Legal Titles for Making Bequests

Legal Titles for Making Bequests

The legal title of the corporation, duly chartered by the Legislature of Virginia, "with power to take by gift, devise or bequest, property of every description, real, personal or mixed, and to hold the same to themselves and their successors, for the purpose of providing for the disabled clergy, the widows and orphans of the deceased clergy, the support of the episcopate and for any other purpose of said church in said Diocese whether of a like kind with those mentioned or not" is:

"The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia"

The legal title of the Virginia Diocesan Center (Roslyn) is:

"The Memorial Trustees of the Virginia Diocesan Center"

The legal title of the Diocesan Missionary Society is:

"The Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia"

The legal title of Virginia Theological Seminary is:

"Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in Virginia"

The legal title of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society of Virginia is:

"Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Education Society in Virginia" (Chartered by the Virginia Legislature to give financial aid to men preparing for the ministry of the Church.)

The legal title of the Episcopal High School is:

"Protestant Episcopal High School in Virginia"

The legal title of the corporation which conducts the system of schools under the control of the Diocese is:

"Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia"

The legal title of the Blue Ridge School is:

"The Blue Ridge School, Incorporated"

The Shrine Mont Endowment Fund Form of Bequest:

"I hereby give, devise and bequeath to Shrine Mont, Incorporated, a corporation under the laws of Virginia _____."

The Virginia Diocesan Homes Form of Bequest:

"I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Trustees of the Virginia Diocesan Homes, Incorporated, a corporation under the laws of Virginia

The legal title of Bloomfield is:

"Bloomfield, Incorporated"

Bequests for work outside the Diocese of Virginia, but in the continental United States, its possessions, or overseas, should be made to:

"The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America"

The legal title of Stuart Hall, owned and controlled by the dioceses of Virginia, Southern Virginia and Southwestern Virginia is:

"Stuart Hall, Incorporated" Chartered under the Laws of Virginia Address: Staunton, Virginia

Also chartered under the Laws of Virginia:

"St. Paul's Endowment Fund, Incorporated," Richmond, Virginia
"All Saints' Endowment Fund, Incorporated," Richmond, Virginia
"St. Stephen's Endowment Fund, Incorporated," Richmond, Virginia
"Grace & Holy Trinity Endowment Fund, Inc.," Richmond, Virginia
"St. John's Endowment Fund" (St. John's Church, Richmond - income needs)
"St. John's Foundation" (St. John's Church, Richmond - for maintenance)

"Westminster-Canterbury Corporation," Richmond, Virginia (Organized in December 1971 by the Virginia Diocesan Homes and Westminster-Canterbury Homes to be the successor of the Cary Montague Home.) The Westminster-Canterbury form of bequest is:

"I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Trustees of the Westminster-Canterbury Corporation, a corporation under the laws of Virginia **Goodwin House, Incorporated** was established as a corporation in March 1982 by changing the name of the Virginia Diocesan Homes, Incorporated to Goodwin House, Incorporated. The form of bequest for Goodwin House is:

"I hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Trustees of the Goodwin House, Incorporated, a corporation under the laws of Virginia ______."

Bequests may also be made to the Trustees, Virginia Diocesan Homes, Inc., for the designated use and benefit of any Westminster-Canterbury Corporation.

The 190th Annual Council approved the following organizations as diocesanrelated in accordance with Canon 17 of the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia:

- 3. Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia
- 4. The Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia
- 5. The Shrine Mont Corporation
- 6. Memorial Trustees Virginia Diocesan Center
- 7. Roslyn Managers Corporation
- 8. Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia

The 190th Annual Council adopted the following resolution:

Be It Resolved, that the 190th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia states that the following organizations are determined to be ecumenically related:

The Virginia Council of Churches Chaplain Services of the Churches of Virginia St. Alban's Housing Corporation

and the following organizations are determined to be Episcopally oriented:

Bloomfield, Incorporated St. Paul's College, Lawrenceville Virginia Theological Seminary Blue Ridge School Stuart Hall, Incorporated

and a current list of such organizations shall be maintained by the Secretary of the Diocese and published annually in the Journal of Council.

Rules of Order

Rules of Order

- 1. On each day of Council there shall be appropriate worship services including a celebration of Holy Communion at each regular meeting of the Council.
- 2. On the first day of Council the Presiding Officer, having taken the Chair, shall declare a quorum present, if such be the case, or he may direct that the roll of the members of the clerical and lay order be called to determine a quorum.
- 3. On the first day of Council, a Program of Council shall be adopted.
- On the first day of each regular meeting of Council, the Presiding Officer may appoint assistant secretaries to the Secretary of the Council.
- 5. Prior to each regular meeting of Council, the Presiding Officer shall appoint the following Committees of Council to serve until their successors have been appointed.
 - A. Committee on Credentials
 - B. The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to which all proposed amendments to the Constitution and Canons shall be referred. The Committee on Constitution and Canons shall conduct a hearing at a session of Council and thereafter make a report to Council.

Notice having been given that amendments to the Constitution and Canons should be submitted prior to the Council meeting, no additional amendments to the Constitution and Canons shall be received and acted upon at the Council without a two-thirds vote of the Council, unless it shall be reported by a Committee of Council. All such amendments submitted on the floor of Council must be submitted in 700 copies ready for distribution.

C. The Committee on Resolutions, to which may be referred all resolutions, except those referred to the Committee on Budget, provided they are submitted in writing, shall conduct a hearing at a session of the Council and thereafter report its recommendations on all resolutions submitted.

Notice having been given that resolutions should be submitted prior to the Council meeting, no additional resolutions shall be received and acted upon at the Council without a two-thirds vote of the Council, unless it shall be reported by a Committee of Council. All such resolutions submitted on the floor of Council must be submitted in 700 copies ready for distribution.

D. The Committee on Budget, to which shall be referred (a) the Executive Board's recommended program and proposed funding, and (b) such resolutions related thereto as shall have been filed in writing with the Council.

The Committee on Budget shall conduct a hearing at a session of the Council and thereafter report to Council by presenting:

- 1. The Executive Board's budget
- 2. The resolutions or recommendations referred to it by Council with the Committee's recommendation(s) to Council regarding adoption or rejection of each.
- 3. Such other changes in the Executive Board budget as the Committee shall recommend, said changes to be presented in the form of a resolution or resolutions.

No floor amendment to the proposed budget will be considered unless the subject matter of the proposed amendment has been presented or made known to the Committee on Budget prior to or during open hearings.

No amendment to the proposed diocesan budget, as presented by the Committee on Budget, shall be received unless the amendment includes provision for offsetting changes in other expenditures or revenues.

- E. The Committee on Church Status, to which shall be referred all petitions for church status prepared and presented as prescribed by Canon.
- F. The Committee on Related Organizations, which shall study, review, and report to Council the relationship existing between the Diocese and any organization, institution, corporation, board, or other group which by charter or custom or for any reason may be considered to have a relationship with the Diocese or a desire to have such a relationship. All requests to change or create such

relationship shall be referred to this Committee. This Committee is charged with presenting to Council or the Executive Board between meetings of Council, nominations or elections for confirmation, for officers or board members of all related organizations whose articles of incorporation or bylaws require such action.

- G. The Committee on the Journal of the Council, composed of three persons of whom the Secretary of the Diocese shall be one, and of either order, to whom shall be referred all matters to be printed in the Annual Journal of the Council, which said Committee shall have power to act during recess of the Council, and report to the Council.
- 6. The Presiding Officer shall appoint such other committees of Council as the Council may direct or the Presiding Officer may determine and he may designate the chairman of any committee.
- 7. The size and composition of every committee of Council shall be in the sole discretion of the Presiding Officer, except where otherwise provided by the Constitution and Canons.
- 8. The President may appoint a parliamentarian for any meeting of Council.
- 9. Elections: In every election where more persons are nominated than are to be elected, the balloting shall be:
 - A. On each ballot, the nominee(s) receiving the highest number of votes, but not less than a majority of votes cast, shall be declared elected.
 - B. If any office remains to be filled after the first ballot, second and subsequent ballots shall be taken. On each later ballot, the number of nominees shall be reduced by one-half, but such reduction shall always provide for two more nominees than offices to be filled. In the event of a single vacancy, the number of nominees shall be reduced to two. Depending upon the distribution of votes, the presiding officer may, on the advice of the Chief Judge of Election and with the approval of Council, authorize the retention of three more names than offices to be filled.
 - C. In the event of an impasse, declared to be such by the Presiding Officer, the Council may change or modify Section A and B of this rule by a majority vote of members present, notwithstanding the

- requirement for a two-thirds vote to suspend a Rule of Order.
- D. Whenever the Council must fill a vacancy on the Standing Committee, the order of election shall be:
 - 1) The member for a regular term;
 - 2) The member or members for the longest vacancy to be filled;
 - The member or members for the remaining vacancy to be filled.
- 10. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Presiding Officer, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary. After a motion is so stated or read, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- 11. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the Presiding Officer or any member require it.
- 12. A. When a motion is pending, the following amendments shall be in order: (1) One amendment may be made to each independent or separable portion thereof; and (2) one motion to amend that amendment shall be in order; and it shall be in order also (3) to offer a further amendment by way of substitute to which may be offered (4) one amendment.
 - B. No proposition not germane to the subject under consideration shall be received under color of an amendment or a substitute. Neither the substitute nor its amendment shall be voted on (except to lay on the table) until the original matter is perfected. An amendment or a substitute may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of his seconder before amendment thereof or before decision is had thereon.
 - C. The amendment or the substitute shall be debatable only when the main question is debatable.
 - D. The adoption of an amendment by way of substitute or otherwise shall not displace the main resolution, which, after being amended, shall be the question before the Council.

- E. The following questions cannot be amended: (1) The call for the Order of the Day, (2) an appeal from the decision of the Chair, (3) an objection to consideration of any question, or the motions (4) to adjourn, (5) to lay on the table, (6) to take from the table, (7) for leave to continue speaking, (8) to postpone indefinitely, (9) to reconsider, (10) to suspend rules, (11) to take up business out of order or (12) for leave to withdraw a motion.
- F. The order of decision of a question before the Council shall be:
 - Amendment to the amendment of the main question;
 - (2) Amendment to the main question;
 - (3) Amendment to the substitute motion;
 - (4) The substitute motion:
 - (5) If the substitute fails, then the main question.
- 13. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to (1) adjourn, (2) to lay on the table, (3) for the previous question, (4) to take at a certain time, (5) to commit or recommit, (6) to amend or substitute, (7) to postpone to a certain day, or (8) to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated and be settled by a majority vote.
- 14. A motion for the previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the previous question or questions before the Council now be put?" If the previous question is voted, only the immediately pending questions before the Council shall be put without debate.
- 15. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.
- 16. When two or more members of Council rise at once, the Presiding Officer shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 17. Except by leave of the Council, no member shall speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than two minutes at one time. No applause shall be permitted when a question is under debate
- 18. The vote on all questions shall be taken by orders whenever as many as five members request it.

- 19. Reports of all committees shall be in writing. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the Presiding Officer shall, without obligation, so direct, or when the Council shall so require.
- 20. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.
- 21. All persons elected as officials of the Diocese by the Council or by the Executive Board of the Council, Presidents of the Regions, and members of the Executive Board-elect who will take office at the conclusion of the regular meeting of Council, shall by virtue of their respective offices, be entitled to a seat and voice, but no vote, at all meetings of the Council.
- 22. These rules may be amended or special orders for the conduct of business adopted at any time by a two-thirds majority of the members present.
- 23. In all matters not specifically covered by these Rules of Order or by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, Robert's Rules of Order, Revised, shall govern the Council in all cases to which they are applicable.
- 24. Rules in force: At the meetings of the Annual Council, the rules and the orders of the previous meeting shall be in force until they are amended or repealed by the Council.

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Louis C. Breitenbach March 20, 1925-March 13, 1999

The Rev. Louis C. Breitenbach, a retired priest of this diocese, died March 13, 1999.

A 1953 graduate of Virginia Seminary, Mr. Breitenbach began his ministry as vicar of Calvary Church, Hillman, Michigan and Grace Church, Long Rapids, before coming to the Diocese of Virginia in 1955 as vicar of Epiphany Mission, McMullen, in Neve Parish, and Middle River Mission, Stanardsville, in Bromfield Parish.

He later served as assistant rector of St. Matthew's, Richmond from 1958-1963; rector of Grace Church, Goochland from 1963-1980; and as rector of Lynnwood Parish, Port Republic from 1980-1990. A funeral was held March 16 at Grace Church, Stanardsville, Bishop David Lewis presiding.



William Buttrick

July 21, 1933-February 1, 1999

The Rev. William Buttrick died suddenly on Monday, February 1, 1999, of congestive heart failure. He was 65.

A priest of the Diocese of Virginia since 1977, Mr. Buttrick served as rector of St. Mark's, Richmond from 1977-1987, and then served several parishes in the Diocese as interim rector from 1988-1996 including St. Peter's, New Kent; Emmanuel, Brook Hill, Richmond; St. John's, West Point; and St. Paul's, Hanover. He also served the Diocese as a member of the Executive Board in 1979 and again from 1982-1985, and was Dean of the Central Richmond Deanery from 1979-1983.

Mr. Buttrick earned an A.B. from Princeton in 1955, a B.D. from the Episcopal Theological School, Massachusetts in 1960, and was ordained later that same year. Prior to coming to the Diocese of Virginia, he served several parishes in Ohio and Massachusetts. A funeral was held February 4, 1999 at Emmanuel, Brook Hill, Richmond. Bishop Lee presided and preached, and Bishop Jones and Bishop Lewis vested and participated in the service.

Proceedings of the Special Meeting of the 204th Annual Council September 19, 1998

The Special meeting of the 204th Annual Council began with a service of Morning Prayer at 10 a.m., Saturday, September 19, 1998 in St. Stephen's Church, Richmond.

Following the Morning Office, Bishop Lee called the special meeting of the 204th Annual Council to order and called on Secretary of the Diocese Happy Pullman for a determination of quorum.

Determination of Quorum

Ms. Pullman read Article IV of the Diocesan Constitution, which states one-third of the members of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business, and one-half the members of the clergy. There being 397 members of the clerical order, 133 are required for a quorum. There being 259 members of lay order, 129 are required for a quorum. She said that at 10:02 a.m. there was established a quorum with 152 members of the clerical order registered, and 179 members of the lay order registered.

Appointment of Parliamentarian, Secretary, Assistant Secretary

Bishop Lee determined that a quorum was present, and appointed Mr. Russell Palmore, Chancellor of the Diocese, as Parliamentarian; Ms. Happy Pullman as Secretary of the Council; and Mr. Patrick Getlein as Assistant Secretary.

Adoption of Program

He then called for a motion to adopt the proposed program of the Special Council. The motion was made and seconded. Bishop Lee called for a vote, the matter succeeded and the program of the Special Meeting of the 204th Annual Council was adopted.

Report of Credentials Committee

Bishop Lee introduced the Credentials Committee of the Special Meeting of Council: the Rev. Sue Eaves, Chair, St. James's, Richmond; Ms. Suzanne Davenport, Grace and Holy Trinity, Richmond; Mr. Steve van Voorhees, Holy Comforter, Richmond. He then called on Ms. Davenport for the report of the Credentials Committee.

Ms. Davenport stated the Credentials Committee had examined the certificates of election and filed with the Secretary of Council a list of those persons duly elected as delegates and alternate delegates to the special meeting of the 204th Annual Council.

Bishop Lee thanked Ms. Davenport for her report. He called attention to the unique nature of the Special Meeting of Council and noted that other Committees of Council will not be appointed for the meeting, but that they will be appointed for the regular meeting of Council when it assembles in February.

He then called on Mr. Mike Kerr, Chief Financial Officer of the Diocese, for an update on diocesan finances.

Report of the Chief Financial Officer—Mr. Mike Kerr

Good Morning. I'll take only a few minutes to brief you on the financial position of the Diocese of Virginia. In your packets that were distributed when you registered there was an income statement for the Diocese as of the end of August. On the back of that packet of financial information was a final page showing outstanding parochial reports from 1997. Parochial reports were due on March 1st of this year, and the attached list is current as of Tuesday, September 15. If your church is listed, please make an effort to ascertain why the report is outstanding, and if it is my oversight, please send me a copy, and I apologize in

advance.

Turning to the financial pages, many of you have seen this income statement before. The first five pages reflect the support and revenue side of the budget, and the final three reflect the expenses. In the past two weeks I have contacted a number of churches concerning the status of their 1998 diocesan pledge. The Budget Committee will be moving forward in early October on the 1999 budgets, and being able to more accurately forecast a deficit or a surplus is important in their decision making. If your church needs to adjust the reflected pledge numbers, please see me.

At the bottom of page 5 you will see the Total Support and Revenue line. On a year-to-date plan we are slightly behind in total support and revenue at \$2.2 million of the \$3.5 million budget. This is not unusual coming out of the summer, and we have historically caught up throughout the fall. But while the total pledges are slightly behind plan, the other income section that you'll see is actually ahead of target, primarily due to the transfer of the Reid Trust income earlier in the year.

Turning to the expense side on page 6, I will point out that the second half of the grants for Ecumenical Partnership and Youth and Young Adults ministries were made earlier this month and are not reflected in the report that you have. Total expenses are running at about the same pace as the income side, being slightly over \$2 million of the \$3.5 million budget. Again, expenses also pick up as we enter the fall.

Page 8 of the report shows a net surplus of \$188,945 as of August 31. This is a very positive sign of the health of the Diocese, but we are far from year-end.

I feel that the Diocese of Virginia is as strong as it ever has been. We are planting new churches, we are spreading God's kingdom, and we are doing so on a strong and stable footing. The Special Council is a fortunate time to take a snapshot of our current financial position, and to take the next step in the vision of the Diocese. While I'm not quite ready yet to announce a stock split, I hope to be able to present continued good news when we next meet. That is my report. Thank you, Bishop.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Kerr for his report and noted that in terms of Council the report is unofficial and requires no action. He encouraged those with questions to speak with Mr. Kerr.

Bishop Lee then continued and introduced the subject of the meeting:

"When Bishop Matthews told me of his appointment to the Office of Pastoral Development of the National Church, and that he needed therefore to resign as Bishop Suffragan of Virginia, my immediate concern was to maintain the momentum of ministry that had been available to the Diocese through the services of three full-time bishops for the two years and eight months that Bishop Jones, Bishop Matthews and I were working together. So securing a third bishop as soon as reasonably possible was a high priority for me, and I believe for the Diocese.

"The canons of the general church provide for three types of bishops to assist a diocesan bishop. A bishop coadjutor is elected by the Council of the Diocese with the automatic right to succeed the diocesan bishop. A bishop suffragan is elected without the right to succession but with a right to tenure. The bishop suffragan's tenure does not end at the

conclusion of the tenure of the diocesan bishop. The third type, assistant bishop's position, is created by the Council and the person is appointed from among the ranks of existing bishops by the diocesan bishop with the consent of the Standing Committee.

"No elections for a bishop coadjutor or bishop suffragan may be held without the consent of the diocesan bishop. No appointment for assistant bishop may be made by the diocesan bishop without the Council creating the position and the Standing Committee consenting to the particular person who is appointed.

"I turned 60-years old in May. I must retire when I am 72. I have no plans for retirement at the present time, but I believe I am too young to elect a bishop coadjutor, and I am too old for us to elect a bishop suffragan.

"My hope for an assistant bishop is that we can secure a bishop with considerable experience as a diocesan bishop, who will perceive a call to come to Virginia as an exciting challenge for the next chapter of that bishop's ministry. I wanted to provide this introduction to this session of the Council to summarize directly to the Council itself the conversations that I have had since last March with the Executive Board, the deans and presidents, and most particularly the Standing Committee who has canonical responsibility in this area. I think this process has been thorough, open, and because our canons provide it, a balanced process between my initiatives and the necessary consultation and consenting role of the Standing Committee and the Council.

"The National Canon concerning the appointment of an assistant bishop has been reproduced and is in your packet. I now recognize the Very Rev. Allen Coffey, President of the Standing Committee, who will lay the resolution before the Council and put it on the floor."

Mr. Coffey then introduced the resolution:

"Bishop Lee, Bishop Jones, distinguished visitors and guests, and fellow members of Council, it is my privilege as the President of the Standing Committee to move that the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, upon the request of the Bishop and with the consent of the Standing Committee, approves the creation of a position of Assistant Bishop and authorizes the Bishop of the Diocese to appoint a bishop for such a position, with the consent of the Standing Committee."

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Coffey and permitted him to speak to the resolution.

Mr. Coffey continued:

"For many of you it will come as no surprise to learn that less than two weeks after Bishop Griswold appointed Bishop Matthews, Bishop Lee met with the Standing Committee at its regular meeting at St. George's Church in Fredericksburg to make a case, as he has done this morning, for continuing the ministry of three active persons in the Episcopal order in the Diocese of Virginia. He did then suggest that there were three options. The election of a bishop coadjutor, which was ruled out, even before his 60th, as premature. The election of a bishop suffragan, which was ruled out as too costly and too soon after the election processes of 1992/1993 and 1994/1995. And finally, the option of the creation of the position of assistant bishop, which of course is clearly favored by Bishop Lee.

"The current issue of the Virginia Episcopalian lists episcopal visitations by so many bishops who are retired in the Diocese of Virginia, and who are taking over Bishop Matthews' scheduled visitations for the rest of 1998, that it boggles the mind. It is clear that if we are to continue that one aspect of episcopal ministry in the style which we have preferred, namely Sunday mornings if at all possible, a third bishop is a must. And that doesn't even begin to consider the other areas of ministry that are undertaken by our bishops.

"The Bishop and the Standing Committee discussed other increased staffing proposals that had already been suggested to the Bishop, and we proceeded to enumerate the benefits to be gained by moving quickly to create the position of Assistant Bishop. Bishop Lee expressed the hope that if approval were given by the Council, that the new bishop would be on board by January 1, 1999, probably a year sooner than if we were to have an election and subsequent consecration. An assistant bishop who would serve under a term contract would be appointed by Bishop Lee with the consent of the Standing Committee. After this discussion last March, and with the happy memory of Bishop Atkinson's ministry as Assistant Bishop among us from 1989 to 1993, the Standing Committee gave it's unanimous and enthusiastic consent to the call of this Council to approve the creation of the position of Assistant Bishop, and I urge your affirmative vote this morning."

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Coffey and recognized the Rt. Rev. Robert P. Atkinson to second the resolution, to the appreciative laughter of the members of Council.

Bishop Atkinson seconded the resolution with the following words:

"Mr. President, members of Council, I arise to second the resolution presented by the Standing Committee, and I do so for lots of reasons. I wanted the chance to have a few moments with you about what is proposed. It was a little over 10 years ago, in January 1988, at the 103rd Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, that your Bishop called for the establishment of the Office of Assistant Bishop. I am told that there were some who were a bit worried about it because the Diocese of Virginia had never ever had an Assistant Bishop who was appointed. Virginia is used to having a chance to elect its bishops, and rightly so. When Rosemary, my wife, and I came down to Richmond to meet the staff and to have dinner together, and to see first hand the inside of Mayo House I can remember the late, beloved Hoke Palmer coming up to me as he would often do with people, and he would take you by the arm and he'd look you straight in the eye, and he looked at me and he said, 'Robert, why would any Bishop agree to giving up being number one in his diocese in order to become number two in another diocese?'

"And I stumbled and faltered for a little bit, but not for long. I said to him, 'Hoke, it is, on the surface, a crazy thing to do. To give up a diocese that has elected you as there diocesan, where you've been for 15 years, to be a part of the life of a great Diocese.' To give that up, lose tenure, and be at the mercy and the kindness and the forgiveness of Peter Lee, must take some kind of divine imperative, because in an earthly sense it makes no sense at all. But there has to be a divine call in that, with some persuasion from the Bishop of Virginia.

"And sure enough, as we agreed to come, I recognized that there were some moments of doubt whether the Bishop and the Diocese made the right decision to call me, and I must say that I had some moments when I wasn't sure that was the best thing for me. But I want to say to you, friends, that even though one receives a kind of identity crisis being elected in one Diocese, being appointed in another, and then retiring, it does bring to pass

some of those recognitions of reality that have taken a marvelous moment of my ministry to share with you.

"There were two primary factors that made it work as well as it did. It could have worked better, but it worked well, I think. Certainly for me it did. One factor was the kind of bishop you have. Peter Lee was a great colleague in those five years serving this diocese as Assistant Bishop. He is a great bishop of the Church, and a great bishop for the Diocese of Virginia. He is the kind of person who can say to me, as his assistant, 'Now, Bob, what do you think of that?'

"I remember one day we were at one of our regular executive retreats, and we were talking about something that was somewhat controversial, and Bishop Lee made his point well, as he often does, and I agreed with him. He said, 'Bob, why are you so deferential to me?' And I said, 'Well, Peter, Bishop Lee, doggone it, you're always right.' But I want to say, also, that that primary factor of Peter Lee makes all the difference in calling an assistant to serve with David and with Peter.

"The second primary factor is the Diocese of Virginia, and I have a chance now to say that. You received me knowing full well that you had nothing to do with it other than a vote to pass in order for me to come. But you received me with such gracious and generous hospitality that all of a sudden ministry of bishoping became easier and we prayed together, and we worked together.

"Those five years went by terribly fast, primarily because of your Bishop and you, the Diocese of Virginia. You will make it work, as you did before. You will make it work better. I'm convinced.

"Finally, I want to say that although if you pass this resolution, although if the Bishop looks forward, as I know he does, to the filling of the vacancy in the college of bishops of Virginia, and although he looks forward to the presence of an assistant bishop to not only fill that vacancy but also to move ahead together, I want to say to you, friends, that I look forward to the next Assistant Bishop's retirement, because then the two of us can reflect on our days together and I will be the senior, and I've always wanted to be a Dean in my own right. Thank you."

Bishop Lee thanked Bishop Atkinson and opened the floor to discussion.

Mr. Robin Lind, St. Mary's, Goochland, listed his previous church affiliations and spoke against the resolution with the following words:

"Mr. President, I say Mr. President rather than My Lord Grace, because this is still the Protestant Episcopal Church in America, and you are the presiding officer over a duly elected constituent assembly. This is our Virginia tradition that Bishop Atkinson just referred to. It's our Virginia heritage. It's the heirloom of representative self-government handed down to us since the convening of our first Council and the election of our first bishop in 1786. Mr. President, as I explained to you last week, I have been sorely troubled by your request and felt compelled to speak. I understand how you might feel more comfortable being able to appoint an assistant bishop of your own choosing, but I would ask you to reconsider. I would remind you, Mr. President, that the church in Virginia stood alone in the 17th century against the combined powers of theocracy and autocracy in Britain, winning in 1703 a 60-year court battle that secured for Virginia vestries the

unrestricted right of a diocese, the right to elect our own ministers, a right that is not yet granted in Britain. The democratic and independent right won by Virginia was recognized, valued, and adopted by other Protestant churches throughout America. It is zealously guarded by them today. It is Virginia's legacy, Mr. President, that we elect our ministers.

"When churches of this diocese gathered in Council in 1789 to discuss whether or not we should even have Bishops, we agreed to a two-step process. Election by council, then consecration by the laying-on of hands. Election by council has always been primary. Over the past 210 years this has been our tradition in every single instance but one. That was the Council's consent to your request to appoint an assistant after the untimely death of good Bob Hall. This Council felt your great need, Mr. President, and acted, I believe, out of a spirit of generosity, knowing that you had not had sufficient time to feel secure in your duties. Your appointment of Bishop Robert Atkinson was a welcomed response. I think everyone in this Council realized we could hardly have been served better. But a once-in-two-century exception should not become a rule, a habit, or a tradition.

"I know there are those who might object to the appointment of an assistant bishop because it restricts consideration to those who are white and male, and of a certain age. There are others who may object because it eliminates from consideration all potential nominees who are currently serving as ordained ministers in this diocese, members of this Council who are seated among us. I'm sensitive to these objections, but I feel a greater sense of dis-ease. When you remove the process of election from the people you diminish both the people and the Office of Bishop. When you go forth as Bishop of Virginia, you go forth diminished as well: the representative not of a free, independent and self-governing people, who choose their own leaders, but of a director of a congregation that has surrendered vote in the matter of its leadership.

"Mr. President, I think we all recognize that democracy is an inconvenient, inefficient process. It creates uncertainty. It feeds insecurities. It challenges the established order. It calls into question the beliefs and opinions of Council, and I think it threatens us all. It also brings forth nominees from places where we had not sought, and often directs us in paths where we had not intended. For out of such a process, Mr. President, this Council elected you to become our Bishop. We did not expect it at the time, and you said that you did not expect it either. I'm among those who believe that God works in these mysterious ways. Mr. President, there are many in this Council who voted to elect you 14 years ago. They have come to love and respect you. Our love and respect for you grows as we see you walk as Christ among us, suffering as we suffer, experiencing the uncertainty of daily life, facing the challenges of human frailty, accepting the call to go out into the world with faith that a loving God will provide what is best. My gratitude to our forebears for bequeathing to us the hard won right to elect our leaders prevents me from giving my consent. I would ask you to express your faith and trust in this Council, and call for an election. Thank you, Mr. President."

Mr. Lind was followed by Mr. Russell Randle, Christ Church, Alexandria who spoke in support of the resolution with the following words:

"If these were ordinary times I would have the same objections stated so well by the prior speaker, and I would object quite strongly that the process chosen here as compared to an election greatly reduces the chance that we will choose a qualified woman or African-American as our next Bishop. These are not ordinary times for the Anglican Communion.

As you will hear today, and as those of us who have gone to Sudan or to Burma have seen for ourselves, hundreds of thousands, and perhaps millions of Episcopalians face ghastly persecution and hardship. Many thousands this year have been killed, and many more are facing starvation as we meet. In the face of this persecution, famine, and warfare, I believe that God is calling us to put aside ordinary differences and instead, to respond boldly to the persecuted church. If we can't unite when our own brothers and sisters are being killed for the name of Jesus Christ, then we ought to shut up shop and close, and go home, because we don't deserve the name Christians. In order for us to concentrate on helping the persecuted church I ask those of you who, like me, are deeply troubled by this approach and who would ordinarily object to this resolution, to support it. I think that responding to our brothers and sisters in persecution, facing famine and war, matters much more to Jesus Christ right now than our internal church politics. I think we ought to be acting accordingly. I call upon you to support the resolution."

Following Mr. Randle, the Rev. Ralph Bayfield, St. Thomas', Richmond spoke in favor of the resolution with the following words:

"I would like to echo my support for the last speaker's remarks. I believe that times are quite different today than they were. I am very much in support of tradition, but we are also faced with a time where something happened suddenly. While the appointment of Bishop Matthews to the National Church was not a death, it was a sudden removal from this diocese of one of our bishops. It happened very fast. I think that we need to keep going the way we are, and in a sense we are really electing whoever that Bishop will be and putting our support today with our beloved Bishop Lee who has led us so faithfully in the years of his tenure. I would move the question."

Bishop Lee, prior to recognizing the motion, called for additional speakers. There were none. Bishop Lee stated that the question had been moved and called for a vote to close debate. The matter succeeded and debate was closed.

Bishop Lee then called for a vote on the resolution to create the position of Assistant Bishop. The matter succeeded on voice vote, the chair ruling that the aye's predominated. He then asked if there was any challenge to that ruling. There was none. The resolution was declared adopted, and Council signified its approval with extended applause.

Bishop Lee and Bishop Jones then presented their impressions of the recently concluded Lambeth Conference of Bishops and opened the floor to questions.

Following the presentation on the Lambeth Conference, Bishop Lee called on the Rev. Richard Lord, Holy Comforter, Vienna and chair of the Executive Board Task Force on Virginia Plan 2000, for a report of the work of that Task Force.

Interim Report on Virginia Plan 2000—The Rev. Richard Lord

Thank you, Bishop. In preparing this interim report on the funding plans for Virginia 2000 I was reminded of the story of an Episcopal priest who concluded a sermon on the stewardship of creation by saying there's a sermon found in every blade of grass. On that following Monday as he was pushing his lawn mower across the rectory lawn a parishioner stopped by and said, "Father, I'm so glad to see you engaged in keeping your sermons short." I'll follow that advice.

Resolution R-1(sa), adopted by the 203rd Annual Council, calls for wide consultation on Virginia Plan 2000. A plan which commits the church and the Diocese of Virginia to exercise the power of our unity, to love in God's name, and to witness this united love to the world in three ways: by planting new churches; by developing and revitalizing existing congregations; and by expanding and strengthening youth ministry. We also know that voluntary giving based on gratitude and a strong biblical vision of stewardship is the fuel of this vision.

The Executive Board was tasked to present to the next Annual Council, the 204th, a specific plan for voluntary giving for the Diocese of Virginia. Having served on the task force on parish giving, and now chairing this sub-committee for the Executive Board, I've seen that our diocese holds very strongly two important values. We want to continue to encourage equal opportunity for each parish to participate in funding the wider church's mission, specifically Virginia Plan 2000. At the same time we want a plan that takes into account the direct parish based outreach which is so much a part of our life in the Diocese of Virginia. As of Wednesday, the Bishop and the Executive Board have received 42 written responses to Bishop Lee's letter asking vestries to consider the various funding plans for Virginia Plan 2000. I want to refer you to the document that's in your packet, Virginia Plan 2000, under the orange cover. This document was sent to rectors and vestries of the Diocese, as well as the consultations and visits that the bishops made earlier this spring across the Diocese, to share Virginia Plan 2000. In this document you will see the various breakdowns of the plans that were offered in that resolution. Let me just share with you the breakdown of the 42 responses that we have received, which represents about 23 percent of the parishes and congregations.

- For Plan A there were 10 parishes that expressed support for Plan A.
- For Plan B there were no congregations expressing support, of these 42 responses.
- For Plan C there were 12 congregations expressing their support.
- For Plan D there were eight congregations expressing support.
- Ten congregations supported remaining with the existing Virginia Plan.

So you can see that the responses are fairly well across the map on all four of those options. We would like to receive additional input from those congregations that we've not heard from before the Executive Board, Presidents and Deans meeting on Oct. 5 at Roslyn. If at all possible, we'd like to encourage rectors and wardens to be in touch, either by letter to Bishop Lee or to the members of the Executive Board, with your input so that whatever proposal the Executive Board ultimately makes to Council, it will be a report that is expressive of a wide range of input and opinion.

Also on the subcommittee today, if you want to speak with any of us, please contact Mary Jenks, Joe Paxton, Dexter Fox, the Rev. Pam Foster, and the Rev. Chuck Alley, or myself. We will be glad to speak to you about the various options for this funding plan. We look forward to continued discussion on Virginia Plan 2000 and funding options at diocesan Council. Thank you, Bishop.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Lord for his report. He explained that Virginia Plan 2000 is first a vision of the unity, the love, and the witness of the Diocese expressed in priorities of

church planting, congregational revitalization, and youth ministry. He then introduced two new diocesan staff members to carry forward the priorities of the Diocese in these areas: the Rev. Tony Pompa, Assistant to the Bishop for Congregational and Ministry Development; and the Rev. Priscilla Grant, Assistant to the Bishop for Youth Development

Bishop Lee then called on the Rev. Pierce Klemmt for a presentation on the relationship between the Diocese of Virginia and the Diocese of Renk in Sudan.

Report on Relationship with the Diocese of Renk, Sudan—The Rev. Pierce Klemmt

If you are involved in the relief of persecuted religious people anywhere in the world, or wish to begin a commitment of the same, I ask you now to stand and join me in leading this prayer. Or if you just need to stand and take a stretch, please join us as well.

Look with compassion, O God, upon the people in Sudan who live with injustice, terror, disease, and death as their constant companion, and have mercy upon us. Help us to eliminate our cruelty to these our neighbors, strengthen those who spend their lives establishing equal protection of the law and equal opportunities for all. Grant that everyone of us may enjoy a fair portion of God's rich abundance, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

On behalf of the Sudan Commission, I have been asked by Bishop Lee to update the Diocese regarding our shared mission to the persecuted church. . . [blank portion on tape] ... officials were frustrated by the Islamic government's ban on flights into the South bringing aid. Only a few pushed to put public pressure on Khartoum. Thus, the Sudan Commission of this diocese has been pressing our representatives and senators in Washington for a more comprehensive, strategic plan for Central and East Africa. There have been few successes since Namibia, South Africa and Mozambique turned to peace and democracy earlier this decade. Goodwill visits and innovative trade initiates are not enough. Enhanced ability and vigorous conflict management are needed to assure Africa's economic and political turnaround, and it is time for us to consider how we can make sure all parties involved, the good, the not so good, and the down right corrupt, take us more seriously and cooperate with each other in making for peace. If battles would only end the Sudan could make it on their own. Starvation is unnecessary. Southern Sudan offers some of the most productive land in Africa. The people who live there are hard working farmers and herdsmen. Masters at raising cattle, coping with scanty rainfall, and husbanding seeds. If war would stop, tens of thousands of them would survive this famine and the next one that is, without peace, surely to come. Peace is the commodity the Sudanese people need most, and one that you and I have resources to offer. This is why with the help and prayers of our bishops, and you our Diocese, we the church are in Sudan. We continue to enlist covenant parishes, hound congressmen, and spread the urgent word for Bishop Daniel, who has said to us, "My people are drowning, can you come and help us?" The Sudan Commission finally gives thanks to God for you, our caring and courageous friends in the family of this diocese. If you haven't been involved, here's how you can help.

1. Pray with us.

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2. Communicate the urgency of our concerns to your elected representatives for a country that receives very little attention because there are no resources serving our wealthy and prosperous, if not at times greedy country.

