FORMS FOR MAKING BEOUEST

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

If it is the desire to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its officers.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is, "Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia."

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia."

The legal title of the Episcopal High School is "Protestant Episcopal High School in Virginia."

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia."

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia," a corporation chartered under the laws of Virginia.

The legal title of the Blue Ridge Industrial School is: "The Blue Ridge Industrial School, Incorporated."

The legal title of St. Agnes' School, Alexandria, is: "St. Agnes' Episcopal School for Girls, Incorporated."

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg is: "The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia."

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond. Va."

ORGANIZATION

From Canon I, Section 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

Canon II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

RULES OF ORDER

1st. The Council shall be opened with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Report of Secretary.

Election of a Secretary.

The appointment of a Treasurer pro tempore when the Treasurer is absent.

The adoption of rules of order.

RILLES OF ORDER

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The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses.

The appointment of committees.

Report of standing committees.

Communications from Convocations.

Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on New Parishes.

A Committee on Dispatch of Business.

And the chairmen of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President may think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next Council.

5th. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention, shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

6th. Divine service shall be held on the Wednesday evening of each Council with a sermon, and a committee of three shall be appointed at each Council to select a preacher to deliver this sermon at the succeeding Council.

7th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; and all resolutions shall be referred to their proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

8th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

10th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.

11th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefi-

nitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

12th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

13th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

14th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

15th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

19th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21st. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22d. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

23d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *Provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

24th. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

25th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

26th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the President may

appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And the Committee may report at any time.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

27th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

28th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

29th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

30th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

JOURNAL

OF THE

141st Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia

RICHMOND, May 13, 1936.

The one hundred and forty-first Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia convened at 10 o'clock on this date at St. Paul's Church, Richmond. The Holy Communion was celebrated by Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rt. Rev. F. D. Goodwin, D. D., Rev. B. D. Tucker, Jr., D. D. and Rev. Beverley M. Boyd.

The Council assembled in business session at 11:00 o'clock. The Roll call showed a quorum present consisting of 67 clergy and 62 lay delegates.

The Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, D. D., was re-elected Secretary of the Council and the Rev. L. C. Harrison was reappointed Assistant Secretary.

The rules of order of the last Council were, on motion,

adopted.

The Chairman appointed a Committee on Credentials consisting of the Rev. Dudley Boogher, Mr. Frederick Northup and Mr. Samuel Winston Lacy.

ADDRESS TO THE COUNCIL.

My Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

As we open this, the 141st Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, it is my privilege to greet you, my brethren, the clerical and lay delegates and to pray that God's blessing may rest upon you and upon the parishes that you represent. During the ten years that have passed since I was elected Bishop-Coadjutor by the Council in Lees-



burg, there has grown up on my part at least a feeling of genuine affection for the clergy and lay people of the Diocese. These annual words of greeting are therefore no mere formality, but are a sincere expression of my gratitude for your loyal co-operation in the work and your kindness to me personally.

CLERGY DECEASED SINCE THE LAST COUNCIL.

Since our last meeting two of our clergy have passed from us and have entered into that rest that remaineth for the children of God.

The Rev. Henry Horton Williams, Deacon. Mr. Williams was born at Birkenhead, England, November 17, 1852. After coming to live in Albemarle County he served as a volunteer lay worker in the mountain work under Archdeacon Neve and in order to widen his sphere of usefulness was ordained as a perpetual Deacon by Bishop Peterkin in 1902. He continued his work for the mountain people until advancing years compelled his retirement from active work. He died September 12, 1935.

The Rev. Robert Allen Castleman. Mr. Castleman was the son of a former widely known and beloved minister of the Church in Virginia, the Rev. Robert Allen Castleman, Sr. He was born in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, in 1857. After his graduation from the Theological Seminary in 1886 he was sent by Bishop Whittle to the charge of Cople and Montross Parishes in Westmoreland County. He served in that field for five years and in Fairfax County for five years more when he went to the charge of churches in Maryland. He returned to his old diocese in 1917 and held the rectorship of The Falls Church from that date until his retirement from active work in 1931. He continued to live at his home at Falls Church greatly beloved by his parishioners until his death on February 28, 1936.

Before entering upon the main subject of this address, I wish to call your attention to a particular problem, the Virginia Churchman. It is the official organ of the Diocesan Missionary Society and is a vital factor in the promotion of its work. It ought to be read by every communicant in the Diocese. At present there are only some 1,300 paid subscribers to this magazine. This means first that it is not being widely enough read and therefore is failing to fulfill its purpose. Further it means inadequate financial support. The magazine cannot be continued without more paid subscriptions. The price is only fifty cents a year. It is of course too much to expect that every communicant should subscribe, but we can aim at one copy for each family. The editors need help in securing subscriptions. I would suggest as a not impracticable goal that we try before the end of this year to increase the paid subscriptions to 3,000. I further recommend

that at this meeting of the Council we formulate a plan for doing this and make arrangements for having the plan carried out.

Another subject of which I would make brief mention is our work at the University of Virginia. In my opinion it is in its possibilities the most far-reaching single piece of work that we as a Diocese are undertaking. Last year you recognized this by passing a resolution calling for the appointment of a committee to make an appeal for money to clear off the debt still remaining upon the parish house and rectory. This committee has inaugurated a campaign for this purpose, and its first efforts have met with an encouraging response. I hope that the members of this Council will do everything in their power to cooperate with the committee. The clearing off of this debt will not only remove a serious handicap from the work at the University, but will release for other purposes diocesan funds that now have to be used for the payment of interest.

The Committee on the Revision of the Canons is to make its final report at this Council. I wish to express to this committee my appreciation of their careful and prolonged labors. No one who has not sat, as I have, at some of the sessions of a committee engaged in revising Canons can realize what long and detailed effort is involved. I trust that the Council will give adequate attention to their report.

One of our finest hymns begins with the line, "Watchman, tell us of the night!" This possibly represents all that many would venture to ask of one who is charged with the task of reporting on the present religious situation. Yet, while there are real grounds for anxiety, there are also signs that the night is drawing to a close. For example, the statistics published in the Living Church Annual show that there has been a steady decrease in contributions since 1929. On the other hand there were more persons confirmed in 1934 and 1935 than in any previous two-year period in the history of our Church. It is perhaps unsafe to put too much reliance upon statistics, but there are on every side indications of the beginnings at least of a revival of interest in the spiritual side of life. In our own Church the widespread response to the Forward Movement illustrates the awakening sense of religious need. Already, to use a quaint Biblical phrase, the sound of a going in the tops of the trees can be heard. This means that the hour of opportunity is before us. The keynote of this Council should therefore be not discouragement nor should our aim be to accommodate ourselves to the exigencies of a desperate situation—we should rather bestir ourselves, for the Watchman is calling out to us that the night is far spent, the day is at hand. Let that assurance be the dominating note in the deliberations of this Council.

Conditions in the Diocese correspond pretty closely to those of the General Church. The work itself shows satisfactory results, the problem of financing it is more difficult than ever before. This imme-



diately raises the question whether the support of the work which we have undertaken is not beyond the financial capacity of our Diocese. Personally I am convinced that we have sufficient capacity, provided we can arouse among our church members the kind of interest in the work that springs from the conviction that it is serving vital human needs.

The Diocese of Virginia has comparatively heavy missionary responsibilities. On the other hand much the larger part of these is for work within our own borders. It should be relatively easy therefore to promote an understanding of the value of our missionary activities. Of our 220 churches and chapels approximately 160 are either in the open country or in towns of not over 1,000 population serving largely country people. By far the larger proportion of these are necessarily dependent upon the Diocesan Missionary Society for at least part of their support. The value of these rural churches to the Diocese is shown by the fact that they furnished nearly one-half of the candidates for confirmation last year. If they do not seem to show much growth from year to year, it is because of the constant removal of their younger members to city parishes. They are however in this way a vital factor in the development of the Diocese as a whole. Even more important than this is the contribution which the country churches makes to the spiritual, social and physical well-being of the communities in which they are situated. For some of these communities, notably those in mountain districts, our Episcopal missionary work was the first and for a long time the only means of contact with the physical, educational and spiritual standards of modern Christian civilization. Through the devoted efforts of Archdeacons Neve and Mason, Dr. Mayo and their fellow-workers, a change, worthy to be called being born again, has been brought about in many of these mountain communities. A recent survey has shown that in most of our counties there are neglected spots where similar work needs to be done. Moreover, there is a challenging opportunity for missionary service among the large colored population of our diocese. "The Kingdom of Heaven," said Christ, "is like unto leaven which a woman took, and hid in three measures of meal, till the whole was leavened." Is the Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Virginia exerting a leavening influence among the people within its borders? Its right to continued existence in God's world will be determined by the answer which we give to that question.

Nor can our missionary responsibility be limited to those within our own borders. The same needs which we see here at home are even more acute in the foreign fields. Christ is performing in them the same miracles of regeneration as those which our cooperation makes possible in the Virginia mountains. Shall we refuse to extend that cooperation to Him in the lands that lie beyond the seas? These

peoples are rapidly learning from us the methods by which human self-ishness can attain its ends. If that is the only lesson that we are teaching them what kind of a world will we bequeath to our descendants? The Christian Church today is being weighed in the balance. Its leavening quality is being tested. If in this respect it is found wanting, nothing else that we do will save it from extinction. Already in our own age one great church has seen the handwriting on the wall. Christ Himself sounded the warning. Ye are the salt of the earth. If the salt has lost its savor, it is thenceforth good for nothing, but to be cast out, and to be trodden under foot of men.

It is not my purpose to be pessimistic nor bring railing accusations against our Church of disloyalty to the mission entrusted to it by Christ. On the contrary there has never been a time since the Apostolic age when Christian people responded more generally to the call of service than they do today. God, however, has responded to our readiness to serve by widening our missionary horizons. Our danger is that we may fail to recognize our enlarged opportunities for service and continue interpreting our responsibilities in terms of vesterday. Each age must discover for itself what are the implications of that command: "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." The great enemy of our soul's welfare is selfishness. The worst form of selfishness is that which limits its spiritual concern to the saving of one's own soul. "He who saveth his life shall lose it," applies to our religion. Christ recognized the danger. He imposed upon His Church missionary responsibilities not simply as a duty, albeit an unpleasant one, to be performed, but as a means of escape from that subtlest and most constant of all temptations, limiting our spiritual concern to our own salvation, or to that of our own parish, our own race. If a recently published statement that the Episcopal Church is first in contributions for parochial purposes and next to last in its missionary giving is true. then we ought seriously to ask ourselves whether we are not in danger of succumbing to the temptation of spiritual selfishness, and whether we should not give more heed to Christ's way of escape from it. namely. missionary service. I ask you to bear this in mind when this afternoon you enter upon the consideration of our Diocesan Budget. It represents human needs, and that means missionary opportunity. We have reduced it to an amount that we believe to be well within the capacity of our people. Let us not be content simply with approving the budget as presented, but let us go back to our parishes with the firm conviction that it ought to be and can be fully met. If the members of the Council will make themselves responsible for communicating this conviction to their respective parishes, I am sure that there will be no more deficits, and no need for further emergency appeals. The formula for success in Christian work is. This is God's will. It ought

to be done. By God's help it can be done. Remember, however, that there is no magic in a formula. To be effective, it must be followed.

The Bishop then presented his Report of Official Acts. (See Appendix A, 1.)

IN MEMORIAM.

J. CHURCHILL COOKE.

A Lay Delegate to this Council for Sixty-seven Consecutive Years. Born February 22, 1839; Died February 7, 1936.

The death of this gallant gentleman and faithful churchman has removed one of the picturesque figures of our Country and Church.

A pathetic feature of the end of this good man is the fact that the burning of "Airwell", the home of his daughter in St. Martin's Parish, Hanover, with the tragedy of two deaths therefrom, may have shortened the days of his life just before his ninety-seventh birthday.

Son of the Reverend John Cooke, rector of St. Martin's Parish, and of his wife, Elizabeth Edmonia Churchill Berkeley, whose home, "Dewberry", was one of culture and refinement for many years. Young Cooke was educated at the Episcopal High School, the Hanover Academy, and at the University of Virginia. From the latter place he became a soldier of the Confederacy, and was a member of the Hanover troop that went out under command of Captain, afterwards General, William C. Wickham.

His record as a soldier under Fitz Lee, Stuart and Hampton was a notable one. He was dreadfully wounded at Trevillian's Station. At the close of the war he married Miss Mary Belle Blackford, of Lynchburg, sister of Messrs. L. M. Blackford and Charles M. Blackford, well known to all Virginians.

At the close of the war Mr. Cooke and his wife moved to King William County, where he spent the years of his useful life, until in his old age he removed to the home of his daughter. He was for many years a Vestryman and Senior Warden of St. David's Parish and represented that Parish in the annual Diocesan Council sixty-seven years. He represented St. Martin's Parish one year.

This Council desires to put upon record its deep appreciation of his long years of service and our sense of loss in his removal from among us.

Mr. W. Frank Powers presented the following amendment:

The sense of this meeting is that the entertainment of delegates be not considered compulsory. It was moved that the Chair be requested to appoint a Committee of five to consider the above resolution and amendment and all other matters bearing on the entertainment of the Council and make report to the next Council. This motion was carried and the Chair appointed Messrs. W. K. Goolrick, Geo. L. Browning, W. Frank Powers, A. S. Smoot and E. Marshall Newton as the members of that committee.

Rev. R. Cary Montague presented his report as City Missionary of Richmond. (See Parochial Reports in Appendix D.)

Bishop Goodwin presented the report of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. (See Appendix A, III, (a).)

Rev. D. C. Loving presented a memorial from the Rappahannock Valley Convocation.

Dr. Tucker, Chairman, presented the report of the Board of Apportionment. (See Appendix A, III, (b).)

After general discussion the budget as proposed by the Board of Apportionment was adopted.

The Memorial from the Rappahannock Convocation was on motion referred to the Committee on Canons. (For their report see pages 52 and 60.)

Rev. F. L. Robinson presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to revise the finances of the Diocese along the lines of economy and the permission to allow givers to support only such work as they choose or are willing to support.

This resolution was adopted and the Chair appointed Rev. F. L. Robinson, Rev. Paul D. Bowden, Mr. Bernard P. Chamberlain, Mr. Edward C. Anderson and Mr. Frank Davis as members of the committee therein created.

On motion of Mr. Nelson the thanks of the Council were extended to the Committee on Securing a Preacher for the Council for having secured Bishop Hobson to preach at this Council.

Rev. W. B. Lee Milton presented a resolution bearing upon applications by Vestries to the Diocesan Missionary Society for aid. Owing to the lateness of the hour, its consideration was postponed until tomorrow. (See page 61.)

Rev. Dr. Zabriskie presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That a committee of laymen be appointed by the Bishop to appraise each piece of work to which Diocesan funds are contributed, and to report their estimate thereof to the next Council before the budget is adopted.

This resolution was adopted. The Chair appointed the following gentlemen as members of the committee therein created:

Mr. John B. Mordecai, Mr. Douglas Forsyth, Mr. James M. Lewis, Mr. Richard Baylor, Mr. Frank P. Preston, Mr. Maxwell Wallace.

Mr. Sydney Coates presented the following resolution:

Whereas, our beloved Bishop, in his Council address this morning stated that "The hour of opportunity for the Church's advance has struck; and

Whereas, There was in this Diocese a few years ago an organization known as the Laymen's Brotherhood of the Diocese of Virginia in the Counties of Albemarle, Greene and Orange; and

Whereas, under the able leadership of Hon. George L. Browning, the Layman's Brotherhood did effective work in the Diocese; therefore be it

Resolved, That this 141st Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia does approve of and will encourage the organization and development of similar Laymen's Brotherhoods throughout the Diocese.

This resolution was adopted.

The hour of 4:30 having come the Council adjourned.

The Council convened at "Roslyn" the Virginia Diocesan Center, Bishop Tucker presiding. After the opening prayer by Bishop Goodwin the minutes of yesterday's meetings were read and approved.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

To the 141st Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

One of the difficulties confronting this Committee in preparing its report is the fact that the material forming its basis is not gotten together until the time of the meeting of the Council. It is only after the Bishop has made his address to the Council, and the various Boards have made their reports that we have necessary material with which to work. Perhaps in the future some arrangement can be made so your Committee may have at least part of this material beforehand.

We have heard from the Bishop in his address, and from the other reports the very serious situation confronting the Diocese. Financially we have barely enough support to carry on existing work. At the same time there is brought to our attention very real opportunities for work in new fields within the Diocese. This is work that ought to be done, the starting of which we can ill afford to postpone year after year. Yet under present conditions it would seem financially impossible to take on any new work.

The budget presented to this Council shows a drastic reduction in appropriations. While it is probably necessary under present conditions to make this reduction, we should be very careful to avoid the temptation of accepting it as all the Diocese can do. It should be the earnest desire of every member of this Council to work for the day when we can again enlarge our activities.

In the meantime there are, we believe, a few ways in which we might receive some aid in solving our difficulties. We would remind you of the suggestion made by this committee last year that the wider use of the Bishop's Pence Cans offers to our people an opportunity for prayerful participation in the Church's work and that their use should be furthered as much as possible.

There are ways in which we might release funds from present work to new work. There is a very real opportunity in the effort to wipe out the debt on the church property at the University. There are those who are particularly interested in this work. In securing their contributions for this object we can place the work among the students

on a surer basis, and can release present funds for missionary work so sorely needed. Every one connected with the Church ought, therefore, to see in this effort a very real opportunity for service to the Church. We urge them to get behind the campaign.

While many of the country parishes need financial assistance, and while this work must be maintained, we are not to think of the present situation as a permanent condition. There is no reason to feel that all the parishes now receiving aid will always need assistance, nor that this assistance must always be in the same amount. We would urge that the Diocesan Missionary Society have a standing committee actively in touch with assisted parishes to keep constantly before them the challenge to greater self-support on their part that funds now contributed to them might be directed to new work.

We would suggest that the Department of Publicity utilize the Virginia Churchman as a very useful means of giving information to the people of the Diocese, and that this department undertake to increase the circulation of the paper.

We regard the Forward Movement as one of the greatest opportunities for the spiritual awakening and enrichment of our people, and urge the rectors and vestries to encourage greater participation on the part of their congregations. Do not let this end simply with the distribution of pamphlets, but rather work constantly for their use in family prayers and prayer groups, seeking a wider observance of the prayer life. If there is to be a real forward movement it must be through prayer and not simply on paper.

The words of our blessed Lord "The harvest truly is great but the laborers few" have been quoted at this Council. They are as true today as they were when He uttered them. The great difficulty is that too many of us want to be the harvest and too few desire to be the laborers.

Times are difficult, but with faith in God, prayer for His guidance and the dedication of our lives to labor for Him we can gain the victory. With men it may seem impossible but with God all things are possible.

The Committee has given its consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of New Jersey on account of the extent of Diocesan Work.

The Committee has given its consent to the election and consecration of the Very Reverend Benjamin Dunlap Dagwell to be Bishop of the Diocese of Oregon.

The Committee has given its consent to the election and consecration of the Reverend Charles Clingman, D. D., to be Bishop of Kentucky.

The Committee has given its consent to the election and consecration of the Reverend Leopold Kroll to be Missionary Bishop of the District of Liberia.

The Committee has given its consent to the election of Right Reverend Charles Shriver Reifsneider, D. D., Suffragan Bishop of the Missionary District of North Tokyo to be Bishop of the Missionary District of North Tokyo.

The Committee has given its consent to the election and consecration of the Reverend Theodore Russell Ludlow, D. D., to be Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Newark.

The Committee has given its consent to the election and consecration of the Reverend Lewis Bliss Whittemore to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Western Michigan.

The Committee has given its consent to the election and consecration of the Reverend Bartelle H. Reinheimer, D. D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Rochester.

Consent was given to the placing of a mortgage loan of \$19,000.00

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

To the 141st Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia: Gentlemen:

The Committee on Finance reports that all accounts of the various funds under the charge of the Treasurer of the Diocese from Janu-

ary 12, 1935, to January 10, 1936, have been audited by Messrs. A. M. Pullen and Company, Certified Public Accountants, and have been found to be correct.

