St. Peter's Mission, Richmond, Henrico Parish.

ORGANIZATION

CANON I, SECTION 1. A list of all the ordained Ministers, or Clergy, of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in this Diocese, with their post office addresses, and their respective cures, stations or positions, shall be prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority and kept, corrected up to date, on file at the headquarters of the Diocese.

This official list of the Clergy of the Diocese shall be prima facie evidence of a Clergyman's canonical residence, and his cure, station or position.

SECTION 2. The right of any Clergyman to vote in the Council shall, if denied or disputed, be determined by the Council itself according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, whether his name be inserted in, or omitted from, the said list.

SECTION 3. The said list of the Clergy of the Diocese, corrected up to date, with the names of those entitled to vote in the Council designated thereon, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the roll of the Clerical delegates entitled to vote shall be called therefrom.

Canon II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make a roll of the Lay Delegates and Alternates certified to him as duly elected, with the Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches, or Missionary Jurisdictions represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall thereupon appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one Clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to which shall be referred the Credentials of all Lay Delegates and which shall make its report to the Council promptly. But until this report be received the roll as made and called by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authentic roll of Lay Delegates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, the Committee on Credentials shall hear the evidence presented and report its judgment thereon. Upon this report the Council shall determine the matter unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present the Council shall decide to hear the whole case de novo.

RULES OF ORDER

I. ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. The Council shall be opened on the first day with a brief service of prayer, and on the second day with a celebration of the Holy Communion, at which time there may be a sermon by a preacher selected by the Bishop.

2. Upon completion of the service on the first day the Secretary shall report the number present of the clergy canonically connected with the Diocese ac-

cording to the list prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and the number present of the lay delegates, certified to the Secretary as duly elected. The credentials of the lay delegates shall thereupon be referred to a committee on credentials composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates appointed by

- 3. Except as otherwise provided herein, the following order of business shall be observed:
 - (a) Report of the Secretary.
 - (b) Election of the Secretary of the Diocese, who is ex-officio the Secretary of the Council.
 - (c) Adoption of Rules of Order.
- (d) Adoption of a program of the Council prepared by the Secretary and the Committee on the Dispatch of Business, in consultation with rector of the host parish.
- (e) Reading of pastoral addresses.
- (f) Appointment of committees.
- (g) Reports of standing committees, commissions and boards.
- (h) Reports of special committees.
- (i) Communications from Convocations.
- (j) Unfinished business.
- (k) New business.
- (l) Adjournment.
- 4. (A) There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise disrected:
 - (1) Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the pastoral addresses of the Bishops made to the Council, with particular direction to report to the Council upon any recommendations made in the pastoral addresses.
 - (2) Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.
 - (3) Committee on New Parishes, whenever such a committee is needed.
 - (4) Committee on Canons, to whom shall be referred all motions to amend either the Canons or the Constitution of the Diocese.
 - (5) Committee on Nominations to Diocesan Corporations. to whom shall be reported all vacancies in membership of such boards for which nominations must be made by the Council, and to whom all nominations for membership of any of such boards shall be referred for their consideration before being presented

to the Council. The Committee shall also nominate seven persons for election by the Council to represent this Diocese on the Virginia Council of Churches.

(6) Committee on the Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, the hour for the Council to sit as a Missionary Council, and other matters pertaining to the orderly dispatch of business.

(7) A Committee on Minutes, consisting of three clergymen and three laymen, who shall hear and approve the reading of the Minutes of the Council after each day's session.

(1) There shall be appointed by the President at each annual meeting of the Council a commission on resolutions to serve at the next annual meeting of the Council and at any special meetings that might be called before the next annual meeting. As many proposed resolutions as possible shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Diocese at least two weeks before the annual meeting of the Council so that they may be edited, mimeographed and mailed to all deputies and to the Chairman of the commission on resolutions.

(2) The President shall have authority at each Council after making appointments of standing committees for such Council to appoint the Chairman and so many of the other members of such committees as he may think proper, who shall serve during the ensuing interim and at the next meeting of the Council.

5. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Committee on Finance, and for Deputies to the Synod of the Province and the General Convention shall be made on the first day of the Council, and the names shall be printed, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other committees, officers or representatives as may need to be chosen. In these elections, after the second ballot, the two names receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

In every election by ballot, when two or more persons are to be chosen, any ballot which does not have the specified number of names shall not be counted by the tellers.

6. The election of the elective members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the members of the elective committees and the Deputies to the General Convention and to the Provincial Synod, shall be conducted as follows:

(a) Preparation of Ballots.

Immediately after the nominations have been made, the Secretary of the Convention shall have ballots prepared, giving the names of the various nominees in groups; following the names of the nominees there shall be three columns designated "First Choice", "Second Choice", and "Third Choice".

(b) Method of Voting.

The voters should check in these columns the names of the nominees for whom they vote, checking in the first column their choices as many in number as there are positions to be filled, and checking the same number of second choices in the second column, and so on.

(c) Defective Ballots.

If any delegate votes two or three times for the same person for the same position, his second and third choices shall be void.

(d) Counting the Ballots.

After counting the ballots, the tellers shall report as elected the required number of nominees who receive the highest votes in the first column, if a majority of the delegates has voted for him.

If any of the required number fail to receive a majority in the first column, the tellers shall add to the number of delegates voting for him in the first column, the number of delegates voting for him in the second column, and if these make a majority of the delegates voting, the tellers shall report him as

If in the first two columns the required number of positions have not been filled, the tellers shall add to the number of delegates voting in the first two columns, the number of delegates voting for him in the third column, and reported as elected any delegate for whom a majority of the delegates have voted.

If any of the required number who received the "high" vote in the first column fails to have a majority of the delegates voting for him in all three columns, the tellers shall in turn take the next highest in the first column and add to the number of delegates voting for him in that column, the number of delegates voting for him in the other columns, and if in the three columns the tellers find that a majority of the delegates have voted for him, the tellers shall report him as elected.

(e) Reporting the Election.

The tellers shall report the results of the balloting to the President of the Convention.

II. RULES OF PROCEDURE.

7. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; every resolution shall be referred to its proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.

- 8. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the
- 9. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.
- 10. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate. but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.
- 11. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 12. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?"; until decided all debate and amendments are precluded.
- 13. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.
- 14. When a member desires to speak in debate or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personalities.
- 15. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.
- 16. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 17. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.
- 18. The vote on all questions shall be taken by order, whenever as many as five members request it.
- 19. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed in-
- 20. Every member who may be in the house when any question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- 21. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.
- 22. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, provided such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

- 23. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported up by the Finance Committee, or in their absence, by a special committee.
- 24. Reports of all committees shall be in writing. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall, without obligation, so direct, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

III. GENERAL.

25. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

26. The President may, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

27. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

28. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

JOURNAL

OF THE

155th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia

Church of the Epiphany, Richmond, Va., Wednesday, May 24, 1950.

The 155th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia opened in the Church of the Epiphany, Richmond, with the service of morning prayer conducted by Bishop Mason, assisted by the rector, the Rev. Rufus J. Womble.

The Bishop called the Council to order at 10:30 A. M. The Secretary reported a quorum of both clergy and laity present. The Rev. Samuel B. Chilton was elected Secretary of the Diocese. Upon his election Mr. Chilton appointed the Rev. W. F. Burke and the Rev. David Lewis, Jr., Assistant Secretaries of Council. The Bishop appointed the following men on the Committee on Credentials: The Rev. John A. Gray, Mr. Norwood Clary and Mr. Robert L. Brown, and Mr. D. Edward Bray. Alternate. This Committee was asked to meet immediately.

The Rev. Mr. Ribble, Chairman of the Committee on Rules for Elections, moved that the rules of order of the last Council be adopted with the addition of one amendment by addition to the first paragraph in Section 5. This motion was passed. (See Rules of Order.)

The Bishop recognized the rector of the host parish, the Rev. Mr. Rufus J. Womble, who welcomed the members of Council to his parish, and then introduced the Junior Warden of the Church of Epiphany, Mr. Thomas L. Ruffin, who spoke on the history of Epiphany Church and of their pleasure in entertaining the Council.

The Rev. Mr. Womble moved the adoption of the program as printed, with one change, that the report of the Woman's Auxiliary be heard at 12:15 P. M. in place of the Report of the Committee on New Parishes and Congregations, which will be heard at 2 o'clock. It was ruled by the chair that the Report on the Washington Election Plan be heard immediately after lunch Wednesday. The program as amended was adopted.

Bishop Goodwin then read a brief pastoral address:

To the Clerical and Lay Members of the 155th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

I bring you greetings in the name of the Lord. May the Holy Spirit purify our motives, make clear our vision, and strengthen our wills. For there is work to be done, and to its accomplishment the Lord calls us.

My words to you this morning will be brief, for reasons of which I shall speak in a moment.

First, may we pause to remember before God those, who from the ranks of our clergy, have passed into the joy of Paradise:

THE REVEREND JOHN YATES DOWNMAN, D. D.

The Rev. John Yates Downman, D. D., was born in Lancaster County, Virginia, May 23, 1858, and died in Richmond on June 28, 1950. Graduating from the Virginia Theological Seminary in 1882, he was ordained deacon by Bishop Whittle, and advanced to the priesthood in the following year by Bishop Peterkin, of West Virginia. He received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Washington and Lee University in 1908 and was a Deputy from the Diocese of Virginia to the General Convention of 1928.

His first charge was the two combined rural parishes, St. John's and St. David's, in King William County, which he served for three years. He was then assistant minister in Camden Parish, Danville, and in 1888-89 he was rector of Christ Church, Greenville, in South Carolina,

In 1889 he came to Richmond as rector of the newly organized congregation tion of All Saints, which had been established as a mission by the Monumental Church, the venerable mother of churches in Richmond.

By the people of this generation Dr. Downman will long be remembered and honored for his ministry at All Saints' Church. Taking charge of & small newly organized congregation in what was then the westernmost section of the city of Richmond, by the ability of his leadership and the power of his preaching he trained and led his people along the developing ways of growing and distinctive life. The notable features of musical service and the simwhich of worship in a spacious and beautiful church building today are the mornment to Dr. Downman's own character as he lived and taught the strength of simple faith in the old unchanging fundamentals; and their expression in the glorious beauty of worship.

Dr. Downman was a son of the Church of Bishops Johns and Whittle. Encompromising in his own convictions, and in his adherence to the teachings and ideals of the great leaders of the Church in his youth, he was ever a strong and effective preacher of the Gospel. For many years he was one of the leaders in the work of the diocese, in all its missionary and promotional work.

THE REVEREND JOSEPH BRAGG DUNN, D. D.

The Rev. Joseph Bragg Dunn, D. D., was born in Petersburg on June 9, 1868, and died at his home in Virginia Beach on October 17, 1949. He graduated at the University of Virginia in 1890 with the degree of Master of Arts, and in later years he received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Hampden-Sydney College.

After spending a year at the Virginia Theological Seminary, he took the remainder of his theological course at the Episcopal Theological School. Cambridge, Massachusetts. He graduated in 1894 and was ordained deacon and priest by Bishop Randolph, of the Diocese of Southern Virginia.

Sent as a deacon to the charge of Randolph Parish in Halifax County, in the Diocese of Southern Virginia, he held that as his first charge from 1894 to 1897. He then served as rector of St. Paul's Church, Suffolk, Virginia, for thirteen years, and in 1920 became rector of St. Paul's Church, Lynchburg. He remained in this charge for ten years, until a distressing development of tuberculosis forced his retirement from active pastoral work, in 1920. He eventually was restored to health but the ravages of his disease upon his throat and vocal cords made it impossible for him to resume full active charge of a parish. During his later years while living in Richmond, he found a field of opportunity in holding services for vacant parishes and teaching a Bible class. He was editor of the Southern Churchman for two years from 1924 to 1926. He was a clerical deputy to the General Convention from the Diocese of Southern Virginia for five conventions consecutively, from 1910 to 1922.

Dr. Dunn was always a student of philosophy and history, and a patient delver into the hidden recesses of historical by-ways. He wrote and published a historical sketch of Nansemond County, in southern Virginia, and a book of his own pastoral experiences and spiritual growth, under the title of In the Service of the King. An active and vigorous leader in the work of the Church as long as his health permitted, he served his day; and through the years of his disability he found and showed in his own experience the truth that John Milton learned in his blindness: "They also serve who only stand and wait."

THE REVEREND GEORGE PEYTON CRAIGHILL

The Rev. George Peyton Craighill was born in Lynchburg on October 4 1878, and died at Millwood, in Clarke County, on January 4, 1950. After his college training at the Virginia Military Institute he entered the Virginia Theological Seminary, from which he graduated in 1905. Ordained both deacon and priest by Bishop Randolph, he spent his diaconate as assistant at St. John's Church, Roanoke. He became rector of Randolph Parish in Halifax County in 1906 and held that charge for four years. In 1910 he came to Richmond as the rector of the Church of the Epiphany, in Henrico Parish After eight years in that charge he went to Shelburne Parish, in Loudoun County, and was the rector of St. James' Church, Leesburg, for twenty-four years, from 1918 to 1942. Desiring to retire from active pastoral work because of ill health, he removed to Millwood. But the great and pressing need of elergymen for parishes made vacant by war conditions presented a challenge which he could not refuse; and he accepted the rectorship of Cunnings ham Chapel Parish, in Clarke County, in 1943. He continued in that charge until his death in the first week of 1950.

Mr. Craighill found his great field of service in the pastoral care of his people and as a parish priest. Here he earned and received the love of his parishioners, as friend as well as pastor, and as a beloved fellow-worker by his brethren of the clergy. In that capacity he made proof of his ministry faithfully until the summons came to higher fields of service.

Now may I present to you those who have, since our last Council, come to us from the Seminary or from other dioceses:

The Rev. Messrs. Thom W. Blair, John B. Shinberger, and John E. Williams-from the Virginia Seminary, and Mr. Heins from Union Seminary, New York. Also the Rev. Messrs. Ralph E. Fall, Leon N. Laylor, Joseph L. Brown, Jr., Gary K. Price, William F. Hanckel, Emmett E. Hoy, Jr., J. Raymond Denton and W. Russell Bowie.

Of two things only am I going to speak to you at this time: first, of the survey now being conducted, of our Diocesan Missionary Work and expanding missionary opportunities within the Diocese, and of our need to face the facts and the consequent challenge therein presented to us.

The Special Council that met in October, 1948, for the election of a Suffragan Bishop expressed its sense that a special campaign for church expansion within the Diocese be undertaken as soon as possible, and requested the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society to proceed to that end. By the time of our annual Council a year ago, it had become evident that a campaign should not be inaugurated until a proper survey of needs and opportunities had been made. The Council of 1949 therefore approved the proposed survey and made provision therefor.

We sought counsel and help from our fellow-workers on the staff of the National Council. Many of their suggestions and much of their plan we adopted, but certain features of the procedure have been our own. All the meld work of the survey has been done by two men—Bishop Gibson and Protessor Dennis; they have worked under pressure of time, and against handicaps of bad weather and sickness to present to the Evaluating Committee their findings in the four important fields of the Northern Urban-Suburban Area, the Metropolitan Richmond Area (I use their phraseology), the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, and the Negro churches and missions. The rural field and certain diocesan institutions remain yet to be studied. More detailed information regarding procedure will doubtless be given when the survey and evaluation report is made this afternoon. At this moment I would express to Bishop Gibson and Professor Dennis and to the members of the Evaluation Committee the deep appreciation of the Diocese for the faithful, the tactful, the skilful way in which they have accomplished this major part of their task. As we consider their report, may God give us humility, and readiness of mind and will to advance His cause in this Diocese as the way, made so evident, opens before us. Like the Nation-Wide Campaign thirty years ago, this Survey and the conscientious carrying out of its recommendations may mark a notable forward step in the life of the Diocese.

Of one other thing only do I speak to you this morning, and that is, of all things—of Bishops. For we have, as of this year 1950, an unusually large and varied assortment of them.

I wonder if this Council realizes of what active help and service Bishop Tucker continues to be in the work of the Diocese. He has confirmation appointments, perhaps not quite so many, just like the rest of us, only without financial remuneration. To every call for special services, anniversary addresses, and a multitude of other requests, he responds whenever humanly possible. He gives himself without reserve to the active leadership of many important and good causes, such as the International Christian University in Japan, the Overseas Department of our National Council, and many others. If there is ever any wisdom or virtue in a decision or suggestion that I may make, you may rightly guess that, the night before I stepped up the road and had a chat with Bishop Tucker,—And so, to sound for this Council the spiritual note that, under God, must lift our vision and inspire our action, we turned naturally to this great leader of the Church and asked him to be the preacher at our Council service tonight. May God grant him strength and length of days among us.

Though less than nine months have passed since Bishop Gibson's ordination and consecration, I am sure that no Bishop of the Diocese has ever worked as hard, met more people, covered more ground, and studied more situations than he has since last September. Immediately upon his return from the General Convention he threw himself wholeheartedly into the exacting work of the Survey. Without him, what has been accomplished would have been impossible. I am grateful to this Council for his election and alike we are grateful to God for giving us so wise and faithful a leader.

The passing of time, and the passing of certain General Church canons makes this meeting of Council the last one before Bishop Mason's retirement from his official, active capacity as Senior Suffragan Bishop. It seems quite ironical that, under the Canons, he must retire because of having reached a constitutional age limit, when he can still beat his juniors in the Diocese at golf, and other activities. But the General Convention had no choice but to accept his resignation effective on his next birthday, which fortunately for all of us, will not be until the late fall.

His characteristic gifts were the gifts of the humble and devoted servant. of his Master and his fellow-men. As the servant of all, he became great among us. He never wavered in his loyalty, never presumed in his office, never failed as a friend.

Other occasion will provide opportunity for the Diocese to give more adequate expression of their admiration of and affection for Bishop Mason, Today, overcoming a reticence born of genuine humility, he has agreed to give the Pastoral Address to Council.

So to him I now gladly give place.

At the conclusion of that past of his address about the clergy who have died during the past year, Bishop Goodwin asked I ishop Gibson to have prayers. During the address he spoke extemporaneously of the successful work that Miss Martha C. Pray did in the Diocese as Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education, and of the encouraging example of two seniors in the Virginia Seminary, Mr. William C. Heffner and Mr. William D. Eddy, in volunteering to go as missionaries to Okinawa and Japan, respectively.

Lishop Mason then gave his pastoral address:

As this may be my last official report for the Archdeaeonry of the Blue Ridge, I want to give a brief outline of things done during the years and of present problems and encouragements. I cannot realize that my resignation as Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese becomes effective at the close of this year in accordance with a canon law that I helped to make and of which I heartily approve. But, though I can hardly believe I have reached the age limit, the record still stands and so my official responsibility for the Archdeaconry will soon come to an end. Also we have a band of faithful and devoted workers who have reached or are approaching the age of retirement. Some of our equipment, too, mostly in the form of worn-out automobiles, is afflicted with the same fatal malady-old age. Though I must leave most of the plans for the future to the Bishop and those appointed by him to consider and act upon the report of the Survey Committee, these immediate difficulties I must continue to struggle with for the rest of the year.

It is hard to replace our women workers with others of the right type. Conditions have changed, training schools are few and a real missionary spirit is rarely to be found. Also salaries in the Archdeaconry are still far below those to be had elsewhere.

On the encouraging side, however, is the fact that our mountain people are able to do more for themselves and to assume greater responsibility in the work of the Church. At one mission the people, with the help of their rector, carry on the work without aid from outside. In another they assume responsibility and keep things going for a month or more each year while the worker in charge is on vacation. At three important points we have our own trained mountain girls in charge and doing good work. This is what we have been praying for and working towards and it is a real joy to see such things taking place. The spirit of the people has changed, they are looking upon the Church as their own and not something brought in from outside. Their offerings have increased many fold since the early days when often the alms basin would be presented with only a few pennies inside. In contrast to this, the mite box offerings from all the missions this past Easter amounted to more than a thousand dollars. One family on Wyatt Mountain, not a member of which had a regular job, contributed fourteen dollars—more than the total offering from all the mite boxes in some of our outside churches of the diocese. Attendance at services also, taking the field as a whole, has been greater this year, I believe, than ever before.

There are several reasons for this increased interest and cooperation on the part of our people. First, I would mention the enthusiasm of our workers. We have a staff of real missionaries to whom in large part the credit is due. Secondly, we have better equipment with which to work. During most of the forty-three years that I have been connected with the Archdeaconry, except in war time and for the seven and a half years that I was rector of Christ Church, Charlottesville, I have been putting up buildings of various kind in the field—churches, parish halls, homes for workers or houses for clothing sales. Funds for our largest and most expensive churches were given as memorials. Of course, we had to hunt for donors but, with the help of Archdeacon Neve's faith and prayers, we were fairly successful in our findings. Also, we had another system which served us well. There were several church buildings that were no longer being used. We asked for these and, if the request was granted, we took them down with the help of our band of very efficient mountain carpenters, moved them from fifty to a hundred miles to some needy point in the Archdeaconry and put them up again as good as new. Recently I have dared to do something that I would have been afraid to undertake in the earlier days—that is to begin to build three churches with parish halls combined without having the money actually in sight. Two of these are now completed and paid for and I have the promise that the third will be taken over as a memorial. Better and more churchly buildings give our people room to expand and greater incentive to work and worship. Another help in arousing interest has been visual education. Two of our

workers have shown great ability in securing films of the right kind and in using them to good advantage. Then a special help towards increased attendance at church services has been our comparatively new system of transportation. We have purchased six second-hand public school buses at prices from \$250.00 to \$400.00 each. On Sundays these buses have their regular routes and bring men, women and children from miles around to worship in the church.

Work at our two new points, on Wyatt Mountain-which is really an old mission brought to life again—and on High Top Mountain has been going very well. Each place now has an attractive church building and a convenient home for workers. But always there is something more that we want to do: so we are planning for a kind of cafeteria or lunch room for the school children at each of these points. The mission workers are also the teachers of the public schools and receive part of their salaries from the state but cannot get state aid for lunches until they comply with rather strict regulations requiring separate lunch rooms and expensive equipment. In the meantime, however, with the help of church friends, they have been serving hot lunches each day to about eighty needy children.

One of our most trying problems, financially, in the Archdeaconry is to keep the automobiles going. These are so necessary to the staff in doing mission work. Yet they have a way of breaking down, sometimes two or three at a time, and we are put to it to find money to replace them even with second-hand cars in good condition.

Finally, I must mention a handicap in trying to meet the spiritual needs of our people that has given us concern. The recent shortage of ordained clergymen in the Archdeaconry has made it difficult to have the service of the Holy Communion at some of our missions as often as we would like. The new minister at Luray will be a real help in this respect in looking after the missions connected with his parish. The Rev. Dudley Boogher, we are glad to say, is not leaving us entirely. He will still have charge of St. John the Baptist near Ivy but must give up three of the other points he has been serving. The Rev. D. C. Loving also, who has been going to Buck Mountain for communion services, can no longer do this in addition to his heavy schedule at the Blue Ridge School. Two of our most valued lay workers in the Archdeaconry, George and Freeman Fisk, wish to enter the ministry and we hope they may soon complete the requirements for ordination. This will take time, however, even though one of them had already been ordained in another church before coming into ours. But before I have to give up active work in the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, I am hoping to see all of our missions having their regular communion services and our mountain people taking their part more and more in the life of the Church. In the words of Archdeacon Neve: May God make them and all of us a thousandfold more useful than ever before.

After this Pishop Mason spoke extemporaneously on the nature of his ministry and his deep appreciation of his oppormnities.

Bishop Goodwin then presented to the Secretary the Official Acts of the Bishops of the Diocese. (See Appendix.)

Mr. Bernard P. Chamberlain moved that the Secretary of Council write a letter to Miss Martha Pray stating the appreciation of Council for her excellent service and he moved further that a letter be written to each of the two Seminary students from our Diocese, graduating this year, who are going to the missionary fields of Japan and Okinawa. This motion passed.

The chair called for matters of reference.

A considerable number of amendments to the Constitution and Canons was presented and referred to the Committee on Constitutions and Canons. (See report of Committee.)

The applications of St. Paul's, Bailey's Cross Roads, Weddell Memorial, Richmond, and St. Luke's, Wellington Villa, to become Mission Churches were referred to the Committee on New Parishes and Congregations.

The report on the audit of the accounts of the Diocese and of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia were presented and referred to proper committees.

Various resolutions were received and referred to the Committee on Resolutions. (See report of Committee.)

The budget for the Program of the Diocese for 1950 was presented and referred to the Committee on Budget.

There followed the report of the Committee on Credentials, that all credentials of lay delegates to Council are in order with the exception of the three missions requesting admission as Mission Churches. The Committee recommended that these be acted upon after the question of the change of status had been decided. This report was accepted.

Noon day prayers were conducted by the Rev. Palmer Campbell.

There followed the report of the Woman's Auxiliary by the Diocesan President, Mrs. Ida B. Wellford:

REPORT TO COUNCIL OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

Bishop Goodwin, Delegates and Visitors:

This is the fourth message I have been privileged to bring from the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Virginia to the Council, and I do appreciate your wanting this report and taking a few minutes from your busy session to listen to it. The year 1948-49 was a very active and successful one and again it is my joy to tell you of the wonderful spirit of fellowship and cooperation one feels everywhere in the women of the church banded together in trying to help carry out God's purpose in these critical days in which we live.

