub-Committees as may be needful to facilitate its work, and prescribe their duties

Article 6. In order that sufficient means may be provided by the stated

offerings of the people for the support and extension of the missionary, educational, social service and other religious work of the Diocese, and for its proper share of the work of the Church at large, the Executive Committee shall plan and promote each year an Every-Member Canvass to be made after adequate preparation in every congregation and parish as far as possible, at a time appointed by the Committee.

The Board of Apportionment, after consultation with the appropriate Departments of the National Council and of this Province, the Trustees of the diocesan institutions, and representatives of the parishes and missions of the Diocese, shall annually prepare a survey setting forth the opportunities and needs of the Church as represented by these various interests, and also an itemized budget indicating the amount required by the Church in the Diocese for the next fiscal year, which survey and budget, after approval by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, shall be submitted to the Council for final action. This survey and budget shall also be submitted to each minister and vestry for their information not later than Mav

After action by the Council the Board of Apportionment shall prepare a schedule apportioning the total amount called for by the budget adopted by the Council among the parishes and congregations of the Diocese, which apportionment shall be based upon the relative financial ability of the several parishes and congregations; and the financial ability of each congregation for this purpose shall be measured by the amount of its annual operating expenses. exclusive of interest and capital expenditures, over a series of years as disclosed by its parochial reports, and by such peculiar facts and considerations as may be deemed pertinent by the Board. This survey, budget and schedule shall be published and the apportionment of each parish and congregation shall be communicated to the minister and vestry thereof not later than October first of each year.

In order that the people may be properly instructed as to the needs of the Diocese as outlined in the survey and budget, the Board of Apportionment, in cooperation with the Field Board, the parochial authorities and committees organized for the purpose, shall conduct a campaign of instruction and preparation throughout the Diocese, culminating in the Every-Member Canvass.

It shall be the duty of the minister and vestry of each parish and congregation to further the objects of this campaign, by laying before the people of the congregation the apportionment as fixed by the Board of Apportionment, and by using all diligence to secure pledges to the full ability of their respective congregations to give to the Budget of the Diocese and other missionary opportunities of the Church, and to provide for the payment to the Treasurer of the Diocese, in regular monthly installments during the next fiscal year, of the amount pledged to the diocesan budget. It shall be the further duty of said minister and vestry to report to the Treasurer of the Diocese not later than December 15th each year the amount which said parish or congregation expects to pay on, or above, its apportionment.

It shall be the duty of the said Treasurer, as soon as the total of said parochial pledges is ascertained, to inform the several clergy and congregations of said total and of the additional amount, if any, necessary to meet all the budget needs and obligations. And it shall thereupon be the duty of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society to make an appeal directly to individuals and organizations in the Diocese by such means as it deems best for supplementary gifts to enable the Diocese to carry on all the work provided for in the budget, and to take advantage of opportunities for the extension thereof.

As soon as practicable after December 15th each year, the Board of Apportionment shall provide for the distribution among the interests represented in the budget of the estimated receipts for the next fiscal year as based upon the information then available, and shall direct when and under what conditions the payments shall be made. The estimated receipts, if less than the budget, shall first be applied to fixed obligations, and the remainder apportioned to other objects in the budget pro rata. The schedule of payments, when approved by the Executive Committee, shall be the warrant of the Treasurer of the Diocese for paying out the money received, periodically, according to its terms. Pending the fixing of said schedule, the Treasurer is authorized to make payments according to the terms of the budget.

Article 7. The Executive Committee shall present a report of its operations and those of its Boards and Sub-Committees, and of the progress and condition of the missionary work of the Diocese, to the Council, sitting as a Missionary

Council, on or before the second day of each annual meeting.

Article 8. The maximum expenses of the Executive Committee shall be fixed annually by the Council of the Diocese.

Article 9. All resolutions and Canons in conflict with this Canon are hereby repealed.

## CANON XI.

## Of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

Section 1. The Missions engaged in Mountain Work shall constitute a missionary jurisdiction to be known as "The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge." The Missions to be included in this jurisdiction shall be designated from time to time by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Section 2. The management of the affairs of this jurisdiction shall be in the hands of the Board of Mountain Work.

Section 3. A presbyter, to be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, shall have as the representative of the Bishop general supervision of the Mountain Work, and shall be responsible for the promotion thereof. The Archdeacon shall be appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the Executive Committee. When necessary in the judgment of the Bishop and the Executive Committee, there shall be an Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, chosen in like manner.

Section 4. The Board shall formulate by-laws governing the Mountain

Work, which shall become effective upon approval by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

## CANON XII.

## Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction,

Section 1. The colored people residing within the Diocese of Virginia who are, or may be hereafter, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall constitute a Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be lawful to organize Separate Congregations or Mission Churches composed exclusively of colored persons within the limits of any already existing parish or parishes, subject to all the conditions prescribed in the Canon "Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish," or the Canon "Of Mission Churches," except that the consent of the Vestry or Vestries of white congregations need not be obtained; and further, that the right of representation of such Separate Congregations or Mission Churches composed exclusively of colored persons shall be in the Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction, and only in the Council of the Diocese as provided in Section 6 of this Canon.