The receipts of the Bishops and Contingent Fund for the year 1935 from assessments made upon the parishes of the Diocese amounted to \$16,075.67, of which \$1,320.42 were assessments due and unpaid in 1934.

The Contingent Fund is facing a serious situation. The assessments made against the parishes total \$18,581.00. At the beginning of the year 1934 parishes had failed to pay their assessments for the year 1933 by \$2,978.63, of which amount \$1,320.42 was received in the year 1935 as back payments, leaving the net failure of parishes to pay the 1934 assessments in the sum of \$1,658.21.

We face the same situation at the beginning of the year 1936. Parishes failed to pay the assessments of 1935 by \$2,988.90. Since the close of 1935 the Treasurer has received \$836.85 as belated payments on assessments due in that year. Other payments will be made but the final failure of parishes to pay the 1935 assessments will, unless more earnest efforts are used, amount to about the same as the failure to pay assessments for the year 1934, or about \$1,600.00.

For the two years the parishes have failed to pay their assessments by a total of over \$3,000.00.

As the result of this situation an increasing deficit has been accumulating in the Contingent Fund. This deficit at the close of the year 1935 amounted to an overdraft of \$3,037.30 which was covered by a note of the Diocese of Virginia in the First and Merchants National Bank. As \$836.85 of last year's assessments have been received and applied upon the note our overdraft for 1935 at present stands at \$2,200.45. Unless the parishes will pay their arrearages for last year the Finance Committee can see no other way of securing funds to pay this note except to increase the assessment.

The Board of Apportionment of the Diocesan Missionary Society in preparing a tentative budget of the Diocese for the year 1937 has recommended that the amount heretofore paid from the Contingent Fund for the expenses of the Diocesan Offices, including the salary of the Diocesan Treasurer, be transferred from the Contingent Fund to the Diocesan budget, so that all of the expenses of the Diocesan Offices may be included as was formerly the case in the budget of the Diocese and not in the Contingent Fund. We concur in the recommendation of the Board of Apportionment in regard to this matter.

To offset this reduction of \$4,000.00 in the expenditures of the Bishops and Contingent Fund we must report that the General Convention has directed an annual assessment upon every Diocese of not more than \$4.00 for each minister canonically connected with the Diocese in order to secure funds to pay the salary of the Presiding



Bishop. In addition to this assessment there is a triennial assessment of \$5.00 for each minister which is due in the years in which the General Convention meets. As the General Convention will meet in 1937, we have therefore to put in an item for the General Convention including the annual assessment of not more than \$4.00 and the Triennial assessment of \$5.00 and also the expenses of the Delegates to the General Convention. This will make a total under that item of \$2,071.00. We recommend that the same plan be adopted for the 1937 General Convention as for 1934, that an appropriation of \$100.00 be made to each Delegate to apply upon his expenses.

We therefore recommend the following budget of the Bishops and Contingent Fund for the year 1937:

We recommend the same schedule of assessments for the Bishops and Contingent Fund upon the parishes for the year 1937 that is now in force for the year 1936. The total of these assessments is \$18,581.00. It will be noted that our indebtedness to the Bank of \$2,200.00 as reported above is not included in this budget. Our hope in the situation is that our parishes will see more clearly the importance of paying their assessments and arrearages in full. If all of the arrearages for the last year should be paid and our parishes should pay their assessments in full for this year we shall be able to wipe out the indebtedness.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

Your Committee on Canons to which was referred the report of the Commission on Revision and Simplification of the Canons and the Code of Revised Canons returned therewith, and also the proposed amendments to several of said revised Canons as reported by said Commission, beg leave to report as follows:

- 1. They recommend that each of the proposed Canons be considered and acted upon in numerical order.
- 2. They ask that the amendments recommended by the Committee be first acted on, and afterwards those proposed by individuals which have not been accepted by the Committee.
 - 3. The amendments recommended by the Committee are as follows:
 - (1) In Canon I, Section 4, line 3, insert after word "President" the words "of the Council".
 - (2) In Canon II, Section 1, line 7, insert after words "Separate Congregations" the words "or Mission Churches" and in line 8 after word "Council" put a period, and strike out the remainder of the sentence.
 - (3) In Canon III, Section 2, line 4, strike out the words "Appointment and will perform its duties", and insert "election".
 - (4) In Canon V, Section 1, line 2, strike out word "and" and insert after words "Mission Church" the words "and Missions" with the same change in other paragraphs and sections.
 - (5) In Canon IX, Section 2 (a), line 4, after words "if there be one" the words "and the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon of the Colored Work, if appointed".
 - (6) In Canon IX, Section 2 (c), line 3, change "1936" to "1937", and in line 6 change "1937" to "1938".
 - (7) In Canon IX, Section 5, line 5, after word "members" insert the words 'elected annually as soon as may be after the organization of the Committee".
 - (8) In Canon IX, Section 5, after VI insert an additional paragraph as follows, 'Members of each Board, whether primary or additional, shall continue in office until the next election of primary members by the Executive Committee".
 - (9) In Canon XII, Section 2, last line, after the word "or" strike out the word "in" and insert the words "becomes a member of".
 - (10) In Canon XVI, Section 1, paragraph 4, line 4, strike out the sentence beginning "They shall have" and ending "fifty Communicants".



- (11) In Canon XVIII, Section 4, next to last line, strike out words "amount to" and insert the word "number".
- (12) In Canon XXI, Section 1, line 5, after the word "wardens" insert a comma, and the words "or one of them".
- (13) In Canon XXI, Section 3, line 4, strike out the word "regular".
- (14) In Canon XXI, after Section 3, insert an additional Section to read as follows:
- "Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Rector or Minister of every Parish or Congregation, learning of the removal of any member of his Parish or Congregation to another Cure without having secured a letter of transfer as herein provided, to transmit to the Minister of such Cure a letter of advice informing him thereof."
- (15) Canon XXVI should be stricken out as not a proper subject for Canon but rather for resolution adopting the Canons.
- 4. The amendments proposed by individuals and not accepted by the Committee are as follows:
 - (1) Canon II, Section 1 and Canon XVI, paragraph 4, by Mr. Rotter, altered and accepted by the Committee.
 - (2) Canon V, Section 1, by Mr. Powers. The Committee recommends that it be not adopted because in conflict with Canons 50 and 51 of the General Church.
 - (3) Canon V, Section 2, by Mr. Robinson. The Committee recommends that it be not adopted, because it would destroy the intended purpose of the "Contingent Fund".
 - (4) Canon XVIII, Section 3, by Dr. Tucker. The Committee did not accept, but recommend that the Council act thereon.
 - (5) Canon XVIII, Section 4, by Dr. Churchill Gibson. The Committee recommends that it be not adopted.
 - (6) Canon XVIII, Section 4, by Mr. Powers. Not accepted by the Committee, but recommend that the Council act thereon.
- 5. The amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution proposed by Mr. Robinson, providing for adding four Clergymen to the Committee on Finance, your Committee recommends should not be adopted.
- 6. In the opinion of your Committee the resolution from the Rappahannock Valley Convocation referred to it is not a proper subject for treatment by Canon, but is within the province of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON REVISION AND SIMPLIFICA-TION OF THE CANONS.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia: Gentlemen:

Your Commission on Revision and Simplification of the Canons, consisting of the Rev. G. M. Brydon, the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, the Rev. H. S. Osburn, and Messrs. Henry R. Miller, Jr., John B. Minor, W. R. Shands, and E. Randolph Williams, begs leave to submit the following report:

In order to secure the most careful study of the existing Canons and the desirable additions, omissions, and alterations, different Canons were assigned to sub-committees of one or more members. The result of their study as completed was furnished to each member of the Commission, and the Commission as a whole, in three or more meetings, went over carefully and critically all of the proposed drafts.

Copies of the Canons as finally agreed upon by the Commission have, in advance of this meeting, been sent to every Clerical and Lay Delegate to enable them to study the same and be prepared to suggest any amendments that may be deemed desirable.

For the convenience of the Delegates it seems advisable to give a brief synopsis of the Canons as revised and simplified by the Commission.

Existing Canons III, IV, and V, dealing respectively with the Standing Committee, the Registrar of the Diocese, and the Chancellor of the Diocese, have been omitted, because they are now covered by the new Constitution.

Existing Canons XXIII and XXIV, dealing respectively with the celebration of the Lord's Day, and with Family Worship, have been omitted, as not suitable subjects for regulation by Diocesan Canon.

Existing Canon XXIX, repealing all former Canons, etc., has been omitted because better covered by resolution of the Council.

Two additional Canons, numbered respectively VI and VIII in the proposed revision have been added. Canon VI prescribes the duties of the Committee on Finance, and Canon VIII prescribes the duties of the Trustees of the Funds in regard to the Church Pension Fund. The substance of both of these new Canons is contained in other existing Canons, but it was thought best to give them the emphasis of separate Canons.

Existing Canon I-same number in the Revision-dealing with the

List of the Clergy of the Diocese—has been altered only in arrangement and phraseology.

Existing Canon II—same number in the Revision—dealing with Lay Representation in the Council—has been rearranged and phrase-ology altered, but no material changes made, except,—

- (1) In Section 1 there is omitted the provision that "Churches not constituted or received as Separate Congregations, but which, being distinct cures, have been recognized by long and unbroken usage as Separate Congregations" shall be entitled to representation.
- (2) There is added to this section that part of the provision, contained in existing Canon XVII on Mission Churches, giving Lay representation in the Council to Mission Churches which have in the preceding year reported at least fifty communicants. That part of said provision requiring in addition, that the Church should have reported the disbursement of at least \$500.00, has been omitted, as unwise.
- (3) Provision is also made in this Section for Lay Representation of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge and of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction—not provided in the existing Canon.

Existing Canon VI—number III in the Revision—dealing with Deputies to the General Convention—has been altered in only two respects, viz:

- (1) To provide that the Clerical Delegates shall be canonically resident in (not merely "connected with") the Diocese, and
- (2) That the Lay Delegates shall be communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church (not merely Communicants) in the Diocese.

Existing Canon VII—number IV in the Revision—dealing with the Committee on Church Property—has been simplified by omission of Sections 1 and 3 (now covered by the Constitution), and by slight change in phraseology.

Existing Canon VIII—number V in the Revision—dealing with the Bishop's and Contingent Fund—has been altered in the following particulars, viz:

- (1) Section 2, creating a Committee on Finance and prescribing some of its duties, has been eliminated and incorporated in a separate Canon, No. VI, on Committee on Finance.
- (2) There has been inserted a new Section 2, creating the Fund, providing how it shall be raised, and how applied.
 - (3) Section 3 has been redrafted, but without material change.
 - (4) Sections 4 and 5 only altered to conform.

Existing Canon IX—number VII in the revision—dealing with the Church Pension Fund—has been completely redrafted.

Section 1 confirms the adoption by the Diocese of the Church

Pension Fund and recognizes its obligations under the Contract of November 27, 1918, between the Trustees of the Funds and the Church Pension Fund.

Section 2 omits the provision for the Committee because this is now covered by the Constitution; prescribes the duties of the Committee, and omits the duties imposed upon the Trustees of the Funds in connection with the Pension Fund by the said Contract of November 27, 1918,—which are incorporated in a separate new Canon No. VIII.

Existing Canon X—number IX in the Revision—dealing with the Diocesan Missionary Society—has also been redrafted.

As a Canon it should not be designated as the "Constitution of the D. M. S.", for its existence is recognized, and its government by an Executive Committee under Canon authorized, by the new Constitution of the Diocese.

The Canon as revised is therefore confined to the composition of the Executive Committee and prescribing its powers and duties, which in no material respect differ from those in the existing Canon, except—

- (1) That the Board of Apportionment is eliminated and its functions transferred to the Executive Committee as a whole.
 - (2) That the Board of Evangelism is eliminated, and
 - (3) That a Board of Colored Work is provided for.

Existing Canon XI—number X in the Revision—dealing with the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge—has been rearranged, but without any substantial alteration.

Existing Canon XII—number XI in the Revision—dealing with the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction—has been redrafted to conform substantially with the Canon on the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, with no material change from the existing Canon except that Section 7 is omitted as unnecessary.

Existing Canon XIII—number XII in the Revision—dealing with Convocations—has been altered in the following particulars, viz:

- (1) St. Martin's Parish in Hanover County has been taken out of the Albemarle Convocation and placed, with the other Parishes in Hanover County, in the Rappahannock Convocation.
- (2) The Richmond Convocation is described as including, in addition to the Parishes in Henrico County, all in the City of Richmond north of James River.
- (3) A new Convocation, without geographical lines, is added to be known as the Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction.

Existing Canon XIV—number XIII in the Revision—dealing with Division of Parishes—has not been altered except in phraseology.

Existing Canon XV-number XIV in the Revision-dealing with



Establishing and Altering Parish Boundaries—has also not been altered except in phraseology.

Existing Canon XVI—number XV in the Revision—dealing with Formation of Separate Congregations in a Parish—has been altered in the following particulars, viz:

- (1) In Section 2, instead of requiring the consent of all Vestries in the parish, where more than one, in order to establish a Separate Congregation or to build a Church in a new location, as provided in the existing Canon, the corresponding section in the revised Canon requires only the consent of the Parish Council.
- (2) There is added an additional Section outlining the authority and duty of the Rector and Vestry, of the Parish where there is only one, and of each Rector and Vestry where more than one, in the promotion of the Church in the Parish as a whole.

Existing Canon XVII—number XVI in the Revision—dealing with Mission Churches—has been altered in the following particulars, viz:

- (1) Section 1 has been altered to require the consent of the Parish Council for the establishment of a Mission Church in a Parish that has more than one Vestry, instead of the consent of a majority of the Vestries, if there be more than two.
- (2) Omits the requirement that the Church shall have reported the disbursement of at least \$500 for the preceding year in order to be entitled to lay representation in the Council.

Existing Canon XVIII—number XVII in the Revision—dealing with Parish Councils—is not altered except in phraseology.

Existing Canon XIX—number XVIII in the Revision—dealing with Election of Vestries, &c.,—rearranged, but with no material changes.

Existing Canon XX—number XIX in the Revision—dealing with Duties of Vestries and other Parish Officers—rearranged, but with no material alteration, except that in Section 1 there is omitted the provision that the Vestry as a body shall meet all candidates for confirmation.

Existing Canon XXI—number XX in the Revision—dealing with Parish Registers, &c.,—some changes in phraseology only.

Existing Canon XXII—number XXI in the Revision—dealing with Transfer of Communicants. The existing Canon provides for receiving, but not for giving, a transfer. There has therefore been added a section providing for the giving to an outgoing communicant a transfer to another congregation within or without the Diocese. No other alteration.

Existing Canon XXV—number XXII in the Revision—dealing with Exclusion from Communion—has not been altered.

Existing Canon XXVI—number XXIII in the Revision—dealing with Appeal from Exclusion from Communion—not altered except in phraseology and punctuation.

Existing Canon XXVII—number XXIV in the Revision—dealing with the Trial of a Presbyter or Deacon—as adopted at the 1925 meeting of the Council, has not been altered in any respect.

Existing Canon XXVIII—number XXV in the Revision—dealing with amendment of Canons—not altered except in phraseology.

Your commission herewith presents to the Council the Code of Canons for the Diocese, as revised by it, and recommends its adoption.

Your commission further recommends:

- 1. That the consideration of this report and accompanying Canons be fixed as soon as practicable as a special and continuing order:
 - 2. That each Canon be acted upon separately; and
- 3. That when the Council shall have acted upon them all, the following resolution shall be adopted, viz:

"Resolved, That the Code of Revised Canons of the Diocese as presented by the Commission on Revision and Simplification of the Canons, as amended by this Council, be adopted as a whole, and that all Canons, or parts of Canons in conflict therewith be and are hereby repealed."

The canons were then acted upon seriatim, the various amendments proposed yesterday by members of this Council being voted on when the proper canon was under consideration.

Canon I was adopted. Canon II was taken under consideration. The amendment proposed by Mr. Everett was incorporated in another form into the amendments recommended by the committee. Mr. Sands offered an amendment which was put to the vote and lost. Canon II was then adopted. Canon III was adopted. Canon IV was adopted. Canon V was taken under consideration. The amendment proposed by Mr. Powers removing from the parishes the requirement that our fiscal year should begin on January 1st was rejected. The amendment proposed by Mr. Robinson to confine the Bishop's and Contingent Fund to the salaries of the Bishops was rejected. Canon V was then adopted. Each of the canons from VI to XV as amended by the committee were adopted.

Canon XVI. Mr. Bowden moved as an amendment to in-



sert the words "and of the Council of the Diocese" after the words "Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese" in the third paragraph of section 1. This amendment was accepted by the committee. Canon XVI was then adopted as amended. Canon XVII was adopted as amended. Canon XVIII. The committee reported without recommendation the amendment proposed by Rev. Dr. Tucker to section 3 to strike out the word "male" in line 1 and "of the Protestant Episcopal Church" in line 2.

The matter was divided and the Council took under consideration first the elimination of the word "male". This amendment was lost by a vote of 33 ayes to 90 noes.

The second amendment to strike out the words "of the Protestant Episcopal Church" was put to the vote and lost.

By invitation of the Council Mr. Herbert Claiborne, the architect who has been employed by the Memorial Trustees to prepare a layout for a possible future development of a Church Center, presented his report showing a sketch and pictures of a proposed layout including a memorial chapel.

The hour of 1:00 having arrived the Council adjourned for lunch.

VIRGINIA DIOCESAN CENTER.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, 2:15 o'clock.

The Council convened, Bishop Tucker presiding. Consideration of the report of the Committee on Canons was resumed, the eighteenth canon being still under discussion. Dr. Churchill Gibson moved to amend by striking out the words "eighteen years of age" in the first line of section 4. Mr. Welsh moved as a substitute to change the word "eighteen" to "sixteen". The substitute being put to the vote was lost. Dr. Gibson's amendment was lost.

Mr. Frank Powers moved to strike out the last three lines of section 4, being the sentence beginning "but no election shall be valid". Mr. Welsh moved as a substitute that this sentence be retained and the words "qualified to vote" inserted after the

words "number of communicants" in the last line. This substitute was accepted by the committee on Canons and was carried by the Council. Canon XVIII as amended was then adopted.

Canon XIX was adopted. Canon XX was adopted. Canon XXI. Dr. Robert F. Gibson moved that section 1 of Canon XLII of the Canons of the General Church be adopted as a substitute for Canon XXI of the Committee's Report. Dr. Gibson's motion was lost. Canon XXI was then adopted. Canon XXII was adopted. Canon XXIII was adopted. Canon XXIV. The canon adopted at the Council of last year, "Of the Presentment and Trial of a Presbyter or Deacon", was readopted as canon XXIV of the Committee's Report. Canon XXV was adopted. Every one of the preceding motions whereby a canon was adopted was carried by a canonical majority.

Mr. Minor then presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Code of revised canons of the Diocese as presented by the Commission on the Revision and Simplification of the Canons and as amended by this Council be adopted as a whole, and that all canons or parts of canons in conflict therewith be and they are hereby repealed.

This resolution was adopted by a canonical majority.

The Report of the Commission on Revision and Simplification of the Canons as amended by the Council, carrying the Canons now in force in the Diocese of Virginia, and also the Constitution of the Diocese as finally adopted at this Council, are printed as Appendix E of this Journal.

The Committee on Canons reported the amendment to the Constitution moved by the Rev. F. L. Robinson that the words "and four clergymen" be inserted after the words "three lay communicants" in article XVI. The Committee recommended that this amendment be not adopted. The recommendation of the committee being put to the vote was approved by the Council.

The Memorial from the Rappahannock Valley Convocation referred by the Council to the Committee on Canons was re-

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MEMORIAL FROM THE RAPPAHANNOCK VALLEY CONVOCATION, ADOPTED AT ITS SPRING MEETING, MAY 7TH, 1936.