I have some statistics here that have encouraged us, and I think will be of interest to you. In 1946 the total raised by the Woman's Auxiliary for everything was \$69,045.91; in 1947, \$83,729.70; in 1948, \$96,207.80; in 1949, \$114,151.43. Of the last sum, \$22,402.76 was spent in parishes. The report for 1949 shows 8,303 members of the Woman's Auxiliary, of which number 6,323 have Blue Boxes. There are 890 new members,

This is a good report but as our goal is to have every baptized woman a registered member of the Woman's Auxiliary and the owner of a Blue Box—and these figures show there are about 2,000 members who do not have them—we should not have any complacent feeling of ambition that is satisfied. This year our effort is to cooperate in every way possible with the pattern set by the triennial meeting working for that "One World in Christ."

Mrs. Sherman, our National Executive Secretary, has written that, being an Auxiliary to the National Council, we must be ready and willing to try to help carry on the work left destitute by the undersubscription to the One World in Christ Fund. Miss Beardsley, our National United Thank Offering Custodian, gives a pathetic account of the just appeals for \$800,000.00 for necessary buildings—when \$200,000.00 was all the allotment possible from the United Thank Offering of the last triennial. Many of the pleas.

have come down through the years, so you see there is no way you can "rest on your laurels" in this world of today.

Last week I was called to Fredericksburg to a conference with the Canterbury Club of the Mary Washington College there and was told their need for an Episcopal Diocesan Student Center was desperate. This is to be helped by the "Bishop's Request Fund" (one of our objectives). Bishop Goodwin tells me last year this fund came to \$1,155,16.

The Students Committee said if our Woman's Auxiliary would underwrite the \$15,000.00 building planned, for \$1,500.00 a year for ten years, it will be put up promptly. I have only just heard this, but I have started talking. It is already one of our objectives. St. George's Woman's Auxiliary of Fredericksburg has given \$100.00 a year for the past four years. Their lot is bought and paid for.

I believe among our 150 Branches this sum can easily be raised year by year as things are now, but there is uneasiness over a ten-year pledge. I would like very much to talk this over if possible with the College Board.

The youth work, we trust and feel, will be greatly benefitted by the interest created by all the discussion since our annual meeting last fall as to the best way to handle it. The question being whether to continue Juniors as they were or to merge them into Junior Girls Friendly—the latter is backed by the National Church with literature and any other help it can give. A vote was asked from every parish in the Diocese.

It has been decided to increase the age limit of the Juniors and they can continue as such as long as they want to. They are advised to use the Junior Girls Friendly literature as needed.

It has been decided to have Junior Girls Friendly groups where desired, starting as young as they want to, each parish to make its own decision as to which it wants.

Now this is where you come in. Please help us to have some youth organization in every parish, if humanly possible, with a good leader.

We will need these leaders of tomorrow and they are in great need now of the leaders of today to train and to inspire them.

Finally, I want to express my sincere appreciation to you, Bishop Goodwin, to Bishop Mason and to Bishop Gibson, and to each one of you clergy and churchmen for your unfailing cooperation and help. We have never "called in vain." Thank you!

The Rev. James Beckwith gave a report of the Virginia Council of Churches and introduced the Rev. Roland P. Riddick, pastor of Barton Heights Methodist Church who is also Chairman of the Commission on Finance of the Virginia Council of Churches. Dr. Riddick spoke on the relevancy of Church

comity and the importance of all churches working together in the Virginia Council of Churches.

A resolution moved by the Rev. Mr. Beckwith was referred to the Committee on Resolutions. (See report of Committee.) The Council adjourned for lunch at one o'clock.

The Council reconvened at 2:12 o'clock. The Rev. Mr. Beckwith continued his report on the Virginia Council of Churches. He gave the report of the committee appointed at the last Council to study principles of Comity as advocated by the Comity Commission of the Virginia Council. On motion of Mr. Beckwith, duly seconded, the following statement that had been adopted by the Virginia Council of Churches was approved:

- 1. The Virginia Council of Churches recommends that committees on comity be set up by all local councils of churches and all ministerial associations in rural or urban areas.
- 2. It recommends that the following "Comity Principles" be considered in connection with the establishment of such committees:

COMITY PRINCIPLES

I. Purpose

- 1. It shall be the policy of the Comity Committee—by investigation, conferences, advice and recommendation—to aid in securing the organization and distribution of the churches of the city (or county) so as to promote primarily the advancement of the Kingdom of God: seeking that no portion of the city (or county) shall be without adequate church facilities; that each church shall have a reasonable opportunity for growth and development; that no portion of the city (or county) shall be overchurched; and that every church may feel the cooperative support of the other churches of the city (or county).
- 2. In addition to the adjustment of specific cases through common counsel, the Committee will seek to develop a comprehensive plan based on the comparative study of community needs. It will endeavor to effect modifications in the number, placement, equipment, and program of the churches to match changes in the community, such as growth or decline of population, changed character of different areas of the community, emergent needs and the challenge of specific deficiencies or evils.
- 3. The Council (or Ministerial Association) recognizes that there are certain conscientious limitations felt by some Christian bodies in the matter of Comity between denominations and gives assurance that such conscientious convictions will always be respected by members of the Council (or Ministerial Association).

II. Plan of Operation

- 1. The Committee will seek to implement its conclusions by rendering advisory judgments on specific issues which may come before it, as reached through the democratic processes of mutual discussion and finding their authority in their essential reasonableness and the obligations of Christian solidarity and good will. It is believed that the joint wisdom of the churches arrived at through common counsel will lead to the acceptance of advisory judgments by the parties concerned.
- 2. Before a cooperating congregation or denomination takes definitive action in such matters as the organization of a church, purchase of church property, the relocation of a church, a radical change in its program, or the abandonment of a field, it should make its intentions known to the Comity Committee and seek its counsel.
- 3. This provision should apply equally to Sunday Schools and missions, and the same course should be followed in any preliminary action such as the establishment of a temporary preaching point or Sunday School.
- 4. If option is taken on a property with view to purchase, it shall be with the understanding that such action is tentative and will in no way bind the judgment of the Committee.

III. Composition

- 1. The Comity Committee shall consist of the resident executives of each of the cooperating denominations or some person formally designated as a deputy for each, in addition to one minister and one lay person elected from each cooperating denomination upon its nomination. Recognized experts in community planning and welfare may be added to the Committee as members at large in numbers not to exceed 20 per cent of the elective membership.
- 2. The officers shall consist of a chairman elected by the Council (or ministerial association) in the same manner and for the same term as other efficers, and a secretary and sub-committee elected annually by the Committee.

IV. Exceptions

- 1. The Council (or Ministerial Association) assumes that the usual and regular method of carrying on permanent work is through congregations exclusively affiliated with some one denomination.
- 2. Exceptions of two sorts are recognized: (a) When the community is not fully self-determining, as in the case of a public housing project or inmates of an institution. Such situations may preclude the organization of a denominational church and require a special type of interdenominationally related congregation. (b) When the community involved definitely desires an interdenominational church and requests the sponsorship of the Council of Churches. In such a case the Comity Committee may recommend organization on one of the following patterns:

(1) A denominationally organized and related church with ecclesiastical standing in one single denomination, but operated as a community church with specific agreements, e. g., to receive "associate" members without requiring them to withdraw from their former church membership.

(2) A federated or multi-denominational church which has connection and standing in two or more denominations. The terms of relation with the denominations concerned shall be expressed in a local constitution and by-laws adopted by the congregation and approved by the denominations.

3. In some communities, or larger areas, it may become desirable to effect a mutual exchange of fields. In others it may seem desirable for two or more churches to develop an integrated or cooperative program in some particular phase of their work, that the needs of the community may be more adequately met.

4. In all such cases (2 and 3 above) the Comity Committee will give its advice and aid upon request, or it may make such suggestions on its own initiative.

3. The Virginia Council of Churches calls attention to the fact that more elaborate comity principles, drawn up by Dr. Douglass for the Conference on Church and Urban Life in June, 1947, can be secured from the office of the Federal Council of Churches.

Mr. Shannon of St. Marks, Richmond, moved that the Committee on Resolutions draw up suitable resolution regarding the ministry and contributions of Bishop Mason. This was approved unanimously by the Council.

The Rev. Mr. Mathews gave the report of the committee appointed last year by the council to study the Washington election plan and after presenting the report in detail the committee recommended the approval of this plan for the Diocese of Virginia. Mr. Lewis Williams moved that this recommendation be postponed for discussion until Thursday A. M. Mr. Sands moved that the motion be laid on the table until next Council. This motion was lost. Mr. Williams' motion was lost 120 to 62. It was moved and seconded that the recommendations of the committee be accepted. There followed considerable discussion. The motion was carried 136 to 55. The chair pointed out the fact that this motion now became an addition to the rules of order. (See rule number 6, which is the recommendation as adopted.)

The Rev. Henry Johnston gave the report of the Committee on New Parishes and Congregations:

The Committee on New Parishes and Congregations submits the following report to the Council:

The Committee has received the applications of three missions seeking to be admitted as Mission Churches. They are as follows:

 St. Paul's Chapel, Bailey's Cross Roads, Va. (in Fairfax Parish—Rev. Edward E. Tate, Minister-in-Charge).

 Weddell Memorial Episcopal Church, National and Kemp Streets, Richmond, Va. (in Henrico Parish—Rev. S. S. Spathey, Minister-in-Charge).

3. St. Luke's Church, Wellington Villa (in Fairfax Parish—Mr. Alex Robertson, Virginia Seminary student; to be assigned here after graduation, June, 1950).

All three of these applications come under Canon XVI, which requires that in order to be admitted as a Mission Church a Mission must have at least twenty-five communicants in the group and must have disbursed during the preceding year at least \$500.00 for church purposes, as shown by its last report to the Diocesan authorities. It must also (under Canon XVI) have the approval of its Parish Council, the Bishop of the Diocese, and of the Diocesan Council.

The Committee has examined the applications of these three Missions and has found that they all have met satisfactorily the requirements of Canon XVI. The Committee recommends that each of these Missions be admitted to the Diocese of Virginia as a Mission Church.

It was moved, seconded and passed that St. Paul's Church, Bailey's Cross Roads in Fairfax Parish, be admitted to the status of Mission Church in the diocese.

It was moved, seconded and passed that Weddell Memorial Church, Henrico Parish, be admitted to the status of Mission Church in the diocese.

It was moved, seconded and passed that St. Luke's Church, Wellington Villa, Fairfax Parish, be admitted to the status of Mission Church in the diocese.

The Chairman of the Credentials Committee reported that the credentials of the lay delegates of the above mission churches were in order and, upon his motion duly seconded and passed, those delegates were admitted to seat and vote in this Council.

The first ballot for clerical and lay members of the Standing Committee was taken. The first ballot for clerical and lay deputies to the Provincial Synod, to be held at Wheeling, West Virginia, October 17-19, was taken.

· Tishop Goodwin then asked Mr. Edmund Campbell of St. Mary's Church, Arlington, Chairman of the Coordinating Committee for the Diocesan Survey, to report to the Council.

Mr. Campbell moved, and it was seconded and passed, that the Council resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole and that the present officers of the Council be the officers of the Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Campbell then presented several recommendations from the Coordinating Committee which were approved by the Committee of the Whole but which will be presented again to Council for adoption.

Mr. Campbell stated the report on the Niven property was referred to the Committee of Council on the Niven property.

Fishop Gibson spoke of the planning of the survey and the work which he and Dr. Dennis have done since November 1, 1949. He reported that although they have worked diligently and almost continuously since that date, at present they have completed the survey for only half of the diocese in the areas Alexandria-Arlington-Fairfax, Metropolitan Richmond, the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge and the Missionary Work in the Negro churches and missions in the diocese.

The Rev. Herbert A. Donovan read the report of the Evaluation Committee on the Survey of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

Mr. Campbell moved, and it was seconded and passed, that the suggestions of that Evaluation Report be referred to the Eoard of Mountain Work.

The Rev. David Lewis, Jr. read the report of the Evaluation Committee on the survey of the work of the Diocese of Virginia in its Negro parishes and missions. It was moved, seconded and passed that the recommendations of this report be referred to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Rev. Aston Hamilton, D.D. then spoke to the report in terms of the unity of the diocese and the needs of Negro work.

It was moved, seconded and passed that we arise from the Committee as a Whole and reassemble as Council.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the secretary of the Council cast the unanimous vote of Council for the nominees for membership on the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society presented by Convocations. This was done and they were declared elected.

On the report of the first ballot for membership on the Standing Committee the Rev. Messrs. Herbert A. Donovan, C. J. Gibson and F. B. Comer Lile were declared elected clerical members. The Messrs. Ivey F. Lewis, Blake T. Newton and A. A. Smoot were declared elected lay members.

The first ballot for members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society was taken.

It was moved and passed that the Diocesan Council resume its sitting as a Committee on the Whole. Mr. Campbell introduced the Rev. B. B. Comer Lile who presented the report of the Evaluation Committee on the Alexandria-Arlington-Fairfax area.

Mr. Campbe'l cal'ed on Mr. James Ayers of St. Stephen's Church, Richmond, to make a preliminary report of the Evaluation Committee on the Richmond area. Both of these reports were received and referred to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Mr. Campbell pointed out that the survey has not yet studied the rural areas in small cities and towns and the report of the survey will not be complete until these reports are made. He insisted that the urgency of the situation necessitates careful consideration by the Council of the specific recommendations already made by the Co-ordinating Committee and urged that considerable funds as recommended be raised as soon as possible to begin the new work, the entire sum to be used as capital outlay fund for new work in the Diocese.

Mr. Campbell moved that recommendations be made to Council that these funds be raised. Bishop Gibson spoke to the motion. The motion was that these recommendations be presented to Council for consideration. This motion was passed.

It was moved and seconded that the Committee of the Whole be adjourned and that the Diocese resume sitting as the Diocesan Council.

It was moved and seconded that the acceptance of the entire recommendation of the Co-ordinating Committee be approved.

This motion was passed unanimously. These recommendations were as follows:

(1) That Council appoint a committee to study question of revision of parish lines and matters related thereto and to report findings with recommended canonical changes to Council of 1951.

(The Bishop appointed on this committee Bishop Gibson, Dr. Brydon

and Miss Mary F. Goodwin.)

(2) That attention of Council be called to the Canon on parish councils and that parishes and churches be urged to activate existing councils and to organize them wherever they should exist but do not.

(3) That we refer to the Committee on the State of the Church for report to the Council of 1951 the question of defining terms used in parochial

reports, including especially the following:

(a) A family.

(b) An active communicant.

(c) An inactive communicant.

And to recommend canonical changes that may be needed to put their definitions into effect.

(4) To refer to the Committee on State of the Church for 1951 the fol-

lowing extract from the report of the Survey Committee:

"In a large number of instances parish records and reports are incomplete and/or inaccurate. To assist rectors and vestries in correcting and bringing up to date these parish records, it is recommended that a committee or committees be appointed by Council and charged with responsibility for their respective areas."

(5) That we recommend to the Bishop that he appoint a committee, of which the Chancellor of the Diocese shall be a member, to study titles to cer-

tain properties referred as follows in the report:

"The Status of Two Properties:

In order to clarify the legal status of the two properties named below, it is recommended that a committee be appointed to ascertain the equity in and/or the diocesan relationship to, the following:

(a) The land, and perhaps the building, at St. John's Nursing Home, Ivy.

(b) Summer Rest, near Greenwood, Albemarle County.

Discovering and Listing Scattered Properties.

The survey is unearthing or receiving reports of tracts of land with or without buildings said to belong to the Diocese. It is recommended that a committee be appointed to investigate, to confirm title to, and to list all ascertainable properties of this sort. Illustrations of such cases are:

(a) The diocesan equity, if any, in the property at Ada. This is urgent,

and should be given immediate attention.

(b) A plot of ground several miles north of Miller's Tavern.

(c) The church and land at Rockland Mission."

(The Bishop appointed on the committee to consider this entire fifth recommendation Mr. Archibald G. Robertson, Mr. W. H. Walsh, and Mr. Gordon Lewis.)

(6) To ask the Survey Committee to write out a report on the Episcopal Men's Home in Charlottesville, and to submit it to the Trustees of the Home before the meeting of Council, if possible.

(7) That the report on the Niven property be referred to the Committee

of Council on the Niven Property.

- (8) That the Bishop be requested to appoint a committee which shall inclined the primary members of the Diocesan Board of Christian Social Relations to be named at the June meeting to explore the possibilities of extending the work of this Board and to report their findings to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.
- (9) That the report of the Evaluation Committee on Mountain Work be read at Council.
- (10) That the following canonical changes recommended by the Evaluation Committee on Mountain Work as revised be presented to the Council for approval:
- (a) That Canon 9, Section 5, sub-head (b) Item V be changed to read as follows:

"The Board of Mountain Work composed of two primary members, one being a clergyman, and the other a layman, elected by the Executive Committee, and a chairman and six (6) additional members appointed by the Bishop and approved by the Executive Committee, which shall have charge of all mountain work in the Diocese of Virginia. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocese shall be ex-officio member Secretary-Treasurer of the Board."

- (b) That Canon 10, Section 2, concerning the appointment of an Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge be re-worded and changed to read as follows:
- (a) "Presbyter, be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, may be appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. When appointed, he shall, as representative of the Bishop, have general supervision of the mountain work and be responsible for the promotion thereof. When in the judgment of the Bishop and the said Executive Committee it is necessary, there shall be an associate or an Assistant Archdeacon appointed in like manner and with like powers and duties."

The Coordinating Committee further proposes that there shall be a campaign for funds for capital expenses to meet needs revealed by the survey and ecommended by the Evaluation Committees and approved by the Coordinat-

(a) That the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society shall set the total amount needed after the completion of the survey and shall have charge of conducting the campaign, and of the administration and allotment of expenditure of the money raised.

(b) The time for the campaign is to be Lent, 1951, culminating on Easter Sunday. Before the end of 1950 there shall be a special gifts campaign to enable large givers to contribute in time to include their gifts for income tax purposes this year.

(c) That there be no quotas given to churches but that the campaign be directed to individuals and that all church people of the Diocese be included.

(d) Basing their estimate on that part of the survey now complete, the Committee recommends that the following projects be included in the sum to be raised in the campaign: St. Paul's, Bailey's Cross Roads; St. Luke's, Wellington Villa; Olivet, Franconia, Sharon-Groveton; West Falls Church; Grace-Epiphany, Arlington, Meade Memorial, Alexandria; purchase of Christ Church, Richmond, for a Negro congregation; St. Philip's Church, Richmond; Grace Church, Miller's Tavern; Weddell Memorial and Prince of Peace, Richmond.

The Bishop recognized Dr. Pollard, temporary Dean of Church Schools, who stated that he would present his report by title tomorrow morning. (See Appendix.)

Mr. James Massie submitted by title the report of the Committee on Invested Funds as follows:

"Your Committee has examined the Auditor's Report and lists of funds and securities held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Virginia, referred to the Committee.

The report of A. M. Pullen and Company, certified public accountants, sets forth that the Virginia Trust Company and the First and Merchants National Bank, both of Richmond, Va., are custodians of the funds and securities held by the trustees of the funds of the Diocese, and that the securities representing the invested funds have been inspected and found correct.

Relying upon the accuracy of the above, it is, therefore, the opinion of your Committee that all securities are on hand and that receipts and disbursements accounts of Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, Treasurer of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, have been properly audited and accounted for as of December 31, 1949.

The Rev. Frank Hayes presented by title report of the Board of Evangelism. (See Appendix.)

At the Council service at 8:00 P. M. the Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker, D. D. spoke on the subject "The Responsibility of the Church in the Modern World." The Rt. Rev. F. D. Goodwin, D. D. and the Rev. Messrs. Baird Shinberger and Robert B. Echols conducted the service. When Council reassembled in official session the report from the ballot for deputies to the Provincial Synod was read. The Rev. Messrs. Dudley A. Boogher, Thos. A. Fraser, Jr., Thos. G. Faulkner, Jr. and Rufus J. Womble were declared elected clerical deputies. Messrs. Walter N. Chinn, John G. Pollard, Ferdinand F. Chandler and Thos. L. Ruffin were declared elected lay deputies.

Mr. Turner Arrington moved the unanimous approval of the election of the Rev. Messrs. Fraser, Faulkner and Womble and Mr. Thos. L. Ruffin to prevent their election being questioned on technical grounds because of the new rule of order for elections.

Mr. James P. Massie rose to a point of order and questioned the constitutionality of the Rule of Order for elections adopted earlier in the session. The Bishop announced a ruling of the Chair and ruled the new rule of order unconstitutional and the ballot void. The Rev. A. St. John Matthews requested that an appeal be taken from the ruling of the Chair. The appeal carried 96 to 48. With the consent of his second, Mr. Arrington withdrew his motion.

Before presenting the tentative budget for 1951 the Rev. Reno S. Harp, Jr., Chairman of the Council Budget Committee for 1950, moved the adoption of the following: "the Budget Committee recommends that the 1951 Council Budget Committee be the Committee on the Budget for the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society for 1951." The recommendation was seconded and passed.

The Committee recommended striking from the proposed budget the item of \$1,200.00 for Advance Work in the Archdea-conry of the Blue Ridge and the proposed increase of \$2,550.00 for the Field Board.

The Rev. Parker Thornton moved, and it was seconded and passed that the item of \$500.00 for the American Bible Society

Whereas, The American Bible Society is an interdenominational missionary enterprise recognized by our Church as the agency for the supply of the Scriptures for mission work at home and abroad; and

Whereas, In the words of Bishop Tucker, "It is no exaggeration to say that the offering which you make to the American Bible Society will double the evangelistic value of the dollars which you contribute to the missionary pregram of the Church"; and

Whereas, The General Convention of 1949 passed a resolution urging that the entire church make it a matter of "primary concern" to support the American Bible Society by an offering and also the pastors are urged to lay this responsibility upon the consciences of their people; and

Whereas, The Church calendar long ago, in the second Sunday in Advent, provided the opportunity and the responsibility for presenting to our people the essential place of the Holy Scriptures in the advent of Christ's Kingdom; therefore be it

Resolved, First, that the Diocese of Virginia does hereby urge every congregation to receive an offering for the work of the American Bible Society on the Second Sunday in Advent;

Second, that the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society be, and is hereby, directed to appoint a Commission each year to promote said offerings with information and inspirational material to the clergy.

This was seconded and passed.

It was moved, seconded, and passed that the item of \$1,200.00 for advance work in the Archdeaconery of the Blue Ridge be deleted from the budget.

Bishop Gibson spoke against removing the increase for the Field Board and against paring the budget in any way. After further discussion it was moved, seconded and passed that the item for the Field Board be left at \$4,000.00 which included the proposed increase.

Mr. Lewis C. Williams questioned the wisdom of the Budget Committee in not including something for the Church Schools of the Diocese of Virginia for scholarships. The Rev. E. E. Tate moved that Council insert an item of \$10,000.00 for scholarship purposes in the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia.

After impassioned pleas by Mr. Tate and the Rev. John G. Scott and others on behalf of Mr. Tate's motion, and equally vehement protests against bringing in the motion at this time, the motion was lost.

The Rev. Dr. Cary Montague asked that \$200.00 be added to the item for the Board of Christian Social Relations in order to provide Forward Movement literature for institutions. Motion to amend that item in the budget and increase it from \$800.00 to \$1,000.00 was made, seconded and carried without a dissenting voice.

The budget as amended was adopted by council without a dissenting vote. (See Appendix for budget.)

Before the Council adjourned Bishop Goodwin presented to the Council Mr. George R. Humrickhouse and introduced him as a very energetic layman from the Diocese of Southern Virginia now living in Richmond, and expressed the hope that Mr. Humrickhouse would see fit to transfer his church affiliation to this diocese.

Council recessed at 10:45 P. M.

Thursday, May 25, 1950.

The service of Holy Communion was held Thursday morning May 25th, at 9:00 A. M., with Bishop Goodwin as celebrant, assisted by Bishops Tucker, Mason and Gibson and the Rev. Rufus J. Womble, Rector of the host parish.

The Council was called to order by Bishop Goodwin at 10:00 A. M.

The tellers presented the report on election of members of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. The Rev. W. Leigh Ribble, the Rev. F. W. Hayes, Mr. A. Smoot, and Mr. Bernard P. Chamberlain were declared elected the term ending in 1953, and the Rev. George F. Tittman for term ending in 1952.

The report of the Department of Christian Education was given by the Chairman, the Rev. Thomas Fraser, Jr. (See Appendix.)

The report of the Board of Christian Social Relations was given by the Chairman, the Rev. Albert K. Hayward. (See Appendix.)

The report of the Field Board was submitted by title by the Rev. P. B. Comer Lile, Chairman (See Appendix.) Mr. Lile announced the meeting to be held on June 18th at Roslyn of all local chairmen of the Every Member Canvass to study method, procedure and technique of conducting the Every Member Canvass. He stated that Mr. Robert Jordan of the National Council will conduct the instruction. Mr. Lile announced also the plans of the Field Board in planning a meeting on September 16th and 17th at Roslyn for the specialized training of laymen and that Mr. Lewis Franklin will be the leader.

