ORGANIZATION

From Canon I, Section 1. Within one week before every regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of all the Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese, with their Post Offices, and their respective cures or stations as missionaries or as chaplains, or the schools or seminaries of learning, or institutions, or societies, connected with this Church, in or by which they are engaged, and the ministers entitled to seats in the Council shall be designated.

This list, corrected as hereinafter mentioned, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting and the names of the clerical members called therefrom.

CANON II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make out a roll of the Lay Delegates certified to him as duly elected, with the parishes or churches represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall then appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to whom shall be referred the credentials of the lay delegates, and who shall report thereon to the Council.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate to his seat, it shall be the duty of the said Committee on Credentials to hear all the evidence presented, and to report its judgment thereupon. And upon this report the Council shall determine the matter; *Provided*, that by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, the Council may hear and determine the whole case de novo.

RULES OF ORDER

I. ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. The Council shall be opened on the first day with a brief service of prayer, and on the second day with a celebration of the Holy Communion, at which time there may be a sermon by a preacher selected by the Bishop.

2. Upon completion of the prayer service on the first day the Secretary shall call the roll of the clergy canonically connected with the Diocese from the list prepared and laid before the Council by the Ecclesiastical Authority; the roll of lay delegates, certified to the Secretary as duly elected, shall then be called; the credentials of the lay delegates shall thereupon be referred to a Committee on Credentials composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates appointed by the President. Upon completion of the celebration of the

 Holy Communion on the second day, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read. The minutes of the second day shall be read before the final adjournment of the Council.

3. Except as otherwise provided herein, the following order of business shall be observed:

(a) Report of the Secretary.

- (b) Election of the Secretary of the Diocese, who is ex-officio the Secretary of the Council.
- (c) Adoption of Rules of Order.
- (d) Adoption of a program of the Council prepared by the Secretary and the Committee on the Dispatch of Business, in consultation with rector of the host parish.
- (e) Reading of pastoral addresses.
- (f) Appointment of committees.
- (g) Reports of standing committees, commissions and boards.
- (h) Reports of special committees.
- (i) Communications from Convocations.
- (j) Unfinished business.
- (k) New business.
- (1) Adjournment.
- 4. (A) There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:
 - (1) Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the pastoral addresses of the Bishops made to the Council, with particular direction to report to the Council upon any recommendations made in the pastoral addresses.
 - (2) Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.
 - (3) Committee on New Parishes, whenever such a committee is needed.
 - (4) Committee on Canons, to whom shall be referred all motions to amend either the Canons or the Constitution of the Diocese.
 - (5) Committee on Nominations to Diocesan Corporations, to whom shall be reported all vacancies in membership of such boards for which nominations must be made by the Council, and to whom all nominations for membership of any of such boards shall be referred for their consideration before being presented to the Council.

- (6) Committee on the Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, the hour for the Council to sit as a Missionary Council, and other matters pertaining to the orderly dispatch of business.
- (B) The President shall have authority at each Council after making appointments of standing committees for such Council to appoint the Chairman and so many of the other members of such committees as he may think proper, who shall serve during the ensuing interim and at the next meeting of the Council.
- 5. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

II. RULES OF PROCEDURE.

- 6. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; every resolution shall be referred to its proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.
- 7. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- 8. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.
- 9. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.
- 10. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 11. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?"; until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.
- 12. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.
- 13. When a member desires to speak in debate or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personalities.

- 14. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.
- 15. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 16. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.
- 17. The vote on all questions shall be taken by order, whenever as many as five members request it.
- 18. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.
- 19. Every member who may be in the house when any question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- 20. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.
- 21. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, provided such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.
- 22. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported up by the Finance Committee, or in their absence, by a special committee.
- 23. Reports of all committees shall be in writing. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall, without obligation, so direct, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

III. GENERAL.

- 24. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.
- 25. The President may, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.
- 26. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

OF THE

149th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia

ALL SAINTS CHURCH, RICHMOND, VA., Wednesday, May 24, 1944.

The 149th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia convened at 10:00 A. M., following a service conducted by Bishop Goodwin and the Rev. E. C. Pedrick.

The Council was called to order by Bishop Tucker.

The Secretary reported a quorum present in both Orders.

Bishop Tucker appointed the Committee on Credentials as follows: Rev. W. R. G. Irwin, Mr. Rosewell Page, Jr. and Mr. G. Edward Lewis.

The Chair appointed a Committee on Dispatch of Business as follows: Rev. George Ossman, Mr. Theodore C. Hudson.

The Rev. Samuel B. Chilton was elected Secretary. He appointed the Rev. Albert C. Muller Assistant Secretary.

On motion the Rules of Order were adopted.

On motion the printed program was adopted.

Bishop Tucker then gave his pastoral address. He expressed for the National Council the appreciation of the General Church for the help and support given by the Diocese of Virginia. Bishop Tucker spoke of the work of the Army and Navy Commission saying that Virginia is proportionately up in front in giving to this work. He touched on plans for helping returning members of the armed services in their readjustment. The future welfare of the Church is involved in part in the way this problem is met. He said he hoped the Diocese would cooperate in the plans being evolved by the General Church. Bishop Tucker also thanked the Diocese for the support given the work of the American

Bible Society saying that this Society's activities are very helpful to the work of foreign missions. It has cooperated especially in work among members of the armed forces. Referring to his resignation as Bishop of Virginia he said that a legal question was involved but that he must abide by the action of the House of Bishops. Personally he considers his resignation effective as of June first. He said that he was resigning from the Diocese with a great deal of assurance as the great progress in recent years was due to the assiduous efforts of Bishop Goodwin and he knew that he was leaving the Diocese in excellent hands.

Bishop Goodwin read his pastoral address and presented the record of his official acts by title. He prefaced his address with a tribute to the one clergyman of the diocese who had died since the last Council.

The Reverend Joseph Fenner Mitchell

The Rev. Joseph Fenner Mitchell died at his home in Newport News on December 13, 1943, aged ninety years. Mr. Mitchell was the last link that bound the Church in the Diocese of Virginia to the early days of our ministry to the Negro race.

Born in Franklinton, North Carolina, on January 9, 1853, he was a lad of twelve years when the end of the War Between the States brought the greater opportunities of freedom to the Negroes of the South. Educated at Christian College in Franklinton he entered in mature manhood upon the preparation for the ministry of the Episcopal Church. He graduated from the Bishop Payne Divinity School in Petersburg in 1889 when that institution was barely ten years of age. He was ordained to the diaconate by Bishop Whittle that year and assigned to the charge of St. Stephen's Church in Petersburg. After a ministry of eight years in that church he was advanced to the priesthood by Bishop Randolph in 1897 and assigned to the charge of the work among the Negroes in Newport News under the care of St. Paul's Church.

On February 1, 1907, he took charge of Meade Chapel in Alexandria and as the first priest in charge of that congregation, after its separation from its earlier status as a Mission of Christ Church, he organized his people for independent existence and was instrumental in raising the greater part of the funds required for the purchase of lots and the erection of the present church building.

After a service of eleven years Mr. Mitchell was sent to the

charge of St. Mary's Memorial Church in Berryville and Christ Mission at Millwood. He retired from active work in 1922 after which he lived at his home in Portsmouth and ministered, as opportunity offered, assisting his brethren in our own and in other religious bodies until in the past few years extreme old age compelled him to desist.

Mr. Mitchell was an earnest, godly and faithful priest of the Church, ministering faithfully to his people and upholding steadfastly the high ideals of Christian character and conduct. The Church in the Diocese of Virginia and especially in the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese is the richer today for the life of this earnest and faithful man of God.

Diocesan Affairs

In making a statement about the affairs of the Diocese since the last Council, as required by canon the picture of the present and of the future is as usual one both of encouragement and of difficulties. The war has brought problems which increase as time goes on, especially in the matter of supplying our parishes. In the last year our roll of chaplains has increased by the commissioning of George Bean, Ed. Clary, Francis Rhein, and Sydney Swann. Steve Davenport is expecting his call in the very near future. To these, and to all of our chaplains, the most cordial greetings of the Council go, with the prayer that God may sustain them, and keep them and bring them safely home again. We are proud of them.

There are now twenty-three vacant fields in the Diocese, but with sixteen chaplains in service, and six men to graduate from our seminaries in June, the profit and loss account in man power just about balances. It is the war which creates our present problem. However, services are being maintained in all the parishes. City clergy are going out on Sunday evenings to learn anew the joys of the country ministry; as for example the rectors of St. Mark's and St. Paul's in Richmond serving the churches in Hanover County. Country parishes are sharing their rectors, as e. g., Ware and Abingdon in Gloucester releasing their clergy for one Sunday a month that they may help in the nearby fields. The Seminary, through faculty and students, is doing a most helpful supply work. Retired clergy, as Mr. Shaw and Mr. Robinson, are back in harness,—others, who have resigned, are carrying on at their vestry's request, and Mr. Chilton does four men's work and seems to cover the whole field.

One Deacon, the Rev. Wilfred T. Waterhouse was ordained and is now serving Rappahannock and Madison Counties and Rapidan. There have been five ordinations to the priesthood—The Revs. Francis B. Rhein, George M. Bean, David H. Lewis, Ir., Edward Guthrie Brown, Palmer Campbell and R. E. Davis.

Six Deacons await ordination in June. Within the Diocese, the Rev. C. E. Buxton has moved from Cople and Lunenburg Parishes to Pohick Church and the Rev. Darby W. Betts resigned Whittle and Piedmont Parishes to undertake the development of the new St. Clements in Alexandria, and right nobly has he succeeded. Taking charge in November of an entirely new and unorganized work he moved into the completed chapel on Easter Sunday, ministering to five hundred people the first day the building was opened. This work represents an accomplishment of which the Diocese as well as Mr. Betts has a right to be proud. We make no promises, but it looks as if it would be a new self-supporting parish in Alexandria in another two or three years.

There are other opportunities in this area that, while not quite as ready to burst into full blossom at the first touch of Spring as was St. Clement's, yet are ready and waiting for development. If the Church is in any measure to keep pace with the rapid growth in this section, even making all proper allowances for possible decline after the pressure of the war is over, we must be ready to increase the number of our clergy and our building program as occasion may demand. This area remains a challeng-

ing missionary opportunity within our own borders.

Richmond also is growing, and in two sections, to the west and to the north of the city, lots have been tentatively selected as future church sites. Obviously the responsibility for the purchase of these lots and the development of chapels thereon is a responsibility of the local group of the churches already established in the general area, and of the Diocese. I am glad to report that the churches in the Piedmont Convocation have generously backed the Chapel of St. Clement's. I hope the Richmond churches will be equally as interested and generous in the support of the new projects near to us, when and as they are developed.

The Financial Situation

Twenty-five years ago the Council met in Christ Church, Winchester, and committed this Diocese to a new movement in the Church called the Nation Wide Campaign. This movement developed out of the experience of great national efforts during World War I, such as the Red Cross, and other welfare enterprises. Millions of people then worked together and had given millions of dollars. Why could not the Church present a wellplanned and comprehensive program and make a nation-wide appeal to Episcopalians. So came into existence the nation-wide campaign. Some dioceses of course failed to cooperate, but the results in our diocese were phenomenal. The diocesan budget of \$90,000 of 1918, the last year before the campaign, was more than trebled, and in a great effort it was raised. Undertaken first as a three-year plan, the campaign made possible the establishment of our system of Church Schools; St. Paul's Church and Parish House at the University came into being; other churches, parish houses here and there over the diocese, were erected—but the bills had to be paid. And paid they were, for the Movement was much more than a money-raising campaign. It was a deeply spiritual effort, and the gifts were the fruit of a revived spiritual vision and sure sense of stewardship. Necessarily, up went parish quotas-and what a shock vestries got. Just an example or two, of quota increases, city and country alike. Christ Church. Alexandria, from approximately, \$1,000 to \$9,000. St. Paul's. Richmond, from \$3,644.00 to \$29,070.00; a country parish from \$170.00 to \$1,365.00. In one year, quotas increased seven, eight, nine, ten times what they had been. You can imagine the first response: "Impossible! ridiculous! we won't even try!" But the Diocese caught fire, we talked a lot, prayed a lot, worked a lot and made it! \$290,000—What should we do with so much money! Well, the General Church got \$90,000, Church Schools \$53,000, the D. M. S. \$40,000, New Work in the Mountains and in the Colored Field \$12,500, New Churches, Parish Houses, Rectories \$25,600, St. Paul's at the University \$16,000, etc.

We kept that pace for three years and then slowly began to tire, until during the depression we slipped to a level of giving of about that of the pre Nation-Wide Campaign days. But the Diocese had received much of lasting benefit—a school system worth \$1,500,000, an enlarged diocessan misionary vision and many useful buildings.

But we have not remained at our depression level. In the last four years there has been a steady and healthy increase to giving to missionary causes. This past year in addition to raising many salaries and increasing our missionary obligations we have paid off almost all of our old indebtedness, including the final payment on the obligation of \$25,000 incurred at the New Orleans General Convention of 1925 to help liquidate a large indebtedness of the National Council. In our present operations for 1944 the expected income slightly exceeds the total budget adopted by last year's Council. The response of the parishes has been generous, enabling the Executive Committee to meet present obligations and to move forward to meet new opportunities.

For 1945 the Executive Committee will present to the Council a slightly increased budget. Possibly we have not been bold enough. The National Council asks the Diocese for \$39,500 for 1945. That figure is in the budget as a first claim on our income but may we not do something better than that? The officers of the National Council acting under the direction of General Convention assigned minimum quotas to the various dioceses. More and more the dioceses are accepting these minimum quotas in full; but many still fall short. Cannot Virginia back up our Bishop as Presiding Bishop and President of the National Council by going beyond the minimum asked of \$39,500, to a possible \$40,000 or more? I know we can do it; do we feel it is worth while? And the salaries of our mountain missionaries—we are all ashamed of what they receive, while we glory in the selfsacrifice of these unselfish women that makes possible the continuance of this great work. Can we not remember them more generously?

A voluntary Whitsunday Offering has been authorized this year, and since the money thus obtained will not be needed to balance our current operating budget, the Executive Committee has designated the great need of the John Moncure School, the Arlington-Fairfax development, and Bishop Tsu's work in China as proposed objects among which the offering will be divided. They are all most deserving, and I trust that the clergy and laity will stand back of this offering. We need it for our advance. Bishop Mason, I trust, will in a few minutes dwell more particu-

larly on the needs of the Mountain Work and the Colored Work since these are his special care.

The Virginia Council of Churches

For a number of years our Diocese has been cooperating through individuals, many parishes and our Diocesan Board of Christian Education, with the Virginia Council of Religious Education. The activities of this Council are varied but the most conspicuous and fruitful has been the promotion of religious teaching in the public schools. In the state of Virginia there is now no state-wide Council, such as the Federal Council of Churches has organized on a national basis, and in many states on a state-wide plan. The Federal Council, as I understand it, agrees not to organize a state federal council in those states where similar organizations are now operating. In Virginia the old Virginia Council of Religious Education is changing its constitution and by-laws so as to become the Virginia Council of Churches, and invites the cooperation of the Episcopal dioceses in the state. The Diocese of Southwestern Virginia has acted favorably and suggests a basis of division of representatives on the governing body of the Council allowed the Episcopal Church in the state. Copies of the constitution and by-laws of the Council are available for study, and I sincerely hope this Council may take such action as will bring our diocese into full cooperation with the Virginia Council of Churches.

The Canon on Holy Matrimony

At the General Convention last fall in Cleveland, the matter that engaged the attention of the House of Deputies at much greater length than any other, was the consideration of the majority and minority reports of the Joint Commission on Holy Matrimony, with attending parliamentary entanglements.

As one has observed the action of successive General Conventions on this subject over a period of many years, certain interesting and important facts become evident; that the Church is not satisfied with the present canons on this subject;

that the mind of the Church as represented in General Convention is widely divided as to how the word and spirit of our Lord should be applied in the Church's teaching and discipline; that the trend toward a liberalization of the present canon seems to be increasing, and may have been even a majority sentiment at Cleveland though no change could be agreed upon and the canon stands today as before.

There is no need of course before this Council of the Diocese

of Virginia to argue for the vital necessity of maintaining the Christian home. All Christians are agreed on that and all are working to that end. But on the matter of what should be the Church's Law on Holy Matrimony our viewpoints certainly differ widely. Our deputation at Cleveland frequently divided their vote. May I suggest therefore, that during the next triennium clergy and laity alike, through their opportunities of study and discussion in parishes, in clerical and convocational gatherings, study this subject beginning with the teachings of Christ, using every aid that historical and critical research can offer, that the mind of God's people may be more readily and surely guided by His spirit into the way of His truth.

While the Church studies and seeks a more satisfactory solution to this vital problem, it is surely our duty as clergymen and

laity to know and abide by the law of the Church.

Just to "stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance", may I be permitted to quote from a familiar authority as follows: Canon 15. Section 2-(a):

"If any minister of this Church shall have cause to think that a person desirous of Holy Baptism or of confirmation, or of receiving the Holy Communion, has been married otherwise than as the word of God and discipline of this Church allow, such minister, before receiving such person to these ordinances, shall refer the case to the Bishop for godly judgement thereupon. The Bishop, after due inquiry into the circumstances, and taking into consideration the godly discipline both of justice and of mercy, shall give his judgement thereon in writing, Provided, however, that no minister shall in any case refuse these ordinances to a penitent person in imminent danger of death."

I am not seeking extra responsibilities nor am I willing in so important a matter to evade them.

