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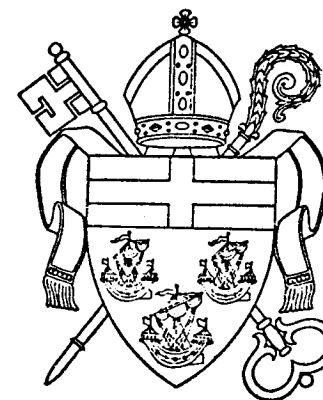

LEGAL TITLES FOR MAKING BEQUESTS

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, grant, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the Episcopates and for any other purpose of said Church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is: "The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia."

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is: "The Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia."

The legal title of the Theological Seminary in Virginia is: "Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia."

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is: "Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia," chartered by the Virginia Legislature to give financial aid to men preparing for the ministry of the Church.

The legal title of the Episcopal High School is: "Protestant Episcopal High School in Virginia."

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of Schools under the control of the Diocese is: "Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia," a corporation chartered under the Laws of Virginia.

The legal title of the Blue Ridge School is: "The Blue Ridge School, Incorporated."

The Shrine Mont Endowment Fund Form of Bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, a corporation under the laws of Virginia."

The Virginia Diocesan Homes Form of Bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Trustees of The Virginia Diocesan Homes, Incorporated, a corporation under the laws of Virginia."

(The above Form applies to the Goodwin House Alexandria).

The legal title of Bloomfield is: Bloomfield, Incorporated.

Bequests for work outside the Diocese of Virginia, but in Continental United States, its possessions, or overseas should be made to: "The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America,"

The legal title of the Church Home for Ladies is: "The Protestant Episcopal Church Home," chartered by the Virginia Legislature. Address: 206 North Thompson Street, Richmond, Va. 23221.

The legal title of Stuart Hall, owned and controlled by the three Dioceses of Virginia, Southern Virginia and Southwestern Virginia, is: "Stuart Hall, Incorporated," chartered under the Laws of Virginia. Address: Staunton, Va.

"St. Paul's Endowment Fund, Incorporated."

"All Saints' Endowment Fund, Incorporated."

"St. Stephen's Endowment Fund, Incorporated."

"Grace and Holy Trinity Endowment Fund, Incorporated."

"St. John's Endowment Fund." (St. John's Church, Richmond, income needs.)

"St. John's Foundation." (St. John's Church, Richmond, for maintenance as a National historical shrine.)

"Westminster-Canterbury, Corporation, Richmond, Virginia. Organized in December, 1971, by The Virginia Diocesan Homes and Westminster-Canterbury Homes to be the successor of the Cary Montague Home. The Westminster-Canterbury form of bequest: "I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Trustees of the Westminster-Canterbury, Corporation, a Corporation under the laws of Virginia."

ORGANIZATION

ARTICLE III of the Constitution of this Diocese: Section 1 (b)

(b) The clerical order shall consist of the Bishop or Bishops and all other ministers canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia. No member of the clerical order under ecclesiastical censure shall be entitled to a seat in the Council.

CANON I, Section 1. A list of all the ordained Ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in this Diocese, with their respective post office addresses, cures, stations and positions, shall be prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority and kept, corrected up to date, on file at the headquarters of the Diocese.

This list shall be prima facie evidence of a clergyman's canonical residence, and his cure, station or position.

Section 2. The right of any clergyman to vote in the Council shall, if challenged, be determined by the Council itself according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, whether his name be inserted in, or omitted from, the list.

Section 3. The official list of the clergy of the Diocese with the names of those entitled to vote in the Council designated thereon, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the roll of the clerical delegates entitled to vote shall be determined from it.

The list of the clergy submitted to the Council shall be appended to the Journal, and be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

Section 4. Every clergyman canonically resident in the Diocese shall attend every meeting of the Council; or, if unable to attend, shall send to the President of the Council a written statement of the reasons for his absence.

CANON II, Section 4. The Secretary of the Council shall make a roll of the Lay Delegates and Alternates certified to him as duly elected, with their respective Parishes, Separate Congregations and Mission Churches. The President shall appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one Clergyman and two Lay Delegates. The Committee shall make its report to the Council promptly. Until this report be received the roll as made by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authentic roll of Lay Delegates and Alternates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of the Lay Delegate or Alternate to his seat, the Committee on Credentials shall hear the evidence presented and report its judgment. Upon this report the Council shall determine the matter unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present the Council decides to hear the whole case de novo.

RULES OF ORDER

1. Order of Business

1. The Council shall be opened on the first day with a brief service of prayer. On the second and third days of Council there shall be prayer services within the Program of Council. There will be a celebration of the Holy Communion during the Council at which time there may be a sermon.

2. Upon the completion of the service of prayer on the first day, the Secretary shall report the presence (or lack of it) of a quorum.

3. Following the report of the Secretary that a quorum is present, the Council shall adopt a "Program of Council".

4. (A) There shall be appointed by the President prior to Council and announced on the first day of Council the following committees, to consist of an equal number of each order, unless otherwise directed:

(1) Committee on New Parishes, whenever such a committee is needed.

(2) Committee on Canons, to whom shall be referred all resolutions to amend either the Canons or the Constitution.

(3) Committee on Nominations. The Committee shall nominate a requisite number of persons to fill all vacancies in membership on the Boards of Diocesan-related corporations for which nominations must be made by the Council, and to which Committee all nominations for membership of any of such Boards shall be referred for their consideration before being presented to Council. The Committee shall also nominate a requisite number of persons for election by the Council to represent this Diocese in the Virginia Council of Churches. The Committee shall also nominate a requisite number of persons for election by the Council to the Executive Board of the Council.

(4) Committee on Minutes, who shall hear and approve the reading of the Minutes of the Council after each day's sessions.

(5) Committee on Public Relations, who shall act as a liaison with representatives of the press and with the public in furnishing and interpreting information concerning actions of the Council.

(6) Committee on the Budget to whom shall be referred the annual budget and all resolutions and matters pertaining thereto. It is not the function of this committee to prepare the budget but to receive it for consideration at the meeting of the Council. The majority of the committee shall be persons not members of the Executive Board at the time of their appointment.

(7) Committee on Resolutions and Petitions. As many proposed resolutions as possible shall be forwarded to the Secretary at least two weeks before the Council so that they may be edited, mimeographed and mailed to all delegates and to the Chairman of this Committee.

(8) A Committee on the Journal of the Council, composed of three persons of whom the Secretary of the Diocese shall be one, and of either order, to whom shall be referred all matters to be printed in the Annual Journal of the Council, which said Committee shall have power to act during recess of the Council and report to the Council.

(B) The President shall appoint the committees named herein and such other committees as he or Council shall desire.

5. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, members of the Executive Committee of the Council, Deputies to the Synod or the General Convention, Chancellor of the Diocese, and Registrar shall be made at the first session of the Council and the names shall be placed upon a ballot or ballots to be voted upon at an hour to be specified for the election of these and such other officers, representatives and committees as need be chosen.

If only the number of persons to be elected shall be placed in nomination, the Secretary (upon proper motion) shall cast the vote of the Council in favor of such nominees.

6. In every election where more persons are nominated than are to be elected, the balloting shall be:

(a) On the first ballot any nominee having a majority of all the votes cast shall be declared elected.

(b) If any office then remains to be filled, a second ballot shall be taken. On this and on subsequent ballots the number of nominees remaining shall be reduced by half, but such reduction shall not result in less than twice the number of offices remaining to be filled, and the manner of such reduction shall be by retaining as nominees those persons receiving the higher numbers of votes on the preceding ballot. After the deputies to the Synod or the General Convention have been elected, a ballot shall be taken for their alternates. The proper number receiving the highest number of votes on this ballot shall be declared alternates in the order of the highest number of votes received.

(c) A ballot cast for other than the exact number of vacancies to be filled shall not be counted.

(d) In event of an impasse, declared to be such by the presiding officer, the Council may change or modify Section (b) of this rule by a majority vote of members present, notwithstanding the requirement of Rule #28 for a two-thirds vote.

II. RULES OF PROCEDURE

7. Every resolution shall be submitted in writing to the Secretary prior to the end of the first session or by 4:30 p.m. on the day of that session, whichever is the earlier. (That session begins at 2:00 p.m. on Friday, January 22, 1972). Such submission to the Secretary shall constitute presentation to the Council sufficient for referral to the appropriate committee. Every resolution shall be referred to the appropriate committee to be considered and reported on before debate by Council. The title or subject matter of the resolution and the committee to which the resolution has been referred shall be stated by the Secretary immediately prior to adjournment of the first session.

8. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the President, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary. After a motion is so stated or read, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.

9. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the President or any member require it.

10 (A) When a motion is pending, the following amendments shall be in order: (1) One amendment may be made to each independent or separable portion thereof; and (2) one motion to amend that amendment shall be in order; and it shall be in order also (3) to offer a further amendment by way of substitute to which may be offered (4) one amendment.

(B) No proposition not germane to the subject under consideration shall be received under color of an amendment or a substitute. Neither the substitute nor its amendment shall be voted on (except to lay on the table) until the original matter is perfected. An amendment or a substitute may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of his seconder before amendment thereof or before decision is had thereon.

(C) The amendment or the substitute shall be debatable only when the main question is debatable.

(D) The adoption of an amendment by way of substitute or otherwise shall not displace the main resolution, which, after being amended, shall be the question before the Council.

(E) The following questions cannot be amended: (1) The call for the Order of the Day, (2) an appeal from the decision of the Chair, (3) an objection to consideration of any question, or the motions, (4) to adjourn, (5) to lay on the table, (6) to take from the table, (7) for leave to continue speaking, (8) to postpone indefinitely, (9) to reconsider, (10) to suspend rules, (11) to take up business out of order, or (12) for leave to withdraw a motion.

(F) The Order of decision of a question before the Council shall be:

(1) Amendment to the Amendment of the main question.

(2) Amendment to the main question.

(3) Amendment to the substitute motion.

(4) The substitute motion.

(5) If the substitute fails, then the main question.

11. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to (1) adjourn, (2) to lay on the table, (3) for the previous question, (4) to take a vote at a certain time, (5) to commit or recommit, (6) to amend or substitute, (7) to postpone to a certain day, (8) to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated and be settled by a majority vote.

12. A motion for the previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the previous question or questions before the Council now be put?" If the previous question is voted only the immediately pending questions before the Council shall be put without debate.

13. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

14. When a member desires to speak in debate or present any matter to the Council, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personalities.

15. If any member transgress the rules of the Council, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, unless permitted to explain. If the ruling of the President be appealed from, the Council shall decide the appeal without debate.

16. When two or more members rise at once, the President shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

17. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.

18. The vote on all questions shall be taken by orders, whenever as many as five members request it.

19. Any member may call for a division of the question where the sense will admit of it, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

20. Every member who may be in the house when any question is put shall give his vote, unless the Council, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

21. No member shall vote upon a question in the decision of which he is immediately and personally interested.

22. When a question has been decided by the Council or postponed indefinitely, it may be reconsidered upon motion made by a member voting in the majority provided such motion be made on the same or next succeeding day of the session.

23. Reports of all committees shall be in writing. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the President shall, without obligation, so direct, or when the Council shall so require. But such reports shall be published in full in the Journal unless otherwise ordered.

III. General

24. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.

25. The President may, at his discretion, select suitable seats without the limits of those allotted to the use of the members, which shall be appropriated to the accommodation of visiting clergymen and candidates for Orders, who may be invited by the rector or wardens of the church in which the meetings of the Council are held, under the direction of the President and Council.

26. All persons elected by the Council or the Executive Board of the Council, as officials of the Diocese, or its Departments, shall, by virtue of their respective offices, be entitled to a seat and voice, but no vote, at all meetings of the Council. This Rule shall apply also to elected Lay members of the Executive Board.

27. No spectators shall, during the daily session of the Council, be admitted above or within the pews allotted to the members, and the rector and wardens of the church in which the sessions of the Council are held are directed to see that this rule is enforced.

28. No rule of order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

The 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, meeting at the Shenandoah College and Conservatory of Music, Winchester, Virginia, January 21, 22 and 23, 1972 opened with devotions led by the Rev. Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., at 2:00 P.M.

The Council was called to order by the Rt. Rev. Robert F. Gibson, Jr., Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia at 2:15 P.M.

The Rev. Charles F. Glaenzer, Secretary of the Diocese, reported a quorum present in both orders.

Bishop Gibson recognized Mr. Glaenzer to make a nomination for Secretary of the Diocese. Mr. Glaenzer nominated Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer. There being no further nominations, motion was made, seconded and passed that the Secretary cast an unanimous ballot for Mr. Palmer.

Bishop Gibson expressed his appreciation to Mr. Glaenzer for his work as Secretary during the past two years.

Mr. Palmer took his seat as Secretary and appointed as Assistant Secretaries, The Rev. David H. Lewis, Jr., and The Rev. Jack N. Eby.

The Rev. John A. Baden, host Rector of Christ Church, Winchester, welcomed the Council and introduced Dr. Robert P. Parker, President of Shenandoah College and Conservatory of Music, who in turn welcomed the meeting of the Council to the College and Conservatory.

The Rev. Mr. Baden moved the adoption of the Program of Council as printed. This was seconded and passed.

The Rev. Mr. Baden moved the adoption of the Rules of Order as printed in the Pre-Council Journal. This was seconded.

The Rev. J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr. moved a change in Rule of Order #12.

The Hon. George R. Humrickhouse, Chancellor of the Diocese, raised a question concerning the wording which he had sent to Mr. Lowe in response to the resolution adopted at the last Annual Council meeting and read the full text of the change which he had suggested to Mr. Lowe.

The Rev. Reno S. Harp, Jr., D.D., moved the substitution of the Chancellor's wording for Mr. Lowe's motion. This was seconded, but after discussion, the substitute was defeated and Mr. Lowe's motion was passed as follows:

RULE OF ORDER #12

A motion for the previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the question or questions before this Council now be put?" If the previous question is voted only the immediately pending questions before the Council shall be put without debate.

The Rev. John S. Spong moved that the applicable and possible parts of Recommendation V, Page 70, pre-Council Booklet, be used by this Council in its implementation of Rule of Order 4 A (6). (With the suggestion by the Chair that the words "Program and Budget Committee" be substituted for the words "The Finance Department of the Diocese").

RECOMMENDATION #V

At the time of the budget presentation specific resolutions to increase, decrease, add or delete specific line items be received and referred to the Council Budget Committee; that debate and vote be allowed only on those line items about which there is a specific resolution; that the Council Budget Committee conduct open hearings on these specific resolutions and report back to the Council with a recommendation for or against each resolution or an alternate resolution; that debate be limited to ten minutes on each recommendation of the Council Budget Committee; that the Council be instructed to present a balanced budget; that any contingency fund remaining when the budget is adopted shall be expended by the Executive Board; that the Program and Budget Committee be instructed to include a contingency item in its proposed budget which can be added to or deleted from in the course of debate and action.

This was seconded.

Mr. William Rotch, Chairman of the Council Committee on the Budget questioned this change as did the Rev. Robert W. Duvall and Dr. Robert Smoak. Mr. Richard H. C. Taylor and Mr. John Martin supported the change.

The Bishop then called for the question. As the voice vote was close, he took a vote by show of hands, and declared the motion adopted.

The Rev. James M. Green moved a new Rule of Order #29, concerning the election of a parliamentarian for Council. After a brief discussion, this was defeated.

The Chancellor, Mr. George R. Humrickhouse, moved the following change in the Rule of Order 4 A concerning a Committee on the Journal of the Council, as a new sub-paragraph #8. This was seconded and passed as follows:

RULE OF ORDER 4 A - Sub-paragraph #8

A Committee on the Journal of the Council, composed of three persons of whom the Secretary of the Diocese shall be one, and of either order, to whom shall be referred all matters to be printed in the Annual Journal of the Council, which said Committee shall have power to act during recess of the Council and report to the Council.

A motion was made that the Rules of Order as printed and amended be adopted. This was seconded and passed.

The Rev. Bruce H. Campbell, Chairman of the Committee on Credentials, reported all credentials in order, with the exception of the following: Holy Cross, Afton, Greenwood Parish, Albemarle County; Mission Church of Our Saviour, Montpelier, St. Martin's Parish, Hanover County; St. David's Parish, Aylett, King William County and Piedmont Church, Madison, Gibson-with-Neve Parish, Madison County. (The following was later approved by the Committee on Credentials: Mission Church of Our Saviour, Montpelier).

Mr. A. R. Dunning introduced the Rev. J.L.B. Williams, a former Priest of the Diocese of Virginia and asked that he be given a seat without voice or vote. This was passed unanimously.

Bishop Gibson announced the appointment of the Committees of Council. (Listed under "Committees").

Bishop Gibson called for nominations for Treasurer of the Diocese, Mr. Frederick M. Morris was nominated and there being no further nominations, motion was made, seconded and passed that the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Council for Mr. Morris.

Bishop Gibson called for nominations for Clerical members of The Standing Committee. After considerable discussion, with regard to the possible effect of the adoption of Restructure proposals, the following were placed in nomination: The Rev. Messrs. Reno S. Harp, Jr., D.D., W. Holt Souder, Boyd R. Howarth, D.D., Francis M. Cooper, Robert H. Lyles, Allen J. Green, David J.W. Ward, Edward Morgan, III, Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., John S. Spong, Alfred St. J. Matthews, James P. Lincoln, Henry B. Mitchell, Richard C. Fell, James T. Alves and James M. Green.

Upon motion of the Rev. Charles R. Allen, the Chair declared the Nominations closed.

The Chair called for nominations for Lay members of The Standing Committee. The following were nominated: Messrs. Harold Gouldman, J. Chisman Hanes, Stephen D. Waters, Malcolm E. Hardy, Thomas M. Carruthers, Mrs. Priscilla Howe, M. B. Markey, Jr., Reuben A. Clay, Peter V. S. Myers, James B. Roberts, Mrs. C. Hill Carter, Richard H. Catlett, Jr., Mac Eason Rein, George L. Gordon, Richard H. C. Taylor, W. Tayloe Murphy, III, John E. Dillard, James C. Davis, III, William Rotch and Mrs. Mary Ann Elwood. Mr. Armistead Boothe, who had been nominated, requested that his name be withdrawn. His request was granted and the Chair declared the nominations closed.

The Chair called for nominations for Clerical Deputies to the General Convention which will meet in Louisville, Kentucky in 1973. The following were nominated: The Rev. Messrs. J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr., James M. Green, John R. Frizzell, Jr., John D. Chappell, Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., Henry B. Mitchell, David J. Greer, John S. Spong, Richard R. Baker, III, Alfred St. J. Matthews, Henry A. Blake, Edward L. Merrow, Albert T. Mollegen, Thomas G. Faulkner, Jr., William Sydnor, F. Daniel Montague, Holland B. Clark, James P. Lincoln, Allie Frazier and Gary K. Price. The Very Rev. G. Cecil Woods, Jr., was nominated but was declared ineligible as he is not canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia. Motion was made, seconded and passed that nominations be closed and the Chair so declared.

The Chair called for nominations for Lay Deputies to General Convention. The following were nominated: Messrs. Walter R. Tinsley, The Hon. Thomas C. Gordon, Jr., Mr. George R. Humrickhouse, A. R. Palmer requested that his name be withdrawn and his nominator agreed. The Chair declared the nominations closed.

After a brief "seventh inning stretch", Bishop Gibson delivered his Pastoral Address.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

GREETINGS to this 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia. Grace be unto you and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

IN Memoriam

Since the last Annual Council we have lost by death seven of our clergy, five of our retired priests, and two while still active. Memorials are prepared and will be printed in the Journal. We shall especially remember these our departed brethren in the service of Holy Communion on Sunday.

Organization and Restructure

This address must of necessity confine itself in the time permitted to the business affairs of the Diocese. Uninspiring as our routine tasks may seem, we are the legislative and governing body of this Diocese. This is our primary responsibility. It is our Christian business.

The most important matter before this meeting is the proposed restructure of the diocesan organization. We have spent more than three years in this process. We have used our time and energy, we have diverted our attention from other tasks for too long. The time has come to act.

Let me make my position completely clear. I believe that the proposed restructure should be adopted. I accept the proposals before us and expect them to improve the functioning of the Diocese. It should be added that Bishops Hall and Smith concur in this judgment.

The last Annual Council by resolution approved in general the plan of Diocesan organization proposed by the Restructure Committee. The constitutional and canonical changes which are before you are in the form approved by the overwhelming straw vote of the last Council. I believe that the members of this Council understand the need and support that former approval.

The transition to a restructured organization has been a controlling factor in the program and procedure of this meeting. Elections must be postponed until after we have acted on the proposed changes. An open hearing for the Committee on Constitution and Canons is scheduled for this evening, in place of any other Council business. The Committee will report for Council's action as the first order of business tomorrow morning.

There is some criticism and disagreement regarding certain details. These should be resolved at the open hearing tonight. Only experience can prove which is the better way. Canonical details can, and no doubt will, be changed next year and in succeeding years as experience guides us. This Council should initiate our restructured organization. It does not settle the final and detailed form.

Therefore I hope that Council will be prepared tomorrow to accept the proposed changes substantially as presented at that time by the Committee on Constitution and Canons. The better time to plead for amendments is at the open hearing tonight.

I hope that amendments on the floor of Council will be limited or unnecessary. We should understand that we do not have the time to debate individually the many proposed changes. We should also understand that it is impossible to restructure in a piecemeal manner. Only when restructure is settled can we proceed with our normal and necessary Council business.

There is also a further problem of transition from the present to the new structure. Time must be provided for the organization of the proposed Regions and for elections at the local level of the new Executive Board. To this end I have recommended a canonical provision for the present Executive Committee, and its agencies, to continue in service until the end of June, by which time the new organization should be fully effective.

Proposed Changes in National Constitution

Certain proposed changes in our National Constitution, passed on first reading at the General Convention in Houston, are required to be made known to the Council or Convention of every Diocese before they can be adopted at the next General Convention.

These proposals are printed in the last two pages of the Pre-Council Journal. No action is required by this Council. The changes have my full approval. (See INDEX)

Council Program Committee

In response to requests from members of Council, your Executive Committee, by resolution on February 3, 1971, requested the Bishop to appoint a Council Program Committee to make recommendations about the agenda, the time, and the place of Council meetings.

This committee, under the Chairmanship of the Rev. Henry Mitchell, was appointed and made interesting and helpful suggestions to the Bishop. Their eighteen recommendations are printed in the Pre-Council Journal, page 69-72.

I consider this a most important subject. Council continues to grow in size, complexity of activities, and need of special facilities. It is increasingly difficult to find adequate facilities, and there are no church buildings outside of Richmond which can comfortably seat the Council members.

The special needs of this meeting made it impossible to use the program as proposed by the committee. It should be noted further that the resolution of the last Annual Council regarding preliminary workshops was impossible of implementation because facilities were not available on this opening day.

I note especially two of the committee's recommendations: First, that we meet only on Friday and Saturday, omitting the present Sunday session; and second, that we meet in October rather than January. I reserve judgment on both of these, but point out certain problems.

A two-day meeting would not have been adequate for the business of the last several Councils. It can be achieved only by radical curtailment of customary business. And, an October meeting date would on alternate years be in conflict with the General Convention, and further would require considerable pre-Council work during the month of August, which is widely used for vacations. A meeting date in the Fall has some advantages, but it would require delegation of authority for the annual budget, which cannot be determined until pledges are received from the parishes.

I do not feel that this Council is prepared to make final decisions about the place, date or content of future meetings. We are faced with serious problems, and in my judgment we need further and intensive study of all of these questions.

Relationship with Institutions and Corporations

The last meeting of Council requested the Bishop to appoint a Committee to study the relationship of the Diocese and its related institutions and corporations. This committee, under the chairmanship of the Rev. Boyd R. Howarth has made a thorough investigation of institutions and corporations. I commend their report and especially their recommendation of defined categories of relationship.

Commission on Diocesan Boundaries

The Joint Commission on Diocesan Boundaries has continued to meet and diligently work for a second year. In their report to the three Dioceses they recommend greater inter-diocesan cooperation as an immediate goal, but they do not recommend any particular plan of division. They have appointed a special small committee, which will use the extensive study material already prepared, to draw up a statement of four or five alternate plans for the possible re-structure of the Episcopal Church in the State of Virginia. These plans, when completed, will be publicized jointly in the three Dioceses for consideration and reaction.

I commend these plans, when published, for serious evaluation. Guided by them I hope that we can find the best plan for the future to render the most effective service of the Episcopal Church throughout this Commonwealth. The Joint Commission deserves the sincere gratitude of the three Dioceses for this important work.