To the 141st Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia:

Whereas, the activities connected with raising sufficient funds in this Diocese have been continued over a large portion of the year due to the necessity of emergency appeals; and,

Whereas, such emergency appeals are damaging to the purpose and philosophy of the Every Member Canvass;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by this Convocation that the following suggestions be communicated to the next Council of the Diocese:

- 1. That the annual Every Member Canvass be held on a date sufficiently early for the returns and acceptances of quotas from the missions and parishes to be sent into Diocesan Headquarters by December 8th.
- 2. That if a serious deficit is at that time apparent and an emergency appeal be foreseen as a necessity, that such a challenge be presented at once to the ministers and vestries throughout the Diocese, requesting them to assume at once such additional responsibility as may be necessary, leaving the method of meeting it in the hands of such ministers and vestries.

Be it further revolved that:

We of the Rappahannock Valley Convocation do pledge ourselves to carry out the suggestions in the foregoing resolution and to cooperate with the Diocese in every way possible.

The Secretary stated that there is a vacancy in the number of members of the Board of Trustees of Stuart Hall elected by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia owning to the expiration of the term for which Mr. David N. Rust was elected.

It was moved and carried that Mr. Rust be re-elected to serve another term as a member of that Board.

THURSDAY, MAY 14, 1936

The following resolution of Rev. W. B. Lee Milton presented yesterday and referred for further consideration today was then taken under consideration.

Whereas, the Missionary Work of the Diocese of Virginia is dependent upon the resources of the Diocesan Missionary Society; and, Whereas, for the past few years these resources have been limited:

Whereas, every extra dollar that is assumed by aided parishes releases money to spend in Advance Work: therefore be it.

Resolved, That each parish and mission in the Diocese that is receiving aid from the Diocesan Missionary Society be requested to make its annual Every Member Canvass on the basis of its total expense, considering for the time of the Canvass that the Diocesan Missionary Society does not exist. And after making a canvass of every communicant in the parish or mission that each one have an opportunity to give to God through His Church, if it appears that there is a deficit in relation to the total budget, the Vestry then apply to the Diocesan Missionary Society for a sum which is the difference between the said budget and the amount pledged.

After discussion this resolution was adopted.

Rev. Dr. Rollins, Chairman of the Committee appointed at the last Council to consider amendments to the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America which were reported to this Diocese by the Secretary of the General Convention, requested that the committee be permitted to present its report to the Council of 1937 instead of to this Council. This permission was granted.

Mr. Allison presented the following resolution:

Resolved. That the Council express by a rising vote their thanks to Mr. John B. Minor and the other members of the Committee on Revision and Simplification of the Canons for the excellent way in which they have completed a most difficult task.

This resolution was adopted unanimously by a rising vote. Mr. Bowden presented the following resolution:

"Resolved, That this Council do hereby express to the rector, vestry, choir and congregation of St. Paul's Church and to the Memorial Trustees of the Virginia Diocesan Center our hearty appreciation for the generous hospitality extended by them to members of this Council."

This resolution was unanimously adopted.

Mr. John M. Taylor presented the report of St. Catherine's School.



III. THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

(a) REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

To the One Hundred and Forty-first Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society begs to report that during the year 1935 its receipts were \$64.261.27, including \$11,026.27 received from the Challenge Campaign, and its disbursements \$64.195.44.

Of this amount:

\$54,695.74 was for salaries of missionaries.

\$6,000.00 for the Blue Ridge Industrial School; and

\$1,500.00 for St. Paul's, at the University.

Translating this from terms of money into work accomplished. we find our army of workers to consist of 44 clergymen. 15 in the cities and towns, and 29 in rural places; 25 as the staff at the Blue Ridge Industrial School: 30 lay workers, 2 men and 28 women, in the mountains, and 7 colored women workers in our schools, a total of 105 whose salaries are paid in whole or in part by the Diocesan Missionary Society. What their service means both to those to whom they minister and to the Church which helps make this service possible is beyond any human estimate.

But what we are now doing is not our only reason for encouragement. There are new opportunities opening before us that will mean new achievement and greater strength for the Diocese. Here are suggested some of these opportunities where the need seems greatest.

- (a) A clergyman to be placed in charge of the Seminary Missions. The Seminary Faculty desire it. The students have formally petitioned for it. The Piedmont Convocation has urged it. This section of our Diocese is growing in population with great rapidity and many of these missions occupy strategic locations. Already there are over 200 communicants in these missions. 23 were confirmed last year and 15 already this year, and yet there is no clergymen directly responsible for this group of communicants. That happy and helpful relation with the Seminary Faculty and student-body which has proven of so great value to the Diocese for many years will, of course, be continued. But the time has come when in justice to the Seminary and to this field alike, a resident minister should assume responsibility for the development of this field.
- (b) Another field for missionary work is presented by that section of our Diocese lying roughly between the R. F. & P. and Southern Railways, a section sometimes called "the great Episcopal Desert". To determine more exactly the conditions, the Executive Committee had this past year a study made by the Rev. Frederick Griffith. The re-

sults of this study and survey were reported last Fall to a group of our clergymen in whose parish limits this region is situated. In certain localities, notably in Stafford and Spotsylvania Counties, were found conditions not unlike those that existed in certain mountain communities in the early days of our work in the Blue Ridge. One community in Stafford was selected as the place to begin work, and we only wait some financial backing before moving definitely to meet these needs—needs that even if less romantic, are not less challenging than those which called our first missionaires into the mountains.

- (c) With the inheritance of our Parish system from colonial times came also the ideal that the parish constitutes a real cure of souls, and that the parish rector is responsible for the spiritual welfare of all persons in his parish, who are not members of some other religious body. If there are neglected groups or unchurched communities the rector of the parish has his responsibilities to meet the conditions. This principle led to the establishment of some of our mountain missions first as parish projects, notably Rattlesnake Mountain and Ada Missions. At Watson, in Loudoun County, members of the local parish have carried on a work for the past few years. But a resident worker and Diocesan backing are needed if the opportunity is not to be lost. But in Tidewater Virginia the need of the development of these parish missions with Diocesan support is pressing. In North Farnham Parish, Rev. Dewey Loving has developed such a mission at the far upper end of his field, 30 miles from his home. In Gloucester County, Rev. Dr. Osburn has a similar situation just waiting the placing of a woman worker in the community to bring the ministry of the Church to a spiritually neglected neighborhood. Probably every parish in Tidewater Virginia has one or more such opportunities within its borders.
- (d) To these opportunities that we are not yet reaching, there must be added the many, many calls for the extension of our Mountain Work and Colored Work. We have of course work in these fields with which the Diocese is familiar, but new openings are constantly before us—only waiting, waiting until someone is sent. "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few."

A glance over the records of the Diocesan Missionary Society for the past few years reveals some interesting facts. In 1930, the high water mark of the Society's material prosperity, the Secretary reported appropriations of \$78,000 with about 100 missionaries clerical and lay, whose salaries were paid in whole or in part by the Society.

In 1936, we still have the 100 or more missionaries at work and the Diocese appropriates \$45,000 for salaries. How can the work be maintained this year on that basis? Only for two reasons:

First—The loyalty and sacrifice of our missionaries, who with salaries cut far, far too much, have carried on.

Second—Through an appeal to the people of the Diocese to give

at Easter and Whitsunday such offerings as may make it possible to avoid the abandonment of work and the discharge of workers.

In the four years from 1923-1926, inclusive, the income of this society ran behind its expenditures until there was an accumulated deficit of \$20,000. Then a bequest came to the Society, and out of this bequest the deficit was paid. For the next four years, years of comparative prosperity, income was sufficient to meet our obligations. In 1931, however, the deficit again appeared. Lest it should accumulate again, each year's deficit has been paid out of the first receipts of the following year.

This year approximately \$7,500 of 1936 receipts go to pay the 1935 deficit, incurred in large part by parishes not paying their acceptances. Of necessity, therefore, there must go out year by year a second appeal; hence the Whitsunday appeal, or the Challenge Campaign, or the voluntary offering of Vestry and congregation. Now we believe and all agree that the frequency of these appeals renders each successive one less effective and weakens the regular Fall Campaign. It is a dangerous and unhappy situation in which we find ourselves, but we are confident that this Diocese has that measure of ability and degree of loyalty necessary to awaken new enthusiasm and devise sound methods that will meet this situation. The final responsibility rests upon this Council. May we have the faith and wisdom to meet it.

(b) REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPORTIONMENT.

To the One Hundred and Forty-first Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

GENTLEMEN:

The Board of Apportionment of the Diocesan Missionary Society hereby presents for your consideration a tentative budget of the Diocese for the year 1937.

In preparing the budget we have taken into consideration the fact that there is more criticism throughout the Diocese of the Contingent Fund assessment than any other thing. It seems to us that the Contingent Fund should be reduced by removing therefrom the item of \$4,000 for the expenses of the Diocesan offices and putting that into the budget where it originally was placed. It seemed to us also advisable, inasmuch as the Council of the Diocese has fixed the salary of the Treasurer at \$3,250, to make a separate item of that amount rather than lump it along with the other expenses of the Diocesan Offices.

In regard to the Diocesan Missionary Society, we have taken into consideration the fact that all of our missionaries are living under a

(c) REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE FIELD BOARD.

Gentlemen of the Council:

I have been told to make a report to Council of the work of the Field Board of the Diocese. You will observe that I have called it a report of the chairman of the Field Board. There has been no opportunity for the other members to pass on it and I hope they will feel as free to make suggestions or criticisms as other members of the Council.

With the membership scattered over the entire Diocese, it was necessary that most of the details of the Canvass be worked out by a Steering Committee. Two meetings, however, of the entire Board were held and the plans of the Steering Committee submitted and approved.

The plans consisted, as many of you may recall, of:

First, meeting of the Deans of the five Convocations to secure their approval and assistance in beginning last spring the work of training Chairmen for the local churches.

Second, securing at once the election or appointment of as many local chairmen as possible and their attendance at the spring meetings of Convocation.

Third, the preparation of simple but suggestive tracts setting forth the work which we are called to do, the use of what literature could be secured from the National Council, prayer cards, and, in the fall, a series of articles for the newspapers.

Fourth, the organization of teams of two, generally one clergyman and one layman to visit personally one or more churches and give definite assistance in organizing local groups of workers.

There was, of course, considerable follow-up work by the chairman both by letter and personal visits. Following a very well attended group meeting of prospective workers at All Saints Parish House in Richmond, a like meeting was brought about by Rev. Henry Miller at St. Paul's Parish House, Alexandria, for workers in that end of the

The efforts of the Field Board were brought to a climax by a personal letter from Bishop Tucker to every family in the Diocese, setting forth the great importance of the task of the Church in the Diocese and presenting it as a challenge to our loyalty to Christ.

It has been seriously suggested that the Field Board could best serve the Diocese by doing nothing, and simply waiting for requests for help from the rectors and vestries. That would, at least, be an easy way for the Field Board. It is conceivable that it would work. especially in churches where there is already interest, a sense of responsibility, and the necessary information. Your chairman feels, however, that even at the risk of repetition and boresomeness, we cannot trust any plan to work itself, but must see the work of the Field Board as a continuing process, the instrument through which the giving already practiced may be kept intelligent and the means by which others may be reached and become faithful stewards and not just nominal members of the Church.

(d) REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PUBLICITY.

To the One Hundred and Forty-first Council of the Diocese:

Rt. Rev. Fathers in God, Brethren of the Clergy and Laity, your Board of Publicity wishes to report that its members have been active in publicity work for Diocesan affairs as far as the means at the disposal of the Board would permit. In the Every Member Canvass four pamphlets were prepared, and much space in daily papers of the Diocese used. The chief organ of publicity is the Virginia Churchman. This publication has improved greatly and has been running on its own power. A separate report of the Virginia Churchman will be made later. The Board recognizes as a very serious charge its duty to publicize the enterprises of this Diocese and deplores the

lack of funds available. Every department of the Diocese, Religious Education, Missions and what not, and every parish should call upon this committee; since the committee desires to serve all the work of the Episcopal Church in these fields. We should develop a system of greater publicity by the spoken word as well as the written word. Appeal to the eye through posters, pageants, and cinema trailers should be developed. Likewise the radio should be used to carry knowledge of the doings of the Diocese to the people of the Diocese.

In the commercial world the value of publicity is quite obvious. If any concern in trade or commerce desires to develop into something more than a corner grocery type it must resort to a vigorous and intelligent campaign of publicity. In the religious and ecclesiastical field the case cannot be different, for to bid for success the same objective must be sought, viz., cooperation. This cannot be secured unless interest is aroused; and interest cannot be obtained without the spreading of knowledge in an attractive and compelling way.

This work in our judgment is so important that the three Dioceses of the State of Virginia could well profit by combining and securing the services for a period of three years of an expert in publicity. In a material way the employment of such a person would bring in more than three times the amount expended and in a spiritual way the benefits would be inestimable.

(e) REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

To the Diocesan Council:

Your Board begs leave to report a busy year of seven meetings (instead of the usual two hours quarterly) at which plans for the future were worked out and various points of progress and failure were checked. An all-day conference at the Walker house in September gave sufficient time to outline a program which required investigation and study for every member of the Board, as they were divided into committees to give especial attention to the following groups: Pre-School and Primary, Young People and College, Adult, Summer Conferences, Negro Work and Publicity. The adopted program is to last, not for a few months, but to extend over a period of years.

To date this program has been functioning very satisfactorily, though handicapped greatly by a lack of funds, due in the first place to a small appropriation and later to the Diocesan deficit. In order to supplement our working capital an appeal was sent to all of the Sunday Schools of the Diocese requesting contributions, mainly for the

necessary expenses of the Field Secretary. Something over \$100.00 was received from the schools and \$50.00 from the Young People's Service Leagues. This with the reduced Diocesan appropriation will not enable us to continue the services of the Field Secretary unless some other provision be made.

The report of the Field Secretary shows 126 visitations and conferences with schools and groups throughout the Diocese and much personal work in the office, which by the way, has increased fourfold in the last year, consisting of individual advice and coaching. The Secretary has also rendered valuable aid to the Young People's Leagues.

In order to create a deeper consciousness of the need and opportunities of Religious Education and to acquaint the whole Diocese with the objectives of this Board, a mimeographed leaflet of several pages, called "Contact", was prepared and sent to all of the clergy and superintendents. This publication will be continued at certain times and for special objects throughout the year. In addition to "Contact" there will be displays of material and equipment at the five Summer Conferences. This display is on exhibition for the first time in St. Paul's Parish House, giving the members of Council the opportunity to examine it.

This Board strongly urges the adoption of the revised Canon IX, Section 5, which provides for a different allocation of the members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and prevents the members thereof being assigned to more than one board, and makes possible the securing of a larger number of persons throughout the Diocese specially interested in Religious Education.

Present objectives of this Board:

To have at least one teacher from every school attend a Summer Conference (of the 20 Summer Conferences in the Province of Washington, 10 of them will be held in this Diocese).

To have a series of local training institutes in several sections, some one of which will be accessible to every teacher in the Diocese.

To furnish books, materials and advice to all applicants.

To promote life and guide the activities of the Young People's Service League.

To have special and separate conferences for the clergy, adults, teachers, colored teachers and young people—under 12, 12 to 15, above 15.

To cooperate as far as possible with the Virginia Council of Religious Education in promoting instruction in the public schools of the state by competent and trained teachers.

To make every Sunday School in the Diocese an efficient factor in building Christian character.

(f) REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SOCIAL SERVICE.

The Board during the year has held five meetings.

At the January meeting the Executive Secretary presented a digest of social service activities in twenty-nine Dioceses of the Church. This digest had been made up from reports which he had procured from the Rev. C. Rankin Barnes, Executive Secretary for Social Service of the National Council, and he asked that it be considered by the Board and suggestions offered to our Board for making its activities more efficient. At this meeting considerable discussion was devoted to the best and most modern methods of caring for dependent children, and a resolution was adopted requesting all of the clergy of the Diocese to consult with this Board before establishing charitable institutions.

At the meeting held on October 11 Mr. Preston presented a very carefully prepared paper on the subject of child welfare, which brought up so much important matter that Bishop Tucker suggested the holding of an all-day conference on Social Service the last week in November or first week in December.

This conference was held on December 4 under the leadership of the Rev. Robert B. Nelson, numerous visitors, including the Rev. C. Rankin Barnes, Executive Secretary of the Board of Social Service, National Council; Guy Irvine Burch, Executive Secretary for the National Committee on Federal Legislation for Birth Control; Dr. Godfrey Brackett, who was chairman of the Massachusetts Board of Public Welfare for 29 years; Dr. Mary Baughman of the Federation of Women's Clubs; Mrs. Marion Frost of the Family Welfare Service Society of Richmond, and Mrs. Tuffs representing the local committee on moving pictures of the Federation of Churches, Washington. At the conclusion of the Conference, a meeting of the Board of Social Service was called at which the findings adopted by the Conference were considered and passed as follows:

That the Board of Social Service of the Diocese of Virginia promote a conference with similar boards of the Dioceses of Southern Virginia and Southwestern Virginia on matters of social legislation which are to be presented to the coming session of the General Assembly, and that such a conference should consider specifically the following: Probation and parole, old age pensions, Mothers' Aid, public provision for dependent and neglected children away from their own homes, legislation fixing paternity of children born out of wedlock, provision for opportunity for recreation and informal education in connection with the public school system, and the care of feeble-minded children, especially the colored children for whom no provision is now being made.

It is recommended that a special committee be appointed to consider ways and means of bringing the students, especially those of the Episcopal Church, in the William & Mary School of Social Work, into

touch with the Church, that they may both be helped personally to make themselves Christian social workers and also may learn how the Church may help them in their professional career.

That the Chairman, in consultation with the Bishop, appoint a committee to make a survey in the way of an inventory and evaluation of the activities in or related to the field of social work, now being carried on by the Diocese of Virginia; and that this committee may seek the services and advice of especially qualified individuals who are not members of the Board of Social Service.

That the Board of Social Service of the Diocese of Virginia create a standing committee on parochial social service which shall take steps to create a specific agency in each parish of the Diocese for the promotion of social service therein, and that the Board adopt a slogan, "A Parish Social Service Committee or the equivalent in every Parish".

That the Chairman, in consultation with the Bishop, be asked to appoint a special committee of three to investigate the desirability and possibility of setting up a Church Mission of Help Society for the Diocese of Virginia.

That the Board of Social Service of the Diocese of Virginia arrange immediately for an intensive Diocesan-wide observance of Social Service Sunday on January 26th, through such methods as celebration of the Holy Communion for social workers, with breakfast following, and special sermons on "The Church and Social Service".

According to the provisions of a resolution that a conference be called with representatives from the Southern and Southwestern Dioceses of Virginia, Dr. Tucker called such a conference to meet in the Parish House of the Church of the Holy Comforter on Monday, December 16, at which time Bishop Thompson of Southern Virginia, Bishop Jett and Rev. Warren A. Seager of Southwestern Virginia, met with Dr. Tucker. Chairman of the Committee, Bishop Goodwin, Dr. Montague and Mr. Frank Preston, the latter acting as Secretary. It was decided that the three Boards of Social Service were in favor of the general principles of bills for prevention of hasty marriage, for probation and parole, and for the fixing of paternal responsibility for children born out of wedlock, but that no such bills should receive active support until copies of same had been submitted to the legislative committees of all three Boards, and that even then it should only be stated in soliciting support for these bills that it was being done in the Board of Social Service, and not in the name of the whole Church.

The report of Dr. Montague as City Missionary is appended to this report.

(g) Report of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

To the Council of the Diocese:

We are glad to be able to report a very encouraging year in the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge. In our building program we have been more active possibly than in any former year. This is because we are trying to adjust ourselves to the new conditions caused by the Shenandoah National Park running through the middle of our territory, taking two of our missions and leaving the others divided into two groups, one on either side of the Park area. The State, of course, paid us for the two points taken and the Park officials were good enough to allow us to move Holy Innocents Chapel from Simmons Gap to our new point at Cross Roads, ten or twelve miles distant. The purchase money enabled us to make this move and to rebuild the chapel with a seating capacity almost twice as great as it had before. The building is covered with stucco and has a large basement room twenty-five by sixty feet in the clear, to serve as Sunday School room and Parish Hall. The whole cost was approximately \$3,800.00, possible because the work was done by our own mountain builders. We are glad to say that a number of the Gap people who have moved from their old homes are following this little church and will worship in the same building they have loved as their own for so many years.

