

Report to the 2025 Convention of the Diocese of Virginia


Created by the Council of the Diocese of Virginia in 1919 and incorporated in 1920 to "own and operate a system of schools," Church Schools in the Diocese of Virginia (CSDV) operated in the 2024-2025 academic year as six separately accredited educational institutions: Christchurch, Stuart Hall, St. Catherine's, St. Christopher's, St. Margaret's, and St. Stephen's and St. Agnes.

Three full-time officers work across the entire system. President Henry Broaddus, Vice President and Treasurer Chip Broadway, and Corporate Secretary and Assistant Treasurer Lea McCormick constitute this executive team, and they work closely with the system's Board of Trustees, the Heads of School, their leadership teams, and the schools' Boards of Governors.

CSDV's structure facilitates mutually beneficial relationships and opportunities for collaboration among school leaders.

The Heads of School have access to peers at other schools. The business officers from the schools compare notes regularly and work through CSDV as a single entity for insurance, audit services, legal counsel, employee retirement plans and health benefits. The CSDV chaplains connect several times per year to share reflections and insights.

All of the schools strive to create supportive, diverse, and inclusive communities that, in the words of the baptismal covenant, "strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being."



Growth and strong demand characterized much of the CSDV system for the 2024-2025 academic year, especially in the lower schools of the three day schools. Meanwhile, Stuart Hall increased its number of boarding students for a fourth consecutive year, and Christchurch had its first graduating class ever with as many girls as boys.

However, a lack of significant growth and strong demand at St. Margaret's, reflecting a national trend for all-girls boarding schools, led the CSDV Board of Trustees to decide in early July — after thorough deliberation and with great sadness — not to reopen the school for the 2025-2026 school year.

This decision followed a notification of risk to parents and employees in early June, and it came after more than a decade of declines in student enrollment and tuition revenue. Signed enrollment contracts by the time of the decision would have accounted for only 19% of the school's operating budget.



Despite heroic support by St. Margaret's alumnae and donors, the Trustees saw no viable path for the school to return to financial sustainability.

For 104 years, St. Margaret's educated girls who left Tappahannock prepared to make a positive contribution to the world. To quote from *A Brief History of St. Margaret's School*, which observed its 90th anniversary, "At its center, St. Margaret's is and has always been ... about empowering the girls to discover the women they will become, teaching them that they can achieve their highest potential and, in doing so, enrich the lives of others, giving them the moral and spiritual foundation that will allow them to grow in grace."



Even in the midst of shared sadness and a profound sense of loss, nothing diminishes the distinguished heritage of St. Margaret's. Its legacy endures in those whose lives have been touched by the school, and the spirit of St. Margaret's will live on forever.

Many of the girls at St. Margaret's for the 2024-2025 year chose to continue their education at another CSDV boarding school, including six students who enrolled at Stuart Hall School this fall and sixteen who enrolled at Christchurch. The chaplain from St. Margaret's and its longest-serving faculty member, a Latin teacher, are working this year at Christchurch School, which is able to offer Latin classes for the first time in many years. All of the students in upper-level Latin are transfers from St. Margaret's.

- Record-breaking year for philanthropy: Recorded the largest planned gift intention (\$5M+) in school history; nearly \$600,000 raised during annual "Give Day"
- State championships in golf, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field; state runner-up in softball; 4 league championships







- Successfully completed an admission cycle resulting in the largest and most racially diverse student body in school history for 2025-2026 1,039 students, 18.4% students of color
- Record-breaking year of philanthropy, with \$17.8 million raised in cash and pledges
- Tenth-anniversary celebration of The Center for the Study of Boys, marked with special speakers and parent programming
- Facilities enhancements including a new track, a new baseball press box and the renovation of the Upper School library
- Recipient of the Virginia Prep League Director's Cup, representing all-around athletic excellence, for a record ninth consecutive year







- Celebration of centennial year with events on- and off-campus
- Opening of the renovated and expanded Upper School building, which features new classrooms, studios, a student commons and a dining hall
- Workshops to educate students and teachers about artificial intelligence tools and to provide students with personalized guidance
- Robust strategic planning process, including focus-group conversations and surveys
- Launch of campus master planning process to evaluate facilities and to imagine how physical spaces can better support mission, student experience and programmatic goals







- Fourth consecutive year of growth in boarding enrollment
- State championship for VISAA Division IV boys' basketball
- Restarting of varsity-level teams for boys soccer and girls volleyball
- Launch of a self-study on the school's Episcopal identity, added a lay chaplain, and reintroduced a religious studies course
- Implementation of a new, individualized professional development program for faculty
- Addition of a full-time Director of Human Resources to support faculty and staff