Roslyn

The Roslyn Advisory Committee has worked extensively during the year, and through their recommendations the Memorial Trustees have formed a Roslyn Management Corporation. I am convinced that this is a creative and forward step in the planning, program and management of Roslyn. Members of the Advisory Committee will be Directors of the new Roslyn Management Corporation. I concur, therefore, in their recommendation that Canon XXVII, providing for such an Advisory Committee, be deleted.

Program Budget

The proposed program budget for 1972 is disappointing, but is, I believe, the best that can be provided on the basis of pledged income. Fifty-two churches increased their pledges over 1971, for which we are deeply grateful, but twenty-three churches were required to decrease their pledges, leaving but a small gain for 1972.

It should be noted that this does not represent a decline in Christian giving. Total parish income has continued to increase during each of the past five years, in our parishes by considerably more than a million dollars. But increased fixed costs, and higher clergy remuneration, on all levels of church life, have required the curtailment or elimination of former programs. I expect this trend to continue, and therefore we must learn to adjust our planning and our activities.

In this regard I call attention to two of our budget items. We have formerly offered \$200.00 per year as scholarships to each of our clergy children in college. The income is not available to continue this practice, and the budget provides only for our commitments in the present academic year. I assure the clergy who will have children in college next year that, if there is real hardship resulting from this curtailment, I will find discretionary funds for continued scholarships for any of the clergy who appeal directly to me.

The second item is the diocesan subsidy to assist our program of camps for youth, a program of which we can all be proud. We have been able to budget the same amount for 1972 as that in 1971, but the fixed costs of the camps have increased and the program will be considerably more costly this year. Special gifts have aided the camps for many years. It may well not be proper, wise or possible to support this program more extensively from diocesan income. But I sincerely hope that, through individual or parish support, no child in this Diocese will be denied the privilege of church camps because the required charges are too high.

* * * * *

I regret that this address has dealt exclusively with business matters. I am adjusting, as we all must, to the demands of this period of change in all areas of life. More flexibility for change is urgently needed, and I believe that our restructure will help us to this end. But the necessity for material business, and some forms of structure will remain.

As Christians, therefore, we must learn to handle this without distraction from our primary call to glorify God, to proclaim His saving Gospel, and to serve His children wherever there is need. The Bishop Coadjutor will address this Council at the Holy Communion service on Sunday morning, freed from the constraints of business, and leading us into opportunities of higher service.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Ghost, be with us all evermore.

He presented to Bishop Gibson a check for \$1,000.00 to be known as the John C. and Ethel N. Davis Fund and on their demises as the John C. and Ethel N. Davis Memorial Fund. The document accompanying the gift is as follows:

In Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the privilege of serving for thirty-five years in the Ministry and particularly for twelve years in the Diocese of Virginia, I present to the Diocese of Virginia a check for one thousand dollars to be used as follows:

1. To be invested (principal) in the name of the John C. and Ethel N. Davis Fund. After our demises it shall be known as the John C. and Ethel N. Davis Memorial Fund.
2. The income from the said Fund shall be for the General Church and Diocesan Budget (each year) on a pro-rata basis. (For example, if the Diocese gives 33% of its total budget for a given year to the General Church, 33% of this Fund shall go to the General Church and 67% to the Diocesan Budget."

Bishop Gibson expressed his deep appreciation for the generous gift.

The Rev. Jennings W. Hobson moved an amendment to Canon III, Section 1, -Eligibility of Deputies to General Convention.

The Rev. Sherodd Albritton presented an amendment to Canon XVIII, Section 8 - To permit a Vestry for a Church under Supervision.

Mr. George D. Williams presented an amendment to Canon VIII, Section 3 - Parishes and Regions.

The Rev. Dwight D. Duncan presented an amendment to Canon X, Section 1 - Program of Worship of a Church.

The Rev. Richard R. Baker, III presented a Resolution on Proportionate Giving.

Dr. Robert Smoak submitted the Program Budget as circulated to the members of Council.

Mr. Charles E. Tomlin, Jr., moved the following Resolution:

That any amount of excess in the prepared budget and/or any additional monies received be added the line item 'The Christian Education of People in the Parishes' until \$1400.00 be added to make the total amount of the line item \$3,000.00.

The above resolution was referred to the Council Committee on the Budget.

The Rev. J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr., raised the question as to whether line items could be changed in the Budget under the new Rule.

The Rev. John S. Spong replied that there was full opportunity to persuade the Council Budget Committee to make changes.

The Rev. Treadwell Davison moved two resolutions - One providing \$200.00 for the Committee on Evangelism and the other providing \$200.00 for Study of our Opportunity and responsibility to Community Colleges within the Diocese.

These resolutions were referred to the Council Committee on the Budget.

The Rev. John S. Spong presented a resolution concerning fulfilling of the full request of the General Church.

This resolution was referred to the Council Budget Committee.

Bishop Hall introduced the new clergy now at work in the Diocese, as follows:

NEW DEACONS: The Rev. Messrs. Michael Bye, Dwight Douglass Duncan, Dale E. Mekeel, Stephen F. Noll and John G. Steed.

OTHER CLERGY: The Rev. Charles D. Curran, Jr., William R. Dennis, Jr., Steirling G. Gordon, Alden M. Hathaway, Thomas R. Lamond, William H. Marmion, Jr., Stanton R. Ramsey, William P. Scheel, David A. Scott, John O. von Hemert.

CLERGY WORKING IN THE DIOCESE UNDER LICENSE OF THE BISHOP: The Rev. Messrs. Glenn E. Busch, Randall L. Prior, John S. Ruef, William F. Myers.

The Rev. Boyd R. Howarth, D.D. gave a brief oral report in support of his printed report in the pre-Council Journal.

The Rev. W. Holt Souder presented the report of the Virginia Diocesan Homes by title. He informed Council of the formation of the Westminster-Canterbury Corporation growing out of the common concern for the care of the elderly by Presbyterians and Episcopalians in the Richmond area.

The Rev. Mr. Spong moved that Rule 7 of the Rules of Order be suspended and that resolutions in writing with regard to the Budget be submitted to the Secretary up to 9:00 a.m., Saturday, January 22, and that the Secretary announce those resolutions on Saturday morning. The motion was seconded and passed.

Mr. Armistead Boothe gave the Report on the Virginia Theological Seminary as follows:

I want to thank all of you and Bishop Gibson for the opportunity to report to you on the behaviour of the child you beget in 1823, The Virginia Theological Seminary, during the past year. The news is good. We have 183 students, comprising three excellent classes of candidates

for the Master of Divinity degree, and others doing special and graduate work. They represent forty different professions or job types. Two-thirds are married. Two-thirds of the married women work. More than half have served in one of the four branches of the military service.

Twenty percent do not have short hair. But only a few wear hair longer than that on Michael Angelo's superb statue of David in Florence, Italy. Five percent grow beards. But none of these beards look as bad as that in my photograph of great-uncle Lewis Armistead, who led Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg.

They continue to study the timeless truths of Christianity and their realistic applicability in these fast moving days.

All children write home for money. This is your Seminary, your child. This child has an annual budget of \$1.2 million. A powerfully large sum. Yet your child stands next to the lowest, percent-wise, of any of the twelve accredited Episcopal Seminaries. And the little boy needs 1/6th of his budget, or, \$200,000 00 in his allowance from you, from Annual Giving, that is, TEO, Friends and Year End.

And we could raise most of the essential \$200,000.00 in the seven founding dioceses, IF we could get from them a sum equal to \$1.00 from every communicant per year in those dioceses. And this is what we are seeking, and Lord willing, will seek until we find. Don't think this cannot be done. Just yesterday we received from a congregation of 122 communicants, a TEO check for \$750.00 or \$6.00 per person.

Of course, every year we want your hearts, your minds, and strength, more than we want your money. But we do want your hearts warm and not cold to the fact that there is no more worthy cause. We want your minds alert to the fact that we can help relieve you of the burden of taxation, both Federal and State, the burden upon both your incomes and your estates. We want to strengthen your strength by referring you to that old Biblical passage "He who saves his dough shall lose it but he who gives his dough shall save it." The worldly result of all this will be a happier you and a more grateful we.

Then parents and children together can stand with the Philips of this world, when the Nathaniels ask the question, "Can any good come out of Virginia?" In a thunderous response we shall hold out our arms together and say "Come and see".

Mr. A. R. Dunning moved a resolution concerning an Ad Hoc Committee on real estate (Mayo House)

The Rev. Harry Lee Hoffman submitted an amendment to the proposed canons-Pastoral Care of each Region assigned to a Bishop.

The Rev. Edward M. Gregory submitted an amendment to proposed Canon X - The title of Vicar.

The Rev. J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr. expressed concern that an appropriate resolution of thanks to the Rev. Dr. John C. Davis be drafted.

The Bishop assured Mr. Lowe that such a resolution would be welcome.

The Bishop declared the Council recessed at 4:45 p.m., until the 9:00 Service.

Saturday, Morning
January 22, 1972

The 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia reconvened at 9:00 a.m., with the opening devotions led by the Rev. Hollard R. Clark of Cuningham Chapel Parish.

The Secretary of the Council announced that a resolution from the Rev. John von Hemert regarding including the Episcopal Radio/TV Foundation in the Budget had been received and referred to the Council Budget Committee.

The Secretary of the Council announced that a resolution concerning the title on page 5 of the Budget, had been received from Mrs. Gordon Johnson and had been referred to the Council Budget Committee.

The Chair recognized Mr. Richard H. C. Taylor, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to present the report of the Committee.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was passed by two-thirds majority vote that Canon V concerning the Church Pension Fund be amended as follows:

CANON V

Section 1. Delete the following: "and the assumption of all duties and obligations thereunder, including the contract dated November 27, 1918, as amended April 1, 1946, between the Church Pension Fund and The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a copy of which is filed at the headquarters of the Diocese.", so that Section 1 as amended will read:

"The Diocese of Virginia hereby ratifies and confirms its adoption of the system of the Church Pension Fund."

Section 2. Delete the following: "and of the contract between the Church Pension Fund and The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia," so that the first paragraph of Section 2 as amended will read:

"In furtherance of the Church Pension Fund system, the Executive Board of the Council shall:" (As the proposals for Restructure were adopted the word "Committee" was changed to "Board".

Mr. Taylor moved that Canon XXVII concerning the Roslyn Advisory Committee be deleted. This was seconded and passed by two-thirds vote.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded, that the proposed new Canon concerning relationships between the Diocese of Virginia and any organizations or corporations not be adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Boyd Howarth spoke in favor of the proposed Canon because of the continuing question of the relationship of the Diocese and organizations and corporations.

Motion was passed, not to adopt.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded, that the proposed deletion of Canon III not be adopted. Motion passed and the deletion was not made.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed on second reading that Article III of the Constitution be adopted with the following amendments in Section 1 (c), (d), (e) and (f), as follows:

ARTICLE III

Section 1. (c) The lay order shall consist of two classes, namely:
(1) The lay delegates for the churches, and (2) the lay members ex officio.

(d) There shall be one lay delegate from each church, to be chosen by its Vestry or congregation. But from every church having more than three hundred communicants in good standing reported to the Diocesan authorities in the last annual report, there shall be an additional lay delegate for each three hundred communicants in good standing, or major fraction thereof, above the first three hundred.

(e) The lay members of the Standing Committee, the lay members of the Executive Board, the Chancellor and the President of the Episcopal Churchwomen of the Diocese, shall be members of the Council ex officio.

(f) Each elected delegate and ex officio member shall have one vote.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed that Article IV of the Constitution be adopted on second reading as follows:

ARTICLE IV

One-Fourth of the members of the clerical and one-fourth of the members of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or special meeting of the Council, but a smaller number may adjourn.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed that Article VI of the Constitution be adopted on second reading as follows:

ARTICLE VI

In addition to the Bishop of the Diocese, there may be a Bishop Coadjutor or Bishops Suffragan, or both, upon the conditions and pursuant to the authority contained in the Canons of the General Convention.

In addition to the Bishop, or Bishops, the officers of the Diocese shall consist of a Secretary, Treasurer, Chancellor, and a Registrar.

For the conduct of the affairs of the Diocese, there shall be a Standing Committee and an Executive Board, together with such other officers, committees, departments, and boards as the Council may deem desirable.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed that Article VIII of the Constitution be adopted on second reading as follows:

ARTICLE VIII

The Bishop shall preside at all meetings of the Council and exercise all the ordinary duties of a Presiding Officer. He may call a special meeting of the Council at whatever time and place he may think necessary, and whenever requested by the Standing Committee, it shall be his duty to call a special meeting to be held at the time and place selected by the Standing Committee.

The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside at any meeting of the Council from which the Bishop is absent, or whenever the Bishop may request him to preside.

A Suffragan Bishop, if there be such, may preside at sessions of a Council if he is requested to do so by the Bishop, being present, or, in the absence of the Bishop, by the Bishop Coadjutor, being present.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed that Article IX of the Constitution be adopted on second reading with the editorial changes, as follows:

ARTICLE IX

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office, a special meeting of the Council may be called by the Standing Committee; and the Council, immediately upon assembling, shall elect by ballot a President from among the Suffragan Bishops of the Diocese, or, if there be none, from among the order of Presbyters, who shall remain in office until the election and the consecration of a Bishop for the Diocese of Virginia or until the next regular meeting of the Council, whichever shall happen first. The President so elected shall perform all the duties and possess all the privileges of a presiding officer. He shall not have the power to call a special meeting of the Council except when requested so to do by the Standing Committee, in which case he shall call the special meeting at the time and place set by the Standing Committee.

If there be no vacancy in the Episcopal office, yet both the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor be absent from a meeting of the Council, then the Council shall elect by ballot a President pro tempore from among the Suffragan Bishops of the Diocese, or if there be none, from among the order of Presbyters.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed that Article X of the Constitution be adopted on second reading with the editorial changes, as follows:

ARTICLE X

A Secretary of the Council shall be elected at each regular meeting thereof. He shall take minutes of its proceedings, attest the public acts of the body, and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

In case of a vacancy in the office of the Secretary of the Council, arising when the Council is not in session, the Ecclesiastical Authority, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, shall fill the vacancy. If the standing Committee itself be the Ecclesiastical Authority, then the Standing Committee shall fill the vacancy.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed that Article XI of the Constitution be adopted on second reading with the editorial changes, as follows:

ARTICLE XI

A Treasurer of the Diocese shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee or by the Standing Committee if it is at the time the Ecclesiastical Authority. He shall, upon qualification, continue in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority or until removed as hereinafter provided. He shall receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be provided by Canon. He shall report annually to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same. The Treasurer shall give bond in an amount to be fixed by the Standing Committee, with corporate surety approved by the Standing Committee, which bond shall be conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of his office.

At the close of each fiscal year, accounts of the Treasurer shall be audited by a certified public accountant selected by the Standing Committee.

In case of the misconduct of the Treasurer, or of his incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, the Standing Committee shall remove him and a new appointment shall be made in the manner aforesaid.

The Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons moved for the Committee that Article XII with editorial changes be adopted on second reading. This was seconded.

ARTICLE XII

A Chancellor of the Diocese shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee or by the Standing Committee if it is at the time the Ecclesiastical Authority. He shall, upon qualification, continue in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Chancellor shall be a lay communicant in good standing of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia and a member of the Virginia State Bar. He shall be the legal advisor of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and of the Council.

The Rev. J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr., raised the question of the separation of powers of the Chancellor as legal advisor of the Ecclesiastical Authority and of the Council. Mr. Taylor responded for the Committee that they saw the Chancellor as the legal Advisor of the Ecclesiastical Authority and of the Council.

The Rev. Charles L. Johnson, a member of the Committee, said that the

Committee sees the Chancellor as the legal advisor to the Council through the Chair.

The Rev. Mr. Lowe stated that he would prefer to delete the words "and of the Council" and if it were in order that he would so move that amendment.

Bishop Gibson ruled that such an amendment was not in order but that if Article XII passed on second reading, such a motion to amend for first reading would be in order.

The Chancellor stated that he and the Rev. Mr. Lowe were in agreement regarding the wording "and of the Council".

After further brief discussion Article XII with editorial changes as proposed was adopted on second reading and the Chair ruled that it was in effect.

The Rev. Mr. Lowe then moved and it was seconded, that the words "and of the Council" be deleted. This was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons by the Chair.

(Near the close of Council, the Rev. Mr. Lowe raised the question privately regarding the proposed amendment he had submitted on this Article on Saturday. See note appended at the end of the report by the Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons on the Articles of the Constitution).

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed on second reading that Article XIII be adopted with the proposed editorial changes, as follows:

ARTICLE XIII

A Registrar of the Diocese shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee or by the Standing Committee if it is at the time the Ecclesiastical Authority. He shall, upon qualification, continue in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Registrar shall receive and preserve, under the direction of the Council or the Bishop, books, papers or other documents bearing upon the history of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia, and perform such other duties pertaining to his office as may be required of him by the Bishop, the Council or the Secretary of the Diocese.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and adopted on second reading that Article XIV be adopted with the proposed editorial changes, as follows:

ARTICLE XIV

The Standing Committee of the Diocese shall consist of twelve members, six of the clerical order and six of the lay order, each of whom shall be a communicant in good standing of the Church in this Diocese.

At each regular meeting the Council shall elect two members of each order for a term of three years. Each member of the Committee shall hold office for the term for which he was elected and until his successor is elected or appointed. No member shall be eligible to succeed himself.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office, or in case neither the Bishop or the Bishop Coadjutor be capable of performing the administrative duties of the Bishop, and in any case when the Bishop shall authorize it to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

The Standing Committee at every regular meeting of the Council shall submit a report of its proceedings. When required by the Council it shall also lay before the Council any document which may have come into its possession. It shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

In case of a vacancy in the Standing Committee the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy from the same order, the appointee to serve until the next regular meeting of the Council, at which meeting the Council shall fill the vacancy.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed on second reading that Article XV not be deleted. Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed on first reading that the word Diocesan be deleted. The amended Article XV is as follows:

ARTICLE XV

All baptized members of the Protestant Episcopal Church residing in this Diocese shall, as heretofore, constitute a Missionary Society known as The Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

The direction and activities of the Society shall be identical with those of the Executive Board and shall be directed solely by it.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed that Article XVI be adopted as follows:

ARTICLE XVI

Every Congregation, however called, within the Diocese of Virginia shall be bound by this Constitution and the Canons adopted in pursuance hereof.

The Chair declared a recess at 10:03 a.m.

The Chair called the Council to order at 10:20 a.m.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed on second reading that Article XVI of the Constitution and Canons before Restructure be deleted.

(The motion of the Rev. J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr., concerning the duties of the Chancellor referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to be reported at the 178th Annual Council).

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon I, be adopted as follows:

CANON ILay Representation in Council

Section 1. The Churches of this Diocese entitled to lay representation in the Council are those which were recorded by the Secretary of the Council as parish churches or separate congregations on the effective date of this Canon, together with churches thereafter constituted in accordance with Canon and received into union by act of the Council.

Section 2. The churches under supervision of this Diocese entitled to lay representation in the Council are those which were recorded by the Secretary of the Council as mission churches or missions on the effective date of this Canon, together with churches under supervision thereafter constituted in accordance with Canon and reported as such to the Secretary of the Council.

Section 3. A list of the churches and churches under supervision entitled to representation in the Council shall be appended to the Journal of each regular Council.

Section 4. The Vestry of a church, or the Vestry Committee of a church under supervision, shall elect the lay delegates from that church to the Council, and shall also elect one lay alternate for each delegate elected. Alternates shall not be entitled to voice or vote in the meetings of the Council except in the absence of their principals.

Section 5. The election of lay delegates to the Council, and their alternates, shall be certified by the rector, Priest-in-charge, minister-in-charge, register, or one of the wardens of the proper church, in duplicate, which certificate shall be in form as follows:

'This is to certify that a meeting of the Vestry (or Vestry Committee) of _____ Church in the County (or City) of _____, held on the _____ day of 19_____, the following named communicants in good standing of church, viz: _____ as Lay Delegate and _____ as Alternate, were duly elected to represent the same in the Council of the Diocese of Virginia to be held at _____ on the _____ day of _____ 19_____.

(Signed), _____.'

One copy of this certificate shall be sent to the Secretary of the Diocese at least ninety days before the meeting of the Council, and a copy shall be given to each delegate named therein.

Section 6. Lay delegates of churches, or in their absence their alternates, shall be entitled to one vote each on all questions coming before the Council.

Section 7. The Secretary of the Diocese shall make a roll of the lay delegates certified to him as duly elected with their respective churches. The President of the Council shall

appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one clergyman and two lay delegates, to which shall be referred the credentials of all lay delegates. The Committee shall make its report to the Council promptly. Until this report be received the roll as made by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authentic roll of lay delegates and alternates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any lay delegate or alternate to his seat, the Committee on Credentials shall hear the evidence presented and report its judgement. Upon this report the Council shall determine the matter unless by vote of two-thirds of the members present the Council decides to hear the whole case de novo.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed by two-thirds majority that Canon III be adopted as follows:

CANON IIIDeputies to the General Convention

Section 1. At the regular council held during the calendar year next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention there shall be elected by ballot the full number of Clerical and Lay deputies to the General Convention to which this Diocese is entitled, and in the same manner, a like number of Clerical and Lay alternate deputies; and a majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. The Clerical deputies shall be presbyters canonically resident in this Diocese, and the Lay deputies shall be communicants in good standing of the Protestant Episcopal Church and domiciled in the Diocese of Virginia. No one shall be eligible for election who has served as a Deputy at each of the last preceding three regular meetings of the General Convention unless at the most recent meeting, he was an officer of the House of Deputies, or a member of the Executive Council, or a member of a joint committee or commission of the Convention, or a member of one of the following committees of the House of Deputies; Committee on Amendments to the Constitution; Committee on Canons; Committee on Dispatch of Business; or Committee on the Book of Common Prayer.

The deputies so elected shall serve for the regular meeting for which they are chosen and for any special meeting held prior to the next regular meeting of the General Convention unless other deputies be elected by the Council.

Section 2. Each of the deputies elected shall signify to the Secretary of the Council within thirty days after his election whether or not he accepts the election. If he accepts, the Secretary shall issue to him a certificate of election. Should any deputy elected decline, or fail to signify his acceptance, or remove his domicile from the Diocese of Virginia, or should a vacancy occur otherwise, the Secretary of the Council shall issue the certificate of election to the alternate deputy of the same order in which the vacancy occurs who was first elected; or, if more than one were elected on the same ballot, who received the highest number of votes; and if there be more than one vacancy the others

shall be filled successively in like manner.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed by two-thirds majority that Canon IV be adopted with the proposed editorial changes, as follows:

CANON IV

Church Property

- Section 1. The Executive Board shall take such steps as may be necessary to recover or secure any property, real or personal, belonging to any church, or bodies heretofore known as Parish, separate congregation or mission church within this Diocese, the legal title to which is not vested in duly constituted Trustees; and in case of any abandoned property the Executive Board shall take such steps as may be necessary either to hold the property, or to sell it; and in case of sale of the property, the Executive Board shall pay over to the Diocese of Virginia the proceeds of sale, to be subject to the disposition of the Council.
- Section 2. The Executive Board, when it may be necessary, shall apply to the courts of the State for the appointment of Trustees to hold the legal title to any property belonging to the Diocese and under the control of the Council thereof. The Executive Board is hereby constituted the proper authority of the Council to make such application. It shall have the care of the Episcopal Residence and other property belonging to the Diocese for which no other custodians are provided.
- Section 3. The Bishop, or the Ecclesiastical Authority, of the Diocese is hereby authorized to administer the affairs of the Diocese in connection with the establishment of churches under the provisions of the Canons, and as such shall have power to acquire by deed, devise, gift, purchase, or otherwise any property for use in the missionary work of the Diocese or for use as Diocesan headquarters or offices for the administration of the affairs of the Diocese. Property so acquired shall be held and transferred in accordance with the provisions of Section 57-16, Code of Virginia, 1950, as from time to time amended.

In the administration of the property thus acquired, the Bishop, or the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, may delegate all authority in connection with the property so acquired to the Executive Board, except the right to hold and pass title to any real estate.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon VI be adopted, deleting Sections 3 and 4, as follows:

CANON VI

Archdeacons and Deans

- Section 1, (a) The Council may elect, upon nomination by the Bishop, not more than five priests as Archdeacons, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Council. In the event of a vacancy occurring between meetings of the Council, the Standing Committee shall have power to fill the vacancy, upon nomination by the Bishop, until the next regular meeting of the Council.

(b) Archdeacons shall have functional titles, and shall have the duties and powers which are assigned or delegated to them by the Bishop or the Council, which shall always be defined at the time of their nomination.