3. Help us raise the additional \$120,000 it will take to buy grain and other food supplies to alleviate the famine with our companion Christians in Sudan.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Klemmt and called on Mr. J.P. Causey, St. John's, West Point and member of the Joint Commission on Nominations of the General Convention who called on members of Coucil to consider nominating persons for election to the following national bodies: Executive Council; the General Board of Examining Chaplains; the Trustees of the Church Pension Fund; and the Trustees of the General Theological Seminary.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Causey and following several other announcements and the closing prayer adjourned Council until reassembly on February 5, 1999.



Proceedings of the 204th Annual Council

The 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia February 5, 1999 **Hyatt Regency Reston**

Call To Order

Bishop Lee began the day with opening prayers and Hymn 408, "Sing praise to God." Following the prayers, Bishop Lee gavelled the 204th Annual Council to order at 9:40 a.m. and called on Secretary of Council Happy Pullman for the determination of quorum.

Determination of Quorum

Ms. Pullman read Article IV of the diocesan Constitution which states that "one-third of the members of the clerical order and one-half of the members of the lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business at any regular or special meeting of the Council." There being 408 members of the clerical order, 136 are required for a quorum. There being 267 members of the lay order, 133 are required for a quorum. Ms. Pullman announced that at 9:34 a.m. a quorum had been achieved with 140 members of the clerical order registered and 162 members of the lay order registered.

Appointment of Parliamentarian, Secretary and Assistant Secretaries

Continuity, Change & Challenge

The Pastoral Address of the Rt. Rev. Peter James Lee, Bishop of Virginia, at the 204th Annual Council, Friday, February 5, 1999, at the Hyatt Reston, Reston, Virginia.

At this point Bishop Lee announced that Ms. Peggy Hombs, Holy Comforter, Richmond, who has chaired the Commission on Ministry for 11 years and served on the Commission for 13 years, concludes her service as of this meeting of Council. He then announced that Ms. Donna Blackistone, Christ the Redeemer, Chantilly, will become chair of the Commission on Ministry at the conclusion of this meeting of Council.

This 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia is a sign of the continuity of the church in Virginia. Some of the congregations represented at this council have been present at every one of the councils of the Diocese. Much of the basic structure of the council remains the same as it has been since 1785. The Council hears from the Bishop. The Council addresses mission strategy. The Council takes the measure of where we have been in the past year and seeks God's guidance for where we are to be led in the year to come. So a major theme of this and every council is the continuity of the church.

Bishop Lee then continued with introductions of appointments for election, all of which were elected.

people in 'the faith' as this church holds the same....we feel that we cannot too earnestly urge the claims of this nursery of the church."

And in that scandalous time of Virginia history when legally mandated racial segregation was becoming the norm, our council heard a report that stressed the importance of an increase in what was then called "colored work." A century later, our Diocesan Curriculum on Race Relations is used in an increasing number of congregations as we struggle against the continuing sin of racism.

In the face of its basically positive report, that committee a century ago called the attention of the council to the declining number of persons presenting themselves as candidates for the ordained ministry. And it pointed to the need "to revive, build up, and cause to flourish" the congregations as the places from which those candidates would be raised. And the report ended a century ago with words that are so fitting for us: "...Let us all pray without ceasing for an outpouring of the Holy Ghost upon us, that we may be enabled to do faithfully and efficiently the work which the Master has given us to do in this dear old diocese." *

We are in continuity with the past.

But times change. Look around you. There are new faces among us, delegates here for the first time, clergy and lay, and there are, represented in the council for the first time, two new congregations, the Church of the Cross, Charlottesville, and the Church of the Spirit, Kingstowne, in Fairfax County. We have a bishop who is new to Virginia. This council welcomes the Rt. Rev. Francis Campbell Gray as our Assistant Bishop and pledges him our support as his rich gifts are used among us in the service of Christ.

There are other new faces on the diocesan staff. Last year, the Council adopted in principle Virginia Plan 2000, which is first of all a vision of unity, love and witness. That vision is expressed in program priorities of church planting, congregational revitalization and development, and in youth ministry development. We welcome at this council the Rev. Tony Pompa, Assistant to the Bishop for Congregational Development and Ministry, and the Rev. Percy Grant, Assistant to the Bishop for Youth Development. In addition, it is my happy privilege today to introduce to you the Rev. Lynne Washington, who will become Assistant to the Bishop for Outreach and Witness on March 15, 1999. Her ministry will include helping congregations and our diocesan organizations increase our outreach-outreach that will unite youth ministry and congregational development and strengthen our witness in ministries of compassion and justice. As a wife and the mother of twin sons born last Fall, she will work part-time at first.

I am very grateful to the Council of the Diocese and to the vestries who elect our delegates and pledge to our work together for your positive response to the vision of Virginia Plan 2000 and to its program priorities. The new position of Assistant Bishop and the staff positions in congregational development, youth development, and outreach are concrete signs that we are moving in the directions that we established when Virginia Plan 2000 was adopted last year.

Maintaining our stewardship theology of grateful and voluntary giving and offering voluntary guidelines for parish giving are already providing support for the vision and the priorities of Virginia Plan 2000. We live in a nation of abundant prosperity. I am thankful that our people are increasing their giving to our congregations, and that the

overwhelming majority of our congregations are increasing their giving to our work together. Boyd Spencer, our director of development, has been invited to some 50 congregations to help them initiate planned giving or capital expansion programs to increase their capacity for mission.

Just as we gather as a community of continuity, we also gather as a community committed to change as Christ leads us. Our new staff persons are signs of change, and of our efforts to focus our energies for what we believe God is calling us to do together as this century draws to a close.

We are an aging church. Visit most of our congregations and you will observe that many people in our congregations are over 50. We welcome, of course, persons of all ages, but one change we need to make in our common life is a deliberate and intentional focus on young people--from children and youth to young adults, joining with persons of much older years in the mosaic that is the Body of Christ. Are we a child-friendly church? Do we encourage young people to take their place in setting priorities for mission?

In particular, we need to change our emphasis on how we encourage young people to hear God's call to ordained leadership in the church. In December 1998, along with Henry Burt of our staff and the Rev. Paul Walker of Christ Church, Charlottesville, I joined the Bishop of Massachusetts, the Bishop of Pittsburgh, and young representatives of their dioceses in a meeting organized by young clergy of the Episcopal Church aimed at developing pilot programs for increasing the number of people under 30 who hear God's call to ordained leadership. We hope what is called the Young Priests' Initiative will contribute to that effort.

The prevailing culture of the Episcopal Church's ordination process in most dioceses over the last few decades has been one that waits passively for individual persons to hear a private call to ordained leadership and then the diocese screens them to test their vocation. When I read the gospels, I do not see a single instance when any one of the first 12 apostles volunteered. They were all young. They were all called. A compelling invitation was offered and accepted: "Follow me."

I charge the members of this Council to identity young men and women in their late teens and early 20s who have obvious gifts for leadership and a capacity for spiritual depth and invite them to consider whether God might be calling them to ordained leadership in the Church. I ask the Commission on Ministry and the Standing Committee to review with me our ordination process to see how it can encourage young leaders to respond to God's call to ordained leadership. National statistics point to the reality that we are entering a time of a shortage of clergy. I want this diocese to respond to that shortage not by lowering standards but by vigorously reaching out to leaders, especially young leaders, and invite them to this vocation that is demanding, rewarding and essential for the life of the Church.

While we reach out to help people claim their ministries as ordained persons we must also discern how to help persons discern their ministries in their everyday lives.

One of the most successful changes that has occurred in the lives of all of us here at this Council is the church's recovery of the ministry of all the baptized. Ministry is not solely the task of ordained persons. The laity are not passive consumers of a religious product produced by the clergy. In baptism, each one of us is called to be a representative of Christ

and is gifted for that representative ministry by the Holy Spirit. This emphasis on the total ministry of all the baptized is at the heart of our priority for congregational development. Our Parish Leadership Training Event at Roslyn (our conference center in Richmond) our new Parish Development overnight conferences, and our participation in programs like the Congregational Development Institute all are examples of equipping all of our people for the ministries of all the baptized.

The Diocese of Virginia has a cherished tradition of strong lay leadership, a tradition particularly responsive to the recovery of ministry by all the baptized. It is the ministry of all the baptized that is the theological basis for some of the modest changes in the diocesan constitution and canons proposed at this Council. The great majority of lay delegates to this Council are elected by the vestries of our congregations. Clergy, simply by virtue of their ordination and canonical residence in Virginia, have seat, voice and vote. Some dioceses limit clergy votes to those who have parochial responsibility. I believe all clergy should be seated with voice and vote, as we do here, because they are leaders of the Church.

Similarly, I believe those lay persons who exercise central leadership functions in governance structures created by this Annual Council also should be seated with voice and vote. I support the constitutional change before you on second reading that grants the Presidents of the Regions seat, voice and vote. More than 25 years ago, the Diocese of Virginia created the regional structure. It is the regional councils that elect the Executive Board members who in turn execute the program of this diocese following the direction of the Council. Lay members of the Executive Board and the Standing Committee are already members of this Council, as they should be. The presidents, too, belong as full members of Council.

I have proposed that all the officers of the Council should have seat, vote, and voice. The ordained officers already do. The Chancellor already does. Extending the vote to the Treasurer and Secretary of the Diocese, who are lay persons, would be consistent with our theology of baptism and with our previous action in seating essential lay leaders in the governance structures of the Diocese. Those changes are appropriate consequences of an emphasis on laity taking their rightful place in the governance of the church, and those changes stress our unity as a diocese, a unity that is greater than a confederation of congregations.

We are a community of continuity, a community of change, and we are community of challenge. We are challenged by new opportunities, new population groups moving into Virginia, challenged by new technologies that invite us to tell the old, old story of Jesus and his love in new and refreshing ways to people who have never heard the story and to people who have lost their grasp of that saving story.

Many of the challenges to the church in Virginia are shared across the world. The presence at this Council of Bishop Kenneth Barham of Rwanda, Bishop William Rukirande of Uganda, Mr. Abel Alier, a courageous spokesperson for human rights from the Sudan, and Mr. Tom Hart, the head of the Government Relations Office of the Episcopal Church in Washington, testifies to the challenges facing our worldwide Anglican Communion when we respect the dignity and freedom of every person whom God has made.

Last summer at the Lambeth Conference, your bishops experienced first hand how continuity, change and challenge are simultaneously present in the worldwide church. It

was marvelously inspiring to join a congregation of several thousand people in the opening Eucharist at Canterbury Cathedral, that magnificent sign of the continuity of faith in our Anglican tradition. I had the clear sense of being an eyewitness to history at a Lambeth Conference when much of the leadership and energy came from the churches of the southern hemisphere, a powerful sign of change in the global relationships between churches of the north and churches of the south. And challenge was all around us: the challenge to proclaim the gospel faithfully in circumstances of dramatic cultural differences; the challenge to serve as bridge builders across economies that are vastly different and population groups that are often at odds; the challenge to affirm the dignity of every person when new technology comes close to redefining what personhood might be, and when cultural differences tempt us to exclude people whom we do not understand.

I suggest to you that a faithful church, a vibrant church, the living Body of Christ, will recognize the simultaneous demands of continuity, change and challenge in its midst. Some people are inherently more concerned about maintaining continuity than with accepting change. Other people have personalities that are attracted quickly to the possibility of change and give scant attention to the value of continuity. Still others welcome challenge as an opportunity and live with people who see challenge as a threat.

Surely, you have heard the definition of how many Episcopalians are required to change a light bulb? "Change?! Change? You can't change the light bulb. My grandmother gave that light bulb."

Sometimes we need new light bulbs; but we need to honor the donors of the old ones.

I think the stresses and controversies that were present at the Lambeth Conference are signs that our Communion is one that embraces continuity, change and challenge, all at the same time. I encourage all of our people to study carefully the Lambeth reports--and not to use the Lambeth resolutions and reports out of their context to push agendas of our own. We are a Communion, not a monolithic institution. We embrace the defenders of continuity, the advocates of change, and the prophets of challenge.

We proclaim Jesus Christ, the same, today, yesterday and forever—and we remember that no one generation, no one culture, no one person has a monopoly on the truth of Christ. If we are an obedient church, we are in continuity with the apostles' teaching and fellowship and we are also a church committed to change. Every time we fall on our knees and confess our sins, and hear God's gracious promise of grace and forgiveness, we participate in a dynamic of change. Every generation of Christians faces challenges unknown to generations before, when new situations require a deeper search for God's truth and when new occasions teach new duties.

I hope this Council will continue the characteristic virtues of the Diocese of Virginia in maintaining our unity, love and witness. We do that best by affirming in our worship our central truths, by listening with love in our dialogue with those whom we disagree, as we are doing in the Sexuality Dialogue Group created by Council two years ago, and by witnessing to Christ who is our unifying, enlightening power. By God's grace, the Diocese of Virginia has not focused on issues that divide, but on Jesus Christ who unites.

We are blessed again this year with stewardship that exceeds our expectations. This council will have more money to invest in God's mission than what the Executive Board

expected when the proposed budget was adopted in late December 1998. But I do not use words like "surplus" or "excess" because there is so much more that we can do to energize existing congregations, to expand youth development, and to plant new churches; so much more we can do to strengthen our unity, our love and our witness.

I hope this Council will focus our resources on our priorities, tithe our income over revenue for overseas assistance, set aside money for development in poor countries, and strengthen the staff that serves the churches of this diocese. Remember that the mission of this diocese is what all of us do together. What is funded by the budget we adopt here is only a fraction of what we do together, and it is designed to unite us in our love and witness.

I believe the end of this century is a time when we need to consider carefully a long range diocesan effort to increase our capital resources for new churches, development of existing churches, and for expanded youth ministry.

In 1998, a person with an especially generous and visionary spirit and who wishes to remain anonymous, gave 2.3 million dollars to the Diocese of Virginia to help us in church planting, principally through the acquisition of land. The donor is neither an Episcopalian nor a Virginian but is close to a person who is both. Bishop David Jones has been the donors' contact with the Diocese of Virginia, and I am grateful to him and especially to the donor and to the Virginian who inspired the donor's vision. I think that donor's generosity is both an invitation and a challenge. Consider what might happen if the Diocese of Virginia had an endowment for development to enable us to purchase land for new churches before the price per acre is beyond our reach; if we had assets in the Diocese to stimulate and encourage the revitalization of an existing congregation by a diocesan challenge grant to that congregation for a renovated parish house or youth facility; if Shrine Mont had an endowment for maintenance so its weekend and camp and conference fees could be even more accessible than they are now.

Most major universities are completing or launching capital fund drives, many in the hundreds of millions of dollars. I thank God for the gifts of America's great universities. But the end of this violent 20th Century teaches us that humanity's spiritual hunger must be met as well as its intellectual and scientific needs; that American people are searching, seeking folk to whom the Christian faith speaks with a word of generosity and love, and to reach out with that word the church needs to increase our capacity to stimulate mission and growth. I believe God's gracious abundance is telling us that our too frequent characteristic of complaining of our need must be set aside to allow a confident, risk-taking, hopeful faith to enliven the church.

That risk taking, hopeful and lively faith should lead us, I believe, to an effort at planned giving and capital expansion so that the assets of the Diocese may be invested in the future of our congregations and release our energies for mission beyond ourselves. I expect to be working with diocesan leadership groups in this next year towards developing such a planned giving and capital campaign.

We are approaching the end of one millennium and the beginning of another. The millennium, for Christian people, is a jubilee--a time to celebrate with thanksgiving that the God who has been our help in ages past, is also our hope for years to come.

In the biblical tradition, a jubilee is a time for new beginnings. New beginnings require

repentance in ourselves, forgiveness of others, and a hopeful, fresh start. Our vision of Virginia Plan 2000, with its emphases on youth, renewal of our congregations and on planting new churches, is one way we celebrate God's jubilee. And we mark the jubilee of the new millennium with our brothers and sisters in other communions, as well, responding with them to God's call for the unity of Christians in our life together, and our unity in our compassion for the poor. That's why the celebration of the jubilee will also include particular attention to the staggering burden of poverty in the world's poorest countries and in the hidden pockets of our own society.

As we celebrate the millennium with our jubilee, remember that the calculation of our calendar, according to most scholars, is based on a mistake. The actual birth of Jesus Christ occurred some 2004 or 2006 years ago. Yes, the turning of the calendar into a new millennium is an appropriate time of celebration. But that calendar mistake by some scribes so many centuries ago also points to a theological truth. The Risen Christ who went before his disciples into Galilee is already ahead of us in the new millennium. Christ is calling us to join him in his jubilee that has already begun for those who live in his presence.

This dear old diocese, as it was called 100 years ago, is blessed with unity when the temptations for division are strong. Our congregations are missionary outposts of Christ's love and centers for equipping all the baptized for witness in His name. We are in continuity with a faithful tradition. We are summoned to respond to the unique requirements of our own generation with changes that will make the gospel alive and afresh in new circumstances. And we are challenged, personally and as a church, to enter the future grateful for our past, and open to the Christ who has already gone before us into the future to open that future for us.

Fifteen years ago next Thursday, the Council elected me Bishop Coadjutor of this diocese. They have been years of growth and challenge for which I am deeply thankful.

Now, with a new millennium and a new century before us, with a staff of vision and energy, with supportive episcopal colleagues and with a diocese united in Christ, I look forward to our future together with thanksgiving for you, confidence in you, and with the commitment to serve Christ in you with all that I am and all that I have.

At the conclusion of Bishop Lee's Pastoral Address, Council convened into discussion groups. Following discussion groups, Council recessed for a 30-minute break and reconvened at 11:30 a.m.

Upon reconvening, Bishop Lee introduced Ecumenical Guests to the 204th Annual Council:

The Rev. Joe Vought, representing Bishop Richard Bansemer of the Virginia Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America; Dr. David Jarvis, District Superintendent of the Arlington District of the United Methodist Church representing Bishop Joseph E. Pennel Jr.; the Rev. James F. McDonald, General Minister of the Virginia Council of Churches; the Rev. Charles Faul of Church of the Holy Apostles, Virginia Beach representing Bishop Walter Sullivan of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Richmond; and Ms. Phebe Hoff, co-chair of the diocesan Ecumenical-Interfaith Committee.

Bishop Lee then introduced Mr. Joseph Paxton, Emmanuel, Harrisonburg and vice president of the Executive Board for the report of the Executive Board.

Report of the Executive Board—Mr. Joseph Paxton

Bishop Lee, Bishops Jones and Gray, distinguished guest, ladies and gentlemen. It has been an honor to have the opportunity to serve as Region XIV's representative to the Executive Board for the past three years. I would like to thank the members of the Executive Board for permitting me to serve this past year as its vice president. I know I speak for many past vice presidents that this position gives you the opportunity to fully appreciate the leadership and guidance provided by our bishops. The congregations that comprise the Diocese of Virginia should be thankful for the dedication and service provided by the lay management team that works with our bishops and the staff. To Happy, Mike, Henry, Patrick and Boyd, thank you for what you do for our diocese and for the assistance that you have given to me.

The Executive Board acts for Council in between the meetings of Council. This past year has brought many exciting challenges for us as we look forward to meeting the vision laid out in Virginia Plan 2000. In the next few minutes, I will give you an overview of the activities of the Board during 1998.

One of the most rewarding tasks for the Board is the opportunity to hear about and approve grants from the Diocesan Fund for Human Need. During this past year, the DFHN Grant Board approved \$5,000 grants for a downtown church's parish nurse ministry in Winchester, the formation of an after-school program for middle schoolers in the Woodbridge area, assistance for the Sudanese refugee resettlement program in Alexandria, and an interim housing project in the Madison County area. The use of this fund allows "us" to reach into many parts of our diocese and provide direct support for outreach opportunities.

The Board has seen our diocese continue to thrive and grow, as we authorized \$100,000 from the funds remaining at the end of 1997 for the purchase of a future church site for Christ the Redeemer in Centreville. In a truly innovative action to meet the special needs of a proposed mission, we authorized a five-year lease for 6,236 square feet of commercial space in Kingstowne to be used for Church of the Spirit, and set aside \$150,000 from the New Missions Fund to help form the new mission. Also, we received a report that Church of the Spirit received \$75,000 from the Falls Church to assist in start-up costs. We also received the exciting news that land had been purchased for Church of the Cross north of Airport Road in Albemarle County, and that Church of the Apostles had acquired a larger site for its church in the Braddock Road/Fairfax Parkway area.

Late this past year, the Board approved refinancing the note issued in 1994 for the renovation of our Shrine Mont properties significantly reducing the interest rate on the outstanding indebtedness, and authorized support for the borrowing of an additional \$250,000 to develop and construct new camp facilities on the hill behind the lake across from the main Orkney building, and continuing the renovation program for the cottages around the circle up the hill. This action will allow us to expand our Christian education program opportunities for youth and adults in the Diocese. Our diocese continues to thrive and grow.

In mission outside of our diocese and in keeping with actions of the 203rd Annual Council,

we authorized the payment of \$2,306 to the churches in Burma and \$20,758 to the Diocese of Renk in the Sudan.

On a more administrative note, the Executive Board, along with the finance staff Mike Kerr and Joy Buzzard, continue to work to provide a health insurance program for our churches. In December, we approved the change of health care insurance administrators from Aetna/US Healthcare to Cigna. Mike and Joy should be thanked by all for the yeoman's job of completing this task with minimal interruptions being felt by those covered.

Finally, I leave for last the Board's involvement with staff changes over the past year. In March, we met with mixed feelings the news that "our" Bishop Matthews would be leaving us to take a position as Director of the Office of Pastoral Development for the House of Bishops. We were excited for his opportunity and the call to serve the larger church, but saddened that we would lose the opportunity to continue to interact and receive the benefit of his wisdom on a more day-to-day basis. But with change brings opportunity, and with guidance from Bishop Lee, the Board restructured the 1998 budget to fund three positions. I am sure that Bishop Matthews always knew it would take more than one person to replace him. This restructuring allows us to continue with a college of three bishops and provides added support to allow us to reach for the vision set forth in Virginia Plan 2000 which stresses development of youth ministry and revitalizing and developing our existing congregations.

To that end, we have since learned that the Rev. Percy Grant has been called to fill the position of Assistant to the Bishop for Youth Development and the Rev. Tony Pompa the position of Assistant to the Bishop for Congregational and Ministry Development. In the very short time that I have had the opportunity to work with both of these persons, I have found them to be very enthusiastic, hard-working and ready to challenge us to meet the goals we have set for ourselves in the 21st century. I ask you to support them and challenge them to assist you and your congregation. I am sure that they will welcome your call.

Also, this past year we learned that Sarah Reiners Bartenstein would leave her diocesan position as Executive for Communication and Liturgical Events, a position she has held for 12 years, to take on a new challenge as Director of Communications for Central Virginia Public Broadcasting. Sarah was a fixture around Mayo House and will be missed. The diocese is fortunate to be able to have Patrick Getlein to step into this position, and the Bishop has reorganized to move him into the position of Assistant to the Bishop for Communications.

The final change which involved the Board this past year was to meet the challenge recommended by the Bishop and approved by a special meeting of Council on September 19 to create and fund the position of Assistant Bishop. The Board, based on the recommendation of the Working Group on Budget, met this challenge and the revised 1998 budget reflected this change. With the recent history of the wonderful contribution made to the life of this diocese by Bishop Atkinson, it was not a challenge that met resistance. I was pleased to meet with Bishop Gray during the past three weeks and I will miss the opportunity to work more closely with you as a member of the Executive Board. However, on behalf of the Board welcome to Virginia. We know that you will find this diocese to be warm, receptive and challenging.

In closing, this past year has been a busy one for the Executive Board, one in which we hope that the actions of the Board will help to facilitate the priorities that we have set for ourselves in Virginia Plan 2000. The Board has reviewed the work of the task force created by Bishop Lee to study resolution R-1 (sa) adopted by the 203rd Annual Council and unanimously supports the resolution included in your pre-Council packet as R-7, which reaffirms and strengthens the Virginia Plan of Proportionate Giving as the means by which parishes determine their giving to the Diocese.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Paxton and introduced Mr. Michael J. Kerr for the report of the Chief Financial Officer.

Report of the Chief Financial Officer—Mr. Michael J. Kerr

Thank you Bishop Lee. Ladies and gentlemen of Annual Council, I take great pleasure in being able to present to you the continued good news that I reported to you at the Special Council in Richmond.

Enclosed in your Council registration materials is a financial packet that has been printed on goldenrod paper.

Included in this packet is:

- the unaudited income statement for the Diocese of Virginia as of 12/31/98, as current through January 27, 1999.
- the parish pledge report as of January 27, 1999 and
- the parish audit report as of January 27, 1999

The parochial report listing is not included, but Bishop Lee reminded me those reports from 1999 are still outstanding.

Mr. Joe Paxton, Chair of the Budget Committee, will be presenting the proposed 1999 budget tomorrow.

Working from back to front, the parish audit report shows the current report year (1997), as well as the prior four years. We have had very good responses in the prior four years, but have seen a tailing off in the submission of these annual reports for 1997. They are required by canon, and are supposed to be received by the diocesan office by August 31.

Please note that since January 27, 1997, audits have been received from Immanuel Churchon-the-Hill, Alexandria; Christ Church, Charlottesville; and St. David's Church, Ashburn.

Since the revision of the internal audit form two years ago, I have been very impressed with the work that parishes have done in terms of physical property inventories, updating church trustees, and modifying investment policies. Contrary to popular belief, these efforts are not a waste of your time. All persons involved in this work are strengthening your church for the future.

The diocesan audit is soon to be underway with the preliminary fieldwork starting on February 15. It's very hip and trendy to mention Y2K (year 2000), so I will. Since we deal with thousands of fund and sub-fund accounts among the diocese and various diocesan corporations, I felt I should assure the Annual Council that our accounting software is Y2K compliant, and we do not expect any glitches.

The pledge report is included as of January 27, and to update this even further, please make note of the following pledges:

Church of the Spirit, Kingstowne, \$750 St. Paul's', Haymarket, \$200 St. Peter's, Purcellville, \$5,000 The Cathedral Shrine of the Transfiguration, Orkney Springs, \$6,000

Total pledges represent an increase of just under 10 percent from 1998, with just 16 pledges outstanding. I applaud the response of all of the churches responding to the Bishop's request. I truly feel this diocese is being called to do great things for Virginia, the greater Church and the world.

Now, to the financial section. Many of you have seen this report before. This first five pages reflect the past two years' pledging information for all of the churches in the Ddiocese, region by region. You can see at the bottom of page five that pledge income exceeded what the budget planned for by \$90,000 and other income exceeded the plan by over \$60,000. In total, income exceeded plan by \$153,862.

On the expense side, some diocesan staffing was not filled, and we did not fill other positions until 1999. These staff savings and some non-incurred budgeted program funds combine for \$225,756.

So, if you do the math (and page nine saves you the trouble), you end up with \$379,618 of 1998 money prior to audit. The Budget Committee, in consultation with Bishop Lee, has been working on a variety of proposals to present to Annual Council taking into account the diocesan priorities and the response of those attending the five pre-council meetings.

Finally, two additional items to bring to your attention.

The first is to let you know that the Diocese of Virginia is engaged in a pilot program with the Dioceses of New York and Atlanta for the creation of a national payroll program. This pilot is in cooperation with ADP, the largest payroll processor in the world, and the Church Pension Group, and it will be active on April 1, 1999. I would like to thank the four churches that agreed to walk blindly with me. They are the Church of the Cross, Charlottesville, the Falls Church in Falls Church, St. Margaret's, Woodbridge, and Ware Church, Gloucester. They will join the Roslyn Conference Center and the diocesan office in the pilot.

The second is a reminder and shameless plug for this afternoon's workshop, "Trifecta," which will be held in the chapel in the Lake Thoreau Room and not at Laurel Racetrack as I heard someone say last night. "Trifecta" will cover three ways in which a church makes use of or plans for the use of the money entrusted to it. We will be covering the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Trustees of the Funds and Planned Giving programs.

If anyone has any questions, audits or pledges, please find me either at a break, the diocesan office across the hall or call my room and we can set a time to meet in the next

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I would like to express the staff's thanks to you all. It is a pleasure to serve this diocese.

Thank you Bishop Lee. This concludes my report.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Kerr and introduced the Very Rev. E. Allen Coffey for the report of the diocesan Standing Committee.

Report of the Standing Committee—The Very Rev. E. Allen Coffey

Bishop Lee, members of Council and distinguished guests, I bring a report on the work of the Standing Committee in the last year and on the Standing Committee's vision of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

It's hard to imagine what serving on the Standing Committee is like until you're actually involved. I have a story that has helped me to understand this ministry.

An Irishman and Englishman met each other one day when each was out walking his respective pet. The Irishman said that he thought his Wolfhound could take the Englishman's pet and inquired what it was. The Englishman said it was a long-nosed, long-tailed, short-legged terrier. The Irishman said it was a fierce looking animal. "What did you say it was again?" The Englishman said it was a long-nosed, long-tailed, short-legged terrier. "Okay," the Irishman said, let's let them have at each other. What's that beast of yours called again?" He's a long-nosed, long-tailed, short-legged terrier," the Englishman said.

Well, these beasts went at each other but in a matter of seconds there was nothing left of the Irish Wolfhound. The Irishman said, "Wow, what's that animal called again?" The Englishman replied, "It's a long-nosed, long-tailed, short-legged terrier. Some people around here call it an alligator."

That punch line really puts that whole story in perspective and suddenly jumps into focus. In a similar way, serving on the Standing Committee puts the various aspects of the church—parochial, diocesan, national and international—in perspective and focus.

First, I want to ask the members of the Standing Committee to stand when I call each one's name and to remain standing until I've finished. I want you to see who we are from all around the diocese: Mr. Roy Barksdale, Mrs. Martha High, Mrs. Liz Parlett, Mr. Tom Rohr, Ms. Cynthia Roscoe, Mr. Maurice Spraggins, the Rev. Grace Cangialosi is recuperating from knee surgery and is not present, the Rev. Bill Brake, the Rev. Sue Eaves, the Rev. Rick Greenwood, and the Rev. Doug McCaleb. Mr. Spraggins, Mrs. Parlett, Mr. Greenwood and I all complete our terms at the end of this Council. This is as dedicated a group of people as I've ever worked with in terms of their commitment to Christ and the Church. You have chosen well in electing them. When I came on the Standing Committee in 1996, attendance was poor and erratic at meetings of the Standing Committee. In the last year, it has been consistent and good with 100 percent attendance the rule not the exception.

We have carried out our duties to the best of our abilities. We have consented to the ordination and consecration of eight persons to be bishops of the church; consented to several Episcopal elections; a highlight of the year was consent to the Bishop's request to select an assistant bishop, to his calling of a special session of Council to approve, and finally interviewing and unanimously consenting to the Bishop's appointment of the Rt.

Rev. Francis Campbell Gray to be Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Virginia; consented to the ceding of territory from the Diocese of Arizona to the Diocese of San Diego, supported the Bishop's request to constitute Church of the Spirit in Kingstowne as a mission of the Diocese; supported the Bishop's request to return three churches to mission status; consented to the request of four churches to incur indebtedness; nominated a slate for election by this Council to the ecclesiastical trial court; consented to the Bishop's nominations of the deans of the regions who take office at the close of this Council; approved two persons for candidacy for Holy Orders; and consented to ordination to the diaconate of nine persons.

Those were the diverse duties canonically required of the Standing Committee since this Council met last year.

We have also engaged in the task of reviewing the ministry of our diocese in its various aspects. Of particular concern to us has been the process of review leading to our deciding on whether a church or institution of the Diocese may incur indebtedness. The guidelines issued when J. B. Burtch served as president several years ago, were reviewed, expanded somewhat, and reissued last summer. A primary feature of these new guidelines is a financial review either by the Diocesan Missionary Society (if a loan is to be sought from that organization of the Church) or by a new review committee appointed by the Bishop that is to consist of experienced bankers and the chief financial officer of the diocese—both these groups enable the Standing Committee to review the larger picture and be more effective as we represent the whole Diocese in this process. Two recent requests for indebtedness approval by the Church of the Holy Cross, Dunn Loring and by St. John's Church in McLean fulfilled completely our hopes for how this important and serious process should be conducted.

We also noted with no small degree of sadness the departure of our senior Bishop Suffragan, the Rt. Rev. Frank Clayton Matthews, to become the Director of the Office of Pastoral Development of the House of Bishops; and the departure of senior lay staff member Mrs. Sarah Reiners Bartenstein who left the fold for new employment in the secular world. On behalf of the whole Diocese, we expressed to Bishop Matthews and to Mrs. Bartenstein our sadness at their departures, our gratitude for their many years of ministry in our midst, and our joy at their new opportunities for ministry and service to our Lord.

Finally, in regard to the ordination process which is such a large part of the focus of the Standing Committee, Bishop Lee described this Standing Committee as having been "flexing its muscle." We have understood our role to be unique from that of the Parish Ordination Committees, and unique from that of the Diocesan Commission on Ministry which does a truly incredible amount of work in this area, and unique from that of the Bishop. We have begun what is an ongoing dialogue with the Bishop and the Commission on Ministry in the hope that we may make even better an already fine process of discernment. We do have serious concerns, however, about pastoral aspects of the ordination process and about its complexity—concerns that we know are shared by the Bishop and the Commission on Ministry. The Standing Committee is committed to continuing the dialogue and to assisting in refining this ministry even more.

I want to conclude with a personal note of gratitude to you for electing me three years ago to this ministry which I have found thoroughly interesting and challenging and fun; with thanks to my 11 colleagues on the Standing Committee for their dedication and

commitment, especially to Martha High who has served so ably as our secretary in the past year; and to Bishop Lee for his wisdom and sensitive pastoral care that he has shared so willingly with me in the last year which has not been an easy one for me personally. I thank God for being able to serve in this great diocese under the leadership of a great bishop. And I thank you.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Coffey for his report. He then introduced several visitors to Council: The Rt. Rev. Simon Chiwanga, Bishop of the Diocese of Mpwapwa, Tanzania, in the Anglican Church of Tanzania; the Rt. Rev. William Rukirande, Bishop of the Diocese of Kigezi in the Anglican Church in Uganda; the Rt. Rev. Kenneth Barham, Bishop of the Diocese of Cyangugu, Rwanda in the Episcopal Church of the Province of Rwanda; and Mr. Thomas H. Hart, director of the Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations, Washington, D.C..

He also noted that the evening deliberative meetings of the committees will be "in closed session" to permit free discussion among committee members.

Council reconvened at 2:30 p.m.

Bishop Lee recognized clergy who have retired in the past year: the Rev. Ellin Deese, Buck Mountain, Earlysville; and the Rev. John Hatcher, St. Anne's, Reston.

Ecumenical Presentation

Bishop Lee introduced the Rev. Charles Sydnor of the diocesan Ecumenical-Interfaith Commission for a presentation on behalf of the Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical Officers organization.

Mr. Sydnor recognized Ms. Phebe Hoff and presented her with the first Episcopal Officer's Award with the following citation:

Be it known by these Presents, that the first Episcopal Officer's Award is hereby bestowed on our beloved sister Phebe Margaret Hoff for her extraordinary leadership in ecumenism for our Episcopal Church spanning over 50 years.

Beginning in the Diocese of Virginia as Ecumenical Relations Chair of the Episcopal Church Women, followed by state Presidency of

Church Women United, her exceptional gifts were recognized in serving on the national Board of Managers of Church Women United.

As visionary pioneer with the Consultation on Church Union, she served on its commissions including: Generating Communities, Interim Eucharistic Fellowship; and as Consultation adjunct staff and Episcopal delegate to multiple COCU plenaries.

Phebe was "founding mother" of EDEO, attending the first Annual Meeting in 1975 and every subsequent meeting to date. Her knowledge and commitment were affirmed with successive terms on EDEO's Executive Committee including vice presidency.

On behalf of EDEO, she has offered gracious hospitality to ecumenical guests at numerous General Conventions. Her contributions to our national Church include two terms on our Standing Committee on Ecumenical Relations with one as vice chair.

In her own diocese, Phebe continues her respected and effective leadership as co-chair of its Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission and Lay Ecumenical Officer, positions held since their inception. She also functions as Cabinet member of the Virginia Council of Churches (VCC) and member of VCC's Faith and Order Commission, member of the state LARC Committee and consultant to the Ecumenical Commission of the Catholic Diocese of Richmond. She was recipient of VCC's 1994 Faith in Action Award given to those who exemplify the faith and ability to build bridges to make human community possible.

With profound gratitude for her cherished presence among us and the larger church, and her inspiring example that ecumenism is about faithful relationships given in our unity in Christ Jesus, this award is presented on the 27th day of April, 1998 at the 24th Annual Meeting of EDEO, St. Paul, Minnesota.

Ms. Hoff accepted the award and made the following brief remarks to Council: "Don't begrudge the time you spend with your neighbor across the street or your neighbor in a different church. This is some of the most important ministry you do. Friends and building relationships are what comprise the Kingdom of God."

Council rose to its feet and offered an extended ovation to Ms. Hoff.

Bishop Lee thanked Ms. Hoff for her service in the field of ecumenism. He then introduced the Rev. James Papile for a report on the Rainbow Youth Mission Trip to the Diocese of Christ the King, South Africa.