We also moved the Jewel Chapel from Lydia, a distance of fifty miles to Alberene. Here we rebuilt on a larger scale, excavating for a basement Sunday School room, refinishing the inside walls and stuccoing the outside, all for the sum of \$2,600.00. This money came from the sale of mission property to the Park Commission also. At Lydia we remodeled a school house to serve as a chapel and take care of the small congregation left on the edge of the Park. Mr. Brownell.

our worker at this point, has, at a very small cost, made the building churchly in appearance and adequate to our needs. He has had here in less than a year two Visitations by the Bishop of the Diocese.

Another building project has been the remodeling of the chanel at Rockland Mission, Linden, Va., built over fifty years ago by the Rev. H. B. Lee, D. D. The work here is now under the supervision of the Rev. Fremont N. Hinkel. The building was about to fall down: windows dilapidated, birds nesting inside the chapel, sun and rain coming through the cracks. It is now repaired and freshly painted and the people are so happy and proud of their little chapel. We have a very willing and faithful worker at this point, Miss Bertha Pickrel, a young girl born and brought up in the neighborhood, and we pay her the large salary of five dollars a month for her efficient services!

The spiritual side of the work is, we feel, progressing in a very encouraging way. The people have learned to know and trust us. and most of them appreciate what the Church is doing for them. The growth in our Sunday Schools and the increase in Church attendance bear out this statement. A few statistics will show in part the activities of our workers and the response on the part of the people themselves. There have been altogether in the Archdeaconry during 1935 120 baptisms and 100 confirmations. Let me give you the statistical report of our most isolated mission, Tanner's Ridge. There are many other reports equally fine, but this one shows what is being done in a place which a very short time ago seemed quite impossible, and in which at the time had almost no communicants. There during 1935 the worker reports as follows:

We are having, and possibly shall have more and more, our difficulties with finances. The Clothing Bureaus, once our main source of income for repairs and incidentals, no longer receive clothing enough to meet the needs of the people or to supply the funds necessary for the upkeep of mission property. Then the way is not so open as formerly for special appeals. In the early days of the work people were glad to hear about it and to have their offerings go to its support. But now rectors want all funds to be credited on the quota and so discourage special offerings. We must raise each year at least as

much again as the Diocese is able to give us, and about fifty per cent of what we raise comes from outside the Diocese.

The opportunity for new work is unusually good. Just recently from two different mountain sections the Macedonian call has come to us. If the Church people could see what has been accomplished and the wonderful opportunities knocking at our door I cannot believe they would refuse the Bread of Life to these our mountain people. We should thank God for the privilege of taking the Gospel to His neglected children. The workers in the field are eager to carry on. May the Church people gladly share in the work by prayer, by gifts and by their personal cooperation. Let not our Church become a Pharaoh asking us to make brick without straw, but rather by love and sacrifice may she lift the burdens from the shoulders of her missionaries that they may give their time and strength more completely to the Master's service in spreading the Good News, the Gospel of Our Lord and Saviour, to the people of the mountains.

(h) REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF COLORED WORK.

To the One Hundred and Forty-first Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

GENTLEMEN:

Your Board feels that while there has been very little gain in numbers there has been a small increase in the attendance and in the finances and a deeper interest in the people doing more for themselves.

There are six Priests; all received their training at the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Va., except one. There are 15 Parishes and Missions with 778 Communicants and a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in every one. All of these Missions pay something towards the Minister's salary.

The Bishops of the Diocese, who are deeply interested in the colored work, after serious thought, have made the following changes in the Diocese: They have sent Rev. F. de Lisle Pike, who was at Meade Chapel, Alexandria, Va., to St. Mary's, Berryville, Va., and the Rev. C. R. Dawson, to Charlottesville and Gordonsville, Va., and Rev. T. D. Brown, who was in charge of the Osgood Memorial Church, Richmond, Va., to Meade Chapel, Alexandria, Va. The reports from these changes show that progress is made and that the future will prove the wisdom of these changes.

The Board wishes to thank Archdeacon Mason for the school desks which he gave to the John Moncure High School, at Miller's Tavern, Va., and Calvary Mission, Hanover, Va.

The Board expresses thanks and deep appreciation to the Woman's Auxiliary and Emmanuel Church, Brook Hill, Va., for their contribution to the Colored work and the promise to increase their gift this year.

In 1931, when the Joint Commission made a report to the General Convention, it stated that there were 292 Negro congregations and only 36 were self-supporting, leaving 256 to be aided by the Diocese and the General Church. Our lay people ought to have this information brought before them in order that they may proudly take up and help to carry more of the burden. It should ever be the purpose of our people to move more and more towards self-support. In appreciation of all that we have received in the way of missionary assistance, we should use every effort to justify this generosity on the part of the Church in past years and assume a greater share of our own expenses. Gratitude and self-respect alike demand this.

IV. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT.

To the Right Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D., President Ex Officio:
In presenting the status of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary for the year 1935, it is a very great pleasure to be able to report progress throughout the branches. There are three new branches of the Woman's Auxiliary; five new branches of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary; one new Section C Branch, making a total of 175. The Juniors have gained five and the Little Helpers twelve.

There has always been in Virginia a deep love for the Auxiliary. It is generally recognized as a spiritual and material force in our parishes, and it is good to see, in these expanding times, that the desire to keep the auxiliary a missionary organization is the foremost objective of our women.

The President, mainly because of the generosity of the United Thank Offering Custodian, who supplied a car, gas and oil, has been able to attend four out of five Convocation meetings; three executive committee meetings, the Summer Conferences, the Diocesan Institute, the colored Convocation and over twenty branch and neighborhood meetings, besides the regular meetings of the Diocesan Field Board, the Board of Religious Education and the Board of Mountain Missions, so that this has been a busy and most interesting year.

The officers have stood ready to assist in every way, and our thanks and appreciation are due them in unstinted measure. No money stays long in the hands of the treasurer; each month the checks are forwarded to their destination. Our Secretary is never too busy

to ease the work of her president, and her assistant is already proving the value of her appointment. To lighten the work of the Supply Secretary, Mrs. Dunn, we have been most fortunate in persuading a busy woman, Mrs. R. B. Bean, University of Virginia, to be her assistant and already her hands are full, showing how splendidly the women respond to the appeals for boxes. Valuable contacts and discussions of Auxiliary plans have been outstanding features of the meetings arranged by the Convocation secretaries.

The Monthly programs prepared by the Diocesan Educational Secretary and her committee are widely used and the Diocesan Institute, anonther child of her brain, had an outstanding attendance. Because of the resignation of Miss Pickett Waller, Secretary of the Isolated Church Women, her mantle has fallen on equally consecrated shoulders, and Mrs. Jaquelin Smith is anxious to be informed of names and addresses.

The Junior Woman's Auxiliary is to be congratulated on their far-reaching efforts to organize other groups of young women; on their splendid Provincial Conference at Shrine Mont, and their earnest support of the Gift of Life.

Mrs. W. W. Braxton, Fredericksburg, has prepared delightful files from the Spirit of Missions in each Mission field, and will be glad to lend them for study class or program material.

Our indefatigable director of the Church Periodical Club has not only distributed more magazines than ever, but furniture and even an organ.

The Colored branches are most encouraging. At their Convocation meeting their leaders, both younger and older women, gave reports of great interest and their contributions were made not only to colored work, but as an evidence of their appreciation, to other work in the church.

The programs and information sent out by the Secretaries of the Juniors and Little Helpers is of inestimable value to both children and parents. As we all know, the Christian homes in Virginia are the backbone of our old Commonwealth and from those homes will come its future leaders. In putting first things first, we realize that this training and education of our little ones is the foundation of their character. If they are to take their places in a difficult world situation and do a better job than we have done, they need the high ideals and glorious vision of this Church of ours.

The World Day of Prayer and the Quiet Day for Prayer have both been gratifyingly observed and our Clergymen have arranged special Corporate Communion Services for the United Thank Offering. The Devotional leaflets are a source of power and strength and their use each day is steadily spreading through the Diocese.

The value of the branches to their parishes is in proportion to

their information and thus their knowledge and study make them realize the deep responsibility of their Bishops and the General Church. They know how tragically near to catastrophe the missionary program is and what vigorous efforts must be made to meet this disastrous situation.

In 1936, each branch is asked to plan, 1st—Reaching more individuals; 2nd—Awaking deeper spirituality; 3rd—Use of prayer leaflets and the Forward Movement pamphlets; 4th—Distribution of more U. T. O. boxes, or more papers and magazines under the C. P. C., underwriting the supply work, increased attendance at Summer Conferences, either Shrine Mont or Tappahannock, or both; seeking out the isolated; Bible and study classes, and as a test of our love and interest, an increase in our gifts.

V. SCHOOLS.

- I. CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.
- (a) REPORT OF CHRISTCHURCH SCHOOL, SESSION 1935-1936.

Christchurch School will close its 15th session on June 9th. In reviewing the work for this year we can report definite progress in the program of the School. Our enrollment shows an increase over last session; the curriculum has been broadened and our teaching facilities improved; an enlarged schedule of student activities has been developed; our students show a higher average of achievement; and the School has, I believe, the complete confidence of its patrons and friends.

It is interesting to note that the School is patronized largely by Episcopalians. Seventy-six per cent of our boys are from Episcopal families. Our confirmation class this session will number seven boys and Dr. Smith has baptized four boys during the year. At the end of the session sixty per cent of our student-body will be members of

the Episcopal Church. The percentage of Episcopalians on the School Staff is even higher. All of our staff except two are members of the Church. Four of them sing in the choir at Christ Church. All of them are regular in their attendance at the services and contribute to the support of the Parish work.

This session, for the first time, the School has a Library. Under the able leadership of Mrs. Thomas P. Bryan and Dr. Smith funds were raised to purchase books and equipment. The study hall was enlarged, shelving and tables installed, and a modern system of cataloging inaugurated for the classification of the books. The library meets the requirements of the State Board of Education and the Southern Association of Preparatory Schools. It has added a great deal to the effectiveness of our instruction, and to the development and pleasure of our students.

Our Science Department has been enlarged and moved to the brick cottage. This change gives us some much needed room, and has enabled us to add the study of Biology as a regular course. The School now offers courses in Physics, Chemistry, and Biology and will add next session a course in General Science.

Two student activities, which have made notable progress this year are the Literary Society and the School paper, The Stingaree. These organizations are run by the students under the supervision of a faculty advisor. The boys enjoy the programs of the Society and have made real progress in the technique of public speaking and debating. The Stingaree reports the news of the School, maintains contact with our old boys, and through its editorial columns helps mould student opinion.

Our athletic teams have given a good account of themselves in competition with other schools. Winning about half of their games with schools of much larger enrollment, they earned the respect of their opponents by their hard, clean play, and their sportsmanlike attitude.

We place great emphasis at Christchurch on out-door activity aside from our regular athletic program. We attempt to give every boy some hobby that will occupy his time and absorb his energy. This session our boat shop has been our main activity. During the session we have built five boats. They were launched last week. Two of our masters give instruction in sailing. These boats are 18 ft. Marconi rigged sloops; they are fast and seaworthy, and much enjoyed by the boys.

During the winter a course in navigation was introduced into the curriculum. Work was done in both dead-reckoning and celestial navigation. The course was popular with the boys and will be improved next year by the acquisition of some equipment, such as a sextant and charts.

A Radio Club and a Camera Club were organized during the session. The Radio Club built and is successfully operating two transceivers. With them we hope to maintain two-way conversation from the shore to boats on the river. The dark room technique of the Camera Club is improving and we have some very good pictures of student activities, as a result of their efforts.

We feel here that the religious program of a church school is not so much a program as a group of people who are trying to find the way of life by following in the steps of Christ. This ideal reaches into every phase of our life here. We are attempting to create here a Christian atmosphere. We want a boy to realize that Christianity solves all of our problems here in our little community, and that the same principles are an answer to the needs of the world.

In closing, I wish to speak of the chief problem confronting the School at this time, the need for a larger enrollment. The School is not known and has no medium of advertising, save through its friends and patrons. Christchurch School can offer a boy a healthy, normal out-door life under positive Christian influence. It can give him sound academic training and a real appreciation of true life values. I ask you to investigate the School. Satisfy yourself as to the soundness of its instruction and to the emphasis it places on fundamentals. Speak to your parishioners, who have boys, of your belief in the School. Help us to make contacts that will result in enrollments.

(b) REPORT OF ST. ANNE'S SCHOOL FOR YEAR ENDING JUNE, 1936.

The year at St. Anne's has been, on the whole, a successful one in spite of the disastrous effect of the polio epidemic in Virginia last Summer and Fall, which without doubt seriously affected the enrollment in our Boarding School. However, 18 boarding students have been enrolled from ten States and the District of Columbia. The total enrollment for the year is 87.

Extensive alterations have had to be undertaken on account of the severe weather of the past few winters. Heat has been installed on the sleeping porch. The outdoor gymnasium has had to be glass-enclosed on all sides. A coat of cement has been applied to the smaller school building, making it much warmer and greatly improving its appearance. These repairs were undertaken on a budget which was very closely balanced, but fortunately we have every prospect of closing the year free from debt.

Scholastically the record is also gratifying. A graduate of the class of 1935 won the open scholarship offered by Hollins and another member of the class won a Barnard scholarship. Both of these were awarded on the high grades made by our students in their College En-

trance Board examinations. Every member of the 1935 graduating class who earned the College Preparatory diploma, entered college. At the present time St. Anne's graduates are enrolled at Bryn Mawr, Barnard, Columbia, Skidmore, Mount Holyoke, Wilson, William and Mary, Hollins and Sweet Briar.

The regular program of the school keeps our students very busy and this is especially true of the boarders. Hockey, baseball, tennis, basketball and other games are pursued in their season. Field Day and May Day programs provide opportunities for exhibiting the results of various extra-curricular activities. This year St. Anne's riders will have a part in the Horse Show to be held for junior riders at Farmington on May 30th. Some of the younger girls took part in an Easter pageant at Christ Church and the girls in residence have not forgetten their obligation to help others less fortunate. The whole school maintains a charity fund from which contributions totalling \$75.00 have been made to the local church, the work of the Mountain Missions, to the Preventorium and to the Children's Home. Knitting and sewing have also been done for needy children. At Christmas time they not only sent the usual Xmas box to the Mission assigned to them, but were able to send toys to another Mission which was in danger of being forgotten.

To build Christian character and to develop religious leadership should be—and is—one of the main objects in our Church schools. The entire faculty here at St. Anne's, more than ever before, is united in its aim to provide girls with a first-class education plus social and moral stability.

(c) REPORT OF ST. CATHERINE'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

This year, 1936, marks the sixteenth year of St. Catherine's School, and its thirteenth year as a boarding and day school, continuing the Virginia Randolph Ellett School, which had been in operation for thirty years. Of a total enrollment of three hundred and sixty-two students, an increase of fifty-one over last year, two hundred and seventy-nine are day scholars, representing Richmond. The Resident School, with eighty-three students, is filled to capacity. Of this group, forty-two girls are from the South, thirty-three from the North, and eight from the West.

The Senior and Junior Classes are slightly larger than last year. A large number of the graduating class is planning to go to college. The number going up for the College Entrance Board Examinations is about the same as last year. Two of the Seniors are being accepted by Vassar and Radcliffe according to a new plan, known as Plan D, which

means that because of their outstanding school record they are not required to take examinations.

Of the forty-two students who graduated last year, two are travelling, five are not in school, one is working, and thirty-four are in college or in schools for advanced training.

Two new buildings have been added—a much-needed infirmary, and a gift to the school of a residence for the Headmistress. The cottage, formerly used by the Headmistress has been moved to another part of the grounds, and will be used as a dwelling for members of the faculty.

Two resident students are being baptized this year, and about fifteen will be confirmed on Ascension Day in the Chapel.

We feel both sad and honored this year because Miss Watkins, after eleven years of loyal and unusual service to St. Catherine's, has been asked to become the Headmistress of St. Timothy's School, and leaves at the end of this year to assume her new duties.

(d) REPORT OF ST. CHRISTOPHER'S SCHOOL.

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

I beg to submit the following report of St. Christopher's School for the session of 1935-1936, being the twenty-fifth in its history and the sixteenth under Church ownership:

- (1) Enrollment: (a) Total enrollment of pupils, 235: Boarding pupils, 38; day pupils, 197. Upper school pupils, 158; lower school pupils, 77. (b) Faculty members (including two half-time teachers in the lower school), 19; men teachers, 12; women teachers, 7. (c) House staff, 4; matrons, 2; housekeepers, 1; resident nurse, 1. (d) Executive staff, 2; Treasurer and bookkeeper, 1; secretary, 1.
- (2) Health: The health of the School has been excellent throughout the session. There has been no case of serious illness in the boarding department.
- (3) Work: The regular work of the School has been of a satisfactory character.
- (4) The Faculty and House Staff: The religious affiliation of the members of the faculty and of the house staff and executive staff this session is as follows: Protestant Episcopal, 14; Baptist, 4; Presbyterian, 3; Methodist, 4.
- (5) Religious Affiliation of Pupils: (a) Protestant Episcopal, 63 \(\frac{3}{4} \) per cent. (b) Other churches, 36 \(\frac{1}{4} \) per cent.
- (6) Graduating Class: At the close of the session, on June 4th, a class of twenty-one will be graduated.
- (7) Finances for the session: While it is impossible for me at this date (May 13th) to give exact figures for the session, it is my hope that the books of the School on June 30th, the closing day of

our financial year, will balance. It is to be noted here that the School will by June 15th have met for this year the annual assessment of \$6,000 made upon it as its share of the \$18,000 required for interest on the Church Schools Bond Issue of \$300,000, and will also have made an extra donation of \$300 for the same purpose.

- (8) Scholarships: Scholarships established by friends of the School, amounting to about \$1,500, are this year being given through the School toward the education of the youth of Virginia and the Church
- (9) Enrollment: Last session we had a total enrollment of 241 boys. Our enrollment this year to date is 235—a decrease of 6, or about 2½ per cent. It is to be noted that this year the School rates were raised considerably all along the line, and this increase of rates necessarily affected temporarily the School enrollment.
- (10) A Suggestion: It is once more offered as a suggestion that individual parishes in the Diocese found at the School parish scholarships, reserving to themselves the right of presentation. By such action the parish would benefit, and the School, the property of the Church and one of its working organizations, would be strengthened.
- (11) Religion: St. Christopher's School is a Church institution. In every department of the school's life, therefore, the fundamental importance of religion is recognized. The first exercise of every school day is a short divine service, in which every boy takes an active part; and before athletic events the boys of the whole school kneel together in prayer to ask God's blessing upon those who are about to represent them in the contest. In addition to these religious services, regular instruction in religion is provided for in graded courses, every boy being required to take two periods a week in the religious studies of his form.

Furthermore, recognizing the futility of trying by means of religious exercises and studies alone to inculcate a religious spirit, the school management endeavors to awaken that spirit in the boys and to foster it when awakened by presenting to them definite opportunities of work for others.

Among the opportunities that have come to the boys of St. Christopher's this year are the following: The Red Cross Membership Campaign, the Anti-Tuberculosis Christmas Seals Drive, and direct appeals for funds, clothing and toys to aid various schools, orphanages, mountain missions, and the like. Answering these appeals, the School will, by the end of the session, have collected and distributed through its Missionary Societies and other agencies sums amounting in the aggregate to over \$900.00, and a large number of articles of clothing and toys.

(12) The Bishop's Visitations: On Sunday, March 29th, 1936, Bishop Tucker confirmed at St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, nine

of the pupils of St. Christopher's School, all of whom are members of the Day Department. Again, on Wednesday, May 6th, Bishop Tucker visited St. Stephen's Church to confirm a class of four boys of this School, three of whom are members of the Boarding Department. In all, thirteen members of St. Christopher's Student Body have been confirmed at St. Stephen's Church this year.

(13) Ordination of Former Pupils of St. Christopher's: On Friday, September 13th, 1935, John Page Williams, a graduate of St. Christopher's School, B. A. of the University of Virginia, student at the Virginia Theological Seminary for one year, and at Christ Church College, Oxford, for two years (holder of a Rhodes Scholarship), was ordained to the Sacred Ministry in Grace and Holy Trinity Church, Richmond.