(c) A priest may serve as Archdeacon without resigning his Cure. A Dean of a Region may not serve as an Archdeacon.

Section 2. (a) The Bishop shall appoint, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, one priest in each Region as the Dean thereof. A Dean shall serve at the pleasure of the Bishop, but in no event for more than four consecutive years, and shall be the official representative of the Bishop to the Region.

(b) A priest may serve as Dean without resigning his Cure.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon VII be adopted as amended, as follows:

CANON VII

The Executive Board

Section 1. The Executive Board shall be composed as follows:

- (a) One member elected by each Regional Council.
 (b) The Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor if there be one, and the Suffragan Bishops if there be such.

Section 2. Terms of elected members shall expire at the conclusion of the regular meeting of the Council in the appropriate year.

Section 3. Any two members of the Executive Board may call for a vote by orders on any motion or in any election; the vote of a Bishop shall be counted among the clerical order. A motion or an election so dealt with must succeed concurrently in both orders to be effective.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall elect a lay member as President, and a Secretary, who may be of either order. It may elect such other officers as it may desire, not in conflict with these Canons. All terms of office shall be for one year.

Section 5. The Executive Board shall prepare and recommend diocesan programs, and the proposed funding for such programs, to the Council for approval. The Executive Board shall be responsible for the execution of all approved programs, except as the Council may specify, and between meetings of the Council shall be responsible for the work of the Church in the Diocese. In the performance of its duties the Board may create such Ad Hoc committees as shall seem to it necessary or desirable, but shall not create any positions of remuneration without the consent of the Council. The Executive Board may adopt such by-laws as it may desire, not in conflict with these Canons.

Section 6. The Executive Board shall meet regularly, at such times and places as it may determine. Special meetings may be called by the President, by any three members, or by any Bishop who is a member. Written notice of the time and place of any special meeting shall be mailed or otherwise delivered to each member at least seven days in advance of such meeting.

Section 7. Until June 30th, 1972, the Executive Committee of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, as constituted on January 1, 1972, shall exercise the authority and responsibilities of the Executive Board, and the Executive Board shall not exercise such authority and responsibilities until after June 30, 1972. This provision shall not be deemed to affect elections to or organization of the Executive Board preliminary to its exercise of such authority and responsibilities.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded, that Canon VIII, Section 4 (c) be amended by deleting the word canonically from line 3.

Mr. George R. Humrickhouse offered as a substitute motion that the word canonically be retained. This was seconded and passed.

The Rev. Dr. Louis Haskell, moved a substitute for Canon VIII, Section 4 (c). The purpose of the substitute motion would be to make the voting ratio near equal, giving a slight majority to the lay order. This was defeated.

A motion was made from the floor to amend Canon VIII, Section 4, by deleting the words region and regional and substituting the words convocation and convocational. This was seconded and defeated.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon VIII be adopted as amended, as follows:

CANON VIII

Regions and Regional Councils

Section 1. The Diocese of Virginia shall be divided into Regions in such a way that every point of the Diocese is in a Region, and every church shall be a member unit of some Region. Assignment to a Region shall be by majority vote of all members of the Standing Committee, which may ~~create~~ as many regions as it wishes, but not less than nine nor more than twenty, containing two or more geographically contiguous churches and at least 2,000 communicants in good standing in each Region.

Section 2. The Vestry or Vestry Committee of any church which to change to another Region shall petition the Standing Committee for such change, stating reasons, and including with the petition the views of both Regional Councils affected by the change. The Standing Committee shall decide the change by majority vote of all its members.

Section 3. The Standing Committee shall notify all Bishops in the Diocese, the President of the Executive Board, and the Secretary of the Diocese promptly of any change in the number or compositions of Regions, and shall provide annually to the Council a list of Regions and their member churches, which shall be published in the Journal of the Council.

Section 4. In each Region there shall be a Regional Council, subject to the following provisions:

- (a) Each church of the Region shall be represented by its active clergy and as many lay persons, elected by its Vestry or Vestry Committee, as it has lay delegates to the Council of the Diocese. Lay members of the Regional Council must be at least eighteen years of age and communicants in good standing of the church from which elected.
- (b) The Dean shall call the first meeting of a Regional Council, which shall then organize itself, electing a lay member as President. Each Council shall elect such other officers as it desires and shall establish a schedule of regular meetings. Special meetings may be called by any Bishop, by the Dean, by the President, or at the request of the representatives of any two constituent churches.
- (c) Each Regional Council shall elect one member of the Executive Board. That member must be a communicant in good standing resident in the Region and may not be the Dean of the Region. Such member shall be elected for a term of two years, and the position shall alternate between lay and clerical incumbents. The initial distribution of lay/clergy incumbents, and an initial allotment of one-year terms to half the Regions, shall be decided by the Standing Committee, by lot. Vacancies shall be filled by the appropriate Regional Council for the unexpired term, with due regard as to order. Regional Council representatives on the Executive Board shall become ex-officio.
- (d) A Regional Council shall be governed by the Rules of Order of the next preceding regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, unless the Regional Council shall decide otherwise.

Section 5. (a) Each Regional Council shall be responsible for seeing that the ministrations of the Episcopal Church are made available to every person living within the boundaries of such Region and shall exercise authority for the Region as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the church throughout its borders, so that the Region may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. A Regional Council may execute such portions of the approved Diocesan Programs as are appropriate to it, except as the Council of the Diocese may specify. A Regional Council may, for these and other purposes, and subject to the approval of the Executive Board, adopt and administer a budget.

- (b) Any proposal to begin missionary work or to found a church must have the approval of the Regional Council of the Region in which such work or church is to be established.
- (c) In any case when a church is aggrieved by an action of its Regional Council, its Rector or Priest in charge may, with the advice and consent of its Vestry or Vestry Committee, appeal the matter to the Standing Committee, the decision of which shall be final.
- (d) In any case when a Regional Council, upon request to the Dean of the Region by the Ecclesiastical Authority, fails to meet and act within sixty days of such request, the Executive Board of the Diocese shall exercise the authority of the Regional Council with respect to the matter under consideration, subject to the right of appeal set forth in Section 4 (c) of this Canon. Any such exercise of authority by the Executive Board shall be reported within one month of its exercise to the Standing Committee, and shall also be reported in full to the next meeting of the Council of the Diocese.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority, that Canon IX be adopted as amended as follows:

CANON IX

Miscellaneous Matters

- Section 1. The Parishes of the Diocese, and their boundaries, are fixed as of the effective date of this Canon, and shall not be changed henceforth.
- Section 2. In every Region, the Rector and Vestry of each church and the Vicar and the Vestry Committee of each church under supervision shall have and exercise concurrent jurisdiction within the boundaries of the Region, and equal responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church and ministrations to needy people within the Region.
- Section 3. The authority of an inactive church is assigned to the Executive Board, which may delegate this authority in specific cases to a sub-committee composed entirely of members of the Executive Board. An inactive church is defined as one in which there is no functioning Vestry or Vestry Committee.

Mr. Taylor reported on the recommended editorial changes in Canon X, Section 7.

The Rev. Dwight Duncan of the Page County Ministry, moved, and it was seconded, that Canon X, Section 1, clause 2 be amended. This was defeated.

Mr. A. R. Dunning moved, and it was seconded, that Canon X, Section 7, line 1 be amended by deleting the words "exercising supervision over a church" and substituting the words, "In charge of a church".

Captain Vincent Hodge, Church Army, moved the following amendment to Mr. Dunning's amendment. In Canon X, Section 7, Line 1, strike the words "the Episcopal Priest exercising supervision over a church under supervision of the Bishop shall be called the Priest in Charge of such Church." Substitute the following: "The Priest, Deacon, or Lay person in charge of a church under supervision of the Bishop shall be called the Vicar."

The Rev. McAlister C. Marshall moved the following substitute motion: "The Minister in charge of a church under supervision of the Bishop shall be called the Vicar." This was seconded and passed.

The Rev. Jennings W. Hobson, Jr. moved for reconsideration of the substitute motion. This was defeated.

The Rev. Edward Morgan, III, moved that Canon X, Section 8, Line 6 be amended by changing the word "clergyman" to "Vicar", and that Section 9, line 4 be amended by changing the word "clergyman" to "Minister". This was seconded and passed.

The Rev. James M. Coram moved, and it was seconded, that Canon X be referred back to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for study and to report to Council on Sunday morning. After discussion, the motion was withdrawn.

Canon X was then passed by the required two-thirds majority with the amendments made in Sections 1, 7, 8 and 9.

Mr. John Paul Causey moved, and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that the word "Vicar" be substituted for the words "Priest in Charge" or "Minister in Charge" wherever the saying may appear in the Canons.

CANON X

Churches

- Section 1. A group of people (1) which acknowledge the jurisdiction of the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese of Virginia, (2) among whom there is a regular program of identifiable Episcopal services (including regular celebration of the Holy Communion) at a designated place or places of worship, (3) which as a group shares in the support of the Episcopate of the Diocese, (4) which makes provision for the Pastoral administrations of the church to its members and (5) which functions under the supervision of a priest or deacon, shall be called a church. A list of all churches shall be published annually in the Journal of the Council. All congregations designated as Parish Churches, Parishes or separate congregations on the effective date of this Canon shall be classified as churches.
- Section 7. The priest or deacon in charge exercising supervision over a church under supervision of the Bishop shall be called the Vicar.
- Section 8. The Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese of Virginia shall appoint, or else shall allow a church under supervision of the Bishop to elect, a committee of not fewer than three nor more than twelve members, all communicants in

good standing of that church who have passed their eighteenth birthdays, to be called the vestry committee. The Vicar exercising supervision over the church shall be an ex officio member of the vestry committee and shall preside at its meetings. The vestry committee shall elect, from among the communicants in good standing of that church, representatives to the Regional Council and Council of the Diocese in the number provided by Canon. It shall be charged with transacting the temporal business of the church, except insofar as the Bishop shall see fit to retain to himself, or to delegate to others, certain of these functions.

Section 9. Any church may, with the consent of the Regional Council of the Region in which it is located, establish within the boundaries of such Region one or more churches under its supervision. The Minister in charge of such church shall be appointed by the rector of the Founding Church with the concurrence of the Ecclesiastical Authority. A vestry committee may be appointed by the vestry of the Founding church and shall be composed as provided in Section 8 of this Canon. It shall be charged with transacting the temporal business of the church, except that the Founding Church may retain to itself such temporal functions as it deems proper and in any event shall be ultimately responsible for the temporal obligations of the church. The rector and vestry of the Founding church may at any time agree with the Bishop to designate such church as a church under supervision of the Bishop, and upon such designation becoming effective the provisions of this section shall no longer apply to such church. Any church functioning under this section shall be so marked in the annual list of churches under supervision.

Mr. Taylor moved that Canon XI be adopted as printed.

The Rev. Robin G. Murray moved to amend Section 2, line 1 by changing the word "eighteen" to "sixteen". This was defeated.

Mr. John Paul Causey moved that wherever the words, parish, separate congregation or mission church" occur in Canon XI, they be changed to "church". This was seconded and passed.

The Rev. Jennings W. Hobson, Jr. moved that Section 2 be amended by deleting from line 4 the words "provided that persons who have served as vestrymen prior to May 1, 1946 shall be eligible for election or re-election." This was defeated.

The Rev. James M. Green moved and it was seconded and passed that wherever the word "vestryman" or "vestrymen" occur in the Canons, they shall be changed to "vestry member" or "vestry members", This was passed.

The Rev. Richard L. McCandless moved that wherever the word "register" may occur in Canon XI, Section 8, it be changed to "clerk."

Mr. Thatcher wood offered a substitute motion that wherever the word "register" appears in Canon XI, Section 8, it shall be changed to "registrar".

Motion was made from the floor to recommit.

The Chair ruled the Rev. Mr. McCandless' motion and Mr. Wood's substitute motion as well as the motion to recommit were out of order.

Canon XI was then passed, as amended, as follows:

CANON XI

Election and Organization of Vestries, and Call of Congregational meetings.

Section 1. The election of vestry members shall be held annually at such time and place as shall be designated by the vestry, or in the event the vestry does not act then by the minister, or if there be no minister by the wardens. If the time and place be not so fixed, then the election shall be held on Easter Monday in the church or regular place of worship. At least three days' notice of the time and place of each election of vestry members shall be given in the church on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means.

Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, if any church so authorize, vestry members may be elected for terms not to exceed four years, the congregation to determine the length of terms and the number of vestry members to be elected for such terms. The vestry members elected and qualified under this Canon shall serve until their successors are elected and have qualified.

Section 2. Only lay persons, eighteen years of age or over, who are communicants in good standing shall be eligible as vestry members of such church, provided that persons who have served as vestry members prior to May 1, 1946, shall be eligible for election or re-election.

Section 3. All persons sixteen years of age or over who are registered as communicants in good standing of the particular church in which they offer to vote, and non-communicant members in good standing twenty-one years of age or over who have been for six months known to the treasurer as regular contributors to the expenses of the same, shall be entitled to vote at the election of vestry members. The voting shall be by ballot in person and, unless otherwise provided by the meeting, a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. But no election shall be valid unless the participating qualified voters number at least ten per cent of the number of active communicants qualified to vote reported for the previous year.

Section 4. The vestry may appoint three persons to act as judges, to conduct and superintend such elections. In case no such judges are appointed, those present may choose three persons to act as judges. The judges of election, if appointed or chosen, shall judge of the qualification of the voters, and shall determine who shall be eligible for nomination as vestry members.

Section 5. Any church having two or more congregations in different communities which meets the requirements for churches under supervision of another church may apportion to each congregation the number of vestry members to be chosen as its representation upon the vestry. A separate election shall be held by and for each congregation, at which the number of vestry members allotted to that congregation shall be chosen in accordance with the procedure presented in the preceding provisions of this Canon.

The Vestry members so chosen, together with the rector or minister, if there be one, shall constitute the vestry of the church. The vestry members chosen by each congregation, together with the rector or minister, shall be a committee of the vestry to have the care and control of the property and to transact the local business of the congregation from which elected. Each vestry committee may appoint one warden for its congregation, a treasurer, and a clerk.

The church vestry shall meet as a whole at least once a year. any matter concurred in by a majority of the committees of the vestry, recorded by their respective clerks and by the register of the vestry, shall be the act of the vestry of the church, unless the minister, or if there be none, the senior warden deem it proper that such matter should be acted upon in a meeting of the church vestry as a whole.

Section 6. As soon as may be after their election, the persons chosen as vestry members shall assemble and organize at such time and place as the minister or rector shall appoint, or, if no time or place be appointed by him within a reasonable time, then at such time and place as shall be designated by any two vestry members elect, the minister and each vestry member-elect being notified. The proceedings at this and every meeting of the vestry shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's Prayer by the minister, or in his absence by any member who may be chosen to preside over the meeting.

Section 7. Every person chosen a vestry member shall qualify by subscribing the following declaration and promise: "I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do yield my hearty assent and approbation to the doctrines, worship and discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in these United States; and I promise that I will faithfully execute the office of Vestry member Church in County (or City) according to my best knowledge and skill." No person shall act as a vestry member until he has subscribed this declaration and promise.

Section 8. The vestry shall elect a senior and a junior warden, a register and a treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected. If wardens have been chosen for particular churches by committees of the vestry, the senior and junior wardens of the church shall be chosen from among such wardens. The wardens and register must be members of the vestry.

Section 9. The rector or minister when present shall preside at all meetings of the vestry, but shall not be entitled to vote except in case of a tie, and then only when he is not personally interested. All vestry meetings other than fixed meetings shall be subject to his call; but in case he fails, at the request of two vestry members to call a meeting, such vestry members may themselves call a meeting, giving at least three days' notice of the time and place to the rector or minister and to each vestry member. A majority of the vestry members who have qualified exclusive of the rector or minister,

shall constitute a quorum; but any vestry may by resolution fix a smaller number, to act as a quorum at future meetings.

Section 10. In case of a vacancy in the vestry, the remaining members may elect a qualified member of the congregation to fill the vacancy until the next annual congregational meeting, at which time such vacancy shall be filled. The failure of any elected vestry member to qualify within sixty days, or the continued neglect of any vestry member to attend the meetings of the vestry without adequate excuse, may, after due warning, be deemed to create a vacancy which shall be declared by resolution of the vestry.

Section 11. In addition to the annual meeting of the congregation for the election of vestry members, other meetings of the congregation may be called by the vestry or, if they decline to do so, by ten qualified voters of the congregation after at least three days' notice of the time, place and object of the meeting shall have been given either on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means to the rector or minister in charge, each vestry member and the congregation. At such meetings only those persons shall be entitled to vote who are qualified to vote for vestry members, and such meetings shall be conducted in the same manner as meetings held for the election of vestries except that voting by ballot need not be required.

Section 12. At all meetings of the congregation the rector or minister in charge shall preside unless the meeting determine otherwise.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed that Canon XII be adopted with the proposed editorial changes, as follows:

CANON XII

Duties of Vestries, Wardens and Parish officers.

Section 1. (a) The Rector of a church shall be elected by the vestry, and the vestry committee of a church under supervision of the Bishop shall elect a minister upon nomination by the Bishop, such minister to serve at the pleasure of the Bishop; (b) and each vestry shall cooperate with the rector or minister in promoting the spiritual welfare of his cure, extend personally a hearty welcome to newly confirmed or transferred members of the congregation; (c) each vestry shall continuously encourage the members of the congregation to assume their individual responsibility and to give generously to the Church, (d) see that the rector's salary and other obligations are paid regularly and punctually, (e) provide for the appointment of Trustees under the laws of the State of Virginia authorized to hold the legal title to the church property, (f) make and execute all contracts for erecting, furnishing, preserving and insuring the church edifice and other property, (g) regulate the use of the graveyard, (h) make all necessary provision for Church music, with the advice and consent of the rector or minister, and subject to his control, and (i) generally, as the constituted agents of the parish or congregation shall transact all its temporal business.

Section 2. The wardens shall (a) keep watch over the church property, (b) see that it is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship, (c) see that the sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties, (d) collect the offerings of the people, (e) take charge of the font and communion plate, (f) provide out of the church funds, under the direction of the vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship, and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Communion, (g) attend to the accommodation of the congregation with seats, and (h) maintain order and decorum in the time of public worship.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the register of the vestry to take charge of all records except the parish register, and to keep correct entries of all proceedings of the vestry in a well-bound book to be provided for that purpose and to deliver the records and minute book to the minister, or wardens, when his term of office expires.

Section 4. The treasurer shall take charge of all funds except Communion alms and disburse the same under the direction of the vestry, keep regular accounts supported by proper vouchers, render reports to the vestry at stated times, and make such reports to the Council as may be required. At the end of his term of office he shall deliver all books and papers pertaining to his office to the wardens.

Mr. Taylor moved that Canon XIII be adopted as amended.

The Rev. W. Holt Souder offered the following amendments to Canon XIII, (1) Section 1, Line 1, "and the Council of the Diocese may elect"; (2) Section 1, Line 3, delete "the Bishop shall nominate" and insert "the Bishop may nominate"; (3) Section 1, delete the words in paragraph 2 (d) "acting with the advise and consent of the Standing Committee". (Section 2 becoming the second paragraph of Section 1 and Section 3 becoming Section 2).

The Rev. John R. Frizzell, Jr. requested a division of the question.

The Rev. Mr. Souder's amendments passed serially.

Canon XIII was passed, as amended, as follows:

CANON XIII

The Secretary of the Diocese

Section 1. The Bishop may nominate, and the Council of the Diocese may elect, a person to serve as Secretary of the Diocese. If the Secretary is a priest, the Bishop may nominate him as an Archdeacon and he shall hold no other clerical preferment. If he is not the Secretary of the Council, he shall serve during meetings of the Council as an associate secretary thereof. He shall serve during the pleasure of the Bishop.

The Secretary of the Diocese shall be the administrative superior of all persons employed by authority of the Council of the Diocese to assist in the operation of diocesan headquarters. The Secretary of the Diocese shall have the power (a) to hire, (b) to set working hours, duties and working

conditions, (c) to discharge employees, and (d) in general, to perform the customary duties of an office manager, under the immediate authority of the Bishop.

Section 2. The Secretary of the Diocese shall have general oversight of the offices of the Treasurer and the registrar. The Treasurer and the Registrar shall rank as Assistant Secretaries of the Diocese.

The Chair recessed Council at 12:25 p.m.

(The Rev. Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., reported to the Assistant Secretary, personally, that Bishop Gibson had instructed him, Mr. Hobson, to raise the question with the secretaries concerning the legality of Cedar Run Parish, Fauquier County and Christ Church Parish, Lancaster County, in sending two delegates respectively when Council had not granted permission for two delegates as permitted in Section 1, Article III of the Constitution.)

Bishop Gibson called the Council to order at 3:30 p.m.

Bishop Gibson made an announcement concerning the need for eight to ten volunteers as additional tellers. They were asked to meet with the Rev. John A. Wright, Head Teller.

Bishop Gibson announced that Mr. Richard H. C. Taylor, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, would resume his report.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed by two-thirds majority that Canon XIV be adopted as printed, as follows:

CANON XIV

The Treasurer of the Diocese

Section 1. (a) All trust and permanent funds belonging to the Diocese or over which the Diocese has control, and all other funds for which the Treasurer is responsible, shall be kept in one or more accounts in the Diocese of Virginia, properly earmarked, with one or more national or state banks or trust companies, or one or more building or savings and loan associations, the accounts of which are insured by an instrumentality of the United States, or with a Diocesan Corporation, approved in writing by the Executive Board, and shall not be withdrawn in whole or in part except upon the signature of two designated persons.

(b) All securities of whatsoever kind belonging to the Diocese or over which the Diocese has control shall be kept, with a Diocesan corporation or some other agency, approved in writing by the Executive Board, and shall not be withdrawn except upon the signature of two designated persons.

(c) The Treasurer shall be bonded in such sum and with such surety as the Executive Board may from time to time determine.

(d) Such books of account shall be kept as, in the judgment of the Executive Board may be necessary.

(e) The Executive Board shall annually cause to be audited by certified public accountants the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese and the accounts of the Treasurer of every trust and permanent Diocesan fund.

(f) A condensed report of the audit shall be made under the direction of the Executive Board, which shall make its report to each regular meeting of the Council and to any special meeting of the Council when requested.

(g) All buildings and tangible personal property, over which the Diocese has control, shall be kept adequately insured in such amount and with such insurers as the Executive Board may determine.

(h) The Executive Board shall supervise all financial affairs of the Diocese and the methods prescribed for the conduct of Diocesan business affairs.

Section 2. Pending the adoption of an annual budget by the Council of the Diocese, the Executive Board shall prepare and furnish to the Treasurer of the Diocese a schedule of payments for the ensuing fiscal year, which schedule of payments shall first provide for fixed obligations and then for other objects in the program of the Diocese, within the amount of estimated receipts. This schedule of payments shall be the warrant of the Treasurer of the Diocese for disbursement of the amounts specified therein. Upon adoption by the Council of an annual budget, such budget shall become the warrant of the Treasurer to make the expenditures provided therein.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon XV be adopted as printed, as follows:

CANON XV

The Standing Committee of the Diocese

Section 1. The Standing Committee shall annually elect a President and a Secretary from among its members.

Section 2. In addition to its other constitutional and canonical duties, the Standing Committee shall (a) serve as a Council of Advice to the Bishop, and (b) annually evaluate the performance by the Diocese of the previous year's program, reporting such evaluation to the Council of the Diocese in a general report on the State of the Church.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon XVI be adopted as printed, as follows:

CANON XVI

Business Methods in the Churches

Section 1. All trust and permanent funds, belonging to a parish or church, over which a parish or church has control, all money for which the Treasurer of a church is responsible,

shall be kept in one or more accounts, properly earmarked, with one or more national or state banks or trust companies, or one or more building or savings and loan associations, the accounts of which are insured by an instrumentality of the United States, or with a Diocesan corporation, approved in writing by its committee on finance.

Section 2. All securities of whatsoever kind held in trust or permanent funds belonging to a parish or church, or over which the parish or church has control, shall be kept properly earmarked with one or more national or state banks or trust companies approved in writing by its committee on finance, or with The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

Section 3. The Treasurer of every church shall be bonded in such sum and with such corporate surety as the vestry of his church, or its committee on finance, may from time to time determine.

Section 4. Such books of account shall be kept as, in the judgment of the vestry or its committee on finance, may be necessary.

Section 5. The Vestry of the church, or its committee on finance, shall annually cause to be audited the accounts of its treasurer, or other custodian of the funds or securities of the church.

Section 6. A condensed report of the audit shall be made to the vestry of the church not later than February 1st of each year, or oftener if requested by the vestry.