The War and Our Parishes

A moment ago we spoke of the effect of the war upon the supply of clergy in the Diocese, but its effect goes much further. In comparison with some nearby dioceses such as Southern Virginia and Maryland, Virginia has comparatively few large camps, with the attendant problems, or great population movements, except in the northern section of the Diocese. Some war industrial developments in places such as Yancey, Front Royal and Scottsville are having some effect upon these communities and the local parish, but there are of course other effects of the war that reach into every community, every hamlet, every home. War

and industry have called the youth, and in many cases the adults. Family life is seriously disrupted, hearts are anxious, homes are lonely. Sorrow, deep sorrow, may strike at any moment in any and in many places, and the universal cry, in spite of brave faces and courageous hearts, is—"Lighten our darkness, O Lord". "Have mercy upon us."

This condition, it seems to me, shows clearly the great urgency of our ministry today, and defines where its emphasis should be placed. In our preaching, that we may show that this war is really a judgement of God upon us; not just a punishment, but also if we prove worthy, an opportunity to strive and sacrifice beyond war for the blessed fruits of peace—God's peace. Teach our people to pray such prayers that, come what may, their faith in God may be strengthened. Teach fearlessly the word of the Lord. "Forgive your enemies, pray for them which despitefully use you and persecute you." Never have we more needed the pure voice of prophecy, that above the strife of men, the voice of God may be heard. As pastors, seek out the lonely homes, before dark sorrow enters. As ministers of Christ, all unshepherded people are yours. Christ came to seek and to save. Loneliness and anxiety opens many an otherwise closed door. Your pastoral care is now of course following the soldiers and sailors who have gone from your parish. How great too is the reward for this ministry. They will never forget the pastors or the parish which is constant in ministering to them. And when they come home,—well so important is this that a large part of

the time of our clergy conference in September will be devoted to

preparing ourselves and our parishes for their return. But we

cannot wait, for war and invasion and sorrow and deep hurt to

human souls do not wait. God help us all to serve our people

fearlessly and faithfully.

The thought that must be uppermost in our minds at this moment is that this is the last Council of this Diocese over which Bishop Tucker will preside. Tonight at our public session opportunity will be had to hear from some of his associates regarding his services to the Church and the Nation, and gladly will we all join in that tribute.

Bishop Tucker is an amazing man. I remember the good start my amazement got on an occasion in 1925 when he came to the Northern Neck at Bishop Brown's request for a confirmation visit. It was December and, spending the night together in a country home, I was awakened early in the morning to see him breaking the ice on the pitcher and then proceeding to take a

bath in the ice water. I have noticed since that what most of us consider the hardships and difficulties of life are met by him in the same cavalier spirit as that in which he met and overcame the excessive frostiness of that winter morning.

I have been amazed again and again at his wisdom and effectiveness in dealing with people and situations where the stage was all set for a proper row, but it just didn't come off because he was there. I have been amazed at his patience, especially with his coadjutor, notwithstanding many and great provocations.

As time went on amazement gradually changed into lasting appreciation of the qualities of a great Christian man, equally the master of a rural vestry meeting or a joint session of the General Convention; because on the one hand his quality of simple sincerity disarmed suspicion and prejudice, and on the other the power of his mind and spirit aroused enthusiastic following. Those who have been privileged to see him in great assemblies, as on the recent occasion of Dr. Dun's consecration in the Washington Cathedral, learn anew the truth of real greatness. There he moved, without benefit of colored adornment or insignia of his high office save for his simple robes of a Bishop. In that inspiring ecclesiastical setting he was the real master of the assembly. His enthusiastic reception as Presiding Bishop by the whole Church has been due. I believe, as much to this quality of simple greatness as to his knowledge and wisdom in worldwide affairs, and his spirit as a Christian leader. I know Virginia is proud that he continues as Presiding Bishop. No other call could have taken him even temporarily from his Diocese. He represents the best, he is the embodiment of Virginia Evangelicanism; and his high position as Presiding Bishop of the Church enables multitudes to benefit by his example, and be instructed in ways of wisdom and sincerity. We look forward to his return to his native soil when his duties as Presiding Bishop are fulfilled: and our word to him now and tonight is not goodbye, but "well done, keep it up, and come back home when you can."

Bishop Mason gave his pastoral address and presented the record of his official acts.

Bishop Mason presented the report of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge and the Report of the Colored Work. (See Appendix).

Under matters of reference the suggestion of Bishop Goodwin in his pastoral address concerning the forming of a Virginia Council of Churches, was referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. Mr. Blake T. Newton moved that a committee be appointed to draw up suitable resolutions on the retirement of Bishop Tucker. This motion was carried and the Chair appointed the following: Rev. A. C. Zabriskie, Mr. John B. Minor and Mr. W. Frank Powers.

The Secretary presented the tentative program of the Diocese for 1945. This was referred to the Committee on the Program of the Diocese.

The Treasurer presented the report of the Church Extension Committee and the report of the operating accounts of the Diocese. These were referred to the Committee on Finance.

It was moved and carried that Bishop Goodwin appoint a commission to carry out Bishop Tucker's recommendation that the Diocese cooperate with a committee of the General Church to help in the readjustment of returning members of the armed forces. Bishop Goodwin appointed: Rev. F. J. Warnecke, Rev. C. J. Gibson, Rev. W. L. Ribble, Rev. R. W. Eastman, Mr. Ed Turner, Mr. Calvin Lucy, Mr. Thomas C. Boushall and Major J. O. Walker.

Mr. Lewis C. Williams, on behalf of the Committee on Finance, presented two amendments to the canons.

These were referred to the Committee on Canons.

A resolution from the Piedmont Convocation was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

A resolution from the Rappahannock Valley Convocation was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

The following were nominated to the Standing Committee: the Rev. Messrs. W. Leigh Ribble, A. C. Zabriskie, D. D., Beverley M. Boyd, Paul D. Bowden, and Messrs. A. R. Hoxton, A. MacKay-Smith, Gardiner L. Boothe, John B. Minor, Blake T. Newton.

The following were nominated as delegates to the Provincial

Synod: The Rev. Messrs. H. A. Donovan, S. B. Chilton, E. E. Tate, A. C. Tucker, R. B. Nelson, George P. Mayo, H. G. Lane, Dudley A. Boogher, Hon. F. F. Chandler, Hon. John J. Morris and Messrs. Henry R. Miller, Richard C. Horne, Roland Harrison, W. Frank Powers and Dr. Martin H. Urner.

Nominations to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society were made as follows: Valley Convocation: Rev. J. A. Figg, Mr. Thos. Atkinson. Colored Convocation: Rev. Aston Hamilton, D. D., Dr. W. H. Hughes. Rappahannock Valley Convocation: Rev. Henry Heaton, Hon. E. Hugh Smith. Richmond Convocation: Rev. George Ossman, Mr. John B. Mordecai. Piedmont Convocation: Rev. E. E. Tate, Mr. Theodore C. Hudson. Albemarle Convocation: Rev. Jas. D. Beckwith, Dr. Ivey F. Lewis.

The following were nominated to succeed the Rev. E. A. de-Bordenave and the Rev. George P. Mayo as members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society: the Rev. Messrs. H. A. Donovan, E. Guthrie Brown, L. C. Harrison, J. Sullivan Bond, Robert B. Echols, C. J. Gibson and J. W. Kennedy.

The following were nominated to succeed Mr. James M. Ball, Jr., and Mr. William C. Seipp as members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society: Dr. H. A. Latane, Messrs. John W. Yowell, John Dorsey Brown, Richard C. Horne, H. F. Minter and Rosewell Page, Jr.

The Rev. G. M. Brydon announced that Mr. W. Meade Addison had asked that he not be continued as a member of the Committee on Finance. The following were nominated as members of the Committee on Finance: Messrs. E. W. Newman, Lewis C. Williams, C. C. Lamond, Harry F. Augustine, John B. Mordecai, Dan P. Sigourney, Henry R. Miller and John T. Ramey.

Noon-day prayers were read by the Rev. Charles Noyes Tyndell.

The secretary presented an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution which provided for the striking out of the word

"three" and inserting the word "five" thereby enlarging the membership of the Committee on Finance from three to five. This was the second reading of this amendment. It was adopted.

The secretary presented for the second reading an amendment to Article III, Section I, Sub-Section A of the Constitution providing that the words "reported to the previous regular meeting of the Council" be changed to "reported to the diocesan authorities in the last annual report." This was adopted.

Mr. Lewis C. Williams presented the report of the Commission to Study the Problems of Divorce and Juvenile Delinquency:

To the 149th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

There is no more serious problem facing America today than divorce. It has been the subject of discussion at the General Convention of the Episcopal Church for many years, but a question is whether the emphasis by the church is in the right place. More attention is paid to the fear that a few may suffer than that the whole body of society may deteriorate. We approach it as a menace to our civilization and one which must be faced if we shall survive. The sanctity of marriage is the prime consideration. Its indissolubility is the ideal.

There is a parallel in the history of the Roman Empire as narrated by Gibbon. Plutarch says that Romulus allowed but three grounds of divorce: "Poisoning, adultery and false keys", and no divorces were known in the early years of the empire, but as of 533-565 A. D. Gibbon says that when Roman matrons became "the equal and voluntary companions" of the men a new jurisprudence was introduced that marriage like an ordinary partnership could be dissolved at the will of one associate. "In three centuries of prosperity and corruption this rule was enlarged to frequent practice and pernicious abuse. Passion, interest or caprice suggested daily motives for the dissolution of marriage, . . . the most tender of human connections was degraded to a transient society of profit and pleasure." Gibbon concludes: "A specious theory is confuted by this free and perfect experiement which demonstrates that the liberty of divorce does not contribute to happiness and virtue."

In America divorce has become so easy and profligate that it is no longer regarded as a tragedy. It has become so fashionable that its danger to the welfare and happiness of the State is little considered.

"Civilizations, let us assure ourselves", says an anonymous writer "are far more vulnerable on their domestic side than on their economic side. The home is the unit of the nation. Family life is the great assurance. If a State would not perish, it must see that its homes are the altars of human happiness of the family".

In America today, a vacation at a motor court in a foreign state is a residence giving jurisdiction for divorce from the flimsiest of grounds.

One of our Bar Associations had an inquiry asking for the marriage laws, and at the same time for the divorce laws, indicating merely a trial marriage. A law publication recently stated that it had been advised that several states had authorized marriages by proxy and inquired whether such a marriage was permissible in Virginia.

In eight years from 1933 to 1940, inclusive, the number of divorces in America has arisen from 165,000—1.31 per thousand of population to 264,000, or 2 per thousand of population, or one divorce to every six marriages.

Marriage is no longer regarded as an affair for grown-ups well disciplined, nor is there much suggestion that the partners to matrimony should cultivate understanding and sharing of one and the other's burdens. On the contrary, the emphasis is laid upon the freedom to change.

Dean Gauss, of Princeton, has been quoted as saying that broken homes contribute three or four times the problem cases among the students than normal homes. This is borne out by the testimony of school principals.

A leader for ethical culture says: "The reason is plain enough to those who understand what still distinguishes a home from a stock farm. The best contribution of the parents to their children is a spiritual gift. The man encourages his wife to offer their children all that is most excellent in her, and she exercises this influence upon the father."

A great philosopher has said that the ideal marriage is where each surrenders everything to the other.

The approach to the solution of the question is through legislative, religious and social sanctions. This means that the people must set the standards, must change the attitude of society, and must advocate stricter laws.

The late John B. Minor, a great Virginia law teacher, said on this subject "Religion, reason and experience combine to enforce the sanctity of the marriage tie. If not held indissoluble altogether . . . in the interest of society and the happiness of mankind, it should be dissolved in rare and extreme cases."

Juvenile Crime

Tied in with divorce and spreading to many families regardless of divorce is juvenile crime. The arrest of males and females under twenty-one years of age showed a percentage of change from 1941 to 1942 of a decrease of 3.6 % in males and an increase of 55.7% in females, while the increase in arrests of females under twenty-one years of age from 1942 to 1943 showed a total increase of 47.9% over the previous year, and the arrest of males under eighteen years of age showed a total increase of 23.4% for 1943 over 1942. There was no decrease in males under eighteen years of age in 1943, and for that year the number of males arrested was greater for the seventeenth year than for any other year.

There is but one conclusion to be drawn from this. It is that the unfluence

of the home has broken down; that schools cannot supply what the home lacks: and that the Church has failed.

We, therefore, recommend the following resolution for the consideration of this Council:

WHEREAS, in the opinion of this Council the increase in divorce and invenile delinquency threatens the life of our people;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia exert its influence in every way possible to support the sanctity of the marriage tie and to advocate the repeal of lenient laws for divorce as a means of directing the attention of the people to this threat to our civilization; that our Church Schools be called upon to see to it that every child in addition to other instructions be specifically taught to know his duty to God and his duty to his neighbor as set forth in the catechism of the Church: and further that the Bishop of the Diocese be requested to call a conference of Clergy and laymen to consider these important questions and that the Bishop be requested to present this matter to other Dioceses, and that after the conference called by the Bishop for studying the whole field of Juvenile delinquency and marital relations, the Bishop appoint a commission for this Diocese to work in cooperation with the General Convention's Commission on Holy Matrimony.

LEWIS C. WILLIAMS, Chairman JAMES W. KENNEDY ALEXANDER W. WEDDELL

The report was received and the resolution was adopted.

Bishop Goodwin suggested that the conference called for in the resolution be held in connection with the annual clergy conference at Roslyn. At Bishop Tucker's suggestion the matter was also referred to the Woman's Auxiliary for study.

Mr. John B. Minor presented the Report of the Commission on Mission Churches appointed at the last Council.

On motion this report, with its recommended amendments to the canons, was referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. C. J. Gibson presented matters of reference from General Convention, as follows:

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED AT THE GENERAL CONVENTION OF 1943, AND TO BE FINALLY ACTED UPON AT THE CONVENTION OF 1946.

That amendments to the Constitution, as set forth below, were proposed to the General Convention, and by resolve thereof, were directed to be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority of every Diocese and Missionary District, and to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, and of the Convocation of

every Missionary District, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or the Missionary District Convocation at its next meeting:

(1) Amend Article X of the Constitution as follows:

Strike out, in lines 16 and 17, the words: "within the boundaries of the United States of America"; and in lines 26 and 27 the words: "within the boundaries of the United States."

(2) Amend the first sentence of Article I, Sec. 3, so that the same will read as follows:

"At the General Convention next before the expiration of the term of office of the Presiding Bishop, it shall elect the Presiding Bishop of the Church."

(3) Amend Article I, Sec. 2, of the Constitution, so that it will read as follows:

"Sec. 2. Every Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, every Suffragan Bishop, and every Bishop who under an election to an office created by the General Convention has resigned his jurisdiction, shall have a seat and vote in the House of Bishops. Every Bishop who by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity has resigned his jurisdiction shall have a seat without vote in the House of Bishops. A majority of all Bishops entitled to vote, exclusive of Foreign Missionary Bishops, shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transactions of business."

And amend Article X of the Constitution by striking out the words: "excluding retired Bishops not present."

And amend Article XI of the Constitution by striking out the words: "excluding retired Bishops not present."

(4) Amend third paragraph of Article VIII of the Constitution so that the paragraph shall read as follows:

"If any Bishop ordains a priest or deacon to minister elsewhere than in this Church, or confers ordination as priest or deacon upon a Christian minister who has not received Episcopal ordination, he shall do so only in accordance with such provisions as shall be set forth in the Canons of this Church."

Amend Article VIII so that the Article shall read as follows:

"No person shall be ordered Priest or Deacon to minister in this Church until he shall have been examined by the Bishop and two Priests and shall have exhibited such testimonials and other requisites as the Canons in that case provided may direct. No persons shall be ordained and consecrated Bishop, or ordered Priest or Deacon to minister in this Church, unless at the time, in the presence of the ordaining Bishop or Bishops, he shall subscribe and make the following declaration:

"I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do solemnly engage to conform to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

"Provided, however, that any person consecrated a Bishop to minister

in any Diocese or Missionary District of an autonomous Church or Province of a Church in Communion with this Church may, instead of the foregoing Declaration, make the promises of Conformity required by the Church in which he is to minister.

"If any Bishop ordains a Priest or Deacon to minister elsewhere than in this Church, or confers ordination as priest or deacon upon a Christian minister who has not received Episcopal ordination, he shall do so only in accordance with such provisions as shall be set forth in the Canons of this Church.

"No person ordained by a foreign Bishop, or by a Bishop not in communion with this Church, shall be permitted to officiate as a Minister of this Church until he shall have complied with the Canon or Canons in that case provided and also shall have subscribed the aforesaid declaration."

This report was received. It was moved and carried that a Commission be appointed to study the proposed amendments to the National Constitution and report to the next Council. Bishop Goodwin appointed the following:

Rev. B. M. Boyd, Rev. C. J. Gibson, Mr. John B. Minor, Justice G. L. Browning.

Mr. Lewis C. Williams presented the following report of the Committee on Finance:

To the 149th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Committee on Finance reports that audits of the various funds and accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese for the period beginning January 1, 1943, and ending December 31, 1943, have been made by Certified Public Accountants, A. M. Pullen & Company, being the same accountants who have heretofore made such audits. These audits entitled "The Church Extension Committee, Diocese of Virginia" and "Diocese of Virginia Operating Account, Samuel B. Chilton, Treasurer", both dated May 12, 1944, are presented herewith.