Section 3. There may be appointed by the Bishop one or more Presbyters who shall have general supervision of such colored churches and congregations as the Bishop may designate, and perform such duties as he may prescribe.

Section 4. When, in the judgment of the Bishop, the number of colored ministers and congregations is sufficient to justify it, a Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction shall be held annually at such time and place as may be designated by the Bishop as to the first meeting, and afterwards by the Convocation itself. The colored ministers of the Diocese, in good standing, shall be members of the Convocation, and it shall be the duty of every such minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every Colored Mission Church or congregation shall elect one male Lay Delegate annually, a communicant, and twenty-one years of age, who shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation upon presentation of a proper certificate, signed by the Minister, or, if there be no minister, by one of the Wardens, or the Register of the Vestry.

The Bishop, the Bishop-Coadjutor, if there be one, and the Presbyters mentioned in Section 3, shall be members ex-afficio of the Convocation. The Bishop, or, in his absence, the Bishop-Coadjutor, shall be President of the Convocation; or, if neither be present, the Convocation shall elect a President pro tempore.

Section 5. The Convocation shall have power to consult and devise measures for their common welfare and the advancement of the work of the Church among the colored people, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Council of the Diocese.

SECTION 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two clergymen and two laymen to represent them in the Council of the Diocese.

Section 7. Colored congregations constituted as above provided may

acquire and hold property of their own, as by law provided, but cannot come into possession of the property of any white congregation, except by transfer, under the laws of the State of Virginia; nor shall any white congregation come into possession of the property of any colored congregation, except by like transfer.

## CANON XIII.

## $Of\ Convocations.$

Section 1. The parishes in this Diocese shall be grouped in five Convocations as follows:

(1) The Albemarle Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Albemarle, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Louisa, Orange, and St. Martin's Parish in Hanover County.

(2) The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the City of Alexandria and the Counties of Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier (south of the Bull Run Mountain) and Prince William.

(3) The Rappahannock Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Caroline, Charles City, Essex, Gloucester, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster, Mathews, Middlesex, New Kent, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford, Westmoreland, and Ashland and St. Paul's Parishes in Hanover County.

(4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the County of Henrico.

(5) The Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Clarke, Fauquier (north of Bull Run Mountain), Frederick, Loudoun, Madison, Page, Rappahannock, Rockingham, Shenandoah and Warren. Provided, however, that nothing herein shall affect the provisions in the Canon "Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction."

Changes in Convocation boundaries shall be authorized by Council on joint application of the Convocations interested.

Section 2. Every clergyman settled as rector, assistant minister or minister in charge shall be a member of the Convocation in which his principal Church is situated.

Section 3. The Convocations shall make provision for lay representation. Section 4. The Convocations may enact such rules and by-laws as may be necessary for their own guidance.

## CANON XIV.

## Of the Division of Parishes.

Section 1. Whenever the members of this Church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, or in adjoining portions of two or more Parishes, shall desire to separate from the Parish or Parishes of which they form a part, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after ten days' notice of the time and place of such meeting, given publicly in the church, or, otherwise, to each known person qualified to vote for Vestrymen in the territory proposed to be

formed into a new Parish, and appoint a Committee to take such measures as may be necessary.

Section 2. The committee thus appointed shall give to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and to the Vestry or Vestries in the Parish or Parishes from which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply for such separation: which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority, and to the said Vestry or Vestries, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.

SECTION 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council; and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desirable, together with an accurate description of the proposed line or lines of division, the name proposed for the new parish, and a statement showing the extent of the territory, the churches and missions, if any, and the number of communicants, which will be embraced therein.

Section 4. The Council shall refer the petition to a committee to examine and report thereon; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, proceed to divide said Parish or Parishes, and to constitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese; in which case the petition, or so much thereof as shall contain the description of the line or lines of division, shall be delivered to the Secretary and shall be published in the Journal.

Section 5. As soon as practicable after the new Parish is constituted, the committee which made the application aforesaid shall give at least ten days' notice, in the manner prescribed in section one of this Canon, to the qualified electors residing in the new Parish to assemble for the election of a Vestry; which election shall be conducted according to the direction contained in the Canon "Of the Election and Organization of Vestries."

