

THE REVEREND JOHN POTTER CUYLER

NOVEMBER 4, 1905 - NOVEMBER 19, 1979

The Reverend John Potter Cuyler, a retired Priest in the Diocese of Virginia, died November 19, 1979, in his native state and city of birth, Princeton, New Jersey, after a short illness.

The Reverend Mr. Cuyler received his undergraduate degree from Princeton University and attended General Theological Seminary, receiving his Bachelor of Divinity in 1931. He was ordained Priest in June 1932 by Bishop Manning of New York.

He served as Assistant, Calvary Church, New York; Rector of St. Columba, Middletown, Rhode Island; Master at South Kent School, Connecticut; Rector of St. Paul's, Westfield, New Jersey; and served in various teaching capacities at Peddie School, Highstown, New Jersey; Woodberry Forest; and the Blue Ridge School, Dyke, Virginia. His last cure was Vicar, Piedmont Church, Madison, Virginia.

A man of high integrity, ever kind, thoughtful; with compassion for others, and always open to new leading of the Spirit.

THE VENERABLE WATKINS LEIGH RIBBLE, D.D.

DECEMBER 10, 1902 - SEPTEMBER 29, 1979

The retired Archdeacon of the Diocese of Virginia, The Rev'd Dr. Watkins Leigh Ribble, died at his home in Richmond, Värginia on September 29, 1979, after a long illness.

Born in Santa Maria, Rio Grande do Sal, Brazil, where his father, an Episcopal Priest, served as a missionary and where Dr. Ribble received his early schooling and knowledge of Portuguese before coming to the United States. He attended the Episcopal High School, Alexandria, and was a graduate with honors from the University, Charlottesville. He was graduated from The Theological Seminary in Virginia in 1927 and was ordained Priest and Deacon in that year by The Rt. Rev'd Beverley D. Tucker. He received an Honorary Degree in Divinity in 1952 from the Seminary.

Dr. Ribble began his long and distinguished career as a Professor of Greek and Philosophy at The Theological Seminary of the Brazilian Episcopal Church. In 1930 he became Priest in Charge of District 6, Archdeaconry of the Blue Ridge, where many of his Parish visits were made on horseback. From 1935 to 1945 he was Rector of The Falls Church, Falls Church, Virginia. From 1945 to 1962 he was Rector of Grace & Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, and from 1962 until his retirement July 1, 1968, he served as Archdeacon and Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions of the Diocese of Virainia.

Dr. Ribble, an accomplished raconteur with a keen sense of humor, was also keenly interested in writing. In addition to his regular church duties as rector, he served as Editor of THE VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN, 1949-1951; and Associate Editor of <u>THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH NEWS</u>, 1951-1955. He served the Diocese in many capacities as Deputy to three General Conventions, the Standing Committee, and was one of the Examining Chaplains from 1935 through 1958. The Executive Committee, and numerous other commissions and committees. He was a Trustee of the Diocesan Missionary Society, a member and Chaplain to the Society of Cincinnati, The Society of Mayflower Descendants, and the Sons of the Revolution.

On the occasion honoring Dr. Ribble at his retirement Bishon Gibson said, "Under the leadership and direction of Archdeocon Ribble, the missionary endeavor in the Diocese of Virginia has been greatly expanded and through his love and patience as a friend and pastor, the Clergy of this Diocese have been notably strengthened."

RULES OF ORDER

RULES OF ORDER

- 1. On each day of Council there shall be appropriate worship services including a celebration of Holy Communion at each regular meeting of the Council.
- 2. On the first day of Council the Presiding Officer, having taken the Chair, shall declare a quorum present, if such be the case, or he may direct that the roll of the members of the clerical and lay orders be called to determine a quorum.
- 3. On the first day of Council, a Program of Council shall be adopted.
- 4. On the first day of each regular meeting of Council, the Secretary of the Council shall be elected. The Presiding Officer may appoint assistant secretaries.
- 5. Prior to each regular meeting of Council, the Presiding Officer shall appoint the following Committees of Council to serve until their successors have been appointed.
 - A. Committee on Credentials
 - B. Committee on Constitution and Canons, to which all proposed amendments to the Constitution or Canons shall be referred. The Committee on Constitutions and Canons shall conduct a hearing at a session of Council and thereafter make a report to Council.
 - C. Committee on Budget, to which shall be referred (a) the Executive Board's recommended program and proposed funding and, (b) such resolutions related thereto as shall have been filed in wirting with the Council.

The Committee on Budget shall conduct a hearing at a session of the Council and thereafter report to Council by presenting:

- 1) The Executive Board's Budget
- 2) The resolutions or recommendations referred to it by Council with the Committee's recommendation(s) to Council regarding adoption or rejection of each.
- 3) Such other changes in the Executive Board budget as Committee shall recommend, said changes to be presented in the form of a resolution or resolutions.
- D. Committee on Church Status, to which shall be referred all petitions for church status prepared and presented as prescribed by Canon.
- E. The Committee on Resolutions, to which may be referred all resolutions, except those referred to the Committee on Budget, provided they are submitted in writing and the Committee shall conduct a hearing at a session of the Council and thereafter report its recommendations on all Resolutions submitted.

- F. Committee on Related Organizations which shall study, review, and report to Council the relationship existing between the Diocese and any organization, institution, corporation, board, or other group which by charter or custom or for any reason may be considered to have a relationship with the Diocese or a desire to have such a relationship. All requests to change or create such relationship shall be referred to this Committee. This Committee is charged with presenting to Council nominations for officers or Board members of all related organizations.
- G. Committee on the Journal of the Council, composed of three persons of whom the Secretary of the Diocese shall be one, and of either order, to whom shall be referred all matters to be printed in the Annual Journal of the Council, which said Committee shall have power to act during recess of the Council and report to the Council.
- 6. The Presiding Officer shall appoint such other committees of Council as the Council may direct or the Presiding Officer may determine and he may designate the chairman of any Committee.
- 7. The size and composition of every committee of Council shall be in the sole discretion of the Presiding Officer, except where otherwise provided by the Constitution or Canons.
- 8. The President may appoint a parlimentarian for any meeting of Council.
- 9. Elections: In every election where more persons are nominated than are to be elected, the balloting shall be:
 - (a) On the first ballot any nominee having a majority of all the votes cast shall be declared elected.
 - (b) If any office then remains to be filled, a second ballot shall be taken. On this and on subsequent ballots the number of nominees remaining shall be reduced by half but such reduction shall not result in less than twice the number of offices remaining to be filled, and the manner of such reduction shall be by retaining as nominees those persons receiving the higher numbers of votes on the preceding ballot.
 - (c) If the office filled by election requires the selection of an alternate or alternates, a ballot shall be taken immediately for such alternate. The proper number receiving the highest number of votes on this ballot shall be declared alternates in the order of the highest number of votes received.
 - (d) A ballot cast for other than the exact number of vacancies to be filled shall not be counted.
 - (e) In event of an impasse, declared to be such by the Presiding Officer, the Council may change or modify Section (b) of this rule by a majority vote of members present, notwithstanding the requirement for a two-thirds vote to suspend a Rule of Order.

- (f) Whenever the Council must fill a vacancy on the Standing Committee, the order of election shall be:
 - 1) The members for a regular term.
 - 2) The member or members for the longest vacancy to be filled.
 - 3) The member or members for the remaining vacancy to be filled.
- 10. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Presiding Officer, and, if in writing, be read by the Secretary. After a motion is so stated or read, it shall be deemed in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before amendment or decision, with the consent of the second.
- 11. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the Presiding Officer or any member require it.
- 12. (A) When a motion is pending, the following amendments shall be in order: (1) One amendment may be made to each independent or separable portion thereof; and (2) one motion to amend that amendment shall be in order; and it shall be in order also (3) to offer a further amendment by way of substitute to which may be offered (4) one amendment.
 - (B) No proposition not germane to the subject under consideration shall be received under color of an amendment or a substitute. Neither the substitute nor its amendment shall be voted on (except to lay on the table) until the original matter is perfected. An amendment or a substitute may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of his seconder before amendment thereof or before decision is had thereon.
 - (C) The amendment or the substitute shall be debatable only when the main question is debatable.
 - (D) The adoption of an amendment by way of substitute or otherwise shall not displace the main resolution, which, after being amended, shall be the question before the Council.
 - (E) The following questions cannot be amended: (1) The call for the Order of the Day, (2) an appeal from the decision of the Chair, (3) an objection to consideration of any question, or the motions, (4) to adjourn, (5) to lay on the table, (6) to take from the table, (7) for leave to continue speaking, (8) to postpone indefinitely, (9) to reconsider, (10) to suspend rules, (11) to take up business out or order, or (12) for leave to withdraw a motion.
 - (F) The Order of decision of a question before the Council shall be:
 - (1) Amendment to the Amendment of the main question
 - (2) Amendment to the main question
 - (3) Amendment to the substitute motion
 - (4) The substitute motion
 - (5) If the substitute fails, then the main question

- 13. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to (1) adjourn, (2) to lay on the table, (3) for the previous question, (4) to take a vote at a certain time, (5) to commit or recommit, (6) to amend or substitute, (7) to postpone to a certain day, (8) to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order enumerated and be settled by a majority vote.
- 14. A motion for the previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the previous question or questions before the Council now be put?" If the previous question is voted only the immediately pending questions before the Council shall be put without debate.
- 15. A motion to adjourn, or lay on the table, shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.
- 16. When two or more members of Council rise at once, the Presiding Officer shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 17. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Council.
- 18. The vote on all questions shall be taken by orders, whenever as many as five members request it.
- 19. Reports of all committees shall be in writing. Statistical and other reports of officers and committees which require no action by the Council may be read by title only, and any report may be read in part only when the Presiding Officer shall, without obligation, so direct, or when the Council shall so require.
- 20. No member shall absent himself from the meetings of the Council without leave, unless he be sick or unable to attend.
- 21. All persons elected as officials of the Diocese by the Council or by the Executive Board of the Council, and Presidents of Regions, shall by virtue of their respective offices, be entitled to a seat and voice, but no vote, at all meetings of the Council.
- 2. No Rule of Order shall be suspended except with the concurrence of twothirds of the members present.
- 3. In all matters not specifically covered by these Rules of Order or by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, Roberts Rules of Order, *Revised*, shall govern the Council in all cases to which they are applicable.

PROCEEDINGS of the 185TH ANNUAL COUNCIL of the DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

93.

Richmond, Virginia February 1, 1980

The 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia met in Grace & Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, Virginia after proper call and notice.

The Service of Morning Prayer was held and led by the Rev'd William O. Gregg of St. Anne's-Belfield School, Charlottesville, Virginia.

Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer, Secretary of the Diocese of Virginia, convened the Council at 10:20 a.m. and announced to the delegates that the Rt. Rev'd Robert Bruce Hall, President of the Council, would be unable to attend the Council meeting as he was hospitalized. Mr. Palmer read a letter to the Council written by Bishop Hall as follows:

Dear Members of the 185th Annual Council:

I can assure you that I never thought it to be within the realm of likelihood that I would miss a Council of our Diocese. To miss this one is particularly sad for me because of the events connected with Bishops Baden and Lewis.

Last Monday night I suffered an attack of acute bronchitis and entered Johnston-Willis Hospital for treatment of it and a bronchial infection.

I feel very much better and hope to be able to participate in the Consecration on Sunday. That decision, however, rests with the doctors who are attending me.

You will be in my prayers and affectionate best wishes and I pray God to guide your deliberations.

Mr. Palmer then called on the Chancellor of the Diocese, A. Hugo Blankingship, Jr., Esquire to explain the procedure neccesary under Article IX of the Constitution of the Diocese whereby a President *pro tempore* would be elected from the presbyters of the Diocese.

Mr. Blankingship stated that he had asked that a meeting of the Standing Committee of the Diocese be called prior to the Council meeting and that such a meeting was held within the past hour. The Standing Committee acts not only as counsel to the bishop but is the Ecclesiastical Authority during a permanent absence of the bishop. Since Bishop Hall's absence is only temporary, a President pro tempore must be elected in compliance with Article IX of the Constitution, "FROM AMONG THE ORDER OF PRES-BYTERS" since there is no Bishop Coadjutor and the Suffragan Bishop having retired December 31, 1979. The Chancellor advised that the secretary proceed with the election of a President pro tempore. The secretary recognized Mr. Thomas C. Rohr, President of the Standing Committee, who nominated the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., Suffragan Bishop-elect, to be the President *pro tempore*. This was seconded by the Rev'd James P. Lincoln, Emmanuel, Harrisonburg. A motion was made that the nominations be closed which was seconded and the secretary was asked to cast a ballot electing the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., President *pro tempore* of the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

The Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., Bishop Suffragan-elect assumed the Chair and after a brief word, proceeded with the order of business before the Council and called on the secretary for a report on a quorum in accordance with Canon II, Sect. 7. Mr. Palmer reported that there was a quorum present in both orders.

ELECTION OF A SECRETARY AND APPOINTMENT

OF ASSISTANT SECRETARIES

The President called for the election of a Secretary of the Council. Mrs. Charles W. Shields, Jr., St. Stephen's, Richmond, President of the Episcopal Churchwomen, nominated Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer for the office of secretary. This was seconded by the Rt. Rev'd Samuel B. Chilton, D.D., retired Suffragan.

The Chair called for other nominations and there being none, the President cast the ballot electing Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer as Secretary of the 185th Annual Council.

ADOPTION OF THE PROGRAM OF COUNCIL

The Chair recognized the Host Rector, the Rev'd W. Hill Brown III who welcomed Council and introduced vestryman, Dean Franklin Bacon of Virginia Commonwealth University, who was in charge of arrangements. The Rev'd Mr. Brown made reference to Mrs. Slaughter Fitz-Hugh, president of the Episcopal Churchwomen of Grace & Holy Trinity Church, who had undertaken many of the logistical problems, as well as the Rev'd Eric S. Greenwood, Jr., the assistant at Grace & Holy Trinity Church. The Rev'd Mr. Brown moved the adoption of the Program of Council as printed and made available to all members of Council. This was seconded by Mr. Thomas C. Rohr, St. Paul's, Alexandria. The Council, by vote, adopted the Program of Council.

ADOPTION OF THE RULES OF ORDER

The Chancellor moved that the Rules of Order as printed on pages 5-8 of the pre-Council Journal be adopted as the Rules of Order for the 185th Annual Council. This was seconded and on a vote taken, the Rules of Order were adopted.

Mr. Donald T. King, Epiphany, Richmond was recognized and advised that he had an ammendment to Rule of Order 21 and that the adoption process went so fast he could not be recognized. The President asked what amendment to Rule 21 did Mr. King wish to make. He advised that it had to do with the incoming lay members of the Executive Board who had been elected prior to the Council meeting and whose term would begin at the conclusion of Council. Bishop-elect Lewis advised that he would receive the amendment to Rule of Order 21 if there was no objection from the Council. There was none. The amendment would be to include in Rule of Order 21, following the phrase - and presidents of regions, "incoming lay members of the Executive Board" - the guestion was called and the Council adopted the amendment to Rule of Order 21. The Council then adopted the Rules of Order

The President *pro tempore* asked that before proceeding with the business of Council that Council join him in a prayer for our Bishop for full recovery and strength.

The resolution providing honorary seats in Council was adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS

The Rev'd W. Frisby Hendricks, Vicar, St. Martin's, Richmond and chairman of the Committee on Credentials, made the following report: "Your Committee on Credentials has met with the secretary prior to the Council meeting and have examined the Certificates of Election of the Lay Delegates to this 185th Annual Council and find them in order.

Since that time, your committee certifies those changes which have been duplicated and are in your information packet appearing on the pink sheet. This morning your committee has approved these changes and in addition, recognizes Mr. Francis E. Elkins of Aquia Church as delegate, Patricia Ward as delegate from the Church of the Good Shepherd, Burke, Marcia Allshouse, delegate from St. David's, Manassas, Mr. Miles Cary, Jr., delegate from Grace & Holy Trinity, Richmond.

This concludes our report and your Credentials Committee asks to be discharged."

The Council on motion duly seconded, received the report, and the Chair advised that the committee was discharged.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH STATUS

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., Page County Ministry and chairman of the Committee on Church Status, reported that no changes in status had been referred to the committee. He did report an error in the pre-Council Journal on page 55 where the Church of the Creator, Mechanicsville, is listed as a "Church", but should now be listed properly as a "Church Under Supervision". The Chair advised that the secretary knew of this error and that it would be corrected.

The Chair called for other nominations and there being none, it was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed. The motion passed.

The Chair asked the secretary to read for members of the Council those nominated in each order. Following this, he recognized the Archdeacon of the Diocese, the Venerable Milton R. LeRoy, S.T.M., who read the Pastoral Address prepared by Bishop Hall, prior to his hospitalization.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

"Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ"

I greet you in the name of the Lord and pray that He will guide the deliberations of this 185th Annual Council of the Diocese that we may be led in the ways of truth and light.

This Council will conclude when we gather in St. Paul's Church, Richmond, on Sunday morning to take part in the Ordination and Consecration of The Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr. as Bishop in the Church of God and Suffragan Bishop of Virignia. In addition to Council members, the Presiding Bishop, about ten bishops from Virginia and neighboring dioceses, friends and family of the new bishop, and parishioners from churches in which Bishop-elect Lewis served will be a part of the great gathering. The late Bishop Stephen F. Bayne wrote of the Consecration of a Bishop:

"You will see neither the honoring or the transfiguration of a mortal man; you will, rather, see him entrusted with the authority and the holiness of Christ and His Church, and you will hear the prayer that he may be worthy of what is committed to his charge. He will be your shepherd, God willing; and needs and asks your prayers now and as long as he lives, that he may rule mercifully and guide wisely and bear the witness of the Church with courage and understanding."

Since Bishp-elect Lewis has served all of his ministry in Virginia he is known and admired by countless members of the Diocese and will, I am certain, continue to receive the same kind of admiring and affectionate support as bishop that has characterized his ministry amongst us for almost forty years.

In addition to the usual sacramental and pastoral responsibilities inherent in the office of Suffragan Bishop, I will assign him responsibility for the oversight of Missionary Outreach, Churches Under Supervision of the Bishop and care of vacant cures.

Tonight we shall pay tribute to Bishop Baden and honor him and his wife at a banquet. He has officially retired but I am certain that we shall continue to see him, learn from him and be challenged to serve more faithfully the Lord he serves and loves so well.

For all but the first ten years of his ministry (which were spent in Maryland) Bishop Baden has exercised his ministry in Virginia. As parish priest, missionary archdeacon, and suffragan bishop he has emphasized the outreach and thrust of the Gospel and has never been content to accept a parish status guo as a live option. Many of the churches of the Diocese owe their existence to his vision and sense of missionary strategy.

As founder and long-time director of the Mid-Atlantic Parish Training Program his leadership gave to seminary students and members of congregations in this diocese and many others, the opportunity to share experiences and insights into the parish ministry that have been of inestimable value to the Church.

Somehow, between honoring one bishop and consecrating another, the Council will carry out the business of the Diocese! I wish to indicate some of the matters that should receive attention from the Council.

I recommend that Council consider favorably the plan for more adequate pension annuities which the Diocese should provide for its lay employees. In terms of dollars, it represents a very small segment of the Diocesan Budget and I mention it to you in order that individual congregations may also take up the matter. Our clergy, overall, receive a reasonably good retirement pension from the Church Pension Fund but such is not generally the case with lay employees in our congregations. I urge all our churches with full-time employees to consider whether their retirement plans are adequate in an era of inflation and, where no plan exists, to begin to investigate such possibilities.

The "Committee to Study the Possiblity of the Division of the Diocese", chaired by The Rev'd Harry W. Baldwin, Jr., will present a progress report on its work and shortly will conduct hearings throughout the Diocese to gather material which will provide, in large measure, the content of the discussion which will take place at the Special Council of the Diocese, which I shall call to meet in All Saints Church in Richmond on Saturday, 26 April 1980, to consider the report of the Committee.

Obviously, this matter is of profound importance for our future and requires the best and most imaginative thinking of which we are capable. There are no easy generalizations which will enlighten the many issues that are raised pro and con a division of the diccese nor will cultural nor political considerations shed much light on a structure's responsiveness to the demands of the Gospel. Good and effective communications within a diocese of any size require a continuing commitment to wish to communicate and to share selves and our ministries with one another.

The people of our Diocese have responded generously to the call for healing and help from the people in Cambodia. The diocesan treasurer has forwarded to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief \$25,584.00 in the past three months. In addition, considerable sums of money have been sent directly to the fund from many of our congregations. We must continue this work of mercy and be among those throughout the world who are responding to the call for help from that devastated people and nation.

Soon it will be a year since we began our "Venture in Mission" Program. Most of our churches have completed the formal educational and fund-raising aspects of the Venture although a substantial number of congregations will undertake the complete program in 1980. Understandably, a program of this magnitude, involving a potential 168 congregations, has had its "ups and downs" and its joys and disappointments. It is my observation that in those churches where the educational and spiritual foundations were firmly laid, spiritual growth ensued and the fund raising came as a logical and natural result of the prior educational programs. Further, not only have many of our people and parishes experienced joy and a release of spiritual concern and energy but we do, in fact, have the financial resources to meet local, national and international human needs that we did not possess a year ago. We have achieved approximately half of our goal of five million dollars and when the final report is available in the spring it is my hope and expectation that the figure will be substantially larger.

As bishop I must express my gratitude to the many people who work diligently and effectively in Venture in Mission. Great sacrifices of time are being made and for such people there is simply no substitute. On the diocesan level Bishop Baden,Bishop-elect Lewis, Mr. Pete Johnston and Mr. Tom Rohr have visited numerous vestries to explain the program and all of us owe them a great debt of gratitude.

We must not lose any spiritual insights that Venture has brought us but, rather, should use them for further growth in the years ahead. Certainly, in the areas of stewardship, commitment to the Lord and our reaching out to his people we have made strides forward and we must keep moving in those directions ever more firmly, confidently, and with the knowledge that God will continue to lead and guide us in His Service.

It appears that the "eighties" will be a time of testing and deep reflection for us Americans. Changes will occur in the world affecting us in ways we cannot presently foresee. Stresses and challenges which we have not previously experienced may face us and, no doubt, some of the accepted "stabilities" of our life and culture may be shaken. Strong religious convictions will give a degree of spiritual equanimity which we shall surely need as we survey and live in the years ahead.

I shall conclude my address with a prayer that suggests something of the spiritual context in which Christians should always live and which, if truly prayed and truly lived, will aid us in the years ahead.

* "FOR GUIDANCE"

"O God, by whom the meek are guided in judgment, and light riseth up in darkness for the godly; Grant us, in all our doubts and uncertainties, the grace to ask what thou wouldest have us to do, that the Spirit of Wisdom may save us from all false choices, and that in thy light we may see light, and in thy straight path may not stumble; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen."

The Chair called for matters of reference from the pastoral address. There were none.

PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTIONS, PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONVENTION

The President advised that this was time for delegates to submit resolutions, petitions and memorials and that those resolutions printed in the pre-Council Journal, as well as those enclosed in the registration packet were now referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Two additional resolutions were submitted and the Chair asked the secretary to advise the Council the total number of resolutions before it. They are as follows:

Bishop-elect Lewis referred all resolutions to the Resolutions Committee.

PRESENTATION OF THE PROPOSED BUDGET

BY

THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Mr. William A. Johnston III, Frederick Parish, Winchester and President of the Executive Board, presented the proposed budget of the Executive Board to the Council. In doing so, he referred both to the budget section in the pre-Council Journal and the printed blue page titled "Revised Statement of Income for 1980 as of January 31, 1980". Mr. Johnston called the attention of the Council to page B-21 of the pre-Council Journal which contains resolutions which have been prepared by the Executive Board and are a part of the proposed budget.

He indicated that resolutions would explain the situation Council faces with this deficit budget and would help to focus on the substance of some of the major issues which would relate to:

- 1) 1979 Unpaid Pledges
- Additional income necessary to fund needed and important programs
- 3) Pledge to the General Church
- 4) The Deacons Training Program
- 5) The Mayo Memorial Church House Repair
- 6) Correcting Item E on page B-8 to read \$50,057.

The Chair called for amendments to the budget. Mr. James R. Davis, Page County Ministry, presented a proposed resolution that the office expenses of the coordinator for the Commission on Ministry be reduced from \$4,000 to \$2,700. The Chair referred this to the Budget Committee and again reminded Council that all resolutions including amendments to the budget must be submitted before 3 p.m. this day.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND CANONS AND THE REPORT THEREON

The Chair called for amendments to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese. There were none. The secretary advised that he had receided none and accordingly, there were no amendments to the Constitution or to the Canons as appearing in the pre-Council Journal.

The Chair recognized John Paul Causey, Esq., St. John's, West Point, chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons who advised that in lieu of the fact that no amendments were before the Council that the committee be discharged. The Chair inquired the pleasure of the Council and on motion made and seconded, it was adopted that the Committee on Constitution and Canons for the 185th Annual Council, be discharged with thanks.

The President announced that on the recommendation of Mr. Bennie I. Elmore of the Committee on Credentials, even though the committee had been discharged, there were certain approved changes and the Chair announced that Mr. Dale Hogoboom is the delegate in place of Mr. Charles Turner, Jr., Grace Church, The Plains and Mr. Daniel Hoyle is the alternate serving as the delegate in the place of Carol Lady, the Church of the Holy Comforter, Vienna, Mr. Venable Payne replaces Mr. George H. Chilton, St. Luke's, Remington, Mr. Charles E. Tomlin, Jr. replaces Mr. R. Latane Waring of Wicomico Church, Mrs. June C. Gooding replaces Mr. James F. Allison, Church of the Messiah, Highland Springs, Mr. John Vander Voort replaces Mr. Harry Strong, Truro, Fairfax and Mr. Marvin C. Boswell replaces Harriet Dale Hague, Christ Church, Charlottesville.

The Chair ruled that these delegates will be seated with their delegation.

The President also announced that Harriet Gray would replace Jean Campbell of the Falls Church as Teller as would Mrs. Archie Berkeley in place of Mr. James E. Jenkins of St. Mark's, Richmond.

The Council took a ten minute break.

NOONDAY PRAYER

The Council was called to order and was led in a Service for Noonday Prayer by the Rev'd Mary B. Anthony, Chaplain, St. Catherine's School, Richmond.

SEAT AND VOICE FOR

THE REV'D DRS. TISDALE

The Chair announced that due to an oversight in the organizational session, he had neglected to welcome to the Council the Rev'd Dr. Alfred Tisdale and his wife, the Rev'd Dr. Leonora Tisdale, ordained Presbyterian ministers who served St. James's, Louisa in the Shared Ministry of the Episcopal Church and the Presbyterian Church in that county.

On motion of the Rev'd Robert J. Boyd, Jr., Trinity, Fredericksburg, and seconded, Council voted to provide seat and voice for the Drs. Tisdale. The Chair asked the Tisdales to stand and there was applause.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE POSSIBILITY OF THE DIVISION OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

The Chair announced that the chairman of the Committee to Study the Possibility of the Division of the Diocese of Virginia, the Rev'd Harry W. Baldwin, Jr., was prepared to give his report, which is as follows:

"The Committee to Study the Possibility of the Division of the Diocese of Virginia, or, more appropriately described as the Committee to Study the Possibility of the Creation of Two New Dioceses from the Diocese of Virginia, files its report by title and you will find this detailed report beginning on Page 191 of the Journal. We hope that you will read and study it.

The Committee wishes to thank Bishop Hall for his offer to call a Special Council of this Diocese to consider this most important issue as to whether the Diocese of Virginia should be divided, and we express our gratitude to him for following up on his offer and establishing the Special Council at All Saints Church, Richmond on Saturday, April 26, 1980.

Eleven area meetings, under the leadership of the Rev'd Dr. John Page Williams and with the Rev'd Stephen R. Park as reporter plus members of the Committee, will be held throughout the Diocese of Virginia with the first meeting being held February 7th and the eleventh one on March 4th. The clergy, wardens, council delegates, Episcopal Churchwomen and other lay persons are urged to attend these area meetings. The purposes of these meetings are:

- To inform the clergy, wardens, council delegates and other parish leaders of the possibilities and of the issues which the Committee has identified, and to help them stimulate informed and responsible thinking among the people of the Diocese, and
- To enable the Committee to gather diverse opinions and points of view which will assist it in making a more representative recommendation to the Special Council.

The Committee will present the findings about the Diocese of Virginia and the possibilities for division at the area meetings. We need to hear your questions, listen to your reactions, and find out what your opinions are regarding the division of this diocese into two dioceses. We urge your cooperation, encourage your attendance at the area meetings most convenient to you, and covet your prayers between now and the time of the Special Council on April 26th.

The Rev'd Mr. Baldwin, on behalf of the committee, expressed thanks to Bishop Hall for the Special Council which has been announced will be held on Saturday, April 26, 1980, in All Saints Church, Richmond, Virginia. Prior to that time, all are again urged to attend the meetings throughout the Diocese led by the Rev'd Dr. John Page Williams, a member of the Committee to Study the Possibility of the Division of the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HUMAN SEXUALITY

The President pro tempore asked if the Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr. chairman of the Committee on the Study of Human Sexuality was prepared to report. He advised in the affirmative and the Chair then introduced the Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr., who gave the report of their committee and announced that it is printed in full on page 153 of the Journal.

The Rev'd Mr. Frizzell indicated that the committee was concentrating on looking for effective educational programs which can be used throughout the diocese. He also said that he had no resolutions to present because the resolution from the General Convention was clear.

HEROIC MEDICAL MEASURES

The Chair announced that in the absence of a chairman, the Committee on Heroic Medical Measures would not have a report. There had been a break in communications and noted the records on this subject by the Standing Committee.

Council recessed for lunch at 12:25 p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Bishop-elect Lewis, President pro tempore, called the Council to order at 2:00 p.m. He announced that he had just returned from a visit with Bishop Hall in the hospital and that Bishop Hall sends his love and greetings to the members of the 185th Annual

Council. He informed that his doctors require that he stay in the hospital through Monday thus negating his fervent hope to be at the Consecration Service on Sunday. Bishop-elect Lewis shared his personal disappointment and knew that the Council joined him in this feeling.

STANDING COMMITTEE NOMINATIONS

The Chair recognized W. T. Withers Fennell, Esq., St. Paul's, Ivy and President of Regional Council 15. Mr. Fennell advised that he had inadvertently, when the time for lay nominations where received, to nominate from Region 15 Mr. Henry Wilson Eells, whose biography and picture had been in <u>THE VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN</u> supplement. Mr. Fennell advised there is no Dean currently in Regional Council 15, and that he regretted not making the nomination at the proper time. Mr. Fennell then moved that the nominations be reopened. This was seconded by the Rev'd W. Ramsey Richardson, Christ Church, Charlottesville.

The Chair advised that the motion was to reopen nominations so that the name of Mr. Henry Wilson Eells could be placed in nomination. The motion passed.

Mr. Fennell then placed in nomination the name of Mr. Henry W. Eells of Charlottesville as a lay nominee to the Standing Committee.

The Chair advised the name had been received and would be placed upon the ballot.

FIRST BALLOT

After preliminary instructions as to the balloting and the use of ballots provided and the distribution of the lists of lay and clerical nominees, Bishop-elect Lewis called for the first ballot in the lay order. After everyone had voted, the Chair closed the first ballot in the lay order and then called for the first ballot in the clergy order for election to the Standing Committee.

At approximately 2:24 p.m., the first ballot was closed.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD ON

MATTERS REFERRED BY THE 184TH ANNUAL COUNCIL

Mr. William A. Johnston, President of the Executive Board reported that the Board had taken action on the matter of referral by the 184th Annual Council to cause a study in 1979 as to the relationship between the Camps, Conferences and Youth Ministries at Shrine Mont and the Diocesan Budget to the end that the Diocese provide the most effective and efficient facilities possible and to make this report to the 185th Annual Council.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ______STATE OF THE CHURCH

Mr. Thomas C. Rohr, St. Paul's, Alexandria, President of the Standing Committee, began his remarks by thanking on behalf of the Standing Committee, Bishop Baden for his long and active ministry and his many services and contributions to the Diocese of Virginia. He then made reference to the Bishop-elect, the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr. for his many years of service as an elected member of the Standing Committee, having served as president and secretary on more than several occasions. "The Standing Committee will miss his counsel and able judgment; however, the Standing Committee looks forward to his ministry in the diocese as the Suffragan Bishop."

Mr. Rohr called attention to the written report of the Standing Committee to be found on page 194 of this Journal wherein the Standing Committee in response to Canon XV, Sect. 2(a) provides a general evaluation on some of the elements of the Diocesan Programs for 1979. This report can be found on page of this Journal.

Mr. Rohr advised Council that his report would be in two parts, first to deal with the number one priority in the diocese, namely our Venture in Mission program and, the second part would deal with some of the concerns and observations of the diocese in the past year.

"In the year 1979 this diocese undertook an extraordinary program and we called for it to be our #1 priority. Two meetings of this Council and numerous smaller groups preceded our unanimous decision to participate in Venture in Mission.

Venture has given us a unique opportunity to look at this unit of our church, (The Diocese of Virginia), that we have not had before. Venture has highlighted our strengths and weaknesses. It has shown us what we can and what we seem unable to do.

It has been said that, 'absolute truth, if there be such a thing, requires the concert of many voices,' so today I hope that we might be the conductor of that concert for truth and provide opportunities for discussion and response in the parishes, regions, committees, and staff of this diocese.

To provide the stimulus or launching devices for these discussions, let us share with you some of our observations about the VIM experience which by no means is over yet.

- 1 VIM has been able to tap some resources we had not seen or experienced before, some of our parishes came alive with spirit and commitment, that will affect their corporate lives for years to come; previously unknown talents of our people rose to the surface enriching our lives. How can we identify these things: How can we capitalize on them for our future life?
- 2 We seem to have no problem in agreeing to a statement of our mission and giving it our full support, but we stumble, fumble and grumble with its implementation.
- 3. We have observed this past year a widespread lack of understanding of the structure of the Episcopal Church and how it operates. We have seen the frustrations of clergy, vestries and parishes that this lack of knowledge brings about. In this area we respectfully request the bishop to appoint a task group whose purpose will be to develop a pamphlet or paper to offer guidance and knowledge to us on the structure of the church and what it means to be an Episcopalian in this

Clergy salaries in our diocese now rate 19th on the list of dioceses in this country. We must keep our eyes on this if we are to continue to attract the best people. Salaries should be based on the job and not on the incumbent needs; our clergy should not subsidize the church's monetary life and I remind you Canon law requires us to review this each year. At our current rate of inflation this becomes even more critical.

Mayo House, our Diocesan Headquarters building, continues to fall down and we seem unable to resolve this: there have been non-productive committees and much talk, but no action. It seems unreasonable to ask Hoke Palmer to continue patching it up when he can find a spare 2 x 4 and a nail.

These items are fairly easy to judge; money, bricks and organization and they all have fairly straight forward solutions, yet none is more important than our spiritual life.

God continues to move and speak among us and we are all seeking ways to respond to that pressure in our lives.

In the '50'S we studied the travels of Paul from place to place and I remember all those cities and roads and they have not helped me at all. In the '70'S we were not so much concerned with where he went but what he did and what he said and what that means in our lives. A large number of groups in our diocese are studying theology by extension and attend courses at the Virginia Seminary. There are Bible Study Groups all over our Church and we are seeking knowlege of our Lord and our lives, no longer satisfied with roadmaps of biblical travels.