On Tuesday, April 14th, 1936, Robert S. Bosher, a graduate of St. Christopher's School, B. A. of the University of Virginia, for two years a student at the Theological Seminary at Alexandria, and this year a student at the General Theological Seminary, New York, was ordained to the Sacred Ministry in St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton.

Mr. Williams and Mr. Bosher are the third and the fourth Alumni of St. Christopher's School to be ordained to the Episcopal Ministry, the other two being, in the order of their ordination, the Rev. William Wyllie, Jr., and the Rev. Peyton Randolph Williams.

- (14) Alumni of St. Christopher's studying for the Sacred Ministry: At the present time one alumnus of St. Christopher's, Mr. Treadwell Davison, is studying for the ministry at the Theological Seminary at Alexandria.
- (15) Improvements at the School: Among the gratifying improvements to the property of St. Christopher's School to be noted here are (1) the erection of a new brick, fire-proof gymnasium, (2) the enlargement of one of our three athletic fields, (3) the erection of a dwelling for the servants of the School, and (4) the grading and beautifying of the grounds generally.
- (16) The Outlook for the Session of 1936-1937: Prospects for next session are better than they have ever been, and we are looking forward to a large increase in the enrollment of the School.
- (17) Further information in regard to the character and work of St. Christopher's can be found in the school catalogue and in the other printed publications of the School.

(e) REPORT OF ST. MARGARET'S SCHOOL.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The session drawing to a close has been a good one for St. Margaret's School.

The enrollment now stands at seventy-seven; the boarding de-

partment with seventy girls in residence is completely filled. Thirty-nine of the girls come from Virginia, eight from Maryland, five from New York, four from West Virginia, three from Connecticut, three from New Jersey, two each from the District of Columbia, North Carolina, Ohio and Illinois, and one each from Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Florida, Alabama, Cuba, and Holland.

Sixty-five girls are in the High School classes, twelve in the lower grades. Twelve girls are in line for graduation in June.

Ten St. Margaret's girls have been confirmed this year, nine by Bishop Tucker in St. John's Church in Tappahannock, the other one in her own church in Richmond.

While these facts may be of some interest to the friends of St. Margaret's, it is difficult to give a report of the real life of the School. Growth, physical, mental, spiritual, is a slow process and is rarely spectacular. It is the earnest hope of those who are responsible for St. Margaret's School that the St. Margaret's girls are being trained up in the way they should go.

(2) REPORT OF BLUE RIDGE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, BRIS, VIRGINIA.

With the year ending December 31, 1935, Blue Ridge Industrial School completes its twenty-sixth year of operation. During this time there has been an increase from an enrollment of 12 boarding pupils in 1910 to an enrollment of 208 boarding pupils in 1935. In addition to the number of boarding pupils there has been an enrollment of 23 day pupils in 1935.

There are 25 employees—14 teachers, 4 housemothers, 1 housefather, 2 matrons, 1 farm manager, 1 shop foreman, 1 nurse, 1 secretary. Many of the teachers are college graduates. The average salary of women workers is \$40.00 per month with board and lodging.

Boys and girls do all the routine work of the school and in this way are able to help in meeting their own expenses. The regular charge for a boarding pupil is \$12.00 a month, but frequently a special arrangement is made for those who cannot pay this amount. During the past year the total sum collected in cash from pupils, their parents, or patrons was $50\,\%$ of the cost of operation.

The school is accredited under the State Board of Education and the course extends from the primary through high school. A pupil has a chance for special vocational training in agriculture, shop work, home economics, handcraft, and business. The routine work of kitchen, farm, laundry, office, etc., serves as an opportunity for laboratory work carried on in connection with the study of these branches.

Three periods a week are given to religious instruction. Service is held every Sunday in the school chapel and Holy Communion is celebrated about twice a month. There is a special young people's meeting every Sunday evening. A class of 26 was confirmed during the year. The amount contributed for missions and benevolences was \$770.63. Pupils of the school showed great interest in their Lenten mite box work and made a generous offering at Easter. Members of the School staff carry on Sunday School work at the Wyatt Mountain and Haneytown Missions.

The following is a brief statement of health work done:

Dispensary patients, 4,645; hospital patients, 414; Immunizations—typhoid, diphtheria and smallpox, 137. 2 Clinics—(1) diphtheria inoculation; (2) chest examination, 33.

Ninety-eight pupils were enrolled in the summer school which lasted 10 weeks. Two students received diplomas at the end of this term.

(3) REPORT OF STUART HALL.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

I wish to submit the following report from your school, Stuart Hall:

Due to the infantile paralysis in Virginia and in certain states of the east, the opening of the 92nd session of the school was delayed until October 1st as a precautionary measure. The school has an enrollment of 121 students, 100 of these being resident students, making a 31% increase over the session of 1934-35, which had shown a 42½% increase over the session of 1933-34. The greater number of students required the opening of Robertson House, a dormitory which had been closed for two years. Faith Hall, the building in the main group assigned to the Lower School, is at present taxed to capacity, there being eight resident students. To care for these additional students, we increased the faculty and staff by one teacher for the Lower School, and a house mother for Robertson House.

The school still maintains its emphasis on the academic, and prepares students successfully for all colleges, and for the examina-

tions of the College Entrance Examination Board. At present we have students in Wellesley, Smith, Barnard, Sweet Briar, Hollins, Goucher, Wooster, Wilson, Oberlin and Mary Baldwin Colleges, and the Universities of Minnesota, Arizona, Oklahoma and North Carolina. Of the present Senior Class of twenty-six, nineteen graduates are planning to enter college next session.

Three new courses were added during the year to the list of academic studies—namely, Biology, High School Arithmetic, and History of Art. In addition, Art Appreciation and Music Appreciation are offered to the whole school. A program of remedial work in spelling, grammar, writing and arithmetic has gone forward. Girls deficient in these elementary branches, regardless of their classification, have been put in special classes for intensive training.

A great many new books have been added to the library, and it is with great pleasure that I report that the girls' interest in good literature has been stimulated, and many have begun their personal libraries.

It has been the feeling of the present administration that girls at Stuart Hill, particularly those from outside the borders of the State, should have some opportunity to visit historic points and to see some of the natural beauties of the Commonwealth while students here. To that end, the entire school has visited the Grand Caverns, and large groups have made trips to Monticello and the University of Virginia, historic Lexington, Natural Bridge, Richmond and Williamsburg. This program has been heartily endorsed by parents and greatly enjoyed by the students.

A very decided interest in the religious life of the school has been noticed this year, which is gratifying. In this connection, I may say that it has been necessary to organize three choirs in order to care for the students who wish to participate in this phase of church work. Students have been generous in their donations to the Boys' Home at Covington, the Red Cross and other social agencies, have sent boxes of clothing to the needy, and have given of their time on Saturdays to read to the blind children at the local school for the blind, working through the Service League.

Owing to the fact that we have an unusually large graduating class, nine post graduates and a number of special students who cannot return next year, we must ask the cooperation of everyone in helping us to secure students to fill their places.

St. Agnes School, Mrs. Helen Arny Macan, Principal, with Bishop Tucker as President of the Board of Trustees, is ending its twelfth year in good condition and with good prospects for the coming year 1936-1937. The enrollment is holding up well and the ten boarders (practically our full quota) represent 5 States. All the activities of the curriculum and extra-curriculum, have been energetically and happily carried on. In particular the Troop of Girl Scouts have manifested an admirable interest and loyalty. The Supervisor of Secondary Schools in Virginia gave St. Agnes the highest rating possible in this State. The new catalog of St. Agnes School, "A Country Resident and Day School for Girls and Little Boys", is just off the press and will be sent by mail on application. Beautifully situated on a high bluff within the city limits of Alexandria, the School is only 15 minutes motor ride from the White House in Washington. Religious teaching is carefully provided as in our former reports.

The Journal of the 125th Annual Council reported: "A short while before his death, Bishop Gibson suggested that it would be well for the vestry of St. George's Parish to give the chapel into his charge, which they did. The Senior Warden, Judge Wellington Wallace, wrote the document of consent, which was signed by a majority of the vestry.'

St. George's Chapel is only six miles from Fredericksburg on a hard surface road. Only one of its present communicants is active in any way, he coming to Fredericksburg to services once every few months. I personally can see no future for the little chapel, which is the opinion of all except one of its communicants. Several Baptist and one Methodist churches are not far distant, and are meeting the needs of the people. The communion silver is in the home of a Baptist, whose late husband was an Episcopalian and whose grandfather gave the land for the chapel.

Of the Episcopalians living anywhere near the Chapel, two belong to a chapel in Warwick County, three have their membership at St. George's, Fredericksburg, two at Trinity, Fredericksburg, and six still at the Chapel.

Although not in charge of the Chapel, I have visited all Episcopalians in the community at least once each summer for two years.-J. J. A.

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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

(Adopted May 13, 1936.)

Whereas, the civil government in the Virginia Colony from time to time established within the bounds of the Colony parishes of the Established Church of England in Virginia, which parishes continued as such until the Church was disestablished by the several acts of the General Assembly of Virginia in 1784; and

Whereas, the Protestant Episcopal Church of Virginia was organized in May, 1785, by a union of all the parishes of the disestablished Church of England within the bounds of the Commonwealth of Virginia and took part in the organization of the union of all the Protestant Episcopal Churches of the several States and, by its own formal ratification of the plan of union, became the Diocese of Virginia of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America; and

Whereas, the original Diocese of Virginia, embracing the entire State, has since been divided into several Dioceses, one of which remains established as the Diocese of Virginia:

Now, Therefore, the Diocese of Virginia acknowledges the authority and power of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, as set forth in the Constitution and Canons adopted thereby, and, in the exercise of its own powers and authority, doth amend and revise the Constitution of this Diocese so that the same shall read as follows:

THE CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

IN THE

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

ARTICLE I.

The order, government, and discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia shall be vested in the Bishop, and in the Council of the Diocese, constituted as provided in Article III hereof, which shall have

power to adopt Canons, and take any other action that may be proper, for the conduct of its affairs, not in conflict with this Constitution.

ARTICLE II.

The Council shall hold each year a regular meeting at the place designated by the preceding regular meeting of the Council. Each regular meeting shall be held on the third Wednesday in May, except that when Ascension Day shall fall upon the day following the third Wednesday in May, the regular meeting of the Council for that year shall be held on the fourth Wednesday in May.

The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may, for any cause deemed by it to be sufficient, change the time, or the place, or both the time and the place, for any regular meeting of the Council.

A special meeting of the Council may be called by the Bishop as provided in Article VIII, or by the Standing Committee, as provided in Article IX.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The Council shall be composed of the clerical order and the lay order.

The clerical order shall consist of the Bishop or Bishops and all other ordained ministers canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia.

No member of the clerical order shall be entitled to vote in any meeting of the Council until he has been for at least six months preceding the meeting canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia.

No member of the clerical order under ecclesiastical censure shall be entitled to a seat in the Council.

The lay order shall consist of four classes, namely: (a) the lay delegates from the parishes, separate congregations, and mission churches entitled to representation by canon; (b) the lay delegates from the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge; (c) the lay delegates from the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction; and (d) the lay delegates ex-officio.

- (a) There shall be one lay delegate from each parish having a parish Vestry, from each separate congregation, and from each mission church entitled to representation by Canon, to be chosen by their respective Vestries. But from every parish, or separate congregation, in which there is more than one minister canonically settled, there shall be as many lay delegates as there are ministers so canonically settled, and from every parish or separate congregation having more than five hundred communicants reported to the previous regular meeting of the Council, there shall be an additional delegate for each five hundred communicants or major fraction thereof above the first five hundred; in no case, however, shall any parish or separate congregation be entitled to more than three lay delegates.
 - (b) There shall be three lay delegates from the missionary jurisdiction

known as the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge to be appointed by the Board of Mountain Work.

- (c) There shall be two lay delegates from the missionary jurisdiction known as the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction to be elected by the Convocation of the said Jurisdiction from among congregations not otherwise entitled to representation in Council.
- (d) The lay members of the Standing Committee, the Chancellor of the Diocese, and the members of the Committee on Finance, as the same are or may hereafter be constituted by Canon, shall be members ex-officio of the Council.
- Section 2. The lay delegates shall serve for the regular meeting for which they are chosen, and, unless other delegates be chosen, for any special meeting held prior to the next regular meeting of the Council.
- Section 3. All members of the Council shall be communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

ARTICLE IV.

Thirty members of the clerical and thirty members of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or special meeting of the Council, but a smaller number may adjourn.

ARTICLE V.

In all matters that may come before any meeting of the Council the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body and a majority of those voting shall be necessary for a decision, except where the vote is by orders, in which case there must be a concurrence of majorities in each order; but, before a vote is taken upon any measure, five members may, by request, require the vote to be taken by orders, in which case the voting shall be by ballot.

ARTICLE VI.

In addition to the Bishop of the Diocese, there may be a Bishop Coadjutor or Bishops Suffragan, or both, upon the conditions and pursuant to the authority contained in the Canons of the General Convention.

In addition to the Bishop, or Bishops, the officers of the Diocese shall consist of a Secretary, Treasurer, Chancellor, and Registrar.

For the further conduct of the affairs of the Diocese there shall be a Standing Committee, Committee on Church Property, Committee on Finance, Pension Fund Committee, and the Diocesan Missionary Society, together with such other officers, committees, and boards as the Council may deem necessary.

ARTICLE VII.

The election of a Bishop shall be made at a regular annual meeting of the Council, or at a special meeting of the Council called for the purpose. The

vote shall be by ballot and by orders and a concurrent majority of the votes

ARTICLE VIII.

cast by each order shall be necessary to a choice.

The Bishop shall preside at all meetings of the Council and exercise all the ordinary duties of a presiding officer. It shall be his duty to give to the regular annual meeting of the Council a general view of the state of the Church. He may call a special meeting of the Council at whatever time and place he may think necessary, and whenever requested by the Standing Committee it shall be his duty to call a special meeting to be held at the time and place selected by the Standing Committee.

The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside at any meeting of the Council from which the Bishop is absent, or whenever the Bishop may request him to preside.

ARTICLE IX.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office, a special meeting of the Council may be called by the Standing Committee; and the Council, immediately upon assembling, shall elect by ballot a President from among the order of Presbyters, who shall remain in office until the election and the consecration of a Bishop for the Diocese of Virginia, or until the next regular annual meeting of the Council, whichever shall happen first. The President so elected shall perform all the duties and possess all the privileges of a presiding officer. He shall not have the power to call a special meeting of the Council except when requested so to do by the Standing Committee, in which case he shall call the special meeting at the time and place set by the Standing Committee.

If there be no vacancy in the Episcopal office, yet both the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor be absent from a meeting of the Council, then the Council shall elect by ballot a President pro tempore from among the order of Presbyters.

ARTICLE X.

A Secretary of the Diocese shall be elected at each regular annual meeting of the Council. His duty shall be to act as Secretary of the Council and to make minutes of its proceedings, to attest the public acts of the body, and to perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall have the power to fill the same.

ARTICLE XI.

A Treasurer of the Diocese shall be elected at each regular annual meeting of the Council, and shall, upon qualification, continue in office until removed as hereinafter provided, or until his successor is elected or appointed and qualified. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other

property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be provided by Canon. He shall report annually to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same. The Treasurer shall give bond for the faithful performance of his duties in an amount to be fixed by the Committee on Finance, with corporate security approved by said committee, which bond shall cover his responsibility for all money and other property coming into his hands as Treasurer from whatsoever source.

At the close of each fiscal year, accounts of the Treasurer shall be audited by a certified public accountant under direction of the Committee on Finance

In case of a vacancy in the office of Treasurer, arising when the Council i⁸ not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall have th^e power to fill the same. The Treasurer so appointed shall be required to giv^e a like bond with like security.

In case of the misconduct of the Treasurer, or of his incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, the Ecclesiastical Authority may remove him and fill the vacancy.

ARTICLE XII.

At the regular annual meeting of the Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, the Council shall elect a Chancellor of the Diocese, who shall continue in office until his successor is elected or appointed. He shall be a lay communicant residing in the Diocese of Virginia and learned in the law. He shall be the legal adviser of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and also of all the officers, committees and boards of the Diocese whenever they shall require legal advice in matters affecting the interests of the Diocese of Virginia.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Chancellor the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a successor to serve until the next regular annual meeting of the Council, which shall have power to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE XIII.

At the regular annual meeting of the Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, the Council shall elect a Registrar of the Diocese, who shall continue in office until his successor is elected or appointed. It shall be the duty of said Registrar to receive and preserve, under the direction of the Council, or the Bishop, books, papers and other documents bearing upon the history of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia, and to perform such other duties pertaining to his office as may be required of him by the Council.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Registrar the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a successor to serve until the next regular annual meeting of the Council, which shall have power to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE XIV.

At each regular annual meeting, the Council shall elect a Standing Committee of the Diocese, consisting of six members, three of the clerical order, and three of the lay order, each of whom shall be a communicant of the Church in the Diocese and each of whom shall continue in office until his successor is elected or appointed.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office, or in case neither the Bishop nor the Bishop Coadjutor be capable of performing the administrative duties of the Bishop, and in any case when the Bishop shall authorize it to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee at every annual meeting of the Council to submit a report of its proceedings. When required by the Council it shall also lay before the Council any documents which may have come into its possession.

In case of a vacancy in the Standing Committee the Committee shall have authority to fill the same.

ARTICLE XV.

The Committee on Church Property shall be composed of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and three lay members who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia and who shall be elected at each regular annual meeting of the Council and shall continue in office until their successors are elected or appointed.

The Committee shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in the Committee.

ARTICLE XVI.

At each regular annual meeting of the Council there shall be elected a Committee on Finance of the Diocese, which shall be composed of three lay communicants of the Diocese, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected or appointed.

The Committee shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in the Committee.

ARTICLE XVII.

At each regular annual meeting of the Council, there shall be elected a Committee on the Church Pension Fund, to consist of two clergymen and five laymen who shall continue in office until their successors are elected or appointed.

The Committee shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in the Committee.

ARTICLE XVIII.

All baptized members of the Protestant Episcopal Church residing in this Diocese shall, as heretofore, constitute a Missionary Society known as the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

This Society shall have charge of all the missionary, educational and social work of the Diocese. Its activities shall be directed by an Executive Committee selected in such manner, and vested with such powers and duties, as shall be prescribed by Canon.

ARTICLE XIX.

Every parish, separate congregation and mission church within the Diocese of Virginia at the effective date of this Constitution, and all others that may be canonically connected with or created within this Diocese thereafter, shall be bound by this Constitution and the Canons adopted in pursuance hereof.

ARTICLE XX.

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner only, namely: At any regular annual meeting of the Council any proposed amendment shall be referred to the proper committee, and considered. If approved by the Council, it shall be again considered at the next annual meeting of the Council and, if again approved, shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

CANONS

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CANONS

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

(As Revised and Adopted May 14, 1936.)

CANON I.

Of an Official List of the Clergy of the Diocese.

Section 1. A list of all the ordained Ministers, or Clergy, of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in this Diocese, with their post office addresses, and their respective cures, stations or positions, shall be prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority and kept, corrected up to date, on file at the headquarters of the Diocese.

This official list of the Clergy of the Diocese shall be *prima facie* evidence of a Clergyman's canonical residence, and his cure, station or position.

Section 2. The right of any Clergyman to vote in the Council shall, if denied or disputed, be determined by the Council itself according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, whether his name be inserted in, or omitted from, the said list.

Section 3. The said list of the Clergy of the Diocese, corrected up to date, with the names of those entitled to vote in the Council designated thereon, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the roll of the Clerical delegates entitled to vote shall be called therefrom.

The said list of the Clergy as submitted to the Council shall be appended to the Journal, and be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of every Clergyman canonically resident in the Diocese to attend regularly every meeting of Council; or, if unable to attend, to send to the President of the Council a written statement of the reasons therefor.

CANON II.

Of Lay Representation in the Council.

