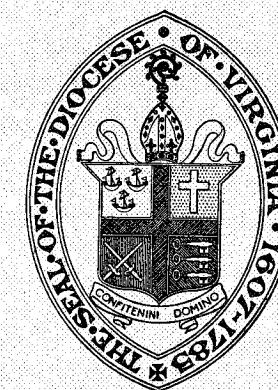

LEGAL TITLES FOR MAKING BEQUESTS

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopate, and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "*The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.*"

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is: "*Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia.*"

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "*Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia.*"

The legal title of the Episcopal High School is: "*Protestant Episcopal High School in Virginia.*"

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "*The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia.*"

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "*Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, a corporation chartered under the laws of Virginia.*"

The legal title of the Blue Ridge School is: "*The Blue Ridge School, Incorporated.*"

The legal title of the Divinity School in Petersburg is: "*The Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia.*"

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

The Shrine Mont Endowment Fund Form of Bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, a corporation under the laws of Virginia,"

The legal title of the home for men is: "*Episcopal Church Home for Men.*"

ORGANIZATION

CANON I, SECTION 1. A list of all the ordained Ministers, or Clergy, of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in this Diocese, with their post office addresses, and their respective cures, stations or positions, shall be prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority and kept, corrected up to date, on file at the headquarters of the Diocese.

This official list of the Clergy of the Diocese shall be *prima facie* evidence of a Clergyman's canonical residence, and his cure, station or position.

SECTION 2. The right of any Clergyman to vote in the Council shall, if denied or disputed, be determined by the Council itself according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, whether his name be inserted in, or omitted from, the said list.

SECTION 3. The said list of the Clergy of the Diocese, corrected up to date, with the names of those entitled to vote in the Council designated thereon, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the roll of the Clerical delegates entitled to vote shall be called therefrom.

CANON II, SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make a roll of the Lay Delegates and Alternates certified to him as duly elected, with the Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches, or Missionary Jurisdictions represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall thereupon appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one Clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to which shall be referred the Credentials of all Lay Delegates and which shall make its report to the Council promptly. But until this report be received the roll as made and called by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authentic roll of Lay Delegates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, the Committee on Credentials shall hear the evidence presented and report its judgment thereon. Upon this report the Council shall determine the matter unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present the Council shall decide to hear the whole case *de novo*.

RULES OF ORDER

I. ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. The Council shall be opened on the first day with a brief service of prayer, and on the second day with a celebration of the Holy Communion, at which time there may be a sermon by a preacher selected by the Bishop.

2. Upon completion of the service on the first day the Secretary shall report the number present of the clergy canonically connected with the Diocese ac-

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cording to the list prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and the number present of the lay delegates, certified to the Secretary as duly elected. The credentials of the lay delegates shall thereupon be referred to a committee on credentials composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates appointed by the President.

3. Except as otherwise provided herein, the following order of business shall be observed:

- (a) Report of the Secretary.
- (b) Election of the Secretary of the Diocese, who is *ex-officio* the Secretary of the Council.
- (c) Adoption of Rules of Order.
- (d) Adoption of a program of the Council prepared by the Secretary and the Committee on the Dispatch of Business, in consultation with rector of the host parish.
- (e) Reading of pastoral addresses.
- (f) Appointment of committees.
- (g) Reports of standing committees, commissions and boards.
- (h) Reports of special committees.
- (i) Communications from Convocations.
- (j) Unfinished business.
- (k) New business.
- (l) Adjournment.

4. (A) There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

(1) Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the pastoral addresses of the Bishops made to the Council, with particular direction to report to the Council upon any recommendations made in the pastoral addresses.

(2) Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.

(3) Committee on New Parishes, whenever such a committee is needed.

(4) Committee on Canons, to whom shall be referred all motions to amend either the Canons or the Constitution of the Diocese.

(5) Committee on Nominations to Diocesan Corporations, to whom shall be reported all vacancies in membership of such boards for which nominations must be made by the Council, and to whom all nominations for membership of any of such boards shall be referred for their consideration before being presented

to the Council. The Committee shall also nominate seven persons for election by the Council to represent this Diocese on the Virginia Council of Churches.

(6) Committee on the Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, the hour for the Council to sit as a Missionary Council, and other matters pertaining to the orderly dispatch of business.

(7) A Committee on Minutes, consisting of three clergymen and three laymen, who shall hear and approve the reading of the Minutes of the Council after each day's session.

(B) (1) There shall be appointed by the President at each annual meeting of the Council a commission on resolutions to serve at the next annual meeting of the Council and at any special meetings that might be called before the next annual meeting. As many proposed resolutions as possible shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Diocese at least two weeks before the annual meeting of the Council so that they may be edited, mimeographed and mailed to all deputies and to the Chairman of the commission on resolutions.

(2) The President shall have authority at each Council after making appointments of standing committees for such Council to appoint the Chairman and so many of the other members of such committees as he may think proper, who shall serve during the ensuing interim and at the next meeting of the Council.

5. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen.

In every election by ballot, when two or more persons are to be chosen, any ballot which does not have the specified number of names shall not be counted by the tellers.

II. RULES OF PROCEDURE.

6. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; every resolution shall be referred to its proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

7. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

8. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

9. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.

10. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

11. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?"; until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.

12. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

13. When a member desires to speak in debate or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personalities.

14. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

15. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

16. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

17. The vote on all questions shall be taken by order, whenever as many as five members request it.

18. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

19. Every member who may be in the house when any question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

20. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

21. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, provided such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

22. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported up by the Finance Committee, or in their absence, by a special committee.

23. Reports of all committees shall be in writing. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall, without obligation, so direct, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

III. GENERAL.

24. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

25. The President may, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

26. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

27. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

JOURNAL

OF THE

154th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia

ST. GEORGE'S CHURCH, FREDERICKSBURG, VA.,
Wednesday, May 18, 1949.

After the opening service read by Bishop Mason and the Rev. Thos. G. Faulkner, Jr., the 154th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia was opened by Bishop Goodwin.

The Secretary reported that there was a quorum present in both orders.

The Rev. Samuel B. Chilton was elected Secretary of the Diocese. The Secretary then appointed the Rev. Alexander D. Juhan and the Rev. W. Francis Burke as Assistant Secretaries.

The Chair appointed the Committee on Credentials consisting of the Rev. J. A. Figg, as convener; Messrs. Aubrey Hawkins, George Williams and Fred N. Lynn.

The Rev. W. Leigh Ribble moved that the Rules of Order of the last Council be adopted with the following amendments:

1. Section 4 (A); (5)—

add: "The committee shall also nominate seven persons for election by the Council to represent this Diocese on the Virginia Council of Churches."

2. Section 5—

add: "In every election by ballot, when two or more persons are to be chosen, any ballot which does not have the specified number of names shall not be counted by the tellers."

Both amendments, voted on separately, were adopted; and the Rules of Order were adopted as amended.

The Rev. Mr. Faulkner, as rector of the host church, welcomed the delegates to the Council. He paid tribute to the Rev. Edward C. McGuire, past rector of St. George's Church, who served in all three of the church's successive edifices. The present building's 100th anniversary is being observed this year.

The Rev. Mr. Faulkner moved that the printed program be adopted as the official program, except that a place be allowed for a report from the Virginia Seminary. This motion carried.

The Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. F. D. Goodwin, D. D., then presented his pastoral address to the Council:

To the members of the 154th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia: Brethren:

The occasion of this meeting of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia in Fredericksburg is the happy renewal of an association of long standing. When, in 1817, the Council, or Convention as it was then called, ventured for the first time to meet outside the City of Richmond, it was to St. George's, Fredericksburg, that they came—to a parish with an already distinguished history, which this year celebrates its 100th anniversary of this building—the third on this site. We are glad to pay another return visit, as we have done many times since 1817.

The Rt. Rev. Richard Channing Moore was then Bishop. Some of the duties before them were not unlike ours today, such as the election of deputies of the General Convention—for the traveling expenses of whom \$80.00 was appropriated. We hope in this respect to do somewhat better this year as we send our delegation to San Francisco.

The task before the Church of that day was clear. It was the time of the Fall and Rising again of the Church in Virginia. From this very spot, though not in this building, their leader presented the case for 1817. "The Church," he said, "has been prostrated in the dust, but from her ruins she implores our united aid and supplicates our assistance. Our Zion will raise her dejected head—be disrobed by an omnipotent arm of her weeds and clothed in the attire of joy. Her harp will be taken from the willows, and the voice of joy and salvation fill her courts." In good measure, within the twenty-four remaining years of his ministry as Bishop, that prophecy was fulfilled. One hundred and thirty-two years later we come to this same place, on the business of the same Lord and His Church, to measure our task and set ourselves again under God, towards its fulfillment.

Our numbers have increased—fourteen clergy were present to hear the Bishop's first appeal in St. George's. Today our whole number of the clerical order in the Diocese is tenfold that number—two of them in the past year have gone to that nearer service with their Lord.

ARCHDEACON NEVE

The Rev. Frederick William Neve, D. D., was born at Benenden in England on December 8, 1855, and died at his home at Ivy, Virginia, on November 16, 1948, in his ninety-third year. After his graduation at Oxford University he was ordained deacon in 1880 and priest in 1881 by the Bishop of St. Alban's. During a period of seven years he held charges in Hertfordshire, Somerset and Cornwall, in England, and in 1888 came to the Diocese of Virginia to the charge of Emmanuel Church, Greenwood, and St. Paul's Church, Ivy Depot, in Albemarle County. He held the charge of Emmanuel Church, Greenwood, for seventeen years, but retained the charge of Ivy Parish, where he built his own home, until his retirement from active pastoral work in 1923. He was appointed Archdeacon of the Mountain Work in the Diocese of Virginia in 1904, and held that position until his death.

Archdeacon Neve will be long and gratefully remembered by the Church in Virginia and elsewhere as the founder, and for many years the leader, of one of the most important departments of our missionary endeavor: the work among the mountain people of Virginia. Coming as he did fresh from England to a parish situated in the mountains of Albemarle County, he found in the coves and hollows of the Blue Ridge Mountains a neglected and forgotten people who lived to themselves outside the cultural and, to a large extent, the religious care of the more favored people of the Commonwealth. He devoted the rest of his life to answering the challenge that their need and their helplessness presented. And today, now that his earthly account has been closed, throughout all the mountain missionary work of our Church in our own Diocese, and in the Commonwealth of Virginia, and in the southern Alleghanies, he will be remembered and honored as the consecrated Messenger of the Cross, who first established and developed into organized forms the ministry of schools and chapels, of clergy and devoted women workers, who have gone into the remote recesses of the Southern Highlands to find and minister to the people who live therein; and even beyond this, as founder of the "Order of the Thousandfold" the influence of his faith, has gone literally around the world.

REV. HERBERT S. OSBURN

The Rev. Herbert Stabler Osburn, D. D., was born in Leesburg, Virginia, on October 1, 1881, and died in Tappahannock on March 11,

1949. A graduate of the school of law at Washington and Lee University, he turned to the ministry of the Church as his life work, and graduated from the Virginia Theological Seminary in 1910. In his later life Washington and Lee University gave him his degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Ordained deacon by Bishop Arthur S. Lloyd in 1910 and priest by Bishop Robert A. Gibson in 1911, he went to his first charge as minister of St. Anne's Parish in Essex County, which he held for three years. After brief rectorships in other sections of Virginia and North Carolina, he returned to Essex County, and held the rectorship of South Farnham Parish, from 1922 to 1931, and then that of Ware and Abingdon Parishes in Gloucester for ten years until 1941.

During these two fruitful decades Dr. Osburn was deeply and actively interested in the wider work of the Diocese through his membership in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and on the Board of Trustees of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia. To all his work in parish, diocese and school, he gave the devoted service of his mind and heart, and won the affection as well as the respect of his fellow workers in these fields.

Stricken down into complete physical helplessness by arthritis in the midst of his active life, he refused to accept helplessness as his lot. After his enforced retirement from active pastoral work he made a pulpit out of the rolling-chair in which his days were spent, holding services and preaching, and conducting a Bible class as opportunity offered, until the final summons came. The Episcopal congregations in Essex County, and the Baptist congregation at Tappahannock, will long remember with gratitude and affection the undefeatable man who preached to them from his rolling-chair.

We need a greater number of clergymen in the Diocese. In the past year more letters dismissory have been given than received. This may have its "more blessed" aspect to those places which have received these men, but it is hard on the vacant parishes left behind. This shortage of clergy is today, as most of us are well aware, a serious problem in the whole Church. Our seminaries, and particularly our own Virginia Seminary, are all making serious effort to meet the situation. It is to the Virginia Seminary that we look with real hope. Three of our Virginia men graduate there this June, and one elsewhere. Next year there will be six men from the Diocese in the senior class and possibly eight or nine in the junior class. This is a healthy sign, an encouraging portent for the future.

And as for the moment we dwell on encouraging things may we pause to welcome to our Council our Bishop-Suffragan-elect, the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, D. D. On September 8th, in the Seminary chapel, he will be ordained and consecrated a Bishop—our Bishop. We need

not tell him how warmly we will welcome him and his family back home, nor how greatly we will depend on his counsel and leadership for the task ahead. In a few minutes we will have an opportunity to hear from him.

SURVEY PROPOSED

What is this task? Where should we direct our efforts, and put our resources of men and money? Do we know that task with definiteness? Is that goal clear?

Ours is a complicated diocesan life. To the obligations of maintaining clergymen in our rural and mountain churches, lay workers in the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge and elsewhere, commissions to promote College work, Christian Education, Evangelism, Christian Social Relations, a fair share and more of responsibility for the work of the National Council lest we be counted unprofitable servants—in addition to these responsibilities there comes the challenge that cannot be denied to strengthen and increase our work in the suburban areas of the Diocese and elsewhere. At the special meeting of the Council last October, direction was given that a special campaign for church expansion should be undertaken as soon as practicable, and the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society was requested to proceed with such a campaign and fix its amount as expeditiously as possible.

When the Executive Committee began to lay its plans to carry out this mandate, it was realized that there were certain committees then at work endeavoring to evaluate diocesan work and expenditures, and advising on opportunities for new work. The heads of all these committees were brought together and asked for advice as to procedure.

At the January meeting of the Executive Committee they reported, unanimously recommending a campaign for raising funds for capital expenditures for church extension. Before such an effort should be made, however, they recommended that a complete survey and evaluation of the work of the Diocese be made, together with suggestions for future work in the Diocese, in order that definite facts and figures might be presented to our people as a basis for the campaign. They further recommended that the survey and evaluation be of the kind now available under the guidance of the Home Department of the National Council.

These recommendations were adopted. The promise of cooperation of the Home Department has been secured, and if this Council authorizes the furtherance of this project, for the first time in the history of the Diocese a thorough study and evaluation of our missionary and institutional work will be made. The services of a director for this projected undertaking will be available next fall, but before that time

much preliminary work may be done. It will be about a year before the final report can be made; but when it is in hand we will have a clear picture of the weaknesses in our present situation as well as a plan for expanding our work in the years ahead. An item in the Diocesan budget that is presented to this Council by the Diocesan Missionary Society provides for the considerable, though I believe the entirely justified, expenses of this work. The method has been tested in other Dioceses and found helpful.

I commend this plan to this Council for approval.

RECENT ADVANCES

This past year has witnessed the realization of several important projects in the Diocese. Just west of Richmond, St. Matthew's congregation has been organized and is asking recognition by this Council as a "Mission Church." Under the energetic leadership of the Rev. Henry Johnston, almost one hundred communicants are enrolled, and Sunday School and Church services are being held temporarily in the Tuckahoe school building. Within a year St. Matthew's hopes to be in its own building, and soon to arrive at the status of an independent congregation.

St. Michael's, Arlington, admitted to union with the Council only last year, now occupies a beautiful and useful building for church services and parish house activities, and is growing under Dr. Weiser's leadership, in a most satisfactory way.

Grace Church, Alexandria, having sold its property downtown, has erected in the northwestern suburb of the city one of the most complete and lovely church plants in the Diocese. There is great prospect for growth here. The Rev. Edmund Merrow is rector.

Emmanuel, Braddock, under the Rev. William Macbeth's leadership, has enlarged and beautified its church plant in order to take care of its increasing work. And in order to put the whole picture before us we must leave the lowlands of Richmond and Alexandria and ascend to the top of the Blue Ridge, where the new building at High Top fills a fine service as chapel, and in the basement, a place for the day school. Nor should we fail to mention the extensive and expensive work that has been done recently on the building in which we are meeting. But from steeple to steeple this historic church is now secure.

And time would fail us to tell in any worthy way of the new Parish Houses at St. Timothy's, Herndon, Immanuel-on-the-Hill, and St. Paul's, Ivy; of new rectories at Warsaw, Wicomico and Tappahannock; of other plans well on into the blueprint stage for building advances at many points. These mentioned clearly indicate the pur-

pose of our people to meet the necessities imposed upon us by our expanding work, and what is finer still, to meet them in almost every case, without decreasing their share in supporting the missionary work of the Diocese and the General Church. It is this spirit, rather than any achievement in stone, brick or mortar, that really counts for the glory of God, and the strengthening and extension of his Kingdom.

If we turn to examine the state of the Church as revealed in our annual statistics, as far as such a method can reveal facts of value, the picture is good.

With the exception of baptisms, where there is a small decrease, and contributions outside the parish, all other figures, both in parochial statistics and in financial reports for 1948, show good progress over the previous year. Confirmations, marriages, baptized and confirmed persons, communicants and Sunday School enrollment, all are in the increase. Especially noteworthy is the increase in officers, teachers and pupils in our Sunday Schools. After several years of decline, for the last three years the rate of increase has been more than 1,000 a year. A great deal of the credit of this is due to the excellent work of the Diocesan Board of Christian Education, and especially its efficient field worker, Miss Martha Pray.

Total parish income increased by more than a quarter million dollars, yet contributions and work outside of our parishes decreased by \$17,000. The budget for the Program of the Diocese, \$173,000, after some minor adjustment, was carried out practically as adopted by Council. However, when the number of communicants increase and the total income increases, it is not a good sign when the contributions to objects outside of the parish decrease.

In 1948 parish indebtedness more than doubled, reflecting the renewal of building activities. However, endowments increased very considerably, and property values increased about seven times more than indebtedness. Present indebtedness is only 5% of property values. So the Diocese is still solvent.