The report of the Committee on Finance and the Bishop's and Contingent Fund was given by the Chairman, Mr. Lewis C. Williams.

To the 155th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

Some of you will recall that at the last Council the expenses of the Diecesan Headquarters were transferred from the Program of the Diocese to the Budget of the Bishop's and Contingent Fund under the direction of the Committee on Finance. As a result of this transfer the assessments to the parishes and churches of the Diocese were greatly increased. This plan, we believe, is working out satisfactorily and your Committee on Finance is glad to administer the enlarged budget.

At the beginning of this year there was a deficit in the budget for 1949 amounting to \$741.81. This was due in large part to the failure of several churches to pay their assessments in full in the amount of \$586.25. This deficit had to be charged against the budget for 1950.

We understand that the report of the Committee on the Church Pensions Fund will explain what has happened because of increased pension assessments. As far as the Bishop's and Contingent Fund is concerned, it is estimated that for this year 1950 we shall have to pay \$1,647.00 for pension assessments which were not included in the budget adopted at the last Council These two items, the deficit for 1949 and the pension assessment, amount to \$2,388.81. A part of this sum can be paid out of the item for contingencies but we believe that at the end of this year we shall have a deficit of \$2,000.00.

Your Committee wishes to call your attention to the name "Bishop"s and Contingent Fund." We are quite sure the name is full of historical allusions which are known to only one man in this Council. To most of us the name is misleading and confusing. It is certainly not the Bishop's Fund and it is just as clearly not Contingent Fund. The only part of the

budget that may be considered contingent is the item of \$500.00 in the budget for 1951 marked "Contingencies." Further, we find that in the parochial reports that are used throughout our Church, and which each parish is required to fill out annually, this fund is called "Diocesan Assessment." Some rectors and treasurers, not knowing what is meant by this designation, leave the item blank and then on the report add a special item marked "Bishop's and Contingent Fund." In view of these facts your Committee recommends that in Canon 5, and wheresoever else the words "Bishop's and Contingent Fund" occur in the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese that they be changed to read "Diocesan Assessment." We believe that this will eliminate confusion and bring our terminology in line with that generally used throughout the Church.

For the year 1951 we recommend the following budget:

The chair recognized the Rev. Dr. Churchill Gibson who gave a report of the Committee on Church Pension Fund as a prelude to consideration of the budget submitted by the Committee on Finance:

To the 155th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

As many of you know, the Diocese pays the pension assessments on the salaries paid to clergymen through the Diocesan office, including payments on salary supplements to clergymen in aided parishes and missions. To make these payments the Diocese has the income of the Disabled Clergy Fund and of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, which now amounts to about \$5,700.00 per year. In the past this fund has been more than sufficient to meet the full need. This resulted in a balance to our credit with the Church Pension Fund.

In 1946 the General Convention increased the rate of the assessments for the Pension Fund from 7½% to 10% of the salary paid a clergyman. The balance that had accumulated was soon used up. By the end of 1948 there was a small deficit due from the Diocese. This was not reported to the Diocese until the close of the year 1949. By that time the deficit was \$4,843.00. To meet this the Diocese had on hand \$500.00 which had been set aside in anticipation of the income from the invested funds being insufficient. This reduced the deficit to \$4,343.00.

Faced with this deficit, your Committee met to consider ways and means of meeting it. The Committee has on hand as reported from time to time to the Council a sum of money known as the Emergency Fund of the Diocesan Committee of the Church Pension Fund. The sum was accumulated in the early years of the Church Pension Fund, when assessments on all salaries of

elergy were paid to your Committee on the Church Pension Fund and by them sent to the Church Pension Fund headquarters in New York. As the Committee itself had some expenses in making collections, it had defrayed them by collecting pension assessments not only from parishes having rectors but from vacant parishes as well. In this way the Committee was able not only to pay its expenses but to accumulate a balance of between two and three thousand dollars. When the practice of collecting through the Diocesan Committee was discontinued the expenses of the Committee ceased. Your Committee decided to invest the balance on hand under the name of the Emergency Fund of the Diocesan Committee on the Church Pension Fund, reserving the right to withdraw the fund at any time. The income from this fund has sometimes been used to help a needy member of a clergyman's family, such as an elderly daughter who did not come under the provisions of the Church Pension Fund. At other times the income was added to principal. The fund now stands at \$4,059.03, plus interest from January 1. 1950.

In view of the fact that this sum was collected originally to enable the Diocese to pay assessments on the salaries of clergymen, your Committee has given its approval to withdrawing this fund from investment and using it with income thereon since January 1st toward the payment of an obligation to the Church Pension Fund. The Chancellor of the Diocese has ruled that we have a right to do this. In view of the fact that our Committee has from time to time reported to the Council the existence of this fund, the Committee now wishes to secure the approval of Council for the use of the fund as recommended by your Committee. The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society has made arrangements to pay the small balance that will still be due for 1949.

The General Convention in 1949, in order to increase the low minimum pensions being paid, raised the assessment for the Church Pension Fund from 10% to 15% of the salary paid each clergyman. This means that for the current year and for some years to come the Diocese will have to pay in pension assessments a sum considerably larger than for 1949. Your Committee recommends a plan that has been accepted by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society and by the Committee on Finance. The income from the Disabled Clergy Fund and from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund will be applied as heretofore. The balance remaining to be paid will be divided between the budget for the Diocesan Missionary Society and the budget for the Bishop's and Contingent Fund in proportion to the clergy salaries paid by them. In each of these budgets plans have been made for these payments in 1950 and 1951.

Now for the bright side. The increase in the assessments for the Church Pension Fund was made in order that existing pensions and all future pensions for clergymen retiring at age 68, after a minimum of twenty-eight years from the date of ordination, shall be not less than \$1,500.00 per year and that the minimum for their widows shall be not less than \$750.00 per year, and for

similar increases for orphans. The old minimum of \$600.00 for a clergy-man and \$300.00 per year for widows was established in 1917, when the purchasing power of the dollar was considerably more than it is today. Under present conditions it is totally inadequate. Therefore the General Convention authorized the increased rate.

As of January 1, 1950, there were in the Diocese of Virginia nineteen retired clergymen, twenty-nine widows of clergymen and two orphans receiving pensions. Their total pension for 1949 was \$30,386.88. This year they are receiving pensions at the rate of \$50,555.52, an increase of 67%. It is not hard to see what this increase means to them.

In conclusion, your Committee wishes to report that all pension assessments for the year 1949 from this Diocese have been paid except the amount referred to above due from the Diocese itself. In order that the Diocese may discharge its obligation your Committee asks your approval of the following resolution:

Whereas, the Committee on the Church Pension Fund has on hand a fund known as the "Emergency Fund of the Diocesan Committee on the Church Pension Fund," which has arisen from the collection of pension assessments in excess of actual amount needed and from income thereon;

Be it Resolved, That the Council now gives its approval to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund to use this fund with income thereon to date in paying, as far as possible, the obligation of this Diocese to the Church Pension Fund for 1949.

COMMITTEE ON THE CHURCH PENSION FUND, By CHURCHILL J. GIBSON, Chairman.

The resolution contained in this report of the committee on Church Pension Fund was moved, seconded and passed by Council.

Mr. Williams then resumed the report of the Committee on Finance and presented the budget for the Bishop's and Contingent Fund.

Mr. Edmund Campbell moved that the salary of each Eishop be increased by \$1,000.00. This motion was seconded. Bishops Goodwin and Gibson withdrew from the floor. Bishop Mason took the chair. An amendment was made and seconded to reduce the amount to \$500.00 each. The Rev. Van T. Chamberlain moved to lay the motion and the amendment on the table. This motion was seconded and carried.

Mr. Mathews moved the adoption of the budget. This was passed by Council.

Mr. Fraser moved a motion recommended by the Budget Committee that the current interest of the Episcopal Fund for 1951 be used to apply on this budget. The motion was seconded. Mr. Welsh moved to lay the motion on the table. The motion was seconded and carried 108 to 56.

The tellers distributed the ballots for election of alternates to the Provincial Synod.

The tellers distributed the ballots for election to the Committee on Finance.

Bishop Goodwin asked Bishop Gibson to take the chair.

Bishop Gibson recognized Dr. Brydon who presented the following resolution which was moved, seconded and carried.

Whereas, on October 16th of this year Bishop Goodwin will celebrate the twentieth anniversary of his consecration as a Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia.

Therefore the Council of the Diocese of Virginia now assembled do hereby express our hearty congratulations to Bishop Goodwin, and our thankful appreciation of his leadership in the work of the Church and in our Diocesan fellowship during these years.

The Rev. Edward E. Tate gave a report of the Committee on the Niven bequest. He presented the following resolution which was seconded and passed.

The Committee recommends to Council that it request the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese to sell the Niven property, whenever in the judgment of the Trustees such sale can most advantageously be made, and that the proceeds from such sale be allocated to the forthcoming campaign for Church expansion and to be designated in some specific form as a memorial to Judge Niven.

Bishop Goodwin moved that this Council send a statement of deep appreciation, etc. to Mr. John Herndon for his generous offer to the Diocese of an old men's home, stating, however, that the Diocese saw within the next several years no possibility of assisting in the formation of an old men's home. Discussion followed regarding the future, if any, of an Episcopal home for old men in the Diocese. Bishop Goodwin's motion was seconded and passed. The Secretary was instructed to write this letter to Mr. Herndon.

The chair recognized the presence in the Church of the Bishop of Cuba, the Rt. Rev. A. Hugo Blankingship.

Dr. G. MacLaren Brydon presented the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Your Committee beg to present the following report upon the matters presented to us:

1. To amend Canon IX, Section 5, Sub-division V.

Your Committee believe it to be unwise to specify as members of the Committee on Evangelism the Chairmen of other Boards, as important to the work of the Diocese as those mentioned in this proposed amendment for the reason that the work of the Committee on Evangelism should be in the hands of persons who are making a special study of methods to be used in evangelization—or preaching the Gospel—and not committed as an additional duty to persons who as Chairmen of Boards devoted to other specialized forms of Christian service must devote their best efforts to the work of the respective boards and organizations of which they are Chairmen.

Inasmuch as the duties of the Committee on Evangelism are not defined in the present Canon, we believe that the Committee on Evangelism as at present constituted would render a great service to our Diocese and people by taking under their consideration and study the whole field of strengthening the ideals of evangelical preaching, training clergymen in better methods of holding parochial or preaching missions as a means of strengthening the faith and zeal of our own people and carrying the Gospel to the unchurched and the unbelievers.

We therefore recommend that this amendment be rejected.

The Council voted to sustain the report of the committee. The Rev. Lloyd Bell was asked to have noonday prayers. The Rev. Mr. Harp presented the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, That a special committee be appointed by Bishop Gibson to plan for a suitable observance of Bishop Goodwin's twentieth anniversary.

Bishop Gibson appointed the Rev. Reno S. Harp and the Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon.

Dr. Brydon resumed his report:

2. To amend Canon IX.

(a) Resolved, that Section 3 of Canon IX be amended by the insertion after line 6 of the following:

"An Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education shall be elected by the Executive Committee upon nomination by the Bishop."

(b) Resolved, That Canon IX, Section 5, Sub-division I be amended by the addition at the end of the words: "and shall serve as an advisory board to the Executive Secretary" so that as amended this sub-division shall be:

I. The Board of Christian Education, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of the work of Religious Education in the Diocese, and shall serve as an Advisory Board to its Executive Secretary.

Your Committee recommends the adoption of these two amendments.

These amendments were adopted by a canonical majority in each case.

Dr. Brydon continued the report:

3. To amend Canon XIX, Section 3, by striking the word "male" out of the present Canon, which declares that "only male communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church, etc., shall be eligible to the office of vestrymen," etc. Your Committee divided four to four upon this matter and beg to refer it directly to the consideration of the Council without our recommendation.

The Rev. Mr. William Byrd Lee moved that the word "male" be removed from Canon 19, section 3. Mr. Edmund Campbell spoke in favor of the motion and stated that he had been converted to his present position. A motion by Rev. Leigh Ribble that the proposed amendment be laid on the table was lost 87 to 85. After a heated and oratorical and emotional debate the proposed amendment was defeated by a count of 89 to 83. When a recount was asked the chair ruled it was not necessary.

The report of the committee was continued:

4. Amendment of Canons V and XXX.

(a) Resolved, That Canon V shall be amended by striking out of the title of the said Canon, and wherever in the body of the Canon they appear, the words "Bishop's and Contingent Fund"—and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Diocesan Expense Assessment," so that the title shall read as follows: "Of the Diocesan Expense Assessment, and duties of the Committee on Finance in connection therewith," and the first two lines of Section 2 shall read: "There shall be created a special fund known as the Diocesan Expense Account, to be raised by assessment upon the parishes," etc., and similar change of words as they appear in Sections 3 and 5.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of this amendment and also the following:

(b) Resolved, That Section 8, line 5 of Canon XXX be amended by striking out the words "Contingent Fund" and inserting the words "Diocesan Expense Assessment," so that the latter part of this section shall read: "Shall be defrayed by the Treasurer of the Diocesa out of the Diocesan Expense Assessment, upon order of the Council, if in session, otherwise upon order of the Committee on Finance."

The recommendation of the committee was sustained by a canonical majority.

The report was continued:

5. (a) Resolved, That Canon IX, Section 5, Sub-head (b), Sub-section V be amended by striking out the entire paragraph and inserting the following:

The Board of Mountain Work, composed of two primary members, one being a clergyman and the other a layman, elected by the Executive Committee and a Chairman and six additional members appointed by the Bishop and approved by the Executive Committee, which shall have charge of all mountain mission work in the Diocese. The Secretary and the Treasurer of the Diocese shall be ex-officio the Secretary and the Treasurer of this Board.

(b) Resolved, That Section 2 of Canon X be amended by striking out the entire section and inserting the following:

Section 2. A Presbyter to be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge may be appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. When appointed, he shall, as representative of the Bishop, have general supervision of the mountain work and be responsible for the promotions thereof. When in the judgment of the Bishop and the said Executive Committee it shall be necessary, there may be an associate or assistant Archdeacon appointed in like manner, and with like powers and duties.

Your Committee recommends the adoption of these two amendments.

The recommendation of the committee was sustained by a canonical majority.

The report was continued:

6. (a) Resolved, That Canon XII, Section 1, Sub-section (5) be amended by striking out the words "City of Richmond," and inserting the words "Cities of Richmond and Alexandria," in the second paragraph so that this paragraph shall read: "Except in the case of the cities of Richmond and Alexandria, cities shall for the purpose of this section be considered parts of the counties in which they are geographically located."

After discussion it was moved, seconded and passed that this matter be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for 1951.

Council then adjourned for lunch.

Bishop Goodwin called the Council to order at 1:55 P. M. and the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons was resumed:

7. A proposed addition to Canon XXIII "Of alienation of real property," by adding the following paragraph, "No consecrated building, or church or chapel which has been used solely for divine service, shall be alienated or exchanged, to be used for other than religious purposes, except upon condition that any distinctive features of its use for religious purposes shall be removed."

Your Committee, while unanimously in sympathy with the purpose desired to be secured by this proposed amendment, believe that because of the diversity of the features that can be involved in the term "distinctive features," the matter cannot be satisfactorily handled by the enactment of a Canon; but believe that in each case of proposed alienation the question of retention or removal of such distinctive features should be considered by the Bishop and the Standing Committee as his advisers.

Your Committee therefore recommend that this proposed amendment be rejected.

The recommendation of the committee was sustained.

The committee reported that they had read the proposed revision of Canon 7, section 2 and recommended that it be rejected. The recommendation of the committee was sustained.

This completed the report of the committee.

Bishop Goodwin presented the following amendment to Article 1, Section 2, of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church in the United States, as proposed at the General Convention of 1949, and to be finally acted upon at the Convention in 1952, stating that the bishops of this diocese are in favor of the amendment:

Every Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, every Suffragan Bishop, and every Bishop, who under an election to an office created by the General Convention, has resigned his position, shall have a seat and a vote in the House of Bishops. Every other Bishop who has re-

signed his position shall have a seat without vote in the House of Bishops A majority of all Bishops entitled to vote, exclusive of Foreign Missionary Bishops, shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

No action was required by the Council.

The Rev. Hedley J. Williams reported for the Committee on Resolutions. The Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Be it Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia recognizes the right of the Virginia Council of Churches to give expression to its judgment on moral and social questions as a Council of Churches with the distinct understanding, however, that such expressions of judgment do not necessarily reflect the judgment of the Episcopal Church and are in no way binding on the Episcopal Church in this Diocese unless ratified by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

This resolution was adopted.

In regard to the following resolution:

Be it Resolved, That this Council express its gratitude and appreciation to Bishop Mason for his many years of faithful and consecrated service in the Diocese of Virginia,

the Committee stated that to fulfill the true purpose of this resolution the Committee is mindful that no worthy tribute to Bishop Mason can be hastily expressed, and, therefore, recommends that the Bishop appoint a Committee of two to prepare a fitting and proper resolution, which resolution be incorporated in the minutes of this Council. This recommendation was approved by a standing vote. The Bishop appointed on this committee, the Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon, D. D., and the Rev. Samuel B. Chilton. On behalf of the Council after its adjournment, they drew up the following resolution:

Whereas, The Right Reverend W. Roy Mason, D. D., has announced that upon reaching the canonical retirement age in November, 1950, he will resign his office as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia and retire from active work; therefore, be it

Resolved by the clergy and lay delegates of the Diocese of Virginia, in annual Council assembled, that we look forward with keen regret to the retirement from the active service of the Church one who has made for himself an abiding place in the life and work of our Diocese, and in the hearts of our people.

Bishop Mason has spent the whole of his active ministry in the Diocese of Virginia. From the day when he came as a newly ordained deacon into the mountain mission field to the present day; as a missionary carrying the message of the Gospel to the isolated families living in remote mountain coves; as Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge in succession to the beloved founder of that work; and as Suffragan Bishop going into all parts of his Diocese, he has labored unceasingly and effectively as a preacher of righteousness and God's salvation, as priest and pastor of the people committed to his charge.

He will carry with him into his retirement from office the gratitude and love of the Diocese and people to whose service his life has been given.

The Rev. Mr. Harp spoke feelingly of the services of Bishop Mason and of his inestimable gifts to the people of this Diocese, and he moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Bishop appoint a special committee to plan for a suitable observance of Bishop Mason's episcopate at the time of his retirement.

This resolution was passed unanimously with a standing vote, and applause.

The Fishop appointed the Rev. Messrs. Donovan, Loving, and Boogher, and Messrs. John J. Morris, John A. Gilmore and Miss Annie Park. At the request of Bishop Gibson after the adjournment this committee was combined with the committee appointed by him on the Commemoration of Bishop Goodwin's 20th Anniversary of Consecration.

The Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, The Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia were created by the Diocese and were financially aided by the Diocese until 1940;

Whereas, The Church Schools have received no financial aid since 1940; Whereas, Even though the Church Schools are self-sustaining and are operating at about the "break-even" point, they are finding it difficult, under conditions of higher operating costs over which they have no control, to continue offering scholarship assistance out of its own fee income;

Whereas, The Church Schools regard themselves as a true missionary arm of the church, deserving the continued active interest of the Diocese;

Be it Resolved, therefore, That the Bishop of the Diocese be requested to appoint a committee of five members, including both clergymen and laymen, to study the relationship between the Diocese and the Church Schools and to consider ways and means by which the Diocese can promote the schools in their evangelical efforts, more particularly in providing scholarships for deserving students of parents in the Diocese who need financial assistance.

The Pishop appointed on this committee the Rev. Reno S. Harp, Jr., the Rev. Paul D. Bowden, Dr. John Garland Pollard, Mr. James R. Ayres, and Mr. Shaun Kelley.

The Rev. B. B. Comer Lile, Chairman of the Committee on the State of the Church, read the following report:

As your Committee on the State of the Church, we feel it our duty that we, of the Diocese of Virginia, be reminded of the warnings of Christian leadership all over the world that the Church must be the world's profoundest critic in order to be as well the means of the world's salvation. As she has been commissioned by her Lord, the Church must expose the root of the evils of any age at the same time as she enters every phase of human life to save mankind from sin.

From this high level of viewing the Church's role in the divine judgment and rescue of earth, we must return to our Diocese, its parishes and institutions. Every man, woman and child bearing the seal of baptism must in these days return once more to "confess the Faith of Christ crucified," as the central conviction of their lives. To Christians who are aware of the spiritual crisis of our time, this standing forth to be counted for Christ and His Church must be expressed increasingly in all phases of life in our parishes and in the Diocese. There is an urgency upon us as ambassadors of Christ, to be what God has chosen us to be above all other loyalties—above membership in any income group, race, educational bracket, political party or national citizenship. The time is probably not far off when our increasingly secular society, still in large measure tolerant of us, will become more and more openly hostile to any effective witness to Christian values and standards in the life of individuals and social institutions. This hostility may often cover its attack by plausible appeals to what may be called "The American Way of Life." It may masquerade as an offensive against Soviet communism, or it may come in large measure supported by those people of sincere piety who identify the particular type of social order they most prefer with the world as they think God would have it. As an example of this attack, a book entitled "The Road Ahead," by John T. Flynn (chapter 10) identifies the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America and the main stream of non-Roman Christianity in America, with Socialism and Communism. This particular attack is startling when we realize that Democracy in any such form as we know it in America, has never arisen or been able to survive except where there was a dominant Protestant Christian Church. However, the most alarming fact

about Mr. Flynn's book is that it is not only being widely read in this Diocese, but is being enthusiastically circulated and given away in large numbers by many church people throughout the nation.

So, under whatever form we Christians are tempted to betray our primary allegiance to Christ and His Church, the call is to be ever on guard and ever ready to make decisions without fear, and to acquit ourselves as people for whom God's ultimate victory is the deepest confidence and final hope.

In the light of these signs of the times, in every field the Church is called not only to spread God's Good News far and wide, but above all to intensify the teaching and strengthening of her own. The program of evangelism needs evangelists and evangelists must be informed, committed, convinced Christian people. We may have to be willing in some cases to pay the price of concentrating on the intensive type of evangelism rather than the extensive. Our National Church's emphasis on advance in Christian Education can be an instrument that can be used to intensify our evangelism. Particularly we would like to recommend wide distribution and use of the two books, "The Holy Scriptures" and "Chapters in Church History," produced by the National Council.

Our Diocesan Church preparatory schools can also serve as important instruments of intensive evangelism, provided they bear a distinct and clear-cut Christian witness in every phase of their activities and teaching. "We believe that the people of this Diocese should be made aware of the fact that our Church preparatory schools are a missionary arm of the Church. It is hoped that more of our young people who are looking forward to teaching will regard the opportunity to teach in a Church school as a missionary calling. Teaching in a Church School can be held up before our young people as a real opportunity to make an attack on the secularism of our day. It is a hopeful sign that so many young men are offering themselves for Holy Orders and we hope that the young men and women of this Diocese will more and more find a vocation for teaching in our Church preparatory schools.

The Committee on the State of the Church looks with hope and expectancy to the important work that is now going on in surveying the needs and opportunities that lie before the Church in our Diocese. However, we feel that we must warn the clergy and people of the Diocese that this survey will not solve any of our problems or in itself meet and deal with our opportunities. The survey is designed to uncover our problems and opportunities but not to solve them. We hope and believe that, as a result of the survey, we will be challenged to a great advance in the Diocese of Virginia. The survey has already uncovered some of our need for advance. This is particularly true in regard to our work among the negro people of the Diocese.

The Diocesan statistics compiled from the annual parochial reports for 1949 show in general a gradual and steady increase in the life of the congregations of the Diocese. We would like to comment on only two items in the Diocesan statistics. Although we added 3,438 communicants by confirmation and transfer during 1949, we lost 3,342 communicants by death and

transfer and by coming under the new classification of "inactive"; so we finished the year with a net increase of ninety-six communicants for the entire Diocese. We must add, however, that a good deal of the loss, through being classified as inactive, represents the accumulation of several years for some of our parishes. We believe that the new classification on the parochial reports of "inactive" communicants, included this year for the first time, will serve a real purpose. Your Committee wishes that our parochial reports could provide for a more detailed classification of "communicants" in order that we might know from these reports how many communicants we have who can really be counted on to stand up for the Christ and His Church in any crisis.

The other matter in the Diocesan statistics which we would like to call to your attention is the increase in parish indebtedness from \$487.332.00 to \$620,119.00. Knowing that there are other large building program debts which are now being incurred and will show up in the next parochial reports. we think everyone in the Diocese should be aware of this striking increase in parish indebtedness.

We thank God for our retired Bishop, our Diocesan Bishop, our Senior Suffragan Bishop and our Junior Suffragan Bishop for the leadership which they have given and are now giving to this Diocese.

We are saddened by the approaching retirement of our Senior Suffragan Bishop but we thank God for raising up such a one as our Junior Suffragan Bishop, whom we feel is so ably qualified to carry on the great traditions of the Episcopate in this Diocese. May we close with the prayer that God will guide and strengthen the Bishops, the clergy and the people of this Diocese to see and to fulfill the challenge and opportunities that lie ahead of us in the Diocese of Virginia.