Section 7. All buildings and tangible personal property belonging to the church, shall be kept adequately insured in such amount, and with such insurers as the vestry or its committee on finance may determine.

Section 8. The Vestry of each church shall annual review the salary and allowances received by the rector and his assistants and shall take such action, if any, with respect thereto as it may determine.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon XVII be adopted as printed, as follows:

CANON XVII

Creation of Church Debt

Section 1. No indebtedness, other than for the purpose of refinancing an existing indebtedness, shall be incurred by a church, without the written approval of the Bishop and of the Executive Board.

(a) Except where proposed indebtedness for permanent improvements, replacements, or additions to real estate or equipment, plus indebtedness of every kind already existing, does not exceed one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the average annual receipts of such church during the previous three fiscal years; and

(b) Except where proposed indebtedness for current expenses, plus all indebtedness theretofore incurred for current expenses and still existing, does not exceed twenty percent (20%) of the total current receipts of such church, during the preceding fiscal year.

Section 2. In computing receipts under sub-sections (a) and (b) of Section 1 of this Canon there shall be excluded amounts from or for endowments or from or by bequests, except income therefrom not specifically designated to be used for other purposes, and receipts specially designated for expenditures other than parochial.

Section 3. The approval required under this Canon shall not be granted until there is submitted to, and approved by the Bishop and the Executive Board a plan of payment of the indebtedness.

Mr. Taylor moved and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon XVIII be adopted as printed, as follows:

CANON XVIII

Alienating, Exchanging or Encumbering
Property

No part of the real property of any parish or congregation, except abandoned property, shall be alienated, exchanged or encumbered for any purpose, without the consent of the congregation in interest, in a meeting called for that purpose, and in case of consecrated property, or any church or chapel which has been used solely for divine services, the consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

The Bishop or, in the event of his inability to act, the other Ecclesiastical Authority, may, with the advice and consent of The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, or the Executive Committee of such Trustees, grant, bargain, sell, convey, transfer, and deliver any other property accruing to the Church generally in the Diocese of Virginia, unless prohibited by the instrument by which title to such property is acquired.

The provisions of this canon shall not apply to property acquired for missionary work in the Diocese and held under the provisions of Canon IV.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority, that Canon XIX be adopted as printed, as follows:

CANON XIX

Parish Registers and Parochial Reports

Section 1. Every minister shall keep a record of all communicants and all baptisms, confirmations, marriages and burials, within his congregation, specifying (a) the dates when persons became or ceased to be communicants under his charge, and whether by confirmation, transfer, discipline, death or

otherwise, (b) the name, age or the date of birth, the sponsors or witnesses, and, in the case of infants, the parents, of each person baptized, (c) the names of persons confirmed, and by what Bishop, (d) the names, ages, and residences of persons married, and the names of at least two witnesses, (e) the names and ages of persons buried, and (f) the date and place of every such rite respectively; and he shall attest each by his signature.

These records shall be made by the minister in suitable books to constitute collectively the parish register, to be provided by the vestry for that purpose and to remain the property of the vestry. When a congregation is without a minister, one of the wardens shall take charge of the parish register, and shall make, or cause to be made, all needful entries until the vacancy is filled.

Section 2. Every minister shall send to the Bishop, or, if there be no Bishop, to the Secretary of the Diocese, or the President of the Council, on or before the fifteenth day of January of each year, a report of his official acts and, if he has a cure, of the condition of his church or churches, for the year ending the thirty-first day of December preceding, in such form as shall be prescribed by the Bishop, or the Council. If any congregation is without a minister the report shall be sent by the wardens.

Mr. Taylor moved, and it was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority that Canon XX be adopted as printed, as follows:

CANON XX

Transfer and Enrollment of Communicants

Section 1. Upon request of any communicant in good standing desiring to be transferred from a congregation in this Diocese to another parish or congregation within or without this Diocese it shall be the duty of the minister, or if there be no minister, it shall be the duty of the wardens, or one of them, of the congregation from which the communicant desires to be transferred, to furnish to the communicant a certificate that he or she is a communicant of the congregation in good standing.

Section 2. Every communicant in good standing removing from one parish or congregation within or without this Diocese to another within this Diocese, and desiring to be enrolled as a communicant thereof, shall present to the minister of the congregation to which the communicant desires the transfer a certificate that he or she is a communicant in good standing, from the minister or, if there be no minister, from one of the wardens, of the parish or congregation from which the communicant desires to be transferred.

Section 3. No minister shall enroll as a communicant any person seeking transfer to the congregation under his charge until he has conversed with him or her on the subject, and is satisfied that he or she has been a communicant in some other parish or congregation of this Church; nor shall he enroll anyone who is known to deny the Articles of the Christian Faith as set forth in the Apostles' Creed.

Section 4. The rector of minister of every congregation, learning of the removal of any member of his congregation to another cure, without having secured a letter of transfer, shall transmit to the minister of such cure a letter so advising him.

Mr. Taylor reported that the Committee on Constitution and Canons recommended that Canons XXI, XXII, XXIII (XXV deleted) and the remaining Canons be renumbered XXIV, XXV, XXVI, XXVII, with such changes in wording as printed, be adopted.

Mr. Taylor moved, and this was seconded and passed by a two-thirds majority, as follows:

CANON XXI

Trial of the Appeal of a Layman After Repulsion from the Holy Communion

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with the requisitions expressed in the Rubric in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his complaint in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof, and requesting to be restored to the Communion. Thereupon the Bishop, unless he think fit to restore the communicant from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the minister, shall nominate two of the clergy and two of the laity, of whom the minister repelling shall select one of the clergymen, and the communicant one of the laymen. It shall be the duty of the two thus chosen to take without delay the evidence in the case, under oath, and in writing, of such witnesses as may be produced by either of the parties, and to certify the same to the Bishop, who shall proceed to adjudge the case, unless for his own satisfaction or for good cause shown by either of the parties interested, he shall desire further evidence. If further evidence be desired it shall be obtained and certified, either by the same commission, or another appointed in the manner above prescribed, as the Bishop may direct. When the evidence is thus procured the Bishop shall adjudge the case, and shall communicate his judgment to the minister repelling, and to the communicant repelled, and the judgment shall be final and conclusive. In case his judgment shall direct a further continuance of the repulsion, it shall nevertheless be subject to all the conditions and provisions of the Rubric.

CANON XXII

Examining Chaplains

A Board of Examining Chaplains consisting of at least two presbyters shall be nominated by the Bishop at the regular meeting of the Council, the nomination to be confirmed by the vote of the Council. The term of office of the Examining Chaplains shall be one year.

The Board of Examining Chaplains may conduct for the Diocesan Commission on the Ministry, the canonical examinations required by the Canons of the General Convention.

XXIII

Commission on the Ministry

Section 1. Membership.

(a) The Council shall elect six (6) persons, three clerical and three lay, to the Commission on Ministry; one-third in each order to be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. No one so elected shall be eligible for re-election after having served two consecutive terms until after the expiration of one year.

(b) The Bishop may annually appoint not more than six additional members for a term of one year. Such appointments shall be nominated for election by Council. Such appointments need not be communicants of the Church.

Section 2. The duties of the Commission on Ministry shall be those prescribed in the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Section 3. The Commission on Ministry shall report annually to the Council of the Diocese.

CANON XXIV

Presentment and Trial of a Presbyter or Deacon

Remains the same except for Section 8, where the words "Executive Committee" are changed to "Executive Board".

CANON XXV

Voting by Ex Officio Members

Remains the same.

CANON XXVI

Listing of Certified Professional Church Workers

Remains the same.

CANON XXVII

Amendment of Canons

Remains the same.

Gratitude of the Council was expressed with applause at the work of Mr. Taylor and his Committee.

Bishop Gibson expressed his personal appreciation to Mr. Taylor and his Committee for a truly remarkable job and commended Council for its cooperation.

Mr. Taylor reported that the Committee recommended the following new Article in the Constitution to be number Article XI, concerning the Secretary of the Diocese, and the remaining Articles to be renumbered through Article XVIII and he moved that this be adopted on first reading:

"A Secretary of the Diocese shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee or by the Standing Committee if it is at the time the Ecclesiastical Authority. He shall, upon qualification, continue in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority. If the Secretary is a priest, he shall hold no other clerical preferment. If he is not the Secretary of the Council, he shall serve during meetings of the Council as an Associate Secretary thereof."

This was seconded.

A motion was made to amend this proposal to conform to Canon XIII.

Mr. George R. Humrickhouse, Chancellor of the Diocese of Virginia, suggested that Council had already spoken on this matter by voting a two-thirds majority earlier in the day.

Mrs. Robert Howe opposed the amendment. The Rev. Arthur H. Underwood opposed the amendment. Mr. Pierpont Buck raised the question of interim appointments. The Rev. W. Holt Souder supported the privilege of Council in electing the Secretary of the Diocese. Mr. H. Merrill Pasco suggested that the same procedure should be followed for the Secretary as for other officers of the Diocese. Mr. William E. Cox, of St. John's Church, Arlington, spoke in favor of the Council's electing. Mr. Bernard P. Chamberlain spoke in favor of the amendment.

When the question was put, the Chair called for a count and the amendment failed 171 to 129.

The Article as originally presented by Mr. Taylor was then voted upon and passed on first reading.

The Rev. Dr. Haskell raised the question as to whether members of the Standing Committee were prohibited from serving on the Executive Board and vice-versa, and was told that there was no such provision voted upon.

The Rev. Dr. Boyd R. Howarth, Chairman of the Committee to study Diocesan Institutions and Corporations, spoke concerning the need for some action by Council in response to the work of this Committee and he moved the following resolution.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the 177th Annual Council request the Secretary of the Council list in the Journal the Corporations, Institutions of the Diocese in the categories as defined by the Report of the Committee on the Relationship of the Diocese to its Institutions and/or Corporations.

This was seconded and passed.

The Chair recognized the Rev. Thomas C. Barnes, Chairman of the Nominating Committee and requested that he give his report, as follows:

The Chair announced that the members of The Standing Committee whose terms expire in 1973 and 1974 shall serve until the end of their respective terms (Mr. Shearer C. Bowman, Jr. and the Rev. Edward L. Merrow until 1973; The Rev. Louis A. Haskell, D. D. and Mr. William A. Johnston until 1974).

The Chair called for the first ballot to be taken for four clerical members of The Standing Committee.

Mr. John Paul Causey moved the suspension of Rule number 6 of the Rules of Order. This was seconded and passed by two-thirds majority, as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the 177th Annual Council that Rule 6 of the Rules of Order be suspended with respect to the election of Clerical and Lay members of The Standing Committee and that the four members in each order receiving the highest number of votes in the initial ballot be elected.

Mr. Causey moved the following resolution, which was seconded, concerning the election of Clerical and Lay members of The Standing Committee and their terms of office:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the 177th Annual Council that in the election of Clerical and Lay members of The Standing Committee, the two persons in each order receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected to three year terms, the person in each order receiving the next highest number of votes be elected to two year terms, and the person in each order receiving the next highest number of votes be elected for one year term.

Mr. Humrickhouse offered an amendment to Mr. Causey's motion, moving that the election be by majority vote and that the term of office be determined by lot.

The Chair declared that the amendment was out of order.

Mr. Causey's motion was passed.

The Chair called for the first ballot to be taken for the election of lay members of The Standing Committee.

The Secretary announced that the Committee to Read the Minutes would meet on the stage after the Council recessed.

The Rev. John S. Spong, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions and Petitions announced that his Committee would meet at 7:30 p.m. in the Singleton Building.

The Rev. Louis A. Haskell, D.D., moved a Resolution, and it was seconded and passed that a message of greetings, affection and love be sent to the Venerable and Mrs. W. Leigh Ribble.

"We, of the 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, wish to express to Constance and W. Leigh Ribble that you are both in our hearts and prayers."

The Chair recessed Council at 5:00 p.m. and announced that Council would re-convene at 8:00 p.m.

Bishop Gibson called the Council to order at 8:03 P.M.

The Rt. Rev. Robert B. Hall, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor, submitted the following names as Examining Chaplains: The Rev. Messrs. Henry B. Mitchell, John R. Frizzell, Jr., John D. Chappell, Walton S. Pettit, Jr., and Mrs. Alison Cheek.

The above nominations were approved as Examining Chaplains by the 177th Annual Council.

Bishop Hall took the Chair at 8:06 P.M.

The Secretary reported on the ballot for the election of four Clerical members of The Standing Committee. The Rev. James P. Lincoln and the Rev. John S. Spong were elected for three-year terms; the Rev. Henry B. Mitchell was elected for a two-year term and the Rev. Boyd R. Howarth, D.D., was elected for a one-year term.

The Secretary reported on the ballot for the election of four Lay members of The Standing Committee. Mrs. Priscilla Howe and Mr. Richard H.C. Taylor were elected to three-year terms; Mr. William Rotch was elected for a two-year term and Mr. J. Chisman Hanes was elected for a one-year term.

The Chair called for the first ballot for the election of four Clerical Deputies to General Convention. The nominees were asked to stand and be identified as their names were read.

The Chair declared the ballot closed.

The Rev. McAlister C. Marshall asked if the four nominees receiving the highest number of votes could be declared Deputies with the next four as Alternates.

Mr. Humrickhouse replied that the Canons of the National Church required that Deputies be elected by a majority vote.

The Chair rules against the suggestion.

The Chair called for the first ballot for the election of four Lay Deputies to General Convention. The nominees were asked to stand to be identified as their names were read.

The Chair declared the ballot closed.

The Chair recognized Mr. William Rotch, Chairman of the Budget Committee of the Council to give his report.

The proposed changes to the printed Budget by the Council Budget Committee were then presented by Mr. Rotch.

The Rev. H. Llewellyn Fairchild asked why there was a need for \$11,000 for support of the work at Reston as it is a relatively low-cost operation, having no Church or Parish Hall.

The Chair directed that discussion of changes in the Budget be taken in order.

Mr. Rotch moved the adoption of the Budget as amended.

Mr. Rotch told of the disposition of Resolutions concerning the Budget which had been referred to the Budget Committee.

Mrs. Gordon Johnson thanked the Committee for considering the change of title to "Gospel for all People".

The previous question was moved and passed.

The Budget as presented by Mr. Rotch was adopted, as follows:

The Resolution of the Rev. John S. Spong concerning PECUSA was fulfilled in part:

RESOLVED, that the full request to the National Church be accepted a part of our total Budget.

The Resolution of the Rev. Treadwell Davison concerning Community Colleges was referred to the Board of Christian Education, Task Force on College Work:

WHEREAS, the system of Community Colleges in the State of Virginia offers a fertile field of community service.

RESOLVED, that \$200.00 of the amount designated for Christian Social Relations concerns be designated in the Budget to study our opportunity and responsibility to the Community Colleges in our Diocese.

The Resolution of the Rev. Treadwell Davison resulted in designating the sum of \$200.00 for the Committee on Evangelism, as follows:

RESOLVED, that the Committee on Evangelism be added to the other objectives - The Gospel for all Men,

AND, FURTHER RESOLVED, that \$200.00 be designated for the use of the above Committee.

The Resolution of Mr. Charles E. Tomlin under line item "The Christian Education of People in the Parishes" was approved, as follows:

RESOLVED, that any amount of excess in the prepared budget and/or any additional monies received be added to the line item "The Christian Education of People in the Parishes" until \$1,400.00 be added to make the total amount of the line item \$3,000.00.

The Budget Committee declined the request for an increase in the amount budgeted for Radio/TV Foundation.

The Budget Committee accepted the intent of the Resolution of Mrs. Gordon Johnson of Immanuel Church on-the-Hill, Alexandria, and changed "The Gospel for all Men" to "The Gospel for all People" in the following places: (a) Summary statement of the Budget; (b) The Budget title on page 5; (c) The relevant "Purpose Statement" of the Diocese.

Mr. Bernard S. Johnson replied to the question asked earlier by Mr. Fairchild. Mr. Johnson said that the work in Reston was begun in 1969 and had become self-supporting in thirteen months. In 1971 a request for additional aid was received because of the work being done in the Community. The Board of the Department of Missions decided to add another clergyman at Reston rather than start a new work in the area. Funding will be for nine or ten months when Reston will again become self-supporting.

A question was raised concerning the stipend paid the Vicar at Reston. Mr. Johnson replied that the total cost for the Vicar is about \$17,000.00 annually. This includes salary, housing, travel, utilities, pension and insurance.

The Rev. Dr. John C. Davis made an appeal for St. Paul's College and St. Augustine's College, but was ruled out of order.

Mr. Humrickhouse, on a point of personal privilege as a Trustee of St. Paul's College, thanked Dr. Davis for his appeal and noted that several Trustees of St. Paul's College were present and expressed the hope that they would contribute to St. Paul's.

Mr. John Nugent, III, reported for the Roslyn Advisory Committee. (See Reports).

Mr. Nugent presented the following resolution of appreciation for the services of the Rev. and Mrs. Stanley E. Ashton, Directors of Roslyn.

WHEREAS, The Reverend Stanley E. Ashton has served as Director of "Roslyn", The Virginia Diocesan Center since 1948; that during that span of more than twenty-four years this Center has grown in physical demensions, and in service to the Diocese, and other denominations; and

WHEREAS, the Reverend Stanley E. Ashton will retire in August 1972; and

WHEREAS, through these years of careful stewardship, Roslyn can now face confidently the expanded and challenging role it will be asked to play in its continuing service to the Diocese and the Community in which we live; and

WHEREAS, throughout these years of faithful and diligent service, the talents of Mr. Ashton have been uniquely complemented by those of Mrs. Ashton, and that in combination, one with the other, Roslyn has gained a place of high prominence as a Conference Center, as heard in the high praise of this couple who have devoted their most fruitful years to this Diocese;

THEREFORE: in recognition of these years of dedicated and faithful service

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED: that the 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Virginia express its most sincere appreciation for the dedicated service of these good people, and extend to Stan and Mary Ashton its prayers for their happiness and well-being in the years to come.

The Secretary reported on the first ballot for Lay Deputies to General Convention and declared Mr. John Paul Causey and Mr. Richard H. C. Taylor, Jr. elected. Under the Rules of Order, he stated that on the second ballot the following names would be dropped: The Hon. Thomas C. Gordon, Jr., Mrs. Geraldine Murray, Mr. William Elwood, Colonel Robert Sweatt, Mr. Horace Knox, Mrs. Paul Llewellyn and Mr. John Wright.

Bishop Hall declared the Council recessed at 9:25 P.M.

Sunday
January 23, 1972

The Service of the Holy Eucharist Second Order of Services for Trial Use was begun at 9:00 A.M. The Rev. John A. Baden, host Rector, opened the Service. Bishop Hall was the Preacher and Bishop Gibson was the Celebrant. The other participants were: The Rt. Rev. Philip A. Smith, The Rev. Thomas G. Garner, Jr., The Rev. McAlister C. Marshall, The Rev. Michael K. Thompson.

BISHOP HALL'S ADDRESS

Originally it was intended that there would be one pastoral address to be given by Bishop Gibson and I would preach a sermon at the Eucharist which we are celebrating this morning. As he and I began deeply to consider matters which affect the life of our Church today and to look a bit into the future as well, it became obvious that one address could not contain both the necessary business matters and also speak a word to the Church from your Bishops. Thus a new model has been designed and you are being presented with two addresses!

I must add that what I shall have to say may or may not represent the thinking of Bishops Gibson and Smith. Indeed some of what I shall speak to you today is quite tentative in my own mind and perhaps should be cast in the form of questions. In a way I shall be asking you to share with me some of the possibilities and questions that lie before us in the next few years.

Involved in this, too, is my own personal and Episcopal role during the years ahead. In the natural course of events (and the Lord willing!) I shall be your bishop and will have some responsibility for leading this Diocese into that future. Frankly, I don't want to be dragged or pushed into an even more rapidly changing world with little or no control over the events that will be taking place. That prospect, for the next fifteen years, is not pleasant either personally or professionally. My desire for some control over my destiny may be naive but I would like to think not.

To a very considerable degree you and I will live with the future creatively only as we try to understand all of our thinking and actions against the background of change. We cannot suppress it but we must try to manage it. I believe, too, that we shall not be able to derive as much help from past experience as we would like. This will be very difficult for members of the Church because our history is long and until recently that past has provided us with many guideposts for the future. Alvin Toffler in his book FUTURE SHOCK writes that "Ultimately, to manage change we must anticipate it". This, I believe is what we shall, and must try to do. And, because the Church touches so many areas of life our task will be doubly difficult and we shall be pulled in many different directions as we wrestle with new problems.

In the next fifteen years we shall witness revolutionary changes taking place in the field of education. The role of teacher and pupil will change and the very structures within which education itself takes place will be modified dramatically. Curriculum will be vastly overhauled and a much more functional approach to education will appear. We, the Church, will have to deal with the "products" of this revolution and will have to devise for more effective and imaginative ways of passing on the Gospel than presently exist. When one considers the billions of dollars that Christians have spent since the end of the Second World War on parish houses and tries to equate the expenditure of that money with any significant results in terms of knowledge, human growth, or commitment to Christ on the part of the people, something of our dilemma is highlighted.

Traditionally the Church has manifested deep concern for the family and morality. The revolution in these areas is already taking place and will spread in the years to come. Pre-marital sexual relations, successive marriages, bachelor parents, communal living arrangements (plus many more bizarre developments) are already a part of the "scene" today and will loom larger in the years ahead. What shall we say to these things?

Our attitudes toward all these matters must be radically re-thought and we may have to say "farewell" to come of our deepest feelings in these areas.

I know of no clergyman who is satisfied with our official attitude toward remarriage after divorce. When I was a parish priest I would often marvel at the willingness of some people to undergo, what I believed to be, the indignities implicit in our system.

Having to live in the "eye of the hurricane" of the future, how will our parish structures fare? Both in Berton's, THE COMFORTABLE PEW, and in Gibson Winter's THE SUBURBAN CAPTIVITY OF THE CHURCHES, and more recently in THE FUTURE SHAPE OF MINISTRY by Holmes, the picture is not very reassuring.

Winter speaks of the "introverted Church" which he says, "puts its own survival before its mission, its own identity above its task, its internal concerns before its apostolate, its rituals before its ministry". These are harsh words, but may not the exaggeration underscore their truth?

We must strengthen the traditional forms of church life and must search out new forms of ministry and as the Church, we must live and love each other within this tension.

Before we can strengthen parish life we must find out what we are in business for! What justifies the existence of St. So-and-so? How would the people and the neighborhood be affected if it were to disappear overnight? Properly the question should be phrased, "What profound differences would result if St. So-and-so's were to disappear?" For surely the Church of Jesus Christ has within it the dimension of "do-or-die".

Ideally, the Church is a company of people who see in Jesus a pattern or model of both the human and the divine and attempt to organize their lives and actions after the demands of that model. Probably worship and service are inevitable results of such a meeting and surely human growth and commitment follow. The Common Meal is a sharing of human love among the brethren and a foretaste and reminder of the eternal quality of God's love.

You will write your own definition of the Church but write it you must if you wish to establish your priorities and to find out why you are really in business. Perhaps, the key word here is seriousness - seriousness about being a Christian!

With the change both in the life styles of people and in their attitudes toward institutional forms we must seek new ways of ministering to them. I am not at all sure that I am happy with our "throw-away" culture, but I do believe that we should be willing to take chances and be willing to experiment even though the experimental venture may come to naught. To change the words of Gibson Winter, we may have to put mission before survival and trust that God will bless our efforts, feeble as they may be. Where are God's people and how can we bring into their lives more love, more hope, and greater humanity? A deep and sometimes agonizing cry is uttered by most of the world's people for love, hope, and human dignity.

If I live to age sixty-five and duly retire, I am sure that the Diocese which I shall be leaving will not be either geographically or functionally the same as it is today. There are too many present signs that indicate great and probably needed changes in both our territory and ways of operating.

Certainly the restructuring of the Diocese will bring many unknown surprises and if the regions operate successfully, there will inevitably take place a decentralizing of both planning and programming. The regions will do together (or separately) some of what is now being attempted on the diocesan level. Already we can see this process of decentralization taking place on the National Church level and we shall experience more of it on all levels in the future.

This will affect the distribution of our financial and human resources in many ways and we must be open to these new probabilities. Again, within our thinking and planning we must try to anticipate some of the future changes as they begin to come within our purview.

Functionally, we shall operate (I suspect) in a much more Ad Hoc fashion and will depend less upon permanent committees and commissions than is true today. A task will be undertaken and when it is accomplished the membership will be discharged.

This way of operating has the potential for including more lay people and clergy in our work and suggests, in addition, that knowledge of the interests and skills of our people is imperative.