Mr. Papile recognized three youth who spoke about the transformtional experience of participating in the mission trip: Ms. Christina Mansilla, La Iglesia de Cristo Rey, Arlington; Mr. Adam White, St. Phillip's, Richmond; and Mr. Brand Rodenberg, St. Paul's, Alexandria. In addition to his comments, Mr. Rodenberg offered the following prayer: "Your love knows no divisions, no borders, no boundaries. We come before you to ask your blessings on our brothers and sisters who live their lives and strive to do your will in South Africa. Life them up that they may see clearly that their witness to your love inspires and strengthens our efforts to live into the promise of your love."

Mr. Papile concluded the presentation by announcing the group's intent to raise funds to host a group of 10 youth from the Diocese of Christ the King in the summer of 1999.

Bishop Lee thanked the Youth Mission Team members for their report and introduced Ms. Ann Mingledorff, president of the diocesan Episcopal Church Women, for her report.

Report of the Episcopal Church Women—Ms. Ann Mingledorff

Thank you, Bishop Lee. My brothers and sisters in Christ, it is a great joy to bring you greetings, once again, from the largest organization in the Diocese of Virginia, the Episcopal Church Women. The women who do the work of the ECW in this diocese have been extremely fruitful this past year, and I would like to share with you briefly what some of the highlights have been.

Our new mission statement adopted last August states, "The Episcopal Church Women in the Diocese of Virginia, together, share the love of God through prayer, service and education in knowing Christ and in making Him known." We have worked hard on producing a new brochure that further describes who we are and what we do. It is available for the first time today, and I invite you to stop by the ECW table to see it. Our goal is to make it available as soon as possible to all churches.

Another new venture has been the adoption by the ECW of St. Andrew's School, a largely unknown Episcopal school offering tuition-free education to about 100 low-income children in the Oregon Hill section of Richmond. To St. Andrew's, to the Jackson-Feild Home for Girls, to many other missions both in and out of our diocese, the ECW has given thousands upon thousands of dollars this past year.

Undoubtedly, one of our greatest joys was to send a travel team of four women to the Diocese of Christ the King for two weeks in October. The ECW is privileged to have a close friendship with the women of the Diocesan Women's Project there, the umbrella group for the Mothers Union and the Anglican Women's Fellowship. It seems most appropriate at this time to introduce Gladys Lewis, co-chair of the ECW South African Partnership Committee to summarize the trip for you.

Ms. Lewis began her report:

As the travel team prepared for our visit to the Diocese of Christ the King, South Africa, we accepted the following challenges:

- to be open-minded to God's direction
- to have prayer time each day; and
- to keep a constant focus on our ministry of presence.



We expressed interest in:

- attending Mothers Union Meetings
- visiting schools, especially at Orange Farm
- learning of the ministry-in-action that meets the needs of women and children
- · viewing displays of diocesan women's projects
- sharing and hearing the women's stories

During our two-week visit, we were pleased to learn that our ministry of prayers, correspondence and monetary gifts have supported numerous projects. Through the Diocesan Women's Project, women have been able to purchase sewing machines, overlockers, fabric, computers and juice-making equipment. The team marveled at the success of newly learned job skills and at the difference they are making in women's lives.

We received a heart-warming and joyous welcome when we visited churches in informal settlements and townships. What a moving and humbling experience that was for us. We met women who have made giant steps toward self-sufficiency in the face of massive problems with both deep faith and determination. Their gift to us was the gift of God's love.

Four women left the U. S. on a mission to the Diocese of Christ the King with many expectations, but discovered during the two weeks that they were on a spiritual journey. We reached into the depths of our souls for strength and prayers that helped us to meet our challenges. Deeper truths were learned about God's love and how many ways it is manifested in our lives and others.

We were able to fulfill all our interests beyond our expectations. This spiritual journey was awesome and memorable.

Our sisters in South Africa still need our help. The challenges are great and the resources limited, but through strong faith and will, the people press on and work for a better future in a new South Africa.

God Bless South Africa. Please take a moment to visit our exhibit.

Bishop Lee thanked Ms. Mingledorff and and Ms. Lewis, introduced Mr. Thomas H. Hart of the Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations in Washington, D.C.

Report of the Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations—Mr. Thomas H. Hart

Thank you very much, Bishop Lee, and to you of the Diocese of Virginia, for the privilege of speaking to you this afternoon.

I am the newly appointed Director of Government Relations for the National Episcopal Church. I have been with the office for four years and before that worked for the U.S. Senate on Capitol Hill.

The Office of Government Relations for the National [Episcopal] Church, which is located right across the street from the U.S. Capitol, is charged with carrying forward the public

policy positions of the Church's General Convention to the U.S. government, the Congress, the White House, various departments, and the diplomatic community. We function in much the same way as other advocacy groups in Washington. We meet directly with members of Congress and the Administration. We work with the media. We build coalitions of both religious and secular interest groups to further the Church's positions. And we recruit and mobilize a nationwide grassroots network of Episcopalians, like you, to influence their elected leaders. I encourage all of you to join the Episcopal Public Policy Network and help us carry forward the voice of the Church to your elected representatives. Membership is absolutely free—part of your commitment to the national church at work for you.

Let me quickly tell you about a bill in which we were heavily involved last year, a bill to combat religious persecution abroad. The gentleman who will follow me at this podium, Mr. Abel Alier from Sudan, will express to you far more eloquently than I could the pain and suffering experienced by people in many parts of the world because of their faith. So I will leave to him to express the passion behind this issue and stick to the legislative work we have done.

We pushed for a bill that would improve monitoring and reporting on religious persecution by creating a new office in the State Department. We wanted to ensure that religious communities were consulted about their experience, so that people like Mr. Alier had a place to go to tell their stories and recommend U.S. response. We wanted to ensure that with this better information the U.S. would respond in some manner, giving the President a range of options from which to choose. We wanted better training of immigration officials and embassy officials to recognize religious persecution and assist those who suffer from it.

We were very pleased to provide an opportunity for an Anglican bishop from Pakistan, whom many of you know, Bishop Mano Rumalshah from the Diocese of Peshawar, to testify before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. We also brought the strength of the Anglican Communion's presence throughout the world particularly the strong statements of Lambeth Conference on religious freedom—to bear in support of this important legislation.

It won't surprise you to know that, like every bill, there was opposition and serious questions raised, such as, is this the right way to deal with this issue and how will this affect our trade relationships? At one point in the debate, the lead senator called to say the bill was dead or at least on serious life support.

But instead of folding our tents and going home, we took the challenge and built a broad coalition of religious organizations to support the bill. The coalition included several mainline churches, in which I include ourselves, the Lutherans, and Methodists, the reform and orthodox Jewish communities, Roman Catholics and our partners in the more conservative evangelical community, such as the Christian Coalition and Southern Baptist Convention. By our guess, over 80 percent of the church and synagogue-going public were represented.

And with this coalition, a little political savvy and a lot of prayer in the closing days of the congressional session, the House of Representatives and Senate passed the bill without a single vote in opposition. The President signed it a few weeks later.

I think this process was one of those moments when the Episcopal Church was at its best. We carried forward the voice of our Anglican brothers and sisters to the highest levels of our government. We built bridges across ideological lines and political parties. We stood for principles but pushed for pragmatic, workable solutions. And I hope we made, and will continue to make, a difference in people's lives.

As we look forward to the next couple of years, I hope we can do it again, particularly carrying forward the concerns expressed by Lambeth about the heavy international debts on impoverished countries. I am very pleased to be working with Bishop Lee on this issue, and seek your help and support as we continue our work in the government relations office.

Thank you.

Mr. Hart then introduced the Hon. Abel Alier, former Vice President of Sudan, to address council and bring greetings in the name of the Christian churches there.

Mr. Alier thanked members of Council and the Diocese of Virginia and spoke about the bleak situation facing the Sudanese, particularly Sudanese Christians, describing in detail the horrifying conditions in the refugee camps. He credited religious persecution in his country, however, with creating the the rising strength of the church there. "If it were not for the heavy hand of government in Khartoum," he said, "the Christian church might not have been able to live up to its obligation." The church, he said, has grown "100 times" during this time of persecution.

Mr. Alier gave thanks for the continuing and developing relationships with churches in the Dicoese of Virginia formed largely out of a visit to Sudan in 1997 by a seven-member mission team from the Diocese of Virginia. That visit, he said, filled us with the Spirit of the Holy Ghost," The relationships, he said, "show us many dimensions of what the world Christian community can do."

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Hart and Mr. Alier for their remarks. He then introduced four senior seminarians: Mr. Jonathan Clodfelter, presented by St. Clement's, Alexandria; Mr. Chris Ditzenberger, presented by The Falls Church, Falls Church; Ms. Janet McDonald, presented by Buck Mountain Church, Earlysville; Ms. Lin Walton, presented by The Falls Church, Falls Church.

Bishop Lee then recessed Council into workshops, followed by a celebration of the Holy Eucharist and an evening Ministries Reception.

The 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia February 6, 1999

Call to Order

Bishop Lee called Council to order at 9 a.m. and called on Bishop Jones to lead Council in a meditation.

Meditation—Bishop Jones

Nothing like this had ever happened before. It was not part of the plan. It just happened spontaneously. There was no committee meeting, no review of the change in policy, not even a memorandum from headquarters. Men from Cyprus and Cyrene had just begun preaching to the Greeks.

It just was assumed that the Greeks would not be interested, were too far from the faith, had not been properly prepared to receive the messiah. They certainly were not the chosen people of Israel. But there they were, enthusiastically responding to the good news of salvation.

What was extraordinary was the ease with which the Antioch mission was accomplished. The gentiles seemed to sense the truth about God. Their hearts appeared to be open to the good news. It seemed like the hand of the Lord was with those men from Cyprus and Cyrene.

The news of these developments caused quite a stir. Headquarters (or shall I call it Mayo House?) sent Barnabas to investigate. He was able to confirm the goodness of this mission when he arrived. A new strategy was unfolding faster than the apostles could plan it because the hand of the Lord was with the Gentile mission. Barnabas was able to affirm the work of God.

Does this not explain the meaning of Psalm 127:1 which says, "Unless the Lord builds the house, their labor is in vain who build it"? The Antioch mission was successful because the church was able to hear and to follow the inspiration of God.

The same principle is true this morning as we consider resolutions, canonical and constitutional changes, and a budget. If the hand of the Lord is with us, our work will be accomplished with ease. We pray, therefore, for the hand of the Lord, the leading of the Spirit of God.

Your bishops are privileged to see numerous examples of God's blessing and inspiration as we visit congregations. We see living examples of evangelistic ministry, community outreach, and international mission. We see new and creative strategies, which are inspired by the hand of God. I wish that each of you could see what I have been privileged to see these past three years. The hand of God is with us.

But I do not always perceive an appreciation of what God is doing—over there. I am dismayed when I am asked, "Why don't they?" Often, we assume how things are supposed to be based on our own experience and we fail to listen. Might God be calling each of us to a new understanding of mission which is greater than anything we have ever imagined? How great might God's vision actually be for the Diocese of Virginia?

Bishop Lee has held before us a vision of unity, love, and witness and has suggested that we measure our efforts in light of those values. This is the very time to do just that! Today, the 204th Annual Council will speak. Our actions will be recorded. Our missionary initiatives will be funded. The very life of the Church will be affected by our decisions. Let us seek the hand of the Living God.

Bishop Lee then called on Ms. Helen Zebarth for the report of the Diocesan Fund for Human Need.

Report of the Diocsan Fund for Human Need—Ms. Helen Zebarth

Bishop Lee, Bishop Jones, Bishop Gray, Honored Guests, Delegates, it is my pleasure to give to you a quick report on 10 years of this fund's work.

From our first grant in 1989, awarded to Christ Church, Brandy Station for its Racoon Ford Project for children in trouble, to our latest, awarded Sept. 28 to St. Paul's, Alexandria to fund the Sudanese Refugee Resettlement Aid Program, the Diocesan Fund for Human Need has provided funding support for more than 92 projects through the 185 congregations of the Diocese of Virginia. Projects have included a Women's Resource Center through St. George's, Pine Grove; Early Learning for Needy Children through Piedmont Church, Madison; the VCU Campus Ministry and James Madison University Campus Ministry; and the Gloucester-Mathews Free Clinic through Abingdon Church, White Marsh, programs that connect the Church in Virginia to the need of God's people here and around the world. Grants to date total over \$407,000.

Let me read for you an excerpt from a recent newsletter of the Gloucester-Mathews Free Clinic: "We have had many successes at the Gloucester-Mathews Free Clinic. Here are three stories that exemplify an evening at the clinic. Last summer a mother brought her toddler in for a respiratory infection. The doctor noted a developmental problem that made him eligible for additional services that the family was unaware of. In September a young woman made an appointment to have a digestive problem taken care of. While here she mentioned a breast lump. She was referred to a surgeon and then to an oncologist who takes our patients. Without the Free Clinic, this woman may have waited too long. Just last week a 31-year-old man who was having trouble buying his supplies to monitor his blood sugar came in to see if we could help. We could, but we also found that he had dangerously high blood pressure. He now has both conditions under control."

But the Fund is more than a charity conduit to support "good works." The goal of the Fund is to inspire, encourage and coordinate hands-on outreach in the local parish. Congregations in the Diocese, not outside organizations, apply for grants. The vestry of the church that applies for the grant must pass a resolution acknowledging its support and

pledging accountability for the expenditure of the grant. And no project receives funding that does not have the full support and backing of the congregation. Typically, grants are one-time-only seed funds that match dollars and/or volunteer hours contributed by the congregation.

Money given to the Fund comes from a variety of sources throughout the Diocese including churches, regions, individuals, and, often penny-by-penny, from children. There is even one person, Patrick Getlein tells me, that visits the Bishop's office nearly every day and hands the receptionist \$1 "for the work of the church." That goes in, too. And since administrative costs are borne by the budget of the Diocese, 100 percent of gifts to the Fund go toward grants.

The Fund is managed by the diocesan Executive Board. Applications are reviewed by a special grants board which meets with leaders from the churches applying for funds and, if appropriate, with their partner organizations. Typically, grants don't exceed \$5,000.

The most vital thing the Fund can do, however, is help breathe life into your congregation's vision as a mission outpost of the Diocese of Virginia. If there's a special project you want to undertake, or a group your church works with wants to embark on a new program to answer a cry for help, the Fund exists for you.

Ms. Zebarth thanked Col. Harry Amos, her predecessor as chair of the DFHN grant board, for his leadership, and Mr. Patrick Getlein, diocesan Communications Director, for his work on the new brochure which she encouraged delegates and visitors to read.

Bishop Lee thanked Ms. Zebarth for her report and called on Dr. J. Kenneth McDonald for the report of the Committee on Related Organizations.

Report of the Committee on Related Organizations—Dr. J. Kenneth McDonald, chair

Mr. President, members of Council and guests, it's my privilege to offer the report of the Committee on Related Organizations. In accordance with Council's Rules of Order, this committee is charged with presenting to Council, or to the Executive Board between meetings of Council, nominations or elections for confirmation, of officers or board members of all related organizations whose basic documents require such action.

I'm sure that all of you will recall the report to the 203rd Council by the Task Group on diocesan related Organizations. That report explained that of the eight organizations that Council has approved as related to the Diocese of Virginia, Council has no role in the governance of four. This is because these four organizations' basic documents—their articles of incorporation and bylaws—establish accountability to the Diocese by providing a central *ex officio* role for the diocesan bishop. These four organizations are:

Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Virginia; Memorial Trustees—Virginia Diocesan Center; Roslyn Managers Corporation; and Shrine Mont, Inc.

The basic documents of the remaining four of the eight related organizations do establish a role for Council in their governance. Let me explain this role, so you will have some idea of what it is that you are being asked to approve in the lists that I shall present to you in

a moment.

For two of these organizations, the Diocesan Missionary Society and the Trustees of the Funds, Council must approve at least two nominees for each vacancy on their boards.

For the Virginia Diocesan Homes, Council must approve a list of nominees to fill the vacancies on its board.

For Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, Council is responsible for confirming the trustees and officers previously elected to its board.

I should also note that while Council approves lists of nominees for the first three of these organizations, not all of these nominees will be elected to these boards in the elections that follow Council.

The question sometimes arises whether designating these organizations as diocesan related and preserving these links with the diocese in governance serve a useful purpose. I would endorse the Task Group's conclusions of last year. First, this designation formally identifies these organizations as important segments in our diocesan mission. And secondly, we encourage stability and continuity in these organizations by maintaining their accountability in governance through the Bishop and Council.

Since I would like to keep my report from taking more time than the Committee spent in reaching its recommendations, let me now proceed with our motions. I ask you to refer to the revised list of nominees for Related Organizations that you received yesterday, which is part of my report. I should note that in addition to nominees for the boards of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Trustees of the Funds, and Virginia Diocesan Homes, you will find a nominee listed for the board of Bloomfield, Inc. Bloomfield is an organization designated as "Episcopally related" to this diocese, whose board nominees are not usually presented to Council. I must also note that we have received one additional nominee, Mrs. Betty K. Hart, whose name should be added to the nominees list for Trustees of the Funds.

Mr. President, I move those persons named on the revised list of nominees for Related Organizations for the boards of the Diocesan Missionary Society, the Trustees of the Funds, Virginia Diocesan Homes, and Bloomfield, Inc.

Bishop Lee noted that the motion comes from a committee of Council and requires no second. He called for discussion of the motion. Hearing none, the Bishop called for a vote on the motion. The motion was adopted on voice vote and the following persons were nominated for election accordingly:

Bishop Lee then called on Ms. Elizabeth Sedlins for the report of the diocesan Committee on the Stewardship of Creation.

Report of the Committee on the Stewardship of Creation—Ms. Elizabeth Sedlins, chair

I am delighted to be here to tell you about the diocesan Committee on the Stewardship of Creation; to highlight activities in our parishes which seek to preserve and protect God's creation—"this fragile earth, our island home;" to remind you of how these activities are central to our faith; to share with you some of the challenges that lie ahead of us; and to explain how the Committee can help parishes find ways to address them.

The committee exists primarily to help you establish a stewardship of creation ministry in your parish! To that end, we have completed a list of parish points of contact who will serve as liaison to the committee. If you don't know yours, come to our exhibit and we will tell you who it is.

To assist our contact persons, we are developing seasonal mailings—the first of this year's is a Lenten booklet of prayers, Bible verses and "action" ideas; we produce quarterly newsletters and sponsor an annual conference—pick up a brochure at our exhibit about our sixth conference, April 10 at VTS.

There are too many to list them all, but here are some examples of parish highlights:

- Outdoor sanctuary: St. Matthew's, Sterling
- Earth Day Sunday Service: Emmanuel, Middleburg

- Representatives from the Corps of Engineers and Department of Environmental Quality visited church property to teach about its wetlands: Emmanuel, Brook Hill, Richmond
- Recycling programs: many parishes, including students at VTS
- Adult Education: from St. John's, Warsaw to Christ Church, Winchester

Stewardship of God's creation is central to our faith. We believe in God the creator of all that is, "seen and unseen," of earth and all its creatures—while this is clearly and beautifully taught by the Bible, it is also taught by creation itself as Job tells us in Chapter 12:

But ask the animals, and they will teach you, or the birds of the air and they will tell you, or speak to the earth and it will teach you, or let the fish of the sea inform you. Which of these does not know that the hand of the Lord has done this? In his hand is the life of every creature and the breath of all mankind.

We believe in Jesus Christ, "the firstborn over all creation. For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible...all things were created by him and for him. He is before all things and in him all things hold together...For God was pleased to have all his fullness dwell in him, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross" as it is written in Colossians.

Bishop Lee preached at the second annual diocesan conference sponsored by this committee (not surprisingly, I'm a firm believer in recycling...and so I have "recycled" the Bishop's words many times!)—in it, he makes references to Celtic Christianity—our roots—in this way:

We are living in a time when a renewed appreciation of Celtic Christianity is bringing again into our consciousness the links of relationships between the human soul and the wonder of the earth God has made...The church's rediscovery of Celtic Christianity is an important pastoral resource as we search our tradition to deal with the reality of our place in the world...

Celtic Christians had a strong sense of the divine hand of God in creation. The catechism established by the first great saint of the Celtic Church, Ninian, makes clear that "what is best in this world," is to do the "will of our Maker." His will is that we should live according to the laws of his creation, which we learn by studying the Scriptures. And the fruit of such study? The answer here is "to perceive the eternal Word of God reflected in every plant and insect, every bird and animal, and every man and woman."

And from our own Book of Common Prayer, in our own Catechism, the first two questions and their answers are:

- Q. What are we by nature?
- A. We are part of God's creation, made in the image of God.
- Q. What does it mean to be made in the image of God?

A. It means that we are free to make choices; to love, to create, to reason, and to live in harmony with creation and with God.

Here are the challenges ahead:

- · need to engage more parishes;
- · need to link them together to address regional environmental issues; and
- need to make personal changes in how we live, BUT with a view toward celebrating the joy of abundance

To quote Bill McDonough, Dean of the School of Architecture at the University of Virginia, who addressed the annual conference sponsored by this Committee last year:

"I would posit that eco-efficiency might be one of the most terrifying prospects in the history of the world. Because if you realize what it really implies, it says that we have to wake up in the morning, feeling really *bad*. You have to spend your day trying to be better by being less bad. And your goal is *zero*. What kind of legacy is that? The problem with eco-efficiency is that it says let's try and get twice as many miles per gallon, let's try and make twice as many cardboard boxes from Indonesian trees. But it doesn't stop us from deforesting Indonesia. And it doesn't stop us from building roads. We end up with twice as many cars, getting twice as many miles per gallon. We keep going nowhere, faster.

"This is Zero's Paradox, we will never get there. Basically, we're not re-imagining the world, we're just trying to be less guilty within it. What has to happen now, and why your work is so critical to us, is that we have to imagine a new way of being. We have to understand what a sustainable world might look like, in order for us to move toward it. So instead of saying, 'I'm 100 percent bad; I'm going to try to be 90 percent bad tomorrow,' what we should say is that we're only 10 percent sustainable, tomorrow, let's try to be 11. That means we have to imagine what 100 percent good looks like. It means we have to accept the world for what it is, as a joyous, abundant place, rather than a world of destitute limits. We have to celebrate the abundance of good things...the abundance of solar energy...the abundance of species...the abundance of songbirds. We have to celebrate the abundance, instead of limits, so we can celebrate—in a spiritual way—this great drive that lets us keep getting up in the morning and having—a strategy of hope. Nature is not efficient. You don't wake up in the morning in the spring, and walk up to a cherry tree and say, 'Oh my God, how many blossoms does it take?' Nature is not efficient. But we're not afraid of those blossoms because they all go back to the soil safely to become trees again. So nature can explode with these exuberant, exciting abundances and we can celebrate them, rather than fear them. We fear human production because it's so dangerous...We want to look at a world of effectiveness...a world of joy and a world of abundance. And design into that."

Remember: Jesus said, "I have come so that you might have life, and have it abundantly."

How the Committee can help? We need to know what your parish is most interested in! For example:

- Want to offer a children's Sunday school program? We have curricula, videos and all kinds of other resources;
- Want to create a wildlife habitat on church property or an outdoor sanctuary? We can put you in touch with those who have done it;

- Want to preach on caring for God's creation, but not sure where to start?
- We have resources specifically for clergy with sample sermons, scriptural references, sources from the hymnal and BCP and audio tapes of each and every speaker from our five annual conferences!
- Want to motivate your parish with a good adult ed session? Again, we have a number of excellent resources from adult study guides to books, videos and audio tapes.
- Looking for a way to simply introduce the whole idea of Christian caring for creation? Committee members are available for presentations.
- Want to seriously address an environmental issue in your community? Consider holding a forum in your church—we can offer advice and some assistance in organizing it;
- Want to make your parish more energy efficient? We can consult with you
 regarding compact florescent light bulbs and solar panels on your church roof.
- Want to become an "Environmental Justice Covenant Congregation"? Stop by our
 display to find out how to sign up for this step-by-step program sponsored by the
 National Council of Churches.

Christian earth stewardship is a way of life...a way of being faithful to Christ...a way of praying and worshiping that includes a live of all creation. It is a way of making choices that show we see the world differently. We see it as God's holy place.

This concluded the report of the Committee on the Stewardship of Creation.

Bishop Lee thanked Ms. Sedlins for her report and called on the Rev. Susan Eaves, St. James's, Richmond for the report of the diocesan Committee on the Status of Women in Mission and Ministry.

Report of the Committee on the Status of Women in Mission and Ministry—The Rev. Susan Eaves, chair

When Bishop Lee asked me to report to Council about the diocesan Committee on Women in Mission and Ministry I had a momentary mental image of myself putting my finger into an electric outlet. However, our good bishop is merciful; he has asked me to speak only about women, not human sexuality or my prayer life.

In deciding to seek inspiration and wisdom from scripture before beginning my task I turned to the venerable book of Proverbs I and encountered the following insight about women: "Like a gold ring in a pig's snout is a beautiful woman without common sense." (Proverbs 11:22) Not a lot of guidance forthcoming there. Perhaps Council would prefer a lighter note, such as: "How many feminists does it take to change a light bulb? One, and it's not funny!"

It is no news to any of us that we live in a time of immense cultural change. As a result, last spring the Committee on Women in Mission and Ministry was convened by the Executive Board of the Diocese of Virginia. In 1997 a Task Force to determine the status of women in mission and ministry in this diocese was appointed by the Executive Board and charged by Bishop Lee to report by June 1997.

In reviewing the data, the Task Force confirmed that social change has impacted the lives of women very heavily. Unfortunately, there is an increasing gap between how the secular

world and how the church has responded to those shifts. Many of our church practices and organizations were designed for a world that no longer exists. For example, try obtaining daytime volunteers if you don't believe me.

In addition, our mindset remains largely masculine in tone and organization. The picture is further complicated by differences between generations. There was concern, expressed both by men and women, about a religious environment that fails to understand and affirm the needs of women personally, professionally, and spiritually, and thus fails to facilitate and benefit from full ministry of all women in the Body of Christ.

In response, the Executive Board established our committee, asking us to do three things: to address those spiritual and professional needs on a regular basis; to develop an experiential and listening workshop to give visibility and respect to women's perspectives and actions; and to find ways to support the significant work of the Episcopal Church Women and the Episcopal Women's Caucus

This diocese has been blessed with a particularly hard working group of men and women on this committee. In short, they are wonderful! We also have a great sense of humor. They have a deep commitment to a ministry of hospitality. That is to say, we operate on the basis that men and women are welcome in and essential to this conversation and that we will be the poorer should that not occur. We would like to move beyond the level of formally or legislatively mandated relationships and enter into the heart of our fears about each other, to confront our mutual confusions, and become able to honor the lives of women with our whole heart.

Our first endeavor is the offering of a workshop at the Parish Leadership Training Event at Roslyn in March entitled, "A Place in the Church: Telling the Story of Women, in Prayer, Relationship, and Leadership. We are immensely privilege to have Pamela Chinnis, the first woman to be president of the House of Deputies, as our keynote speaker. This workshop is, of course, open to men and women as we share our experience of the work of the Holy Spirit in the lives of the women of God's household.

In process is an interactive learning workshop which takes a fresh look at who women are. The focus will be Jesus' way of dealing with the women he encountered in his ministry and how those women and men responded to that encounter. By entering the biblical story we hope to become sensitive to our deepest attitudes, beliefs, and behaviors. When completed the workshop will be offered by trained facilitators throughout the diocese.

We have also begun exciting conversations to discover how best we might support and uphold the ministries of the ECW and EWC. We want to hear from you all. Please contact us with ideas, concerns or questions. Come to our events. Visit our table on the mezzanine. We are fortunate to be in a diocese that encourages the ministry of women and is faithful in its growth into that task.

Mary Magdalene came to know Jesus when he called upon her by name in the Garden of Resurrection. As we seek to become persons to each other, it is our hope that we can join them in the garden of knowing. A garden where we welcome the fullness of life and joy in each and every person, so we may call upon each other by name.

Bishop Lee thanked Ms. Eaves for her report and called on the Rev. Pierce Klemmt, Christ Church, Alexandria for a report of the diocesan Committee on Race Relations.

Report of the Committee on Race Relations—The Rev. Pierce Klemmt

My friends in Christ, the 1972 General Convention commissioned each diocese to foster dialogue to address the national sin of racism in our land. Subsequently, Bishop Lee established a Race Relations Committee. Over time, with prayer and the able guidance of the Rev. Bill Brake, Jill Wood, Marge and Cecil Robinson, Maurice Spraggins, Betty and Frank Hart, Gladys Lewis, Donna Constant, Joe Royster and others, diocesan sponsored racism workshops were born.

Bishop Lee has written, "Racism remains a stain on our life in Virginia," and invited us with his colleagues in the House of Bishops to "strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being. Recognizing that we are part of a body that is infected with racism, our spiritual health is endangered. While progress has been made, still our times are shaped by persistent and pervasive racism, an evil that clings so closely that it seems to be part of our very flesh."

Mindful of the evil of racism, in the winter of 1998, representatives from two congregations in Alexandria began to talk. One generally black congregation began conversation with one generally white congregation. They discovered that before the Civil War they were one congregation, however unequal that was lived, but that during Reconstruction they separated, and eventually the remaining black members of Christ Church were transferred to Meade Memorial Church, and the handful of white members at Meade were transferred to Christ Church with the stroke of each rector's pen.

This division has persisted. In fact, the relations between these two churches have mirrored our nation's racial history: While legal segregation has ended, racial isolation has remained.

To break the long years of silence and isolation, to reach for the vision of new community and the invaluable experience of the church that comes from encountering difference, and to heal generations of neglect, a diocesan sponsored racism workshop was proposed between the two congregations. During the day, I know we all caught something of Martin Luther King's vision of the "Beloved Community" found in the Book of Revelation where all nations and tribes gather at the feet of the Lamb. We got under each other's skin in the safe, yet prodding environment of the Church, learning each other's struggle of inequality, abuse, despair, ambivalence and guilt. We began to trust each other beneath our perceived but misrepresented reputations. We discovered we wanted to talk, pray and serve with each other.

We are within walking distance of each other, so after services two weeks ago we had a Sunday brunch with each other. A shared Lenten program is planned. Representatives meet monthly to find ways to call us toward greater unity, love and witness. To borrow a holy phrase, "we have overcome," and promised to overcome still what separates us from the faith and enjoyment we hope to share with each other.

Wisely, Joe Royster, my mentor in this ministry, and the senior warden of Meade Memorial, has encouraged us not to set a goal, only plant seeds. He speaks not of breakthrough, but of new beginning. So we must remember, we are not called to finish the task, only never to lay it aside. As the poet says, "We are only undefeated because we go on trying." And, of course, there's no reward like the sense of undeserved integrity that comes with being in the right fight. So we thank God for bishops and a diocese that has

enabled and encouraged us to begin in Alexandria to mend an ancient and disturbing wound.

We often think of our churches as problem-centered, issue-dominated, resource scarce. In this, National Black History Month, I can report reconciliation is unseating the stain of racism. We have reason to celebrate: Let us lift every voice and sing!

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Klemmt for his report and called on Ms. Happy Pullman, Secretary of the Diocese, for the report on the program of the Diocese.

Report on the Program of the Diocese—Ms. Happy Pullman

First, I would like to thank you for your support, care, love, and especially your prayers over this last year. Cancer is a sneaky opponent. The prayers of a community of God are powerful. I knew that. What I didn't know was how being prayed for by a community of God, like you, feels. It feels like God wrapping God arms around you and holding you back from the brink of dark. Being wrapped in prayer feels. You can feel it. Being wrapped in prayer gives you that peace that passes all understanding. I am doing well. I have my energy back and am pretty much up to my old tricks. Your prayers were for me a loving sign of God's presence in the world and in my life. So I thank you.

This morning I am to tell you about the program of the Diocese of Virginia. The Diocese of Virginia is you and all the people in your churches. It is 185 churches that stretch from the Potomac River in the north to the James River in the south, the Chesapeake Bay in the east to the West Virginia line in the west. The Diocese of Virginia has a \$50+ million budget, and we do more things than you can ever imagine with that budget. Yes, we teach Sunday school and sing in church choirs. We have youth lock-ins and arrange flowers. We have meetings and meetings and meetings on the church's vision, the church's building plans, the church's leaking roof.

The program of the Diocese—all that we do in our 185 churches—is also about opening up our doors and our arms. We host Boy Scouts and AA meetings. We have the homeless spend the nights on cold winter nights.

The program of the Diocese is you as you go out from your church into your ministries in your workplaces. It is about supporting and sending people out from our churches to places as far away as South Africa and the Sudan or as close as the Urban Work Camp at the Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn that works with the poorest communities in Richmond.

The program of the Diocese is also what we do together as a diocese like planting churches. My own parish, Christ Church, Richmond, is six years old this spring, and we will move into our new church building. No more church in a truck! Together, with God, we helped give birth to that vital, exuberant congregation.

Bishop Lee recognized early in his episcopate that with 80,000 people and some 400 priests, we are a diocese rich in resources. What we do together as a diocese is not dependent on a few experts at the diocesan office but rather on 55 commissions, committees and boards with, the last time I counted, some 660 volunteers. If you have had an opportunity to walk around and look at the exhibits, or read the fliers on your tables, you have an idea of some of the things we do.

Under Bishop Lee's leadership, the institutions of the Diocese—its five church schools and two conference centers—also became closer supports of the diocesan program and therefore able to respond to the diocesan priorities. My job is actually a symbol of how the program is unified. It is rather confusing, I admit. My primary employers are the Memorial Trustees of the Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn and the Shrine Mont Board. They graciously allow me to work also as the Bishop's Chief of Staff and Secretary of the Diocese.

Programs such as the Parish Leadership Training Event, whose new brochure is on your chairs, and the Parish Development Overnights this past fall grew out of our knowledge of the Diocese's need for certain training and educational events for the laity and clergy, and Roslyn's ability to respond to that need. I am very proud of the program and ministry we do together at our conference center at Roslyn.

Shrine Mont may be best known for its summer camp programs. Please be sure to pick up your parish's packet of brochures outside the main doors of this ballroom, campers are waiting for them tomorrow at your church. We have eight camping programs now with over 18 different camp sessions. The new camp which will open in the spring will have 60 more bunks. It allows us to expand programs and also to create some new programs such as the St. Elizabeth's Camp, a camp for mild to moderately mentally retarded teens. We may not be the only Episcopal diocese in the country offering such a program, but I know we are one of only a few. I am very proud of the program ministry we do together through our conference center at Shrine Mont.

So, I finally come to my Mayo House colleagues known sometimes as the Bishop's staff and often as the diocesan staff. They are your staff. From Dot, who has answered the phone for the Diocese of Virginia for the last 25 years, to Percy Grant who has worked here a mere two weeks, they are your servants. They are here to help you in all that you do from those things you do at your home parish like finding a rector and advice on property issues, to stewardship and planning those wild dreams your visioning committee may have had and you are wondering if anyone else has ever done it. It is a fun group of people; we laugh a lot. And they work very hard, they drive many miles, and they are the most creative folks I have worked with. They are dedicated to you, and they are dedicated to this diocese.

So, in five minutes, that is the program of the Dicoese. Any of the staff would love to come and talk with your vestry, your adult forum, your youth group. So call us. If you have never called Mayo House, the number is 1-800/DIOCESE. And be sure to visit our web page at www.thediocese.net.

Bishop Lee thanked Ms. Pullman and introduced the members of the diocesan staff (see list at beginning of this Journal, p.2), as well as the members of the Parish Youth Ministries Committee and thanked them for their help during Council.

Bishop Lee then introduced the Rev. Kenneth Barham, Bishop of Cyangugu, Rwanda, to address Council.

Bishop Barham thanked Bishop Lee and brought greetings from Archbishop Emmanuel Kolini of Rwanda. He then discussed his experiences in the Diocese of Cyangugu noting that the first 18 years of his life in Rwanda it was governed by the Belgians, ruled by Kings and chiefs, and dominated by the Roman Catholic Church. His father, he said, was the last

bishop of what was one diocese 30 years ago and what is now 14 dioceses in two provinces.

In 1993, he was elected assistant bishop of the missionary diocese of Cyangugu: three parishes and three ordained clergy. In the genocide in 1994, the diocesan bishop fled leaving Bishop Barham alone to rebuild what was left after massive killing and destruction. In 1996 following the Anglican Consultative Council meeting in Panama, he was elected diocesan bishop. He outlined ministry in Cyangugu dedicated to "the message of reconciliation," citing construction of a cathedral as a center of prayer and worship; construction of 20 new churches several additional projects to benefit the local community including a guest house teaching farm. Bishop Barham noted that all these ministries require additional funds to be maintained and expanded and that the Diocese of Cyangugu is a missionary diocese and is not self supporting. He said that to build the necessary infrastructre to become self supporting will require about \$255,000. Building projects include a community hall, diocesan offices, staff houses, and vicarages.

Bishop Lee thanked Bishop Barham for his report, briefly suspended the business of Council, and called on the Rev. Brad Rundlett who introduced "The Halleluja Honeys," a comedy troupe from St. Timothy's, Herndon, who performed a series of amusing songs with a lighthearted perspective on the church.

Following the brief interlude, Bishop Lee then returned Council to order and called on Mr. J.P. Causey, St. John's, West Point for the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Report of the Committee on Constitution & Canons-Mr. J.P. Causey Jr., chair

Mr. Causey thanked the members of the Committee and those who attended the open hearing or offered comments to the Committee.

He then called attention to proposed amendment C-1, noting that the Committee had heard arguments on both sides of the issue, and that while the Committee continues to believe that the lay representation at Council should primarily be delegates elected by the churches of the Diocese, the Committee recommends approval of C-1 on second reading, and he so moved.