#### CANON XV.

## Of Establishing or Altering Parish Boundaries.

Section 1. When it shall be deemed desirable to alter the boundary lines between two or more Parishes; or when such lines are unknown, or need to be newly determined, the Vestries of the Parishes concerned may agree upon the lines which they wish to have established as their parish lines, and unite in a petition to the Council to alter or establish them accordingly; which petition shall contain an accurate description of the line or lines proposed. Or if the said Vestries fail to agree, then one or more of them may present such petition; in which case a copy of the petition shall be sent to every Vestry in the Parishes concerned which does not unite therein, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the petition shall be presented. And in any case, if a proposed change in parish lines would effect a transfer of any congregation or church building from one parish to another, formal notice thereof shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority at least two months before the meeting of the Council.

Section 2. The Council shall refer such petition to a Committee to examine and report thereon; whereupon the Council may, if they deem it expedient, alter or establish the said line or lines accordingly. In which case the petition, or so much thereof as shall contain the line or lines so established, shall be delivered to the Secretary and shall be published in the Journal.

## CANON XVI.

## Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish.

Section 1. When any number of persons, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a minister, shall desire a separate parochial organization, but do not reside so apart from other congregations as to admit of forming a new parish, they may proceed according to the directions of the Canon "Of the Division of Parishes," except as regards a line or lines of division, which provision in this case is inapplicable. And the Council, proceeding under the directions of the same Canon, may constitute the applicants a Separate Congregation in the Parish in which they are situated, with the right to elect a Vestry, and to have representation in the Council, subject always to the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese.

Section 2. No new church shall be built, or new congregation established, in any Parish, unless the consent of the Vestry, or of all the Vestries, of the said Parish be first had. But if such consent be not given an appeal may be taken to the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese, or to the Council when in session; and in either case their decision in the matter shall be final.

## CANON XVII.

## Of Mission Churches.

Section 1. When any number of persons belonging to any parish or congregation desire a separate organization, but cannot comply with the requirements of the Canon in regard to the formation of Separate Congregations, they may proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

They must obtain the approval of the Vestry of the Parish to which they belong, and if there be two or more Vestries in the Parish they must have the consent of a majority of the same.

They must have the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. They may have their own Vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties, shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of Vestries; except that they shall have no representation in the Council of the Diocese, and shall not call a minister without the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of a church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary and the Treasurer of the Diocese; and a list of such Mission Churches shall be published annually in the Journal.

## CANON XVIII.

## Of Parish Councils.

Section 1. In every parish with a single Rector and Vestry, their parochial authority, and their consequent primary responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church, extends throughout the territorial limits of their parish and should be so recognized and exercised.

In every parish which contains, in addition to the original Parish Church. one or more Separate Congregations or Mission Churches, organized as provided in these Canons, there shall be a Parish Council, to consist of the Rector or Minister in charge of each of the said organized churches or congregations therein, and one or more lay members of the Vestry thereof. The lay members shall be elected annually by their respective Vestries, and shall continue in office until their successors are duly elected. The Parish Council shall elect a Chairman and a Secretary, and shall adopt such rules for its own guidance as may be deemed necessary, subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Parish Council to exercise the authority which belongs to the Parish as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout its borders, so that the Parish may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. Especially it shall be its duty to encourage the planting of missions or mission Sunday Schools where necessary in the Parish, to determine their location and their status and to foster their growth and efficiency, and to provide as far as possible that the services of the Church shall be available to all the people within its territory, and that its united influence be exerted in matters pertaining to the welfare of the community. Provided, however, that the Parish Council shall not encroach upon the rights or duties of the Vestries of organized congregations within its Parish; but it may act with them in an advisory capacity by their express invitation.

## CANON XIX.

## Of the Election and Organization of Vestries.

Section 1. Every Parish, Separate Congregation and Mission Church in this Diocese shall elect annually, as hereinafter prescribed, suitable persons who, with the Rector or Minister in charge, if there be one, shall constitute the Vestry thereof until their successors are elected and have duly qualified; or if any parish or separate congregation at a meeting called as provided by Section 2 of this canon so authorized, vestrymen may be elected for terms not to exceed three years, the congregation to determine the length of terms and the number of vestrymen to be elected for such terms.

SECTION 2. The election of Vestrymen shall be held on Easter Monday, in the church or regular place of worship. But if no election be held on Easter Monday it may be held on any day thereafter; and if there be no church or regular place of worship, or if it be not available, the election may be held at any suitable place in the Parish; such time or place to be appointed by the Minister, or if there be none, by the Wardens, or by two Vestrymen, or, if there be none, by three members of the congregation. But any congregation may, at a regular meeting of the congregation duly convened at the call of the Vestry or of three members of the congregation, appoint some fixed day in the year other than Easter Monday on which to hold the annual election of Vestry. And the Vestry, or other persons authorized under this Section to act in the premises, shall take care that adequate notice of the place, and the day and hour, appointed for every election of a Vestry shall be given, either in the church on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means.