A better measure of the life of the Diocese is its record in missionary giving, both to the Diocesan Missionary Society causes and to the General Church. Here the record shows a steady advance, and, if this Council adopts the program and budget to be recommended to it by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, this advance will be maintained. We do not know yet what amount the General Convention will ask of the Church for the program for 1950. Should we not leave the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society free to act so that when the National Church's budget is fixed by the General Convention next fall, our Diocese may be in a position to assume her fair and honorable part in the Church's missionary undertaking, and keep her place as one of the leaders in the whole Church in this respect?

MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE

At this time we are midway between the meetings of the Lambeth Conference and the 1949 General Convention. I am deeply grateful to the Diocese that, through your generosity, I was able to attend the Lambeth Conference last summer. The association with Christian Brethren from all over the world, the viewing of common problems from many different angles, the sense of daring, of danger, and even of martyrdom arising from the condition in which so many of our fellow Christians live, and yet the spirit of unity within the Anglican fellowship could but deepen one's sense of the diversity and at the same time the oneness of our common heritage in the Church of Christ.

The reports and resolutions of Lambeth are known to all of us and need not be referred to now.

Two of the main topics, however, Christian marriage and the Unity of the Church, are very real issues before the Church in this country, and will doubtless receive attention at the General Convention. I confess that my own feeling in regard to these two issues is, what in each case, I understand to be the majority sentiment at Lambeth: a conservative approach towards the liberalization of the Canon on Holy Matrimony; and, while holding true to the essentials of our Christian revelation and faith, a liberal, even a daring, approach to other Christian bodies as we seek for the realization of that unity which is now ours in Christ. With these matters our deputies to the General Convention will have to deal.

And also with another matter of real importance. In recent years the Church herself through General Convention—not on the initiative of the National Council—has shown an increasing tendency to go outside of the regular budget and quota system and to call for special efforts and special offerings to meet emergencies and new responsibilities. Emergencies and the opening up of new responsibilities are inevitable in a post-war world. You cannot fit the Church's responsibility to a broken and disillusioned social order into the neat pattern of a budget pre-determined on a three-year basis. So by order of General Convention in 1943 at Cleveland the Reconstruction and Advance Fund was projected, and more than \$5,000,000 was raised outside the regular budget.

The last General Convention, in 1946, at Philadelphia, found a starving world in many places, and the Christian Churches of Europe and elsewhere in ruins. They authorized a special appeal of a million dollars each year of the triennium for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief—and this sum has been raised each year outside the budget and quota system.

There was no way within the regular budget and quota plan that these post-war emergencies could be met, and so arose the necessity

for the extra appeal. In every case our Diocese met and exceeded her proportionate part of the total amount sought.

But sometimes there is a danger in success. In the years immediately ahead other special causes are asking special consideration; Christian Education, World Relief, Theological Education, special methods of promotion. If these askings are added to the present National Council budget, our Diocesan quotas will greatly increase, and the support of the missionary cause of the Church might well be endangered. But continued extra appeals may well threaten the whole system of diocesan and parish quotas. And there is *our*, not the National Council's, dilemma.

This problem General Convention must face and solve. Our deputies and the Bishops have here a great responsibility—for the Church must go forward in a way commensurate with her increasing strength, and not take too great counsel of her fears.

OUR DIOCESAN FAMILY

In closing, may we speak a word regarding the Diocesan family.

As one is privileged to go here and there in the Diocese, there are seen so many instances of quiet devotion and unselfish service—*devotion* that would be embarrassed by a spoken word of appreciation—*service* that is above any expectation of praise, that it is almost unseemly to speak of them in public. But it is not amiss to commend certain types of work of this fine nature, nor to mention certain persons as representatives of many others who do a similar task.

Thinking thus of the Diocese, I would commend the type of parish, and its leader, who year after year, following an intelligent plan, without ostentation, without haste, yet without rest, move steadily and consistently forward—Trinity, Fredericksburg, and Frank Moss may well stand as representative of many parishes in this group.

I would commend the zeal of our retired clergy, that will not let them rest while they have strength to serve Sunday by Sunday. In the past year they have had 1,259 services, 114 baptisms, 55 marriages and 140 burials. These services are an invaluable aid to our Diocese and our vacant parishes—we could not do better than to ask Campbell Mayers to represent the youth and vigor of the old guard.

I would commend the faithfulness and fullness of service known only to God of our mountain workers—of Deaconess Hutton and many like her.

If I were to ask Hedley Williams to stand as the representative of those men upon whom rests the challenge and responsibility of developing a rapidly growing suburban parish where the pressure of

increasing populations and a constantly shifting scene make an already difficult task yet more difficult—those in similar situations would understand that each one's work is as worthy of praise as his.

I would commend those clergymen who, called of God primarily to teach in schools and seminaries, have dedicated their lives and their special talents that boys and men may be led into the way of truth, and may hold the faith. To mention John Page Williams or Bob Kevin will show what is in mind.

And these country parsons, who want to be country parsons, and intend to remain in that state of grace—from among them whom should we mention! I speak no one's name, but just look about you, and the one that blushes the reddest and blushes the furthest back will long remain the embodiment of the best that name "country minister" connotes in the Diocese of Virginia.

And with all the emphasis I have I would commend as God's true servants certain lay men and women, who in their parishes, on Diocesan Boards and Committees, in positions of leadership and responsibility give unstintingly of their time and service whenever called upon. Mr. John B. Minor, Mrs. Harrison Wellford are the types I have in mind, and every layman and laywoman is honored in God's service as they approach the ideal of this great layman and godly laywoman.

Have I failed to mention anyone? The city clergy, perhaps, before whom, as an ex-country parson, I stand in great awe, or others. If so please just reach around and pat yourself on the back, for my time is running out. Yet it is well to remember that these persons, and hundreds like them, are the human elements that give life, under God, to the Diocese. They make it a living reality—their works of quiet devotion and steadfast loyalty make for us contemporary Church history.

So from this Council, when our duties are done, we will return to our parishes for another year's labor there where the real work of the Church is done.

We suggest this year no great program, no campaign, no crusade—no special money raising effort, save that which is called for as we take fair part in the task of the whole fellowship. To make your parish the living, growing, eager group that it should be, as a Christian fellowship, aware of the new age in which we live, teaching and serving in a way relevant to this day—yet under the leadership of a Lord who, while He makes all *things* new, yet is the same yesterday, today, and forever—this is our task.

"God of grace and God of glory,
Free our hearts to faith and praise;
Grant us wisdom, grant us courage
For the living of these days."

After his address Bishop Goodwin called upon the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, Jr., D. D., Suffragan Bishop-elect, to speak to the Council. Dr. Gibson said that he was unable to put into words the things he felt in his heart, and that if he could it would be a wonderful speech. He said that he experienced a real sense of joy in anticipating his return to Virginia, his home, feeling that he knew the trust and hope placed in him. He stated that he was not only honored but humbled to the dust. Dr. Gibson said that he had come to give himself to God's service and that he could be counted on to give this gift. It would be a surrender of his whole self to the task.

The Bishop introduced the new clergymen who had become canonically resident in the Diocese since the last Council. They were the Rev. Messrs. Richard R. Baker, III, Harry W. Baldwin, Jr., Edgar C. Burnz, Barton Lloyd, James P. Lincoln, Raymond W. Davis, W. Byrd Lee, Edward L. Merrow, Stewart B. West, Beverley D. Tucker, Jr., and Henry Johnston, Jr.

The Chair announced that Bishop Mason did not wish to make a pastoral address, but that both he and Bishop Mason would submit by title their reports on official acts during the past year. (See Appendix.)

Bishop Goodwin asked Bishop Tucker if he would like to make a pastoral address, to which Bishop Tucker replied that he had graduated from this.

The Rev. Mr. Beckwith, for the Committee on New Parishes, submitted four applications for admission as Mission Churches and one for admission as a Separate Congregation. These were referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

A resolution on communism was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

The Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., spoke on the Virginia Theological Seminary. He reported that the campaign to raise funds for enlarging the plant and improving it had exceeded the \$600,000 goal by \$102,000. He stated that the money was in hand for completing four dormitories, with two more to be built. Because of the shortage of clergy there is tremendous need for enlarging facilities to care for more men. Next Fall

the Seminary plans to increase its enrollment, but in order to do so it must house the men under unfavorable conditions. Dr. Gibson stressed the need for more facilities.

Bishop Mason took the Chair and called upon the Rev. Frank R. Wilson, who represented the American Bible Society. Mr. Wilson spoke of the accomplishments of the Bible Society during the past year and of the services it offers not only to the work of the Church abroad, but also in this country among the blind and the Indians. He praised the missionary spirit in this Diocese. The Chair commended the work and recommended that the Diocesan Missionary Society put the Bible Society material into the hands of the clergy before Bible Sunday each year. He assured Mr. Wilson of our support.

The Rev. Mr. Beckwith reported on the Virginia Council of Churches, as a representative on the Executive Committee. Mr. Beckwith stressed the point that this is the Episcopalians' year, Bishop Goodwin being President of the State Council now.

Mr. Beckwith moved the following, which was adopted:

The Virginia Council of Churches Department of Comity and Missions has asked each member denomination to consider principles of Comity. Due to the fact that the Episcopal Church in Virginia consists of three Dioceses, be it resolved that a committee of this Council be appointed by the Bishop to study the principles submitted by the Virginia Council of Churches on Comity and to confer with the other Dioceses on this question.

The Bishop appointed on this committee the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, Jr., the Rev. James D. Beckwith and Mr. Richard Florence.

Bishop Goodwin urged the churches to put an item in their budgets for the Virginia Council of Churches. Mr. Beckwith asked, and received, permission to have the following letter by Dr. Miller included in the minutes with his report:

REPORT OF THE VIRGINIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES TO ITS CONSTITUENT DENOMINATIONS

Following a period of 69 years of various types of cooperative church activity in Virginia, the Virginia Council of Churches was or-

ganized on July 6, 1944. The Council has thus completed four full years of work since the present organization was formed. On January 1, 1949, the Council entered upon its fifth year of service to the churches of Virginia. The membership of the Council is composed of 146 officially elected representatives of fifteen Protestant denominations. It is a *council of the churches*. This officially elected membership is supplemented by 34 members at large and representatives of county and city councils of churches. The total membership is well distributed over the various sections of the state. In this group of 180 people are to be found some of the most loyal and consecrated Christians of Virginia. These people determine the policies and program of the Council.

The Council conducts its work through ten separate departments. The scope of this report does not permit of any adequate description of the work of these departments. Suffice to say that through these departments, the Council is promoting and guiding many and varied programs of cooperative church work throughout Virginia. Among projects which will be conducted during 1949 are the following:

In the area of *Christian Education* the Council promotes week-day religious education and supervises eighty-five to one hundred full-time Bible teachers in approximately 350 communities in Virginia. In connection with this work, the Council has published nine volumes consisting of over fourteen hundred and fifty pages of curriculum material which is being used in Virginia and in many other states. The *Department of Comity and Missions* is conducting a spiritual ministry to migrants. Through its *Department of Evangelism* the Council is helping churches to unite their efforts in the community to the end that they may more effectively proclaim the good news of the Gospel to the unchurched. The *Departments of Worship, Rural Church and Radio* are conducting conferences throughout the state in the area of the responsibility of each particular department. The *Interracial Department* is working for a more effective application of Christian principles in the area of race relations and it is demonstrating patterns in race relations which have been received with wide commendation. The *Department of Social Education and Action* is engaged in the task of helping to locate displaced persons and is working in many areas in an effort to bring about a more generous application of Christian principles in social problems. The *Council of Church Women* and the *United Christian Youth Council* are supporting organizations which represent specialized functions in the area of cooperative Christianity.

The Council is appreciative of the appropriations which have been made for the Council work by the state organization of each of the fifteen cooperating denominations. The total receipts from these sources amount to approximately \$15,000.00, and this amount is approximately one-third of the Council's budget of \$49,146.00. At its last annual

meeting the Council reached the conclusion that it is necessary to appeal directly to local churches for direct contributions in the form of **AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIPS**. With the view of securing concurring action from the cooperating denominations the Council took action as follows:

VOTED—that the Council call upon its constituent denominations to request their local churches to make direct contributions to the Council through their respective budgets, or otherwise, in the form of **AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIPS**.

Under the leadership of its president, the Rt. Rev. Frederick D. Goodwin, and of the Rev. Robert Lee House and the Rev. Roland P. Riddick, chairmen respectively of its Commission on Activities and of its Commission on Finance, and of the able leaders of each of its departments, the outlook for Council work during 1949 is most encouraging. Its officers and staff record sincere appreciation of the cooperation which has been extended by all of its member denominations, local councils of churches and generous friends throughout Virginia.

Mrs. Harrison Wellford, the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, made her report. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. R. Cary Montague reported on the Interdenominational Religious Work Foundation.

The Rev. Mr. Figg reported for the Committee on Credentials. On motion the report was adopted.

The Council adjourned for lunch.

The Council reconvened at 2:00 P. M.

Mr. Lewis Williams, stating that he was acting upon the request of a friend, moved that nominations for Clerical Deputies to General Convention be reopened. The motion prevailed.

The Rev. Dr. Cary Montague and the Rev. Francis Hayes were nominated.

The Rev. Roy E. LeMoine moved that during the balloting for members of the Standing Committee, members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and other elections, after the second ballot the two lowest names in each order be dropped; except in the election of Deputies to the

General Convention, after the second ballot the lowest name in each order be dropped on each successive ballot. This motion prevailed.

The Bishop then called the Council to order to sit as the Diocesan Missionary Society. The Rev. B. B. Comer Lile presented a report on "Church Communications," the efforts of the National Council on the Southern Radio Program and its program, Great Scenes from Great Plays. The great question before the Church, he said, was the payment of a deficit amounting to \$352,000. The National Council had understood that the Churches would contribute in full for the complete radio program, but early in January, 1949, realized that this would not be true and terminated the program at the end of February.

Mr. Lile said he was chairman of a committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society appointed to consider how this Diocese might meet its share of this deficit, approximately \$10,000. Of this, \$5,500 had been paid already by Churches in the Diocese, leaving a balance of \$4,500. It was the recommendation of the committee that our mathematical share up to \$10,000 be assumed by the Diocese and that the lapsed balances account of the Diocese be used for this purpose, and that the parishes and churches be urged to overpay 1949 acceptances so as to make possible a sufficient amount for this purpose.

It was moved by Mr. Lile, and seconded, that this be done. An amendment to the motion was made that the Diocesan Missionary Society be authorized to devise other means of paying this share in the event the lapsed balances account is not sufficient. The motion as amended was passed unanimously.

The report of the Board of Christian Education was made by the Rev. Thomas A. Fraser, Jr., Chairman, who spoke briefly on this work. (See Appendix for full report.)

The Rev. Mr. Beckwith gave the report of the Committee on New Parishes:

The Committee on New Parishes submits the following report to the Council. The committee received four applications of Churches seeking to be admitted as Mission Churches. They are the following: Osgood Memorial Church, Richmond, Va.; Meade Memorial Church,

Alexandria, Va.; St. Matthew's Church, Richmond, Va., and Trinity Church, Charlottesville, Va.

The committee considered each application and make the following recommendations:

Osgood Memorial Church, Richmond, Va.—The committee recommends that Osgood Memorial Church be accepted by the Diocese as a Mission Church. The vote of the committee was unanimous.

Meade Memorial Church, Alexandria, Va.—The committee recommends that Meade Memorial Church be accepted as a Mission Church. The vote of the committee was unanimous.

St. Matthew's Church, Richmond, Va.—The committee recommends that St. Matthew's Church be accepted by the Diocese as a Mission Church. The vote of the committee was unanimous.

Trinity Church, Charlottesville, Va.—The application of Trinity Church, Charlottesville, did not have the written consent of the vestry of St. Paul's Church, but they did have the written consent of the vestry of Christ Church and the informal approval of a majority of the vestry of St. Paul's Church. Therefore, the committee offers the following resolution to Council:

The committee, after full consideration of the reasons for the Canon requiring the approval of the vestry or Parish Council of a parish before a mission may be admitted from such parish, and being fully cognizant of the fact that the admission of Trinity Church, Charlottesville, as a Mission Church will result in no conflict of interest insofar as the other Churches in Monticello Parish are concerned, and having before it the formal approval of Christ Church and the informal approval of a majority of the vestry of St. Paul's Church to the admission of Trinity Church, recommends to the Council that Trinity Church, Monticello Parish, be admitted to the Diocese of Virginia as a Mission Church.

The committee received one application of a Church seeking to be admitted as a separate congregation.

The application of Epiphany Church, Arlington, Va., was considered by the committee and the committee recommends that Epiphany Church be accepted by the Council as a separate congregation. The vote of the committee was unanimous.

The Church of the Epiphany has of recent months received support at the rate of \$300 per annum from Diocesan funds. Effective January 1, 1949, the Church of the Epiphany assumed full responsibility for its own support. The Church of the Epiphany now has approximately 155 communicants. Its mailing list now reaches 170 families, including approximately 194 confirmed persons.

All five recommendations were adopted by the Council.

The Bishop appointed additional tellers as follows: Mr. Robert Baylor, Mr. Beverley Pratt, Mr. John Causey, the Rev. Messrs. Henry Johnston, Henry B. Hucles and Stewart B. West.

The first ballot for election of four Lay Deputies to the General Convention was taken.

The Rev. Thomas D. Brown submitted the report of the Board of Colored Work. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. B. B. Comer Lile submitted the report of the Field Board. (See Appendix.)

Mr. Lile asked that the Every Member Canvass chairman in each congregation be appointed early, and Bishop Goodwin spoke emphatically on the importance of having an Every Member Canvass in every congregation in the Diocese.

The Bishop interrupted the order of the day by interjecting an interesting note about the gavel being used. The gavel was made by the Rev. D. Campbell Mayers from some charred wood brought by the Bishop from the ruins of the Chapel of Lambeth Palace. The first Bishop of Virginia, Bishop Madison, was consecrated in this Chapel, said Bishop Goodwin, making this a historic link. The Council voiced a vote of appreciation to Mr. Mayers for his work.

The Chair announced the election of the Standing Committee as follows: Rev. C. J. Gibson, Rev. H. A. Donovan, Rev. A. C. Zabriskie, Mr. Blake T. Newton, Dr. Ivey F. Lewis, Mr. Albert A. Smoot.

The Rev. Dudley Boogher read the report of the Board of Mountain Work. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. George Ossman submitted by title the report of the Board of Christian Social Relations. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. R. R. Brown read the report of the Board of Evangelism. (See Appendix.)

The Chair announced the election, on the first ballot, of Mr. Blake T. Newton and Mr. Albert A. Smoot as Lay Deputies to the General Convention.