The fact that the Standing Committees of the three Virginia dioceses spent a year divising various proposals for a rearranging of diocesan boundaries in the State is significant. Even more significant is that this was done at the request of the five Virginia bishops. Clergy and lay people alike realize that there are serious anomalies to our present boundaries and that proper pastoral oversight is often lacking.

You may agree or disagree with the areas which I have touched on as being important for our work together or you may feel that I have neglected areas of even greater importance. I am sure the latter is true and for the former I can only plead that this is the way I see it and feel it. In the beginning of this address I asked you to share in my thinking about these areas of concern and as you can tell I have no ready-made answers to give. I would ask you to think about them and to bring, and, on the part of all of us indeed, a seriousness to the work of him whom we call Lord. We know He wants us to do certain things for Him and His people and our task is to find out what those things are and then to be about the doing of them.

Bishop Gibson called the Council to order at 10:35 A.M. and reported that there was no election on the first ballot for Clerical Deputies to the General Convention. He called for a second ballot to be taken.

Bishop Gibson called for a second ballot for Lay Deputies to General Convention.

Bishop Gibson thanked especially the Rev. McAlister C. Marshall and the Rev. Thomas Garner for their help in planning the Holy Communion Service and expressed the thanks of Council to the Choir from Christ Church, Winchester, and to all involved for their assistance in the Service.

Bishop Gibson recognized the Rev. William Sydnor. Mr. Sydnor moved that we stand in silence in thanksgiving for the life and work of the late Rev. Robert H. Shaw, D.D., whose spirit and influence had been most helpful in the preparation of Restructure Proposals and the life of the Diocese.

Council stood in silent prayer.

Bishop Gibson called for the Report of the Committee on Resolutions and Petitions. The Rev. John S. Spong, Chairman, gave the report.

Mr. Spong reported on the Resolution regarding Trial Use. He moved this resolution, as amended by the Committee and it was seconded and passed.

WHEREAS, the undertaking of Prayer Book revision is of utmost importance, affecting the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Episcopal Church; and

WHEREAS, the present three-year period of experimental use provided by action of the 1970 General Convention of the Episcopal Church does not give adequate opportunity for thoughtful response by individual congregations; and

WHEREAS, more time and study are needed for competent appraisal and evaluation regarding the liturgical and theological implication of the book of "Services for Trial Use;" therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Council of the Diocese of Virginia memorialize the General Convention of the Episcopal Church that no final action be taken at the forthcoming meeting of the Convention on the "Services for Trial Use," and that the period for trial use be extended for another two years; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that (1) More opportunity be afforded by The Liturgical Commission of the General Convention for diocesan and congregational response and evaluation of these proposed services; and (2) That before any final action is taken, the General Convention strongly consider having a Special Convention in which undivided attention would be given to a detailed study of the "Services for Trial Use" or any other proposed revision of the present Book of Common Prayer.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the sense of this Council is that permanent Prayer Book revision is so weighty a matter, that it should be the only agenda item of a General Convention called for that specific purpose and that the delegation from the Diocese of Virginia be officially apprised of this Resolution and be requested to introduce at General Convention, In Louisville, Kentucky, the proper enabling legislation.

Mr. Spong moved for the Committee that the Resolution on Companion Dioceses be adopted in its original form. This was seconded and passed, as follows:

WHEREAS, the 175th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia did on January 28, 1970, authorize the establishment of a three-way Companion Diocese Program among the Dioceses of Virginia, Mexico and Barbados, and

WHEREAS, the Commission on World Mission of the Diocese of Virginia was charged with promoting and implementing arrangements to be agreed upon by the Bishops for the furtherance of such a program, and

WHEREAS, the Commission on World Mission has during 1971 engaged in a student Exchange Program with the Dioceses of Mexico, and Barbados, and has found it impossible to establish fruitful three-way communications, but has initially found great potential in working with each of our two companions separately.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Commission on World Mission requests of the 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia permission to terminate the three-way relationship, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission on World Mission requests of the 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia permission to substitute for the previous program a bi-lateral Companion Diocese Program with the Dioceses of Mexico and Barbados and to promote and implement the arrangements for effective Companion Relationships with each of the above Dioceses.

Mr. Spong reported there had been submitted three Resolutions on the general subject of giving. He moved, for the Committee, that the Resolution on restricted giving, submitted by the Rev. Francis B. Rhein, not be approved.

The motion of the Committee was seconded and sustained.

Mr. Spong reported, for his Committee, the following substitute for the resolution of the Executive Committee and the resolution of the Rev. Richard R. Baker, III. This was seconded and passed.

WHEREAS, there is confusion in the Diocese of Virginia as to the plan of Stewardship or proportional giving upon which we are operating, and

WHEREAS, this confusion seems to revolve around quotas and assessments, restricted giving, a special standard and plan of partnership and percentage.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Council call on the Executive Board to prepare a specific guide and plan and standard of Stewardship and giving for action at the 178th Annual Council of the Diocese that will speak to the aforementioned concerns.

Mr. Spong reported that the Resolution on Draft Evasion was presented merely as a report of the action of Abingdon Church congregation, Gloucester, and moved, for the Committee, that no action be taken by the Council.

Mr. Spong reported that the Resolutions concerning marriage and re-marriage which had been submitted by the Rev. David H. Lewis, Jr., and the Rev. John S. Spong, had been combined by the Rev. Mr. Lewis.

Mr. Spong moved, for the Committee, that the combined resolution be adopted. This was seconded and passed:

RESOLVED, that the Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia be requested to appoint a Commission to study the application for re-marriage procedure in the Diocese of Virginia consistent with the National Canons of the Episcopal Church with an eye toward enhancing the pastoral sensitivities of our diocesan procedure.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Diocesan Commission study for possible revision Title I, Canons 17 and 18 of the General Church regarding marriage and the re-marriage of divorced persons; to forward the results of their study to the Committee of the House of Bishops now studying Title I, Canons 17 and 18; and to present such revision as they may recommend to the 178th Annual Council for the Diocese of Virginia in the form of a Memorial to the General Convention.

Mr. Spong reported on the resolution concerning Paxton Home, and moved the adoption of the resolution. This was seconded and passed.

RESOLVED, that since the Margaret Paxton Memorial for Convalescent Children (a Virginia Corporation) is ineligible to become a part of Virginia Diocesan Homes, and is by its charter primarily a parochial activity of St. James' Church, Leesburg, Virginia, we recommend that the Council request The Trustees to seek a change in their charter which will remove the mandatory requirement that the Bishop of the Diocese be a member of the Board of Visitors.

Mr. Spong reported on the resolution concerning Bethany Institute and moved its adoption.

Mr. Humrickhouse moved that the recommendation be amended "and that it be referred to the Executive Board for appropriate action". The amendment was accepted by Mr. Spong and as there was no disagreement by his Committee, the resolution was adopted as amended:

WHEREAS, the Bethany Institute, incorporated on February 7th, 1890, in the State of Virginia to be a training school for deaconesses and other women workers for the purpose of establishing and conducting an orphan asylum and hospital, and for educating women in the care of the poor and the sick, etc., has never functioned.

AND WHEREAS, there is no indication that the Bethany Institute ever will function:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia recommends the dissolution according to law of the Bethany Institution and the distribution of its funds (amounting to \$17,384.00 on December 31, 1970) to the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Finally, contrary to the principle of reducing the number of Boards on which the Bishop of the Diocese is required to serve, we ask the Board of the Diocesan Missionary Society to reconsider its revised by-law which rotates the Bishop off that Board, and to change it so that the Bishop of this Diocese, our chief missionary, is always a member of the Board of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Mr. Spong reported on the recommendations of the Council Program Committee and made several comments and recommendations for the Committee on Resolutions and Petitions, as follows:

The Committee on Resolutions notes with appreciation the recommendations of the Council Program Committee. We observe that most of the recommendations can be implemented, without Council action, by the Bishop if he chooses to do so. We rejoice that recommendations III, VI, XI, and XVI, are already in effect by the direction of the Bishop and recommendation V was voted by this Council to be the governing principle in regard to the budget.

Our Committee took a straw vote, in the open hearings, on each of the remaining recommendations, the result of which we will share with the Bishop and the Executive Board.

We recommend that item XIII, which calls for a Council Committee to study each proposed site prior to its acceptance can be implemented as soon as practicable by the Bishop consistent with the commitments the Diocese has already made to be hosted at least in 1973 in Fredericksburg.

We further recommend that a Council Program Committee be continued and that they meet very soon with the Bishop and the host Committee in Fredericksburg to seek to work together for the enrichment of the Council next January.

We recommend that this 177th Annual Council give its assent to a flexible format to be agreed upon by the Bishop, the Council Program Committee, and the host Committee from Fredericksburg for the 1973 Council.

The above recommendations were approved. The Report of the Council Program Council is filed under "Reports".

Mr. Spong reported that his Committee had received two resolutions about the plans of giving. They were in direct conflict. They come, it seemed to the Committee, out of the general confusion that surrounds the policy of stewardship in this diocese. Many wonder what is the status of the Virginia Plan that seemed to some to have been abandoned at last year's meeting of the Council.

The Committee on Resolutions and Petitions received and reviewed the statement on Christian Giving of the Stewardship Department of the Executive Committee but concurred with the sentiment expressed at the open hearings that this statement, though inspiring, was vague, and did not deal with the specific concerns. At the same time the Resolutions Committee was not prepared to recommend a return to the quota-assessment system of giving as the Rev. Mr. Baker's resolution asked us to do.

The Resolutions Committee was also concerned that Restructure might have some effect on the Diocesan Program which might become Regional Programs and require financing on a regional and not diocesan level.

Therefore, we offer as a substitute for both the resolutions on the subject of Giving the following resolution:

WHEREAS, there is confusion in the Diocese of Virginia as to the plan of Stewardship or Proportional Giving upon which we are operating, and

WHEREAS, this confusion seems to revolve around quotas and assessments, restricted giving, and a special standard and plan of percentage and partnership giving of the Diocese to the National Church and congregations to the Diocese.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Council call on the Executive Board to prepare a specific guide and plan and standard of Stewardship and giving for action at the 178th Annual Council of the Diocese, that will speak to the aforementioned concerns.

Mr. Spong reported on the resolution concerning printing the names of the husbands (or wives) of the clergy and moved the following substitute for the Committee on Resolutions and Petitions. This was seconded and passed.

RESOLVED, that the Committee charged with printing the Journal include in that Journal, clergy home and office telephone numbers zip codes and the names of their wives (if there be such) or husbands.

Mr. Spong reported on the Resolution of Mr. Harold M. Gouldman, Jr., concerning an Association of Treasurers and on behalf of the Committee offered a substitute. The substitute was seconded and passed.

WHEREAS, the tasks of treasurers in our several congregations is an increasingly complex task and that said treasurers might gain from an association with people facing similar responsibilities.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia commend the idea of an Association of Treasurers to the various Regions with the suggestion that treasurers in each Region might tend to have more in common than treasurers in the entire Diocese.

Mr. Spong reported on the resolution of Mr. A. R. Dunning regarding the real estate where the Mayo Memorial Church House is located. Mr. Dunning spoke briefly in support of his resolution and it was seconded and passed.

RESOLVED, that the Bishop appoint an Ad Hoc Committee to investigate the better utilization of the real estate upon which the Diocesan Office (Mayo Memorial) is located.

Mr. Spong expressed his thanks to the members of the Committee on Resolutions and Petitions.

Bishop Gibson expressed his thanks to the Rev. Mr. Spong and his Committee.

The Rev. David H. Lewis, Jr. requested permission to present a courtesy resolution which had been submitted by Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer. Permission was granted unanimously, as follows:

RESOLVED, that this 177th Annual Council extends its regrets that Mrs. George DeWitte Zachary, a capable and faithful Secretary and worker for nineteen successive Councils, and taking note of her inability to attend this her twentieth Council, extends its greetings and best wishes to her.

The Rev. Mr. Lewis presented a matter of reference concerning editing the Constitution to the Committee on printing the Journal: (Submitted by Mr. Earl E. Huyck of St. Peter's Church, Arlington):

"The headings indicated for the Canons are helpful in finding one's way quickly to the substance of the particular Canon.

Could this also be done for the Constitution?"

Mr. Lewis reported that the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia had submitted their report by title.

Bishop Gibson presented to the Council the Rev. William P. Scheel, Ed. D., new Headmaster of Christchurch School.

The Chair recognized the Rev. John D. Chappell, Chairman of the Committee on New Parishes. Mr. Chappell reported that the Mission Church of the Resurrection, Alexandria, had met all requirements in order to be admitted as a Separate Congregation and he moved that the status change be adopted. This was seconded and passed.

The Rev. James M. Green expressed his thanks to the Bishop, and to the Department of Missions for their guidance and support. He also expressed his thanks to the Diocesan Missionary Society for their help and urged members of Council to support the work of the Society.

The Bishop Coadjutor requested authority from the Council for the Executive Board to elect, upon nomination of the Bishop, the Rev. Milton R. LeRoy as Archdeacon. This was passed.

The Chair reported on the second ballot for the election of Lay Deputies for General Convention. There was no election.

The Chair called for a third ballot to be taken.

The Rev. Thomas G. Faulkner, Jr., submitted the report of The Standing Committee by title.

The Rev. Clyde S. Angel, Chairman of the Board of Christian Stewardship gave a verbal report of the Board.

The Chair reported on the second ballot for election of Clerical Deputies for General Convention. The Rev. A. T. Mollegen was elected.

The Chair called for a third ballot to be taken.

The Rev. T. Dabney Wellford, Chairman of the Committee on Evangelism offered the services of the Committee to any churches interested in programs of evangelism. Report on this Committee by title.

The Chair reported on the third ballot for the election of Lay Deputies to General Convention. There was no election.

The Chair gave the number of votes cast for each nominee.

The Rev. J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr., presented a resolution expressing thanks for the gift of the Rev. Dr. John C. Davis, as follows:

RESOLVED, that the 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia express its appreciation for the gift of the Rev. Dr. John C. Davis to the Bishop of the Diocese and commends the intention of the establishment of the John C. Davis Fund.

The Rev. James M. Green presented a resolution expressing the thanks of the Council to our host Rector, The Rev. John A. Baden and to Shenandoah College and Conservatory of Music, as follows:

RESOLVED; that this 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia express its hearty thanks to our hosts, the Rector and people of Christ Church, Winchester, and to the Shenandoah College and Conservatory of Music for their gracious and generous hospitality which they have provided.

The Chair called for a fourth ballot to be taken for the election of Lay Deputies to General Convention.

The Chair reported on the third ballot for the election of Clerical Deputies to General Convention. The Rev. Henry B. Mitchell, The Rev. John S. Spong and the Rev. James P. Lincoln were elected.

The Bishop thanked Mr. and Mrs. P. D. Shoemaker, Co-chairmen for the 177th Annual Council for their work in connection with the Council meeting.

The Rev. Dr. John C. Davis moved that Bishop Hall's sermon at the celebration of the Holy Communion be published in The Virginia Churchman. This was seconded and passed.

The Chair reported for The Standing Committee and stated that they had designated fifteen (15) Regions in the Diocese as prepared under the former Standing Committee.

The Bishop requested that suggestions, comments, and reactions concerning Council be reported to him. He will then turn them over to the proper Committee.

The Chair reported on the fourth ballot for the election of Lay Deputies to General Convention. Mr. George R. Humrickhouse was elected.

The Chair called for a fifth ballot to be taken for Lay Deputies to General Convention. The election at this point was between Mr. Thomas C. Rohr and Mr. Shearer C. Bowman, Jr.

The Chair announced that according to the Rules of Order, Clerical and Lay Alternate Deputies to General Convention will be elected by plurality from the list of those originally nominated and not elected.

The Chair announced that the next Annual Meeting of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia will be held in January 1973, at the Sheraton Motor Inn, Fredericksburg, Virginia.

The Chair called for the ballot to be taken for the election of four Alternate Clerical Deputies to General Convention.

The Chair reported on the fifth ballot for the election of a Lay Deputy to General Convention. Mr. Thomas C. Rohr was elected.

The Chair announced that the Rev. Edward R. Merrow had been elected President and Mr. William A. Johnston, Secretary, of The Standing Committee.

The Chair called for the ballot to be taken for the election of four Alternate Lay Deputies to General Convention.

The Head Teller reported on the ballot for the election of four Alternate Lay Deputies to General Convention: First Alternate - Mr. Shearer C. Bowman, Jr.; Second Alternate - Mr. Walter Tinsley; Third Alternate - Mr. A. R. Dunning; Fourth Alternate - Mrs. Marian Kelleran.

The Head Teller reported on the ballot for the election of four Alternate Clerical Deputies to General Convention: First Alternate - The Rev. Edward R. Merrow; Second Alternate - The Rev. Richard R. Baker, III; Third Alternate - The Rev. John R. Frizzell, Jr.; Fourth Alternate - The Rev. James M. Green.

After singing Blest Be the Tie that Binds, the Chair declared the 177th Annual Council adjourned sine die at 12:53 P.M.

THE REVEREND PAUL ALVA BANKSTON

The Reverend Paul Alva Bankston, Rector of St. Mary's Church, Arlington, Virginia, died August 24, 1971.

He was born in Chattanooga, Tennessee in 1916. In 1936, he received a B.A. degree from Emory and Henry College and in 1939 the B.D. degree from Emory University.

He first served in the ministry of the Methodist Church and then during World War II, served as a Chaplain in the U. S. Army Air Corps.

In 1947, he was ordained Deacon in the Episcopal Church and Priest in 1948 by the Right Reverend Henry Wise Hobson.

In October, 1941, he married Kathryn Dwayne Cook and they had a daughter, Kathryn, (Mrs. Peter Olsen) and a son, David Paul.

Mr. Bankston served in St. Luke's Church, Marietta, Ohio; St. Stephen's Church, Edina, Minnesota; St. Peter's Church, Ladue and Good Shepherd, St. Louis, Missouri; St. Paul's Church, Akron Ohio, and St. Paul's Church, Mt. Lebanon, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He was for two years a staff officer in the Diocese of Ohio.

The people of St. Mary's Church will long remember with gratitude and rejoicing the time of renewal Father Bankston sparked for them as a parish family by his strong pastoral leadership. The worship of the people of God was of deep concern to him and his impressive and varied intellectual gifts were put to good use there as evident in the beauty and dignity of the services he planned and led.

The wonder of his spirit and the depth of his faith were dramatically manifested in the way he continued his priestly ministry to all around him through the long months of his final illness - without bitterness and with incomparable courage and grace.

THE REVEREND PALMER CAMPBELL

The Reverend Palmer Campbell, a retired Priest, died April 27, 1971.

Born in Summit, New Jersey in 1891, the Rev. Mr. Campbell was educated at Pennsylvania State University. After some twenty-five years in secular work, he studied theology at the DuBose Memorial Training School in Tennessee.

He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Wiley R. Mason in 1942 and Priest by the Rt. Rev. Frederick D. Goodwin in 1944.

With the exception of one year, Mr. Campbell spent his entire ministry after ordination in the Diocese of Virginia. His first assignment was as Deacon in Charge of Kingston Parish in Mathews County. From there he moved to the Church of our Saviour, Sandston, Virginia and the Church of the Messiah, Highland Springs, Virginia.

In 1954 he became the assistant at the Church of Christ and St. Luke in Norfolk. Returning to the Diocese of Virginia, he was Rector of Overwharton Parish, Stafford County from 1955 until he retired four years later.

As a clergyman, Mr. Campbell was a studious and faithful pastor. He was keenly interested in seeing that the Services of the Church were conducted decently and in order, and that the traditional ways of the Church as he understood them were maintained.

In his work he was loyally and graciously supported by his wife, Mary Fielding Calmes, whom he married in 1923.

THE REVEREND HERBERT ALCORN DONOVAN, D. D.

The Reverend Herbert Alcorn Donovan, D.D., missionary, popular priest and teacher, and superb pastor, died July 28, 1971.

Born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, November 4, 1896, he was educated at Columbia University, the College of Liberia, and the Virginia Theological Seminary.

In February, 1923, he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Garland, and, in August of that year, he was ordained Priest by Bishop Rhinelander.

The first seven years of his rich ministry were spent as a missionary in Liberia. After that period, he came to the Diocese of Virginia and for nine years was Rector of Truro Parish, Fairfax, and then went to Christ Church, Charlottesville, where he spent thirty years as its Rector.

His service to the Diocese of Virginia ranged over a wide field, in addition to the two congregations under his care and included his long term as Chaplain of St. Anne's School; membership on The Standing Committee; the General Board of the Church Schools of the Diocese of Virginia, and many committees and commissions. He was Clerical Deputy to General Convention six times. He was author of "Understanding Africa."

Above all, his personal ministry and counsel to people in trouble, the bereaved, and the sick, was exceptionally effective due to his genius for relating to diverse personalities, to his cheerful spirit, and to his warm love for them. Those who knew him and came under his godly spell will never forget him.

THE REVEREND ROBERT ARCHER GOODWIN, D.D.

The Reverend Robert Archer Goodwin, a retired Priest, deeply loved as missionary, teacher and pastor, died November 5, 1971.

Born in Petersburg, Virginia in 1886, he received degrees from three of Virginia's renowned educational institutions; a B.A. from the University of Richmond in 1905, a M.A. from the University of Virginia and both B.D. and D.D. from The Virginia Theological Seminary.

He was ordained Deacon, June, 1910 by Bishop Robert A. Gibson and Priest, June, 1911, by Bishop Logan H. Roots.

He married Emily Gravatt in August, 1912 and they had three children - Mrs. Thomas W. Armitage, Dr. Robert Archer Goodwin, III, and John Gravatt Goodwin.

His ministry encompassed two tours as a missionary in China, seven parochial assignments covering twenty-one years in four different dioceses, and service in four educational institutions in Virginia, most notably as professor and Dean of the Bishop Payne Divinity School and as professor at The Virginia Theological Seminary. He served also as the Executive Secretary of the Diocese of Southern Virginia from 1924 to 1926.

The whole gamut of ministries was his - teacher, administrator, rector, and missionary. This ministry continued into his retirement after 1956, for being a pastor in every conceivable way and circumstance was the stuff of his life up to the end.

The souls who came under his pastoral care and tutelage were blessed deeply by their contact with this devoted man of God in his quiet humor, wondrous grace, serenity and humility. Greatly loving and as greatly loved, he served his Lord.

THE REVEREND ROBERT HARRISON SHAW, PH. D.

The Reverend Robert Harrison Shaw, Rector of Trinity Church, Fredericksburg, Virginia, died on March 6, 1971.

Dr. Shaw was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, January 1, 1919. He received a B.A. degree from Carroll College in 1940, a Master's degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1941, and a Ph. D. from George Washington University in 1952.

On May 23, 1942, he married Lucille Ila Samuelsen, who along with two children, survive him.

He was ordained Deacon in March, 1958, and Priest in May, 1959, by the Right Reverend Robert F. Gibson, D.D.

Dr. Shaw served as Assistant Rector of St. George's Church, Arlington in 1958, as Assistant Rector of St. Paul's Church, Falls Church, in 1958-1959, and in 1959 became Rector of Trinity Church Fredericksburg, where he served for the remainder of his life.

In addition to his duties at Trinity Church, Dr. Shaw was professor of mathematics at Mary Washington College of the University of Virginia, and his influence on faculty and students alike was profound and long lasting.

He was author of the book, "A Conjecture on Signs of the End".

In the Diocese of Virginia, Dr. Shaw served as Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as a member of the Program and Budget Committee, the Executive Committee, Restructure Committee, Liturgical Commission and the Long Range Planning Committee.

Dr. Shaw, in addition to his interests in the Church, continued as a consultant to the National Security Agency, and his scholarly and cultural interests set him apart from most men. He was a talented musician, fluent in Chinese, and deeply involved in all aspects of mental health.

In the words of one of the members of Trinity Church, "Bob was a spiritual leader of unusual quality and force, keeping us always alert, intellectually awake to our opportunities and responsibilities as Christians. He was our counselor reaching us in our worst needs and helping us at all times by his faith, strength and example."

We shall miss him but shall ever take pride in his life, his contributions to the Church and his love of the Lord.

THE REVEREND STAMO SPRIDON SPATHEY

The Reverend Stamo Spyridon Spathey died September 25, 1971.

Born in Cefallonia, Greece in 1893, Mr. Spathey emigrated to the United States as a teenage boy. Here he continued his education at the University of Richmond and at the Virginia Theological Seminary.

Mr. Spathey was ordained Deacon in 1923 and priest in 1924 by Bishop Brown.

In 1930 he married Eunice Wilson and they had one daughter.

Mr. Spathey's entire ministry after ordination was in the Diocese of Virginia serving as Assistant or Rector of six churches in the City of Richmond and its suburbs.

