The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopates and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is: "Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia."

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia."

The legal title of the Episcopal High School is: "Protestant Episcopal High School in Virginia."

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: The Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia."

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia," a corporation chartered under the laws of Virginia.

The legal title of the Blue Ridge School is: "The Blue Ridge School, Incorporated."

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. Form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise, and bequeath to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia March 25, 1875, and located in the city of Richmond, Va."

The Shrine Mont Endowment Fund Form of Bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, a corporation under the laws of Virginia,"

ORGANIZATION

Canon I, Section 1. A list of all the ordained Ministers, or Clergy, of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in this Diocese, with their post office addresses, and their respective cures, stations or positions, shall be prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority and kept, corrected up to date, on file at the headquarters of the Diocese.

This official list of the Clergy of the Diocese shall be prima facie evidence of a Clergyman's canonical residence, and his cure, station or position.

Section 2. The right of any Clergyman to vote in the Council shall, if denied or disputed, be determined by the Convention itself according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, whether his name be inserted in, or omitted from, the said list.

Section 3. The said list of the Clergy of the Diocese, corrected up to date, with the names of those entitled to vote in the Council designated thereon, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the roll of the Clerical delegates entitled to vote shall be called therefrom.

Canon II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make a roll of the Lay Delegates and Alternates certified to him as duly elected, with the Parishes, Separate Congregations, Mission Churches, and upon the meeting of the Council shall call their names therefrom. The President shall thereupon appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one Clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to which shall be referred the Credentials of all Lay Delegates and which shall make its report to the Council promptly. But until this report be received the roll as made and called by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authentic roll of Lay Delegates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate to his seat, the Committee on Credentials shall hear the evidence presented and report its judgment thereon. Upon this report the Council shall determine the matter unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present the Council shall decide to hear the whole case de novo.

RULES OF ORDER

I. ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- 1. The Council shall be opened on the first day with a brief service of prayer, and on the second day with a celebration of the Holy Communion, at which time there may be a sermon by a preacher selected by the Bishop.
- 2. Upon completion of the service on the first day the Secretary shall report the number present of the clergy canonically connected with the Diocese ac-

cording to the list prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority, and the number present of the lay delegates, certified to the Secretary as duly elected. The credentials of the lay delegates shall thereupon be referred to a committee on credentials composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates appointed by the President.

- 3. Except as otherwise provided herein, the following order of business shall be observed:
- (a) Report of the Secretary.
- (b) Election of the Secretary of the Diocese, who is ex-officio the Secretary of the Council.
- (c) Adoption of Rules of Order.
- (d) Adoption of a program of the Council prepared by the Secretary and the Committee on the Dispatch of Business, in consultation with rector of the host parish.
- (e) Reading of pastoral addresses.
- (f) Appointment of committees.
- (g) Reports of standing committees, commissions and boards
- (h) Reports of special committees.
- (i) Communications from Convocations.
- (j) Unfinished business.
- (k) New business.
- (1) Adjournment.
- 4. (A) There shall be appointed by the President and announced on the first day of the Council the following standing committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:
 - (1) Committee on the State of the Church, to whom shall be referred the pastoral addresses of the Bishops made to the Council, with particular direction to report to the Council upon any recommendations made in the pastoral addresses.
 - (2) Committee on Invested Funds, to consist of five laymen, to whom shall be referred the accounts of all funds held by the Trustees of the Funds of the Diocese.
 - (3) Committee on New Parishes, whenever such a committee is needed.
 - (4) Committee on Canons, to whom shall be referred all motions to amend either the Canons or the Constitution of the Diocese.
 - (5) Committee on Nominations to Diocesan Corporations, to whom shall be reported all vacancies in membership of such boards for which nominations must be made by the Council, and to whom all nominations for membership of any of such boards shall be referred for their consideration before being presented

- to the Council. The Committee shall also nominate seven persons for election by the Council to represent this Diocese on the Virginia Council of Churches.
- (6) Committee on the Dispatch of Business, who shall recommend orders of the day, hours for taking votes, the hour for the Council to sit as a Missionary Council, and other matters pertaining to the orderly dispatch of business.
- (7) A Committee on Minutes, consisting of three clergymen and three laymen, who shall hear and approve the reading of the Minutes of the Council after each day's session.
- (B) (1) There shall be appointed by the President at each annual meeting of the Council a commission on resolutions to serve at the next annual meeting of the Council and at any special meetings that might be called before the next annual meeting. As many proposed resolutions as possible shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Diocese at least two weeks before the annual meeting of the Council so that they may be edited, mimeographed and mailed to all deputies and to the Chairman of the commission on resolutions.
 - (2) The President shall have authority at each Council after making appointments of standing committees for such Council to appoint the Chairman and so many of the other members of such committees as he may think proper, who shall serve during the ensuing interim and at the next meeting of the Council,
- 5. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, Members at Large of the Executive Committee of the Council, Deputies to the Synod or the General Convention, Chancellor of the Diocese, and Registrar shall be made at the first morning session of the Council, and the names shall be placed upon the ballot, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Council for the election of these and such other officers, representatives and committees, as need be chosen.

If only the number of persons to be elected shall be placed in nomination. the Secretary (upon motion made, seconded, and passed) shall cast the vote of the Council in favor of such nominees.

- 6. In every election where more persons are nominated than are to be elected, the balloting shall be:
- (a) On the first ballot any nominee having a majority of all the votes cast shall be declared elected.
- (b) If any office then remains to be filled, a second ballot shall be taken. On this and on subsequent ballots the number of nominees remaining shall be reduced by half, but such reduction shall not result in less than twice the number of offices remaining to be filled, and the manner of such reduction shall be

by retaining as nominces those persons receiving the higher numbers of votes on the preceding ballot.

(c) In event of an impasse, declared to be such by the presiding officer, the Council may change or modify Section B of this rule by a majority vote of members present, notwithstanding the requirement of Rule 28 for a two-thirds vote.

II. RULES OF PROCEDURE.

- 7. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary; every resolution shall be referred to its proper committee, if there be such a committee, to be considered and reported on before debate by the Council.
- 8. After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- 9. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.
- 10. No new motion or proposition shall be admitted under color of amendment or as a substitute for the motion or proposition under debate, but a substitute for the whole that is germane to the question may be admissible.
- 11. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to (1) adjourn, (2) to lay on the table, (3) for the previous question, (4) to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, (5) to commit or amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
- 12. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; it shall be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?"; until decided all debate and amendments are precluded
- 13. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.
- 14. When a member desires to speak in debate or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personalities.
- 15. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.
- 16. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 17. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18. The vote on all questions shall be taken by order, whenever as many as five members request it.

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19. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20. Every member who may be in the house when any question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority, provided such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

23. No motion or resolution appropriating any of the funds of the Diocese shall be adopted until it has been reported up by the Department of Christian Stewardship, or in their absence, by a special committee.

24. Reports of all committees shall be in writing. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall, without obligation, so direct, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

· III. GENERAL.

25. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

26. The President may, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

27. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

28. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

JOURNAL

OF THE

160th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia

CHRIST CHURCH, CHARLOTTESVILLE, VIRGINIA, Wednesday, May 25, 1955.

The Convention was opened in Christ Church, Charlottesville, Virginia, May 25, 1955, at 10:10 A. M., with a service of shortened Morning Prayer conducted by the Rev. Theodore H. Evans, D. D., and the Rev. David H. Lewis, Jr.

The Convention was called to order at 10:55 A. M. by Bishop Goodwin. The Secretary reported that a quorum in both orders was present.

The Rev. Albert C. Muller was elected Secretary; and he announced the appointment of the Rev. David H. Lewis, Jr., and the Rev. Charles G. Leavell as his assistants.

The Rev. Alfred St. J. Matthews moved the adoption of the Rules of Order of the previous Convention with the exception of Rules 5 and 6.

This motion was adopted.

Mr. Matthews moved the adoption of the following:

Rule 5.—Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, Members at Large of the Executive Council of the Convention, Deputies to the Synod or the General Convention, Chancellor of the Diocese, and Registrar shall be made at the first morning session of the Convention, and the names shall be placed upon the ballot, to be voted upon at an hour to be specified by the Convention for the election of these and such other officers, representatives and committees, as need be chosen.

If only the number of persons to be elected shall be placed in nomination, the Secretary (upon motion made, seconded, and passed) shall cast the vote of the Convention in favor of such nominees.

This was seconded and passed.

Mr. Matthews moved the adoption of the following:

Rule 6.—In every election where more persons are nominated than are to be elected, the balloting shall be:

- A. On the first ballot any nominee having a majority of all the votes cast shall be declared elected.
- B. If any office then remains to be filled, a second ballot shall be taken. On this and on subsequent ballots the number of nominees remaining shall be reduced by half, but such reduction shall not result in less than twice the number of offices remaining to be filled, and the manner of such reduction shall be by retaining as nominees those persons receiving the higher numbers of votes on the preceding ballot.

C. In event of an impasse, declared to be such by the presiding officer, the Convention may change or modify Section B of this rule by a majority vote of members present, notwithstanding the requirement of Rule 28 for a two-thirds vote.

The Rev. Henry G. Lane offered a substitute which he withdrew.

Rule 6, as offered by Mr. Matthews, was seconded and passed.

The Rev. Herbert A. Donovan moved that the printed program be adopted as the official program of the Convention. This motion was passed.

Mr. Donovan, as host rector, welcomed the Convention to Christ Church.

The Chair asked Bishop Gibson and Bishop Mason to escort to the chancel the Rt. Rev. G. Ashton Oldham, retired Bishop of Albany, who now makes his home at Charlottesville. Bishop Oldham responded with thanks to the welcome from the Bishops, and he was given a seat in the chancel.

Bishop Goodwin then gave his pastoral address as follows:

To the Clergy and Lay Delegates of the 57th Convention and the 103rd Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

Greetings!

May the Almighty and everliving God, whose fatherly hand is always over us and whose Holy Spirit is ever with us, direct our consultations and prosper our endeavors that they may be in accordance with His will, through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Under the good providence of God, we are meeting in peace and safety in a land greatly blessed by God, to consider our responsibilities to a world overshadowed by fear and largely without a knowledge of Christ; our responsibilities as Christian citizens in a nation beset by many problems, that is not of one mind as to how to discharge their Christian obligation of fellowship; our responsibilities as members of a diocese faced with great missionary opportunities within our own borders and our responsibilities as members of our parishes, where the basic business of worship and service and giving is nurtured. It is a sacred and serious business we are engaged in, and we have need to pray earnestly for the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

God calls us for great service through His Church in the World—in the Nation—in our Diocese, and in our parishes.

First, may we pause to pay tribute to those of our clerical brethren who in the past year, having finished their course in faith, do now rest from their labors.

The Reverend Thomas Perry Baker died at his home in King George County on August 1, 1954, aged ninety years. Born in May, 1864, he graduated from the Virginia Theological Seminary in 1893 and was ordained deacon by Bishop Whittle. He was advanced to the priesthood in June, 1894, by Bishop John B. Newton, our Bishop Coadjutor of that day.

Nearly all of Mr. Baker's ministry was spent in rural parishes. Three of his charges were in the Diocese of Virginia: St. John's Parish, King William County, in 1893-94; St. Anne's Parish in Albemarle County, 1904-07; and Washington and Montross Parishes in Westmoreland County, 1921-32. His other charges were in South Carolina and Maryland. He retired from active work in 1932. He spent the years of retirement in his own home in King George County, serving in vacant parishes and assisting his brethren as opportunity offered, as always a faithful and willing minister of Christ.

The Reverend CLAUDIUS FERDINAND SMITH died in Richmond on February 16, 1955, aged ninety-three years. His ministry covered service in Virginia, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina and Washington. Receiving his Bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina in 1887, and graduating from the Virginia Theological Seminary in 1890, he was ordained deacon in 1890 and priest in 1891 by Bishop Alfred A. Watson, of East Carolina.

When he retired from active work in 1937 he came to live in Richmond, was welcomed and loved by his brethren as ready at all times to hold services and to minister as he found opportunity. He rendered notable service as locum tenens in many vacant parishes, and was deeply interested to the end in all that pertained to the welfare of the Church and of his brethren.

The Reverend Stanley Brown-Serman, D. D., S. T. D., was born in Yorkshire, England, in 1883, and died on March 11, 1955. His father, a clergyman of the Church of England, came to a parish in Michigan, and the son received his scholastic training at Columbia University, after which he took his theological course at the General Theological Seminary. Upon his graduation in 1908 he was given a fellowship which gave him further years of study at his Seminary, and a three-year course at Keble College, Oxford

University. He was ordained both deacon and priest by Bishop David II. Greer, of New York, in 1908. Entering pastoral work in 1915, he was rector of Zion Church, Dobb's Ferry, New York, until 1923, and rector of Grace Church, Nyack, N. Y., for nine years, until 1932. In 1932 he accepted the Chair of New Testament Language and Literature at the Virginia Theological Seminary, and held that charge until his retirement in 1952. During the last two years of that period he was Dean of the Virginia Seminary.

After his retirement he was sent by the Overseas Department of the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church as its special representative to the Theological Seminary of the Episcopal Church in Brazil, at Pelotas. Upon his return from that duty he was given a lectureship in Liturgies at the General Seminary. A great and inspiring teacher, a man greatly beloved, a saintly character, he influenced deeply and lastingly the generations of theological students who came under his instruction, and his influence still carries on in their lives.

The Reverend Aston Hamilton, D. D., was taken from his work in the midst of an active career. Born in the Island of St. Kitt's in the British West Indies in 1894, he died in Richmond on May 2, 1955. Coming to America, he entered the Bishop Payne Divinity School at Petersburg, and graduated in 1924. He was sent by the Bishop in 1924 as deacon in charge of the field of three Negro mission congregations in Essex and King and Queen Counties, and served as priest-in-charge of that field for twenty years. Dr. Hamilton was given charge also of a parish school at Miller's Tavern, and under his active leadership and administration it developed into the John Moneure High School, which he brought to a high degree of efficiency as a diocesan boarding and day school, and preparatory to the St. Paul's Polytechnic Institute at Lawrenceville.

Dr. Hamilton was called in 1944 to the rectorship of St. Philip's Church in Richmond, where he spent the remaining eleven years of his life as rector of his parish and a trusted leader in the developing life of his people within the Episcopal Church.

May their rest be in peace, and their dwelling in the Paradise of God.

BUILDINGS-MANPOWER-MONEY

The corporate life of the Diocese has never been so vigorous, so prosperous or so busy as now. The amount of building that is going on, or in immediate prospect, is amazing; rectories, parish houses, churches and school buildings! Parish after parish, and among them some of the largest in the Diocese, have put on, usually under professional guidance, financial drives which in most cases have confounded the professionals and gone well beyond their first determined goal.

Then, in a way that keeps pace with plant expansion, our manpower output increases. When our five prospective Seminary seniors are ordained, the Examining Chaplains and Standing Committee being willing, to be joined

by three graduates from other dioceses, and some calls now extended are accepted, there will be more than 170 clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and fewer vacant cures, only three or four, than for many years past.

For the years immediately ahead, the prospects are that we will continue to have an adequate supply of men graduating from our seminaries to meet all of our needs and enough, we hope, to share with the missionary demands of the Church. Thirty or more students are expected to be enrolled next year from this Diocese alone, and, thanks to the generous help of certain members of the Diocese who prefer to remain anonymous, the heavy expense that falls on the Diocese in training this goodly number is being met. May their good and generous support continue. The Church owes them a great debt of gratitude.

With the buildings going up and the men coming forward to put them to use, there remains yet a third factor to be considered, money; and money not given grudgingly nor of necessity, but out of a sacrificial spirit with a sacramental understanding.

By now we are all familiar with the plan of giving adopted by last year's Council, developed by our Board of Stewardship, and called, with not too great modesty, "The Virginia Plan of Proportionate Giving." Where the Plan was carefully prepared for and conscientiously carried out, the results were splendid, in some cases surprisingly so. But it is not a one-year plan. It is a real conversion as far as our motive and practice of giving is concerned. The second mile may well be the hardest. The Board of Stewardship in its report will tell its plan for this second year. They will deserve, and I am sure will receive, our whole-hearted support. For the merits of the plan are receiving nation-wide attention. From New England to Texas its methods are being acclaimed. The Department of Promotion of the National Council is advocating the principles on which The Virginia Plan is based. Not only have we begun a good thing for our Diocese, but its influence is reaching out through the Church.

Builders for Christ

But to buildings, men and money there must be added yet another factor—opportunities, opportunities that are so compelling, so thrilling that we cannot rest until we have faced them honestly and met them adequately.

Look at the need in the world overseas and in our own country as these needs are marshalled and brought before us in the Builders for Christ Campaign: Japan, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, our inadequate seminaries, the needs of the American Church Institute for Negroes, for church building in rapidly growing urban and suburban areas, opportunities for capital expansion that cannot be denied. Four millions and more for this, said the last General Convention. Right nobly the Church at large has responded. As yet Virginia and three or four other dioceses, for sufficient reasons, have not yet made their move. But the day is at hand—Whitsunday is next Sun-

day. It is not an easy task—\$68,000 as our bare minimum, and more as a reasonable obligation, but the heart and open hand of this Diocese will not slacken until our full part is raised. We will be Builders for Christ and not laggards behind Him.

1956 ITEM FOR GENERAL CHURCH

While we are speaking of our share in the Church's work in its world-wide and national aspects, a word should be said of our quota figure to the regular operating budget adopted each triennium by General Convention. The diocesan budget for 1956, to be considered by this Council, will have as its first item of missionary giving our estimate of our 1956 quota plus, we hope, some good margin beyond that which is just our duty to give. However, until the Honolulu General Convention has fixed the 1956 General Church budget, we will not know exactly what our part is. I trust, therefore, that when we adopt our 1956 diocesan budget at this Council, with its first item a generous estimate for our 1956 General Church quota, we will also give the Executive Committee authority and instruction to increase whatever figure we may set here to such an amount as may cover any reasonable figure assigned to the Diocese of Virginia after the General Convention in Honolulu. Missionary vision and enthusiasm may well mount when we gather in General Convention at the crossroads of the Pacific.

The Builders for Christ Campaign is the whole Church's response to the needs for capital expansion in the missionary fields at home and abroad. We have reasonable hope that the full amount of \$4,150,000 will be raised by the time of General Convention.

NEEDS OF OUR OWN PARISHES

But what of these needs and the way of meeting them in our own Diocese! These needs fall into two categories:

First—Those parochial needs which are being met by parish resources without diocesan aid; and, secondly, those needs in parishes and missions that require diocesan aid.

All honor to those parishes and congregations which, recognizing their responsibility for the expansion of their facilities, have made sacrificial efforts and pledged sufficient funds to accomplish their purpose without help from outside sources. The amount of parochial building without diocesan aid, recently completed, now going on or planned for the immediate future, is more than \$3,000,000. If the new buildings in our church schools are included the amount is over \$3,400,000. (Unless we are pathetically parochial and ingrown, should we not raise our share of the Builders for Christ—\$68,000—with a shout!)

The second category consists of those congregations and missions faced with the most pressing need for church building—sometimes a new congrega-

tion worshipping in rented quarters, or a private home, that must and rightly do turn to the Diocese for aid. These represent the missionary frontier within our own Diocese. What is the prospect of meeting these needs? What have we done thus far? What do we plan for the future?

The answer is not too encouraging. Three years ago we undertook to raise about \$1,000,000 in the B. B. F. to meet these needs. We raised about half of it, and much was accomplished in meeting the most pressing needs of three years ago in church and school building.