There are positive signs, signs of people growing and nuturing one another.

So there is hope, hope that our future holds a melting, a coming together of our spiritual life and our corporate structure and organization so that they will not seem to be at odds but complimentary, each nurturing the other.

The Council responded to Mr. Rohr's address with loud applause.

BUDGET AMENDMENT

The Chair recognized the Very Rev'd Vincent S. Hodge, C.A., St. Paul's, West Point, noting that the hour was not yet 3:00 p.m. asked to present an amendment to the budget for which the Chair ruled it was really a resolution and received resolution R-9 dealing with the submission of pledges.

OPEN HEARING ON BUDGET

At 3:00 p.m., the Chair announced that Council would begin the session dealing with the Open Hearing on the Budget for 1980 and introduced the chairman of Council's Budget Committee, Mr. Andrew H. McCutcheon.

Diocese and the National Church, and to disburse the same to all parish vestries, at least.

4 - How do we sit in this room 600 strong, one of the greatest gatherings of talent and skill in the Episcopal Church, and be unable to move as one, unable to set aside petty differences, to act in the corporate interest of Our Lord Jesus Christ? What are the things that block us from this unity of spirit and task?

5 - Why can't we trust one another with our thoughts, our dreams, our disappointments and joys and with our money? Have we forgotten how to dream? Have we forgotten our task? Out of 60 or 70 thousand Episcopalians in this Diocese only 120 mission ideas? Where is our excitement and the fire of our spirit?

You say you do not need to discuss these things, you already know the answers, well so do we. We have the answers to each question and here today there are 600 more answers and somewhere in that mass of answers lies the truth.

To find it, we must set aside our conscience clauses, set aside the 'me' decade of our lives, to listen with all our hearts, and to risk belonging to each other in our Lord Jesus Christ.

Share your findings with us this coming year. They are important to us individually and corporately."

"The second part of my address to you is that I would like to share some of the concerns and observations we have made this past year concerning our life together. It would be impossible to touch on all things and recognize all the people who have contributed to our corporate life. It would also be boring. So, let's just look at a few.

The issue of our Prayer Book appears to be resolved; the resolutions are passed and the guidelines drawn and we have cast our votes, but we are far from one on this matter and it affects our lives in every way. A great deal of work is yet to be done and we must continue to move; movement with love and understanding and real sensitivity to each other.

The ordination of homosexual persons continues to perplex us. The General Convention has offered recommendations to us on this matter: many in our church have signed a conscience clause that they will not uphold these recommendations and we as a diocese have yet to respond to these recommendations. All of us who are involved in the ordination process, and this includes you, must respond and soon; and we must respond from prayerful thought and study, not from emotion.

We have moved forward with deliberate speed on the ordination of women. The ministry of ordained women continues to make its presence felt in our lives, yet we must continue to affirm their ministry and bring it to its full potential in the whole church.

While we have been open and supportive of the ordained ministry of women, we have solely neglected blacks and other minority groups in this process. I have been unable to find out when we

Mr. McCutcheon repeated what the Chair had said - that this was an "Open Hearing" - that there would be no formal resolutions entertained. The Budget Committee is anxious to get the input and the sense of Council as pertaining to the budget and in an orderly fashion, recommended that each of the resolutions received be discussed numerically.

The Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr. inquired about the payment of the 1979 Pledge to the General Church which equaled 37% of the total income.

Mr. Palmer replied that all but approximately \$1800. of the total accepted pledge to the General Church in 1979 had been paid and that there still remained to be paid to the diocese, \$8,000. on pledges for 1979. If these are paid, 37% would more than pay our total commitment to the General Church.

Mr. James A. Creasy III, Church of Our Saviour, Sandston, spoke to B-1, which had been submitted by Region 9, requesting an increase in the budgeted amount under Church Under Supervision for the Church of Our Saviour, Sandston for an additional \$4,400.

The Very Rev'd Heyward H. Macdonald, Rector, Westover Church, Charles City spoke in favor of increasing the budget appropriation for the Church of Our Saviour, Sandston.

Mr. John W. Martin, St. George's, Arlington asked for a clarification.

Mr. McCutcheon said that the next matter to be discussed were the resolutions of the Executive Board and the first resolution would be dealing with income, Item - E, Individual Gifts to the Program, which number in the pre-Council Budget is \$79,399. but has now been reduced to approximately \$50,000.

The Very Rev'd Heyward H. Macdonald inquired if there was to be a plan to raise this additional money by fund raising.

Mr. McCutcheon responded that there was no specific plan envisoned.

The Rev'd John M. Smith, St. James's, Leesburg inquired about priorities and if there were other 1979 commitments that had not been made. The answer was "no".

The Rev'd Mr. Smith then urged commitment to the General Church in its entirety be first met from any additional funds.

Mr. W. Thomas Rice, St. Stephen's, Richmond inquired if the earned income on money received on Venture in Mission pledges, which would be invested at approximately 12 to 13%, could be used to help meet the deficit.

Mr. McCutcheon answered it could not. Any money earned on the VIM money must stay with VIM.

Mr. McCutcheon then asked for discussion on the 3rd resolution dealing with the Pledge to the General Church which is set at \$437,125. or 36.7% of the total income to be received in 1980.

The Rev'd Richard R. Baker III, Wicomico Church, urged Council

either to keep the percentage and proporationate philosophy or "get off of it" and pay the direct quota asked.

Mr. Baker said he concurred with the Rev'd Harry W. Hoffman who spoke earlier on this subject.

The next resolution dealt with <u>Deacons Training Program</u> requesting an evaluation and study. The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., Coordinator for the Deacons Training Program, spoke inquiring as to what was desired by the study and attempted to give something of the mechanics of the Deacons Training Program. He asked for clarification of the wording of the resolution and what it actually meant.

Mr. William A. Johnston, President of the Executive Board, attempted to clarify and answer Mr. Hobson's question.

Mr. Jack W. Burtch, Jr., chairman of the Commission on Ministry, made the appeal for a clear resolution on what was desired by the Executive Board.

Mr. McCutcheon advised that the committee would now hear discussion on the Executive Board's resolution pertaining to the renovation and necessary repair to the Mayo Memorial Church House.

Those speaking to this question were: Mr. Walter W. Scott, St. Paul's, Richmond raised the question "if the diocese should divide and there was a mortgage for several hundred thousand dollars, what would happen then?" - therefore, Mr. Scott spoke against the resolution.

The Very Rev'd Heyward Macdonald, member of the committee on the Study of the Possibility of Division of the Diocese, advised that he concurred with Mr. Scott that no action be taken until the April meeting and a decision has been reached on division.

The Rev'd Charles G. Leavell, St. Luke's, Simeon inquired what general repairs are needed.

Mr. Palmer attempted to address this question.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., Page County Ministry, commented that over the years the Council has refused, for some reason or other, to face the issue of providing sufficient funds to maintain a Diocesan Headquarters.

Mr. John W. Martin, Standing Committee, asked that he be allowed to revert back to an earlier resolution as it pertained to proportionate giving versus quota and how the percentage was calculated.

The balance of the Open Hearing dealt with a "walk through" by category, the Diocesan Budget, and Mr. McCutcheon sought the input in the form of suggestions, recommendations, criticisms, alternatives, et cetera as they might apply to the budget. The following persons expressed their viewpoint as to the proposed budget:

Therefore, the following names shall be dropped from the second ballot: Henry Eells, Bennie I. Elmore, Barbara Levy, William Taylor, Sr. and David W. Wilcox.

Those remaining on the ballot are: Lloyd Addington, R. duVal Dickinson, W. Fairfax Griffith, Charlotte Kern and William Shubatt.

SECOND BALLOT

Council cast its vote in the lay order for the second ballot and the Chair declared Ballot No. 2 closed at 4:15 p.m.

The Chair called for the second ballot in the clergy order and announced that from the report of the tellers and in accordance with the Rules of Order, the following names should be dropped from the ballot: the Very Rev'd William Buttrick, the Rev'd Stuart H. Henderson, the Rev'd Charles A. Joy, the Rev'd David H. Knight, the Rev'd John M. Miller, Jr., the Rev'd Randall L. Prior, the Rev'd Daniel O. Worthington, Jr.

Those names remaining on the ballot are: the Rev'd Mark S. Anschutz, the Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr., the Rev'd John W. Howe, the Rev'd J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr., the Rev'd Claud W. McCauley, the Rev'd Heyward H. Macdonald, the Rev'd Edward Morgan III, the Rev'd Charles R. Sydnor, Jr.

The Chair declared the second ballot in the clergy order closed at 4:25 p.m. and declared Council in recess until 4:35 p.m.

At 4:45 p.m., Council was called to order and the Chair recognized as a point of personal privilege, the Rev'd Elijah B. White III, Church of Our Saviour, Oaklands, who asked the Resolutions Committee to draft a resolution wishing Bishop Hall a complete, speedy and lasting recovery of his illness. This motion was put and passed unanimously.

OPEN HEARING SESSION ON RESOLUTIONS

The Chair announced that the time had come to follow the same procedure that had been done with the budget and to have this Open Hearing on all the resolutions, memorials and petitions before the Council. He introduced John Ariail, Jr., Esq., chairman of the Committee. Mr. Ariail presented the Committee working with him and then opened the session to have comments on the nine resolutions before the Council. He announced that five of these resolutions are in the pre-Council Journal and numbered R-1 through R-5 and that three have been reproduced and in the packets with the last resolution R-9 to be drafted by the Committee as moved by the Rev'd Elijah B. White, Jr. He asked that comment begin with Resolution R-1, submitted by the vestry of Truro Church, Fairfax dealing with the action the General Convention took as it relates to Human Sexuality. The Rev'd Stephen R. Park of the Commission on Ministry asked for clarification and precisely what did the vestry desire in this resolution. Senior Warden Edgar A. Prichard, Jr., Esq. answered by saying that the General Convention had adequately dealt with this and had passed a resolution as it would apply to the ordination of persons with a homosexual preference. The resolution asked that the ecclesiastical authorities and other bodies dealing with the ordination process adhere to the General Convention resolution.

The Rev'd Claud W. McCauley, All Saints, Richmond, VA The Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr., St. Alban's, Annandale, VA The Rev'd J. Mr. McCutcheon advised that the Budget Committee would convene and requested Mr. Thomas Rohr, Mr. John Graham and some person knowledgeable about the impaired hearing to counsel with the Budget Committee.

This concluded the Open Hearing on the Budget.

REPORT ON BALLOT NO. 1

The Chair announced that there was no election on the first ballot on either the lay or the clerical order and that Council would proceed to take a second ballot.

Bishop-elect Lewis announced that in accordance with Rule of Order 9, Sect (b) that if any office then remains to be filled, a second ballot shall be taken. On this and on subsequent ballots the number of nominees remaining shall be reduced by half, but such reduction shall not result in less than number of offices remaining to be filled and the manner of such reduction shall be by retaining as nominees those persons receiving the higher number of votes on the preceding ballot.

The Rev'd Alden W. Hathaway, St. Christopher's, Springfield speaking on behalf of Region 7, said that he would like to have the Committee consider a substitute or change the word that is in the "resolved clause" of approved and delete <u>approved</u> and substitute the word affirmed.

Mr. Ariail said that the Committee would hear comments regarding R-2 which recommends a two-day length Council.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr. said that the resolution was unclear and the Committee should clarify whether it is Friday and Saturday or Saturday and Sunday. The Rev'd John M. Miller, Jr., Holy Comforter, Vienna supports the resolution and felt the intention of the resolution dealt with a meeting of Council on Friday and Saturday.

The Very Rev'd William H. Brake, Jr., St. Stephen's Parish, Culpeper spoke to the ambiguity of the resolution and emphasized the stewardship of money and that Region 1 of which he was a member, who proposed the resolution, felt that one overnight should be adequate to do the business of the Council. Further, Region 1 was strong in its opinion that the clergy should be in their parish church on Sunday.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson III spoke against the resolution, emphasizing the need of not being pressured and rushed. The Rev'd Heyward H. Macdonald, Westover Church, Charles City, spoke against the resolution.

Mr. Ariail said that the Committee is of the opinion that R-3 dealing with the vote in Council for the Rev'd Tisdales has been already handled and if there is no other comment he would ask for those observations desired on R-4 requesting a Commission to be appointed on Alcoholism.

The Rev'd Dr. Mark S. Anschutz spoke in favor of the resolution and the need of such a commission, which could help this serious problem, which appears to be growing at this point and time. The Rev'd Edwin T. Williams, retired, spoke in favor of the resolution and the need for such a commission to work on this serious problem. He offered the commission, if appointed, his services.

A question was asked from the floor whether the Executive Board or the Bishop would appoint such a commission. The answer was that this would be under the authority of the Bishop, to bring such a commission into being.

Mr. Otiș L. Turner, St. Thomas's, McLean requested the Resolutions Committee to give special attention to sub-paragraph (c) of the <u>Resolved</u> as it refers to Parish and Diocesan Policies for the Use of Alcoholic Beverages at Church Functions.

The chairman of the committee asked for comments related to R-5 requesting a Task Force to be established seeking information from other established organizations that could be helpful to the Diocese of Virginia.

The Archdeacon, the Venerable Milton R. LeRoy, recommended to the committee that this resolution be referred to the Commission on Ministry which has a sub-committee dealing with lay ministry. The Rev'd W. Frisby Hendricks, St. Martin's, Richmond spoke in

of the resolution and advised Council that there are within the church structure certain orders of monks and nuns who provide valuable services. He agreed with the suggestion of Archdeacon LeRoy.

The Chairman asked for comment on R-6, a Memorial Proposed to the General Convention, dealing with the structure of the General Convention.

The Rev'd Dr. Henry H. Rightor, the drafter of the Memorial, spoke as to why he feels the structure of General Convention should be changed and is similar to Resolutions that this Council has adopted in the past, memorializing General Convention on this subject.

There were no further comments.

The Chairman called for comments as to R-7, a resolution honoring Mrs. Jane Dellastatious. There were no comments.

The Rev'd Elijah B. White, Jr. made an inquiry of Dr. Rightor and suggested a more limited scope of the study. Dr. Rightor responded.

The Chairman of the Resolutions Committee called for comments on Resolution R-8 dealing with Venture in Mission. The Rev'd Charles R. Sydnor, Jr. commented that the Council made Venture in Mission the one priority of the diocese and that those churches who have not participated in the Venture Program that the Council should give some direction - and encouragement for these churches to participate.

The Rev'd John M. Smith said he found the proposed resolution disturbing and did not like the grouping of those who have against those who have not.

There being no further comment, the Chairman thanked the Council and the President ruled the session dealing with the Open Hearing on Resolutions had ended.

REPORT NO. 2 ON ELECTION TO STANDING COMMITTEE

The President, pro tempore of Council, advised that the report of the Head Teller is that the Council has elected in the lay order Mrs. Robert (Charlotte) Kern, Frederick Parish, Winchester to a regular term on the Standing Committee. There remains one vacancy to be filled in the lay order and there was no election in the clerical order.

BALLOT NO. 3 FOR ELECTION TO THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The Chair advised that acting under the Rule of Order the following names shall be dropped from the third ballot: Mr. R. duVal Dickinson and Mr. W. Fairfax Griffith; leaving on the ballot for election for one person, Mr. Lloyd Addington and Mr. William Shubatt.

The Council, having voted in the lay order on ballot 3, the Chair ruled that Ballot No. 3 in the lay order was closed.

The Rev'd Alden W. Hathaway, St. Christopher's, Springfield speaking on behalf of Region 7, said that he would like to have the Committee consider a substitute or change the word that is in the "resolved clause" of approved and delete <u>approved</u> and substitute the word affirmed.

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The Council, having voted in the lay order on ballot 3, the Chair ruled that Ballot No. 3 in the lay order was closed.

The Chair announced that there being no election in the clerical order on the second ballot and in conformance with the Rule of Order, the following names are dropped from the third ballot: the Rev'd John W. Howe, the Rev'd Dr. Mark S. Anschutz, the Rev'd Heyward H. Macdonald and the Rev'd Edward Morgan III.

The names remaining on the ballot - No. 3, of which two shall be elected, are the Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr., the Rev'd J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr., the Rev'd Claud W. McCauley, the Rev'd Charles R. Sydnor, Jr.

The Chair called for Ballot No. 3 in the clerical order and the Council having voted, declared Ballot No. 3 closed at 5:32 p.m.

Announcements were made concerning the banquet to be held at 7:30 p.m. in the Mosque honoring the Rt. Reverend and Mrs. John Alfred Baden.

The Rev'd Ronald S. Okrasinski, St. George's, Fredericksburg led the Council in an Order for Worship for the Evening, after which the Chair recessed Council until 9:00 a.m., Saturday, February 2, 1980.

BANQUET HONORING THE RIGHT REVEREND JOHN ALFRED BADEN, D. D.

On Friday evening, February 1, beginning at 7:30 a.m., in the ballroom of the Mosque, a banquet was held as part of the 185th Annual Council, honoring the ministry of the Rt. Rev'd John A. Baden, D.D., who retired after 40 years of ministry to the children of God, on December 31, 1979. Approximately 500 people were present, including Bishop Baden's immediate family, close personal friends, the delegates to Council and others who have grown to know and love Bishop Baden.

Because of Bishop Hall's hospitalization and his inability to serve as Master of Ceremonies, he asked Mr. Thomas C. Rohr, President of the Standing Committee, to serve in his place. Following the dinner, Mr. Rohr heightened the occasion by his humor and wit. Mr. Rohr introduced Mrs. Charles W. Shields, Jr., President of the Episcopal Churchwomen of the Diocese, who presented Bishop Baden with a beautifully framed calligraphic resolution from the Churchwomen of the Diocese.

Mr. Walter R. Tinsley next spoke concerning his long time friendship with Bishop Baden and more recently, serving with him on the MOCUS Committee.

The Bishop's wife, Dottie Hall, presented Mrs. Baden with a lovely jeweled pin on behalf of the clergy spouses in the Diocese.

Mr. William A. Johnston III, President of the Executive Board and former Senior Warden of Frederick Parish when Bishop Baden was a parish priest, spoke and then Mr. Rohr introduced the Rev'd W. Holt Souder of the Standing Committee, who on behalf of the people of the Diocese, presented Bishop Baden a check in excess of \$8,000 as a loving gift and tribute to Bishop Baden.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr. spoke at length about one of Bishop Baden's projects which he helped found namely the Middle Atlantic Training Program.

This was followed by some moving remarks by the Chancellor,

A. Hugo Blankingship, Jr., Esq. and lastly, Mr. Rohr, again on behalf of the Diocese of Virginia, presented to Bishop Baden the keys to a 1980 red, front-wheel drive, Chevrolet Citation sedan, which filled with gas, properly licensed, was waiting for him in Winchester, Virginia.

Bishop Baden in his usual genuine and loving way spoke movingly to all present and closed a very happy evening and occasion with his blessing.

There was a standing ovation and applause which lasted many minutes.

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SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 2, 1980

At 9:05 a.m., the Order of Morning Prayer led by Mr. and Mrs. Bruce MacAlister, St. Bartholomew's, Richmond, the President, pro tempore, The Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., called the Council to order at 9:29 a.m. in Grace and Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, Virginia.

The President introduced to the Council the Rt. Rev'd Robert Fisher Gibson, Jr., D.D., L.H.D., retired bishop of Virginia, who received a standing ovation from the Council.

REPORT NO. 3 ON ELECTION TO THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The President, pro tempore, announced that on the third ballot, the Council had elected in the lay order, Mr. William F. Shubatt of Trinity, Arlington, to a regular term in the lay order. Council has now filled both the regular vacancies by rotation, having earlier elected Mrs. Robert (Charlotte) Kern, Frederick Parish, Winchester.

On the third ballot, the Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr., St. Alban's, Annandale, was elected to a regular term in the clerical order.

BALLOT NO. 4 FOR ELECTION TO THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The Chair advised that acting under the Rule of Order the name of the Rev'd Claud W. McCauley should be dropped and that the slate for the fourth ballot shall contain the names of the Rev'd J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr. and the Rev'd Charles R. Sydnor, Jr.

The Rev'd Mr. Lewis declared that ballot #4 for election to the Standing Committee in the clerical order was closed at 9:30 a.m.

WELCOME TO NEW CONGREGATION LITTLE FORK CHURCH OF ST. MARK'S PARISH

The Rev'd Mr. Lewis announced to the Council that it was his genuine pleasure to welcome a new church under a founding church to be in communion with the Council. Little Fork Church in Culpeper County under St. Mark's Parish was duly and properly brought into communion by the Bishop of Virginia, whereupon the President pro tempore introduced Mr. William Tucker, who has the distinction of being the first lay delegate to a council since 1834. There was loud applause.

MR. GEORGE D. WILLIAMS EMMANUEL CHURCH - RAPIDAN

The Chair recognized, on point of personal privilege, the Rev'd Albert N. Jones, Pohick Church, Lorton who advised the Council that Mr. George D. Williams, Emmanuel Church, Rapidan, long time delegate to these Council meetings, was desperately ill and asked that Council include in its prayers Mr. George Williams and that the Secretary of the Council communicate to him our love, esteem and prayer for full recovery and return to this Council. The Chair so ordered, there being no objection.

HOLY CROSS CHURCH, DUNN LORING

The President welcomed Holy Cross Church, Dunn Loring, another church under a founding church, St. Dunstan's, McLean, Virginia, to be in communion with the Council and welcome its first delegate, Mr. Richard Juergens, Jr. There was applause.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON

The Archdeacon of the Diocese, the Rev'd Milton R. LeRoy, S.T.M. amused the Council with some personal remarks about his role in preparing for the consecration of Bishop-elect Lewis and then asked that as part of his report, and with the Chair's permission, the Rev'd Harold N. White, St. Aidan's, Alexandria a coordinator of the 1980 D.A.C.E. Conference, would speak, concerning this effective and special ministry of the diocese.

The Archdeacon's address is as follows:

A year ago, I reported to Council on rising interest in religion within the Diocese. This interest was evident in the number of people forming groups for Theological Education by Extension and a rising demand for help in learning to pray and to relate Christian scriptures and doctrine to daily personal and corporate life. The trend continues with even greater force.

In response to these recognized needs and my personal interest, I planned a six months sabbatical leave to research and explore ways in which people grow in faith, how they encounter God through Bible study and the busy-ness of modern life and how they learn to pray.

I decided to search beyond church related institutions following my belief that if we want to learn something really new, we must get outside of our own communities of faith and action. I spent time under the discipline of the Guild for Psychological Studies in San Francisco, which has developed a most unusual approach to the study of the Gospels. I spent time in Starcross Monastery, a monastic group unrelated to any church. I was named official Visitor, one of two persons who form the only link with organized Christianity. I feel that I uncovered a gold mine of religious insights and ways of helping people personally appropriate the great resources of our scriptures and devotional life. Those outside of and on the fringe of church life have great gifts to offer, as truly as those strange foreigners, the wisemen, had gifts for the Christ Child.

From a group of Jungian analysts, I bring a new and revolutionary approach to Bible study. It allows one to read the Bible as if for the first time. It helps one find oneself in the Biblical narratives and to discover the narratives of salvation within oneself. When one discovers the paralysis within, one sees the forgiving healer is also present. When one discovers one's own spiritual blindness, the eyes may be opened. To date, in seminars ranging from two hours to five days, my favorite colleague (my wife) and I have used this approach to Bible study with well over one hundred persons since returning from leave. Their response has been enthusiastic and deeply appreciative of a different way of seeing and living the scriptures. A team from the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia attended a five-day seminar/workshop with us in January and hopes to incorporate our approach into their diocesan program. Several clergy and lay persons from this Diocese have told me of their plans to begin groups using our methods. We are joining with the Rev'd William Dols to offer a week-long seminar in June in which we

plan to use our new methodology studying the Kingdom of God in the Bible and now. To the best of my knowledge the three of us are the only educators offering this type of study in depth within a church structure. I will not claim to have discovered a panacea, but for people open to new and personal understandings of Jesus and the scriptural narratives, I think we are offering a unique, eye-opening approach. Bishop Hall's chief critique of me has been that I place my light under a bushel. Well, there it is for those who have eyes and see.

Our approach to Bible study has been blended with practices of prayer and meditation for which we are indebted to such sources as the Presbyterian School of Christian Education, Richmond; Union Seminary in New York and the Institute for Advanced Pastoral Studies in Detroit.

I've been greatly helped to understand how these various pieces fall together by the research on Faith Development being conducted at Emory University and my own work on personality types and the ways they respond to our study.

I am deeply grateful to the Bishop and Diocese for the sabbatical leave which has been a great renewal for my own life and work. I hope for many opportunities to share the results. I expect by next year to have a proposal for you which will make such leaves possible on a regular basis for our clergy and lay professionals concerned with growing in faith and improving their knowledge and abilities.

Last year, Council spent about one-half hour questioning a request for \$4,000. to sponsor the Sewanee Theological Education by Extension program. We now have 29 TEE groups, with 22 mentors, and shortly we will have a team of two mentor trainers. Rebates in the amount of \$3,400. from Sewanee in the first year have reduced our diocesan costs to \$600., plus another \$400. in local training costs. I've calculated that at a cost of around \$1,000. the Diocese is sponsoring a \$60.000. program. Theology by Extension is changing its name to Education for Ministry, because that's what it really is. The mentors and participants are the best promoters of the program. By continually organizing classes around the life and work decisions of the participants, the religious content is always seen as relevant.

The Committee on Lay Ministry of the Commission on Ministry is now sponsoring two conferences a year and is preparing survey studies to encourage more development of lay persons in their ministries. This new committee is off to a good start. A continuing concern of mine within the area of ministry is the relationship of non-parochial clergy. For the second year in a row, I must report no observable progress. My concern continues.

The Cursillo movement, with which I maintain liaison, is growing so rapidly that it has been felt advisable to form two councils in order to sponsor more people and more movements. This movement is healthy and growing and does not receive subsidy from the Diocese. I hope to give more time to the Cursillo movement, which I think is a great force for spiritual renewal. For the past two months, I have been involved with several churches seeking new clergy, as I attempt to cover on an interim basis, those responsibilities left by the resignation of the Rev'd Allen Brown and the retirement of Bishop Baden. One of the joys of working as Clergy Deployment Officer is helping a priest prepare his computer profile and then hearing of real results. Some three weeks ago, the Archdeacon of a midwestern diocese, calling to inquire about one of our clergy said, "He really had excellent help in preparing his profile." I said,

The Diocesan Association of Christian Educators (D.A.C.E.) successfully held the third annual Christian Education Conference with the best known name in Christian education in this country, John Westerhoff, as keynote speaker and over 100 in attendance. Less known, but probably as important to church programs, D.A.C.E. has provided consultation and helped design programs at the request of a number of parishes.

The Rev'd Mr. White described the D.A.C.E Program, its membership, purpose and activities. He encouraged parishes to send members to the D.A.C.E. Conferences, particularly the one to be held at Shrine Mont in July.

The Rev'd Heyward H. Macdonald, Westover Church, Charles City, emphasized what success his church had had in its association and involvement with D.A.C.E.

The Rev'd Mr. White concluded with two recommendations to parishes to wit: (1) to provide scholarships for D.A.C.E. and (2) to send teams of clergy and lay persons to D.A.C.E. conferences.

REPORT NO. 4 ON ELECTION TO THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The President pro tempore of the Council announced that the report from the Head Teller is that the Council has elected on the fourth ballot in the clerical order, the Rev'd Charles R. Sydnor, Jr., St. George's, Fredericksburg, to a regular term.

All vacancies for regular terms on the Standing Committee have now been filled and the Council has elected in the clerical order, The Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr. and the Rev'd Charles R. Sydnor, Jr. In the lay order, Mrs. Robert (Charlotte) Kern and Mr. William F. Shubatt.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN

The Rev'd Mr. Lewis introduced to Council, Mrs. Charles W. Shields, Jr., President of the Episcopal Churchwomen of the Diocese and escorted her to the pulpit. Mrs. Shields then gave the following report:

The focus of my report is the value of Episcopal Churchwomen as an organized group.

A definition of "Value" is the worth of a thing, in money or that which is desirable or worthy of esteem for its own sake.

On May 1st at Christ Church, Charlottesville, we'll have our 38th Annual Meeting and Diocesan United Thank Offering Ingathering. We will welcome the Rev'd Thomas D. Bowers, Rector of St. Bartholomew's Church in New York City as our speaker. If you haven't heard Mr. Bowers, I suggest you come. He's a dynamic speaker.

Our Christian Education program for the next two years will be, The Christian in Communication (with God, Neighbor and Self). The Christian in Communication with the real Presence of God in her life is on the road to becoming a real presence in the life of those around her. As Christians we communicate the faith we live by whether we intend this or not. Our communication widens in our outreach to neighbors near and far.

My Rector once said if only one person showed up at a service, it was worth having it. The Episcopal Churchwomen are far more than one - 75% of the Churches in the Diocese have active groups following their five fold purposes: prayer, worship, study, service and fellowship.

Our value as an organized group is that we recognize and respond to a need in the diocese for diversity in kinds of service, to carry out the mission of the Church. As we continue our special and long standing ministry of outreach, we move into the next decade with clarity and purpose.

REPORT OF THE ECUMENICAL OFFICER

The Rev'd Mr. Lewis introduced Mrs. Ebbe C. Hoff, one of the ecumenical officers of the diocese, who presented the following report:

I hope that you will all take time to read our report on page 118 of the pre-Council Journal. You will see that your representatives and officers take their responsibility seriously,. The ecumenical work in our Diocese and in the churches is moving along quietly, but with vigor.

General Convention gave us encouragement and direction. We are now busy implementing the resolutions which were passed in Denver.

Last week, the Consultation on Church Union met in plenary session in Cincinnati, and agreed on a significant statement on MINISTRY which, if the ten participating denominations support it, will enable them to develop a ministry of bishops, presbyters and deacons, with the laity, which is not precisely similar to any which we have now, but which incorporate elements which we respect in our various traditions. To reconcile such traditions as that of ordained lay elders with our own understanding of priesthood was not easily or quickly accomplished, but both our delegation and those of the Presbyterians and Disciples accepted it. We rejoiced in growing mutual understanding, and look forward to deeper, perhaps convenantal relations in the future.

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The highlight of the year was the 36th Triennial Meeting of the Women of the Episcopal Church in Denver in September. The theme of the meeting was, "Walking in the Light". We walk in that light, we are Christ's Body in the world today. At Triennial we looked at our lives as Christian women, learning what the phrase "walking in the light" meant to us, how through the light, in prayer, worship, study, service and fellowship we could improve the quality of our lives. We examined three mountain top experiences of Jesus and related them to that place in our Christian walk where we found ourselves in the year 1979. This spiritual experience has been shared by the five delegates at many of the churches around the Diocese. The Episcopal Churchwomen have their mountain top and valley experiences and I like what Bishop Stewart said at the Eucharist of the Ascension. "Listen, you hear His call; to the mountains for strength, to the valleys for service. Go ye into all the world - Venture in Mission". Individual offerings from women's groups around the Diocese are coming in for Venture in Mission and we have designated our Viva Voce offering at the Annual Meeting in May to VIM.

Many people do not see the value of an all women's group when women are now serving in all areas of the Church. But I believe an organized group is of great value. Attendance at our Annual Meeting at Holy Comforter, Vienna, in May was well over four hundred people; an enthusiastic crowd enjoying a gloriously planned day. The Prayer and Worship Retreat at Shrine Mont was well planned and well attended. Then the Christian Social Relations Institute in the Fall, on aging, drew a hundred interested people, some of whom I've never seen at a meeting before. In this way the Episcopal Churchwomen are touching others and meeting a need.

Value, as I've already said, does include money: our Diocesan United Thank Offering Chairman presented a check in Denver for \$63,407.00. One small church with sixteen ECW members - only 5 under 65 years old - contributed \$594.00 of this total! She has sent in to New York almost \$37,000 for the first half of this year. The Domestic Violence Shelter program in Richmond received one of the 83 grants made in 1979. Our Episcopal Churchwomen Treasurer has received and disbursed overseas and at home, which includes the state of Virginia as well as the Diocese of Virginia, almost \$78,000. as of the closing of the books on April 30, 1979. Where has all of this gone? Too many places to list but among them are our Missionary Districts, Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, Bishop Hall's Fund for World Hunger, Bishop Baden's Virginia Tanzania Fund, Bloomfield, Goodwin House, Westminster-Canterbury, Virginia Seminary and scholarship funds for needy students. Without an organization this would no longer exist. When I go to the meetings of Province III, I am proud to represent the Diocese of Virginia. They are in need of and most appreciative of the support of the Episcopal Churchwomen of the Diocese of Virginia.

We are looking forward once again to spring and our Open Board Meeting on March 6th, where our new Bishop Suffragan, The Rt. Rev'd David H. Lewis will be our speaker, followed by our Prayer and Worship Retreat at Roslyn on March 19th to 21st. Lest you think that these are matters of little concern to us here in the Diocese, I would remind you that we are concerned indeed with recognition of ministry. We have welcomed to this Council our colleagues the Tisdales, Presbyterians who minister to our people in Louisa. Because of Episcopal Church policy they can neither vote in this Council nor consecrate the Lord's Supper with their Episcopal congregation. There are many similar situations around the country and the number is growing. We need practical solutions. The recent COCU decision is a step on the way.

You will be hearing the phrase soon: Yes, Virginia, there is an ARC! The five dioceses in Virginia, Richmond, Arlington, Virginia, Southern and Southwestern Virginia have an active committee which is making exciting plans for a joint workshop on October 25th, at Christ Church, Charlottesville. Father Herbert Ryan, SJ will keynote a discussion of Eucharist, and the two co-pastors of the Tidewater A/RC Parish of the Holy Apostles will discuss the practical suggestions in the 12 year report of the A/RC Commission in the U.S. Plan to be with us, please, and bring your people.

Finally, we should remember that ecumenism is a broad term. It has an element which reaches far beyond Christian unity to other religions and to all humanity. Events of this past year should remind us that ecumenism means reconciliation, and that it is not easy or simple, but takes a lot of love and a lot of prayer. The visit of Pope John Paul II was joyful, but left us with some problems; the relationship of Dr. Hans Kung, Schillebeex and others with the Pope and Curia concern us as sisters and brothers in Christ. We may well ask, how do we treat those with whom we disagree -- how do we deal with matters of authority? No less are we concerned with our lack of understanding of Islam and the Muslim faith, and the strange expressions of it in Iran.

No, ecumenism is not an esoteric hobby for a few theologians and canon laywers and the odd lay person (like me). It calls for deep Christian commitment of churchpeople of every level and style, as Christians and as members of their local and their worldwide communities.

Your Diocesan Ecumenical Committee and your two officers, Charlie Rowe and myself, try to be aware of these issues, and we beg your support and your prayers.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOLS in THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

At 10:23 a.m. the President *pro tempore* introduced the Rev'd Christopher M. Brookfield, Dean of the Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia who gave his report as follows:

For those of you who collect Holy Trivia, I have an impecable offering this morning. The legal profession has finally outdone itself:

The Federal Register of October 25, 1979, page 61548, gets into theology by defining an Act of God. It appears in federal regulation 50 CFR Part 258, Subpart C, Paragraph 285.21(a). An act of God "means any act, event or circumstances...whose effect could not reasonably have been prevented, avoided or ameliorated by human care, skill or foresight (either before or after the act, event or circumstance) or a type, degree and timeliness which would normally be expected from an ordinarily prudent person in the same situation and under the prevailing circumstances."