Section 3. All persons eighteen years of age, who are registered as communicants of the particular church in which they offer to vote, and noncommunicants twenty-one years of age who are baptized, and who have been for six months regular contributors to the charges of the same, shall be entitled to vote at the election of Vestrymen. The voting shall be by ballot, and a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. But no election shall be valid hereunder unless at least ten per cent of the qualified voters of the congregation participate therein.

SECTION 4. The Vestry may appoint three persons to act as judges, to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges are appointed, the electors present may choose three persons to act as judges. The judges of election shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and of those

elected as Vestrymen.

Section 5. The number of Vestrymen elected shall be not less than three, nor more than twelve; provided, however, that in any congregation having more than one hundred communicants, one additional Vestryman may be elected for each additional one hundred communicants or fraction thereof; but the total number of Vestrymen shall in no case exceed eighteen. If the election be the first in a new Parish or congregation the number of Vestrymen shall be fixed by vote of the electors present; otherwise it shall be the same as that of the former Vestry unless changed by vote of the electors. Only male persons twenty-one years of age who are communicants, shall be eligible to the office of Vestryman; in other respects the qualifications of Vestrymen shall be the same as those prescribed for voters; provided, that a Vestryman now serving on this 22nd day of May, 1919, shall be eligible for re-election.

Section 6. If there be in any Parish two or more congregations apart from each other, not being Separate Congregations or Mission Churches in the meaning of these Canons, it shall be lawful for the Vestry of such Parish, if they deem it expedient, to apportion to each congregation the number of Vestrymen to be chosen as its representation upon the Vestry of the Parish. In which case a separate election shall be held by and for each such congregation; and the electors thereof shall choose the number of Vestrymen so allotted to that congregation, and no more. In other respects such elections shall

conform to all the foregoing provisions of this Canon. But in no case shall the aggregate number of such Vestrymen in any Parish exceed twelve.

All the Vestrymen so chosen by the different congregations therein, together with the Rector or Minister, if there be one, shall constitute the Vestry of the Parish, with all the duties and powers of other Vestries under these Canons. But the Vestrymen chosen by each congregation respectively, together with the Rector or Minister, shall be a Committee of the Vestry to have the care and control of the property, and to transact the local business, pertaining to that congregation alone, and not to the Parish at large. In which case they may appoint one Warden for their Church, a Treasurer, and a Clerk who shall keep a record of their proceedings.

When in the judgment of the Minister, or, if there be none, of the Senior Warden, a meeting of a Parish Vestry so constituted is impracticable, any matter concurred in by a majority of the aforesaid Committees of the Vestry, and duly recorded by their respective Clerks and the Register of the Vestry, shall be deemed to be the act of the Vestry of the Parish. *Provided*, however, That the Parish Vestry shall meet as a whole at least once a year.

Section 7. As soon as may be after their election, the persons chosen as Vestrymen shall assemble at such time and place as the Minister shall appoint, or as shall be designated by any two Vestrymen-elect, the Minister and each Vestryman-elect being notified, and proceed to organize the Vestry. The proceedings at this and every meeting of the Vestry shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's Prayer by the Minister, or in his absence by any member who may be chosen to preside over the meeting.

Section 8. Every person chosen a Vestryman shall, in order to qualify as such, subscribe the following declaration and promise: "I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do yield my hearty assent and approbation to the doctrines, worship and discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in these United States; and I promise that I will faithfully execute the office of Vestryman of Parish, or Church, in County, according to my best knowledge and skill." No person shall act or vote as Vestryman until he has subscribed this declaration and promise.

Section 9. The Vestry shall proceed to elect a Senior and a Junior Warden, a Register and a Treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. If Wardens have been chosen for particular churches by Committees of the Vestry, the Senior and Junior Wardens of the Parish shall be chosen from among such Wardens. All Wardens must be communicants and members of the Vestry.

Section 10. The Rector shall preside at all meetings of the Vestry when present, and be entitled to give the casting vote in case of a tie, when he is not personally interested. All Vestry meetings shall be subject to his call; but in case he fails, at the request of two Vestrymen, to call a meeting, such Vestrymen, if they deem it necessary, may themselves call a meeting, giving

notice thereof to the Rector and to each Vestryman. A majority of the Vestrymen who have qualified, exclusive of the Rector or Minister, shall constitute a quorum; but any Vestry may agree upon a smaller number, not however less than four, to act as a quorum thereof.

Section 11. Vacancies occurring in the Vestry shall be filled by a vote of the remaining members. The failure of any Vestryman-elect to qualify within a reasonable time, or the continued neglect of any Vestryman to attend the meetings of the Vestry without adequate excuse, may, after due warning, be deemed to create a vacancy.