From 1942 to 1965, when he retired at the age of seventy-two, Mr. Spathey was the Rector of Christ Church, Richmond. It was during this period that this Church was moved to a new location and the present handsome and commodious edifice was erected. After retiring, Mr. Spathey continued his ministry by supplying at vacant churches in the Diocese of Virginia and the Diocese of Southern Virginia.

It is difficult to describe Mr. Spathey's genial and lovable personality in a few words. He was a faithful minister of Christ who loved people and who was endowed with a delightful sense of gentle, friendly humor. With these qualities he made friends far and wide, with people of all walks of life, not only in his own church, but in many others also.

THE REVEREND EDMUND HARDING STEVENS

The Reverend Edmund Harding Stevens, a Priest, died March 25th, 1971.

Born in Charles, Minnesota in 1878, Mr. Stevens was an alumnus of the University of Minnesota where he received the degree of A.B. and B. Ph. In 1906 he received the degree of B.D. from Seabury (now Seabury-Western) Theological Seminary.

He was ordained Deacon in 1906 and Priest in 1907 by Bishop Edsall.

In 1917 he married Grace Oliver and they had two children.

Before coming to the Diocese of Virginia, Mr. Stevens served in the Dioceses of Minnesota, Washington, Delaware and Iowa.

In 1951, which was before the General Convention adopted a Canon requiring clergy to retire at the age of seventy-two, Mr. Stevens who was then seventy-three years old, accepted a call to come to the Diocese of Virginia as the Rector of St. Timothy's Church, Herndon. Four years later he retired, but only officially, as he began a new and unofficial ministry at St. Mary's Church, Arlington, Virginia, assisting the Rector in Services and other parish activities.

In addition to his pastoral work, he found time to write, as the author of a pageant, "Holy Night"; a musical comedy, "The Lady Moreunique" and a story, "The Convent".

At St. Mary's Church, Arlington, where he lived and where he was best known in his latter year, Mr. Stevens was greatly beloved and respected for his devotion to the ministry, his friendly spirit and his readiness to serve beyond the call of duty.

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REPORT OF
THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The Standing Committee, at the request of the Bishop Coadjutor, approved shortening the period of Candidacy for Alison M. Cheek to six months and for Robert D. Spencer to nine months.

The Standing Committee met four times during the year at Christ Church, Charlottesville, in joint session with the Standing Committees of the Dioceses of Southern Virginia and Southwest Virginia, constituting the Joint Commission on Diocesan Boundaries. In Addition, the Standing Committee met twice with the Bishops of the Diocese to study and consider problems related to the restructure of the Diocese of Virginia and to changes in the boundaries of the Dioceses situated within the Commonwealth of Virginia.

At the request of the Bishop, the Standing Committee studied and made a report to the Bishop recommending the initial division of the Diocese into Regions within the framework of the Restructure Proposal considered at the 176th Council and to be finally acted upon at the 177th Council. The Standing Committee also made a recommendation to the Bishop that the Standing Committee under the Restructure Proposal not exceed eight members, with the further suggestion that two members be elected annually for four year terms.

On 28 December, the Standing Committee met with the Seminarians to renew former acquaintances and make new ones. It was a profitable meeting during which the Committee answered Seminarians' questions on procedure toward certification for Candidacy and Ordination and in turn was pleased with the manner in which the Seminarians answered and discussed the questions asked them by the Committee members.

REPORT OF
JOINT COMMISSION ON DIOCESAN BOUNDARIES

During 1971 The Standing Committee of Southwestern Virginia met with The Standing Committees of the Dioceses of Virginia and Southern Virginia as a Joint Commission Diocesan Boundaries four times. We met at Christ Church, Charlottesville, Virginia, February 16th, April 23rd, September 23rd, and November 23rd. The five Virginia Bishops were present at our meeting in November, and the president met with the Bishops and a member of the State Department of Planning and Community affairs.

This Commission was called into being by the five Virginia Bishops on April 9th, 1970 to consider Council resolutions from Virginia and Southern Virginia concerning Diocesan Boundaries, to study potential restructure of boundaries into one or more Virginia Dioceses, and to make recommendations to the Bishops concerning Diocesan boundary restructure and greater inter-diocesan cooperation.

The Commission pursued this task diligently and after two years of work made its recommendations to the Virginia Bishops as to greater inter-diocesan cooperation and for restructure of Diocesan Boundaries. The following resolution was passed in the presence of the five Bishops:

"That a Committee of three, consisting of Charles G. Newbery, Chairman; A. R. Dunning, and W. L. Watson, drew up a statement of four alternate plans as possible ways of dealing with the matter of the structure of the Episcopal Church in the State of Virginia into one or more Dioceses and that these plans be publicized jointly in Virginia for the consideration of the people and their reactions. This statement is to include sufficient supporting data as to encourage competent discussion of the plans."

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR

During the year past the usual inquiries concerning historical matters pertaining to the clergy, parishes, and churches of the colonial established Episcopal Church of Virginia have been answered; assistance has been given to students and others engaged in research; letters of transfer have been issued from defunct churches to active ones; baptismal records have been issued to individuals seeking to establish age for social security pensions, and requests for information concerning a variety of questions have been answered and in many instances such information furnished.

A history of Shrine Mont has been written, with the assistance of Mr. Wilmer E. Moomaw, Executive Director of Shrine Mont, and which at this writing is in print. All profits from the publication of this work by Shrine Mont, will go to Shrine Mont. A Manuscript, LEST WE FORGET, about the bishops of the Diocese of Virginia, beginning with Bishop Madison, has been written and placed for purposes of reference with Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer, Administrative Assistant to the Bishop. An address on Bishop Madison has been delivered to the students at the College of William and Mary, and another on the Colonial Church of Virginia and its vestry system has been delivered to the Northern Neck Historical Society.

With the consent of the Bishop some five hundred titles, by various authors, of a liturgical, historical, and otherwise valuable nature dealing with the worship, work, and history of the Church in Virginia, have been placed in the Virginia Historical Society Library, Richmond, on permanent loan. Also with the consent of the Bishop the historical material concerning the clergy, churches, parishes, etc., of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia in the keeping of the Registrar, have been placed on permanent loan in the Historical Society Library. With these other historical matter, miscellaneous in nature, has been placed. Historical material dealing with the Monumental Church, its registers, books, bible, prayer books, because of their historical value, with the Bishop's consent, been placed with the other material in the Virginia Historical Society Library. In addition a complete set of the Journals of the Diocese of Virginia has been placed in the same library. This insures the protection of all this material against the danger of fire or loss and makes it available to all for purposes of study and research. The books have been catalogued and a file of the catalogue cards has been given to the office of the Registrar; the same is in process concerning the other material, and when finished a complete catalogue will be given the office of the Registrar so that visitors to the Mayo Memorial Church House may see at a glance what material is at the Historical Society Library concerning any given subject.

REPORT OF
DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

The Department of Christian Social Relations began 1971 wondering whether it could not best fulfill its mission by disbanding and saying to the parishes, "Take it from here; the job is yours". As 1971 progressed, however, the Board has become cautiously optimistic: perhaps a Diocesan Christian Social Relations Board can accomplish something in spite of the lack of a staff and in spite of a very small budget. In the spring the Board spent a weekend at Roslyn considering what its role could be. From the discussions it seemed a Diocesan Board could do four things:

1. Act as an information clearing house about CSR type projects within the Diocese - particularly in making information available to parishes about operating programs which can be directly studied.
2. Help act as a conscience for the Diocese - bringing to the attention of the appropriate persons within the Diocese Christian concerns of a state-wide or national nature.
3. In a small way help start new CSR projects in the parishes.
4. Advise the Diocese how Christian Social Relations functions can best be performed under the Diocesan restructure.

The Department sponsored a workshop in the Potomac Convocation in the fall at which the fourth function was discussed. A consensus emerged that concerns about our fellow men could best be met in the regions if all of the churches in a region supported the same FISH type organizations along with churches of other denominations in the same region. Some of the Northern Virginia inter-church organizations such as ACCA have conceived and put into operation more CSR projects than a Diocesan CSR Board with an unlimited budget could initiate.

During 1971 considerable attention was given to the third function. Within the modest CSR budget, a number of projects were assisted. \$500.00 was given to Summer in Urban Neighborhood in Richmond, an organization which assists central city youths in summer vacation projects. \$200.00 went to Ecumenical Social Concerns Dialog in Richmond. \$1,200.00 was made available to assist Operation Breakthrough establish in Falls Church a counselling service to combat drug abuse. \$300.00 assisted in the establishment of an Interdenominational Pastoral Counselling Center at Truro in Fairfax. \$350.00 was given to The Assembly Project of Buckingham to assist in installing plumbing in the dwelling house of a family with five wheelchair-bound children suffering from muscular dystrophy. \$1,000.00 was made available to the Church Schools of the Diocese as a partial scholarship for a black youth to attend a school in which the students had not previously had the advantage of an inter-racial situation. \$1,500.00 went to TRUST in Richmond. \$500.00 was given to Shalom et Benedictus, an Alexandria project which houses disturbed youths who are unable to live at home and yet do not require hospitalization. In keeping with the objective of using its funds to help begin projects rather than to sustain them each of the grants was a one-time grant to a new project. The Board feels the money was spent wisely and well and that enduring new projects were made possible by it.

In attempting to implement its first and most important objective of spreading the Word, the Board has continued to operate its grapevine of contacts between Board members and designated CSR representatives on vestries. At each meeting reports are received from Board members as to what is going on within the parishes. The recent workshop in the Potomac Convocation made apparent to all who attended the importance of providing a face to face

meeting place for those who wrestle with similar problems. In more recent months, the Board has explored with the editor of the Virginia Churchman the possibility of expanded coverage of CSR activities in the Virginia Churchman. The results will be apparent to all.

Finally, the Board participated in the preparation of a statement on Church property, prepared for the Executive Committee a statement on State legislation which would permit gambling and recommended to the Executive Committee a statement on national welfare which was rejected because the Executive Committee understood it was asked to rubber stamp an action of the National Church. The Board is preparing a response.

REPORT OF
DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

All communicants, vestries and clergy of the Diocese share a common responsibility for the accomplishment of Christ's work through His Church throughout the world, at home and abroad. The Department of Christian Stewardship is responsible for encouraging all elements of the Diocese to assume that responsibility and give generally for the accomplishment of that work. In its effort to serve these purposes, the Department reports the following work accomplished in 1971:

1. Develop a policy for giving within the Diocese called "A Christian Way of Giving" (text of this policy is appended to this report).
2. Obtained and distributed canvass aids to each church unit of the Diocese to assist in the training of canvassers and conduct of an effective Every-Member Canvass.
3. Offered the assistance of the members of the Board of the Department to any canvass leader desiring the same. Every church of the Diocese was advised of the availability of persons ready and willing to assist in local canvass training.
4. The Board of the Department sought and accepted invitations to meet with local clergy and vestries for a mutual interchange of ideas and concerns. The Board's primary interest was to hear and learn how to be more helpful. Meetings included Trinity, Arlington and a joint meeting with St. John's, West Point, Christ Church, Middlesex and Immanuel, King and Queen Court House.
5. To accomplish a provision of "A Christian Way of Giving", obtained from the Committee for Program and Budget a document which set forth goals, support needs and program opportunities of the Diocese (with estimated cost figures) for the year ahead. Copies of this document were provided each vestry of the Diocese visited by persons noted in the following item.
6. Developed and used with Executive Committee approval, a visitation program in which approximately forty persons, lay and clergy leaders within the Diocese, visited almost all of the clergy and vestries (a few declined or refused to accept their scheduled visitor). The purposes of the visitation program were (1) to encourage full use and application of "A Christian Way of Giving", (2) to help all vestries and parochial clergy to be aware of and understand the Program Opportunities and support needs of the Church beyond

the bounds of the local congregation, and (3) As a bonus feature to help the law and clerical leadership of the Diocese become better acquainted with one another and with their respective areas of responsibility.

In its evaluation of the aforementioned work in 1971, the Department plans to continue along the same basic lines in the year ahead but with certain changes and improvements. For example, it would continue the use of projected Goals and Program Opportunities essentially as used in 1971 but would simplify the format and expand distribution to all vestry members. It sees better and more effective ways to help vestries and parochial clergy meet their stewardship responsibilities. The Visitation Program would be continued but visitors would be provided with improved aids to help them to make a more comprehensive presentation in less time. And, most important, "A Christian Way of Giving" would be given far greater emphasis than in 1971, to include specific training and familiarization for the clergy.

Finally, any evaluation of stewardship, especially giving for the work of the Church outside the Diocese, should include the effect of the attitudes and response of clergy and vestries to the so-called controversial issues and programs of the Church. In 1971 this reaction ranged from bitter hostility and rejection to glad acceptance and support. And, there seems to be a direct relationship between this variation in reaction and the quality of giving. In this connection, the evidence seems to indicate a close correlation between giving in relation to controversial issues and the quality of spiritual leadership exercised in the congregations. Where the local leadership has consistently and forthrightly preached, taught and demonstrated the Biblical principles of justice, mercy, love and forgiveness, and where commitment to Christ as Lord is not merely an option, the challenge of controversial issues has little or no adverse effect on the quality of giving.

"A Christian Way of Giving"

STATEMENT OF THE WAY: "A Christian Way of Giving" is a way whereby the communicants and congregations (vestries) of the Diocese of Virginia contribute money for the support and work of Christ's Church. It is a way of giving which relies on the motivation of the contributor to give out of glad commitment to Christ and the work of His Church instead of giving in dutiful response to a budget, assessment, or any other device which specifies the amount of money to be given or expected.

APPLICATION OF THE WAY: "A Christian Way of Giving" is intended to apply to each individual giver and each vestry within the Diocese, and, insofar as the budgetary provisions of General Convention will permit, the Council of the Diocese.

BIBLICAL BASIS: Although a variety of Bible resources might be cited as a basis for "A Christian Way of Giving", one will be sufficient. It is the 9th Chapter of St. Paul's end Letter to the Corinthians. In this letter, St. Paul provides a goal or stated purpose for giving and then he exhorts the Corinthian Church to give, "Each one...as he has decided, not with regret or out of a sense of duty, for God loves the one who gives gladly." (II Cor. 9:7 T.E.V.)

PLEDGING UNDER THE WAY: It is expected that each individual and each vestry within the Diocese will, each year, make an unrestricted pledge of money for the support of the Church and for the accomplishment of its programs. A divided, restricted or split pledge whereby the giver would elect to give his money to certain specified programs or objects and deny its use for other

programs approved by vestry, Council or General Convention, is considered contrary to the spirit and purpose of "A Christian Way of Giving." However, nothing in "A Christian Way of Giving" is intended to preclude the use by the giver of a statement of program priorities which the giver considers important to the decision making processes of the vestry and Council.

GOALS AND PROGRAM OPPORTUNITIES: Nothing explicit or implicit in "A Christian Way of Giving" will prevent or inhibit the development and use of goals and program opportunities for giving. In fact, the leadership of the local congregation and the Diocese is expected to develop and put forth incentives for generous giving and to help givers make intelligent decisions concerning the use of their money. There is nothing in the "Way" which is intended to prevent or inhibit the use of estimated cost figures for particular program opportunities, provided the total of such figures does not constitute a tacit budget.

EMPHASIS AND RESPONSIBILITY: "A Christian Way of Giving" stresses giving in response to commitment to Christ and the work of His Church. The accent is on Commitment. It assumes that the prime business of the Church is to produce committed Christians and to be enabler, strengthener and means whereby they can do Christ's work in the world. It assumes that giving is a normal by-product of Christian discipleship. Thus the burden for development and promotion of giving falls squarely on the spiritual leadership of the Church, both lay and clergy.

REPORT OF
BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions has operated this year with some sense of frustration and some feeling of the lack of a clear sense of direction. The exigencies of our situation have made it difficult to start new work and we have been forced to curtail efforts in some areas. Lack of funds and confusion over where mission responsibility will be under restructure and are the chief contributors to this situation. It is the devout hope of the Board that more urgency will be felt and more clarity be forthcoming for this important function of our Church.

All is not gloom, however. We have accomplished these important tasks:

- (1) Backed the founding of a new mission in North Manassas. The Rev. Charles D. Curran, Jr., began work there in November, and the mission is now showing exciting signs of good health.
- (2) Approved placing a second man on the staff of the Mission Church at Reston. This important and highly innovative work is deemed extremely important by the board because of its potential bearing on the ministry of our church in the future.
- (3) We have taken off direct aid to these churches - St. John's, Glen Carlyn, St. Francis in-the-Fields, Great Falls, Meade Memorial, Alexandria, and Trinity Parish, Louisa.
- (4) We recommended that All Saints-Sharon Chapel, Alexandria, Church of the Creator, Mechanicsville and Church of the Messiah, Highland Springs move to self-support at the earliest practicable moment. They have not as of this year, but it is hoped that in one more year they will become fully self-supporting.

The Commission also planned and led services of worship at the Spring and Fall clergy conferences and will be responsible for the eucharist at this Council. It is our hope that we will be able to demonstrate at diocesan functions the rich variety of possibilities for worship that are available to us in our "Services for Trial Use."

In innumerable cases the Commission has assisted individual clergy and congregations with answers to questions about trial use. In this regard, please feel free to call upon us at any time. We have received many bulletins and reports from churches using trial services and we will be happy to pass on to you this data and experience.

This year the Commission has expanded its membership in order to carry a larger work load. The new hymnal is off the press and must be introduced. Not only does it contain new settings and hymns, but it offers us the opportunity to experiment with cantors and instruments other than organ. Liturgical renewal is not only a revised order of worship with different wording; it is sight and sound, movement and drama, and music is a necessary ingredient. Therefore, liturgy and music must go hand in hand.

The Commission must also make a concentrated effort to encourage and assist worship committees in local congregations. Such committees are essential to the concept of self-determination in trial use because they can provide a dialogue between priest and people and can help to develop greater interest and participation by the laity in the conduct of worship. Also, this coming year we will have a chance to evaluate our trial use, and worship committees will be an important link in this process.

REPORT ON ECUMENICAL RELATIONS

The Commission has actively continued its work this year, not only corporately, but also severally, as individual members, in promoting ecumenism throughout the Diocese and State.

Our first priority has continued to be concentrated on the Plan of Union of the CONSULTATION ON CHURCH UNION. During the coming months we see that it is essential to focus on our denominational response to the Plan. Study itself should still be undertaken jointly with other churches, and as much practical experience of sharing the life of other black and white neighboring congregations as possible needs to be promoted. A specifically Episcopal response will be made by March, 1972. The Commission looks for a helpful response from the Diocese's clergy and parishes. Directions will be circulated by the Ecumenical Officer and by this Commission. The State-wide Task Force on the COCU of which we are members is stimulating and promoting further efforts in this direction.

The Rev. W. Holt Souder continues to represent this Diocese and Commission on the Faith and Order Commission of the Virginia Council of Churches. An Institute on Black Theology is being planned for April 1972.

Mrs. Ebbe Hoff remains a Consultant to the Roman Catholic Commission for Ecumenical and Inter-religious Affairs of the Diocese of Richmond. We see this close liaison as a practical expression of continually closer relationship with the Roman Catholic Church and its Diocese of Richmond.

This year has also seen the beginning of the program of refinancing debt initiated by the Diocesan Missionary Society. This has made it possible for the Church of the Resurrection, Alexandria to move off diocesan aid entirely.

We have accomplished some things.

There is much more to be done.

Many thanks to the members of the board who have worked so hard and faithfully this year and to our Secretary Bernard Johnson, without whom the board would have accomplished far less than it did.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON MINISTRY

The Commission on Ministry, established at the direction of General Convention by Canon at the 176th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, has studied its duties and responsibilities as defined by National Canon. The responsibilities are primarily to assist the Bishop in matters pertaining to the enlistment and selection of persons for the ordained ministry, in the guidance and pastoral care of Deacons, Deaconesses and Professional Church Workers, in matters pertaining to the continuing education of the Ministry and to ascertain the personal readiness of persons before ordination alike to the Diaconate and the Priesthood.

In 1971 the Commission has interviewed and reported on the personal readiness for ordination to the Diaconate of five Candidates for Holy Orders, and for ordination to the Priesthood of seven Deacons.

The Commission has begun to evaluate the work of programs related to its responsibilities. These programs are: (1) The Bishops' Advisory Council on Applicants for the Ministry, (2) The Deacons' Training Program, (3) The Examining Chaplains, (4) The Clergy Development Committee, (5) The Middle Atlantic Parish Training Program.

These evaluations, which are still in process, have already caused some of the responsible groups to evaluate their own work. The knowledge that the Commission is seriously interested in their purposes and functions has been salutary. As a result of our only completed evaluation, the Clergy Development Committee has broadened its membership and made it more representative.

The results of the Commission's evaluations will undoubtedly produce changes in current programs, but the evaluations are also serving to educate the Commission in the complexity of ministerial development.

The Commission is acting as a coordinating agency for all programs related to the development of the ordained ministry including the relationship to seminaries.

The Commission is also studying and will make recommendations to the Bishop concerning reading for orders under supervision as an alternative to seminary education for some men. Another study under way looks toward a recommendation to the Bishop regarding the Perpetual Diaconate as an option in the Diocese.

Yet another study undertaken hopes to define more clearly the purpose and meaning of ordination. This very old question has proved to be the basis of most of our disagreements and discussions in the first year of the Commission's existence.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS

* During 1971 the Board of Examining Chaplains conducted written and oral examinations for the graduating seminarians of this Diocese. The following men passed those exams and were recommended for ordination to the Diaconate: Michael Bye, Dwight Duncan, Stephen Noll, John Steed and Dale Mekeel.

Additional work is required in the year of their Diaconate and before ordination to the Priesthood. They must produce a paper in an area of their own choosing under the general heading of Studies in Contemporary Society with special reference to Racial and Ethnic minorities, and they must pass oral exams in Theory and Practice of Ministry and Liturgics.

In addition to seminary students, the chaplains have responsibility for examining men reading for Holy Orders. Four men currently fall in that category and are at various levels of preparation.

Also in this year, the chaplains provided examinations for three persons in special categories. Mrs. Alison Cheek, one of the chaplains who was, herself, applying for ordination to the Diaconate, Mr. Carl Praktish, graduate of the M.A.R. program of Virginia Theological Seminary, and Mr. Robert Spencer who will graduate at Virginia Theological Seminary in January 1972, and is seeking early ordination. Mrs. Cheek and Mr. Praktish have passed all required work and have been recommended for ordination; Mr. Spencer is still in the process of taking the exams.

Since General Convention has established a General Board of Examining Chaplains and a set of National Canonical Exams, the Diocesan chaplains have adopted a policy of requiring all seminarians to take the National exams. The chaplains will review the evaluations of each seminarian who passes and, if areas of weakness are present, design additional work during the period of his Diaconate to strengthen those areas. In the case of a seminarian who fails the Nationals, the chaplains will require that he retake and pass them the following year before he can be recommended for ordination.

Our Chairman, The Rev. Frederick J. Warnecke, Jr., resigned in September since he was leaving the Diocese. We want to express our appreciation for his imaginative and competent leadership. We shall miss his ability and his spirit. We want also to thank The Rev. Richard R. Baker, III, for his generous help during the oral exams. The present chaplains are: Mrs. Alison M. Cheek, The Rev. John D. Chappell, The Rev. John R. Frizzell, Jr., The Rev. Henry B. Mitchell and The Rev. Walton S. Pettit, Jr.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD MISSION

Bishop Robert F. Gibson, in a statement concerning the Commission on World Mission, wrote: "The Commission on World Mission does not just propose a contract of companionship, however intriguing. They propose a plan of education and human involvement in anticipation of such companionship which in itself promises good fruits of giving and receiving whether or not we ever reach the desired state of official companionship."

To this end, the Commission began its program in 1971 with the advent of the Summer Youth Exchange among Mexico, Barbados and Virginia.

Keeping in mind, What can my diocese give? What does Virginia need? What then can we share? we find that the initial program fairly well met the goals. Thus in the years to come plans will be made to expand this area of our concern and larger numbers of young people will form a closer relationship with other Anglicans in other lands.

The Commission continues to try to make the Diocese and the people of Virginia conscious of mutual encouragement, intensified knowledge of one another and concern for one another, increased awareness of a single mission which embraces an exchange of gifts and resources and a deeper exploration of full Communion.

While learning to deal with the problems of money, or lack of money, paternalism, social, political and cultural differences as well as language barriers, the Commission strives to fully involve the Christians in this Diocese in the Missionary efforts of the Church.