The report of the Standing Committee was submitted by title by the Rev. H. A. Donovan, Chairman:

The Standing Committee, since its election on May 18, 1949, has performed the following acts:

- 1. It has recommended for admission to candidacy Messrs. Stephens Tucker Gulbrandsen and Bruce C. Causey.
- 2. It has recommended for ordination to the diaconate Messrs. Thom Williamson Blair, Paul Socrates Heins, John Edwin Williams, and John Baird Shinberger.
- 3. It has recommended for ordination to the priesthood the Rev. Messrs. John Edwin Williams and John Baird Shinberger.

4. It gave consent for the election of a Bishop Suffragan for each of the following named Dioceses: Minnesota, Chicago, New York, Albany, and California.

5. It gave consent to the election of the Right Reverend Horace W. B. Donegan, Bishop Suffragan of New York, to be Bishop Coadjutor of

the Diocese of New York.

- 6. It gave consent to the ordination and consecration of the Rev. Randolph Rovall Claiborne, Jr., as Suffragan Bishop of Alabama; the Rev. Joseph Gillespie Armstrong, III, as Suffragan Bishop of Pennsylvania; the Rev. Helson Marigold Burroughs, as Bishop Coadjutor of Ohio; the Rev. Allen Jerome Miller, as Bishop of the Diocese of Easton; the Rev. Gordon V. Smith, as Bishop of Iowa; the Rev. Dudley Scott Stark, as Bishop of Rochester; the Rev. Wilburn Camrock Campbell, as Bishop Coadjutor of West Virginia; the Rev. Edward Randolph Welles, as Bishop of West Missouri.
- 7. It recommended to the Council of the Diocese of Virginia a proposed Canon concerning the alienation of consecrated property.

A resolution was presented by the Rev. Mr. Donovan and passed:

Be it Resolved, That the Bishop be, and he is hereby, requested to appoint a committee, one member of which shall be the Chancellor of the Diocese, to make a thorough study of the new Rule of Order for elections adopted by this Council on May 24, 1950, in relation to the Constitution of this Diocese, and to report back its findings and recommendations to the next meeting of this Council.

The Bishop appointed the following commission; Mr. Archibald G. Robertson, the Hon. John L. Ingram, Mr. E. Randolph Williams, and the Rev. Thomas G. Faulkner, Jr.

The report of the Examining Chaplains was submitted by title:

During the past year your board of Examining Chaplains has examined the middlers and seniors from the Diocese of Virginia in Theological Seminaries and the deacons working in the Diocese whose examinations were incomplete, and have reported the results of these examinations to the Bishop.

SAMUEL B. CHILTON, Secretary.

The report on Church Unity was submitted by title by the Rev. B. B. Comer Lile:

As we report to you this year, our Commission on Church Unity is conscious of two serious limitations. One is occasioned by the illness of the Very Rev. Alexander C. Zabriskie, D. D., who has always furnished such able and inspired leadership to our Diocese in the field of Church Unity. The other limitation which we feel is the fact that our general church, at the present time, is not challenging us with any definite action in the direction of Church Unity. In view of this fact, your Diocesan Commission on Church Unity. would like at this time to urge every clergyman and every communicant of this Diocese to make every effort possible to cooperate with other Christian groups in the communities in which we live. If there is a local Council of Churches in our city or county, let us give it the fullest support possible. If there is no local Council of Churches in our area, may we of the Episcopal Church consider seriously the need for and the possibility of forming such a local council, and if the need exists, may we give the leadership necessary to bring such a council into being. Whether a local council of churches is a possibility or not, we urge the clergy and communicants of this Diocese to support the Virginia Council of Churches, of which our own Bishop is the President. We believe that cooperation with other churches in the local community and on a state-wide basis is an effective means of laying groundwork for a deeper Church Unity in the future. The tragedy of a divided Christendom in a world of paganism and secularism demands that we respond under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to every opportunity for cooperation with our Christian brethren of other groups.

B. B. COMER LILE, Convenor.

It was moved and carried that the Commission on Church Unity be continued.

There was no report submitted on the library. It was moved to continue the Committee on the Library. This motion was passed.

There was no report of the Committee on the Consolidation of Corporations. It was moved and passed to continue this Committee.

The report of the Committee on Church Architecture was submitted by title:

The Committee has recently received a request from the Reverend Paul S. Heins, of Remington, Va., for information and assistance in regards to construction of a new church at Brandy, Va. Since this request was received

too late for the Committee to meet before Council, it hereby recommend that the newly appointed Committee take this matter into consideration,

The report of the Church Music Committee was presented by the Rev. Reginald Eastman, Chairman:

Stanley Bulley, Mus. D. (University of Toronto), a member of the faculty of Mary Washington College, University of Virginia, Fredericksburg, a man with considerable background as cathedral organist, choral director and teacher, conducted a conference for the Diocesan Commission on Church Music at Roslyn, October 10th, 11th and 12th. This was the first conference of more than a day's duration.

The subjects included a historical introduction to church music, proper selection of music, hymn singing, chanting, choir leadership and the problems connected with playing the organ.

Using the group as a choir, choral evensong was held at St. Stephen's Church, Westhampton. The Commission appreciates the kindness of the Rector of St. Stephen's, the Rev. Reno Harp, in allowing it to use the building; also the fine spirit of cooperation and helpfulness on the part of Granville Munson, Jr., organist.

A total of sixty-two registered and it is interesting to note that all the Virginia Dioceses were represented.

Mr. Bulley held the interest of everyone throughout the conference and a large number asked that a similar conference be held next fall.

In February, 1949, the Commission lost one of its members, the Rev. Joseph B. Tucker, who left the Diocese to accept a call to Clarksville, Tenn. Last fall the Rev. Wilfred T. Waterhouse was appointed by Bishop Goodwin to fill this vacancy.

The Commission is indeed grateful for the additional financial support given to it by Council.

REGINALD W. EASTMAN, Chairman.

It was moved and carried that this committee be continued.

The head teller, the Rev. Mr. Faulkner, reported on the election of alternate delegates to the Provincial Synod.

The Chair announced the election of the following clerical alternate deputies; the Rev. Reno S. Harp, Jr., the Rev. Edward E. Tate, the Rev. D. C. Loving and the Rev. Aston Hamilton, D. D.; and the following lay alternate deputies; Messers John J. Morris, James Ayers, Jr., Richard Florance, and Lewis A. Kellar.

The head teller reported on the election of the Committee on Finance. The Chair declared the following persons elected: Mr. Albert A. Smoot, Mr. Lewis C. Williams, Mr. Blake T. Newton, Mr. H. H. Augustine, and Mr. John B. Mordecai:

The report of the Blue Ridge School was submitted by fitle. (See Appendix.)

There was no report from the Committee on Shrine Mont.
The report on Stuart Hall was submitted by title. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. H. A. Donovan offered the following resolution:

Be it Resolved, That the sincere appreciation of the Council be extended to the rector, vestry, parish staff and congregation of the Church of the Epiphany, to the pastor and ladies of Barton Heights Methodist Church, who served the luncheons both days of Council, and to the rector and ladies of St. Thomas' Church, who served dinner, for their gracious hospitality and for all they have done to make this meeting both pleasant and profitable.

The motion was passed by a standing vote.

The Rev. Henry E. Batcheller, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations submitted the following nominations:

The representatives for the Council of Churches were elected. The nominees for the vacancies on the Boards of Church Schools, John Moncure School and Stuart Hall and Blue Ridge School were approved.

Bishop Goodwin expressed his appreciation to Dr. Ivey Lewis who has resigned for his service on the Church School Board.

The Mr. Scott moved that the Council instruct the Secretary of the Diocese to write a letter to Dean Zabriskie expressing the best wishes of the Council for his improving health. An amendment was accepted that the Secretary write letters to all the clergy who by reason of illness, or other reasons, were forced to be absent from the meeting of this Council. This motion was passed.

The Rev. S. B. Chilton was elected Treasurer of the Diocese by a standing vote on motion by the Rev. H. A. Donovan.

Miss Mary Goodwin was elected statistician of the Diocese.

The present Committee on Church Property was re-nominated and elected by the Council. (See p. 3 ff.)

All present members of the Committee on Church Pension Fund were re-nominated and re-elected. (See p. 3 ff.)

The Examining Chaplains of the Diocese were re-nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Council. (See p. 3 ff.)

The Bishop called for unfinished and new business and recognized Mr. Bernard Chamberlain who in a very gracious manner invited the Council to meet at its next annual meeting in 1951 at St. Paul's Memorial Church, Charlottesville, Virginia. This invitation was accepted.

Mr. Shaw of Arlington presented the following resolution which was passed by Council: (See No. 57.)

Moved that Committee on Program for next Council not feel themselves required to limit themselves to a two-day council session if the amount of business so requires.

The Chair recognized Bishop Tucker who spoke for a few moments on the International Christian University in Japan. Dr. Montague moved that the Council pledge to Bishop Tuckerits full cooperation in his efforts towards helping with this project. This motion was passed.

The Rev. Parker Thornton read a resolution passed by the Clergy Conference held last week in which the clergy were urged

to ask their congregations to give at least 5% of their income to the church. The Rev. Mr. Lile moved that the Council endorse the 5% challenge, which motion was passed. The Council then sang "Blest Be the Tie that Binds." Bishop Mason gave the blessing. Bishop Goodwin then declared the 155th Council of the Diocese of Virginia adjourned, sine die.

Dr. Dunn died at Virginia Beach, Virginia, October 17, 1949.

The Diocesan Board of Christian Education has reached a crossroad in its service to the people of this diocese. When Miss Martha Pray resigned her position with the Diocesan Board she rendered a valuable assistance to

us in helping us to appraise the work we had been doing and in our approach to the subject of Christian Education under the new program inaugurated by the National Council of our Church.

Therefore this report is in two parts, the work of the past year and the work of the future.

The past year has shown steady progress in all departments of the work of the Board. The only set back to our work has been the vacancy left by Miss Pray and the period we have just passed thru in evaluating the fuction of our department under the new program of the National Council. Mrs. Oscar Parrish deserves great praise for her work as a secretary in keeping the diocesan work moving in the absence of a religious education worker. We hope to be able to report to you the name of a diocesan worker very soon after this Council convenes.

This brings me to the future of the work which concerns two items, a canonical change that will be proposed to you tomorrow, and the new curriculum.

In the past the office held by Miss Pray was that of an employee of the DBCE. We are told by those with experience in this field and have learned by our own experience that the diocesan worker in Christian Education should no longer be employed by the Board of Christian Education but by the Diocese thru the Executive Committee. As an employee of the Board the worker lacks the prestige, the freedom, and does not have the relationships with the clergy and the Bishops that are essential to the best execution of her work, The National Council and other authorities in religious education advise us that the worker should have the position of an Executive Secretary in the employ of the Diocese. Under the present conditions in the life of the Church we do not believe that anyone will accept a call to this work unless the office is raised to this level. Therefore the Board of Christian Education heartily recommends this change in the canons of the diocese to your favorable consideration, namely, that the diocese employ, at the recommendation of the Bishop, and thru its Executive Committee an Executive Secretary of Christian Education.

Second, and lastly, the future of the work. The future of all work in Christian Education in our Church will be directed toward the new curriculum being published by the National Council. Some of this material is already off the press, for example, two volumes of the Church's Teaching, one on Holy Scriptures and one on Church History. Many clergy in the diocese and the board have reviewed these volumes and are most enthusiastic about them. Also several study courses on Marriage, the Bible, the Prayer Book, and Christian Stewardship have been published and are available. These are splendid pieces of work in their fields and have met with national acclaim in the field of education.

At the present time clergy from all over the country are being trained in educational methods at the College of Preachers in Washington and it is

essential that every vestry makes it possible for its rector to attend these courses when he is called,

Other volumes of the Church's Teaching, Doctrine, Christian Life, Worship, are in the process of being written and published. Twelve more study programs are on the way. Material for the children in the Sunday Schools will come more slowly because they depend upon the completion of these volumes for their final production.

In conclusion. The new curriculum is not a cure all for the headaches of Christian Education but it does lead us forward in the right direction. The program is from birth to the grave. The program lays great emphasis on the fact that the Sunday School is only a supplement to the home. Parents must regain their rightful duty and responsibilty to train their children in the Christian faith and in "all other things that a Christian ought to know and believe." The Sunday School will provide what it can provide and that is what the family can not provide, a corporate experience in the worship of the church thru the Book of Common Prayer. The Church thru its clergy and lay workers will be on hand to advise, counsel, and pastor young and old in their needs and in their common worship of God thru Jesus Christ our Lord.

This may make some parents feel that a heavy burden is laid upon their shoulders and they should, but the Church is standing by to help you fulfill your responsibilities. As parents we must begin to do the things we have failed to do, and the first step is toward the creation of a Christian home.

Very soon we hope every clergyman in this diocese will be calling the parents and all adults in his congregation to class in the Teachings of the Church. Men and women, this is our job together! Join us in this great adventure in honest, intelligent, and forthright missionary work of bringing the good news of our faith to every man, woman, and child within the Diocese of Virginia.

(d) Report of The Board of Christian Social Relations

This Board, through the office of its Executive Secretary, renders services to the diocese in the eight following specific ways:

(1) Furnishes information about State and charitable institutions for old people, children and cripples, as well as mental defectives; with requirements of applicants and the necessary steps to be taken for admission.

(2) Secures free transportation on the C. and O. and R., F. and P. Railroads, and special rates on the Southern and Atlantic Coast Line, and Seaboard Air Line, in worthy charity cases.

(3) Helps to procure artificial limbs, false teeth, crutches and wheel chairs.

(4) Helps to adjust hospital bills in worthy charity cases, and in securing free treatment at Sheltering Arms Hospital when needed.

(5) Sends out speakers on social relations for parochial or convocational meetings.

(6) Visits out-of-town patients in hospitals and nursing homes here in Richmond.

(7) Helps deserving cases in schools and colleges, and supplements funds for relief cases, to a limited extent.

(8) Generally gives advice on any kind of social relations problems, whether parochial or personal.

Like the Diocesan Board for Religious Education, this Board only meets quarterly in conjunction with the meetings of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, consequently it functions almost entirely through the office of its Executive Secretary.

After our October meeting, we sent out a letter to all the clergy of the diocese offering our assistance in the ways mentioned above, and asking them for any suggestions they might have for enlarging our program, but we received only one reply. This reply suggested that we might get help in this direction from the Washington Diocese, but upon following up this line we found that that Diocese is not doing anything more than we are except that it employs a professional social worker.

During the year, Bishop Goodwin referred to our Board the whole matter of locating Displaced Persons in this Diocese. We immediately sent letters to every clergyman, with the informative material furnished us from the headquarters for social relations of the National Council. In response, we got three inquiries, which we followed up promptly, but so far have not been able to place any Displaced Persons in this Diocese.

At present we are endeavoring to make a survey of the Diocese to find out how many elderly women there are who now need, or may need, institutional care in some Home. A similar survey about old men revealed only thirteen such cases, and one of these was a Negro and another Mr. John Herndon who is interested in establishing such a Home.

We welcome the resolution asking for a Committee to consider enlarging the activities of this Board, and shall be pleased to carry out any plans they may offer.

Our Executive Secretary, Dr. R. Cary Montague, serves this Board without compensation for himself, but is allowed from our funds the modest sum of \$60.00 per month for secretarial and transportation expenses.

We conclude with his statistical report, which includes his activities as City Missionary, which are similar, but by no means identical, with the work entitled Christian Social Relations.

(e) Report of The Field Board

The Diocesan Field Board directed the Fall Every Member Canvass in 1949. This was the last of the annual campaigns involving a multiplicity of mailing pieces together with other printed materials from the National Council. The Field Board, under its subcommittee of publicity, issued a single sheet, "The Diocese Surveys Its Opportunities." This leafet was used in most instances in the portfolio mailing piece of the National Church; but some congregations used it separately.

The Fall Canvass was so successful that the Diocese was enabled to accept its full share of the great increase asked by General Convention, Virginia's minimum mathematical quota being \$60.700.

The Field Board then began cooperating with the Episcopal Churchmen of the Diocese of Virginia, first in the selection of lay leaders to receive special training and then in helping to see that these leaders were invited to speak to Vestries on the "One World in Christ" program. This program, largely educational, reached its main climax with the Presiding Bishop's radio broadcast on March 12.

In January Bishop Harris of Liberia was secured for engagements in a number of areas of the Diocese. After many attempts it was found not feasible to carry out the February plan of having a domestic missionary bishop make such appearances. The March theme on Christian Education and on World Relief was observed with area meetings.

The one World in Christ offering, which includes the offerings taken at the area meetings and also all gifts earmarked especially for World Relief, is already above \$18,500.

The Field Board cooperated with the Episcopal Churchmen in a "post March 12" conference of the men who had trained under Dr. Lewis B. Franklin in January, and who had subsequently gone to the Vestries with the 1950 story. This meeting was held at Roslyn on May 7, 1950. At that time they made a request that the Board issue a monthly Information Sheet to be sent

to the Vestries in the name of the Episcopal Churchmen. The Board voted to carry out this request.

Looking to an entirely new approach next fall, the Field Board plans to work even more closely with the laymen's organization. At least 40 laymen will be trained again under Dr. Franklin, during the week-end of September 16-17, at which time the annual meeting of the Episcopal Churchmen will also be held at Roslyn. The men thus trained will be assigned to speak to entire congregations, using also audio-visual aids; and they will give such congregation's canvassers instructions in canvassing techniques.

Of immediate importance is a conference for Every Member Canvass Chairmen, set up at the suggestion of some of the laymen. This will be held at Roslyn on Sunday, June 18, opening with a Corporate Communion at 11 A. M., E. S. T. We cannot urge too strongly the importance of choosing your congregation's Every Member Canvass Chairman as early as possible. We hope, too, that you will make every possible effort to get him to this one day meeting, which will be led by Mr. Robert D. Jordan, Executive Director of the National Council's Department of Promotion.

The National Council plans only one, optional, mailing piece this year; but it will provide a poster and such other helps as usual.

The Field Board at its recent meeting adopted a recommendation from the Clergy Conference urging that the Field Board and the laymen who will visit the congregations use the plan suggested in the House of Bishops' Pastoral Letter, calling for giving to the Church at least five per cent of one's income.

I think it is worth mentioning that one lay member of the Field Board, Mr. Robert J. Johnson, has taken part in the planning and direction of three Building Fund Campaigns and four Every Member Canvasses.

In closing may we express our sincere appreciation of the untiring work which has been done during the past year by the Secretary of the Field Board, the Rev. Albert Muller. His constant attention to carrying out the policies of the Field Board have been largely responsible for the successful accomplishment of our year's program.

Attached hereto is the financial report of our Diocese magazine The Virginia Churchman.

(f) Report of The Board of Evangelism

Your Diocesan Board of Evangelism has held three meetings during the course of the year to prepare recommended courses of evangelistic action for the Diocese. Suggestions for the clergy have been distributed throughout the Diocese which suggestions have contemplated a continuing program of evangelism in every parish during the year.

Our major recommendation to the Diocese was full participation by every Church in the Federal Council of Churches' program, "United Evangelistic Advance." We felt such cooperation by our Church with all Protestant groups could not fail to have significant influence for Christ's work whereever the program was carried out. Unfortunately, your Board has little evidence that this suggestion met with success in the Diocese.

The new emphasis being made by the National Church upon Christian Education with its courses of study for adults, and the publication of two volumes in its contemplated series, "The Church's Teaching," has had good success in the Diocese of Virginia. Increasing evidence of large and successful use of the study series is at hand, and the response to the volume, "The Holy Scriptures," has been most encouraging. All of this points up the hunger of our people for knowledge of Christ and His Church, which we within the Church must encourage.

Continued advances being made in participation in the Men's Advent Corporate Communion, Youth Sunday and the Youth Offering, the various special offerings sponsored through the Sunday Schools, and the Youth Corporate Communion are all encouraging, but still wider understanding of these, and more participation is needed. We urge the clergy to use every effort to have their Churches participate to their fullest extent.

Your Board feels that in spite of all these significant advances, and increased interest being manifested, that its work is not adequate to the need of the Diocese. The program of the Diocese which is carried out by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society through its various

Boards, is planned without the Board of Evangelism being in consultation. It seems to your Board that this is unrealistic, since our understanding of Evangelism is that which includes all the work of the Church. As presently organized and constituted practically all the Diocesan Board of Evangelism has been able to accomplish is to recommend to the Diocese such plans of the Diocese and the National Church which are passed on to it. We feel that the work of a Diocesan Board of Evangelism should be that of planning the evangelistic program of the Diocese with the advice and consent of our Bishops, and that the Boards of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society should be the agents for carrying this program out. This would necessarily require a rethinking of the existing procedure which seems to us to be disorganized as far as existing Boards are concerned, each making its own plans with little knowledge of the others, and with no over-all program or plan for advance of the Diocese as a whole.

We recommend therefore that a canonical change be made setting up a Board of Evangelism as follows: four primary members, as at present, the Chairmen of all existing Boards of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the President of the Women's Auxiliary, the President of the Episcopal Churchmen, Dean of the Church Schools in the Diocese, and four additional members.

IV. CHURCH SCHOOLS

1. The Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia

On May 15, not ten days ago, your church preparatory schools were accorded a rare privilege. They were given an entire evening on the program of the Clergy Conference at Roslyn. This very privilege, however, puts me in an awkward position in presenting a report to this Council.

At the Conference last week four of the school "Heads" and myself discussed with the clergy many of the most important matters affecting the Schools. To repeat them now would be to run the chance of being boring to the clergy. To fail to repeat at least part of them, would be withholding problems which should be brought before the laity.

A way out of the dilemma, perhaps, is for me to excuse the clergy,—that is excuse either their physical presence or their mental awareness. What could be fairer from me as a layman! For surely the clergy in their turn, when in the pulpit, have regularly had to accept from laymen either their absence of body or their absence of mind.

Two matters are uppermost in the thoughts of us who are responsible for the operation of your church schools. On the one hand, conscious of our inadequacies, we are keenly desirous of making ourselves more effective in imparting a Christian education. And on the other hand, in our task of providing a Christian education, we feel the need of your interest,—the active interest of both the clergy and the laity.

The Diocese has no reason for being in the education business unless the education is Christian. This is the way our former Dean used to put it. And at this point, I want to pay high tribute to the Rev. E. A. deBordenave, who regrettably resigned two months ago to go to Christ Church, Philadelphia. To our keen and beloved "Froggie" we are grateful for making us acutely aware of the imperative command that we do a better job in imparting a Christian education. He led us to think increasingly from the theological standpoint. We have been doing an acceptable job, we hope, when it comes to the influences usually found in church-related schools, that is, bible studies, chapel services, and an environment that makes for good behaviour. But

This point of weakness in education is precisely the point of greatest weakness in our culture. And precisely because the weakness pervades our culture we need all the help we can get, including particularly your active interest.

"Froggie" helped make clear the point at which our schools are religiously

the weakest.

Let me tell you what I mean. The significant struggle in this world, it seems to me, is between the forces that would make us centered in God and the forces that would make us centered elsewhere. For these anti-God forces there is the old term—the Devil; and the new term, secularism is the failure to hold God central.

Now, what has this got to do with your church schools and the need for your cooperation. To begin with, we in the schools, under the leadership of deBordenave, came to realize in a new way that teachers and teaching material are usually brought to bear on children in a manner that is not Godcentered. Typically, education to today carries with it no expressed or implied dependence of man on God. God is left out as if irrelevant. The subtle result is the development of the attitude that God is indeed irrelevant, or, at least, that God is not central; but that, on the contrary, man plus knowledge plus time are adequate. This, to be sure, is secularism.

We in the Church Schools feel that we cannot successfully combat secularism by confining ourselves to methods heretofore generally considered sufficient,—that is sacred studies, chapel, and influences toward good personal behaviour. While these are of immense value and while we are working hard to make ourselves more proficient in these extremely important areas, we know that religion is not a thing apart and that we shouldn't teach as if it were. We cannot properly treat Christianity as if it had special boundaries in a separate compartment of our intellectual life.

Our pressing school problem, therefore, is how to infuse into our already excellent daily intellectual diet a growing awareness of the central nature of God and of Man's dependence on God. We in the Church Schools cannot meet the challenge if we present the academic subject-matter entirely from the conventional point of view, which is secular, while limiting our evangelical work to areas apart from the academic. There must be integrated with the academic a sense of the power of God. And this integration, to be acceptable,

must of course be accomplished without any sacrifice of truth. We have made worthwhile steps in the right direction under the guidance of deBordenave, and we shall ever be indebted to him.

CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

We need your help. Some of you are already working closely with the schools and can assist us in developing a sound academic curriculum which takes God into account. All of you, in large measure or small, can aid in exposing the dangers of secular education. The more a person becomes aware of the hazards of secularism, the greater is his appreciation of the need for Christian education. From a feeling of the need for Christian education, there naturally follows an increased demand for Christian education, whether the education comes from your church preparatory schools, from your Sunday Schools, or from elsewhere. A larger enrollment in our schools not only increases our usefulness but also tends to decrease the per-student cost of operation.