The second ballot for two Lay Deputies to the General Convention was taken.

The Chair announced the election, on the first ballot, of the

Rev. Samuel B. Chilton as a Clerical Deputy to the General Convention.

The second ballot for Clerical Deputies to the General Convention was taken. At their request, the names of the Rev. Messrs. Frank Hayes, Rufus J. Womble, R. Cary Montague and J. Manly Cobb, with consent of their nominators, were removed from the ballot.

The Rev. Reno S. Harp gave the report of the Commission on College Work. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. B. B. Comer Lile gave the report of the Committee on a Proposed Survey of the Diocese. It was moved that this survey be approved as outlined. The report of the committee follows

1. It subscribes heartily to the purposes of the Council resolution, believing that church expansion into various centers of population in the Diocese, especially into certain suburban areas around Richmond and into others in the Arlington-Alexandria-Fairfax region, should be undertaken at the earliest possible time, but it feels that a need so great deserves a fund-raising campaign grounded in careful planning.
2. It recommends that the proposed campaign be devoted to the single aim of raising funds for capital purposes for church extension in the Diocese. This means that the committee does not favor the inclusion in the campaign of any request for funds for salaries or operating expenses of new churches, nor for other capital purposes, such as for Church Schools or the Episcopal Home for Men.
3. It feels that to assure the success of the campaign definite facts and figures should be presented to the people of the Diocese, and to this end it recommends:
 - (a) That a complete survey and evaluation of the present work of the Diocese and suggestions for future work in the Diocese be made by the Home Department of the National Council, which is an impartial and competent agency, fully qualified and willing to do this work.
 - (b) That a special local survey be made of the suburban areas around Richmond similar to that recently made in the Arlington-Alexandria-Fairfax area.

- (c) That these two local surveys along with the general Diocesan survey be evaluated by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and that the Executive Committee then determine the objects and goal of the campaign.
4. It is the opinion of your committee that the earliest time at which a successful campaign can be held would be during the season of Lent in 1950. This decision is based upon an informal conversation with the Executive Secretary of the Home Department of the National Council in which we have been informed that because of previous commitments, the Home Department could not give us such a survey until the late fall of 1949.
5. The committee further believes that in order to assure a successful campaign the full-time services of a suitable director should be secured.

A resolution was presented by Mr. Archibald Robertson, Chancellor of the Diocese, which was referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Chair announced that there was no election on the second ballot for Lay Deputies to the General Convention. Mr. Portewig's name was dropped under the resolution previously adopted. Mr. Hunter's name was dropped at the request of his nominator.

The third ballot for Lay Deputies to the General Convention was taken.

Following lengthy discussion of the proposed survey, the Rev. Mr. Tate made a plea for the Church Schools of the Diocese which he felt had been handicapped by a lack of funds and should surely be included in any plan for the future because he felt them to be a place for real missionary work by the Church.

The Chair announced the election of Mr. R. Turner Arrington and Mr. D. Tennant Bryan as Lay Deputies to the General Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Lile, in reply to Mr. Tate, submitted an amended motion, which was seconded. The question was called for.

Mr. Rosewell Page, Jr., requested more information on the results of these surveys in other dioceses, to which the Bishop replied that such information is confidential.

The Rev. Mr. Lile's motion, as amended, was adopted:

That the plan for the survey be approved; and that the scope and the amount of money to be raised by the special campaign which has been authorized be not determined by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society until after a report on the survey has been received.

The Chair announced the election, on the second ballot, of the Rev. C. J. Gibson and the Rev. H. A. Donovan as Clerical Deputies to the General Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Faulkner gave notice of a sightseeing tour and reception at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George L. Hunter, Jr. It was voted to reconvene after the 8:00 o'clock service Wednesday night.

The Council adjourned at 5:00 P. M.

The Council reconvened at 9:30 P. M. after an anniversary service for the 400th year of the Book of Common Prayer, at which the Rt. Rev. Angus Dun, Bishop of the Diocese of Washington, preached the sermon.

The Rev. E. A. deBordenave reported on the Church Schools. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. Mr. deBordenave stated that a change will take place next year at Christchurch School because Mr. James Ratcliffe, who was unanimously elected for the coming session, declined election in order to take graduate work in another locality. The new headmaster, Mr. Branch Spalding, was introduced to the Council. He stressed the need for Christian education and expressed his appreciation for the election.

Bishop Goodwin expressed gratitude to the committee who worked on the Prayer Book Anniversary Service and pageant.

The Chair announced that there was no election on the first ballot for clerical members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. The second ballot was called

for and the names of the Rev. Messrs. J. L. B. Williams, A. St. J. Matthews and Rufus Womble were dropped.

The Chair announced that there was no election on the first ballot for lay members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. The second ballot was then called for.

The Rev. Thomas A. Fraser, Jr., Chairman, presented the report of the Budget Committee for 1950.

The Chair announced that there was no election on the third ballot for Clerical Deputies to the General Convention. The Rev. Theodore Evans' name was dropped and the fourth ballot was called for.

The Chair announced the election of the Rev. Messrs. E. A. deBordenave and Churchill J. Gibson as clerical members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Chair called for the election of five members of the Finance Committee.

The Chair announced the election of Mr. Walter N. Chinn, Jr., as a lay member of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. The names of Capt. Wickham, Messrs. Sigourney and Wilmer were dropped and the fourth ballot was ordered.

The Rev. John G. Scott moved that the Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. D. Tennant Bryan to be a lay member of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. The motion was passed 62 to 36. The Secretary cast the ballot for Mr. Bryan.

The Chair announced the election of the Rev. A. C. Zabriskie as a Clerical Deputy to the General Convention.

The Rev. John G. Scott moved that a special ballot be taken to elect alternate Deputies to the General Convention, in both orders, the four receiving the highest vote in each order to be declared elected. This motion was passed and the ballots were taken.

The Council adjourned at 10:44 P. M.

At 9:00 A. M. Bishop Goodwin, assisted by Bishop Tucker, Bishop Mason, the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, Jr., and the Rev. Thomas G. Faulkner, Jr., celebrated the Holy Communion.

The Council was called to order at 10:00 A. M., Bishop Goodwin presiding.

The Bishop recommended to the Council the adoption of the following two suggestions:

(a) A committee, composed of the Chancellor of the Diocese, the Secretary of the Diocese, and the Rev. W. Leigh Ribble, draw up a rule of order for elections, to be presented to the next Council.

(b) The Rev. A. St. J. Matthews, the Rev. Darby W. Betts and the Rev. George F. Tittmann to serve as a committee to study the Diocese of Washington's plan of election and to report its recommendations to the next Council.

On motion, the Council concurred.

The Chair announced the election of the following to the Committee on Finance: Mr. Harry H. Augustine, Mr. John B. Mordecai, Mr. Lewis C. Williams, Mr. Clyde C. Lamond, Jr., and General Edwin Cox.

The Chair announced the election of the following as alternate Lay Deputies to the General Convention: Messrs. Edmund D. Campbell, P. Winfree Fore, John G. Pollard, Severn M. Nottingham.

The Chair announced the election of the following as alternate Clerical Deputies to the General Convention: Rev. E. A. deBordenave, Rev. Robert R. Brown, Rev. W. Leigh Ribble. The Rev. Mr. Lile and the Rev. Mr. Fraser tied for fourth place.

The Council agreed to vote on these two names for election of the fourth alternate.

Bishop Goodwin made a plea for the Diocese to overpay its quota to the National Council to make it possible for the missionary work of the Church to be carried on even though all dioceses may not be able to meet their quotas in full. He urged that the tentative figure for the General Church be left in

the budget pending action of the General Convention, so that we might be sure of not falling below our mathematical quota. Bishop Tucker stated that the expected increase for next year would be due in part to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief being included in the National Council budget. In the past this has been an effort outside the budget.

Mr. Blake Newton moved that item No. 1 of the budget be approved. The Rev. Mr. Harp offered a substitute motion that this item be approved, but that it be left to the Bishop and the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society to fix the final figure, and that Virginia should continue in its tradition of paying more than its minimum quota.

The Rev. A. C. Zabriskie offered an amendment to the substitute motion because he felt that certain items of the National Council's budget do not have the entire sympathy of many. He asked that the substitute be amended to say that the Bishop and the Diocesan Missionary Society designate what the overplus is to go for within the National Council budget. The Chair informed the Council that this measure was passed several years ago to empower the Bishop and the Executive Committee to designate any item within the National Council's budget for any overpayment of the minimum mathematical quota. Bishop Tucker urged that the Council realize that the missionary work of the Church takes in the whole Church regardless of churchmanship which is not taken into consideration by the National Council, and said that it would be a pity to designate any items on the grounds of churchmanship. The Chair clarified Dean Zabriskie's motion, stating that he did not believe it referred to churchmanship although it may have been inferred. The Rev. Mr. Harp accepted Dean Zabriskie's amendment.

After further discussion the Chair then ruled that the question be divided.

Question on the amendment was called for, and the amendment was lost by a vote of 156 to 51.

Mr. Edmund Campbell offered an amendment that a special Contingent Fund of \$5,000 be set up to be used if necessary by

the Bishop and the Executive Committee at their discretion in order that the minimum quota should be met, and also to give them the option of increasing it if it can be done within this amount. Mr. John B. Welsh's motion that the amendment be tabled, was not seconded.

The Rev. Mr. Lile, reporting on plans of the Department of Promotion of the National Council, said that a nationwide offering is being planned for next Spring, and asked that if we increase our budget would we also participate in this nationwide offering. The Bishop stated that if the Diocese raises this budget to meet the minimum quota, it was his personal opinion that a big extra offering in the Spring, especially when a costly survey was to be made of the Diocese, would not be wise.

Mr. James Massie submitted a substitute to the amendment, saying since we do not know now what the General Convention will do, that instead of increasing this budget item now we put in a contingency item of \$6,000 for meeting any increase. Mr. Massie's substitute motion was lost.

Mr. Campbell's amendment was voted on and failed by a vote of 112 to 59.

The Rev. Mr. Harp restated his original motion that the Council approve the item in the budget and authorize the Bishop and the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society to increase this after the General Convention. The resolution was voted upon and failed to carry.

Mr. Newton's motion, that item No. 1 of the budget be adopted as presented by the committee, was then put and carried.

The Chair announced the election of the Rev. B. B. Comer Lile as fourth alternate Clerical Deputy to the General Convention.

Bishop Mason took the chair.

The Rev. Mr. Fraser continued with the presentation of the budget.

The budget was then approved item by item, except that the figure of \$1,000 for the American Bible Society was re-

stored, and the item of \$17,500 for Diocesan Headquarters was directed to be transferred to the Bishops' and Contingent Fund budget. The item of \$2,000 for the John Moncure School was designated for scholarships to be used on recommendation of its Trustees.

Bishop Goodwin resumed the chair.

The amended budget of \$187,695 was adopted. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. Mr. Bowden submitted the report of the Committee on the Evaluation of the Work of the Diocese:

As we reported at the last Council the work of this committee has been divided under the general headings of Mountain Work, Rural Work, Negro Work, and Suburban Work, with a member of the committee as chairman of the group studying each project. Some suggestions for changes have been made directly to the department concerned by members of this committee, and assistance has been given by committee members in fields of work assigned to them.

We have had two general meetings of the committee. In our discussions, and study of the problems involved, we became convinced that a survey ought to be made similar to surveys that have been made in the Diocese under the direction of the Home Department of the National Council. This was brought to the attention of the Diocesan Missionary Society, which is making such a recommendation to this Council.

We feel it would be unwise to make any recommendations to the Council concerning the work of the Diocese at this time. However, the findings and recommendations of the members of the committee will be available to the Survey Committee sent into the Diocese by the Home Department of the National Council.

We, therefore, ask that this committee be discharged.

The report was accepted, the committee discharged, and the Bishop thanked the Evaluation Committee for its valuable work.

Mr. Lewis Williams reported for the Finance Committee.

The Rev. Mr. Lile moved that the expenses in the item regarding the election, consecration and moving of the Bishop Suffragan-elect be increased from \$1,800 to \$2,200. This was carried.

The Rev. Dr. Brydon moved that the whole income from the Episcopal Fund be made available for next year. This amendment to the committee's recommendations carried.

A motion was made that the report of the Finance Committee be accepted as amended. This carried.

The Rev. Mr. Chilton moved that the expenses of electing, consecrating and moving the Suffragan Bishop-elect, together with his salary and traveling expenses, be paid out of the accumulated and current interest of the Episcopal Fund as long as we have three Bishops.

At this point Mr. Sigourney questioned the financing of the Episcopal Fund, to which Dr. Brydon replied beginning with a resume of the action taken in the 1912 Council and stated that the increase was due to the reinvestment of the Fund's income over a period of many years.

Mr. John B. Welsh asked whether the resolution of the last Council in regard to the expenses for electing, consecrating and moving the Suffragan Bishop-elect did not bind this Council. The Chair replied that it did not.

The amendment was voted upon and was carried.

The budget proposed by the Finance Committee as amended was then approved. The committee's report, with the budget as amended, follows:

To the 154th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Committee on Finance reports that all accounts of various funds under the charge of the Treasurer of the Diocese from January 1, 1948, to December 31, 1948, have been audited by Messrs. A. M. Pullen & Company, certified public accountants, and found to be in proper order and correct. Copies of these audits are submitted herewith.

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society has advised the Finance Committee that they recommend that the Diocesan appropriation for operating the Mayo Memorial Church House and the office expenses, including salaries, be transferred to the Bishop's and Contingent Fund. The total of this item is \$17,500, which, added to the usual appropriation from the Bishop's and Contingent Fund, make a total of \$52,040.

The following budget for the Bishop's and Contingent Fund for 1950 is recommended:

The Rev. Mr. Hayes presented the report of the Committee on Resolutions.

The committee recommended that the resolution of the Valley Convocation, calling for discontinuance of the radio program, Great Scenes from Great Plays, be not approved. The Council concurred.

The committee recommended that the resolution presented by Mr. B. Powell Harrison, Jr., "that the Diocese of Virginia . . . accept the fact that Communism and our Christian faith are in conflict, publicly declare its opposition to Communism, and commence the utilization of all the resources of its Christian brotherhood to combat the evil movement," be not approved in the light of similar action already taken by the Lambeth Conference. The Council concurred.

The committee recommended adoption of the resolution from the Diocese of Harrisburg, that the word "Holy" be restored to the ninth article of the Nicene Creed.

The Rev. Dr. Brydon said that there was no reason for this Diocese to approve the action of the Diocese of Harrisburg. A motion was made that this resolution be not adopted. A substitute motion, that it be tabled without debate, was carried.

The Chair announced that there had been a tie vote for second place, in the election of alternate Lay Deputies to the General Convention, between Mr. P. Winfree Fore and Mr. John Garland Pollard, Jr.

The Rev. John G. Scott moved that a vote be taken by a show of hands, taking these names in alphabetical order. This motion was carried.

During the voting the question was raised as to its validity because some of the delegates misapprehended the procedure. Mr. Bernard Chamberlain moved that the first action be rescinded concerning the show of hands and that all action on this motion be rescinded. This carried. He then moved that another ballot be circulated. This motion carried.

Mr. John B. Minor reported for the Committee on Constitution and Canons. It was moved to adopt, on second read-

ing, the following which passed first reading at the last Council:

In place of the first paragraph of Article XIV of the Constitution substitute the following:

"The Standing Committee of the Diocese shall consist of six members, three of the clerical order, and three of the lay order, each of whom shall be a communicant of the Church in this Diocese.

"At the first regular annual meeting of the Council succeeding the final adoption of this amendment the Council shall elect the six members of the Standing Committee, one of each order for the term of one year, one of each order for the term of two years, and one of each order for the term of three years.

"At each regular annual meeting thereafter the Council shall elect one member of each order for the term of three years. Each member of the committee shall hold office until his successor is elected or appointed."

This was adopted by the Council.

It was moved to adopt, on second reading, the following:

For the last paragraph of Article XIV of the Constitution, substitute the following:

"In case of a vacancy in the Standing Committee the committee shall have authority to fill said vacancy from the same order, the appointee to serve until the next annual meeting of the Council, at which meeting the Council shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term, if any, of the previous incumbent."

This was adopted by the Council.

A motion to postpone final action on amendments to Article III of the Constitution, until action could be taken on the canonical changes, was lost.

The Chair announced that on the ballot to decide second and third Lay Alternate Deputies to the General Convention. Mr. John G. Pollard was elected second alternate and Mr. P. Winfree Fore, third alternate.

The Council adjourned for lunch.

The Council reconvened at 2:00 P. M., Bishop Goodwin presiding.

Mr. Minor continued the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

On recommendation of the committee, amendment to Article III, Section 1, sub-section (b) of the Constitution was approved on first reading, to add at the end the following

"from among congregations not otherwise entitled to representation in Council."

Motion was made that proposed canonical changes to eliminate "words of segregation" be adopted. Mr. Cochran spoke in favor of the proposed changes.

Mr. Chamberlain moved that the Constitution and Canons Committee report be postponed for a period of five minutes until Dr. Brydon could report for the Committee on Words of Segregation. This was passed.

Dr. Brydon then presented the report of his committee. The Rev. T. D. Brown spoke on what he felt was a lack of missionary zeal with respect to Negro work in the Diocese. The Rev. John G. Scott moved that the whole matter be laid on the table. The motion was lost.

The Rev. Frank Moss moved that action on amendments to the Canons be suspended until the report on "words of segregation" committee be concluded. The motion passed.

The Rev. Aston Hamilton spoke on what he considered the negligence of the Negro people in assuming their rightful responsibilities. He supported the amendment as being the removal of a "psychological block," which would prove of inestimable value to the going forward of the Negro work in the Diocese. Mr. John R. Mayne, the Rev. Thomas Fraser and the Rev. S. S. Spathy spoke for the amendment.

A motion was made that the report be received. The motion passed. The report follows:

To the 154th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Your committee, to whom you referred the consideration of the question whether or not to remove from the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese all mention of Colored persons or congregations as a separate group, beg to report that after careful consideration of the matter and discussion with both white and Negro representatives, we have become convinced that the great majority of the Negroes

feel that our Constitution and Canons establish a form of segregation of Negro churchmen which they believe to be hurtful to themselves as a race and as members of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

We believe that if the great majority of our Negro communicants, as brethren within our Church, look upon our present Canons as hurtful to their development, or in any sense derogatory, it will be desirable to amend Constitution and Canons in such a way as to leave no suggestion of differing status between the white and Negro members of our Diocese.