I wish such trivia were not so timely in our time.

You have, I know, received my annual report to the Diocese, printéd on pages 126-131 in the pre-Council Journal; but, as you might expect from a compulsive listener, I have more to say--which, if it needed a title would be called, "OF LAW, LOVE, AND LETTUCE IN CHURCH SCHOOLS."

In an age of legalities and lawsuits in a litigant society, have you ever wondered whether it is more hazardous to be your brother's keeper in a parish or in a Church School? Well, I have begun to wonder, ever since someone found it necessary to Insure the Dean of Church Schools for \$2,000,000. Of course, being constantly on the lookout for latent litigation is liable to skew one's perspective toward one's fellow man. For example, of late I have been known to say to some unsuspecting souls who have ventured to visit me at Church Schools' office in Mayo House, as I point them toward the steep uncarpeted backstairs exit, "Feel free to fall; we're insured to the hilt!"

You may not think it half so likely that you would be liable for legal action in the safety of God's sanctuary whenever two or three are gathered. But let me lay upon you the lesson that Church Schools has learned from the perils of parish prosecution. Now, you can be sure, when I bid the Diocese of Virginia "Greetings and peace in the Lord," I do so from the safety of the podium. It is not just the fear that my palms might be moist beyond social acceptability which keeps me at this distance from you. I have read in the ANGLICAN DIGEST that alleged injuries suffered in a handclasp in the exchange of Peace in a parish church has led to the filing of a \$100,000 lawsuit contending that the defendant "did willfully, wantonly, with malice intent and with great force so grasp and seize the plaintiff's right hand and wrist on March 22, 1977... and so forth. A high price to pay for passing the Peace, if you please--whether priest, pedant, or plaintiff--the love of our fellow man notwithstanding.

Leaving love and the law, let us turn to lettuce. Some of you may remember that a year ago I presented you with a puzzle which had been presented to me when I was newly Dean of Church Schools five years ago, a question begging an answer: How was it that Church Schools, having been founded, funded, and fondled by the Diocese of Virginia over a period of fifty years, now found itself flagrante delicto accepting exile from the Diocesan budget? After that little speech some of you tried to comfort me by saying it was purely politics; others said it was God's will. But it was John Baden who finally supplied the answer with one of his apple stories he is fond of repeating. If it is injudicious to tell it over again, you have only John to blame. (Incidentally, the name of Church Schools and the place of the Diocesan budget have been cleverly changed in the story in order to assure anonymity.)

Adam and his son Abel were taking a walk, some years after being expelled from Eden. As they passed by that lovely garden, Abel exclaimed, "gee, Dad, what a beautiful place! Wouldn't it be nice to live there?" Adam paused a moment, then answered, "Well son, we did live there one time, but your mother ate us out of house and home."

In misericordia, I cannot let that explanation pass without noting that last year Church Schools had to raise \$677,000 in unrestricted gifts in order to make up the difference between the actual cost of education in the Schools and what the tuition charge pays for \$477,000 of which went for scholarship aid to students who could not afford to pay full tuition costs. Therefore, I have one serious question to leave with you today. Has your parish ever considered sponsoring a scholarship, or a partial scholarship, for a student in your congregation, or elsewhere, who could not otherwise afford to attend one of our Church Schools? If you are willing to give to VIM, why not to the educational mission that the Diocese pledged itself to support nearly 60 years ago?

But do the parishes and the Schools speak the same language?, I have heard some of the brethern and sisteran inquire. I could begin by saying somewhat cryptically that we take our church at least three times as seriously as the parish--that is to say, at least our students attend chapel regularly several times a week. What we say there may not be so very differnt; we also struggle with the new language of the Church, in word and deed. Forgive me if I am reminded of the story we have all heard about the little boy who, when he was asked by his teacher to recite a verse from the Bible, stood up and said, "Don't be afraid, I'm coming with the quilt." The teacher corrected him, "No dear. That's Fear not, the Comforter cometh."

In closing, let me see if the language of this letter from a friend to the Head of a school does not ring true for you in its description of his task and our common mission, whether in the parish or the Schools:

"Some might say that a Christian school is a contradiction in terms, but really, a Christian anything is a contradiction in terms. There's nowhere you can avoid getting cruicified if you are Christian, nowhere that I know of. The choice is how you set about being cruicified. On this hang all the events of your Easter Sunday. Either you stop trying to love, trying to create channels for God to the boys and girls around you, Or you don't. Only if you are willing to let yourself be stretched to the breaking point over the School, you the person, you the role, only then will you find what is right for everyone in it. In the destructive element immerse. Roles, organizations, are destructive elements. But immerse yourself in them. Be incarnate. And lo it very good. On this hangs your Easter Sunday. You cannot avoid the agony of changing roles and rules of course. No man can if he loves. An old commandment I give unto you. Your life must be hell. But you know, I envy you, your life must also be such fun. Easter Sunday round the corner, all the time."

I have asked Viola Woolfolk, in this her 30th and best yet year as Headmistress of St. Margaret's--a comely, competent, and committed school in Tappahannock--to tell you about her Easter Sundays. She won't, of course, she is too modest, but I'll wager she will tell you about her loves and her hobby in her own terms. Should you have the good fortune to speak to her personally here at Council, I hope you will tell her how much I admire her and envy her life of remarkable service in education, caring alike for the least and the greatest among us.

The Rev'd Mr. Brookfield then introduced the Headmistress of St. Margaret's School, Tappahannock, Miss Viola Woolfolk.

Miss Woolfolk expressed her personal appreciation for the support the Diocese has given to the schools throughout the years. Following a description of each of the schools, Miss Woolfolk said that she felt Council would be interested to know that although 48% of the students of the schools belong to other denominations, all use the Episcopal liturgy for Chapel Services. In each of the schools, there are still required religion courses. The schools strive for a combination of growth, as well as academic achievement and are therefore concerned with the "whole person".

Concluding with a few remarks about St. Margaret's in particular, Miss Woolfolk encouraged the Council to take an interest in, and promoting knowledge of, the Church Schools within the Diocese. (Note: Miss Woolfolk's report in full on page_____)

RECESS

At 10:45 a.m., following recess, the Chair announced that the Rev'd David J. Greer, St. James', Warrenton, had been called to St. Paul's Church, Shreveport, Louisiana and wished him well in his new call.

The Rev'd W. Hill Brown, Host Rector, then introduced various members of his staff and congregation who have had an active part in working for, and assisting in, the planning for this Council meeting in Grace & Holy Trinity Church. There was applause.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON MINISTRY

The President introduced to Council Mr. Jack B. Burtch, Jr., Chairman of the Commission on Ministry; Holy Comforter, Richmond, who gave the following report:

"I urge members of Council to read the report of the Commission on Ministry which is found on Page 111 of the pre-Council Journal."

As you all are aware, the Commission is charged with advising the Bishop on the selection of persons for Holy Orders and it has also been charged by this Council with developing the Ministry of the Laity in this Diocese. To that end, last year the Commission created a committee on the Ministry of the Laity which has been very ably chaired by Janet Maguire.

Now you will be hearing more about the work of that committee in your own parishes in the year to come, but I would like to take one second to draw your attention to the Conference on Total Ministry which is going to be held at Roslyn in April. We have a number of brochures in the display room and I hope that everyone will have the opportunity to pick one up and look it over. This is a wonderful opportunity for all the people of the church. I would just like to share a few impressions with you about what is going on in the Commission on Ministry.

During our meeting times for the last several months we have been spending a substantial amount of time talking with each other on what we "for lack of better words" term "our image of a priest". There are twelve of us who are charged by the Bishop with assisting in the selection of persons for Holy Orders. We thought it might be useful if we talked with each other about what

were those operative values that go into our own minds and into our own selections and, as you may know, this selection process takes place in the context of a number of interviews from the time a person applies for postulancy until the time a person is ordained priest.

Among our members we have struggled, frankly, with the difference between the ministry of priests and the ministry of those not priests. We have tried to address ourselves to what is essential in priesthood - what is unique about the role of the priest - and I can only say that as the concept of the ministry of the laity becomes more clear and becomes more clearly articulated. and at this time in the history of the church, the answer to that question is not completely self evident and we continue to struggle. The one question and I think the most important question the Commission addresses when it looks at one individual is that of "is God calling this person to ordination?" I think it is a commonly shared assumption among us that God calls all people. God calls people and we respond to him. He calls us to be ourselves, to give everything that we have as a human being, all that we are, to Him. But, the people who come and present themselves to the Commission on Ministry take that a step further and they are saying that God has called me to be a priest in His Church.

One unique aspect of this process or that call to priesthood is that not only does the individual identify that for him or herself, in his or her own way, but that call is ratified by the church and the Commission in advising a Bishop is one very small piece of the Church's process of ratification, of bringing up people to be the priests of our church. We fully recognize and are often painfully aware that we are imperfect and completely fallible instruments of the church and this is sometimes rather terrifying. When you engage in a struggle with another person in their own soul searching, to conclude that unlike them, maybe you don't think that God's call to them is priesthood. On the other hand, there are some completely joyful times when what you preceive in that other person is a movement of the spirit in the same direction as they articulated themselves.

What I have been talking about are abstractions, difficult to put into concrete terms because we don't really deal with ideas and theories, we are dealing with human beings and lives and the way God is working actively in his Church, not yesterday, but today and now.

We are not looking for one kind of person that will fit into any one kind of mold, the church just isn't like that. Some accuse us of creating a very elaborate process for ordination that will screen out all but those who can endure absolute frustration and nitpicking regulations. That is not our intent at all. Frankly, we spend most of our time working with the individual cases of individual people.

I would like to suggest that congregations and vestries have probably the most important role in the selection

of persons for ordained ministry. This role is not simply in the pledgetory support you give the Diocese, that is extremely important, but I believe the most important role of the congregation and the vestry is to lift up people from amongst yourselves, to identify people who you would have be your priests, let them know there may be a service for the church they have not yet considered.

There is another service that I believe the congregation and vestries can offer the church and quite frankly in this time that is jobs. We have many very fine men and women who would greatly enhance the life of this Diocese if there were jobs for them to fill and I would ask each congregation to look into itself and see if there is not another job there for a deacon, or for a priest. The place to look when you have a job is not in the budget. Rather than do that, on a Sunday morning at the most popular service, walk outside the church and look in the parking lot. Look around at all those new cars - if you have a lot of new cars in the parking lot at the major Sunday Service you have a job. You have the economic potential to expand the ministry of Christ in this way.

I am only suggesting the money is there and we can tap it.

It is a privilege for all of us on the Commission to serve in this manner. We thank you for the opportunity of being able to offer this service and we ask your prayers that we may continue to go forward in the power of the Spirit.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTIONS AND CANONS

Mr. John Paul Causey, Jr., Chairman, advised that while this item appears on the Agenda at this time, the committee was discharged on Friday, February 1, by the Chair inasmuch as there had not been submitted, nor was there any amendment to, the Constitution or Canons for the committee to consider.

VENTURE IN MISSION

The President pro tempore introduced Mr. William A. Johnston III, who is the lay diocesan coordinator for the Venture in Mission program; a member of Frederick Parish, Winchester.

Mr. Johnston gave the following report:

Due to the press of Council's business, I will be as brief as I possibly can, consistent with a responsibility that I feel to try in probably the most eloquent way that I can to say to you some things that I think are opportunities for us that we have recognized through our efforts in Venture in Mission during the past year.

It has been fun, there have been a lot of people in the Diocese who have done great yeoman things in bringing about a missionary result in VIM that would not have been possible, I am confident, in any other way. Let me pause for a minute if I may, Mr. President, to remind

Council that people such as yourself in the enormous effort that you have put forth for VIM have made the things possible that have happened. People like Tom Rohr, Bob Hall the Less, people who have labored long and hard. I have traveled 10,000 miles this year for VIM and I have had a good time doing ft. We all have. And, what I want to share with you is the simple fact that we went about a project, we did what we did, we accomplished what we accomplished and I am going to report in an interim way to you on what we have accomplished in a minute, and now we stand to take a look at that and see what we can learn from it. When I say "we had a little fun" I am serious about that and I have told some of you this, but one Sunday morning last fall as I was driving down to a small church in the southern part of the diocese, and it was raining and I had on the radio and I didn't know what I was listening to and then the disc jockey broke and he said, "Where is it happening, it is happening at St.Swithin's at 11:00, come hear Pete Johnston talk

about the VIM baby whatever that may be!" My wife teaches a 7th grade Sunday School class, some of them sneaked in the back when they were showing the film strip on VIM, that got them to thinking, they picked it up on their own, we forgive them for not following the plan, they didn't know what it was, but they adopted their own plan and basically part of it was a recurring bake sale that got apparently beyond their own interest for a bit, but at any rate, there came a Sunday when little Billy came in and they said to Billy, "Have you cooked those cookies again." He said, "No, my Mom did these, she did them from scrap!"

The Bishop in his pastoral said to us, "Where the foundation was laid, growth ensued." Now, that is a very short way to say precisely what happened. Let me translate that for you into the numbers. In this diocese we have approximately 21,000 giving units - pledged units. Our VIM effort in the past year has resulted in pledges from 5,000 of those units. Approximately one-fourth of us have pledged. The amount of money that has been generated by those pledges is about 2-2/3rds million dollars. You can apply the arithmetic to that and see that at least it is debatable that if half of us had given, we would have been comfortably past our 5 million dollar goal and so forth.

Now what happened? Let me share with you an experience that I have had so that you can understand what I am about to say. In the reporting process that CCS has in keeping the Executive Committee of VIM up to date on the progress of what is happening, they developed a five-part report that took the churches in our diocese and listed them in five separate categories. Category 1 was those churches which essentially followed the so called plan a three phased asking with specific dollar amounts in the asking, a serious educational effort, etc. You know about that. So Category 1 were those that had a three-phase program approximating the plan. Category 2 was those churches which adopted a modified plan which for one reason or another essentially conducted a twophase rather than a three-phase asking with an educational effort simultaneously. Category 3 were those churches which conducted a single asking, either in the usual every member canvass - the sort of model we are used to - through a single mailing, a single asking of some kind. Category 4 was churches who had indicated that for reasons particular. to each parish on that list, they would be unable to complete a VIM project in 1979 and intended to take on the effort in 1980. Category 5 was those churches who had indicated that for some particular reason applying to their own case, they would not participate in VIM - they would not have a program of any kind.

The reason I take your time to explain that rather detailed process to you is to say to you this, I took that report, laid it out in front of me and tried as hard as I could to tell why a church would be in Category 1 rather than Category 2 or in Category 4 rather than Category 3. And, after a serious effort, and then backing away from it and coming back again and taking another look to see if I could get some fresh perspective, I simply was unable to tell why the various churches were on which list. Oh, there were a few that you would normally expect to appear here or there, but by and large it was very difficult to preceive any distinction.

There didn't seem to be any segregation of the churches by size, by geography, by what I sensed to be their conservative or liberal bend. I thought there must be some explanation to that and the conclusion that I drew, perfect or imperfect, right or wrong, was that it probably had to do with leadership.

It probably had to do with what I came to think of as the blocking mechanism, but somehow, the clergy in that parish or the lay leadership in that parish, or some mixture of the two, accounted for the fact that the parish was not going to be permitted to go forward to follow the recommended plan.

Now, I am not here to be critical of that as a process, so much as to say to those who failed to take the full advantage of what was offered, and here is where I would like to be as eloquent as God would permit, that you have missed something, you have missed a real chance, it is not too late to pick it up, it can be picked up, the results are enormous.

I can tell you from the experience in my own parish. I can tell you from the experience in other parishes that I visited with and I studied, that what was done, where it was done with an earnest, active effort, was not just 80% effective, was not just 90% effective, it was universally effective. There was generated a spirit in the name of Venture in Mission that has not existed, and I am sure you can find your friends at Council who can attest to this, in anything that has happened in our church in a long, long time.

Now, I hope you hear me on that, and I hope you think about it. I am not just saying to you another pious thing, another religious suggestion, I am saying to you quite seriously that I am convinced that the life of this diocese has benefited in a substantial and significant way that we need to nurture and go forward with.

The Bishop said it in his pastoral - we now need to go forward with confidence. You will forgive me if I get a little emotional about that. I feel that way about it.

It is clear to me therefore, that where there was vestry support, where there was strong leadership from the clergy, where there was a system that somehow had visitors asking for a specific amount, where the congregation developed a plan for implementation, there was success. I say that to you with all seriousness in my heart.

Let me conclude these remarks to say to you that Venture is not at an end, this is not the final chapter, we are at a point in mid-mission, we are going forward. For your information and the information of any parish that requires or needs any assistance, Mr. Morison will be with us through the end of March. It is my intention, which I announce to you at this time, to go back to the Executive Board, commencing at its meeting next week, and to do what I can to implement the formation of a committee or group to carry it forward with the VIM leadership through the balance of the two year period, providing among other things, the resources that are continuing to be required, the assistance that is continued to be required. We do, at this point, because of the success that approximately one-fifth of our congregations have enjoyed, have in our midst a cadre of experienced people who can join with us in this educational and assistance project.

If you need help, please ask for it. We will see that the people are there, as we have in the past year as to the best of our ability.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY

The Chair reminded Council that it is five minutes ahead of the Agenda, the hour being 11:45 a.m., and requested that Mr. C. Craighead Fritsche, President of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, Inc. give his report.

Mr. Fritsche gave the following report:

The purpose of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia is to receive, acquire by purchase, gift or otherwise and hold and manage money and all other personal property and real estate for the use of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia in its missionary work.

Under the direction of its twelve trustees, a third of whom are elected each year for three year terms, the society assists the Diocese of Virginia by providing capital in the following areas:

- 1. Creating new debts
- Re-financing of existing debts, primarily hardship debt service cases
- 3. Financing of diocesan related corporations
- 4. Financing of individuals

During 1979, the Society completed the revised loan commitment to the Diocese of Virginia to facilitate the construction of St. Andrew's, Burke. In addition, the Society made a loan to St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Groveton, to enable the paving of their parking lot.

At the beginning of 1979 the Diocesan Missionary Society had twenty-five active loans. One loan was increased during the year, one church has since paid off its loan in full and the other churches are making payments on schedule.

The Society's working capital is held and managed in three separate funds, namely, the Diocesan Revolving Fund, which consists of money and/or the proceeds of the sale of personal property that has been given or bequeathed to DMS without restriction.

Two, the First Deed of Trust Funds, which consists of money and/or the proceeds of the sale of personal property that has been given or bequeathed to the DMS with restrictions.

And, third, the First Deed of Trust Loan Funds, which consists of money that has been lent to the DMS, usually for a minimum term of 15 years at $5\frac{1}{2}$ % interest to provide additional capital to enable the Society to meet ever increasing needs.

During 1979 new capital was received in the form of gifts from the Rev'd Allen and Mrs. Brown and St. John's Episcopal Church, Centreville and a bequest from the estate of Mrs. Lucille Lozier. In addition, a one acre tract of real estate in Essex County was sold with the proceed of the sale being added to the Revolving Loan Fund.

The Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia is grateful for the gifts and bequests that have come to it and also to those older and well established churches that have loaned money to the Society for it in turn to loan to new and struggling congregations at 6% interest and usually with amortization of principal on a long term basis.

NOONDAY PRAYERS

The Rev'd Dr. Edward Meeks Gregory conducted an Order of Service for Noonday Prayer. He was assisted by Mr. John Coleman, Head of the Peter-Paul Development Center, Richmond, Virginia.

INTRODUCTION OF CLERGY CANONICALLY RESIDENT SINCE THE LAST COUNCIL

The President advised that there has been discussion with the Standing Committee and it was his pleasure to present the clergy canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia since the last meeting of the Annual Council and that as he would call out the name of each clergy person, he would ask that they come forward singl and remain standing in front of the chancel until all new clergy have been introduced. RECESS FOR LUNCHEON

The Rev'd Mr. Lewis announced that the Standing Committee consisting of the newly elected members and all old members of the committee, would meet in Room 5 immediately upon recess.

The Chair declared Council in recess until 1:45 p.m.

RESUME BUSINESS SESSION

At 2:04 p.m., the President *pro tempore*, the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., called the Council into session. He introduced the Rev'd William Guthrie, Vicar of Trinity Church, Charlottesville. The Rev'd Mr. Guthrie comes to the Diocese from South America.

The Council rose and the Chair introduced a former Suffragan Bishop of Virginia, the Rt. Rev'd Philip Smith, now Bishop of New Hampshire.

Bishop Smith, in his marvelous fashion presented a few remarks and shared with the Council his joy in being back in Virginia for the Consecration Service of Bishop-elect Lewis.

BUDGET PRESENTATION

At 2:22 p.m. the report of the Council's Committee on Budget, consisting of six pages, was distributed to members of Council and Mr. Andrew H. McCutcheon, Jr., Chairman, St. Matthew's, Richmond presented the following report:

In his opening remarks, Mr. McCutcheon advised Council that the Budget Committee had been working on the proposed recommendation of the Executive Board since the past Tuesday and that the report and recommendations before the Council presented much hard work and that the report the committee felt was challenging as well as practical, and was definitely a response to the feedback that had been given in the Open Hearing.

In general, the proposed budget has been cut some \$12,000 from various programs and with respect to the General Church programs, a reduction of \$9,000. The proposed budget will challenge each congregation to produce another \$200. which would result in a total of \$30,000 additional income which then would fund the total programs that the Budget Committee is recommending.

Mr. McCutcheon again renewed the challenge aspect of this budget and the need to continue new work such as the Hispanic Ministry, the Ministry to the Deaf and to initiate the work with the blacks in the inter-city.

Mr. McCutcheon then said that he would take up in orderly fashion the recommendations of the committee to the Council.

<u>B - 1</u> The Budget Committee recommends rejection of the Resolution identified as B-1 as submitted by Regional Council 9 wherein the Church of Our Saviour, Sandston, Virginia be provided additional monies to the Aided Congregation sector of the budget for support of a full time clerical ministry at the Church of Our Saviour, Sandston in the additional amount of \$5,964. This was seconded.

The Rev'd H. Llewellyn Fairchild, Leeds Church, Markham on a point of personal privilege, inquired the process the Chair envisoned in handling the recommendations and would there be a time when the total budget was going to be acted on.

The Chair responded by saying that the Report of the Committee on Budget of the Council would be received in the order as they made their recommendations and dealing with the specific resolutions offered.

At the conclusion of the committee's report, the Council will have the opportunity to approve the Budget as a whole or to amend it. At that time, such motions as Mr. Fairchild had in mind could be made.

The committee's recommendation to reject B-1 was sustained by vote of Council.

Mr. McCutcheon referred Council to the five resolutions appearing on page B-21 of the pre-Council Journal, from the Executive Board and the fact that the committee in dealing with these five proposed resolutions had to consider them separately and in order to respond and to report to Council, had considered them as B-2, A. B. C. D, and E, etc. and that the report in the hands of members of Council reflects the committee's amendments and/or substitutes.

<u>B - 2A</u> Mr. McCutcheon moved the following resolution as a substitute for the Executive Board's resolution on 1979 unpaid pledges. BE IT RESOLVED, that because of the mandate of the 184th Annual Council of the Diocese directing that 37% of all income for 1979 be applied to the pledge to the General Church programs, Council agrees that any unpaid pledges for 1979 that are paid in 1980 be first subject to 37% being forwarded to the National Church - any remaining funds should be replaced in the 1980 budget, but not subject to a second proportional sharing with the National Church.

This was seconded.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr., Page County Ministry, moved an amendment that the pledge to the General Church be paid in full from any 1979 income that should be available in order to meet our obligation and pledge to the General Church and to establish a priority. This was seconded.

The Rev'd John M. Smith, St. James, Leesburg spoke in favor of the amendment and that his two points being we should pay our obligation to the General Church but more importantly what is done at Council assists in what should be done at the parish level. He also favored the priority concept.

The Rev'd John A. M. Guernsey, Christ Church, Alexandria and a member of the Committee, said that he favored the spirit of Mr. Hobson's amendment but the intent of the Budget Committee in their resolution was to do just what he was requesting.

Mr. A. R. Dunning, Christ Church, Millwood asked for clarification and then made the suggestion that could not the unpaid \$1800 as reported by Mr. Palmer as the remaining unpaid balance for 1979 be paid at once and to proceed with the 37% figure.

The question was called. The amendment was lost.

The Council sustained the recommendation of the Budget Committee and did adopt B-2A as presented.

- B 2B Mr. McCutcheon moved the following substitute and amended resolution for that as submitted by the Exeuctive Board relative to individual gifts to the program as follows:
 - BE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, responding to the desires of the Diocese to meet its commitments in Christian stewardship; agrees that:
 - A line item be included in the income statement of the budget to provide for \$1,000 individual gifts to program and
 - (2) That a further line item be included in the Income Statement of the Budget to provide for \$30,000 to be raised by an Executive Board appeal for each vestry of the Diocese to increase its 1980 giving to the Diocese by a minimum of \$200.

This was seconded.

Mr. Donald Paschal speaking as a member of the Executive Board, said that he was in favor of the approach as recommended by the Council's Committee on Budget, to seek the additional income, but felt that it would be prudent to have the Executive Board directed to set a deadline for the response to the appeal as well as providing authority to the Executive Board to make such adjustments in the Diocesan Budgets as might be necessary to balance expenditures with receipts.

Mr. McCuthcheon advised that he and his committee would have no objections to this amendment.

The Chair inquired whether or not this could be a part of the proposed B-2B resolution of the committee and not an amendment. This was agreed and therefore, as part of the recommendation of the Budget Committee, the following sub-paragraph (3) is added to wit:

(3) That the Executive Board is directed to set a deadline for responses to this appeal and it is further directed that after this deadline to make such adjustments in the Diocesan Budget as are necessary to balance expenditures with receipts.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr. spoke as rector of Christ Church, Luray saying he was in favor of paragraph 2 of the resolution seeking an additional \$200. from each congregation. He cited the situation at Christ Church, Luray as well as St. George's, Ingham and what effect the \$200. would have percentage wise and that in essence it would be a great hardship but that he would do everything he could to raise the money, however, the \$200. is asking for "peanuts". Therefore, there is some inequity, but Mr. Hobson reaffirmed that he was speaking in favor of paragraph 2, but wished to cite the overall effect that could take place and hoped that the larger churches who could do more, would take the \$200. as a minimum and thereby give more inasmuch as some of the smaller churches probably could not raise the \$200. and that the resolution was based on all of the 160 odd giving units to "preform".

The Rev'd Robert Sheeran, Grace, Kilmarnock first commended the Budget Committee for the honesty of the presentation. He agreed with Mr. Hobson concerning the unfairness of paragraph 2, "appealing to each vestry of the diocese to increase its pledge by a minimum of \$200.", making the comparison that for some it could be monumental while to other churches it would not be very much. Therefore, he moved an amendment which reads as

> (2) That a further line item be included in the Income Statement of the budget to provide for \$30,000 (additional vestry gifts to program), to be raised by an Executive Board appeal and that the 185th Annual Council appeals to each Vestry in the Diocese to endeavor to increase by a minimum of 3% its 1980 giving to the Diocese.

This was seconded.

The Rev'd Mr. Sheeran advised that this should produce \$32,417. and the percentage would in effect take away the inequity that Mr. Hobson had referred to.

Mr. Hartsell of Grace Church, Casanova spoke in favor of the amendment as offered by the Rev'd Mr. Sheeran. The Rev'd Heyward Macdonald, Westover Church, Charles City, moved to amend the amendment to eliminate the words, "to endeavor", and thereby making the proposal more positive. Thus, the amendment to the amendment would be that "the Executive Board appeal to each Vestry of the Diocese to increase its 1980 giving to the Diocese by a minimum of 3%.

The Rev'd Ralph Bayfield, St. Timothy's, Herndon asked for clarification as it referred to the 3%, as it would apply to the Virginia Plan of Proportionate Giving.

The Chair ruled that the question was not germane to the amendment and resolution itself.

The Rev'd Robert Sheeran said he was very fond of the word *endeavor* and urged that it be retained.

The Rev'd John W. Howe, Truro Church, Fairfax advised that he was uncomfortable with the amendment because many churches who had made their pledge to the diocese had provided the full proportional amount possible and referred to the fact that Truro Church, in making its pledge, had increased it 40% over the previous year. The amendment in Mr. Howe's judgment seems "unfair".

The Rev'd Mr. Sheeran qualified his amendment by showing where the 3% which produced the \$30,000 came from on page B-4 and again urged that the words "to endeavor" be included.

The question was called on the amendment to the amendment and the vote was negative, thereby the amendment to the amendment was lost.

The Rev'd Jere Bunting, Jr., Christ Church, Christchurch requested clarification of the 3% and was advised that the 3% referred to the pledge already made by an individual church to the diocese and that an additional 3% of that amount be made available.

The Council then voted affirmatively and adopted B-2B as amended with the inclusion of paragraph 3 as recommended by Mr. Paschal, so that B-2B reads as follows: 144. BE IT RESOLVED:

that the 185th Annual Council, responding to the desires of the Diocese to meet its commitments in Christian Stewardship, agreed that:

- A line item be included in the income statement of the budget for \$1,000.00 in Individual Gifts to the Program; and
- (2) That a further line item be included in the income statement of the budget to provide for \$30,000.00 (additional Vestry gifts to program) to be raised by an Executive Board appeal, and that the 185th Annual Council appeals to each Vestry in the Diocese to endeavor to increase by a minimum of 3% its 1980 giving to the Diocese; and
- (3) That the Executive Board is directed to set a deadline for responses to this appeal and it is further directed that after this deadline to make such adjustments in the diocesan budget as are necessary to balance expenditures with receipts.

THE BISHOP OF WEST TEXAS

The Chair asked for the personal privilege of interrupting the report of the Committee on Budget to present to the Council a dear friend and classmate at the Virginia Theological Seminary, the Bishop of West Texas, the Rt. Rev'd Scott Field Bailey, D.D. who addressed the Council.

B - 2C Mr. McCutcheon moved on behalf of the committee a substitute for the Executive Board's third resolution as to the amount to be pledged to the General Church and moved the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia pledges to the General Church programs 36.5% of the total income of the Diocese for 1980 and that the amount be \$428,125.00.

This was seconded.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr. moved an amendment in support of the Virginia Plan because he felt that the resolution calls for a percentage as well as a fixed dollar amount and moved to amend the Budget Committee's resolution so that it would read: "and not less than" \$428,125.00. This was seconded.

The Rev'd Mr. Fairchild advised that the resolution B-2C as moved is confusing. He commented about the conflict in his own church as to making a percentage pledge. He recommended that the Council make up its mind as to whether or not they want a percentage of income, a fixed amount or a limit placed on the total income of the diocese. He supported the principle of Mr. Hobson's amendment.

Mr. Donald Paschal, St. Christopher's, Springfield pleaded that the percentage concept be endorsed and that the Council consider

the principle of tithing and moved an amendment that a plain percentage be included and that there be no ceilings and no dollar amounts shown. His amendment was seconded. The Chair, however, ruled that he did not think he could accept the amendment inasmuch as the Treasurer of the Diocese must make a dollar expectation amount available to the Treasurer of the General Church and that is why at every Council meeting a dollar amount is discussed.

Mr. Paschal felt that the treasurer could make such an expectation and still keep to the percentage concept. The President advised that he might be out of order but that he could not accept Mr. Paschal's amendment because he did not think that the Council could delegate this responsibility to the treasurer.

Brig. General Harry Disston, Grace, Cismont moved an amendment to the amendment which would read, Be It Resolved that the 185th Annual Council pledges to the General Church for its programs for 1980 the amount of \$428,125.00.

General Disston advised that further the 3% that had just been voted would not be a part of this \$428,125.00, as an addition.

This was seconded.

The Rev'd Edward Morgan III, St. Luke's, Wellington spoke against the amendment to the amendment and urged Council to support the concept of the (proportional) concept that has been in effect in the Diocese for a number of years.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr. questioned whether this was an amendment or a substitute. The Chair ruled that it was an amendment to the amendment.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson III, Trinity, Washington rose to clarify that the 3% or the \$30,000 had already been considered by the Budget Committee as coming in and therefore this is not a problem as indicated by Gen. Disston.

The question was called to vote on the amendment to the amendment as proposed by Gen. Disston. The vote of the Council defeated the amendment to the amendment and the Chair ruled that the amendment to the amendment as proposed by Gen. Disston was lost.

The Rev'd Robert Sheeran inquired whether a substitute could be introduced at this time and the Chair ruled that it could, however the substitute which Mr. Sheeran introduced, the Chair ruled that the substitute was not in order since the substitute was the same sense of the amendment moved by the Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr.

Mr. W. Thomas Rice, St. Stephen's, Richmond asked the Chair to reconsider his ruling on the suggestion made by Mr. Paschal whereby dollar amounts are dropped and that the principles of the Virginia Plan be considered. He referred to Bishop Goodwin who once said "it was not the Virginia Plan, but it was God's plan" and that in his judgment it would be perfectly proper to drop the dollar amount as shown, retain the percentage or proportional amount, and then speak to the General Church in terms of a goal.

146. The President attempted to explain his ruling, namely that the treasurer, as recommended in Mr. Paschal's suggestion, just could not make such a commitment on behalf of the Diocese to the Treasurer of the General Church and that the suggestion of Mr. Rice, he felt, was in order, and should it be the pleasure of Council to receive Mr. Rice's suggestion, that it would be a substitute.

At this point, Mr. Scott Townsend, Trinity, Lancaster inquired whether the 3% or \$30,000 already passed in 2-B2 would be included or considered as additional amounts to increase the pledge to the General Church.

The question was answered that the Budget Committee had already considered the fact that the \$30,000 would be forthcoming and that the \$428,125.00 did include that.

The Chair inquired whether Mr. Rice was prepared to move the substitute which would provide for a percentage, drop the dollar amount and allow the Executive Board the right to determine the amount to be notified as the pledge of the diocese to the General Church since the Executive Board is the Council in between sessions.

Mr. Rice advised that he was ready to give the substitute and moved the following:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia pledges to the General Church Program 36.5% of the total income of the Diocese for 1980 and that the Executive Board is authorized to report a minimum dollar amount pledged to the Treasurer of the Executive Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

This was seconded. The question was called.

The substitute motion prevailed and the Chair ruled the substitute in lieu of the Council's Committee on Budget resolution was adopted.

INTRODUCTION OF THE PRESIDING BISHOP

The President pro tempore said that he was somewhat embarrassed because he knew that the Presiding Bishop was with the Council and sitting in the Chancel and decided that it would be best to proceed with the debate on the pledge to the General Church while he was here. He then advised that he had the high privilege of introducing to the Council the Rt. Rev'd John M. Allin, Presiding Bishop, who received a standing ovation and he then addressed the Council concerning the Episcopal Church as he sees it and touched on the potential and capability of the Episcopal Church and its mission in the name of Jesus Christ being beyond the dream of any of us. He again received, as he gave his blessing to the Council, a loud and standing ovation.