Economy of operation is obviously important. You can help us financially by increasing the demand for education that is Christian, and you can help in many other ways too numerous to mention in the limited time allotted to me. Contrariwise, I shall modestly refrain from dwelling on the ways the Church Schools can be of assistance to you through its students who return to your homes, parishes and communities.

However, there is one, small specific thing you can do for us at this Council. Our request grows out of the knowledge that this Diocese has a strong missionary spirit and out of the conviction that your Church Schools are a true missionary arm of the Church. Our request does not call for money, at least not yet; and the money in any event would not be directly for us.

After receiving generous financial aid from the Diocese for many years your school system became self-sustaining in 1940, since which time it has steadily expanded to include 7 schools and about 1,750 students. The annual budget of over \$1,000,000, is met from fees paid on behalf of the students by the parents. Rising costs have been met by rising fees. We are reluctant to increase fees further because we want to keep the cost of tuition within the range of as many families as possible. But we are barely breaking even. Indeed, if full depreciation is charged, we were in the red by \$17,000 last year and will be in the red by a slightly greater amount this year.

Here is our specific problem. For some years we have been giving to students discounts and grants-in-aid that total about \$25,000.00 a year. This aid is not from outside sources but falls on fee income. Most of this aid goes to the benefit of children of needy parents, children of the clergy and of theological students, and children of the teaching staffs. We doubt that we can continue such extensive student aid all by ourselves unless we increase tuition fees; and even then, there is the real danger that higher fees will hurt our enrollment.

We have therefore presented a resolution to the Resolutions Committee, which reads as follows:

Whereas the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia were created by the Diocese and were financially aided by the Diocese until 1940;

Whereas, the Church Schools have received no financial aid since 1940; Whereas, even the the Church Schools are self-sustaining and are operating at about the "break even" point, they are finding it difficult, under conditions of higher operating costs over which they have no control, to continue offering scholarship assistance out of their own fee income:

Whereas, the Church Schools regard themselves as a true missionary arm of the Church, deserving the continued active interest of the Diocese;

Be It Resolved, therefore, that the Bishop of the Diocese be instructed to appoint a committee of five members, including both clergymen and laymen, to study the relationship between the Diocese and the Church Schools and to consider ways and means by which the Diocese can promote the schools in their evangelical efforts, more particularly in providing scholarships for deserving students of parents in the Diocese who need financial assistance.

We ask your approval of this resolution.

2. Blue Ridge School

The work at Blue Ridge School for the session 1949-50 has progressed in a satisfying manner. The enrollment for the Boarding Department has reached its present capacity and we now have a waiting list. There are 98 boarding and 22 day students, making a total of 120. Of the boarding students, 75 come from the Diocese of Virginia, 7 from the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia and 1 from the Diocese of Southern Virginia. The remainder by states are as follows: New York, 1; New Jersey, 3; Delaware, 1; Maryland, 4; District of Columbia, 4; North Carolina, 2; and Florida, 1.

Of the above students, board and tuition for 68 is paid by parents or patrons, 13 by the Welfare Departments, 8 by the Community Chest, 1 by the Woman's Auxiliary, 3 through Bishop Mason and 7 in part through parents and patrons and in part by scholarships and organizations. Of the boarding students, about 15 might be considered as mountain children, plus the 22 day students, making a total of 37. The remainder come, in large part, from urban areas, with a lesser number from rural sections.

We feel that our function as a *home* is possibly more important than our function as a *school*. Perhaps most of our children could find a suitable school nearby, but what they need in addition to schooling is understanding and love and care and a sense of emotional security. Just now we have 9 sets of two children each from the same family, four sets of three children each from the same family and two sets of four children each from the same family. Since these include both boys and girls, we feel that our usefulness in providing a temporary home and in keeping the family unit together is unique among boarding schools in this section of the country. That, coupled with our

moderate charges, enables the children to come to us who would not otherwise be able to go to another school. Our children are about equally divided as to boys and girls, even though we do not take boys beyound the Seventh Grade at present.

Financially the year has been a little better than last. The one thousand dollar increase in the diocesan appropriation has been a tremendous help. It has helped us in keeping six children from the Diocese of Virginia for whom no one is financially responsible. The loyal support of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Episcopal Churchmen, the Y. P. S. L., the D. A. R., the New York Auxiliary, congregations, schools, and individuals both in and out of the Diocese has been of inestimable benefit. While we have a note for \$2,000.00 in the bank at present, we hope to close the year June 30th without a deficit. Our basic salary for teachers and housemothers has been increased during the last four years from \$60.00 to \$85.00, and in some instances \$100.00, plus board and room. Salaries and wages to the men on the farm have increased in even a larger proportion.

Capital improvements to the farm during the past year are as follows: a new tractor; a new disc plough; a new disc harrow; a mower attachment for the tractor; a \$500.00 pure bred Hereford bull; and a boar of the Danish and Canadian strain. Mr. Cason, our Farm Manager, has made many other improvements in the increase of livestock and the clearing of land and of operating the farm on scheduled time. Our dairy herd is increasing also.

Capital improvements to the school include insulating two frame buildings with rock wool, tile floors in all bathrooms at Boykin Hall and in the main kitchen, new bath facilities in the hospital and in the Richards Cottage. Our greatest improvement, however, has been at the Stone Cottage for the older boys. Here a new hot water heating system with stoker and ample hot water supply has been installed, a double bathroom for the boys and single bathroom for the houseparents and a great deal of painting on the inside. A new light line has been run from the Main Building to the Boy's Building and house telephones are now in all buildings. We have bought a new pick up truck which was sorely needed. We are most grateful for these improvements to the property and the comfort of living here. However, a great deal of repair work is needed at Blue Ridge now on existing buildings which it is hoped we can take care of soon.

Among our needs are dormitory space for both boys and girls, an adequate water supply, which is already under construction, enlarged dining room facilities, a gymnasium and staff apartments. The time for expansion appears to be here.

The academic work has been carried on in a creditable manner under Mr. Ralph A. Kelly, our principal. Music, shorthand and typing, and a course in home making have been offered in addition to the regular subjects. We still hope to offer again the shop work, which was dropped during the war.

There are four in the graduating class, three of whom plan to go on to college.

Again we have had a year of good health, with the exception of several minor accidents. Broken arms, wrists, and collar bones have been about what one would expect with our number of children.

The need of a gymnasium is great especially in the winter months, but we have carried on a fair program of recreation out-of-doors, as the weather permits. Movies twice a month, a formal dance, plays, recitals, folk dancing, and several trips to Charlottesville have been provided. A number of our children participated in the folk dancing at the Virginia Music Festival in Charlottesville.

Plans are under way for a building program to take care of more children. The Board voted to allow our seventh grade boys to stay on another year. The Summer Camp-School Program will be carried on again this year.

Regular services twice a Sunday have been held, also, week night Lenten Services. Religious education is taught three times a week, with daily chapel services. Five children have been baptized and six Confirmed. The Mission at Haneytown has been reopened, with Mr. and Mrs. James Teeter, members of our staff in charge. The response is most encouraging. The people really want the church there and are helping in every way they can

The spirit of the school is very good. It is natural that there are emotional peaks and valleys with adolescent children, but taking the year as a whole, our children have been happy and in many senses, privileged children in the opportunities that have been theirs. The age range of our staff members has been lowered. We have several younger staff members at this time. A D. P. farm family is expected soon and two young couples with one child each will soon join our staff. We cannot say too much in praise of the staff and their usefulness and unselfish devotion and service to the children. It is our earnest hope that their salaries can be raised sufficiently to indicate more appreciation for what has been done.

Blue Ridge has been going through a period of adjustment for several years. However, our purpose and direction seem now to be determined, and we ask the earnest consideration of the Diocese in the expansion and development of Blue Ridge School for the further fulfillment of this great work which is our common task.

3. Stuart Hall

Except for the reduction in the number of our boarding students—a condition which I believe has prevailed in practically all schools and many colleges—the year 1949-50 has been a satisfactory one in every respect. Our faculty and staff have certainly been the most able and the most happily adjusted that we have had during my seven years at Stuart Hall. We have four vacancies in the faculty, none in the staff, for the coming year, and two of these have already been filled—I hope and believe satisfactorily.

By realizing early last spring that there would be a reduction in numbers, we have been able to curtail expenses in every department, and shall finish the year satisfactorily from the financial standpoint, if not with a surplus. Since early last fall we have worked earnestly and steadily to raise our enrollment for 1950-51, always bearing in mind that enrollment must not be increased at the price of lowered standards of ability and work.

In actual numbers we have had this year 120 students, 106 boarding and 14 day students. Our senior class numbers 34, 23 of whom will enter outstanding colleges in the fall. We have recently had the reports from the College Board examinations taken March 11. Our students have done satisfactorily, and in a number of cases brilliantly on these examinations.

I feel that the spiritual life of the school has been deepened through our Bible classes, to which we are allotting three periods a week with academic credit in our General Course, and through our daily vesper services, conducted frequently by the girls themselves, under the direction of Mrs. Malcolm Macfarlane, our excellent Bible teacher.

Our academic and social life have progressed satisfactorily and happily, with much of encouragement in the day by day development of individual girls.

The school plant and the school grounds are in excellent condition, and I do not anticipate any large expenditures for the summer over and above the usual papering, painting and repairing.

In making a report, I always like to be peak your interest and efforts on behalf of the school. Stuart Hall, owned and operated by the three Virginia dioceses, would be flooded with applications for the entrance of students if every clergyman in these three dioceses would feel himself a part owner in the school, and share in its problems and responsibilities. Throughout the 107 years of its existence, the majority of the students have come from Virginia. Is it too much to ask that each clergyman bear this in mind and endeavour to interest in Stuart Hall those girls in his parish whom he would like to have as students in the school of his diocese? I realize that we probably cannot expect from the Diocese of Virginia, with its seven church schools and its own individual problems, as much support as from the other two dioceses. For Southwestern Virginia and Southern Virginia, Stuart Hall is the only diocesan owned church school for girls. With its background, fine traditions and the work which it is doing today in the development of young women, I believe, with all my heart, that it is a school of which you may be rightly proud. I only wish that more of you would make yourselves familiar with it. We welcome visits at any time.

II. OPERATING ACCOUNT OF THE DIOCESE, AND INVESTMENT ACCOUNTS OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESAN MISSION-ARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA AND CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE.

To the Finance Committee, Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia.

GENTLEMEN:

We have made an audit of the Treasurer's records and accounts of the administration of Operating Funds of the Diocese and Investment Funds of the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society and Church Extension Committee for the year ended December 31, 1949, as kept by your Treasurer, Rev. Samuel B. Chilton, and submit herewith sundry statements, as reflected in the foregoing index, together with the following related comments.

The account of the Operating and Investment Funds, considered as a whole, embraces miscellaneous funds for general church administrative and extension purposes in the Diocese; and the cash funds for the purposes designated are derived mainly from churches, auxiliary organizations, apportionments from the General Program Funds, individuals, etc.

In the verification of the amounts shown as accruing to the general account from the various sources enumerated above, we have not gone beyond the records of your Treasurer, but have relied substantially on a check of all recorded receipts and disbursements.

The form of the statements presented herewith is substantially the same as those of the preceding year.

Exhibit "A" reflects the assets and fund balances of the Diocese at December 31, 1949.

Exhibits "B," "C," "D," "E," and "F" set forth the receipts and disbursements of the various operating funds of the Diocese, showing for each fund, the condition at the beginning of the year, the total receipts and disbursements and the final balance.

Exhibit "G" reflects the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society. Securities held are described in Exhibit "G-1."

Exhibit "H" sets forth the changes during the year in the principal and income accounts of the Invested Funds of the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Exhibit "I" records the changes in the notes and fund balance of the Church Extension Committee.

We have examined the records of account relating to the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, for the year ended December 31, 1949, and in connection therewith, we have prepared the accompanying statements, as set forth in the foregoing index, which in our opinion reflect the changes that have occurred in the various funds during the year 1949 and show their status at the close of the year.

Exhibit "A" sets forth the assets and fund balances at December 31, 1949. Exhibit "B" reflects the total increases and decreases during the year and the year ending balances of both fund principal and income of the individual funds of the general group and of the Disabled Clergy, Widows' and Orphans', Sallie May Dooley, Working Girls' Cot and Diamond Cot Funds.

In the allotting of income to the various individual funds, your Treasurer has apportioned net income to the funds on a basis of 4% of the average monthly balance of principal, except in the case of specified securities held for certain funds, in which case the income was allotted as received from the respective investment.



CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA.

(1950)

Whereas, the civil government in the Virginia Colony from time to time established within the bounds of the Colony parishes of the Established Church of England in Virginia, which parishes continued as such until the Church was disestablished by the several acts of the General Assembly of Virginia in 1784; and

Whereas, the Protestant Episcopal Church of Virginia was organized in May, 1785, by a union of all the parishes of the disestablished Church of England within the bounds of the Commonwealth of Virginia and took part in the organization of the union of all the Protestant Episcopal Churches of the several States and, by its own formal ratification of the plan of union, became the Diocese of Virginia of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America; and

Whereas, the original Diocese of Virginia, embracing the entire State, has since been divided into several Dioceses, one of which remains established as the Diocese of Virginia:

Now, Therefore, the Diocese of Virginia acknowledges the authority and power of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, as set forth in the Constitution and Canons adopted thereby, and, in the exercise of its own powers and authority, doth amend and revise the Constitution of this Diocese so that the same shall read as follows:

THE CONSTITUTION

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

IN THE

DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

ARTICLE I.

The order, government, and discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia shall be vested in the Bishop, and in the Council of the Diocese, constituted as provided in Article III hereof, which shall have power to adopt Canons, and take any other action that may be proper, for the conduct of its affairs, not in conflict with this Constitution.

The Council shall hold each year a regular meeting at the place designated by the preceding regular meeting of the Council. Each regular meeting shall be held on the third Wednesday in May, except that when Ascension Day shall fall upon the day following the third Wednesday in May, the regular meeting of the Council for that year shall be held on the fourth Wednesday in May.

ARTICLE II.

The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may, for any cause deemed by it to be sufficient, change the time, or the place, or both the time and the place, for any regular meeting of the Council.

A special meeting of the Council may be called by the Bishop as provided in Article VIII, or by the Standing Committee, as provided in Article IX.

The clerical order shall consist of the Bishop or Bishops and all other ordained ministers canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia.

No member of the clerical order shall be entitled to vote in any meeting of the Council until he has been for at least six months preceding the meeting canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia

No member of the clerical order under ecclesiastical censure shall be entitled to a seat in the Council.

The lay order shall consist of three classes, namely: (a) the lay delegates from the parishes, separate congregations, and mission churches entitled to representation by canon; (b) the tay delegates from the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge; and (c) the lay delegates ex-officio.

- (a) There shall be one lay delegate from each parish having a parish Vestry, from each separate congregation, and from each mission church entitled to representation by Canon, to be chosen by their respective Vestries. But from every parish, or separate congregation, in which there is more than one minister canonically settled, there shall be as many lay delegates as there are ministers so canonically settled, and from every parish or separate congregation having more than three hundred (300) communicants reported to the diocesan authorities in the last annual report, there shall be an additional delegate for each three hundred (300) communicants or major fraction thereof above the first three hundred (300); in no case, however, shall any parish or separate congregation be entitled to more than three lay delegates. SECTION 2. The lay delegates shall serve for the regular meeting for which they are chosen, and, unless other delegates be chosen, for any special meeting held prior to the next regular meeting of the Council.

SECTION 3. All members of the Council shall be communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

ARTICLE IV.

Thirty members of the clerical and thirty members of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or special meeting of the Council, but a smaller number may adjourn.

In all matters that may come before any meeting of the Council the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body and a majority of those voting shall be necessary for a decision, except where the vote is by orders, in which case there must be a concurrence of majorities in each order; but, before a vote is taken upon any measure, five members may, by request, require the vote to be taken by orders, in which case the voting shall be by ballot.

In addition to the Bishop of the Diocese, there may be a Bishop Coadjutor or Bishops Suffragan, or both, upon the conditions and pursuant to the authority contained in the Canons of the General Convention.

In addition to the Bishop, or Bishops, the officers of the Diocese shall con-

sist of a Secretary, Treasurer, Chancellor, and Registrar.

For the further conduct of the affairs of the Diocese there shall be a Standing Committee, Committee on Church Property, Committee on Finance, Pension Fund Committee, and the Diocesan Missionary Society, together with such other officers, committees, and boards as the Council may deem necessary.

ARTICLE VII.

The election of a Bishop shall be made at a regular annual meeting of the Council, or at a special meeting of the Council called for the purpose. The vote shall be by ballot and by orders and a concurrent majority of the votes cast by each order shall be necessary to a choice.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Bishop shall preside at all meetings of the Council and exercise all the ordinary duties of a presiding officer. It shall be his duty to give to the regular annual meeting of the Council a general view of the state of the Church. He may call a special meeting of the Council at whatever time and place he may think necessary, and whenever requested by the Standing Committee it shall be his duty to call a special meeting to be held at the time and place selected by the Standing Committee.

The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside at any meeting of the Council from which the Bishop is absent, or whenever the Bishop may request him to preside.

ARTICLE IX.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office, a special meeting of the Council may be called by the Standing Committee; and the Council, immediately upon assembling, shall elect by ballot a President from among the order of Presbyters, who shall remain in office until the election and the consecration of a Bishop for the Diocese of Virginia, or until the next regular annual meeting of the Council, whichever shall happen first. The President so elected shall perform all the duties and possess all the privileges of a presiding officer. He shall not have the power to call a special meeting of the Council except when requested so to do by the Standing Committee, in which case he shall call the special meeting at the time and place set by the Standing Committee.

If there be no vacancy in the Episcopal office, yet both the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor be absent from a meeting of the Council, then the Council shall elect by ballot a President *pro tempore* from among the order of Presbyters.

ARTICLE X.

A Secretary of the Diocese shall be elected at each regular annual meeting of the Council. His duty shall be to act as Secretary of the Council and to make minutes of its proceedings, to attest the public acts of the body, and to perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall have the power to fill the same.

ARTICLE XI.

A Treasurer of the Diocese shall be elected at each regular annual meeting of the Council, and shall, upon qualification, continue in office until removed as hereinafter provided, or until his successor is elected or appointed and qualified. It shall be his duty to receive and keep safely all money and other

property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be provided by Canon. He shall report annually to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same. The Treasurer shall give bond for the faithful performance of his duties in an amount to be fixed by the Committee on Finance, with corporate security approved by said Committee, which bond shall cover his responsibility for all money and other property coming into his hands as Treasurer from whatsoever source.

At the close of each fiscal year, accounts of the Treasurer shall be audited by a certified public accountant under direction of the Committee on Finance.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Treasurer, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall have the power to fill the same. The Treasurer so appointed shall be required to give a like bond with like security.

In case of the misconduct of the Treasurer, or of his incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, the Ecclesiastical Authority may remove him and fill the vacancy.

ARTICLE XII.

At the regular annual meeting of the Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, the Council shall elect a Chancellor of the Diocese, who shall continue in office until his successor is elected or appointed. He shall be a lay communicant residing in the Diocese of Virginia and learned in the law. He shall be the legal adviser of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and also of all the officers, committees and boards of the Diocese whenever they shall require legal advice in matters affecting the interests of the Diocese of Virginia.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Chancellor the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a successor to serve until the next regular annual meeting of the Council, which shall have power to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE XIII.

At the regular annual meeting of the Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention, the Council shall elect a Registrar of the Diocese, who shall continue in office until his successor is elected or appointed. It shall be the duty of said Registrar to receive and preserve, under the direction of the Council, or the Bishop, books, papers and other documents bearing upon the history of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia, and to perform such other duties pertaining to his office as may be required of him by the Council.

In case of a vacancy in the office of Registrar the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a successor to serve until the next regular annual meeting of the Council, which shall have power to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE XIV.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese shall consist of six members, three of the clerical order, and three of the lay order, each of whom shall be a communicant of the Church in this Diocese.

At the first regular meeting of the Council succeeding the final adoption of this amendment the Council shall elect the six members of the Standing Committee, one of each order for the term of one year, one of each order for the term of two years, and one of each order for the term of three years.

At each regular annual meeting thereafter the Council shall elect one member of each order for the term of three years. Each member of the committee shall hold office until his successor is elected or appointed.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office, or in case neither the Bishop nor the Bishop Coadjutor be capable of performing the administrative duties of the Bishop, and in any case when the Bishop shall authorize it to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee at every annual meeting of the Council to submit a report of its proceedings. When required by the Council it shall also lay before the Council any documents which may have come into its possession.

In case of a vacancy in the Standing Committee the committee shall have authority to fill said vacancy from the same order, the appointee to serve until the next annual meeting of the Council, at which meeting the Council shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term, if any, of the previous incumbent.

ARTICLE XV.

The Committee on Church Property shall be composed of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and three lay members who shall be communicants of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia and who shall be elected at each regular annual meeting of the Council and shall continue in office until their successors are elected or appointed.

The Committee shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in the Committee.

ARTICLE XVI.

At each regular annual meeting of the Council there shall be elected a Committee on Finance of the Diocese, which shall be composed of five lay communicants of the Diocese, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected or appointed.

The Committee shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in the Committee.

ARTICLE XVII.

At each regular annual meeting of the Council, there shall be elected a Committee on the Church Pension Fund, to consist of two clergymen and five laymen who shall continue in office until their successors are elected or appointed.

The Committee shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in the Committee.

ARTICLE XVIII.

All baptized members of the Protestant Episcopal Church residing in this Diocese shall, as heretofore, constitute a Missionary Society known as the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

This Society shall have charge of all the missionary, educational and social work of the Diocese. Its activities shall be directed by an Executive Committee selected in such manner, and vested with such powers and duties, as shall be prescribed by Canon.

ARTICLE XIX.

Every parish, separate congregation and mission church within the Diocese of Virginia at the effective date of this Constitution, and all others that may be canonically connected with or created within this Diocese thereafter, shall be bound by this Constitution and the Canons adopted in pursuance hereof.

ARTICLE XX.

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner only, namely: At any regular annual meeting of the Council any proposed amendment shall be referred to the proper committee, and considered. If approved by the Council, it shall be again considered at the next annual meeting of the Council and, if again approved, shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

CANONS

OF THE

PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

(1941)

CANON I.

Of an Official List of the Clergy of the Diocese.

Section 1. A list of all the ordained Ministers, or Clergy, of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in this Diocese, with their post office addresses, and their respective cures, stations or positions, shall be prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority and kept, corrected up to date, on file at the headquarters of the Diocese.

This official list of the Clergy of the Diocese shall be prima facie evidence of a Clergyman's canonical residence, and his cure, station or position.

SECTION 2. The right of any Clergyman to vote in the Council shall, if denied or disputed, be determined by the Council itself according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, whether his name be inserted in, or omitted from, the said list.

SECTION 3. The said list of the Clergy of the Diocese, corrected up to date, with the names of those entitled to vote in the Council designated thereon, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the roll of the Clerical delegates entitled to vote shall be called therefrom.

The said list of the Clergy as submitted to the Council shall be appended to the Journal, and be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of every Clergyman canonically resident in the Diocese to attend regularly every meeting of Council; or, if unable to attend, to send to the President of the Council a written statement of the reasons therefor.

CANON II.

Of Lay Representation in the Council.

Section 1. The Parishes of this Diocese, entitled to representation in the Council, are those which were established by law prior to the eighteenth day of May, A. D., 1785; together with those which have since that time been, or may hereafter be, constituted and received into union therewith by act of the Convention or Council of the Diocese. The Churches entitled to representation are those which have been constituted and received as Separate Congregations or Mission Churches by like action of the Convention or Council. But

a Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission Church, having no vestry, shall not be entitled, as such, to representation in the Council.

The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge shall be entitled to the representation

given by the Constitution.

A list of the Parishes, Separate Congregations and Mission Churches in the Diocese entitled to representation in the Council shall be appended to the journal of each annual Council.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of every Parish, and of every Church entitled to representation, as above defined, to elect the number of Lay Delegates and Alternates to each annual meeting of the Council of the Diocese to which they may be respectively entitled.

Section 3. The election of Lay Delegates to the Council, and their Alternates, shall be certified by the Rector, Register, or one of the Wardens of the proper Parish or Church, in duplicate; and said certificate shall be in form as follows:

One copy of this certificate shall be sent to the Secretary of the Diocese at least ten days before the meeting of the Council, and a copy shall be given to the delegate or delegates attending.

Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make a roll of the Lay Delegates and Alternates certified to him as duly elected, with the Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches, or Missionary Jurisdictions represented by them respectively, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall thereupon appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one Clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to which shall be referred the Credentials of all Lay Delegates and which shall make its report to the Council promptly. But until this report be received the roll as made and called by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authentic roll of Lay Delegates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, the Committee on Credentials shall hear the evidence presented and report its judgment thereon. Upon this report the Council shall determine the matter unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present the Council shall decide to hear the whole case *de novo*.

CANON III.

Of Deputies to the General Convention.

