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FORMS FOR MAKING BEQUEST

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

If it is the desire to create a new fund for any church purpose, such as is authorized by the charter of the said corporation, it will be prudent to communicate with the said corporation through its officers.

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is. "Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia."

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia."

The legal title of the Episcopal High School is "Protestant Episcopal High School in Virginia."

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia."

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia," a corporation chartered under the laws of Virginia.

The legal title of the Blue Ridge Industrial School is: "The Blue Ridge Industrial School, Incorporated,"

The legal title of St. Agnes' School, Alexandria, is: "St. Agnes' Episcopal School for Girls, Incorporated."

The legal title of the Colored Divinity School in Petersburg is: "The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia."

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

RULES OF ORDER

ORGANIZATION

FROM CANON I, SECTION 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case *de novo*.

RULES OF ORDER

1st. The Council shall be opened with prayer.

2d. After the call to order no member shall remain standing nor afterward stand, except to address the chair.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

3d. After the organization of the Council, the following order of business shall be observed:

Report of Secretary.

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Election of a Secretary.

The adoption of rules of order.

The reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

The reading of pastoral addresses. The appointment of committees. Report of standing committees. Communications from Convocations. Report of special committees.

Unfinished business.

4th. There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council, the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

A Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the address of the Bishop on the opening of the Council.

A Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

A Committee on New Parishes.

A Committee on Dispatch of Business.

And the chairmen of all the above committees, and so many of the other members of the said committees as the President may think proper, may be appointed at each Council for the next Council.

5th. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention, shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

6th. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; and all resolutions shall be referred to their proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

7th. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

8th. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

9th. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.

10th. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

11th. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present. It shall be in this form: "Shall the main

Rules of Order

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question now be put?" and until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

12th. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

13th. When a member desires to speak in debate, or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality.

14th. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

15th. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

16th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

17th. The vote on all questions shall be taken by ayes and noes, whenever five members require it.

18th. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

19th. Every member who may be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

20th. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

21st. Upon a division and count of the Council on any question, no member shall be counted who is not within the limits assigned as seats to the members.

22d. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority; *Provided*, such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

23d. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported upon by the Finance Committee, or, in their absence, by a special committee.

24th. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall so direct, without objection, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

25th. When the business of the Council shall demand it, the President may appoint a Special Committee on Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, etc. And the Committee may report at any time.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

26th. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

27th. The President shall, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

28th. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

29th. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

JOURNAL

OF THE

144th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia

CHRIST CHURCH, CHARLOTTESVILLE,

Wednesday, May 10, 1939.

The 144th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia convened on this date in Christ Church, Charlottesville. The opening service of Morning Prayer was conducted at 10:00 o'clock by the Rt. Rev. F. D. Goodwin, D. D., the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, D. D., rector of the church, and the Rev. B. D. Chambers, dean of the Rappahannock Valley Convocation.

After the close of the service the Council was called to order by Bishop Goodwin, who, in absence of the Secretary of the Diocese, called both the roll of the clergy and the roll of the lay delegates of the Diocese. Fifty-nine clergy and sixty-six lay delegates having answered to their names, the Chair declared a quorum present and the Council open for business.

The Chair appointed the Rev. Dudley A. Boogher, Dr. Ivey F. Lewis and Mr. Christopher Green as a Committee on Credentials of Lay Delegates.

The Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, D. D., was nominated for re-election as Secretary of the Diocese. The nominations were closed and Dr. Brydon unanimously re-elected. Bishop Goodwin announced for Dr. Brydon the appointment of the Rev. W. Francis Allison and the Rev. Albert C. Muller as Assistant Secretaries.

The Rev. Dr. Gibson welcomed the Council to Christ Church, moved adoption of the Rules of Order of the last Council and

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of the printed program as the agenda. This motion was carried.

Bishop Tucker, having arrived, asked Bishop Goodwin to read first his Annual Address to the Council.

Bishop Goodwin prefaced his address to Council with the following commemoration of deceased clergy:

JACOB HALLER GIBBONEY.

Mr. Gibboney's ministry represented a life of devoted service that serious ill health could interrupt but not terminate. When in 1931, after five years of retirement as one totally disabled by the Pension Fund's ruling, he felt a measure of return to normal health, he happily began a new period of service in Tappahannock. Within three years he was forced again into retirement, and had just bought a home some four years later among his former parishioners when one night preparing a sermon that he hoped to preach the following day to his friends in Tappahannock the call to a life of higher service came suddenly. A devoted pastor, an excellent preacher, a true friend, a worthy Priest of the Church.

PHILIP AUGUSTUS ARTHUR.

Denied many of the formal educational advantages that are the privilege of most clergymen, and forced by circumstances to enter the business world, Mr. Arthur, first as a layman, then through a diaconate of twelve years, and finally as a priest for fourteen years of active service, and seven years retired, showed a will to serve in the ministry that could not be denied. His rectorship of fourteen years at the Church of the Ascension was crowned by that Church's assuming at the end of his rectorship a self-supporting status. He gave all his talents to his Master's service, from Him to receive a faithful servant's reward.

CHURCHILL GIBSON CHAMBERLAYNE, PH. D.

(Bishop Tucker's Tribute as printed in "The Pine Needle", St. Christopher's School Student Publication.)

The epitaph of Sir Christopher Wren, the famous English architect who designed St. Paul's Cathedral—si monumentum requiris, circumspice—"If you seek his monument, look around," might well be applied to Dr. Churchill Gibson Chamberlayne. Like Sir Christopher, Dr. Chamberlayne, was a builder, but the material to which he gave shape was human life rather than brick and stone. One

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can look around among the younger men of this generation, and find hundreds the quality of whose minds and characters bear eloquent testimony to the value of the training given by Dr. Chamberlayne in St. Christopher's School.

No influence is more far-reaching than that of a truly great teacher. Virginia has been singularly fortunate in having had for several generations a group of teachers who, like Arnold of Rugby, inspired the boys who were trained under them with love of culture and high moral ideals. Those who were at the University of Virginia in the eighties and nineties of the last century will remember the enthusiasm and the daily influence and tutelage of such a person. It was this spirit that created the atmosphere of the whole school and bound the faculty and students into a loyal comradeship.

This same spirit was demonstrated not only in the classroom, but quite as much in intramural contests and on the athletic fields. The manner in which the boys entered and conducted such contests made the hearts of the parents swell with pride. The victories were taken with modest elation—the defeats with a smile, and a hand of hearty congratulations to the winners. It was true sportsmanship which can only come from a real sense of justice and fair play.

Dr. Chamberlayne loved his boys and his boys loved him. They were individuals to him, not merely groups gathered for instruction. He made every effort to know each one's characteristics so that he would be able to aid him more readily with his problems.

They were "his boys" even after their school days. He kept in contact with them in the colleges in which they enrolled. He secured their grades and always found time to write and admonish them about their studies, urging them on to greater efforts if he thought them capable of better work. He also took a keen interest in their success after their school and college lays were over.

St. Christopher's School stands out as a monument to Dr. Chamberlayne. The records of the school and the honors won by its graduates in the different colleges, both in scholastic work and as leaders among their associates, testify to his wonderful influence.

"The measure of a man is not the number of his servants, but the number of people whom he serves."

Dr. Chamberlayne is resting from his labors, and one can appreciate the fullness of his life by contemplating the great number of young men in whom he labored to instill the love of truth and righteousness, as well as culture and knowledge, and to make men of courage to carry on to other generations the high principles for which he stood.

Dr. Chamberlayne's boys have a great heritage which will remain with them in the years to come.

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Their parents rejoice in the fact that their boys were also "his boys".

BISHOP GOODWIN'S ADDRESS

For the first time in many years the Council of the Diocese is meeting without the guiding hand of its Secretary at the helm. In that capacity and also as Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, Dr. Brydon has been, as we all recognize, of the greatest value, taking excellent care of the secretarial responsibilities of the Council and presenting year by year the report of the Missionary Society. Finishing, as we hope, a thorough cure during a two months' leave of absence recently granted him, it falls to my lot, in Dr. Brydon's absence, to present the report of the activities of the Diocesan Missionary Society. But, first, I would report on the clerical changes that have taken place within the Diocese.

An unusually large number of clergy have left the Diocese for work elsewhere and not many have come in yet to take their place. There has been quite an exodus to the Diocese of Ohio. First, the Rector of St. Paul's, Richmond, was consecrated Bishop Co-adjutor of Ohio, and our great loss was their great gain. But that wasn't all. Soon Bishop Beverley Tucker called the Rector of the Church of the Ascension, Rev. B. B. Comer Lile, to be his Canon Missioner. Then, this Spring, Rev. Pembroke Reed resigned his work at Grace Church, Goochland, and at St. Paul's, Richmond, to follow the western trek. And now still another, Rev. R. B. Campbell, Rector of Kingston Parish, Mathews County, is going in a few days as Rector to Steubenville, Ohio. Virginia wants the Church in Ohio to prosper, but is beginning to wonder just what price we will have to pay. The Rev. E. V. Stires has gone from All Saints Church, Richmond, to Waco, Texas; the Rev. Charles Leavell from Washington and Montross Parishes to Southwestern Virginia; the Rev. Herbert Pateman to the Diocese of California, and the Rev. F. D. Pike to the Diocese of West Virginia. The Rev. E. W. Mellichampe, working temporarily at Lynnwood, Va., terminated his stay May 1st, and the Rev. H. L. Doll becomes Rector of Trinity Church, Houston, Texas, on July 1st. The Rev. E. B. Guerry has also left Tappahannock and gone to St. Luke's Church, Salisbury, N. C.

Our oldest clergyman in point of service, yet one of our youngest as far as vigor, mind and spirit goes, the honored Missioner of the Diocese, Rev. Nelson P. Dame, retired from active service on January 1st. Sixty-one years in the active ministry, Mr. Dame's name first appeared on the clergy list in 1878. In that Council he was a member of a group of the clergy, the ministry of one of whom went back to 1833. So. Mr. Dame forms for us, with this one other clergyman, a living link over this long span well back into the Episcopate of Bishop Moore—just twenty years after the young Deacon, William Meade, returning from the vain attempt to hold a Council in Monumental Church, Richmond, had heard the words, "Lost, lost, lost,", ringing in his ears, as he thought, ringing the doom of the Episcopal Church in Virginia. Our Diocese keeps young in the perennial youth of such men as Nelson Page Dame.

Within the Diocese the changes have been few. Rev. S. S. Spathey has relinquished charge of the Church of the Messiah, Highland Springs, and the Church of Our Saviour, Sandston, keeping his work in Varina Parish and as assistant at St. Paul's Church, Richmond; and the Rev. Louis D. Tucker, formerly of Grace Church, Berryville, has taken charge of the work at Highland Springs and Sandston.

From the Diocese of West Virginia, the Rev. C. R. Dawson has been transferred to this Diocese. Mr. Dawson has charge of the colored work in the Charlottesville-Gordonsville area. In June, the Rev. Vincent C. Franks, formerly rector of Grace Church, Berryville, comes from St. Stephen's Church, Philadelphia, to the Rectorship of St. Paul's, Richmond. Of the Deacons ordained last June, Rev. A. Hume Cox has been stationed in Rivanna Parish, Fluvanna County, and also has had charge of Trinity Church, Louisa; the Rev. Marshall M. Milton has been minister in charge of Upper Truro Parish and the Rev. J. Winfree Smith in charge of Ivy Parish. There are now ten vacant parishes or churches in the Diocese.

During the past year the Diocesan Missionary Society has continued its support of our clerical and lay missionaries in the Rural Field, the Archdeaconery of the Blue Ridge and in the Colored Convocation. Also there has continued the regular support to the Blue Ridge Industrial School and to the work among the students at the University of Virginia. This latter work, and that of St. Paul's Church with which it is connected, have so increased that it is necessary to give the Rector of St. Paul's an assistant, who will probably be our one graduate from the Seminary next month. But it is encouraging that the growth of this work demands more man power, and that the members of St. Paul's are endeavoring to raise the amount necessary for the assistant's salary without help from the Diocese. This is a work regularly increasing in importance and strength, and the rector and people deserve the appreciation of the Diocese.

The Diocesan Missionary Society closed the year 1938 with a balance of \$395.88. Even with this, it must be remembered that there are salaries among the clergy and lay workers that have not been restored since the first cut some six years ago. The Diocesan

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Program Budget closed with a deficit of \$5,229. This net deficit was, of course, paid out of the first receipts of 1939 and represents the larger part of the amount that we are now endeavoring to secure by the Easter-Whitsunday effort. The financial situation of the Diocese emerges now, year by year, in a fairly consistent pattern. The income from parish acceptances and invested funds is about \$103,000.00. The necessary expenditures are about \$115,000.00, which would include the payment of the previous year's deficit. If we can close one year without such a deficit, we will be able to do just that much more for the missionary work of our Diocese and our missionaries elsewhere.

The financial problem, which we find attending the January meeting of the Executive Committee meeting every year is to close that gap between \$103,000.00 and \$115,000.00, or else reduce our work. Not being willing to reduce our work or to cut salaries further, the Executive Committee optimistically appeals to the Diocese for a special offering at Easter or Whitsunday, and the Diocese responds loyally, and seemingly in exact proportion to the vigor with which the offering is pushed by the Executive Committee and the other leaders in the Diocese. We have gotten as much as \$25,000.00. We have fallen back to less than \$4,000.00.

Personally I am in favor of such a voluntary offering. The quota system on which we work demands something of the sort. But what a glorious thing it would be if this voluntary offering year by year could go to increase the missionary work-to strengthen and expand it! Under our present Canon, if the total acceptances do not equal the total Budget, it is the duty of the Executive Committee to inform the people of the Diocese as to the facts and to take such steps as it shall deem best to meet the situation. This has been done regularly, year by year. But I suggest that it might be well for the Council, when it adopts the Budget for next year, 1940, to express its mind on the matter of an Easter-Whitsunday offering, so that the Executive Committee may feel that they have back of them the expressed purpose of the Diocese to pursue its missionary work both through regular and voluntary channels, to the end that our present work may not only be maintained, but consistently advanced. It seems to me that especially in these days of constant emergency in all walks of life, it is impossible to budget twelve or eighteen months ahead all the needs that may arise in the work of a missionary church.

In regard to the Easter-Whitsunday offering or effort for this year, we have set our goal at a minimum of \$10,000.00. The National Church, in approximating its goal of \$300,000.00 as recently reported, counted in the sum of \$5,000.00 from this Diocesse. No pledge has been made, but assurance has been given that such an expectation

will be realized from the National Church's share of our Easter-Whitsunday offering. In our final effort at Whitsunday we must make this assurance good. And our own Diocese will need, according to present computations, nearer \$7,000.00 than \$5,000.00 to balance its own operating budget for this year. The response of those churches that took their offering Easter was most encouraging, but there remains the greater part of the sum to be raised by the final effort on Whitsunday. To meet fully this emergency, to balance our budget is the duty imperatively before us at this time.