These audits show receipts and disbursements and list the indebtedness of the diocese as of January 1, 1943 as \$20,653.35. Of this amount \$7,560.67 is a debt of the Board of Colored Work. Since January 1 they have paid \$950.00, leaving an indebtedness of \$6,510.67, all of which is due to the Church Extension Committee. \$8,092.68 of the total indebtedness was created to pay for lots in Alexandria and Arlington. We expect this debt to be paid from the income of the Dooley and other funds. This leaves \$5,000.00 for which the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society is responsible. \$2,500.00 of this amount is the old New Orleans debt and the remaining \$2,500.00 is the debt on the rectory at Sandston. Since January 1 the old New Orleans debt has been paid in full and \$500.00 has been paid on the Sansdton rectory debt, leaving a total debt of \$2,000.00 for which the

Executive Committee of the Missionary Society is directly responsible, and a total debt of \$16,603.35. The audit discloses insurance policies examined and outstanding as follows: fire insurance on Mayo Memorial Church House and sundry mission buildings \$101,400.00; war damage insurance \$80,000.00; fidelity bonds \$66,000.00. The war damage insurance will be discentinued.

The report of the diocesan program account for 1943 shows a balance of \$4.048.77 after crediting late payments received in January 1944.

The report of the Bishops' and Contingent Fund shows an overdraft of \$1,705.50 as of January 1, 1944 but tardy payments of last year's assessments received through January have reduced this deficit to \$1,120.47 which is \$379.53 less than we anticipated at this time last year. The following budget for the Bishops' and Contingent Fund for 1945 is recommended:

Compared with the sum of \$21,300.00 required for 1944, the budget for 1945 shows a slight decrease.

No deficit in the budget for 1944 is anticipated.

The expenses of the General Convention have been increased to provide for increased traveling expenses to San Francisco, and because the General Convention has increased the assessment on this Diocese for 1944 to \$1,048 against an average for the last triennium of \$635 per annum.

The recommendation of this Committee made last year that certain appropriations for executive and clerical salaries and for the maintenance of the Mayo Memorial Church House be transferred from the Diocesan Program Account to the Bishops' and Contingent Fund has been under consideration

by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society but no final conclusion has yet been reached.

Your Committee has considered carefully Canon XXI, adopted at the last meeting of the Council, and has found it impossible to comply with all of its provisions. For this reason, your Committee is submitting herewith a proposed amended Canon in place of the present Canon XXI, and recommends its adoption, or that it be referred to this Committee to report at the next Council a canon in conformity with the canons of the General Church.

We also recommend an amendment to Canon VI as indicated in the form presented herewith.

In presenting the above report, Mr. Williams called attention to the proposed change in Canon XXI. The Canon with suggested changes was referred to the Committee on Canons. Mr. Williams asked that in accepting the report the Council would understand that the Committee on Finance had found that the present canon on business methods in Church affairs was not workable and that the committee was not acting under it at present. The report of the committee was received and the budget contained therein for 1945 was adopted.

Bishop Goodwin introduced the clergy who had received their canonical transfers to this diocese since the last meeting of the Council.

At 1:00 P. M. the Council adjourned for lunch. At 2:00 P. M. the Council reassembled. Mr. Rosewell Page, reporting for the Committee on Credentials, pointed out that the credentials for Mr. George Dix and Mr. Benjamin Brinton were irregular. It was moved and carried that these delegates be seated. Mr. Page then read a list of the parishes that had reported no election of delegates.

The Rev. Vincent C. Franks presented the following statement in regard to the reorganization of the Province of Washington:

To the 149th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Commission on Christian Education of the Third Province meeting at Sweet Briar last Summer appointed a committee to study the program

and organization of the Province and to make recommendations looking toward the more effective functioning of the Province.

This committee presented a rather lengthy report at the Fall meeting of the Commission. There were recommendations under the headings of finances, program, and organization. The Commission requested the committee to revise the report, rewrite the Ordinances of the Province, and through the Committee on Action to bring it to the attention of the Dioceses.

The Third Province is not a natural division of the country, as are for example the First and the Fourth. There are no areas of work which are distinctly provincial in scope. There are no sectional loyalties which would tend to unite the various Dioceses. General conditions and traditions vary considerably between the northern and southern parts of the Province. While these facts do make the effective functioning of the Provincial organization difficult, it is not at all impossible.

Further difficulty arises from the fact that the Church has never been able to decide just what it wants a Province to be. There is wide difference of opinion. However there is ample General Convention legislation to make possible a strong provincial organization if it is wanted.

Believing that a more effective Provincial organization is both desirable and possible, this committee offers three general recommendations looking to the accomplishment of this end:

- 1. Increase the available income.
- 2. Put most of the income into salaries of Provincial workers.
- 3. Revise the Ordinances to provide greater co-ordination.
- 1. Increase the Available Income.

This can be accomplished in three ways:

- a. A much larger proportion of present income can and should be appropriated to the actual work of the Province rather than to operating expenses. The committee believes that the fixed expenses could and should be reduced by 60%.
- b. The assessment for the support of the Province are at present based on \$2.50 for each clergyman canonically resident in a Diocese. The committee recommends that the basis be changed to two cents for each Communicant as recorded in the latest Journal of each Diocese. This is a more equitable basis because the income of a Diocese is determined not by the number of clergy but by the number of Communicants. This will result in a reasonable increase in income as can be seen in the following tabulation:

c. There are other possible sources of income which might be carefully studied, such as: contributions from the Woman's Auxiliary for specific projects; the charging of an extra 25c registration fee at all summer conferences held in the Province, in recognition of the value to conferences of the Commission on Christian Education; consider the possibilities in the provisions of Section IX of Canon 54 of the General Convention. These and other sources have been used by other provinces.

2. Put Most of the Income into Salaries of Provincial Workers.

A project will be carried through only when it becomes the main business of some individual. As long as the work of the Province is dependent on the free time of men who already have full-time positions, nothing much in the way of continuing effort can be expected.

The First and Fourth Provinces have been effective because in each there has been someone whose main business it was to see that the Province did something.

The committee therefore recommends that the first charge against an increased income for the Province be the salary and expenses of an Executive Secretary. With a capable person devoting his time to the work of the Commissions, all should increase their range and effectiveness.

The committee further recommends that as soon as possible funds be made available for the salary and expenses of a College Work Secretary, at least on a part-time basis.

3. Revise the Ordinances to Provide Greater Co-Ordination.

The present organization of the Third Province lacks co-ordination. Each Commission is independent of every other Commission. This Province still holds to, in general, the form of organization which was abandoned by the National Church at the General Convention of 1919, at which time the Council and Department form of organization was adopted. Since then most Dioceses and Provinces have followed the example of the National Church.

The committee recommends that this Province do likewise. This means the setting-up of a Provincial Council composed of the Officers and others elected by the Synod and the Chairmen of the various Commissions. This Council would foster and co-ordinate the work of the Province. The work now done by such standing committees as that on Proceedings and on Finance would be done by the Council. With all Commission Chairmen sitting on the

Council, each would see his work in relation to the work of the others. Unified strategic planning becomes possible.

This results in a simplifying of the Provincial machinery. The Ordinances are reduced in number from 13 to 9, and in length by about 50%.

The committee is aware of the fact that unless there is a change in the custom of electing only Bishops as Chairmen of Commissions, the proposed Council will be composed largely of Bishops. It is partly for this reason that the formation of Commissions is left in the hands of the Council members elected by the Synod. They will undoubtedly exercise due discretion.

Attached to this report is a copy of the revised Ordinances.

ORDINANCES

OF THE

THIRD PROVINCE

In the Name of the Father, and the Son and the Holy Ghost. Amen. The Synod of the Third Province, in pursuance of the authority granted by the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention, sets forth the following ordinances for the purpose of furthering the missionary interests and other religious activities and such other duties of the Church as may be committed to it by the said authority.

ORDINANCE I

The Third Province shall be called the Province of Washington. The Synod of this Province shall be known as the Provincial Synod of Washington.

ORDINANCE II

OF THE MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Synod of this Province is composed of all the Bishops residing within the bounds of the Provinces having seat in the House of Bishops of the General Convention, together with four clerical deputies and four lay deputies from each Diocese within the Province.

Section 2. Each person holding office or appointment under the Synod shall have seat and voice in the Synod, but shall not have the right to vote unless they are Deputies.

ORDINANCE III

OF THE OFFICERS

Section 1. The Officers shall be a President, a Secretary and a Treasurer.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 24, 1944

Section 2. The President shall be one of the Bishops of the Province, elected by the Synod by the concurrent vote of the three Orders, and by the plurality of each Order, and he shall hold office for the term of three years. The President shall be a member, ex-officio, of all Standing Committees and Commissions. In case of vacancy caused by death, resignation or otherwise, the Bishop senior by consecration having jurisdiction within the Province shall be President until the next meeting of the Synod, when a President shall be chosen for the term of three years.

Section 3. The Secretary of the Synod shall be elected at every regular meeting of the Synod, and shall hold office until his successor is chosen. The Secretary shall perform such duties as shall be assigned to him by the President of the Synod. A vacancy in the office of the Secretary occurring during the adjournment of the Synod, shall be filled by appointment of the President.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall be elected triennially at the regular meeting following the session of the General Convention. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all moneys collected under the authority of the Synod. His account shall be rendered to each stated meeting of the Synod and shall be audited under its authority. A vacancy in the office occurring during adjournment of the Synod shall be filled by appointment of the President.

ORDINANCE IV

OF MEETINGS AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. The sessions of the Synod shall be held annually, except in the year of the General Convention, on the third Tuesday in October, and on the following day or days, at such place as shall have been fixed by the preceding Synod: The time and place may be changed, and special meetings shall be called by the President on the request, in writing, of ten Deputies with the consent of the majority of the Bishops of the Province. The several Orders, the Bishops, the Clerical Deputies and the Lay Deputies shall meet in one body. Upon notifying the Synod, the Bishops may sit and deliberate in council, separately, whenever they may deem it necessary. To constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, there shall be present at least one member of each Order of the majority of the Dioceses.

SECTION 2. All elections shall be by ballot. The Synod shall vote as one body, and on any question a vote of the majority of the Deputies present shall suffice, unless otherwise ordered by these ordinances.

ORDINANCE V

OF THE REPRESENTATIVE ON THE NATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1. The Synod at its last meeting prior to the triennial meeting of the General Convention shall elect a Representative from the Province on the National Council. He may be either a Bishop, a Presbyter or a layman. The Secretary of the Synod shall certify such election to the proper authorities.

In case a vacancy occurs the Synod at its next meeting shall fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 2. The Representative on the National Council shall report at each regular meeting of the Synod matters pertaining to the National Council of interest to the Province, including apportionments and appropriations within the Province.

ORDINANCE VI

OF THE PROVINCIAL COUNCIL

Section 1. There shall be a Provincial Council constituted as follows: The Officers of the Synod; the Representative on the National Council; five members elected at each regular meeting of the Synod, to be known as Synod members of the Council; and the Chairmen of all Commissions as provided in Section 4 of this Ordinance, to be known as Commission members of the Council.

Section 2. A Synod member of the Council elected to such office at three consecutive meetings of the Synod shall not be eligible for re-election at the next regular meeting of the Synod.

Section 3. The Provincial Council shall foster and co-ordinate the Program of the Province, and perform such work as may be committed to it by the Synod. The Council shall initiate and develop such new work as it may deem necessary. It shall prepare a program for each meeting of the Synod in cooperation with the authorities of the Diocese in which the meeting is to be held. The Council shall also prepare a budget for Provincial expenses to be included in its report at each regular meeting of the Synod. It may fill vacancies in its membership.

Section 4. The Provincial Council shall be authorized to appoint and to define the scope of the work of such Commissions as it may determine.

Section 5. The Provincial Council shall be authorized to elect, direct and determine the salary and allowance of Executive or Field Secretaries for work in the Province. Such items shall be included in the budget submitted to the Synod.

ORDINANCE VII

OF A COURT OF REVIEW

Section 1. There shall be a Court of Review composed of a Bishop of the Province, three Presbyters, canonically resident in one or other of the Dioceses of the Province, and three Lay Communicants of the Church, having domicile within the Province, two at least of said Lay Communicants to be men learned in the law.

Section 2. At the first meeting of the Synod after the regular meeting of the General Convention, the Judges of the Court of Review shall be elected by the concurrent vote of the three Orders. The persons so elected, except in

the case of death, resignation, refusal or inability to serve, shall continue to be members of the Court of Review for the term of three years or until their successors shall be elected. The Bishop elected by the Synod shall be the presiding officer of the Court.

SECTION 3. The Court of Review is vested with jurisdiction to hear and determine appeals from decisions of trial courts in Dioceses, on the trial of a Presbyter or Deacon, in conformity with the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention.

ORDINANCE VIII

OF FINANCES

The Provincial Council shall submit to the Synod with the Budget of Provincial Expense a schedule assessing the Dioceses of the Province for an amount to meet such expense; providing that the stated amount does not exceed two cents for each Communicant as reported in the latest Journal of said Diocese.

ORDINANCE IX

OF AMENDMENTS

No alteration or amendment of these ordinances shall be made unless the same shall be proposed in writing on one day of the session of the Provincial Synod, and be adopted on some other day during the same session by a majority vote of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all Dioceses entitled to a representation in the Synod.

It was moved and seconded that the recommendations in this report be approved. The motion was carried.

Dean Zabriskie presented by title the report of the Standing Committee:

To the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Since the last Council the Standing Committee has given consent to the consecration of the Rev. Everett H. Jones as Bishop of West Texas, of the Rev. E. Pinkney Wroth as Bishop of Erie, of the Rev. J. Thomas Heistand as Bishop Coadjutor of Harrisburg, of the Very Rev. Austin Pardue as Bishop of Pittsburgh, of the Rev. Angus Dun as Bishop of Washington, of the Rev. Thomas N. Carruthers as Bishop of South Carolina and of the Very Rev. Elwood L. Haines as Bishop of Iowa.

It consented that the Rev. Palmer Campbell and the Rev. W. T. Waterhouse, Deacons, be ordered Priests;

It has given its consent to the ordination to the Diaconate of the following gentlemen:

Mr. Wilfred T. Waterhouse,

Mr. Dorsey G. Smith,

Mr. Francis W. Tyndall,

Mr. Joseph B. Tucker,

Mr. Jaquelin M. Washington,

Mr. Joseph H. Banks (colored),

Mr. Alexander Easley (colored).

It has given its consent to Mr. Frederick W. Brownell being made a Candidate.

It gave its consent to the sale of the property of St. Cyprian's Chapel, a colored mission near the Seminary in which operation had been suspended, and to the use of the proceeds of the sale for the development of the work in the Meade Memorial Chapel, Alexandria.

It consented to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of Michigan, which election had been requested on the grounds of the extent of diocesan work; and to a Suffragan Bishop for the Diocese of New Jersey for the same cause.

It canvassed at great length the situation caused by the resignation as Bishop of Virginia, the Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, D. D. Having received an opinion from the Chancellor of this diocese that the canon's provision governing such a resignation had not been complied with, which opinion was supported by several other chancellors, it expressed to Bishop Tucker its opinion that he should resign again at the next meeting of the House of Bishops in strict accordance with the canonical provisions, in order that there might never be any question either in civil or canon law about Bishop Goodwin's status as Diocesan.

ALEXANDER C. ZABRISKIE,
For the Standing Committee.

The Rev. Churchill J. Gibson presented a verbal report of the Army and Navy Commission.

Chaplain Lt. Commander Charles L. Parker of Camp Peary gave an address on the work of the Army and Navy chaplains.

Dean Zabriskie presented the following report for the Committee on Church Unity:

To the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia: At General Convention last October, the report of the Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity, and also the dissenting report of its minority, were both received and referred to the Church for study; the Commission was continued, enlarged from fifteen to eighteen, with certain changes in personnel, and directed to continue negotiating for organic union with representatives

of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. (commonly called the Northern Presbyterian Church). Since General Convention the Commission has had one meeting at which its members agreed to study afresh some of the theological problems involved in the document called *Basic Principles* and in the minority report, and invited the Presbyterian representatives to meet with them again at some mutually convenient date.

No new proposals concerning Church unity have been put before the Church since the last meeting of Council. It has been impossible for your committee to hold any meetings for various reasons. This report therefore seeks only to indicate some of the questions at issue. Inasmuch as they are almost sure to be involved in any future proposals for unity Churchmen should be thinking about them in order that intelligent action may be taken at the next General Convention.

1. If another Church agrees that the Historic Episcopate shall be part of the structure of a united Church, is it necessary that some *specific* interpretation of the episcopate be accepted?

The Presbyterian representatives agreed to the episcopate. The majority of our Commission on Approaches to Unity thought that that is all we can ask. The minority thought that the episcopate is inadequate unless understood in such a sense as implies that non-episcopally ordained ministers are not valid ministers of the Word and Sacraments. Inasmuch as this sense is one to which the Presbyterians cannot subscribe, our Church must determine whether or not it regards it as essential.

2. Is the Episcopal Church committed to a specific theory of Orders? The majority of the Commission thought it is not, but only to the perpetuation of the offices of Bishop, Priest and Deacon. The minority thought the Church is committed to the theory indicated above, and to the consequent theory that Churches which for some reason have not maintained the office of Bishop, as we know it, thereby ceased to be parts of the Holy Catholic Church. Inasmuch as the answer to this question determines whether or not one regards the willingness of the Presbyterians to accept the office of Bishop but not any theory about it as a sufficient basis of union, and also determines whether or not one thinks we should treat with the Presbyterian Church as part of the Holy Catholic Church or as a schismatic body which is quite outside the Church, our Church must make up its mind on this point.