B - 2D Mr. McCutcheon moved on behalf of the committee the following substitute to that as prepared by the Executive Board dealing with the Deacons Training Program in order that during the coming year study could be made to provide additional support and clarification in the good work that is being done by the Deacons Training Program.

He moved the following:

RESOLVED, that the Executive Board, in cooperation with the Commission on Ministry and any other appropriate groups as may be determined by the Executive Board, undertake during 1980 a review and evaluation of the Deacons' Program and the subsidy for placement of deacons in order to strengthen the Program and to aid the 186th Council in its budget decision.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, Jr. was recognized who said that he would like to have the privilege of seconding the resolution and then called for the previous question.

The Council voted to act on the previous question.

The Council sustained the recommendation of the Budget Committee and adopted B-2D as presented.

Mayo House Repair/Renovation - Mr. McCutcheon B - 2E advised that the committee had spent considerable time dealing with this urgent matter and that the committee was of the opinion that the matter has been delayed too long and that further the committee feels that the trust in the Executive Board in carrying out the proposed resolution is proper and just.

> He then moved the following resolution on behalf of the committee:

- the 180th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia WHEREAS, in 1975 approved a proposal to repair and renovate the Diocesan Headquarters (The Mayo Memorial Church House) at a cost of \$200,000.00, said cost to be budgeted through the Diocesan Operating Budget at \$20,000.00 per year over a 10 year period; and
- WHEREAS, in the four succeeding Councils budgetary limitations have necessiated the elimination of any funding of the project so that it has not gone forward; and
- WHEREAS, since the 180th Annual Council additional deterioration has occurred; and
- WHEREAS . the 185th Annual Council believes it to be in the best interest of the Diocese that the Diocesan headquarters Building be properly repaired and renovated;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council hereby directs the Executive Board to proceed as promptly as possible to accomplish a program of necessary repairs and renovation to the Mayo Memorial Church House, after having first commissioned a feasibility study, including development of architectural and engineering plans and the costs thereof, and having taken all other usual and necessary steps in that regard, said program of repairs and renovation to be funded by mortgage borrowing, if deemed necessary by the Executive Board, the repayment of said indebtedness, if any, to be made from succeeding operating budgets until said indebt-edness shall have been fully paid and discharged; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Executive Board and other appropriate officers of the Diocese be, and they are hereby authorized to do all such things as are reasonable and necessary to carry out the purpose of this resolution, and the Executive Board is directed to report its actions to the 186th Annual Council.

Mr. Donald Paschal, St. Christopher's, Springfield as a member of the Executive Board, alerted Council to the large responsibility and so called blank check delegated to the Executive Board and that in view of the fact that there is the division of the diocese to be decided in April, perhaps a delay would allow the Executive Board to provide a feasibility study and have it completed by now and the next Council whereby the Executive Board could determine exact costs of necessary repairs and to present to the 186th Annual Council for its approval a specific plan of repairs and their costs with an assessment of the impact on the diocesan budget.

He moved an amendment to that effect. The amendment to the "resolve" was seconded.

Mr. James C. Davis III, St. Luke's, Wellington, a member of the Executive Board, spoke against the amendment and urged Council to proceed now to begin doing something and to trust the Executive Board.

Mr. Edgar Prichard, Truro, Fairfax spoke against the amendment, but called attention to an incorrect word in the "resolve" part of "withdrawals" which should be "borrowing".

Mr. McCutcheon responded that as usual Mr. Prichard was correct and that there was another incorrect word in the final "resolve" the word "renovation" should be "resolution".

The Chair ruled that these corrections were made to the original motion.

The Rev'd Brown Morton, St. Peter's, Purcellville, spoke against the amendment, sharing with the Council his work in the secular world as a historic preservation consultant and urged that time was of the essence and that this action should be taken and not to delay.

The Rev'd William D. Boyd, Aquia Church, Stafford, shared with the Council this same question which arose when he served on the old Executive Committee some seventeen years ago and that the question continually arises. Someone must make the decision and he urged this Council to take that action.

The Rev'd David Collin Jones, Church of the Good Shepherd, Burke spoke against the amendment, referring to the high cost of interest and increasing cost in building and felt that time was important and urged that action be taken in support of the committee's resolution.

The question was called. The Council voted to act on the original resolution as amended. The President asked the secretary to read the amendment as presented by Mr. Paschal, after which the Council defeated the proposed amendment to B-2E, and the Chair ruled that the Paschal amendment was lost.

The Council called for the question on the original resolution as presented by the committee. This was adopted. The Chair then put the original resolution with the editorial changes that had been requested by Mr. Prichard and the Council, by vote, adopted and sustained the committee's recommendation. The Chair ruled that B-2E had been adopted.

<u>B-3</u> The resolution introduced by Mr. James R. Davis, delegate from Christ Church, Luray concerning a reduction in a line item in the budget was the most popular resolution the committee had received said Mr. McCutcheon on behalf of the committee moved adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, in the past years it has been the practice of this Diocese to pay the coordinator for the Commission on Ministry a salary from which he is paid all office or clerical expenses.

> This policy has been changed and in the past years these office expenses were paid for and shown as a separate budget item.

After a period of operation under this method, it has been found that the coordinator's office can be operated at a lesser cost to the diocese and after careful analysis, it is hereby recommended that this budget item for 1980 be reduced from \$4,000to \$2,700.

This was seconded and by vote of the Council, sustained the recommendation of the Budget Committee. The Chair ruled that B-3 had been adopted.

<u>B-4</u> Mr. McCutcheon said that we were now ready to deal with both the income and the disbursement by categories and moved as the Revised Statement of Income for 1980, an income budget of \$1,178,812. broken down as follows:

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This was moved and seconded and the Council approved the revised Statement of Income in the amount of \$1,178,812.

- <u>B-5</u> Mr. McCutcheon said that in order to bring the expenditures into balance with the various changes he moved the following:
- RESOLVED, that the 185th Council make the following further changes in the 1980 Budget recommended by the Executive Board
 - On Page B-10 under General Church Programs, make quota to church \$404,000 and total \$428,125
 - On Page B-10 under Diocesan Programs, add \$1,000 to Budget of Camps and Conferences, making total \$41,000.
 - On Page B-10, under Joint Diocesan/Regional Programs, include \$50. for both Goodwin House and Westminster-Canterbury Home.
 - On Page B-10, under Joint Diocesan/Regional Programs, reduce Communications (Item 5) by \$500.
 - 5. Under Administration on Page B-13 reduce category total by \$1,957, leaving the execution of this reduction to the discretion of the Diocesan Secretary, exempting salaries and related costs from this reduction.

The Council sustained the recommendation of the committee and adopted the resolution as proposed consisting of the five changes. The Chair ruled B-5 adopted.

<u>B - 6</u> Mr. McCutcheon moved on behalf of the committee, the summary of the budget by categories for disbursement in the amount of \$1,178,812. which is equal to the anticipated income for all programs in 1980.

This was seconded.

The Rev'd Llewellyn Fairchild, Leeds Church, Markham moved an amendment in 4 parts which were:

 That items B-C,D, and E under Column Headings of "Requested 1980" on Page B-9 in the pre-Council Journal be restored back to the full value.

- That Item A (General Church Asking) be reduced from \$437,125. to \$331,889.
- 3) That of the extra monies that may be received over the present expectations of \$1,190,469. to a total of \$105,226. be committed to the restoration of the General Church Asking.
- 4) That any monies received over the total of \$1,295,695 may be dispensed at the discretion of the Executive Board of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

Mr. Fairchild then explained that he felt that many Virginia Programs have been cut or have not been implemented because of the pledge this diocese makes to the General Church. The amendment to the resolution he offers does try to provide a challenge in the asking and that monies that could be received over and above the \$331,899. as proposed as the total pledge to the General Church could be forthcoming and lastly, that the Executive Board be empowered to use their discretion and direction in the allocation of these particular funds.

The Rev'd Charles S. Cook, Jr., Church of the Messiah, Highland Springs moved to lay on the table the amendment as offered by Mr. Fairchild. This was seconded.

The question was called. The vote to lay on the table the Fairchild amendment was adopted and the Chair so ruled.

The question was called on the previous question to adopt the Budget Expenditure Summary. This was seconded and the Chair asked the pleasure of the Council and the call for the question was adopted.

The recommendation of the committee was then put and the Council did sustain the committee's recommendation and did adopt a Budget Summary in the amount of 1,179,812. as shown in Categories A thru E. The Chair ruled B-6 adopted.

ADOPTION OF THE BUDGET

Mr. McCutcheon then moved that the budget as presented and amended be approved for the budget, both as to income and disbursements for the year 1980.

This was seconded. Council approved the proposed Program Budget as presented by the Committee and amended by the Council, in the total of \$1,178,812. (Note: The Budget appears on Page 139.)

The Rev'd J. Fletcher Lowe, Jr., Church of the Holy Comforter, Richmond moved the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that the Executive Board be requested to explore alternative methods of presenting the needs of the Diocesan Budget in order that the needs of the Diocese be presented to the several congregations prior to congregational budgeting deliberations and, that the Executive Board report to the next Annual Council of this Diocese.

This was seconded and adopted.

Mr. William Taylor, Sr., President of Regional Council 6 and

also a member of the ACT Committee dealing with alternatives to children in trouble, gave a quick status report on the work of this committee over the past few years, mainly that there was no money spent the first year when the ACT Committee came into being and during the past two years, some ten grants have been made available throughout the various regions to support the program dealing with children in trouble.

The total grants amount to \$27,876. and in almost every instance this has been seed money to assist local programs. Over \$100,000 has been obtained from this seed money to these various programs.

Over several hundred children have been benefited and helped through this initial effort that came out of the approval of this Council to approve a committee on Alternatives to Children in Trouble, and the funding through the Diocesan Budget.

At 4:10 p.m., Council reconvened following a short recess and the Rev'd Mr. Lewis announced that the Standing Committee had met and elected Mr. Thomas C. Rohr, St. Paul's, Alexandria, the President and the Rev'd W. Holt Souder, St. Mary's, Richmond as its Secretary.

He also introduced to the Council the Rev'd Myron Miller, Executive Secretary of the Virginia Council of Churches and Mrs. Alice Skalnik of St. Patrick's, Falls Church the President of the Virginia Council of Churches.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The President, pro tempore produced Mr. John Ariail, Jr. Pohick Church, Lorton, Chairman of the Council's Committee on Resolutions, who opened his remarks by thanking the committee for their hard work and advised Council that the report of the committee had been printed and made available to members of Council and that accordingly he would proceed on behalf of the committee to report their recommendations in numerical order.

<u>R - 1</u> A Resolution introduced by the Vestry of Truro Church, Fairfax called for an exercise of canonical functions regarding the selection and approval of persons for ordination.

> Mr. Ariail, on behalf of the committee, advised that the committee recommends R-1 but has amended the resolution - the final "resolve" clause as shown on their report. He moved adoption of resolution as amended. This was seconded. There was no debate. The question was called and Council did adopt Resolution R-1 as amended and as follows:

WHEREAS,

The 66th General Convention of the P.E.C.U.S.A. by a vote in the House of Bishops of 99 for and 34 against, by a clerical vote in the House of Deputies of 60 for, 39 against and 13 divided and by a lay vote of 80 for, 27 against and 3 divided, adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, we are conscious of the mystery of human sexuality and how deeply personal matters related to human sexuality are, making it most difficult to arrive at comprehensive and agreed-upon statements in these matters, and

WHEREAS, we are aware that under the guidance of the Holy Spirit the Church must continue to study these matters in relationship to Holy Scripture, Christian faith and traditions, and growing insights, and

WHEREAS, the 65th General Convention recognized ". .that homosexual persons are children of God who have a full and equal claim with all other persons upon the love, acceptance, and pastoral concern and care of the Church. .", and

WHEREAS, all the clergy and laity of the Church are expected to render compassionate and understanding pastoral care to one another and to all persons

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the House of Deputies concurring, that the 66th General Convention receives with gratitude and appreciation the Report and Recommendations of its Standing Commission on Human Affairs and Health with special reference to the requested study of the matter of ordination of homosexual persons, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this General Convention recommend to bishops, pastors, vestries, commissions on ministry and standing committees, the following considerations as they continue to exercise their proper canonical functions in the selection and approval of persons for ordination:

1. There are many human conditions, some of them in the area of sexuality, which bear upon a person's suitability for ordination. 2. Every ordinand is expected to lead a life which is a "wholesome example to all people" (Book of Common Prayer, pp 5/7, 532, 544). There should be no barrier to the ordination of qualified persons of either heterosexual or homosexual orientation whose behavior the Church considers wholesome.

3. We re-affirm the traditional teaching of the Church on marriage, marital fidelity and sexual chastity as the standard of Christian sexual morality. Candidates for ordination are expected to conform to this standard.

more firm decision on the part of members of Council. He also mentioned the stewardship element which must be considered.

The Rev'd Richard R. Baker III, Wicomico Church, emphasized the stewardship factor and cost of Council. He also made note that he felt Council was becoming an elite group and could afford it and this he did not like.

The Rev'd Berry Ed Parsons, St. Dunstan's, McLean spoke in favor of the resolution, commenting that he had come to this Diocese from the Diocese of Washington where two (2) day Councils had been successfully held.

The question was called, voice vote was taken, and the Chair then asked for a raising of hands and declared that the recommendation of the Committee on Resolutions was sustained and ruled R-2 adopted.

- <u>R 2A</u> Mr. Ariail advised Council that it was the recommendation of his committee that if the resolution R-2 calling for a two (2) day Council should be adopted, then the committee felt it should recommend the following and he moved the following resolution:
- RESOLVED, that the 186th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia begin at 10 a.m. on a Saturday and conclude with the end of Council business on the following day.

The Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr., St. Alban's, Annandale spoke vigorously in opposition and reminded Mr. Ariail that he and his committee had indicated in presenting the resolution for two (2) day Council, that it was not trying to bind the ecclesiastical authority and others with regard to the dates of Council, but R-2A, which is the committee's own recommendation, certainly does bind the situation.

The President *pro tempore* ruled that he found this resolution R-2A as recommended by the committee, specifying that the Council begin on a Saturday and conclude on the following day, in conflict with Article II of the Constitution and ruled the resolution out of order.

The President advised that it is only the ecclesiastical authority who can set the dates. The Council does have the authority to approve the location of a Council but has no authority as to the calling or of the date of any Council. There was applause.

The Rev'd Berry Ed Parsons, St. Dunstan's, McLean rose as a point of personal privilege and said there was a speaker at the microphone who wished to speak to the previous question and that if the Chair would not recognize the Rev'd John M. Miller, Jr., Holy Comforter, Vienna, he would like to speak to the question. The Chair inquired what issue and Mr. Parsons replied to the previous recommendation of the Resolutions Committee, since using the word "recommend" does not bind nor is it in conflict. The President advised that the resolution as reported and printed does not carry the word "recommend". Mr. Parsons responded that the chairman implied that it meant recommend. The President said that unless someone wished to appeal the ruling of the Chair, he would request the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee to continue.

Therefore, we believe it is not appropriate for this Church to obtain a practicing homosexual, or any person who is engaged in heterosexual relations outside of marriage.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia affirms the foregoing resolution and recommends that it be applied pastorally by the Bishops, Pastors, Vestries, Commission on Ministry and Standing Committee of the Diocese of Virginia to be considered by them in the exercise of their proper canonical functions in the approval of persons for ordination.

 <u>R - 2</u> A Resolution introduced by Region 1 requesting a twoday Council. The Chairman of the Resolutions Committee on behalf of the committee, moved adoption of this resolution with the editorial amendment deleting the words "Council of Region 1" and substituting the words "the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia". Mr. Ariail on behalf of the committee presented the amended resolution and so moved it as follows:

This was seconded.

RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia requests that subsequent annual meetings of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia be limited to two (2) days, beginning at ten o'clock a.m. on the first day and concluding with the end of council business on the second day.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson, III spoke against the resolution saying that he favored a three (3) day Council.

Mr. Ariail as Chairman, advised Council that his committee had discussed this at great length and it will be noted that the word "requests" appears in the resolution and that the resolution is not authorative or demanding. The committee recognizes that the Bishop does have the authority to specify the date, time and the length of the Council meeting and that the proposed amended resolution is purely to request consideration for a two-day Council.

The Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr. spoke against the amended resolution citing the rush of this particular two (2) day Council and the fact that there have been few resolutions, no amendments to the Constitution and Canons and that the Open Hearings were compressed, which did not provide the openness for debate and exchange of ideas as would be desirable. He also raised the question of a major liturgical service on Sunday which is a major part of the Council meeting.

The Rev'd Stewart B. West, St. John's, Columbia spoke against the committee's recommendation, commenting on the spirit of Council which is so important and which a two (2) day Council would limit.

Mr. Donald Paschal, St. Christopher's, Springfield spoke in favor of a two (2) day Council in that it would require a framework of discipline which would require a quicker decision and a

Mr. Parsons then said he would like to move a substitute motion.

The Chair ruled that there was no motion on the floor so there could be no substitute.

Mr. Parsons then asked if he could make a motion. The Chair ruled "not at this time" since the committee was making its report and that following the conclusion of the report, if he wished to make a motion, it could be done.

The Rev'd W. Frizby Hendricks III, St. Martin's, Richmond rose on a point of personal privilege stating he felt that the Chair had properly ruled but he questioned how a resolution could confine any Authority to the number of hours.

The President requested the chairman to proceed with his report.

<u>R-3</u> A Resolution submitted by Region 1 requesting that Seat, Voice and Vote be afforded to the Presbyterian clergy serving St. James' Church, Louisa. Mr. Ariail advised that this matter had been resolved for this Council, therefore his committee took no actiom.

The Very Rev'd William H. Brake, Jr. asked if he could present a substitute which would be a Memorial to the General Convention. The Chair ruled that he would receive a substitute after the committee had given its full report.

R - 4 A Resolution submitted by the Rector and Delegates from Christ Church, Alexandria dealing with the abuse of alcohol and requesting the formation of a diocesan commission to design programs for the intervention and treatment of this decease.

> Mr. Ariail reported on behalf of his committee that they recommend adoption of R-4 as amended. The second line of the first "resolve" - eliminating the words "speedily implement the formation" substituting the words "request the Bishop to appoint". This was seconded.

The question was called and without debate, Council sustained the committee's recommendation to adopt Resolution R-4, and the Chair ruled it adopted as follows:

- WHEREAS, the abuse of alcohol is an increasing torment to the lives of countless persons, the drinker and non-drinker alike; and
- WHEREAS, the abuse of alcohol affects every aspect of the physical, mental and spiritual nature of human kind, the total person; and
- WHEREAS, alcoholism is a treatable disease; and
- WHEREAS, the General Convention of the Episcopal Church has most recently recognized our need to respond to this disease in an effective manner (Resolution B-122)
- <u>BE IT RESOLVED</u>, that this Council of the Diocese of Virginia requests the Bishop to appoint a Commission on Alcoholism, under the guidance of sensitive clergy, laity

and those familiar with the disease of alcoholism.

<u>BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED</u>, that this Diocesan Commission be charged to report to the succeeding Diocesan Council its progress in:

- Designing programs of education for the prevention, intervention and treatment of the disease of alcoholism on the parish and diocesan level;
- b. Creating guidelines for the treatment of clergy and diocesan employees and members of their families who suffer the effects of this illness;
- c. Providing guidelines for the establishment of parish and diocesan policies for the use of alcoholic beverages at church functions and/or on church properties;
- d. Generally enabling this diocese and its parishes and missions to recognize and respond to the challenge that alcohol abuse presents to the People of God.
- <u>R 5</u> A Resolution submitted by Cordelia M. Plunkett, Buck Mountain Church, Earlysville citing the various organizations and communities existing in our church who could provide valuable data in the ongoing life of the diocese.

Mr. Ariail on behalf of his committee moved adoption of R-5 as amended. The amendment would be in the "resolve" clause of taking out the words "organize a task force which would" and substituting the words, "through the Commission on Ministry". This was seconded.

The question was called. There was no debate. Council sustained the recommendation of the committee and adopted Resolution R-5, as follows:

- WHEREAS. the Episcopal Church is fortunate to include within its structure a great variety of organizations and communities, such as the Church Army, the Community of the Cross of Nails and the monastic communities; and
- <u>WHEREAS</u>, a greater knowledge of the beneficial work done by those organizations, both in society in general and to the individuals within them, would be helpful to all Episcopalians;
- BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Diocese of Virginia, through the Commission on Ministry, gather information concerning these organizations and plan how to best present and distribute this information to members of our churches.
- <u>R 6</u> A Resolution submitted by the Rev'd Dr. Henry H. Rightor memoralizing General Convention on the matter of a Unicameral General Convention and the question of voting by Bishops other than diocesans.

Mr. Ariail moved on behalf of the committee the adoption of the resolution as submitted. This was seconded.

The Rev'd Martin F. McCarthy, St. Dunstan's, McLean inquired why had this resolution been submitted and is it really needed.

The Rev'd Dr. Rightor responded to the Rev'd Mr. McCarthy's inquiry.

The Chair put the question and the Council did sustain the recommendation of the committee to adopt Resolution R-6. The Chair ruled it adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, this Diocese at its 178th Annual Council memorialized General Convention, 1973, "to request the Standing Commission on Structure, and such other commissions and committees as might be appropriate, to consider the preparation of the constitutional and canonical amendments necessary to permit the next General Convention to vote on its restructure (<u>Journal of the Council</u>, 1973, pages 138, 139); and

WHEREAS, this Diocese at its 179th and 181st Annual Councils similarly memoralized the General Conventions of 1976 and 1979 (*Journal of the Council*, 1974, pages 95, 96); and

WHEREAS, the increasing size and procedural difficulties of General Convention, as evidenced at the 1979 Denver Convention, are increasingly obstacles to carrying out the mission and other work of this Church; and

WHEREAS, General Convention continues to be the only bi-cameral legislative body in the Anglican Communion; and

WHEREAS, a resolution passed by the House of Deputies at the 1973 General Convention, instructing the Standing Commission on Structure to study and make recommendations regarding restructure to the next General Convention, was voted down without consideration by the House of Bishops when it reached that House during the crush of business on the last day of Convention;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, that it does hereby memoralize General Convention that it adopt the following resolution recommended by the Committee on Structure of the House of Deputies and passed by that House at the 1973 General Convention:

> <u>RESOLVED</u>: the House of Bishops concurring, that the Standing Commission on Structure be, and it hereby is, instructed to study the present situation of the Church of England, the matter of a unicameral General Convention, the question of voting by Bishops other than Diocesans and related subjects and report to the next General Convention prior to its meeting, including in

such report such proposed constitutional and canonical changes as the Commission recommends.

The Chair put the question and the Council did sustain the recommendation of the committee to adopt Resolution R-6.

<u>R - 7</u> A Resolution submitted by the Rev'd Edward M. Morgan honoring Mrs. Jane W. Dellastatious.

Mr. Ariail moved on behalf of the committee the adoption of the Resolution R-7 with the editorial changes that had been suggested by Mr. Morgan. This was seconded. The Council sustained the committee and adopted Resolution R-7 as follows:

WHEREAS, Jane W. Dellastatious has served the people of the Diocese of Virginia in a warm and caring, and highly capable fashion as Secretary to the Suffragan Bishop for more than eleven years, and in that period of time has offered a skillful and courteous ministry to the bishops, clergy, parish secretaries, leaders among the laity, visiting dignitaries, and all who have crossed the threshold of the Suffragan's office,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia expresses its deepest appreciation to Jane W. Dellastatious for her loving and faithful ministry to our church, and we wish her every blessing, joy, and peace in the days and years to come.

<u>R - 8</u> A Resolution on Venture in Mission as submitted by the Executive Board.

Mr. Ariail reported on behalf of his committee a substitute resolution. The substitute was moved and seconded. The Council sustained the committee's substitute resolution and Resolution R-8 was adopted as follows:

> WHEREAS, Venture in Mission has raised before us a new vision of the mission of a servant church, and has been a source of renewal for individual participants, and

> WHEREAS, many churches of our diocese are participating actively in VIM,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, commends those churches which are participating in VIM and further recommends VIM to all churches as a significant source to them of renewal and as a means of revitalizing and extending their commitment to the work of our Lord Jesus Christ.

<u>R - 9</u> Mr. Ariail said it gave him great honor to move the following resolution which was a resolution of the committee and one he felt would be unanimously adopted by the 185th Annual Council.

Mr. Ariail read the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., Suffragan Bishop-elect, has been forced through the misfortune of illness of our beloved bishop, to preside over this Council, and

WHEREAS, Suffragan Bishop-elect Lewis has presided with justice, wisdom and compassion,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this 185th Annual Council gives thanks to Suffragan Bishopelect Lewis for his leadership of this Council and his service to the greater glory of God.

Council rose and applauded for a long period. The secretary was privileged to put the question and the resolution was adopted unanimously.

The President pro tempore, the Bishop Suffragan-elect David H. Lewis, Jr., expressed to members of Council his great appreciation and thanks for their generosity to the Chair, for their attention, their courtesy and for the spirit that has prevailed throughout.

<u>R - 10</u> The Chair recognized the Very Rev'd William H. Brake, Jr., who asked to move a substitute, if that be in order, or a motion as a new resolution concerning the matter of seat, voice and vote to our Presbyterian brethern who are carrying and nuturing St. James' Church, Louisa and that advices had been made that the best way to do this is to memorialize the General Convention since it is the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention which preclude offering a vote in our Annual Council to a clergy of another denomination.

Mr. Brake then moved the following resolution which was seconded:

- WHEREAS, The Rev'd Alfred Tisdale and The Rev'd Leonora Tisdale are both duly ordained persons of the Presbyterian Church and are serving as Vicar and Associate, respectively, of St. James' Episcopal Church, Louisa, Virginia, and
- <u>WHEREAS</u>, The Rev'd William Alfred Tisdale and The Rev'd Leonora Tisdale have been given seat and voice in the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, but are not canonically entitled to a vote; and
- WHEREAS, the Vestry and Congregation of St. James' Church, as well as the members of the Council of Region 1, are concerned that the clergy duly appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia to be the Vicar and Associate at St. James' Church are not canonically allowed to represent the parishioners of St. James' Church by seat, voice, and vote in

this Diocesan Council;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia does hereby memorialize the 1982 General Convention of the Episcopal Church to seek a way to provide seat, voice, and vote, in Diocesan Council meetings for non-Episcopal clergy who are duly appointed by a Bishop of the Episcopal Church to be the clergy-in-charge of an Episcopal congregation.

Mr. Brake then read a long letter from the Vestry of St. James' Church, Louisa encouraging this action and appreciating the position that the Council has taken in attempting to recognize their Presbyterian clergy who offer themselves in a shared ministry in this rural county.

The Rev'd Robert C. Hall, Jr. spoke against the motion and referred Council to the vote of clergy, as well as the vote of lay representatives and that the vote of the clergy persons did not represent those of the laity.

The Rev'd Jennings W. Hobson felt that perhaps this matter could be resolved by changing our own Constitution and Canons and therefore moved that the resolution offered by Dean Brake be referred to our own Committee on Constitution and Canons of the Diocese and to be reported back at the next Annual Council. This was seconded.

The question was called and the Council, by vote, took action to refer the resolution as presented by the Very Rev'd William H. Brake, Jr. to the Committee on Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Virginia, with report back at the 186th Annual Council.

The Chair ruled that the Hobson motion was adopted.

The Rev'd John M. Miller, Jr., Church of the Holy Comforter, Vienna on a point of personal privilege, arose and inquired if now that the report of the committee was over, whether a resolution or a substitute to R-2A could be introduced dealing with a 2-day Council and the days of such a Council meeting.

The Chair ruled that such a motion would be in order.

The Rev'd Mr. Miller then moved the following:

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that it be suggested to the Ecclesiastical Authority.

That the 186th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia begin at 10 a.m. on a Friday and conclude with the end of Council business on the following day.

Mr. Theodore Caplow, Emmanuel, Greenwood felt that it would be regretable if the matter was confounded by confusing the two issues and felt that the philosophy used and expressed to Council by the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee was in order and therefore Mr. Caplow moved an amendment to the Miller Resolution to change the word "Friday" to that of

"Saturday" so that it would read . . . begin at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday and conclude with the Council business on the following day.

This was seconded.

The Rev'd John M. Miller shared his concern about the days the Council should meet and that he hoped that the Council would state or express its mind as to whether the Friday and Saturday would be a feasible solution inasmuch as the resolution has already been adopted recommending to the Ecclesiastical Authority a two day meeting.

Mr. Caplow responded that the purpose of his amendment was to do exactly what Mr. Miller was soliciting.

The Rev'd Charles S. Cook, Church of the Messiah, moved that this entire matter be referred to the Ecclesiastical Authority "where the matter belongs anyway".

There were many seconds and the Council, by vote, adopted the resolution of the Rev'd Mr. Charles Cook to refer the entire matter to the Ecclesiastical Authority.

<u>R - 11</u> The Chair advised Council that the resolution that had been passed the previous day sending greetings to Bishop Hall in the hospital had been sent to him by messenger this morning and the resolution read as follows:

> WHEREAS, the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia greatly misses the good humor and firm leadership of our Bishop;

BE IT RESOLVED, that we send him our love and best wishes for a complete, speedy and lasting recovery.

<u>R - 12</u> The Rev'd Claud W. McCauley, All Saints, Richmond moved the following resolution which was seconded and adopted:

> WHEREAS, the 185th Council of the Diocese of Virginia convening in Grace & Holy Trinity Church, Richmond, has been warmly and lovingly received, superbly catered for by the Virginia Commonwealth University Food Services, has enjoyed the excellent facilities of the Church and the Mosque, and has been most comfortably housed and transported;

<u>BE</u> IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this Council express to the Rev'd W. Hill Brown, the staff of Grace and Holy Trinity Church, and the Parish Committee on Arrangements, its sincere appreciation for the splendid way in which preparations were planned and implemented for our convenience and the execution of our business, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Council express its appreciation to the staff of the Diocese of Virginia and most particularly to our Secretary, Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer, for this fine and continuing work, and

<u>BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED</u>, that this Council express our thanks and our congratulations to our President pro tem, and Bishop-elect David H. Lewis, Jr., on the exceptional manner in which he presided over the business of this Council; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Council instruct the Secretary of the Diocese to send a copy of this resolution of thanks to the aforementioned persons expressing our deep gratitude for their splendid work.

REPORT ON THE NEXT MEETING OF COUNCIL

The President pro tempore advised that in accordance with Article II of the Constitution the committee appointed by Bishop Hall to recommend the place of the next meeting would now be heard, and recognized the Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr., St. Alban's, Annandale.

The Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr., reporting for the Committee on the Next Meeting Place for Council, presented the recommendation that the 186th Annual Council be held in the Sheraton National Hotel, which is located at Columbia Pike and Washington Boulevard in Arlington, Virginia, which will preclude the problem of meeting in three different buildings as has been done at this Council, namely the legislative meeting in the church, eating in another building and housing in hotels and motels nearby.

He also indicated that the cost would be cheaper and that a package deal would be available and that the cost on single ∞ ccupancy would approximate \$56.00 a day which would include the three meals and the two coffee breaks.

The Rev'd Richard R. Baker III, Wicomico Church, urged that the committee in making the plans, not lock in those to the package deal who are unable to eat at the Council but have special dietary or other sound reasons.

The Rev'd Barry Ed Parsons recommended that the committee take into consideration having a special section in the dining room for those who smoke.

Upon motion, the Council approved the recommendation of the Committee on the Next Meeting Place of Council to have the 186th Annual Council at the Sheraton National Hotel, Arlington, Virginia.

The Rev'd W. Hill Brown III expressed thanks on behalf of the staff and the Rev'd Mr. Greenwood of Grace & Holy Trinity Church for the privilege of having the Council present.

THE REV'D BENJAMIN P. CAMPBELL

The Rev'd Benjamin P. Campbell rose on behalf of Regional Council No. 16 who would like to present a courtesy resolution.

The Chair inquired that there was no such Regional Council whereupon the Rev'd Mr. Campbell advised that he had been handed this resolution from such a member and proceeded to read the following resolution:

- WHEREAS, the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia was held on the second day of February, 1980; and
- WHEREAS, the second day of February is the anniversary of the first appearance of a ground hog to John Smith and Christopher Newport, when they first arrived at the falls of the James River in 1608; and
- WHEREAS, that first ground hog's day is one of the many major events which this great Commonwealth has given to this nation;
- THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council of of the Diocese of Virginia does thank the ground hog for his constant and faithful contribution to the digging of holes in this Commonwealth and this nation, and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the ground hog be designated the favorite, furry animal, of the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia.

There was great applause and the Chair ruled that such applause was the response to the resolution presented by Mr. Campbell on behalf of Regional Council 16.

AN ORDER OF EVENING WORSHIP

The Rev'd John Miller and Mr. Watson led the Council in an Order of Evening Service.

There being no further business, the Chair ruled the 185th Annual Council in recess until 11:00 a.m. on Sunday Morning when Council would be present in St. Paul's Church, Richmond for the Consecration of the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr. as Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Virginia.

THE ORDINATION AND CONSECRATION OF THE REV'D DAVID HENRY LEWIS, JR. AS A BISHOP IN THE CHURCH OF GOD

The lay and clerical delegates of the 185th Annual Council met at St. Paul's Church, Richmond, Virginia at 11 o'clock a.m. in special seating made available for each order to attend the final session of the Annual Council Meeting and to participate in the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., as a Bishop in the Church of God.

Participating in the two hour liturgy for more than 1200 persons were eleven Bishops, including the Presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church, The Rt. Rev'd John Maury Allin, D.D., the Chief Consecrator, assisted by The Rt. Rev'd Robert F. Gibson, Jr., D.D., and The Rt. Rev'd Scott Field Bailey, D.D. as Co-Consecrators, acting in the absence of Bishop Hall due to his hospitalization. The Most Rev'd Walter F. Sullivan was present.

The Preacher was The Rt. Rev'd Philip Alan Smith, D.D., former Suffragan Bishop of Virginia, and now Bishop of New Hampshire.

The handsome forty-two page program was prepared by The Rev'd E. Allen Coffey and The Rev'd Robert C. Hall, Jr.

The Rev'd Robert C. Hall, Jr., St. George's Church, Arlington, served as Master of Ceremonies and was chiefly responsible for the movement and execution throughout the pomp-filled ceremony.

The Bishop-elect was presented vestments on behalf of the Episcopal Churchwomen of the Diocese. The Bishop's scarf was given on behalf of the Council of West Richmond, Region 12. The Holy Bible was presented by the Presiding Bishop. The silver pectoral cross was presented on behalf of the Clergy of the Diocese. The Episcopal ring was given on behalf of the members of St. Stephen's Church, Culpeper, where Bishop-elect Lewis once served.

The Venerable Milton R. LeRoy acted as a Deputy Registrar and The Rev'd Craig Biddle III, host rector, served as the Presiding Bishop's Chaplain.

At 1:30 o'clock p.m. following the blessing given by The Rt. Rev'd David Henry Lewis, Jr., Suffragan Bishop of Virginia, he declared the 185th Annual Council of the Diocese adjourned sine die.

Immediately after the Service, the Suffragan Bishop and the other Bishops engaged in signing the Letters of Consecration.