But as Bishop Tucker has explained to us, our fundamental problem is not just year by year to meet emergency situations by emergency offerings, but rather to broaden the basis of our regular support by larger acceptances from parishes to the Diocese, and from the Diocese to the General Church. This is the real problem of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society through its Field Board, and we count upon the loyal cooperation of clergy and vestries in attaining this end.

Shall we continue our Easter-Whitsunday offering as a supplement to the Fall campaign effort?

How can we say to sufferers of man's wrath in war or nature's victims in earthquake or disaster, "We are sorry, but your emergency need was not anticipated in our carefully formulated budget"? The work of a living Church just cannot be carried on solely through carefully prepared plans and balanced budgets. The call is to take up the cross daily and not just during the Every-Member Canvass.

For as great as is the desirability of a balanced budget, it may also present a grave danger. If a balanced budget should for one moment mean a satisfaction with our present efforts, or a slackening of our endeavor, then it would have defeated the only purpose that justifies its existence. We must think and act, not in terms of \$115, 000.00 in red ink is equalled by \$115,000.00 in black ink; but rather in the measure of the New Testament vision—"Until the kingdoms of this world become the kingdom of our Lord."

We must not let ourselves forget that here in our Diocese there are needs for the work of the Church disclosed in Stafford and adjoining counties that were uncovered by a survey of this section of the Diocese some six years ago; but needs which we have not yet been able to meet.

There are certain signs of encouragement evident in the Diocesan life. There is a steady, but a very slow growth in the number of communicants year by year. 1,117, 1,123, 1,131, is the record of the last three years. Virginia with a percentage of slightly over five per cent, stands about one-third of the way from the top in the list of Dioceses in the proportion of confirmations to communicant strength.

Why are we not among the leaders? Why should Maine and California, Long Island, Fond du Lac and Florida, and many others be ahead of us? It is a challenge both to our missionary zeal and to our parish system, which we sometimes boast covers the Diocese like the dew. No foot of territory that is not in some clergyman's cure; yet there are thousands and thousands within the limits of the Diocese that are not members of any Christian church. And a surprisingly large number of our candidates for confirmation come from other denominations. Primarily we are not interested in numbers. Certainly we are opposed to the presentation of candidates for confirmation unless they are as well prepared as the ability of the clergyman and the exigencies of particular circumstances will permit. But in the midst of unshepherded thousands there is the constant challenge to seek every creature.

Among the laymen there is a most gratifying increase of interest, both in the spread of their laymen's organization and in making themselves more effective in parish and Diocesan life. To avail ourselves of and to develop this growing movement is one of the great opportunities before us and one that when properly harnessed should go a long way towards solving the financial problems of the Diocese.

Last Fall there was held at Shrine Mont a Clergy Conference. under the auspices of the Field Board. It was felt that such a conference was helpful, both as a means of acquainting the clergy with the plans for the Fall Campaign and also as an opportunity to hear such talks as were given last year by Dr. Dunn and Dr. Lowery, This year it is planned to hold the conference two days, having the attendance on the second day voluntary, but affording a larger opportunity for lectures and discussions. The dates for this gathering have been set for September 25-27. It is also planned to offer at some three or four places in the Diocese during the pre-Lenten season Quiet Days in preparation for our special responsibilities for that season. For there is ever present with us the danger that in the absorption of ourselves in our daily parochial task we may miss the true perspective of our work, and the freshness of mind and spirit that can only be gained when we come apart and rest awhile. Surely our corporate life as clergy in a Diocesan Fellowship must find expression not only in meetings and campaigns, but also and more importantly in days spent together in study, in prayer, and in meditation.

Bishop Tucker gave his Annual Address without manuscript. He expressed his gratitude to Bishop Goodwin for the splendid leadership which he has given the Diocese and for the way in which he has so efficiently shouldered the extra work falling on him since the duties of the office of Presiding Bishop take Bishop Tucker so much from the Diocese. The Bishop felt that at no time has the work in the Diocese progressed so well as it has done in the past year. He paid warm tribute to Dr. Brydon, whose recent illness compelled him to be absent from the Council.

The Bishop touched on the missionary crisis in the Church and stated that a permanent solution depends upon finding a greater number of givers. As far as our own Diocese is concerned, contributions to the support of the Diocesan program should be increased by at least \$10,000. He also noted with satisfaction the new and growing feeling of responsibility on the part of the men of the Church. His address ended on a note sounding the need for unity in the Church to face the world today.

Bishop Goodwin presented the lists of confirmations in 1938 and other official acts of the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor. (See Appendix A for these reports.)

Bishop Goodwin invited to the chancel the Rt. Rev. Beverley D. Tucker, Jr., D. D., Bishop of Ohio, who was escorted by Mr. W. Frank Powers and Mr. Frederick E. Nolting. The Bishop of Ohio spoke briefly and resumed his former position with the lay delegates from Richmond.

Bishop Tucker took the chair and appointed

The Rev. Robert B. Nelson proposed an amendment to Canon IX, Section 5, to change the name of the Board of Christian Social Service to conform with the new name of this department in the National Council.

The Rev. Albert C. Muller proposed an amendment to Canon IX, Section 5, to incorporate the work of the Board of Publicity with the Field Board.

Mr. J. J. Leake proposed an amendment to Canon XVIII.

All these proposed amendments were referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. Sanford L. Rotter presented a communication from the Valley Convocation asking the Council to memorialize the State Legislature to bring marriage laws of the State of Virginia into conformity with such laws of surrounding States. Mr. John B. Minor moved that the Chair appoint a Committee on Resolutions. This was carried. The Chair appointed this committee as follows: Rev. Robert A. Goodwin, Rev. Paul D. Bowden and Mr. W. H. Wellford.

Mr. Minor presented resolutions dealing with the same subject as that contained in the communication from the Valley Convocation. These were all referred to the above named committee.

The Rev. B. M. Boyd presented a resolution pertaining to the use of the term, "Diocesan Center" in connection with the estate of the late Annie Rose Walker, and moved that it be referred to a special committee.

This was carried. The Chair appointed on this committee: Mr. John B. Minor, Hon. E. Hugh Smith, Mr. James M. Lewis, Rev. B. M. Boyd, Rev. B. D. Chambers.

The Rev. Mr. Boyd presented the proposed budget of the Diocese for the year 1940, and moved that it be referred to a Committee on the Budget. This was carried.

The Chair appointed on this committee: Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., Rev. Robert B. Nelson, Rev. Peyton R. Williams, Rev. Beverley T. White, Mr. W. Frank Powers, Dr. Ivey F. Lewis, Mr. J. J. Leake and Mr. C. T. Hudson.

Bishop Goodwin presented the reports of Dr. Brydon as Treasurer of the Diocese, of the Board of Apportionment, of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia and of the Church Extension Committee. (See Appendix B for these reports.)

The report of the Trustees of the Funds was then referred to the Committee on Invested Funds.

The Rev. Paul D. Bowden moved the following:

Resolved, That the Sixth Rule of Order as listed in the Journal be dropped from the Rules of Order and the numbers of the other rules be changed to conform.

COMMITTEE ON ADDITIONAL EPISCOPAL ASSISTANCE.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

On page 35 of the Council Journal for 1938 the purpose of your committee is stated as follows:

"Bishop Tucker spoke of the necessity of securing additional Episcopal asistance for visitations in this Diocese because of his duties as Presiding Bishop, and suggested that a committee be appointed to consider how the work of the Diocese can best be carried on during his term of office as Presiding Bishop. A motion was made that a committee be appointed to consider this subject."

Your committee has held two meetings, in addition to many personal conferences, and submits the following report:

Bishop Tucker is giving a number of Sundays to the Diocese this year, and expects to be able to continue to do so. Bishop Goodwin needs assistance in caring for the rest of the visitations. especially if he continues to make almost all of these on Sundays. He is driving about two hundred miles a Sunday, and preaching three or four times. His weeks are crowded, and, especially during the illness of Dr. Brydon and Mr. Phillips, he has too much office work to do.

It has been suggested that we elect a Suffragan Bishop. Your committee does not favor the election of a Suffragan unless he could relieve Bishop Goodwin of other duties besides visitations. We do not feel that an older man would offer the kind of relief needed, and are not ready to elect a man younger than Bishop Goodwin, who would naturally aspire to the office of coadjutor, and almost compel the resignation of Bishop Tucker on his return to the Diocese in five years.

We feel that it would be more satisfactory to have Council approve the engagement of some available Bishop, preferably Bishop Robert C. Jett, for a requisite number of Sundays to care for the visitations year by year, as such an approval would allow our Bishops to feel free to send him anywhere in the Diocese for Confirmations.

We feel that such a plan, together with the appointment of an Associate Archdeacon for the colored work and adequate assistance in the office, will meet our needs.

We would like to see a sum of money to the sum of \$4,000, or as much thereof as may be provided by Finance Committee, allocated from the Contingent Fund for the purpose of providing Episcopal or other assistance for the Bishop Coadjutor, and thus make money available for providing any kind of assistance Bishop Goodwin may need.

COMMITTEE APPOINTED AT THE COUNCIL OF 1938 TO CON-SIDER A PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL CHURCH.

To the 144th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia: GENTLEMEN:

The Secretary of the General Convention reported to our Diocesan Council of 1938 that one amendment to the Constitution had been acted on at the Council of the General Convention of 1937, and will have to be finally acted upon at the General Convention of 1940. This proposed amendment is as follows:

To amend Article XI of the Constitution by inserting into it requirement that all alterations and amendments of the Constitution must be reported to the Convocations of all Missionary Districts within the boundaries of the United States as well as to the Conventions or Councils of the various Dioceses.

This has not been the case heretofore and your committee are in favor of the proposed amendment, as we think that in as much as every Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States has the right to a limited representation in the General Convention it should also have the privilege of being informed officially of any proposed changes in the Constitution.

The Article as amended reads as follows:

Article XI. "No alteration or amendment of this Constitution shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed at one triennial meeting of the General Convention and by a resolve thereof be sent to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese and of the Convocation of every Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or the Missionary District Convocation at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding triennial meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses and of all the Missionary Districts within the boundaries of the United States entitled to representation in the House of Deputies voting by orders."

The Council adjourned for lunch.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, MAY 10, 2:30 O'CLOCK.

The Council was called to order, Bishop Tucker presiding. Mr. Blake T. Newton asked the privilege of making a further nomination, and presented the name of the Rev. L. Carter Harrison as a clerical deputy to the Synod.

The Rev. R. Cary Montague, D. D., was also nominated as a clerical deputy to the Synod.

A motion by the Rev. F. L. Robinson to reconsider the motion abolishing the Rule of Order pertaining to Wednesday night of Council was lost.

Mr. Newton moved the referring to a special committee the matter of drawing up suitable resolutions on the passing of the late Rosewell Page, Sr. This was carried, and the Chair appointed Bishop Goodwin, Rev. J. P. H. Mason, Rev. S. B. Chilton, Mr. B. T. Newton, Justice George L. Browning as the committee.

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Mr. J. J. Leake moved the following:

Resolved, That a committee be appointed by the Bishop to consider the advisability of the guaranty by the Diocese of mortgage loans made by the several congregations therein, and that such committee report to the next meeting of the Council.

This was carried, and the Chair appointed Messrs. E. R. Williams, J. Jordan Leake and W. W. Beverley as the committee. (See additional members appointed later, below.)

The Rev. H. G. Lane made the report of the

COMMITTEE ON PROPOSED NEW CANON TO FIX DURATION OF SERVICE OF THE RECTOR OF A CURE.

Resolved, That, first, this committee be continued for another year; second, that the matter covered by this proposed Canon become a subject of discussion among any organized group of laymen within the Diocese during the year; third, that any conclusions reached by such groups be reported to the Chairman of this committee.

This report was adopted.

The Rev. Robert B. Nelson presented extracts from the Minutes of the Committee on Clergy Placement of the Third Province. On motion this was referred to the committee mentioned above.

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE COMMITTEE ON CLERGY PLACEMENT OF THE THIRD PROVINCE.

Committee: The Rev. Philip C. Pearson, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Wyatt Brown, the Rev. Robert B. Nelson, Mr. W. H. Howard, Mr. Spencer Ervin, the Rev. George H. Toop.

Be it *Resolved*, That this committee recommend to the Province the establishment as soon as convenient of a Clergy Placement Bureau of the Third Province under the direction for the time being of the Secretary of the Province. 3. *Resolved*, That this committee further recommend the establishment throughout the Third Province of diocesan placement bureaus, the secretary of which shall gather the information blanks of the clergy and forward the same to the proper provincial officer, and the adoption in each Diocese of canons providing substantially as follows:

a. There shall be a Placement Committee consisting of the Bishop of the Diocese, together with three Presbyters and three laymen to be elected annually by the Diocesan Convention.

b. In the case of a vacancy in the rectorship of any parish it shall be the duty of the vestry to nominate to the Placement Committee a clergyman in good standing in this church for election as rector, who, with the advice of the said committee, may be elected.

c. If the nomination of the vestry is not approved by the Placement Committee, the Placement Committee shall nominate at least three clergymen to the vestry for election as rector, and if none of these are satisfactory to the vestry, this procedure shall continue until a rector is chosen by the vestry.

d. In case of a vacancy occurring in a Mission, the Bishop shall advise with the Placement Committee in making an appointment.

e. On petition from a Minister, or a vestry, or on its own initiative, the Placement Committee shall give a hearing to the parties interested, and at least six months must elapse before action becomes effective. Whenever a rectorship shall be terminated under the provisions of this paragraph, it shall become the duty of the Bishop of the Diocese or Missionary District in which such rector is canonically resident, to secure for him other work, within his jurisdiction or elsewhere, if possible.

4. This committee recommends to the Executive Councils of the several Dioceses the consideration of the above proposals in advance of putting them into final form for submission to the next meeting of the Synod of the Province.

APPENDIX.

Proposed Form of Call to the Rectorship of a Parish.

The Vestry of (Parish, Church) hereby call the Rev. to the rectorship of said (Parish, Church) at a salary of per year, payable monthly (or) with (or without) use of rectory and payment of pension premium. Said call to continue until dissolved by mutual consent or at the arbitration and decision of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

The present members of the Committee on Church Property were, on motion, re-elected.

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Justice George L. Browning was nominated to the vacancy on the Diocesan Committee on the Church Pension Fund, together with present members, and they were duly elected.

The Bishop-Coadjutor nominated the Rev. Samuel B. Chilton and the Rev. W. Leigh Ribble as examining chaplains of the Diocese.

These nominations were, on motion, confirmed by the Council.

The Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, D. D., was unanimously reelected Treasurer of the Diocese by a rising vote.

The Rev. Dr. Brydon was elected Statistician of the Diocese.

Mr. John B. Mordecai and Mr. Archibald B. Robertson were nominated to fill the vacancy on the Board of Trustees of Stuart Hall. By rising vote Mr. Mordecai was nominated to succeed himself.

Dr. Douglas VanderHoof and Mr. W. W. Beverley were nominated to the Board of Church Schools of the Diocese.