But what of the great needs that could not be met because of our failure to raise the full amount? And those that have risen since? A new campaign could not be launched, the current operating budget was deemed to be at its highest possible point. Where could we turn!

THE NEED FOR CHURCH EXTENSION

It was then that the item for Church Extension, \$50,000, was devised, half-way in and half-way out of the budget. Not made a part of quota assignment, put "below the line," a sort of stepchild item, to meet this tremendous challenge of diocesan growth! The figure of \$50,000 was suggested. The Diocese contributed in 1954, \$28,000. The same figure of \$50,000 for Church Extension is in our current 1955 budget. What we will receive this current year, we don't yet know. In our favor is the impetus The Virginia Plan has given to our sense of stewardship. 1955 also happens to be the year for the Builders for Christ Campaign. The situation remains fluid and interesting, and as yet unsolved.

But we are not resting on our oars. I wish every member of this body could be present at some of the monthly meetings of the Board of Stewardship, or the Board of Missions; but come prepared to make a day of it. There you would see these clergymen and laymen from all over the Diocese, from Winchester to West Point, from St. Mary's, Arlington, to St. Mary's, Whitechapel, spend hours and hours going over the appeals that come to them from local Strategy Committees and elsewhere, presenting really desperate demands for aid. What do they have with which to meet these needs? A few sparse left-overs from the Bishops' Building Fund, all gone now; \$28,000 of the \$50,000 asked for Church Extension in 1954, all spent, too; about the same amount hoped for this current year, all of it already promised; and even whatever may come in 1956 tentatively assigned for present and pressing needs. This has actually meant the abandonment of at least one very worthy enterprise, heartily endorsed by the local Strategy Committee, the Convocation, the Bishops and the Department of Missions, and the congregations involved. Some possible help in 1957 just couldn't meet the immediate situation in 1955. Reality, as we euphemistically call it, had to be faced, and the plans and hopes abandoned to the great loss of the Church.

Faced with situations like this, one could well have expected a hard-headed business man or a practical parson, and we have plenty of both on our boards,

to have said as they prepared next year's budget for us to act on today: "There is no point in fooling ourselves. We ask for \$50,000 for Church Extension—we get \$28,000. Let's be realistic and make the Church Extension item \$30,000 or, better, cut it in half and we will get it." But you don't know the calibre of the men on our Missionary and Stewardship Boards. They didn't cut the \$50,000 in half, they doubled it, and the Executive Council approved their action, and passed it on in the proposed budget for 1956 to this body for action—not \$50,000 for Church Extension but \$100,000.

For a great missionary diocese like Virginia, it seems there was something a bit out of focus in our 1954 giving for building programs—\$3,000,000 for parish and school buildings, worthy and necessary projects that deserved our loyalty and sacrifice—and only \$28,000, less than 1% as much for Church Extension in the Diocese. These figures are not exactly comparable categories but they are near enough to be arresting.

Let's do better in 1955—this year, toward the full \$50,000, and then in 1956, with the memory of the Builders for Christ Campaign but a memory of a task well done—make the \$100,000 for Church Extension not a pious hope but an ecclesiastical I. O. U. with our names signed below.

REORGANIZATION IS WORKING

Two years ago the report of the Ad Hoc Committee on diocesan organization was adopted and its recommendations, or most of them, put into effect. The first year was one of feeling our way; taking things a bit easily and seeing how matters would work out, how new hands could handle the departmental steering wheels. Frankly, while the new plan immediately relieved the Bishop of many administrative responsibilities, for which I am indeed grateful, it was a hard year on Bishop Gibson and Mr. Chilton. They had to do their usual duties as Bishop or Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocese, and at the same time serve as Executive Secretaries of the Departments of Stewardship and Missions, and train many new board members for their responsible duties.

The appointment of an Administrator for Mountain Missions, the election of Mr. Chilton as Archdeacon and the election of Mr. Holcombe Palmer as Executive Secretary of the Department of Stewardship have all been steps in filling out the original plan with the necessary manpower. I sincerely hope that Bishop Gibson and Mr. Chilton will feel more and more relieved of many administrative burdens which they have been carrying, far more than should have been imposed on them. But there seemed no other way to carry through the reorganization these first two years. I want this body to know how great have been their responsibilities, how wise their guidance, and how unselfish their added measure of service. But we are coming out of the woods now with a minimum of bureaucratic buncombe, well organized, thoroughly departmentalized, and, thankful to say, no one's health or temper has broken under the strain. Only the elevator gave way one day when Jim

Lincoln was aboard—a hopeless wreck. But the elevator has not been the only structural catastrophe. Hurricane Hazel nipped off a part of the roof. Intrepid termites, starting in the basement, ate their way right on up to the first floor. Repairs thus occasioned cost considerable money but they had to be made. Further study has revealed that many other repairs and changes, and much cleaning and painting, will be necessary before the building can be made into reasonably adequate diocesan offices. To do this will require several thousand dollars.

HEADQUARTERS PROBLEM

Moreover, as the work at diocesan headquarters has increased four-fold and more since we began to use the Mayo Memorial Building, we are badly cramped for space. Desk room in one of the hallways is the best we can offer newcomers. Poor Bob Seiler, as Executive Secretary of the Department of Social Relations, moved his desk here and there so often that he might as well have tried to perform his duties on a pogo stick. He has disappeared lately, and I have an idea that he has set up shop out in the back yard under the big tree which used to be there. We just have to have more space.

So, recently at a staff meeting—we have them now—a resolution was prepared to be presented to this Council asking that a committee be appointed to study this situation and, if possible, do something about it—maybe even move to Roslyn. Where the money is coming from no one has the slightest idea. You will hear more of this when the resolution is presented by our Chief of Staff, Archdeacon Chilton.

So adequately are the various phases of our diocesan life now taken care of by our competent departments and committees thereof, that in a general address like this one hesitates to speak too specifically of certain matters, knowing full well that when the various departments make their reports, that these matters will be presented by well informed persons who have worked with and developed the matter in a thoroughly responsible way. However, I cannot refrain from giving particular and joyful emphasis to the fact that the Department of Christian Social Relations is going to present to us a plan of action, approved by the Executive Council, which if approved will bring to reality the hopes of so many in this Diocese for a Diocesan Home for Old Folks. It will supplement the fine work of the Protestant Episcopal Church Home for Women in Richmond, and indeed it is through the sympathetic cooperation of the governing Board of that Home that our new project may become a practical reality. I know that you will hear with special eagerness this part of the Department's report.

THE ALL SAINTS PROPOSAL

One final matter. The Trustees of Roslyn, the Diocesan center in Richmond, have asked me to bring a request to this Council that they give, if they will, an expression of approval to the desire of the Trustees to lease or sell a

portion of land on the River Road front of the Roslyn property at the western end of the wooded and now unused portion to All Saints congregation in Richmond. This congregation purposes to erect thereon a church, parish hall and other such buildings as are usually needed for a normal parish life. The Trustees feel that such a parish plant would not only greatly improve the looks of the property, but would be of mutual advantage to the conference center and the parish. The Richmond Strategy Committee, the Convocation, the Roslyn Trustees, and the Bishops most cordially endorse this plan. I would ask that the Committee on Resolutions take this request of the Trustees under advisement, and present such a resolution to this body as may properly bring this matter before Council for their consideration.

So now let's get to the serious work before this body; with our eyes lifted up to see the world-wide work of our Episcopal Church as it faces the needs of the world; with a sense of God's judgment upon us as each one, according to the dictates of his own conscience, seeks to work out his duty as a Christian citizen and as a member of that Body of which Jesus Christ is the Head, and all the baptized people are the members; as communicants of the Diocese within whose borders missionary opportunities are as fields white unto the harvest; as members of a Christian fellowship in our home parish where we worship and are strengthened and serve and give because the Lord is our hope and our salvation.

God calls us to greater service through His Church in the World—in our Nation—in our Diocese and in our parish.

Bishop Goodwin and Bishop Gibson presented by title their reports of official acts. (See Appendix.)

The portion of the Bishop's Pastoral Address conveying to the Convention a request of the Trustees of Roslyn for an expression of approval to their desire to lease or sell a portion of land to All Saints Church, Richmond, was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. T. Wilson Wilmer presented the following report for the Committee on Credentials:

The Committee on Credentials has examined the list and each certificate of appointment of lay delegate and alternate delegate, and found them in order with the following exception:

Saint Matthew's Church, Tuckahoe Parish, is listed as a Mission Church, but has certified two delegates and two alternates to the Convention. Saint Matthew's Church has a sufficient number of communicants to name two

Your Committee recommends that only one delegate be seated from Saint Matthew's Church, until the Convention wishes, by proper action, to reclassify this church as a Separate Congregation, at which time the second shall be considered seated.

Adoption of this report was moved, seconded and carried. Mr. Turner Arrington read noon-day prayers. Before doing so he thanked the members of the Convention for their prayers last year for his recovery when he was ill in the hospital.

The Rev. William A. Clebsch presented a resolution to amend Canon XV, Section 8, and a resolution to amend Canon XVII, Section 1 and/or 10. These were referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. O. V. T. Chamberlain presented, on behalf of the Committee on the State of the Church, a proposed substitute for Canon X and a proposed amendment to add a Section 4 to Article III of the Constitution. These were referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. James P. Lincoln presented a resolution to amend Canon IX, Section 4. This was referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. Albert Muller presented proposed amendments to Canon XV, Section 8, and Canon XXVIII, Section 8. These were referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Treasurer's report was received in the form of an audit of the operating account of the Diocese.

The audit of the accounts of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia was received, and it was referred to the Committee on Invested Funds.

The audit of the Investment Funds of the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society was received.

Archdeacon Chilton moved the following, which was seconded and adopted:

Whereas, the present building used as the Mayo Memorial Church House requires the expenditure of approximately \$19,000 for repairs and improvements in the immediate future, and in addition approximately \$25,000 for repairs and improvements within the next three to five years; and

Whereas, there is doubt about the wisdom of spending large amounts on the repair and improvement of the present building, since in the minds of many it is doubtful whether the building can be remodeled in such a fashion as to allow the Diocesan staff to operate at an adequate degree of efficiency; and

Whereas, the deed of conveyance by the daughters and granddaughters of Captain and Mrs. Peter H. Mayo, whereby the Diocese acquired the Mayo Memorial Church House property, made provision that the Diocese may, if necessary, dispose of the present property upon condition that the money derived therefrom be applied to the purchase or erection of another building to which the name Mayo Memorial shall be transferred;

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That a geographically representative committee of ten, with the Bishops and the Archdeacon as additional members, be appointed to consider the wisdom and feasibility of moving the Diocesan offices, now housed at 110 West Franklin Street, to the Diocesan Center, "Roslyn," or elsewhere, and that report be made to the Executive Committee, and further that authority be given to the Executive Committee to make a final decision of re-locating the Mayo Memorial Church House of the Diocese of Virginia, if indicated, and to take such action as may be necessary to effectuate the same.

The Rev. Ward McCabe presented a resolution on proposals to revise the Prayer Book. This was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

The Rev. William A. Clebsch presented a resolution on missionary work and a resolution to mark the martyrdom of Bishops Ridley and Lattimer. This was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. Braxton H. Tabb, Jr., presented a resolution regarding the fixing of meeting place of General Convention. This was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. McLain T. O'Ferrall presented a resolution on behalf of the congregation of All Saints Church, Richmond. This was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. James M. Ball, Jr., presented a petition of the churches in St. James-Northam Parish for the transfer of Goochland County from the Albemarle Convocation to the Richmond Convocation. This was referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. Dr. G. MacLaren Brydon moved the following, which was seconded and adopted:

Resolved, That the Chair appoint a committee to consider the question of official titles to be given clergymen in charge of Parishes and Congregations and report to the next Council.

Mr. Frederick M. Morris was nominated Treasurer of the Diocese. It was moved, seconded and passed that nominations be closed, and Mr. Morris was elected Treasurer.

Mr. Archibald G. Robertson, Mr. James R. Ayers, Jr., Mr. Bernard P. Chamberlain and Mr. J. Chisman Hanes were nominated for the office of Chancellor of the Diocese. The last three withdrew their names, with the consent of their nominators, and, on motion of Mr. Blake T. Newton, Sr., Mr. Robertson was declared re-elected Chancellor.

The Rev. Dr. G. MacLaren Brydon was unanimously reelected Registrar of the Diocese.

Dr. Brydon was unanimously re-elected Historiographer of the Diocese.

The Rev. Dr. W. Leigh Ribble moved the adoption on second reading of the following, which was passed on first reading by the 159th Annual Convention:

- 1. Whenever the word "Convention" appears in the Constitution and Canons it shall be changed from "Convention" to "Council."
- 2. Whenever the words "Executive Council" appear in the Constitution and Canons, the words "Executive Committee" be substituted therefor.

These amendments were duly adopted.

Dr. Ribble moved the adoption on second reading of the following amendment to the Constitution, as passed on first reading by the 159th Annual Convention:

A new Article to the Constitution to be numbered Article XV and to read:

"All baptized members of the Protestant Episcopal Church residing in this Diocese shall, as heretofore, constitute a Missionary Society known as the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

"The direction and activities of this Society shall be identical with those of the Executive Committee of the Council and shall be solely directed by said Committee."

This article was duly adopted.

Council adjourned for lunch.

Bishop Goodwin called the Council back to order at 2 P. M.

The Rev. Dr. A. C. Zabriskie presented a resolution on theological seminary representation at the General Convention. This was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Mr. T. Wilson Wilmer reported for the Committee on Credentials, that a Lay Delegate had now been certified for Gibson Parish (Grace Church, Stanardsville). He moved that the delegate be seated. This motion was seconded and passed.

The Rev. Thomas G. Faulkner, Jr., reported for the Committee on New Parishes.

He moved that St. Luke's Church, Wellington, in Fairfax Parish, be admitted as a Separate Congregation. This motion was adopted.

Mr. Faulkner moved that St. Matthew's Church, in Tuckahoe Parish, be admitted as a Separate Congregation. This motion was adopted.

Mr. Faulkner moved that St. John's Church, Glencarlyn, in Arlington Parish, be admitted as a Mission Church. This motion was adopted.

Mr. Faulkner reported that the Committee had taken note of a parochial mission of Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill in the Shirley Duke area of Alexandria.

Mr. Faulkner moved the following, which was seconded and adopted:

Resolved, That a commission be appointed by the Bishop to study:

1. Whether all established Congregations in the Diocese should not be required to meet the standards of Congregations under Canons 13, 14 and 15, dealing with the establishment of Missions, Mission Churches, and Separate Congregations, in order to maintain their present status.

2. Whether abandoned church property should not be razed or otherwise

altered before it is allowed to be put to secular use.

Mr. T. Wilson Wilmer, Chairman of the Committee on Credentials, noting that St. Matthew's Church, Tuckahoe Parish, had now been admitted as a Separate Congregation, moved that the second Lay Delegate from this congregation be seated. This motion was adopted.

The Rev. Innis L. Jenkins presented the Certificate of Election of the Lay Delegate and Alternate of St. John's Church, Glencarlyn, in Arlington Parish. He moved that the Delegate be seated, and this motion passed.

The Rev. James P. Lincoln proposed the adoption of fitting resolutions to be sent to the Rev. B. B. Comer Lile, absent because of illness; the Rev. Robert R. Brown as Bishop Coadjutor-elect of Arkansas, and the Rt. Rev. Harry Lee Doll, newly consecrated Suffragan Bishop of Maryland. These were referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

The Rev. Dr. John Page Williams reported on Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia. (See Appendix.)

Bishop Gibson read the names of eighteen new clergymen who had come to the Diocese since the last Council, and introduced those who were present. The list included the Rev. Messrs, J. E. Bethea, E. P. Bush, C. W. Carnan, George Estes, John R. Frizzell, Jr., E. M. Gregory, Boyd R. Howarth, Holt Jenkins, R. Baldwin Lloyd, R. Douglas Pitt, Jr., George Zabriskie, Benjamin Axleroad, Lawson Cox, E. A. deBordenave, Joseph Heistand, Allen M. Miller, Donald Partington, and J. F. Ferneyhough.

The Chair called for the election of one clerical member of the Standing Committee.

The Chair called for the election of one lay member of the Standing Committee.

Dr. John Garland Pollard, Jr., gave the report of the Interracial Commission. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. George F. Tittmann moved that the report be received with thanks. This motion passed.

The Rev. O. V. T. Chamberlain gave the report of the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix.)

The tellers reported on the first ballot for a clerical member of the Standing Committee. There was no election. The names of the Rev. R. M. Olton and the Rev. A. M. Robertson were dropped, and the Chair called for a second ballot to be taken.

Mr. Charles Leete moved that the report of the Committee on the State of the Church be received with thanks. This motion was passed.

The tellers reported on the first ballot for a lay member of the Standing Committee. There was no election. The names of Mr. Bernard Chamberlain, Judge Hamilton Haas, and Mr. Blake T. Newton, Jr., were dropped, and the Chair called for a second ballot to be taken.

Mr. Warren H. Turner, Jr., gave the report of the Department of Christian Education, and it was moved, seconded and carried, that the report be received with thanks. (See Appendix.)

The tellers reported on the second ballot for a clerical member of the Standing Committee. There was no election. The Rev. Edward L. Merrow's name was dropped, and the Chair called for a third ballot to be taken.

The tellers reported on the second ballot for a lay member of the Standing Committee. There was no election. The names of Mr. Reed I. West and Mr. J. Chisman Hanes were dropped, and the Chair called for a third ballot to be taken.

Mr. George R. Humrickhouse gave the report of the Department of Christian Social Relations. (See Appendix.)

Mr. Humrickhouse moved the adoption of the following, which carried:

"2. That the action of the Executive Council on April 19, 1955, authorizing the purchase of the property at 1621 Grove Avenue for said purpose be approved.

"3. That, in order to carry out the recommendations of the Department of Christian Social Relations and effectuate the purchase of the said property, this matter be referred to the Chancellor of the Diocese and the Department of Christian Social Relations with authority to organize under the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia a corporation with power to operate such a Home for the Aged and to acquire the real property necessary for the same. Said corporation to be governed by a Board of Trustees, the number and terms of office to be set forth in the charter, the original Board to be elected by the Executive Committee of the Council, and subsequent board members to be elected by the Board of Trustees of the Corporation from nominations made by the Council of the Diocese."

Mr. Humrickhouse moved the adoption of the following, which carried:

"Residing in the Diocese of Virginia, existing in many cases instead of living, are many of God's children who are patients and inmates of nursing homes, hospitals, and prisons. These are, in many instances, the forgotten ones of our society. For them our Lord died and rose again. To them we have a Christian responsibility for their spiritual care and guidance, by the help of Almighty God.

"Be it Resolved, That this Council of the Diocese of Virginia give its approval and support to the Department of Christian Social Relations in promoting a ministry to the people in institutions, wherever it may be possible."

The Tellers reported on the third ballot for a clerical member of the Standing Committee. The Chair declared the Rev. David H. Lewis, Jr., elected.

The tellers reported on the third ballot for a lay member of the Standing Committee. The Chair declared Mr. Albert A. Smoot elected.

The Chair called for the election of two clerical members-atlarge of the Executive Committee of the Council.

The Chair called for the election of two lay members-atlarge of the Executive Committee.

Mr. Humrickhouse moved the adoption of the resolution contained in the report of the Department of Christian Social

[&]quot;Be it Resolved:

[&]quot;1. That the Council of the Diocese does hereby ratify the plan for the establishment of a home for single men, single women and couples as set forth in the report of the Department of Christian Social Relations.