Section 1. At the Annual Council next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention there shall be elected by ballot the full number of Clerical and Lay Deputies to the General Convention to which this Diocese is entitled, and, in the same manner, a like number of Clerical and Lay Alternate Deputies; and a majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. The Clerical Deputies shall be Presbyters canonically resident in this Diocese, and the Lay Deputies shall be communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

The Deputies so elected shall serve for the regular meeting for which they are chosen and, unless other Deputies be elected by the Council, for any special meeting held prior to the next regular meeting of the General Convention.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of each of the Deputies elected to signify to the Secretary of the Council, at least ten days before the meeting of the General Convention, whether or not he accepts the election. If he accepts, the Secretary shall issue to him a certificate of election. Should any Deputy elected decline, or fail to signify his acceptance, or should a vacancy occur otherwise, the Secretary of the Council shall issue the certificate of election to the Alternate Deputy of the same order in which the vacancy occurs, who was first elected; or, if more than one were elected on the same ballot, who received the highest number of votes; and if there be more than one vacancy the others shall be filled successively in like manner.

CANON IV.

Of the Committee on Church Property.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Church Property to take such steps as may be necessary to recover or secure any property, real or personal, belonging to any Parish or Congregation of the Church within this Diocese, the legal title to which is not vested in duly constituted Trustees; and in the case of any such property which may be regarded as abandoned property, the said Committee shall take such steps as may be necessary either to hold said property, or to make sale thereof, in accordance with the statutes of this State in that case made and provided; and in case of a sale of the said property, the said Committee shall pay over to the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia the proceeds of such sale, to be subject to the order and disposition of the Council of this Diocese.

Section 2. It shall also be the duty of this Committee, when it may be necessary, to apply to the Courts of the State for the appointment of Trustees to hold the legal title to any property belonging to the Church within this

Diocese, and under the control of the Council thereof. And it is hereby constituted the proper authority of the Council to make such application. It shall also have the care of the Episcopal Residence, and other property belonging to the Diocese for which no other custodians are provided; and shall be authorized to make such expenditures for repairs, insurance, etc., thereon as may be necessary, with the approval of the Committee on Finance.

SECTION 3. This Committee shall make a report annually to the Council of any action taken by it in the preceding year.

CANON V.

Of the Diocesan Expense Assessment and Duties of the Committee on Finance in Connection Therewith.

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Diocese, and of each Parish, Separate Congregation, Mission Church and Mission, shall begin January first.

Section 2. There shall be created a special fund known as "The Diocesan Expense Assessment" to be raised by assessment upon the Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches and Missions of the Diocese, as provided in Section 3 hereof, out of which shall be paid the salaries and expenses of the Bishop, or Bishops, assessments made against this Diocese by the Provincial Synod and the General Convention, and such other expenditures as may specifically be directed by the Council.

Section 3. The Committee on Finance shall, at each annual Council, present an estimate of the amount needed to cover the anticipated expenditures from the Diocesan Expense Assessment for the fiscal year beginning the first of January following, together with a schedule assessing the amounts called for in said estimate equitably upon the several Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches and Missions of the Diocese.

The said assessment shall be based upon the relative financial strength of the several Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches and Missions, as shown by their respective parochial reports over a period of the three preceding years and by other pertinent facts and considerations.

When the Council shall have fixed the said estimate and assessment for the Diocesan Expense Assessment, notice of the amount assessed against it shall be promptly sent to the several Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches and Missions so assessed: but any Vestry, or the Minister in charge of a Mission so assessed, shall have the right, within thirty days after the receipt of said notice, to request the Committee on Finance for an adjustment of the said assessment, and the said Committee may make adjustment accordingly if cause be shown therefor.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of each Vestry, or Minister in charge of a Mission, to see that the sum assessed is paid to the Treasurer of the Diocese in full at the beginning of the fiscal year, or quarterly in advance throughout the year. Each Vestry shall be free to adopt such means as it may deem best to secure the assessment.

CANONS

Section 5. The Committee on Finance may, between meetings of the Council, authorize and require the Treasurer, out of such part of the Diocesan Expense Assessment as has not been allocated by the Council, to pay any extraordinary or unforeseen expenses which shall legitimately arise in the proper conduct of the business of the Diocese.

CANON VI.

Of the Committee on Finance.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance to have the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese audited annually, and to report to each regular annual meeting of the Council, and to any special meeting thereof when requested, the financial condition of the Diocese as disclosed by such audits, with such recommendations as it may deem expedient, and to perform such other duties as the Council may direct or may be prescribed by Constitution or Canon.

CANON VII.

Of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund.

Section 1. The Diocese of Virginia hereby ratifies and confirms its previous adoption of the system of the Church Pension Fund and the assumption of all duties and obligations thereunder, including the contract dated November 27, 1918, between the Church Pension Fund and the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a copy whereof is on record at the headquarters of the Diocese.

Section 2. In furtherance of the Church Pension Fund system and of the said contract between the Church Pension Fund and the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia it shall be the duty of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund:

(a) To furnish annually, not later than April 1, to the Church Pension Fund the canonical roll of the Bishops and other Clergy of this Diocese, and of the Clergy canonically resident in other Dioceses or Missionary Districts who may be licensed to officiate in this Diocese, with a statement of the stipends received by each of said Bishops and Clergymen from the Diocese, or from any Parish, Congregation, or other Ecclesiastical Organization in this Diocese.

(b) To collect from the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia the annual income accruing on the investments held by the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund of this Diocese, and to transmit the same semi-annually to the Church Pension Fund for application as the Committee shall direct on account of the premiums necessary to be paid by this Diocese.

(c) To make arrangements, if deemed desirable, with the Church Pension Fund for the direct transmission by the several Parishes, Congregations,

Missions and other Ecclesiastical Organizations of the Diocese to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund of the premiums payable by said Parishes, Congregations, Missions and other Ecclesiastical Organizations.

(d) To keep the Church Pension Fund informed at all times of the Bishops and other Clergy, and of the unmarried widows and unmarried minor orphans of such Bishops and other Clergy, canonically resident in this Diocese, who may

be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.

(e) To secure from every Bishop and other Clergyman canonically resident in this Diocese receiving a stipend or stipends a statement showing the stipend or stipends received, and it shall be the duty of every Bishop and other Clergyman receiving such stipend or stipends, and of every Parish, Congregation, Mission or other Ecclesiastical Organization in this Diocese paying a stipend or stipends to Clergymen, to furnish a statement of such stipend or stipends to the Committee upon its written request.

(f) In general, to do all things necessary to keep the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese advised as to the benefits of the Church Pension Fund, to secure the prompt payment of the assessments due by the several Parishes, Congregations, Missions and other Ecclesiastical Organizations of the Diocese, and to perform all other duties imposed upon the Committee by Canon or resolution

of Council.

(g) To make a report to the regular annual meeting of the Council containing a list of such Parishes, Congregations, Missions or other Ecclesiastical Organizations as may have failed to pay in full the assessments charged for the preceding year, and such other matters in regard to the operation of the Church Pension Fund in this Diocese as may be deemed desirable.

CANON VIII.

Of Duties of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia in Connection with the Church Pension Fund.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia to pay semi-annually, or oftener at their option, to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund all the income of the investments held by the said Trustees for the Widows and Orphans Fund and the Disabled Clergy Fund.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to transfer and deliver to a Trust Company to be named jointly by the Trustees and the Church Pension Fund all of the securities and principal funds belonging to the Disabled Clergy Fund and the Widows and Orphans Fund, and any further gifts or bequests for the benefit of disabled Clergy or the widows and orphans of deceased Clergy which the said Trustees may in future receive, to be held by the said Trust Company with authority and obligation on its part to collect the income and to hold it subject to the order of the Trustees.

Canons

17

Whenever in the judgment of the Trustees it shall become expedient to make a particular investment of uninvested funds, or to change any existing investments, said investment or change of investment shall be made when and as may be directed by the Trustees with the approval of the Church Pension Fund.

Section 3. The Trustees are hereby authorized and directed to exercise all powers necessary to carry into effect the contract of November 27, 1918, between themselves and the Church Pension Fund, and any other contract which, with the consent of the Council, may be entered into between them.

CANON IX.

Of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Section 1. The government of the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia shall be vested in an Executive Committee. Its object shall be to extend and support the missionary, educational and social work of the Church in the Diocese and to encourage the liberality of its members in support of the Church's mission.

SECTION 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of three classes of members, as follows, namely: (a) The members ex officio; (b) The members from the several Convocations in the Diocese; (c) The members from the Diocese at large.

(a) The members ex-officio shall be the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, the Bishop Suffragan, if there be one, the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, the Associate or Assistant Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge, if there be one, the Treasurer of the Diocese, the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese, and members of the corporation known as "The Trustees of Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia."

(b) The members from the several Convocations in the Diocese shall be one clergyman and one layman from each of the several Convocations in the Diocese which shall have been recognized by the Council as being entitled to such representation, and shall be elected annually by the Council to serve for one year.

(c) There shall be twelve members from the Diocese at large, six of whom shall be clergymen and six of whom shall be laymen. In the year 1937 the Council shall elect two Clergymen and two Laymen to serve for one year, two Clergymen and two Laymen to serve for two years and two Clergymen and two Laymen to serve for three years, and in the year 1938 and annually thereafter the Council shall elect two Clergymen and two Laymen to serve for three years.

The class (b) members must be chosen from those who are nominated by the respective Convocations, and no such member shall be elected for more than three successive years.

No class (c) member shall be eligible to succeed himself.

Section 3. The Bishop shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall be Vice-Chairman.

The Treasurer of the Diocese shall be Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

The Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Society shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

An Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education shall be elected by the Executive Committee upon nomination by the Bishop.

The Executive Committee shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in class (b) or (c) membership of the Committee provided that a vacancy in a class (b) membership shall be filled only upon nomination by the Convocation to be represented.

The Executive Committee may adopt such rules and by-laws as may be needful for its own guidance and the guidance of those under its authority, not in conflict with the Constitution and Canons and subject always to the direction and control of the Council.

Nine Members of the Executive Committee, duly convened, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 4. The Executive Committee shall be charged with the conduct and development of the missionary, educational and social work of the Church in the Diocese, except such as is strictly parochial; it shall receive, appropriate and disburse contributions made for such work; and *generally*, as the executive agency of the Society shall advance its interest and promote its work.

All Boards, and other agencies and persons employed or engaged in the said missionary, educational, and social work in the Diocese shall be subject to the supervision and direction of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall have authority, with the advice and consent of the Bishop, to establish missions in the Diocese; to aid in the erection of buildings connected therewith; to group missions or congregations dependent upon the Society into suitable fields or cures; to employ missionaries, provide for their support, and give them such directions as may be deemed necessary; provided always that the rights and responsibilities of a duly constituted Rector or Vestry shall never be infringed upon without his or its consent.

The Executive Committee shall also have authority to aid feeble Parishes or Congregations in supporting their ministers, upon application from the Vestries thereof, when, and as long as, they are satisfied that such aid is necessary; to assist in providing the material equipment of Parishes and Missions; to provide for the training of workers and teachers; for the distribution of Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals; for the publication and distribution of books, papers, etc., for Sunday Schools and Missions; and for missionary meetings and addresses.

SECTION 5. For the furtherance of the purposes of the Society the Executive Committee shall create the following named Departments or Boards with such powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Committee; each of which shall consist of the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor as ex-officio mem-

bers and of two classes of members elected annually, as soon as may be after the organization of the Committee, namely:

(a) Primary members, who shall be elected by the Committee from its own membership except as hereinafter otherwise provided; and

(b) Additional members, either clerical or lay, who shall be elected by the primary members of said Department or Board from the Diocese at large.

The Departments or Boards so created, with their respective membership, shall be:

I. The Board of Christian Education, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of the work of Religious Education in the Diocese, and shall serve as an advisory board to the Executive Secretary.

II. The Board of College Work, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of work in colleges and universities within the Diocese.

III. The Board of Christian Social Relations, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of the work of Christian Social work in the Diocese.

IV. The Field Board, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall bave charge of the Every-Member Canvass as provided in Section 6 of this Canon, such other promotional work as the Executive Committee may direct; and, through a subcommittee, all such publicity as the Field Board may deem necessary thereto. This subcommittee shall have charge of the Diocesan Magazine.

V. The Board of Mountain Work, composed of two primary members, one being a clergyman and the other a layman elected by the Executive Committee and a Chairman and six additional members appointed by the Bishop and approved by the Executive Committee, which shall have charge of all mountain mission work in the Diocese. The Secretary and the Treasurer of the Diocese shall be ex-officio the Secretary and the Treasurer of this Board.

VI. The Board of Evangelism, composed of four primary and ten additional members, which shall have charge of the work of evangelism in the Diocese.

Members of each Board, whether primary or additional, shall continue in office until the next election of primary members by the Executive Committee. Each of the additional members of said Departments or Boards shall be entitled to a seat—but not a vote—at the meetings of the Executive Committee.

Each Department or Board shall elect from its members a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, and shall report its actions and recommendations to the Executive Committee.

Out of the appropriation made by the Executive Committee to each of said Departments or Boards the Treasurer of the Diocese shall pay the expenses incurred by each Department or Board upon written order of the Chairman or Vice-Chairman, certified by its Secretary.

In addition to the above named Departments and Boards the Executive Committee may also appoint from its membership such sub-committees as may be needful to facilitate its work, and may prescribe their duties.

Section 6. In order that sufficient means may be provided by the offerings of the people for the support and extension of the missionary, educational and social work of the Church in the Diocese, and for its proper share of the work of the Church at large, the Executive Committee shall plan and promote, through the Field Board, each year, an Every Member Canvass to be made after adequate preparation in every Parish, Congregation and Mission as far as possible, at a time appointed by the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall consult with the appropriate Departments of the National Council, the Trustees of the Diocesan institutions, and representatives of the Parishes, Congregations and Missions of the Diocese and shall prepare an annual Survey and Budget setting forth the opportunities and needs of the Diocese and of the General Church for the next fiscal year and, not later than the first day of May of each year, submit the Survey and Budget to every minister and vestry, and shall also submit the Survey and Budget to the Council for final action thereon at its regular meeting.

The Executive Committee shall prepare a schedule apportioning among the Parishes, Congregations, and Missions of the Diocese the total amount called for by the Budget adopted by the Council, which apportionment shall be based upon the relative financial ability of the several Parishes, Congregations, and Missions. For the purpose of such apportionment, the financial ability of each Parish, Congregation and Mission shall be determined by the amount of its annual current expenses, over the three years preceding, as disclosed by its parochial reports, and by such peculiar facts and considerations as may be deemed pertinent by the Executive Committee.

The Schedule and Budget so prepared and adopted shall be published and copies thereof shall be delivered to each Minister and Vestry not later than the first day of October of each year.

In order that the people may be properly instructed as to the needs of the Diocese and of the General Church as outlined in the Budget, the Field Board, in co-operation with the parochial authorities and committees organized for the purpose, shall conduct each year a campaign of instruction and preparation throughout the Diocese, culminating in the Every Member Canvass.

It shall be the duty of the Minister and Vestry of each Parish, Congregation and Mission to further the objects of the annual campaign of instruction and preparation by laying before congregations the apportionment or quota as fixed by the Executive Committee and by using all diligence to secure pledges, to the full ability of their respective congregations to give, to meet the needs of the Diocese and of the General Church. It shall be the further duty of each Minister and Vestry to report to the Treasurer of the Diocese not later than the thirty-first day of December in each year the amount which their Parish or Congregation agrees to pay on, or above, its apportionment or

quota, and to provide for regular monthly payment to the Treasurer of the Diocese of the amount that they have agreed to pay to the Diocesan Budget.

If the total acceptances do not equal the total Budget the Executive Committee shall inform the people of the Diocese as to the facts and shall take such steps as it deems best to meet the situation.

As soon as practicable after the first day of January in each year the Executive Committee shall prepare and adopt a schedule of payments for the ensuing fiscal year and furnish the Treasurer of the Diocese with a copy of the same. The estimated receipts, if less than the Budget, shall be applied first to fixed obligations and the remainder to other objects in the Budget.

The adopted schedule of payments shall be the warrant of the Treasurer of the Diocese for paving out the money received. Between the first of the fiscal year and the adoption of the schedule of payments the Executive Committee may specifically direct the Treasurer of the Diocese to disburse money in such manner as may be found necessary.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee at every annual meeting of the Council, sitting as a Missionary Council, to submit a report of its proceedings and operations and those of its Boards and subcommittees, and of the progress and condition of the missionary work of the Diocese.

CANON X.

Of the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge.

Section 1. The Missions engaged in Mountain Work shall constitute a Missionary Jurisdiction to be known as "The Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge." The Missions to be included in this jurisdiction shall be designated from time to time by the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Section 2. A Presbyter to be known as the Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge may be appointed by the Bishop with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society. When appointed, he shall, as representative of the Bishop, have general supervision of the Mountain Work and be responsible for the promotion thereof. When in the judgment of the Bishop and the said Executive Committee it shall be necessary, there may be an associate or assistant Archdeacon appointed in like manner, and with like powers and duties.

Section 3. The management of the affairs of this Jurisdiction shall be under the Board of Mountain Work as constituted under the Canon dealing with the Diocesan Missionary Society. The said Board may adopt, with the approval of the Bishop and said Executive Committee, such by-laws governing the Mountain Work as may be deemed advisable.

CANON XI.

Of Convocations.

SECTION 1—There shall be five Convocations in the Diocese of Virginia which shall be fixed by geographical limits as follows:

(1) The Albmarle Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties of Albemarle, Culpeper, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Louisa, Orange and

(2) The Piedmont Convocation, comprising all parishes in the Counties

of Arlington and Fairfax, and the City of Alexandria.

(3) The Rappahannock Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Caroline, Charles City, Essex, Gloucester, Hanover, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster, Mathews, Middlesex, New Kent, Northumberland, Richmond, Spotsylvania, Stafford, and Westmoreland.

(4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all parishes in the County of Henrico and in the City of Richmond north of the James River.

(5) The Valley Convocation, comprising all Parishes in the Counties of Clarke, Frederick, Loudoun, Madison, Page, Rappahannock, Shenandoah, Warren, Fauquier and Prince William.

Except in the case of the City of Richmond cities shall, for the purpose of this section, be considered parts of the Counties in which they are geographically situated.

Changes in Convocation boundaries of any of the five Convocations shall be authorized by Council on the joint application of the Convocations in-

Section 2. Every Clergyman canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia shall be a member of the Convocation in which his principal Church or his Cure is situated; except that a retired Minister shall retain his membership in the Convocation of which he was a member at the time of his retirement, or become a member of the Convocation in which he resides.

SECTION 3. Each of the Convocations may make provision for its lay representation, and may enact such rules and by laws as may be necessary for its own guidance.

CANON XII.

Of the Division of Parishes.

SECTION 1. Whenever the members of this Church, residing in a particular portion of a Parish, or in adjoining portions of two or more Parishes, shall desire to separate from the Parish or Parishes of which they are a part and form an independent or new Parish, it shall be lawful for them to assemble, after ten days notice of the time and place of such meeting given publicly in the Church, or otherwise, to each known person qualified to vote for Vestrymen in the territory proposed to be formed into a new Parish, and appoint a Committee to take such measures as may be necessary.

Section 2. The Committee thus appointed shall give to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and to the Vestry or Vestries in the Parish or Parishes from which they desire to be separated, a formal notice of their intention to apply to the Council for such separation and formation of an independent or new Parish, which notice shall contain a description of the proposed line or lines of division, and shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority, and to the said Vestry or Vestries, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the application shall be made.

Section 3. Said application shall be made in the form of a petition to the Council; and shall set forth the considerations which are supposed to render the division desirable, together with an accurate description of the proposed line or lines of division, the name proposed for the new Parish, and a statement showing the extent of the territory, the Churches and Missions, if any, and the number of communicants, which will be embraced therein.

Section 4. The Council shall refer the petition to a committee to examine and report thereon at such time as the Council shall require. Upon receiving the report of the committee the Council may, if deemed expedient, proceed to divide the said Parish or Parishes and to constitute the portion thereof applying for separation a new Parish, with all the rights and privileges of other Parishes of this Diocese. The petition, or so much thereof as shall contain the description of the line or lines of division, shall, if the petition be granted, be delivered to the Secretary of the Diocese and shall be published in the Journal of the Council.

Section 5. As soon as practicable after the new Parish is constituted, the Committee which made the application aforesaid shall give at least ten days' notice, in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Canon, to the qualified electors residing in the new Parish to assemble for the election of a Vestry. Such election shall be conducted according to the direction contained in the Canon "Of the Election and Organization of Vestries."

CANON XIII.

Of Establishing or Altering Parish Boundaries.

Section 1. When it shall be deemed desirable to alter the boundary lines between two or more Parishes, or when such lines are unknown, or need to be newly determined, the Vestries of the Parishes concerned may agree upon the lines which they wish to have established as their parish lines, and unite in a petition to the Council to alter or establish them accordingly, which petition shall contain an accurate description of the line or lines proposed. If the said Vestries fail to agree, then one or more of them may present such petition, in which case a copy of the petition shall be sent, at least two months before the meeting of the Council to which the petition shall be presented, to every Vestry in the Parishes concerned which does not unite therein. In any case,

if a proposed change in parish lines would effect a transfer of any Congregation or Church building from one Parish to another, formal notice thereof shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority at least two months before the meeting of the Council.

SECTION 2. The Council shall refer such petition to a committee to examine and report thereon at such time as the Council shall require. Upon receiving the report of the Committee the Council may, if deemed expedient, alter or establish the said lines accordingly, and as so altered or established they shall be published in the Journal.

CANON XIV.

Of the Formation of a Separate Congregation in a Parish.

Section 1. When any number of persons, sufficient to build a house of worship and provide for the support of a Minister, shall desire a separate parochial organization, but do not reside so apart from other Congregations as to admit of forming a new Parish, they may proceed according to the directions of the Canon "Of the Division of Parishes," applicable thereto. The Council, proceeding under the directions of the same Canon, may constitute the applicants a Separate Congregation in the Parish in which they are situated, with the right to elect a Vestry, and to have representation in the Council, subject always to the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese.

Section 2. Before a new Congregation can be established, or a new Church building erected upon a new location for a Congregation already in existence, the consent of the Vestry of the Parish, if there be only one, or of the Parish Council, if there be more than one Vestry, shall first be secured. If consent of the Vestry or of the Parish Council be not given, an appeal may be taken to the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese, and their decision in the matter shall be final.

SECTION 3. In every Parish with a single Rector and Vestry their parochial authority and their consequent primary responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church and ministration to needy people extends throughout the territorial limits of the Parish and should be so recognized and exercised.

In every Parish in which one or more Separate Congregations or Mission Churches have been established the Rectors and Vestry of each Separate Congregation and Mission Church shall have and exercise concurrent jurisdiction within the territorial boundaries of the Parish, and equal responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church and ministry to needy people within the Parish bounds.

CANON XV.

Of Mission Churches.

Section 1. When any number of persons belonging to any Parish or Congregation desire a separate organization, but cannot comply with the

requirements in regard to the formation of Separate Congregations, they may proceed to organize a Mission Church upon the following conditions:

After the 20th of May, 1943, there must appear from their last report to the Diocesan authorities that there are at least twenty-five communicants in the group, and that they have disbursed during the preceding year at least \$500.00 for church purposes.

They must obtain the approval of the Vestry of the Parish to which they belong, if there be only one Vestry, or of the Parish Council if there be more than one Vestry in the Parish.

They must have the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese and of the Diocesan Council.

They may have their own Vestry and officers, whose manner of election, and whose duties, shall be according to the provisions of these Canons in regard to the election and duties of Vestries. They shall not call a minister without the approval and consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of a Mission Church organized under this Canon to give notice of the same to the Secretary of the Diocese and the Treasurer of the Diocese; and a list of such Mission Churches shall be published annually in the Journal of the Council.

CANON XVI.

Of Missions.

Section 1. In every Parish with a single Vestry it shall be the duty of the Rector and Vestry to provide and maintain a sufficient number of Churches, Chapels of Ease, mission buildings, or other places of worship, and to establish Missions, to serve adequately the needs of the Parish; and the temporal affairs of all such Missions or places of worship shall be under the charge of said Vestry.

Section 2. Any Separate Congregation in a Parish may, with the consent of the Parish Council, establish and maintain one or more Missions within the bounds of the Parish. The temporal affairs of any Mission so established shall be under the charge of the Vestry of the Separate Congregation by which it is established.

Section 3. The Vestry of a Parish with a single Vestry, or the Vestry of a Separate Congregation, having charge of any Mission as provided in the preceding sections, may, in its discretion, from adult members of said Mission appoint a Warden and a Mission Vestry Committee of not less than three or more than seven, or may authorize the same to be elected by the adult members of said Mission, with such duties in the administration of the temporal affairs of the Mission as said Vestry may deem advisable.

Section 4. The Archdeacon of the Blue Ridge or the Bishop, if there be no Archdeacon shall for every Mission under his jurisdiction appoint, or may consent to the election by the enrolled adult members of such Mission of, a Mission Vestry Committee of not less than three or more than seven adult members of the Mission, to whom may be assigned such duties in the administration of the temporal affairs of the Mission as may be deemed advisable by the Archdeacon.