If, as appears manifest, these changes in our Canons shall place a greater responsibility upon the Negroes themselves, we trust that they will accept the challenge, and undertake their full share in the missionary and promotional work of our Church.

We present herewith the attached series of resolutions to effectuate the aforementioned amendments.

Mr. Minor continued the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

It was moved that the main question, approving on second reading amendments to Article III of the Constitution, be put. The motion carried.

Mr. Rosewell Page, Jr., called for a vote by orders, four other delegates joining in the request.

The amendments were adopted Lay—Yes, 79; no, 18. Clergy—Yes, 77; no, 1.

These amendments are:

That the fifth paragraph of Article III, Section 1, of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows:

"The lay order shall consist of three classes, namely, (a) the lay delegates from the parishes, separate congregations, and mission churches entitled to representation by canon; (b) the lay delegates

from the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, and (c) the lay delegates *ex officio*."

That sub-section (c) of Section 1 of Article III be stricken out and sub-section (d) be changed to (c).

Mr. John B. Welsh moved that the Council express their gratitude to the rector, vestry and congregation of St. George's Church and to the other churches which helped entertain the Council so graciously for the past two days. The Chair proposed a rising vote of thanks, which was carried out unanimously.

Mr. Minor continued his report. It was moved that the canonical amendments on removing words indicative of segregation, as recommended in this report, be approved. This motion was seconded and carried by a canonical majority. The amended portions will read as follows:

Canon II. Of Lay representation in the Council.

Section 1, Paragraph 2. The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge shall be entitled to the representation given by the Constitution.

Canon IX. Of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Section 2. (a) The members *ex-officio* shall be the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, the Bishop-Suffragan, if there be one, the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, the Associate, or Assistant Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, if there be one, the Treasurer of the Diocese, the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese and members of the Corporation known as "The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia."

Canon IX. Section 5. Strike out the paragraph marked VI, thereby abolishing the Board of Colored Work of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Canon XI. Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction—be repealed.

Canon XII. Of Convocations.

Section 1. There shall be five convocations in the Diocese of Virginia, which shall be fixed by geographical limits as follows:

"(1) The Albemarle Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Albemarle, Culpeper, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greeee, Louisa, Orange and Rockingham.

"(2) The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Arlington and Fairfax and City of Alexandria.

"(3) The Rappahannock Valley Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Caroline, Charles City, Essex, Gloucester, Hanover, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster Mathews, Middlesex, New Kent, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford and Westmoreland.

"(4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all parishes in the County of Henrico and in the City of Richmond north of the James River.

"(5) The Valley Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Clarke, Frederick, Loudoun, Madison, Page, Rappahannock, Shenandoah, Warren, Fauquier and Prince William.

Except in the case of the City of Richmond cities shall, for the purpose of this section, be considered parts of the counties in which they are geographically situated."

Canon XII. Section 1. Last paragraph.

Changes in Convocation boundaries of any of the five Convocations shall be authorized by Council on the joint application of the Convocations interested.

Canon XII. Section 2. Every clergyman canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia shall be a member of the Convocation in which his principal Church or his Cure is situated; except that a retired minister shall retain his membership in the Convocation of which he was a member at the time of his retirement, or become a member of the Convocation in which he resides.

Canon XII. Section 3. Each of the Convocations may make provision for its lay representation, and may enact such rules and by-laws as may be necessary for its own guidance.

Canon XVII. Of Missions.

Section 4. The Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, or the Bishop if there be no Archdeacon, shall for every Mission under his jurisdiction appoint, or may consent to the election by the enrolled adult members of such Mission, of a Mission Vestry Committee of not less than three or more than seven adult members of the Mission, to whom may be assigned such duties in the administration of the temporal affairs of the Mission as may be deemed advisable by the Archdeacon.

Canon XVII. Section 9. Lists of all Missions under the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, under the faculty of the Theological Seminary in Virginia, and under the direct charge of the Bishop, shall be published separately in the Council Journal.

On recommendation of the committee, Canon 18 was amended by a canonical majority as follows:

That Canon XVIII entitled, "Of Parish Councils," be amended by the addition of another section to read:

"Section 3. In every case where a municipal area within this Diocese shall extend over and into the territory of two or more parishes the Parish Council of that area shall include all congregations and missions within the bounds of the city and its suburbs, as far as the same shall be within this Diocese."

On recommendation of the committee, the second paragraph of Section 2, Canon 19, was amended by a canonical majority as follows:

"Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, if any Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church, at any meeting held as hereinabove provided in this Canon, so authorize, vestrymen may be elected for terms not to exceed four years, the congregation to determine the length of terms and the number of vestrymen to be elected for such terms."

On recommendation of the committee, Canon 23 was amended by a canonical majority, by the addition thereto of the following paragraph:

"The Bishop, or in the event of his inability to act, the other Ecclesiastical Authority, may, with the advice and consent of the trustees of the funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, or the Executive Committee of said trustees, grant, bargain, sell, convey, transfer, and deliver any other property accruing to the Church generally in the Diocese of Virginia, unless prohibited by the instrument by which title to such property is acquired, and the proceeds of such sale shall be invested by such trustees, or its Executive Committee, as they may deem advisable."

The committee disapproved the recommendations of the committee headed by the Rev. Mr. Betts concerning the proposed amendment of Article III, Section 1 (a) of the Constitution.

The Rev. Mr. Betts was recognized by the Chair and gave an extended defense of his committee's recommendations which sought in principle to make it possible to count baptized members of congregations when delegates are elected to represent them in the Diocesan Council.

The Rev. J. L. B. Williams, speaking against Mr. Betts' proposal, stated that we are still the Episcopal Church in which confirmed communicants are really the only representative members. He felt that Mr. Betts' proposal would weaken our position as a Church. Mr. Bernard Chamberlain felt that Mr. Betts' proposal would create confusion in counting the members of various parishes when they have not transferred their memberships. The Rev. Dr. Brydon objected to trying to make a law governing a few exceptions to the general rule.

The Rev. Mr. deBordenave moved that Mr. Betts' committee be continued and report to the next Council.

Mr. Gunnell moved that the previous question be called. The Chair asked for a vote on the main question which was approved and carried. Mr. Betts' resolution did not carry.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to revise the Constitution and Canons as amended and index the same.

Mr. Turner Arrington moved the following, which was adopted:

That a committee from this body be appointed to prepare a resolution expressing the sincere feeling of appreciation of the contribution of the late W. Frank Powers to the Diocese of Virginia and of its deep sense of loss in his passing. That such resolution be spread upon the minutes of the Council, and that copies be sent to his family, and be published in The Virginia Churchman and in the Southern Churchman.

The Bishop appointed as members of this committee: Mr. Archibald G. Robertson, the Rev. Robert R. Brown and Mr. John B. Minor.

The resolution follows:

W. FRANK POWERS

We, the delegates assembled at St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, Virginia, for the 154th Council of the Diocese of Virginia, do hereby record our deep sense of personal loss as well as the loss to the Church in the Diocese of Virginia by the passing into eternal life on January 12, 1949, of W. Frank Powers.

A long-time vestryman and senior warden of St. Paul's Church in the city of Richmond, his loyalty and devotion were never confined to the limitations of that congregation. For more than twenty-five years he gave unstintingly of his time, his possessions, and his abilities to the Church as a whole. This Diocese honored him in 1943 by electing him a deputy to the General Convention, and again in 1946 by electing him an alternate to the General Convention. He in turn honored and contributed to the life of this Diocese by faithful service as a member of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, as a member of the Committee on Finance, as one of the memorial trustees of Roslyn, the Virginia Diocesan Center, as a member of the Committee on Applications and Appropriations, and as chairman of the Diocesan Loan Commission.

We are grateful to God for the life of W. Frank Powers and for his Christian sacrifice and service.

"Go Forward, Christian Soldier."

Mr. Walter Chinn gave a report on the Episcopal Home for Men in Charlottesville, stating their dire need for funds and the lack of contributions which has made it practically impossible for them to begin this work.

The Rev. Churchill J. Gibson moved that the Council go on record as being willing and anxious to do something about the Home for Men before the next Council. This motion was seconded. Mr. Archibald Robertson asked that Dr. Gibson's resolution be held up until another report could be made.

At this point the Chair instructed the Secretary to answer a telegram of greetings from the Convention of the Diocese of Ohio and also to send a telegram of greeting to Dr. W. E. Rollins.

The report of the Standing Committee was presented:

To the 154th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Standing Committee since its election on May 19, 1948, has performed the following acts:

1. It has recommended for admission to candidacy Messrs. Conrad H. Goodwin, Jr., Arthur P. M. Rigg, Walter Holt Souder, Paul Socrates Heins, William D. Eddy, William Clancy Heffner, Alexander Macfarlane Robertson, and John Edwin Williams.

4. It gave consent for the election of a Bishop-Suffragan for each of the following named Dioceses: Los Angeles, Virginia, Central New York, Alabama, and Pennsylvania.
5. It gave consent for the election of a Bishop-Coadjutor for the Diocese of North Carolina, and the Diocese of Ohio.
6. It gave consent to the election of Suffragan-Bishop Henry Irving Louttit to be Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese of South Florida.
7. It gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Russell Sturgis Hubbard, as Suffragan-Bishop of the Diocese of Michigan; the Rev. The majority report on the Niven bequest was given by the Rev. E. E. Tate:

The committee appointed at the special meeting of Council in Richmond to consider the use of the bequest of the late Judge Mauchlin Niven, whose property in Alexandria was left to the Diocese of Virginia, has had under discussion the request of the Old Men's Home Committee of Charlottesville that said estate be sold and the proceeds turned over to the Home for its furtherance and development.

After careful consideration, the committee wishes to make this recommendation and resolution to the Council:

Resolved: That in order to afford the Diocese full opportunity to ascertain the best use to make of the "Home place" of Judge Mauchlin Niven, and to carry out the spirit and intent of his will, final action by the trustees of the Diocese should be deferred until the next regular meeting of this Council; and that in the meantime a committee of the Council be appointed and empowered to receive and consider all suggestions which may be made for the use of the property, and to make its final recommendation to the next regular meeting of the Diocesan Council.

The committee consisted of the following members: the Rev. Messrs. E. E. Tate, Chairman; S. B. Chilton, William Macbeth, J. Manly Cobb, H. A. Donovan, and Messrs. Clyde Lamond, Archibald Robertson, Walter Chinn, Jr., Edmund Campbell. The vote in favor of the resolution was 6 to 2, the Chair not voting. A minority report was requested, and I believe will be made.

E. E. TATE, *Chairman.*

The minority report on the Niven bequest was submitted by Mr. Archibald Robertson on behalf of Mr. Walter N. Chinn, Jr., and himself, recommending return of the previous gift for a men's home at Charlottesville if the Niven bequest be denied it.

The motion was made that the majority report be accepted. Considerable discussion followed. The motion passed.

The Rev. Churchill Gibson, reverting to his motion regarding the Men's Home, moved that Council go on record as determining to do something for this home within the coming year. The motion passed.

There was no report from the Committee on Diocesan Corporations.

The Church Pension Fund report was presented:

Your committee buttressed by other interested members of the Diocese, both clerical and lay, had a meeting with Bishop Cameron Davis and Mr. Robert Worthington, of the Church Pension Fund.

These men reassured us as to the soundness of the pension system and of our good standing with the Fund. They are in accord with us in our desire that the minimum pensions paid to retired clergy and to the widows and orphans of those clergy ordained before the beginning of the Fund, shall be increased so that they may be more nearly adequate for the support of the recipients. Two ways for supplementing these pensions have been suggested, the suggestions coming from members of the Church, but not from the officials of the Pension Fund, as they do not deem it a part of their function to make changes, but rather it is their duty to administer the Fund according to the will of the Church, and within a sound actuarial practice.

The two ways are—first, that the system be changed by the General Convention, providing that the assessment on each parish be raised from 10% to 15%, and that this extra 5% be applied to raising minimum pensions from \$600.00 to \$1,200.00 for clergy, and one-half of the clergyman's grant to be given to his widow; second, failing the above, that the agreement between our Diocese and the Fund be amended to provide that the trustees shall reassume full control of the income of the funds of the Diocese, provided for retired clergy, before the Fund came into being, and now held by the Fund. This income has been applied to Diocesan pension assessments, but might then be used to supplement minimum pensions.

The trustees of the Church Pension Fund clarified their position as to the employment of retired clergy. The point of their argument is this, "The need is for higher stipends for the active clergy and higher pensions to the retired. Mixing stipends and pensions would lead to lower stipends for the active and lower pensions for the retired."

The report of the Committee on Church Unity was presented by the Rev. Dr. Zabriskie and the motion contained therein was passed by Council:

To the 154th Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The last Council continued the Committee on Unity, charging it to investigate important proposals for unity that might be presented to the Church and to promote the study thereof throughout the Diocese.

A meeting of the committee was postponed until it should learn what proposals were to be put before the Church by General Convention's Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity. By February one member of your committee (who is also on the Joint Commission) knew that the Joint Commission did not intend to offer any new proposals. Consequently there was no specific measure before the Church for your committee to study.

The Joint Commission's report to General Convention has recently been published. Besides telling briefly of its activities during this triennium, and publishing the statement on Faith and Order in harmony with the Lambeth Quadrilateral, which it had been instructed to prepare and which Lambeth Conference approved, it urges the great importance of a Churchwide, "grass-roots" study of the necessity for Church unity, and the main questions that must be answered before it can be achieved, and also asks authority both to have the requisite literature prepared and to promote the study thereof as widely as possible.

Last summer Lambeth Conference met, and the first sessions of the World Council of Churches were held. Both of these gatherings issued reports which dealt in part with the problems of Church unity and which deserve to be studied throughout the Church.

In Cincinnati, Ohio, very interesting experiments are being made in joint parishes. In the downtown part of the city whence the population has moved, an Episcopal parish, and a Northern Presbyterian parish continue their separate existence. But they have one minister in charge of both; they worship together; offerings for missions are sent to the diocese and presbytery in proportion to the number of Episcopalians and Presbyterians in the joint parish. Annually the Bishop of Southern Ohio makes a visitation to confirm those who wish to assume fully responsible membership in the Episcopal Church, and the Moderator of the Presbytery admits to full communicant status in the Presbyterian Church, USA, such as desire to take that step. By pooling their resources, these two congregations can bear a more effective witness to Christ and serve their community in His name and more adequately than they could do separately.

In a new residential area wherein there were mission chapels of both Episcopal and Presbyterian affiliation, a similar joint parish has been formed. Without going into further details of these experiments, it is quite clear that here are attempts to bring the two Churches together at the local level without impairing their larger allegiances, attempts which merit very sympathetic study.

The following resolution is offered:

Be it resolved, That the Committee on Church Unity be continued with such changes in personnel as the Bishop may determine; that it be charged to study matters bearing upon Church unity, especially the topics proposed by the Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity, the reports of Lambeth Conference and the World Council of Churches, and the experiments in joint parishes, and to promote the study throughout the Diocese of these and allied topics.

The report of the Committee on Religious Education in Church Schools was presented:

The Committee on Religious Education in Church Schools has met twice. At our organizational meeting we recognized at once that our assignment was a very large one. In our survey of the problem it became obvious that a factual study to be productive would require visits to all the Church Schools and considerable research work. Indeed, much more work than the members of this small committee felt able to undertake it. We faced the choice of having our committee enlarged and aided by a Diocesan appropriation or of making a superficial study and a report that would have little or no value.

At our second meeting we decided that in view of the survey soon to be initiated in this Diocese, which would include a complete survey of all Diocesan institutions, this study might be done much more efficiently and thoroughly by that agency.

At this second meeting we had before us the study recently made by the Rev. E. A. deBordenave, Dean of Church Schools in this Diocese. This study of the problem of Christian Education in preparatory schools was made under the auspices of the National Preparatory School Committee and published in their "Information Service." It has gone to six hundred preparatory schools in this country and to all the clergy of this Diocese.

We are unanimous in commending Dean deBordenave's report. We feel that it should be required reading for all who are in any capacity interested in educating our youth. In our opinion this paper is very

devastating in unmasking basic failures in confronting our young people in our schools with the Christian faith as opposed to the secular faith that is so prevalent in our whole civilization. This report points out with proper emphasis the fact that unless history and science and literature are taught from the Christian viewpoint we are not going to have much influence through classes in the so-called "Sacred Studies." The suggested solution, starting with textbooks written from the Christian point of view, is so far-reaching in plan and effect that we can do little more in this report than to say that we subscribe fully to its analysis of the present situation and to its proposals for remedying it. We feel very strongly that our Church Schools should lead the way among the preparatory schools in Virginia and throughout this country toward education in the Christian faith.

This report referred to ends with these words: "We realize that we are only just beginning to tackle the problem. We make no pretence of having done very much as yet. The interest from all sides that has been manifested in what we are doing, however, makes us think that at least we are tackling a basic problem. It is our intention to continue working at it, but we need help. Criticisms and suggestions should be sent to the author of this report."

For the reasons given above, and because our committee has no suggestions beyond those made by Dean deBordenave, we ask that this committee be discharged.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was presented:

A FORWARD STEP

We are grateful for the definite action that has grown out of the reports of the State of the Church for the years 1946 and 1947. From that report a Committee on Evaluating the work of the Diocese was formed and a Committee on Advance Work. These two committees have consolidated their work and asked, with approval and recommendation by the Diocesan Missionary Society, for a survey of the Diocese under the direction of the Home Department of the National Council. This report has been made and received and approved by this Council. Possibly by the next Council the findings and recommendations resulting from this survey will be given.

Attention is called to the graph charts posted in the vestibule of the Church, prepared by the Diocesan office, spanning a period of 20 years. Your committee again urges the people of the Diocese of Virginia to consider and respond to the needs of the Seminaries of our Church and especially the Virginia Seminary in its plan for enlarging the student body to take care of 150 students beginning in the fall of this year. It would prove helpful if the story of the Virginia Seminary could be brought into those parishes and missions of the Diocese which have not had the opportunity of having it presented adequately. The responsibility and privilege of recruiting able men for the ministry and able women for life vocation in the Church in our post-war era fall upon the laity and clergy alike.

The proposed building of a new curriculum by the Church with emphasis upon parent-child relationship may in part meet the decline of Church School enrollment. A preview of this project was given at the recent spring Clergy Conference. This matter should have the whole-hearted support of both the clergy and laity of our Diocese. The fall Clergy Conference, with its inspiring and helpful programs, made possible by an anonymous gift of a layman, is of great value to both the clergy and the life of the Diocese. The appreciation of both clergy and laity go to the one whose interest and support lie in this direction of better equipping the clergy in aids to their devotional life and their ministry of teaching and preaching.