3. Is the Episcopal Church committed to any specific theory about the mode of Christ's presence in the service of Holy Communion, or to any particular doctrine of the Eucharistic sacrifice? The Commission thought not, but only to the fact that in some way our Lord is apprehensible and accessible in that service, and that the worshippers offer to God their praise and thanksgiving, their means, their souls and bodies, in conjunction with a memorial of Christ's self-offering on the Cross. To the minority this view seemed inadequate. Inasmuch as the Presbyterian commissioners are ready to subscribe to the view of the majority, the Church must determine whether this is a sufficient basis of unity.

4. Is the Lambeth Quadrilateral the basis upon which the Episcopa Church is willing to unite with another Church? The majority of the Commission on Approaches to Unity said "yes." The minority regarded the Quadrilateral as the basis upon which we would begin negotiations, but that before we could unite there must be further agreement upon the doctrines of the Church, Ministry and Sacraments. Inasmuch as the Presbyterians, and a large number of Churchmen, think we are committed to the Quadrilateral as a platform for unity and are therefore unwilling to add other planks as essentials, the Church must decide on this point.

5. Is the standard of reference by which the position of the Episcopal Church on these questions is determined the Book of Common Prayer, including the Thirty-Nine Articles, or is it some anterior definitions of the Catholic faith? The Commission's report is based on the assumption that the Prayer Book including the Articles is our standard of reference. The minority report seems to be based on the assumptions that the Thirty-Nine Articles have no authority in determining our Church's position, and that the offices must be understood in the light of the doctrines obtaining throughout the pre-Reformation period. This is a fundamental question upon which the Church should make up its mind.

There are other important points involved in negotiations for unity with the Presbyterian, Methodist, Lutheran and other Protestant Churches. But these appear to be the most fundamental. If agreement is reached on them, the other points can be settled; if agreement is not reached on these, no agreements on other points will make very much difference. We hope therefore that our clergy and laity will give thoughtful and prayerful study to the questions indicated.

But more important than any particular points is the question of our will to unity. We are persuaded that God is calling upon the Churches to unite-The plain teaching of Scripture points that way: a divided Christendom contradicts the basic idea of Church. The effective prosecution of the mission entrusted by our Lord to His followers is impossible so long as they are divided into discordant and mutually competitive sects: only a United Church can win the pagan world to Christ. The world tragically needs to be united—its nations and races and classes: Yet we must confess with shame that the Churches in their disunity actually are a dividing rather than a uniting factor in the life of our country and world; and we must add that the Christian appeal to men to be reconciled and live in peace and cooperation with each other, can have no weight so long as the Churches themselves are irreconciled, competitive, denouncing each other. The disunity of the Churches is not only the cause of our tragic failure adequately to serve the world's needs: it is a terrible sin against God and inevitably has brought, and will bring, upon us disasters such as befell those men of old who in their self-willed pride sought to build the Tower of Babel in disregard of God's purpose. We call upon the clergy and laity of the diocese to contemplate God's will that His Church should be one; to repent for our Church's share of the blame for disunity, and



especially for those traits of prejudice and self-contentment which make reunion difficult; to work and pray for the cause of Christian unity.

We submit the following resolution:

Resolved that the Committee be continued, with such changes in membership as the Bishop may consider expedient, and that it be charged to study proposals for unity with the Presbyterian and other Churches, to report on them to the next Council, and so far as possible to carry on a program designed to educate our people in the doctrine and practice of the negotiating Churches.

Dr. Brydon moved that the report be received and the resolution therein adopted. This was carried.

The Rev. A. Campbell Tucker read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

To the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Once again the Council of this Diocese meets in a world at war! Today the opposing forces of World War II are poised for the Invasion, when destruction such as the world has never seen will be loosed. Today as never before the Church should lift in the arms of intercessory prayer the millions of the very flower of our country, now serving in the Armed Forces. Today as never before she faces the urgent need of carrying comfort and strength to the homes in which our people dwell. Today as never before she has the duty and privilege of creating a public opinion which will demand and get a just and enduring peace.

But a divided and competing Church can hardly heal a divided and competing world. Because of the necessity laid upon us, it is our hope that one result of the present world conflict will be the recognition of the saving power in a unified Christendom. We therefore recommend that our Church, and 'every member of the same, in his vocation and ministry,' work and pray and live for Church Unity.

Already, we are happy to report, there are many indications of a clearer understanding and closer cooperation among the denominations in a mutual effort to set forward the Kingdom of God.

Many of our congregations have been reduced in numbers because of the young men in the Service and other men and women away on defense work. On the other hand, this condition has increased the size of the congregations in the defense areas. In the midst of these troublous times there are some people who hunger for spiritual vision and a well-founded hope. Yet they are living in such anxiety and are so constantly busy that they do not have time or energy to cultivate the spiritual life and strength so badly needed. Among these, especially, are the clergy and lay leaders of the Church. For the present and for the future we need far more spiritual discipline and vision than can be found in the Church at the present time.

Your Committee would call attention to the fact that as vacant parishes are filled the Diocese will be faced with a new problem when the war ends and our Chaplains, separated from the Military Establishment, return to civil life. To meet this problem one Diocese (Texas) at least is raising a fund with which to provide an income to its mustered-out Chaplains till they can be reabsorbed into the diocesan ministry. We commend some such plan for your consideration.

The supply of women workers for the Church, like the supply of clergymen, is inadequate. And some who offer their services to the Church are not properly trained, nor is it always possible for them to get such training with the present facilities. We therefore urge and recommend that steps be taken to provide that a member of our Church (man or woman) be appointed to serve as a full-time instructor in association with the Assemblies Training School. This, parenthetically, would be a practical step in the direction of Church Unity. And it will give us a corps of workers trained in the Virginia Tradition. Your Committee recommends:

1. That the Council of Virginia tentatively approve and ratify the Constitution and By-Laws of the Virginia Council of Churches as submitted herewith, and that this Diocese become a constituent member of the Council.

2. The Committee suggests the following division of membership representing the Episcopal Church in Virginia: Diocese of Virginia—7; Diocese of Southern Virginia—5; Diocese of Southwestern Virginia—2. It being understood that the total representation is 14.

The Committee further recommends that the representatives from Virginia be appointed by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, one of whom should be nominated by the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary.

3. The Committee recommends that the Diocese of Virginia assume its proportional share of the expenses of the Virginia Council of Churches.

We share in the gratification over the excellent financial condition of the diocese. We do not, however, feel that we can take real pride in this condition until some other financial needs are met. We urge especially that steps be taken this year to increase the salaries of the lay workers in the mountains. Their salaries were shamefully small before the war. They have not been raised even in proportion to the increases made in clergy salaries.

One condition in this Diocese, which has almost become perennial, is the filing of Parish Reports. The Council has set April 1st as the 'deadline' for such reports, but they filter in all through the year. Many reports reached the diocesan office after that date, and some have not yet been received. And of the reports sent in, many fail to supply all the information requested, especially that called for on the final page of the report. For instance, only 71% of the white churches reporting and 18% of the colored showed the value of Church property or the amount of insurance carried.

The number of "Communicants Last Reported" is another item many parishes have trouble with. The reports for 1942 showed the then Present

Number of Communicants as 24,151. The 1943 reports show the Number Last Reported as 22,639. One wonders what has become of those 1512 erstwhile Communicants no longer considered worthy to appear in Parochial Reports, even as 'has-beens'.

The State of the Church can be more correctly presented when every

parish report is fully, accurately, and promptly made.

Canon XXIV requires that parochial reports be sent in by February 1st each year. We recommend to the Committee on Canons that it present an amendment to said Canon to provide for the enforcement of its provisions.

As we today consider the State of the Church the thoughts of each of us are focused upon the change in leadership confronting our Diocese. General Convention has laid upon us the necessity of terminating our official relation-

ship with Bishop Tucker.

Henry St. George Tucker has been a Bishop of the Church for thirty-two years. For fourteen years he has been Bishop of Virginia, and Presiding Bishop for six years. And now, because he is still Presiding Bishop and because he wishes to abide by the spirit of the Canons made by the latest General Convention, we must relinquish him to the General Church. We would be a strange people indeed were our hearts not deeply moved on this occasion. Our prayers and our devotion accompany him on his expanding mission of guiding the Church and, to a degree, the Nation into a just and lasting peace and a new and intensified Christianity.

The progress made by the Diocese of Virginia under the divided leadership of the past six years justifies our looking forward to an era of unusual growth and service under Bishop Goodwin, assisted by Bishop Mason. We confidently expect the Diocese to follow, to the last man, our new leader.

The recommendation in the report in regard to putting teeth into the canon in regard to parochial reports was referred to the Committee on Canons with the understanding that the chairman of the Committee on the State of the Church shall write out his proposed changes in the present canon.

In their report, the Committee on State of the Church recommended that this diocese accept a membership in the Virginia Council of Churches and that it tentatively approve the Constitution and By-Laws thereof. The Rev. L. Carter Harrison moved that the Council approve this recommendation. This was carried without dissenting vote.

CONSTITUTION OF THE VIRGINIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Preamble

Believing that the time has come in the providence of God for followers of Christ to cooperate more effectively for the progress of the Gospel, we, representatives of the evangelical churches in Virginia, do herewith establish a State Council of Churches to be governed by the following constitution and by-laws.

ARTICLE I. Name

The name of this organization is the VIRGINIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES.

ARTICLE II. Objects

The objects of the Council shall be:

(1) To manifest the essential oneness of the churches of Virginia in Jesus Christ as their Divine Saviour and Lord, and to foster fellowship and mutual understanding among their members.

(2) To provide an interdenominational agency for cooperation in comity, evangelism, worship, missions, education, moral and social action, and any other Christian service that may promote more effectively the objectives of the Christian religion.

(3) To promote cooperation among local churches of member denominations, and to encourage the establishment of, and recognize approved local councils of churches.

(4) To study the religious needs of the people, the churches, and the communities of the state and to devise plans through which these needs can be met.

ARTICLE III. Principles

(1) This Council shall be a voluntary association, and shall be without mandatory power in relation to the bodies choosing to utilize it as a channel of counsel and of joint Christian expression.

(2) The complete autonomy and corporate integrity of each communion shall be mutually respected and safeguarded in all relations involving inter-

denominational fellowship and action.

(3) All constituent denominations and cooperating county and city councils will be expected to share in the cost of financing the cooperative program.

ARTICLE IV. Membership

(1) Each Protestant Evangelical denomination in Virginia shall be entitled to six representatives on the Council for the first ten thousand communicant members or any fraction thereof, four for each additional twenty thousand or major fraction thereof up to fifty thousand, and thereafter two for each fifty thousand or major fraction thereof. These representatives will be chosen in any way that the communion sees fit, regard being given to adequate representation of ministers, laymen, laywomen, and young people.

(2) Each County or City Council of Churches, approved by the Executive Committee as provided in the By-Laws, shall be entitled to elect one member

of the Council, provided that the total number of such representatives shall not exceed 25 per cent of the total membership of the Council.

- (3) Upon recommendation of the Executive Committee, and on the basis of special fitness, the Council may elect not to exceed fifteen members at large.
- (4) Representatives shall be elected in each case for two years, except for the first year when more than one representative is chosen, half of the number shall be elected to serve for a single year.

ARTICLE V. Meetings, Quorum, Procedur

- (1) There shall be an annual meeting of the Council at such time and place as the Executive Committee may determine. Due notice shall be given.
- (2) Special meetings of the Council may be called by the President on authorization of the Executive Committee, or on written request of at least ten members of the Council, the purpose of the meeting being stated in the call. At special meetings only such business may be transacted as is stated in the call.
- (3) Thirty-five members of the Council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
 - (4) The Council shall determine its own rules of procedure.
- (5) State-wide conventions or series of regional conventions for pastors, Sunday School and other church workers may be arranged or sponsored by the Council or by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI. Officers

- (1) The officers of the Council shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, and a Treasurer, elected annually by the Council. These officers shall perform the usual duties pertaining to their respective offices as provided in the By-Laws. They shall continue in office until their successors have been elected and have accepted office.
- (2) In case of death, resignation, or inability of any officers to act, the Executive Committee may elect a successor to hold the office thus vacated until the next annual meeting of the Council.
- (3) The Council may elect an executive secretary and other staff members and assistants as it may decide, on recommendation of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII. Executive Committee

- (1) The Executive Committee shall include the following:
- (a) The officers of the Council.
- (b) The chairman of the Commission on Activities.
- (c) The chairman of the Commission on Finance.
- (d) One member elected by the Council from each of the cooperating denominations.

- (2) The officers of the Executive Committee shall be the officers of the Council.
- (3) Regular meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held as provided in the By-Laws. Special meetings may be called by the Chairman, and shall be called upon the written request of five members, due notice being given.
 - (4) Seven members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum,
 - (5) The Executive Committee may determine its own rules of procedure.
- (6) The Executive Committee shall propose to the Council a constructive program of cooperative activities, with an itemized budget for the same, and shall execute and administer the program which the Council adopts. The Executive Committee may assume the powers of the Council when necessary between Council meetings, provided, however, that it does not annul or reverse any action taken by the Council. The Executive Committee shall report its proceedings to the Council at every regular meeting.

ARTICLE VIII. Commission on Finance

A Commission on Finance shall be elected annually by the Council to consist of not less than seven members of whom the Treasurer of the Council shall be one. The duties of this Commission shall be:

- (1) To prepare an annual budget for submission to the Executive Committee at least two months before the annual meeting of the Council.
- (2) To develop plans and policies for the successful financing of the work of the Council subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.
 - (3) To provide for the proper auditing of the Treasurer's accounts.

ARTICLE IX. Commission on Activities

- (1) A Commission on Activities shall be elected annually by the Council to plan and recommend a program of work to the Executive Committee, and to coordinate and correlate the work of the various departments as may be provided in the By-Laws.
 - (2) Members of this Commission shall include:
 - (a) The chairman, who shall be elected by the Council.
 - (b) The chairman and two additional members from each department.
- (c) Six individuals chosen because of special fitness in the general area of the activities of the Commission.

ARTICLE X. Bu-Laws

The Council may adopt such by-laws as it deems proper provided the same are not in conflict with this constitution.

ARTICLE XI. Amendments

The Council may amend the constitution at any annual meeting by a majority vote of members present, provided, that at least one month before the vote is taken, the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to all members of the Council.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. Duties of Officers

The officers of the Council and of the Executive Committee shall perform the duties usually pertaining to their respective offices and such other duties as are specified in the following paragraphs.

President. The President shall be ex-officio a member of both Commissions and of all departments.

Vice-President. In the absence of the President, the duties of his office shall be performed by one of the Vice-Presidents.

Treasurer. The Treasurer shall have the custody of all funds, securities, and legal documents of the Council, shall receive moneys and make disbursements as authorized by the Executive Committee, and shall keep accurate books on account. He may borrow in the name and on behalf of the Council for the uses and purposes thereof, as may be authorized by vote of the Executive Committee. He shall make a written report to the Council at its annual meeting and to the Executive Committee at the regular meetings thereof. The Treasurer shall be bonded for the faithful discharge of his duties in such sum and with such surety or sureties as shall be required from time to time by the Executive Committee. The Treasurer, at the expiration of his term of office, shall turn over to his successor all the books, accounts, and documents belonging to the Council.

Executive Secretary. The Executive Secretary shall be the general advisory and executive officer of the Council and shall render such service in its several departments as the Executive Committee shall from time to time determine. He shall particularly seek to correlate the activities of the Council's departments and commissions and to maintain such relations with the executive officers of the denominations and other cooperating units of the Council as shall help to develop a comprehensive and well balanced program of cooperative religious work throughout the state.

The Executive Secretary shall be an ex-officio member of the Council and of the Executive Committee without vote, and an ex-officio member without vote of both Commissions and of all departments.

ARTICLE II. Departments of Work

- (1) The work of the Council shall be administered through the following named departments:
 - (a) Christian Education.
 - (b) Evangelism and Worship.
 - (c) Comity and Missions.
 - (d) Social Education and Action.

Any of these departments may be modified or discontinued and others may be added by the Executive Committee when in its judgment the total program of the Council will be furthered by such change. The Executive Committee may appoint from time to time committees for the purpose of giving special emphasis to any item of work.

(2) Departments shall include the following members:

(a) A chairman and five or more members elected by the Council.

- (b) Employed secretaries or executives of member denominations working in this particular area.
 - (c) Chairmen of similar committees in the constituent denominations.
- (d) Additional members elected by the departmental committee and approved by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE III. Nominating Committee

The Executive Committee shall elect a Nominating Committee of five members, at least one month prior to the annual meeting of the Council. The Nominating Committee shall present to the Council nominations for the President, Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Treasurer of the Council, the members of the Executive Committee, the chairmen and the members of the two Commissions and of the various departments. Opportunity shall be given for nominations from the floor.

The Executive Secretary shall be elected by the Council on nomination of the Executive Committee.

In its selection of nominees, the Nominating Committee shall give due attention to denominational representatives.

ARTICLE IV. Program Committee

A Program Committee shall be elected by the Council at each annual meeting to prepare the program for the next annual meeting.

ARTICLE V. County and City Councils of Churches

Approved County or City Councils of Churches are those which are set up on the general pattern of the State Council of Churches, and whose constitution and by-laws have been approved by the Executive Committee of the Virginia Council of Churches.