Mr. James M. Ball and Mr. Edmund Strudwick were nominated to the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

The following were nominated to the Board of the Blue Ridge Industrial School: Messrs. Langhorne Gibson, John J. Morrison, Blake T. Newton and the Rev. D. A. Boogher.

The Rev. C. J. Gibson presented the report of the Committee on the Proposed Budget for 1940. The committee recommended the raising of the item for the General Church to \$28,150. The Rev. W. L. Ribble offered an amendment to increase the item for the Virginia Churchman to \$600. This amendment carried. The budget, totaling \$119,870 as amended, was then adopted by the Council.

Justice George L. Browning, representing the vestry of St. Thomas' Church, Orange, invited the Council to meet with that congregation in 1940.

This invitation was accepted by a rising vote.

Mr. Minor reported for the Committee on the Diocesan Center, and recommended adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, the late Annie Rose Walker in her will devised and bequeathed to certain Trustees her country estate, "Roslyn", near the city of Richmond, together with a generous endowment for the same, as a trust "for the establishment, development and maintenance of a Diocesan Center for the Diocese of Virginia of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America"; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia hereby grants to the aforesaid Trustees the right to use the name, "Diocesan Center", to designate the real property conveyed by this bequest so long as the said property is used for Diocesan purposes.

This was adopted.

Mr. Minor moved the following:

Resolved. That the Chancellor of the Diocese be requested to report in writing to the Bishop, to be filed with other valuable papers of the Diocese, his legal opinion as to the legal rights of the Diocese in the real estate devised by the will of the late Annie Rose Walker, of Richmond, "for the establishment, development and maintenance of a Diocesan Center for the Diocese of Virginia, etc.".

This was carried.

Bishop Goodwin called attention to the fact that the report of the Executive Committee was incorporated in his Annual Address.

The Rev. B. M. Boyd presented the report of the Field Board. (See Appendix A, Section III, for these reports.)

Archdeacon W. R. Mason presented the report of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge by title. He then read the report of Archdeacon Neve.

The report of the Board of Colored Work was presented by the Rev. Aston Hamilton, Secretary of the Board, in the absence of the Archdeacon of Colored Work.

The Rev. Thomas D. Brown, President of the Colored Convocation, presented a supplementary report.

The report of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education

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was presented to each member of the Council in mimeographed form. The Chairman read certain portions of the report and recommended that the full report be read carefully by the members.

The Rev. B. D. Chambers presented the

REPORT OF THE FORWARD MOVEMENT COMMISSION.

The first statement to be made in this report is that the publications of the National Commission are increasing both in number and excellence. "Forward—Day by Day" is receiving more commendation and meeting a hearty response not only in our own but *other* communions.

Despite the high standard of this devotional literature an *increased* number of people in this Diocese *fail* to receive it. Twenty prominent churches (not to mention smaller parishes and missions) do *not* subscribe to this venture of faith on the part of the general Church. We know not where the fault may lie, but do earnestly recommend that an urgent effort be made to procure and distribute this timely and efficient help to those who need it.

The Commission realizes that the *power* required in this country at large in its present dilemma is not "horse-power" but "man-power", and is suggesting plans to harness this unused power and connect it with the many objects which need development. Definite programs for laymen's activities are being formulated to put into action this latent force and make it a *real* potential power not only in the Church but the community.

These suggestions adopted by your committee and recommended for use in this Diocese are here appended; criticism as well as cooperation is cordially invited.

Recommendations for Committees on Lay Work.

1. To arouse laymen of the Church to a fuller active cooperation in the building of the Kingdom of God on earth.

2. To have laymen acknowledge their responsibility to participating not only in the devotional but the active life of the Church, such as study and Bible classes and the several Conferences.

3. To place before laymen the importance of studying and understanding the Church's Program, the Diocesan Program and the Parish Program, and to participate in disseminating this information and securing support of these Programs through the Every Member Canvass.

4. To bring laymen to a realization of the opportunity which frequently presents itself for cooperation with the clergy in forming Confirmation classes and attendance at the Church schools; to keep boys of the Church in close contact with the Church and to engage actively in parochial and Diocesan social service work.

5. To enlist with the advice and recommendation of the rector the services of carefully chosen laymen to act as lay readers and thereby fill a great need in the Church.

6. To sponsor, with the advice and consent of the rector, Preaching Missions in order to emphasize to all people the necessity of real religion in the Home as well as in the Church.

7. To make a survey of conditions within the limits of the Parish, looking particularly for neglected areas and the possibilities of establishing contact with those in need of care and teaching.

8. To impress upon laymen that the value of association and fellowship which they have learned as members of fraternities, lunchclubs, etc., is equally strong in association, fellowship and united effort in the work of the Church.

The Committee on Credentials presented a supplementary report recommending that Mr. H. L. Stinnett be seated as the lay delegate from St. Luke's Church, Remington.

The recommendation was adopted and Mr. Stinnett was declared seated by the Chairman.

Bishop Tucker read a telegram of greetings from the Bishop and Council of the Diocese of Southern Virginia. The Council instructed the Secretary to acknowledge the telegram and to write a letter to the Secretary of the Diocese of Southern Virginia conveying our very best wishes.

The Rev. Robert B. Nelson presented the report of the Board of Christian Social Service. The Rev. C. J. Gibson and Mrs. Robert T. Barton spoke to the report. During the discussion of certain resolutions in this report the Committee on Resolutions was asked to report. While these reports were being discussed, the hour of adjournment having arrived, it was moved that this matter be the first order of business at the session tomorrow morning.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

At a service of Evening Prayer, conducted by Bishop Goodwin, the Rev. W. Roy Mason, D. D., Archdeacon of the

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Blue Ridge, and the Rev. T. D. Brown, Dean of Colored Convocation, on Wednesday evening, the Council sermon was delivered by the Very Rev. W. E. Rollins, D. D., Dean of the Theological Seminary in Virginia. The subject ws "The Centrality of God".

Preceding the sermon, Miss Frances Holtzclaw, President of the Young People's Service Leagues of the Diocese, gave the report of the work of her organization.

Archdeacon Mason also at this time presented medals of the Church Builders' Guild of the Blue Ridge to Messrs. David M. Sullivan, Silas B. Shiflett, W. Lawrence Shiflett, and Russell Davis.

THURSDAY, MAY 11, 9:00 A. M.

The Council began with a corporate celebration of the Holy Communion, which was followed by the reconvening of the Council, Bishop Tucker presiding.

The minutes of Wednesday's sessions were read and approved.

The Bishop asked the privilege of adding the names of Mr. J. C. Stewart and Col. Julien H. Hill to the Committee appointed on the previous day to consider the matter of proposed guaranty by the Diocese of mortgage loans made by congregations. There being no objection the names were added.

Mrs. Robert T. Barton was then asked by the Chair to give her report on the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese. (See Appendix A for this report.)

Bishop Tucker commended Mrs. Barton for her report and called attention to the great support of the Woman's Auxiliary in the work of the Church, especially in Missions.

Archdeacon Mason offered the following resolution:

We wish to express to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Virginia our due appreciation of the splendid work being done by this organization and pledge ourselves to do all in our power to assist them in any way possible. The resolution was carried by a rising vote.

The Committee on Credentials presented a supplementary report, recommending the seating of Mr. F. F. Chandler as Lay Delegate representing St. James Church, Montross, and Dr. H. L. Segar as Alternate, representing St. John's Church, Lunenburg Parish.

The recommendations were approved and the Chair declared these delegates seated.

The Council resumed the Order of Business, and the Committee on Resolutions unanimously recommended the adoption of the following:

Whereas, under the General Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States the existence of venereal disease in either party to a marriage dissolved by a civil Court is ground for Ecclesiastical annulment; and

Whereas, by Canon of the Diocese of Virginia of said Church every Minister of this Church is forbidden to solemnize, or assist in solemnizing, a marriage in this Diocese unless and until he shall receive from a qualified physician, in case of each of the contracting parties, a certificate to the effect that he, or she, is free from any communicable venereal disease; and

Whereas, the Code of Virginia, Section 5088a, makes it a criminal offense for any person afflicted with a contagious venereal disease to marry in this State; or for any minister, or other person authorized to solemnize marriage within this State, knowingly to unite in marriage persons, or either of them, so afflicted; or for the clerk of a Court knowingly to issue a license to marry to any person so afflicted; and

Whereas, it is apparent that such legislation, either by civil or any Church authority, has proved inadequate to prevent such marriages and to afford the desired protection to the physical, mental, and moral health of the people of this Commonwealth, but that such protection can only be secured by the requirement of a competent physical examination by a qualified physician as a prerequisite to the issuance of a marriage license;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia of the Protestant Episcopal Church in annual meeting assembled this 10th day of May, 1939:

1. That the General Assembly of Virginia be urged and earnestly requested to enact at its next session such legislation as may be ade-

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quate to prevent any person obtaining a license to marry except upon certificate of competent medical examination showing both parties to be free from contagious venereal disease; and also to provide for such examination after marriage when both parties have gone out of this State to be married with intention to return to reside therein.

2. That a Committee of three be appointed by the Chair to present a copy of these resolutions to the General Assembly at its next session, and to advocate legislation in accordance therewith.

An amendment proposed by the Rev. E. A. deBordenave failed of adoption.

The original resolution was then adopted.

The Chair directed the Committee on Resolutions to continue its report. The Committee unanimously recommended adoption of the following resolution presented by Mr. John B. Minor:

Whereas, There is no institution more conducive to the welfare of the State, as well as to Religion, than that of harmonious and lasting marriage,—for on it depends the happiness of the home, the welfare of the children, and the moral tone of the people; and,

Whereas, a large number of the divorces in Virginia are due to want of adequate thought and consideration by the parties before entering into marriage, which the requirement of an interval of a reasonable number of hours between application for license to marry and its issuance would go far to prevent;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia of the Protestant Episcopal Church in annual meeting assembled this 10th day of May, 1939:

1. That the General Assembly of Virginia be urged and earnestly requested to enact at its next session legislation which will require an interval of from forty-eight to seventy-two hours to elapse between the application for license to marry and its issuance;

2. That a Committee of three be appointed by the Chair to present a copy of these resolutions to the General Assembly at its next session, and to advocate legislation in accordance therewith.

This was adopted by the Council.

The Chair appointed as the Committee to present these requests to the Legislature: Mr. John B. Minor, Mr. Blake T. Newton, and Mr. Robert E. Anderson. The Rev. Robert B. Nelson presented the report of the Board of Social Service which contained the above resolutions, and moved its adoption. This was carried. (See Appendix A.) The Rev. Robert A. Goodwin presented the following:

Resolved, That a rising vote of thanks be given to the Rectors, Vestries and Congregations of Christ Church, St. Paul's Church, and Trinity Mission, for their gracious entertainment of Council.

This was adopted by a rising vote.

The Chair called for the election of two clerical and two lay members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. The Rev. A. Hume Cox and Mr. A. W. Horstman were appointed tellers.

The Chair called for the election of four Clerical Deputies to the Provincial Synod, and asked the Rev. H. Winfree Smith and Mr. Armistead Boothe to act as tellers.

The Rev. Herbert S. Osburn moved that the four clergymen receiving the highest vote be declared deputies and the four receiving the next highest be declared alternates. Mr. John M. Taylor then offered an amendment to include the lay deputies, which was accepted by Dr. Osburn. The motion as amended was then adopted.

The Chair called for the election of four Lay Deputies to the Synod, and appointed the Rev. Peyton Williams, the Rev. Lee Marston and Mr. F. C. Boggs to act as tellers.

The Rev. Mr. Muller presented the report of the Publicity Committee on the Virginia Churchman by title. (See Appendix A.)

Mr. John M. Taylor presented the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

To the One Hundred and Forty-fourth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

GENTLEMEN:

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The Committee on Finance begs to report that all accounts of the various funds under the charge of the Treasurer of the Diocese from

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January 1 to December 31, 1938, have been audited by A. M. Pullen and Company, Certified Public Accountants.

Owing to the prolonged illness of the Treasurer of the Diocese and also the illness of Mr. J. Carson Phillips, the Auditor of the Church Schools, who has been acting as Assistant to the Treasurer of the Diocese for several years, it has been found necessary to employ an additional bookkeeper.

We have a joint committee consisting of members of the Committee on Finance, the Finance Committee of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia and the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society which has appointed Mr. Frank N. Livesay as bookkeeper for the Diocese and for the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia with a salary of \$1,800.00 of which one-half from July 1, 1939, is to be paid by Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia and the remainder, including the full salary from the date of his appointment in February to the end of this year, out of the Bishops and Contingent Fund.

This plan has been approved by the Church Schools and the Finance Committee has approved it.

The only source from which we could get the amount required to pay this salary has been deducted from the item of \$2,400.00 appearing in our budget for 1939, entitled, "To repay amount owing to Episcopal Fund" as we felt that because of the emergency it would be preferable to postpone the payment of the amount owing to the Episcopal Fund until next year in order to meet the emergency needs of the diocesan offices. We ask the approval by the Council of our action in this matter.

We also recommend that the position be made permanent in order to give the necessary relief to the Treasurer's office when the present Treasurer shall be able to resume fully his duties, and therefore recommend that our share of the bookkeeper's salary for 1940 be paid under the diocesan program.

We recommend the following budget of the Bishops and Contingent Fund for the year 1940:

Inasmuch as the matter has not yet been definitely settled by the Council as to whether the needs of the Diocese can best be solved by the election of a Suffragan Bishop or by additional assistance in the diocesan offices, we have increased the item of Contingencies to a total of \$1,207.50 in order to leave the budget at the same figure as last year. If it should be found that the work of the Diocese and of our Bishops could be carried on satisfactorily without the election of a Bishop Sugragan and without additional assistance in the Diocesan Offices, it will be possible for us to reduce the budget of the Contingent Fund by perhaps \$1,500.00 to \$2,000.00, but this reduction cannot be made until a definite plan has been worked out. We are strongly convinced, however, that in view of the long absences from the Diocese of our Bishop, on account of his duties as Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church and the heavy burden of work laid upon our Bishop Coadjutor, sufficient assistance should be provided to prevent his breakdown from the burden of increased duties.

We recommend that the present schedule of parish assessments be continued for the year 1940.

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REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE OF THE CHURCH PENSION FUND.

To the One Hundred and Forty-fourth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

GENTLEMEN:

Your Committee reports with much pleasure that another year has passed in which every Pension Fund assessment charged against any salary of a clergyman of the Diocese of Virginia has been paid in full. In a report made to your Committee by Mr. Robert Worthington, the Secretary of the Church Pension Fund in New York, he states:

"It is very gratifying that the Diocese of Virginia, according to our records, has discharged its pension obligations in full for the entire period from March 1, 1917, through December 31, 1938. This means that so far as the Diocese is concerned, no clergyman who has served there since the beginning of the Fund will suffer in relation to the future pension through failure of any church or other ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese to carry out its pension responsibility."