FURTHER COMMENTS ON PAROCHIAL REPORTS

The total receipts from all sources in the Diocese for 1948 were \$1,568,827, including a balance of \$179,314. The total parish indebtedness for 1948 was larger than it has been for some time; but considering the building program for that period, this situation is to be expected. It is a healthy condition provided no congregation undertakes an indebtedness beyond its means of amortization. One hundred and eighty-one parochial report blanks were sent to as many Churches and

Missions; of this number 10 sent in no report at all, and 3 came in too late to tabulate.

This is of the date of May 9th. Of the 168 reports received, 42 had no report on Church property; 53 had to have corrections in the figures; 8 were incomplete, but were completed by the Statistician, and 95 were not signed by an auditor or the rector on the financial pages.

These figures have been furnished to the committee by Miss Mary F. Goodwin, the Statistician of the Diocese, and the committee appreciates this willing cooperation.

A WEAKNESS IN THE SET-UP OF THE DIOCESE AND CHURCH

With the unique organization in the Episcopal Church of cooperation between clerical and lay leadership, there is a manifest weakness of policy when any program is brought before the clergy as a body with the apparent approval of that body, and then there is the failure to gain a like approval on the part of the vestries and the congregations. The unfortunate result is seen in the undertaking of a program when the funds for payment of that program are not in sight. The case in point is the situation with regard to the radio program of the Church. This situation applies to any other program that the Church seeks to adopt.

THE JOINT RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY

In leadership the Church looks to the clergy and to consecrated laymen alike, and the responsibility, the opportunity, the inspiration and direction in any parish and mission, by and large, is reflected by the character, diligence, and quality of life of these leaders who accept positions of responsibility in their various parishes and missions. The clear-cut imperative of the missionary program of the Church as coming from our Master, Christ, should be a major concern. This means that a conscientious effort on the part of each parish and mission should be made to accept and have paid at least the mathematical quota assigned by the Diocese. The responsibility of the clergy, lay delegates to Council, members of the vestries and laymen's organizations, as well as members of the Woman's Auxiliary, moves out into the all important area of bringing and interpreting the program of the Diocese and general Church to the membership of the parishes and missions.

DIOCESAN CALENDAR

It would be a help if a Diocesan Calendar could be worked out and copies sent to the clergy to avoid conflicts of meetings in the Diocese.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

Your committee commends the hearty support given by the consultant on Christian Education and the Department of Christian Education to the work of the youth of the Diocese. It is encouraging to note that there is the continuing emphasis on evangelism, "To know the Christ and to make Him known." The disciplined Christian life held before the youth of our Church is the same life for every communicant: "To follow Christ; to worship God every Sunday in His Church, and to work and pray and give for the spread of His Kingdom."

This Committee on the State of the Church brings to mind again the concluding thoughts from the committee's report of last year: "Your committee feels that basically the real issue facing the Diocese of Virginia as well as the whole Christian body of the Church is whether or not we have the necessary spiritual vitality to carry forward the job facing us. At this particular time in history we, as the members of the Church, are entrusted with a great individual as well as corporate spiritual challenge. This is a time for deep soul-searching prayer on the part of the individual Christian to be given the necessary spiritual grace to make the Church the most vital force in our time. Unless we do this we are failing the Church in one of its great crises."

The report of the Episcopal Churchman of the Diocese of Virginia was presented:

To the 154th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

On October 9-10, 1948, the fourth annual meeting of the Episcopal Churchmen of Virginia was held at "Roslyn." Every Convocation was represented, and, during the two-day session, there was a total registration of 80 laymen—a new record.

Reports were made on the activities of the past year which indicated a growing interest in the work of the organization by the laymen. An excellent program was presented, highlighted by the address of Thomas C. Boushall, Richmond layman, who declared, "If our 77,000,000 professing Christians were 77,000,000 practicing Christians, we would have no fear of Communism nor the collapse of Western civilization."

Objectives adopted by the organization for 1948-49 were:

1. Support of the men's Corporate Communion on Advent Sunday.
2. Support of the Evangelical Program planned by our Diocesan Commission on Evangelism, including the specific objectives of worship, education and service adopted by the Presiding Bishop's Committee for Laymen's Work, with especial emphasis to be placed on support of the missionary efforts of the Church—both domestic and foreign.
3. Support of the Bishop's theological education fund.
4. Support of the Blue Ridge School.
5. Support of the Seminary Building Fund.
6. Improvement of our Sunday Schools, including special emphasis on improved curricula.
7. Endorsement of the plan for the proposed Episcopal Home for Aged Men in Charlottesville, Virginia.

Application of our estimated receipts for the next year were:

1. To the Bishop's Theological Education Fund....\$1,000.00
2. To the support of Blue Ridge School 500.00
3. To books and miscellaneous expenses of this Laymen's Organization 150.00

4. To the Blue Ridge School45% of balance
5. Toward the establishment of a chair of religious education at the Virginia Theological Seminary.45% of balance (This was withheld, on advice of Bishop Goodwin, as funds already provided in Seminary budget)
6. To a reserve carry-over fund10% of balance

Much stress was placed on the corporate communion as the first objective with every effort made to get each layman to participate in the celebration of Holy Communion on Advent Sunday. It was requested that the men be informed that a free-will offering would be taken, the funds from which would be used to carry out the objectives adopted by the laymen. It was felt, because the corporate communion was planned as an activity of the laymen's organization, that each layman attending would welcome the opportunity to increase his participation in the period of worship by giving to the causes adopted by the laymen themselves.

All parishes, however, did not take an offering, and it is hoped that this will be done as part of the program at corporate communions in the future. A steady rain on Advent Sunday curtailed attendance at the corporate communions in 1948, the number being 2,119 against 2,565 the preceding year. We are confident the actual number of men participating exceeded the figure shown due to the fact that we received reports from only 86 of the 183 churches and missions in the Diocese. It is hoped that next year a more satisfactory method of reporting can be effected. The lower attendance this year also decreased the corporate gift, which amounted to \$1,746.88 against \$2,069.92 in 1947. This year's gift allowed us to meet the obligations we assumed but left little balance.

The activities of the laymen in the Diocese of Virginia have been praised by the national office of the Presiding Bishop's Committee for Laymen's Work, which is gratifying to all of us. Group meetings or convocational meetings were held throughout the Diocese, some of the convocations being split into three or four group meetings. During the past several months, I have made numerous visits throughout the Diocese and have been impressed by the earnest desire of the laymen to play a more active part in the spiritual work of the Church. New

men's organizations are being formed and the activities of the existing ones extended further.

The results of the past five years have been gratifying, and it is believed that a foundation of sufficient breadth and depth now has been built to allow the organization to make steady strides forward in the years ahead.

The deep interest and inspiring influence that we have received from Bishop Goodwin has made this progress possible. His strong support since the inception of this organization and the benefit of his counsel and wisdom account for much of the success of the work that has been accomplished. We likewise are grateful and indebted to the clergy of the Diocese for the interest and cooperation in all phases of our work.

The fifth annual meeting of our organization will be held at "Roslyn" on Saturday and Sunday, October 8-9, and we hope that every Church in the Diocese will be represented by at least one delegate.

Hayward, Mr. M. Ellwood Cridlin; Valley Convocation, Rev. Wilfred T. Waterhouse, Mr. George J. Durfey.

On motion by the Rev. William Macbeth, the Secretary was directed to delete the descriptive word "Colored" wherever it occurs in the clergy list to conform with the changes in Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. J. L. B. Williams reintroduced the resolution regarding restoration of the word "Holy" in the ninth article of the Nicene Creed. The resolution again failed.

The Chair announced the appointment of the Rev. James D. Beckwith and Dr. Edward Peple to fill vacancies on the Roslyn Advisory Committee.

There being no invitation for a place of meeting for the next Council, the Bishop stated that he will be receptive to such.

After the singing of "Blest Be the Tie that Binds" and pronouncement of the benediction, the Council adjourned **Sine Die**.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH, RICHMOND, VA.,
Tuesday, October 26, 1948

The meeting of the special session of Council of the Diocese of Virginia was called to order at five o'clock October 26th at St. James' Church, Richmond, pursuant to due notice having been sent out by the bishop of the diocese. The meeting was opened with prayer by Bishop Tucker.

The secretary reported a quorum present in each order.

The Rev. Churchill J. Gibson, D. D., offered a program for the council and moved that the rules of order be the rules of order of the last council so far as applicable to this special session. Both were approved by vote of the council.

The secretary presented the following report:

To the Special Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The secretary of the Diocese of Virginia respectfully reports that he has carried out the instructions of the one hundred and fifty-third Annual Council of the Diocese and has notified all the bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, and the standing committees of the several dioceses, of the decision of this diocese to elect a suffragan bishop and that he has obtained the written consents of the majority of the bishops and of the standing committees.

The chair appointed the following Committee on Credentials: The Rev. J. P. H. Mason, Chairman; Mr. Severn M. Nottingham and Mr. Walter N. Chinn, Jr.

The Hon. E. Hugh Smith moved that Bishop Goodwin be requested to make a statement on the relation of a suffragan bishop to his diocese. This motion carried and Bishop Goodwin made an explanatory statement on the subject.

The chair called for the report of the Committee on Nominations.

Dr. Ivey F. Lewis, Chairman of the Committee to bring in Nominations, presented the following report:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO MAKE NOMINATIONS TO THE COUNCIL FOR A
 SUFFRAGAN BISHOP

The following resolution was adopted by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia at its meeting on May 19, 1948:

Resolved, That the bishop of the diocese be authorized to appoint a committee of not more than twenty-one members nor less than fifteen, the chairman to be a layman, the other members to be equally divided between clergy and laity, to bring nominations for the office of bishop suffragan of the diocese to the council at the meeting for the election of said bishop.

Gentlemen and Mrs. Wellford:

Following the direction of the Council I am hereby appointing the above clergymen and laymen of the diocese as a committee to make nominations to the Council for a suffragan bishop should such election be authorized by the bishops and standing committees. It will take quite a while to secure these necessary permissions; therefore, it would probably be best for this committee to meet, elect a layman as chairman, as provided in the enclosed resolution, and get to work without delay. I am asking the Rev. C. J. Gibson, D. D., to act as convener of this committee.

The enclosed copy of the resolution of the council will give an outline of the duties prescribed. If the committee desires to do so I would be glad to make additional appointees at their suggestion up to the limit allowed by council. If the name of any clerical member of this committee is proposed for consideration, and thereby causes that member embarrassment, I will be glad, of course, to accept his resignation if he so desires. I would like it to be distinctly understood that membership on this committee does not in any way preclude individuals from consideration by the committee or from nomination from the floor.

I am sure you realize that this is one of the most important things the diocese has ever asked of you and I sincerely trust that you will serve.

The committee thus named assembled at the Mayo Memorial on June 10, 1948, with all members present. Organization was effected by the election of Ivey F. Lewis as chairman, R. Turner Arrington as vice-chairman, and Joseph B. Tucker as secretary.

In this, as in subsequent meetings, the committee was of one mind in seeking to find the very best man for the high calling of the bishopric without regard to any personal or otherwise minor considerations. It was the sense of the committee that in view of the experience of the Church the council would be called upon to elect a man who would serve immediately as suffragan, but who would in the natural course of events become the bishop of Virginia. The earnest thought of the committee was directed toward the selection of the future bishop of Virginia, regardless of the title of suffragan.

It was also decided at this meeting that "a two-thirds majority of those present at a meeting and a majority of the committee shall be necessary for a choice of names to be submitted to the council."

In view of the wording of the resolution of council in instructing the committee "to bring nominations for the office of bishop suffragan of the diocese to the council at the meeting for the election of said bishop," it was resolved that the deliberations of the committee be kept confidential and that its report should be made directly to council.

The committee spent some time in setting forth for its own guidance its conception of the qualities to be sought in the person of the future bishop of the Diocese of Virginia. Beginning with St. Paul's advice to Timothy on this matter and the implications of the consecration service of the Book of Common Prayer, there was specific mention of certain qualities to be desired.

It was the sense of the meeting that inasmuch as these times call especially for spiritual leadership, and further that because administrative assistance can be provided for a man of spiritual ability, but not vice versa, our primary objective should be to find a man of high spiritual stature. Secondly objectives would include proved administrative ability, vigorous health, suitable age, warmth and inspiration in the preaching office, a warm and loving personality. In respect to churchmanship and contact with the diocese and Commonwealth of Virginia it was decided that we should consider "anyone who would feel spiritually at home in the atmosphere of this diocese."

The committee was notified by the Rev. Samuel B. Chilton on June 24, 1948, that "consents have been received from the majority of the bishops and standing committees for the election of a suffragan bishop in the Diocese of Virginia."

Since the responsibility of the committee was so earnestly assumed, it was resolved to call upon the clergy and laity of the diocese for cooperation so that all might share with the committee in its important task. Carrying out this resolution the secretary was instructed

to prepare a letter stating that the committee would welcome suggestions of names, with pertinent information, for consideration. The letter was duly mailed on July 12 to all clergymen canonically connected with the diocese, all vestrymen, presidents of the Woman's Auxiliaries, and lay delegates to the last council of the diocese. Approximately 1,400 letters were sent. The clergy were requested to read the letter or make an announcement to their people. The letter follows:

To the Clergy, the Members of Council, and Other Laymen of the Diocese of Virginia.

Dear Friends:

As you no doubt know the council of the diocese at its recent meeting voted to take the necessary steps toward the election of a bishop suffragan. The council also adopted a resolution authorizing the bishop of the diocese to appoint a committee of clergymen and laymen "to bring nominations for the office of bishop suffragan of the diocese to the council at the meeting for the election of the said bishop."

The committee appointed by Bishop Goodwin has had its first meeting and has organized under the chairmanship of Dr. Ivey F. Lewis; and I have been authorized to send out this letter stating that the committee will welcome from the people of this diocese the suggestion of names and pertinent information for consideration. Names and information should be sent to the secretary, the Rev. Joseph B. Tucker, Montross, Virginia.

The committee wishes it to be made plain that all the people of the Church in this diocese may make suggestions to the committee. This letter is sent to you in the belief that you are in a position to make this known. Would the clergy please read this letter, or make an announcement to this effect to their people?

The third meeting of the committee was held at St. George's Church, Fredericksburg, on September 28, with all members in attendance except Mrs. Wellford, Mr. Newton, and Mr. Hamilton. All names remaining on the list after a preliminary pruning were presented, with all available information and all letters which had come to the secretary and the chairman.

It was announced that in accordance with the action taken at the meeting on June 10 requiring a two-thirds majority of those present and a majority of the committee, ten affirmative votes would be required to present a name for nomination.

After prolonged discussion, and careful and prayerful consideration, the committee voted to present two nominations to the council, set down here in alphabetical order:

THE RT. REV. JOHN BOYD BENTLEY, D. D.

Born: Hampton, Virginia, on February 9, 1896, the son of Charles Headley Bentley and Susan Elizabeth (Cake) Bentley.

Educated: Hampton High School, College of William and Mary, 1915-16, 1920-21, Theological Seminary in Virginia, 1921, D. D., 1932. Phi Beta Kappa.

Experience: Employed by the Texas Company, 1914, Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock Company, 1914-15, 1919-20. Served in World War I in every grade from private to captain, later major Field Artillery Reserve.

Ordained deacon, 1922; priest, 1929; assistant minister Christ Church, Anvik, Alaska, 1921-25; master Charlotte Hall School, Maryland, 1925-26; assistant Bruton Parish Church, Williamsburg, and minister Grace Church, Yorktown; Hickory Neck Church, Toano, Eastern State Hospital, Williamsburg, Robert Hunt Shrine, Jamestown,

1926-30; archdeacon of the Yukon, 1930-31; consecrated suffragan bishop of Alaska, 1931, serving from then to 1942; bishop in charge, 1942-43; bishop of Alaska, 1943-47; vice-president of the National Council, 1947.

Family: Married Elvira Wentworth Carr, May 28, 1921.

Bishop Bentley is so well known in Virginia that it is hardly necessary to say that he measures up fully to the most exacting requirements and to the best traditions of the historic bishopric of Virginia.

THE REV. ROBERT FISHER GIBSON, JR., D. D.

Born: Williamsport, Pennsylvania, November 22, 1906, the son of the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, former rector of Christ Church, Charlottesville, and Harriet (McKenny) Gibson.

Educated: Porter Military Academy, Charleston, South Carolina; Trinity College (Connecticut), B. A., 1928; University of Virginia, M. A. (History), 1932; Theological Seminary in Virginia, B. D., 1940; D. D., 1948.

Experience: Teacher, Brent School, Baguio, Philippine Islands, 1928-29; with General Motors in Java, 1929; master, Gilman School, Baltimore; Southampton (L. I.) Country School; two years with the Canada Dry Company (N. Y.), then to Virginia Seminary.

Ordained deacon June, 1940; priest, December, 1940. Minister in charge Upper Truro Parish, 1940-41; minister in charge Immanuel Church, Alexandria, 1941-43; associate professor of Church History, Virginia Seminary, 1940-46; minister in charge Immanuel Church, Alexandria, 1946-47. Appointed missionary to Mexico, 1946. Dean of the Seminary, Sewanee, Tennessee.

Family: Married Alison Morice, June 1, 1935. Three children.

Dr. Gibson is a "Virginian who knows how to get along with the clergy and people, a man of attractive dynamic personality, a man acquainted with the traditions and character of the people of Virginia, and one who commands respect of all who wish to follow good leadership."

"The type of man to be acceptable in any society, and married to a woman who would grace the office. A man who is of the spiritual and mental stature to be bishop of Virginia."

The bishop commended the committee for their work. Mr. Alexander Sands moved that the bishop's words be considered as a motion. This resolution was carried.

The Rev. Mr. Bowden moved that the Nominating Committee's report be accepted. This was carried. The chair announced that the acceptance of the report put the names of the Rt. Rev. John Boyd Bentley, D. D., and the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, D. D., in nomination.

It was moved and carried that nominating speeches be limited to five minutes and seconding speeches to three minutes.

Bishop Goodwin announced the appointment of the following tellers: For the clerical order—the Rev. James B. Roe, head teller; the Rev. Messrs. Stewart B. West, Harry W. Baldwin, Jr., Beverley D. Tucker, Jr., Richard R. Baker, III, J. L. B. Williams and James P. Lincoln. For the lay order—the Hon. John Warren Cooke, head teller; Messrs. Reed I. West, George D. Williams, George T. King, Jr., Clyde C. Lamond, Jr., Paul Rollins and Barton Palmer.

