The 190th Annual Council adopted the following resolution:

Be It Resolved, that the 190th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia states that the following organizations are determined to be ecumenically related:

The Virginia Council of Churches Chaplain Services of the Churches of Virginia St. Alban's Housing Corporation

and the following organizations are determined to be Episcopally oriented:

Bloomfield, Incorporated St. Paul's College, Lawrenceville Virginia Theological Seminary Blue Ridge School Stuart Hall, Incorporated

and a current list of such organizations shall be maintained by the Secretary of the Diocese and published annually in the Journal of Council.

Rules of Order

Rules of Order

- 1. On each day of Council there shall be appropriate worship services including a celebration of Holy Communion at each regular meeting of the Council.
- 2. On the first day of Council the Presiding Officer, having taken the Chair, shall declare a quorum present, if such be the case, or he may direct that the roll of the members of the clerical and lay order be called to determine a quorum.
- 3. On the first day of Council, a Program of Council shall be adopted.
- On the first day of each regular meeting of Council, the Presiding Officer may appoint assistant secretaries to the Secretary of the Council.
- Prior to each regular meeting of Council, the Presiding Officer shall appoint the following Committees of Council to serve until their successors have been appointed.
 - A. Committee on Credentials
 - B. The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to which all proposed amendments to the Constitution and Canons shall be referred. The Committee on Constitution and Canons shall conduct a hearing at a session of Council and thereafter make a report to Council.

Notice having been given that amendments to the Constitution and Canons should be submitted prior to the Council meeting, no additional amendments to the Constitution and Canons shall be received and acted upon at the Council without a two-thirds vote of the Council, unless it shall be reported by a Committee of Council.

C. The Committee on Resolutions, to which may be referred all resolutions, except those referred to the Committee on Budget, provided they are submitted in writing, shall conduct a hearing at a session of the Council and thereafter report its recommendations on all resolutions submitted.

Notice having been given that resolutions and amendments to the Constitution and Canons should be submitted prior to the Council meeting, no additional resolutions or amendments to the Constitution and Canons shall be received and acted upon at the Council without a two-thirds vote of the Council, unless it shall be reported by a Committee of Council. All such amendments and/or resolutions submitted on the floor of Council must be submitted in 700 copies ready for distribution.

D. Committee on Budget, to which shall be referred (a) the Executive Board's recommended program and proposed funding, and (b) such resolutions related thereto as shall have been filed in writing with the Council.

The Committee on Budget shall conduct a hearing at a session of the Council and thereafter report to Council by presenting:

The Executive Board's budget

- The resolutions or recommendations referred to it by Council with the Committee's recommendation(s) to Council regarding adoption or rejection of each.
- Such other changes in the Executive Board budget as the Committee shall recommend, said changes to be presented in the form of a resolution or resolutions.
- E. The Committee on Church Status, to which shall be referred all petitions for church status prepared and presented as prescribed by Canon.
- F. The Committee on Related Organizations, which shall study, review, and report to Council the relationship existing between the Diocese and any organization, institution, corporation, board, or other group which by charter or custom or for any reason may be considered to have a relationship with the Diocese or a desire to have such a relationship. All requests to change or create such relationship shall be referred to this Committee. This Committee is charged with presenting to Council nominations for officers or board members of all related organizations.
- G. The Committee on the Journal of the Council, composed of three persons of whom the Secretary of the Diocese shall be one, and of either order, to whom shall be referred all matters to be printed in the Annual Journal of the Council, which said Committee shall have power to act during recess of the Council, and report to the Council.
- The Presiding Officer shall appoint such other committees of Council as the Council may direct or the Presiding Officer may determine and he may designate the chairman of any committee.
- The size and composition of every committee of Council shall be in the sole discretion of the Presiding Officer, except where otherwise provided by the Constitution and Canons.
- 8. The President may appoint a parliamentarian for any meeting of Council.
- 9. Elections: In every election where more persons are nominated than are to be elected, the balloting shall be:
 - A. On each ballot, the nominee(s) receiving the highest number of votes, but not less than a majority of votes cast, shall be declared elected.
 - B. If any office remains to be filled after the first ballot, second and subsequent ballots shall be taken. On each later ballot, the number of nominees shall be reduced by one-half, but such reduction shall always provide for two more nominees than offices to be filled. In the event of a single vacancy, the number of nominees shall be reduced to two. Depending upon the distribution of votes, the presiding officer may, on the advice of the Chief Judge of Election and with the approval of Council, authorize the retention of three more names than offices to be filled.
 - C. In event of an impasse, declared to be such by the Presiding Officer, the Council may change or modify Section A and B of this rule by a majority vote of members present, notwithstanding the requirement for a two-third vote to suspend a Rule of Order.

- D. Whenever the Council must fill a vacancy on the Standing Committee, the order of election shall be:
 - 1) The member for a regular term;
 - The member or members for the longest vacancy to be filled;
 - 3) The member or members for the remaining vacancy to be filled.
- 10. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Presiding Officer, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary. After a motion is so stated or read, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the Presiding Officer or any member require it.
- 12. A. When a motion is pending, the following amendments shall be in order:
 (1) One amendment may be made to each independent or separable portion thereof; and (2) one motion to amend that amendment shall be in order; and it shall be in order also (3) to offer a further amendment by way of substitute to which may be offered (4) one amendment.
 - B. No proposition not germane to the subject under consideration shall be received under color of an amendment or a substitute. Neither the substitute nor its amendment shall be voted on (except to lay on the table) until the original matter is perfected. An amendment or a substitute may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of his seconder before amendment thereof or before decision is had thereon.
 - C. The amendment or the substitute shall be debatable only when the main question is debatable.
 - D. The adoption of an amendment by way of substitute or otherwise shall not displace the main resolution, which, after being amended, shall be the question before the Council.
 - E. The following questions cannot be amended: (1) The call for the Order of the Day, (2) an appeal from the decision of the Chair, (3) an objection to consideration of any question, or the motions, (4) to adjourn, (5) to lay on the table, (6) to take from the table, (7) for leave to continue speaking, (8) to postpone indefinitely, (9) to reconsider, (10) to suspend rules, (11) to take up business out of order, or (12) for leave to withdraw a motion.
 - F. The order of decision of a question before the Council shall be:
 - (1) Amendment to the amendment of the main question;
 - (2) Amendment to the main question;
 - (3) Amendment to the substitute motion;
 - (4) The substitute motion;
 - (5) If the substitute fails, then the main question.

- 13. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to (1) adjourn, (2) to lay on the table, (3) for the previous question, (4) to take at a certain time, (5) to commit or recommit, (6) to amend or substitute, (7) to postpone to a certain day, or (8) to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated and be settled by a majority vote.
- 14. A motion for the previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the previous question or questions before the Council now be put?" If the previous question is voted, only the immediately pending questions before the Council shall be put without debate.
- A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.
- When two or more members of Council rise at once, the Presiding Officer shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 17. Except by leave of the Council, no member shall speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than two minutes at one time.
- 18. The vote on all questions shall be taken by orders whenever as many as five members request it.
- 19. Reports of all committees shall be in writing. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the Presiding Officer shall, without obligation, so direct, or when the Council shall so require.
- 20. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.
- 21. All persons elected as officials of the Diocese by the Council or by the Executive Board of the Council, Presidents of the Regions, and members of the Executive Board elect who will take office at the conclusion of the regular meeting of Council, shall by virtue of their respective offices, be entitled to a seat and voice, but no vote, at all meetings of the Council.
- 22. These rules may be amended or special orders for the conduct of business adopted at any time by a two-thirds majority of the members present.
- 23. In all matters not specifically covered by these Rules of Order or by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, Robert's Rules of Order, Revised, shall govern the Council in all cases to which they are applicable.

The Rev. Raymond W. Davis

July 20, 1919 - December 25, 1993

The Rev. Raymond W. Davis, former rector of Truro Church, Fairfax, died December 25, 1993.


He had been an assistant at the Cathedral of St. Luke in Portland (Me.); assistant at St. Peter, Morristown (N.J.); and a U.S. Army chaplain before coming to Virginia to be rector of Truro from 1948-74.

After retiring from the full-time parish ministry in 1975, he was a visiting fellow at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1976-77, 1984-85, 1988-91, assistant at Trinity, Manassas, 1985-87, and assistant at St. Paul's, Knightsbridge (London), 1987-88.

He was the author of An Ecumenical Episcopate: The Life and Work of Edwin James Palmer, Bishop of Bombay 1908-29.

He retired to South Caicos Island in the British West Indies where he served as rector of St. George's Church until his death at age 74.

His funeral was held January 11, 1994 at Trinity, Manassas, Bishop Lee officiating, with interment at Pohick Church Cemetery in Lorton.



The Rev. Treadwell Davison

April 5, 1912 - May 30, 1993

The Rev. Treadwell Davison of Tucker Hill died May 30, 1993. He was 81.

A native of Richmond, Davison twice served as the rector of Washington and Montross parishes, most recently from 1951 until his retirement in 1977. He earned his undergraduate and master's degrees from the University of Virginia and earned the Master in Divinity from Virginia Seminary in 1937. He was ordained the following year.

Davison was assistant principal of the Blue Ridge Industrial School in Bristol from 1937-1939 when he was named rector of Washington and Montross parishes. During World War II, he served as an army chaplain in the U.S. and in Europe.

After the war, he continued his ministry as rector of St. John's, West Point, St. David's, Aylett, and St. Stephen's, King and Queen from 1946-48. In 1948 he was called to be rector of Calvary Church in Tarboro, N.C. until 1951 when he returned to Washington and Montross parishes, which later included St. Paul's, Nomini Grove. He retired in 1977.

A funeral service was held June 2 at St. James', Montross, Bishop Lee presiding. Burial followed in the church cemetery.



The Rev. Alexander Fraser


January 25, 1926 - December 17, 1993

The Rev. Alexander Fraser, the former rector of St. Stephen's, Heathsville, died December 17, 1993 at age 67.

Fraser began his ministry as rector of St. Paul's and priest-in-charge of St. Peter's and St. Phillip's Missions in Salisbury (N.C.). From there, his ministry took him to parishes in Louisiana, South Carolina, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania and Alabama. Fraser was also a former chair of missions in the Diocese of Southern Virginia and served on the Alabama Department of Mission in Higher Education as well as numerous other committees.

He was rector of St. Stephen's, Heathsville from 1981-1985.

A memorial service was held December 27, 1993 at Wicomico Church, Wicomico. His cremated remains were scattered at Christ Church in Tarrytown, New York, where he served as summer supply priest from 1986 until his death.



The Rev. Glyn Jones

February 12, 1915 - January 12, 1994

The Rev. Glyn Jones, former assistant at St. Thomas', McLean, died January 12, 1994, in Reston. He was 78.

Jones earned an M.Div. in 1940 from Andover Newton Technical School. He served as a chaplain in the U.S. Navy from 1941-1965 and then as chaplain of Northfield Mount Hermon School in Massachusetts from 1965-1980.

He was ordained to the diaconate in 1984 and served as an assistant at St. Thomas', McLean until 1988 when he retired.

A memorial service was held Jan. 15 at St. Thomas', McLean.



The Rev. Francis Bayard Rhein

January 5, 1915 - January 2, 1994

The Rev. Francis Rhein died January 2, 1994. He was 78.

Ordained to the priesthood in 1943 by Bishop Goodwin, "Padre" Rhein had served several parishes in the Diocese of Virginia: St, James', Montross; St. Peter's, Oak Grove; St. Mary's, Colonial Beach; St. John's, Warsaw; Cople Parish, Hague; Cunningham Chapel Parish, Christ Church Millwood; Emmanuel, Harrisonburg; and Trinity, Upperville.


He also served parishes in Rhode Island and Philadelphia. Rhein was also a chaplain in the U.S. Naval Reserve from 1943-46.

While rector of Emmanuel, Harrisonburg, he served as an associate professor of philosophy and biblical literature at James Madison University from 1957-66.

Upon his retirement from the parish ministry in 1979, he served as an adjunct professor at Lord Fairfax Community College until 1981.

He is the author of two books: An Analytical Approach to the New Testament, and A Simplified Approach to the New Testament.

He was buried January 5, at Little Georgetown, The Plains, following a funeral service at Cunningham Chapel Parish, Christ Church.



The Rev. Embry C. Rucker

October 1, 1914 - August 1, 1994

The Rev. Embry C. Rucker, a retired priest of this diocese, died August 1, 1994, in Reston. He was 79.

Rucker graduated from Virginia Military Institute in 1936 and spent 25 years as a businessman in Louisville before reading for Holy Orders in the Diocese of Kentucky.

He was ordained a priest in 1962 and served in Kentucky before being called as rector of St. Aidan's, Alexandria in 1963. He was the vicar of Reston Parish from 1969 until his retirement in 1976.

The Episcopal Congregation of the Church at Reston was the first Episcopal presence in what was then a newly developed town.

During his years in Reston, Rucker founded the Common Ground Foundation which launched the Common Ground Child Care Center as well as a Reston bus service, a visiting nurses agency and two organizations to help the needy: Friendly Immediate and Sympathetic Help (FISH), and Reston Interfaith Inc. Rucker also served on the boards of the Virginia Churchman and Goodwin House and was vice-president of the Trustees of Diocesan Homes. He is the author of 300 Weeks of Sundays.

A graveside service was held August 4 at Chestnut Grove Cemetery in Herndon.



The Rev. Berry Barber Simpson

December 25, 1915 - December 6, 1993

The Rev. Berry Simpson, former rector of Olivet Church, Franconia, died December 6, 1993. He was 77.

A graduate of Virginia Seminary (M.Div. 1941), Simpson was ordained to the priesthood in 1941. He served as vicar of Chapel of the Holy Evangelist in Baltimore from 1941-43. In 1943, he began three years of service as a U.S. Navy chaplain.

After the war, Simpson became rector of St. James, Indian Head, Maryland from 1946-48; rector of Holy Communion, Washington, 1948-69; and rector of Olivet Church, where he stayed until his retirement in 1981.

Bishop Montgomery presided at a memorial service December 9, 1993 at Olivet Church.

Proceedings of the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia January 7, 1994 Fredericksburg, Virginia

The 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia convened on Saturday, January 7, 1994 in Dodd Auditorium at Mary Washington College, Fredericksburg, at 10 a.m.

The Rt. Rev. Peter James Lee, Bishop of Virginia, called the meeting to order and introduced the Suffragan Bishop of Virginia, the Rt. Rev. F. Clayton Matthews, as Chaplain of the Council, for Meditation Number 1.

Meditation Number 1

The Council sang Hymn 577 and read Psalm 111.

Bishop Matthews read the lesson from the Gospel according to Matthew. After reading the lesson, Bishop Matthews offered the following meditation.

It is my pleasure to be your Chaplain during this 199th Annual Council. During the Council I will be working with a popular drama group known as the Friends of the Groom. We will be responding to the theme of this 199th Council, "Bearing one another's burdens."

The meditation for today will be in the spirit of, but not the same format as the meditations that will follow January 28 and 29. And in our lesson from the Gospel according to the evangelist Matthew, we understand that there is also a parallel to the same story in the Gospel according to Mark. In the account from Matthew, it is the mother of the sons of Zebedee who comes before our Lord asking not only for a position of honor and privilege to be created, but also that her two sons be given that position. Her name was Salome, and according to some, Matthew the evangelist is trying to protect the honor of James and John by having their mother come, rather than the two of them. It is Mark who tells us that indeed it was James and John who came to Jesus, asking not only for this position to be created, but that they fulfill both the positions of sitting at the right and left hand with Jesus in His Kingdom.

Those of us who are parents can fully understand the passion that went into the desire of Salome for her two children not only to be successful, but also to have a position of privilege. For those of us who are parents know that desire well. We want our child (or our children) to be successful. We want them to be financially independent. We want them to have friendships that are fulfilling. We want them to be able to be independent, and to think for themselves, to have ample amounts of power and responsibility. We want them to have a strong faith, and if we are honest with ourselves, we want them to be able to take care of us in our declining years.

And in our desire for success, we as parents are often willing to go to all extremes to help them fulfill that goal. We are willing to take the risk of being humiliated, we are willing to extend our own good health and to jeopardize it. And we are willing to not only jeopardize our good health, but also to extend our resources far beyond those for which we are capable. We are willing to deny our own needs and our wants. And yes, even on some occasions, we are willing to stretch the truth in order to accomplish the goal. Salome comes to Jesus as his sister-in-law. And she

comes asking for a position of favor based not necessarily on James' and John's character and qualifications, but rather on family relationship. "Will you do me a favor?" But we do not have to be parents in order to understand the human drama of this lesson. For all of us carry in our heart of hearts desires and ambitions. All of us want to be successful. All of us want to be wealthy. All of us want to be able to exercise influence and power. All of us want to be independent. I am convinced in the response of the 10, that they reveal also their own ambitions, for they recognize the request of the two immediately. And I am also convinced that in their response, we are given an insight into a universal desire for ambition, and also the universal tension between pride and humility. Pride is self love, and it is sinful when pride leads us in our love of self to only use it for our own desires, and to put it aside in some kind of perpetual self deposit. Pride is self love, and it is not sinful when it is used to propel us to work for the good of self and others, despite the blemishes that we know in each. Humility is not polite self-deprecation, but humility is looking into others and seeing and responding to them, and our own selves, in the same way. And in the lesson for today, we have the clear message that our destiny, our souls, are in the hands of God, and that the way God deals with us is through the love made known to us in Jesus Christ. Therefore, in the Kingdom of God, it would be those who serve, those who are willing to bear one another's burdens, who will be great. It will be those who serve who will inherit thrones. The Napoleons around us will find exile.

The Tale of the Three Trees: An American folktale.

There were three trees growing on a hilltop. Each one was growing and had dreams and ambitions.

The first said that it wanted to be a box, but not just any old box. It wanted to be the treasure chest of a wealthy human being, to hold the great treasures of the world.

The second tree said that it wanted to be the mast on a sailing ship, and not just any sailing ship, but one in the Royal Navy, and it would insure the safety of the King, even as it travelled through storms.

The third said it just wanted to be a tree, but not any old tree. It wanted to grow beyond the clouds, and it wanted to point to the heavens for all to see.

Years passed, and three woodsmen with axes came to the top of the hill. They cut the trees down, and each went their separate ways. The first tree was taken to a carpenter. It was stripped of its bark, trimmed of its limbs, and made into a box. But not a treasure chest. A box for feeding animals.

The second tree was taken to a dockyard. It was stripped of its bark, trimmed of its limbs, and it was made into a bench, and placed on a fishing vessel.

The third tree was taken to a lumberyard. It was stripped of its bark, and trimmed of its limbs. And then it was placed on the woodpile, underneath a tarp, because it was so flawed that it was not good for even common use.

Years passed. And then one day, a young couple came into a barn where the first tree lay as a feeding box. They gave birth to their first born, wrapped him in soft clothes, and laid him in the box. The dream of the first tree was realized, because it held within it the greatest treasure of the world.

Years later, a young teacher stepped onto a fishing vessel, and laid down on a bench—the second tree. And later in the night, a storm came up, and the captain, out of fear, came to the young teacher and said, "Help." And with one word—one word—the teacher stood and silenced the wind. The dream of the second tree had been fulfilled. It carried the King of Kings.

Years passed. Soldiers came and found a tree in a lumberyard—the third tree—and placed it on the back of a wounded man. They planted it on a hilltop and put the man on it. And the dream of the third tree was realized, because anyone who saw that event that day, or sees it today, knows that tree points us to the way to heaven.

The story, the lesson, brings us to the wonderful paradox of our faith, and that is, we are the strongest, we are the most capable of responding to the needs of others, the burdens of others, when we recognize our weaknesses, and know our need to trust in God's strength, and in God's timing.

Let us pray

Lord, make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred let us sow love, where there is injury, pardon, where there is discord, union, where there is doubt, faith. Where there is despair, hope, where there is darkness, light, where there is sadness, joy. Grant we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. *Amen.*

Announcements

Following the meditation, Bishop Lee made several announcements, including informing Council of the death of the Reverend Raymond Davis, retired priest of this Diocese, who died in his sleep on Christmas Day. A service for Mr. Davis, who was living in the British Virgin Islands at the time of his death, was to be held at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, January 11, at Trinity Church, Manassas.

Bishop Lee also reported the death of the Rt. Rev. William Gordon, retired Bishop of Alaska, three days earlier in Michigan. The Bishop said that he was sending the Rev. Alwin Reiners to represent the Diocese at a memorial service to be held at the Cathedral in Detroit for Bishop Gordon. Mr. Reiners, a priest of this Diocese, served under Bishop Gordon as a missionary in Alaska.

Finally, Bishop Lee reported that the Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals found no reversible error in the decision of the Arlington Circuit Court that dismissed the lawsuit of Jane Doe against the Reverend Bruce Newell, the Falls Church, the Diocese of Virginia, and Bishop Lee.

Bishop Lee recognized Sarah Bartenstein, Executive for Communication and Diocesan **Events**, who made additional announcements.

Appointment of Secretary and Assistant Secretaries of Council

Bishop Lee appointed the Rev. Charles Gill as Secretary of the Council, and the Rev. Gail Epes and the Rev. Randolph Hollerith as assistant secretaries. The Bishop called on the Secretary for determination of a quorum.

The Secretary reported that Article 4 of the Diocesan constitution states, "One-third of the members of the clerical order and 1/2 of the members of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business, at any regular or special meeting of the council." There being 384 members of the clerical order, 128 were required for a quorum; there being 269 members of the lay order, 135 were required for a quorum. At 9:30 a.m., 130 members of the clerical order had registered, and 165 members of the lay order had registered. The Secretary stated that a quorum was present.

Appointment of Parliamentarian and Adoption of Program and Rules of Order

Bishop Lee appointed Russell V. Palmore as Parliamentarian of the Council, and asked for a motion to adopt the Program of Council as contained in the council packet. The Program was adopted.

Bishop Lee asked for a motion to adopt the Rules of Order as found in the council packet. The Rules were adopted as printed.

Credentials, and Call for Submission of Additional Resolutions, Nominations, Changes to the Constitution and Canons

The Bishop recognized Mr. P.C. Omohundro of Emmanuel Church, Brook Hill, Richmond, Chair of the Credentials Committee.

Mr. Omohundro reported that his Committee had examined all the certificates of election and had filed with the Secretary a list of those persons who have been properly elected to serve as delegates to this council.

Bishop Lee thanked the Committee, and called for submission of any nominations, resolutions, or proposed amendments to the Constitution or Canons, or to the budget, that had not been previously submitted. He advised that after this date, any such resolutions that are not resolutions of a committee of Council must receive a 2/3 vote for their consideration.

No additional items were submitted.

Report on Medical Insurance

The Bishop asked Dr. David Charlton to report on the medical insurance plan for the Diocese. Dr. Charlton gave the following report.

Thank you, Bishop. At the 197th Council in 1992, Council resolved to create a task force to study and to develop a medical insurance plan for the Diocese. The task force was chaired by Stephen Foster, the insurance commissioner of Virginia and a member of Christ Church, Richmond, and many fine and knowledgeable members were appointed to work on that task force. Their charge was to create a diocesan plan which had the best possible coverage, schedule of medical benefits, at the best possible price, and with the most choice of medical providers, doctors and hospitals.

It was also hoped that plan would position the Diocese well for health care reform. The issues of coverage, of price and of choice, we very quickly learned, are issues which are in tension; they work against one another in developing a medical insurance plan. It became clear early on, in addition, that the way to accomplish these opposing goals was through two major efforts: one, to manage medical care. That means the kind of certification and oversight of the provision of health care which is sometimes known through the shorthand of "gatekeeping," and also through the kind of negotiated discounts with hospitals and doctors that are available when you represent a large enough group.

That leads into the second point that the Task Force discovered: that critical mass that provides muscle in negotiating discounts was essential to achieve the objectives that we were given as a task force. The Diocese of Virginia, 180+ churches and missions, is viewed by the insurance industry as an association, a voluntary association, not as a group similar to an employer/employee group. In order for this to work we needed to appear more like an employer and behave more like a formal group. The task force developed such a plan, recommended it to the Executive Board, and that plan was approved. The provider of that plan is Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Virginia, a financially sound entity, one of five or six large national and regional providers of health insurance which the task force believed would be well positioned to provide health care regardless of what healthcare reform brings us. The plan that they've developed which the Executive Board has approved for the Diocese has a good schedule of benefits, it has a good price with controls on increases in those prices, and provides choices of doctors and hospitals. In fact, it provides full choice of doctors and hospitals, while making very clear financial incentives in the plan to use those doctors and hospitals which are participating and with whom discounts have been negotiated.

This plan was recommended and adopted five months ago. The intervening five months have been spent in an effort to communicate the details of this plan and the issues before us as a diocese. We have done workshops, the issue has been covered at all 181 vestry visits, most of

which have been accomplished, some of which are yet to be accomplished, mailings, articles in the Virginia Episcopalian, and many, many, many individual meetings, conversations and exchanges of correspondence. It's critical to do this kind of education between now and then because of the issue I mentioned before about participation. This plan is conditioned on and dependent on participation of at least 75 percent of those eligible. We can perhaps have a plan with fewer than 75 percent, but it will undoubtedly affect the premium that's charged, and it's not a certainty that we could have a plan with less than 75 percent. I hope that you'll look closely at the proposed canonical change, C-3, in the pink pages of your packet. There's an accompanying statement of rationale supporting it. That's the proposed addition to the Canons which would mandate participation and allow us, in effect, to begin to act as a formal employeremployee group in the eyes of insurance providers. Please read C-3 and read the rationale carefully, and listen to the open hearings, and make your own views known on that.

I think going forward it's fair to say that, if in the wisdom of Council that canonical change is made, that we'd appear to be a group in the eyes of insurance companies, our cost will be spread across the entire group, and our strength, stability and security as a group can be maximized. Without that canon, we will try this year, and if successful, we will try every year to achieve and to sustain sufficient participation to remain viable and hope that we don't repeat the experience of our current carrier, the insurance plan that covers 44 percent of those eligible now, the Medical Benefit Trust through the general Church. That experience is of course that some depart the group because they're able, perhaps temporarily, as a result of age or location, or a surrender of choice, to get a better price.

Between now and the overnight meeting at the end of the month at Reston, I want to encourage any of you—and please pass the word to members of your vestry, key decision-makers in your parishes—to write, call or fax me or Mike Kerr, the assistant treasurer of the Diocese, any questions that you might have. We'll come visit you, we'll answer your questions. We think it's terribly important, when this decision is made at the next session of Council, that it be made on an informed basis with a clear understanding of what is being gained, perhaps, and what is being lost, perhaps, as you weigh long-term stability and security versus independence and perhaps permanent or perhaps temporary financial advantage. There are clear trade-offs in considering this canon and its our hope that the Diocese will make a fully informed, "eyes-open" decision. In addition, at the two-day council in Reston, there'll be an opportunity during the open hearings for a question-and-answer session for those of you that have individual or particular questions.

Finally, Bishop, I'd like to thank Steve Foster for chairing the task force, and Bishop Matthews for providing the support for it during most of the time, and all the other members of the task force, many of whom are here. They worked hard for a year and a half to do this, and I hope you'll give it careful consideration. Thank you.

Bishop Lee thanked Dr. Charlton.

Reports from Committees of Council and Open Hearings

Bishop Lee introduced the Committees on Constitution and Canons, the Budget, and Resolutions.