Section 5. The clerical members of the Faculty of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, canonically resident in this Diocese, shall constitute a Committee, to be known as the Seminary Mission Committee, whose duty it shall be to maintain and conduct such missions as are in existence on May 5, 1938, under charge of the Faculty of the Seminary, and to establish and maintain such additional Missions as they may deem desirable. But no mission, other than those in existence on May 5, 1938, shall be established by said Committee without the consent of the Vestry or Parish Council of the Parish in which such Mission is proposed to be established.

The Seminary Mission Committee shall, from adult members of any Mission maintained and conducted by it, appoint a Warden and a Mission Vestry Committee of not less than three or more than seven, or may authorize the same to be elected by the adult members of said Mission, with such duties in the administration of the temporal affairs of the Mission as said Committee may deem advisable.

Section 6. Whereas certain Missions in existence on this 5th day of May, 1938, are so separated from the control of the Vestry or Parish Council of the Parishes in which they are located, or of any Separate Congregation in said Parishes, as to render it inexpedient to cause said Missions to return to a canonical connection as provided in this Canon; and whereas occasion may in the future arise in which it may be desirable to permit the establishment of a Mission outside of any canonical connection under this Canon; it is hereby provided that in any such case the Bishop shall have authority, with the consent of the Vestry or the Parish Council of the Parish in which the Mission is located, to assume charge of the same, and to appoint, or cause to be elected, a Mission Vestry Committee for the said Mission, and to appoint a Minister to have charge of the same.

Section 7. The duties of the Mission Vestry Committee provided for in this Canon, unless otherwise prescribed by the appointing body, shall be to co-operate with the Minister-in-Charge of the Mission, to prepare an annual budget and take all necessary steps to raise the funds to cover the same, and to transact the temporal business of the Mission. The Minister-in-Charge shall be ex-officio a member of said Vestry Committee, and shall preside at its meeting, when present.

Section 8. No Mission heretofore organized, or organized under this Canon, shall be entitled to lay representation in the Diocesan Council until and except it be established as a Mission Church under the Canon on Mission Churches.

CANONS

Section 9. Lists of all Missions under the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, under the Faculty of the Theological Seminary of Virginia, and under the direct charge of the Bishop shall be published separately in the Council Journal.

Section 10. If a change of status from one classification to another in a mission listed under any of the above classes should be found desirable, such change may be effected by written authorization of the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese. Any change so made must be reported to the Secretary of the Diocese and published in the Journal of the next Annual Council.

CANON XVII.

Of Parish Councils.

Section 1. In every Parish in which there is more than one Vestry there shall be a Parish Council, to consist of the Rector or Minister in Charge of each of the organized Churches or Congregations therein, and one or more lay members of each of the Vestries therein. The lay members shall be elected annually by their respective Vestries, and shall continue in office until their successors are duly elected. The Parish Council shall elect a chairman and a secretary, and shall adopt such rules for its own guidance as may be deemed necessary, subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Parish Council to exercise the authority which belongs to the Parish as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout its borders, so that the Parish may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. Especially it shall be its duty o encourage the planting of missions or mission Sunday Schools where necessary in the Parish, to determine their location and their status and to foster their growth and efficiency, and to provide as far as possible that the services of the Church shall be available to all the people within its territory, and that its united influence be exerted in matters pertaining to the welfare of the community. The Parish Council shall not encroach upon the rights or duties of the Vestries, but it may act with them in an advisory capacity by their express invitation.

Section 3. In every case where a municipal area within this Diocese shall extend over and into the territory of two or more parishes, the Parish Council of that area shall include all Congregations and Missions within the bounds of the city and its suburbs, as far as the same shall be within this Diocese.

CANON XVIII.

Of the Election and Organization of Vestries, and Calling of Congregational Meetings.

Section 1. For each Parish, Separate Congregation and Mission Church in the Diocese there shall be a Vestry. The Vestry shall consist of the Rector or Minister in Charge and not less than three nor more than twelve Vestry-

men, except that in any Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church having more than one hundred communicants one additional Vestryman may be elected for each additional one hundred communicants or fraction thereof provided the total number of Vestrymen shall in no case exceed eighteen. The exact number of Vestrymen shall be fixed within the foregoing limits by the persons in the Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church entitled to vote therein for Vestryman, and shall be subject to change by the said electors at any meeting called for the election of Vestrymen.

Section 2. The election of Vestrymen shall be held annually at such time and at such place as shall be designated by the Vestry, or in the event the Vestry does not act then by the Minister, or if there be no Minister by the Wardens. If the time and place be not so fixed, then the said election shall be held on Easter Monday in the Church or regular place of worship. Notice of the time and place of each election of a Vestry shall be given either in the Church or on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means.

Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, if any Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church, at any meeting held as herein above provided in this Canon, so authorize, Vestrymen may be elected for terms not to exceed four years, the congregation to determine the length of terms and the number of Vestrymen to be elected for such terms.

The members of the Vestry elected and qualified under this Canon shall erve until their successors are elected and have duly qualified.

Section 3. Only male persons, twenty-one years of age, who are communicants of the Protestant Episcopal Church and communicants of the Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church, shall be eligible to the office of Vestryman of such Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church, provided that persons who have served as Vestrymen prior to May 1, 1946, shall be eligible for election or re-election.

Section 4. All persons eighteen years of age, who are registered as communicants of the particular Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission Church in which they offer to vote, and non-communicants twenty-one years of age who are baptized, and who have been for six months known to the Treasurer as regular contributors to the expenses of the same, shall be entitled to vote at the election of Vestrymen. The voting shall be by ballot, and, unless otherwise provided by the meeting, a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. But no election shall be valid hereunder unless the qualified voters of the congregation participating therein number at least ten per cent of the number of communicants qualified to vote reported for the previous year.

Section 5. The Vestry may appoint three persons to act as judges, to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges are appointed, those present may choose three persons to act as judges. The judges of election, if appointed or chosen, shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and shall determine who shall be eligible for nomination as Vestrymen.

Section 6. If there be in any Parish two or more congregations apart from each other, not being Separate Congregations or Mission Churches in the meaning of these Canons, it shall be lawful for the Vestry of such Parish, if they deem it expedient, to apportion to each congregation the number of Vestrymen to be chosen as its representation upon the Vestry of the Parish. In such event a separate election shall be held by and for each such congregation, and the electors thereof shall choose the number of Vestrymen so allotted to that congregation, and no more. In other respects such elections shall conform to all the foregoing provisions of this Canon.

All the Vestrymen so chosen by the different congregations therein, together with the Rector or Minister, if there be one, shall constitute the Vestry of the Parish, with all the duties and powers of other Vestries under these Canons. But the Vestrymen chosen by each congregation respectively, together with the Rector or Minister, shall be a Committee of the Vestry to have the care and control of the property, and to transact the local business, pertaining to that congregation alone, and not to the Parish at large. Each such Committee of the Vestry may appoint one Warden for its congregation, a Treasurer, and a Clerk who shall keep a record of their proceedings.

When in the judgment of the Minister, or, if there be none, of the Senior Warden, a meeting of a Parish Vestry so constituted is impracticable, any matter concurred in by a majority of the aforesaid Committees of the Vestry, and duly recorded by their respective Clerks and the Register of the Vestry, shall be deemed to be the act of the Vestry of the Parish. The Parish Vestry shall, however, meet as a whole at least once a year.

Section 7. As soon as may be after their election, the persons chosen as Vestrymen shall assemble and organize at such time and place as the Minister shall appoint, or, if no time or place be appointed by him within a reasonable time, then at such time and place as shall be designated by any two Vestrymen-elect, the Minister and each Vestrymen-elect being notified. The proceedings at this and every meeting of the Vestry shall be opened with one or more Collects and the Lord's Prayer by the Minister, or in his absence by any member who may be chosen to preside over the meeting.

Section 8. Every person chosen a Vestryman shall qualify by subscribing the following declaration and promise: "I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do yield my hearty assent and approbation to the doctrines, worship and discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in these United States; and I promise that I will faithfully execute the office of Vestryman of Parish (or Church) in County (or City), according to my best knowledge and skill." No person shall act or vote as Vestryman until he has subscribed this declaration and promise.

Section 9. The Vestry shall proceed to elect a Senior and a Junior Warden, a Register and a Treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. If Wardens have been chosen for particular churches by Committees of the Vestry, the Senior and Junior Wardens of the Parish

shall be chosen from among such Wardens. The Wardens and Register must be communicants and members of the Vestry.

Section 10. The Rector or Minister in charge when present shall preside at all meetings of the Vestry, but shall not be entitled to vote except in case of a tie, and then only when he is not personally interested. All Vestry meetings other than fixed meetings shall be subject to his call; but in case he fails, at the request of two Vestrymen, to call a meeting, such Vestrymen may themselves call a meeting, giving notice of the time and place thereof to the Rector and to each Vestryman. A majority of the Vestrymen who have qualified exclusive of the Rector or Minister, shall constitute a quorum; but any Vestry may by resolution fix a smaller number, not however less than four, to act as a quorum at future meetings thereof.

SECTION 11. In case of a vacancy in the Vestry, the remaining members may elect a duly qualified member of the congregation to fill the vacancy until the next annual congregational meeting, at which time such vacancy shall be filled. The failure of any Vestrymen-elect to qualify within a reasonable time, or the continued neglect of any Vestrymen to attend the meetings of the Vestry without adequate excuse, may, after due warning, be deemed to create a vacancy, which shall be declared by resolution duly adopted by the Vestry.

SECTION 12. In addition to the annual meeting of the congregation for the election of vestrymen, other meetings of the congregation may be called by the vestry or, if they decline to do so, by ten qualified voters of the congregation after at least three days' notice of the time, place and object of the meeting shall have been given either on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means. At such meeting only those persons shall be entitled to vote who are qualified to vote for vestrymen, and such meetings shall be conducted in the same manner as provided in this Canon for meetings held for the election of vestries, except that voting by ballot shall not be required.

Provided, however, that if the meeting is called by ten members of the congregation, three days' written notice of time and place shall be given to the Rector and each member of the Vestry.

CANON XIX.

Of the Duties of Vestries, Wardens and Parish Officers.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Vestry (a) of a Parish or Separate Congregation to elect a Rector, and of a Mission Congregation to elect a Minister in charge upon nomination by the Bishop, (b) to co-operate with the Rector or Minister in charge in promoting the spiritual welfare of his Cure, (c) to extend personally a hearty welcome to newly confirmed or transferred members of the congregation, (d) to see that a budget of the estimated expenses of the Parish or Congregation including its quota for the work of the Diocese and of the General Church is prepared before the beginning of the fiscal year, and to take all necessary steps to raise said amount, (e) to see that the Rector's salary and other obligations are paid regularly and punctually,

(f) to provide for the appointment of Trustees under the laws of the State of Virginia authorized to hold the legal title to the church property, (g) to make and execute all contracts for erecting, furnishing, preserving and insuring the church edifice and other property, (h) to regulate the use of the Parish graveyard, (i) to make all necessary provision for church music, with the advice and consent of the Rector or Minister in charge, and subject to his control, and (j) generally, as the constituted agents of the Parish or Congregation, to transact all its temporal business.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Wardens (a) to keep watch over the church property, (b) to see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship, (c) to see that the Sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties, (d) to collect the offerings of the people, (e) to take charge of the font and communion plate, (f) to provide out of the church funds, under the direction of the Vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion, (g) to attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and (h) to maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Register of the Vestry to take charge of all parish records except the Parish Register, and to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the Vestry in a well-bound book to be provided for that purpose, which records and Minute Book he shall deliver to the Minister, or Wardens, when his term of office expires.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of all parochial funds except communion alms and to disburse the same under the direction of the Vestry, to keep regular accounts supported by proper vouchers, to render reports to the Vestry at stated times, and to make such reports to the Council as may be required by its orders. At the termination of his office he shall deliver to the Minister, or Wardens, all books and papers pertaining to said office.

CANON XX.

Of Business Methods in Affairs of the Church, and Affiliated Institutions in this Diocese.

Section 1. Affairs of the Diocese.

(a) All trust and permanent funds and all securities of whatsoever kind, belonging to the Diocese or over which the Diocese has control, shall be kept on deposit properly earmarked with a Federal or State bank in the Diocese of Virginia, or with a Diocesan corporation, or some other agency approved in writing by the Committee on Finance of the Diocese, under either deed of trust or an agency agreement, and shall not be withdrawn in whole or in part except upon the signature of two designated persons.

- (b) All other money for which the Treasurer of the Diocese is responsible shall be kept on deposit properly earmarked with a Federal or State bank in the Diocese of Virginia approved in writing by the Committee on Finance of the Diocese.
- (c) The Treasurer of the Diocese, or other custodian of such funds or securities,—other than a banking institution,—shall be bonded in such sum as the Committee on Finance of the Diocese may from time to time determine in writing.
- (d) Such books of account shall be kept as, in the judgment of the Committee on Finance of the Diocese, may be necessary for satisfactory accounting and auditing
- (e) The Committee on Finance of the Diocese shall annually cause to be audited by Certified Public Accountants the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, of the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Society, and the accounts of the treasurer of every trust and permanent Diocesan fund.
- (f) A condensed report of such examination and audit shall be made by the Committee on Finance of the Diocese to each regular annual meeting of the Council, and to any special meeting thereof when requested.
- (g) All buildings, and their contents, over which the Diocese has control shall be kept adequately insured in such amount as the Committee on Finance of the Diocese may determine.
- (h) The Committee on Finance of the Diocese shall supervise all financial affairs of the Diocese and the methods herein prescribed for the conduct of Diocesan business affairs

SECTION 2.—Affairs of the Parish, Separate Congregation, and Mission.

- (a) All trust and permanent funds, belonging to a Parish, Separate Congregation or Mission, and all securities of whatsoever kind held in such trust or permanent fund, and all money for which the treasurer of the Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission is responsible, shall be kept on deposit properly earmarked with a Federal or State bank approved in writing by the Vestry of said Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission, or its Committee on Finance.
- (b) The Treasurer of the Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission, or other custodian of such funds or securities,—other than a banking institution,—shall be bonded in such sum as the Vestry of such Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission, or its Committee on Finance, may from time to time determine.
- (c) Such books of account shall be kept as, in the judgment of the Vestry or its Committee on Finance, may be necessary for satisfactory accounting and auditing.

- (d) The Vestry of the Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission, or its Committee on Finance, shall annually cause to be audited by an auditor, or auditors, appointed by it, the accounts of its treasurer, or other custodian of the funds or securities of the Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission.
- (e) A condensed report of such examination and audit shall be made by the said auditor, or auditors, or by its committee on Finance, to the Vestry of the Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission not later than February 1st of each year, or oftener if requested by the Vestry.
- (f) All buildings, and their contents, belonging to the Parish, Separate Congregation, or Mission shall be kept adequately insured in such amount, and with such companies, as the Vestry, or its Committee on Finance, may determine.

CANON XXI.

Of Creating of Church Debt.

- Section 1. No indebtedness, other than for the purpose of refinancing an existing indebtedness, shall be incurred by a parish, mission, or separate congregation without the written approval of the Bishop and of the Finance Committee of the Diocese, except:
- (a) Indebtedness for permanent improvements, replacement, or additions to real estate or equipment, where the amount of such indebtedness, plus indebtedness of every kind already existing, shall not exceed one hundred and fifty per cent (150%) of the average annual receipts of such Parish, Mission, or Separate Congregation during the previous three fiscal years.
- (b) Indebtedness for current expenses where the amount of such indebtedness, plus all indebtedness theretofore incurred for current expenses and still existing, shall not exceed twenty per cent (20%) of the total current receipts of such parish, mission, or separate congregation during the preceding fiscal year; and the payment of all indebtedness for current expenses shall be provided for in the budget of the next ensuing fiscal year with reasonable expectation of its payment out of the receipts of the next two years.
- Section 2. In computing receipts under sub-sections (a) and (b) of Section 1 of this Canon there shall be excluded amounts from or for endowments or from or by bequests, except income therefrom not specifically designated, and receipts specially designated for expenditures other than parochial.
- Section 3. Whenever approval is required under this Canon such approval shall not be granted until there is submitted to, and approved by, the approving authority a plan of amortization, or other method of payment, of said indebtedness.

CANON XXII.

Of Alienation of Real Property.

No part of the real property of any parish shall be alienated, exchanged or encumbered for any purpose, without the consent of the congregation in interst, in a duly constituted meeting called for that purpose, and in addition thereto, in case of consecrated property, or any church or chapel which has been used solely for divine service, the consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. Provided, however, that this consent shall not apply to abandoned property.

The Bishop or, in the event of his inability to act, the other Ecclesiastical Authority, may, with the advice and consent of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, or the Executive Committee of said Trustees, grant, bargain, sell, convey, transfer, and deliver any other property accruing to the Church generally in the Diocese of Virginia, unless prohibited by the instrument by which title to such property is acquired; and the proceeds of such sale shall be invested by such Trustees, or its Executive Committee, as they may deem advisable.

CANON XXIII.

Of Parish Registers and Parochial Reports.

Section 1. Every Minister of this Diocese shall keep a record of the Communicants, and of all Baptisms, Confirmations, Marriages and Burials, within his Parish or Congregation, specifying (a) the time when persons became or ceased to be Communicants under his charge, and whether by confirmation, transfer, discipline, death or otherwise, (b) the name, age or the date of birth, the sponsors or witnesses, and, in the case of infants, the parents, of each person baptized, (c) the names of persons confirmed, and by what Bishop, (d) the names, ages and residences of persons married, and the names of at least two witnesses, (e) the names and ages of persons buried, and (f) the date and place of every such rite respectively; and he shall attest each by his signature.

Such records shall be made by the Minister in a suitable and substantial book, to be known as the Parish Register, to be provided by the Vestry for that purpose and to remain the property of the Vestry. When the rectorship of a Parish or Church becomes vacant the Parish Register shall be deposited with one of the Wardens, who shall make, or cause to be made, all needful entries therein until the vacancy is filled.

SECTION 2. Every Minister shall send to the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, to the Secretary of the Diocese, for the President of the Council, on or before the first day of February of each year, a Report of his official acts,

and, if he has a cure, of the condition of his Church or Churches, for the year ending the thirty-first day of December preceding, in such form as shall be prescribed by the Bishop or the Council. If any Church be vacant the report for that Church shall be sent by the Wardens.

CANON XXIV.

Of the Transfer and Enrollment of Communicants.

Section 1. Upon request of any Communicant desiring to be transferred from a Parish or Congregation in this Diocese to another Parish or Church within or without this Diocese it shall be the duty of the Minister, or if there be no Minister, it shall be the duty of the Wardens, or one of them, of the Parish or Church from which the Communicant desires to be transferred, to furnish to said Communicant a certificate that he or she is a communicant of said Parish or Congregation in regular standing.

Section 2. Every Communicant removing from one Parish or Congregation within or without this Diocese to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the Minister of the Parish or Congregation to which the communicant desires the transfer a certificate that he or she is a communicant in regular standing, from the Minister or, if there be no Minister, from one of the Wardens, of the Parish or Congregation from which the Communicant desires to be transferred.

Section 3. No Minister shall enroll any persons as Communicants in the Parish or Congregation under his charge until he has conversed with them on the subject, unless he shall be satisfied that they have been communicants in some other Parish or Congregation; nor shall he enroll anyone who is known to deny the Articles of the Christian Faith as set forth in the Apostle's Creed.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Rector or Minister of every Parish or Congregation, learning of the removal of any member of his Parish or Congregation to another Cure, without having secured a Letter of Transfer, as herein provided, to transmit the Minister of such Cure a letter of advice informing him thereof.

CANON XXV.

Of Offenders to be Admonished, or Repelled from the Lord's Table.

If any persons within this Church offend their brethren by wickedness of life, such persons shall be admonished, or repelled from the Lord's Table, by the Minister in charge of the Parish or Church, according to the Rubric. In cases where it may be deemed expedient by the Minister, or may be requested by the accused, the Wardens of the Parish, or either of them, shall be summoned to assist the Minister in ascertaining the facts of the case. But if such Warden or Wardens fail or refuse to act within ten days, the Minister shall proceed to act under the Rubrics of this Church.

CANON XXVI.

Of the Trial of the Appeal of a Layman After Repulsion from the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself-ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and requesting to be restored to the Communion. Thereupon the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the Minister, shall nominate two of the Clergy and two of the Laity, of whom the Minister repelling shall select one of the Clergymen, and the Communicant one of the Laymen. It shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case, under oath and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop, who shall proceed to adjudge the case, unless for his own satisfaction, or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence. If further evidence be required it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. When the evidence is thus procured the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment to the Minister repelling, and to the Communicant repelled, and the said judgment shall be final and conclusive. In case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall nevertheless be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

CANON XXVII.

Of Examining Chaplains.

A Board of Examining Chaplains consisting of at least two Presbyters shall be nominated by the Bishop at the Annual Council, the nomination being confirmed by the vote of the Council. The term of office of the Examining Chaplains shall be one year.

CANON XXVIII.

Of the Advisory Committee of the Virginia Diocesan Center.

Section 1.—In response to the request of the Memorial Trustees of the Virginia Diocesan Center an Advisory Committee of the Council, consisting of ten communicants of the Diocese of Virginia, is hereby created to act in co-operation with the said Memorial Trustees in the development, operation, and conduct of a diocesan center for the Diocese of Virginia upon the tract of land and improvements therein devised to the said trustees for such purpose under the will of the late Annie Rose Walker of Richmond, Virginia.

Section 2.—The members of said Advisory Committee shall be appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese. The ten members first appointed shall, at their first meeting, be divided by lot into five groups of two members each to serve respectively for one, two, three, four and five years.

Section 3.—At every annual Council thereafter two duly qualified persons shall be appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese as members of said Advisory Committee to succeed the two whose terms then expire. The term of office of the persons then appointed shall be five years, and no person shall be eligible for re-appointment on said Committee for at least one year after the expiration of his preceding term.

Section 4.—Any vacancy occurring in the membership of said Committee may be filled by the Bishop, the persons so appointed to serve for the remainder of the term in which the vacancy occurred.

Section 5.—The Advisory Committee shall make an annual report to the Council as to matters connected with the development, operation, and conduct of the Diocesan Center.

CANON XXIX.

Of the Presentment and Trial of a Presbyter or Deacon.

Section 1.—Offenses for which presentment and trial may be had.

The following shall constitute the offenses for which a Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese may be presented and tried in this Diocese, namely:

- (a) Crime or immorality.
- (b) Holding and teaching publicly or privately and advisedly any doctrine contrary to that held by this Church.
- (c) Violation of the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer.
- (d) Violation of the Constitution or Canons of the General Convention, or of this Diocese.
 - (e) Any act which involves a violation of his ordination vows.
- (f) Habitual neglect of the exercise of his ministerial office, without cause; or habitual neglect of public worship, and of the Holy Communion, according to the order and use of this Church.
- (g) Conduct unbecoming a clergyman; Provided, however, that before proceeding to a presentment on this charge the consent of three-fourths of all of the members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese shall be required.

No presentment shall be made or conviction had for any said offence, unless the offence shall have been committed within five years immediately preceding the date of the presentment, except that in case of the conviction of the accused for said offence in a court of record exercising criminal jurisdiction, a presentment may be made at any time within one year after such conviction notwithstanding five years may have elapsed since the commission of the offence. Section 2.—How charges preferred.—Board of Presentment.—Presentment.

(a) Upon complaint to the Ecclesiastical Authority in writing preferred by the Council, or by the Vestry of the Parish or Congregation to which the accused belongs, or by three adult Communicants thereof, or by any three Presbyters of the Diocese entitled to seats in the Council, that a Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese has been guilty of one or more of the offences enumerated in Section 1 of this Canon (except "Conduct unbecoming a clergyman," in which case consent of three-fourths of members of the Standing Committee is required), the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a Board of Presentment composed of three disinterested Presbyters, not related by blood or affinity to the accused in a direct ascending or descending line, or as a brother, uncle, nephew or first cousin, whose duty it shall be to examine in private the evidence produced in support of the charges and report to the Ecclesiastical Authority in writing whether or not a trial of the accused upon the charges preferred is justified. If the Board of Presentment reports that a trial is justified they shall formulate the charges in writing in clear and concise language, stating the specific offence or offences charged, and when and where committed—which said formulation of charges shall be known as the Presentment-and shall submit the same with their report to the Ecclesiastical Authority, together with the names and addresses of the witnesses upon whose testimony the Presentment is based.

(b) If the charges are preferred by three Communicants or Presbyters, the persons preferring the charges shall constitute a Committee of Prosecution in presenting the charges and evidence in support of same to the Board of Presentment and in prosecuting the presentment before the Trial Court. If, however, the charges be preferred by the Council, or by the Vestry of the Parish or Congregation to which the accused belongs, then the Council or the Vestry shall appoint a Committee to present and prosecute the charges before the Board of Presentment and the Trial Court, with such instructions as may be

deemed advisable.

(c) In case a Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese becomes finally convicted in a Court of Record of any crime or misdemeanor involving immorality, or against whom a final judgment has been entered in a Court of Record in a cause involving immorality, it shall be the duty of the Standing Committee of the Diocese to institute an inquiry into the matter. If in the judgment of said Committee there is sufficient reason for a presentment and trial hereunder, it shall be their duty to prefer charges against him

Section 3.—Trial Court.—How constituted.—Functions of President and jury.