A bill offered in Congress, during the current session, for the amendment and revision of the Social Security Act would have removed the exemption heretofore existing whereby our clergy and all persons employed by religious organizations are exempted from the requirements of the Old Age Pension. If this change had been made it would have resulted in the serious impairment of our own Church Pension Fund and might very easily have resulted in the break-up of our Pension system. Your Commtitee is happy to report that because of the many protests sent to the Committee of Congress having this bill under consideration, this provision has been removed and the exemption will stand as heretofore.

We cannot close this report without expressing the sense of loss which our Committee has suffered in the death of Mr. Rosewell Page. Mr. Page has been a member of the Diocesan Committee of the Church Pension Fund from the establishment of the Church Pension Fund system in 1917 and has always taken a very active part in the work of our Committee. Because of his long connection with the work of the Church in this Diocese beginning in his early young manhood, he was vitally interested in everything connected with its welfare and he has made a large and varied contribution to the life and growth of the Church in this Diocese.

The Committee recommended adoption of the following:

Resolved, That in Canon IX, Section 5, subsection b, division I, the words "The Board of Religious Education", be changed to read "The Board of Christian Education".

This was carried.

The Committee recommended adoption of the following:

Resolved, That Section 5 of Canon IX, entitled "Of the Diocesan Missionary Society", be amended as follows:

1. Strike out Clause III pertaining to The Board of Publicity, and renumber the clauses following and remaining.

2. Amend the present Clause IV, pertaining to The Field Board, as follows:

III. The Field Board, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of the Every-Member Canvass as provided in Section 6 of this Canon; such other promotional

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work as the Executive Committee may direct; and, through a subcommittee, all such publicity as the Field Board may deem necessary thereto. This subcommittee shall have charge of the Diocesan Magazine.

This was carried.

The Committee recommended adoption of the following:

Resolved First, That Canon XIX be amended by the addition of the following Section, namely:

Section 12. In addition to the annual meeting of the congregation for the election of vestrymen, other meetings of the congregation may be called by the vestry or, if they decline to do so, by ten qualified voters of the congregation after at least three days' notice of the time, place and object of the meeting shall have been given either on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means. At such meeting only those persons shall be entitled to vote who are qualified to vote for vestrymen, and such meetings shall be conducted in the same manner as provided in this canon for meetings held for the election of vestries, except that voting by ballot shall not be required.

Provided, however, that if the meeting is called by ten members of the congregation, three days' written notice of the time and place shall be given to the Rector and each member of the Vestry.

Secondly, That the title to said Canon be amended so as to read:

"CANON XIX"

"Of the Election and Organization of Vestries and Calling of Congregational Meetings."

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church would depart from the usual type of report based on statistical statements of work done in the Diocese during the year and try to examine certain marked trends.

We note generally a strong tendency toward increasing Church attendance and interest. Especially is this true in the growth of Sunday Schools and in the more efficient methods of instruction given. Training institutes and summer conferences for instructing teachers are being more widely used but these and other methods must be resorted to more generally if the children in the Diocese as a whole are to be properly instructed in the fundamentals of Christianity.

We observe with satisfaction the increasing efficiency of the work of the women's organizations throughout the Diocese. They are achieving a greater co-ordination of their activities and are utilizing to a greater extent their potential strength.

We hear with joy the rumblings of some activity among the laymen of the Diocese. The need has long existed but is becoming more articulate. Lay conferences which have been held on a small scale need to be increased rapidly as possible. Such conferences might very well be promoted by the Convocations as well by the Diocese as a whole. An apportunity should be provided every congregation to have at least one layman attend a conference, there to receive information and inspiration which they shall be responsible for transmitting to their respective parishes. Those laymen who have been interested, evidence a willingness to assume leadership. We cannot and will not believe that the Diocese of Virginia will refuse this potential lay leadership.

From one source comes the suggestion that dependence upon known and tried talent both among clergy and laity robs the Diocese of new material for leadership. We point again to the necessity of having an adequate number of lay conferences as a means of discovering latent talent.

From every quarter comes the cry for a teaching ministry. There is great eagerness on the part of the people for information on the fundamentals of Christianity. We make bold to suggest that there be made available for the clergy of the Diocese a service on a modest scale similar to that rendered by the College of Preachers where we may sharpen the effectiveness of our preaching, gain inspiration and enjoy the fellowship denied to so many of the elergy because of their comparative isolation.

The missionary shortage of the Diocese and General Church reveals an appalling situation and is but the outward and visible sign that our people have not been given adequate information and instruction which would elicit their full loyalty for the Church's program. We cannot expect that a mere appeal for money will do more than result in ever diminishing returns. Human need and not budgets is the only thing to which people will respond adequately. Further, we would do well to heed the request of certain of our laymen that a greater measure of the responsibility for interesting Church people in this work be placed in their hands.

We note with regret the anomalous position of the Convocations in the Diocese and strongly recommend that the Deans be given some authority for assisting with the details of the administration of the Diocese.

There is manifested an increasing recognition of the need for a Suffragan Bishop. It is being felt that visiting Bishops cannot represent the Diocese when they visit congregations nor help to weld the more distant parishes into the Diocesan whole. Moreover, a Suffragan Bishop would be able to help bear the heavy administrative burdens of the Diocese.

With regard to the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction, we urge a

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vigorous prosecution of the resolution which they adopted, designating one of the colored clergy to act as a missioner, visiting each field upon invitation of the incumbent and seeking to minister to those communities where no work is being done.

We deplore the confusion and varied methods which prevail throughout the Diocese for reporting statistics. We seem to be living in the days of the Judges where every man does what is right in his own eyes. No one can define a communicant. No distinction is made between a communicant and a confirmed person. We recommend that this matter be made the subject of study and report.

We respectfully refer these several recommendations to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Bishop Tucker added a word

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about the importance of the work at the University and of its vital importance to the welfare of the Diocese.

Bishop Goodwin presented for Mr. Oliver J. Sands the report of the General Board of Church Schools of the Diocese. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. B. D. Chambers proposed the following:

Whereas, there seems to be a far cry from the original intention and the present custom of observing the Lenten Season, and

Whereas, most of this has been in the lack rather than the observance;

Be it Resolved, that the Diocese decide whether this season be either observed or discarded and not retained as hollow form, and that to this end a Committee be appointed to study the subject and report recommendations at the next Council.

This was carried.

The Chair appointed, as the Committee on this resolution, Rev. B. D. Chambers, Rev. S. B. Chilton, Mr. C. M. Davison.

The Rev. Mr. Chambers proposed a resolution to have appointed a Committee on Prayer Book Revision to report to next Council, which report would be sent on to the proper Committee in time for the meeting of General Convention in Kansas City in 1940.

This was carried.

The Chair appointed, as the Committee on this resolution, Rev. C. Sturges Ball, S. T. D., Rev. Henry J. Miller, Mr. A. A. Smoot.

The Committee on Credentials presented a supplementary report recommending seating of Mr. E. F. Barnes as Lay Delegate from Kingston Parish, Mathews County.

The Council adjourned for lunch.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, 2:00 O'CLOCK.

The Council was called to order by the Bishop. The Chair recognized Justice George L. Browning who reported for the Committee appointed to draw up suitable resolutions on the passing of the late Rosewell Page, Sr.

The resolutions, which were adopted by a rising vote, were:

Resolved, That, it is very meet and fit for the Council of the-Diocese of Virginia to pause in its work to do honor to the memory of an erstwhile member whose long and eventful life was so interwoven with its deepest interest and concerns. It is not here intended to detail the many activities of the fine and purposeful career of the late Mr. Rosewell Page. Rather is it a brief resume of his part in the life of his Church to which he was so singly devoted. He is easily recalled as one of the most forceful and effective of the speakers of this body. His fervor and power of expression in debate might have been interpreted by those who did not know him well, as indicating the dogmatic but underneath a rugged exterior was the tenderest and kindliest of hearts.

He was tolerant of the opinions of his fellows. He was courteous and civil always. The recognition of these qualities found expression in his repeated election to the General Conventions of the Church, where he was as valued as here. Indicative of this was the spontaneous outburst of applause at the last General Convention in the City of Cincinnati when his name was called as a Delegate.

He served on the most important committees of the Church and his advice and counsel was sought and heeded when troublous questions were to be solved and differences were to be adjusted and ironed out. His friends and associates who form this body, individually and corporately, pay just tribute to this fine soul.

He is gone, but he will not be forgotten while there are those who hold with Joseph Jefferson, that,

"Life is like a play upon the stage. It signifies not how long it lasts but how well it is acted. Die when or where you will, think only on making a good exit."

Resolved, Further, That this word shall be recorded upon the minutes of the Council and a copy sent to the family of Mr. Page.

Bishop Goodwin stated that a member of the Committee was present and could speak on the matter if he desired.

The Rev. Dr. Herbert S. Osburn addressed the Council and recited what had been done by the Committee appointed by the General Church School Board of the Diocese.

Mr. John B. Minor rose to a point of order, that as the matter had been referred to the Board no action can be taken until that body reports. The Chair ruled the point well taken and discussion ceased.

THE TENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF SHRINE MONT.

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

This is the tenth annual report of Shrine Mont to the May meetings of this Council. During this decade each year has been marked by steady advance on all lines which may be summarized as follows:

Property assets in trust by the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society (Inc.) now total on a fair valuation basis of appraisal, \$80,000.00.

Earned income has shown a year by year increase from \$2,284.99 in 1931 to \$9,475.95 in 1938—over 400% increase. The financial operations are duly audited year by year, and fire insurance is fully carried.

Endowment Fund, as of January 1, 1939, in care of the above Trustees, \$4,015.33.

Ministrations in 1938 to Church leaders, clergy and laity, and young people, of the Diocese, Province and General Church-

(a) Through nine Church Conferences, over 600 delegates.

(b) Through vacation privileges enjoyed by church people, clergy and laity, their families and friends, over 400 persons.

Whereas, the people of the Diocese of Virginia have invested some \$650,000 in the Diocesan School System, and

Whereas, many clerical and lay representatives of these people in the Council of the Diocese are not familiar with the organizational set-up of the Diocesan School System, and

Whereas, the recommendations of the committee set-up by Council to appraise the work of the Diocese, which recommendations were generally approved by the Council, have not received any action from the Schools' Board, and

Whereas, the sad experience of many churches in having schools established by the churches only to lose them to secular control demonstrates that such a possibility must be safe-guarded against in respect to our schools,

Therefore, I move that the President of this Council appoint a committee of three Presbyters and three laymen, none of whom shall be members of the Board of Church Schools, (a) to study the relationship of the Diocesan Council to the Board of the Church School, (b) to study the relationship of the General Board of Church Schools to the Local Boards of the various schools, and (c) to study the administration and policies of the schools, and to report its findings to the Diocesan Council next year.

This was carried.

THE REVEREND CHURCHILL GIBSON CHAMBERLAYNE, Ph. D.

Born in Richmond December 23, 1876.

Graduated at the University of Virginia in 1901 and at the Virginia Theological Seminary in 1904. Received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Halle-Wittenburg in 1906.

Ordained Deacon in 1904 and Priest in 1914 by Bishop Gibson of Virginia.

His first charge was in a Missionary field in Albemarle County and Chaplain to the Episcopal students at the University of Virginia 1906-1907.

Teacher and Chaplain of the Gilman School, Baltimore, 1907-1911.

Established in Richmond the Chamberlayne School for Boys in 1911, which was taken into the system of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia under the name of St. Christopher's School in 1920. He retained Headmastership of this school until his death.

Died April 3, 1939.

IV. REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

(b) The Program of the Diocese for 1940 (As Adopted by the Council).

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

L

Your Committee on the Budget of the Diocese for 1940 recommends one change in the tentative program as presented.

They recommend that the sum of money allotted to the work of the General Church be increased to the sum of \$28,150. This increase of \$1,570 will bring the sum allocated to the sum to be given this year when the \$5,000 has been raised on Whitsunday.

If this increase be voted for the whole budget will total \$119,570 (Ed. note—An amendment from the floor raised the Virginia Churchman item from \$300 to \$600, bringing the total to \$119,870), being still about \$4,500 below the askings for this year.

If the budget be not raised in the fall, we recommend that a supplementary effort be made at Whitsuntide.

We recognize the fact mentioned by Bishop Tucker that our men have not been sufficiently active in missionary work, and recommend that the effort be made to organize the men and put them to work in the business of raising sufficient funds to finance the work of our Diocese properly and do our full share for the General Church.

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(c) Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

MY DEAR BISHOP:

As this year will mark the 35th Anniversary of the formation of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge I think it may be interesting to make some remarks as to the way in which it came into being and as to the remarkable development which has taken place since it was first established.

As was stated last year my connection with the work among the mountain people began in the summer of 1888 soon after I took charge of St. Paul's. Ivy and Emmanuel, Greenwood. Beginning in the Ragged Mountains and confining my work to that section I made a further venture in the fall of 1900 when I started work in the Blue Ridge by opening a Mission School in Simmon's Gap.

In the following May I had the opportunity of setting forth the needs of the Mountain people before our Diocesan Council which was held that year, 1901, in Christ Church, Alexandria, I concluded my address by asking for an assistant, which resulted in Bishop Gibson giving me the Rev. George P. Mayo, in June. 1902.

Owing to the rapid growth of the work Bishop Gibson conceived the idea of forming it into an Archdeaconry and asked me to serve as Archdeacon which I consented to do. At the Diocesan Council in May. 1904, the Bishop asked the Council to approve his plan and also his selection of myself as Archdeacon. Action was taken by the Council to that effect and the work went forward from that time with growing success.

In 1908 the Rev. W. Roy Mason became Assistant to the Rev. George P. Mayo at Mission Home and after Mr. Mayo had moved to Bacon Hollow and engaged in the creation of what is now the Blue Ridge Industrial School, Mr. Mason took charge of the Mission Home District. The work of these two men has been, in a great measure, responsible for the upbuilding of the Mountain Work as we now know it and the appointment of the Rev. Roy Mason as Associate Archdeacon in January, 1926, has given to the work a reputation which makes it stand out as the largest and most important of its kind in the Episcopal Church.

At one of our Diocesan Councils some years ago I stated that the Mountain Work was a good thing for the mountain people, for the Diocese and also for the world. There is no question about the help that it has been to the mountain people and Bishop Tucker has again and again remarked that it has been an inspiration to the Diocese. And a later outgrowth of the work, the Order of the Thousandfold, has not only spread far and wide throughout this country, but to other parts of the world as well. In fact, the Church herself, both in the Bishops' Crusade and in the Forward Movement, has sent the Thousandfold Prayer into every parish and mission throughout this country and also wherever its mission work is carried on in other countries.

It seems to me that what began as a grain of mustard seed has grown into a great tree which has spread its branches far beyond anything which either I, myself, or Bishop Gibson ever dreamed of. My part in it has been a very small one and I feel that no merely human power would have brought about the results which have come to pass.

In the early days of the work at a time when the magnitude of what I had undertaken seemed to oppress me, I had a vision of light and glory which I could not but believe was the presence of the Master, and at this very moment the words rose clearly in my mind: "As Captain of the Lord's Host am I now come." The vision passed in a few moments, but I knew then that the work was not mine, but the Lord's, and that He, not I, was in charge of it.