Relations, on the elimination of racial barriers in the life of the Church.

The Rev. William A. Clebsch moved that the resolution be amended by striking out the words "will of God" and substituting therefor the words "principle of the Christian ethic."

This amendment carried.

The Rev. Dr. George J. Cleaveland presented a substitute resolution which was lost.

Considerable discussion followed.

Mr. Archibald G. Robertson presented a substitute resolution.

The Rev. Thomas Faulkner moved that the substitute resolution and the original resolution, as amended, be referred to the Committee on Resolutions. This motion was lost.

Mr. Edmund D. Campbell called attention to the fact that the Department's resolution could be rejected, but that its report could not be rejected.

Mr. E. N. Montague moved that a vote be postponed until tomorrow and that mimeographed copies of the amended resolution and of Mr. Robertson's substitute resolution be made as soon as possible, so that the members might have opportunity to study them. This motion carried.

The tellers reported on the first ballot for two clerical members of the Executive Committee. There was no election. The names of the Rev. Messrs. Fox, Bethea, Eddleton, H. J. Williams, and Denton were dropped; and the Chair called for a second ballot to be taken.

The tellers reported on the first ballot for two lay members of the Executive Committee. There was no election. The names of Messrs. Boss, Burruss, Jeffreys, Morrison, Shay, and Trader were dropped; and the Chair called for a second ballot to be taken.

Mr. Humrickhouse moved the adoption of the report of the Department of Christian Social Relations, with the exception of the resolution on racial barriers. This motion passed.

The Rev. Dr. R. Cary Montague spoke on the work of the Department, and commended the work of his successor, the Rev. Robert S. Seiler, its Executive Secretary.

The Rev. H. Lee Marston moved that, in voting for Deputies to the General Convention, the list of names, including those already elected, be never less than eight names. This motion was lost.

The Rev. A. St. J. Matthews moved that the present ballot be taken and that the present nominees, except the four elected in each order, be made the nominees for alternates. This motion carried.

The tellers reported on the second ballot for two clerical members of the Executive Committee. The Chair declared the Rev. Francis W. Hayes, Jr., elected.

The names of the Rev. Holt Souder and the Rev. Rufus Womble were dropped, and the Chair called for a third ballot to be taken.

The Rev. William B. Lee moved the election by acclamation of the candidate having the highest number of votes. Unanimous consent was needed for this motion to prevail. The Rev. Mr. Leavell revealed that there would not be unanimous consent.

Mr. Reed I. West gave the report of the Department of Missions. (See Appendix.)

Mr. West introduced Mr. McLain O'Ferrall, who reported for the Committee on Mountain Work and its progress towards placing the mountain missions on a par with the other rural work in the Diocese.

Mr. West moved that, under the arrangement previously authorized by the Council, by which the unrestricted assets of the Diocese may be used as a credit in assisting needed expansion of parish resources in the Diocese, the total loans secured in this way shall not at any time exceed the sum of \$200,000. Originally the total was set at \$100,000. Subsequently it was increased by the Council to \$150,000.

This motion was seconded and carried.

It was moved, seconded and carried, that the report of the Department of Missions be received with thanks.

The tellers reported on the third ballot for a clerical member of the Executive Committee. The Chair declared the Rev. E. A. deBordenave elected.

Council adjourned at 5:30 P. M.

The Council banquet was held at the First Methodist Church at 6:15 P. M. The Rev. Mr. Donovan presented the Gospel Train Quartet, who sang several selections.

Bishop Oldham was asked to repeat a statement on patriotism which he had written during the First World War, entitled "America First," and calling on America to be first not only in things material but also, more importantly, in things of the spirit.

Bishop Goodwin then presented Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, former Treasurer of the National Council, who spoke on the Builders for Christ Campaign. Dr. Franklin spoke graphically and fervently of the work of the Church throughout the world, in our seminaries, and in the Home Department of the National Council, which will benefit from the funds raised in the Builders for Christ Campaign.

Following Dr. Franklin's address, Messrs. William Early, of St. Thomas' Church, Orange, and William Jeffreys, of St. James' Church, Richmond, spoke briefly concerning their churches' effort and response in the Builders for Christ Campaign.

Bishop Gibson moved that we authorize the Treasurer of the Diocese of Virginia to notify the Treasurer of the National Council that we accept \$70,000 and any in excess which we may raise as our part for the Builders for Christ Fund. This was seconded and passed without a dissenting voice.

Mr. B. Powell Harrison, Jr., presented the report of the Department of Stewardship. He presented Mr. John Paul Causey, Chairman of the Committee on Publications, who spoke of the plans for the future development of The Virgin's Churchman.

Mr. Harrison reported on the Efficiency and Workload Committee surveying the Mayo Memorial headquarters, under the Rev. Robert R. Brown and General Edwin Conquest. It was found necessary to employ a professional to make the survey. Results of the survey were: (1) the appointment of Mr. Chilton as "Chief of Staff"; (2) the employment of an Executive Secretary for the Department of Stewardship—Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer, layman whom Mr. Harrison introduced to the Council; and (3) the retirement age of lay workers has been lowered from

68 to 65 years. In order to accomplish the latter an annuity premium was paid, so that benefits would be equalized at the earlier retirement age.

The Rev. Mr. Harp suggested that, in view of the late hour, the budget consideration be postponed. This suggestion was lost on a show of hands.

Mr. James R. Ayers, Jr., presented the proposed budget for 1956.

The Rev. Dr. Cary Montague moved that the item in the budget of the Department of Christian Social Relations be increased from \$2,600.00 to \$2,750.00 for our diocesan share in the expenses of the Interdenominational Religious Work Foundation.

Bishop Goodwin announced that this would be the first order of business in the morning, because it had been agreed not to go into discussion of the budget tonight.

After a closing prayer, Bishop Goodwin announced Council adjourned until the service of the Holy Communion at 9:00 o'clock Thursday morning.

Thursday, May 26, 1955.

The Council began its second day with a Corporate Communion at 9:00 A. M. Bishop Goodwin was the celebrant. He was assisted by Bishop Gibson, Bishop Mason, Bishop Oldham, and the Rev. Mr. Donovan.

Bishop Goodwin called the Council to order at 10:15 A. M.

The tellers reported on the second ballot for the lay members of the Executive Committee. The Chair declared Mr. Edwin P. Conquest elected.

The names of Messrs. Dunning, Fowler and Wilmer were dropped, and the Chair called for a third ballot for one member to be taken.

The tellers reported on the first ballot for clerical deputies to the General Convention. The Chair declared the Ven. Samuel B. Chilton elected.

The names of the Rev. Messrs. Ashton, Baldwin, Cleaveland, Davis, Evans, Ewing, Laylor, Mason, Mead, Ossman,

H. J. Williams and J. L. B. Williams were dropped; and the Chair called for a second ballot to be taken.

The tellers reported on the third ballot for a lay member of the Executive Committee. The Chair declared Mr. Norman E. Simpson elected.

The tellers reported on the first ballot for lay deputies to the General Convention. There was no election. The following names were dropped: Messrs. AttKisson, J. M. Ball, Jr., Neville G. Ball, Blair, Chandler, Morris, Richmond, Robinson, Sumner, Tinsley, and Wooten. The Chair called for a second ballot to be taken.

The Rev. Dr. Cary Montague renewed his request for an increase in the Christian Social Relations budget item for the Interdenominational Religious Work Foundation. He now moved that the item be increased by \$200 to a total of \$2,800. After some discussion and explanation, this motion was lost: 52 for, 136 opposed.

The Rev. William H. Mead said he felt that there was a discrepancy between the teaching and practice in our Diocese as to stewardship. While the parishes have focused on the inward spirit of stewardship, the Diocese was lagging far behind. On the Diocesan level we talk one thing and do another. Some argued we are not ready to discard budgets, even so cannot we begin? The \$100,000 "below the line" item for Church Extension could be the focal point. He moved, therefore, to amend the budget so as to strike \$100,000 from the budget for Church Extension and put in its place a question mark, meanwhile emphasizing the opportunities for Church Extension in our Diocese. Bishop Goodwin then suggested the placing of a cross rather than the question mark. The Rev. Mr. Mead accepted this suggestion in his motion. The Rev. Mr. Fox seconded Mr. Mead's motion. Mr. B. Powell Harrison said that he felt the Department of Christian Stewardship would be amenable to such a move. Mr. James Avers said we have not yet pledged the raising of \$50,000, might it not be better, therefore, to wait a year with the realistic shock of \$100,000 in the budget? Mr. Albert Smoot said there was, in his opinion, no reason to wait another year; the time is now.

Dr. Brydon pointed out the power of the Cross is very great. If a cross is put there instead of \$100,000 it will be effective, in his opinion.

The Rev. Mr. Hayes questioned Mr. Mead as to whether he actually accepted a cross instead of a question mark. Mr. Mead said he did feel this a very powerful suggestion. Mr. Hayes then suggested that the Cross as a plus sign be placed after the budget as encouraging increased giving for Church Extension.

The Rev. Reno Harp spoke in favor of the resolution but pointed out that it was actually faith in vestries rather than faith in God that was involved.

Mr. Leete said that he subscribed to the substitution of a cross if in addition \$100,000 is shown as a bare necessity. Mr. Nemir pointed out that sacrificial giving really should be present in our giving to the whole of budget, rather than in one particular portion thereof.

Mr. Mead's motion was adopted.

Bishop Goodwin suggested that the Secretary send felicitations of the Council to the Council of Southwestern Virginia now in session. Mr. John B. Welsh so moved, and it was carried.

The tellers reported on the second ballot for clerical deputies to the General Convention. The Chair declared the Rev. Herbert A. Donovan and the Rev. Dr. Churchill J. Gibson elected second and third deputies, respectively.

The names of the Rev. Messrs. Chamberlain, Lile, Lincoln, Merrow and Souder were dropped, and the Chair called for a third ballot to be taken.

Mr. B. Powell Harrison, Jr., moved adoption of the following, which was seconded and carried:

Resolved, That the first three divisions of the budget of the Department of Christian Stewardship for 1955, amounting to \$79,464.50, adopted by the Council (Convention) of the Diocese at its meeting in May, 1954, be, and the same are, for the purposes of Canon V, adopted as the budget of the Diocesan Expense Assessment; and it is hereby specifically directed that appropriations under the authority of such budget, not paid out of other funds designated for such purposes, shall be paid out of the Diocesan Expense Assessment.

Mr. James Ayers then asked for questions on the budget. It was asked whether or not if the Diocese used the Virginia Plan completely would we not have to amend the Canons. The Chair stated that in his opinion such amendment would be necessary.

The Rev. Thomas Faulkner, Jr., asked Mr. Ayers if the Department of Christian Stewardship had considered the American Bible Society in preparing its budget. Mr. Ayers stated that it was left out of the budget again this year to be taken care of by voluntary offerings in the various congregations. Mr. Faulkner said he was cognizant of the fact that \$500 was taken out of the budget in the hope that thereby voluntary giving would result in a larger amount for the American Bible Society. Bishop Goodwin said that an offering on the second Sunday in Advent would be a good thing, as he felt one or two special offerings were necessary for every congregation, the other special offering being that for theological education.

The Rev. Parker Thornton pointed out that actually the sum contained in previous budgets of the Diocese was \$1,500 rather than \$500. The Rev. Rufus Womble, Chairman of the American Bible Society for our Diocese, then stated that he had planned later in the Council to ask vestries to place the American Bible Society in their budgets or to take a special offering on the second Sunday in Advent. He stated that he was doing so now since the matter had been so cogently brought up.

The combined Diocesan Expense and Program Budget for 1956 was then adopted as presented by the Department of Christian Stewardship, in the total amount of \$415,805.72. With \$10,000 estimated income from interest and gifts, the amount to be apportioned is \$405,805.72. (See Appendix.)

The tellers reported on the second ballot for lay deputies to the General Convention. This seemed to reveal that there was no election, it being stated that there were 225 votes necessary for election. This was questioned by the Rev. Mr. Leavell, and the Chair agreed that something was in error and referred the report back to the tellers for clarification.

Mr. B. Powell Harrison, Jr., moved adoption of the following, which was carried:

Resolved, That the Executive Committee be, and it hereby is, authorized to increase the budget for the year 1956 by any sum it may feel necessary (to add) in order that this Diocese may adequately pay its fair portion of the budget adopted by General Convention this year.

The tellers brought in a corrected report on the second ballot for lay deputies to the General Convention. The Chair declared Mr. B. Powell Harrison, Jr., Mr. Albert A. Smoot and Mr. R. Turner Arrington elected in that order.

The names of Messrs. Ayers, Campbell and Chinn were dropped, and the Chair called for a third ballot to be taken.

The tellers reported on the third ballot for clerical deputies to the General Convention. There was no election. The names of the Rev. Messrs. Harp and Hayes were dropped, and the Chair called for a fourth ballot to be taken.

Mr. B. Powell Harrison, Jr., moved adoption of the following, which was carried:

Resolved, That this Council is deeply interested in the matter presented by the Rev. Dr. Cary Montague and requests the Executive Committee to consider the situation at an early date, with a view to providing the additional \$200 requested for the item in the Department of Christian Social Relations budget, if the funds can be found.

Mrs. Henry P. Taylor gave the report of the Woman's Auxiliary. (See Appendix.)

The tellers reported on the fourth ballot for clerical deputies to the General Convention. There was no election. Dr. Ribble's name was dropped, and the Chair called for a fifth ballot to be taken.

The Rev. Dewey C. Loving read noon-day prayers.

The tellers reported on the third ballot for lay deputies to the General Convention. There was no election. The names of Mr. Newton and Dr. Pollard were dropped, and the Chair called for a fourth ballot to be taken.

The Ven. Samuel B. Chilton moved a rising vote of appreciation to Mr. E. W. Newman, of Ashland Parish, who was attending his fortieth consecutive Council. The Council rose in appreciation.

The tellers reported on the fifth ballot for clerical deputies to the General Convention. The Chair declared the Rev. David H. Lewis, Ir., elected.

The Rev. Dr. W. Leigh Ribble began the report of the Committee on Canons. The Committee recommended that Canon XV, Section 8, be amended to read:

"Section 8. A list of all Missions under the Department of Missions shall be published separately in the Council Journal."

This was moved, seconded and passed by a canonical majority.

The Committee recommended that Canon XXVIII, Section 8, be amended by substituting the words "Department of Christian Stewardship" for the words "Committee on Finance."

This was carried by a canonical majority.

The Committee recommended that Canon XVII, Section 10, be amended by deleting the words "not however less than four."

This was carried by a canonical majority.

The Committee recommended that the request of the churches in Goochland County for transfer from the Albemarle Convocation to the Richmond Convocation be approved. On motion, seconded and carried by a canonical majority, Canon X, Section 1, paragraph (1), was amended by deleting the word "Goochland," and paragraph (4) of this section was amended to read:

"(4) The Richmond Convocation, comprising all parishes in Henrico County, Goochland County, and in the City of Richmond north of the James River."

The Committee recommended that the proposed amendment to Canon IX, Section 4, be not adopted. Mr. John Paul Causey spoke in favor of the Committee's recommendation. The Rev. James P. Lincoln, proposer of the amendment, asked that the Committee's recommendation be rejected because the proposed change defined clearly rotation of Board members. The Committee's recommendation was lost.

Mr. Lincoln moved adoption of the change in Canon IX, Section 4, second paragraph of sub-section (d), so that the sentences beginning "Thereafter, the Executive Council shall, at its first meeting, etc. . . ." shall read:

"Thereafter, the Executive Committee shall, at its first meeting after Council, elect one-third of the membership of each Board to serve for a term of three years, WHO UPON COMPLETION OF THE THREE-YEAR TERM, WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE FOR RE-ELECTION FOR A PERIOD OF ONE YEAR. In the event of a vacancy in any Board by reason of death, resignation or other cause, the Executive Committee shall elect a member to fill the unexpired term, AND UPON THE COMPLETION OF THIS TERM THIS PERSON SHALL BE ELIGIBLE FOR ELECTION IN HIS OWN RIGHT FOR HIS OWN TERM UPON THE BOARD."

This was carried by a canonical majority.

The tellers reported on the fourth ballot for lay deputies to the General Convention. The Chair declared Mr. Reed I. West elected.

There followed discussion of the choice of alternate deputies. In reply to a question, the Chair said that the four clergymen receiving the next highest number of votes in order were: The Rev. George F. Tittmann, the Rev. W. Leigh Ribble, D. D., the Rev. Francis W. Hayes, Jr., and the Rev. Reno S. Harp, Jr.

Dr. Robert Shaw moved reconsideration of the motion passed yesterday to keep all remaining names in nomination. This was seconded and passed.

It was moved that the nominations be wiped away and the four clergymen—Messrs. Tittman, Ribble, Hayes and Harp—be nominated and that nominations be closed. This was seconded and passed and the four clergymen were declared elected alternate deputies to the General Convention in the order named. The Secretary was directed to cast the ballot of the Council for these clerical alternates.

The Chair announced that the four laymen receiving the next highest number of votes for deputies to the General Convention were: Messrs. George R. Humrickhouse, Warren H. Turner, Jr., and a tie between Blake T. Newton, Sr., and Dr. John Garland Pollard, Jr. Mr. C. M. Davison, Jr., moved that all nominations be wiped away and that Messrs. Humrickhouse,

Turner, Newton and Pollard be nominated, that the tie between the latter two be determined in alphabetical order, and that nominations be closed and the Secretary be instructed to cast the ballot for these men as lay alternates. This was seconded and passed, and these men were declared elected in the order named.

Dr. Ribble resumed the report of the Committee on Canons. The Committee recommended that the substitute for Canon X be not adopted. The Committee's recommendation was sustained.

The Rev. Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., moved that this suggested canon be referred to the Executive Committee for study. This was seconded and passed.

The Committee recommended that the proposed amendment to Article III of the Constitution be not adopted. The recommendation of the Committee was seconded and carried after a show of hands.

The Chair introduced the Rev. J. J. Hamel, new rector of St. Andrew's Church, Arlington.

The report of the Committee on Nominations was made by the Rev. William B. Lee. After a parliamentary difficulty had been cleared up the Chair asked the Committee to clarify its report and bring it in later.

The Rev. Ward McCabe reported on the Albemarle Convocation's work toward radio programs within its area. It was suggested that this might be used as a pattern for the Diocese, and Mr. McCabe further suggested the possibility of a commission on radio and television for evangelism.

Council adjourned for lunch.

The Rev. William B. Lee gave the report of the Committee on Nominations. The Committee recommended the nomination of the Rev. Herbert A. Donovan as a Trustee of Stuart Hall. Mr. Donovan was nominated.

The Committee nominated to represent the Diocese on the Virginia Council of Churches the present incumbents, and they were elected as follows: The Rev. Robert S. Seiler, the Rev. J. P. H. Mason, the Rev. Rufus J. Womble, the Rev. Thomas G. Faulkner, Jr., Mr. E. A. Prichard, Mr. Walker Florance, and

Mr. Stuart Gilchrist. (Mr. Gilchrist had not been able to serve previously, due to illness, and he later asked that his name be not included this year.)

Mr. J. Chisman Hanes reported for the Committee on Resolutions.

The Committee recommended adoption of the following resolution, which carried:

(The resolution as finally edited is printed here. See reference in Council action just below resolution.)