ARTICLE VI. Meetings

The Executive Committee shall hold four regular meetings each year, in the months of September, December, March, and June.

ARTICLE VII. Suspension or Amendment

These By-Laws or any of them may be suspended or amended at any meeting of the Council by majority vote.

Mrs. John H. Guy gave the report of the Woman's Auxiliary.

This report was received by a standing vote. (See Appendix)

The secretary read the following resolution from the Annual Meeting of the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in regard to salaries of mountain women workers:

WHEREAS, The Woman's Auxiliary has for years been concerned about the inadequate salaries of the missionaries in the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, and

Whereas, at the Annual Meeting of the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, a letter was read from the Junior Woman's Auxiliary of St. John's Church, Richmond, urging that we take up the matter with the Diocesan Council,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, in annual meeting assembled, urges the consideration by the proper authorities of a larger appropriation for the salaries of these Mountain missionaries.

The Council voted to approve this resolution in principle and refer it to the Committee on the Budget for 1945.

Dr. Gibson presented the report of Shrine Mont. (See Appendix)

The Council reassembled as a Missionary Council under Canon IX. That part of the Bishop Coadjutor's address dealing with the Missionary Society was received as the report of the Executive Committee.

The Rev. J. W. Kennedy presented the report of the Diocesan Board of Christian Education. (See Appendix.)

Mr. Kennedy moved that the following resolution be adopted.

Be it Resolved, that the Diocese of Virginia take steps to establish a training center for girls who are interested in Church work as a professional career in cooperation with the Presbyterian Assembly's Training School, and that this whole matter be referred to the Diocesan Board of Christian Education with power to act.

This was carried. The report was received.

The Rev. Edward E. Tate presented the report of the Diocesan Board of Christian, Social Relations. (See Appendix).

The Rev. H. A. Donovan presented the report of the Field Board by title. (See Appendix).

The Rev. T. D. Brown presented the report of the Board of Colored Work by title. (See Appendix).

The Rev. Charles T. Warner, chairman of the Board of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, spoke on the school yesterday, today and tomorrow. The following resolution presented by Mr. Archibald G. Robertson was carried:

Resolved, that the Council of the Diocese of Virginia put on record its faith in the plans now going forward for the rehabilitation of the Bishop Payne Divinity School.

It is impressed with the need of the urgency of carrying out these plans.

It believes that such a plan, carried to a successful conclusion, would do much towards the solution of the race problem in our midst. It recommends this plan to our sister dioceses.

THE PLANS

- 1. Putting up adequate plant now estimated to cost \$250,000.00.
- 2. Bringing curriculum up to standard of Association of Theological Schools.
- 3. Securing an adequately equipped faculty, all of whom shall have graduate degrees and devote entire time to teaching.
 - 4. Adequate salaries.
 - 5. Building up of library facilities.
 - 6. Increasing endowment.

The Rev. J. Sullivan Bond presented the report of the committee on the program of the Diocese for 1945. He introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, that the committee on the program of the diocese be appointed at the meeting of one Council to consider the program to be presented at the following Council, and that a copy of the program, together with an itemized statement of the proposed expenditures, be presented to this committee for its study not less than 30 days preceding the Council at which its report is to be made.

This was adopted.

Several changes were made in the tentative program as presented by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. In making an increase for the Diocesan Missionary Society, \$3,000 was earmarked for an increase in the appropriation of the Society to Mountain Work to be used in increasing salaries of mountain lay workers now receiving \$50.00 or less.

A motion by the Rev. Mr. Boyd that the secretary call the

roll of parishes in taking the vote on the program was lost. The program as amended was then adopted as a whole, the total being \$137,700. (See Appendix.)

The Council adjourned until the evening session at the Jefferson Hotel.

At 8:00 P. M. the Council reassembled for an open session in the auditorium of the Hotel Jefferson in honor of Bishop Tucker.

Bishop Goodwin presided. He introduced the speakers of the occasion—the Rev. Joseph B. Dunn, D. D., who spoke on the Tucker tradition and Bishop Tucker as a young man.

The Rev. G. M. Brydon, D. D., spoke on Bishop Tucker as a Diocesan leader. The Rev. Charles W. Sheerin spoke on Bishop Tucker as a missionary and as a leader in the National Church.

The Rev. Samuel M. Cavert, D. D., of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America spoke on Bishop Tucker's leadership in the Council and as an interdenominational leader.

Mr. John B. Minor, on behalf of the committee appointed earlier in the day to bring in resolutions, presented the following:

The clergy and lay delegates assembled in this one hundred and forty-ninth annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia realize with keen regret that this Council is the last one at which the Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker will preside as our Bishop.

We recognize the fact that with the increasing weight of duties as the Presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America he deems it necessary to resign his Diocesan Episcopate and we regretfully acquiesce in his judgment; but in so doing we wish to emphasize the unbreakable tie of esteem and affection which has grown steadily stronger during the years of his ministry among us as our Bishop.

During the eighteen years of his canonical connection with the Diocese of Virginia as Bishop Coadjutor for one year, and as Diocesan since July 1927, the people of the Diocese, both clergy and laity, have gladly followed his inspirational leadership and have learned to love the man beneath his robes of office with a reality that will not be affected by the termination of an official relationship. We therefore express the earnest hope that he will continue to hold his canonical connection as a clergyman of the Diocese of Virginia and, after the close of his term of office as Presiding Bishop, resume his residence in Virginia and exercise his right to a seat and vote in our Diocesan Council.

On behalf of Bishop Tucker's many friends in the Diocese several presentations were made. Mr. John B. Minor presented two silver bowls with the following inscription on each:

To the

RIGHT REVEREND HENRY St. GEORGE TUCKER, D. D., LL. D., S. T. D. Bishop of Kyoto, Japan, 1912-1923 and now

Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia

Presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the

United States of America

Presented on the occasion of the one hundred and forty-ninth Council of the Diocese of Virginia, 1944, as a testimonial of the affection and pride of the people of his Diocese in him as a Christian leader and friend.

Bishop Mason presented a check for \$1,000.00 for the painting of a portrait of Bishop Tucker to be hung in the Mayo Memorial Church House.

Bishop Goodwin presented a check for \$2,500.00 for Bishop Tucker to use at his discretion for the rehabilitation of the Church in the Orient after the war. He expressed the hope that this would be a nucleus of a much larger fund.

Bishop Tucker responded graciously thanking all those who had taken part in the testimonials and gifts.

Thursday, May 25th. 1944.

The service of the Holy Communion was conducted by Bishop Tucker, Bishop Goodwin, Bishop Mason and the Rev. James W. Kennedy. Bishop Tucker then called the Council to order. The Secretary read the minutes of Wednesday's sessions. The minutes were approved as read. The Chair called for elections.

On motion it was decided that those receiving the highest number of votes on the first ballot for delegates to the Provincial Synod be declared the delegates and that those receiving the highest number on the second ballot be declared the alterna7es.

The Chair called for election of members of the Standing Committee. The Chair called for election of members of the Executive Committee of the Diogesan Missionary Society.

The Rev. Dr. Brydon moved that the Secretary be instructed the cast the unanimous ballot of the Council for those who had been nominated as Convocational representatives on the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. This motion was carried. They were elected.

The Rev. B. M. Boyd reported verbally for the Committee on Forward in Service.

Bishop Tücker explained further about the current status of the Forward in Service movement declaring that there is now one program of the Forward Movement and the Forward in Service Movement. He said that the work of all Departments of the National Council was being coordinated in conjunction with the program and also coordinated with the work of the corresponding diocesan departments.

Mr. W. W. Beverley asked unanimous consent for the nomination of Justice George L. Browning as a delegate to the Provincial Synod, there being but seven laymen nominated on Wednesday. Unanimous consent was granted by the Council.

Mr. W. Frank Powers requested that his name be withdrawn as he would not be able to attend if elected.

The Rev. J. G. Scott then nominated Mr. Archibald G. Robertson in the place of Mr. Powers.

The Rev. Dr. Brydon moved that unanimous consent be granted for other nominations from the floor. This motion was lost. The Chair called for the election of members the Committee on Finance.

The Rev. A. C. Muller reported for the Commission on Architecture:

To the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Pursuant to the resolution adopted by the 148th Annual Council "that
the Bishops appoint a Diocesan Commission on Architecture, and that the
personnel and function of this commission be determined by the three Bishops"

the Rev. Albert C. Muller and the Rev. Edward R. Welles were appointed to organize the work of such a commission.

After consultation with Bishop Goodwin and the author of the resolution, the Rev. B. Duval Chambers, preliminary steps were taken as follows:

- 1. Contact was established with the Interdenominational Bureau of Architecture, which is connected with the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. Helpful pamphlets, booklets and suggestions as to new buildings and improvements are thus available to any Church group within the Diocese. The Bureau also stands ready to give technical advice on tentative plans before building operations are begun.
- 2. The nucleus of a Diocesan Library on Architectural subjects has been established, with funds provided by Bishop Goodwin; so that any Church group within the Diocese may borrow and study good books on the subject prior to building or making improvements.
- 3. A contest, suggested and underwritten by Bishop Goodwin, was inaugurated through the pages of The Virginia Churchman, to secure photographs of parish buildings throughout the Diocese. These pictures would also be available for reference by other Church groups.

Your Commission recommends that the work already begun be continued and developed, and also commends for possible future action, perhaps after due consideration may have been devoted to them, the following suggestions from the original mover of the resolution:

- 1. That the Commission be composed of men who know Church architecture and have had experience in erecting and planning buildings according to Diocesan traditions.
- 2. That the Diocese at large be interested in this Commission and give it the authority which it should have, not only in helping to design new buildings but, what is more important, to ascertain beforehand whether the parish contemplating improvements is able to pay for the visions of the vestry or building committee.
- 3. That the Commission should be given weight in the Diocese, so that proposed memorials would be referred to it as to churchly and architectural appropriateness; thus often relieving local authorities of possible embarrassment in this regard.

The report was received.

Mr. W. Frank Powers reported for the Committee on Nominations recommending the re-election of Mr. David H. Rust, Jr. as a trustee of Stuart Hall; the nomination to the Trustees of the Funds in the Diocese of Virginia of Mr. C. Braxton Valen-

tine and Mr. John W. Boyd; the nomination to the Board of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia: Rev. Robert F. Gibson, Jr., Rev. E. E. Tate, Mr. Armistead Boothe and Mr. John M. Daniel. The committee's recommendations were adopted.

Dr. Brydon presented the following resolution:

Whereas the annual Council of 1945 will be the 150th meeting of the Council (or convention) of the Diocese of Virginia since its organization in the year 1785: therefore, be it resolved, that the Bishop of the Diocese be requested to make such provision for recognition of that event, by historical address or otherwise, as he with the advice of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society may deem best.

This was adopted.

The Rev. Robert B. Nelson asked for unanimous consent to substitute the name of the Rev. J. Sullivan Bond for his own name as a nominee for delegate to the Synod. Consent was not granted.

Mr. John B. Minor presented the report of the Committee on Canons:

1. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the amendment to Canon XVI, Section 1, recommended by the Commission on Lay Representation of Mission Churches in the Council as follows:

Immediately after the first paragraph of Section 1 add the following as a separate paragraph:

"After the 20th of May, 1943, there must appear from their last report to the Diocesan authorities, that there are at least fifty communicants in the group, and that they have disbursed during the preceding year at least \$500 for Church purposes."

The Rev. F. P. Thornton offered an amendment to the proposed change so that the minimum number of communicants be 25 instead of 50. This amendment was carried. The recommendation as amended was adopted by a vote of 102 ayes to 12 noes.

2. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the amendment to Canon VI suggested by the Committee on Finance, said canon as amended would read as follows:

CANON VI

OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

"It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance to have the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese audited annually, and to report to each regular annual meeting of the Council, and to any special meeting thereof when requested, the financial condition of the Diocese as disclosed by such audits, with such recommendations as it may deem expedient, and to perform such other duties as the Council may direct or may be prescribed by Constitution or Canon."

This was adopted by a canonical majority.

3. Your Committee recommends for adoption the following, as recommended by the Committee on State of the Church:

Amend Canon XXIV, Section 2, by striking out the words "the first day of February of each year" and substitute in lieu thereof the words "the first day of March of each year".

This was lost.

4. Your Committee recommends for rejection the proposed addition of a Section 3 to Canon XXIV, also recommended by the Committee on State of the Church, which would provide that

"Any congregation whose minister fails to meet the requirements set forth in Section 2 of this Canon, shall be deprived of its lay vote in the Council session immediately following."

The Rev. A. C. Tucker moved a substitute. This was referred to the Committee on Canons for a report at a later time.

5. Your Committee is of the opinion that certain amendments be adopted to Canon XXI dealing with Business Methods in the affairs of the Church is of too great importance to be acted upon in the limited time available to the Committee during the sessions of this Council.

Your Committee therefore recommends that it be constituted a Commission to study the proposed amendments carefully and report to the next regular meeting of the Council.

This was carried. This completed the first report of the Committee on Canons.

Mr. J. C. Phillips presented the report of the Committee on Invested Funds:

Your Committee on Invested Funds begs to report that they have examined the various funds held by the Diocese and find that they have been audited by certified accountants and found in order.

We are very much gratified to know that the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Funds was able to pay 3.8% on the funds held in the General Account.

As the operating account of the Trustees of the Funds is not itemized, we were not able to tell from what funds this came, but we would suggest that if not already done, a proportionate share of this expense be charged to investments held outside of the General Fund.

Mr. Donovan, speaking as a member of the Joint Commission on the Presiding Bishop's See of the General Convention, asked for the appointment of a Diocesan Commission to consider the matter of the establishment of territorial area in the Diocese of Virginia, with a view to determine what arrangements, if any, might be made, in case such should be the desire of the Church as expressed by its General Convention, and to report to the next meeting of the Diocesan Council. It was moved and carried that this Commission be appointed. Bishop Goodwin appointed:

Rev. H. A. Donovan, Rev. Stanley Ashton, Rev. C. E. Buxton, Mr. Theodore C. Hudson, Mr. Blake T. Newton, Mr. A. A. Smoot.

The Rev. V. C. Franks reported for the Commission on Resolutions. He recommended adoption of the following resolution submitted by the Rappahannock Valley Convocation and amended by the committee:

Be it Resolved, that a committee be appointed and made responsible for planning and publishing an annual or semi-annual schedule of all Diocesan meetings. The committee shall be chosen by the Bishop.

This was carried.

Bishop Goodwin appointed Rev. S. B. Chilton and Rev. A. C. Muller.

Dr. Franks then presented a resolution from the Piedmont Convocation in regard to offering resolutions in Council:

Whereas it is befitting the dignity, position, and influence of the Diocese of Virginia that the Resolutions of its Council should have the most careful preparation, as well as proper and adequate consideration before adoption; and

Whereas it appears that many such Resolutions have been hastily and carelessly prepared, and in turn adopted with a minimum of knowledge and consideration:

Now, therefore, be it resolved by this Convocation, that it petitions the Diocesan Council to make such changes in its Rules of Order as to accomplish the following:

- 1. That a Commission on Resolutions be appointed at each regular meeting of the Council to continue as a committee until the next regular meeting of the Council.
- 2. That all Resolutions, except those of Standing Committees of Council and those of appreciation, sympathy, or commendation, shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Diocese at least 60 days before the regular Council meeting for consideration and recommendation to that Council.
- 3. That such Resolutions shall be printed, typed or mimeographed, and circulated to all delegates at least 30 days prior to the meeting of the Council.
- 4. That Resolutions may be submitted at the annual meeting of the Council and referred to the Committee on Resolutions for consideration at the

next regular meeting, unless the Council, by a two-thirds vote, instructs the Committee on Resolutions to report for immediate consideration.

Dr. Franks then read the following report of the committee: Your Committee on Resolutions recommends to Council the following changes in this resolution:

1. No change.

2. That items two and three be merged to read as follows:

That all resolutions except those of standing committees of the Council and those of appreciation, sympathy and commendation, shall, at least fifteen days before the regular meeting of Council be forwarded to the Secretary of the Diocese who shall thereupon furnish a copy to each member of the Commission on Resolutions and like copies to the Deans of Convocations, and to each parish having representation in the Council.

3. Resolutions however may be submitted at the annual meeting of the Council and considered by said Council, provided two-thirds of the members present and voting shall so direct.

Mr. Lewis C. Williams moved that the resolution be laid on the table. This was lost.

Section 1 of the resolution providing for the appointment of a commission was adopted. The Rev. Robert B. Nelson moved an amendment to Section II. This was lost.

Dr. Kevin moved the following substitute for Sections 2 and 3 of the resolution:

That as many proposed resolutions as possible be forwarded to the chairman of the Commission on Resolutions at least two weeks before the annual meeting of the Council so that they may be edited, mimeographed and mailed to all the deputies.

This was accepted. It was moved that the whole matter be referred to the Commission that had already been created. This was carried 64 to 40.

It was moved and carried that the Rev. A. Campbell Tucker, the Rev. George P. Mayo, the Rev. Robert B. Nelson and the Rev. Henry G. Lane be declared clerical alternate deputies to the Synod and that Messrs. Roland Harrison, Archibald G. Robertson, Richard C. Horne and Dr. Martin H. Urner be declared alternate lay deputies to the Synod.

The Council adjourned for lunch at 1:00 P. M. and reassembled at 2:00 P. M.

Mr. John B. Minor read the second report of the Committee on Canons.