I believe that the Council would find much help and inspiration if it would restore the former custom of holding a Missionary Meeting on the Wednesday night of the Council and receive some firsthand information of what is really being accomplished in its own special Mission Field, the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge. I, therefore, move that the Council pass a resolution to that effect.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON OF THE BLUE RIDGE.

To the Bishops, Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

I present the following report for the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge in this the thirty-fifth year of its existence.

Just thirty-five years ago the Council of this Diocese recognized the evident fact that Archdeacon Neve was not merely seeing visions and dreaming dreams, but that he had discovered a real opportunity for this Church of ours. It was an opportunity to serve a deserving people rich in possibilities, but needing friends and helpers to reveal the love of a Saviour in an intelligent and churchly way.

It would be interesting to follow the development of the Archdeaconry during the succeeding years and to note the trials and difficulties we had to meet in climbing up to plant the Cross ou the Mountain top. First there was trouble in getting financial backing from the D. M. S., always hard pressed for funds and always having more appeals than money. Under such circumstances there would be hard sledding for any new venture. Only faith, patience and a determined spirit could make progress. But Archdeacon Neve had all

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these qualities and step by step we reached the coveted goal-the salaries of our mountain workers paid by the D. M. S. We had to raise from outside sources only funds sufficient to keep up and replace some fifteen automobiles, pay over a thousand dollars a year insurance, keep the thirty mission stations in repair and put up the new buildings urgently needed.

For just a year or two, however, could we enjoy this state of comparative security. Soon the D. M. S. found it necessary to cut our appropriation. We have had two cuts with nothing restored. yet we have managed to keep the missions open and are doing the best we can. Still we are hoping for the dawn of a better day and we believe that it is coming.

During the past year we moved a church from Somerset where it was no longer needed, and rebuilt it at Lower Pocosan. We made some changes in the plan, using new material where necessary and covering the whole with a fresh coat of paint. Now we have a suitable and attractive church at this place and one of which the people are very proud. Also we have met another great need in completing the Parish Hall at Red Hill. This is a new building made of rock and connected with the rock church. Together they make a very convenient and attractive plant, enabling the rector to do a much more effective work.

Because of low interest rates and depreciation of investments we found it advisable to close St. Olive's School for a time. We are, however, sending five of the girls to the Blue Ridge Industrial School and expect to keep them there until our funds increase sufficiently to justify opening St. Olive's again. In educating these motherless mountain girls we are still carrying out the purpose for which the money was given.

Since the Rev. Mr. Shultz left the field we have been greatly missing the help of a clergyman in the Luray District with its large group of missions. With the aid, however, of our faithful lay workers we have continued to hold regular services at the various points. Simmons Gap has finally been taken over by the Park and the people who have not moved away go to Wyatt Mountain and Mission Home for their church services.

The Quiet Days held twice a year in the Archdeaconry and the Annual Conference of Mountain Workers at Summer Rest are a great help in making workers and people realize the oneness of the work in the whole of this great mission field. These gatherings have a far-reaching significance in their friendly contacts and in spiritual uplift.

Our faithful and devoted missionaries have held many hundred Church and Church School services, have taken a large number of sick to the hospitals and clinics, have received thousands of visitors in the mission houses and have paid many thousands of visits to the homes of the people. It is a beautiful life work in its love, its simplicity and the variety of the kinds of service rendered-a work I am sure you can approve and be proud of. For my own part I am thankful to Our Heavenly Father that it has fallen to my lot to be leader in such a work, and thankful for the splendid cooperation of my helpers, and for the interest and support of the friends outside who have helped to make possible continued progress in the Archdeaconry

of the Blue Ridge.

(d) Report of Board of Colored Work.

GENTLEMEN:

Before giving this brief report of the Board of Colored Work, we wish to extend our sympathy to Dr. Brydon during his illness and regret that he is unable to attend the Council to give this report.

The work among the colored people in the Diocese is steadily but slowly growing. There are points where large numbers of colored people are not being reached owing to the lack of funds for the enlargement of our work.

Distinct steps are being taken to carry forward the work in other points as in King and Queen County, Fredericksburg, Somerset and Orange. We commend this work for helpful consideration.

The congregations of the Colored Convocation are assuming their share of all Parochial and Diocesan responsibilities with some increased sense of duty and will work out their own salvation, both materially and spiritually, under wise leadership of the Archdeacon. An attempt was made during the year to work out plans of ad-

justing the social and religious conditions at St. Mark's, Beazley, by means of a Social Service Worker as to work among the underprivileged people. This has not fully materialized, but in the meanwhile a Layworker is employed in the field and many results have been accomplished.

Much effort and time are being given recently to the need of the John Moncure School. It has been taken up as a project of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Third Province to provide more adequate equipment and Science Laboratory so as to do better and more efficient work.

The school should be greatly strengthened as to buildings and equipments, making it an accredited institution in the Diocese of Virginia.

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The Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese of Virginia continues to occupy a rather unique place in the General Church as well as in this Diocese, being the only Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Episcopal Church in these United States of America and incidentally has the Presiding Bishop of the whole Church as its • chief executive. It is not the only Missionary Jurisdiction in this Diocese, but it is the only one having, at present, both a Convocation and a special governing board with legislative and managerial powers.

The Annual Convocation is the older institution and the scope of its work, as provided by canon, is: "The Convocation shall have power to devise measures for the welfare and advancement of the work of the Church among the colored people, which measures shall take effect when approved by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society." On the other hand, the Board of Colored Work has charge of all colored mission work in the Diocese and the Canonical provision is: "The management of the missionary work of this Jurisdiction shall be under the Board of Colored Work appointed by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society." This terminology is not quite clear to some of us.

The scheduled meeting of the Convocation is in July each year when it is usually very warm, indeed, while the Board of Colored Work has heretofore met on a more or less "now and then" schedule governed largely by the matters to be attended to from time to time.

Some success, however, has been noted in the Jurisdiction. There was a larger attendance of lay delegates at the 29th Annual Convocation at West Point, July, 1938, than in any previous year. There have been two regular meetings of the Executive Committee of the Convocation and one meeting of the Clergy with the Field Board of the Diocese, all concerned with the advancement of the work. There was one meeting of a number of the Clergy to consider the matter of suggesting the appointment of an Assistant or Associate Archdeacon for the Colored Work. There seems to be a great awakening among the clergy and laity recently as the opportunities and responsibilities of the work in the Jurisdiction multiply.

There are some eighteen congregations and mission stations distributed through the twelve of the thirty-eight counties represented in our Diocese and reporting a membership of approximately 800; less than 1/10 of 1 per cent of the 100,000 Negro population of the Diocese. There are five full-time ministers and one giving part time service and belonging to the Diocese of West Virginia.

The acceptances of these congregations and missions for 1938 amounted to a total of \$571.00 with all but four accepting a quota for the missionary work of the Church. By January 10, 1939, \$435.07 had been paid on these acceptances, but on April 11, 1939, the payments on this 1938 quota had risen to \$530.19, slightly short of the total amount pledged; which shortage was more than offset by the payments on advanced work. An increase of 21 per cent over the givings of the previous year is noted.

Of the six Sunday Schools reporting their Easter Offerings by April 11, two days after Easter Day two of the colored schools were included and one of them the only Sunday School in Richmond to report by that date. Twelve of the schools participated in the Diocesan Presentation Service, Fredericksburg, April 30.

There is much to be desired in the way of assuming greater responsibility for leadership in the colored field; it appears that proper Church extension can be realized only in that way. To quote from Dr. Brydon's book, "The Episcopal Church Among the Negroes in Virginia" (1937): "The Negro congregations must support their own work, develop their own lay and clerical leaders and extend the Church among their own people. But for many years to come there must be the quiet, suggestive, unseen leadership of the Diocesan authorities."

This seems to be the prevailing sentiment among the Negro churchmen of this Jurisdiction, and it seems both wise and just to base the amount of outside help on the amount of genuine interest manifested in the work by the colored people themselves.

(e) Report of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education

To the 144th Annual Council:

We have had during the past year the continued cooperation which we asked of the Diocese and its organizations. We have been able to widen and extend our programs and interests, and to do better the task you have appointed us. A check of our 3-year program, copies of which were sent out 18 months ago, shows activity in about threefourths of that program. We are not completely satisfied, but we are doing something definite in these many fields, in some of which there was no activity before.

We summarize the more important activities:

Church Sunday Schools. Our Field Secretary has sent out much material, given much aid by mail, and helped those who called at the office. But she spends most of her time in the field, having visited about two-thirds of the Churches in the Diocese within the year. She has talked to Church Schools, groups of teachers, individual teachers and leaders, and conducted teacher training courses in six Churches. She helped plan curricula, aided in starting new and re-

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opening old Church Schools and in setting up whole units in Christian Education.

The Four National Offerings. This Board is charged with promotion of the four National Offerings. In this Diocese, the Little Helpers and the Christmas Box Offerings have long been a part of the program of the Woman's Auxiliary. We stand ready to help them at any time. The Christmas Box Work is done principally through the Junior Auxiliaries. We hope more Church Schools will take part in this project.

Miss Etta Ambler, of St. James' Church, Richmond, is the new Birthday Thank Offering Secretary. Last year only 7 Churches sent in the offering through proper channels. Every Church School should take it and remit through the Treasurer of the Diocese.

Our greatest gain has been in the Lenten Mite Box Offering. Under the Rev. Edwin J. Bethea of Culpeper we had our first Diocesan presentation service on April 30 in St. George's Church, Fredericksburg. About 750, representing 88 schools, attended. 35 schools had proxies. These 123 schools presented \$9,711.15. Others have since reported, bringing total to \$10,668.38. Nineteen, who last year reported a total of \$660, have made no report. Hence, the offering should go well over \$11,000. We estimate an increase of from \$700 to \$1,000 over 1938. In four or five years the increase has been more than \$3,000. The boys and girls deserve some real recognition by the Council.

A striking missionary pageant was presented at the service by St. James' Church, Richmond, and massed junior choirs furnished music. A well planned program during Lent is important. Such education will lead to a larger increase, as has been evidenced where tried recently.

Our greatest difficulty is in getting this offering reported and remitted promptly. No Church has a right to keep back any part or to hold it up.

Daily Vacation Church Schools. Experience has shown the great value of such schools to supplement Church School work. We recommend that more parishes join the many now using this method in the Diocese. There is a Committee of the Board ready to offer suggestions as to teachers, materials, and methods of organizing and conducting such schools.

Youth. One of our weak points heretofore has been our work with the youth (14 to 25) of the Church. As this is the time so many slip away, we now lay more stress on this phase.

There are four youth organizations in the Diocese—The Young People's Service League, The Girls' Friendly Society, The Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and the Junior Auxiliary. Our Secretary works

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with all of these, and we are ready to cooperate always. These groups should cover our needs, but we do not believe they are touching a large part of the Diocese. We commend them to more Rectors and parishes.

To strengthen this, our Youth Committee, under Mrs. James F. Ferneyhough of Casanova, has arranged youth meetings at 8 points. We hope that thus more young people will become interested.

College Work. Our Board has done little in this field, but we realize its importance. We believe there should be more work like that done at St. Paul's Church, University.

Adult Education. Realizing our inadequate meeting of this challenge, we are making plans to include more adult education in our program in the coming year. It is interesting to note, however, that often there are more adults than children in our Church Schools, which is a healthy sign. We need more such Bible classes.

The Woman's Auxiliary is also doing a good job here, and we have cooperated with this organization in such work.

Teacher Training takes much of the Field Secretary's time and energy. She has held six institutes in different parts of the Diocese.

Perhaps the weakest spot is our dealing with the men. We all agree that we need well-informed Churchmen and we hope to remedy this somewhat during the coming year.

Other Cooperating Agencies. We endeavor to cooperate with organizations outside the Diocese and our own Church, particularly the Provincial Board of Religious Education. Also the Governing Board of the Advanced Conference of the Province and the Virginia Council of Religious Education. The latter does excellent work, including week-day religious instruction in public schools by highly trained and competent teachers in twenty counties, involving 154 communities and 18,895 children.

Summer Conferences. Last year proved a poor conference year, but we hope for a better one in 1939. We feel this to be one of the most important projects in Christian Education, and we strongly urge all Churches to use the conferences as fully as possible.

The Educational Reporter. Our campaign for support of the National Council's monthly educational bulletin resulted in about 250 subscriptions in the Diocese from thirty-three Church Schools, onetwentieth of the entire national subscription list of this bulletin.

Contact. Financial reasons are responsible for the non-appearance of "Contact", our Diocesan bulletin, in recent months. We would like to revive it as soon as possible.

Outside the Diocese. Early last fall, upon invitation, your Field Secretary and Chairman met with the new Board of Religious Educa-

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tion of the Diocese of Harrisburg; giving them benefit of our past experience.

Visitors. The Rev. Vernon C. McMaster, of the National Council, spoke to the Board in January, on pertinent matters. Other visitors were Miss Margaret Jefferson, National Secretary for the Girl's Friendly Society, Mr. W. A. Naramore, Jr., National Secretary for the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

Presbyterian Training School. We have been studying the matter of establishing a Chair of Episcopal Prayer Book and Church History at the Presbyterian Training School in Richmond, and using its facilities for our girls. We are still working on it, but finances are the main hindrance.

Finances. The actual working budget for 1939 only allowed us \$1,650, instead of the proposed \$2,685. The D. M. S. supplemented this with a gift of \$100, but this is a cut of over \$1,000 or 39%, and leaves us with no means or tools with which to carry on our work.

Work of Field Secretary. The Board has been amazed at the variety and magnitude of the work of the Field Secretary in the year. Without her expert guidance and knowledge we would never have been able to report the progress we have made. As a Board we have already expressed to her personally our appreciation and commendation for the valuable work which she is doing in the Diocese. We wish to express it also before this Council.

Policy. As often stated, it is our policy to be of service in the whole field of Christian Education. Use us. We will respond to the best of our ability and means. We want our Field Secretary to spend as much time with you and your Churches, in the field, as is necessary—with the larger and city Churches and also with the smaller and rural parishes and the missions of the Diocese.

In closing, we repeat our appreciation of your fine cooperation. We hope and pray for a continuance of this very fine spirit.

(f) Report of the Board of Christian Social Service from the Council of 1938 to the Council of 1939

Owing to the delay in electing supplementary members to this Board no meeting was held until October 13, 1938. At this meeting the chairman was instructed to request the Provincial Board of Social Service at its meeting on October 19th to take up the matter of securing laws in the District of Columbia requiring pre-marital certificates of freedom from contagious venereal disease.

The Provincial Board appointed the Chairman and the Rev. W.

Carroll Brooke of Weston, West Virginia, a committee to look after this matter.

The Chairman interviewed the Surgeon General's Office and the Health Commissioner of the District and reported to the Synodical Board and the Diocesan Board that the health authorities of the District had prepared such a law which was to be presented to Congress by Jennings Randolph, Chairman of the House District Committee, with the statement that the above authorities requested the assistance of the Religious Forces of the Province in backing up such legislation.