Mr. J.P. Causey Jr., St. John's, West Point, made preliminary remarks about the work of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Mrs. Martha Barfoot, St. Luke's, Alexandria, briefly summarized the resolutions submitted thus far to the Committee on Resolutions.

The Rev. Geoffrey Hoare, St. Paul's, Alexandria, gave the following report on behalf of the Budget Committee.

We do have some matters, serious matters to address and to report. You've received a copy of the proposed budget, the budget proposed to you by the Executive Board, on which work began early in the fall.

We sought to be clear that our role is to effect diocesan policy, not to make it. What we've heard over the past few years from the Diocese, from the Executive Board, from previous Annual Councils, from vestry visits, is that the budgetary priorities for funding in our diocese are, in the main, the establishment of new missions, and the expansion of the episcopate.

We have proposed a no-growth budget, no growth in anticipated income over 1993 when the books are finally closed. As of yesterday there are about 50 pledges from churches still to be received, and the ones that have been received are running at about two and a half percent less than last year. So a no-growth budget is still optimistic, and I hope that the Budget Committee of Council will not be making further cuts when we meet in Reston.

Before the Executive Board voted on this proposed budget, discussions were held with the board, the presidents of regions and the deans of regions. The question put to that group of diocesan leaders was whether or not we were correct in understanding the budgetary priorities of the Diocese to be new missions and the expansion of the episcopate. And if we were not correct, what are the priorities of the Diocese? Discussion was lively, but overall what we heard was that we're on the right track, that the priorities we have identified are still our priorities. That being the case, the Executive Board unanimously approved and proposed the budget as you have received it today.

We are all aware that the cuts that are found throughout this budget represent muscle. They represent personnel and program and they affect a large number of lives. This is particularly true of the cuts in work with our ecumenical partners, the Chaplains' Service, the Virginia Council of Churches, The Interfaith Center for Public Policy. The cuts affect our ability to provide scholarship assistance, which goes largely to minority populations, and significantly reduce subsidies of a number of conferences at Shrine Mont. We are clear that these cuts result from a fundamental policy choice, and are necessary in the light of that choice.

As you read through this budget, there is one difference from previous years that you may notice, and that is that specific line items for the Commission on Congregational Missions have not been detailed. The reason for this is that the early work of CCM anticipated a more significant increase than the meager 3 percent that we were able to provide, and they are currently working out how to

allocate those funds among the various people looking for them. A proposed budget document which includes those numbers will be produced for us when we meet in Reston. However, the bottom line number is the bottom line that is being proposed. Those of you who are new to this body will not probably be aware that the Commission on Congregational Missions is the body that actually allocates those monies to the individual congregational missions of our diocese.

The budget does not extend our ability to start and fund new missions. As previous budget committees have reported, we are not allocating enough money to properly fund our goal of one new mission a year. We've made a good start. But we're not there yet. This is a line item that if we are to be fully serious, will need to be increased in the future.

We have funded a search, consecration and initial salary for a second suffragan bishop in 1994. This is all but \$26,000 of the full cost for the third bishop. Should this budget pass in its current form or something close to it, we will be leaving the Diocese free to articulate new or additional budgetary priorities in future years. We will not be leaving a job unfinished.

I believe that all other line items are fairly self explanatory, but we welcome questions and would gladly give such explanations as I can during our lunch breaks, or indeed on the telephone or by mail while the council is in recess. There will be an open plenary hearing this afternoon, and another opportunity to raise concerns at a hearing on Friday the 28th in Reston before the budget is presented by the Budget Committee of Council and discussed for a vote on Saturday the 29th.

Let me conclude this brief report by reiterating that the Executive Board understands that the fundamental issue of this budget is one of priorities. If we have misunderstood or misinterpreted the priorities of our diocese, then this council must make that clear. And we will gladly go back to work on your behalf.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Hoare and introduced the members of the Budget Committee.

Bishop Lee introduced the members of the Executive Staff: Bishop Matthews, David Charlton, Sarah Bartenstein and Happy Pullman.

Because the program was running ahead of schedule at this point, Bishop Lee invited the Committee on Constitution and Canons to hold their open hearing before lunch instead of after lunch as was reflected on the program.

The Committee conducted their hearing, after which Mr. Causey reminded the Council that there would be an additional hearing in Reston.

The Bishop led noonday prayers. After prayers, he called a recess for lunch.

After lunch, Council members went into regional caucuses.

Following the caucuses, delegates reconvened in Dodd Auditorium for hearings on the budget and proposed resolutions.

Following the hearings, Bishop Lee reminded delegates that they reconvene in Reston on January 28 and encouraged them to study and prayerfully to consider the materials they had received before and during the January 8 session of Council.

The Bishop noted that the Council stood in recess until January 28, and dismissed the members with his blessing.



January 28, 1994 Reston, Virginia

The 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia reconvened Friday morning, January 28, 1994 at the Reston Town Center. Inclement weather prevented many delegates from arriving on time, so there was not a quorum when the President, the Rt. Rev. Peter James Lee, opened the meeting at 10:56 a.m. The time for taking the first ballot for Standing Committee elections was moved from 10:55 a.m. until after lunch to allow time for more delegates to arrive.

Bishop Lee asked that anyone wishing to introduce a resolution not previously submitted do so at this point. He reminded the Council that the rules of order stated that any such resolutions be submitted already typed and copied on 3-hole punch paper. He also said that because of the weather, the Parliamentarian would be somewhat flexible about receiving the actual copies late.

The Rev. Rosemari Sullivan, St. Clement's, Alexandria, submitted a courtesy resolution.

The Rev. Deborah Rutter, Grace Church, Kilmarnock, noted that 700 copies of a resolution from the Committee on Peace were on the way to Reston. The Council approved the submission of this resolution by a two-thirds vote, as required by the Rules of Order.

Mrs. Betty Wanamaker noted that 700 copies of a courtesy resolution would be forthcoming.

Bishop Lee announced that more delegates had registered, bringing the total closer to a quorum, adding that no votes would be taken until a quorum was assured. He offered thanks to God that those in the chamber had arrived safely and asked for prayers that those enroute would have safe travel.

Meditation Number 2

Bishop Lee introduced Bishop Matthews for Meditation Number 2. Bishop Matthews introduced the Friends of the Groom, a Christian drama troupe.

The Suffragan Bishop read the lesson from the fourth chapter of the Gospel according to Mark, verses 1-9.

The Friends of the Groom then presented, "Unless a Seed Falls."

Bishop Matthews led prayers.

O God our Father, there are no two of us here with the same need. You know our needs. Bless us as each one of us needs. Especially bless those who are in the middle of some especially difficult time, those who have some especially difficult task to face, or some especially difficult examination to sit, those who have some especially difficult problem to solve, those who have some especially difficult decision to make, those who have some especially difficult temptation to resist, those who have some especially baffling doubt through which to think their way. Speak to those who are evading some decision, shirking some task, putting off some duty, playing with fire, wasting their time, throwing away their opportunities. Tell them that they dare not bring shame to themselves and disappointment to those who love them. Speak to those who are successful, that they may be kept from all pride and self-conceit. Speak to those who are selfconfident, that they may not be riding for a fall. Speak to those who are too sure that they are right, and too sure that everyone else is wrong, that they may be kept from intolerance. Help those who are shy, remember those who are in disgrace and in prison, and keep them from despair. This we pray through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy, but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified, mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace, through the same, thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Bishop Matthews closed the morning worship by leading the Council in the Lord's Prayer.

Announcements

Bishop Lee encouraged delegates and visitors to visit the exhibits and to pick up the newly published Camps and Conferences brochures. He explained changes in the program made to accommodate late-comers.

The Bishop introduced Sarah Bartenstein, Executive for Communication and Diocesan Events.

Ms. Bartenstein explained that copies of the revised program were being printed. She also announced that videotapes and printed copies of the Bishop's Pastoral Address would be available.

Ms. Bartenstein then introduced Dr. David Charlton, Treasurer of the Diocese. Dr. Charlton made the following remarks.

Remarks by the Treasurer

I want to share some rather sobering financial news with you before we actually go into budget hearings. To orient you, let me list the things that are in your packet on blue paper. There is a trial balance, which is an unaudited, year-end statement from 1993, and a pledge report. There's a report of parish audits received as of the 13th of December—please remember the canonical obligation to audit those accounts—and there's a proposed 1994 budget, again with the accompanying pledge reports. There are summary reports on the operating budget as well as the growth of the New Church Budget to which many churches have pledged.

I wrote to the senior wardens in December at the request of the Executive Board to give an update on the financial situation. When we closed the books for 1993 we had an income shortfall of \$169,000. That means that about 94 percent of the dollars estimated when pledged were actually received. It is possible that some late payments will come and adjust that a little bit, but that's the number.

We did not spend \$152,000 of budgeted, authorized money in the 1993 budget, so when we closed the books, unaudited, there was a \$17,000 deficit that may be offset by late payments. However, that was achieved at the cost of not filling the third funded bishop's position, as well as other staff positions which were held vacant.

For 1994, we have, verbally or in writing, 174 of 182 churches pledged and overall we're experiencing a 5 percent reduction in the estimate of dollars for 1994, against what was pledged in 1993. The Executive Board anticipated some reduction in dollars when it put together the proposed budget, which is in your packets, but not a drop that dramatic.

At the moment, the 1994 proposed budget before you anticipates \$26,000 more in income than we expect to get; that's a \$26,000 problem. That's compounded by the fact that the budget is based on the assumption that we can budget 100 percent of the dollars pledged or estimated. We have never done that in my seven years as treasurer. Historically we have budgeted 98.5 percent of dollars pledged; our experience is we have received 96 or 97 percent of dollars pledged, and in 1993, we received 94.5 percent of dollars pledged. So the question before you, and before your budget committee, is what should we do with that in 1994?

In my seven years in the Diocese of Virginia, the rate of increase of parish giving to the Diocese has gradually declined. In 1994 giving will have gone down for the first time. I don't know if that's an aberration, a trend, or a fundamental change in the way funding and revenue are going to be. But we need to make that decision together, and we need to start making it at this council.

These pledges on which our budget is based are estimates, intentions, hopes, but the expense side of this budget is almost entirely commitments and promises to people and to programs who are depending on that money. So those of you who plan to attend the budget hearings, I encourage you to think about these larger structural issues that drive this budget, and to share your thoughts and your suggestions with the Budget Committee, along with your concerns and suggestions for individual programs and line items. They will need that guidance from you. Thank you very much.

Bishop Lee thanked Dr. Charlton and announced that it was time to leave the plenary sessions for open hearings.

Open Hearings

Delegates left to attend open hearings on the budget, proposed resolutions, and proposed amendments to the Constitution and Canons.

Report of Roll Call, Determination of Quorum and Ballot Number 1

Bishop Lee announced that a quorum was present with 176 lay delegates and 145 clerical delegates now in attendance, and proceeded to call for the first ballot for the election of four new members to the Standing Committee, two in the lay order and two in the clerical order.

Introduction of Ecumenical and Other Honored Guests

Bishop Lee recognized the ecumenical guests invited to Council, some of whom were unable to attend due to the weather: Father Roy Cosby of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Arlington, representing Bishop Richard Keating; Pastor Conrad Christianson of the Virginia Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America; the Rev. Robert Parsons, representing Bishop Stockton of the United Methodist Church of Virginia Conference; Pastor Thomas Prinz, representing Bishop Jansen of the Metropolitan Synod of Washington of the Evangelical Lutheran Church; and the Rev. James MacDonald, general minister of the Virginia Council of Churches.

Pastoral Address of the Bishop

Bishop Lee gave the following pastoral address:

"Bear One Another's Burdens"

My brothers and sisters in Christ,

At this first Council that he is attending as a Bishop in the Church of God, I want to salute the Rt. Rev. Clay Matthews, our suffragan bishop, as a cherished friend, a trusted colleague, and a stimulating partner in the episcopate.

A diocesan bishop is called, in ecclesiastical terminology "the ordinary." *This* suffragan bishop, I believe, we can call "the extraordinary."

Since his consecration in September, our work together has taken on new dimensions as we have shared this ministry and I find that sharing to be renewing and encouraging for the life of our diocese.

I have asked Bishop Matthews to pay particular attention to church planting, to supervision of mission churches, and to congregational development as well as to continue his leadership in the ordination process. It is a joy to experience the energies and gifts that he brings to these ministries and I find a great deal of hope in our life together.

Nineteen ninety-three was a year that combined hope with disappointment. As I reviewed the Pastoral Address I made just a year ago, I am aware that we had expected much from a college of three bishops that would have been in place by this time. I look back to the election of suffragan bishops on May 1, 1993, with an abiding sense of thanksgiving that the Diocese of Virginia crossed a racial barrier and that fact continues to be a source of gratitude for us. But the disappointment that our Standing Committee felt compelled to ask the Rev. Antoine Campbell to resign his election has saddened all of us. The Standing Committee's action was necessary, I believe, but the sadness is understandable. We can live with sadness because we are grounded in hope.

Ours is a strong, compassionate, and hope-filled diocese. We have acknowledged our disappointment and our sadness and now it is time to move ahead in hope.

I ask you to affirm our vision for three bishops and the plan for a nominating committee to present names by next fall for an election of an additional suffragan bishop at the Annual Council one year from now.

Bishop Matthews and I are responding to the pressures of the episcopate. I believe we can maintain what is expected of bishops in terms of responding to problems and opportunities, but we need to do more than react and respond. We need to extend our reach. The original vision of three bishops for this diocese is a sound one. We want to provide more support for clergy, more supervision of clergy in new situations, more effective pastoral care, more involvement of bishops in equipping laity for evangelism and teaching, more long-range planning and development of mission, more initiative in raising the vision and releasing the energies of this diocese for service in the Kingdom of Christ.

Strengthening the episcopate remains a major priority of this diocese. The episcopate provides leadership that is needed if our energies are to be effectively deployed in the mission of Jesus Christ.

The other major priority of the Diocese for the last several years has been and remains developing new churches.

I affirm these two priorities of our diocese as fundamental to our future. We need effective, sound leadership and we need to grow. A commitment to a college of three bishops and to the development of new churches is a signal that the Diocese of Virginia is entering the future with hope and is focusing more on mission than on maintenance.

Our newest church in the Diocese is Christ Church, Richmond. Less than three weeks ago, I visited Christ Church for the first time. Christ Church meets in an elementary school in Henrico County. More than 360 people were in attendance. It is a sign of the future-directed, hope-filled character of new churches that 16 persons were baptized at that service.

This month, St. Andrew's Korean Congregation in Arlington celebrates 10 years of worship services and we are in the process of recognizing the Korean Congregation as a mission church of the Diocese. Bishop Matthews is involved in planning what we hope will be a Vietnamese mission later in 1994. Mission today in Virginia means affirming the diverse ethnic and cultural communities in Virginia as well as reaching out to areas growing in population.

A strong episcopate dedicated to service in a diocese committed to new churches will help assure that our diocese will be a growing one and that the growth will be sound. Strong leadership and growth are long-term commitments for a healthy church, and they have a positive impact on all existing churches.

The episcopate is at the center of our structure, unifying our churches and linking them across the centuries, across the world, and into the future with the universal church. Across the church, indeed in many institutions, people are re-examining structures to insure that they are effective for the missions they were originally designed to serve. The Diocese of Virginia is a leader in the evolution of diocesan patterns to encourage ministry and mission at the local level while at the same time strengthening the connections among us so that, consistent with Paul's message to the Galatians, we "bear one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ." (Galatians 6:2)

There is much interest in our diocese in examining structures for mission at every level of the church to assure that they serve the gospel effectively rather than simply maintain the institution. Last summer, at the "Shaping Our Future" symposium in St. Louis, the Diocese of Virginia had more lay people and clergy present than any other diocese except East Tennessee, which organized the symposium. Our interest in transforming structure is not a protest, but rather demonstrates our commitment to assure that our structures are consistent with our commitment to mission.

More than 70 years ago, the Diocese of Virginia was a leader in the nationwide campaign that began in 1919 to strengthen the national church. Bishop William Cabell Brown, the Bishop of Virginia, wrote in December 1919 that congregations in the Diocese of Virginia "pledged their gifts to the nationwide campaign with a magnificent generosity which set a new standard for the church in the whole country."

Giving to the general church more than doubled and the income of the Diocesan Missionary Society was so increased that the number of missionaries supported by the Diocese of Virginia increased from 37 to 54.

That burst of energy had a major impact at the local level. Frederick Goodwin, who later became Bishop of Virginia, described "the greatest constructive result of the nation-wide campaign in this diocese was the establishment of the system of five church schools." More missionaries and a system of church schools went hand in hand with attention to structure in that reform of 75 years ago.

We are now at another time in which leadership is required, a time when it is appropriate to evolve new structures to release the enormous energies for mission at every level of the church. We need to ask:

- what is it a general or national church structure can do best? and then
 equip that structure for service;
- what can a diocese do best? and make sure the diocese has the resources to do its work and
- what can local churches and local regions do best and how can their resources be released for service?

Attention to structure and emphasizing local ministry must not be a code for withdrawal of our support for mission that is best accomplished through national, ecumenical or diocesan efforts. Our focus must be on the best structure for mission, whether close at hand or worldwide.

I plan in the next year and a half to encourage the Executive Board and other groups in the Diocese to expand our evaluation of all diocesan programs to assure that what we do together as a diocese is done best at the diocesan level and then to tell that story to vestries so that our common energies have widespread support.

Remember that none of us works in isolation. We are called to bear one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ. It is shortsighted when we act as if only local ministry is important. Christianity has always had a global vision, with the gospel preached first in Jerusalem and then to the four corners of the earth. It is shortsighted to seek short-term solutions to problems that have the long-term effect of penalizing others.

That's why I encourage support for participation in the Diocesan Heath Insurance Plan. One local church with a young and healthy staff will obviously be able to obtain less expensive insurance in the short run. But we are a diocesan family, where the burdens of those who are older and less healthy need to be shared by those whose decline of health is just a matter of time.

The work of our distinguished commission in developing a plan for diocesan health insurance has technical, administrative and financial dimensions. But at its heart, the health plan is another way we can identify ourselves as Christians who bear one another's burdens.

We live in a culture in which the self-seeking, isolated individual finds it very difficult to be bound in relationship and in obligation to others. When we exalt the self-seeking individual as the highest good, structures of family, church and community suffer. No wonder we live at a time when family bonds are shaken. No wonder we witness such an increase in violence in so many communities. We need to recover a sense that God made the human person to live in community with others, and strengthen our structures of community.

It may well be that our common life as a church, our communion with one another, our maintaining relationships, even when they are stressful and difficult, will be the most persuasive manner we proclaim the liberating and uniting gospel of Jesus Christ. That living together in communion has consequences in the decisions we make about budgets, about insurance, about the links between local churches, regions, the Diocese and the general Church.

Our commitment to our common life is one of the reasons we pay such close attention in the Diocese of Virginia to improving our communication. The Annual Council last year authorized a major survey of our communication. That

survey has been completed with results that both affirm the effectiveness of the communication methods we have and outline ways those communications can be improved.

It is our commitment to improved communication and to shared ministry at every level of diocesan life that is at the root of our new pattern of involving regional presidents and deans of regions in meetings of the Executive Board so that communication is strengthened. It is that commitment to communication that has led us in recent years to increased occasions when diocesan leaders and staff members visit the vestries of our congregations to strengthen the ties that bind us together. Each of you is an important partner in telling the story of our life together in your local church.

Communication in a healthy community involves a commitment to truth telling. The Diocese of Virginia has been saddened in the last year, along with many other church bodies across the land, by allegations of misconduct among some very few clergy. We have addressed those allegations in an appropriate manner, the disciplinary canons of the Diocese have been used when necessary, and we have been direct and forthcoming in telling the truth about those situations.

It is a sign of the fundamental strength and integrity of the clergy of this diocese that so few allegations have been brought. Most of our clergy participated in the workshops for the prevention of clergy sexual misconduct which were held across the Diocese last year. We are providing clear and consistent guidelines both for the prevention of misconduct and for the fair and vigorous processing of allegations when they occur. We believe the church must be a safe place for all, and we will not tolerate those who betray and imperil that safety.

The diocesan staff is committed to strengthening leadership at every level of the Diocese of Virginia by serving those who lead our churches. The Parish Leadership Week that will be held at the Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn from March 4 - 13, is another sign of that commitment. I hope you will encourage many people in your congregations to participate in the many opportunities of that leadership week.

When we bear one another's burdens, we often discover surprising gifts in the midst of sharing. As we have developed our plans for starting new churches, we have also discovered a widespread commitment to new and bold initiatives within existing congregations who want to develop as centers of evangelism and mission.

Congregational development, which means renewal of our churches and the development of new patterns of evangelism and mission, will be an important measure of our commitment to Christ and to our hope in the future. Congregations cannot develop into strong and vital centers of Christian mission unless the laity claim and own their own gifts for ministry. I ask the Commission on Lay Ministry of the Diocese of Virginia to explore more effective patterns for the training of lay teachers and lay evangelists, so that more of our people can come to an awareness of their gifts for building up the Body of Christ.

We were graced in 1993 with the visit of the Bishop of the Diocese of Christ the King in the Church in the Province of Southern Africa. Bishop Peter John Lee and his wife, Gill, spent nearly a month among us last spring, bringing in person their powerful witness to enduring faith in the midst of tumultuous change. All of us can identify overseas visitors who have touched our lives who have been in the Diocese in recent years. Those increasing links between members of the

Diocese of Virginia and churches overseas are mutually strengthening and help us increase our awareness that we are not alone and that the church of Jesus Christ is a worldwide community of all races and nations and of many gifts, as well as burdens to share.

The role of the leadership of the Diocese of Virginia and of the Virginia Seminary in the worldwide Anglican Communion was affirmed in 1993 when the Archbishop of Canterbury visited our diocese and the Seminary, visibly demonstrating an important vocation for our diocese in the worldwide church. We were challenged by that visit, by our relationships with our Anglican brothers and sisters across the world, and I encourage all of our churches to raise their sights so that we remember the ties of affection and faith that link us across the world.

We have been blessed with so many riches. Look around you. Look around your congregations. People of faith, people of compassion, churches with varieties of gifts and varieties of opportunities of service are abundant in Virginia. I want to stress the richness of our life together, especially in this year when difficult budget decisions are required of us. A changing budget is a sign of an institution that is stretched, of a community reaching out beyond its visible assets and making hard decisions because it wants to do so much in the name of Christ. Of course, I hope that your congregations will increase their level of giving to the Diocese and mission beyond the congregation. But I also recognize that we must bear one another's burdens and honor the decisions that are made by vestries who, like this Council, must make difficult choices in allocating their resources. We need to enter our budget debate and enter the deliberations of this Council with a vision that we are together, that we bear one another's burdens, that our richness is far more than we can see because we are united to one another in Jesus Christ.

The major issues before this Council are not the election of a bishop, not the establishing of new churches, not discerning where God wills us to move through our budget process. All of those are important, but they are instruments in the service of more important tasks.

We live at a time of loneliness and violence, when people are afraid to walk in city streets, when families are collapsing, when the values that nurture children into wholeness and strength are challenged, when national and racial hatreds imperil the peace of the world, when the continuing scourge of racism traps too many in poverty and in despair, when differences in lifestyles are forces of confrontation among families and communities rather than opportunities for patient learning and mutual respect.

But what else is new? We live in the midst of a broken world where too many people are trapped in despair and we have a message and an experience of love and hope in the gospel of Jesus Christ.

What we are about in the Diocese of Virginia is nothing less than telling the story of the love of Christ and telling that story so persuasively by the way we live together that others may come to know the power of his forgiveness and the hope of his resurrection.

So we enter the last few years of this century with challenges and opportunities, with a commitment to strengthen the leadership of our diocese and to growing churches, and all for the purpose of expanding that spacious and inviting vision of Christ whose outstretched arms welcome all people, strengthen us for mission in his name, and bind us together in his love.

Report of the Standing Committee

Bishop Lee introduced the Rev. Martin F. McCarthy, president of the Standing Committee.

Bishop Lee, Bishop Matthews, Bishop Lewis, Bishop Montgomery, Bishop Heistand, delegates and honored guests, it is following an active and often arduous year that I report to you as president of the Standing Committee.

The predominant event of the year has been reported to you in both the diocesan and the secular press. Though some members of our diocese are still troubled by the action of our committee in asking Canon Campbell to honor his previously offered willingness to resign, we earnestly believe that this action was in the best interests of all concerned. Further, we are absolutely convinced that it is time for the Diocese to get on with the work at hand, which is to fulfill the mandate of our previous council. In that mandate we called for the election of two suffragan bishops. We are now wonderfully and ably served by Bishop Lee and Bishop Matthews, and we believe it is time to begin the process of electing the second suffragan bishop. I want you to know that the expressions of love and prayer that we received, along with the letters of inquiry about our deliberations and final action, we all heard as evidence of your support for us in a very difficult time. We thank you for that support.

Though our agenda was almost consumed by this issue, we dealt with a range of other concerns. Of great significance is that we reviewed, and in all cases approved, an increasing number of church requests to go into debt for the purpose of growth. In the decade of evangelism, I think this is quite a good sign. We also approved the establishment of a new mission, Christ Church, Richmond, which is already bursting with members. In another of our responsibilities, we enjoyed the benefit of interacting with the Commission on Ministry, which furthered a number of exceptional candidates through the various stages of the ordination process.

One very difficult issue for us revolved around the question of a church giving an easement to an agency of the state. We struggled over the role of the state historic resources board, and the question of the cost versus the benefit of an historic church granting an easement to this agency. We voted not to allow it, but continued to explore the question later in the year.

We also deliberated at length over several requests for consent to Episcopal elections. Though numerous consents were granted for elections in other dioceses of our church, for the second time in two years we declined consent to a specific election. All of this is evidence of an already active and faithful committee, but soon we found our committee would get much busier.

At the time that we were involved with our former bishop-elect, we had no road map to guide us. The canons of the church were silent on this concern. We moved with caution in light of our strict concern that rights be honored. And while Canon Campbell's rights were prominent in our deliberations, we simultaneously were concerned with his integrity in the effectiveness of episcopal ministry. Hence the canonical issue of impediments loomed large in our deliberations. I recognize that there are delegates present who were unable to be at one of those area meetings that were held last December, so at the risk of being repetitive, I need to say again what many of you have already heard.

What Canon Campbell was fighting for in Ecclesiastical Court in South Carolina was the preservation of his ordained ministry. That is wholly different than our concern, which is whether we found impediments to his calling to serve in the

episcopate. We did. And so we asked him to honor what he had several times offered to our committee and to Bishop Lee. And so he resigned. We recognize that our action could become a troublesome precedent in other dioceses. Unfortunately, we cannot provide for any future interpretation of our action. We worry that other standing committees may misinterpret our action as precedent, allowing for a standing committee to invalidate an election they don't favor. Please remember though, that we did not invalidate an election. After careful and painstaking inquiry, we found impediments. All 12 members of the committee reached this same conclusion. We were unanimous in this action. This is significant in that the other actions of this committee were often reached only by majority. In many ways, these other concerns were no less significant.