The chair announced the appointment of the following committee to make arrangements for the proper celebration of the 400th anniversary of the Book of Common Prayer as authorized at the 153rd Annual Council: the Rev. Churchill J. Gibson, D. D., convener; the Rev. G. M. Brydon, D. D., the Rev. A. C. Zabriskie, D. D., the Rev. Roy E. LeMoine and Mr. John B. Mordecai.

The chair announced that the floor was open for nominations. Mr. Rosewell Page nominated the Rev. Watkins Leigh Ribble. Mr. John B. Minor seconded this nomination. Mr. Calvin T. Lucy nominated the Rev. Frederick J. Warnecke. The Rev. Dewey C. Loving seconded this nomination. The Rev. F. L. Robinson nominated the Rev. Theodore H. Evans, D. D. The Rev. Dr. Evans requested that his name be withdrawn, and with the consent of his nominator, this was done. The Rev. Reginald W. Eastman nominated the Rev. Moultrie Guerry.

Dr. Churchill Gibson welcomed the council to St. James' Church and announced that supper would be served in the Sunday School annex. The meeting was adjourned for supper.

The meeting was called to order again at 7:35 P. M. and the

chair announced that nominations were again in order. Mr. Alexander H. Sands nominated the Rev. Churchill J. Gibson, D. D. The Rev. Stamo S. Spathey nominated the Rev. Samuel B. Chilton. Mr. Edmund W. Newman made the seconding speech for Mr. Chilton. The Rev. Francis W. Hayes, Jr., nominated the Rev. B. B. Comer Lile. The Rev. Robert M. Olton seconded the nomination of the Rev. Frederick J. Warnecke.

It was moved and seconded that the nomination be closed. This motion was carried.

Bishop Goodwin spoke of the advance work in the diocese and the need of providing money both for salaries and capital expenditures. After speaking at length on the need for expanding the work in the diocese, particularly in the Arlington-Alexandria-Fairfax and Richmond areas and also in other areas, Bishop Goodwin said that the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary had asked for a special committee to study the questions of advance work in the diocese and to make a report to the council in May so that definite action might be taken. Mr. Muller, speaking of the urgency of starting this advance work now, offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society be authorized and directed to launch a campaign not later than Epiphany, 1949, and ending at Whitsunday, 1949, to raise \$100,000 in pledges for 1949 and 1950 for the purpose of putting four new men in the Richmond area and five new men in the Alexandria-Arlington-Fairfax area at salaries of \$4,000 plus house and up to \$10,000 for a scientific survey of the Richmond area.

Dr. Zabriskie moved that the recommendation at the end of Bishop Goodwin's address be put before the council as a resolution. There was debate on whether this was a substitute to Mr. Muller's resolution or vice versa. It was finally ruled by the chair that Mr. Muller's resolution was not a substitute and that the two resolutions were not antithetical. There was prolonged debate. Mr. Muller amended his motion to call for the raising of \$200,000 rather than \$100,000 and to include capital expenditures as well as salaries. There was more prolonged debate.

Mr. Edmund Campbell offered the following substitute to Mr. Muller's resolution:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this council that a special campaign for church expansion in this diocese should be undertaken as soon as practicable; and that to this end the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society is requested to proceed to conduct such a campaign and fix its amount as expeditiously as possible.

Dr. Lewis moved the following substitute:

The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society be requested to examine the whole subject of the campaign and the advance work and to reach an early opinion on this question upon which we have no unanimity.

Mr. Muller accepted Mr. Campbell's substitute. Dr. Lewis withdrew his substitute. Mr. Campbell's substitute was put to a vote and carried. Dr. Zabriskie withdrew his motion which would have put the bishop's recommendation as a resolution.

Bishop Goodwin announced that the diocese had recently received a bequest from the late Judge Niven of property valued at about \$40,000. His will had mentioned that this property might be used in certain ways, including use for a men's home.

Mr. Walter Chinn read the following resolution adopted by the trustees of the Episcopal Church Home for Men:

The trustees of the Episcopal Church Home for Men in the Diocese of Virginia at a meeting in Charlottesville, Va., on October 18th passed a resolution urging the Council of the Diocese of Virginia that they recommend to the trustees of the Diocese of Virginia that Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the legacy from Judge Niven (who expressed a desire that his property be used for a home for elderly people) be designated for the use and benefit of the funds now being raised for the building and equipment of the Episcopal Home for Men in Charlottesville, to which home this council has previously voted its hearty approval, and accepted the initial gift of a layman for the purchase of a building and site.

Mr. Chinn moved that the council approve this request.

Bishop Mason took the chair. Bishop Goodwin said that we ought to wait until we find out exactly what the bequest contains before we decide on what is to be done with it.

The Rev. George F. Tittmann moved that Mr. Chinn's resolution be received by the council and referred to a special committee to be appointed by the bishop for a careful study and to report back to the council at its next meeting. After an oratorical struggle between Drs. Brydon and Montague, Mr. Tittmann's motion was carried.

The chair appointed on this committee the Rev. S. B. Chilton, the Rev. William Macbeth, the Rev. E. E. Tate, the Rev. H. A. Donovan, the Rev. J. Manly Cobb, and Messrs. Archibald Robertson, Mr. E. D. Campbell, Mr. W. N. Chinn, and Mr. C. C. Lamond.

The Rev. John G. Scott moved that the bishop take the proper steps to communicate privately with Bishop Bentley with reference to his attitude towards the suffragan bishopric of Virginia.

Dr. Ivey Lewis offered an amendment saying that the same should be done for the Rev. Robert Gibson. After heated debate a motion to table this motion was carried.

The meeting was adjourned until 9:30 the following morning.

Wednesday, October 27th

The meeting was opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion by Bishop Goodwin, assisted by Bishops Tucker and Mason and the Rev. Churchill J. Gibson.

The council was called to order at 10:32.

The Rev. Churchill Gibson moved that the floor be opened for nominations. There being a division, a vote by show of hands was called for and Dr. Gibson's motion was carried 116 to 61.

The Rev. Herbert S. Osburn, D. D., nominated the Rev. E. A. de Bordenave. The Rev. Frank H. Moss seconded Mr. de Bordenave's nomination. Mr. Clyde C. Lamond, Jr., and Mr. J. Chisman Hanes both seconded Mr. Lile's nomination.

The Rev. Reno S. Harp, Jr., moved that the nominations be closed. This was carried.

The Rev. J. P. H. Mason, Chairman of the Committee on Credentials, reported that all the credentials were in order.

The first ballot was taken.

The Rev. J. P. H. Mason reported that two laymen had come during the balloting as delegates to the council without credentials. On certification of their senior wardens and rectors and on motion each time of Mr. Blake T. Newton, the council voted to seat these men.

The chair declared the meeting open for business.

The Rev. Darby W. Betts moved that the bishop appoint a committee to study the problem of parishes which have large transient populations and to recommend a policy on the number of delegates they should be allowed to send to council, this committee to report to the next meeting of council.

The Rev. Mr. Chilton offered an amendment to the effect that this committee should study the whole problem of representation of parishes in council. With this amendment, Mr. Bett's motion was carried. The chair appointed on this committee The Rev. Messrs. Betts, Chilton, and Hedley J. Williams, and Messrs. Rosewell Page and A. H. Sands.

Mr. Bernard Chamberlain moved a rising vote of thanks to the rector and congregation of St. James' Church for their hospitality to the council. This was carried with gratitude.

The Rev. Mr. Spathey asked for information on the Episcopal Radio Program. The Rev. Robert R. Brown gave a very encouraging report on the effectiveness of the program to date.

The second ballot was taken. The tellers brought in the report of the second ballot. There was no election.

The Rev. Mr. de Bordenave asked that his name be withdrawn, but his nominator would not consent. The Rev. Mr. Ribble asked that his name be withdrawn. His nominator not objecting, this was done. The Rev. Mr. Eastman, who had

placed in nomination the name of the Rev. Moultrie Guerry, asked that his name be withdrawn, which was done.

A third ballot was taken.

The tellers brought in the report of the third ballot. The chair declared that the Rev. Robert Fisher Gibson, Jr., D. D., having received a concurrent majority in both orders was thereby duly elected bishop suffragan of the Diocese of Virginia. The results of the three ballots were as follows:

The Rev. Mr. Harp moved that the vote be made unanimous by a rising vote. This was carried.

The chair appointed the following to act as a committee to notify Dr. Gibson of his election. The Rev. A. C. Zabriskie, the Rev. H. A. Donovan and Dr. Ivey F. Lewis.

Mr. Lewis C. Williams offered the following resolution on behalf of the Finance Committee:

Resolved, That the salary of the new suffragan bishop be \$6,500.00 with house and travel expenses, and that the necessary money be provided from the Episcopal Fund for the first year.

This was carried.

Mr. Chilton explained that to make the election official, the signatures of all members of the council had to be affixed to the testimonial of election, and moved that this should be done before the adjournment of the council. This was carried.

The following testimonial of election was signed by the delegates:

We, whose names are hereunder written, fully sensible how important it is that the sacred order and office of bishop should not be unworthily conferred, and firmly persuaded that it is our duty to bear testimony on this solemn occasion without partiality or affection, do, in the presence of Almighty God, testify that the Rev. Robert Fisher Gibson, Jr., D. D., is not, so far as we are informed, justly liable to evil report, either for error in religion or for viciousness of life; and that we know of no impediment on account of which he ought not to be ordained and consecrated to that holy office. We do, moreover, jointly and severally declare that we believe him to be of such sufficiency in good learning, of such soundness in the faith, and of such virtuous and pure manners and godly conversation, that he is apt and meet to exercise the office of a bishop to the honor of God and the edifying of His Church, and to be a wholesome example to the flock of Christ.

In Memoriam

THE REVEREND

FREDERICK WILLIAM NEVE

Born at Benenden, England, December 8, 1855.

Son of George and Eliza Selmes Neve.

Graduated at Oxford University with B. A. in 1879; M. A. 1883. Received D. D. degree from Virginia Theological Seminary in 1921.

Ordained deacon in 1880 and priest in 1881 by the Bishop of St. Alban's.

He married Fannie G. Taylor (deceased), and in 1913 Helen Augusta Cooch (deceased).

Dr. Neve served in England from 1880 to 1888. He was rector of Emmanuel Church, Greenwood, Va., 1888-1905, and rector of St. Paul's Church, Ivy Depot, Va., 1888-1923. He inaugurated the work of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge in the Diocese of Virginia and was appointed Archdeacon in 1904, a position he held until his death.

He was founder of the "Order of the Thousand Fold." He was author of many booklets, leaflets, articles; "The Church of the Living Waters"; "Manual of Order of the Thousand Fold"; "The House of God and the Child," a book of poems.

Archdeacon Neve died at his home at Ivy on November 16, 1948.

THE REVEREND

HERBERT STABLER OSBURN

Born at Leesburg, Va., October 1, 1881.

Son of Herbert and Elizabeth Jane Whitmore Osburn.

He graduated from the Virginia Theological Seminary in 1910 and was given the degree of D. D. by Washington and Lee University in 1933.

He was ordained deacon in June 1910 by Bishop Lloyd and priest in June 1911 by Bishop Gibson.

He married Fanny Scott Beverley in 1913.

Dr. Osburn was rector of St. Anne's Parish, Essex County, Va., 1911-14; Christ Church, Emporia, Va., 1914-15; Emmanuel Church, Harrisonburg, 1915-17; Christ Church, Elizabeth City, N. C., 1917-18. He was *locum tenens* at St. Paul's Church, Petersburg, Va., 1918-19, and at St. John's Church, Petersburg, 1919-22; then rector of South Farnham Parish and Chaplain and Instructor in Religious Education at St. Margaret's School, Tappahannock, Va., 1922-31, and rector of Ware and Abingdon Parishes, 1931-41.

He continued to serve the Church as Bible Class teacher, supply preacher, and in other ways even after he was forced to retire in 1941 by reason of extreme ill health.

He died at his home in Tappahannock on March 11, 1949.

(b) Report of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge

Prepared by the Secretary of the Board of Mountain Work

This report is unorthodox, because it is customary for the Bishop in Charge of Mountain Work to make the report. This time I, the secretary, asked and received the privilege of so doing.

First some statistics, which are in part accurate, in part approximate, but in no case at all exaggerated.

The mountain work of the Diocese is carried on in seven counties. There are nine missions in Albemarle, six in Greene, one in Madison, three in Rockingham, four in Page, one in Clarke, and two in Fauquier, making 26 in all, besides the two institutions, St. Anne's Preventorium and the Blue Ridge School. The missions cover a very large territory, perhaps 4,000 square miles, though, of course, the area of the seven counties is much more than that.

Regarding equipment we have land and buildings well above \$100,000.00 in value. There are seven rock churches, 16 frame, two cinder block, one stucco over concrete block and frame, a total of 26 church buildings, which will accommodate an average of 250 persons each. We have adequate mission houses and parish houses at all points except that St. Andrew's, Ada, and St. John the Baptist need parish houses. At the latter point we are just beginning a parish hall.

There are perhaps five hundred families connected with the church with a total of perhaps 1,600 communicants. Services are as frequent as may be when you consider that most of the clergy are parish priests who have from one to four missions in addition to their parish churches, and who have to travel from three to ten miles from their homes to these missions. There are services every Sunday, but of necessity many of these must be lay services conducted by the workers. Sunday Schools are, of course, regular. In most missions we have in summer Daily Vacation Bible Schools and a week of mission services when possible. The missions have gradually built up in the matter of thorough Every Member Canvasses until most of them are doing very well. Recently the workers at Middle River, which had been rather a discouraging point, placed 72 sets of church envelopes in their congregation and they say these are being used. Good progress toward self-support has been made though we do not feel that it will be possible

for these small mountain communities ever to become completely self-supporting. Progress has been slow but sure.

We have six clergy besides Bishop Mason, and there are now three vacant parishes. We have 25 lay workers, two of whom are wives of paid workers, wives who work but do not receive salary, and three who are volunteer workers, two of them for the summers only. When it comes to salaries for these lay workers it may be safely stated that not one gets a really adequate salary under present living conditions. This makes it very hard to fill vacancies with suitable persons. We received in 1948 from the diocese \$16,000.00 for these salaries. For this year we are receiving \$18,000.00. This makes possible a small increase on some of the lower salaries, but as there are two places to fill as soon as possible we must hold back enough to pay two more workers.

In the matter of giving by our people it should be noted that last year the missions gave toward their ministers' salaries approximately \$1,770.00; on the diocesan quota, \$2,435.00; for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, \$406.92; toward the Seminary Building Fund, \$503.23; for the Mite Box offering for missions, \$1,069.07; on the Bishop's and Contingent Fund, \$216.00. Undoubtedly there were offerings which were not reported. All this would total about \$6,600.00. At any rate you may consider the fact that these little missions which you have thought of as being entirely on the receiving end, have given six thousand dollars to their church, and this does not include the fuel, insurance and other local expenses, and the many smaller benevolences which many of them have paid.

Besides reporting on clergy, workers and so forth, I want to speak also of our Board of Mountain Work. I don't believe any part of the Church's work anywhere has a finer group of men and women serving. It is made up of five clergy and three lay members chosen from the D. M. S., and these add to their number a like number. The members of our Board are not only outstanding persons, but they are deeply interested in the work and willing to spend as much of their time as necessary at the quarterly Board meetings to discuss the work and try to meet its needs.

The work which is in their care is purely a missionary jurisdiction within the Diocese. It started in 1898 when the Rev. Frederick W. Neve came to Ivy Depot from England and saw the great need among the people of the foothills close by. He began the work there and then went up into the Blue Ridge. He envisioned a string of missions along the Ridge, say, ten miles apart, to reach all the isolated, underprivileged, backward people of the mountains. He pegged away at first without diocesan recognition and then with the full devotion and help of Bishop Gibson and the Diocese, until at his death last November he could look out and see to a great extent his dream come true. He had brought into the work in the early days two outstanding men, first,

George P. Mayo, afterwards founder of the Blue Ridge School, and then W. Roy Mason, first a missionary at Mission Home, then Associate Archdeacon and now Suffragan Bishop with care of the mountain work. Dr. Neve was Archdeacon until about 1930 when he retired, and became Archdeacon Emeritus.

In the death of our beloved Dr. Neve we have lost a dear friend, a mighty helper, but we cannot lose the inspiration we have found in his faith, and we can but try to carry on the work he loved and lived for.

The Blue Ridge School, our first institution, has grown through the years since 1909 until today it is a power in the life of the Church in this Diocese. It has itself trained many young persons to become teachers, thus raising the standard of the public schools especially in Greene County. It has turned out graduates who have become clergymen, doctors, lawyers and bankers, and perhaps most important of all good homemakers.

The second institution, St. Anne's Preventorium, is for the building up of undernourished children, especially those threatened with T. B. The character of its work has somewhat changed with changing conditions until now it has many heart cases and many children from outside the hills. However, the good work goes on and many more children are added each year to the hundreds who have gone out from its doors, restored to health. And whatever may be the final outcome St. Anne's Preventorium will stand there a monument to the devotion and expert work of Miss Annie Park, its guardian angel, and Bishop Mason, its constant friend, guide and careful manager.

Some of the original missions have closed as conditions changed, but others have been opened. We have at present an almost brand new mission on High Top, where the work develops wonderfully, and an old mission at Wyatt's, once almost dead and now brought back to new life, and doing a fine work. Both of these are under the leadership of our own mountain girls, the Walton sisters. They were educated in our little mission day school at Blackwell Hollow, then at Blue Ridge School, one of them at the University of Virginia School of Education, and the other at the Church Training School in Philadelphia. Two others of our mountain girls are at work, one at Crossroads and one at Pine Grove, both doing splendid work. We have as head of the Blue Ridge School a clergyman who himself grew up near a mission and became dedicated to the life of service in the Church because of the influence of the mission workers. He graduated at the Blue Ridge School, went through college, then through the Virginia Seminary and after several years of parish work in the low country came back to the hills to be a missionary priest. Three years ago he became head of the Blue Ridge School. We have many products of our mission training in many places outside the mountains as well

as in our own little communities. And we have on the whole a strong body of good churchmen and churchwomen of whom we are justly proud.