C-1 second reading (original text; adopted unchanged)

Article III, Section 1 (e). Composition of Council

Amend Article III, Section 1 (e) as follows:

The Lay members of the Standing Committee, the Lay members of the Executive Board, the Chancellor, the Presidents of the Regions, the President of the Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese, and five lay persons, not over 21 years of age at the time of election, to be elected on or before May 1 as Youth Delegates by five of the Regional Councils designated on an annual rotating basis by the Standing Committee shall be members of the Council *ex officio*.

Bishop Lee noted that the motion comes from a committee of Council and therefore needs no second. He called for discussion. There was no discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote on the motion to adopt C-1 on second reading. Council approved the motion and adopted C-1.

Mr. Causey then called attention to C-2a, noting that it is presented and worded with the assumption that C-1 would pass and therefore contains that new language. Mr. Causey also noted an amendment introduced by the Committee to address concerns about the denominational affiliation of a lay officer of the Diocese and the suitability of the individual to serve as a member of Council only if he or she is also a confirmed communicant in good standing of the Diocese.

Mr. Causey said the Committee also considered other concerns raised by members of Council. He said that Council appreciates and respects the work of the officers of the Diocese yet stated that the Committee distinguishes the officers from the Presidents of the regions and other members of Council who are generally elected by some body or another and therefore representatives, directly or indirectly, of the people or churches of the Diocese. He also noted the concern that to the extent that the officers may be compensated employees of the Diocese, there might be an appearance of a conflict of interest for them to vote on some issues before Council.

The Committee, therefore, recommends rejection of C-2a and moved C-2a.

C-2a (as amended by the committee) Article III Composition of Council

Amend Article III, Section 1 (e) as follows:

The Lay members of the Standing Committee, the Lay members of the Executive Board, the Chancellor, the Officers of the Diocese who are adult confirmed communicants in good standing of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, the Presidents of the Regions, the President of the Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese, and five lay persons, not over 21 years of age at the time of election, to be elected on or before May 1 as Youth Delegates by five of the Regional Councils designated on an annual rotating basis by the Standing Committee shall be members of the Council ex officio.

Bishop Lee noted the motion comes from a committee of Council and needs no second. He called for discussion.

Jack Schick, President, Region III rose and spoke to the value of lay leadership and in support of the proposed legislation. The Rev. Jennings Hobson, also spoke in favor of the legislation, noting that if an ordained person were to serve as an officer of the Diocese, he or she would retain the right to vote. There was no more discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The legislation failed: 234 in favor, 289 opposed.

Mr. Causey called attention to C-3 noting that the Committee does not see that this amendment significantly increases the risk of liability for churches, who already have a potential risk of liability for acts of wardens and vestry persons and who have the benefit of Virginia law which exempts officers and trustees of tax exempt organizations from civil

liability. He also noted that this legislation presents an opportunity for churches to review their insurance coverage and that the equivalent of directors and officers liability insurance is available from the Church Insurance Company and other carriers, but that coverage is not part of the comprehensive package liability insurance currently offered in Virginia.

He urged churches to review the option of obtaining insurance for this risk, and recommended approval of C-3.

C-3 (original text; adopted by two-thirds majority and effective immediately) Canon 15 Church Property

Amend Canon 15, Section 7 as follows:

Section 7. Trustees appointed pursuant to this Canon shall be indemnified by the Church or Mission electing them, or, in the case of Trustees designated by the Executive Board, by the Diocese, to the fullest extent as if the Church, Mission, or Diocese were a "Corporation" and such Trustees were "Directors" within the meaning of, and as set forth in, Article 9 of the Virginia Nonstock Corporation Act, as the same may be from time to time amended.

Bishop Lee called for discussion. There was none. Bishop Lee called for a vote, the matter succeeded. The Bishop ruled that the legislation obtained the required two-thirds majority necessary to make the amendment effetive immediately, and C-3 was adopted.

Mr. Causey then called attention to C-4. He noted that it was indicated to the Committee in open hearings that the number of confirmed communicants in good standing, while no longer reported on parochial reporting forms, remains reasonably available. He noted that as a result of the youth of the new parochial reporting form and a limited review of the numbers reported for communicants in good standing and confirmed adult communicants suggests there may not be an appropriate level of precison in the numbers reported, which renders suspect any projection of the effect of a change on the size of Council. He encouraged rectors and their staffs to focus on the definitions of who they are counting for the parochial reports.

He noted the Committee's conclusion is that C-4 is premature and indicated that he has discussed with the Secretary of the Diocese Happy Pullman a process to have churches who may have more than one delegate to Council provide to the diocesan staff the number of confirmed communicants in good standing in their churches.

He noted that the Committee recommends rejection of C-4 and moved the proposed legislation.

C-4 (original text)
Article III
Composition of Council

Amend Article III, Section 1 (d) to read as follows:

(d) There shall be only one Lay Delegate from each church, to be chosen by

its Vestry. But from every church having more than three hundred confirmed communicants in good standing reported to the Diocesan authorities in the last annual report, there shall be an additional Lay Delegate for each three hundred confirmed communicants in good standing, or major fraction thereof, above the first three hundred.

Bishop Lee noted the motion comes from a committee of Council and therefore requires no second. He called for discussion.

The Rev. Paul Johnson, Christ Church, Richmond, noted that if the standard is "confirmed communicants" then children are not included and that runs counter to the diocesan position regarding the importance of children in the life of the Church.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. C-4 was defeated on voice vote.

That concluded the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons. Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Causey for his report and discharged the Committee with the thanks of Council.

Bishop Lee then called on Mr. Julian Bivins, Trinity, Charlottesville for the report of the Committee on Resolutions.

Report of the Committee on Resolutions—Mr. Julian Bivins, chair

Editor's Note: Throughout the following report, resolutions are printed on first reference as they were introduced to Council by the Committee. Where the original text of a resolution is printed with the Committee's amendments and revisions, a strikethrough (strikethrough) indicates text that was removed by the committee; text that is italicized indicates text that was added by the Committee. Resolutions that were amended either by the Committee or by action of Council are printed twice: first as introduced to Council, and again as adopted following final action.

Mr. Bivins greeted Council, introduced and thanked members of the Committee and on behalf of the Committee thanked Council for the opportunity to serve the Church through this ministry. He thanked Mr. Grant Pullman and Ms. Karen Glasco for their assistance and also thanked God for the help of the members of the Parish Youth Ministries Committee: "They are a shining example of what is so good about the Church," he said. "They work without ceasing to eat, dance and to be generous with thoughts and assistance."

Mr. Bivins then continued with his report: "Bishop Lee, yesterday you named this community as one of continuity, change and challenge. Your characterization created for me a very powerful centerpoint for the work of Council and, in particular, the Resolutions Committee. Your vision of community where we are entwined together invoked for me John 15:1-5 ... This sense of connected community refreshed me to know that as a church what we do today is not the first fruits of a faith journey but a continuation of the vine planted over three millenia ago. What a wonderful gift we have, that through our baptism, we have been grafted onto this vine of Christ. The resolutions before us today are this season's sprouts from this most holy vine."

Mr. Bivins then introduced resolution R-1s substitute for original R-1 with the committee's recommendation for adoption.

R-1s (original text with committee revisions for substitute)

Whereas, we are approaching the third millennium since the birth of our savior Jesus Christ and have a continuing obligation to be stewards of must examine our role as stewards in caring for the whole of God's Creation, the home of all those who will come after us.; and

Whereas, we have the capacity to be become powerful and active agents to support in changing God's Creation in the face of We are altering the atmosphere of the planet by depleting the ozone shield which protects us from cosmic radiation, and creating the threat of global warming with the increasing likelihood of detrimental effects. We are transforming vast segments of the land and polluting the air, rivers and oceans: population pressures which increasingly limit our choices with regard to the land, forests and living things of God's creation: ; and

Whereas, there is no refuge from the hand of human industrial society: It can harm without heed to individuals' ability to flee, remedy, or absorb the impacts. There is nowhere that God's other creatures and his people can hide. There is nowhere that future generations can hide. We have become as tyrants, over the land, the present and future environment, our island home. Therefore be it

Resolved, the 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia prays for forgiveness for our blind transgressions against God's Creation and the generations of God's children yet to come, and asks that:

- 1) Every parish in the Diocese prayerfully consider the responsibilities that Christians have for the care of God's Creation, the present and future home of all God's Children.
- 2) The Committee on Stewardship of Creation undertake in consultation with the Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission to broaden the important ecumenical aspects of its environmental stewardship concerns about our role in transforming the Garden of Eden, and our attendant responsibility to God, and to the affected powerless and ill-informed in this and future generations; and, on behalf of the Bishop, identify options to advance this these objectives, including (such as participation in the conference being planned by the Virginia Council of Churches to be held in Richmond in June 2000).
- 3) The *Diocese encourages the* Committee on Stewardship of Creation be directed to contact their counterpart environmental organizations within other Christian religious bodies to seek opportunities to advance these objectives. to collaborate, coordinate and participate in such options to promote an ecumenical approach to the stewardship of creation.
- 4) We seek by every means to educate our parish families about the transformations that we are imposing on God's creation and their implications for individuals, groups or humankind at large in this and future generations, and to include specifically such groups beyond the parishes as Regional level leadership, PYM, and the like.

Bishop Lee noted that the motion comes from a committee of Council and therefore needs no second. He called for discussion. Hearing no discussion, Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-1s was adopted as follows:

R-1s (As adopted)

Whereas, we are approaching the third millennium since the birth of our savior Jesus Christ and have a continuing obligation to be stewards of the whole of God's creation; and

Whereas, we have the capacity to be powerful and active agents to support God's creation in the face of population pressures which increasingly limit our choices with regard to the land, forests and living things; and

Whereas, the hand of human industrial society can harm without heed to individuals' ability to flee, remedy, or absorb the impacts. Therefore be it

Resolved, that:

- 1) Every parish in the Diocese prayerfully consider the responsibilities that Christians have for the care of God's creation, the present and future home of home of all God's children.
- 2) The Committee on Stewardship of Creation undertake in consultation with the Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission to broaden the important ecumenical aspects of environmental stewardship and identify options to advance these objectives (such as participation in the conference being planned by the Virginia Council of Churches to be held in Richmond in June 2000).
- 3) The Diocese encourages the Committee on Stewardship of Creation to contact counterpart environmental organizations within other religious bodies to seek opportunities to advance these objectives.

Mr. Bivins continued with his report and moved adoption of resolution R-2

R-2 (Original text; as adopted)

Resolved, that we of the Diocese of Virginia issue a call for action on behalf of the millions who are persecuted on account of their religious beliefs, including using our individual and collective influence to press the many arms of our government to become more actively involved in the fight against religious persecution; insisting that the people who set and execute our foreign policies understand that one of their priorities is to take seriously claims of religious persecution, and fashion appropriate and strong actions to oppose it; and be it further

Resolved, that those persons who exercise leadership within the Diocese, including our Bishops, and all clerical and lay leaders, energize the faithful to support a sustained campaign against worldwide persecution using our moral

authority as Christians to lift our congregations to the challenge; speaking out publicly on this issue; and maintaining contact with overseas believers who are persecuted, and regularly informing their congregations of the state of persecution abroad; in order to both educate and illuminate, to let the American citizenry know what is happening; and encourage both broadcast and print news media to provide detailed coverage of religious persecution; and be it further

Resolved, that we should regularly pray for those enduring religious persecution.

Bishop Lee noted that the motion comes from a committee of Council and therefore needs no second. He called for discussion. Mr Russ Randle, Christ Church, Alexandria spoke in support of the resolution, noting that the resolution also has the support of the mission team that visited Sudan in 1998. Mr. Randle also urged Council not simply to adopt and forget about the resolution.

There was no more discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-2 was adopted.

Mr. Bivins continued his report and moved adoption of resolution R-3s, substitute for original R-3, noting that the original resolution did not recognize programs other than Five Talents.

R-3s (Original text with committee revisions for substitute)

Resolved, that the 204th Council of the Diocese of Virginia commends to its congregations and parishioners revolving micro-credit projects such as Five Talents, a micro-enterprise initiative of the of the Anglican Communion that equips the poor in the developing world with the means to start small businesses; and, be it further

Resolved,—that the Budget Committee consider contributing 0.7% of annual diocesan income to Five Talents; and, be it further

Resolved, that this Council encourages each congregation to set aside 0.7% of its annual budget to contribute to Five Talents; and, be it further

Resolved, that this Council encourages financial support of such initiatives at the diocesan, congregational and personal levels. gifts to Five Talents.

Bishop Lee noted the motion comes from a committee of Council and therefore needs no second. He called for discussion. Ms. Sandy Walker, All Saints, Dale City, expressed her regret that the resolution does not remain focused on Five Talents in light of the fact that the Five Talents project was developed in the Diocese of Virginia and endorsed by the Lambeth Conference of Bishops in 1998. She added, however, that sponsors of the original resolution are content with the substitute and said that she had seen the program at work in Uganda.

The Rev. Martyn Minns, Truro, Fairfax, spoke in favor of the resolution but cautioned that "the more broad we become the less specific we are in addressing needs." He pleaded Council not simply talk about supporting micro-economic development.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-3s was adopted as follows:

R-3s (As adopted)

Resolved, that the 204th Council of the Diocese of Virginia commends to its congregations and parishioners revolving micro-credit projects such as Five Talents that equip the poor in the developing world with the means to start small businesses; and, be it further

Resolved, that this Council encourages financial support of such initiatives at the diocesan, congregational and personal levels.

Mr. Bivins continued his report and moved adoption of resolution R-4.

R-4 (original text)

Whereas, reports as of mid-November indicated that the casualties in the Diocese of Honduras as a result of Hurricane Mitch were up to 15,000 dead and 13,000 missing, with an estimated 1,500,000 homeless--and the count expected to go higher; and

Whereas, the Bishop of the Anglican Diocese of Honduras, Leo Frade, has appealed to fellow Episcopalians in the United States for prayer and succor; and

Whereas, the Rev. Canon John and Mrs. Gail MacDonald and Bob and Jane Atwood, Episcopal missionaries in the Diocese of Honduras supported by parishes in the Diocese of Virginia including The Falls Church and Holy Comforter, Vienna, are laboring with the task of helping the Honduran people recover from this disaster; and

Whereas, the devastation even up to the beginning of this Council remains great and substantially in need of restoration, and there is continuing great need for financial support in the form of cash donations so the Diocese of Honduras can provide food, clothing, medicine, pure water, and shelter to those suffering; and

Whereas, SAMS (The South American Missionary Society, P.O. Box 399, Ambridge, PA 15003-0399) has established a special account to receive tax-deductible donations; now therefore, be it

Resolved, that this Council of the Diocese of Virginia does urge and encourage all members of the Diocese to continue in prayer for the Diocese of Honduras, specifically for the following: Pray for Bishop Frade and the Honduran people; Pray for our missionaries there, that they may be able to serve mightily and lovingly all those in need; Pray about what kind of financial and other support each parish and parishioner can provide for the rehabilitation in Honduras; and Pray about the possibility of sending short-term groups at this time to assist in the rebuilding of houses, churches and schools.

Bishop Lee noted the motion comes from a committee of Council and requires no second. He called for discussion.

Mr. Samuel Thompson, The Falls Church, Falls Church spoke about the inaccuracies of the figures in the resolution and proposed amending the first whereas clause to reflect 9,000 dead and 200,000 homeless.

Mr. Thompson also moved an additional amendment to add a fifth whereas clause as follows:

Whereas, The Committee to Assist the Episcopal Diocese of Honduras (CAEDH) was established in Virginia (Box 464, Somerset, Va. 22972) for the specific purpose of providing assistance and succor to the Episcopal communicants devastated by Hurricane Mitch.

Mr. Thompson then proposed a third amendment to the third whereas clause to add Dori Peterson, ordained as a Deacon in San Pedro, to the list of those laboring in Honduras.

Mr. Bivins accepted all three amendments on behalf of the Committee as friendly amendments thereby requiring no vote of Council.

Bishop Lee recognized the Rev. Jennifer Pridmore, Holy Comforter, Vienna, who offered an amendment adding language to the final resolve urging that prayer be coupled with research on the best ways to help victims of the disaster and with consultation with SAMS and CAEDH, the two organizations mentioned in the resolution. The amended resolved clause to read as follows:

Resolved, that this Council of the Diocese of Virginia does urge and encourage all members of the Diocese to participate in prayer and service for the Diocese of Honduras, specifically for in the following ways: Pray for Bishop Frade and the Honduran people; Pray for our missionaries there, that they may be able to serve mightily and lovingly all those in need; Prayerfully research, under the direction of SAMS and CAEDH, possibilities for financial, material, and spiritual support of the Honduran people, missionaries, and relief workers by both individuals and parishes, and to take action as appropriate. Pray about what kind of financial and other support each parish and parishioner can provide for the rehabilitation in Honduras; and Pray about the possibility of sending short-term groups at this time to assist in the rebuilding of houses, churches and schools.

Bishop Lee called for discussion on the amendment.

The Rev. Roberto Morales, La Iglesia de San Jose, Arlington, proposed an amendment to the amendment adding the Dioceses of Nicaragua, Guatemala, and El Salvador to the list of dioceses prayed for "to show our solidarity with them, too."

Mr. Bivins said that the Committee had considered broadening the resolution accordingly but resisted doing so in light of the special relationship that exists between the Diocese of Honduras and organizations within the Diocese of Virginia.

Mr. Thompson spoke as sponsor of the original resolution and accepted Mr. Morales' proposal as a friendly amendment.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and

resolution R-4a was adopted as follows:

R-4 (As adopted with amendments)

reports as of January indicated that the casualties in the Diocese of Honduras Whereas. as a result of Hurricane Mitch were up to 9,000 dead and 13,000 missing, with an estimated 200,000 homeless--and the count expected to go higher; and

Whereas. the Bishop of the Anglican Diocese of Honduras, Leo Frade, has appealed to fellow Episcopalians in the United States for prayer and succor; and

the Rev. Canon John and Mrs. Gail MacDonald, Bob and Jane Atwood, and Whereas, Dori Peterson, ordained as a Deacon in San Pedro, Episcopal missionaries in the Diocese of Honduras supported by parishes in the Diocese of Virginia including The Falls Church and Holy Comforter, Vienna, are laboring with the task of helping the Honduran people recover from this disaster; and

Whereas, the devastation even up to the beginning of this Council remains great and substantially in need of restoration, and there is continuing great need for financial support in the form of cash donations so the Diocese of Honduras can provide food, clothing, medicine, pure water, and shelter to those suffering; and

Resolved, that this Council of the Diocese of Virginia does urge and encourage all members of the Diocese to participate in prayer and service for the Dioceses of Nicaragua, Guatemala, El Salvador and specifically for the Diocese of Honduras; specifically in the following ways: Pray for Bishop Frade and the Honduran people, Pray for our missionaries there, that they may be able to serve mightily and lovingly all those in need; Prayerfully research, under the direction of SAMS and CAEDH, possibilities for financial, material, and spiritual support of the Honduran people, missionaries, and relief workers by both individuals and parishes, and to take action as appropriate.

Mr. Bivins continued with his report and called attention to resolutions R-5 and R-6 which the committee recommended be combined into a substitute resolution R-10s for "a more wholistic approach" to issues raised during the Lambeth Conference of Bishops in 1998.

Bishop Lee recognized the Rev. Elijah White, Church of Our Saviour, Oatlands, who moved to divide the question to allow for separate discussion of issues.

Bishop Lee ruled the motion in order and called for a vote. The vote to divide failed.

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The matter returned to resolution R-10. Mr. Bivins noted that the Committee felt there is a time needed around the Diocese for prayer, discernment and the distribution of materials from Lambeth and moved adoption of the resolution.

Bishop Lee noted the motion comes from a committee of Council and therefore needs no second. He called for discussion.

The Rev. Elijah White, Church of Our Saviour, Oatlands said, "God so loved the world that he did not send a committee."

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-10s was adopted as follows.

R-10s (As adopted)

Be It Resolved,

that the 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia expresses appreciation to its bishops for their leadership and participation at the 1998 Lambeth conference, especially to the Rt. Rev. Peter James Lee for his work on the Lambeth Resolutions Committee and his leadership regarding the issue of international debt, poverty, and development; and, be it further

Resolved,

that the 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia recommends to all the congregations of the diocese a careful study of the reports and resolutions of the 1998 Lambeth Conference and, be it further

Resolved,

that the diocese make available to interested parishes a listing of these and related materials and how they may be obtained.

Mr. Bivins continued his report and moved adoption of resolution R-7.

R-7 (Original text; as adopted including guidelines referenced in paragraph 2 of the first resolved clause)

Whereas,

Resolution R-1(sa), adopted by the 203rd Annual Council, endorsed Virginia Plan 2000, a call to exercise the power of our unity, to love in God's name and to witness this united love to the world in three ways: 1) the planting of new congregations, 2) the revitalization of existing congregations, and 3) the expansion of youth ministries; and

Whereas,

the 203rd Annual Council designated 1998 as a year of discernment for Virginia Plan 2000 which included meetings of the Bishops and Bishops Suffragan with Council delegates, with the Deans and Presidents and with vestry wardens across the Diocese to share the vision for Virginia Plan 2000; and

Whereas,

the Executive Board was charged to present to the 204th Annual Council a plan for voluntary giving that is fair and equitable to support the work of Virginia Plan 2000 and that the Executive Board has carefully reviewed the written responses of vestries to four proposed plans of suggested guidelines for voluntary giving; and

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Whereas,

these responses made clear the strong support for a variety of plans as well as the consensus that voluntary giving out of thanksgiving for God's abundance is the fuel that drives the vision and work of the Diocese of Virginia; therefore be it

Resolved,

that the 204th Annual Council continue to support its mission and ministry under the existing Virginia Plan of Proportionate Giving with the following provisos:

- 1. That Council reaffirm the biblical tithe as the minimum standard for giving by laity, bishops, priests, and deacons, and that the tithe be viewed as a voluntary minimum guideline for parish giving to the Diocese;
- 2. That those congregations desiring to use voluntary guidelines as a framework in reaching decisions about diocesan support consider Plan A as recommended by the 1997 Task Group on Giving;
- 3. That the mission of the Diocese be clearly communicated through continued region-wide meetings with the Bishops and staff and through representative visits with parishes;

and be it further

Resolved,

that this Council gratefully acknowledge the original work of the 1997 Task Group on Giving as well as the vestries of the Diocese who have contributed to a beneficial year of study in congregational giving to our common mission in the Diocese of Virginia.

Plan A Proposed by the 1997 Task Force on Giving

This is the proposal as developed by the Task Group on Giving. It seeks to provide each parish with a range of specified minimum askings for voluntary support of the Diocese of Virginia. Five tiers are used to determine the minimum percentage asking of each parish.

Total Operating Income	Minimum Percentage Rang
\$1,000,000 and over	16% and over
\$750,000 - \$999,999	14% - 16%
\$500,000 - \$749,999	12% - 14%
\$100,000 - \$499,999	10% - 12%
\$99,999 and under	8% - 10%

Bishop Lee noted the motion comes from a committee of Council and requires no second. He called for discussion.

Mr. Russ Randle, Christ Church, Alexandria emphasized the need to keep the giving plan simple, set the level of giving at 10% for everyone, and proposed an amendment to strike numbered paragraph 2 in the first resolved clause and replace it with the following language:

2. All parishes are urged to increase giving above the tithe to the Diocese and to the Diocesan Missionary Society for the purpose of building new churches, revitalizing existing churches, dispatching mission teams overseas, and expanding and improving ministry to youth;

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Bishop Lee called for discussion on the amendment.

The Rev. Jennings Hobson, III, Trinity, Washington and St. Andrew's, Ada spoke against the amendment noting that the Diocese had asked for guidelines.

Mr. Peter Buck, Church of the Apostles, Fairfax spoke in favor of the amendment noting the absence of any biblical grounding for anything less than a tithe nor for larger churches to give more than smaller churches and cautioned that to adopt the guidelines risks creating designation of second class churches.

The Rev. Rick Lord, Holy Comforter, Vienna, spoke in opposition to the amendment noting that to limit guidelines would ignore the work that has been done by the Task Group on Giving, the Executive Board, and the discernment process over the past year.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote on the amendment. The amendment failed.

Discussion returned to resolution R-7. There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-7 was adopted.

Mr. Bivins continued with his report and moved adoption of resolution R-8s, substitute for original R-8, noting that the revisions in the substitute were made in an effort to respond to requests that the resolution be more inclusive of other faiths.

Resolved,	to the end that our divisions may not provoke prejudice; that we may live together in greater harmony; and that we may minister together to establish greater peace and justice in the world.

Bishop Lee noted that the motion comes from a committee of Council and needs no second. He called for discussion.

The Rev. Ron Woodruff spoke in favor of the resolution and urged members of Council to invite one of another faith to lunch.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-8s was adopted as follows:

Mr. Bivins continued with his report and moved adoption of resolution R-9.

R-9 (Original text; as adopted)

Whereas, the rapid increase in Hispanic population that began in the 1970's and

1980's has continued; and

Whereas, a large percentage of the Hispanic population in Virginia remains

unchurched; and

Whereas, Hispanic cultured churches, such as San Jose, San Marcos and Cristo

Rey, and bilingual ministries have proved to be effective means of

ministering to the unchurched population; therefore be it

Resolved, that the 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia requests the

Commission on Church Planting of the Diocese to make planting of Hispanic cultured churches in Northern Virginia a high priority with

efforts beginning in 1999; and be it further

Resolved, that the attached report of the ad hoc committee on Hispanic

Ministry, dated December 1998 be considered by our Bishops, members of Council, the Executive Board, and other interested groups for additional action and response as they deem appropriate;

and be it further

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Resolved, that the attached report be published in the Journal of the 204th Council. (*See Appendix VI*, p. 509)

Bishop Lee noted the resolution comes from a committee of Council and therefore needs no second. He called for discussion.

The Rev. Victoria Heard, diocesan Missioner for Church Planting, called attention to the Diocese's reputation for reaching new people and spoke in support of the resolution as the way to reach out to the large Hispanic population in Northern Virginia, and as a prelude to reaching out to other groups.

Mr. Herb Pearce, Church of the Apostles, Fairfax, noted that Asians were shown recently to be the largest ethnic group in Northern Virginia and recommended being attentive to growth of that population as well.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-9 was adopted.

Mr. Bivins continued with his report moving adoption of resolution R-11.

R-11 (Original text with covenant; as adopted)

Whereas, Devastating poverty, persecution, war and slavery afflict the people of Sudan; and

Whereas, the spirit of Sudanese Christians soars while a hostile government systematically seeks to destroy the Church; and

Whereas, the Rev. David Bako of the Diocese of Ezo, a leader in his diocese and the whole Sudanese Church, has been a student at Virginia Theological Seminary for the past two years, during which time he has developed a close relationship with the people of St. Francis' Church, Great Falls; and

Whereas, the parish of St. Francis has enthusiastically covenanted together with the Diocese of Ezo (Covenant attached for information purposes); therefore be it

Resolved, that churches in the Diocese of Virginia are urged to study and pray about the plight of all Sudanese, and to consider joining in the Covenant with the Diocese of Ezo, or other similar arrangements, to assist the Sudanese Church in their life and witness.

Covenant Between Ezo Diocese, The Episcopal Church of the Sudan and St. Francis Episcopal Church, The Diocese of Virginia, The Episcopal Church in The United States of America.

February 1998

We the undersigned clergy and laity from St. Francis in the Diocese of Virginia give thanks for the splendid witness made by our brothers and sisters in Ezo Diocese, Sudan who are suffering continuing harsh persecution because of their unswerving faith in Our Savior,

Jesus Christ. In response to their witness, we covenant to pray, study and work to ease their suffering, to make their faithful witness widely known, and to help visit and materially assist the Church in Sudan as we may be able and as its needs require. We ask our brothers and sisters in Ezo Diocese to pray for us, that we may be faithful in carrying out this covenant to help them and that our faith may be strengthened by their faithful witness in adversity. We will undertake the following steps in the next two years, God willing:

- 1. In our public worship and private devotions, we will pray regularly for peace in the Sudan, for the alleviation of suffering which war and famine has brought to that country, and especially to Christians in Ezo Diocese. We will pray for the Church in persecution there; for the abolition of the abominable slavery which has been practiced on Christians and others in the Sudan; for an end to the abject poverty that cripples that country; and for the endurance of our people in such adversity. We will pray for the relief of individual Christians suffering in Sudan as well as a change of heart and action for those who cause this suffering.
- 2. We will study the conditions the Sudanese Christians face including poverty, persecution and slavery. We will regularly report to our congregation striving to keep them informed of conditions faced by our brethren in the Sudan as well as practical steps which we can undertake to assist them.
- 3. We will bring this Covenant before the 204th Council of the Diocese of Virginia in 1999, and ask that Council commend this covenant for the prayerful consideration of people and parishes in the Diocese of Virginia as a means to respond positively to Christians facing great persecution and poverty.
- 4. We will communicate regularly with the Rev. David Bako, who has worked closely with St. Francis over these past two years, and we will open further communications with parishes and people in his diocese as we come to know them.
- 5. We will work to send a mission team from St. Francis to visit Ezo Diocese in 2001 in order to learn first hand the obstacles faced by our brethren, to focus our material efforts to help them, and to provide them such encouragement as our physical presence with them may add to our prayers. We will work closely with the Vestry of St. Francis to help assure that this mission enhances rather than competes with ongoing mission at St. Francis.

The Rev. Robert Friend, St. Francis, Great Falls spoke about the many fruits realized in the

parish by their new-found relationship with the Diocese of Ezo, and he recommended congregations looking for new things in parish ministry consider world mission.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-11 was adopted.

Mr. Bivins continued his report and moved adoption of R-12s, substitute for original R-12.

R-12s (Original text with Committee revisions for substitute)

Resolved, by the 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Diocese of Virginia urges each parish, the U.S. government, and international organizations to address the serious problem of debt in developing nations and, in so doing, to insist upon strong protections for human rights, especially religious freedom. Copies of this resolution shall be provided to the Office of Government Relations of the Episcopal Church and to Virginia's Senators and Representatives.

- 1. Individuals and churches in this diocese are urged to study the Lambeth Conference's resolution on Third World Debt Relief, and the related issues of poverty in the third world, especially poverty among Christians.
- 2. Individuals and churches in this diocese have a responsibility as Christians to take concrete steps this year to assist in the relief of third world poverty, especially as it affects Christians and the church's ability to proclaim the Gospel.
- 3. Parishes shall report their ongoing and new efforts to assist the church in the third world to the Executive Board by Pentecost, 1999. The Executive Board shall summarize and report the highlights of these efforts to the 205th Annual Council, and make the information generally available so parishes can better coordinate their efforts with each other.
- 4. The Diocese urges the U.S. government and our elected representatives to insist on strong protections for human rights, especially religious freedom, as an essential component of any third world debt relief undertaken by the United States Government or by multilateral lending institutions such as the World Bank or International Monetary Fund in which the United States participates. Copies of this resolution shall be provided to Virginia's Senators and Representatives.

Bishop Lee noted the motion comes from a committee of Council and therefore needs no second. He called for discussion.

Mr. Russ Randle, Christ Church, Alexandria proposed a friendly amendment to insert the phrase *each individual in the Diocese* in the first line. Mr. Bivins accepted the friendly amendment as proposed.

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Mr. Alden Hathaway, St. Peter's, Purcellville questioned why three points had been removed from the original resolution.

Mr. Bivins explained that the issues involved were complex and numerous and not all parishes are ready to respond.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and resolution R-12s was adopted as follows:

Resolved, by the 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia:

The Diocese of Virginia urges each individual in the Diocese and each parish, the U.S. government, and international organizations to address the serious problem of debt in developing nations and, in so doing, to insist upon strong protections for human rights, especially religious freedom. Copies of this resolution shall be provided to the Office of Government Relations of the Episcopal Church and to Virginia's Senators and Representatives.

Mr. Bivins continued with his report and apologized for errors contained in the Courtesy Resolutions distributed to Council. He assured Council that errors would be corrected prior to distribution of the resolutions to those honored. He then read the subject matter of each courtesy resolution and moved adoption of the courtesy resolutions as a group.

Bishop Lee called for a vote. The matter succeeded and Courtesy Resolutions CR-1, CR-2, CR-3, and CR-4 were adopted as follows:

CR-1 (As adopted)

Whereas, The Rev. Ellin Deese came to Buck Mountain Church on June 4, 1990 as its Deacon and in June 1991 was appointed Priest-in-Charge; and

Whereas, the parish, at that time, was devoid of purpose or plan; and

Whereas, during the ensuing eight years she brought a unique leadership style to our parish which allowed it to thrive in spiritual awareness, congregational attendance, community ministries, Christian education and fiscal security; and

Whereas, during her tenure the parish attended to its facilities by ensuring preservation of the old church building through structural and cosmetic repairs; divested itself of the Rectory which had become a burden; made major improvements to the Parish Hall; and added a totally new addition which, as an expression of gratitude, love and admiration is now called Deese Hall; and

Whereas, she has been an inspiration to the members of the parish and the greater community through her personal courage in her battle with cancer and in her deep and continuing devotion, faith and belief in Our Lord, living a life that follows the tenets of our faith; therefore be it

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Resolved, that the Vestry and members express their most sincere thanks for her years here at Buck Mountain and for the marvelous job she has done.

CR-2 (As adopted)

Whereas, Rear Admiral Douglas F. Mow, Sr., an active member and leader of St. James', Mt. Vernon, died of a heart attack on November 25, 1998; and

Whereas, Admiral Mow faithfully served his country as an officer of the United States Navy, retiring in 1981 after a 30-year career; and

Whereas,

Admiral Mow was a heavily decorated combat veteran of the Vietnam War and during his career received the Distinguished Service Medal, the Silver Star, three awards of the Legion of Merit, three awards of the Distinguished Flying Cross, three Bronze Stars, five Air Medals, and three Navy Commendation Medals with "V" for valor; and

Whereas,

Admiral Mow was a distinguished leader in the Diocese of Virginia serving as a member of the 1991 Task Group on Diocesan Giving; Chair of the 1995 Task Group on Regional Structure; and most recently as Chair of the diocesan Commission on Church Planting; and

Whereas, Admiral Mow's enthusiasm, inspiration and diligence provided great support in the establishment of the Church of the Spirit, Kingstowne; therefore be it

Resolved, that this 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia expresses its deep thanksgiving for the ministry of Rear Admiral Douglas F. Mow, Sr., and expresses its sympathy to his beloved wife Rosalie and his family.

CR-3 (As adopted)

Whereas, Sarah Reiners Bartenstein served on the Bishop's staff from 1986 until 1998,

Whereas, Ms. Bartenstein served as editor of the Virginia Episcopalian, winning numerous awards for her fair and excellent reporting of news local, national and international, and

Whereas,

Ms. Bartenstein and, by her efforts, the Virginia Episcopalian, gained an exceptional reputation across the general Church so much so that in 1994 she was invited to report the 71st General Convention for the Episcopal News Service, and

Whereas, Ms. Bartenstein served on the Board of Directors of Episcopal Communicators, a national organization of communication professionals in the Episcopal Church, and

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Whereas, Ms. Bartenstein served as one of two U.S. representatives on the communications advisory board of the Anglican Communion, and

Whereas, Ms. Bartenstein served with distinction as the Executive for Communication, including outstanding diligence and pastoral sensitivity during many chapters, joyous and difficult, in the life of the Diocese of Virginia, and

Whereas, Ms. Bartenstein served as the Executive for Liturgical Events, faithfully planning not one, but two episcopal consecrations, numerous ordinations, Council Eucharists, including the 1997 visit of the Most Rev. and Rt. Hon. George L. Carey, Archbishop of Canterbury, and

Whereas, Ms. Bartenstein, despite sometimes extraordinary demands of time, talent, and energy, remained devoted to her family, Larry, Elizabeth and Austin, and

Whereas, Ms. Bartenstein resiliently endured for six years the merciless teasing, goading, and baiting of Mr. Henry D.W. Burt, Mr. Michael J. Kerr, and Mr. Patrick N. Getlein, and

Whereas, Ms. Bartenstein ended her service on the Bishop's staff in July 1998 to begin work as the director of communications for Public Broadcasting of Central Virginia, therefore be it

Resolved, that the 204th Annual Council commends the service and devotion of Ms. Sarah Reiners Bartenstein, which will be long remembered by the members of the Diocese of Virginia, and therefore be it

Resolved, that the 204th Annual Council recognizes the many contributions of Ms. Bartenstein to the life of this diocese which have touched and will continue to touch the lives of Virginia's Episcopalians, and therefore be it

Resolved, that the 204th Annual Council gives thanks for her ministry among us.

CR-4 (As adopted)

Whereas, Peggy L. Hombs, longtime member of the Church of the Holy Comforter, Richmond, has served for thirteen years on the Commission on Ministry of the Diocese of Virginia; and

Whereas, she guided the Commission's work for eleven years as its Chair, devoting herself tirelessly to the effort needed to coordinate the many faceted process of discernment for aspirants and formation of priests in this diocese; and

Whereas, she was instrumental in helping to shape the ordination process in the Diocese of Virginia, being sensitive both to concerns of aspirants and needs of the Diocese, bringing her tremendous ability in organization, vision, passion, compassion, wisdom, energy, dependability and thoughtfulness to this job; and

Whereas, as Chair she also served the Diocese and the Province in other capacities, giving selflessly of her time, talent and treasure for the sake of God and His church. Therefore, be it

Resolved, that this 204th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia thank God for the exemplary leadership of Peggy L. Hombs on the Commission on Ministry, and extends our love and appreciation to her for her faithful ministry in our midst.