## CANON XX.

Of the Duties of Vestries, Wardens and Other Parish Officers.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Vestry to determine upon and elect a Rector; to co-operate with him in promoting the spiritual welfare of his cure; to use all earnestness in seeking with him to enlist new disciples for the congregation of Christ, and particularly as a body to meet, at the Rector's appointment, all persons desiring to be confirmed or to be transferred into the congregation, in order to express to such persons before their reception into the congregation what the Vestry, as the lay leaders of the congregation, consider the duties and privileges of work and service for such prospective members of the fellowship to be; to see that the Rector is properly supported and that his salary is paid regularly and punctually; to provide for the appointment of Trustees under the laws of the State of Virginia authorized to hold the legal title to the church property; to make and execute all contracts for the erection, furnishing, preserving and insuring the church edifice and other property; to regulate the use of the Parish graveyard; to make all necessary provision for church music, with the advice and consent of the Rector, and subject to his control; and generally, as the constituted agents of the Parish or Congregation, to transact all its temporal business.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Wardens to keep watch over the Church property; to see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship; to see that the Sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties; to collect the offerings of the people; to take charge of the font and communion plate; to provide out of the Church funds, under the direction of the Vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion; to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Register of the Vestry to take charge of all Parish records, and to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the Vestry in a well bound book to be provided for that purpose.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all .Church funds, except communion alms and other special offerings, and to disburse the same under the direction of the Vestry; to render his accounts

to the Vestry at stated times, and to make such reports to the Council as may be required by their orders.

## CANON XXI.

## Of Parish Registers and Parochial Reports.

Section 1. Every Minister of this Diocese shall keep a record of the Communicants, and of all Baptisms, Confirmations, Marriages and Burials, within his Parish or Congregation; specifying the time when persons became or ceased to be Communicants under his charge, and whether by confirmation, transfer, discipline, death or otherwise; the name, age or the date of birth, the sponsors or witnesses, and, in the case of infants, the parents, of each person baptized; the names of persons confirmed, and by what Bishop; the names, ages and residences of persons married, and the names of at least two witnesses; the names and ages of persons buried; and also the date and place of every such rite respectively; attesting each by his signature.

These records shall be made by the Minister in a suitable and substantial book, to be known as the Parish Register, to be provided by the Vestry for that purpose and to remain their property. When a Parish or Church becomes vacant the Parish Register shall be deposited with one of the Wardens, who shall make, or cause to be made, all needful entries therein until a Minister shall be in charge.

Section 2. Every minister shall send to the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, to the Secretary, for the President of the Council, on or before the first day of February of each year, a Report of his official acts, and, if he has a cure, of the condition of his Church or Churches, for the year ending the thirty-first day of December preceding, in such form as shall have been prescribed by the Bishop or Council. And if any Church be vacant the report for that Church shall be sent by the Wardens.

## CANON XXII.

# Of the Transfer and Enrollment of Communicants.

Section 1. Every communicant removing from one Parish or Church to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the minister a certificate that he or she is a communicant in regular standing, from the Minister, or, if there be no Minister, from one of the Wardens, of the Parish or Church from which the communicant desires to be transferred.

Section 2. No Minister shall enroll any persons as communicants in the Parish or Congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, unless he shall be satisfied that they have been regular communicants in some other Parish or Congregation; nor shall he enroll any one who is known to deny the Articles of the Christian Faith as set forth in the Apostles' Creed.

## CANON XXIII.

Of the Due Celebration of the Lord's Day.

All persons within this Church are enjoined to celebrate and keep the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, in hearing the word of God read and taught, in private and public prayer, and in acts of charity, using all sober and godly conversation.

## CANON XXIV.

## Of Family Worship and Instruction.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of every communicant in this Church, who is at the head of a family, to live in the daily exercise of family worship.

Section 2. The members of this Church shall instruct their families, as far as they are able, in the principles of the Christian religion. Parents and sponsors shall be careful to teach their children the solemnity and obligation of their baptismal vows, to cause them to attend the Sunday-school and other catechetical instructions of their Minister, and, as soon as they are sufficiently impressed with the importance and sacredness of their baptismal promise, shall take care that they come to the Minister to be examined, and, if they be deemed fit, to be presented to the Bishop for confirmation.

## CANON XXV.

## Of Offenders to Be Admonished, or Repelled From the Lord's Table.

If any persons within this Church offend their brethren by wickedness of life, such persons shall be admonished, or repelled from the Lord's Table, by the Minister in charge of the Parish or Church, according to the Rubric. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the Minister, or may be requested by the accused, the Wardens of the Parish, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the Minister in ascertaining the facts of the case: Provided, That if such Warden or Wardens fail or refuse to act within ten days, the Minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

## CANON XXVI.

Of the Trial of the Appeal of a Layman After Repulsion From the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and desiring that he may be restored to the Communion. And then the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the

Minister, shall nominate two of the clergy and two of the laity, of whom the Minister repelling shall select one of the clergymen, and the communicant one of the laymen; and it shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case, under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop; who, thereupon, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence, shall proceed to adjudge the case. If further evidence be required it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. And when the evidence is thus procured the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment whenever made to the Minister repelling, and to the communicant repelled; which judgment shall be final and conclusive. Provided, That in case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall nevertheless be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

## CANON XXVII.

Of the Trial of a Clergyman, Not Being a Bishop.