We feel that this work is not only worth while and well conducted and organized, but that it deserves to go on with more workers, better paid, with more equipment, to continue to raise the standards of the small isolated communities in which it serves. We feel that it will perhaps always have to be helped, but that more and more the mountain people will be doing the work themselves and passing on to other neighborhoods that which the Church has brought to them. As one mountain father said to his daughters: "Go up there on those mountain tops and do for those young-uns who are your own people. They need you. Seems to me it's time some of us passed along some of what the Church has done for us." And they will do it! But we must not fail to keep up our end of the work so that they can go into other communities and do what the two Walton girls are doing on Wyatt's and High Top.

(c) Report of the Board of Colored Work

Church work among the Negroes in the Diocese of Virginia is in a stage of transition. Several factors have contributed to the present unsettled conditions—among them the federal program of civil rights, the recent agitation in our own state concerning the public schools and Judge Hutchinson's decision for equal opportunities for white and colored children, also the strong opposition of the Negro race to any form of segregation. In consequence many of our Church leaders feel that we should eliminate all reference to work among Negroes as a separate or distinct unit in our Diocese.

During the meeting of this Council an amendment to our canons is to be offered providing for doing away with our Board of Colored Work. Recently the Board of John Moncure High School for Negro boys and girls decided to close the school at the end of the current session. The Board of the Bishop Payne Divinity School in Petersburg, which has hitherto trained our Negro candidates for the ministry had already taken similar action.

In the case of John Moncure two main factors made the decision necessary. A few years ago the state made no adequate provision for even the most elementary education of Negro children living in that part of Essex County where the school is located. Thus the Church

was filling a real need in providing education and Christian training in a neglected field. Now the state has been forced to do something to remedy its past failures and is furnishing transportation in buses to public schools for the Negro children, thus taking the pupils from John Moncure and making our work there unnecessary. Because of this situation the diocesan board of apportionment did not feel justified in continuing to allocate diocesan funds to the school which without this aid had no alternative but to close its doors.

The whole movement towards non-segregation of the races has a good and a bad side. It is good for the state to realize a greater responsibility toward its Negro citizens and good also for the Church people of the white race to become more tolerant and fair-minded toward toward their Negro brethren. On the other hand, we must guard against the loss of some things of definite value to our work.

In giving up the John Moncure School we are losing in large measure our opportunity to give our Negro boys and girls the teachings of our Church and to train them in Christian living. If we do away with the Colored Convocation—a proposition upon which our colored clergy are divided—I feel that the colored people of our Diocese will suffer a real loss in being no longer able to meet together for discussions of their particular problems and interests. Also I am confident that if this work loses in a sense its identity, contributions from the Woman's Auxiliary and from other interested groups and individuals will greatly decline.

I trust we may find a way to eliminate the things which hinder the work but to preserve those of real value to its progress. The sooner a proper adjustment can be made the better for all concerned. Doubt and uncertainty are always destructive of harmony and progress.

In spite of the difficulties we are facing at present we have held our own in the colored missions, and in some of the churches are making real growth. There have been more confirmations than usual this past year in St. Philip's, Richmond. Offerings there have increased considerably and the church building is proving too small for the congregations.

Attendance in Trinity, Charlottesville, has also increased and, both here and in St. Philip's, confirmation classes are waiting for a visitation from the Bishop. Prospects are unusually bright for a fine work in St. Peter's Mission, Richmond, if only we could obtain a suitable building in which to carry on.

Meade Memorial in Alexandria has been greatly improved largely through the contributions and work of its own people. They have painted and repaired the inside of the church and put a beautiful new carpet in the sanctuary. We hope soon to enlarge the vestry room and to put water into the building. Equipment is greatly needed at this point.

In most of our other church buildings also we have seen gratifying improvement in care and upkeep: in Grace Church, Millers Tavern; St. Andrew's, Upright; the Osgood Memorial, Richmond, and in St. Paul's, West Point. The interest thus manifested by our colored people in making their church buildings better suited to the worship of God, I feel is an indication also of inward growth in appreciation and understanding of the Church's ways. I do trust this spirit may continue and increase and that greater things await us in the near future for and through the colored people of our Diocese.

(d) Report of the Board of Christian Education

The Department of Christian Education is to become more and more important as the whole Church progresses with the new curriculum. At present the plans are for the heads of the diocesan departments to meet this summer for the opening course of introduction to the new work. Beginning this fall our clergy will be invited to the College of Preachers in groups of five. The first five will make their Sunday Schools experimental centers. The next five will do likewise. At the same time the Diocese will run training centers using these experimental centers. The Church hopes to prepare 2,000 clergy a year to use the new curriculum.

If your rector is not conscious of the importance of this two million dollar proposed program that our Church is undertaking—stick a needle in him, and needle him good. If he is conscious and anxious, support him to the hilt. Help him to get away to these training conferences, help him to get new teachers for your Sunday School, encourage the vestry of your church to give financial support to every endeavor of the Sunday School.

It has been said that Sunday Schools don't pay the bills, and on the surface this is true. It is not the purpose of the Sunday School to support the Church. It is the Church's responsibility to support the education of its children, and if it does its job right, the Sunday School will raise up churchmen for tomorrow and tomorrow's tomorrow who will be the backbone not only of the financial life of the Church, but will be new life in the spiritual fibre of this earthly Church.

As a people we are caught in a warfare that finds its opposing centers in Moscow and in Rome. It is our bounden duty to teach our children to live in the love and judgment of God through Jesus Christ and the blessed companionship of the Holy Spirit before they are wooed into some vain philosophy which will warp their minds and destroy their souls.

New Church Schools have been started in the rural areas and many others have been groomed and improved. Both new parish houses and remodeling work have been undertaken this past year because of a deep concern for more adequate space for Christian Education program.

There is an alert interest in the new curriculum and plans of the National Department. We are very anxious to prepare the Diocese for the work of the new curriculum committee which is stressing parents' cooperation. The parent committee has suggested the formation of new parent groups in many of the parishes. There has been an increase in this phase of the work in the diocese.

SUMMER CONFERENCE

A week's conference for young people and adults was held at the John Moncure School, Millers Tavern. Miss Pray served on the planning committee as well as teaching there. The Youth Summer Conference at Roslyn increases in value as we try to combine our week and ten-day conferences with worship, study, fellowship and play. As a result of the young people's interest they, on their own, have organized an alumni association with the Rev. George Tittmann as their advisor.

LEADERSHIP

The joint leadership conference of superintendent and leaders was held at Roslyn in the spring. The delegates from the Dioceses of Washington, Southern and Southwestern and Virginia were present. As a result of this conference many church schools have organized teachers' training and parent groups. Mr. Albert A. Smoot of St. Paul's Church, Alexandria, chaired the program.

MISSIONARY EDUCATION

More of the boys and girls are sharing the opportunity of learning of the missionary work of the church. We have a continued increase in our giving of the three projects. The Birthday Thank Offering last year went to help to buy jeeps for Bishops overseas. Our Christmas Box money and gifts went to Puerto Rico, Seaman's Church Institute and to our own people in the mountain and rural areas. Our Lenten Mite Box gifts went to St. Mary's, Honolulu, rural areas in Nevada to purchase a boat, Godspeed, in Alaska and a special offering to four children in Liberia, a children's clinic in Haiti and a kindergarten in Japan. The Mite Box Committee prepared an attractive and colorful folder for the parents telling of this work.

YOUTH WORK

A leadership conference and convention week-end was held at Roslyn in the fall. The young people are voted to become on the Diocesan level a United Movement of the Church's Youth Group. An executive committee of young people and adults were chosen to carry out the business and plan for the year. There was a Diocesan-wide youth rally held at Fredericksburg in the Battlefield Park on Whitsunday. At this time a pageant worship service was held, singing and a picnic supper followed. A good proportion of the youth group participated in the Nation-wide Youth Plan as Youth Sunday in the fall; the offering sent to St. Joseph's School in Puerto Rico; Epiphany candlelight services, Nation-wide Corporate Holy Communion and the Church World Service. Both Richmond and Piedmont Convocations held meetings and had special events to promote fellowship and understanding of the youth's work in the Church. It is our hope that we may organize the other Convocations to be as active as these two.

CHURCH SCHOOL BY MAIL

This past year we have reached several young people, adults and children in this Diocese. Many of them have returned their lessons and have found this connection with the Church very helpful. Some of the children have been transferred from this group to participation in an active Sunday School.

LEADER AND TEACHER TRAINING

There has been an increase in regular teachers' meetings. Also in some areas there has been a Teacher Training Institute and Parent Conferences. Many of the Church Schools have conducted their own Teachers' Training Program in their local churches. A guide for this was sent to all the churches from our National Department.

At the overnight planning meeting for the Board of Christian Education it was voted and permission given by Bishop Goodwin to have the Spring Clergy Conference based on the new curriculum and plans of the National Department of Christian Education.

This past spring Miss Pray was elected chairman for the Province Committee on Christian Education. She has also been teaching Christian Education each Friday at the Bishop Payne Divinity School. We wish at this time to thank the members of the committee, both the clergy and lay, for their assistance and help in planning and carrying the work out along with Miss Pray.

(e) Report of the Board of Christian Social Relations

1. REPORT OF CHAIRMAN

This Board meets quarterly, concurrently with the regular meetings of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. However, the June meeting is almost entirely to organize the Board for the following months. Four primary members are chosen from the membership of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and they meet, usually on the same day on which they are elected, to choose advisory and supplementary members of this Board.

Our work is carried on almost entirely through the office of our Executive Secretary, who has been for more than twenty-five years the Rev. R. Cary Montague.

We act, through him, chiefly in an advisory and cooperative capacity. Communications are sent out to the clergy, auxiliary workers, and county superintendents of public welfare, calling their attention to the assistance we are able to give them through our office. This help consists of giving information about state, charitable, and Church institutions, both within and without our own Diocese and state, arranging for hospitalization of indigent rural patients, procuring artificial limbs, and occasionally false teeth, securing positions, and charity railroad passes or rates.

Dr. Montague's report is hereto attached and made a part of this report.

2. REPORT OF EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The work of the Board of Christian Social Relations continues through my office in much the same manner that it has for many years past.

We act as an advisory center for the Diocese, and, indeed, for the whole state, as a sort of reference bureau for handling social problems either individually, collectively, or in parochial matters.

We keep in close touch with all social agencies and charitable and state institutions throughout the city and state, cooperating closely with them to get the best results at the least expense to inquiring clergymen or church and secular social workers.

Our Board is recognized by the railroads, especially the Chesapeake and Ohio, Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac, as being an authorized agency through which to grant charity passes.

In a state like ours where there are three Dioceses it is difficult to arrange for a legislative program without the cooperation of the Boards of Christian Social Relations from the Diocese of Southern Virginia and of Southwestern Virginia, and in spite of repeated efforts we have never been able to work out a plan on which all three of these Boards would agree.

The mail that comes to our office and individuals to whom we render assistance include every range of society; for instance, within the past few months we have helped a man paroled from the penitentiary to get back to his home in Sacramento, California, and have arranged for a retired clergyman to reach a nursing home in Boston, Mass., with the cooperation of two bishops.

Through the liberality of the Hunton charity funds we are able to give considerable financial assistance to worthy cases that are not restricted to definite localities, but include wards of the Department of Public Welfare at Baxter Seminary in Baxter, Tenn., and help in scholarship funds for Church girls in our own state.

An inquiry of the National Department of Public Welfare in New York brought us numerous reports from Dioceses all over the country, but none of them seemed to be rendering a more practical service to the Church in their respective locations than does our Board.

The work of the Richmond city missionary is more or less inextricably mixed with that of the Board of Christian Social Relations, since the same person acts as city missionary and secretary to the Board, and the activities are carried on through the same office, therefore, the following statistical report represents the work of both organizations.

(f) Report of the Field Board

To the 154th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Diocesan Field Board, at the suggestion of Bishop Goodwin, last year stressed Stewardship in connection with giving to the support of the local churches and to do the work of the Diocese and General Church. A pamphlet, largely the work of the chairman, the Rev. Frederick J. Warnecke, assisted in particular by the Rev. Joseph B. Tucker in the necessary art work, was issued. This pamphlet was used largely throughout the Diocese.

In addition to this, a series of area services were held throughout the Diocese, also stressing Stewardship.

The national promotion of the Church this year will follow this idea of Stewardship, which Virginia initiated in 1948.

The Field Board also aided in a number of instances where its members were invited by vestries to help evaluate local approaches, with the result that some of these local groups were enabled to undertake more of their parish burden and even, in some instances, to increase their giving to the Diocese.

The Board financed again this spring the annual clergy conference which is generally given over largely to promotional plans. This year, however, the major portion was devoted to the new curriculum for Sunday Schools and churches being evolved by the National Council, and the conference was directly sponsored by the Diocesan Board of Christian Education.

The Virginia Churchman, under the Field Board, increased its subscription rates, and also received a new impetus in the special drive of May, 1948. The Woman's Auxiliary, through local Church papers representatives, has helped greatly in the increasing of the magazine's circulation in the past several years; and the total is by far the largest since it went back some years ago on a paid-subscription basis.

J. B. SHAW, *Manager*.**(g) Report of the Board of Evangelism**

In reporting the work of your Board of Evangelism this year of 1948-49, your chairman must confess that due to two events on the national and Diocesan level, some of the major work of this Board has necessarily been curtailed. For one thing your Board advocated as a major emphasis for this year the support of the National Radio Program, which has since been discontinued. Secondly, it voted to recommend to the Diocese an organized survey of each parish and community which survey is also before you under the Bishop and Clergy's recommendation at this Council.

Nevertheless the Board has not been inactive. Concerning the Radio Program, you will be glad to know that 22 parishes and missions placed items in their budgets totaling \$7,059.41, and that 19 other parishes and missions made pledges to this program to the total of \$1,981.57. These figures, together with one tentative subscription of \$600, show that 42 parishes and missions of the Diocese have pledged support of the Radio Program to the total of \$9,640.98.

It was also the recommendation of your Board of Evangelism that the Diocese support the men's Corporate Communion during the past Advent; and while the organization of this matter fell within the province of the laymen, you will be glad to know that of 86 parishes reporting 2,119 laymen received Communion at that special service, with the offering amounting to \$1,746.88.

The Board further recommended the "Bishop's Christmas Service" for Christmas Day, and 45 parishes and missions reported the use of this service. We are disturbed to learn that in many instances the material arrived too late and feel ourselves at fault in this matter; however, some of the farther points of the Diocese received the material in plenty of time, while many of the churches in the larger communities did not.

Our suggestion for Epiphany and pre-Lent included a study of "Successful Marriage and the Christian Family," and 33 parishes and missions have reported the use of this excellent study.

No survey has been made yet as to the Lenten study on the Prayer Book, for many parishes and missions have signified their intentions to use this material later in the year.

This must necessarily conclude the report of your Board in view of the fact that the Diocese has properly decided that its survey should be made on a larger scale than was contemplated by the Board of Evangelism. The only other item worthy of mention is the expressed feeling of the Board that all evangelism must divide itself into two parts: (a) That type of evangelism which is carried on within the parish boundaries and among the members of the Church through education, inspiration, and worship, and (b) the other side of evangelism which goes into all the world, beginning with the unchurched of any given community, and extending to every region where the Gospel of Christ is not preached. If each parish or mission could grasp the full significance of the "a" and "b" of evangelism; then your Board of Evangelism feels the individual parish or mission would be immeasurably strengthened, the size of their conference groups doubled, and the support of the whole missionary movement both domestic and foreign increased.

The Board of College Work has made every effort to see that there has been some ministry to Episcopal students in the colleges and universities in the Diocese. Our largest expenditure of funds has been for work at the University of Virginia, where we have a full-time clergyman at work, the Rev. Barton M. Lloyd. He is assisant at St. Paul's Church, and part of his salary is paid by the Church Society for College Work.

At Mary Washington College we have a full-time student worker, Miss Theodosia Parke. The Board passed a resolution, with the con-

sent of the Bishop, placing the work at this college under the direction of the Rev. T. G. Faulkner, Jr., rector of St. George's Church, Fredericksburg.

At Harrisonburg the Diocese provides the salary for a part-time worker, Mrs. Elliott Reeke, whose work is under the direction of the Rev. Roy E. LeMoine, rector of Emmanuel Church, Harrisonburg.

In addition, there is also a small appropriation from the Diocese for expenses of work among the students at Union University, under the direction of the Rev. Aston Hamilton, rector of St. Phillips' Church, Richmond.

The churches of Richmond are carrying the responsibility for the colleges and universities in the parts of the city where they are located.

IV. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

In any report of the hopes and plans for the future of the Woman's Auxiliary, it seems wise to take the first step from the present. The past is our background—the present is where we stop and take inventory and make plans for the future. Our future is planned with confidence and the resolution that we must never waver in going forward in service.

The 18 divisions of the Woman's Auxiliary are led by chairmen who never seem to weary in promoting their departments. Many of these function so smoothly and you are so familiar with them I will not take time to dwell on them in this report.

Our youth work is all important and the Woman's Auxiliary through various committees is prepared to welcome the babies and carry the interest and love of the Church along with them until they become regular members of the Woman's Auxiliary. Our hope is to reach each young person and train her to grow up with a feeling of responsibility for her share in the great and ever growing work of the Church. Three new branches of Little Helpers, 37 branches of Juniors (including six new and two revived), and 12 'Girls' Friendly are reported and their leaders feel encouraged and that they are gaining ground.

Each year we send contributions to the Church Society for College Work and for the "Provincial Project" we contribute to the Discretionary Fund of our college worker.

There is a fine increase in subscriptions to Church papers. You know there was a plea in the Spirit of Missions of 1897 that each branch of the Woman's Auxiliary appoint a member to have special charge of getting new subscriptions. It was felt the women of the Church were not gaining the knowledge they should—truly there is "nothing new under the sun."

The history of the Woman's Auxiliary of our Diocese is opening up in ever larger vistas, and more and more missionaries, too often unknown and unsung, are being added to the list of those giving their all to the work of the Church.

This committee, under the leadership of Mrs. Charles Davison, of Richmond, is trying to find records pertaining to the early life of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary.

Diocesan mission work is still by far the darling of the Woman's Auxiliary. \$8,084.74 was given in 1948, mostly for Mountain Missions. \$2,345.73 was given to General Missions.

Towards education Blue Ridge School and scholarships came to \$2,307.55.

Our Book of Remembrance and Gift of Life Scholarship Funds, totalling this year \$1,906.14, go to the education and training of worthy young women who wish to make Church work their vocation, and I am glad to say at last some are being found. Miss Lelia Brown is using a Gift of Life Scholarship at Bishop Payne Divinity School this year, and Miss Jean Price, from St. Paul's Church, Richmond, is using a Book of Remembrance Scholarship at Wyndham House, N. Y.