Your committee recommends that the following Section 3, Canon XXIV submitted by Rev. A. Campbell Tucker be rejected:

"No representative in Council from any parish or congregation failing to comply with Section 2 of this Canon shall be eligible to election to any office of Council at its meeting next following such failure."

Your committee is of unanimous opinion that it is of extreme importance that all parochial reports should be made on or before February 1 of each year as required by Canon but they do not think it wise to attempt to secure performance by penalty imposed.

Your committee begs leave to suggest that if the Bishop will go after recalcitrant clergy with a red hot polker, motion will be stimulated.

The recommendation of the committee was carried.

It was moved by A. Mackay-Smith that the names of all parishes which do not submit their reports by February first of each year be published in the Virginia Churchman and be read out at the annual meeting of the Council. This was carried.

The Rev. Robert B. Nelson presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, there is in the Synod of this Province a Commission on the placement and replacement of Clergy whose recommendations have been adopted by the Synod.

Be it resolved that such recommendations be referred to the Committee appointed to consider the problem of the men returning from the armed forces after being honorably discharged.

The report of the Board of Examining Chaplains was presented by title:

To the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Board of Examining Chaplains respectfully reports that since the last Council it has examined the following candidates for holy orders in subjects prescribed by canon as necessary for ordination to the diaconate and priesthood:

Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia be, and are hereby authorized in their discretion to acquire property (and building) and to establish a Preparatory School for Boys in or near Alexandria, Va., to provide for such grades as the Board of Trustees may determine, the location to be as they select.

The Rev. H. Lee Marston moved that greetings of the Council be sent by the Secretary to all Chaplains in the armed services. This was carried.

It was moved and carried that the greetings of the Council likewise be sent to laymen now serving in the armed forces who during the past five years have been delegates to the Council. The rectors were instructed to send their names and addresses to the Secretary.

Mr. John B. Welsh offered the following motion:

Resolved, that the Council do extend a most pressing and cordial invitation to Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, Presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States to attend and participate in the proceedings of the 150th annual meeting of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

Mr. Justic Browning presented the following motion which was adopted:

Resolved, that the Bishop or presiding officer of this Council appoint a committee of five which shall prepare and have printed a brochure of greeting and Christian salutation to be sent to each of the persons in the armed service

of this country and now abroad from this diocese and, inasmuch as this will entail an expenditure of money, it is further resolved that this feature be referred to the Committee on Finance, with power to act.

It was moved that Bishop Goodwin appoint a Commission on Forward in Service. This was carried. The following Commission was appointed: Rev. Messrs. Beverley M. Boyd, chairman, Frederick J. Warnecke, H. A. Donovan, James W. Kennedy, and Edward E. Tate, Mrs. John H. Guy, Mr. Fred C. Cochran, and Mr. William Cooke.

The report of the Church Schools was presented by title. (See Appendix).

Dr. Mayo presented the report of The Blue Ridge School. At his request, Judge John J. Morris, an alumnus of the school, made a brief statement setting forth the value and accomplishments of this school.

The reports of St. Agnes' School, Stuart Hall, St. Anne's School, St. Catherine's School, and St. Margaret's School, were presented by title. (See Appendix)

The Rev. S. J. Hutton presented the report of Christchurch School. The Rev. John Page Williams presented the report of St. Christopher's School. (See Appendix)

The Rev. J. P. H. Mason presented a resolution thanking the Rector, Vestry, Choir and Congregation of All Saints' Church for their hospitality in entertaining the Council. This was adopted by a standing vote.

The Rev. F. J. Warnecke invited the Council to meet at St. Mark's Church in 1946. This was received and the invitation held for decision next year. It was announced that the next Council, according to the resolution adopted in 1943, would meet at St. Paul's Church, Richmond.

The minutes for the day were read and approved. After the singing of Hymn No. 489, Bishop Tucker had the closing Prayers and Benediction.

The Council adjourned sine die.

(b) Report of the Board of Mountain Work

We are living in difficult times in the mountains as in other sections. So many of our people are in the service or in war plants that our congregations are much smaller than in former times. There is a critical shortage of labor available to do the many things necessary for upkeep of property and work about the missions, so the missionaries have to do a great many hard tasks. Then there is the problem of keeping the churches open, giving each one at least two services a month. So many of the clergy are gone into the service that it means extra work for those who are left. But in spite of all these difficulties we are trying not only to hold our own but to go forward in at least a few places. We have been calling on our mountain people to help out. This is good for them and some very interesting results have come about. For instance, Miss Walton was given a scholarship at Windham House in New York, with an opportunity to do some studying which she felt would help her in future. So we asked the people of Tanners Ridge to carry on in her absence. The services are being held by the Rev. Lee Marston of Greenwood, and the people hold Sunday School and look after the property. They have done a very good job from all accounts and I am sure it has been good for them.

Another sign of progress is in the offerings. While there are fewer people the giving in Church and Sunday Schools has been greater. This year's Easter offerings have been the largest we have ever had. In Blackwell Hollow Mr. Fisk reports an offering of \$116.00 which I am sure compares favorably with that of many a larger town church. At Alberene, Miss Cary reports that last year not only were their offerings in church larger than before, but the various organizations took care of a British refugee child and a Chinese orphan. Alberene is probably one of the very poorest communities we have.

Of course there has been no building and very little repair work possible. We are trying to save up a little money to have a fund ready for such work after the war. There will have to be extensive repair and reconstruction work as well as some new building done then.

As for the daily routine of the mission workers' lives, their reports show on the whole a very large number both of their visits to the people and of the people's visits to the mission house. The mission cars can of course be used only in cases of real necessity, so there are fewer trips to the clinics and doctors. This means a deal of extra work and responsibility for the workers in trying to look after the sick and injured wherever possible. It is more like the old days when we were very far from medical help and had to be as self sufficient as we could. However, we are trying to see to it that where really necessary, our people are brought to a place where they can have expert care.

On the whole the work is in healthy condition and developing well. On May 31st at St. Paul's Ivy, we are to celebrate the fortieth anniversary of the founding of the archdeaconry. This occurred at the meeting of Council in Christ Church, Charlottesville, in May of 1904. Archdeacon Neve now in his eighty-ninth year, is looking forward to the great day when many of our mountain people, as well as workers and clergy will meet, to receive the Holy Communion and to listen to a historical address by Dr. Churchill Gibson, son of Bishop Gibson under whose administration this work was begun.

The beginnings were small; the people were suspicious of our motives; they gave nothing or almost nothing to the Church; they were aloof, waiting to see just what we were up to. What a contrast today! We are getting from the people real cooperation, help in the work of the church, generous offerings, sincere friendship, so that we can look forward now, in spite of the terrible conditions of war time, to a year of sturdy growth, finer service, deeper spirituality.

(c) Report of the Board of Colored Work

(1) REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

There are several things to give us new courage and hope in the colored work of our diocese, things for which we are very thankful. First:

We are ordaining two deacons in June, graduates of the Bishop Payne Divinity School. They are both very promising young men and well equipped for their ministry. This will give us a full staff of clergymen. We gave three to the service of our country and now we are getting three to take their places—these two, and the Rev. A. Myron Cochran, who has been in charge during the past year of the Meade Memorial in Alexandria.

Our second cause for thankfulness is the interest shown by so many people. The Woman's Auxiliary, always at the front where there is a real mission cause to be served, gave \$5,000.00 from the past triennial's United Thank Offering to be used for the new building at John Moncure High School. The Virginia Branch of the Auxiliary has also promised us a thousand dollars or more through the Bishop's Request fund. Then the committee in charge of

the St. Andrew's fund in Richmond is giving \$2,500.00 for necessary plumbing for the building. Also through the influence of the Rev. Robert Patton the American Church Institute for Negroes gave \$500.00 to our building fund. Many churches in the diocese have given us smaller amounts. We have raised altogether including the \$7,500.00 insurance, more than half of the \$30,000.00 required. The building is progressing in a fairly satisfactory way. It has been very difficult at this time to get labor and materials. The study hall has been in use for the greater part of the year. Now most of the other rooms are also completed. Everything will be in readiness we think, for the opening of the fall term in September. The Diocesan Missionary Society has increased the appropriation for this work to enable us to get a good well trained man to give his entire time as headmaster of the school. This would relieve Dr. Hamilton, the Chaplain, of many duties and enable him to devote more time to his parish Churches. We have in mind, a man recommended by Archdeacon Harris and if we can land him believe he will prove to be just the right person. He is now principal of a high school in Florida. We are trying to persuade him to come on as soon as his school closes for the summer vacation, to look the situation over at John Moncure.

Several of our churches have made progress during the year—Trinity, Charlottesville; Meade Memorial, Alexandria and the Osgood Memorial, Richmond. The Rev. Cornelius Dawson in charge of Trinity has presented twenty persons for Confirmation in less than a year. The Rev. Myron Cochran seems very active in his work in Meade Memorial. Among other things he is training a rather unusual choir. Though some of the members do not even belong to his church he is giving them an interest in really worthwhile church music. St. Philip's, Richmond, has held together in spite of being without a rector for more than a year. One of our theological students has been holding regular services and visiting among the people while the Rev. Aston Hamilton has conducted the services of Holy Communion. I do hope that as our staff increases all of our churches and mission points among the colored people of our diocese will more and more show greater signs of life and Progress.

I have asked the Rev. Thomas D. Brown to add a supplement to this report. I feel that it would be helpful to have something always from one of our colored clergy. In this way we can better get their point of view which would be beneficial, to both the colored and white members of our Board.

As secretary of the Diocesan Board of Colored Work, I have the honor of making its annual report. The board has held three regular meetings this council-year, exclusive of its organization meeting in June.

The work of the Board has been much along the same line as that of last year. No additional work has been undertaken in view of the fact that the present policy is to strengthen the already existing work before venturing into new fields. Assistance has been given to our Calvary Church, Hanover, in helping to complete the new building to the extent of \$380.00 and to the Osgood Memorial, Richmond; \$367.00 in helping to repair and paint the church building; in both cases on a basis of self help. The board also supported the summer conference for colored workers at the John Moncure School, Millers Tavern, and also several vacation church schools and the evangelistic meetings among the missions.

As pointed out in the suffragan bishop's report last year, the two points where great emphasis is being placed in the development of the work are: the John Moncure School, Millers Tavern, and Meade Memorial Chapel, Alexandria. In the former case the work of restoration and expansion of the school building has gone forward under very serious odds in securing necessary material and labor. Yet the enrollment has kept up to normal and the morale of the students and faculty has been exceedingly high under these adverse circumstances. In the latter case, a new minister was secured in July 1943, but the ever present problem of having a place to live and equipment with which to work keeps that work practically at a standstill.

The congregation at Alexandria has raised a considerable amount of money toward a new building and several substantial donations have come in for that purpose. The St. Cyprian's Mission property on Seminary Hill has been sold and the \$800.00 proceeds have been set aside in a temporary investment and earmarked for "new church, rectory or parish house" for Meade Memorial Chapel. The work of the two missions have been consolidated.

It is regretted yet understood that no building can begin at present because of war conditions. Your board acknowledges with deepest gratitude the splendid contributions from individuals, churches and organizations and especially the gift of \$1,000.00 from the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary through the "Bishop's Request Fund" which enabled the board to make a substantial appropriation of an equal amount to the John Moneure School Building Fund. For a number of years the board has been handicapped in its expansion work by the presence of several accumulated debts against the "Fund for Colored Work." This year these debts are being considerably reduced and it is hoped that they will soon be wiped out entirely and some degree of extension work once more resumed.

In the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction work is being carried on at fifteen different points under the care of five clergymen. Our St. Philips Church, Richmond, is still without a regular minister. The 35th Annual Convocation of the jurisdiction met at St. Paul's, West Point, May 3, 1944 with the bishop, five clergy and lay delegates from five congregations present. The spirit and tone of the meeting was extra fine.

Our two students graduated from the Bishop Payne Divinity School May 17, 1944. They have passed their chaplains examinations, and order has been taken for their admission to Deacon's Orders in June. They will be assigned work in the Diocese which should mean a great deal to the development of our work.

(d) Report of the Diocesan Board of Christian Education

To change the phrase "Christian Nurture" from an ideal into a realized fact is the basic aim of the D. B. C. E.; our chief desire is that all may grow up spiritually. To aid this process of transforming and maturing we have worked along the following lines during the past year, in cooperation with our National Department.

Our Consultant, Miss Pray, has been the greatest single factor in accomplishing our plans. She has labored with great zeal and enthusiasm in many parts of the diocese, helping parishes and missions with their various Christian educational problems. Outstanding work has been done in the field of leadership training through the many schools of Christian Education, held in practically every convocation, colored and white. Miss Pray's first responsibility, we feel, is to initiate and help plan for just such projects. The work of her office is endless—and she does it all, from the mimeographing and mailing to the building of curricula and the dekinking of educational tangles wherever they are found. She is doing as much as any single individual can do and we should have at least one other worker in the field

However, Miss Pray will be able to cover more and more of the Diocese now that the Department has an official automobile. She has wasted a great deal of time on travel to isolated points during the past year. The car was made possible by a Christmas offering from some of the Church Schools of the Diocese and a generous grant from the D. M. S. Miss Pray has the car all shined up ready for your inspection—a 1940 Chevrolet 2-Door Deluxe Sedan.

In order to carry on more effectively the many responsibilities of our diocesan task we have appointed various committees to handle certain specified areas of it. There is no need to outline the work of these committees. Needless to say, every part of our work is in charge of a capable committee. I single out the work of the Youth Commission as an example of the coordination and extension plan of the Board. Under the guidance of this Commission the youth work of the Diocese has been evaluated and through several conferences at Roslyn has been strengthened and enlarged. They are engaged now in a youth survey of the Diocese and are doing something with and for youth in rural areas. We are proud to have one of our young people on the National Youth Commission (Miss Willis Adams). You will hear from our new Parents Committee and Committee on Rural Work soon. The curriculum committee is to produce soon a guide in cooperation with the Diocese of Southern Virginia. The D. M. S. has again come to our aid in order that these various committees might function. I almost forgot the important work of our Summer Conference Committee in arranging for four conferences at Roslyn in July and helping to put Roslyn to use as a real conference center of the Diocese as indicated in the will of Miss Rose Walker. Pamphlets telling of the summer conferences are available in the vestibule of the Church. Miss Pray is on hand for consultation along any line of Christian Education in the Diocese.

We cooperate with the work of the Virginia Council of Religious Education, and help support it financially.

We believe we have made a contribution to the Province through inaugurat-

ing a continuing winter conference at The College of Preachers in Washington for the express purpose of defining the theological content of Christian Education and how to put it across to boys and girls. Miss Pray will teach at the Provincial Conference at Sweetbriar next month. She is also on the Provincial Commission of Christian Education.

We are particularly anxious to increase such offerings in the Diocese as the Mite Box offering and B. T. O.; such work as the Christmas Boxes, the Negro (we may have a part-time worker here), the rural, and to enlarge the service of our conference center—Roslyn. We want to spend more time in the field and to actually demonstrate how to do things. We are assembling sample curriculum materials and books for lending to parishes and missions, all of which the consultant will "lug" along in her "new" car, for you to actually see and touch.

There are several fields in which we need to do more work. This is especially true of the colleges. There are opportunities all over the Diocese. We hope to do something about them. Another great area of need is for women workers. In order to begin meeting this need, we have worked out a plan, in cooperation with the Diocese and National branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, and with the Dioceses of Southern Virginia and West Virginia, for training workers under our supervision at the Presbyterian Assembly's Training School in Richmond. Some of our girls have already been trained there quite adequately, and since our own training program for women workers in the National Church is in a state of flux, we want this plan to take effect immediately and to continue temporarily until something more definite is worked out on a National scale. These girls, and we hope to have several enter this Fall, would be available for work in our parishes on Sundays and for field work in the Diocese in the summer—an item in the budget is to take care of this field training program.

Our budget for this year is an increase over last, but it is not yet thoroughly adequate to make the work in our Diocese compare favorably with that of other denominations. The work of Christian Education in the Episcopal Church has fallen far short of the progress other churches have made and we must labor diligently to catch up.

We have kept the clergy, Church School Superintendents and Directors of Christian Education informed of our work through the medium of a penny post card edition of "Contact".

We still hope to work out a program for Sunday lessons to the isolated, other conferences, etc. We have taken many forward steps. One of them was the D. V. B. S. Training School for mountain workers at Charlottesville.

Some of our conference plans have fallen through, one for the rural clergy and workers especially, because of reduced funds available from the Memorial Trustees.

Our desire is to serve. Please call on the Department and Miss Pray for any of the needs of your Church School, young people, etc. We can arrange a visit, a conference, a chat by mail, etc.

(e) The Report of the Diocesan Board of Christian Social Relations

The work of this board has been somewhat disorganized during the past year owing to the resignation of its chairman, The Rev. Robert B. Nelson, just after the last Annual Council.

Mr. Nelson had served for a number of years, but owing to transportation difficulties, he felt that he could no longer continue to do so efficiently. Before his resignation, however, he planned the program for the April meeting, which included addresses by Dr. Dabney Lancaster, Superintendent of Public Education, Mr. Carroll T. Taylor, Supervisor of Classification State Board of Correction, both of whom emphasized the danger of the rising tide of juvenile delinquency, in the state, attributing it to two causes: one, lack of proper home supervision and care-due to so many mothers being engaged in war work; second, due to the fact that young people, both boys and girls could make so much money with so little effort in war work. Dr. Lancaster called attention to the need of properly trained teachers of religion for our public schools, but said there seemed to be no hope of a solution of this problem for the duration of the war.