 $\it Whereas$, the Roslyn Estate is administered by trustees under the will of Annie Rose Walker;

Whereas, the Diocese of Virginia, in cooperation with the said trustees and in accordance with the purpose stated by Miss Walker in her will, has established and now maintains a Diocesan Center on the Roslyn Estate;

Whereas, the Richmond Strategy Committee, after careful study and consideration, has recommended the establishment of a church in the vicinity of the Roslyn property;

Whereas, the Richmond Convocation and the Richmond Parish Council have each expressed an opinion that the establishment of a Parish Church located on the Roslyn property is in furtherance of the development of the Diocesan Center and of the needs of the Diocese of Virginia;

Whereas, the Richmond Convocation has approved of the location of All Saints Protestant Episcopal Church upon the Roslyn property;

Whereas, the Richmond Parish Council has gone on record as interposing no objection to the use by one congregation of a portion of the Roslyn Estate as the location for its church:

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the Diocesan Council does endorse the location of All Saints Protestant Episcopal Church upon an undeveloped wooded portion of the Roslyn property located near the western edge thereof.

The Chair noted that the opening clause in the resolution about All Saints congregation's proposed move to Roslyn contained statements which should be made more precise. He asked unanimous consent to have this portion of the resolution edited, the Secretary to be authorized to consult the Roslyn Trustees, or their president, in this matter. This consent was granted.

The Committee moved adoption of the following, which carried:

Whereas, the basic function of the Church is the spreading of the Gospel of Christ Jesus to the uttermost parts of the world; and

Whereas, the Overseas Department of the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church, which supervises the exercise of that function for our Church in the overseas field, is the only department of our National Council without a corresponding department in the respective dioceses; now, therefore,

Be it Resolved, That the Diocese of Virginia request its Department of Missions to establish a division on overseas missions or to take other appropriate action to foster continuously within the Diocese knowledge and support of the overseas missionary work of our Church; and

Be it Further Resolved, That the delegates of this Diocese to the General Convention of 1955 be requested to offer a resolution recommending that each Diocese and Missionary District of the Church establish a division or take other appropriate action to foster continuously the knowledge and support of the overseas missionary work of the Church.

The Committee moved adoption of the following resolution, which carried:

Resolved, That Sunday, October 16, 1955, be and hereby is designated by the Diocese of Virginia to honor the martyrdom of Bishops Nicholas Ridley and Hugh Latimer and other great martyrs of the English Reformation who four centuries ago suffered the pains of death for their faith and ours;

Further Be it Resolved, That the Deputies of the Diocese of Virginia be requested to urge upon the General Convention of 1955 the adoption of a resolution so designating October 16, 1955, as a day upon which the whole Church honors said martyrs.

The Committee moved that the resolution offered by the Rev. Ward McCabe, relative to suggested revision of the Prayer Book, be not adopted. After considerable discussion, the recommendation of the Committee was carried by a vote of 96 to 58.

The Committee moved that the resolution offered by Dr. Zabriskie, concerning representation for theological seminary faculty members in the General Convention, be not adopted. This motion carried.

The Committee moved that the resolution offered by Mr. Braxton H. Tabb, Jr., with reference to the fixing of meeting place for the General Convention, be not adopted, since the Standing Committee had already made public its protest. The Rev. Mr. Leavell spoke against the Committee's recommendation. Dr. Ivey Lewis did likewise, saying the Standing

Committee would appreciate the backing of the Council. Mr. John B. Welsh asked that the Standing Committee be backed in its stand.

The Committee's motion was lost by a vote of 48 for and 127 against.

The Rev. Treadwell Davison moved the original resolution. Mr. E. N. Montague said the language of the resolution as circulated can be construed as a rebuke to the Presiding Bishop and laid upon Council consideration of this. Dr. Ivey Lewis said the Standing Committee did not have this resolution as such nor take action thereupon. Dr. Cleaveland said the article in the Constitution of General Convention was not put there to give the Presiding Bishop authority to change the place of meeting for such reasons, as he did make that change. Mr. Tabb pointed out that the General Convention could not put his proposal into effect until after 1958, at which time there would be a new Presiding Bishop.

Mr. George Humrickhouse offered a substitute resolution. The Rev. Rufus Womble moved that the substitute be tabled. This motion passed.

Mr. Womble moved that the original resolution be tabled. This motion passed.

For the Committee on Resolutions, Mr. Hanes moved adoption of the following, which carried:

Whereas, this Council of the Diocese of Virginia has learned with regret of the illness of the Rev. B. B. Comer Lile, Rector of Christ Church, Alexandria; and

Whereas, Mr. Lile is held in deep affection and esteem for his devoted service to this Diocese;

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That this Council expresses its deep regret at his absence from Council and assures him of its continued prayers for his speedy recovery, and that the Secretary of the Council be instructed to transmit a copy of this resolution to him.

The Committee moved adoption of the following, which carried:

Whereas, the Rev. Robert R. Brown, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Richmond, has accepted his election as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Arkansas; and

Whereas, he has made an exceptional contribution to the life of the Diocese of Virginia during his ministry in this Diocese;

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That this Diocesan Council hereby expresses its affectionate godspeed to the Rev. Mr. Brown as he enters the higher service into which God has called him.

The Committee moved adoption of the following, which carried:

Whereas, the Rt. Rev. Harry Lee Doll has recently been consecrated Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Maryland; and

Whereas, this Council recalls his fruitful service as Rector of Christ Church, Alexandria, and his contributions to the work of the Diocese;

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the prayerful good wishes of this Council be extended to Bishop Doll upon his entrance into the Episcopate, and that the Secretary of the Council be instructed to transmit a copy of this resolution to him.

The Committee moved that the Secretary be instructed to advise Bishop Tucker of our regrets at his absence and our best wishes for his rapid recovery. This motion carried.

Mr. Braxton H. Tabb, Jr., presented a resolution regarding use of foreign languages in the Book of Common Prayer. The Rev. O. V. T. Chamberlain suggested that not enough work or study had been put on the resolution and that it should be defeated.

Dr. Robert Shaw moved that the resolution be laid on the table. This motion passed.

Mr. C. M. Davison, Jr., moved that the Council express its appreciation to the Rector, men and women and pages of Christ Church, the hosts and hostesses of other congregations, the choir of St. Anne's School, and the women of the Methodist Church, for their part in making this annual session enjoyable and successful; and that the Secretary convey this to the Rev. Mr. Donovan. This motion carried.

The Secretary moved the following resolution, offered by the Executive Committee, and it was adopted:

We record with sorrow the death, on October 9, 1954, of James Pleasants Massie, Senior Warden of Grace and Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, and valuable member of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

Mr. Massic was a member of the Diocesan Committee on Finance, and a member of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Missionary Society

and its Sub-Committee on Applications and Appropriations. He gave earnest and untiring leadership as Chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee for the reorganization of the administrative work of the Diocese. Under the new administrative plan he was a member of the Board of the Department of Missions and of its Committee on Applications. He was a Deputy to the Provincial Synod.

His counsel and devotion were esteemed by all with whom he served.

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, That this Council record its deep sense of loss in the passing of James Pleasants Massie and its great appreciation for his devoted and loyal service to the Diocese.

Bishop Goodwin told the Council that means had been provided so that Bishop Mason might attend the General Convention in Honolulu; and Bishop Gibson announced that Presiding Bishop Sherrill had said that similar provision had been made for Bishop Tucker to attend if he is able to do so.

The Chair called for consideration of the proposed substitute for the amended resolution of the Department of Christian Social Relations as the order of business.

The Rev. Ward McCabe asked that the substitute resolution be rejected. Col. Robert Fletcher sought to introduce another procedure, but this was ruled not in order at this time. The Rev. Rufus Womble said that both the substitute and the amended resolution were dodging the real issue—willingness to meet our brothers in Christ.

Dr. Brydon spoke concerning the actions of individuals and in favor of the substitute. The Rev. Mr. Lincoln suggested that we might defeat both the proposed substitute and the amended resolution and distribute copies of the report of the Interracial Commission throughout the Diocese.

Mr. John Welsh asked several questions of the Chancellor of the Diocese, Mr. Archibald Robertson.

The Rev. Mr. Lee suggested that debate be limited to two minutes for each speaker.

The Rev. Mr. Hayes moved that the substitute be laid on the table. This was seconded and passed.

Mr. Edmund Campbell moved that the previous question now be put. It was voted to put the previous question by a show of hands—100 to 74.

As one of five, Mr. Turner Arrington asked that the vote on the amended resolution of the Department of Christian Social Relations be taken by orders by standing vote. Dr. Robert Shaw raised the point of order that all votes by orders are by ballot. The Chair sustained his point of order, and the vote of the clerical and lay orders was taken by ballot.

Mr. Henry Fowler gave the report of the Committee on Invested Funds by title. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. H. A. Donovan gave the report of the Standing Committee by title. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. Dr. W. L. Ribble gave the report of the Examining Chaplains by title. (See Appendix.)

The report of the Virginia Theological Seminary was presented by title. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. Campbell Tucker presented the report of Shrine Mont by title. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. Thomas Faulkner gave the report on the Virginia Council of Churches by title, but urged the delegates to read especially the last paragraph. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. G. MacLaren Brydon gave his report as Registrar and Historiographer by title. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. D. C. Loving gave the report of the Blue Ridge School by title. (See Appendix.)

The report of Stuart Hall was given by title. (See Appendix.)

The report of the Protestant Episcopal Church Home was given by title. (See Appendix.)

Bishop Goodwin nominated the following as Examining Chaplains: The Rev. Messrs. W. Leigh Ribble, D. D., Leon N. Laylor, Richard C. Fell, Allen J. Green, and John Page Williams; and as Academic Examining Chaplains—the Rev. Messrs. Robert E. Cox and William A. Clebsch. It was moved that these nominations be accepted and that the men be elected. This was seconded and passed.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the question of the meeting place for the next Council be referred to the Executive Committee.

The Rev. Dr. Cary Montague presented by title the report of the Religious Work Foundation.

The tellers reported on the ballot on the amended resolution of the Department of Christian Social Relations. This showed: Clergy, 59 for and 24 against; Lay, 54 for and 48 against. The amended resolution of the Department of Christian Social Relations was carried as follows:

"Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the Council of the Diocese of Virginia here assembled believes that it is the principle of the Christian ethic for the people of the Diocese, that they make every effort, in Christian love, to eliminate all barriers preventing the free fellowship in the Church's life of people of different races."

Mr. Albert Smoot moved that the report of the Interracial Commission be circulated to the parishes of the Diocese for further study. This was seconded and passed.

Bishop Goodwin said that he wished to express a special word of appreciation to the tellers for their very real labor during this Convention.

After the singing of Blest Be the Tie that Binds and the blessing by the Bishop, Bishop Goodwin announced the 160th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia adjourned *sine die*.

III. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(a) Report of the Department of Missions

In closing his report for the Department of Missions last year, Bishop Gibson said: "We must grow—not to be large but because the world needs our treasures. We must grow in Virginia and America, because only a much stronger, larger, witnessing body can go forth with power to the world at large. We must grow because we believe that we are the body of Christ and our Lord wills that all mankind should be drawn unto Himself and be saved." These words sum up the aim and purpose of the Department of Missions.

In carrying out these aims and purposes the Department works, through a Board, on sub-committees on Mountain Work, Negro Work, Town and Country Work, Strategy in the Potomac Convocation, Strategy in the Richmond Convocation, Evangelism, Armed Forces, College Work, Church Unity, and Applications. A total of seventy-seven persons donate their time to the Board and its sub-committees. It is estimated that they gave approximately two hundred and fifty man days during the past year. They, especially the lay members, deserve the appreciation of the Diocese.

In the budget for our Department the first item is always the item for the General Church Program. We believe that it should always be first as a reminder that the Church is world-wide in its mission and that it is our responsibility as Christians to preach the Gospel to all people.

NEW LAND AND BUILDINGS

One of the Department's major activities during the past year has been in carrying on the work that was given a great boost by the Bishops' Building Fund and is still being helped by the Church Extension Fund. During the past year the Diocese purchased in Fairfax County sites for St. Patrick's Mission, near Falls Church, and for a new mission at Springfield, and assisted in the purchase of a site for St. Mark's Church, Groveton. Since the last Convention the following buildings have been completed with the aid of Diocesan funds:

The parish house at Highland Springs.
Sunday School rooms for the Church of the Prince of Peace, Richmond.
Parish house at Lancaster.

Parish house at Grace Church, Miller's Tavern.

St. Asaph's Church and Parish House in Bowling Green.

A rectory at Mineral.

A parish house at Delaplane.

A rectory at Markham.

St. Paul's Church and parish house at Bailey's Cross Roads.

A substantial addition to the parish house at St. Matthew's, Richmond.

The parish house at Wicomico Church in Northumberland County.

It is to be noted that seven of these are in rural areas and four in suburban. In actual dollars, however, the grants from the Diocese for suburban buildings was twice what it was for the rural buildings.

CLERGY SALARY SUPPLEMENTS

The largest item in the Department's working budget for Diocesan activities is for subsidizing missions and aided parishes to assist them in paying their ministers. The Department feels that a subsidy at times is a necessity, especially in getting a new work started, and in some cases may always be required. On the other hand, a continued subsidy where it is not needed we believe is harmful. Therefore, each subsidy is carefully reviewed each year. Several years ago the policy was adopted of reducing the subsidy by at least 10% per year except for those congregations that can show reasons why they cannot absorb the reduction. The response to this policy on the part of the aided parishes and missions has on the whole been very encouraging. Many of them have become self-supporting ahead of schedule.

The Department has also been interested in adequate salaries and automobile travel allowances for clergy. We would like to see each priest paid at least \$3,600 per year in addition to his rectory. If it is necessary for him to travel to perform his parochial responsibilities, we believe that such travel should be paid for by the congregation.

MOUNTAIN WORK

For many years our Church's work among the people of the Blue Ridge Mountains has been of great interest to the whole Diocese. Like all other things, life in the mountains has changed. To meet these changed conditions among the mountain people, the Rev. Albert N. Jones was appointed in the fall of 1953 to the position of Administrator of Mountain Missions. One of his chief aims has been to provide for the mountain missions regular services and administration of the sacraments. To do this has meant the securing of more clergy. This has been difficult but progress is being made. The presence of more clergy will mean a greater emphasis on the Church as Church, and we hope it will be the means of the mountain people finding that the Church is their spiritual home not only when they are in the mountains but when they leave, as many of them do, for other parts of the country.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

NEGRO WORK

The Committee on Negro Work has been considering the question of how to advance the Church's work among the more than 200,000 Negroes in the Diocese of Virginia. With a few exceptions, the Negro Episcopalians in this Diocese are members of congregations composed of all Negro members. At present there is one self-supporting Negro congregation and nine missions. One small mission is served by a white priest. The others are served by Negro clergy. The Committee has made a constructive study of our work in this field. Their findings are now being carefully studied by the Department. By next year we hope to give you a report of definite progress in this important area.

TOWN AND COUNTRY

With the population of our Diocese growing with such rapidity in the Potomac Convocation as to create a population emergency area, something would have been dreadfully amiss if the Department of Missions had not been deeply concerned and given a great deal of its time to the meeting of the spiritual needs of the thousands of new people, mostly young people, coming into this area. At the same time we would have been amiss if we had neglected the town and country work that for years has been so significant a part of our whole Diocese. The Committee on Town and Country Work has played an important part in our activities. With their approval a new mission is to begin in Prince William County in June. During the winter they held a successful conference for rural clergy at Roslyn. They have now arranged for several clergy to attend a Supervisors' Conference on Town and Country Work, and for seven seminary students and one training school girl to attend the Town and Country Training Conference at Claggett Center, Maryland.

College Work

We have a clergyman who is coming soon to be our chaplain at the University of Virginia. At the Mary Washington College, Fredericksburg, the securing of a woman worker has been postponed until a college center building can be erected. It now looks as if Trinity Church, Fredericksburg, will move to the college community and provision will be made in its new building for college center activities. Closely connected with the college work is the opportunity to secure a chaplain at the University of Virginia Hospital. This has been made possible through an anonymous gift that will take care of all the expenses involved for a period of two years. The hospital officials, the Ministers' Association of Charlottesville, and the Interdenominational Religious Work Foundation are all cooperating in this enterprise. As long as Episcopal money is supporting this chaplaincy the plan is to have an Episcopal minister as chaplain.

(b) Report of Department of Christian Stewardship

The Department of Christian Stewardship is pleased to present its report and believes you will find it encouraging. The year ending with this Council appears to have been a successful one.

More money has been raised for the Diocese, and the Department has assisted in raising more money for the individual parsihes of the Diocese than has ever been the case before. At the same time plans and arrangements have been put into effect which are expected to produce more efficiency and certain economies in the operation of Diocesan headquarters.

As regards *The Virginia Churchman*, changes are under way in both the editorial and business policies, which are expected to make it a really outstanding monthly magazine.

You will want certain details on each of these phases, and I will give them as factually as possible.

PROMOTION

During the past year your Department of Stewardship was organized into four sub-committees. The first was the Promotion Committee under the able chairmanship of the Rev. B. B. Comer Lile. The principal items handled by the Committee have been the Every Member Canvass and promotion of the Builders for Christ Campaign.

THE VIRGINIA PLAN

Last year at this Convention the Department of Stewardship presented for your consideration a Plan to change the manner of promoting the Every Member Canvass in the Diocese. The existing method was in effect a copy of the accepted American money-raising techniques for secular activities. The suggested method was in effect a return to the Biblical idea of proportionate giving. The plan was termed "The Virginia Plan for Proportionate Giving."

It was hoped that this new concept of conducting the Every Member Canvass would accomplish three things: (1) provide a spiritual benefit to the Every Member Canvass; (2) raise additional income for the individual parishes and the Church as a whole; (3) eliminate certain inequities which had arisen in the old campaign system.

The results were extremely rewarding. Based on reports from the fifty-four churches which have given us details of their canvass, it appears that the parishes which used the plan enjoyed better than usual success. One church raised 162% more money than the previous year; one 90% more; another 78% more. Fifteen churches did 25% better. Twenty-one increased 20% more. Forty-one did between 10% and 20% better. The overall results were an increase of 16%.

If the parishes fared well, how did the Diocese do? Better than ever. For instance, on January 1, 1954, the Reserve for Future Needs item, which in effect is the surplus at the end of the year, was \$14,852.16. The same Reserve for Future Needs as of January 1, 1955, was \$28,180.31. This was more than a sufficient amount and made it possible for the Executive Council of the Diocese to use some of the excess to take advantage of important opportunities. We will refer to some of these opportunities in other sections of the report from this Department.

Another reflection of the success of the Virginia Plan is in the number of churches which overpaid their 1954 quotas. Thirty-one parishes overpaid their quotas. In addition to this, thirty-three churches at the conclusion of the Every Member Canvass went back and paid \$11,931.55 on old BBF quotas. Having done this, thirty-two churches undertook additional amounts to the \$50,000 Church Extension "Below the Line" item, overpaying their mathematical apportionments by \$4,176. One of the interesting facts in this picture is that in all but one or two cases, these thirty-one, thirty-two and thirty-three churches were those which promoted the Virginia Plan most enthusiastically.

Perhaps you would like to hear something about the movie, "Make Us Duly Thankful." The movie cost \$4,000 to make, plus \$600 for the fifteen prints purchased by the Diocese for loan to individual parishes. The Rev. B. B. Comer Lile was Chairman of the committee of five elergymen who produced the film.

In addition to the fine manner in which it was received in this Diocese, it has been widely acclaimed throughout the country. The Dioceses of Washington, Maryland and Pennsylvania have been given permission to use it. although they are replacing the beginning with their own opening, and showing their Bishops instead of ours toward the end. The National Council sent a bulletin to each Diocese informing them of the Virginia movie and recommending the purchase of a copy. Twenty-one did, and it was made available to them at cost.