Let me digress one moment, though, to add that while our responsibilities took us into uncharted waters this year, and our action was without precedent, it was not without earlier similarity. Fully 182 years ago, in another episcopal election in this diocese, the election was resigned before consecration. Bishop James Madison had died that year, and according to our much respected historian and fellow priest, the Rev. Robert Prichard, the ensuing election met a similar outcome. Standing committees were not involved, since the church's Constitution and Canons had not developed to our modern proportions. Indeed, the church at that time was far less developed. In any event, only 12 persons and 13 clergy met to elect the bishop's successor. Look at yourselves now. While his election was resounding, it was his intention simultaneously to fill the post as President of the College of William and Mary while serving his episcopal ministry. A couple of strong-minded young clergy of this diocese thought that such a divided loyalty would be detrimental to the responsibilities of the episcopate as they envisioned it. They met with the bishop-elect, and persuaded him that his attentions needed to be wholly devoted one place or the other, and preferably with the college. They succeeded and the bishop-elect withdrew.

Subsequently, Richard Channing Moore was elected second bishop of the Diocese, and he presided over a period of growth and vigor in the life of the church. Indeed, he even participated in the founding of Virginia Theological Seminary which is so vitally a part of this diocese and the life of the general Church. I believe there may be a similarity at this point.

We are in an extended period of growth in our diocese. Chronicle the actions of the last five standing committees, and we can see an ever-increasing commitment to church growth that is reflected in requests for permission to secure indebtedness. This year we have approved a number of church expansions of a very significant nature, and also approved wholly new efforts for establishing churches. I believe that we are in a time of increase that is finding us in the church pushing our growth into our roots, much as a pruned plant would do. Such is a promising sign of health in life in our service of Jesus Christ, and our calling to spread the Gospel. That the Standing Committee has weathered a tumultuous episode in our common life with increased love and charity for one another, and respect for the high calling of ministry carried out together in our diocese, is witness to the blessing of our Lord. That we uniformly agree that it is time to close this chapter in our book, I believe should be instructive to the Diocese. Let's get on with the requirements of another election.

It is time to seek a second suffragan bishop, so that the vision for this diocese may be more fully complemented with episcopal assistance. Our Bishop Lee, and now, too, Bishop Matthews, deserve the help, as do we.

In closing, I want you to know the great privilege you have given each one of us by our election. It is clear that this last year put a strain on everyone's calendar, both professionally and personally. But it was a great gift to be a part of such a

wonderfully competent, committed group of Christians. Each member brought different gifts to the table and worked diligently to achieve an outcome that was faithful to our common calling in our Lord's service. When all is done, nothing was compromised, and I believe our Lord is being faithfully served. In closing, it is appropriate for you to see and know the committee that served you so well. So if you would, please stand as I call your name: Cindy Roscoe, John Miller, Neal Goldsborough, Susan Goff, Anne Dickinson, Gustavo Mansilla, Maurice Spraggins, Betty Wanamaker, Ben Harmon, J. B. Burtch, Bill Brake. Please join me in thanking them.

I further want to thank two people who personally made my life and my work easier this last year. My assistant the Rev. Gale Cooper, who ably kept her work done and sometimes mine as well. I'm pleased that in the course of this year, you and Elliot even found time to get away and celebrate 25 years of marriage. Congratulations. Further, the Chancellor, Mr. Russ Palmore, who found himself being called to an extent that I'm sure he never thought possible. Long Saturday afternoons on the phone. Yet he always gave willingly and capably of himself. His professional skills and personal commitment were a valuable resource to my committee as we conducted our work. Gale and Russ, I thank you. Bishop Lee, for your clear vision, your very clean decision making and your outstanding leadership, I thank you. And members of the council, on behalf of the Standing Committee, we thank you.

Report from Alan Newman Research on Communications Survey

Bishop Lee introduced Bruce Cauthen of Alan Newman Research, who presented the findings of the diocesan communications survey commissioned in 1993 by the 198th Annual Council.

Bishop Lee, Bishop Matthews, Bishop Lewis, Bishop Heistand, members of Council:

First of all, I would like to thank you for giving me the opportunity to speak with you today. For me this is a process that started almost a year ago: during that time I've worked with many fine people across the Diocese, and I've gained a renewed respect for the Diocese, its mission and our people. As you may recall, the process did begin a year ago with the passage of resolution R-7, which called for a complete examination of the diocesan communications program. Specifically, it called for an examination of the timeliness, effectiveness and cost-effectiveness of those programs, and for an exploration of future uses of all types of media.

These objectives also point to several more fundamental objectives. What specific information do the members of the Diocese want? How well does the Diocese communicate that information, and what can the Diocese do to build a stronger relationship with the people in the pews? My firm was hired to gather that information, to assess not only the timeliness and effectiveness of the communications, but the quality of those communications. Today I'll discuss my findings and provide some summary recommendations.

Let me first describe what we did in the process of gathering the information. It was a two-step process: the first step consisted of a series of interviews and group discussions. I spoke with Bishop Lee, members of the Executive Board, Sarah Bartenstein, members of the Communications Commission, clergy, lay leaders, and even with general lay members in four meetings across the Diocese. To those of you here today who took part in those discussions, thank you very much.

The purpose of these meetings was to list the different types of information that the Diocese could provide, and to generate a list of ways the Diocese could communicate that information. Once the lists were generated we developed two surveys, one for clergy and lay leaders who receive the Communiqué, and another for lay members who receive the Virginia Episcopalian. We mailed the questionnaires in early September, and by mid-October we'd received responses from 365 clergy and lay leaders, and more than 4,200 lay members. Many of you probably remember receiving a survey questionnaire and remember that we asked people to tell us which types of information were most important to them, whether they were receiving enough of that information, and who they thought should provide that information to them, the Diocese or their local church. You probably also remember that we asked for evaluations of the Diocese's publications, the Communiqué and the Virginia Episcopalian, and for evaluations of the Diocese's communications in special circumstances, such as the Tony Campbell situation. And of course there were several questions on respondent demographics: age, income, education, occupation, household size, church size, region within the Diocese etc., so we could develop a profile of our members. These demographic questions also allowed us to compare answers between various audiences to see whether there were or were not any differences of opinion.

Visituately, I don't have time to present the results for every question we included. Such a presentation would take four or five hours, and definitely would bore you beyond reason, so today I'm just going to point out some of our key findings. You should also know that I made a presentation to the Executive Board in December at Roslyn. These board members have a summary of our results. If you want information, they or people from the diocesan communications staff would be glad to share the results with you.

So what did we find out? Well first of all, lay members are most likely to be married, female, over 40 years old, predominantly white. Most of us would consider our members to be affluent. One-third of our members have graduate degrees, and almost 40 percent of our members have annual household incomes above \$75,000. Lay members are most likely to attend mid-sized churches, ones with 200 to 500 members. On average, they attend services frequently, and usually go with their spouses and their children. And over half our lay members would describe their faith as being very secure, with no reservations. And most people consider the Diocese to be at least a somewhat important part of their lives.

Ninety percent of the clergy and lay leaders who returned their questionnaires and 60 percent of the general lay members said that their relationships with the Diocese were either very important or somewhat important to them personally. But looking at the same data another way, 40 percent of the general laity said that their relationships with the Diocese were either not very important, or not important at all. That's a large number, and it doesn't even include all of the people who cared so little about the Diocese that they didn't fill out their questionnaires and return them for processing.

What can the Diocese do to build its relationship with those people? Let's realize that the Diocese has two ways it can communicate with its members. First, the Diocese uses mass communications. It publishes the Virginia Episcopalian and sends it to member households. It also publishes the Communiqué and sends it to clergy members and lay leaders. The Diocese has the most direct control over this communications channel.

The other way the Diocese communicates with its members is through local churches. The Diocese has less control over this channel. It has less control over what information gets communicated, and how much of that information gets communicated to lay members.

One of the findings from the group discussions that I had with clergy and lay leaders is that sometimes they feel like they're bombarded with information from the Diocese, so, of course, not everything gets through. But this channel doesn't appear to be working as well as we probably would like. Compared to clergy members, general laity and lay leaders don't consider themselves to be well informed about the Diocese. Only one out of 10 lay members, and only one out of four lay leaders says that they know a lot about the Diocese and its activities. In comparison, over half of the clergy members consider themselves to be well informed. Lay members want more information from their clergy and lay leaders, and almost half of the general laity responding to the survey said that their local clergy didn't tell them as much about the Diocese as they would like to know. One out of three clergy members and lay leaders admits as much, that they don't tell their local congregations as much as they would like to know.

So what can the Diocese do? There are two options: either make it easier for local clergy and lay leaders to pass on information the Diocese considers to be important, or to assume a greater responsibility for communicating this information directly to lay members. With that in mind, let's look at the types of information that are important to clergy, lay leaders and general lay members. Then we'll look at how that information can be communicated.

Lay members are most interested in news about their local churches and about upcoming church events, and for the most part they indicate they're getting enough of that information. Most often lay members, clergy and lay leaders also want to get news about diocesan activities, and they want to know what Bishop Lee's positions are on the issues, and again, for the most part, they indicate they're getting enough of this information.

But there are several specific areas where the Diocese needs to increase its communications efforts. Clergy members, lay leaders, and lay members want the Diocese to provide more analysis of events. They want to know how national and diocesan decisions are going to affect their churches. They want to know how these decisions are going to affect their lives.

Our members also want the Diocese to provide more spiritual guidance. They want to know how Episcopalian beliefs are different from those of other denominations. They also want to know how Episcopalians might view various social issues, and they look to the Diocese to provide this information, or at least to provide it in conjunction with their local clergy.

When I presented my findings to the Executive Board in December, I shared an analysis of the survey findings, which showed the percentage of our survey respondents who indicated they were receiving too little information about topics they considered important. This analysis showed that over half of the clergy and lay leaders who returned questionnaires thought it was important they receive analysis of national and diocesan events, and the effects of those events on the local churches. They also indicated they weren't getting enough of this information. Over 40 percent of the clergy wanted more information on regional events, on defining Episcopalians' beliefs, and on information on how to make Christ more a part of their everyday lives. Among the general laity these same topics are considered to be both important and undercommunicated. Analysis of diocesan and general church decisions, in terms of their effect on local churches,

and their effect on individual beliefs, and defining Episcopalians' beliefs relative to other denominations. In addition, general lay members also want more news of the Episcopal Church and its activities across America.

Many of you are probably thinking, well aren't those topics ones that the local rectors should be communicating to their congregations, especially the spiritual topics? The answer is no. For each of the topics I've just identified, over half of the people who considered these topics to be both important and undercommunicated, indicated that they thought the Diocese should communicate that information, either on its own, or in conjunction with local church efforts. Our survey data suggest many of our members perceive the Diocese as a news organization, communicating news of events, when they really want it to define what those events mean. And they also look to the Diocese to provide more support to their local churches, in defining what's special about the Episcopal Church. The Diocese needs to increase its efforts to provide spiritual guidance and analyses of events. This will, in turn, increase the importance of the Diocese to its members.

Given that this is the information people want, what type of job does the Diocese do in providing that information? The Virginia Episcopalian is the single most important communications channel for disseminating news of the Diocese to clergy, lay leaders, and the general laity. Two out of three lay members and almost 40 percent of clergy and lay leaders say that they most often find out about diocesan activities through the Virginia Episcopalian. And for the most part, our respondents say that they consider it to be informative, useful, interesting and well written. Half of the general laity and 2 out of 3 clergy members and lay leaders say that they read most or all of the Virginia Episcopalian, and half of our lay members say they would even pay \$10 a year for a subscription. The same is true for the Communiqué—clergy and lay leaders find it to be informative, useful, interesting, and well written. But people want more than just the news they find in the Virginia Episcopalian. As we've seen, they want types of information that the Virginia Episcopalian doesn't offer, given its current mission of providing objective news coverage. It appears one decision which needs to be addressed is whether the Virginia Episcopalian's mission should be revised to include more analysis and spiritual guidance, or whether this information could be communicated in some other way.

You probably also remember from the survey questionnaires that there were several questions about possible communications programs the Diocese could undertake. Of these, clergy, lay leaders and general lay members are most in favor of the Diocese placing more emphasis on youth programs. Half of the people who returned their questionnaires thought the Diocese should even develop a youth newsletter, to help keep teenagers involved in churches. There was also strong support for the Diocese developing methods to help local churches communicate with each other, and to coordinate local programs, as well as developing videocassettes to help churches with confirmation classes, counselling people with faith issues, and especially in helping to train vestry members. Indeed, three out of five of the Diocese's lay leaders indicated that they haven't received as much training as they would like to receive. I think this is also an area for you to address.

I know that many of you are also interested in our survey questions about the uses of computer technology and electronic media. In general, people place less emphasis on developing new electronic networks or adding fax machines, than they do on the Diocese addressing the topics and making the improvements I've already mentioned. It's not that fax machines and networks are unimportant, but they're just less important than analysis, guidance and supporting our youth.

And finally, the timing of the Diocese's communications doesn't appear to be an issue for most of our members. Over half of the clergy and lay leaders responding to our survey think the Diocese, even in situations like the one with Tony Campbell, communicates both in a timely and accurate manner.

That concludes my summary of the research findings, now I'd like to offer a few opinions on how to use this information. Those of you who have dealt with consultants before probably know how reluctant we are to make recommendations. Few issues are ever clear cut: individuals may interpret the same data in completely different ways. I may look at one result and perceive a problem, whereas you may look at the same result and be completely satisfied. With that caveat, here are my recommendations.

First, you need to decide who will manage the information from our surveys. Today, I've presented just a small portion of the information we gathered. The full data tables contain a lot of information. Who will use it? The Executive Board, the Communications Commission, somebody at the Mayo House? Whoever it is, they must work with me to understand the full scope of the information we have gathered, and how that information can be used to make better recommendations. You need to decide who that will be.

And how will the data be used? It's possible for you to use it to address several communications issues, especially if you want to consider developing new communications programs. For example, let's say you are considering developing regional newsletters to help local churches coordinate their programs. The survey would tell you that here in Northern Virginia would be the place to start because there is more support for regional newsletters here than in other parts of the Diocese. And that's just the beginning. Computer software allows you to look more closely at specific segments within the Diocese, and to target those audiences with specific messages.

For instance, if you wanted to know what types of information lay leaders in smaller churches wanted; or if you wanted to know how the needs of people living with small children are different from those who are living alone; or even if you wanted to know how parents attending smaller churches in the Northern Neck area feel about a particular issue; the data are there, and the software exists to provide you with those answers.

With our survey information, you can develop better communications programs, which in turn will build stronger relationships. But someone has to understand that information, and how that information can be used. Who will that be?

Second, my recommendation to you personally is that you recognize that general lay members don't know a lot about the Diocese, and many of them feel left out. I mentioned before, almost half of the general laity told us they're not getting as much information about the Diocese's activities as they would like, and practically no one feels like they're getting too much information. I believe the first part of building the Diocese's relationship with the people in the pews is for you, their rectors, their wardens, and their friends, to tell them what you know about the Diocese, not only what you learned here at Council, but what you learn in the months and years to come. Keep your congregations informed about the Diocese, and what it's doing.

Related to this, I recommend you discuss the surveys, and the findings, with lay members. In private discussions, and in such publications as the Virginia Episcopalian and your church newsletters, let the members of your congregations know that their voices have been heard. I can tell you from experience that surveys inherently create the expectation that the findings will be used to cause

some sort of positive change. Now you have an opportunity to say to your congregations, "Here's what you said, and here's what we're doing about it." The process of conducting the survey, in itself, offers an opportunity to build a stronger relationship between the Diocese and its members.

As far as specific communications recommendations, I think I've already described the need for the Diocese to place more emphasis on communicating an analysis of events, and for providing more spiritual guidance. The news contained in the Virginia Episcopalian, by itself, is not enough to satisfy people's needs. Our members expect the Diocese to tell them how events and decisions will affect the Diocese, their churches and their lives. They want the Diocese to tell them how Episcopalian beliefs are different, and presumably why those beliefs are good. What is it about the Episcopal Church, and about our diocese, that is both different and better? The people want to know.

You need to discuss and decide exactly how that information can best be communicated, whether it's through the Virginia Episcopalian, through the Communiqué, or through some other publication, whether it's through your church newsletters, through your sermons, or through your conversations. The important thing is that the information our members want gets communicated to them.

In conclusion, we found out what information people want and what type of job they think the Diocese has done in delivering that information. We've discovered what their unmet needs are, and in so doing we have identified specific areas the Diocese must address in its communications efforts, in order to build relationships with its members.

Thank you again for allowing me the opportunity to work on this project, and to talk with you today. It's truly been a pleasure.

Report of the Executive Board

Bishop Lee introduced Mr. Steve Hoyle, Vice President of the Executive Board, who gave the following report:

Thank you Bishop Lee and bishops all, both ordinary and extraordinary, ladies and gentlemen, good afternoon. It is my privilege to offer the report of the 1993 Executive Board to this Council. I promised the Bishop and the Program Committee that I would keep this report brief, and they took me at my word: I have 10 minutes.

By and large, you know what we've done in 1994 as well as I do; so let's use these minutes to look at what we've learned. For this has been a year of great learning—learning about ourselves, about who we are, what we think, and how we operate.

A year ago, we asked ourselves some pretty direct questions about our attitudes concerning race, diversity, and unity. To no one's surprise, we learned that some of us hold onto racist and sexist attitudes which severely hinder our mutual

We also learned that many of us are far more free of these crippling prejudices than might have been expected. We are making very real progress toward seeing the people around us as individuals, with individual wants, needs, and gifts rather than pigeon-holing them by age or culture or color.

And we learned that most of us, while saddened by our inability to purge these sins from our midst, have no particular plans to do anything to bring change.

In other areas, we've asked others to do detailed learning for us, and report back to us the "Reader's Digest Condensed" version of their findings. We will hear the report of the Task Group on the First Amendment from Ms. Rutkowski. Their written report is in your notebooks; it is a bold challenge to overcome fear and division, and to carry out the work of the Great Commission in our society at large, including our public and private schools. Thank you, Counselor, and Task Force members. We look forward to learning more from you in the future.

Also at our request, the Commission on Communications undertook an ambitious learning project. With 100 percent parish participation, we took a good, hard look at the vehicles, processes, and timetables of diocesan communications. We learned that our professional and volunteer communicators do a darn good job of getting the essential material in the hands of the people who need it in a comprehensive and timely manner.

We have before us this weekend the results of the work of the Task Force on health care coverage for the Diocese, which was chaired by the Honorable Steven Foster, Insurance Commissioner of the Commonwealth of Virginia, and which included in its membership a member of the First Lady's advisory group on health care reform. We are all concerned about the cost of health care today, and while we may favor different approaches to providing medical insurance, we all appreciate the extraordinary combination of experience, ability and diligence which went into the creation of this report.

I'd like to end my time here a little more personally with a look at what we have learned this past year in the election of two bishops... and the consecration of just one.

Together we have ridden a combination gyroscope and roller coaster, whirling giddily through weeks of eager anticipation, thoughtful and prayerful consideration, amusing speculation and breathless elation... and crashing in a wounded mass into all seven of the stages of grief. We have taken stock of ourselves, and, holding each other's hands for courage, elected first our known and beloved colleague Clay Matthews, and then a largely unknown but very dynamic African-American nominee, as bishops in the Church of God and in service to the Diocese of Virginia. Many of us learned that we really didn't care one way or the other about the sex of the nominees... that a woman bishop was really okay and not a threat to world order... that we really, deeply, wanted to see one of the women elected not because of her gender, but because of her gifts for ministry and her vision for the Church.

Collectively, we learned that we really meant a lot of what we said when we answered the Racial Attitudes Survey four months earlier... and we learned that working together we really were stronger, and healthier, than the sum of our parts.

And then came the news. Canon Campbell was accused of serious wrongdoing. The decision of our Standing Committee to wait for the results of the trial in South Carolina, and the decision not to allow Virginia's response to the situation to be dictated by South Carolina's findings. And the waiting.

Oh, the waiting. The anger. The frustration. What's taking so long? Why are we waiting for them to decide? What more have you heard? When will we know?

I heard it all. Frankly, I probably heard about as much of it as anybody not directly involved in the process, since many lay people and clergy around the Diocese, and even some of my fellow members of the Executive Board, seemed to expect me to have more information than was publicly available through the terrible months between May and October. We doubted, we worried, and we sniped. What was the hidden agenda of the Standing Committee? Were they bound and determined to get rid of this black man? Were they bound and determined to keep this man in place no matter what he'd done? Were they trying to negate the election of two men in the only way available, in hopes that a woman might be elected next time around?

The doubts. The pain. The anger. The suspicion. I felt them all, too. I cried, and I needed and I got pastoral care for my own hurts and frustrations. And I saw that while the focus of our discontent in South Carolina was a largely nameless "them," the focus of our anger here at home was definitely an "us," and we had names: Susan, and Marty, and Maurice, and Gustavo, and J.B., and Betty, and Cynthia, and Bill, and Ann, and Ben, and Neal and John. When we feed on "them," that's cannibalism, but when we feed on ourselves—that's cancer, and death, and defeat. Defeat for the Church, for the name of Jesus, and for the work of the Holy Spirit. Defeat for joy, and for hope. And through the tense and anxious summer, that cancer was the enemy we fought.

The final action of our Standing Committee—their finding that there was impediment to consecration of Canon Campbell as Suffragan Bishop in Virginia, even after his acquittal in South Carolina, for reasons known to our Standing Committee but not readily available to the rest of us—forced each of us into a struggle with that cancer... and each of us fought an ugly, difficult fight of one kind or another.

The choices we had in November, and the choices we have today, are but two: embrace the cancer and feed it "us," or attack it ruthlessly, eradicating it completely and embracing our faith. For ultimately it is our faith which has to provide our comfort when the answers don't—and can't—make sense. Our faith in ourselves; our faith in God's justice, and his mercy; our faith in each other. If nothing else, our faith in each other.

The 12 members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Virginia during 1993 are definitely "us": female and male; African-American, Hispanic and Anglo; solidly orthodox and actively progressive. They *are* our Standing Committee precisely because they are people we know and respect, people whose judgment and fidelity and ability have been proven over and over again, people we know we can trust.

These four women and eight men lived in hell this summer. There weren't any rules, and there was nobody to write them some. They asked, and they listened, and they learned, and they cried, and they sweated, and they prayed.

We are safeguarded by the knowledge that they acted unanimously in all that they did. Face it: if you want to allege conspiracy, you've got to spin a tall, tall tale to make anybody who knows both Betty Wanamaker and Bill Brake believe they were in cahoots on anything.

After our first spasm of pain and grief, I cannot imagine that any of us really believes that any one of these 12 persons is guilty of deliberately lying to us and to the world, guilty of abusing their position of authority to stain the life and career of a fellow priest, in order to overthrow the results of a lawful episcopal

election, in hopes that someone they might prefer might be elected in the future. And there aren't words final enough to dismiss the possibility that all 12 of them have done so.

And therein lies our answer. I don't know all that they learned. In God's mercy, most of us will never know all they learned. But we do know that all 12 members of our Standing Committee learned enough of the details to come to a clear decision that we could not proceed with the consecration of Canon Campbell as a bishop in Virginia. Think of the pain that must have caused them. Think of the cost of being the messengers of grief and disappointment. Think of the anxiety of making themselves the only available target for the anger and frustrations of the people of this diocese, people who joyfully voted for Canon Campbell last May first. Think of the courage it took to tell the 80,000 people of this diocese of our insurmountable problem and our incalculable loss. And think of what we've learned, in this year of learning: We are bigger, and stronger, and healthier together, with God and his mercy on our side, than any challenge we will ever face.

There are days of sadness, there are days of joy. There are feelings of guilt, and feelings of gratitude. There are moments of failure, and moments of success. But all of them are embraced by your unwavering love. My only real temptation is to doubt your love, to think of myself as beyond the reach of your love, to remove myself from the healing radiance of your love. To do these things is to move into the darkness of despair. Oh Lord, the sea of love and gladness, let me not fear too much the storms and winds of my daily life. Let me know that there is an ebb and a flow, but that the sea remains the sea. In this we pray, through Jesus Christ, Our Lord.

O Father Almighty, and God of all comfort, look with compassion, we beseech Thee, upon the little companies of our faithful brethren, who in lonely places of the world are striving to uphold the banner of the cross. If the comfort of human sympathies seem far from them, be Thou their close companion, and pour into their hearts the spirit of Hope, that they may steadfastly persevere and be of good courage because of Thy word, knowing that their labor is not in vain. Through Jesus Christ, our Lord. *Amen*.

Report of the Task Group on the First Amendment

Bishop Matthews introduced Ms. Renee Rutkowski, Chair of the Task Group on the First Amendment who introduced Mr. Michael Woodruff to present the following report:

Bishops, ladies and gentlemen and guests: We had a challenge before us to look at nearly 60 subject areas polarizing our nation, and dividing our members. Our task was both to address those subjects that threaten our common life, and to develop a process for dialogue. The report that you have, I think, does both in an open textured way to keep the conversation moving forward. That is very important. It is important because we need resources, and we need to know how we can work together on the problems as they emerge. The Task Force considered, for example, a parish outside the Diocese who was told that it could not maintain a soup kitchen. We learned, for example, that the failure to address a building code with a venting system was a health and safety matter that was more important than the First Amendment. And yet, the court said that the church has been in the business of loaves and fishes from the beginning, and therefore it was proper and appropriate for the church to conduct a restaurant-type function of its ministry in an area of the city that was not zoned for such a function.

Every problem that we discussed had a specific focus and a specific context. It could not be addressed in generalities, except to say that there were certain guidelines and boundaries we had to identify, and around which we hoped a consensus could be built. One of those was that we had an obligation to proceed with charity toward everyone. If the communications were not charitable, something was wrong. Secondly, we felt it was important that problems be addressed visibly and collectively, so that resources would be available to us. So you will find in the report an invitation to you and your parishes to take advantage of speakers, bibliographies and materials which have been prepared, and to begin a dialogue about specific problems and concerns people have in the

area of religious freedom and the First Amendment. We noted that the problems, however grave, and however much of a concern they were to us, seemed to pale in comparison with some of the problems faced by our brothers and sisters outside this diocese and outside this country. This week there is a person who is scheduled for execution in Pakistan for spreading the Gospel. There are others in Egypt and other countries whose lives are at risk as a result of their faithfulness to Christ. We suggested that there be a mechanism to continually address some of those problems and how we can provide information and help.

Finally, we recognized that with the resources we have, we had to be pretty clear in the rejection of fear and demagoguery that so often accompany any discussion of the First Amendment and religious freedom. This is no area for triumphalism. This is no area for bigotry and intolerance. This is an area to move forward under a framework that protects the religious liberties of all people whether or not they believe as we do. And that message is not often understood. It is not often clearly communicated. We are at our best when we embrace those who are unlike us in our beliefs, and yet who are able to share our common conviction that the protection the law gives for activities that are lawful and proper is a framework in which we share a religious freedom that has a precious and long heritage, one which does respect those who are different from us.

So it is a great privilege for me to speak to you on this subject, recognizing that there are great jurists who have devoted their careers to this subject. There are those who have spent many, many hours solving difficult problems. But the Anglican Way has been called a *via media*. There is in the Benedictine Community the emphasis on balance and stability. We looked for ways in which consensus could be generated without offending the great principle that has been given us in the First Amendment. The principle of liberty for all, with the expectation that religion is to be respected, government is to be neutral, and without hostility to religion. Those lawyers here, and in the parishes of our diocese, probably are aware that the law is in transition. That is one reason our report is open textured. I hope you will take the opportunity to let the conversation begin; and as we look at a problem, whether it be school prayer or zoning, and its impact on local churches, we hope you will see that the substance of these problems can be discussed openly as we marshall the resources to speak to each other carefully and compassionately.