To this end the Commission plans to provide speakers, films, filmstrips, educational courses and other program aids concerning our Companion Diocese Program; to explore the possibilities of seminary exchanges for the years 1972-1973; to sponsor adult exchange visits to Barbados and Mexico; to promote the missionary offering in Lent 1972; and to explore the feasibility of Episcopal exchanges among the several dioceses.

Questions and Answers, ours as well as theirs, will form the structural framework for a bridge of understanding and response among three different cultures, enabling partners to have a deeper involvement in one another's "lives".

The Commission feels people are being reached and helped. A "common discipline" is being better understood and more wisely applied, Church and Christian unity are revealed as fact rather than mere conversation. Awareness is emerging—awareness between Americans and others as to the common problems both face, and the need for shared solutions, awareness of old ways that must be seen in a new light, and an awareness that the act of giving also requires knowledge of both receiving and sharing.

REPORT OF THE LITURGICAL COMMISSION

More than half the churches of our diocese are engaged in some form of trial use. This is being done on the basis of self-determination in each parish as clergy and laity plan their own method and schedule for fulfilling the requirements to participate in trial use services some time during this triennium.

During this past year the Liturgical Commission has attempted to raise the general level of liturgical awareness by sponsoring three conferences. In February, The Rev. Henry H. Bruel, then president of Associated Parishes, spoke on why change is necessary and examined in detail "Prayer Book Studies 21." This was followed in May with a conference conducted by The Rev. Bonnell Spencer, O.H.C. in which he outlined the theological basis for the revisions in our liturgy. And then, in October, a liturgical music conference was led by Mr. Mason Martens who introduced new settings and hymns for the eucharist and daily offices.

Three Commission members, The Rev. David Greer and the Rev. Raymond Davis and Mrs. Ebbe Hoff, attended the annual meeting of Episcopal ecumenical chairmen and members organized by the Ecumenical Officer, Dr. Peter Day, in Houston, Texas. It was held immediately before the annual National Workshop on Christian Unity, sponsored by the Catholic Diocese, but attended by many other denominational representatives. We are grateful to the Council for making budget provision for this meeting and for the other activities of this Commission.

We have been in close touch throughout the year with the Ecumenical Office in New York. We deeply regret the necessary resignation of the Assistant Ecumenical Officer, Mr. John Cosby, due to the general financial crisis, resulting in no funds to support him as liaison officer to the dioceses.

We have submitted a budget request for 1972. We hope that you will continue to support the work of this Commission.

We are aware of the changes that will be involved if the Restructure Plan is approved. We are preparing some recommendations that would enable this Commission to continue to operate and to improve its efficiency and effectiveness.

During the course of the year we have lost the services of three members - The Rev. Van Chamberlain and the Rev. Leon Laylor have retired, Mrs. Daniel Cox has resigned. We are very grateful to them for their committed service to ecumenical work in the diocese.

We are grateful indeed to the Rev. Milton LeRoy, our staff member. This Diocese is peculiarly fortunate in that our Bishop is Chairman of the Joint Commission on Ecumenical Relations and therefore is in close touch with national and international ecumenical affairs. We especially appreciate his guidance and inspiration. It is our intention to continue to support him in whatever way we can. We stress again our belief that this Commission's task bears close relationship to our Christian concern for human as well as ecclesiastical ecumenism.

REPORT OF
THE VIRGINIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Among encouraging trends of the past year is a growing ecumenical concern evidenced in more openness in exploring needs, taking stock of resources, and planning together for needed ministries across the state. In all of this the Council's role is increasingly that of the enabler.

In the year Concern Areas (program units) have been organized with officially designated persons from member judicatories, and new directions and priorities are being formulated in response to expressed needs.

During the 1972 session of the Virginia General Assembly, the Associate Executive Secretary will devote a major portion of his time in a stepped-up education and information service, both to our constituents and to members of the Virginia General Assembly in areas of legislative concern to the churches. The Concern Area of Church and Society is providing a much needed study and resource service in such areas as Hunger, Housing, Welfare, Peace, Pari-Mutuel Betting. The publication of a study booklet, "Myths and Facts about Virginia Public Welfare Programs," has been well received with many requests for additional copies for study in church and community groups.

Through the Concern Area of Educational Development two new training programs are planned for 1972. A Consultant Skills Workshop for Organizational Renewal will be held June 30-July 5 at Massanetta Springs to equip persons to serve as consultants in working with local churches in strengthening local ministries. Also planned for April 18-20 is a Consultation on Sexuality, Marriage, and the Family.

One of the priorities of the Ecumenical Affairs Concern Area is strengthening ecumenical relationships among denominational judicatories through consultations of church leaders on a state planning district basis. One of the promising developments growing out of discussions with local leaders over a period of months is the establishment of the Lord Fairfax Social Services, Inc., in Planning District 7 to focus upon such concerns as housing and health services.

Through Offender Aid and Restoration (OAR) five communities are now being served by OAR directors. Mr. Charles Lankford began serving in Fairfax in the spring and Mr. Robert Mordhorst began service as Richmond's OAR director in December.

During the past year studies of Weekday Religious Education (WRE) and the Migrant Ministry were initiated to determine if there were changes needed to make these long-time Council programs more effective. Currently 33,000 children are enrolled in WRE Released Time programs in 225 school communities reaching 96% of all the children having the opportunity to be enrolled. Thirty-one persons served on the 1971 Migrant Ministry staff in a broad program including day care, pastoral ministry, recreation and educational programs.

Other highlights of the year include Ministries in State Parks, Cooperative Camp Study, United Clothing Appeals, Church Planning Consultations, Leader Development, Radio-TV program placement, ministry with persons of special need, and assistance to local ecumenical groups across the state.

The Council continues to request help of its member judicatories in raising the level of judicatory support from the present \$40,000 to underwrite a greater portion of the current \$94,000 budget.

The Council is grateful to the Diocese of Virginia for its participation and support and takes this opportunity to express warm thanks and to invite continuing participation in the cooperative witness of the churches through the Council.

REPORT OF
COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

The Committee on Evangelism has continued to serve as a clearing house for information on what the Church is doing to win people to Christ and to deepen their commitment to him. Going on the principle that we cannot make him known unless we know him ourselves, there is a strong emphasis in all our meetings on Christian fellowship through Bible study and prayer, and through testimonies as to the difference Christ has made in our own lives. We welcome guests, and have had a good many during the year from other denominations as well as our own. They tell what the Lord has been doing for them, and find that the telling frees them, and frees him to step up his activity.

Through The Virginia Churchman each month the Committee has continued to present the stories of people whose lives have been transformed by Jesus Christ. Judging by the comments we have received, this column is widely read. We also sponsored an advertisement by the Bible Reading Fellowship, an Anglican organization which publishes suggested daily Bible readings along with commentaries.

We have been heartened by news of what the Holy Spirit has been doing in many different directions. There have been wonderful manifestations of the Spirit which have cut across denominational lines and all other kinds of human barriers, bringing to many a new unity in Christ and a new power. Through local Bible study and prayer groups, Christians of different churches have found joy in worshipping a common Lord together, and in the process have found release from both spiritual and physical ailments. Through such institutions as Teen Challenge, which has centers in several states made possible by broad interdenominational support, countless young people have been freed from drugs by the power of the Spirit. Through preaching and teaching missions, such as those conducted last year in Northern Virginia by Derek Prince, Bob Munford, Don Basham, Graham Pulkingham, and others, which were supported by Episcopal, Methodist, and Assembly of God churches, many have discovered that the events described in the Book of the Acts of the Apostles are still happening, and that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever." An article in The Virginia Churchman by the Rev. Raymond Davis, rector of Truro Church, Fairfax, told graphically of the wonderful things the Lord has been doing there.

The Committee wants to call the attention of the Diocese to the interdenominational evangelism campaign for 1973 called Key '73. The Episcopal Church is one of the few Christian denominations not officially backing this campaign. Our National Advisory Commission on Evangelism did not even ask the Executive Council to do so, because they knew there were no funds available for such things as radio and television programs. However, according to Methodist publications, the main thrust of Key '73 will be on the local level, with emphasis on Bible study, prayer groups, personal evangelism, and youth projects. Your Committee hopes that the parishes of this Diocese will be alert to opportunities for cooperation in these and other ways.

REPORT OF

EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN

The Constitution of the Episcopal Churchwomen, Diocese of Virginia says "The object of this organization shall be to carry forward the program of the Church, to know Christ and to make Him known through worship, education, service, gifts, and fellowship, in the five fields of service, the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World."

Honest efforts by the many branches of Episcopal Churchwomen and the Executive Board have been made to carry out this purpose. Through our financial objectives the women of the Diocese gave \$17,500 to the eighteen missionary districts of the Episcopal Church and to six inter-Anglican communions. Of this \$2,319 went to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief and over \$1,800 was sent to Trinity College in the Philippines.

To individual institutions and programs in the U.S. and the Diocese the women contributed \$35,642. Of this amount \$2,595 went to the Ministry to American Indians, \$1,571 to the Chaplains Service of the Churches of Virginia and \$1,133 to St. Paul's College, Lawrenceville, Virginia.

Within the Diocese \$5,347 was given to Bloomfield and \$2,155 to the Virginia Seminary for support of candidates for the priesthood. The Vi Voce Fund given at the annual meeting in May was \$2,800 to be used by the Commission on World Mission in its program with Mexico and Barbados. Our Scholarship fund from the Book of Remembrance and the Gift of Life has helped support a young woman in the Diocese who is working on her doctorate in Special Education.

Learning is another important part of our effort. We heard a dialogue on lay ministry and the role of women in the church by the chairman of the Executive Council Program Advisory Committee on Lay Ministry, Mrs. Walker Lewis. We saw slides and heard talks by the Commission on World Mission in our companion dioceses of Mexico and Barbados. The founder and director of Offenders' Aid and Restoration spoke at the annual meeting about their volunteer program of working with prisoners. The OAR was given a United Thank Offering grant at Houston in 1970.

At worship we studied the Psalms at the Retreat at Shrine Mont under Bishop Smith and the Rev. William Hargett. We held our first Diocesan United Thank Offering presentation in November when the Rt. Rev. James Pong of Taiwan was our guest and preacher. Many prayer groups are in existence throughout the Diocese.

Women are now on vestries in most parishes. Women are being appointed to more parish and diocesan committees and elected delegates to Council. Women are active in ecumenical programs - Church Women United - and in untold volunteer community projects. Women are busy and generous. In this Diocese they try hard "to carry forward the program of the church, to know Christ and to make Him known. . . ."

EPISCOPAL CHURCHMEN

In 1971 The Episcopal Churchmen held two meetings at Roslyn with interesting and informative programs.

The Spring Conference was held on April 24th and 25th and was attended by about thirty laymen. This Conference featured the efforts of our Church in the Appalachian region of Virginia and neighboring states. The program was led by the Rev. R. Baldwin Lloyd. The purpose was to focus our attention on the needs of neglected mountain people.

The Fall Conference was held on October 9th and 10th with about the same attendance. The theme of this program was "NEW OPPORTUNITY FOR EVANGELISM" stressing - Seven Day Christmas. We were led by the Rev. Robert H. Crewdson, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Haymarket and past chairman of the Committee on Evangelism.

The officers elected to serve the next two years were: President, Daingerfield L. Ashton; Vice-President, Frederick P. Aldridge; Secretary, Harry Johnson and Treasurer, Norman D. Hundley.

We are disturbed about the attendance at these Conferences and I am going to remind "The Key Men" who are responsible in each Parish, that:

1. He is responsible for the Advent Corporate Communion in his parish.
2. He is the recipient of "Letting the Laymen Know", and therefore responsible for passing along to the laymen of his parish information contained therein.
3. He is responsible for inviting laymen in his parish to attend the conference of the Episcopal Churchmen and for publicizing such meetings.

Each parish is supposed to have a Key Man. The Key Man needs the full support of the laymen and the priest for the successful continuance of this important effort and program. The purpose of this organization is to stimulate religious thoughts, worship and Christian action among the laymen of the Diocese and to support such general and special objectives as may be selected for support at an annual meeting.

In the past we have voted the monies collected at the Advent Corporate Communion be given to the Bishop for his discretionary fund. The Bishop uses this to help seminary students in case there is a special need or emergency.

Our Spring Meeting is scheduled for April 15th and 16th at Roslyn.

REPORT OF

COMMITTEE ON INSTITUTIONS AND/OR CORPORATIONS

The Committee appointed to study the relationship of various institutions and/or corporations to the Diocese of Virginia requested by the 176th Annual Council submits the following report. Appointed to serve were three laymen and three clergymen in the Richmond area who have met frequently and worked diligently to ascertain the facts which characterize the various relationships and to elicit some conclusions and recommendations which we trust will prove beneficial to the well being of our Diocese and the institutions involved.

We regret to report that our study of the institutions which have been most directly involved in the life of the Diocese, prevented us, because of the limitations of time, from making any report on the three institutions which were at one time closely related to the Diocese which helped to start them, but which are not now involved in Diocesan life; namely, The Blue Ridge School, Dyke, Virginia, The St. Andrew's Association, Richmond and the Richmond City Missionary. Neither were we able to consider the relationship to certain organizations such as T.R.U.S.T., in Richmond, and the Metropolitan and Ecumenical Training Center in Washington, which currently receives financial support from the Diocese of Virginia, but otherwise are related in a very ambiguous and intangible way.

Regretting our inability to complete this aspect of the study we hopefully recommend that another committee be appointed to be charged with the responsibility to study the relationship of the Diocese to these institutions and organizations.

Early in our consideration of this matter it became apparent that the relationship of the fifteen corporations and institutions present a variety and complexity which creates widespread misunderstanding resulting in problems of communication, influence and responsibility. Our first goal was to attempt to arrive at several defined categories into which we would attempt to fit the various organizations in our effort to clarify the relationship.

In order to do this we assigned three or four institutions to each member of the committee and requested that each man make an in-depth study of the organization assigned to him. In order to help us carry out these assignments we adopted a seven point guide line to cover information needed. (A copy of the guidelines is attached to this report). The guidelines reflected such concerns as: (1) How did the relationship with the Diocese begin? (2) How does the fact that you are related to the Diocese influence the management of your affairs? (3) What is the nature of your financial relationship to the Diocese? (4) Does your admission policy reflect the catholicity of the Church, etc.?

It is on the basis of these reports that we have drawn our conclusions.

The first category contains those institutions which are integral and necessary to the legal and canonical functioning of the Church in the Diocese. They are: The Diocesan Missionary Society, and The Trustees of the Funds.

The second category contains those institutions which are auxiliary to the work of the church in the Diocese, but which are related to the Diocese legally and canonically. They are: Bloomfield, Inc., The Episcopal Book Store, The Memorial Trustees of Roslyn, The Shrine Mont Commission and the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia, The Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, and Virginia Diocesan Homes. (Report on the Episcopal Theological Seminary is included in the minutes of the Council and which was given by Mr. Armistead Boothe).

The third category contains those institutions which are related to the Diocese by tradition, which in a sense need the Diocese rather than being necessary to the work of the Church in the Diocese. They are: Bethany Institute of Virginia (Council recommended dissolution and referred to the Executive Committee for appropriate action), The Episcopal High School, The Protestant Episcopal Church Home, St. Paul's College, and Stuart Hall.

The fourth category contains only one institution, The Margaret Paxton Memorial for Convalescent Children which by charter requires the Episcopal Bishop of "Northern Virginia" to be a member of its Board of Trustees. (See minutes for Council action).

One of the first conclusions is that for the sake of clarity these categories and the institutions designated in each be published annually in the Journal of the Council. We shall propose a canon to implement this recommendation.

Because of the unwieldy nature of many of these relationships, and because of certain ambiguities regarding the term "Diocese of Virginia" (it appears frequently to be interpreted as synonymous with the Bishop of the Diocese) we would further recommend that no relationship between any institution, corporation or organization and the Diocese of Virginia be assumed or enacted without the endorsing action of the Annual Council of the Diocese, or its interim Executive Board. We shall propose a canon to implement this recommendation.

It is our further conclusion that membership on the Boards of various corporations and institutions demands an exorbitant amount of time from the

Diocesan Bishop and we recommend that this mandatory kind of membership be eliminated wherever possible. We acknowledge that progress has been made in this regard by the action of the Standing Committee and the Restructure Committee. We shall have specific recommendations in some instances when we deal with specific institutions.

We believe that it is important to remind ourselves periodically that the relationship of the Diocese to all of its institutions and corporations is founded upon mutual trust. Those persons elected or appointed to serve on the various boards are all dedicated Churchmen desirous of strengthening the mission of the Church. Though some feel that there should be stricter Diocesan control exercised in some legal or mechanical fashion we believe that a relationship based on a common devotion to Christ and His Church is worthy of our trust; and we can recommend no foundation more firm on which to build. We regret that provisions in wills and other binding restrictions have not always given trustees and board members the freedom to adopt policies more consistent with the declared policies of the Church.

The test of the Canon which we propose for your consideration and adoption is as follows:

THE COMMITTEE ON RELATIONS TO THE DIOCESE shall be a permanent standing committee of the Council; six members shall be appointed by the Bishop, three lay and three clergy, to serve for one year or until the next regular meeting of the Council, and no member shall serve more than two consecutive terms. This committee shall:

- (a) Study, review, and report to the Council annually the relationship existing between the Diocese of Virginia and any Organization, Corporation, Board or other group which by charter, custom or for any other reason may be considered to have a relationship with the Diocese or desire to have such a relationship; and
- (b) Advise the Council of its recommendations concerning the relationship which will best serve the needs of the Diocese: its people, churches and official bodies; and
- (c) Publish annually in the Diocesan Journal a list of related institutions, etc., and the type of relationship accepted by the Council from its action on the annual report of the Committee on Relations to the Diocese.

And, further, no institution, board or other group shall be accepted by any party of this Diocese as having an official relationship to the Diocese until the Committee on Relations to the Diocese shall report its findings concerning that institution, board or other group for action establishing the relationship by the Council of the Diocese.

The proposed resolutions follow:

- (1) Since the Margaret Paxton Memorial for Convalescent Children (a Virginia Corporation) is ineligible to become a part of Virginia Diocesan Homes, and is by its charter primarily a parochial activity of St. James' Church, Leesburg, Virginia, we recommend that the Council request The Trustees to seek a change in their charter which will remove the mandatory requirement that the Bishop of the Diocese be a member of the Board of Visitors.

- (2) WHEREAS: The Bethany Institute, incorporated on February 7th, 1890, in the State of Virginia to be a training school for deaconesses and other women workers for the purpose of establishing and conducting an orphan asylum and hospital, and for educating women in the care of the poor and the sick, etc., has never functioned;

AND WHEREAS: There is no indication that the Bethany Institute ever will function;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the 177th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia recommends the dissolution according to law of the Bethany Institution and the distribution of its funds (amounting to \$17,384.00 on December 31, 1970) to the Diocesan Missionary Society.

Finally, contrary to the principle of reducing the number of boards on which the Bishop of the Diocese is required to serve, we ask the Board of the Diocesan Missionary Society to reconsider its revised by-law which rotates the Bishop off that Board, and to change it so that the Bishop of this Diocese, our chief missionary, is always a member of the Board of the Diocesan Missionary Society.

I. INSTITUTIONS WHICH ARE INTEGRAL AND NECESSARY TO THE LEGAL AND CANONICAL FUNCTIONING OF THE CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE.

(a) The Diocesan Missionary Society.

1971 was an important year for the Diocesan Missionary Society. The Trustees acted to convert the former "Invested Funds" which were in stocks and bonds into "The First Deed of Trust Fund" which is to be used for financing churches. In the process the unrealized appreciation in the securities was realized thereby multiplying the fund threefold. This increase will benefit the various beneficiary programs which receive this income with much increased resources.

A loan was made from the First Deed Fund to the Church of the Resurrection in Alexandria which eliminated the need for Diocesan assistance, saving the Diocese nearly \$10,000 per year, and allowing the Church of the Resurrection to take over its own debt service. An additional advantage came from the reduced interest rate, and the fact that as this is repayed the funds will remain to be used again by the Society for other church extension purposes.

The Trustees also have made plans to build up the Revolving Loan Fund. This will be a major area of concern in 1972. While not a "fund drive" in the campaign sense, we will be in touch with persons who may be able to make gifts in addition to their normal stewardship. We also encourage Virginia Episcopalians to consider naming the Society in their wills as a way to establish a permanent benefit for their church. We also stand ready to negotiate loans to churches for individuals and parishes who are willing and able to make such loans available.

The DMS is committed to ultimately creating a major financial resource for capital expansion of the Church in our Diocese. We believe that such a resource will be of lasting value to the life of the Church. We invite the support and participation of all who are interested in making this goal a reality.

The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia is a Virginia Corporation which was chartered by an act of the General Assembly, February 2, 1895. The Charter has been amended in 1900, 1965, and in 1971.

By official request and resolution of the Executive Committee of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, the Corporation was requested to consider implementing the principle of rotating membership on its Board of Trustees . . . this being a general Diocesan policy.

Bishop Gibson, as President of the Corporation, requested an Ad Hoc Committee to study the existing By-laws of the Corporation with the purpose of bringing them up to date, to meet with representatives of the Diocesan Missionary Society to achieve a better understanding of the respective responsibilities of these two important Diocesan Corporations, to consider including in the revised By-laws or the Charter the principle of rotating membership, and lastly, to make such other recommendations as might be beneficial to the Corporation.

The Corporation by official action did meet and accepted the report of the Ad Hoc Committee and did incorporate into its Charter the principle of rotating membership and at the same time reduced the membership from fifteen persons down to a membership of nine persons, with the Bishop of the Diocese being ex officio, and thereby making the total membership of the Board of Trustees a total of ten persons. The State Corporation Commission did on January 6, 1972, certify the Articles of Amendment, restating the Articles of Incorporation to embody these changes.

The Annual Council will continue to nominate persons to serve on the Board of Trustees, and beginning with the Council in 1973, three persons will rotate off the Board, and, accordingly, the Council will nominate persons to fill these vacancies.

The Corporation enjoyed in the year 1972 a successful financial operation and did pay to all funds on deposit interest at 6%.

There are deposited with the Corporation 180 church funds. There are approximately 45 funds held in the General Account. The majority of these have specific designations and restrictions as to their use, these being funds left to the Corporation, (as the legal corporation to enable the receipt by gift or bequest).

The financial report of the Corporation listing parish and general funds on deposit, as well as the listing of all securities, cash, and other investments owned by the Trustees of the Funds, is

printed in the Journal under the section. . ."Reports of the Treasurers".

The Corporation is governed by a Board of Trustees, who in their fiduciary capacity are charged with the duty of: "exercising their judgment or care under the circumstances prevailing, which men of prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds considering the probably income as well as the probable safety of their capital."

A. M. Pullen & Company, certified public accountants, are the auditors for the Corporation.

The Trustees have consistently tried to invest in securities of high quality and those that will provide a reasonable high rate of return with security of principal and prospects of growth. The Trustees are mindful of their responsibility in trying to retain as high a rate of income earned as possible to the various depositors.

The First & Merchants National Bank, of Richmond, Virginia, acts as the custodian for all the investments, with the actual day to day accounting and distribution of income earned to the various parish and general funds on deposit being done in the office of the Treasurer of the Diocese. Distribution of earnings to all funds is made yearly and in the month of December. However, there are certain funds which receive semi-annual distribution.

There are only a few unrestricted funds held by the Trustees. Some of these have been used and are pledged with the First & Merchants National Bank as collateral along with funds pledged by the Diocesan Missionary Society for loans made to churches which have exhausted their credit with commercial lenders, at prevailing interest rates by the Loan Commission of the Diocese of Virginia.

(c) The Church Pension Fund.

Of major importance to the Diocese is the fact that the Church Pension Fund did increase its assessment from 15% to 18% effective January 1, 1972. The fact of this change is to bring about certain increases, particularly for present retirees whose compensation in the past was low. Benefits have also been strengthened for active clergy and their prospective widows, as well as making minimum benefits for both clergy and widows to increase.

Notice of this increase in the assessment was made in THE VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN and each individual clergyman of the church and the Treasurer connected with his remuneration likewise received notice.

In the year 1971 the Church Pension Fund paid pensions to 25 clergymen in our Diocese in the amount of \$82,201.00; 4 clergy who of necessity took early retirement, and 3 clergy who were disabled received a total of \$9,398.00. As of December 31, 1971, there were 41 widows of clergymen receiving widow's pensions of \$64,388.00 and lastly 7 children of clergy eligible to receive benefits obtained \$4,953.00. The total paid out by the Church Pension Fund to persons in the above category was about \$171,331.00.

The Church Pension Fund has published a booklet which will be of help to parish treasurers and clergy and is available, if you do not have a copy of same, at the Church Pension Fund office, 800 Second Avenue, New York, N. Y. 10017. It is titled: "THE CHURCH PENSION. . . THE WAY IT WORKS FOR YOU".