(a) As occasion shall arise there shall be established an Ecclesiastical Court for the trial of any Presbyter or Deacon canonically resident in this Diocese against whom a Presentment has been found under Section 2 hereof.

Said court, hereinafter called the Trial Court, shall consist of five disinterested Presbyters (other than members of the Standing Committee) entitled to seats in the Council, none of whom shall be a presenter of the charges, and with same qualifications as members of the Board of Presentment, who shall act as a jury, together with the Bishop or, at the Bishop's request, the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese, who shall preside and act as President of the Court, exercising the same functions as those exercised by a Judge of a Court of Record in Virginia.

If there be a vacancy in the Episcopal office, or if neither the Bishop, nor the Bishop Coadjutor, for reason satisfactory to himself, be qualified to preside at the trial, upon notice in writing to that effect the Standing Committee shall appoint some qualified Presbyter, entitled to a seat in the Council, to preside and act as President of the Court.

(b) Upon receipt by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Presentment said Authority shall forthwith nominate eight Presbyters, qualified as jurors, and cause their names, together with a copy of the Presentment, to be furnished to the Accused by a summoner, or by registered mail calling for receipt, addressed to his last known place of residence, as provided by Section 5 hereof.

Of the eight Presbyters nominated as aforesaid, the Accused may select five to act as jurors, or, in case of his refusal or neglect for twenty days after receipt of the names of said nominees to notify the Ecclesiastical Authority of his selection, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall select five, and the presbyters so chosen, together with the Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor, or, in case of vacancy in the Episcopal office, or the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor be disqualified, the President appointed by the Standing Committee shall constitute the Court for the trial of the accused upon the Presentment.

- (c) As soon as the personnel of the Trial Court has been determined the President of the Trial Court shall fix the time and place for the trial, and notice thereof shall be served on the Accused at least thirty days before the day set for the trial, in the manner provided in Section 5 hereof, and like notice shall be given to each member of the Committee of Prosecution, and to the Presbyters chosen for service as jurors on the Trial Court.
- (d) The President of the Court shall exercise the functions usually exercised by the Judge of a Court of Record in Virginia, and, upon return by the Jury of a verdict of "guilty" upon any or all of the charges, the President, if a Bishop, shall determine the penalty to be imposed and, at the proper time, as provided in Section 4(g) hereof, shall pronounce sentence.
- But if the President of the Court be not a Bishop, then a certified copy of the record of the trial up to and including the verdict of the Jury shall be forthwith transmitted to the Standing Committee, which shall in turn transmit the same to the Bishop of some other Diocese with the request, and he is hereby authorized, to act thereon as if he were a Bishop of this Diocese, with full power and authority to determine the penalty and sentence the Accused as provided in Section 4 (q) hereof.

The Jury shall by majority vote determine all questions of fact, and by like vote shall return a verdict of "Guilty" or "Not Guilty" as to each offence charged in the Presentment, together with such recommendation as to penalty as they may deem proper.

- (e) At the time and place fixed for the trial the Court shall convene. The President shall appoint a Clerk, not a juror, whose duty it shall be to keep an accurate record of the proceedings, and who shall be responsible for all documentary evidence filed with the Court during the trial—which record, together with all exhibits filed therewith, duly authenticated by the President, shall at the conclusion of the trial be delivered to the Registrar of the Diocese for preservation.
- (f) At the request of the Committee of Prosecution or, on his, or its, own initiative, the Ecclesiastical Authority may appoint a Church Advocate, with or without assistants, to aid or conduct the prosecution of the Presentment before the Trial or the Appellate Court. Such Church Advocate and assistants, if any, shall all be of the profession of the law and communicants of this Church.
- (g) The Accused shall have the right to be present at all times during the trial to produce his evidence, and to make his defence in person, or by counsel of his own selection not exceeding two, provided that every such counsel shall be a communicant of this Church.
- (h) For reasons deemed satisfactory to the Court the proceedings may be adjourned from time to time and from place to place.

Section 4.—Procedure.

(a) When the Court has convened, if the Accused shall refuse, or neglect without sufficient excuse, to appear before the Court when summoned according to Section 3 (c) of this Canon, and no defence be there made under his authority, the President of the Court, if a Bishop, or if the President be a Presbyter, then the Bishop of another Diocese as provided in Section 3 (d) hereof, shall declare him to be in Contumacy, and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall pass against him for such Contumacy; but if within thirty days from the date of such sentence the Accused shall in writing directed to the Ecclesiastical Authority request a rehearing of the case, and shall present to such Authority evidence sufficient to raise a reasonable doubt as to whether justice has been done and tender himself ready to take his trial upon the Presentment, the Ecclesiastical Authority, in the exercise of a sound discretion, may order a rehearing of the case.

Upon the expiration of said thirty days, if no rehearing has been ordered, the President of the Trial Court, if a Bishop, or, if the President of the Court be a priest, then the Bishop of another Diocese, as provided in Section 3 (d) hereof, shall forthwith pronounce the sentence of Degradation from the Ministry of this Church for Contumacy as if he had been convicted upon a plea of "Not Guilty" under sub-section (g) hereof.

(b) If the accused, appearing before the Court in person, or by counsel, or in writing addressed to the President of the Court, pleads "Guilty" to any or all of the charges in the Presentment, the Jury shall report accordingly and may recommend such penalty as they deem right and proper, but the President, if a Bishop, or if the President be a Presbyter, then the Bishop of another Diocese,

CANONS

It is declared to be the duty of all members of this Church in this Diocese to attend and give evidence when duly cited in any ecclesiastical trial or investigation under the authority of the constituted authorities of this Diocese.

(f) When the taking of evidence is completed the Committee of Prosecution, through a single spokesman or the Church Advocate, if there be one, and the Accused in person, or by counsel, may present argument to the Court—the Prosecution having the opening and conclusion.

Thereupon the Jury, having considered the evidence, shall, within three days after the case has been submitted, present to the President of the Court in writing their verdict on each separate charge in the presentment signed by those concurring therein, being a majority, with such recommendations as to penalty as they may deem proper.

- (g) In case of the conviction of the Accused on any or all of the charges, the President of the Court shall have a copy of the verdict served upon the Accused, who may, within thirty days after said service, request a new trial on the ground of after-discovered material evidence, upon which motion the President, whether Bishop or Presbyter, may pass. After the lapse of thirty days from said service, unless a new trial has been granted, the President of the Court, if a Bishop, or, if the President be a Presbyter appointed by the Standing Committee in accordance with Section 3 (a) hereof, the Bishop of another Diocese selected by the Standing Committee in accordance with Section 3 (d) hereof, shall determine the penalty, admonish the Accused, or pronounce sentence of suspension or deposition from the Sacred Ministry, as to him may seem just and proper, as provided in the Canon of the General Convention treating of Sentences and the Publication thereof, and such sentence shall be final. Provided, however, that pending the hearing and determination of an appeal from said sentence, if any be taken, said sentence shall stand suspended.
- (h) In case a new trial is granted, a new Trial Court (with the exception of the President) shall be constituted as provided in Section 3 hereof.

Section 5.—Service of citation, notice, or summons.

All notices, citations, summons, or other papers required by this Canon may be served by a summoner, or summoners, appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, or by registered mail requiring a return receipt, addressed to the person at his last known place of residence.

The delivery of a written notice or other paper to the party to whom directed, or the leaving of it at his last known place of residence, or the signed receipt by him or member of his family of said notice or other paper sent by registered mail, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

The certificate of such summoner, or said post-office return receipt, if mailed, shall be evidence of the due service of such notice or paper.

SECTION 6.—The Record.

The record, required by Section 3 (e) of this Canon to be kept by the Clerk, shall consist of

- (1) The Presentment.
- (2) The evidence of service of the Presentment upon the Accused.

as provided in Section 3 (d) hereof, shall alone determine the penalty to be imposed and pronounce sentence therefor.

- (c) If the Accused appear, the Presentment shall be read to him and he shall be called upon to answer "Guilty" or "Not Guilty" to each of the charges therein contained. If he neglect or refuse to answer, a plea of "Not Guilty" shall be entered for him. Upon the charge or charges to which the plea of "Not Guilty" has been entered, either by the Accused or by the Court for him, the trial shall proceed.
- (d) In the conduct of all trials the laws of the civil jurisdiction in the State of Virginia so far as they relate to evidence are adopted and taken as the rules by which all Trial Courts in this Diocese shall be governed, and all trials therein shall be conducted according to the principles of the common law as the same is administered in the State of Virginia.

But no technical errors—not going to the merits of the case—shall affect the determination or judgment of the court on questions arising during the trial.

(e) All testimony shall be given under oath, or affirmation, administered by some person authorized by law in Virginia to administer oaths.

Upon application of either the Committee of Prosecution, the Church Advocate (if one be appointed), or the Accused, either before or during the trial, the President of the Court shall issue its summons for witnesses when satisfied that the testimony sought to be adduced is material and that the witness is one whom the Court would be willing to hear upon the trial—otherwise he may refuse to issue the summons.

In case the testimony of any witness is desired whose attendance at the trial cannot be obtained, either party may at any time after copy of the Presentment has been served on the Accused apply to the Court if in session, or if not, to the Ecclesiastical Authority, for a Commission to take the testimony of said witness, and the Court, or Ecclesiastical Authority-being satisfied by affidavit of the applicant that the testimony sought to be introduced is material—shall appoint a Commissioner to take the deposition of said witness. The party desiring to take said deposition shall give to the other party, or some one of them, reasonable notice of the time and place of taking the deposition, accompanying said notice with the interrogatories to be propounded to the witness, and the other party, within six days after receiving said notice, may furnish the first party with proposed cross-interrogatories. Said interrogatories and cross-interrogatories, if any be propounded, shall then be sent or delivered to the Commissioner, who shall forthwith, at the time and place fixed in said notice, proceed to take the testimony of such witness, and transmit the same under seal to the Court, if then in session, or, if not, to the proper Ecclesiastical Authority for use at the trial.

But no deposition shall be read at the trial unless the Court has reasonable assurance that the attendance of the witness cannot be procured, or unless the Prosecution and Accused both consent that it may be read.

- (3) The answer of the Accused to the Presentment, or his written confession of guilt, if any.
- (4) The evidence and all exhibits introduced at the trial.
- (5) The action of the President on all motions made by the Accused or his counsel.
- (6) The verdict and recommendations of the Jury.
- (7) The Sentence.

SECTION 7 .- The Appeal.

(a) Within thirty days from the service upon him of notice of the decision of the Trial Court sustaining in whole or in part the charges set forth in the Presentment the Accused may take an appeal to the Court of Review of the Third Province as provided in the Canon of the General Church dealing with Appeals to the Court of Review.

(b) From a decision of the Trial Court acquitting the Accused of a charge involving a question of doctrine, faith, or worship an appeal may be taken within thirty days after said decision by the Ecclesiastical Authority to the Court of Review of the Third Province, as provided in the above Canon of the General Church.

SECTION 8.—Expenses incident to the trial.

The expenses of the trial—including those incident to inquiry by the Standing Committee or authorized by the Board of Presentment, and also expenses incurred in defending an appeal or in prosecuting an appeal by the Ecclesiastical Authority when such appeal is allowable—shall be defrayed by the Treasurer of the Diocese out of the Diocesan Expense Assessment upon order of the Council if in session, otherwise upon order of the Committee on Finance.

CANON XXX.

Of Altering or Adding to the Canons.

The Canons of this Diocese may be altered, repealed or added to by the Council; but no proposed repeal or addition to the Canons shall be considered by the Council unless at least one day's notice be given in open Council, nor until such alteration, repeal or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a Committee of at least two Presbyters and two Laymen. Nor shall such alteration, repeal or addition be adopted during the same Council if two-thirds of the members present shall not concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration at the next regular meeting of the Council. Unless otherwise provided by the Council, all alterations, repeals or additions to these Canons shall become effective upon the adjournment of the meeting of the Council at which final action thereon shall be taken.

ADDENDUM

CERTAIN CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF VESTRIES AND THE LAY PEOPLE: SELECTED BY
THE BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE, AND PUBLISHED HERE BY
ORDER OF THE COUNCIL

EXCERPTS FROM CANON 16

Of Regulations Respecting the Laity.

Section 2. When a person to whom the Sacraments of the Church shall have been refused, or who has been repelled from the Holy Communion under the Rubrics, or who desires a judgment as to his status in the Church, shall lodge a complaint or application with the Bishop, or Ecclesiastical Authority, it shall be the duty of the Bishop, or Ecclesiastical Authority, unless he or it sees fit to require the person to be admitted or restored because of the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the Minister, to institute such an inquiry as may be directed by the Canons of the Diocese or Missionary District, and should no such Canon exist, the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority shall proceed according to such principles of law and equity as will insure an impartial decision; but no Minister of this Church shall be required to admit to the Sacraments a person so refused or repelled, without the written direction of the Bshop or Ecclesiastical Authority.

Section 3 (a) If any Minister of this Church shall have cause to think that a person desirous of Holy Baptism, or of Confirmation, or of receiving the Holy Communion, has been married otherwise than as the word of God and discipline of this Church allow, such Minister, before receiving such person to these ordinances, shall refer the case to the Bishop for his godly judgment thereupon. The Bishop, after due inquiry into the circumstances, and taking into consideration the godly discipline both of justice and of mercy, shall give his judgment thereon in writing. *Provided, however*, that no Minister shall in any case refuse these ordinances to a penitent person in imminent danger of death.

- (b) Any persons who have been married by civil authority, or otherwise than as this Church provides, may apply to the Bishop or to the Ecclesiastical Court of their domicile for the recognition of commonucant status or for the right to apply for Holy Baptism or Confirmation. After due inquiry into all the facts relevant thereto, judgment shall be given in writing to the petitioners by the Bishop or by the Ecclesiastical Court acting through the Bishop.
- (c) When marital unity is imperiled by dissension, it shall be the duty of either or both parties, before contemplating legal action, to lay the matter before a Minister of this Church; and it shall be the duty of such Minister to labor that the parties may be reconciled.

CANON 17

Of the Solemnization of Holy Matrimony.

Section 1. Every Minister of this Church shall conform to the laws of the State governing the creation of the civil status of marriage, and also to the laws of this Church governing the solemnization of Holy Matrimony.

Section 2. No Minister of this Church shall solemnize any marriage unless the following conditions are complied with:

(a) He shall have ascertained the right of the parties to contract a marriage according to the laws of the State.

(b) He shall have ascertained the right of the parties to contract a marriage according to the laws of this Church, and not in violation of the following impediments:

(1) Consanguinity (whether of the whole or of the half blood) within the following degrees:

(a) One may not marry one's ascendant or descendant.

(b) One may not marry one's sister.

(c) One may not marry the sister or brother of one's ascendant or the descendant of one's brother or sister.

(2) Mistake as to the identity of either party.

(3) Mental deficiency of either party sufficient to prevent the exercise of intelligent choice.

(4) Insanity of either party.

(5) Failure of either party to have reached the age of puberty.

(6) Impotence, sexual perversion, or the existence of venereal disease in either party undisclosed to the other.

(7) Facts which would make the proposed marriage bigamous.

(8) Concurrent contract inconsistent with the contract constituting canonical marriage.

(9) Attendant conditions: error as to the identity of either party, fraud, coercion or duress, or such defects of personality as to make competent or free consent impossible.

(c) He shall have ascertained that at least one of the parties has received Holy Baptism.

(d) He shall have instructed the parties as to the nature of Holy Matrimony.

(e) The intention of the parties to contract a marriage shall have been signified to the Minister at least three days before the service of solemnization; *Provided*, that, for weighty cause, the Minister may dispense with this requirement, if one of the parties is a member of his congregation, or can furnish satisfactory evidence of his responsibility. In case the three days' notice is waived, the Minister shall report his action in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority immediately.

(f) There shall be present at least two witnesses to the solemnization of the marriage.

(g) The Minister shall record in the proper register the date and place of the marriage, the names of the parties and their parents, the ages of the parties, their residence, and their Church status, and the witnesses and the Minister shall sign the record.

Section 3. The Minister shall have required that the parties sign the following declaration:

"We, A. B. and C. D., desiring to receive the blessing of Holy Matrimony in the Church, do solemnly declare that we hold marriage to be a lifelong union of husband and wife as it is set forth in the Form of Solemnization of Holy Matrimony in the Book of Common Prayer. We believe it is for the purpose of mutual fellowship, encouragement, and understanding, for the procreation (if it may be), of children, and their physical and spiritual nurture, for the safeguarding and benefit of society. And we do engage ourselves, so far as in us lies, to make our utmost effort to establish this relationship and to seek God's help thereto."

SECTION 4. It shall be within the discretion of any Minister of this Church to decline to solemnize any marriage.

SECTION 5. No Minister of this Church shall solemnize any marriage except in accordance with these Canons.

Section 6. No Minister of this Church shall solemnize the marriage of any person who has been the husband or wife of any other person then living whose marriage has been annulled or dissolved by the civil court, except as hereinafter in these Canons provided; nor shall any member of this Church enter upon a marriage when either of the contracting parties has been the husband or the wife of any other person then living whose marriage has been annulled or dissolved by a civil court, except as hereinafter in these Canons provided.

CANON 18

Of Regulations Respecting Holy Matrimony.

Section 1. The provisions of this Canon shall apply only to an active member of this Church in good standing.

Section 2 (a) Any person, being a member of this Church in good standing, whose marriage has been annulled or dissolved by a civil court of competent jurisdiction may apply to the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or Missionary District in which such person is canonically resident for a judgment as to his or her marital status in the eyes of the Church. And any person, being a member of this Church in good standing, who desires to marry a non-member of this Church whose previous marriage has been dissolved or annulled by a civil court of competent jurisdiction may apply to the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or Missionary District in which he or she is canonically resident, for permission to be married by a

Minister of this Church, provided in both cases that the judgment of the civil court has become final and that at least one year shall have elapsed from the date that the decree became final. Such application should be made at least thirty days before a contemplated marriage.

- (b) If the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority is satisfied that the parties intend a true Christian marriage he may refer the application to his Council of Advisors, or to the Court if such has been established by diocesan action. The Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority shall take care that his or its judgment is based upon and conforms to the doctrine of this Church, that marriage is a physical, spiritual and mystical union of a man and woman created by their mutual consent of heart, mind and will thereto, and is a Holy Estate instituted of God and is in intention lifelong; but when any of the facts set forth in Canon 17, Section 2, Clause (b), are shown to exist or to have existed which manifestly establish that no marriage bond as the same is recognized by this Church exists, the same may be declared by proper authority. No such judgment shall be construed as reflecting in any way upon the legitimacy of children or the civil validity of the former relationship.
- (c) Every judgment rendered under this Canon shall be in writing and shall be made a matter of permanent record in the Archives of the Diocese or Missionary District.
- (d) Any person in whose favor a judgment has been granted under the provisions of this Canon may be married by a Minister of this Church, provided, that if the marriage is proposed to be solemnized in another jurisdiction than the one in which said judgment has been granted, the said judgment shall have previously been submitted to and approved by the Ecclesiastical Authority of that jurisdiction.

CANON 24

Of the Music of the Church

It shall be the duty of every Minister to appoint for use in his Congregation hymns or anthems from those authorized by the Rubric, or the General Convention of this Church and, with such assistance as he may see fit to employ from persons skilled in music, to give order concerning the tunes to be sung in his Church. It shall be his especial duty to suppress all light and unseemly music, and all irreverence in the performance.

CANON 25

Of the Consecration of Churches

Section 1. No church or chapel shall be consecrated until the Bishop shall have been sufficiently certified that the building and the ground on which it is erected have been fully paid for, and are free from lien or other incumbrance; and also that such building and ground are secured from the danger of alienation, either in whole or in part, from those who profess and practice the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of this Church, except in the cases provided for in Secs. 2 and 3 of this Canon.

Section 2. It shall not be lawful for any Vestry, Trustees, or other body authorized by laws of any State or Territory to hold property for any Diocese, Missionary District, Parish, or Congregation, to encumber or alienate any consecrated church or chapel, or any church or chapel which has been used solely for Divine Service, belonging to the Parish or Congregation which they represent, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, or of the Council of Advice of the Missionary District, as the case may be.

Section 3. No consecrated church or chapel shall be removed, taken down, or otherwise disposed of for any worldly or common use, without the previous consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, or of the Council of Advice of the Missionary District, as the case may be.

CANON 47

Of the Filling of Vacant Cures.

Section 1. When a Parish or Congregation becomes vacant the Churchwardens or other proper officers shall notify the fact to the Bishop. If the authorities of the Parish shall for thirty days have failed to make provision for the services, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to take such measures as he may deem expedient for the temporary maintenance of Divine services therein.

Section 2. No election of a Rector shall be had until the name of the Clergyman whom it is proposed to elect has been made known to the Bishop, if there be one, and sufficient time, not exceeding thirty days, has been given to him to communicate with the Vestry thereon.

Section 3. Written notice of the election, signed by the Church-wardens, shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. If the Ecclesiastical Authority be satisfied that the person so chosen is a duly qualified Minister, and that he has accepted the office, the notice shall be sent to the Secretary of the Convention, who shall record it. And such record shall be sufficient evidence of the relation between the Minister and the Parish.

Section 4. A Minister is settled, for all purposes here or elsewhere mentioned in these Canons, who has been engaged permanently, or for any term not less than one year, by any Parish, according to the rules of the Diocese in which such Parish is located.

SECTION 5. In case of the election of an Assistant Minister, the name of the clergyman whom it is proposed to elect, shall be made known to the Bishop, and sufficient time, not exceeding thirty days, shall be given him to communicate with the rector and vestry thereon.

CANON 50

Of Lay Readers.

SECTION 1. A competent person ready and desirous to serve the Church in the public services statedly as a Lay Reader must procure from the Bishop

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or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese or Missionary District a written license. Such license shall not be granted to any but a male communicant of this Church, and must be given for a definite period, not longer than one year, but may be renewed from time to time, or revoked at any time. Such license may be given for any vacant Parish or Mission, or for a Congregation without a Minister, but where a Presbyter is in charge, his request and recommendation must have been previously signified to the Ecclesiastical Authority. A license shall not be granted for conducting the service in a Congregation without a Minister, which is able and has had reasonable opportunity to secure the services of an ordained Minister. If the Lay Reader be a student in any Theological Seminary, he shall also, before acting as such, obtain the permission of the presiding officer of such institution and of his own Bishop.

Section 2. A Lay Reader shall be subject to the regulations prescribed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and shall not serve in any Diocese other than that in which he is licensed, unless he shall have received a license from the Bishop of the Diocese in which he desires to serve.

Section 3. In all matters relating to the conduct of the service, and to the Sermons or Homilies to be read, he shall conform to the directions of the Minister in charge of the Parish, Congregation, or Mission in which he is serving, and, in all cases, to the directions of the Bishop. He shall read only the Morning and Evening Prayer (omitting the Absolution), the Litany, the Offices of Instructions and the Office for the Burial of the Dead. He shall not deliver sermons or addresses of his own composition, unless, after instruction and examination, he be specially licensed thereto for urgent needs by the Bishop. He shall not wear the dress appropriate to Clergymen ministering in the Congregation.

Other Provisions of the General Canons.

A person applying to the Standing Committee for recommendation to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders, or for ordination to the Diaconate, or the Priesthood, must present a certificate of his character and fitness signed by the Vestry of the Parish to which he belongs. Canons 27, 34, 35. (Therefore, when a Rector has recommended a postulant to the Bishop as a fit person to study for the ministry, said Rector should report the fact to his Vestry; and the Vestry should be careful to become acquainted with the postulant, that they may intelligently indorse him.)

If a Bishop shall for three years have declined to visit a Parish or Congregation, the Vestry (in this Diocese including the Rector), may apply to the Presiding Bishop for a Council of Conciliation, to be composed of the five Bishops living nearest the Diocese. Canon 43, Sec. 2 (b).

In case there be no Minister in charge of a congregation—"No Churchwardens, Vestrymen, or Trustees of the Congregation, shall permit any person to officiate therein, without sufficient evidence of his being duly licensed or ordained to minister in this Church." Canon 49.

It shall be the duty of the Vestry or Church-wardens having charge of the Parish Register, in a vacant Parish, to exhibit it to the Bishop on the occasion of his visitation. Canon 45, Sec. 2 (d).

A Vestry has the privilege of refusing its consent to the resignation of its Rector. Canon 46, Sec. 1.

A Vestry desiring for urgent reasons a separation and dissolution of pastoral relations with its Rector, may, if the parties be not agreed, give notice thereof in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority, who will act in the premises. Canon 46. Sec. 2.

Lay Delegates to the Diocesan Council are called upon to sign a testimonial for a person whom they elect Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor. Canon 39, Sec. 1 (a).

Lay Delegates may also be called upon to take part in placing the Diocese under the provisional charge of the Bishop or Bishop-Coadjutor of another Diocese. Canon 43, Sec. 6 (b).

A person applying to be appointed Deaconess must lay before the Bishop a testimonial of fitness, signed by four presbyters and eight lay communicants, six of whom shall be women, as a prerequisite to her appointment to that function. Canon 51, Sec. 6.

A communicant in good standing, removing from one Parish or Congregation to another, is entitled to a certificate that he or she is a communicant. Canon 16, Sec. 1 (a).