Shortly thereafter there was held in Scott Hall a reception for all present. The Chairman of the Reception Committee was Mrs. S. Buford Scott, who with her committee provided

a delightful repast for this eventful occasion.

Mrs. Henry Converse served as co-chairman with Mrs. S. Buford Scott concerning the many logistical matters with St. Paul's. Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer served as General Chairman of the Committee on Arrangements.

Bishop Lewis and Bishop Gibson visited Bishop Hall in the hospital later that afternoon when Bishop Hall joined in the Ordination and Consecration of Bishop Lewis, along with Bishop Gibson, in the Prayer of Consecration and the laying on of hands.

COMMENTS OF MISS VIOLA WOOLFOLK, HEADMISTRESS ST. MARGARET'S

May I start out with a personal comment. I am now in my 51st year of close association with these schools--most closely with St. Catherine's and St. Margaret's--as a student, as a daughter of a staff member, as a teacher, and as a Headmistress. Can you believe that I believe in the Church School System in this Diocese?!

It's been many years since I spoke to this group. At that time I stood in the pulpit of St. Paul's, Richmond, shaking so in my three inch heel shoes that I was fearful of shaking out of the shoes, down the steps, and into Bishop Goodwin's lap! Now my heels are lower and you are younger, and the Bishop remains as a real support. "Praise the Lord" I am still in this Diocese of Virginia that is strong and committed, I am with a Council that cares and dares to affirm the Church's belief, and I am still a part of the Church Schools in the Diocese, a System that while keeping up with the times, continues to dedicate itself to excellence in education, and most importantly to an education with a Christian foundation as its keynote.

It is hard to speak to a group of Episcopalians about their schools, for some of you work in or for them, or have attended them, or have or had relatives in them, or regularly direct your friends or parishioners to them. Then there are others of you who have had little opportunity for a close acquaintance with us. St. Anne's-Belfield, a coed and day school in Charlottesville, is still associated with our group. St. Stephen's, St. Christopher's and Christchurch concentrate on boys, St. Agnes, St. Catherine's, and St. Margaret's are for the girls. We all have day students, and Christchurch, St. Catherine's, and St. Margaret's have significant boarding groups. We are not wealthy schools. We do not receive direct dollar support from the Diocese. We are dependent on fees and on gifts. For instance this year each St. Margaret's student is supported by her own fees plus \$1,010 which comes from outside help. You will want to know that when you hear someone say, "I am an Episcopalian but I can't afford to send my child to one of our schools", that if the child is qualified he or she probably can attend one of our schools. All of the schools have some scholarship help, so that indeed where there is a will, there is a (W) way. (That "way" is meant with a capital W as well as a small one!)

We are not Episcopal schools with just Episcopal students. Forty-eight percent of our student bodies come from other faiths or denominations. Classes in Religion are just as required as of those in English and Mathematics. Chapel services, led by chaplains, other staff members, and students follow the Episcopal form of worship.

Our schools, like any <u>good</u> independent schools or public schools, emphasize academic effort and achievement. Additionally our schools emphasize the individual and his/her growth. We care a lot about the reading, writing, arithmetic, and arts, but we also keep before us the integrity, the responsibility, and the creativity, that develop the person into a Whole Person, as a real child of God, who holds his head high and happily in so being. Of course each school is different, and I can speak most specifically about St. Margaret's. We have girls whose abilities are above average, but we endeavor to accept those girls who are capable of doing our work and living in our community, although some may need special remedial or "catching up help", and who would like to go on with some kind of further education. Our goal is to live with that girl, and the boarding situation is a helpful one here, and to help her to develop herself into the kind of person her particular capabilities would enable her to be, always emphasizing development of character as well as leadership and accomplishment. I hope that each St. Margaret's girl senses that as a child of God she is important, and that she is deserving of our encouragement, our caring, and our love.

I urge you to continue to know your schools--to visit them, to take part in the their programs, to ask and to read and to hear about them, and to encourage your acquaintances and parishioners to join you in being a part of them, for they are indeed your-our schools!

CHURCH SCHOOLS, A MISSION OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA?* Thomas N. P. Johns, Chairman, Board of Trustees

I would direct your attention this afternoon to the subject of education in our schools as an expression of the mission of the Church and of the Diocese, and to the role we as Trustees play in carrying out this mission. The events surrounding the establishment of Church Schools in 1920, and I will refer to these events in a moment, indicate clearly that primary and secondary education was considered an important mission of the Church.

Is education still a legitimate mission of the Church? Is Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia still a mission of the Diocese? If the answers are yes, then how and in what measure do the schools contribute to the success of this diocesan mission, and to what extent does the Diocese, its Council and its parish churches contribute to the schools?

Origins of Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia

Historically, the Church has considered education of the young one of its primary missions. Spreading the Gospel, saving mankind from its sinful nature, conversion of the heathen; if these have been the missions of the Church, a fundamental principle, in fact one recognized by all ideologies, is that indoctrination of the young is the key to continued success. In England, the mother country of Virginia and of our church, in England where Church and State are still nominally one, education has traditionally been a major fabric of the Church and only today in the social and economic upheaval of that country do we find the Church losing its hold on the great universities and the better schools. Commenting on this subject last year, Sir William Haley, former director of the BBC and editor of the TIMES, stated, "older people believe that much of the present amorality in the nation is due to the decline of the church schools."

Here in the new world the Church, exemplified by the Church of England in Virginia, the Puritans in New England, and by the Quakers of Pennsylvania and the Roman Catholics of Maryland, was a powerful force in colonial life and government. Education was a focus of this powerful force expressed in the Christian folkway of home schooling, schools near churches taught by clergymen, and in the founding of centers of higher learning such as Harvard, William and Mary, and Yale.

Despite the confiscation of church properties and glebe lands in Virginia following the Revolution, the formalization of primary and secondary education in the nineteenth century was influenced almost entirely by churches. Public school education became law only in 1870, legislation equaled in its controversial nature only by that of the 19th amendment which granted voting rights to women in 1920. Compulsory school attendance and woman suffrage were stirring events in our culture. The forecast of doom by sages of the early 1900's was that with women voting and every Tom, Dick, and Jane being taught, the country was surely going to hell. Little did they know.

It was at this time and in this environment, with its threat of secularization of primary and secondary education, that Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia was founded.

172. The first recorded mention of Church Schools is found in the address of the 1919 Council of the Diocese by a newly consecrated bishop, William Cabell Brown. Brown had been influenced by his predecessor. Robert A. Gibson; who realized that a number of private schools within the Diocese were operated by Episcopalians and considered a plan of a loose voluntary association of schools. Bishop Brown in 1919 said simply, "the whole subject of Church Schools interests me deeply, and I ask that a committee of five members be appointed at this Council and instructed to make a thorough study and investigation of such schools and report on the same to the next Council." Brown moved rapidly and had himself appointed Chairman of the committee at the same meeting. He was prodded no doubt by the competition, for another report to that 1919 Council stated "a Methodist principal of one of the colleges of the excellent Randolph-Macon system asked a member of our church on a certain occasion: 'Why do you not establish schools of your own? We have a number of the children of your church who are being educated in our institutions.'" Playing catch-up ball did not bother Brown, for by the next meeting of the Diocese in 1920 he reported that the school system had been set up, funded by a nationwide campaign in the amount of \$200,000; that the system would be comprised of five schools, two in Richmond, one in Charlottesville, and two in Tidewater. Three of the five schools, St. Anne's School in Charlottesville, and the Chamberlayne School for Boys and the Virginia Randolph Ellett School for Girls, both in Richmond, had already been secured at a price of \$116,000. The Bishop was inflation-conscious, for in his report he states, "this amount covers simply the value of the land and the buildings on the basis of cost when erected. If these buildings had to be built today they would cost over \$200,000." The three schools were advertised on the back of the JOURNAL of the Council that year as the Diocesan System, and by the Fall of 1920 the two Richmond schools had been renamed St. Catherine's and St. Christopher's. Church Schools was in business.

By the following year, 1921, St. Margaret's and Christchurch had been established and the school system incorporated with the Bishop as President. Brown's statement about Church Schools in his 1921 address to Council includes two important points: 1) although the schools were designed to be self-sufficient, substantial funds would be needed for their future development and 2) "In my judgment the establishment of these schools, and their future development, is the most vital work before the Church at this time, next to the faithful and earnest preaching of the gospel." And the Bishop continued, "I can think of no investment of money that will bring such rich returns as money invested in the Christian education of boys and girls, thus opening up for them the possibilities of a larger and richer life than could ever be theirs without such aid."

Here then is expressed not only the mission of the Diocese in establishing Church Schools, but the intended recognition of the continued support of the schools by the Church.

Finally, by 1922 Brown was able to take pride in the establishment of the school system and to comment on its success, particularly on the contribution of the trustees. He speaks to the Council of his deep and abiding interest in the schools and their utmost importance to the development and well-being of the Church and the Diocese. He refers to the school systems established by other churches throughout the country. To quote Bishop Brown further, "Every other church in the state is spending, in the establishment of new schools, or in the further development of schools already established, thousands of dollars where we spend hundreds. I should be recreant to my duty, did I not urge you with all the earnestness at my command to do everything in your power to strengthen and increase the interest in our schools." At the same Council, 1922, for the first time, reports were heard of the individual schools and of the Dean. The Reverends Chamberlayne, Warren, and Mason reported for St. Christopher's, Christchurch, and St. Anne's; Mr. Lewis C. Williams

174. made a verbal report for St. Catherine's, and the Bishop reported for St. Margaret's. Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia was off and running.

It had been a remarkable accomplishment: <u>five</u> schools firmly established in just two to three years.

The Swing Away from Church Schools

as a Mission of the Church

Once the school system was established, a bond issue was floated for capitalization of projects and the schools were made liable for the bonded indebtedness which they duly paid off out of operating funds. The office of the Dean, the central office, was strengthened. The schools rolled with the punches of the Depression and World War II. Set up by the Church with the intent that they should become selfsupporting, the schools did just that. The Diocese no longer had the school system in its budget. It was as if the school mission of the Church had been accomplished.

But, beginning about a quarter of a century ago, things began to change for Church Schools. The changes were so subtle as they evolved as nearly to have escaped recognition. But taken together, the changes have in effect raised the question, Are Church Schools still a mission of the Diocese? Do we see ourselves as Trustees of a Church mission? Do the parish churches in this Diocese still see us as their missionaries? Look at these changes.

I. In 1954 there was a decision involving another Brown, this one not a Bishop. As desegregation exposed racism, churches and church schools wrestled with their consciences; and as the Internal Revenue Service was to wrestle with their pocketbooks, church schools adopted open admission policies amounting to tokenism, in fact, the only policies economically suitable at the time. It was a painful and devisive time, not for students so much as for school patrons. But that time turned into a bonanza for school growth and financial success. As the public schools became further prey to the socialistic manipulations of a gargantuan bureaucracy and trans-metropolitan busing prevailed, thousands left the public school system in search of private education, and church schools found themselves scrambling for their fair share of the white flight market. Church school enrollments burgeoned. Budgets became distended. Tuitions rolled in. And today the schools still ride on the crest of that wave. Was all this a mission of the Church?

II. Consider another change. In a real sense geography has caught up with our schools. Originally our campuses were placed in areas providing adequate space, convenience to constituents, places attractive, even inspiring and beautiful, for example, the river sites of St. Margaret's and Christchurch. In the case of the Richmond schools the campuses were built in Westhampton, a country area at the end of the Richmond College streetcar line. For five cents a ride, or less if one bought tokens, most students were transported four or five miles to and from the city. Later St. Stephen's and St. Agnes were to advertise themselves as three miles from the city of Alexandria. What has happened as a consequence of urban growth? Five of the Church Schools, and I include St. Anne's campus, now find themselves landlocked in affluent neighborhoods where real estate values are enormous and traffic dangerous. Already, three schools have given serious consideration for a variety of reasons to moving campus. Frankly, I find our campuses to be well-situated and would not suggest moving any of them. On the other hand, these posh neighborhoods and the quality of students which they provide lend us an accurate image of schools for the rich, hardly a missionary challenge to parish churches in the Diocese, many of whom see themselves less favorably situated.

III. A third change tending to divert our system from the original diocesan mission has been achievement by individual schools of financial strength and relative financial independence. With the exception of Christchurch, which has survived recent decades by virtue of being in the system, and of St. Anne's, one of the original schools in this system which was spun off in the interests of its own survival to become the affiliated free-standing entity that is now St. Anne's-Belfield, with these two exceptions the schools have demonstrated fiscal stability in meeting capital and operating requirements and in establishing endowment funds.

As we all know, capital has been required primarily to replace or refurbish obsolete structures and to build new ones in order to accommodate student body growth and to meet competition by providing new services in the growing technology of education. Science centers, laboratories, computer centers, and the establishment of summer programs with swimming pools and air conditioned buildings are examples. Capital requirements have been met by the Boards of Governors and their chairmen, with construction money funded through the bank lines of the central office and aided by the use of interscholastic loan funds at favorable interest rates.

With the establishment of development offices in each of the schools and Foundations as receptacles for tax-free gifts and with programs for deferred giving, survival of the schools in an uncertain future seems indeed probable.

All of this change from the days when the schools were beholden to the Church for their financial integrity is good change. It speaks to the maturity of our institutions. But financial security augurs independence from authority and ownership, even ownership which feigns benevolence. Indeed the very wealth and independence of our schools raises the question, Are schools so prosperous and high-flying a legitimate mission of the Church? IV. Consider the final change, one in what might be called the religious lives of the schools. The founders of Church Schools proposed "an education with religion as its basic principle . . . for training earnest and intelligent churchmen and churchwomen." Bishop Brown in 1921 referred on two occasions to the "Christian education of our boys and girls" and to "the advantages of an education under church auspices." At Council in 1922, Rosewell Page, a layman, described in a resolution which was adopted, "an educational system which shall advance the cause of religion and the welfare of the youth of our diocese and so of the community" and in 1922, the Reverend E. L. Woodward, the dean, described at Council "the school system which in two years has proved so successful and promises so much in the development of Christian manhood and womanhood."

There was no doubt as to the role religion was intended to play in Church Schools and no doubt that this role was put into effect in the founding of this system.

Looking back, a change in the role of religion in schools should have seemed inevitable, as does change in this aspect of school life seem in the future. It was a change conditioned by the growing sophistication of a behaviorally disturbed society, one which professes that moral values can be acquired with little emphasis on the teachings of the Church.

Let me illustrate this change. One of our Heads has developed a useful tool for self-assessment of his school: He invites each year a group of selected recent graduates, usually college sophomores, to meet with a committee of the Board of Governors. These sessions are provocative and generally reassuring about the quality of the school's program. Inevitably to the question, "What does it mean to you that you went to a church school"? the answer is, "We never thought of it as a church school, only as a good school." This is a good answer, one to warm the hearts of those who appreciate the good college preparatory

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country day or boarding schools we own, an answer to warm the hearts of those who could care less about the Church. But is this degree of relative invisibility of the Church in church schools to be left as it is? Does this estimation by college students describe our schools as a mission of the Diocese? What do we mean today by church schools?

Mr. Chairman, this concludes my remarks at this Annual Meeting. I have tried only to raise some questions about our school system, questions for which no pat answers exist. But they are questions with which we as trustees must surely deal.

I close, Mr. Chairman, by quoting ideas expressed by the late Headmistress of St. Agnes School. In 1971, Roberta C. McBride wrote, "Those who say that the Church has no business running schools are in reality either disavowing a belief in education or implying that religious commitment has no effect on how one lives. If education is a force powerful enough to change men's lives, then as Christians we should be . . . concerned that our children's education be rooted in the Christian faith, not in some amorphous mass of changing theory. . .

"If the Church abandons the schools, it loses the opportunity to act as a force in the lives of many people.

"In short, education should be one of the primary concerns of the Church and its role in the Church School system should be stronger than it is now or ever has been."

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE 185TH COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

In May of 1980 Virginia Diocesan Homes will be twenty-five years old in service as the diocesan instrument of ministry to the aging. Goodwin House is now in its twelfth year and continues in its efforts to improve the quality of life and the standards of care of its residents. No small part of this task is to assure the long-term fiscal stability and continuity of the home in an economy experiencing a high rate of inflation.

We are happy to report that out 1978-79 (Oct.-Sept.) budget of \$3,380,178.00 was met with a balance of \$35,065.00 remaining of income over expenses. Our Fellowship Assistance Program continues to help 60 residents with their cost of care with a total expenditure of \$217,061. Careful cost control and constant budgetary review have been essential throughout the year to come in on target.

Continued inflation and projections of our next twelve month operations has forced the Board to announce increases in the Monthly Maintenance Charges and Founders Fees effective January 1, 1980.

We have made great progress in our plans to establish an office of Development and Fund Raising to undergird the Fellowship Assistance Program. The Goodwin House Endowment Fund has been established "to build a broad financial foundation for the fellowship assistance program in the future." The Pooled Income Fund has been developed as a trust to which donors can give property to or for a charitable institution irrevocably but retain the income for life.

Mrs. Primrose Vining is serving as the developmental officer under the direction of the Administrator and the Community Relations Committee of the Board. Two mailings have gone out to 1) past contributors and 2) our growing number of friends. Our efforts are showing a generous response and we hope that next years report can be a full story of continuous success.

We are profoundly aware that our tax exempt status is the key to our ability to be a charitable institution. When legislative committees make studies and hold hearings regarding the criteria of tax exempt properties and corporations it makes us aware that the base of our support and the resources of our charitable funds must be broader and touch the hearts and concerns of an increased number of friends.

Three-hundred (300+) applications for residency at Goodwin House make it evident that additional homes are needed. Our Board has spent many committee hours studying the possibilities and problems of developing new continuing care homes. A committee of interested Episcopalians and Presbyterians in Northern Virginia has been formed and is at work on this subject. A survey is now under way to inquire of our members of the Churches 60 years of age and older, what they believe their housing and living needs will be as they live the years of their retirement. The

Episcopal-Presbyterian part of the survey is of Northern Virginia but Virginia Diocesan Homes seeks the same information from members of parishes throughout the diocese. The survey is being directed and implemented by the consulting firm of Van Scoyoc and Associates, Inc. of Falls Church.

We have reported to you the concerns demanding the attention of the Board and Administration of Virginia Diocesan Homes/ Goodwin House in the past year and our plans for the future. We ask in return your prayers for the ministry to the aging in our diocese and for your continued support through your gifts.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH

COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE POSSIBILITY OF THE DIVISION OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

BACKGROUND

This committee was formed in 1978 by resolution of the 183rd Council of the Diocese of Virginia, which charged the committee to perform a study and report its findings. The committee thereupon investigated a number of issues, including compiling an exhaustive list of reasons pro and con for division, and presented an interim report setting out a timetable for future possible considerations and decisions at the 184th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia. The committee was continued by the Bishop and this report documents its activities since the 184th Council.

COMMITTEE ACTIVITY

Since its formation, the committee met 15 times, primarily in Fredericksburg but also in Richmond. Its deliberations were supported by considerable subcommittee and individual work. The following members of the committee have served since the 184th Council:

Mmes. DuPont Guerry III, Robert H. Howe, Messrs. Lloyd B. Addington, Henry R. Burt, Bernard S. Johnson, William A. Johnston III, William Rotch and the Reverend Messrs. Harry L. Hoffman, Albert N. Jones, James P. Lincoln, Heyward H. Macdonald, Claud W. McCauley, John M. Miller, Jr., John Page Williams and Harry W. Baldwin, Chairman.

AREA MEETINGS

As reported to the 184th Annual Council, a systematic gathering of responses among various groups and bodies of the Diocese was planned for the Fall of 1979. Information packets on the issues were to be sent out, questionnaires asked to be returned and face-to-face dialogue in meetings were the media that were being prepared for this effort. However, concern regarding possible interference with the process of the Venture in Mission campaign was raised by the VIM Committee and echoed by the Standing Committee. At their request, and after consultation with the Bishop, this committee decided to defer the diocesan survey and area meetings until after the beginning of 1980.

Eleven meetings in areas all over the diocese are planned for the period February 7 through March 4, 1980. The meetings will have two objectives:

1. To inform the wardens, council delegates and other parish leaders of the possibilities and of the issues which the committee has identified and to help them stimulate informed and responsible thinking among the people of the Diocese; and

2. To enable the committee to gather diverse opinions and points of view which will assist it in making a more representative recommendation to the Council of the Diocese.

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The information obtained by means of these meetings will be compiled into a form useful for the delegates of Council to refer to when considering recommendations this committee will bring to them.

STATISTICAL STUDIES

During the year several hypothetical ways of dividing the diocese were considered in order to delineate study areas for statistical purposes. Alternative schemes for division into two dioceses, and division into three dioceses, incorporating sections of adjacent dioceses, were among the possibilities considered. The theoretical arrangements judged most likely to be practical were set out in considerable detail defining specific study areas in which detailed information and projections could be formulated. Present and projected populations, membership, clergy, congregations and budgets were compiled for these hypothetical study areas to test in detail the conclusion of this committee that division appeared to be feasible, if deemed to be desirable. The conclusion reported at the 184th Diocesan Council that division into two more-or-less equal diocese was feasible was confirmed by these detailed studies of conjectural plans for division.

DISCUSSIONS WITH THE BISHOP OF CENTRAL GULF COAST

The committee determined that consultation with those who had had direct experience with realignment of diocesan boundaries would be in order and thereupon contacted the Right Reverend George M. Murray, Bishop of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast. He met with subcommittees and the entire committee who sought his advice and experience regarding the following items:

a) The forming of concensus and the reasons for considering revision of diocesan boundaries,

b) Pre-decision planning and information gathering,

c) Surveying the opinion of the people of the dioceses affected, and the best means thereof,

d) Derivation of equitable formulas for allocation of diocesan assets and liabilities,

e) Setting up an orderly process for decision-making and timetables for the transition, and

f) Procedures and actions to enable the new diocese to legin to function.

These and a number of other matters that came up in the course of discussions were of great interest. An article in the VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN reported many of these points. Both Bishop Hall and Bishop Baden were present and participating in these discussions.

ANTICIPATED NEXT STEPS

The committee strongly believes that the views of every person in the diocese are valuable, important and must be considered in formulating recommendations for or against division of the diocese. A very substantial effort to obtain and analyze representative views will be undertaken immediately following this Council. The facts the committee already has compiled will be brought to as wide a segment of the leadership of the diocese as practicable and their reactions and responses to it systematically recorded. These responses, and the material evoking them, will be the major portion of the report and recommendation that we intend to bring to Council.

The committee has been advised by Bishop Hall that he intends to call a Special Council in the Spring to consider its recommendations regarding division. This Council is to be held on April 26, 1980. It is the intention of the committee to present a definite recommendation for or against division of the diocese for consideration at that time. Should the Council act favorably on the idea of division of the diocese, a timetable of future actions is recommended virtually identical with those presented with our interim report at the 184th Council, as follows:

- 1980 Recommendation to the Special Council at which time the Council will act. If the report is to divide and Council approves, then, the committee's work could continue in this manner:
- 1980 Prepare plan and details for division.
- 1981 Present plan to the 186th Annual Council.
- 1981 Refine the plan.
- 1982 Present final plan to the 187th Annual Council for approval.
- 1982 Present data and plan to the 1982 General Convention.
- 1983 If approved by the 1982 General Convention, the organization of the two dioceses would proceed.

If the committee's report is against division or should the Special Council act to oppose division, then the work of this committee would be at an end.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT - 1979

This report of the Standing Committee is in two parts, both of which appear in the pre-Council Journal. The first part is a general evaluation of some elements of this year's diocesan program, in direct response to Canon XV, Sec. 2a; the second part is a report on the response of the diocese to a single major project - Venture in Mission - presented as a way of drawing our attention to the life, vitality, sensitivity, and concern of Episcopalians here in Virginia as we carry out our perceptions of the Lord's work in this place.

CHURCH GOVERNMENT

Specific inquiries among a number of persons in the diocese have not revealed any work on the development of guidelines for clergy salaries, nor have numerous meetings with congregations and vestries in the course of the VIM campaign shown any evidence of a concerted effort to educate vestries and congregations on church government and cannon law. We again call attention to Canon XVI, Sec. 8, of our diocesan constitution, which requires the annual review by vestries of the salaries and allowances received by a minister. And, we wish to continue to emphasize the need for greater effort to educate vestries and congregations on church government and canon law.

MISSION OUTREACH & CHURCHES UNDER SUPERVISION (MOCUS)

This committee was chartered by the Executive Board in June, 1977, to work with aided congregations and to be concerned with outreach and strategy, and lands and buildings.

The Standing Committee takes note of and wishes to commend the MOCUS Committee for (1) its practice of holding its meetings at the various aided congregations throughout the year, which has enhanced communications and builds upon the relationships that exist between the churches and the diocese;(2) the improvement of the liaison system that has been established with the aided congregations, which has resulted not only in improved communications but in the development of new lines of communication; (3) assisting the churches in the use of the "block grant," adopted by the 1978 Council, which has resulted in a responsible acceptance of the principles of good stewardship and mutual interdependence; and (4) the publishing and distribution of guidelines for the use of all the churches under supervision of the bishop.

We particularly commend the MOCUS Committee for its sense of responsibility in helping with the establishment of new churches under the supervision of a founding church, two so far this year: the Church of the Holy Cross in the Dun Loring area, under St. Dunstan's Church, McLean, and the Church of the Holy Spirit in Dale City, under St. Margaret's Church, Woodbridge.

COMMUNICATION

This has been a year of turmoil and anxiety for those associated with THE VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN, as well as for its readers, which could have resulted in a weaker communications program for the diocese and a <u>Churchman muzzled</u> by timidness and bureaucratic conservatism. The Standing Committee wishes all to take note that the opposite has occurred: the leadership assumed by those associated with the <u>Churchman</u> and the trust given to those persons by others who could have been less supportive has resulted in a sense of new strength throughout the diocese and a newspaper, if anything, even more responsive to the twin goals of responsible reporting and sensitive editorializing. We note especially the following:

- The series of articles about the regions demonstrates a responsiveness to engendering further understanding about regions, with the apparent result that more people are more appreciative of what regions are doing in the areas of ecumenism and mission.

- There is evidence in the <u>Churchman</u> itself, in articles and letters, and among those who are asking about the <u>Churchman</u>, of a loyalty to, and a concern about, the <u>Churchman</u> being a channel through which our own church people and other Christians are encouraged to think and search rather than a platform from which we are told what to think.

- The Communications Committee was both deliberate and careful in its selections of editors, and was faithful to the trust that a trial editorship should be attempted. When this failed, the committee responsibly resumed its most important task, recommending a new and permanent editor to the bishop. This task was successfully completed with the recommendation of Lee Hickling in July. Through it all, the bishop's gentle but unmistakable presence was a significant element of the balance that was maintained during some troublesome times.

- The leadership and competence of the interim editor, the Rev'd Burtis Dougherty, was steady, and we thank him and congratulate him for his loyal and able ministry.

Other areas of communications in the diocese are not so visible. The Standing Committee, like everyone else, wishes for better and more rapid communications. Perhaps what we really wish, as we expect others wish, is not for more talking but for more listening. We note one missing element: we regret that the Executive Board has chosen not to publish a reiteration of the goals of restructure adopted in 1972. We think that the experience with restructure these past seven years, together with a broader understanding of what restructure was attempting, would prepare us better for the tasks and opportunities of the 1980s.

DIOCESAN RELATIONSHIP & ANNUAL PLEDGE TO THE NATIONAL CHURCH

There was a time when the Diocese of Virginia fully supported the programs of the National Church, had a close relationship with the Presiding Bishop, and was one of the church's leading dioceses. While individuals from Virginia may still be in some national leadership roles, the general feeling in the diocese toward the national church reflects a hostile we/they attitude or, even worse, indifference. This is due, in part, to differences on sensitive issues, such as prayer book revision and ordination of women and, in part, a feeling of uneasiness with positions taken by the Presiding Bishop that are not supportive of the majority's opinion. This attitude has not been helped by the decision of the Executive Council

and its Communications Committee to place the Episcopalian in every home and reduce the national church's support of diocesan newspapers by eliminating advertising support.

On the other hand, the presence of the Presiding Bishop at our annual council last year and the increasing evidence of support for Venture in Mission in the diocese may result in improving the relationship between diocese and national church.

AS TO ANNUAL PLEDGE

Many years ago the Diocese of Virginia was, at its own request, exempted from the quota and assessment requirements of the national church because of Virginia's strong belief in and commitment to stewardship as practiced in proportionate giving (the so-called Virginia Plan"). The Executive Board, in keeping with the principles of proportionate giving as affirmed by the 183rd Annual Council, recommended 38% of total pledged income received (to cover quota and assessments) during 1979 in support of general church programs. This was revised by council to 37% of total income for quota plus an assessment of \$22,567. At the income estimated for 1979, the total contribution will fall less than one thousand dollars short of the national church's request.

It appears from this that we give only lip service to proportionate giving; that, irrespective of the merits of proportionate giving, we seek first to find out what we are expected to give and then work to obtain that amount, one way or another.

SEXUALITY

Both the General Convention and the Virginia Diocesan Council in 1979 discussed the issue of sexuality seriously, compassionately, and openly. Resolutions from both councils affirmed the Church's belief that all candidates for ordination, if not celibate, should be heterosexual and, if married, committed to expressing their sexuality within that marriage. But both councils also elevated to focus of the church's consideration of sexuality beyond the narrow issues of ordination alone.

We heartily endorse this focus upon the "wholeness of sexuality." and we believe that both councils have expressed positions on the ordination of homosexuals that is consistent with the doctrine and heritage of the Episcopal Church and provides bishops and others who are canonically involved in the ordination process the needed guidance required for fulfilling their responsibilities in dealing pastorally with each applicant for ordination.

We continue to be gravely concerned with the presence of homophobia (the fear of homosexuality) and believe each of us must study whatever is necessary to help us "reject homophobia in our lives and challenge it in others." We request the Executive Board to provide suitable study materials so that such study can begin this coming year.

The Standing Committee has before it and will continue to review the General Convention resolution and guidelines as we fulfill our responsibilities to endorse candidates suitable for the ordained ministry.

ELECTION OF THE SUFFRAGAN BISHOP

The Standing Committee celebrates the election of the Rev'd David Henry Lewis, Jr., as Bishop Suffragan and looks forward to his consecration at this council. Bishop-elect Lewis was one of ten persons on the slate offered by the Nominating Committee at the Special Council held at All Saints Church, Richmond, in October 1979.

Bishop Hall, in his pastoral address at the 184th Annual Council, announced Bishop Baden's intention to retire and requested and received permission for the election of a successor in 1979.

In March of 1979 Bishop Hall met with the Standing Committee for its advice and consent in the appointment of a nominating committee. Bishop Hall appointed Betty Lacy chairman and together with the Standing Committee selected a committee that was broadly representative of the diocese and the special gifts of its people.

At its initial meeting, the Nominating Committee decided to undertake a process similar to the search process for a new minister in a parish, adapted to the special conditions imposed by exigencies of time and geography. The committee's procedures included attendance at regional council meetings to discuss what qualities a suffragan should have, soliciting and receiving recommendations of persons for the committee's consideration, contacting the persons recommended for their permission to be considered, and consulting with Bishops Hall and Baden and with Bishop David Richards, Director of Clergy Deployment in New York.

Two of the ten persons nominated withdrew before the Special Council, and one person was nominated from the floor. The Rev'd Mr. Lewis was elected on the fourth ballot.

Comments on the procedures of the Nominating Committee, generally speaking, have been favorable. It was suggested at the conclusion of the process that the criteria for the selection of candidates that were being used by the committee should have been publicized. The committee did address this issue and in its report concluded that the qualities sought in the examination on pages 517 and 518 of the Prayer Book sufficed.

BISHOP JOHN A. BADEN

John Baden brought special gifts to every phase of his ministry, but in noneof his many roles in Virginia were these gifts more apparent than as suffragan bishop: wisdom, grace, humor, conscience, stewardship, humility, diligence, indefatigability; above all, a manifest love for his savior that permeated all he did and was, and which was, in return, shown to him by all he met. We shall think of him not as retired but, instead, selected for yet another special ministry but one with fewer administrative duties.

MEMORIALS TO GENERAL CONVENTION

Although memorials to the General Convention from Virginia's Annual Council were forwarded to General Convention, and although the Secretary of the Diocese had letters acknowledging receipt of these memorials from the Secretary of Convention. they were not prefiled with either the House of Deputies or the House of Bishops; they had to be filed by the Virginia deputation after its arrival. A formal protest has been registered with the President of the House of Deputies, the Presiding Bishop, and the Secretary of Convention.

HEROIC MEASURES

The Standing Committee regrets that there was no continuation of the study of heroic measures as requested by council last year and hopes that this issue will receive due attention in 1980.

THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

Last year, the Standing Committee noted the financial plight of our seminaries and the problems caused by declining enrollment. Both issues continue to need attention.

At Virginia Seminary, for example, the number of parishes which contribute one-and-a-half percent of net disposable income, as recommended by General Convention and supported by this Council, has risen from 36 to 65. This growth is heartening; but in view of the fact that alumni serve in 850 parishes and missions, there is a long way to go. Total annual giving increased during the past year by less than 10 percent, a lower percentage than the rate of inflation. For 1979-80, there is a budgeted deficit of \$30,000. We believe that these figures are, if anything, less discouraging than those which would be presented by most other schools.

Enrollment also continues to decline, a situation caused, in part. by the small number of available paid jobs for ordained persons--there is plenty of work to do!--and, in part, by the rising cost of tuition.

The Denver General Convention affirmed its support of education for clergy in these accredited institutions and voted to continue Theological Education Sunday and the voluntary one-and-a-half percent plan to finance it. We hope that our parishes will continue this percentage of giving to all Seminaries through these channels, and even give a higher percentage.

Once again, we urge parishes to provide money and opportunity for continuing education for clergy. It is one of the most effective means for the renewal of the clergy and, through them, of the church at large.

Lay interest in theological study increases. The program of Theological Education by Extension, organized by Sewanee, now numbers 29 groups in this diocese. Enrollment in the Lay School at Virginia Seminary continues at about the same level as last year. In recognition of the growing importance of lay ministry, and to bring the policy of VTS into conformity with that of other institutions, VTS has opened its MDiv program to students who do not seek ordination.

The Commission on Ministry, acting in accordance with last year's council resolution R-1, has established a Committee on Lay Ministry, which is chaired by Janet Maguire and is functioning well.

CAMPS, CONFERENCES, AND YOUTH MINISTRIES COMMITTEE

This was the year that reaped the results of the long-range planning by the CC&YM Committee, which included the appointment of Bernard S. Johnson as program coordinator. New programs have been begun and offer great promise. One especially worth mentioning is a one-week camp for children with hearing problems.

Budgeting is an increasing problem, and the Standing Committee is concerned about the CC&YM Committee having to look around for operating funds from sources outside the church. The benefits of developing a budget commitment from Council for two or even three years in advance is worth looking into.

Camps and conferences benefits from the enthusiastic efforts of the program coordinator, but the fact is that his involvement is a hidden cost to the program that is not reflected in the budget. The longterm effects of this should be reviewed.