Section 1. The Parishes of this Diocese, entitled to representation in the Council, are those which were established by law prior to the eighteenth day of May, A. D., 1785; together with those which have since that time been, or may hereafter be, constituted and received into union therewith by act of the Convention or Council of the Diocese. The Churches entitled to representation are those which have been constituted and received as Separate Congregations or Mission Churches by like action of the Convention or Council. But

a Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission Church, having no vestry, shall not be entitled, as such, to representation in the Council.

The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge and the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction shall be entitled to the representation given to each by the Constitution.

A list of the Parishes, Separate Congregations and Mission Churches in the Diocese entitled to representation in the Council shall be appended to the journal of each annual Council.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of every Parish, and of every Church entitled to representation, as above defined, to elect the number of Lay Delegates and Alternates to each annual meeting of the Council of the Diocese to which they may be respectively entitled.

Section 3. The election of Lay Delegates to the Council, and their Alternates, shall be certified by the Rector, Register, or one of the Wardens of the proper Parish or Church, in duplicate; and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

Rector Register Warden."

One copy of this certificate shall be sent to the Secretary of the Diocese at least ten days before the meeting of the Council, and a copy shall be given to the delegate or delegates attending.

Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make a roll of the Lay Delegates and Alternates certified to him as duly elected, with the Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches, or Missionary Jurisdictions represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall thereupon appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one Clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to which shall be referred the Credentials of all Lay Delegates and which shall make its report to the Council promptly. But until this report be received the roll as made and called by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authentic roll of Lay Delegates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, the Committee on Credentials shall hear the evidence presented and report its judgment thereon. Upon this report the Council shall determine the matter unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present the Council shall decide to hear the whole case *de novo*.

CANON III.

Of Deputies to the General Convention.

SECTION 1. At the Annual Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention there shall be elected by ballot the full number of Clerical and Lay Deputies to the General Convention to which this Diocese is entitled, and, in the same manner, a like number of Clerical and Lay Alternate Deputies; and a majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. The Clerical Deputies shall be Presbyters canonically resident in this Diocese, and the Lay Deputies shall be communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

The Deputies so elected shall serve for the regular meeting for which they are chosen and, unless other Deputies be elected by the Council, for any special meeting held prior to the next regular meeting of the General Convention.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of each of the Deputies elected to signify to the Secretary of the Council, at least ten days before the meeting of the General Convention, whether or not he accepts the election. If he accepts, the Secretary shall issue to him a certificate of election. Should any Deputy elected decline, or fail to signify his acceptance, or should a vacancy occur otherwise, the Secretary of the Council shall issue the certificate of election to the Alternate Deputy of the same order in which the vacancy occurs, who was first elected; or, if more than one were elected on the same ballot, who received the highest number of votes; and if there be more than one vacancy the others shall be filled successively in like manner.

CANON IV.

Of the Committee on Church Property.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Church Property to take such steps as may be necessary to recover or secure any property, real or personal, belonging to any Parish or Congregation of the Church within this Diocese, the legal title to which is not vested in duly constituted Trustees; and in the case of any such property which may be regarded as abandoned property, the said Committee shall take such steps as may be necessary either to hold said property, or to make sale thereof, in accordance with the statutes of this State in that case made and provided; and in case of a sale of the said property, the said Committee shall pay over to the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia the proceeds of such sale, to be subject to the order and disposition of the Council of this Diocese.

Section 2. It shall also be the duty of this Committee, when it may be necessary, to apply to the Courts of the State for the appointment of Trustees to hold the legal title to any property belonging to the Church within this Diocese, and under the control of the Council thereof. And it is hereby constituted the proper authority of the Council to make such application.

It shall also have the care of the Episcopal Residence, and other property belonging to the Diocese for which no other custodians are provided; and shall be authorized to make such expenditures for repairs, insurance, etc., thereon as may be necessary, with the approval of the Committee on Finance.

Section 3. This Committee shall make a report annually to the Council of any action taken by it in the preceding year.

CANON V.

Of the Bishop's and Contingent Fund for Diocesan Expenses and Duties of the Committee on Finance in Connection Therewith.

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Diocese, and of each Parish, Separate Congregation, Mission Church and Mission, shall begin January first.

Section 2. There shall be created a special fund known as "The Bishop's and Contingent Fund" to be raised by assessment upon the Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches and Missions of the Diocese, as provided in Section 3 hereof, out of which shall be paid the salaries and expenses of the Bishop, or Bishops, assessments made against this Diocese by the Provincial Synod and the General Convention, and such other expenditures as may specifically be directed by the Council.

Section 3. The Committee on Finance shall, at each annual Council, present an estimate of the amount needed to cover the anticipated expenditures from the Bishop's and Contingent Fund for the fiscal year beginning the first of January following, together with a schedule assessing the amounts called for in said estimate equitably upon the several Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches and Missions of the Diocese.

The said assessment shall be based upon the relative financial strength of the several Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches and Missions, as shown by their respective parochial reports over a period of the three preceding years and by other pertinent facts and considerations.

When the Council shall have fixed the said estimate and assessment for the Bishop's and Contingent Fund, notice of the amount assessed against it shall be promptly sent to the several Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches and Missions so assessed: but any Vestry, or the Minister in charge of a Mission so assessed, shall have the right, within thirty days after the receipt of said notice, to request the Committee on Finance for an adjustment of the said assessment, and the said Committee may make adjustment accordingly if cause be shown therefor.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of each Vestry, or Minister in charge of a Mission, to see that the sum assessed is paid to the Treasurer of the Diocese in full at the beginning of the fiscal year, or quarterly in advance throughout the year. Each Vestry shall be free to adopt such means as it may deem best to secure the assessment.

Section 5. The Committee on Finance may, between meetings of the Council, authorize and require the Treasurer, out of such part of the Bishop's and Contingent Fund as has not been allocated by the Council, to pay any

extraordinary or unforeseen expenses which shall legitimately arise in the

proper conduct of the business of the Diocese.

Canons

of such Bishops and other Clergy, canonically resident in this Diocese, who may be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.

(e) To secure from every Bishop and other Clergyman canonically resident in this Diocese receiving a stipend or stipends a statement showing the stipend or stipends received, and it shall be the duty of every Bishop and other Clergyman receiving such stipend or stipends, and of every Parish, Congregation, Mission or other Ecclesiastical Organization in this Diocese paying a stipend or stipends to Clergymen, to furnish a statement of such stipend or stipends to the Committee upon its written request.

(f) In general, to do all things necessary to keep the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese advised as to the benefits of the Church Pension Fund, to secure the prompt payment of the assessments due by the several Parishes, Congregations, Missions and other Ecclesiastical Organizations of the Diocese, and to perform all other duties imposed upon the Committee by Canon or resolution of Council.

(g) To make a report to the regular annual meeting of the Council containing a list of such Parishes, Congregations, Missions or other Ecclesiastical Organizations as may have failed to pay in full the assessments charged for the preceding year, and such other matters in regard to the operation of the Church Pension Fund in this Diocese as may be deemed desirable.

CANON VI.

Of the Committee on Finance.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance to examine the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, to have the same audited annually, to report to each regular annual meeting of the Council, and to any special meeting thereof when requested, the financial condition of the Diocese, with such recommendations as it may deem expedient, and to perform such other duties as the Council may direct or may be prescribed by Constitution or Canon.

CANON VII.

Of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund.

SECTION 1. The Diocese of Virginia hereby ratifies and confirms its previous adoption of the system of the Church Pension Fund and the assumption of all duties and obligations thereunder, including the contract dated November 27, 1918, between the Church Pension Fund and the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a copy whereof is on record at the headquarters of the Diocese.

SECTION 2. In furtherance of the Church Pension Fund system and of the said contract between the Church Pension Fund and the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia it shall be the duty of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund:

- (a) To furnish annually, not later than April 1, to the Church Pension Fund the canonical roll of the Bishops and other Clergy of this Diocese, and of the Clergy canonically resident in other Dioceses or Missionary Districts who may be licensed to officiate in this Diocese, with a statement of the stipends received by each of said Bishops and Clergymen from the Diocese, or from any Parish, Congregation, or other Ecclesiastical Organization in this Diocese.
- (b) To collect from the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia the annual income accruing on the investments held by the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund of this Diocese, and to transmit the same semi-annually to the Church Pension Fund for application as the Committee shall direct on account of the premiums necessary to be paid by this Diocese.
- (c) To make arrangements, if deemed desirable, with the Church Pension Fund for the direct transmission by the several Parishes, Congregations, Missions and other Ecclesiastical Organizations of the Diocese to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund of the premiums payable by said Parishes, Congregations, Missions and other Ecclesiastical Organizations.
- (d) To keep the Church Pension Fund informed at all times of the Bishops and other Clergy, and of the unmarried widows and unmarried minor orphans

CANON VIII.

Of Duties of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia in Connection with the Church Pension Fund.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia to pay semi-annually, or oftener at their option, to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund all the income of the investments held by the said Trustees for the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to transfer and deliver to a Trust Company to be named jointly by the Trustees and the Church Pension Fund all of the securities and principal funds belonging to the Disabled Clergy Fund and the Widows and Orphans Fund, and any further gifts or bequests for the benefit of disabled Clergy or the widows and orphans of deceased Clergy which the said Trustees may in future receive, to be held by the said Trust Company with authority and obligation on its part to collect the income and to hold it subject to the order of the Trustees.

Whenever in the judgment of the Trustees it shall become expedient to make a particular investment of uninvested funds, or to change any existing investments, said investment or change of investment shall be made when and as may be directed by the Trustees with the approval of the Church Pension Fund.

SECTION 3. The Trustees are hereby authorized and directed to exercise

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all powers necessary to carry into effect the contract of November 27, 1918, between themselves and the Church Pension Fund, and any other contract which, with the consent of the Council, may be entered into between them.

CANON IX.

Of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Section 1. The government of the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia shall be vested in an Executive Committee. Its object shall be to extend and support the missionary, educational and social work of the Church in the Diocese and to encourage the liberality of its members in support of the Church's mission.

SECTION 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of three classes of members, as follows, namely: (a) The members ex officio; (b) The members from the several Convocations in the Diocese; (c) The members from the Diocese at large.

- (a) The members ex-officio shall be the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, if there be one, the Archdeacon of the Colored Work, if there be one, and the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon of the Colored Work, if appointed, the Treasurer of the Diocese, and the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese.
- (b) The members from the several Convocations in the Diocese shall be one clergyman and one layman from each of the several Convocations in the Diocese which shall have been recognized by the Council as being entitled to such representation, and shall be elected annually by the Council to serve for one year.
- (c) There shall be twelve members from the Diocese at large, six of whom shall be clergymen and six of whom shall be laymen. In the year 1937 the Council shall elect two Clergymen and two Laymen to serve for one year, two Clergymen and two Laymen to serve for two years and two Clergymen and two Laymen to serve for three years, and in the year 1938 and annually thereafter the Council shall elect two Clergymen and two Laymen to serve for three years

The class (b) members must be chosen from those who are nominated by the respective Convocations, and no such member shall be elected for more than three successive years.

No class (c) member shall be eligible to succeed himself.

SECTION 3. The Bishop shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one; shall be Vice-Chairman.

The Treasurer of the Diocese shall be Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in class (b) or (c) membership of the Committee provided that a vacancy

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in a class (b) membership shall be filled only upon nomination by the Convocation to be represented.

The Executive Committee may adopt such rules and by-laws as may be needful for its own guidance and the guidance of those under its authority, not in conflict with the Constitution and Canons and subject always to the direction and control of the Council.

Nine Members of the Executive Committee, duly convened, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 4. The Executive Committee shall be charged with the conduct and development of the missionary, educational and social work of the Church in the Diocese, except such as is strictly parochial; it shall receive, appropriate and disburse contributions made for such work; and *generally*, as the executive agency of the Society shall advance its interest and promote its work.

All Boards, and other agencies and persons employed or engaged in the said missionary, educational, and social work in the Diocese shall be subject to the supervision and direction of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall have authority, with the advice and consent of the Bishop, to establish missions in the Diocese; to aid in the erection of buildings connected therewith; to group missions or congregations dependent upon the Society into suitable fields or cures; to employ missionaries, provide for their support, and give them such directions as may be deemed necessary; provided always that the rights and responsibilities of a duly constituted Rector or Vestry shall never be infringed upon without his or its consent.

The Executive Committee shall also have authority to aid feeble Parishes or Congregations in supporting their ministers, upon application from the Vestries thereof, when, and as long as, they are satisfied that such aid is necessary; to assist in providing the material equipment of Parishes and Missions; to provide for the training of workers and teachers; for the distribution of Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals; for the publication and distribution of books, papers, etc., for Sunday Schools and Missions; and for missionary meetings and addresses.

Section 5. For the furtherance of the purposes of the Society the Executive Committee shall create the following named Departments or Boards with such powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Committee; each of which shall consist of the Bishop and Bishop Co-adjutor as ex-officio members and of two classes of members elected annually, as soon as may be after the organization of the Committee, namely:

- (a) Primary members, who shall be elected by the Committee from its own membership except as hereinafter otherwise provided; and
- (b) Additional members, either clerical or lay, who shall be elected by the primary members of said Department or Board from the Diocese at large.

The Departments or Boards so created, with their respective membership, shall be:

I. The Board of Religious Education, composed of four primary and ten

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additional members, which shall have charge of the work of Religious Education in the Diocese.

II. The Board of Christian Social Service, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of the work of Christian Social work in the Diocese.

III. The Board of Publicity, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of such publicity as the Executive Committee may direct.

IV. The Field Board, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of the Every Member Canvass as provided in Section 6 of this Canon.

V. The Board of Mountain Work, composed of eight primary members (including the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge and the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon, if there be one) and six additional members, which shall have charge of all Mountain Mission work in the Diocese.

VI. The Board of Colored Work, composed of four primary Members (including the Archdeacon of the Colored Work and ten additional members, three of whom are to be nominated by the Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction, which shall have charge of all colored mission work in the Diocese.

Members of each Board, whether primary or additional, shall continue in office until the next election of primary members by the Executive Committee. Each of the additional members of said Departments or Boards shall be entitled to a seat—but not a vote—at the meetings of the Executive Committee.

Each Department or Board shall elect from its members a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, and shall report its actions and recommendations to the Executive Committee.

Out of the appropriation made by the Executive Committee to each of said Departments or Boards the Treasurer of the Diocese shall pay the expenses incurred by each Department or Board upon written order of the Chairman or Vice-Chairman, certified by its Secretary.

In addition to the above named Departments and Boards the Executive Committee may also appoint from its membership such sub-committees as may be needful to facilitate its work, and may prescribe their duties.

SECTION 6. In order that sufficient means may be provided by the offerings of the people for the support and extension of the missionary, educational and social work of the Church in the Diocese, and for its proper share of the work of the Church at large, the Executive Committee shall plan and promote, through the Field Board, each year, an Every Member Canvass to be made after adequate preparation in every Parish, Congregation and Mission as far as possible, at a time appointed by the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall consult with the appropriate Departments of the National Council, the Trustees of the Diocesan institutions, and representatives of the Parishes, Congregations and Missions of the Diocese,

and shall prepare an annual Survey and Budget setting forth the opportunities and needs of the Diocese and of the General Church for the next fiscal year and, not later than the first day of May of each year, submit the Survey and Budget to every minister and vestry, and shall also submit the Survey and Budget to the Council for final action thereon at its regular meeting.

The Executive Committee shall prepare a schedule apportioning among the Parishes, Congregations, and Missions of the Diocese the total amount called for by the Budget adopted by the Council, which apportionment shall be based upon the relative financial ability of the several Parishes, Congregations, and Missions. For the purpose of such apportionment, the financial ability of each Parish, Congregation and Mission shall be determined by the amount of its annual current expenses, over the three years preceding, as disclosed by its parochial reports, and by such peculiar facts and considerations as may be deemed pertinent by the Executive Committee.

The Schedule and Budget so prepared and adopted shall be published and copies thereof shall be delivered to each Minister and Vestry not later than the first day of October of each year.

In order that the people may be properly instructed as to the needs of the Diocese and of the General Church as outlined in the Budget, the Field Board, in co-operation with the parochial authorities and committees organized for the purpose, shall conduct each year a campaign of instruction and preparation throughout the Diocese, culminating in the Every Member Canvass.

It shall be the duty of the Minister and Vestry of each Parish, Congregation and Mission to further the objects of the annual campaign of instruction and preparation by laying before congregations the apportionment or quota as fixed by the Executive Committee and by using all diligence to secure pledges, to the full ability of their respective congregations to give, to meet the needs of the Diocese and of the General Church. It shall be the further duty of each Minister and Vestry to report to the Treasurer of the Diocese not later than the thirty-first day of December in each year the amount which their Parish or Congregation agrees to pay on, or above, its apportionment or quota, and to provide for regular monthly payment to the Treasurer of the Diocese of the amount that they have agreed to pay to the Diocesan Budget.

If the total acceptances do not equal the total Budget the Executive Committee shall inform the people of the Diocese as to the facts and shall take such steps as it deems best to meet the situation.

As soon as practicable after the first day of January in each year the Executive Committee shall prepare and adopt a schedule of payments for the ensuing fiscal year and furnish the Treasurer of the Diocese with a copy of the same. The estimated receipts, if less than the Budget, shall be applied first to fixed obligations and the remainder to other objects in the Budget.

The adopted schedule of payments shall be the warrant of the Treasurer of the Diocese for paying out the money received. Between the first of the fiscal year and the adoption of the schedule of payments the Executive Com-

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mittee may specifically direct the Treasurer of the Diocese to disburse money in such manner as may be found necessary.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee at every annual meeting of the Council, sitting as a Missionary Council, to submit a report of its proceedings and operations and those of its Boards and subcommittees, and of the progress and condition of the missionary work of the Diocese.

CANON X.

Of the Archdeaconru of the Blue Ridge

Section 1. The Missions engaged in Mountain Work shall constitute a Missionary Jurisdiction to be known as "The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge." The Missions to be included in this jurisdiction shall be designated from time to time by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Section 2. A Presbyter, to be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, shall, as the representative of the Bishop, have general supervision of the Mountain Work and be responsible for the promotion thereof. When in the judgment of the Bishop and the said Executive Committee it is necessary, there shall be an Associate or Assistant Archdeacon appointed in like manner and with like powers and duties.

Section 3. The management of the affairs of this Jurisdiction shall be under the Board of Mountain Work as constituted under the Canon dealing with the Diocesan Missionary Society. The said Board may adopt, with the approval of the Bishop and said Executive Committee, such by-laws governing the Mountain Work as may be deemed advisable.

CANON XI.

Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction.

Section 1. The colored people residing within the Diocese of Virginia who are, or may be hereafter, connected with the Protestant Episcopal Church shall constitute a Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be lawful to organize Separate Congregations or Mission Churches composed exclusively of colored persons within the limits of any already existing parish or parishes, subject to all the conditions prescribed in the Canon "Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish," and the Canon "Of Mission Churches."

Section 3. The management of the missionary work of this Jurisdiction shall be under the Board of Colored Work appointed by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society; and a Presbyter may be appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the said Executive Committee, to be known as the Archdeacon of the Colored Work, who, as the representative of the Bishop, shall be responsible for its promotion. When in the judgment of the Bishop and the Executive Committee the necessity shall arise, there may be

an Associate or Assistant Archdeacon chosen in like manner. The Board of Colored Work shall have authority to open new work or to discontinue work already in existence in the Diocese, provided such action has the approval of the Bishon.

Section 4. A meeting of the Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction shall be held annually at such time and place as shall have been designated at the preceding annual meeting. The Convocation may enact such rules and by-laws as may be necessary for its own guidance.

The colored Ministers cononically resident in the Diocese shall be members of the Convocation and it shall be the duty of every such Minister to attend its meetings. The Vestry of every colored Separate Congregation or Mission Church shall annually elect one Lay Delegate to the Convocation who is a communicant and twenty-one years of age. The delegate shall be entitled to a seat in the Convocation upon presentation of a certificate of election in the same form as prescribed for the certification of election of Lay Delegates to the Council.

The Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and the Archdeacon and Associate or Assistant Archdeacon of the Colored Work, if such officer or officers have been appointed, shall be members ex-officio of the Convocation.