This Department, with the blessing of the Executive Council, is proceeding for next year's Every Member Canvass on the basis of continuing the promotion of The Virginia Plan for Proportionate Giving. For something slightly new, emphasis this year will be put on Church Extension work in our own Diocese. Use of the movie, "Make Us Duly Thankful," will be recommended again. We believe it has lasting appeal and that every communicant of the Diocese will appreciate seeing it another time. In addition, a new movie is being made as a companion piece and will give a concrete example of how the Church uses any increased offering for the advancement of the Kingdom of God in our own area. The movie will feature Church Extension work and the Rev. Mr. George Tittmann is chairman of the committee in charge of its production. The committee is essentially the same

which produced last year's film and consists of the Rev. Messrs. O. V. T. Chamberlain, Holt Jenkins, Frank Hayes, Edward P. Bush, Allen Miller, and Comer Lile.

This fall the Diocese intends to hold again a meeting in every Convocation in the month of September to show the new movie, display all promotion material available for the canvass and to give final suggestions on effective ways for their use. It is hoped every parish will be well represented with its Rector, its officers and vestrymen and key Every Member Canvass officials.

BUILDERS FOR CHRIST

The Builders for Christ Campaign has been a major concern of this Department for the last four months. No doubt everyone here is thoroughly familiar with it by this time and knows that the Whitsunday offering is being set aside in most parishes for purposes of this effort of the National Council to raise \$4,150,000. As one of the lay members of the Board of Christian Stewardship, I would like to express our unanimous feeling on the subject. We have seen the beneficial results of Church Extension work in this Diocese. Our witness for Christ is growing rapidly and the size of our Church is greatly increasing. The Builders for Christ Campaign is to produce money to accomplish the same purposes on a national and international level. In this time and age we surely want our national Church to forge ahead and succeed in this effort. Frankly, if it has any failing it is that it's too small.

This Department sincerely hopes that every parish will be proud to exceed its mathematical quota by sizeable proportions. The aim should be to double it.

All dioceses of the Episcopal Church except a few have now completed their campaign and all have done exceedingly well. National Council is close to its goal. The mathematical quota of this Diocese is \$68,000.

If we succeed in this campaign there will be a glorious feeling in the Diocese. If we fail it will be a calamity to the Diocese.

You will hear more on this subject tonight and so we will not dwell on it further.

The Committee of this Department in charge of publicity, public relationships and *The Virginia Churchman* is under the chairmanship of Mr. John Paul Causey, of West Point, and I will call on him to outline what has been accomplished by this Committee.

THE VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN

During the past year an intensive study of *The Virginia Churchman* has been made by a sub-committee of this Board. Resulting from this have been certain recommendations to the Board concerning the format, content and operation of this publication. One of these recommendations has already

been carried out, a "Bishops' Page" in each issue. Others are being worked on. The basis of the sub-committee's thinking is that The Virginia Churchman should be a news magazine bringing to the people of this Diocese word of what the Church is doing—locally, within the Diocese, nationally and abroad. Circulation must be primarily the result of interest. What we will endeavor to do is to print a magazine that people will want. We feel that Stewardship is the proper Department to publish the magazine, bearing in mind that it must report and reflect all the work of the Diocese. The people in the Diocese can help by reading the magazine, letting us have their criticisms and suggestions, and, if they think favorably of it, urging their friends and neighbors in the Church to read it.

OPERATING EFFICIENCY

You will recall that two years ago the Diocese was reorganized as a result of the report of the Ad Hoc Committee. The first year of the reorganization was a trial year, but it was made permanent by the Council last year. Under the new organization, the Department of Stewardship was charged with the overall management of Diocesan business affairs and the organization of Diocesan headquarters. Therefore, last summer the Department appointed a sub-committee on Efficiency, with the Rev. Robert R. Brown, chairman and General Edwin Conquest assistant. They picked up where the Ad Hoc Committee left off and at a cost of \$750 procured the services of a professional efficiency expert for the purposes of making a study of the organization of Diocesan headquarters in Richmond. The aim was to achieve the same degree of efficiency and economy of operation that a high-class business would experience. Obviously all of the ideas of this professional have not and will not be adopted. But many appear to be extremely beneficial and this Department is putting them into effect as conditions permit. The major changes which already have resulted are:

(1) The creating of a sort of chief of staff to coordinate the activities of the four departments and eliminate overlapping. This is to be handled by Archdeacon Chilton in addition to his duties as Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions; (2) the employment of an Executive Secretary for the Department of Christian Stewardship. This was accomplished in April and I am happy to introduce to you at this time Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer, a layman and member of All Saints Church, Richmond, who has accepted the position.

(3) The lowering of the retirement age for lay workers of the Diocese from 68 to 65. This brings the Diocese into line with accepted business practices and it is believed will promote efficiency. In lowering the age it was necessary to pay \$5,681.11 additional premium on the annuities for these workers so that at the earlier retirement they will receive the same income as formerly promised. The money for this premium was taken from the surplus of last year's operation.

The Department of Stewardship hopes you approve of these activities in the organizational field. From time to time additional measures may be adopted, but always the aim will be the same—to see that every dollar given to the Diocese shall in turn produce the maximum results for the Lord's work through an efficient and economical headquarters.

CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDS

As watchdogs of the treasury, the Stewardship Department handles Church Extension funds. During the year it has allocated to the Department of Missions \$113,820.00 for Church Extension work in the Diocese. This money was to be divided among ten parishes. In this connection it should be reported to you that in April the last Church Extension money available or anticipated was allocated. This means that we have come to the end of the Church Extension program unless sizable money is given to the Church Extension fund as a result of the next Every Member Canvass. All of the Bishops' Building Fund money, all of the additional funds which the Bishops had available for this use, and all of the money given last year in the so-called "below the line" \$50,000 Church Extension item has been allocated. Further, the expected income to the Church Extension Fund this year through the "below the line" item has been earmarked. Therefore, it can be seen that the rather spectacular growth of the Diocese of Virginia during the last three years may either slow down materially or cease altogether unless the interest and generosity of the parishes toward the Church Extension Fund greatly increases.

Experience has shown that it takes approximately \$40,000 of Diocesan money to get a new church started. On the basis that the Diocese might like to continue its expansion program at least to the extent of two new churches per year for the years immediately ahead, the Department and the Executive Committee are recommending an increase in the Church Extension Fund item of the budget. You will hear more of this when the budget for 1956 is presented.

For your information the total amount given last year toward the Church Extension item of \$50,000 was \$31,325.62. This came from seventy-two churches. It is hoped that this phase of the Diocesan program can now be broadened, with all churches participating and most producing a reasonable share of the budgeted amount.

Shortly you will have the budget for next year presented by Mr. Ayers, who has been Chairman of our Sub-committee in charge of this work,

Let me conclude the report of the Department of Christian Stewardship with this statement: The Board of the Department is made up of seven laymen and five clergymen, twelve in all. It meets monthly in Richmond for a full-day meeting. On one occasion it was a two-day meeting, with the Board spending the night at Roslyn. The wonderful thing about this Board is

that it includes many extremely busy men and yet there has never failed to be a quorum. At several meetings all twelve were present and seldom were there less than nine or ten. This dedication has made our work both enjoyable and, I believe, reasonably fruitful. I would like to mention by name the men who have served so faithfully on the Board. They are: the Rev. Messrs. Donovan, Lile, Robert Brown, Hoy, and Carnan; Messrs. John Causey, James Ayers, Edwin Conquest, Blake Newton, Jr., Al Nemir and Percy Warren. Due to rotation, four of these twelve must be replaced next month, and due to transfers in locations, two others are departing and must be replaced. It is our hope that these six positions will be filled by able men. But the important thing is that whoever accepts one of the vacant positions understand the importance of attending every meeting except in an emergency. There are few more important ways in which a person can serve his Church.

The budget for 1956 will be presented shortly by Mr. Ayers and there will be two resolutions presented by this Department in connection with it. In concluding this report of the Department of Christian Stewardship, the Department wishes to express its gratitude for the splendid cooperation of all the clergy and every layman on whom it has called for assistance during the past year. We believe there is among the men of this Diocese a deep appreciation of the responsibilities of Christian Stewardship.

COMMENT

Department of Missions.—The increase of \$9,680 in the 1955 working budget over the budget approved by Convention is to provide adequate travel allowance, and to give assistance to vacant parishes. This is made possible

by drawing on funds not used in 1954, when certain positions were not filled for lack of manpower. The proposed budget for 1956 provides for (1) an increase of \$10,000 in the appropriation to the general church, and (2) to provide for new missions.

Department of Christian Education.—The increase in the working budget over the budget approved by Convention reflects some increase in salaries and in the cost of an expanded schedule of summer conferences. The proposed budget for 1956 includes a small salary increase, an increase of \$950 for conducting conferences, and \$500 for the Diocesan Library, now under this Department.

Department of Christian Social Relations.—The increase reflects the employment of a full-time Executive Secretary beginning July 1, 1955; also, for 1956, an item of \$4,000 for the operating expenses of a Home for the Aged.

Department of Christian Stewardship.—The working budget for 1955 includes \$5,250 for the salary of the Executive Secretary for eight months. The budget for 1956 includes the year's salary of \$7,000.

(c) Report of Department of Christian Education

The year just past has been a momentous one for your Department of Christian Education, what with the publication this spring of the first courses in the "New Curriculum." Partly on this account it has also been a busy year.

As our new organization shifted into gear under the revised Canons, we have found it helpful to set aside a time during which departmental "Busyness" was deliberately ignored in favor of prayerful discussion of aspects of the question: "What is our vocation as the Diocesan Department of Chris-

tian Education?" And so, at the outset of this report we should like to discuss some of our thinking in this regard.

First, Christian education takes place primarily not in organized Sunday Schools, Adult Study Programs, Junior Auxiliaries, Junior Brotherhoods, Summer Conferences and the like, but rather in the daily lives of people under God. Since the characteristic quality of the lives of people, children and adults alike, is largely determined by the kind of living that goes on in their homes, it must be the primary overriding purpose of any Christian education program to focus its impact on the home life of church people. Christian education, then, is a specialized work of evangelism whose witness is primarily to people already standing in some relationship to the Body of Christ.

Second, just as the quality of family life is a primary determinant in the life of each family member, so also is the quality of parish life greatly influential in the life of each parish member. Accordingly, Christian education is inevitably concerned with the *quality* of every aspect of the corporate life of the parish.

Third, by God's help a Diocesan Department can assist parishes and families by counsel, resource and program to appropriate in their lives an enriched awareness of their Christian vocation. Thus it is the responsibility of the Diocesan Department to test every aspect of its program in this crucible: "Does this activity give reasonable promise of relating Christian insights to the needs and experiences of our parishes and families?" You may correctly assume that we have applied this test to each of the activities hereinafter summarized and that in our humble judgment the answer in every case is at least a qualified "Yes,"

The Division of Worship, composed of the Liturgics Commission and the Music Commission, has really begun to function this year. The Liturgics Commission has studied the proposed Service of Holy Communion, and has made recommendations to the National Commission through our Diocesan representative. It is also engaged in drawing up proposed Mite Fox Presentation Services, and is considering a Liturgical Manual for use by the clergy. The Music Commission is conducting Diocese-wide Music Conferences for organists and choir directors, and is planning, for the first time in many years, a Diocese-wide Choir Festival. It is also engaged in a compilation of music resources following the suggestions for our National Music Commission, and is building up in our Diocesan office a library of records and tape recordings of chanting and hymn singing within the horizon of parish choirs and congregations.

The Youth Division.—At the fall Leadership Conference held at Roslyn the young people of the Diocese ratified their new constitution, and thus are now known officially as the House of Young Churchmen. At this significant meeting, the young people elected as their advisors the Rev. Webster Simons, of Scottsville, and Mr. Clarence Doane, of Richmond. Mr. Doane is the first layman to hold this position in the Diocese. The young people also requested that the program of Diocesan Youth Rallies be continued. Therefore,

^{*}Note.—That part of this budget for 1956 (Part A) amounting to \$88.045.00 constitutes Diocean Expense Assessment. This amount, less \$6.00.88 as shown above, which is provided from these other sources, makes a total of \$81.444.12 to be raised by assessment.

Rallies during this year have been held on a Convocational basis, with one Diocese-wide meeting at Fredericksburg. These Rallies have been of great aid in stimulating youth groups in small parishes, and have also supplemented individual youth group programs.

The Adult Division.—During the year the Adult Division undertook the task of introducing the "New Curriculum" to the Diocese. Twelve teams were organized and ten area meetings were held. The new curriculum—the history of its development, the philosophy that underlies that development, the theology supporting the prerequisites for effective use of the materials were presented to superintendents and teachers in grades 1, 4 and 7, and others concerned for the task of Christian Education. Members of the Division are also assisting as resource people in Teacher Training programs in individual churches, and will continue to be available for this kind of help.

As a follow-up to the above-mentioned area meetings, the Department sponsored a visit from one of the National Council's Leader Training teams. Five Convocational meetings were held, in which 90% of the clergy and approximately 2,200 lay people took part. These meetings were intended to undergird the teacher training program in individual parishes.

The Episcopal Book Store.—It is increasingly evident that the Department of Christian Education cannot function adequately without having resource books readily available for display in churches and at conferences. It is also abundantly clear that the best Christian books must be available on sale for quick delivery to any Virginia Episcopalian. With this in mind we have operated for two years the Episcopal Book Store at the Diocesan offices in Richmond. The Book Store has grown in usefulness during the past year, and we are happy to report that it is being called upon increasingly to supply the needs of our people. Book displays have been sent to conferences requesting them, a service the store stands ready to render at any time. Financially the Book Store is in better shape than last year, and the business is growing.

The Diocesan Library.—The Council of the Diocese of Virginia that dealt with the reorganization assigned our Department responsibility for the supervision and maintenance of the Diocesan Library. This year we have appointed the Rev. George Cleaveland to be our Diocesan Librarian, with instructions to begin cataloging the books now on hand as soon as practicable, and provisions for materials necessary to get on with this work have been made in our budget. The Life Insurance Company of Virginia has generously donated seventeen metal book shelves, adequate space is now being arranged in the Mayo House, and we expect cataloging to begin soon.

Report of the Roslyn Advisory Committee.—We note with gratitude the increasingly heavy use by Episcopalians of the Virginia Diocesan Center. However, it is quite evident that churches and church organizations in the

Diocese of Virginia could be utilizing Roslyn to a much greater extent than they now do. During the coming year it is out plan to study in detail present uses and possible uses of Roslyn by Virginia Episcopalians.

During the year past we consulted the Diocesan Interracial Commission with regard to the advisability of requesting the Roslyn Memorial Trustees to review and revise their policy under which racially integrated overnight conference privileges are extended to all groups except youth groups. The Interracial Commission in reply concurred in the proposal to make this request of the Memorial Trustees and advised your Department that, should favorable action be taken by the Memorial Trustees, the Department should proceed with patience and caution to conduct such conferences. It is the policy of your Department to conduct racially integrated conferences only after it has been first fully advertised to all prospective participants in each case that the conference would be conducted on this basis (e. g., this summer's Family and Senior Conferences at Shrine Mont).

It is our understanding that the Memorial Trustees are presently reviewing our recommendation.

Major Concerns of the Board During the Past Year.—Concentrated effort was made this past year to prepare the ground for the advent of the Seabury Series of the National Church, chiefly in line with the four "prerequisites," as follows:

1. The encouragement of a core of people in each parish concerned about being the Church. Toward the accomplishment of this we conducted a large number of Parish Life Conferences (Intensive Week-ends), from which it is our hope that groups returned to many parishes with a new concern for the redemptive task of their church.

2. Religious and educational instruction of teachers in Grades 1, 4 and 7. The Area Meetings conducted by our teams were the beginning stage in teacher preparation for the use of the new materials. The conducting of the Teacher's Workshops with members of your Department as resource people is the stage we are involved in right now.

3 and 4. Family Worship Services in the Church on Sunday, and weekly classes for parents and god-parents. We have encouraged our congregations to develop plans to conduct such services and classes, and we are available to assist in an advisory capacity any church calling on us for help.

A second major concern of the Board this past year has been a thorough reorganization of our summer conference program for the youth of our Diocese. This has dealt with both the administrative and program sides of our conference program at Shrine Mont and Roslyn. (Further report will be made on this in the section dealing with our future projects.)

With the increased use of our Youth Manual, "PLEASE TAKE ME BACK," and such other publications as "A RICHMOND TOUR FOR YOUNG CHURCHMEN," we hope to be useful in assisting parishes to enrich their youth programs as important aspects of their total Christian Education work.

Report on Future Projects.—In addition to their regular work, our Divisions will have the following projects under way:

The Children's Division has under preparation a Manual intended to help the program needs for non-Sunday School organizations of our pre-teenage youngsters, such as Girls' Friendly, Acolytes, Junior Brotherhood and Junior Auxiliary groups.

The Youth Division is concerned about the relationship of the Church to the every-day problems of our "normal" teen-agers, especially those problems dealing with ethical and moral standards.

Plans are also under way, and changes are being made this summer to enhance the religious significance of the Conference program at both Roslyn and Shrine Mont. A real counselling staff of adults is being engaged, so that actual counselling of the youngsters in small groups may take place, and in order that room prayers and similar worship activities may be planned for our children. As a by-product we expect to achieve better life-guard staffing for the pool, more intelligent handling of problems of discipline, and improved overall conference planning. In keeping with this expanding program, we are seeking a youth director for the summers to be liaison between the Department, the Memorial Trustees of Roslyn, the staff and the youngsters. We would share the activities of this person with one of the Church Schools of the Diocese.

The Adult Division is planning a series of reunion meetings of Parish Life Conference graduates. It also hopes to provide increased assistance in teachers' workshops, to provide resource people for adult Bible study programs, and to assist such programs in any of our churches.

The Worship Division is going to resume work on the Confirmation Manual that was first conceived in 1952, as well as to prepare suggested services for Convocational Lenten Mite Box ingatherings.

Finally, we hope to set up a small Bookmobile that may bring good Christian books to small parish meetings as well as to larger conferences throughout the Diocese. It is also planned that our Episcopal Book Store will have the book display at the Washington Provincial Conference at Hood College this year.

Thus, we of the Department of Christian Education, and those wonderful volunteers serving in our various Divisions, have by God's help endeavored to sharpen the necessary tools that may fulfill our primary objective. Christian education is the Church's outreach to children, young people and adults now, precisely where they are living now, that they may know the power of God now. The future is important, but Christianity is a living reality that pertains to the present or it ceases to be religion. In this we are trying to fulfill our part of the great purpose and nature of the Christian religion: That man from birth to death may know and feel the saving power of God through Jesus Christ through the fellowship of the Church.

(d) Report of the Department of Christian Social Relations

Christian Social Relations is the concern of the Church for the total welfare of all God's children: as individuals, in families, and in the community at large. Your Department has been working to show forth this concern in many areas in the past year.