Bishop Lee recognized Ms. Donna Blackistone, Christ the Redeemer, Chantilly who noted Ms. Hombs' compassion as well as her passion exhibited during her years working with those in the ordination process.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Bivins and the members of the Committee on Resolutions for a thoughtful and careful report and discharged them with the thanks of Council.

Bishop Lee recognized Bishop David Lewis on a point of personal privilege. Bishop Lewis expressed his appreciation to Bishop Lee and the members of the diocesan staff for one of the best councils in recent memory.

Bishop Lee then called on Mr. Jospeh Paxton for the report of the Budget Committee.

Report of the Budget Committee—Mr. Joseph Paxton, chair

Bishop Lee, members of council, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen. It is a great honor to be able to present the report of the Budget Committee for the 204th Annual Council. I must say on behalf of the committee that we have enjoyed the challenge that you have given to us this year. The opportunity to use the gifts provided by the congregations to reach for the vision set forth by us in Virginia Plan 2000, and to address those initiatives Bishop Lee included in his pastoral address has been rewarding.

We would like to thank Michael Kerr, the Chief Financial Officer of the Diocese, Joy Buzzard and the finance staff for their help in keeping us on task and up to date with the latest pledge and financial data during the year and at Council. In addition, thank you to Happy Pullman, Chief of Staff and Dr. Charlton, Treasurer of the Diocese for your invaluable input into our process. It is through the input of staff that the continuity of the Diocese is assured. Finally, thank you to Susan Daughtry, who served as PYM's clerk to the Budget Committee.

On a personal note, I would like to thank the members of the Budget Committee, many of whom have been on the Committee for three years or more. As I call you name, please stand and be recognized for your service to our Diocese: David Campbell, the Rev. Pam Foster, the Rev. Harold Hallock (who cannot be with us today), Mrs. Martha High, Mrs. Ann Mingledorff, the Rev. James Reed and former Budget Committee Chair, Debora Williams. Thank you.

The report of the Committee will be in two parts. First, the Committee has prepared a recommendation for the 1999 budget, adjusted to reflect \$222,730 in new pledge income. The second part of this report is a recommendation for Council on the allocation of pledges and other income received in 1998 in excess of budget, coupled with unexpended funds primarily in the staff category, resulting from the departure of Bishop Matthews and other

staff, and the delay in calling the assistants to the Bishop for youth development and congregational and ministry development. The total amount of 1998 funds to be allocated is \$379,618.

The vision established in adopting Virginia Plan 2000 set forth three areas of focus in our ministry: planting of new churches, revitalization and development of congregations and development of youth. The proposed budget takes a significant step toward reaching these goals and sets a solid foundation for continued work in each area into the 21st century.

First in the area of planting new churches, the budget includes \$200,000 for the new mission fund, an increase of \$80,000 over the current year and this budget will allow us to reach the goal set for the Diocese by Bishop Lee in proposing this fund in the early 90's. This item, D1, is on page 1 in the goldenrod summary document you received this morning.

Next, on page 3, item F2, \$60,000 is recommended for revitalization and development, an increase of \$20,000 or 50 percent over 1998. This budget will provide for the continuation of the parish leadership meetings with the Bishops and provide program money for the Assistant to the Bishop for Congregational and Ministry Development, the Rev. Tony Pompa, in consultation with the Commission on Congregational Development and Revitalization to assist parishes as they strive to develop new ministries and revitalize their congregation. Also included under category G 1(b) on the last page is funding supported with recurring income to fund Tony's position.

The third area of primary focus in Virginia Plan 2000 is the development of youth and youth ministry. The recommended budget includes funds in several areas to increase our work for the youth of our Diocese:

On page 1 under Support for Youth and Young Adults Ministry, \$11,500 has been added for the two scholarship programs, Robert Bruce Hall and St. Paul's College. The Robert Bruce Hall Diocesan Scholars Program provides financial assistance for minority students to attend our church schools.

\$22,395 has been added to the grants for ministries in higher education to fully fund the requests from the campus ministry programs in the Diocese. This ministry was one that generated considerable support during the open hearing and the committee feels that the recommended amount is a significant step forward for the Diocese. Further, we encourage the Diocese to strive to provide additional funds in this area to permit Bishop Lee to develop partnerships with local congregations to provide full-time campus chaplains at each university in the Diocese.

Also in this area, \$50,000 has been added to the Shrine Mont programs budget. These added funds will provide for additional nursing and chaplain services to meet expanded program offerings, partially fund St. Elizabeth's Camp for special needs youth, meet the needs for opening the new camp on the hill behind Portlock Pond, and reduce the cost of camp to each camper in 1999 by \$25.

On pages 2 and 3 under Committees of the Executive Board and Diocesan Ministries, the Committee on Ministries in Higher Education is proposed to receive \$3,350 in additional funding, and Parish Youth Ministries (PYM) \$14,375, which represents \$9,375 more than proposed during the pre-Council meetings.

On page 4, under Bishops, Communications, Staff and Support, \$10,000, up from the \$3,000 originally proposed in the pre-Council budget, is recommended for program development by the Assistant to the Bishop for Youth Development. The budget also funds on a continuing basis the Assistant to the Bishop.

While reaching to meet the needs of our vision in Virginia Plan 2000 was a priority, the Budget Committee also addressed other areas in the recommended budget that is before you:

In Ecumenical Partnerships, additional funds totaling \$8,500 were added to the budget proposed by the pre-Council hearings, with each item recommended for an increase. Responding to a call for additional consideration by the Rt. Rev. David Lewis, retired Suffragan Bishop of Virginia and others, the Committee recommends an additional \$4,000 for the Chaplain Service of Virginia. This will increase by \$9,000 the funds for the program that provides chaplain services for our state prisons.

Also, in response to concerns expressed during the open hearings yesterday, \$2,855 was added under Category D, Missions and Church Planting under item 5b. Miscellaneous on page 2, with an encouragement from the Committee to the Commission on Congregational Missions to work with Bishop Jones to enhance the compensation level for vicars in the Diocese.

As noted in the pre-Council meetings, funds were added for various committees of the Executive Board as requested by the Executive Committee's Working Group on Program.

Under Category G, the added funds over the pre-Council budget will allow the Bishop to increase the average compensation of staff by 4 percent for the coming year, as well as realign salaries to reflect new duties assigned during the restructuring of staff of the past year.

The final area of consideration for the 1999 operating budget is to allocate .7 percent of pledge income, or \$25,000, for the coming year to micro-economic development projects as a vehicle for Bishop Lee, in consultation with the Executive Board to begin to address specific development needs in developing countries.

Bishop, this completes the first part of the Budget Committee's report, and I respectfully move that the 1999 budget be adopted as recommended by the Committee.

Bishop Lee noted that the motion comes from a Committee of Council and therefore needs no second. He called for discussion. There was none. Bishop Lee called for a vote, the matter succeeded and the 1999 diocesan budget was adopted. (See Appendix IV, page 497)

Following adoption of the budget, Mr. Harry Strong, Truro, Fairfax, proposed a resolution to allocate any unanticipated income received in fiscal year 1999 with 50 percent to overseas mission programs and 50 percent to church planting.

Bishop Lee noted that for the resolution to be considered by Council would require a two-thirds majority vote of the Council. He called for a vote; the matter failed.

Mr. Paxton continued with his report:

From the \$379,618 of unused 1998 funds prior to audit, the committee, after consultation with Bishop Lee, recommends the following. You will note that each project is one-time in nature. This is to insure that future operational budgets are not burdened to meet the needs created by these projects.

First, in keeping with the philosophy adopted by last year's council, 10 percent or approximately \$40,000 is recommended to be tithed to overseas missions. There is much need in the third world and in particular the Sudan, Colombia and Honduras are in extreme need of assistance. In addition, we heard from Bishop Barham of Rwanda of the need for funds to develop a school for orphans in his country. We recommend that the \$40,000 be set aside to allow the Bishop, in consultation with the Executive Board to address these and other needs. We further recommend that special consideration be given by the Executive Board to the request of Bishop Barham as that Diocese meets the challenge of building their school.

Next, \$125,000 is recommended to be used to provide compensation and program support for an assistant to the Bishop for Outreach and Witness for a period of two years. Bishop Lee addressed his vision for this position in his pastoral address and introduced the Rev. Lynne Washington who is to fill this position. Managing the outreach ministries is very time-consuming but has the opportunity to fulfill many of the needs in intercity outreach, grantsmanship and other related areas that currently are being accomplished as time allows by Ms. Happy Pullman in addition to her work as Chief of Staff and Coordinator of Program (Shrine Mont and Roslyn), and by Bishop Lee. We feel that with added attention this area will flourish. This project is recommended to be under the direction of the Bishop and the Executive Board.

As with the funds that remained from 1997, \$84,618 is recommended as a one-time addition to the funds held to acquire land for church plants in the future. A vital step in the expansion of ministry in the Diocese of Virginia.

Finally, we recommend two initiatives to address the pressing need for young priests:

\$25,000 is recommended for the Young Priests Initiative. These funds would allow the working group of the Rev. Percy Grant, the Rev. Tony Pompa, Mr. Henry Burt and the Rev. Paul Walker of Christ Church, Charlottesville to work with Bishop Lee to model a program that will raise the awareness of the priesthood as a vocation for our young people, and to provide summer work experiences for those considering a call to the ministry.

Further, \$105,000 is recommended to set up a pilot intern program in the Diocese to allow three interns to be added to the diocesan staff from June 1999 through May 2000. Each intern would be assigned by Bishop Lee in the fields of communication, finance and program with the special intention of providing services out in our regions and congregations. The overall goal of the program is to enable college graduates to better discern a call to ministry within the church, be it lay or ordained.

Bishop Lee, these recommendations fully allocate the funds that are expected to be available upon the completion of the audit. The committee recommends that Council approve these projects as presented.

Bishop Lee called for discussion.

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Mr. Richard Hines, Church of the Apostles, Fairfax, asked that the Committee on World Mission be consulted for advice on the allocation of monies for overseas missions.

Bishop Lee noted that the Committee on World Missions is a committee of the Executive Board. Mr. Hines requested that Council so stipulate. Mr. Paxton said that such consultation is how he anticipates the allocations will be made.

The Rev. Martyn Minns affirmed the work of the Committee and moved a friendly amendment to aid those in greatest need by moving \$60,000 from the diocesan internship program to overseas mission.

Mr. Paxton said that the internship program could be slow in starting and accepted Mr. Minns' friendly amendment.

Ms. Sandy Walker, All Saints', Dale City, questioned the need for \$125,000 for the position of Assistant to the Bishop for Outreach and Witness. Mr. Paxton noted that the proposal is only for a two-year program.

Mr. Dexter Fox, Trinity, Manassas and member of the Executive Board, hailed the proposed allocation of funds to the Young Priests Initiative as a good way to attract young people to the ordained ministry and reminded Council of the desperate need to build leadership by noting that the money for this proposal is available due in part to unpaid salaries and vacant leadership positions. The Rev. Sue Eaves, St. James's, Richmond affirmed the need for the Church to lead young people.

There was no further discussion. Bishop Lee called for a vote; the matter succeeded and the proposed allocations were adopted, as amended and pending the outcome of the 1998 audit.

Bishop Lee affirmed the approved allocations to world mission and reaching out to young people as complementary and in keeping with the vision of Virginia Plan 2000.

Mr. Paxton continued with his report:

Once again, it has been a pleasure to have served you the past two years as Budget Chair. Thank you to each of you for your commitment to our work together. Mr. President, I ask that the Budget Committee of the 204th Annual Council be discharged.

Bishop Lee thanked Mr. Paxton for his report, and discharged the committee with the thanks of Council and with the hopeful request that subsequent years have similar financial outcomes.

Bishop Lee announced that the meeting of the 205th Annual Council will take place Feb. 4-5, 2000 at a site to be determined. He then called council to its feet to sing Hymn 397, "Now thank we all our God," following which he gave the final blessing and declared the 204th Annual Council adjourned. *Sine die.*

Report of Region I

In support of our mission to help enable the local parish and the Diocese in carrying out their mission to the world as witnesses to God's love, Region I has provided programs on Faith Alive, the World Missions Committee, the Rainbow Youth Mission Trip to the Diocese of Christ the King in South Africa, and Sophia House, a retreat center that will provide facilities for all people whether handicapped or not.

A day of prayer for children was set aside in September. Many churches participated by having their buildings open for continuous prayer from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Another region implemented that idea also. It is hoped that more of the Diocese will participate next year. All children here and abroad need our support.

Youth ministry continues to be of prime importance for the region. The Voices program run by the young people under the guidance of their leaders brings the youth together from around the region. They also have a campout, a Shrine Mont weekend and a dinner.

Our support of missions in the region, the Diocese and the world includes funds for St. Paul's College, Thurman Brisben Homeless Shelter, Campus Christian Ministry, the Ecumenical Resource Center, Madison Emergency Services, Sophia House, the Diocese of South Dakota, Bethlehem Arab Society, a scholaship at Escuela Espiritu Santo and Bishop Frade in Honduras, the Diocesan Fund for Human Need and the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief.

In April our annual dinner was held at St. George's, Fredericksburg, with Bishop David Colin Jones as our guest speaker.

The Rev. Sherry Hardwick Thomas of St. James', Louisa, the Rev. Anne Manson of Church of the Incarnation, Mineral, and the Rev. Melanie McCarley were welcomed as new priests to Region I.

In November, Jack Gaines of St. Mary's, Colonial Beach was elected Executive Board representative to succeed the Rev. Jim Reed, Messiah Church, Fredericksburg at the end of the Annual Council, February 1999.

An updated directory, our newsletter *The Harbinger* (under the able editorship of Mrs. Jackie Drumheller of St. James', Louisa), and a display board serve as means of communication among the churches.

Report of Region II

Region II is the largest region, area size, in the Diocese of Virginia, traversing the counties of Gloucester, Middlesex, Mathews, Lancaster, Richmond, Westmoreland, Northumberland, King William, King & Queen and Essex. Within the region are 22

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churches, served by 18 priests. St. Margaret's School and Christchurch School are also nestled in the countryside of the region. Although this is not based on "scientific research," Region II prides itself on being the busiest, the friendliest and the most "laid-back" region! In the last quarter of this year, we welcomed two new priests to the region, and for this brief time, the region had no churches in the search process!

Outreach continues to be a focus of Region II. We again supported the Cluster Ministry with a budgeted item of \$8,200. We also provided camp scholarships for Shrine Mont Camps and gave \$1,000 to several children from Region II who were members of the Diocesan South African Rainbow Youth Mission Trip that visited the Diocese of Christ the King this summer. The region also gave a one-time contribution to 10 youths attending the Junior High Fall Weekend at Shrine Mont.

Region II has been intentional in responding to Bishop Lee's charge in Virginia Plan 2000 by continuing our affirmation of unity, love and witness. We are 1) emphasizing the **planting of new churches**. A parcel of land has been identified in Region II as a possible site for future planting of a new church, and an *ad hoc* group has met with Bishop Jones. 2) **Revitalizing existing churches**: Several of our smaller parishes are happily experiencing phenomenal growth this year. 3) **Expanding youth ministries**: In May, the region held a sexual abuse prevention workshop focusing on youth protection. We hired a youth coordinator, and 40 people attended a one-day "Summer Celebration" on July 18. On November 1 a new youth coordinator joined the region's team, met with the Youth Advisory Committee and will attend the first youth event for 1999 in January.

Region II is still involved in a great deal of fellowship, which begins with our Pre-Council Supper, continues with our Caucus at Council and culminates with our Pig Roast in June.

We feel God's hand in all that we do in Region II.

Report of Region III

In 1998, Region 3 Council focused on local outreach programs—as one rector put it—as corporate, common efforts. For example, our efforts in the spring were directed toward planning for the Region 3 Race Relations Workshop, in which 45 people participated on May 9. The Rev. Carla Thompson of Trinity was our clergy leader. We received much valuable counsel and support from the Diocesan Race Relations Committee and from Kent Hamaker, Church of the Holy Cross, Dunn Loring. Maria Wilson, president of Region 8 and member of the Race Relations Committee, was a featured speaker.

The Dexter family of St. Michael's once again constructed an exhibit of the life and work of the Episcopal Churches of Arlington at the Arlington County Fair in August, Virginia's only urban county fair. Each of our 10 churches and missions staffed the exhibit with rotating teams. According to St. George's, three new families joined the parish as a result of learning about the church from the exhibit.

On September 20, Region 3 Council voted to join the Save ARNA Valley Coalition, which is a broad-based citizen effort in Arlington to keep the Hispanic Community intact in ARNA Valley. A Real Estate Investment Trust's plan to redevelop the area into luxury town homes within easy reach of the Pentagon would force the evacuation of over 700 residents—47 percent of whom are El Salvadoran immigrants. We wrote the Arlington County Board to express our concern and state our opposition to the developer's plan, together with the Arlington Interfaith Council and Roman Catholic parishes.

In addition, St. George's hosted an evening in March of choral music produced by our combined choirs that has become a tradition for Region 3. Another tradition is our annual Potluck Supper, which the newly refurbished St. Mary's hosted in May in a beautiful setting. A third tradition is our St. Luke's Day Healing Service at Trinity Church in October.

The Council has started publication of a Region 3 Newsletter to enhance communication across the Region of the outreach programs and Christian education offerings of our parishes.

Twice this year, the Dean and President participated in the meetings of the Diocesan Executive Board, which updated us on the priorities of the Diocese and provided a forum for deans and presidents from all 15 regions to meet and share experiences. Once again, I would like to offer a personal word of thanks to the Very Rev. Anna Stribling, Dean of Region 3, for an harmonious and supportive working relationship, and to the other officers serving this year: Vice President Terri Katon, Secretary Bill Schenck and Treasurer Delores King.

Report of Region IV

This year brought several changes to Region IV. We began 1998 with a new president and an experienced Dean. This quickly became a combination of new president, new dean, and seasoned delegates! We continue to uplift Meade Memorial Church in its search and will prayerfully support St. Clement's Church as it bids farewell to the Rev. Rosemari Sullivan.

A public relations/advertising/evangelism task force was formed with representation from each church. This group planned a joint ad for Easter services which was run in several Washington and Virginia papers. The group comtinues to work on a folder containing a brief description of our eight churches and a map with their locations. We anticipate placing them in strategic places in Alexandria.

Clergy and members from St. Paul's and Christ Church were joined by two other churches

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for a missionary journey to the southern Sudan where Bishop Daniel Deng Bul is ministering under extremely adverse conditions. Support for the Sudanese community in our area is also a priority.

There was sufficient financial support from our regional churches and the general public to assist St. Clement's Church in its annual opening of their church on winter nights to accommodate the homeless. Members of all the churches serve in the city shelter on a rotating schedule and provide meals in the evening.

Initiated by one parish and endorsed by all clergy and the regional council was a letter to local papers responding to the abuse of one citizen's property because of prejudice. We are being called upon to take a more outward response to the social injustices that surround us.

Christ Church and Meade Memorial Church jointly hosted a race relations seminar led by the diocesan race relations committee. Other goals for combined regional ministries center around our youth.

Many of the events and outreach ministries in our region are community efforts. One parish takes the lead and creates the energy and vision which is supported by members and leaders in our other churches. Our clericus gatherings have renewed energy with monthly speakers and include those non-parochial clergy who work in our region or are living here in retirement. Together we are attempting to respond as God calls us into action after prayer and discernment. I feel truly blessed to be part of this active and caring community.

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Report of Region VI

Individuals in several of the churches of the Region took part in overseas mission trips. These included George Walker of All Saints, Dale City, who went to Uganda; and Kathy Oravetz of Christ Our Lord, Lake Ridge, who went to Poland.

The Region welcomed The Rev. Rachelle Birnbaum, who was called as Rector to All Saints', Sharon Chapel.

Finally, the Region, with great sadness, said good-bye to Rear Admiral Douglas F. Mow, Sr. who died on November 25. Doug was a faithful and active member of St. James', Mt. Vernon, and Chair of the Commission on Church Planting. We will miss him.

Report of Region X

Empowered by the Holy Spirit and led by the Bishops, Region X serves as a bond between its parishes and the Diocese and other religious organizations. In 1997-98 we continued our minisries to each other and the world through prayer, action and monetary support of various activities and programs. Our 1997-98 budget was approved by the Executive Board last fall; it includes contributions to the Virginia Commonwealth University Campus Ministry in which all five churches participate. We miss the presence and counsel of the Rev. Leigh Spruill, formerly of St. James's, who coordinated this college minisry. We also miss our Region X Council Secretary, Ms. Robin Simms, who moved to North Carolina.

Region *X* is continuing its discussion on how best to provide human needs ministries in central Richmond following the disappearance of Grace House, a neighborhood center located in our region, and the Greater Richmond Episcopal Cooperative Ministries (GRECOM) organization. We are considering establishing a social worker position in the region to coordinate human services. We are still looking for potential partners in Regions 9, 11 and 12 for urban ministries. We plan to propose a specific program or programs for 1999 to our member churches.

Region X Council elected the Rev. Charles D. "Buck" Aiken, Jr. of St. Mark's to replace Robin Simms as Council Secretary. Steve van Voorhees, Church of the Holy Comforter, begins the last year of his term as President. Betty Woolard, Grace and Holy Trinity, continues as Treasurer and Howard Pugh, St. Mark's, remains as our Executive Board representative. Ms. Johnnie Lou Terry, St. James's, is our Alternate Executive Board member.

Region X's Thanksgiving Eucharist at Grace and Holy Trinity was held again this year with Holy Comforter participating. We continue planning other joint worship services. The Very Rev. George Muir, our Dean, is coordinating a regional Lenten Teaching Series to rotate among three of our churches this coming year. Region X will host a diocesan Racism Workshop for our parishes on February 27 at Holy Comforter, and is inviting paticipation from the surrounding regions.

Continuing a Region X tradition, we will have a regional dinner at Holy Comforter for our

Council members, vestries and church staffs with a short program on January 19, featuring the Rt. Rev. Francis Campbell Gray, the new Assistant Bishop of Virginia, as our guest.

Each one of our congregations has a distinct personality, membership and different ministries. And yet, we have also discovered with joy that we can affirm and celebrate each other's differences. We know that some shared ministry in the city will give us an opportunity to blend our strengths and talents into something that any of us acting alone could not accomplish. We pray for the power, guidance and inspiration of the Holy Trinity to carry us through the coming year together.

Report of Region XV

The past year has been a busy one for Region XV. Perhaps the most exciting thing to happen here in the last year is the first "public" worship service for our newest member church, the Church of the Cross. The joyful Eucharist, led by vicar Terry Sweeney and

attended by many visitors, Region XV supporters, and the ever-growing core congregation, was followed by the sharing of a 12-foot banana split.

During the spring and summer, Region XV built an "all-Episcopal house" with Habitat for Humanity. Many individuals from our 19 member churches participated, working alongside the Albarran family, for whom the house was built. The house was dedicated August 22 by the Rev. Ed Pippin.

Region XV was proud to send six young people and one adult to South Africa on the Rainbow Youth Mission Trip this summer.

Ongoing ministries supported by Region XV include Trinity Child Care and Preschool, the Ministry with the Aging, and the Alliance for Interfaith Ministries, which provides temporary assistance to those in need.

Report of the Commission on Congregational Development and Revitalization

The Commission on Congregational Development and Revitalization is now in its fifth year of service to the Diocese of Virginia. The Commission was formed in 1994 to respond to a need to strengthen existing congregations in the Diocese, a need which is one of three diocesan priorities.

The principal work of the Commission this year was the initiation of the Parish Development Overnights, a training and resourcing event for congregations by size. The overnights were sponsored jointly by the Commission and the Diocesan Center at Roslyn. Over 75% of our congregations sent representatives and participant response to the program was resoundingly positive. Planning for the 1999 conferences is now underway. We encourage every congregation to participate in this event.

The Commission also sponsored this year the "Wrestling with Angels: The Spirituality of Conflict" workshop at the Parish Leadership Training Event. This workshop, keynoted by the Rt. Rev. J. M. Mark Dyer, examined conflict from a theological perspective rather than a conflict management model. Audio tapes of Bishop Dyer's addresses are available through the Commission. The design of this conference has been shared with other dioceses through the Province III Ministry Lab.

In 1999 the Commission and Roslyn are bringing the Church Development Institute to the

Diocese. This is an intensive training in congregational systems for clergy and lay leaders. While this training is available through both The General Theological Seminary and the School of Theology at the University of the South, bringing the Institute to Virginia is a way to make it available to more in our diocese, especially lay leaders, at a reasonable cost and with a manageable time commitment.

The commission has responsibility with Bishop Jones for the Parish Revitalization Program. Consultations are currently underway in five congregations. Since 1994 over 15 congregations have participated in this process. The commission also provides trained consultants to lead vestry retreats and work with revitalization committees. Congregations interested in the Parish revitalization program or the other services of the Commissions may contact one of the bishops, the Rev. Anthony R. Pompa, assistant for congregational and ministry development or the chair of the commission, the Rev. Steven A. Miller.

Report of the Commission on Congregational Missions

The Commission on Congregational Missions is responsible for assisting the Bishops in the oversight of small and mission churches. Most of our meetings are held in mission churches throughout the Diocese. These visits provide an opportunity to meet with church leaders and learn of their goals and dreams for their congregations. CCM provides a direct link between these congregations and the resources and leadership of the Diocese.

Each year brings change and added responsibilities to this organization, as we are the commission that small and mission churches can look to for advice, council, and financial help. Whether it be a short or long term financial need or just someone to talk over a problem with we are always available.

Under our current structure, Bishop Jones is rector of all mission churches. Roy Barksdale is the chair of CCM and shares oversight with Bishop Jones. Barbara Levy is the Liaison Coordinator and as needed works with the liaisons assigned to each church.

We currently have 12 liaisons assigned to the 33 churches that we work with. Each liaison will visit or contact their assigned churches each month to be of assistance where needed and are always available if needed by the vicar or vestry.

We look upon the job of a liaison to be a friend to the church and a representative of the Diocese of Virginia. They are there to listen, observe and give advice and council when asked to do so by the vicar or the vestry. They do not make command decisions nor dictate policy.

Each year the liaison is responsible for receiving a request for funds if needed and also a budget from that church to be reviewed by the Budget Committee of CCM and then by the entire commission. If approved the amount requested will be added to the CCM budget along with the other requests. At that point, the entire budget is submitted to the Diocesan Executive Board for funding from the Annual Council budget.

With the help of various funds, we assist churches in many ways for a variety of reasons. Our shared goal is to help stimulate growth in that congregation so that in 5 years, the financial growth will overcome the need for aid and the church will again be self-supporting.

Additionally, we are in a position to respond to emergencies such as the need for a furnace or help with a roof through our CCM miscellaneous funds of about \$10,000 dollars each year.

Another form of funding that has just become available to us in 1998 is the Reid Trust. The Reid Trust is a fund which was left to the Diocese of Virginia to help carry on the work of mountain missions. A portion of this fund we call deferred maintenance. A major problem of churches with limited funds is the inability to adequately maintain their buildings. Many of these churches date back 75 to 150 years, upkeep is a major expense that unfortunately comes last on their list, and many repairs are never done due to the lack of funds.

We now are able to offer assistance as needed to help correct a problem before it becomes a major expense. We feel that having this new maintenance fund available even with its limited monies will over the years help preserve many of our church buildings and other facilities.

We are also involved with new church plants. If after their diocesan, regional, and other financial support has been exhausted and if their plate and pledge income is not sufficient for self-support, we are then contacted for assistance.

I hope that this brief overview of the Commission on Congregational Missions has helped you to better understand our organization and its mission.

Report of Episcopal Church Women

Calendar year 1998 has been and continues to be busy and most fruitful for Episcopal Church Women in the Diocese of Virginia. For purposes of organization, I will address our endeavors chronologically in this report.

In March we began with a Diocesan ECW Board meeting at Mayo House, Richmond, our diocesan seat. Eucharist with Bishop Lee and a tour of Mayo House supplemented regula business and discussion.

The annual Prayer and Worship Retreat was held April 28-29 at Roslyn, our retreat center in Richmond. Carter Echols, lay canon missioner at the National Cathedral in Washington led the group on the subject "The Forgiving Heart."

Our Open Board Meeting at St. Barnabas', Annandale in May was a joyful occasion. Many women from churches without active ECWs attended, and our program on "Ecumenism in the Diocese of Virginia" given by the Rev. Charles Sydnor, Chair of the Diocesan

Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission generated much interest.

In August, the diocesan ECW Board met at a private home for business and luncheon. A new mission statement was adopted for the organization:

"The Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Virginia, together share the love of God through prayer, service and education, in knowing Christ and making Him known."

Our other major decision in August was to adopt St. Andrew's School, Richmond, as a mission of our organization. St. Andrew's School, founded about 100 years ago by an Episcopal Church Woman, gives primary education (grades K-5) tuition-free to approximately 100 students from low-income families. Support for St. Andrew's School is one way in which the ECW can support our Bishop's Vision 2000 which has as a primary goal support of children.

Our 107th annual meeting, held at St. Stephen's Church, Richmond on October 8, featured our two bishops who shared their thoughts about the Lambeth Conference and what it means for the person in the pew. During the Eucharist, the 109th ingathering of the United Thank Offering was received, and our second travel team to the Diocese of Christ the King, South Africa, was commissioned. Communion alms and our Viva Voce offering were equally divided between St. Andrew's School and the Jackson-Feild Home for girls. An additional highlight of our annual meeting was a ministries fair which suggested many ways in which women can offer their time and talents to further the work of Christ's kingdom.

Four women left for South Africa for two weeks on October 9. Our purpose was to strengthen ties with women of the Diocesan Women's Project (DWP), our counterpart, and to identify ways in which we can be mutually supportive.

Our year concluded with an overnight board meeting at Roslyn in November, during which the diocesan ECW Board visited St. Andrew's School for Eucharist with the children and a tour of the school. Each member brought a new, hardcover book for the school library. Our business focused on charting the direction of our organization as we move toward a new century. Our current challenges are many, but so too are our opportunities.

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Report of Diocesan Missionary Society

On behalf of the Boad of Trustees of the Diocesan Missionary Society (DMS), I am pleased to submit this report of the activities of DMS during the past year.

DMS is an independent not-for-profit corporation that operates in close affiliation with the Diocese to provide financial support to parishes engaged in the construction or renovation of church buildings or related facilities. Such assistance normally takes the form of below-market-rate loans made by DMS on a five-year, renewable term basis. At present, DMS has some \$8.4 million in loans outstanding to 32 parishes throughout the Diocese.

The sources of funds used by DMS in its revolving loan programs are 1) gifts made to DMS by parishes and individuals throughout the Diocese, and 2) loans made to DMS by parishes and related trust funds. Currently, DMS has a net worth of approximately \$11 million.

The Board of DMS continues to seek additional funds to be used in this important ministry. Requests for DMS assistance substantially exceed the resources. The cost of planting new churches continues to rise. Accordingly, the DMS Board invites vestries and the trustees of various parish and church-related trust funds throughout the Diocese to consider loans to DMS as part of their portfolios of investments. Indeed, with the substantially reduced returns now available on market investments, DMS's standard 6.5% interest rate (on a typical 15-year loan) is attractive. Moreover, loans to DMS are fairly safe investments. DMS (which was founded in 1829) has never defaulted on a financial obligation, but more importantly, an investment in DMS provides an opportunity to participate in the ongoing missionary activities of the Diocese, a purpose which under most church-related trust instruments probably justifies a more modest return for at lesat a portion of the trust assets.

During this year, DMS decided to invest \$750,000 of the \$1.4 million Reid Fund with the Trustees of the Funds in order to protect the Fund against inflation over time. The balance of the Reid Fund is included in the DMS funds now available to loan to parishes.

The amount of funds available to loan fluctuates from month to month. At this writing, DMS has \$1,907,430 available for loans and will be happy to consider applications from needy parishes and churches.

The members of the DMS Board stand ready to respond to any questions or inquiries from parishes throughout the Diocese concerning either investments in DMS or possible DMS involvement in parish building or expansion programs. Such inquiries may be directed to me or to any other member of the DMS Board. DMS looks forward to continuing and expanding its service to the Diocese in the years ahead.

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Report of the Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission

Our mission is given the imperative of our Lord Jesus Christ who prayed that we all might be one and who mandates that we love our neighbor as ourselves as the way of loving the one God of us all.

In seeking to fulfill this mission during the past year, your diocesan Ecumenical and Interfaith Commission (DEIC) has been involved with the pulse of ecumenical developments in the following ways: participating in the joint Ecumenical Commissions Conference of the Virginia Council of Churches with keynoter Bishop Vinton Anderson, a Vice President of the World Council of Churches, planning and paticipating in the annual LARC (Lutheran, Anglican, Roman Catholic) Conference which continues to fulfill our historic 1990 Statewide Covenant, being represented at the National Workshop on

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Christian Unity and Annual Meeting of Episcopal and Diocesan Ecumenical Officers (EDEO) in St. Paul, MN, at the Virginia Synod of the Lutheran Church, at meetings of the Episcopal Church Women of our diocese, the Ecumenical Commission of the Catholic Diocese of Richmond and in many other ways.

We note three significant ecumencial and interfaith developments during this year:

- 1. The revised Concordat, now entitled "Called to Common Mission," has been reviewed by the 65 synods of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), with their input resulting in additional revisions to be presented for vote at their Churchwide Assembly in Denver in July 1999. The revisions seem to be not substantive but clarification which, we believe, increase the likelihood of approval of full communion between our church and the ELCA.
- 2. In a world of prejudice and misunderstanding, commission members have begun informal dialogues with our Muslim neighbors toward the goal of developing models of interfaith dialogue for parish use.
- 3. Noting that ecumenism is seldom taught in our Sunday schools and the void of such curriculum materials, we are beginning, with a consultant, to develop teaching materials including videos for parish use with children of all ages.

Our commission notes with thanksgiving that Phebe Hoff received national recognition as the first recipient of the Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical Officers Award for over 50 years of outstanding ecumenical leadership and as "Founding Mother" of EDEO. With appreciation for their service, we recognize the resignations of Rosemary Sheatsley and Virginia Pelling, a consulting status for Dick Abbot and regret the death of Anne Board, commission member. We welcomed the following new members: Kitty Babson, Bruce Gray, Carolyn Lillenthal, John Hortum, Ted Haddix, Ron Woodruff, Gladys Lewis and Ginny Montgomery.

Our commission is grateful for the opportunity to serve as agents of reconciliation in our world where global technology means everyone lives next door.

Report of the Committee on Evangelism

The Committee on Evangelism meets regularly to pray for and discuss ways that our diocese can work to fulfill the Great Commission of our Lord. In 1998 the committee adopted a new mission statement to express our intentions in this regard:

To help churches and individuals experience and share a compelling faith in Jesus Christ in order that the people of our diocese, working together, will have the heart and the means to reach our varied communities and the world with the Gospel of salvation.

In 1998 a web page was introduced to encourage the networking of evangelism ministries. Internet visitors find the site at "www.jcsolutions.com/evangels".

The Evangelism Roundtable at the Parish Leadership Training Event was energized by a presentation on "Why we should define a target audience." The Rev. George Beaven led an informative discussion with representatives from approximately ten parishes.

The Committee invites requests for financial assistance to promote ministries of evangelism at the parish level. Criteria for these requests can be found on the web page. In 1998 grants assisted:

Evangelism missions at St. Paul's, West Point, Calvary Church, Hanover, and Grace Church, Miller's Tavern.

"Youth Alpha Day" (the Alpha Course in a day) for teens in northern Virginia, cosponsored by Region 13, St. Matthew's, Sterling, and Christ the Redeemer, Chantilly.

Scholarships for small churches in the Diocese of Virginia to host Faith Alive weekends.

A pressing issue facing the Committee is the need for energized and consistent membership. The Committee has grown to appreciate the long-term contribution of a dedicated few, but additional members to better represent the diocese would add a great strength to the mission set before us.

Many churches in our diocese are putting the ministry of evangelism at the center of their parish life. More than fifteen churches have active Alpha Courses, others have hosted Faith Alive Weekends, some are teaching "relationship evangelism", and some have created small groups that attract people from diverse life situations. Parishioners throughout the diocese are living out the Great Commission through Habitat for Humanity, Cursillo, Happening, Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and prison ministries, to name only a few of many organized efforts. In these, and many other ways, the diocese is seeking to make the Good News of Jesus Christ known. The Committee seeks to make others aware of these great treasures already in our midst. We invite a more intense use of the Committee's resources and connections to vital evangelism ministries.

Report of the Diocesan Fund for Human Need Grant Board

The Diocesan Fund for Human Need encourages and rewards parishioners' direct involvement in local initiatives, matching their gifts and volunteer hours with dollars from the Fund. The Fund is completing its tenth year of grant making, and wonderful things continue to transpire as a result of its work.

To date the Fund has made 92 grants for a total of \$407,706. The fund receives voluntary

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contributions from individuals, churches and others. In 1998, \$38,388.93 was received from 62 contributors. The size of gifts ranges from \$1.00 to \$3,800. We hope that all members of the Diocese will continue to spread the word about the Diocesan Fund for Human Need. Here are three suggestions:

- 1. Remind parishes that applications and guidelines are available at the Mayo Memorial Church House in the Program Office.
- 2. Remind parishes also that this important ministry is funded entirely by volunteer contributions. Many of these contributions are very small. All are very useful.
- 3. When a parish in your region receives a grant, they are instructed by the Diocesan Fund for Human Need Grant Board to make a verbal report to their Regional Council. You receive a copy of the letter from the Bishop announcing a grant award. Please invite the parish project team to come to a regional meeting sometime within the next year.