The following statement of policy was agreed upon by the officers of the United States Public Health Department and of the District of Columbia, and the Boards of the Province and of the Diocese:

In my opinion the proper approach to the problem of public health on the part of the Church is, first, for the leaders of the Church to go to the public health authorities in their communities—county, city, or state—asking what their plans are for meeting the needs of the public in controlling contagious diseases. Especially does this apply to the premarital certificate of freedom from infectious venereal diseases. Second, it would then be their duty to cooperate with those health authorities, creating public sentiment to justify the legislators making the laws necessary to control contagious diseases.

The first thing for the Church to do is to pass canons controlling the action of its own members requiring premarital health certificates, and also where needed to furnish the funds to meet these requirements.

In so doing it will set an example and create a sentiment which will justify the states doing the same thing.

See to it that all the Clergy do all in their power to create public sentiment to secure laws leading to this end.

We recommend the adoption of this statement of policy.

At the meeting on January 17th, Judge John L. Ingram and Rev. E. A. deBordenave were appointed a committee to draw up a statement defining the duty of this Board in regard to proposed civil legislation of a moral and social character.

Dr. Anderson, of the State Board of Health, read a paper entitled "The Church and the Fight Against Venereal Disease", suggesting that it is the duty of the Church to cooperate with the State and the National health authorities in every way possible.

The annual report of the Executive Secretary was received and ordered filed, and is included as a part of this report.

At the meeting on April 18th the Committee on "The Duties of this Board and Social Legislation" reported. Adopted. That report is included for action on the part of Council:

Whereas, The Board of Christian Social Service of the Protestant

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Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia is an official Board, provided for by the Canons of the Diocese, and thereby bearing the responsibility of representing all the members of the Church within the Diocese; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the duties of the Board of Christian Social Service shall be as follows:

1. To promote and co-ordinate any institutions or efforts of a social service nature which may be supported or sponsored by the Council of the Diocese.

2. To promote and cooperate with such non-partisan and non-political humanitarian efforts as this Board may approve; and to stimulate intelligent interest and activity among members of the Church in behalf of such efforts.

3. To keep itself informed of political and economic attempts to improve the lot of humanity; but in no way shall it commit itself to the support of any one side of such attempts unless it be so instructed by the Council of the Diocese.

4. To promote intelligence and interest among members of the Church as to such political and economic attempts.

5. To exert upon the Church a steady insistence that it is the duty of the individual Christian to make conscious decisions in accordance with Christian principles about such political and economic attempts to better the lot of humanity and that it is their duty to take such action as their decisions may demand.

6. To co-operate with the programs of the Department of Social Relations of the National Council and of the Province, except where doing so would be in violation of any of the foregoing duties.

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REV. E. A. DEBORDENAVE, JUDGE JOHN L. INGRAM.

The matter of changing the title of this Board to conform to the title of similar boards of the National Council and of the Province was referred to a committee of which Dr. Montague is Chairman to draw up a proper canon in this matter.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese having appointed Mrs. E. G. Higginbotham Diocesan President of Social Service, she was elected a member of this Board. Mr. Preston, Chairman of the State Conference on Social Work, was present and emphasized the great importance of the church keeping in close touch with that organization, and Judge John L. Ingram and Mr. Blake T. Newton were appointed delegates to represent this Board at the annual meeting of the State Conference, and report on methods of co-ordinating the work of the State Social Workers and the Church for mutual benefit. Dr. Montague was instructed to confer with Mrs. Higginbotham and work out plans for the co-operation of this Board and the Board of Social Service of the Woman's Auxiliary. We recommend the cooperation of the parishes in these plans.

The Chairman reported that the Provincial Board has requested this Board to ask Council to take action in connection with the hasty marriage laws of the neighboring states and secure legislation by which Virginia will conform to such laws.

We recommend such action.

We recommend the co-operation of the Women of the Diocese in the effort to erect a chapel at the State Farm for Women.

Report of Rev. R. Cary Montague, D. D., Executive Secretary Board of Social Service, Diocese of Virginia.

During the year 1938 the activities of your Executive Secretary have continued along the same lines on which we have been working now for the past fifteen years, namely, that of maintaining my office as a source of general information for all kinds of social cases throughout the State, especially along the lines of securing hospital and institutional treatment for indigent people and procuring transportation for them to Richmond or other points where such treatment can be given. My statistical report shows some decline in the number of these cases handled due to two facts. First the Sheltering Arms Hospital had accumulated such a large waiting list that they refuse to give out further applications except upon the written request of physicians in charge, and it is very difficult to get country doctors to make such written requests. I do all I can to make it easy for them by sending them return postcards with as much information typewritten for them as I can, but even so we are not able to handle as many cases as we have heretofore. The second cause for reducing the number of cases handled is due to the better organization of both social and public health work throughout the counties with workers more thoroughly trained, and consequently knowing better how to handle their own cases without our assistance. In spite, however, of this reduction, our records show the handling of seventy-six such cases, which is considerably more than one a week, and I think justifies the maintenance of our office for this purpose.

During this past year our board took an active part in trying to secure the passage of a bill calling for certificates of freedom from venereal disease from prospective brides and grooms. Through the

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energetic sponsoring of Hon. Frank P. Moncure, a member of our Board, such a bill passed the House of Delegates, but was killed in the Senate Committee, in spite of personal appearances of myself, Dr. Tucker and Mr. E. Randolph Williams, the Chancellor of the Diocese.

However, we secured the adoption of a Canon requiring such certificates by all persons wishing to be married by our clergy, and Mr. Moncure is very active in trying to arouse public sentiment to make sure that his bill will not fail in the next Legislature.

It is always my earnest desire to carry out any order and instructions from the Board, and I am ever ready to go anywhere to address meetings on the subject of Social Service when such addresses are called for.

(g) Report of the Field Board

To the One Hundred and Forty-third Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Field Board begs to submit the following report:

The Field Board held two regular meetings—one in St. George's Church Parish House, Fredericksburg, on May 31st, 1938, and the second one on February 7, 1939. At the May meeting plans for a Laymen's Conference to be held at Roslyn, the Diocesan Center, were set up; also plans for a Clergy Conference at Shrine Mont. At the meeting in February, the plans were mapped out for a special Missionary Offering to be taken at Whitsunday. The rest of this report will be devoted to the Conferences that were sponsored by the Field Board.

The Laymen's Conference was held at the Diocesan Center on October 8th and 9th. The Conference was addressed by the Bishop Coadjutor, Dr. Sheerin, Vice-President of the National Council, and the Rev. Mr. Boyd, Chairman of the Diocesan Field Board. About twenty-five laymen from the five Convocations in the Diocese were in attendance. The laymen adopted a motion setting up a permanent organization. Mr. Arthur M. Field, of Christ Church, Winchester, was elected permanent Chairman; Mr. James P. Massie was elected Vice-Chairman, and Mr. George Robey, Secretary. It will probably be of interest to this Council that a motion was made and duly seconded and carried, that a written request be made to the Finance Committee of the Diocese, asking that the Financial Report in the annual Journal be made in such a manner that would be readily understandable by the laity. It is the opinion of the Field Board that this Conference was well worthwhile and a similar conference will be held this Fall just prior to the Every-Member Canvass.

The Clergy Conference was held at Shrine Mont, October 3rd and 4th. About eighty-five per cent of the clergy of the Diocese were present. The Conference was addressed by the Rev. Joseph B. Dunn, D. D., of Richmond, and the Rev. Charles W. Lowry, D. D., of the Virginia Theological Seminary. The afternoon of the second day was devoted to the plans of the Field Board, and literature for the coming Fall Campaign was distributed and suggestions, following the round table discussion, were made in regard to the conducting of the canvass.

In addition to these two conferences, the Chairman of the Field Board or some member of the Field Board has appeared on the program of Fall and Spring meetings of all of the Convocations.

At the January meeting of the Executive Committee of the D. M. S. the Field Board was charged with the responsibility of conducting a campaign to help the National Council and our own Diocese meet the rather serious emergency. Working through Convocational Chairmen your Field Board has tried to carry out the wishes of the Executive Committee. A great many of the parishes took the special offering at Easter, and those that did not will take one on Whitsunday. In addition to this a great many individuals in the Diocese have made contributions direct to the National Council. The goal set by the Field Board for this special offering is \$10,000.00. This \$10,-000.00 will be divided on a fifty per cent. basis with the National Council up to the \$10,000.00. Anything that may be raised over \$10,000.00 will be kept here for our own Diocesan needs. Of course, no financial report can be given, as most of the congregations will take the offerings on Whitsunday.

The Field Board has been encouraged by the aroused interest of the laymen in assuming their responsibility for carrying on the Church's program in the Diocese. We wish to call especial attention to the excellent work done by laymen in the Valley and Piedmont Convocations. We regret to report that Mr. Arthur M. Field, of Win-

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chester, had to resign due to his change of residence to Memphis, Tennessee. Mr. Field gave unstintingly of his time during the Fall Campaign and visited as a lay speaker many of the congregations and missions in and around Winchester.

With the continued aroused interest of the Laymen we trust that by next year we may have the opportunity of presenting to you a more detailed report of lay activity in the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

V. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

To the RIGHT REV. H. ST. GEORGE TUCKER, D. D., President Ex-Officio: It is my pleasure to make to make the following report:

The work of the Woman's Auxiliary shows during the past year a very definite development in its objective of prayer, study, service. Each morning the Diocese is encircled by prayers for our Bishops and clergy and our officers, together with a special weekly objective.

During 1938, I have written four hundred and twenty-two letters, twenty-five postals, visited sixteen Branches, attended four Convocations, the Diocesan Institute, the Provincial Synod, meetings of the Executive Committee, Diocesan Missionary Society, the Board of Religious Education, the Board of Mountain Work, besides the always helpful and profitable days spent with the mountain missionaries at Summer Rest.

The report of the Auxiliary was read to the Council by my able Secretary, Mrs. Higginbotham, because of my inability to do so, and my place at the Summer Conferences was filled by other willing and able officers.

Six new branches have been formed: several branches of the Junior Women have moved up into the adult groups, and following the suggestions at the Triennial in Cincinnati, great interest has developed in the unified Auxiliary, which enlists the attention of all the women in the parishes. dividing them into chapters, or groups, or leagues, or guilds, as the case may be, and those branches using this method show more members, greater interest, and larger gifts.

It is interesting to note that eight new branches of the Little Helpers have been organized, though eight other branches seem to be inactive. having failed to report or answer letters. This is deeply to be regretted, as no work in the Auxiliary could be of greater service in a parish, because of its influence in moulding the characters of little children and aiding mothers to answer difficult questions and situations.

The Junior Auxiliaries, the groups which follow the Little Helpers, are developing their own leaders, by planning their own meetings, holding study classes, working in the five fields of service, contributing always to the United Thank Offering, and sending out money and boxes.

Between the Juniors and the Seniors are the 'teen age girls, with their enthusiasm and energy and latent possibilities. This important group is called Section C. A definite way of developing them into strong and loval Church women would be through the Altar Guild.

The Convocation Secretaries report increased interest and splendid meetings. Under the Educational Secretary, the Institute has again, through its fine leaders, brought information and spiritual help, and its contacts have been invaluable.

Our Treasurer has a gift for making money talk, and the year's financial statement, though below that of last year, reveals a profound interest in mission work-China, Japan, Brazil, India, Liberia, and both our continental and extra-continental possessions. Especially is this interest true of the United Thank Offering as more and more women use the little blue boxes.

The colored work is developing definitely. The clergy are getting behind the Auxiliaries and the branches report money and boxes and gifts. The Convocation at Miller's Tavern is developing a fine set of leaders.

The Summer Conferences are of such inestimable value that it is hoped

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each parish will see that it is represented by both young people and adults.

Through generous contributions to the Book of Remembrances and the Gift of Life Committee, scholarships for two girls have been provided in training schools.

We were most fortunate in having the Provincial Synod meet in Richmond in October. With its fine personnel and its deep spiritual emphasis, it went far to make us provincial-minded by enlarging our vision and by exchanging plans and purposes with outside groups.

In comparing our report with others, from the tabulated answers to questionnaires sent out before the Synod, it was good to see that the Diocese of Virginia had the largest number of branches of both Senior and Junior women, therefore, the largest membership, largest number of study classes, devotional services, quiet days and devotional chairmen.

A gracious thing was done by the Synod in selecting as its project for 1939 the high school for colored boys and girls at Miller's Tavern, Va. Dr. Hamilton's appeal for better equipment went straight to our hearts and the response was enthusiastic.

The Auxiliary is also deeply interested in St. Andrew's Community Centre, Gloucester County, Va., where a splendid piece of rural work is being done.

One designated weak spot was failure to take the Spirit of Missions, and your president sees also a glaring weakness in this Diocese in the failure of our women to be willing to take their place as leaders.

Two resignations have been regretfully accepted: that of Mrs. Picot, Secretary of the Forward Movement, and Mrs. Robert Bean, Supply Secretary. Their work has been deeply appreciated. Mrs. E. Jauquelin Smith will take over the Forward Movement, and we have been very fortunate in securing Mrs. John Hancock, of Richmond, as Supply Secretary. Every branch will hear from them and we assure them of our co-operation.

The annual meetings of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, at Bishop Tucker's request, was postponed until April, 1939, the old officers holding over. It will meet in Grace and Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, April, 12th-13th-14th.

As we become more and more interested in India and hear from the returning delegates about the World Council in Madras and as we learn of the great opportunities here at home, through our Study Groups, and as the sufferings of oppressed peoples are loud in our ears, may we realize that it is the consecrated life of each individual and her influence in every department of life that counts.

Our prayer is that our Father may teach each of His children, puzzled by the new situation, where he may go and what he should do, and may help us to put utterly at His disposition every little talent, which may be of use in His Kingdom.

General Remarks.

The Finance Committee has sold a new bond issue in the amount of \$550,000 for purpose of paying outstanding bonds and all floating indebtedness.

The large improvements at St. Catherine's School, and additions to other properties, caused a considerable increase in obligations. The favorable interest rates existing at this time, together with the necessity of rearrangement of maturities so that a proportionate amount within the ability of the schools to pay, would mature each year, induced the Committee to accept the proposal of the bankers to underwrite a new issue of bonds. The rate of interest to be from $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ to a maximum of $4\frac{1}{4}\%$. This will result in a much more satisfactory form of indebtedness as well as an actual saving in interest of over \$2,000 per annum for the period ending June 1, 1950.

The Greenway Rise property was purchased at what seemed to

be a most reasonable price, \$40,000. This sum was paid—cash \$10,000 by St. Anne's School and the balance along with \$95,000 for new buildings by an issue of \$125,000 of bonds, \$30,000 of which will mature in five years, interest rate 4%, and \$95,000 in ten years, interest rate 5%. These bonds are secured by a mortgage on the property and an assignment of the Hobliston bequest, estimated at this time to be worth \$165,000.