Connected with the Church Pension Fund is its subsidiary, the Church Life Insurance Corporation. It is through this affiliate corporation that the Diocese of Virginia maintains a comprehensive group medical care plan and a mandatory life insurance plan for clergy.

Beginning January 1, 1972, the Diocese has been notified that there has been effected a change of insurance carrier. The carrier for this Diocesan group comprehensive medical care plan is now the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company of Boston.

Clergy are advised that there is no change in the manner of submitting a claim and that all claims for persons under this group coverage will be processed at the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company's claims office in Richmond, Virginia. At the time of making this report to the Council, there has been no change in either the format of the current billing system or any change in the premium for January 1, 1972.

II. INSTITUTIONS WHICH ARE AUXILIARY TO THE WORK OF THE CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE, BUT WHICH ARE RELATED TO THE DIOCESE LEGALLY AND CANONICALLY.

(a) Bloomfield, Inc.

There are presently twenty-three children in residence at Bloomfield - twelve boys and eleven girls - which is close to our capacity of twenty-five.

The Rev. Douglas Pitt accepted a call to Emmanuel Church in Baltimore as assistant to the Rector there and resigned as administrator of Bloomfield on January 1, 1971.

This change left a serious void in our management which has not been filled to date. However, I am happy to report that the Rev. W. Davis Draine, Jr. will come as administrator on June 1st. In the meantime, Mrs. Marion Sprinkle, who was our hostess has assumed the duties of administrator and has done a good job. Without her loyal and dedicated interest in the children under her care our problems would have been greatly magnified - those problems have been many, but chiefly maintaining an adequate staff to properly care for the children. We are indeed fortunate and grateful to have had the valuable services of Mrs. Sprinkle during the past year.

Due to the continuing escalation of normal expenses our budget has increased considerably. It now costs well over \$3,000 per annum per child. We were fortunate to get the welfare agencies to increase their contributions. A minimum charge of \$200 per month has now been established, which is some relief to our financial problem.

The Trustees wish to express their very grateful appreciation to the many Parishes throughout the Diocese for their interest and loyal support to the work being done at Bloomfield. Their continuing contributions are vital to the maintaining of that work.

(b) The Episcopal Book Store, Inc.

The year 1971 has been one of self-analysis and progress for the Book Store. We completed a detailed analysis of our sales data, reddecorated our interior, expanded our Board membership and shifted somewhat the emphasis of our sales effort.

The self-study pointed to some interesting facts about which there had been some divided opinion before. The Book Store does serve as a service to our Diocesan Churches and clergy. Some 55% of our sales go to these categories with very little contribution to gross profit. Our sales to the general church membership represent most of the additional sales and the vast majority of our gross profit. So we feel that it is by continuing to improve our services and attractiveness to the general public that we will be able to better serve our Churches and Clergy.

With this in mind, we secured a VCU senior to study and recommend changes to our interior. Her conclusions and recommendations were put into action by the Board and were essentially completed during 1971.

The Board expanded its membership to thirteen members, with the Manager being a permanent member. This was done to give us the ability to call upon a greater variety of skills in managing the operations of the Book Store.

Service to our customers continues to be our greatest asset and it is our dedicated staff which makes this service possible. A committee was set up to study Employee Benefits and it is hoped that this committee can come up with ways to more justly compensate our staff for their superior service.

We are optimistic about our future and hope that the change brought about in 1971 will enable us to better serve the Diocese and its membership.

(c) The Roslyn Advisory Committee.

The Roslyn Advisory Committee was authorized by Canon 24 passed at the 1970 Council of the Diocese of Virginia, and the following year the Bishop's appointments were confirmed by Council.

Following a detailed review of the history and operation of Roslyn, the Advisory Committee presented the Memorial Trustees a report including many recommendations covering operations, administration and future planning.

As a result of our report and in consultation with the Bishop and Memorial Trustees, the Advisory Committee recommended that the Memorial Trustees act to create a non-profit corporation charged with the specific responsibility of management supervision, administration and development of the Diocesan Center.

Such Corporation would, of course, act in full accordance with the last will and testament of Miss Annie Rose Walker and under the auspices of the Memorial Trustees. The Corporation would be required to report annually to the Council of the Diocese.

This recommendation has been acted upon by the Memorial Trustees and such a corporation has been formed. The Advisory Committee is confident that this step will enable Roslyn to continue to develop and expand its operation making maximum use of its existing facilities and its potential for service to the Episcopal Church and the community.

In the light of the creation of the Management Corporation, the Advisory Committee recommends to this 1972 Council of the Diocese of Virginia the repeal of Canon 27. This Canon authorized the creation of the Advisory Committee, and it is our opinion that our objective has been completed and our job finished. Consequently, a resolution to repeal Canon 27 has been introduced and we commend it to you.

As the last act of the Roslyn Advisory Committee, we should like to pay tribute to the Rev. and Mrs. Stanley Ashton, who have served as Resident Directors of Roslyn for the past years. The Rev. Mr. Ashton has announced that he will retire on August 1, 1972, and the Roslyn Advisory Committee wishes to recognize the invaluable contribution of the Ashtons to the mission of the Church, in an appropriate resolution.

(e) Church Schools

The programs of the schools continue to evolve and are being open to new material and approaches while students are being more adventurous in ideas and activities. The schools have had their share of unrest and of disciplinary problems, but the administrations have in the past developed strengths of relationship and understanding which have enabled the schools to work their way through the crises and have laid the foundation for a steady operation during the present session. Your Heads continue to show themselves pre-eminent as pastors. They hold to the values which have proved important over the years and apply such values with more understanding of young people than was possible in the past, recognizing the profound changes in our culture and in the knowledge, material well being, responsibility and expectations within which young people work.

The continued increase in fees required to meet our obligations to faculty and the students has been disturbing. Many of us believe that non-governmental institutions can make their greatest

contribution if they have genuine relationship with, commitment to, and support from the Church. Yet too many people in the Church and outside are more preoccupied with the failings of institutions than with their accomplishments.

It would be good if the support from the Church for its institutions included both spiritual and material elements. Institutions have shown themselves able to survive without direct material support from the Church, but if spiritual support is not maintained you may expect that your institutions will become like salt which has lost its savor.

Turner Hall, the new chapel and library building at St. Catherine's, named in honor of Susanna Pleasants Turner, former Headmistress of the school, may be the most successful building ever built at one of our schools. It is both beautiful and functionally exciting. It is a testimony to the leadership of the Headmaster, Robert Trusdell, in both planning and fund raising. The whole faculty had a part in developing the educational program and the analysis of space needs on the basis of which the construction was planned. The Rev. Philip Whitehead, Chaplain of the school, is due special credit for the successful design of the chapel.

St. Christopher's and St. Catherine's are exchanging a total of 102 students in classes in which one or the other school has special strengths. This is part of an overall program of cooperation with educational, social and economic motivations.

St. Margaret's continues to maintain a strong school community and to give to, and receive strength from, the town and the parish in which it is set. After long and devoted service, Arnold Motley has rotated from the chairmanship of the Board of Governors and is being succeeded by Robert Handly. The work of the school has been strengthened by the renovation of the library and the conversion of the study hall to be the Signe Maria Granbery Olsson Memorial Reading Center. These improvements were made possible by a grant from the Elis Olsson Chesapeake Foundation and Mrs. Olsson's family.

St. Anne's-Belfield moved forward in the development of the consolidated school of which John Rice is President.

Church Schools joins the Diocese in thanksgiving for the life and ministry of the Rev. Herbert A. Donovan. Dr. Donovan, as chaplain of St. Anne's School, chairman of the Board of Governors, and a trustee, gave himself through many years to the spiritual education and support of students and faculty.

After 19 years as a member of the faculty of Christchurch School, including 13 years as Headmaster, Robert Yarbrough resigned last year to return to teaching. Through his brilliant teaching, his unflinching concern for students, and his capacity for winning financial and other support for the school, he increased the enrollment of the school from 125 to 198 and the investment in the school plant from \$400,000 to \$1,530,000.

The Rev. William P. Scheel, Ed.D., became Headmaster of Christchurch School on July 1, 1971. Dr. Scheel is a graduate of the oldest Episcopal school in the mid-west, Shattuck School, of the University of the South, of Seabury Western Theological Seminary, and of the Graduate School of Education of the University of Massachusetts. He had served in churches in Minnesota, including an Indian Mission, and had taught and been an assistant headmaster at Shattuck.

St. Agnes' School depends heavily on a pre-school conference for the Heads of student organizations and faculty advisors held at Roslyn shortly before school opens each session. Emphasis is on the need for concern, not just punishment, for recognition of individual differences, for sensitivity to others needs and all that these attitudes imply for school life. This conference has become the nucleus of a sense of community which has its effect in the total life of the school.

St. Stephen's School after years of dreaming and planning hopes to break ground later in 1972 for construction of additional facilities. Henry A. Thomas, chairman of the Board of Governors, Floyd M. Johnson, Jr., chairman of the Campaign Committee, Winfield S. Preston, Jr., chairman of the Building Committee, and the Rev. Emmett Hoy, Headmaster, have collaborated in planning and winning support for the project.

Dr. Hoy and his faculty and staff have probably set a record for getting the most out of meager facilities and established a model for full utilization of school buildings. As a result of a long history of pastoral discipline, they have been able to minister effectively to young people caught in the pressures and disorders of our time.

The Trustees of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, recognizing the growing complexities of the business operations of the schools, have established the full time position of the Director of Business Affairs. We are fortunate that George T. Glenn, an active member and vestryman of St. Andrew's Church in Richmond, and a former Budget Director for Virginia Commonwealth University, has accepted the position.

The enrollment reported at the opening of the school session was as follows: St. Catherine's Boarding 135, Day 538; St. Christopher's Boarding 93, Day 653; St. Margaret's Boarding 128, Day 34; Christchurch Boarding 163, Day 14; St. Agnes' Boarding 24, Day 441; St. Stephen's Day 502; and St. Anne's-Belfield Upper division Girls Boarding 85, Day 99, Boys Day 32 and Lower Division Boys and Girls 391.

(f) Virginia Diocesan Homes, Inc.

At Goodwin House we are organized and function primarily as a retirement community. Our total program seeks to promote the independence and continuing activity of each resident at the level of their highest potential. At the same time, our range of services extends to provide life-time care at the levels of service needed:

supportive watchfulness of residents in their apartments, rooms on our Physical Assistance Unit of 28 beds, skilled nursing care in the 31 bed Nursing Care Unit, which is prepared for post-operative care, physical therapy, and general custodial and terminal care.

Our Resident Services Department is organized to respond to any and every need of residents to assist them in receiving whatever they might need. Resident involvement is their byword. Therefore, residents are more active than ever; publishing their own weekly paper; planning social, cultural, and educational events and trips in a monthly calendar meeting; participating in the Resident's Associates and its Steering Committee. Resident Services recruits, trains and coordinates 70 volunteers from local churches. The volunteers regularly visit, sew and provide transportation for shopping and doctors appointments, of which there were 294 in 1971. A fulltime instructor in Arts and Crafts is on the Resident Services staff. She spends time during each week with handwork, games or activities that their condition will allow.

Residents themselves are the greatest support and help one or another in all areas of cooperative life and we could not function without their relating to one another in this way.

The Nursing Care Service is on duty 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to respond to the medical needs of apartment dwelling residents as well as those who are bonafide patients on our Nursing Care Unit.

In our 31 bed Extended Care Facility in 1971, we have had an average patient census of 30 with diagnoses ranging from fractured hip to post cardiac pace-maker implementation. Private nursing patients from the general community are accepted on our unit when beds are not filled by residents. In addition to the residents cared for in the E.C.F., we have provided a supervised environment for an additional 18 residents whose physical or mental limitations preclude independent living.

As an additional support to continued independence our nursing service administers medications for residents. The needs in this area of service necessarily fluctuate but an average of 30 patients are seen by each shift each day.

Inhalation Therapy, minor treatments, dressing changes, and maintenance injections of vitamins are generally received by residents on the nursing unit.

Twice weekly doctor appointments are kept at the nursing station for an average of 36-40 visits per week.

In order to evaluate progress and prevent as far as possible, medical crisis, a weekly medical meeting is held. This meeting is attended by all those connected with the physical and mental well being of the patients, as well as the physician in attendance on the unit.

The Social Service needs of residents and persons on the nursing care unit are attended by a part-time, qualified, social worker. The social worker handles all admissions interviews,

making an assessment of the individual's ability to function independently in the social-emotional and physical levels as a resident. This study serves as a base-line social history for our future resident care. The social worker gives direct case-work service to residents, patients and to their families as the need arises. She participates in medical conferences and in staff development and training in areas of social and emotional awareness.

A Medical Records Secretary arranges all resident's doctors appointments both in our in-house clinics on Mondays and Fridays and with doctors in the community. She maintains records of all medications and prescriptions, organizes all medical charts, information forms and cares for their proper recording and storage. She organizes the weekly medical meetings and makes notes of their decisions. She is responsible for all Medicare Part A and Medicaid billing.

The Medical Insurance Secretary researches all doctor's bills, laboratory charges, physical therapy services, etc., for their accuracy. She receives the pertinent diagnostic information required for medicare and all other types of insurance claims and submits them for reimbursement. She summarizes all charges for persons on the nursing unit and produces charge statements for the bookkeeping and administrative offices. Procuring medicare and insurance benefits for 260 residents is an extremely complicated procedure but it secures resources which would often be neglected by individual residents because of the red tape involved in reimbursement claims.

To keep the business and bookkeeping procedures functioning properly, three full-time persons are employed; one, handling a payroll for 110 weekly and another 25 bi-weekly, with all deductions involved and accounts payable; a second person handles accounts receivable, resident billings and reception and deposit of the same. The head bookkeeper manages the general ledgers, organizes financial statements for the operating and capital accounts and oversees the work of the bookkeeping department.

Handling the communications, meeting the general public and guests, there are the switchboard staff giving 24 hour service both on the telephone and over the front desk. A general hostess handles guest room reservations, takes interested persons on tours of the house, assists new residents in "settling in", and assists residents in the postal service areas.

Providing a well functioning building for all the above activities are the very essentials and basic services of the Maintenance and Housekeeping departments.

Four full-time men are providing the building and grounds care of 224 apartment units and public areas; heat and air-conditioning, painting, nursing care unit oxygen supply and upkeep of all equipment, plumbing, etc.

The housekeeping is done by a staff of 15 maids, 3 porters and directed by an executive housekeeper and an assistant. The 224 apartments are serviced weekly, nursing care unit is serviced daily as are all public areas. Most of the flat linen is laundered here in the building. A laundry and dry cleaning handling service is provided. The executive housekeeper does all purchasing of cleaning supplies, medical supplies and general furnishings upkeep and cleaning. Trash handling, packing and disposal are supervised by this department.

The Marriott Corporation is contracted into Goodwin House to provide the management of the food service. Under a management team of the director and two assistants, 17 full-time and 40 part-time employees serve 5400 meals each week, including tray service on the nursing unit and to the sick in their rooms. 200 special dinners for resident family gatherings, clubs and organizations luncheons and teas, holiday festivals were served in 1971.

The Administrator and his office coordinates and facilitates all of the above activities and services through the Executive Secretary and the general management functions of the Administrator and his assistant. Securing professional service from the various disciplines of medical, nursing, geriatric, food production, and other service fields and budgeting for them the materials and assistance they need are part of the Administrator's responsibility. Involvement in state and national organizations to promote the advance of geriatric concerns in the total community is another activity of the administrator's office.

The operation of Goodwin House and the provisions of its services involves a sizable amount of money. In 1971 the total operating expenses amounted to \$1,314,327.70. The largest source of income is that derived from resident monthly maintenance charges, private patients on the nursing and physical assistance unit.

For those residents who cannot pay their full cost, the Fellowship Fund provides assistance of varying amounts according to need in both the category of monthly maintenance and Founder's Gift. These Fellowship Funds are derived from gifts from individuals, parish offerings and various church groups contributions. There are also various foundations who remember the Goodwin House Fellowship Fund in their annual distribution of funds. The goal for Fellowship Funds from the church and its members in 1971 was \$53,000. The income was \$23,000. In the light of our tax free status, a portion of our general operating funds is applied to the Fellowship program allows for a total 1971 provision for Fellowships of \$73,513.42. Our 1972 budget provision for the Fellowship program is approximately \$100,000.

We conclude this Goodwin House report with an emphasis on our full scope of services for retirement living and life-time care and with a genuine appeal for the support of our Fellowship Program to assist in a private way, those persons who need assistance in their cost of care.

III. INSTITUTIONS WHICH ARE RELATED TO THE DIOCESE BY TRADITION WHICH IN A SENSE NEED THE DIOCESE RATHER THAN BEING NECESSARY TO THE WORK OF THE CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE.

(a) The Bethany Institute of Virginia.

(Council recommended dissolution and referred this to the Executive Board for appropriate action)

(b) The Episcopal High School. (No Report Received)

(c) The Protestant Episcopal Church Home. (No Report Received)

(d) St. Paul's College.

From its humble beginning, Saint Paul's College, a co-educational, private, church-related, liberal arts institution, has been firm in its commitment to provide quality education for its students. While the purpose of this institution in its infancy was to bring literacy and skills necessary for survival to the impoverished Blacks in Southside Virginia, today it is a fully accredited four-year college with programs designed to prepare students for teaching in elementary and secondary schools and for admission to graduate and professional schools. Among its graduates may be found a diplomat in the United Nations, college presidents, physicians, lawyers, dentists, Federal service administrators, college and university administrators and professors, and several hundred school teachers and administrators.

Aside from income from student fees, which provide a little more than one-half of the cost of its operation, the primary sources of financial support for the College are the national Episcopal Church, the Dioceses in Virginia, the United Negro College Fund, Federal appropriations, endowment incomes, and gifts and grants.

A ray of hope during the 1970-1971 academic year was a substantial increase in the annual appropriations to the College by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Houston, Texas October 1970. It is hoped that the Dioceses will find it possible to do likewise.

During the year 1970-1971, Saint Paul's College successfully met the requirements for reaffirmation of its accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. In addition to the institutional study required by the Association, the College has been involved in several other studies of its total program which resulted in the strengthening of its personnel and facilities. A need for an academic building equipped with modern appointments had to receive top priority and, accordingly, an application was filed with and approved by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for a low interest loan to construct a \$1,198,000 academic facility. Construction is expected to begin during the current academic year.

In the Fall of 1969, the College opened a new \$1,115,000 dormitory for women. During the Spring of 1970, phases one and two of its Library renovation, which included climate control, new lighting, and new stacks and study carrels, were completed. During the Spring of 1971, construction began on a new central

heating plant to cost \$265,000. This project was completed in the Fall. These campus investments are cited to show that an effort is being made to improve the total climate of the College.

With a considerable amount of its funds, along with much needed financial supplement from Federal sources, the College has been able to strengthen its faculty and initiate or strengthen several new administrative and student services. Among these important services are Development, Placement, Cooperative Education, Recruitment, Counseling, Freshman Orientation, Dormitory Living, and the administration and organization of Student Personnel Services.

St. Paul's College was cited in a nationwide periodical as being one of a few colleges in the United States with a surplus revenue over expenditures in its operation for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971. This accomplishment was a result of an austerity program and wise use of its resources.

Because it has not been plagued with large-scale incidents of student unrest that have resulted so prevalently in violence and destruction of property on today's campuses throughout the nation, the College is one of a few institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth of Virginia without a penalty cost in its fire insurance premium.

After much agonizing, it was with considerable difficulty that, because of the lack of resources, the College announced to its faculty and staff in the Spring of 1971, it could not grant salary increases for the Academic Year 1971-1972. Yet every faculty and staff member, other than those persons with prior commitments, immediately signed his or her contract to continue loyal and dedicated service to the College. Much credit is due these persons

Equally divided between men and women, the student enrollment for the Academic Year 1971-1972 at the College is 541. Geographically, the student body is drawn from 16 States and the District of Columbia.

St. Paul's deserves and desperately needs the continued support of the Church and the Dioceses in Virginia. If it were not for St. Paul's a vast number of young persons would not have an opportunity for college experience - a tragedy that would have a far-reaching adverse effect in an affluent society.

If the Dioceses of Virginia rise to the challenge and the opportunity presented by St. Paul's College, the beneficial effect would be felt throughout Virginia, the nation and the world. It is a considered judgment of those seeking support for the College that the attitude of foundations and corporations is conditioned by the degree and kind of support that it receives from its church constituency.

The voice of the Church must be heard in our effort to give direction to today's youth in this world fraught with universal disorder and distrust. It is the hope of the leadership of the College that this voice will be loud and clear.

(b) Stuart Hall.

In the 128th year since its founding, Stuart Hall opened its 1971-1972 session with a happy, cooperative student body. The student unrest of a few years ago seems to have been largely replaced with an attitude of helpful responsibility. Various student-faculty committees are working together constructively. Also, most of our girls seem to be going at their studies with commendable seriousness of purpose. The student-to-student tutoring program initiated last Spring is being expanded and is bearing fruit both for the tutors and for the girls they are helping.

The composition of the student body is more varied than in former years. By special arrangement with Augusta Military Academy for the convenience of both schools, 13 cadets come to Stuart Hall each afternoon to join our French classes. Two black resident students (our first) have been well received and are doing good work. Both are on scholarships donated by an alumna.

The current problem about the student body is not spirit or variety but numbers. Stuart Hall has been hurt by the general falling off of boarding school enrollments throughout the country. This year we opened with 104 boarding students and 9 day students. We would like to have 120 boarding students and some additional day students.

Stuart Hall's curriculum continues to develop. Now new but of special interest is our highly successful summer program in France. In the summer of 1972 the Stuart Hall group will be at Dijon. During the current session 10 of our juniors and seniors will participate in a program of special ecological studies involving groups of students in a number of the Virginia preparatory schools, both girls' and boys'. For the most part Stuart Hall's participants will be pursuing this special study in addition to a full regular program. Additional changes this year include a new course in ecology and new content and approaches in religion courses.

Religious activities have changed in more areas than the courses in religion. Students are expected to establish a church home in Staunton either at the church of their parents denomination or at the church of which the Stuart Hall chaplain is Rector. Although they no longer go in a body to Emmanuel, the majority attend services there. The Rev. Hugh C. White, III, new Rector of Emmanuel and chaplain of Stuart Hall, is doing much to bring the parish and the school together as a congregation. In addition, Mr. White holds chapel services at the school every week, attends a number of school functions, and provides helpful counseling for those Stuart Hall girls who take advantage of it.

Financially Stuart Hall has had a varied year. It has raised close to \$200,000 in a capital funds campaign and has received, along with other church schools, a very substantial deferred bequest from the estate of William M. Habliston. The exact value of the bequest from the estate is still to be established. On the other hand, decreased enrollment has let to more decrease in operating income than in expenditures and has resulted in an unbalanced budget. In this period when the pendulum of public interest has swung away from boarding schools, Stuart Hall needs your loyalty.

You are asked to spread the word about its quality and to recommend it to parents of girls who can profit by the opportunities it offers.

December 31, 1971

1. During March, 1971, the securities held by the Invested Funds of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia were sold for \$339,970.50. A net gain of \$240,904.09 was realized thereon and an additional gain of \$1,754.21 had resulted from sales in prior years.

A portion of the total net gain of \$242,658.30 was allocated to the individual funds of the Invested Funds which received \$219,896.95. The equity of the Revolving Loan Funds in the securities of the Invested Funds resulted the remainder of \$22,761.35 of the gain being further allocated to the individual funds of the Revolving Loan Funds.

Following the allocation of the portion of the net gain to the individual funds of the Invested Funds these funds were renamed the First Deed of Trust Funds.

2. The following funds are held in the Revolving Loan Funds, and are on loan from the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia with the provision that the Trustees of the Funds may withdraw same upon two years' notice:

ACCOUNTANTS' COMMENTS RELATING TO CERTAIN AUDITING PROCEDURES

The scope of our examination is set forth in the Report of Certified Public Accountants. Certain features of the auditing procedures employed in our examination of the 1971 financial statements follow:

By means of selected tests, cash receipts as recorded were traced to bank deposits, and cancelled checks were examined in support of cash disbursements. Receipted bills and invoices supporting the expenditures during the year were substantially tested. Cash on deposit at end of the year was reconciled with amounts reported directly to us by the depositories.

Accounts and notes receivable were verified by an inspection of the notes and an examination of the supporting office records.

Notes payable were confirmed by the holders thereof or satisfactorily proved.

The cash transactions pertaining to the operations of the various departments of the Diocese of Virginia were tested as to their general accuracy, but we did not examine all the transactions.