Members of the Diocesan Fund for Human Need Grant Board are available to help parishes or regions develop their grant requests. Please feel free to call them with any questions you may have.

Report of Goodwin House, Inc.

The recent year has been a time of renewal and a time of focusing on core values. Celebrated activities include the renovation and expansion of Goodwin House, growth of our Foundation, enriching resident programs, extending our hospice and home care programs, and setting into motion a clinical pastoral education (CPE) program for students.

The rapid change in the desires of older persons requires the organization to refocus and renew our services and facilities. The process of renewal, although difficult, helps us focus on our core values of providing the highest quality services, being a community of Christian faith, having respect for others, responding to people in need and serving our community. This renewal was celebrated with a service of rededication by Bishop Lee at Goodwin House on December 3, 1998.

The renovations at Goodwin House will be complete in March 1999. Please visit to see our work in progress! Goodwin House West is under constant renewal so that we can better serve the residents. Program offerings are being enriched and expanded. There is a strong emphasis on wellness, fitness, arts and lifetime learning.

We have developed several exciting new programs including a formal hospice program and licensure of our home care program. The Eden Alternative concept is a major new program for 1999.

Education and training are a priority for the organization. GHI University offers a wide array of mandatory and elective courses including supervisory skills and basic skills, such as ESL and GED preparation. Residents and staff continue to be actively involved with schools in the wider community, from elementary schools to graduate programs. The CPE program began last summer with four students and has continued with four new students this academic year. The Rev. Ruth D. Walsh is leading the program.

Our mission is to serve the community of Northern Virginia. We reach out to persons in need with our financial assistance program. Our Foundation continues its strong progress toward a goal of \$12 million by the year 2002 so that we can continue to serve a greater number of persons of low and moderate financial resources. The residents continue to help those in need by supporting projects such as homeless shelters locally or, internationally, by raising over \$14,000 in a week to help the victims of Hurricane Mitch in Central America.

We look forward to serving you in the future.

Report of the Commission on Ministry

In conjunction with the Bishops, the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Boad of Examining Chaplains, the Middle Atlantic Parish Training Program Board and Director, the New Clergy Development Program Director, the presenting priests and vestries of sponsoring congregations, and persons pursuing Holy Orders, the Commission on Minisry continued to faithfully carry out its canonical charges and responsibilities related to the ministry of all baptized persons.

In the discharge of these responsibilities, representatives of the Commission on Ministry continue to engage with other diocesan bodies. Of the issues before the Council on Missions and Church Planting, the gifts and formation necessary for church planters are of paticular interest to the Commission on Ministry. Members of the Commission on Professional Standards and Support are engaged in defining continuing education expectations, reviewing clergy compensation norms, and developing standards for persons engaged in spiritual direction. The issues of self-care and support, as well as expectations for clergy behavior in pastoral relationships, are continuing matters of interest through the Commission on the Prevention of Clergy Sexual Misconduct. Again, during 1998 Commission members served as national level readers of the General Ordination Examinations and as members of Response Teams, formed to investigate allegations of clergy sexual misconduct. An *ad hoc* group with membership from the Standing Committee and the Commission on Ministry has met regularly to discuss topics of common interest to the two bodies.

Commission members attended the Province III Commission on Ministry meeting in June 1998, held in conjunction with the Province III Synod at Hagerstown, MD. Present were representatives from Commissions on Ministry, Commissions on Lay Ministry, and Standing Committees of twelve of the Province III dioceses, as well as representatives from

five Episcopal seminaries. Topics of particular interest included: the vocational or permanent diaconate and various diocesan preparation programs; the use of local canon ministry and various diocesan preparation programs; issues which hinder inclusion of minority groups, especially deployment; and the General Ordination Examinations.

During 1998 five aspirants were accepted as postulants, two postulants became candidates, and nine candidates were ordained deacons. The Bishop's decisions following postulancy interviews conducted in October and November are not yet known. At the current time there are over 30 aspirants active at the parish level in the diocesan ordination process.

The Commission continues to grapple with the tension between the growing need for ordained persons employed full-time by the church ("the clergy shortage") and the desire for excellence in ordained ministry. We particularly seek persons who give evidence of leadership skills and demonstrated willingness to take risk, who are imaginative, but who can function within the parameters of the Scriptures and the Book of Common Prayer; and who have the ability to articulate a mature faith. The Diocesan Handbook on the Ordination Process is currently being revised to reflect our ongoing enagement with vocational discernment, theological education and personal formation, as well as to incorporate newly issued canonical forms and supporting documents for required medical and mental health examinations.

The Commission entered a period of reflection and transition, beginning with Bishop Matthews' departure in May, followed by the September departure of longtime staff support, Brenda Bradley, and the resignation of longtime MAPTP Director and Diocesan Examining Chaplain, Betty Wanamaker. With Annual Council 1999, four seasoned veterans will also end their service on the Commission: Gladys Lewis, St. Philip's, Richmond; Bob Davies, St. Thomas', Orange; the Rev. Daniel Robayo, Piedmont Parish, Delaplane; and Peggy L. Hombs, the Church of the Holy Comforter, Richmond. At Bishop Lee's request, Mrs. Lewis and Ms. Hombs will serve as consultants to the Commission.

Report of the Commission for the Prevention of Sexual Misconduct

The Commission under the direction of the Bishop is charged with facilitating prevention training for clergy, lay employees and volunteers as well as in assisting the Bishop in responding pastorally to reported allegations of sexual misconduct. To this end over the past year, the Commission has:

- Purchased and distributed the film "Protecting God's Children" to each parish in the diocese. An abbreviated prevention curriculum was also developed and distributed to accompany the film for all Sunday morning volunteers.
- Designated and recruited regional coordinators for the training for the prevention
 of sexual abuse of children. Designated two diocesan coordinators for adult
 misconduct prevention training as well: the Rev. Randall Prior and the Rev. Milton
 Williams.
- Facilitated prevention workshops across the diocese.

- Recruited new members for the Response Team Pool and conducted introductory and continuing education for Response Team members on November 14, 1998 at Trinity, Fredericksburg.
- Organized, sponsored and publicized "The Challenging Church" colleague and consultation groups in Richmond and Northern Virginia. In a group setting, the groups provide confidential professional and collegial support to clergy in challenging ministries.
- Revised Diocesan Policy and Procedures for the Prevention of Sexual Misconduct in Pastoral Care.
- Convened three Response Teams to assist the Bishop in the pastoral investigation of allegations of clergy sexual misconduct.
- Bid farewell to the original chair, the Rev. Karen Evans, as well as to faithful member, the Rev. John Miller. Added two new members: the Rev. Milton Williams and Ms. Ruth Brock.

Report of the Roslyn Managers Corporation

The Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn flanks the James River at the head of the falls above Richmond. Right at the first fall line sits Bosher's Dam, an artificial barrier present in one form or another since President Washington was in office. In 1998 a fish passage, or ladder, was built on the north bank of the river to let shad bypass the dam and reach spawning ground farther upriver.

Work on the fish ladder was obvious from Powers Hall, the original residence on the property, particularly when the trees undressed for the winter. We were up there working ourselves, giving the old house a new furnace, water heater, some wallpaper. It is usually quiet around Christmas, so we renovate buildings, and house the homeless. This year, with the help of two local parishes, we hosted forty homeless guests for eight days. As we count such things, that works out to 320 guest nights. In 1998, we had over 8,000 such guest nights at the Center, 18,000 conferee days, 28,000 meals prepared, 10,000 visitors for picnics or swimming. (Late December was our only quiet time).

The over 400 groups represented in these statistics were about a third Episcopal, a third other denominations, and a third non-profit service organizations. Many came with their own programs. Quite a few in 1998 came for Roslyn programs. In January we had the well attended and well received Youth Leaders Retreat. The sixth annual Parish Leadership Training Event in March offered 14 programs in a week, and drew hundreds of representatives from 101 parishes. The six Parish Development Overnights, done in conjunction with the Commission of Church Development and Revitalization in October and November, gave an opportunity for the leadership of like sized parishes to gather and learn. 122 parishes took advantage of that opportunity. In July, the inaugural Urban Work

Camp introduced a youth group from St. Paul's, Alexandria, to the Eastview Community in urban Richmond. The results were so heartening, four more camps are scheduled for 1999, together with a course in St. Catherine School's March minimester. Of course, throughout the year we had the usual scattering of Elderhostels.

Not all who enjoyed Roslyn came in groups, though. Our Sabbatical House was in use nearly 6 months in 1998, and we had a fourfold increase in personal retreats at the Center. Two local newspaper articles about personal retreats featuring Roslyn contributed in part to this. We think the ever growing need for quiet and reflection in modern life had more to do with it. Open space, still moments, and chance to listen for the whispers of God are increasingly rare. The long range planning currently underway at the Center is taking pains to remember this. We have begun working on the future of the grounds with the planting of 29 long lived hardwood trees in the last 14 months. Most of these trees were donated to the Center as part of the "Trees at Roslyn" program, where special moments or people are remembered in the planting of trees. We have also installed dozens of benches on the grounds, so guests can appreciate the new, and old, trees. And so they can listen for whispers.

In 1998, we implemented, new programs, new services in housekeeping, food service and administration, installed new computers, computer programs, scanners and web sites, worked more efficiently, worked more intelligently. People came here for none of these reasons. They came looking for God in a world where God can seem very far away. The journey there is long and uncertain, with obstacles barring the way like a dam on a river. We are in the ministry of building passages around obstacles, so we may find the way home.

Report of the Sexuality Dialogue Group

The 202nd Annual Council of The Diocese of Virginia mandated through Resolution R-7 that diocesan leaders engage in a serious process of prayerful discernment and discussion with one another regarding the difficult issues surrounding the church and human sexuality. In May, 1997, the Bishop first convened the Sexuality Dialogue Group and it has continued to meet at least twice a year.

The group met three times since the last diocesan council. Those meetings were:

- March 11, 1998, Trinity Church, Fredericksburg, Va. The group decided to find a facilitator to work with them and their process.
- September 27-28, 1998, Shrine Mont. The group began work with Mr. Rob Cahill, a
 member of St. Mary's Arlington as a facilitator. The group decided to replenish the
 membership of the original thirty with voices more representative of the diversity
 within our Diocese.
- January 10-11, 1999, Virginia Diocesan Center at Roslyn with new members. The group began careful examination of the Kuala Lumpur Statement, the Lambeth Resolution and the Lambeth Report. The group re-affirmed its task to continue to look

for ways to create or adapt a model for dialogue for the diocese and to continue meeting to deepen our sense of community with one another and to explore the creation of a dialogue for the diocese.

Report of the Shrine Mont Board

Shrine Mont opened the second weekend of April this year. Over the winter, Peterkin cottage and three more Hotel Cottages were renovated. At their July Board meeting, the Board authorized renovation to begin this November on Atkeson Cottage. Atkeson is known for its large porch that sits over the woods and seems to sing with warm, happy laughter on summer evenings. The finished cottage will have 9 bedrooms with private baths.

The Board also authorized work to begin on a New Camp located in the woods above the Portlock Pond behind Maryland House. The New Camp will be completed by this April and allows the summer camp program an opportunity to move some of its programs from the renovated Hotel cottages. It will also allow for the expansion of existing programs and the creation of a new program, St. Elizabeth's Camp, a camp for mildly to moderately mentally retarded campers.

Over 400 donors gave \$204,392 in 1998 to help with the renovations of Shrine Mont Cottages. The Shrine Mont Development Committee is at work now to raise the funds to pay for the New Camp.

Overall camp attendance was up by 13% this summer. Many of the programs were full including a new camp called The Explorers, which had a very successful start. The 612 campers came from 107 of the 186 churches of the Diocese of Virginia as well as 53 other churches from other denominations or dioceses. The Directors of the summer camp programs were: St. George's Camp—Henry Burt; Music and Drama Camp—Julie Ryder; Young Artists Camp—James Brown; Soccer Camp—Larry Bartenstein; St. Andrew's Camp—Kathy Wincheski; Senior High Youth Conference—William "Yogi" Browning, Cathy Boyd and Travis Ellwanger; Wilderness Odyssey Program—Peter Horne; and The Explorers—Mary Hardy.

Shrine Mont also had these very successful adult programs last summer:

Adult Conference, led by the Rev. John Ohmer

Painting Workshops I and II, coordinated by Emma Lou Martin and Richard Crozier

Shrine Mont, under the operational leadership of Dick and John Moomaw, hosted 200 parish weekends, meetings, conferences and retreats this year. It continues to serve the Diocese with gracious hospitality to all the folks who come to visit "this place set apart for fellowship and growth in the grace of God." We thank you for your support.

Report of the Committee on Stewardship

The Committee on Stewardship in 1998 is comprised of eight members: The Rev. Bradford Rundlett, St. Timothy's, Herndon; Mr. Ron Dobey, Trinity, Fredericksburg; Mr. Howard Hicks, St. Christopher's, Springfield; Ms. Elizabeth Henry, St. Barnabas, Annandale; Mr. Robert Hubbell, Christ Church, Winchester; Mr. Sven van Baars, Grace Memorial, Port Republic; Ms. Janet Adams, St. Dunstan's, McLean; and the Chair, Mr. Harry Raab, Good Shepherd, Burke.

Our committee's sole mission is to help individual parishes in their stewardship work by teaching biblical principles of stewardship and practical ways to motivate giving of time, talent and especially treasure within parishes. Our focus and our principle experience is in annual giving. We assist parishes to develop biblically-based year-round stewardship commitment programs. We offer programs for teaching Vestries. We provide speakers and trainers for individual parishes that ask for our help. We do not run parish commitment programs or tell parishes what they should do. Rather our role is as friendly consultants, teachers and inspirers.

Our year's highlight was the 19th Annual Stewardship Conference at Trinity Church, Fredericksburg, April 18, 1998. The Rev. John Guernsey, All Saints', Dale City, was our Keynote Speaker. Committee members led workshops on "Getting the Vestry on Board," "Year-Round Stewardship," and the "Personal Note Commitment Program." Extensive printed material about stewardship was provided to all attendees, and a copy of the Morehouse workbook on "The Personal Note Commitment Program" was provided to every parish represented at the conference. The conference was attended by 59 people from 33 of our parishes, representing every region of the diocese except Regions 3, 4 and 10. The committee also attended the Stewardship Institute at Roslyn in March.

The committee provided individual parish assistance to 10 parishes that asked for help in 1998. This is substantially fewer parishes than in prior years. The assistance included providing printed material, reviewing plans for the commitment program and helping to carry out the Personal Note Commitment Program. At least seven parishes in our diocese used this new approach to the annual commitment program. One sermon and training sessions for callers and note writers were provided. The committee tries to tailor its work for an individual parish to suit the specific needs of that parish.

The committee plans to present its 20th Annual Stewardship Conference on February 27, 1999 at Trinity Church, Fredericksburg. The Rev. Sara Chandler will be Keynoter. Workshops will be presented on experience with the Personal Note Commitment Program; other options for the commitment program; experience in teaching children about stewardship; planned giving; and ways that the tax code can help finance church work. The committee continues to seek new members to assist us in this important work of serving the Lord. We are grateful for the opportunity to serve the Diocese of Virginia, and pray that our efforts will continue to draw our parishioners closer to Christ.

Report of the Committee on the Stewardship of Creation

"For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities -- his eternal power and divine nature -- have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that men are without excuse."

Romans 1:20

Scripture shows us that God reveals himself through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and also through the created order. In the Outline of Faith (p. 845 in the Book of Common Prayer), the answer to the question of how God first helped us is: "God first helped us by revealing himself and his will, through nature and history, through many seers and saints, and especially through the prophets of Israel." What does it mean to Christians if God's creation suffers abuse and degradation? How can we even begin to understand his "invisible qualities" if we live in such a way that we pollute the air, soil and water and cause the extinction of countless creatures?

The Committee on the Stewardship of Creation continues to provide parishes with resources, speakers and an annual conference to help members of this Diocese understand what is happening to God's creation. It seeks to provide a Biblical basis for action to reverse trends which harm the earth. It strives to be a catalyst for positive change and works for the healing of the relationship between humanity and the world God has created.

To that end, in 1998 the Committee undertook the following activities:

In an effort to be accessible to another part of the Diocese, the fifth annual conference was held in March at the School of Architecture, the University of Virginia in Charlottesville, instead of at Virginia Seminary where all previous conferences have been held. Entitled, God's Creation in Crisis: Designing a Future for All, the conference was co-sponsored by the School of Architecture. It brought together leaders in the fields of "green" architecture, environmental negotiation and economic justice. Speakers included: The Very Rev. William Rankin, Dean of the Episcopal Divinity School (Cambridge, MA); William McDonough, Dean of the School of Architecture (and host of the PBS special "Planet Neighborhood"); Richard Collins, Director of the Institute for Environmental Negotiation at UVA; Michael Lipford, Director of the Virginia Chapter of the Nature Conservancy; and Tena Willemsma, Executive Coordinator of the Commission on Religion in Appalachia (Knoxville, TN). About 100 people from four dioceses participated in the conference, and came from as far away as Baltimore, Maryland. To avoid the use of styrofoam, coffee mugs were provided to participants, with the words, The Earth is the Lord's and Stewardship of Creation, the Diocese of Virginia printed on them;

The Committee sent a follow-up letter to all conference participants, which included the following enclosures:

- a list of conference participants' names, phone numbers and addresses;
- a parish resource from the National Council of Churches (NCC) called "The Environmental Covenant Congregation Program;" and
- an environmental justice resource list, also produced by the NCC;

Provided speakers and/or resources to six parish adult education sessions and at least 20 written or telephone inquiries;

Held seven meetings of the Committee at members' parishes throughout the diocese, in addition to the annual conference and participating in the diocesan commissioning service;

Invited a member of the Southern Environmental Law Center (Charlottesville) to give a presentation at the October committee meeting about power plants and air pollution in Virginia;

Distributed a quarterly newsletter to all parishes in the diocese and other points of contact containing articles written by Committee members relating to Christian earth stewardship, scientific perspectives on environmental concerns, book reviews, helpful web sites and other resources for parishes;

Continued to build a resource library of books, study guides, videos, audiotapes and other resources -- available on loan to parishes upon request;

Contacted every parish in the Diocese to identify a person to serve as liaison between the parish and the Committee and to learn more about what assistance parishes require to initiate or sustain a stewardship of creation ministry

Currently working to compile and distribute a parish resource packet containing prayer, information and action for the earth which will be sent to every parish 5-6 times a year;

Organized a display table and distributed materials at the annual ECW conference, as well as at Annual Council;

Wrote and illustrated a brochure entitled, "Enjoying and Caring for the Natural Beauty of Shrine Mont" and contributed three articles to the Virginia Episcopalian;

Met with Bishop Lee to discuss Committee objectives and ways to reach and assist parishes more effectively;

Provided support for the Committee chair to participate in the provincial synod of Province III and the annual meeting of the national Church's Episcopal Ecological Network at the Kanuga Conference Center in North Carolina;

Confirmed details of the sixth annual diocesan conference, entitled, Climate Change and the Economy of Creation to be held on April 10, 1999 at Virginia Seminary. Speakers will be: the Rev. Dr. Larry Rasmussen, Professor of Social Ethics at Union Theological Seminary in New York; Dr. Herman Daly, Professor of Economics, School of Public Affairs at the University of Maryland, College Park; and Dr. Allen Hammond, Senior Scientist and Director of Strategic Analysis at the World Resources Institute in Washington, DC.

The Committee is dedicated to establishing and supporting earth stewardship ministries in every parish in the diocese.

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Report of the Committee on World Missions

The mission of the Committee on World Missions is to educate and stimulate involvement in global missions through education programs, visits by internationals, mission training and short-term mission trips. We encourage churches and individuals to develop programs for supporting and experiencing ministry with our national and international neighbors through relationships and short-term mission trips.

The Committee's ministry is to encourage God's commandment to evangelize the world (Matthew 28:19) and to assist those in our diocese who are considering or who are planning short-term (less than a year) trips as a means of understanding and sharing God's provision among us both materially and spiritually. This is accomplished by offering short-term mission scholarships (grants) to individuals or churches going on short-term missions and to those attending mission training conferences.

We want to encourage first-time overseas experiences for clergy and key church leaders of small churches by offering financial assistance and to assist churches and regions to receive inspirational Anglican leaders into their communities.

The Committee participates in National Church activities for promoting mission such as the Global Episcopal Mission (GEM) Network, Episcopal Council for Global Mission (ECGM), and the Volunteers for Mission program.

Strategies for 1999

We hear from our third-world Anglican Communion brothers and sisters that our support through prayer and visitations show God's presence in what we do. The Committee believes that the opportunity to respond with our hearts and our going out create a better cross-cultural understanding of Christ in the world and we become spiritually enriched through the experience. The Committee seeks to be an active facilitator in drawing churches in the diocese to act on the commitment of the Great Commission. We have the resources; God has given us His commandment; with faith, he will enable us.

Therefore, the committee will continue to promote missions by:

- Offering missionary visits/speakers to diocesan churches
- Encouraging short-term missions
- Encouraging clergy in first-time mission experience
- Providing an annual directory of mission resources
- Continue developing contact persons in each church for communicating mission interests
- Providing an annual missions conference for sharing current experiences, mission theology and cross cultural training
- Submitting articles to the Virginia Episcopalian, describing mission experience of people from the Diocese

1998 Activities

1. The Committee sponsored a prayer program in November for the persecuted churches in accordance with the 1998 Annual Council instructions in Resolution R-4a. This was in conjunction with a world wide event. Educational kits were advertised, in some cases

provided, to all churches for their participation.

- 2. We provided a manned booth featuring mission displays at the Annual Council. A video was shown, "Catching the Vision for Mission," based on a talk by Bishop Lee. The Committee also hosted a workshop where a stimulating video, "Beyond the Sun", produced by Open Doors, was presented on the struggles of a Christian son returning to visit his Muslim family.
- 3. Mr. Pearce and the Rev. Michael Mohn represented the Diocese at the annual Global Episcopal Missions (GEM) Network Conference in Ellenton (near Sarasota), Florida, in late April. The purpose of the organization is to assist dioceses in developing stronger mission activity. The Rt. Rev. David Reed, former Bishop of Kentucky, was recently named the Executive Director.
- 4. The Committee assisted churches in sponsoring partnerships in Sudan with clergy of the Diocese of Renk who have no income.
- 5. We co-sponsored a training conference at Christ Church, Alexandria, for short-term missions on May 9 with our consultant Mrs. Edwina Thomas, National Director of Sharing of Ministries Abroad (SOMA) providing the instruction. The Committee publicized an October 31 ACMC Mission Conference & Workshops held in Fredericksburg.
- 6. Operating under a minimum budget, we awarded ten scholarships to short-term mission applicants. "Ask About My Mission Trip" buttons produced by the committee are given to all participants so that they can "talk-up" their mission experience.
- 7. Members of the Committee participated in the ECGM (Episcopal Church for Global Mission) annual meeting in New York City in April which was followed by an ECGM sponsored conference on the Suffering Church which the committee helped promote. A large number from the diocese attended the three-day conference. ECGM memberships consists of representatives from Episcopal mission agencies, the National church as well some strong mission dioceses and churches. It is now connected to the Standing Committee on World Mission by action of the last triennial.
- 8. We held our day-and-a-half long planning retreat in February to pray for direction and to develop events and strategy for mission development in the Diocese. Bishop Jones attended, giving enthusiastic insight and counsel on established and proposed mission plans. Mrs. Ann Mingledorff of the ECW and Mrs. Judy Lovegren of the UTO provided valuable insight to the Committee of their organizations mission related activities.
- 9. The ECW Annual meeting October 8 was supported with a missions booth and display. 10. A missions display booth and support of two workshops were provided at the Annual Meeting the Virginia Council of Churches November 9.
- 11. The Committee has been exploring with the Committee on Race a possible conference to assist church leadership in welcoming internationals of our communities into our congregations.
- 12. A subcommittee and a system has been developed for hosting international visitors.
- 13. Consideration has begun on the concept of establishing a separate organization, called Diocesan Fund for World Mission, for raising funds for mission grants and for their distribution.

Annual Report of the Church Pension Fund

Canon 5 requires that at each regular meeting of the Council, there shall be submitted a report concerning the Church Pension Fund. The Church Pension Fund is part of the Church Pension Group, which is a church operated corporation which provides benefits to clergy who have elected either early retirement, retirement at 65 years of age or 68 years of age, or those who must retire at the age of 72. It also provides various benefits to a surviving spouse, for those who have disability benefits and those children of deceased clergy who are eligible for benefits and have not yet reached the age of 21.

The most current statistical information made available to the Chief Financial Officer of the diocese from the Church Pension Fund reflects that total benefits paid by the Church Pension Fund in the fiscal year ended March 31, 1998 to beneficiaries in all 99 domestic dioceses amounted to \$101,078,764. This is an increase of almost \$10 million over 1997.

For the information of the 204th Annual Council, benefits received by recipients within the Diocese of Virginia, based on the Church Pension Fund report dated November 20, 1998, were as follows:

Another unit of the Church Pension Group is the Church Life Insurance Corporation. The Diocese of Virginia continues to maintain a group term life insurance plan for active clergy on the canonical list of the Bishop. This plan is also available for lay employees of churches or related organizations who might qualify under local personnel rules, and therefore be eligible. The current coverage for clergy is \$40,000 term life insurance. The 1999 annual premium for this term life insurance is \$240.

In 1994, the diocese passed Canon 31, mandating health insurance coverage through a diocesan plan. Cigna provides the health and dental benefit plans for 1999. Dental insurance is approved by each church location on a church-by-church basis. Annual insurance premiums through December 31, 1999 are as follows:

The diocese also maintains a relationship with the Episcopal Church Clergy and Employees' Benefit Trust in providing Medicare supplement insurance for those over 65

on Medicare who choose to participate. Annual insurance premiums for this coverage for the calendar year 1999 are as follows.

Clergy Medicare Supplement (Clergy with 10+ years service):

Lay and Clergy (under 10 years) Medicare Supplement:

Single \$2,364 Couple \$4,728

First Health Group Inc. provides the administrative services for the Church Life Insurance Corporation and pays the various claims provided for under the benefits available to the Diocese of Virginia and its group plan. Their toll free number is 800-410-7989.

Another unit of the Church Pension Group is the Church Insurance Company which provides liability, theft, fire, auto damage and similar types of insurance to many of the churches in the diocese. The Diocese of Virginia maintains a blanket policy through this corporation, which protects and covers all aided congregations, as well as specific diocesan property. It is this company that provides the diocese with its blanket surety bond that covers all treasurers of churches and other employees, including volunteer workers, in an amount of at least \$10,000 per annum.

The diocesan churches and the Church Insurance Company absorb the premium for this coverage. The diocese, by providing this service of bonding, makes it possible for all churches and their treasurers to comply with Title I, Canon 6, Section 3 of the General Church Canons and Canon 13, Section 3 of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Virginia.

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia (the Diocese) is a community of members and clergy in counties throughout central, northern and northwestern Virginia. Established in 1785, the Diocese serves the world through its congregations, schools, diocesan centers, and diocesan homes.

Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity and Related Organizations

These statements present financial position, results of operations and cash flows for funds under control of the Council of the Diocese. The statements do not present such information on individual church, parish, or regional organizations or separately organized and controlled entities in the Diocese such as Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in The Diocese of Virginia, Memorial Trustees of Virginia Diocesan Center, Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, Church Schools of The Diocese of Virginia, The Episcopal Book Store, The Episcopal Churchwomen, Virginia Diocesan Homes, the Roslyn Conference Center, The Shrine Mont Corporation and Glebe Properties, Incorporated.

Fund Accounting

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Diocese, its accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purpose. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Operating Funds

Operating funds include the unrestricted funds available for operations controlled by the annual Diocesan budget.

Designated Funds

Designated funds include those unrestricted funds which have been designated by the Executive Board for specific purposes.

Notes to Financial Statements

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Restricted Funds

Restricted funds include funds whose use has been restricted to a specific purpose as designated by the donor.

Endowment Funds

Endowment funds represent funds that are subject to restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and only the income be used.

Comparative Amounts

The amounts shown for 1997 in the accompanying financial statements are included to provide a basis for comparison with 1998 and are not intended to present all information necessary for a fair presentation in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Certain comparative totals have been reclassified to be consistent with classifications at December 31, 1998.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Such estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of reporting cash flows, the Diocese considers demand deposits and investments with a purchased maturity of less than three months to be cash and cash equivalents. At times such investments may be in excess of the FDIC insurance limits. The Diocese monitors the credit ratings of financial institutions in which it places its cash and temporary cash investments.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable and accounts payable approximate market value due to the short maturity of these instruments. The carrying value of notes and loans receivable approximate fair value because they bear interest at rates which are not materially different from market rates. The carrying amount of investments approximates market.

Property and Equipment

Equipment is stated at cost. Major additions to equipment are capitalized. Repairs and renewals are expensed. Depreciation is computed using the straightline method over a useful life of between five and seven years.

Income Tax Status

No provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements, since the Diocese is exempt under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and the tax statutes of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

NOTE 2 - INVESTMENTS

The Diocese has an investment with an affiliate, Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia, of \$1,068,749 at December 31, 1998 and \$1,005,224 at December 31, 1997. Interest payments are paid monthly and interest income totaled \$71,731 in 1998 and \$51,149 in 1997.

The Diocese also has investments with the Trustees of the Funds. These funds are combined with other invested funds into a unitized investment pool. Income on these funds totaled \$406,052 in 1998. Investment balances by fund were as follows:

NOTE 3 - CONTINGENCIES

The Diocese is listed as guarantor on a note for Shrine Mont Corporation for the purchase and renovation of real property.

December 31, 1998 is approximately \$2,200,000.

In addition, as of December 31, 1998, the Diocese was contingently liable as guarantor on a note payable of St. Andrews Episcopal Church for \$507,000.

NOTE 4 - LEASE COMMITMENTS

The Diocese leased automobiles under noncancelable agreements which expired at various times during 1998. Automobile lease expense was \$16,297 in 1998 and \$27,091 in 1997. At the end of the lease terms in 1998, the Diocese exercised options to purchase the automobiles.

Notes to Financial Statements

NOTE 4 - LEASE COMMITMENTS (Continued)

The Diocese also has a noncancelable copier lease agreement expiring in October 2001. The lease requires payment of an excess copy charge in addition to the monthly lease payment.

NOTE 5 - PENSION PLAN

The Diocese has a defined contribution pension plan for all full-time lay employees. Plan contribution expense was \$75,825 in 1998 and \$58,689 in 1997. In addition, clergy employees of the Diocese participate in the National Church Pension Program which is also a defined contribution plan. Pension plan expense on behalf of clergy employees of the Diocese was \$52,743 in 1998 and \$57,789 in 1997.

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Diocese provides administrative and accounting services to several related organizations. Memorial Trustees of the Virginia Diocesan Center and Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, Inc. reimburse the Diocese for a portion of the salary and benefits of the accounting staff under a "common paymaster" arrangement. Under this arrangement, a person employed by several related organizations is compensated by one organization, which is reimbursed by the other organizations. The Diocese was reimbursed \$13,898 and \$35,101 by Memorial Trustees and \$7,500 and \$8,400 by the Trustees of the Funds for 1998 and 1997, respectively.

The Trustees of the Funds, a nonstock, nonprofit corporation, was established in 1892 to receive, hold and invest gifts and bequests of real and personal property for the Diocese, including the Mayo Memorial House, which is used as the general offices of the Diocese.

NOTE 8 - PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENTS

Beginning operating net assets have been adjusted for gifts made to outside organizations from the 1997 operating surplus in the amount of \$123,157. The beginning balance of operating net assets has also been adjusted for the transfer of the Bishop's Investment Account to the Restricted Fund in the amount of \$125,149. The Designated Fund beginning net assets have been adjusted to reflect clergy housing in the amount of \$237,667 and the related note payable of \$219,735. The Restricted Fund beginning net assets have been adjusted \$15,666 for net income and expenses attributable to the 1997 year.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the accompanying statements of assets and liabilities of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, Inc. as of December 31, 1998 and 1997, and the related statements of operations and changes in net assets for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Trustees' management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As explained in Note 4 to the financial statements, the Trustees of the Funds does not record depreciation on long-lived tangible assets. In our opinion, this omission is not in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except for the effects of not recording depreciation, as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, Inc. as of December 31, 1998 and 1997, and the changes in its net assets for the years then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Notes to Financial Statements

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, Inc. (the Corporation), a not-for-profit corporation established under the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia, acts as an investment agency for Diocesan funds and parishes in the Diocese. The Corporation also receives and holds real property and designated funds for the Diocese, including the Mayo House.

Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Presentation

Operations for investment activities are conducted in a manner similar to common trust funds. The operations of each fund are accounted for separately. The funds presented in the financial statements are described below:

Parish Funds account for investment funds managed for churches and church-related organizations located within the Diocese.

 ${\tt Diocesan}$ Funds account for investment funds controlled by the separate Diocesan organizations.

Trustee Funds account for investment funds held for the benefit of the Diocese which are primarily controlled by the Bishop.

The Mayo Memorial Fund accounts for the cost of the Mayo House, the general offices of the Diocese.

Investment Valuation

Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are stated at the last reported sales price on the day of valuation. Other securities traded in the over-the-counter market and listed securities for which no sale was reported on that date are stated at the last quoted bid price.

Investment Units

The equity of each fund in the pooled net assets is represented by investment units. New money entering the pool is accepted at the unit value of net assets as of the last day of the calendar quarter in which the deposit is made. The number of new units bought is determined by dividing the new money by the unit value. Withdrawals from the pool are based on similar unit values.

Income Recognition

Income on investment is recognized when earned.

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Distributions to Unitholders

The income allotted to each fund is computed quarterly based on the number of units owned during the quarter. An income distribution is made annually in December. Distributions of \$45.91 and \$44.60 per unit, aggregating \$1,431,209 and \$1,211,650 were paid to unitholders in 1998 and 1997, respectively.

Income Taxes

The Corporation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. These estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

The Corporation has not adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 93, "Recognition of Depreciation by Not-for-Profit Organizations", which requires all not-for-profit organizations to recognize the cost of using up long-lived tangible assets (depreciation) in their financial statements. This is a departure from generally accepted accounting principles. If depreciation had been recognized using the straight-line method, assets and net assets of the Mayo Memorial Fund would be reduced by approximately \$459,400 and \$435,100 as of December 31, 1998 and 1997, respectively, and a decrease in net assets of approximately \$24,300 would be recognized for each year then ended.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

The role of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia ("DMS") is to assist in missionary work in the Diocese of Virginia. This is accomplished by seeking gifts, loans and property in order to make low interest loans available for the extension of the mission of the Church. DMS also owns property used by others assisting missionary work of the Church.

A summary of DMS's significant accounting policies follows:

Basis of presentation: DMS's statements are presented in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. In 1997, DMS adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards ("SFAS") No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations. DMS reports amounts for total assets, liabilities, and net assets, changes in net assets in a statement of activities, and changes in cash and cash equivalents in a statement of cash flows. DMS classifies net assets in three classes - permanently restricted, temporarily restricted, or unrestricted based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

<u>Financial accounting and reporting</u>: Contributions received, which include unconditional promises to give, are recognized as public support and revenues in the period received at their fair values which includes a provision for doubtful collection. A promise to give is a written or oral agreement to contribute cash or other assets; however, to be recognized there must be sufficient evidence in the form of verifiable documentation that a promise was made and received.

<u>Cash and cash equivalents</u>: For purposes of reporting the cash flows, the Society includes all cash accounts, which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties and all highly liquid short-term investments with a purchased maturity of three months or less as cash and cash equivalents on the accompanying statement of financial position. The Society maintains certain cash accounts in commercial bank institutions. Average amounts on deposit in these institutions normally exceed federally-insured limits.

Loans to churches: The Society provides low interest financing to churches within the Diocese of Virginia. The notes receivable typically bear interest at 7.25% and are due within 5 years; however, the Society often grants extensions in five year increments up to 30 years. Most of the notes are secured by deeds of trust on real estate or securities. Due to the sufficiency of collateral and a history of no defaults on these notes, a reserve for loan losses has not been recorded.

<u>Real estate</u>: The value at which the real estate is carried on the books represents acquisition cost or fair value as assigned at date of acquisition by DMS through gifts. Depreciation is computed by the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

<u>Use of estimates</u>: The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Income tax status: The Society is exempt from income taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Note 2. Real Estate

DMS has title to real estate which is used only by certain churches within the Diocese of Virginia. Real estate consists of the following classes of property at December 31, 1998 and 1997:

Note 3. Notes Payable

The notes payable to churches consist of unsecured loans from churches to DMS, for lending to other churches to help finance additional construction. The loans from the churches to DMS are evidenced by 15-year negotiable promissory notes which bear interest at 6-1/2%. Generally, interest on all notes is payable each June 30th and December 31st, with principal generally due 15 years from the date of issue.

Aggregate principal maturities of the notes payable under scheduled maturities are presented below; however, notes have traditionally been renegotiated for an additional 15-year period.

Note 5. Investments

During 1998, DMS authorized the investment of \$750,000 from the corpus of the Legh Wilber Reid and Elizabeth Griffith Hoxton Reid Trust. The money was invested in the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia in a fund titled "Diocesan Missionary Society Legh Wilber Reid and Elizabeth Griffith Hoxton Reid Trust". Income earned on the fund is to be used for the primary purpose of the Reid Trust.