Report of the South African Partnership Commission

Bishop Matthews introduced the Rev. Randolph Hollerith, who made the following report on behalf of the South African Partnership Commission:

I thank you Bishop Matthews, and Bishop Lee. My co-chair Virginia Allen is iced-in, in Winchester, and sends her regrets.

In his first letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul wrote: "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body." It was with that understanding that the Diocesan Commission for South African Partnership first came into existence in 1991 under the direction of Bishop Lee. It is in the spirit of those same words by St. Paul that we continue our work today.

The Commission is composed of laity and clergy who are committed to fostering and nurturing a relationship of mutual ministry between the Diocese of Virginia and the Diocese of Christ the King in South Africa. The operative phrase for us has always been and continues to be "mutual ministry." We are not a fund raising group, nor do we hold to the notion that the Diocese of Virginia can or should in any way act as a kind of "Big Brother." Rather, we are committed to

the belief that by sharing our hopes and dreams, successes and failures, and our day-to-day life, both corporately and individually, our two dioceses can grow in our understanding of what it means to be a part of the body of Christ.

The past year has been an exciting time for the Commission. The Rt. Rev. Peter John Lee, Bishop of Christ the King, and his wife Gill visited the Diocese of Virginia during April and May 1993. Bishop and Mrs. Lee traveled throughout the Diocese, spoke several times to a variety of groups, and were present for the election of suffragan bishops at VTS in May. Their presence had a powerful impact throughout the Diocese and did much to foster the growth of our friendship and our mutual ministries.

Because of that visit, several new opportunities are opening between the two dioceses. St. Catherine's and St. Christopher's School in Richmond are building a relationship with a church school in the Christ the King. St. Catherine's students recently raised several thousand dollars through fruit sales for the building of classrooms within a new settlement area in Christ the King known as Orange Farms. The Rev. and Mrs. Bob Hetherington are scheduled this summer for the first of what we hope will be many sabbatical trips to South Africa. Following their trip, a plan is underway for a sabbatical visit by a priest from the staff of Bishop Peter John Lee. The Commission is also in the process of creating a new group called The Friends of Christ the King. This group is designed to link by newsletter those individuals interested in keeping in close contact with our brothers and sisters in South Africa. The function of the "Friends" will be to gather increased support for the friendship between our two dioceses, and to share news and prayer concerns. Finally, the Commission is planning a second group trip to South Africa in March of this year. A group of four to six people will travel to Christ the King for 10 days to share in the life of the Diocese.

Bishop Peter John Lee in a recent fax sends his regards to Bishop Lee and our Diocese. Bishop, with your permission I would like to read Bishop Lee's fax.

"My Dear Peter James and all our Sisters and Brothers in Christ in the Diocese of Virginia: this past year has been a significant one for both our dioceses. We have continued to wrestle with the racial and social tensions bequeathed by our respective histories. We have struggled to be faithful through both elation and disappointment in church life and in society around us. God is building his reign before the eyes of the World, and is calling us to cooperate with him at a time when urban violence and economic restraints are pressing us into new styles of response to his word. For us in the Diocese of Christ the King, through many channels but especially through the love which was poured upon Gill and myself during our visit during April and May, this year has been a great experience of receiving affirmation and concern from the Church in Virginia. For our part, we have continued to try to learn something of the life of the Diocese of Virginia. We have shared deeply in the joy and the pain of your search for new Suffragan Bishops. Most of all, we rejoice in relationship. As I write, a colleague of our daughter Clover Ann from her service at Shrine Mont in 1992, Beth Conklin, is staying in our home, and we are looking forward to a visiting team in March and Bob and Lolly Hetherington's sabbatical in June and July. Nineteen ninety-four will be guite simply the most momentous year in South African history. We thank you for travelling with us in it, and covet your prayers for a year of peace, hope and reconstruction. I greet you all in the name of our Lord and Friend, Jesus Christ. Peter John Lee."

March 20 is the suggested Day of Prayer for South Africa in the Diocese of Virginia. It is one day before the anniversary of the massacre in Sharpeville and one month before the elections. It is also during the time when we hope the travel team will be in South Africa. We have created a Lenten Litany for your

use on the Day of Prayer and all throughout Lent as we pray for our brothers and sisters in Christ the King. They will be placed on your chairs and we hope you will make good use of them.

The Commission has a booth at Council this weekend and we hope those of you interested will stop and learn more about us. This is an exciting time in the Diocese of Virginia, the Diocese of Christ the King, and in South Africa as a whole. As our year continues, we ask your prayers for the work of the Commission and for our brothers and sisters in South Africa. Thank you.

Announcement of Parish Leadership Training Week

Bishop Matthews introduced Ms. Happy Pullman, Executive for Program and Conference Centers, who presented the following report.

Bishop, delegates, and friends. When I was young, I had a favorite song, and I recently ran across this song, and it's become another favorite of my songs. Some of the words go like this:

I could wile away the hours,
conferring with the flowers,
consulting with the rain;
With the thoughts I'd be thinking,
I could be another Lincoln,
if I only had a brain...

I'd be tender,
I'd be gentle,
I'd be awful sentimental,
regarding love and art;
I'd be friends with the sparrow,
and boy that shoots the arrow [that's Cupid],
if I only had a heart...

It's hard,
believe me, Missy,
when you're born to be a Sissy,
without the vim and verve;

Members of the Executive Board, regional deans and presidents, and the executive staff visited all of your vestries this past fall. And we collated all of your responses to those questions that we asked you. Do you remember those questions?

As the vestry of _____, where will you be focusing your energy and resources? Do you need help from other churches and the people of the Diocese? (One of my personal favorite responses to that question was, "Yes, we need help. Please have each church send us 50 members.")

When we looked at all of your answers, what we heard was a whole lot of "if only's." "If only this, we'd grow." "If only that, we'd have the kind of program that we wanted."

The Parish Leadership Training Week at the Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn, March 4-14, in just a few weeks, was designed to help you with your "if only's." We have conferences, and we have workshops, and we have seminars to meet all your needs. We have a clergy/vestry conference. We have a parish treasurers and administrators conference with the Rev. Canon Bill Geisler from the Diocese of California. We have an incredibly exciting church musicians conference led by Dr. Horace Boyer, who was the general editor of *Lift Every Voice and Sing II*, a new supplement to the Hymnal.

We have a conference on congregational development, led by the Rev. Robert Gallagher, formerly congregational development officer for the Diocese of Connecticut. We have a Lenten Journey with Verna Dozier; a communications workshop with Canon Ruth Nicastro from the Diocese of Los Angeles. We have a parish secretaries and administrators' conference. We have a conference for those people who work with youth, led by Joy Werth of the Diocese of Louisiana. We have a bricks and mortar workshop for those of you who are considering a planning or building renovation program. We have a Christian education conference led by LaDonna Wind from the Diocese of Alabama, and that's not all that we have in the Parish Leadership Training Week.

Annie Rose Walker was a woman who gave the Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn to the Diocese of Virginia. And it was her dream that the Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn would be a place that nurtured the spiritual and intellectual life of the Diocese of Virginia. The Roslyn staff and the staff of the Diocese of Virginia are very, very excited about hosting this event for you. Brochures are available: they're at the program table, they're at the Roslyn table, they'll be mailed to your churches.

I have to admit that as we worked real hard at putting this conference together for you, we found out that we, too, have an "if only." And our "if only" is "if only they come."

I hope to see you at the Parish Leadership Training Week. Thank you, Bishop.

Report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons

Bishop Lee recognized Mr. John Paul Causey, chair of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Mr. Causey thanked the members of his committee and asked that the members of Council recognize them. Mr. Causey also thanked Brenda Bradley of the diocesan staff for her assistance with the committee's work.

Mr. Causey noted that the Committee did not have time to address a referral from the 198th Annual Council, charging the Committee with studying criteria for membership of Council, vestries and other bodies. He asked that the referral be passed to the Committee on Constitution and Canons of the 200th Annual Council, and suggested that that Committee make a report prior to the convening of the 200th Council.

Seeing no objection, Bishop Lee ruled the matter was so referred.

Mr. Causey noted that the recommendations of the Committee concerning proposed changes to the Constitution and Canons were succinct, and involved amending only one of the proposals as received by the Committee. Bearing that in mind, he asked that the Council permit a change in the rules of order to permit the Committee's report to be submitted orally instead of in writing. Bishop Lee put the matter to a vote. The motion carried without dissent.

Mr. Causey asked for consideration of C-5 first, noting that it was approved on first reading by the 198th Annual Council. On behalf of the Committee, he moved adoption of C-5. After the motion was seconded, Mr. Causey spoke to it.

He explained that C-5 changes the method of electing youth delegates to Council so that they would be elected by regional councils on a rotating basis (five each year), rather than by the Executive Board. Mr. Causey noted that if C-5 were defeated, the Council would continue to have four youth delegates elected by the Executive Board.

Bishop Lee asked if there were any comments from the members of Council. There were none, and the Bishop put C-5 to a vote.

C-5 passed without opposition.

C!

Council approved, on second reading, the amendment of Article III, Section 3 (e) to read as follows:

SECOND READING

ARTICLE III. COMPOSITION OF THE COUNCIL

Section 3. (e) The Lay members of the Standing Committee, the Lay members of the Executive Board, the Chancellor, the President of the Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese, and five Lay persons, not over 21 years of age at the time of election, to be elected on or before May 1st as Youth Delegates by five of the Regional Councils designated on an annual rotating basis by the Standing Committee shall be members of the Council *ex officio*.



Mr. Causey reported that in response to a suggestion made at the January 8 session of Council, the committee recommended dividing C-1. If divided, the first portion, called C-1a, would amend Canon 2, Section 5, and C-1b would amend Canon 11, Section 4. On behalf of the committee, Mr. Causey moved the adoption of C-1a. After the motion was seconded, he explained that C-1a conforms the certification of delegates to Council with the intent of the Council when it voted to permit youth representation among its members, and brings the age requirement into line with General Convention canons.

Bishop Lee asked if there were additional comments from members of Council. There being no further comments, he put C-1a to a vote, and it passed without dissent.

At the request of Mr. Causey, Bishop Lee ruled that the vote carried by a two-thirds majority.

<u>C1a</u>

Council approved the amendment of Canon 2.5 to read as follows:

Section 5. The election of Lay Delegates to the Council, and their alternates, shall be certified by the Rector, Vicar, Register, or one of the Wardens of the proper Church, in duplicate, which certificate shall be in the form as follows:

"This is to certify that a meeting of the Vestry (or Vestry Committee) of Church in the county (or City) of held on the day of , 19, the following named adult confirmed communicants in good standing, eighteen (18) years of age or older, viz as Lay Delegate and as Alternate, were duly elected to represent the same in the Council of the Diocese of Virginia to be held at on the day of , 19
(signed)

One copy of this certificate shall be sent to the Secretary of the Diocese no later than March 15th, and a copy shall be given to each Delegate named therein.

* * *

On behalf of the Committee, Mr. Causey moved the adoption of C-1b. After a second was received, he explained the C-1b would permit the election of 16- and 17-year-old persons to vestries, the current minimum age being 18. The intent of C-1b, like C-1a, was to bring diocesan canons into line with national canons. Mr. Causey reported that "it was the learned consensus of the lawyers on the committee that there are no significant civil law impediments to electing minors to vestries, but this is a permissive provision, and the committee concluded that there were not persuasive reasons for categorically denying 16- and 17-year-old communicants in good standing the opportunity to serve on vestries if the congregation sees fit to elect them."

Bishop Lee asked if there were additional comments about C-1b. There were none. The voice vote was unclear, so the Bishop asked for those in favor to stand, then asked for those opposed to stand, and ruled that the motion carried by a 2/3 majority.

C₁b

Council approved the amendment of Canon 11.4 to read as follows:

Section 4. Only Lay persons, eighteen (18) years of age or over, who are confirmed adult communicants in good standing of the church, as defined in General Convention Canon I.17, shall be eligible for election as Vestry members of such church. However, regardless of eligibility of a person for election, no person shall be elected at duly convened congregational meetings to consecutive full terms on a congregation's Vestry or Vestry Committee.



On proposal C-2, Mr. Causey reported that the committee recommended referral, and so moved. After a second, Mr. Causey spoke to the motion:

The Episcopal Church continues to wrestle with issues of human sexuality. Our diocese is doing so administratively, and the national church is doing so through a committee charged to facilitate dialogue on issues related to human sexuality,

and through another committee charged to draft a pastoral teaching on the subject for the House Bishops. Both of those committees will have a report at General Convention in Indianapolis. In the meantime, the church is also having to deal with these issues in civil courts. It is clear to the committee that not only is there continuing debate about the theological issues involved, but there is immense potential for civil liability based on the corporate actions we take with regard to this issue. The committee believes it is essential that we understand the civil law liability implications of having Council vote on the issues raised in C-2, before we vote, and recommends referral to ascertain those implications. The committee specifically recommends that C-2 be referred the Committee on Constitution and Canons of the 200th Annual Council and the Chancellor, to consult with the Bishop, the Church Insurance Company, and other appropriate resources to determine the civil law liability exposure of the Diocese, its parishes and clergy, for sexual misconduct; and the effect that action of this council might have on liability insurance coverage available for matters relating to sexual misconduct; with the committee reporting to the 200th Annual Council recommendations for canonical changes, and/or non-canonical guidelines or policies to deal with situations involving sexual misconduct.

Bishop Lee restated the motion and asked if there were any debate.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. Elijah White of Our Saviour, Oatlands, who spoke against the motion to refer.

Bishop Lee recognized Mr. Russ Randle of Christ Church, Alexandria, who spoke in favor of the motion to refer.

There being no further discussion, the Bishop put the motion to a voice vote. The motion to refer was adopted.



On behalf of the Committee, Mr. Causey moved the adoption of C-3, the so-called "health insurance canon." He stated the committee's belief that "we see our life together as one of an interdependent community of faith in which we need to share the risks and share the burdens... Understanding the hardship which this canon will impose on some of our churches, we believe it is in the best interest of the Diocese as a whole and therefore recommend approval."

The Rev. John Morris, St. Thomas, McLean, read a resolution from the Virginia Episcopal Clergy Association in support of the proposal.

There being no further debate, the Bishop put the matter to a vote. It carried on a voice vote with little dissent. The chair ruled that the vote constituted a 2/3 majority.

<u>C3</u>

Council approved the following addition to the Canons:

Health Insurance

Section 1. Any and all health insurance coverage provided or paid for by the Diocese, Churches, Diocesan Missions or Missions of a Founding Church located within the Diocese for active and retired ordained persons or lay employees shall be provided through the diocesan health insurance plans established by the Executive Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall establish forms and processes for receiving applications for exception or exemption from the mandate of paragraph 1 hereof, and for reviewing and reaching a decision regarding each application. The Executive Board may designate an appropriately constituted body and delegate to it the necessary authorities to receive, review and make recommendations to the Executive Board. Á description of these forms and processes shall be furnished to the entities identified in paragraph 1 hereof, made available by the Diocese upon request, and published in the annual guidelines offered by the Diocesan Compensation Commission as approved by

Section 3. The Executive Board may grant such exemptions or exceptions from the mandate of paragraph 1 hereof as it deems appropriate. Each decision of the Executive Board shall be communicated to the applicant in writing together with a description of any process that the Executive Board may establish for appealing its decisions.

Section 4. In deciding on each application, the Executive Board shall be guided by the following considerations (among such others as it may deem appropriate):

- (a) consistency;
- (b) fairness;
- (c) hardship;
- coverage available through spousal, military or other
- the effect that the exemption or exception requested, if granted, would have on the plan as a whole;
- the precedential effect of the exemption or exception requested, if granted.



On behalf of the Committee, Mr. Causey moved approval of C-4 with amendment. He explained the amendment was the deletion of the last two words, "April 15th," and the substitution of the words "the conclusion of Council." The last portion of the proposal would thus read, "the results of any election shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Diocese no later than the conclusion of Council." Mr. Causey explained that since the terms of office for regional officers conclude with the end of Council, this amendment would require that elections be held before Council. Thus there would be no period of time during which a regional council is without officers. The amendment further ensures that the diocesan office will have the ability to communicate with regional officers as

There was no further discussion of C-4 which was approved, as amended by the committee, on a voice vote without dissent. Bishop Lee ruled that the vote constituted

<u>C4</u>

Council approved the amendment of Canon 8.4(c) to read as follows:

"(c) All terms of office shall be determined by each Regional Council, and shall expire at the conclusion of the regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese in the appropriate year. Notice, and the results, of any election shall be forwarded immediately to the Secretary of the Diocese at the conclusion of Council."

* * *

The Bishop explained that the reason for noting a 2/3 vote is that if such a majority is achieved, the canonical amendment takes effect at the end of Council. If a canonical change is passed by a majority of less than 2/3, it requires a second reading at the subsequent Annual Council before it can take effect.

Mr. Causey stated that his report had concluded. Bishop Lee discharged Mr. Causey and the committee with thanks.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. John Guernsey, All Saints, Dale City. Mr. Guernsey commented that the reason behind the requirement that reports be made in writing is so that the members of the Council may be prepared to debate a measure when it comes to the floor. The Bishop thanked Mr. Guernsey for his comments.

Recognition of Youth Delegates

Bishop Lee introduced the youth delegates to the 199th Annual Council: Becky Belyea, Emmanuel Church, Woodstock; Katie Harrison, Christ Church, Spotsylvania; Frank Lamb, St. Martin's, Richmond; and Kimberly Ann McKinney, St. John's, Centreville.

Recognition of Clergy who have retired since the last Annual Council

Bishop Lee recognized the clergy of the Diocese of Virginia who have retired from fulltime, active ministry since the last Annual Council. Although not all of these clergy were present at Council, Bishop Lee noted that we recognize new clergy, and it is fitting that we likewise honor those persons who have given many years of service to the Church:

The Rev. Donald Bitsberger (Don) retired in July as president of the Evangelical Education Society in Arlington where he had served since 1987. He was a missionary in Japan from 1954-59. In the 1960s, he worked for Church World Service and was Secretary of the Overseas Department for the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church. He was rector of Church of the Redeemer in Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts for 19 years before going to the Evangelical Education Society.

The Rev. Howard LaRue has been rector of Emmanuel, Greenwood and Holy Cross, Afton since 1969. He served in the U.S. Navy from 1948 until 1964, when he entered Virginia Seminary. After ordination, he served in the Diocese of Southern Virginia until coming here in 1969. He served on the Executive Board of the Diocese (72-73) and the Board of Missions (71-72).

The Rev. John D. Andersen (Jack) is best known in this diocese as Executive Director of Roslyn during an era of expansion and the beginnings of a closer relationship between the Virginia Diocesan Center and the diocese it serves. He came to Roslyn in 1972 from the Diocese of Connecticut, where he served two parishes. From 1991 until his retirement in May, he was Executive Director of Episcopal Camps and Conference Centers, Inc.

The Rev. Carl Harris was Rector of St. Alban's, Annandale from 1964-67. For most of his career, he has been engaged in non-parochial ministry and has worked for the State Department and the Agency for International Development, serving in Thailand. He has also served in the Diocese of Washington. He is a graduate of Virginia Seminary.

Bishop Atkinson is "officially" retired, but he is serving as Interim Rector at Christ Church, Charlottesville. He retired as our Assistant Bishop in October 1993 after serving for nearly five years in that role, and 13 years as Bishop of West Virginia. We honored him at last year's council with a resolution thanking him for his service as our Assistant Bishop.

The Rev. George Wyer was Rector of St. Paul's, Ivy from 1974 until retirement last February. He has also served parishes in Cleveland, Ohio and Palm Beach, Florida.

The Rev. Neale Morgan was Rector of Emmanuel, Middleburg and Our Redeemer, Aldie from 1969 until his retirement Dec. 31, 1993. He had also served in Pittsburgh; in Pennsylvania Hills, Pennsylvania; Washington, D.C. and Santo Domingo. He is well known as a photographer not only here but throughout the church. He has covered General Convention for years and will be here for part of the Council on assignment for the Virginia Episcopalian.

The Rev. Alwin Reiners, Jr. (Al) was Rector of St. Paul's, Hanover from October 1982 until retirement on Jan. 2, 1994. A native Virginian, he served in Alaska as a seminarian, and returned as a missionary, serving from 1955-57, and founded St. George's-in-the-Arctic. He was Curate at St. James's, Richmond from 1957-61 and founding vicar of St. Bartholomew's, Richmond. He served in the dioceses of North Carolina and Missouri before returning to Virginia in 1982. He has been a deputy to General Convention, Dean of Region 11 and served on the Standing Committee and the Executive Board. He continues to serve as vacancy consultant and a program liaison.

The Rev. William F. Myers (Bill) was Vicar, then rector of St. John's, McLean, serving in that parish from 1971 until his retirement in September 1993. He has been in the parish ministry for over 30 years, serving in several parishes in Maryland and Missouri before coming to the Diocese of Virginia to serve St. John's. In Missouri, he was Chairman of the Board of Examining Chaplains. He has been Dean of Region 5 and President of the Standing Committee. He chaired the Committee on Family Life and Human Sexuality when it prepared the widely-acclaimed "Opportunities for Dialogue on Human Sexuality." He was a nominee for Suffragan Bishop here in 1993.

The Rev. David Warner retires in February, having served as rector of Christ Ascension in Richmond since 1974. He has served in Utah and Colorado, where he founded two mission churches. He was a hospital chaplain in Aurora, Colorado from 1956-67. Has been Dean of Region 11, and a Deputy to General Convention.

The Rev. Ramsey Richardson was Rector of Christ Church, Charlottesville from 1978 until his retirement in June 1993. He was rector of Church of the Redeemer in Richmond from 1966-78 (Southern Virginia), and has also served in the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia. He is serving as interim rector of St. Thomas, Orange.

The Rev. Raby Edwards retired as Rector of St. Stephen's, Richmond last summer, having served there since 1973. A native of North Carolina, he served parishes in Wilmington and Goldsborough, and was rector of Emmanuel Church in Athens, Georgia. He has served on the Standing Committees of the dioceses of East Carolina, Georgia and Virginia and has been a deputy to General Convention. He has chaired the Commission on Ministry and has been a trustee of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia. He is an honorary canon in two dioceses: Guatemala and Bukedi, Uganda and was a nominee for Bishop Coadjutor in the Diocese of Virginia in 1984.

The Rev. James Green (Jim) was Rector of Church of the Resurrection, Alexandria from 1972 until his retirement earlier this year. He was vicar of Resurrection from 1965 until 1972 and was assistant at Immanuel-on-the-Hill, Alexandria from 1963-65. He has been Dean of Region 4 and has been a visiting instructor in Pastoral Theology at Virginia Seminary since 1968. He was on Diocesan Missionary Society from 1981-89.

The Rev. Edward Morgan was Professor of Field Education at Virginia Seminary from 1981 until his retirement last summer. He is interim rector at St. Patrick's, Falls Church. He was rector of St. Luke's, Alexandria from 1960-1981 and was Deacon-in-Charge, then Rector of Cople Parish and St. Paul's, Nomini Grove from 1955-1960. He has served as a Regional Dean and on the Standing Committee.

Bishop Lee asked that any of these clergy who were present, stand to receive the thanks of Council for their service.

Bishop Lee then recognized and thanked members of the Parish Youth Ministries Committee who were at Council to assist the diocesan staff.

He also recognized and thanked the members of the Executive Staff , Sarah Bartenstein, David Charlton and Happy Pullman, as well as the Chancellor, Russell Palmore.

The Council recessed for the evening at 5:01 p.m., with dinner scheduled for 7 p.m.

Saturday, January 29, 1994

The Council gathered Saturday morning, beginning with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

Following the Eucharist, Bishop Lee advised that a task force was appointed by the Committee on Race Relations to develop a seminar following the results of the race relations survey.

Report of the Budget Committee

Bishop Lee introduced the Rev. Geoffrey Hoare, chair of the Budget Committee. Mr. Hoare reports that the committee affirmed the basic budget cuts made at the Fredericksburg session of Council, necessitated by the continued incremental decrease in diocesan income. Mr. Hoare stressed that in making the approved changes to balance the budget, there would be a need for additional funding of \$100,000 in 1995 for the second Suffragan Bishop, unless additional budget cuts were made. Mr. Hoare recommended the new budget committee be appointed immediately to address this issue

The Rev. Ben Campbell made a motion to restore the cuts made to the Virginia Council of Churches, The Ecumenical Resource Center in Richmond and to the Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy. Regarding the Virginia Council of Churches, the Rev. Marty McCarthy, the Rev. Bob Hetherington and the Rev. Hill Brown spoke in favor of the restoration of \$4500. The Rev. Randolph Bragg spoke against the restoration of the funds. Bishop Lee placed the amendment to a vote. The amendment was adopted.

Regarding the restoration of \$3000 to the Ecumenical Resource Center, Mr. Hoare explained the cuts were due to the regional nature of the center. The Rev. Jim Chipps spoke against the restoration, as well as additional restoration amendments made to a strapped budget. The Rev. Ralph Bayfield also spoke against the restoration. Bishop Lee placed the amendment to a vote. The amendment failed.

Regarding the restoration of \$700 to The Virginia Interfaith Center, Mr. Hetherington spoke in favor of the restoration. Bishop Lee placed the amendment to a vote. The amendment was adopted.

The Rev. Vaughan Booker made a motion to restore diocesan funding to St. Paul's College to 1993 budget level of \$15,450. Mr. Hoare explained the committee perspective that overall giving by Episcopal sources was over \$422,000, and this cut was rather minor, by percentage. The Rev. Bob Sawyer offered a suggestion that if each parish came up with \$500 more, Council would not have to argue over budget cuts. Dr. Holden and Mr. Bolling Robertson spoke in favor of the motion. Bishop Lee placed the amendment to a vote. The amendment was adopted.

Mr. Hoare made a motion to adopt a rule of order providing for proposed budget amendments to carry a specific funding source, meaning the proposed area to cut to fund the amendment. Bishop Lee placed the motion to a vote. The motion carried.

Mr. Cooper made a motion to fund all proposed cuts from the \$80,000 Shrine Mont request. Bishop Lee placed the motion to a vote. The motion failed.

Mr. Chipps proposed that the budget be adopted as amended and that should any additional income be forthcoming, that it be used to restore whatever cuts have been made. Bishop Lee placed the motion to a vote. The motion carried. The budget was adopted as follows:

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Hoare and the Budget Committee for their work. Mr. Hoare acknowledged Bishop Lee's thanks, and thanked his committee. The members of Council applauded the committee and Mr. Hoare.

Following the conclusion of the Budget Committee's report, the Bishop recognized a delegation from the Church of the Resurrection, Alexandria, who presented a letter from the senior warden of that congregation. The letter read as follows:

It is with great pleasure that the vestry and community of the Church of the Resurrection present to the New Church Fund a gift of \$10,000 in grateful praise for the ministry of the Rev. James Green, rector, pastor, and friend for many years.

The Bishop expressed his profound thanks to the delegation, which also received the applause of the members of Council.

#### Presentation by the Commission on Church Planting

Bishop Lee recognized Mr. Buddy Tolleson, All Saints, Richmond, the Chair of the Commission on Church Planting.