Two girls received scholarships to attend a conference at Roslyn.

All chairmen of convocations report gains and cooperation and enthusiasm in their convocations. I can vouch for this from personal experience, for the last three I attended (pouring rain for two of them) there was hardly an empty seat to be found in the church.

More and more we plan to go forward in the five fields of service; this an all comprehensive plan and calls for the help of all of us. There is no one who has not some talent she can offer to God's service.

The theme to be given us at the Triennial this year is "Called Into His Holy Fellowship." Our task as women of the Church will be to reach out and try to bring into the fellowship those whom our influence and example can reach and I hope we can make them realize the joy this fellowship gives to all who are taking part in it.

To me one of the best auguries for the future is to watch a new, uncertain chairman become an enthusiastic one as she realizes the great opportunity for service that comes to her when she is a faithful leader in this great work.

V. SCHOOLS

1. REPORT ON CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

It is impossible in a brief report to tell much of what happens in seven schools during the course of a year. Therefore, this is merely to indicate the general situation.

Enrollments in boarding departments have dropped off from capacity. This means a curtailment in earnings, since the income from the last two or three enrollees often spells the difference between black and red operating results. The support of the people in the Diocese in recommending our schools to parents who are sending their children to boarding schools is, therefore, earnestly solicited.

The day school departments continue to be filled, with a large number on waiting lists for the lowest grades. We regret that we cannot accommodate all who apply, but limitation of facilities prohibits our doing so. A sympathetic understanding of this situation is solicited.

One change in school heads is in prospect. Mr. James Ratcliffe has declined his re-election as headmaster of Christchurch School for next year, in order to pursue graduate study. The Board has elected Mr. Branch Spalding to be headmaster of Christchurch. Mr. Spalding is at present head of the English Department of the Episcopal High School.

The debt of the corporation will drop below the million dollar mark before the end of this fiscal year—but not much below! It will be \$992,000. While we are able to handle it at present, it continues to be a heavy burden and one which might cause difficulty unless our schools stay full. This is another reason to repeat that we urge you to cooperate by recommending our schools to parents who may be considering sending their children to private schools.

2. THE BLUE RIDGE SCHOOL

The session of 1948-49 has been a satisfying one at the Blue Ridge School. The present enrollment is 94—75 boarding and 19 day students. In the boarding department there are 36 boys and 39 girls; and nine boys and ten girls in the day school. There are 26 girls in the high school department and 68 girls and boys in the grades.

The 19 day students are all local children and, of course, come from the Diocese of Virginia. Of the boarders 55 come from within the

Diocese and the remainder as follows: eight from Southwestern Virginia, five from Washington, three from Southern Virginia, two from Maryland, and one each from North Carolina and Iowa. The fact that there have been no boys above the sixth grade accounts for the reduced enrollment as compared to last year.

Boarding students whose parents are wholly responsible for them number 33; from Welfare Departments, 15; those taken care of by churches and other organizations, 15; children sponsored in part by parents and in part by churches and other organizations, 12.

The staff numbers 19 women and seven men. Four of them are part-time workers, and one is a volunteer. Of the above staff eight are full-time teachers and two part-time. Blue Ridge is again fortunate in having a fine staff. They deserve far more than the salaries they get. A pension system should be developed for their protection as they are not eligible for social security benefits.

Music, art, typewriting and shorthand have been offered this year in addition to the regular courses. Religious instruction is given three times a week as part of the regular course of study. Seven children have been baptized, two of them local children, and twelve confirmed. Regular church services are held each Sunday, and chapel at the beginning of each school day. Week night Lenten services were held by visiting clergymen during the prolonged illness of the headmaster, and Sunday services were held by visiting clergy and University of Virginia students. The Woman's Auxiliary, the Junior Auxiliary, and the Junior American Citizenship Clubs have been active all the year, as well as the Glee Club and the choir. We miss the Rev. Dennis Whittle, especially in the choir and other religious activities. After he left the work at High Top and Wyatts Mountain was put in the Mission Home District; Haneytown Mission is closed temporarily, and the work at Earlsyville is shared jointly by the present headmaster and the Rev. George Fisk, of Mission Home.

Many small improvements have been made to the buildings and grounds, such as painting, screening, etc. A new spraying machine, wagon, hammermill and power mower have been bought. An adequate hot water system for the main building has been installed, and circulating hot water is piped from there to the hospital and post-office.

The farm and cannery did not have a very profitable year. The whole farm program is being reorganized, the dairy herd and beef cattle increased, and the farm mechanized as funds permit. We hope for more profitable years ahead.

With the exception of an epidemic of mumps the health of the school has been quite good. The Albemarle Nutrition Camp was held again last summer.

Eleven children have withdrawn during the session. Several of these left because the home situation had cleared up. Only one had to be sent away. The spirit of the children has been exceptionally good and almost every one wants to be back next year. A fine program of regular movies has been shown on alternate Friday nights, preceded by a comedy. Educational films have been shown at intervals and folk games and dances have alternated with movies on Friday nights. Since we didn't have older boys the upper class boys from Miller School nearby were invited for a dance, and they in turn invited our older girls over there. The bus has been useful for occasional trips, ball games and in taking the children to and from Charlottesville for vacations.

Because of a need expressed by many of our parents and patrons and others a Summer Camp Program is being planned for girls and small boys from June 17th to July 29th. Provision is being made for the other periods during the summer except for August, when we try to provide a change for every one.

Shifting to twelve grades this year for the first time, and stopping at the tenth grade last year, and having no older boys meant that we would normally not have a graduating class until 1950. However, there will be one graduate this year and we hope for several next year.

We are again combining our commencement exercises with our Spring Festival (May Day), which comes May 29th and 30th.

Financially the year was none too bright at the beginning. With no older boys and, therefore, a decreased enrollment, and an increase in staff by taking girls through the twelfth grade, it looked as though we were bound to incur a deficit. However, by careful spending and through generous friends and organizations it now looks as though we will reach the end of the fiscal year, June 30th, without a deficit. We are most grateful to the Diocese and the Diocesan organizations for their loyal support. Special thanks are also due our New York Auxiliary, Christ Church, Short Hills, N. J., and the D. A. R. for greatly increased support.

A survey of the school was made last June by the Child Welfare League of America and recommendations were set forth as to its further usefulness. The Board considered these recommendations at its meeting on May 5th and plans were made for carrying out some of the suggestions in the near future. A planning and building committee was appointed with the view of starting a building program soon, now that materials are becoming available. A new water supply is being considered as a part of this program. A good portion of the finances is in sight.

Blue Ridge School is seeking to find its place in the program of the Church. Its policy is not fixed and final. In addition to continuing the high school for the older girls the Board granted permission to

take boys through the seventh grade next year and, therefore, keep our present sixth grade boys. The Board has shown an openness and a real desire to shape its policies to meet the existing needs. These needs seem to center more and more around homes disrupted by separation, death, sickness and tensions; and also normal homes where the income does not permit the child to attend the higher priced Church boarding schools. We seek to serve children from all over the Diocese and elsewhere who need our services. We are especially anxious to help normal children who find themselves in abnormal circumstances. Already we are receiving children who were born during World War II, and with the disruption of many war marriages we feel our services will be needed more and more. Blue Ridge is doing a vital part of the Church's work not duplicated by any other institution in the Diocese, and we earnestly solicit your interest and support.

3. STUART HALL

I am glad to report to you that the year 1948-49 has been a satisfactory one for Stuart Hall. Last year with 143 students we were filled to considerably over capacity and, for general comfort and efficiency, I decided to consider 138 as our maximum. We began the year with 136, but for various reasons have lost seven and gained one, giving us at present 130 resident and 14 day students. The fact that in 1947-48 we began and ended the year with 143, having practically no turnover during the year, showed plainly that we had been able to make a careful selection, on account of the large number of applications. This present year, when applications were less numerous (as I believe they were in all preparatory schools and in many colleges) I was not able to select as carefully as the summer advanced.

It is at this point that I am apprehensive about the coming year, and for this reason that we sent every clergyman in the three Virginia Dioceses our bulletins with the request that he suggest to us girls in his parish who would be good Stuart Hall material. With youth as free and uncontrolled as it is at present, and the public high school problem what it is, I hope that we can continue to have a sufficient number of applications to be able to exercise care in the selection of our students, in order to maintain that atmosphere of cooperation and stability so necessary for the best work of any educational institution.

Our present senior class numbers 55, a large number to be replaced. Sixteen of these seniors will take the College Board examinations on

April 9th, and many others will go to colleges and junior colleges which accept on certification.

Our greatest asset for this year has been the new Bible teacher, Mrs. Malcolm Macfarlane. Mrs. Macfarlane, a deeply spiritual, broadly cultured woman, has fitted excellently into our school life and has contributed to it in many ways over and above the teaching of Bible classes for the 9th, 10th and 11th grades. All of her Bible classes meet three times each week, one section for the 9th grade, two for the 10th, and three for the 11th. Dr. Gibbs, the chaplain, continues to have the senior Bible classes. Mrs. Macfarlane also has charge of our daily twenty-minute vesper services, which are meaning a great deal in our school life, especially to those girls from the different classes who frequently conduct them, and to the student choirs, which furnish the music. This June we hope that we shall send a group of our students to the Northfield Conference, chaperoned by Mrs. Macfarlane. Mrs. Macfarlane will return to us next year.

I am now endeavoring to fill for next year two important vacancies. Miss Henrietta Sparrow, who has been our completely satisfactory, efficient dietitian for the past three years, is resigning on account of ill health. Miss Anna Bergin, who for three years has been equally as satisfactory and skilled as a nurse, wishes to return to hospital nursing. It is with the greatest regret that we give up these two. There will be some vacancies in the faculty, but none which it will be too difficult to fill. With one exception, the able, valued members of the faculty who have been with us more than one year are remaining, and this one is leaving to accept a government position.

We are constantly endeavoring to broaden our school life, especially for our seniors, by giving them more responsibilities and more privileges, in order to prepare them for the complete freedom which all colleges allow, and by strengthening our academic courses. With this broadening in mind, we have added this year two new courses, both greatly enjoyed by the girls who have taken advantage of them—a course in world geography and a course in interior decoration and costume designing.

Again next year we shall join with Mary Baldwin College in their lecture-concert series. The series this year has proved satisfactory and enjoyable in every respect.

I hope that the clergy of the Council have found time to look over the catalog and view book sent you. Stuart Hall wishes and needs your interest and your cognizance of the work the school is doing.

VI. REPORT OF SHRINE MONT

During 1948 Shrine Mont went steadily forward in its improvement and development. St. Andrew's cottage basement was expanded and two new rooms with private baths were built; the kitchen was repainted and completely modernized with hotel-type gas stoves and a new gas bake oven installed; 100 new mattresses were purchased; three new gas hot water heaters were purchased to replace inadequate and expensive coal burning types, and the interiors of many cottages were redecorated.

GENTLEMEN:

We have made an audit of the Treasurer's records and accounts of the administration of Operating Funds of the Diocese and Investment Funds of the trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society and Church Extension Committee for the year ended December 31, 1948, as kept by your Treasurer, Rev. Samuel B. Chilton, and submit herewith sundry statements, as reflected in the foregoing index, together with the following related comments:

The account of the Operating and Investment Funds, considered as a whole, embraces miscellaneous funds for general Church administrative and extension purposes in the Diocese; and the cash funds for the purposes designated are derived mainly from churches, auxiliary organizations, apportionments from the General Program Funds, individuals, etc.

In the verification of the amounts shown as accruing to the general account from the various sources enumerated above, we have not gone beyond the records of your Treasurer, but have relied substantially on a check of all recorded receipts and disbursements.

The form of the statements presented herewith is substantially the same as those of the preceding year.

Exhibit "A" reflects the assets and fund balances of the Diocese at December 31, 1948.

Exhibits "B," "C," "D," "E," and "F" set forth the receipts and disbursements of the various operating funds of the Diocese, showing for each fund, the condition at the beginning of the year, the total receipts and disbursements and the final balance.

Exhibit "G" reflects the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society. Securities held are described in Exhibit "G-1."

Exhibit "H" sets forth the changes during the year in the principal and income accounts of the invested funds of the trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Exhibit "I" records the changes in the notes and fund balance of the Church Extension Committee.

GENTLEMEN:

We have examined the records of account relating to the funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia for the year ended December 31, 1948, and in connection therewith we have prepared the accompanying statements, as set forth in the foregoing index, which in our opinion reflect the various changes that have taken place in these funds during the year 1948, and show their status at the close of the year.

Exhibit "A" sets forth the assets and fund balances at December 31, 1948.

Exhibit "B" is a statement of principal and income of funds for the year ended December 31, 1948, in which is set forth in total the current condition and changes of each individual fund of the general group, as well as of the Disabled Clergy, Widows' and Orphans', Sallie May Dooley, Working Girls' Cot, and Diamond Cot Funds.

In the allotting of income to the various individual funds, your Treasurer has apportioned net income to the funds on a basis of 3.4% of the average monthly balance of principal, except in the case of specified securities held for certain funds, in which case the income was allotted as received from the respective investment.

Changes in the general investment income account during the current year are set forth in Exhibit "B," but are restated in summary form as follows:

APPENDIX D

CHANGES IN CONSTITUTION AND CANONS OF THE DIOCESE ADOPTED AT THE 153rd AND 154th ANNUAL COUNCILS

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE III

SECTION 1. Final paragraph—The lay order shall consist of three classes, namely, (a) the lay delegates from the parishes, separate congregations, and mission churches entitled to representation by canon; (b) the lay delegates from the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, and (c) the lay delegates *ex officio*.

ARTICLE III

SECTION 1. Sub-section (c) was stricken out, and sub-section (d) changed to (c).

ARTICLE XIV

The Standing Committee of the Diocese shall consist of six members, three of the clerical order, and three of the lay order, each of whom shall be a communicant of the Church in this Diocese.

At the first regular meeting of the Council succeeding the final adoption of this amendment the Council shall elect the six members of the Standing Committee, one of each order for the term of one year, one of each order for the term of two years, and one of each order for the term of three years.

At each regular annual meeting thereafter the Council shall elect one member of each order for the term of three years. Each member of the committee shall hold office until his successor is elected or appointed.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office, or in case neither the Bishop nor the Bishop Coadjutor be capable of performing the administrative duties of the Bishop, and in any case when the Bishop shall authorize it to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee at every annual meeting of the Council to submit a report of its proceedings. When required by the Council it shall also lay before the Council any documents which may have come into its possession.

In case of a vacancy in the Standing Committee the committee shall have authority to fill said vacancy from the same order, the appointee to serve until the next annual meeting of the Council, at which meeting the Council shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term, if any, of the previous incumbent.

CANONS

CANON II

Of Lay Representation in the Council.

SECTION 1, Paragraph 2—The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge shall be entitled to the representation given by the Constitution.

CANON IX

Of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

SECTION 2, Paragraph (a)—The members *ex officio* shall be the Bishop the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, the Bishop Suffragan, if there be one the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, if there be one, the Treasurer of the Diocese, the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese, and members of the corporation known as "the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia".

CANON IX.

SECTION 5, Paragraph VI. Stricken out. (Thereby abolishing the Board of Colored Work of the Diocesan Missionary Society).

CANON XI.

Of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction.

Repealed.

CANON XII.

Of Convocations.

SECTION 1—There shall be five Convocations in the Diocese of Virginia, which shall be fixed by geographical limits as follows:

(1) The Albemarle Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Albemarle, Culpeper, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Louisa, Orange and Rockingham.

(2) The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Arlington and Fairfax, and the City of Alexandria.

(3) The Rappahannock Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Caroline, Charles City, Essex, Gloucester, Hanover, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster, Mathews, Middlesex New Kent, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford, and Westmoreland.

(4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all parishes in the County of Henrico and in the City of Richmond north of the James River.

(5) The Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Clarke, Frederick, Loudoun, Madison, Page, Rappahannock, Shenandoah, Warren, Fauquier and Prince William.

Except in the case of the City of Richmond cities shall, for the purpose of this section, be considered parts of the Counties in which they are geographically situated.

Changes in Convocation boundaries of any of the five Convocations shall be authorized by Council on the joint application of the Convocations interested.

SECTION 2. Every Clergyman canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia shall be a member of the Convocation in which his principal Church or his Cure is situated; except that a retired Minister shall retain his membership in the Convocation of which he was a member at the time of his retirement, or become a member of the Convocation in which he resides.

SECTION 3. Each of the Convocations may make provision for its lay representation, and may enact such rules and by-laws as may be necessary for its own guidance.

CANON XVII

Of Missions.

SECTION 4—The Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, or the Bishop if there be no Archdeacon, shall for every Mission under his jurisdiction appoint, or may consent to the election by the enrolled adult members of such Mission of a Mission Vestry Committee of not less than three or more than seven adult members of the Mission, to whom may be assigned such duties in the administration of the temporal affairs of the Mission as may be deemed advisable by the Archdeacon.

CANON XVII.

SECTION 9—Lists of all Missions under the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, under the Faculty of the Theological Seminary in Virginia, and under the direct charge of the Bishop shall be published separately in the Council Journal.

CANON XVIII.

Of Parish Councils.

SECTION 3—In every case where a municipal area within this Diocese shall extend over and into the territory of two or more parishes, the Parish Council of that area shall include all Congregations and Missions within the bounds of the city and its suburbs, as far as the same shall be within this Diocese.

CANON XIX

*Of the Election and Organization of Vestries, and Calling
of Congregational Meetings.*

SECTION 2, Paragraph 2—Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, if any Parish, Separate Convocation or Mission Church, at any meeting held as herein above provided in this Canon, so authorize, Vestrymen may be elected for terms not to exceed four years, the congregation to determine the length of terms and the number of Vestrymen to be elected for such terms.

CANON XXIII

Of Alienation of Real Property.

No part of the real property of any parish shall be alienated, exchanged or encumbered for any purpose, without the consent of the congregation in interest, in a duly constituted meeting called for that purpose, and in addition thereto, in case of consecrated property, or any church or chapel which has been used solely for divine service, the consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. Provided, however, that this consent shall not apply to abandoned property.

The Bishop or, in the event of his inability to act, the other Ecclesiastical Authority, may, with the advice and consent of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, or the Executive Committee of said Trustees, grant, bargain, sell, convey, transfer, and deliver any other property accruing to the Church generally in the Diocese of Virginia, unless prohibited by the instrument by which title to such property is acquired; and the proceeds of such sale shall be invested by such Trustees, or its Executive Committee, as they may deem advisable.

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