204th Annual Council Sermon By The Rt. Rev. Francis C. Grav

Before I begin this sermon, I very much want to tell you what a joy it is to be a part of the life and ministry of this wonderful diocese. Karen and I have felt welcomed in your midst and are thankful for your generosity of spirit. Bishop Lee and I have a long standing friendship, and it is an honor to serve under such an out standing and well respected bishop and with my friend, Bishop Jones. It is also fun to meet friends of long standing - like Fritz Trumbore who was at my ordination - your assistant lordship. Thank you again for all you have done to make our move to Virginia so special.

Once upon a time, in a kingdom far away, there lived a cruel prince. Each night, this man would have, for his pleasure, a woman. At the end of the evening he would have her murdered, and the next night would start again. One night, there came to his palace a woman whose wisdom and charm far surpassed even her beauty, which was beyond compare. As she entered his chambers, the woman said: "My lord, before we begin the evening, I would like to tell you a story." She then told a story filled with enchantment and suspense, it riveted the attention of the cruel prince. As she neared the end of the story, which, took all evening, she said "My Lord, I will finish the tale tomorrow evening". Her life was spared, and the next night she finished that story and began another. This pattern went on for many nights and the prince fell hopelessly in love with the girl. He reformed his ways, married her, and they lived happily ever after.

By now, you may know that the beautiful woman's name was Sheherazade, and among the stories she told were those about Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves, Sinbad the Sailor, Alladin and the Magic Lamp. These became known as the 1001 Arabian Nights, and continue to be widely read.

All of us who proclaim Jesus as Lord and who seek to tell His story live under the sentence of Sheberazade. For we too seek to tell a life changing, indeed a salvation story, to a world as cruel and jaded as any ancient oriental kingdom. In fact, St. Paul spoke for us where he said "For I am compelled to preach the Gospel, and woe unto me if I do not do so". Ours is a world which has heard all the stories and has been changed by few of them. Ours is a world of seventy seven T.V. channels and two hundred choices of cereal. Ours is a culture so accustomed to violence that the daily murders are listed on the third page of the newspaper, replaced by sex and graft on the first page. Spousal abuse, child neglect, racial intolerance are commonplace. Sadly, the stories which do excite many are Michael Jordan's retirement, President Clinton's choice of pronouns or the inconvenience of the Springfield interchange in the coming years. We are enthralled with anything new. New stories, new relationships, new toys, new gadgets. And, we often discard the old with the same impunity of that cruel prince so long ago. It is in this mileau that we seek to preach the Gospel, and these times are as urgent as any.

Thus, there is still salvation in the telling of the story of the young rabbi, Jesus, who went about doing good, who was put to death, and who was raised on the third day. His presence is still with us, and His power still changes lives. How can it be that His story still has the power to save lives - even more than the stories of Sheherazade? How can it be that we, almost 1000 people strong can gather in His name within a few miles of the capital of the world when we could be doing something else? How can it be that in His name the disorder of alcoholism can be reversed, the blindness

of violence averted, the sadness of marital breakup transformed, and the shallowness of consumerism given depth by generosity of spirit? Why are lives still changed by the telling of his story? Why will churches represented here give away millions of dollars? Because there is still **POWER IN THE STORY.** The power of God. And we gather to proclaim that power in transformed lives and renewed congregations.

Make no mistake, we are not here to pass a budget, to enact legislation, to carry out elections, or to give speeches. We are here to proclaim the love, generosity, grace and power of the resurrected Jesus over our own sinful broken and disordered lives. Lives which have been changed through the hearing of the story of God. Elections, and speeches, budgets and canons only have power in the light of the story of God. When the story is told with grace and conviction, the money will be there and the speeches will be heard, for the story of God will melt the hearts of sinners to the love of God. So, I ask you to listen for God to continue to speak in the coming days. Have an open mind and willing heart, trusting that God just might speak through someone unexpected. Allow the voice of God to be tuned to your heart in frequencies not often preselected on your spiritual monitor. Trust that Christ desires the unity of his church and that in the power of the Spirit that unity will come to pass. After all, it is Gods story, He is the author of the beginnings, the continuations and the endings of his own stories, for His is the master story, the parabolic word, the Alpha and the Omega.

Few people have felt the story of God as did the author of the old spiritual, when he wrote:

My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus blood and righteousness I dare not trust the sweetest frame but wholly lean on Jesus' name. On Christ the solid rock I stand All other ground is sinking sand

When darkness veils his lovely face I rest on his unchanging grace In every high and stormy gale My anchor holds within the Vail On Christ the sold rock I stand All other ground is sinking sand All other ground is sinking sand.

The story of Jesus. Keep it in your heart - for it can save your life and it will last far longer than 1001 nights. It will last a lifetime and beyond.

Once upon a time in a far away place called Damascus, a young man named Saul..... but that story is for another night.

Report of the *ad hoc* Committee on Hispanic Ministry December 1998

I. Introduction

The Diocese of Virginia's interest in Hispanic ministry dates to the fall of 1975, when St. George's Church in Arlington first began to offer public worship in the Spanish language. Diocesan financial support began in 1978 with significant increases in support in 1980, 1985, and 1988. The initial Spanish language service has matured into the San José mission congregation with a peak Sunday attendance of 200 people. Spanish ministry has expanded geographically as well, with Spanish worship also celebrated at St. Mark's Church in Alexandria (San Marcos founded in August of 1988), St. John's, Arlington (Cristo Rey, begun at Grace Church, Alexandria, moved to Virginia Seminary's Key Chapel in August 1989; moved to St. John's in January 1994), and Grace Church, Alexandria (site of Cristo Rey from founding in April 1982 until August 1989, Spanish-language service resumed in December 1993). St. Timothy's, Herndon is currently weighing the possibility of incorporating some Spanish-language elements within its worship schedule.

From 1988 until December 1997 the Diocese of Virginia supported at least two full-time positions in Spanish ministry. From 1994 to 1997 Roberto Morales devoted his attention to San José, while Thomas Mansella had charge of the missions of San Marcos and Cristo Rey. In January 1998, however, the Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia approved a budget that reduced Thomas Mansella to a half-time status.

A number of clergy were concerned about the impact of the council decision on the future ministry of the diocese. Others were interested in a discussion about the overall diocesan vision for Hispanic ministry. John Weatherly convened a small group at St. John's, Arlington on May 19, 1998. Those who attended shared their concerns and hopes with one another. They agreed to request a meeting with Suffragan Bishop David Jones. Anna Stribling communicated that desire to Bishop Jones, who met with the group at his office at Virginia Seminary on June 3. No specific decisions were made at the meeting, but Bishop Jones agreed that interested clergy might continue to meet with one another. Subsequent meetings were held on July 15, September 22, October 19, and December 1. Among those who attended one or more of the meetings were: Penny Bridges and Robert Malm (Grace Church, Alexandria), Ron Crocker and Margaret Pollock (St. George's, Arlington), Ruth Anne García and Bradford Rundlett (St. Timothy's, Herndon), Barbara Gurr (Senior Warden of Cristo Rey), Richard Jones, Robert Prichard, and Boanerges Rosa (Virginia Seminary faculty members and student), Thomas Mansella (Cristo Rey and San Marcos), Roberto Morales (San José), Daniel Robayo (Piedmont Parish, Delaplane), Anna Stribling (St. John's, Arlington), John Weatherly (St. Mark's, Alexandria), and Victoria Heard (Diocesan Missioner for Church Planting).

Members of this *ad hoc* committee decided at their September 22 meeting to prepare a report for the Annual Council and other interested parties in which they expressed their concerns and sketched their hope for future ministry. The Members of the *ad hoc* committee discussed a draft report and made revisions at their October 19, December 1, and December 8 meetings.

II. Historical Background: the Task Force on Black, Asian, and Hispanic Ministries
The *ad hoc* committee drew on the earlier work of the Task Force on Black, Asian, and
Hispanic Ministries. The Executive Board created the task group in June of 1989 in order
to clarify the diocesan strategy on ethnic ministry. It made an interim report to the Annual

Council in January of 1990, and issued its final report to the Executive Board on April 19, 1990.

That final report noted the increasingly diverse ethnic makeup of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The projections of the 1990 census figures, available at the time that the report was issued, made it evident that the racial profile of the Diocese was changing rapidly, due in large measure to new immigration from Latin America and Asia. Members of the Task Force anticipated that diversity would grow greater during the 1990s.

The Task Force recommended a two pronged approach to this diversity: creating and supporting "door congregations" and striving to make new and existing congregations more culturally diverse. (1) Door Congregations. The Task Force defined door congregations as those "in which a deliberate effort was made to overcome ethnic, social, and linguistic differences that were so great for the members of some demographic group that there was no practical possibility of their entering one of our largely white, middle to upper class, English-speaking congregations." The task group saw the particular value of such congregations as a means by which the Episcopal Church could extend ministry to new immigrants. As the name door congregation implied, some of those who initially entered the Episcopal Church through door congregations would pass on to membership in English-language congregations. This process is, however, often slow and can take several generations. (2) The task group noted that in the past door congregations to African Americans had become agents of segregation. It therefore urged that the founding of new door congregations be accompanied by a concerted effort to increase the racial and cultural diversity of new and existing congregations. The committee called for "a concerted effort to make all churches open to all persons." It noted that such diversity did not come by accident, and cited the "placement of Black, Asian, and Hispanic clergy in parishes that are predominantly white" as "one of the most effective means of" creating that diversity.

III. Demographic Changes since 1990

Census figures available since the publication of the 1990 Task Group Report have borne out the Task Group's predictions of increasing diversity. Such changes are most evident in the municipalities of Northern Virginia.

The number of white non-Hispanic persons has been falling in absolute terms in Alexandria and Arlington and in percentage terms in Fairfax and Prince William. Hispanic and Asian population has, in contrast, been growing sharply. Hispanic population increased between 34.9% (Arlington) and 76.4% (Prince William) between 1990 and 1997. Asian population has been increasing at a similar rate, and Black population has been increased between 6.2% (Arlington) and 33.9% (Prince William) in the same period.

While the percentage of immigrants is smaller in the remainder of the state, the beginnings of the same trends are evident elsewhere. The Richmond area offers one example.

The non-Hispanic White and Black populations are remaining roughly stable. The Asian and Hispanic populations, while small, are increasing rapidly. One finds a similar trend in the Charlottesville area.

Clearly the increasing diversity of the population of Virginia is a continuing phenomenon.

IV. Future Actions

Members of the *ad hoc* committee believe that the two-pronged approach to ethnic ministry outlined in the 1990 report of the Task Group on Black, Asian, and Hispanic Ministries continues to be viable. They do, however, have specific recommendations about how this strategy might be best employed as we approach the new millennium:

A. Free-Standing Hispanic Congregations

Members of the *ad hoc* committee note the persistence of a pattern of Hispanic immigration that makes a door congregation strategy continue to be useful. They believe that San José has demonstrated the viability of a largely free-standing congregation for Hispanic immigrants and believe that it is time to take the next step: *to found a new free-standing Hispanic congregation with its own building elsewhere in Northern Virginia*. The members

of the committee envision a congregation staffed by one or more full-time Spanish-language clergy. The members believe that the person chosen to head this church-planting project should be trained both in church planting and in the particular dynamics of a Spanish-language congregation. We recognize that the founding of such a new congregation requires careful planning.

B. Bilingual-multicultural Ministry

Members of the *ad hoc* committee believe that attention must continue to be paid to the important work of Hispanic-language ministry. It is a complex ministry to an evolving population. While new immigrants continue to enter the Diocese of Virginia through existing, Hispanic ministries, we are beginning to see another phenomenon as well. Children of immigrants and those who have been in the U.S. for an extended period of time are gaining increasingly facility in the English-speaking world.

The needs of this group are different from those of recent immigrants. Their needs are not as urgent or as visible as those of recent arrivals, yet they are equally important. These persons are concerned about schools, drugs, and the widening cultural gap between parents and children. They are concerned about quality of life, especially as it relates to affordable housing. More and more are buying their first house. They are overwhelmed by consumer issues and are the easy targets of scam artists. They understand more, speak, and feel more comfortable using or learning English. In church life, they now perceive the local host church more as a partner than a dispenser of goods.

A bilingual-multicultural ministry has the potential of meeting needs of those leaving Spanish-only congregations in a way that a freestanding Hispanic or English-only congregation may not. Such a ministry also has the potential to reach out to professional and assimilated Latinos, multiethnic families, and those non-Hispanics with business or service experience in Latin America who would prefer a church that can accommodate and enrich their experience. These groups have the interests, education, and resources for leadership to contribute significantly to the local congregation as well as to the community at large.

- Members of the committee note that the congregations of San Marcos and Cristo Rey are in increasingly close relationship with the host congregations Saint Mark's and Saint John's. We believe that the diocese should support and encourage these relationships.
- Members of the committee applaud the decision of Grace Church, Alexandria to offer a Spanish-language service. We encourage other parishes in areas in which there is a significant number of Spanish-speakers to follow Grace's example.
- For future years we support, at a minimum, the restoration of funding for bilingual-multicultural ministries to the level of the 1997 diocesan budget.

C. Racial diversity in the Diocese of Virginia

Members of the *ad hoc* committee note the relatively modest progress made toward greater cultural diversity in the English-language congregations of the Diocese of Virginia. If we are to avoid the segregation and isolation of which the Task Group warned at the beginning of this decade, we will need to make a renewed effort. We hope that individual English-speaking congregations will welcome those who are moving out of Spanish-only or bilingual congregations and will demonstrate sensitivity to the cultural riches that they bring with them. A person of German heritage can easily recognize German tunes in our music. One from Scandinavia might recognize the use of greenery at Christmas. An

African might note the presence of the Martyrs of Uganda on the Church calendar. We hope for a similar sensitivity to the culture of Latin Americans.

The ad hoc committee members note a number of areas in which progress could be made:

- The members hope for a greater cultural and racial diversity in the persons chosenfor diocesan staff positions, in appointed mission clergy, and in the names recommended to parishes engaged in clergy searches. We note, as did the early Task Group Report, that qualified clergy and staff persons who are Black, Asian, and Hispanic can serve as powerful living signs of inclusion to minority persons entering congregations that are predominantly non-Hispanic, white in makeup. Committee members note the particular value of stressing cultural diversity in new missions, where the racial profile has not yet been fixed by long practice.
- We applaud the current signs of a greater cultural diversity in those persons selected for postulancy. (Two postulants who have recently begun seminary training are African Americans and a third is a Spanish-speaker sponsored by Cristo Rey.) We believe, however, that all seminary students, regardless of their racial and cultural background, should be encouraged to take advantage of cross-cultural training so that they will be able to serve effectively in a more culturally diverse church.
- Members of the ad hoc committee commend the earlier diocesan efforts to introduce Lift Every Voice and Sing II. We hope that the diocese will make parallel efforts to introduce the new Hispanic Hymnal, when it is available, as a resource both to Spanish-language and non-Spanish language congregations.
- Members of the committee note the value of ecumenical cooperation with members of other denominations engaged in multi-cultural evangelism and social justice ministries.

the Protestant Episcopal Church of Virginia was organized in May, 1785, by a union of all the parishes of the disestablished Church of England within the bounds of the Commonwealth of Virginia and took part in the organization of the union of all the Protestant Episcopal Churches of the several States and, by its own formal ratification of the plan of union, became the Disease (Virginia and

became the Diocese of Virginia of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America; and

the original Diocese of Virginia, embracing the entire State, has since been divided into several Dioceses, one of which remains established as the Diocese of Virginia;

the Diocese of Virginia acknowledges the authority and power of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, as set forth in the Constitution and Canons adopted thereby, and, in the exercise of its own powers and

authority, doth amend and revise the Constitution of this Diocese so that the same shall read as follows:

Whereas,

Now, Therefore,

The Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia

Article I. Order, Government and Discipline.

The order, government, and discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia shall be vested in the Bishop, and in the Council of the Diocese, constituted as provided in Article III hereof, which shall have power to adopt Canons, and take any other action for the conduct of its affairs not in conflict with this Constitution.

Article II. Meetings of Council.

The Council shall hold on a weekend, upon the date designated by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, a regular annual meeting at the place designated by the preceding regular meeting of the Council. The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may, for any cause deemed by it to be sufficient, change the time, or the place, or both, for any regular meeting of the Council. At meetings of the Council, the Rules of Order of the previous meeting shall be in force until they are amended or repealed by the Council.

Article III. Composition of the Council.

Section 1.

- (a) The Council shall be composed of the Clerical order and the Lay order.
- (b) The Clerical order shall consist of the Bishop or Bishops and all other ministers canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia. No member of the Clerical order under ecclesiastical censure shall be entitled to a seat in the Council.
- (c) The Lay order shall consist of two classes, namely: (1) the Lay Delegates from the church and (2) the Lay members *ex officio*.
- (d) There shall be only one Lay Delegate from each church, to be chosen by its Vestry. But from every church having more than three hundred confirmed communicants in good standing reported to the Diocesan authorities in the last annual report, there shall be an additional Lay Delegate for each three hundred confirmed communicants in good standing, or major fraction

- thereof, above the first three hundred.
- (e) The Lay members of the Standing Committee, the Lay members of the Executive Board, the Chancellor, the Presidents of the Regions, the President of the Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese, and five lay persons, not over 21 years of age at the time of election, to be elected on or before May 1 as Youth Delegates by five of the Regional Councils designated on an annual rotating basis by the Standing Committee shall be members of the Council *ex officio*.
- (f) Each elected Delegate and ex officio member shall have one vote.

Section 2. The Lay Delegates shall serve for the regular meeting for which they are chosen, and, unless other delegates be chosen, for any special meeting held prior to the next regular meeting of the Council.

Section 3. All Lay members of the Council shall be adult confirmed communicants in good standing, as defined in the General Convention Canon I.17., of the Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Virginia.

Article IV. Quorum of the Council.

One-third of the members of the Clerical order and one-half of the members of the Lay order shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or special meeting of the Council, but a smaller number may adjourn any such meeting.

Article V. Methods of Voting in the Council.

In all matters that may come before any meeting of the Council the clergy and laity shall deliberate in one body and a majority of those voting shall be necessary for a decision, except where the vote is by orders, in which case there must be a concurrence of majorities in each order; but, before a vote is taken upon any matter, five members may, by request, require the vote to be taken by orders. In a vote by orders each Clerical Delegate and each Lay Delegate shall be entitled to one vote.

Article VI. The Bishops, Officers and Committees of the Diocese.

In addition to the Bishop of the Diocese, there may be a Bishop Coadjutor, Bishops Suffragan, Assistant Bishops, or any combination thereof, upon the conditions and pursuant to the authority contained in the Canons of the General Convention.

In addition to the Bishop, or Bishops, the officers of the Diocese shall consist of a Secretary, Treasurer, Chancellor, and a Registrar.

For the conduct of the affairs of the Diocese, there shall be a Standing Committee and an Executive Board, together with such other officers, committees, departments, and boards as the Council may deem desirable.

Article VII. Election of a Bishop.

The election of a Bishop shall be made at a regular meeting of the Council, or at a special meeting of the Council called for that purpose. The vote shall be by ballot and by orders and a concurrent majority of the votes cast by each order shall be necessary to a choice.

Article VIII. The Bishop as President of the Council.

Section 1. The Bishop shall preside at all meetings of the Council and exercise all the ordinary duties of a presiding officer. He may call a special meeting of the Council at whatever time and place he may think necessary; and whenever requested by the Standing Committee, it shall be his duty to call a special meeting to be held at the time and place selected by the Standing Committee.

Section 2. The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside at any meeting of the Council from which the Bishop is absent, or whenever the Bishop may request him to preside.

Section 3. The ranking active Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, shall preside at any meeting of the Council if he is requested to do so by the Bishop, or in the absence of the Bishop, by the Bishop Coadjutor; or if declared or serving as the Ecclesiastical Authority pursuant to Article IX of the Constitution.

Section 4. A retired Bishop or an Assistant Bishop of this Diocese may preside at any meeting of the Council at the request of the presiding officer.

Article IX. Vacancy in the Office of the Bishop.

Section 1. Upon the death of the Bishop and if there is no Bishop Coadjutor, then the ranking active Suffragan Bishop shall be in charge of this Diocese and shall be temporarily the Ecclesiastical Authority of this Diocese until such time as a new Bishop shall be chosen and consecrated; or, if the Standing Committee declare the disability or absence of the Bishop and there is no Bishop Coadjutor able and present, then the ranking active Suffragan Bishop shall be in charge of this Diocese until such time as the Standing Committee shall declare the ability and presence of the Bishop.

Section 2. In case of a vacancy, or anticipated vacancy, in the Office of the Bishop, a special meeting of the Council shall be called by the Ecclesiastical Authority. That special Council, immediately upon assembling, if there be no Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, Suffragan Bishop, or Assistant Bishop present, shall elect by ballot a President from among the order of Presbyters present, who shall remain in office until the election and consecration of the Bishop. The President so elected shall perform all the duties and possess all the privileges of a presiding officer. He shall not have the power to call a special meeting of the Council except when requested so to do by the Standing Committee, in which case the special meeting shall be at the time and place requested.

Article X. Reserved for Future Use.

Article XI. The Secretary of the Diocese.

A Secretary of the Diocese shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee. He shall, upon qualification, continue in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority. If the Secretary is a Priest, he shall hold no other Clerical preferment. He shall also serve as Secretary of the Council, take minutes of its proceedings and attest to the public acts of the body. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

Article XII. The Treasurer of the Diocese.

A Treasurer of the Diocese shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical

Authority with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee or by the Standing Committee if it is at the time the Ecclesiastical Authority. He, or she, shall, upon qualification, remain in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority or until removed as hereinafter provided. He shall receive and keep safely all money and other property confided to his custody; and he shall disburse and dispose of the same as may be provided by Canon. He shall report annually to the Council an account showing all money and other property received by him, and the manner in which he has disbursed or disposed of the same. The Treasurer shall give bond in an amount to be fixed by the Standing Committee, with corporate surety approved by the Standing Committee, which bond shall be conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of his office. At the close of each fiscal year, accounts of the Treasurer shall be audited by a certified public accountant selected by the Standing Committee. In case of the misconduct of the Treasurer, or of his incapacity, refusal or failure to discharge the duties of his office, the Standing Committee shall remove him and a new appointment shall be made in the manner aforesaid.

Article XIII. The Chancellor of the Diocese.

A Chancellor of the Diocese shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority or by the Standing Committee, if it is at the time the Ecclesiastical Authority. He shall, upon qualification, continue in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Chancellor shall be a confirmed adult communicant in good standing, as defined in General Convention Canon I. 17., of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, and a member of the Virginia State Bar. He shall be the legal advisor of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and of the Council of the Diocese, and to the Executive Board of the Diocese.

Article XIV. The Registrar of the Diocese.

A Registrar of the Diocese shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee or by the Standing Committee if it is at the time the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Registrar shall, upon qualification, continue in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed in the Diocesan Canons.

Article XV. The Standing Committee of the Diocese.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese shall consist of twelve members, six of the Clerical order, and six of the Lay order, each of whom shall be a confirmed communicant in good standing as defined in General Convention Canon I. 17. of the Church of this Diocese and eighteen (18) years of age or over.

At each regular meeting the Council shall elect two members of each order for a term of three years. Each member of the Committee shall hold office for the term for which he was elected and until his successor is elected or appointed. No member shall be eligible to succeed himself.

In case of a vacancy in the Episcopal office, or in case neither the Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor nor Bishop Suffragan be capable of performing the administrative duties of the Bishop, and in any case when the Bishop shall authorize it to act, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

The Standing Committee at every regular meeting of the Council shall submit a report of its proceedings. When required by the Council it shall also lay before the Council any document which may have come into its possession. It shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Canon.

In case of a vacancy in the Standing Committee, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy from the same order. The appointee shall serve until the next regular meeting of the Council, at which meeting the Council shall fill the vacancy.

Article XVI. The Missionary Society.

All baptized members of the Protestant Episcopal Church residing in this Diocese shall, as heretofore, constitute a missionary society known as the Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

The direction and activities of the Society be identical with those of the Executive Board and shall be directed solely by it.

Article XVII.

Parishes to be Bound by This Constitution.

Every Congregation within the Diocese of Virginia, however called, shall be bound by the Constitution and the Canons adopted in pursuance hereof.

Article XVIII.

Transitional Provision.

Every member of a committee heretofore established and continued under this Constitution, and every officer heretofore chosen, shall hold office during the term for which he was chosen.

Article XIX.

Amendments to the Constitution.

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner only, namely: At any regular meeting of the Council a proposed amendment shall be referred to the appropriate committee, and report thereon shall be presented by that committee and the amendment shall be considered by the Council. If approved by the Council, it shall be again considered at the next regular meeting of the Council and, if again approved, shall become effective immediately upon its adoption unless otherwise provided therein.

Article XX. Gender of Pronouns.

The masculine pronoun whenever used in this Constitution shall be deemed to include the feminine pronoun.

Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia

CANON 1.

Official List of the Clergy of the Diocese.

Section 1. A list of all the ordained Ministers of the Episcopal Church, canonically resident or licensed to work in this Diocese, with their respective post office addresses, cures, stations and positions, shall be prepared by the Ecclesiastical Authority and kept, corrected up to date, on file at the headquarters of the Diocese. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall keep the Church Pension Fund informed of the employment of any parish, congregation, diocesan related institution or other ecclesiastical organization in this Diocese of clergy canonically resident in this Diocese and of non-resident clergy officiating in this Diocese.

Section 2. The right of any clergyman to vote in the Council shall, if challenged, be determined by the Council itself according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons, whether his name be inserted in, or omitted from, the list.

Section 3. The official list of the clergy of the Diocese with the names of those entitled to vote in the Council designated thereon, shall be laid before the Council on the first day of its meeting, and the roll of the Clerical Delegates entitled to vote shall be determined from it. The list of the clergy submitted to the Council shall be appended to the Journal and be transmitted to the Secretary of the General Convention.

Section 4. Every clergyman canonically resident in the Diocese shall attend every meeting of the Council; or, if unable to attend, shall send to the President of the Council a written statement of the reasons for his absence.

CANON 2.

Lay Representation in Council.

Section 1. The Churches of this Diocese entitled to Lay representation in the Council are those which were recorded by the Secretary of the Council as Parish Churches or Separate Congregations on the effective date of this Canon, together with Churches thereafter constituted in accordance with Canon and received into union by act of the Council.

Section 2. The Missions of this Diocese entitled to Lay representation

in the Council are those which were recorded by the Secretary of the Council as such on the effective date of this Canon, together with those Missions thereafter constituted in accordance with Canon and reported as such to the Secretary of the Council.

Section 3. A list of the Churches and Missions entitled to representation in the Council shall be appended to the Journal of each regular Council.

Section 4. The Vestry of a Church, or the Vestry Committee of a Mission, shall elect no later than March 1st the Lay Delegates from that Church to the Council, and shall also elect one Lay Alternate for each Delegate elected. Alternates shall not be entitled to voice or vote in the meetings of the Council except in the absence of their principals.

Section 5. The election of Lay Delegates to the Council, and their alternates, shall be certified by the Rector, Vicar, Register, or one of the Wardens of the proper Church, in duplicate, which certificate shall be in the form as follows:

One copy of this certificate shall be sent to the Secretary of the Diocese no later than March 15th, and a copy shall be given to each Delegate named therein.

Section 6. Lay Delegates of Churches, or in their absence, their Alternates, shall be entitled to one vote each on all questions coming before the Council.

Section 7. The Secretary of the Diocese shall make a roll of the Lay Delegates and Alternates certified to him as duly elected with their respective Churches. The President of the Council shall appoint a Committee on Credentials, to be composed of one Clergyman and two Lay Delegates, to which shall be referred the credentials of all Lay Delegates. The Committee shall make its report to the Council promptly. Until this

report be received, the roll as made by the Secretary shall, unless objection be made, be accepted as the authentic roll of Lay Delegates and Alternates.

Should doubt arise as to the right of any Lay Delegate or Alternate to his seat, the Committee on Credentials shall hear the evidence presented and report its judgment. Upon this report the Council shall determine the matter unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present the Council decides to hear the whole case *de novo*.

CANON 3. Deputies to Provincial Synod.

At the Annual Council preceding the meeting of the Provincial Synod, there shall be elected by ballot one member of the Clergy and two Lay persons to be Deputies to the Provincial Synod, who shall serve until their successors are elected. A report shall be made to the Annual Council following each meeting of the Synod. Qualifications for election to Provincial Synod shall be the same as for election to the General Convention.

CANON 4. Deputies to the General Convention.

Section 1. At the regular Council held during the calendar year next preceding each regular meeting of the General Convention there shall be elected by ballot the full number of Clerical and Lay Deputies to the General Convention to which this Diocese is entitled and a majority of all votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. Following the election of the full number of Clergy and Lay Deputies, a ballot shall be taken for a like number of Clergy and Lay Alternate Deputies; and the proper number receiving the highest vote shall be declared Alternates in the order of preference of that ballot.

The Clerical Deputies shall be Presbyters or Deacons canonically resident in this Diocese, and the Lay Deputies shall be persons eligible for election to the Vestry of a Church in this Diocese.

The Deputies so elected shall serve for the regular meeting for which they are chosen and for any special meeting held prior to the next regular meeting of the General Convention unless other Deputies be elected by the Council.

Section 2. Each of the Deputies shall signify to the Secretary of the Council within thirty days after his election whether or not he accepts the

election. If he accepts, the Secretary shall issue to him a certificate of election. Should any Deputy elected decline or fail to signify his acceptance, or fail to meet the requirements for election, or should a vacancy occur otherwise, the Secretary of the Council shall issue the certificate of election to the Alternate Deputy of the same order in which the vacancy occurs, who was first elected, or, if more than one were elected on the same ballot, who received the highest votes; and if there be more than one vacancy the others shall be filled successively in like manner.

CANON 5. The Church Pension Fund.

Section 1. The Diocese of Virginia hereby ratifies and confirms its adoption of the system of the Church Pension Fund.

Section 2. In furtherance of the Church Pension Fund:

- (a) The Secretary of the Diocese shall keep the Clergy and laity of the Diocese advised of the benefits of the Church Pension Fund for Clergy and qualified lay employees and shall procure prompt payment of the amounts due the Church Pension Fund, or such other comparable pension fund as may be selected by this Diocese, a Church, Mission or Related Organization, from this Diocese and the several Churches, Missions and Related Organizations in the Diocese.
- (b) The Secretary of the Diocese shall keep the Church Pension Fund informed of the Clergy canonically resident in this Diocese and the qualified lay employees of this Diocese and the Churches, Missions and Related Organizations in this Diocese, and their beneficiaries who may be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.
- (c) The Secretary of the Diocese shall report to the Executive Board which Churches, Missions or Related Organizations have failed to pay in full their assessments by the Church Pension Fund and such other matters in regard to the operation of the Church Pension Fund as may be appropriate.

CANON 6. Archdeacons and Deans.

Section 1.

- (a) The Council may elect, upon nomination by the Bishop, not more than five Priests as Archdeacons, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Council. In the event of a vacancy occurring between meetings of the Council, the Standing Committee shall have power to fill the vacancy, upon nomination by the Bishop, until the next regular meeting of the Council.
- (b) Archdeacons shall have functional titles, and shall have the duties and powers which are assigned or delegated to them by the Bishop or the Council, which shall always be defined at the time of their nomination.
- (c) A priest may serve as Archdeacon without resigning his cure. A Dean of a Region may not serve as an Archdeacon.

Section 2.

- (a) The Bishop shall appoint, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, one Priest in each Region as the Dean thereof. A Dean shall serve at the pleasure of the Bishop, but in no event for more than four consecutive years, and shall be the official representative of the Bishop to the Region.
- (b) A Priest may serve as Dean without resigning his cure.

CANON 7. The Executive Board.

Section 1. The Executive Board shall be composed as follows:

- (a) One member elected by each Regional Council or in the absence of the member, an alternate member elected by each Regional Council.
- (b) The Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor if there be one, and the Suffragan Bishops if there be such.

Section 2. Terms of elected members and alternate members shall expire at the conclusion of the regular meeting of the Council in the appropriate year.

Section 3. Any two members of the Executive Board may call for a vote by orders on any motion or in any election; the vote of a Bishop shall be counted among the Clerical order. A motion or an election so dealt with must succeed concurrently in both orders to be effective.

Section 4. The President of the Executive Board shall be the Bishop. The Executive Board shall elect a Lay member as its Vice President, and may elect a Secretary, who may be of either order. It may elect such other officers as it may desire not in conflict with these Canons. With the exception of the President, all terms of office shall be one year.

Section 5. The Executive Board shall prepare and recommend Diocesan programs, and the proposed funding of such programs, to the Council for approval. The Executive Board shall be responsible for the execution of all approved programs except as the Council may specify and between meetings of the Council shall be responsible for the work of the Church in the Diocese. The Executive Board may adopt such by-laws as it may desire, not in conflict with these Canons.

Section 6. The Executive Board shall meet regularly, at such times and places as it may determine. Special meetings may be called by the President, or by any three members. Written notice of the time and place of any special meeting shall be mailed or otherwise delivered to each member at least seven days in advance of such meeting.

Section 7. The Bishop may appoint, subject to the approval of the Executive Board, a person to serve as the coordinator of the Board. Such person will function as the Bishop may direct.

Section 8. In the event of the absence of the President, and of the Vice President, the meeting shall be presided over by a member present selected by the members present.

Section 9. One-half of the members of the Clerical and one-half of the members of the Lay order constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or special meeting of the Executive Board, but a smaller number may adjourn.

CANON 8. Regions and Regional Councils.

Section 1. The Diocese of Virginia shall be divided into Regions in such a way that every point of the Diocese is in a Region, and every Church shall be a member unit of some Region. Assignment to a Region shall be by majority vote of all members of the Standing Committee, which may create as many Regions as it wishes, but not less than nine nor more than twenty, each containing at least two or more geographically contiguous Churches.

Section 2. The Vestry or Vestry Committee of any Church which desires to change to another Region shall petition the Standing Committee for such change, stating reasons, and including with the petition the views of both Regional Councils affected by the change. The Standing Committee shall decide the change by majority vote of all its members.

Section 3. The Standing Committee shall notify the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and the Suffragan Bishops, if there be such, the Executive Board, and the Secretary of the Diocese promptly of any change in the number or compositions of Regions, and shall provide annually to the Council a list of the Regions and their member Churches, which shall be published in the Journal of the Council.

Section 4. In each Region there shall be a Regional Council, subject to the following provisions:

- (a) Each church of the Region shall be represented by its active Clergy and as many Lay persons, elected by its Vestry or Vestry Committee, as it has Lay Delegates to the Council of the Diocese. Qualifications for election to Regional Councils shall be the same as for election to a Vestry.
- (b) The Dean shall call the first meeting of a Regional Council, which shall then organize itself, electing Lay Members as President and Vice-President, respectively. Each Council shall elect such other officers as it desires and shall establish a schedule of regular meetings. Special meetings may be called by any Bishop, by the Dean, by the President, or at the request of the representatives of any two constituent Churches.

- (c) All terms of office shall be determined by each Regional Council, and shall expire at the conclusion of the regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese in the appropriate year. Notice, and the results, of any election shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Diocese at the conclusion of Council.
- Each Regional Council shall elect one member and one alternate member of the Executive Board. That member and alternate member must be a Lay person eligible for election to the Vestry of a Church in the Region or members of its active Clergy, and may not be the Dean of the Region or a member of the Standing Committee. Such member and alternate member shall be elected for a term of three years and shall both be of the same order. The positions shall alternate between Lay and Clerical incumbents. The rotation of members shall be established by the Standing Committee from time to time so that as nearly as possible one-third thereof shall be elected each year. Vacancies shall be filled by the appropriate Regional Council for the unexpired term, with due regard as to order, except that, when the unexpired term is for three months or less, the replacement member may be of either order. Regional Council representatives on the Executive Board shall become ex-officio members of their own Regional Council.
- (e) A Regional Council shall be governed by the Rules of Order of the next preceding regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese, unless the Regional Council shall decide otherwise.

Section 5.

- (a) Each Regional Council shall be responsible for seeing that the ministrations of The Episcopal Church are made available to every person living within the boundaries of such Region and shall exercise authority for the Region as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout its borders, so that the Region may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. A Regional Council may, for these and other purposes, and subject to the approval of the Executive Board, adopt and administer a budget.
- (b) Any proposal to begin missionary work or to found a Church must have the approval of the Regional Council of the Region in which such work or Church is to be established.
- (c) In any case when a Church is aggrieved by an action of its Regional Council, its Rector or Vicar, with the advice and consent of its Vestry or Vestry Committee, may appeal the matter to the Standing Committee, the decision of which shall be final.

(d) In any case when a Regional Council, upon request to the Dean of the Region by the Ecclesiastical Authority, fails to meet and act within sixty days of such request, the Executive Board of the Diocese shall exercise the authority of the Regional Council with respect to the matter under consideration, subject to the right of appeal set forth in Section 5(c) of this Canon. Any such exercise of authority by the Executive Board shall be reported within one month of its exercise to the Standing Committee, and shall also be reported in full to the next meeting of the Council of the Diocese.

CANON 9. Boundaries.

Section 1. The Parishes of the Diocese, and their boundaries, are fixed as of January 23, 1972, and shall not be changed henceforth.

Section 2. In every Region, the Rector and Vestry of each Church and the Vicar and the Vestry Committee of each Mission shall have and exercise concurrent jurisdiction within the boundaries of the Region, and equal responsibility for the extension and welfare of the Church and ministration to needy people within the Region.