We have advanced into the year, which ends on June 30th, sufficient to know the approximate situation of the finances for the season 1938-1939, and from all indications the net results equal those of the statements herewith published.

It must be borne in mind that so long as the schools are heavily involved in debt that all earnings should be conserved for purpose of reducing the debt and to meet the heavy demands from the schools to keep their plants in condition to render the service for which the system was instituted.

ST. ANNE'S SCHOOL.

In addition to property previously occupied by St. Anne's School there has been purchased the property known as Greenway Rise, located just beyond the city limits of Charlottesville, on the Ivy Road. This beautiful estate of 23 acres with its main residence and buildings now under construction will furnish boarding facilities for 45 girls, faculty, etc., and for 150 day pupils.

The old property will be sold and proceeds applied to payment of the Greenway Rise purchase.

CHRISTCHURCH SCHOOL.

This school was founded in 1921 as a country boarding school for boys. It is located at Christchurch, Virginia, in Middlesex County, in the heart of the Tidewater Section of Eastern Virginia and has an enrollment of 44. The campus contains 103 acres, situated on high ground overlooking the Rappahannock River, on which are located 11 buildings and an athletic field.

ST. CATHERINE'S SCHOOL.

This school was founded by Miss Virginia Randolph Ellett in 1890 and acquired in 1920 by the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia and made a country resident and day school for girls. It is now located in Westhampton, Richmond, Virginia, near the Country Club of Virginia and the best residential section of Richmond. St. Catherine's is

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one of the leading girls' schools in the South, with an enrollment of 416. The campus contains approximately 13.2 acres, on which are located nineteen buildings, swimming pool, riding ring and hockey field.

ST. CHRISTOPHER'S SCHOOL.

St. Christopher's School was founded in 1911 as the Chamberlayne School, beginning in a small way with quarters at 3311 Grove Avenue, Richmond, Virginia. After three sessions, the school increased in size to a point where it was necessary to have larger quarters, and in 1914 the present school property was acquired. The school continued to grow, and in June, 1920, was taken over by the Trustees of the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia under the name of St. Christopher's School, and has since been operated by them as a boarding and day school for boys. It is located on St. Christopher Road in Westhampton, Richmond, Virginia, a short distance from the Country Club of Virginia and adjoining a fast growing residential section. St. Christopher's has an enrollment of 295. The campus contains approximately 29.5 acres, on which are located twenty-one buildings and three large athletic fields.

ST. MARGARET'S SCHOOL.

This school, founded in 1920 as a boarding and day school for girls, is located at Tappahannock, Virginia, and fronts on the Rappahannock River.. The campus contains approximately 7 acres, on which are located six buildings, hockey field and private beach. St. Margaret's has an enrollment of 74.

(b) Christchurch School

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Christchurch School will close its nineteenth session on June 6th. The school this year has an enrollment of 53; 51 boarding pupils and 2 day pupils. In the boarding department 42 of the 51 students are from Episcopal families, 28 live in the Diocese. This is the largest enrollment the school has had in recent years.

In reviewing the work for this year I can report definite progress in the program of the school. During the past summer some muchneeded improvements were made to the property which have greatly increased the efficiency of the plant; many evergreens, trees and shrubs have been planted on the campus by the boys which add greatly to the natural beauty of the school setting. The general average of the academic work has been high, and the boys have taken part in many extra-curricula activities. Our health record is as usual excellent. This year for the first time we have had a school choir. They have developed under the excellent direction of a member of the Staff, and the music adds greatly to the evening services held in the School Chapel. Four of the boys and two members of the Staff sing in the choir at Christ Church.

Religious instruction is under the supervision of Dr. Smith, the Chaplain. Dr. Smith teaches the boys of the two upper forms; the lower forms being taught by members of the regular faculty.

Two student activities which have made notable progress this year are the Literary Society and the school paper. The boys enjoy the programs of the Literary Society and have made real progress in the technique of public reading and declamation. The school paper is written by the boys and printed by them on the school mimeograph. This year they are printing a year book and illustrating it with photographs furnished by the Camera Club.

The school has a regular job system and every boy has some definite piece of work to do each day. These jobs include such assignments as care of the campus, cleaning the class rooms and study hall, and taking care of the chapel and gymnasium. We attempt to teach our boys to work with their hands as well as with their minds, and to take pride in the appearance of the school property.

At the present time prospects for a full enrollment next session are excellent. The school looks to the future with confidence and to an increasing opportunity of service to the Church.

(c) St. Anne's School

To the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

I am very glad to send you a report of the work of St. Anne's School for the year that has passed since your Council met.

The total enrollment for the year is now 121, showing consistent growth in the ten years I have been here. I find that the proportion of Episcopalians in the school has grown, being two-thirds of the total this year as against 45 per cent four years ago.

Our new buildings at Greenway Rise should certainly help us greatly to build a larger and better school. I hope that all who attend the Council meetings will find it possible to go out and visit this new site. The residence now on the property is in excellent condition and splendidly adapted to the uses of a school. It will house the older boarding students and will also contain the library, reception and dining rooms. A new unit will provide rooms for younger girls in the boarding school. There will also be a new school building and

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a gymnasium, in the basement of which there will be a small chapel. Large playing fields are also provided for hockey, tennis and other outdoor forms of recreation. As we admit boys up to and including the fourth grade, there will be a separate playing field for the use of these small boys.

As a Church school we have realized the importance of our chapel services for the whole school and in the last few years particularly, these have been planned to enlist their interest in regular services of worship, as well as in the work which the Church and its related organizations are doing. Home and foreign missionary efforts receive our contributions all through the year. Voluntary cash contributions during the current year amounted to \$183.12, besides several boxes of clothing to school children, Mountain Mission workers, the Salvation Army and the Red Cross. Three early morning communion services have been held for resident students, the Rev. Dudley Boogher and the Rev. Mr. Batchellor officiating. Four of the students were presented for confirmation by Dr. Gibson on April 23rd and were confirmed by Bishop Tucker.

St. Anne's continues to place its emphasis on college preparation and has recent graduates attending Vassar, Smith, Wellesley, Wilson, Sweet Briar and Randolph-Macon. One of our girls at Vassar has just been awarded a large scholarship for her junior year, similar awards having been made in her Freshman and Sophomore years because of her fine scholastic record.

(d) St. Catherine's School

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia: This year, 1939, marks the nineteenth year of St. Catherine's School, and its sixteenth year as a boarding and day school, continuing the school founded in Richmond in 1890 by Virginia Randolph

Ellett.

It is appropriate here that I report to the Council that on the afternoon of Easter, Miss Ellett ended her long, useful, and inspiring life. For several years she had been in retirement from active duties, but in happy contact with St. Catherine's staff and alumnae, living in the house provided for her by her alumnae on the school grounds. Beginning life, she had looked into the future, with a vision of giving young women a preparation for life by means of higher education. She lived to see her vision realized. Many young women were inspired by her teaching and example. The memorial meeting of students at the School, the funeral services at St. Paul's Church, Richmond, reflected the deep feeling of many loyal friends. Notable indeed were the editorials in the Richmond papers, giving her a high place in educational advancement in Virginia and the South. Death at Easter, after a brief illness, at a ripe age, came to "Miss Jennie" as a true and beautiful ending to a rare life.

Rev. Giles B. Palmer is preparing a class of eighteen students to be confirmed by Bishop Goodwin on Ascension Day, in the Bishop Brown Memorial Chapel. Two of these students are also to be baptized in the Chapel.

We reported to the Council last year our happiness in looking forward to the occupancy of the buildings which were in the process of being constructed. There is now only a small part of one floor to be finished in the summer, and we wish to report our great appreciation of the comfort and pleasure that we have in the new buildings. We repeat that we hope that the Council will meet soon in Richmond, and at St. Stephen's Church, so that we may ask you to see the completed buildings and to have lunch at St. Catherine's.

A large number of girls from the graduating class plan to go to college; a number of them are taking the College Entrance Board examinations. From the Senior Class of last year, numbering fiftyfive girls, twenty-nine are in Senior Colleges, eleven in Junior Colleges, seven are in schools for advanced work, such as music, art, etc., one is studying abroad, and seven have stayed at home.

The complete enrollment of St. Catherine's for 1938-1939 is 421 students. 296 are day pupils, and 125 are resident students. This last is the total number planned for the boarding school. Of this group, forty are from Virginia, twenty-three from the South, twelve from states west of Virginia, and fifty from states north of Washington, D. C.

(e) Report of St. Christopher's School

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia: SIR5:

I beg to submit the following report of St. Christopher's School for the session of 1938-1939, being the twenty-eighth in its history and the nineteenth under Church ownership:

(1). Enrollment: (a) Total enrollment of pupils, 292; boarding pupils, 42; day pupils, 250. Upper School pupils, 207; Lower School pupils, 85. (b) Faculty members (including three half-time teachers in the Lower School and the School Librarian), 24; Men, 15; women, 9. (c) House staff, 5: Matrons, 2; housekeeper, 1; resident nurse, 1; superintendent of buildings, 1. (d) Executive staff, 3. Business Manager, 1; Treasurer and bookkeeper, 1; secretary, 1.

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(2). Health: The health of the pupils in the School has been excellent throughout the session.

(3). Work: The regular work of the School has been of a satisfactory character.

(4). The religious affiliation of the members of the faculty and of the house and executive staffs this session is as follows: Protestant Episcopal, 19; Baptist, 6; Presbyterian, 5; Methodist, 1; Russian Orthodox, 1.

(5). Religious affiliation of pupils: (a) Protestant Episcopal,181 (61 plus per cent). (b) Other churches, 111 (38 plus per cent).

(6). Graduating Class: At the close of the session, on June 9th, a class of 22 will be graduated. The variety in the selection of colleges by this group is interesting. The distribution is as follows: one to Princeton, one to Harvard, one to Yale, one to Annapolis, one to the University of Texas, one to the University of Michigan, one to Hampden-Sidney, one to William and Mary, several to the Virginia Military Institute, several to the University of Virginia, and one to Washington and Lee. The influence that St. Christopher's and the Church has had on these young men will through them be distributed over a large area of our country.

(7). Finances for the session: While it is impossible for me at this date (April 22nd) to give exact figures for the session, it is my hope and belief that the books of the School on June 30th, the closing day of our financial year, will show a substantial credit balance. It is to be noted here that the School will by June 30th have met for this year the annual assessment of \$6,000.00 made upon it as its share of the \$18,000.00 required for interest on the Church Schools Bond Issue of \$300,000.00 and will also have met an additional assessment of \$1,750.00 made by the Board of Trustees for operating expenses of the Church Schools System. Furthermore, we are retiring a bond of \$1,000.00 (of a School issue of \$15,000.00 for the erection of the new Gymnasium) and are likewise meeting interest payments on gymnasium bonds outstanding.

(8). Scholarships: Scholarships established by friends of the School, amounting to about \$1,500.00, are this year being given through the School toward the education of the youth of Virginia and the Church.

(9). Increase in Enrollment: Last session we had a total enrollment of 281 boys. Our enrollment this year to date is 292—an increase of 11, or almost .03% plus.

(10). A Suggestion: It is once more offered as a suggestion that individual parishes in the Diocese found at the School parish scholarships, reserving to themselves the right of presentation. By such action the parish would benefit, and the School, the property of the Church and one of its working organizations, would be strengthened. (11). Religion: St. Christopher's School is a Church institution. In every department of the School's life, therefore, the fundamental importance of religion is recognized. The first exercise of every school day is a short divine service, in which every boy takes an active part; and before athletic events the boys of the whole school kneel together in prayer to ask God's blessing upon those who are about to represent them in the contest. In addition to these religious services, regular instruction in religion is provided for in graded courses, every boy being required to take two periods a week in the religious studies of his form. During this session, one of the Masters has had complete supervision of this work and all classes in Religious Instruction are being conducted either by him or under his personal supervision. His work has added much to the development of this course.

Furthermore, recognizing the futility of trying by means of religious exercises and studies alone to inculcate a religious spirit, the school management endeavors to awaken that spirit in the boys and to foster it when awakened by presenting to them definite opportunities of work for others.

Among the opportunities that have come to the boys of St. Christopher's this year are the following: The Red Cross Membership Campaign, the Community Fund Drive, and direct appeals for funds, clothing and toys to aid various schools, orphanages, mountain missions, and the like. Answering these appeals, the School will, by the end of the session, have collected and distributed through its Missionary Societies and other agencies sums amounting in the aggregate to about \$900.00 and a large number of articles of clothing, toys, and books.

(12). The Bishop's Visitation: On Sunday, March 26th, 1939, Bishop Goodwin confirmed at St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton, three of the pupils of the School, one of whom is a member of the Boarding Department. On Sunday, April 2nd, Bishop Tucker confirmed at St. James's Church, Richmord, six of the pupils of the School, two of whom are members of the Boarding Department.

(13). Limiting the enrollment: For the coming session the enrollment is to be limited to 300 pupils—48 boarding pupils and 252 day boys.

(14). The Outlook for the Session of 1939-1940: Prospects for next session are excellent.

(15). On April 3rd St. Christopher's suffered an incalculable loss in the death of Dr. Churchill G. Chamberlayne, Headmaster. Although Dr. Chamberlayne had been ill since the latter part of January, his death came as a great shock to all connected with the School. He was respected and loved by teachers and pupils alike. His deep rooted influence in the School has inspired not only each member of the faculty, but each member of the student body, to do everything pos-

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sible to carry on for him and to continue his great work in the way they know he would want it done. St. Christopher's will stand as a living memorial to its beloved founder. His spirit will always be in the School.

(16). Further information in regard to the character and work of St. Christopher's can be found in the school catalogue and in the other printed publications of the School.

(f) St. Margaret's School

To the Bishop and Members of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

St. Margaret's School last September began its eighteenth session with an enrollment of eighty-two, of whom eight were day pupils and seventy-four boarding. Seventy-four boarding pupils fill the dormitories, the study hall, class rooms and dining room to their capacity. Of the seventy-four, forty are from Virginia, and of these twenty-seven are from the Diocese of Virginia, twelve from the Diocese of Southern Virginia, and one from the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia. The others come from as far north as Massachusetts, as far south as Florida, and as far west as Minnesota, and it is noteworthy that at least thirteen of these have some family connection with Virginia and apparently wish to keep the tradition.

St. Margaret's graduates have frequently chosen colleges within the State, but last year two of its graduates chose Wellesley and Vassar. They took College Entrance Board Examinations, were admitted to the colleges they desired, and are doing satisfactory work as freshmen.

The School endeavors to make religion for its girls a part of normal life. Brief morning and evening prayers open and close each school day; the seniors conduct the service one evening a week, the juniors another evening, and last fall the sophomores, at their request, were given the privilege of taking their turn. The curriculum provides for two periods a week of graded religious instruction for every girl. On Sunday the girls attend St. John's Church, being regularly present at Sunday School and morning or evening service. They themselves carry on a Junior Auxiliary. When Bishop Tucker's appeal for the deficit was called to the attention of the School, a check for fifty dollars was speedily sent, but the interesting thing is that every girl and every member of the faculty and staff made some

contribution to this fund. Seven of the girls were confirmed by Bishop Goodwin in March.