Mr. Tolleson reported on behalf of the Commission, reminding Council of the presentation made by the Rev. Eric Turner, St. Matthew's, Richmond, to the 198th Annual Council in which he stated that planting new churches is the most effective form of evangelism. New churches attract new people, he said.

Mr. Tolleson talked about the work of the Commission, saying that members had spent the past year learning all they could about church planting, and supporting the efforts of such congregations as Christ Church, Richmond, the newest congregation in the Diocese, and Episcopal Church of the Word, Gainesville, who used church planting principles to revive their congregation.

The Commission and diocesan leaders are looking at a number of places in the Diocese as potential areas for future church planting efforts: Central Prince William County, Western Fairfax County-Centreville area; Crystal City; the Quantico-Dumfries area; Stafford County; and Hanover County. Mr. Tolleson stressed that the Commission needs to hear from the people and congregations in the various parts of the Diocese about where churches could be planted.

The Commission looked at ways to say "thank you" to Annual Council for its support of new churches, and of giving "living witness to church planting." They thought of bringing members from the Church of Christ our Lord, Lake Ridge, and Christ Church, Richmond, as the newest congregations in the Diocese, to parade into council in the way that newly independent congregations do. Mr. Tolleson pointed out that new congregations are "just getting used to the fellowship of the parish," and don't know about or identify with Annual Council. "We are part of them and they are part of us," he said, and the Commission wanted to find a way to demonstrate that. Bishop Lee encouraged them to expand that idea to include all of the congregations established during his episcopate.

So all of those congregations came to Annual Council and, as Mr. Tolleson called their names, they processed into the Council chamber:

Mr. Tolleson invited the Rev. Paul Johnson to the podium to read a letter from the congregation of Christ Church, Richmond:

To the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, to the Rt. Rev. Peter James Lee, Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia, and the Rt. Rev. F. Clayton Matthews, Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia:

### Dear Friends,

Greetings in name of Our Lord Jesus Christ. The annual budget of the Diocese of Virginia in past years has set aside money to be used for the purpose of starting new churches. Christ Church, Richmond is one of the most recent beneficiaries of these funds. We began our life September 12 in an elementary school gymnasium in the far West End of Richmond. As such, we are God's-and your-newest congregational creation in this diocese. Our birth has been successful. Through God's grace we have negotiated the passage to become alive. We are. And our birth has been one that causes us to live expectantly, with great hopes for the future and excitement over what God has in store for us. We are deeply grateful. We are deeply grateful for your generosity and vision and from the depths of our being we thank you. God has called this new thing into being and your giving—your giving—has helped make us real. Our prayer is that you will take pride in this mission, the work of which is nothing more complicated yet nothing less significant than to invite people, the people of West Richmond, into a relationship with Jesus Christ and one another, and to help them grow and live in those relationships.

May God's blessings be upon this body, this diocese, and our bishops and leaders. Bidding you God's Grace and Peace, we are

### Christ Church.

The congregations processed out of the council chamber singing Hymn 528, "Lord, you give the Great Commission."

Bishop Lee thanked the Church Planting Commission and Mr. Tolleson for "the wonderful experience of making incarnate for us the kind of actions that we take when we debate a budget." To the council, the Bishop said, "These are human lives that are touched by what you do, and it's been a wonderful experience to see that."

The Council recessed for a coffee break.

# Report of the Resolutions Committee

When Council returned from the break, the Bishop recognized Mrs. Martha Barfoot, St. Luke's, Alexandria, Chair of Council's Committee on Resolutions.

On behalf of the Committee, Mrs. Barfoot moved the following courtesy resolutions, which were passed unanimously on a voice vote.

#### CR1

Whereas, we are glad that Robert Poland Atkinson came down from the hills to serve as Assistant Bishop in the plains of this Diocese;

Whereas, he has advanced the cause of ecumenism by his faithful ministry among us as Ecumenical Officer of our diocese and co-chair of our Ecumenical Committee;

**Whereas,** he has enabled the ministry of the Virginia Council of Churches as Chair of their Development Committee;

Whereas, he brought to this effective leadership the depth of his insight, the passion of his commitment, and the joy of his gracious wit;

Whereas, he has made us one as he worked with us by his generous care and pastoral concern for each of us, and

**Whereas,** he has now concluded his service as our Ecumenical Officer and co-chair of our committee; now, therefore, be it

**Resolved,** we the members of the Ecumenical Committee of the Diocese of Virginia give thanks to God for his servant Robert and extend to our beloved brother in Christ and Bishop our sincere appreciation for his presence and the benefits of his ministry among us, and be it further

**Resolved,** that we pray God's blessing on his continuing ministry now and upon his retirement and we express our joy that this our friend in ecumenism will continue to reside in our diocese.

#### CR₂

Whereas, the Rev. Myron Miller recently retired from his long ministry at the Virginia Council of Churches, and

Whereas, this ministry covered years of service to ecumenical causes in the State of Virginia in which this diocese has participated; these included the establishment of an annual gathering of denominational ecumenical leaders, as well as staffing the Faith and Order Commission and other concern areas such as direct ministries, weekday religious education and church and society, and

Whereas, Myron Miller devoted special care to the migrant workers in Virginia, showing loving concern for their children, and inspired and encouraged others to support this ministry, and enabled cooperation with the government Head Start Program; now therefore be it

**Resolved,** that the Diocese of Virginia at its 199th Annual Council honor Myron Miller, and express deep gratitude and real affection to him, wishing him and his wife Dorothy a long, happy and healthy retirement, as we give thanks to God for his long, faithful and fruitful ministry among us.

#### <u>CR3</u>

Whereas, the Very Reverend Richard Reid has served the Virginia Theological Seminary as its Dean and President since 1982, and will retire from this ministry in 1994, and,

Whereas, he has been, since 1968, a distinguished New Testament teacher and scholar at Virginia Theological Seminary, and

Whereas, he has through his vision of the Seminary prepared men and women for the ordained ministry, particularly service in parish ministry, and raised up pastors, teachers, preachers and prophets for the church who have gone forth into all the world to proclaim the Gospel, and

Whereas, he has through his leadership prepared men and women for lay ministry, deepening their service to "the faith once delivered to the saints"; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Diocese of Virginia at its 199th Annual Council honors Richard Reid and expresses gratitude to him for having led the Seminary and the Church by these words,

"Endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit which has been given to us,"

wishing him and his wife Helen, a long, joyful, healthy and fruitful retirement, as we give thanks to God for his faithful, obedient and holy ministry among us.

#### CR4

Whereas, the Rev. Alwin Reiners, Jr. was baptized and confirmed at St. George's, Arlington; and educated at the Catholic University of America, Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut and Virginia Theological Seminary following service in the United States Navy; and

Whereas, he was ordained to the diaconate at St. George's, Arlington by Bishop Goodwin in May 1954, with plans to enter the mission field in Alaska; and

Whereas, he met Joanne McElman when she was on the overseas mission staff of the Episcopal Church, and they were married in Calvary Church, New York City on February 5, 1955 by John Bentley, the former Bishop of Alaska; and they were sent to Kotzebue, Alaska to found St. George's-in-the-Arctic; and

Whereas, the Rt. Rev. William Jones Gordon ordained him to the priesthood in February 1955; and

Whereas, the Reiners returned to the "Lower 48" in 1957 when he was called to St. James's, Richmond, where he served with the Rev. Richard Royall Baker; and

Whereas, in 1961 he became the founding vicar of St. Bartholomew's, Richmond, where his ministry was distinguished by innovation in worship and Christian education and the development of lay ministry; and

Whereas, he was called in 1968 to be rector of the Church of the Holy Comforter, Charlotte, in the Diocese of North Carolina, where he continued to be a pioneer in Christian education, lay ministry and other areas; was President of the North Carolina Clergy Association and served on the Standing Committee and the Executive Council; was the first rector in North

Carolina to call a clergywoman as an assistant; founded the "Loaves and Fishes" hunger ministry which flourishes today; and was an instrument of unity and reconciliation during the introduction of liturgies for trial use and the 1979 Book of Common Prayer; and

and the 1979 book of Continon Frayer,

Whereas, he was called to St. Louis in 1979 to succeed Elsom Eldridge as director of the Educational Center, where he directed the development of new resources for Christian education, with particular emphasis on the scriptural and religious dimensions of the center's programs; and

Whereas, he returned to the Diocese of Virginia in 1982 to accept the call to become rector of St. Paul's, Hanover, where he has served a growing parish as well as the Hanover community through ecumenical ministry and leadership in community activities; and

Whereas,
he has served the larger church as a board member of the National Network of Episcopal Clergy Associations and the Mid-Atlantic Training Institute, and as an alternate to General Convention; and he has served the Diocese of Virginia as Chairman of the Department of Christian Education; as a Dean; as a member of the Executive Board; as a consultant to parishes engaged in mutual ministry review, the search process, and conflict resolution; as a founder of the Virginia Episcopal Clergy Association; and as a Program Liaison ("Happy's Helper") and

Whereas, he retired from the parish ministry on January 2, 1994; therefore be it

**Resolved,** that the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia offers its sincere thanks to the Rev. Alwin Reiners, Jr. for his years of service in this diocese and elsewhere and wishes him Godspeed as he moves into new spheres of ministry; and be it further

**Resolved,** that copies of this resolution be sent to Al Reiners and be spread upon the pages of the Journal of the Council.

#### CR5

Whereas, the Reverend David Maxwell Warner, a graduate of The University of Denver and Seabury-Western Theological Seminary, was ordained Deacon in June 1955 and Priest in January 1956, and

Whereas, he served in the Diocese of Colorado, where he was founder of Saint Martha Chapel and co-founder of Christ the King Chapel, and

Whereas, while serving three churches in the Diocese of Utah he also was minister to Ute Indians, a member of the Executive Council, and twice a deputy to General Convention, and

Whereas, in August 1974, he was called as rector of Christ Ascension Church, Richmond, Virginia, and

**Whereas,** during almost twenty years there he has ministered with love, devotion and care, and

Whereas, on March 1, 1994, he will retire from active parish ministry; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia does extend to the Reverend David Maxwell Warner its heartfelt thanks for his presence and his ministry among us and does express to him our wishes for a long and fruitful retirement, and be it further

**Resolved,** that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Father Warner and that it be published in the Journal of the Council.

#### CR₆

Whereas, the Rev. James McIver Green has faithfully served the Church of the Resurrection for 29 years, as vicar and then rector, until his retirement on January 16, 1994; and

Whereas, Mr. Green began his ordained ministry as deacon and then assistant to the rector at Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill, learning all the many skills required for parish ministry; and

Whereas, Mr. Green served with courage and vision the needs of the Alexandria community, especially as one of the founders of Carpenter's Lodgings; and

Whereas, Mr. Green gave wisdom and heart and energy as a leader in the mission of the church in the region and in the Diocese of Virginia for all his ordained ministry; and

Whereas, Mr. Green returned to serve the Virginia Theological Seminary as an instructor of pastoral theology and as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Seminary; and

Whereas, Mr. Green remained, to the day of his retirement, a loyal and caring pastor and friend to the retired and to the sick and to the dying at Goodwin House; and

Whereas, Mr. Green loves to fish, to tinker with cars and to plant daylilies; now, therefore, be it

**Resolved,** that this 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia joins the members of Region IV in the expression of sincere appreciation to Jim and his wife, Dibbie, with best wishes for a happy and healthy retirement.

#### CR7

Whereas, the Rev. John Guernsey completed his term on the Evangelism Committee as chair in 1993; and

Whereas, he was the committee's inspirational and innovative leader in its formative period; and

Whereas, he led the design of the All Day Evangelism Workshop, several of which were held in various regions of the Diocese and others are planned for 1994; now, therefore, be it

**Resolved,** that this 199th Council of the Diocese of Virginia join the members of the diocesan Committee on Evangelism in the expression of sincere appreciation to John for his gifts and ministry and wish him well in his continued service in the Lord.

#### CR8

Whereas, the Reverend Alexander Fraser, graduate of the School of Theology of the University of the South, was called to the larger life in the nearer presence of Christ on December 17, 1993; and

Whereas, he served as a priest in the Episcopal Church in many parishes and dioceses throughout the United States, before concluding his active ministry as a parish priest here in the Diocese of Virginia as rector of Saint Stephen's Church, Heathsville; and

Whereas, he sought out the helpless, threatened, endangered, poor, and oppressed wherever he might find them so that he could serve them, defend them, and respond to their needs, seeking to be their pastor, priest, counselor, and teacher; and

Whereas, during the course of his long ministry he touched the lives of those with whom he made contact, making a lasting impression; and

Whereas, his life and ministry were replete with examples of service which will long be remembered and from which much can be learned to the benefit of the work of the Church and its ministry everywhere, especially during his final struggle with physical infirmity and serious illness; and

Whereas, his final days were filled with an outpouring of affection from many of those he had served and helped in their difficulties and times of trial, now, therefore, be it

**Resolved,** that the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia affirms these sentiments in commemoration of the life and ministry of the Reverend Alexander Fraser, may be go forth from strength to strength in the life of perfect service in God's heavenly kingdom; and be it further

**Resolved,** that copies of this resolution be forwarded to his widow, Jody Fraser, in Kilmarnock, Virginia, and to his daughter, Mary Beth Fraser, in Birmingham, Alabama.

Mrs. Barfoot announced that Council members had received the Committee's written report, distributed throughout the chamber earlier in the morning.

On behalf of the committee, Mrs. Barfoot moved the referral of R-1 on the permanent diaconate to the Office of the Bishop.

Bishop Lee asked if there were any discussion. The Bishop recognized the Rev. David Thabet, the sponsor of the resolution, who asked if Council would be informed of the result of such a referral and study.

Bishop Lee responded that it would. Bishop Lee called for a vote, and the motion to refer was passed on a voice vote without dissent.

On behalf of the Committee, Mrs. Barfoot proposed a substitute for R-2 which "traces the previous history of the recent similar resolutions, and Council's actions. It also allows for taking into consideration what comes out of the pastoral teaching, that will come from the House of Bishops, and this is somewhat in line with the actions that we took earlier [on the proposed change to the canons]."

Following extensive discussion of the substitute for R-2, and one amendment, Council approved on a voice vote Substitute R-2 with one amendment.

#### Substitute for R2

Whereas, resolutions pertaining to human sexuality have been submitted to Annual Council for the last four out of five years, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1994, and

Whereas, the Council has previously heard reports from the Committee on Family Life and Human Sexuality, heard Bishop Lee's statement on the subject in his Pastoral Address to Council in 1992, debated and discussed human sexuality, and

Whereas, a Pastoral Teaching from the House of Bishops is expected at the 1994 General Convention on the subject after much prayerful consideration by that body, and

Whereas, individual dioceses and churches have studied the question of human sexuality and continue to study the question, and

Whereas, the 195th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia articulated the position of this diocese regarding issues of human sexuality, and

Whereas, the 197th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia again articulated this position; now therefore be it

Resolved, that the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia echoes and reaffirms the words of Bishop Lee when he said, "The diocese is consistently faithful to the church's teaching that the normative context for sexual intimacy is life-long, heterosexual, monogamous marriage; and we have resisted with compassionate strength attempts to divide us, or to define us, by such a fearful or narrow expression of that teaching that it becomes oppressive and self-righteous"; and be it further

**Resolved,** that these same principles be applied to Candidates for Ordination to the three orders of the Church; and be it further

**Resolved,** that the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia submits this resolution to the 1994 General Convention of the Episcopal Church.

* * *

On behalf of the Committee, Mrs. Barfoot moved the adoption of the Committee's substitute for R-3.

Following debate, the Council adopted the substitute on a voice vote.

#### Substitute for R3

Whereas, the 196th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia established a multiyear budget separate from the annual operating budget for the purpose of supporting new churches through grants for clergy compensation and program costs; and

Whereas, the 197th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia established a special fund (growth fund) for the purpose of supporting new churches through site acquisition and building construction; and

Whereas, the Executive Board of the Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, at its meeting on September 16, 1993, recognizing the difficulty of distinguishing between the physical plant and personnel/program costs of starting new churches, acted to combine these funds; and

Whereas,

Bishop Lee has combined the Commission on Congregational Missions and the Commission on Church Planting, and placed responsibility for Congregational Development under a Commission for Congregational Development and New Missions, to be chaired by Bishop F. Clayton Matthews, with a charge to develop a diocesan plan for new churches and congregational development; and

Whereas, the Executive Board named the new combined budget the Congregational Development and New Missions Budget reflecting the wish to broaden the use of these funds to include grants for Congregational Development; now, therefore be it

**Resolved,** that the Executive Board keep in mind the priority that the diocese has placed upon the planting of new churches and carefully weigh the requests that come before it as to the granting of funds; and be it further

Resolved, that the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia hereby authorizes the Executive Board to broaden the usage of the funds in the Congregational Development and New Missions Budget to include grants to churches for site acquisition, building construction, and personnel/program costs as well as grants for Congregational Development.

On behalf of the Committee, Mrs. Barfoot moved the adoption of R-4, the resolution affirming the call of the Bishop for episcopal assistance and outlining the process.

Following a question from one delegate about the logistics of conducting an episcopal election during the course of a regular Annual Council meeting, the resolution was adopted without dissent on a voice vote.

#### <u>R4</u>

**Resolved**, that the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia affirms the call of the Bishop of Virginia for episcopal assistance, rejoices in the election and consecration of the Rt. Rev. F. Clayton Matthews as suffragan bishop, and requests the Bishop to appoint with the advice and consent of the Standing

Committee a nominating committee to present to the Diocese nominees for election of the second suffragan bishop authorized by the 197th Annual Council, with the following timetable and procedures:

- (1) Appointment of the Nominating Committee (Committee) no later than March 31, 1994.
- (2) Announcement of nominees for suffragan bishop no later than November 15, 1994, with certification that all nominees are approved by the Committee and the Bishop of the Diocese.
- (3) Additional nominations may be submitted by written petition no later than December 15, 1994; provided that each petition states the nominee's consent to be screened by the Committee. Each petition shall be signed by at least five clerical members and five lay members of the 200th Annual Council who are from different congregations of the Diocese and who represent at least five different regions.
- (4) Introduction of all eligible nominees at the first session of the 200th Annual Council, January 7, 1995.
- (5) Election of the suffragan bishop at the second session of the 200th Annual Council, January 27-28, 1995.



On behalf of the Committee, Mrs. Barfoot moved the adoption of the Committee's substitute for R-5.

After Mrs. Barfoot accepted a friendly amendments to the Committee's substitute for R-5, the resolution passed on a voice vote without dissent.

#### Substitute for R5

Whereas, a major objective of the 1992 Diocesan Council resolution on the environment was to assist parishes and churches under supervision in assuring the protection of people in the churches, especially children; and

Whereas, parishes and churches under supervision in the diocese are responsible for nearly 200 buildings in which children are educated and other important ministries conducted; and

Whereas, another major objective of the council resolution was to equip our people with information about environmental issues so that they can make responsible Christian choices; now therefore be it

Resolved, by this 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia that the Commission on Stewardship of Creation shall obtain, periodically update, and notify all parishes in the diocese of information (including availability of Commission personnel and names of skilled consultants) facilitating safe and cost-effective protection of children in church schools, other church properties and community schools from potential environmental hazards such as asbestos, radon and lead in drinking fountains, paint and water taps; and be it further

- **Resolved,** that the Commission shall report to the 200th Annual Council in 1995 about the implementation of this resolution; and be it further
- **Resolved,** that rectors are urged to identify to the Commission points of contact at their parishes.



On behalf of the Committee, Mrs. Barfoot moved the adoption of the Committee's substitute for R-6. After accepting a friendly amendment made by the Rev. Martyn Minns, the resolution passed without dissent on a voice vote.

# Substitute for R6

- Whereas, in response to the call of the 195th Annual Council, each parish in the Diocese of Virginia participated in a Year of Prayer for the Decade of Evangelism to "proclaim Jesus Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit in such ways that persons may accept him as Savior and follow him as Lord in the fellowship of the church;" and
- Whereas, the Decade of Evangelism has focused our attention on fulfilling the Great Commission to take the Gospel of Christ to unreached people everywhere;
- Whereas, several parishes in the Diocese of Virginia are now jointly sponsoring and sending missionaries to various parts of the world with support in prayer, funding, the encouragement of team ministry visitations, education, training, research and strategic mission planning assistance; and
- Whereas, the Decade of Evangelism is intended to involve all parishes in the Diocese of Virginia in the mission of the Church at home and abroad, but not all parishes can send ministry teams abroad and many lack direct personal missionary contact; and
- Whereas, creative and cooperative outreach strategies can link small and larger parishes in common ministry within and outside the Diocese of Virginia;
- Whereas, the Diocese of Virginia can encourage inter-parish cooperative ministries to send missionaries to evangelize, teach and train their replacements in strategic areas of the world, to plant new churches, as well as construct and renovate church buildings; therefore be it
- Resolved, that this 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia requests the Program Committee of Council to provide at the 200th Annual Council an opportunity for participants at Council to convene for exchange of information and dialog on mission, outreach and evangelism. Representatives from the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Evangelism Committee, Cursillo, the Committee on Refugee and Migrant Ministries, the Committee on Overseas Missions, the Commission on Congregational Missions, the Commission on Church Planting and the Episcopal Church Women are especially encouraged to participate, with special attention being given to discussion of the following questions:

- What are the benefits and burdens of inter-parish cooperation and sharing in outreach ministries and church planting within and outside the diocese?
- 2. How can the Diocesan Missionary Society effectively promote missionary activities within and outside the diocese?
- 3. How can the Diocese of Virginia develop strategies, long-range plans, and programs during and after the Decade of Evangelism and use its resources for church planting within and outside the diocese?
- 4. What impact and changes would such inter-parish cooperation in outreach programs and church planting have on the aforementioned organizations? And be it further

Resolved, that adequate provision be made prior to the 200th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia for preparatory discussions of this subject by the Executive Board meeting with the Regional Deans and Presidents, by the Regional Councils, and by the vestries of churches and missions of the diocese.



On behalf of the Committee, Mrs. Barfoot recommended rejection of R-7 on the structure of the Church, since General Convention and its Executive Council have already initiated steps in this area.

The Rev. Martyn Minns offered a substitute for R-7. Extensive discussion followed, after which the Bishop called for a vote. The substitute for R-7 proposed by Mr. Minns was adopted by a vote of 192 to 140.

#### Substitute for R7

Whereas, concern about the present structure of our Church is a pervasive one; and

Whereas, work is presently underway by various committees established by the 70th General Convention to review the national Church's structure, operation and program; and

Whereas, various proposals for restructuring the national Church have been put forward including:

- Allowing the Office of Presiding Bishop to be held by a sitting diocesan.
- 2. Limiting the ministry of Presiding Bishop to presiding over the House of Bishops and the Council of Advice.
- Restructuring or abolishing the Executive Council.
- Establishing that a vote of a set percentage of dioceses be required in order to convene a General Convention, with business restricted to a stated purpose.

- Giving to the presiding bishops of the several provinces of the Episcopal Church the role of authority of taking order for and consecrating new bishops.
- Elevating the role of provincial synods to replace General Convention wherever possible; now, therefore be it

**Resolved,** that this 199th Council of the Diocese of Virginia enthusiastically supports these various committees in their difficult work of institutional reform from within the structure; and be it further

**Resolved,** that a copy of this resolution be delivered to the Secretary of the General Convention.



On behalf of the Committee, Mrs. Barfoot moved the adoption of R-8 with amendment. The motion carried.

#### <u>R8</u>

Whereas, the purposes of the United Nations are to maintain international peace and security, to develop friendly relations among nations, to achieve international cooperation in solving international problems and in promoting human rights and fundamental freedoms, and to be a center for harmonizing the actions of nations in the attainment of these common ends; and

Whereas, the Charter of the United Nations was signed by representatives of the governments of the United Nations at San Francisco on June 26, 1945; and

Whereas, the United Nations will celebrate its 50th anniversary with special activities and ceremonies in San Francisco on June 26, 1995; and

Whereas, the Friendship Force International is leading an effort among 1,400 nongovernmental organizations, sister cities and church organizations to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the United Nations with "One Week of Friendship in the Whole World" during the week of June 25 - July 1, 1995; now therefore be it

**Resolved,** that the Diocese of Virginia celebrate "One Week of Friendship in the Whole World" with exchanges with our sister diocese Christ the King, or with other appropriate activities; and be it further

**Resolved,** that the 199th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia submit a copy of this resolution to the 1994 General Convention of the Episcopal Church.

* * *

This concluded the Committee's report. Bishop Lee discharged the Committee with thanks.

# **Announcement and Adjournment**

Bishop Lee announced that St. James's, Richmond had called the Rev. Robert Trache of Immanuel-on-the-Hill, Alexandria, to be their new rector. Mr. Trache begins his new ministry in March.

The Council adjourned at 1:30 p.m. with the Bishop's blessing.

## **Annual Report of the Committee on Aging**

The Committee on Aging meets on the third Monday, January through May, and September through November, at 9:30 a.m. at Trinity, Fredericksburg. We invite anyone interested in ministries with the aging to join us at our meetings.

The Northern Virginia Group on Aging held their February Seminar, "Aging with Grace," with Professor Emeritus Charles Price of Virginia Seminary as keynote speaker. The seminar and workshops were well attended and received very positive evaluations.

In February, the Committee on Aging distributed the materials for Age in Action Month (May) which the Episcopal Society for Ministry with Aging (our only national group dedicated to ministry with aging) provided to all congregations in the diocese.

During 1993, the committee made a concerted effort to recruit a contact person from each of the 15 regions in the Diocese. The purpose of this is to distribute the committee's handbook on aging ministries, the first draft of which will be completed by the end of the year. This contact person will be responsible for circulating the handbook to all churches in the region, and for inserting updates as they are prepared.

The third annual Adult Fall Camp, "Discovering Ourselves Anew," was held at Shrine Mont, October 11-13th. The Rev. Churchill Gibson, Chaplain at the Virginia Theological Seminary, was the keynote speaker. Ms. Verna Dozier conducted workshops discussing her recent book, *The Dream of God.* Ed Kilbourne led the conference music and a workshop on storytelling. Workshops on legal issues for older persons, art, music, medical insurance, retirement housing decisions and Bible study were well attended. The evaluations from the 60 participants were so enthusiastic about the leaders that most have been invited to return in 1994.

#### **Annual Report of the Commission on AIDS**

The Commission on AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency syndrome) exists to encourage and help churches, church agencies, church members and others in the Diocese of Virginia to respond compassionately and effectively to the HIV/AIDS epidemic, through support of persons, families and communities affected by HIV (Human Immune Deficiency Virus) and AIDS, through education regarding HIV/AIDS.

Our activities provide a link to all areas of the Diocese through:

- members who are active in responding to the HIV/AIDS epidemic within their own and other communities;
- sponsorship of, and support for, workshops, retreats, services of prayer and healing, and other activities;
- collaboration with other diocesan committees and commissions;

- participation in, and support for, programs of the National Episcopal AIDS Coalition, the Presiding Bishop's National Day of Prayer for persons affected by HIV/AIDS, and other programs within the national and international Church;
- providing, when requested, information and referrals, speakers, resources for educational and other programs, and other assistance; and
- other activities.