REPORT TO THE 185TH ANNUAL COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA IN REGARD TO THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN CAMPS, CONFERENCES, AND YOUTH MINISTRIES, AND SHRINE MONT

The 184th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia adopted the following resolution as a part of the Budget of the Diocese for 1979:

"To cause a study in 1979 as to the relationship between the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries at Shrine Mont and the budget to the end that the diocese provide the most effective and efficient facilities possible and to make a report to the 185th Annual Council."

The Executive Board of the Diocese began to deal with this question at their meeting on February 9, 1979, but had some difficulty in reaching a conclusion as to the current interpretation of the resolution. A sub-committee was appointed to study the resolution and ascertain exactly what the Budget Committee of Council desired. The sub-committee consisted of the Chairman of Council's Budget Committee (The Rev'd John R. Frizzell, Jr.), the Chairman of Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee, (Mr. William F. Shubatt), the Chairman of the Bishop's Advisory Commission on Shrine Mont (The Rev'd William W. Pendleton), an ember of the Executive Board (The Rev'd Gerald A. Riley), and a member of the Bishop's staff (Mr. Bernard S. Johnson).

On March 9, 1979 the sub-committee reported to the Executive Board their understanding of the resolution as follows:

- -- How are Shrine Mont rates in comparison with other camps?
- -- Should Shrine Mont give a reduced rate to Episcopal Groups attending Shrine Mont?

The Executive Board accepted this interpretation.

On May 11, 1979 the Executive Board again discussed the matter particularly in regard to tuition charges and scholarships available. The following resolution was then adopted by the Executive Board:

"Mr. Tinsley moved and it was seconded by Mr. James C. Davis III, that the Committee on Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries share with all regions by disseminating data on costs of the Camping Program with the hope in mind that those regions who do have scholarship funds available would make them obtainable to the program, even if there were no applicants within a specific region."

In the spring of 1979 the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee gathered data on other Church Camps in the Valley Area and did, through the Virginia Council of Churches, tour six camps including Shrine Mont. On June 8, 1979, the Chairman of the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee made the following report to the Executive Board:

"As reported to the Executive Board on May 11, 1979,

by the Rev'd Gerald A. Riley, the questions raised by the resolution of the Council Budget Committee were:

- '1) Does the Shrine Mont Commission subsidize participants in the Diocesan Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries programs by a reduced fee schedule?
- 2) How to do the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries camping fees compare to other camps in the Valley Area?'

At the March 9, 1979 meeting of the Executive Board and in response to Question #1 - above information was provided by Mr. Bernard S. Johnson indicating that Shrine Mont Commission does subsidize the programs of the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries of this Diocese by charging a fee lower than fees charged to non-Episcopal groups. (NOTE: The comparison is \$14.00 per day as compared to \$20.00 per day in 1978 for St. George's Camp.)

In response to Question #2 above relating to a comparison of camping fees of St. George's to other church related camps, three representatives of the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee participated in a tour sponsored by the Virginia Council of Churches on March 20,21, and 22, 1979. The twenty-two persons taking the tour represented thirteen church camps which are operated by five denominations. A total of six camps were visited including St. George's. Information was obtained relating to nine camps in order to compare with our own St. George's. The information related only to summer in-camp residence programs which most closely resemble our program at St. George's.

Of the ten camps (including St. George's), the following is set forth for your information:

Some camps visited were very primitive and operating procedures included the staff being issued food materials and the meals were prepared by the staff assigned to each cabin area. Our operation is unique in that the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries purchases "room and board" whereas in many other camps the camping program rents only the facility and the staff must take care of all or many other aspects of logistics such as food purchase and preparation. It is believed our procedure is more desirable and permits the staff to be totally involved with their ministry which is the program and providing opportunities for growth in each individual youngster.

It is believed relevant to note that our applications to attend St. George's are always greater than we have space and a waiting list is complied. As noted above, some camp operations only utilitize 34% of their capacity in the 1978 season.

While the per day cost of the camping program for the youth

of our Diocese is greater, it is believed the program which is made available and presented clearly is worth the additional cost involved.

Members of the tour group were very impressed with our camp facilities and it was our (Diocesan Representatives) belief that Shrine Mont and Massenetta Springs have by far the best facilities."

NOTE: A number of other denominational representatives expressed the desire to have a similar set-up as Shrine Mont wherein the Program Director would not have responsibility for facility repair and maintenance.

After assessing the information available to the Executive Board from various sources, the Board concludes that:

1) The relationship between Shrine Mont and the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee and its several programs has developed to the point where there is a strong working relationship between the groups.

2) Shrine Mont does in fact offer reduced rates of room and board to the Camps and Conferences sponsored by the Diocese of Virginia in the amount of \$6.00 per camper per day.

3) It is believed that a further reduction by Shrine Mont in its rates to the Camps and Conferences programs is not economically feasible. (In 1979 Shrine Mont subsidized 5,688 camper days at \$6.00 per camper day or a total of \$34,128.00).

4) The programs sponsored through the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee apparently meets the needs of the people of our Diocese better than others as witnessed by a 96% fill in comparison with a low of 35% for other camps and their programs.

5) It is believed that the structure in which we operate wherein a Program Director is responsible for program and not facilities is by far the superior method.

6) The purposes of the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee, will continue to offer meaningful programs to the people of our Diocese in the most effective and economical manner possible.

7) The Executive Board, through its Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee, will continue to offer meaningful programs to the people of our Diocese in the most effective and economical manner possible.

8) The Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee is directed to make known on their application forms, the actual cost of each program compared to the tuition charge. The chart for 1980 is as follows:

CAMPS, CONFERENCES, AND YOUTH MINISTRIES COMMITTEE OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

During 1979, the programs coordinated by the Camps, Conferences, and Youth Ministries Committee of the Executive Board expanded and provided Christian living experiences for a larger number of youths and adults within our Diocese. The increase was from 546 in 1978 to 910 in 1979, an increase of 67.58%. The programs are planned to serve 1,280 in 1980, or a further increase of 40.6%.

The programs included those which have previously been held at Shrine Mont such as St. George's Camp for 9-15 year olds; Wilderness Odyssey backpacking and canoe expeditions for teens and adults; Choir Camp for 10-15 year olds; and the Shrine Mont Conference for all ages. In addition, new programs were formally instituted which included the Diocesan Youth Conference at Shrine Mont in July and the Diocesan Youth Weekend at Shrine Mont in October. The other new programs included weekend canoe and backpacking trips during the Spring and Fall months, "Happening" week-ends and Youth Advisor Workshops.

The Committee considers the work of the Directors of the programs and their staff personnel to have been outstanding. Their efforts resulted in a positive experience with spiritual growth and many learning opportunities for the participants taking part.

Experience has shown that program information and tuition costs must be distributed very early in the calendar year in order that families and persons interested in taking part may make necessary decisions. During 1979 the literature and information regarding the programs was distributed in January with tuition costs stated although the Annual Diocesan Council had not as yet approved our requested funding assistance. Pre-registrations during 1979 were made at a much earlier date than in previous years. It should be noted that communicants of the Diocese are given preference for space only until March 15. Literature regarding the 1980 programs and tuition costs is scheduled for distribution in early January 1980. As suggested by the Executive Board, the tuition costs set out in such materials are identified as tentative and subject to change pending final approval of the budget at the Annual Diocesan Council.

The committee has continued to develop resources for week-end back-packing and canoe expeditions during the Spring and Fall Months as desired and requested by individual parish groups. As reported last year, members of the summer staff of the Wilderness Odyssey program have been available to assist in such events and serve as resource persons and coordinate use of Diocesan equipment.

During 1979 a total of 8 weekend events were scheduled from 7 parishes with a total of 92 persons participating. In the work with the Youth Ministries section, 3 "Happening" Weekends were held with a total of 150 persons being involved, 42 young people attended the first Youth Weekend, and 46 adults attended two Youth Group Advisor Workshops that trained them to work with youth groups. Two additional new programs will be implemented during 1980 at Shrine Mont. The first will be The Arts Camp which will consist of three one-week sessions for youngsters 8-10; 11-12; and 13-15 years of age. These sessions will develop skills and knowledge using artistic expression in a variety of art media as a vehicle to build a community of worship and activity. The second new program for 1980 will be a one-week camp experience for hearing impaired youngsters. This will be an ecumenical endeavor with the Roman Catholic Diocese of Richmond. The camp will be held at Shrine Mont with a first enrollment set at 25.

In connection with long range plans and in view of the potential represented by the recent purchase of additional land and facilities at Orkney Springs, the Committee has started work on a "needs survey". During the survey, which will be completed during early 1980, ideas, dreams, and comments will be solicited from a random number of individuals throughout the Diocese. An evaluation of the results should provide the Committee with guidance for program considerations in our future long range planning.

ALTERNATIVES FOR CHILDREN IN TROUBLE (ACT)

The purpose for the ACT Committee was spelled out in 1978 when the Executive Board of the Diocese of Virginia was charged by the 183rd Annual Council to:

- Establish an appropriate committee of the Executive Board to be charged with a continuing oversight in the whole area of support to children in trouble.
- 2) Establish in cooperation with the Committee a part-time professional coordinator position. The person to fill this position should be knowledgeable of Federal and State laws as well as funding available from these sources, and to coordinate and provide staff support to the efforts of regions and churches in support of children in trouble.

The 184th Annual Council provided in its 1979 budget \$12,990 for the ACT Committee for work in these areas. Also, in October of 1979 ACT was notified that the \$5,000.00 loan made to the Virginia Council of Churches in 1978 had been repaid and credited to the Committee's Account.

Personal support and funds provided through this committee have helped literally hundreds of children throughout the Diocese of Virginia. The Committee has taken care to investigate thoroughly all project proposals which have come before it. It has sought to educate itself on how the Church might best work in cooperation with state and governmental agencies in this area. The Committee has encouraged regional support whenever possible.

Two grants which were given in 1978 required further study and action in 1979 because the purposes for which the funds were granted had been changed by those who sought the grants. In both cases the changes were supported and approved by the committee and the Executive Board. These grants were:

 To Region II for a children's home in Gloucester or Northern Neck area -- \$2,500.

Under this change the grant will help enable Gloucester County to participate in the use of neighboring counties' group homes and treatment facilities.

2) To Region IV to help FOLD relocate its Interim House \$3,000.

FOLD is a non-profit corporation which now operates five residential facilities for children in trouble and has helped several hundred children since its first facility was opened in 1969. This grant will help FOLD to relocate its short-term group shelter, Interim House, into a newer facility in an environment which will allow for a "family setting" and, therefore, contribute to better treatment for the children.

This year a number of alternatives have been considered and four (4) projects have been given financial support. A summary of the 1979 grants is shown below: Grant to Virginia Council of Churches Emergency Foster Care Program (VEFC) \$2,000.00

This program initiated by the VCC in cooperation with other religious bodies, and state and private agencies, is to provide short-term foster care for children in Virginia. Presently they are in the process of determining needs and resources, as well as the establishing of a training manual for foster parents. Their goal is to recruit and train 500 families in churches and synagogues in Virginia. The grant goes to the operating budget of VEFC.

2) Grant to Virginia Home for Boys \$1,936.00

This program in the Richmond area operated by the Virginia Home for Boys provides short-term emergency care for approximately 12 boys and girl. This grant made to the Virginia Home for Boys Emergency Shelter will cover expenses of mattresses and staff training.

3) To Action in the Community Through Services, Inc. (ACTS) in Dumfries and Manassas \$8,000.00

The Rev'd Peter Gray of this organization requested \$8,000 through Region VI to match \$12,000 from other sources to provide start-up costs for a home for girls in trouble in Woodbridge. The home would house 12-14 teenage girls for several months while more permanent arrangements can be made. Applications have been made by the Rev'd Gray for state and federal funds for continued support and operation of the home.

4) To Community Attention for Community Resource Coordinator in Charlottesville \$1,500.00

Community attention is a branch of the Department of Social Services which provides a range of therapeutic residential treatment services for youth. Our grant will help fund a Community Resource Person who together with volunteer staff will provide recreational programs, vocational programs, and will support ancillary schools for troubled youth.

The four above proposals recommended by the ACT Committee and approved by the Executive Board total \$13,436.

The 1980 proposals are shown below:

Part-time coordinator for ACT	\$ 7,500.
Sustaining funds to VCC's VEFC	2,500.
Seed money support to regional projects	20,000.
Total needed in 1980	\$30,000.

It is the conviction of the ACT Committee that by providing both leadership and necessary funding to meet existing needs in our Diocese that we are providing alternatives for children in trouble.

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COMMISSION ON MINISTRY

The Commission on Ministry of the Diocese of Virginia advises the Bishop and the Standing Committee in selecting persons for ordination. It has been charged by the Diocesan Council to develop and encourage lay ministries within this Diocese.

The Commission's membership consists of six clergy and six lay persons, assisted by the Secretary to the Bishop, the Coordinator for the Deacons' Training Program and the Archdeacon of the Diocese.

Nineteen seventy-nine was a significant year for the Commission:

1) That amalgam of canonical, educational and diocesan requirements for ordination known as the "Process" has advanced to the point where persons who entered it a few years ago are now ready for ordination. Under normal circumstances, it takes three and a half years for a person accepted as a postulant to be ordained as a deacon. Because many persons of widely diverse backgrounds, ages and expectations find themselves called to the ordained ministry of Jesus Christ at different times in their lives, it is difficult to establish or maintain a common procedure applicable to all persons at all times. The goal of the "Process" then, is to select suitable persons for ordained ministry and to assist them in fulfilling the necessary requirements, keeping in mind each individual situation. This year there has been some difficulty maintaining the integrity of the selection procedure and at the same time, responding to the many requests for individual variation of the steps to ordaination. In each such case, the Commission attempts to reconcile its inclination for order with its expectation of a genuine movement of the Spirit.

2) Last year's Council gave the Commission the responsibility of developing lay ministries in the Diocese. To that end, the Commission appointed a Committee on the Ministry of the Laity which is chaired by Janet McGuire. That committee has already begun to organize and plan the Total Ministry Conference. It is currently exploring various outreach methods to make baptized persons aware of their own ministries in Jesus Christ.

3) The Theological Education by Extension Program of the University of the South at Sewanee, Tennessee is growing rapidly. There are already over 29 TEE groups throughout the Diocese. Several groups are entering their fourth year of the program.

While many persons are offering themselves for the ordained ministry, the Church cannot neglect its duty to recruit the people it needs as its clergy. This is especially true in black and hispanic communities. Rectors and vestries play a vital role in identifying persons who may be called to ordination. Those who know an applicant best are in a unique position to help distinguish God's call to Holy Orders from his call to other, equally important, ministries.

In 1979, eight persons were ordained deacon. Currently there are 17 persons in the Process attending Seminary.

As we enter 1980, the Commission is faced with several areas of obvious concern. One of these is the apparent shortage of fulltime parish jobs for graduating seminarians. The problem is especially acute in the placement of women deacons and priests. The quality of our clergy tomorrow is not unrelated to the jobs available to our graduating seminarians today. Continuing diocesan support, both personal and financial, is essential to develop the clergy the church will need.

The Commission on Ministry asks your prayers for its work in the coming year.

REPORT

EXAMINING CHAPLAINS

In 1979, the Examing Chaplains have worked toward integrating our task more effectively with the entire ordination process, particularly in our relationship with the Commission on Ministry and Deacons Training Program. We have made significant progress in improving the overall coordination and communication between these three functions. For example: our meeting with the deacons to determine their assignment during their deaconate included their supervisors, a representative from the Commission on Ministry, and the director of the Deacons Training Program. By this procedure, we were able to outline an assignment that would fulfill the specific concerns of the Examining Chaplains and be helpful to the deacon in his parish church.

Outlined below is a detailed description of our work under the heading of TASK and PROCESS:

TASK:

1) The primary responsibility of the Examing Chaplains of the Diocese is to receive and consider the General Ordination Examinations of those Candidates preparing for Holy Orders. It is the Board's task to suggest to the Bishop, Commission on Ministry, and Director of the Deacons Training Program, the candidates's degree of academic readiness and to recommend areas of study and ministry to be worked on during the Diaconate as reflected in those exams.

2) The General Ordination Examinations are read in hopes of discerning whether or not the candidate (1) has sufficient acquaintance with the academic discipline of a theological education and a sense of those resources available to him/her, and (2) that the student has demonstrated an ability to link that academic content with the practice of ministry.

3) An additional task of the Committee is to be available to the Director of the Deacons Training Program to assist in whatever way is consistent with the program to help deacons in the program as they prepare for ordination to the priesthood.

4) It is our understanding of the task before us that after reading the examinations, we will be in a position to recommend ways in which the candidate might fill any gaps in his theological preparation and do some on-going work in linking theology to the practice of ministry. We do not see ourselves as called upon to either pass or fail. We are working on the assumption that the candidate is moving towards ordination to the Diaconate and that we have the opportunity to be of help to him in that process.

PROCESS:

1) Each candidate's GOE will be read thoroughly by two Board members and discussed with the other members. At that time we expect to determine the candidates academic readiness and to identify those areas of concern in linking theology to the practical and personal diminisions of ministry. We will suggest fruitful areas for continuing education which can later be incorporated in a specific assignment or project for completion by February of the diaconate year.

2) Evaluation of the candidates for the diaconate will be done as soon as possible following receipt of the GOE's. Unless a serious deficiency is found, certification will be made in April for ordination with the understanding that an assignment will be completed during their diaconate should they remain in the Diocese.

3) Any deacons placed in our Diocese who metriculate from another Diocese will be urged to participate in a special assignment as are the other deacons. Notification of their completed assignment upon completion will be made to their Bishop.

4) Determination of assignments during the diaconate will involve two steps:

a) After determination of placement, a meeting will be held with the chairman of COM and director of the Deacons Training Program together with the Deacons and Supervisors to outline the nature and scope of the assignment. This meeting will serve the purpose of integrating the work of the Board and its specific recommendation with that of the Deacons Training Program and COM. Effort will be made to avoid duplication of effort or create unnecessary conflicts.

b) The Board's recommendation will be finalized by a personal meeting of the deacon with one of the Board members who will be responsible to follow the assignment through and make a final evaluation to the Board. Should there be questions raised which need further attention or disappointments over the deacon's work, these will be passed on to the Bishop and the deacon advised accordingly. A copy of this report will go to the deacons also.

5) Certification for ordination to the priesthood will be made in writing to the Bishop in April by the chairman with the evaluation of the candidate attached thereto.

BISHOP'S LITURGICAL COMMISSION REPORT TO THE ANNUAL COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

The Bishop's Liturgical Committee of the Diocese has been particularly busy this past year carrying forward its duties of planning and conducting the worship services at the annual council meeting of the Diocese, conducting workshops in music and liturgy, and acting as consultant to parishes and regions. In addition, this past year the committee had representatives present at General Convention in Denver to act as consultants to our deputies, and a representative attended the national meeting of Diocesan Liturgical Committees in Albuquerque.

The first program of the committee this past year was the conduct of worship at the annual Council meeting at the Sheraton in Reston. For the first time, a concerted effort was made to transform a convention hall meeting room into a worship space and thanks to the innovative designs of Mrs. Adelaide Winstead with lighting and staging assistance from Bruce and Kathy MacAlister, this objective was happily achieved. In the process of designing vestments for Bishop Hall, Mrs. Winstead created a new white garment to be worn over Bishop Hall's new purple cassock, and this garment has proven itself both attractive and versatile this past year.

The committee was happy to act as a co-sponsor for a workshop in Hymns Three conducted November 11, 1979 at St. Paul's Church in Richmond by Mr. Raymond Glover, a member of the committee and a member of the Standing Commission on Church Music. This workshop attracted over one hundred clergy and musicians from the Diocese of Southern Virginia and the Diocese of Virginia.

Another music conference is scheduled at Roslyn May 4-7, 1980 featuring Marilyn Kaiser, well known specialist in the development of parish music programs from North Carolina.

It has been particularly gratifying this past year to see the spirit with which most of the clergy and congregations of this Diocese have entered into the transition to a new prayer book. The real relationship between liturgical and spiritual renewal has helped many parishioners discover a new vitality in the worship expression of their Christian faith within the Episcopal, tradition. Members of the committee stand ready to meet with clergy, worship committees or congregations in any way possible in order to assist in this transition in those places where it is still in process.

While attention has naturally focused on the adoption of the Prayer Book 1979 this past year, congregations should pay particular attention to the publication of several works by the Standing Commission on Church Music. The <u>BOOK OF CANTICLES</u> includes settings contemporary and traditional for both Rite One and Rite Two Morning and Evening Prayer. Hymns III includes a wide variety of additional traditional hymns for occasions and seasons not adequately covered by the Hymnal 1940. <u>Hymns IV</u> includes a selection of the most popular and theologically sound hymns growing from the renewal movement within the church. Also published at the end of 1979, and of great value to clergy, is THE BOOK OF OCCASIONAL SERVICES.

Finally it needs to be pointed out again that the process of liturgical renewal has forced worship leaders to question decisions long taken for granted ranging from such minor matters as how and when to extinguish altar candles to such major concerns as the type of bread used at the altar. One such major issue which needs constant re-examination is the place of the Eucharist in Sunday worship. Our tradition of Morning Prayer in this Diocese extends to the era before the Revolution when there were far fewer clergy than parishes! It is hoped that clergy and worship committees throughout the Diocese will question their own Sunday morning practices as they become familiar with the rich heritage in the new Prayer Book, will rediscover the centrality of the Eucharist as that worship distinctive of Christians. Provision is made in the new Prayer Book, for example, to use Morning Prayer with its familiar canticles, versicles and responses and collects as the Liturgy of the Word preceding Holy Communion.

Surely there are an infinite number of solutions, but clearly the fruit of the liturgical movement of the past decade will lead us to ask some searching questions about what we do when we gather together to worship God.

THE ECUMENICAL COMMITTEES AND OFFICERS

The Diocesan Ecumenical Committee has continued its work in the Diocese and is fulfilling its task as a link in the ecumenical network which reaches from the national Executive Council to the individual parishes. Regional representatives take active part in this network. This year we received strong support and encouragement from the evident interest of General Convention in this subject.

Because of the Diocese's involvement in VIM this year, we decided not to hold a workshop. We commend the broad basis of VIM and its criteria for shared concern with other denominations.

The Committee thanks last Annual Council for approving our budget of \$1,000.

The Virginia Council of Churches (VCC) Joint Conference of Ecumenical Commissions of major denominations in the State has become an important annual occasion. It is unique - the only one held in any State as far as we can tell. This year we met, overnight, at St. Joseph's Villa, Richmond, and heard two addresses on <u>Visible Unity</u> by Dr. Gerald Moede, United Methodist and General Secretary of the Consultation on Church Union. These, and the discussions which followed were informative and stimulating.

The Ecumenical Officers attended the Annual Meeting of the Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical Officers and the National Workshop on Christian Unity in Birmingham, Ala. This conference is important for Episcopalians and other ecumenists. We have also attended meetings of the officers of the Third Province, which Phebe coordinates.

This Diocesan Committee has met five times during the year. The sixth meeting was cancelled in the interest of stewardship of gasoline, time and money.

We have regretfully said goodbye to: The Rev'd Edwin Williams on his retirement (Region 1), to the Rev'd William Brook on his moving to Southern Ohio (Region 14), and to the Rev'd Allen Brown, who served on our Staff Liaison. Allen was always most helpful, encouraging and innovative. We shall greatly miss him. We express our deep appreciation of his gifts and dedication to the task of Christian reconciliation. We wish him well in his new parish in Florida.

We welcome a new member-at-large of the Committee. Dr. Cynthia Wedel. She will be the keynote speaker at the VCC Conference in October, the theme will be "Affirmation for Action." Another colleague will be the Rev'd Dr. William Weiler, National Associate Ecumenical Officer, who heads the Episcopal Church's Office in Washington. He lives in Virginia, and assists at St. George's, Arlington. He has special expertise in Christian-Jewish relations.

A special occasion is being planned for next fall. We hope that many will attend. A joint Anglican/Roman Catholic conference for the whole State will take place on October 25th. We have a joint planning group from the three Episcopal dioceses and the two Roman Catholic dioceses. The distinguished keynoter will Father Herbert Ryan, SJ, a member of both A/RCIC and A/RC in the U.S. $\ensuremath{\mathsf{V}}$

Your Committee's concern is to help each Region and parish in the Diocese to have a lively appreciation of our Lord's prayer for unity and to do all we can to implement its fulfillment, through spiritual and practical opportunities that arise, or that we can initiate. We hope that they will be enabled to do this by the leaderships. For instance, do they all have seat, voice and vote at Regional Councils? We congratulate the Regions who are developing a number of exciting shared programs.

We welcome the Rev'ds Alfred and Leonora Tisdale, our two Presbyterian ministers in Louisa. It is our sincere wish that they will be given seat, voice and we hope, vote at this Council.

Please call on your ecumenical officers in the Regions as well as both of us to help you, and to let us know what you are doing in this field.

THE DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATORS

D. A. C. E.

Now four years old, the Diocesan Association of Christian Educators (DACE) evolved from a series of meetings called by the Venerable Milton R. LeRoy, S.T.M., Archdeacon of the Diocese. Clergy and lay Christian educators from throughout the Diocese took part in the meetings, which responded to a recommendation of the Standing Committee that serious attention be given to the entire scope of Christian education in the Diocese.

DACE has grown quickly out of the desire to define the special Christian education needs of churches and to identify the resources which can assist regions and churches in their educational tasks. DACE members - clergy and laypersons, professionals and non-professionals, salaried church workers and volunteers - meet monthly in Fredericksburg to (1) share needs, concerns and ideas in the field of Christian education; (2) organize and use skills present inside and outside the group to develop programs, conferences, and trained teams to help interested regions and churches; and (3) provide stimulus and motivation for the improvement of Christian education throughout the Diocese.

DACE holds annual week-long Christian education conferences at sites such as Shenandoah Conservatory, Roslyn and Shrinemont, each attended by about 100 clergy and lay readers in the field of Christian education. The 1979 conference, which featured Christian education expert John Westerhoff, received Diocesan support. DACE also sponsors occasional smaller conferences, such as the one on "The Small Parish" held at St. John Vianney Seminary in Richmond in April, 1979.

The principal ongoing resource made available by DACE to regions and churches in the Diocese is its traveling education teams. These teams, comprised of clergy and laypersons with broad experience in such areas as church school and adult education, problem-solving and decision-making, program planning, curriculum, educational materials, and communications, can help parish churches with nearly any educational concern.

Team members, under the general direction of the Rev'd James Henry of St. Paul's, Alexandria, respond to requests for assistance by (1) helping to "diagnose" educational problems by means of surveys and/or prior consultations with parish clergy and lay leadership; (2) assisting with the design of educational programs to help resolve the defined problem; (3) presenting, where requested, special classes, discussion sessions, planning seminars, or workshops which help meet the "diagnosed" problem; and (4) aiding in the evaluation of the effectiveness of the programs which are presented, and in recommending future activities. The teams can also help parish churches with needs which are not directly related to their educational programs, but which do involve education of their clergy and lay leaders in special areas, such as communications skills, leadership, parish planning and women's programs.

Undergirding DACE activities are the efforts of its Nurture and

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Support Committee, which develops programs for monthly DACE meetings "which encourage mutual support of members and events which are educationally and motivationally enriching." The committee, co-chaired by Ms. Louisa Sheets and Ms. Jeanette Yarus, scheduled 1979 programs on "Faith Development -Implications for Baptism, First Communion and Confirmation," "Values in Spiritual Development: On Not X-ing Out Our Problems," "Saturday Morning" (on youth work), new approaches to Bible study, and other topics.

The current DACE coordinator is Ms. Nancy L. Warman. Other committee chairpersons are Ms. Claire Fulghum, Conference, and the Rev'd Stan Ramsey, Communications. DACE welcomes the participation of any churches or individuals with a serious interest in Christian education in the Diocese of Virginia.

B L O O M F I E L D I N C O R P O R A T E D

Bloomfield continues to grow in quality care for children. Karen Collins, M.Ed. continues as Executive Director, with Virginia Kelsey, Diana Luebbert, PNP; and Bill Percy as Business Administrator, Clinical Supervisor and Child Care Coordinator, respectively. This solid staff represents the resource network from which and to which the direct child care staff relate and manage the various programs of care. Bloomfield has reduced overall staff turnover from over 30% to approximately 12% per year, significantly better than the national average for residential child care workers.

All children in residence are individually integrated into each of our component programs; their plans of care designed to facilitate their highest potential for achievement. The following is a brief comment on the progress and development of each of our program areas:

Educational: 80% of our children have been mainstreamed from on-site classrooms to community-based public schools. The school placements include children in elementary, middle and high schools ranging in programs from regular academic education to special education (*trainably and educably mentally retarded*) to programs of vocational education. We have qualified tutors and educational consultants both on our paid staff as well as student interns and graduate practicum students.

Socialization and Recreation: Karen Collins has worked with our local City and County Departments of Parks & Recreation toward the development of recreational programs for the handicapped and a pilot program of scheduled, supervised activities is now underway. Although we also enjoy various on-site recreational activities such as minature golf, adaptive hockey and soccer, board games, backgammon, etc., our recreational space is severely limited and children's activities sorely restricted in inclement weather. We hope for indoor recreation areas in the future in which physical therapy may also be done.

<u>Pre-Vocational</u>: The development of this program over the past year has done much to support Bloomfield's philosophy of child care development toward maximum independence and self esteem. Many community resources are utilized to bring our residents into contact with others in a positive and rewarding manner. For example, we have children enrolled in MRS Night College, participating in Girl Scouts in a local troop, shopping for their school supplies, managing and budgeting their allowances, planning special outings and parties, attending U. of Virginia cultural and theatrical programs, etc. This year many of the children are planning and implementing their Christmas celebrations, vacation plans and shopping. These are great strides toward goal achievement.

Transportation: The March of Dimes contributed \$1,000 toward the purchase of a new and much needed van. We have purchased Handi-Ramps to comply with licensure and to facilitate safe loading and unloading of children. The position of driver is now full time as he is kept busy with numerous trips to and from clinics, medical appointments, therapy, school events, etc.

We hope to work with the area planning district to develop a master plan for transportation which, if equipped for wheelchairs, may ease our burden and expense.

<u>Medical</u>: The full time clinical assistance of a Licensed <u>Practical</u> Nurse has enabled our Clinical Supervisor to expand her professional role into the area of Pediatric Nurse Practitioner. This will enable her to identify and manage common illnesses in children, under the supervision of a Medical Doctor. We will be better equipped to handle children with more involved physical problems.

<u>Counseling</u>: Bloomfield has expanded its counseling service to include family counseling with parents of youngsters in care, group counseling with terminally ill children, fellowship groups, training of child care staff in counseling skills, and of course we continue adjustment counseling on a one-to-one basis.

Our limited water supply has now become critical. Two new wells failed to produce sufficiently so we're engaged in a project to connect with the county's supply which will require an initial outlay of some \$15,000 to \$20,000 additionally. We find we must reduce our evacuation time in fire drills from 9 minutes to under 4, or extend the sprinkler system to other unprotected areas. As reported in previous years, we continue to be without the financial flexibility to provide residency to children outside the Welfare system. There are at least five children presently on our waiting list, and will remain so until alternative funds are available. They are children of middle income families who are not financially able to afford Bloomfield's rate, yet not impoverished enough to qualify for Welfare, or public assistance. It is a tragic discrepancy.

Bloomfield has had a significant turnover of children this year. Since May four of our children have been placed in private homes (this is the trend in child care nationally). Five new children have been admitted to Bloomfield since then to offset our loss. The four children we lost were among our independent residents, whereas those admitted are among the most dependent. This has been the nature of our referrals and has dictated a change in our staffing patterns as well as our staff-to-child ratio. We continue to emphasize development of maximum potential for self sufficiency and self esteem, and to accept children for whom these goals are reasonable.

We hope to receive increased support from indivduals, organizations and churches within the Diocese, that through this help we may gain the flexibility and strength to preserve the integrity and credibility of our philosophy.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON HUMAN SEXUALITY TO THE 185TH ANNUAL COUNCIL

The Commission has met four times in this past year. Its first task was to study and discuss materials in the field of human sexuality produced either for or by The General Convention 1979. Copies of the Report of the Standing Commission on Health and Human Affairs and of the General Convention Resolution on the ordination of homosexuals were provided each member for review. After a long and thorough discussion of these two documents, the Commission arrived at a concensus that each person seeking ordination should be regarded as an individual and that if his or her sexual orientation or practices created problems in the light of the General Convention resolution, the matter should be handled pestorally.

The Commission understands one of its tasks to be the planning and executing of educational programs in human sexuality to be presented in the form of one day workshops or longer conferences on the Diocesan level and to be offered to the various parishes for inclusion in their own educational programs. To this end the Commission calls Council's attention again to the bibliography published at the end of the Commission's Report to the 184th Council and recommends in addition two books recently studied by the Commission. They are "Sexuality, The Bible and Science" by Stephen Sapp and "The Homosexual and the Church" by Richard Lovelace. The Commission has just begun work on another highly recommended book entitled "Embodiment" by James H.'Nelson. A questionnaire on sexuality prepared by the Commission on Human Sexuality of the Diocese of Los Angeles and published in their Diocesan newspaper has also been reviewed by the Commission.

There are other issues in the field of human sexuality which need attention by the Church. Mrs. Nancy Van Scoyoc met with the Commission in November and made an excellent presentation on her work with Women in Transition. In her talk and in the discussion which resulted from it these concerns were addressed: 1. the present blocks to womens' full participation in leadership roles in the Church; 2. the relationship of a patriarchal religion to the actual psychic and social self-image of women; 3. the additional stresses and strains experienced by women as they move back into the work force; 4. the Church's message, or lack of one, to divorced men and women who are moving back into the dating scene.

The Church, at least in its Biblical and theological understanding recognizes sexuality, maleness and femaleness, as the gift of God. Each member of the Church struggles to understand the power, the dimension and the responsibility implicit in that gift. At present that struggle takes place within the framework of a larger community which increasingly sees sexuality generally in exploitive and hedonistic terms which tend to dehumanize persons. The more Christians seek to live into the mystery of sexuality and to order their own use of its powers in a loving and responsible way, the more the Church will be seen to offer a true alternative to the distorted view of sexuality now so widely taken for granted.

The Chairman expresses his personal appreciation to the members of the Commission for their faithful and responsible work through the past year. They are:

Plea for Chaplain

The Director of Corrections recently requested additional chaplains for the new prisons in Virginia. Mr. T. Don Hutto, Director, expressed an urgent need for chaplains at Mecklenburg, Staunton, and Deep Meadow Correctional Centers. These new prisons have opened during the past four years and Chaplain Service has been unable to provide chaplains because of a lack of funds.

Superintendents at St. Brides and Bland Correctional Centers have requested expanded programs at these state prisons. These two prisons now have only part-time chaplains.

Prisons Explode

During the past four years, the number of prisoners in Virginia prisons has increased by <u>one-third</u>! Five new prisons have opened during the past four years. Additionally, existing prisons have more prisoners and new units.

No More Chaplains

With this drastic increase in the number of prisoners and prisons, Chaplain Service has been unable to expand its staff because of the lack of funds. Denominational support has not increased to help meet this new challenge for the churches of Virginia.

60 Years of Service

Since 1920, the Diocese of Virginia has sponsored this vital Christian mission. The Diocese supports this ministry to 8,000 adults and 1,000 children in state correctional institutions. Nineteen denominational groups join the Diocese in providing 8 full-time and 8 part-time chaplains in the 41 state prisons and 7 juvenile institutions scattered across the state.