Home For the Aged

At the Convention of the Diocese last year a resolution was passed which said in part: "Be it Resolved—that the Department (of Christian Social Relations) work directly towards the establishment of a church home in addition to the Protestant Episcopal Church Home." In response to this resolution, the Department created a committee on the aged under the chairmanship of Mr. Allen C. Adams. The committee submitted the following recommendations, which have been approved by the Department: (1) An additional home for the aged should be established in the Diocese of Virginia; (2) a statement of policy for such a home follows:

- A. Shelter care will be offered to single men, single women, and couples. B. Eligibility:
 - 1. Age: The minimum for entrance will be approximately 65 years.
 - 2. Religion: Preference will be given to Episcopalians.
 - 3. Residence: Preference will be given to residents of the Diocese.
 - 4. Health: Limited to available facilities of the home at time of application.
 - 5. Finances: Applicants will be considered in the light of the resources of the home to meet the need of the individuals regardless of whether they can pay the full cost of care.
- C. Essential Services: Spiritual, medical, nursing, social case work and rehabilitation, including recreation, will be planned.
- D. Extension of services will be planned for the aged outside of the home, especially to those on the waiting list and those in the neighborhood.
- (3) The board of trustees of the new home should be nominated by the Convention of the Diocese so as to assure adequate control of policy by the Diocese. (4) The most practical site for such a home is on the property now owned by the Board of Corporators of the Protestant Episcopal Church Home, 1621 Grove Avenue, Richmond. The property at 1621 Grove Avenue will be available during the first quarter of 1956, because the present Protestant Episcopal Church Home is building a new home on another site with the money left by Mrs. Lettie Pate Evans. Knowing of the availability of the property, the Committee had an independent appraisal made which stated that the present market value was \$60,000. Making an offer to the Board of Cor-

porators, they informed the Committee: "That, . . . we stand willing to grant an option good until June 15, 1955, to the Diocese of Virginia to purchase the property at 1621 Grove Avenue, for use as a home for the aged, when vacated by us, at the price of \$60,000. The terms which we propose are: \$20,000 cash, with a balance of \$40,000 to be secured by a deed of trust on the property payable at the rate of \$4,000 per year for ten years with interest on the unpaid balance at $4\frac{1}{2}\%$."

The Department believes that this chance to secure the property at 1621 Grove Avenue, Richmond, offers an unusual opportunity. Considering current construction costs for new homes for the aged in Virginia, it would cost four to five times this amount to build a new home. Funds needed under the 1956 budget would be \$20,000 for the down payment on the property and \$4,000 towards operation costs. The Department believes that if the Diocese would back this new church home during the formative stage, private gifts would soon come in to create an adequate endowment. We firmly believe that, just as a new mission church usually becomes self-supporting in a short time, this home can become self-supporting in a reasonable number of years. To back our belief we can cite a number of cases in which individuals in the Diocese have left their money, or indicated a desire to leave money, for the establishment of a home for the aged; but their ideas failed to materialize due to lack of a plan on the part of the Diocese. One case in point follows:

In 1948, when Judge Mauchlin Niven of Alexandria died, he bequeathed in fee simple certain real property to the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia. The property consisted of valuable lots, including Judge Niven's residence. It was suggested by Judge Niven in his will that the residence and some portion of the land be used as a home for the aged and for orphans, and/or as a Diocesan center, or for other church and philanthropic uses as future needs may require. In 1950, upon recommendation of the Committee on the Niven property, the Diocesan Council voted authority to the Trustees to sell the property and apply the proceeds to the fund for Church Extension. After due process the property was sold in 1952, bringing a net profit to the said Trustees of approximately \$34,000.

The plan of the Department to establish a new home was submitted to the Department of Christian Stewardship on March 30 and received their approval. It was submitted also to the Executive Council of the Diocese on April 19, and secured their approval. We heartily endorse the establishment of a new Church Home in the Diocese of Virginia, and we trust that this Convention here assembled will approve the following resolution which will put our plan into effect:

"Be it resolved:

"1. That the Council of the Diocese does hereby ratify the plan for the establishment of a home for single men, single women and couples as set forth in the report of the Department of Christian Social Relations.

"2. That the action of the Executive Council on April 19, 1955, authorizing the purchase of the property at 1621 Grove Avenue for said purpose be approved.

"3. That, in order to carry out the recommendations of the Department of Christian Social Relations and effectuate the purchase of the said property, this matter be referred to the Chancellor of the Diocese and the Department of Christian Social Relations with authority to organize under the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia a corporation with power to operate such a Home for the Aged and to acquire the real property necessary for the same. Said corporation to be governed by a Board of Trustees, the number and terms of office to be set forth in the charter, the original Board to be elected by the Executive Council of the Diocese, and subsequent board members to be elected by the Board of Trustees of the Corporation from nominations made by the Convention of the Diocese."

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT

The Convention of the Diocese last year also showed its concern for the uprooted and homeless peoples compelled to live outside their own countries by calling on the Department to work in cooperation with the National Council in its program for the resettlement of refugees. To date the Department has sent thirteen completed assurances, for a total of thirty-three individuals, to the State Department for refugees to be admitted to this country under this program. The number of refugees is far surpassing the number of assurances we are signing; for instance, it is estimated that within the last twenty-four hours three to four hundred refugees have escaped into West Berlin from behind the Iron Curtain. Last summer at their meeting in Evanston, the World Council of Churches again reaffirmed their responsibility to aid the refugees around the world. The refugee program is an overwhelming one. We might well ask the question, "Is the end in sight?" The answer is found in a phrase by Winston Churchill: "The end of the beginning." There can be no hope for ultimate peace in our world while the refugee program is not solved, and only action by governments and voluntary agencies will solve this in the long pull. The refugee problem is an emergency, but in our time it is a permanent emergency. Your Department has available life stories of refugees looking for resettlement in America. We trust that every delegate will leave this Convention determined to do his part to see that every parish in our Diocese aids in the resettlement of at least one refugee family.

COMMITTEE ON ALCOHOLISM

Concern for the sick alcoholic was also shown by the last Convention of the Diocese by its resolution calling on the Department to appoint a committee on alcoholism. We are happy to announce that the Rev. John Henry, chairman of that committee, will attend the Yale Summer School of Alcoholic Studies this year.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

MINISTRY TO INSTITUTIONS

A committee on the Ministry to Institutions has been at work under the chairmanship of the Rev. Harry W. Baldwin, Jr. This committee has brought to light the fact that many persons in institutions, both public and private, are being neglected by their families and their church, and that Christian folk have a great opportunity and responsibility to minister to them. To strengthen its hand in developing a more adequate ministry to persons in institutions in our Diocese, the Department presents the following resolution:

"Residing in the Diocese of Virginia, existing in many cases instead of living, are many of God's children who are patients and inmates of nursing homes, hospitals, and prisons. These are, in many instances, the forgotten ones of our society. For them our Lord died and rose again. To them we have a Christian responsibility for their spiritual care and guidance, by the help of Almighty God.

"Be it Resolved, That this Convention of the Diocese of Virginia give its approval and support to the Department of Christian Social Relations in promoting a ministry to the people in institutions, wherever it may be possible."

THE CHRISTIAN AND HIS DAILY WORK

A Committee on the Christian and His Daily Work, under the chairman-ship of Mr. St. George Tucker Lee, has been at work to discover ways in which we may help the lay people more closely relate their faith to their daily job. To this end the Department sponsored a conference on "Christian Leadership in Industry." This conference was composed of laymen who are executives or managers in small industry. They gathered to discuss the questions: "What does God expect of us in our daily work?" and "How can we apply Christianity to our daily work?" The conference met with such favorable reaction that conferences are being planned in the coming year for men in other phases of work, especially doctors, lawyers, social workers and men in the service trades. We believe that these conferences will afford the members of our Diocese an opportunity to wrestle with the decisions that they make Monday through Saturday, and in their relationship to the persons they meet.

RACE RELATIONS

No question in the field of human relations has troubled the conscience of Christian folk more in the past year than the question of our relations to members of other races. To help answer our questions in this field the Department's Committee on Race Relations has drawn up a statement and resolution, which we present:

STATEMENT AND RESOLUTION

The historic Christian faith holds that:

God is the Creator of all mankind.

He has made in His own image every human being, whom He claims as His child.

He so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son to be both the Saviour and Redeemer of all mankind.

Our Saviour, Jesus Christ, loving us to the utmost, laid down His life for the entire world; so "a thing of price is man because for him Christ died."

Jesus Christ commanded: "All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth. Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you." (St. Matthew 28:18-20.)

He ordained the Sacrament of Baptism through which by repentance and faith each believer is, without exception, received into His Body the Church.

Upon each member of His Church He imposed an obligation, saying. "This is my commandment, that ye love one another, even as I have loved you." (St. John 15:12.)

He ordained the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, or Holy Communion, as the bond of our unity in Him and with one another.

Within the Body of Christ, the Household of Faith, the Communion of Saints, the Holy Catholic Church, divisiveness, discrimination, denial of the Sacraments or of any Christian privilege to any one for any cause other than repudiation of Christ and His Gospel or willful persistence in sin, have no place within the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ. St. Paul declares: "Ye are all sons of God, through faith, in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ did put on Christ. There can be neither Jew nor Greek, there can be neither bond nor free, there can be neither male and female; for ye are all one in Christ Jesus." (Galatians 3:36-38.)

He also teaches us that "if man is in Christ, he is a new creature: the old things are passed away; behold, they are become new." (II Corinthians 5:17.)

With these premises certain conclusions follow:

Human society outside the Church of Christ is organized and governed by laws of man's devising. The Church is the Body of Christ, born of the will of God, given life and power by the Holy Spirit, bound by the commandments of God. Therefore, a different and higher type of human association should be expected within the Church.

Under grace, Christians are governed by the law of Love. By his acceptance of Baptism, each Christian has obligated himself to obey that law.

Therefore, no problem of race relations ought to arise within the Church, nor should any other cause of divisiveness emanating from social, economic, intellectual, or political fears, prejudices, or selfishness be permitted to disrupt the unity of believers. Ancient prejudices, hatreds and contempts have no validity or power over Christians who are one in Christ.

In considering the problems raised by the recent utterance of the United States Supreme Court concerning races and the public schools, it should be pointed out that no problem of race relations exists within the Protestant Episcopal Church except where individual members or groups of members create that problem. By rubric and by Constitution and Canon Law, the Church knows no such problem. By Baptism the Church receives all into the Body of Christ and all baptized persons are equally members thereof. At no time does the Church place a member below another nor prefer one member above another. All are equally considered as children of God, members of Christ, and inheritors of the Kingdom of Heaven. In its sight, all baptized people are brothers in Christ, sinners needing the one redemption, participators in the same salvation, sharers in the one hope of our calling, workers in the same vineyard, and citizens of the same Kingdom. In the sight of the Church and, we believe, in the sight of Christ, each member of the Church, regardless of race, wealth, poverty, intellect, or position, is under the same compulsion to adore Christ, efface self, prefer others, and to work, pray and give for the spread of the Kingdom of God on earth.

"Therefore, be it Resolved: That the Convention of the Diocese of Virginia here assembled believes that it is the will of God for the people of this Diocese, that they make every effort, in Christian love, to eliminate all barriers preventing the free fellowship in the Church's life of people of different races."

In the light of this resolution, we recommend the following steps for action, particularly within our own congregations:

- 1. Joint meetings could be held between representatives of the white and Negro races, who are brothers in our one Church, for the purpose of exploring and discussing common problems and not merely for the purpose of discussing race relations.
- 2. A local church could well sponsor an interracial chorus or choir which would sing at community events and at special programs of the various churches.
- Children of both races could be included in special vacation study groups.
- 4. Each parish and each member should do everything possible to see that the children in the churches and the church school grow up free from prejudice and ill-will toward members of other races. This applies to churches both white and Negro.
- 5. Clergymen can visit back and forth in the Diocese and in the various congregations among churches of all races.

In the long run the Church shows its concern for God's children primarily in and through the local worshipping congregation. For this basic reason we again request that every congregation in the Diocese set up a Committee on Christian Social Relations that it may give guidance to the people of their church in this broad area of the Christian life, and further that this Committee may serve as a means of contact with our Diocesan Department.

We are happy to announce that Bishop Goodwin has nominated and the Executive Council has elected the Rev. Robert S. Seiler as full-time Executive Secretary of the Department effective July 1. We trust that with his full-time services a great majority of the parishes will be visited in the coming year and that more of people will be encouraged to think about the social mission of the Church, and how they, as individuals and members of the corporate body of Christ, may witness to His healing powers in our troubled times.

IV. REPORTS OF CHURCH SCHOOLS

(a) Report of the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia

Thirty-five years ago the Council of the Diocese of Virginia established the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia. Perhaps this is an appropriate time to take a look at the schools, remind ourselves of their history, consider their function in contemporary education and call the attention of Church people to some of their major problems. My report is that of an individual officer and is not the report of the Board.

At the beginning of this report I wish to mention the great debt this Diocese owes to the Rev. Edward E. Tate for his work of founding and developing St. Stephen's School in Alexandria. Through faith and courage and concern for boys and families of the Church, Mr. Tate established a great school. In this work he was assisted by the faculty and board whom he gathered around him and to whom he imparted a full measure of his vision and inspiration. The school system suffered a great loss when Mr. Tate resigned to accept the call to become Rector of the Church of the Incarnation, Dallas, Texas.

We rejoice that the Rev. Emmett Hoy, after notable work as Chaplain at Christchurch School, will become headmaster of St. Stephen's School next month. Those who know Mr. Hoy will share our confidence that he will carry St. Stephen's even nearer the fulfillment of the vision of a Church School.

We are grateful to Mr. Willis Wills, who has served nobly in the difficult position of acting headmaster during the present session.

BOARDS

Our corporation is a Church-sponsored corporation. It is administered by a Board of Trustees which now consists of thirty members. These members are elected by the Board from nominations made by this Council. A year ago the trustees changed the charter of the Corporation to enlarge the Board and provide for rotation in order that there might be wider representation of the Diocese.

In addition to the Board of Trustees, each school has a Local Board which serves as an advisory group for the school head and for the Board of Trustees. Each of these boards consists of between eight and fourteen members. These members are appointed by the Bishop. At least two members of each Local Board are selected from the Board of Trustees. The others are selected by the Bishop from nominations by the Local Board—at least two nominations are made for each vacancy.

OBJECTIVES

The schools try to follow the general objective of being a missionary arm of the Church. It seems to me that this objective has two parts. The first has to do with the more than two thousand children who are enrolled in the schools and with their families. We do not succeed with all the children by any means but we succeed with a sufficient number of them to be encouraged. It is striking to observe the number of families knit more closely into the life of the Church as the result of their contact with the Church through their children in our schools.

The second phase of the objective is that of maintaining the influence of the Church on education in general. I do not believe that the Episcopal Church is ready to start a full parochial school program, but there is need for the Church to make its influence felt on public education for the functions of schools and churches are becoming steadily more closely related. Some of you may have noticed last fall announcement of the appointment of a full-time officer of the Methodist Church whose responsibility is to represent the interest of that Church in connection with public education. You are familiar with the way in which the Roman Catholic Church is able to influence the education of the children of its families through its educational program. It is important to be sure that the influence of the Episcopal Church is felt in the educational world. A group of schools such as ours can be far more influential than an individual school or a number of individual schools.

HISTORY

Our system of schools has its roots in the early Parsons' schools which were developed in Virginia. Through these schools and through later

academies presided over by churchmen the Episcopal Church had strong influence on the development of education in Virginia. In 1919 when the Church was making its plans to go forward and take advantage of opportunities through the Nation-Wide Campaign, Bishop William Cabell Brown led the people of the Diocese to place the system of Church schools among the chief opportunities. As a result, \$200,000 was designated for the beginning of the school system, though only \$170,000 was raised. Three schools were purchased and opened in 1920 under Church auspices. Two new schools were started and opened in 1921. The early years were marked by the struggle for survival and development. The character of the schools was largely set by two men who had had experience with educational projects in the mission fields. Bishop Brown gave his leadership with the experience of schools in the Brazil field fresh in his mind. Dr. Edmund Woodward who, as the first Dean, molded the religious and educational policies of the schools, had had his vision nurtured by experience in China. Devoted Church people on the staffs of the schools early gave to the school system a clear Christian direction. It would be hard to give an adequate account of the faithful service of both clergymen and laymen on the Board of Trustees and on the Local Boards of the schools. Headmasters and headmistresses have been able to depend on the finest churchmen for counsel in connection with religious and educational policy. Outstanding business and professional men have helped the schools maintain a sound financial operation.

DILEMMAS AND TENSIONS

The schools are challenging because they represent a meeting ground of the Church with an enterprise which is deeply involved in the world and all of its problems. They are constantly faced with those dilemmas or paradoxies which Christians always meet in the world. There is the tension between parochial interest and diocesan interest. Each school inevitably has its own individualistic character and must have its own loyal adherents. It is not easy to rise to the diocesan point of view. There is tension between the academic interest and the religious interest. The school day is short enough and the pressures of the many varieties of education are strong. Those interested in maintaining the religious basis of all education face strong competing interests. There is a paradox in the area of discipline. People do not always understand the fact that neither churches nor Church Schools are composed of perfect Christians. The fact that the Church is a congregation of sinners is more obvious in a school than it is in a parish. Since there is more constant contact between the members of the body than there is in the ordinary congregation, both the members and the leaders or pastors are more aware of the presence of sinners in schools than the members and pastors are apt to be in parishes. Furthermore, sometimes the sinners stay out of the way of the pastor but the school sticks more closely with its sinners.

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Another tension is that between charitable instincts of Christians and financial responsibilities. We would like to be thoroughly charitable and never deny admission to anyone who could not pay the established rates, and yet the schools have definite financial responsibilities.

Another tension comes out of a main function of the school system. This is the tension between Church-related education which is independent and the community education which is controlled by the state and at the same time the backbone of our democracy. This is not easy. All of us accept the function of public education as a mainstay of the democrary which we consider a logical expression of Christianity. Yet we also recognize that Christianity is opposed to the kind of state control over the individual personal development which can too easily come from modern state education unless there is a competing education.

The schools can function as a balance to state education, but they must always be constructive in their attitude and earnestly avoid being confused with the destructive or hostile critics of public schools. Those who enjoy the privilege of working in independent schools cannot but be moved with admiration for the accomplishments of the public schools in the face of enormous difficulties. In return for our privileges, it is our responsibility to be of service to public education.

Such are the dilemmas which we face. We find illustrated in most of them the chief problems of our schools. These have to do with finances, enrollment and teachers.

FINANCES

Annual budgets presented for the schools last fall totaled a little more than \$1,481,000. This gives some idea of the size of the work. The Diocese's contribution to the budget for 1954-55 amounts to \$7,000.

When the schools were started the Diocese contributed \$170,000 from the Nation-Wide Campaign. In 1922 it was agreed that the Diocese would contribute \$50,000 a year for twelve years to the schools. When the depression came along this agreement was cut short and the amount was reduced to \$10,000 a year. This amount was stopped in 1939. From that time until 1951 the Diocese made no contribution to the annual expenses of the schools. Beginning with the year 1952, the Diocese has contributed \$7,000 with the special purpose that it would promote or strengthen Christian education in the schools. To date the Bishops' Building Fund has allocated approximately \$135,000 to the schools. The total contribution of the Diocese to the schools, including the contributions made through the Bishops' Building Fund, has amounted during these thirty-five years to approximately \$900,000. During the same period parents of children have paid twenty times as much or approximately \$18,500,000 to the schools.

It has been pointed out before now that the teachers are, in effect, the chief financial supporters of the schools. It has been estimated that in order

to bring the salaries of our teachers up to the level of salaries paid to public school teachers in the same areas in which our schools are located the schools would need to add over \$100,000 per year to their budgets. This figure is interesting when it is compared with the previous annual diocesan appropriations for the schools.