Through 1993, commissioners and associates met approximately every two months to plan and to conduct commission work. The highlight of our accomplishments in 1993 was a three-day retreat for HIV/AIDS caregivers, held at the Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn, November 5-7. Registration for this second annual retreat was more than double the registration for our first retreat. The majority of registrants required full or partial scholarships in order to participate in the retreat. Support from Annual Council, from churches, and from individuals provided sufficient scholarship funds so that no registrant was turned away. Formal and informal evaluations indicate that our retreat model and program meets vital spiritual, informational and other needs of caregivers.

We look forward to 1994 activities, including sponsorship of workshops at the spring and fall Parish Leadership Fairs; sponsorship of our third annual retreat for HIV/AIDS caregivers, planned to be in the Northern Virginia area; participation in the national conference of the National Episcopal AIDS Coalition; sponsorship of activities for the Presiding Bishop's National Day of Prayer; World AIDS day; and other activities.

Churches, agencies, groups, and individuals are invited to request assistance from the commission. We also very much welcome all who are interested in helping with commission activities. Please contact any member of the commission or diocesan staff.

#### **Annual Report of the Commission on Communications**

This year has been a productive and active one for the Commission on Communications. For the first time, we provided a communications exhibit at the Annual Council. Members of the commission maintained the exhibit, provided informational materials and had the opportunity to talk to parish representatives regarding their communications needs. A number of parishes requested assistance. We arranged communication audits and scheduled a series of workshops for the FACETS program. We plan to repeat this same program during the 1994 Council.

As mentioned, we provided workshops for the FACETS program. Three of the commission members spent the better part of one day and continued a follow-up program with both the FACETS student staff and their advisors.

One of the most important activities undertaken by the commission in 1993 was the Communications Resources Audit. Our objective in conducting the survey was to identify the technological resources of the diocese (how many parishes have fax machines? typewriters? computers? modems? etc.). We designed, produced and distributed questionnaires to all parishes in our diocese: the initial response was over 124; we continued to contact each parish and by early March we had a 100 percent response. Although this survey was brief and limited in its scope, the commission considers it a good beginning and a base line to monitor the continued communication needs of our parishes. In June we reported on our efforts to the Executive Board of the Council.

The commission participated in two Parish Leadership Fairs. In one, we addressed the issues of parish publications and the applications of new technology. At the second fair, we addressed ways in which the individual parish could improve its communications efforts with limited resources. Both were well attended.

In February the Executive Board gave the Communications Committee commission status. Acting on the second resolve of Resolution R-7 of the 198th Council, the Executive Board initiated an independent study of diocesan communications needs in the 21st century. The commission was asked to assist in the implementation of the Executive Board's recommendations following the evaluation.

In support of the financial obligations facing the Diocese in the next year, the commission voted at their December 7th meeting to reduce the commission's budget request by ten percent. The commission's programs will continue as planned.

# Annual Report of the Commission on Congregational Missions

The Commission on Congregational Missions has the unique role of assisting the Bishop in the oversight of small churches and mission congregations. Meeting locations move each month to different congregations where we meet and pray with leaders, enjoy Christian fellowship, and hear the vision of the ministry of their congregation. These visits also provide an opportunity to build understanding and provide support and encouragement.

Bishop Atkinson provided the commission with encouragement, guidance and wisdom, bringing firsthand knowledge of the needs and dreams of the mission congregations. Another important asset of the commission is the long term memory and knowledge that several members bring to this work. Each commission member is assigned to serve three or four mission congregations as a liaison and is charged to establish and maintain ongoing relationships with the vicars and parish leaders. This important link provides communication, understanding, and cooperation.

Monthly visits during 1993 included meetings held with parish leaders at La Igelsia de Cristo Rey; St. Peter's, Richmond; St. Paul's, West Point; La Iglesia de San Jose, Arlington; and the Korean Congregation at St. Andrew's, Arlington. These meetings are inspirational for the commission members who are able, month after month, to witness the wonder of God's mission and ministry in these congregations.

An important dimension of the commission's work is the monitoring of mission budgets and the oversight of that part of the diocesan budget which is allocated for support of mission congregations. Through the liaisons, the commission is able to keep in close touch with each congregation and to make recommendations on their behalf to the Executive Board and Annual Council for funding.

Another part of our work is the support of clergy working in small congregations. In 1993, we gave scholarships to clergy to attend the Small Church Institute at Salter Path, North Carolina.

# Annual Report of the Diocesan Missionary Society

On behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society (DMS), I am pleased to submit this report of the activities of DMS during the past year.

DMS is an independent, not-for-profit corporation that operates in close affiliation with the Diocese to provide financial support to parishes engaged in the construction or renovation of church buildings or related facilities. Such assistance normally takes the form of below-market rate loans made by DMS on a five-year, renewable term basis. At present, DMS has some \$5.5 million in loans outstanding to 21 parishes throughout the Diocese. In addition, DMS has committed another \$922,000 to five projects either under construction or soon to be started.

Highlights of 1993 include the completion of the renovation project at St. Philip's, Richmond and the commencement of a renovation and expansion project at St. John's, Centreville, both with DMS assistance. In addition, DMS assistance made possible the financing of a major expansion at St. Anne's, Reston and the acquisition of a new facility by the Church of the Word, Manassas. DMS standby assistance also made possible the completion of a renovation project at Trinity Church, Charlottesville.

The sources of funds used by DMS in its revolving loan program are: 1) gifts made to DMS by parishes and individuals throughout the Diocese and, 2) loans made to DMS by parishes and related trust funds. Currently, DMS has a revolving fund of some \$7 million, of which all but \$450,000 has actually been loaned to churches or committed for such purposes.

The Board of DMS continues to seek additional funds to be used in this important ministry, particularly during the current "Decade of Evangelism." The requests for DMS assistance substantially exceed the Society's resources and the cost of "planting" new churches has risen significantly in recent years. Accordingly, the DMS Board invites vestries and the trustees of parish and church-related trust funds throughout the diocese to consider loans to DMS as part of their portfolios of investment. Indeed, with the substantially reduced returns now available on market investments, DMS's standard 6.5 percent interest rate (on a typical 15-year loan) is more attractive than in prior years. Moreover, loans to DMS are fairly safe investments; DMS (which was founded in 1829) has never defaulted on a financial obligation. But more importantly, an investment in DMS provides an opportunity to participate in the ongoing missionary activities of the Diocese, a purpose which under most church-related trust instruments probably justifies a more modest return for at least a portion of the trust assets.

The members of the DMS Board stand ready to respond to any questions or inquiries from parishes throughout the Diocese concerning either investments in DMS or possible DMS involvement in parish building or expansion programs. # Annual Report of the Committee on Disabled Persons

The Committee on Disabled Persons encourages clergy and lay leaders' awareness of key factors in providing full physical and attitudinal access to all church functions for all people, including those with disabilities, those who are becoming frail as they age and/or those experiencing long-term illnesses. Over the years, we have:

1. Conducted surveys and diocesan workshops;

- Located and published educational materials and strategies to help leaders deal with the range of ways available to enable solid ministry with people with disabilities whose needs are as diverse as those of people who do not appear physically or sensorially disabled. These range from lighting and sound amplification to improving physical access to all church activities and programs;
- Helped leaders deal realistically with two competing demands: a)
   preserving historic worship space and b) providing full program access
   by emphasizing that moving a program site is usually more feasible
   than remodeling a local or national historic treasure;
- Identified an additional resource to assist churches with the first part of item 3 above: "Partners for Sacred Places," a national, non-sectarian, not-for-profit organization at the National Center for the Stewardship and Preservation of Religious Properties, 1616 Walnut St., Suite 2310, Philadelphia, PA (215)546-1288;
- Nurtured our church family's corporate awareness and collective conscience, recognizing that few notice access issues until "they" impinge upon someone we know and love;
- 6. Maintained information on:
  - technical assistance and assisting devices for improving visual, auditory, physical and attitudinal access to church programs;
  - b. alternate format materials including large print, Braille, and tapes;
  - best practices various denominations employ to integrate people with disabilities into their church communities;
  - names of personal communication aides who sign or otherwise help translate to assist people with speech or hearing difficulties;
  - e. technical assistance about the new Americans with Disabilities
    Act, which does not regulate churches but which has spurred
    numerous congregations to move to comply with the spirit, if not
    the letter, of the law.
- 7. Worked collaboratively with various churches and non-profits (e.g., Project WORD, the National Organization on Disabilities; the National Catholic Office for Persons with Disabilities; ecumenical groups such as LARC, the Stephen Ministries, and diocesan regional groups; Sophia House; local neighbor-to neighbor service groups) to learn how to reach out to people with disabilities; after having devoted 1993 to planning, we expect to work with these and other groups to convene an interfaith conference during the spring of 1994. The conference, "Catching our Dreams," will help participants identify and support creative ways to minister with people with disabilities both within and outside our congregations;
- 8. Worked with the heads of various Commonwealth health and human service agencies, as well as state and local political officials, to legislate and initiate local and state services for the largely unserved **and rapidly growing** population of an estimated 300,000 Virginians with severe disabilities between the ages of 22 and 60.

In spite of these efforts, the committee notes the disturbing estimate that approximately 95 percent of people with severe disabilities remain unchurched. In many cases, particularly with parents of severely disabled children, this means that their families are unchurched as well. Furthermore, the committee laments the

situations facing a large number of people who, as they grow older and more frail, tend to slip quietly away from their parishes just when they may most need the support faithful congregations can provide.

# Annual Report of the Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission

The proposed change of name from Ecumenical Committee to Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission represents a year of transition and renewal in our ecumenical work. The commission acknowledges with gratitude the effective and enthusiastic leadership of the Rt. Rev. Robert P. Atkinson, who as ecumenical officer and co-chair of our commission, was succeeded by the April 15, 1993 appointment of the Rev. Charles F. Sydnor, Jr., as new ecumenical officer, who now serves as co-chair of our commission with Phebe Hoff. This transition was related to Bishop Atkinson's pending retirement.

The commission acknowledges with appreciation the valuable service of three members who have found it necessary to resign, Ellen Diming of Region XV, Ursula Baxley of Region XIII, and the Rev. Ronald L. Woodruff of Region I.

The commission has adopted the following revised mission statement for the guidance of our ecumenical work.

Our mission is to respond to the ecumenical imperative of our Lord Jesus Christ for the church that we all may be one, and to nurture interfaith relationships.

We accomplish this by:

- serving as a communications link among all levels of the church from the national office to the local parish;
- providing information and education for PERS (Parish Ecumenical Representatives);
- promoting and implementing our LARC covenant;
- nurturing inter-church and interfaith dialogues so that unity and understanding may overcome estrangement;
- encouraging the priority of ecumenism in all the ministry and mission of our diocese.

Our group is seeking permission to function as a commission with not more than 20 members, of which 15 are representatives from each region. We believe this commission system will better fulfill our mission of linkage and communication than the present committee structure.

Our goal of having a Parish Ecumenical Representative appointed by every parish of our diocese is only about half complete. We urge parishes to appoint a PER and convey that person's name to the ecumenical officer. The commission provides training for PERS through the annual Parish Leadership Fairs.

Our diocese was represented at national and state ecumenical programs during this past year. Phebe Hoff and Charles Sydnor attended the National Workshop on Christian Unity and the Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical Officers meeting in Milwaukee last May from which much important information was gained and shared with our commission and Bishop. Our commission participated in the annual faith and order meeting of the Virginia Council of Churches in Richmond in October, when Dr. Paul Nelson led us in completing a four-year study and response to Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry (the Lima Document) of the World Council of Churches. Members of our commission participated in the annual Luthern-Anglican-Roman Catholic Conference in November where we learned creative ways of keeping our LARC Covenant through sharing the Scripture of our common lectionary. Betty Garnett of our commission continues her capable representation of our mission with Church Women United. The Rev. Robert Trache continues our Jewish-Christian dialogues.

During the coming year we plan to begin a Muslim-Christian Dialogue with the hope that suspicion and distrust may be overcome by mutual understanding.

# Annual Report of the Committee on Education

The purpose of the Committee on Education of the Diocese of Virginia is to encourage, promote, develop, coordinate and support the efforts of all members of congregations, lay and ordained, in the Diocese who are in any way involved in the lifelong process of Christian education. To accomplish this purpose, the committee sponsored the following activities in 1993:

- four Christian Education workshops were held, including an introduction to The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (led by Marilyn Krause, a trainer for the program), a plan for a more meaningful and less hectic Christmas season (led by the Rev. Jane Heenan), a program entitled "Dealing with Difficult Issues: Healing Birds with Broken Wings" led by the Rev. James Green, and a program on servant leadership led by Diana Chambers of the Servant Leadership School;
- the publication of a quarterly Christian Education Network Newsletter mailed to all clergy and Christian education leaders in the Diocese;
- on October 2, 1993, the committee sponsored the first annual Parish Education Day which featured the Rev. William Dols, director of the Educational Center in St. Louis, as keynoter, and a choice of afternoon workshops. The event was attended by 75 people from our diocese and two neighboring dioceses. Our new suffragan, Bishop Matthews, offered a welcome.

In addition, the chair of the committee has served as the Provincial Partner for Province 3, the Christian education representative from the province who meets annually with representatives from the other eight provinces and the staff of the Office of Education, Evangelism, and Ministry Development of the Episcopal Church Center. This role has included the coordination of the annual meeting of the diocesan coordinators of Christian education in the 13 dioceses of Province 3. Our diocese had the largest participation at this year's gathering where John Westerhoff was the keynote speaker and Howard Williams the representative from the Episcopal Church Center.

# Annual Report for the Education for Ministry Program in the Diocese of Virginia

Like the Eveready Bunny, EFM in Virginia keeps on going and growing. Education for Ministry is theological study by extension from the School of Theology at the University of the South, Sewanee, Tennessee. This year there are 37 active groups in the Diocese, comprising 286 students. The focus of the program is to teach lay people to think theologically in all decision making circumstances. The curriculum consists of Bible study, with the emphasis on the theological reflection process, whereby each student presents a decision made and the group reflects on the decision using a theology-based structure. In 1994, a program is being introduced for graduates of EFM, "Practically Christian." It seeks to respond to the question, "In respond as I walk and live in this needy world?" Practically Christian provides a method and a support system which responds to that question. For more

#### Annual Report of the Episcopal Church Women

In the Diocese of Virginia, Episcopal Church Women continue to build on the theme of "Restoring God's Creation to Wholeness" by using God's gifts for communication, compassion and reconciliation. Originally established as a mission arm of the Church, we view our role as extending beyond our parishes and this diocese. Thus, in 1992-1993, Episcopal Church Women contributed \$90,452.42 to mission and ministry objectives. These objectives are closely coordinated with the mission program of the Diocese.

Episcopal Church Women participated in the diocesan-sponsored Parish Leadership Fair, offering a workshop on Lyle Shaller's book "44 Ways to Revitalize a Women's Organization." In 1994 the Women of Vision training program will be offered. Our annual Prayer and Worship Retreat was held at Shrine Mont in May. The retreat theme was "Becoming God's Woman."

The 101st Annual Meeting of the Episcopal Church Women in the Diocese of Virginia and the 103rd United Thank Offering Ingathering was held in May at St. Margaret's School. Bishop Peter John Lee of the Diocese of Christ the King was the keynote speaker. With leadership from the South African Partnership Ministry Committee, the women of this diocese were able to present Bishop Lee with a gift of \$8,269. The relationship we are building with that diocese continues to be a major focus of the Episcopal Church Women.

The Missionary Prayer Partners Program of the Episcopal Church Women provides support through prayer, correspondence and financial contributions to three missionary families in Latin America. In Haiti, the program assists a boy in the Holy Trinity School, and in Honduras it sponsors a young girl at Our Little Roses Home.

This year, under the leadership of the Altar Guild Chairman, contributions were solicited from church women for the traditional "Dressing of the Bishop." This chairman also coordinates the sharing and exchanging of linens, vestments and banners for churches in need.

The Gifts and Scholarships Committee awarded grants totaling \$5,500 to seminarians and college students from the diocese. Funds for these grants come from donations made to the Book of Remembrance and the Gift of Life.

Women from the Diocese of Virginia serve in Episcopal Church Women positions beyond the Diocese. Martha High is a representative to the national United Thank Offering Committee. Mary Leigh Armstrong is Vice-President of Program for the national Episcopal Church Women. Ursula Baxley is the Province III Secretary for the Church Periodical Club. Cindi Bartol is the Province III President for the Episcopal Church Women.

As Episcopal Church Women in this diocese, we treasure our rich heritage, but we are looking forward. Resolutions passed at the Annual Meeting challenge us to confront issues of racism, poverty, AIDS, violence and substance abuse in our communities. We are actively supporting the dialogue on human sexuality.

When the 40-member ECW Executive Board met in November, we began a process of self-study. The Episcopal Church Women will look closely at our organization to identify changes necessary to more effectively support our mission and the ministries of our members.

Episcopal Church Women in this diocese are now in their second century. The program is strong; the women are committed.

# First Report of the First Amendment Task Group

#### Introduction.

The 198th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia established by resolution a special task group on issues concerning the protection of religious freedom. The above named members of the First Amendment Task Group were appointed by the Bishop to implement the resolution in its several parts:

- 1..1 To devise educational programs for use at the parish or regional level about the First Amendment's protections of religious freedom, their meaning and practical effect under current law, and the range of views, theologically, politically and legally, about the appropriate role of government in protecting the free exercise of religion; and
- 1..2 To study ways to reduce government burdens on the free exercise of religion, particularly on the exercise of our faith by our young people or on the conduct of public worship; and
- 1..3 To report the results of its work to the Executive Board and to the 199th Annual Council, including any recommendations.

The Task Group, meeting regularly at St. George's Church, Fredricksburg, was mindful of historic meetings in Fredericksburg when Thomas Jefferson, George Mason and others discussed religious freedom in the Commonwealth and led Virginia as the first among the colonies to protect religious freedom for all its

citizens, establishing legal principles that influenced the eventual adoption of the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof..."

The Task Group reached consensus that the Church should adhere to several basic principles concerning religious liberty:

I. That Christian charity should be maintained as the primary object, despite personal differences as to how First Amendment rights are interpreted or implemented. Such charity is a biblical injunction and a constitutional duty of all citizens of the Commonwealth:

...[L]ove your neighbor as yourself. (Lev.19:18; Mt. 19:19); ...love your enemies... (Mt.5:44, Lk.6:35); ...do to others what you would have them do to you... (Mt.7:12; Lk.6:31).

"That religion or the duty which we owe to our Creator, and the manner of discharging it, can be directed only by reason and conviction, not by force or violence; and, therefore, all men are equally entitled to the free exercise of religion, according to the dictates of conscience; and that it is the mutual duty of all to practice Christian forbearance, love, and charity towards each other. No man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever, nor shall be enforced, restrained, molested, or burthened in his body or goods, nor shall otherwise suffer on account of his religious opinions or belief; but all men shall be free to profess and by argument to maintain their opinions in matters of religion, and the same shall in no wise diminish, enlarge, or affect their civil capacities...."

(Va. Const., Art. I, §16, emphasis added).

As we are to overcome evil with good and to respect the freedom of conscience of those with different religious beliefs as equal before the law, true Christian charity...

- rejects fear and division, appeals to do battle in the name of religion, trivializing the legal process through alarmist and adversarial calls for direct action when many are being seriously persecuted for their faith in the world; and
- respects the dignity and worth of others and courteously considers their points of view, seeking to live in peace with all persons.
- II. That religious freedom is a matter of great importance to the Church and society. It is so closely related to fundamental matters of conscience (decisions to worship or not, to believe or disbelieve, to agree or dissent from temporal authority), that we identify religious freedom with humanity's higher moral obligations toward God and humankind. We speak of it as an inalienable right to distinguish it from other governmentally-derived civil rights.

Religious liberty is protected by the First Amendment and is called the "First Liberty." Until 1990, the Supreme Court interpreted the First Amendment as protecting sincere religious belief and practice from undue legal burdens unless government could show a countervailing compelling interest that could not be satisfied by less restrictive means. Congress reinstated that interpretation through its adoption of the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993 as a corrective measure to the Court's

abandonment of that test in the highly criticized case, *Smith v. Employment Division*. Assuming that the Court upholds the new law, the historic test will continue to be employed by courts to protect religious liberty claims when appropriately made.

The Supreme Court has been severely criticized for its holdings concerning prayer, a moment of silence and the posting of the Ten Commandments in public schools. But it has upheld Release Time programs, state aid to students attending religious schools, and student religious meetings on university and high school campuses. The principles seem clear enough and are gaining wider approval: government may not promote or teach religion, but may recognize and teach about religion.

The Court's cases teach us about pluralism, a principle of toleration that is under attack in some quarters; but the decisions are unequivocally certain: no person may be forced to believe or hold an opinion either by word or symbolic act. We recognize that immigration patterns have significantly altered the public consensus concerning how religion and public institutions interface. A public debate over the influence of religion in public life in a "culture of unbelief" illustrates the degree to which many areas of society have been secularized. The debate over whether the public access to information should be exclusive or inclusive concerning religious language and ideas may depend for its outcome on the value the public gives to religion in its contribution to society's common life.

Religious liberty is only as strong as the law that protects the unpopular minority religion. The First Amendment bars government from showing hostility toward religion and will prevail over local ordinances and state laws that disclose a bias against or hostility toward religion. Given unique historic traditions, the Court has shown an inclination to uphold practices that appear religious without conceding that they still retain their religious character (legislative chaplains, charitable tax exemptions, Sunday observance laws). The Court has also spoken of the required separation of church and state (no religious tests for public officeholders, direct government subsidy for religious education, or laws conferring partisan religious advantage) and of government's benevolent neutrality in matters of religion (indirect aid to religious providers permitted to meet secular purposes).

In its two Clauses of No Establishment and Free Exercise, the First Amendment protects careful balances: it supports careful and proper accommodation of religion, avoids direct government support for religion, observes the principle of separation of church and state to maintain the appropriate autonomy of churches and religious organizations in matters of faith and governance, and promotes the principle of toleration that minimizes religious divisiveness in society. The Court with some care has recently delineated the difference between government support of persons and religious institutions. In closely decided cases, it has allowed government aid to be given to religious providers where secular purposes were to be accomplished. In those cases, the Court placed off limits direct government aid to religious providers seeking religious objectives.

The Task Group understood that such principles and the Supreme Court's efforts to delineate rules in many cases requires careful study. We are privileged to have experts within the Diocese who are available to discuss and explain the cases and to help interpret why these principles are important and necessary in a changing society.

# Educational Program Development.

The Task Group identified resources for specific educational programs on religious freedom in the regions and parishes of the Diocese. These resources should assist parishes desiring to learn about First Amendment principles and their application to contemporary problems.

- Human Resources. Qualified persons serving on the Task Group are available to make educational presentations and to participate in programs concerning religious freedom in adult classes or seminars. Parishes or regions interested in sponsoring a program on religious freedom may contact the chair of the Task Group: Renee Rutkowski (703) 979-4870.
- 1.2 <u>Publications</u>. The Task Group prepared an annotated bibliography of books, articles and resources on the First Amendment as a resource for further reading and study. It is available through Mayo House.

# 1.3 Educational Resources.

- 1.3.1 Educational resource materials on religious liberty are available through the First Liberty Institute at George Mason University, Robinson Hall, #3307, 4400 University Drive, Fairfax, VA 22030. FLI provides seminars, guidelines, sample policies and curriculum resources for teachers, administrators and school board members.
- 1.3.2 Copies of the popular brochures, "Religious Holidays in the Public Schools: Questions and Answers" (published in 1988 by the American Academy of Religion, American Association of School Administrators, American Federation of Teachers, American Jewish Congress, Americans United Research Foundation, Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs, Christian Legal Society, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, National Association of Evangelicals, National Conference of Christians and Jews, National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., National Council on Religion and Public Education, National Council for Social Studies, National Education Association, and National School Boards Association) and "Religion in the Public School Curriculum: Questions and Answers" (published in 1989 by fifteen of the above groups) may be ordered through the Christian Legal Society, 4208 Evergreen Lane, Suite 2, Annandale, VA 22003.
- 1.3.3 The journal <u>Religion and Public Education</u>, published three times a year by the National Council on Religion and Public Education, N162 Lagomarcino Hall, Iowa State University, Ames, IA 50011, is informative about religious activities and court decisions. Other journals are identified in the annotated bibliography referred to above.
- 1.3.4 A "Restatement of the Supreme Court's Law of Religious Liberty and the First Amendment" has been developed by Professor Carl H. Esbeck, University of Missouri, identifying the rules applied by the Supreme Court in religious freedom cases. Copies are available through the Task Group.

- 2. Public Witness and Private Faith. Much has been written about the nature of religious witness in the public sphere and about public and private virtues. Many believe that personal faith is a private matter, others that it is necessarily shared publicly. Although the First Amendment protects both seemingly contrary views, it is directed not against persons or individual actors, but against government burdens on religious exercise, however expressed. While expressions of faith have legal implications, their forms are theologically determined by belief, practice and tradition and are shaped by many cultural forces. The dichotomy between public and private faiths is ultimately not a First Amendment concern, but a theological one.
- 3. <u>Public Education</u>. Recognizing that Supreme Court decisions over the past 30 years have removed many religious traditions in the public schools, including prayer and Bible reading, the Task Group affirmed those decisions, believing that the Church should never rely on government to provide the content of religious belief or to use its influence to extend religious beliefs in children, and that efforts to use government to such ends should be opposed.

The Task Group recognized, however, that government cannot limit lawful private religious expression, whether by students or teachers—a fact that is often ignored. The absence of government prayers does not mean that the law inhibits private conversations of individuals to communicate their faith or prohibits the rights of students under federal law to meet for religious study and to engage in religious conversations during extracurricular club meeting times. Both federal law and the Constitution protect such speech. In fact, just as teachers may not take advantage of their position before a captive public school student audience to bear witness, read the Bible, or pray, so the school may not dictate to students or teachers what they may or may not say on their own time outside the classroom. The difference between the government as actor and the individual as actor is not well understood, despite the distinction's legal significance.

Public schools are rapidly becoming multicultural. Respect for different religious traditions is enhanced when opportunity is given for learning about religion. Indeed, the Supreme Court has expressly approved such educational approaches to religion and religious practices in the public schools.

Student participation in prayer demonstrations around the flagpole before school as a means of witness appears to us to be the very type of pharisaical public display of religiosity prohibited by the Lord (Mt.6:5ff). Instead, we think secondary school students, who are so inclined, should be encouraged to use the benefits of the federal Equal Access Act on their own out-of-class time to study and discuss religious topics or the Bible during their extracurricular club period as permitted. This may help develop leadership skills and deepen their curiosity to study the Bible or religious subjects. Materials cited above may aid them in that task.

We had no support for teacher-led prayer in public schools, a practice which the Supreme Court found unconstitutional.

4. <u>Discussion Papers</u>. Several position papers were written by members of the Task Group on various pertinent religious liberty subjects and are available through Mayo House. These were not formally adopted, but were received by the Task Group to aid its deliberations.