SECTION 5. The Convocation shall have power to devise measures for the welfare and advancement of the work of the Church among the colored people, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

SECTION 6. The Convocation shall elect annually two lay delegates to the Council of the Diocese from among Congregations not otherwise entitled to representation in Council.

CANON XII.

Of Convocations.

Section 1. There shall be six Convocations in the Diocese of Virginia, five of which shall be fixed by geographical limits, and the sixth shall be known as the Convocation of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction and shall be composed of all of the colored Separate Congregations and Mission Churches in the Diocese of Virginia without regard to the particular Parish or Parishes in which they may be situated, and they shall not be considered as a part of any of the other five Convocations.

The five Convocations fixed by geographical limits shall be as follows:

- (1) The Albemarle Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Albemarle, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Louisa and Orange.
- (2) The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier (south of the Bull Run Mountain) and Prince William.
- (3) The Rappahannock Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Caroline, Charles City, Essex, Gloucester, Hanover, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster, Mathews, Middlesex,

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New Kent, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford and Westmoreland.

(4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the County of Henrico and in the City of Richmond north of the James River.

(5) The Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Clarke, Fauquier (north of the Bull Run Mountain), Frederick, Loudoun, Madison, Page, Rappahannock, Rockingham, Shenandoah and Warren.

Except in the case of the City of Richmond cities shall, for the purpose of this section, be considered parts of the Counties in which they are geographically situated.

Changes in Convocation boundaries of any of the last five Convocations shall be authorized by Council on the joint application of the Convocations interested.

Section 2. Every Clergyman canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia shall be a member of the Convocation in which his principal Church or his Cure is situated; except that a retired Minister shall retain his membership in the Convocation of which he was a member at the time of his retirement, or become a member of the Convocation in which he resides.

Section 3. Each of the five Convocations fixed by geographical limits may make provision for its lay representation, and may enact such rules and by-laws as may be necessary for its own guidance.

CANON XIII.

Of the Division of Parishes.

Section 1. Whenever the members of this Church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, or in adjoining portions of two or more Parishes, shall desire to separate from the Parish or Parishes of which they are a part and form an independent or new Parish, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after ten days notice of the time and place of such meeting given publicly in the Church, or otherwise, to each known person qualified to vote for Vestrymen in the territory proposed to be formed into a new Parish, and appoint a Committee to take such measures as may be necessary.

Section 2. The Committee thus appointed shall give to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and to the Vestry or Vestries in the Parish or Parishes from which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply to the Council for such separation and formation of an independent or new Parish, which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority, and to the said Vestry or Vestries, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.

Section 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council; and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desirable, together with an accurate description of the proposed line or lines of division, the name proposed for the new Parish, and a statement

showing the extent of the territory, the Churches and Missions, if any, and the number of communicants, which will be embraced therein.

Section 4. The Council shall refer the petition to a committee to examine and report thereon at such time as the Council shall require. Upon receiving the report of the committee the Council may, if deemed expedient, proceed to divide the said Parish or Parishes and to constitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese. The petition, or so much thereof as shall contain the description of the line or lines of division, shall, if the petition be granted, be delivered to the Secretary of the Diocese and shall be published in the Journal of the Council.

Section 5. As soon as practicable after the new Parish is constituted, the Committee which made the application aforesaid shall give at least ten days' notice, in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Canon, to the qualified electors residing in the new Parish to assemble for the election of a Vestry. Such election shall be conducted according to the direction contained in the Canon "Of the Election and Organization of Vestries."

CANON XIV.

Of Establishing or Altering Parish Boundaries.

Section 1. When it shall be deemed desirable to alter the boundary lines between two or more Parishes, or when such lines are unknown, or need to be newly determined, the Vestries of the Parishes concerned may agree upon the lines which they wish to have established as their parish lines, and unite in a petition to the Council to alter or establish them accordingly, which petition shall contain an accurate description of the line or lines proposed. If the said Vestries fail to agree, then one or more of them may present such petition, in which case a copy of the petition shall be sent, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the petition shall be presented, to every Vestry in the Parishes concerned which does not unite therein. In any case, if a proposed change in parish lines would effect a transfer of any Congregation or Church building from one Parish to another, formal notice thereof shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority at least two months before the meeting of the Council.

Section 2. The Council shall refer such petition to a committee to examine and report thereon at such time as the Council shall require. Upon receiving the report of the Committee the Council may, if deemed expedient, alter or establish the said lines accordingly, and as so altered or established they shall be published in the Journal.

CANON XV.

Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish.

Section 1. When any number of persons, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a Minister, shall desire a separate

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parochial organization, but do not reside so apart from other Congregations as to admit of forming a new Parish, they may proceed according to the directions of the Canon "Of the Division of Parishes," applicable thereto. The Council, proceeding under the directions of the same Canon, may constitute the applicants a Separate Congregation in the Parish in which they are situated, with the right to elect a Vestry, and to have representation in the Council, subject always to the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese.

SECTION 2. Before a new Congregation can be established, or a new Church building erected upon a new location for a Congregation already in existence. the consent of the Vestry of the Parish, if there be only one, or of the Parish Council, if there be more than one Vestry, shall first be secured. If consent of the Vestry or of the Parish Council be not given, an appeal may be taken to the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese, and their decision in the matter shall be final.

Section 3. In every Parish with a single Rector and Vestry their parochial authority and their consequent primary responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church and ministration to needy people extends throughout the territorial limits of the Parish and should be so recognized and exercised.

In every Parish in which one or more Separate Congregations or Mission Churches have been established the Rectors and Vestry of each Separate Congregation and Mission Church shall have and exercise concurrent iurisdiction within the territorial boundaries of the Parish, and equal responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church and ministry to needy people within the Parish bounds.

CANON XVI.

Of Mission Churches.

SECTION 1. When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or Congregation desire a separate organization, but cannot comply with the requirements in regard to the formation of Separate Congregations, they may proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

They must obtain the approval of the Vestry of the Parish to which they belong, if there be only one Vestry, or of the Parish Council if there be more than one Vestry in the Parish.

They must have the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese and of the Diocesan Council.

They may have their own Vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties, shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of Vestries. They shall not call a minister without the approval and consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of a Mission Church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary of the Diocese and the Treasurer of the Diocese; and a list of such Mission Churches shall be published annually in the Journal of the Council.

Of Parish Councils.

Section 1. In every Parish in which there is more than one Vestry there shall be a Parish Council, to consist of the Rector or Minister in Charge of each of the organized Churches or Congregations therein, and one or more lay members of each of the Vestries therein. The lay members shall be elected annually by their respective Vestries, and shall continue in office until their successors are duly elected. The Parish Council shall elect a chairman and a secretary, and shall adopt such rules for its own guidance as may be deemed necessary, subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Parish Council to exercise the authority which belongs to the Parish as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout its borders, so that the Parish may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. Especially it shall be its duty to encourage the planting of missions or mission Sunday Schools where necessary in the Parish, to determine their location and their status and to foster their growth and efficiency, and to provide as far as possible that the services of the Church shall be available to all the people within its territory, and that its united influence be exerted in matters pertaining to the welfare of the community. The Parish Council shall not encroach upon the rights or duties of the Vestries, but it may act with them in an advisory capacity by their express invitation.

CANON XVIII.

Of the Election and Organization of Vestries.

Section 1. For each Parish, Separate Congregation and Mission Church in the Diocese there shall be a Vestry. The Vestry shall consist of the Rector or Minister in Charge and not less than three nor more than twelve Vestrymen, except that in any Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church having more than one hundred communicants one additional Vestryman may be elected for each additional one hundred communicants or fraction thereof provided the total number of Vestrymen shall in no case exceed eighteen. The exact number of Vestrymen shall be fixed within the foregoing limits by the persons in the Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church entitled to vote therein for Vestryman, and shall be subject to change by the said electors at any meeting called for the election of Vestrymen.

Section 2. The election of Vestrymen shall be held annually at such time and at such place as shall be designated by the Vestry, or in the event the Vestry does not act then by the Minister, or if there be no Minister by the Wardens. If the time and place be not so fixed, then the said election shall be held on Easter Monday in the Church or regular place of worship. Notice of the time and place of each election of a Vestry shall be given either in the Church or on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means.

Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, if any Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church, at any meeting held as herein above provided in this Canon, so authorize, Vestrymen may be elected for terms not to exceed three years, the congregation to determine the length of terms and the number of Vestrymen to be elected for such terms.

Section 3. Only male persons, twenty-one years of age, who are communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church and of the Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church, shall be eligible to the office of Vestryman of such Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church; provided that a Vestryman who was serving on May 22, 1919, and is a member of the congregation, shall continue eligible for election as Vestryman.

Section 4. All persons eighteen years of age, who are registered as communicants of the particular Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church in which they offer to vote, and non-communicants twenty-one years of age who are baptized, and who have been for six months known to the Treasurer as regular contributors to the expenses of the same, shall be entitled to vote at the election of Vestrymen. The voting shall be by ballot, and, unless otherwise provided by the meeting, a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. But no election shall be valid hereunder unless the qualified voters of the congregation participating therein number at least ten per cent of the number of communicants qualified to vote reported for the previous year.

Section 5. The Vestry may appoint three persons to act as judges, to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges are appointed, those present may choose three persons to act as judges. The judges of election, if appointed or chosen, shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and shall determine who shall be eligible for nomination as Vestrymen.

Section 6. If there be in any Parish two or more congregations apart from each other, not being Separate Congregations or Mission Churches in the meaning of these Canons, it shall be lawful for the Vestry of such Parish, if they deem it expedient, to apportion to each congregation the number of Vestrymen to be chosen as its representation upon the Vestry of the Parish. In such event a separate election shall be held by and for each such congregation, and the electors thereof shall choose the number of Vestrymen so allotted to that congregation, and no more. In other respects such elections shall conform to all the foregoing provisions of this Canon.

All the Vestrymen so chosen by the different congregations therein, together with the Rector or Minister, if there be one, shall constitute the Vestry of the Parish, with all the duties and powers of other Vestries under these Canons. But the Vestrymen chosen by each congregation respectively, together with the Rector or Minister, shall be a Committee of the Vestry to have the care and control of the property, and to transact the local business, pertaining to that congregation alone, and not to the Parish at large. Each such Committee of the Vestry may appoint one Warden for its congregation, a Treasurer, and a Clerk who shall keep a record of their proceedings.

When in the judgment of the Minister, or, if there be none, of the Senior Warden, a meeting of a Parish Vestry so constituted is impracticable, any matter concurred in by a majority of the aforesaid Committees of the Vestry, and duly recorded by their respective Clerks and the Register of the Vestry, shall be deemed to be the act of the Vestry of the Parish. The Parish Vestry shall, however, meet as a whole at least once a year.

Section 7 As soon as may be after their election, the persons chosen as Vestrymen shall assemble and organize at such time and place as the Minister shall appoint, or, if no time or place be appointed by him within a reasonable time, then at such time and place as shall be designated by any two Vestrymen-elect, the Minister and each Vestrymen-elect being notified. The proceedings at this and every meeting of the Vestry shall be opened with one or more Collects and the Lord's Prayer by the Minister, or in his absence by any member who may be chosen to preside over the meeting.

Section 9. The Vestry shall proceed to elect a Senior and a Junior Warden, a Register and a Treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. If Wardens have been chosen for particular churches by Committees of the Vestry, the Senior and Junior Wardens of the Parish shall be chosen from among such Wardens. The Wardens and Register must be communicants and members of the Vestry.

SECTION 10. The Rector or Minister in charge when present shall preside at all meetings of the Vestry, but shall not be entitled to vote except in case of a tie, and then only when he is not personally interested. All Vestry meetings other than fixed meetings shall be subject to his call; but in case he fails, at the request of two Vestrymen, to call a meeting, such Vestrymen may themselves call a meeting, giving notice of the time and place thereof to the Rector and to each Vestryman. A majority of the Vestrymen who have qualified exclusive of the Rector or Minister, shall constitute a quorum; but any Vestry may by resolution fix a smaller number, not however less than four, to act as a quorum at future meetings thereof.

Section 11. In case of a vacancy in the Vestry, the remaining members may elect a duly qualified member of the congregation to fill the vacancy until the next annual congregational meeting, at which time such vacancy shall be filled. The failure of any Vestrymen-elect to qualify within a reasonable time, or the continued neglect of any Vestrymen to attend the meetings of the Vestry without adequate excuse, may, after due warning, be deemed to

create a vacancy, which shall be declared by resolution duly adopted by the Vestry.

CANON XIX.

Of the Duties of Vestries, Wardens and Parish Officers.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Vestry (a) of a Parish or Separate Congregation to elect a Rector, and of a Mission Congregation to elect a Minister in charge upon nomination by the Bishop, (b) to co-operate with the Rector or Minister in charge in promoting the spiritual welfare of his Cure. (c) to extend personally a hearty welcome to newly confirmed or transferred members of the congregation, (d) to see that a budget of the estimated expenses of the Parish or Congregation including its quota for the work of the Diocese and of the General Church is prepared before the beginning of the fiscal year, and to take all necessary steps to raise said amount, (e) to see that the Rector's salary and other obligations are paid regularly and punctually. (f) to provide for the appointment of Trustees under the laws of the State of Virginia authorized to hold the legal title to the church property, (g) to make and execute all contracts for erecting, furnishing, preserving and insuring the church edifice and other property, (h) to regulate the use of the Parish graveyard, (i) to make all necessary provision for church music, with the advice and consent of the Rector or Minister in charge, and subject to his control. and (j) generally, as the constituted agents of the Parish or Congregation, to transact all its temporal business.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Wardens (a) to keep watch over the church property, (b) to see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship, (c) to see that the Sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties, (d) to collect the offerings of the people, (e) to take charge of the font and communion plate, (f) to provide out of the church funds, under the direction of the Vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion, (g) to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and (h) to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Register of the Vestry to take charge of all parish records except the Parish Register, and to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the Vestry in a well-bound book to be provided for that purpose, which records and Minute Book he shall deliver to the Minister, or Wardens, when his term of office expires.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all parochial funds except communion alms and to disburse the same under the direction of the Vestry, to keep regular accounts supported by proper vouchers, to render reports to the Vestry at stated times, and to make such reports to the Council as may be required by its orders. At the termination of his office he shall deliver to the Minister, or Wardens, all books and papers pertaining to said office.

CANON XX.

Of Parish Registers and Parochial Reports.

Section 1. Every Minister of this Diocese shall keep a record of the Communicants, and of all Baptisms, Confirmations, Marriages and Burials, within his Parish or Congregation, specifying (a) the time when persons became or ceased to be Communicants under his charge, and whether by confirmation, transfer, discipline, death or otherwise, (b) the name, age or the date of birth, the sponsors or witnesses, and, in the case of infants, the parents, of each person baptized, (c) the names of persons confirmed, and by what Bishop, (d) the names, ages and residences of persons married, and the names of at least two witnesses, (e) the names and ages of persons buried, and (f) the date and place of every such rite respectively; and he shall attest each by his signature.

Such records shall be made by the Minister in a suitable and substantial book, to be known as the Parish Register, to be provided by the Vestry for that purpose and to remain the property of the Vestry. When the rectorship of a Parish or Church becomes vacant the Parish Register shall be deposited with one of the Wardens, who shall make, or cause to be made, all needful entries therein until the vacancy is filled.

Section 2. Every Minister shall send to the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, to the Secretary of the Diocese, for the President of the Council, on or before the first day of February of each year, a Report of his official acts, and, if he has a cure, of the condition of his Church or Churches, for the year ending the thrity-first day of December preceding, in such form as shall be prescribed by the Bishop or the Council. If any Church be vacant the report for that Church shall be sent by the Wardens.

CANON XXI.

Of the Transfer and Enrollment of Communicants.

Section 1. Upon request of any Communicant desiring to be transferred from a Parish or Congregation in this Diocese to another Parish or Church within or without this Diocese it shall be the duty of the Minister, or if there be no Minister, it shall be the duty of the Wardens, or one of them, of the Parish or Church from which the Communicant desires to be transferred, to furnish to said Communicant a certificate that he or she is a communicant of said Parish or Congregation in regular standing.

Section 2. Every Communicant removing from one Parish or Congregation within or without this Diocese to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the Minister of the Parish or Congregation to which the communicant desires the transfer a certificate that he or she is a communicant in regular standing, from the Minister or, if there be no Minister, from one of the Wardens, of the Parish or Congregation from which the Communicant desires to be transferred.

Section 3. No Minister shall enroll any persons as Communicants in the

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Parish or Congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, unless he shall be satisfied that they have been communicants in some other Parish or Congregation; nor shall he enroll anyone who is known to deny the Articles of the Christian Faith as set forth in the Apostle's Creed.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Rector or Minister of every Parish or Congregation, learning of the removal of any member of his Parish or Congregation to another Cure, without having secured a Letter of Transfer, as herein provided, to transmit the Minister of such Cure a letter of advice informing him thereof.

CANON XXII.

Of Offenders to be Admonished, or Repelled from the Lord's Table.

If any persons within this Church offend their brethren by wickedness of life, such persons shall be admonished, or repelled from the Lord's Table, by the Minister in charge of the Parish or Church, according to the Rubric. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the Minister, or may be requested by the accused, the Wardens of the Parish, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the Minister in ascertaining the facts of the case. But if such Warden or Wardens fail or refuse to act within ten days, the Minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

CANON XXIII.

Of the Trial of the Appeal of a Layman After Repulsion from the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and requesting to be restored to the Communion. Thereupon the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the Minister, shall nominate two of the Clergy and two of the Laity, of whom the Minister repelling shall select one of the Clergymen, and the Communicant one of the Laymen. It shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case, under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop, who shall proceed to adjudge the case, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence. If further evidence be required it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. When the evidence is thus procured the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment to the Minister repelling, and to the Communicant repelled, and

CANON XXIV.

Of the Presentment and Trial of a Presbyter or Deacon.

Section 1.—Offences for which presentment and trial may be had.

The following shall constitute the offences for which a Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese may be presented and tried in this Diocese. namely:

(a) Crime or immorality.

- (b) Holding and teaching publicly or privately and advisedly any doctrine contrary to that held by this Church.
- (c) Violation of the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer.
- (d) Violation of the Constitution or Canons of the General Convention, or of this Diocese.
- (e) Any act which involves a violation of his ordination vows.
- (f) Habitual neglect of the exercise of his ministerial office, without cause; or habitual neglect of public worship, and of the Holy Communion, according to the order and use of this Church.
- (g) Conduct unbecoming a clergyman; Provided, however, that before proceeding to a presentment on this charge the consent of three-fourths of all of the members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese shall be required.

No presentment shall be made or conviction had for any said offence, unless the offence shall have been committed within five years immediately preceding the date of the presentment, except that in case of the conviction of the accused for said offence in a court of record exercising criminal jurisdiction, a presentment may be made at any time within one year after such conviction notwithstanding five years may have elapsed since the commission of the offence.

Section 2.—How charges preferred.—Board of Presentment.—Presentment.

(a) Upon complaint to the Ecclesiastical Authority in writing preferred by the Council, or by the Vestry of the Parish or Congregation to which the accused belongs, or by three adult Communicants thereof, or by any three Presbyters of the Diocese entitled to seats in the Council, that a Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese has been guilty of one or more of the offences enumerated in Section 1 of this Canon (except "Conduct unbecoming a clergyman," in which case consent of three-fourths of members of the Standing Committee is required), the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a Board of Presentment composed of three disinterested Presbyters, not related by blood or affinity to the accused in a direct ascending or descending line, or as a brother, uncle, nephew or first cousin, whose duty it shall be to examine in private the evidence produced in support of the charges and report to the Ecclesiastical Authority in writing whether or not a trial of the accused upon the charges preferred is justified. If the Board of Presentment

reports that a trial is justified they shall formulate the charges in writing in clear and concise language, stating the specific offence or offences charged, and when and where committed—which said formulation of charges shall be known as the Presentment—and shall submit the same with their report to the Ecclesiastical Authority, together with the names and addresses of the witnesses upon whose testimony the Presentment is based.