Section 1. The trial of a clergyman, not being a Bishop, shall be on a presentment in writing, specifying with reasonable clearness and certainty as to time, place, and circumstance, the crime or misdemeanor, by violation of the canons or otherwise, charged; the said presentment to be made to the Bishop, either by the Council, or by the Vestry of the Parish or Congregation to which the accused belongs, or by any three presbyters of the Diocese entitled to seats in the Council; the said vestry, or presbyters, pledging themselves to act as a committee of prosecution. If, however, the presentment be made by the Council, then the Council shall appoint the committee of prosecution and furnish them with such instructions as may be deemed necessary.

Section 2. Such presentment being made to the Bishop, and being accompanied by a further statement in writing of the names of the witnesses, and of the purport of their evidence, and by such documentary evidence as may be in their possession, the Bishop shall immediately proceed to the trial, according to the following provisions: He shall nominate from among the clergy entitled to seats in the Council, other than the members of the Standing Committee, eight presbyters, and cause a list of their names and a copy of the presentment to be furnished to the accused, or left at his place of residence. Of the eight presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the accused may choose five, or in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days so to do, the Bishop shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen shall constitute a court for the trial of the accused. The Bishop shall also at the same time, cause at least thirty days' notice of the time and place of the trial to be given, both to the accused and to the parties presenting him, and also to the presbyters nominated as before provided.

Section 3. The Court shall appoint a President and Secretary, the first always from their own body.

Section 4. If the accused appear before proceeding to trial, he shall be called on by the court to say whether he is guilty of the offence, or offences, charged against him, and on his neglect or refusal to answer, the plea of not guilty shall be entered for him, and the trial shall proceed: Provided, That for sufficient cause the court may adjourn, from time to time, and place to place: And provided also, That the accused shall, at all times during the trial, have liberty to be present, to produce his testimony, and to make his defense.

Section 5. On the request of the accused, or the committee of prosecution, witnesses may be summoned, if before the meeting of the court, by the Bishon; if during the session of the court then by its President. All testimony shall be given under oath or affirmation, administered by some officer authorized by law. In case the testimony of any witness, whose attendance on the trial cannot be obtained, is desired, it shall be lawful for either party, at any time after notice of the presentment is served on the accused, to apply to the court, if in session, or if not, to the Bishop, who shall thereupon appoint a commissioner to take the deposition of such witness; and such party so desiring to take deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying such notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness; whereupon, it shall be lawful for the other party, within six days after such notice, to propound cross-interrogatories, and such interrogatories, and cross-interrogatories, if any be propounded, shall be sent to the commissioner, who shall thereupon proceed to take the testimony of such witness, and transmit it under seal to the court. But no deposition shall be read at the trial unless the court have reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, unless both parties shall consent that it may be read.

Section 6. The court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall, within ten days after closing the same, declare in a written judgment signed by them, or a majority of them, that the accused is guilty, or not guilty, of the charge or charges, or any of them, laid in the presentment, in order therein set forth, and also, if guilty, what punishment shall be awarded; which judgment, with all the evidence received, shall be delivered forthwith to the Bishop; whereupon, unless the Bishop see cause to mitigate or remit the punishment, or to grant a new trial, he shall pronounce sentence according to the judgment of the court, and such sentence shall be final. In case a new trial is granted, a new court shall be constituted according to the provisions of this Canon.

Section 7. If the accused shall neglect or refuse to appear before the court, when summoned according to section second of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the court shall declare him to be in contumacy, and report the same to the Bishop, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass against him for contumacy; but the said sentence shall be reversed by the Bishop, if, within three calendar months, the accused shall tender himself ready, and accordingly appear, to take his trial on the present-

ment; but if he shall not so tender himself before the expiration of the said three months, the sentence of degradation from the ministry for contumacy shall forthwith be pronounced by the Bishop, who shall cause such sentence to be publicly read to the congregations of the Diocese by the respective ministers thereof.

Section 8. If at any time the accused shall confess himself guilty of the matters charged in the presentment, or any of them, the court shall proceed to award the punishment, and certify the same, as hereinbefore provided, to the Bishop, who shall, unless he see cause to remit or mitigate the punishment, pronounce the sentence according to the Canons.

Section 9. All notices and papers contemplated by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Bishop, or by the court when the same is in session; and the certificate of any such summoner shall be evidence of the due service of a notice or paper. The delivery of a written notice or paper to a party, or the leaving it at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

Section 10. The accused party may have the privilege of appearing by counsel, in number not more than two, and, in case of the exercise of such privilege, but not otherwise, those presenting shall have the like privilege. If the party accused desire it the trial shall be in public, and said party shall be entitled to a copy of the evidence if he require it.