#### 5. Recommendations.

- 5.1 We recommend that the Task Group's commission be extended through the 200th Annual Council to enable the Task Group to assess the effect of a new and historic federal law, the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993, as well as any new developments or issues in First Amendment law, and to report the same to that Council;
- 5.2 We recommend that each church within the Diocese sponsor an adult class, conference or seminar in 1994 on the First Amendment and public education or a subject of local concern.
- 5.3 We recommend that a Task Group be commissioned to give special attention to international religious liberty issues (particularly to religious persecution, human rights abuse, and the absence of legal protections for religious freedom or the rule of law) in places of the world where churches of the Diocese already have outreach or sister church programs or points of engagement through lay contact or professional concern. The Task Group should survey the churches for such concerns, identify experts and organizations within the Diocese and the wider Anglican communion and report the same with recommendations on how churches of the Diocese may help those working on these issues at home and abroad.



#### Annual Report of Goodwin House, Inc.

It is the mission of Goodwin House, Inc. to offer older adults in the Northern Virginia area an environment which meets their needs for spiritual enrichment, safety, security and dignity and which respects everyone as a unique and valuable person who requires individual attention and concern. Goodwin House, Inc. owns and operates two continuing care retirement communities, Goodwin House in Alexandria and Goodwin House West in Falls Church. Both communities offer independent living, assisted living, nursing care and a wide array of programs and services to our elderly citizens.

The past year has been one of change and of new beginnings. After more then 25 years of service as the organization's President, Mr. James Meharg retired. The Board of Trustees created an Endowment Fund in his honor. The Rev. Charles P. Moncure retired at the end of 1993 after serving the organization for over 20 years as the Executive Vice President and having served the Diocese for over 40 years.

A new spirit abounds at both Goodwin House and Goodwin House West. Mr. Marvin L. Ogburn has been appointed President. Both residents and staff are looking forward to working together toward common goals. The future is very bright!

During the upcoming year the organization is focused on maintaining a leadership role by providing high quality services that are a good value for residents, maintaining the financial strength of the organization, offering professionally accredited resident programs, and providing educational opportunities at a wide range of schools and universities. We have also begun a program of outreach to the Episcopal parishes and communities in Northern Virginia.

The financial assistance program (Fellowship Program) is a vital and central program of Goodwin House, Inc. The Goodwin House Foundation is the development, fundraising, and endowment arm of the organization. The need continues to expand both

for Episcopalians who cannot afford residence and for residents who can no longer meet the monthly fee. It is the Foundation's mission to bring attention to this need and expand our fund-raising and Endowment.

The Board of Trustees, residents and staff of Goodwin House, Inc. invite all of our friends in the Diocese to visit. Your prayers and gifts are a continuing source of inspiration. We are committed to enhancing and expanding our ministry to older adults and to meeting the charitable mission as originally expressed by the Diocese in 1955.

#### Annual Report of the Commission on Liturgy and Church Music

In the last two years, our diocese has had collective ordinations to both the diaconate and the priesthood and our commission coordinated the diaconal ordinations at All Saints, Richmond, and the priestly ordinations at the Washington National Cathedral in December.

The highlight of the year for us was the consecration of the Rt. Rev. F. Clayton Matthews at Washington National Cathedral on September 11. We were honored to have the responsibility of that service and to be assisted by the excellent staff of the Cathedral. The superior and totally professional commitment of the staff of the Diocese of Virginia are never so evident as in a planning process such as that one, where time pressure and high standards were also affected by an element of uncertainty which we had to live with for most of 1993.

#### **Annual Report of the Committee on Mental Illness**

The committee's agenda for the coming year is focused on information and advocacy.

#### Information:

- Inform regions and parishes of the prevalence and magnitude of mental illness in the United States and in their midst.
- Clarify the myths and misconceptions surrounding the severely mentally ill.

#### Advocacy:

The 1991 Annual Council adopted a resolution on mental illness committing the church to advocate for the mentally ill. The major mental illnesses are chronic and disabling, leaving our brothers and sisters in Christ to be abandoned and homeless. The committee will speak their cause.

The committee is part of EMIN (Episcopal Mental Illness Network), NAMI (National Alliance for the Mentally Ill), and VAMI (Virginia Alliance for the Mentally Ill). All have religious outreach networks.

In 1993 we have held regional workshops at St. Paul's, Richmond (April), Harrisonburg (November) and Truro, Fairfax (October).

The committee participated in the spring Parish Leadership Fair in Fredericksburg, distributed information at Council, and made presentations at regional clericus gatherings.

As members of the committee, we draw strength from our faith, and helping hands and encouraging support from our many friends. We thank especially Bishop Robert Atkinson, Happy Pullman and Linda Keener.

## Annual Report of the Middle Atlantic Parish Training Program

The Middle Atlantic Parish Training Program, sponsored by the Diocese of Virginia, offers an intensive eight-week summer program of full-time parish ministry. Seminarians between the second and third year of seminary have the opportunity to experience the many areas of parish ministry with its joys and challenges, its demands and surprises. Seminarians are asked to explore their ministry gifts and to identify the areas that need work as they examine their own professional and spiritual development.

A church participating in the program enters fully into the ministry experience. The supervisor meets weekly with the seminarian for an hour of theological reflection. The lay committee and seminarian meet weekly for two hours. Each summer the program suggests a theme as a focus for theological reflection by all participating members. Each seminarian evaluates his or her ministry based on the work-learning agreement established at the beginning of the summer. The supervisor and the lay committee then respond to this evaluation.

In the summer of 1993 there were 14 seminarians in the program, 11 from the Diocese of Virginia and one each from the Dioceses of Connecticut, West Texas and New York. Urban, suburban and rural parish sites were represented in Northern Virginia, the Richmond area, the western part of the Diocese and Washington, D.C. Immanuel, Old Church had a seminarian for the first time in 50 years and Truro Church participated in the program for the first time ever. The theme for the summer was "Growth Through Gifts." Separate orientations were given for supervisors, lay committees and seminarians in April, May and June respectively. These were staffed by board members. Lay attendance was excellent this year, although the problem of communication with lay members continues because of their not being chosen early enough or not identified to the director in time.

For the seminarians only there was an end-of-summer day of reflection with the director and the president of the board. At that time the seminarians identified gifts in an extensive list of those needed and those they were surprised by. There was also recognition of gifts not readily available to them. Most perceptive was the following statement by a seminarian in his evaluation: "About parish ministry: Parish ministry is difficult if one wants to keep it lively. Doing parish ministry is like playing the violin: you must know how to pull and push and when to stop (the strings). There are no specific rules or instructions. It is a dangerous road and you go through it by God's grace and by watching your steps. A minister cannot be successful without the support of the laity. Get the laity involved in the ministry of the parish by letting them do the work." Here is a seminarian who learned.

One of the delights of the program is its acknowledgement of the diversity of ministry in the Diocese of Virginia and the metropolitan area by drawing on clergy and laity in urban, suburban and rural parish life. These persons provide leadership for seminarians as they, in turn, discover a first awareness of Episcopal parish life and acquire new insights into their future ministries. For many seminarians, the scope of this program is a way of meeting, for the first time, their future colleagues in ordained and lay ministry.

The five clergy and five lay members of the Middle Atlantic Parish Training Board make up a working board. In an overnight planning retreat early in the year the board members meet, bond as a group, seek guidance in prayer and reflection, and design and staff the summer program. Individual board members act as contact persons for the seminarians. In this role, they talk with the seminarian, the supervisor and the lay committee during the summer in order to provide resources and support. Each year in October the board evaluates the summer program and applies its learning to the next year's work. In all its facets, the Middle Atlantic Parish Training Program endeavors to play a significant role in the formation process for professional ministry.

#### Annual Report of the Committee on Ministries in Higher Education

The diocesan Committee on Ministries in Higher Education serves to develop an overview of current ministries on campuses within the Diocese, to determine needs for campus ministry within the Diocese, to offer resources for campus ministry, and to inform the Diocese and its congregations of the church's role in higher education today.

In 1993 the campus ministry at the University of Virginia helped to organize and host a Province III student conference at Shrine Mont attended by over 70 participants. With the committee's approval, in 1993 campus ministry was supported by the diocesan budget at James Madison University, Northern Virginia Community Colleges and the University of Virginia. The diocesan budget also contributed to the Encounter with Christ retreat program and the Virginia Forum on Campus Ministry.

In 1994, the committee will shift its emphasis from overseeing the budgetary distributions to providing a context for people involved in campus ministry to share their work and ideas and to corporately develop diocesan programs.

The committee will sponsor a faculty, staff and campus ministry retreat at Shrine Mont on June 6-8, 1994. The retreat, entitled "The Search for Meaning and Community," will be led by Dr. Thomas Naylor, Professor of Economics at Duke University.

#### **Annual Report of the Commission on Ministry**

In conjunction with the Bishops, the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Board of Examining Chaplains, the Mid-Atlantic Parish Training Program Board, the Clergy in Training Program Director, the presenting priests and vestries of sponsoring congregations, and persons pursuing ordination, the Commission on Ministry continued to faithfully carry out its canonical charges and responsibilities related to the ministry of all baptized persons.

Since the commission report of 1992, general oversight for the ordination process has been delegated by Bishop Lee to Bishop Matthews, although Bishop Lee continues to be involved with pastoral care and policy guidance. Also, subsequent to the submission of the 1992 report, 10 persons were admitted as postulants. An additional postulant was admitted during 1993. During 1993, 18 postulants became candidates and eight candidates were ordained deacon. Six deacons were ordained to the priesthood at the Washington National Cathedral on December 15, 1993. Five persons were released from the ordination process by Bishop Lee.

Joined by participants from the other founding dioceses of the Virginia Theological Seminary, our seminarians and deacons are participating in the new Clergy in Training program, headed by the Very Rev. Stephen D. McWhorter. The goal of this Cornerstone Project pilot program is to strengthen leadership skills and enhance the participants' abilities to live the sacred story in their communities of faith. The 25-month program begins the summer after the second year of seminary and continues until ordination to the priesthood.

Members of the commission actively participated in various projects and conferences at the diocesan and national church levels. Ms. Peggy L. Hombs again served as a national level reader of the General Ordination Examinations. The Rev. Dennis J.J. Schmidt has initiated an on-going examination of admissions standards for seminary, the use of the Graduate Record Examination and the Miller Analogy Test, and remedial instruction provided seminarians. Commission members continue to explore issues of power and authority in relationships, particularly as they manifest themselves in clergy sexual misconduct. The handbook on the ordination process is being revised to include the requirement for aspirants to have the same background check required by the Church Insurance Corporation for all clergy, youth volunteers, and employees. Ms. Hombs also played a role in the writing of diocesan policy on clergy sexual misconduct, in the conduct of diocesan-wide training sessions, and as a response team member. She also attended the "Shaping Our Future" symposium in July 1993 in St. Louis, Missouri, on behalf of the commission. The commission will use A Resource on Cultural Awareness in the Ordination Process, prepared by the Council for the Development of Ministry, for a series of in-house training sessions in 1994, led by the Rev. Daniel Robayo, and Mrs. Gladys Lewis. Ms. Hombs and Mr. Schmidt attended the May 1993 meeting of the Province III Council for the Development of Ministry in Bethesda, Maryland. Speakers included the Rev. Carol Gallagher on cultural sensitivity in the ordination process; the Rev. Canon Jim Ransom on the recruitment and selection project of the Board of Theological Education; the Rev. Dr. Peyton Craighill on the Diocese of Pennsylvania process for lay and ordained gifts identification; the Very Rev. Richard Reid on the relationship between seminaries and diocesan Commissions on Ministry; Bishop Matthews on the issue of employability as a criterion for postulancy; the Rev. Dr. Jean Milliken presenting her paper Power, Authority and Spiritual Maturity: Women Clergy Serving as Rectors or Vicars in the Diocese of Virginia; the Rev. Dr. Charles Price on "per saltum" ordinations; and the Rev. Martha Horne on the Cornerstone Project.

#### **Annual Report of the Committee on Overseas Missions**

God never asked a committee to fulfill the Great Commission, but he did ask the Church to. The Committee on Overseas Missions serves the efforts of the congregations of the Diocese of Virginia in their involvement in overseas missions.

Some of this mission is in "Samaria" — cultures different but near to us, and where the church already has a presence. Some of the work is also in "the ends of the earth" where the church has not yet been established. Some of the congregations are already underway with significant and strategic efforts; others are looking for ways to be more effective in their roles.

The Overseas Missions Committee (known as OM — what else?) sees a convergence of trends which bring foreign mission into a higher profile than it has recently had in our church.

the Decade of Evangelism, for example, must include neighbors across the waters who need to hear the Gospel, as well as neighbors within our country. CNN is making the remote areas of the world much more familiar and understood.

The Episcopal Church center ("815") has had to downsize its missions office as well as its emphasis.

Many churches are increasing their direct involvement through shortterm trips and other immediate ways of involvement.

At a July retreat outside Gordonsville we reflected on this critical moment in missions, and brought fresh commitment and new ideas to the role of this committee. We hope to be a catalyst in a few selected areas for diocesan missionary involvement. We intend to:

have our first annual Missions Conference in 1995;

provide the opportunity for seminarians to take one of their summers in another country;

continue to support short-term trips;

begin to support and formally endorse long-term missionaries going out from this diocese;

assist in the training and research to keep a strategic emphasis on what is done.

Many people are finding great joy in the honor of participating in the commission God has given to the Church. The Overseas Missions Committee is encouraged and in awe of the current and rising interest in missions. We believe that these few areas of our concentration will deepen the overseas involvement by the congregations of this diocese.

#### Annual Report of the Committee on Peace

The Committee on Peace was first commissioned in 1983 by the 188th Annual Council to develop and recommend ways in which the members of our diocese might address issues of war and peace, later expanded to include the concept of justice.

In 1993, 10 years later, we find a world radically changed in terms of balances of power and discern the need to educate and inform ourselves and others about the faith and culture of Islam. The people of Islam could serve to be the focus of much fear and prejudice unless better understood and recognized. We felt that our church had a responsibility to provide opportunities for this dialogue and education to take place. Our meetings were fruitful, although we felt it would have been beneficial to have had more visitors present. The April meeting with Dr. Hameed Asghar, a local Islamic pastor, was especially informative.

Our Spring Leadership Fair program on Islam, led by the Rev. Howard Bowlin, was well attended and well received even though it was not publicized in advance. We had prepared a similar event for the fall Parish Leadership Fair to include Dr. Hameed Asghar and Dr. Richard Jones from VTS. The event was subsequently cancelled due to the low number of registrants for the Leadership Fair. We will continue to pursue this avenue of peace education.

Our fall retreat to Richmond Hill with the Rev. Ben Campbell proved to be a helpful guide and time of refreshment for all who attended.

In November an invitation to attend our monthly meeting was sent to all by way of the *Virginia Episcopalian* and the *Communique*. Mr. Joseph Montville, an international mediator and political psychologist, met with us to share some of the exciting work he is doing in the Middle East. In the midst of the discussion, he highlighted a number of appropriate ways in which we could be involved in national and international peace-making endeavors.

#### Annual Report of the Committee on Refugee and Migrant Ministries

The committee chair for the past four years, the Rev. Mark E. Waldo, Jr., left the diocese in the fall to accept a call in Pennsylvania, so we want to thank him publicly for his work and support, and to wish him well in his new ministry.

The Committee on Refugee and Migrant Ministries has been working toward a restructuring which will provide representation from each region of the Diocese. The intent is to meet quarterly as a committee, with individual members networking among the churches of their own regions to assess parishes' interest in and ability to sponsor refugees.

In addition, we are again connected with the Virginia Council of Churches' Office on Refugees, with whom we work cooperatively, and whose resources in Harrisonburg, Leesburg, Manassas and Richmond are available to help with Episcopal sponsorship.

The committee has not been involved, in recent years at least, with the needs and problems of migrant workers, despite the fact that the name of the committee would indicate that as part of its mission. Therefore, we intend to become knowledgeable and then to involve ourselves as possible and appropriate with ministry to that population within our diocese. Some of the new members of the forming committee are especially interested in that aspect of our mission, particularly in the Valley and the Northern Neck where migrants work.

Individual parishes have shown interest in refugee sponsorship, and have asked to become more "educated" about what is involved. The Diocesan Refugee Coordinator has been to a number of parishes, and is available to come to any parish or group to explain the actual commitment to take on that ministry. Committee members who have been part of several sponsorships are wonderful resources as well. (Please call on us.)

During this year two families have been settled in the diocese: one Vietnamese family of five, and a Somali woman and two grown children who have joined a daughter/sister. We hope that, with the help of our parishes, there will be more refugees in the coming year to whom we can stretch our helping hands in Christian love.

These include the Madison County Emergency Services Association (MESA), the Diocese of Honduras, and the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. We feel this outreach is an important part of our work as a region, and can cover important areas of mission and ministry.

### Annual Report of Region II—Lower Rappahannock

Region II conducted meetings of our Council in January (at the Diocesan Council meeting in Fredericksburg), March, May, September, and November. Business for 1993 actually began in November 1992, when Region Council made a significant increase in the budget. Added items were \$1,200 in support for the congregation at Grace Church, Miller's Tavern, and the addition of \$4,000 as quarter-time salary for a Region Youth coordinator. Region budgets are specified in full elsewhere. In the face of belt-tightening times, this move represented a challenge which the parishes of Region II accepted thoughtfully and positively. Our parishes have followed through

generously during the course of the year. Under the care of Treasurer Patty Rosenberg, we have held the same budget line for 1994, to fully adapt to these enhancements of our giving.

After the well-attended January meeting in Fredericksburg, the March snows caused delay and revision of the second 1993 meeting. Workshops were cancelled as the meeting came a week late, but a revised program served to inform the region about Habitat for Humanity (in preparation for a summer youth activity that was to follow). May 21st found the Bishops Lee and wives (our own bishop accompanying the Diocesan from Christ the King Diocese in South Africa) as guests at the annual Region II dinner. The delegates, vestries, and spouses were enlightened about the sort of challenges with which Peter John Lee is faced in his work in South Africa.

The long summer break ended on September 19th, as newly consecrated Bishop Matthews provided insights about how the episcopate would function, particularly this fall and winter. November 14th saw the final meeting of the region council for 1993, as we adopted our 1994 budget, reported out the fall vestry visits, heard from Region II members serving the diocese: The Rev. Scott Dillard for the Committee on Christian Education, Mrs. Flora Dalton regarding the Virginia Diocesan Homes, Inc., and The Rev. Debbie Rutter for the Committee on Peace. For our featured program in November, the Rev. Charlene Alling and the Rev. Peter Worthington (Region II attendees) generously provided insights that brought "home" some of the controversial points from the St. Louis symposium on church structure.

Notice of each of our meetings and news pertinent to the parishes appeared prior to each Region Council as the Dovecall newsletter, thanks to the diligence of Secretary Elizabeth Schlenk.

Two major 1993 thrusts for the region activities (apart from what our individual parishes do in their own locales) were the Youth Coordinator's work and a Region Task Group for Evangelism. To briefly sketch these, our Youth Coordinator, Carol Burke, initiated substantial programs for the high school and junior high school young folks. Through spring and fall planning meetings, and by asking each parish to have a point of contact, Carol sought active participation in all phases of the programming. A Lock-In at the Gloucester Wellness Center in February led off. The highlight of 1993 action was a one-week excursion to the Eastern Shore to work on two Habitat for Humanity homes that were in progress. Twenty-four youth members and adults participated in this (hoped to be first of its kind) event. Groups of young folks from the region attended the fall rallies and get-togethers at Roslyn and Shrine Mont. An October dinner meeting set plans for the first half of 1994.

Evangelism in the region has the support of a small but persistent group, formed nearly a year ago. Throughout 1993, Tawny Barnard (Abingdon), Bob Shriver (Ware), Guinevere White (St. Stephen's), and David Cooke (St. James) have met on three occasions to form the group and to develop ideas for activities. In July, the meeting included Liz Ebel from the diocesan Evangelism Committee, who, as our guest leader, provided a terrific inspiration for actions. The Task Group hosted an afternoon of **Prayer and Praise** at Grace Church, Kilmarnock, on January 16, 1994. The opening of each region meeting will include the Prayer for the Decade of Evangelism and the group has asked each parish in the region to include this prayer as part of their regular worship.

#### Annual Report of Region III-Arlington

Region III of the Diocese of Virginia continues an active ministry of outreach within the region, the Diocese, and the larger Christian community.

- 1. The Arlington County Fair: For the second year, the region successfully exhibited at the Arlington County Fair. Since the region is entirely within Arlington County, it is an appropriate outreach opportunity for all nine congregations at our seven churches to witness to our presence in Arlington. This year the booth was enhanced by the addition of a backdrop with beautiful full-color photographs of each church, and the distribution of 300 ballpoint pens which said "The Episcopal Churches in Arlington Welcome You." Literature from the Diocese and from all of the parishes was available and the booth was staffed at all times by volunteers from the different churches. It was an opportunity to come together as a region while at the same time celebrate our diversity. A brochure describing the churches was also updated and made available at the exhibit.
- 2. The Appalachian Craft Fair: Each year in April, the region sponsors the Appalachian Craft Fair, the 1993 Fair being the 19th consecutive fair. Proceeds from ticket sales benefit local charities, such as the Northern Virginia AIDS Ministry, the Hospice of Northern Virginia, AMEN (Arlingtonians Ministering to Emergency Needs) and the Arlington Food Assistance Committee. The fair also benefits the crafters who exhibit and sell at the fair, all of whom come from a regionally depressed area and are housed and fed by volunteers from the Episcopal churches in the region.
- 3. **Uganda Book Program**: This is the continuation of a project started several years ago wherein the region funded the packaging and shipping of 2,000 pounds of donated books which were sent to the Bishop Usher Wilson Theological College in Mbale, Uganda. A continuing relationship with the seminary has encouraged us to actively solicit the donation of additional books and supplies, and to apply for a grant from the Diocesan Fund for Human Need.
- 4. Youth Program: During 1993, the region sponsored a regional youth program led by a regional youth coordinator, the Rev. Kathy Jordan. In September 1992, Region III Council voted to encourage the region's vestries to contribute funds for this program for the academic year 1992-93, and succeeded in budgeting for a regional youth coordinator. Ms. Jordan reported on the program in June, and while the program was generally successful, she was not available to continue the program since she had relocated outside the region. Without staff to continue and lacking the full support of all the churches in the region, the regional council decided to defer continuation of the program during 1993-94.
- 5. Corporate Worship Services: The region also encourages inward spiritual support through two scheduled corporate worship services each year. On St. Luke's Day in October, the region conducts a service of healing, and each year the combined choirs of the region participate in a choral evensong. Funds collected through open offerings at these services are contributed to local outreach programs.

6. **Regional Events**: In the spring each year, the region invites clergy, delegates, alternates, vestry members, and spouses to a Region Dinner. In May 1992, the Region Dinner featured John and Jocelyn Rohde. John is Executive Director of El Hogar de Amor y Esperanza and Instituto Ecnico Santa Maria in Honduras. The Rohdes gave a presentation on their ministry with abandoned boys in Central America. The region also sponsored two workshops focusing on the Shaping Our Future conference in St. Louis in August. The first workshop, held on August 11, gave all interested parishioners in the region an opportunity to discuss the program before those who were attending left for the conference, and the second workshop, held on October 30, featured an open-ended discussion about the issues raised at the conference.

#### Annual Report of Region IV—Alexandria

The Council of Region IV continues to focus its efforts toward ministry in service to the community in the city of Alexandria.

The council, and its member churches, continued its support of and involvement in:

- Carpenter's Shelter;
- Carpenter's Lodgings, Inc. (CLI), a non-profit housing agency which endeavors to preserve low- and moderate-priced housing, offer transitional housing programs, and encourage advocacy for affordable housing policies;
- NOVAM, Northern Virginia Aids Ministry, which received a grant from the United Thank Offering for its housing program;
- Network Preschool, a preschool program for at-risk children in Alexandria.

In addition, the council has extended financial support to Camp Joy, a city camp for at-risk children, the Chaplain's Office at Alexandria Hospital, the building program of Meade Memorial Church, Alexandria, and La Iglesia de Cristo Rey, for its senior citizens' program, *Abuelo Felices*.

On December 5, the Region gathered at the Seminary Chapel in Alexandria for a service of Advent Lessons and Carols, with massed choirs from the churches of Region IV, under the direction of Mark Whitmire of Immanuel-on-the-Hill. The evening was a beautiful gathering for worship and song, at which the Rev. James Green of Church of the Resurrection was honored in anticipation of his retirement. The offering from the evening was given to Carpenter's Lodgings, in thanksgiving for the ministry of Mr. Green in Region IV.

The members of the Council of Region IV note with appreciation increased collegiality and mutual support among themselves, and among the member congregations for each other's concerns and ministries. We look forward to 1994 with plans for additional collaborative projects.

#### Annual Report of Region V—North Fairfax

Region V is comprised of eight congregations in North Fairfax County. In 1993 we vigorously pursued our Program Plan Mission "to link parishes into a cohesive community in which members offer support and strength to one another, thus enhancing our combined capability to make Christ known throughout Region V." We are an active region in outreach opportunities within and outside the larger Christian community as evidenced by our 1993 Regional Budget of \$15,850. Our budget supports church growth in Northern Virginia and the Diocese, college and youth ministries, community outreach programs and shared ministry. Approximately 90 percent of our budget was expanded for these projects: 19 percent supported church growth, 24 percent to youth and college ministries, and 46 percent was provided to a variety of diocesan and regional mission opportunities (handicapped, homeless, terminally ill, AIDS patients, human needs and day care centers).

A major emphasis this year was in youth fellowship and outreach opportunities. Two work projects were sponsored—one to the Dakota Indians and the other in Appalachia, Virginia. Both youth groups enjoyed the fellowship and the opportunity to help those in need.

Our annual June picnic was held at Holy Comforter, Vienna, and it was enjoyed by our vestries, clergy and lay delegates as an opportunity to know each other better.

All our delegates participated in the election of two Suffragan Bishops, and the consecration of Bishop Matthews was a joyous celebration for us all. We were saddened by the events leading to the withdrawal of Canon Campbell from the election process, but support the Standing Committee's actions and look forward to participating in the election of a third bishop in the future.

At our December meeting we approved the recommendations of a select committee to revise our Region V By-Laws and Program Plan. Our six meetings will be devoted to implementing our outreach programs with special emphasis on youth ministry as recommended by our recently activated Youth Council. Also at the December meeting, our officers for 1994 were elected to take office after January Council.

#### Annual Report of Region VII—West Fairfax

In 1993, Region VII was involved in supporting several activities, both within the region and internationally.

Within Region VII we provided assistance to the FACETS program. This program gives aid in the form of food and other assistance to people who lack permanent housing in parts of Fairfax County. We also gave financial support to the ministry at George Mason University, a program now under supervision of Truro Church. This ministry makes available to students at GMU the message of Christ and offers them the opportunity to take leadership in presenting Christ to other students and faculty. Finally, in October we sponsored an Evangelism Conference led by the Rev. Bill Atwood from Corsicana, Texas.

Internationally, we continued our relationship with Bishop Gerard Mpango and the Diocese of Western Tanganyika. Funds were given to that diocese to fund two new churches and fund the air travel of Bishop Mpango within his diocese. Given the primitive road system in Tanzania, air travel is the only effective way for him to cover the distances required. Mission Aviation Fellowship provides the air transport.

Finally, we added funds to the Region VII Mission Development Fund. This fund assists churches within the region which are involved in building programs. There will be substantial demands on this fund in the future because of growth within the region.

## Annual Report of Region XII—West Richmond

Christ Church meets at Gayton Elementary School in western Henrico County, but the members are eagerly looking forward to the day that a permanent facility is built for this ninth congregation in Region XII.