The activities of the board in rendering special service throughout the Diocese in the case of individual social problems throughout the Diocese has continued through my office, although on a very much reduced scale. The reason for the reduction for the number of cases handled is also due to the change in economic conditions brought about by the war situation. The unusual abundance of money now being handled by the working classes relieves the need for charity patients in hospitals, and the overcrowded condition of the railroads makes it difficult to procure such charity transportation.

For these reasons, my statistical report is much less imposing than usual, and is as follows:

(f) Report of the Field Board

Your Field Board is composed of seven clergymen and seven laymen whose major responsibility is that of promoting the Fall Campaign in the respective parishes of the Diocese. The Board shares in other promotional interests of the Diocese assigned to it by the D. M. S. During the past year the Board has held four meetings which were attended by most of the members. The difficulty of travel and the rationing of gasoline has inhibited some of the normal activities of the Board. This has been particularly true of the usual Laymen's Conference which has been held annually just prior to the canvass period, at "Roslyn." To offset this, a number of regional meetings have been held throughout the Diocese. Although these meetings somewhat filled the purpose of a lay conference there is a decided need which we believe is fully met in the Diocesan Laymen's Conference. It is hoped such a conference may be held this year. The value of such a conference has long since proved itself.

During the first week of November the Field Board sponsored a series of meetings to present the "Report to the Churches," at which time the Right Rev. Benjamin M. Washburn, D. D., Bishop of Newark, was the chief speaker. Meetings were held at Richmond, Charlottesville, Montross, Fredericksburg, Alexandria, Arlington and Boyce. At each of these meetings one of our own Diocesan bishops was present and at least two of the clerical members of the Field Board. The attendance at all of these meetings was good and we believe these meetings were of much value.

The Field Board has for a number of years sponsored a Conference of the clergy of the Diocese. The 1943 Conference was held at Roslyn, beginning on Monday, October the 18th, at five o'clock and continued until Wednesday, October the 20th, at two o'clock. The guest speakers included the Rev. Ralph Waldo Lloyd, D. D., president of Maryville College, who presented the question of Church Unity as a representative of the Presbyterian Church; the Rev. Robert O. Kevin, Ph. D., of the Virginia Theological Seminary, who

gave four lectures on "The Contemporary Lesson of the Apocrypha," and the Rev. J. Moulton Thomas, the official representative of Forward in Service and the Department of Promotion of the National Council. The attendance at this Conference had a higher percentage of clergy than at any of the other conferences held during the past several years. The value of the clergy conference has long since been widely recognized. During September of this year a similar conference will be held for the active clergy of the Diocese.

On February the 25th, in the Parish House of Falls Church, the Field Board sponsored a meeting of the clergy and Canvass Chairmen or "Key Men" from all of the parishes in Arlington, Fairfax and Prince William Counties. The purpose of the meeting was to secure information relative to the effectiveness of the previous canvass. The signal importance of a meeting of this type can not be overstressed. It was held somewhat as an experiment but we believe regional meetings of this type should be held soon after the annual canvass this year.

The Field Board is grateful to the clergy and laity who have shared in conducting group vestry meetings and parish meetings in presenting the picture of the work of the Diocese where these meetings have been sponsored by the Field Board.

VI. THE VIRGINIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

To the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Again I want to express my appreciation of the courtesy shown by Council in allowing me time on a crowded program to give the report of the Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

Our report for the year 1943 is the largest in the history of the Auxiliary. From all branches of the work, from the Woman's Auxiliary, including the United Thank Offering and Supply Work, from the Junior Woman's Auxiliary, from the Junior Auxiliary, and from the Little Helpers, the amount was \$68,756.42. We may well be proud of this report, representing as it does not only the money given but the love, and labor and sacrifice of the members of the Auxiliary, and their willing and joyful service.

But to be proud often means to be satisfied, and this does not lead to continued service. So that our hope for the members of the Auxiliary is that they will, in the words of Saint Paul, "Press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." The Auxiliary sent five delegates to the triennial meeting in 1943. The Executive Board in trying to realize "God's Gift and Our Task", as outlined by the triennial, has suggested many forward steps, which I hope will be carried out this year and in the years to come.

We have voted money for Junior Auxiliary Leadership conferences, and we have attempted closer cooperation with the Girls' Friendly Society. We have put the Diocesan President of the Girls Friendly on our Executive Board. And in response to a letter from Bishop Goodwin we have suggested that the individual parish choose whether it wants a Junior Auxiliary, a Girls Friendly or both; and we have recommended the Girls Friendly especially for the teen age group; except in parishes where there is the Unified Plan; and then we suggest that this group be a circle or chapter of the Unified Plan.

As a result of a letter from Dean Zabriskie we are going to make an effort to add to our study subjects for next Fall or Winter that of the doctrine and practice of the Presbyterian and Methodist churches (with a great deal of assistance from Dean Zabriskie) with the hope that our members will better understand the approaches to unity.

We have been wanting for some time to have a member of the Auxiliary speak to the graduating class of the Seminary on the work of the Auxiliary, and at Dean Zabrizkie's invitation, we hope we can arrange it this year. We have ordered a copy of "Women in the Life of the Church" and "When We Organize" for each graduate. It means everything to an Auxiliary to have the rector take an intelligent interest in its work.

I wonder if it would be possible for every rector at some time during the year to tell his congregation about the United Thank Offering. This would be of inestimable help to our Custodian in reaching the women who are not interested in the Blue Box.

The parish auxiliary is by far the most important group in the Auxiliary. The convocational, diocesan, provincial and national groups may plan wisely and well, but if these plans are not carried out by the individual parish auxiliary they cannot succeed.

We hope to send a representative to several Virginia colleges to acquaint the junior and senior girls with the opportunities open for church work, and of the scholarships, both diocesan and national, for their training for such work. Our Auxiliary has two such scholarship funds,—the Book of Remembrance and the Gift of Life,—each with sufficient funds for the training of a girl for two years.

At our annual meeting the Auxiliary sent two resolutions to the Secretary of the Council, to be brought before this body. We beg your endorsement.

At the last triennial meeting in Cleveland, at the suggestion of the Virginia Branch of the Auxiliary \$5,000.00 was put into the budget of the United Thank Offering for the American Bible Society.

Virginia came fifth in the list of the Auxiliaries giving to the United Thank Offering; and our delegate, Mrs. Harrison Wellford, was chosen to be one of those leading the procession at the presentation service. We felt this honor was accorded Virginia to compliment Bishop Beverley Tucker and Bishop Saint George Tucker.

When we used to speak of the Auxiliary we thought of an organization which studied about and gave to foreign missions and a few home missions; and packed missionary boxes. Now the Auxiliary is the womanhood of the Church; bound together for service, for all service, for we are, indeed, auxiliary to the National Council in all of its departments. But we women of today

must be very sure in branching out into so much activity, and in necessarily using so much organization that we do not lose the spirituality and deep devotion of those women of earlier years who gave their lives to the service of the Church. If we had to give up either I think the organization would go, but it does make for efficiency, and there is no reason why we can't have both.

We now have splendidly organized Convocations, with chairmen in each corresponding to the Diocesan Chairmen; and this has gotten many more women working and has spread the knowledge of the Auxiliary set up. The members of the Auxiliary must always remember that we are the womanhood of the Church, working for the whole program of the Church, -not one isolated group, working by itself, but each group a unit in a tremendous organization, all bound together by the same ideals, working towards the same goal. We realize at our annual meetings our strength and out unity of purpose; and the real fellowship that exists between Auxiliary women. We have urged our members to do war work in their own time, not in the Church's time. I think we women are apt to feel in these days of many things that we are only Marthas. I think it is all right for us to stay Marthas, for Martha made it easy for Mary to be a Christian; and that is a wonderful thing for anybody to do, to make it easy for someone to be a Christian. (We all know people who make it hard for us to be Christians). What we need is to make our quantity of service take on some of the quality of Mary's; and I think this is what the Auxiliary women are trying to do.

In looking over the records of the first annual meetings I found some differences, but the same emphasis then as now on the obligations and responsibilities of the Christian Life, but it seems to me that in the last twenty years there has been added a joy to what used to seem almost a stern duty. We want the women of the Auxiliary to go about their work with joy and a gallant spirit, with high courage and a certain knowledge, enlisting their lives in the only cause which will bring on earth, "Peace, Good Will Toward Men."



The bonded indebtedness of our system at the present moment is \$645,000. Payment of bonds maturing July 1, 1944 will reduce our bonded indebtedness to \$630,000.00.

Inasmuch as the fiscal year of the Church Schools system runs from July 1 to June 30 a financial report made at this time must present the figures of a year that ended ten months ago. We are very glad to report that our present enrollment of pupils totals 1,123, which is an increase of 90 pupils over the year 1942-43 with financial situation of the four schools, St. Christopher's, St. Catherine's, St. Margaret's and St. Anne's equally as good if not better than in the preceding year. The new headmistress of St. Margaret's School, Mrs. Maurice Langhorne Craighill, entered upon her duties at the first of the current school year and our Board is happy to report the success of her administration during this first year.

Christchurch School is coming to the end of the first year of administration of the new headmaster, Rev. S. Janney Hutton. While the school is not yet self-supporting, and while in order to preserve our property the General

⁽¹⁾ Included in expenses of Christchurch School for the year 1942-43, \$38,051.69, is the cost of major repairs amounting to \$2,140.77. Net loss for 1942-43 of \$9,485.54 was in effect offset by appropriations by Board, \$4,989.10, so that the net decrease in School Capital was \$4,496.44. This compares with \$4,027.72 for 1941-42.

CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

Board has been compelled to expend an unusually large amount for repairs that were absolutely necessary and replacement of equipment which is essential to the operation of the school, we believe with much confidence that under Mr. Hutton's administration the school will grow into a strength both of enrollment and of financial resources that it has never yet had.

A strong majority of our Board are convinced of the value of Christchurch School to the general system of Church Schools of the Diocese. As a school of limited enrollment, and with its beautiful location upon salt water on a five mile wide river we believe that it can become—and by God's blessing will become, a self-supporting school.

At the Annual Council of 1943 a resolution was adopted recommending to our Board that consideration be given to the plan to take St. Agnes' School at Alexandria into our System. In conformity with this request the matter has been discussed in our Executive Committee meetings, and members of our Committee appointed for he purpose are keeping in touch with the situation. The difficulties that have hitherto stood in the way of immediate action of taking the school into our System are in process of being cleared up and we hope that the time will shortly come when definite action can be taken.

Our report of the Church Schools system must deal to a great extent with financial matters and statistics of enrollment. Yet the Board feels very, keenly that the supreme aim and purpose of a system of schools under the Diocese is to stress and emphasize the spiritual side of all balanced education and to give proper place to religious training and study of the Bible as essentia 1 to the formation of Christian habits of life, and to the development of growing and vital faith in God on the part of the individual pupil. Character building in its aspects both of the relation of the human soul to its God and to the world of human intercourse with its manifold needs and responsibilities must ever be the guiding star for the charting of our course.

(b) St. Anne's School

St. Anne's will complete a successful year on June 5, 1944, with Dr. Meta Glass, President of Sweet Briar as the commencement speaker. Of the fifteen graduates this year, eight are entered in colleges, one is entered in a junior college, one is planning a business career, and one is to be married in June. The class of 1945 will have 30 graduates.

The total enrollment is 167 pupils, 55 of whom are in the boarding department, and 112 in the day department. The majority of students at St. Anne's are in the high school, which has 43 boarders and 51 day students.

We are glad to say that in this time of rapid faculty turn-overs we are expecting the great majority of our faculty and staff to return to us next year.

At the present time, in addition to their regular school programs, the students are doing the greater part of work on the grounds and gardens, they are waiting on the tables, and they are doing most of the cleaning of the dormitories.

The academic program is continuing as usual, with the majority of students working toward the College Preparatory Diploma. The library has been increased during this session by approximately 200 volumes. The physical education program has been enlarged this year, several new courses having been added, and all students required to have one hour a day of athletics. Competitive sports have been played with Sweet Briar College, Fairfax Hall, Lane High School, and Southern Seminary.

Extra curricular activities have included the play Sheridan's Rivals and Charles Brooks' Wappin' Wharf; a Glee Club concert; a Fashion Show; and the usual parties and Field Days. The school choir has sung the service twice in Christ Church.

The student body has raised in various ways throughout the year approximately \$800.00 for the war effort, charitable organizations and the Red Cross.

Our objectives are to fit the individual to live with and for others, and to be a useful and worthy member of society, and we are working daily to enable every student to grasp the fundamentals and realities of the Christian ideal.

(c) St. Catherine's School

The enrollment of St. Catherine's School, for the year 1943-1944, is 472 students—153 being boarding students and 319 day students.

I quote from the report sent the General Board at its meeting in March 1944 regarding the students of this year: "Some are from homes which are truly Christian, some from broken homes, some which are rich in wordly goods, and some which are not. Many this year have fathers in the Service. Considering the days we live in, considering the adult world and adult community which is the background of St. Catherine's School, I think there is a wonderful spirit in the School of high ideals, high academic standards, and a very unusual and fine cooperation of the faculty and staff. The Religious Education courses and all others are helping many girls "to live more nearly as we pray".

The religious affiliations of the students are Episcopalians 324; Presbyterians 73; Baptists 27; Methodists 19; Roman Catholics 9; Jewish 6; Litheran 5; Unitarian 3; Quaker 2; United Brethren 2; Reformed Evangelical 1; no affiliation 2.

We are grateful to Bishop Goodwin and Dr. Palmer for taking time on these busy war days to give us a special Confirmation Service on Ascension Day, followed by the Service of Holy Communion. Five girls were confirmed.

Of the 79 students of the Class of 1943, 72 received College Preparatory Diplomas, 6 school (or General) Diplomas, and one a Certificate. Sixty are attending Major Colleges, 7 Junior Colleges, 4 Business Schools, 3 are taking Nursery and Nurses' Training, 1 attending a School of Design, and four are working.

We are sorry not to be near enough to the present meeting of the Council

to have you with us again for lunch, as we did when you met at St. Stephen's in 1932.

(d) Christchurch School

Christchurch School opened its twenty-third year with an enrollment of 45 boys, 27 of them new students. During the course of the session 11 others have come in and 13 have been withdrawn or dismissed. The present enrollment, therefore, is 43; 5 of these are day students, 30 are new boys. The average enrollment during the year has been 46. The great majority of the boys are from Virginia; the others are from Maryland, the District of Columbia, North Carolina, and Georgia. More than two-thirds are from our own Church families; the majority are themselves communicants.

The outlook for the school at the beginning of last summer was not encouraging. The buildings were badly in need of repair; the entire faculty and staff were leaving; only a small group of the students were planning to continue at the school; there was obviously no escape from a large operating deficit for the year. In spite of high costs and the difficulty of procuring materials and labor, the essential repairs were undertaken and are still proceeding; but to meet these costs, it has been necessary for the General Board to make special appropriations totaling more than \$9,000. By good fortune, an excellent faculty and staff of matron, dietitian, and nurse were secured. There was a larger number of new boys enrolled than the most hopeful anticipations indicated. The prospect of the operating deficit has not disappeared, but at least it is now expected to be about \$2,000 less than the original estimate.

Changes were made in the general policy of the school. The requirement for admission was lowered to the completion of the standard fifth grade. Special attention was given to developing the Lower School, offering the work of sixth to ninth grades, inclusive, with the idea of thoroughly preparing boys for the final three years of the Upper School, or for any of the larger preparatory schools if they wish to transfer. Classes meet six days in the week. Organized recreation for all boys is supervised by the masters. A Student Council has been formed and is functioning effectively. There has been a definite tightening up in scholastic requirements and in discipline. Many of the changes have not been welcome to the student body; some have met definite opposition; but on the whole they have been accepted with general approval, and they have been carried through to a surprising extent in the course of a single year.

The administration at the school is fortunate in having the interest and the support that have been shown by the members of the Local Board. But the real task of carrying it on and developing it must, of course, be faced by the faculty and members of the staff who live on the grounds. In this group the school has real strength. The ability, interest, unremitting toil, patience,

and cooperativeness of all members have enabled the school to progress steadily through the year in bettering scholastic standards, improving discipline, and building up morale. The results, as far as they can be noted in the development of individual boys during the year and in the comments from parents, are gratifying. And fortunately all members of the staff, with the exception of one master, plan to return next year.

The school, consequently, looks ahead with confidence. For the future, emphasis is being placed upon the Lower School, which seeks to give boys from eleven to fourteen years of age a thorough foundation for more advanced work in any preparatory school of the country. At the same time, a limited number of boys of ability will be carried on through the full college entrance requirements at Christchurch.

We are nearing the end of a difficult but a most interesting year. Personally, I feel that we now face one that is even more critical than the year just ahead. We face it with the confidence that comes from an encouraging beginning. That we have made serious mistakes we do not deny, that we have obviously failed with individual boys we sincerely regret; but we have a small accomplishment with many of those committed to our charge, an accomplishment that has come from conscientious and devoted work. On this we build with assurance. None of us is satisfied with what we are now doing at Christchurch; but all feel that we have done some good work this year, and that we are going on to do better. In consequence, we hope to open next September filled to capacity; the school has accommodations for twenty more boys than are now on the rolls. We count heavily upon the support of our patrons, to make us better known among their friends who have boys of school age, and we are getting it. We take occasion at this time to invite the interest and the cooperation of every member of this Council to the same end.