Section 11. In case of a presentment occurring during a vacancy in the Episcopal Office, such presentment shall be made to the Standing Committee, who shall thereon take such steps as are by this Canon enjoined on the Bishop. Provided, That on receiving the proceedings and judgments of the court, they shall transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese, who shall be requested, and is hereby authorized, to act thereon, as if he were the Bishop of this Diocese, and, if he shall concur in opinion with the court, he shall proceed to pronounce sentence accordingly.

Section 12. The expenses of such trial, as also those of the investigating committee preliminary to a presentment, shall be defrayed by the Treasurer out of the Contingent Fund by order of the Council, or, when it is not in session, of the Committee on Finance.

SECTION 13. All judgments and proceedings under this Canon shall, after they have been acted on by the Bishop, be transmitted by him to the Standing Committee, who shall preserve the same.

## CANON XXVIII.

## Of Altering or Adding to the Canons.

No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall hereafter be considered by the Council, unless at least one day's notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a committee of at least two presbyters and two laymen. Nor shall such alteration or addition be adopted during the same Council if

two-thirds of the members present shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration until the next annual Council.

## CANON XXIX.

## Of Former Cannons Repealed.

All the former Canons or parts of Canons of this Diocese, not included in these Canons, are hereby repealed.

## APPENDIX

## CERTAIN CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF VESTRIES AND THE LAY PEOPLE: SELECTED BY THE BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE, AND PUBLISHED HERE BY ORDER OF THE COUNCIL.

## CANON 20.

## Of the Fitting of Vacant Cures.

Section 1. When a Parish or Congregation becomes vacant the Church-wardens or other proper officers shall notify the fact to the Bishop. If the authorities of the Parish shall for thirty days have failed to make provision for the services, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to take such measures as he may deem expedient for the temporary maintenance of Divine services therein.

Section 2. No election of a Rector shall be had until the name of the Clergyman whom it is proposed to elect has been made known to the Bishop, if there be one, and sufficient time, not exceeding thirty days, has been given to him to communicate with the Vestry thereon.

Section 3. Written notice of the election, signed by the Church-wardens, shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. If the Ecclesiastical Authority be satisfied that the person so chosen is a duly qualified Minister, and that he has accepted the office, the notice shall be sent to the Secretary of the Convention, who shall record it. And such record shall be sufficient evidence of the relation between the Minister and the Parish.

Section 4. A Minister is settled, for all purposes here or elsewhere mentioned in these Canons, who has been engaged permanently by any Parish, according to the rules of said Diocese, or for any term not less than one year.

Section 5. In case of the election of an Assistant Minister, a certificate from the Rector and Wardens shall be sent to the Bishop.

## CANON 26.

## Of Lay Readers.

Section 1. A competent person ready and desirous to serve the Church in the public services statedly as a Lay Reader must procure from the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or Missionary District a written license. Such license shall not be granted to any but a male communicant of this Church, and must be given for a definite period, not longer than one year, but may be renewed from time to time, or revoked at any time. Such

license may be given for any vacant Parish or Mission, or for a Congregation without a Minister, but where a Presbyter is in charge, his request and recommendation must have been previously signified to the Ecclesiastical Authority. A license shall not be granted for conducting the service in a Congregation without a Minister, which is able and has had reasonable opportunity to secure the services of an ordained Minister. If the Lay Reader be a student in any Theological Seminary, he shall also, before acting as such, obtain the permission of the presiding officer of such institution and of his own Bishop.

Section 2. A Lay Reader shall be subject to the regulations prescribed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and shall not serve in any Diocese other than that in which he is licensed, unless he shall have received a license from the Bishop of the Diocese in which he desires to serve.

Section 3. In all matters relating to the conduct of the service, and to the Sermons or Homilies to be read, he shall conform to the directions of the Minister in charge of the Parish, Congregation, or Mission in which he is serving, and, in all cases, to the directions of the Bishop. He shall read only the Morning and Evening Prayer (omitting the Absolution), the Litany, and the Office for the Burial of the Dead. He shall not deliver sermons or addresses of his own composition, unless, after instruction and examination, he be specially licensed thereto for urgent needs by the Bishop. He shall not wear the dress appropriate to Clergymen ministering in the Congregation.

#### CANON 43.

## Of the Solemnization of Matrimony.

Section 1 Ministers of this Church shall be careful to secure the observance of the law of the State governing the civil contract of marriage in the place where the service shall be performed.

Section 2. (i) No Minister shall solemnize a marriage except in the presence of at least two witnesses.