It Is Desperate!

Prisoners, prison administrators and families of prisoners are begging for additional chaplains! The need is enormous. The call to Christians is clear! How shall we respond?

It is not possible for the Chaplain Service staff to minister to 2,000 additional prisoners in 5 new prisons. Our staff is the same size as it was in 1976! With the new prisoners and prisons, more is required of Christians in Virginia.

1980 BUDGET REQUEST to THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA from CHAPLAIN SERVICE of the CHURCHES OF VIRGINIA, INC.

Request for 1980 -- \$18,000

During the past four years, the Diocese of Virginia has given the following support to Chaplain Service:

1976	-	\$10,000
1977	-	\$10,000
1978	-	\$10,000
1979	-	\$11,500

During the past four years:

- the prison population has increased more than one-third! and
- inflation has increased more than one-third.!

The request for 1980 reflects only these two increases! Chaplain Service has the same number of chaplains today that it had in 1976. However, there are five new prisons that have opened during the past 4 years and

2000 more prisoners.

Two new prisons have no chaplain; Mecklenburg and Staunton Correctional Centers. Each has more than 300 prisoners. Deep Meadow Correctional Center has more than 300 prisoners and has a chaplain a couple hours a week.

Bland Correctional Center has about 500 prisoners and has a Chaplain only one and one-half days a week!

With additional support, the four prisons above will be given additional chaplaincy coverage. Additional Chaplains are imperative if we are to provide a ministry to the increased number of prisoners in Virginia.

REPORT OF CHURCH SCHOOLS IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

This Fall, one of the remaining three members of the Board of Trustees who have "perpetual succession" on the Board wrote to Bishop Hall saying that he believed it was time he stepped down as a Trustee -- after 35 years service. Bishop Robert F. Gibson, Jr., who had been "President" (which office now has become "Chairman") of the Board over a fifteen year period, from 1960 until his retirement as Bishop in 1974, said that Church Schools would always receive his personal support and prayers, but that his present pattern of life kept him from taking an active role in Board affairs.

Church Schools' Minutes reflect, in part, the Board's appreciation for his many contributions to our Schools over the years:

In accepting the resignation with regret and expressed thanks for Bishop Gibson's significant service to the Board in the past, the Committee could not help be reminded that from the days when he had been on the faculty of the Seminary, he had been a firm supporter and promoter of Church Schools. Bishop Gibson had shown profound understanding of the relationship between the Christian faith and education, and had been able to articulate the place of education in the mission of the Church. He had shown great spiritual insight in guiding the Schools through the period of desegregation, reflecting his commitment to that goal as well as sympathetic understanding of those who found it difficult to accept the process. Those who knew him well were aware of his abiding and deep concern for and interest in each one of the School Heads.

Some very interesting things are going on in our Schools, as some of you may know. I might point out a few of the significant mentionables:

Few of you will be aware that last Spring, St. Agnes School received a letter from the College Board in special recognition of the achievement of this year's Senior class, more than 30% of whom had scored in the upper 5% nationally of those taking the National Merit Achievement qualifying tests. Not many of you have had an opportunity to hear the witness and enthusiastic approval of the college sophomores who return to St. Christopher's School at Christmas to evaluate with the education committee of the Board how well they have been prepared for their varied college experiences by that School. For those of you who have heard it, you know how persuasive the Headmaster of Christchurch can be about his personal, educational, and Christian commitment to serving a type of student that our other Schools cannot--in special ways and with a different educational mission. I have said on several occasions how miraculous and splended is the educational operation of St. Margaret's School which, according to all the sensible NAIS studies of "efficient boarding school size" simply "could not continue to exist." Most of you here will be aware of the remarkable spirit and fortitude of the determined development program which has gone on continuously at

st. Stephen's School since 1960, building, expanding, changing, and challenging--as if the School and its educational programs operated on the biological principle of binary fission. A handful of you will have had the privilege of reading Allen Becker's opening remarks to his faculty at the start of the school year: impressive and articulate, yes--but clearly a significant new emphasis and departure for St. Catherine's in a new era. And have you heard Bill deColigny on the subject of St. Anne's-Belfield recently? In scarcely five months he has managed to convince an aggressive Board of the educational wisdom that the shaping of programs always precedes the question of facilities, that the School should think in terms of more than tripling the amount of money raised during the year, that the School's assets contain a rich heritage and an expanding future to celebrate and join in.

In addition, of course, there are other things about Church Schools which are interesting and remarkable (in whichever sense of that word you may choose): I think of one loyal, long-term Trustee who said to the Governing Board of his School that it was unlikely he would ever come to an understanding of how Church Schools work. On one occasion I can remember the awkardness of having to remind some of our Heads that if indeed I was an ex-officio member of their Board of Governors, the Board would have to be informed of it. Surely I have mentioned to you that moment when I came to give my annual report to the Council of the Diocese of Virginia; whereupon, it became clear that I had no seat, no voice, and no vote in Council. (Fortunately, that time has passed along with the era in which our Schools had no vote in matters which directly affected the future governance of each institution.)

We have two new Heads of our Schools this year who bring with them distinguished experience in education: Dr. Allen W. Becker at St. Catherine's and Dr. William G. deColigny at St. Anne's-Belfield. Five of our Schools started this year with a different chaplain (St. Catherine's, St. Margaret's, St. Agnes, Christchurch, and St. Anne's-Belfield), four of whom have come to us from the parish, three of whom are women priests. This is St. Agnes' first year in many that they are fortunate enough to afford a full-time chaplain. Happily, the student enrollment has also increased in our Schools. (St. Anne's-Belfield up 11%) despite the clear drop nationally in the numbers of school-aged children.

Bishop Hall continues to give us his personal support, direction, and encouragement as Chairman of the Board. In his first full year as President of the Trustees, Doctor Thomas N. P. Johns has given more time, energy, and clear leadership than anyone could possibly expect or thank him for. In this my fifth year as Dean I am most grateful to acknowledge Church Schools' indebtedness to them both.

As I have said in the past, activities among each of our Schools are too numerous to report on or summarize fairly in such a report. Therefore the following brief paragraphs will have to suffice as an indication of the variety and vitality of opportunities and events offered among our Schools.

226. St. Catherine's School - Allen W. Becker, Headmaster

Under the leadership of its new headmaster, Dr. Allen W. Becker, St. Catherine's School has continued its development in those areas described in earlier Council reports. A new Fine Arts - Lower School building is nearing completion and will be in full use by this coming year. The Gold and White Fund, which made possible this handsome new facility, has begun its second phase which is focused on the raising of funds for endowments and the remaining capital needs. This year the boarding department was filled by the end of spring and a waiting list established. Total enrollment for 1979-80 exceeds 700 girls.

The cirricular improvements studied by the faculty and recommended by a visiting committee in 1977 will be completed by the end of the current year. Under the guidance of the new chaplain, The Reverend Mary Anthony, a new program of worship has been instituted in the Upper School, and new opportunities for community service are being studied. Other studies being undertaken by the administration and the Board of Governors include expanding the scholarship program, extending the work of the Development and Alumnae Office, and deepening student involvement in the life of the school.

Christchurch School - Louis W. Randall, Headmaster

On January 11, 1979, Christchurch received a grant of \$20,000 from the Edward E. Ford Foundation. The grant is to be used for faculty development, and I believe that this grant is one of the most significant the School has ever received. Using the grant money, we conducted a faculty workshop in March of 1979. The workshop was led by Dr. Crosby Deaton of the Athyn Group, a management consultant firm. The following comments are representative of the faculty's response to this workshop:

"...made us work for a common out put!"

- "...caused me to talk to more people than I have in years!"
- "...showed real sensitivity to some of our frustrations."
- "...felt a spirit of team work...all too rare!"

Again, using the Ford Foundation Grant, we conducted a planning workshop on October 19 & 20, 1979. This workshop was held at the Diocesan center at Roslyn and was attended by members of the Board of Governors as well as representatives from the faculty and administration of the school. Out of this workshop came proposals for task forces to address planning in the following areas: Facilities, Program, Financial Security, and Size and Composition. These proposals were given to the planning committee of the Board of Governors, chaired by Mr. Randolph F. Totten. The planning committee has directed that work proceed in all areas, but has given the highest priority to the improvement of facilities. As a result, the planning committee has recommended that Christchurch undertake a campaign to raise \$2.5 million dollars to construct a new dormitory, upgrade present housing and support facilities, and build an endowment.

St. Stephen's School - The Rev'd Joseph B. Doty, Headmaster

St. Stephen's Episcopal School for Boys, with a student body of 585 students (third through twelth grades) continues to serve the Northern Virginia area by providing sound college preparation with emphasis on the education of the whole boy: physical, mental, and spiritual.

Several events this past year focus on this endeavor: the completion of a badly-needed new athletic field dedicated by Bishop Hall at a splendid ceremony in late 1979; an ongoing, thorough evaluation of all the course work in the School, focusing on the School's unique goals as a Christian institution; school life committees which have highlighted the relationship between what is going on in the student's class work and work of worship; an expansion of the visits of regional clergymen; continuing efforts at providing scholarships to eligible, Episcopal boys in the area; and pursuit of the projected goal to increase the tying together of the activities of local parishes and those of the School.

St. Christopher's School - George J. McVey, Headmaster

The summer program at St. Christopher's once again topped enrollment projections, and the School itself opened its doors in September with the largest enrollment ever, 804 students. Happily, the influx of new students was spread rather evenly throughout the grades and created no real problems as far as space and staff were concerned. This increase in the number of students helped to ward off some of the ravages of inflation, but not all of them.

Through a gift from the Charles S. Luck III family and matching gifts from the corporate sector the School has been able to purchase a computer. This machine has already proven a boon to the academic program and should in time streamline the business and development functions of the School. The development office has added to its staff Mr. Frank T. Hyde. Mr. Hyde, who was with the Bank of Virginia for many years, is working in the area of deferred giving--with great industry and high hopes.

St. Margaret's School - Viola Woolfolk, Headmistress

St. Margaret's School continues to enroll a diverse student body (of whom 75% are boarders and 25% day students) with a wide range of ability levels. Since the School has a firm commitment to the development of each student as a whole person, we find that we must offer strong remedial programs in addition to our regular academic work. We are offering for the second year a remedial program in mathematics and have extended the use of study skills counseling. This year we are seeking to coordinate more closely the academic life and the residential life of our students by the use of group counseling sessions, case conferences and case studies. Our new dean of residents meets weekly with academic administrators to plan for all student activities. We have recently strengthened our program of curricular activities by organizing a photography club and by encouraging student production of one act plays.

Chapel services, community service projects, and discussion groups are important aspects of the religious life of St. Margaret's School. This is a Church School. Our imaginative and committed female chaplain makes the religion classes interesting and relevant. We are pleased to be sharing in the joy of her ordination into the priesthood. Our Chaplain is assisted by a second teacher of religion. The girls attend services at St. John's Church on Sundays and assist in teaching Sunday School. Four all-school Communion Services are held in the chapel on special days. Clergymen from the community regularly contribute to the chapel program. A responsible Chapel Committee plans six weekly services led by staff and students.

St. Agnes School - Robert E. Leipheimer, Headmaster

The Rev'd Margaret E. Phillips, who assumed her duties as Chaplain to St. Agnes this fall, already has become an integral member of the St. Agnes community. Her ministry includes pastoral counseling for students and parents, as well as teaching, chairing the Religion Department, and conducting chapel services.

The School also is very proud of the ten seniors (one-fourth of the class) who have received recognition as Semi-Finalists or recipients of Letter of Commendation from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

This spring and summer will bring two new opportunities for St. Agnes students; a group of seniors, led by Suzanne Babcock of the English Department, will travel to Cambridge University for a special program of studies during the Senior project period; and a number of Upper School girls and their families will participate in a three-week summer exchange program with students and families from L'Institut de l'Assomption in Paris.

Long range plans for improvements in the school's facilities are nearing completion, and the Board of Governors is making excellent progress with the preliminary phases of an ambitious program for capital development.

St. Annes's-Belfield School - William G. de Colingy, Headmaster

Having bid Ham Bishop a fond farewell after his eighteen years of service, St. Anne's-Belfield is experiencing another busy year:

The question of consolidating the two campuses has been defused until May of 1980 when specific recommendations for the next five years will be presented to the Board by the Headmaster. These recommendations will derive from educational goals and objectives establishes during the year by the faculty, staff, parents, and students with the Board.

Meanwhile, the new comingles with the old gracefully. An 11% increase in enrollment spread evenly across grades. Mr. Robert Jackson, formerly a teacher, was appointed Head of the Upper School which now includes a new Middle School (Grades 7 and 8) on the St. Anne's site in existing facilities. Much painting and patching has taken place to restore buildings and grounds, and energy conservation has become a priority with electric and fuel bills posted each month so students and faculty can gauge

progress against inflating prices.

Highlights of the fall included a large reception for the new Headmaster by the Parents' Association and its Auxiliary, a performance of Bach's Contata #140 replete with 60 voices and a twenty-one piece orchestra, winning seasons for all varsity teams including undefeated Varsity Football, and a successful Junior Class Bazaar.

In the Upper School a number of courses were added to the curriculum such as Horticulture, Sociology of Sport, Italian Culture; and offerings in Art and Music were expanded. Plans for a two week early-spring intersession to include trips, camping, and career exploration are under way while student government is being reviewed by student leaders.

An important sense of unity between the two campuses, faculty, staff, and students is evidenced by increased cooperative endeavor and in strong progress within the community toward an ambitious annual giving goal.

HISPANIC MINISTRY

THE EPISCOPAL BOOK STORE, INC.

Incorporated in May 1957, following authorization by the 162nd Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia. Episcopal Book Store, Inc., was chartered (1) "To establish, operate, and maintain a bookstore or bookstores to serve the Diocese of Virginia of the Protestant Episcopal Church and such other dioceses or denominations as may be appropriate, (2) to purchase, publish, prepare, sell and disseminate Episcopal literature, educational and religious supplies and likewise such related items as are found appropriate and acceptable to such purposes.

Our manager, Mrs. Claire Heins, who is trained in Christian Education, as well as others on our staff, provide valuable assistance and counseling in the field of Christian Education. Appropriate literature is exhibited and sold at various conferences and meetings during the year both in Virginia and North Carolina. Substantial mail order business has also been established.

Attractive displays of religious and secular books, teaching materials, Christian jewelry and greeting cards are maintained in the store, which is located in the basement of Mayo House, 110 West Franklin Street, Richmond. These quarters are provided rent-free by the diocese, for which we are grateful.

The operation of Episcopal Book Store, Inc. is supervised by a thirteen member board of directors composed of clerical and lay members, including our manager, Mrs. Heins. Meetings are held monthly, or more frequently, as required, except during the summer months.

Members serve a three year term, and four are rotated off each year, replaced by nominees approved by the annual meeting of the Council of the Diocese.

Episcopal Book Store, Inc. has been granted tax exempt status by the Internal Revenue Service. Many churches, church organizations, members of the clergy and individuals have made contributions to the Book Store. These gifts have been applied toward the reduction of bank debt assumed by the Corporation from the Book Shelf formerly operated by the Department of Christian Education, to the extent that the debt has this year been paid in full.

Sales in the fiscal year ended March 31, 1979 were \$114,808. We are looking for new ways to increase our sales since our walk-in trade continues to drop each year. We have begun supplying items for a shop at St. Stephen's Church and hope to do more of this for other churches.

Our principal objective is to provide efficient, courteous service to the diocese, its churches, clergy and lay people. Your support and suggestions are solicited.

As an ethnic community we are here to stay and with God's grace we are determined to survive as partners of a common ministry and servants of the same Lord.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 1979

1) OUR WEEKLY SCHEDULE includes: a) Holy Eucharist every Sunday. b) Bible Study and Vespers at St. George's in Arlington. c) Bible Study and Service for Noonday followed by lunch at St. Paul's, Bailey's Crossroads. d) Spanish Choir. e) Altar Guild and Acolytes, f) Hispanic Vestry Committee that meets once a month. g) Private Confession is made available upon request and occasionally "Grupo Libertad" and AA Spanish Group meets at St. George's. A weekly page in Spanish is published in the St. George's Banner and monthly in the St. Paul's Newsletter.

2) THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY was again a very well attended celebration with piñata and fiesta after the Mass. Father Samuel Pinzon, Vicar of the Hispanic Episcopal Mission of Washington, D.C. was the preacher.

3) OUR LENT SERIES ON 'VIDAS EJEMPLARES DE LA BIBLIA' brought 40 people to hear presentations by representatives of different Christian traditions: Dr. Bob Adams, professor Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary; Dr. Barbara Izaguirre, Presbyterian layperson; Father Luis Valdivieso, St. Charles Roman Catholic Church in Arlington and Dr. Guillermo Cabera Leiva, Presbyterian Bible Teacher.

4) HISPANIC FESTIVAL at Kalorama Park in Washington. For the first time we participated with a stand that was open for two days. It was a good opportunity to celebrate our heritage, to gain some visibility for our Congregation and to raise funds for our ministry.

5) VISIT OF THE RT. REV'D SUMIO TAKATSU, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of South Central Brazil. He was our guest as preacher and celebrant in a bilingual service (Spanish-Portuguese) at St. George's on June 17th.

6) SHRINE MONT HISPANIC RETREAT for families with emphasis on Christian Education (June 27-July 1). Daily Eucharist and Offices set the tone of the retreat that included classes on Anglicanism, Stewardship, Church History and Evangelism. Ninety persons attended. This was a joint project of the

Diocese of Virginia and the Diocese of Washington made possible through a special grant of \$7,000 from the National Commission on the Hispanic Ministries. Main leaders: Fr. Ivan Ramirez of Virginia, Fr. Samuel Pinzon, Diocese of Washington; Fr. Luis Quiroga of Brooklyn and Fr. Robert Prichard of Virginia. Lloyd and Laura Swartzendruber and Thomas and Gladys Bauder provided classes for the children.

7) WE HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO VENTURE IN MISSION with a special gift and within our still limited resources, we will continue to support the program. We have also contributed to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for Cambodian Relief and have joined St. Paul's to assist in the relocation of a Vietnamese family.

8) OTHER IMPORTANT HAPPENINGS include: a) Palm Sunday Procession. b) Vacation Bible School. c) Thanksgiving Day. Spanish Mass followed by dinner. d) Columbus day family picnic at Burke Lake Park. e) Sponsored an Advent Concert at St. George's by the Interamerican Chamber Singers. f) Our Congregation was well represented at the annual breakfast of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew at Christ Church, Alexandria and at the Services for Ascension Day at St. Peter's in Arlington. h) The remodeling of the Chapel at St. George's has greatly contributed to enhance our communal worship. i) T. V. classes. Four members of our Congregation have received introductory classes.

9) ON A MORE PERSONAL NOTE, I would like to report that on Ash Wesnesday I led a Quiet Day Retreat at St. George's with reflections on the life of three Spanish Saints. Preached at an Ecumenical Service at St. Paul's on Good Friday. Addressed the Region 3 Committee on Social Concerns. Worked during the year on the Christian Education Committee for the Hispanics at National level and in December I was appointed by the Presiding Bishop as a member of the National Commission on Hispanic Ministries of the Episcopal Church (NCHM). References and information about the Hispanic Ministry in our Diocese has been reported during the year in the periodical of the Diocese of Washington, in 'Avante' a national publication of the Episcopal Church for the Hispanics and in the 'VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN'.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

About 21,800 dollars were provided during 1979 for the Hispanic Ministry in Virginia. Main sources of funds: Diocese of Virginia \$10,000; St. George's \$7,300: St. Paul's, Falls Church \$2,500; St. Mary's, Arlington \$1,000; The Falls Church \$1,000.

In addition, St. George's provides the full use of the Chapel. office space, secretarial help and other administrative assistance. We are encouraging our members to grow in the stewardship of money through responsible giving. For 1980 the Hispanic Congregation has pledged \$5,000 to help with the budget.

The Alcoholism Information Center reports 912 phone calls; 421 walk-in requests for alcohol abuse/alcoholism audio visuals; and 130 requests for literature. Recipients include: (1) Elementary (2) Middle (3) High School and (4) College levels, as well as institutions, church-related schools, public supported schools, and state and local school systems; alcohol-related agencies, clinics, hospitals, P-T.A. groups (statewide).

Conferences and Seminars, et cetera, sponsored: The Alcoholism Institute for Professionals with 8 participants, at the Alcoholism Recovery Clinic at Medical College of Virginia Hospital; the Virginia Institute for Alcohol and Other Drug Studies, 67 participants, at Roslyn Conference Center, Richmond; eight Institutes for the State Division of Substance Abuse, (statewide); church related conferences: three Baptists, two United Methodist, one, Virginia Home for Boys. Referrals: Referred for clinical assistance alcohol related problems - 46 persons.

PROJECTED PLANS: Assist in an out-patient counseling program for indigents at a mutually convenient time; replacement of at least five films in our film library, limited by exorbitant film costs; to implement requests from health educators of local elementary and middle school systems for alcohol/drug abuse prevention programs; to hold at least four crisis intervention training sessions for clergymen involved with families suffering from alcohol abuse.

OUTREACH TO THE ELDERLY

The Ministry with the Elderly in Region 15 continues to evolve and we feel strongly that the Holy Spirit is guiding us.

Here is a brief summary of what has been done during the past year: As Missioner I traveled 7,948 miles in my own car (excluding public transportation), attended 65 meetings as a board or committee member. In addition, I spoke at 102 meetings, and taught 50 classes (mostly Bible classes) at the Senior Center. Once in awhile I am a guest lecturer at the University of Virginia on the Role of Churches and Synagogues in making life more interesting and pleasant and worthwhile for our senior citizens.

I have helped as a resource person, people in four other denominations, and serve on the Task Force on Aging of the Virginia Council of Churches. I made 330 pastoral calls and conferred with 47 individuals about this ministry. For four weeks an intern from Virginia Theological Seminary did field work with me.

I wish all parishes and missions would set up a committee to call on the elderly, especially those who no longer are able to get to church. Friendly visiting is so essential.

We clergy need to become informed about community service agencies in our area so we can avail ourselves of their services; for there are many things they can do better than we. And, there are other areas where we can do a better job than a secular agency.

Please let me know if I can be of service to you.

ROSLYN, THE VIRGINIA DIOCESAN CENTER

Report to the 185th Annual Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia

ROSLYN MANAGERS CORPORATION

Roslyn's service to parishes and other organizations in the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia continued to grow dramatically in 1979. This is reflected in the number of groups using the Center's conference and recreation facilities; in response to our own program offerings; in mushrooming demand for leadership and consulting services; and in hours volunteered by staff on assignments for diocesan committees.

Stewardship: There is no doubt that much of this progress is a direct result of the Memorial Trustees' intentional effort to build up Episcopal usage of Roslyn by a grant of \$10,000 per year in subsidy funds for parish and diocesan groups in 1978 and 1979. In 1979, 22 groups received funding amounting to one third of the total costs of Episcopal groups' food and lodging for the year. The Trustees and Directors are very gratified to note that Episcopal conferences now represent 20% of Roslyn's total food and lodging business; and with fees from consulting and other services, 26% of the Center's total income is directly related to our own denomination. That's 6% better than in 1978, and a vast improvement over prior years. This provides a healthy objective indication that we are beginning to realize our mandate to be a Center for the Diocese of Virginia. With this encouragement, the Trustees have decided to extend the subsidy for a third year at the same amount, \$10,000. It is noted that this money is from the trust fund set up for Roslyn's operation: Roslyn is neither owned nor financially supported by the Diocese.

Conference Facilities: 46 groups from parishes and diocesan committees had conferences at Roslyn in 1979, as compared to 30 in 1978: an increase of 53.3%. The events were attended by a total of 829 persons, an overall increase of 17.4%. Parish groups alone brought 48.9% more people than last year. So popular is weekend time at Roslyn that we are already fully booked for all weekends well into June 1980. We know we must expand our overnight facilities to meet the everincreasing demand for retreats and conferences. Such expansion will also assist us in off-setting some of our inflationary costs. It is the hope of the Roslyn Board and the Memorial Trustees that something may be worked out with the Trustees of the Funds regarding the Ross Fund for the construction of a diocesan-type building or buildings at Roslyn. Such construction could then meet the needs of a growing number of parishes in the Diocese.

Recreational Facilities: By careful scheduling, Roslyn was able to accomodate 37 picnic groups from Episcopal parishes this year, an increase of 42% over 1978. More hours were also made available for local Episcopal clergy families to use the pool, along with residential conferees. In addition, several Richmond inner-city agencies continue to use our pool facilities free of charge on weekdays during the summer months. All involved are most appreciative of the opportunity.

"Spiritual Pilgrimage" Programs: 1979's enthusiastic response to Roslyn's own program offerings saw 8 of 12 scheduled programs successfully run: quite a contrast to 1978, when all but one of our public offerings were cancelled for lack of registration. e deepened and broadened the resources offered, with such leaders as Dr. Emma Lou Benignus, Verna Dozier, Dr. Joseph Wagenseller, John and June Yungblut, and Henry Atkins. Feedback from the 120 participants in retreats, seminars and workshops has been overwhelmingly positive and encouraging, and response to our newsletter, The Acorm, has been exciting. Consultation and Leadership: Roslyn staff members have served as retreat leaders, consultants and resource persons to nine parishes in the Diocese this year, working on projects ranging from vacancy consultations to crisis interventions to vestry retreats. Executive Director Jack Andersen has served as one of two consultants employed this year by the Episcopal Church Center as resources for Episcopal camps and conference centers throughout the country, and has been called in directly as consultant for six other Episcopal dioceses. Expansion of Roslyn's ministry in this was, both within the Diocese and to the larger church, has met with great affirmation.

piocesan Task Commitments: In addition to responding to referrals for consultations, Roslyn staff are involved in various diocesan task forces where their particular talents are needed. Program Advisor Jean Andersen is an active member of pACE (the Diocesan Association of Christian Educators), and of the new Committee on Lay Ministry. She was the diocesan representative at the December conference of APSO (the Appalachian Peoples' Service Organization), where reports were made on experiments from VErmont to Atlanta in raising up indigenous ministries in small (and often historic) parishes. All these activities funnel back into the development of Roslyn program. Associate Director George Bridgman was named by Artchdeacon Milton LeRoy to sit on the Energy-Ecology Task Group of the Virginia Council of Churches, an area of vital concern for Roslyn and other conference centers as well as for the Diocese at large. Jack Andersen, in addition to his administrative and consulting duties, has also been elected president of the International Association of Camp and Conference Center Administrators, and has served as Chairman of the administrative group of the Mid-Atlantic Association for Training and Consulting, on whose Board he is the diocesan representative.

With such a wide variety of ways to use Roslyn, we hope this will be the year for you to try us. And if you are already involved with Roslyn, either individually or through your parish, we thank you for making our ministry possible.

STUART HALL STAUNTON, VIRGINIA

Stuart Hall began the 1979-80 school year with a 15% increase in enrollment over last year, and, for the first time since 1947, an eight-grade program was included.

Stuart Hall is a college-preparatory boarding and day school which enphasizes learning as a 24-hour-a-day experience. To strengthen its commitment to round-the-clock guidance, the school has placed Miss Sally Joyner in the newly-created position of Coordinator of Student Life. Miss Joyner received her B.A. degree in behavioral science at Lyndon State College in Vermont. She holds a Master of Education degree from JMU, and she has extensive counseling experience with young people. At Stuart Hall Miss Joyner will be ultimately responsible for coordinating all phases of student life outside the classroom. She will also serve as a counselor to the students.

Other personnel changes include the resignation of Headmaster Nathaniel Goddard on July 1, 1979, to return to a graduate education program at the University of Virginia. He has been replaced by Colonel James W. Love while a search committee headed by P. William Moore seeks a permanent replacement. Colonel Love has been business manager and treasurer at Stuart Hall since 1976 when he came to the school from Staunton Military Academy.

Emphasis on spiritual life continues to be a major part of the school's curriculum. The Rev'd Hugh White, rector at Emmanuel Church, and Grace Trapp, chaplain, offer a coordinated campus ministry stressing religion as a part of daily life. Ms. Trapp, who has been chaplain since July 1, 1979, received a B.S. degree in secondary education at the University of Wisconsin and a Master of Divinity degree at Seabury-Western Theological Seminary. She has worked as a youth counselor and hospital chaplain before coming to Stuart Hall.

Stuart Hall continues to offer a strong academic program in-

VIRGINIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Virginia Council of Churches expresses appreciation to the piocese of Virginia for participation and support in furthering efforts through the Council to give expression to the church's oneness in mission.

NEW MINISTRIES

On January 1, 1979, Mrs. Carol D. McMurray began serving as Coordinator of Volunteer Emergency Foster Care which is seeking to assist local communities in enlisting families in providing needed temporary care of children until more permanent care can be arranged.

In response to the tragic plight of the "boat people," the Council launched a new program of refugee resettlement on August 1 with the Rev'd Aline G. Russell as Coordinator. Also, during the year a statewide Disaster Response Plan was initiated to help coordinate the response of the religious community in future disasters in Virginia.

LEADER DEVELOPMENT

Continuing efforts to share resources and strengthen educational ministries during the past year have included a fourth conference on the Future of Church Education, Stages I and II in three areas of a three-stage Workshop for Rural Church Leaders, Town and Country Ministers Summer School, two events for leaders in church camping, and a workshop for adult leaders in youth ministry. In an effort to strengthen ecumenical relationships, a fifth Joint Meeting of Ecumenical Commissions was held under the theme, "Making Unity Visible."

The Council continues assistance to communities in programs of weekday religious education on released time including the annual pre-school conference for teachers and in-service training events. In April Harrisonburg and Rockingham County celebrated fifty continuous years of Weekday Religious Education on released time.

LEGISLATIVE CONCERNS

Relating religious commitment and concern for fellow human beings with responsible participation in the legislative process continues as a primary goal of the program areas on Church and Society. The legislative newsletter provides a continuing update on state legislation as a means of assisting church members in becoming more responsibly involved as Christian citizens. Legislative concerns developed with input from denominational bodies have been used to provide a base for continuing education and witness activities related to the legislative process in Virginia.

SPECIAL MINISTRIES

Through Campus Ministry Forum, continuing services are provided to strengthen ministries through pilot projects, consultations, and coordination of efforts among participating denominations.

Through the Migrant Ministry continuing services including

pastoral ministry, day care and recreational activities are extended to migrant agricultural workers. A major new project is underway to build a needed day care center on the Eastern Shore to continue services for migrant children.

Through the Ministry in State Parks, visitors are provided the opportunity to participate in services of worship conducted by area clergy. Three parks were served by employed chaplains during the 1979 season.

The Council also continues cooperation with CROP in support of the Clothing and Hunger Appeals of Church World Service on behalf of persons in need around the world. Again in 1979 the Council has arranged for distribution of needed clothing to school children in several southwestern Virginia counties.

Through these and other efforts, the Virginia Council seeks to serve in an enabling role to aid the member communions in sharing resources and in planning and working together to strengthen the church's ministry. We thank you for your part in this important quest and invite your continuing participation that the oneness we share might more fully be manifest in mission.

REPORT OF WESTMINSTER-CANTERBURY HOUSE, RICHMOND to the 185TH ANNUAL COUNCIL OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH in THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

The current and long-term financial stability of Westminster-Canterbury House has received a major share of time and attention from the Board of Trustees and administration during the past year, for spiralling inflation and the relatively fixed income of our residents mandate the most careful and businesslike approach toward meeting current and future expenses.

Within the parameters of that reality, Westminster-Canterbury continues to be primarily concerned that this facility offer to residents the very finest lifestyle that is reasonably available.

In planning for the current and future financial security of the Corporation and its individual residents, the following actions are among those initiated in 1979:

- contracted with Howard Winklevoss and Associates of Philadelphia to conduct an actuarial and accounting study of the facility to cover mortality and morbidity experience and forecasts; an annual financial forecast for the next 25 years; the effects of inflation and other variable assumptions; the Fellowship program; and many other aspects of the operation.
- increased rates in order to cover current operating costs. As a result of our cost containment program and other efforts which enabled us to increase revenues from outside sources, we were able to hold the monthly rate increase to 6% in spite of the national inflation rate of 13+%.
- changed the criteria for Fellowship recipients in order to allow them to take advantage of government assistance programs when appropriate.
- required a noninterest bearing advance deposit on founders fees of \$1000 (\$1500 for couples) to accompany applications to the facility.
- tightened up our operation and reduced expenses as much as possible consistent with the present level of service and programs.

Briefly, Westminster-Canterbury is in sound financial condition now and we intend to keep it that way into the indefinite future as we continue to serve many needs of the elderly as charged to us by the Church and our founding philosophy.

The effectiveness of ecumenicity has seldom been more dramatically proven than in the harmonious relationship between the eight Episcopalian and eight Presbyterian trustees whose vision and wisdom have guided the destinies of this unique facility to its present position of national prominence. Both judicatories owe a deep debt of gratitude to those selfless, dedicated and capable people whose vision and energy have

developed Westminster-Canterbury House into a prestigious operation which is being monitored and emulated throughout an ever-widening area of our nation. Last year the Virginia Association of Non-profit Homes for Adults voted Westminster-Canterbury House as Home of the Year. This year they selected our first president, J. Edwin Givens, as Trustee of the Year.

Donations to the Fellowship Fund for FY '78-'79 increased by nearly \$20,000 over the previous year, for a total of \$66,785. These contributions will be used in 1980 toward the support of 94 residents who are not financially independent.

Four new Fellowship recipients were admitted to the facility in 1979.

The Westminster-Canterbury Foundation was established, with W. Thomas Rice and Frank G. Louthan, Jr. as co-chairmen, to broaden the scope of our charitable giving program, especially the Fellowship Fund.

The Westminster-Canterbury Guild, our dynamic auxiliary volunteer organization, has proven to be one of the most effective groups of Westminster-Canterbury. Guild members provide leadership in such diverse areas as church relations, development, and health care, and it is through their continuous efforts that community understanding of Westminster-Canterbury's goals is increasing dramatically.

Responding to the critical need for qualified nursing assistants throughout the health care field, administration has launched its own 12-week, comprehensive training program for these persons responsible for providing this level of personal care. The Geriatric Nursing Assistant Training (GNAT) program is open to students from the community and is designed to prepare them for nursing assistant positions in health-related facilities throughout Virginia.

The following statistics covering our first four-and-a-half years of operation will be of interest to our sponsors in the Diocese of Virginia: Total number of admission, 543; total deaths, 68; total withdrawals after admission, 11; total permanent transfers to the Health Center, 51; total admissions to the Health Center, including community patients, 725; average census for 1979 in the apartment units, 433; average age, 79.6; average census in the Health Care Center, 124; average age in the Center 82.3.

At present each one of the 378 apartments is occupied. There are 270 applications on the waiting list.

During the past year we presented a 12-minute slide and sound picture tour of Westminster-Canterbury House 23 times to churches, civic clubs and other interested groups with a combined audience of approximately 1500 people. Although this is not as satisfactory as a personal visit, it provides us the opportunity of introducing the "Westminster-Canterbury House Story" to a large number of people. Our goal is to present the continually up-dated program to all Episcopal and Presbyterian churches in this area on an annual basis. We welcome invitations.