(e) St. Christopher's School

At the present time the School has an enrollment of 330 boys. There have been 351 boys enrolled during the course of this session, but the total enrollment at any one time has not been in excess of 344 boys. The average enrollment last year was 300 boys. In other words, there is an increase of approximately 10% in the total enrollment. There are now 44 boarders. The average number of boarders last year was 38. Applications for next year indicate that both the Upper and the Lower School will be filled to capacity. During the course of this year, we have turned down many applications for places both in the Upper and in the Lower School.

The faculty is stronger than it was last year, but since we reduced it by one man—on account of doing away with one section of the Seventh Form—individual faculty members have had to carry a heavier burden. It will be necessary to add another member for next year.

We are still striving to maintain high standards of education in the Liberal Arts. Our graduates in the armed services have shown that the education that St. Christopher's has been giving is sound preparation for military service. We are constantly seeking to strengthen our curricula.

Last June in Washington, a conference of teachers of Religious Studies was held to consider improvement of the Religious Studies curricula. Representatives were present from many schools in this region. We expect to have a similar conference this June.

We have been making studies of the English curriculum with the hope that we may be able to increase the effectiveness of classes in that subject. We are making some slight modifications in order to increase the ability of boys in composition and rhetoric and to meet the difficulties of boys entering St. Christopher's without previous preparation in grammar. Recently teachers of English from the Episcopal High School, Woodberry, and St. Christopher's have met together for an exchange of ideas and experiences with a view to strengthening the study of English in the schools. We hope that similar conferences will be held for teachers in other fields.

Our Senior Class is small, but the boys have made an excellent record in various tests for branches of the armed services. In the tests for the Navy V-12 Program, four boys out of seven passed the tests with sufficiently high grades to entitle them to be considered in interviews for the V-12 Program. Two other boys who took the Navy test were not interviewed by the Navy, but had high enough grades to qualify for the Army A-12. One boy out of seven failed the test. The four boys who took the Army A-12 test all passed. In the V-12 test one boy stood fourth among all students who took the tests in the State of Virginia. In the Navy V-5 Test, seven out of ten boys passed. This gave the School an average of 70% for the V-5 examination. The average percentage of boys passing this examination in the State as a whole was 11 and 5-7ths percent. In examinations for the Army Air Corps, twenty boys took the test. This test was not limited to Seniors. Sixteen boys passed.

We already have at least 450 names on our rolls of boys in the armed services. We know of nine boys who have given their lives for their country. In addition, four have been reported missing.

Chamberlayne Hall was dedicated last October by the Right Rev. H. St. George Tucker. The building is a handsome memorial to the founder o St. Christopher's School. It has proved an invaluable aid to the work of the School. The grounds of the School have been greatly improved.

During the course of the year an endowment fund for St. Christopher's School has been started. Two anonymous donors have already contributed \$11,000.00. Another handsome gift to the School during the course of the year consists of one hundred box bushes given by Mr. John L. Ratcliffe.

There are 205 Episcopalians enrolled in the School at the present time. There are 19 Episcopalians from the State of Virginia in the Boarding Department. Fifteen of these are from the Diocese of Virginia.

The boys are showing a very fine spirit by taking part in the work program

of the School. Boarding students are cleaning their bedrooms and making their beds. All boys take part in sweeping the classrooms at the end of the day's session. The work of the boys in the diningroom has been especially satisfactory. They have taken up the waiting on the tables with a fine spirit and with a minimum of breakage. The boys receive no compensation for this work, but our rates for the year have not been raised.

I should like to take this occasion to pay tribute to the excellent work which has been done by the other members of the administrative staff of the School during the past session. Mr. Robert W. Bugg, the Senior Master, has done invaluable work both as a teacher and as a guide for the boys in all phases of their school life. He carries the burden of helping boys work out their plans for military service and for college. Mr. B. S. Morgan, Jr., has done excellent work guiding the boys of the Middle School. Miss Jane Henderson has had such success as Principal of the Lower School that one of our hardest problems is trying to take care of the large number of boys who apply for admission to the Lower School. The success of the work of the School's Business Manager and Director of Athletics, Mr. Hugh C. Brenaman, is eloquently attested by the Auditor's report for one phase and the newspapers' sport page for the other phase.

We are aware of the awesome responsibility of schools in these days which are so hard for young people and their families. We have no pat solution to the well known problems of the young people today, but we are striving to solve those problems as well as we can.

(f) St. Margaret's School

The enrollment of St. Margaret's School during 1943-1944, its twenty-third session, has been 89 boarders and 12 day pupils. Forty-nine of the 89 boarders are Virginians, and the rest are from 13 different states. The School has been completely filled throughout the year. Sixty-nine of the students are Episcopalians. Eight are being confirmed. The others belong to Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian and Lutheran churches.

Last June there were 12 graduates, 11 of whom are in college, and the twelfth has a position with J. P. Morgan and Company.

The school year has been a very serene one. Six new members of the faculty have helped to uphold the scholastic standard and have contributed greatly to a successful year. Two new subjects, Spanish and General Science, have been added to the curriculum. The fine spirit among the students has been evident in their respect for the high ideals of their honor system and in their untiring attempts to realize these ideals, also in their willingness to undertake new responsibilities.

Their interest has been centered outside of the School as well. The Junior Auxiliary contributed \$78.00 for various objectives, and mailed a Christmas Box. The girls have continued their support of four British children, and have

given their mite box money, which they made in various ways, to the Boys' Home in Covington, Virginia.

St. Margaret's, through trying to give the girls a sense of responsibility for themselves and for others, is continuing to promote spiritual, physical and intellectual growth toward living a useful, Christian life.

2. ST. AGNES SCHOOL

Enrollment: Lower School 193; Middle School 100; Upper School 90. Total 383.

There have never been more than 320 children in school at any one time; the sixty-three over and above that represent those who were entered and attended, some for as little as four weeks and some for seven months, and were then withdrawn because of the transfer of their parents to other localities. Upon the withdrawal of one child, the next on the waiting list of the class in which the vacancy appeared was accepted.

The large number in the Lower School is due to the fact that for two years we have tried to contribute to the war effort by running two sections of the kindergarten, first and second grades, one in the morning and the other in the afternoon, with two sets of teachers for each grade.

3. BLUE RIDGE SCHOOL

With the year ending 1943, the School completes the 34th year of its existence.

The enrollment for the session of 1943-44 is 228, of which 38 are day pupils.

The enrollment is almost equally divided between boys and girls—115 girls and 113 boys; and there are 156 in elementary school and 72 in high school. About 90% of the boarding pupils are from broken homes.

The staff consists of 22 women and 6 men, of which 12 are teachers. Five mountain families live on the School property and from them most of the farm labor is drawn. Owing to the difficulty of getting male help, we have been unable to secure teachers for manual arts and vocational agriculture. In fact, this shortage of male help is seriously hindering all of our industrial work.

The School is accredited under the State Board of Education and in spite of the handicaps due to the war has been able to maintain this standard.

The only building operation of the year was the completion of the cottage near the younger boys dormitory. Most of our buildings are in need of repairs which we have been unable to do owing to the difficulty in getting materials and also the scarcity of help.

The School never closes. The average number of boarding pupils for twelve months was 150. The total cost of operation was \$38,203.41 or approximately \$260.00 for each boarding pupil. About 56% of the cost of operation was paid by parents and patrons. \$5,700.00 was appropriated by the Diocese of Virginia. The State paid part of the salaries of the handcraft and home economics teachers. The New York Auxiliary contributed \$2,000.00. Donations amounted to \$7,129.30.

Considerable emphasis is placed on religious instruction. Four 30 minute periods were given each week in this subject and in the high school the State course in Old and New Testament was given for credit. Thirty nine students and one member of the faculty were confirmed.

Contributions for missions and benevolences were \$1,125.14. The Easter Mite Box offering was \$136.96.

The health of the pupils has been very good and this condition has been due mainly to the careful supervision of our resident nurse and the cooperation of the University of Virginia Hospital.

We have over 700 acres of land, of which approximately 250 acres are under cultivation. The value of the provisions furnished the School through the farm, orchard, and cannery amounted to \$6,636.12. The value of student labor furnished farm, orchard, cannery, and buildings was \$1,319.83.

Through the collection of scrap iron, rubber and paper, we have endeavored to do our part in helping to win the war. \$117.00 was contributed to the Red Cross War Fund. The Honor Roll of our boys in the armed serv ce numbers seventy seven. We are sure there are others we have not heard from.

Regular Sunday School and services as often as possible have been held at the three missions connected with the School—St. David's, Wyatt Mountain; All Saints, Haneytown; and Resettlement.

We wish to express our deep appreciation and sincere thanks to the New York Auxiliary, the Daughters of the American Revolution, and our own Diocese for their continued interest and financial assistance.

4. STUART HALL

As many of you know, I came to Stuart Hall as its new Principal the middle of last June, and at once plunged into the task of building up the enrollment, of securing the necessary new members of the faculty, of supervising certain repairs in various parts of the building, and of studying, as far as possible, all I could learn of the internal life of the school, with a view towards making it as rich and full and happy for the students as possible.

With reference to enrollment, my efforts were rewarded even beyond my hopes and expectations. We have had all year a school filled to capacity—134 boarding students and 21 day students. We could have had twenty-five more boarding students if we had had room for them, and for the greater part of the year, we have had a waiting list from which we were easily able to fill the vacancies caused by a few necessary withdrawals.

The prospects for next year are excellent, and I am hoping to have the enrollment entirely completed by the early part of the summer. With the exception of the 35 graduates, and a very few girls whom for various reasons I am not asking to return, practically the entire present student body has already enrolled. After this present year, we shall not give the Stuart Hall diploma to a student who has been with us only one year; so the Senior Class for 1944-45 is already complete, with 33 girls who have come up from the Junior Class.

Ten of our Seniors have already taken the College Board achievement tests, and 25 of our 35 Seniors are going to outstanding colleges in the fall.

In next year's enrollment, I am making every effort to secure more outstanding Virginia girls, and I feel sure that my efforts are meeting with some success. I feel that a school of Stuart Hall's traditions and background should always have the largest proportion of its students, and many of its faculty, from its home state.

The new members of the faculty who came in September have, without exception, been women of real personality and teaching ability. They will return next fall, as will also the larger number of the older faculty. I shall have five vacancies out of a faculty of twenty-one, and two of these have already been filled.

The spirit of the school has been excellent. The girls have given me 100% cooperation, and have enthusiastically worked with me in many constructive changes we have made in our efforts to develop a form of student government, and a sense of individual responsibility. The year has been a happy one for them, for me, and for the large majority of the faculty.

As in so many parts of the country, the servant problem has been a most serious one. The large government hospital here in Staunton, paying wages with which we could not possibly compete, has taken a number of our most valued servants, and prevented our getting new ones whom we wanted. I have no idea what new problems in this direction the summer may bring forth. We may be forced to a limited amount of student assistance in the dining room, although this will be resorted to only in case of necessity.

We have made a number of changes and improvements in the buildings, always with the happiness and development of the girls in mind. A Browsing Room has been opened where the lighter magazines are kept, and the girls may drop in for free moments. The library has been enlarged by the addition of a room. An attractive sitting room has been fitted up in Robertson House, which, on account of our numbers, is open this year. A large basement room in the Main Building is in process of being developed into a most attractive Recreation Room. The equipment and furnishings of this room will be paid for from the proceeds of the E. L. A. tea room. (For those unfamiliar with the letters, E. L. A. stands for an honor society founded at the school more than fifty years ago.)

We hope during the summer to increase the bathroom facilities in the Main Building, to change and improve the kitchen equipment and arrangement, and to enlarge and improve the Library by removing the passageway which runs through it. I also hope that much needed painting can be done on all the outside woodwork, and that our three tennis courts may be put in better condition.

VIII. REPORT OF SHRINE MONT

To the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

During the year of 1943 Shrine Mont's operation and development compared well, in the testing of wartime conditions, with its growth through fifteen years since its small beginning of November, 1928. But for the unfailing and generous backing of Bishop Tucker, as President of its trustees, Bishop of Virginia and Presiding Bishop of the Church, this spiritual adventure for the Church's Mission would never have been undertaken or achieved notable results. Tucker Lodge in the central group of our buildings is our loving tribute, and, please God, should receive endowment of \$5,000.00, as one unit in achieving the minimum endowment of \$50,000.00 set by Bishop Tucker himself as the minimum goal required to ensure the future of Shrine Mont. Art Hall and its art contents in Tucker Lodge was in 1943 the recipient of such a \$5,000.00 unit of endowment by the John Douglas Woodward Memorial bequest.

The Shrine Mont Endowment Fund, in trust of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia (a corporation), as is all Shrine Mont and Cathedral Shrine of the Transfiguration property, was begun in 1930 with the corporate communion thank-offering of the first Shrine Mont seminar for clergy of the general church. Steadily through the years it has grown, the interest always added to the principal, until now it is passing the \$12,500.00 mark, with several bequests now in wills to double that amount. Further gifts and bequests should assure the minimum \$50,000.00 endowment during the ever-shortening period of the director and Mrs. Woodward's stewardship. The legal form of bequest is to be found on page 6 of this Journal.

We have made an audit of the Treasurer's records and accounts of the administration of

Diocesan Operating Funds#

for the year ended December 31, 1943, as kept by your Treasurer, Rev. Samuel B. Chilton. We submit herewith sundry statements, as reflected in the foregoing index, together with the following related comments:

The account of Diocesan Operating Funds, considered as a whole, embraces miscellaneous funds for general church administrative and extension purposes in the Diocese, and the cash funds for the purposes designated are derived mainly from churches, auxiliary organizations, apportionments from

the General Program Funds, individuals, etc.
In the verification of the amounts shown as accruing to the General Account from the various sources enumerated above, we have not gone beyond

the records of your Treasurer, but have relied substantially on a check of all recorded receipts and disbursements.

Exhibit "A" is a summary of receipts and disbursements for the entire group of operating funds as a whole, reflecting the condition of each fund at the beginning of the year, total amounts received, as well as disbursed to and from each fund, and the final balance or overdraft in each fund, which latter figures are indicated in the column to the right. This summary is codified with respect to the separate statements for the individual funds, which statements show all details pertaining to receipts and disbursements of the respective fund. 

We have examined the records and accounts relating to the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia,* for the year ended December 31, 1943, and in connection therewith we have prepared the accompanying statements, as set forth in the foregoing index, which, in our opinion, reflect the various changes which have taken place in these funds during the year 1943, and show their status at the close of that year.

Exhibit "A" is a general summary of receipts and disbursements relating to the individual funds grouped under General Fund. The final current condition of the income account of each individual fund in the general group, as shown by your books, is indicated in the last column to the right. The total of all individual funds reflecting a net balance of \$19,399.27 is a result of the following:

The increase of \$53,830.94 in the General Fund is reflected in Exhibit "I-1", which shows the increases and decreases in those funds which have changed during the year.

The increase of \$311.39 in the Disabled Clergy Fund is due to premiums on bonds sold in amount of \$308.94 and liquidating dividend of \$2.45 on Citizens Street Railway Company stock not carried at any nominal value.

The increase of \$14,534.28 in Sallie May Dooley Fund was a result of the profit realized on the sale of \$39,000.00 City of Lynchburg, Virginia, 5% school bonds.

The decrease of \$634.36 in Diamond Cot Fund was a result of the loss on settlement of the \$1,000.00 Asheville Country Club real estate note held by

The total fidelity bonds already in force for the treasurership of Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, in the amount of \$50,000.00, is understood and specified by the Constitution of the Diocese to cover all funds connected with the Diocese.

Scope of Audit.

Cash receipts and disbursements, as reported by statements on file in your office, submitted by the custodians, were recorded in the treasurer's records. Receipts were traced to their deposit in the bank, and disbursements by treasurer were represented by cancelled checks properly endorsed.

APPENDIX D

CHANGES IN CONSTITUTION AND CANONS OF THE DIOCESE ADOPTED AT THE 149TH ANNUAL COUNCIL

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE III, SECTION 1, SUB-SECTION (a).—There shall be one lay delegate from each parish having a parish vestry, from each separate congregation, and from each mission church entitled to representation by Canon, to congregation, in which there is more than one minister canonically settled, there shall be as many lay delegates as there are ministers so canonically settled, and from every parish or separate congregation having more than three hundred (300) communicants reported to the Diocesan authorities in the last (300) communicants or major fraction thereof above the first three hundred (300); in no case, however, shall any parish or separate congregation be entitled to more than three lay delegates.

Article XVI.—At each regular angular mosting of the Constitution of the second state of the Constitution of the

ARTICLE XVI.—At each regular annual meeting of the Council there shall be elected a Committee on Finance of the Diocese, which shall be composed of five lay communicants of the Diocese, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected or appointed.

The Committee shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in the Committee.

CANONS

Canon VI.—It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance to have the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese audited annually, and to report to each regular annual meeting of the Council, and to any special meeting such audits, with such recommendations as it may deem expedient, and to perform such other duties as the Council may direct or may be prescribed by

CANON XVI, SECTION 1.—When any number of persons belonging to any parish or congregation desire a separate organization, but cannot comply with the requirements in regard to the formation of separate congregations, ditions:

After the 20th of May, 1943, there must appear from their last report to in the group, and that they have disbursed during the preceding year at least They must appear at least They must be a second or church purposes.

They must obtain the approval of the vestry of the parish to which they belong, if there be only one vestry, or of the Parish Council if there be They must be a parish.

They must have the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese and of the Diocesan Council.

They may have their own vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties, shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in rewithout the approval and consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.