Region XII also saw the completion of a two-year project to produce a regional brochure. This attractive brochure contains detailed information about each parish in the region, including a locator map for the convenience of those seeking a parish in the Region XII area.

During the year, Region XII saw the resignation or retirement of three rectors. The Rev. Raby Edwards retired from St. Stephen's Church, and The Rev. Tad DeBordenave resigned as rector of St. Matthew's Church to become the founding director of Anglican Frontier Missions. The Rev. Judy Burgess resigned from Grace Church, Goochland to return to her native Texas.

Finally, Region XII heard with sadness that Betsy Walker had to resign as president of the region due to illness. Betsy has been a vital part of our regional council, and an important figure in the Diocese.

Region XII begins 1994 with optimistic support of our new mission, and hope that we can begin to look at congregational development for the other congregations in the

#### **Annual Report of Saint Paul's College**

Saint Paul's College (SPC) moved into 1993 with its primary focus on Phase I of the \$7.5 million Capital Development Program that was launched in August of 1992. This program has had a positive affect on the College's overall fundraising activities and led us in the challenge with following notable highlights:

- Freshmen enrollment increased and overall enrollment remains steady. Enrollment in the Organizational Management degree program increased by 51 percent;
- SPC has placed a minor in Religious and Philosophical Studies in its curriculum;
- SPC initiated a new aquaculture program in 1993 that will be one of the few in the nation;
- Phase I renovation of the historic Chicago Building, a performing arts center on campus, is complete;
- For the fifth consecutive year, SPC has maintained a balanced budget;
- In addition to its Child Development Center (1992), SPC was funded as a site for a Head Start program;
- SPC was chosen as one of the sites for the first Southside Virginia Regional Governor's School for Global Economics and Technology;
- SPC continues to provide a stateside home for Cuttington College, a sister Episcopal-related college in Liberia;
- Annual giving of alumni increased by 25% over the previous two years with a notable increase in planned giving;
- The Capital Development program has generated increased activity among corporations and foundations;
- SPC completed and received approval on its Follow-up Report to the Committee on Criteria and Reports of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the accreditation approval agency.

Saint Paul's College welcomes and supports the significant and increasing support that has been provided by the Diocese of Virginia and its parishes. Based on its more than a century of excellent service and today's strong academic and fiscal management, investments in Saint Paul's College today will return significant benefits tomorrow.

I want to thank the other 11 members of the committee who have given of themselves tirelessly. Their devotion to our Lord's ministry and the well being of the whole Church is a sterling example of what it means to be the body of Christ. We each thank you for the privilege to serve this diocese.

## Annual Report of the Commission on the Stewardship of Creation

The Commission on the Stewardship of Creation has now been in existence for 18 months. Our primary objective remains to increase an understanding throughout the Diocese of environmental issues, remedial actions required, and the theological and ethical basis for our obligation as Christians to undertake or support those actions. We continue to see the commission as the heart of a diocesan network for the flow of information out to and back from the parishes, for it is within the parishes that the greater part of the education process will take place.

We remain convinced that the degradation of the environment is (a) a central theological question of our time concerning our love of neighbor and God's Creation and (b) a very serious problem of increasing magnitude that exacerbates all of the social problems facing the Church both at home and abroad. Most of the causes of human misery can be traced in part, directly or indirectly, to environmental degradation, brought on by our consumption of the world's resources faster than they can be regenerated, and pollution of the planet by the products of that consumption, all made worse by the runaway growth in the world's population. We believe that these problems may easily become the most serious challenge to the human race in the next century, and perhaps the greatest challenge in history.

It would be foolish to think that we can find simple solutions to these overwhelming and complex problems. Rather, we hope to be able to provide as accurate and complete information as possible on both sides of the issues, with the object of initiating substantive and open dialogue between people with opposing views. We believe that such a dialogue will lead people to discover appropriate responses to the problems, and motivate them to act accordingly.

To that end, we have thus far identified approximately 60 points of contact in as many parishes who: act as recipients for teaching materials that we are developing; ensure that those materials reach the appropriate persons in their parishes; and channel comments and requests from their parishes back to us for further action. Until recently that material was limited to a bi-monthly newsletter, but as we gain a better understanding of the needs of parishioners, we have prepared or are preparing more substantive educational materials, including background papers, lists of suggested readings, videotapes and a list of speakers who are available to address parishes in their vicinity. In addition, we are planning a diocesan-wide conference to be held at Virginia Theological Seminary on March 19, 1994, and have submitted a resolution for your consideration calling on all churches to reduce environmental hazards on church properties and in local schools, with support for that effort to be provided by the commission.

During 1993, the commission has held eight meetings at as many member churches, to which all interested persons are always welcome. We participate in the spring Parish Leadership Fair, and had prepared to participate in and conduct the service at the Fall Parish Leadership Fair that was, unfortunately, cancelled. On six occasions we have provided speakers for parish adult education classes outside of the speakers' own parishes. Finally, we set up and manned exhibits at the 198th Diocesan Council, as well as the 199th Council.

Although we have managed to reach one-third of the parishes in the Diocese, our objective remains to reach all of them, and our efforts over the next year will be directed to that goal, as well as increasing the quality of the resources that we can provide to the parishes.

#### **Annual Report of Virginia Council of Churches**

The apostle Paul, in one of his ringing calls to early Christians to renounce their quarrelsome ways, questions them pointedly: "Has Christ been divided?" Since Paul's day the Church has struggled with what it means to be part of the one Body of Christ, sometimes achieving brilliant insights, sometimes failing miserably. The quest for Christian unity continues to challenge us in our time and place; it is what our Council of Churches is about—our guiding vision, our nuts-and-bolts task, our sole reason for being.

Matters of **Faith and Order** have been priorities as our four-year study and discussion of <u>Baptism</u>, <u>Eucharist and Ministry</u> has resulted in the Roslyn Call for Christian Unity. Discussion continues concerning joint celebrations of baptism. Council statements, with a concern for fidelity to our common biblical tradition, have been prepared regarding the **Death Penalty** in Virginia and public policy affecting children and families.

As member judicatories struggle with new fiscal realities, our own funding has held steady; the cost of maintaining what we do, however, continues to rise. Accordingly, our **Development Committee**, with the leadership of Bishop Robert P. Atkinson, moved into its second year of work on behalf of ensuring our financial viability. Our 1993 development campaign has resulted in some \$12,500 toward our core budget.

The 1993 Faith In Action Award was presented to Bishop Walter F. Sullivan, in recognition of his contributions to ecumenical and interfaith life in Virginia.

We continue to serve children, youth and families in ways both direct and indirect. Our Migrant Head Start Program served close to 450 children of agricultural workers during the 1993 growing season. We have seen a shift in recent years requiring more Spanish-speaking personnel and programs through our Migrant Ministry Program. Ministry to and with students and faculty through Campus Ministry Forum continued, as did Weekday Religious Education and work with pregnant teens through our Interfaith Infant Mortality Prevention Project. A process of drawing congregations into ecumenical advocacy efforts on behalf of children and families was launched through the Bread and Stones Project. Legislative Advocacy continued in cooperation with the Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy, addressing issues coming from both the Concern Area on Church and Society and the Concern Area on Rural Virginia. During the year our Refugee Resettlement Program has brought 157 refugees to Virginia, including our first Bosnian families.

While the Virginia Council of Churches clearly does not represent all of the Body of Christ in Virginia, we do represent a significant portion. As together we worship, study and serve God's people, we are tempted to answer Paul's question with a resounding, "No! Christ is not divided." Honesty, however, demands the admission that unity eludes the Church much too often. This council is committed to the continuing pursuit of Christian unity and we rejoice in the commitment of our member judicatories to that vision.

## Annual Report of the Virginia Episcopal Clergy Association

Encouraging collegiality, enhancing clergy skills and awareness, and providing an appropriate forum for the expression of professional concerns have been the three major objectives of the Virginia Episcopal Clergy Association, or VECA. By sponsoring the Diocesan Clergy Pictorial Directory, programs with noted speakers, and gatherings for the exchange of ideas and information, members of VECA serve as a model of open communication and caring for self, others and the Church.

Spearheaded by the Rev. Tom Holliday with the assistance of Sarah Bartenstein, the clergy of the Diocese were invited to have their pictures taken at the 198th Annual Council. A copy of the Diocesan Clergy Pictorial Directory was made available to each clergyperson at this year's Council. For clergy new to the diocese or unable to have their pictures taken last year, update photos were taken at this year's Council and an update page will be mailed by VECA to all clergy.

This year's series of speakers, coordinated by the Rev. Anne Manson, opened with the Rt. Rev. Jane Dixon, Suffragan Bishop of Washington, who shared her perspective as bishop and a woman in the church. The Rev. Michael Williams from the Office of Preaching in the United Methodist Church offered a workshop on the art of storytelling in sermons. The Rev. Canon Joel Gibson of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York, presented a behind-the-scenes view on issues ranging from church deployment policy, to initiatives for pastoral care of clergy and their families, to proposed plans of the Church Pension Fund.

The Rt. Rev. Clay Matthews, then bishop-elect, first broke the news at a VECA

meeting of the misconduct allegations against Tony Campbell. With the help of the Rev. Karen Evans, the same debriefing model used with congregations was employed with the clergy. The facts and chronology were made known. The expression of feelings was invited in whole and small groups. The discussion concluded with future actions and direction of the Diocese.

At "network" meetings throughout the year, this issue and others of professional concern have continued to be discussed. Amid the steadfast support for the efforts of Bishop Lee in the face of complex challenges, VECA shares the desire for clergy health insurance based on the principle of mutual care, the hope for fair and equitable compensation for all clergy and lay employees, the promise for healing in instances of involuntary clergy terminations, and the commitment to standards which uphold healthy clergy and congregations.

In this mission VECA is supported by the more than 40 other diocesan associations which compose the National Network of Episcopal Clergy Associations (NNECA). More than representing all clergy, NNECA seeks to represent the best in every clergyperson in every aspect of ministry.

#### Annual Report of Shenandoah Valley Westminister-Canterbury

On October 15, 1993, occupancy in our Independent Living Units reached 100 percent. Since that time we have had some apartment vacancies. However, each of these vacancies has been filled by reservation-holders from our Ready List. We currently have 165 people in our Future Priority List, representing an interest in 105 apartments or cottages. As these people come to the top of our Future List, they go through a pre-admission procedure and are placed on our Ready List for the next available apartment or cottage in order to minimize the vacancy time of these units.

Construction of Phase 1 of our Dining Services expansion project should be complete by January 15, 1994. This will provide a new "finishing" kitchen for our Health Center, allowing us to provide even higher quality food service to Health Center residents.

The next phase of our expansion project is expected to include additions to our Cafe and Main Dining Room and improvements to our main kitchen. The addition of six cottage units is also likely in this next phase.

A revised Mission Statement has been adopted by the Board of Trustees which pledges our community to remain a relatively small, family-type, Continuing Care Retirement Community. That revised Mission Statement is as follows:

The mission of Shenandoah Valley Westminister-Canterbury is to operate a church-related continuing care retirement community, embracing all faiths, which provides the utmost quality of life with the assurances of lifetime care for each resident. The goal of Shenandoah Valley Westminister-Canterbury shall be to remain a small retirement community with a caring family atmosphere which, at all times, is respectful of residents' privacy and dignity. Through responsible management and fiscal integrity, Shenandoah Valley Westminister-Canterbury will provide a not-for-profit community "...whose

purpose is to enable the residents to use their gifts fully, live their lives richly, and to make the best of the years that God has given them."²

As always, we are grateful for the ongoing support of the Diocese of Virginia.

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### Note 1. Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting entity and related organizations:

These statements present financial position, results of operations and cash flows for funds under control of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia. The statements do not present such information on individual church, parish, or regional organizations or separately organized and controlled entities in the Diocese such as Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in The Diocese of Virginia, Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, Church Schools of The Diocese of Virginia, The Episcopal Book Store, The Episcopal Churchwomen, Virginia Diocesan Homes, the Roslyn Conference Center, the Shrine Mont Corporation and Glebe Properties, Incorporated.

### Accounting method:

The financial statements of the Diocese of Virginia have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Diocese, the accounts of the Diocese are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting, whereby separate accounts are maintained for each specific fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Diocese are reported in four self-balancing fund groups as follows:

- Operating funds which include the unrestricted funds available for operations as controlled by the annual Diocesan budget.
- (2) Designated funds which include those unrestricted funds which have been designated by the Executive Board for specific purposes.
- (3) Restricted funds which include funds whose use has been restricted to a specific purpose as designated by the donor.
- (4) Endowment funds which represent funds that are subject to restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and the income only be used.

### Cash and cash equivalents:

For purposes of reporting cash flows, the Diocese considers demand deposits and investments with a maturity of less than three months used as part of a cash management program to be cash and cash equivalents.

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### Income tax status:

The Diocese is exempt from income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3).

### New accounting standards:

The Financial Accounting Standards Board has issued two new pronouncements during 1993 which will affect the Diocese's financial reporting. The statements will be required to be adopted no later than December 31, 1995.

Statement No. 116, entitled <u>Accounting for Contributions</u>
<u>Received and Made</u>, applies to all entities that receive or make contributions. Generally, contributions received, which include unconditional promises to give such as pledges, will be recognized as revenues in the period received at their fair values. Management does not believe adopting the standard will have a material effect on its financial position.

Statement No. 117, entitled <u>Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations</u>, establishes standards for general purpose external financial statements provided by all not-for-profit organizations. It will require that the financial statements of the Diocese provide certain basic information that focuses on the entity as a whole, including presenting a statement of financial position, a statement of activities and a statement of cash flows. Management does not believe adopting the standard will have a material effect on its financial statement presentation.

### Note 2. Contingencies

On January 19, 1979, as authorized by the Executive Board of the Council of the Diocese, the Bishop of the Diocese entered into an agreement to purchase all the outstanding capital stock of Orkney Springs Hotels, Inc. on behalf of Shrine Mont, the camp and conference center of the Diocese. The total purchase price for the stock was \$1,200,000 with an initial down payment of \$100,000 which was paid from Shrine Mont funds, with the remainder to be paid over twenty years in equal annual installments without interest. As of December 31, 1993, the balance owed on these notes was \$275,000. It is believed that annual payments will continue to be made with funds generated from operations of the hotel and special gifts to Shrine Mont Corporation. Since these financial statements do not include any reporting on the operations of Shrine Mont, the investment in capital stock of the corporation and the notes payable are not shown on the balance sheet of the Diocese of Virginia.

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

In addition, as of December 31, 1993, the Diocese was contingently liable as guarantor on a note payable of St. Andrews Episcopal Church for \$125,000.

### Note 3. Lease Commitments

The Diocese has leased two automobiles under noncancelable agreements which expire between October 1995 and November 1998. The leases also require the payment of registration and personal property taxes. There is also a provision for an excess mileage charge.

### Note 4. Pension Plan

The Diocese has a defined contribution pension plan for all full-time lay employees. Contributions to the plan amounted to \$50,022 in 1993 (\$51,085 in 1992). In addition, clergy employees of the Diocese participate in the National Church Pension Program which is also a defined contribution plan. Pension plan contributions on behalf of clergy employees of the Diocese was \$45,783 in 1993 (\$44,742 in 1992).

### Note 5. Comparative Amounts

The amounts shown for 1992 in the accompanying financial statements are included to provide a basis for comparison with 1993 and are not intended to present all information necessary for a fair presentation in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

We have audited the accompanying statement of assets and liabilities of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia as of December 31, 1993, and the related statements of operations and changes in net assets for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Trustees of the Funds' management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As more fully described in Note 4 to the financial statements, the Trustees of the Funds do not recognize depreciation on buildings. In our opinion, generally accepted accounting principles require the recognition of depreciation.

In our opinion, except for the effects of not recognizing depreciation, as described in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia at December 31, 1993 and the results of its operations and changes in its net assets in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of business:

The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia acts as an investment agency for parishes in the Diocese and for Diocesan funds. In addition, the Organization accounts for the carrying value of the Mayo House.

A summary of the Organization's significant accounting policies follows:

Basis of presentation:

Operations for investment activities are conducted in a manner similar to common trust funds. The operations of each fund are accounted for separately. The funds presented in the financial statements are described below.

Parish Funds account for investment funds managed for churches and church related organizations located within the Diocese.

Diocesan Funds account for investment funds controlled by Trustees of the Funds or the Bishop.

The Sally Walke Chipley Fund is a separately invested Diocesan fund. At the request of the Fund's beneficiary, Grace Church, Cismont, the Sally Walke Chipley Fund was separated from the Diocesan group of funds in 1978. Income, net of expenses, is distributed quarterly to the designated beneficiary.

The General Operating Fund accounts for the Organization's general and administrative expenses and allocates a portion of such expenses to the common trust funds. Any fund deficiency at year-end will be replenished in future allocations.

The Mayo Memorial Fund accounts for the cost of the Mayo House, the general offices of the Diocese.

Investments valuation:

Investments traded on a national securities exchange are stated at fair value based on closing prices reported on the last business day of the year; investments traded in the over-the-counter market are stated at fair value based on the last reported bid price of the year.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Investment units:

The equity of each fund in the pooled net assets is represented by investment units. New money entering the pool is accepted at the unit value of the appropriate Parish or Diocesan net assets as of the last day of the calendar quarter in which the deposit is made. The number of new units bought is determined by dividing the new money by the unit value. Withdrawals from the pool are based on similar unit values.

#### Income recognition:

Income on investments is recognized when earned.

#### Income distributions:

The income allotted to each fund is computed quarterly based on the number of units owned during the quarter. Distributions are made annually based on levels set by the Trustees for Diocesan type funds. All income is distributable to Parish funds.

#### Income taxes:

The Organization is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

#### New accounting standard:

The Financial Accounting Standards Board has issued a new pronouncement during 1993 which will affect the Trustees' financial reporting. The statement will be required to be adopted no later than December 31, 1995.

Statement No. 117, entitled <u>Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations</u>, establishes standards for general purpose external financial statements provided by all not-for-profit organizations. It will require that the financial statements of the Trustees provide certain basic information that focuses on the entity as a whole, including presenting a statement of financial position, a statement of activities and a statement of cash flows. Management does not believe adopting the standard will have a material effect on its financial statement presentation.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of business:

The mission of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia (DMS) is to assist in missionary work in the Diocese of Virginia. This is accomplished by seeking gifts, loans and property in order to make low interest loans available for the extension of the mission of the Church. DMS also owns property used by others assisting missionary work of the Church.

Significant accounting policies:

#### Fund accounting:

The accounts of DMS are in a common pooled fund. Individual fund balances are maintained to preserve the integrity of the funds as requested by the donor. These fund balances are grouped as designated by the Governing Board into the Revolving Loan Funds, the First Deed of Trust Funds, Capital Debt Repayment Fund, and the Real Estate Funds. The titles of the fund groups are indicative of limitations on the use of these funds in making loans to new or expanding churches in the Diocese of Virginia. Certain funds are endowment type funds for which earned income is designated. The income, net of any expenses, is allocated to the individual funds pro rata based upon each fund balance as compared to the total fund balances (not including real estate funds). Such allocated income is, by choice of donors, either distributed to designated beneficiaries or added to the principal of the Revolving Loan Funds to be used to make new or additional loans to churches.

In 1974, the Trustees established the Capital Debt Repayment Fund to provide sufficient cash to meet payments due on outstanding loans each year. The Trustees agreed that the amount set aside for repayment, if any, would be funded from income received and that such amount would be determined by the Trustees annually. At December 31, 1993 and 1992, the repayment fund balance was \$100,000, with no amounts set aside in either year.

#### Real estate:

The value at which the real estate is carried on the books represents acquisition cost or fair value as assigned at date of acquisition by DMS. Depreciation is computed by the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

#### New accounting standards:

The Financial Accounting Standards Board has issued two new pronouncements during 1993 which will affect DMS's financial reporting. Both statements will be required to be adopted no later than December 31, 1995.

Statement No. 116, entitled <u>Accounting for Contributions Received and Made</u>, applies to all entities that receive or make contributions. Generally, contributions received, which include unconditional promises to give such as pledges, will be recognized as revenues in the period received at their fair values. This differs from the current method of recording contribution revenues, which occurs when the cash or other assets have been received. Management does not believe adopting the standard will have a material effect on its financial position.

Statement No. 117, entitled <u>Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations</u>, establishes standards for general purpose external financial statements provided by all not-for-profit organizations. It will require that the financial statements of DMS provide certain basic information that focuses on the entity as a whole, including presenting a statement of financial position, a statement of activities, and a statement of cash flows. Management does not believe adopting the standard will have a material effect on its financial position.

#### Note 2. Real Estate

DMS has title to real estate which is used only by certain churches within the Diocese of Virginia. Real estate consists of the following classes of property at December 31, 1993 and 1992:

#### Note 3. Notes Payable

The notes payable to churches consist of unsecured loans from churches to DMS, for lending to other churches to help finance additional construction. The loans from the churches to DMS are evidenced by 15-year negotiable promissory notes which bear interest at the rate of 5-1/2% annually for issuances before 1981 and at 6-1/2% for 1981 or later

issuances. Generally, interest on all notes is payable each June 30th and December 31st, with principal generally due  15  years from the date of issue.

Aggregate principal maturities of the notes payable under scheduled maturities are presented below; however, notes have traditionally been renegotiated for an additional 15-year period.

To the Memorial Trustees of Virginia Diocesan Center Richmond, Virginia

We have audited the accompanying statements of assets, liabilities and fund balances - modified cash basis of the Memorial Trustees of Virginia Diocesan Center as of December 31, 1993 and 1992, and the related statements of revenues collected, expenses and changes in fund balances - modified cash basis for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Trustees. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, these financial statements are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

As also described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the Memorial Trustees of the Virginia Diocesan Center does not recognize depreciation of real estate. In our opinion, the modified cash basis of accounting requires that such depreciation be included in the financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the effect of not recognizing depreciation of real estate, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Memorial Trustees of Virginia Diocesan Center as of December 31, 1993 and 1992, and the revenues collected, expenses and changes in fund balances for the years then ended on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

#### Note 1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

#### Nature of Business:

The Memorial Trustees of Virginia Diocesan Center was established by the last will and testament of Annie Rose Walker to establish, develop, and maintain a Diocesan Center for the Diocese of Virginia of the Protestant Episcopal Church. Under the trust, specified real property and personal property (known as "Roslyn") is held for, and proceeds and income thereof is used for, religious and charitable purposes.

A summary of the Organization's significant accounting policies follows:

#### Accounting method:

Except as described in the following paragraph, the Memorial Trustees' accounts are maintained, and these statements are presented, on a modified cash basis method of accounting under which only income collected, costs and expenses paid, assets and liabilities resulting from cash transactions or from the acquisition of long-lived assets and a provision for depreciation of personal property are recognized. Therefore, accrued income and expenses, payables and deferred expenses, which would be recognized under generally accepted accounting principles, and which may be material in amount, are not recognized in the accompanying financial statements.

The exception to the modified cash basis method of accounting is that the Memorial Trustees' accounts do not recognize depreciation of depreciable real estate. The effect on the financial statements of this variance with generally accepted modified cash basis method of accounting is not reasonably determinable.

#### Investments:

Investments in stocks and bonds are carried at the lower of cost or market. Temporary investments are carried at cost which approximates market.

#### Real and personal property:

Property is stated at cost. Major additions to real estate are capitalized. Repairs and renewals are expensed. No depreciation is recorded on real estate as described above. Additions to personal property are also capitalized, and depreciation is computed thereon using the straight-line method over useful lives from 5 to 12.5 years.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Trust/fund accounting:

The Memorial Trustees maintains its records to account for the assets, liabilities and operations of a Trust in accordance with restrictions as set forth in the will of Annie Rose Walker whose gift of real property and securities founded the Trust in 1934. The corpus of the Trust includes the tangible property of the Virginia Diocesan Center (Roslyn) and marketable securities. As required by law, the Trustees make an annual detail accounting to the Circuit Court of the City of Richmond of the assets and operations of the Trust.

The Trust accounts for the investment earnings, general and administrative expenses of the Trustees, and certain costs associated with maintaining Roslyn as explained below in Note 3. In accordance with the will, the original corpus is to be kept intact for the duration of the Trust. However, while it is the intent of the Trustees to use only income in support of Roslyn, the Trustees have received permission from the Court to consider "total return" in distributing income. Therefore, certain realized gains, generated from the sale of securities included in the corpus, can be used from time to time to accomplish its purposes.

Certain amounts have been designated by the Trustees for specific purposes, namely:

Future contingencies:

The Future Contingencies Fund was established by the Trustees from existing cash reserves, and a majority vote of the Trustees is required before expenditures can be made from this account.

Managers Corporation: These funds are specifically designated for the support of Roslyn and account for personal property transferred and fund surpluses of Roslyn Managers Corporation.

Discretionary repairs to Bishop's residence:

This fund provides the Bishop with the resources to make discretionary repairs to the residence located at Roslyn.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Tax exempt status:

The Trustees are exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

#### New accounting standard:

The Financial Accounting Standards Board has issued a new pronouncement during 1993 which will affect the Organization's financial reporting. The statement will be required to be adopted no later than December 31, 1995.

Statement No. 117, entitled <u>Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations</u>, establishes standards for general purpose external financial statements provided by all not-for-profit organizations. It will require that the financial statements of the Organization provide certain basic information that focuses on the entity as a whole, including presenting a statement of financial position, a statement of activities and a statement of cash flows. Management does not believe adopting the standard will have a material effect on its financial position.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of business:

Roslyn Managers Corporation, a not-for-profit, nonstock corporation, was formed by and exists at the will of the Memorial Trustees of Virginia Diocesan Center (Memorial Trustees). The Corporation's purpose and function is to direct the day to day operations of the Center known as "Roslyn", which primarily serves the Virginia Diocesan Churches and Church organizations of the (Episcopal) Diocese of Virginia.

A summary of the Corporation's significant accounting policies follows:

Real and personal property:

The real and personal property at "Roslyn" are carried on the financial records of Memorial Trustees. The costs of repairs and minor renewals are paid and expensed by The Corporation. The costs of additions and major replacements are transferred to the Memorial Trustees.

Income tax status:

The Corporation is exempt from income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3).

The Financial Accounting Standards Board issued a new pronouncement during 1993 which will affect the Corporation's financial reporting. The statement will be required to be adopted no later than December 31, 1996.

Statement No. 117, entitled <u>Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations</u>, establishes standards for general purpose external financial statements provided by all not-for-profit organizations. It will require that the financial statements of the Corporation provide certain basic information that focuses on the entity as a whole, including presenting a statement of financial position, statement of activities, and a statement of cash flows. Management does not believe adopting the standard will have a material effect on its financial position.

Note 2. Support From Memorial Trustees

The support from Memorial Trustees represents monies remitted to the Corporation during the year to manage and operate the Virginia Diocesan Center at "Roslyn".

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Note 3. Pension Expense

The Corporation has a defined contribution pension plan covering the Executive Director and all other personnel having at least two years of service and working at least 1,000 hours per year. Payments are made to the Episcopal Church Pension Fund and Church Life Insurance Company. Pension expense (included in general and administrative expenditures) was \$14,996 and \$23,786 for the years ended December 31, 1993 and 1992, respectively.

#### Note 4. Designated Funds

The Board of Directors designated \$10,000 in 1993 for programs to be held in 1994.