Your schools have kept their rates low in order to try to keep them available for as many Church children as possible. The cost of education has been increasing steadily. We have not increased our rates as rapidly as the value of the dollar has decreased. The sense of responsibility to the Diocese has been a strong factor in this policy.

Lacking more financial support from the Diocese, and lacking the income to be derived from higher rates, the schools have found that they could handle their capital needs through selling bonds. The corporation had outstanding in 1948 a total of \$1,054,000 first mortgage bonds. Between 1948 and 1954 the corporation reduced this indebtedness to \$682,000. In the fall of 1954 the corporation refinanced its debt and borrowed money for new facilities. The bonded indebtedness now amounts to \$1,100,000. During this year the corporation will pay approximately \$88,000 in interest and curtail on this debt. The rate of curtail for the bonds is \$50,000 per year for the first ten years and \$60,000 per year for the second ten years. Over the period of twenty years the average interest rate will total \$22,457. The bonds are held by insurance companies, banks, trust funds, and individuals. Buildings built in recent years have been financed chiefly through the use of slowly accumulated reserves for replacement of buildings and through the use of borrowed money.

During the last few years the corporation has been trying to get the individual schools to raise money. The schools have not accumulated any sizeable endowment. There has been some problem apparent in trying to get people to contribute to a system of schools. Individuals who give money to educational institutions usually have strong local loyalties. Recognizing this fact about human nature, the board has encouraged the individual schools to set up foundations which can receive and hold money for the use of particular schools.

Since January, 1954, there has been considerable activity in fund raising Many church people have given generously of time and money. St. Margaret's has to date raised a gross of over \$90,000. The St. Christopher's School Foundation has raised a gross of over \$150,000. St. Stephen's and St. Agnes are both well on their way towards goals of \$100,000 each. In most cases these funds are being raised for building purposes. The one exception is that part of St. Christopher's funds will be used for endowment purposes. It is worth noting that St. Margaret's has not only had an encouraging record in raising money, but also has had an encouraging experience in building. It is about to complete an excellent new dormitory at the extraordinarily low cost of \$7.90 per square foot.

The schools represent an impressive financial operation. Outside experts have indicated that the schools are operated on a sound and economical

basis. The appraisers for the mortgage gave especial commendation to the administrations of the schools for keeping the plants in good condition. They valued land and buildings at \$4,144,000.00. The schools have weighty financial responsibilities to both bond holders and teachers. Salary contracts for teachers total something over \$500,000 per year. These contracts are with people who have given themselves unselfishly in the service of the schools. Many of them have been with the schools for a number of years.

Enrollment

As far as enrollment is concerned, the schools are in a position which is apt to be confusing to people outside. The elementary day schools have been crowded for several years. More recently, as the increased population has grown older and prosperity has spread, the day departments in the high school area have become more full. (We are not able to enroll in day schools the children of all the Episcopal families who apply.) The chief increase in enrollment this year has been in the Alexandria area. The total enrollment increase is approximately 163 students. Of this number, the increase in Alexandria amounts to over 100.

The contradiction is that the boarding departments of the schools, especially the girls schools, have not been filled to the same extent. Frankly, we need in our boarding schools more children of strong Episcopal families. We hope that you will recommend the schools to the families in your parishes and not confine such recommendations to the families which have problems (whether academic, moral or financial).

The other aspect of our enrollment which requires considerable thought at this time is the matter of the enrollment of Negro students. Inquiries from Negro families in regard to enrollment in the schools have been few. The cultural patterns which have prevailed in the communities in which our schools are located have made it seem not best for the interest of the Negro child to encourage enrollment. The schools and their staffs have constantly worked for increased understanding between the races. The board members and the school heads have given careful thought to the question of actual enrollment of Negroes. This question is not as easy for the schools and their administrators as it is for the congregations and their clergy and vestries. On the whole, I should say that the range of point of view among the school heads is fairly close to the range of point of view among the clergy, and the point of view of teachers and board members covers about the same range as that which you find among vestrymen, Woman's Auxiliary leaders, and Sunday School personnel.

Children of a number of races have been admitted to the schools. The Living Church recently made an apt comment in regard to the position of Church Schools on this matter. It said something to the effect that it is the cultural (not racial) contrast which makes such difficult problems for both schools and pupils and requires wisdom and more wisdom for solution.

The real problem as far as the Church Schools are concerned is that there is a very real difference between the Church School and the Sunday School when it comes to such matters. The Church School has children together for five days a week during six to eight hours a day at the least. The boarding schools, of course, have the children together for twenty-four hours a day. Various aspects of the cultural relationship are thus more complicated than they are for the Sunday Schools.

To indicate its present state of mind the Board of Trustees has, after careful thought, accepted this as a description of its fundamental position: "The criterion for each admission of students to the Church Schools is: Will the admission be best for this child and for the school?" Whenever a positive answer can be given and there is a vacancy, the child is admitted. The Board is keenly aware of its responsibility to deal impartially with the entire constituency of the Diocese in relation to the Church Schools."

There are two basic propositions which are struggling in the minds of many people concerned for the schools. First, the schools, because they are Church schools, cannot become refuges from integrated public schools. Second, from a practical point of view there are considerations which must be satisfied. As a result of practical educational problems, the schools are not in a position to become the spearhead of a social revolution. If such a revolution is in order, it should start in the churches and Sunday Schools. This is true, because the latter have less intense life than do the elementary and secondary schools. From the practical economic point of view, the obligations of the schools in terms of contracts with teachers amounting to over \$500,000 a year, and in terms of obligations to the bond holders, make it necessary that the Board consider carefully the financial problems which might occur. It is not certain that enrollment would suffer as a result of the admission of Negro students, but it is necessary that the Board of Trustees pay full attention to its financial responsibilities.

Teachers

In spite of the amount of attention which I have given to these first two problems it is true that the schools' chief concern is a much larger one, namely. Christian education. That depends primarily on the teachers. It is the obligation of a Christian individual or a Christian institution to do whatever he, or it, does at least as well as such work is done or could be done by anyone else. This means that your schools must provide excellent academic instruction. They are in fact in competition with the best secular schools in the country. Your schools, however, are different in that their good jobs must be done on the basis of the Christian faith. In other words, we need faculty members who are both good teachers and good Christians. In spite of all ideals of unselfish service we find that this is an expensive combination. Thirty-four years ago Dr. Chamberlayne, the first headmaster of St. Christopher's School, in his report to Council lamented the fact that Episcopalians

A part of the annual diocesan appropriation is used to provide grants for teachers to enable them to strengthen the Christian insights of their teaching. Our experience over the last year has been particularly successful. Your schools have had strong representation at the Yale Institute for Teachers in Independent Schools and at the series of conferences which was arranged by the Department of Christian Education of the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church. The latter conferences have been especially helpful to our teachers. I believe, however, that they have not only been good for our schools but that through these conferences our schools have been able to help other Church Schools.

Recruiting teachers and training them is a real challenge and we need your help in meeting it.

Conclusion

We cannot stress too often the importance of Church Schools to modern democracy. There is a need for a body of teachers and students who understand and practice the implications of Christianity for education.

States are steadily increasing their influence in the lives of individuals. In the modern state the modern school performs many of the functions of the Church, yet communities which control schools no longer have religious homogeneity. In large communities some public schools are forced to maintain a religious point of view which is theoretically neutral but which practically represents a religion which may be a rival to Christianity. A recent writer in "The Christian Century" referred to the temptation of the public schools to become "a patriotic parochial system whose gods are Americanism, democracy and cultural adjustment." Through schools like yours the Episcopal Church can exert a positive influence on the educational community and help insure that Christian influences in education will be as strong as secular influences. This can be done without joining the hostile critics of public education.

I can assure you that your schools are striving to be worthy of their name and we need the continuance of your help and guidance.

(b) Report of the Blue Ridge School

The enrollment at Blue Ridge School for the present session is slightly larger than it has been in former years. We now have 125 boarding students on the main campus, 28 day students, and 21 children at St. Anne's Preventorium—making a total of 174. It was necessary to turn away quite a number of boys, and I believe we could have filled another boys' dormitory had it been available.

Children in the boarding department come from ten other states beside Virginia and the District of Columbia, as follows:

There are 14 families this year of 2 children each; 4 families of 3 children each; 2 families of 4 children each, and 1 family of 5—making a total of 27 families, numbering 53 children.

Of the 146 boarding students, 48 are supported entirely by welfare or other organizations; 11 are partly supported by welfare or other organizations, and 87 are supported by parents or guardians. One hundred twenty-three (123) of our boarding children come from disrupted homes and 28 come from homes where both parents are living together. The ratio of boys to girls is 60 per cent boys and 40 per cent girls.

The Church affiliations of our students are: 56 from Episcopal backgrounds and 90 from non-Episcopal backgrounds. There have been 5 baptisms and 7 confirmations during the year.

Four of our six dormitories on the main campus have a man and his wife for houseparents. This seems to be an ideal arrangement, particularly for the boys and little girls.

There will be six graduates this year, three boys and three girls. One of our boys who was called into service has completed his work while in the service and is, therefore, eligible for his diploma. During the past year one couple came all the way back from England to be with us as houseparents, and another couple came all the way back from California. We are most grateful for these people who are willing to be with us even though it has meant sacrifices and long journeys.

We have carried through during the current session a regular schedule of athletic events in football, basketball and baseball. Our teams have been moderately successful. Our coach, Mr. Shanley, is to be congratulated on being able to build teams out of an exceptionally small number of raw recruits. We are looking forward with a great deal of joy to the use of the gymnasium next year.

Looking ahead to the increase of \$3,500 in the diocesan appropriation for 1955, the salaries of teachers, housemothers and a few other staff members was increased in the amount of \$15.00 per month as of September 1. We are most grateful for this additional help through the Diocese. Financially, we have come through the year in fairly good shape, thanks to the diocesan appropriation, the Woman's Auxiliary, the Daughters of the American Revolution and other interested groups and individuals. Both the school proper and St. Anne's Preventorium came through in the black. This was more than offset, however, by quite a large loss on the farm, due in part to the extreme drought last summer.

St. Anne's Preventorium is continuing to render a valuable service, especially with health cases, and enabling us to take whole families. One of our seniors this year is a polio victim, paralyzed from the waist down. However, she is going on with her school work at St. Anne's Preventorium and will be a graduate in this year's class at Blue Ridge.

There seems to be an increase in the interest shown by the lay people throughout the Diocese, particularly the men. On their own initiative, following a supper meeting here at the school last October, the laymen of the Albemarle Convocation contributed around \$1,300.00 toward the new well. We are most grateful to have this new source of water should a drought strike us again this summer.

Over \$22,000 in capital improvements was spent during the past year in painting, making additions to the infirmary and the little boys' dormitory, and building a new house for our senior farm man, and drilling a new well. Included in the above is \$1.319 which was spent on capital improvements at

St. Anne's Preventorium. The old dormitory near the entrance to the school, which was an eyesore for many years, has now disappeared.

The superstructure of the new gymnasium is going up and we hope to have this building ready for use shortly after the opening of school. It will meet a long-felt need in the care and development of our boys and girls.

(c) Report of the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia

To the Bishop and Convention of the Diocese of Virginia:

What should a seminary be thinking about? The answer is simple—Christ and His Church. To do this no seminary (and there are eleven in the Episcopal Church) can be bound by the outworn traditions of the past. But it can live in the best of all traditions—fellowship with Christ. In so doing it will not look back to a false "golden age"—or to a future of "pie in the sky." It will live in the present that is God's gift to men. It will glory in its present opportunity. I am happy to report that the Virginia Theological Seminary is living in the present, and is seeking to use its great heritage to train men to be effective ministers to Christ's ministers today.

Last June (1954), 60 men left the Seminary for work in parishes and missions in 32 dioceses and missionary districts. Two of these men now are working in Alaska.

Sixty-eight new students entered the Seminary in September, 1954. Of these, 53 were Juniors, 2 transfers to the Senior Class, 5 transfers to the Middle Class, and 8 were Special Students. The average age of the entering Juniors was 26½, and 21 are married. Our total enrollment is 180, with 89 of this number married. Fifty-seven dioceses and missionary districts are represented, including Liberia, Brazil, England, Japan, Alaska, Honolulu, and the Canal Zone.

Applications for admission for the academic year 1955-56 are running ahead of last year. The quality of men already admitted is high. The number of married men applying creates problems in many ways—not the least of the problems being financial!

The year 1954 saw the completion of a new faculty residence and of the roadway joining the new buildings with the old. During the summer Bohlen Hall was remodeled to house the administration offices. Two new classrooms were constructed in Aspinwall Hall. The Sheerin Commons Room was moved from Francis Scott Key Hall to Aspinwall, and Key Hall became the new home of the Voice and Speech Department under Dr. Beveridge.

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At the November meeting of the Board of Trustees, I asked for the appointment of three special committees—one to consider the problems created by the large increase in the number of married men enrolled in the Seminary; another on Scholarship Aid Policy; and another on Student Fees. Changing conditions make it necessary to give serious thought to these matters.

Dr. Mollegen was on Sabbatical leave for the first half of 1954, and during the last half Dr. Howe. Dr. Howe taught at St. Augustine's College, Canterbury, England, under appointment by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

The Seminary faculty, staff and students are grateful for your support and interest and prayers. We need them as we try to let God use us for His purposes. We look forward to the year 1955 as truly "the year of our Lord." May it be rich in opportunities for us all to witness to the Risen Christ!

(d) Report of Stuart Hall

This year 1954-55 is proving in every respect a good year for Stuart Hall, with excellent prospects for the enrollment, et cetera, for the coming year.

Both our faculty and our students are doing good work and showing a fine spirit. Of our forty-nine seniors, forty have in applications at outstanding colleges, quite a number applying for scholarships. Our standing with colleges throughout the country continues high. It is my earnest hope that this high academic standing may continue, and even increase, and that it may be associated as definitely with Stuart Hall as are its social standards and its training in spiritual values.

For the year 1955-56 we have increased our board and tuition from \$1,350 to \$1,500. This increase was necessary in order to meet the high costs of living and to increase the salaries of our faculty and staff—an increase which has enabled us to keep a large number of our faculty and staff.

At present there are only four vacancies to be filled for next year—that of a dietitian, a teacher of science, of mathematics, and of physical education. These are difficult positions to fill, as they are connected with the industrial, technological work of the country where there are many opportunities with tremendous salaries. I am doing my best to fill these vacancies before my retirement July 1.

I feel sure that we shall close the fiscal year in the black, and I am especially gratified because we have paid off in July and October of this year \$30,000 of our indebtedness, leaving no debt for the school except that incurred for the recent installation of the sprinkler system. I am hoping that at the close of the fiscal year we shall have at least several thousand dollars to be allocated especially to certain needed repairs and improvements: (1) in-

creased bath room facilities in at least two areas; (2) new roof on a portion of Robertson; (3) repair or replacement of certain vital parts of our furnace boiler. Our buildings are old and need constantly to be watched in order to be kept safe and attractive.

May I tell you that I have greatly enjoyed my twelve years at Stuart Hall; that I feel it has been a privilege to be its Headmistress, and that my interest in and desire to help the school in any way will always be present with me.

(b) The Woman's Auxiliary

When I come to the Diocesan Council to give the annual report of the Woman's Auxiliary, I speak not for myself but for the women in your Church.

It is they who do the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, quietly, efficiently, intelligently, and prayerfully. As Bishop Goodwin said in his message to us, "The women of the Auxiliary proceed in their work from knowledge, through prayer and devotion to grateful and sacrificial giving." That is truly what we try to do.

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The most significant advance in our year's work has been in prayer and worship. There have been more Schools of Prayer, active Prayer Groups, and Quiet Days than ever before, and the influence of our Diocesan Retreat at Shrine Mont, led by Dr. Whiston, has been felt throughout the Diocese. Our last two Diocesan Educational Institutes have emphasized prayer, and the seeking for a more meaningful devotional life is evident in our work.

I want to stress right here how important I feel that it is for the women in the Auxiliary to attend Convocation meetings, our Annual Meeting, the Diocesan Retreat held this year at Shrine Mont July 22-24, the Educational Institute at St. Catherine's June 13-15, and the Provincial Conference at Hood. There they receive inspiration, knowledge and fellowship, and a feeling of being part of the whole great women's work of the Church. They go home determined to be a better Auxiliary woman in every way.

We have six new Parish Auxiliaries this year, one hundred and twenty-eight Standard Branches, and nearly two-thirds of the total number are unified. Our work touches many thousand women, but still not enough.

We are looking to the Department of Christian Education for help in the finding of young women to use our Scholarship Funds. The funds were both used in part this past year—one helping a college girl to spend the summer in Alaska working with Bishop Gordon, and the other was used by a young woman at the Assembly Training School preparing for Director of Religious Education work.

You will find Auxiliary women helping in every phase of the youth work of our Church—Sunday Schools and other youth organizations. But I would like to point out that the Woman's Auxiliary sponsors the Guild of the Christ Child and the Junior Auxiliary. Both are active in their work under the able leadership of Diocesan Chairmen. If you do not have these two youth groups in your church, you are missing a real opportunity in having a unified family program, and of training the boys and girls in your church for leadership.

The Historian of our Woman's Auxiliary has collected some valuable articles and data over the years. We are asking that in the plans of work on the Mayo Memorial Church House, that the Auxiliary be provided with adequate fireproof space in which to keep these records.

We are working directly with the Board of Mountain Work through our Supply Department and our Representative of Diocesan Missionaries. We have faithfully supplied the clothing needs in the mountains and have responded in many other ways with help. Notably, our *Viva Voce* Pledge at the Annual Meeting amounted to \$1,243.00 and was allocated to a Director of Religious Education for the Mountain Work. Now we are broadening

Our United Thank Offering is the largest it has ever been, but the greatest inspiration is the increase in the number of Branches participating and the fact that more Blue Boxes are being used in each parish.

The Auxiliaries carry on their Christian Social Relations work in many different fields and as the needs arise, work with the sick and needy, the aged and those in institutions, and improving conditions which tend to lead to juvenile delinquency. There is also work with Church World Service and our special project in the Diocese of Kyoto in Japan and with Korean orphans. Interest in legislation, national, state, and local, continues and should increase in the light of various problems which face Christian prople in today's world. In discussing the subjects which needed our chief concern in the next few years, the Auxiliary voted they were: race relations, juvenile delinquency, the aged, and the work of the United Nations.

Our total giving as reported on the Annual Report Blanks is well over two hundred thousand dollars. Of this amount, about three-eighths was spent on ourselves on parish projects and administration. At the request of the Bishop, the Auxiliary voted to allow the Diocese to use the \$7,000 raised for the Student Center at Mary Washington College toward student center facilities in the new church in Fredericksburg, provided these facilities meet with the approval of the Committee on College Work. We also voted to include the Interdenominational Religious Work Foundation on our Objectives for next year.

We were encouraged to note from our Annual Reports that a much smaller amount was given to be counted on the Parish Quotas, as we have always endeavored to have the Auxiliary giving over and above the Parish Quotas. Then it is a *real gift* to our missionaries!

It is easy to report on part of our work—because that is facts and figures—but I wish I could convey to you the warmth of our devotion for our Church, the peace and kindness, tolerance, love, and faith which the Auxiliary brings to our women. This is exemplified in their work. This is the real spirit of the Woman's Auxiliary!

(d) Report of Shrine Mont

Shrine Mont has concluded another successful year of operation. In making this report to the Convention, we shall not include finances, as our financial report was submitted to the Diocesan authorities in January.