- (b) If the charges are preferred by three Communicants or Presbyters, the persons preferring the charges shall constitute a Committee of Prosecution in presenting the charges and evidence in support of same to the Board of Presentment and in prosecuting the presentment before the Trial Court. If, however, the charges be preferred by the Council, or by the Vestry of the Parish or Congregation to which the accused belongs, then the Council or the Vestry shall appoint a Committee to present and prosecute the charges before the Board of Presentment and the Trial Court, with such instructions as may be deemed advisable.
- (c) In case a Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese becomes finally convicted in a Court of Record of any crime or misdemeanor involving immorality, or against whom a final judgment has been entered in a Court of Record in a cause involving immorality, it shall be the duty of the Standing Committee of the Diocese to institute an inquiry into the matter. If in the judgment of said Committee there is sufficient reason for a presentment and trial hereunder, it shall be their duty to prefer charges against him.

 Section 3.—Trial Court.—How constituted.—Functions of President and

(a) As occasion shall arise there shall be established an Ecclesiastical Court for the trial of any Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese against whom a Presentment has been found under Section 2 hereof.

Said court, hereinafter called the Trial Court, shall consist of five disinterested Presbyters (other than members of the Standing Committee) entitled to seats in the Council, none of whom shall be a presenter of the charges, and with same qualifications as members of the Board of Presentment, who shall act as a jury, together with the Bishop or, at the Bishop's request, the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese, who shall preside and act as President of the Court, exercising the same functions as those exercised by a Judge of a Court of Record in Virginia.

If there be a vacancy in the Episcopal office, or if neither the Bishop, nor the Bishop Coadjutor, for reason satisfactory to himself, be qualified to preside at the trial, upon notice in writing to that effect the Standing Committee shall appoint some qualified Presbyter; entitled to a seat in the Council, to preside and act as President of the Court.

(b) Upon receipt by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Presentment said Authority shall forthwith nominate eight Presbyters, qualified as jurors, and cause their names, together with a copy of the Presentment, to be furnished to the Accused by a summoner, or by registered mail calling for receipt, addressed to his last known place of residence, as provided by Section 5 hereof.

Of the eight Presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the Accused may select five to act as jurors, or, in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days after receipt of the names of said nominees to notify the Ecclesiastical Authority of his selection, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen, together with the Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor, or, in case of vacancy in the Episcopal office, or the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor be disqualified, the President appointed by the Standing Committee shall constitute the Court for the trial of the accused upon the Presentment.

- (c) As soon as the personnel of the Trial Court has been determined the President of the Trial Court shall fix the time and place for the trial, and notice thereof shall be served on the Accused at least thirty days before the day set for the trial, in the manner provided in Section 5 hereof, and like notice shall be given to each member of the Committee of Prosecution, and to the Presbyters chosen for service as jurors on the Trial Court.
- (d) The President of the Court shall exercise the functions usually exercised by the Judge of a Court of Record in Virginia, and, upon return by the Jury of a verdict of "guilty" upon any or all of the charges, the President, if a Bishop, shall determine the penalty to be imposed and, at the proper time, as provided in Section 4(g) hereof, shall pronounce sentence.

But if the President of the Court be not a Bishop, then a certified copy of the record of the trial up to and including the verdict of the Jury shall be forthwith transmitted to the Standing Committee, which shall in turn transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese with the request, and he is hereby authorized, to act thereon as if he were a Bishop of this Diocese, with full power and authority to determine the penalty and sentence the Accused as provided in Section 4 (a) hereof.

The Jury shall by majority vote determine all questions of fact, and by like vote shall return a verdict of "Guilty" or "Not Guilty" as to each offence charged in the Presentment, together with such recommendation as to penalty as they may deem proper.

- (e) At the time and place fixed for the trial the Court shall convene. The President shall appoint a Clerk, not a juror, whose duty it shall be to keep an accurate record of the proceedings, and who shall be responsible for all documentary evidence filed with the Court during the trial—which record, together with all exhibits filed therewith, duly authenticated by the President, shall at the conclusion of the trial be delivered to the Registrar of the Diocese for preservation.
- (f) At the request of the Committee of Prosecution or, on his, or its, own initiative, the Ecclesiastical Authority may appoint a Church Advocate, with or without assistants, to aid or conduct the prosecution of the Presentment before the Trial or the Appellate Court. Such Church Advocate and assistants, if any, shall all be of the profession of the law and communicants of this Church.
- (g) The Accused shall have the right to be present at all times during the trial to produce his evidence, and to make his defence in person, or by counsel

of his own selection not exceeding two, provided that every such counsel shall be a communicant of this Church.

(h) For reasons deemed satisfactory to the Court the proceedings may be adjourned from time to time and from place to place.

Section 4.—Procedure.

(a) When the Court has convened, if the Accused shall refuse, or neglect without sufficient excuse, to appear before the Court when summoned according to Section 3 (c) of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the President of the Court, if a Bishop, or if the President be a Presbyter, then the Bishop of another Diocese as provided in Section 3 (d) hereof, shall declare him to be in Contumacy, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass against him for such Contumacy; but if within thirty days from the date of such sentence the Accused shall in writing directed to the Ecclesiastical Authority request a rehearing of the case, and shall present to such Authority evidence sufficient to raise a reasonable doubt as to whether justice has been done and tender himself ready to take his trial upon the Presentment, the Ecclesiastical Authority, in the exercise of a sound discretion, may order a rehearing of the case.

Upon the expiration of said thirty days, if no rehearing has been ordered, the President of the Trial Court, if a Bishop, or, if the President of the Court be a priest, then the Bishop of another Diocese, as provided in Section 3 (d) hereof, shall forthwith pronounce the sentence of Degradation from the Ministry of this Church for Contumacy as if he had been convicted upon a plea of "Not Guilty" under sub-section (g) hereof.

- (b) If the accused, appearing before the Court in person, or by counsel, or in writing addressed to the President of the Court, pleads "Guilty" to any or all of the charges in the Presentment, the Jury shall report accordingly and may recommend such penalty as they deem right and proper, but the President, if a Bishop, or if the President be a Presbyter, then the Bishop of another Diocese, as provided in Section 3 (d) hereof, shall alone determine the penalty to be imposed and pronounce sentence therefor.
- (c) If the Accused appear, the Presentment shall be read to him and he shall be called upon to answer "Guilty" or "Not Guilty" to each of the charges therein contained. If he neglect or refuse to answer, a plea of "Not Guilty" shall be entered for him. Upon the charge or charges to which the plea of "Not Guilty" has been entered, either by the Accused or by the Court for him, the trial shall proceed.
- (d) In the conduct of all trials the laws of the civil jurisdiction in the State of Virginia so far as they relate to evidence are adopted and taken as the rules by which all Trial Courts in this Diocese shall be governed, and all trials therein shall be conducted according to the principles of the common law as the same is administered in the State of Virginia.

But no technical errors—not going to the merits of the case—shall affect the determination or judgment of the court on questions arising during the trial. (e) All testimony shall be given under oath, or affirmation, administered by some person authorized by law in Virginia to administer oaths.

Upon application of either the Committee of Prosecution, the Church Advocate (if one be appointed), or the Accused, either before or during the trial, the President of the Court shall issue its summons for witnesses when satisfied that the testimony sought to be adduced is material and that the witness is one whom the Court would be willing to hear upon the trial—otherwise he may refuse to issue the summons.

In case the testimony of any witness is desired whose attendance at the trial cannot be obtained, either party may at any time after copy of the Presentment has been served on the Accused apply to the Court if in session, or if not, to the Ecclesiastical Authority, for a Commission to take the testimony of said witness, and the Court, or Ecclesiastical Authority—being satisfied by affidavit of the applicant that the testimony sought to be introduced is material—shall appoint a Commissioner to take the deposition of said witness. The party desiring to take said deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying said notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness, and the other party, within six days after receiving said notice, may furnish the first party with proposed cross-interrogatories. Said interrogatories and cross-interrogatories, if any be propounded, shall then be sent or delivered to the Commissioner, who shall forthwith, at the time and place fixed in said notice, proceed to take the testimony of such witness, and transmit the same under seal to the Court, if then in session, or, if not, to the proper Ecclesiastical Authority for use at the trial.

But no deposition shall be read at the trial unless the Court has reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, or unless the Prosecution and Accused both consent that it may be read.

It is declared to be the duty of all members of this Church in this Diocese to attend and give evidence when duly cited in any ecclesiastical trial or investigation under the authority of the constituted authorities of this Diocese.

(f) When the taking of evidence is completed the Committee of Prosecution, through a single spokesman or the Church Advocate, if there be one, and the Accused in person, or by counsel, may present argument to the Court—the Prosecution having the opening and conclusion.

Thereupon the Jury, having considered the evidence, shall, within three days after the case has been submitted, present to the President of the Court in writing their verdict on each separate charge in the presentment signed by those concurring therein, being a majority, with such recommendations as to penalty as they may deem proper.

(g) In case of the conviction of the Accused on any or all of the charges, the President of the Court shall have a copy of the verdict served upon the Accused, who may, within thirty days after said service, request a new trial on the ground of after-discovered material evidence, upon which motion the President, whether Bishop or Presbyter, may pass. After the lapse of thirty

days from said service, unless a new trial has been granted, the President of the Court, if a Bishop, or, if the President be a Presbyter appointed by the Standing Committee in accordance with Section 3 (a) hereof, the Bishop of another Diocese selected by the Standing Committee in accordance with Section 3 (d) hereof, shall determine the penalty, admonish the Accused, or pronounce sentence of suspension or deposition from the Sacred Ministry, as to him may seem just and proper, as provided in the Canon of the General Convention treating of Sentences and the Publication thereof, and such sentence shall be final. Provided, however, that pending the hearing and determination of an appeal from said sentence, if any be taken, said sentence shall stand suspended.

(h) In case a new trial is granted, a new Trial Court (with the exception of the President) shall be constituted as provided in Section 3 hereof.

Section 5.—Service of citation, notice, or summons.

All notices, citations, summons, or other papers required by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, or by registered mail requiring a return receipt, addressed to the person at his last known place of residence.

The delivery of a written notice or other paper to the party to whom directed, or the leaving of it at his last known place of residence, or the signed receipt by him or member of his family of said notice or other paper sent by registered mail, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

The certificate of such summoner, or said post-office return receipt, if mailed, shall be evidence of the due service of such notice or paper.

Section 6.—The Record.

The record, required by Section 3 (e) of this Canon to be kept by the Clerk, shall consist of

- (1) The Presentment.
- (2) The evidence of service of the Presentment upon the Accused.
- (3) The answer of the Accused to the Presentment, or his written confession of guilt, if any.
- (4) The evidence and all exhibits introduced at the trial.
- (5) The action of the President on all motions made by the Accused or his counsel.
- (6) The verdict and recommendations of the Jury.
- (7) The Sentence.

SECTION 7.—The Appeal.

- (a) Within thirty days from the service upon him of notice of the decision of the Trial Court sustaining in whole or in part the charges set forth in the Presentment the Accused may take an appeal to the Court of Review of the Third Province as provided in the Canon of the General Church dealing with Appeals to the Court of Review.
- (b) From a decision of the Trial Court acquitting the Accused of a charge involving a question of doctrine, faith, or worship an appeal may be taken within thirty days after said decision by the Ecclesiastical Authority to the

Court of Review of the Third Province, as provided in the above Canon of the General Church.

Section 8.—Expenses incident to the trial.

The expenses of the trial—including those incident to inquiry by the Standing Committee or authorized by the Board of Presentment, and also expenses incurred in defending an appeal or in prosecuting an appeal by the Ecclesiastical Authority when such appeal is allowable—shall be defrayed by the Treasurer of the Diocese out of the Contingent Fund upon order of the Council if in session, otherwise upon order of the Committee on Finance.

CANON XXV.

Of Altering or Adding to the Canons.

The Canons of this Diocese may be altered, repealed or added to by the Council; but no proposed repeal or addition to the Canons shall be considered by the Council unless at least one day's notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration, repeal or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a Committee of at least two Presbyters and two Laymen. Nor shall such alteration, repeal or addition be adopted during the same Council if two-thirds of the members present shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration at the next regular meeting of the Council. Unless otherwise provided by the Council, all alterations, repeals or additions to these Canons shall become effective upon the adjournment of the meeting of the Council at which final action thereon shall be taken.

ADDENDUM

CERTAIN CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF VESTRIES AND THE LAY PEOPLE: SELECTED BY
THE BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE, AND PUBLISHED HERE BY
ORDER OF THE COUNCIL.

CANON 20.

Of the Filling of Vacant Cures.

Section 1. When a Parish or Congregation becomes vacant the Churchwardens or other proper officers shall notify the fact to the Bishop. If the authorities of the Parish shall for thirty days have failed to make provision for the services, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to take such measures as he may deem expedient for the temporary maintenance of Divine services therein.

Section 2. No election of a Rector shall be had until the name of the Clergyman whom it is proposed to elect has been made known to the Bishop, if there be one, and sufficient time, not exceeding thirty days, has been given to him to communicate with the Vestry thereon.

Section 3. Written notice of the election, signed by the Church-wardens, shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. If the Ecclesiastical Authority be satisfied that the person so chosen is a duly qualified Minister, and that he has accepted the office, the notice shall be sent to the Secretary of the Convention, who shall record it. And such record shall be sufficient evidence of the relation between the Minister and the Parish.

Section 4. A Minister is settled, for all purposes here or elsewhere mentioned in these Canons, who has been engaged permanently by any Parish, according to the rules of said Diocese, or for any term not less than one year.

Section 5. In case of the election of an Assistant Minister, a certificate from the Rector and Wardens shall be sent to the Bishop.

CANON 26.

Of Lay Readers.

Section 1. A competent person ready and desirous to serve the Church in the public services statedly as a Lay Reader must procure from the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or Missionary District a written license. Such license shall not be granted to any but a male communicant of this Church, and must be given for a definite period, not longer than one year, but may be renewed from time to time, or revoked at any time. Such

license may be given for any vacant Parish or Mission, or for a Congregation without a Minister, but where a Presbyter is in charge, his request and recommendation must have been previously signified to the Ecclesiastical Authority. A license shall not be granted for conducting the service in a Congregation without a Minister, which is able and has had reasonable opportunity to secure the services of an ordained Minister. If the Lay Reader be a student in any Theological Seminary, he shall also, before acting as such, obtain the permission of the presiding officer of such institution and of his own Bishop.

Section 2. A Lay Reader shall be subject to the regulations prescribed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and shall not serve in any Diocese other than that in which he is licensed, unless he shall have received a license from the Bishop of the Diocese in which he desires to serve.

Section 3. In all matters relating to the conduct of the service, and to the Sermons or Homilies to be read, he shall conform to the directions of the Minister in charge of the Parish, Congregation, or Mission in which he is serving, and, in all cases, to the directions of the Bishop. He shall read only the Morning and Evening Prayer (omitting the Absolution), the Litany, and the Office for the Burial of the Dead. He shall not deliver sermons or addresses of his own composition, unless, after instruction and examination, he be specially licensed thereto for urgent needs by the Bishop. He shall not wear the dress appropriate to Clergymen ministering in the Congregation.

CANON 43.

Of the Solemnization of Matrimony.

Section 1. Ministers of this Church shall be careful to secure the observance of the law of the State governing the civil contract of marriage in the place where the service shall be performed.

Section 2. (i) No Minister shall solemnize a marriage except in the presence of at least two witnesses.

(ii) Every Minister shall without delay formally record in the proper register the name, age and residence of each party. Such record shall be signed by the Minister who solemnizes the marriage, and if practicable, by the marriage parties, and by at least two witnesses of the marriage.

Section 3. No Minister, knowingly, after due inquiry, shall solemnize the marriage of any person who has been or is the husband or wife of any other person then living, from whom he or she has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage. Nor shall it be lawful for any member of this Church to enter upon a marriage when either of the contracting parties is the husband or the wife of any other person then living from whom he or she has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage. But this Canon shall not be held to apply to the innocent party in a divorce for adultery; *Provided*, that before the application for such remarriage a period of not less than one year shall have elapsed, after the granting of such divorce; and that satisfactory

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evidence touching the facts in the case, including a copy of the court's decree, and record, if practicable, with proof that the defendant was personally served or appeared in the action, be laid before the Ecclesiastical Authority, and such Ecclesiastical Authority, having taken legal advice thereon, shall have declared in writing that in his judgment the case of the applicant conforms to the requirements of this Canon; and *Provided*, *further*, that it shall be within the discretion of any minister to decline to solemnize any marriage.

Section 4. If any Minister of this Church shall have reasonable cause to think that a person desirous of being admitted to Holy Baptism, or to Confirmation, or to the Holy Communion, has been married otherwise than as the Word of God and discipline of this Church allow such Minister, before receiving such person to these ordinances, shall refer the case to the Bishop, for his godly judgment thereupon; *Provided*, *however*, that no Minister shall in any case refuse these ordinances to a penitent person in imminent danger of death.

CANON 49.

Of the Music of the Church.

It shall be the duty of every Minister to appoint for use in his Congregation hymns or anthems from those authorized by the Rubrics, and, with such assistance as he may see fit to employ from persons skilled in music, to give order concerning the tunes to be sung in his Church. It shall be his especial duty to suppress all light and unseemly music, and all irreverence in the performance.

CANON 50.

Of the Consecration of Churches.

Section 1. No church or chapel shall be consecrated until the Bishop shall have been sufficiently certified that the building and the grounds on which it is erected have been fully paid for, and are free from lien or other incumbrance; and also that such building and ground are secured from the danger of alienation, either in whole or in part, from those who profess and practice the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of this Church, except in the cases provided for in Secs. 2 and 3 of this Canon.

Section 2. It shall not be lawful for any Vestry, Trustees, or other body authorized by law of any State or Territory to hold property for any Diocese, Parish, or Congregation, to encumber or alienate any consecrated church or chapel, or any church or chapel which has been used solely for Divine Service, belonging to the Parish or Congregation which they represent, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

Section 3. No consecrated church or chapel shall be removed, taken down, or otherwise disposed of for any worldly or common use, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

Other Provisions of the General Canons.

A person applying to the Standing Committee for recommendation to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders, or for ordination to the Diaconate, or the Priesthood, must present a certificate of his character and fitness signed by the Vestry of the Parish to which he belongs. Canons 2, 7, 8. (Therefore, when a Rector has recommended a postulant to the Bishop as a fit person to study for the ministry, said Rector should report the fact to his Vestry; and the Vestry should be careful to become acquainted with the postulant, that they may intelligently indorse him.)

If a Bishop shall for three years have declined to visit a Parish or Congregation, the Vestry (in this Diocese including the Rector), may apply to the Presiding Bishop for a Council of Conciliation, to be composed of the five Bishops living nearest the Diocese. Canon 18, Sec. 2 (ii).

In case there be no Minister in charge of a congregation—"No Churchwardens, Vestrymen, or Trustees of the Congregation, shall permit any person to officiate therein, without sufficient evidence of his being duly licensed or ordained to minister in this Church." Canon 23.

It shall be the duty of the Vestry or Church-wardens having charge of the Parish Register, in a vacant Parish, to exhibit it to the Bishop on the occasion of his visitation. Canon 21, Sec. 2 (iii).

A Vestry has the privilege of refusing its consent to the resignation of its Rector. Canon 42. Sec. 1.

A Vestry desiring for urgent reasons a separation and dissolution of pastoral relations with its Rector, may, if the parties be not agreed, give notice thereof in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority, who will act in the premises. Canon 42. Sec. 2.

Lay Delegates to the Diocesan Council are called upon to sign a testimonial for a person whom they elect Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor. Canon 13, Sec. 1 (1).

Lay Delegates may also be called upon to take part in placing the Diocese under the provisional charge of the Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor of another Diocese. Canon 18, Sec. 6 (ii).

A person applying to be appointed Deaconess must lay before the Bishop a testimonial of fitness, signed by twelve lay communicants, six of whom shall be women, as a prerequisite to her appointment to that function. Canon 24, Sec. 3.

A communicant in good standing, removing from one Parish or Congregation to another, is entitled to a certificate that he or she is a communicant. Canon 44, Sec. 3.

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