As we approach the end of this successful year at Westminster-

Canterbury we send to the people of the Diocese of Virginia our most sincere appreciation for their sponsorship and strong support in so many ways. Their continued interest and contribution of time and substance are of vital importance to Westminster-Canterbury House. The Board of Trustees, administration and our residents are very grateful.

THE CHURCH PENSION FUND

Canon V, The Church Pension Fund, requires that a report be made to the regular meeting of the Council concerning information dealing with the Church Pension Fund.

In conformance with the report received from the Church Pension Fund and as has been reported to the Diocese in years past, the following statistics are made available.

As of December 4, 1979 there were, in the Diocese of Virginia, forty-five (45) retired clergymen. The total benefits paid to these forty-five (45) clergymen amounted to \$250,242.00 for the year.

Ten clergymen had selected voluntarily - early retirement - and were paid benefits in the amount of \$25,082. for the year 1979.

Four clergy on our Diocesan Canonical list have disability retirement and their benefits amount to \$23,642.

One of the benefits provided the clergy through the Church Pension Fund is that there is a survivor protection in that there is a spouse's benefit. Currently, there are thirty-three widows receiving the surviving spouse benefit which amounted to \$88,195.

The Church Pension Fund reports that the grand total of the payments for the above cited categories paid in 1979 amount to \$390,058.

In 1979, the Church Pension Fund's Board of Directors implemented three major improvements in benefits for the clergy and their families.

- Monthly pensions of current retirees and other beneficiaries were raised an average of 7% ... the third increase since 1971.
- A resettlement benefit grant was instituted for those retiring April 1, 1979 and after. This provision provides a lump sum equal to three times the regular monthly pension, but limited to a maximum of \$3600.
- 3) The lump sum death benefit for families of ministers who die while active was doubled from \$2000 to \$4000 at death of an active minister.

With regard to the resettlement benefit grant, the Church Pension Fund quotes in their Annual Report - "we at the Fund realize that providing the new resettlement benefit for future retirees only partially resolves the unique housing problem facing our ministers at retirement. We hope this pioneering action, in conjunction with similar programs sponsored by other church organizations, will spark greater interest and planning in this area of great concern. Without doubt, it is one of the most pressing economic problems confronting ministers today. The new benefit was constructed to meet internal revenue service requirements for tax-free housing or rental allowance. It is believed that no part of the lump-sum payment must be reported as income provided it is only solely to provide a home. As a result of a special IRS Tax Ruling in 1973, the first such approval obtained by any major clergy pension fund, regular monthly retirement benefits paid to retired Episcopal ministers also include a portion designated by the Trustees as a taxfree rental allowance."

An affiliate corporation of the Church Pension Fund is the Church Life Insurance Corporation. It is through this corporation that the Diocese of Virginia, along with many other dioceses, has entered into a comprehensive group medical care plan and a mandatory life insurance plan for clergy. The Executive Board of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, at the 181st Annual Council, proposed and the Council approved, recommending that individual churches avail themselves of the opportunity of providing the \$20,000 Term Life Insurance for their clergy rather than the \$10,000 mandatory limit.

The majority of vestries in the diocese have provided this additional coverage.

On November 28, 1979 Bishop Hall was notified by the Church Life Insurance Corporation that the premium or rate for the cost of the comprehensive medical care insurance would be increased effective January 1, 1980. The clergy and treasurers of the diocese were notified on that date of the new rates which are as follows:

Single Coverage	(Non-Medicare)	\$ 149.67 per quarter
Family Coverage	(Non-Medicare)	411.63 per quarter
Single Coverage	(Medicare)	74.85 per quarter
Family Coverage	(Medicare)	149.70 per quarter
Split Coverage	(One Medicare, One Non-Medicare)	224.52 per guarter

Through another affiliate of the Church Pension Fund -- the Church Insurance Corporation -- the diocese carries in its Operating Budget the premium cost for the Surety Bond for all treasurers and other employees/volunteer workers up to \$10,000. By providing this service, all churches comply with Title I, Canon VI, Sect. (3) of the General Church Canons and Canon XVI, Sect. (3) of the Diocesan Canons, which require such bonding.

There is available in the office of the Treasurer of the Diocese a booklet prepared by the Church Pension Fund, entitled: "WHAT EVERY TREASURER SHOULD KNOW" - which discusses how assessments are figured and answers general questions dealing with the Church Pension Fund. This booklet is available for anyone who should care to write for it, as well as any other data concerning the Church Pension Fund or its affiliates.

THE DIOCESAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF VIRGINIA

The purpose of The Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia is to receive, acquire by purchase, gift or otherwise, and hold and manage, money and all other personal property and real estate for the use of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia in its missionary work. Under the direction of twelve trustees, a third of whom are elected each year for three year terms, the Society assists the Diocese of Virginia by providing capital in the following areas:

- 1) Creating new debts
- Refinancing of existing debts (hardship debt service cases)
- 3) Financing of Diocesan related corporations
- 4) Financing of individuals

During 1979, the Society completed the revised loan commitment to The Diocese of Virginia to facilitate the construction of St. Andrew's, Burke. In addition, the Society made a loan to St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Groveton, to enable the paving of their parking lot.

At the beginning of 1979, the Diocesan Missionary Society had twenty-five (25) active loans. One loan was increased during the year. One (1) church has since paid off its loan in full. The other churches are making payments on schedule.

The Society's working capital is held and managed in three separate funds, namely:

THE DIOCESAN REVOLVING FUND, which consists of money and/or the proceeds of the sale of personal property that has been given or bequeathed to the DMS without restriction.

THE FIRST DEED OF TRUST FUNDS, which consists of money and/ or the proceeds of the sale of personal property that has been given or bequeathed to the DMS with restrictions.

THE FIRST DEED OF TRUST - LOAN FUNDS, which consists of money that has been lent to the DMS, usually for a minimum term of fifteen years at 5-1/2% interest, to provide additional capital to enable the Society to meet ever increasing needs.

During 1979, new capital was received in the form of gifts from the Rev'd Allen and Mrs. Brown and St. John's Episcopal Church, Centerville; and a bequest from the estate of Mrs. Lucille Lozier. In addition, a one-acre tract of real estate in Essex County was sold, with the proceeds of the sale being added to the Revolving Loan Fund.

The Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia is grateful for the gifts and bequests that have come to it, and also to those older and well-established churches that have loaned money to the Society for it in turn to loan to new and struggling congregations at 6% interest and usually with amortization of principal on a long-term basis.

TRUSTEES OF THE FUNDS of the PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

The Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia, a Virginia Corporation and sometimes referred to as "The Trustees of the Funds" was incorporated by charter of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth in 1892 and provides a vehicle as well as a service whereby funds of the individual churches and those diocesan funds might be held by a proper fiduciary and properly managed and invested with income remittal on an annualized basis.

The Board of Trustees who direct the activities of the Corporation are nominated by the Annual Council to the Board of the Trustees of the Funds, who elect successor trustees. The term of all elected trustees is three years. No person is eligible to serve for or during more than two successive terms of three years each, but thereafter, shall be eligible for re-election after a lapse of one year. The Trustees serving this corporation are listed in the front of this Journal.

The Bishop of Virginia is the President of the Corporation.

The 184th Annual Council made nominations and the Trustees did elect to serve on the Board in the Class of 1982, Mr. Frederick Deane, Jr., Chairman of the Board of the Bank of Virginia Company, Mr. John P. Waller of Leesburg, Virginia, President of Peoples National Bank and Mr. James S. Watkinson, Richmond, President of Morton G. Thalhimer, Incorporated.

In carrying out its objectives, the Trustees of the Funds have established three agency accounts:

- The First & Merchants National Bank, Richmond, Virginia manages all church and parish type funds made available to the Corporation.
- The Virginia National Bank, Charlottesville, Virginia which manages the Sally Walke Chipley Fund for the benefit of Grace Church, Cismont (Keswick).
- 3) The United Virginia Bank and its affiliate, Capitoline Investment Services, Inc. manages all diocesan - type funds, i.e., bequests to the diocese or to the bishop or specific funds which have been made available to the bishop.

All diocesan type funds have specific designated purposes. As of September 30, 1979 (the latest report available - as the report for the quarter ending December 31, 1979 is not available at time of printing) - shows that the Corporation had for investment 131 church or parish-type funds and 68 diocesan-type funds and the one fund managed by the Virginia National Bank who became the agent in 1978 for the Sally Walke Chipley Fund.

The total market value as of that date was \$5,344,520.97.

The Trustees of the Funds have established a basic investment objective to seek stability and a reasonably high level income

maintaining liquidity and long term growth for all funds that are of a church or parish-type and managed by the First and Merchants National Bank, Richmond, Virginia.

With respect to the management of diocesan-type funds, the investment objective was changed in 1979 from that of the total return principle and adopted investment policy and guidelines so that in the future there would be a pre-determined percentage increase in the dollar payout per unit on all diocesan type funds. Such a pre-determined percentage payout increasing yearly permits orderly planning by both beneficiaries and the trustees as well as providing a pre-determined increase. Secondly, all cash income (interest and dividends), will be invested in a separate income account pending the year-end payout. The pay-out taken by any fund will be reinvested in additional units of participation as of December 31st of each year. Any cash income over and above the stipulated amount for the current year will be segregated and will be held in the income reserve for future years.

SECURITY VALUATION:

Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are stated at market value based on closing prices reported on the last business day of the year; securities traded in the over-the-counter market are stated at market value based on the last reported bid price of the year.

INVESTMENT UNITS:

The equity of each Fund in the pooled net assets is represented by the investment units. New money entering the pool is accepted at the unit value of the appropriate Parish or Diocesan net assets as of the last day of the calendar quarter in which the deposit is made. The number of new units bought is determined by dividing the new money by the unit value. Withdrawals from the pool are based on similar unit values. Withdrawals or additions are accepted at the end of any quarter.

INCOME DISTRIBUTION:

Investment income is distributed as follows:

- PARISH FUNDS: The income distributable to each Fund as invested is computed for each quarter based on the number of units owned during the quarter and the "pay-out" being for the quarter ending September 30.

- DIOCESAN FUNDS: Annual withdrawals are at a specific pre-determined percentage, determined by the Trustees of the Funds with distribution of "pay-out" as of September 30, of each year.

For the information of the church at large, and the Journal reporting the proceedings of the Annual Council meeting, there is printed the complete Audit Report as prepared by the firm, A. M. Pullen & Company, Certified Public Accountants, Richmond, Virginia which list the invididual parish or church-type funds as well as the diocesan-type funds and there is included a complete listing of all the securities owned by the two types of funds as managed by the Trustees.

RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING THE 1980 BUDGET ADOPTED BY THE 185TH ANNUAL COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

IT RESOLVED, that the Council approves that any unpaid pledges for 1979 that are paid in 1980 be first subject to 37% being forwarded to the National Church -- and any remaining funds should be placed in the 1980 budget but (such funds) not subject to a second proportional sharing with the National Church.'

* * * * * *

DE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council, responding to the desires of the Diocese to meet its commitments in Christian Stewardship, agreed that:

 A line item be included in the income statement of the budget for \$1,000.00 in Individual Gifts to Program; and

(2) That a further line item be included in the income statement of the budget to provide for \$30,000.00 (additional Vestry gifts to program) to be raised by an Executive Board appeal, and that the 185th Annual Council appeals to each Vestry in the Diocese to endeavor to increase by a minimum of 3% its 1980 giving to the Diocese; and

(3) That the Executive Board is directed to set a deadline for responses to this appeal and it is further directed that after this deadline to make such adjustments in the diocesan budget as are necessary to balance expenditures with receipts.

* * * * * *

BE IT RESOLVED, that the 185th Annual Council pledges to the General Church Program 36.5% of the total income of the Diocese for 1980 and that the Executive Board is authorized to report a minimum dollar amount pledged to the Treasurer of the Executive Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

IT RESOLVED, that the Executive Board, in cooperation with the Commission on the Ministry and other appropriate groups as may be determined by the Executive Board, undertake during 1980 a review and evaluation of the Deacons Program and the subsidy for the placement of Deacons in order to strengthen the program and to aid the 186th Council in its budgeting decisions.

- WHEREAS, the 180th Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia in 1975 approved a proposal to repair and renovate the Diocesan Headquarters (The Mayo Hamorial Church House) at a cost of \$200,000,00, said cost to be budgeted through the Diocesan Operating Budget at \$20,000.00 per year over a 10 year period; and
- WHEREAS, in the four succeeding Councils budgetary limitations have necessitated the elimination of any funding of the project so that it has not gone forward; and
- WHEREAS, since the 180th Annual Council additional deterioration has occurred; and
- WHEREAS, the 185th Annual Council believes it to be in the best interest of the Diocese that the Diocesan Headquarters Building be properly repaired and renovated;
- NOW THEREFORE. BE IT RESOLVED; that the 185th Annual Council hereby directs the Executive Board to proceed as promptly as possible to accomplish a program of necessary repairs and renovation to the Mayo Memorial Church House, after having first commissioned a feasibility study, including development of architectural and engineering plans and the costs thereof, and having taken all other usual and necessary steps in that regard, said program of repairs and renovation to be funded by mortgage borrowing, if deemed necessary by the Executive Board, the repayment of said indebtedness, if any, to be made from succeeding operating budgets until said indebtedness shall have been fully paid and discharged; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Executive Board and other appropriate officers of the Diocese be, and they are hereby authorized to do all such things as are reasonable and necessary to carry out the purpose of this resolution, and the Executive Board is directed to reports its actions to the 186th Annual Council.

<u>WHEREAS</u>, in past years it has been the practice of this Diocese to pay the Co-Ordinator for the Commission on Ministry a salary from which he paid all office or clerical expenses.

This policy has been changed and in the past few years these office expenses were paid for and shown as a separate budget item.

After a period of operation under this method it has been found that the Co-Ordinator's office can be operated at a lesser cost to the Diocese and after careful analysis it is hereby recommended that this budget item for 1980 be reduced from \$4,000 to \$2,700.

Income Distributions: (Continued)

Diocesan Funds:

The income distributable, including realized gains from a special options account, is accumulated over the period October 1 - September 30. The Trustees determine a per unit income distribution pay out which is disbursed in December. Any fund for which no pay out is made receives its income distribution through acquisition of additional investment units as of December 31.

2. The Sally Walke Chipley Fund - A Diocesan Type Fund:

At the request of the beneficiary of the Fund, the Trustees by formal action agreed to segregate as of June 30, 1978, the Sally Walke Chipley Fund, then included in the Diocesan group of funds, as a separate fund along with the equivalent unit value of cash and securities. The 1978 changes in net assets as reported in the accompanying financial statements for the Sally Walke Chipley Fund reflect transactions for the period July 1, 1978 through December 31, 1978.

The assets of the Sally Walke Chipley Fund are managed by the Virginia National Bank - Charlottesville. Income, net of expenses, is distributed to the beneficiary of the Fund quarterly.

3. Bishop's Special Fund - Shrine Mont:

This special segregated Diocesan type fund was created April 1, 1979 at the request of Bishop Hall, President of Shrine Mont Commission.

The assets of the Bishop's Special Fund - Shrine Mont are managed by Capitoline Investment Services, Inc. Income, net of expenses, is reinvested by the Fund as received.

4. Contingent Liability:

Contingent liability exists jointly with the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia through the Loan Commission of the Diocese of Virginia as endorsers of the mortgage note of Church of our Savior, Rio, Virginia in the amount of \$10,395.

As collateral for the above note, the First & Merchants National Bank is holding assignment of sundry funds of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia, and the following funds of the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginis:

5. Investment Advisory Fees:

Investment advisers received fees of \$27,938 in 1979 for management advisory and custodian services as follows:

Parish Funds - Managerial Custodian:

Managerial custodian fee of \$9,965 was based on the average market value of the portfolio of investments managed at the annual rate of .6 of one percent on the first \$1,000,000, .4 of one percent on the next \$1,000,000 and .25 of one percent on the excess over \$2,000,000.

Diocesan Funds - Managerial Custodian:

Managerial custodian fee of \$17,263 was based on the average market value of the portfolio of investments managed at the annual rate of .55 of one percent on the first \$1,000,000, .4 of one percent on the next \$1,500,000, .25 of one percent on the next \$2,500,000 plus \$50 annually per investor fund for which accounted.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Significant Accounting Policies:

Operations are conducted in a manner similar to a common trust fund. The following is a summary of the major accounting policies.

Security Valuation:

Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are stated at market value based on closing prices reported on the last business day of the year; securities traded in the over-the-counter market are stated at market value based on the last reported bid price of the year.

Investment Units:

The equity of each fund in the pooled net assets is represented by investment units. New money entering the pool is accepted at the unit value of the appropriate Parish or Diocesan net assets as of the last day of the calendar quarter in which the deposit is made. The number of new units bought is determined by dividing the new money by the unit value. Withdrawals from the pool are based on similar unit values.

Income Recognition:

Income on investments is recognized when received.

Income Distributions:

Investment income is distributed as follows:

Parish Funds:

The income distributable to each fund on deposit is computed for each quarter based on the number of units owned during the quarter. Payments of income are made after the end of the quarter ending September 30.

5. Investment Advisory Fees: (Continued)

Sally Walke Chipley Fund - Managerial Custodian:

Managerial custodian fee of \$710 was based the average market value of the portfolio of investments managed at the annual rate of .5 of one percent.

6. Change in Income Distribution Policy - Diocesan Funds:

Prior to April 1, 1979 the income as earned by the pooled assets of the Diocesan Fund were reinvested quarterly and an annual income payout as determined by the Trustees was made by withdrawing from the Fund. Effective April 1, 1979, the policy described in Note 1 was adopted. The annual income payout for 1979 was a combination of the two methods.

7. Subsequent Event:

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Subsequent to December 31, 1979, the Diocesan Funds cash was increased approximately \$15,000 for interest income not correctly recorded by the custodian bank during 1979. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Significant Accounting Policies:

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Reporting Entity and Related Organizations:

These statements present financial information for the Diocesan Program of the Diocese of Virginia and the restricted funds as herein reported on and do not purport to be an all inclusive report of all Diocese of Virginia related organizations and other restricted funds.

Accounting Method:

The accounts of the Diocesan Program are maintained primarily on the cash basis which recognizes income or expense when received or paid rather than when accrued; however, the results approximate full accrual accounting.

Land, Buildings and Rectories:

Land, buildings and rectories of the churches under supervision of the Bishop are carried at cost if purchased or at value at date received if acquired by gift.

The Mayo Memorial Church House, which serves as the administrative headquarters of the Diocese, is carried as an asset by the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia.

2. Real Estate Held for Sale:

The bequest of a parcel of real estate in 1979 created the Carl W. and Katherine James Zimmerman Fund, a restricted fund, the income of which is to be used for the education of seminarians. The carrying value assigned the property is the appraised value, at date of gift, net of estimated selling expenses, plus holding expenditures incurred through December 31, 1979.

Contingent Liability Secured by Capital Stock of Orkney Springs Hotels, Inc.:

On January 19, 1979, as authorized by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Bishop of the Diocese entered into an agreement to purchase all the outstanding capital stock of Orkney Springs Hotels, Inc. on behalf of Shrine Mont, the camp and conference center of the Diocese, whose property is adjacent to the corporation's property. The total purchase price for the stock was \$1,200,000 with an initial down payment of \$100,000 which was paid from Shrine Mont funds, with the remainder to be paid over twenty years in equal annual installments without interest. It is management's belief that these annual payments can be made with funds generated from operations of the hotel and special gifts to Shrine Mont. Since these financial statements do not include any reporting on the operations of Shrine Mont, the investment in capital stock of the corporation and the notes payable are not shown on the balance sheet of the Diocesan Program of the Diocese of Virginia.

6. Venture In Mission Program:

The Venture in Mission Program is a special program undertaken by the Diocese of Virginia in 1979 in conjunction with other similar programs throughout the Protestant Episcopal Church - USA. Funds raised in this campaign have been designated by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia and are limited to such use.

1. Significant Accounting Policies:

The accounts of the Diocesan Missionary Society of Virginia (DMS) are maintained primarily on the cash basis which recognizes income or expense when received or paid rather than when accrued; however, the results approximate full accrual accounting.

The value at which the real estate is carried on the books represents acquisition cost or value assigned at date of acquisition by the DMS.

The following, included in the fund balances of the Revolving Loan Funds, are on loan from the Trustees of the Funds of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia with the provision that the Trustees of the Funds may withdraw same upon two years' notice.

4. Ellen R. Goldsborough Fund:

The DMS is in the process of paying to the Trustees of the Funds \$10,000 per year for the years 1974-1980 as repayment of the Ellen R. Goldsborough Fund, with the final payment of the Fund to be made in 1981. The Bishop will receive income from the DMS based on 5% of the remaining balance held by DMS at the end of each year.

5. First Deed of Trust Loan Funds:

The Loan Funds consist of loans from churches for DMS to lend funds to other churches to help financce additional construction. The loans from the churches to DMS are evidenced by 15-year negotiable promissory notes, bearing interest at 5-1/2% annually, payable June 30th and December 31st, with principal due 15 years from the date of issue. 6. Reserve for Repayment of Capital Debt:

The Trustees of DMS agreed on February 26, 1974, to establish a sinking (reserve) fund to provide sufficient cash to meet the payments due on outstanding loans each year. The Trustees agreed that the reserve fund would be funded from income received each year, and that the amount would be decided by the Trustees annually. At December 31, 1979 and 1978, the balances reserved were \$50,000 and \$35,000, respectively.



MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETING OF COUNCIL IN THE DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

The Special Meeting of the Council of the Diocese of Virginia, called for the election of a suffragan bishop to succeed the Rt. Rev'd John A. Baden, D.D., upon his retirement, which is set as December 31, 1979, was held on Saturday, October 6, 1979 pursuant to due notice and call, having been sent out by the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Holy Eucharist which began at 9:30 a.m. was celebrated by the Rt. Rev'd Robert B. Hall, D.D., assisted by the Rt. Rev'd Samuel B. Chilton, D.D., Epistoler, the Rt. Rev'd Robert F. Gibson, Jr., D.D., Gospeler, the Rt. Rev'd John A. Baden, D.D., Prayers of the People, and the Rev'd Claud W. McCauley, Rector of All Saints Church, served as Deacon.

CONVENING OF THE COUNCIL

The Rt. Rev'd Robert B. Hall, D.D., Bishop of Virginia, called the Council to order at 10:21 a.m. as President of the Council. The secretary of the Diocese, Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer, reported a quorum present in both orders.

ELECTION OF SECRETARY AND

APPOINTMENT OF ASSISTANT SECRETARY

On motion of Mrs. Charles W. Shields, Jr. of St. Stephen's, Richmond and president of the Episcopal Churchwomen of the Diocese, moved the election of Mr. E. Holcombe Palmer as secretary of the Council. This was seconded by the Rev'd James P. Lincoln, Emmanuel Church, Harrisonburg. Mr. Palmer was elected secretary.

Bishop Hall, acting under the Rules of Order $(N\phi. 4)$, appointed the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., Rector, St. Matthew's, Richmond as assistant secretary.

APPOINTMENT OF PARLIAMENTARIAN

Bishop Hall appointed A. Hugo Blankingship, Jr., Esquire, Truro, Fairfax and Chancellor of the Diocese, as the parliamentarian for this Special Council as provided under Rule of Order No. 8.

ADOPTION OF RULES OF ORDER

The President recognized A. Hugo Blankingship, Jr., Esquire, Chancellor of the Diocese, who called the Council's attention to the constitutional provisions as printed in the Program of Council which are:

> Article V, last paragraph: "In a vote by orders each clerical delegate and each lay delegate shall be entitled to one vote."

Article VII: "The election of a bishop shall be made at a regular meeting of the Council, or at a Special Meeting of the Council called for that purpose. The vote shall be by ballot and by orders and a concurrent majority of the votes cast by each order shall be necessary to a choice." 2.

Mr. Blankingship then moved the following resolution dealing with the proposed Rules of Order which resolution was printed in the Program of Council as follows:

PROPOSED RULES OF ORDER

BE IT RESOLVED: that the Rules of Order as adopted by the 184th Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia on January 19, 1979, be adopted as the Rules of Order of the Special Council of the Diocese held in All Saints Church, Richmond, Virginia, on October 6, 1979, as they may be applicable; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the following special Rules of Order be adopted for the government of the said Special Council:

- The President shall appoint judges or tellers of election, who need not be members of the Council, the number of judges or tellers so appointed to be left to the discretion of the President.
- If there is no election of a Suffragan Bishop by 9:00 P.M., the President may in his sole discretion recess the Council to the following day or a latter day, declaring that no election has been had.
- 3. After the receipt of the report of the Nominating Committee, the Chair shall call for nominations for the office of Suffragan Bishop from the floor. Nominating speeches for those nominated from the floor shall be limited to five minutes. There shall be no nominating speeches for those nominated by the Nominating Committee.
- 4. After the nominations are closed, there may be two seconding speeches for each person nominated, whether by the Committee or from the floor, which speeches shall be limited to three minutes each.
- 5. Only delegates or alternates who have been certified by the Committee on Credentials shall be eligible to vote in any ballot, and in the event a delegate absents himself from the Council, his alternate shall not be permitted to vote until his eligibility to vote has been certified by the Secretary. The President shall announce the procedures for permitting an alternate to vote and for replacing a lost ballot.
- 6. Rule 9 of the Rules of Order of the 184th Annual Council which calls for dropping nominees after the first and subsequent ballots shall not apply to the election of a Suffragan Bishop. Those nominated, both by the Nominating Committee and from the floor, shall remain nominees unless they personally request that their name be withdrawn from further consideration.

The Rev'd Claud W. McCauley, Rector, All Saints, Richmond seconded Mr. Blankingship's motion. There was no discussion and the Council adopted the Proposed Rules of Order Resolution.

REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

The President called on the Rev'd E. A. deBordenave, chairman of the Credentials Committee, who reported for the committee as follows: "The Committee reports that there have been numerous changes in the delegates attending this Special Meeting since the last regular Council in January 1979.

I report that your Credentials Committee, in accordance with Canon II, Sect. 7, of the Diocesan Canons, has verified the Certificates of Election of the Lay Delegates, finds that they are in order and have certified that the clergy registered for this Special Council are in accordance with Section 1 of Canon I, 'Ordained ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia'."

On motion of Mr. Thomas C. Rohr, St. Paul's, Alexandria and seconded by Mrs. E. Hunter Fox, All Saints, Richmond was by vote accepted.

Bishop Hall announced that those clergy present at this Special Council, under license of the bishop, and those who have not formally been accepted by letter dimissory, are not entitled to vote.

INTRODUCTION OF ECUMENICAL OBSERVERS

Bishop Hall introduced to the Council, first Mrs. Ebbe C. Hoff, Ecumenical Officer of the Diocese and then the ecumenical observers who were seated in the choir stall at the Bishop's left. The Council rose and applauded the ecumenical observers.

The Rev'd Nicholas Dombalis of the Greek Orthodox Cathedral of Sts. Constantine and Helen, spoke shortly and introduced His Excellency Metropolitan Silas of New York, who gave his greeting to the Special Council.

REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Bishop Hall introduced Mrs. James S. Lacy, St. Paul's, Alexandria, chairman of the Nominating Committee, appointed by him with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. Mrs. Lacy, affectionately known throughout the Diocese as Bettie, advised the Council that the report of the Nominating Committee had been printed as a supplement to the September issue of <u>THE VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN</u> and had been distributed throughout the <u>Diocese</u> one month in advance of this meeting and that in brief the committee had:

--- Pledged itself to accuracy of information on all candidates

- --- Resolved to use THE VIRGINIA CHURCHMAN as the best method and the cheapest method to disseminate the Committee's Report
- --- Had consulted with the Rt. Rev'd David E. Richards of the House of Bishops Pastoral Development Committee
- --- Considered developing a tape/slide presentation this was ruled out because of timing and of cost

- --- Concurred with Bishop Hall that the Bishop elected should be consecrated at the 1980 Annual Council
- --- That throughout the various meetings of the committee, there was devoted dedication to the task, a togetherness of the committee and that all were loving Christians

PRESENTATION OF NOMINEES

Mrs. Lacy advised that two persons nominated by the committee had requested that their names be withdrawn because of personal reasons. They are the Rev'd Bertram N. Herlong, Vicar of Trinity Church and St. Paul's Chapel, New York City and the Rev'd Albert Theodore Eastman, Rector of St. Alban's Parish, Washington, D. C.; thereby, the slate which had been ten in number was now eight.

Mrs. Lacy, on behalf of the committee, then nominated the following clergy for election as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia:

> The Rev'd Henry C. Barton, Jr. The Rev'd Allen W. Brown, Jr. The Rev'd D. Raby Edwards The Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr. The Rev'd Henry B. Mitchell The Rev'd Edward Morgan III The Rev'd William S. Pregnall The Rev'd Martin R. Tilson

The nominations were seconded and Bishop Hall declared that the slate presented by the Nominating Committee was before the Special Council.

NOMINATIONS FROM THE FLOOR

At 10:50 a.m., Bishop Hall then called for nominations from the floor. After a space, Mr. A. R. Dunning, Christ Church, Millwood, moved that the nominations be closed. This was seconded. The voice vote taken clearly indicated approval and Bishop Hall ruled the nominations closed.

The Rev'd Charles G. Leavell, retired, of Charlottesville rose and pleaded that the President test if this is the will of Council as it appears to some that Mr. Dunning's resolution may be considered railroading.

Mr. A. R. Dunning expressed in succinct terms that he was not trying to railroad and that in his judgment, a sufficient time

had elasped after the Chair called for nominations from the floor. Mr. Dunning then withdrew his resolution to close the nominations and moved that the matter be reconsidered. The reconsideration motion was seconded. The Bishop called for a vote and it was adopted. Bishop Hall then declared that the nominations from the floor were open.

The Rev'd John W. Howe, Rector, Truro, Fairfax, moved the nomination of the Rev'd Alden M. Hathaway, Rector, St. Christopher's, Springfield. Mr. Howe's nomination was seconded and Bishop Hall ruled that the Rev'd Alden M. Hathaway was a nominee for the office of Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese.

The President of Council then called for other nominations from the floor.

After a full minute no further nominations were made and Bishop Hall asked the pleasure of the Council. At 10:54 a.m., upon motion of the Rev'd Dr. Richard L. Stinston, Rector, St. James's, Mt. Vernon, which was seconded, the nominations were closed and the Council voted to close the nominations for the office of Suffragan Bishop.

NOMINATING SPEECHES

Bishop Hall as President informed the Council that in line with the resolution adopted concerning the Rules of Order and the Special Rule of Order No. 3, that the Chair would receive nominating speeches, those nominated from the floor to be limited to five minutes, and that there would be no nominating speeches for those nominated by the Nominating Committee since information concerning these persons had been before the Council approximately thirty days.

The Rev'd John W. Howe gave a five minute nominating speech in support of the Rev'd Alden M. Hathaway at 11:00 a.m.

He then advised that there may be in accordance with the Special Rules of Order, No. 4, seconding speeches for each person nominated, whether by the committee or from the floor, which speeches shall be limited to three minutes each.

Mr. Thomas C. Rohr, St. Paul's, Alexandria and the Very Rev'd William H. Brake, Jr., Rector of St. Stephen's, Culpeper, gave seconding speeches for nominee, the Rev'd D. Raby Edwards at 11:10 a.m.

The Rev'd Dr. Boyd R. Howarth, retired, Richmond, gave a seconding speech for the Rev'd Henry C. Barton, Jr. at 11:44 a.m.

THE REV'D ALLEN W. BROWN, JR.

Dr. Wesley N. Mathews of St. Michael's, Arlington gave a seconding speech for nominee, the Rev'd Allen W. Brown, Jr. at 11:46 a.m.

The President ruled that in conformance with the Special Rule of Order and since all nominees have had at least one nominating speech, the Chair declared seconding speeches completed.

NOONDAY PRAYER

The hour being 11:52 a.m., the Bishop requested the Rev'd Robert C. Hall, Jr., Rector, St. George's, Arlington and chairman of the Bishop's Liturgical Committee, to lead the Council in Noonday Prayer.

Bishop Hall called for the first ballot at 12:04 p.m. and closed the first ballot at 12:26 p.m.

The Council was in recess after delegates voted on ballot one (No. 1), at which time delegates had lunch.

REPORT ON FIRST BALLOT

At 1:05 p.m. Council resumed business and Bishop Hall announced that the results of ballot one were at hand and asked the Secretary to announce the results. There was no election. (See Page <u>9</u> for tabulation on Ballot One).

SECOND BALLOT

The second ballot was taken and Bishop Hall announced the ballot closed at 1:20 p.m.

REPORT ON SECOND BALLOT

Bishop Hall announced that the Head Teller, Col. John S. Sullivan, Jr. had presented the report on ballot two. The Secretary announced at 1:40 p.m. that there was no election. (See Page 9 for tabulation on Ballot Two.)

THIRD BALLOT

Bishop Hall called for the third ballot which was taken and this ballot was closed at 1:56 p.m.

REPORT ON THIRD BALLOT

Bishop Hall received the report of the Head Teller on the third ballot and announced that there was no election at 2:20 p.m.

FOURTH BALLOT

Bishop Hall called for the fourth ballot. The Rev'd Dr. Richard L. Stinson advised Council that he had been authorized by the Rev'd William S. Pregnall to have his name withdrawn. The Chair ruled that the name of the Rev'd William S. Pregnall be struck on the fourth ballot. Bishop Hall declared the fourth ballot closed at 2:40 p.m.

REPORT ON THE FOURTH BALLOT

At 3:02 p.m., Bishop Hall announced that the result of the fourth ballot was at hand and asked the Secretary to announce the report. Mr. Palmer reported that on the fourth ballot the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr., having received a majority of the ballots cast in both the clerical and the lay orders had been elected Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia.

The Council rose applauding and sang the Doxology.

Mr. Donald Paschal, St. Christopher's, Springfield, moved that the election of Bishop-elect be unanimous. This was seconded and Council affirmed the unanimous vote. Bishop Hall announced that the election could only be official if the majority of lay and clerical delegates signed the Testimonials of Election and asked the Secretary to have the necessary testimonial sheets on the tables in front of the chancel so that they might be properly signed and called attention to the statement on the Testimonial of Election.

He then asked the delegates of St. Matthew's Church, Richmond and Mrs. David H. Lewis to come to the chancel, after which Bishop Hall presented the Rev'd David H. Lewis, Jr. to the Council and the Bishop-elect responded briefly but in a very moving way to the action of Council in electing him.

We, whose names are hereunder written, fully sensible how important it is that the Sacred Order and Office of a Bishop should not be unworthily conferred, and firmly persuaded that it is our duty to bear testimony on this solemn occasion without partiality or affection, do, in the presence of Almighty God, testify that

The Reverend David Henry Lewis, Jr.

is not, so far as we are informed, justly liable to evil report, either for error in religion or for viciousness of life; and that we know of no impediment on account of which he ought not to be ordained and consecrated to that Holy Office. We do, moreover, jointly and severally declare that we believe him to be of such sufficiency in good learning, of such soundness in the Faith, and of such virtuous and pure manners and godly conversation, that he is apt and meet to exercise the Office of a Bishop to the honour of God and the edifying of His Church, and to be a wholesome example to the flock of Christ.