Our service to the larger Christian community is expanding year by year. In 1953 we had ten conferences and retreats. In 1954 there were fifteen. This summer will bring us seventeen such groups. To accommodate this increase, our season has to be extended. Our first conference will arrive this year on May 13, and our last group will not leave till September 25. August will be reserved as Guest Period, as in the past. Since the number and size of our conferences has increased a slight decline in the number of individual guests is noted, but the over-all total increased 104 in 1954 over the previous year.

Our total number of guests in 1954 was 1,402. These, with our staff, which at its highest numbered 31, consumed 28,373 meals. Our meals, so we are constantly reminded, are excellent, yet we were able to hold the *food* cost down to 33.8c per meal. Food costs, as you are aware, have increased and are still increasing.

We have been fortunate in purchasing at a reasonable cost the Atkison Cottage, situated on The Square next to our Drake Cottage. This has been completely done over and four new baths installed.

After twenty-five years we have decided to discontinue our annual Clergy Seminar, as the need for it no longer exists. Instead of the Seminar, we shall this year inaugurate the Shrine Mont Lectures, to be held for two weeks during the Guest Period with one lecture each evening. In 1955 the topic of these lectures will be some phase of Evangelism.

Throughout the season daily Evening Prayer is said at the Cathedral Shrine or (in bad weather) in Shelter Chapel. In addition we have the

Holy Communion at 8:00 A. M. on Sundays, and Morning Prayer with sermon at eleven. On Wednesdays and Holy Days, and at other times when desired by conference leaders, there is a celebration of the Holy Communion

at 7:30 A. M.

(e) Report of the Protestant Episcopal Church Home

Concern for and problems of the "aged" are almost daily before us in newspapers and magazines.

The Protestant Episcopal Church Home has helped in its limited way to alleviate anxiety and loneliness and to give security and peace to ladies in the Diocese of Virginia for the past eighty years. This is your 160th Annual Convention, so we are half as old as your meetings!

The year 1954 might well be called a year of change. We have been buzzing with meetings and plans for our new home to be erected on the lot purchased at Thompson Street and Grove Avenue. The architects are almost ready with the blue prints and before long ground will be broken. In her will, Mrs. Lettie Pate Evans, in addition to the money for the lot and new building, left us the furnishings of her home at Hot Springs. So our Home looks very lovely with its new acquisitions, and the ladies take great pleasure and pride in its beauty. Furnishings that could not be used were sold at auction in October in Richmond, and the sum realized from the sale will go into the new building.

In the last few years our running expenses have soared, due in great part to the nursing care of so many of our ladies. Twenty-three per cent of our funds are used in this way.

Six ladies died during 1954. Several had been in the Home for fifteen years. Six new ladies have come into the Home. In most instances it is a joy to see them adjust so quickly to their new surroundings, where they find great happiness and make new friends.

Again our deficit of \$10,000 had to be met by appeals to members of the Episcopal churches and the Woman's Auxiliaries. We are deeply grateful for your interest and generosity and trust you will continue to have us in your hearts and remember us in your prayers.

(f) Report of the Registrar and Historiographer

The Registrar begs to report that he has under his care parish registers and vestry books, and other records, of congregations that have passed out of existence, and parish records of a number of other parishes who find in the Diocesan Registrar's library a safe place for the preservation of records no longer necessary for the present-day operation of the parish. Such records are always held subject to the order of the vestry which in each case has so deposited them.

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In addition to parish records, the official records of Bishops Johns, Whittle, Gibson, Brown and Tucker are there preserved, and the minutebooks of Convocations and the Richmond Clericus, the Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge and the now extinct Colored Convocation. These, with a number of historic Bibles and Prayer Books and other articles, form a Registrar's Library of such growing importance that it must be kept at present in a bank vault until such time as the Diocese can provide at the Mayo Memorial Church House a fire-proof and burglar-proof room, where the Library may be made available for greater use.

One of the important duties of the Registrar at present is the securing from the parish registers under his care of baptismal certificates for persons seeking records of birth for Social Security or other needs. Many requests for such certificates have come to him. And he has been forced upon many such occasions of search to report to the inquirer that the particular baptism, for which a record is desired, was not recorded by the officiating minister in his parish register, or was so carelessly recorded as to fail to enter the essentially important items. This carelessness in keeping proper records has become a blot upon the good name of many parishes in the Diocese, and shows the importance of more careful training of candidates for the ministry in the performance of that duty.

Your Historiographer, as he approaches the end of his tenth triennial term in that office, can only report that he continues to carry on his work of research and writing and is now engaged in writing the third volume of his history of the Church in Virginia. He has had the opportunity of helping numerous parishes and congregations secure historical information for parish celebrations. The historical department of the Virginia Diocesan Library, which is especially under his direction, has grown steadily in the collection of historical records, collections of historic Bibles, Prayer Books and hymnals, and books upon various phases and movements in the history of the Anglican Church. He would express his gratitude to the friends who by gifts made to his fund, have enabled the acquisition of many books and records which could not otherwise have been secured.

(g) Report on the Virginia Council of Churches

The Virginia Council of Churches continues its fine inter-church cooperative work in the following fields of service: Christian Education, especially in the week-day program; Council of Church Women; Evangelism; Christian Social Relations; Public Relations; Rural Church; United Christian Youth. In 1956 the Council will sponsor a state-wide church attendance campaign. It is hoped that every congregation in the Diocese will cooperate in this effort as well as in all the endeavors of the Virginia Council. For us to cooperate with the Council simply on a Diocesan level weakens the whole purpose of the Council's work. Cooperative Christianity needs our support on the local level if we are to practice in our lives what we profess to believe. To this end, therefore, let each local congregation in the Diocese spearhead the Council's work in its own community.

In closing, may I remind you that neither the Virginia Council of Churches, nor the National Council of Churches, nor the World Council of Churches can possibly carry on their expanding work without contributions in addition to the contributions made at the diocesan or national level. Since this is the case, may I urge every local congregation in the Diocese to become directly affiliated with these councils by making contributions (designating the communion alms on one or two occasions each year will take care of this and be educational) to each of them. If we believe in cooperative Christianity we cannot do less.

(h) Report of the Committee on the State of the Church

Brethren in Christ:

In examining statistics of the Diocese for the calendar year 1954, we note an increase in the number of confirmations of 126 over the previous year, which represents a growth of 4.57%. This is far below the 7% increase of last year but is above the national average. It is most encouraging to report that we have 1,000 more Sunday School pupils, representing an 8% increase, and there is a 10% increase in enrollment in Adult Bible Classes.

As of this date we have increased the number of parochial clergy by eight and two new churches have been established in urban areas since last year. There is a plentiful supply of candidates for the ministry and we shall be able to use this year's seminary graduates to advantage.

On the whole, the parishes and missions submitted their parochial reports with greater alacrity than last year; but many were late and some have not been heard from. The following churches submitted no parochial reports as of April 27th: St. Margaret's Church, Ruther Glen; St. Stephen's Church, Stephens City; Christ Church, Lucketts; The Chapel of Remembrance, Fletcher; All Saints' Church, Tanner's Ridge; Farnham Church, Farnham, and Trinity Church, Upperville. We propose doing something about this situation and have presented a constitutional change to the Committee on Canons.

Concerning finances, we find that the people of the Diocese increased their giving by 12% for local support and by 22% in giving for all purposes. Total disbursements increased by 20%. These increases are largely due to

generous giving to the Bishops' Building Fund and is especially noted in a net increase of \$330,000.00 in capital expenditure. We note that churches expended 15% more for current expenses but increased their giving to missions by only 11½%. While the Bishops' Building Fund stimulated the giving of the Diocese, and this stimulation has been carried on under the Virginia Plan of Proportionate Giving, this does not replace the concern of the Church for its mission, which is the personal witness of individuals for Christ. Missions can never be measured in dollars and cents. We must alert the membership of the Church to the needs of the three-fold program in the parish, the Diocese, and the world. Too often the clergyman is the only missionary. He recruits the candidates for confirmation but all of us should bring candidates for baptism and confirmation, and we can all pray for the spread of Christ's Kingdom.

The reorganization of the Diocese into departments has relieved our Bishops of much confining executive work, and we commend the Executive Secretaries for work well done. Although some confusion still exists, which is quite natural when a change takes place, the value of the reorganization is apparent to us.

We see much ambiguity in the present classifications of "Parishes," "Separate Congregations," "Mission Churches," and "Missions under the Bishop." We feel that the strength and the work of the Diocese is greatly hindered by our present system. Since a long-range coordinated plan of the Diocese could benefit many of the smaller churches, the need is evident for more Diocesan control over the churches which are not economically self-sufficient, which would permit grouping of churches to the best advantage. Each church should be classified as a "Mission," an "Aided Mission," or a "Self-Supporting Church" on the basis of its ability rather than by geographical location; and canonical changes should be adopted to reclassify from one status to another, depending on changing conditions. We endorse the study of this need now being made by the Department of Missions and urge that action be taken.

We are glad to see that the Department of Missions has wrestled with the problems of clergy salaries and travel allowance. A car is a necessity and we would urge each church to consider travel as a separate item with full reimbursement for miles traveled in parish work. We further urge each church to consider a clergyman's salary which is at least equal to the minimum salary now being paid by the Department of Missions for Aided Churches.

(i) Report of the Interracial Commission

This Commission was created pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Convention of 1954. Among its stated duties is "to confer and advise with the several departments and organizations." To carry out this duty four meetings of the Commission were held and advice was sought, and suggestions received, from the Departments of Christian Social Relations, Christian Education, and Missions, in addition to the letters from several of the clergy of the Diocese.

The resolution creating the Interracial Commission calls "upon all of the members of the Church in this Diocese to do all within their power to provide . . . leadership." In the spirit of this resolution the Interracial Commission presents to Convention certain considerations as set forth in the following statement:

THE GREAT COMMANDS

"Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment, and the second is like unto it: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets."

The doctrine of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man is central to all Christian thinking about man in his relationships, including relationships among the peoples of different races.

OUR RESPONSIBILITY AND PLEASURE

The Interracial Commission believes that it is the responsibility and pleasure of the whole Diocese to extend the areas of relationship in which there is no racial discrimination, in accordance with God's will.

We do not believe that man can know God's will perfectly in its application to specific conditions at given times; and, therefore, with respect to changes for the improvement of human relations, we recognize that there is room for honest differences of opinion.

However, we hold that among Christians there is no room for differences of opinion in regard to, first, the full acceptance of God's Command to love our neighbor and, second, the obligation of each Christian diligently to seek God's will in the understanding and expression of brotherly love.

A Message

We welcome the message from the Third General Assembly of the National Council of Churches as adopted on December 3, 1954, which includes under the section "The Churches in Relation to Society," the following:

"The historic decision of the Supreme Court has put a legal end to segregation in public schools. We believe it is the responsibility and opportunity

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of each local church to create the attitudes essential to carrying out this decision. We call on all Christian churches, whose faith recognizes the unity of men in God, to help make the transition from a segregated to a non-segregated society not only in the public schools but throughout the community, especially within the life and practice of the Church itself. We must champion the rights of minorities and defend the dignity of all men."

PRAYER AND STUDY

The Interracial Commission is convinced that the basic problem in race relations, as indeed in all human relations, is first of all a problem of human sin,—that is, of broken relationships both between God and men and between men and their neighbors. We think it fitting, therefore, that throughout the Diocese we seek to draw closer to God in the confident belief, that, through grace, we can come to learn more fully His will for us and, knowing it, can find the strength to do it.

We further suggest that increasing attention and study be given to race relations in the corporate life of the Church; that is, on such occasions as Morning and Evening Worship. Sunday School classes, vestry meetings, parish and Diocesan meetings of laymen and laywomen.

Where appropriate, we recommend that the services of the Department of Christian Social Relations be utilized.

Parish Life

The Interracial Commission notes that in the Diocese there are six congregations other than Negro where Negroes worship as regular members. We believe that it would be fruitful for parishes generally to examine their policies and practices in the hope that the condition may soon be realized in which Christians of all races are made welcome into the fellowship of every congregation.

DIOCESAN ORGANIZATIONS

In gratitude we call attention to our official organizations and meetings which function without reference to racial differences. These include the Convention and the various Diocesan departments and committees, the Clergy Conferences, the Episcopal Laymen and their week-end Conferences, the Diocesan meetings and educational Conferences of the Woman's Auxiliary, certain of the day Youth Conferences, the Convocations, the Adult Leadership Conferences, and most recently the summer family Conference at Shrine Mont. We recognize that neither in quality nor in extent is this practice yet complete.

CHURCH SCHOOLS

We are grateful that those charged with the government and operation of the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia are aware of their responsibilities to the whole Diocese, and we are confident that they will be guided by the principles of our faith as they confront the practical problems involved in providing for the Christian welfare of their students.

LAY LEADERSHIP

We take joy in the leadership of laymen and laywomen, exercised on their own initiative, for the improvement of race relations in their vocational fields and in secular life generally. We stress the point that progress on a broad scale is dependent primarily on lay people.

A TEST-DIFFICULT BUT NOT TOO DIFFICULT

We believe that the problem of man's relation to man, in his racial differences, constitutes a crucial test of the Church and of Church people.

We realize that the situation before us is difficult and complex, that progress will be irregular, and that solutions will require time. But we caution against pessimism and discouragement,—against the tendency to overestimate the actual difficulties and to under-estimate the light and power that come to us from our Lord.

FINALLY WE PRAY

May we as Christians live in the confidence of our faith, and may we respond with courage, mercy, justice, and love to the choices which confront us

II. OPERATING ACCOUNT OF THE DIOCESE, AND INVESTMENT FUNDS OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA

To the Executive Council, Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia.

GENTLEMEN:

We have made an audit of the Treasurer's records and accounts of the administration of Operating Funds of the Diocese and Investment Funds of the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society for the year ended December 31, 1954, as kept by your Treasurers, Frederick M. Morris and Rev. Samuel B. Chilton, respectively, and submit herewith sundry statements, together with the following related comments:

The account of the Operating and Investment Funds, considered as a whole, embraces miscellaneous funds for general church administrative and extension purposes in the Diocese, and the cash funds for the purposes designated and derived mainly from churches, auxiliary organizations, individuals, etc.

In the verification of the amounts shown as accruing to the general account from the various sources enumerated above, we have not gone beyond the records of your Treasurer, but have relied substantially on a check of all recorded receipts and disbursements.

The form of the statements presented herewith is in conformity with that requested by your Treasurer.

Exhibit "A" reflects the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Diocese at December 31, 1954.

Exhibits "B" through "G" reflect the receipts and disbursements of sundry diocesan operations.

Exhibits "H," "H-1" and "I" pertain to the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia and reflect their financial condition, details of securities held and the additions and reductions to principal and income of the various funds, respectively.

The Treasurer of the Diocese of Virginia holds twenty shares of \$5.00 preferred General Motors Corporation stock for the "John Moncure School, Inc.," an inactive corporation. The income from this security is credited by the Treasurer to the John Moncure School account.

The Diocese has for the past ten years paid \$1,000.00 annually to the Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society under a policy of restoring to the General Reserve Fund the amount of \$11,475.00, representing a loss to the Trustees incurred in 1943 from the cancellation of a mortgage held on Immanuel Church of Alexandria, Virginia. This loss was restored in full by the payment during the year of the balance of \$1,475.00.

Cash receipts as recorded were traced to bank deposits and cash disbursements were represented by cancelled checks properly endorsed. Bank reconciliations were effected at December 31, 1954, with amounts reported directly to us by the depositories.

Accounts and loans receivable (Exhibit "A") were not verified beyond office records.

Notes receivable were examined by us and notes payable were confirmed by the holders thereof.

Investments (Exhibit "H-1") held by the First and Merchants National Bank, Custodian, were inspected by us.

Notes payable (Exhibits "A" and "H") were confirmed by the holders. Receipted bills and invoices supporting expenditures were substantially tested and found to be in order.

III. THE TRUSTEES OF THE FUNDS OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

THE REV. G. MACLAREN BRYDON, D. D., Treasurer

To the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, Richmond, Virginia.

GENTLEMEN:

We have examined the records of account relating to the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia for the year ended December 31, 1954, and in connection therewith we have prepared the accompanying statements which, in our opinion, reflect the changes that have occurred in the various funds during the year 1954 and show their status at the close of the year.

Exhibit "A" sets forth the assets and fund balances at December 31. 1954.

Exhibit "B" reflects the total increases and decreases during the year and the year-end balances of both fund principal and income of the individual funds of the general group, and of the Disabled Clergy, Widows' and Orphans' and Sallie May Dooley Funds.

In the allotting of income to the various individual funds, your Treasurer has apportioned net income to the funds on a basis of 4.3% of the average monthly balance of principal, except in the case of specified securities held for certain funds, in which case the income was allocated as received from the respective investment.

Pursuant to a resolution adopted at the regular annual meeting of the Trustees of the Funds on January 23, 1951, the following plan of procedure for the handling of funds entrusted to the Trustees by various vestries and parishes became effective as of January 1, 1952:

"That deposits now held and those received in future be handled on the basis of a bank deposit, the depositors not sharing in any enhancement in investments in the event of withdrawals, either partial or full withdrawals, the amount of the deposit remaining fixed.

"That the Finance Committee be directed to credit to reserve funds one-eighth (1/8) of yearly income before general distribution, until the reserve fund is of sufficient amount to give ample margin of protection to deposits.

"That earnings on the invested funds be disbursed to the depositors in such percentage and at such time as may be determined by the Finance Committee.

"That a uniform receipt be given for deposits."

Changes in the General Investment Income during the year are set forth in Exhibit "B" and are restated in summary form as follows:

Recorded receipts were traced to bank deposits and recorded disbursements by the Treasurer were represented by cancelled checks properly endorsed. Cash on deposit was reconciled with amounts reported to us by the depositories.

Invoices or other evidence in support of charges to the operating account were examined by us.

Securities comprising the invested funds were verified by actual inspection and amounts as called for as of December 31, 1954, were satisfactorily established. A summary of investments is set forth in Exhibit "H."

ADDENDA

Changes in the Constitution and Canons Adopted by the Diocesan Council in 1955

Constitution

1. Whenever the word "Convention" appears in the Constitution and Canons it shall be changed from "Convention" to "Council."

2. Whenever the words "Executive Council" appear in the Constitution and Canons, the words "Executive Committee" be substituted therefor.

A new Article to be numbered Article XV and to read as follows:

"All baptized members of the Protestant Episcopal Church residing in this Diocese shall, as heretofore, constitute a Missionary Society known as the Diocesan Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

"The direction and activities of this Society shall be identical with those of the Executive Committee of the Council and shall be solely directed be said Committee."

CANONS

Amend Canon XV, Section 8, to read:

"Section 8. A list of all Missions under the Department of Missions shall be published separately in the Council Journal."

Amend Canon XXVIII, last line of Section 8, by substituting the words "Department of Christian Stewardship" for the words "Committee on Finance."

Amend Canon XVII, Section 10, by deleting the words "not however less than four."

Amend Canon X, Section 1 (1), by deleting the word "Goochland"; and Section 1 (4), by making it read:

"The Richmond Convocation, comprising all parishes in Henrico County, Goochland County, and in the City of Richmond north of the James River."

Amend Canon IX, Section 4, second paragraph of sub-section (d), to read:

"Thereafter, the Executive Committee shall, at its first meeting after Council, elect one-third of the membership of each Board to serve for a term of three years, who upon completion of the three-year term will not be eligible for re-election for a period of one year. In the event of a vacancy in any Board by reason of death, resignation or other cause, the Executive Committee shall elect a member to fill the unexpired term, and upon the completion of this term this person shall be eligible for election in his own right for his own term upon the Board."

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