2. Blue Ridge Industrial School

With the year ending 1938, the School completed the 29th year of its existence. The regular work of the school was very satisfactory.

The total enrollment was 183-boys, 80; girls, 103.

Grammar grades, 120; High school, 63.

Boarding pupils, 153; day pupils, 30.

Graduates, 2 girls.

Employees: 32. Men, 10; women, 22. Teachers, 15; 2 housefathers, 4 housemothers; 2 matrons; 1 farm manager; 1 shop foreman; 1 nurse; 1 secretary; 1 principal; 1 night watchman. This does not include the regular farm laborers. Five mountain families live on the school property and from these most of the farm labor comes. In addition to the men in these five families, ten or twelve local men work in the school either on the building or the general farm work. The only source of income for these men is the work at the school.

At the close of this year the new grade school is nearing completion. Work on this building began in the spring and the building will soon be ready to be occupied. The total cost to date is \$10,904.47. The building is of native stone and is designed to fit in with the buildings built last year.

The school was in operation 12 months with an average of 158 boarding pupils. The total cost of operation was \$41,716.21 or about \$264.03 for each boarding pupil. Of this sum \$23,741.52, nearly 57 per cent was received from fees collected for board and tuition and profit from school industries. Donations amounted to \$9,445.39. The total value of all property is \$178,617.00 which is entirely free of debt.

The regular charge for board and tuition following the change made last year is \$15.00 per month, but what we have been able to collect averaged less than \$10.00 a month. Some paid nothing and some paid as much as \$20.00 a month.

The total value of all provisions furnished the school from the farm, orchard and cannery was \$6,911.73. Total value of student labor furnished farm, orchard, cannery, and buildings. \$1,715.58. Profit from farm, orchard and cannery, \$879.70.

The regular academic course in the Blue Ridge Industrial School is accredited by the State Board of Education. In addition, vocational

training is given in commercial work, agriculture, manual arts for boys, handicraft and home economics for girls. The third part of the curriculum of the Blue Ridge Industrial School is the industrial side. Industrial training not only supplies the needs of the School, but also is of additional benefit in training the pupil in a practical way to carry on a job. The school bakery bakes on an average 2,590 loaves of bread per month, providing 95 hours per month of instruction for a class of three boys and 135 hours of instruction per month for a class of five girls. The school dairy handles approximately 1,300 gallons of milk per month, with 45 hours of instruction for a class of two girls. The school laundry handles 7,000 pieces per month and offers 770 hours of instruction to a group of 25 pupils, 4 boys and 21 girls.

The health of the pupils was very good. There were two clinics held at the school which benefited our pupils and the community. 79 per cent of our pupils met the Five-Point Standard. All pupils were given a thorough physical examination, either before or immediately after entrance. The University Hospital and Medical School cooperate in this work, giving free treatment where it is needed.

Recreation is organized and one hour a day given to it. In addition to the regular recreation period, for two weeks we had the services of Mr. John Morgan of Berea College in teaching folk games.

Emphasis has been placed on religious instruction since the founding of the school. Three 40-minute class periods each week were given to this subject. The Christian Nurture Course was used and the state course in Old and New Testament are given for credit. A short service was held daily in the school auditorium and a short family service was held in the dining room after supper. A public service was held in the chapel every Sunday morning. Holy Communion was celebrated twice each month and the Young People's Service League met Sunday evenings. 28 were confirmed. Contributions for missions and benevolences amounted to \$708.42. One of our graduates is a very successful clergyman and another, a postulant from this Diocese, entered the Seminary in the fall of 1938. The two regular missions, St. David's, Wyatt Mountain, and All Saints,

Haneytown, have had regular services by the workers from the school. A new mission at the Federal Resettlement, near Geer, Greene County, was started this fall.

To the Diocese of Virginia:

The 95th session of the school is now drawing to a successful conclusion. We number 133 resident students and 21 day students, making a total of 154.

Our school plant is in excellent condition, and the girls' reception room (in the early days the school chapel) is the admiration of all visitors since its redecoration last fall. Much work is to be done on the grounds. We are doing some each year, grading and re-sodding where needed.

Our student body is a cosmopolitan one; not only are the South, East and Middle West well represented, but there are six students from outside the continental United States.

Last year's class, with the exception of one girl, is in college or in schools offering specialized training. At present we have students in Smith, Bryn Mawr, Vassar, Swarthmore, Radcliffe, Mt. Holyoke, Wellesley, Sweet Briar, Hollins, Randolph-Macon, Barnard, Skidmore, Wilson, Brenau, Stephens, Goucher, Wooster, Colorado, Mary Baldwin, Rollins and Sophie Newcomb Colleges; Akron, Bucknell, Cornell, Duke and George Washington Universities, and the Universities of Cincinnati, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin, as well as numerous junior colleges.

Our courses have proceeded as usual—our work in the Lower School is from the fourth to the 8th grade, we have college preparation, and a general course for the non-college girl. For high school graduates we offer a one or a two-year complete secretarial course.

This year has seen the appearance of a student newspaper, and the formation of a double sextette that sings once a week at the school vespers. Membership in this is taken from the two school choirs— St. Ambrose and St. Gregory.

The alumnae work has been given a great impetus by our first printed alumnae news letter, which went out to more than 1,300 alumnae and former students. Besides the group of local alumnae, we have established within the last year or two a Metropolitan Chap-

ter in New York, and a Central Kentucky Chapter. This year new chapters have been established in Missouri, a New England Chapter in Boston, and a Roanoke Chapter in Roanoke, Virginia.

Commencement, which is not far off, will have reunions of the Classes of 1929 and 1934.

Our school at this time is in excellent condition, and the prospects for the coming year equally good. We hope that churchmen coming through Staunton will take the opportunity to visit the school.

II. REPORT OF OPERATING ACCOUNTS OF THE DIOCESE

REV. G. MACLAREN BRYDON, TREASURER.

To the Finance Committee, Diocese of Virginia,

Richmond, Virginia.

Gentlemen :

We have made an audit of the Treasurer's records and accounts of the administration of

Diocesan Operating Funds

for the year ended December 31, 1938, and submit herewith sundry statements thereon as reflected in the foregoing index, together with the following related comments.

The account of Diocesan Operating Funds, considered as a whole, embraces miscellaneous funds for general church administrative and extension purposes in this Diocese, and the cash funds for the purposes designated are derived mainly from Churches, Auxiliary Organizations, Apportionments from the General Program Funds, Individuals, etc.

In the verification of the amounts shown as accruing to the general account from the various sources enumerated above, we have not gone beyond the records of your Treasurer, but have relied substantially on a check of all recorded receipts and disbursements.

120 144TH ANNUAL COUNCIL DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

Due to the recent illnesses of your Treasurer and assistant Treasurer your records had necessarily been somewhat neglected, and so we consumed more time than usual in the preparation of the statements submitted herewith.

Exhibit "A" is a summary of Receipts and Disbursements for the entire group of operating funds as a whole, reflecting the condition of each fund at the beginning of the year, total amounts received as well as disbursed to and from each fund, and the final balance or overdraft in each fund, which latter figures are indicated in the column to the right. This summary is codified with respect to the separate statements for the individual funds, which statements show all details pertaining to receipts and disbursements of the respective fund.

At the bottom of the general summary, "Exhibit "A", are included the total receipts and disbursements for account of the Board of Apportionment-Diocesan Program, which passed through the same bank account as that of the operating funds. A report of this Fund is being submitted under separate cover.

In this connection, it will be noted that the operating account showed a cash balance of \$26,058.28, which includes therein a balance in the Loan Account in the amount of \$20,400.00. On the other hand, the account for the Board of Apportionment reflected a deficit or overdraft of \$12,078.65, leaving a net balance in the bank of \$13,979.63. Inasmuch as the 1938 Program Account is an integral part of the same bank account, the overdraft of \$12,078.65 of the Board of Apportionment has to be considered in arriving at the net cash balance.

It will be noted that at the beginning of the year the net amount of cash on deposit to the credit of the Treasurer in the operating account was \$11,572.70, at which time the current debt to the bank was \$20,950.00, while at the close of the year cash on deposit was \$26,058.28, against which were current obligations of \$20,400.00. These current obligations consisted of the following:

We are informed that no specific provision has so far been made for financing this old debt, but the balance of \$7,000.00 on a loan from Mr. John M. Taylor, which was made in 1929 for \$8,500.00, is to be curtailed at the rate of \$1,000.00 per year beginning January 1, 1937. Curtail of \$1,000.00 was made in 1937 and \$500.00 in 1938.

Other extraneous liabilities consist of:

pany in Receivership. This fund was established for the purpose of building a chapel in the Mayo Memorial Building.

No expression has been given on your books either to the balance being carried by the Diocese of Virginia in the American Bank and Trust Company in Receivership. This deposit originally in the amount of \$182.80 has been reduced by dividends to \$82.26.

III. REPORT OF THE PROGRAM OF THE DIOCESE FOR 1938

RICHMOND, VA., April 14, 1939

To the Finance Committee, Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia

Gentlemen:

We have audited the Treasurer's records of recorded Receipts and Disbursements of the Diocesan Program for 1937 and 1938, under the Supervision of the Board of Apportionment, for the year ended December 31, 1938, and submit herewith the following statements relative to this Program, which is the medium through which the various activities of the Diocese as a whole are financed.

Exhibit "A"—1938 Program: This statement summarizes the Receipts as to source and the Disbursements as to object for the program year 1938, and also sets forth the budget appropriations for sundry Diocesan expenditures. The funds of this account, which were deposited and disbursed through the same bank account as those of the General Operating Account were examined and found in order.

Reference is made to statement of the net condition of the Diocesan Operating Account in a separate report which shows the final net condition to be as follows:

Current Debt to Bank Net Cash in Bank	
Net Deficit December 31, 1938	\$ 6,420 37

The deficit of \$6,420.37 above includes the \$12,078.65 overdraft or deficiency reflected in Exhibit "A" of this report, but does not include the old deficit debt in the form of a note to Mr. John M. Taylor in the amount of \$7,000.00.

In order to pay the appropriations on the 1938 Diocesan Program it was necessary to borrow during the year from the bank and sundry funds of the Diocese the sum of \$26,050.00. During the year repayments of loans in the amount of \$26,000.00 were made; the net decrease of \$550.00 during the year when applied to the debt of \$20,950.00 outstanding at January 1, 1938, decreases the indebtedness to bank and sundry funds to \$20,400.00 at December 31, 1938. The transactions giving effect to the above changes are reflected in the General Operating Account of the Diocesan Missionary Society. It would appear that if every parish would remit monthly its acceptance it would in all probability relieve the Diocese of the necessity of borrowing funds, and would eliminate the payment of interest of more than five hundred dollars.

V. REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE FUNDS OF THE PROT-ESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

RICHMOND, VIRGINIA, April 14, 1939.

To the Trustees of the Funds, Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia:

Gentlemen:

We have examined the records and securities relating to the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia, for the year ended December 31, 1938, and in connection therewith we have prepared the accompanying statements, as set forth in the foregoing Index, which, in our opinion, reflect the various changes which have taken place in these Funds during the year 1938, and show their status at the close of the period under review.

Exhibit "A" is a general summary of Receipts and Disbursements relating to the individual funds grouped under General Fund. The final current condition of the Income Account of each individual fund in the general group as shown by your books is indicated in the next to the last column to the right, the total of all individual funds reflecting a net balance of \$3,425,12, which is a result of the following:

Due to the recent illnesses of your Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer sundry transfers and adjustments of funds were not effected until subsequent to December 31, 1938. Inasmuch as the statements presented herewith have been prepared, as in the past, on a Cash Receipts and Disbursement basis, the adjustments referred to above do not appear thereon. However, for your information we have indicated on Exhibit "A" in the last column sundry transfers from income to principal account totaling \$4,061.50, and sundry transfers to Baker Fund in the amount of \$1,117.06, which have been or will be consummated in 1939.

Your attention is invited to the fact that the loss of \$1,610.00 on Continental Investment Debenture Corporation Bonds has been charged in 1939

In the allotting of income to the various individual funds, your Treasurer has apportioned income to the funds on a basis of 3-1/2%, except in the case of specific bonds held by certain funds, in which case the income is allotted on the basis as called for by the respective investment.

After the allotment referred to above, there existed an under apportionment of income in the amount of \$855.04, which excess has been credited to the Operating Account. This adjustment includes error in apportionment of \$72.50.

There now remains in the Profit and Loss Account a balance of \$827.76 after crediting same with premium in the amount of \$135.81 on H. O. L. C. bonds sold. The balance in this account is an integral part of the balances making up the total of Diocesan Funds.

Exhibit "B" is collateral to Exhibit "A", and is made up of the individual funds by Parishes, showing the transfers to and from each fund in the General Account Group, as well as securities held for each fund.

Exhibits "C" and "D" show the Receipts and Disbursements for account of the Disabled Clergy, and Widows' and Orphans' Funds.

Exhibits "E", "F" and "G" reflect the Receipts and Disbursements for account of Sallie May Dooley, Working Girls' Cot and Diamond Cot Funds, as reported by the First and Merchants National Bank, Custodian. Remittances to the General Treasurer by this Custodian are set forth in Exhibit "H".

Exhibit "I" records a summary of the equities of each fund in the securities and other values owned by the General Funds. Some of these securities and properties are specifically designated, while the greater bulk of the investments are apportioned. Further details as to securities held for each fund may be found in Exhibit "B" under the respective Fund.

The increase of \$1,763.25 in General Fund was due to transfers from income totaling \$1,463.25 and addition to principal amounting to \$300.00. It will be noted from Exhibit "I" that the loss of \$1,610.00 on Continental Investment Corporation Bonds and the profit of \$500.00 on Virginia Electric & Power Company Bonds sold during the year has been included in the total values held for General Funds. These amounts were charged in 1939 to income account of sundry funds.

The decrease of \$984.70 in Disabled Clergy Fund was due largely to net loss on sundry bonds sold, totaling \$831.59, and premium on bonds purchased, totaling \$155.56.

The increase of \$2,500.53 in Sallie May Dooley Fund is accounted for to a large extent by the profit of \$1,700.00 on City of Lynchburg bonds sold, and the excess amount of Douglas M. Derringer notes received on the sale of foreclosed property (#1404 Claremont Ave.).

Attention is directed to the lease between the Trustees of the Funds and W. B. Catlett for the rental of #11 N. Jefferson Street, Richmond, Virginia. It appears that based on the provisions of this lease executed March 30, 1926, the Trustees of the Funds are due approximately \$925.00 in back rent and taxes.

Attention is also directed to the liability of the Trustees of the Funds on mortgage indebtedness to Jones and Robins, Inc., Richmond, Virginia, for \$2,500.00 due April 6, 1939, on Church of Our Saviour, Sandston, Virginia. Neither this liability or any other which may be existent at December 31, 1938, is reflected by your books.