(ii) Every Minister shall without delay formally record in the proper register the name, age and residence of each party. Such record shall be signed by the Minister who solemnizes the marriage, and if practicable, by the married parties, and by at least two witnesses of the marriage.

Section 3. No Minister, knowingly, after due inquiry, shall solemnize the marriage of any person who has been or is the husband or wife of any other person then living, from whom he or she has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage. Nor shall it be lawful for any member of this Church to enter upon a marriage when either of the contracting parties is the husband of the wife of any other person then living from whom he or she has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage. But this Canon shall not be held to apply to the innocent party in a divorce for adultery; *Provided*, that before the application for such remarriage a period of not less than one year shall have elapsed, after the granting of such divorce; and that satisfactory

evidence touching the facts in the case, including a copy of the court's decree, and record, if practicable, with proof that the defendant was personally served or appeared in the action, be laid before the Ecclesiastical Authority, and such Ecclesiastical Authority, having taken legal advice thereon, shall have declared in writing that in his judgment the case of the applicant conforms to the requirements of this Canon; and *Provided*, further, that it shall be within the discretion of any minister to decline to solemnize any marriage.

Section 4. If any Minister of this Church shall have reasonable cause to think that a person desirous of being admitted to Holy Baptism, or to Confirmation, or to the Holy Communion, has been married otherwise than as the Word of God and discipline of this Church allow such Minister, before receiving such person to these ordinances, shall refer the case to the Bishop, for his godly judgment thereupon; *Provided*, *however*, that no Minister shall in any case refuse these ordinances to a penitent person in imminent danger of death.

## CANON 49.

## Of the Music of the Church.

It shall be the duty of every Minister to appoint for use in his Congregation hymns or anthems from those authorized by the Bubrics, and, with such assistance as he may see fit to employ from persons skilled in music, to give order concerning the tunes to be sung in his Church. It shall be his especial duty to suppress all light and unseemly music, and all irreverence in the performance.

## CANON 50.

## Of the Consecration of Churches.

Section 1. No church or chapel shall be consecrated until the Bishop shall have been sufficiently certified that the building and the grounds on which it is erected have been fully paid for, and are free from lien or other incumbrance; and also that such building and ground are secured from the danger of alienation, either in whole or in part, from those who profess and practice the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of this Church, except in the cases provided for in Secs. 2 and 3 of this Canon.

Section 2. It shall not be lawful for any Vestry, Trustees, or other body authorized by law of any State or Territory to hold property for any Diocese, Parish, or Congregation, to encumber or alienate any consecrated church or chapel, or any church or chapel which has been used solely for Divine Service, belonging to the Parish or Congregation which they represent, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

Section 3. No consecrated church or chapel shall be removed, taken down, or otherwise disposed of for any worldly or common use, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

## Other Provisions of the General Canons.

A person applying to the Standing Committee for recommendation to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders, or for ordination to the Diaconate, or the Priesthood, must present a certificate of his character and fitness signed by the Vestry of the Parish to which he belongs. Canons 2, 7, 8. (Therefore, when a Rector has recommended a postulant to the Bishop as a fit person to study for the ministry, said Rector should report the fact to his Vestry; and the Vestry should be careful to become acquainted with the postulant, that they may intelligently indorse him.)

If a Bishop shall for three years have declined to visit a Parish or Congregation, the Vestry (in this Diocese including the Rector), may apply to the Presiding Bishop for a Council of Conciliation, to be composed of the five Bishops living nearest the Diocese. Canon 18, Sec. 2 (ii).

In case there be no Minister in charge of a congregation—"No Churchwardens, Vestrymen, or Trustees of the Congregation, shall permit any person to officiate therein, without sufficient evidence of his being duly licensed or ordained to minister in this Church." Canon 23.

It shall be the duty of the Vestry or Church-wardens having charge of the Parish Register, in a vacant Parish, to exhibit it to the Bishop on the occasion of his visitation. Canon 21, Sec. 2 (iii).

A Vestry has the privilege of refusing its consent to the resignation of its Rector. Canon 42, Sec. 1.

A Vestry desiring for urgent reasons a separation and dissolution of pastoral relations with its Rector, may, if the parties be not agreed, give notice thereof in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority, who will act in the premises. Canon 42. Sec. 2.

Lay Delegates to the Diocesan Council are called upon to sign a testimonial for a person whom they elect Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor. Canon 13, Sec. 1 (1).

Lay Delegates may also be called upon to take part in placing the Diocese under the provisional charge of the Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor of another Diocese. Canon 18, Sec. 6 (ii).

A person applying to be appointed Deaconess must lay before the Bishop a testimonial of fitness, signed by twelve lay communicants, six of whom shall be women, as a prerequisite to her appointment to that function. Canon 24, Sec. 3.

A communicant in good standing, removing from one Parish or Congregation to another, is entitled to a certificate that he or she is a communicant. Canon 44, Sec. 3.

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