Section 3. The authority of an inactive Church is assigned to the Executive Board, which may delegate this authority in specific cases to a sub-committee composed entirely of members of the Executive Board. An inactive Church is defined as one in which there is no functioning Vestry or Vestry Committee.

CANON 10. Churches.

Section 1. A group of people (1) which acknowledge the jurisdiction of the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese of Virginia, (2) among whom there is a regular program of identifiable Episcopal services (including regular celebration of the Holy Communion) at a designated place or places of worship, (3) which as a group shares in the support of the Episcopate of the Diocese, (4) which makes provision for the pastoral administrations of the church to its members, and (5) which functions under the supervision of a Priest or Deacon, shall be called a Church. A list of all

Churches shall be published annually in the Journal of the Council. All congregations designated as Parish Churches, Parishes or Separate Congregations on the effective date of this Canon shall be classified as Churches.

Section 2. A group of people seeking such status must signify its desire to a regular meeting of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia by petitioning for Church status. Such petition must contain the proposed name for the Church, a certification that the requirements of Section 1 of this Canon are complied with, the name and address of the supervising Priest, the address or addresses of the place or places of worship, and a copy of the current budget. The petition shall be accompanied by certificates of endorsement from the Regional Council of the Region in which such group provides a place of worship and from the Executive Board, it being the responsibility of the group to obtain such certificate.

- Section 3. Each Church shall have a Vestry in conformity with Canon 11.
- Section 4. The Vestry of a Church shall elect, from among those persons eligible to serve as Vestry members of that Church, representatives to the Regional Council and Council of the Diocese in the number provided by Canon.
- Section 5. The Rector and Vestry of a Church as herein defined are expressly designated as the "Rector and Vestry of a Parish" for purposes of the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church.
- Section 6. A group of persons who desire to organize a congregation, but who are unable to meet all of the requirements of Section 1 of this Canon, may be constituted by the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, or the Standing Committee itself if it be the Ecclesiastical Authority, a Mission. Application for such status shall be accompanied by a certificate of endorsement of the Regional Council of the Region in which such group proposes to worship, it being the responsibility of the group to obtain such certificate. A list of all Missions shall be published annually in the Journal of the Council of the Diocese. Upon the request of any Church, or the failure of any Church to meet all the requirements of Section 1 of this Canon, or upon request by a Church for direct aid from the Diocesan Budget, the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, or the Standing Committee itself if it be the

Ecclesiastical Authority, may change the status of such Church to that of a Mission. Any action taken under this section shall be reported in the Journal of the next succeeding Council as one of the official acts of the official taking the action.

Section 7. The minister in charge of a Mission shall be called the Vicar.

Section 8.

- (a) Any Church may, with the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Regional Council of the Region in which it is located, establish within the boundaries of such Region one or more Missions of a Founding Church. The minister in charge of such Mission shall be appointed by the Rector of the Founding Church with the concurrence of the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Vestry of the Founding Church shall appoint or shall allow to be elected a Vestry Committee which shall be composed as provided in Section 14 of Canon 11. It shall be charged with transacting the temporal business of the Mission, except that the Founding Church may retain to itself such temporal functions as it deems proper and in any event shall be ultimately responsible for the temporal obligations of the Mission.
- (b) The Rector and Vestry of the Founding Church may at any time agree with the Bishop to designate such "Mission of a Founding Church" as a "Mission," and upon such designation becoming effective, the provisions of this section shall no longer apply to such a Mission. Any Mission functioning under this section shall be so marked in the annual list of Missions.
- (c) A Mission shall be entitled to Lay and Clerical representation in the Diocesan and Regional Council as is afforded other Churches.

CANON 11.

Election and Organization of Vestries, and Call of Congregational Meetings.

Section 1. In this Canon, the term "Rector" implies "Rector or Vicar," and the term "Vestry" denotes "Vestry or Vestry Committee," unless specifically noted to the contrary.

Section 2. A Church shall have a Vestry which shall consist of not fewer than three or more than twelve members, except that in any Church having more than one hundred confirmed communicants in good standing one additional member may be elected to its Vestry for each additional one hundred confirmed communicants in good standing, or major fraction thereof, provided that the total number of elected Vestry members shall not exceed eighteen.

Section 3. The election of Vestry members shall be held annually at such time and place as shall be designated by the Vestry, or in the event the Vestry does not act then by the Rector, or, if there be no Rector by the Wardens. If the time and place be not so fixed then the election shall be held on Easter Monday in the church or regular place of worship. At least three days notice of the time and place of each election of Vestry members shall be given in the church on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means.

Notwithstanding the foregoing provision, if any Church so authorize, Vestry members may be elected for terms not to exceed four years, the congregation to determine the length of terms, the beginning of the term, and the number of Vestry members to be elected for such terms. The Vestry members elected and qualified under this Canon shall serve until their successors are elected and have qualified.

At all meetings of the congregation, the Rector shall preside, except that at the request of the Rector or if the Church is without a Rector, the meeting shall be presided over by one of the Wardens or, in their absence, by a Vestry member selected by the Vestry.

Section 4. Only Lay persons, who are confirmed adult communicants in good standing of the church, as defined in General Convention Canon I.17., shall be eligible for election as Vestry members of such church. However, regardless of eligibility of a person for election, no person shall be elected at duly convened congregational meetings to consecutive full terms on a congregation's Vestry or Vestry Committee.

Section 5. All adult communicants in good standing, registered in the particular Church in which they offer to vote, shall be entitled to vote at the election of Vestry members. The voting shall be by ballot in person and, unless otherwise provided by the meeting, a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. There shall be no voting by proxy. But no election shall be valid unless the participating qualified votes number at least ten per cent of the number of active communicants qualified to vote reported for the previous year.

Section 6. The Vestry may appoint three persons to act as judges at the Vestry elections, whose duties shall be to determine the qualifications of the voters and the eligibility of persons for nomination as Vestry members.

Section 7. As soon as may be after their election, the persons chosen as Vestry members shall assemble and organize at such time and place as the Rector shall appoint, or, if no time or place be appointed by him within a reasonable time, then at such time and place as shall be designated by any two Vestry members elect, the Rector and each Vestry member elect being notified. The newly organized Vestry takes office at a time previously established by the congregation in a duly called meeting. The proceedings at this and every meeting of the Vestry shall be opened with one or more collects and the Lord's Prayer by the Rector, or other person appointed by the Rector.

Section 8. Every person chosen a Vestry member shall qualify by subscribing the following declaration and promise: "I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do yield my hearty assent and approbation to the doctrines, worship and discipline of The Episcopal Church; and I promise that I will faithfully execute the office of Vestry member of Church, in Region ______ in the County (or City) of _ according to my best knowledge and skill." No person shall act as a Vestry member until this declaration and promise have been subscribed to.

Section 9. The Vestry shall elect a Senior and a Junior Warden, a Register and a Treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected and qualified. The Wardens shall be members of the Vestry.

Section 10. The Rector shall preside at all meetings of the Vestry. In the absence of the Rector, or at his request when present, the Rector may request the Vestry to elect a substitute presiding officer, in which case the Rector will continue to have seat, voice and vote. If the church is without a Rector, meetings of the Vestry shall be presided over by one of the Wardens or, in their absence, by a Vestry member selected by the Vestry. All Vestry meetings shall be subject to the Rector's call; but in case he fails to call a meeting when requested to do so by two Vestry members, such Vestry members may themselves call a meeting, giving at least three days notice of the time and place to the Rector and to each Vestry member. A majority of the Vestry members who have qualified, exclusive of the Rector, shall constitute a quorum; but any Vestry may by resolution fix a smaller number to act as a quorum at future meetings. The Vestry may adopt by-laws not inconsistent with Diocesan or National Canons.

Section 11. In case of a vacancy in the Vestry, the remaining members may elect a qualified member of the congregation to fill the vacancy until the next annual congregational meeting, at which time such vacancy shall be filled. The following actions of any Vestry member may, after due warning, be deemed to create a vacancy which shall be declared by resolution of the Vestry:

- a. Failure to qualify within 60 days of election; or
- b. Failure to continue as a communicant in good standing; or
- c. Continued failure to attend the meetings of the Vestry without adequate excuse; or
- d. Neglect to perform faithfully and diligently the duties of Vestry members enumerated in the Canons or by the bylaws of the congregation.

Section 12. Any Church having two or more congregations in different communities may apportion to each congregation the number of Vestry members to be chosen as its representation upon the Church Vestry. A separate election shall be held by and for each congregation, at which the number of Vestry members allotted to that congregation shall be chosen in accordance with the procedure presented in the preceding provisions of this Canon.

The Vestry members so chosen, together with the Rector, if there be one, shall constitute the Rector and Vestry of the Church. The Vestry members chosen by each congregation, together with the Rector, shall be a committee of the Church Vestry to have the care and control of the property and to transact the local business of the congregation from which elected. Each Vestry committee may appoint one Warden for its congregation, a Treasurer and a Clerk. If Wardens have been chosen for particular congregations by Committees of the Vestry, the Senior and Junior Wardens of the Church shall be chosen from among such Wardens.

The Church Vestry shall meet as a whole at least quarterly. Any matter concurred in by a majority of the committees of the Vestry, recorded by their respective Clerks and by the Register of the Vestry, shall be the act of the Vestry of the Church unless the Rector, or if there be none, the Senior Warden, deem it proper that such matter should be acted upon in a meeting of the Church Vestry as a whole.

Section 13. In addition to the annual meeting of the congregation for the election of Vestry members, other meetings of the congregation may be called by the Vestry or, if they decline to do so, by ten qualified voters of the congregation after at least three days notice of the time, place and object of the meeting have been given either on an occasion of public worship or by other adequate means to the minister, each Vestry member and the congregation. At such meetings only those persons shall be entitled to vote who are qualified to vote for Vestry members and such meetings shall be conducted in the same manner as meetings held for the election of Vestries, except that voting by ballot need not be required.

Section 14. The Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint, or else allow a Mission which is not a Mission of a Founding Church to elect, a Committee of not fewer than three nor more than twelve Lay persons eighteen (18) years of age or older, who are confirmed adult communicants in good standing of that Mission, as defined in General Convention Canon I.17, to be called the Vestry Committee.

CANON 12. Duties of Vestries, Wardens and Parish Officers.

Section 1. The Rector of a Church shall be elected by its Vestry, with the advice of the Bishop and in compliance with General Convention Canon III. 17. The Vestry Committee of every Mission shall elect a Vicar upon nomination by the Bishop, such Vicar to serve at the pleasure of the Bishop. Any assistant ministers of a Church, by whatever name they may be designated, shall be selected by the Rector subject to the approval of the Vestry and in accordance with General Convention Canon III. 14.1.(b).

Section 2. Each Vestry shall cooperate with the Rector or Vicar in promoting the spiritual welfare of his cure and assist him in his duties as defined in General Convention Canon III. 14.

Section 3. Each Vestry member shall support the programs of the Church and continuously encourage the members of the congregation to support the programs of the Church and to give generously towards the support of those programs; and each Vestry member shall extend personally a hearty welcome to newly baptized, confirmed, received, or transferred members of the congregation.

Section 4. Each Vestry shall see that the Rector or Vicar is properly supported, that his salary is paid in full and with regularity, together with the pension premiums and other obligations due from the Church; annually review the compensation of its Rector or Vicar in keeping with the published guidelines of the Diocese; and make all necessary provision for Church music, with the advice and consent of the Rector or Vicar, and subject to his control.

Section 5. Each Vestry shall advise the Diocese by November 30th of

the percentage of its annual disposable income that will be shared with the Diocese in support of Diocesan Programs and remit the resultant sum to the Treasurer of the Diocese in regular monthly installments. It shall be the joint duty of the Rector or Vicar and Vestry to submit to the Bishop by the first of February of each year a parochial report for the year ending December 31st preceding, which report shall be submitted in duplicate on the form prepared by the Executive Council.

Section 6. Each Vestry, as the constituted agents of the Church, shall transact all its temporal business, e.g.: (a) providing for the appointment of Trustees pursuant to the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia to hold title to the property of the Church; (b) making and executing all contracts for erecting, furnishing, and preserving the Church edifice and other property; (c) regulating the use of any graveyard or columbarium; (d) establishing a Finance Committee as required by Canon 25 (Finance Committees); and, (e) observing Canon 13 (Business Methods in Church Affairs).

Section 7. With the assistance of the other members of the Vestry and congregation, the Wardens shall have the following duties:

- (a) To oversee the operation and maintenance of the Church property;
- (b) To see that the Church is duly prepared for every occasion of public worship, attend to the accommodations of the congregation with seats, and maintain order and decorum at the time of public worship;
- (c) To collect the offerings of the people;
- (d) To provide out of Church funds, under the direction of the Vestry, a sufficient supply of vestments and books to be used in public worship and also the elements for each celebration of the Holy Eucharist;
- (e) To see that the sexton and other employees properly discharge their duties; and,
- (f) To possess a copy of the current General Convention and Diocesan Constitutions and Canons for the information and guidance of the Rector, Vestry and congregation.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the Register of the Vestry to take charge of all records except the Parish Register and keep correct entries of all proceedings of the Vestry in a well-bound book to be provided for that purpose and to deliver the records and minute books to the Rector, Vicar, or Wardens, when the Register's term of office expires.

Section 9. The Treasurer shall take charge of all funds except Communion Alms as provided for in General Convention Canon III. 14.2.(f), and disburse the same under the direction of the Vestry, maintaining his accounts in accordance with the canonical requirements for the conduct of business in Church affairs, rendering reports to the Vestry and to the Council as may be required. At the end of his term of office, he shall deliver all books and records pertaining to his office to the Wardens.

Section 10. The provision of this Canon shall also be applicable to Vestry Committees to the extent not in conflict with other Canons.

CANON 13. Business Methods in Church Affairs.

Section 1. In every Church, Mission, and Institution connected with the Diocese, business methods shall be observed as contained in General Convention Canon I. 7. and as supplemented herein.

Section 2. All trust, endowment and other permanent funds and all securities of whatsoever kind for which a Treasurer is responsible represented by physical evidence of ownership or indebtedness shall be deposited or invested with due regard for the social responsibility of the church and the social implications of the Christian faith. These funds shall be (i) deposited in one or more accounts properly earmarked, with one or more national or state banks or trust companies, or one or more savings and loan associations, the accounts of which are insured by an instrumentality of the United States, or with a Diocesan Corporation; or (ii) invested in such a manner as is permitted by Section 26-45.1 of the Code of Virginia (1950) as it may be amended from time to time; or (iii) invested in such manner as approved by the Finance Committee of the Diocese. Such accounts shall be approved in writing by the Vestry or its governing body.

This section shall not be deemed to prohibit investments in securities issued in book entry form or other manner that dispenses with delivery of a certificate evidencing the ownership of the securities or the indebtedness of the issuer.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall be bonded in such sum and with such surety as the Vestry or governing body may from time to time determine.

Section 4. The Vestry or governing body shall annually cause to be audited the accounts of its Treasurer and all other custodians of funds or securities. Such audit will be in compliance with Section 1 above and with such instructions as may be promulgated by the Diocesan Finance

Committee. The audit shall include all accounts which exceed five hundred dollars at any one time during the fiscal year.

Section 5. The Vestry or other governing body of every Church, Mission and Related Organization shall provide for the following insurance with such insurers as may be determined by the Vestry or other governing body:

- (a) Fire and casualty insurance for buildings and tangible personal property of the Church, Mission or Related Organization in amounts not less than their replacement cost or depreciated value, as appropriate.
- (b) Adequate comprehensive liability insurance, naming the Diocese of Virginia as an additional insured, with coverage of not less than One Million Dollars per occurrence, for property damage or personal injury occurring (1) on the property of the Church, Mission or Related Organization, (2) as a result of the operation of motor vehicles owned or leased by the Church, Mission or Related Organization, (3) as a result of acts or omissions of the clergy or other employees with respect to their duties as such, or (4) as a result of acts or omissions of members or volunteers performing activities on behalf of or at the direction of the Church, Mission or Related Organization.
- (c) Workers' compensation insurance for all employees.

CANON 14. Creation of Church Debt.

Section 1. No indebtedness, shall be incurred by a Church or Institution without the written approval of the Bishop and of the Standing Committee:

- (a) Except where proposed indebtedness for permanent improvements, replacements, or additions to real estate or equipment, plus indebtedness of every kind already existing does not exceed one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the average annual receipts of such Church or Institution during the previous three fiscal years; and
- (b) Except where proposed indebtedness for current expenses, plus all indebtedness theretofore incurred for current expenses and still existing, does not exceed twenty percent (20%) of the total current receipts of such Church or Institution during the preceding fiscal year.

Section 2. In computing receipts under subsections (a) and (b) of Section 1 of this Canon, there shall be excluded amounts from or for endowments or from or by bequests, except income therefrom not specifically designated to be used for other purposes, and receipts specially designated for expenditures other than parochial.

Section 3. The approval required under this Canon shall not be granted until there is submitted to, and approved by the Bishop and the Standing Committee, a plan of payment of the indebtedness.

CANON 15. Church Property.

Section 1. All real and personal property held by or for the benefit of any Church or Mission within this Diocese is held in trust for The Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Virginia. The Vestry of every Church and, when authorized by the Bishop, the Vestry Committee of a Mission, shall elect Trustees for appointment pursuant to law to hold title to such property.

Section 2. No part of the real property of a Church, except abandoned property, shall be alienated, sold, exchanged, encumbered or otherwise transferred for any purpose without the consent of the congregation in a meeting called for that purpose pursuant to the provisions of Section 13 of Canon 11 and approval of the appropriate court, if required by law and, in the case of consecrated property, or any Church or Chapel which has been used solely for divine services, the further consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and the consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. No part of the real property of a Mission under Supervision shall be alienated without the further consent of the Bishop.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall take such steps as may be necessary to recover or secure any property, real or personal, belonging to any Church or bodies heretofore known as a Parish, Separate Congregation, Mission Church or Mission within this Diocese, the legal title to which is not vested in duly constituted Trustees; and whenever any property, real or personal, formerly owned or used by any congregation of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia for any purpose for which religious congregations are authorized to hold property under the provisions of the Code of Virginia or any amendment thereof, has ceased to be so occupied or used by such congregation, so that the same may be regarded as abandoned property by the Executive Board, which shall have the authority to declare

such property abandoned and shall have the authority to take charge and custody thereof, the Executive Board shall take such steps as may be necessary to transfer the property to the Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority; or to sell it.

Section 4. The Bishop, or Ecclesiastical Authority, is hereby authorized to acquire by deed, devise, gift, purchase or otherwise, any real property for use or benefit of the Diocese. Property so acquired shall be held and transferred by the Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese in accordance with the provisions of Section 57-16 of the Code of Virginia (1950), as from time to time amended, provided that no such real property shall be alienated, sold, exchanged, encumbered or otherwise transferred for any purpose by the Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority without the advice and consent of the Trustees of the Funds of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia or the Executive Committee of such Trustees, unless prohibited by the instrument by which title to such property is acquired. The Executive Board shall have the care of the Episcopal Residence and other property held by the Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for which no other custodians are provided and the Bishop or the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may delegate all authority with respect to such property, save and except the right to hold, transfer or encumber title to real property, to the Executive Board.

Section 5. The Executive Board is hereby constituted the proper authority of the Church and may apply to the appropriate court of the State for the appointment of Trustees to hold title to real property belonging to the Diocese when it may be necessary. No part of such real estate, except abandoned real property, shall be alienated, sold, encumbered or otherwise transferred for any purpose without the consent of the Executive Board.

Section 6. A list of all real property to which the Bishop and Trustees of the Diocese hold title and of all inactive or abandoned real property shall be maintained by the Secretary of the Diocese and published annually in the Council Journal.

Section 7. Trustees appointed pursuant to this Canon shall be indemnified by the Church or Mission electing them, or, in the case of Trustees designated by the Executive Board, by the Diocese, to the fullest extent as if the Church, Mission, or Diocese were a "Corporation" and such Trustees were "Directors" within the meaning of, and as set forth in, Article 9 of the Virginia Nonstock Corporation Act, as the same may be from time to time amended.

CANON 16. Parish Registers and Parochial Reports.

Section 1. Every Rector and Vicar shall maintain a register of official acts and make the required entries in the Parish Register as required by General Convention Canon I. 6. 1. These records shall be made in suitable books to constitute collectively the Parish Register, to be provided by the Vestry for that purpose and to remain in the property of the Vestry. When a congregation is without a Rector or Vicar, one of the Wardens shall take charge of the Parish Register and shall make, or cause to be made, all needful entries until the vacancy is filled.

Section 2. Every Rector or Vicar shall send to the Bishop, or if there be no Bishop, to the Secretary of the Diocese, or the President of the Council, on or before the first day of February of each year, the report required by General Convention Canon I.6.1 for the year ending the thirty-first day of December preceding, in such form as shall be prescribed by the Bishop or the Council. If any congregation is without a Rector or Vicar, the report shall be sent by the Wardens. The Bishop shall compile a list of those Churches and Clergy whose reports are not sent by the first day of February and, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, take appropriate action.

CANON 17. Related Organizations.

Section 1. Organizations related to the Diocese of Virginia shall be those whose charters or statements of purpose have been reviewed and approved by the Executive Board and whose status as a related organization shall have been approved by the Council of the Diocese.

Section 2. Every related organization shall operate in conformity with the doctrine, discipline and worship of The Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

Section 3. Every related organization shall conform with the applicable provisions of the Canon on Business Methods in Church Affairs; provided, however, that nothing in this Canon shall be construed as acceptance by the Diocese of Virginia of the financial or other obligations of any related organization.

Section 4. The Secretary of the Diocese shall keep a current list of all active related organizations which shall be published in the Council Journal.

Section 5. Every related organization shall furnish an annual report of its activities to the Secretary of Council.

Section 6. The Council of the Diocese, and the Executive Board between Councils, shall have the authority, for proper cause, to terminate the status of a related organization.

CANON 18.

The Secretary of the Diocese.

The Secretary of the Diocese shall perform such duties as may otherwise be prescribed by the Constitution and Canons and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Ecclesiastical Authority, in the performance of which he shall have such authority as may be delegated to him by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

CANON 19.

The Treasurer of the Diocese.

Section 1.

- (a) All trust and permanent funds belonging to the Diocese or over which the Diocese has control, and all other funds for which the Treasurer is responsible, shall be kept in one or more accounts in the Diocese of Virginia, properly earmarked, with one or more national or state banks or trust companies, or one or more building or savings and loan associations, the accounts of which are insured by an instrumentality of the United States, or with a Diocesan Corporation, approved in writing by the Executive Board, and shall not be withdrawn in whole or in part except upon the signature of two designated persons.
- (b) All securities of whatsoever kind belonging to the Diocese or over which the Diocese has control shall be kept with a Diocesan Corporation or some other agency, approved in writing by the Executive Board and shall not be withdrawn except upon the signature of two designated persons.
- (c) The Treasurer shall be bonded in such sum and with such surety as the Standing Committee may from time to time determine.
- (d) Such books of account shall be kept as, in the judgment of the

- Executive Board, may be necessary.
- (e) The Executive Board shall annually cause to be audited by certified public accounts the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese and the accounts of the Treasurer of every trust and permanent Diocesan fund.
- (f) A condensed report of the audit shall be made under the direction of the Executive Board, which shall make its report to each regular meeting of the Council and to any special meeting of the Council when requested.
- (g) All buildings and tangible personal property, over which the Diocese has control, shall be kept adequately insured in such amount and with such insurers as the Executive Board may determine.
- (h) The Executive Board shall supervise all financial affairs of the Diocese and the methods prescribed for the conduct of Diocesan business affairs.

Section 2. Pending the adoption of an annual budget by the Council of the Diocese, the Executive Board shall prepare and furnish to the Treasurer of the Diocese a schedule of payments for the ensuing fiscal year, which schedule of payments shall first provide for fixed obligations and then for other objects in the program of the Diocese, within the amount of estimated receipts. This schedule of payments shall be the warrant of the Treasurer of the Diocese for disbursement of the amounts specified therein. Upon adoption by the Council of an annual budget, such budget shall become the warrant of the Treasurer to make the expenditures provided therein.

CANON 20.

The Registrar of the Diocese.

Section 1. The Registrar shall be responsible to the Bishop and the Council for the preservation of the official records of the Diocese of Virginia, which shall include the Journals of the Councils, and the official records of the Bishops. He shall procure, receive, catalogue and preserve books, papers and other documents bearing upon the history of the Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

Section 2. The Registrar of the Diocese shall, with the advice of the Bishop and the Secretary of the Diocese, issue guidelines to committees and officials of the Diocese of Virginia concerning such documents as shall be considered worthy of historic preservation; such as the Journals of General Convention, the Episcopal Church Annuals, Diocesan ECW Yearbooks. He shall offer advice to parishes regarding the preservation of historic

materials. He shall further make proper disposition of acquisitions to the archives of the Episcopal Church, or to such other repositories as may be appropriate.

CANON 21.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese.

Section 1. The Standing Committee shall annually elect a President and a Secretary from among its members.

Section 2. In addition to its other constitutional and canonical duties, the Standing Committee shall (a) serve as a Council of Advice to the Bishop, and (b) annually address Council on such matters concerning the mission, life or program of the Diocese as the Standing Committee shall deem timely.

Section 3. No member of the Standing Committee chosen by the Executive Board or the Council to fill a vacancy on that Committee as provided by the Constitution shall be ineligible to be elected to a full term, but a member of the Standing Committee who has completed within two years a full term shall not be eligible to be chosen by the Executive Board or the Council to fill a vacancy, nor be eligible to be elected to a full term on that Committee.

CANON 22.

The Commission on Ministry.

Section 1. Membership.

- (a) The Council shall elect six (6) persons, three clerical and three lay, to the Commission on Ministry; one-third in each order to be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. No one so elected shall be eligible for re-election after having served two consecutive terms until after the expiration of one year.
- (b) The Bishop may annually appoint not more than six additional members for a term of one year. Such appointments shall be nominated for election by Council. Such appointments need not be communicants of the Church.

(c) In the case of a vacancy in the elected members [paragraph (a)], the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy from the same order and that member shall serve for the balance of that term. In the case of a vacancy in the appointed members [paragraph (b)], the Bishop may appoint a member to complete that one-year term.

Section 2. The duties of the Commission on Ministry shall be those prescribed in the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Section 3. The Commission on Ministry shall annually report to the Council of the Diocese.

CANON 23.

The Commission on Lay Ministries.

Section 1. Membership.

- (a) The Council shall elect six (6) persons, three clerical and three lay, to the Commission on Lay Ministries; one-third in each order to be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. No one so elected shall be eligible for re-election after having served two consecutive terms until after the expiration of one year.
- (b) The Bishop may annually appoint not more than six additional members for a term of one year. Such appointments shall be nominated for election by Council. Such appointments need not be communicants of the Church.
- (c) In the case of a vacancy in the elected members [paragraph (a)], the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy from the same order and that member shall serve for the balance of that term. In the case of a vacancy in the appointed members [paragraph (b)], the Bishop may appoint a member to complete that one-year term.

Section 2. The duties of the Commission on Lay Ministries shall be those prescribed in the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Section 3. The Commission on Lay Ministries shall annually report to the Council of the Diocese.

CANON 24. Examining Chaplains.

A Board of Examining Chaplains consisting of at least three (3) Presbyters and at least three (3) lay persons shall be nominated by the Bishop at the

regular meeting of the Council, the nominations to be confirmed by the vote of the Council. The Bishop shall appoint one member as Chairman. The term of office of the Examining Chaplains shall be one year. The Examining Chaplains shall discharge such duties as shall be prescribed by the Bishop and shall report their findings and recommendations in writing to the Bishop.

CANON 25.

Finance Committees.

Section 1. There shall be a Finance Committee of the Diocese as required by General Convention Canon I. 7., appointed by the Bishop and including representation from the Executive Board, which committee shall, from time to time and at least annually:

- (a) Advise the Executive Board of the conformity of the Diocese, the Churches, the Missions and Institutions connected with the Diocese with the provisions of Canon 13.
- (b) Issue periodic guidelines for audits and investment management.
- (c) Provide information to Church and other Finance Committees as requested.
- (d) Perform such other functions as required by Canon or as directed by the Executive Board.

Section 2. Each Church and Mission shall establish a Finance Committee of not less than three persons to provide assistance in financial matters to the Rector, Vicar, Vestry and Treasurer in the implementation of these Canons.

Section 3. All reports of audits required by Canon 13 shall be made to the Vestry or governing body not later than August 2nd of each year. Such reports, including recommendations, shall be filed with the Bishop as required by National Canon; reports for Missions shall be made to the Bishop designated by the Diocesan who shall submit a consolidated report to the Diocesan. The Bishop shall refer all audit reports to the Finance Committee of the Diocese for their information and recommendations.

CANON 26.

Appeal of a Lay Person after Repulsion from the Holy Communion.

If any person repelled from the Holy Communion shall allege to the Bishop that injustice has been done, or if, notwithstanding that, he shall have professed himself ready and willing, in truth and sincerity, to comply with

the requisitions expressed in the Rubric in order to be restored to the Holy Communion, and his repulsion shall be continued, he may present his application in writing to the Bishop, setting forth the grounds thereof and requesting to be restored to the Communion. Thereupon the Bishop, after consideration of the reasons given by the Priest and the Lay person shall adjudge the case and shall communicate his judgment in writing to the Priest and the Lay Person and the judgment shall be final and conclusive.

CANON 27

Presentment and Trial of a Presbyter.

Section 1. Presentments and trials of Bishops, Priests and Deacons within the Diocese of Virginia shall be in accordance with the provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the General Convention as such canons are amended from time to time.

Section 2. At each regular meeting of Council, the Council shall elect an Ecclesiastical Trial Court consisting of six (6) priests or deacons and five (5) lay persons. The priests and deacons shall be canonically resident in this Diocese and the lay persons shall be persons eligible under the Canons for election as Lay Delegates to the electing Council. No member of the Standing Committee shall be eligible to serve on the Ecclesiastical Trial Court.

Section 3. Vacancies on the Ecclesiastical Trial Court, other than for cause under Title IV.4.8. of the Canons of the General Convention, shall be filled by majority vote of the Executive Board. The person elected to fill the vacancy shall be a person of the same order as the person who has vacated.

Section 4. The Ecclesiastical Trial Court shall convene within two (2) months after each regular meeting of Council and shall elect from its membership a Presiding Judge and shall appoint a Church Attorney, and one or more Assistant Church Attorneys, if deemed appropriate by the Ecclesiastical Trial Court, who shall be duly licensed attorneys, as described in Title IV.15.1. of the Canons of the General Convention, and persons eligible under the Canons to serve as a member of the Council. If the Presiding Judge or the Church Attorney resigns, or is otherwise disqualified from serving, the Ecclesiastical Trial Court shall (a) elect a successor Presiding Judge or Church Attorney, or (b) elect an acting Presiding Judge or acting Church Attorney to serve with regard to matters involving the disqualifying circumstances.

CANON 28.

Relationships Among Clergy and Congregations.

Section 1. Except upon mandatory resignation by reason of age, a Rector may not resign as Rector of a church without the consent of its Vestry, nor may any Rector canonically or lawfully elected and in charge of a church be removed therefrom by the Vestry against the Rector's will, except as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. When a Rector or a majority of any Vestry believe the pastoral relation between the Rector and the congregation is imperiled by dissension, it shall be the duty of either or both, before contemplating dissolution of the pastoral relation, to lay the matter before the Bishop.

Section 3. If for any urgent reason a Rector or Vestry desires a dissolution of the pastoral relation, and the parties cannot agree, either party may give notice in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. Whenever the Standing Committee is the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, it shall request the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one; or the Assistant Bishop, if there be one; and if neither office is filled, then the Bishop of another Diocese, to perform the duties of the Bishop under this Canon.

Section 4. Whenever a Rector or a Vestry notifies the Bishop under the terms of this Canon, the Bishop shall labor for a reconciliation of the Rector and the congregation, either directly or through the Bishop's designees, or both. The Bishop may require one or more meetings with the Vestry and the Rector, either together or separately, and may require such meetings to be held with the Bishop, with the Bishop's designees, or both. No later than 90 days after receiving the original notification for consultation under the provisions of this Canon, the Bishop shall issue a Pastoral Direction in writing to the Rector and the Vestry shall outline a course of action to unify the congregation.

Section 5. If, in the judgment of the Bishop, the Rector, or the Vestry, the terms of the Pastoral Direction issued by the Bishop as specified in Section 4 above have not been met, or that the purposes for the Pastoral Direction have not been achieved, and 90 days have passed since the issuance of the Pastoral Direction, then the Rector or the Vestry may request a final judgment on the pastoral relation from the Bishop as follows or the Bishop may proceed on his own initiative as follows:

- (a) The Bishop shall give notice to the Rector and Vestry that a godly judgment will be rendered in the matter after consultation with the Standing Committee and that either party has the right within ten days to request in writing an opportunity to confer with the Standing Committee before it consults with the Bishop.
- (b) If a timely request is made, the President of the Standing Committee shall set a date for the conference, which shall be held within thirty days.
- (c) At the conference each party shall be entitled to representation and to present its position fully.
- (d) Within thirty days after the conference, or after the Bishop's notice if no conference is requested, the Bishop shall confer with and receive the recommendation of the Standing Committee; thereafter the Bishop, as final arbiter and judge, shall render a godly judgment.
- (e) Upon the request of either party the Bishop shall explain the reasons for the judgment. If the explanation is in writing, copies shall be delivered to both parties.
- (f) If the pastoral relation is to be continued, the Bishop shall require the parties to agree on definitions of responsibility and accountability for the Rector and the Vestry.
- (g) If the relation is to be dissolved:
 - (1) The Bishop shall direct the Secretary of the Council to record the dissolution.
 - (2) The judgment shall include such terms and conditions including financial settlements as shall seem to the Bishop just and compassionate.
- (h) In either event the Bishop shall offer appropriate supportive services to the Priest and the church.

Section 6. In the event of the failure or refusal of either party to comply with the terms of the judgment, the Bishop may act as follows:

- (a) In the case of a Rector, suspend the Rector from the exercise of the priestly office until the Priest shall comply with the judgment.
- (b) In the case of a Vestry, recommend to the Council of the Diocese that the Church be placed under the supervision of the Bishop as a Mission until it has complied with the judgment.

Section 7. For cause, the Bishop may extend the time periods specified in this Canon, provided that all be done to expedite these proceedings. All parties shall be notified in writing of the length of any extension.

Section 8. Statements made during the course of proceedings under

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this Canon are not discoverable nor admissible in any proceedings under Title IV of the General Convention Canons or Diocesan Canon 27 provided that this does not require the exclusion of evidence in any proceeding under the Canons which is otherwise discoverable and admissible.

Section 9. In the course of proceedings under this Canon, if a complaint is made by the Vestry against the Rector under General Convention Canon IV. 1. or Diocesan Canon 27, all proceedings under this Canon shall be suspended until the complaint has been resolved or withdrawn.

CANON 29. Gender of Pronouns.

The masculine pronoun whenever used in these Canons shall be deemed to include the feminine pronoun.

CANON 30.

Amendment of Canons.

Section 1. The Canons of this Diocese may be amended by the Council; but no proposed amendment shall be considered by the Council unless at least one day's notice be given in open Council, nor until such amendment shall have been referred to and reported upon by a Committee of at least two Presbyters and two Laymen. Nor shall such amendments be adopted during the same Council unless two-thirds of the members present concur therein; but if the majority be less than two-thirds, it shall lie over for consideration at the next regular meeting of the Council. Unless otherwise provided by the Council, all amendments shall become effective upon the adjournment of the meeting of the Council at which final action was taken.

Section 2. Whenever a Canon is amended, enacted, or repealed in different respects by two or more independent enactments at the same Council, including the enactment of an entire Canon, the separate enactments shall be considered as one enactment containing all of the amendments or enactments, whether or not repealed, to the extent that the changes made in separate amendments or enactments are not in conflict with each other, the Chancellor and the Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons shall make the determination whether or not there is a conflict and certify the text of the single enactment to the Secretary of the Council.

Section 3. At the conclusion of each regular meeting of General Convention, the Chancellor and the Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons of this Diocese shall be empowered to correct numbering references in the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese to the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention, which corrections shall be reported to the Secretary of the Diocese.

CANON 31. Health Insurance.

Section 1. Any and all health insurance coverage provided or paid for by the Diocese, Churches, Diocesan Missions or Missions of a Founding Church located within the Diocese for active and retired ordained persons or lay employees shall be provided through the diocesan health insurance plans established by the Executive Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall establish forms and processes for receiving applications for exception or exemption from the mandate of paragraph 1 hereof, and for reviewing and reaching a decision regarding each application. The Executive Board may designate an appropriately constituted body and delegate to it the necessary authorities to receive, review and make recommendations to the Executive Board. A description of these forms and processes shall be furnished to the entities identified in paragraph 1 hereof, made available by the Diocese upon request, and published in the annual guidelines offered by the Diocesan Compensation Commission as approved by the Executive Board.

Section 3. The Executive Board may grant such exemptions or exceptions from the mandate of paragraph 1 hereof as it deems appropriate. Each decision of the Executive Board shall be communicated to the applicant in writing together with a description of any process that the Executive Board may establish for appealing its decisions.

Section 4. In deciding on each application, the Executive Board shall be guided by the following considerations (among such others as it may deem appropriate):

- (a) consistency;
- (b) fairness;
- (c) hardship;
- (d) coverage available through spousal, military or other plans;
- (e) the effect that the exemption or exception requested, if granted, would have on the plan as a whole;
- (f) the precedential effect of the exemption or exception requested, if granted.

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
